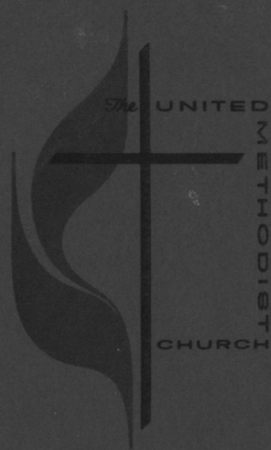
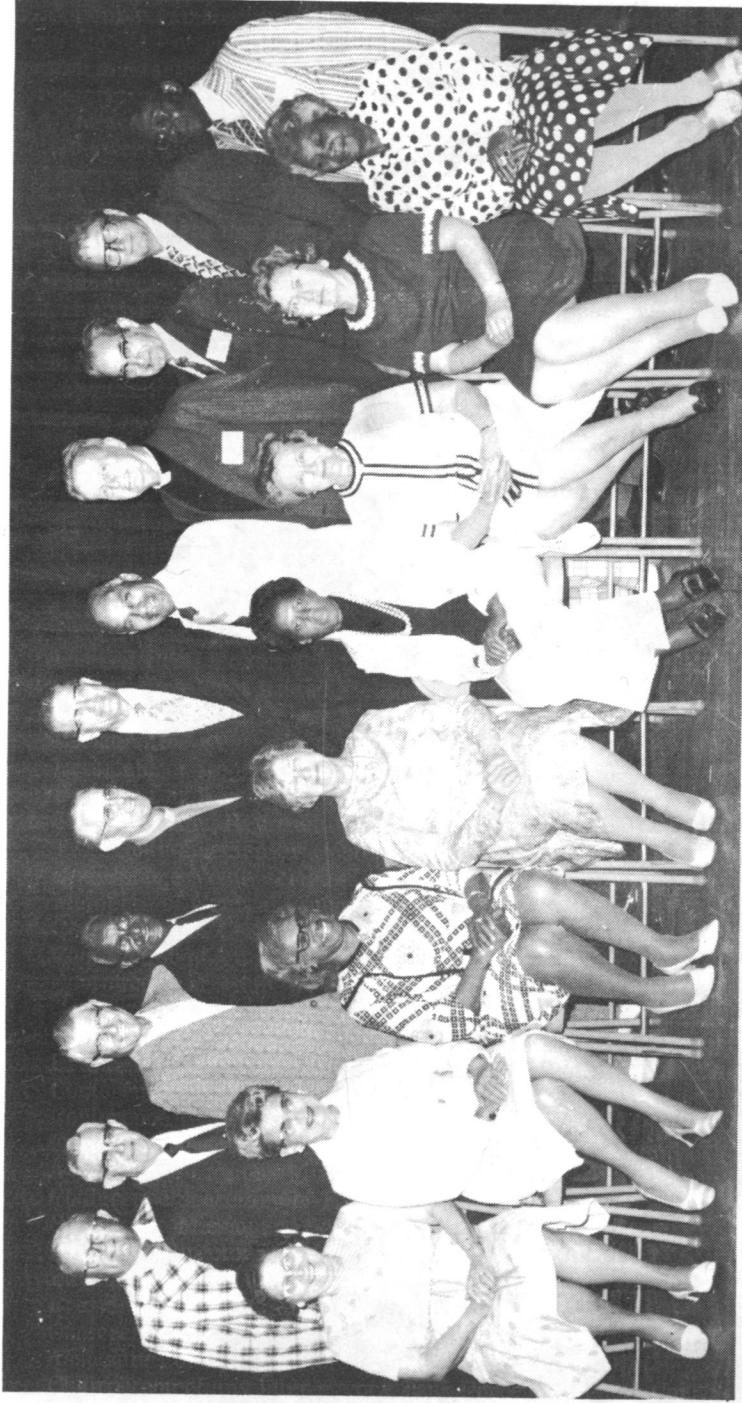

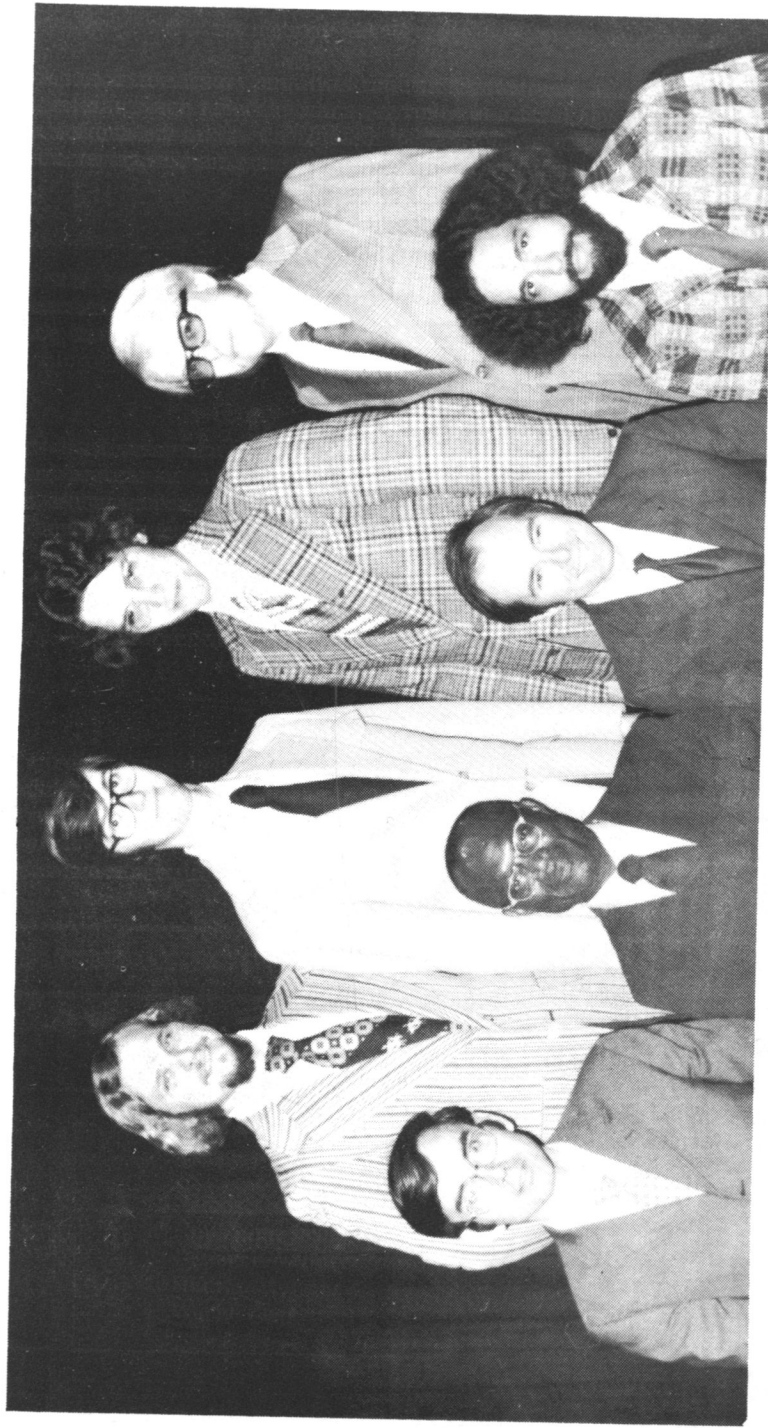

RULES AND GUIDELINES FOR
 THE CONFERENCE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

A.

1. That the Peninsula Conference again record its faith in the Principle of Rotation and adherence to the provisions of the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church.

2. That the Nominating Committee be composed of the Cabinet, the Conference Lay Leader, the Lay Leader of each District, a representative selected by the United Methodist Women Executive Committee, the District Presidents of the United Methodist Women, a youth selected by the Conference Youth Council, one minister under appointment from each District to be elected for a quadrennium by the respective District Ministerium, and the Conference Council Director.

3. That, since the quadrennial system is an established part of Methodist economy, all members of boards, commissions, and committees shall be elected for a quadrennium unless restricted by discipline, charter, or other legal requirements. In the event of such legal restrictions, the Principle of Rotation is still to be observed.

4. That no member of any board, committee, or commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said board, committee or commission and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one quadrennium has elapsed, except members of boards, committees, or commissions elected for three year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has lapsed and except that, when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term, and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term.

5. That no member of the conference, lay or ministerial, shall serve on more than two boards, commissions, or committees concurrently. Ex-officio membership on conference boards or agencies shall not count toward the total of two unless such membership exceeds two. In cases where a member is an ex-officio member on more than two boards or agencies, all excess of two shall count toward the total of two. The following shall not be under the conference rotation system nor counted in the above total: district committees or secretaries, Wesley College Trustees, Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundations, Board of Trustees of the Peninsula Methodist Homes and Hospitals, Inc., the Episcopal Residence Committee and the Committee on Investigation. In the case of the Board of the Ministry, the Nominating Committee is to request the courtesy of the bishop to inform them as to those persons who will be named to the Board of Ministry, in order to assist the Nominating Committee in equal distribution of responsibility on the part of conference ministry members. The Nominating Committee will consider membership on the Board of Ministry as one of two memberships permitted to each minister.

6. That ministerial membership on Annual Conference boards and agencies shall be limited to active full-time conference members and associate members of the Peninsula Annual Conference. In order to be eligible to serve on the conference boards and agencies, lay members shall be members of a local church within the Annual Conference. The Conference Nominating Committee may select other persons as affiliate members.

7. That an age limit of 72 shall be established for both ministers and laymen. If a ministerial member shall retire before the age of 72, he shall then relinquish his privilege to serve on conference boards and agencies.

8. That a conscientious effort shall be made to distribute membership geographically. No fixed number shall be assigned, however, to any one district, since this could become artificial and impractical.

9. That the Cabinet select only one representative from the Cabinet to serve on a conference board and all the divisions of that board, and one cabinet representative each on all other support agencies except where the Discipline states otherwise.

10. That failure to attend the particular board or agency to which one is assigned for at least one called meeting during the year, without written explanation or statement of intended activity to the chairperson of that board or agency, one will be subject to automatic removal in the next nominating committee's report. A report of the board or agency chairperson to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee by March 1st will include the attendance record of his board, committee or agency.

11. That the Conference Nominating Committee designate persons to serve as a Nominating Committee for the Boards, Commissions and Committees. The District Superintendent assigned to the agency is the convener of this committee. The nominating committee shall be prepared at the organizational meeting to nominate officers for the quadrennium.

12. That the date of election to any board, commission or committee be clearly indicated in the Journal.

13. That in every case a nominee to any board, commission, or committee shall be notified before his name is placed before the Conference.

14. That quadrennial boards shall have two even classes; triennial boards shall have three evenly divided classes.

15. That, recognizing again the belief in the principle of rotation in order to involve greater leadership, all district committees and officers shall be elected to two-year terms with a maximum of four years, and persons shall be ineligible for re-election until after a two-year term has elapsed.

B.

Concerning the Nominating Committee, its report and the securing of talent:

1. That the report of the Nominating Committee at the Annual Conference

session will reflect a complete adherence to all the guidelines established by the Annual Conference.

2. That new nominations shall be circulated prior to the Annual Conference session with the pre-conference reports.

3. That forms shall be circulated for both ministers and laymen in local churches to indicate areas of interest, thus creating a Talent Bank. In addition, the same form shall be sent to members of the Cabinet, Board of Laity, Conference United Methodist Women, Executive Committee, and Conference Youth Council in order to obtain names that might otherwise be overlooked. These forms shall be returned to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee.

4. That a complete file of all ministers in the Conference should be kept indicating where each man is serving in terms of conference boards and agencies. Laymen should likewise be listed on a similar file. A third file would be divided between ministers and laymen as part of the Conference Talent Bank.

5. That a minimum of four meetings per year should be held by the Nominating Committee (it may be advisable that the committee meet more often, since its influence is so broad; whenever the committee approaches a new quadrennium, this latter need for additional meetings may be more evident).

6. That the above adopted guidelines for the Nominating Committee of the Annual Conference shall become a printed part of its report at each Annual Conference session.

7. That at the beginning of a new quadrennium a complete and open look at membership on all boards and agencies shall be initiated by the Conference Nominating Committee and all personnel shall be eligible for re-alignment in accordance with A-5.

Miscellaneous

1. That the council director, associate council directors, the home administrators, not be elected to boards and agencies under the conference rotation system but serve only as ex-officio where assigned by the council director.

2. That two (2) high school youth (preferably 10th and 11th grades) shall be ex-officio members of the following boards: Commission on Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs, Board of Education, Board of Evangelism, Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, Board of Missions, Board of Church and Society, Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations, Commission on Worship, Conference Council on Ministries, Board of the Laity, Conference Nominating Committee, and Committee on Conference Arrangements. These shall be selected by the Conference Youth Council each year.

3. That a Rules Committee and a Committee on Journal shall be appointed by the Council on Ministries.

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Others may want to take this route and we outline here the steps involved in case they may not be aware of the procedure.

- (1) All salary and conference apportionments are removed.
- (2) The church drops out of the listing of churches to which pastors are assigned. (We urge the conference to begin a listing of such churches in the Journal with the charge conference where they are to report each year. This will allow for proper records and continue the historic continuity of these churches.)
- (3) The only services to be held are weddings, funerals, or special occasions.
- (4) One or more special services a year may be held with the offering received to be used for the upkeep of the building.
- (5) The remaining members are transferred to a nearby United Methodist Church for regular worship and church involvement.
- (6) The remaining members become a special committee under the charge conference to plan with the pastor for weddings, funerals, and special days. They also present a written report each year as to services held, money received and how expended. etc.
- (7) This allows the possibility that should population shifts bring people into the area we would simply resume regular services.

Dr. Robert H. Parker, President of Wesley College, brought greetings and welcomed the Conference. He presented Chaplain Edward R. Wilkins, who is serving as the liaison person between the Conference and the college.

Olin J. Shockley, assisted by G. Wayne Cuff, presented Mrs. James K. Mathews to the Annual Conference.

The Bishop asked the secretary to read the rules covering the election of delegates to general and jurisdictional conference:

RULES GOVERNING ELECTION OF DELEGATES: Based upon requirements of Par. 601, 602 and Judicial Council Decision No. 333, the following delegation to the 1976 General Conference is to be elected: Four Ministerial and four Lay Delegates to the General Conference and six additional Ministerial and six additional Lay Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

The additional delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference are the Reserve Delegates to the General Conference in order of their election.

In connection with these elections I now move the following procedure and rules:

1. That after all the delegates to the General Conference have first been elected on a separate ballot, the delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference as reserved to the General Conference be elected by balloting.

2. That there shall also be elected three Ministerial Reserve and three Lay Reserve Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

3. That every member entitled to vote shall be ordered within the Bar of the Conference and those not within the Bar of the Conference shall not be entitled to vote.

4. That any ballot containing fewer or more than the number of names to be voted for shall be rejected.

5. That where there are two or more members of the same name, only such ballots as containing the Christian name or initials of the person for whom the ballot is cast shall be counted, but such omissions of the Christian name or initial shall not affect the other names on the ballot.

6. That a majority of the legal ballots cast shall be required for election. A majority of the legal votes cast on any ballot shall elect except when a larger number of members receive such a majority than are to be elected; in which case the persons receiving the highest vote shall be elected to the total number of places to be filled. A tie vote between two persons when but one place remains to be filled shall be disregarded and another vote shall be taken.

The first Clergy Ballot was taken after specific instruction by Bishop Mathews and the following statements from the Commission on Religion and Race was read:

**Commission On Religion And Race
Statement On The Election Of General And Jurisdictional
Conference Delegates And General Board And Agency Members**

The Commission on Religion and Race issued a Statement on General Conference Delegates prior to the 1972 General Conference in Atlanta (that Statement is attached for your information) which said in part: *

"The United Methodist Church through its official body - The General Conference - has called all Methodism to move toward a truly inclusive fellowship. The Boards, Agencies, and Conferences have been urged to implement this as soon as possible. In keeping with this mandate, we - the members of the Commission on Religion and Race - call upon all Annual Conferences to be especially sensitive to the need for having their General and Jurisdictional Conference Delegations . . . reflect true inclusiveness . . ."

We reaffirm the continuing need to work toward a more inclusive church within the family of the United Methodists. We have seen some limited progress. However, we are still far short of this goal.

In 1976, the General Conference meets in Portland. Each Annual Conference will be represented. Therefore, it should be a high priority for each Annual Conference to see to it that there is adequate representation of ethnic minority persons to the General Conference and the Jurisdictional Conference.

We realize that many decisions that relate to policy priorities in the United Methodist Church are made by the General Boards and Agencies. Therefore it is imperative that Annual Conference nominating Committees be intentional in seeing to it that their nominations include adequate representation of ethnic minority persons.

*** Commission on Religion And Race
Statement On General Conference Delegate**

"The United Methodist Church - through its official body - The General Conference - has called all Methodism to move toward a truly inclusive fellowship. The Boards, Agencies, and Conferences have been urged to implement this as soon as possible. In keeping with this mandate - we the members of the Commission on Religion and Race - call upon all Annual Conferences to be especially sensitive to the need for having their General and Jurisdictional Conference Delegations to the 1972 reflect true inclusiveness. We therefore request that all Ethnic Groups be represented in these delegations and have representation on Episcopal Committees, where such Ethnic Groups hold membership in an Annual Conference. Such an act will speak much more clearly than all of the rhetoric that might be proclaimed. We especially ask that the same concept be carried over into the election of Episcopal Leaders. We remind the Southcentral Jurisdiction and other Jurisdictions of the need for the election of a Hispanic member to the Episcopacy. This will speak to our Hispanic Brothers and let them know that we are keenly sensitive to their needs. The time is now - for if our great Church does not demonstrate inclusiveness - then we force the Ethnic Groups with Methodism to look elsewhere for such proof. The Church can and must meet this urgent need - now."

Bishop Mathews recognized DePriest Whye of the Black College Fund who presented a certificate of recognition to the Annual Conference for paying in excess of 100% of our asking for the last two years.

Announcements were made by Frank Chapman and Olin J. Shockley.

Bishop Mathews called on John T. Randolph to high-light the study and work being completed by the Washington area on the Holy Life and the Daily Office.

Since the Tellers had not completed the count for the first Clergy Ballot, David W. Barker moved that the first Ministerial Ballot to the General Conference be sealed immediately (5:20) and the continuance of counting begin Wednesday morning after devotions.

The Bishop adjourned the session until 9:00 a.m. Wednesday morning.

Resolution: Ministers Reserve Pension Fund

WHEREAS, The Peninsula Annual Conference Board of Pensions at the 1974 session did request the Peninsula Conference to authorize the creation of a committee "to propose possible ways of funding the pension load . . . and to report its findings and/ or recommendations to the 1975 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and

WHEREAS, the 1974 session of the Peninsula Conference did authorize the creation of such committee, which during the interim between the 1974 and 1975 annual conference sessions did organize and thereafter, studied and considered actuarial studies prepared by Huggins & Co., Inc. and provided and presented by the General Board of Pensions, and

WHEREAS, the committee has determined that it is desirable for the Peninsula Annual Conference to participate in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund authorized by the General Conference of the United Methodist Church and administered by the General Board of Pensions, and

WHEREAS, such participation will secure for the conference the advantages of (1) current funding of approved service, (2) establishment of reserve funds, (3) compound interest on such reserves, (4) disability benefit for participating members who are granted Disability Leaves, and (5) grants and survivor benefits to the surviving spouses and dependent children of deceased members, and

WHEREAS, the services of the General Board of Pensions in providing its facilities for the depositing of funds, accounting, bookkeeping, investment, actuarial counsel, and making of benefit payments to beneficiaries of the Peninsula Conference is also secured through such participation;

Therefore Be It Resolved:

1. That the Peninsula Annual Conference enter Plan A* of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund of the United Methodist Church as supplemented herein; and hereinafter referred to as the Fund; and

2. That the effective date for enrollment of all ministers serving time with pension credit on the Peninsula Conference shall be January 1, 1977, and that Ministers Reserve Pension Fund pension and benefit payments to retired ministers and to surviving spouses and dependent children of deceased ministers already on the Prospective Distribution Roll on December 31, 1976 shall commence on January 1, 1977.

3. That in accordance with the provisions of Paragraph 215, Section F, Chapter X of the Pension and Benefit Rules and Regulations prepared and published by the General Board of Pensions under the authority of Paragraph 1257.13 of The Book of Discipline (1972), the Peninsula Annual Conference shall enter into the Fund all qualified ministers of the annual conference. (All Full-Time approved Lay Pastors assumed to be serving under appointment with pension credit on the Peninsula Annual Conference shall have provisions made by the conference for the funding of their pensions through the LAY PASTORS RESERVE PENSION FUND, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter XII of the Pension and Benefit Rules and Regulations.) All ministers and Full-Time Lay Pastors who become eligible for participation, after January 1, 1977, in the respective Funds shall enter into the applicable Fund as they may become eligible under the provisions stated in Chapters X and XII of the Pension and Benefit Rules and Regulations.

4. That the Peninsula Annual Conference make provision for the funding of a Total Pension Rate equivalent to an annuity rate of \$110.00 per year of approved service rendered prior to January 1, 1977 by Associates and Full Members for which the Peninsula Conference has pension responsibility (85% for Full-Time Retired Lay Pastors), with 75% continued to the surviving spouse of a member.

5. That such provision as stated above shall include the making of an initial deposit of \$1,400,000.00 on the accrued service obligation cost which is estimated to be \$9,488,656.00 as of January 1, 1977.

An annual deposit of \$526,177 shall be made on December 31, 1977 and on December 31, 1978 and on each subsequent December 31 for the balance of the 30-year period which has a beginning date of 1977, or until such time as the actual cost of funding the accrued service obligation shall have been met. Actuarial re-studies

* Pension and Benefit Rules and Regulations, dated January 1, 1973, Chapter IX, Sec. A, Par. 200a. 1A Current and Prior Service Participation.

shall be made in cooperation with the General Board of Pensions for the consideration of the conference in making possible adjustments in the funding of the Total Pension rates, and in the annual deposits and/ or the original 30-year deposit period.

6. That the Peninsula Conference, in accordance with the provisions of the Rules and Regulations of the Fund, shall contribute annually to the Fund on each December 31, beginning December 31, 1977, an amount equivalent to 9 percent of the average salary of the Peninsula Annual Conference on behalf of each member of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund for whom and to the extent that the Peninsula Conference assumes pension responsibility.

(The Peninsula Conference shall contribute to the Lay Pastors Reserve Pension Fund, annually on each December 31, an amount equivalent to 7 percent of the Peninsula Conference average salary on behalf of each Full-Time Lay Pastor serving under appointment and assumed to be with pension credit on the conference.)

7. That service annuity on account of approved service rendered on and after January 1, 1977, shall be determined according to the tables for annuity rates for such purpose in use by the General Board of Pensions at the time of entering into the annuity and the amount in the Service Annuity Account at that time provided that the Peninsula Conference will provide the Conference Account any additional amounts which may be necessary to provide a total pension rate for such service equivalent to \$110.00 with 75 percent continued to the surviving spouse, if any, and at such higher total pension rates as may be adopted by the Peninsula Conference from time to time.

8. That, in accordance with the provisions of the Fund, the Peninsula members of the Fund shall contribute annually to the Fund, in monthly installments payable in advance, an amount equivalent to 2 percent of the average salary of the conference, provided that if a member's support is less than the average salary, such member may elect to contribute an amount equivalent to 2 percent of that support.

9. That, in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Fund, at the time a member of the fund is granted a Service Annuity, the member shall receive a Personal Contributions Annuity of a type identical with the Service Annuity, the amount thereof to be the actuarial equivalent of the members Personal Contributions to the Fund, together with the interest accumulated thereon. Such Personal Contributions Annuity, on account of required Personal Contributions made after January 1, 1977 shall be counted as a part of the Peninsula Conference Total Pension Rate.

10. The General Board of Pensions will establish a Peninsula Annual Conference Account to which the annual prior service funding requirements of the Conference shall be credited and to which shall be charged:

(a) The transfers made to the Annuity Reserve Account of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund for service annuities not otherwise provided for and including those payable to:

1. Ministers and Lay Pastors already retired
2. Future Surviving Spouses of such Ministers and Lay Pastors who are already retired.
3. Present Surviving Spouses and dependent children of deceased Ministers and Lay Pastors

(b) Accrued service obligation to provide a total annuity rate equivalent to \$110.00 per year of approved service and at such higher rates as the Conference may from time to time approve.

The Conference may deposit with General Board at any time or from time to time, during any fiscal year, all or any part of the annual prior service requirements becoming due on the following December 31 and all or any part of the 9 percent amount for current funding which will become due on the following December 31st; such amounts so deposited with the General Board of Pensions shall be placed in an account known as the Peninsula Annual Conference Deposit Account which will be established by the General Board of Pensions.

The General Board of Pensions will transfer from the Deposit Account such amounts as may be necessary as payments may become due on the annual reserve requirement, for the individual service annuity, the Disability and Survivor Benefit Fund, and the amounts required for the funding of current service.

The Peninsula Annual Conference will retail the right to request adjustments in the amounts charged for current funding on the basis of the extent to which the conference may have assumed pension responsibility during the year for a member of the Fund.

11. When a member of the Fund, not retired as of January 1, 1977 or the surviving spouse or dependent child of such member becomes eligible for pension after January 1, 1977, or when additional amounts are required from the Conference to provide the annuity as indicated in Paragraph 4 above, the General Board of Pensions is authorized to charge the Conference Account and transfer into the Annuity Reserve the sum required to pay a pension to such person in accordance with the provisions of the Fund at an annuity rate equivalent to \$110.00 per year of approved service for which the Peninsula Conference assumes pension responsibility.

The General Board of Pensions shall assume the Peninsula Conference obligations aforesaid only to the extent to which the funding of same has actually been consummated.

Section recommends concurrence.

For 57 Against 0 Not Voting 1

The Conference unanimously adopted the resolution.

Resolution:

WHEREAS: The 1974 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference authorized a committee, chaired by the chairman of the Board of Pensions, and composed of 3 members from the Council of Finance and Administration, 3 members from the Council on Ministries, 3 members from the Conference Board of Pensions and a Cabinet representative to study possible ways of funding the pension load, and required this committee to report its' findings and/ or recommendations to this session of the Annual Conference, and

WHEREAS: These findings and recommendations have been presented and said recommendations will require supervision and implementation, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED: That this committee be continued at least during the ensuing conference year for the purpose of such study and guidance as may be needed to facilitate entrance into the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund by January 1, 1977, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That this committee shall devise and develop plans and/ or a selective financial crusade to diminish and/ or liquidate past service obligations to said fund in a lesser period of time than the maximum 30 year amortization span, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That this committee shall be asked to report its' findings and/ or recommendations to the 1976 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

(For example: Opening up the membership of Conference Boards and Agencies for greater representation of laypersons and members of minority groups; and holding the Study and Review Section meeting on a Saturday, so that more laypersons might be involved.)

WHEREAS it should be our desire to see still more democratic involvement of laypersons in all phases of Conference life.

AND WHEREAS the areas of Finance and Budget-setting are among the most crucial of all,

Be It Therefore Resolved:

1) That a priority study be made by a task force of the Conference Council on Ministries, listing every program or item which receives funds from the Peninsula Annual Conference.

2) That this priority study be made by polling every pastor and every Lay Leader in consultation with Council on Ministries and Administration Boards in every local church in the Conference.

3) That the results of this priority study be published in the Pre-Conference Journal of Annual Conference 1976.

4) That the Council on Ministries and the Council on Finance and Administration be requested to use the results of the priority study as a basis for allocating funds in the 1978 budget.

Section recommended concurrence.

For 77 Against 1 Not Voting 1

The conference adopted the resolution.

Resolution:

During the past year most of us or many of us have become more keenly aware of hunger in the United States and around the world. Ministers and laypersons were confronted about the food situation in the COMMUNICATOR in some weeks ago by a letter from Bishop James K. Mathews. He called us into action! CROP Walks have been a great success within the bounds of our conference during the past year. More are scheduled. The committee on PACEM IN TERRIS has put together a wonderful packet on food and hunger. The United Methodist Committee on Relief has actively participated in fulfilling the needs of humankind around the world.

Last year, we had \$19,772.53 beyond our obligations and responsibilities. This was added to an Operating Reserve which now totals \$190,189.17. Our conference is a progressive one and we have been able to fulfill our commitments without much stress.

As a conference we must set the pace for more activity among our people in fulfilling the hunger needs of the world.

RECOMMENDATION: In response to the report by the Board on World Hunger, I urge the Peninsula Annual Conference to give an additional \$10,000 to UMCOR from the Operating Reserve as soon as possible.

Section recommended that the resolution be referred to the COFA.

WHEREAS, while the median price of a new house in the U.S.A. is \$38,000. while the median family income is \$13,000., thus making it almost impossible for 50% or more of American families to obtain desirable housing, and

WHEREAS, families purchasing houses obtain a subsidy for the purchase of housing through being able to deduct interest on mortgage payments from their Federal and State income taxes (this sum equaling \$12,000,000,000 annual loss in Federal taxes alone).

BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference call upon the Congress of the United States, through the Delaware and Maryland congressional delegations, to reinstate and expand the housing subsidy program for low and moderate-income families that will provide low-interest mortgages and mortgage-payment supplements, the total of such assistance to be equal to the total amount granted as tax deductions to the families that deduct their mortgage interest payments.

Gambling

WHEREAS, the Christian Church has historically promoted and enabled the growth of constructive and positive forces that contributed not only to individual man's spiritual, physical, and emotional maturity but to collective man's growth as he lived his faith, and

WHEREAS the Christian Church today continues to oppose those forces that contribute to individuals and commercial man's decline and deterioration the forces that inhibit the achievement of his God-given potential, and

WHEREAS the Social Creed of the United Methodist Church states: "Organized gambling is a menace to society, deadly to the best interests of moral, social, economic and spiritual life, and destructive of good government. As an act of faith and love, Christians should abstain from gambling, and should strive to minister to those victimized by the practice. Community standards and personal life styles should be such as would make unnecessary and undesirable the resort to commercial gambling, including public lotteries, as a recreation, as an escape, or as a means of producing public revenue or funds for support of charities or government."

WHEREAS today such concerns relate specifically to the legalization of the Lottery and Slot Machines,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference call upon the legislators of the States of Delaware and Maryland to discontinue such current means of raising revenue and that such legislators be asked not to support legislation that legalizes gambling enterprises such as casinos, dog races, and slot machines.

Section recommends concurrence.

Southeast Asia

WHEREAS the deteriorating conditions in Southeast Asia continue to produce increasing human suffering, and

WHEREAS the Church of Jesus Christ is called to a mission of healing and reconciliation,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, by the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church at its 1975 session:

(1) That we support the efforts of the United States Congress to terminate financial support for military activity in Cambodia and Vietnam;

(2) That we call upon the United States Government to support efforts toward peaceful political solutions to the problems to Southeast Asia;

(3) That we support continuing effort to identify, locate, and, when possible, repatriate those now listed as missing in action in Southeast Asia;

(4) That we urge churches to support efforts by independent and religious relief agencies to provide for the basic human needs of those who suffer from the devastations or war in Cambodia and Vietnam, regardless of political affiliations:

(5) That we urge our own United States Government to extend genuine humanitarian aid to these suffering people.

Section recommends concurrence.

For 68 Against 4 Not Voting 2

Criminal Rehabilitation

WHEREAS the Christian Church foundationally stands for the enabling of reconciliation of all human relationships as Christ spoke for and lived the reconciliation of man to God and man to man, and

WHEREAS broken relationships cannot be viewed in isolation of their social milieu; in perspective they need to be viewed in their social context, and

WHEREAS criminals exist in a broken relationship with persons, and society, and WHEREAS society needs to reconcile these broken lives in constructive and positive ways that will enable offenders to participate in the good of community life,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church continue to work for and support community-based rehabilitation programs for criminal offenders such as probation, parole, work-release, and Maryland's one-to-one "Volunteers in Probation" programs.

Section recommends concurrence.

Freedom of Choice on Abortion

WHEREAS the majority of the people of this country concur with the decision of the Supreme Court regarding abortion, and

WHEREAS every child has a right to be born into a family where he or she will be loved and responsibly cared for and,

WHEREAS the Constitution states that separation of church and state is a basic foundation of American society, and

WHEREAS the right of those who oppose abortion to maintain their moral conviction by personally avoiding the procedure is recognized, and

WHEREAS American legal structure ought not to be burdened with enforcing a particular religious doctrine, and

WHEREAS making abortion illegal has never stopped women from risking their lives in order to terminate an unwanted pregnancy, and

WHEREAS pro-life ought to include regard for the life and health of woman, and

WHEREAS freedom of choice is basic to our American life and includes the right to choose when and under what circumstances to bear a child, and

WHEREAS that right is presently being challenged.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference go on record as supporting freedom of choice in regard to an abortion as a basic civil right and necessary to the expression of religious freedom. Further, be it resolved that the conference's support of this right as presently guaranteed by

the U. S. Supreme Court, be publicly affirmed and all attempts to limit or deny this right be vigorously and consistently opposed. Be it further resolved that this resolution be sent to the Peninsula Congressional delegation.

Section recommends concurrence.

- (1) That all young people in the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church seek to deal seriously and intelligently with this question;
- (2) That all United Methodist Churches in the Peninsula Conference make

pertinent materials, including the social principles of the United Methodist Church and the Book of Discipline, available to their members faced with Registration with the Selective System.

World Hunger

WHEREAS the World Hunger situation has reached the crisis state, with more than half a billion people suffering from malnutrition, and as many as 50 million people threatened with death by starvation this year, and
WHEREAS, the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ calls us to have compassion for the needy, to feed the hungry, and give drink to the thirsty (Matt. 25:34-40), and
WHEREAS the General Council on Ministries of the United Methodist Church has declared World Hunger to be an immediate priority of the Church,
BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED by the Peninsula Annual Conference at its 1975 session:

(1) That the churches of this conference shall emphasize the needs in the United States and the rest of the world of the hungry in their prayers, in services of worship, and through study/ action programs such as the following:

(a) The presentation of the film *The Hungry Future*, (available through the Conference Office) or *Diet for a Small Planet* (available through Pacem in Terris).

(b) The serving of meatless meals to emphasize the conservation of grain for Human consumption, and the distribution or sale of the books *Diet for a Small Planet* and *Receipts for a Small Planet* (available through Pacem in Terris).

(c) The raising of funds for hunger relief efforts by budgeting money or receiving special offerings for the United Methodist Committee on Overseas Relief (UMCOR); or by supporting CROP Walks for the Hungry, and other such efforts.

(d) Joining Bread for the World, a National Christian Citizens movement to combat world hunger (602 East Ninth Street, N.Y.C. 10009).

(2) That United Methodist families on the Del-Mar-Va Peninsula be challenged:

(a) To eliminate waste and limit the consumption of food resources, by such means as fasting at least one meal each week in order to contribute the money saved to UMCOR, and to use that mealtime for family prayers and study of world hunger; by serving meatless meals; by modifying dietary habits.

(b) To convey to their representatives in the United States Congress their desire that U.S. Government policies reflect their concern for the hungry people of the world, even if we ourselves must learn to consume less.

Section recommends concurrence.

Integration in Public Schools

WHEREAS the nation historically has had segregated public school system and the Supreme Court has ruled that discrimination and denial of equal rights in housing, employment and education is illegal and whereas the courts have deemed that Wilmington's public school system is segregated, and whereas the mission of the church is to be found where there are human needs, human struggles, human divisions:

The Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church acknowledges that "integration" is a moral, ethical and religious issue, rather than a political issue. It also acknowledges that discrimination or segregation, be it De Facto or otherwise, is a non-Christian practice. The Conference further acknowledges that DEEP (Delaware Equal Education Process) Committee, a task force of the Urban Coalition working cooperatively with the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency and the Board of Church and Society of the Peninsula Annual Conference, is a non-political group that is working toward an amicable means to facilitate the integration of the schools in New Castle County.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church endorse the work and purpose set forth by DEEP. Furthermore the Conference encourages all churches to actively involve themselves in programing and/ or facilitating groups that are interested in dealing with the fears which have evolved from the court's decree on integration of the public schools.

FURTHER, we call upon the leaders of the United Methodist churches in districts where busing for school integration is an issue to be Christlike in their attitude and actions, as it affects this matter.

FURTHERMORE, we reaffirm that no United Methodist Church within the bounds of this Annual Conference shall establish or cooperate with others in a so called "Christian school" whose real purpose is to maintain racial segregation or to undermine the public school system, as a reaction against busing.

Section recommends concurrence.

Aid to Families With Dependent Children

***In Maryland 153,780 children are dependent upon Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC). The current grant to a family of four is \$226. per month. Beginning on July 1, 1975 these children will receive a 7% increase on a Flat Grant basis.

***In Delaware 23,140 children are dependent upon AFDC. The current grant to a family of four is \$231. per month, which is 80% of the 1968 Standard of Need. Proposed legislation (HB 181) would increase these grants to 100% of the 1968 Standard of Need.

Proposed Resolutions

1) The Peninsula Annual Conference notes with appreciation that the State of

Maryland has increased AFDC grants by 7% beginning July 1, 1975 to more adequately support 153,780 children.

2) The Peninsula Annual Conference respectfully requests the General Assembly of the State of Delaware to increase AFDC grants to 100% of the 1968 Standard of Need to more adequately support 23,140 children.

3) The Peninsula Annual Conference respectfully requests Governor Sherman W. Tribbitt to initiate a revision of the 1968 Standard of Need to reflect the realities in the cost of living in 1975.

If passed, Resolution # 1 is to be sent to Governor Marvin Mandel of Maryland; Resolution # 2 is to be sent to Senator Anthony Cicione and Senator Herman Holloway; and Resolution # 3 is to be sent to Governor Sherman Tribbitt of Delaware.

WHEREAS, Alcoholism in the United States is responsible for an annual economic loss of about \$15,000,000,000; in addition the Federal Government is spending \$86,000,000,000. annually for the treatment and prevention of alcoholism; and

WHEREAS, over one half the national highway fatalities are caused by drivers under the influence of alcoholic beverages; and

WHEREAS, many homes have been destroyed and others severely damaged spiritually, emotionally, and economically by alcoholic family members.

These people represent some 9 million people in the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, alcoholic beverages are responsible for other reckless acts by the users of this drug such as robbery, vandalism, assault, murder, and other violent crimes, therefore be

RESOLVED, that the Council of Ministries of the Peninsula Conference petition the Federal Consumer Product Safety Commission to ban all alcoholic beverages as dangerous substances.

The motion was seconded and Gary W. Trail introduced the following amendments which were accepted by Mr. O'Day:

(after 4th paragraph) and whereas precious grain, which could be used for the alleviation of those who suffer from needless hunger, is presently being used in the production of said alcoholic beverages.

(after 5th paragraph) and be it further resolved, that the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church call upon the Congress of the United States of America, out of compassion for the world's hungry, to pass such laws as will sharply limit production of alcoholic beverages for the remainder of 1975.

The question was called. The vote was: For 80, Against 121. The resolution failed.

A. Toward the Mutual Recognition of Members: An Affirmation

(1) As a witness to the faith that animates our participation in the Consultation on Church Union, we, the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, confess that all who are baptized into Christ are members of His universal Church and belong to and share in His ministry through the People of the One God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

(2) At this time, when we are living our way toward church union, we affirm that membership in a particular church is membership in the whole People of God. As a participating church in the Consultation we intend to work toward removing any impediments in our life which prevent us from receiving into full membership all members so recognized.

(3) In the divided state of our churches the word "membership" is used to refer to enrollment in a particular church. Affirming our oneness in baptism does not abolish membership in a particular church and substitute a common membership in all particular churches, nor does it mean plural simultaneous membership in several, nor does it refer merely to the practice of transferring membership from one particular church to another.

(4) Therefore, we covenant with the other participating churches in the Consultation of Church Union to do everything possible to hasten the day when,

together with other churches to whom through the Spirit's leading we may yet be joined, we all shall be one in a visible fellowship truly catholic, truly evangelical, and truly reformed.

B. An Inquiry About the Implications of This Affirmation

(5) The Consultation on Church Union believes that the commitment to seek mutual recognition of membership can be a new and creative ecumenical step if each affirming church undertakes an inquiry into the implications of the affirmation, and shares its findings with the other churches in the Consultation. To help open this inquiry, the Consultation asks the following questions:

1. Does not mutual recognition of membership imply recognition that the baptism of each church, whatever its mode or time of life, is an expression of and witness to our one baptism into the body of the one Lord?

2. Does not mutual recognition of membership imply a new appreciation of the importance of confirming, nurturing and instructing each member in the understanding and practice of a church membership which is recognizable to all as new life in Christ?

3. Does not mutual recognition of membership imply recognition that at each celebration of His eucharistic supper, our Lord's invitation and hospitality are extended to all who, baptized and repentant, draw near with faith?

4. Does not mutual recognition of membership imply the acknowledgement that each member is called to ministry, and has been endowed by the Spirit of Christ with gifts for that ministry which the whole Church requires for the building up of the body of believers and for their total ministry in the world?

5. Does not mutual recognition of membership imply an obligation to explore the new possibilities for mutual recognition of the ordained and licensed ministries of both men and women?

6. Does not mutual recognition of membership imply that our practices of congregational and denominational membership need re-examination? Does it not imply that membership in one communion is valid and acceptable in another communion? Does it not also imply a repudiation of the practice of one Church intentionally increasing its membership at the expense of another?

7. Does not mutual recognition of membership imply the importance of developing a richer ethnic, cultural and other diversity in our congregations and traditions?

8. Does not mutual recognition of membership imply a deeper commitment that we have yet made to racial and social justice in all our churches and communities, and to joint ministry to overcome racism, sexism, and other injustices?

9. Does not mutual recognition of membership imply a readiness on the part of each member to accept responsibility for the discipline of the church in which his or her membership is exercised, and likewise a readiness on the part of each church to develop its understanding and practice of discipline so as to prepare for the day when the churches can share a common understanding of discipline?

C. Recommendations for Action

1. Participating Church Actions

a. We recommend that "toward the mutual recognition of members: an affirmation" be referred to each participating church in the Consultation with the request that it be affirmed by its competent body as a commitment of that church with and to the other participating churches in the Consultation of Church Union.

b. We recommend that each affirming church be asked to undertake a serious inquiry into the implications of its own affirmation, and to share its findings with the other churches in the Consultation.

2. The Consultation's Supporting Action

a. We recommend that the Consultation undertake a common inquiry concerning the implications of mutual recognition of members, which aims both to stimulate and to bring together the fruits of the several inquiries by the declaring churches.

b. We recommend that the Consultation actively and steadily seek to interest other churches in affirming this mutual recognition of members.

The Peninsula Annual Conference petitions the 1976 General Conference of the United Methodist Church to adopt the following statement: "Toward the mutual recognition of members". The United Methodist Church is willing to move toward implementation with the other churches in the Consultation and encourages the Consultation on Church Union to move as rapidly as possible toward additional commitment to action."

Composite Report — 1975 Presented By G. Wayne Cuff

Bishop Mathews, Members of the Conference, and Christian Friends:

The Peninsula Conference is a great conference. It is great because of the leaders who have served it in the past, and because of the leadership that it presently enjoys in the person of Bishop James K. Mathews.

The Peninsula Conference is a great conference because of the dedicated Christian laypersons who have caught the visions of its leaders and have joined together with them to help make those visions become realities.

The Peninsula Conference is a great conference because of the strength of character and the dedication to Christian principles of the ministers who serve within the confines of the Conference.

The aim, the goal, the purpose of these three entities is to do all that is humanly possible to strengthen the local church in the mission and ministry of Jesus Christ.

All that has been done and all that will be done is directed toward that one specific goal, to strengthen the local church in the mission and ministry of Jesus Christ.

In the attempt to achieve this goal, many things have been done:

1. Realignments

Churches and charges have been realigned in the attempt to assure every charge a fully trained and dedicated pastor, and at the same time, to be sure every local church enjoys the benefits of a full service church. At first many people looked askance when the word realignment was mentioned, but after they have thought it over carefully and after they have given it a try, most of them agreed that the realignment had been beneficial to all concerned.

As Christians, we must learn to pool all of our resources and cooperate as much as possible in all aspects of our Christian responsibilities.

The day of complete independence is a thing of the past. All of us are dependent upon others. When we realize this and celebrate our inter-dependence each upon the other, then the complete joy and satisfaction of realignments will be realized.

2. Inclusiveness

Our Conference has adopted a policy of total inclusiveness in all aspects of the Conference. This includes, but is not limited to, the appointment of pastors without regard to race and sex. A resolution on inclusiveness was to have been presented to every Charge Conference for its appropriate action. The intention of the resolution was to give those charges that were ready to affirm it a chance to do so without trying to force the issue on churches that were not ready at that particular point in time to affirm it.

Many of the charges in the Conference did affirm the resolution and it is hoped where the policy was not implemented this year, it will be implemented next year.

The resolution came as a result of the black leadership of both conferences getting together to look at the picture of inclusiveness in our area, and to attempt to devise methods whereby the ministry of the area would be effective and inclusive.

Communication and cooperation of churches at the local church level are also a part of inclusiveness.

Unless some specific attempt is made to foster this communication and cooperation, nothing is likely to happen in the local churches.

There are ways that these things can take place normally and without a lot of noise and fanfare. Some of these methods have been mentioned before. We take the liberty to mention them again but would restate the fact that unless some person or organization is designated to carry out these responsibilities, nothing is likely to happen.

1. An exchange of pastors at least twice a year, but preferably once a quarter (not especially Human Relations Sunday).
2. Combined Vacation Church Schools.
3. Combined Study Courses by the United Methodist Women.
4. Combined work areas of Christian Social Concerns in a given area.
5. Combined senior citizens groups.
6. Combined membership training classes.
7. Combined religious surveys and evangelistic thrusts.

These are just a few of the many opportunities that afford themselves to the local congregation. The list is limited only as much as our imagination is limited.

Special goals should be set and time lines established as to how much of the goal should be reached and at what point in time. The goals should be attainable, measurable, and reasonable. Realignment and inclusiveness should go hand in hand. Some steps are to be taken this year in the area of an inclusive conference, but more steps will need to be taken in the future. The Evaluation of Merger conducted by the Conference Commission on Religion and Race, which will be presented to this Conference, should give us some guidelines as to where we go from here and why.

3. Leadership Training

If a job is to be done, the worker who is to do the job must have a clear understanding of what the job is and what tools are needed, and where they can be secured to accomplish the task.

This seems to be true of every walk of life — the Christian Church being no exception. Our Conference Staff has attempted to provide leadership for the training of local church officers at all levels. Each year all four districts have conducted Leadership Training Sessions for the persons elected to office in the local church. Materials, workbooks, etc., have been made available also to give guidance. Workshops for Pastor-Parish Relations Committees, Trustees, and Financial officers have been held in addition to the annual Leadership Training Sessions. The Conference Staff have worked with the local churches in Church School emphases, financial drives, and stewardship concerns, wills and legacies, evangelistic programs, and in just about every area of concern.

In addition to all of this, our Bishop, Bishop James K. Mathews, has taken time out of his busy schedule to conduct two study days per year per district, in the attempt to sharpen the skill of the minister, so that the minister can help the local church.

4. Restructure Study

When the General Conference adopted the restructure plan in 1972, our Annual Conference modified its structure slightly, but decided to take a long, hard look at what should be done for the future. The Conference Council on Ministries did not want to get too far ahead of the local churches; therefore, they instituted a Structure Study Committee for the Conference Council on Ministries.

That Committee is making its report to the Annual Conference with the hope that this will be the structure that can best relate our local churches to the District, to the Annual Conference, to the Jurisdictional Conference, and finally, to the General Conference.

5. Other Areas of Concern

If the local church is to be strengthened, there are some other things that must have our immediate attention:

(a) Ministers with other employment

The ministry is a full time job, and a minister ought not have other regular employment. Time spent on other employment takes away time that should be spent on the charge fulfilling the ministry and mission of the local charge.

Our Conference adopted a policy on this issue some time ago. We could call your attention to that policy again.

(b) Ministers living within the parish

Every local charge is obligated to provide either housing or a housing allowance for its pastor. In our Conference most charges own parsonages where their pastors are expected to reside. These parsonages are to be kept in good condition. Where there is an adequate parsonage provided, a pastor is expected to occupy it. If the parsonage is not adequate, the charge should bring it up to required standards. In every event a pastor of a charge or parish is expected to live within the parish or charge area.

(c) Annual Financial Audit for the local church

The United Methodist Discipline calls for all financial books of the local church to be audited annually. "This audit should be done by persons who are not a part of the financial program of the church and who are unrelated."

This is a vital program that should be followed strictly by every local church, that everyone will be aware of what has happened and why.

Conclusion

In conclusion we would like to reiterate that our efforts have been directed toward the goal of strengthening all of the local churches. We have not always agreed as to what might have been the best method to attain that goal, but our aim has not deviated from that goal. We have worked together as a team in the attempt to reach that goal.

This year, most of the old team will leave for places yet unannounced and a new team will take their places. One holdover will attempt to bridge the gap between the old and the new.

We solicit for the incoming District Superintendents the same cooperation and support that you gave the outgoing superintendents and we pray that God will continue to work His Will in all of us.

We would like to close with a verse of the Great Hymn "Onward Christian Soldiers" by Sabone Baring Gould:

"Like a Mighty Army moves the Church of God,
Brothers, we are treading where the saints have trod.
We are not divided, all one body we
One in hope and doctrine, one in charity.
Onward, Christian Soldiers, marching as to war
With the Cross of Jesus, going on before."

SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS

DOVER DISTRICT

Olin J. Shockley, Jr., District Superintendent

This report is made on behalf of the pastors and lay persons of the Dover District. The accomplishments reported here are the result of faithful and loyal service on the part of the people called Methodists. They are reported to the glory of God.

We were saddened this year by the deaths of four members of our district family; The Reverend Melvin E. Wheatley, The Reverend Robert Kirby, Mrs. Conrad Hamer, and Mrs. Dayton McClain. Our hearts were gladdened with four new arrivals to our district family; John Peter to John and Ginny Van Tine, Donald Otis to Don and Ann Clendaniel, II; John Thomas to John and Maubra Jane Randolph and Beverley Ann to Dave and Peg Paul. Marriage congratulations were extended to Claude and Mary Brown and Walter H. and Connie Beckwith.

Though the economy of our area has been shakey and unstable with an inflation index of 12.5% and an unemployment ratio of nearly 10%, our churches have rendered a faithful account of their stewardship. In spite of the prevailing economic instability the churches of this district paid 96% of their 1974 apportionment. In addition, our churches raised a record amount for Advance Specials, in particular for U.M.C.O.R. Forty-six of the fifty-two charges of the district increased their ministerial support. The combined total of increased salaries and fringe benefits for the district exceeds \$39,000. Only one charge next year will need support from the Equitable Salary Fund.

Many churches are reporting new members, and increased attendances. New forms of ministry are being explored through the use of buses or special outreaches to mobile parks or to resort areas. A variety of ministries are being planned and implemented for the elderly. Many churches are supporting the Migrant Ministry of the D.E.A.

Dover District takes seriously this conference's desire and need for an inclusive church. Twenty-one of our charges voted affirmatively on Bishop Mathew's resolution, regarding a church's willingness to accept a pastor regardless of color or sex. In compliance with this resolution, two appointments involving female pastors, one of whom is black, will be made on this district at this session of the Annual Conference. The Bishop's Resolution proved to be a valuable instrument at

our Charge Conferences this year, giving our people an opportunity to discuss this very important subject. Some attention in the future must be given to some realignment between black and white congregations, plus our rural black churches need to have their salaries up-graded through the use of funds available in the Temporary General Aid Fund.

Much building activity occurred on the district this year. The Epworth Congregation in Rehoboth consecrated their new educational building. Union-Bridgeville dedicated their sanctuary, educational building and chapel. The Clarksville Charge acquired a beautiful new residence for their pastor. Whatcoat-Dover will break ground this month for their new sanctuary. Construction is beginning on the addition of the educational building at Reliance. Several building projects are being planned by churches of the district for the near future.

Finally, in this my last report as superintendent of the Dover District, permit me the opportunity to express my profound gratitude to Almighty God, Bishop Mathews, the cabinet and the wonderful parsonage families of this district for the privilege Dorothy, I and our daughters have had in serving this great district and being a part of a great people.

EASTON DISTRICT

Otho G. Brewer, Jr., District Superintendent

This report will be my last as Superintendent of the Easton District. These past six years have passed all too swiftly. There is a deep sense of satisfaction in the work accomplished and in the warm and lasting relationships between your superintendent and the pastors and people of the various churches in the district.

The overall goal for these past six years has been to present a sound financial base at the local level. This has been done in order to free churches from the sheer necessity of devoting the bulk of their energies toward raising money and instead to channel these energies into the real work of the church which is the presentation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ that leads to changed lives and to increased membership and attendance.

Some of the ways that helped free the financial burden have been:

1 - Realignment - This has been the greatest help of all and the idea has been well received on this district. Twenty-two of the sixty-three churches have had some type of realignment in the past six years and your superintendent does not know of a single one that would prefer to go back to the old alignment.

2 - Apportionment payments - Churches are composed of individuals that operate on weekly, monthly budgets. More and more churches are beginning to pay monthly and finding it much easier to do.

3 - Budgets - Individuals discover early in life that you have to operate on some sort of a budget or you soon find yourselves in serious financial difficulty. Your superintendent was amazed to discover the number of churches that had no apparent budget and wondered why they had trouble in meeting apportionments or unexpected expenses. More and more churches now operate with a fixed budget for the year.

I have also been proud to have had the privilege of serving the most evenly integrated or inclusive district in all of United Methodism. This working together has greatly enriched my life and taught me the value of an inclusive society. Separateness impoverishes both groups. Inclusiveness greatly enriches both groups. My one real regret is that I was not able to work out a greater sharing of intercommunication at the local level. Such sharing and intercommunication is vital before we can know and enrich each other.

Finally, I want to take this opportunity to thank the pastors and people of the district for the all expense paid trip to England for my wife and myself from April 14th to 22nd. This is but one example of the warm fellowship that has existed over the past six years. We shall miss you one and all, but will treasure the fine memories you have given us.

SALISBURY DISTRICT

David W. Baker, Sr., District Superintendent

In this, my first report to the Peninsula Conference, I shall endeavor to present a summary of the activities on the Salisbury District, as made possible by our ministries and 22,517 laymembers.

State of the Church and Its Ministerial Families: The bride of the District has been Teresa Hurley, wife of Vernon, married 10/ 19/ 74. The stork left a bundle of love to William and Julia Wallace, a daughter, Janee Anita. Death freed the spirit from the bodies of seven members of our ministerial family: Mrs. Sadie Mumford, widow of the late William Mumford, 10/ 22/ 74; Basil Chandler, a student serving Quantico-Rockawalkin, 10/ 25/ 74; Robert W. Dennis, retired, 10/ 26/ 74; Ira Crum, retired, 1/ 30/ 75; and George Jackson, retired, 3/ 18/ 75.

Pastoral Changes: From retirement, Dr. Howard Warren came to fill the Quantico-Rockawalkin Charge; from retirement, The Reverend Mr. Harold Gratten went to fill Nanticoke-Bivalve Charge, when their pastor left the United Methodist Church.

Change in Church Status: Effective 1/ 1/ 75 Whitehaven United Methodist Church on the Quantico-Rockawalkin Charge became a Limited Service Church. The membership was transferred to the Quantico Church on the Charge. . . . Our district ministerial family includes 28 full members, 14 associate members, 14 lay-pastors, 39 retired, and 29 widows living in our district area. We have 124 family units.

Report of Year's Labor: The membership on the district increased 69 . . . The indebtedness on our church property is \$709,401. There are 26 charges which are debt-free. . . . Nearly 300 Lay Leaders; Finance, Council on Ministries and Administrative Board Chairpersons, met on a County basis. The purpose was for the new Superintendent to meet them and discuss procedures for the Charge Conferences and District Program. Four smaller group meetings were held with Ministers, concerning the local church organization with resource persons from the Conference Staff . . . 685 dedicated and eager local church leaders attended a training session which included 21 classes. . . . There were also separate training periods for local church Boards of Trustees and Charge Pastor-Parish Chairpersons . . . There were two Bishop's Study Days, well attended; which were educational, inspirational, and welcomed fellowship . . . Four black charges (10 churches) voted to affirm the resolution on inclusiveness; one black church (on a 3 church charge) voted to affirm; and two white charges (3 churches) also voted to affirm the resolution. . . . 22 Local Lay-Pastors' licenses were renewed. This list is now updated. . . . 111 Certified Lay Speakers were trained for 1975. . . . 7 young men have been recommended by their local Charge Conferences for license to preach. . . . The Superintendent personally conducted 55 Charge Conferences in the fall of '74.

Stewardship of Tithes: As a district we paid 96% of our apportionments, with 10 churches not paying in full. The United Methodist Women raised \$73,093 for their local churches, and \$21,321 for missions. (7 charges reported nothing.) . . . Paid on indebtedness by churches, \$182,369; on Building and Improvements, \$282,037. . . .

Raised for second-mile giving, \$28,103. (2 churches reported nothing.) Of this amount \$9,100 was for a special project in India; - Hostel Extension, Sonipat, Haryana. . . Our thanks to the Reverend Mr. Charles Huffman, District Missionary Secretary, for his leadership in challenging churches beyond the expected giving . . . The District Ministerial Family gave \$300 to Camp Pecometh, 10/ 17/ 74 . . . A goodly number of our churches responded to the call by our Bishop for fasting one meal a week, and are giving to the hungry . . . 43 of our 56 charges increased the ministers' income to the amount of \$29,713; an average of \$691., per year.

Concern Over Lack of Concern: The lack of interest in Second Mile Giving: Out of the 56 charges the following numbers gave to: One Hour of Sharing (32); World Communion (32); United Methodist Student Day (20); Human Relations Sunday (17); Christian Education Sunday (24); Board of Child Care (41); Homes For the Aged (37); Barratt's Chapel (4) . . . Evangelism was the key emphasis at the charge conference, yet the net gain for the year was 69, which is slightly more than 1 per charge . . . 25 charges decreased in membership, 26 increased, and 5 remained the same. . . . We must first evangelize ourselves, and in doing so, our churches will become aware of rededicated members, who will take the Good News outside the walls of the church and into everyday living. . . . The Parsonage does not of necessity need to be the best house in the community, but neither should it be one of the worst in the area. Churches must take pride in the home in which their Pastor lives. Second hand items, second-best standards are not tolerable. We must make our parsonages the type of home in which we would want to live, and be interested in the maintenance of it, as if it were our own.

Commendations: To the District United Methodist Women, Mrs. Jeanean Thomas, president, for their diligent labor. My concern, with the leaders of this organization as well, is for the women in the local churches to see the need for greater giving to the Mission program, more support to the District and Conference organization by their attendance at programs on either level, and most importantly to get about the task of reorganization according to the new by-laws in the local church units. . . . To the District Board of Laity, Robert Taylor - Lay Leader and his corps of Associate Lay Leaders, for their avid support. Our primary concern is the apparent apathy among us, in gatherings on the District or Conference level. Let's become more sociable and be part of programs and projects which will help us to become better laity in our local churches, as well as to increase our circle of friends.

Appreciation and Conclusion: This year has been quite different for me after 36 years in the pastoral ministry. I prayerfully have accepted the opportunity and challenge to enlarge my responsibilities. My purposes this year were to get acquainted, to observe local churches and parish needs, and to lay a foundation for the years of service we may have together on the district. May I share part of an article that came across my desk recently? . . . "What is this place noted for?" asked the traveler of an old time resident. "Why, Mister, this is the starting point for any place in the world! You can start here, and go anywhere you want to." . . . How many of us fail to realize the full richness of living, because we always yearn to be somewhere else before starting seriously on our journey to the place we wish to be. . . . It is impossible to start from some other place. We must begin where we are, using what we have, and launch out upon our journey. . . . For those of us, laity and ministers, who serve together on the Salisbury District, this is our starting point — for any place in the world. We'll find the needed material at our doorstep. We need to use it, and get moving! . . . To Bishop James K. Mathews, who gave me the honor and privilege of being part of his Cabinet; to my colleagues of the Cabinet, who have displayed patience and helpfulness in this year of initiation; to

the Salisbury District Lay Leader, Associates, and local church Laity, who are dedicated to make something happen in their local churches, so we can come alive in '75; to the Ministerial Families of the District, both active and retired, who have received us well, assisted in varied ways to promote the work of the Church; and to the Conference Staff and clerical workers of the Dover office; goes our sincere thanks . . . All have made this year much easier . . . Finally, all this would never have come into reality, but for the patience, guidance, health and strength, which were daily provided by our Father above.

To all those mentioned above, I express my gratitude and deep joy in being privileged to serve. . . . Florence and I are deeply indebted to all of you for the many courtesies extended and experiences shared.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

G. Wayne Cuff, District Superintendent

The Wilmington District is a great district, and it has been my privilege to serve it for the past two years. Having served the Dover District for four years, this will be my last report to the Annual Conference.

Sicknesses

As far as I know there were no major illnesses in our District the past year. There have been some illnesses and some minor operations, but none that were too serious. The Rev. W.L.D. Lyght had an operation; Mrs. Theodora Hart and Mrs. Elizabeth Foster have suffered illnesses; Mrs. Helen Lucia and Mrs. Aileen Squires were hospitalized; Rev. James C. Steen, Sr., retired, was a patient at Brandywine Springs Nursing Home, and is now living at the Manor House in Seaford. On the whole, however, our district has proved to be a rather healthy one.

Marriages

Three ministers took the marriage vows this year: Greg Wayne Hill married Rosemary Ruster on June 8, 1974; F. David Weber married Rosemary Collins on July 6, 1974; Ray F. Graham married Nancy Jean Sanborn on April 18, 1975.

Births

The new additions to the parsonage families were evenly divided between boys and girls this year. A daughter, Kendra Dawn, was born to Dr. and Mrs. D. Bruce Roberts on May 24, 1974. Dr. Roberts, a member of our Conference, is a professor at Scarritt College in Nashville, Tenn., and is a former associate pastor at Brandywine-Trinity Charge. A daughter, Spring Hallel, was born to Rev. and Mrs. Keith Yorkdale on April 2, 1975. A son, Matthew John, was born to Rev. and Mrs. James P. Walz on November 17, 1974. Rev. and Mrs. Donald Hamilton adopted a son, Michael.

Deaths

Death came to our District families on five occasions: Mrs. Edna B. Jones, widow of Rev. C. Nadal Jones, died in June 1974; Mrs. Sara W. Fosnacht, widow of Rev. Walter E. Fosnacht; Rev. Vernon Myers Goodhand died October 27, 1974; Rev. Silvanus T. Hamblin died January 1, 1975; Rev. Dr. Charles S. Clarkson died January 29, 1975; Mrs. J. C. O'Dell's mother died; Mrs. Charles Hart's mother died; Rev. Robert Simpson's father died. Our prayers and condolences were sent to the bereaved families.

Buildings And Improvements

1. Mt. Lebanon Church has completed the educational addition to their church and the building has been consecrated.
2. Simpson Church has started construction of their new church building and plans call for completion this fall.
3. Skyline Church held its ground breaking ceremony recently. They are planning an all purpose building with a possible addition later on.
4. Red Lion Church is still studying plans for a new church building.
5. Ebenezer Church in Newark is almost ready to begin the construction of its new church building.
6. Hockessin Church has plans under way for a new education wing. Construction could begin almost immediately.

Other Pertinent Information

1. Lester Maloney left the Marshallton-Cedars position early in the year, and Wilmer Abbott was called out of retirement to fill the gap.
2. Glasgow Church had a special closing service for its church and many of its members united with the Glasgow Ecumenical Church in Glasgow (Presbyterian, Episcopal, and United Methodist.)
3. Three men are retiring this year: Robert Mackey, Henry Schauer, and William Garrett. They have given long and faithful service to the United Methodist Church.
4. There is just one realignment this Conference year. The South New Castle Parish will go from four charges to three charges.

Conclusion

It has been a pleasure to have served the Wilmington District, its great churches, and its wonderful people. They shall always have a warm spot in my life.

(b.) Boards, Commissions and Committees

SECTION I

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Since the General Conference in 1968 established the Conference Program Council, then in 1972 changed its name to the Conference Council on Ministries, this group has had a growing influence on the life of the Conference and its program agencies are amenable to the Council. Among its functions the Council is responsible for: coordinating the work of the agencies; developing, implementing and supporting worthwhile programs; studying program needs, available resources and recommending a program budget to the Council on Finance and Administration; also recommending a unified program for Conference approval.

To fulfill these responsibilities the Council has met six times since last Conference: in June, September, November, on two consecutive Saturdays in February and in April.

I. Matters Referred By Annual Conference

1. The Conference directed our participation in the Pension study. Robert Powrie, Felton May, and Robert Whitlock have served as members of the task force. The Council Director has been one of the consultants. The Council has been kept informed of the progress of the study. As of this writing the final recommendation has not been drafted. The report will be presented to this session of Conference by the Board of Pensions.

2. The Council has assisted in the study of the ten years since the merger of the Delaware Conference and the Peninsula Conference. In addition to a \$3,000 grant from the Conference Board of Missions, a \$2,000 grant was authorized by the Council on Finance and Administration upon the recommendation of this Council. This report will be brought to Conference by the Commission on Religion and Race.

3. The special task force created from the Council Executive Committee and the Black Caucus to study the Wesley Foundation program has not at this writing submitted its final report. It is expected that it will report to the Council in April and that its recommendations will be sent to Conference as a supplement to this report.

II. Other Significant Actions Of The Council

1. The Council has named a Bicentennial Committee to suggest ways the Conference can participate in this event.

2. In the area of Leadership Development we provided training for the pastors of the Salisbury District in four workshops on local church organization and function and in the planning process. We conducted workshops on the Dover District for chairpersons of Administrative Boards and Councils on Ministries. We supported four workshops for church coordinators of Peace and Self-Development of Peoples. We held workshops on each District for Church Trustees. The major event was the January workshops for local church Council on Ministries members with an attendance of 1577 (201 more than the year before). A retreat for ministers on developing leadership styles was held at Drayton Manor with marked success.

3. In the field of Black Ministries special emphasis has been given to local church consultations and workshops. Major time has been devoted to the Merger Study and the work of the area Think Tank which is concerned about the recruitment and encouragement of Black ministers.

4. In the area of Stewardship, our standing committee, chaired by Robert L. Harris, has held four Wills Seminars on the Districts and a three-day retreat on Family Financial Resource Planning and will provide district programming in the coming months on this subject.

5. The Communications Committee, chaired by Nathaniel Miller has sponsored our Conference paper the *Communicator* with a circulation of 5,300. A training event for communicators is planned in the Northeastern Jurisdiction. Our committee has been involved in the planning. Our Audio Visual Library reports that 493 filmstrips, 136 movie films and 70 cassettes were used during the past year. The new Audio Visual catalogue should further stimulate this usage.

6. The Committee on Camps and Retreat Centers has new leadership. Harold M. Davis was selected to replace John Simperts when the later resigned the chairmanship.

Camp Pecometh

The year 1974 was good one for Camp Pecometh. The Barn was painted, a new ice machine was purchased and some of the camp roads were paved. By the end of 1976 all major repairs and improvements will be completed if our present schedule is maintained.

Our emphasis must now shift to program. Some improvement has been made in this area, but we have hardly begun.

One of the highlights of our year was the increased use of the Camp by Prince George's County Special Education Department. Mentally retarded, blind, deaf, physically handicapped and emotionally disturbed youngsters were brought to camp on week days during the school year.

The number of back pack programs has been increased and a camp on vocations for Senior Highs has been added for 1975. New and innovative programs must be planned and promoted to broaden our base of participation. Some suggestions for these are camps in the inner city, extended canoe trips, camps for retired people, inter-generational camps and experimental conferences for Senior Highs.

In 1974 there were 1167 summer resident campers, an increase for the second year in a row. There were 1831 weekend campers and 2221 who used the camp facilities during the week in other than summer camps. There were 1210 in Family Camps and 1749 in picnic groups.

C. Jackson Robinson, Director

Drayton Manor

Drayton entered its tenth year of service in 1975. Special recognition of this accomplishment will be observed during the month of October, 1975. It was the first weekend of October 1965 that the first retreat was held at Drayton.

The number of people days in 1974 was 7,069 compared to 3,520 in 1970. There were 58 weekend groups and 50 through-the-week groups using the facility making a total of 108 groups.

Programs included a very wide variety: Councils on Ministries from local churches constituted the largest grouping; United Methodist Women from local churches; Church School Staffs; Church School Classes; Marriage Enrichment Experiences; Retreats sponsored by local churches for any or all who wished to participate; Choirs; Growth or Study Groups; and Ministerial groups such as Orientation for new pastors and ministers, clergy leadership styles, and clergy retreat with Brooks Hays.

Secular groups included the following: Delaware Family Court; Administrators of the Mt. Pleasant School District of Delaware; Administrators of the A.I. DuPont School District; Maryland Council on Conservation; Evaluation Staff for Kent County High School; and Division of Adult Corrections, State of Delaware.

Drayton has maintained a favorable financial position for the past four years. The actual expenditures in 1974 were \$75,034.81. The Peninsula Conference contributed \$7,000.00 of this amount. On December 31, 1974, there was a balance of \$1,587.00. There was an increase in income from overnight groups of \$13,000.00 during 1974. An income of \$4,814.00 for swimming pool memberships from 78 families was sufficient to pay the cost of pool operation. Contributions by individuals and church groups to the Friends of Drayton Fund amounted to \$6,401.70.

7. The Task Force for Peace and the Self-Development of Peoples was organized in 1973 by the Conference Council on Ministries, and charged with the task of implementing the Bishops' Call, which was issued to the 1972 General Conference. The General Conference adopted the Call as an emphasis for the 1972-1976 quadrennium. At an all-day session at Drayton Manor, four days before Christmas, 1973, the Task Force was introduced to its task by Bishop Mathews and Carolyn Wilhelm of the Women's Division, Board of Global Ministries.

During 1974, under the leadership of Dr. Richard Turner, Chairperson, the Task Force asked every local church to name a Coordinator for Peace and Self-Development. Workshops were held on each district, September 16-19, to train these coordinators and to plan for the promotion of World Order Sunday, October 20. One hundred sixty-two persons attended these workshops, and some exciting things began to happen on World Order Sunday. Bulletin inserts, sermons, entire

worship services, and alternate diet experiments were used to make people aware of the demands of Peace and Self-Development in the world. CROP Walks for the Hungry, and UNICEF were promoted. On-going emphases on such related issues as World Hunger were initiated in some churches.

In October Dr. Turner resigned and Bruce Cooke became Chairperson of the Task Force. Materials on World Hunger, obtained through Pacem in Terris, were made available to Church and Society Work Area Chairpersons at the January workshops for Councils on Ministries.

As the Task Force pursues its objective - "to sensitize Peninsula Conference United Methodists to be responsive to the issues of peace and self-development through study and action" - it has set the following goals for 1975:

1. To assist in the emphasis on the Bishops' Call for Peace and the Self-Development of Peoples at the 1975 session of the Annual Conference.

2. To urge the use of the Bishops' Call Study Guide as a resource for local church studies.

3. To provide information and action ideas to local churches through their pastors and their Peace and Self-Development Coordinators.

District Workshops are being planned for September 15-18, 1975 for pastors, coordinators, and Church and Society Work Area Chairpersons.

A successful response to the Bishops' Call depends on action by each local church. The Task Force seeks to be a stimulus and a resource for such action. The issues are urgent. The time for action is now. May we help you as you reach out to serve God and your neighbors?

8. Council staff and persons who have been provided special training are being used throughout the Conference in local church, charge and cluster training events, seminars, workshops and consultations. In this and other ways we feel we are strengthening the local church and fulfilling a basic priority.

III. Program Recommendations

The Program Boards and Agencies of the Conference, as prescribed by the Discipline, have submitted program and budget proposals to the Council on Ministries. The Council has evaluated these proposals and has forwarded its recommended program budget to the Council on Finance and Administration. The approved, coordinated program plan for 1975 is submitted to the Annual Conference herewith.

A. To be considered by Study and Review Section II

1. Board of Education

- a. Plan four quarterly resources Preview Workshops. By November 21, 1975 we will hold two Preview Workshops on the Dover and Easton District using the Winter Quarter curriculum. By February 21, 1976 we will hold two Workshops on the Wilmington and Salisbury Districts using Spring curriculum.
- b. Plan a Film Workshop by April 26 which will include "Ways of Leading a Film Discussion" and new films preview. The services of Mass Media will be used for leadership.
- c. Sponsor an Audio Visual Workshop by October 31 in which persons will receive training in using creative materials in the local church.

- d. Develop a means of communicating information on the subject of education to the local church.
- e. Recruit and train persons for leadership teams to train local church personnel, recruit leaders and financial support for their training.
- f. Attempt to put renewed emphasis on the Church School as a continuing evangelistic opportunity. Request the Board of Evangelism to join us in planning effective ways to design a program of training which will help teachers.

2. Board of Evangelism

- a. The major emphasis in 1976 will be the development and conducting of New Life Missions throughout the Conference. The New Life Mission is a contemporary strategy for proclaiming the Good News, designed to elicit relevant commitment from people that will lead to a mobilization of the local church for mission.
- b. To achieve the above it is planned to hold workshops on each district to train New Life Missioners and to provide advanced training for those already certified.
- c. Conduct a preaching mission on each district using a qualified United Methodist Evangelist.

3. Board of Laity

- a. Retreat at Camp Pecometh for men and boys.
- b. Lay Banquet at Conference for Clergy and Lay Members.
- c. Northeastern Jurisdiction Lay Assembly - Lay persons and clergy.
- d. Conference Training Program
 - 1. Lay Speakers
 - 2. Lay Leaders
- e. District Programs
 - 1. Lay Speaking
 - 2. Communion Breakfasts
 - 3. District Fall Banquets

4. Commission on Worship

- a. Hope to plan District Workshops on Worship.
- b. A festival on the theme "Choirs in the Small Church" is projected.
- c. Provide pastors with materials on new baptismal service.

5. Commission on Archives and History

- a. To work with the committee on the Bicentennial in the observance of the anniversary of our country by calling attention to our Methodist Heritage.
- b. Encourage the organization of local or regional Historical Societies as chapters of the Conference Society.
- c. Continue the care and supervision of Barratt's Chapel and Museum.

B. To be considered by Study and Review Section III

1. Commission on Higher Education and Campus Ministry

- a. encourage support of Wesley College and interpret College to Conference.
- b. Continue support of Morgan College Christian Center.

- c. Provide a Christian witness on college and university campuses through Wesley Foundation and related programs.

2. Commission on Lay Worker

- a. Continue to keep before the local church its responsibility in hiring lay employees by sending the approved 1974 recommendations, again in 1975.
- b. Use the Coordinated Mailing to send information on how local churches can be covered by Social Security.
- c. Give support to the Guidelines for Pastor-Parish Relations Committees in hiring professional Christian educators or persons in program or leadership development, as designed by the Peninsula and Baltimore Conference Christian Educators.
- d. Design a similar guideline for Pastor-Parish Relations Committees in hiring professionals in music vocations in the local church.
- e. Bring together all certified persons throughout our Conference who are eligible to become a Lay Worker and discuss this relationship with them.

3. Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations

- a. Strengthen our ties with the local church by:
 - 1. Compiling a mailing list for all secretaries of enlistment or youth counselors.
 - 2. Following up on contacts we have made with high school students, particularly those indicating an interest in church-related occupations, providing them with additional information and encouragement.
 - 3. Having a series of training sessions, district by district, for secretaries of enlistment or (if none) persons designated by the pastor.
 - 4. Promoting a Parent-Student program for discussion of career choices to be held in one community during 1976 as a pilot.
- b. Participate in the annual Career Day at Delaware State College.
- c. Continue to promote the booklet *Church Occupations and Voluntary Service* and, in addition, write a supplement listing church occupations available within our conference.
- d. Promote existing Audio-Visual aids and purchase additional quality films. Also promote Audio-Visual aids available from the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency's Resource Library.
- e. Make contact with guidance counselors at high schools within the bounds of the Peninsula Conference letting them know of our interest and our ability to provide resources in the area of church-related occupations.
- f. Sponsor, either in cooperation with the Board of the Ministry or on our own, another program similar to the Convocation on Christian Vocations held January 11, 1975.

4. Board of the Ministry

- a. Continue, evaluate, and strengthen existing programs with candidates for the ordained ministry.
- b. Study recruitment needs of the Peninsula Conference ordained ministry.
- c. Give special attention to needs and opportunities for women in the ordained ministry.
- d. Continue special emphasis on the recruitment of Black ministers.
- e. Provide twenty persons from Peninsula Conference to participate in seminar on retirement at University of Maryland.
- f. Continue study of the special appointments.

5. Board of Church and Society**a. Division of World Peace**

1. Encourage local churches to coordinate programs in which families fast one meal per week and forward contributions representing the cost of the meal to the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR).

2. Encourage the efficient use of world food supplies by encouraging the use of alternate sources of protein to meat and by discouraging the wasteful use of grain in alcoholic beverages.

3. Promote Peace and World Order Sunday with emphasis on the fact that peace is more than just the absence of open warfare.

4. Encourage churches to become informed with regard to the Paris Peace Agreement of 1973, the obligation which the United States incurred in signing the Agreement, the violations taking place, the United States' current role in Southeast Asia, and the incarceration of political prisoners.

5. Encourage churches to become informed on the Middle East Situation, gathering information from all points of view with recognition that unbiased information is not likely to be found unless it is sought out.

6. Continue participation in Delaware Pacem In Terris.

7. Reinforce support of the Task Force on Peace and Self-Development, requesting all local churches as well as the Conference to give it a high priority.

8. Encourage churches to have "hunger meals" accompanied by educational programs on the subject of world hunger.

b. Division of General Welfare

1. Promote Labor Sunday in September.

2. Promote Drug and Alcohol Concerns Sunday in November.

3. Cooperate with Peninsula Homes and Hospitals, Inc. to raise the questions of the aging and provide program resources to each church in the Conference.

4. Work for the abolishment of capital punishment.

5. Study and seek to raise inadequate public assistance grants through cooperation and support of Delaware Ecumenical Agency (DEA) Social Awareness and Action Task Force and the Public Assistance Task Force (PAT).

6. Share in the DEA Task Force on the Community Rehabilitation Programs for convicted criminals and continue effort to involve ten per cent of churches in specific rehabilitation projects.

c. Division of Human Relations

1. Promote Human Relations Sunday in January.

2. Continue undertaking joint project with Commission on Religion and Race on the planning and presentation of an inter-racial retreat with follow-up.

3. Develop church response, with other agencies, to meeting emergency housing needs.

4. Make the 1976 Bicentennial a time for making democracy real:

a. Encourage the celebration of Martin Luther King's birthday as a national holiday of reconciliation.

b. Study Black contributions in American Culture.

c. Sponsor seminars on the growing tide of anti-Semitism.

d. Encourage the exercise of Ballot Power through voter registration.

e. Work for decent housing for all Americans.

d. Division of Emerging Issues

1. To conduct District workshops on emerging issues.

2. To encourage ten per cent of the churches to establish a study group on at least one emerging issue such as —

—Compulsory Education for two to five year old Children.

—Biogenetic Control.

—Compulsory Birth Control.

—Euthanasia.

—The Future of Democracy.

6. Commission on Religion and Race

a. Conduct four district workshops on Racism as follow-up on Conference Convocation on Racism.

b. Continue to encourage full participation of ethnic minority persons in life of the Conference.

c. Conduct Consultations on Racism on the local church level prior to the end of the next quadrennium.

d. There may be additional specific recommendations upon the completion of the Evaluation of Merger.

C. To be considered by Study and Review Section IV**1. Commission on Ecumenical & Interreligious Affairs**

a. Train local church and conference ecumenical representatives for a more effective ecumenical ministry.

b. Develop and share materials to assist local churches in becoming informed, involved and supportive of Delmarva Ecumenical Agency Task Forces.

c. Increase the number of local churches presently engaged in ecumenical programs.

d. Inform ministers and their churches of available and potential cooperative endeavors.

e. Assist those in responsible positions to nurture productive expressions of unity between United Methodist and other churches.

f. Support Church Home Foundations, Inc., as it develops facilities and programs for the elderly.

g. Support Delmarva Ecumenical Agency and support its projects.

2. Board of Health and Welfare Ministries

a. Train Health and Welfare representatives through annual district workshops.

b. Participate in National Association of Health and Welfare Convention.

c. District Seminars on aging.

d. Conference-wide convocation on aging.

e. Continue support of Board of Child Care.

f. Serve as liaison with Board of Homes and Hospitals, Inc. and continue support of the two homes for retired persons.

3. Board of Missions

a. Encourage support of Advance Specials.

1. Conference Specials: Neighborhood House and Methodist Action Program.

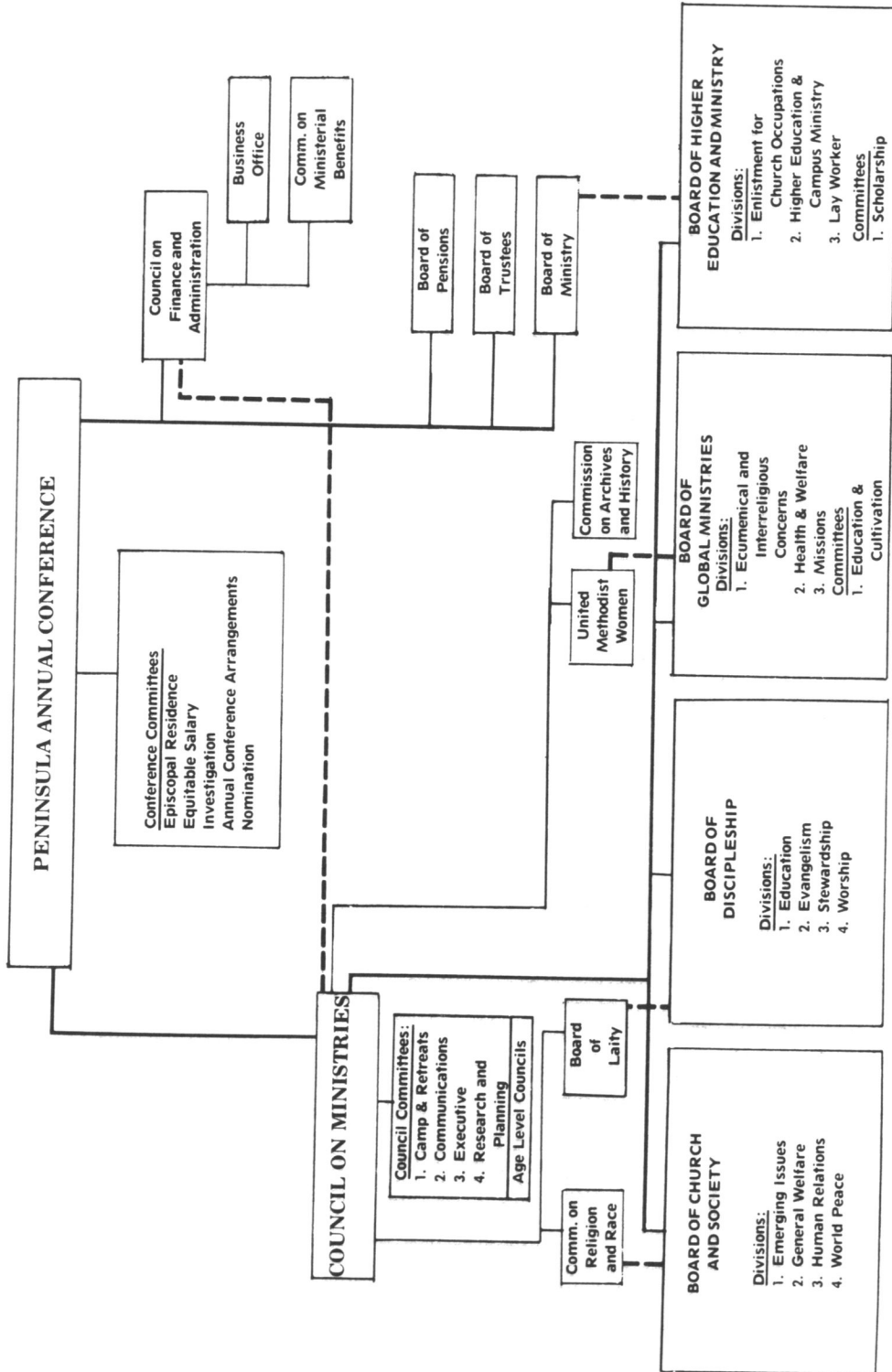
2. National Specials - in particular work in Appalachia.

3. World Specials - Especially India during 1975 and Rhodesia in 1976.

b. Encourage support of Ecumenical Mission projects such as among migrants and Beach Ministries.

c. Where need exists and funds permit assist worthy church extension projects.

d. Encourage a parish development program in the Conference.



IV. Structure Recommendation

In October, 1972 the Peninsula Annual Conference in a special one-day session adopted a structure of organization for its boards and agencies. This structure was considered to be temporary to give us time to study the reorganization of the general church and consider options of structure developed in other annual conferences.

Our Conference Council on Ministries this year established a Task Force on Structure with The Rev. David W. Baker as chairperson and Miss Jessie Stevens, Mr. James Hardcastle, The Rev. Clifford A. Armour and The Rev. R. Jervis Cooke as members. This group, after study of general and annual conference structure models and due consideration of our own unique needs, reported to the Council in February, 1975. The Council, after discussion and deliberation received their report with several changes. The Council now presents the following plan of organization to The Peninsula Annual Conference and recommends its adoption to take effect June 1, 1976.

(This recommendation, with the main body of the Council on Ministries Report, is referred to Study and Review Section I.)

ORGANIZATION OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church is the basic document of law for the church. Nothing herein presented is intended to be in conflict with the Discipline. Rather it is intended to supplement the Discipline in relationship to program boards, commissions and committees of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

Amenability

All program boards and commissions of the Annual Conference shall be responsible to the Annual Conference and between sessions of the Conference they shall be amenable to the Conference Council on Ministries which is directly responsible to the Annual Conference.

Definitions

Board - The conference organization that shall establish policies and plans of work for the implementation of program within its assigned area. It shall receive program suggestions and budget requests from its Divisions and subordinate units and recommended calendaring, program goals and supporting budget to the Council on Ministries. The Board shall oversee the implementation of program and the expenditure of funds in its assigned area of work.

Division - an organizational unit within a Board along program/ functional lines for the purpose of accomplishing a part of the total work of the Board. Each Division is responsible to its Board.

Commission - an organization created for the fulfillment of a specific function, usually for a limited duration.

Membership

Membership of program Boards, Divisions, Commissions and Committees will be one-third laywomen, one-third laymen, and one-third clergy. We recognize that

The United Methodist Women, The Board of the Laity, and the Board of The Ministry may be exceptions to this rule. Care must be given to assure adequate minority representation.

We urge that whenever possible the lay membership of Support Boards, i.e., Boards of Pensions, Trustees and the Council on Finance and Administration, be equally divided between laymen and laywomen.

Individuals will be nominated by the conference nominating committee for election to membership on the Program Boards by the Annual Conference. The Board will assign individuals to serve on its various Divisions following again the formula of $\frac{1}{3}$ laywomen, $\frac{1}{3}$ laymen and $\frac{1}{3}$ clergy. The nominating committee should be sure that each District is well represented on each Board.

Vacancies in Board membership will be filled on nomination by the Conference Nominating Committee and election by the Annual Conference.

District Superintendent

The Cabinet will assign a District Superintendent to membership on each Program Board and Commission. The Superintendent assigned to a Board will be a member of each of its Divisions.

The Superintendent will serve as convener of the Board and its Divisions for purpose of organization.

Age-Level Ministries

The age-level coordinators will be participants in the program Boards but will not have vote. They will serve as resource persons for their respective age-level concerns.

Officers of the Boards and Divisions

Each Board will have a Nominating Committee to nominate the officers of the Board who will be President, Vice-President, and Secretary. The President of a Board is an ex-officio member of all its Divisions without vote. The President also shall determine the agenda of the Board and notify any additional persons who should attend, i.e., age-level coordinators.

Each Division within a Board will have a Nominating Committee which will nominate the officers of the Division, who will be chairperson, vice-chairperson and recording secretary.

The officers of the Board and Divisions will serve for a quadrennium or until their successors are elected.

Conference Staff

Conference staff persons will be assigned by the Conference Council Director with regard to knowledge and expertise. More than one staff person may relate to a Board and a staff person may relate to more than one Board or Division. Staff will not have vote on Boards or Divisions.

All Discipline paragraph numbers refer to the 1972 Discipline.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

There shall be a Conference Council on Ministers in accord with paragraphs 831-834 of The Book of Discipline.

Membership shall be in three categories: at large, ex officio with vote and ex officio without vote.

Membership at large shall consist of twelve persons, divided according to the conference policy.

The following will be ex officio members with vote:

The President and two representatives of Board of Church and Society

The President and two representatives of Board of Discipleship

The President and two representatives of Board of Global Ministries

The Chairperson or representative Commission on Archives and History

The Conference Lay Leader

The Associate Lay Leader for Lay Life and Work

The District Lay Leader - Dover

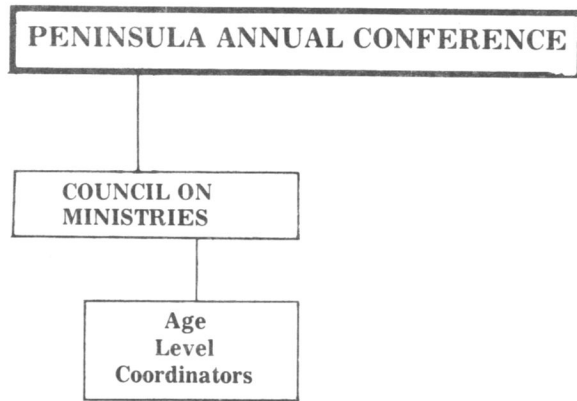
Standing Committees Of Council

There shall be four standing committees of the Council as follows:

1. Committee on Camps and Retreat Centers (relating to the work of Camp Pecometh and Drayton Center)
2. Committee on Communications (Ref. Paragraph 833)
3. Committees on Planning and Research (Ref. Paragraph 834)
(Membership and specific duties of the above committees are determined by the Council upon recommendation of the Executive Committee.)
4. An Executive Committee which shall consist of the officers, the Bishop, a District Superintendent, the Conference Council Director and six members at-large selected from the voting membership of the Council. The powers of the Executive Committee shall be determined by the Council.

Organization Of The Council

The Council shall be convened by its chairperson or if none - by the chairperson of the Cabinet at the first regular meeting following Annual Conference. The officers of the Council shall be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, a secretary and a treasurer. These shall be elected by the Council from the voting members of the Council. Officers are elected for one year and may be reelected. A term of office may not exceed four years.



CONFERENCE AGE LEVEL COORDINATORS

Objective

To keep before the Annual Conference, Council on Ministries and the four program Boards the needs of each age level and to develop goals and programs implementing these needs.

Selection of Conference Age Level Coordinators

The Executive Committee of the Council on Ministries shall nominate a children's age level Coordinator, youth age level Coordinator *, adult age level Coordinator, and a Coordinator of family life ministries, to be elected by the Conference Council on Ministries at its first meeting following Annual Conference session.

Tenure Limitation

The Coordinators, to be elected annually, may serve a maximum of eight years. Should a vacancy occur, the executive committee of the Council on Ministries shall be charged with the responsibility of nominating, for election by the Council on Ministries, a person for the position.

Relationships

The Conference Age Level Coordinators shall serve as resource persons for their respective age level concerns by being participants in the program boards but without vote. Age level coordinators shall notify the chairperson of the program boards when there are agenda items of age level interests and needs to be brought before that board.

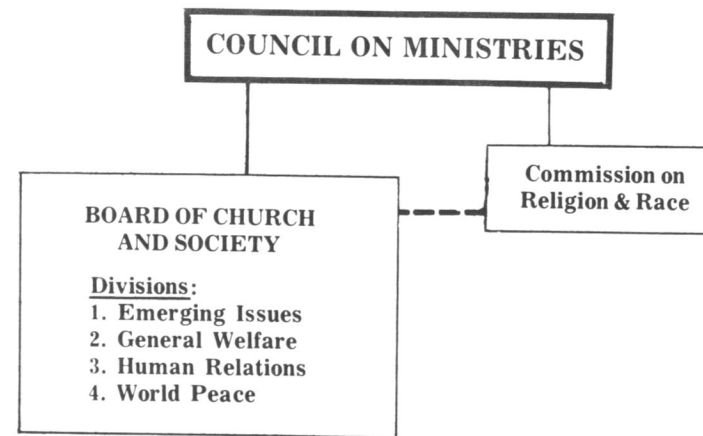
The Conference Age Level Coordinators shall serve as voting members of the Conference Committee on Camps and Retreat Center.

The Conference Age Level Coordinators shall be members of the Council on Ministries, with vote.

Responsibilities

General:

1. To call together and chair their age level council, consisting of district directors and any additional persons deemed to be helpful in carrying out their responsibilities, for the purpose of developing, implementing, coordinating, and evaluating a comprehensive ministry with that age level.
2. To make program/ budget recommendations through the program boards.



*To choose jointly with the Conference Youth Council

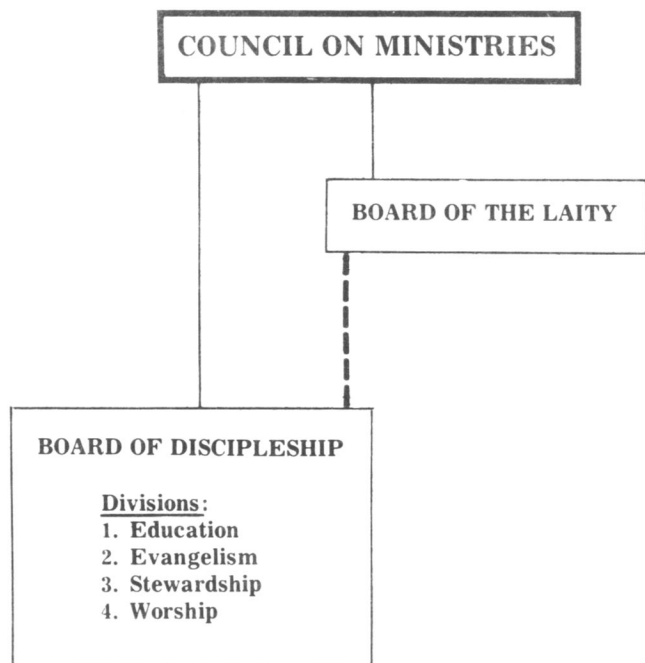
BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

In the Peninsula Annual Conference there shall be a Board of Church and Society which shall be auxiliary to the General and Jurisdictional Board of Church and Society. The Conference Board in cooperation with the general board and the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, shall develop and promote programs on Christian social concerns within the bounds of the Conference. Within the Board shall be four divisions: Emerging Social Issues, General Welfare, World Peace and Human Relations. The responsibilities of the division are found in the Book of Discipline.

The Board shall consist of thirty-six members.

The Board shall have a programmatic relationship to the Conference Commission on Religion and Race and the Commission on Role and Status of Women if organized.

There shall be an executive committee which shall consist of the officers of the Board, the chairpersons of the Divisions and five members at-large elected by the Board from the membership of the Board. The Executive Committee may exercise the powers of the Board as interim.



BOARD OF DISCIPLESHIP

The Annual Conference shall have a Conference Board of Discipleship. This Board shall cooperate with the General Board and the Annual Conference Council on Ministries in carrying out the policies and promoting all phases of the work related to discipleship. Its major responsibility shall be to coordinate activities, programs and budget of the divisions.

Membership On The Board

The Board shall consist of 66 members.

Individuals will be nominated to the Board and then the Board will decide on the method of and assignment to the divisions. It is recommended that each district be well represented.

Executive Committee Of The Board

The officers of the Board, the chairperson of each division, and five additional members elected by the voting membership of the Board shall constitute an Executive Committee which may exercise the powers of the Board ad interim.

Relationship Of The Board Of The Laity To The Board Of Discipleship

The Board of the Laity is amenable directly to the Council on Ministries but shall have a relationship to the Board of Discipleship, helping to strengthen the discipleship of the laity through the work of the four divisions of the Board of Discipleship.

Divisions

The Conference Board of Discipleship shall have four divisions: a Division on Education, a Division on Evangelism, a Division on Stewardship, a Division on Worship, each amenable to the Board of Discipleship.

Division On Education

Objectives

1. To foster and direct a plan of Christian education that encourages an experience of Christ and the development of a well rounded Christian character, and that gives children, youth, young adults and adults a knowledge of and experience in the Christian faith as motivation for Christian service in the Church, the community, and the world.
2. To aid persons in their preparation for the Christian ministry and other church occupations.
3. Shall promote church school extension, the program of Christian education, and the use of church school literature approved by the General Board of Discipleship.

Membership

Membership on the Division, elected by the Board of Discipleship shall consist of 21 members. In addition, the District Directors of Education and the President of the Conference Christian Educators Fellowship shall be members of the Division.

Responsibilities

1. Develop and promote a Conference program of Christian education which will provide guidance and help for all the agencies of Christian Education within the bounds of the Conference, such as outlined in Discipline paragraph 1033.
2. Shall encourage and give help in the use of United Methodist curriculum resources.

3. Shall see that the first Sunday of Christian Education Week, or some other day designated by the Annual Conference, is observed in each local church as Christian Education Sunday, for the purpose of emphasizing the importance of Christian education and for receiving an offering for Camp Pecometh.

4. To provide training conferences for selected persons in the District and Annual Conference and local churches in the effective use of audio-visual materials and other learning resources.

5. Shall cooperate with other conference committees in matters of common interest.

6. Shall report its proceedings and policies to the Board of Discipleship.

Optional Responsibilities

1. To constitute a conference sub-committee on Leadership Development.
2. To constitute a conference sub-committee on Family Life in accordance with Discipline paragraph 1036.
3. To constitute a conference sub-committee on use of United Methodist Curriculum materials in accordance with Discipline paragraph 1037.

Division On Evangelism

Objectives

1. Endeavor to create an intelligent conception of, interest in and passion for evangelism.
2. To promote various types, phases and methods of evangelism throughout the Conference.

Membership

Membership of the Division, elected by the Board of Discipleship, shall consist of 21 members. In addition the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, District Secretaries of Evangelism, representative of United Methodist Women, representative of the Board of the Laity and one youth representative shall be members of the Division.

Responsibilities

1. To develop and promote a program of evangelism throughout the Conference, which shall include:
 - (a) training of ministers and lay persons in the program
 - (b) distribution of promotional literature
 - (c) encouragement of local church participation in the year-round program of evangelism
2. Seek to enlist the cooperation of ministers and lay persons throughout the Annual Conference in promoting the work of evangelism.
3. Shall foster prayer, private devotions, and family worship services in the local church.
4. Give guidance to the district Committee on Evangelism and to local church Commissions on Evangelism in carrying out their purpose and responsibilities as outlined in the Discipline paragraph 159.2.
5. Recommend to the Annual Conference and to the Bishop the appointment of certain effective members of the conference as approved evangelists; provided that such persons shall meet the standards set for approved evangelists by the

General Board of Discipleship and the Annual Conference Committee. These standards outlined in The Discipline, paragraph 1044.1-4.

Division On Worship

Objectives

1. To interpret, recommend resources and develop programs to strengthen all aspects of worship throughout the Annual Conference and in the local churches.
2. Make specific recommendations in order to fulfill the first objective as listed above.

Membership

Membership of the Division, elected by the Board of Discipleship, shall consist of 12 members.

Responsibilities

Duties as outlined in The Discipline, paragraph 1066.3 (a to f)

Division On Stewardship

Objectives

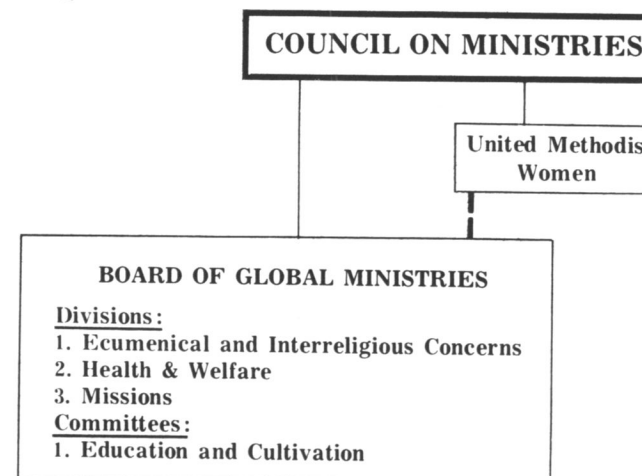
1. To bring United Methodists to an understanding of the theological meaning of Christian stewardship and its application to the entire life of the Christian, including the use of time, influence, personal abilities, and material resources.
2. To motivate, initiate, and develop programs in stewardship.

Membership

Membership of the Division, elected by the Board of Discipleship, shall consist of 12 members.

Responsibilities

To implement the objectives of this division, so as to strengthen all aspects of stewardship in the local church, district, and Conference.



BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES

In the Peninsula Annual Conference there shall be a Board of Global Ministries. It shall be auxiliary to the General and Jurisdictional Boards, shall represent the General Board in all its promotional activities within the Annual Conference.

Basic membership of the Board will be 54 persons. In addition, there shall be a representative of the Conference Board of Discipleship, the Chairperson of Christian Outreach and one other representative eighteen years of age or younger elected by the Conference Council on Youth Ministries, one student chosen by the state or regional student organization operating within the Conference territory and the Conference and District Mission Secretaries, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, the President and the Chairperson of Missionary Education of the Conference United Methodist Women, the Presidents and full-time executives of city, metropolitan and district Missionary Societies, the Chairperson of the Commission on Equitable Salaries and any members of the General Board residing within the bounds of the Conference.

The officers of the Board, the Chairperson of each division, the President of Conference United Methodist Women and five additional members elected by the Board shall constitute an Executive Committee which shall exercise the powers of the Board ad interim.

The Board shall make nominations in accordance with Discipline Paragraph 1082 for membership on the General Board.

The Board shall cooperate with the General Board and the Annual Conference Council on Ministries in carrying out the policies and promoting all phases of the work of missions and church extension. It shall also represent the interests of the United Methodist Committee on Relief and shall promote its projects in the Conference. It shall cooperate with Division of Education and Cultivation of the General Board in developing an effective program of education and cultivation within the Conference. To expedite this program there shall be created a Conference Committee on Education and Cultivation of which the Conference Missionary Secretary shall be Chairperson and all District Missionary Secretaries shall be members. There shall also be on the committee at least one layman, one laywoman and one clergy elected by the Board and a District Superintendent.

The Annual Conference on Nomination of the Board shall elect annually a Conference Missionary Secretary to be publicly assigned by the Bishop. A vacancy in this office during the conference year may be filled by the Executive Committee of the Board. This secretary shall promote the policies and plans of the Board and shall be its representative in the Conference. The secretary shall work in full cooperation with the Conference Council Director of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries. The Annual Conference may fulfill this requirement by assigning the function of the conference Missionary Secretary to a Council on Ministries staff person appointed according to the processes of the Annual Conference.

The promotional work of the Board shall be included in the Conference Benevolence budget.

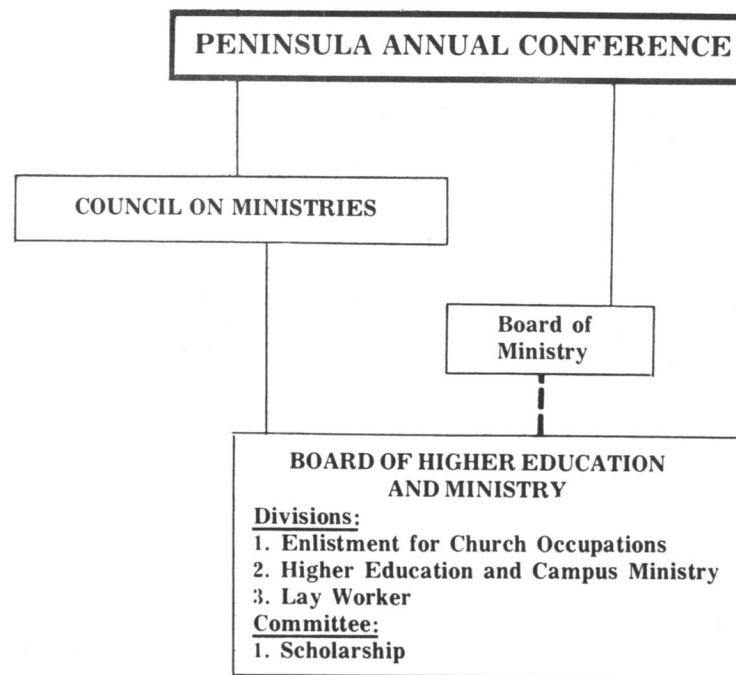
The Conference Board of Global Ministries shall have three divisions: A Division of Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns, a Division of Health and Welfare Ministries and a Division of Missions.

The Division of Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns shall consist of 18 basic members. There may be other ex officio members without vote. It shall be coordinate with the Division of Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns of the General Board of Global Ministries. Its duties shall be those described in Paragraph 1101.4,

a through i. In addition, a "j" — "It shall nominate through the Board to the Conference Council on Ministries such ecumenical projects as it wishes the Conference to support and through the same channels nominate persons to serve on ecumenical task forces and committees."

The Division of Health and Welfare Ministries shall consist of 18 basic members. It shall promote the interests of the hospitals and homes for which the Conference has responsibility within the bounds of the Conference. It may aid in planning and developing a religious ministry, wherever practicable, in state and non-Methodist hospitals and homes needing such ministry. Where civil law requires the election of boards of trustees or managers by the Annual Conference, it may nominate the persons for such elections. The Division, in cooperation with the General Board of Global Ministries shall help lift spiritual, financial and scientific standards in United Methodist Health and Welfare Ministries in the Annual Conference. It shall seek to strengthen the ties between related hospitals and homes and the Church. It shall make recommendations to the Annual Conference regarding the establishment of new institutions and changes in existing institutions. In so doing, it shall use the consultative services of the General Board. The charter, constitution and by-laws of any proposed new institution or agency and, in due course of time, the architectural plans and program of financing, shall first be submitted to the General Board for suggestions before Annual Conference approval and action are requested.

The Division of Missions shall consist of 18 basic members. Its responsibilities shall include such matters as are related in Paragraph 1181 dealing with Home Missions and Church Extension, Paragraph 1182 dealing with Research and Survey, Paragraph 1183 Church and Community Committee, Paragraph 1184 Urban, Town and Country Ministries, and Paragraph 1185 Committee on Parish and Community Development.



BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND MINISTRY

The Peninsula Conference will have a Board of Higher Education and Ministry. This Board shall cooperate with the General Board and the Annual Conference Council on Ministries in carrying out the policies and promoting all phases of the work related to higher education and ministry.

Responsibilities Of The Board

The Board of Higher Education and Ministry exists for the purpose of preparing and assisting persons to fulfill their ministry in Christ as this has been historically understood by United Methodism. Ministry in the Christian tradition is derived from the ministry of Christ. It is a ministry bestowed upon and required of the entire Church. All Christians are called to ministry, and theirs is a ministry of the people of God within the community of faith and in the world. Members of The United Methodist Church receive this gift of ministry in company with all Christians. (1972 Discipline)

The function of this Board is to assist in the preparation for, and the fulfillment of, that general ministry to which we are all called as United Methodists, through institutions of higher education, and to give guidance, counsel, and assistance to those desiring to enter any one of several special ministries of the Church.

Membership Of The Board

The Board shall consist of 36 members.

Executive Committee Of The Board

The officers of the Board, the chairperson of each division and three additional members elected by the voting membership of the Board shall constitute the Executive Committee which may exercise the powers of the Board ad interim.

The Executive Committee of the Board shall also serve as the Committee on Scholarships which shall determine the disbursement of funds from the Student Day Offering. The chairperson of the Board of Ministry's Scholarship Committee will be an ex officio member of the Scholarship Committee with vote.

Divisions

The Conference Board of Higher Education and Ministry will have three divisions: a Division of Enlistment for Church Occupations, a Division on the Lay Worker and the Division of Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

Membership Of The Divisions

Each Division will have 12 members.

Responsibilities Of The Divisions

Division Of Enlistment For Church Operations

It shall be the duty of this Division (a) to cooperate with the Office of Personnel within the Board of Higher Education and Ministry and with the district secretaries and the local church secretaries of enlistment for church occupations;

(b) to promote among youth and adults a philosophy of Christian vocation that recognizes the potential sacredness of all useful work and all opportunities for Christian service; (c) to organize a program for presenting to youth and adults the opportunities and claims of the pastoral ministry and other church occupations; (d) to take into account the basic interest and aptitudes of interested youth and adults and to inform them of the necessary preparation for specific church occupations; (e) to keep accurate and useful records of all youths who have indicated an interest in church occupations from the time of their first commitment until they are appointed to full work in the Church or until such time as responsibility for them is accepted by the proper conference board or division.

Division On Lay Worker

It shall be the duty of this Division

(a) To receive the list of persons certified for lay careers by the agencies.

(b) To review qualifications of these persons as lay workers.

(c) To examine candidates in terms of personal, church, and professional standards for the lay worker in The United Methodist Church. Personal standards include: Commitment to Christian standards; integrity; concern for persons; willingness to work with persons of various social, religious, and ethnic backgrounds; openness to new thinking; and sensitivity to change. Church standards include: membership in a local congregation, a functional knowledge of the data of the Christian faith, a willingness to seek professional improvement, and an enabling approach to leadership with persons in groups. Professional standards include competency norms for performance in lay careers developed from standards established by the particular professions concerned.

(d) To recommend candidates to the Annual Conference for consecration as lay workers.

(e) To process and report to the Annual Conference for action on matters of transfer and termination of the lay-worker relationship.

(f) To keep the Annual Conference advised concerning the lay worker, the careers included in this relationship for which the Church has established standards, and ways in which the Annual Conference may be supportive of the work of persons who served as lay workers.

Division Of Higher Education And Campus Ministry

The general purpose of the Division shall be to provide a connective relationship between the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry and the institutions of higher learning within the bounds of, or related to, the Peninsula Conference. (See Par. 1249) The Division will cooperate with the Conference Board of Ministry and the Division of Education of the Board of Discipleship in interpreting and implementing this relationship.

The primary purpose of the Division shall be the supervision of the Campus Ministry program (s) within the bounds of the Conference. Specific duties of the Division shall be:

1. to evaluate the campus ministry within the Conference;

2. to report its evaluation to the Annual Conference;

3. to recommend improvements in facilities, program, finance, and personnel;

4. to approve the purchase or sale of property and the plans for any new building . . . proposed by the Wesley Foundations (or their equivalent) and the financial program covering the liquidation of its cost;

5. to cooperate in interpretation of the intercollegiate campus Christian movement. (See Par. 1252.4.e)

Since the most prevalent expression of campus ministry within our Conference is through Wesley Foundation programs, the Division shall be responsible for the supervision of these programs.

A further purpose of the Division concerns CERTIFICATION. It shall also be the responsibility of the Division to determine whether applicants meet the standards of the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry for ministers, directors, and associates of Christian education; educational assistants; ministers, directors, and associates of music; and music assistants, and to certify and keep a record of those who do.

The Division shall (a) review the credentials of candidates for certification in harmony with the said standards and (b) recommend plans for institutes, conferences, and other occasions for fellowship and training.

All persons certified shall furnish to the Division, on blanks provided by the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, information for purposes of annual review and approval of status. The names of certified persons shall be included in the annual report of the Division and published in the Conference journal. (See Par. 1253)

FURTHER the Division shall have the responsibility of assisting in interpreting the role of/ and the needs of Wesley College to the Peninsula Annual Conference. In order that this be facilitated the president of Wesley College or a representative shall be an ex-officio member of the Division without vote. The budget request from Wesley College will be included in the Division request to the Board of Higher Education & Ministry.

Relationship Of The Board Of Ministry To The Board Of Higher Education And Ministry

The Board of Ministry shall cooperate with and be amenable to the Annual Conference and its Council on Ministries through the Board of Higher Education and Ministry in all matters relating to the development and promotion of program. It shall cooperate with the Board of Higher Education and Ministry in order that its program emphasis may be integrated into the total unified program of the Council. It shall promote the total program of the Church or aspects of it which are particularly related to the Board of Ministry as it may be directed by the Board of Higher Education and Ministry. Field work plans which relate to the promotion of program in the Annual conference or the local church shall be cleared through the Board of Higher Education and Ministry.

OTHER PROGRAM AGENCIES

1. Commission On Religion And Race

Discipline Paragraph 1280.

Guidelines and structure in Discipline paragraphs 1278, 1279.

Membership — 4 laywomen, 4 laymen, 4 ministers.

"It is strongly urged that this Conference Commission be constituted so that the majority of membership be represented by ethnic minorities, proportionately reflecting the ethnic minority constituency of the conference. Adequate representation of both youth and young adults."

Between sessions of The Annual Conference this Commission is amenable to The Conference Council on Ministries.

This Commission has a programmatic relationship with The Conference Board of Church and Society.

2. Board Of The Laity

Existence permitted by paragraph 665.1 and 2 in The Book of The Discipline. Membership —

Conference Lay Leader, Associate Conference Lay Leaders (Lay Life and Work, Director of Lay Speaking, Director of United Methodist Men), District Lay Leaders, 2 Youth from each District (includes President of Conference Youth Council), 1 layman and 1 laywoman from each District, 2 ministers, President of Conference United Methodist Women and a Cabinet representative.

3. United Methodist Women

Discipline paragraph 1154.

This organization has a programmatic relationship to The Conference Board of Global Ministries.

4. Commission On Archives And History

Membership — 4 laywomen, 4 laymen, 4 ministers.

Cooperate with and Report to General and Jurisdictional Commission.

Preserve all records of The Annual Conference.

Collect and preserve data relating to organization and History of The Conference.

Maintain fire-safe historical and archival disposal.

Provide for the ownership of real property, receive gifts, bequests.

Encourage and assist Local Church in preserving records and compiling historical facts.

Maintain Barratt's Chapel, Frederica, Delaware, as our United Methodist Shrine. Care for the property and assure its availability to visitors on an announced schedule.

Maintain and operate the museum and be responsible for the Curator's home adjacent to the Chapel.

Employ and supervise the work of a Curator who shall be responsible for the care of the historic records, files and displays as well as the Chapel.

This commission may organize an Annual Conference Historical Society and encourage individuals to become members of it for the purpose of promoting interest in the study and preservation of the history of the conference and its antecedents. The officers of the Annual Conference Commission on Archives and History shall be the officers of the Annual Conference Historical Society. Individuals may become members of the Historical Society by paying dues as the society may direct, and in return they shall receive official publications and publicity materials issued by the commission and the society.

The Peninsula Annual Conference may have a historian to undertake specific duties as may be designated by the commission. This person is to be nominated by the commission at the session of the Annual Conference and elected by the conference.

3. Investigation

Discipline paragraph 1540.

Membership Discipline controlled. Chosen by Bishop at each session of The Annual Conference. (5 itinerant elders and 5 reserve)

4. Annual Conference Arrangements

Membership — The Resident Bishop, Host District Superintendent, Secretary of The Annual Conference, Conference Lay Leader, President of Wesley College, Host District Lay Leader, Chairperson of Commission on Worship, Host District President of United Methodist Women, Conference President of United Methodist Women and the Conference Council Director and Associate Council Director — Communications.

The Chairperson of the Committee will be the Host District Superintendent.

5. Nomination

Membership — Conference Lay Leader, District Lay Leaders, A Representative from The United Methodist Women Executive Committee, a Youth selected by The

Conference Youth Council, One minister from each District selected by District Ministerial Association, Conference Council Director and all District Superintendents.

The chairperson of Cabinet is the convener of this committee.

TRUSTEES OF PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

During the year the Trustees continued to update their records of church properties that have been abandoned over the years. Efforts are being made to locate the deeds to as many of these properties as possible. The deeds become necessary when the properties are sold. The new forms adopted about a year ago to be used when a property is declared abandoned by conference action will greatly alleviate the problems which have been encountered with respect to several properties in the past.

The Trustees did not sell any properties during the year. Negotiations are still going on for the possible sale of the Kesley Chapel property on the Easton District. The sale of that property was mandated at the 1973 Conference session but to date a price acceptable to the Trustees has not been offered for it.

The Trustees have reviewed with the Bank of Delaware the portfolio the bank is managing for them. Some changes were made in certain securities designed to increase the yield to the account. As has been the unfortunate case with practically all stock and bond portfolios during the past year, ours, too, has decreased in value and, in some cases, in yield. We believe, however, our securities are sound and will serve the best interests of the Trustees and of the several funds under our control.

In keeping with the policy of helping Conference-wide activities, the Trustees made two grants during the year. Wesley College received \$1,000.00 for library aids, and \$5,988.00 was appropriated to St. Matthews-By-The-Sea Church at Fenwick Island to paint the church and parsonage and to shore up the foundation of the church. It is now an attractive sanctuary in which to worship rather than the almost abandoned looking eyesore it was beforehand. We will continue to aid Conference projects to the extent of our financial ability. We believe it is better stewardship to put our available funds to work rather than emphasizing the building up of fund balances.

Our sincere thanks go to Mr. Theodore Briggs for his most helpful cooperation in maintaining and explaining our various funds and accounts. Appreciation should also be extended to the Reverend David W. Baker for his work and interest in painstakingly researching the conference records while a member of the Trustees to compile a complete list of church properties declared abandoned since 1939. In his present position as the liaison between our Board and the Cabinet, he will continue to be of valuable assistance to the Trustees.

BOARD OF PENSIONS ANNUAL REPORT

The Peninsula Annual Conference Board of Pensions herewith submits its' report for the year 1974. As a part of this report there will be, not only a reporting of accountability, but there will likewise be included some resolutions.

We are charged by the discipline and the conference to look after the pension needs of the ministers and their dependents of the Delmarva Peninsula.

During the year 1974, retired ministers received \$251,377.00, dependents received \$159,262.00, supply ministers and dependents, \$62,947.00 and Clearing House, \$84,000. Still, in this year, the recipients received only poverty level support.

The source of these payments are: Peninsula Conference \$445,340.00, other contributions, \$2,154.00, and interest, \$133,074.61.

As everyone knows, the money market suffered severely during the year 1974. Our investment portfolio likewise suffered from the standpoint of market value. The book value of our portfolio is \$2,589,121.91. The market value is \$2,081,657.38. These figures are as of December 31, 1974. It should be noted, however, that our return on investment was more than in the preceding year, and it should further be noted that our rate of return has maintained an increase for two years.

By previous conference action, clergy are required to pay 2% of their cash salary to the pension fund. Indebtedness by clergy at the present time totals \$131,943.39. It should further be noted that interest on delinquency is charged at the rate of 9% per annum.

Our board suggests that as a means of preventing further increase in delinquency, charges should consider accepting this as a fringe benefit of the

salary package. We further suggest where charges do accept this as a fringe benefit, and the minister is indebted, that the minister should authorize his charge to withhold a portion of his salary, equal to one year's delinquency, plus interest, and remit directly to the Board of Pensions.

In our report last year, we requested a Pension Study Committee to be structured by the '74 Conference, and that it be charged to report "its' finding and/ or recommendations to the 1975 sessions of the Peninsula Annual Conference". This committee report has been endorsed unanimously by our Conference Board of Pensions and it is herewith submitted for consideration by this Conference with the unanimous approval by our Board and the Special Task Force.

Whereas: the discipline of the United Methodist Church requires each annual conference to provide a pension for disabled and retired clergy and their surviving spouses and children until they have reached the age of majority, and

Whereas: the Peninsula Conference is presently one of ten Boards out of the 72 in the denominational church using the current income policy for paying pensions, and

Whereas: the necessity of funding liability load against financial crisis and/ or disaster is admitted as a prudent necessity, and

Whereas: a special Task Force comprised of 3 from Council on Finance & Administration, 3 from Council on Ministries, 3 from Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions, 1 Cabinet Representative, chaired by the Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions Chairman, was constituted at the 1974 Session of the Annual Conference, therefore:

Be it known that this Task Force, after exhaustive and serious study has unanimously approved and recommends this Peninsula Conference to approve the following resolutions:

1. Resolved: that all past, current, and future service of ministers shall be funded through the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund at the beginning rate of \$110.00 per year times the total years of service, and
 2. Be it further resolved that this funding of pension liability shall begin 1/ 1/ 77, and be amortized over a maximum period of 30 years.
 3. Be it resolved that for the calendar year 1975 the sum of \$2,000.00 or 1/3 of the annual pension, whichever is less, shall be allowed as a housing allowance for pensioners for tax purposes (note: the Internal Revenue Service requires this approval annually).
 4. Resolved that the service annuity rate should be \$110.00 per year, times the years of service, for the year 1976.
- We ask the concurrence of the Peninsula Annual Conference in the following resolution, to be submitted for General Conference consideration and/ or action.
5. Resolved that a member of Annual Conference be allowed to retire at the Annual Conference session immediately preceding his or her 65th birthday, provided that his or her pension does not start until the month in which he or she reaches the 65th birth date.

After exhaustive study, this Task Force concurs in Resolutions 1 and 2 of the Report of the Board of Pensions and moved the adoption by the 1975 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

PENINSULA METHODIST FEDERAL CREDIT UNION

The Peninsula Methodist Federal Credit Union continued to grow in 1974 beginning the year with total assets of \$29,657.94 and ending the year with \$40,573.30 total assets. During the year thirty loans were made for the total amount of \$29,342.68. Since the Credit Union was chartered 154 loans have been made for a total of \$115,672.43.

For 1974 a dividend of 5 3/4% was paid for the first half of the year and 6% for the second half. Loan demands exceed available money to lend. Members having money to save can earn a dividend and help fellow members at the same time.

EQUITABLE SALARY COMMISSION

The Commission on Equitable Salaries has supported the salaries of pastors of 24 charges during the 1974 fiscal year. Supplements to salaries have ranged from \$2,980 to \$100.00. A total of \$20,331.77 was expended for an average supplement of \$850.00.

Many charges whose pastors are receiving supplements did increase their 1975 salaries by \$500.00 so that the amount paid from the minimum salary fund did not increase. With some possible realignment of charges our expenditure for 1975 may not greatly exceed the expenditure for 1974.

The Commission makes the following recommendations:

1. The minimum salary guideline figures for 1975 be:
 - (a) \$9,200.00 for conference members, probationary members serving full-time and associate members.
 - (b) \$7,700 for student pastors and full-time supply pastors.
2. The amount to be expendable in 1976 shall not exceed \$40,000.00

SECTION II

BOARD OF EDUCATION

The work of education in the Peninsula Conference is a co-partnership between local church leaders, the Conference Board of Education and the Conference staff. This Board continues to examine the needs of local churches in an attempt to help local leaders through the designing of training events and the collection of resources. Many of our programs originate from calls for assistance from local churches. Each year one meeting of the board is devoted to a twenty-four hour retreat to review the needs and requests from churches and to set goals to meet these needs.

Goals for 1975-76

Projected into the next conference year are the following programs and goals:

1. Two Quarterly Resources Previews of church school materials. The first will be held on November 21, 1975 and the second on February 21, 1976.
2. A film workshop for local church leaders including a presentation of "Ways of Leading a Film Discussion."
3. An Audio Visual Workshop to help teachers to creatively use available tools and materials, e.g., banner making, using the autoharp, films, and filmstrips, etc.
4. We will attempt to communicate directly with local church educators giving them information on new resources, training events, and general church school trends.
5. Provide training for Work Area Chairperson in Education.
6. Cooperate in a joint effort with the Board of Evangelism in designing ways to help church school pupils deepen their commitment to Jesus Christ.

Training Local Church Leaders

Since the last report to the Annual Conference we have continued to provide training opportunities for local church leaders in the following ways:

Many local churches have conducted leadership schools using persons trained through the Board of Education.

Staff members have conducted teacher training programs in some of the small churches of the conference.

Local Church Chairperson in education on every district has received training in the responsibilities of this Work Area.

A most successful pilot Quarterly Resources Preview was held on the Salisbury District.

A day for Children's Workers was sponsored by the Board in February which included an introduction to the new curriculum for children.

The Board co-sponsored a Vacation Church School Workshop with Mt. Olivet United Methodist Church, Seaford, Delaware.

Church Leaders' Weekend

The Church Leaders' Weekend Committee continues to offer successful programs for local church leaders under the sponsorship of the Board of Education. Two different programs were held at Drayton Manor in November and February. One was a continuation of last year's theme, "Making Task Forces Work", and the other was on the theme "Goal Setting for Local Church Leaders".

Resources for Churches

The Board wishes to remind the Conference that resources for many different forms of training are available through the Conference Office in Dover. Filmstrips, pamphlets, training programs and self-instructional aids are available for church schools. Sample curriculum materials are offered free to any local church. The Board sponsors, with the Committee on Communication, a film catalogue providing a complete listing of all films, filmstrips, records and tapes available at no cost to the churches. A fulltime staff person is available for consultation with local church leaders on all education needs of our churches. We hope more of our churches will take advantage of these services in the coming year.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The Work Area of Evangelism has felt a need to aid the local church in awakening faith in its members and renewing them for mission. Most local churches find their membership rolls filled with people who do not know what to believe and base their lives on. Even though they say they believe the gospel, too many times their lives are not operationally committed to Jesus Christ and His will for their lives and the world. Because of this, many local churches are mere collections of individuals, families, or cliques, having little if any unity and lacking in the one motive that generates service to persons and mission to the world, namely compassion.

With this thought in mind, the Work Areas of our Conference and the Baltimore Conference held an Institute on Evangelism at Western Maryland College, Westminster, Maryland, on July 25-28. Its purpose was twofold. First, to provide practical helps for local church lay persons in such areas as youth evangelism, evangelism in the urban setting, evangelism in the church school, and evangelism music. And, second, to train clergy in conducting New Life Missions. It is the latter that we are placing special emphasis upon, because it combines preaching, teaching, reaching and sharing approaches to communicating the gospel for response.

The New Life Mission relates directly to the needs of the local church by employing a three-phase strategy:

I. Preparation

This phase lays the groundwork for the proclamation and penetration to follow by involving many persons in the processes that build interest, conversation, momentum, expectancy, attendance, and participation for an effective proclamation week.

II. Proclamation

In this phase the "New Life Missioner" visits the local church, and through a series of nightly services interprets the basis of Christianity and its good news for today, and challenges people to follow Christ in seeking His Kingdom in the world.

III. Penetration

During the week of proclamation, those in attendance receive fresh understanding and express new commitments that lead to involvement in areas such as evangelism, justice, peace, race, poverty, ecology, the aging, penal reform, drugs, etc. Through the organization of ongoing task forces in these various areas, the people of God reach out to penetrate the community for redemptive change.

Plans have been made to conduct training sessions during 1975 for the certification of Conference clergy as New Life Missioners. It is our prayer that many churches within the conference will avail themselves of this splendid opportunity.

BOARD OF LAITY

Your Board of the Laity has been very active during the conference year. First, our own Dr. David Randolph was the guest speaker at 1974 Annual Conference Lay Banquet. The esteem of our people for Dr. Randolph was evidenced by capacity attendance (484) of both clergy and laity.

The District Lay Speaking Courses are underway in the four Districts. Here, it has been necessary for our leadership to improvise training material since the revised literature will not be available until after the 1976 General Conference. Lay Speaking continues to be an important part of our lay program.

This year the Conference Board of the Laity again assisted in the annual Conference Leadership Training Program. Our responsibilities concerned the training of local United Methodist Men presidents of existing organizations, and of fostering the formation of new United Methodist Men groups. A good attendance in all four districts indicated that there is interest in United Methodist Men's work.

A promotional program is underway to revive United Methodist Men in the Peninsula Conference.

Last November, the Conference had an excellent representation of laity at the Northeastern Jurisdiction Lay Assembly at Atlantic City. Of the 229 attendees, 50 were from our small Conference. If all 18 conferences did as well, there would have been at least 900 persons attending. Am I proud of our people!

Last September we were fortunate to have Jim Talley, Program Director of the Baltimore Conference, as resource person for our Men's Retreat at Camp Pecometh. Our theme concerned practical Christianity as it applies to everyday life. In view of Watergate, etc., such emphasis is very much needed.

At this time, the four Districts are in the process of having their Communion Breakfasts. Last fall, the Districts held their annual Minister and Laity Banquets. These affairs are open to all clergy and lay persons — men, women and youth. Our people use them for fellowship and spiritual renewal.

At this Annual Conference, legislation concerning restructure will be introduced. Your Conference Board of the Laity requests that its structure not be changed; namely, that the Board of the Laity continue to report directly to the Conference Council on Ministries.

The Peninsula Conference Board of the Laity looks forward to even a better year, under the leadership of Bishop Mathews.

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The Peninsula Annual Conference Commission on Worship seeks to provide resources and training for those who plan and conduct worship in the local church. With the cooperation of worship representatives on the districts, we again planned the annual training sessions for Worship Work Area chairpersons in each district.

The Commission has subsidized the purchase of worship manuals for distribution throughout the Conference, the first copy being given to each charge without cost and additional copies being made available at less than the usual purchase price.

A conference-wide workshop on worship is being planned for Saturday, October 18, 1975, at St. John's United Methodist Church, Seaford. The workshop will be for all persons interested in worship and will be held from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. We encourage representation from every charge.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Joanne Cohen, the Conference Music Committee continues to do a superb job. In May 1974 an adult choral seminar and festival was successfully held at Aldersgate Church, Fairfax. A Spring Sing Fest is planned for May 10, 1975 at Delaware State College. Focus will be on children's choir work; principal leader will be Prof. Helen Kemp of Westminster Choir College, Princeton, New Jersey.

We call to the attention of both church musicians and worship leaders a national convocation on music, worship, and the other arts to be held at West Virginia Wesleyan University, August 3-9. An excellent program is planned and the proximity of the location makes possible participation by persons from our Conference. Details may be obtained from the Commission chairperson.

The Commission offers any assistance it can give to local church Work Areas on Worship or others responsible for Christian worship.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

The 194th Anniversary of Barratt's Chapel was observed on Sunday, November 10, 1974. By Conference action this day was also designated as Peninsula Conference Heritage Sunday. Each congregation was urged to devote a portion of its worship service to the examination of its own religious heritage, and to receive a special offering for the restoration work which had been done at Barratt's Chapel. The Commission had had two goals for that day — 500 persons to attend the Anniversary Service, and a Conference-side offering of \$10,000.00. Unfortunately, neither of the goals was attained. Three hundred and ninety-eight persons worshipped at the Chapel, and almost \$3,000.00 was raised.

Rev. John H. Ness, Jr., National Executive Secretary of the Commission on Archives and History of the United Methodist Church, Lake Junaluska, North Carolina was the guest speaker. Eight members of the local commission participated in the service. The Collect and The Gospel were read from John Wesley's SUNDAY SERVICE OF THE METHODISTS IN NO. AMERICA, 1784. Music was provided by the combined choirs of Asbury-Centennial U.M. Churches, Smyrna, and The Children of the King, a youth fellowship group, from Asbury. Mrs. Ronald F. (Marva) Thomas, organist and choir director of Centennial, sang two selections.

The Rev. and Mrs. Harvey B. Flater are still in residence at the Barratt's Chapel

Museum. In light of last year's travel curtailment because of the gasoline shortage, the hours of visitation to the Museum were not changed. The Museum was/ is opened daily except Monday from 9:30 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. during May to September, by appointment during the fall and spring, and closed from Christmas through February. The Tuesday to Sunday schedule also pertains to Barratt's Chapel. However, during the spring and fall it remains open when the curator is at home. It is closed from Christmas through February, but may be opened through arrangements with the Curator. The Commission welcomes the use of Barratt's Chapel for religious services, and cultural and historic meetings. All requests for the use of, and special services in the Chapel must be coordinated with the Curator or the President. Gratuities for the use of the Chapel for weddings is \$25.00.

The Commission wishes to advise the members of the Peninsula Annual Conference that the recommendations of the 1974 Session have not yet been implemented. We did not then, immediately, nor have we as yet obtained possession of any material relating to the former Delaware Conference. The history is not written, and it is conceivable that the material will not be surrendered. We can only report that the entire matter is in the hands of the Bishop.

The Commission on Archives and History has a subordinate Historical Society which has open membership to individuals, families, churches, and church organizations. The annual dues are \$5.00. We urge that as many United Methodists as possible become affiliated with the society. The funds received will be used to promote interest in the study and preservation of the history of the United Methodist Church and its antecedents; to cooperate with the agents of the Church to promote historical interests of the Church; to promote the understanding of and appreciation for Methodist History and heritage including the history of the former Delaware Conference; to preserve Barratt's Chapel, and to maintain Barratt's Chapel Museum as a repository for church records, artifacts, appointments, and other paraphernalia for posterity.

During the past year, the Commission has sent out "thank you" letters to all those individuals, churches, and church organizations who have/ had contributed towards the Barratt's Chapel Restoration Fund. Included in the letter were three new picture post card views of the Chapel.

Gifts to the Restoration Fund for either the Building Fund or the Endowment Fund may be given as memorials in memory of, or in honor of loved ones or friends. The names of all the donors will be carefully recorded in the Memorial Book at the Museum.

Please make your check payable to "Barratt's Chapel" and mail to Peninsula Conference Business Office, 139 N. State St., Dover, De 19901.

The Commission will also be pleased to receive artifacts relating to Methodist History. Please contact the Curator or the President concerning this matter.

We respectfully urge ALL Methodists to visit "The Cradle of Methodism" during the Bicentennial.

Should any church, or any church organization wish to have a program about General History of the Methodist Church on the Peninsula, or a brief talk about the events which centered around Barratt's Chapel, please feel free to contact the president of the Commission.

- Established a formal policy statement with reference to the part-time Wesley Foundations in our Conference.
- Made progress with plans for a workshop to assist local churches in developing ministries to nearby campuses.
- Been represented on the Religious Affiliation Sub-Committee of the Long Range Planning Committee for Wesley College.
- Been represented on the Committee appointed by the Council on Ministries to study an "equitable and comprehensive" program of ministry to all the campuses within the bounds of our Conference.
- Submitted 1976 budget requests for Wesley College, the Wesley Foundations, and Morgan Christian Center.
- Processed the applications for recertification (See below).

IN PROCESS

At the present time (3/ 1/ 75), the part-time Wesley Foundation situation is in flux. It appears now that the Conference will terminate its financial support of the part-time Wesley Foundation at Washington College in Chestertown. However, by action of the Conference Council on Ministries, support at the previous year's level will probably be continued to the part-time Wesley Foundations at Delaware State College and the University of Maryland, Eastern Shore.

Also at the present time, the Wesley Foundation at the University of Delaware is planning to ask the Conference Council on Ministries to recommend its merger with the United Campus Ministry at the University of Delaware.

The reader should see the report of the Council on Ministries for specific recommendations on these matters.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES TO THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE

The 1974-75 school year has been a transitional one for Wesley College. Amid the long search for a new president and the preparations of retirement of Dr. Robert H. Parker, the College has welcomed new students and programs, and looked to the future through long-range planning at all levels.

The drop in numbers of entering freshmen and returning sophomores in September, a common situation throughout the country this year, underlined the need to budget carefully for the year in all departments and activities. However, faculty and staff continued to generate enthusiasm and interest in all aspects of each student's education.

Constant work in improving methods, presentation and content of courses or programs in order to maintain their high quality and impact, is characteristic of the Wesley faculty and staff. Students continue to find not only up-to-date courses at the College, but to find also a group of supportive people who come to know them as individuals, and who work together to help the students develop their interests, potential and abilities while at Wesley.

The faculty and staff are very much aware of the adverse conditions which now face private colleges and are taking very positive action to continue Wesley College as a viable institution of which you can all be justly proud. In this brief presentation, I will outline a few of the major activities which are being undertaken now to assure the future of Wesley College.

Working toward higher enrollment for next year, the Admissions Office sponsored area dinners for high school guidance counselors and their spouses in Hershey and Valley Forge, Pa. and Wilmington, De. during the fall, and plan one this spring for counselors in Lower Delaware. The Admissions staff, aided by members of the faculty and administration, also attended numerous college nights in high schools, college fairs in Philadelphia, Washington and Baltimore, and visited many high schools. During the Christmas vacation, quite a few faculty spent from three to six days "on the road" visiting high schools and chatting with counselors, teachers, and students. As a result of these efforts, Wesley College looks toward an upturn in freshman enrollments for the school year 1975-76.

During the fall semester, an internship program in Retail Marketing was implemented by faculty member Edward Wilchinski. This program is presently in full swing with the cooperation of many Dover area businesses. The Retail Marketing Internship, a part of the Business curriculum, is designed for the student who wishes to enter the distributive areas of the business world after completion of his or her Associate in Arts degree, and who wishes to reinforce

classroom instruction with on-the-job experience. Local businessmen participate not only through providing supervised work experience for the student, but by assisting with classroom or seminar presentations, and by serving as resource people for the program.

Through a grant from the U.S. Office of Education, Wesley College became one of six colleges in the United States to be approved for a three-year development program in Paralegal Studies. This new curriculum, which will be a part of the Applied Sciences Division, was developed in cooperation with members of the Kent County and Delaware State Bar Associations, and will have a number of its major subject courses taught by attorneys. To begin in September, 1975, the program offers both an Associate degree upon completion of the two-year curriculum, and a certificate upon completion of certain required courses. The option is designed to accommodate not only recent high school graduates, but people well beyond high school years who are interested in the legal field as a new or broader career, or who prefer this area in the continuing education program.

Also new, and of interest to full-time Wesley students, is the direct transfer program with the University of Delaware, now one of over 30 senior colleges with which Wesley has such an agreement. Under this program, up to 50 Wesley sophomores each year may transfer directly to all but a few programs at the University with no loss in credits. Beyond that number, students may transfer through the usual channels.

This year more than ever before, Wesley College has sought to recognize academic excellence. Under the leadership of Dr. Parker, an honors scholarship program has been initiated. Through this program, students have been awarded scholarships on the basis of scholastic potential. Scholarship was also recognized when Wesley College's Zeta Rho Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, the national honors fraternity for two-year colleges, sponsored a Scholars' Banquet on Sunday, January 26, honoring 137 Dean's List students of the past two semesters. The Wesley Chapter, one of the national fraternity's Ten Outstanding Chapters, hosted the New England-Middle States Regional Conference in November, and will co-host the National Convention in Philadelphia in April.

The Alumni Association, with the leadership of Director Bella Ward, her staff and numerous volunteers, held an Alumni Telethon during the first two weeks of February in order to ask Alumni for pledges of financial support for the College. Many local Alumni, administrators and faculty assisted with paperwork as hordes of students manned the twenty telephones each of the eight nights. At this writing, all signs indicate that the Telethon was a success in several ways: many more pledges were received than ever before, with the possibility that the Alumni Fund goal may well be exceeded; response from most Alumni was positive, and the personal contact may have rekindled the interest in the College; and many address and phone number changes were recorded, making the files more up-to-date than ever before.

Besides the above programs, which have already yielded tangible results this year, two other groups have been doing work, the results of which will help to shape Wesley College's future. These are the Presidential Search Committee of the Board of Trustees, and the Long-Range Planning Committee.

For almost a year, the Presidential Search Committee, chaired by the Rev. Howell Wilkins, has studied resumes and interviewed candidates to succeed Dr. Parker in the presidency of Wesley College. In narrowing the list of applicants to seven, the Committee was joined in its work by an Advisory Committee of representatives from each of the College's constituencies. The final choice was made in early March, and the name of the new president has subsequently been

announced. The difficult task of selection was made easier by the mutual concern, interest and hard work of all members of the Committees.

The other group whose work will have a far-reaching impact on the future of Wesley College is the Long-Range Planning Committee. This Committee is composed of all constituencies of the campus — trustees, faculty, administration, and students. The committee works under the leadership of The Reverend Doctor J. Gordon Stapleton who is assisted by the consultant firm of Frantzreb and Pray Associates, Inc. Wesley College is indeed fortunate in that the cost for this vital program has been funded by a corporation in Delaware which attests to the worth of Wesley College through the eyes of industry. One of the major decisions already made is that Wesley College should definitely remain a part of the Peninsula Conference of The United Methodist Church. All of the necessary decisions to determine the future direction of Wesley College will be in the final phase by the time this report is officially submitted.

In affirming the desire for the College to remain a part of the Peninsula Conference, the College is further interested in forging ahead with stronger ties between the two. While the Peninsula Conference, at the present time, schedules many events using the facilities at Wesley College, more can be done to use the College in its entirety. The faculty, administration, and student body are also available to you. There must be ways that the College can serve the members of the Conference, to the benefit of The United Methodist Church and the community. It is through these joint efforts that the College will continue to merit your support, and in time merit even greater support.

Already, in order to expand the mutual education of these two bodies, the Wesley Ambassadors, members of local churches throughout the Conference, serve as liaison. The College feels that this is potentially an excellent program designed to promote interest and enthusiasm in both groups. Each of the local churches was asked to find one or two volunteers for the program. The College hopes more Conference members will become interested in joining the Ambassadors in the future. Closer ties have also been established with the Communicator, whose front page carries Conference news to every Methodist Church within the Conference. News of interesting events at the College is published regularly, and Conference members are cordially invited to participate in many of the public events and activities.

In a year that began with a drop in enrollment and a deficit budget, members of the College family seized the opportunity arising out of difficulty to work to pull the College back to its feet. This has produced a promise of an improved enrollment picture for next year. Revitalized courses or new programs have been designed to appeal to both college-age and older students — who come in increasing numbers. Finally, there is a closely-knit group of faculty and staff who are dedicated to an institution in which they firmly believe.

The school year began with the realization that the economy and small number of students would affect the College. As the year draws to a close, it becomes very obvious that everyone directly connected with Wesley is firmly committed to taking the best steps necessary to insure its continuation. Those steps may include curtailing some functions, changing some programs and expanding others. The year has seen few stones left unturned in a concerted search, at every level, for the best decisions and directions for Wesley College's future, one that is important, we feel, to many more generations of Wesley students.

COMMITTEE ON THE LAY WORKER

A continuing goal for our committee is to keep alive before the local church its responsibilities when lay personnel are employed. We have and shall continue to make a yearly contact with persons in the local church responsible for hiring personnel.

Implementation began in 1975, when committee members used a questionnaire which they had designed to personally interview a sampling of pastors and Pastor-Parish Relations Chairpersons. In January, 51 churches, in all four districts, were contacted. Our findings indicate a movement towards a greater awareness and concern about job performance reviews, salary and fringe benefits. Pastor-Parish Relations Committees are assuming more responsibility in this matter.

Our goal shall be to continue to keep before the local church its responsibility in hiring lay employees by sending the approved 1974 recommendations again in 1975.

Goal 2: Using the Coordinated Mailing, to send information on how local churches can be covered by Social Security.

Goal 3: To give support to the Guidelines for Pastor-Parish Relations Committees in hiring professional Christian educators or persons in program or leadership development as designed by the Peninsula and Baltimore Conference Christian Educators.

Goal 4: To design a similar guideline for Pastor-Parish Relations Committees in hiring professionals in music vocations in the local church.

Goal 5: To bring together all certified persons throughout our conference who are eligible to become a Lay Worker and discuss this relationship with them.

Ms. Edith Goodwin, Director of Conference Relations of the Division of Lay Ministries, from Nashville, will meet with our Committee on the Lay Worker in April to review the Guidelines and interpretation of the Conference Committee on The Lay Worker and inform us of "happenings" throughout Methodism.

COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

"What are you going to do with your life?" continues as the theme for the Commission on Enlistment as it challenges youth and adults to consider a Christian vocation either within or outside the church.

The highlight of the Commission's activities was the Convocation on Christian Vocations held at Wesley College in January, 1975 and attended by over 150 high school youth. Stress was placed on our "calling" or vocation as Christians in whatever job we hold as well as offering the youth in attendance a look at five occupational possibilities within the church: parish ministry, Christian education, missions, chaplaincy, and social service.

Members of the Commission presented a program on "Choosing a Career" to junior high campers at Camp Pecometh last summer and participated in the annual Career Day at Delaware State College. Contact was made with high school guidance counselors and local church secretaries of enlistment promoting the programs of the Commission. Workshops were held on the four districts and over 200 copies of the booklet *Church Occupations and Voluntary Service* were distributed throughout the conference. Two new films and one filmstrip were purchased to augment our conference audio-visual offering on vocations.

Looking toward the future we plan to continue many of the same programs that have been started. In addition a Camp on Vocations is planned for August 1975 at

Camp Pecometh for senior highs. Also planned is a more intensive training experience for local church secretaries of enlistment with emphasis on helping them plan exciting programs on vocations at the local church level. Realizing that high school guidance counselors are an important resource, we plan to work more closely with them by letting them know of our interest and ability to provide materials and personnel in the area of church related occupations. Finally, we plan to follow up on contacts we have made with students giving them continued support and encouragement.

BOARD OF THE MINISTRY

For the second year The Board of Ministry conducted an Orientation Session at Drayton Manor. This was an overnight affair to which the Board invited all persons who were appointed to churches for the first time in the Peninsula Annual Conference. Spouses were also invited. Only one of those invited did not come and that was because of a genuine conflict in schedule. Forty-nine persons including staff participated and the reaction from the group was, for the second time, that it was a very excellent and worthwhile experience. The Rev. Mr. Charles Barton, secretary to the Board, served as co-ordinator in planning the leadership.

The Continuing Education Committee, chaired by the Rev. Mr. Frank Lucia, has during the past year, developed guidelines for grants for Continuing Education. These guidelines are available by addressing your request to either the chairman of the Board or to Mr. Lucia. Continuing Education helped to fund an experience developed by the Council on Ministries, under the leadership of Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton, to aid ministers in understanding their leadership styles. It was held at Drayton Manor and response was enthusiastic therein.

The Rev. Mr. Kendall McCabe is the chairman of our committee on Scholarships and Grants. His committee works closely with Scholarship Committee of the annual conference so that the funds available, through the annual conference, can receive the widest distribution. Through this cooperative consulting, we believe that the funds available are effectively utilized.

Each candidate for the ministry has psychological testing and profile review under Dr. Andy Hayes of Wesley College. The Rev. Mr. George Godfrey oversees this part of the Board's work. It continues to prove of assistance in guiding candidates into the ministry.

The Rev. Mr. William Hemphill gives leadership to the area of the counseling elder. This is a program that is continually being evaluated. In some cases it has proved most effective and most helpful to the candidate. New forms have been developed this year to aid the District Superintendents in their evaluation to the Board of Ministry. The whole area of Counseling Elder and Intern Year needs further study.

In the area of recruitment, Committee Chairman Rev. Mr. John Irwin has cooperated with the Rev. Mr. Sterling Green and his committee in a Vocations Conference that was held during the Christmas Holidays.

Visits have been made to the several seminaries where candidates who are from this conference are enrolled. Responses from the candidate seem to indicate that the time and effort and expense make these visitations an important effectiveness area that the Board needs to continue.

Service to ministers, under the leadership of the Rev. Mr. Robert Whitlock, has underway a major project. This will be an area seminar on retirement to be held at

the University of Maryland Campus, College Park, next summer. We expect to have twenty persons from this conference participating in this experience. In other areas of service to ministers, we have provided specialized professional help when it has been needed and no other resources were available.

At the current time there is a study underway as to the specific needs of the Peninsula Conference in the area of recruiting ministers in the near future. It is our intention that the results of this study will be available to the leadership of the conference sometime during the next conference year.

The report of the Board of Ministry, dealing with the change of status of members of the annual conference, will be found in the section containing the disciplinary questions.

We have tried to remember that the one who pointed up the importance of human life when he said, "For what will it profit a man, if he gains the whole world and forfeits his life?" (Matt. 16:26) also said, "Seek first his kingdom and his righteousness." (Matt. 6:33)

Training

Training is always important because we all need a considerable amount of factual information before we have the confidence to speak or act or lead. The Board has tried to provide training opportunities for members of the Board, ministers of the Conference, and members of the local churches. Members of the Board, one or more in each case, attended the following conferences:

Leadership Workshops, one on each of the four districts in the Conference.

Peace and Self-Development Workshops promoted World Order Sunday observances. Four workshops were conducted, one on each district.

The Board plans to continue this emphasis.

Issues

The issues to which the Board of Church and Society is to give its attention are manifold. We must not only keep informed on the issues but provide resources and offer guidance to districts and local churches as they attempt to meet the challenge to provide a Christian witness in their community and state. The Board has attempted to do these things by providing workshops, sending out mailings, formulating resolutions, giving testimony at hearings, supporting the work of various organizations and many other things.

The issues to which we have given some specific attention in 1974 are abortion, amnesty, capital punishment, desegregation/ busing, equal employment, housing, hunger, migrant labor, parochial aid, peace and self development, and welfare. While this is not a comprehensive list, it does indicate the broad concern of the Board.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

The Commission on Religion and Race has spent this past year diligently pursuing the task assigned to the Commission. These tasks were to: (1) Conduct a study and evaluation of 10 years of merger of the Delaware and Peninsula Conference. (2) To conduct workshops on Racism.

In order to accomplish these goals the Commission on Religion and Race secured the assistance and services of the office of research and survey of the National Division of Global Ministries. The objectives for the study were presented to and approved by the Conference Council on Ministries. The objectives are as follows: (1) To discover and evaluate the benefits and disadvantages of merger as viewed by ministers, lay persons (including youth) of both races. (2) To identify major areas of strength and weakness in the present merged conference and to catalogue suggestions for needed changes. (3) Through maximum participation in the study, to help the conference to experience a sense of accomplishment in the achievements so far and a sense of hope for the future. (4) To assist the Commission on Religion and Race to formulate recommendations and proposals for future actions.

This study is still underway at the time of this report; the results and any recommendations will be presented at the Annual Conference.

The Commission will hold its first consultation on Racism in April. Leadership for the Consultation will be provided by the National Staff of the General Commission on Religion and Race. Conference participants at this first Consultation will be members of the Council on Ministries, Cabinet, Conference staff, and the Conference Commission on Religion and Race. The rationale for starting at this level is that we are attempting to develop the Conference leadership that will then be able to provide the leadership at the District and Local Church level.

SECTION IV

COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

"United in Christ" is not just an expression but should be a description of the spirit that is reflected in our actions as Christians. The Commission strives to share ways and means which will enable local churches and our Conference to make real the concept of "United in Christ".

The Commission

During the year of 1974 the Commission met quarterly to focus on opportunities for Ecumenical endeavors. From those meetings grew the plans to activate Local

Churches Task Force on Ecumenical Concerns, encourage the churches to become involved where inter-denominational parish structures were feasible, share opportunities where ecumenical programs on a local level were possible, and give added strength to the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency and its Task Forces.

Leadership training for local persons was carried out in cooperation with the Council on Ministries District Workshops. This enables persons from every district to receive valuable information and motivation. Means of further communicating with local ministers and leaders were established through the channels of the Conference Business Office and the "Communicator".

Expressions of ecumenical endeavor have been developing within the Conference through various Boards, Commissions and Agencies working with representatives of other denominations to broaden and deepen their plans reflected by the "United in Christ" concept. Missions, Homes and Hospitals, Education, Church and Society, United Campus Ministry, United Methodist Women and others are to be commended on their ecumenical programs.

Support of the D.E.A. Task Forces by local churches was determined to be a major goal of the commission for 1975. Plans were made to develop material on each of the Task Forces and to spotlight one each month in 1975. In this way our local churches will have specific information on "why and how" to channel money, efforts by individuals, and other resources to specific ministries in which they wish to participate.

Permission has been received for local churches to direct money to specific D.E.A. Task Forces through the Conference Business Office using line "Other Benevolences" on the monthly remittance form and specifying the D.E.A. Task Force to be supported. These contributions are over and above the apportionments and are considered other benevolences.

A major role of the Commission is to work with the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency. The Peninsula Conference is one of 15 member Judicatories in D.E.A. Members of the Commission serve on the Executive Committee and the Administrative Board while other Boards and Commissions relate to the Task Forces which the Conference has agreed to support. The following from D.E.A. is therefore included with this report.

The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency

The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency (DEA) is the coordinated witness of thirteen Protestant denominations, the Catholic Church, and Church Women United serving Delaware and Eastern Shore Maryland. This ecumenical presence provides the Delmarva Peninsula with a broad base Church contact and resource, opportunities for coordinated community ministries, and a prophetic voice within the congregations and communities. Program planning is carried out through task forces with representation from religious groups, private organizations and public agencies that provide resources (dollars, programs, personnel, and facilities) for the implementation of a specific ministry.

THE DEA RURAL MINISTRIES COALITION is the task force serving the rural residents in poverty, with special emphasis on the migrant and seasonal farm worker. Relationships with local community organizations makes it possible to provide services at the grass roots.

Thousands (5,400 in 1974; 6,500 in 1975) of farm workers (Chicano, Puerto Rican, Black) receive direct personal services of professional health care (physical exams, dental, internal, eye, medication), or personal counseling (family, financial, legal, employment, health, etc.), of spiritual nurture (worship,

education, counseling, fellowship activities), or general assistance (transportation, information, referrals), and beginning in 1975 a manpower training program to up-grade the employable skills of farm workers. Indirect services to all the migrant and seasonal farmworkers are the involvements with state officials in rewriting regulations regarding living and working conditions, with legislators in interpreting needs relative to bills before them, and consciousness raising within congregations and communities through public speaking engagements.

A full time year-round program and staff, directed by Ms. Patricia Groff, is making it possible to expand our ministries to rural residents. Three VISTA volunteers doubled the full time staff in 1974 which will be more than doubled again in 1975 with the addition of manpower training staff and the expansion of the Catholic staff.

THE DEA RESOURCES CENTER provides not only educational materials but also a coordinating relationship between the various denominational staff and leadership responsible for congregational development. Mrs. Helen Walker, Director, conducts congregational workshops in addition to coordinating the services (AV's, resource-full newsletter, simulation games, books, cassettes, ecumenical workshops and referrals) available to congregations and groups in educational settings and learning events.

THE DEA LEISURE MINISTRIES provides opportunities of relationships for coordination and implementation of programs to serve the growing population (permanent, vacation, weekend) along the ocean beaches, yacht basins, trailer communities, and woodland parks. This expanded vision of leisure ministries will be initiated in 1975 and implemented in 1976.

The 1974 ministries at Rehoboth Beach, Delaware, and Ocean City, Maryland, touched the lives of nearly 10,000 youth. Coffee houses at both locations provided youth with opportunities of conversation, fellowship, entertainment, and relaxation in a loving-accepting atmosphere. Counseling and Bible study experiences were available through the leadership of seminarians.

In Ocean City, a twenty-four hour hot line was used by over 700 youth in moments of crisis due to sexual adventure, drug trips, and alcohol overhangs. Two law students on the staff provided assistance to over 100 youth who became involved in experiences with legal implications. One hundred forty youth found opportunities to reorient their lives by living in the fellowship of Diakonia House for a period of 1-3 days.

THE DEA SOCIAL AWARENESS AND ACTION (SAA) task force is established to identify issues, recommend relationships, and suggest strategies for social change, legislative action and congregational involvements to make life more livable for the "least of these my brothers".

The concept of the SAA is to provide an ecumenical umbrella for major social issues which demand a response from the Church. As issues become relevant for a response the SAA will be the communications and resources linkage to relate the community citizens group(s) and religious organizations for the implementation of a social change strategy and/ or project to meet the need.

The current issues include: WELFARE, especially increased grants to families with dependent children (AFDC), and the recommended relationships with the Public Assistance Taskforce (PAT) for Delaware, and Kids in Need (KIN) for Maryland. RACIAL JUSTICE, especially desegregation of schools in New Castle County with recommended relationships to the Delaware Equal Education Process (DEEP) committee and the School Decision Committee. HOUSING concerns are in relationship with the Citizens Housing Alliance of Delaware (CHAD). CRIMINAL JUSTICE concerns has prompted the establishment of the

Smyrna Bus Special which transports family and friends to visit the inmates of the Delaware Correctional Center located 35 miles south of Wilmington in Smyrna, Delaware.

PACEM IN TERRIS is the DEA's valuable resource for congregations and communities to become informed and involved in GLOBAL JUSTICE issues of world hunger and military involvements. World hunger interpretative meetings, information materials and experiential events are available from the director, Mr. Charles Zoeller. CROP hunger walks and fasts in the Delmarva communities are encouraged as a response by members of congregations.

THE DEA URBAN MINISTRIES are primarily in research and planning stages. The Wilmington United Neighbors received support and funding from Lutherans (LCA) and Catholics. The neighborhood organization phases are well underway with numerous immediate and long range needs and issues being identified and followed-up with appropriate forms of action. Mr. Dale Lewis, parish associate, Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd, has been assigned to work with the DEA one day per week in research and development of a metropolitan ministry of support to local neighborhood ecumenical groupings of congregations. The DEA executive director continues to meet and plan with urban ecumenical groups in metropolitan Wilmington, Newark, Dover, and Salisbury.

The DEA COMMUNICATIONS task force is being reorganized to develop an effective design to inform the public and congregations of the ministry of the churches through DEA. Regular news releases, radio and television programing, bulletin inserts, special interpretation programs, and speakers for church meetings are among the plans to be developed and implemented in 1975.

THE ADMINISTRATIVE FUNCTIONS of DEA are carried out by the Executive Director, the Rev. Mr. Donald E. Leiter, through offices in Wilmington, Dover, and Salisbury. These functions include: a) developing ecumenical ministries through taskforces; b) coordinate communication and funding the ministries; c) facilitate relationships between member denominations; d) facilitate ecumenical relations in local neighborhoods; and e) provide liaison with ecumenical organizations beyond the Peninsula.

The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency is the visible organization that brings the various denominations into a relationship for the development and implementation of our united ministry in the name of Jesus, the Christ.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries exists "to assist the church and its people to become involved in direct service to persons in need, through health and welfare ministries, both institutional and non-institutional."

Traditionally, Health and Welfare Ministries has been concerned with the sick, the homeless, and the aging. Today these concerns have broadened to include health care, a wide range of services to children and youth with special needs, and a much broader ministry with the elderly.

Prior to restructure by the Joint Commissions in 1968, in each church there was a Hospital and Homes Steward, whose principal function was to be a liaison or contact person between the Local Church and the homes. Today each church or charge is to have elected a Health and Welfare Representative whose role and

function are far greater than what was true of the steward. This being true, it is incumbent upon this board to provide the necessary education and skills for the representative to do his job. In addition to relating to the local representatives, it is still this board's responsibility to relate to and cooperate with the homes within its jurisdiction. In order to meet the demands of a broadened role and the addition of particular functions, this board is still in the process of becoming better educated in the field of health and welfare and is involved in the process or reorganization to serve the church better. By this we shall endeavor to strengthen our commitment to Health and Welfare Ministries.

Goals - 1974

The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries set out to accomplish the following goals in the year 1974:

1. To cooperate with the Conference Council on Ministries in providing leadership workshops in each district. Through this medium we are able to train newly-elected local Health and Welfare Representatives and provide advance training for others.

2. To place on the back cover of the Annual Conference Journal a ready reference on admission procedures to the Seaford Manor House and the Country House in Wilmington. This project has been completed and the material presently appears in the 1974 Journal. This is something that our board will continue so that it will be readily available to pastors and the other church leaders who possess and use the journals throughout the year.

3. To consider the needs of ethnic minorities within our conference. This urgent concern will be assigned to the new standing committee on Ministries to Ethnic Minorities which has bi-racial representation. It is hoped that out of this committee there will come ways to meet the needs of those within our conference who either cannot or do not wish to enter our present homes.

4. To consider the diversity of representation on the Board of Trustees of the Peninsula Homes and Hospitals, Inc. For the first time our board has actually had the opportunity to suggest prospective trustees and to react to the nominees proposed by the Board of Trustees. There exists now a very cooperative relationship between board and agency. The attempt of this goal is to find persons throughout our conference from each district who can and will serve on the board so as to provide balanced representation.

5. To update the mailing list of local Health and Welfare Representatives. This work has been completed and will be helpful to the district directors and will make possible direct mailings from our board.

6. To appoint district directors to each district. This has been accomplished and the directors are:

Dover - Rev. John W. VanTine, Cheswold, De.

Easton - Rev. James W. Riley, Ridgely, Md.

Salisbury - Rev. Edward C. Goodley, Mardela Springs, Md.

Wilmington - Rev. Paul Hilton, Wilmington, De.

7. The establishment of four standing committees:

Committee on Ministries to the Aging

Committee on Ministries to Children and Youth

Committee on Local Church Ministries

Committee on Ministries to Ethnic Minorities

It was felt that these four general areas would cover the work of the board, except for occasional times when a special task force would be necessary. They are designed to meet on a regular basis and are to become effective, working committees. In 1975, these committees will be activated.

Plans for the Years Ahead

1. A continuation of educational enterprises such as the annual leadership workshops.

2. Hold a Convocation on Aging in the fall of 1975. This will be the first of what we hope will be an annual event emphasizing certain concerns in the area of health and welfare. In 1976 another Convocation on Aging will be held. After that certain other subjects or areas of concern will be the focus of the annual convocation. Through these convocations we hope to provide training, skills, information, inspiration, and leadership for our Conference and also, outside agencies.

3. District seminars will be held starting in the Spring of 1976. The plan now is to take persons who are specially equipped to provide leadership on the district. These seminars may even take the form of a mini-convocation, stressing whatever concern the annual convocation emphasizes, or some off-shoot. This training enterprise is seen as a means to get information and expertise into the local churches.

4. District Directors to provide program based on needs within a specific district. This may take the form of informal rap sessions between District Directors and local Health and Welfare Representatives.

The Foundation of Our Labors

Allow me to close this report with a statement or explanation on the major principles by which our board is guided. They were originally stated in brief form in the 1974 Journal. At this juncture we can report on our progress.

Presently our board, because of past inactivity and last year a large turnover of membership, is having to reorganize itself, to educate itself as it can, and right now to consider the very broad aspects of the field of Health and Welfare Ministries which has changed from the understanding of years ago where our board primarily was concerned with homes for children and the aging. Now we have a much broader field, including health care, the welfare of our people, even including employment practices, the development of new ministries within churches and the conference and by providing leadership to our conference through highly prestigious conferences on health and welfare or some vital aspect of the field. Thus, the goals for 1975 are many and quite general, but this is not to say that they are not important or real, or in some way reachable. What they are doing for now is helping us focus on the broader considerations so that we are not putting a fire out here and then there.

A. Strengthening our ministries through the agencies

1. Improving the agency-church relationships: The Discipline calls on the annual conference board to seek to strengthen the ties between related hospitals and homes and the church. In order to improve the relationship, we must understand what the relationship is, how we define it, how we tie in together as we minister within the conference. This has been under some investigation, as the chairman of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries has met several times with the president of the Board of Trustees. This is a concern that will be handled through one of our recently established standing committees on ministries to the aging. We do want to go on record in support of our fine homes and the excellent care that the residents receive. Indeed our homes have become a model in many ways. So we have a right to be proud. But there is also the need to continually scrutinize a program and our relationships. Now that our conference board is becoming a stronger figure within the Conference, we must know how to relate to our homes and agencies.

2. Lifting the level of leadership: Since our nation and communities need good direction in the broad areas of health and welfare, and since we as a board are called upon to minister well in the name of Christ, we must become more acquainted and better educated in the field of health and welfare. There is no doubt in our minds but that if our conference board is to offer leadership to the Conference, we ourselves must be trained to do so. There are very few experts who sit on our board, and we do not offer advice. What we try to do is to concern ourselves with the needs and also the actual programs that have been created within our Conference, and from looking at them to determine the best directions for our people. We need training for our board members, for our district directors, for our administrators, and members of the Board of Trustees. There must be insight on the part of all of us if we are to provide constructive and outstanding leadership. Some time in the future it is hoped that there will be training enterprises for all of us who are working daily and monthly in the field.

3. Beginning new ministries as needed: We are aware that the Board of Trustees of the Peninsula Homes and Hospitals is active in the Church Home Foundation in Wilmington and the new Cokesbury Village project that is to serve as a retirement facility in the New Castle County area. We are hoping that other studies will be made of our conference so that we can provide homes, if necessary, or some kind of caring institution, to meet the needs in other parts of our Conference besides the Wilmington District. It might interest you to know that the January workshop was attended by several people who mentioned having a home in their areas, namely Salisbury and Easton. So these are concerns of ours. We are also looking at the problems of children and youth today, and what we can do to meet their needs. The chairman of our board has met with local community leadership in the Dover area concerned with children who are classified as non-delinquents, who because of pressures in the home, run away or become incorrigible. There are presently very few homes where children such as this may be placed, and often such non-delinquent children are placed in homes for juvenile delinquents where there are more hardened individuals who have willingly and intentionally practiced some forms of crime.

Also when we consider new ministries, we are concerned that we do something for the ethnic minority groups within our Conference. Two proposals have come to mind; namely, the satellite type of ministry, where a retirement or nursing facility is connected to a church, using the church's available facilities, or to look into the needs of a nursing home for black communities, as opposed to a larger retirement home. Whatever the case, we are concerned and do feel that these are new ministries that need to be explored.

B. Strengthening our Commitment to Health and Welfare Ministries

1. Establishing educational programs within the Conference on Health and Welfare Ministries: This is basic to a productive program, and it will serve to develop and inform the constituency, believing that the Gospel includes all the needs of the people of God, physical, as well as spiritual. It is our mission to find ways to directly serve the people of our Conference.

2. Encouraging support of our agencies: We will continue to announce our support for our agencies and to undergird their work through financial gifts either through our budget or from special offerings. We will also endeavor to provide more information on our homes and to interpret the work of our homes to the people of our conference.

3. Developing a unified program of health and welfare within the Annual Conference: The Council on Ministries is in effect the vehicle for accomplishing this goal. Our board feels that it is vital that we work together and that what we do, we

do cooperatively across multi-lateral lines of communication. Even now most of our materials for distribution to the local churches go through our Council office and our work is done by the Support Services Department. There is reason to believe that the Council on Ministries at times will suggest ideas for a program in the area of health and welfare, or that the Council will provide some direction as we try to work together.

4. Strengthening local church leadership of Health and Welfare Ministries through training enterprises and seminars: The strength of our conference program will depend largely on the board itself as we see our role as that of inspiring educating and leading the church to more effective avenues of ministry. We hope to give counsel to local pastors and churches in dealing with the broader aspects of health and welfare services to children, youth, and adults. Eventually, we hope to provide seminars for pastors in specific areas. For example, in dealing with ministry to the aging, perhaps a program providing information on housing, Medicare, Medicaid, and the like, or workshops for district directors and local church representatives, doing this annually. In a much larger vein, we are hoping to provide an Annual Conference-wide Convocation on some related subject as aging and retirement, medicine and theology, or the problems of housing.

This then is a progress report of where we are in our work in the area of health and welfare.

PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST HOMES AND HOSPITALS, INC.

A PROMISE TO KEEP. The Charter of this Corporation clearly defines our areas of concern and services. They are broad and inclusive, they allow for expansion and extension of a Christ-centered healing and helping ministry to the elderly. They urge and encourage the Trustees to seek means to serve all segments of society. They set no limitations other than our financial capability. They set no barriers of race, religion, ethnic origin or nationality.

The concept upon which the Charter and By-Laws were written is rooted in Faith and Christian Tradition. Faith that all services rendered in the name of Jesus Christ, would be made possible. The Belief that the Christian Tradition means that God's Love flows through the organized church into the community. We are glad our homes are a part of the strong Methodist Tradition. We give thanks to this Annual Conference for assisting us to be God's Agent in providing for the needs of thousands over the past 15 years with food, shelter, clothing, love, respect, custodial and nursing care.

A COMMITMENT TO KEEP. Realizing that we could never meet the needs of all elderly in our homes, we have for the past three years extended our outreach into the community. Several thousand elderly have been touched by the Helping Hand of Sussex County Home Services, based at the Manor House. Originally these services consisted of nursing and companionship — they were broadened to cover transportation and food service. Nutrition centers have been opened in Methodist Churches and Senior Centers to provide one hot meal a day for the elderly and the handicapped, but more than food is dispensed at these centers. A full measure of nutritious food and fellowship combine to make tomorrow something to look forward to rather than dread.

These outreach programs have changed lives — they have helped to make five days a week "A Time for Living," yet these programs, regardless of their value, have a way of going out of existence, unless the community decides to help fund their operation. We believe there is no justification for such action. These programs are directed toward the poor and handicapped, who have no defense except that which we can build and support. We will vigorously oppose the diverting of funds to less needed programs. To suddenly reduce by 50% the funding for human services no one else is capable of (or even wants to give), is not in accordance with our concept of Christian Love for those in need.

Two years ago, we joined with the Episcopalians and Presbyterians in an Ecumenical venture to provide a low cost (through rent subsidy) housing project for the elderly. In July of this year, residents will begin to occupy a high-rise building at 1010 Broom Street, Wilmington. This Home will provide custodial care for 263 elderly persons, with low and moderate incomes. Since this Home was built and mortgaged with state and federal funds, it was necessary to provide additional construction money for program areas necessary to serve the elderly, which we feel are important, but the federal government does not recognize. We therefore, became a guarantor along with members of the Episcopalian and Presbyterian communities for the additional funds.

A Capital Funds Campaign was undertaken to not only secure the needed funds for the completion of Ingleside Church Home, but also to retire our indebtedness on the George Pigueron Health Center and a 20 room addition to the Episcopal Nursing Home. This is a three year campaign and to date about 1/3 of the needed funds have been raised. The economic conditions have also effected this undertaking. It should be clearly understood that the commitment made by our

Board of Trustees was a brick and mortar commitment and ends with the completion of construction and the raising of capital funds for added cost of the building.

One third of the membership of the Board of Trustees are Methodist and represent our Methodist Theology of Service to the elderly. Methodists serve on every committee including Admissions.

There is a very fine 20-minute audio-visual presentation available for showing to church and civic boards which documents the need and concept behind this ecumenical venture. Information may be obtained through our Department of Development and Promotion.

AN IDEAL TO KEEP. For the past 18 months, we have been developing plans for a new retirement community near Wilmington, on 52 acres of beautiful countryside. Cokesbury Village is near to becoming a reality and hopefully by the printing of this report, all approvals will have been received.

This Community will serve many life styles. It will offer maximum freedom, and at the same time, afford maximum security and life care. Housing up to 475 persons in 310 living units varying from complete independence in cottages, two and one bedroom apartments to single rooms, the residents will enjoy the view of 52 beautifully landscaped acres. One hundred cottages will provide from 1300 to 1400 sq. ft. of living space comprised of two bedrooms, two baths, kitchen, living room and dining area. Walk-in and built-in closet spaces and fully equipped kitchens will make for gracious comfort. All cottages will be built around a center court to provide for a community spirit.

The Core Building will provide for 210 apartments and single rooms, health center with 50 beds expandable to 100, dining and food service, chapel, craft rooms and other public areas. Built on the natural slopes of the property, it will become the focal point of the community.

A Benevolence Program will be built into the program to continue our commitment to total care, total concern and a policy of racial inclusiveness.

A TRUST TO KEEP. Never has a Resident, due to financial difficulty, illness, or any other reason, been removed from our homes. Regardless of any difficulties we might have, the Trust Agreement that exists from time of entry of the Resident to their demise, between the Resident and the home, must be honored. Many of our Residents have suffered severe illness for long periods of time — many have outlived their life savings, but our care for them cannot change.

In 1965, the Annual Conference approved the use of a Mother's Day Offering to help support our Scholarship Program. It was viewed then, as it still is, as a manner in which all Methodists could share in Christ's Helping and Healing Ministry to the elderly. This is very important involvement between the churches of the Annual Conference and our homes has a disappointing aspect for the year 1974 in that only 50% of our Methodist Churches remitted a Mother's Day Offering. We pray that the trust we must keep with our Residents might become a shared trust with all Methodists.

A FAITH TO KEEP. This has been a very difficult year. Multiply the individual's experience with the inflationary spiral over the past 18 months by 500 and you get some feeling for what the homes experienced. This coupled with the loss of market values and income, has made it extremely difficult to maintain and expand programs of service. Extreme control measures have been helpful, but the threat of continued inflation, wage demands, etc., is still with us. Our faith is strong and can be strengthened by your prayers and concern for a Christ-centered ministry. Shakespeare said, "It is one of the most beautiful compensations of life that no man can sincerely help another without helping himself." With over 65,000 elderly in our Conference Area today and with the knowledge that it will increase

10M in five years, it would seem relevant to consider these words, "Whatsoever you would that men should do unto you, even so do you also unto them."

Gratefully, we acknowledge the financial assistance of the Annual Conference toward our Scholarship Program. Through our Department of Development and Promotion, we are equipped to put on a program or just supply a speaker, to bring about a better understanding of the aging problems or to share in detail the operations of your Methodist Homes.

We do have a promise, a commitment, an idea, a trust and a faith to keep. We take this opportunity to not only report that we are aware of them, but to tell you that we are and will faithfully execute them.

Seaford Cottage Construction

On March 4th, ground was broken for the construction of a free standing cottage on the Manor House property. One problem we have encountered at both our Homes is that of space requirements of persons, both single and married couples. Many persons object to reducing their life style to that of living in one single room which even though it is large enough to live in, does not allow them to bring with them many of those things which are important and contribute to what they consider a good life.

These cottages, while modest in design, are more than double the largest normal living space found in the Manor House. Containing a large living room with fireplace, a bedroom with ample closet space and large bath and a complete kitchen, a person or couple does have a sense of freedom and privacy not available in the Main Building. At the same time, they have available to them all the protective medical services, food services, and programs shared by those living in the Main Building.

The cottage being built sold for \$30,000.00 and any future cottages, up to a maximum of 22, will be built on a Sold Basis — construction will not begin until a Contractual Agreement is in effect and money paid or obligated by the Resident. Each Resident in a cottage will, of course, also pay a Monthly Charge sufficient to cover all utilities, maintenance and services.

Cokesbury

Since the printing of the Pre-Conference Report, all necessary approvals have been received. We have complied with the Methodist Discipline in securing approvals from the National Division of Health and Welfare Ministries, the Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries, the Conference Council of Finance and the Conference Council on Ministries as approved by Resolution of the 1973 Annual Conference. Design and specifications are now being finalized so that site work may begin in July and actual construction in September. Financial arrangements for the project are also going ahead as planned.

We have prepared a Fact Sheet that we believe will be helpful in giving you a full understanding of what we are doing, its cost, the fees projected and other pertinent data. This Fact Sheet is before you and I would like to review it with you at this time.

New Living-Unit Endowment Fee

Recently our Board of Trustees authorized a study of Entrance Fees for the Country House and the Manor House. The study revealed an inconsistency between the capital needs for repairs, replacement and retirement of capital cost, and

the amount we were then charging. Calculating these costs, using the original cost of buildings and equipment, we found that we must add at least a thousand dollars for capital needs alone. Considering our commitment to care for those who would need some financial assistance for Entrance Fees, it was judged that an amount should also be added for a new benevolence or financial aid. Even though all new contracts contain a clause permitting escalation of the Monthly Fee, we have found that in times of inflation such as we have been experiencing for the past two years we were receiving less from Residents than the actual cost-of-care. In order to provide some cushion during inflationary periods and cover the cost of room renovations for new residents, a sum of \$1,500.00 was added as a component part of the total Living-Unit Endowment Fee. The new fee is now \$12,000.00 for an individual and \$18,000.00 for a couple. The Fee, broken down, means that \$8,500.00 for capital costs, \$2,000.00 for Scholarship or Financial Aid and \$1,500.00 for operations, meets the present financial requirements to care for new Residents in our Homes. I think you can readily see that it will not be possible for us to provide financial assistance for those who do not have the required Entrance Fee on a ratio of one in six, or more, depending on the degree of aid needed. We believe this to be a step in the right direction.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHILD CARE

Five years ago Board of Child Care was among the first of all Methodist agencies for children and youth to be fully certified by the Certification Council, National Board of Health and Welfare Ministries. During the fall of 1974 we became the first to complete a re-certification study, and to be re-certified by that council.

Among the many parts of the re-certification study are relationships with Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences, described as "excellent"; the spirit of services offered, described as "warm and understanding"; the role of Woman's Auxiliary, described as "expanding, significant and helpful"; or feelings of staff, which are that "they are part of an important Christian, growing program of services to children, youth and families." Reviewing program developments, the Council team noted:

- 1) Campus Council, a bi-monthly meeting in which youth are involved in decision making.
- 2) Cottage meetings with children's caseworkers and child care staff.
- 3) Development of different forms of worship on grounds.
- 4) Continuation of On-Grounds School
- 5) Active recreation program.
- 6) Use of student volunteers from local colleges to tutor and visit.
- 7) Recruitment of visiting homes for children who lack a family member with whom they can visit.
- 8) Part-time employment children secure in the neighborhood.
- 9) The MERRYMOBILE, a traveling library which arrives each Wednesday afternoon.

On a trip sponsored by Woman's Auxiliary boys and girls camped in Ohio or upstate New York. As they wrote in OUR BOYS AND GIRLS, "We child care campers went canoeing, swimming, nature walking, and enjoyed feeding cheese to the raccoons that visited our cabins. We were excited when a deer ran alongside the road, stared at us in the face and darted back in the brush! It's a great experience to be among the wild animals."

Adoption services are available to any parent, single or married, and pastors are reminded that they may feel free to refer individuals for such service. Cooperative efforts are made with other social agencies to find adoptive homes for children needing homes: such as the school-age child or the child with handicap.

Swartzell Assembled Families, now in its sixth year, has provided a home to 49 children. Currently, 31 children are in care in seven homes. Ranging in age from one to seventeen years, they are making good progress. Three will soon be eighteen.

Last summer, with the help of a grant from the Kendall Foundation, a fourth home was purchased. It is now fully staffed, and home for three foster children, one of whom is a six-year-old deaf mute.

"The Child Care System — Fostering Relations Between Partners in Care" was the topic of a workshop co-sponsored with National Association of Social Workers in November. Over two hundred social workers, educators, foster parents and juvenile counselors attended.

Old Time Methodist Day, a first (or was it a continuation of Strawbridge days) was held October 5th. Sponsored by the Woman's Auxiliary, many friendly smiles were seen as guests rode the horses, played softball, broom polo, tug-a-war, and other games. October 4, 1975, will be the second Old Time Methodist Day. All are invited.

Appreciation is expressed to all who have participated in the 1974 Christmas Offering. We have exceeded our goal of \$160,000.

The Development Office has embarked upon a long-range deferred giving program to provide a continual input of funds for support of our work. At this time over 1,000 individuals, who have shown an interest in the child care programs of the Board of Child Care, are receiving our Wills and Bequests literature. This literature is being sent out four times a year, and our list of interested individuals is continually growing.

The Capital Fund Campaign is progressing, though slowly. At the present time we have raised \$133,000 in gifts and pledges. The campaign continues under William L. Lucas's direction.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions seeks to set a form of references for its work in the second half of the 1970's. Our global responsibilities, as well as the missional concerns of our conference and local congregations, causes us to reflect upon our interrelatedness, interdependence, and our Christian responsibility.

Interrelatedness

"By reason of their creation by God all humans find themselves united with all other humans and the rest of creation in a universe that was not a part of their making. That fact alone is the basis of global concern. If all the inhabitants of the world (3.6 billion of them) totaled 100, then 84 would find themselves in varying degrees in the midst of poverty, disease, economic and political oppression and desperation. The other 16 would be living a moderately satisfied life. Six of that 16 would inhabit the U.S.; they would use one third of the world's energy and resources, a fact that U.S. Christians cannot ignore, if we believe in the human family with God as our creator."

Interdependence

"Today's world, with its complexity and rapid communications system, draws nations and persons ever closer to each other.

"What happens in one part of our world affects many other parts. For example, the Middle East conflict, complicated enough in and of itself, has wide-spread implications when the Arab nations elected to use their resource of crude oil to bring advantage to themselves in the conflict. As a result many nations suffered fuel shortages, interrupted domestic travel, increased prices, closed businesses and lowered food production. International money markets were disturbed, the price of gold increased, the profits of oil companies went up, the production and sale of automobiles was affected, the unemployment rate increased, and a demand was created for cost-of-living clauses in labor contracts. England was brought to the brink of financial disaster, and international air travel and pleasure cruises were reduced. These crises made many people more ecologically aware, created increased markets for oil from places other than the Middle East and had an impact on U.S. relations with China and Russia. Each of these results has still other long-reaching implications that leave virtually no nation or people untouched by a conflict in the Middle East.

"The world is faced with many common issues that draw us closer together: monetary policies, health care, farm labor, consumerism, poverty, ecology, freedom of the press, tax and prison reforms, amnesty, civil rights, national defense, war. The list is almost limitless."

Christian Responsibility

"Christians have a special responsibility to recognize the interdependent nature of the world and the world's people. The answers to today's monumental global issues cannot be discovered apart from an understanding of God's purpose. Christians should lead the way in reaching out with understanding to persons of all nations, not judging others by their own expectations but seeking to join them in a common effort under God to solve those problems that affect us all.

"A committee of the World Council of Churches summed up the role of Christians in the following way:

"... If men and women are to find the faith and courage to cooperate with God in the struggle for tomorrow's world, they need to see and feel that it is like to live in an international, multiracial, transcultural community. It is the calling of the churches to embody hope in a community, which is open to the future, promised by God."

Mission Is . . .

"Mission, which is always subject to the initiative of God, is the continuation of the history of salvation as God uses his church among the 'nations.' Proclaiming Christ takes place in many ways: Conversation, writing, teaching, preaching, healing, being present, in worship and prayer, feeding the starving, clothing the poor, relieving the oppressed.

"The task of the church as an instrument of God's salvation and as a people of different cultures and nations is to respond to God's call as God reveals the meaning of salvation today and as God summons the church to channel grace to all people who struggle for identity, dignity and meaningful vocation."

The above statements were taken from a publication entitled: "Why Global, The Local Church and World Community," written by H. Claude Young, Jr.

Urban Work Committee Report

1. Establish an Urban Consultation in Salisbury, MD October/ November 1975
2. Research and Survey: to identify the urban churches in our Conference and the Urban Centers with their resources and their responsibility for Mission.
3. Looking for three years into the future, the committee suggested we might expect to find an Ecumenical Urban Ministry for the entire Peninsula, maybe as part of the D.E.A.

Town and Country Work

1. To call attention to the need for current parsonage standards in cooperation with the Cabinet.
2. To encourage group ministry as a viable form for Town and Country churches.
3. To provide pastors and churches with social agencies which can help meet the human needs of Town and Country communities in cooperation with the churches.

4. To encourage aid to small rural churches, such as the Aldersgate — Old Asbury project under the auspices of MAP in Wilmington.
5. To encourage ministry to migrants through the resources of the DEA Rural Ministries Coalition.
6. To encourage church extension in areas which call for it (ref. Millsboro, Delaware site).
7. To encourage church and community research and survey to discover definite needs of Town and Country churches and communities.
8. To plan for the fall of 1975 a Convocation for Town and Country Orientation of Pastors with outside leadership resources.

III

METHODIST ACTION PROGRAM - Reverend James Young, Director

Report for the Year 1974

1) Responding to the Goal of Social Change:

Because the Methodist Action Program joined with other concerned groups across Delaware, those persons who need Public Assistance Grants have seen those grants increased in 1974. A family of four now receives \$230 each month compared to the \$154 before the increases.

Questions about the decision of the United States District Court on the desegregation suit in our public schools continues to be a major issue for all citizens in New Castle County. The Methodist Action Program supports local church studies to explore attitudes and feelings to assist in community understandings. We stand with the affirmations of the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church.

The Methodist Action Program offers a unique ministry to the Spanish-speaking persons in Wilmington. The thousands who have come to our city in recent years need the help we can provide so they can "Sing the Lord's Song in a new land." (Psalm 137:4)

2) Responding to the Goal of Strengthening Local Churches:

During an era of declining church membership in most city churches, Wilmington's United Methodist Churches have continued to witness to the Word of God. Since 1960, more than 4,000 persons have joined our city churches; over half of these commitments have been on Confession of Faith. The Sacrament of Baptism has touched some 2,100 children, youth and adults; initiating them into the Family of God under the care of the Church. Without the vital support of the Methodist Action Program this ministry of evangelism and Christian Education would have not been possible.

3) Responding to the Goal of Meeting Human Needs:

This is the day by day task of the Methodist Action Program. The Gospel of Matthew reminds us, "As you did it to one of the least of my brethren, you did it also to me." (Matthew 24:40)

Camperships are a major item each summer. In 1974 we helped 188 boys and girls to spend one week at Camp Pecometh. We also provided 401 camperships for Day Camping programs at our sites.

There are hundreds of young people who share in the after school programs in the churches and centers in the city. Tutoring, recreation, sewing and dance classes, and social events are some of the regular activities offered.

The Emergency Cupboard for food and clothing helps to feed hungry families

and clothe children. The growing number of churches which receive a monthly collection for the Emergency Cupboard helps the Methodist Action Program to assist persons in need.

IV

NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE - Ms. Mary White, Executive Director

Neighborhood House is a community center located in the heart of South Wilmington. As a Christian witness to the love and compassion of the Church for all people, it aims to:

- enhance community spirit, personal dignity and self-determination;
- provide a climate in which people of diverse backgrounds can interact and contribute to each other from their differences;
- develop indigenous leadership;
- maintain program flexibility to fulfill current needs and make the neighborhood a better place to live.

We achieve our goals with programs of direct service and social action.

Unit I. Services to Children and Families

Unit II. Recreation, Informal Education and Group Work Services

Unit III. Supplementary Educational Services

Objectives:

- to provide educational enrichment of individuals;
- to lift levels of aspiration and achievement;
- to develop higher standards of literacy and educational qualifications

Unit V. Service to the Church

Anticipated future: provide more educational information and experiences for conference churches so people of different cultural backgrounds can interact and contribute to each other from their differences; improve volunteer program; continue ongoing service to Church.

V

Delmarva Ecumenical Agency

The Board of Missions continues to fund the following projects:

1. Rural Ministries Coalition. The 1974 program included the following: Coordinated efforts to serve over 5,400 migrants. Provided counseling and referred services, medical care, health education and emergency food.
2. The Leisure Ministry operated the Ocean City Hot Line, Icthus Coffee House, Diakonia House, and the following services: worship, fellowship, legal and personal counseling.

VI

Glasgow Property

Settlement was made on land for the Ecumenical Church in Glasgow. Papers, which include the Deed are on file in the Conference Business Office. The Settlement was made on December 30, 1974, with Thomas S. Lodge, Esquire, serving as legal counsel. The property is jointly held by the Diocesan Council, Inc., Trustees of New Castle Presbytery, and the Board of Missions of the Peninsula Annual Conference. The cost of the land for the Board of Missions was approximately \$33,000.00. The size of the plot for the future church is 4 acres.

VII

Recommendations

The Board of Missions recommends the following:

- 1) Conference support of Rhodesia as an Advance Special
- 2) Conference support of Methodist Action Program and Neighborhood House as Conference Advance Specials.
- 3) A Conference-wide study of the document: "Why Global: the Local Church and World Community" written by H. Claude Young, Jr.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

Peninsula Conference United Methodist Women are in mission in their local communities, their Conference, country and foreign countries.

In addition to the thousands of dollars spent to bolster church budgets, refurbish churches and sharing in meeting community need, Peninsula Conference United Methodist Women paid their pledge to the Women's Division in full. In 1974 our pledge of \$96,500 was met and a total of \$111,908.22 was paid to the Women's Division of the Board of Global Ministries. Approximately 70% of this amount is divided equally between the World and the National Divisions while lesser amounts go to the Education and Cultivation Division, to the Retired Workers Fund and for Women's Division programs and operating expenses.

Early in 1974 a planning retreat was held for Conference United Methodist Women officers. During the two days we became a cohesive group through group building processes. We evaluated our past organization and determined the direction our new United Methodist Women's organization could go in the Peninsula Conference. We set two priority goals — to improve communications between Conference, District and local units through existing channels and to develop leadership by improving leadership training.

A workshop for Conference and District officers was held March 9, 1974 in Wesley Church Fellowship Hall, Dover, Delaware. Emphasis was on training for a more participatory style of leadership.

All of Peninsula Conference United Methodist Women officers attended the Upper Atlantic Regional School of Christian Mission at Lycoming College, Williamsport, PA May 19-24. As new officers of a new organization we felt great need for training though we missed attending our Annual Conference with regret.

On July 12-13-14 a weekend School of Christian Mission was held at Wesley College, Dover, Delaware with 64 persons in attendance. This was followed by a 5-day school attended by 106 persons. These schools were cooperative ventures with the Conference Board of Missions. Mrs. Orien Mangum served as Dean, assisted

by the Reverend John R. Owens. The Reverend Widmon Butler was Coordinator. Attendance is growing at these events. More men are beginning to participate and women are attending in increasing numbers.

The Annual Meeting was held in Queen Anne's County High School, Centreville, Maryland, on Saturday, November 2, 1974. This marked our first meeting in a school and on a Saturday. The facilities were excellent. Many employed women who had never attended an Annual meeting were present while those women who do not like Saturday meetings were not. The basic group remained about the same numerically. A display of things local women had created (banners, programs, handcraft, etc.) was very well received. Three local presidents — Mrs. Richard Holloway of Asbury Church, Salisbury, MD; Mrs. Roschen Hill of Wesley Church, Georgetown, DE; and Mrs. Diane Reddick of Manokin, MD; told of their local units' activities in a very interesting fashion.

All four districts continue to support Neighborhood House in Wilmington, DE, financially. Many volunteers from Wilmington District participate in the program there. Mary White, Director of Neighborhood House, received recognition for her ten years of dedicated service and leadership completed in 1974 at the Annual dinner meeting of Neighborhood House on February 26, 1975.

We believe that Peninsula Conference United Methodist Women are expanding their concept of mission and pray that we may continue our support wherever it may be needed.

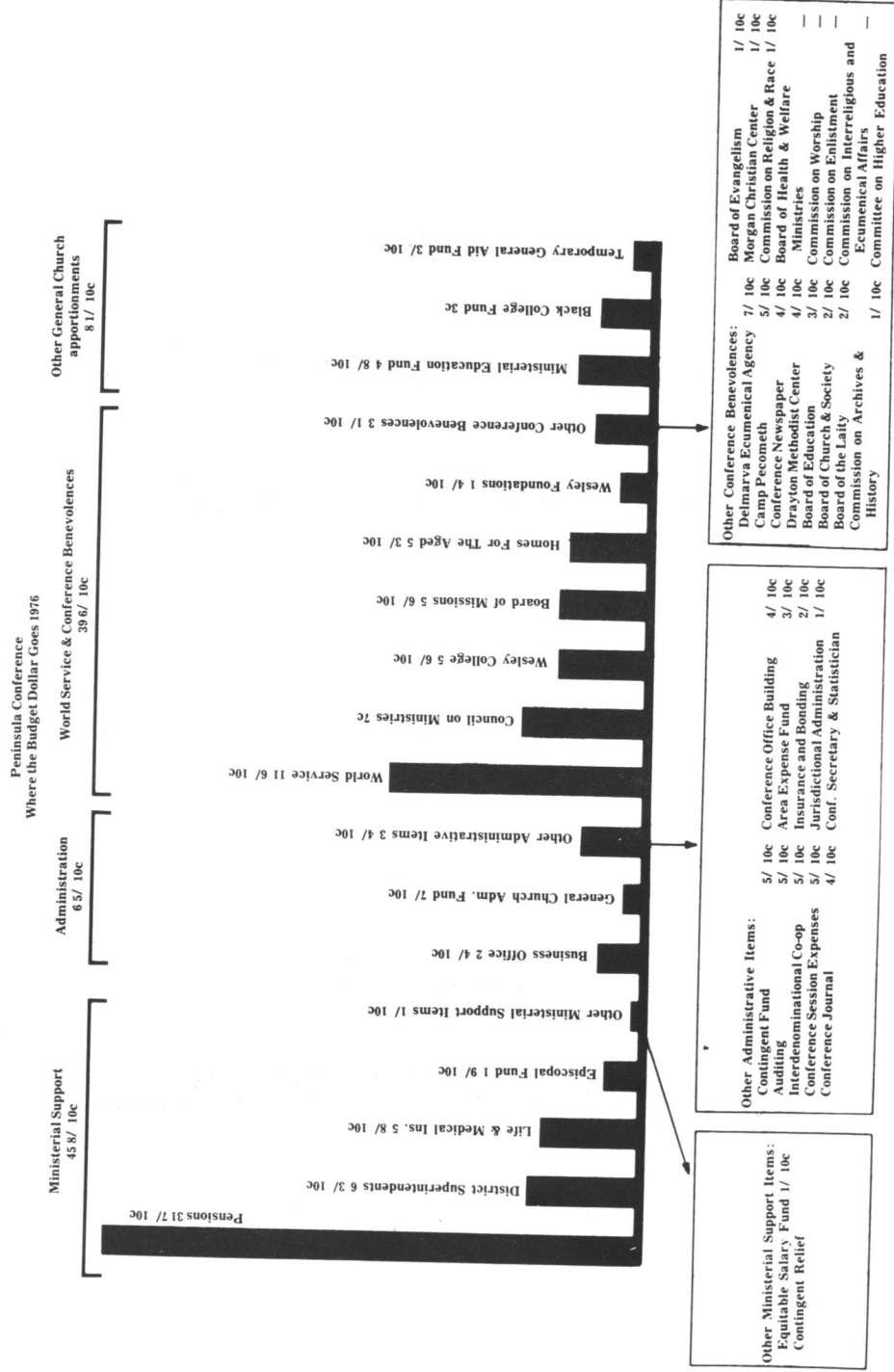

Cash

All cash receipts, as recorded in the record of cash received, were traced to their deposit in bank. Checks issued were examined for signatures, endorsements, etc. and traced to their entry in the disbursements records. Cash balances shown were reconciled with amounts reported by the depositories as of December 31, 1974. We did not test the ministers' contributions to the Endowment Fund, nor did we inspect the individual record of payments to annuitants.

Mortgages

The details of mortgage transactions during the period under audit are presented in Schedule No. 1. We have made a physical examination of the

mortgages and other related documents and satisfied ourselves as to their overall accuracy with the exception of the following:

- Houston C. Clauser — No insurance in force
- Frank G. Fetterman — No insurance in force
- Wilmer E. Pusey — No insurance in force
- Elmer C. Rohrer — No insurance in force
- Walter J. Wassmer — Mortgage clause incorrect

Other Investments

The changes in the other investments of the Endowment Fund Principal during the period under audit are shown in detail in Schedules No. 2 and 3. All securities were confirmed by direct correspondence with custodians thereof. Dividends and interest income for the period of our examination were verified by reference to accredited financial publications.

Accountants' Opinion

Our examination, subject to the comments contained herein, was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

The accompanying statements present fairly the financial position of the Board of Pensions Endowment Fund as of December 31, 1974 and the results of its operations for the period then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the prior years.

CHARLES STAILEY CLARKSON, D.D.

Charles Stailey Clarkson, son of Henry Alfred and Nannie Lucy (McCormick) Clarkson, was born April 23rd, 1905, in Laurel Branch, West Virginia. He received his A.B. degree at Berea College in 1932; his B.D. degree at the Vanderbilt School of Religion (now the Divinity School of Vanderbilt University); and his M.A. degree in 1935. In 1947 he was awarded the D.D. degree from Webster University.

While he was a student at Berea College, Dr. Clarkson had a deep religious conversion which led him to the decision to become a minister of Jesus Christ. He was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South in 1936, being ordained a deacon in 1938, and an elder in full connection in 1940. His pastorates included South Covington, Virginia, 1936-1937; Nokesville, Virginia, 1937-1939; Goldsboro, Maryland 1939-1941; Oxford, Maryland, 1941-1944; Hillcrest, Wilmington, Delaware, 1944-1947; North East, Maryland, 1947-1950, Christ Church, Wilmington, Delaware, 1950-1957; Georgetown and Delmar, Delaware, 1957-1962; Mount Salem Church, Wilmington, Delaware, 1962-1970.

Being completely dedicated to the work of his Lord, Dr. Clarkson always found time to serve on various Conference Boards and Committees. These were, Conference Board of Education, Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications, and the Conference Board of Missions. In addition to these, he was Director of Adult Education of the Wilmington District (1945-1951) and District Missionary Secretary (1952-1957).

On the 6th of April, 1937, Dr. Clarkson was married to Edith Elizabeth Powers, of Covington, Virginia. In this happy union, Brother Clarkson found a faithful helpmate and splendid co-worker with him in the ministry of our Lord. Their only child, Elizabeth May Craig, resides in Newark, Delaware. There are two grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

After his retirement, in 1970, Dr. Clarkson was teacher of the Men's Bible Class of the Christ United Methodist Church, Wilmington. It was under his leadership and guidance that the beautiful sanctuary of this church was built while he was pastor there.

During the years of his retirement, he took classes at the University of Delaware and the Delaware Technical and Community College, in Anthropology, the Arts, Personal Finance, Sociology, and Advanced Sociology. This was consistent with the kind of man he was — a man of astute scholarship and one always eager to pursue intellectual advancement. He contributed articles and devotional literature to various Methodist journals; he had sermons published in the Upper Room, Pulpit, Pulpit Digest, and other religious publications.

This writer has met few men, if any, who were more dedicated to the work of the ministry of Jesus Christ than was Brother Clarkson. He loved to preach and his sermons were always marked with intellectual depth, sincerity, and the firm conviction of Jesus Christ as the Saviour of the World. Those of us who were blessed and privileged to call him our friend and our brother were most fortunate indeed.

Dr. Clarkson was called to his Eternal Reward suddenly on the morning of Wednesday, January 29th, 1975. Funeral services were held in Wilmington,

Delaware on Saturday, February 1st. The Rev. Dr. John E. French, pastor of Avenue United Methodist Church, Milford, Delaware, conducted the service. He was assisted by the Rev. Paul E. McCoy, pastor of St. Mark's United Methodist Church, Wilmington, Delaware; the Rev. Arley B. Golden, pastor of Christ United Methodist Church, Wilmington, Delaware; and the writer, a close friend of Brother Clarkson's for nearly forty years.

IRA E. CRUM

Ira Elbert Crum was born February 15, 1896 near Greenville, South Carolina to Marion and Grace (Harrison) Crum. After losing first his mother and then his father both at a young age, he was raised by his stepmother and stepfather Laura and Thomas Glenn. He worked in a cotton mill and along with his brother went to night school. In World War I he served in the army in France and Belgium. After the war he went to Marcus Hook, Pennsylvania to live with his sister and her husband.

It was here that he met Louis Dennis with whom he attended Wesley College, in Dover, Delaware. After two years at Wesley, they both went to Wilmore, Kentucky where they completed their last year of college preparatory and then entered Asbury College. After graduating together, they went on to complete their preparation for the ministry at Asbury Theological Seminary. Each received his Bachelor of Divinity degree in June of 1935.

In 1936 Ira Crum received his first appointment in the Wilmington Conference at Burrsville, Maryland. He was ordained a Deacon in 1936 and an Elder in 1938. It was during that first pastorate that he met Mildred Elizabeth Torbert. They were married in East New Market, Maryland, October 19, 1939 by the Reverend Hugh Kelso.

Reverend Crum also served Houston, Delaware as part of the old Wilmington Conference. After it became the Peninsula Conference, he served the following appointments: Ellendale, Delaware; Willards and Stengle in Maryland; Bayside, Sherwood, Maryland; Laurel (Mt. Pleasant), Delaware; Georgetown Circuit, Georgetown, Delaware; Powellville, Maryland; Allen, Maryland; Tilghman, Maryland; and Cecilton, Maryland.

After retiring in 1961 Ira and Mildred Crum moved to Fruitland, Maryland where they became active in St. John's United Methodist Church. Even though retired, Reverend Ira Crum never stopped actively serving the Lord. He served both as Minister of Visitation for St. John's and preached every other Sunday at Union Church near Fruitland. Even after being ill and undergoing major surgery he was anxious to return to his ministry to the sick and shut-ins.

This tribute to him that appeared in the St. John's United Methodist Church newsletter sums up his life and ministry: "The Reverend Crum will be greatly missed by our congregation, most especially our shut-ins. He was a real shepherd to his flock. Surely no greater commendation could be given to the life and work of a minister than that of being called upon to serve the later years of his ministry as a visiting pastor in the church to which he had given his life. He was a good man, a good minister and a faithful exponent of the Gospel. His visitation and deeds of mercy and love left their imprint on the hearts of those who knew him. He always carried a message of encouragement to the suffering and comfort to the sorrowing. He was indeed, 'all things to all men that he might win some'."

After becoming bedridden, it was his frequent wish to be able to go to Church

again and "Praise the Lord." As was his wish we took him to Church on Sunday, February 2, 1975 where a memorial worship service was held as the last respects were paid. The congregation joined in singing "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing", "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name", the Apostle's Creed, and the responsive reading. The service was conducted by The Reverend David Baker and The Reverend Nelson Benjamin. Sung by the choir, the words of this hymn, his favorite, testify to his life for the Lord.

Oh I'd like to tell you what I think of Jesus
I have found in him a friend so kind and true
I would like to tell you how he changed my life completely
He did something that no other friend can do.

No one ever cared for me like Jesus
There's no other friend so kind as he
No one else can take the sin and darkness from me
Oh how much he cared for me.

As his granddaughter says, "He went to be with Jesus in Heaven," on January 30, after a long illness. His body was laid to rest in Wicomico Memorial Park, Salisbury, Maryland. He was the beloved husband of Mildred, father of Barbara (Mrs. Leslie Milbourne of Catonsville, Maryland) and Shirley (Mrs. Frank Radzai of San Antonio, Texas) and Pop Pop to two granddaughters, Rebecca and Deborah Milbourne. He is also survived by many nieces and nephews and several step brothers. We miss him greatly but we are consoled by the knowledge that he is happy with the Lord.

CHARLES M. ELDERDICE

Charles Martin Elderdice was born at Snow Hill, Maryland on January 15, 1886, the son of the late James L. Elderdice and Letitia Hayman Elderdice. He died in Westminster, Maryland, on May 28, 1974. His wife, Emma Norris Elderdice, died in July 1965.

Being the son of a Methodist minister, he attended public schools in various parts of Maryland and Pennsylvania. He was graduated from Western Maryland College in the class of 1904, after which he attended the Westminster Theological Seminary, graduating in 1906.

At the age of 20, Rev. Elderdice began his ministry in 1906 as a member of the Maryland Conference of the former Methodist Protestant Church, and continued with that branch of Methodism until its merger with the Methodist Episcopal Church, and Methodist Episcopal Church South in 1939.

His first pastorate was with Christ M.P. Church in Baltimore. He served two years at Christ Church, and in 1908 went to the M.P. Church in Federalsburg, where he remained seven years. After that, he served 16 months as pastor of the M.P. Church in Pittsburgh, Pa., on a temporary transfer to the Pittsburgh Conference. Following this assignment, he returned to Maryland and became pastor of Mt. Pleasant Church in Crisfield in 1916, serving there for 10 years. His next pastorate was in Westminster, Maryland, from 1926 until 1933, when he returned to Crisfield and served Mt. Pleasant Church for a second time until 1946. This was to become the pastorate he served for almost half of his 50 years in the ministry.

From 1946 until 1948 he was pastor of Calvary Methodist Church at Easton, Maryland, and he finished his ministry as pastor of the Magnolia Methodist Church, Magnolia, Delaware. As pastor of the Magnolia Church, he also had the responsibility for Bowers Methodist Church, and for Barratt's Chapel, between Magnolia and Frederica, which is known as the "cradle of Methodism". It was here in Magnolia, Delaware, that at the age of 70, and after 50 years in the ministry, he went on the retirement list of the Peninsula Annual Conference in May 1956. From that time, until May 28, 1974, he resided in Westminster, Maryland, where he died.

He had many life-long friends in all the pastorates he served, and kept in touch with them through the years until his death. He was devoted to his Church and Conference, and appreciated the opportunity to serve them for 50 years. He was also proud to have been the oldest minister in the Conference and at the top of the Chronological Roll at his death. His family, though grieved by their great loss, can join the churches he served, and the Conference, in being grateful for his many years of faithful ministry.

Funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Julian A. Tavenner, pastor of the Westminster United Methodist Church. He was assisted by the Rev. Gilbert E. Turner, retired member of the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church. Services were conducted at the Myers Funeral Home, Westminster, Maryland May 31st, 1974. Burial service was in the Westminster cemetery.

SILVANUS T. HAMBLIN

The Reverend Silvanus T. Hamblin was born August 7, 1890 near Pittsville, Maryland, Wicomico County, son of John D. and Ida Augusta Hamblin. He attended Frankford Methodist Church and Sunday School and was active in the program there. After conversion as a teenager in revival services, he joined the Bishopville Methodist Church. His early education was received at Frankford, Delaware. In 1912 he enrolled at the Wilmington Conference Academy in Dover. During his stay there, the school was renamed the Wesley Collegiate Institute. After graduating in 1918 he taught school at Viola, Delaware and served the Viola, Canterbury and Woodside Methodist Churches for one year. In 1921 he enrolled at Drew Seminary and in 1923 was ordained deacon by Bishop William T. McDowell and Bishop Herbert Welch. He was assigned to the Houston Charge and ordained elder in 1925 by Bishop Wilbur Thirkfield and received into full membership of the Wilmington Conference.

On August 19th, 1925 he married Edith May Pusey, a Wicomico County school teacher than residing near Newport, De. The ceremony was performed at the home of the Rev. Lawrence E. Wimbrow, Sr., Assistant Pastor of Grace Methodist Church in Wilmington. To this marriage a daughter, Lorna Jane, was born.

He continued to serve in the Wilmington Conference at Rehoboth, Odessa, Crapo, Fairlee, and in the Peninsula Conference; Hopewell, Wesley Chapel of Kent, Sudlersville, St. Georges-Summit, and Hopewell again in 1957. After retirement he became minister of visitation for five years at Hillcrest United Methodist Church, working first with the Rev. Howell Wilkins and then with the Rev. William Hackett. Following this, he and Mrs. Hamblin continued to reside in Wilmington and to attend Hillcrest Church.

On January 1, 1975, the Reverend S. T. Hamblin departed this life at the Delaware Division of the Medical Center in Wilmington, Delaware. Funeral services were held at the Hill, Baker, Bounds Funeral Home in Salisbury, Md. on January 4th, conducted by the Rev. William H. Revelle, Jr., Pastor of Hillcrest-Bellefonte United Methodist Church of Wilmington. Burial was in Parsons Cemetery, Salisbury, Md.

He is survived by his wife, who still resides at 303 Chestnut Ave., in Wilmington, and by their daughter, Lorna Jane Miller and two grandchildren who reside in Stroudsburg, Pa.

I count it a joy and privilege to have known this devoted man of God. His gentle humor and fine Christian character endeared him to all. GEORGE THOMAS JACKSON

George Thomas Jackson, son of the late George H. and Henrietta Green Jackson, was born in Port Penn, Delaware, on August 15, 1890, and departed this life on Tuesday, March 18, 1975.

He was reared in the atmosphere of Sunday School and Church — the Saint Daniels Methodist Episcopal Church of Port Penn. He was converted as he entered college in 1908, and became a member of his native church when he returned home for Christmas vacation in the same year. After graduation from college — Delaware State, in Dover — he became active in his "home" church, and was a member of the committee that interceded in obtaining the present building, formerly occupied by a white congregation.

He served as principal of the elementary school for Negroes, in Saint Michaels, Maryland, and Delaware City, Delaware. He was also instructor in animal husbandry and agriculture at the Cheyney (Pa.) Normal and Industrial Institute — now Cheyney State Teachers College.

George felt unmistakably the call to the Christian ministry, and, answering the call, he completed the courses required for admission to the ministry of the (now) United Methodist Church. His pastorates included Nassau and Rehoboth Beach, Delaware; Buttonwood and Christiana, Delaware; New Rochelle and Ossining, New York; and Snow Hill, Maryland.

During his pastorates Brother Jackson was active in civic affairs wherever he served. He served several years as president of the Worcester County (Maryland) Branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, and was a member of the Interracial Commission on Integration of Worcester County Schools. He was secretary of evangelism of the Philadelphia District, Delaware Conference, four years; the Salisbury District, four years, and secretary of Evangelism for the Delaware Conference, three years. These positions required that he be called to various sections of the country on numerous occasions.

Being a cabinet maker and carpenter, he improved each church and parsonage where he served, often doing the work with his own hands and without pay. Among his foremost achievements was purchase of the parsonage at Ossining, New York, and its being paid for in half the time required, and the responsibility of the survey of the proposed church at Dunleith, Wilmington, De. (Coleman Memorial).

He was married to the late Catherine Mae Barkley of Nanticoke, Md., in December, 1915. To this union three sons were born, two of whom preceded him in death. Catherine passed away in 1941. Through a mutual friend he met Odelle Gray, to whom he was married in 1942. He was a devout husband and father. Every morning family prayers were said, when George "talked with his heavenly Father as a man speaks with his friends."

In 1962 he retired from the active ministry, blindness having "afflicted" him. But blindness was really no affliction to George. He preached right on — and taught right on — for 13 more years. All who knew him will remember him for his loyalty to his Lord and Master, and for his faithfulness to his friends.

Surviving are his devoted wife, Odelle, one son, three grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, and many more distant relatives and countless friends.

Ordained an Elder in the Wilmington Annual Conference, Myers served churches in Pittsville, Maryland; Christiana, Delaware; Newport, Delaware; Grace Church and St. Paul's Church in Wilmington, Delaware; Cannon, Delaware; and Cecilton, Maryland where he was serving at the time of his death. In World War II he served as Chaplain in the United States Army from 1941 to 1946. When the United States Air Force Chaplaincy was formed he returned to active duty serving from 1947 until his retirement in 1959 with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

Following a disability leave from the United Methodist Church he helped to form and was the charter minister of the First Christian Church of Wilmington, Delaware, and for three years served as chaplain at the Glen Mills School for Boys in Glen Mills, Pennsylvania.

Death came in a tragic automobile accident October 27, 1974. He was buried with full military honors in Arlington National Cemetery, Washington, D.C. on October 31, 1974 with his close friend and former Chief of Air Force Chaplains, Major General Charles I. Carpenter officiating. Memorial services were held at his last pastorate, Zion United Methodist Church, Cecilton, November 10, 1974 conducted by the Reverend G. Wayne Cuff and J. Gordon Stapleton.

SAMUEL ABRAHAM SNYDER, JR.

Samuel Abraham Snyder, Jr. was born at Centre Hall, Pennsylvania, on October 3, 1910, and died in Caroline County, Maryland, on September 9, 1974. The years of his life are characterized by a deep commitment to Christ and distinguished service to his fellowman. "Sam," as he was affectionately known to his many friends, was decidedly ecumenical in his outlook and used to say with some pride and humor that he had been a member of three denominations without ever leaving the church he was born into. Beginning as a member of the Evangelical Church, he was successively an Evangelical United Brethren and a United Methodist through denominational mergers. His friendships and working associations, however, bridged any boundaries imposed by race or creed; and the more than three hundred persons who attended the service in his memory in Dover on September 15, 1974, represented a true cross section of the total community.

Named for his father, who was a minister of the Central Pennsylvania Conference of the Evangelical Church, Sam credited the influence of a Christian family as "the strongest factor in my call." He said his father "obviously enjoyed

the work of a minister of the Gospel" and his mother, Hattie Dora Maice, "ably supported him as a devoted church worker."

Sam was licensed to preach by the Central Pennsylvania Conference of the Evangelical Church in March of 1931, the same year he graduated from the John Hopkins University. In 1934, he received his B.D. from Graduate School of Theology, Oberlin College. He served churches in Jersey Shore, Bloomsburg, and Montoursville, Pennsylvania before he was married to Margaret Ellen Beard of Brickerville on June 22, 1940. "Sam" is survived by his wife, "Peg" who now makes her home in Newmanstown, Pennsylvania, and by his three brothers, H. Elstun Snyder, P. Stanford Snyder, and William H. Snyder, and two sisters, Doretha M. Dietz and Grace S. Gasull.

MELVIN E. WHEATLEY, SR.

Melvin Ernest Wheatley was born near Federalsburg, Md. August 13, 1883, the son of James J. and Eliza (Williams) Wheatley. He received his public education on the Eastern Shore and graduated from the Wilmington Conference Academy (now Wesley College) in 1908 as president of the senior class. He then took courses preparing him for the ministry and was ordained in 1910.

When her parents became ill, Ruth returned to Wilmington and worked eight years as a secretary for the Du Pont Company. After her parents' death, Ruth became employed by the Department of State, U.S. Foreign Service, as a Staff Officer, serving as an Executive Secretary fourteen years in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; Lisbon, Portugal; New Delhi, India; and Bonn, Germany. One of her inspiring experiences was being chosen in 1966 to accompany President L. B. Johnson and his diplomatic staff on their visit to New Zealand, Australia and Bangkok.

Ruth became ill in 1973 and moved to Brookside, De., where she died of cancer May 8, 1974. An inspiring Memorial Service was held in the Kingswood United Methodist Church May 9, and the funeral service the next day, both conducted by her minister, The Rev. Edward B. Blevins.

Surviving Ruth are two nieces and four nephews; a sister, Mrs. Wilmer E. Abbott, Sr., and a brother, the Rev. Harry Hanson Conner, both of Wilmington.

VIII.

CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

Rule 1. The Conference shall meet at 9:00 A.M. and adjourn at 12:30 P.M. But the Conference may, in its discretion, alter the time of meeting and adjournment.

Rule 2. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his appeal.

Rule 3. All resolutions, motions, amendments and substitute motions presented to the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.

Rule 4. When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule 5. The motion to Lay on the Table, or to Take from the Table, and for the Previous Question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule 6. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:

- (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn.
- (2) To adjourn.
- (3) To take a recess.
- (4) To lay on the table.
- (5) For the previous question.
- (6) To postpone to a given time.
- (7) To refer.
- (8) To substitute.
- (9) Amendment.
- (10) To postpone indefinitely.

A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received, which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.

Rule 7. When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him.

Rule 8. No member shall be interrupted while speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule 9. When a member desires to a question of privilege, he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.

Rule 10. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 11. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.

Rule 12. No member shall absent himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule 13. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule 14. Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons, shall excuse him.

Rule 15. It shall be in order for him to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.

Rule 16. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending on seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.

Rule 17. All reports of the Boards, Commissions and Committees shall be published and mailed to the Members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary thirty (30) days prior to such Session.

Rule 18. No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.

Rule 19. These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.

Rule 20. All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Secretary not later than three (3) days after adjournment of the Annual Session or it shall be excluded.

Rule 21. The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.

Rule 22. Recommendations as to the change in format and policy regarding data to be included in the Journal shall be referred to the Conference Council on Ministries for study and recommendation before action by the Conference.

Rule 23. That no member of any Board, Committee, or Commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrenniums on said Board, Committee or Commission and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one Quadrennium has elapsed except members of boards, committees or commissions elected for three year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be reelected until after one term has lapsed and except that when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term he may complete the unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. No member of the Conference, lay or ministerial shall be elected to serve on more than two Boards, Committees, or Commissions concurrently, except the committees elected or appointed for the Annual Conference session only, district committees whether or not elected by the Annual Conference and the quadrennial committee on the local church. The distribution of membership shall be according to Districts three laymen and three ministers as nearly as possible to each District.

Rule 24. Lay members of the Annual Conference will be elected quadrennially. A lay member may be re-elected for another quadrennium, but must wait one quadrennium before being eligible for election for a third time.

Rule 25. In order to achieve balanced membership in the Annual Conference, the Conference Secretary shall report quadrennially the number of lay persons required to preserve equality of membership, and that the Peninsula Conference achieve the desired equality of membership, by (1) the associate lay leader of Lay Life and Work, the four District Lay Leaders, the four District Presidents of the United Methodist Women, all United Methodist Deaconesses active and retired within the bounds of the Peninsula Annual Conference, all certified Directors of Christian Education employed by churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and all other voting lay persons of the Conference Council on Ministries, shall be members in the Annual Conference with vote; (2) each pastoral charge enrolling more than 500 members, but having only one clergy member appointed to it, may elect one additional lay member, and further, that a pastoral charge having more than one clergy member appointed to it may elect one additional lay member, provided that more than 1,500 members are enrolled; and (3) the Conference Council on Youth Ministries shall elect as many youth members as are needed to maintain a balance, divided equally among the districts.

Rule 26. All budget requests must be referred to the Council on Finance and Administration prior to Annual Conference action.
