PLAN OF EXAMINATION.

EXCERPT FROM RULES OF EXAMINATION.

All examinations shall be in writing, both questions and answers. The examination on each book shall consist of not less than 25 nor more than 50 questions of the catechetical order requiring short, specific answers; and not less than 5, nor more than 10, general questions, broad in their scope, so as to give an idea of the real learning and mental grasp of the student. The examination shall be marked on the scale of 100, the combined catechetical questions counting 50, and the combined general questions counting 50 and a mark of 70 on the whole examination shall be necessary to pass the candidate. (Conference minutes 1894, page 67, amended.)

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED MARCH 21, 1896.

Resolved 1. "No candidate shall be admitted or advanced in classes with conditions, who has failed in more than one major or two minor studies.

Resolved 2. "In no case shall a candidate for full admission be received nor a candidate for Elder's orders be so elected until every requirement shall have been fully met."

RESOLUTION ADOPTED MARCH 27, 1899.

Resolved, That we deem it unwise hereafter to accept certificates of standing in English branches, but will require all candidates to appear before our own Board of Examiners.

Rules of Order.

I. DUTIES OF THE PRESIDENT.

1. The President shall call the Conference to order, punctually, at all times determined upon for the opening of its sessions, have each opened by appropriate devotional exercises, and see that all the business pertaining to the Conference shall be brought forward and transacted in a proper and orderly manner, according to the provisions of the Discipline and the Rules of the Conference.

2. He shall preserve order in all the proceedings, holding speakers strictly to the question, and call them to order when they wander from the point, violate the Rules of Order , or use any improp

er language. 3. He shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference by any two members.

4. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.

5. When two or more members claim the floor at the same time, he shall decide who is entitled thereto.

II. DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY.

1. The Secretary shall keep a fair and correct record of all the proceedings of the Conference, to be read at the opening of each session, subject to correction by the Conference.

2. He shall carefully preserve the journal and papers of the Conference placed in his custody, and shall not allow any person but a member to examine the same nor allow any one to take a transcript from either, without the permission of the Conference; he shall produce the journals and papers at each annual session, and see that the same be forwarded to the General Conference.

3. In an appendix prepared for that purpose, he shall record all reports and documents ordered upon record by the Conference, and all documents so recorded shall be referred to on the journal.

III. DUTIES AND PRIVILEGES OF MEMBERS.

1. Each member of the Conference will be expected and required to be present at the opening of each session to participate in the devotional exercises, unless unavoidably detained; and no member may absent himself, without leave, from the seat of the Conference.

2. When a member would speak on any question, he shall arise in his place and respectfully address the President; refrain from all personalities and discourteous language; and no member shall speak more than once on the same question until every other member who so desires shall have spoken (except, simply to explain when misrepresented), nor shall any one speak longer than fif-

teen minutes without the consent of the Conference. 3. When a member is called to order by the President, or by any member through him, he shall take his seat until the point of order is decided by the President.

4. Any member may call for the division of the question, which shall be granted when, in the judgment of the President, the same will admit of it.

5. When a question has been decided by a vote of Conference, any member who may have voted with the prevailing side, may move for a reconsideration of the same.

6. It shall be in order for any member, during the discussion of any proposition before the Conference (except in the examination of character) to move the "previous question", and if such motion is seconded by a majority of the members present, the question shall be immediately put.

7. Any member may demand the " yeas and nays" upon any question, and if one-fifth of the members present, and voting, shall second such demand, the vote shall be taken.

8. Any member may object to the reading of a paper, and when such objection is made the reading shall be dispensed with, unless the Conference, without debate, shall otherwise order.

9. No motion, unless seconded, shall be entertained; and all motions and resolutions shall be reduced to writing by the member presenting them, if so desired by the President, Secretary, or any member of the Conference.

10. When a motion is made, seconded and entertained by the President, it shall be in possession of the Conference, but it may be withdrawn at any time by the mover with the consent of the seconder before a decision is had thereon, or an amendment entertained by the President.

11. A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, except when a member has the floor, when such a motion cannot be made without his consent.

12 In discussing the reports of committees, the chairman of the committee whose report is under consideration, or such members of the same as the committee may agree upon, shall be entitled to close the debate.

IV. OUESTIONS TO BE TAKEN WITHOUT DEBATE.

1.-All motions, simply, to adjourn.

2.-All motions to lay on the table.

3.-Motions on the "previous question".

4.—Demand for "yeas and nays".

5.—All appeals from the decision of the President, except that the appellant shall state the reason for his appeal and the President the reason for his ruling.

6.-All motions for extension of time, either of a member on the floor, or the session of Conference

7.-All motions to re-commit.

8.—All motions to place documents, reports, or other papers on record.

All questions that may arise in the course of Conference proceedings, not determinable by these Rules of Order, shall be determined by the President, in accordance with established parliamentary law subject to appeal to the Conference.

JOURNAL.

First Day-Wednesday, March 20, 1901.

The thirty-third session of the Wilmington Annual Conference convened in Grace Methodist Episcopal Church, Wilmington, Del., March 20, 1901, Bishop Daniel A. Goodsell, D. D., L.L. D., presiding. The Conference joined in singing the 798th hymn, Bishop Goodsell read the Scriptures and, assisted by the Presiding Elders, administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Roll-Call.—The Secretary of the last Conference, A. S. Mowbray, called the roll and 130 members and 13 probationers answered to their names.

Organization.—On motion of T. E. Martindale, A. S. Mowbray was reelected Secretary by acclamation, and named R. K. Stephenson, J. D. Rigg, W. A. Wise and Z. H. Webster as his assistants and they were confirmed.

On motion of C. W. Prettyman, W. R. Mowbray was by acclamation reelected Statistical Secretary and nominated as his assistants H. A. G. Westerfield, G. P. Jones, J. H. Geoghegan, L. E. Poole, G. R. Ellis, W. E. Greenfield, J. L. Johnson, and H. B. Kelso, who were approved.

On motion of L. E. Barrett, H. G. Budd was elected Treasurer of the Conference by acclamation, and named as his assistants, E. C. Atkins, J. M. Lindale, Jno. Arters, A. Green, J. W. Prettyman, H. S. Goldey, A. H. Covey, Edwin Gardner, F. X. Moore, G. C. Williams, F. N. Faulkner, W. R. Hirons and W. O. Bennett, and they were confirmed.

Standing Committees.—Robt. Watt, on behalf of the Presiding Elders, read the nominations for the Standing Committees and they were confirmed. (See list.)

On motion of V. S. Gollins, a committee of three was appointed to whom persons, not General Conference Officers, desiring to address the Conference shall apply, namely, W. L. S. Murray, J. M. Lindale and W. R. MacFarlane.

On motion of W. F. Corkran, a committee of three was appointed on the Episcopal Fund, consisting of I. G. Fosnocht, L. P. Corkran, T. E. Terry.

Hours.—On motion of Robt. Watt, the hours for meeting and adjournment were made 8.30 and 11.45 a. m., the first half hour to be used in devotional services.

On motion of C. W. Prettyman, the bar of the Conference was fixed to include the seventh line of pews from the front.

Bishop Goodsell.—Bishop Goodsell then addressed the Conference briefly in cheering and helpful words of greeting and counsel.

"Gospel in all Lands".—On motion of W. F. Corkran, E. C. Wright was appointed to canvass for the "Gospel in all Lands".

Board of Stewards.—On motion of T. E. Martindale, the Conference elected the Ministerial members of the Board of Stewards. The Presiding Elders nominating P. H. Rawlins, J. A. Arters, C. W. Prettyman, and John France and the Secretary casting the ballot of the Conference.

Auditing Committee.—C. A. Grise asked the appointment of a special Auditing Committee to pass upon his accounts as Treasurer of the Conference. The Committee was appointed, one from each District and one at large, as follows: Alfred Smith, H. S. Dulany, S. M. Morgan, J. W. Easley and J. T. VauBurkalow.

Post Master.—On motion of Robt. Watt, J. T. Prouse was elected Conference Post Master.

Drafts.—Drafts on the Book Concern for \$544.00 and on the Chartered Fund for \$22.00 were ordered in favor of the Board of Stewards.

Dr. Spencer.—Dr.W. A. Spencer, Corresponding Secretary of the Church Extension Society was then introduced and addressed the Conference.

Dr. Martindale in the Chair.—Bishop Goodsell called T. E. Martindale to the chair.

Limit on Reports.—On motion of V. S. Collins, the Conference directed that the Statistical Secretary and the Treasurer do not receive any reports or monies after noon on Friday of the present session. On motion of A. S. Mowbray the proper officers then received the envelopes containing reports and monies and were permitted to retire.

P. H. Rawlins made request that all claims upon the Board of Stewards be handed in at once.

B. F. Price.—J. D. Rigg offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

WHEREAS, Our dear brother, Benjamin F. Price has, for the first time in 64 years, failed to answer to his name at the roll-call of the Conference, therefore

Resolved. That as a Conference we thank God for this marvellous record; that we will pray for him in these days of bodily infirmity, and that we instruct our

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Secretary to write Bro. Price a letter expressive of our sympathy with him in his affliction and deprivation.

John France made announcement concerning the 20th Century Thank Offering.

Credits.—On motion of V. P. Northrup, the Conference directed that credits be given for studies upon presentation of proper certificates from such of our schools as are approved by the University Senate.

Rules.—On motion of A. S. Mowbray the Rules governing previous sessions were adopted for the government of this session.

W. P. Compton and J. D. Reese were excused to attend funerals and O. W. DeVenish to attend a wedding.

Bishop Goodsell resumed the chair.

Seaford.—On motion of C. S. Baker, R. K. Stephenson made a statement concerning the change of the place of Conference from Seaford to Wilmington, showing the keen regret of the good people of Seaford in their enforced disappointment. On motion of T. E. Martindale, it was directed that a committee to express to the people of Seaford both the gratitude and regret of the Conference in the case, be appointed, to consist of one from each district. The committee was named as follows: V. S. Collins, C. T. Wyatt, G. L. Hardesty, H. S. Thompson.

Notices.—The Committees were then called, announcements were made and Conference adjourned with the Doxology, R. W. Todd pronouncing the Benediction.

Second Day.—Thursday Morning.

Opening.—The Conference convened at 8.30 o'clock with Bishop Goodsell in the chair, the first half hour being spent in devotional services conducted by Bishop Goodsell.

Journal.—The Secretary then read the Journal of yesterday's session and it was approved. The roll of absentees was called, twelve members answering to their names. The further calling of the roll was then dispensed with.

Constitution.—On motion of T. E. Martindale the vote upon the adoption of the Constitution of the Methodist Episcopal Church was made the order of the day for Saturday morning at 10 o'clock.

Reports.—E C. Atkins, in behalf of the Treasurer, called the list of those who had failed to hand in their reports.

Centenary Fund.—P. H. Rawlins presented the following resolution which was adopted:—

WHEREAS, the "Trustees of the Centenary Fund of the Wilmington Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church", a corporation of the State of Delaware, has become dissolved, by reason of the expiration of its charter. And

WHEREAS, of the Trustees living at the time of said dissolution, only two thereof, viz: Rev. William L. S. Murray, and Henry C. Robinson, are now living. Now therefore be it

Resolved, that this Conference shall elect at its present session, three Ministerial Trustees and two Lay Trustees, to fill the vacancies now existing in the Board of Trustees, for the purpose of settling the affairs of said corporation, as provided by Statute in that behalf.

The following were then elected Trustees as provided in the foregoing resolution:—R. H. Adams, W. E. Avery, T. E. Terry, H. F. Pickles and G. W. Todd.

Question 13.—The Thirteenth Question "Was the Character of each Preacher examined?" was then taken up. C. S. Baker, Presiding Elder of Dover District, was then called, his character passed. In answer to the question from Bishop Goodsell he declared there was nothing against any effective Elder upon his District and then read a report of his work. The effective Elders of the District were then called and they reported as to the method of taking their collections, and the amount secured for the Conference Claimants.

W. F. Corkran, Presiding Elder of Easton District was called and his character passed. There being nothing against the effective Elders of his District, he read a report of his work. The names of the effective Elders were called and they made their reports.

T. E. Martindale, Presiding Elder of Salisbury District was called, his character passed and he read his report. The effective Elders of the District were called, their characters passed and they reported their collections.

Robert Watt, Presiding Elder of Wilmington District was called, his character passed and having reported that there was nothing against the character of any effective Elder on Wilmington District, he read the report of his work. The effective Elders of the District were then called and they reported their collections.

Introductions.—The following visiting brethren were then introduced, Dr. W. L. Davidson, of East Ohio Conference, Dr. L. T. Widerman, of the Baltimore Conference, Dr. W. W. King, L. P. Karholsen and E. H. Thrasher, recently transferred to this Conference, and Rev. J. J. Huston of the First United Presbyterian Church of Wilmington. Dr. Widerman spoke concerning the work of the Maryland Bible Society, and Dr. Davidson spoke concerning the work of the American University, which he represents.

Question 23.—The Twenty-third Question, "Who are the Superannuated Preachers?" was taken up. The time was extended. James Carroll, Edward Davis, James Esgate, J. W. Hammersley, C. J. Hammit, G. A. Phoebus, B. F. Price, W. F. Talbot, W. E. Tomkinson, F. O. B. Wallin, W. M. Warner, were called, their characters passed and their relation was continued.

Change of Relations.—The relation of J. S. Wickline, T. H. Harding and C. F. Sheppard were changed from Effective to Supernumerary at their own request,

and the cases of Bros. Harding and Sheppard were referred to the Board of Stewards for favorable consideration.

H. G. Budd was given permission to make some changes in the list of his assistants.

Excused.—T. F. Beauchamp was excused to attend a funeral.

The Committees were called, notices were given, and Conference adjourned with the Doxology, Edward Davis pronouncing the Benediction.

Third Day-Friday Morning.

Opening.—Conference convened at 8.30 o'clock, Bishop Goodsell in the chair and conducting the half hour devotional services.

The Journal of the preceding session was read and approved.

Methodist Review.—On motion of C. S. Baker, W. P. Taylor was appointed to canvass the Conference for subscribers to the Methodist Review.

To Edit Reports.—On motion of R. H. Adams, the Secretaries were authorized to edit the various reports to appear in the Conference Minutes.

On motion of V. S. Collins, such brethren as were not present at the roll-call were permitted to report to the Secretary and be marked present.

Question 9.—The Ninth Question, "What Members are in Studies of Fourth Year?" was taken up. The several members of the Third Year Class were called, their characters passed and, after the Registrar had reported their examinations, upon motion of the Presiding Elders, Omar E. Jones, John W. Jones, Harry Taylor and Evart C. Wright were advanced to the Studies of the Fourth Year. Floyd E. Bloxton, Frederick X. Moore, and Edward H. Dashiell were given credit for the studies passed and were continued in Studies of the Third Year.

Dr. Sitterly.—Dr. Charles F. Sitterly, Professor of Biblical Literature, of Drew Seminary was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Robert Watt presented the following resolution which was adopted.

Resolved that we have heard with interest and profit Professor Sitterly, who represents Drew Seminary, and we pledge anew our hearty sympathy and loyal support of this school of the prophets.

Question 7.—The Seventh Question, "Who have been admitted into Full Membership?" was taken up. John L. Johnson, Wm. E, Wright, Andrew H. Covey, Edward N. Cantwell and George W. Dawson were called before the Conference, the usual Disciplinary questions were propounded and Bishop Goodsell addressed the class and the Conference.

Bishop Foss.—Bishop C. D. Foss was presented to the Conference.

John L. Johnson was admitted to Full Membership and elected to Deacon's Orders. Wm. E. Wright was discontinued and the Presiding Elders were given

permission to employ him. Andrew H. Covey was continued on trial in Studies of the Third Year on account of health. George W. Dawson was admitted, being already a Deacon, and he was excused from further persuit of the course of study. Edward N. Cantwell was, on account of health, continued on trial in Studies of the Fourth Year and excused from work. Bishop Goodsell spoke affectingly of the needs of this brother and a collection in his behalf was taken.

Professor Morgan.—Prof. J. H. Morgan of Dickinson College was introduced and spoke concerning that institution.

E. N. Cantwell.—The collection for Brother Cantwell was reported as \$304, and was presented to him by Bishop Goodsell in appropriate words. Brother Cantwell publicly thanked the Conference and congregation for their noble gift.

On motion of C. W. Prettyman the time was extended.

Question 30.—The Thirtieth Question, "Where shall the next Conference be held?" was called. There being no invitations presented, the matter was referred to the Presiding Elders.

On motion of T. E. Martindale, the reading of the report of the Trustees of the Wilmington Conference Academy was made the order of the day tomorrow morning immediately after the reading of the Journal.

Closing.—Committees were called, notices given, and Conference adjourned with the Doxology, Bishop Foss pronouncing the Benediction.

Fourth Day.—Saturday Morning.

Opening.—Conference convened at 8.30 o'clock with Bishop Goodsell presiding and conducting the half hour devotional services.

The Journal was read and approved.

Question 10.—The Tenth Question "What Members have Completed the Conference Course of Study?" was taken up. John W. Prettyman, Daniel J. Givan and Jas. W. Talley were called, their characters passed, and after report by the Registrar, upon motion of the Presiding Elders, they were advanced in their studies and elected to Elders orders. George W. Dawson was advanced in his studies and elected to Elders orders under the Seminary rule.

Question II.—The Eleventh Question, "What others have been elected and ordained Deacons?" was taken up. The recommendations of Thomas S. Barrett, and Wm. F. Atkinson were announced. The Registrar reported, and credits for books passed were allowed, and the Presiding Elders were permitted to withdraw the applications because of a failure to pass the examinations.

Conference Academy.—The order of the day, the report of the Trustees of the Conference Academy was taken up and T. E. Martindale, vice-president of the Board, read the report. V. S. Collins, Robert Watt, J. T. Van Burkalow, W. F.

Corkran, W. L. S. Murray and R. H. Adams addressed the Conference concerning the needs of the Academy. During the discussions Robert Watt was called to the chair for a time.

Dr. Buckley.—Dr. J, M. Buckley was introduced and addressed the Conference in the interests of The Christian Advocate.

Bishop Goodsell called C. S. Baker to the chair.

Prof. Cross.—Prof. Elmer L. Cross, principal-elect of the Conference Academy was introduced and spoke concerning his prospective work.

Academy Debt.—The following resolutions and nominations were then presented by W. F. Corkran, which with the report of the Trustees of the Conference Academy were unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

The Board of Trustees of the Conference Academy, as a practical measure for raising the debt, would recommend that the entire amount be carefully apportioned to the several pastoral charges, and that a supreme effort be made to raise the amount in each charge upon the first or second Sunday in June, next, to be known as Conference Academy Debt-Paying Day, and that the money be paid to the Treasurer of the Academy on or before the first day of July. We further recommend the appointment of a Committee of twelve, three from each District, the Presiding Elder, one minister and one Layman, to make a careful apportionment of the debt to the various charges and to superintend its collection.

We further recommend the following persons to compose the Committee:—Dover District, C. S. Baker, Alfred Smith, J. E. Carroll, Wm. Saulsbury; Easton District, W. F. Corkran, J. A. Arters, Dr. A. E. Sudler, J. H. Bernard; Salisbury District, T. E. Martindale, C. A. Hill, W. H. Jackson, D. J. Foulks: Wilmington District, Robert Watt, W. L. S. Murray, G. W. Todd, W. R. Flinn.

Academy Trustees.—On motion of C. W. Prettyman, T. E. Terry, T. A. H. O'Brien, E. C. Atkins were appointed to nominate persons to fill vacancies in the Board of Trustees of the Conference Academy.

The Presiding Elders were made a Committee to nominate Triers of Appeals.

To Print Report.—On motion of G. T. Alderson, the President of the Board of Trustees of the Conference Academy was instructed to have the report of that body printed for distribution.

Question 22.—The Twenty-second Question "Who are the Supernumerary Preachers?" was taken np. Warren Burr, John France, W. M. Green, S. J. Morris, P. H. Rawlins, J. O. Sypherd, J. R. Todd, were called, their characters passed and their relation continued. The relation of W. L. P. Bowen, T. H. Haynes, J. B. Merritt, J. W. Poole, W. W. Redman, J. D. Rigg, and G. W. Wilcox were changed to Superannuated. A. T. Scott was made effective and the Conference requested that he be appointed editor of the "Christian Companion."

Conference Claimants.—Permission was given to the Board of Stewards to consider all the needy cases that might properly come before them,

Conference Relations.—E. C. Macnichol, Chairman of the Committee on Conference Relations presented the names of J. M. Collins and O. S. Walton, recommending that they be given the Supernumerary relation. The motion was had in the case of Bro. Collins, but the case of Bro. Walton was deferred until his Presiding Elder could communicate with him.

Question 5.—The Fifth Question, "Who have been Continued on Trial?" was taken up. Joseph E. Gallagher, Howard Davis, Clarence N. Jones were given credits in studies and continued in the first year. John M. Arters, Wm. C. Poole, Goldsborough W. Hastings and Wm. E. Greenfield were continued and advanced to the studies of the second year, the latter two being required to make up one book each.

Dr. Mason.—M. C. B. Mason, Secretary of the Freedman's Aid and Southern Education Society was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Closing.—Committees were called, notices given, and Conference adjourned with the Doxology, Dr. Mason pronouncing the Benediction.

Fifth Day.-Monday Morning.

Opening.—Conference convened at 8.30 o'clock, Bishop Goodsell in the chair and conducting the devotions.

The Journal of Saturdays session was read and approved.

Board of Stewards.—P. H. Rawlins presented a preliminary report of the Board of Stewards which was adopted.

Question 15.—The Fifteenth Question "Who Have Died?" was taken up. The Secretary announced the death during the year of C. P. Swain, D. F. Waddell, H. C. Boivie, B. F. Price. Robt. Watt was given permission to provided memorial notices of H. C. Boivie and B. F. Price to be printed in the minutes.

Question 4.—The Fourth Question "Who Have Been Received on Trial?" was taken up. Wm. R. Hirons, Chas. W. Smith, Jefferson M. Geoghegan and Wm. H. Kenney were presented their recommendations announced, the committees reported and they were admitted on trial.

B. F. Price.—T. E. Terry made an announcement of the funeral of B. F. Price for this afternoon at 2 o'clock. The following were appointed a committee to attend the funeral services: T. E. Terry, J. T. Van Burkalow, C. W. Prettyman, R. H. Adams.

The Secretary read the following letter from the Philadelphia Conference:

REPORTS OF PRESIDING ELDERS.

Dover District.

In presenting my third annual report of the work on the Dover District, I record my devout gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His blessings upon us and

It is occasion for regret that the present session of the Conference could not have been held in Seaford, the place chosen by this body one year ago. Our people there had looked forward to the session with special delight. Much labor had been done and heavy expense incurred in anticipation of the Conference session. For several weeks past there had been whisperings that some contagious malady existed, and within less than one week before Conference would have been assembled there, the State Board of Health reported an epidemic of Small-pox in the town and laid an embargo upon the Conference being held there at the present time. We all know the remainder of the story, and I want to assure my brethren that the change, though necessary, has occasioned keen disappointment and imposed heavy burdens upon the good people of Seaford.

It is just cause for rejoicing that we come to this session with our ministerial ranks unbroken by death. The death angel has, however, visited three of our parsonage homes. In August last, the devoted and precious wife of our brother, W. P. Taylor, was summoned from her home at Beckwith, Md., to her home in Heaven. Brothers O. S. Walton and H. B. Kelso have each been bereft of a darling infant.

But two changes have occurred among the pastors of the District. In October C. N. Jones was released from Leipsic to attend Drew Seminary; the remainder of the year was served by brother Fred Mumford. At the request of Dr. Martindale, brother J. E. Gallagher was released from Zoar Circuit to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Dr. Waddell at Millsboro on the Salisbury District. W. N. Conway, a local elder, successfully completed the year at Zoar.

Profitable Childrens' Day Services have been held on all the charges.

It may be said of the Sunday Schools that they are in a prosperous condition. I find that the Church Catechism is not emphasized in the instruction to the degree that its importance demands.

Many churches seem to think that winter weather makes it necessary to close the schools for several months. This is to be deplored, for with the arch-foe to our highest interests no change of season is recognized. Observation has convinced me that in the great majority of such cases apathy on the part of the Church and indifference of parents to the best welfare of their children explain why they close. Be it said to the credit of the Sunday Schools that they are loyal to our own Church publications for their literature.

The Epworth League is yet in the vigor of its youth, and its efficiency increases with maturity. Prof. Wesley Webb is at the head of this branch of the District Army and is vigorously planning and pushing for success. We have 49 Senior Chapters, with about 2,400 members and 24 Junior Chapters with about 1,200 members.

Church Building.—A commodious new church has been built at Crapo, Md., replacing the one destroyed by lightning nearly two years ago; cost, about \$2,200 and nearly all paid. On the same charge plans are well under way for two more new churches next year, while another, Mt. Zion, is to be remodeled at a cost of probably \$1,000. At Reid's Grove, a new Station on the B. C. & A. R. R., a new church is nearing completion, costing about \$1,100. Brother VanBurkalow has had supervision of the work. The brethren at Greenwood have at last awakened from their indifference and decided to build a new church. It will fittingly represent Methodism in the town; the cost will be about \$3,500, and perhaps \$1,200 have already been paid.

Improvements.—The most extensive improvements have been made to the Avenue Church, Milford. The grounds have been graded, an iron fence erected to enclose the property, cathedral glass windows replace the old ones, and a new pipe organ purchased. Cost. \$1,800 and all paid.

Other improvements were Ebenezer Church on Nassau charge, \$500; Seaford \$200; Cambridge \$200; Lincoln \$140; Harmony on Williston Circuit, \$185; Crapo, \$229; Georgetown, \$150; Magnolia, \$125; Street's Church, Lakesville, \$115; Galestown, \$100, and many others in amounts ranging less than one hundred dollars, making a total paid for building and improvements of about \$8,500.

Old Debts.—During the year the following old debts have been paid:

Hurlock, \$1,640; Harrington, \$845: Armory, Dover, \$400; Street's, on Lakesville, an old debt to Board of Church Extension, \$390; Georgetown Circuit parsonage, \$225; Cannon's parsonage, \$160; Georgetown, \$150; Williamsburg, \$150; Wesley, Dover, \$100; Madison, on Church Creek charge, \$200. Several other charges have paid smaller amounts than \$100, making a total paid on old debts of about \$4,700.

The benevolent collections have all received diligent attention. * There has been an advance in the Missionary collection on the following charges:

Denton, Cannon, Georgetown Circuit, Lakesville, Littlecreek, Seaford, Leipsic, Wyoming, Felton, Armory, Williston, Hooper's Island, Hurlock, Salem, Bridgeville, East New Market and Vienna, while most of the others maintain the excellent standard of last year.

Revivals.—While the revival efforts on the District have not been so prolific of results as last year, it has not been because of any diminution of zeal or effort on the part of the preachers. The epideinic of grip during the winter very seriously interfered with these special efforts, yet I am glad to say that every pastor reports some trophies won. The most notable revivals have occurred on Galestown Circuit, 156 conversions; Crapo Circuit, 125 conversions; Nassau, 95, and Williston, 68 conversions. Total conversions, as reported to me, 1,150.

An increased apportionment to the District in behalf of the interest fund for the Conference Academy was given to the several charges, and I think the increased contribution for this cause will attest both the faithfulness and loyalty of preacher and people to this institution.

The following facts concerning the Conference Academy have been furnished me by the Principal:

Value of property, \$90,000; enrollment, 114; boarding pupils, 41; teachers, 10. I am thankful to say that my own health has been graciously preserved, and I

have been able to meet all my engagements, having held one hundred and seventy-five Quarterly Conferences. Perfect harmony has prevailed throughout the District. Pastors and people have toiled earnestly together for the up-building of our beloved Zion. Every courtesy has been shown me by pastors and people that could make the burdens light and aid in carrying forward plans for the work of the Church. It is my conviction that the possibilities of the Church within our territory have been as yet but meagerly developed. To accomplish this work there must be a broadening of vision with reference to personal responsibility, and higher ideals and attainments in religious experience and life. May the "enduement of power" from God descend upon the whole Church, is my prayer.

Easton District.

A review of the work of the Easton District for the year is a pleasing task. Peace has reigned in all our borders, prosperity has come to every department of church activity, and with few exceptions the lives and health of our preachers and their families have been preserved. Only in one case has death entered a parsonage home during the year and that was at Marydel where Mrs. Katharine K. Sidell, mother-in-law of Rev. E. R. Sidell was transferred to the Church triumphant on the 17th day of last July; Sister Sidell had been a shining light in the church militant for 50 years and her departure was most peaceful.

Early in October the Rev. J. T. Richardson of Church Hill and his wife were both stricken with typhoid fever and for weeks their lives were despaired of, but a gracious Providence and the best of nursing brought them safely through the long siege and he has been doing full work for two months.

The beloved wife of our Bro. Brewington has been in very poor health all the year. In the Summer she repaired to the mountains in vain and she now lies in a precarious condition in the parsonage at Cordova. Our sympathies and prayers should be given in liberal measure to this deeply shadowed family.

The Hon. John H. Hoffecker, U. S. Congressman, died suddenly at his home in Smyrna, Del., on the 16th day of last June in the 73rd year of his age. He was for more than fifty years a member of the church and for the most of that time an official member. At the time of his death he was Steward, Class Leader, and Sunday School Superintendent, which offices he had held for many years. He had been Conference Steward and Treasurer of the Board for years and took the keenest interest in the welfare of the Conference Claimants. His business interests were numerous, varied and successful. He was a man of clean hands and of pure heart. He was honored, trusted and loved by all classes. His departure is a great loss to the church, local and general. He was the benefactor of mankind and the friend of God.

The list of the appointments as it appears in the minutes has been much broken during the year. Three changes were made immediately after the adjournment and Bro. Benson, a probationer, remained at Tunis Mill and Bro. Morris, a supply, remained at Piney Neck, Bros. McFarlaue of Christiana, Wilmington District, and Bro. McKinsey of Royal Oak exchanged places. Late in September Bro. A. H. Covey surrendered his charge at Bayside and Rev. Alonza W. Davis, a local preacher, was put in charge.

On September 19th Bro. Aloycius Green was transferred from Greensboro to Newport, on the Wilmington District, and Rev. S. N. Pilchard who had been serving as a chaplain of the U. S. Army for four years, resigned his chaplaincy and took charge of Greensboro, to the delight of the people.

About the last of September, Bro. Cooper of Oxford was transferred to the Pittsburg Conference and Rev. L. I. McDougle of the Virginia Conference was appointed to fill the vacancy at Oxford and it has been filled in a most profitable manner.

On October 29th Bro. E. C. Sunfield asked his Presiding Elder and Quarterly Conference to release him from the pastorial supervision of Chestertown in order that he might devote himself exclusively to evangelistic work. Consent was given and Bro. E. P. Roberts was taken from Still Pond and assigned to Chestertown, a slight promotion for an eminently learned and useful man, and Bro. Covey having recovered in a measure his health, was appointed to fill out the year at Still Pond.

It is a very strong argument in favor of our method of supervision and appointment making to say that all of these change have taken place without the slightest friction at any point, without having a pulpit vacant for a single Sabbath and without the least apparent hindrance in the progress of the work.

When Official Boards, Pastors and Presiding Elders are possessed of good common sense, entirely frank with each other, dominated by a supreme desire to honor God and build up the Church and are not victimized by unwarranted and designing outside interference, there is seldom any friction in the adjustment of Pastors and Churches.

In material interests this has been a year of more than usual prosperity on the Easton District. We have built and dedicated four new churches. The first to be dedicated is at Morton Station where we ought to have had a church for twenty years past, but sentiment is sometime more potent than sense and the glory of the past blinds to the visions of the future, so it happened that our people held to Old Union, a mile away from the village of Morton, until it was apparent that our hold upon the community and our opportunity were well nigh gone. But, the dormant powers of Methodism were awakened by the thrill of Bro. Sunfield's enthusiasm and a new church was begun in the early Summer, and it was ready for dedication on the 9th of September. The total cost of building and grounds was about \$2600 and so diligently had the soliciting been prosecuted that only about \$500 more was needed on the day of dedication.

On the 13th of last April our church at Rock Hall, took fire from a burning store and was consumed with its entire contents. To add to the calamity there was not a dollar of insurance. The Company that had carried a policy for years cancelled it some months before because of the proximity of the building that proved to be its destruction. The people felt that they were too poor to rebuild and an offer of \$5000 for the lot, the most desirable in the town, very much complicated the situation; many wanted to sell, buy a cheap lot not well located and build with but little extra tax upon the people, but the Pastor and a few of the faithful stood for the best for God and his cause and after considerable delay, the work of rebuilding was begun and prosecuted under conditions the difficulties which I am unable to describe, but one of the very best churches of this Conference, outside

the large towns, was completed and dedicated on the first Sabbath of the New Year. The Pastor and Presiding Elder were alone on the day of dedication and asked for \$1400, and closed the glorious day with \$1500, more than \$1100 of which was in cash. This was the greatest day that I had ever seen up to that time in that line of work when all the conditions were considered. I never saw greater heroism, zeal, dogged determination and tenacity than shown by Bro. Guthrie in the prosecution of this enterprise.

The most beautiful church of the District is that which was dedicated at Bozman, Talbot Circuit, January 20th, and takes the place of the Old Broad Creek Church which was prominent in Talbot County Methodism for many years. The new church is more centrally located on a most desirable lot of two acres. The Pastor, Bro Talley, has shown fine taste, much skill, and great leadership in bringing this enterprise to such a successful issue, while the people have given very hearty co-operation and unusually liberal devotion.

The last new church to be dedicated on the District this year was at Massey, on Sunday March 10th. We have had a church near Massey for many years, but it had a very feeble existence. Three years ago we purchased a lot in the midst of the village and with characteristic zeal Bro. Dulany, the Pastor, attempted to move the old church to the new lot, when a short distance on the way it fell to pieces, leaving the society without a place in which to worship, and in debt for the moving. Thus a kind providence thrust upon them the necessity of building, so the work was begun and a beautiful little chapel was dedicated on the above date. The cost crept up in spite of the greatest economy until the \$900 mark was reached. The little church is a gem, 24x36 ft., recess pulpit, Gothic in style. The little society is really proud of it and it assures our future in that place.

Under the leadership of John M. Arters, Fairlee Church has been thoroughly renovated during the year, the old gallery displaced, a recess pulpit built, new roof, repainted without and frescoed within, with a general fixing up, at a cost of \$900, all of which was raised on the day of re-opening, August 12th.

Chapel, on Cordova charge, was rebuilt during the year and a new organ put in at an expense of \$600, which was a liberal offering for that society. Bro. Brewington led the noble band in this enterprise and the last dollar has been paid.

Sassafras Church has I een newly roofed and otherwise improved at a cost of \$150.

The spirit of improvement infected Kenton charge; the Central Church was refitted at an expenditure of \$160. \$170 was expended in a horse shed at Kenton, the last \$100 paid on the parsonage debt and some minor improvements made. At Crumpton \$185 has been raised for church improvements.

Odessa raised \$350 for improvements, mostly on the parsonage.

Severson's people, on Smyrna Circuit, repainted and repaired their church at a cost of \$200 and other slight improvements are reported.

Old Dudleys, on Sudlersville Charge, one of the oldest churches on the peninsula, was remodeled and put in splendid condition at an outlay of over \$500, which with the parsonage debt of \$500, of long standing, was all raised and Sudlersville rejoices in a handsome commodious church and parsonage property free of debt.

The Ingleside parsonage was repainted and refurnished at an outlay of \$150.

The ladies of Piney Neck paid the last of their parsonage debt this year. These

ladies deserve great credit for their enterprise. Three years ago the time came to buy a parsonage and the men failed us, so a board of lady Trustees was elected and duly incorporated; they bought the property and it is now clear of debt

St. Michaels has had a good year in every respect and especially in her finances. Her troublesome debts have been reduced \$800, leaving only \$950, \$72 has been expended in improvements.

The Townsend people have at last secured a title to the lot on which their tabernacle stands and an additional frontage of 60 ft. by the payment of \$450, and the way is clear for a new church.

Millington church put in two new heaters and made other improvements at a cost of about \$500.

Holdens Church on Millington Charge, and Sherwood on Bavside have been repainted.

Hillsboro raised on old debts and improvements \$300.

Greensboro has raised on various improvements \$300.

Cordova, Chestertown and Cheswold raised for improvements sums ranging from \$200 to \$300.

Smyrna raised for a new piano and other improvements about \$900.

The pastors have been faithful to the great connectional interests of the Church during the year. In a few cases, perhaps, due diligence was not observed in the early part of the year, but I have much less to complain of than formerly. It is a sad fact however, that in some quarters the laymen are not in hearty sympathy with these interests and they make it their business to see that the collections are kept down by not only giving penuriously, themselves, but by using their influence to choke the stream of benevolence in others.

Millington leads the District on total increase in the Benevolences, with an advance over last year of \$107, the missionary collection going up from \$80 to \$150, The advance at Marydel is quite remarkable. Last year she went up from \$53 to \$140 on the Missionary collection and this year goes \$30 beyond that, while the other causes advance at nearly as rapid a pace. The advances at Smyrna Circuit, Bayside, Chestertown and others are quite worthy of note, not in some instances so much because as large, but because the charge had already reached a good standard.

In the matter of Pastors' salaries, I have done my best to get the estimates fixed at a figure somewhat in keeping with the ability of the charge and the needs of the Pastor. In some instances I have woefully failed, but some success has been achieved in this direction. Bayside, Fairlee, Golts, Greensboro, Kent Island, Kenton, Millington, Still Pond, Talbot and Townsend have each advanced in sums ranging from \$25 to \$200, making a total increase of \$800, while Galena, Hillsboro, and Sudlersville each made a lower estimate than last year, aggregating \$200, leaving a gain of \$600. This is small but it shows the drift, and we have the assurance of several advances next year.

I think the last Sunday School is in line on our own literature and the general work of the School is encouraging; almost every Sabbath I visit a School, investigate its methods and perhaps talk to the children. "Decision Day," recommended by the Delaware State S. S. Association, was generally observed in the Delaware

part of our territory and I think something like fifty Probationers were gathered into the church as a result.

The revival efforts have been attended with a good measure of success. There have been a few of great sweep and power. Henderson, on Ingleside charge, was very graciously favored and Bro. Wright brings up a report of more than 100 conversions. Millington has had revival all of the year and 115 have professed faith in Christ and united with the church. At Centreville our church and the Methodist Protestant joined forces and the whole town was stirred as it has not been for many years before. From the converts Bro. Atkins gathered 47 probationers into our church. Easton had a gracious visitation under the leadership of Bro. Adams, assisted by Bro. Sunfield and 50 souls were converted and united with the church. Still Pond has just closed one of the greatest revivals within the recollection of the oldest members, adding 58 probationers. Several other places have had just as great demonstrations of the Spirit's power and as many accessions in proportion to the number of people accessible. Tilghman's Island reports 47 conversions, Oxford 45, Crumpton 37, Kenton 34, Marydel 32, Golts 24, Odessa 35, Wye 28 and a large number of charges report from 25 down, and every church has given evidence of its right to live by leading some souls to Christ. The total number of conversions reported will exceed 1000 for the year; now that these sheaves are garnered into the Church Militant it behooves us to fit them for the Master's use and for a place in the Church Triumphant,

In the matter of Temperance we are not doing our whole duty as a Church, but we are doing something. One very definite and decisive battle has been fought and a glorious victory won; Queenstown has been for years and generations in a large measure synonymous with rum-rule and drunkenness. The demon has been strongly entrenched and defiant here but a local option election was held about the first of last May. The Temperance forces were led by the Methodist preachers and the W. C. T. U. women and his majesty was thoroughly routed and demoralized, since which time the law has been well enforced and the rum-sellers finding it too warm for comfort, have either gone to jail or left for parts unknown. This looks like the beginning of the end of the deadly business that has so long blighted and disgraced that otherwise fair community. In every part of the District there is more or less agitation, and this bodes no good to the traffic for it is a fungus that can flourish only in the darkness—the light means its destruction. So let us agitate, agitate, AGITATE.

Now in conclusion, I want to say with profound gratitude that I have been remarkably sustained during the year, first by the kind Providence that has kept me and mine in health, so that I have not missed a single appointment, on account of sickness. Second, by the Pastors who have heartily co-operated with me and made my visits to their charges and my labors among their people a real pleasure. Third, by the laymen who have thoughtfully cared for my temporal comfort, almost universally shown due respect to my office, and have been ready at all times to counsel with me as to the work to which we are mutually devoted. For all favors from whatever source, I am profoundly grateful.

Once more, through the blessing of God, we complete a year of toil; and present some account of the progress of His Kingdom within the bounds of the Salisbury District.

We are not able to rejoice, as we were one year ago, over unbroken ministerial ranks. Two of our comrades in arms have fallen. Brother C. P. Swain had scarcely more than reached his new field of labor when disease laid him low, and in the month of May sent him, all too soon, to his reward. His was a fiery, apostolic spirit in a frail body. Dr. D. F. Waddell opened his ministry at Millsboro with uncertain health. After half a year of brave struggle, he was obliged to relinquish his charge. Removing with his family to Westminster, Md., he lingered a few painful months, and in December went home to God, thus ending a quiet, yet earnest, pastorship of twenty-seven years. Fitting tributes will be presented at the memorial service. These losses from our number have necessitated some re-adjustment of the appointments. Brother F. F. Carpenter was, by the authority of Bishop Andrews, moved from Frankford to Deal's Island, and Brother M. D. Nutter transferred from the West Virginia Conference to fill the vacancy at Frankford. Brother J. E. Gallagher was released from Zoar, by the courtesy of Dr. Baker, and assigned to Millsboro.

The Children's Day Exercises still crowd the churches with interested congregations, and yield increasingly satisfactory financial returns for our needy Educational Societies. And our young people who are hungry for better mental equipment, are coming more generally to understand that this fund is sacredly dedicated to their welfare. The Sunday School service of the District is well organized, and earnestly operated. There are scarcely any lesson helps known or used among us now except our own.

With respect to the matter of church building and improving and the sweeping away of old debts, it was thought that the unusual results of last year had almost exhausted reasonable possibilities. Yet we surprise ourselves with a showing for the present year which aggregates nearly as much. The new church at Franklin City was dedicated May 20th, and its entire cost (\$3000) covered by good subscriptions. At Omar, on Frankford charge, the courageous little flock has built a neat new church costing \$1000. It was dedicated February 3d and is already out of debt. The new sanctuary at Rock Creek is one of the most complete and artistic on the District. The outlay is \$5400, of which more than one half has already been paid. The dedication is to occur on March 31st. As a result of wise planning, we have at Parsonsburg what is practically a new church, with the modern improvements and very attractive, costing \$1250 which is paid. It was re-opened October 28th. Melson's, a neighboring society has also built a commodius and tasteful house of worship, using the old church for a lecture room. \$1700 of the \$2400 has been provided for. The re-opening took place February 10th.

The completion of the splendid new church enterprise at Snow Hill took place on November 25th, when the dedicatory services, under the direction of Bishop McCabe, were held. After a day of such self-sacrificing giving as is seldom witnessed, at 10 o'clock the last cent of the \$18,300 was pledged, when the congregation sang the Doxology over and over again with mingled tears, smiles and hand

shakings; and what is better still, the entire debt is paid, except \$3000, and that is amply provided for.

The auditorium of the church at Laurel has been refurnished and beautified, and the exterior painted. The expense (\$600) is paid. Wetipquin, on Quantico Circuit, has also been reconstructed, costing \$300. Ironshire, Newark charge, \$350; Dame's Quarter, similar improvements, \$168, and all arranged for.

Following a sweeping revival at St. Peters', near Crisfield, preparations are now being made for a thorough reconstruction of that building. A subscription of \$765 has been secured. Similar plans are also being prepared for the enlargement of Rhode's Point Church, Smith's Island. Other church improvements may be noted as follows:—Asbury, repairs, \$400; Nanticoke, \$275; Mt. Vernon, both churches, \$190; Hollands and Tangier Islands, \$100, each; Powellville and Siloam, each, \$80; Pittsville \$32, and Winona \$20. The assistance of various brethren of the Conference and others at the dedications and re-openings is greatly appreciated.

The much needed enlargement of the parsonage at Roxana has been completed, at a cost of \$460, and we have now a comfortable residence for the Pastor. Pocomoke City has also made an admirable addition of new study, bath and kitchen to her personage, costing \$400. The new parsonage at Princess Anne is the admiration of all who see it—a credit to our Methodism, and an ornament to the town. Its cost is about \$3000. The proceeds of the sale of the old parsonage and a considerable subscription go toward the settlement of the debt. Other improvements and additions have been made to parsonage property as follows:—Tangier, \$150; Somerset, \$140; St. Peter's, \$130; Marion, \$125; Westover, \$115; Snow Hill and Stockton, \$100 each, and Chincoteague, Fruitland, Cape Charles, Girdletree, Deal's Island, Nanticoke, Smith's Island, Quantico and Pocomoke Circuit each less than \$100.

The old debts continue to melt away. Habnab church, for years considered a forlorn hope, and closed much of the time, has, through the blessing of a revival, taken on new life and provided for her debt, one third of which is now in hand. Marion completed her fine work by a last payment of \$831; and on August 5, celebrated her release by an all-day Jubilee. The chronic claim of \$415 against the Westover parsonage has been entirely wiped out. Tangier has reduced her debt by \$1450. Crisfield, by the payment of \$550, quite frees her valuable property. And other charges have contributed to the general result by the following amounts: Berlin, \$458; Nanticoke, \$320; Cape Charles, \$250; Klej Grangé, \$180; Newark, \$250; Smith's Island, \$225; Deal's Island, \$191; Mt. Pleasant and Roxana, each \$150; Fairmount and Gumboro, \$100 each; and Millsboro, Powellville, Riverside, and Bethel, lesser sums. The District has raised this year for all building and improvements, including the payment of former debts, a fine total of \$29,280.

It may be gratifying to the Conference to learn something of the present debt conditions surrounding our property on the District, in view of the thank offering movement of the church.

Estimated value of our church property at last Annual Report, \$325,600. Additional this year, \$23,655. Total value, \$349,255.

On this there is a present indebtedness of only \$13,573. Sixteen charges have

no debt whatever; seventeen have less than \$500, and none have over \$3,000. A record of which the District may well be proud.

The Epworth League holds on its way as a blessed, timely, and Providential method of utilizing the heart and brain power of our young people for the pulling down of strongholds and the spread of the Kingdom. One of its primal needs is the full and steady support of the Pastor. Where this is given the Leagues flourish; where it is absent, they decline. We have 51 Senior, and 21 Junior Chapters. The adoption of the Sub-District Convention plan is expected to increase efficiency at every point. Our Convention at Berlin was marked by an unusual overshadowing of the Holy Spirit. The souls of the workers were greatly quickened. Noble evening addresses were given by Drs. James W. Marshall, of Camden, N. J., and W. I. Haven, of the American Bible Society. Dr. G. W. Woodall is our genial President.

It is pleasant to record still another net advance of \$825 in the aggregate estimate for ministerial support over the past year. One charge only has been obliged to lessen its salary, while 11 have increased, and 32 remain the same. Although general business has been dull at some points, there is no sufficient reason why these estimates should not be realized in full. We deplore deficiencies as being an injustice to the Pastor, and a reflection on the Church.

The claims of the great Benevolences have received zealous and persistant attention. Many tried and approved methods of furnishing information, quickening interest, and reaching the individual conscience have been employed. In addition to our regular contributions, the district has this year, given about \$500 to the India famine sufferers.

Strenuous campaigns have been conducted against the incroachments of the Liquor Traffic at Cape Charles and Delmar, by our resident Pastors and their churches. At the former place, while the agitation was undoubtedly educational, the election went against us. In that part of Delmar lying in Maryland, where the issue was joined, the Temperance workers won the day, and secured the relief of that section of the town from the blight of the bar.

One of the gravest matters confronting us as a District, is the exceedingly limited circulation of our denominational literature. We rejoice that our Sunday School publications are holding their own. It is however, a fact for regret and alarm, that with the increasing taste for reading everywhere manifest, our church papers reach only a very small number of our members. They do not know what the great church is doing; and as Dr. Mains has recently said "It is manifestly absurd to look for the best denominational, and therefore Christian life in those homes into which it is impossible to carry our own church literature." There should be at least one Methodist paper in every Methodist home.

The District rejoices over revival victories, which are the chief joy of the Pastor's heart. The number of converts is not so large as in the preceding year, but the same transforming power continues with us. St. Peter's reports 140 souls saved, Nanticoke follows with 101, and a remarkable occurrence at Trinity Church, where the convicting power of God fell on the congregation at a communion service on Sunday morning, so that the altar just vacated by members of the church was filled with weeping penitents, four or five of whom were converted,

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and the whole neighborhood was deeply stirred. Exceptionally gracious outpourings have visited Tangier Island with 85 professing faith; Somerset 80; Gumboro 65; Bishopville 62; Annamessex 61; Roxana 52; Chincoteague 50; Riverside 48; Girdletree, Fruitland, and Asbury 40 each; Millsboro 38; Pocomoke Circuit, Quantico, and Smith's Island each 35; Whaleyville 31; Snow Hill, Fairmount, Mardela, Berlin, and Bethel 25 each; and no charge has been without its sheaves. We count up 1400 souls rescued, and pray that they may be "presented faultless before the presence of His glory."

In conclusion, I hasten to express my hearty appreciation of the constant and thoughtful kindness of my brothers, both of the ministry and the laity. Their ready help has made an arduous year's work lighter, and the shelter of their homes has been a true refreshment to me in the pauses of the toil. I I thank God for the keeping of my health, and now lay the year's trophies at His blessed feet.

Wilmington District.

In our annual review of the work of the Wilmington district, we note first, the removals by death. We have lost three by death during the year; H. G. Boivie of the Swedish Mission, Louisa Fanniestock, wife of W. P. Compton of Newark, and Anna Wallace, wife of W. T. Hammond of Ebenezer. In each instance the illness was of brief duration. Appropriate Memoirs will be presented at the Memorial session.

Several pastoral changes have occurred. At the last session of our Conference, Bishop Andrews announced the transfer to this Conference of L. P. Karholsen from the Central New York, and Dr. William Wirt King from the St. Louis Conference. In April, Dr. R. I. Watkins was transferred to the Kentucky Conference and E. H. Thrasher of the New England Conference was transferred to us and stationed at New Castle. Last September Bishop Andrews transferred R. T. Coursey to East Ohio Conference, and appointed A. Green pastor of our church at Greensboro.

The spirit of debt paying prevalent last year has continued without abatement. Chesapeake City has wiped out its burdensome debt. The achievment is in every sense notable. Harrison Street has paid \$3,000 ou its mortgage. F. B. Short, the pastor of Epworth, has accomplished the seemingly impossible by placing the church on a safe financial basis. He reports \$2,000 taken from the debt this year. C. A. Grise, pastor of Union, has done hard work and reports that the debt has been reduced one half. Scott is reported out of debt. No man on the district has done harder, better work in the face of greater odds than the pastor, F. P. Harris. No church will suffer in his hands. Grace Church has paid \$8,200 on its debt. The new minister, Wm. Wirt King, has taken hold of every department of church work with vigor, and has shown himself a workman that needeth not to be ashamed. The benevolences are greatly in excess of last year, the Missionary collection being \$500 in advance, the other collections, \$100 over last year, and the offering for our honored veterans more than double the apportionment. There has been raised for all purposes, by this church this year, nearly \$20,000. Mention should here be made of the prompt and generous invitation which this church extended to hold the Conference session here. As soon as it was known to be impossible to hold the session at Seaford, Grace Church immediately opened both church and homes to the Conference, and furnishes entertainment for more than one-half of the Conference. Such generous conduct touches all hearts and increases our admiration for this great church. Jas. Crowe, pastor of Asbury Church, reports \$800 paid on debts. During his pastorate now closing, the church has been greatly improved at a cost of \$5,000.

The following additional amounts are reported in payment of debts: Chester \$426, Delaware City \$125, Elkton \$61, Ebenezer \$250, Newport \$150, Perryville \$350, Rising Sun \$71, St. John's \$50, Brandywine \$125, Epworth \$2,000, Harrison Street \$3,000, Kingswood \$600, Madeley \$140, Mt. Salem \$138, St. Paul's \$500, Silverbrook \$175, Wesley \$200, making a total of debts paid and provided for, of \$23,000.

It is but just to say in this connection that there are two churches in Wilmington, Wesley and Kingswood, that have borne their crushing load of debt so long that unless some relief is afforded the consequences will be serious. The unwisdom, not to put it more strongly, of allowing these societies to contract such hopeless debts, will not meet the present extremity. It is earnestly hoped that the whole Conference so far as is practicable will lend these churches a helping hand.

Much has been done in the way of church improvements Hopewell, G. W. Bowman, pastor, leads in this respect. The church has been remodeled at a cost of \$3,500. The lecture room of St. Paul's, Wilmington, has been improved at a cost of \$1,000. Additional improvements are: Port Deposit \$565, Bethel \$225, Charlestown \$135, Cherry Hill \$600, Chester \$143, Christiana \$80, Delaware City \$850, New Castle \$173, Elk Neck \$100, Marshallton \$230, Mt Lebauon \$125, Mt. Pleasant \$75, Newark \$160, Port Penu \$165, Red Lion \$200, Zion \$350, Rising Sun \$244, Epworth \$100, Madeley \$120, Mt. Salem \$800, Wesley \$200, Cookman \$25, Chesapeake City \$20, making a total of \$11,530, and a total for debts and improvements as reported by the pastors, of \$34,636.

The benevolences have been persistently emphasized, and in most instances the pastors have been conscientious and faithful in presenting these great interests to the people. From the information at hand, there has been no backward step on Wilmington district, but a gratifying increase in the sum total.

The following charges exceed last year's record:—Grace, Newport, Silverbrook, Brandywine, St. John's, Kingswood, Elk Neck, Marshallton, Hopewell, Elkton, Madeley, Perryville, Epworth, Chesapeake City, Rising Sun, Red Lion, Mt. Lebanon, Port Deposit, Colora and Scott.

While none of the general interests of the church have been slighted, all having been emphasized, special stress has been laid on our Conference Academy collection. Wilmington district took one half of the advance asked for and from present indications, it has been nearly all raised; and I have yet to learn of any objection from any charge on the district. All recognize the seriousness of the crisis that confronts our Conference Academy and nothing but a strong pull and pull all together can save it from disaster. The honor of Methodism on this peninsula is at stake, and Wilmington district has cheerfully borne this additional burden for the sake of the institution for which many have made large sacrifices; and for which they are willing to make even greater sacrifices. This institution must be saved.

Your committee appointed to audit accounts begs leave to report as follows: Dr. C. S. Baker, P. E. of the Dover District, received from the Domestic Missionary Society \$172., and applied same as follows: Ellendale \$50; Vienna \$30; Burrsville \$22; Leipsic \$10; Armory, Dover \$30; Lakesville \$30. Dr. Baker also received from Missionary Society \$220, and applied same as follows: Lakesville \$120; Salem \$100.

Dr. W. F. Corkran, P. E. of the Easton District, received from the Missionary Society \$213, and applied same as follows: Royal Oak \$113; Tunis Mills \$50; Piney Neck \$50. Dr. Corkran also received \$188.10 from Domestic Missionary Society, disbursed as follows: Oxford \$50; Fairlee \$20; Cordova \$25; Clayton \$25; Church Hill \$25; Talbot \$25; Ingleside \$15. Due Dr. Corkran \$20.

Dr. Robert Watt, P. E. Wilmington District, received from the Domestic Missionary Society \$279. Elk Neck \$25; Christiana \$50; Bethel \$25; Hockessin \$25; Charlestown \$25; Perryville \$25; Colora \$25; Stauton \$20; Red Lion \$38; Elsmere \$21. Dr. Watt also received from the Missionary Society \$350, the whole of which was applied to the Swedish Mission of Wilmington.

Dr. T.E. Martindale, P. E. of the Salisbury District, received from the Domestic Missionary Society \$175.50, disbursed as follows: Mardela Springs \$40; Pocomoke Circuit \$42; Parksley \$18; Powellville \$8; Millsboro \$10; Riverside \$10; Westover \$20; Bethel \$20. Cash in hand \$7.50. Dr. Martindale also received from the Missionary Society \$380, and paid out as follows: Cape Charles \$170; Parksley \$150; Powellville \$30; Marion \$30.

We also examined the account of Rev. E. H. Nelson, Trustee of funds for the use of Mrs. Annie D. Chatham. The receipts were as follows: from Wilmington Conference \$230; From Mrs. Carrow \$186. This entire amount was applied to the Pennsylvania Hospital.

Bible,

This is an age of literature. More books, more magazines are published than in any previous age of the world. Yet it is gratifying to know that the Bible has not been superceded. There are more people reading and studying the Bible to-day than there ever were.

The Maryland Bible Society distributed last year 9,983 Bibles, 10,447 Testaments, making a total of 20,430 Bibles and Testaments. Of this total distribution 8,238 Bibles and Testaments, costing \$1,743.12, were donations to needy Sunday Schools, Benevolent institutions, navy shipments, individual poor, &c. Besides this \$500 was turned over to the Parent Society in New York. These figures go to show us how necessary it is that the Society should have the liberal support of every church; and believing as we do, that the Methodist Episcopal Church, under God, was raised up to spread Scriptural holiness in the earth, no Church is under stronger obligation than is ours, to sustain the Bible cause. We fear, therefore that the Wilmington Conference has not measured up to its obligations to this Society. While the charges giving nothing to this cause, are growing less every

There has been a steady advance in the matter of pastoral support. Eight charges have advanced the salary this year. Port Deposit \$200, Epworth \$200, Silverbrook, Mt. Lebanon, Cookman and Port Penn \$100 each. Elk Neck and St. John's \$50 each, making in addition to the advances already reported, 30 in three years.

The Pastors and churches have put forth unusual efforts to promote a revival of pure and undefiled religion. In some instances these efforts have been crowned with signal success. In others the fruitage has not been all that could be desired, but there has been no lack of enthusiasm or earnestness on the part of the loborers.

The most remarkable work of grace on the district, outside of Wilmington, was in Port Deposit, A. S. Mowbray, pastor. The whole town was moved by the power of God, the results are a quickened church, and 108 souls saved. In the early fall the Wilmington preachers' meeting named a committe of which the Presiding Elder was made chairman to arrange for a series of meetings that should embrace the entire Methodism of the city. A union meeting was held at Grace, and was followed by a series of group meetings. Kingswood, under the enthusiastic work of its new pastor, L. P. Karholsen, reports 103 conversions. Other charges report as follows: Epworth 67, Silverbrook 60, Elk Neck 65, Newport 50, Grace 54, Hopewell 30, East Lake 26, St. Paul's 40, Chesapeake City 20, Chester 18, Rising Sun 19, Zion 16, Harrison St. 14, Asbury 60, Madeley 12, Brandywine 23, Charlestown 14, Delaware City 15, Elkton 16, Ebenezer 26, Hockessin 12, North East 10, New Castle 10 and Union 65.

So far as could be ascertained, these results are of a very substantial character and will mean a goodly number of accessions.

The Young Peoples' societies have done increasingly valuable work, greatly aiding the Pastors in their revival work and caring for the needy. The elect women of the Woman's Foreign and Home Missionary Societies and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, have done va iant service.

The hoped for relief from the power and domination of the liquor traffic has not yet materialized. The liquor lobby of Dover seems to have been active and efficient. Rural New Castle was denied the opportunity of a vote on the question of license or no license by the refusal of one man to give his consent. One fact is noted in this connection, a most gratifying fact too, every member of the Legislature who was a Methodist voted right on this question. It is an emphatic endorsement of the sturdy utterances of our church "it can never be legalized without sin." The friends of the home and the foes of the saloon are not dishartened.

In conclusion, I record it as my conviction that as a whole Wilmington district was never more ably manned than during the past year. The Ministers for the most part have wrought faithfully and conscientiously, actuated by no other motive than a desire to promote God's glory in the success of His Church. To the writer there has been accorded the fullest confidence by both ministers and laymen. This knowledge has lightened the burdens and made joyous the toil of the year.

That we the members of this Conference will urge our respective official boards to be prompt in keeping all our churches and parsonages safely insured.

Therefore resolved that as far as possible, we will follow the instructions of the General Conference (See Discipline, page 387) and advise the Trustees of church property, to avail themselves of a safe, easy, and cheap insurance in the National Mutual Church Insurance Company, which has been organized for the special benefit of the churches of the United States.

Education.

Recognizing the importance of distinctively Christian schools as aids in our church work, and the part they play in bringing our youth to Christ as well as training them for usefulness, the Methodist Episcopal Church has established or acquired and exercises supervision over more than 200 institutions which it officially classifies as Universities, Colleges and Academies. These schools contain more than 3,000 teachers and nearly 50,000 students. For the purpose of assisting many who are unable alone to pay their way through school, Children's Day is still universally and enthusiastically observed. Restraining tendencies to extravagance, let us keep in view the primary object for which this day was instituted, viz.: a collection for our educational work. Apropos of this subject, the Board of Education makes the following report: Number of students aided from the beginning is 10,413. The average total amount loaned to each beneficiary is \$95.73.

Of the many excellent institutions with which we are blessed and in which we rejoice, we have determined to make special mention of those whose location and character entitle them to our patronage and beneficence.

Morgan College and Princess Anne Academy afford fine facilities for the education of young colored people.

Boston University commands our attention by reason of it's unparalleled situation and the magnificent opportunities it offers for professional and post graduate study. Its school of theology, the oldest in Methodism, is better fitted than ever before to prepare laborers for the Master's vineyard.

Dickinson College will begin its next year in September with a new preparatory school building costing not less than \$50,000. The old building will be utilized as a college dormitory, thus relieving the pressure upon the present accommodations. 474 pupils are enrolled, an increase of 24 over last year. Special attention is directed to the school of law.

Drew Theological Seminary, bulwark of orthodoxy, spiritual to the core, and ever ready to adopt whatsoever things are honorable in modern thought or methods, needs no encomium in this territory. Its natural equipment is the finest of any theological school in our denomination, inclusive of the most complete Methodist library in the world; its enrollment, 195 students, is the largest. Its advantages of proximity to New York with attendant opportunity for all grades of practical gospelizing and for collateral study in the great universities, ought not to be overlooked.

The assets of the American University at Washington, amount to nearly \$3,000,000. We appreciate the urgent need, sympathize with the aim of the promoters, and long for the successful inauguration of this unique institution, standing as it does for Americanism, Protestantism and Methodism. Let us seek to be intelligent as to this sagacious and statesmanlike scheme.

But barring the regular work of preaching the gospel, the supreme consideration for us as members of this Conference this year is the Wilmington Conference Academy. We are fixedly convinced of the necessity for united, unanimous and unwavering effort on the part of the Methodists of this Peninsula in behalf of our own home school. Not to speak of the real worth of the institution or its location or its up-to-date character, the money value of the plant is so far in excess of the debt which harasses its existence, that we contemplate with shame and humiliation the unbusiness-like and unbrave nature of any proposition to abandon the project. The thought of losing it is intolerable. We feel that the Great Master desires otherwise. We, therefore, refuse to continue heartsick because of hope deferred. We hereby commit ourselves determinedly to the plan matured by the Board of Trustees for its salvation, and hold ourselves ready to further any auxiliary or supplemental movement which shall commend itself to our judgment. Let every pastor do his full duty according to his means and also as a mediator with his people in behalf of this school. If this be done, we shall come up to Conference next year rejoicing in the grandest achievement of the most glorious year of our Peninsular Methodism.

Epworth League Report.

Your Committee on Epworth League desires to make the following report:

It is with gratitude to our Lord, that we are permitted to report a constant and pleasing increase in our League work throughout the Conference. There is growing inspiration among the young people of our church within our Conference territory. God is graciously leading them into a larger Christian experience and into broader circles of religious usefulness.

We heartily endorse the Junior History of Methodism, by Rev. W. G. Koons of our Conference, and believe it ought to be used in every Chapter of the Junior League.

We urge all our pastors to give their earnest attention to the call for one hundred thousand dollars as a thank offering. Let us try to increase our regular collection to this cause. Every dollar we get above our apportionment goes toward the debt

We would call your attention to the Christian Educator which will be sent free of charge to every one who contributed one dollar or more to this cause. Let our preachers send in their list at once that our people may become acquainted with the work.

The society has issued a series of tracts which will be sent free to all pastors who apply for them. These tracts are full of information that we need. If we will obtain and read these we are sure they will inspire us to give prompt attention to the raising of our apportionment, every dollar of which should be raised.

Methodist Episcopal Hospital.

The Methodist Episcopal Hospital in the city of Philadelphia continues its benificent work of healing the sick. In the Conference year, March 1, 1900 to February 28th, 1901, it gave 19,967 days of treatment to 769 patients. Sixty-two and three tenths per cent of this work (12,437 days) was done for those who were unable to pay for any part of the treatment received. These helpless sufferers received food and lodging, medicines, the most careful nursing (day and night) and the skilled services of physicians and surgeons of the highest character and skill Wilmington Conference has been a sharer in the benefits of this Christian and Christ-like work of comforting and healing. Your committee is assured that no applicant from our territory has been refused admittance. The hospital stands as a representative of the Methodist Episcopal Church in its effort to obey the divine command which is found in the words, "He sent them to preach the Kingdom of God and to heal the sick."

We wish to give prominence to the following points which are found emphasized in the Annual Reports and other official utterances of the Hospital:—

- 1. No claimant upon the charity fund is ever refused admission unless the resources of the Hospital have been exhausted.
- 2. The proceeds of questionable amusements are sometimes offered to the management but are always declined.
 - 3. No appropriations of public money are ever received.
- 4. The scope of the work of the Hospital among the helpless poor is wholly dependent upon the help received from legacies and contributions.

Now, therefore, resolved:

1. The Hospital is worthy of liberal support on the part of the people of Wilmington Conference. Our contributions ought, at the least, to cover the money outlay for the destitute sick sent from within our territory. We really ought to do more than this. Heretofore, however, we have done far less.

- 2. We recommend the observance of the second Sunday of May as Hospital Sunday in all our churches.
- work to our people, and assure him a hearty welcome to our pulpits. We invite him to correspond with us regarding pulpit appointments for the preaching of the gospel and the presentation of the Hospital cause.

This money we have distributed to 17 superanuate, 4 supernumerary preachers and 39 widows and two orphan children, in the most equitable manner possible, according our judgment, from the light which we have received. It has pained us greatly to be compelled to decrease the allowance to any of our claimants, but the necessity was upon us, and we have had it to do. We hope the pastors will do their utmost to raise the full amount apportioned to their several charges. The money on the Pennington mortgage has been paid into our hands and a committee appointed to secure an investment of the same, and all legacies and investments heretofore given for the benefit of this fund are securely invested except this \$2,000—the amount of the Pennington mortgage—paid in at this Conference.

We urge upon our pastors to examine their minutes and find out the exact amount apportioned to their several appointments. The increasing demands upon this fund requires the raising of the full amount thus apportioned.

Steward's Endowment.

Your committee appointed on Conference Claimant Endowment Fund would respectfully report that we find in the possession of the Board of Stewards and properly invested by them for the benefit of the Conference Claimants the following, viz.: Centenary fund \$2,000 at 6 per cent., yielding \$120; Riddle legacy \$1,900 at 6 per cent., yielding \$141; Bates legacy \$2,350 at 6 per cent., yielding \$141; Reynolds legacy \$200 at 4 per cent., yielding \$8; Academy Bonds \$1,500 at 6 per cent., yielding \$90; Smyrna sewer bonds \$1,000 at 5 per cent., yielding \$50; amount invested \$8,950; interest \$537.

To be added to this is the amount of \$1,100 now in the hands of the 20th Century Thank Offering committee and to be paid over to the Board of Stewards. If this sum total could be incressed by gifts, bequests and legacies until it should reach \$200,000 the interest from such sum added to our present average of collections would not yield more than a comfortable support for our worthy beneficiaries.

Resolved, 1. That, as for many years no legacies or special gifts have come into the possession of the Board of Stewards, and as the needs of the Board are greater every year, we again urge every pastor in his pulpit and by private effort to arouse an interest on the part of those of his membership who have means to remember this great cause in the making of their wills.

Resolved. 2. That, in view of the fact that the Conference has pledged itself to pay off the debt of the Conference Academy, we do not deem it expedient to recommend the paying this year by the members of the Conference the percentages of salaries agreed upon by Conference action last year.

Sunday Schools and Tracts.

I. SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

- 1. We recognize in the Sunday School one of the most important institutions of the church and one of far-reaching influence, since it teaches the Bible and brings the Gospel to vast multitudes in the receptive periods of childhood. In the Methodist Episcopal Church alone, there are over 31,000 Sunday Schools, with 350,000 officers and teachers, and more than 2,600,000 scholars.
- 2. We would recommend that the Pastors and Superintendents of our schools exercise great care, in the selection of suitable teachers, that they may be men and women of earnest christian character, with a knowledge of the Bible, and an aptness in teaching, and if possible that they may be members of our own church.
- 3. We recommend that the literature published by the Book Concern of the Methodist church be used in all our schools. We believe it is the best for the purpose that can be obtained. The price is very low when the quality is considered.
- 4. We recommend to our people, the "Home Department" of the Sunday School, whereby those who by the pressing duties of thome, or from other causes are unable to attend the Sunday School may have the advantage of these studies at their homes.
- 5. We recommend that the "Home Readings" as arranged in the lesson leaves be used in the family circle.
- 6. We commend the work of the Sunday School Union, in which it aids every year about 3,500 needy schools with literature, and urge that an offering be given for this cause in all our charges.

II. TRACTS.

We recognize the value of these little messages of Divine truth, which because of their brevity often gain a hearing, and are an incitement to religious duty, where other agencies fail.

Each year the Tract Society gives away more than 10,000,000 pages of such matter in the United States alone. We would suggest that the pastors and quarterly Conference committees appointed for that purpose, avail themselves of the

liberal offer of the Tract Society, which provides that those who apply may receive tracts to the amount of one half the last collection for that cause, and that they distribute such literature, where in their judgment it will do the most good.

We urge also that a collection be taken for this society in all our churches, and that our support both morally and financially be given to the efforts of this society to spread a Christian literature throughout the world.

Temperance.

In view of the past utterances of the Wilmington Conference on temperance and prohibition, it is difficult for your committee to frame anything new.

We thank God for the advanced position of our Church in opposition to this great evil, and would reiterate our former utterances by re-endorsing all the deliverances of our Bishops, our General Conference and our Discipline upon this subject. In this connection we would not forget to extend our most sincere thanks to our beloved Bishop Goodsell for the strong and inspiring words on this subject, in his address to the class for admission, and pledge ourselves that in every possible way we will as a Conference do all we can to abolish the saloon, trying to prove ourselves worthy of the Bishop's statement that, "the rum traffic finds a bitter enemy in the person and presence of every Metho list preacher."

We rejoice in the fact stated by Dr. Watt in his report that "Every member of the late General Assembly of Delaware, who is a member of the M. E. Church was found on the right side of this great question." But we most deeply deplore the fact that by the trickery so common to modern politics, the people of Delaware are deprived of the benefits of the important reform measure known as the "Anti-Cigarette Bill" even though said bill was properly passed by the legislature.

We also regret that the entire session passed without any action offering to the people of the state, or any part of it, the opportunity to vote out of existance this monster, the saloon, and would urge upon our great Methodist constituency in Delaware to do all in their power by vote and influence, to elect men who will not be slaves and puppets of the rum power, but by the assertion of a manly and righteous independence will stand for the rights of all our people.

We appreciate the action of the Court of Talbot County, Md. in reducing the number of saloons in Chapel District and congratulate the people upon this partial relief. We also rejoice in the splendid victory for Temperance in Queenstown District, by means of which the entire County of Queen Anne comes in line for God and home.

With the entire nation we rejoice in the action of our national government abolishing the canteen from our military encampments, posts and reservations, and most heartily commend all efforts in the several states to have the saloons removed from the regions adjacent thereto.

We most cordially renew our endorsements of the W. C. T. U. and pledge ourselves to give our hearty support to its noble work.

In view of the fact that many of the modern ways of celebrating the Fourth of July are devoid of any really intellectual, moral or patriotic inspiration or influence, we will, as far as possible, induce our churches, Epworth Leagues and other Young People's Societies, and our Sunday Schools to celebrate the day in a truly

patriotic and Christian manner, in the interest and for the promotion of Temperance in its fullest meaning.

We would also state that while the means used were irregular, and may not meet the approval of all, appearing to some as fanatical, we rejoice in the fact that in Kansas a strong sentiment has been aroused in favor of law-enforcement, and pray that this sentiment may spread throughout the entire country.

We most heartily commend the Anti-Saloon League as a means of uniting all Temperance forces in this great struggle. In this connection we would not forget that this organization in unison with others, was a most potent factor in securing the passage of the Anti-Canteen law. We recommend that this Conference elect two of its members as delegates to the National Anti-Saloon Convention to be held in Washington, D. C., Dec. 3, 4, and 5, 1901.

Rules for Conference Treasurer.

1. The Treasurer shall prepare a duplicate of his report for the archives of the Conference which the custodian of the same shall see is duly placed therein.

2. The Treasurer shall forward, within fifteen days after adjournment of Conference, to the treasurer of each society or institution the money he shall have received for the same and shall present his receipt from these, severally, to the Auditing Committee of the Conference on the first day of the following Conference session.

3. Each minister, in his report for Conference Treasurer, shall enclose either a certified check from his local bank, or New York Exchange, or cash, or money order, together with his vouchers.

4. The Treasurer shall regard with absolute fidelity the Disciplinary requirement of receiving nothing except money or bona fide voucher. (Dis. ¶84 &2).

5. In order to simplify his work, the money for the American Bible Society shall be forwarded to New York, to the parent society.

Twentieth Century Thank Offering.

Your Committee on the 20th Century Thank Offering beg leave to make the following report:

As is known to all, the Conference at its last session deemed it advisable to continue the Secretary in the field, requiring that he give all his time to raising funds for the Conference Academy. Dr. J. D. C. Hanna, was therefore reappointed to the work on the following terms: He was to receive \$2,000, salary, out of which he was to pay his house rent, and which amount he was to take from his cash collections of this year. Any collections of subscriptions of last year were not to be used on salary of this year. Soon after Conference the Secretary paid over to the Wilmington Conference Academy the sum of \$1,250, including \$584.16, in the hands of

the Treasurer of the Committee, and on June 15th paid over \$157 additional, making a total of \$1,401 in cash that the Academy has received as a result of the 20th Century movement. This left a like amount of \$1,401 in the Secretary's hands belonging to the Conference Claimant Endowment Fund which he did not pay over. The Secretary entered upon his labours for the present year with great earnestness, but soon found the work very discouraging. He remained in the field until Nov. 11th when he was transferred by Bishop Joice to the Philadelphia Conference and stationed in West Chester, Pa.

During his work as Secretary for the present year he collected \$803.07 in cash, secured \$1,695 in conditional subscriptions, and \$406.66 in unconditional subscriptions. His expenses during these 8 months were \$1,386.80. When it was learned that Dr. Hanna was transferred, the committee thought it best to sell at once the furniture which had been provided for the Secretary and his family, and up to the present time have realized in cash from said sale \$306.74, with nearly \$50 yet outstanding, but which we think will be available. As Bro. Hanna was not able to collect sufficient funds to meet his expenses and support his family, he felt himself obliged to use some of the funds belonging to the Conference Endowment fund yet remaining in his hands from the collections of the previous year. For this reason the committee thought that the proceeds of the sale of the furniture, and whatever could be secured on unpaid subscriptions should be applied to reembursing the fund from which he had drawn his support.

At the request of the Committee the chairman has made an earnest effort to collect these unpaid subscriptions, and would acknowledge the receipt of the following sums—a part of which is from unpaid subscriptions of last year, and a part from the subscriptions of the present year:

Of this amount of \$1,111.99, it is apparent that \$757.80 belongs to the Conference Claimant Endowment fund, and that the remaining \$354.19 belongs, one half each to Wilmington Conference Academy and Conference Claimant Endowment fund. It is also apparent that there is yet due to the Conference Claimant Endowment fund by Brother Hanna the sum of \$643.20. As the Wilmington Conference Academy has received in full the one half of the net proceeds of last year's work, we recommend that all the funds now in the hands of the Committee be ordered paid to the Treasurer of the Board of Stewards for the Conference Claimant Endowment fund—and we further recommend that a committee be appointed to

settle with Dr. Hanna, and to pay over to the Treasurer of the two funds, as soon as the money has been received, the amount now in his hand.

The Committee would also report that whilst but little has been received for the special object named in the appointment of the Secretary, yet a noble work has been accomplished by the Churches and Pastors in the way of 20th Century Thank Offerings, in the large sums of money for the payment of church debts, and the building and improving of Churches and Parsonages throughout the Conference as the following figures will show:

MEMOIRS.

1901

Rev. Charles P. Swain.

The subject of this memoir, Charles P. Swain, was born near Knowls' Cross Roads, in Sussex county, Delaware, about six miles from Georgetown, June 2, 1859, and died at his parsonage home on Deal's Island, May 22, 1900.

His early life was spent on a farm where he was brought up by a godly Methodist father and a devout Baptist mother to fear the Lord. In the fall of '75 a lad named John Dotts, from a Philadelphia Orphaus' Home, influenced young Swain to seek the Lord at the altar in Corcord Church at a meeting conducted by Revs. Wm. M. Green and F. C. MacSorley, but he did not receive conscious acceptance until October 19, 1877, in a meeting at Asbury, on Lewisville Circuit, under the pastorate of Rev. Robert Roe.

With his conversion came the call to preach the gospel; but for a time he resisted the conviction, until finally his call to the work was so clear and convincing that he buried all other ambitions and dedicated himself to the work of the ministry.

His early educational advantages were limited, only such as the district school of that day afforded, but he had a thirst for knowledge, and by improving every opportunity, and utilizing fragments of time he soon prepared himself to enter the high school at Georgetown, Del., where, by close application, he qualified himself to teach. The next two years and a half were spent at Redden, Del., teaching school, clerking and acting as telegraph operator. While residing at Redden he was licensed to exhort. He was licensed to preach at Ellendale, January 1, 1887, and was soon thereafter sent to Hooper's, Island by P. E., Dr. John A. B. Wilson. His goods had been packed and were about to be shipped to Minneapolis, Minn., where he had been appointed to a charge, but Dr. Wilson prevailed upon him to take work in the Wilmington Conference, and he proved a valuable accession to our ranks, as his subsequent record shows.

His first charge was Hooper's Island, where he toiled three years. His success here proved that he was in his divinely appointed sphere. He found a church property comparatively worthless, a membership of thirty, paying \$75 salary; before he left, he built three new churches and one parsonage. A series of revivals on the charge increased the membership to 144 and the salary advance to \$500.

In '91, Crapo was the field of labor; here he was very successful.

'92-94 Frankford, Del., was blest with his labors and every department of the work felt the quickening impulses of his tireless enegry.

In the spring of '95 he was appointed to Tangier Island, where he served a five year term. This was the crowning work of his ministry. The salary was advanced and the benevolences greatly increased. A new church, modern in all its appointments, costing \$10,000 was built and nearly paid for. He conceived the enterprise, and his tireless endeavors and executive ability brought it to completion. It will stand as an enduring monument to his memory for years to come, and when that

society recently changed the name of the church from "Lee's Chapel" to the "Swain Memorial" it was a fitting recognition of the labors of one who well night gave his life that this enterprise might be consummated.

The people of Tangier regarded him but little less than a prophet. This man of Apostolic spirit has left his impress upon this work and his memory will be enshrined in their affections for years to come. His ministry at Deal's only lasted a few weeks. But in that short period he made for himself a large place in the affections of the people.

On May 5th he was compelled to take his bed never to enter the pulpit again. Pneumonia developed and this dread disease baffled all medical skill. Prayers, tears and the ministrations of loved ones proved unavailing. On Tuesday, May 22, in the silent watches of the night he relinquished the struggle, and opened his eyes to behold the unclouded glories of heaven.

Our ascended brother did not possess a strong body and might have lived longer in higher altitudes, but his entire ministry was spent in that part of the Conference where the atmosphere is heavy and makes against one with a predisposition to pulmonary trouble, the merciless foe which for some time had been relentlessly assailing the gates of his life.

The intelligence of his death was a great shock to the people of Deal's. Every home was filled with sorrow. When the news reached Tangier, the whole Island was in mourning. Young and old wept as if the home were bereft of some loved one.

His sick room was a veritable Bethel. He said to the writer, who visited him about a week before his death: "I long to be at rest."

The day before his departure he said to a friend: "When I am gone, write this epitaph upon my tomb: 'He had the testimony daily that he pleased God.'"

Those who witnessed the closing hours of the life of this servant of God will never forget it. Towards eventide he became unconscious, and as the night wore away he passed on to that supernal light that breaks forever from the throne of God and of the Lamb. From our view-point it seems a calamity to family, friends, the church and the world that such a man's sun should set at noonday.

Seldom has a minister of our Conference compressed more permanent achievement into thirteen years than did our departed brother. He threw himself with passionate ardor into the work of the church. He believed that faithful pastoral visitation would increase his efficiency, so he visited from house to house, prayed with the people and entreated them to flee the wrath to come. He always had a message of consolation for the sorrowing and a word of cheer for the disheartened; the poor and needy ever found in him an unfailing friend.

He had an unusual insight into the holy Scriptures, and was able in a remarkable degree to bring forth "things new and old" from this inexhaustible treasure-house. He was a great Bible preacher, and his versatility in science, art and literature enabled him to illuminate the Word until it stood out in simplicity and beauty before his hearers. He preached to the conscience with that power and unction which none possess save him who dwells in the secret place of the Most High. "He was a good man, full of the Holy Ghost and of faith, and much people were added unto the Lord."

He was naturally timid, but truth and moral enthusiasm made him brave. He

was an uncompromising foe of the liquor traffic and in every reform employed both tongue and pen to arouse the people to determined action. He would never stoop to questionable methods to advance his personal interests. His life conspicuously illustrated the words of the Master—"If thine eye be single, thy whole body shall be full of light." All of his splendid powers were unreservedly consecrated to God.

He contributed many articles and poems to the secular and religious press.

A year before his death he published a history of Tangier Island, which is a monument to his industry and literary toil.

For some time he edited the Sunday School Department of the Conference Herald and his lesson notes were both interesting and instructive. But our brother's toil is ended, and while we are still on the field of battle, he has received his discharge, and ascended to citizenship in the triumphant company of believers.

Brother Swain was ordained Deacon at Milford in 1890 by Bishop Bowman and Elder at Wilmington in '92 by Bishop Andrews.

On March 1, 1881 he was married to Miss Martha H. Messick, of Sussex County, Del., who shared with him the joys and sorrows of the itinerant life. The grief stricken widow and eight children survive him, one sweet girl of eight summers having preceded the father to the heavenly home. Impressive funeral services were held in Deal's Island Church, Thursday afternoon May 24. A fearful rainstorm prevented the people of Tangier and other charges from attending. Immanuel Church sent floral designs as a testimonial of affection. In the absence of the P. E., Dr. Martindale, who was at the General Conference, the writer was requested to preach the funeral sermon. Revs. G. R. Neese and Asbury Burke assisted in the service, and paid touching and beautiful tributes to his memory. Loving hands then tenderly laid him to rest in the Deal's Island Cemetery near the grave of Rev. Joshua Thomas, "the Parson of the Islands," to sleep till the resurrection morn.

Rev. David F. Waddell, D. D.

July 16, 1852, there was born near Preston, Md., in the home of Collison Waddell, a baby boy. It was a Methodist home in which this new comer first opened his eyes, the father being an exhorter and class leader of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Preston.

His boyhood was spent on the farm, and his schooling in those early days was received at the Preston Academy. After graduation from the Academy he taught for several years, but God had other work for him.

During the pastorate of Rev. E. H. Hynson, September 14, 1870, the boy was converted and joined the church, and commenced his life work for the Master.

It was not long before the church recognized his talent and gave him work. First he was elected superintendent of his home Sunday School, and this was followed shortly after by being licensed as an exhorter.

So well did he use this office in the church that in less than two years, namely, on August 17, 1872, he was licensed to preach, having already preached his first sermon on his 19th anniversary. Believing that he was called of God to preach and to go out in the active work of the itinerant, he applied to the church for work, and was assigned as Junior Preacher of Lakesville Circuit in 1873, Rev. W. J.

DuHadway being preacher in charge. It was during this year on July 24, that he was married to Miss Deborah R. Thomas, daughter of William J. Thomas, of Bethlehem, Md.

The following year, in 1874, Brother Waddell was admitted on trial into the Wyoming Conference. Here he spent six years in active service, and in the spring of 1880, Bishop Harris transferred him to our Conference and stationed him at Red Lion and Glasgow, Delaware. Here his real work for the Wilmington Conference began, and since that time he has served the following charges, and for the indicated time:—

1880, Red Lion; '81-2, Christiana; '83-4, Appoquinimink; '85, Berlin; '86-7, Gumboro; '88-90, Nanticoke; '91, Galestown; '92-94, Madeley; '95, Lincoln; '96-7, Felton; '98-99, Millington.

His last appointment was at Millsboro, Delaware, to which he was appointed March, 1900. The appointment was a great disappointment to him, and while the people were as kind to him as they could be, he felt very keenly what he believed to be the humiliation of being sent to the charge, and the subsequent worry from the appointment was doubtless the one cause that hastened his death.

Seeing how keenly he felt the disappointment, he was urged by his wife and children to resign from the ministry, as they feared the effect of his worrying upon his physical powers, which were never very strong. To this he would not listen, however, but went to his charge to do his best. His sermons were well received, but he was not able to continue the hard work of a circuit like that, and, in the midst of his usefulness he was stricken with a slight stroke of paralysis. From this he partially rallied, however, and decided to fill his appointment at Dagsboro, Sunday, September 2, against the doctor's protest. While in the pulpit attempting to preach he reeled and would have fallen but friendly hands helped him down and into a carriage and he was brought home, never to enter the pulpit again. The dread disease, paresis, had fixed its grasp upon him and held him till death released him from its relentless grasp.

All that love could devise, or medical skill plan was done for his comfort and for his restoration; but all in vain. Seeing that he could not recover, his faithful wife, worn out by incessant vigil, removed him to a hospital in Baltimore. Here he seemed to rally somewhat; and on being removed to the new home in Westminster which had been selected because of its healthful location, it was hoped that he might continue to improve. Once he aroused as from a slumber and expressed his pleasure at seeing the home and his surroundings, and thanked wife and children for their kindness in planning it for him so beautifully, but very soon he passed into a dreamy state from which he did not arouse until his eyes opened on the glories of the world beyond. He passed away quietly surrounded by his dear ones, early in the morning of Thursday, December 20, 1900.

The funeral was held Saturday, December 22, in charge of Rev. Vaughan S. Collins, of the Wilmington Conference, assisted by Rev. E. L. Hubbard, Ph. D., Rev. D. H. Carroll, D. D., Rev. Job A. Price, D. D., of the Baltimore Conference After a word of prayer at the residence, No. 39 Liberty Street the body was taken to the Methodist Episcopal Church in Westminster where a more formal service was held. The remains were laid away to rest in the cemetery to await the resurrection of the just.

The work and worth of our deceased brother is well understood by the members of the Wilmington Conference. Fond of study, he applied himself with diligence to various branches of learning. Not only was he well drilled in the Bible and in the theology of his church, but he made quite a study of medicine and held the degree of Doctor in Medicine as well as Doctor in Divinity. His preaching was logical and was above the average in lucidity and power.

As a husband he was gentle and loving. As a father he was kind and was almost idolized by his children. He maintained family prayer until he became so weak that it was necessary to assist him to his knees for prayer, and to assist him from his knees when the prayer had ended.

He leaves a large family to mourn his loss, the faithful wife, who has been his companion and help-meet from the days of their childhood, and six children, three girls and three boys. Two of the sons, Collison F. and Walter H., are merchants in the town of Westminster, and seek to make a home for the mother and the rest of the family. Raymond S., a former student of the Academy, is now reading law in Westminster; Minnie R. is studying music in Baltimore; Sarah A. is a teacher in a school at Blackiston, Delaware; while Ethel, the youngest, remains at home to comfort mother.

Rev. B. F. Price.

[The death of B. F. Price during the session of Conference has made it impossible in the brief time allowed to secure an adequate Memoir. The following brief note is inserted with the expectation of a more complete sketch in the next edition.—The Secretaries.]

Rev. Benjamin F. Price, died at his home in Elkton, Md. late Friday afternoon, March 22, 1901, after a short illness, aged 85 years.

Rev. B. F. Price was the oldest member of the Wilmington M. E. Conference and is said to have been the oldest Methodist minister in point of active service, in the United States. He possessed remarkable energy and was on the street not many days previous to his death. He was a kindly courteous gentleman and had many friends. Mr. Price was a son of Benjamin Price and was born at Harmony Mills, Del., in 1816. When 16 years of age he went to Elkton and clerked in the store of the late William Torbert for four years, at which time he was licensed to preach and became a member of the Philadelphia Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He continued in this Conference until the Wilmington Conference was formed 33 years ago.

His first charge was at Denton, Md., in 1836, being then 20 years of age. In 1837 he was stationed at Kent, Md.; in 1838 at Centreville; in 1839 at Dover, Del.; in 1840 at Asbury, Philadelphia; in 1841-2 at Middletown, Del.; in 1843-4 at Millington, Md.; in 1845-6 at Baston, Md.; in 1847-8 at Centreville, Md.; in 1849-50 at Dorchester Circuit; in 1851-2 at Princess Anne; in 1853-4 at Talbot; in 1855 at Newark, Del.; in 1857-8 at Delaware City, Del.; in 1859 at Minersville; in 1860 at Mauchchunk, Pa.; in 1861-2 at Norristown; in 1863-4 at Central, Philadelphia; in 1855-6 at Easton; in 1867-8 at Milford; in 1869-70 at Elkton; in 1871-2 at North East; in 1873-4 at Cecilton; in 1875-6 at Greensboro; in 1877-9 at Delaware City; in 1880-2 at Kent Island; in 1883 at Queenstown; in 1884-6 at Madeley, Wilmingon; in 1887-91 at Christiana; in 1892-3 at Hopewell; in 1894-5 at Stockton, In

1895 Mr. Price was granted a superannuated relation and retired from active work in the ministry. He removed to Elkton, where he has since resided with his wife. At Hopewell Church, in Cecil county, which was one of his last charges a memorial window has been placed in the church in his memory.

Mr. Price was married three times, and is survived by four children of his first wife, Lewis L. Price, of Wilmington; James M., William R. and Dr. George V. Price, of New York. In 1887 he married Miss Husband, of Wilmington, who survives him.

The funeral services were held Monday aft rnoon in the Elkton M. E. Church. Those assisting in the services and paying tributes to their daparted friend were: Rev. John McElmoyle, of the Presbyterian Church, Rev. William Schouler, of Trinity P. E. Church, Rev. T. E. Terry, Rev. C. W. Prettyman and Hon. Henry C. Conrad. The remains lay in the church all night and were taken to Still Pond Tuesday morning for interment.

Mrs. Dora Louisa Compton.

Dora Louisa Fahnestock, wife of Rev. W. P. Compton was born in Lancaster, Pa., January 17, 1858, and departed this life Oct. 2, 1900. At the age of twelve years she was confirmed in the Protestant Episcopal Church, in which communion she continued until her marrirge with Bro. Compton, May 8, 1888, when she united with the Methodist Episcopal Church in Princess Anne, Marylaud, her first home in the itinerancy. She immediately became a teacher in the Sabbath School and a worker in the Church. From that time until the close of her earthly existence she devoted herself with untiring energy to the advancement of God's cause as the help-meet of our Brother whose name and joys and sorrows she had covenanted to share for life. And for twelve years she brightened the home and helped bear the burdens of the pastorate with Brother Compton at Greenwood, Bridgeville, Chestertown, Port Deposit and Newark, mingling her prayers and tears with his for the blessing of their Heavenly Father upon the work to which they had consecrated their lives. No matter what the condition, sunshine or shadow, sickness or health, prosperity or adversity, smiling success or apparent failure this devoted wife always brought to our Brother the warmth, devotion and inspiration that only such a loving heart can bring.

Sister Compton came of a family whose affection for each other was most pronounced, and when God blessed her with bright little children it seemed as if the softened and sublime hues of Heaven's holy light illumined her home and heart, and intensified this dominant characteristic of her being so that she became in the sublimest sense "a queen of the home." To the writer's own saddened heart there comes many fond and tender recollections of bowing at the family altar in this home, where father, mother and children mingled their voices in fervent petition and joyous thanksgiving, and where the voice of praise ascended like incense from the altar of their hearts to Him that sitteth on the everlasting throne of love in the heaven of heavens.

After her family responsibilities increased, her opportunities for public work in the Master's vineyard were necessarily lessened, but her interest and devotion to the cause of Christ were none the less pronounced; from her bright home and loving heart there continually radiated plans for the advancement of God's kingdom.

Sister Compton was a delightful entertainer, affable, sincere, affectionate, always cheerful but never frivolous, she seemed to have a power of attraction which gained for her a wide circle of friends; and this large circle which enjoyed the kind hospitality of ther home, will cherish with tender remembrance the cordiality with which she always received them. Even when her natural animation was modified by affliction and suffering, it did not destroy her cheerful and hospitable spirit; down to the very hour of her transition this Christlike chrracteristic of her nature was manifest. Just a few hours before the end came, she said to the writer, who sat by her couch: "I want to have you and your wife for tea as soon as I get home." But as I held the hand from whose body the spirit was slipping toward the eternal shore, I knew that that anticipated entertainment would be in her heavenly home, the blessed "Our Father's house," and the feast would be one of everlasting love.

The end came peacefully, she received the Holy Communion from the hands of Dr. Watt, expressing her unbounded faith in Christ and perfect submission to His will;—and God took her. Human ingenuity did all in its power and sanctified medical skill resorted to every device yet revealed to science, to retain this loved one to earth and restore her to the bosom of her family and friends; but vain are human attemps to keep from heaven the soul that God has designated as heaven's own. We thought her life work uncompleted, but a loving heavenly Father who never makes a mistake, measured the sighs tears and anxieties and struggles and victories of this earthly existence, and said "Well done."—and this loving wife, filial daughter, sacrificing mother and devout follower of the Lord Jesus Christ entered in holy triumph into the "rest that remaineth to the people of God."

The immediate dear ones of Sister Compton upon the earth are a sorrow stricken husband, a mother, two sisters and five small children. The eternal God is their refuge, and underneath are the everlasting arms."

Funeral services were conducted in the Methodist Episcopal Church of Newark, Del., on Friday, October 5, by Rev. Robert Watt, D. D., assisted by Revs. W. M. Jefferies, D.D. Rector of St. Thomas' P.E. Church, Newark, Wm. J.Rowan, Ph. D. and Joel S. Gilfillan of the Presbyterian Church; A. S. Mowbray, J. W. Easley, H. S. Thompson and Aloysius Green of the Wilmington Conference. The services were continued on Saturday, Oct. 6, at Churchtown, Lancaster Co., Penna., in the Methodist Episcopal Church by the writer, assisted by the pastors of the P. E. and and M. E. Churches. With the impressive commitment of the Church of Christ, all that was mortal of Sister Compton was tenderly laid to rest in the beautiful hill-side cemetery in whose immediate vicinity many of her happy girlhood days were spent and the sad company of friends, who had come from far and near with fond and tender recollections of other days, to pay their last tribute of respect, separated with heaven instilled anticipations of the sweet reunion on the vernal shores of peace.

Mrs. May B. Taylor.

Another conference year crowded with unalloyed blessings to most of us, has brought bitterness into a few of our parsonage homes.

It becomes our privilege to enter one of these saddened doors, and, if possible, to speak a word of comfort or carry that sympathy of silence which will sit seven

days and seven nights, if need be, without speaking a word and on departing leave a tribute or token of love for the dead.

Mrs. May Buyers Taylor the wife of my college friend and our brother minister William Prettyman Taylor, suddenly on August 3rd, 1900, bade "good-bye" to her earthly friends and obeyed the unseen messenger of the Lord who told her to come up higher.

Sister Taylor was a native of Pennsylvania, having been brought up in Sunbury. She was one of a large family of children who were born to intelligent Christian parents in whose home was given that broadening and quickening and spiritualizing training which in later life placed both a son and a daughter in Methodist parsonages.

Sister Taylor early became a Christian and under the ministry of Rev. H. C. Pardoe and of Rev. W. W. Evans, D. D., of the Central Pennsylvania Conference she began her training in church activities.

While at Dickinson College, Bro. Taylor met the subject of our memoir and the acquaintance ripened until soon after Brother Taylor's graduation from Drew and while he was pastor of Perryville, Miss Buyers became his wife.

She at once won her way to the hearts of the people, and long after they were sent to another pastorate did their successor hear Sister Taylor's praises sounded by all. "A bright and cheerful woman."—"A never wearying helper of the people."—"A sympathetic friend in times of sorrow."—"A sincere and earnest Christian worker" were the judgements of those who knew her.

And so did Sister Taylor conduct herself to the last. Time after time she went with a sweet and quiet spirit to discouraging fields, and time after time did her amiable ways encourage her husband and help to win the love of their people.

At Beckwith and Spedden, Brother and Sister Taylor found an eager people who responded to their leadership and who gave them a comfortable welcome, but long expected help was too late. A tired body could no longer serve the people and a saintly woman was compelled to lie down for rest. Although sick for several weeks her friends had no anticipation of a fatal termination until the death stroke fell;—when as though to indicate the kind of toil in which she had spent herself she passed away of "heart failure."

The Lord knows best where he needs his servants, but we who are short-sighted feel as if He had called from Earth a much needed Christian worker and we are sure He has sent a woeful affliction into a Methodist minister's life. With Christian resignation we bow to a Providence which we cannot understand and pray that a loving Father will lift up His downcast servant and tenderly care for a motherless child.
