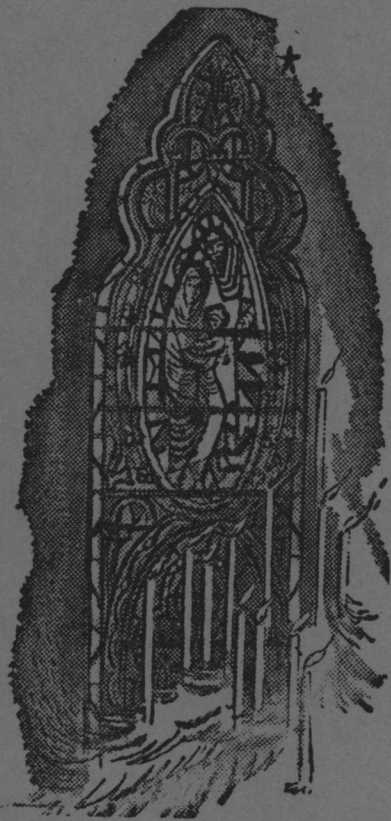

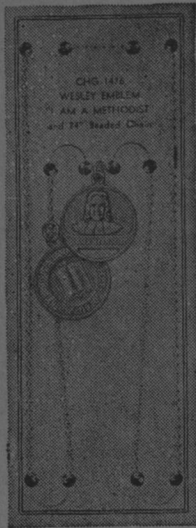

WESLEY MEDAL—"I AM A METHODIST"

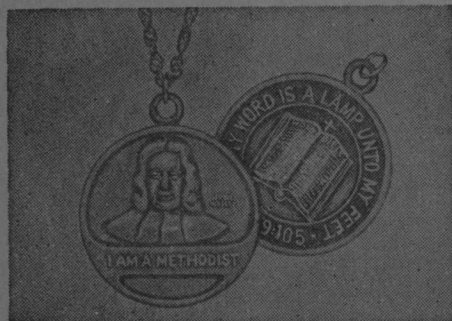

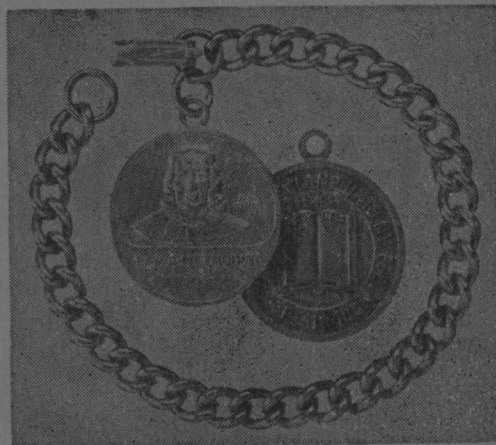

REPORT: The following report of the point committee appointed at the last session of the Conference to define what constitutes a Part and Full Time Approved Supply Pastor was adopted by the Conference.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO DEFINE THE FULL-TIME AND PART-TIME APPROVED SUPPLY PASTOR

Legislative action by the General Conference of 1960 on the matter is as follows:

Paragraph 317. 2. Full-time approved supply pastors. A full-time approved supply pastor is a local preacher, ordained or unordained, (A) who meets the provisions of Paragraphs 306-7; 315-17; (B) who, unless he be ordained elder, has met the educational requirements by completing in the preceding year a full year's study under the Department of Ministerial Education (see Paragraphs 307, sub-paragraph 2; 318; 2041-2048) either in a school for courses of study or by correspondence; (C) who devotes his entire service to the church in the charge to which he is appointed; and (D) whose cash support per annum from all church sources is a sum equivalent to not less than the minimum salary established by the Annual Conference for full-time approved supply pastors. (See Paragraph 1631).

Paragraph 317. 3. Part-time approved supply pastors. A part-time approved supply pastor is one who fulfills the requirements for a full-time approved supply pastor (Paragraphs 317-318) (see sub-paragraph 2 above) except that, (A) he does not devote his entire service to the charge to which he is appointed; (B) he does not receive in cash support per annum from all church sources a sum equivalent to the minimum salary established by the Annual Conference for full-time approved supply pastors; and (C) he completes a minimum of 2 books a year in the course of study.

A person who has met the qualifications for approval as a supply pastor may request to be classified as a part-time approved supply pastor for the ensuing year.

Paragraph 1631. Full-time approved service for which pension credit may be given shall mean service under appointment as pastor to a charge, for which the pastor's cash support per annum from all church sources shall be a sum equivalent to not less than the minimum salary established by the conference for full-time approved supply pastors.

On the basis of this legislation, the Committee to define the full-time and part-time approved supply pastor recommends the following:

1. That this legislation take effect as of the Conference session of 1961, and pertain to the Conference year 1961-62 and subsequent years.

2. That during the Conference year 1960-61 the following steps be taken:

a. A form shall be prepared by the Board of Ministerial Training and qualifications covering the four categories listed in Paragraph 317 in the 1960 Discipline. This form shall be distributed to all Approved Supply Pastors. Each Approved Supply Pastor and each applicant for the status of Approved Supply Pastor will fill in the form and return it to the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications by March 1 of 1961 indicating thereby his request to be classified as either a Full-time or Part-time Approved Supply Pastor during the next year.

b. When approved by the Conference, this list of Full-time and Part-time Approved Supply Pastors shall appear in the Conference Journal as the official record of service.

c. At the end of the Conference year 1961-62, the list shall be reviewed by the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications with reference to the fulfillment of the requirements in Paragraph 317, shall be changed as necessary, and approved by the Conference. Any such revisions will be amendments to the original list and will thus become the official record of service.

d. This same procedure shall be followed in subsequent years.

Bishop Oxnam and Members of the Conference:

Bishop Arthur J. Moore, of the Atlantic Area, enjoys telling this story. Down in Georgia a little boy handed his examination questions in early. The teacher thought that he had finished too early, and she opened the paper to see what he had put down. He had written across the otherwise blank page: "I don't know the answers, but I love my teacher." After three years' testing on the district I am far from being head of the class. I do know that, despite my failures, I love my Lord and His Church. Both have a place for me in life-time service.

Redeeming love has been my theme,
 And shall be till I die.

Longfellow called children "angels of God in disguise." Born in the parsonage this conference year were: Andrea Lee Lucia, August 16, 1959; Mark Edward Irwin, October 2, 1959, and Denise Ann Shockley, February 20, 1960. Those who came into the great discovery that this earth is not enough were: William H. Revelle, Sr., George Emmett Wood, and Mrs. J. M. Yingling. Quoting Tagore: "Death is not extinguishing the light; it is putting out the lamp because the dawn has come." So, to you with loved ones gone for a while, there is radiant morning everywhere. God's morning!

In January, after a long and successful pastorate at Mount Olivet, Seaford, Walter H. Stone became executive secretary of the Peninsula Conference Board of Education. John N. Link was appointed for the remainder of the conference year. Needless to say, the work has not suffered. Within a few months this retired minister and former district superintendent has led more than fifty people into the membership of the church. There is an amazing record of pastoral visitation. And one man said: "I never knew a district superintendent could preach!"

We are called to be evangelists. Says Stephen Neill: "It is not permitted for a minister to say 'I am not an evangelist.' The minister is ordained for the purpose of bringing men and women to Christ; if he is not doing it, it is questionable whether he ought to be in the ministry at all. Equally, it is not open for a layman to say, 'I cannot be an evangelist.' If he is a Christian he must be a witness. If he is not willing to be a witness, it is time he gave up calling himself a Christian." This year we have received 738 on profession of faith, 335 by transfer of membership, and 92 from other denominations. The grant total is 1165. Churches reporting more than ten accessions are: Wesley, Dover 171; Mt. Olivet, Seaford, 81; Lewes, 76; Avenue, Milford, 72; Dagsboro, 51; Smyrna, 43; Grace, George-

Pleasant, 20; Lincoln, 20; Wesley, Georgetown, 17; Camden, 17; Ocean View, 17; Wyoming, 17; Magnolia, 16; Cheswold, 15; Greenwood, 15; Bethel, 14; Georgetown Circuit, 13; Nassau, 12; Reliance, 11; Christ, Laurel, 12; Clayton, 11; Cannon, 10; Roxana, 10.

Ocean View and St. John's, Seaford, consecrated their new educational and social units. Rehoboth is building its new sanctuary at a cost of \$197,000. Milton's building plans are more advanced than they were, but there are still delays. Mt. Pleasant and Magnolia are almost through construction of their educational and social units. Asbury, Harrington, has remodeled the sanctuary. Lewes (Bethel), Hartley and Friendship, White's Chapel and Zion (Nassau), and Middletown have improved their sanctuaries. Dagsboro has purchased a building for educational purposes. Mt. Zion and Harrington (Trinity), are planning church school buildings. Groom, Lewes, is erecting an addition for its church school. Clayton has remodeled its parsonage, and a new parsonage will be built at Smyrna. Smyrna also plans an educational unit in the near future. Wesley, Dover, will rebuild its organ.

The district has raised \$71,038 for General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$4606 for Advance Specials; \$5365 for Wesley Foundation; \$9577 for Wesley College; \$25,140 for Wesley College Capital Improvement Fund; \$8,784 for Wesley Theological Seminary. Other offerings for the year were: World Wide Communion, \$4265; Week of Dedication, \$616; Rally Day, \$1908; Methodist Youth Fund, \$778; Board of Child Care, \$4,121; Race Relations, \$367; Student Day, \$971; Mother's Day (Methodist Country House) \$2873.

Our Woman's Society of Christian Service has a membership of 5781, an increase of 226. Pledges amounted to \$11,569; other causes, \$2368. Mrs. Edgar Timmons is president. More than 1200 men attended the five Lenten breakfasts. John R. Rogers is the district lay leader. 400 men attended the annual Lay banquet addressed by Dr. T. H. Palmquist.

A lecturer in a small town said: "Of course, you know what a corpuscle is like." The chairman interrupted: "Most of us do, but you had better explain for the benefit of those that have never been inside one." Here is a task for John Gunther to write the new title: INSIDE THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENCY. If some of our laymen knew but half of what must go on inside, they would have more respect for the office and the men who serve it. Writes Bishop Gerald Kennedy: "I wish that every layman and preacher of the Church could sit through a Cabinet meeting. They would never doubt that the welfare of the churches and the men receives the best consideration and oversight it is possible for sinful men to give. I would rather place my life in the hands of a Methodist Cabinet than to risk it with any other group in the world." Serving as a district superintendent humbles me, troubles me, and yet thrills me with the meaning and importance of the work I am trying to get done. Thanks to the preachers and laymen who are helping me to do it. Thanks to my brothers in the Cabinet.

It is very difficult to realize that Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam, churchman of the globe and statesman of the nations, is soon to retire. This winged Wesley has made the world his parish next door. In the prophetic ministry of his Redeemer and Lord he has looked with compassion upon the multitudes. He will be listed with the great of church history. Grateful are we that he and the charming, gifted, devoted Mrs. Oxnam have come our way. We shall continue being grateful for them. We shall hold them in treasured memory. We have seen fulfilled in them the promise: "The path of the just is as the shining light that shineth more and more unto the perfect day."

Bishop Oxnam, colleagues in the District Superintendency, members of The Peninsula Conference and friends, I bring to you in summary form the result of the labor and consecration of the ministers and churches of the Easton District.

Let us stop however to note the passing of two revered members of our body. Dr. Walter E. Gunby and the Reverend Leolan Jackson were granted long years and their presence will be greatly missed. Truly "They rest from their labors, and their works do follow them." In September the pastor of Sudlersville suffered a nervous breakdown and on December 1st was relieved of his duties. The Reverend George H. Bennett, retired minister of The Baltimore Conference, has very faithfully and successfully served this charge for the rest of the conference year.

Our sadness is lessened somewhat in the joy which has come to seven of our parsonage homes. Mr. and Mrs. Jas. A. Kees and Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Strickler are the richer for daughters born to them, and sons have gladdened the homes of Mr. and Mrs. J. Lake Church, Mr. and Mrs. Fred A. Arndt, Mr. and Mrs. Richard D. Bailey, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Horney and Mr. and Mrs. Harold Spedden.

Our churches are becoming better organized and the authorized commissions are increasing the effectiveness of their work. Work with The Woman's Society of Christian Service, Youth on The District and Sub District levels, Methodist Men, and the various emphases of The Boards and Commissions of the church have provided challenge and resulted in a record achievement in which we can all take justifiable pride.

In our stewardship of substance we have numerous evidences of growth. In every asking of our churches we have shown an increase over last year except in Advance Specials. The totals as reported to me, given for World Service and Conference Benevolences are \$57,931.00; Wesley Foundation \$4,274.00; Wesley College Operation fund \$7,131.00; Wesley Seminary \$7,157.00; Wesley College Capital improvements \$14,448.00; Advance Specials \$2,732.00; Rally Day \$1,663.00; Week of Dedication \$605.00; MYF Fund \$1054.00; Race Relations \$255.00; Child Care \$4,104.00; Methodist Country House \$1,682.00; Suffering and Service \$1,237.00.

Locally our charges have spent on Building and Improvements \$133,636.00. Those paying over \$1,000.00 are Cambridge Grace \$8,257.00, Cambridge St. Paul's, in the process of building a \$120,000.00 Educational unit has pledged toward this project \$99,000.00 and paid since September 1959 \$27,200.00. Chestertown Christ \$10,500.00, Crumpton \$3,000.00, Concord \$2,800.00, Denton First \$8,379.00, Denton Grace \$2,496.00, Easton St. Marks \$10,500.00, Federalsburg \$5,903.00, Goldsboro \$2,550.00, Greensboro \$20,500.00 on an Educational addition costing \$45,000.00, Harmony \$1,512.00, Marydel \$1,655.00, Millington \$2,500.00, Hillsboro \$7,925.00, Queens-town \$20,000.00 on a new church costing \$35,000.00, Rock Hall \$5,082.00, St. James \$29,500.00 on a new hall costing \$45,000.00, St. Thomas \$15,000.00, Still Pond \$1,228.00, and Vienna \$3,147.00.

In addition we have paid on debt \$140,371.00. Charges paying \$1,000.00 or more are as follows. Cambridge Zion \$47,176.00, Centreville \$2,900.00, Chestertown First \$9,950.00, Church Creek \$8,063.00, Church Hill \$3,400.00, Dorchester \$1,700.00, Easton St. Marks \$25,791.00, Galena \$2,000.00, Hurlock \$6,024.00, Ingleside \$1,062.00, Queenstown \$5,000.00; Ridgley \$3,365.00, Rock Hall \$1,326.00, Royal Oak \$4,000.00, St. James \$1,565.00; St. Thomas \$1,100.00, Still Pond \$1,573.00; Trappe \$7,800.00, Vienna \$4,135.00; Wesley Chapel \$2,500.00.

In harmony with the policy established in 1954 we have been busy trying to re-align churches to make possible a more effective ministry to our people. It has been our constant effort to eliminate over-lapping and competition and at the same time provide a full work load for the pastor and an adequate support for him and his family. Dr. Brewer has stated in his report on Town and Country that 400 members, plus constituents is an honest work load and that this number is the average needed to sustain an effective ministry. We cannot hope to reach this ideal estate for some of our churches have very small memberships and their location demands that they be nurtured. In June the Hickman church on Burrsville Charge voted to discontinue and the Busic church on Ingleside Charge is being discontinued at this conference.

The following charge realignments have been made and all have been accepted in a fine spirit of cooperation. Royal Oak has been attached to

Oxford, Grace Church, Denton attached to First Church Denton, Goldsboro and Marydel charges combined in one charge. The Ingleside charge discontinued and Barclay and Ingleside attached to Sudlersville, Double Creek has been detached from Sudlersville and attached to Millington. Crumpton served by the pastor of Christ Church Chestertown has been attached to Millington. The Rock Hall and Wesley Chapel Charges are to be one charge. As a result of these adjustments every one of these churches will be served by effective ministers giving full time service.

Together with these mergers and adjusted changes has come a noticeable increase in ministerial support. A total increase of \$11,980.00 has been given as follows. Salary \$5,950.00, Car expense \$100.00, and \$5,930.00 for utilities. We will have forty charges next year and the average total support, plus furnished parsonage will be \$5,732.00 or an increase over last year of \$1,058.00.

I am confident that we will show more progress in this area the coming year.

Our problem of enough effective ministers to serve our churches is still with us. We are not securing enough replacements to meet our needs. This should become one of our major concerns. Through prayer, personal influence, and the confrontation of our young men and women with the need we should find many who will give themselves to the varied services of the Christian Church around the world. An active committee on Christian Vocations in each charge would help meet the needs of this hour.

In closing I pay my tribute to Bishop Oxnam whose service to his church and to the Ecumenical Movement has been unsurpassed, and to Mrs. Oxnam who has won the undying affection of us all. Bishop Oxnam I am grateful that I have been privileged to serve under your Superintendency, in the pastorate and on the district, and I shall remember with joy that you counted me worthy of the privilege. May God bless you and Mrs. Oxnam and give you joy in the years of service yet to be.

Bishop Oxnam and Members of the Conference:

I have not heard that Mr. Shakespeare ever held any episcopal office, but one of his characters, Macbeth, must have been a district superintendent, for he said, "Bring me no more reports, let them fly all." At this time of year all of us are sympathetic to that idea. Yet we know there is greater wisdom in Carlyle, who in quoting Mr. Burke, says, "There are Three Estates in Parliament; but, in the reporters gallery yonder, there sits a Fourth Estate more important far than they all." The Christian Church has always made big business of the "Fourth Estate"; for, we publish glad tidings, we tell the good news, we report the advance.

To be the reporter for The Salisbury District is an honor for which I am deeply grateful and humbly proud. Yet, without false modesty I reaffirm that the honor really belongs to forty-four of the finest pastors, and to a host of the most loyal laymen a superintendent could ever have. The spirit of cooperation and good will is our finest asset. Here, now, is the record of what we have done together, God being our helper.

Membership and Evangelism

We have 17,672 members of The Methodist Church in the forty-four charges on The Salisbury District. To this number we have added some 869 new persons during this conference year. Five hundred and ninety-six of these come on Profession of Faith, two hundred and five have been transferred and sixty-eight have come from other denominations. For the third successive year no charge in the district has failed to report some accession. Yet it is a matter of great concern to me that while we report substantial gains in membership each year, there is always a corresponding loss far greater than should be. The result is that the real gain is far too small. Our churches continue to prune their membership, and I fear there is a tendency on the part of many local Commissions on Membership and Evangelism to be more conscious of the presence of those who ought to come off of the rolls of the church than of those who ought to come on. The greatest poverty of our church today is along spiritual lines.

The largest gains in membership are reported by the following charges: Bethesda, Salisbury, 97; Asbury, Salisbury, 75; Grace, Salisbury, 42 and Trinity, Salisbury, 40. One rural charge, Galestown, under the leadership of an Approved Supply Pastor, leads with 45 accessions. St. Andrews, Salisbury; Quantico; Ocean City; Berlin; Bishopville and Delmar, First, each report thirty or more new members, while twenty or more accessions are reported by Parsonsburg; Asbury, Crisfield; Fruitland; Princess Anne; Snow Hill, Bates and Stockton-Girdletree.

Christian Education

Our Church Schools continue to be well-attended and to grow as we steadily improve our facilities and the quality of our work. During the first three years of the quadrennium we spent \$574,147.00 for building and improvements. To this sum we have added this year an amount of \$232,165.00 bringing the total to \$806,312.00. Much of these funds has gone into the construction of new educational units. This year, Zion Church, on the Parsonsburg Charge completed and consecrated a new educational unit costing \$40,000.00. In June, Whatcoat Church, Snow Hill, will complete and occupy its new educational building now under construction, at a cost of more than \$130,000. \$75,000 of this amount has been raised and paid during the year. All of our annual interests and special concerns of the Church School have been emphasized and our charges report offerings of \$1,480. for Rally Day and \$736.00 for Methodist Student's Day.

Christian Higher Education

Our real advance is in the realm of Christian Higher Education, where we have contributed the sum of \$52,822. during the year. Our churches on the Salisbury District have given \$30,630. to the Wesley College Capital Improvement Fund. Of the forty-four churches on the Salisbury District only one is failing to participate in this program. The following table will show the participation of each charge:

World Service and Conference Benevolence

We have overpaid the district apportionment for Administration and Conference Benevolence by a little more than \$500. Forty-two of our forty-four charges accepted and paid in full all of their askings, and three charges paid more than they were apportioned. In all, we have given \$64,203 this year.

General Advance Specials

Last Fall the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation of The Methodist Church reported to me that for the first three years of the quadrennium, the Salisbury District had contributed the sum of \$35,387. to General Advance Specials. This year we have increased our giving over any previous year to \$13,934. bringing our total gifts for the quadrennium to \$49,321. Twenty-seven of our charges are participating in this program. Special recognition should go to the following charges for their share in the work:

The Woman's Society of Christian Service contributed \$11,700 to the conference missionary pledge. Offerings for World-Wide Communion and The Week of Dedication amounted to \$2,368.

Ministerial Support

Last year, our Commission on World Service and Finance requested all of our charges to assume the basic cost of general parsonage utilities and suggested a goal of three years in which time it was to be achieved. Twenty-four, or more than half of our charges are now participating in this program.

Next year our pastors will receive \$15,455 more for ministerial support than last year which represents the largest increase of any year during the quadrennium. We have steadily forged ahead in this area of our work so that next year the annual support of our pastors will be \$48,086 ahead of what it was at the beginning of the quadrennium. Special recognition should be given to St. John's, Fruitland; Salem Church, Pocomoke; and to Sharptown, Mt. Vernon, where, in each case the increase will amount to \$1,000 or more. Debt Reduction and Building Improvements

Twenty-seven charges report having paid \$87,466 on debts, and thirty-five charges have spent \$232,165. on building and improvements. New heating systems have been installed at Crisfield, Mt. Pleasant; Synepuxent,

Ocean City; St. Andrews, Salisbury; and in the parsonage at Willards. Pocomoke, Salem has installed a new organ at a cost of \$22,550. Wenona, on the Deal Island Charge has installed a new electric organ, and Bethesda Church, Salisbury, has contracted for a new organ which is to cost approximately \$40,000.

During the year, new and adjoining properties have been acquired by Fruitland, St. Johns; Bethesda, Salisbury; St. Andrew, Salisbury; and Trinity.

Grace Church, Salisbury, has over a period of twelve years paid off the debt which is said to have amounted to as much as \$190,000., and in November 1959 we dedicated the church. This is one of our hardest working and finest congregations, and we are justly proud of their great achievement. Asbury Church, Salisbury, has recently signed the contract for the building of their new church, and work will soon begin on the \$1,100,000. edifice.

Other

There are many other things I should mention, but time and space will not permit. Let me say in closing, that each year we are increasing our support to Child Care. This year we gave \$4,657 for the Strawbridge and Kelso Homes. I have no way of knowing what we gave on Mother's Day for our Methodist Country House, but we believe in it, and we will support it to the best of our ability.

And, now to Bishop Oxnam, to each of my colleagues in the Cabinet, to all of my pastors and co-workers on the district, to the countless number of laymen and laywomen who have helped me, and to my Dear Heavenly Father who watches over me, I offer my thanks, my love and my prayers.

At this Conference session the Rev. Walter E. Fosnocht, beloved pastor of Mt. Lebanon Church for 25 years will enter the retired ranks. Our thanks to him for service well rendered and our prayers and best wishes for a pleasant retirement.

Changes have been made in the appointments at two of the charges during the year. As of March 1, 1960, the Rev. Edwin S. Mitchell was discontinued as student supply pastor of East Cecil Circuit. The Rev. George L. Prettyman, a local preacher at Zion, Md., completed the Conference year. About March 1, 1960, the Rev. David J. Randolph, Jr., with the permission of Bishop Oxnam, was released from the pastorate of Hockessin Church to take an appointment near Boston, Mass., so that he might pursue his studies at Boston University. The Rev. Leland B. Hall, Chaplain of the Wesley Foundation at the University of Delaware, served as pulpit supply for the balance of the Conference year.

Membership

44 Charges have received 10 or more members during the year. Total accessions on profession of faith, 1,166; by transfer, 913; from other denominations, 266, or a total received during the year, 2,345. 16 Charges received 50 or more members; 2 received no new members. General Contributions

Of our 55 charges, 48 paid their benevolence and world service askings in full; 7 made partial payments. 45 charges responded to the appeal for advance specials and gave a total of \$34,990. 32 of these gifts were over \$100, while 8 were in excess of \$1,000. 41 charges gave \$1,573 for the Methodist Youth Fund. 30 charges gave \$823 for Race Relations. 41 charges gave \$1,594 for Student Day. 32 charges gave \$1,577 for Week of Dedication. 47 charges gave \$2,300 for Rally Day. 44 charges paid \$2,688 for Fellowship of Suffering and Service. 48 charges contributed \$6,374 to the Board of Child Care. 48 charges gave \$5,686 in their Mother's Day offering to the Methodist Country House.

Christian Higher Education

The Wilmington District contributed a total of \$63,600 for Christian Higher Education during the year in the following manner: For the Wesley College Operating Fund we were apportioned \$12,434 and contributed \$11,194. For Wesley College Capital Improvement Fund we were apportioned \$51,029 and contributed \$35,693. For the Wesley Theological Seminary we were apportioned \$12,434 and paid \$10,593. For Wesley Foundation we were apportioned \$7,455 and paid \$6,120. For the Wesley College Operating Fund 40 of our charges paid their askings in full, 10 in part, 5 did not participate. For the Capital Improvement Fund of Wesley College 30 charges paid the full amount asked, 15 paid in part, 10 did not participate. For Wesley Theological Seminary 41 charges paid the asking in full, 9 in part, 5 did not participate. For the Wesley Foundation Fund 42 charges paid in full, 10 in part, 3 contributed nothing.

Organizations

Our District Woman's Society of Christian Service has responded well to the capable leadership of its new president, Mrs. Joseph B. Dickerson. We report 68 Societies with a membership of 5,384. District meetings have been well attended and district projects very well received. The lay leader of our district, Mr. Clifford T. Foster, Jr., and his associate district lay leaders, Mr. Thomas Lodge, Mr. Lawrence Gibson, and Mr. David Montgomery, have given effective leadership to the program of Lay Activities within the district. We report 43 Methodist Men Clubs with a membership of 2,066, and a Laymen's Banquet which was opened this year for the first time to include the presidents of Methodist Men's Clubs in addition to the charge lay leader and pastor. It is our hope that we will be able next year to include yet other laymen within the fellowship and inspiration of this annual banquet. If time permitted we could tell here of the activities in

Christian Education through leadership training, special programs for leaders of children, the district and sub-district Methodist Youth Fellowship program, and a number of fine projects for adults and older adults have been conducted during the year. Our sincere appreciation is given to all those volunteer workers who have done so much in this area in the life of our church.

The support given to our benevolence program including world service and advance specials is evidence of the fine work in missionary education and cultivation which has been done in this and previous years at the Conference, district, and local church level by our consecrated missionary secretaries and loyal pastors and laymen. The Rev. James R. Stevenson made missionary work very real during our week of missionary emphasis in January as he spoke to us about his particular task in providing printed materials for the newly literate peoples of Africa. Two of the fine young people of our district will be going into missionary fields within a few weeks. The Rev. George H. Pigueron III will be going as a student to the University of Mexico to do graduate studies, but he expects to have some opportunity to share in certain of the projects of the Methodist Church in Mexico. Miss Barbara Reynolds, a member of the Official Board of our Methodist Church in New Castle, will be going to Korea to work under the Woman's Division of Christian Service as a missionary with special responsibilities in business administration. Our prayers and best wishes accompany these fine young people as they become our ambassadors in the lands of their choice.

Building and Improvements

54 Charges on our district have invested \$411,121 in building and improvements during this year. The outstanding projects have been these:

West Cecil Circuit: General improvements—\$1,405.

Calvary, Wilmington: Renovation of parsonage—\$1,000.

Madeley: Stained glass windows in sanctuary; sanctuary painted—\$1,778.

St. Paul's: Erection of house chapel on Foulk Road to begin serving neighborhood where church will ultimately be built—\$54,671.

A number of our churches are making specific plans for new construction during this coming year. Aldersgate Church—a new sanctuary to cost approximately \$500,000. Baldwin Church on Cherry Hill Charge—a new sanctuary. Christ Church, Roselle, broke ground on January 24 for a new education wing to cost \$133,000. Christiana Church is completing plans to erect the second floor to its education building and remodel its sanctuary. Hillcrest Church will break ground in June for its new sanctuary and fellowship hall to cost approximately \$260,000. The Hopewell Church has under construction its new education unit expected to cost \$30,000. At Hockessin, Delaware, the parsonage has undergone extensive renovation which will be completed in time for the occupancy by the new minister. St. Mark's Methodist Church of Stanton is completing its plan to relocate upon its new site and build the first units of its new church. It is expected that ground will be broken within a few months.

In the period of this year 44 charges have paid on indebtedness a total of \$329,114.

Pastoral Support

41 of our charges have increased pastoral support for the new Conference year. 28 have increased the salary a total of \$14,659. 4 have added auto expense in the amount of \$1,065. 23 have added utility allowances totaling \$8,690. The grand total increase in pastoral support for the district is \$24,414.

Only 2 of the 55 charges make no allowance for auto expense and only 5 do not contribute to the cost of parsonage utilities. (2 of these have no parsonages).

I feel our people are due a word of praise and gratitude for moving so rapidly at the request of the Commission on World Service and Finance to accept parsonage utilities. In many cases the churches have accepted the full cost this year. Others have taken one-third as the Conference suggested and plan to move annually toward full coverage.

Some Major Concerns

Highlights of this year include our services commemorating the 175th Anniversary of the founding of the Methodist Church in America. On Sunday, January 3, 1960, we met first at historic Bethel Church near Chesapeake City, Md. The preacher was Bishop F. Gerald Ensley, resident Bishop of the Iowa Area. That evening we met at St. Paul's Church in Wilmington. The preacher was Bishop Donald H. Tippett of the San Francisco Area. More than 1600 of our people shared in the services of this day and through their gifts and offerings made possible a contribution of over \$400 to the Conference Historical Society for the maintenance of Barratt's Chapel.

During these months we have given careful consideration to the Church Extension opportunities on the district. With the aid of Dr. Roy A. Sturm and Dr. Albert S. Adams, both staff members of the Division of National Missions of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church. We have studied the growing and changing communities in New Castle and Cecil Counties. We now hope to secure additional land for one and possibly two new churches in the early future. We have also received guidance which will be of value as we seek to develop properly many of the relatively new Church Extension projects of the district.

A matter of grave concern to us is the church in the inner city. After much study and planning a day long workshop on the Inner City was held at Peninsula Church on Saturday, January 16, 1960. A select group from the thirteen churches within the city limits of Wilmington were invited. 40 of us spent six hours studying needs and problems of our city and especially the challenge confronting the Methodist Church. Dr. Philip A. Edwards, associate secretary, Department of City Work, Division of National Missions, helped to plan the sessions and served as consultant during the discussions.

Two continuing committees are preparing recommendations for next steps in this field. One concerns itself with finding natural zones of parish responsibility so that each church and pastor may concentrate in its activities of community ministry on an area peculiarly their own. This can prevent overlapping of effort and also assure us that no sector is forgotten.

The other is seeking to discover the most meaningful approach to establish a mission to the city. At this writing we visualize new program rather than new buildings at the outset. What we do should use existing facilities to serve the people of the city regardless of race or national origin. What we propose should be both projected and developed in cooperation with the Delaware Annual Conference. Steps have been taken to enlist their cooperation.

We expect to use the resources of the District Church Extension Society, Conference Board of Missions, and the Division of National Missions as well as those of the local churches involved.

I hope that by next Conference such a program can be a reality.

Another matter of concern has been the need for strengthened leadership in certain areas of our district. In a day when we suffer from a critical shortage of ministers it is only logical that we achieve certain re-alignments of our charge lines and at the same time bring a better trained ministry to some of our smaller churches. During next Conference year one minister will serve both Hockessin and Mt. Lebanon churches. Madeley and Minquadale will be served by one minister as the South Wilmington Parish. Wesley Chapel of DuRoss Heights will be served by the minister of Asbury Church of Wilmington Manor. Other parts of the district are being studied with the probability of additional re-alignments another year.

In closing I wish to express my gratitude to the ministers and laymen of this district for the very cordial manner in which they have received me and my family and for the loyal support they ever give the church and its leaders.

I wish to thank my colleagues of the Cabinet for their warm friendship and their ready counsel as I have been learning to walk in this new kind of experience. Finally, I thank Bishop Oxnam for the confidence he has shown in me to trust me with the duties and responsibilities of this office.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RELATIONSHIP WITH CHAPLAINS AND OTHER MILITARY PERSONNEL

Your committee has as its main concern the maintenance of personal relations with ministerial members of our conference now on active duty either with the Armed Forces or in the Veterans Administration. This has been accomplished by personal letters from members of the committee and by the mailing of conference programs to the chaplains. Contact is also maintained with the Commission on Chaplains of our church.

Inquiries concerning the military chaplaincy as a career should be made to the Rev. A. M. B. Snapp, who is our representative on the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations.

The annual luncheon for all former and present military, auxiliary and institutional chaplains, members of the Committee and numerous guests was held during the last session of the annual conference. The Rev. Herly C. Bowling, a staff minister of the Commission on Chaplains, The Methodist Church, was the speaker. Mr. Bowling was also presented to the conference and spoke briefly. Another luncheon will be held this year during the conference session.

Military service and related activities apparently will be a part of our social structure for many years. The church has a continuing responsibility to the thousands of men and women who are temporarily or permanently a part of the military system. Young people must not be penalized spiritually while they discharge a military obligation to their country.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHILD CARE

During the past conference year the Board of Child Care has moved forward rapidly toward its goal of assembling its four-fold program at a new center in Rockdale, Baltimore County, Maryland.

The new site was purchased by using some of its capital funds. The Kelso Home for Girls and the Strawbridge Home for Boys have agreed to advance to the Board of Child Care, under a Deed of Trust, the sum of \$250,000 each. Other capital funds of the Board of Child Care, plus special bequests designated for buildings, will defray the total cost. Most of the furniture from the Kelso and Strawbridge Homes will be used in the new buildings. There will be no appeal for building funds.

Ground breaking exercises took place on June 21, 1959, and were attended by a large and representative group. Among those who took part in the program were the District Superintendents, several ministers of the churches in the community, the officers and members of the Board of Child Care, and the children of Kelso and Strawbridge Homes. T. J. S.

Waxter, Director of the State Department of Public Welfare, made the address of the afternoon.

Contract was let for the erection of eight buildings, on competitive bid, to the firm of Philip Vizzini & Son, Inc., on October 7, 1959, for the sum of \$593,000. This included five cottages, each to house twelve children; a large activities building for recreation, assembly for entertainment and worship, and for the use of various church groups who may wish to visit and meet; also an administration building to house all of the offices and service activities of the Board of Child Care. The plan included a residence for the director of the institutional part of the program for the boys and girls living on the grounds. Sewer water lines, roadways, pavements and parking space complete the plan.

The contract called for completion by June 30, 1960. Between October and the first of May over forty working days were lost because of inclement weather. But there is every reason to believe that this new Methodist child care center will be ready for function by mid-summer. The official dedication will take place October 1st.

After the buildings had been laid out, foundations built, and some of the superstructure was on the way, the Board of Child Care received a proposal from the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Baltimore Annual Conference. It began with the statement that the work at Swartzell Methodist Home for Children was to be discontinued. The Board of Child Care was offered \$120,000 on condition that it would accept the children now living in Swartzell, for whom continued institutional care seemed needed, in the new plant at Rockdale, and that the Board would agree to name one cottage for Mr. G. W. F. Swartzell and one for Mrs. B. T. Hynson. The Board of Child Care agreed unanimously to accept this offer, at its meeting April 19, 1960. Details are now being worked out.

Before this proposition came to the Board, it had been approved by the Swartzell Trustees and Guild, the Executive Committee of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Baltimore Annual Conference and the Woman's Division of Christian Service of the Methodist Church.

While the Swartzell organization will cease to exist, the wonderful work that it has done over a period of better than half a century will be memorialized by the naming of the two cottages.

Since the last session of the conference The Strawbridge Home for Boys property was sold to the Carrollton Farms, Incorporated for \$235,000 on November 3, 1959, with understanding that the home could carry on its work until final date of settlement, August 15, 1960. Kelso Home had been sold prior to the previous session, for the sum of \$300,000.

The Kelso Home for Girls and The Strawbridge Home for Boys will maintain their identity and legal entity as the conference program of child care moves forward. The Boards of Trustees of these two homes will continue to serve as heretofore, and continue likewise to serve as Directors of the Board of Child Care.

Some of us still recall the thrill of the expression that heralded the unification of our great Methodist Church—"The Methodists are one people." Similarly we rejoice in this achievement of unity in the conference

child care program. After seventeen years of experimenting, negotiating and close cooperation, we can now say, the Methodist child care services in our two conferences are now unified. We look forward to increasingly gratifying results in meeting the needs of "hurt" children because the Methodists have a single interest and a common cause.

"There is a certain period in the life of the child who has hit a snag and is heading for trouble, when help, prompt and expert, can make the difference between a healthy future and long, weary years of self-multiplying problems."

Underlying all of our achievements and foreshadowing even greater accomplishments is the response of our people at Christmas time to the child care offering. This year has been the most successful in our history. Considerable credit should be given to the tireless and effective promotional efforts of Dr. Robert L. Wood. The Executive Director has been pre-occupied in the many activities incident to the erection of the new plant, recruitment and directing staff, and making sure that program will be adequate as we move into the tomorrow of expanding services to a steadily increasing number of unfortunate youngsters.

With this beautiful, new child care center the Board of Child Care will be able to render all of the services needed by the children of the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences, including continuation of the work of Kelso and Strawbridge and memorializing the work of Swartzell Home.

We earnestly seek the support and prayers of the members of the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences of the Methodist Church in this great work of caring for children.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

As The Methodist Church faces the future with its tremendous challenges and opportunities, the mounting need for more devoted young people adequately trained for service to God through the offices of the Church become more acute. The Conference Commission on Christian Vocations functions as a possible answer to this need by facilitating cooperation among church boards and agencies in (1) promoting within the Conference a philosophy of Christian vocation that recognizes the potential sacredness of all useful work and all opportunities for Christian life service and (2) developing a more effective program for the enlistment and guidance of persons in vocations in the Church and its agencies.

During the past quadrennium the Commission has dedicated itself to the task of developing a program that would confront our youth and adults with the challenge of the Christian idea of work and present to them the opportunities and claims of church vocations. In all its efforts the Commission has tried to keep in mind both the needs of the Church and the basic interests and aptitudes of interested individuals. The program that

has evolved in adherence to these principles has centered its activities in the areas of cultivation and guidance.

There have been two phases to the cultivation activities of the Commission. It has in the first place, continued the policy of previous Commissions in sponsoring annually a Christian Vocation Conference. Sometimes these conferences have placed the major emphasis upon the philosophy of christian vocations and at other times the focal point has been enlistment in church vocations. During the past year this project took the form of a Career Clinic. The Clinic was designed to show the delegates how the church ministers through her many offices. A guide tour was conducted in which the forty young people who attended the Clinic visited in their place of employment, a Minister, Director of Christian Education, Wesley Foundation Director, Institutional Chaplain, Y. M. C. A. Executive, Director of the Country House, District Superintendent, Deaconess, and the Administrators of the Goodwill Industry. Dr. R. C. Singleton, of the Board of Missions, delivered the principal address of the Clinic on the work of the Missionary.

The second phase of the cultivation activities of the Commission has centered on the distribution of resource materials on Christian Vocations. The booklet METHODIST Service Projects, a directory of opportunities for service offered by The Methodist Church, has been distributed through local churches, the summer camp program, and through our vocational conferences. The Commission has also tried to develop ways and means of distributing to the vocational counselors of our public schools Christian vocational materials. Conversations with the Council of Churches to develop an eccumenical approach to this objective failed to produce a feasible plan. Efforts are now being directed toward a direct approach to the several school systems within the bounds of our Conference.

In the area of guidance the Commission has made significant progress. In cooperation with the Board of Education the records system recommended by the Inter-Board Committee on Christian Vocations has been established. By means of this system an accurate and useful record of every youth who has indicated an interest in a church vocation is now being maintained. A counselors Bureau has also been started whereby periodic counseling sessions will be held with those who have indicated an interest in church vocations.

In conclusion, the Commission would like to commend all of those local churches who have established Committees on Christian Vocations, who have held during the past year a vocational conference, and who have established or continued scholarship programs for assisting their ministerial candidates to prepare for service in church.

Much has been done to foster the idea of Christian vocation, but much more remains to be done. Your Commission of Christian Vocations will continue to strive to assist you in developing within the youth of this generation a sense of Christian Vocation.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF CHURCHES—MARYLAND

The Maryland Council of Churches is the cooperating agency for twenty-three Protestant Judicatories throughout the State of Maryland. As such, it is related to the Methodist Church in the Easton and Salisbury Districts as well as those in Cecil County of the Wilmington District. Its relationship is deepened by a large number of laymen and clergy from these churches active on boards and committees, the leadership of the superintendents from these three Districts, Dr. John E. French as Vice-President, Dr. J. Leas Green as a Director, and Rev. R. Jervis Cooke as a Trustee of the Council, and a member of the Peninsula Conference, D. C. Wildey, as Executive Secretary.

Although in the past the Council has been active on the Peninsula with youth work, leadership training and the Migrant Ministry, it has been primarily occupied by responsibilities in and around Baltimore. For some time, however, due to the requests from the denominations now related to the Council, a program of expansion into all counties of the State has been growing. The nine counties on the Eastern Shore have already been involved or soon will be in cooperative work under the direction of the denominational executives and representatives.

Two Town and Country Church Institutes will be held, at Camp Pocometh on September 23-24 and at Happy Valley Camp near Rising Sun on September 30-October 1. An Institute on International Affairs is being scheduled for Salisbury in the Fall. Already a Vacation Church School Workshop and an Audio-Visual Workshop have been held in Denton and Federalsburg. The Council has held a training session for camp leaders giving guidance to a number of persons from the Peninsula as small group camping makes its debut in the area. The migrant work is now a cooperative effort with the Delaware State Council, the Maryland Council and the National Council in which a ministry to nearly ten thousand migrants is carried out by chaplains and through child day care centers. Legislative action is carefully studied by the Maryland Council and when advisable action is taken to enable the united efforts of Protestant churches to make a more effective witness in this area. Other opportunities to communicate the gospel, such as by radio and television, are also being projected, whereby the interdenominational efforts of the churches may be utilized throughout Maryland. Study and research are constantly being conducted and supported in the areas of marriage laws, race relations, gambling, as well as in church location and development, population trends, social services, and other concerns affecting the total relationship of the churches to society.

It is the purpose of the Council to manifest the essential oneness of the Christian Churches of Maryland in Jesus Christ as Divine Lord and Saviour by promoting the spirit of fellowship, service and cooperation among them. The Methodists of the Peninsula are a part of this effort and by their cooperation the unity of effort will truly be blest.

**PENINSULA CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT TO THE
ANNUAL CONFERENCE**

President's Report

After eight years on the Board of Education and four years as its President, I submit this report in hopes that in some small way it will contribute to the increased efficiency of the new Board and officers for the next quadrennium.

It has been a pleasure working with Donzel Wildey and his staff, Mrs. Nelson and Mr. Godfrey. In the few short weeks that Mr. Stone has served as our Executive Secretary, I have discovered that the work of education in our Conference is in good hands. Your staff gives stature to the board and bears witness to the important role of education in the furthering of the Kingdom of God.

A continual review and analysis of what we are doing in the field of education is necessary in order to keep alert to the contemporary needs of our church. Methods and techniques of education have changed and will continue to change as we learn more about human personality and the learning process. The church would be guilty of negligence of primary magnitude if she did not concern herself with proper methods of education as we understand them today. However, we must be cautious, for we are ever in danger of worshipping administrative procedures, techniques and methods, substituting the tools of education for its objectives. Content and means of communicating content are vitally important, but recitation of objective facts does not guarantee the achievement of our purpose.

We have one primary purpose or objective to which we are responsible in Christian Education that places us apart from all other institutions. Upon our shoulders rests the divine imperative of bringing people into a closer relationship with God; relating them to Jesus Christ as the motivating dynamic of life and living. People must be alerted to what Christian maturity is all about. What does it mean to be Christ-like? All these objectives are banded together in the scriptural phrase, "New Creatures in Christ." Have we been successful in the achievement of our objective? We have tried. Success in this area is both intangible and relative, but the pragmatic test of our accomplishment shows that we have a lot of territory to cover. The motivating spirit in the program of education, as in every other field of Christian endeavor, is love. Love between ministers within the fellowship of the church; love between laymen who hold positions of responsibility in the local church as well as in the Annual Conference; love between laymen and their ministers as they work cooperatively in the advance of the Kingdom; love between peoples, no matter their color, creed, race, economic or social situation. When this has been accomplished Christian Education in the conference has achieved its goal.

On the other hand, as long as there is one bit of evidence indicating racial prejudice, social bigotry or class friction in our midst we have failed. When any individual proclaiming to be a follower of Christ allows personal ambition, petty sensitivity or personality conflict to influence his or her decisions in the policies of the Christian church, your Board of Education must again admit to failure. You see, we can't equate the number of

conferences, institutes, or other programs of the Board with success. Results alone must bear witness.

Obviously, from the above comments, the Board of Education cannot do a job unless every member church and person in this Conference cooperates, becoming a participant in the accomplishment of our objective. The development of Christian attitudes can be realized only if we share ideas and feelings in a constructive fashion. Sitting by the wayside hurling criticism at either program or personnel destroys opportunity for service.

There are several areas that need careful inspection and re-evaluation.

Adult education needs to be interpreted more realistically and practically for our present social situation. We do not overcome social crises and conflict by hiding our heads in the sand and pretending that they have no bearing on the Christian message. It is time the church challenged society in the areas of social justice, morality and ethics. Unfortunately, the church instead of being the conscience of the community has become the fortress for the "status quo". We are supposed to love people or we are liars according to the New Testament. We'd better be about the Father's business.

Teacher recruitment and training for the Church School is one of the most important activities of the church. Teachers should be chosen on the basis of their attitude and loyalty to the church and secondly on the basis of skill and ability. More than one church program has been sabotaged by a teacher using the precious time allotted for instruction to give vent to his personal prejudices and pet peeves. More than likely these pet peeves are personified in the church leadership or program.

The personal attitudes of the teachers are the vehicles by which the lesson is communicated. Church loyalty and love for truth are the primary requisites for adequate instruction. Teachers must be dedicated, open-minded people who make learning about Christ a glorious adventure in living, rather than the repetition of yesterday's shibboleths. There is no virtue in being old fashioned, for it neither gives assurance of Christian character nor a guarantee of truth. We do not challenge this generation by worshipping sanctified errors or superstition of the past either in the fields of the natural sciences or the fields of philosophy and religion. Christ is real and alive today. He is as much at home in the day of the rocket as he was on the shores of the Sea of Galilee. His message is always relevant, his personality is ever present. We do Him grave injustice when we make Him a permanent part of any generation. Yet this we do in order that He might refrain from saying too much about the sins of today's society.

Our youth programs on the Conference, district and local levels, can be the best. We have the finest in resource materials and projects. Your Conference Director of Youth is committed to helping you develop your programs. Somewhere the line of communication between the Conference and local church suffers a serious breakdown. You are not taking advantage of the facilities and personnel available to you. We hope that those who are responsible for the local church program will initiate correspondence with the Conference office so that we are aware of the overall youth program throughout the general church and are related to it.

One of the outstanding projects of the Board during the last quadrennium has been the acquisition of an additional 260 acres of land for camping. This would not have been possible without the enthusiastic cooperation of the Cabinet and World Service and Finance Commission. This new property is undergoing gradual development as funds are available. Some day the Peninsula Conference will have a camp and program second to none.

The promotion of the use of Methodist literature in the Church School is an essential part of the Christian education program of our Conference. Church loyalty alone should give support to this project, but even without loyalty, the quality of the material speaks for itself. With all its imperfections, it is the best to be offered on the present market of literature for the Church School.

Your Board has actively cooperated with the Commission on Higher Education, giving the necessary support to Wesley Seminary, Wesley College, and all other Methodist Institutions of Higher education. Under the able direction of Dr. Dunkle, the Wesley Foundation program has made great strides both in the areas of program and facilities.

To present item by item the details of accomplishment over the past four years would be repetitious. Much has been done, many projects are under way and much remains to be done. The report of our Executive Secretary will be more explicit.

One of the areas where we need improved communications and joint planning is in the general programs of Methodism for the Peninsula. I urge most vigorously a spring planning meeting of Conference Boards and Cabinet to break down any spirit of competitiveness and assure unity of program and purpose. Then a pre-conference meeting of the same group could evaluate any progress and make joint recommendations to the Annual Conference. Our organizational planning procedures are weak. Too many Boards are acting without concern or interest in the programs of the other Boards. We are as guilty as any. I do not believe this is intentional, but rather our failure to set up adequate cooperative programs to assure complete flow of information from one group to another.

This great Conference of ours could be even greater in its impact on the Peninsula if we spoke with the voice of enthusiastic unity. We have made some feeble efforts in this direction, but the results have been far below our potential.

Although the tenor of this report might be interpreted as critical, I hope that it is constructive. There is no dissatisfaction with the efforts that have been set forth. Your Board has done a comparatively good job, but to be complacent with good results would show both lack of observation and deep concern.

Thanks to all the members both lay and ministerial for doing much for the cause of Christian education. May the new board be cognizant of our sins of omission and commission and use our experience to render even greater service to the Kingdom.

Executive Secretary's Report

The Purpose of Christian Education

On the subject of Christian Education the Discipline of the Methodist Church states our responsibility in this way: "Christian Education has its roots in the nature of the Christian Gospel itself. Jesus is frequently called Master or Teacher, and He is the authority in our church's program of Christian nurture. His Great Commission is: 'Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, . . . teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you.' The purpose of Christian Education is to learn, to teach, and to use His way by which persons of all ages are related to God as Father and to all men as brothers."

The Present Situation

On January 7 of this year, a statement was issued by the General Board of Education which indicated that a searching evaluation had been made of the present situation. It is clear that all is not well with us as we analyze our growth in our Church Schools with the progress being made by other denominational groups. We now have fewer church schools in the nation than we had in 1946. More serious are the slight gains in Church School membership. For the past two years the percentage gain has been 1.0%, the smallest in years. Three years ago the gain was 2%; four years ago it was 3.6%. In the Peninsula Conference the net gain, 1.0%, was the same as over the whole church, or a total of 607 persons.

In the light of these reports "The General Board calls upon all pastors, church school superintendents, and other leaders concerned to increase greatly the number being reached by our local church schools. The Church school is the major source of new members joining The Methodist Church. At present six out of every ten who join the Church in profession of faith come through Methodism's 38,000 local church schools. If the church is to be increasingly an effective leaven for righteousness in our land, the minimum endeavor must be a rate of church school growth considerably larger than the rate of population increase in the community."

In response to this call from our leaders in Christian Education, the following recommendations are suggested:

Suggestions for the Future

1. A new dedication to Christ and the cause of Christian Education. Apart from Him we can accomplish nothing; apart from Him there is no meaning in what is undertaken. What is done must be in His spirit and for His sake or our effort will be in vain. In His fellowship the most difficult assignments can be sources of joy and enrichment. Let us first give ourselves as we seek afresh "to learn, to teach, and to use His way."

2. Let the Commission on Education in each church achieve a more adequate understanding of its responsibility and better organizations for effective results. Your Conference Board of Education is ready to assist in any way it can the local church commission as it seeks to perform its duties and the realization of its goals.

3. The emphasis on the program of Leadership Training continues as the major endeavor of your Board of Education as it relates to all aspects of church life and organization.

Many opportunities for training are being offered for potential leaders in numerous areas beyond the local church. Subdistrict, district, Conference, and jurisdictional opportunities are opening on an ever-widening scale for persons serving in various aspects of the life of the Church. In addition, it seems most advisable to sponsor opportunities for training sessions within the local church itself. In this way more leaders are reached and specific problems receive direct attention not always feasible under other conditions. In view of this we urge our ministers and the Commissions on Education to establish leadership schools wherever possible within the local church.

The great hindrance is the difficulty of finding a sufficient number of qualified accredited instructors to teach in these enterprises. Some of our ministers and laymen are giving much time and energy but the field is great and by comparison the workers are few.

One solution would be to enlist a greater number of potential teachers from our laity to assume a large share of this teaching task. The discovery and development of at least one accredited teacher from each charge in The Peninsula Conference during the coming quadrennium is a practical answer towards the goal. With more teachers more schools will be possible, with more training there is the reasonable expectation of better teaching and from better teaching a consequent growth in knowledge and experience on the part of those taught concerning Christ and His way.

4. Let the spirit of evangelism be the motivating influence of our Christian Education. By its very nature Christian Education is evangelistic. When it is not, it is not Christian Education. The aim of Christian Education should lead to lives committed to Christ and His Church. When this is not the case then what is done is not Christian Education. There is no point at which the Christian teacher ends and the Christian evangelist begins. Within the church school they must be one and the same person.

The spirit of evangelism should lead us to greater concern for those who find themselves making new homes in unfamiliar environments. All over our nation major shifts in population are much in evidence. It is said, "that one in five in the United States changes his place of residence annually." Thousands of new communities have come into being within our nation in the past decade but Methodism has not visibly meant the changing conditions to the degree that the situation demands or as other religious groups apparently have been able to do according to information published by our own General Board of Education. In addition to opportunities present in our established churches let us be alert to the opening fields in new communities. Special attention should be given to the possibilities of out-post church schools sponsored by established churches concerned with evangelism. Some of our churches are aware of this responsibility and are engaged in such worthy ventures, notably our church at Elkton under the able leadership of its Minister, the Rev. Harold M. Davis. Many others need to be aware of what can be done for the multitudes who are making new patterns for living as well as new homes in new communities. As the spirit of evangelism expresses itself in this manner the church school will find

another means of being "the growing edge" of the faith, meeting the needs of the present age.

5. Let us faithfully nurture those who are being prepared for membership within the church. Confirmation Classes, to use an ancient term full of meaning and rich in heritage, open many approaches for Christian Education for adults as well as for youth. Ministers who are wise will use this resource to the fullest degree. The return is a long term investment but one that yields great treasure. Observation, however, leads to the conclusion that we are seriously negligent at this point. Even in many situations where such instruction is given the time allotted is not sufficient. By way of suggestion it is recommended that classes be formed in September for those preferably thirteen years of age, and continued through the remainder of the church year. This would bring most gratifying results and it would be said again "wisdom is justified of her children."

Other Areas of Concern

Special attention is called to other matters which are part of the responsibilities of your Board of Education.

Methodist Literature—The subject of Church School literature is a matter of far-reaching importance to many of our conscientious people. There are many good reasons why Methodist people should be encouraged to use the literature prepared by the General Board of Education of The Methodist Church. It is sound teaching; it meets the needs of churches of all types and sizes; it is based on the Bible and used as Jesus used the scriptures to nurture Christian growth. Its teaching plans are plain and workable and its educational methods are sound. It builds loyalty among the people as they come to know and understand their church. It interprets our great movements within our connection such as the emphases upon the local church and higher education. We need what our own literature is prepared to do for us.

Having said this let it be stated that suggestions for improvement will receive respectful consideration. The officers of your Board of Education are ready to give consideration to the reflections and evaluations of the people. At the proper time and place these will be reported to the dedicated people in our General Board for examination and study. Out of such sharing, great benefits may accrue. Continued loyalty through use of Methodist Literature is an important key to our future advancement.

Camp PeCoMeth—One of the great satisfactions of our Conference life is to see Camp PeCoMeth grow and develop. Each year has brought important advancements. The possibilities involved excite the imagination of what could happen here with careful planning and support. During the coming years we look forward to the fulfillment of plans that now are emerging upon our horizon. Investment here holds a promise for the future beyond calculation.

Rally Day—Rally Day, observed widely on the fourth Sunday of September at the beginning of Christian Education Week needs, we believe, closer correlation between the local churches and the Conference Board of Education. By Conference action, the Rally Day offering is the one contribution

requested for the work of Christian Education in the Conference. Churches are encouraged to give as generously as they can, bearing in mind that contributions received over six thousand dollars (\$6,000) are to be designated for Camp Development.

Church Music—Better music for our churches is now an important part of the program of Christian Education. Many experiences gained while participating in some phase of church music add immeasurably to Christian development and growth. Lending support to this growing emphasis in present day church life your Board of Education has sponsored two musical events of great significance during the present year involving approximately six hundred people.

A Choir Clinic was held in Asbury Church, Salisbury, on January 28 under the direction of Professor Allen C. Lannon and the Choral Art Society of Boston University. A second clinic was held in Grace Church, Wilmington on February 20. Among those participating in the leadership of that program were Mrs. Madeline D. Ingram, Lynchburg College, Virginia; Dr. Harold W. Gilbert, Headmaster, St. Peter's Choir School, Philadelphia; Dr. Ivan H. Trussler, Minister of Music at Grace Church, Wilmington, and Dr. William F. Dunkle, Jr., the Minister of Grace Church. Arrangements for the Wilmington Clinic were made by the J. W. Pepper & Sons, Inc. of Philadelphia. So successful were these ventures that similar programs in other parts of the Conference are planned for the coming year.

Senior Citizens—Attention today is being given to a growing degree to the welfare of the increasing number of Senior Citizens among us and their needs for security, employment, and fellowship. Next January, 1961, the First White House Conference concerning our Senior Citizens is planned by our leaders in Government. Your Board of Education has been invited to participate in the planning for this far-reaching enterprise.

The calling of this conference accentuates one responsibility in which the churches need to take more definite action. In Home Departments of our Church Schools and in other programs provided through Senior Citizens organizations opportunities should be made available to assist our people reaching this point in life to lives of continued activity and service. Retirement to "the rocking chair brigade" is not life's ideal. "Retirement from something to something" is an idea full of meaning. Christian Education can help make the meaning clear. Let the church fulfill its ministry here as elsewhere that all the needs of life may find us wisely concerned.

Camp—Youth Director's Report

Youth Work—The Conference Youth Council under the leadership of the President, Miss Pat Van de Visser has done a very excellent job in heading up the work of youth for the Peninsula. More training "beyond the local church"—but for the local church has been sponsored by both the Conference and the Subdistricts.

The District and Subdistrict Directors have been of great assistance in seeing that the activities were presented and given support. The programs in the most part have been strengthening the local church programs. More training and inspiration have been given in different areas and interests.

Our objectives for working with youth in Conference, Subdistrict and Local Church activities have been: Assuming greater leadership by our youth, finding better ways of organization, establishing better programs, coordinating the Sunday Evening Fellowship with the Sunday Morning Fellowship, helping our youth to accept the challenge to develop as mature Christians, showing that witnessing to their Christ will help reach the unchurched youth in communities.

Among the activities held was the Annual Youth Conference, which gave the young people of the Conference an opportunity to experience and understand the organization and the procedure of the Peninsula Annual Conference. Rev. Howard Gordy, Jr. did a very excellent job as Director. Dr. George W. Flint, Pastor of Mt. Vernon Place Church in Baltimore, gave an inspiring sermon. Almost every church had a delegate or alternate present. The total number present was 339.

The Senior Week at PeCoMeth gave special attention to a study course on Methodist Polity, Bible Characters, and Religious Drama. The Bishop's Company of Santa Barbara, California were present to present two plays and lead the drama workshop.

The theme: "Is It Love" dealt with boy-girl relationships during the Fall Conference for Youth. Dr. Haskill M. Miller of Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D. C. was the guest speaker and the resource leader. Questions and answers came forth on matters of dating, going steady, love, marriage and divorce. Rev. Edwin Thomas directed the 244 youth in a very informative and illuminating weekend. The Bishop's Company returned to present the play: "The Great Divorce."

In order to have a program that is inclusive of all phases, one must not forget our own responsibility in citizenship and our continual need for establishing "peace on earth." Under the direction of Rev. Charles Covington, the Peninsula Conference Youth Council sponsored a United Nations Trip to New York City. The 36 youth and 5 adults came to realize the importance of the United Nations with a new clearness and individual sense of responsibility. They returned wanting to inform others about the UN and the desire to collect funds for UNICEF.

Witnessing for Christ can have real meaning when youth attend a Christian Witness Workshop under the direction of the Rev. Howard W. Ellis, from the General Board of Evangelism. To the 65 youth present in Millsboro, witnessing became a concern and a willingness to share the "Good News of Jesus." The skills and the techniques will be of use to reach the unchurched youth. Plans were well carried out by Rev. John Irwin, director and registrar.

Many of our youth were interested in inter-faith marriage and its problems after seeing the film, "One Love—Conflicting Faiths," which was purchased by the Board of Education and the Youth Council. It helps point out the responsibility of the church to teach and to make known the difficulties involved in a Protestant-Roman Catholic Marriage.

Youth have become so interested in Camp PeCoMeth, that the Youth Council decided to have a project for the raising of funds to renovate the barn. The goal of \$2,000.00 was set for the Conference. Districts and Subdistricts have been having projects to raise their allotted amount. Two

individual MYF's sent in \$100.00. The barn will be used as a dining hall and meeting room downstairs and two dormitories upstairs. The youth will use this for retreats for the local, subdistrict, and Conference activities. It will also provide a small rustic camp for about 24-30 campers this summer.

Camp Work—Each year we have an all time high in attendance at PeCoMeth. This year 2,513 persons attended camp for a week, a week-end or a day. Laymen of the Conference packed in with an all-time high of 186 men. Some will remember sleeping in the office on the floor, or the restless night in the station wagons. The Woman's Societies of Christian Service met at PeCoMeth for a Day Apart and came close in attendance with 180 women present.

The Camp has 1 Senior Week, 1 Girls' School of Missions Week, 5 Junior Hi Weeks, and 5 Junior Weeks. The Campers and Counselors spending a week at camp totaled 1,311.

Many activities were offered on a week-end basis. Among those were: MYF Presidents' Confab, Camp Directors and Counselors Training, Ministers' Orientation, Young Adult Week-end, Field Workers' Retreat, Church School Superintendents' Retreat, Senior Hi Week-end, Family Week-end, Coaching Conference, and MYF local church week-ends. Adults spending a week-end at camp increased to a high of 989.

With a very cooperative and workable permanent and program staff, an outstanding contribution was made to the campers. Young people were brought closer to the way of living together as Christians, dedicating their lives to full-time church vocations, and returning to their churches and communities better prepared to meet problems and responsibilities as young people.

We are grateful for the work of each Director and Counselor who gave of their services, their time, and their talents. More training has been given to each Director and Counselor in order to do the very best job in educating others.

The Rustic Camp area will be available for around the Barn and will provide a new experience in Camping for Seniors, Junior Hi's, and family camping. The picnic area will not be developed this year because of the lack of financial support given by the local churches. The Camp needs your consideration and support in time, talents, and gifts.

Wesley Foundation

This is a summary of our stewardship for the quadrennium, 1956-1960. Four years ago our Conference had only one Wesley Foundation which had been operating in the premises of the Newark Methodist Church for students of the University of Delaware. Plans had already been made, however, for the establishment of Wesley House immediately adjacent to the campus, and work was under way in May, 1956. One of the first responsibilities of your Committee, however, was to secure more adequate financing for the completion of this enterprise and particularly for furnishings. A sub-committee of women in Newark was exceedingly helpful. Grace Church in Wilmington, Delaware, dedicated its Easter Offering of 1957 to furnish the Upper Room

Chapel. The original debt for the Wesley House enterprise was \$24,000. At the conclusion of this fiscal year it will remain at \$19,737.85. Meanwhile, more funds have been made available from year to year for salary and programming.

The Rev. Leland Hall, our chaplain at Newark, has been granted a leave of absence to complete doctoral work at the University of Alabama. Mr. C. Chapman Herrman, a recent Seminary graduate from the Candler School of Theology at Emory University in Georgia, will take his place for the coming year.

Meanwhile, your Committee has been able to establish Wesley Foundation Work at Washington College in Chestertown, Maryland, and at the State Teachers' College in Salisbury. In both cases the problem has been to cut through various problems arising from the relationships between Methodist Churches in these communities.

At Chestertown a highly desirable tract of land immediately adjacent to the college campus has been purchased for any eventual need to have a student center. Unfortunately, neither of the Methodist churches in Chestertown is in the immediate vicinity of the college campus.

In Salisbury, however, the Asbury Methodist Church will ultimately occupy new quarters adjoining the college campus. Some negotiation has taken place between your Committee and Asbury Church exploring the possibility of using church premises in the future for our work with college students. Only tentative understandings have been reached, however, by this time.

Interest in Wesley Foundation work is slowly growing in our Conference. This is reflected when the per capita giving of 6c in 1955-1956 is contrasted with the per capita giving of 21c for 1958-1959. We trust that when the figures for the current year have been compared, the increment will be even higher. However, your committee remains deeply concerned that so much of our limited operating funds (secured from the minimal asking of 30c per member allocated to all of our churches) should need to be used for the capital needs of debt retirement at Newark and Chestertown. Sooner or later the Peninsula Conference must make available some capital funds for Wesley Foundation work.

The Chairman of your committee regrets that it has proven so very difficult to get bona fide Committee-work done. It has been very difficult to assemble Committee personnel for frequent consultation. It is hoped that in the coming quadrennium this situation can be improved, and it is recommended that operating committees be established for both the Chestertown and Salisbury work though care must be exercised to keep control at the Conference rather than at the local level.

We have been very fortunate in having such competent leaders as the Rev. Messrs. Hall and Kesmodel and Mrs. Bloodsworth. Their work has been both dedicated and intelligent. However, it is highly desirable that a chaplain for work at Washington College be secured who can give considerably more time than can a busy pastor like Mr. Kesmodel. Mrs. Bloodsworth took responsibility for work in Salisbury with the understanding that an ordained minister would be secured eventually. Your Committee is grateful that Mrs. Bloodsworth has remained with us but regrets that the

proposal to have an ordained minister to work with our Salisbury students has not been consummated yet.

In summary, your Committee feels that real progress has been made at least in getting three Wesley Foundations into operation; but, as is here indicated, much remains to be done by the Committee who will succeed in the next quadrennium.

QUADRENNIAL COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION OF PENINSULA CONFERENCE

The General Conference of 1956 fully realized the dire necessity of awakening the Churches in city, town, and country to the opportunity and need for much greater interest and support of Christian Higher Education. A quadrennial program which was devised to create greater understanding, wider interest and much increased financial support for our Methodist Institutions of Higher Learning was adopted and projected into the life stream of the Church. This program ordered the setting up in each Annual Conference a Quadrennial Committee on Christian Higher Education to be responsible to relate the General Church Program to the needs and opportunity within the Annual Conference.

The Commission in the Peninsula Conference was elected in 1957, the second year of the Quadrennium. This year (1957-58) was spent in organization, research, study and conversations with Institutions and Conference Agencies related in any way to Christian Higher Education. With great patience and care the Commission projected a plan wherein the goals and program for Christian Higher Education was integrated into the total program structure of the Annual Conference. This plan was adopted (see

1958 Conference Journal). It assured full cooperation of persons and agencies of the Conference as well as Wesley College, Wesley Theological Seminary and Wesley Foundation, the Institutions involved, in the promotion of the total cause.

Although it took two years to get our Conference Program for Christian Higher Education into "high gear," it has been effective in rapidly moving to reach the goals set. In 1954-55, the Peninsula Conference paid a total of \$47,477 for Christian Higher Education. \$37,935 was for Colleges and \$9,542 was for Wesley Foundation. In 1958-59, \$191,573 was paid for Christian Higher Education. \$100,492 was for Wesley College Capital Fund, \$36,283 was for Wesley College Operation Fund, \$33,938 was for Wesley Theological Seminary and \$20,860 for Wesley Foundation.

This achievement has placed the Peninsula Conference high on the list rating the Annual Conferences in Methodism in per capita giving to Christian Higher Education. The 1959-60 report which we do not have at this writing but which will be given in the Conference Treasurer's report should show further gains, especially in the Wesley College Capital Funds column.

This is no time for complacency, however. We have not yet reached our goals. Since our total giving for Christian Higher Education was \$2.43 per member in 1958-59 and will be higher this year, it would appear that we have gone far beyond the goal of \$1.30 per member. This is not technically correct. The goal of \$1.30 per member for Christian Higher Education was intended as an annual amount for operation and program of Higher Education Institutions and not for building funds, which were to be in addition to the \$1.30 per member. When we realize that out of the \$2.43 per member paid last year to the Conference Treasurer, \$1.67 was used for capital expenditures by Wesley College, Wesley Seminary and Wesley Foundation and only \$.76 per member was available for operation and program, we will understand that we still have much work to do to reach the true goal of \$1.30 per capital annual gift for the support of the continuing program of Christian Higher Education.

This Quadrennial Committee fully cooperated with Wesley College, Wesley Seminary and Wesley Foundation through special sub-committees headed by George W. Goodley, Walter H. Stone and William F. Dunkle, Jr. Information about these institutions have been channeled to the local churches. Each year more churches use College Day, Wesley Seminary Day and Methodist Student Day as an opportunity to inform our people about the work of our Educational Institutions in our Conference and throughout the world. It is devoutly to be hoped that we shall continue to urge this until every Church is sharing in the program.

As we close the Quadrennium and the work of this particular Commission ends, it seems expedient to point out the following:

1. The Obligation to raise \$750,000. for Wesley College Capital Improvement is upon this Conference until every dollar is paid. If a local church is behind in paying her share (apportioned by The Commission on World Service and Finance), the obligation is upon that church to make up the unpaid amount. After this year, we will have approximately \$500,000 to raise to complete payment on this commitment. Our program

calls for this to be done in three years. Every local church needs to realize that if this amount is not paid within the allotted time three years, it will be necessary to extend the time until the full amount is paid.

2. The \$.50 per member for Wesley Seminary goes toward paying a commitment of \$125,000 for relocation and building. We have paid approximately \$33,000 per year for three years. We still have an obligation here of \$26,000, (this is approximate) for this purpose. After this is paid, the \$.50 per member should be given for annual operation costs which will then put us in line with the true goal projected by the General Conference.

3. The total goal of \$.30 per member for Wesley Foundation needs to be met. Last year (1958-59) \$20,860 was paid. The amount apportioned was \$23,990. From the amount paid, approximately \$6,000 had to be used for Capital expenditures. This means that instead of \$.30 per member, \$.26 per member was paid. \$.08 per member was used for capital expenditures. Only \$.18 per member was available for operation and program costs of the Methodist Student work. We need to keep in mind that the intended goal projected by the General Conference was \$.30 per member for operation and program costs.

4. When we compare where we are with the projected goals, we understand that we have much yet to do to reach these goals. When we compare what we are doing now with what we did four years ago, we can thank God for a good achievement, take courage and move on to do the rest.

The Peninsula Conference Program of Christian Higher Education has truly just begun. It is a continuing program. There is a need for a special committee to cultivate and promote this work. It is our conviction that a small committee from the Conference Board of Education can manage this as well as a special Conference Commission composed of many persons.

We recommend, therefore, that the Conference Board of Education be authorized to set up from its membership a Committee to have responsibility for the Program of Christian Higher Education within the Annual Conference.

We express our gratitude to Bishop Oxnam, our four District Superintendents, The Annual Conference Board of Education, The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, The Conference Treasurer and all other persons who have contributed to the great progress made by our Peninsula Conference in the work of Christian Higher Education.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Decade of Dynamic Discipleship

These are remarkable and unusual days in which you and I are living. No longer are we surprised by the announcements of new discoveries in the field of medicine and scientific achievement in industry and outer-space. Yet, it is my firm belief that the greatest discoveries in the next decade or so will be in the field of the spiritual, in such things as the power of prayer, the influence of mind over matter, and the broadening field of human relations. Science today has not only the imagination of the peoples of the world, but the front page of every newspaper. Man needs to learn how to control himself and to live with himself and with his neighbor even more than he needs to know how to live in the outer-space or on any planet far away from here.

I do not believe it foolish to be thinking in terms of missions and a ministry to those who, in the years to come, will go into outer-space. The slogan should be that, "The Church Follows Her People." The day will come, no doubt, when thousands will be traveling to places not even known nor dreamed about now. In a recent gathering of scientists in England one of the most eminent scientists stated that there were men before him whose grandchildren would be born in "Outer-space." A trip into outer space would not carry a man away from God but rather it should create an atmosphere in which he will need God more than ever. He will truly be able to sing with the Psalmists, "The heavens declare the glory of God."

But our immediate task as Christians cannot be minimized by the glamor and the romance of outer space.

Man can either destroy this world and himself on it, or he has the possibility of making it the Kingdom of God on earth. It is our task and our common challenge to see that God's will is done on earth as it is in heaven. We are now being told that any kind of matter has locked up in its structure one thousand times as much energy, pound for pound, as is released in the fusion of uranium. But have we also really discovered what the power of Jesus Christ, when accepted in a human life, can release in the form of a redeeming force for all the world? We must never neglect the physical scientists, but we surely must go deeper than ever before in spiritual forces and resources.

"More Depth!" is the cry of the ministry and laity alike regarding the church membership today!

With rapid shifting populations, we have accentuated gain in church membership without adequately assimilating and indoctrinating those received.

The next ten years should indeed be a Decade of Dynamic Discipleship, and with prayer upon our lips and determination in our hearts we will for the glory of God and his Son Jesus Christ march on to the challenge and adventure which lies ahead. It is the hope of your Conference Board of Evangelism that EVERY church in the Peninsula Annual Conference will embark in faith to the mark of the high calling in Jesus Christ. All church members can and must become informed, convinced, and active witnesses for Christ and His Church. Every Methodist must enlist himself, all other church members, all unlisted persons in his community, and win our youth for the ministry, missions, and other full-time service.

In the United States there are one hundred and six million Church members—good, bad, and indifferent—while seventy one million profess no faith at all. U. S. News and World Report estimates that by 1990 the present population of two and one-half million will double to five million. In the next ten years in the U. S. alone, 8,400,000 more family units will be started at some church altar or Justice of the Peace office.

How can we get people concerned about their homes, their families; babies, children, growing youth?

Our emphasis must be upon personal evangelism. A new spiritual life chart has been prepared for use in prayer groups and Sunday School classes to help each person become more efficient in winning others. Let us preach on evangelism until each member carries in his heart a burden for souls.

How Can We Begin?

1. Let each District hold an evangelistic planning session in June or July to set up the District program, and have a Conference Board representative meet with each District Committee. Let the guide to evangelism be studied prayerfully in setting up a District program. Let each District be asked to have the work of the Membership and Evangelism Commission explained and emphasized at District Workshops.
2. Set a minimum of ONE EVENING A MONTH in each local church for visitation evangelism: Organize a Fisherman's Club in every Church and also a Shepherd's Club.

3. Let the summers be re-captured for Christ! In other years, summer was an excellent time for evangelistic services, a time productive for great good in the number of decisions for Christ. For those churches that find it practical and possible, let plans be made for at least one week of revival services.
4. Observe September, October, November and December as months for Total Enlistment.
5. Observe the Week of Dedication combining it with One Great Week of Evangelism.
6. Let training classes in Church membership be held for children, youth, and adults conducted by the pastor.
7. Undergird the whole evangelistic movement with prayer: (1) In the home, encouraging the use of the Upper Room for all families; (2) In the church, with prayer cells organized among the youth and adults; (3) In the business world, with prayer breakfasts and luncheons held weekly in which business men and women participate; (4) Enlist the interests of all shut-in members who can set aside a special period each day for special prayer-time in the interest of evangelism.

Let us pray, study, and work that God may continue to lead the Peninsula Annual Conference Methodists onward and upward!

1. WEEKLY NEWSPAPER ADS
presenting in challenging language the theme for the week.
2. RADIO MESSAGES
to interpret the challenge of the theme for the week to be used (if pos-

sible) during the first fifteen minutes of each of the ten weekly meetings of the family groups in the homes.

November 27th Total Enlistment Sunday

On this Sunday entire membership and constituency of the church shall be challenged to come to the altar of the church for a dedication of self and abilities, using the cards prepared and distributed previously for this purpose. This should be the greatest day in the life of the Methodist in the Peninsula Annual Conference in a generation.

December 4th Membership Sunday

For the reception of new members, following the two-week period of training.

3. FAMILY GROUP MEETINGS
With eight or more families in each group, with at least two unchurched families invited, meeting weekly during each of the ten weeks—probably in lieu of the mid-week service—with an appointed and trained leader in charge.
4. EVANGELISTIC PREACHING SERVICES IN EACH CHURCH EACH SUNDAY
During the ten-week period embodying the theme for the particular week conducted by the pastor or prepared lay speaker. NO SILENT PULPIT IN THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE ON ANY OF THE TEN SUNDAYS.

GOODWILL INDUSTRIES OF WILMINGTON

For Goodwill Industries, the past year was a period of continued growth and progress in practically every phase of the agency's program of service for physically and mentally handicapped persons.

In the area of operational activities, several new all-time record highs were recorded—calls by the agency's trucks in response to requests by contributors numbered 21,686, a 44% increase over the number made during the previous year. Sales of merchandise processed by handicapped workers and sold through Goodwill retail stores, amounted to a new high of \$102,872.44 and represented a 23% increase over sales of a year ago. Total earned income from all industrial activities reached the highest level yet at \$120,258.70 showing a gain of 25%.

In addition to industrial earnings, \$12,000 was received through the United Community Fund and \$435.31 from other miscellaneous contributions. Total income for the year, from all sources, amounted to \$132,694.01 or a 19% gain over total income for the previous year.

Total expenditures for the year, including staff salaries, wages to handicapped workers and all other operating expense, amounted to \$130,827.20, showing an increase of 19%. As an added point of interest, it can be reported that Goodwill Industries was about 92% self-supporting during the year under review.

Gains and increases in terms of "how many and how much" are important factors in Goodwill's constant effort to improve and expand its services to larger numbers of handicapped people. The advances in operational and financial activities recorded during the year were reflected in providing added dimensions to the agency's program of service.

85 different physically and mentally handicapped persons were served during the year as compared with 75 for the previous year. Of the 85 served, 55 were male and 30 were female; 30 were single, 31 were married with dependent children; 14 were married without children, 10 were widows. Ages of the workers ranged from 18 to 80 years.

Handicapping conditions encountered during the year included, in general classifications: orthopedic, organic, visual, aural, mental and emotional, social and the disabilities occasioned by advanced age. In many instances multiple disabilities were encountered.

Opportunity wages, the most readily measured, and perhaps the most tangible of the many benefits resulting from Goodwill's employment program, amounted to \$79,368.00 for the year, a 14% increase over the amount paid during the previous year. Other benefits maintained included vacations with full pay; sick leave; blue cross coverage; free life insurance.

Goodwill workers, despite the fact that they may once have been classified by commercial industry as "unemployable" were able to assume their share of the responsibilities of productive citizenship in the community. Rather than being "tax burdens" they were "tax payers" and paid from their earnings during 1959, \$7,703.72 in Federal Withholding Taxes; \$2,212.33 in Social Security payments; and \$531.19 in Delaware State income taxes.

For a number of years, Goodwill Industries has maintained a vocational training program for handicapped persons, if but on a more or less informal basis. During the past year, however, training opportunities were expanded considerably as the result of formal training agreements with the Veterans Administration and the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation. Handicapped clients of both agencies were channeled into Goodwill Industries for extended prevocational adjustment opportunities and for established vocational training activities.

In our local situation, Goodwill Industries has not only tried to continue the original conception of our work as a religious organization but has also, as the program has grown, endeavored to strengthen its emphasis on the importance of spiritual values in the rehabilitative process. Along with the inclusion of these values in every phase of the program, half hour Chapel services were conducted three mornings each week throughout the year. The services, interdenominational in character, were maintained for Goodwill workers only and attendance was entirely voluntary. Both ministers and laymen, representing the various denominations in the area, visited our Chapel services on many occasions and brought inspiring messages to our handicapped workers.

In conclusion, Goodwill Industries would like to express its appreciation to the many Methodist Church groups in our Conference and to the respective individual Pastors, all of whom cooperated so splendidly, and on so many occasions in helping to fulfill the primary purpose and chief goal of Goodwill Industries—that of restoring handicapped people to the community as stable, happy, useful and independent citizens.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The Peninsula Conference Historical Society closes its third year of existence as an incorporated body. We are pleased to report several achievements. Deeds, plots and agreements pertaining to Barratt's Chapel are recorded. Barratt's Chapel is insured for a total of \$17,000. During the year this Board has met three times.

Many activities have centered around Barratt's Chapel itself. We have had visiting Church groups from New Jersey, Wesley College, and one of the Salisbury sub-district Youth Groups. The Delaware State Grange held their annual Church Service in the Chapel. Membership classes from many of the surrounding churches have visited the Chapel. Two anniversary services of significance have been held in the Chapel. The regular anniversary service was held in October with Dr. John N. Link as guest minister, assisted by the Rev. Roy L. Tawes, Dover District Superintendent. Solos were presented by Mrs. Mason Willis, contralto.

On Saturday, November 14, a service was held to commemorate the 175th Anniversary of the Lord's Supper by legally recognized Methodist ministers in North America. The four districts provided four hours of Silent Communion, District Superintendents and a number of Elders assisted. The anniversary worship service was held at 11:00 a. m. with the Rev. Dr. G. Ray Jordan, of Candler Theological Seminary of Emory University giving the sermon.

We wish to commend the Rev. R. Jervis Cooke, Superintendent of the Wilmington District, and his co-workers for the two outstanding celebrations held in January, 1960. We also wish to thank this District for their gift of some \$400 to be used for the maintenance of Barratt's Chapel.

At this writing we have reason to believe that the American Association of Methodist Historical Societies will provide a grant of \$1,000 per year to our society to be used for Barratt's Chapel. The Association has had a representative visit. Our Conference, upon hearing of our plans which will be recorded in the next paragraph, recommended to the American Association the above grant.

The Society, during the year, has given a great deal of study to the needs of Barratt's Chapel. Encouraged by the grant of \$1,000 per year for 5 years by the Annual Conference, the same to be used toward building a home at Barratt's Chapel, we have studied the need very carefully. Our studies lead the Society to decide that a small museum along with a house should be built. With these thoughts in mind the services of George D. Savage, architect, of Narberth, Pa., were secured and the preliminary plan placed in your hands has been accepted and approved by the Society. The estimated cost of this building will be \$25,000.

We, therefore, recommend that this plan be accepted and that the Historical Society be given Conference permission to proceed with the building thereof when adequate financial arrangements can be made and when the final plans have been reviewed by the Bishop of the Washington Area, the Executive Committee of the American Methodist Historical Societies, the Executive Committee of the Northeastern Jurisdictional Historical Societies, and the Cabinet of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

We recommend that this Conference go on record in extending a word of thanks to the Delaware State Archives Commission under the direction of Mr. Leon De Valenger for their accepting of a vast collection of Methodist materials for protection and preservation.

We respectfully request that the presiding Bishop and Cabinet give study to the possibility and the practicality of appointing a retired minister interested in historical research and who would also be interested in developing a fitting religious program for the Chapel. We believe that there are certain retired ministers who would be interested in applying for such a position. We believe that a resident minister would add status to the position of the Chapel as one of Methodist's Shrines.

Your Historical Society will continue to gather historical data and is continuously interested in receiving materials of historical interest. The cooperation of every Methodist in gathering material is solicited.

Your guidance, suggestions and help are always appreciated.

HOMES FOR THE AGED OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH, INC.

This report is concerned with our major project, The Methodist Country House. We cannot offer it without acknowledging the goodness and kindly providence of God and also our gratitude to all those who, through their prayers, counsel, services and gifts, have made possible the progress that we herewith set forth.

On March 6, 1959 ground-breaking exercises were conducted, trustees and distinguished guests participating. A message of encouragement was delivered by the Honorable J. Caleb Boggs, a loyal Methodist layman and the Governor of the State of Delaware.

On Sept. 26, 1959 the cornerstone laying ceremonies were led by the President of the Board of Trustees and our District Superintendents. Dr. J. Leas Green brought the message and Dr. Pierre S. du Pont, III laid the cornerstone assisted by the President of the Board of Trustees and the Executive-Director, Rev. George H. Pigueron, Jr.

The construction program has moved on schedule and it is expected that The Methodist Country House will be ready for guests in September 1960.

Belief in the purpose of The Methodist Country House to provide a Christian Home for the aged, and the careful thought and consideration that has gone into the plans for its construction has inspired many persons to make gifts of considerable magnitude.

A gift for building and equipping a chapel was donated by Mr. H. Gregg Danby, former Wilmington banker, as a memorial to his parents. Mr. Danby's gift provides for the construction of a 180 seat chapel, its furnishings and an electric organ. This colonial-design chapel, ingeniously planned to double as an auditorium will be marked with a plaque inscribed: "This

chapel dedicated to the memory of Mr. & Mrs. John H. Danby through a gift by their son, H. Gregg Danby."

Mr. & Mrs. Ernest du Pont, Jr. have given the dining room as a memorial to Mr. du Pont's maternal grandfather, Richard Bowen Brinton. This beautiful colonial dining room will seat approximately 180 guests at tables for two and four. Lighting fixtures, carpeting and other appointments will be in keeping with the general architectural scheme.

The Woodcock Memorial Library is a gift of the widow of Floyd W. Woodcock, now Mrs. Kathleen Hooker. The library will be completely equipped and is being set up by one of the incoming guests who was a former librarian at the University of Delaware. In addition to this very fine memorial to Mr. Woodcock, who was one of the early trustees of The Methodist Country House, Mrs. Hooker has made possible through another gift the executive offices as a memorial to her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Isaac W. Thompson.

An anonymous donor as a part of his gift has endowed a double living room unit for a retired minister and his wife. The suite will be occupied by Rev. and Mrs. A. P. T. Hudson.

Careful thought is being given to the development of the staff who will carry on the various services necessary in the proper functioning of the home. Mrs. Arthur E. Swann, an active member of Silverbrook Church, a native of Delaware, holding graduate degrees, has been engaged as the head nurse. She will serve under the direction of Dr. John H. Barnhart, a trustee of The Methodist Country House and a member of Grace Methodist Church, who will direct the infirmary which will be capable of caring for 28 patients. The infirmary will also include a doctor's office, examination room and a laboratory.

Mr. Eugene Henderson, a licensed stationary engineer and a Methodist from the southland, has been employed as the Chief Engineer. He comes with excellent recommendations and is now on the job becoming familiar with all the equipment which is involved in his particular responsibility.

On June 1, 1959, Mr. Ernest du Pont, Jr. was elected treasurer. He succeeded Mr. John F. Kelso, conference treasurer, who has served as the treasurer of The Methodist Country House since its inception. Mr. Kelso felt that because of increased responsibilities, not only of the Annual Conference work but also with the bank with which he is associated, that it was impossible for him to continue in the work to which he was so fully dedicated. His successor, Mr. du Pont, gives generously of his time and talent and is doing an outstanding work in his office. He is assisted by his able accountant, Mr. Arthur S. Reed, Jr., a Methodist layman.

One of Delaware's distinguished citizens, Dr. Pierre S. du Pont, III, a man who has given valued counsel, considerable time and generous gifts to The Methodist Country House was elected to The Methodist Hall of Fame and presented with a citation by the General Board of Hospitals and Homes at its annual convention held in Columbus, Ohio, in February of this year. His citation read: "His unselfish gifts of time, counsel, thought, and energy have figured prominently in the establishment of this Methodist residence for older persons . . . His genuine interest in the project has served as an inspiration to gain the support of others."

Of our guests in The Country House, three-fourths will be accepted on the Founder's Fee plan, one-fourth will be persons unable to make a contribution to the building fund and will therefore be accepted on the basis of whatever their resources permit.

To date about 60% of those who will come in on the Founder's Fee plan have been accepted and have made pledges. It is interesting to note that one year ago we had \$90,000 pledged whereas today we have \$418,000. Of those who will be received on the basis of whatever their resources permit we have a full quota of applicants.

Our original forecast anticipated raising \$650,000 from Founder's gifts. It now appears likely that this could be increased by approximately \$75,000. By our opening date in September we will have a near capacity roster of guests. Area-wise our guests are as follows: 55% from the State of Delaware, 35% from the Eastern Shore of Maryland and 10% from nearby states.

We have received in cash a total of \$886,779. We have in unpaid pledges a total of \$92,175, of this amount \$50,000 is from the Kresge Foundation. If our forecast is correct we shall need approximately \$1,400,000 to liquidate the indebtedness which will be ours when the building is completed. This is exclusive of the Founders' gifts. Considering that the cost of this project is slightly in excess of \$3,000,000, this is quite a happy picture. We, however, must realize that it will be extremely difficult to operate with a mortgage of \$1,400,000 across the years. Though we have good prospects, no guarantee can be made of how much money can be received in each current year. We are confident that with God's help, the full support of our trustees, our many friends and conference members, the work begun in faith will ultimately be paid for in full.

We are incorporating within this report an audited statement for the period beginning June 1, 1958 to May 31, 1959, prepared by our conference auditors, Coe, Lukens & O'Donnell. We are also presenting a breakdown of the financial picture as prepared by our treasurer, Mr. Ernest du Pont, Jr. and the Executive-Director, Rev. George H. Pigueron, Jr. as of April 4, 1960.

Again, I wish to say, "thank you" to Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam for his helpful counsel, to our cabinet for their friendly concern, the chairman and members of the Conf. Bd. of Hospitals and Homes for their promotional efforts, to the officers and members of the trustees of The Methodist Country House, to the ministers, laymen and laywomen of our conference, and to a host of friends for their kind words and thoughtful deeds. Last but not least to our Executive-Director and his Associate, Rev. George H. Pigueron, Jr. and Rev. Wm. H. Owens.

**A REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES
PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE**

1959-1960

The purpose of our report is to keep before the Peninsula Annual Conference the ministry it performs or will perform to the boys and girls, to the sick, and to the aging in our area.

You may be interested in knowing that our Methodist Church developed seventeen brand new institutions over the United States in 1959. This is significant because it reveals developing interest in this ministry.

In our own Conference we express our appreciation to you for your excellent support at Christmas time of the work of the Board of Child Care and on Mother's Day of the Methodist Country House. In view of increasing costs these offerings should become larger every year as we endeavor to meet the needs of human sufferers in the name of Christ. Details regarding the work of these institutions will be presented elsewhere.

We would like to say a special word about the Methodist Country House as a supplement to the report made by the President of the Board of Trustees. In our changing economy when most of our senior citizens possess certain channels of income, the Methodist Country House will provide a home of comfortable and congenial environment and at the same time allow the guests to maintain a sense of independence. For those who are not so fortunate, we Methodists, through our Mother's Day Offering, can give support. Hence, we will have within our boundaries an institution that will be meeting human need and eventually paying its own way. We would pray God to continue to guide and bless those who have helped to make possible the Methodist Country House.

We would recommend for 1960-61 that:

1. We continue to support the Board of Child Care with a special Christmas Offering and the Methodist Country House with a special Mother's Day Offering.
2. That the work of these institutions be kept before the members of the local church either by the appointment of a Welfare Secretary or a Committee on Hospitals and Homes.
3. That the Annual Conference approve the recording of the Mother's Day offering of the churches in a separate column in the Statistical Table of the Journal of 1960, and each year thereafter.

We nominate as members of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Country House for three-year terms the following persons:

REPORT OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Perhaps the most significant accomplishment of the Board of Lay Activities during the last quadrennium was in the chartering of Methodist Men's organizations. Our goal was forty new Methodist Men's organizations during the quadrennium. We reached our goal. We now have in the Dover District 40% of the charges having Methodist Men's organizations; in the Easton District, 45%; in the Salisbury District, 55%; in the Wilmington District, 75%; and in the Conference as a whole, 55% or a total of 114 Methodist Men's organizations in the Peninsula Conference. This advance has been possible largely because of many of our ministers coming to realize the importance of active Methodist Men's organizations in their churches.

Laymen's Sunday was observed in about 300 of the churches in our Conference. We regret that there are still a few who do not observe this important day. We appeal to ministers and laymen alike to see to it that this day is observed in every church, with laymen filling the pulpit at the main service.

In those Districts where laymen sponsored communion breakfasts 2350 men attended. In the Dover District, six were held with approximately 1200 men attending; in the Easton District, five with 650 men attending; in the Salisbury District, five with 500 attending. We are thrilled and humbly grateful for the interest shown by our men in coming to these services.

Each of the four Districts had laymen-minister banquets. A total of about 1250 men were present at these banquets. These affairs are growing in interest and effectiveness year by year. They are good.

A total of seven, including your Conference Lay Leader, attended the Jurisdictional meeting at Buck Hill Falls. The next Jurisdictional meeting will be in Atlantic City in October.

We are pleased to report that one of the radio stations in the Dover District is carrying the Methodist Men's Hour every Sunday. We trust that those of you who can will listen to it and let us have your comments.

It is gratifying to know that our District Lay Leaders have visited nearly all of the Methodist Men's organizations in their Districts, and in addition have spoken in many churches and at many church services. Our heartfelt thanks are extended to: John R. Rogers of the Dover District, Walter B. Palmer of the Easton District, Elton W. Parsons of the Salisbury District, and Clifford T. Foster of the Wilmington District. We also want to thank their Associate Lay Leaders for the work they have done.

This report would not be complete without special mention of our Laymen's Retreat held last September 12th and 13th at Camp Pecometh. There were 183 men who registered. When you realize that the capacity of Camp Pecometh is about 160 you know we had an overflow crowd. We are told that we had the largest attendance for any event ever held at Camp Pecometh. Some of our men slept in the Chapel. Nevertheless, it was a wonderful retreat, a series of great experiences. Perhaps the high spot was the Sunday morning worship service during which Dr. Robert G. Mayfield, General Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities, preached. I doubt that those who heard him will ever forget that experience. We thank God that this and other of our retreats have meant so much to so many men.

This being my last report as Peninsula Conference Lay Leader, I trust you will pardon a few personal words. I would like to thank the many ministers and laymen who have helped in many ways. I cannot thank them enough for their advice and counsel, their prayers and support. But more than any other I want to thank the little man from one of our smaller churches who came to me at the close of our last retreat with shining face and tear filled eyes and said as he grasped my hand, "God was here, God was here, I felt His presence."

In conclusion let me say that old lay leaders never die, they just live to testify.

THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

The business of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications is people, specifically, our ministerial candidates, as they move from the status from Local Preacher to full Conference membership and ordination. The work of this Board produces no buildings, except all of the buildings constructed under the leadership of our ministers, wherever they go. This Board raises no money, except all the money which the churches, led by our ministers, give for Christian work at home and abroad. Ministerial training has to do with only one element in the life of our church, and that is its life blood—the quality of our ministry as it molds the destiny of the church wherever her name is proclaimed and known. To this high task the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications has been and continues to be committed.

The Chairman and Registrar of the Board attended the Thirty-fourth Conference on the Ministry, sponsored by the Department of Ministerial Education of the Board of Education of the Methodist Church, held at National College in Kansas City, Missouri, December 29-31, 1959.

The Board has continued its program of interviews and training. The Second Training Program for newly appointed ministers was held at Camp Pe-Co-Meth on June 11, 1959. Ten newly appointed ministers attended this program. Panel discussions were conducted on the following subjects: "The Minister As A Leader of The Local Church", "The Five Commissions of the Local Church", "The Minister As a Member of the Annual Conference", and "The Minister As a Preacher".

The Fifth Annual Orientation Program for Ministerial Candidates was held on Saturday, January 23, at the Newark Methodist Church. Panel discussions were held on "The Minister and His Conference" and "The Minister and His Church". At dinner the group joined the Career Conference, being sponsored by the Commission on Christian Vocations, to hear Dr. R. D. Singleton, Director of the Department of Student Work of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, speak on "The Life and Work of the Missionary". Twenty-five candidates and ten Board members attended this program.

Interviews have been conducted thus far by the Executive Committee with sixteen candidates; and psychological tests have been administered to seven candidates for Conference membership and two Approved Supplies. At this writing four men are scheduled to be received On Trial and eight to be received into Full Membership.

The School for Approved Supplies will be held at Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D. C., from June 27 to July 22. This school is arranged so that a Supply can complete four courses during one session, thereby securing credit for a full year's work. Scholarships are available from our Board on a pro rata basis. The Department of Ministerial Education of the Methodist Church, although it still continues the course of study through correspondence, now strongly urges Supplies to secure their training by attending such schools as this throughout the country. The advantages of such training as compared with correspondence work are obvious.

Because the summer Program for Newly Appointed Ministers and the Candidates Orientation Program involve essentially the same men and deal with the same general area, the Board recommends that beginning in 1960-61 the two programs be held on alternate years, and that the Candidates Orientation Program at Christmas time be held in 1960, and the Program for Newly Appointed Ministers in June, 1961.

The Chairman wishes to express his appreciation to William H. Revelle, Jr. for his excellent work as Registrar of the Board, to J. Robert Mackey for his helpful assistance as Secretary and to other members of the Board and of the Annual Conference for their splendid cooperation. Especially impressive has been the cooperation of our candidates in fulfilling the appointments and other requirements requested of them. Almost without exception this has been the kind of relationship we have had with our new Conference members.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS TO THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Board of Missions has met five times during the Conference year, and two additional meetings of the Executive Committee have been held. Many challenging opportunities for Church Extension have faced us during the year, and some forward strides have been taken to meet these challenges as the following report will show. In addition to this, we have also continued to be actively concerned with world outreach as the other arm of our two-phase program.

I. Cultivation

The responsibility of missionary education and cultivation falls largely upon our Conference Missionary Secretary, the Rev. Ira E. Doyle, and his four District Missionary Secretaries: the Rev. D'Arcy Littleton, Wilmington; the Rev. John A. Irwin, Dover; Rev. J. J. VonHagel, Salisbury; and the Rev. Harold Nunemaker, Easton. These men planned the year's cultivation program last summer at the Silver Bay Conference on the Christian World Mission where they met in consultation with the District Superintendents and advisors from the General Board. As a result, they have carried out an excellent program for our churches throughout the year. This began last Fall with workshops on each District for the members of local church Commissions on Missions. In January, a week of cultivation emphasis was held in each District. The Rev. James Stevenson and the Rev. Charles Reeve, both missionaries from the Central Belgian Congo, were our speakers in this program which included a total of thirty-nine meetings

attended by some 3,930 people. *Christian Missions Digest* was again mailed by the Board to every pastor serving an appointment within our Conference. The Film Library, operated by our Conference Missionary Secretary, continues to be widely used by our churches. It has been improved by the addition of several new films this year. Our Conference Missionary Secretary has addressed various groups on the topic of missions, and he and his assistants have given guidance to individual churches in the area of missionary education whenever called upon to do so. We feel that the fine quality of work being done by this cultivation committee of the Board is reflected in the high level of World Service and Advance Special giving in our Conference.

II. Special Projects

Two convocations on the Inner-City Church and The Interracial Church were held by the Division of National Missions early in November in Gary, Indiana. Our Board sent one delegate to each of these three-day sessions. These convocations were then followed up by a convocation in Wilmington during January on the problems of the inner-city. Under the leadership of the District Superintendent, R. Jervis Cooke, a program for a strong Methodist ministry in the changing urban areas of Wilmington is now being planned. It is imperative that this ministry be a special project of this Board during the coming Quadrennium, for although we build many fine suburban churches to serve the people who move into the many housing developments around the city, in the name of Christ we must not forget the thousands who continue to live in the heart of the city.

We have continued other special projects again this year such as the support given to the ministry to the families of the Dover Air Force Base personnel; the Migrant Ministry of the Del-Mar Migrant Committee of the Council of Churches; the work of our deaconesses at Union Methodist Church, Wilmington, and at the Wesley Chapel at DuRoss Heights; and the Browntown Mission. On March 24, this Board sponsored a Fiftieth Anniversary Service of Honor and Recognition for Mrs. Lillian C. Biddison who completed fifty years of work at the Browntown Mission on March 14. Attended by many people whose lives have been influenced by this mission, this inspiring testimonial was held in Union Methodist Church.

Within the bounds of our Conference is a large resort area along the seacoast. The Board of Missions has long been concerned about the responsibility of our Conference to strengthen the work of local churches in this area who are striving to minister to the large influx of summer visitors. Our Survey Committee, chaired by the Rev. Robert Mackay, arranged for a survey of this area to be made by the Department of Research and Survey of the Division of National Missions. This was conducted last Fall by Dr. Robert Wilson, and the conclusions of his report will be helpful in shaping the future policy of this Board along the seacoast.

III. Church Extension

The acquiring of new church sites has been one of our most promising accomplishments during the year. In June, 9.2 acres of land were purchased at Harbor View on Kent Island where a new church building will be erected by the merged congregations of the Island which are now known as The

Kent Island Methodist Church. A consecration service for this land was held in October, and the site will be deeded to the local church as soon as they are ready to begin actual construction. Later in the summer a choice site of 14.5 acres was purchased East of Salisbury on Phillip Morris Drive. Located between existing Route 50 and the new Throughway, this land is being held by the Board pending future plans for a church in that area which is growing very rapidly. A careful religious survey of this section of Wicomico County has been authorized for this summer. A new development called "Meadowview", west of Wilmington on the road to Newark, also gives some indication of needing a Methodist Church. The developer has made it possible for us to acquire a future church site here at a very reasonable price. Other land should be acquired in various sections of the Conference where population growth now calls for foresightedness in church extension planning.

In addition to those projects for which we have had a continuing responsibility this year, we have allocated funds for new church extension projects to the following churches: Magnolia, Delaware City, Ocean View, Georgetown-Grace, and Milton-Goshen. Payment on some of these grants in aid cannot begin until next year due to the lack of funds in the present budget. Other projects are not yet ready to receive financial assistance, but funds have been assured when their plans are fully approved and construction is underway. Several projects have been presented to the Board for consideration and have been studied carefully before the request has been denied. Unfortunately, not all applications for aid can be fulfilled. Donations can be made only on the basis of need and in the light of the Church Extension Policies published in the Journal of the Annual Conference of 1959.

In 1954, a survey of church extension needs of our entire Conference was made by Dr. Roy Sturm of the Department of Research and Surveys of the Division of National Missions, in response to a request by this Board. The findings and recommendations of this survey report were published and adopted by the Annual Conference of 1954 and have since proven to be of invaluable worth to our Cabinet and to this Board. The specific suggestions of this report concerning the starting of new churches, the strengthening of existing churches in rapidly growing areas, the realignment of circuits, and the merger of churches have constantly guided many of the developments that have occurred during this period. Such situations as Kingswood of Brookside, the new Kent Island Church to serve the Bay Bridge Area, the relocation of Asbury Church in Salisbury, and the merger of churches in Centreville, Hurlock, St. Michael's, and many other places are all indications of the helpful guidance of this survey report of 1954.

However, during the past six years many sociological changes have occurred on this Peninsula, and the Board felt an urgent need for an evaluation of this Survey to be made this year. Consequently, the Rev. Robert Mackay, chairman of the Board's Survey Committee, was authorized to proceed with this, and in late March, Dr. Roy Sturm, accompanied by Dr. Albert Adams of the Church Extension Department of the Division of National Missions, resurveyed the Conference in the light of what has happened during this six year period. The text of that report including its recommendations follows:

"At your request we have evaluated the results of six years of operation under the policy set up in 1954. Herewith is our report and suggestions:

One of the objectives of the policy established six years ago was to encourage particularly small membership size churches located in the same neighborhood to merge their resources. At that time there were 307 churches with a membership of less than 200, today there are 269 or a decrease of 38. Also there is an increase from 104 to 109 of those churches with a membership of more than 200. Then there were 62 charges with less than 200 members for the entire charge. Now (1959 Conference) there are 47. (Plans projected for the 1960 Conference will further reduce the number to approximately 37.) This practice has not only strengthened local churches but it has resulted in stronger charges which pay a more adequate salary." Furthermore, this reduction in the number of charges has been accomplished without leaving any minister without a charge. It is expected that no change will be made in this policy.

It should be noted that during this time the total membership of the Conference has increased from 72,527 to 79,968 or 7,441. Moreover, in at least three of the four districts, a number of communities have lost population. When these are added to by the inertia and sometime opposition to change, which so often accompanies a desire to maintain the old accustomed ways, the progress achieved is very commendable.

Further progress in strengthening local churches and charges is desirable in order to have churches which exert the maximum influence for building better communities, and also charges which not only provide an adequate salary for the ministers but also a challenging situation in which to live and labor.

Consequently, it is believed that there is need to reaffirm the policies established in 1954 with certain modifications indicated by experience and the changed situation. It is, therefore, recommended:

1. That the conference request the Bishop to continue to place churches located in close proximity, especially those with a small membership, under one pastor.

2. That in all situations, regardless of the membership size of churches, there be active cooperation so that the spiritual needs of the community be more adequately met and that Methodism present a united witness.

3. That the Conference commend the District Superintendents and the Bishop for their efforts to merge Methodist Churches located in the same neighborhood. These efforts to lead the churches to form more efficient units is resulting in a stronger Conference.

4. That the Conference authorize the Board of Missions to continue to cooperate with the cabinet in encouraging the unification of churches in close proximity by assistance in the purchase of sites, moving of buildings, purchasing or building parsonages, and/or erection of new church buildings.

5. That the Conference instruct its Board of Missions to make no appropriation to churches in the above category which refuse to cooperate in achieving the objective set forth.

6. That the Conference request the cabinet in the plan of appointments to arrange circuit appointments so that no minimum salary funds be expended for those churches which refuse to cooperate.

7. That the Conference instruct the District Superintendents, the District Boards of Church Location and Building, and Pastors to withhold their approval to any request for remodeling, improvements, etc., from Churches falling in the category of refusing to cooperate with the Conference in achieving the objective outlined above.

8. That the District Superintendents and the District Boards of Church Location and Building be requested to evaluate any requests for church building and improvement in the light of possible future uses of the church and/or churches in the immediate area.

9. It is believed that the time has arrived when the Conference Board of Missions should consider reducing the ratio of grants and increasing that of loans.

10. That the Conference suggest that churches give special attention to their present and projected needs for off-street parking. This matter is becoming more and more a serious problem to churches which only a few years ago felt they would never have any need for off-street parking.

11. The practice of the realignment of charges so as to provide stronger leadership is to be commended and encouraged. This practice has taken the form of attaching two churches, formerly stations, together thus forming a new and strong charge; attaching a weaker to a stronger church; placing additional churches upon circuits, etc. The ministers of the Conference are thereby provided more adequate salaries. The practice has been carried on without leaving ministers without churches and should continue thus.

12. Inasmuch as these are critical years just before a second period of church expansion comes when the so-called "war babies" reach marriage age during the mid sixties, it is urged that the Conference Board of Missions hasten as rapidly as possible to bring to self-support all churches now in process of development, to strengthen weak churches, and in every possible way move to be in a position of strength as rapidly as possible. It is hoped that the conference will realize the importance of being prepared and provide increased support to the Board so that the demands of the second expansion period will not find the Board and Conference unprepared.

New Churches:

Wilmington District:

The purchase of a site for a new church in the area of the John Dickinson High School should be made as soon as possible.

While the recommendation is for only one new site at this time it should be noted that there may be need for more new congregations before the end of the quadrennium. New developments are springing up in many areas. These should be watched carefully and provision made to secure a new site

when purchase can be made in acres rather than waiting until it must be done in lots.

It would seem that the expansion of new church units in the Wilmington District has made contact with the first ring of churches which formerly were located in the towns and villages surrounding the city, but which are now included in the metropolitan area. After a brief period it will be necessary to build new congregations and church buildings beyond this first ring of churches. In the meantime, the district has a short time for consolidation and strengthening its churches. This is especially desirable for those churches located in areas of transition within the city.

Strengthening the District Missionary Society:

The District Missionary Society now has the opportunity to become a strong and vital force. It is especially desirable that it strengthen its position so it can play a leading role in the next period of expansion, which will be much more demanding than any yet seen. The few years—four to six—are desperately needed for long-time planning and strengthening.

Easton District:

Kent Island—as rapidly as possible a building program should come into reality on the excellent new site. The Conference Board will be alert to the needs here.

Centreville—should be commended upon the merger achieved and the new site purchased. They should be encouraged to move ahead just as rapidly as possible.

Dover and Salisbury Districts:

Churching Resort Areas: It is believed that the Conference Board of Missions, in cooperation with the two District Superintendents, should develop a plan for the strategic location of churches and/or summer chapels for the resort area from Rehoboth Beach to Ocean City. In the event a bridge is built to Assateague Island, the Island should be surveyed and, if needed, a site or sites be secured.

It was reported that a retired member of the New York Conference has offered a site in Fenwick Island. It was also reported that a realtor from Salisbury is ready to provide a site between Ocean City and Fenwick Island. If these two sites are strategically located, plans should be made to meet the needs of the area. It would seem that the South Bethany situation is developing with sufficient rapidity that an alert is in order.

Attention should be directed to the need for off-street parking. Consequently, sites should be secured as soon as possible after plans have been developed for churching the entire area located within both the Dover and Salisbury Districts.

City of Salisbury:

The progress in the redeployment of our churches in the city of Salisbury is commendable. Asbury's recent unanimous vote to sign a building contract for \$1,150,000 signals a major achievement. The willingness of Asbury to relocate from a site which it has occupied since 1778 in order to better serve the city and Methodism is commendable.

It is also believed that a second church should relocate from the central city and occupy the new 15 acre site purchased by the Conference Board of

Missions in East Salisbury. Thus, the churches of Methodism would be strategically deployed throughout the city.

It is suggested that for the Conference year 1960-61 the strategy be to explore further the situation. During this time a religious census of the East Salisbury area should be made and plans be made to provide a minister by the 1961 Annual Conference, provided in the meantime that both of the central city churches have decided against relocation.

Since Salisbury has a growing fringe and is the largest city on the Maryland Eastern Shore, it is recommended that an evaluation of the size and location of the sites now occupied by the periphery churches be studied and made a part of the long-time plans for Methodism in Salisbury and surrounding area. In those situations where sites are small, adjacent land should be secured in preparation for an increase in population and membership. The present membership of these churches should not only be prepared with physical facilities but also psychologically to meet the spiritual needs of the newcomers in their communities.

This report was unanimously adopted by our Board of Missions with the recommendation that it be presented to the Annual Conference for adoption.

IV. Recommendations

1. That the month of January be designated as Missionary Cultivation Month.
2. That the Rev. Ira E. Doyle be appointed Conference Missionary Secretary.
3. That the recommendation of the Survey Report printed above be adopted.

V. Conclusion

For the past eight years I have had the privilege of serving on the Board of Missions, and I want to publicly state my gratitude for this opportunity of service. Looking back across two Quadrenniums one sees a great many accomplishments which have advanced the Kingdom of God and for which we praise God with humble hearts. For seven years of this period, this Board's very able president was the Rev. R. Jervis Cooke whose excellent leadership I would like to acknowledge here. I would also like to pay tribute to the fine cooperation of all with whom I have had the privilege of working during these years. As we come now to the beginning of a new quadrennium, however, it cannot be to rest from our labors. For as the new Board of Missions lifts its eyes to the harvest fields of this Peninsula and of the world, it will find new fields ripe unto the harvest challenging the church to greater efforts than ever to preach the gospel and extend the Kingdom of God throughout the earth. May the concern of our Lord's be ours as we hear Him say to us: "The harvest truly is plenteous, but the laborers are few; pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest that he will send forth laborers into his harvest."

THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

In behalf of the Conference Board of Pensions, charged with the responsibility of administering the funds of the Board, and distributing the income from investments and from apportionments, it is my privilege to bring to you our report for the year and to make recommendations for your action.

Not only does the Board take care of its month by month responsibilities in seeing that pensions are paid, but expends a great deal of time and effort in planning wise investment of funds, in carefully considering matters of records of our ministers, and in looking into the future as to the direction of the Pension Program. In the investment of funds we have had the professional guidance of our Investment Counselor, Lionel D. Edie Company, and the competent administration of our Investment Committee. Our Secretary has done much research in compiling records of individual ministers, so as to assure full credit for service to each conference claimant.

Dr. Charles L. Calkins, Executive Secretary of the General Board of Pensions, met with your Board in February to discuss the total pension program of the Methodist Church. Dr. Calkins outlined the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund Program and the provisions being made by the General Church for long-range pension coverage of ministers. Your Board has noted the fact that the 1960 General Conference has authorized the General Board of Pensions to establish and administer a Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program for ministers and lay employees of the Methodist Church. Your Board has recognized the necessity of projecting our thinking into the future as we discharge our responsibilities of the present.

Your Board has been concerned always with building up our endowment fund, which grows thru bequests and thru the percentage assessment on our ministers. It is necessary that we remind our ministers, year by year, of their obligation to pay their assessments promptly for their own protection and for the protection of our Endowment Fund. To accomplish this end, your Board is recommending herewith that the annual interest rate of 4% be charged on all unpaid minister's assessments beginning May 1, 1961. We feel that such procedure will be good business and in the best interest of our endowment funds. (see par. 1610, sec. 4 of the 1956 Discipline as to authority for this recommendation).

Our second recommendation concerns the ministers under special appointment to an institution, organization or agency. In accordance with Par. 1623.7a, we recommend that those agencies be assessed in the amount of 12 times the annuity rate for the ensuing conference year, which amount be paid to the Conference Board of Pensions.

Our 3rd recommendation is that the last Sunday in January be observed in every church in honor of our retired ministers, in accordance with par. 1610.6 of the 1956 Discipline.

Our Board has shared the findings of the Joint Committee to define full time and part time approved supply service and we accept gratefully the report which more clearly defines these categories.

We have been pleased to report to you year after year since unification an increase in annuity rate to our retired ministers and widows. This year

it is our recommendation that the annuity rate be increased from \$58. to \$63.

We can report that final settlement of the Edgar L. Haynes Estate Bequest, except for a possible minor item, was completed during the past year. The amount received from this bequest has totalled \$531,537.99.

On Thursday evening the Board was privileged to have as guests at dinner the retiring and retired ministers, wives and widows. This small token of recognition of our retired ministers, wives and widows has become a time of fellowship which means much to the total Annual Conference program.

As the outgoing chairman of your Board, I want to thank you for your excellent cooperation and for the privilege of serving on the Board for the past eight years.

REPORT OF BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS PENINSULA CONFERENCE

1960

It is the first duty of the Church to win souls to Christ. Your Board of Social and Economic Relations recognizes this, but we want it understood that our purpose is to carry out the social implications of the teachings of Our Lord as He has directed us to do.

The past year has been a fruitful one in many ways from the standpoint of the General Board, the Conference Board, and the Local Commissions. In number of Commissions elected there is great encouragement.

Many of these Commissions have given the program real study and have developed activities to bring before the people. We wish to acknowledge the effort of Dr. Green in promoting Commissions in nearly 100% of the churches of the Easton District. Our Board sponsored a meeting in Easton to which all Commission Chairmen and ministers were invited. It was well attended, and the function of the Commission was outlined.

During the year our Conference was represented at the First National Conference on Human Relations in Dallas, Texas, and the Northeastern Briefing Conference at Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania. These sessions were most stimulating, and greater attendance should be encouraged in the future.

The Interboard Commission of Christian Social Relations will meet in Washington, D. C., January 31 to February 3, 1961. The Planning Committee, headed by Bishop John Wesley Lord, hopes to have ten representatives from each Conference Board. We trust this will be carried out by the Peninsula Conference.

In September, 1959, your Board was privileged to provide the evening program at the Laymen's Retreat at Camp PeCoMeth. There was a large attendance and a most attentive audience.

The 1959 Annual Conference combined the Legislative Committee with this Board. The Maryland Legislature is not in session. In Delaware, under the leadership of Richard C. Stazesky, a very able committee has been set up. At least one of our ministers visits the Legislature each week and other persons are on call.

Legislation has been broken down into seven categories with a man assigned to watch each of these categories. It is our purpose to be a positive force in the legislation field and to work for desirable laws, not to restrict our influence to opposition to undesirable laws.

We must concern ourselves as Christians in the affairs of our State and Nation. In these days of rapid scientific development, godless political ideology, and demand for physical comfort we must keep pace with moral and spiritual development, or our world will be lost.

This year we elect a new President of the United States. Christians should be greatly concerned in this election. A religious question has been raised, and we should consider it carefully and calmly. Roman Catholic theologians agree that it would be a sin for a Roman Catholic voter to vote for a Roman Catholic for President simply because he is a Roman Catholic. Protestant theologians agree that it would be a sin for a Protestant to vote against a Roman Catholic for President simply because he is a Roman Catholic.

The Rt. Rev. James A. Pike, Protestant Episcopal Bishop of California, has provided sound leadership for all non-Roman Catholics: "The question is not whether a Roman Catholic should be president, but which Roman Catholic. The issue is not primarily how others interpret the authority and mission of the Roman Catholic Church, but how the Roman Catholic candidate himself interprets that authority and mission." As the Minneapolis Presbytery of the United Presbyterian Church has expressed its "concern" over the possibility that religion "may be used to dominate and confuse . . . fair discussion . . . in the coming national election . . . In our free society, a man's religious affiliation should not automatically commend or condemn him to the intelligent voter . . . His personal integrity and views on real concrete issues should be the voter's guide for decision."

We suggest the reading of the Abingdon prize-winning book, **The Riddle of Roman Catholicism**, by Jaroslav Pelikan, an important background for an understanding of the Roman Catholic Church.

It should be understood, of course, that each candidate for high national office should be open to questions as to particular issues, e.g., birth control, censorship, Franco Spain, a United States ambassador to the Vatican, federal aid to parochial schools, etc.

It is generally recognized that the greatest social problem facing our nation is that of race relations. The future inner stability of the nation and its place as a world leader depend in large measure upon our successfully solving this grave problem. The Christian faith has the only answer to this problem; we are to live together in love and peace, regardless of race or color, because we recognize that we are all children of the one Father who loves us all alike. We are one in Him and we call upon our churches to witness to this oneness which we already have in God. To this end we encourage the holding of interracial meetings in our churches, the organizing of interracial training schools on church concerns, and the forming of interracial associations of churches which share similar problems and are located in the same areas. We also look forward to the time when all our churches that are located in interracial communities will be interracial in their memberships, and we are happy that some of our churches are now moving in that direction. It is intolerable to think that the church can much longer be split apart by distinctions made on the basis of race or color. To this end, the Board stands opposed to any system in our church, including the jurisdictional system, which is based upon racial considerations.

This is the last year as Board members for most of the Board. We wish to express our appreciation for this opportunity to serve, and to wish our successors inspiration to carry out the important work before them.

We urge the Conference to give serious thought to appointing a full time director for the Board. After the General Conference we anticipate a merger of this Board with the Board of Peace and the Board of Temperance. If this action is taken, it would seem necessary that a director be appointed, with an office and secretarial help to direct the work. This will entail substantial cost that must be borne by the Conference. We are sure this will be gladly supported.

**THE REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE TO
THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE**

Following the last session of the Peninsula Annual Conference two resignations were sent in to the Chairman of the Board, Mr. Milton Pope. The Rev. Otis P. Jefferson felt compelled to resign as the Conference Director and Mr. Walter Palmer submitted his resignation as Easton District Director and Treasurer of the Board. Reluctantly the Board accepted these resignations and in their September meeting on September 30, 1959, the Rev. H. N. Nicklas was elected to be the new Treasurer, Mr. Granville Hooper was elected to be the Easton District Director and the Rev. J. Thomas Churn was elected to be the Conference Director.

In presenting this, my first report to the Annual Conference as your Conference Director, I would like to preface my remarks with a word concerning the approach we make as a Board to the temperance issues of alcohol, narcotics, tobacco, gambling, and pornographic literature. We are having to recognize that we are faced with the need for a twofold approach to our task: 1) to overcome an approach to these concerns that has displayed more zeal and emotion than knowledge, that has been largely negative and judgmental in character, and 2) to offer effective leadership to our Churches by an approach that is positive, enlightened, and in accord with the historic position of American Methodism on these issues. In the past we have sometimes alienated some of the persons and forces at work on the problem of beverage alcohol because they were not able to come to a position of total abstinence. Your present Director believes that it is not necessary to alienate those who are equally concerned with control and rehabilitation as we, but who are not prepared to take the position of total abstinence, that we can and should work with any and all who are working to find solution to this #3 health problem of our society. This does **not** mean that we will compromise our own position but it does ask us to allow each person or group to arrive at their own conclusions without undue pressure or censure. It is for us to keep the lines of communication and cooperation open wherever possible and to offer our service to all who need the help we can give.

Having said this, let us turn to a brief account of the activity of your Board during the past year. Mr. Hooper and I attended the Northeastern Regional Briefing Conference held October 27-29, 1959 at the Inn, Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania. With the valuable information and inspiration of the Conference, plans were developed for what program we have tried to carry out this year. A number of film strips were purchased by the Board and a letter was sent to each Pastor and Lay Leader, telling them of the services we were in position to offer and asking them to make use of these services as it would be most helpful in the local Church. Our District Directors and I offered our services to be speakers in a local Church on the temperance issues to bring these concerns before our people. Only one request came to my desk. I received some valuable suggestions from my District Superintendent, the Rev. Roy L. Tawes, and in putting one into action I visited each of the District Preacher's Meetings in turn and was given the privilege of making a brief presentation on behalf of the Board to those who were present. This suggestion will be continued in the coming year. There

have been seven requests to show the film, FAR FROM ALONE, for which we have requested an offering. Only one such offering has been sent in to date. Just recently the Board has purchased two films to add to our audio-visual library, STOP DRIVING US CRAZY, and, WHAT YOU OUGHT TO WANT, a film which features our own Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam. We hope that our Churches will make use of these films especially in our youth groups.

As we turn to plan for the year ahead we are faced with the uncertainty at this writing about what action the General Conference will take concerning the relation of the Board of Temperance to the Board of Social and Economic Relations, and the Board of World Peace. A number of persons will be leaving the Board this year and other persons will be nominated to take their places. Our plans have been made in the light of these facts and the activities set forth will not need to be changed very much in any event. Our plans for the coming year include the following things:

1) We call the attention of the members of the Conference to the Northeast Adult School of Alcohol Studies to be held July 11-15, 1960 at Boston University. The School is planned for pastors and leaders in the local Church. We recommend this School to our Churches for their consideration and urge that interested persons register and attend.

2) We heartily commend the Board of Missions and the Woman's Society of Christian Service in their planning as a course for Church-wide study a unit on the world alcohol problem. We hope that each of our churches and societies will include this unit as a part of their program for this year and we offer our help and resources to make your study more meaningful.

3) We would like to set up seminars on a district or sub-district level, if possible in conjunction with the Board of Social and Economic Relations, so that our Pastors and people can have the opportunity to become better acquainted with these issues that concern us all.

4) We recommend that our Pastors and laymen take the opportunity to become acquainted with the work being done by Alcoholics Anonymous in helping people on the road to recovery from alcoholism. They are doing the most significant piece of work in this area that is being done today, using methods as old as Christianity itself. They welcome the sincere interest of any one who is interested in their efforts and they are deserving of any assistance we can give them. A number of the members of A. A. are also members of our Churches.

5) We plan to add to our library of film strips and films as the money is available for their purchase. To make the film strips more accessible to the Churches and to encourage wider use of them we are planning to place them in the hands of the District Directors. We ask two things of our Pastors and Churches: 1) these resources are made available for you to use and unless you can and do use them their purchase is an unjustified expenditure of funds, and 2) please send the offering that is asked in connection with their use. This will help us keep our library in good shape and enable us to add to it from time to time without having to approach the Conference for additional funds.

6) We want to encourage the continued observance of Commitment Day in our Churches as a time of personal challenge and decision. The General

Board makes available materials for your use. We urge our Pastors to make use of the materials which will help them make most meaningful the observance of this day. It would be of help to know just how many of our Churches are observing this day and with what result.

7) We call to the attention of the Pastors and laymen of Maryland that in your state a Speaker's Bureau has recently been formed to provide persons who are willing to speak at meetings on problems relating to alcoholism. Contact with the Bureau can be made by writing or calling Dr. Caroline A. Chandler, Maryland State Department of Health, State Office Building, 301 Preston Street, Baltimore 1, Maryland.

8) Our District Directors and I again offer our services in presenting to your people the causes of temperance. This will have to be arranged with the person you desire as far as time and place goes.

One final word, as one who is new in this area of work, I have deeply appreciated the help and patient understanding I have received from the members of the Board, the kindness afforded me in the District Preacher's Meetings, and the help of my District Superintendent, the Rev. Roy L. Tawes. As a Board, we exist to be of service to the Pastors and the Churches, and to provide leadership in these areas of our common concern. We are dependent largely upon the Pastors of our Churches to encourage the use of the resources of the Board and to cooperate in the program we try to plan and carry out. Our people need to be kept informed on these matters as well as many of the other issues of our day. Admittedly it is not an easy task. As Christians living in a free society, we have the right to know the facts and to be challenged to live for Christ in the light of these facts, as God gives us wisdom to see the right.

THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

The Town and Country Commission seeks to be informed in the area of its responsibility and usefulness to the work of the conference.

The Commission participated in an inter-denominational Town and Country Church Conference held at the University of Maryland, College Park, Maryland, July 6-8, 1959.

Eight persons were registered as delegates and participated in the work of the quadrennial National Methodist Town and Country Conference held in Wichita, Kansas, July 21-24, 1959. On each of the four days, a major topic was presented to the assembly of 1100 delegates and was the basis of discussion for the remainder of the day. The discussion groups numbered about 15 persons each. Preparation for the conference included study of the source book, *EMERGING PATTERNS IN TOWN AND COUNTRY METHODISM*.

Members of the Commission and those in attendance at these conferences have been available as resource persons for interested groups in local churches.

Interest in the rural church has been lifted up this year in the study course, "The Church's Mission in Town and Country," and in the program of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

The Commission has purchased a print of the Methodist rural film, *NONE GOES HIS WAY ALONE*, which is being circulated as a part of the film library of the Conference Board of Missions. This film is recommended for wide use.

The fact that Methodism in the Peninsula Conference is predominantly in the category of town and country challenges the Commission to face itself to thoughtful study and creative leadership.

The Town and Country Commission recommends the appointment of Willard Robinson, Jr., as the Secretary of Town and Country Work for the coming year.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF THE CONFERENCE

The duties of the Board of Trustees are many and varied, ranging from the upkeep of cemetery lots to the administering of large bequests. Your board has worked faithfully to perform these duties, and we trust the following report will prove the worthwhileness of our effort.

Scattered over the countryside of our conference are many small Churches, closed or abandoned over the years. Many of these buildings have been neglected for so long a period of time they are in a sad state of repair and are an eyesore to those who live in these communities. Your board, the past year, has spent considerable effort trying to dispose of these properties. As a result of this effort, Green Hill and Ironshire Churches on the Salisbury District, and Lebanon Church on the Dover District have been sold. The proceeds from sale of Ironshire Church were given to Bowen Church at Newark, Maryland, and the proceeds from sale of Lebanon Church were given to Whatcoat Church, Camden, Delaware.

The community houses at Choptank and Bethlehem were offered to a representative community group for their use as a community center.

Negotiations are now under way for the sale of Nichols Church near Federalsburg, Maryland.

The Scott Memorial Scholarship Trust Fund has now been established and is being administered by the Superintendent of the Wilmington District.

To aid in the many problems arising from the closing of Churches, the Board has engaged an attorney on each district to act as an advisory counsel to the superintendent of that district. Mr. John Clarence North will represent the Easton District, Mr. Hamilton P. Fox, Jr. the Salisbury District, and Mr. Thomas Lodge the Wilmington District. The selection of an attorney for the Dover District was deferred until a later date.

The disposition of the income of the Poole Estate last year was as follows:—\$1,000 to Dames Quarter, \$500 to Houston, and \$500 to Rehoboth Beach. Applications for this year's income will be considered at the Annual Meeting on May 18th.

Recently the Board received a bequest from Mrs. Charlotte Jones Caswell of Middletown, Delaware. When this bequest has been liquidated the proceeds will be given to the Methodist Country House to be used to provide a room or rooms for retired Methodist ministers and/or their wives or widows.

The untimely and unexpected death of our treasurer, Rev. Richard M. Green, was a shock to the members of the board. We pay tribute to the many years of faithful service performed by Rev. Green on behalf of this board and as a minister of the Peninsula Annual Conference. Rev. Edwin Horney of Hurlock, Maryland has been elected as treasurer for the remainder of the conference year.

The ownership of the property known as Grace Methodist Church, Milton, Delaware, is still in contest. Your board has engaged the services of Mr. Robert Tunnell, attorney of Georgetown, Delaware, and the case is now in the hands of the court.

In closing, your board will continue to work with all diligence to dispose of all properties committed to its care and not used as places of worship for Methodist people. It will also guard jealously the trusts that have been placed in its hands, spending the income judiciously and in a manner that will serve the kingdom of God.

WESLEY COLLEGE REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE

May 18, 1960

Elton Trueblood, in his volume, "The Idea Of A College," has said that the purpose of the Christian college, "is that of maintaining the Christian college as one which seeks to demonstrate excellence in the sciences and in other major studies, striving to influence positively the course of contemporary civilization, not in separation from its religious roots but in an ever closer connection with them. Many now believe this to be our highest ideal, something far superior to an institution which is so secular that it has no positive unifying philosophy and equally superior to one which serves only the purposes of a religious group, without adequate reference to the needs of the world." That we are pursuing such a task may be evidenced in the concern given to expansion of the college on many fronts.

Of course attention is given to the academic standards and the securing of a person full-time in the position of dean indicates the seriousness with which we approach this phase of the college. The diligent pursuit of the recommendations of the faculty and the Middle States Association is another evidence. The raising of the admission standards at a time when we could receive many more students is another. At this time President Slaybaugh reports we have exactly 50 per cent more applications for the fall term than we did a year ago. The limited facilities and the selective process in accepting applications will allow a resident student body of only 300.

Before discussing the development program, I should like to include the report of the development fund:

At 3.30 p. m. on June 4, there will be an open house and dedication of the two dormitories. This is one tangible result of the program. However, we are faced with a serious problem in the immediate future. We now have housing facilities for more students; however, we do not have sufficient dining room space or equipment to feed them. A new dining hall and kitchen must be erected as was envisioned in our over-all campus plan. We are without the services of a gymnasium, and although temporary arrangements have been used this past year and must be again this next academic year, these arrangements are surely nothing more than temporary. We have been waiting for action by the Congress on the HHFA program

which would provide \$317,000 for our dining hall. Plans are further complicated by the fact that while payment on pledges by alumni and friends of the college has been at the rate of 84 per cent, payment by the churches of the Peninsula Conference has been only 68 per cent. This means to begin construction now, we will have to borrow against anticipated income. This, of course, is costly. Your immediate response to your commitment would provide an enormous boost to the development program. The cost of the gymnasium is estimated to be \$550,000; the dining hall and kitchen, \$375,000.

The support of Wesley College—financially, in interest, in suggesting students, and in many other ways, has been most gratifying. As we enter into a period with new leadership, we are certain that the goals set forth by our conference and by the college will be vigorously championed.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Bishop Oxnam, members of the Peninsula Conference and friends:

The month of May marks the end of another quadrennium. This year also marks the twentieth anniversary of our Woman's Society of Christian Service. During the past quadrennium, the theme, "The Spirit of Christ for All of Life" has echoed up and down this Peninsula Conference.

We are glad to report that progress has been made. There has been an enthusiasm and dedicated concern for the work shown by many, many of our women. We would pay tribute to each officer, secretary of line of work and Chairmen of Conference, District and Local Societies. Much credit for the success of our last year's work is due to the untiring efforts of the four District Presidents. Our gratitude also goes to Bishop Oxnam, the District Superintendents, the Ministers, and last but not least, the husbands of the Woman's Society members.

Our Woman's Society is built on a spiritual foundation which we have emphasized. In October, local societies all over the Conference observed, "The week of Prayer and Self-Denial." These meetings not only resulted in spiritual inspiration but in offerings amounting to \$3,800.19 to be used in the United States and Africa. There were Spiritual Days Apart in the four districts in addition to our Prayer Groups and our personal prayer lives.

In June, eight Conference Officers and Secretaries of lines of work, and the four District Presidents attended the Jurisdiction School of Missions at Pembroke College in Rhode Island. A knowledge of four study courses and information gained in clinics was passed on at our Conference School of Missions and Christian Service in July. At this school which was held at Wesley College, Dover, there were 83 full time registrations with 73 jurisdiction cards given, and there were 212 day visitors. The study courses offered were "Luke," "The Role of the United Nations in World Affairs," "Africa" and "The Church's Mission in Town and Country." Plans are

complete for our 1960 School of Missions which will be held at Wesley College, July 18-22.

As an outgrowth of the Conference School of Missions, the four Districts held successful Educational Seminars in September, reaching approximately 1,000 women. Following the Conference School of Missions and the District Seminars, 153 classes with 1,494 members enrolled, have been held in local churches.

The Girl's School of Missions was held at Pecometh June 21-26 with 110 girls enrolled. 29 of these girls indicated interest in full time Christian service and 23 girls graduated, having attended the School of Missions for three years. It is unfortunate that because of limited accommodations many girls, each year, have to be turned away. This school is one of the most effective ways of recruitment of Christian workers. The Secretaries of Missionary Personnel have tried to keep in touch with the girls who indicated interest in fulltime service. These girls have expressed the desire of becoming educational directors, nurses, deaconesses and missionaries.

The Conference Youth Secretary has shared valuable information that she gained at the National Convocation of Methodist Youth at Perdue, at the White House Conference on Children and Youth at Dover, and at the meeting of the Conference Youth Council in Dover, in every way possible where it could be of help to young people. She, with five other adults, accompanied 36 of our Conference youth to a two-day Seminar at the United Nations. She said in a recent report that "there was an increasing spiritual interest of our youth."

There is an increasing number of Secretaries of Children's Work each year and as a result, the work is becoming more meaningful to both children and their leaders. Because of additional sessions, children are becoming more mission minded. There are more councils of Children's Workers and more council meetings now than ever before.

In each District of our Conference there is a Wesley Foundation program on the campus. All districts have reported cooperation in every way possible with these Wesley Foundations. In June, Student Day was observed in 30 churches. Offerings, reported sent to the Board of Education, amounted to \$665. Newsletters, magazines, Motive, Power, World Outlook and Upper Room have been sent to students, service personnel, and employed young people of college age. Students are being entertained in homes and many of them participate in Woman's Society programs, causing the women to become aware of the work on the campus.

"There A Light Upon The Mountain," the theme of the program material, proved to be a challenge to our Woman's Society members as was shown by the increase of the use of our program material in local societies and Circle meetings. There are three ways of informing our women—program, study and literature; these ways are becoming more widely used each year. It is hoped that the Methodist Woman (our official magazine) and the World Outlook will be more widely circulated among our women during the coming years.

The Status of Women office, having gained clergy rights and other recognitions in the church for women, will be dropped as an office of the Woman's Society after May 31st, however, it will be indirectly integrated

in all lines of work of the Woman's Society. Our present secretary will continue on the executive committee as Membership Chairman.

We have had an increase in membership of 686 making a total of 23,224 members of local societies and Wesleyan Service Guilds as of February 1st. We regret to say that there are many women in our churches who are not Woman's Society or Guild members. We have 352 societies, including 18 district members and we have 13 unorganized churches. One of our aims for the next quadrennium is that every church will have an organized Society of at least 5 members. It was decided at the Woman's Division meeting in January that the "district member" continue to be cultivated by the District Secretary of Promotion, as the nucleus of a Society. At the end of the quadrennium, 1960-64, the church to which she belongs, however, will be considered organized only when a society of at least 5 members is formed.

Twelve Wesleyan Service Guild members, including the chairman, attended the 4th Annual Meeting of the Jurisdiction Wesleyan Service Guild at Buck Hill Falls in March. They received much information and inspiration while there and are making plans for increased interest in our Conference. They hope to reach employed women who are not being reached by the Woman's Society.

In our Christian Social Relations Department, there are more local societies using C. S. R. study books each year; more women attending the U. N. and becoming interested in its work; keener interest shown in legislature issues and definite progress in race relations. Our Conference Secretary attended the Seminar at Bennett College in Greensboro, North Carolina last July and as a result has given much help to our women. A Pilot Study across the country was made last fall to ascertain the effect of employed women on the church. It was found that there are more employed women today than ever before, however, there are as many unemployed women as employed.

Each year, the Recording Secretary of our Conference Woman's Society compiles and has published a year book of the Society. The Peninsula Conference Newspaper has a ten year record. This publication, which is a means for the promotion of our work, is interesting and means much to our women. A historian has been appointed to compile and have printed a history of our work since its organization in 1940. This historian, by the way, was a delegate to the White House Conference on Children and Youth in Washington, D. C.

Our projects, The Riddle Memorial Deaconess Home and the Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House in Wilmington, Delaware, serve 350 boys and girls with a nursery school and mother's club, 13 clubs for girls and 8 clubs for boys. Through this program, those in charge endeavor to provide wholesome leisure time activities and to teach basic Christian standards of life. Miss Genevieve Poppe, who has been the Deaconess-Director for 11 years, has been appointed by the Woman's Division to begin work in the Suzanna Wesley Community Center in Hawaii in June. A new director is coming to the homes in Wilmington. The members of the Board of Managers of these projects have a new center, where an adequate program can be conducted, in their thinking.

The total amount paid to the Woman's Division of Christian Service from April 30, 1959 to May 3, 1960 was \$70,985. On the basis of pledges made by local societies at the Spring District Meetings, our Conference Pledge to the missionary work of the Woman's Division for the coming year is \$54,000, an increase of \$3,000 over the past year. This figure is subject to an increase at the Annual Meeting May 24th, when the four districts will make their pledges for the year. Although \$51,000 was the amount pledged to Missions by the Conference Woman's Society for the year 1959-60, \$55,624.03 was the actual amount that was paid in missionary pledges for the year.

We have been supporting 4 missionaries, who are: Miss Lillian Montgomery, who has served 2 years in Seoul, Korea as the Woman's Division Treasurer, who is now on furlough and who will be at the School of Missions; Miss Maude Goff who is serving in Inhon, Korea; Miss Rosalie Jenkins, who was stationed in Brazil but who now has a leave of absence for study at the Boston University School of Theology; and Miss Eunice Sluyter who, while she is on furlough, is studying at the New York University. She will return to India in January 1961, where she will be the Director of Christian literature for the entire Methodist Church in all of Southern Asia. We are happy to announce that we recently accepted the support of Miss Barbara Reynolds, daughter of Reverend and Mrs. Paul E. Reynolds of St. Michaels, Maryland, who will be a missionary to Korea.

We are happy to report that Peninsula Conference Local Woman's Societies and Wesleyan Service Guilds are having a part in spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ, not only to far distant places, but in the United States. The Woman's Division supports 1,500 workers in home fields and between 400 and 500 foreign missionaries, and hundreds of nationals at work in 29 countries. This is the responsibility of the Woman's Division.

A majority of our members accept responsibility in the total program of the church and many assist with community activities. The following quotation is taken from a letter of Mr. "Bob" Mayfield, General Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities: "85% of the total amount of money given in 1958 in the Methodist Church was retained for use in the local church. This did not include Home Missions. 15% went outside the local church for all benevolent causes, both Annual Conference and general benevolences."

The Fall and Spring District Meetings were very successful. During the past year, the 4 districts held successful Officer's training sessions, reaching about 1,800 women. Dr. Clara Nutting, retired missionary from Umtali, Southern Rhodesia, Africa, will itinerate our 4 districts this fall, and Miss Louise Nichols, a promotion worker of the Woman's Division, will itinerate the districts in the spring of 1961.

Our Conference Annual Meeting of the Woman's Society will be held at Zion, Cambridge, May 24, at 10 o'clock A. M. Miss Dorothy McConnell, one of the editors of the World Outlook, and our own missionary, Miss Lillian Montgomery, will be the main speakers. The theme is, "With Thy Church Abide."

Our theme for the next quadrennium will be, "Our Mission Today." The emphasis will be: "The Faith That Compels Us," "Factors That Confront Us," "Frontiers That Call Us," and "The Program That Unites Us In Witness And Service."

Clouds seem to be hanging over our world today. Instead of tensions being eased and a better relationship existing following what was to have been a meeting of the four heads of government, conditions are more unsettled than ever. Although Christianity has been in the world for 2,000 years, only approximately $\frac{1}{3}$ of the people of the world are Christians. The Communists have won about $\frac{1}{3}$ of the world's population to their atheistic belief in the past 43 years. We know not what the future will hold but we do know that if we will become excited about our Christian work, place our hands in the hands of our Master and trust Him to guide us, the Kingdom of God is bound to advance to His Honor and Glory.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

The Commission on World Service and Finance wishes to commend the Churches, Lay-leadership, Ministers and District Superintendents, for making possible the splendid financial report you have just received.

We also wish to express our deep appreciation to Bishop Oxnam for his wise council and willingness to always be available for advice and guidance.

We recommend to the Conference the following report and attached budget for the next two years (1960-62) and request that the budget be printed in the 1960 Journal.

The apportionments will be based on the figures as reported to this Conference, by Statistician and Treasurer, and will remain the same for two years.

Our benevolent dollar shall be divided as follows:

65% for Annual Conference Benevolence
35% for World Service

If any surplus is realized, the balance due Peninsula Conference shall be given to the Conference Board of Missions for Church extension. If the entire amount is not realized, then each Conference Board shall take its percentage of the loss, however Group Life and Hospitalization shall have prior claim to Conference Benevolence monies.

The following must be paid on Current Cash Salary; if salary is changed, these must be adjusted currently:

Episcopal Fund, Dist. Supt. Fund, Board of Pensions, Minimum Salary

The basis for apportionments to the local charges for General and Conference Administration expenses and for World Service and Conference Benevolence, shall be as follows:

- 2.12 $\frac{1}{3}$ —Based on Membership of each Charge;
.058 $\frac{1}{3}$ —based on total giving of each Charge; less amounts paid on debts, building & improvements and World Service and Conference Benevolences (e.i. Col. 75 minus Cols. 42, 43 and 56c)
.767 $\frac{1}{3}$ —Based on the amount paid for World Service and Conference Benevolence.

That the Salary of the District Superintendents shall be the average of the highest ten Pastors salaries of Peninsula Conference.

That \$20,000 from the Minimum Salary Fund, be transferred to the Contingent Fund.

For the office of Treasurer for the next quadrennium, we nominate John Kelso.

The 1957 session of the Peninsula Conference voted to accept an obligation to raise \$750,000 for a Capital Improvement Fund for Wesley College.

The decision was made that this amount be paid over a five year period and apportioned to the churches as an asking.

Many of our churches have been paying their asking in full each year. Others have been making some effort to raise their share. However, there are several churches that are making no attempt to pay. This is creating a serious problem and the Commission has discussed the advisability of making this item a part of our Benevolence budget unless a better effort is made this year to raise the entire asking.

This Conference has an obligation to pay the \$750,000 in full and must keep it in the budget until it has been completed. Such a situation is unfair to those churches who have met their obligation in full each year, many of them small churches with little income. Those that have not paid have a very definite obligation which they cannot shirk. This group of churches have a shortage in two years of \$94,240 which they should make an effort to raise immediately. The Commission feels that this Conference expects every minister and layman to push this project to a successful conclusion.

The 1957 Session of The Peninsula Conference authorized the building of a new District Parsonage, at Salisbury, Maryland.

To complete settlement, it was necessary for us to borrow \$20,000 and the going rate was $5\frac{1}{2}\%$. We had on deposit with the Wilmington Savings Fund \$20,000 at 3% interest, in the Minimum Salary Fund. We, therefore, borrowed this money, which has not been paid back. This is the \$20,000 we are requesting be transferred to the Contingent Fund.

MEMOIRS

CHARLES HARRY DOBSON

The Reverend Charles Harry Dobson was born in St. Michaels, Maryland on September 13, 1877, the son of John N. and Mary Scotton Dobson. He attended the public school in Talbot County.

Feeling the call of the ministry and this constant tug in his heart to serve the Lord, he entered Westminster Theological Seminary at the age of forty-one and graduated with the S.T.B. degree.

In 1921 he assumed his first charge at Bivalve, Md. Thence he moved to Deer Park, then Uniontown and on to Burgess Store. From Burgess Store he continued in his service to Popular Springs and then to Federalsburg. Leaving Federalsburg, Brother Dobson's next charge was Greenbush, Virginia and later Fox Hall, Virginia. After serving in Fox Hill, he was assigned to Vienna, Maryland and from there he moved to the historical Harper's Ferry in West Virginia. His last charge was Mariners in Crisfield, Maryland.

Due to ill health, he had to seek a disability retirement in 1932. Since 1936, Brother Dobson and his gracious wife lived in Federalsburg until his death.

I never visited them that they did not have a cheery word to speak and lift my spirits. Their faith and trust in the Lord and His providence was exemplar for all Christians. As I held his hand in mine and prayed while he lay in an oxygen tent, he made the remark, "Don, I'm ready to go home anytime my Saviour calls." He hesitated and then concluded, "I've been ready a long time." What a spirit of faith and trust he had.

His home church all the while he was in Federalsburg was Union, and he and Mrs. Dobson were always present for morning worship when he was physically able.

Brother Dobson is survived by his wife, Mary Elizabeth, who now resides at Accomac, Virginia and five sons: W. E. Dobson of Federalsburg; Emory Dobson of Denton; T. A. Dobson of Accomac, Va.; H. A. Dobson and C. R. Dobson of Westminster.

During his illness his family surrounded him with tender loving care until his death in Easton Memorial Hospital on his birthday, September 13, 1959 at the age of 82.

The Reverend J. M. John, minister of Onley Methodist Church, Onley, Virginia conducted the funeral service in Federalsburg, Maryland. Interment was in Oxford Cemetery, Oxford, Maryland.

It seems fitting to quote the following poem "Rest" by a anonymous author, for it breathes an assurance to all who trust Him Who knows us each by name.

"Rest"

REST? It is simply trust in Him

 Leaving tomorrow in His hands, and

RICHARD M. GREEN

The Reverend Richard M. Green, son of William T. and Susie R. Green, was born December 8, 1904, near Milton, Delaware.

His early life was spent serving as a clerk in a department store in his community where he was active in the church. Soon he came under the conviction that God wanted him in the Christian Ministry. Thus he gave up his store responsibilities and enrolled in the school at Dover. He received his A. B. degree from the University of Delaware in 1935 and later received the B.D. degree from Drew University in 1938.

In 1932, he was married to Louisa Husbands of Wilmington, Delaware who so graciously helped to fill their home with charm and understanding.

Mr. Green served charges at Zoar, Christiana, and Hockessin. In 1942, he was enlisted to revive the work of Christian Education in the Conference and for a decade guided us with marked progress in this field. In 1952 he was assigned to the Newport charge from which he retired in 1959.

He was a member of the General Conference of the Methodist Church in 1948 and in 1952. He also held several positions of leadership in the Jurisdictional Educational Program.

Serving the church for only 27 years, he left his mark upon the whole of Methodism. He was a man of contagious spirit, eager and alert, quick

to see opportunities for service and to meet their challenge. Wherever he went, whatever he did, the result of his presence was constructive. In classic language, he was a builder of the Kingdom of God on this earth.

He was always full of humor, a man of ready repartee, and intensely human. Why shouldn't he be? He was a man who knew how to toil with his hands. He knew how to work hard for an education. He had what we need so much in our world today, the inspiration to be a leader, so with hard work and much sacrifice he became one.

On Tuesday, March 1, 1960, after a few months of illness, he was stricken at his home with a severe heart attack which proved fatal. Funeral services were held from the Peniel Methodist Church, Newport, Delaware, edifice to his memory, and conducted by The Reverend Harold M. Davis, minister of the Elkton Methodist Church and The Reverend R. Jervis Cooke, Superintendent of the Wilmington District.

We have known Richard Green in the flesh. From now on we are to know him in the spirit and to know him in the spirit just as really as we have known him in the flesh.

Richard M. Green is still and will continue to be one of the ministers of the Methodist Church, though no longer visible to us. The fellowship we have had with him will remain unbroken. We will tarry here on earth until the Lord calls us, but he is free in the presence of his Lord.

WALTER EDWIN GUNBY

Walter Edwin Gunby, son of Jacob M. and Lovey J. West Gunby, was born November 3, 1878 in Sussex County, Delaware; and died April 20, 1960 at his home in Cambridge, Md. Following his graduation from Buckingham High School, he entered Washington College, Chestertown, Md., where he graduated in 1914; receiving a bachelor of arts degree. In 1923 his alma mater conferred on him the the Doctor of Divinity degree. In 1927 he was graduated from the Dickinson College School of Religious Education at Carlisle, Pa. In 1901 he was married to Miss Alberta B. Brittingham of Berlin, Md., and to this union were born two sons, who survive him. These are Olin B. Gunby, an electrical engineer of Los Angeles, California, and Walter E. Gunby, Jr., a medical doctor, of Cambridge, Maryland.

For a short time Dr. Gunby was engaged in the field of public school work, but was soon called to the Christian ministry and joined the Wilmington Conference. He was ordained a deacon in 1905 and an elder in 1907. He served the following churches: Queenstown, Md.; Odessa, Del.; Princess Anne, Md.; Easton, Md.; Dover, Del.; Cambridge, Md.; and Newark, Del. Twice he was appointed to the office of District Superintendent, serving the Dover and Wilmington districts. On two occasions he was elected as delegate to the General Conference, and served as Chaplain of the Senate of Delaware. After his retirement in 1944 Dr. and Mrs. Gunby took up residence in Cambridge where they were honored members of the com-

munity and faithful members of Zion Church. Mrs. Gunby preceded him in death in 1957.

The life of Dr. Gunby speaks clearer than any words that might be written. He was blessed with a remarkable mind and was familiar with the deeper things of philosophy and theology. I have been privileged to know him intimately over the years and have always admired his decision of character. In the pulpit he was an outstanding messenger of the Gospel of Christ. He was also a superb pastor. He gave himself to others so freely that their joys were doubled and their sorrows were lessened. He was a friend to many of us, even closer than a brother. We are the better for having had this noble Christian man among us.

LEOLAN JACKSON

Leolan Jackson was "God's gentleman" in every sense of the word. For many years, his lofty living was a continuous illustration of the varied ways in which our Master can make so very much out of a dedicated life.

He was born on May 27, 1874, in Oera Coke, North Carolina. He worked his way through Grant University, now The University of Chattanooga, Chattanooga, Tennessee; from which school he received the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1925. He united with the Atlantic Mission Conference in 1896, subsequently became a member of the Holston Conference, and very early in his ministry, was transferred to the Wilmington Conference. He answered the annual roll call of his conferences for forty-two consecutive years.

Elizabeth Nelson of Gloucester, North Carolina, became the bride of Leolan Jackson on July 16, 1896. For sixty-two years, they were so busy at the fascinating activities of their profession that they quite overlooked any hardships incident to its pursuit. The Methodist itinerancy gave them the kind of life work in which they "daily had the time of their lives." The result was the raising up of a family a rich pleasure to know and countless numbers of friends and parishioners who call them blessed. Mrs. Jackson survives her husband. Their living children are: John H. Jackson of Baltimore, Mrs. Leona Flanigan of Beach Haven, Md., Mrs. Nellie Dean of Ridgely, Md., and Mrs. Marguerite Gillis of Beach Haven, Md. Oletha and Raymond died in childhood.

Leolan Jackson lived well within the grander traditions of the Christian ministry. His study held the best books of the present and the past. Although a man of contemplation, he knew and loved people, making friends in such a way that they would not let him go, not permitting the passing of the years to weaken this close relationship.

His courtesousness and understanding endeared him to all who knew him well and his lack of interest in preferment and power for himself was a benediction to observe. Yet, he was among the first to express joy over the promotions other men got. His commitment to the unostentatious way of living was a useful hint to some of his younger ministerial friends, of whom he always had many. In him, for fifty-two years and more, we saw walking among us, the loveliness of the meek and the strength of the meek.

Beckwith, Wyoming, Crapo, Magnolia, Princess Anne, Tilghman, Sudlersville, Ridgely, Madely, Wilmington, Kent Island and St. Michaels were enriched by the ministry of Leolan Jackson. His scholarship and preaching glowed with the regal quality of his inner life. As God's spokesman, he talked as one having authority, unpretentious scholarship and valid spiritual strength uniting to reveal God's true prophet.

He slipped home to Heaven, "his native place" on June 8, 1959. Funeral services were conducted in the Ridgely Methodist Church by the Reverend Vincent D. Shufelt, assisted by Reverend John E. French, Reverend J. Leas Green and Reverend J. Robert Mackey. Interment was at St. Michaels, Maryland. I should like to conclude this memoir by quoting what a great English author once said of a loved one: "here was a man who was religious with the consent of his entire personality."

C. NADAL JONES

The Reverend C. Nadal Jones was born in Fairlee, Maryland, January 31, 1873, and departed this life August 13, 1959. His father, the Reverend Adam C. Jones, a member of what is now the Peninsula Conference, gave three sons to serve as ministers and members of the Peninsula Conference, C. Nadal, John W., and Omar E. Jones all of whom have served in wide areas of the Conference.

C. Nadal Jones was educated at the old Wilmington Conference Academy, Dover, Delaware and graduated with diploma in 1903 from Drew Theological Seminary, Madison, New Jersey. Brother Jones retired in 1942, after serving 42 years in many outstanding churches in Delaware and the Eastern Shore of Maryland. A detailed list of his appointments is contained in the Conference Minutes but his work as a minister is written indelibly in the lives of countless people, young and old, during his long career. Bare statistics can never convey the story and record in the Lambs Book of Life. Brother Jones was a consecrated servant of the Lord and His Church. Mr. Jones during 1933-34 served as Chaplain in the Senate of the Delaware General Assembly.

On June 28, 1905, he chose for his wife a lovely Christian woman, Louise Jane Crozier, the daughter of the Reverend A. J. Crozier, then stationed at Red Lion, Delaware. From this marriage three sons were born, Nadal, Jr., Erdman, and Harold. Harold is now a Methodist Minister serving the Methodist Church at Babylon, New York. All of these sons today are living testimony to the values of a Christian home. The mother of this family died January 19, 1916, at the age of 43, and the father following

her death took on the responsibility for seven years of being both father and mother to his three children. On August 9, 1923, Brother Jones married Laura Edna Blades of St. Michaels, Maryland. Again he was blessed in his choice of a wife. For thirty-six years until his death, Mrs. Jones was a devoted helpmate as wife and mother in that family. Her gracious manner and outstanding Christian character made for herself a place of affection in every church they served.

A few years ago the writer of this memoir conceived the idea of organizing all the retired Methodist Ministers in the Wilmington area for a monthly social get-together in each others homes. There were seven of us in the group and we called ourselves "The Mystic Seven." In the group were A. A. Wise, Vinal E. Hills, John L. Sparklin, Leonard White, C. Nadal Jones, Earl Shockley, and W. H. Briggs. We had glorious, heart-warming fellowship. And now with the passing of Brother Jones to the land that is fairer than day there are only two of us left of that company and so may we say—

"To all eternity, they bind us:
They link the planet and the star:
They ride ahead, the trail they find us,
And where they are, and where we are
Will never seem again so far."

HOWARD R. McDADE

The Reverend Howard R. McDade was born in Norristown, Pa. on October 16, 1878. He was educated in the public schools of Bannand, graduated from the Mt. Hermon School for Boys and spend the two years at Yale Divinity School.

On August 5th, 1905 he married Miss Carole Voss and to this union were born eight children: Two sons Howard F. and David J. and six girls: Marie, Marian, Mabel, Ruth, Carolyn, and Jean.

A great source of grief to our McDade was the death of his son who bore the name of his father while a sophomore at Delaware University. He was injured in a football game and after suffering three operations, died May 3d, 1932.

Brother McDade was dearly beloved by all the churches he served and was highly regarded by the writer of this memoir. He probably did his best work at Claymond, The Atonement Methodist Church; from a press report we can quote a reference made of his achievements there: "Howard McDade seems to have been such a pastor. He came to the pulpit of the Atonement Methodist Church in 1920. The Board brought him from the Philadelphia Conference, doubling his salary to obtain him. By the end of his second year, the Sunday School had doubled its membership and the Church Membership nearly so. With this, the church came out of its doldrums and began a forward movement which has continued until this day."

Brother McDade was a good preacher especially when speaking of Old Testament characters; he seemed to have a way of making them live in our day and in our presence.

He was a lover of children, having eight of his own he seemed to understand the wants and ambitions of all the children of his parish, and helped them accordingly.

He died on August 12, 1959 and was buried from the Asbury Methodist Church in Sharptown, a church he once served.

He is survived by Mrs. Joseph Jackson, of Queen Anne, Md.; Mrs. Russell Hall, Oriole, Md.; Mrs. Max Hecker, Boothwyn, Pa.; Mrs. James Embert, Church Hill, Md.; David J. McDade, Frankford, Del.; Mrs. Walter Cordrey, Sharptown, Md.; and Mrs. Robert Owens, Sharptown, Md.

REVEREND WILLIAM HARRISON REVELLE, SR.

William Harrison Revelle, Sr. was born at Fairmount in Somerset County, Maryland on June 28, 1876. His parents were John H. Revelle and Sarah Jane Ford Revelle. Brother Revelle spent his boyhood days in the Fairmount community and attended the public school there. He was converted during the ministry of The Reverend C. W. Prettyman, D.D. and joined the Methodist Church in Fairmount during the ministry of The Reverend T. A. H. O'Brien, D.D. He became active in the church and later felt the call to the Christian ministry. In preparation for the same he attended the Wilmington Conference Academy, as it was then known, in Dover, from which he went to Dickinson College and graduated from the latter school in 1903.

Brother Revelle's ministry began in 1906, when he was appointed as Supply Pastor of the Mardela Charge by the then District Superintendent, Reverend Adam Stengle, D.D. Here he served one year.

While serving the old St. Peter's Church on the Annessex Circuit he met Miss Mary Anna Ward of Crisfield, a member of that church. On April 14, 1909 they were married. Being well trained in church activities, she became a most efficient co-laborer with Brother Revelle in his ministerial career and walked faithfully by his side.

On Saturday morning, March 23, 1907, Brother Revelle was received On Trial into the old Wilmington Conference at its session held in Asbury Church, Smyrna and presided over by Bishop Joseph F. Berry. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop D. H. Moore in 1909 and ordained Elder by Bishop Thomas B. Neely in 1911.

He served the following appointments: Annessex, 1907-08; Quantico, 1909-10. He was returned to Quantico for 1911, but shortly after the conference year began he was transferred to fill a vacancy at Newark, Maryland, where he continued to serve through 1914. Then followed Mt. Vernon, 1915-17; Somerset, 1918-19. In 1920 Brother Revelle was appointed to the Ayers Church in Pittsville, but shortly after the appointment was made he was transferred to Hillsboro, where he remained until 1922. He served Rock Hall, 1922-26; Trinity, Wilmington, 1927-29; North East, 1930-32; Cookman, Wilmington, 1933; Hockessin, 1934-37; Sudlersville, 1938-43; Lewes, 1944-48. Having reached the age limit of 72, he was given the retired relation in 1949.

But Brother Revelle didn't cease the active work of a minister, for he was appointed the Supply Pastor at Lincoln, where he remained for seven years. At the conference session of 1956 he, having completed 50 years of continuous ministry, eight as a supply pastor and forty-one as an active member of the Conference, moved to his home in Lewes, which he had purchased a few years before. Here Brother and Sister Revelle enjoyed a well-earned rest.

Just a few words about some of the more noteworthy achievements of his ministry. While pastor at Rock Hall in 1922 a new parsonage was built costing \$4300. At the completion of this fine achievement a special service was arranged by the pastor and conducted on Sunday, December 17, 1922, at which time Bishop John W. Hamilton preached. During 1948, the last year before retiring, and while he was stationed at Lewes, \$6730 were spent for improvements, included in which was a new organ. While serving as the Supply Pastor of Lincoln in 1954, Brother Revelle reported \$1082 spent for improvements.

In 1931, while Brother Revelle was pastor at North East, the 150th Anniversary of Methodism in that community was observed during the week of October 26 to November 1. An interesting program was arranged by the pastor.

During the closing years of his ministry, when evangelistic work was becoming more difficult, Brother Revelle brought in some of his best reports in this field. At the conference session of 1947, while stationed at Lewes, he reported 48 accessions to the church. In the closing report of his ministry at Lewes for the year 1948, he reported 38 accessions to the church, which was the third highest reported on the Dover District that year. At the conference session of 1954, while Supply Pastor at Lincoln, Brother Revelle reported 39 accessions to the churches of that charge.

Recognizing his faithful and conscientious services, the Annual Conference called on Brother Revelle to serve on a number of committees. He served on the Bible Committee in 1912; on the Committee on Temperance and Prohibition in 1922; on the Committee on Resolutions in 1924; on the Board of Examiners 1928-1937; and on the Committee on Investigation in 1945, of which he served as chairman that year.

But his outstanding work, both as to length of service and efficiency, was in the Treasury Department of the Conference. It began in 1914, when Reverend J. W. Colona, then Conference Treasurer, appointed Brother Revelle as one of his assistants. He continued as one of the assistants until

1923. In 1930 he was again appointed as one of the assistants by the Treasurer, Reverend J. L. Sparklin. This relation continued until 1936 when he was elected as Conference Treasurer. In this position he served most proficiently until the Conference decided in 1940 to elect a full-time Treasurer.

The writer of this memoir had known Brother Revelle for quite a number of years, had exchanged services with him, done work as a member of a Ministers' Quartet with him and in certain other brotherly services, but it was during Brother Revelle's term as Conference Treasurer that our associations were so close that I learned to appreciate his actual worth as a Minister of Jesus Christ. During this period the writer was one of his first assistants. Brother Revelle's passion for accuracy and work well done was outstanding. He also had a deep sense of appreciation of the work and assistance of those associated with him and freely expressed it.

For a few months before the final summons came to come up higher, Brother Revelle had been in declining health. His spirit took its flight to be forever with the Lord on July 18, 1959. The funeral was held in The Bethel Methodist Church of Lewes on Wednesday, July 22, 1959. The present Pastor, Reverend Robert E. Green, had charge of the service, assisted by Reverend Roy L. Tawes, Superintendent of The Dover District and The Reverend A. E. Dougherty, Pastor of Avenue Methodist Church in Milford. The interment was in Barratt's Chapel Cemetery, near Frederica.

Brother Revelle is survived by his wife, Mrs. Mary Ward Revelle; a daughter, Mrs. Guthrie A. Frye of Wilmington, the Organist-Choir Director of The Presbyterian Church of The Covenant of that city; and a son, The Reverend William H. Revelle, Jr., Pastor of The St. Paul's Methodist Church of Wilmington; a brother, Bain Revelle, Fairmount, Md., and three grandchildren.

In the words of the hymn writer, John Ellerton, I close this memoir of my dear friend:

"Now the laborer's task is o'er;
Now the battle day is past;
Now upon the farther shore
Lands the voyager at last.
Father, in Thy gracious keeping
Leave we now Thy servant sleeping.
There the tears of earth are dried;
There its hidden things are clear;
There the work of life is tried
By a juster judge than here.
Father, in Thy gracious keeping
Leave we now Thy servant sleeping."

The REVEREND O. H. CONNELLY

GEORGE EMMETT WOOD

Dr. George Emmett Wood, scholar, poet, preacher, almost reached the century mark. He was born July 24, 1862. He died January 10, 1960. His earthly life began before the smoke of the Civil War had cleared away. He lived to see the use of atomic power and the promise of the space age. Thus he was alive in a great and changing and advancing period of history. Unto the last he kept his mind alert, his heart singing, and his life preaching. He saw a united nation become a world power, and he prayed unceasingly for consecration of the power in its hands. Dr. Wood was a Christian patriot who loved church and country and home, but he had a mighty passion for all mankind. He saw the Cross towering o'er the wrecks of time, and in Christ, his crowned Lord, redemption for the human race.

Dr. Wood was born the son of John Wesley and Eliza Ireland Wood. His parents were loyal Methodists, and his father was a church official. The farm boy grew to appreciate his goodly heritage of home and nature. From the "little red schoolhouse" he went to Washington College. There he made an amazing record in scholarship through the four years, and the record still stands. The college gave him both a M.A. and a D.D., and his ministry honored the institution.

Dr. Wood was fortunate in his marriage. Mrs. Wood was an exceptionally gifted woman in music and dramatics and program building. On the coming birthday of Dr. Wood, which would have marked his ninety-eighth year, a memorial service will be held for both the Woods in Rochawalkin Church, in Maryland. Here, the sweetheart, who was to add romance to the ministry, attended church. Here, she heard the Gospel to be later shared with her husband in long years of devotion and service.

Dr. Wood was of the retiring, unassuming disposition. Larger pulpits were occupied by men less able than he. Yet where he was he influenced men, and many preachers today rise up to call him their father in the Gospel. He was generous to a fault, and only the Lamb's Book of Life knows the acts of kindness done.

In a commencement address at St. John's College, Dr. Wood said: "Be loyal and true to the God of wisdom, truth and love, and open the windows of your being to the light of that divine glory which shines from the face of Jesus Christ, in whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge. Then will life in its largeness of possibility open up before you, and truest success will be yours, both for this life and for that which is to come."

In one of his poems, Dr. Wood has these lines concerning the "Bethlehem Star":

As backwards through the ages past
 So brighter still while time shall last,
 His healing beams of righteousness
 Shall all earth's yearning nations bless.
 For every light that cheers our hearts,
 That comfort, hope and joy imparts,
 Is but a ray divine from Him
 Whose glory ages n'er can dim!
 Yea, He, God's fadeless Morning Star

Shall brighter shine both near and far,
 Until shall come eternal day
 And every shadow flee away.

The funeral of Dr. Wood was conducted by Dr. John A. Trader and the Rev. Edward R. Wilkins, minister and associate minister of Wesley Church, Dover, the Rev. John E. Parker and the writer. Dr. John E. French, of the Salisbury District, assisted at the grave. Members of the Peninsula Conference bore the body to its resting place. Young men walked in silent tribute to a Veteran of the Word.

Dr. Wood is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Wood Humphreys, of Dover, and Mrs. Miriam Teaff, of the Rainbow House, Washington, D. C.

Jane Hamilton Habbart, daughter of the late Thomas and Mary L. Hamilton of Delaware County, Pennsylvania, was born on May 22, 1879. She was one of a large family, having six sisters and one brother. They were members of and active in Siloam Methodist Church at Booths Corner, Pennsylvania. June 30, 1904, in Siloam Methodist Church, she was united in marriage to the Rev. William E. Habbart. To them two children were born; Fairlee, now Mrs. Robert E. Woodside of Millersburg, Pennsylvania, and Paul Ridgely of DeLand, Florida.

For forty years she lived as the perfect minister's wife. Dr. Habbart retired in 1944. From then until his death in 1950, she was a comfort and joy to him.

MISCELLANEOUS

(a) **CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER**

- Rule 1.** The Conference shall meet at 9.00 A. M., and adjourn at 12.30 P. M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.
- Rule 2.** The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.
- Rule 3.** All resolutions and motions shall be in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.
- Rule 4.** When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5.** The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.
- Rule 6.** No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
- (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
 - (2) To Adjourn.
 - (3) To take a recess.
 - (4) To lay on the table.
 - (5) For the previous question.
 - (6) To postpone to a given time.
 - (7) To refer.
 - (8) To substitute.
 - (9) Amendment.
 - (10) To postpone indefinitely.
- A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.
- Rule 7.** When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.
- Rule 8.** No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

- Rule 9.** When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10.** No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11.** When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12.** No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13.** No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14.** Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- Rule 15.** It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16.** The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.
- Rule 17.** All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees, shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.
- Rule 18.** No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19.** These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.

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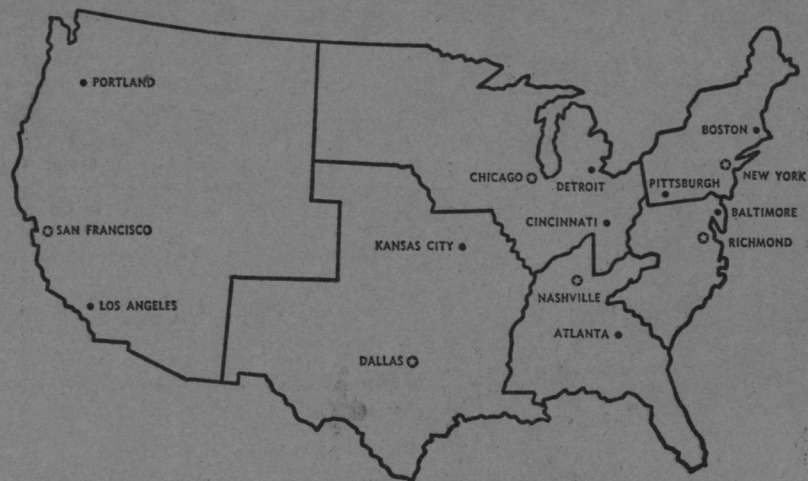
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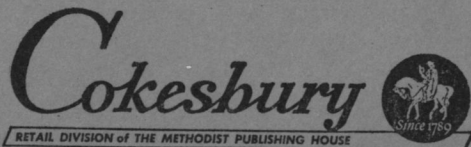
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
