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
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
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
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

ADDRESS: Bishop John Wesley Lord gave an address "The State of the Church."

RESOLUTION: Felton E. May presented the following:

I move that the Peninsula Annual Conference receive with deep appreciation, Bishop Lord's address for study and review as a Conference under the direction of the Program Council and cause said report to be printed and circulated to every member of the Annual Conference.

It was adopted.

PRESENTATION: Mrs. John Wesley Lord, wife of the Bishop, was presented by the Reverend O. G. Brewer and received with a standing ovation. She addressed the Conference.

After several announcements were made, the Conference adjourned to meet in Study and Review Sections at 2:00 p.m. and a closing prayer was presented by Richard C. Stazesky.

TUESDAY EVENING—MAY 30, 1972

8:00 p.m. An address was given by Dr. Eugene Smith, Executive Secretary, World Council of Churches. The music for the evening was provided by the Choir of the Whatcoat United Methodist Church, Camden, Delaware.

WEDNESDAY MORNING—MAY 31, 1972

8:45 a.m.—John Edward Jones led the conference in worship, an old-fashioned Love Feast.

9:15 a.m.—The Conference met for the second session of the Study and Review Sections.

12 noon—The conference convened for an address by Dr. Eugene Smith.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON—MAY 31, 1972

2:00 p.m.—Conference reconvened in plenary session.

CORPORATE SESSION OF WESLEY COLLEGE: Howell Wilkins chaired the session in the absence of O. H. Perry Baldwin due to illness. (The secretary was ordered to send him greetings.)

NOMINATING COMMITTEE: David W. Baker gave the report. It was accepted.

NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE: Mrs. Hicks gave the report.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Bishop Love is unable to attend the session of the Annual Conference due to ill health. The secretary was ordered to send greetings from the Conference to Bishop and Mrs. Love.

The wife of Walter H. Stone died on Tuesday, May 30, 1972. The Conference secretary was ordered to convey to him the sympathy of the Conference.

UNITED METHODIST PUBLISHING HOUSE: The Reverend Al Choin gave the report and presented Bishop John Wesley Lord a check for \$9,035.58.

PRESENTATION: John Leshan of the Board of Child Care was presented.

STUDY AND REVIEW SECTION #1: The following report was presented by the Study and Review Section #1: Education and Communication. Reports placed on Consent Calendar:

Board of Education

Drayton Manor Conference Center

Board of Trustees of Wesley College

Resolution: The following resolution was presented by David Riffe and adopted by the Conference: "As a result of the Symposium for Cooperative Efforts in Campus Ministry at the University of Delaware held November 7, 1971, an ad hoc committee was formed to prepare a proposal for a cooperative/united/ecumenical ministry for consideration by the Symposium representatives. The specific aim of this action is to provide the ground work for implementation, on a trial basis, of a cooperative ministry on this campus with the participation of the following communions: American Baptist Convention, Disciples of Christ, Episcopal Diocese of Delaware, United Presbyterian Church, United Church of Christ, and the United Methodist Church. The committee, composed of representatives from the six participating communions, has met regularly over the last three months to examine research data, interview resource persons, and discuss possible approaches to a cooperative ministry."

Although the proposal includes a short statement of goals and a philosophy of programming, the primary focus of the proposal is on structure and organization. There has been no effort to provide a common theological or philosophical basis in recognition of the desire and necessity of maintaining denominational integrity in theological terms. The keystone of the proposal lies in the organization of an interdenominational "working board" which will participate with the staff in formulation and implementation of policy and programming.

The proposal is divided into seven sections, reflecting the specific areas of discussion covered by the committee:

- 1) Statement of Goals
- 2) Philosophy of Programming
- 3) Composition of the Board
- 4) Initial Selection of the Board
- 5) Future Selection of the Board
- 6) Internal Organization of the Board
- 7) Recommendations for the Future

This proposal is viewed by the committee as a necessary first step in the creation of a cooperative ministry on this campus. Constructive criticism, objective evaluation, time and experimentation, and most of all, open honesty and sincere willingness to cooperate by all parties concerned are the ingredients necessary to bring about success in a venture of this kind. The committee wishes to express its gratitude to all those who have aided its efforts in the preparation of the following proposal.

I. Statement of Goals

Some of the proper goals of an emerging cooperative ministry are viewed as follows:

- A. Christian Life—To provide opportunities for Christian growth and development within the unique framework of university life.
 1. Provision of religious orientation for "churched" individuals.
 2. Confrontation of "unchurched" individuals with alternative Christian life styles.
- B. Christian Witness—To provide a Christian response to existing situations in the university community, and to specific issues which may arise within it.
 1. Implementation of social "action and understanding" programs
 2. Issue-oriented constructive critical participation in university life.
 3. Alliance with the university to give service to the world.
- C. Christian Interpretation—To interpret the university and the campus ministry to community churches and area congregation; to serve as a bridge or link from community churches to the campus ministry.

NOTE: The working board shall have the responsibility to elaborate further on these goals.

II. Philosophy of Programming

The actual responsibility for development of specific programs will lie with the Board and Staff. The following points indicate the committee's opinions regarding programming guidelines:

- A. Each specific program or project should be a direct response to one or more of the goals. The strength of the relationship between program and goal, and the degree to which each program contributes significantly to the achievement of a goal indicate the relative validity of the program.
- B. Each program should be subjected to periodic evaluation from both internal and external points-of-view to determine its effectiveness. That something has "always-been-done-this-way" is an invalid justification for its continuation.
- C. The key to successful programming over a long term period is flexibility. The Board and Staff must be sensitive to the constantly changing university environment. New moods and ideas on campus may require new programs.
- D. The proposal committee recommends that the Board and Staff consult the available resource data (from UMHE and other sources) relative to special programming approaches in a cooperative ministry.

III. Composition and Responsibility of the Working Board

As a "working board," this group will have the responsibility, along with the professional Staff, for formulating and implementing the governing policy and all the programs of our co-operative ministry. This is to demonstrate the unity of our faith and our concerns in working together. Its membership will reflect the various cross-sectional components of the university community as well as the six participating communions.

- A. The Board shall be composed of not more than 25 voting members, and not fewer than 18, divided among the following categories:
 - 1) Teaching faculty—Four members
 - 2) Non-teaching, administrative faculty—Two members
 - 3) Students—Four members
 - 4) Residents of the Greater Newark area—Five members
 - 5) Full-time campus Chaplains who are members of participating communions
 - 6) Local parish clergy—Three members
 - 7) Representatives of Communions not represented by chaplains (presently this would mean one member each, representing the American Baptist Convention, Disciples of Christ, and the United Church of Christ)
 - 8) The Administrative Assistant (see Recommendation A)

NOTE: It is possible that a single individual may fill more than one category, as described in Sec. A (e.g. A member of the teaching faculty who is also a resident of the Greater Newark Area).

- B. Two non-voting positions on the Board shall be reserved for liaison representatives from the Lutheran Campus Ministry and the Roman Catholic Campus Ministry—one representative from each.
- C. Within the membership described above the following denominational breakdown shall be observed:
 - 1) At least four members each, representing Episcopal, Presbyterian, and United Methodist Communions.
 - 2) At least two members each, representing American Baptist, Disciples of Christ, and United Church of Christ Communions.
- D. Seven positions on the Board are unspecified with regard to status of religious affiliation.

NOTE: The creation of a "working" Board in no way indicates the obsolescence of currently existing local boards. Such boards can, and must, remain in operation to aid in the interpretive function of a vital, on-going campus ministry. These separate, local boards will also provide additional manpower for committee work and special projects, and will function, in a sense, as "training programs" for familiarization with campus ministry prior to actual service on the Board itself.

IV. Initial Selection of the Board

- A. The initial selection of the Board shall be supervised by an ad hoc Nominating Committee composed of representatives from each of the participating communions. This committee, working with the current local boards, will collect names and screen possible nominees to the Board. (Nominees may, or may not, be persons currently serving on any local board.)
- B. The nominees will be divided, by the nominating committee, into three classes serving one, two, and three year terms from the time of initial selection. After, the initial selection of the Board all terms will be for three-year periods, thus each year there will be a one-third turnover in Board membership.
- C. The entire slate of nominees to the Board, presented by the ad hoc nominating committee, shall be elected by each of the participating communions, with the authority to elect placed with whatever group or body so designated within each of the participating communions.
- D. The proposal committee recommends that those nominated for the initial one and two year terms be chosen largely from the membership of existing local boards to enhance the new Board's familiarity with the campus ministry program already in operation on this campus.

V. Future Selection of the Board

- A. Vacancies due to completion of term (one-third of total membership each year) shall be filled in the following manner:
 - 1) Nominations shall be made by the Board itself.
 - 2) Election of the entire slate of nominees shall be ratified by each of the participating communions, using whatever method is determined by each.
- B. The proposal committee recommends that:
 - 1) No person be permitted to serve more than two consecutive three-year terms on the Board. A person may be renominated to the Board after an absence of one year off the Board.
 - 2) Student members serve one-year terms with the possibility of re-election up to the six-consecutive year limit described above.
- C. Vacancies on the Board due to resignation prior to completion of term shall be filled through appointment by the Board Chairman, subject to approval by the entire Board. Such appointments shall be only for the remainder of the unexpired term being filled.

VI. Internal Organization of the Board

A. Officers

- 1) The Board shall elect, from its members, a chairman, vice-chairman, and recording secretary.
- 2) Election to office shall be by a simple majority for a one-year term with the possibility of unlimited re-election.
- 3) After the first year of the Board's operation, the proposal committee recommends that the Chairman and Vice-chairman meet a requirement of at least one year of service on the Board prior to election.

B. Committees

There shall be four "standing" committees under the auspices of the Board. The core of each committee will be composed of Board members, but this does not rule out the opportunity to involve interested persons not on the Board itself in committee activities (particularly short-term ad hoc projects). The standing committees and their responsibilities follow:

- 1) Budget and Finance—Preparation of budget requests to be sent to the supporting communions; Development of an appropriate budget to implement the strategies and goals developed by the Board; Auditing of books; Provision for periodic review in the interest of adequate administration of the budget.
- 2) Policy and Strategy—Gathering of reports of current programs; Review of policy; Responsibility for formulation and presentation

- to the Board a long-range strategy; Review on priorities of new work and new forms of ministry.
- 3) Personnel—Development of job descriptions to include duties, responsibilities and relationships of Staff; Annual review on financial support of Staff; Review work of Staff; Provide for continuing education of Staff; Screening and nomination of new candidates to the Board.
 - 4) Interpretation—Development of interpretive materials and programs for the Newark community and for local churches; Assist in the process of continuing education concerning ministry in higher education for the Board members; work with the existing local boards in interpretation of the campus ministry to the community and local churches.

C. Committee Appointments

- 1) As part of the initial selection process, the committee chairmen and members will be appointed by the Board Chairman, in consultation with the ad hoc Nominating Committee, and subject to approval by the entire Board.
- 2) After the first year, the committee chairmen and members will be appointed by the Board Chairman, in consultation with the Personnel Committee, and subject to approval by the entire Board.

STUDY AND REVIEW SECTION #3: The following report was presented by Study and Review Section #3: Program and Ecumenical Affairs. The report of Family Life Ministries and also that of the Commission on Worship were placed on the Consent Calendar and adopted.

Report of Quadrennial Emphasis Committee was voted concurrence.

Report of Commission on Ecumenical Affairs was voted concurrence with the added statement, "The Section is extremely disappointed in the apathetic attitude of the churches of the Annual Conference concerning their response to the Study and Review of A Plan of Union.

Report of Program Council was adopted with the following change in #III Recommendations, last paragraph, last sentence to read, "Some of the following events listed separately such as the District workshops may be combined or scheduled at a later time," and the inclusion of "Detailed reports should be made by all the persons on the Conference Program Council Staff of their work and evaluation of their areas of concern to the 1973 Annual Conference."

Ronald Arms introduced the following resolution which was adopted (170 in favor and 103 opposed): In light of the Bishops Call for Peace and the Self Development of People's and the action of the 1972 General Conference, we move that our Annual Conference instruct its boards, agencies and local churches to study and act on their responsibility to be peace-makers by May 1973. To this end we ask the Annual Conference to appropriate \$5,000 to support the work of Pacem in Terris, an interfaith task force of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency, recommending their staff and program to our boards, agencies and local churches as a practical way to begin the work of peace, subject to approval of the Program Council and the Commission on Finance and Administration.

facilities and program to provide additional housing and welfare services for the aged of ethnic minority groups.

Health and Welfare Ministries: The motion "It is recommended that the Annual Conference make a decision on the receiving of Federal and/or State funds and that some agency, such as the Board of Christian Social Concerns, clarify the principle of Government aid to church institutions and submit it to the Annual Conference," was amended to read "Recommend that the Program Council be requested to study the receiving of Federal and State funds by agencies, institutions and local churches of the Conference, and make recommendations to the Annual Conference at the earliest possible date, in order that a policy in this regard may be stated as soon as possible."

Voted referral to Program Council.

Board of Christian Social Concerns: Three resolutions were presented and the following action was taken on each:

Freedom of Religion: Voted Concurrence
Conference Investment Policies: Voted Concurrence
Elimination of Racial segregation in public and Methodist schools was amended by Charles Belcher and now reads:

"The General Conference has stated that "United Methodists should insist on the elimination of racial segregation (including "de facto" segregation) in public and Methodist schools everywhere." So called "de facto" segregation in public schools is no more morally right than government enforced segregation."

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns calls upon the States of Delaware and Maryland to undertake the following actions:

1. Where severe "de facto" segregation exists between contiguous school districts, the school districts should be consolidated or their boundaries redrawn.
2. Local state tax revenues should be made available to school districts on the basis of educational need and not on the basis of the affluence of the school district.

3. Equal employment practice legislation should be extended to local school districts and should include teachers, administrators, and all other employees of the school district. Failure to comply should result in the loss of all aid until compliance has been met.
4. Schools should be located so as to serve as diverse a student population as possible.
5. Bussing over reasonable time and distances has been a part of public education for decades to provide expanded educational opportunities for those in rural and semi-rural areas and to achieve maximum and efficient utilization of school buildings in more densely settled areas with little or no adverse effect on the student. Where students are today being bussed to segregated schools, it seems illogical that they should not be bussed similar distances to integrated schools. We believe that legislation or a constitutional amendment prohibiting bussing as a means of desegregating schools would serve no useful purpose.

Resolution on Indochina: Ronald Arms introduced the following resolution on Indochina:

"In 1968 the General Conference of the United Methodist Church emphasized that the first allegiance of Christians is to God, under whose judgment the policies and actions of all nations must pass. The Church as an institution, while existing within particular nations and cultures, must constantly stress the universal values which must find expression in national policies in our day, if mankind is to survive.

This responsibility of the Church leads us to express a growing concern over the cause and consequences of United States foreign policy, especially in Southeast Asia. The rising toll of casualties among all involved, military and civilian, in the Vietnamese war and the continued division of resources from the heightend crisis in American cities continue and compound the tragic situation." (1968 General Conference Statement on Vietnam)

In 1972 the war in Indochina continues with undiminished intensity even though there are fewer U. S. casualties, increased troop withdrawal and lower draft calls.

Nevertheless, in the four years since the General Conference statement was issued, what was then an urgent priority concern has become an intolerable monstrosity. The United States Armed Forces have since then invaded Cambodia, widened the war into Laos, unleashed millions of tons of bombs over the entire area (estimate 6.4 million tons on Indochina in all, Cornell University Study), leaving more than 20 million craters in those lands, defoliating one-eighth of the acreage in South Vietnam, destroying food crops and millions of acres of valuable forest.

While it is difficult to obtain exact facts, it has been estimated that more than 450,000 Asian civilians have been killed, more than 1,000,000 wounded and upwards to 10 million people have become refugees. More than 790,000 Asian military personnel have been killed and countless have been wounded.

More than 55,000 American military personnel have been killed, more than 350,000 have been wounded and large numbers maimed for life, while thousands more have been caught in patterns of boredom, discontent, prostitution and drug addiction.

The cost of the war has denied resources desperately needed to solve high priority domestic problems and to act responsibly in aiding developing nations.

We who are American delegates to the 1972 General Conference of the United Methodist Church are therefore moved to confess our own continuing complicity in this violence and death. We have sinned against our brothers and sisters, against the earth and our Creator. We have paid our taxes without protest; we have closed our eyes to the horror of our deeds; we have driven families from their homes into endless lines tracking across the pock-marked earth.

We are exposed for caring more for the lives of Americans than Asians; and for blocking from our minds the horror of our continuing bombing.

Further, our own sons and daughters, veterans of Vietnam, others in prison and refugees from their homeland—who first sensed the magnitude of our immorality in Indochina—bear on their bodies and in their souls the wounds and scars of this hell.

God grant that we may say "yes" to his judgment upon us and our nation and that the Indochinese, and we, might be delivered out of this anguish.

We further call upon the leadership of the United States to confess that what we have done in Indochina has been a crime against humanity, and to take the following responsible steps to bring U. S. involvement in this war to a swift conclusion:

1. We call upon the President of the United States to cease immediately all bombing in Indochina.
2. We plead with the governmental leaders of Hanoi and the United States to agree immediately for the release of all prisoners of war at the earliest specified date, no later than December 31, 1972.
3. We call upon the President of the United States to proceed with the withdrawal of all U. S. military forces from Vietnam no later than December 31, 1972.
4. We call upon the Congress of the United States to cease providing any funds for the support of military activities in Vietnam no later than December 31, 1972.
5. We call upon the leadership of the United States to cease all efforts to control the results of the political settlement, leaving such political determination in the hands of the Vietnamese.
6. We declare our national intention to pay reparations to victims of the war under United Nations auspices.

Voted Concurrence.

Resolution on state lotteries: John Van Tine introduced the following resolution on state lotteries:

WHEREAS the United Methodist Church is opposed to legalized gambling for the purpose of raising state revenue,

WHEREAS state lotteries are no more than legalized gambling,

WHEREAS the legislation of the State of Maryland has passed a Constitutional Amendment approving a state lottery which goes to the voters in November,

BE IT THEREFORE, resolved that the Peninsula Annual Conference be so recorded as being opposed to state-wide lotteries and that this feeling be communicated to our many congregations in Maryland and Delaware.

For 56 Against 0 Not voting 6

Conference voted concurrence.

Resolution by the Board of Christian Social Concerns: The following resolution was introduced by the Board of Christian Social Concerns:

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns recommends that the Conference be more concerned with the role of women in the church, especially in regard to policy making positions and to encourage more women to enter the ordained ministry.

For 63 Against 0 Not voting 0

Conference voted concurrence.

The Board of Christian Social Concerns report was amended in the section Priority-Social Action, section 4, to read: Human Relations:

- A. The Board will meet with Project Equality for the purpose of evaluation of the work of Project Equality. The report of this evaluation will be made to the Program Council and to the next Annual Conference with recommendations.
- B. The Board will develop a continuing effective program, in pursuit of inclusiveness within the church, in cooperation with the Cabinet, Program Council, Director of Black Ministries and the Black Caucus.
- C. The Board will set up a committee to study the position of Women in this Conference with special emphasis in policy making roles as well as the ordained clergy.

Motion by David W. Baker: The order of the day for the report of the Board of Ministry be set for Thursday, June 1st at 11:00 a.m. This motion was passed.

Motion by W. H. Revelle, Jr.: I move that the World Service and Finance Commission be empowered and authorized to buy a residence to be used by a staff member of the Program Council. This motion was passed.

Motion by O. G. Brewer, Jr.:

WHEREAS there is a piece of property in the town of Easton, Maryland, located on the north side of Vine Street, which was purchased in 1903 by the Methodist Protestant Church for the purpose of building a church for colored people, and,

WHEREAS, there is no need for such a church since we are now an integrated church, and

WHEREAS, there is no one left who participated, as a Trustee in the purchase of this land,

THEREFORE, be it resolved that this land be declared abandoned and be sold by the Trustees of the Conference with the proceeds being divided equally, between Asbury and St. Mark's United Methodist Churches of Easton.

The motion was passed.

Motion by O. G. Brewer, Jr.:

WHEREAS, the Friendship Community Church located in Caroline County between Hyson and American Corners has not been used as a United Methodist Church or under the Pastoral care of a Minister of the Peninsula Conference for approximately 40 years; and

WHEREAS, a small group of local people have been using the facilities for approximately 16 years under a word of mouth agreement; and

WHEREAS, this local group has made extensive and valuable repairs to the facilities; and

WHEREAS, the United Methodist people of the area are more than adequately cared for by nearby United Methodist Church,

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the property be declared abandoned and be sold for \$1 by the Trustees of the Conference to the present local independent congregation.

This motion was passed.

The daily proceedings were approved as printed.

Announcements were made and the Conference was dismissed with a prayer by James Elbert.

The Conference voted concurrence.

BOARD OF THE MINISTRY REPORT: An Amendment to the report was introduced as follows:—Recruitment—paragraph #2 amended as follows: (recruit men changed to recruit clergy and chairman changed to chairperson)

"Accompanied by the chairperson of the Cabinet, visitations were made to the School of Religion at Howards University in Washington, D. C. and Garrett Seminary in Chicago, in an effort to recruit clergy for our Conference, with particular emphasis on the need for black candidates. That effort seems very favorable in long-range effects, as well as some immediate possibilities."

p. 61—Recommendations—Chairperson (instead of chairman) after the name of David W. Baker.

p. 61—Recommendations—1. Change lay delegates to lay members as follows:

"We call upon the lay members from each charge to urge the finance committee of their local churches to assume in full the amount asked below the apportionments listed "Ministerial Education Fund". Full support of this program not only provides additional Scholarship-Loan Funds for our local Conference but supports the three Theological Schools within our jurisdiction."

p. 61—Recommendations—2. Change delegate to member as follows:

"We call attention to the lay members and the lay leader of each charge to put paragraph 355 of Book of the Discipline into operation by including a line item in the local budget for Continuing Education."

The amendment was amended by Jean T. Fleming to delete the use of Chairperson as a substitute for Chairman. The Amendment passed.

The main amendment was then adopted.

The Study and Review Section #4 then introduced the following recommendations: We recommend that the Annual Conference direct the Board of the Ministry to reconsider the mandatory nature of #3 under Psychological Testing in regard to the candidate's spouse, and that it give full explanation for the program.

COMPOSITE REPORT—1972

Bishop Lord, members of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and Christian Friends:

There are many pressures being brought to bear on the Christian Church today. The Christian Church is being beset on every side by a number of pressure groups, each seeking its own peculiar brand of power. There are groups seeking "Youth Power", "Woman Power", "Indian Power", "Black Power", "White Power", and what some people call "People Power".

The recent General Conference of the United Methodist Church found itself besieged by Blacks, White, Indians, Asian Americans, Women, Youth, Seminarians, and a host of other groups, seeking their own interests.

A recent survey conducted by Dr. Virgil Sexton, Associate General Secretary for planning, for the United Methodist Program Council, pointed out the fact that the local church is seeking more power. Power in relationship to the Annual Conference, as well as the General Conference.

"The Name of the Game" seems to be "POWER" in the day in which we live. There seems to be a constant struggle for power on the international, national, state and local scale.

Power, in itself, is not bad. It is only when Power is misused that it can be termed evil. When power is used correctly, it tends to achieve a goal that is in the best interest of all concerned.

It seems a pity that so many pressure groups seem to be interested in their own goals only, and not the needs and interests of the Christian Church as a whole.

After the resurrection of Christ, the disciples lost their source of inspiration and unity, and became separate entities. Many went back to their old walks of life. Others went on to do their own things. But when they met together in the Upper Room; put aside all their differences; concentrated upon the things that bound them together, the Power of the Holy Spirit descended upon them, and thus began the Christian Church.

The Peninsula Annual Conference has tried to concentrate on the things that unite us, and has tried to hear what the local churches are saying.

Listening sessions were held on each of the four districts. These listening sessions pointed up the fact that the main concern of the local churches was the strengthening of the local church. This concern was expressed in different ways, but the concern was expressed in different ways, but the concern was the same.

How can we strengthen the local church? Will new buildings do it? Will a change in pastors produce the desired results? Will new modes of worship bring about the desired goal? All these things may help, but the obvious answer to all these questions is that these things alone will not do the task of strengthening the local church.

If the local church is to be strengthened, it must be done by the members of the local church, at the local church level. Neither the General Conference, nor the Annual Conference can strengthen the local church if it does not want to be strengthened.

The desire for the local church to be the Community of Christians, must come from the local church itself. Once this desire has been established, there are any number of ways that the local church can be strengthened.

One way that the Conference has tried to strengthen the local church has been to attempt to make sure that every local church, no matter how small, has the opportunity to share under the umbrella of a "full service church". A full service church might be defined as a church that provides all facets of opportunities for Christian service and growth. A church that is not a part of a full service church, no matter what the size of the church, is not living up to what is expected of a Christian Church.

If a church is to be strong, it must be concerned about the "larger church" i.e. the church beyond its boundaries of walls, community, state or nation.

The Conference has encouraged missionary studies and projects, from the local community to every corner of the earth.

A church whose **only** concern is to strengthen itself is not following the principles of Christianity. The early church was a missionary church; a church that gave service to God, the community, and the world.

Workshops on the function of the Commission on Christian Social Concerns have been held on each district, in the attempt to get the chairmen of the Work Areas of Christian Social Concerns in the local church acquainted with their responsibilities, and to help them see the many opportunities of service that present themselves to the local church.

Resource teams have been made available to every local church in order to help them organize their Councils on Ministries, and to function as a Council on Ministries should function.

A Parish Study Task Force, composed of people from each of the four districts has been studying the different types of parishes. It is hoped that the Task Force will be available to help the local church become aware of these different types of parishes, and will serve as a resource group to help the local churches as they discuss what system would best suit their particular situation.

C.O.C.U. study sessions were held on each district with leadership being provided by the Conference Commission on Ecumenical Affairs.

A Workshop on Racial Ministries was held at Drayton Manor, with pastors of both races involved in a rather intense meeting of the hearts and minds, in an attempt to get to know each other better, and to know each other's situation better.

The Negro College Advance Program has been presented to all four districts. Some have held dinner meetings, while others have presented other types of programs, but the program has been presented, and the response has been heartening.

The Conference Cabinet has tried to execute all of its duties and responsibilities in a Christian manner. We have not been able to please everyone, but we have tried to carry out our duties and responsibilities, and more importantly, to please God. The task has not been easy, but things that are worthwhile rarely, if ever, come easily.

The Cabinet has worked harmoniously in the attempt to do its work. The District Superintendents have cooperated, in every way possible, with all the Boards and Agencies of the Annual Conference, in addition to the districts, and the local churches.

They have been most anxious to be of service and of help to all concerned.

As a team, we commit ourselves anew to the ongoing of God's Kingdom in the Peninsula Annual Conference.

In behalf of the entire Cabinet, I would like to express our deep love of, and appreciation for Bishop and Mrs. John Wesley Lord, and for what they have meant to the Peninsula Conference, and to the entire United Methodist Church. They have left an indelible mark on our Conference, and we are eternally indebted to them for their leadership, guidance, graciousness, thoughtfulness, and genuine Christian concern.

We wish them God's continued blessings as they continue their Christian ministry in another area of Christian concern.

DOVER DISTRICT

G. WAYNE CUFF, District Superintendent

On behalf of the ministers and laymen of the Dover District, I am privileged to make the following report:

Sickness:

Sickness has again plagued the parsonage families of the Dover District. It has invaded seventeen ministerial homes during the course of the year, as well as the homes of many of our fine laymen. I am happy to report, however, that for the most part, all of the people are now well, or on the road to recovery.

Births, Weddings and Deaths:

There have been three births, three weddings, and two deaths this Conference year on the Dover District.

Daughters were born to Rev. and Mrs. Harry Bradford, and Rev. and Mrs. Robert Lee Harris, while a son was born to Rev. and Mrs. Charles W. Walz.

Calvin Byrd and Marie Boyer were united in Holy Wedlock on September 1, 1971; the first ones to take the plunge on the District during the year. This wedding was followed closely by the wedding of Donald O. Clendaniel, II, and Ann Elizabeth Reed who took their vows on December 18, 1971. A short time later, on March 3, 1972, Jacob Caulk and Marian Bungy were united in marriage.

Mrs. Evelyn Reynolds, wife of Paul Reynolds, retired United Methodist minister, and Dr. John Trader, a retired United Methodist minister, have both gone on to receive their Heavenly reward.

Buildings and Improvements:

Goshen United Methodist Church in Milton dedicated its new church building during the year, and is now laying plans for an Education Building.

Bethel United Methodist Church in Lewes dedicated its Education Building this year, as did the Wyoming United Methodist Church in Wyoming.

Cannon United Methodist Church in Cannon is completing its new Education Building now.

Many other charges have made extensive renovations to their church properties, and others are at different stages of preparation for new buildings.

Increases in Pastor's Salary and Travel:

Most of the churches on the District have met the standards set by the Conference for pastor's salary and travel, and the rest are planning to do so in the very near future. On the whole the salaries of the churches on the Dover District are competitive.

Other Pertinent Information:

A number of realignments have taken place over the last few years, and all seem to be doing well. Notable among these are the Camden-Woodside Charge, and the Lincoln-Milford-Harrington charge. Other realignments are being made this year, and it is hoped that they will work equally as well.

The Low Income Housing Program at Whatcoat United Methodist Church in Dover is just about finished, and the first tenants should be in the apartments by the time that this is printed in the Conference Journal. The Charge is now completing plans for a new sanctuary.

Epworth United Methodist Church in Rehoboth Beach is making plans for a much needed education building.

This has been a most trying, but a fruitful year for the Dover District. There have been problems, and there will always be problems, but we will continue to seek solutions to the problems together; and, the Lord being our helper and guiding us, we shall overcome all these problems.

Much has been accomplished, but there is much more to be accomplished. Working together, as directed by God, I feel confident that we can do all that God would have us do.

EASTON DISTRICT

OTHO G. BREWER, JR., District Superintendent

The Easton District is committed to the idea that our main reason for being as a District is to strengthen the local church. The local church is where the action takes place, if there is to be any action at all.

I shall briefly list four ways in which this is being done.

1. **Realignments**—Fifteen charges or almost 25% of those on the District have been realigned over the past three years. We have stopped the old idea of stringing a series of small weak churches together and are instead making combinations in which strong churches assist small churches. This has resulted in better pastoral and lay leadership at less cost which is a combination that is hard to beat. In every case, this has been done voluntarily after much consultation with the churches involved.
2. **Pastoral Support**—We have already broken the old idea of leaving the salary the same year after year and simply changing pastors every two or three years. Continually moving of pastors is one of the quickest ways to kill a church. This is why salary raises have taken place in almost every charge on the Easton District and stability and permanent growth is beginning in almost every church.
3. **Apportionments**—We again led the Conference in meeting this obligation. I believe this is partly due to a better understanding to the fact that basically our apportionments go to people and not that impersonal, far-removed organization known as "the conference". I also believe it is partly due to our Eastern Shore pride—meeting one's financial obligation and not to be " beholden " to anyone. I predict that at least three of the five counties in the Easton District will be 100% counties this year.
4. **Evangelism**—This is the best sign of all in the strengthening of the local church. I can see evidences of spiritual growth all over the District. I believe the basic groundwork for evangelism is taking place and will come to a climax in the Key 73 thrust.

I wish to express my deep appreciation to my brother ministers and to the laity for their cordial welcome and kindest cooperation everywhere.

A special word of appreciation to Bishop and Mrs. Lord. They are the embodiment of kindness and courtesy and have a warm spot in our hearts and in the hearts of the United Methodist of the Easton District.

SALISBURY DISTRICT

DALE L. RUTH, District Superintendent

On behalf of the ministers and churches of the Salisbury District, I present this report and in appreciation to those who have served in churches as pastors and lay persons, and especially to our Bishop, John Wesley Lord.

It has indeed been a privilege to serve with the people of the District and Conference. Even in the most difficult situations people have been most kind and considerate.

I commend people and pastors for their efforts to carry out the District and Conference program. Once again we paid 96% of our share of the amount apportioned for the ongoing of the church.

In addition to this many churches have made significant renovations and improvements to buildings, as well as paying off old indebtedness.

Forty of the fifty-six charges have seen the need to raise the salary and travel of their minister to help meet the need of the increased cost of living. Together they have increased a sum of \$28,337.

Realignment to bring about a "full service church" has resulted in an improvement of services, increased attendance, and interest, new building and improvement, some united church schools, extra educational sessions and classes, as well as increased salaries for pastors. Note situations where salary raise was partly due to realignment with little extra outlay on the part of the church:

Responding to the statistical report of the Program Council, citing the many churches that made no gains in membership and some that received no persons into the fellowship over the past two years, a survey was made to determine the causes of this decline and prepare for Conference help in the form of persons on Task Forces to determine need and direction in which we ought to move in an effort evangelically.

On the positive side, our District experienced no loss in membership this year. This was an improvement over the past two years.

Our District United Methodist Women is the largest in the Conference (4,737) and expended more than any other on Local Work and Community Activities (\$66,817). We have the largest number of ongoing classes and groups for learning.

Worship Service attendance percentage is the highest in the Conference and number of youth in Church School is second.

The Communion Breakfasts were better attended than in four previous years. Our offerings were taken for improvements at Camp PeCoMeth.

A Lay School of Religion on the District was held in cooperation with the several other denominations.

A Lay School Speakers course was held and thirty-four persons completed the course.

The District Lay Board nominations for next year completely integrates the board and also placed in nomination two women.

Laymen met to decide on a proposal to raise \$15,200 for Black College Fund and this will be a fall project in October. One drive is planned for the total project amount.

Resulting from the W.O.R.M. Sessions (Workshop on Racial Ministries) held at Drayton Center, several meetings have been held on the District in which Lay persons participated. Others are to be scheduled in the coming months.

The District Council on Ministry is in process of being restructured, and new persons added to bring it into line with new legislation.

It is with a deep sense of gratitude we come to the close of our fourth year together on the District. "The Lord has done great things for us, and we are glad."

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

HOWELL O. WILKINS, District Superintendent

Most observers of the Christian Church list as one of our problems that of a limited world view. Some owe their allegiance to an organization or class within the church; some to one aspect of the ministry of the church; some to ministry in the community; and some to the particular congregation of which they are a part. Not many seem to be able to contain these loyalties within a perspective that has wider horizons including neighboring congregations, the district, the Conference, the world.

Much effort in the past year has been exerted to develop cooperative ministries involving several congregations. A series of discussions have been held in the North Wilmington area about how the various resources of leadership, etc., could be used to strengthen the total ministry of the church to their own members and to the community in which their church buildings are located. Peninsula and McCabe, which began the year as a separate church with one staff, have since merged and now have one of the strongest collections of resources available to minister to the congregation and the community. The South New Castle County Parish is an expression of cooperative ministries. Various programs of the churches will be done together and the ministers appointed to the charges will give part of their efforts to strengthening all of the churches. In Cecil County discussions have been held in the County as a whole and in clusters of churches. The different clusters are developing cooperative efforts depending upon the needs in their areas. Some realignment has been undertaken to have the charges composed of churches in the same neighboring areas. The District Assembly was helpful in sponsoring a convocation to consider the work of the churches in the County. Nearly 200 people participated in this. Considerable attention was given to discover the best way to minister to the congregations and people in the east and south of Wilmington. One strong arm of the church in ministry is the Methodist Action Program. The significant contribution of Rev. Richard C. Stazesky is being carried on by the very able staff and we anticipate the leadership of Rev. Charles E. Belcher.

Several new developments in ecumenical ventures have occurred. The United Presbyterian and United Methodist Churches in Chesapeake City, Maryland, will be served by the same pastor. This arrangement was carried out by a committee representing the two congregations and the plan was approved by the members in a very cooperative spirit. The plans for the establishment of a congregation at Glasgow by the Episcopal Church, United Presbyterian Church, and United Methodist Church is proceeding to the point that someone will probably need to be appointed next year. Several denominations are working together for a common ministry on the campus community at the University of Delaware. There is reference to this in the pre-conference reports. Unfortunately, the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency has not made a strong contribution, but it is hoped that with a new executive after August 1, this potential will soon be felt.

While my major preoccupation has been with the work of the district, I have been involved in the United States Association for the Christian Peace Conference and attended the 4th Assembly in Prague in late September (preaching in a Methodist Church). I was one of the representatives of our Conference at the World Methodist Council and Conference in Denver last summer and participated in the General Conference. I have assumed responsibility in the Committee of 39, a good government group in Wilmington, and in the Better Administration of Justice Committee in Delaware, and concluded three years as director of the Ministers' and Wives' Retreat at Buck Hill Falls.

There was one birth in the district ministers' families. On September 27, 1971, a son, John Mark, was born to Rev. and Mrs. William G. French. There were two weddings. Rev. Norman Poultney and Miss Sara E. Porter were married on June 12, 1971, and Rev. Bernard T. Hepbron and Miss Catherine Elizabeth McCann were married on August 23, 1971.

It is sad to report there were 9 deaths on the district: Rev. W. H. Briggs; Rev. Dr. J. Earl Cummings; Rev. John W. Wootten; Rev. Henry G. Holdway; Rev. John H. Russum; Mrs. Elizabeth D. Steen, wife of Rev. James C. Steen, Sr.; Mrs. Fannie E. Broadway, widow of Rev. Luther M. Broadway; Mrs. Caroline A. Richardson, widow of Rev. James T. Richardson; and Mrs. Grace F. Chancy, wife of Rev. Augustus T. Chancy.

I am grateful for the willingness to explore new ideas and new approaches. With the church under attack and suffering many pressures, it is encouraging to note that many are seeking better ways to live the Gospel. We could not talk about exploring new ideas and new approaches without thinking of our Bishop and his wife who have led us in so many wonderful and unexpected ways. We pray that they will lead us in that path of peace which we profess.

(b) Boards, Commissions and Committees

SECTION I

EDUCATION AND COMMUNICATION

DRAYTON MANOR CONFERENCE CENTER

During 1971 Drayton Manor completed its sixth year of operation with more than 5,000 people days of usage, an increase of more than 1,800 people days over the previous year of 1970. In addition, an operating deficit has been overcome and the Center has entered 1972 in a favorable financial position.

Usage

In respect to usage, all weekends in 1972 except those in the month of December are engaged as well as many weekends in 1973. Use of Drayton through the week is also increasing significantly, offering the expectation that this resource will be used more and more as Drayton becomes better known and more fully understood.

In making the foregoing statement the following ought also be stated. Occasionally, a church group finds it necessary to cancel their engagement. For this reason church groups are encouraged to inquire of Drayton even at a late date, for in the interval of the next several months, an opening may occur which would serve the interests of all concerned. However, for best results, arrangements should be made well in advance.

Financial Position

Financially, Drayton Manor has moved from red to black during 1971. In addition to greater use, already noted, all employees with the exception of the Resident Director were placed on a part-time basis. As a result of these two factors, Drayton has moved to a favorable financial position while at the same time continuing to maintain its high level of efficiency and service.

The Drayton Manor Campaign Fund to date reflects a total of \$14,760.72. This fund, designed to match the Walter S. Carpenter, Jr. gift of \$22,500 in 1970, is expected to be completed during the present year of 1972. In consultation with the Rev. O. G. Brewer, Jr., Superintendent of the Easton District, who gave leadership to Drayton Manor Campaign Fund, assurance has been given that further effort in the present Conference Year will be made to complete the goal set for this fund at its inception.

During the year of 1971 the Friends of Drayton Fund was initiated with \$2,450 received in various amounts from one dollar to gifts of more than one hundred dollars. The large number of individual contributors was reassuring and encouraging in respect to the interest and concern for

Drayton's welfare and future. Contributions to this fund are tax deductible and are gratefully received at anytime during the year.

Our Purpose

Although a large percentage of our Peninsula Methodists have an adequate understanding of the purposes of Drayton Manor, there are still many of our people who would benefit from more complete information as to the many ways this excellent resource can be used.

It is well in this connection to point out that Drayton's purpose is to provide for adults in small groups a setting, and the resources for the strengthening of the spiritual life and the stimulation to study in depth the foundations for Christian faith and living. Open to persons of all denominations, Drayton is frequently used by ministers from various backgrounds seeking a fuller understanding of their ministries. Primarily, however, our Conference Center is designed for use by the laity as a place of worship, study, creative planning and Christian fellowship. At PeCoMeth, the Peninsula Conference is providing for the Christian formation and development of children, youth and families. At Drayton the continuing Christian education of our adults is provided. In this way these two great resources fulfill and complete each other and are harmonious with the recommendations being made to the Peninsula Conference this year by the Program Council.

In conclusion, the members of the Drayton Manor Committee are grateful for the interest and support extended to our Conference Center during the year and wish to take this opportunity to express our deep appreciation for aid so generously given by so many.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Two of the key words in this quadrennium are "mission" and "ministry." The Peninsula Conference Board of Education is attempting to direct its services to the local churches of our Conference as they seek to define these terms within individual congregations. The needs of our churches are many and varied. As the problems of the churches are directed to this Board, we have sought to find the resources, plan the leadership training, counsel with ministers and local church leaders and be supportive and helpful to the limit of our resources. Some of the problems have been solved and some answers still elude us. When we have reached the limits of our own expertise, the General Board has been very helpful with both leadership and counsel. A number of persons from the national staff have visited the Conference this year to lend us a hand.

The following report seeks to give some understanding to the Conference of the scope of our work.

Program Staff

The total staff of the Program Council is available to all the Boards of the Conference. One staff member, J. Gordon Stapleton, is assigned to the Board of Education as full-time consultant to local churches. In this capacity he assists the Board in carrying out its program plans and in direct service to our congregations. Throughout the year the staff member seeks to be in contact with the church leaders, provides assistance in church school problems, surveys church schools, designs local training events and leadership schools, and collects and interprets new resources for use within local churches. The Board, through its several committees, attempts to provide guidance as the needs are discovered and reported by the staff.

Some Representative Ministries

CHURCH LEADERS' WEEKENDS are sponsored by the Board and planned by a corps of dedicated lay persons. This year two week-end retreats were held at Drayton Manor where sixty-seven persons from our church engaged in a training experience in communication for church leaders.

LOCAL CHURCH MINISTRIES are provided on a daily basis from the Education office of the Program Council. Requests for resources and assistance with specific problems are dealt with as promptly as possible. A number of leadership training schools have been designed for individual churches and for local church clusters. Council on Ministries training has been provided for many of our churches.

PILOT PROJECTS were a part of our experimental ministries this year. The training of local church teachers during the church school hour for a geographical grouping of churches was tested with the cooperation of Wesley Church, Dover. In Crisfield, a program which originated in Immanuel Church for a summer school of religion received the assistance and support of the Board of Education. This experiment is commended to other churches, for we learned here that parents are willing to pay the cost of a school of religion in order to give children a more intensified Christian education program. Two full quarters of curriculum material were taught in a six-week period.

RESOURCES. A considerable amount of the budget of the Board is spent for resource materials. This year a number of new films and filmstrips have been purchased to assist church leaders in their training programs. Sample copies of most material produced through the General Board of Education are available in the Education office. New resources for programmed instruction for teachers can now be offered to local churches.

A NEW ADULT CURRICULUM entitled "Our Living Bible" is now in preparation. The General Board of Education worked with a representative group of churches from Peninsula Conference for assistance in designing this curriculum. It is also assigning a staff member to assist the Conference staff in presenting and interpreting this resource to our churches.

COUNCIL ON MINISTRY teams trained last year have been at work this year in assisting our church to set goals for local ministries.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT is the responsibility of one committee of the Board under the chairmanship of the Reverend Harold E. Walton. A survey is under way to determine the future needs of church leaders in our several districts. It will be continued through the coming year.

Christian Education Sunday

This offering promoted by the Board is crucial in the life of Camp PeCoMeth. The churches of our Conference are responding generously each September, and we urgently request more of our churches to give their people the opportunity to participate in this offering.

Camp PeCoMeth

The program at Camp PeCoMeth is under the direction of the Reverend C. Jackson Robinson. The Board provides a Committee on Camping to advise and assist him in this responsibility. His report to the Conference is printed here:

"Have you felt the presence of God as you shared a sunrise with a group of youth? or cooked your dinner over an open fire and found it to be delicious? or learned to love a person who was no more than an acquaintance a few days ago? Some have experienced these beautiful moments as they have participated in our program at PeCoMeth. We have been able to reach some people that no other area of the church has touched. There are unique times of worship as the camper is surrounded by nature. Personal relationships begin to blossom as they work together. There are many opportunities for growth of persons in their relationship to others and to God.

1,200 resident campers were in attendance last summer. 405 people used our family campground. There were 2,989 picnickers in '71.

190 4th-6th graders were enrolled in our day camp. Weekend retreats were attended by 1,686 persons. The total number of people using Camp PeCoMeth in 1971 was 6,852 or 18,993 camper days.

There is a growing excitement as buildings are repaired and painted, new equipment purchased, new programs are developed, new leaders are enlisted and an increasing number of ministers and laymen are involved in the camp. We look forward to the 1972 season with great anticipation."

Certification

The Certification Committee of the Board meets under the leadership of the Reverend Ronald Arms and processes applications for Certification of credentials by the Annual Conference. At least one new name will be presented to the Conference at this session.

Higher Education

Annual Conference support for the program of Higher Education is channeled through the Board of Education. The Reverend Richard L. Hamilton is chairman of this committee which reviews the work and approved the budgets of the Wesley Foundations. A portion of these monies are allocated to Wesley College on the recommendation of the Board.

Campus Ministry Directors approved by this committee for the four Wesley Foundations are: University of Delaware—Rev. David Riffe; University of Maryland, Eastern Shore—Rev. Carroll Scott; Washington College—Rev. A. Jason Blundon; and Delaware State College—Rev. W. Hayward Greene.

The Total Team

The Board of Education is finding its way comfortably into the team ministry concept of the Conference Program Council. Wherever possible it cooperates and supplements the work of the other Conference boards. When called upon we design training programs or furnish resources for other work areas of the Council.

The role of this board has been changing in recent years. We find ourselves now facing the responsibility of examining our total ministry for education, testing the waters to constantly critique proven methods of the past and seek to design new ones as our world continues to change at a more rapid pace. The search for more effective strategies, methods, and techniques to put the Gospel in contemporary terms is a major part of our role. We shall continue to find and meet the needs of the churches of our Conference that all of us together may more effectively minister in carrying out the mission of the church.

CAMPUS MINISTRY-AD HOC COMMITTEE UNIVERSITY OF DELAWARE

It is expected that by time of Annual Conference it will have been approved by the Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation at the University of Delaware. It will likely be presented to this session of our Annual Conference for adoption.

**REPORT OF THE AD HOC PROPOSAL COMMITTEE FOR THE
SYMPOSIUM ON COOPERATIVE EFFORTS IN
CAMPUS MINISTRY—U. OF DEL.**

The Task (Aim & Scope) of the Committee

As a result of the Symposium for Cooperative Efforts in Campus Ministry at the University of Delaware held November 7, 1971, an ad hoc committee was formed to prepare a proposal for a cooperative/united/ecumenical ministry for consideration by the Symposium representatives. The specific aim of this action is to provide the groundwork for implementation, on a trial basis, of cooperative ministry on this campus with the participation of the following communions: American Baptist Convention, Disciples of Christ, Episcopal Diocese of Delaware, United Presbyterian Church, United Church of Christ, and the United Methodist Church. The committee, composed of representatives from the six participating communions, has met regularly over the last three months to examine research data, interview resource persons, and discuss possible approaches to a cooperative ministry.

Although the proposal includes a short statement of goals and a philosophy of programming, the primary focus of the proposal is on structure and organization. There has been an effort to provide a common theological or philosophical basis in recognition of the desire and necessity of maintaining denominational integrity in theological terms. The keystone of the proposal lies in the organization of an interdenominational "working board" which will participate with the staff in formulation and implementation of policy and programming.

The proposal is divided into seven sections, reflecting the specific areas of discussion covered by the committee:

- 1) Statement of Goals
- 2) Philosophy of Programming
- 3) Composition of the Board
- 4) Initial Selection of the Board
- 5) Future Selection of the Board
- 6) Internal Organization of the Board
- 7) Recommendations for the Future

This proposal is viewed by the committee as a necessary first step in the creation of a cooperative ministry on this campus. Constructive criticism, objective evaluation, time and experimentation, and most of all, open honesty and sincere willingness to cooperate by all parties concerned are the ingredients necessary to bring about success in a venture of this kind. The committee wishes to express its gratitude to all those who have aided its efforts in the preparation of the following proposal.

I. Statement of Goals

Some of the proper goals of an emerging cooperative ministry are viewed as follows:

- A. Christian Life—To provide opportunities for Christian growth and development within the unique framework of university life.
 1. Provision of religious orientation for "churched" individuals
 2. Confrontation of "unchurched" individuals with alternative Christian life styles
- B. Christian Witness—To provide a Christian response to existing situations in the university community, and to specific issues which may arise within it.
 1. Implementation of social "action and understanding" programs
 2. Issue-oriented constructive critical participation in university life
 3. Alliance with the university to give service to the world
- C. Christian Interpretation—To interpret the university and the campus ministry to community churches and area congregations; to serve as a bridge or link from community churches to the campus ministry.

NOTE: The working board shall have the responsibility to elaborate further on these goals.

II. Philosophy of Programming

The actual responsibility for development of specific programs will lie with the Board and Staff. The following points indicate the committee's opinions regarding programming guidelines:

- A. Each specific program or project should be a direct response to one or more of the goals. The strength of the relationship between program and goal, and the degree to which each program contributes significantly to the achievement of a goal indicate the relative validity of the program.
- B. Each program should be subjected to periodic evaluation from both internal and external points-of-view to determine its effectiveness. That something has "always-been-done-this-way" is an invalid justification for its continuation.
- C. The key to successful programming over a long term period is flexibility. The Board and Staff must be sensitive to the constantly changing university environment. New moods and ideas on campus may require new programs.
- D. The proposal committee recommends that the Board and Staff consult the available resource data (from UMHE and other sources) relative to special programming approaches in a cooperative ministry.

III. Composition and Responsibility of the Working Board

As a "working" Board, this group will have the responsibility, along with the professional Staff, for formulating and implementing the governing policy and all the programs of our co-operative ministry. This is to demonstrate the unity of our faith and our concerns in working together. Its

membership will reflect the various cross-sectional components of the university community as well as the six participating communions.

A. The Board shall be composed of not more than 25 voting members, and not fewer than 18, divided among the following categories:

- 1) Teaching faculty—Four members
- 2) Non-teaching, administrative faculty—Two members
- 3) Students—Four members
- 4) Residents of the Greater Newark area—Five members
- 5) Full-time campus Chaplains who are members of participating communions
- 6) Local parish clergy—Three members
- 7) Representatives of communions not represented by chaplains (presently this would mean one member each, representing the American Baptist Convention, Disciples of Christ, and the United Church of Christ)
- 8) The Administrative Assistant (see Recommendation A)

NOTE: It is possible that a single individual may fill more than one category, as described in Sec. A (e.g. A member of the teaching faculty who is also a resident of the Greater Newark Area).

- B. Two non-voting positions on the Board shall be reserved for liaison representatives from the Lutheran Campus Ministry and the Roman Catholic Campus Ministry—one representative from each.
- C. Within the membership described above the following denominational breakdown shall be observed:
- 1) At least four members each, representing Episcopal, Presbyterian, and United Methodist communions.
 - 2) At least two members each, representing American Baptist, Disciples of Christ, and United Church of Christ communions.
- D. Seven positions on the Board are unspecified with regard to status of religious affiliation.

NOTE: The creation of a "working" Board in no way indicates the obsolescence of currently existing local boards. Such boards can, and must, remain in operation to aid in the interpretive function of a vital, on-going campus ministry. These separate, local boards will also provide additional manpower for committee work and special projects, and will function, in a sense, as "training programs" for familiarization with campus ministry prior to actual service on the Board itself.

IV. Initial Selection of the Board

- A. The initial selection of the Board shall be supervised by an ad hoc Nominating Committee composed of representatives from each of the participating communions. This committee, working with the current local boards, will collect names and screen possible nominees

to the Board. (Nominees may, or may not, be persons currently serving on any local board.)

- B. The nominees will be divided, by the nominating committee, into three classes serving one, two, and three year terms from the time of initial selection. After the initial selection of the Board all terms will be for three-year periods, thus each year there will be a one-third turnover in Board membership.
- C. The **entire slate** of nominees to the Board, presented by the ad hoc nominating committee, shall be elected by each of the participating communions, with the authority to elect placed with whatever group or body so designated within each of the participating communions.
- D. The proposal committee recommends that those nominated for the initial one and two year terms be chosen largely from the membership of existing local boards to enhance the new Board's familiarity with the campus ministry program already in operation on this campus.

V. Future Selection of the Board

- A. Vacancies due to completion of term (one-third of total membership each year) shall be filled in the following manner:
- 1) Nominations shall be made by the Board itself.
 - 2) Election of the entire slate of nominees shall be ratified by each of the participating communions, using whatever method is determined by each.
- B. The proposal committee recommends that:
- 1) No person be permitted to serve more than two consecutive three-year terms on the Board. A person may be renominated to the Board after an absence of one year off the Board.
 - 2) Student members serve one-year terms with the possibility of reelection up to the six-consecutive year limit described above.
- C. Vacancies on the Board due to resignation prior to completion of term shall be filled through appointment by the Board Chairman, subject to approval by the entire Board. Such appointments shall be only for the remainder of the unexpired term being filled.

VI. Internal Organization of the Board

A. Officers

- 1) The Board shall elect, from its members, a Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Recording Secretary.
- 2) Election to office shall be by a simple majority for a one-year term with the possibility of unlimited reelection.
- 3) After the first year of the Board's operation, the proposal committee recommends that the Chairman and Vice-chairman meet

a requirement of at least one year of service on the Board prior to election.

B. Committees

There shall be four "standing" committees under the auspices of the Board. The core of each committee will be composed of Board members, but this does not rule out the opportunity to involve interested persons not on the Board itself in committee activities (particularly short-term ad hoc projects). The standing committees and their responsibilities follow:

- 1) Budget and Finance—Preparation of budget requests to be sent to the supporting communions; Development of an appropriate budget to implement the strategies and goals developed by the Board; Auditing of books; Provision for periodic review in the interest of adequate administration of the budget.
- 2) Policy and Strategy—Gathering of reports of current programs; Review of policy; Responsibility for formulation and presentation to the Board a long-range strategy; Review on priorities of new work and new forms of ministry.
- 3) Personnel—Development of job descriptions to include duties, responsibilities and relationships of Staff; Annual review on financial support of Staff; Review work of Staff; Provide for continuing education of Staff; Screening and nomination of new candidates to the Board.
- 4) Interpretation—Development of interpretive materials and programs for the Newark community and for local churches; Assist in the process of continuing education concerning ministry in higher education for the Board members; Work with the existing local boards in interpretation of the campus ministry to the community and local churches.

C. Committee Appointments

- 1) As part of the initial selection process, the committee chairman and members will be appointed by the Board Chairman, in consultation with the ad hoc Nominating Committee, and subject to approval by the entire Board.
- 2) After the first year, the committee chairmen and members will be appointed by the Board Chairman, in consultation with the Personnel Committee, and subject to approval by the entire Board.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF WESLEY COLLEGE REPORT TO PENINSULA CONFERENCE

Throughout the years, in close cooperation with the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church, Wesley College has progressed to where it has become known as one of this country's top two-year colleges.

Wesley is recommended by high school counselors, senior college admissions officers, and other professional guidance workers in the field of higher education. The Peninsula Conference can be proud of this fact and of the progress made in the field of church-related higher education.

The Peninsula Conference has influenced the direction of this institution that was once called the Wilmington Conference Academy. The Academy opened almost 100 years ago. In connection with this anniversary, Dr. Robert H. Parker, President of Wesley College, has announced Mr. Joseph S. Bellmeyer of Dover, as Director of Centennial Affairs.

The College's Centennial program will begin this coming September. Special programs and events will take place throughout the year of dedicating a new second century. Three major events, the Opening Convocation, Honors Convocation, and Graduation Exercises, will highlight the year. Well-known men in government, science, and religion will be guest speakers at these events. Special concerts, plays, art shows, and other Centennial affairs will add continuity to the major events. Wesley's high academic standing and association with the Peninsula Conference will be effectively displayed.

The Centennial year also will offer the Trustees and College administration an opportunity to review the tremendous growth of the College. In April of 1973, the new College Center building will be completed, ending the last phase of a three-stage development project directed by the Board of Trustees.

In the development area, Dr. Parker appointed Mr. Herman T. Meinersmann to the College Cabinet as director of development.

In this past year two development seminars have been held; one for the Trustees, the other for faculty members. The net effect of these seminars has been to create an awareness of the position of private higher education in general and motivate specific programs that will benefit the College.

Wesley College has taken a position of leadership in the college development field. Having just received a third Education Professions Development Act grant from the federal government, the College has been instrumental in advising private two-year colleges in development programs. Here, the Peninsula Conference can be gratified by the national attention Wesley receives in influencing the development of the country's two-year colleges.

Some people feel the success the College has enjoyed is due to the individual attention the Wesley student receives. Others feel that the Christian philosophies, absent on many campuses, make a substantial difference in our students' performance. Still others point to our well-qualified faculty as highly professional teachers. Bringing new life to these areas of student growth is William C. Wright and H. Thomas Welch, appointed as Academic Dean and Dean of Students. With the innovative programs established by these young men, all agree that the total mix, the church-related Wesley, is educating and helping to round out new generations of youth.

Several generations ago, the founders of the United Methodist Church believed knowledge and devotion to God must be linked if one was not

to destroy the meaning of the other. Today Wesley's role in the Peninsula Conference is under study. As society changes, so change the institutions of higher education. There are several critical and difficult questions that are being analyzed as to priorities. Wesley College has faced many perplexing problems in the past and survived. Nevertheless, it is important to realize that private higher education throughout the country, faces many financial difficulties. Wesley College is no exception.

However, with renewed Christian dedication and stronger commitments, Wesley will continue to exert a strong influence on young people. The College is one very direct avenue to providing them with the opportunity for higher education that is in accord with Christian principles. We can afford to do no less.

When a student enrolls at Wesley, he pays less than 80% of the total costs. Some students, with financial aid, scholarships, and grants, pay far less. Foundations, individual gifts, wills, endowments, and other incomes are supporting Wesley student costs by 20 to 25%. Broadly speaking, the Peninsula Conference funds to the College are used in this manner.

In order to ensure Wesley's continued place among top two-year colleges, with maximum use of facilities and student recruitment, a major fund drive is under consideration by the Board of Trustees. With a successful campaign, Wesley can become even more symbolic of effective church-college relationships, with a significant impact on church-related colleges everywhere.

To this end, Wesley College is participating in a national United Methodist Church-college program. NEW GENERATIONS FOR NEW DAYS is proposed as an intensive program under the leadership of the National Association of Schools and Colleges of the United Methodist Church and the National Methodist Foundation for Christian Higher Education.

It will:

1. State the case for the church-related college.
2. Help the schools and colleges attract more students.
3. Increase the moral and financial support of the educational institutions, so they can use the full potentiality of their service to youth and society.

The program is designed to cover several years and includes over 100 Methodist colleges.

With all that is taking place today in the church, society, and education, we are mindful of the problems facing the Conference in the matter of finances. A number of years ago, a member of the Peninsula Conference stated: "We have committed ourselves to an educational institution in our Conference; we can do nothing less than support it adequately." If Wesley College is to continue as a church-related institution, this statement is even more true today.

BOARD OF CHILD CARE



"I appreciate people in this world doing things for others. You have made a lot of children like me happy. I'm a fifteen-year-old girl. I understand when people like you make things better. We need people to show 'consideration' for others."

From the Peninsula and Baltimore Conference, young people 12 years up to 18 have found a home at Board of Child Care. Somewhat special, these are kids with problems, kids who have been moved around, shoved around, and kicked around for whom "to be happy" may be a new experience.

Activities at the Child Care Center are three-fold: school, work and play. The young people are enrolled in varied academic programs. Some are in special educational classes. This Spring twenty-one of junior-senior high age, in addition to regular school are enrolled in an introduction to vocational training, studying auto body repair, food service, carpentry or machine shop.

Summer is a busy time. Again, some of our youth were in school, participating in a work-study program, learning and teaching. Others were gainfully employed at nearby Social Security headquarters.

A major event of the year was our camping experience, underwritten by Woman's Auxiliary, made possible by you. We divided into two groups, one went to Camp Adahi near Reading, Pennsylvania; the other, to Alleghany State Park in New York.

Swartzell Assembled Families is home to 28 boys and girls from Junior Village in the District of Columbia. Children are involved in various community activities including Scouts, music lessons, church choir. One pre-school age child is in a school for the deaf. One of the boys attends a private, special educational school. Most of all, these children are learning to enjoy the benefits of life in a private home, in a residential area, far removed from the impersonal, large institution from which they came. We note with great joy that other agencies in the District of Columbia are developing homes for children of the Village, and that the population of that institution is declining. With representatives of concerned agencies we continue to provide consultation to persons in Congress, to District of Columbia Commissioners and to Department of Human Resources as to how

public and private organizations can work together for homeless children in the District of Columbia.

A little boy in FOSTER CARE (Ricky, age 12) has many problems and was confined at Children's Hospital simply because a suitable foster home could not be located for him. One of our foster mothers said she would take this child, who has an Ilesotomy (kidney problem and must wear urine bag), Spina Bifida (deformity of legs), club feet, dislocated hip and must use crutches. Ricky has a wonderful outlook on life and has done so well in this placement that he is now enrolled (for the first time in his life) in public school. He feels that this is the most wonderful thing—to be able to go to school instead of the hospital and home teaching that he had always had. He has shown talent in art and is taking art lessons.

This same foster mother has in care a Negro-Caucasian baby. The natural mother took this baby home at the age of three-and-a-half months. After one month of trying to go it on her own, she requested that we take back her baby and plan for adoption. Mrs. C. has done very well with this youngster. Plans for adoption are imminent via Maryland Adoption Exchange.

Among our graduates, Class of '72, are Susan, who hopes to enter a local community college; Jack, who is prepared to be an auto body repairman; Sharon, who hopes to enter college somewhere; and Gene, who is undecided about the future. Graduating from Towson State is Barbara, an alumna of Board of Child Care, now married, and hoping to teach first grade "because the start children get in school is so very important." Two other of our alumnae, Gary and Vicki, participated as panelists in a recent Regional Conference of Child Welfare League of America. Their topic: "Evaluation of Long Term Care by Young Adults Who Experienced It."

Although 26 adoptions have been completed this year, we regret the necessity of telling many young couples of our churches that babies are not available for adoption. This results we believe, from increased numbers of abortions and from many single girls deciding to keep their babies at home. A limited number of children with special needs are available for adoption, and we are making homes available to them as homes become available. Of course, we shall continue to counsel with unwed mothers who seek our help, and we shall make their babies available to couples for adoption when the parent so wishes.

Woman's Auxillary continues their volunteer service and conducts many fund raising projects. With the funds raised they provided art lessons, award for scholarship, Christmas and birthday gifts for the children, a new piano, game and camping equipment, and a contribution to our operating budget. They sponsored the week-long summer camp trip, and continue to solicit trading stamps for a new station wagon. One district aims to supply a new quilt for every child's bed. They have attended hearings of the Maryland State Legislature to support increased purchase-of-care payments to children in child care agencies.

The Key Woman in the local church serves as a resource of information and service.

Our Board of Directors and staff express appreciation to Mrs. William (Laura) Bishop, president of the Auxillary; to each of the officers on the Conference and District level; and to each individual within the Auxillary who has served so faithfully.

The following are services completed January 1, 1971 to December 31, 1971:

- 26 Adoptions completed and finalized
- 28 infants cared for in study homes
- 29 children in Assembled Families (one child killed in accident)
- 38 unwed mothers were given counselling and service
- 14 children in Foster Care
- 93 youth in Child Care Center

Our Board and staff feel pleased with the rich privilege you continue to give to us to nurture children. Many times we feel that as we give to them we, too, are blessed. Their struggles are intense, but life with them is rich, meaningful, exciting, and never dull. Our facilities are operating at maximum capacity. Several times each week we are requested to receive a boy or girl whom we cannot receive because space is not available. Bishop Lord's appointment of a committee to study our need for additional facilities and the need of other Conference agencies for capital funds was most welcome, and we express appreciation to Ted Schiller, Chairman of that committee, and to the committee, for the exhaustive work which they have done. The recommendations which they are making, if accepted by Annual Conference, and if brought to fruition, will make it possible for this agency of the Church to construct an additional facility providing residential care for 60 boys and girls; and to acquire two residences caring for eight boys and/or girls each. We firmly support the recommendations which the committee appointed by Bishop Lord is making, and we look forward to the possibility of receiving additional numbers of children into care.

PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST HOMES AND HOSPITALS, INC.

The beginning of any report on the activities, problems and achievements of the Methodist homes poses the question of just how this can be accomplished within the bounds of space allotted. There are so many areas of human interest connected with serving the elderly that have not heretofore been mentioned; a portion of this Annual Report will be devoted to church-person involvement.

The Residents

Time marches on, but the programs in our homes do not permit time to weigh heavily on those we serve. We believe it is important that life in a retirement home should be a time for growth. We try to serve all their needs and insist they share actively in programs that promote growth

and general well-being. The success of this type programming is confirmed by the average age of 86.4 years of the residents. Community and church involvement is encouraged aside from the in-home activities. New and innovative programs constantly promote mental growth through new learning experiences. We, therefore, proudly state that life in our homes is a "time for living."

The Volunteer

I question at times just how we could accomplish the many things we do without the many active volunteers working in our homes. Jobs of varying description are performed by these persons. The degree of their involvement depends upon the needs of the resident, but whether it is letter writing, combing hair, shopping, nursing, sewing, wood working, or companionship, the task and the service is important. Over 100 volunteers support this very vital part of our home operations. The Gift Shops in each of our homes, operated by the Junior Board, is a gathering place for friendship and refreshment and produce vital income for our benevolent work in the homes.

Mother's Day and Fall Festival

These two very important days contribute in many ways to our homes. Mother's Day, our one day of sharing with the local church, is important to us in several ways. It affords individuals the opportunity to contribute directly in an area of personal concern, to honor loved ones and to share in a very personal way, their concern for the less fortunate. The Fall Festival is an opportunity for church membership to become directly involved with a very important activity program. Days of preparation and months of planning provide a forum for good fellowship, an opportunity for the community at large to view what happens in our homes, and a direct contact with the outside for our residents who live inside. These two days make possible full scholarships for about twenty persons in our homes. The words of Shakespeare—"No man can truly help others without helping himself"—is most appropriate when one becomes involved in these two very significant occasions.

Community Action

For the past two years, our community involvement has been one of constant growth—no request goes unanswered—no opportunity is passed by which would bring comfort or help to the aging community. Hundreds of requests for nursing, housekeeping, companionship and food service have been answered in the past year. The well being and needs of those on our waiting list become a real concern for administration. No longer is this just an in-house operation; our concerns extend into the whole community. We feel that we must be concerned with all the problems facing the elderly population in order to be better prepared to meet their needs. Once they become residents, and too, if we are to serve the ministers and their churches through educational programs, we must be aware of human, spiritual and social needs.

In order to accomplish these things, we continue to invite our ministers into our homes to observe our programs, expose them to our possibilities and limits of service, and to try and determine their needs as they relate to our Health and Welfare Ministries. There is in excess of forty thousand persons over the age of 65 in our Conference area with varying needs, and this figure grows each year.

Finances

In spite of excellent controls, cost of care continues to rise. 25% of our budget must be raised to cover our benevolence work in the homes. We provided \$134,000 in direct scholarship aid to our residents during the past year: We should be doing more, but it becomes a matter of economics. The extended life of many of our residents has placed them on our scholarship rolls simply because they have outlived their savings. They are our concern for life, and we continue to love and serve them regardless of their needs or their ability to pay.

Today and Tomorrow

Twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, three hundred and sixty-five days a year, the outstretched hands of our healing ministries touch people. There are times when a local church must be closed, its classrooms empty, its sanctuary still. But in our homes the nursing section and other staff persons are always available to take care of emergencies which so often occur in the small hours of the morning. We cope with and master the daily problems because we are free to react and to innovate and test new methods. Ours is not only a health serving ministry, it is a teaching and doing ministry. The Health and Welfare Ministries of the United Methodist Church, represented by 338 agencies, will serve four million persons this year and give close to fifty million dollars' worth of free services. We are proud to be a part of an arm of the church that directly touches more lives and provides a ministry in the name of Christ, to more people annually than any other United Methodist program beyond the local church. In our homes alone last year, over one and three-quarter million man hours of service was provided, over one-half million meals served, and over 700 thousand hours of nursing service was performed. This illustrates what 24 hours a day—7 days week—365 days a year really means.

We agree with Bishop Paul Galloway when he stated that—"Our local church, supported by the agencies serving the youth and the aging, must become a center for healing and helping ministries that are relevant to the tough life and death problems people face. Our ministry as the Body of Christ in every local church and agency, must be the same as HIS—PREACHING, TEACHING AND HEALING." We believe our agency ministries must continue to grow. The needs are vast, complex and challenging. We cannot rely on government to do the job. We can do it better, more economically and with a greater degree of concern for the dignity of the person. Christ provides direction for us through a life of direct service ministry to all persons about Him. This is our heritage—we must not rest on past accomplishments.

Our belief is that an attempt must be made to identify the many and various needs of the aging community. Economics prevent us dealing with the vast number of persons who live in poverty situations and whose needs are far greater than financial assistance, yet a way must be found to make life worth living for all God's children. If we are to plan for the future and meet present needs, priorities must be developed that will permit bringing into being, a program capable of serving all levels of care.

I am happy to make "A Prayer of Thanksgiving" delivered by Bishop Arthur McKinstry at the ground-breaking ceremony for the new Health Center at The Country House, a part of this report. It says so vividly what all Methodists should be saying if we are sincere in our obligation and true to our calling.

And mindful again of Jonah's words—we know that the second element of thanksgiving is SACRIFICE—sacrifice on our part, sacrifice on the part of all who have loved and supported The Methodist Country House through the years.

We remember, O God, that sacrifice means "to make SACRED." Sacrifice has its origin in the desire of men to take a material thing and set it apart for sacred uses. Sacrifice is a Holy thing. This means that the wonderful addition to our Infirmary—because of its ultimate use—is a

May we remember that the best **THANKSGIVING** is **THANKS-LIVING!** Because of the grave tasks ahead, the hard problems to be solved before the Pigueron Health Center is completed—may we at The Country House have the grace to dedicate ourselves to the task of sharing in the cost of this good work—each of us as he or she is able. "I will sacrifice unto Thee with the voice of Thanksgiving." PRAISE, SACRIFICE . . . these are the elements of thanksgiving. Write these words on our hearts, O God—today and always—that we may be true stewards of thine. Thanks be to Thee, O God, for thou alone dost assure us the victory—through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

HEALTH & WELFARE MINISTRIES

The Board of Health & Welfare Ministries of an Annual Conference has as its primary function the promotion of a Christ-centered ministry to the aging, to the orphans or needy children and to the ill. The Board feels the need of broadening these various areas of concern by in-depth studies of the community needs as they relate to each of the primary functions.

J. Wallace Watson, Executive Director of our Homes for the Aging, while reporting to our Board, made us aware of many of the growing needs of our Conference area. It is apparent that the out-reach community project sponsored by Sussex County Home Services and based at the Manor House, is meeting a very serious and challenging need by providing hot meals, nursing, companionship and housekeeping to the elderly in the areas surrounding Seaford. The Board heartily endorses this type service through our Homes and hope for expanding opportunities. Deficiencies in total care of persons living in our two retirement homes will now be solved by the addition of a new George Pigueron Memorial Health Center at The Country House. On March 19, Bishop John Wesley Lord participated in ground-breaking ceremonies for this extension of our healing ministries. This addition will serve both Homes in providing a Mental Health Treatment Center. The Committee approved Mr. Watson's report and commended him for his work since coming to the Homes as Executive Director.

There was considerable discussion on the merger of the Health & Welfare Ministries of the United Church into an agency called Global Ministries, at the next General Conference. The Committee feels that some consolidation may be beneficial, but voted unanimously to oppose the plan as it is now being presented. It was feared that much of the service and effect would be lost at the local level.

The effectiveness of Mother's Day and Golden Cross was discussed, and it was suggested that within the next Conference Year, the Program Council and the World Service and Finance Commission seek ways of increasing the budget for the Homes for the Aging to fully cover the scholarship work of the homes. It was the thinking of the Committee that our churches would appreciate the elimination of special offerings.

A letter, addressed to the Program Council, from the Board of Child Care requested funds for a new home in the Baltimore area. After careful consideration, the following motion was made and approved.

Motion—In light of the request from the Board of Child Care and since there are other pressing needs within our Conference, we request the Program Council to consider in the near future, a major capital funds drive to meet the needs of our present Conference agencies.

It was suggested that the Board of Child Care stands with the other Boards and Agencies and Institution of the Conference. If the Program Council decides to recommend a major capital funds drive, it will also decide who to recommend to receive funds from the drive. The Board of Child Care may or may not be included.

Since there seems to be some confusion among the thinking of many members of the Conference concerning Federal and/or State funds for capital expansion or operations by our various agencies within the Conference, we offer the following resolution:

It is recommended that the Program Council be requested to study the receiving of Federal and State funds by agencies, institutions, local churches of the Conference, make recommendations to the Annual Conference at the earliest possible date, in order that a policy in this regard be stated as soon as possible.

The Board of Health and Welfare approves the following list of persons nominated as Trustees for Peninsula United Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc., and asks the Annual Conference to elect them as members of the Class of 1975.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions herewith presents the report of its stewardship during the past Conference Year and reviews some of the significant advances made in the past quadrennium.

Promotion and Cultivation

At the 1971 Annual Conference the Rev. Widmon Butler was appointed Conference Missionary Secretary. Together with the four district secretaries, he has worked diligently to promote missionary projects and schools of Christian mission. Each of these leaders trained themselves by attending the Eastern Ecumenical Conference held at our own Wesley College. Through their district programs and the mission cultivation month they have presented to our churches the challenge of Christian mission. "A Night of World Vision" has become one of the highlights of inspiration in our Conference Year. The World Student Scholarship Fund has helped to provide tuition for a student from Nigeria at Wesley College. The Committee on Promotion and Cultivation has consulted with Dr. Howard Brinton on several occasions to project our Conference into greater participation in general advanced specials.

The relationship of the Conference Missionary Secretary with the Program Council has been carefully reviewed, and it is agreed that the work of the Conference Missionary Secretary is most important in relating to districts, to local churches, and involving many persons in The Mission Program. This working arrangement follows the recommendations in last year's report.

Mission and Church Extension

The committee on church expansion has continued to work with the Business Office in getting all of our records of outstanding loans and projects in good order so that future Boards of Missions will be able to have full information for their use. The church building project at Chester-Bethel is nearing completion, and we have made the first payment on an encouragement loan. It is anticipated that during 1972 the church building projects at Whatcoat, Dover, and Pocomoke City will be started.

The Mortgage and Indenture Form has been revised in accordance with recommendations of our attorneys and will be used in the future. The loan policy of our Conference adopted by the 1968 Annual Conference is printed for information as follows:

a. Requests up to \$5,000 may be awarded donations. New Mission projects also may be awarded donations. All other disbursements shall be as loans. (We reaffirm that it is the policy of this Board to purchase land for new church projects.)

b. Churches must comply with formal application procedures and must meet The Board of Missions criteria of eligibility for aid.

c. Before such a loan is made, a repayment plan and interest rate shall have been agreed upon by the church officials and the Board of Missions.

d. In most situations, payments of interest and repayment of loan would begin after commercial loans and mortgages have been satisfied.

e. A trust agreement and mortgage must be duly executed and recorded before any money is made available either as grant or loan.

Item (d) was spelled out by the full Board at its November 15, 1971 meeting after long consideration to include the following:

"Repayment is to begin at a specified time after original commercial loans have been satisfied. The interest rate is to begin at that time also."

After several years of consultation with representatives of the Episcopal and United Presbyterian Church, an agreement was entered into by our three judicatories for an exciting ecumenical venture at Glasgow, Delaware. It is expected that a population of 10,000 or more will live in this new development area. The three judicatories have made a down payment of \$10,000 on a \$100,000 agreement to purchase four acres for a new ecumenical church. When 300 housing units are built and occupied, we will make settlement. Hopefully, in the meantime, a ministry will have started in this growing area.

Methodist Action Program

During the five years of leadership given by the Rev. Richard C. Stazesky, the program of MAP expanded in many directions to meet the crying needs of the people in the city of Wilmington. Besides sustaining and strengthening inner city churches, MAP has become involved in many programs of helping and enabling people. Its efforts toward changing attitudes and involving people in the city have been noteworthy. We are indeed indebted to Richard Stazesky for his tireless and wholehearted leadership, and we miss his guiding hand.

During this year MAP has been involved in self study and seeking new directions for the future. A professional survey was made of all the facets of its operation, with the blessing and financial support of the Board.

For several years now the Board of Missions has been calling attention to the need for a Conference-wide approach to the ministries in the metropolitan areas of our Conference. The need does not diminish. Now that the Program Council Staff has been organized and is giving direction to the many areas of program throughout the Conference, it is hoped that this matter will be given careful study in the new quadrennium.

Neighborhood House has continued to expand its ministry and service in the Southbridge Area of Wilmington. Its Day Care Program has expanded, and it provides many programs for children, youth and adults in a neighborhood situation. The Neighborhood House Staff, under the able direction of Miss Mary White, gives significant community leadership. A study is now being made of the possibilities of a multi-purpose community center to meet the needs of South Wilmington. The Board of Directors of Neighborhood House and the Staff are very much interested in such a venture.

Special Ministries

The Peninsula Conference and individual churches within the Conference have supported the ministry to migrant workers who come to our area for seasonal harvests. The work, under ecumenical direction, is being reorganized, and will be carried on this spring and summer. Due to changing conditions, it is most necessary that some new approaches and programs be adopted.

Your Board has been aware of the many outreaches of Christian mission and ministry that requires ecumenical involvement. We have cooperated wherever possible. Our concern for parish and community development requires our working together with other churches and community agencies in almost every situation.

Seashore Ministries

The Rev. John A. Irwin, Selbyville pastor in charge of the summer ministry at St. Matthews by the Sea at Fenwick Island, writes:

"In 1962 the Board of Missions built a chapel at Fenwick. Since that time each summer this work sponsored by the Board has ministered to the Sunday worship needs as well as through the week a pastoral ministry to the people living and vacationing at Fenwick Island. It is not only an Inter-Denominational ministry but inter-faith as well.

Each summer over 2,500 people attend services on Sunday and offerings have increased from \$1,085 that first summer of 1962 to over \$2,400 last summer. This is one project which is appreciated by the people who attend, and it is a ministry which I hope will continue on for many years until such time as a permanent congregation may be established at the beach. The services of the ministers of the Conference have meant much as they have given of their service during their vacation time."

Last summer we shared in an ecumenical ministry in Ocean City, Maryland. Our program was an attempt to relate to the thousands of youth who come to that resort area during the summer. The program will be greatly expanded this summer, and your Board has committed itself to a united effort with several other denominations. Hopefully, the ministry will be extended to include larger areas of summer vacationing along the Atlantic and Delaware Bay seacoast.

Delaware and the Eastern Shore of Maryland are growing as a vacation land at a very rapid pace. We have not met the challenge by being there to minister to people in their leisure. There will undoubtedly be the need of several new churches as well as more informal ministries. The time is at hand.

Recommendations

That February, 1973, be designated as missionary cultivation month.

That the Reverend Widmon Butler be reappointed as Conference Missionary Secretary for the 1972-73 Conference Year.

A Look Into the Future

An exciting prospect for the next few years will be the development of the ecumenical venture at Glasgow. This will be a challenge for our Conference as the Board of Missions breaks new ground on the ecumenical frontier.

We have been challenged to involve ourselves in significant Advance Special Projects and the new Board will be called upon to act on several thrilling suggestions.

The 1968-72 Quadrennial Emphasis Committee has inaugurated several significant projects in our Conference and has passed on to the Board of Missions the challenge to evaluate the need for their continuance.

Word of Appreciation

As retiring Chairman, I want to express appreciation to the members of the Board of Missions, to the Cabinet and to the Program Council staff for their assistance in the many faceted program of Christian Mission. Mr. Harlan Pyle has been most dedicated in his work as the Treasurer of the Board. Mr. Theodore W. Briggs, our Conference Business Manager, has been very diligent and helpful in keeping records for the Board and providing safekeeping for important official documents. This will be most helpful in the years to come, especially in reference to Church Extension Projects. Also, we express appreciation to the resource persons from the National and World Divisions of the General Board of Missions for their help to us in many projects we have undertaken. We trust that the new Board will be able to go forward in strength and faith as new challenges are faced.

In conclusion, we are grateful to the churches of the Conference for their faithful support of the Conference benevolence and world service programs. Last year marked an increase toward full meeting of apportionments. In addition many of our churches have supported General and Conference Advance Specials. These are essential responses to the challenge of the total Christian mission enterprise.

CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

In light of the Priorities established by the Program Council in January of 1972, the Board of Christian Social Concerns began implementation of program by holding training sessions, one on each district. Persons in attendance were pastors, lay leaders, chairmen of the Council on Ministries, local work area chairmen of Christian Social Concerns, secretaries of Christian Social Relations of the Women's Society of Christian Service and youth.

The purpose of the sessions was to acquaint the local church with the general program and structure of the Christian Social Concerns work area, as a beginning in local church involvement with emphasis on "Ecology".

The sessions established a realistic working relationship between the Conference board, district directors and the local church, in preparation for implementing the new Quadrennial Program.

The program adopted by the Board and endorsed by the Program Council, subject to revision as new quadrennial program is received, is as follows:

Priority—Social Action

1. A retreat for the Board of Christian Social Concerns, to be held in the early Fall for the purpose of orientation and study of new programs as adopted by the General Conference. Retreat will be conducted by a General Board representative.

2. **Division of World Peace:** In support of "The Bishop's Call for Peace and Self-Development of Peoples", the Division Chairman will attend the World Peace Conference this summer as the initial step in this area of program.

3. **Division of General Welfare:** The Board will launch and promote a study program in "Drugs and Alcohol Concerns", hopefully involving every local church. Also, continuing emphasis on "Ecology".

4. **Human Relations:** A. The Board will meet with Project Equality for the purpose of evaluation of the work of Project Equality. The report of this evaluation will be made to the Program Council and to the next Annual Conference with recommendations. B. The Board will develop a continuing effective program, in pursuit of inclusiveness within the church, in cooperation with the Cabinet, Program Council, Director of Black Ministries and the Black Caucus. C. The Board will set up a committee to study the position of women in this Conference with special emphasis on policy making roles as well as the ordained clergy.

RESOLUTIONS

Freedom of Religion

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns affirms the constitutional right of any citizen to freely exercise his religion in any public place, including public schools, without any influence, interference or com-

pulsion from any agency of government or its employees, provided such exercise does not interfere with any other citizen's right to freely exercise or abstain from exercising his religion.

We oppose any constitutional amendment which would limit this right.

Conference Investment Policies

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns recommends that the Conference examine its investment policies so that the stewardship which the Conference exercises over these funds shall provide an example to all of social responsibility.

Specifically, we call attention to a recent study by the National Council of Churches citing the United Methodist Church as having substantial holdings in military related industries.

It is deplorable that the church should ever profit from the irresponsible and socially injurious policies of companies engaged in environmental pollution, discriminatory employment practices, the manufacture of military hardware, support of apartheid policies and other activities contrary to the Christian ethic.

We believe that all Christians can exercise leadership in promoting corporate social responsibility by exercising proxy statements, discussion with corporate leaders and when appropriate, changing investments to influence corporate policy.

Elimination of Racial Segregation in Public and Methodist Schools

The General Conference has stated that "United Methodists should insist on the elimination of racial segregation (including "de facto" segregation) in public and Methodist schools everywhere". So called "de facto" segregation in public schools is no more morally right than government enforced segregation.

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns calls upon the States of Delaware and Maryland to undertake the following actions:

1. Where severe "de facto" segregation exists between contiguous school districts, the school districts should be consolidated or their boundaries redrawn.
2. Local state tax revenues should be made available to school districts on the basis of educational need and not on the basis of the affluence of the school district.
3. Equal employment practice legislation should be extended to local school districts and should include teachers, administrators, and all other employees of the school district. Failure to comply should result in the loss of all aid until compliance has been met.
4. Schools should be located so as to serve as diverse a student population as possible.
5. Busing over reasonable time and distances has been a part of public education for decades to provide expanded educational opportunities for those in rural and semi-rural areas and to achieve maximum and efficient utilization of school buildings in more densely settled areas

with little or no adverse effect on the student. Where students are today being bused to segregated schools, it seems illogical that they should not be bused similar distances to integrated schools. We believe that legislation or a constitutional amendment prohibiting busing as a means of desegregating schools would serve no useful purpose.

A hearty thanks to our vice chairman, Ed Lasbury, Division of General Welfare, Mrs. Boyd Alford, Division of Human Relations and Richard Turner of the Division of World Peace, and to the District Directors and members of the Board, for their tremendous efforts, dedicated labors and splendid cooperation.

We look forward with faith and humility to the challenge of engagement (Christian) with the social problems of our world and nation. As the Board of Christian Social Concerns of the Peninsula Conference, we call Christians to Social Action; To feed the poor, cleanse the leper, give sight to the blind, free the prisoner, bind the broken-hearted, to heal the sick and even raise the dead, and to give to the peoples of the world a Christian sense of direction, by the help of almighty God.

WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

I deem it a great privilege to present this annual report for the Peninsula Conference Women's Society of Christian Service. The dedication and commitment of our entire membership has resulted in a most gratifying record of "Women in Mission."

We were off to a good start in 1971 following our Annual Spring Meeting held in St. Mark's United Methodist Church, Easton, on May 13. Over 400 women participated in a program of "Devotion in Motion" during the morning session, directed by Mrs. Carola Williams of Ossining, New York. In the afternoon session Mrs. Williams presented a monologue entitled, "God's Supreme Court." Both programs were well-received, and many expressions of spiritual uplift and challenge were heard.

In June, 1971, eleven Conference officers and a representative from the Wesleyan Service Guild attended the Middle Atlantic Regional School of Christian Mission held at West Virginia Wesleyan College in Buckhannon, West Virginia. Also, in the group was the Reverend Nathaniel Miller of Milton, Delaware, who was a member of the faculty of our Conference School of Mission held at Wesley College, Dover, in July, 1971. Our officers will attend the 1972 Regional School to be held in Lycoming College, Williamsport, Pennsylvania, in June. Our Conference School will be held at Salisbury State Teachers College, Salisbury, Maryland, from July 17 to 21. Mrs. Boyd Alford is the Dean; Mrs. Charles Z. Dukes, Registrar.

Also, in July, 1971, we were represented by Miss Jessie Cottman of Pocomoke City in a Women's Division-sponsored Leadership and Develop-

ment Seminar held in Cuernavaca, Mexico. In June of the year Miss Cottman will attend a similar seminar to be held in Tanzania, Africa.

August, 1971, was a busy month. Mrs. R. J. Cooke, Chairman of Christian Social Relations, and Mrs. Howard A. Bailey, Vice-President, two of our Conference officers, attended a Women's Division National Seminar held in Lincoln, Nebraska. Both reported on this experience in the meeting in Rehoboth Beach in November.

The President attended the Assembly of the World Federation of Methodist Women held at Loretto Heights College, Denver, Colorado, in August. We were fortunate to be chosen as one of the one hundred North American representatives permitted to attend.

Following the Federation meeting we moved to the campus of Denver University to attend the meetings of both the World Methodist Council and the World Methodist Conference. The President was elected a member of the World Council for the term 1971-1975.

The Conference Wesleyan Service Guild held their annual retreat at Drayton Manor on September 18 with 27 women in attendance. Mrs. Sylvanus Browne, Jr., Conference Guild Chairman, and her committee directed the retreat. As in other years this was one of the "mountain top" experiences in the lives of those who attended.

The President was again invited to attend the annual meeting of the Board of Missions and the Women's Division, but because of illness in her family, was unable to attend.

On November 18 our Fall meeting was held in Epworth United Methodist Church, Rehoboth Beach. There were over 400 women present. The featured speaker was Mrs. Helen Gangwere, a well-known artist. She spoke of the value of art in religion, using some of her own paintings as examples. Her message concerning "Stewardship of our Hands and Talents" was most inspiring.

Our Chairman of Spiritual Growth, Mrs. Joseph Murray, attended the Christmas Convocation of Evangelism held in Philadelphia, November 30 to December 2.

Sixty-four women from our Conference attended the quadrennial meeting of the Northeastern Jurisdiction Women's Society-Guild Meeting held in Atlantic City in March. Two of our women were honored at this assembly; Mrs. William A. Henry of Wilmington was re-elected to serve for another quadrennium as a member of the Board of Missions, and Miss Jessie Cottman was elected as the Vice-President of the Jurisdiction Society-Guild.

Our pledge for Missions this year was \$95,500. We have met this pledge in full and with \$8,694 given for special causes and projects, a total of \$104,194 has been forwarded to the Women's Division.

During the sessions of the Summer School and in the Conference meetings, Mrs. Paul Evans, our Secretary of Program Materials, sold \$1,603.95 worth of program and resource materials.

All the districts have held "cluster" or "area" meetings during the year, resulting in a contact of the majority of local Women's Societies. There is a great deal of interest, dedication, and devotion to the program

and Purpose of the Women's Society of Christian Service. In every effort put forth there has been clear evidence of an upsurge in spiritual concern.

In the past eight years our organization has undergone many changes. We now face more changes, including a new name! What the future holds for us we do not know, but it is safe to say we do know who holds the future, and in His strength and with His guidance, we go forward.

SECTION III

PROGRAM AND ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

What is C.O.C.U. all about? What do these letters stand for? What does ecumenical mean, anyhow? These are just some of the questions to which we have tried to address ourselves during this Conference Year. Members of the Commission have come together for several meetings, and two of our members, the Reverend Thomas C. Short and the Reverend Ivon Downing, were sent to the workshop on Christian Unity in an effort to find out where we are and where we are going in the "ecumenical world".

The Church of Christ Uniting

The Consultation on Church Union (C.O.C.U.) is now referred to as the Church of Christ Uniting. During this year, our commission sponsored a workshop on each of the four districts in our Conference to help enable pastors and Commission Chairmen to understand and lead their congregations in a study of **A Plan of Union**. This study booklet has been produced to help us understand the theology and structure of such a united church. We have also sent commission members to help various local congregations with such a study when they have asked for help. As a follow-up to these district meetings, we have sent questionnaires to each of our pastors requesting that the questions and suggestions which their people offered as a result of the study be shared with us, so we can share them with the steering committee of the Church of Christ Uniting. At the writing of this report, we have reviewed several of these and anticipate receiving many more before June 1, 1972.

Please understand that June 1, 1972, is not an automatic "cut-off" date for such a study in your local church. If you have not had a study group meet in your church, please try to have one in the coming year.

DelMarVa Ecumenical Agency

This agency, known to us as the D.E.A. has been going through abnormal organizational pains during this past year. All began fairly well, but the illness of our Director, the Reverend Robert Allred, resulted in his

resignation, and naturally, this has greatly hindered the work and progress anticipated by all of us who are a part of this agency. Currently, the Personal Committee is interviewing new candidates for the position of Executive Director, and someone should be employed in this capacity in the near future. This crisis calls for our patience and understanding and a new determination to co-operate with our new leader.

In spite of these many problems in the summer of 1971, the D.E.A. was able to sponsor a meaningful "beach ministry" at Ocean City and a migrant ministry in some rural counties and plans are made for a continuation of these ministries in the summer of 1972. Take heart!! This organization still affords a great opportunity for sixteen judicatories on the DelMarVa Peninsula to work co-operatively in the ministry of our Lord.

Other Ecumenical Expressions

The members of our Commission are delighted to hear of the many other ecumenical expressions in our area. In Glasgow the Presbyterian, Episcopalian and United Methodist Churches continue to work and plan toward a joint ministry. In Chesapeake City the Presbyterian Church and the United Methodist Church are in the process of selecting a pastor to serve these two churches. A proposal is being considered for an Ecumenical effort in the Campus Ministry. Other studies are being made in our Conference which might very well produce co-operative ministries across denominational lines. All of this is very encouraging.

Recommendations

1. We encourage the "heartiest" participation possible by the members of our Conference in local ecumenical activities.
2. We request the DelMarVa Ecumenical Agency to lead its member churches in workshops to help deepen our understanding of and commitment to the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and similar local ecumenical expressions, and that such workshops be held in various geographical locations throughout DelMarVa.

PROGRAM COUNCIL REPORT

The Conference Program Council has met five times during the past year with an average attendance of 35. The following have served as the elected officers: Dr. James C. Hardcastle, Chairman; the Reverend Robert P. Whitlock, Vice-Chairman; the Reverend William H. Revelle, Jr., Secretary; and Mr. Robert Powrie, Treasurer. The professional staff are: the Reverend R. Jervis Cooke, Program Director; the Reverend J. Gordon Stapleton, Associate Program Director (Education); the Reverend Walter H. Stone, Associate Program Director (Drayton Retreat Center); the Reverend Richard D. Bailey, Associate Program Director (Communications); and the Reverend

C. Jackson Robinson, Assistant Program Director (Camp PeCoMeth). In addition, there are two ministers who serve as volunteer staff: The Reverend W. Hayward Greene, Conference Secretary of Evangelism and the Reverend Widmon Butler, Conference Missionary Secretary. (It should be noted that Mr. Bailey serves part-time on our Conference Staff and also on the Baltimore Conference Staff.)

I. Items Referred By Annual Conference

1. It was requested that the Council recommend the minimum salary for certified lay workers. This was studied by a Task Force and the Program Council. Our recommendation is \$7,500 per year. If a housing allowance is paid or living quarters furnished, the housing allowance or value of the quarters furnished would be included in the \$7,500 figure, and any pension provided by the employing agency would not be included in the \$7,500 figure.

2. It was requested that we expand the mailing list of the Conference Capsule to include Senior MYF Presidents and Youth Council Chairmen. This has been done, where we have information. There are only 95 names on file in the Conference headquarters.

3. It was suggested that we consider developing a Conference-wide M.A.P. program. This was studied by the Council, Executive Committee, Cabinet, and Staff. It is our feeling that it is necessary for work of this kind to grow out of an awareness of need on the part of local churches and/or Districts. An organized urban program should grow out of this local response rather than be superimposed. M.A.P., on the Wilmington District, has been undergoing significant self-study this year looking to its own future planning. Should there be similar programming developed in one or more of the other Districts, then, the Program Council would likely suggest a Conference-wide structure to coordinate the work. We will encourage response to special needs throughout the Conference.

4. We were asked to sponsor workshops for each District involving laity. After considerable discussion, it was decided we not hold district workshops on Race this year. However, there were other workshops on each district which involved laity and the same are noted in this report.

5. We were requested to study the possibility of employing a full-time Conference Youth Worker. After much study, and a review of present commitments and other pressing needs, such as the urgent request of the Black Caucus, it was decided to postpone consideration of establishing this full-time position. A Task Force has provided us with a suggested job description and budget for this position. In the meantime, we will give increased emphasis to our youth work through the use of Conference staff, part-time and volunteer leadership.

6. A matter relating to goal setting and long-range planning suggested by Mr. Fred Teets of St. John's Church, Seaford, was referred to the Council. We believe the Council speaks to this matter with directness and clarity in the adopted priorities, one point of which calls for the naming of a committee on Research and Planning within the Council. This will provide

us with an ongoing review of priorities as well as regular attention to long-range planning.

7. Two separate references were related to the same subject—our lack of a Black person on our Council Staff. We have elected an Associate Program Director for Black Ministries and subject to appointment by Bishop Lord, the Reverend John R. Shockley will begin his staff duties at the close of this session of Conference.

8. A matter of major concern was the referral of the request for \$100,000 per year for four years beginning January 1, 1973, to strengthen the black churches. This was assigned for study to the Task Force on Priorities and the Cabinet. During the year a Black Caucus was formed to aid us in understanding the implications of this request. With real churchmanship and a genuine desire to find a satisfactory way to deal with very real needs, the Black Caucus has fully supported the plan which was adopted by the Council on recommendation of its Priorities Task Force. This plan calls for an allocation of \$25,000 per year to provide support and program funding for a Director of Black Ministries who will be amenable to the Program Council and work under the supervision of the Program Director. The Black Caucus participated in the process of selecting the person elected. The Commission on World Service and Finance has included this funding in its proposed budget. We believe that this is the best possible way for us to strengthen our Black Churches. Obviously, the skills developed and the experience gained will be of benefit to all our churches regardless of race, and this is as it should be.

II. Other Actions Of The Council

One of the most significant actions taken by the Program Council this year was the adoption of Priorities. Once adopted these became guidelines for budget and program planning. The full report of the Task Force has been widely distributed through the Coordinated Mailing and CONTACT. We will only include here the priorities and specific recommendations which were adopted by the Council.

Basic Assumption

THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE EXISTS PRIMARILY AS AN EXTENSION OF AND TO SUPPORT THE LOCAL CHURCH IN MISSION AND MINISTRY.

Priority I—STRENGTHENING OF THE LOCAL CHURCH IN MISSION AND MINISTRY

Recommendation

The Program Council shall direct its staff to devise methods that will assure the continued enlistment and training of competent lay leadership; in-service training of clergy; better use of communications; and the development of challenging, life-affecting programs to be used in and by the local churches, such as "Key 73."

Priority I-A—THE STRENGTHENING OF BLACK CHURCHES IN MISSION AND MINISTRY

Recommendation

1. That a Black person be added to the Program Council Staff as an Associate Program Director for Black Ministries. The term of employment shall be effective June 1, 1972. This person would be a program counselor for Black Churches and an interpreter of Black needs to the rest of the staff and the Conference agencies. This person would be amenable to the Program Council and work under the direction of the Conference Program Director.

2. \$12,500 shall be made available this year for support and program beginning June 1, 1972. \$25,000 per year shall be included in the 1973 budget for support and program.

Priority II—CAMP PECOMETH

Recommendation

The Board of Education be requested to make an immediate study of the condition of Camp PeCoMeth facilities and report its findings and needs to the next meeting of the Program Council with a view towards reallocation of current budget for emergency items and a long-range plan for rehabilitation.

Priority III—COMMITTEE ON CAMPS AND RETREAT CENTERS

Recommendation

One committee, amenable to the Program Council, would be responsible for the operation and program of Drayton Manor and Camp PeCoMeth. This Committee would be designated "Committee on Camps and Retreat Centers".

Priority IV—MINISTRY TO YOUTH

Recommendation

Ministry to youth must have a high priority, and we feel that this is encompassed in Priority I concerning strengthening the local church. It is recommended that consideration of the appointment of a full-time Conference Youth Director be deferred until Recommendations I, I-A, and II have been implemented.

Priority V—WESLEY COLLEGE RELATIONSHIP

Recommendation

The Program Council appoint a committee to study Wesley College to consist of five persons to examine the past, present, and future relationship of Wesley College to the Peninsula Annual Conference and report its findings and recommendations to the Program Council and trustees of Wesley College not later than February 1, 1973.

Priority VI—CONTINUED REVIEW

Recommendation

That the Program Council appoint a Committee on Research and Planning each year at its first meeting following the regular Annual Conference session to review, study and recommend priorities for the ensuing year. Not more than one-half of the previous year's committee members shall be reappointed, no person shall be reappointed more than three successive years, and appointments shall take into consideration age, sex, race, and geography.

At the suggestion of the Cabinet and upon the recommendations of the Council of Bishops, the Council has named a Task Force on Parish Development. Eight ministers, eight laymen, and the Cabinet and Program Director comprise the Task Force. The Reverend Laurence Stookey is Chairman. They are now studying parish problems and patterns hoping to find a way that would assure every United Methodist in this Conference access to a full program church.

A Workshop on Racial Ministries was held at Drayton Manor on January 11-13, 1972. This involved 22 clergy and was half black, half white. This is the second such experience. There will be others.

With Council support there were four workshops on the Consultation on Church Union sponsored by the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs.

Likewise, with Council support, four workshops on Social Concerns were held in March by the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns.

The Council staff, at the request of the Cabinet, conducted a workshop for District Program Councils at Drayton Manor.

We are indebted to the Board of Education for providing valuable leadership training in a number of settings throughout the year. These programs have been scheduled through the Council and have been of real benefit to the churches.

Teams of trained persons are available to visit local churches to assist in developing Councils on Ministries, Administrative Boards, or to help in the process of goal setting and program planning. All you need do is ask for help. Contact the Council Office (302-674-2626) or consult your own District Superintendent.

The Council has decided to affiliate with Mid-Atlantic Training Committee, an organization which provides training in human relations and leadership skills. Membership offers a wide variety of training opportunities at a reduced cost.

We are actively involved in the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency. Specific programs to which we are related include: Migrant Ministry, Seashore Ministry, Communications Task Force, groups studying Peace, Capital Punishment, Religion in Public Schools, etc. Basic participation is at the level of the Metropolitan and the Peninsula Planning Committees.

Our Division of Communications continues to provide the Ministers' Coordinated Mailing and the Benevolence Bulletin each month. The Conference Capsule was given a new format and a new name in December when CONTACT was first issued. This has been well received. The mailing list

has been greatly increased. It is sent to 370 Council on Ministries Chairmen; 95 Youth contact persons; 55 News Media; 22 Board and Agency Chairmen; 501 Lay Leaders; 45 Program Council Members; all ministers active and retired; 19 students and chaplains; and 400 Lay Members of the Annual Conference.

A 9½ minute slide/tape presentation was provided to the District Superintendents for use in Charge Conferences—"Sights and Sounds of the Peninsula Conference."

The Audio-Visual Library filled 2,050 requests in 1971.

A total of 16 Stewardship Sessions have been conducted for local churches in our Conference by our Director of Communications, the Reverend Richard D. Bailey, who is the Baltimore Conference Director of Stewardship.

The Council has endorsed the resolutions of the Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns relating to "freedom to practice one's religion," "suggested review of investment portfolios by Conference agencies and individual Christians," and one relating to "school segregation, busing, etc."

This has been a busy year for the Council and its Staff. The Staff has been building meaningful team relationships and developing skills that they may better serve the churches and people of this Conference.

III. RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that:

1. The minimum annual salary for a certified lay worker be \$7,500.
2. The Program Council be authorized to conduct a study of the feasibility of an Urgent Needs Campaign within the Peninsula Conference to provide funds for a variety of worthy causes and institutions related to the Conference, including the Pension Endowment Fund.
3. That in recognition of the Centennial Year of Wesley College, Dover, Delaware, we designate October 22, 1972, as Wesley College Centennial Sunday and urge all of our churches to share in this celebration.
4. The following be adopted as the program of the Peninsula Annual Conference for the remainder of 1972 and the Calendar Year 1973:

Please note that this program relates closely to the adopted priorities with special reference to I and I-A.

It is suggested that a Conference-wide Convocation be held in the Fall of 1972 to launch this program. Several of the events suggested for the Fall of '72 could be included in such a meeting. Some of the following events listed separately such as the District Workshops may be combined or scheduled at a later time.

Program Outline

IN ORDER TO STRENGTHEN THE LOCAL CHURCH IN MISSION AND MINISTRY:

1. (a) Renewed emphasis on enlistment or recruitment of lay workers for work both in the local church and beyond.
- (b) Major emphasis on leadership training for both laity and clergy. We will utilize workshops, laboratory schools, seminars and for

- a limited number of persons, the training made possible through membership in the Mid-Atlantic Training Committee, Inc.
2. In cooperation with the Board of the Ministry, the Board of Education, and our theological seminaries, we will seek to provide significant opportunities for in-service training for the clergy.
 3. To improve communications, we will plan:
 - (a) A workshop for District communications leaders in the Fall of 1972.
 - (b) A training experience for local church communications people in the winter.
 - (c) Beginning January 1, 1973, the Program Council will assume responsibility for the Support Services Section presently related to the Business Office. This will operate under our Division of Communications and should increase our ability to serve the churches.
 - (d) **Contact** and the Coordinated Mailing should be improved and the target audience expanded.
 4. Programs to be planned in the areas of:
 - A—Evangelism**
 - (1) "Key 73"
 - (a) Conference endorse full program "Key 73".
 - (b) Program Council name Task Force to sponsor program. This should lead to deepening of spiritual life, stimulate more meaningful and varied worship experiences as called for in our Priority.
 - (2) "We Care" Program
 - (a) At least a pilot project on each District.
 - (3) Convocation on Evangelism—Fall '72—to train and motivate District and local church area chairmen of Evangelism.
 - B—Stewardship**
 - (1) Four District Workshops on Stewardship in Fall '72 for ministers and laity (4 hours). To explore overall meaning of Stewardship and evaluate local church needs. Stress "Time and Ability."
 - (2) Training sessions—Spring '73—for Every Member Commitment Program.
 - (3) Conference-wide Every Member Commitment Program—Fall 1973.
 - C—Youth**
 - (1) Renewed emphasis on youth work to support the local church.
 - (2) Involvement of more youth in decision making process in Conference through Boards and Agencies as well as Conference sessions, consultations, convocations, etc.
 - D—Parish Development**
 - (1) Convocation in 1972 for discussion of Parish program.
 - (2) Suggest and implement Conference policy in regard to Parish Development under leadership of Program Council Task Force.
 - E—Missions**
 - (1) Month of February 1973 be the month for missionary itineration and special cultivation.

- (2) Interpretation of General Board policies and programs through Conference Board programs and communications facilities of Conference.
 - (3) Promotion of General and Conference Advance Specials.
 - (4) Promote a sense of Global Mission.
- F—Fund for Reconciliation**
- (1) A major effort to meet our goal of \$200,000 by December 31, 1972.
- G—Social Concerns**
- (1) **Peace and World Order**—support the "Bishops' Call for Peace and the Development of People."
 - (2) **General Welfare**—Drug and alcohol concerns be program priority.
 - (3) **Human Welfare**—Programs in pursuit of inclusiveness. Study and evaluate work of Project Equality.
- H—Education**
- (1) Develop new forms for teaching the faith.
 - (2) Build and train a cadre of specialists to use in leadership development in the local church.
 - (3) Stress training in Human Relations concepts through Middle Atlantic Training Committee.
 - (4) Establish a long-range planning committee within the Conference Board of Education which will be open to expressions of local church needs.
- I—Camps and Retreat Centers**
- (1) Program Council will name the Committee which will operate Drayton Retreat Center and Camp PeCoMeth.
 - (2) We will expect coordination of effort and increasingly efficient programming through cooperation and mutual sharing of resources.
- J—Ecumenical**
- (1) Continued support of Delmarva Ecumenical Agency.
 - (2) Study of COCU Plan and interpretation of developments in regards the consultation.
 - (3) To encourage the Ecumenical dimension in all our planning.

With reference to Priority I-A, **Strengthening of Black Churches:**

Specific program to be developed when staff person has had opportunity to study the situation and the Program Council has reviewed suggestions from all sources.

Detailed reports should be made by all the persons on the Conference Program Council Staff of their work, and evaluation of their areas of concern, to the 1973 Annual Conference.

FAMILY LIFE MINISTRIES

The Family Life Ministries of our Conference are coordinated by Donald J. Hurst. His responsibility includes being acquainted with all of the current Family Life resources and being able to help implement their use when the need is indicated. He also keeps abreast of movements that are within the sphere of family life ministries in order to keep our Conference program to date.

The opportunities for ministry in the area of Family Life are overwhelming. It is obviously a full-time responsibility. Last year a major attempt was completed in acquainting local Churches with the resources available through our publishing house to carry on a complete family life program in the local Church. This year 87 ministers were trained in the art of pre-marital counseling and the appropriate use of materials for the same. A program of Marriage Enrichment has also continued to expand under the combined leadership of the Conference Family Life Coordinator and his wife, Muffett. Churches that have scheduled Marriage Enrichment retreats with their leadership have been elated with the Christian growth which takes place and the stability created among married couples. It is felt that more ministers and their wives in our Conference will want to be trained this coming year to lead Marriage Enrichment experiences. In the spring Mr. Hurst will attend a Northeastern Jurisdiction Workshop at Wesley Theological Seminary for Conference Family Life Coordinators in order to learn to design a better Family Life program for our Conference.

He will continue to work with the outstanding District Family Life Coordinators, Joseph C. Bostick from the Easton District, Earl L. Magill from the Dover District, Emerson M. Jolly from the Salisbury District and Mrs. Marjorie Hallwell from the Wilmington District, and develop strong leadership among the local Church Family Life Coordinators.

QUADRENNIAL EMPHASIS COMMITTEE

Reconciliation is our business and this committee has always tried to be mindful of this fact in our endeavor to fulfill our ministry in the areas of our responsibility, volunteer services, Bible study and the Fund for Reconciliation.

At our request, the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations created a committee on volunteer services. This committee stands ready to assist in providing volunteer workers for projects in our Conference. However, the committee has received no requests for assistance.

Pastors have been encouraged to provide opportunities for their people to participate in the quadrennial emphasis Bible study, The Life and Teachings of Jesus.

It has been increasingly apparent to us that the Fund for Reconciliation is a real effective program for reconciliation and not only deserves but demands our whole-hearted support. Everything possible must be done to

assure the attainment of the Peninsula Conference fair-share goal of two hundred thousand dollars (two dollars per member). As of December 31, 1971, we had received a little less than one third of this amount. Listed below is a statement of receipts and disbursements for the first three years of this quadrennial program.

The Fund is administered by the Quadrennial Emphasis Committee according to the following formula:

- 50% RECONCILIATION TO THE CHANGING CITY
- 25% CONFERENCE-WIDE STUDIES AND WORKSHOPS
- 25% OTHER MINISTRIES OF RECONCILIATION

Conference funded projects and the amounts allocated are:

- (1) MAP, OPERATION LEAVEN, Racial Attitudes and Perspectives RAP, a course designed to explore the facts and feelings of black and white persons who are living in a society permeated by racism and to assist in understanding the Christian response to the situation. Other ministries include open forums and vacation church school. (\$8,600)
- (2) WHATCOAT DAY CARE CENTER at Dover. Day care services are offered to working parents. (\$1,500)
- (3) SCHOLARSHIPS AT WESLEY COLLEGE: For black students from the Peninsula Annual Conference. (\$5,800)
- (4) DRAYTON MANOR RECONCILIATION RETREATS: To afford the black and white leaders of a given community the opportunity to meet together on neutral ground for exposure and dialogue which can produce a positive change of attitudes and result, hopefully, in constructive planning for the local community. The churches of St. Michaels participated in the first of these retreats. Another retreat is being planned for the churches of Seaford. (\$2,000)
- (5) KENT NARROW MINISTRY: To migrants and the people of Kent Narrows. This ministry is a project of Pe-Co-Meth. (\$600)
- (6) DELMAR YOUTH CENTER: Funds were allocated to help finance a coffee house at the center. (\$500)
- (7) NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE (\$4,400)

The committee anticipates that the work begun by the Fund for Reconciliation in this quadrennium will not be completed but will be a continuing

ministry of reconciliation in our Church. We urge the pastors to give the Fund their wholehearted support, and recommend:

Recommendation

that the month of November, 1972, be designated as Reconciliation Month with emphasis to be placed on completing the Conference quota for the Fund for Reconciliation.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The activities of the Commission on Worship are channeled through two groups, the Commission itself and the Music Committee which for two years has been a part of the Commission on Worship

The Music Committee, under the chairmanship of Ralph Ellis, has done an excellent job in preparing for a day for choir members and directors which at this writing is to be held under the leadership of Dr. Ivan Trusler late in April. The Committee is composed mainly of laymen who are active in the musical programs of their local churches and who are enthusiastic about the need of developing more effective ministry of music in all local churches.

The Commission on Worship this year has sought to assist local churches and district programs by providing personnel from the Commission or from other resources of the Conference whenever requested. In October there were several churches that attempted to use the proposed alternative order for Holy Communion which has been developed by the National Commission on Worship. This order for Holy Communion is the service which will be used to open the 1972 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

Once again the Commission has borne responsibility in designing and preparing for the several worship experiences which are to be a part of the Annual Conference. As always its goal is to provide the Annual Conference with an ideal of liturgical practice and to teach by demonstration and through participation that liturgy does not mean "dead" nor "formal", but does involve **life and movement** and celebration of what God has done.

MEMBERSHIP AND LAY ACTIVITIES

REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN ON PERSONAL-PROGRAM COUNCIL BOARD OF EVANGELISM

This report is a restatement of goals and how we plan to achieve them. Program Council, page 1256, Goal B, Conference Journal 1971, which read—

"Program Council's goals—

"Personal—Gaining personal commitment to God through Jesus Christ which will involve the total use of all that we are and have—work, time, talent, money, influence, etc.—in the light of what God is doing in His world with people as His Co-workers."

Personal commitment in the light the goal defined—(1) To do, (2) To carry through, (3) To involve, and (4) Entrust.

We have made a claim such as the Israelites. They saw themselves as a particular chosen people, covenant people of God, etc.

"O Lord, thou art my God" Isa. 25:1. "I have given you as a covenant to the people, a light to the nations, to open the eyes that are blind, to bring out the prisoners from the dungeon, and those who sit in darkness." Isa. 42:6-7.

In view of what God has wrought in Jesus Christ, His was a continuation of God's redemptive action. Lk. 4:16, Matt. 5-7, Matt. 28:18, Mk. 16:15, John 1-17—8:16, Rom. 11:17-18, Gal. Eph. Phil. Coll. 1.

As United Methodist Christians we lay claim to a God in Jesus Christ as expressed such credulous statements as found in the modern Korean affirmation of faith. The United Methodist Church which provides for us a place to stand where we can declare our faith has laid upon us a burden of responsibility to bear fruit as evidence of our true relationship to God in Jesus.

In so doing Guidelines for such are as follows:

I. The Aim of Evangelism is—

- A. To bring all persons into living active fellowship with God through Jesus Christ as Divine Savior and Lord, and the Regenerating power of the Holy Spirit.
- B. To gather them into the fellowship of the Church, and
- C. Lead them to express their Christian discipleship in every area of human life that the kingdom of God may be realized. Par. 1125-1968 Discipline.

II. Evangelism

- A. The winning of persons to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. It is an attitude, a Spirit, and a living faith that finds expression in a continuous cooperative effort on the part of the Holy Spirit and man to bring the individual into vital relationship to God and his fellowmen through faith in Jesus Christ.
- B. It results in a definite personal experience of salvation (wholeness of life), a growing sensitivity to the social relevance of the Gospel and progressive building Christlike character.
- C. It seeks to bring men into complete harmony with the will of God into the fellowship of the church, and into involvement in the world to be God's servant of reconciliation.
- D. It helps him grow spiritually through the means of grace and to serve God in daily living. Par. 1126, Discipline 1968.

The Annual Conference has given to the Board of Evangelism and the Board of the Laity the task of calling (persons) to the membership of our Conference to total individual commitment to the above.

Outlined by our Conference as follows: (1) Study Groups, (2) Retreat, and (3) Mission,—Lay, Youth, etc., and (4) Church School, and (5) Young Adults. Also "We Care Ministry-Mission".

Question: What are the implications and how do we deal with them?

Answer: Institute a "We Care Mission" as one phase of "The Care of Members".

Purpose: Local Church gain new insight as to its responsibility to care for its members.

The above project is to take place in Local Churches on each District. "We Care Ministry-Mission" is a program designed for 3 days—Tuesday-Thursday. Ministers visit the entire membership confronting them with three questions.

1. How do you view your church? How do you respond to it?
2. How do you view Jesus Christ, and what is your relationship to him?
3. How do you view yourself in relationship to others?

ITS PURPOSE IS:

- To help the local church develop a meaningful and authentic ministry of evangelism.
- To mobilize and equip the people for their involvement in the church in mission.
- To refine the continuing structure of the church for mission.
- To establish such task groups as are necessary for mission.
- To set the scene for the church to render a more vital ministry to its people, its community, and the world.

ITS METHOD OF PROCEDURE IS:

- To assist the pastor as he leads the congregation into mission.
- To lead the church in the examination of its resources and discovery of the needs to which these resources should be applied.

To work within the Council on Ministries, Administrative Board, age level ministries, work areas, WSCS, and other organizations as they assess and project their work.

To build functional, authentic task groups to do the work that needs to be done.

To conduct a lay academy for the equipping of a core of people to live out their faith in the world.

Annual Conference Projects—Recommendations

1. **We Care Ministry-Mission** on each district.
2. **Conference Evangelistic Convocation**—Three days in length—Tuesday-Thursday. Possible place—Rehoboth or Ocean City, Md.—Fall or early winter. Emphasis Key 73.
3. **Retreat**—for executive members of Boards for insight, direction, projections, etc.—weekend—Friday-Sunday.
4. **Key 73 Projects**—Ecumenically where possible.

Recommendation—The undergirding or strengthening of weak churches.

The following was suggested.

- A. Give special assistance to weak churches by:
 - Leadership in designing implementing "Care of Members".
 - Design for Witness and Short Term Evangelistic Ministry.
 - Equipping minister and laymen for ministry in and to their area of need.
- B. Provide assistance in difficult situations such as:
 - Rapidly expanding areas.
 - Serve difficult inner city and rural parishes.
 - Churches unaware of evangelistic opportunities.
- C. Provide assistance and encouragement to declining churches.
 - Conducting surveys to determine possible alternatives.
 - Help minister and laymen make whatever change necessary.

It was agreed a task force is needed.

To provide organizational structure for initiating and implementing, evaluation and other support factors such as: Providing leadership, resources—materials and personnel.

Provide funds from their budgets and where financial needs reach beyond their means to seek such funds from other sources.

Recommendation—These are to be appointed by the District Superintendent in consultation with the Chairman of Personal.

What the Board of Evangelism has to offer:

Direction—aim and purpose.

What the Conference Board provides to local church through District, Conference, Jurisdictional, General, National agencies in order that the Local Church might achieve above goals.

1. It provides available leadership who have a motivation and for the most part some basic training to give guidance to local churches.

2. It provides training opportunities for local Church leadership, etc.
3. It provides opportunities for personal growth.
4. It organizes, promotes and sponsors programs designed to meet personal Local Church, District and Conference needs.
5. It encourages Local Churches to initiate programs of design to observe, goal set, help in individual needs.

The Board serves as an invaluable aid to persons in training Local Churches, District, and Conference levels in accomplishing set goals.

CONFERENCE LAY LEADER'S REPORT

The Peninsula Conference Board of the Laity has had a very busy year. We shall long remember Bishop Roy Nichols' challenging and inspiring message at the Annual Conference Lay Banquet.

Our "come as you are" lay services at old Barratt's Chapel were well attended. These Sunday evening services during July and August gave many of the Laity a chance to participate. Hopefully, additional interest in old Barratt's Chapel was created.

In September, the Annual Men of United Methodism Retreat was held at Camp PeCoMeth. Dr. David Self, General Secretary of the General Board of the Laity, led us in a study in depth of Evangelism and what it means to be a Christian. A special dividend was obtained from this well-attended Retreat—RAIN.

Excessive rain emphasized the needs for repairs at Camp PeCoMeth. As a result, special offering at the Ministers' and Laymen's Communion Breakfasts this spring (three in each District) have raised at least \$1,500 for these badly needed repairs. This will supplement the Conference appropriation.

During the winter at least one Lay Speaking Course was offered in each of the four Districts. In some Districts an advance course concerning basic Christian beliefs was held for Certified Lay Speakers.

The well-attended District Ministers' and Laymen's Banquets offered us an opportunity for fellowship as well as inspiration from excellent after-dinner speakers.

A dinner honoring Bishop and Mrs. Lord will be given by the Ministers and the Laymen instead of the Annual Conference Lay Banquet.

The Board of the Laity wishes to thank all laity and clergy, Bishop Lord, and the Cabinet for their help in making this an excellent year.

I am sure that I speak for all of our laity, both men and women, when I say, "Bishop Lord, we shall miss you and your Lady. We wish both of you many years of happiness in your retirement."

LAY WORKER COMMITTEE

Within a span of less than three years, the newly created committee on the Lay Worker has moved forward, even pioneering at times to understand, interpret, and clarify the position of the Lay Worker in the United Methodist Church. We feel progress has been made.

This past year the committee met three times, spending a majority of the time implementing the recommendations passed at the 1971 sessions of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

In September, personal letters were mailed to the Pastor-Parish Relations Chairman of each charge conference requesting that they consider initiating a pension plan covering any lay employee who has been employed full time by that church for one full year or more. No specific pension plan was recommended, but a copy of the Cumulative Pension and Benefit Fund, administered by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church was included with the mailing. Inquiries resulted from this bulk mailing.

The Program Council, on recommendation by our committee and mandated by the 1971 Annual Conference, appointed a task force to study and recommend a minimum salary for Lay Workers. This salary recommendation will be presented at this session of the Annual Conference. You are asked to please give this recommendation careful consideration. Appropriate monetary compensation needs to accompany the already established educational and professional requirements for persons contributing to the life of the church as a consecrated Lay Worker; as well as, be an incentive to attract additional persons to this career.

A memorial was sent to General Conference to amend #507 of *The Discipline*, regarding the Lay Worker's benefits. This memorial requests that the Annual Conference shall include the Lay Worker in the retirement plan of the Annual Conference or a satisfactory equivalent. Secondly, that the Annual Conference in which a Lay Worker is serving shall provide guidance in lay employee benefits in addition to the pension fund. It shall be the aim of the Annual Conference to insure for Lay Workers rights and conditions at least no less than those representative of enlightened and Christian policies now commonly practiced by secular institutions.

These three years which I have served as chairman of this committee have been rewarding ones. I suppose it is always so when you nurture the birth of a new idea; for you sense the creativity potential in new life. Sharing this with me has been a most faithful and responsible committee. Special recognition should be given to Miss Nancy Osgood, who has been our meticulous secretary during this time of our labors together.

Before us lies the future. Together, let us encourage, enlist and undergird, all who shall seek this challenging vocation within the church—The Lay Worker.

BOARD OF MINISTRY

"As I begin my ministry, I want to be faithful. I want to be fruitful. I want to be dedicated. But most of all I want to be honest in my witness and my relationship with Christ. I want to say, with Paul 'Therefore, having this ministry by the mercy of God, we do not lose heart. We have renounced disgraceful, underhanded ways; we refuse to practice cunning or to tamper with God's Word, but by the open statement of the truth we would commend ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God,' (II Corinthians 4: 1-2) This is the best gift a minister can give the people to whom he ministers". (From, "Where the Action Is".)

The Board of Ministry of the Peninsula Annual Conference continues to strive to maintain the high standards for the ministry established by the General Church and our local Conference. At the same time we seek to provide maximum guidance and help for ministerial candidates to fulfill their "high calling".

The activity of your Board is summarized in the following report of committees and Task Force.

Continuing Education

The task of this committee is to present to the ministers information concerning the various types of opportunities in which they may wish to become engaged for the purpose of developing new skills and enriching their ministry.

During the year such information has been circulated through the coordinated mailing. To our knowledge a number of the ministers have been enrolled in short-term seminars and reading courses offered by seminaries in close proximity.

The one project sponsored by our committee was a Seminar for Ministers, held at Drayton Manor Center, July 19-21, 1971. The theme was "New Trends in the Ministry". Our leaders for the three days were Dr. Robert E. Luccock of Boston University School of Theology, and The Reverend George Younger, Director of Metropolitan Urban Service Training (MUST), New York, N. Y. There were 19 pastors enrolled in this project.

Currently, the committee is in touch with a number of hospitals and seminaries, seeking to get the listing of opportunities which will be open to our pastors in the months which lie ahead.

Recruitment

At present this committee is maintaining contact with some ninety (90) persons either as "decided" or "potential" candidates for the ministry. Through cooperation with the Division of Higher Education of The United Methodist Church, each of these persons has received five (5) brochures that open many of the exciting options to a variety of ministries. They identify the kinds of persons who are needed, what is involved in pre-seminary studies, resources that are available for financial aid, and provide information on curricula, degree program, housing, Selected Service regulation, cost and procedures for applying for admission to seminaries.

Accompanied by the chairman of the Cabinet, visitations were made to the School of Religion at Howard University in Washington, D. C. and Garrett Seminary in Chicago, in an effort to recruit clergy for our Conference, with particular emphasis on the need for black candidates. That effort seems very favorable in long-range effects, as well as some immediate possibilities.

We have initiated a plan to provide three (3) pilot projects in our Conference in which the Board of Ministry would cooperate with the local church or Conference agency, enabling potential candidates to determine their direction in regard to the ministry. The effort would be to develop three varying opportunities (urban, rural, specialized, etc.). The Board of Ministry would provide approximately one-third of the necessary finances with the local church or agency providing the other two-thirds, plus housing for either a summer period or a part-time involvement through the academic year. The emphasis would be directed toward the college student in his last two years, or a first-year seminarian. This program would enable us to see the ministerial candidate at work in the field, and would permit him to become familiar with the ministry and our Conference.

Scholarship—Loan

Financial aid in the amount of \$5,250 was granted in the form of scholarship loans to nine (9) seminary students. Three students received the maximum amount of \$800 while the others were given amounts proportionate to their needs. Total amount allocated in the budget for this purpose was expended. The committee also processed applications and gave its approval to scholarship loans amounting to \$900 from the Scott Memorial Fund for two additional students, and to one scholarship loan made available by the W.S.C.S. of Grace Church, Wilmington in the amount of \$500.

The Committee noted that \$1,000 of scholarship money is available for a student at Drew from the Riddle Fund—Domestic, and an additional \$1,689 from the Riddle Fund for a student who will study at Drew in preparation for Foreign Missionary Service. There were no applicants this year for either of these funds.

A change of policy was made this year in reference to repayment. One third of a student's total scholarship loan is cancelled for each year of full-time service rendered within the Peninsula Conference after graduation.

At the last session of the Annual Conference, a new Scholarship and Loan Committee was elected of which the members of The Board of Ministry Committee are ex-officio. The actions reported above were approved by the new committee.

Some requests for financial aid have been received from college students preparing for their ministry. To date there has not been sufficient support of the Ministerial Education Fund for this to be considered because of the great financial needs of seminary students. However, the committee has recommended that The Board of Ministry consider a change of policy at this point when greater financial resources are available.

The Annual Chaplains luncheon will be held on Wednesday during the session of The Annual Conference.

b. Psychological Testing

A task force was appointed immediately after the Conference in 1971 for the purpose of setting up means within the Peninsula Conference for Psychological Testing for all probationary candidates. After much research and discussion, the following program is being implemented:

1. Written psychological testing for all probationers is being administered and evaluated by Dr. Andy Hayes and Mr. Joe Dunn of the Testing and Counseling Center, Wesley College, Dover. The following instruments are being used—

- (a) Personal Orientation Inventory
- (b) California Psychological Inventory
- (c) Edwards Personal Preference Schedule
- (d) Guilford-Zimmerman Temperament Survey
- (e) 16 Personality Factor Questionnaire
- (f) Orientation Inventory
- (g) Study of Values

(In order to determine the norms for evaluation, selected members of the Peninsula Conference were tested.)

2. After the written test a committee will interview each candidate. The committee will be Dr. Hayes, Mr. Dunn, one other clinical psychologist and two members for The Board of Ministry. After the interview, the written test evaluation and the committee evaluation will be presented to the registrar of The Board of Ministry.

3. Each candidate and spouse will attend an encounter group for a 24-hour period with the same committee as in #2.

(At the present time #1 is the only step being fully implemented. It is hoped that #2 and #3 will be feasible within the next year.)

The testing program described above will provide a complete psychological profile on each candidate, permitting the Board to assist the candidates in anyway possible to overcome present problems and handicaps or to anticipate future ones, meeting them in a productive way.

Our appreciation to the administration and staff of Wesley College for their cooperation in this program.

c. Candidates

At this date, 3/27, it appears that there will be—3 persons to be received into full membership and ordained Elder; 8 persons to be received as Probationary members and ordained Deacon; 2 persons to be elected Associate Members. With the 6 new Probationary members we will have 33 men under this category working toward full membership.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We call upon the lay members from each charge to urge the finance committee of their local churches to assume in full the amount asked below the apportionments listed "Ministerial Education Fund". Full support of this program not only provides additional Scholarship-Loan Funds for our local Conference but supports the three Theological Schools within our jurisdiction.

2. We call attention to the lay members and the lay leader of each charge to put paragraph 355 of Book of the Discipline into operation by including a line item in the local budget for Continuing Education.

3. The Ministry Sunday to be observed in all churches on September 17, 1972, or another date more suitable.

Edwin Lasbury, who in the past 8 years has faithfully executed his responsibility as Registrar; to all who have come under the working of our Board, for their patience, willingness to cooperate and the respect they have shown to the Board and its responsibilities.

SECTION V**ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE****THE COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY REPORT—1971**

Barratt's Chapel, "The Cradle of American Methodism", celebrated its 191st Anniversary on November 14, 1971. The Reverend Dr. Douglas Chandler, professor of Church History, Wesley Theological Seminary, Wash-

ington, D. C., was the guest speaker and delivered an exciting message on John Wesley and Methodist beginnings in America. The Chapelettes of Ocean View, Delaware, sang special numbers.

During the year there have been many visitors to Barratt's Chapel, and Museum. The Chapel is open for use for special services, weddings, baptisms, funerals, confirmation classes, and like functions. However, its use must be coordinated with the Curator prior to the date of its intended use.

The Peninsula Conference Board of Laity conducted a series of Sunday Evening Worship Services in Barratt's Chapel during July and August and are planning the same for 1973. The purpose is to serve tourists returning from the resorts. People are encouraged to "come as you are". Mr. A. Frank Chapman and the Curator will coordinate the details of the project. Individual churches or choirs who desire to participate are urged to contact either of the two named coordinators.

The N. E. Jurisdiction Commission on Archives and History was held May 17-19 at Alexandria Bay, N. Y. Rev. Charles E. Covington represented the Peninsula Conference Commission on Archives and History. The Conference included a trip into Canada to Barbara Heck's grave and the old Hay Bay Church, erected in 1792. To emphasize the Bi-Centennial of Francis Asbury's arrival in America, Dr. Guy Smeltzer gave a lecture on Asbury's life and works.

As reported last year, the Commission on Archives and History has organized a subordinate Historical Society, which has open membership to individuals, families and churches of our area. (Last year two Women's Society of Christian Service joined.) The annual dues are \$5 and \$8. Funds received through this medium will be used to promote interest in the study and preservation of the history of the United Methodist Church and its antecedents, to cooperate with the agents of the church to promote Historical Interest of the church, to promote Methodist History in General and History of Methodism on the Delmarva Peninsula in particular, to preserve Barratt's Chapel and to establish and maintain Barratt's Chapel Museum as a repository for church records, artifacts, appointments, and other paraphernalia for posterity.

In order to focus attention on the Historical Society, the directors agreed to sponsor a United Methodist Heritage Tour of England in October 1971 with Rev. Charles E. Covington as Tour Coordinator and Tour Host. There were 249 persons who participated from the Peninsula Conference and the Central Texas Conference. The project was very successful and greatly increased the general appreciation of our church. The directors have agreed to make the Tour available again October 9-18, 1972. The cost as an affinity group is only \$375. The Tour is not limited to United Methodists, but all who participate must be members of the Historical Society. Rev. C. Jackson Robinson will serve as Tour Host.

Rev. and Mrs. Joseph V. Holliday have served as Curator of Barratt's Chapel and Museum during the Conference Year 1971-72. By their request they are returning to an active pastorate, and the directors are requesting interested applicants to contact the president.

The Chapel and Museum are open every day except Monday from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and on Sunday from 1:00-8:00 p.m. during May to September, open by appointment during the fall and spring, and closed from Christmas through February.

Bishop Roy H. Short, Secretary, Council of Bishops of the United Methodist Church, wrote to the Peninsula Conference and the Baltimore Conference and requested a block of wood from Barratt's Chapel and the Old Otterbein Church. These two pieces of wood will be used to make a block and gavel, representing the two historical traditions of the United Methodist Church, to be used in the conduct of business sessions of the Council of Bishops.

Realizing the importance of Barratt's Chapel in both the religious and social history of the Peninsula, the directors have requested that Barratt's Chapel be nominated to the National Register of Historical Places. Also, Carey's Camp Meeting Grounds, Millsboro, Delaware, is being considered. Placing a site on the National Register serves as a protection against encroachment by projects of conflicting nature and flavor. Although there are only limited federal funds available for assistance in site preservation, its inclusion on the National Register will properly place it among its peers.

Last year the Curator's home was painted both inside and outside, the back porch was enclosed, utility cabinets were installed, and minor repairs were made to bring it to new condition.

The serious conditions of Barratt's Chapel, structurally speaking, has been noted in our reports of 1969, '70, and '71. We repeat it again for emphasis. In 1970 we employed the services of Pope, Kruse, and McCune, architects, Wilmington, Delaware, who are experienced consultants in the restoration and preservation of buildings of antiquity, to examine the Chapel and render professional evaluation of its state and condition. We proceeded immediately with their recommendations to correct crucial deterioration. Soon afterward a severe wind storm felled some trees in the yard and shook the Chapel's structure to the extent that new faults were opened, but the initial reinforcing kept the Chapel from falling.

The second and third stages of their recommendation are that the front wall and both side walls be cleaned, toothed-out, damaged bricks repaired, and pointed-up; that the rear wall be demolished to its base and rebuilt with brick-faced concrete block, using reclaimed brick from the present wall, insofar as possible, for the new construction; and that all exterior masonry wall surfaces be waterproofed with two coats of clear silicone. The cost of this project is about \$39,000.

The Board of Directors of the Commission on Archives and History has voted to proceed with the restoration according to the recommendations, are now seeking funding for the entire project, and will accept with appreciation all contributions towards this project.

We sincerely request both churches and individuals to make Barratt's Chapel Museum their repository for items of ecclesiastical and historical value and to contribute to our endowment fund for their preservation. During the year we received another small endowment, bringing our total to \$7,170. Our hope is to establish an endowment sufficient to insure excellent

care of Barratt's Chapel, "The cradle of American Methodism", and one of the Shrines of the United Methodist Church.

FEDERAL CREDIT UNION

The Peninsula Methodist Federal Credit Union continues to serve the financial needs of its members. We now have 101 members who have \$17,344.43 invested as of February 29, 1972. All members received a 5% dividend on money invested for the year, 1971. Every account is insured against loss up to \$20,000.

Since the beginning of the Credit Union four years ago, we have made loans totaling \$37,367; our loss to the present time has been \$34.09. We have been able to return a 5% dividend, plus insurance, to our investors and to place more in the reserve each of these years than is required by law.

We are now able to make loans up to \$1,750 with a suitable co-signer. We hope to announce an auto loan program in the very near future.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

Your Board of Pensions submits the following report for the year, 1971, for your consideration and action.

We have been very careful to promptly consider and answer all communications from our pensioners. Many of these communications are in the form of a request for some special service to be rendered by the Board. In each case the requests have been studied, and, if thought fair, have been honored through the special Necessitous Fund reserved for this purpose.

Every other year a census is taken to determine the financial status of our pensioners, and each year special cases are reviewed.

The total assets of the Pension Fund as of December 31, 1971, reveal that the book value of the fund is \$2,424,532 and the market value is \$2,752,082. This represents an increase over last year of \$100,000 in the market value and \$300,000 in the book value. During the year we paid in pensions to our retired ministers in full connections and to our associate

members \$191,975; to widows \$160,347; to our retired lay pastors \$29,269; to widows \$24,462; to all children \$3,709; and to the Clearing House of the General Board of Pensions \$84,648, for a grand total of \$494,410. In addition, the Board has distributed \$8,603 from the Necessitous Fund.

The income to pay pensions for the year was derived from the following sources: Peninsula Conference, \$429,644; Investments, \$112,548; other, \$15,951, for a grand total of \$558,143.

In addition to the above receipt your Board received the sum of \$22,882 from the N. E. Jurisdictional Equalization Fund which was credited directly to our Distribution Fund of the General Board of Pensions.

As of January 1, 1972, the Bank of Delaware became the investment counselors for the Endowment Fund of the Board. The reason for the change from Lionel D. Edie and Company to the Bank of Delaware was the fact that the Bank of Delaware offered a more complete service at a cheaper rate.

For the year, 1973, the Board requests that the Peninsula Conference allocate for pensions the sum of \$425,000 and that the amount for the Necessitous Cases be \$7,500.

The Board, again, urges all ministers having supply years on their service records to have those years cleared through the Board at the earliest time possible.

Your Board is deeply concerned over the failure of many ministers to pay their askings to the Endowment Fund. Full and associate members are asked for 2% of their cash salary. Students are asked for 1½%. Delinquent accounts are charged an 8% interest rate. However, students are exempt of the interest. The delinquent accounts total a little over \$100,000.

We are sorry to report that the Task Force appointed to prepare an appropriate brochure to be used to encourage Methodists to remember this important work in their wills has no report of progress for this year.

Your Board is pleased to report that it has received a legacy of \$30,000 from the Last Will and Testament of William H. Briggs. Proper acknowledgement was made to Mr. Brigg's family thanking them for the gift.

The annuity rate for next year is under consideration and will be made as a recommendation at the session of the Annual Conference.

The Board wishes to express its appreciation for the courtesy and generosity of Wesley College and its President, Dr. Robert Parker, for making available one of its fine rooms for the meetings.

The Board also expresses its appreciation to all members of the Board and all pensionees for their interest and spirit of cooperation throughout the year.

TRUSTEES OF PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The officers of the Board of Trustees previously elected and serving in the current year are: Chairman, Mr. K. Thomas Everngam; Vice-Chairman,

the Reverend John R. Shockley; and Secretary-Treasurer, the Reverend W. H. Revelle, Jr.

All the funds held by the Board are invested by the Trust Department of the Bank of Delaware. All returns on investment are received and dispersed by the Conference Business Office and an annual audit is incorporated in the report of that office.

The Conference Trustees exist to hold title to property retained by the Conference for its uses; to dispose of property declared abandoned or otherwise authorized to be sold by the Conference in session, and to expend money in accordance with the mandate of the Conference or trust agreements.

During the current year the following items have been completed: The Chestertown District parsonage was sold for \$32,500; the William Street property in Dover, once a staff parsonage, was sold for \$28,800 the lot on which the former Grace Church at Greenwood stood was sold for \$750. These receipts have been used to reduce Conference indebtedness and other obligations, according to previous instructions by this body.

The bell and Bible from the Grace Church in Greenwood have been transferred to the custody of Barratt's Chapel and the Peninsula Conference Historical Society.

\$15,000 has been received and a trust agreement for this amount has been entered into for the Spedden United Methodist Church in Dorchester County, Maryland. This money has been turned over to the Trust Account of the Bank of Delaware for management.

1. PeCoMeth—granted \$4,000 for 1971 for sea wall.
2. Purchased the property at 506 Westwood Drive, Dover, Delaware, for the Program Director—\$42,500.
3. Westwood Drive Parsonage—granted \$5,000 for 1971 for renovating and furnishings.
4. Drayton Parsonage—maintenance of property to be handled the same as other Conference owned property.
5. Public Relations Director—granted \$2,517 for salary and travel for the period June 1 to December 31, 1971.
6. Established the policy to not make a loan to or secure a loan for any individual.
7. Drayton—granted \$1,200 for 1972 for sewage work.
8. PeCoMeth—granted \$7,000 for 1972 for pool repairs and kitchen equipment.
9. Began paying the printing costs of the appointments which were previously paid by the Bishop's office.

10. Elected to reimburse the Unemployment Insurance Fund rather than make contributions to it for 1972.
11. Made available June 1, 1972,—\$12,500 for the Black Ministry Program. \$11,682.63 from the 1971 budget surplus and \$817.37 from the Contingent Fund.
12. That the expenses of the retired ministers' wives at Conference be paid the same as the retired ministers.





All cash receipts, as recorded in the record of cash received, were traced to their deposit in bank. Checks issued were examined for signatures, endorsements, etc. and traced to their entry in the disbursements records. Cash balances shown were reconciled with amounts reported by the depositories as of December 31, 1971. We did not test the ministers' 1½% contributions to the Endowment Fund, nor did we inspect the individual record of payments to annuitants.

Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The accompanying statements present fairly the financial position of the various Funds at December 31, 1971 and the results of operations for the period then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of preceding years.

MEMOIRS

REV. WILLIAM H. BRIGGS

1882-1971

The Rev. William H. Briggs was born in Kirk Burton, England, and came to this country when he was 12 years of age. He was graduated from Alexis I. duPont High School in 1900, the University of Delaware in 1904, and Drew Seminary in 1907.

He was ordained in the Old Wilmington Conference in 1907 at Milford, Delaware. He served the following churches: Colora, Maryland, Zion Circuit, Preston, Maryland, Selbyville, Delaware and Ebenezer, Easton, Maryland. He retired in 1931.

After his retirement from the active ministry due to his health, he became chaplain at the Ferris School for 18 years. Also for several years he was a volunteer at the Veteran's Hospital at Elsmore.

His wife, the former Miss Mabel Beecher of Wilmington, died in July of 1960.

Surviving are two brothers, Ernest of Wilmington, and Albert of Clarks Summit, Pa.

"Will" Briggs had a keen mind, kept up his interest in the church, and was a real friend to the writer of this Memoir.

The last four years of his life were spent at The Methodist Country House in Wilmington, where he died on June 16, 1971. His funeral services were held in Wilmington, conducted by the Rev. Chester Wilcox and Paul E. McCoy.

REV. J. EARL CUMMINGS, D.D.

J. Earl Cummings was born in Westminster, Maryland, May 28, 1899. The family moved to Baltimore and he received his early religious training in a devoutly Christian home and in a German Reformed Church at North and Druid Hill Avenues, Baltimore.

In his adolescent years, he was deeply impressed by the dynamic Christian character of the Reverend Dr. Leonard B. Smith, founder and long-time minister of Christ Methodist Protestant Church, Baltimore, Maryland, with which he united. A Call to the Christian Ministry became vivid and insistent.

A few months before his twenty-first birthday, he was assigned to the Chateau and Madison Churches, near Cambridge, Maryland, as Student Pastor by the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant

Church. He served these Churches during his first year in the Westminster Theological Seminary, 1921.

During the years 1922-1924, he served the Pipe Creek Circuit in Carroll County, Maryland, while completing his Seminary work. 1925-1927, St. Paul's Church, Baltimore, Maryland; 1928-1932, Christ Methodist Protestant Church, Laurel, Delaware; 1933-35, Westminster Methodist Protestant Church, Westminster, Maryland where he ministered to the faculties and student bodies of Western Maryland College and the Westminster Theological Seminary; 1936-1939, Peninsula Methodist Protestant Church, Wilmington, Delaware. 1940-1944, with the consummation of Methodist Union he served as Superintendent of the Easton District where he had marked success in achieving the merging of many adjacent Churches of the three uniting denominations. 1945-1952, St. Paul's Methodist Church, Wilmington, Delaware. 1953-1959, Salem Methodist Church, Selbyville, Delaware, and 1960-63, Richardson Park Methodist Church in suburban Wilmington, Retired in 1964.

For many years he was Chairman of the Peninsula Conference Committee on Hospitals and Homes. The merging of his long experience and good judgment with the dynamic energy of Dr. George Pigueron, was largely responsible for making the dream of an adequate Methodist Retirement Home in the Peninsula Annual Conference become a reality in the Methodist Country House and the Methodist Manor House. A member of its Board of Trustees from the beginning until his retirement, he was made a member emeritis and continued to travel to Churches all over the Peninsula building good public relations until a little over a week before his death.

Many honors came to him across the years, including the presidency of the Westminster Summer Conference for Ministers which preceded the Annual Retreat at Buck Hill Falls. His Alma Mater, Western Maryland College, awarded him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. He served on this Board of Trustees many years until his death.

At the close of the 1922 Annual Conference, he was married to Miss Fannie Brannock of Hoopers' Island. One son was born to them, Jay E. Cummings, Jr. who for many years has been an active layman in St. Paul's and Richardson Park Churches. Several years after the passing of Fannie Brannock Cummings, he was married to Mrs. Anne Winkler Scarborough of Peninsula Church. Both of these ladies were outstanding in their loveliness, their character, their many talents, their devotion to Christ and His Church. Both greatly supplemented his ministry. Both had long terminal illnesses, during which his faithfulness and tender, loving care were most exemplary.

Genial, out-going, with a contagious friendliness, J. Earl Cummings was a worthy minister of Jesus Christ; a good preacher, a good pastor, a good administrator!

His earth-life ended suddenly on Monday evening, July 26, 1971. The Memorial Service was held in Richardson Park United Methodist Church Thursday, July 29, 1971, with the following ministers participating: Ralph A. Ellis, Jr., William P. Kesmodel, John N. Link, Howell O. Wilkins. Inter-

ment was in Krider's Lutheran Church Cemetery, just outside Westminster, Maryland.

WILLIAM AUSTIN HILL

William Austin Hill, retired, died suddenly Sunday, November 14, 1971, as he was preparing to preach the homecoming sermon during the 11:00 A. M. service in the Tyaskin United Methodist Church on the Nanticoke Charge. He had just finished a solo when he was stricken with a fatal heart attack.

Austin was doing what he considered most important in life, serving his Lord. There was nothing which gave more joy than being about his Father's business. He is and will continue to be missed by all who knew him. He left a mark upon everyone he ever met. This was evidenced by the many who paid their last respects to him on November 16 and 17.

All will remember his hearty laugh and joyful smile. Austin often said that he had never met a person he could not love. His life reflected the christian love he preached about. It didn't matter whether it was preaching the Gospel, sharing in a discussion group, teaching a Church School class, repairing a leaky faucet in the church basement, or for an elderly shut-in, he did it all to the glory of God and in the name of Jesus Christ.

Austin was born on January 3, 1904 in Wilmington, Delaware. He was the son of the late Charles and Elizabeth Burris Hill. He is survived by his wife, Juanita Dorothy Wilkinson Hill, and a daughter, Mrs. William Walker (Juanita) of Newark, Delaware, a brother, Charles Hill of Wilmington, Delaware, and several nieces and nephews.

Brother Hill began his ministry in 1944 and served several charges in the Salisbury District including Bishopville, Nanticoke, Parsonsburg, Smith Island, and Sharptown-Mt. Vernon where he retired in 1969. He served as interim pastor at Harbeson on the Dover District from June 1969 through May 1970. Since then he had lived in Sharptown, Maryland, and had been very active in the Mt. Vernon United Methodist Church, his church home in retirement.

Austin loved to sing. Next to preaching, singing was his greatest joy. One of the songs of the Gospel which meant so much to him was "Love Lifted Me" which was used as the invitation hymn the day he accepted Christ as his Lord. Among the many Gospel songs and hymns he loved was the one he had just finished singing as a solo at the time of his death. One which expressed his love for God; "Little is Much, When God Is In It." The closing verse and chorus express what he worked toward during his life in the ministry.

When we enter heaven's portals
And our Savior's face we see;
Cares of life will be forgotten,
We'll be happy; glad and free.
Chorus: Little is much, when God is in it,
Labor not for wealth or fame;

There's a crown and you can win it,
If you go in Jesus' name.

It was truly in the name of Jesus that Brother Hill labored, and it was while actively engaged in Jesus' service that he was called to his eternal home.

Brother Hill's body was interred in Grace Lawn Cemetery, Wilmington, Delaware, following two services conducted on November 17, 1971. The first was at Mt. Vernon United Methodist Church, Sharptown, Maryland, with the Reverend Dale L. Ruth, District Superintendent of the Salisbury District, giving the memorial address. The second was at the Grace Lawn Chapel with the pastor of Mt. Vernon Church officiating.

May Brother Hill now rest from his labor and behold the beauty of God forever and ever.

Dayton E. McClain, son of Lewis White McClain and Mary Ellen (Culver) McClain, entered his eventful life on May 15, 1876, at Gumboro, Delaware.

The ministry of Dr. Dayton E. McClain is a splendid story of love, service and sacrifice. He served through depression and prosperity with great courage. His ministry was one that gave hope and faith to countless people.

His body rests in the native earth but his soul has moved on in the vastness of a new appointment to eternal purposes.

LOUIS CALVIN RANDALL

He began his ministry at Calvary Methodist Church in Wilmington and served the following churches: St. James, Worton, Maryland; Unity Church of Hurlock; Grace Church, Milton and Grace Church in Centreville, Maryland, before enlisting in the Navy as a chaplain. During World War II, he served in the Pacific area and was a retired Lt. Commander. He was also a World War I Army veteran. Upon his return to the ministry, he served the Washington Street Church, Hurlock; Zion Circuit, Leeds and St. Johns; Epworth Methodist at Rehoboth; Bethany, Pocomoke, Maryland and Mt. Olive in Delmar.

Retiring in 1961 to live in Delmar, where he was librarian at the Delmar High School, he earned the respect and admiration of the students

and aides. He trained students to become library aides and served the school over five years.

REV. JOHN ALBERT TRADER, D.D.

John Albert Trader was born May 11, 1897 in Crisfield, Maryland, the son of the late Charles B. and Cornelia A. Trader. Educated in the Public Schools of Crisfield, he was graduated from Western Maryland College which later conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. He received his theological training and degree from the Westminster, now Wesley, Theological Seminary.

During his Seminary days, he served as student pastor of the Methodist Protestant Church in Haddonfield, New Jersey. There he met and married his talented and faithful companion and helpmate of nearly half a century, Miss Ruth Merrill.

His active ministry of forty-one years included significant pastorates in Haddonfield, New Jersey; Cumberland, Maryland; Baltimore, Maryland, Cherrydale, Virginia; Washington, District of Columbia; Salisbury, Maryland, Dover, Delaware. (In 1973 he would have completed fifty years in the ministry.)

A good administrator, his ministry was marked repeatedly by constructive building. At Lauraville Methodist Protestant Church, Baltimore, Maryland, he sponsored the leaving of an inadequate frame building for the erection of an adequate and modern brick educational building and Sanctuary. At Lewis Memorial Methodist Protestant Church, Washington, a mission project at his arrival, without a building of its own, he led the congregation into building a lovely Colonial Sanctuary and educational building, and then multiplied its membership into a strong congregation. During his thirteen year pastorate at Wesley Methodist Church, Dover, recognizing the increasing needs of that growing congregation, he not only doubled its membership, renovated the Church Building he found at the beginning of his pastorate; led in the erection of Grace Fellowship Hall and additional Class Rooms; but gave the vision that ultimately led to the purchase of the adjacent Dover Post Office building for a Wesley Church Youth Center.

But even more outstanding than his administrative achievements was his ministry in his various pulpits. From his Seminary days, he had strong convictions concerning the Christian Gospel, its rootage in the Old Testament heritage and its fruitage in the application of Christian principles to every area of life. These he expressed with the vigor of an Old Testament prophet. These traits enabled him to be a dynamic member of the Board of Trustees of Western Maryland College, the Board of Trustees of Wesley College, and many of the most important committees of the Penin-

sula Annual Conference. Retiring because of physical conditions in 1962, he participated in many Church and Civic activities during his retirement years.

A Memorial Service was held in Wesley United Methodist Church, Dover, February 27, 1972, and interment was in Lakeside Cemetery, Dover. Participants in the service were the Reverends Robert P. Whitlock, William P. Kesmodel, C. Jackson Robinson, Edward R. Wilkins. Instead of a memorial address, a taped recording was played of his Easter Sermon before retirement, 1962, titled "The Resurrection Hope".

Dr. Trader is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ruth Merrill Trader, a son, Merrill Trader of Dover, a grandson, John Friedel Trader; a brother, Dr. Charles W. Trader of Pocomoke, Maryland; two sisters, Mrs. Marie Trader Dougherty of Crisfield, Md. and Mrs. Estella Trader Chilcut of Easton, Maryland.

DENSON HOWARD WARRICK

Denson Howard Warrick died at his home in Brookview, Dorchester County, Maryland, on December 28, 1971 at the age of 63, survived by his wife, Charlotte P. Warrick. The funeral service was conducted on December 31 with the Reverend Robert D. Howell and the writer participating. The interment was in the Brookview Cemetery.

He was born in Denson, Ohio, the son of the late Howard and Edith Suderland Warrick. Here he grew and completed his education.

During World War II he enlisted in the United States Army and served in Europe. He served later in Korea, Turkey, France and Germany. In 1964 he retired as First Sergeant after 20 years of military service.

His thoughts then turned to a "second career"—service in the ministry. He became a Lay Speaker. He worked hard for the Local Preacher's License. He developed a helpful library. He willingly substituted for pastors and teachers in time of need. He served as the pastor of the Wingate-St. Thomas Charge and the Galestown Charge. In these activities he made his way into the hearts of the congregations. With his wife's generous help, his ministry developed and was well received.

His was a strong Christian witness: "I have served many commanding officers in the Army. Now I serve another General who has all the stars. And I will serve Him for the rest of my life. He is my Lord Jesus Christ". It is easy to see Denson in the role of the Roman centurion who asked Jesus, "Only say the word and my servant will be healed". His was a soldier's mind with a strong soldier's discipline and faith—and under orders. And that meant being faithful to Christ even to death.

JOHN M. WOOTEN

The Reverend John M. Wooten was born June 6, 1890 in Gumboro, Delaware, the son of Jacob and Elizabeth Wooten. One of a family of six

children he attended the public schools of Gumboro and later entered Wesley Collegiate Institute, Dover, Delaware, where he received his pre-ministerial education. He graduated from the Conference Course of Training and became a member of the Wilmington Annual Conference in 1918.

On December 12, 1917 he was married to Reba Crowell. A daughter, Elizabeth Ann, blessed their marriage.

Prior to entering the ministry, John Wooten was a public school teacher, serving in the schools of Sussex County. Following his ordination he served a series of pastorates including Scott Methodist Church, Wilmington; Grace Methodist Church, Cambridge; Union Methodist Church, Bridgeville; and others.

In the Annual Conference John Wooten distinguished himself as Conference Statistician, a post which he filled a number of years. In July, prior to his death, he received the Masonic 50-year pin. He departed this life on October 26, 1971. Interment followed a memorial service in Grace-lawn Cemetery.

This "man, sent from God, whose name was John" was a bright reflection of "the true light that lighteth every man coming into the world." Through his inspired witness to the light, he moved other men to respond to the high calling he himself heard and followed, and to which he gave his deepest devotion and his life.

Mrs. Fannie E. Broadway entered into God's eternal presence on February 20, 1972, at the age of 92. She was the daughter of Henry and Susan Hackett, born in Smyrna, Delaware on November 26, 1879.

On May 11, 1904, Fannie Hackett was married to Luther M. Broadway who later became a Methodist minister. Three children were born into the Broadway home; Luther H., William M., and Grace.

The Broadways began their ministry in 1914 in Kingswood Methodist Episcopal Church in Wilmington, Delaware. In 1918 they were transferred to Madley Methodist Episcopal Church in Wilmington where they served nine years. Their next charge was in Perryville, Maryland from 1927 to 1931. Early in 1931 Rev. Broadway was retired from the active ministry because of ill health.

Following Rev. Broadway's early retirement the family moved to the Eastlake area of Wilmington and became active members of Eastlake Methodist Episcopal Church. Rev. Broadway preceded Mrs. Broadway in death on December 20, 1938.

After her husband's death Mrs. Broadway's continued activities contributed much to the life of the Eastlake congregation. She remained active in nearly all the services and ministries of the congregation, including singing in the choir, beyond her 92nd birthday.

Concern over the various illnesses of her three children had been draining Mrs. Broadway's strength for several months. On February 5, 1972 her youngest son died. She entered the hospital on the day of his

burial and spent her last days there. She was buried beside her husband in Smyrna, Delaware.

Mrs. Broadway is survived by a son, Luther H., of Wilmington, and a daughter, Mrs. Henry R. Folsom, Jr. of Newark, Delaware. She is also survived by four grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

At her funeral the Rev. Everett C. Isaacs summarized her life by recalling that Mrs. Broadway was truly a great Christian lady. Her faith and witness and supportive help touched and blessed the lives of many. She will be greatly missed by those whom she loved and helped so much, and who in turn loved her. We buried her body but the inspiration of her faith and love lives on.

MISCELLANEOUS

(a) **CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER**

- Rule 1. The Conference shall meet at 9:00 A.M. and adjourn at 12:30 P.M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.
- Rule 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.
- Rule 3. All resolutions, motions, amendments and substitute motions presented to the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.
- Rule 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5. The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.
- Rule 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
- (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
 - (2) To adjourn.
 - (3) To take a recess.
 - (4) To lay on the table.
 - (5) For the previous question.
 - (6) To postpone to a given time.
 - (7) To refer.
 - (8) To substitute.
 - (9) Amendment.
 - (10) To postpone indefinitely.

A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.

- Rule 7. When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.
- Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.
- Rule 9. When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12. No member shall absent himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.
- Rule 15. It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.

- Rule 17. All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees, shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.
- Rule 18. No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19. These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.
- Rule 20. All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Secretary not later than three (3) days after adjournment of the Annual Session or it shall be excluded.
- Rule 21. The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.
- Rule 22. Recommendations as to the change in format and policy regarding data to be included in the Journal shall be referred to the Committee on Journal for study and recommendation before action by the Conference.
- Rule 23. Only such motions as are carried and/or passed by the Conference shall be included in the Journal.
- Rule 24. That no member of any Board, Committee, or Commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrenniums on said Board, Committee or Commission and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one Quadrennium has elapsed except members of boards, committees or commissions elected for three year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be reelected until after one term has lapsed and except that when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term he may complete the unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. No member of the Conference, lay or ministerial shall be elected to serve on more than two Boards, Committees or Commissions concurrently, except the committees elected or appointed for the Annual Conference session only, district committees whether or not elected by the Annual Conference and the quadrennial committee on the local church. The distribution of membership shall be according to Districts three laymen and three ministers as nearly as possible to each District.

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
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
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
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
