


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

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Superintendents and the District Board of Church Location and Building of the district in which the action is contemplated, the Annual Conference may declare any local church within its bounds discontinued or abandoned," I recommend that Bethel Church, near Chesapeake City, Cecil County, Maryland, be discontinued. This action follows the formal decision of the congregation and Quarterly Conference of Bethel Church to discontinue after several years of study of all the conditions affecting their church life. By their action the church was closed as of October 29, 1961.

WHEREAS, Bethel Church is the third oldest church within the bounds of the Peninsula Annual Conference, having been organized in 1773 by Richard Wright and according to two sources, it is the first place in the world that a Methodist altar call was ever given, it has won for itself a place among the shrines of Methodism in our section of the country. I, therefore, recommend that the church and parsonage become the property of the Historical Society of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, Incorporated. It is suggested that a local chapter be formed and that occasional services be held in old Bethel Church under the direction of said Historical Society to commemorate the history of Methodism in Cecil County.

WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE COMMISSION: Gilbert S. Scarborough, Jr., in addressing the Conference presented the following statement and presented the report of the Commission with the following amendment. It was amended and adopted by the Conference.

Since the unification of the Methodist Church in 1939, Methodists in the Peninsula Annual Conference have contributed \$64,922,909 during this twenty-two year period ending April 30, 1962. During this past year, contributions totaled \$6,354,603. This represented an increase of \$1,006,540 over the previous year or 18.8 per cent. The per capita giving, based on 84,042 members, reported to the Conference was \$75.61 per person. This compares to a national average of approximately \$55.00 per person.

In looking back to the 1941 figures, which was the first full year under unification, 65,964 members gave a total of \$987,020 to their churches for an average of \$14.96 per person. Since 1941 per capita giving has increased 405 per cent, and the total giving has increased 544 percent.

During this past twenty-two years, the Peninsula Conference has contributed \$2,140,000 to the world service agencies of the Methodist Church. An additional \$1,783,444 has been used for higher education within the Peninsula Conference.

Milton is now worshipping in its new sanctuary. Mt. Olivet, Seaford, expects completion of its remodeled, enlarged air conditioned sanctuary by September. Camden will soon erect a new sanctuary, and in a recent campaign, locally conducted, pledged \$111,000. A summer chapel will be ready for services at Fenwick Island in June. Last summer the Rev. David W. Baker conducted tent services there, and with remarkable success. He will again be in charge. This chapel is sponsored by our Board of Missions, and \$20,000 of the cost comes from the estate of the late Rev. W. C. Poole. Slaughters Neck Church (Lincoln) has been renovated.

There are new educational units at Hickory Hill (Roxana), Dagsboro and Trinity, Harrington. Sound (Roxana), St. Georges, Bridgeville, Lincoln and Smyrna will have new educational units within the year. New parsonages are at Dover (for the associate minister), Smyrna and Nassau. Plans are in the making for a new parsonage at Cannon.

The district has raised \$114,235 for General and Annual Conference Benevolences, an increase of \$15,622 over the previous year. The amount for Wesley College Improvement Fund is \$32,352. Other moneys are: Bishop's Appeal for Congo \$1006; Rally Day \$2272; Student Day \$908; Methodist Youth Fund \$703; Race Relations Day \$278; World Wide Communion \$1570; One Great Hour of Sharing \$865; Board of Child Care \$3994; Mother's Day (Methodist Country House) \$3377; Advance Specials \$5838.

1184 men attended the Lenten Breakfasts, and the total offering was \$800. 370 men attended the annual banquet. We regret losing Dr. George V. Kirk as the District Lay Leader. His one year of leadership has endeared him to our laymen. Dr. Kirk has received a large promotion as school administrator in another state. The woman's Society of Christian Service has increased its membership by 52, and the total membership is 5,776. The pledge has been increased by \$1000, and one new society has been organized at Gumboro.

New organs are in the following churches: Epworth (Farmington), Greenwood, Hartly and Leipsic. Laymen of the district contributed new choir robes to the Wesley College Chorus.

I was converted in a Methodist Class Meeting. After the manner of my people who did so much for me in leading me to Christ, I offer my testimony. I am thankful for the ministry and the laity, and glad for my fellowship among them. I think often of the counsel offered by a prominent Negro voice concerning preparation for the pulpit: (1) Read yourself full (2) Think yourself clear (3) Pray yourself hot. No man has any right to neglect his books, his mind and his devotions in making ready to preach. In an age of know-how the world needs to "know Whom I have believed." I give myself then to the Church to which Christ gave Himself. A converted Mexican put his prayer in verse:

I am only a spark; make me a fire.

I am only a string; make me a lyre.

I am only a drop; make me a fountain.

I am only an ant hill; make me a mountain.

I am only a feather; make me a wing.

I am only a serf; make me a king.

I am only a link; make me a chain.

I am only a sprinkle; make me a rain.

Again, thanks to Bishop Lord and my brothers in the Cabinet, and to the Dover District. And thanks be unto God! I close this fifth report with the Interpreter's benediction:

The Comforter be always with thee, good Christian, to guide thee in the way that leads to the City.

Bishop Lord, comrades in the District Superintendency, members of the Peninsula Conference, and friends:

I have noted while in the pastorate and since assuming this office that District Superintendents' reports are something to be endured and that they are commended or condemmed according to the time they consume. I shall therefore restrict this report to a brief summary of the achievements of the ministers and churches of the Easton District.

We have been blessed in that no effective minister has been lost to us by death during the Conference year. Two of our retired members, J. H. Whedbee and Charles M. Kelser, after long illness, attained rest from their labors, and the widow of Charles G. Cannon, a local preacher, fell asleep in Jesus. Our parsonage families were cheered by the arrival of infants in the homes of Richard D. Bailey and Robert W. Helms. Laurence E. Staton, pastor at Queenstown, and Betty Ann Henry, of St. Mark's Church, Easton, were united in marriage.

On January 1st Harold E. Nunemaker entered the Chaplaincy of the Armed Forces and Richard D. Bailey, serving Harmony Charge, was appointed to succeed him at Vienna. Stanley W. Grant, a retired member, was asked to serve the Harmony Charge. November 1st Edward B. Blevins was released from serving St. James Charge and was appointed to Christ Church, Laurel. Thomas J. Turkington, a retired member, consented to serve St. James Charge until Conference. I am deeply indebted to these good men for their willingness to aid when these vacancies occurred.

Our ministers and church officials have been zealous in their efforts to learn more about their respective tasks and have been trying to make more effective the work of the organizations and administrative committees.

The Group Quarterly Conferences, District Conference, and Inter-Board School proved effective instruments in undergirding their work. Our District Organizations, The Woman's Society of Christian Service, Laymen and Youth Groups have been active and the results in all areas of church service are evident. The devotion of our leaders is to be commended.

Spiritual results are not always easy to assess, but an increasing awareness of Christian Stewardship is providing some evidence of growth. Our district is not growing rapidly in population and in several areas our churches are becoming weaker in numbers. The very great shortage of effective ministers, resulting in part-time service, adds to the problem. Over the next few years some of our churches must become willing to unite or they will find it impossible to continue. In spite of these handicaps real gains have been made and the Easton District is showing commendable growth. In membership our gains will equal population growth. With the addition of 1022 new members we now number 17,521. We are the least among the tribes of Israel, but are becoming increasingly aware of our growing strength.

Three phases of the stewardship of money show that our people are willing to respond to the varied needs of the Christian Church. These are gifts to others, the expansion of worship, educational and recreational facilities and the support of the ministry. In response to General and Annual Conference decisions, while every church did not cooperate in each appeal, gains were registered in giving to every appeal by our District. I list only totals, as the breakdown for each church will be carried in The Conference Journal.

For Administration and Benevolences—\$92,948.00; Wesley College Capital Improvements—\$29,116.00; Advance Specials—\$3,574.00; Rally Day—\$1,824.00; Student Day—\$738.00; M. Y. F. Fund—\$1,000.00; Race Relations—\$195.00; Fellowship of Suffering and Service—\$1,415.00; One Hour of Sharing—\$971.00; Child Care—\$4,126.00 (of this amount \$494.00 was the offering from the Laymen Communion Breakfasts); The Country House—\$2,195.00.

Our churches have spent on buildings and improvements—\$364,736.00. With few exceptions church properties are well maintained and adequately insured. Some items beyond normal maintenance and repair deserve special mention. Cambridge Grace remodelled its chancel and installed an Allen Organ at a cost of \$18,000.00; Centreville has completed its educational building and has paid \$128,589.00 on the cost; First Church Chestertown installed a new organ and remodelled its chancel and finished its sanctuary

at a cost of \$57,804.00 all paid. Denton St. Luke's acquired land for a new church at a cost of \$41,500.00; St. Mark's Easton has erected its sanctuary and ordered a pipe organ with an estimated indebtedness of \$250,000.00; Kennedyville is building a new two story educational building costing \$27,000.00 all money subscribed; Kent Island in a special campaign raised \$85,000.00 and expects to begin construction of a new church this summer; Preston acquired a new parsonage at a cost of \$15,000.00; St. Michaels has built a fellowship hall costing \$23,000.00.

On indebtedness a total of \$126,334.00 was raised. Churches paying more than \$1,000.00 are: Cambridge—St. Paul's, \$20,750.00; Cambridge—Zion, \$29,000.00—(The balance of \$59,000.00 plus \$30,000 for a new pipe organ is fully underwritten in pledges over the next three years); Chestertown—Christ, \$1,000.00; Chestertown—First, \$9,949.00; Church Creek, \$1,050.00; Church Hill, \$8,339.00; Dorchester, \$3,359.00; Easton—St. Mark's, \$10,083.00; East New Market, \$7,462.00; Goldsboro, \$3,795.00; Greensboro, \$3,000.00; Harmony, \$2,338.00; Hurlock, \$2,500.00; Preston, \$2,900.00; Queenstown, \$3,700.00; Ridgely, \$2,341.00; Rock Hall, \$4,000.00; St. James, \$4,828.00; St. Michaels, \$11,150.00; Trappe, \$2.062.00; Vienna, \$6,331.00.

The other area of concern is the support of our pastors. Our laymen are aware of the need and for the most part are willing to cooperate in trying to adequately care for their ministers. A total increase of \$9,950.00 has been made for next year. Of this amount \$7,200.00 is on salary, \$600.00 expense and \$2,150.00 utilities. Significant progress has been made in furnishing desirable and comfortable homes and in providing larger salaries and expense accounts.

Bishop Lord and Members of the Conference:

One of the grandest reports of all church history begins with the words: "unto us a child is born," and I can think of no better way to relate the joy of three of our parsonage families as they welcome Ann Blessing Higgins, born September 14, 1961; Deborah Sue Gladden, born March 3, 1962; and David Francis Wilson, born February 15, 1962. They reside with their parents at Salisbury, Powellville and Quantico, Maryland. There are no deaths to report; no marriages; no changes in pastoral assignments since our last appointments. Yet change is evidenced in many things. Here is the record of what we have done or failed to do.

Membership and Evangelism

Our greatest task is that of winning the unchurched and the unsaved for Christ. Here, our record can never be too good; and I fear, it must always be too poor. We have added 916 new members to the rolls of the church and have lost by death, transfer and all other causes some 693. Our total membership is now reported as 17,929. Nearly all of our charges report some accessions, and a majority of them report net gains. We are happy that eight of our charges (Delmar, First; Galestown; Hebron; Parsonsburg; Princess Anne; Quantico; Salisbury, Grace; and Smith Island) have received twenty or more members into their fellowship during the year. Berlin; Crisfield, Immanuel; Crisfield, Mt. Pleasant; and Salisbury, Trinity have received thirty or more each; while Salisbury, Asbury; Salisbury, Bethesda; Salisbury, Christ; and Fruitland, St. John have received more than fifty persons. Fruitland, St. John has for the second successive year recorded the largest net gain of forty-five. We rejoice in our gains, but like the Big Fisherman, we long most for the ones that got away.

Building and Improvement

Thirty-nine of the forty-three charges on the Salisbury District report that during the year they have spent \$825,499 on building and improvement. A new chapel has been erected at Shad Point on the Allen Charge. Showell Church on the Bishopville Charge, partially destroyed by fire in November

of 1961 has been rebuilt. Churches and educational buildings at Crisfield, Mt. Pleasant; Newark; Melson on the Pittsville Charge; Powellville and Cokesbury, Pocomoke have been remodeled, but the most extensive work in this area has been done at Bethesda Church, Salisbury, where the congregation has spent more than \$160,000 in remodeling the educational building, creating a new chancel and installing a new organ. New heating systems have been installed in parsonages at Mardela, Mt. Hermon and Pittsville.

Church Extension

All the things I talked about last year in the field of Church Extension have become, or are fastly becoming grand realities! The new Christ Church in East Salisbury has had a wonderful beginning. With more than a hundred new members in less than ten months, it has become established in every area of our church organization. Proper financing has been arranged and by mid-summer or early Fall, the first unit of the new church, designed by Mr. A. Hensel Fink, will begin to rise on the site two miles east of City Hall. The Rev. Daniel G. Higgins, Jr., pastor, has had indispensable help from the Conference Board of Missions, and particularly from the pastor and congregation of Trinity Church, Salisbury, who are pledged to provide the first \$25,000 for building costs when needed. Many others have assisted us in the initial stages of our work and give assurance of additional support in the future. Last January, we held final services at Atlantic Church, Ocean City. The church which had stood for more than forty years, from the very beginning of the resort town, could no longer meet the need of a greatly expanding summer population. The structure was demolished, and a new church costing in the neighborhood of \$200,000 is being erected on the old site. While it will not be completed by summer, progress is sufficient to assure the use of the new edifice during the coming season. I have had a grand stand seat for the building of the new Asbury Church, Salisbury. One of the great joys of my administration has been to watch the development and the growth as well as to assist with the work associated with the relocation of this fine church. In April, 1961 we broke the ground; and a little more than a year later, Bishop Lord laid the cornerstone. For the better part of a decade, The Rev. J. R. Mackey and his loyal people have lived and labored for the fulfillment of this dream. Within a month or so from now, the congregation will move to their new church where the fires from an old altar first established in 1778 will go on burning in a new setting and a new day.

Christian Education

Aside from those items on apportionment which pertain to the general work of Christian Education, we have given \$1,624 for Rally Day; \$666 for Methodist Student Day and \$545 to the Methodist Youth Fund.

Our best accomplishment has been for Wesley College. No charge has failed to assist me in our drive for capital improvement funds, and I am delighted to report that we have contributed \$34,878 or 96.7% of the asking for this purpose. As an alumnus of Wesley Collegiate Institute, the forerunner of Wesley College, I gladly acknowledge a debt I can never repay to the institution which gave me my first opportunity and education

for the ministry which I so dearly love. With this in mind, I have welcomed the opportunity to serve as a superintendent during one of the most critical periods in the life of this school, knowing that the heaviest debt is that of gratitude, when it is not in our power to repay it. My people have given \$128,738 during the past four years, and I am personally grateful for their fine support of this very worthy cause.

Bishop Lord, my colleagues of the Cabinet, and members of the Peninsula Annual Conference:

The following is a report involving the work of the Wilmington District ministers and laymen during the past Conference year. It will be impossible here to list all of the achievements of these fine men and loyal congregations. Most of the details of individual achievement will be found in the statistical tables of the Conference journal. Let it suffice for us here to mention what seem to be high-lights of the year.

May I first indicate changes that have affected parsonage families during this year. We must report six deaths. The Rev. Wingate D. Short, retired member of our Conference, died July 15, 1961; the Rev. Peter M. R. Schauer, retired, died on February 20, 1962; the Rev. Roy T. Thawley, retired, died on May 3, 1962; Mrs. Fannie V. Sherwood, widow of the Rev. William N. Sherwood, died November 19, 1961; Mrs. Adella F. Kelso, widow of the Rev. John M. Kelso, died March 25, 1962; Mrs. Florence I. McCoy, widow of the Rev. Jesse C. McCoy, died April 12, 1962.

There is one marriage to report. The Rev. George H. Pigueron III was married to Miss Celia Wirz in Mexico City, Mexico, on December 5, 1961. Mr. Pigueron, who holds his Quarterly Conference membership in this district, was appointed to attend school last year and is presently continuing his studies at the University of Mexico.

During this year we have welcomed into parsonage homes the following children: Erika Elizabeth Foster, daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Gerald Foster, Union Church, Wilmington; Curtis Hall Short, son of the Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Short of North East, Maryland, born on June 23, 1961; Charles Andrew Davis, son of the Rev. and Mrs. Charles D. Pruett, Port Deposit, Maryland, born on December 7, 1961; Tracey Anne Randolph, daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. David J. Randolph, Jr., Lowell, Massachusetts, born on January 6, 1962; John Charles Lasbury, son of the Rev. and Mrs. C. Edwin Lasbury, 2615 Foulk Road, Wilmington, Delaware, born on January 9, 1962; Edward Paul Owens, son of the Rev. and Mrs. Wliliam Owens, 1404 Lovering Avenue, Wilmington, Delaware, born on February 15, 1962; Mark Christopher Beckwith, son of the Rev. and Mrs. Walter Beckwith, Chesapeake City, Maryland, born on March 14, 1962; Mary Ellen Pusey, daughter of the Rev. and Mrs. Irvin Pusey, Bear, Delaware, born on April 16, 1962. We also welcome the birth of Douglas Gordon Braum, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas G. Braum, who was born on March 20, 1962. Mrs. Braum served until the first of this year as the deaconess at Union Church, Wilmington. We wish her and her family God's blessings.

At this Conference session two of our ministers will seek the retired relation. The Rev. Franklin B. Bailey, associate minister at McCabe Memorial Church, will complete 40 years of active ministry. The Rev. Otis P. Jefferson, pastor at Trinity Church, Wilmington, will be completing 37 years in the active ministry. We express a heartfelt "well done" to these men and their wives for the devoted service they have rendered to Christ and His church. Our prayer for them is that they will have many years to enjoy this new relation and that they will find many ways in which they may continue their Christian service.

One change in appointment was necessary during the Conference year. The Rev. Robert E. VanCleaf, pastor of Eastlake Church, Wilmington, was called to active duty with the National Guard in October 1961. The Rev. Conrad Hamer, pastor of Christ Church, Laurel, Delaware, was assigned to Eastlake Church on November 1.

Membership And Evangelism

Accessions have been reported in all but one of the charges on the district. We have received on profession of faith, 1,081; by transfer from other Methodist churches, 771; from other denominations, 204; making a total increase of 2,056 members this year, for a net increase of 650, or a present district total of 27,524. We have during the year conducted one major visitation evangelism program at Cherry Hill, Maryland, involving ministers and laymen from other churches of the district. This meaningful project was under the direction of our District Secretary of Evangelism, the Rev. John E. Jones. Another significant program introduced by Mr. Jones was a series of six Lenten Communion discussion sessions for our ministers in the city of Wilmington and environs. We met for six Wednesday mornings at seven o'clock for Communion in the Chapel of Grace Church, then moved to the social hall for a light breakfast and were led in meditation on one of the great spiritual classics by six of our brethren. The average attendance for these early morning devotions was 20. Plans are already being made to renew this project another year.

World Service And Benevolences

Charges on this district were asked to give \$179,533 for World Service and Conference Benevolences. The amount accepted was \$166,742, while the amount paid was \$159,891. 38 of the 53 charges paid the asking in full. This represents an increase both in the number of charges meeting the asking in full and in the total amount raised. 40 of our charges have contributed \$34,194 for Advance Special projects. This likewise represents an increase in the number of charges participating and in the total amount contributed for the Advance. We were pleased to note that the Wilmington District led the Washington Area in contributions to Advance Specials a year ago and stood high in this regard in the Northeastern Jurisdiction. We hope it will be possible for us to find more of our churches participating in these second-mile gifts to specific projects of World and National Missions and the Methodist Committee on Overseas Relief.

Last year we reported that 35 churches had responded to the Bishop's Appeal for the Congo with gifts totaling \$3,953. During this year 18 additional gifts totaling \$2,219 have been received for this cause, making our total for the Bishop's Appeal for the Congo, \$6,172.

I wish to acknowledge the work of our District Missionary Secretary, the Rev. John W. Simpers, Jr. His program of missionary education and cultivation has brought the story of missions and the great needs of the world before our people this year.

General Contributions

Our churches have contributed \$41,839 for Wesley College Capital Improvement and a total of \$20,844 for the 8 special offerings taken during the year. This represents some increase in the total given.

Buildings And Improvements

This has been a year of major building on the Wilmington District. 28 of our churches have spent \$1000 or more for building and improvements.

Three new churches have been opened for worship: Hillcrest and Aldersgate have each completed sanctuary units this year, while St. Mark's in Stanton has completed a new church including education unit and temporary sanctuary. One education building has been completed and opened for use at Cherry Hill, Cecil County, Maryland. Four new parsonages have been purchased: St. Mark's, Stanton: McCabe Memorial, a parsonage for the pastor and a parsonage for the associate pastor; and St. Paul's Church. One education building is presently under construction for McCabe Memorial Church. Three churches have plans for education buildings. It is expected that ground will be broken for a new unit at Ebenezer Church in September. Newark is completing a campaign for pledges to underwrite construction of a new education unit for which plans have been drawn. North East Church is completing plans for their new education building following a very successful financial campaign. Grace Church, Wilmington, has completed a campaign for funds for major redecorating and the purchase of a new organ. Several of our churches have acquired additional real estate to be used for either eventual enlargement of facilities or parking lots. Included in this group will be New Castle, Peniel Church at Newport, Perryville, and Port Deposit Churches.

During the year St. Paul's Church building at 10th and Jackson Streets, Wilmington, was sold to the State Highway Department. The old building is to be demolished to make way for a new highway. All church activities have been moved to the Foulk Road area adjacent to the site of the new church. It is expected that ground will be broken within a few weeks for this church. Madeley Church has received permission to relocate several miles south of its present site, and it is expected that a new building will be available for this congregation in the near future. The Madeley Church properties in South Wilmington have been purchased by the Peninsula Conference Projects Committee of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and will provide them with added room for their mission program. The Mt. Joy Methodist Church of the Delaware Conference is providing significant Methodist ministry for this area of the city. In its new location the Madeley Church will have significant opportunities for service to the members of its own congregation and to many unchurched persons in a rapidly growing complex of suburban developments.

Pastoral Support

Again this year there have been some increases in pastoral support. 26 charges have increased salaries by \$19,766. Four charges have increased travel allowance \$1,100, and six charges have increased parsonage utilities by \$1,220, for a total increase in pastoral support of \$22,086.

Organizations

The several organizations of the Wilmington District have taken great strides forward during the year. The District Woman's Society of Christian Service, under the capable leadership of Mrs. Arthur Benjamin; The District Board of Lay Activities under the District Lay Leader, Thomas S. Lodge, and his Associates, Lawrence Gibson, Richard Farmer, Samuel Craig, L. LeRoy Horne, and Benjamin Webber; The Methodist Youth Fellowship program under competent district and sub-district leaders. Many meaning-

ful programs have been held by these organizations during the year and these leaders have given loyal support to every phase of the district program. Increased giving on the part of our Woman's Society, greater support by our churches to projects sponsored by our Board of Lay Activities, and increased participation by our youth testify to the effectiveness of these programs.

Interboard School

We wish to express appreciation to Bishop John Wesley Lord for his leadership in the Interboard School held throughout our Conference in January. We feel that this School has had significant impact upon the ministerial and lay leadership of our district and has brought a greater sense of direction to our responsible leaders at both district and local church levels.

Recruitment

We are pleased to report that at least four additional young people have indicated this year their intention to enter Christian vocations. William K. Cahall, Jr., of Trinity Church, Wilmington, who will be appointed to a student pastorate at this session of the Conference, is planning to continue his college work in the fall at the University of Delaware. Charles Lawson of Perryville Church is graduating from Washington College, Chestertown, and expects to enter Wesley Theological Seminary in the fall. Jay Baird of Peninsula Church and Raymond Eck of Silverbrook Church are likewise preparing for the Christian ministry and are receiving the encouragement and support of their home churches. We are maintaining contact with those who have previously made commitments for Christian vocations and are pleased with their progress in training.

Town And Country

It was indicated in last year's report that special attention would be given to our rural areas. At my request the Conference Commission on Town and Country work has conducted a careful study of the Town and Country Churches in Cecil County, Maryland. This study culminated in an all-day Convocation in Elkton, Maryland, on Saturday, March 31. Much credit belongs to the Rev. John W. Simpers, Jr., Chairman, and the Rev. Willard L. Robinson, Jr., Executive Secretary and those associated with them for the outstanding success of this project.

The purpose of the study and Convocation was three fold. 1. To help each church see itself more clearly. To see how relevant its message and program were to the needs of this age and the ongoing lives of the people. 2. To help each church see itself in relation to the other Methodist Churches of the county and those churches of other denominations and faith groups represented, with special concern for an increased level of cooperation. 3. To help each church see the total community about it; to come to a better understanding of the social and economic factors affecting life in Cecil County and to sense a need for closer cooperation with those voluntary and governmental agencies at work within the County.

Special study committees involving ministers and key laymen worked for months doing research, compiling charts, graphs, tables, maps, etc. Their findings were reported in a bound volume of 45 pages.

The Convocation was a very helpful experience. Responsible civic and community leaders served as resource people. Serious study was given to the findings of the committees and much valuable discussion took place.

Two follow-up meetings have been held. Plans are being formulated for much closer cooperation between the churches and those agencies concerned with the betterment of life and the raising of standards. We believe that our people are now more clearly aware of their opportunities to provide a relevant ministry in the name of the living Christ.

Some changes are to be made in the structuring of Methodism in the county involving certain charge re-alignments and strengthening of leadership. Further study is being made of a group ministry plan that will relate student pastors to full time pastors. Further study is also being given to the employment of a full time rural worker in Cecil County in cooperation with the Woman's Society of Christian Service of our Conference.

Specific plans are under way to provide religious coverage for the increasing number of people who vacation along our five beautiful rivers each summer. (Some 20,000 campers were counted one weekend last summer on Elk Neck alone). Worship services will be taken to new areas this year and several of our churches will adapt their schedules to better serve the summer residents.

Two cooperative programs will be conducted by the 31 churches in Cecil County next year as a result of our Convocation. In the fall we will have a united Evangelistic Mission. Next spring we expect to develop a cooperative emphasis on Stewardship and Finance with an every member canvass in each church.

In order to develop these and other plans for our Town and Country Churches, we are establishing a steering committee which will give continuing guidance to these projects and plan new ventures in the coming years.

Inner City

Another major area of concern is the inner city. Our churches in the city of Wilmington have been giving careful study to their communities and have been re-evaluating their own purpose and mission. I believe without exception each church has taken some new and specific steps to relate itself to the real needs of the city. I am very proud of our pastors and laymen as we sense their growing concern for people in the changing neighborhoods of Wilmington. It is true some churches have taken major steps while others have just begun, but the concern is present and new answers are being sought. I believe we are being led by the Holy Spirit to some significant new ministries.

Our major progress this year has been in cooperation with the other major denominations through the Wilmington and New Castle County Council of Churches. A two day seminar last fall brought together selected ministers and laymen from all parts of the city for information and inspiration. As a result the Council of Churches has formed a committee on

Metropolitan Ministry. This group is now proposing certain "Larger Parishes" for cooperative work in several areas of the city. These areas or sectors will be related to suburban churches on a voluntary basis. We are very pleased with the plans that have been developed and are cooperating fully with the program.

As Methodists we participated in the quadrennial Convocation on Urban Church in St. Louis in February. While we are cooperating in broad planning with our sister denominations, we are developing specific plans to strengthen the program and staff of several of our churches in those areas of most critical need. The Conference Board of Missions has made available certain funds to use this year in two or three new projects. It is expected that we will be adding full time workers and developing additional programs in certain pilot projects this year.

In closing this report I would like to express appreciation to the ministers and laymen of the District for their excellent cooperation and loyal support. I must also acknowledge my gratitude for the friendship, encouragement, and cooperation of my Bishop and my colleagues of the Cabinet. This Conference marks the completion of six years of service by Dr. John E. French. As one who served under his leadership for two years in Salisbury and for three years as a co-worker in the Cabinet, I would like to express my gratitude for his able administration, good judgment, and genuine concern for his ministers, the laymen of his churches, and the Kingdom of God.

No report such as this can be complete without a word of thanks to Almighty God for strength and guidance and the privilege of service.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHILD CARE

May, 1962

During the present conference year the Board of Child Care celebrated the first anniversary of the dedication of the new buildings at Rockdale, Baltimore County. The Kelso Home for Girls sold its property in Towson, Maryland, and made its fourth move in its long history. The Strawbridge Home for Boys also sold its property at Sykesville, Maryland, and made its first relocation. The Board of Child Care offices were transferred from 516 N. Charles Street, Baltimore, to the grounds of the Kelso and Strawbridge Homes. Now the Board's supervision of the four-fold program—group care, foster boarding home care, adoption service and counselling unwed parents—is centered and is greatly facilitated by so doing.

The new address for the two Homes and the Board of Child Care is 3300 Gaither Road, Baltimore 7, Maryland. The phone number is area code 301, Walnut 2-2100.

All applications and inquiries should be made to the above address.

These new buildings and enlarged program did not just happen, they were made to happen. The Peninsula Conference had a significant part in this. The members of the Board of Directors from this conference are to be commended for their faithful attendance and participation at board and committee meetings at a real cost in time and money to themselves. The Board is indebted to the District Superintendents for their interest, understanding and loyal cooperation. The Conference Board of Lay Activities, and the lay leaders of the local churches have rendered yeoman's service in promotion of the Christmas offering. The pastors of the churches have been our effective representatives in and out of the pulpit. The membership of the churches expressed their Christian interest in disadvantaged children by a steadily increased contribution toward the operational service of their conference child care agency. One man and wife this year contributed \$3,000. The total amount given in 1960-61 was \$20,482.09. This year it amounted to \$21,617.88.

The work being done by the Board of Child Care is outstanding in Methodism. Our standards are high and are in accordance with the recommendation of our General Board of Hospitals and Homes. The emphasis is upon a qualitative service to children with tremendous needs. Moreover, we are licensed by the State of Maryland with authority to function in other states and the District of Columbia by reciprocal agreement. In the ground breaking ceremonies, Mr. T. J. S. Waxter, Director of the State Welfare Department, our licensing agency, gave utterance to the following: "The Methodist Board of Child Care has embarked on an adventure which will be good not only for the children who pass through the institution, but also for the entire State in terms of an experiment on behalf of a group of under-privileged children who really are the forgotten people of our State."

Just as it took time to reach the point where we are now, the next couple of years will find our care of children enriched if we become able financially to incorporate certain suggestions made by the State Department of Public Welfare.

- "1—Obtaining adequate staff to include a sixth caseworker, a medical care consultant and sufficient recreational staff.
- 3—Providing psychiatric service for consultation to staff and diagnosis and treatment, as needed, for the children.
- 4—Reviewing the values of amending the charter to permit rotation of full board membership.

Already two of the five recommendations have been fulfilled, number "3" and number "4". Also, we have been able to get good recreational staff during the summer months.

Brick and mortar are important but of far greater significance are the people who live and work in the buildings. At the present we are limited in the children we can accept and help by a dearth in physically sound houseparents who are able to understand, accept, control and direct children in the cottages. So far, we have been unable to enlist the interest of a medical care consultant or a sixth caseworker to give special attention to applications. Our attention is now focused upon realizing these objectives during the coming conference year.

Much of the speed with which we will settle down in our new facilities, and increase the quantity and quality of our work, will depend upon the additional contributions from individual members of the 419 churches in the conference. The object of our promotion is to get each Methodist in every church to make an annual contribution, whether it be one dollar or one hundred dollars.

Finally, to quote Judge Waxter: "The Board of Child Care is a shining example of an organization concerned with the fundamental needs of children, and will go any lengths to meet the needs, and particularly the needs of children who cannot fend for themselves. . . ." This is true. We believe that all Methodists accept this challenge!

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION

From the beginning, the Christian Church has been concerned with the importance of its teaching ministry. "Jesus said, go ye therefore and teach". There was a content of faith to communicate and there were persons both within and without the fellowship who needed guidance in living as followers of Christ.

Christian teaching in the 380 Churches of the Peninsula Conference of the Methodist Church is the concern of a great multitude of people who continue to go about their responsibilities with children, youth, and adults.

It is the responsibility of the Conference Board of Education to do its utmost to provide guidance and assistance to our people in this part of our work. The following is a summary of the various ways we have sought to carry out the entrusted commission.

Children's Work

MISS DORIS HOOVER, Conference Director of Children's Work

- 1) An increase in the attendance at the four (4) Vacation Church School Workshops, held in various parts of the Conference, indicated a renewal of interest in these undertakings. The future of Vacation Church Schools seems more promising at present than in the recent past. Based on the interest indicated by the 250-300 persons in attendance, two (2) additional Workshops are planned for this spring making six (6) in all. Recommended materials are the resources provided by the Curriculum Committee of The National Council of Churches entitled the Cooperative Series. The prompt return of report blanks to the office of the Board of Education upon the close of Vacation Church School in the local church proves helpful in planning for the subsequent year.
- 2) A Laboratory School was held July 24-28 at St. Mark's Church, Easton. The faculty was composed of Miss Beatrice A. Daniel, New Concord, Ohio: Miss Virginia Moores, Winterville, Ohio; and Mrs. Howard Roher, Silver Spring, Maryland. Another school had been planned for the Salisbury District using the same instructors but was cancelled for a lack of registrations. One such school is planned in the Wilmington District, July 8-13 at Peniel Church, Newport. Teachers of children from all the Districts, however, are invited to participate.

As a method of assisting our teachers of children, the Laboratory School is coming into wide use throughout the country. Mr. Glenn Gothard, of the General Board of Education, reported in the January Inter-Board Schools, a phenomenal growth of this type of training experience. It is our hope that plans already announced will have enthusiastic support.

- 3) In October, upon the invitation of the Board of Education, the Reverend J. Gordon Stapleton, Minister of Salem Church, Pocomoke City, entered upon a plan of training to develop additional instructors of children's teachers for Christian Workers' Schools. Fifteen persons are expected to be accredited from this effort. It is our measured judgment that a fulltime children's worker to assist teachers of children going from Church to Church is one of the most pressing needs of our Conference.
- 4) Further effort at this point has been made by arrangement with the General Board of Education in recent years for periodic visits of special workers for a limited time. During the year, Miss Evelyn Tripp of the General Board of Education, returned to the Peninsula Conference spending four weeks conducting Leadership Education Schools in the following charges; Middletown, Charlestown, Mt. Zion, (on Bethel), Quantico, Hurlock, St. Michaels, Oxford, Tilghman, and Galena. In all, twenty-three (23)

Churches participated in the undertaking. Reports from Ministers and laymen alike have been most appreciative in regard to this consecrated worker. Plans are now being made for similar assistance extending eight weeks in the coming fall. Those interested in such a program are invited to inquire concerning plans for this enlarged endeavor.

Youth Work

- 1) On January 1, our Youth Camp Director, the Reverend George C. Godfrey, was appointed Youth Director of the Baldwin Community Methodist Church of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. During his more than three years of service, Mr. Godfrey brought significant leadership to the Conference Youth Program and the development of Camp PeCoMeth. Deeply regarded and highly respected, our prayer goes with him as he enters upon a new and challenging opportunity of service.
- 2) On January 18, at the Winter Meeting of the Board of Education, Mr. Wallace Smith of Cambridge, Maryland was elected Camp Manager of PeCoMeth.

Mr. Smith is a teacher in the Public School System of Maryland; an active member of Zion Church, and former President of The Peninsula Conference Young Adult Council.

Before coming to PeCoMeth as Mr. Godfrey's assistant last summer, he had previously served as Camp Director in New England camps.

At PeCoMeth his duties will include supervision of the camp's operation and assistance in the program. Mrs. Smith is the Educational Assistant in Christian Education at Zion Church.

- 3) Intensive search is being made to discover a new associate to share the responsibilities of Christian Education in the work of the Board. The associate's duties will include participation in all age levels of the work with special responsibilities in the area of youth. In addition, he will have supervision of the program for Camp PeCoMeth.
- 4) The well-organized Youth Council of The Board of Education has been active through the year and has completed a number of important enterprises.
- a) The Peninsula Annual Youth Conference was held at Wesley Church, Dover, May 6; with approximately 150 in attendance. Plans for the Annual Youth Conference for this spring at St. Paul's Church, Cambridge, Maryland; include a look at the Methodist Student Movement and what it offers to those who expect to continue their education beyond high school.
- b) Thirteen officers attended the MYF Regional Training School held at Lycoming College, Williamsport, Pennsylvania. The value of this experience is seen in the splendid leadership provided by this group of officers during the present year.
- c) The Fall Youth Assembly was held at Hillcrest Church, Wilmington, October 13-15 with approximately 200 in attendance. The program was developed with the cooperation of The Board of Christian Social Concerns using the theme, "The Bible and Race."
- d) A trip to the United Nations at Thanksgiving included 113 youth and counselors. The Reverend Charles Barton, Minister at Secretary, Maryland, served as Director.

e) The renovation of the barn at Camp PeCoMeth was undertaken two years ago under the sponsorship of the Youth Council. Last year \$3,000. was raised for this project. Another \$3,000. will complete this responsibility. This is a worthy undertaking which adds greatly to the general facilities at PeCoMeth for which our youth are to be highly commended. By the additional facilities provided at the Barn, many young people from our local churches have shared richly in weekend spiritual days apart. During the past spring and fall, over 300 young people from 15 MYF's have used the Barn for various activities. In addition, 250 other young persons had camping experience during Junior and Senior High Rustic Camp Weeks.

An important step which would extend Leadership Training to all areas of local church activities could be made possible if heating facilities should be installed in the Barn. This can be done for approximately \$3,000. Our Barn then could be used on a year-round basis not only by MYF's but by other leaders from our local churches in need of training for their leadership duties. Such experiences would provide opportunities for spiritual renewal to the workers and to our work.

f) Methodist Student Day Offering in the Peninsula Conference has shown a decline in recent years which gives concern not only to leaders here but also to those in the General Church in charge of these funds. Communications from responsible officials point out that further assistance to young people from the Peninsula Area seeking loan funds in colleges will be encountering further difficulty unless our support improves. Frequently, letters addressed to the Executive Secretary are requests for financial aid and information about the Student Loan Fund. If we are to be eligible for assistance we must, as a Conference, face these facts and make plans on Student Day to increase our financial support. The Reverend William H. Hudson has consented to serve as Director for the observance this year.

Adult Work

The REVEREND GEORGE GOODLEY, Conference Director of Adult Work

"Christian Education for adults is of primary importance because adults are the persons who are making the basic decisions of the world today; and they need Christian guidance in meeting their responsibilities."

This was the keynote of emphasis in the Adult Workers' Commission of the Methodist Conference on Christian Education, held November 1-6. We therefore urge all local churches to strengthen their program of Christian Education for adults. Your Conference Adult Director and the District Directors are ready to be of any possible assistance in helping local churches prepare adults for assuming their responsibilities in a world so fraught with external and internal dangers.

1) Significant in the Adult Work of our Conference is the Young Adult Council, Mr. C. Robert Godfrey, President. It is this group which sponsors young adult organizations in local churches and the Young Adult Weekend at PeCoMeth.

Upon the invitation of the Young Adult Council, Bishop John Wesley Lord came to PeCoMeth on June 24 and gave himself utterly to the enthusiastic group in attendance. The generous and gracious interest which our

Bishop took in the proceedings of the day will be long remembered by all who had the privilege of participating.

2) A new venture in Christian Education in St. Mark's Church, Easton, began under the able leadership of the Reverend Hartwell Chandler, Minister, and Dr. Vincent O. Eareckson, Chairman of the Board of Managers. Fully accredited by the General Board of Education, the Institute was continued through eighteen weeks of study. Courses offered were as follows: The Life and Teachings of Christ; Understanding the Christian Faith; Prayer and Personal Religion; One World, One Mission; Major Religions of the World; When Children Ask; The Letters of Paul; A Short History of Methodism; and The Meaning of Suffering.

This was indeed an inspiring adventure filled with far-reaching suggestions for similar action in other areas of our Conference. Out of such study in depth and content, a whole new pattern for Christian Education may be developing. Our commendation to St. Mark's in the splendid effort to bring a new dimension to this field.

3) The Adult Convocation held annually at The Inn, Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania, was again the place of assembly for nearly 400 adult workers March 5-11. A delegation of 23 from the Peninsula Conference responded to this opportunity. We would urge our leaders in adult work to consider seriously possible attendance next year when the Convocation will be held March 7-11.

Conference on Christian Education

The most important national meeting of Methodist Christian educators is the Methodist Conference on Christian Education. Every two years it brings together the persons most directly responsible for leadership in Christian teaching in Methodist Churches.

The fourteenth session was held November 1-6 in Chicago. "The Transforming Gospel and the Teaching Church" was the theme of study. More than 1,000 persons attended from fifty states. A delegation of fifteen (15) persons representing various positions within our Conference was in attendance.

Coaching Conference

A very successful Coaching Conference was held at Wesley College, Dover; October 5-7. The fifty (50) persons in attendance began their preparation for accreditation in the following courses led by these instructors:

Teaching Primary Children-Mrs. Evelyn Dorr, Arlington, Virginia.

Guiding Youth (with special attention given to the new Junior-High materials)—Dr. J. Irvin McDonough, Nashville, Tennessee.

Adult Work in the Church School—Dr. Robert R. Powell, Wesley Seminary, Washington, D. C.

Teaching in the Church School—Dr. Francis Wilson, Nashville, Tennessee.

Workers' Conferences

It is the considered opinion of many leaders in Christian Education today that among our resources there are few agencies so helpful as the Workers' Conference. Composed of the Commission on Education and the Church School Staff and other interested persons, the Workers' Conference meeting periodically for worship, study, and fellowship, provides a splendid means of continuous training of leaders in Christian Education.

Forty-four (44) Workers' Conferences have been conducted by the Executive Secretary during the year in the following churches or charges: Charlestown, Tilghman, Zion on Bethel, Cecilton, Ridgely, Greensboro (2), Asbury, Wilmington Manor (2), Zion-Cecil County (2), Union, Wilmington (2), Goldsboro, Burrsville (2), Bishopville, Elkton, St. Paul's, Laurel Circuit, Ellendale, Lincoln, North East, Cherry Hill, Galena, Frederica, Pittsville-Ayers, Grace, Salisbury, Zion, Cambridge; Quantico, Whites Chapel, Concord, Asbury, Harrington; Felton, Kingswood of Brookside, First Church, Chestertown; Hillsboro, Townsend, Wyoming, Vienna, St. Paul's Cambridge, Delmar, Mt. Olive, Hockessin, and St. Georges.

Frequently, out of Workers' Conferences, the desire for further study results in plans on the part of the local Church for a Leadership Education School. Your Conference Board is more than ready to help you in building such a program in your church.

Church School Administrators' Conference

The Church School Administrators' Conference, formerly known as the Church School Superintendents' Weekend, was held at PeCoMeth July 8-9; Mr. Richard Price of Smyrna, Delaware, President, presiding.

Dr. A. Merritt Dietterich, Executive Secretary of the Baltimore Conference Board of Education, and Mr. Holland Heck, Superintendent of General Church School Work for the Philadelphia Conference, served as resource persons. Plans for this year include an arrangement for Dr. Dietterich to return for his third engagement and extension of invitations to include Church School Superintendents, Chairmen of Commissions on Education, Departmental Superintendents, and other interested persons. Mr. Robert Porter, Salisbury, President, will give leadership to the program to be held June 16-17.

Evangelism In The Church School

Upon the approval of the previous session of the Conference, a joint committee of the Board of Evangelism and the Board of Education has provided materials for an emphasis on Evangelism in the Church School. Points of emphasis made by the Joint Committee briefly summarized included suggestions for Workers' Conferences or Schools on Evangelistic Teaching; active leadership on the part of Membership Cultivation Superintendents; the place of Confirmation Classes; strengthening of home and Church relationships; and the importance of the teacher as an Evangelist.

Although the plan was specifically designed to be made during February, March, and April of the present year; it is our hope that what has been underscored will continue to influence our leaders with the urgency of the task.

The statistics concerning our progress in Church School membership may allow various interpretations—the indications, after every explanation

is made however, are not reassuring. The reports call us to go deeper than a mere examination of records. They ask, "what are these reports saying in respect to our spiritual condition?"

Methodist Literature

One of the most important areas of the work of the Board of Education concerns our resources for teaching—The Church School literature. The reports of last year revealed that of the 3,864 church school classes reporting, 3,040 (or 76%) are using Methodist approved literature. Although this is a commendable number, we are concerned about those who continue with literature other than that prepared under the guidance of our denominational leaders. Where the literature is in question, several matters may contribute to a given situation. Two factors, however, emerge repeatedly as sources of difficulty.

1) A marked reluctance on the part of the teachers to make necessary preparation required for effective teaching. A recent survey disclosed the disturbing revelation that not more than $25\,\%$ of our teachers throughout the denomination are making adequate weekly preparation.

2) Teachers have not learned how to use Methodist materials.

These two factors alone do not indicate all existing situations but they are present in a large number of cases when teaching materials are discussed.

We therefore call upon our leaders in the Church Schools to ponder the importance of training for those who teach and to our teachers that they consider their training and preparation a part of their dedication.

The Conference Center

Upon the recommendation of the President of the Board of Christian Social Concerns, a resolution was adopted during last session of the Conference suggesting use of the facilities of the office of the Board of Education as a place of meeting for boards and committees. It was also requested that the various film libraries of the Conference be placed with the same office for general service to all.

Through the year many meetings have been held at this central point convenient to most of our people. Again, the Board of Education extends its word of welcome to all.

Day Of Introduction

On March 12, the second day of introduction for ministers was held at the office of the Board of Education. Nine presentations were made by as many leaders concerning various phases of our work in Christian Education.

A Day Of Fellowship

On March 19, the Directors of Christian Education and Educational Assistants of our Conference area shared in a day of fellowship and inspiration. Dr. William H. R. Willkens, Professor of Christian Education, Crozer Theological Seminary, Chester, Pennsylvania; served as a resource person and spoke on the theme, "Imperatives for Directors of Christian Education."

Additional Activities

In addition to active participation in the foregoing activities, the Executive Secretary has delivered sixty-two sermons or addresses, sought to administer the business affairs of the Board, planned training opportunities with Field Workers, served with the various committees of the Board which in turn assume a large measure of the work, met with representatives of our Wesley Foundations, The Methodist Student Movement, The Baltimore Conference Board of Child Care, Trafco, Town and Country Commission, and other related interests, Committees, and Agencies. By a plan of visitation through the past two years, 70% of the Ministers and charges of our Conference have been visited.

Matters Of Urgent Concern

1) We urge the Commissions on Education in our churches to faithfully fulfill their responsibilities described in the Manual for the Commission on Education. Where Commissions are not now organized or where they exist in name only, we call upon our Ministers to give leadership to the

development of this Commission. In churches where few persons are available to discharge all functions, a charge-wide Commission may provide the necessary leadership.

- 2) We urge that in situations where Ministers are unable to observe the Church Schools on their charge that some adjustment of schedule be made to make this feasible. This report does not suggest that the Minister be required to teach but that he might know the existing circumstances better, have time to greet the people involved and give informed guidance in the affairs of the Church School. The report of the Peninsula Conference Town and Country Commission on Cecil County, Maryland, at Elkton, March 31, of this year, graphically called attention to the need for better arranged schedules in this respect.
- 3) We urge Commissions on Education in churches not using Methodist Literature to make a new study of the lesson materials, considering with open mind the valid reasons for utilizing the resources prepared by the Methodist Church for its people.
- 4) We urge support of projected plans for District-wide Christian Workers' Schools to be held in each district during the coming Conference year.
- 5) We urge a full observance of Christian Education Sunday which occurs this year on September 30, not only in the Church School but in the Worship Services of the Sanctuary. It is our hope that our Ministers will plan sermons on themes bearing significantly upon Christian nurture and that moments of dedication be provided in which the congregations and the Church School Staffs may give themselves anew to the teaching ministry.
- 6) We urge that our people be given an opportunity to make an offering for the work of Christian Education in the Peninsula Conference informing them of the work of the Board of Education and that contributions over \$6,000 are to be expended for the development of Camp PeCoMeth.
- 7) We urge every Minister to plan for a Christian Workers' School in his charge or in cooperation with neighboring charges during the coming year.
- 8) We urge the regular use of the Workers' Conference as one of the most useful means of promoting a continuous program of Christian Education within the local church.

WESLEY FOUNDATION REPORT TO THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

More Methodist Students are now attending State Universities, Teachers Colleges and Independent Colleges than are attending Methodist related Institutions of Higher Education. This trend is continuing year after year.

Six hundred and eighty Methodist students are enrolled at the University of Delaware, three hundred at the State Teachers College in Salisbury and one hundred at Washington College in Chestertown. All three Institutions

are engaged in expansion programs which will add many more Methodist Students to their rolls.

Add to the above facts, the revolving nature of the student body and the picture projection becomes clearer—in a ten year period, at the present rate, four thousand Methodist students will have been resident at the above institutions.

It has been correctly stated that the college and university campus is the greatest missionary and evangelistic field in the world today. The opportunity and obligation to provide a special ministry to these students and faculty are forcefully upon the Church. This is why Leaders in the General Church have stressed the development of the Wesley Foundation program Nationally, and why we in the Peninsula Conference are moving rapidly to serve better the Institutions of Higher Education within the bounds of our Conference Area.

The Peninsula Conference has made great strides in accepting and reaching the financial goal of fifty cents per member for the support of Wesley Foundation work. Thirty cents per member has been achieved and forty cents per member is being proposed. Significant progress has been made in expanding the program. The Wesley Foundation Unit at the University of Delaware has already reached the standards set by the Accrediting Agency of The General Church and The Wesley Foundation for Eastern Maryland is within reach of this desired end. Two significant steps were taken this year: A competent Board of Directors made up of representative people from the institutions, communities and churches of Salisbury and Chestertown was established and incorporated under the laws of Maryland; and a house to be used as both a student center and residence for a Director has been acquired. A full time qualified person is the next step which is provided for in the projected budget and plan beginning with the Conference year of 1963.

The day of experimentation is over. We now know the direction we must go: an effective fully accredited Wesley Foundation at the University of Delaware (already achieved) with some counsel and guidance given to Delaware State College; and one in Eastern Maryland with units at Washington College and the State Teachers College at Salisbury with guidance and help given to the College at Princess Anne. Wesley College in Dover is in a different relationship with the Conference and cooperates with the Methodist Student Movement through the College Chaplain.

The program concept is not to set up and provide meetings and worship services to which students are invited but to involve students themselves in planning, setting up and putting into action a variety of events including worship, study in religion, participation in the Area and National Methodist Student Movement, participation in Mission projects and working out a close relationship with at least one Church in the Community designated as the Wesley Foundation Church.

The Wesley Foundation is the Student Church on the Campus. Developing this concept of program is most difficult and takes time. It involves building good public relations with College Administration, Faculty, and student organizations. It involves inter-personal relations at many levels of college and personal life. It involves academic respect. It involves com-

petition for the students time within a self contained community crowded with multitudinous activities. It involves stubborn resistance of those whose concept of "separation of Church and State" would exclude organized religious programs as proper within the life of the Educational Institution. It involves bitter criticism and hostility of those who look upon religion as a relic of the past without any genuine relevance to life today.

Even though obstacles are many, success is being achieved in the program area. At the University of Delaware, the Wesley House is in constant use. The program had to be diversified to minister to a situation of increasing complexity. Included in the program were these features: 1. A weekly Wesley Forum series and Sunday Study Fellowship groups emphasized "The Mission of the Church To America"; Programs were based on the book, The Noise of Solemn Assemblies by Dr. Peter Berger, selected as the study book of the National Student Christian Federation. Eight clergymen, seven professors, two missionaries and a medical doctor appeared in the forum series; 2. A non-credit course in religion was offered the second semester of this year. With the co-operation of the American University, The National Award Winning Telecourse, "The Life and Teachings of Jesus" was offered to the University Community. The warm reception given indicates that non-credit courses in Bible and Religion will become a permanent feature of the program. 3. Social Service and Action is a program concern. The students expressed themselves in this area by: giving \$100. to a student mission project in Puerto Rico: giving cottage parties for children at Governor Bacon Health Center; participating in the struggle against racial discrimination: and providing worship and fellowship programs for juvenile offenders at the state detention institution.

Although not as extensive, the program at Washington College was similar to that described above. Weekly Council meetings were held at a room provided by the College. General meetings were held on alternate Sundays in the Parish House of Christ Church. Study and fellowship groups met at the home of the director. Student participation in planning and implementing programs of interest and variety was at a high level. Students participated in discussions concerning social problems and contributed time and service to projects designed to aid health charities.

The Student Group at State Teachers College in Salisbury held meetings on Thurday evenings. Good relations have been established with the Administration and Faculty. Close cooperation has been effected with The Christian Association and other Campus Groups. The emphasis this year has been to organize an effective W. F. Student Council and train this group in program planning. Great interest has been indicated in the Wesley House which should be available for use in the next school year.

All three Student Groups have participated in the M. S. M. program beyond the local campus. Nine students from the University of Delaware and seven from Washington College attended the seventh National Quadrennial of the Methodist Student Movement. Eight students from the University of Delaware and six from Washington College attended the Chesapeake Area Fall Workshop at Camp PeCoMeth. Fourteen students from the University, twelve from Washington College and six from State Teachers College are planning to attend the Area M. S. M. Spring Conference. Much student and

adult leadership for these events is provided from the Peninsula Area. Students at the above Conference have had opportunity hear such outstanding Christian personalities as Dr. Howard Kee, Dr. William F. Dunkle, Dr. Robert Hammill, Dr. Edward W. Baughman, Bishop Gerald H. Kennedy, Bishop John Wesley Lord, Dr. John Deshner and many others.

The Peninsula Conference can be justly pleased by the financial support given and the progress being made in the Wesley Foundation Movement within the Conference.

CONFERENCE EDUCATION SOCIETY

"The kind of a world one carries about in one's self is the important thing, and the world outside takes all its grace, order and value from that." Methodist Student Day is observed by our church for the purpose of enlarging this inner world of which Lowell writes.

The offering received on this day is used for college loans and scholarships for our Methodist students. In the past quadrennium 197 loans and scholarships were given to help students from our Annual Conference area.

The money you give on this day is divided on a 75-25 ratio. One quarter is sent to Nashville to be awarded by the General Board in our National Methodist Loans and Scholarships. Three quarters is given to our Conference Scholarship Committee, to which is added the investment income of the Conference Education Society. The breakdown for the quadrennium is: 55 National and 142 Conference loans and scholarships.

This year we are suggesting a \$5,000 goal for the Student Day offering. It is one easily possible to attain if every church is given an opportunity to participate. In 1960, the latest report available, only 116 of our 189 charges observed the day with an offering received:

Dover District31 of 55 charges	\$1,046.00
Easton District20 of 40 charges	674.00
Salisbury District29 of 42 charges	735.00
Wilmington District	1 401 00

With the full cooperation of our churches, we can be more significantly helpful to our youths seeking assistance.

Though more adequate financial support is the immediate and pressing need, it is not the only way you can help our students acquire a college education. The Counselors Guide to Methodist Schools and Colleges is a most helpful booklet. It should be in every minister's office. Each year we hear of our great need for ministers and workers in other church vocations. Today the market for youth is extremely competitive. Business is there seeking to win youth. It offers financial aid, guidance in school selection and course, and, at the end, a lucrative position. The church must do no less. By our failure to seek and guide and support we say by indirection, the church is not important and the Kingdom of Christ is properly relegated to the periphery of life. This cannot be said in truth. It must not be said by our lack of concern.

In summary, may we suggest six ways every minister and church can help our youth at this crucial time of life:

- 1. Order now your supplies for June 10, 1962.
- 2. Observe Methodist Student Day significantly in every church.
- 3. Prepare yourself to give guidance to families looking for a college.
- 4. Tell your high school graduates of Methodist loans and scholarships.
- 5. Urge your Secretary of Student Work (W.S.C.S.) to send the introduction cards on every new student to the campus religious director.
- 6. Report your high school seniors, and possibly your juniors, to your Quarterly Conference.

By doing these we can at least help to place Christ at the center of that "world one carries about in one's self."

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

No serious churchman needs to be reminded of the critical lag between the personnel needs of the church and our actual record of enlistment. If the church is to take full advantage of the expanding opportunities for ministry afforded today, we must do a better job.

Your Commission on Christian Vocations exists to supplement and correlate the enlistment programs of the several boards and agencies of the church confronted with personnel problems. The responsibility of this Commission has been officially described (see page 676 of the 1960 Methodist Discipline) and is summarized by Marcus J. Birrell in the booklet "The Commission on Christian Vocations in the Annual Conference" as follows:

- 1. To express and encourage devotion to the Doctrine of Christian Vocation, the Christian belief that all people are obligated to God, to dedicate their life's work to Him. This calls for a devoutly made choice, an exemplification of one's faith while at work and the use of one's job as an avenue for evangelizing for the faith.
- 2. To present the challenge of church-related vocations to the youth, students and young adults of the church.
- 3. To furnish all people in the church, confronted by the necessity of making a vocational decision, with personal guidance enabling them to know the opportunities and requirements of the occupational fields, the nature of their own talents, the needs of the world, and the way a person can receive God's guidance in making his tentative and finally definite decision.

To implement its responsibility, seven categories of work have been developed into the program of the Commission on Christian Vocations: 1) Holding conferences (such as Career Clinics and Christian Vocation Workshops) and contributing leadership and resources to meetings sponsored by others; 2) Distribution of Christian vocation materials, particularly Methodist Service Projects to assemblies of the Methodist Youth Fellowship and the Methodist Student Movement; 3) Stimulating and guiding local church

committees on Christian vocations; 4) Work of the campus; 5) Training of adult leaders in the skills requisite for adequate vocational counseling; 6) Record keeping and the follow-up of commitments; and 7) Contacts with public and private schools.

Every board and agency of the church has a vital stake in making the Commission on Christian Vocations an effective instrument in accomplishing its purpose and self-designated task. The recruitment of pastors, directors of Christian education, and ministers of music for our local churches, teachers for our colleges, ministers for our Wesley Foundations, missionaries for our frontier out-posts, staff for our hospitals and homes, chaplains for public institutions, etc. cannot be left just to the concentrated or sporadic programs of the various boards and agencies of the church. In addition to our individual concerns, we all have a mutual responsibility to promote.

Since the Commission on Christian Vocations is in essence an interboard committee, it will be only as effective as the boards and agencies which comprise its membership choose to make it. According to page 675 of the 1960 Methodist Discipline,

In each Annual Conference there shall be a Commission on Christian Vocations, composed of: a representative of the Cabinet, the executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education, the conference director of youth work, the chairman (or registrar) of the Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, the secretary of missionary personnel of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, one representative each from the Conference Boards of Hospitals and Homes, Missions, Lay Activities, Evangelism and Christian Social Concerns; one representative each from the Conference Deaconness Board and the state or regional Methodist Student Movement; and one youth under twenty-one years of age. The Cabinet or the commission may appoint other members when advisable.

We will have the human resources to pursue with vigor the great work of the church, if together we promote with determination the work of the Commission on Christian Vocations. In Christ's name we can and must.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

We have no alternative to evangelism. If we want to live as a Christian Church we must evangelize. We must be evangelists in the pulpit, and in the office. We must be evangelists at home and in school. Evangelism must be an emphasis in the Methodist Men, the Women's Society for Christian Service, the Methodist Youth Fellowship, the Church School, and in many other groups within our church. Your Conference Board of Evangelism exists to serve you and your church, in the cause of evangelism. We are dedicated to this cause and seek your prayer for God's guidance for us, and the whole work of evangelism.

What We Have Done

By the Directory of Evangelistic Personnel we have been able to assist in obtaining persons to help in the local church evangelistic programs. The Directory of Evangelistic Personnel is in the hands of our Chairman, the

Reverend Joseph Dickerson, the Conference Secretary, the Reverend William Dore, and the Recording Secretary, the Reverend Charles Covington. Through the Fall Seminars at Rock Hall and Snow Hill we were able to bring General Board personnel to give us excellent training in visitation evangelism. At the well received District Dinner meetings in Easton and Salisbury we were able to acquaint local church workers with some of the newest methods and materials for evangelism. As members of this board we have helped in preaching missions, study groups, and visitation evangelism programs. We have endeavored to keep the ministerial associations up to date respecting evangelistic materials from the General Board of Evangelism. We participated in the Inter-Board Conference meetings called by our Bishop. With the Board of Education we engaged in a plan to bring the evangelistic spirit into the Church School, and to look at the recruitment of Sunday School pupils as an evangelistic task. We have been especially interested in the local church developing groups of "The Twelve," and instituting some form of visitation evangelism for the laymen.

Our Proposed Program for the Year

Our Annual Conference Activities. Our Annual Conference Activities will include a Prayer Vigil for any one who will pray in earnest for the evangelistic mission of the Church. The Reverend Richard Gibson will be in charge. A display of evangelistic and devotional literature may be seen in the Fellowship Hall of Grace Church. The Reverend Charles Covington has arranged this material. At our morning session on Friday, the Reverend Dr. Ferd Wagner, pastor of the Nolan Memorial Methodist Church, Newport News, Virginia, will speak. Besides arranging for Dr. Wagner's presence, the Conference Board will sponsor a Dramatic Presentation by the College Players and Choir of the Wesley College on Friday night for the Conference.

Aldersgate Year. 1963 has been designated Aldersgate Year by the General Board of Evangelism. It will be the celebration of the 225th anniversary of John Wesley's Aldersgate experience. Your Conference Board will have for each person a leaflet explaining the highlights of this year as it pertains to evangelism.

Special Evangelistic Confabs. It is our plan to send several of our men to the various meetings of evangelism offered by the Church. Since the National Council of Evangelism will meet this year in Ocean City, New Jersey, many will be able to attend. All ministers are encouraged to note the dates: the week of November 26.

Fall Seminar. Building on the experience of our Fall Seminars in Rock Hall and Snow Hill we shall hold a Fall Seminar for the Dover District and the New Castle County of the Wilmington District, Friday, October 26. The Seminar will begin at 10:00 A. M. in the Middletown Church with a member of the General Board as a resource person. After a 12:30 lunch, visitation teams will go out into as large an area as possible. Details of this seminar will be in the mail to all ministers concerned.

District Dinner Meetings. A District Dinner meeting is set for November 30, 6:30 P. M., in the Wilmington Manor Methodist Church for the Wilmington District. A similar meeting is planned for the Dover District

as a follow-up to the work done in the Fall Seminar in the Middletown area. The Dinner Meetings will call the ministers and members and ex-officio members of the local church Commission on Membership and Evangelism together for an evening of inspiration and information. The hope is that through the Dinner Meetings the local church will be stimulated to participate in the Conference wide evangelism program, and to take up certain other valuable aids to evangelism for their use in the local community.

Joint Effort With The Board Of Education. Your Conference Board of Evangelism plans to participate in a joint effort with the Conference Board of Education to strengthen the Church School. Materials for study and action will be mailed to the local church in the near future.

Strengthening the Local Parish

The underlying aim of all of the Conference Board's work is to strengthen the local church work of evangelism. To this end we look for more churches to use the plan for Prayer Vigils offered by this Board. We would hope for at least one group of "The Twelve" in every church of our Conference. Laymen should be trained in each church for visitation evangelism. There is an excellent turn-over chart available, and many churches have used the chart booklet with success. Our Directory of Evangelistic Personnel is kept to help churches in need of speakers, musicians, and others with evangelistic experience. The District Secretaries of the Conference Board of Evangelism have on hand an almost unlimited amount of sample material which can be had from our General Board of Evangelism in Nashville. It is hoped that our ministers and laymen will continue to look to this literature for developing the personal and parish devotional life.

The Conference Board of Evangelism wishes to commend the many local churches of our Conference who have engaged in special evangelistic programs this past year. There have been some notable efforts made and some heartening results seen. One of the most interesting programs of evangelistic planning has been carried out in Cecil County, Maryland, on the Wilmington District. The plan calls for intensifying the evangelistic program of the county in the Fall of 1962. The plan is under the direction of the Conference Town and Country Commission and the Wilmington District Superintendent, The Reverend Jervis Cooke.

The Board proposes to study the problem of evangelism in the industrial area this year and hopes to bring some appropriate recommendation to the next Annual Conference. The Board is at present in the process of acquiring a list of Certified Evangelists of the Methodist Church from the General Board in Nashville. We hope that this will help churches seeking eminent speakers for their revival, or preaching mission type evangelism.

Special Days to Remember

Please remember these special days and put them in your calendar. Friday, October 26th, Conference Board of Evangelism Fall Seminar at Middletown Methodist Church for the Dover District and the New Castle County of the Wilmington District. Friday, November 30, Wilmington District Dinner Meeting, in Wilmington Manor.

GOODWILL INDUSTRIES OF WILMINGTON

Bishop Lord and Members of the Peninsula Conference:

In 1961, Goodwill Industries completed 40 years of continuous service in the Wilmington area. Starting its work in 1921, the Agency was the pioneer, locally, in a field of service which has grown during the years to become a large and very important concern of modern society—that of helping handicapped people to help themselves.

During Goodwill Industries' forty years of service, many hundreds of people severely handicapped by both physical and mental disabilities have found opportunities through the Agency's employment and training program, to re-establish themselves in the community as productive workers and responsible citizens. Many of these had, for all practical purposes, been discarded by industry in general as unemployable.

The year 1961, not only marked the 40th Anniversary of Goodwill Industries' service in Wilmington, it also marked, what can be considered the peak year for the organization in terms of program activities and achievements. Records for the year show a continued pattern of steady, gradual growth, characteristic of the Agency's development during the long succession of years. With continued increases and gains in material resources and operations it was possible to serve more handicapped people in 1961 than in any other previous year, and, to serve them better.

A total of 98 persons, occupationally handicapped by physical and/or mental disabilities were employed during the year as compared with a total of 85 for 1960. Needless to say, many more could have been served were it not for (1) extremely limited space facilities, and (2) because of the nature of the needs encountered. With regard to the latter reason, in the majority of cases, the need for long-term employment and related services was clearly indicated if realistic and effective results were to be obtained. The nature of the handicapping conditions encountered being such as to preclude, in many cases, a return to normal industry, turn-over in employment opportunities was very low during the year. As a result, the Agency's ability to place additional workers did not keep pace with the number of applications received.

Opportunity wages—the wages paid to handicapped workers and certainly the most tangible of the various benefits as far as the handicapped workers themselves were concerned, reached a new all-time high in 1961. \$100,500.00 went directly into the pay envelopes of handicapped workers during the year, a 9% increase over the amount expended for the same purpose in 1960.

It is interesting to note that Goodwill's handicapped workers paid out of their earnings, a total of \$13,026 to their Federal and State Governments in withholding taxes and social security payments during the year. Rather than being tax burdens, they were self-supporting tax payers.

In addition to wages, other benefits provided for the workers during 1961 included vacations and sick leave with full pay; free Life Insurance coverage without physical examinations; Christmas bonuses of a full week's pay for those having a year of service or more, and a proportional bonus for those having less than a year.

Contracts with the Veterans' Administration and the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation were continued in force during the year, providing work-adjustment training opportunities for clients of both agencies. In these areas of service particular emphasis was placed on serving the needs of the mentally ill.

With an ever increasing population of what we call today—"Our Senior Citizens" Goodwill Industries experienced in 1961 an accompanying increase in the number of applications from persons handicapped occupationally by advanced age. Service for persons handicapped by the disabilities of advanced age has long been a part of the Goodwill Industries traditional program and was continued in 1961. For the most part this service was provided for persons not having Social Security benefits.

A significant event, from Goodwill Industries' point of view occurring in 1961 was the accrediting of our local program by Goodwill Industries of America, the National Organization of which our Agency is a member. We are pleased to report, that after an intensive and detailed examination of our Agency's policies and practices with regard to organization, operations and services to handicapped people, the Agency scored well above the basic Standards as required for full accreditation. Goodwill Industries of Wilmington was among the very first in the nation to receive its Certificate of Full Accreditation.

In concluding our report for the past previous year we want to express our appreciation for every effort put forth in behalf of our Goodwill Industries' program during the period being reported. We are especially grateful to the many hundreds of friends, ministers and lay people alike, in our Peninsula Conference who supported our work and helped to make another good year of service possible. We sincerely hope that with the continued blessing of our Heavenly Father and the interest and support of our Church membership, new and larger dimensions in service for handicapped people will be possible in the days to come.

REPORT OF HISTORICAL SOCIETY

As the Historical Society closes its fifth year as an incorporated body, we are pleased to make the following report.

The restoration and care of Barratt's Chapel has required much of our attention. As funds become available, we are using them to completely restore the Chapel.

During the year, many activities have centered around the Chapel. On Sunday, November 12, 1961, we held the 177th Anniversary Service commemorating the administration of the Lord's Supper by legally recognized Methodist ministers in North America. The Reverend R. Jarvis Cooke, Superintendent of the Wilmington District, was the guest speaker.

We are pleased to report that the Chapel has been used by several fraternal orders, youth groups and college groups for worship.

We have been informed that a replica of Barratt's Chapel will be included in the historical village proposed as a part of the Methodist Center in our Nation's Capital.

Preliminary plans have been completed for the Museum and residence at Barratts. The estimated cost of construction will be \$35,000. This will include a central heating system which will heat both the Chapel and the new building. The residence and museum will be of brick construction. The museum will be constructed of fire resistant materials. The Historical Society has approved the attached plans and will proceed with construction as soon as the procedures required by the Annual Conference, as found on page 391 of the 1961 Minutes, under recommendation 3, Section b, are fulfilled.

We are interested in Methodist History throughout the Conference. All churches are encouraged to form a Committee on Records and History. (Par. 145, Section 4, of 1960 Discipline).

The Board is happy to receive materials of historical interest such as manuscripts, journals, books, letters and membership records of closed churches. Such materials will be faithfully preserved and will be available for study and research.

Suggestions are always welcomed by the Board of Directors.

HOMES FOR THE AGED

We begin this report by giving thanks to our Heavenly Father for His providence and guidance. We are also deeply grateful to our Resident Bishop John Wesley Lord and members of his cabinet for the wise counsel and many services they have rendered to The Methodist Country House, and to our fellow clergymen and the hundreds of laymen who by their concern and generous gifts of time and talents have made this ministry possible.

Finances—There is a balance due on our mortgage held by the Wilmington Savings Fund Society of \$1,377,500. Since our last pre-Confer-

ence report, this has been reduced by \$90,000. There are unpaid pledges of \$103,000 which when paid will be applied to the mortgage. Our amortization calls for the payment of approximately \$30,000 per year at this time. On this basis, the amortization is paid about three years in advance. The annual audit will be made by Isaacson, Stolper & Company after the close of our Conference Year; namely, April 30th, and the audit report will be ready for the Annual Conference Sessions.

Endowment Fund—A small sum of money is currently being deposited each month in a savings account, which monies are received from payments on mortgages held at the present by The Methodist Country House. As time goes by this fund will be gradually developed and should ultimately become a source of financial strength. Monies will ultimately be received from donors and also through the medium of wills.

New Wing-Last fall ground was broken for the construction of the new wing. Work is progressing very nicely and at this conference session our many friends are invited to inspect the same. The first floor of the wing will embody a new ground level infirmary with a separate entrance, offering an increased capacity for the care of residents who need medical attention. There will be living units on the second floor. We will be able to accept 35 additional guests. It is our plan that by the time the construction is completed the bills will have been paid in full. Up to the present our monthly bills have been paid on time, and we have no reason to doubt the faithfulness of our Heavenly Father so far as the future is concerned. We would, however, earnestly request your prayers in this matter. The long waiting list which seems to grow each week is a constant reminder of the wisdom of this further step of faith. Just recently one pastor wrote asking if we could possibly receive a very worthy couple who are members of his church. He concluded by saying, "We hope that in the not-too-distant future it will be possible to have another unit of The Country House in the southern section of our Annual Conference." Who could question the need of this additional ministry?

Benevolent Giving—We are very happy no one has ever been refused acceptance into The Methodist Country House because of their inability to meet financial requirements. We continue to care for much more than 25% of our guest capacity on what we like to call a scholarship or benevolent basis. Each month nearly \$7,000 is given in scholarships or benevolent adjustments. The question is often asked, "Where does this money come from?, How large a fund do you have?" Actually, we do not have any fund, but work on the basis of faith.

Last year with the kind cooperation of the Board of Lay Activities and the Board of Hospitals and Homes, it was hoped that the Mother's Day Offering would amount to \$25,000. As of this writing we have received only \$14,407. This was disappointing; however, we rejoice in the progress being made by the new Methodist Country House Auxiliary which was authorized by the Annual Conference. Mrs. John Wesley Lord is Honorary Chairman and Mrs. William F. Dunkle, Jr., is General Chairman. Perhaps by the time you read this report you will have received the detailed information and promotional material for the Auxiliary. Your full cooperation is earnestly solicited.

Consecration—We trust that many of our friends will be able to attend the consecration service of the new wing to be held in The Country House on Friday, September 28th, at 3 p. m., at which time Bishop John Wesley Lord will officiate.

Infirmary—Doctor John W. Barnhart who heads the Medical Department of The Country House and his staff are doing an excellent piece of work. He and his staff are extremely well liked by the residents, and they place their faith and confidence in them. In a year and seven months' time we have had only nine deaths. This is much lower than the national average, and we attribute this to the excellent mental health we have been able to create among our people. As we all recognize, good mental health lends to happier and longer life.

The Ministry of The Methodist Country House—At the very center of the ministry of The Methodist Country House is its spiritual emphasis, which centers in the Danby Memorial Chapel. As the staff and guests gather from time to time in this lovely sanctuary there is felt the presence of the Holy Spirit, faith is renewed, hearts are uplifted and joy and peace is received. In the lovely Brinton Memorial Dining Room, our guests enjoy excellent meals served in a most attractive environment. Incidentally, our Dining Room has been increased in size. The Woodcock Memorial Library, the lounge rooms, the cook nooks, game rooms, all lend to enjoyable gracious living in The Methodist Country House. There is a rather complete program planned in which the guests may or may not participate. In addition to the regular Sunday evening services at least two nights a week entertainment—concerts, music, lectures, travelogues, etc.—are held in the Danby Chapel. During the day classes in art, Bible study, current events, activities in the game rooms are among the events scheduled for the enjoyment of our guests.

The Future—With the opening of the new wing, The Country House will accommodate 200 residents. It is our sincere hope and prayer that in the not-too-distant future the mortgage will be reduced to a point where the Peninsula Annual Conference might feel justified in giving serious consideration to: (1) the construction of another unit of The Country House in the southern section of our Conference, and/or (2) the building of a nursing home. We cover your prayers in this matter.

By the time this report reaches you, The Country House will have been in operation one year and eight months. We are deeply grateful to our Heavenly Father for His faithfulness in making possible the ministry of The Methodist Country House. In just a short time the wonderful work done by our Annual Conference in the field of geriatrics is perhaps best stated by the following communique from the Reverend Doctor Olin E. Oeschger, Executive Secretary of the General Board of Hospitals and Homes:

"The General Board of Hospitals and Homes of The Methodist Church is greatly encouraged by the wide recognition that The Methodist Country House, of Wilmington, Delaware, is rapidly gaining as an excellent retirement and geriatrics facility."

"We are thrilled with the physical properties, the architectural beauty, the warmth of the decor, the modern equipment, and are especially impressed with the obvious happiness of your residents."

"Congratulations, too, upon your success in fund raising. Frankly, we were surprised and pleased to learn that you are able to add a new wing in such a short period of time, having started construction on your addition in less than a year from the time you received your first guest. The plans for the relocated Health Department, including a number of soundproof rooms, are splendid."

"Truly The Country House is an evidence of God's smile of approval upon your venture of faith. Again, our heartiest greeting to you and those who have made the ministry of The Country House possible."

We are grateful for the fine service of our Executive Director, the Reverend George H. Pigueron, Jr., and our Associate Executive Director, the Reverend William H. Owens. Through their constant labors, foresight and wise planning, The Methodist Country House is adequately and well managed. Their loyalty, their fine spirit and their many acts beyond the call of duty merit our appreciation.

We are thankful for a fine Board of Trustees, for our Honorary Trustees, for our Special Consultants and for many others who have contributed service and financial aid to The Methodist Country House.

We appreciate the fine work of our Standing Committees, and their chairmen, Mr. J. Wallace Watson, Mr. Carroll W. Griffith, and the Reverend Brooks E. Reynolds.

We are grateful for our treasurer, Mr. Ernest du Pont, Jr., who has given generously of his time, his talent and his possessions to a cause to which we believe he is so totally committed. We are indebted to our Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes, the Reverend Hartwell F. Chandler, Chairman, and to our General Board for their guidance and assistance. We wish to thank our Conference Board of Lay Activities for their promotion of the Mother's Day Offering.

We deeply appreciate the kindness of all those who have contributed to this work, whether their contribution be large or small. We likewise are mindful of the fact that this work has been undergirded by the faithful plans of many of God's people.

If you have not seen for yourself what God has made possible on the Kennett Pike, we cordially invite you to visit us during the Annual Conference Session.

REPORT 1961-62 BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

We solicit the growing support of the Christmas Offering for the Board of Child Care and the Mother's Day Offering for the Methodist Country House. As will be described in the report of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Country House, the Mother's Day Offering will come as a climax to the Annual Roll Call, which will be conducted by the Auxiliary now being formed by that Board. The Board of Hospitals and Homes, through which was initiated this activity, will continue to lend its whole-hearted support to its development. We should move upward toward the goal of \$1.00 per member to help those guests who are in financial need. We trust that every Methodist within the boundaries of The Peninsula Conference will become a paying member of this Auxiliary.

Most of our churches have elected a Hospital and Homes Steward to help promote the cause of our homes in the local churches. It is hoped that every congregation will have completed this election by the time our Conference Year is concluded. Such a person will become the liaison representative between our institutions and the local church. Those who are consecrated to God and possess His Love for this type of service should be selected. Through them it is hoped that a new interest in the Methodist Country House and the Board of Child Care may develop. Further education of and activity with these Hospital and Homes Stewards will be promoted this year by the Board of Hospitals and Homes.

Beyond these two fields we have not expanded our work. Yet we know that in the field of nursing care for the aged there is opportunity for increased effort. It is hoped, too, that sometime in the not too distant future the Peninsula Conference may be able to project the care offered our "senior citizens" to cover more of these folk who are unable to pay. What is now being done at The Country House is a glorious response to faith and devoted giving and service, but there are great needs for care yet unmet.

To sum up the report the Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Peninsula Conference urges these steps for every Methodist within its boundaries:

- 1. Pray for the work of the Board of Child Care and The Methodist Country House.
- 2. Become a member of the Auxiliary as soon as possible and promote this work among fellow-Methodists.
- 3. Give each year as much as you can to the Christmas and Mother's Day Offerings.
- 4. Visit the Country House and the Children's Center sometime during the year.
- 5. Remember these institutions in your will.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The second year of the quadrennial period 1960-64 now comes to a close. The Board of Lay Activities has made a continued effort toward a greater enlistment of the man power in the mission of the Church.

We have been seeking additional dedicated leadership in the Methodist Men's organizations, plus a strengthening of the efforts of those persons in existing positions of leadership. While the ultimate goal is a Methodist Men's group in every charge, it is our belief that those already in existence should be aggressive and actively engaged in their purpose. Four new groups have been chartered during this Conference year. Plans are being formulated to conduct a series of workshops in the four districts, to give further training to the officers of Methodist Men. This is to bring to the local level, information and knowledge gained at the National Workshop for Methodist Men, held in Chicago, Illinois, February 1962.

The Thirteenth Annual Retreat for Methodist Men was again held this year at Camp PeCoMeth, September 9 and 10th. The theme was, "Seeking Daily Christ's way of Life." Particular emphasis was placed on personal evangelism. We believe that those in attendance gained a new insight of responsibility in this area, and how each one could be a more effective witness in his daily life, for Christ and His Church

Laymen's Day was observed this year in the local churches on October 15th. The theme was, "You Shall Be My Witnesses." Reports indicate a greater participation on this occasion than in any previous years. We strongly urge the continued cooperation of pastor and layman in this effort.

The Third National Conference of Methodist Men was held at Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana, July 14-16, 1961. The theme, "Man Power With God's Power Builds The Church." A total of eighteen laymen were in attendance from our conference. Planning is already in progress for the Fourth National Conference in 1965, it is not too early for you to begin making plans to attend. You will be inspired by what you see and what you hear.

The Tenth Annual Assembly, Northeastern Jurisdiction, Board of Lay Activities was attended by seventeen persons from the Peninsula Conference. It was held in Atlantic City, N. J., October 20-22, 1961 at the Ambassador Hotel. The theme was, "Dynamic Discipleship." If you have never attended one of these assemblies, an inspirational christian experience awaits you.

The Four District Laymen's Banquets were well attended again this year. Challenging messages were heard by approximately thirteen hundred laymen. The interest displayed by the laymen in their loyal attendance and support of these affairs is encouraging.

The Board of Lay Activities continues the effort of promoting the free-will offering, in the local churches, at Christmas, for the benefit of the Board of Child Care, and the Mother's Day offering for The Methodist Country House. The reports received are encouraging toward reaching our objective of \$25,000.00 for each of these worthy causes.

During the Lenten Season the series of Communion Breakfasts were again held, and approximately twenty-six hundred laymen attended. The offering taken at these services is given directly to the Board of Child Care as a contribution from the laymen of the Peninsula Conference.

The Board of Lay Activities expresses appreciation to Bishop Lord for his enthusiastic leadership and the challenge he presents to the laymen of the local churches. We are especially grateful for the series of Interboard Schools, conducted January 7-10, 1962 under his leadership and guidance.

These schools made it possible for the local church lay leaders, chairmen of official boards and the chairmen of the five commissions to become more aware of their duties and responsibilities. Thus enabling them to better recognize the opportunities that exist in their individual churches for the advancement of God's Kingdom.

We greatly appreciate the assistance given by the District Superintendents in our efforts. Likewise our gratitude is extended to the District Lay Leaders: Dr. George V. Kirk, Dover District; Dr. Vincent O. Eareckson, Easton District; Maurice M. Hancock, Salisbury District; Thomas S. Lodge, Wilmington District. The Associate District Lay Leaders are entitled to our thanks too. Together these persons have presented the Lay Activities program in the district, county and local church level.

Finally, to each layman and minister we are grateful for the splendid spirit of cooperation that each has given, as we have labored together. As we proceed further in our efforts to enlist the man power of the local churches, for the advancement of His Kingdom, we will continue to give thanks daily, for the many blessings that have been so richly bestowed upon us all, by our Heavenly Father.

REPORT OF THE MARYLAND COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The Maryland Council of Churches, as the coordinating agency of twenty-three Denominational Judicatories in Maryland, sends greetings to this the twenty-third session of The Peninsula Annual Conference of the Methodist Church.

This Conference, with 60% of its churches in Maryland and with these churches on a predominantly Methodist Eastern Shore, is in a unique position to give leadership to the increase in ecumenical concern being shown on the Shore and throughout the state.

This leadership was evident in the programs relating to Christian Education, Social Concern, Radio and Television and the Migrant Ministry sponsored by the Council of Churches this year. In a Skill Workshop at Easton, persons from twenty-six churches of nine denominations participated. At a television study conference at Cambridge on "The Family Use of TV" another new experience was available for the concerned regarding the proper use of mass communication. Our Eastern Shore Committee, the Rev. Charles Barton as Chairman, is considering the Christian Education of mentally retarded children as a project. The Methodist produced television series "Breakthru" is being considered by the Maryland Council of Churches for placement on one of the three Baltimore stations in the near future. Cooperation with Trafco Committees will be a part of this project. Our Migrant Ministry continues to expand with the possible opening of another Child Care Center for the Choptank area this summer.

The following items are of particular interest to each of us: The development of a packet of materials on Church Related Vocations for use by

Guidance Counselors in the High Schools and "The Maryland Picture" a booklet giving population, church membership and rural development throughout the state. These will give valuable information and assistance to clergy and lay persons interested in the development of the Church in Maryland.

The concern of the Church on legislative matters is of prime importance. On such items as Problems of Illegitimacy, Place of Religion in the Public Schools, Equal Accommodations and Slot Machines, to mention a few, the Council of Churches strives to keep the churches informed and to serve as directed to bring focus on such legislative matters as may be of special interest to the body of Christians of all denominations.

These are only a few of the many relationships that the Maryland Churches of this Conference have with other denominations through the channel of your Council of Churches.

An increase in your leadership, financial support and encouragement is greatly needed in order that this work may continue to the glory of God.

Our pledge to you, a member body, is to more fully serve as the media through which our members may together more fully serve Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour.

WASHINGTON AREA METHODIST INFORMATION REPORT

This report to the Annual Conference comes from the Washington Area Commission on Public Relations and Methodist Information, of which our resident Bishop is the Chairman. The commission is composed of eleven members representing the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences.

Using the popular name of Methodist Information, offices have been established in nearly every Episcopal Area in Methodism, with a view to inincreasing public awareness of Methodist views and Methodist activities, and to acquaint Methodists and others with newsworthy events in our churches by means of press releases to the secular press and to religious publications. A special responsibility of Methodist Information in each Area is the editing of the Area News Edition which accompanies TOGETHER Magazine. The Washington Area News Edition goes with TOGETHER into more than 30,000 Methodist homes in our Area.

Plans are now being made to offer in every District of our Area, a training workshop for local church public relations committees and for editors of local church newspapers. Our churches can have a much greater impact on their communities when laymen in each church understand the resources available to them for telling the Methodist story.

The Washington Area Methodist Information office stands ready to assist you in securing deserving publicity for creative and outstanding events in local churches. Advance notice of forthcoming events ought to be sent routinely to Methodist Information. Photographs of unusual activities are easily placed in secular and religious publications.

Personal reporting and photographic coverage of events on a District or Conference-wide level can usually be arranged by advance contact with Methodist Information.

Methodism, in cooperation with the Councils of Churches, has a major contribution to make in the fields of radio and television. Station managers insist that worthwhile program material can be scheduled, but very little is being offered.

The popular Bible Telecourse by Dr. Edward Bauman of Wesley Seminary, viewed in Washington, and now in many other cities by means of Video-tape is the only religious telecast by Protestants in our Nation's capital. The situation is comparable throughout the area.

Methodist Information is cooperating with the radio and television departments of the Councils of Churches in seeking to discover personalities and program ideas which will deserve an audience. Something happening in your parish right now might be the subject of an on-the-spot report for a religious telecast. Our Church must not neglect to use the media of television which has hypnotized children, youth, and adults, despite the unwholesome diet that is often served up. Bring your own favorite ideas to Methodist Information for possible development.

From February 1, 1961 until March 1, 1962, the office of director of Methodist Information for the Washington Area was vacant, but task of editing the Together Supplement, and of putting out important news releases of Area activities was carried on capably by Mrs. Rubye Jefferson Williams, office secretary in Washington.

On March 1, 1962, the Rev. Kenneth S. Jones, a Methodist missionary on leave of absence from the Board of Missions, was appointed to be Director and he it is who brings you this report.

He will go wherever invited in search of newsworthy Methodist activities, and will help to promote projects if his services are requested.

Methodists in the Washington Area are neglecting the search for the Methodist Family of the Year. Every local church should name a family, and every District choose a Winner for entry in the national search. This one project can do a great deal to make our churches news-conscious. Every local newspaper will jump at the chance to publish a fine family picture. Methodists should count it an honor to be chosen Methodist Family of the Year

The local church that does not strive to see TOGETHER Magazine in every Methodist family is depriving its members of wholesome reading for the whole family and driving them to the newsstands where they do half as well at twice the price. We commend the All-Family plan of subscription to TOGETHER as an excellent means of increased stewardship.

We need not be ashamed of our Methodist heritage.

Use Washington Area Methodist Information services to tell the story of your faith and your service in Christ's name.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND QUALIFICATIONS

The Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications has continued to carry on its responsibilities to the Conference by examining candidates for the ministry, providing advisors and counsellors to assist them in times of stress or in the face of problems, and establishing those necessary procedures for adequate physical examinations and psychological testing.

There are several phases of the program that have proven quite successful. One is the orientation banquet held on Conference Saturday night. Attended by various leaders of the church with an outstanding speaker, this program has helped relate the candidates in a real way to the life of the Peninsula Conference.

Another area that has proven fairly successful, but needs continued emphasis and guidance is the concept of the "Pastor helper program" in which one of the senior members of the Conference, who also serves on the Board, is assigned to one of the candidates as counselor and advisor. There is much evidence that this is a necessary part of our program and must be activated to its fullest potential.

The primary concern of the Board during the balance of their quadrennium will be that of recruitment. The competitive forces of the materialistic attractions in an age that worships things rather than spiritual values tends to increase our difficulties. The recruitment committee and the Chairman of the Board attended a three day conference in Painted Post, New York, to discuss with representatives of the National Board the need for an adequate recruitment program for new ministers. The word recruitment is not pleasant in its connotations. We might better describe the program as the dynamic challenge to our youth to take upon themselves the yoke of Christ. It is pathetic to see vocational guidance programs at local high schools challenging our young people to the call of medicine, physics, chemistry and law, with no attention paid to the call of the church. It is high time that the Christian church, which has the most dramatic challenging

message of our day, learns to communicate to our young people just what the Christian ministry is all about.

The first place the church needs to be stimulated to action is in the local church. Your Board is going to make a survey of the churches of our Conference to find out how many ministers they have provided. This information will be presented at the next Annual Conference. We hope that it will not prove embarrassing to all of us. There is one fact we know before we make the survey. We are not indigenous. We look to other Conferences to help supply our ministerial needs.

We have recommended that a scholarship program be established for students entering the ministry. Certain regulations and standards will be outlined. The Board with the cooperation of the Cabinet will award these scholarships on a fair and just basis.

Nearly every Conference in Methodism has been contacted by the Board is pursuit of information relating to what other Boards of Ministerial Training and Qualifications are doing in the area of recruitment. The pile of literature is mountainous but the content can hardly be described as fabulous or earth-shaking. There is obvious need for the best techniques in communication and public relations to be established in order that our youth will feel the impact of the challenge of the gospel. The phrase Madison Avenue has lately become the symbol of the sordid and the false, but we must be careful in our often just criticism not to forget that we who have the most wonderful opportunity for service in all the world are not getting the world to hear our call. We need to have formidable displays at all Vocational Conferences that will catch the imagination of a generation that is crying for a cause. We can establish a program that will motivate our young people to the ministry if we put our minds and resources to the task. Your Board plans to make a vigorous campaign in every high school and college within our Conference boundaries.

The Board would like the name of every person in the Conference who has expressed an interest in the ministry. There will be conferences and activities involving these future members of our Conference. Please send these names to the Board Registrar.

The best laid plans of any Board or Commission have no value unless there is a determined effort in the local church to play its role in this important phase of the church's ministry. Every minister is a recruiting agent. His zeal and enthusiasm over his own ministry will enhance this "Holy Calling" for his youth.

Recommendations:

- 1. The Board recommends to the Conference that men in the Course of Study should do at least one year's work in every two years for a period of eight years. These men will be given forms designed to show annual progress. A copy will be sent to the Registrar of the Board and a copy to the District Superintendent. Failure to comply with this rule will result in the loss of license to preach.
- 2. It will be the policy of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications that we will not recommend any Local Preacher for ordination, except such persons as are appointed to serve pastoral charges.

I am sorry that my preaching mission abroad has made impossible attendance at the Annual Conference. My thoughts and prayers are with you as you make those important decisions that affect the life of our church.

COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATION OF MINISTERS' BENEFITS

Recognizing the complexity and technical nature of the various programs provided under "Ministers' Benefits", and in particular our Group Life Insurance and Medical Expense Plan, the Commission on World Service and Finance, together with the District Superintendents, appointed a five man committee to administer these programs. This committee has been charged with keeping under constant review and study the coverages and costs, enrolling eligible members, handling claims, and keeping the Commission on World Service and Finance advised of the status of the Ministers' Benefits programs.

Under the Group Life Insurance plan, which was started on May 15, 1958, the total number of ministers covered is 241, with a total insurance coverage of \$361,500. During the past Conference Year three claims were paid totaling \$4,500.

The installation of the Medical Expense Plan was completed and is now operating satisfactorily. A summary of those covered under this plan is as follows:

A study of the first eighty-four claims completed indicated that of a total incurred expense of \$30,394.20, reimbursement was made in the amount of \$21,807.83, or for $72.75\,\%$ of the total expenses incurred.

The first eighty-four claims included nine payments for maternity benefits.

The largest claim in this group was for incurred expenses of \$3,152.70. Reimbursement was made for 74.4% of this amount, or for \$2,345.78.

If the claims for hospital and surgical benefits are separated from the non-hospital and maternity claims, it was found that the total expenses incurred for hospital charges and surgical fees for sixty-six claimants totaled \$23,134.78. Reimbursement was made for \$18,884.25 or for 81.6% of the incurred expenses when a claimant was confined to a hospital.

1962

Up to the present time approximately one hundred and ten claims have been paid or are in process of being paid.

When the Medical Expense Plan certificates were mailed there was included in the envelope a mimeographed sheet outlining claim procedures. Those who are following the procedure outlined are having their claims processed quickly. It is suggested that you follow the established procedure and it will save both you and this Committee considerable time.

There is one change in procedure that is effective immediately. When emergency treatment is received as an out-patient in a hospital within twenty-four hours after an accident, and the total incurred expense does not exceed \$50, it will only be necessary for the claimant to complete his portion of the claim form and forward it to the insurance company together with the hospital bill, provided the bill states that the treatment was for an emergency as a result of an accident. It no longer will be necessary to have the attending physician complete a statement in these situations. The procedure in accordance with the foregoing will be sent to each claimant when notification of a claim is received.

The claim experience under the Medical Expense Plan has been just a trifle better than predicted when the plan was established and rates set a year ago. We must be realistic, however, in looking ahead a year or two and be prepared for rate increases if the cost of medical services increase. There is no indication of this at present under our plan, but according to economic forecasts it is a distinct possibility in the future. It is for this reason that this Committee recommended to the Commission on World Service and Finance a \$3,000 increase in the Ministers' Benefits budget for the 1963-64 Conference Year.

As a result of conservative planning of our Ministers' Benefits budget last year, and through the saving resulting from the Conference portion of the premiums for dependents and widows who did not elect coverage under the plan, we are pleased to announce that without any increase in our budget or in contributions for dependents or widows, the following changes in the Medical Expense Plan are effective as of May 15, 1962:

- The eligibility of Dependent Children is increased from age 19 to age 24, provided that the child is dependent upon his or her parent, is a full-time student in a school of higher learning, and is unmarried.
- 2. The allowable hospital room and board charges are increased from \$20 to \$21 per day.
- 3. The Maternity Benefit is increased from \$150 to \$175.
- 4. The deductible for non-hospital expenses is reduced from \$100 to \$75 for each calendar year.

For those who have incurred non-hospital expenses this calendar year but have not submitted a claim, their deductible will be the amount of eligible non-hospital expenses incurred prior to May 15, 1962, however in no event shall the deductible exceed \$100 or be less than \$75. If non-hospital expenses incurred prior to May 15, 1962 are less than \$75, benefits will commence when the total eligible expenses incurred since December 31, 1961 exceed \$75.

Because of insurance regulations, claims for non-hospital expenses already processed cannot be recomputed or adjusted.

5. For retired ministers over age 65, for wives of retired ministers over age 65, if the wife is also over age 65, and for widows over age 65, the lifetime maximum benefit is increased from \$3,000 to \$7.500.

A rider covering these changed provisions will be sent to each minister and each insured widow to be attached to their certificates. As previously stated, the changes are effective as of May 15, 1962.

We welcome constructive suggestions at any time in the area of Ministers' Benefits. Many of the foregoing changes resulted from suggestions made to this Committee by interested ministers having no connection with this Committee. We will consider and study any worthwhile ideas that are presented. You need only contact a member of this Committee to arrange for a mutually agreeable time to discuss with us your ideas and suggestions.

It is recommended that, in order for our Medical Expense Plan to have the desirable flexibility, the Conference authorize the Commission on World Service and Finance, through its appointed Committee on Administration of Ministers' Benefits consisting of a District Superintendent, two members of the Conference Board of Pensions, and two members of the Commission on World Service and Finance, to announce and make effective at once any liberalizations or improvements which such Committee deems appropriate, provided, however, that the cost of such liberalizations or improvements are within the established budget for Ministers' Benefits, and without jeopardizing the portion of the Ministers' Benefits budget necessary to pay the Group Life Insurance premiums, Ministers' Assistance, and the subsidy for Mutual Relief.

Continued study and analysis of our Ministers' Benefits program will be made, and as needs arise and as claim experience dictates we shall endeavour to make further liberalizations and improvements which we believe to be in the best interest of the majority in the group, and which can be safely handled financially within the approved budget.

Recommendation

The Committee on Administration of Ministers' Benefits, with the approval of the Commission on World Service and Finance, recommends to this Conference that the eleven retired ministers who are members of our Conference, but who are not covered under the Group Life Insurance Plan and did not receive any payment from this Conference upon their retirement, but are entitled to have \$1,000 paid by this Conference to their surviving spouse or their estate at the time of their death, be paid as follows: That in lieu of such \$1,000 payment being made at the time of their death, the Conference Treasurer shall forward to each of these gentlemen on or about June 1, 1962 a check in the amount of \$1,000 in full discharge of this future obligation of the Conference.

Strausburg It is further recommended to this Conference that the thirteen ministers who are no longer members of this Conference, but who are under appointment in other conferences and who contributed funds to Ministers' Assistance while a member of this Conference, but whose relationship with this Conference terminated prior to May 15, 1958 when the Group Life Insurance Plan was established, be reimbursed for the contributions which they made with 5% interest compounded annually from the date of their transfer until June 1, 1962 added thereto.

In studying the terms of "Plan for 'Minister's Assistance'" beginning on page 708 of the 1951 Conference Journal, it is the opinion of this Committee and the Commission on World Service and Finance that this Conference has an obligation to pay a death benefit under this plan, in accordance with its terms, to a minister who is no longer a member of this Conference. This Committee and the Commission on World Service and Finance feels, however, that those in this particular group are entitled to some refund of deposits made, if they so choose, in lieu of the future death benefit. Since the amount of refund cannot be determined actuarily, a full reimbursement of deposits made with interest added thereto is, in our opinion, a fair and reasonable consideration. It is therefore recommended that the Conference Treasurer mail to those on the attached list the amounts indicated, together with a suitable letter of explanation, on or about June 1, 1962, and that the Conference Treasurer type or print on the reverse side of each check the following:

"I, the undersigned, by endorsing this check, acknowledge reimbursement of deposits made to Peninsula Annual Conference for coverage under Ministers' Assistance, and hereby release the Peninsula Annual Conference from any future liability under the plan for Ministers' Assistance to myself, my heirs, executors, administrators or assigns."

It is recommended that the \$12,973.05 necessary to liquidate these two obligations be paid from the following funds:

BOARD OF MISSIONS REPORT TO PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE MAY, 1962

The Board of Missions has met three times during the year with splendid attendance. The Executive Committee has met the same number of times, and the officers have been in constant touch with each other and with developments that come under our work. In all of our meetings, along with other Boards and agencies of the Conference, we have been using the facilities of the Board of Education offices in Dover.

1. Cultivation

Our program began last Summer when ten delegates were sent by the Board of the Silver Bay Conference on the Christian World Mission. Plans for the year's work were worked out at this conference. The experience which we gain at this conference is extremely valuable in our preparation for the work of the Board of Missions in our Districts.

Three members of our cultivation team are new this year. The Reverend Howard Evans, on the Salisbury District, the Rev. John Simpers, Jr., on the Wilmington District, and the Rev. Richard Bailey, on the Easton District. These men, along with the Rev. John Irwin on the Dover District, have done an outstanding piece of work.

During the year the cultivation team promoted the request of Drs. Edgar and Elizabeth Miller for X-Ray equipment to be sent to Nepal. Word was received recently that the equipment has been purchased and shipped.

Our work began in the early Fall with invitations from the cabinet to present our program to the Group Quarterly and District Conferences. We were also given a part in the workshops which were held in each District.

In February Rev. H. K. Anderson of the Indian Mission in Oklahoma and Rev. Harold Diehl, representing Alaska, spent two weeks in our Conference telling of the needs in these two areas. They were well received and did a good job. By count of the District secretaries these men spoke to three thousand, one hundred and thirty-three (3,133) people, in addition to those reached by radio. Two highlights were the Youth Rally held on the Wilmington District, and the Tri-District Rally held in Centenary Church, Laurel, Delaware. Both of these meetings were well attended.

Again this year "The Christian Mission Digest" was mailed to every minister in the Conference. Copies of the Advance Special brochure were placed in the hands of pastors and key officials of every church. Every effort was made to supply all interested persons with as much literature and information as possible.

Across our Conference there is a notable increase in interest in the Advance Program. Our Conference Missionary Secretary, the Rev. Ira Doyle, with his four district secretaries have rendered a great service in this work.

2. Special Projects

At the beginning of the Conference Year, a special Urban Life Committee was appointed, with the Rev. Richard Stazesky as chairman. We were represented in February by eight delegates at the Methodist Churches' Urban Convocation in St. Louis, Mo. This was an outstanding convocation and plans are under way to increase action and study on this matter within our own Conference. We shall be cooperating closely with the Wilmington District Superintendent in the work of the church in urban areas.

3. Methodist Investment Fund

Your Conference Board of Missions calls to your attention that the Methodist Investment Fund has been created as an instrument through which Methodist organizations and individuals may invest, at a fair return and with safety, in first mortgages secured upon Methodist churches.

The Methodist Investment Fund is a non-profit corporation of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The fifteen directors of the Fund are elected by the Division of National Missions of The Methodist Church. The Division of National Missions acts as agent for the Fund in processing all mortgage papers, as custodian for all documents and legal papers, and as collector of all principal and interest payments. All expenses of the Fund are paid by the Division of National Missions.

The purpose of the Fund is to meet, at least in part, one of the very serious problems facing our denomination today—lack of adequate funds to finance the large building program now under way and projected for the future.

The loan funds of the Division of National Missions and of the various conferences are insufficient for this purpose. Based upon information furnished by the District Superintendents, it is estimated that the Division of National Missions will receive applications for mortgage loans totaling at least \$5,000,000 per year for each year of the next quadrennium. The

loan fund of the Division provides on the average \$3,000,000 per year for new loans. The purpose of The Methodist Investment Fund is to supply the additional funds needed for building purposes.

Who May Invest?

Methodist institutions—conferences, hospitals, homes, educational institutions, local churches, etc.—and individual Methodists. The minimum amount that may be invested is \$1,000. The current rate of interest is 5% per annum.

4. Church Extension

In the matter of Church Extension the Board of Missions is constantly planning and working. We cooperated very closely with the district superintendents because as close as they are to situations on their districts they can see the needs for planning and action in this field.

We can report real progress in such places as East Salisbury, Fenwick Island, Kent Island, Stanton, Ocean City, Centreville, Milton, Denton, etc. The list is long, and each place very important in the life of the Conference. If you will take the time to check our treasurer's report you will find that the great part of our budget goes into the work of church extension. On a limited budget we resort to incentive giving. We wish we could help in larger amounts. We feel we increasingly must use incentive loans. Let me say a word about two places in particular.

Last year we reported about plans for a new church in East Salisbury, Christ Methodist Church. This church now has better than one hundred members, a fifteen acre site which has been paid for by the Board of Missions, a parsonage, and building the first unit will shortly be under way. In this new Conference Year Christ Church will assume part payment on their minister's salary and part payment on some of the apportionments. We of the Board of Missions are particularly proud of this growing church in East Salisbury. We congratulate the District Superintendent, Dr. French, and the pastor, Rev. Daniel Higgins on their fine leadership.

In last year's report we mentioned the need for some Methodist work at Fenwick Island. Under the leadership of the pastor of Salem Church, Selbyville, Delaware, Rev. D. W. Baker, services were held in a tent during the Summer Sundays, and the attendance was excellent. It demonstrated to us that the Methodists needed to get to work in this coastal region. We hope plans are being readied for the construction of a chapel in Fenwick Island that will be ready this Summer. Again Mr. Baker will have charge of the pastoral activities.

In all this work of church extension we never have enough money. If this Conference ever decides to go in the matter of really raising some money, one thing that must be included is funds for church extension..

5. Recommendations

- That the month of February be designated as Missionary Cultivation Month.
- 2. That the Rev. Ira Doyle be appointed Conference Missionary secretary.

6. Conclusion

At the conclusion of my second year as president of the Conference Board of Missions, I express my sincere appreciation to the members of the Cabinet and the members of the Board for their interest, efforts and support in this very important task of the church. I ask your continued prayers and support.

REPORT OF STUDY COMMITTEE "OUR MISSION TODAY"

On appointment by Bishop John Wesley Lord, I have served this year as chairman of the Quadrennial Study Committee charged with the responsibility of rethinking the nature and validity of the missionary enterprise of The Methodist Church. Approximately fourteen ministers and laymen of our Conference comprise the Conference Committee. Our primary responsibility to date has been that of study in three areas. First, the study of The Faith That Compels Us which constitutes a search for the Biblical and Theological foundations of our mission as a Christian Church. Second, The Factors That Confront Us which requires an objective, panoramic review of the conditions in the nation and world in the midst of which we witness and serve. Third, The Frontiers That Call Us in which we are concerned with discovering areas where we sense new responsibilities to witness—any front where faith meets unbelief.

This Committee has met four times during the year. One of these meetings was a joint session with the study team members from the Baltimore and Washington Annual Conferences. The next step in our program calls for the involvement of other Boards and Agencies within our Annual Conference. Such a meeting is projected for early June. It is hoped that there will be a conference wide rally in the fall to promote this study and program.

The team members have been called to a Regional Study Conference next February in Washington, D. C., at which time plans for the church wide study will have been completed.

The final emphasis of this study will come in the spring of 1963 when the attention of the entire church will be focused upon "OUR MISSION TODAY".

This is but a progress report to indicate that your study team is at work and that plans are being made within our Annual Conference to share in the Church-wide emphasis.

THE 1961-62 REPORT OF THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

The Board of Pensions' activities during the past conference year were devoted largely to the administration of the pension fund, striving to assure our retired Ministers, their widows and children pension benefits which will compare favorably with other conferences. A fully invested position was maintained throughout the year. Considerable emphasis was placed on improving the quality of our mortgages. Under the supervision of Lionel D. Edie Company, our investment counselor, the program of common stock purchases, instituted a few years ago, has proven to be very rewarding. This will be reflected in the report of our very efficient Treasurer, Ira S. Pruitt.

We report with deep appreciation a bequest of \$7,947.36 from the Estate of Della D. Taylor. A bronze plaque, to be placed in appropriate churches, has been designed to acknowledge all previous and future legacies.

Funds to cover the cost of the plaques are being requested from the Commission on World Service and Finance.

Based on an analysis of income anticipated from all sources for the coming year and other factors involved, an increase of \$5.00 in the annuity rate to \$72.00 for the conference year 1962-63 is recommended to the Conference.

The Board greatly appreciates the fine cooperation received in the performance of our duties from Bishop Lord, our District Superintendents, and the World Service and Finance Commission. Also, I would like to express my sincere thanks to each member of our Board for their assistance and guidance during my tenure of office.

PUBLISHING INTERESTS REPORT

"The Methodist Publishing House has become one of Christendom's greatest enterprises for the production of Christian literature." Dr. John Gross, General Secretary of the Division of Higher Education, Board of Education, has this to say of the Publishing House in his recent Abington book, "The Beginnings of American Methodism."

The primary purpose of the Publishing House is to provide the Church with necessary Books, Bibles, Periodicals, Church and Church School Supplies and other materials. The Board of Publication, doing business as the Methodist Publishing House, appropriates funds annually from its net income for the benefit of the Conference Claimants and the Church. For 172 years this has been the cause for which the Publishing House has functioned, and in 1961 the publishing interests of the Church reported the most productive twelve months in its history from the standpoint of service to the Church and people.

One of the most important achievements of the year 1960-61 was the organization of the Annual Conference Committees on Publishing Interests. Dr. George Curry, Associate Publisher of the Methodist Publishing House, Nashville, Tennessee, met with us this last Conference session and again on

October 27, 1961, for the purpose of renewing interest in Christian reading with constant emphasis on good literature at Conference, District and Local Church levels. Consequently, the Publishing House Committee of our Conference requested each District Superintendent at the last District Conference to grant his District Secretary of Publishing Interests an opportunity to speak concerning content and display of sample materials published by the Methodist Publishing House.

Prompt service and delivery for mail order purposes are assured to all customers by Cokesbury under a new regional plan consisting of 6 regional centers and 15 retail stores.

Together, Methodism's family magazine with a circulation of 908,901, is designed to inform Methodists about the Methodist Church. In cooperation with the Board of Education of the Methodist Church a special issue of Together for June 1962, will be devoted to the recognition of Methodism's emphasis on Education.

Editorial work was completed on the four volume set of the Interpreter's Bible Dictionary which will be ready in October, 1962. This highly illustrated work is the first complete English Dictionary of the Bible in more than fifty years. Over 7,500 entries are defined in the four volumes.

New literature courses for Junior High Age Groups were released October, 1961. These courses, fully field experimented in actual use, have many innovations in art and design.

Eight hundred new libraries, registered in the Church Library Program during the year, bring the total to more than 8,000. The new Church Library Manual, provided free to all registered libraries, received wide acceptance.

A total of 143 million pieces of Church School literature for all ages was mailed during the year and a total of 5,300,000 books were printed and bound in the printing plants of the Publishing House.

Church Music is now on display in each of the Cokesbury stores. Both service centers and stores have wide selections of Church Music, and examination copies are available to choir directors and ministers of music.

The Methodist Publishing House exists to serve the needs of Methodism. The service of the House is geared to serve the Church of every level of its Work. Expanded services are planned for the coming years as the Methodist Church continues to spread the Word of God.

REPORT OF THE RADIO, TELEVISION AND FILM COMMISSION

The Conference Trafco has met two (2) times this past conference year and has held many Executive Committee meetings. The work of Trafco is interesting and stimulating. We feel this year, however, that Trafco has moved closer to its intended purpose and function as we seek to make it a service commission to the general church. We, the members of Trafco that

have been privileged to serve this year, are finding our work most provocative as we move into interdenominational and inter-conference cooperation. We are cognizant of the fact that if Trafco is to serve well it must seek to serve all and with all in the name and spirit of Christ our Lord.

Work Accomplished

One of the main functions this year has been a general promotion of Breakthru, the new children's TV series, produced by our church in cooperation with the United Church of Canada. The first series of thirteen (13) weeks is complete and is now being placed on TV stations in many of our larger cities, including New York City. The second series of thirteen (13) weeks will be ready for production next fall providing that ample money from the Methodist Conferences earmarked for this project continues to come in. This children's series has been highly recommended by the National Council of Churches and is being promoted by the State Council of Churches throughout the nation. Wherever the series has been used it has met with great success and acclaim both by the viewing audience and the station personnel. In our effort to acquaint Peninsula Conference with the new children's TV series, a premier showing of the Breakthru film entitled "Nightmare Chaser" was shown at a dinner meeting at Wesley College for the Conference Officers and Commission Heads and Cabinet last September.

During the year our conference Trafco cooperated with the Maryland Council of Churches by taking part in an audio-visual training school held at Cambridge, Md. In cooperation with the Delaware Council of Churches Trafco gave a luncheon for the members of the radio commission of the council and all radio station managers of Kent and Sussex Counties. We discussed ways that the church and the local station might better cooperate. As ministers we found the suggestions and criticisms from the managers in reference to the church's radio ministry stimulating and helpful.

Prospective Plans

This year at Conference on Saturday we plan to have two (2) showings of the film entitled "Patty Duke Introduces Breakthru". Members of Trafco will be on hand to explain Breakthru, to hand out free literature and to give advice regarding the local church audio-visual committee. In the fall in cooperation with the Conference Board of Education we will be responsible for the course, "The Use of Audio-Visuals in the Local Church", that will be taught with the leadership training schools on all four (4) districts. In cooperation with the Women's Society of Christian Service of Peninsula Conference we will endeavor to produce a sound 16MM film this summer and fall. It will be a promotion film about Camp PeCoMeth that can be used in all local churches. If this proves successful we then plan to do a film developed around the theme of ministerial recruitment. Several of the Trafco members will attend Lycoming College this summer for a workshop on the use of audio-visuals in the local church and will be available to speak in the local church in helping to organize audio-visual committees in the fall. In conjunction with the Baltimore Conference Trafco and the Philadelphia Conference Trafco and the Council of Churches

involved, we plan to help in the placement and promotion of Breakthru on a station in Baltimore, preferably WMAR so that Salisbury will be able to carry it, and on a station in Philadelphia. These stations cover our total conference area.

Appreciation

The members of Trafco wish to express their appreciation to the members of Peninsula Conference for the fine support that you have given us this year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

I. 1961-62 ACTIVITIES

A. Planning and Training

During the conference year the Board has met five times. All meetings have been held in the evening and at the Peninsula House in Dover. From November 1-3, ten members of the Board attended the annual Northeastern Regional Briefing Conference, which was held at Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania. In October the vice-chairman of the Division of Temperance and General Welfare attended the National Council of Churches Conference on the Church and Social Welfare at Cleveland, Ohio and in April, 1962, he attended a conference for the chairmen of this Division, which was held in Washington, D. C. The major training emphasis in the Annual Conference was carried out through the Interboard School which was held in January, 1962 on the four districts. The chairman of the Board was on the team which visited each of the districts and he had contact with commission members from about seventy churches. In addition, district workshops for the Commission on Christian Social Concerns were held at two of the district meetings. All four of the district directors have been available for personal consultation with the local church commissions on their districts.

B. Legislative Committees

The Board has two legislative committees, one for Delaware, of which the chairman is the Rev. Richard H. Bready and one for Maryland, of which the chairman is the Rev. Richard L. Hamilton. The chairmen keep abreast of the various bills before the respective State Assemblies, visit the Assemblies, enlighten the legislators as to the position of the Methodist Church on various issues, and inform the local churches of legislative matters that would be of particular interest to them. In addition to these regular duties, the chairmen and the Board also stand ready to act as resources for legislators who would care to contact them in regard to specific issues. In this respect, the chairman of the Board testified at a public hearing on a whipping post bill in the State Senate of Delaware on May 17, 1961.

C. Division of Temperance and General Welfare

A major concern of the Division has been the prison problem in the State of Delaware. The 1961 Annual Conference ordered this Board to make a study of the Delaware prison problem and to report back to the 1962 Annual Conference the results of this study. Inasmuch as this Board had neither the money, the personnel, nor the knowhow to make such a thorough study itself, it decided to utilize the results of the study made for the Governor's special committee set up to study this situation. The study has been completed but the report has not yet been published. Therefore, the Board cannot at this session of the Conference make a final report and recommendations in regard to the Delaware prison system.

Although we cannot go into specific details about the penal system of Delaware and what should be done about it, there can still be no question about the general direction of our thinking as Methodists on this problem. Several statements from "Our Theological Basis" in the "Social Creed" (Par. 2020, 1960 Dis.) are very relevant in this regard: "We believe that God is Father of all peoples and races, that Jesus Christ is His Son, that all men are brothers, and that man is of infinite worth as a child of God." "We believe that all persons have supreme value in the sight of God, and ought to be so regarded by us. We test all institutions and practices by their effect upon persons. Personality is oppressed in many parts of the world, and we seek its emancipation and those things that will enrich and redeem it. Since Jesus died for the redemption of human life, we believe we should live to help save man from sin and every influence which would harm or destroy him." As to the methods of dealing with criminals we take our lead from this statement in the "Social Creed," listed under "D. Treatment of Crime": "We stand for the application of the redemptive principle to the treatment of offenders against the law, to reform of penal and correctional methods, and to criminal court procedure. For this reason we deplore the use of capital punishment."

Knowing that nothing will be done to remedy the sad plight of correctional methods in Delaware unless there is a great deal of citizen interest and concern, the Board has given its endorsement to the "3-S Campaign" of Delaware, which is seeking to arouse general interest in this problem. The chairman of this Campaign, Dr. Russell Peterson, spoke at two meetings which the Board set up for members of the local church commissions. One was held in Wilmington on March 27, 1962 and the other in Wyoming on March 29. All the Delaware pastors and chairmen of the local church commissions on Christian Social Concerns will be kept informed on the progress of the prison study and will be advised as to how they can help to remedy the situation.

Another activity of this Division was the holding of a seminar for pastors on "Counseling the Alcoholic." Dr. C. Nelson Davis, of the Malvern Institute, Malvern, Pennsylvania, led this seminar on April 3, 1962.

Recognizing the need that many people have for personal counseling and realizing the dual facts that many of our pastors are not adequately trained to do such counseling and that other resource persons are not always readily available, the Board has begun to study the possibility of establishing a counseling center within the confines of our Annual Conference. Its

purpose would be both to train pastors in the art of counseling and at the same time provide a resource for our people where they could go when in need of counseling. This study is now being carried on in conjunction with the Baltimore Conference, with the possibility of establishing an Area Counseling Program.

D. Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs

The first major effort of this Division in 1961-62 was the conducting of the Fall MYF Conference, October 13-15, on the subject of "A Christian's Responsibility in Race Relations." About two hundred youth of our churches gave very serious attention to this question and what they can do about it in their local churches and communities.

A second very significant accomplishment was the holding of a meeting on November 4, 1961 in Easton, Maryland, of the leaders of the Delaware and Peninsula Annual Conferences. In attendance at this meeting were the two bishops of the Conferences, the eight district superintendents and sixty-three other conference leaders. The all day meeting was devoted to a consideration of what are the problems that confront us as our two conferences—at all levels—begin to work closer together and, then, what can we do to solve these problems. This meeting has already resulted in several joint undertakings of our two conferences, and it is expected that such united endeavors will increase in the coming year. This Division is working to bring about a greater working relationship between our two conferences, on conference, district and local church levels.

Thirdly, in view of threatened freedom-rides and sit-ins in our conference area over the Easter weekend and because of the general situation of race relations in this area, the Board issued for local church and local press publication a statement on the position of the Methodist Church in regard to the effort to attain equal rights for all peoples.

E. Division on Peace and World Order

The major problem confronting all mankind is that of the possibility of nuclear war. The Methodist Church is taking the lead among all churches in trying to apply the insights of the Christian faith to this universal problem. The particular program being pushed has been given the name "Race for Peace." This Division has been promoting this during the past six months, primarily through sending information in regard to the program to the pastors and local church commission chairmen.

On April 7, 1962 a "Seminar on Disarmament" was held in Dover. It was led by the Rev. Rodney Shaw of the Division of Peace and World Order of the General Board of Christian Social Concerns. He set forth the reasons for disarmament and the meaning of it and what can be done in local churches to bring about disarmament.

The Board is also pleased to be able to bring to this session of our Annual Conference Dr. Darrell Randall, associate professor at the American University School of International Affairs. His presentation will do much to enlighten us as to the perilous situation in regard to world peace and what the churches should and can do about it.

II. 1962-63 PLANS

A. Planning and Training

During the year various members of the Board will attend several regional and national conferences. These conferences are very important for the gathering of information and program ideas in regard to the work of the Board. The Board plans to stress in 1962-63 the work of the local church commission. Almost all the churches have paper commissions. It is hoped that by this time next year they can become commissions pulsating with life and vigor as they bring home to the local church its social ministry.

B. Legislative Committees

These committees will continue their previous activities. In addition, it is planned that they will issue periodic reports to the pastors and local church commission chairmen, keeping them up to date on legislative developments. This has been done sporadically in the past; we shall do it more systematically in the future.

C. Division of Temperance and General Welfare

The major emphasis of this Division will be on the problem of correction and rehabilitation. Although this is now primarily a Delaware matter, it may well prove to be of great concern in Maryland also. The Legislative Council of Maryland has submitted a report concerning the correctional system of Maryland and this may result in new legislation in regard to it.

As indicated previously, the Division is also working for the establishment of a Counseling Center in our Conference. Study, and it is hoped, action along this line will be continued.

A greater use of the excellent audio-visual materials in regard to alcohol and gambling will also be promoted. The General Board is issuing new materials on these and other subjects and we shall obtain them for use in our churches.

D. Division of Human Relations and Economic Affairs

The major thrust of the program of the General Board in 1962-63 will be on the subject of race relations. It is entitled "Helping All God's Children Travel the Freedom Road." The details of this have not yet been published, but when they are the Board will seek to promote this program, knowing that the question of race relations and human rights is one of the most pressing questions before us.

In this regard, the Board will seek to bring about a closer relationship between the local churches of the Delaware and Peninsula Annual Conferences. Our plan is to have sub-district, or even more limited types of gatherings, at which time the local churches can begin to think through more seriously about their responsibilities in this area of human relations.

The Board will be urging our local churches to become racially inclusive whenever they are located in areas where various races live. Evangelism means seeking all people for Christ, regardless of their color or race. It is encouraging to know that several of our churches now have people of other

than the white race worshiping with them regularly and, at least, one church has now received Negroes into its membership. There is hardly any area of our common life in which the church can bear a stronger witness to the love of Christ and to the nature of the new community that He came to establish than in this area of race. Prejudice, racial discrimination and segregation are not only unAmerican and undemocratic, they are above all evil and unChristian and should be fought vigorously by the Church, both within its own life and in the community as a whole.

To this end we commend to our churches and especially to their pastors and leaders the booklet We Can and We Will which deals with what a local church can do in the matter of race relations. It is available from the General Board, 100 Maryland Ave., N. E., Washington 2, D. C.

"The Board will issue annually for the next two years a progress report on the experience of our churches in regard to their efforts to make a Christian witness in the area of race relations."

E. Division of Peace and World Order

Although the major thrust of our program in 1962-63 deals with race, the major problem in the world is not race but war. We shall, therefore, give renewed emphasis to the "Race for Peace" program, especially as it has to do with disarmament. Everyone realizes how catastrophic it would be for the world to have a nuclear war, but not everyone realizes that the arms race is a danger to our national security. Everytime a new and more sensitive and complex weapon is devised, greater becomes the possibility that war may begin by accident or foolishness or misunderstanding. Bigger bombs and better missiles make broader the chances of an accidental war.

Such considerations make it imperative that this Board seek to awaken the churches of this Conference to the dangers that confront us and also to the ways in which we can do something about these dangers. The Board, therefore, will stress the study of the book None Shall Make Them Afraid by Rodney Shaw, which can be obtained from the General Board, 100 Maryland Ave., N. E., Washington 2, D. C. The Board will train teachers for this study who will in turn train local church teachers. It is already clear that in no area of this Board's responsibility can so few people do so great amount of good as in this one. We know, then, that if we can arouse a few people in the next year to think, pray, and act for peace that peace will be a more certain possibility than before.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS

- (1) The Board recommends that every local church give serious study to the two books We Can and We Will (on the local church and race) and None Shall Make Them Afraid (on world peace and disarmament).
- (2) The Board recommends that the Conference urge the Delaware State Assembly to give serious study to the forthcoming report of the Governor's committee on the correctional system to the end that the Delaware correctional system might be rescued from the abyss into which it has fallen and restored to its former prominence as a system that seeks not just to punish the offender but to rehabilitate him, to redeem him, and thus to return him to society as a constructive citizen.

- (3) The Board recommends that the Peninsula Conference urge the Assemblies of Delaware and Maryland to pass legislation that will insure equal opportunity for public accommodation (and for employment) to all people regardless of race, creed, color or national background. In particular, the Board recommends that the Conference endorse H. B. 422 before the Delaware Assembly which bill would grant such rights, and that the Conference urge Governor Tawes of Maryland to do all in his power to bring about such a voluntary granting of basic rights on the part of proprietors in that state.
- (4) The Board recommends that the Peninsula Annual Conference endorse the proposal of the Board of Christian Social Concerns to establish in the Conference a counseling center or centers for the purpose of providing for the people of our churches and communities a counseling resource and for the training of our ministers in the art of counseling.
- (5) We note with concern the rising tide of unnecessary commercialization of Sundays. The trend is toward making Sunday just another day of the week. We propose to give attention and study to this development, as a basis of further report and possible recommendation for Conference action. In the meantime we call upon our people to show by their example a concern that Sunday be kept as a day of rest and worship.

COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

The Commission on Town and Country work held three meetings during the Conference Year. At the December 5th meeting, due to the resignation of the Chairman, John W. Simpers, Jr. was elected to this Office.

We are cooperating with other Town and Country Commissions of the Northeastern Jurisdiction for the next Jurisdictional Town and Country Conference, to be held this fall in West Virginia.

Last October, three delegates from the Commission attended the Second Town and Country Convocation, sponsored by the Delaware Conference, and held in Oxford, Maryland.

Mrs. Walter B. Palmer, Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service President, was sent as our Representative to the Conference concerning "Rural Church and Community" which was held at Scarritt College, Nashville. Tennessee.

Upon request of the Superintendent of the Wilmington District at our last annual Conference, the Commission sponsored a Town and Country Convocation for our Churches in Cecil County. The Convocation, held at Elkton, Md., March 31, 1962, had a three-fold purpose: (1) to help each church to objectively evaluate itself; (2) to help each church understand its role in relation to the total County; (3) to help each church to see itself in relation to other churches in Cecil County. Several months of intensive research and study by laymen and clergy preceded the actual presentation of the factors gathered. The printed Resource Book, prepared for this meeting, will serve as a reference for many years to come. Well

qualified persons, representing the social and governmental agencies of Cecil County, spoke on their respective areas of work. The National Director of Town and Country Work for the Methodist Church, Harold S. Huff, participated in the planning of the Convocation and attended as an observer and speaker. Especially do we wish to express appreciation to the Superintendent of the Wilmington District, R. Jervis Cooke, for his cooperation and leadership throughout this Pilot project.

Evaluation meetings for laity and clergy are now in effect to process the information presented at the Convocation and to set the course of action for the future.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE, INC.

The Board of Trustees during the past year has been busy in many directions, keeping a close watch on its properties, invested capital and trust funds, and doing its utmost to use its assets to aid in the progress of the Peninsula Conference.

During the year the Board has contributed \$1,000.00 to the New Christ Church in East Salisbury, \$700.00 to Whatcoat Methodist Church in Snow Hill and \$20,000.00 from the Poole Estate toward the new Fenwick Island Memorial Chapel. The proceeds of the sale of Trinity Methodist Church, in the amount of \$300.00, were given to the Quantico Charge, Salisbury District.

The Finance Committee has kept close watch over the investments of the Board, buying and selling when necessary, always attempting to earn as much as possible within the realm of safety.

At long last the court has awarded the Board a clear title to the properties in Milton, Delaware known as Grace Methodist Church. Chancellor Seitz has ordered the occupants to leave the property by July 2nd of this year.

The properties in Middletown, Delaware, left to the Board by Mrs. Charlotte Croswell, are still involved in legal entanglement. Time will work us out of this situation.

We also wish to acknowledge receipt of the Adele O'Neill Scholarship Fund for 1962-1963 and the Scott Memorial Trust Fund for scholarships. This money has been forwarded to the proper parties to help out our young people.

There is still much to be done. Many abandoned properties remain to be disposed of, investments of previous years need to be revaluated, and prospective donors encouraged to remember the Peninsula Conference in their wills.

The members of the Board are grateful for the opportunity to serve the Conference in this capacity and pledge their continued effort to do the best possible job.

REPORT OF WESLEY COLLEGE

A young man making a report at a national meeting a few years ago, began with these words: "Be careful what you dream, for dreams do come true."

This is a good word for us to consider in reference to Wesley College. There has been a great deal of talk in recent years about the tidal wave of students, the necessity to prepare for them, and the obligation of the church to see that a fair share of them are exposed not only to learning, but to the Christian Gospel. Our church has presumed to do so through the Wesley Foundation and through the educational institutions which we sponsor. More recently, we have said that it is a necessity that the educational program offered by the church-related college must be a program of academic excellence. Not only must we recognize we have the responsibility for the large increase in people who want higher education, and not only must we see that they have the finest quality of additional program, but we must also consider our Christian witness and remember our historic emphasis of the past.

We know that learning takes place anywhere. On the campus, we provide the setting, the materials, the example, and the encouragement for learning. Many other influences affect the attitude and the personality of the student. At Wesley College there is a special interest in the young people of the Methodist churches of the Peninsula. We provide the small campus and the small community relationship and have been particularly helpful to the young person with ability, where adjustment has been slow during secondary school. We have given a more complete emphasis upon the need of the development of the whole Christian personality, but one of our great handicaps at the moment is the lack of facilities for the development of the physique and the proper setting for a wholesome social life. The fine program of religious instruction and counseling is important, but it does not replace the other needs.

At the present, we find several evidences of growth. Examination of the enrollment figures for this year shows a very desirable shift in the student body, in terms of representation of areas and religious affiliation. Not only are there more students from the Delmarva Peninsula in attendance at the college than ever before, but, more important, the percentage of students from the Conference area has increased. Last year, 134 students came from the Conference area. This year there are 237, just under half of the total student body, an increase of 79 percent in a general enrollment increase of 21 percent. There has been a 31 percent increase in the number of Methodists attending the college this year, from 147 in 1960-61, to 193 at present, and the number of Methodists from the Peninsula Conference has increased 46 percent, from 75 to 110. Five years ago, there were only 35 Methodists from the Peninsula Conference area enrolled.

These figures are significant, for they indicate that Wesley has become, in a very real sense, a Conference college, one which is supported by the Conference through its interest in its young people and which, through its student body, directly serves the Conference. This has long been the goal of the college, and it is gratifying to be able to report its achievement. The

Conference is to be congratulated not only upon its rank in per capita giving to Christian higher education, but in its orientation of its young people toward the Christian college. It is particularly encouraging to note the interest of the people called Methodists of the Peninsula Conference expressed through increased giving to the capital funds of the college.

Where great strides have been made at Wesley in the development of an adequate academic program, little has been achieved in the last year in the building of necessary facilities, though construction did begin this winter on the new dining hall-kitchen-day student rooms. Plans have been approved to erect at least the shell of the gymnasium, and if necessary, consideration will be given to the borrowing of funds to complete the gymnasium. First, the people who are interested in Wesley will be given the opportunity later this year to provide the funds for completion of this building.

The south end of the present Old Main, used for some administration and a men's dormitory, is a fire hazard. Its use for sleeping purposes must be discontinued, and application will be made to H. H. F. A. for the second of the men's dormitories. This will be financed through federal funds, its cost repaid out of student fees.

In addition, Wesley's endowment needs to be enlarged. More funds must be placed in endowment so income received may be used in the operating budget.

The cost of higher education is no more exempt from inflation than any other phase of life. Although we often think in terms of building, the most important aspect considered should be teaching. To compensate a good faculty properly and keep abreast of their cost of living, it is essential that continuing increases be made available to them. With most of the large amounts of money that have been raised going into construction, much of the increase necessary for faculty salaries has been provided from student fees. We must soon get to the place where more income can be provided for this primary responsibility. The suggestion of contributions from groups for scholarship assistance is one way; groups all over the Peninsula may assist deserving students who need financial aid for higher education by providing annual gifts of from \$200 to \$500, which will help bridge the gap between the operating cost of the school and the funds that some families have available. The other is to increase the endowment fund, which will have to be done after the basic building needs have been met.

The entire staff of the institution is to be commended for the Christian community which it provides. It is our responsibility as the patron to see that they are given the tools with which to work.

WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Bishop Lord and Members of the Conference:

St. Paul said: "Now there are varieties of gifts but the same spirit, and there are varieties of service but the same Lord, and there are varieties of working, but it is the same God who inspires them all in everyone—1 Cor. 12: 4-6. I am reminded of this scripture as I begin our WSCS report. We have varieties of gifts, services and working, but we all have a common purpose (or should have) and that is to advance the kingdom of God.

We have heard much about our quadrennial theme "Our Mission Today". We are aware of the factors that confront us and the frontiers that call us but often we are so intent on organization and promotion that we forget to put Christ at His rightful place—at the center of this work.

The faith that compels us must be strong but it can be only as strong as the Holy Spirit that dwells within us. During the past year, the need of Prayer Groups, Prayer Chains and Bible study has been stressed. We have been blessed and strengthened by Day-Apart services in the conference and the districts. The Week of Prayer and Self-Denial has helped us spiritually and has been responsible for offerings amounting to \$3,809.84. This amount was used for libraries around the world, Deaconess Retirement fund in the U. S. and work in Latin America. We cooperated with the United Church Women in the observance of the World Day of Prayer, and we cooperated with the Commission on Membership and Evangelism. A district Prayer Group has been formed that meets each month.

The theme of our program and worship material was "The Household of God". Every year our program material becomes more spiritual, inspiring and informative. That every program that is presented should be presented to the "Glory of God" is our goal. A majority of the societies are using the program and worship book. They are realizing the value of visual aid and group participation.

We are grateful for the resource material that is available to us. We are grateful to have access to the Methodist Woman, The World Outlook and the Together magazines. At the last reporting period, there were 1198 subscriptions to the Methodist Woman, 513 combinations to the Methodist Woman and the World Outlook and 56 subscriptions to the World Outlook. The sale of literature at the 1961 School of Missions amounted to \$577.48.

Twelve conference officers and secretaries, including the Secretary of the Wesleyan Service Guild, and three presidents attended the jurisdiction School of Missions and Christian Service at Dickinson College last summer. Everyone took a study course for credit, in addition to attending clinics every day, where new techniques were used in the presentation of the work of the WSCS. These women, in turn, attended the conference School of Missions and passed on to the women there the information that they had received at Dickinson. The study courses were: "The Meaning of Suffering," Sockman; "Under Orders: The Church and Public Affairs", Barnes; "Edge of the Edge", Matson; and "Land of Eldorado", Barbieri.

Ten officers and secretaries and the four district presidents will attend the Jurisdiction School of Missions at Lycoming College from June 10-15,

1962. Specialized training will be given again this year—emphasizing the work of the Secretary of Missionary Personnel and program development.

We had a good School of Missions at Wesley College July, 1961. There were 86 resident students and 12 daily commuters, with 95 of this number receiving Board of Education credit cards. There was a visitors' day when 135 women registered. There were 4 teachers, one leadership training director, 2 missionaries—one representing the home field and one from the foreign field, and 4 staff members. We had 2 official representatives from the Peninsula Conference to attend the Delaware Conference School of Missions and 2 from the Delaware Conference School of Missions attended our school. Plans are complete for our July 16-20, 1962 School of Missions.

Following the Conference School of Missions, successful Educational Seminars were held in the 4 districts. The Seminars were for the purpose of promoting missionary education and introducing the current study books, thereby providing trained leadership for local societies. As an outgrowth of these Seminars, approved study courses were taught in many local societies. There were also Officers' Training sessions held in the 4 districts, where the specialized training gained at the schools of missions was passed on to local society officers, secretaries and chairmen of committees.

The Secretary of Youth Work is the chairman of the Camp Council. Since there have been more girls apply for reservations to the Girl's School of Missions in the past than could be accommodated, it was decided to have 2 weeks in June, 1962 instead of 1 week as in the past. The school will be held at PeCoMeth, June 24-29 and July 1-6. At the school last summer, there were 119 girls, 12 counselors, 2 teachers, a registrar and an acting dean. 7 girls answered the call for full-time Christian service at the Gallilean Service. It is interesting to know that Miss Barbara Reynolds, one of our missionaries, was a graduate of this school and it was while there that she decided to become a missionary. We had a district youth secretary to attend the Regional Youth Conference at Lycoming last July. It was reported there that Peninsula Conference was low in M. Y. Fund giving. There have been meetings of the Youth Council in order to find ways to help the young people of our conference to become concerned about the Mission of the Church and about Christian vocations.

We are grateful for the privilege of supporting, through the WDCS, the Riddle Memorial Deaconess Home and the Mary Todd Gambrill Neighborhood House in Wilmington. These homes have served an average monthly attendance of 1,000 boys and girls. 31 teen-aged girls and 4 leaders, including the director and one of the teachers spent a week at PeCoMeth last July.

After careful study of the needs for more adequate facilities for the Neighborhood House in Wilmington, the Future Planning Committee of the Conference Projects recommended to the Woman's Society the purchase of the Madeley property located at Claymont St. and B St. in Wilmington. It was decided by the WSCS of the Conference that this purchase be made. This property consists of a Church, a community hall and a parsonage. With some remodeling and some renovations, these buildings will provide facilities for the Neighborhood House. The cost of Madeley property, plus the remodeling and renovations will amount to \$65,000. The Crusade for More

Adequate Facilities, which was launched November, 1961, will go to the cost. The goal of the Crusade is \$1.00 per member by May 24, 1962 for the first year. It is hoped that the property will be paid for in 4 or 5 years. We regret that Mrs. A. J. Jackson, who was the Chairman of the Future Planning Committee and who spent much time looking into this project, is leaving this Conference. We are grateful for the help that she has given to this project and for the wonderful help and inspiration that she has been to our Woman's Society and to the church as a whole. We are also grateful to Dr. Jackson for his outstanding leadership and witness.

The job of the Secretary of Missionary Personnel is to influence people to take Christ's message into our own communities and around the earth. This is a cooperative venture and needs the help and concern of all church members. Our Conference Secretary of Missionary Personnel reported that there were 31 young people in our conference who were interested in church-related vocations.

The Secretary of Student work on all levels feel a concern and responsibility for making known to today's students an understanding of the mission of the church and how they can find their place of service within the program of the church. Our Student Secretary attended the Student Conference in Baltimore last December. The Methodist Movement study book for the years was "The Noise of Solemn Assemblies" by Berger. The new frontiers in student work are international and negro students.

Our Secretary of Children's Work attended the Regional Conference of Children's Work April, 1962. The conference stressed missionary education for children, and the cooperative relationships of conference and district directors. A new curriculum for children's study is being prepared, the first quarter to begin September, 1964. The northeastern jurisdiction will hold a workshop in August for the interpretation of this new curriculum when conference children's workers will be trained.

Our Secretary of Christian Social Relations has attended and partipated in many meetings that related to her line of work. In return, she has brought much information to our conference WSCS. Work has been progressing on the correlation of the Peninsula and Delaware Conferences. Our women are showing concern for public affairs by supporting good legislation, civil rights and liberties, the United Nations, Foreign Aid, World Understanding, control of nuclear energy, disarmament and other vital issues confronting us as we seek to apply the teaching of Jesus to others of this world.

Our 4 District Presidents have been untiring in their efforts to advance our work. They and their officers, secretaries, and chairmen of committees, have been responsible for many successful meetings that have been held in districts and zones. New Societies have been organized, new members secured and visitation programs carried out that advanced our work. The Jurisdiction Vice President was the speaker at 7 meetings—4 in one district, the past fall, and the Jurisdiction Secretary of Missionary Personnel was the speaker at the Annual Meetings this spring.

A membership drive was held in the 4 districts last fall. At the present time, there are 354 local societies with 2 new societies and 2 district members. There are 23 unorganized churches. There are 21,273 Woman's Society members and 60 Wesleyan Service members, making a total of 21,333

members. We are asking pastors of unorganized churches to please help us get those respective churches organized. The conference promotion secretary would like to have the opportunity, at a time that fits in with schedules, to present to the pastors and the heads of organizations of the churches, the relationship of the WSCS to local churches.

The recording secretary compiles and has published, in a booklet form, the Annual Report of our WSCS. The Peninsula Conference News, a medium for promoting our work, is printed 3 times a year. The expense of this newspaper is taken care of by the 4 districts, and the newspapers are given to local Societies.

A Historian has completed an interesting historical book, labeled "The First Twenty Years," and has begun a second book. A Standing Rules Chairman and her committee keep our Standing Rules up-to-date and see that they agree with the official one of the Woman's Division. A Nominating Committee of five members was elected in 1961, at the same time that officers and secretaries were elected.

The total amount sent to the WDCS this past year was \$87,087.05. On the basis of Mission Pledges made by local Societies at the 4 annual District Meetings in April, our Conference Woman's Society Pledge to the work of the Woman's Division for 1962-63 is \$60,000, an increase of \$2,000 over the past year.

There are 5 organized Wesleyn Service Guilds in the Conference. A Week-end School of Missions was held following the WSCS School of Missions. The Conference Secretary is attending the Assembly Week-end.

We are supporting Miss Barbara Reynolds, Miss Ruth Reynolds and Miss Maude Goff, who are in Korea, and Miss Eunice Sluyter, who is the all-India director of literature. We shall again be supporting Miss Rosalie Jenkins after June 1st, when she will have finished her doctoral degree. Our home workers are Miss Elizabeth Dalbey, Director of the Conference Projects, Miss Myrtle Zicafoose and Mrs. Daisy Cabean.

The Conference President attended the Town and Country Conference at Scarritt College, February 5-8. Those 3 days convinced her that the church in a town or community has the responsibility to God and man of seeing that everyone in that town or community has an opportunity of becoming a follower of Christ.

The Sixth National Assembly of the WSCS which was held this week in Atlantic City, N. J. closed Friday. It was followed by a Wesleyan Service Guild Week-end. There were 2 delegates from our Conference WSCS, one delegate from each District, a WSG delegate (from the Conference) for the week-end, a college student delegate and a M.Y.F. (High School) delegate

gate. In addition to the delegates, there were several women from our Conference who were full-time visitors. In all, there were at least 250 women from our conference who attended the Assembly during the week. The theme of the Assembly was the "Church in the World". We came home convinced that as christians, it was our responsibility to dedicate ourselves to the Church in the World, beginning in our communities. Local Societies of the Peninsula Conference sent by the Conference President an Assembly offering of \$1,019.27, to be used for scholarships for deserving boys and girls, not financially able, who will enter christian vocations. The entire amount of the Assembly offerings was \$111,165.00.

The Annual Meeting of our Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service will be held in the Bethesda Church, Salisbury, Maryland, May 24th, 10.00 A. M. The evening meeting will begin at 7:30. The guest speaker in the afternoon will be Miss Marjorie Dimmitt, a missionary who for a number of years has been head of the English Department at Isabella Thoburn College. in Lucknow, India. In the evening, Bishop John Wesley Lord, resident Bishop, will be the speaker.

Our appreciation goes to you, Bishop Lord, to our four District Superintendents, our Ministers, co-workers and everyone, including our husbands, who have helped in any way to advance our work. May the Lord grant that during the year ahead, the Holy Spirit may enter our lives and that we may be witnesses, as we have never been before, of our Lord and Master.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

This Commission has continuously studied the financial aspects of our Conference during the past year and commends the support that Methodists have given their churches and in turn the support that the churches have given the Conference.

It is recommended that the basis for apportionments adopted last year and appearing on page 423 of the 1961 Journal be continued. Apportionments for the 1963-64 Conference Year shall be based on statistics appearing in the 1962 Journal, and will be forwarded to each charge prior to October 1, 1962.

Apportionments for the present year (1962-63) were forwarded to each minister prior to October 1, 1961. If a salary change has occurred since May 1, 1961 the four items based on salary must be adjusted as of the effective date of salary change.

Any surplus realized on Conference Benevolences shall be allocated to the Conference Board of Missions for Church Extension. If the budgeted amount is not realized, the deficit shall be borne by each Conference board and agency in proportion to their individual budgets.

All churches are urged to complete their five year asking for Wesley College Capital Improvement during the 1962-63 Conference Year. A complete summary of this project will be found following the statistical section of the Conference Journal.

Each of the Conference boards and agencies, with the exception of the Conference Board of Missions, are requested to transmit to the Conference Treasurer any unexpended funds at the end of a Conference Year which exceed twenty per cent $(20\,\%)$ of such board or agency's share of the Conference Benevolent Budget for the ensuing Conference Year. Such unexpended funds in excess of this twenty per cent allowance shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer prior to July 15th of each year.

A committee to administer the Ministers' Benefits program has been appointed by this Commission. This committee, known as "Committee on Administration of Ministers' Benefits", consists of Rev. R. Jervis Cooke, Superintendent, Wilmington District; Willard W. Heisler and Rev. Preston W. Spence, Chairman and Vice-chairman respectively of the Board of Pensions; Rev. Dale L. Ruth and G. S. Scarborough, Jr. members of the Commission on World Service and Finance. This committee has the duty of enrolling eligible persons, collecting and paying premiums, handling claims, keeping under constant review and study the Ministers' Assistance Plan, Group Life Insurance Plan, and the Medical Expense Plan. It is anticipated that this committee will have sufficient data compiled so that a report may be made to the Conference covering the first year under the Medical Expense Plan and recommendations in other areas as a result of material currently under study.

We have carefully studied the progress that has been made at Wesley College. The additions to the physical plant are commendable. Every individual and every church that has supported the expansion program should be proud of the results obtained to date and the work that is being done currently. The academic standards are constantly being raised. From studying information from various sources, it is the conclusion of this Commission that we have here in the Peninsula Conference one of the finest Two Year Colleges in the United States.

With the firm belief that it is the obligation of religious denominations to establish, maintain, and support strong institutions of higher learning, there is included in the Benevolent portion of the 1963-64 budget \$140,000 to be used at the discretion of the Wesley College Board of Trustees.

This same reasoning, coupled with the fact that an increasing number of our young people are enrolling at the other two Methodist educational centers in our Area, leads us to include in our Benevolent budget an unrestricted grant of \$5,000 each to American University and Western Maryland College.

The plans for the capital development of Camp Pe-Co-Meth have been studied and it is recommended that steps be taken towards transforming these plans from blueprints into realities by placing into our budget as an asking during the Conference Year 1963-64 the sum of \$50,000. The Administration of this program shall be the responsibility of the Conference Board of Education. Each charge's proportionate share of this asking shall be computed by the formula used for normal apportionments and indicated on the apportionment sheet sent to each charge.

Due to the rapidly expanding enrollment at the University of Delaware, Washington College and Salisbury State Teachers' College, it is recommended that the budget for Wesley Foundation be increased as indicated in the proposed budget. Heretofore this figure has been computed at the rate of thirty cents per member, but the increased budget is computed at the rate of forty cents per member.

After reviewing the Minimum Salary schedule we recommend that it remain unchanged.

VII MEMOIRS

HARRY V. BRANFORD

Harry V. Branford, son of John and Margaret Branford, was born at Upper Fairmount, Maryland July 25, 1888. His father had come from the Norse Land where he had learned the art of boat-building as only master craftsmen do; and Harry grew up helping him with this very creative work. His mother's people were out of the land of Joshua Thomas, The Parson of the Islands, and for generations had made their living following the sea. They were deeply religious, God-fearing people; and it is not strange that two of their three sons chose the ministry for their life work.

After leaving public schools, Harry did special work at Drew University in preparation for the ministry, and was received into membership of the former Wilmington Conference in 1926. His special gifts as a preacher were soon recognized and rewarded by his appointment to serve churches at Rehoboth Beach, Lewes and Harrington, Delaware. In Maryland, he served variously at Nanticoke, Federalsburg and Centreville; and while stationed at Kent Island his health began to fail and he was forced into retirement after thirty-one years service to his church. He spent the remaining years of his life at Rehoboth Beach where he had enjoyed an earlier pastorate, and from whence he departed this life on November 11, 1961.

Surviving him are his wife, the former Josephine M. Tyler and their two children; Josephine, a teacher in the public schools of Baltimore City, and Walter Avery Branford, professor at American University, Washington, D. C.

Funeral services were conducted from the Epworth Methodist Church in Rehoboth Beach with the Rev. Dr. Roy Lawson Tawes, district superintendent; and the Rev. Charles E. Covington, pastor, officiating. His body was laid to rest in the family plot at Rehoboth, but the memory of Harry Branford, a faithful preacher of the Gospel, a kindly servant of the church, will live on in the hearts and minds of all who knew him. Like The Big Fisherman, his early training had served him well, the spirit of the master craftsman had been well-employed, and Harry Branford had been called to other labors for his Lord.

OLIE H. CONNELLY

A little while before he died, the Rev. Olie H. Connelly completed the Memoirs of his long and fruitful life. In sending them to me, his daughter Carolyn, wrote: "I think a great deal of my father's character comes through as you read his life in his own words. The things that were really important to him are all recorded, and the fact that he lived and loved his religion comes through very clearly. I hope you will find them as interesting as I do, for in them is a true picture of a really fine man."

In The Life and Memoirs of The Rev. Olie H. Connelly, he speaks of his birth near Federalsburg, Maryland, on September 4, 1886, the son of George Walton and Amanda Parker Connelly. He received his education at Hurlock High School, and at Washington College, graduating from the latter institution in 1912. He was admitted into the membership of the old Wilmington Conference that same year, and served faithfully in the pastoral ministry until his retirement in 1959, after forty-seven years service. In June, 1912 he was married to Miss Gertrude Dempsey of Galena, Maryland, who survives him, and who now resides at their home in Ocean Grove, N. J. She had been trained in music at the Peabody Institute and he speaks warmly of their companionship which lasted for nearly a half century. They became the parents of three children, two of whom survive. Their eldest child, Walton Theodore Connelly died in 1947. Their daughters, Carolyn Harrison and Elizabeth Reasin now live near their mother in the state of New Jersey.

The Chapters on "Spiritual Experience", "The Call and Preparation For The Ministry" and "The Christian Ministry, A Great Fraternity" are most interesting. "I was converted", he says "at the age of thirteen" and then he relates, step by step, the memories and services of a good and wonderful life. His frequent reference to "the ingathering of precious souls" is a key to that life's work. "When I was ordained in the spring of 1916," he says, "I was given a text by Bishop Berry and advised to prepare and preach a sermon from it. The text was: "And they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever."—Daniel 12:3 "I prepared the sermon and preached it, using as my subject: "A Soul-Winner's Motive." It has been an inspiration to me throughout my ministry as a pastor evangelist".

Olie H. Connelly died in Ocean Grove, N. J. on July 19, 1961 after a brief illness. Funeral services were conducted in Wilmington, Delaware by the writer and Dr. Albert S. Layton, pastor of the Ocean Grove Church. His body was laid to rest on the grounds of old Ebenezer Church near Newark. The earthly life and memoirs of The Rev. Olie H. Connelly have come to a close, but as Carolyn says, "His character still comes through."

WILLIAM JAMES ENNIS

William James Ennis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Ennis, was born on April 25, 1905 in Pocomoke City, Maryland. After attending the public schools in Pocomoke, he attended Asbury College and Seminary, where he received his B. A. and B. D.

He was ordained and became a member of the Wilmington Conference in 1930. His first appointment was at Quantico, Maryland. He served there from 1930 through 1936, making many friends and building a strong church.

In the Peninsula Conference he was sent to Camden, Delaware and served for three years. Following this, he was appointed to serve the church at Selbyville. In 1944, due to failing health, Brother Ennis was forced to retire from the active ministry. During the last years of his

life he endured much pain from various allergies and a curvature of the spine.

During the years of his retirement, he lived in Camden, Delaware with his mother, who was of invaluable assistance during his active ministry, and in his years of illness.

Brother Ennis died on October 8, 1961 and was buried in Pocomoke, Maryland. He was buried October 11, 1961. His pastor conducted the funeral service. His mother and a twin brother survive.

One of the many tributes received by the mother of Brother Ennis was received from a former parishioner: "The three of us did enjoy the years he served as our pastor. It was a great privilege to have known him."

LEWIS BENJAMIN MORGAN

Lewis Benjamin Morgan was born in Seaford, Delaware on October 22, 1876, the son of William Morgan and Elizabeth Hastings, and died in retirement at his home in Middletown, Delaware on June 28, 1961. He is buried in Old St. Ann's churchyard near Middletown. Funeral services were conducted by the Reverend Arthur H. Hastings, the Reverend Tilghman Smith, and the Reverend William F. Dunkle, Jr. Mrs. Morgan, the former Annie Pusey, died a number of years before her husband, but two daughters, Mrs. Earle Hudson and Mrs. Clark Fontaine, are still living.

Brother Morgan entered the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1905 and served, among other charges, Chincoteague, Virginia; Richardson Park, Delaware, and Elkton, Maryland. After his technical retirement, he continued with unusual vigor to serve as interim pastor of Ebenezer Church in Easton, Maryland and as Minister of Visitation of Grace Church, Wilmington, Delaware.

A graduate of the Conference Academy before it became Wesley College, Brother Morgan always had the inquiring mind of a true scholar and became a well educated person indeed. His was a very high order of native intelligence and he continued all his days to read with catholicity and discernment. He possessed special graces for the pulpit ministry. His sermons were logically constructed, his voice melodious and powerful, and his preaching will long be remembered. Brother Morgan also had the gifts of a shepherding ministry. He was sensitive to the needs of people, wise in his judgments and counsels. Parishioners responded to him with affection and appreciation. But perhaps what will longest be remembered by the people to whom he ministered was the beauty and inspiration of his public prayers and the skill with which he read the Holy Scriptures in public worship. A number of his prayers have been preserved in published form and are treasured by those who have copies.

The area served by our Peninsula Conference never gave to the whole Church of Jesus Christ a more competent minister than Lewis Benjamin Morgan. We who remain rejoice in his memory and are heartened by his example.

THE REVEREND WINGATE D. SHORT

Wingate D. Short, son of Joseph Sharp Short and Minnie Caroline Collins Short, was born on a farm near Georgetown, Sussex County, Delaware, on the fifth day of June 1891. After attending grammar school and high school in the community he entered Wesley Collegiate Institute, Dover, from which he was graduated in the year 1912.

In preparation for the Christian ministry Mr. Short began his studies at Western Maryland College. During this period he served as pastor of the Faith Methodist Church in Waverly, Baltimore City, Maryland. Many friendships which he formed in these early days continued until the time of his death. After receiving the degree of Bachelor of Science from the University of Delaware he was elected to membership in the Wilmington Conference and was appointed to serve the Greenwood Charge in Delaware. This was followed by other pastorates at Charlestown, Crapo, Trappe, East New Market and Still Pond, all in the State of Maryland.

On Christmas day 1913 Wingate D. Short and Mary Eliza Taylor were united in holy matrimony at Seaford, Delaware, by the Rev. Charles E. Dryden. To this marriage, which was terminated on November 14, 1957, by the death of Mrs. Short, the following children were born: Elizabeth Kathel Short Knouse, Kathryn Jane Short and Mary Irene Short Szafran.

While pursuing his studies at the Boston University School of Theology Mr. Short served as pastor of the Cherry Valley Methodist Church, Cherry Valley, Massachusetts. His pastorate in this busy industrial city was greatly enriched by his contacts with the many cultural and national backgrounds found in his congregation. After receiving his degree in theology in June 1932, he returned to the region of his own conference and served effectively the Millington, Ridgely, St. Peters, Smith's Island, Madeley and Kenton Charges. After his retirement from the active relationship in the year 1947 he and Mrs. Short resided in Wilmington, Delaware, and affiliated with Eastlake Methodist Church.

Evangelistic zeal and the desire to be an effective pastor to his people were the two outstanding characteristics of Mr. Short's ministry. Under his leadership evangelistic services, coupled with purposeful visitation, were used to lead many persons to become followers of the Lord Jesus Christ. His words of comfort and understanding were deeply appreciated by families and individuals experiencing the sorrows and troubles of life.

Until his sudden call to be with his Lord and his loved ones, which came on July 15, 1961, his regular attendance at the services of worship and his keen interest in the varied program of Eastlake Church manifested his great love for the Master and for the church which he had served so faithfully.

Following the services at the McCrery Funeral Home in Wilmington on July 18, 1961, which were conducted by his district superintendent and pastor, the interment was made at Riverview Cemetery, Wilmington, Delaware.

ROY. T. THAWLEY

The Reverend Roy T. Thawley was born January 15th, 1893 in Denton, Maryland. He was the son of Willard A. and Alverta Jewell Thawley. Brother Thawley was educated in the Public School of Denton, The Wilmington Conference Academy, Dover, Delaware and received the Bachelor of Arts degree from Wesleyan University, Middletown, Connecticut as a member of the class of 1922. Following his graduation from Wesleyan, he entered the Hartford Theological Seminary, Hartford, Connecticut and received his degree in Theology from that institution in 1925.

While pursuing his education in Connecticut, Brother Thawley served as a student supply in churches within the bounds of the Southern New England Conference. Upon completion of his studies in preparation for the Methodist ministry he returned to his home conference in 1925 and was assigned to the Mt. Vernon charge on the Salisbury District.

Brother Thawley was received into membership in the Wilmington Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church at its session held in Grace Church, Wilmington in March of 1916 and served the following charges: Red Lion, Mt. Vernon, Port Deposit, Tilghman, Cecilton and Centreville. And in the Peninsula Conference: Selbyville, Brandywine, Wesley Dover, Union Federalsburg, Stanton and Scott. At the session of the Conference in 1957, Brother Thawley asked for and was granted the retired relation.

Brother Thawley was married on September 4th, 1918 to Miss Mary Evans of Crisfield, Maryland who shared with him the activities of the ministry and service to the church which they both so dearly loved. To these devoted people a daughter was born, who is now Mrs. William H. Brockton, Kenneth Square, Pennsylvania.

In addition to his church activities, Brother Thawley was active in several Masonic Bodies. He was a Past Commander of St. John's Commandery of Wilmington and at the time of his death was the Recorder of that organization.

About eighteen months ago Brother Thawley was stricken with a coronary condition from which he never fully recovered. Though he lived a somewhat restricted life, the strain was even then too great. During the last week in April, he was stricken with a second attack from which he never recovered. The end came on May 2nd in the Delaware Hospital in Wilmington.

Funeral Services were conducted in Grace Church, Wilmington on Monday, May 2nd by the Reverend R. Jervis Cooke assisted by the pastor. Many ministers and a host of friends were in attendance.

We who knew him best count it a great privilege to have known Roy Thawley as a minister and friend. He loved the Church and gave himself sacrificially in the promotion of its interests. Genial in manner, he had the gift of friendliness to a marked degree. He was recognized by various honors in ecclesiastical, fraternal and civic organizations because his fellows trusted him and liked him and and appreciated his ability. Sympathetic by nature, his heart was ever touched by the sorrows and sufferings of all with whom he came in contact. His words of comfort were a source of strength and consolation to the people he served.

"He was a man whose heart was good, Who walked with men who understood, His was a voice that spoke to cheer, And fell like music on the ear. His was a smile folks loved to see, His was a hand that asked no fee, For friendliness or kindness done, And now that he has journeyed on, His is a name that never ends, He leaves behind uncounted friends."

And so brave and strong when sorrow cast her mantle over him. He was an inspiration to all. His memory will ever be held most tender in the mind of the writer.

In March, 1946, at the age of 64, this wonderful woman consented to be the bride of Rev. John T. Bailey, Methodist Minister retired, who was at this time supplying Canterbury Methodist Church. Their new found happiness was to be short lived for Rev. T. Bailey was killed by an automobile as he stepped out into the highway on September 27th, 1946.

Mrs. Bailey continued to reside in Milford, Delaware until her health failed and then became a guest in Messick's Nursing Home in Harrington, Delaware where she lived until her death on December 26th, 1961. Death came at the age of 79.

In her lifetime Mrs. Bailey touched the lives of many people for good and built in the minds of those she loved lasting memorials which will only be erased when those who knew her have gone to join her in Heaven.

BERTHA BECKWITH CANNON

Bertha Beckwith Cannon, daughter of Job W. and Sarah Mowbray Beckwith, was born at Aireys, Maryland on September 5th, 1882. After seventy-nine fruitful years, she died on March 17th, 1962 in the Cambridge, Maryland Hospital, after on illness of several months. Miss Bertha, as she was most

affectionately known, confessed Christ as Savior at the age of eleven and became a member of the Friendship Church of the old Cambridge Circuit. Later, after her father's death, she and her mother moved to Cambridge and she united with Grace Church. She was graduated from Cambridge High School in June, 1901, and after that taught in the Dorchester County school system for nearly five years. I never knew a more dedicated and consecrated Christian. She was a licensed local preacher each of those years I knew her, and this was not just a title—she worked at it. Her most earnest desire was to be wanted and to be used in the work of her Lord. The last decade of her life found her teaching the Dr. Hive's Bible Class of Grace Church, Cambridge. This is a class of fifty adult ladies. It grew and prospered under her leadership. Particularly did it grow in Christian knowledge and grace. In that role as teacher Miss Bertha is most difficult to replace.

Miss Bertha as a Methodist preacher had a limited ministry so far as geographical area was concerned. Her whole world was Dorchester County of the Free State of Maryland. She went into her world and preached the saving gospel of her Lord Jesus Christ and the full evidence of it is found in the lives—the redeemed lives of a host of people.

Miss Bertha is gone now from us for a little while—but she has served her Lord well and she lives within our hearts.

She was buried in Mt. Salem cemetery in Wilmington, Delaware. A chapel service was conducted in Milford by The Reverend F. Douglas Milbury and the graveside service was conducted by The Reverend Ralph L. Minker, Jr., minister of Kingswood of Brookside Methodist Church. She is survived by a son, The Reverend Charles I. Carpenter, and a number of nieces and nephews.

MISCELLANEOUS (a) CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

- Rule 1. The Conference shall meet at 9.00 A. M. and adjourn at 12.30 P. M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.
- Rule 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.
- Rule 3. All resolutions and motions shall be in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.
- Rule 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5. The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.
- Rule 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
 - (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
 - (2) To Adjourn.
 - (3) To take a recess.
 - (4) To lay on the table.
 - (5) For the previous question.
 - (6) To postpone to a given time.
 - (7) To refer.
 - (8) To substitute.
 - (9) Amendment.
 - (10) To postpone indefinitely.

A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.

- Rule 7. When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.
- Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

- Rule 9. When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration: but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12. No member shall absent himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- Rule 15. It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.
- Rule 17. All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees, shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.
- Rule 18. No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19. These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
- Rule 20. All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Secretary not later than ten (10) days after adjournment of the Annual Session or it shall be excluded unless specific permission for further delay is granted by the Conference.
