

RULES AND GUIDELINES FOR THE CONFERENCE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

A

- That the Peninsula Conference again record its faith in the Principle of Rotation and adherence to the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church.
- 2. That the Mominating Committee be composed of the Cabinet, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Lay Leader, the Lay Leader of each District, the Conference President of United Methodist Men, a representative selected by the United Methodist Women Executive Committee, the District Presidents of United Methodist Women, a youth selected by the Conference Youth Council, one ministrenumber appearance from each District to be elected Conference Council Director.
- 3. That, since the quadrennial system is an established part of the United Methodist economy, all members of boards, commissions, and committees shall be elected for a quadrennium unless restricted by Discipline, charter, or some other legal requirement. In the event of such legal restrictions, the Principle of Rotation is still to be observed. That for the 1988-93 time period, persons elected to Boards and Agencies of the Peninsula Annual Conference at the Annual Conference of 1988 will serve for a quinquennium (1988-1981) of the Peninsula Annual Conference of 1988 will serve for a quinquennium (1988-1981) the the next change in leadership in 1993 following the Jurisdictional Conference of 1992 when Episcopal leadership changes occur.)
- 4. That no member of any board, committee, or commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said board, committee or commission and shall not be eligible to be reelected until after one quadrennium has elapsed, except members of boards, committees, or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has elapsed and except to be re-elected until after one term has elapsed and except of the committee of the
- 5. That no member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall serve on more than two boards, commissions, or committees concurrently. Ex-officio membership on conference boards or agencies in excess of two shall count toward the total of two. The following shall not be under the Conference rotation system nor counted in the above total: district committees or secretaries, Wesley College Trustees, Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundations, Board of Trustees of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., the Episcopal Residence Committee, and the Committee on Investigation. In the case of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Nominating Committee is to request the courtesy of the bishop to inform it as to those persons who will be named to the Board of Ordained Ministry, in order to assist the Nominating Committee in equal distribution of responsibility on the part of the Conference ministry members. The Nominating Committee will consider membership on the Board of Ordained Ministry as one of two memberships permitted to each minister.

- Insofar as possible, the membership on Councils, Boards, and Agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen, in keeping with policies for general church agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry.
- 7. That ministerial membership on Annual Conference boards and agencies shall be limited to Conference members and associate members of the Peninsula Annual Conference. In order to be eligible to serve on the Conference boards and agencies, lay members shall be members of a local church within the Annual Conference. The Conference Nominating Committee may select other persons as affiliate members without vote.
- "In recognition of the Rights of the Aging" as stated in the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church (Page 98 of the 1988 Book of Discipline), age shall not be a barrier to serve on any board, council, or agency of the Annual Conference. However, the Conference Nominating Committee shall give careful attention to assuring that younger members of the Conference are given full opportunity for service.
- 9. That a conscientious effort shall be made to distribute membership geographically. No fixed number shall be assigned, however, to any one district, since this could become artificial and impractical. Consideration shall be given to the inclusion of lay and clergy persons from small membership churches.
- 10. That one representative of the Program Management Team shall be selected to serve on each Conference board and on all other support agencies except where the Book of Discipline states otherwise.
- 11. That failure to attend the particular board or agency to which one is assigned for at least one called meeting during the year, without written explanation, or statement of intended activity to the chairperson of that board or agency, one will be subject to automatic removal in the next nominating committee's report. A report of the board or agency chairperson to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee by March 1st will include the attendance record of this board, committee or agency.
- That the Conference Nominating Committee designate persons to 12. serve as Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, and Secretary for Boards, Commissions and Committees. Boards and Committee members will be notified in advance of their officer nominations. The Program Management Team Member assigned to each unit will convene the first meeting and present the nominations of officers. Additional nominations may be received from the members of that unit. The officers elected at the meeting shall serve for the quadrennium. *Except where the Book of Discipline directs otherwise, the Vice-Chairperson will succeed the Chairperson in the event of a resignation. The board or commission shall elect a new Vice-Chairperson.

The following Criteria for Leadership shall be used in the selection of Chairperson:

- Willingness to commit time as required by the position.
- Willingness to commit time for training for the 2. responsibilities of the office. 3.
 - Have an understanding of and a willingness to support the polity of the United Methodist Church.
 - A demonstrated leadership ability in the local church. 4.

- That the date of election to any board, commission or committee be clearly indicated in the journal.
- 14. That in every case a nominee of any board, commission or committee shall be notified and consent to serve before the name is placed before the Conference. When vacancies occur in the report, nominations may be made from the floor, provided that the nominee is present and agrees to serve.
- 15. That recognizing again the belief in the principle of rotation in order to involve greater leadership, all district committees and officers shall be elected to four-year term waximum eight and the state of the state of the state of the committee of the principle of the state of the state of the state of the principle of the bistrict Committee of Ordained Miniatry and the District Committee on Church Building and Location which shall serve a minimum of four years and a maximum of eight years.

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Concerning the Nominating Committee, its report and the securing of talent:

- That the report of the Nominating Committee at the Annual Conference session will reflect a complete adherence to all the guidelines established by the Annual Conference.
- The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.
- 3. That forms shall be circulated for both ministers and laity in local churches to indicate areas of interest, thus creating a falent Bank. In addition, the same form shall be sent to the members of the Cabinet, Board of Laity, Conference United Methodist Women, Executive Committee, and Conference Youth Council in order to obtain names that might otherwise be overlooked. These forms shall be returned to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee.
- 4. That a complete file of all ministers in the Conference should be kept indicating where each one is serving in terms of Conference boards and agencies. Laity should likewise be listed on a similar file. A third file would be divided between ministers and laity as part of the Conference Talent Bank.
- 5. That a minimum of four meetings per year should be held by the Nominating Committee (it may be advisable that the committee meet more often, since its influence is so broad; whenever the committee approaches a new quadrennium, this latter need for additional meetings may be more evident).
- That the above adopted guidelines for the Nominating Committee of the Annual Conference shall become a printed part of its report at each Annual Conference session.
- 7. That at the beginning of a new quadrennium, a complete and open look at membership on all boards and agencies shall be initiated by the Conference Nominating Committee and all personnel shall be eligible for re-alignment in accordance with A-5.

Titles such as "Mrs," "Miss," or "Mr." shall not be used in the preparation of the Nominating Committee report.

Miscellaneous

- That the council director, and associate council directors, not be elected to boards and aspecies under the Conference rotation, but serve only as ex-officio where assigned by the council director.
- That two high school youth (preferably in the 18th and 11th grades) shall be members of all program boards of the Conference Council and on the Conference Council on Ministries on assignment by the Conference Youth Council.

Others may want to take this route and we outline here the steps involved in case you may not be aware of the procedure.

(1) All salary and conference apportionments are removed.

(A) ALI SALBY and conterence apportionments are removed.
(2) The church drops out of the listing of churches to which pastors are assigned.
(We urge the conference to begin a listing of such churches in the journal with the charge conference where they are to report each year. This will allow for proper records and constitutes the historic continuity of these churches.)
(3) The only services to be held are weddings, funerals, or special consains.

(4) One or more special services a year may be held with the offering received to be used for the upkeep of the building.

(5) The remaining members are transferred to a nearby United Methodist Church for regular worship and church involvement.

(6) The remaining members become a special committee under the charge conference to plan with the pastor for weddings, funerals, and special days. They also present a written report each year as to services held, money received and how

expended, etc.

7) This allows the possibility that should population shifts bring people into the area we would simply resume recular services.

THE PROCESS OF MAKING APPOINTMENTS

Par. 57, Article X - The bishops shall appoint, after consultation with the district superintendents, ministers to the charges; and they shall have such responsibilities and authorities as the General Conference shall prescribe.

Article X, quoted above from the 1988 Discipline, is the primary authority for itinerancy in the Constitution of The United Methodist Church. (The Constitution can only be changed by 2/3 vote of the 74 Annual Conferences. All other Discipline paragraphs quoted in these pages are in Part IV, Organization and Administration, and require only a majority vote of the analysis of the property of responsibility and authority and the property of their ordination and Conference membership vows, and all United Methodist churches are by covenant and law so committed.

Par 437 - The Itinerant System - The itinerant system is the accepted method of The United Methodist Church by which ordained ministers are appointed by the bishops to fields of labor. All ordained ministers shall accept and abide by these appointments.

Par. 538 - Responsibility - Pastors and clergy in appointments beyond the local church shall be appointed by a bishop, who is empowered to make and fix all appointments in the episcopal area within which the Annual Conference is a part. Appointments are to be made with the consideration of the gifts and graces of those appointed, to the consideration of the fifts and graces of those appointed, to the institutions, and with faithfulness to our commitment to an open itinerancy. Open itinerancy means appointments are made without regard to race, ethnic origin, sex, color, or age, except for the provisions of mandatory retirement. Through appointment-making, the connectional nature of the United Methodist system is made visible.

Par. 412.2 - Both men and women are included in all provisions of the Discipline which refer to the ministry.

Per. 531 - Consultation and Appointment-Making - Consultation is the Piccess whereby the hishop and/or district superintendent confer with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, taking into consideration the criteria of Per. 532, a performance evaluation, needs of the appointment under consideration, and mission of the church. Consultation is not merely notification. Consultation is not committee selection or call of a pastor. The role of the P.P.R. is advisory. Consultation is both a continuing process and a more intense involvement during the period of change in appointment. Consultation is not negotiation or voting upon the appointment of a pastor. It is information sharing and advice to the cabinet and bishop prior to the bishop's fixing the appointment. (Par. 531.1)

Par 533.1 - Process of Appointment-Making - 1. A change in appointment may be initiated by a pastor, a Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, a district superintendent, or a bishop.

Pastor-Parish Relations chairpersons and/or pastors are asked to make such requests by using the evaluation formhich is required to be sent annually to the district superintendent by January 15th. (See "Timeline for Appointment-Making" - \$2.) The Pastor-Parish Relations Committee is to represent the charge in the appointment-making process. The chairperson is the designated officer

through whom the charge contacts the district superintendent, and through whom the district superintendent contacts the charge.

Par. 533.2 - The Bishop and the Cabinet shall consider all requests for change and the gifts and evidence of God's grace, professional experience, and family needs of the pastor.

Par. 533.3 - When a change in appointment has been determined, the district superintendent should meet together or separately with the pastor and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee where the pastor is serving, for the purpose of sharing the basis for the change and the process used in making the new appointment.

This meeting will provide the pastor the opportunity, in the presence of the district superintendent, to declare his/her acceptance of the change of appointment, stating his/her reasons for responding to the new opportunity and thereby to facilitate the grief process for the pastor and for the congregation.

Par. 533.4 - All appointments shall receive consideration by the bishop and the district superintendent(s) and the Cabinet as a whole until a tentative decision is made.

We interpret this to mean that all appointments require the participation of the entire Cabinet. This is to insure that all ministers of the Conference are considered whenever there is an opening.

Par. 533.5 - The process used in making the new appointment shall include: a) The district superintendent shall confer with the pastor about a specific possible appointment (charge) and its congruence with gifts, graces, professional experience and expectations, and the family needs of the pastor identified in consultation with the pastor (Par. 532.2).

Only "open" charges (churches) shall be considered by the Cabinet. A charge (church) becomes "open" by virtue of its pastor's retirement, change of appointment, leave of absence, sabbatical leave, disability, location, death or withdrawal from the United Methodist ministry. In certain present pastor and the knowledge ich agreement of the present pastor and the knowledge ich agreement of the Relations Committee, may declare a charge "open" for appointment purposes.

Par. 533.6 - The district superintendent shall confer with the receiving Pastor-Parish Relations Committee about pastoral leadership (Par. 532.1).

Par. 533.7 - When appointments are being made to less than full-time ministry, the district superintendent shall consult with the minister to be appointed and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee regarding Proportional time, salary, and pension credit.

Par. 533.8 - If during this consultative process it is determined by the bishop and Cabinet that this decision should not be carried out, the process is to be repeated until the bishop, basing his/her decision on the information and advice derived from consultation, makes and fixes the appointment. Par. 533.9 - A similar process of consultation shall be available to persons in appointments beyond the local church.

Par. 533.10 - When the steps in the process have been followed and completed, the announcement of that decision shall be made to all parties directly involved in the consultative process; that is, the appointment Cabinet, the pastor, and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee (of both charges) before a public announcement is made.

Par. 532 - Criteria - Appointments shall take into account the unique needs of a charge in a particular setting and also the gifts and graces of a particular pastor. To assist bishops, Cabinets, pastors, and congregations to achieve an effective match of charges and pastors, criteria must be developed an analyzed in each instance and then shared with pastors and congregations.

- Congregations the district superintendent shall develop
 with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committees of
 all churches profiles reflecting the needs, characteristics,
 and opportunities for mission of the charge consistent with
 the committee of purpose (Par. 522.1). These
 profiles shall be reviewed annually and updated when
 appropriate to include:
 - The general situation in which a congregation finds itself in a particular setting: size, financial condition, quality of lay leadership, history.
 - The convictional stance of the congregation: theology; prejudices, if any; spiritual life.
 - c) The ministry of the congregation among its people for the sake of the community: service programs, basis for adding new members, reasons for losing members, mission to community and world, forms of witness.
 - d) The qualities and functions of pastoral ministry needed to fulfill the mission and goals of the congregation.
- Pastors The district superintendent and the pastor shall identify the pastor's gifts, graces, and professional experience and expectations, and also the needs and concerns of the pastor's spouse and family.
 - a) Spiritual and personal sensibility: personal faith, call and commitment to ordained ministry, work through the institutional Church, integration of vocation with personal and family well-being, life style.
 - Academic and career background: nature of theological stance, experience in continuing education, professional experience, record of performance, age.
 - c) Skills and abilities in church administration, leadership development, worship, liturgy, preaching and evangelism, teaching and nurturing, counseling and group work, ability to work in cooperation, and ability in self-evaluation, and other relational skills.
 - d) Family situation: health and educational needs of the family, and the spouse's career.

Par. 534 - Frequency - While the bishop shall report all pastoral appointments to each regular session of an Annual Conference, appointments to charges may be made at any time deemed advisable by the bishop and Cabinet.

Appointments are considered "fixed" until changed. They are reviewed and reported annually but not "made" annually.

Par. 269.2.f.8 - (The duties of the Bastor-Parish Relations Committee shall include the following:) To confer with the pastor and/or other appointed members of the standard partor (s) will be served by a change the standard partor (s) will be served by a change district superintendent, and the bishop in securing clergy leadership. Its relationship to the district superintendent, and the bishop in securing clergy leadership. Its relationship to the district superintendent and the bishop shall be advisory only.

It is also vital that the committee understand that its relationship to the district superintendent and bishop is advisory only, and that it is to represent the needs of the entire charge. Members of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee must understand how the itinerant system of The United Methodist Church functions to fulfill their responsibilities faithfully.

Per. 269.2.e - The committee...shall meet only with the knowledge of the pastor and/or the district superintendent. It may meet with the district superintendent without the pastor being present; however, when the pastor is not present, the pastor, or any member of the staff under consideration, shall be informed prior to such a meeting and immediately thereafter be brought into consultation either by the committee or by the district superintendent.

Par. 269.2:f.3 - (The duties of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall include the following: To evaluate annually the effectiveness of the pastor and staff, based upon criteria, processes, and training developed by the Board of Ordained Ministry and Cabinet (Par. 445), and, where applicable, the Board of Diaconal Ministry.

Par. 444 - Evaluation - Evaluation is a continuous process which must take place in a spirit of understanding, acceptance. 1. The pastors in local churches shall receive evaluation

annually from the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations for use in an ongoing effective ministry and for identifying continuing education needs and plans (Par. 269.2f[2], using criteria, processes, and training developed by the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Cabinet.

The district superintendent will evaluate annually the pastors' effectiveness for ministry (Pars. 423.1b, 520, 733.2n,o), using criteria, processes, and training developed by the Cabinet and the Board of Ordsined Ministry.

2. Clergy serving in appointments beyond the local church will undergo annual evaluation by their immediate supervisors, engage in annual self-evaluation, and include copies of these evaluations in the annual report submitted to the bishop, district superintendent, and the Board of Ordained Ministry (Par. 443,2a).

NOTES ON RETIREMENT

Handatory Retirement - Pastors who attain the age of 78 before July 1 must retire as of July 1 of that year (Par-451.1).

- Voluntary Retirement Voluntary retirement is available to those who attain the age of 65 or complete 40 Conference years of service before July 1 [Par. 451.2.c].
 - Voluntary retirement is also available at a reduced annuity rate to those who attain the age of 62 or complete at least 35 Conference years of service before July 1 (Par. 451.2.b).
 - A pastor may also retire after 28 Conference years of service with benefits beginning the first of any month after the session of Annual Conference in the year which the minister attains the age of 62 before July 1 (Par. 451.2.a).

ALL MINISTERS WHO QUALIFY FOR VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT MUST INDICATE IN WARTING BY JANUARY 15 THEIR INTENT TO ACTIVATE THIS OPTION; Otherwise, the Cabinet will assume their continued eligibility for appointment. The annual self-evaluation form may be used for this purpose.

TIMELINE FOR APPOINTMENT-MAKING

- FALL AND EARLY WINTER: District Superintendents make an informal inventory and evaluation of their charges (churches) and pastors, including a review of the criteria (Par. 532). They are available for consultation (Par. 531) with Pastor-Parish Relations Committees and pastors, and, in some instances, may initiate such contacts. The official contact person for the charge is the chairperson of the charge Pastor-Parish Relations Committee.
- 2. JANUARY 15: DEADLINE FOR REQUESTS for change of appointment, including retirement. By January 15, Pastor-Parish Relations chairpersons and/or pastors are asked to make their requests and recommendations to the Cabinet by using the annual evaluation form. The reason(s) a change appears to be desirable shall be included (Par. 269.2.f.8). Initiating a request for change is not to be interpreted as an automatic guarantee that a change will be made. All requests will be treated with integrity by the bishop and Cabinet (Par. 533.1). Persons planning retirement must also observe the above date. Notification of intention to retire must be in writing. (See "Notes on Retirement").
- 3. PEBBUARY: Cabinet needs to begin the appointment-making process. Requests for change will be carefully reviewed. When neither the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee nor the pastor has made a request, the Cabinet, however, has the prerogative of initiating changes of appointment which are deemed to be for the good of the charges or the pastors or the program and missional stategy of the Conference.
 - a) "Open" charges (churches) will be determined, (see commentary under Par. 533.5) and the district superintendent will meet with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee to gather all available data about the charge and its pastoral needs (Pars. 532 & 533.2) and present pastoral support including parsonage compliance with Conference policies.
 - b) The Cabinet determines which available pastor best fits the needs of the charge (Par. 533.2). Note: The present pastor

is to remain neutral in all appointment proceedings concerning his/her successor.

- c) The district superintendent of the "open" charge contacts the prospective pastor and consults with him/her, supplying essential data and information about the "open" charge, community setting and time frame for the prospective pastor: sresponse.
- d) When the pastor-designate is determined, the district superintendent then contacts the chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee of the "open" charge and arranges a time for the pastor-designate and the committee to meet. This meeting is an introduction of and to the pastordesignate and not an interview. The district superintendent will preside at this meeting.

The purpose of the meeting is:

- To aid the district superintendent and the Cabinet, through consultation, in their responsibility to the appointment process.
- To verify the appropriateness of the proposed appointment, matching local needs and pastoral aptitudes.
- To initiate the process of getting acquainted with the pastor-designate.
- To arrange for the moving and receiving of the pastordesignate and his/her family.

The district superintendent will bring the meeting to a close with an appropriate summary of his/her insights and understandings. It is understood that barring prohibiting factors which may become apparent in the conversation with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, the pastor-designate will be appointed to the "open" charge.

e) When the results of the meeting have been shared with the Cabinet and the appointment has been fixed by the bishop, public announcements shall be arranged through the office of the district superintendent (Par. 533.18).

NOTE: The meeting of the pastor-designate with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee may not always be possible for pastors receiving their first appointment following seminary.

- 4. FEBRUARY MAY: Using the above process, the Cabinet will arrange for the appointments to be reported to the Annual Conferences (Par. 532.18). The list of appointments will be published in the Conference paper prior to the Annual Conference session, and publicly announced at the Annual Conference session along with additional changes and corrections.
- 5. JULY 1: Changes of appointment become effective.
- 6. POST-COMFERENCE: The district superintendent will meet with the new pastor and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee for post-Conference role clarification to help facilitate the new shared ministry of charge and pastor. This meeting will be held at a mutually agreeable time.

 DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT AVAILABILITY: The district superintendent is available to Pastor-Parish Relations Committees and pastors for consultation at any time it is deemed appropriate.

VII. Business of the Annual Conference A. Daily Proceedings

Executive Session - At 1:25 p.m. Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel convened the Executive Session in the Student Development Center at the University of Maryland, Eastern Shore in Princess Anne, Maryland. The Opening worship was led by the Rev. Douglas Ridley, the Rev. Jerrold Knotts led in the sincing of the hymne.

By action of the body, the following guests were granted the privilege of participating in the Executive Session: The Rev. Mary Krause and the Rev. Tom Starnes of the Baltimore Conference, the Rev. Karen Hittel of the Western North Carolina Conference, and Elders who are Associate Members of the Annual Conference

The Rev. Dr. F. David Weber, Registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry, distributed the report entitled "PART II PRFRTAINISO TO ORDAINED MINISTERS AND LOCAL PASTORS". This report may be found in its entirety under the Disciplinary Questions in this Journal.

Under Question 31 and 38(a), Dr. Weber presented the following candidates for Full Connection and Ordination for Elder:

The Rev. Ridley then presented the following recommendation:

The Board of Ordained Ministry recommends to the Peninsula Annual Conference that the provision requiring probationary members to serve "full-time under episcopal appointment in a local church, not in appointment beyond the local church, in the Peninsula Annual Conference" be dropped, and that we quideline in this matter, 124, 1988 Book of Discipling quideline in this matter.

After discussion, it was approved.

After an opportunity for questions, all of the above were approved.

Under Question 28(a) and 37(b), Dr. Weber presented the following candidates for Probationary Membership and Deacon's Orders:

Donald Leroy Godwin Barbara Ann Britt Loper The Bishop welcomed the newest Full members to the itinerant fellowship and they were greeted with enthusiastic applause.

Dr. Weber presented Robert Benjamin Otchere, who will be ordained here at the request of The Methodist Church of Ghana. He was approved.

Bishop Yeakel led the session through the balance of the report, making corrections, additions and editorial changes as needed. The entire report was approved by the body.

The Rev. Ridley presented the following policy recommendations:

. PSYCHOLOGICAL TESTING AT CANDIDACY

The Peninsula Annual Conference requires all persons seeking to enter the itinerant ministry to undergo a psychological assessment as a part of the requirement for District Committee on Ordained Ministry certification as a Candidate for Ordained Ministry, the first step toward conference membership and/or titnerant ministry.

2. LOCAL PASTOR LICENSING SCHOOL

A. The Peninsula Annual Conference requires all persons to be appointed as pastors, either probationary members or local pastors, to complete the local pastor's licensing school by or at the time of their first appointment.

b. The Peninsula Annual Conference will pay the tuition cost of the local pastor's licensing school for all persons sent from our conference.

3. TRANSFERS IN AS PROBATIONARY MEMBERS/DEACONS

A pastor transferring into the Peninsula Annual Conference as a probationary member/deacon shall be required to serve under appointment in the Peninsula Annual Conference for two years before being eligible for full membership and elders orders.

4. SUPERVISION BY COUNSELING ELDERS

For the purpose of supervision in preparation for ministry, the Peninsula Annual Conference requires that a counseling elder be assigned to all local pastors (except those who, upon completion of the five year Course of Study, elect to remain in the local pastor relationship, as either full-time or part-time local pastors) and probationary members.

5. SCHOLARSHIPS FOR MINISTRY STUDENTS

A. Persons receiving scholarship support from the Peninsula Annual Conference through the Board of Ordained Ministry for the purpose of completing the minimum educational requirements for ordained or diaconal ministry shall satisfy the repayment requirement by serving full-time in the Peninsula Annual Conference for a period of three years, upon completion of the educational requirements, or by repaying the money to the Peninsula Annual Conference over a three-year period.

B. As an affirmation of our connectionalism, persons who complete the three-years of full-time service in another annual conference of The United Methodist Church shall have satisfied the requirement for repayment, with no expectation on the part of the Peninaula Annual Conference of receiving remuneration from the other annual conference.

6. CONTINUING EDUCATION

The Peninsula Annual Conference shall require all clergy to obtain eight Continuing Education Units (CEU's, with one CEU being defined as ten contact hours or ten hours in a formal setting with an instructor(s) each quadrennium, as fulfillment of para. 445, 1988 Book of Discipline.

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After discussion it was approved in its entirety.

The policy for Continuing Education was presented:

POLICY GUIDELINES FOR CONTINUING EDUCATION

- CONTINUING EDUCATION is a structured educational or spiritual event, supplementing a basic theological degree (M. Div. or equivalent).
- II. CONTINUING EDUCATION UNITS (CEU): One CEU is awarded for each ten (18) contact hours or equivalent, in an organized continuing education event or self-study program authorized by the Peninsula Annual Conference Board of Ordained Ministry (BOOM) through its Committee on Continuing Education.
 - A. A contact hour is a 50-minute classroom session or equivalent.
 - B. Non-structured individual or collective settings must include Board-approved evaluation instruments.
 - Research, Reaction papers, Critiques, Logs, Journals, Written Reports.
 - 2. Documents shall be sent to: Registrar of the Continuing Education Committee.
 - C. Eight Continuing Education Units (CEU's) per quadrennium. A CEU is ten (18) contact hours or ten (18) hours in a formal setting with an instructor or instructors. For the 1989-1993 quadrennium, it will be required that 4 of the 8 CEU's be earned in units. It is highly recommended that clergy spend one week (five consecutive days), in one continuing education event per quadrennium.
- III. CERTIFICATION OF CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT shall be given for structured events as well as individual and small group study programs approved by the BOOM, including:
 - A. Events accredited by General, Jurisdictional, and Annual Conferences (i.e. Drayton Manor)
 - B. Doctor of Ministry programs and CEU's granted by approved seminaries.
 - C. Sabbaticals and Study Leaves of more than one month.

- D. Retreats and Study-term Educational opportunities (educational, but non-promotional).
- E. CEU's granted by accredited agencies for programs in other disciplines.
- F. Continuing Small-Groups Organized for Study
- G. CEU's granted by theological seminaries certified by the University Senate are accepted without further approval
- IV. GENERAL GUIDELINES FOR INDIVIDUALIZED PROGRAMS: Formal continuing educational programs normally operate according to various executions of criteria which are governed by established institutions criteria which are governed by identify certain criteria for individualized spiritual programs and study experiences and to secure written approval from the Continuing Education Committee prior to the event.
 - A. An Individual Education Program should include:
 - 1. Specific educational objectives.
 - Administration procedures verified by second person's affidavit.
 - 3. Evaluation instruments.
 4. Annotated bibliography.
 - 5. Written summary evaluation.
 - B. An Individual Spiritual Program may be designed around:
 - An Individual Spiritual Program may be designed around:
 Spiritual Formation and Growth.
 - An Area of Need identified by the applicant or his/her PPRC.
 - Travel Programs documented by: Stated objectives, Annotated bibliography, Itinerary, and Daily Journal. (see Section II)
 - C. Small Groups Organized for Study are to address the following:
 - 1. Identify the kind of topics to be covered.
 - Identify learning disciplines, objectives and methods.
 - Participants--Who are involved in the group?
 Format--How often will the group meet? In what
 - setting?

 5. Accountability -- How is the group
 - administered/coordinated?
 6. Reporting--provide supporting documents,
 - Reporting--provide supporting documents, curricula, projects, etc.
 Negotiation--CEU's granted only after prior
 - Negotiation -- CEU's granted only after prior negotiation with BOOM Continuing Education Committee.
- V. CONTINUING EDUCATION UNITS WILL NORMALLY NOT BE GIVEN FOR:
 - A. Board or committee meetings and orientation sessions.
 - B. Annual Conference and other meetings, unless specifically authorized CEU's.
 - C. Mass media programs (unless integral to a larger educational program).

VI. AVAILABILITY OF CONTINUING EDUCATION EVENTS:

Clergy needing help in locating opportunities for appropriate continuing education events, contact the Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee.

VII. Funding

- A. The Peninsula Conference Board of Ordained Ministry recommends that the local charge budget \$580.80 per year for each minister's continuing education and that this be excluded from the apportionment base and salary and included as a line item in the Journal.
- B. In addition to this funding from the local church, clergy may apply to the Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee for financial assistance.

VIII. Accountability

- A. Paragraph 445.5 of the 1988 Discipline states: "Pastors shall be asked by the district superintendent in the Charge Conference to report on their programs of continuing education for the past year and plans for the year to come. The district superintendent shall also ask the local church to describe its provision for time and financial support for the pastor's program of continuing education."
- B. Clergy shall report their Continuing Education Units to the Registrar of the Continuing Education Committee.
- C. Clergy who have not accumulated 8 CEU's in a quadrennium shall appear before a Review Committee for accountability and further assistance for CEU planning.
- D. Read The Discipline, 1988, paragraph 423.2(d).

The Executive Session was adjourned by Bishop Yeakel at 3:00 p.m.

Monday Afternoon - May 22, 1989

"Gathering In": The Conference joined in the singing of "Come, We That Love the Lord" after which the Rev. Dr. P. Thomas McKelvey, the host District Superintendent, invited the members to share what they are doinn to serve God in their communities.

PLENARY SESSION: Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel convened the fiftieth session of the Peninsula Annual Conference and recognized the Conference Secretary, the Rev. Gary L. Moore, who offered the following Organizational and Procedural Moting

- A. The bar of the Conference include the seating on the three center sections of the auditorium, excluding the left and right sides.
- B. The printed program be the program of the Conference subject to necessary changes.
- C. The roll call be taken by all members signing cards to be turned in at the registration desk at the time of

registration, or if late, registering with an usher or an assistant secretary.

- D. Charges with only one Lay Member have the name of the Reserve Member's name typed on the same badge with the Lay Member's name. When a Reserve Member is to take the place of a Lay Member, the badge for the Lay Member will be brought to the registration desk. The attendant there will hold the Lay Member's badge and type another badge for the Reserve Member. Before the Lay Member can go back into the session the Reserve Member's badge must be returned.
- E. Charges with more than one Lay Member will not have any Reserve Member's name typed on the same badge with the Lay Member's name. When a Reserve Member is to take the place of a Lay Member, the badge for the Lay Member will be brought to the registration desk. The attendant there will hold the Lay Member's badge and type another badge for the Reserve Member. Refore the Lay Member can go back into the session the Reserve Member's badge sust be returned.

- J. The Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees as printed in the <u>Journal</u> become the Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and <u>Committees</u> of the Conference, with such corrections, as may be needed.
- K. All motions be presented to the Secretary on forms provided for this purpose prior to or at the time they are presented to the Conference. Forms will be found on the Secretary's desk and are also in the hands of the ushers.
- L. Resolutions not appearing in the Pre-Conference Booklet be in the hands of the Secretary by Noon on Tuesday. Copies sufficient for distribution to the Conference must be submitted.
- M. When the customary draft is received from the United Methodist Publishing House it be endorsed and given to the Conference Treasurer.
- N. The Reverend Connie Metzger be named reporter for United Methodist Information and Publications, other church papers, and press contact with the secular communications media.

The officers elected at the meeting shall serve for the quadrennium.*Except where the Book of Discipline directs otherwise, the Vice-Chairperson will succeed the Chairperson in the event of a resignation. The board or commission shall elect a new Vice-Chairperson.

The following criteria for Leadership shall be used in the selection of Chairpersons:

1. Willingness to commit time as required by the position.

2. Willingness to commit time for training for the

responsibilities of the office.

Bishop Yeakel called each one forward with their spouses to be recognized by the Conference and to receive their Certificates of Appreciation. The Conference stood to its feet and gave an enthusiastic ovation.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT: The Bishop explained the rationale behind the amendment as it impacts the fast growing United Methodist churches in the Central Conference.

On Friday evening, May 6, 1988, at a session of the General Conference of The United Methodist Church held in St. Louis, Missouri, the following Constitutional Amendment was made by a recorded vote of 783, yes; 85, no; 3, abstaining. It is now presented to the Annual Conferences for vote.

In Section VII, Paragraph 35, Article I, insert the following words:

In the Annual Conferences of the Central Conferences, the four-year participation and the two-year membership requirements may be waived by the Annual Conference for young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age. Such persons must be members of the United Methodist Church and active participants at the time of election.

If voted and so declared by the Council of Bishops, Par. 35 would then read:

The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the disconal ministers, the conference president of United Methodist Women, the conference president of United Methodist Women, the conference lay leader, district lay

leaders, the president or equivalent officer of the conference young adult organization, the president of the conference youth organization, and two young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age from each district to be selected in such manner as may be determined by the Annual Conference. In the Annual Conferences of the Central Conferences, the four-year participation and the two-year membership requirements may be waived by the Annual Conference for young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age. Such persons must be members of The United Methodist Church and active participants at the time of election. Each charge served by the annual conference of the time of election. Each charge served by the ministerial to the conference of t

If the lay membership should number less than the ministerial members of the Annual Conference, the Annual Conference shall, by is own formula, provide for the election of additional lay members to equalize lay and ministerial membership of the Annual Conference.

A standing vote was taken. The result was res - 364, No - 8;

COMPERENCE GUESTS: Bishop Yeakel introduced to the Conference Members, the Rev. Mary Krause, pean of the Baltimore Conference Cabinet, the Rev. Thomas Starnes, the Program Director of the Baltimore Conference and the Rev. Dr. William A. Holmes, our Conference Preacher and Pastor of Metropolitan Memorial United Methodist Church in Washinaton, D.C.

DISTRIBUTION OF APPOINTMENTS: The Bishop directed the ushers to distribute the Appointment List, to become effective July 1, 1939. He led the Conference through the list, making corrections and additions as needed.

The session concluded with prayer by Bishop Yeakel.

Monday Evening - May 22, 1989

EUCHARIST/MEMORIAL SERVICE: The service was held in the Ella Fitzgerald Center for the Performing Arts, beginning at 7:38 p.m. The celebrant was Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel and the preacher was the Rev. Harvey G. Chase, pastor of Waugh United Methodist Church, Cambridge, Maryland. Assisting were, the Rev. Dr. P. Thomas Rev. Dr. True D. Wood III.

The Anthems were offered by a Mass Choir from the Salisbury District, under the direction of Dr. Douglas I. Smith, Director of Music, Bethesda, U.M.C. Salisbury. The organist was Mr. Taylor Harvey of Asbury, U.M.C. in Salisbury. The servers were ordinands and each of Conference clergy. The ushers for the evening were laity from across the Salisbury District.

PLENARY SESSION: Bishop Yeakel reconvened the Conference at 8:38 a.m. inside the Ella Fitzgerald Center.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS: Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel began his address by talking about his file entitled "5-1 Stuff". He then proceeded to unpack the file for us.

I. Anniversaries

This year marks many anniversaries for us as a church family and for the Yeakel family. The Bishop then spoke of the birth of their third child on May 23. That this marks the 25ist year since Wesley's Aldersgate experience and 259 years since his experience with the Moravians and field preaching. This is the bicentennial of the meeting of Bishops of Asbury and Coke with the newly elected President of the United States, George Washington. It is the 1037d year since the founding of the University of Maryland, Eastern Shore (formerly Delaware Conference Academy). He noted that this is the 50th year of the founding of the Peninsuia Conference

The Bishop then probed further about the present situation of the Conference. Are we 59 years old or 124 years old? Are we 285 years old or 21 years old? What do we want to say about ourselves today with the name we use? Is it now time to reconsider the issue and think about a new name for the Conference?

He continued by noting that 65 years ago the United Methodist Building in Washington, D.C. was consecrated to the task of influencing the moral life of our country. It sits near the Capitol Building and was constructed before the Supreme Court Building.

Paul Phillips was asked to stand. He was an active member of the Methodist Protestant Church during the 1939 merger talks and a member of the Peninsula Conference today. The Bishop spoke further of how on April 25, 1939 in Kansas City that representatives from the Methodist Episcopal Church, South and the Methodist Protestant Church methodist Protestant Church methodist Protestant Church methodist Protestant Church service to paid. With all that has happened, we need a definitive study on what has happened in the former Delaware Conference churches since 1965.

II. The Church in Today's World

The Bishop told of his boyhood trip to the New York World's Fair where he experienced many of thee new things that would later become major influences on American Society, especially, television. While in New York, he took from his YMCA room, the "Do Not Disturb" sign. He reminded us that we want to hang it outside out life's door. But with the drug and alcohol abuse at our doorstep, we need the church to be a sign that says with the Apostle Paul, "There is a better way." God has put us here to be a serving people in the midst of a great need. He then reminded us of Wesley's words: "Do No Marm, Do God with one another; you have," and Jesus' commandment is to love one another;

III. General Conference

He lifted up four pivotal actions that the Conference made in our life together. The first is what we mean by the term "Minister." It is every person who is a baptized and confirmed disciple of Jesus Christ.

The second is the new Hymnal. He recognized the work and skill of the Rev. Dr. Laurence H. Stookey who served faithfully and tirelessly on the Hymnal Revision Committee. The Bishop then challenged the pastors to study its liturgy, in order to be adequately prepared to lead others in worship. He offered it to all of us for our private as well as our public worship. Turning to Mesley's Instruction on Singing, he level by the United Methodist Publishing House for the Council on Bishops Service of Dedication.

The African University was the third emphasis. It is the last missionary challenge in our generation. It came of the needs of the African churches. They had asked, "We have our own saints, why not our own university?" It is anticipated to open this Fall.

IV. Annual Conference Events

The Bishop noted that rain stopped as soon as we arrived from the Eastern Shore to Annapolis for the Celebration of the Church at the Naval Academy and that it started again when we returned to the other side.

He expressed his and his wife's pleasure upon their arrival to our Conference for the time remaining them until the 1998 Jurisdictional Conference.

The Bishop spoke about the Appointments. They are not complete but would be very soon. He then spoke of how the 1976 General Conference determined that appointments are made (fixed) until changed; that they are not remade for every pastor at every Conference. He reaffirmed that the appointive process is based on the best possible person available. Each person is not available each year.

He expressed thanks to the Camp Pecometh Campaign Committee

for their work and reminded the Conference that there is still a lot of work ahead as the program continues under a different structure.

Next year's Annual Conference is expected to be here on June 1-4, a weekend with ordination on Sunday evening. He thanked the Rev Dr. P. Thomas McKelvey and his staff for their preparation in arranging for this year's conference.

The Rev. Connie Metzger introduced Mr. John Lovelace, who shared the story of how the United Methodist Reporter Institute for Church Communications was started to improve the local church's newsletter and public communications. He also shared the challenge facing church communications today. He closed with the statement that the ministry of communication is what makes all other ministries possible and wieible.

Bishop Yeakel called Dr. Ruth Laws forward, who introduced the Board's five-year emphasis called "Shalom" and also introduced the officers. Ms. Sally Milbury Steen presented the following

CHRISTIAN FAITH AND DISARMAMENT

We recognize the current situation which is described as a "nuclear dilemma," presents the possibility that, referring to Isaiah's prophery of a faithful remnant [Isa. 7), there may not be a remnant left.

But we also recognize our own responsibility to act, on the basis of our faith, to establish alternatives to war as outlined in the Social Principles and "The United Methodist Church and Peace."

In order to fulfill our obligations to witness to God's hope for the future, we pledge ourselves to these actions:

We, as United Methodist Christians, must build the conditions for peace through development of confidence and trust between peoples and governments. We stand unalterably opposed to those who would instill hate for one people and nation in the people of another nation. As a world-wide church, we recognize in Christ the unity of all humanity. There must be no hatred between sisters and brothers. We must seek out and struggle against any attempt to instill hatred of any, whether a country, people or a national symbol.

United Methodist and other Christians must recognize that conflict can be alleviated by accepting the validity of political and economic systems in other countries, and by pledging to work to eliminate attempts to impose systems developed in countries other than their own. That recognition is a necessary first step toward stopping the threat to one system by the government of the other.

Disarmament and peace depend upon all nations discovering a prophetic vision of justice and tranquility, as well as the intentions of the Preamble of the U.S. Constitution.

THERFORE, we call upon the Peninsula Annual Conference of The Peninsula Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church to establish justice ministries committed to appreading scriptural holiness and reforming the land. Justice requires exciptural holiness and reforming the land. Justice requires competition of racism, powerty and violence, and the energence everywhere of reconciliation. For that

FURTHERMORE, we call upon members and congregations of the Peninsula Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church to work to influence public policies which will bring about peace with justice.

The resolution was adopted by the Conference.

The Rev. Ronald Bell introduced the following resolution with an editorial correction suggested by the Bishop:

A RESOLUTION ON POVERTY AND ECONOMIC JUSTICE

Whereas, the 1988 General Conference of The United Methodist Church called upon The United Methodist Church to establish justice ministries committed to spreading scriptural holiness as reforming the land:

Whereas, justice requires the end of racism, poverty and violence, and the emergence everywhere of reconciliation;

Therefore, be it resolved that we reaffirm the 1984 resolution in reference to "Advocacy to the poor" as printed in the 1988 Book of Resolutions.

Advocacy for the Poor SP 73.F.

Whereas, we recognize the harsh reality of the serious crisis facing a large segment of our society, and are confronted with the fact that there have been billions of dollars in federal cutbacks borne by the poor, which have resulted in tremendous suffering and hardship for millions of women, men, children, elderly, and families in the United States; and

Whereas, the pastoral letter from the Council of Bishops, November 14, 1982, said: "As Christians we acknowledge that implicit in the faith of the Church is a mandate for action. It is not enough to experience deep distress over the plight of the hungry and hopeless victims of the economic crisis." The gospel demands that we manifest our love for Christ through our efforts to relieve the the burden of the current economic catastrophe and increasing social injustices; and

Whereas, the private sector has been unable and/or unwilling to respond effectively to the needs of the poor and oppressed people in our communities;

Therefore, in solidarity with the pastoral letter from the Council of Bishops, we call upon The United Methodist Church, at all levels, to be a reconciling force in this time of economic distress and to be an advocate for the poor and oppressed people of all nations, acting with a sense of justice, compassion, understanding and God's presence.

We furthermore call upon members and congregations of tthe United Methodist Church to work to influence public policies which will bring about greater economic justice.

It was adopted by the conference.

Dr. Ruth Laws introduced the following resolution:

RESOLUTION AFFIRMING A DIVERSITY OF LANGUAGE USAGE IN THE UNITED STATES AND OPPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT MAKING ENGLISH THE OFFICIAL LANGUAGE

Whereas, the United States is a land whose inhabitants are enriched by diverse traditions, language, land cultures:

Whereas English is the commonly used or primary language of the country, and there have always been other language present throughout the history of the nation;

Whereas, in recent years there have been renewed efforts in different parts of the country to make English the official language of the nation--national legislators have received more letters about this issue than any other one in the last ten years. (Eric Schmidt, "As the Suburbs Speak More Spanish, English Becomes A Cause," New York Times, February 26, 1989, p. 6E);

Whereas, these efforts and their implications are another metastation of the systemic racism which has infected this country for generations—the English-only movement blames the deterioration of the American fabric on immigration and the use of languages other than English;

And because as Christians, we believe that we are children of God, created in God's image, and members of the family of God;

That we believe that diversity is a gift of the creative genius of God and that languages are an expression of the wisdom of God;

That we believe competence in the English language is important to participate fully in the life of the United States, but that we also live in a global context, the global Family of God, where people and nations experience interdependency at all levels;

That we believe our nation needs to take advantage of the rich contributions that the ethnic/language groups bring to this country by preserving those languages and encouraging North Americans to learn other languages.

That we believe it is the will of God that each human being is affirmed as a whole person and that it is in the acceptance and interchange of our uniqueness that we find Oneness--total wholeness--Shalom:

Therefore be it resolved that we condemn the attempt to rob a person of his/her language as dehumanizing and as a denial of that person's wholeness;

Be it further resolved that we condemn the English-only movement as a manifestation of the sin of racism;

And that The Peninsula Annual Conference shall:

1) Express in writing to the President of the United States its

support for practices and policies which permit provision of information in languages appropriate to the residents of communities and its opposition to the movement which seeks to make English the

only language of the United States, which movement is discriminatory and racist:

- Forward this resolution to members of Congress, governors and the legislatures of the two states encompassed in this Annual Conference:
- Commend this resolution to all boards and agencies of this conference for promotion and interpretation within their jurisdictions; and;
- Ask the Board of Church and Society to make this resolution an urgent item in their agenda for lobbying, constituent education and advocacy.

Debate was suspended for the ORDER OF THE DAY.

ORDER OF THE DAY: PREACHING.

The Division of Worship led the Conference in a worship service centered on John Wesley's heart-warming experience. The Rev. Dr. William A. Holmes preached on "Aldersgate: Wesley in Discovery." He stressed that what you believe about yourself in relation to God makes all the difference in the world.

At the close of service, the Conference recessed for lunch at 12:15 p.m.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON - MAY 23, 1989

Bishop Yeakel reconvened the Conference at 2:00 p.m. with the singing of the hymn, "He Touched Me."

ORDER OF THE DAY: CAMP PECOMETH CAMPAIGN.

The video, "It's Time for Tomorrow," which was prepared for the campaign, was shown to the Conference members.

The Committee joined Ms. Kay P. Cloud on the stage as she shared the latest campaign results and led the Conference in a Litany of Thanksgiving.

Ms. Cloud then made the enabling motion for the establishment of the Pecometh Campaign Continuation Committee:

"I move the implementation of the Continuation Program which calls for the establishment of a Pecometh Campaign Continuation Committee to operate under the Conference Council on Ministries."

It was adopted by the Conference.

Ms. Cloud introduced the Rev. Dr. R. Jervis Cooke, who was given the gavel as the new Chair of the Pecometh Campaign Continuation Committee. He began his remarks with, "Its time for tomorrow!" He proceeded to outline how this Committee would function, and

introduced the Rev. William Hemphill, the new Campaign Director.

Bishop Yeakel expressed his thanks to Ms. Cloud and the Committee for their excellent service.

Bishop Yeakel recessed the Conference for the evening meal.

WEDNESDAY MORNING - MAY 24, 1989

MORNING WORSHIP: Beginning at 8:88 a.m., in front of the Ella Pitzgerald Center for the Performing Arts, lay and clergy members of the Conference led us in worship with the Rev. Charles E. Barton preaching.

PLENARY SESSION: Bishop Yeakel reconvened the Conference at 8:33 a.m. and introduced the Rev. Dr. James Faltot, who presented the following resolution:

REAFFIRM OPPOSITION TO CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

Whereas, the latest General Conference of the United Methodist Church reaffirmed its opposition to capital punishment (see the 1988 edition of The Book of Resolutions, particularly pages 468 and 469); and;

Whereas, human beings on death row within our states face an increasing probability of being executed at any moment;

Therefore Be It Resolved, that the Peninsula Conference reaffirm strongly its position against capital punishment;

Be It Finally Resolved, that the Peninsula Conference's Board of Church and Society take a more active role in the development and implementation of a plan of action to impact capital punishment legislation in both Delaware and Maryland.

"And Be It Finally Resolved, that the Board of Church and Society take an active role in developing alternatives to capital punishment including, but not restricted to, methods of rehabilitation and ways to reintroduce these persons into society as responsible citizens."

Bishop Yeakel recognized Mr. W. J. Clark, who offered this amendment as a substitute for the last paragraph:

"And be it finally resolved that the Board of Church and Society take an active role in developing alternatives to capital punishment including, but not restricted to, methods of rehabilitation and ways to reintroduce these persons into society as responsible citizens."

The Rev. Faltot offered to amend the substitution by adding the Clark Amendment to the original resolution. It was pass by the Conference.

The resolution now reads:

REAFFIRM OPPOSITION TO CAPITAL PUNISHMENT

Whereas, the latest General Conference of the United Methodist Church reaffirmed its opposition to capital punishment (see the 1988 edition of The Book of Resolutions, particularly pages 468 and 469); and

Whereas, human beings on death row within our states face an increasing probability of being executed at any moment;

Therefore Be It Resolved, that the Peninsula Conference reaffirm strongly its position against capital punishment; and;

Be It Resolved, that the Peninsula Conference's Board of Church and Society take a more active role in the development and implementation of a plan of action to impact capital punishment legislation in both Delaware and Maryland.

And Be It Finally Resolved, that the Board of Church and Society take an active role in developing alternatives to capital punishment including but not restricted to methods of rehabilitation and ways to reintroduce these persons into society as responsible citizens.

The resolution was adopted as amended.

Bishop Yeakel clarified the initiating group for the Peninsula Annual Conference is the Board of Church and Society.

The Rev. Faltot introduced the following resolution:

RESOURCES FOR AIDS EDUCATION

Whereas, the virus which causes Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) has proven itself to be a deadly killer of children, women and men: and

Whereas, the AIDS virus is being carried and may be transmitted by millions of persons world-wide; and

Whereas, the AIDS virus is known to be transmissible through exchange of blood, seemen or vaginal fluids or other suspected bodily fluids of the carrier; through sexual intercourse (anal, oral or vaginal); by injection of a contaminated hypodermic needle; or transfusion/contamination with infected blood, or organ transplant; and

Whereas, massive efforts will be required to change the behaviors that result in continued transmission of the virus, and to care for victims who develop AIDS or AIDS-related Complex (ARC);

Therefore be it resolved, that the 1989 Peninsula Annual Conference directs the Board of Church and Society and Global Ministries to continue providing the Annual Conference and local churches with equipping resources to carry out a multi-faceted effort of education and awareness for all, including school-age children, particularly the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency of Wilmington, Delaware and the Health Support Ministries of Salisbury, Maryland; legislative lobbying at federal, state and local levels; and direct ministry to persons who have been or may be exposed to or infected with the AIDS virus; and

Further be it resolved, that the Peninsula Annual Conference:

- utilize the resources developed by the General Boards or other organizations such as the National Council of Churches or the United States Public Health Service; or
- 2) continue developing its own resources; and
- make these resources available to their own churches as quickly as possible.

Further be it resolved, that these efforts and resources

- be explicit and clear in describing AIDS virus and the process of its transmission;
- 2) promote the prevention and treatment of AIDS and ARC;
- educate the public about the needs of the victims of AIDS and ARC:
- encourage clergy and laity to continue participating in direct ministries with human immune virus victims and their families. (Adapted from the resolution of the same name adopted by the 1988 General Conference. See Book of Resolutions, 1988, pp. 188-189)

The Bishop recognized the Rev. Clifford A. Armour, who offered to amend by adding to the first "Further be it resolved ...l)"

"including those special worship resources for use with persons who are HIV positive and developed by Deidra Kriewald and Jervis Henry and introduced at the United Methodist Consultation on AIDS Ministries."

It was adopted.

The Rev. Armour offered a second amendment by adding the second "Further be it resolved 4)" these words in place of "human immune virus victims and their families".

"persons who are HIV positive and their families and welcoming persons who are HIV positive into the fellowship and worship of our congregation."

It was adopted. The amended resolution was adopted by the Conference.

The Rev. Louis Timmons presented the following resolution:

ADVERTISEMENT OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

"Mhereas, drugs and alcoholic beverages cause a tremendous amount of pain, suffering, and destruction of body, mind, and family; and is a major contributing cause in many different criminal activities ranging from rape and incest to robbery and burglary;

whereas, the United Methodist Church has historically encouraged abstinence from alcohol as a faithful witness to God's liberating and redeeming love for persons; and the Church also strongly supports measures designed to curb the abuse of drugs;

Whereas, we commend recent federal laws requiring a warning to prospective mothers and the general public of the dangers of alcohol use on beverage containers;

whereas, we are deeply concerned that the advertisement of alcoholic beverages; particularly on television and radio, presents a false and misleading picture of the beneficial social effects from the consumption of alcohol;

Therefore be it resolved, that Peninsula Annual Conference call on the national TV and radio networks, cable television industry, and local stations to voluntarily ban all advertising of alcoholic beverages. (Similar banning of tobacco products on the airwaves has produced a beneficial social effect.)

Be it further resolved that, in the event a voluntary ban is not undertaken, then we direct the Board of Church and Society to lobby for federal legislation to end all advertisement of alcoholic beverages on radio and television.

Be it further resolved that, we encourage all Peninsula Annual Conference United Methodists and other persons of moral persuasion and judgment:

- 1) to support the effort to ban the advertising of alcoholic beverages on radio and television and to exercise
- all possible influence to deter the illegal use of drugs and the misuse of over-the-counter and prescription drugs; and
- to solicit the support of all U.S. Senators and Congresspersons in banning the advertisement of alcoholic beverages on television and radio.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Harold Walton, who moved to amend by adding a new "Be it further resolved":

"Be it further resolved, as a witness to our good faith in the establishment of this resolution, that the agencies of the Peninsula Annual Conference shall abstain from using, encouraging, or allowing the use of beverage alcohol."

The amendment was amended and approved.

The Rev. Louis Timmons presented a second resolution:

SUBSTANCE ABUSE

Whereas, we recognize the awesome proportions of the epidemic nature of drug and alcohol abuse within our society. In the face of this problem, we affirm that all members of the Christian family are called to be partners with God, and God's effort to make the world a home for the human family. Our most practical realization of this is to love our neighbor. We cannot claim with integrity that we are fully engaged in love of neighbor unless all of the members of the Peninsula Annual Conference are effectively engaged in the effort to heal the pain of the victims and remove the insidious manifold root cause of this tragedy.

Whereas, we affirm that the root cause of drug and alcohol abuse comes in people, not in crack vials or bottles. With this thought in mind we ask that the leadership of each local church, intentionally and forthrightly impliment within their respective communities the bold measures already formulated and approved by the 1988 General conference (Book of Resolutions pp. 198-281).

Whereas, this resolution, in clear terms, gives a comprehensive definition of every means and form of chemical abuse. In each case, it lists the elemental cause and effect of abuse and offers practical remedial suggestions.

Whereas, its central thrust, in the prophetic struggle against all forms of addictions, is to call us to affirm the richest part of our Wesleyan heritage. That is, to live out the reality of sanctifying grace by assuming the obligation to seek the healing and justice in society that will alleviate the social conditions which contribute to and issue from alcohol and all other major forms of drug abuse.

Therefore, we urge all local churches to prayerfully study and implement the measures which General Conference has placed within our hands.

It was adopted the the Conference.

The Rev. Mark Palmer presented the following resolution:

BAN ON SEMI-AUTOMATIC ASSAULT WEAPONS

Whereas, every human being, made in the image of God, is inestimably precious, and we must do everything in our power to protect human life;

And whereas, in 1984 and 1985, 62,897 people were killed in the United States by firearms - a higher death toll than U. S. deaths during the entire eight and a half years of the Vietnam War, (April 1889 Advocate);

And Whereas, the sales of the Chinese version of the Soviet AK-47 have leaped from four thousand in 1985 to forty thousand in 1988 (April 1989, Advocate). And these and similar assault rifles are designed not for hunting but for war, and can be purchased across the counter in many states with no waiting period or background check-

Therefore, we call upon the United States Government to continue the national ban on the importation of semi-automatic weapons, and establish a national ban on the sale and possession of such weapons with reasonable limited exceptions. We also desire legislation that would require the registration of all assault weapons now in circulation, and a thorough background check for any sale or transfer

It was adopted.

Bishop Yeakel called Dr. Roberta K. Tarbell to the front of the Conference to present a resolution for Hockessin U.M.C.:

ONE CHURCH * * * ONE PAMILY

RESOLUTION PROPOSED BY THE HOCKESSIN UNITED METHODIST CHURCH FOR ENDORSEMENT BY THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE, MAY 1989

We propose a resolution for the conference which would provide for the implementation of a two-year program whereby every church in the Peninisula Conference would sponsor one homeless family. What you are asked to vote on has no financial package tied to it. You are asked to endorse a concept that could grow and flourish conference wide, and even possibly nationally and internationally. Ways and means to implement the idea for each church are a separate insue to be dialogued within the COM of individual charges and the COM and their commissions on Evangelism, Missions, Outreach, and Pamily Ministry.

All of us as human beings and certainly as Christians have felt compassion for the homeless living in cars, alleys, and bus and train stations. We all realize that everyone is vulnerable to such seemingly hopeless situations. All of us can identify with people in our society whose pay check is not sufficient for house payments or who is temporarily between jobs. A homeless family could be one or two people who might thrive on a room or two. Procuring a long-term first's month's or the deposit rent or supplemented monthly rental costs. The key to change between homeless and housed might be furnishings or help with repairs.

We propose a Two-Step Plan:

1. 1989-1998 Explore the many possible means by which each church could supply a home--provide a rental deposit or supplement, fix up a run-down house, share an "extra" house owned by a congregant, or supply other needs so that scarce income could be used for housing. If, for example, a church felt either that their members could not extend their financial commitments, it could pair itself with another church so that both churches could work

together to sponsor two families with one providing non-monetary support. The first year, then, would be to accept the challenge in a foristian spirit to think creatively how, in a people-to-people action, we together could solve this tremendous international problem and to coordinate with existing programs so as not to duplicate efforts. A conference wide committee appointed by the conference Council on Ministries and nature of possible ways one church could

sponsor one homeless family and write guidelines pooling creative ideas and documenting factual data for local churches to use as a resource.

2. 1998-1991 At the Annual Conference in 1998, the guidelines of the CCOM and the Ad Moc "One Church--One Family" Committee would be discussed and voted on. Those churches which had not creatively implemented sponsorship during the first year of exploration would do so during the second year, aided by suggestions in the quidelines.

A homeless family, temporarily "out of sync" with society, usually has more than the one problem of no home. Most churches have members with some expertise in one or more of the following areas who could counsel and work with the homeless when appropriate on legal matters; educational questions (job training, tutoring, positive re-enforcement for youth); substance abuse; temporary physical or mental health problems; long-term handicapping conditions; marriage and family counseling; day care for children, the handicapped and the elderly, spiritual support; crisis intervention (tape, crime, physical abuse); transportation difficulties; clothing, training and appliance procurement and the country of the c

Our ultimate idea is to mobilize the church to help the homeless on spersonal a level as possible. One conceivable outcome could be a presentation of a successful ongoing proven program to the General Conference in 1992. A relatively simple idea—EVERY CHURCH IN THE NATION (IN THE WORLD) CAN ALLEVIATE THE PROBLEMS OF ONE HOMELESS PAMILY—could with a minimum of bureaucracy go a long way to solving a major problem of the twentieth century.

It was seconded and after a brief discussion which recognized that it was calling for a task force under the Conference Council On Ministries, it was adopted.

The Rev. James Faltot concluded this portion of the Conference Agenda by sharing the Biblical Notion of Shalom, which is wholeness of body and soul, God and us, and, us and us, and by making the Conference aware of the local church workshop on August 16---Making Peace With God's Creation."

BOARD OF PRESIONS: Bishop Yeakel called the Rev. Olin Shockley, President of the Board, forward who directed the Conference; attention to the report in the Pre-Conference Booklet and offered the following motion: The Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions recommends that:

- 1. The Past Service Rate for 1998 be \$248 per year of
- Each Charge is encouraged to observe Retired Minister's Day, in honor of the retired ordained ministers and their spouses, and the surviving spouses of ordained ministers that reside in the area of your parish.
- 3. It is recommended that the President of the Conference Board of Pensions be notified when a death or disability occurs in the family of an active or retired ordained minister or full-time local pastor so that contact with the family can be made to inform and assist them in obtaining their

Numbers 1. 2 and 3 were adopted.

Rev. Shockley presented the "Resolution Relating To Rental/Housing Allowances For Retired Or Disabled Ministers of the Peninsula Annual Conference."

Ms. Kay Cloud offered to amend the first line of "Now Therefore Be It Resolved: by changing the word "equal" to "up." It was approved by the Conference.

Now the resolution reads:

RESOLUTION RELATING TO RENTAL/HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED OR DISABLED MINISTERS OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

whereas, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of The United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that he Peninsula Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of their Conference; and

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. An amount up to 188% of the pension payments received by a retired minister, or 188% of the disability benefit payments received by a disabled minister, during the year of 199% be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of the United Methodist Church with the property of the Peninsula Annual Conference at the time of his or her retirement or disability.
- 2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of The United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of the United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension or benefit for the United Methodist Church for such that the contributions to the pension or benefit for the distance of the United Methodist Church for such for the United Methodist Church for such that the Church for the Church for such that the Church for the Church for

ORDER OF THE DAY: CORPORATE SESSION OF WESLEY COLLEGE.

Bishop Yeakel summoned Mr. Gilbert S. Scarborough, Jr., Chair of the Board of Trustees, who called the session to order. He introduced the Trustees present and the Rev. Dr. Edwin C. Thomas, Jr., Chair, Committee on Trustee Development, who made the following nomination:

Mr. Scarborough introduced the President of Wesley College, the Rev. Dr. Reed H. Stewart, who introduced Dr. J. Thomas Sturgis, Vice-President and Dean, Ms. Alice Rasmussen, Dean of Students, Dr. Prudence Precourt, Director of Resource Development and Ms. Debra Hill, Administrative Assistant to the President, and addressed the Conference on the progress of the school.

Mr. Scarborough gave an opportunity for questions. The report was received by the Conference with applause.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES:

Bishop Yeakel called Mr. James Robinson, President of the Conference C.O.M. forward, who gave the Conference an object lesson of trying to pute variety of fruit on a small plate. When it all fell off to the floor, he stated that this is the Council's problem-we have too much to fit on our plate. He then introduced Mr. Robert McKee who gave an update on the retreat ministry at Drayton Manor.

ORDER OF THE DAY: PREACHING.

The Conference was led in a late morning worship and a moving message by the Rev. Dr. William A. Holmes on "Bristol: Wesley in Community."

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON - MAY 24, 1989

Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel reconvened the plenary session at 2:88 p.m. with the singing of the hymn, "Precious Lord, Take My Hand." He introduced Bishop Edward Gonzalez Carroll, who joined him at the President's table and led us in prayer.

COMPERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES (continued): Mr. Robinson introduced the Rev. Vauphn A. Johnson, who is completing five years as the Associate Council Director for Special Ministries. He addressed the Conference on how his work centered on strengthening the weak part of the body through new and renovated parsonages and churches; on how they have expanded the ethnic base of the Conference to include Hispanic and Korean congregations; and on how his office is now receiving increasing requests for help in developing programs. Next year the Commission on Religion and Race will continue the inclusive process by having an "Identity Seminar." The Conference received Rev. Johnson with enthusiastic and joyful applause for a job well done.

CAMP PECOMETH: The Rev. Dr. John W. Simpers, Jr. presented a positive report on how the enrollment is already passing last year's record pace and that they are doing everything to keep from turning youth away.

Mr. Robinson applauded the work of our Conference Council on Ministries Director, the Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton and the Associate Director for Education and Leadership Development, the Rev. Harvey Manchester, Jr.

REPORT OF TASK GROUP STUDY STRENGTHENING OF THE LOCAL CHURCH: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Dr. Robert P. Whitlock, who presented the report. After a time for discussion, the Rev. Clenn P. Catley moved to amend the title and scope of the Task Group by adding to "the local church" the words "and districts." It was adopted.

The report is as follows:

At the direction of the Annual Conference a task group was formed to study issues influencing the strength of the Local Church.

- Role of Program Management Team (District Superintendents and Council Staff) in relation to ministry of local church

- Number of churches served by one pastor (impacting presence/leadership)
- Open itinerancy
- Varieties of experiences among United Methodists (strength/problem?)
- Intergenerational programming

After study, two primary issues emerged for the Task Group:

I. No long-range strategic planning (Annual Conference or Local Church)

The 1988-1989 Conference Year is a classic illustration of what happens when an Annual Conference does not have long-range/strategic planning. Beginning in the fall and ending in the spring, there were a series of overlapping, often competing programs presented to the local church. All of these programs are part of the mission of the Church, but could not be handled effectively in the period of time.

Years ago the Annual Conference began a study of Camp Pecometh. Three years ago the Annual Conference set in place a very clear schedule that included the Camp Pecometh Capital Funds Campsign to begin at Annual Conference of 1988; a strategic decision was made on the part of the Annual Conference; the Conference program calendar did not prepare for this strategic program. The result was that many programs were competing for the attendance and support of the same people within very short periods of time.

In order for the Annual Conference to expect the support of the local church it will be necessary for the Annual Conference through its Conference Council on Ministries to adopt a strategic-planning posture.

As a task group we urge the Annual Conference to direct the CCOM towe forward in the process of developing strategic planning as a major priority. The strategic/long-range planning must begin at the Conference; local church or District strategic/long-range planning creates constant conflictive programming. With the Conference taking the first step, then local churches and districts can plan within that framework.

Notes:

Some of the issues that lack of strategic planning creates in the local church are the following:

A sense of no ownership--"Someone in someplace is making decisions that we do not understand nor have we agreed to."

If and when the Annual Conference develops a strategic planning process, inherent in that process will be the necessity of creating ownership through communication with each of the local churches in more effective ways. The very nature of strategic planning demands

A second issue is related to the first. When people do not feel a sense of ownership and they "do not know what is coming and who is creating it," the result is that often they are resistant. To provide too much programming to a church in a survival/maintenance posture is to have a negative in Conference with have multiple lilustrations

One of the results is that we do develop churches that "do their stare, what they are supposed to do, what the Annual Conference is asking them to do, what the D.S. says has to be done", that kind of response is not mission-building. We may be able to support programs with attendance; we may be able to raise funds; but we cannot develop

It is not surprising with this model on the Annual Conference level that it is characteristic of most of our local churches that the conference of the conference of the conference of the conference their effective of the conference of the confere

II. The second major issue is the lack of spiritual vitality in the local church. The strength of the local church cannot escape the most basic reason for its being: spiritual vitality.

While the task group has spent equal time/study on this issue, we are not prepared to bring any recommendations to the Annual Conference; we will spend another year of study hoping to bring a report to the 1998 Annual Conference that would be forwarded to the existing Boards, Agencies and structure of the Annual Conference.

We will be attempting to review reports from the General Church and Council of Bishops who have begun studies of the local church. This will not be substituted for our own pursuance of the issue.

TASK GROUP TO STUDY STRENGTHENING OF THE LOCAL CHURCH

RESOLUTION:

WHEREAS, long-range/strategic planning is a critical issue in the Peninsula Annual Conference and

WHERRAS, the Conference Council on Ministries has studied the feasibility of strategic planning for an extended period of time without arriving at a readiness to adopt the process of developing strategic planning.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the 1989 sessions of the Peninsula Annual Conference direct the CCOM to move ahead with the process to develop a strategic plan and a continuing model to annually extend that planning.

The CCOM will report on strategic planning to each Annual Conference session beginning in 1998.

Note:

Punding shall be provided to secure necessary professional assistance by increasing the Contingency Fund of the Council on Ministries through requests to the C.F. & A. Contingency Fund not to exceed \$5,888 annually in 1989-91, believing that while we may have financial pressure in the Annual Conference much of that pressure is

related to the need for strategic planning.

The entire Conference Council on Ministries report was adopted by the

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES: The Bishop summoned Rev. Laura A. Marrin. Chairperson, who presented the following clarification:

1988 Parsonage Furniture Decision

It has been a year since the historic Parsonage Furniture proposal. As a whole, the turning over of furniture to the pastor has been positive. The Commission has strived to work with District Superintendents and churches that have had problems. Since this proposal was adopted, clergy now are responsible for all the furniture in the parsonages. Clergy are to secure insurance for the furniture. The local church no longer has to replace the old furniture nor worry with insurance cost on the pastor's personal

As a point of clarification concerning student appointments, last year we stated:

"We also recommend that student appointments be exempted from the provisions of this legislation. Those churches shall continue as they have in the past."

For further clarification we invite you to read the Parsonage Furniture Proposal as adopted last year at Annual Conference. It is found on pages 292 and 293 of the 1988 Conference Journal.

The Rev. Martin presented the following recommendation:

Minimum Salary and Travel Reimbursement:

WHEREAS, the Commission on Equitable Salaries has strived to bring the Peninsula Conference up to the Denominational Average (D.A.C.);

WHEREAS, the Commission on Equitable Salaries for the past two years has based minimum salary using the Conference Average Compensation;

BE IT RESOLVED, that for the year 1998 we will not use the Conference Average Compensation to determine minimum salaries;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the level of minimum salary for the year 1998 be:

Full-Time Elder \$17,000.00

Probationary-Associate \$15,750.00

Full-Time Local Pastor \$14,500.00

Student \$12,000.00

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the service increments continue at the rate of \$129.88 for every year of service to a maximum of 28 years for full members and 15 years for probationary, associate and fulltime local pastors.

Reimbursing pastors for miles traveled on Church business is a policy established by this Conference. Therefore, the Commission recommends the following action:

BE IT RESOLVED, that reimbursement for travel expense during 1998 shall be 24 cents per mile for the first 15,000 miles, said rate being in compliance with IRS policy. In addition, we also recommend that pastors be reimbursed for tolls and parking expenses incurred in the performance of pastoral duties.

The Rev. Laurence M. Berry presented the following amendment:

"Be It Resolved, that for the year 1996 we will suspend use of the Conference Average Compensation Formula for a period of one year."

The amendment failed.

The Rev. Clifford A. Armour, Jr., moved that the following resolve be added to the report:

"Be It Further Resolved, that the Commission on Equitable Salaries have a comprehensive report to the Council on Finance & Administration by April 1, 1998 on how to improve the minimum compensation for full-time Elder Probationary/Associate Members, full-time Local Pastors and Students."

It was adopted.

The Bishop recognized Mr. Marvin Smith, who moved to amend by:

"changing '24 cents to '21 cents" and delete said rate being in compliance with IRS policy."

It was defeated.

"The Minimum Salary and Travel" report was adopted as amended.

ORDER OF THE DAY: PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST FOUNDATION, INC.

The Rev. William Hemphill presented Dr. Ruth Laws and the Rev. Roy Phillips who are retiring from the Foundation Board. He then presented the Rev. Bryan Rice, the Executive Director, who shared how the Foundation can help local churches.

ORDER OF THE DAY: UNITED METHODIST COMMITTEE ON RELIEF

The Rev. Jerome DeVine introduced Ms. Fay Whittle who shared the "1-2-3 Hunger Program from UMCOR.

The Rev. Clifford A. Armour, Jr., President of the Board of Global Ministries, introduced the following resolution:

UMCOR 50TH ANNIVERSARY RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, 1990 will mark the 50th anniversary of the United Methodist Committee on Relief, and

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Committee on Relief has enabled members of The United Methodist Church to respond to the suffering of the world in Jesus' name, providing life-saving actions to people in crisis and despair, and

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Committee on Relief has involved United Methodist Church members in ministry with refugees and initiated and supported programs which work to alleviate the root

causes of hunger,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Peninsula Annual Conference affirms the history and work of the United Methodist Committee on Relief and commends the members of its United Methodist Churches for their support of the United Methodist Committee on Relief and encourages each local church to 180% participation in giving to the One Great Hour of Sharing each year, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Peninsula Annual Conference reaffirms the mandate of the United Methodist Committee on Relief in relief, rehabilitation, root causes of hunger and refugee ministries and pledges its cooperation to enable each church to celebrate the SG years of service of UMCOR and to dedicate support to the future work of this committee.

And be it finally resolved, that we, individual lay and clergy members of the Peninsula Annual Conference, will help make this celebration and support tangible by helping our own congregations participate in the UMCOR 1-2-3 Hunger Challenge Project.

It was adopted.

The Rev. Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton nominated the Rev. Jerome R. DeVine as the Conference Missionary Secretary. He was elected.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: The Rev. William Hemphill, a member of the General Board of Global Ministries, lifted up the work of evangelism the Board is doing along with UMCOR.

ORDER OF THE DAY: COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

The Bishop summoned the Rev. Dr. Philip C. Lawton, President, who presented the results from the Church History Contest. There were six entries and the three winners are:

First Place (\$200) -- Chester-Bethel U.M.C., Wilmington, DE

Second Place (\$100) -- Ezion-Mt.Carmel U.M.C., Wilmington, DE

Third Place (\$50) -- St. Paul's U.M.C., Greensboro, MD

The Conference greeted the recipients with applause.

The Rev. Dr. Fradrick C. Seyfert, Jr., introduced Mr. 5 Mrs. Dougherty, who were at the 1939 Uniting Conference in Kansas City He then presented a historical overview of Methodism which was warmly received by the Conference.

The Bishop recognized the Rev. Harold Walton, who made the following motion:

"that the address of the Rev. Dr. Fredrick C. Seyfert, Jr., commemorating the 50th Anniversary of the Methodist Church become a permanent part of the Annual Conference Journal of 1989."

It was adopted and is printed below:

Remembering the 1939 union

WITH PRAISE TO GOD

"The glories of my God and King,

One hundred and fifty-five years before the Methodist re-union of 1939, the Christmas Conference of 1784 created an independent organized sethodist Church in America. It established the Methodist Episcopacy pon foundations genuine and historic. The General Conference of 1898 established an essential and elemental constitution for Church Government. The succeeding quadrenniums brought interpretations, amplifications, and applications, but the principles remained permanent throughout the years to come

With the expansion of both industry and population in America, it was, perhaps, only natural that there would arise diverse opinions as to methods of church administration, theological emphases, and social and political priorities. These varieties of opinion led to sharp debate in the churches.

In 1828-38 the people designating themselves Methodist Protestants separated from the Methodist Bhiscopal Church, not over differences of doctrine or moral order, but over church policy. The issue was the authority of the presiding elder and the importance of lay representation in the councils of the church. Much of the ferment leading up to this division centered right here in what is now the Washington Episcopal Area, including the Eastern Shore and Delaware (Simmson D. 650)al

The 1844 General Conference suspended a member of the Baltimore Conference for not freeing the slaves belonging to his wife. The conference also removed from office the just married Bishop James Osgood Andrew of Georgia, whose new wife also owned slaves. The problem was that in Georgia it was illegal to free slaves (Simpson, Parkers of the Conference of 1848 adopted the position that the Conference of 1849 and 1864 was secession (Moore, p. 263).

The southern churches saw the separation as a compact and a mutual agreement (Moore, p. 263,265). In his episcopal address to the Uniting Conference, May 26, 1939 in Kansas City, Bishop John M. Moore reminded his listeners that in those days.

men of noble purpose and eminent ability differed in principle and convictions and took different ways to build a Methodism that accorded with their consciences and judgement. Their voices rang clear for what to them was right..but from the high levels of their characters and attainments we are able today to press across and above the different control of the control of the control of the control Methodism to the glory of God and the establishment of Christ's kingdom on earth ("The Wethodist-Protestant

Recorder", p. 10.)

Fifty years ago there was a reconciliation which had its beginnings back in May 1876 at Cape May, New Jersey. There a duly authorized and appointed commission representing both northern and southern churches, acknowledged each other to be true branches of the original church. This probably laid the groundwork for the 1939 reunion. In 1984 a joint hymmal was agreed upon by the northern and southern churches. In 1918, the Methodist Protestant and the

Methodist Episcopal Church (North) discussed union. But it wasn't until 1936 that the three general conferences, the Methodist Protestant Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Episcopal Church, adopted the declaration of Union to create the Methodist Church. The uniting conference met in Kansas City April 25, 1939, and on May 18, 1939 at 8:59 in the evening, according to Bishop John Moore, "made the Declaration of Union in the most momentous ceremony which the Christian Church ever witnessed in this country" (Moore, p. 271).

this country" (Moore, p. 271).
The chairman declared to the 980 conference delegates, its 55 bishops, and 14,800 guests, "No one stands in opposition...The Declaration of Union has been adopted. The Methodist Church now isl Long live the Methodist Church!" (Moore, p. 271).

The union brought together approximately 82% of all American Methodists into one body (Twentieth Century Encyclopedia of Religious Knowledge p. 733). It created the largest Protestant denomination in America and the largest Methodist denomination in the world.

Meanwhile, here on the peninsula, the four conferences were preparing for a unifying conference of their own to be held in Asbury p.w.paring ror a unitying conterence of their own to be held in Abbury Hethodist Episcopal Church, Salisbury on March 31, 1939. In the January 21 edition of the "Middletown Transcript", Dr. Walter E. Gumby, Wilmington Superintendent, had predicted the denominational merger in Kansas City would be approved "with hardly a dissenting Dr. Gumby was a delegate to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church to be held at Columbus. Ohio. right

The last session of the Wilmington Conference was held at Old Asbury Church, Wilmington, March 22 to 38, 1939 and the organizing session of the Peninsula Annual Conference was set for October 31, 1939 following the Kansas City Conference, in the Salisbury Teachers College auditorium.

Into this new conference came 174 charges and 177 ministerial members from the Wilmington Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, 53 charges and 54 members from the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, eight charges and eight members of the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and eight members from the Virginia Conference of the Methodist Church South. The territory of this new conference now included all the state of Delaware and the nine counties of the Eastern Shore of Maryland. The 112 churches of the Delaware Conference were not included in this union, but by a bad compromise, remained a part of the Central Jurisdiction until after the 1968 merger. In 1965, the 112 churches of the Delaware Conference were included in the Church Union is a long and yet Peninsula Conference Church. unfinished journey.

So, fifty years ago, three branches of the Methodist Church on the peninsula ended their division. They laid down their competitive spirits to "form a new union" and to re-establish the Methodist family ties that had been broken and often denied through the previous 95 years.

Within the new Conference area were historic shrines revered in common by the three branches of Methodism. These include: Barrett's Chapel, where Coke and Asbury met and where the ordinances were first legally administered in America; Bethel, near Chesapeake City, Maryland, where the first altar call was ever given anywhere; Bridgetown, built by the Church of England in 1773, and in continuous use ever since, confiscated during the Revolutionary War and given to us in 1778; Lewes, where Whitefield established the first class meeting in America in 1739; Thomas' Chapel, the first building we owned in Delaware, given to Francis Asbury by Dr. McGaw, an Episcopal clergyman; Asbury (Old Asbury), the mother church of Wilmington.

There, too, were the memories of the saints of God who had been faithful. And on that night in the year of our Lord 1939, the banner of faith was passed on to a new generation. The Methodist people raised again their voice.

"...assist me to proclaim,
To spread through all the earth abroad
the honors of thy name."

Mr. Libis told of how one million Campbell Soup labels were collected for a new Dodge Van, only one of the in the country. He spoke of how children are the most neglected group in America and how they are helping youth on the Peninsula to find love and security. He then related how they are battling the local zoning restriction that is keeping them from further expansion.

At 5:04 p.m., the Bishop dismissed the Conference with prayer.

THURSDAY MORNING - MAY 25, 1989

MORNING WORSHIP: Beginning at 8:80 a.m., the Division of Worship led the Conference in worship outside the Ella Fitzgerald Center for the Performing Arts with an innovative sermon by the Rev. Cynthia Koski and the Rev. Harvey Manchester, Jr.

PLENARY SESSION: Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel reconvened the Conference at 8:38 a.m. with the singing of the hymn "When Peace, Like a River" and a time for prayer concerns.

ORDER OF THE DAY: COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN UNITY & INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

The Bishop called the Rev. David B. Garrett forward, who introduced Dr. George Cora, Executive Director of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency (DEA). Dr. Cora called attention to the AIDS packet that was passed out earlier in the morning and was appreciative for the help of the Conference in the formation of the AIDS Ministry Team. Their presentation and report was received by the Conference.

ORDER OF THE DAY: BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION & CAMPUS MINISTRY

The Bishop summoned Dr. M. Dwayne Whittington, who introduced the new video on the Africa University, entitled "AFRICAN UNIVERSITY: Challenge For The Future." Afterward he presented a T-shirt with the University logo to the Bishop who displayed it before the Conference. Dr. Whittington then introduced the campus ministers and Ms. Colleen White, who will be working at Delaware State College and is a

Dr. Whittington introduced Chaplain Roger Fair of Bethune-Cookman College, Daytona Beach, Florida, who brought greatings in the name of the schools and students. OPDER OF THE DAY: HARRY DENMAN AWARD

Bishop Yeakel recognized the chair of the Division of Evangelism, Mrs. Barbara Jester, who presented the 1989 award to Mr. Arthur L. Gamaby of Ebenezer U.M.C., Newark, DE, for his outstanding work in the prison ministry and to the Rev. Dr. Gerald A. Foster for his work as Conference evangelist and servant of Christ to people around the world.

The Bishop presented the award for Mr. Gamsby to the Rev. Thomas Donnachie, who received it on his behalf, and to Dr. Foster.

U.M. PUBLISHING MOUSE: The new manager of the Baltimore Cokesbury Store is Me. Molly Nash, who presented a check for S10, 17.19 % from the United Methodist Publishing Mouse to be used for pastors' pensions in the Peninsula Conference. Ms. Nash recognized those who have written for Abingdon and/or for the Church School Curriculum by having them stand.

Dr. Stapleton then presented, on behalf of Mr. Robert Peaster, President of U.M.P.H., on the Bushop's first use of the Publishing House's 289th Anniversury. The Bishop's first use of the pen was to endorse the U.M.P.H. check for pension's

He will be returning to Africa for a visit and extended an invitation for someone to join him. The Conference responded with applause.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION & RACE: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Dr. Fred D. Wood, who presented the Rev. Bill Scott, who will become the new Chair of the Commission. Their report was adopted.

COMMISSION ON BOUITABLE SALARIES (continued): The Bishop called the Rev. Laura Martin back, who presented the Rev. Ken Valentine. The Rev. Valentine presented section "STANDARDS FOR THE PARSONAGES" which is found in the Commission's report.

The Bishop called the Conference's attention to Disciplinary paragraph 269.2f(4) which states that the annual inspection is done by the Chairperson of Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees and the pastor. Paragraphs III.B and V.C. of the Commission's report will be updated in accordance with The Discipline.

The Bishop recognized the Rev. David Paul, who motioned to amend section II.A., the last sentence, to be changed from "should" to "shall." It was approved.

The Bishop recognized Mr. Howard Mason, who moved to amend section V.D. by adding after telephone the words "and antennae and/or basic cable TV." It was approved.

The Bishop recognized the Rev. Clifford Armour, who moved -

"that the report be referred back to the Commission on Equitable Salaries for refinement and a serious study of the size and genuine need of parsonage families."

It was seconded.

The Bishop recognized the Rev. David Paul, who moved to refer only Section 2A back to the Commission. It failed.

The Armour Motion to refer back to the Commission was passed.

Bishop Yeakel called on the Rev. Mark Palmer, who presented the following motion:

HOUSING NOW RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the 1984 resolution of the General Conference entitled "Advocacy for the Poor" states, that "the gospel demands that we manifest our love for Christ through our efforts to relieve the suffering of those who are without food and shelter;" and

WHEREAS, prevalent estimates place the number of homeless $\boldsymbol{\lambda}$ Americans at 3 million; and

WHEREAS, a recently released, Congressionally-funded study predicts that another nearly 19 million people will face the prospect of homelessness in America in the next 15 years (Housing Now Pact Sheet); and WHEREAS, in the past eight years, federal support for low income housing programs has fallen 77% to less than \$8 billion a year, while government subsidies for upper-income homeowners, in the form of mortgage tax-exemptions has grown to \$46 billion a year; (Housing Now Fact Sheet); and

WHEREAS, the Housing Now organization is planning a march on the Capital, on October 7, 1989 in order to bring to government an emphatic message to reverse the housing crisis;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Peninsula Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church endorses the Housing Now October 7th march on Washington as a way to raise a strong voice for an increase of housing funds in the Federal budget, and insure that safe, decent, affordable homes for all people be given the priority it deserves.

It was adopted by the Conference.

ORDER OF THE DAY: PREACHING

The Conference then moved to a time of worship and preaching by the Rev. Dr. William A. Holmes on "The World: Wesley in Mission."

The Conference was recessed at 12:15 p.m.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON - MAY 25,1989

PLENARY SESSION: The Bishop reconvened the session with the singing of the hymn "God the Spirit, Guide and Guardian."

PRRSONAL PRIVILEGE: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. P. Thomas McKelvey, who thanked the UMES staff; Preston Richardson, who designed and built the Communion table and John Johnson, who constructed the cross and the flame.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. F. David Weber, who made the following motion:

"that the Annual Conference seriously discourage the sale of parsonages until a full review of the issue (especially implications relative to the itinerant ministry) be made by a task force composed of Equitable Salaries, the four District Church and Location Committees and CCOM Personnel Committee. The findings to be reported to District Ministers and finally the next session of the Annual Conference."

The Rev. Glenn Catley moved to delete the words "seriously discourage." It did not pass

After considerable discussion, the Rev. John Irwin moved the Question and it was approved by more than 2/3 vote.

The Weber Motion was adopted by the Conference.

COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Charles E.

Barton, who presented the report with new corrections. The Conference approved it. The complete text may be found in the Journal under section IV.

CABINET PROPERTY MATTERS: Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Dr. Robert P. Whitlock, Easton District Superintendent, who moved that:

"The Congregation of Lynch UMC of the Stillpong-Kennedyville Charge request Limited Service effective July 1, 1989. St. James and St. Paul on East New Market-Linkwood Charge be removed from Limited Service to Discontinued."

The Bishop recognized the Rev. Dr. P. Thomas McKelvey, who moved:

"As Salisbury District Superintendent and with great appreciation of the faithfulness and vision of the people of Grace Church of the Pittsville-willards Charge, I move the discontinuance of Grace Church, Pittsville, effective min 1, 1982."

The above property resolutions were approved by the Conference.

The Bishop recognized Mr. Paul Phillips of the Church Creek Charge, who made the following motion:

"I move the District Superintendents be instructed to convene the Lay Members on a quarterly basis for the purpose of sharing information of the Conference work for a trial period of one year."

The Bishop recognized the Rev. George Godfrey, who moved to add "clergy" to the motion. It was adopted.

The Bishop recognized the Rev. James Walz, who moved to amend the motion by changing "quarterly" to "twice a year." It was adopted.

The question was called for and passed.

The amended Phillips Motion now reads:

"I move the District Superintendents be instructed to convene the Lay and Clergy members twice a year for the purpose of sharing information of the Conference work for a trial period of one year."

It was adopted by the Conference.

REPORT OF THE STATISTICIAN: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. Boyd B. Etter, Statistician, who shared that the 1988 figures show a slight decrease of 52 in membership, which is six-tenths of one percent, the least in the Jurisdiction. Average weekly worship attendance did increase by 165. The entire report may be found in Section VII.C of this Journal.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION: Bishop Yeakel summoned the Rev. George C. Godfrey, President, who introduced Ted Briggs, Conference Business Manager. Mr. Briggs expressed his profound appreciation to Ms. Ginny Durant and Ms. Joan Warren for their faithful service to the Conference.

The Rev. Godfrey then presented the following recommendations:

1. That the 1990 budget in the amount of \$4,179,220 be adopted.

It was adopted by the Conference.

2. That .38 be the apportionment factor for 1998.

It was adopted.

 That the deadline for apportionment adjustments for the ensuing year must be in the hands of the District Superintendent and the Council on Finance and Administration by October 1.

It was adopted.

4. That housing allowances rather than parsonages be provided Clery Conference Council on Miniatries' Staff except appointments to Pecometh and Drayton. That present parsonages be sold at the next change in appointments for those now living in parsonages, and sooner at the option of the resident.

After much discussion, the Bishop recognized the Rev. Howard P. Ketterman, Sr., who moved to table the motion. The Ketterman Motion was adopted by the Conference.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT TO ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The following composite report comes as the result of the Cabinet members listing what we considered to be critical issues facing the local church, Districts, and the Annual Conference; we then prioritized eight issues; two reports have been written by each of us; the preparer will also present these to the Annual Conference.

These are serious issues for us and constitute what we feel are major unavoidable priorities to set before the Annual Conference.

We trust that in the course of being connecting agents, supervisory personnel, and pastors to pastors that we also have some priority time to deal with what are the critical issues facing the Annual Conference. It is hard to imagine that any four people in our annual conference is the second of the conference of the

In addition to the composite report, there are reports from each of the individual Districts dealing with personals, statistics, and what the District Superintendents feel are highlights of 1988.

HUNGER

Hunger just won't go away. It becomes evident when famine conditions catch the attention of the media. There are flurries of activity, but hunger just won't go away.

The Public Assistance Task Force in Delaware reminds us that 10 percent of Delawareans are chronically hungry. That's nearly 60,000 people spread out over the whole state.

Emmanuel Dining Hall in Wilmington fed 10 percent more people in 1988 than in 1987. Our many churches with their food closets or community food pantries are discovering an increasing demand for their resources. Hunger just won't go away.

Sixty percent of the people fed in one large Delaware feeding program were employed but still below the poverty level. The problem in America is not a shortage of food. It is a shortage of resolve to arrange our priorities to deal adequately with the problem.

Our churches are answering some of the cries for help in their local communities. There are emergency measures that do not get at the heart of the problem. Systems must be re-evaluated.

UNICEF indicates that if the money expended around the world for armaments for only two weeks of each year were directed toward feeding the hungry, 48,888,889 children each year could be spared death from mainutrition. Can we really convince hungry children that they are more secure because of the military hardware that is in place to protect them?

The hungry in our local communities are not usually visible, but hunger just will not go away. The high death rate of infants on the Delmarva Peninsula is due in part to low birth weights, stemming from inadequate nutrition of their mothers.

Our United Methodist Women are searching local neighborhoods in their program's concern for children. They are discovering problems that can be addressed. Hunger just will not go away. God has put enough resources in the hands of Christian people to feed the hungry. There is no way that a Christian Church in a nation "under God" can ignore the cries of the hungry.

PECOMETH CAMPAIGN

Most of us have heard "It's Time for Tomorrow." We have heard it, seen it, prayed over it, lost sleep because of it, and sincerely believed it. The Peccometh Campaign has come at a time when the needs at Camp Peccometh are rising daily. The increase in applications for the 1989 summer programs are up dramatically from the 1988 applications, which taxed facilities to the fullest. Many programs this year were already full in April, with many new applications arriving daily.

Beginning with Bishop Yeakel, the leadership of the Conference was totally committed to the Pecometh Campaign. Many calendar dates were reserved for the campaign. Leadership pledges were first made by the Program Management Team and the leadership of the campaign. Conference staff working closely with Wesley and Luise Sheffield, developed materials, attended meetings, and promoted the campaign.

May Cloud has led a devoted cadre of laity and clergy in the extremely complicated task of getting its message out. Churches have extended their own vision of the possibilities and have entered into making tomorrow possible for Camp Pecometh. Laity and clergy have shared their own personal faith testimonies, many of which included Pecometh as part of their faith journey.

The Campaign Committee will make its report to this session of the Annual Conference. Nearly half of the churches have not yet reported their goals. Many are still struggling with their particular involvement in the campaign. A Campaign Continuation Committee has been formed and will be offered to this session of the Annual Conference for implementation. This committee will keep us aware of what is occurring and how we can best prepare Pecometh for Tomorrow.

Some churches are finding that their participation in a project that reaches beyond their own congregation or local community is adding them in their work in their own congregation. One church, for example, had a group working together to promote the Pecometh Campaign. This group is evolving into a young adult group that the church has needed for sometime. It was designed for the Pecometh Campaign; it can easily be adapted for use in the local church for this year's or ensuing years' stewardship program.

It is fortunate that the needs of Pecometh were foreseen, that leave the plans were developed, that a campaign was prepared and is now beginning to produce the much-needed funds. It is fortunate that Pecometh Tomorrow is so close to reality as the needs are increasing aduly. We can rejoice that an expanding interest in ministry to children and youth is coming at a time when there is the possibility of providing the facilities and programs for these ministries.

MINISTERIAL RECRUITMENT

A critical issue dramatically confronting our Annual Conference is the need for sufficient numbers of well-trained clergy persons with natural gifts and graces to be effective in ministry.

The reality of what is taking place is dramatically confronting us in our Ordination Service for 1989. We have only two (2) deacons to be ordained as compared to sixteen (16) elders who are being given full membership and full ordination. If the pattern were only a unique one that might create a different issue, but in fact if we look at those who are in process we have no prospect of this significantly changing. When you add to this fact the number of those who are eligible to retire over the next ten to twenty years we

In our concern to find significant numbers of persons to fill our appointments, we wish to quard against nerely coming up with necessary persons to fill appointments. It is our conviction that it is better to have an appointment open than to have ineffective ministry in place. The cabinet is not at all interested in the Annual Conference reducing its standards or being less concerned about potential effectiveness of those who enter our process. We do have to deal with the reality of not having sufficient numbers of

We suggest the following strategies to deal with this critical issue:

Encourage local churches to locate strong candidates. When these candidates have indicated interest and a sense of call and have identified themselves to the local Pastor-Pariah Relations Committee, we urge that committee to work with them in an intensive way to determine their appropriateness to be in the ordained ministry. It is no favor to any individual to merely pat them on the shoulder or in locating and helping to work with those who feel a call to the ministry cannot be overemphasized. Note: We are encouraged that many for those persons who come forward feeling called into ministry are now second-career candidates who often bring a high level of maturity and life experience to the profession. We are strengthened by these individuals when they choose to accept the call to be in

We applaud and encourage the increased efforts on the part of the Board of Ordained Ministry Recruitment Committee to visit and interview prospective candidates to try to bring them to our Annual Conference. We are strategically located in proximity to Wesley Seminary, where the Student Track Program provides us with a wealth of opportunity individuals who come to our Annual Conference and serve for a four-year period but also in many cases, if they have a good experience within the Peninsula Annual Conference, may choose to stay here, as is the case with some of our current students. This is not self-serving because it is also clear that the Peninsula Annual Conference is a training place and a recruitment area for many boundaries, on on not end up serving in the Annual Conference

Our churches are only as strong as our laity/clergy leadership. We have more than two centuries of evidence to attest to this. God can do little until there is spiritual openness and persons to enable. We urge all the clergy and lay members of this Annual Conference to take upon themselves the responsibility to hear and heed this issue that confronts us.

An important issue facing the Conference is developing effective ministry to these churches. Most of these congregations of 188 members or less had make the previous years. Some of the churches have moved into maintenance or survival tactics. Where vital congregations still exist, they are often burdened with the cost of maintaining facilities, paying salaries, and raising apportionments. This is particularly true on the Easton and Salisbury Districts. Many of these churches are ethnic congregations. (As an aside, the Cabinet is endorsing a two-year study of the churches of the former Delaware Conference to determine what is taking place in these congregations.) The financial realities are evident in the statistics of average giving of members of small-member congregations (\$283/member) as compared to members of the large congregations \$178 per member) and the Conference average (\$247 per member) at taken from the 1988 Conference Journal

In order to move from a position of strength, we need to understand that number of members does not determine in itself effectiveness of ministry; a 25-member congregation can be a total mission church by following the Acts definition. On the other hand, these small congregations do face unique problems. Our Annual Conference and Districts need to develop sensitivity and assistance to these congregations. No one solution is the answer, but mergers, realignments, and the establishing of less than full-time charges will be necessary, particularly in the light of the realities of the financial pressures at the Conference and local church level. It is clear, however, that the bottom line is a commitment to risk in some areas, perhaps by moving the apportionment rate one point to make available funds to assist these congregations with salaries and/or apportionment subsidies. If we are timid and try to hold the line

without seeking solutions we will lose the battle to reverse the loss of members in these communities of faith. Those who are part of us need to know we have prioritized their vitality.

The transforming love of God impacts every person, every need, and every issue of life. The lack of decent housing for many of God's people is one such issue that calls for a creative and compassionate response from us.

HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS: A SPIRITUAL ISSUE

In our affluent society an increasing number of people are homeless or are living in a slum-type housing that is inadequate and indecent. The problem is not limited to Washington, Baltimore or New York City. "Street people" are to be found in our peninsula in Wilmington, Salisbury, Dover, Seaford, Cambridge, and in towns throughout the bounds of our Peninsula Conference. All over the Eastern Shore and Delaware, materially impoverished people are paying exorbitant rent to live in apartments and shacks that are unhealthy and unsafe. There is a widening gap between those who live in such squalor and the majority of us who live in abundance and comfort. This is a spiritual problem for us, the people called United Methodists, for all people of faith and good will!

Spiritual powerty is evident in national statistics that show that the more people posses the less they are willing to give. The greater one's affluence the less one is willing to give to others. This files in the face of the model of John Wesley, who as he made some material gains did not spend more on himself or keep more for himself but rather gave more away to those in need. Greater that—"Everyone to whom much is given, much shall be required." (Luke 12:48)

Spiritual poverty is seen in insensitivity to the struggles and

needs of people who are impoverished materially. This is seen in the suburbs of our cities, where people who are upwardly mobile move into larger homes that are farther and farther away from blighted neighborhood and less successful people. For some folks this means "Out of sight, out of mind." In our towns and rural areas, where such housing patterns are not as possible, insensitivity is visible when one never really sees the shack that has always been there. Sometimes we accept the familiar without ever questioning it--not

God cries out to us through the suffering and struggles of homeless people and of families and individuals who live in substandard housing! We rejoice in the spiritual abundance of many who have ears to hear and eyes to see. Many United Methodists and a number of our congregations are joining in ecumenical and interfaith efforts to provide affordable housing that is decent. Thanks be to

Some are reaching out to people who are homeless through temporary shelters. There seems to be a renewed interest in supporting existing shelters and also in starting new shelters where none now exist. Churches are opening their doors to the homeless and some of you are renovating and converting houses and other buildings into shelters. Emergency shelters now exist in some of out towns as well as our cities. In many cases these shelters are being overwhelmed by people in need: transients, victies of family viclence and folks with all kinds of problems. The shelters are prevailed to the porary help. Affordable and adequate housing that

Some of you are joining in efforts to build or renovate apartment buildings or houses for people without a decent place to live. Individuals and churches are responding to the need through financial giving and through woll with the control of the greater Salisbury area and in partnership with those in need are building and renovating homes. People are becoming home-owners for the first time through "sweat equity" and no-interest loans. A Mabitat group is currently being organized in Chestertown and Kent County.

In addition, some of you have been involved in organizing ecumenical and/or interfaith nonprofit housing corporations that utilize federal, state and private funding to build subsidized housing developments. Such efforts are having a measurable impact upon the housing problem. However, the need is still so great that waiting lists far outnumber the apartments or houses available.

We are delighted to report that with the support of the Enterprise Foundation and the leadership of our various judicatory heads, the Interfaith Task report of the Enterprise of the State of the State

CHURCH CROWTH

Church growth is an important issue for us, not just for the sake of numbers but because healthy, ministering, serving churches will grow! The question is not whether we want to reverse a membership trend, but are we willing to follow Christ's lead and meet the needs of God's people? Biblically speaking, we find our matching orders in the Book of Acts, where the resurrected Christ, speaking the disciples, said, "But when the Roly Spirit tomes so for me in the disciples, said," But when the Roly Spirit comes for me in will be filled with power and you will be filled with power and you may be set on the said to the chast of the earth." The mention of Jerusalem dispersate that we are able to be witnesses close to home, with influence in ever-increasing concentric circles reaching all the way out to the ends of the earth.

One question a congregation should ask itself is: "Are we visitor-friendly?"

Do we have road signs to point people from four directions to our church?

Do we have an identification sign to clearly indicate who we are?

Do we have a sign to provide more information for the interested person?

Do we provide designated parking spaces for visitors?

Do we have signs to help people find their way to the sanctuary, fellowship hall, nursery, etc.?

Do we provide name tags to help new people get acquainted?

Do we provide a coffee hour/fellowship time for meeting, greeting or discussion?

How visitor-friendly is your church?

Another question has to do with follow-up procedures with first-time visitors.

How soon does someone visit newcomers from your congregation?

How soon does someone telephone?

How soon does a letter of welcome go out from your pastor?

Do you list the names of visitors in your weekly bulletin or monthly newsletters?

How many contacts does your congregation make with newcomers in the first month?

Ten or twelve contacts in that first month will help your congregation win and conserve a larger percentage of those persons who demonstrate some initial interest. The purpose of the Church is to nutture those sheep who are in the fold and to win those who are not--that's Church Growth!

STEWARDSHIP

A continuing critical need in the churches of the Conference is the addressing of the issue of Christian stewardship--the faithful use of our God-given resources for our own benefit and that of our neighbors, it has Yilman conference.

The Bible would be a good place to begin since the Biblical injunctions against the exploitation of the poor and the accumulation of wealth are clear and straightforward. The Bible challenges nearly every economic value in contemporary society. Just consider the concept of the Jubilee Year in Leviticus--since wealth belongs to God and not humankind it should be regularly redistributed. Jesus referred to wealth "mammon," as a rival god.

Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel has called us, on occasion, to develop a "Theology of Affluence." By that he was referring to the problem created system of such money-the distortion of values, the false sense of security, the concern that materialism deadens spirituality and promotes the hedonism of our culture, which is increasingly dependent on drums.

One of the churches in the Conference where the pastor and people are wrestling with these issues reported a breakthrough recently. This is what they said:

In mid-July, while meeting in the basement of the home of nee of the members, the Holy Spirit descended. This may sound very dramatic—and it was—although not in the way you may be imagining. There was no tongues or flames. There was simply an uncontrollable excitement and joy at having made a breakthrough in our understanding of what God would have us do. As a body we committed ourselves to either tithing or giving proprtionately, with the expectation that the proportions would increase each year to meet or exceed a tithe. We defined the second section that giving as "plan by enfority. You decide what percentage of God's gifts you will redistribute to benefit others." There was a sense that for the first time were taking responsibility for our giving and not responding to the demands or expectations of others. Giving, and finances in general, were taking on a

spiritual dimension. Instead of being a necessary evil, they were being seen now as the potential source of great blessing. And, last but not least, we decided that we would no longer ask church members to "fund a budget." We would challenge them to give out of their abundance, as God has given to them—to give proportionately. In fact, we would not develop a budget after ledges had been received. after pledges had been received. I imiting, too secular, too "dupont!" and definitely not Biblical. In short, giving came to be seen as a spiritual discipline as important as prayer and Bible study.

With this excellent example before us, we urge our pastors and people to raise the issue, discuss it openly, and move out on the basis of the decisions/commitments that you make.

Dover District

The 1988-89 Conference Year has been unusual for the Dover District. Leadership moved from "to be supplied," to part-time, to new but completely inexperienced--all in a six-month period. The District not only survived, it prospered.

In the transition period, a new office was inaugurated, a most proficient secretary hired, furnishings--including a computer--were put in place. The office already has had extensive use by small plietic Committees for meetings, by PPRC's and other local church groups. The district churches have been faithful in providing response for the office through the District Apportioment.

Charge Conferences were not an option for the Superintendent of the Dover District this year. Most pastors conducted their own Charge Conference. Those charges not served by elders were aided by neighboring elders. The Superintendent has had to employ other methods to become familiar with the churches, such as visits with PRC's, wesulphing with congregations, attending social and other

As a result of the Missions Festival held in the spring of 1988, more of our churches are catching the vision of reaching out. District churches have supported the Nehemiah Project to build a chapel at the Sussex Correctional Institution. Churches in Sussex County have been involved with Prison Fellowship on projects that release prisoners to live for two weeks in homes of church members and go into the community to work on houses for the disadvantaged. Other churches have held bazaars and other fund-raising events to expressly emphasize and to provide resources for outreach ministries. New and well-managed food closets are springing up over the district.

Ministry in Eastern Sussex is becoming exciting. Churches such as Epworth and Mt. Pleasant in Rehoboth are expanding facilities and programs to meet the needs. Long Neck is building a new sanctuary; Ocean View is planning expanded facilities. Miliville is proving its control of the composition with the Board of the Church. In cooperation with the Board of the Church in the Church of the Chur

Our 1988 growth emphasis was to develop discipline opportunities in each of our churches where people can be encountering transformation. In 1989 we are moving into Intentional Growth strategy. In 1999 we will deal with systemic racism; in 1991 the family and youth issues will be addressed; in 1991 we move beyond our local walls and break out into the world in mission.

The planning has revolved around hundreds of people. Our District Council on Ministries is very active and holds an annual retrate when we plan the next emphasis as well as having regularly scheduled meetings through the year. The District Board of Laity has had a key role in our district, not only in planning our exciting Lay Speaking Training School (over 15% in attendance) and other laity events but as active participants on the District Council on Ministries.

Aware of the strategic issues that are set before us as a District we are moving ahead with confidence not in our own talent and resources but in God's ability to resource, energize, and lead us.

outside of their congregations. Many of our churches are celebrating the good news of new members, while others are struggling with membership loss. Many are filled with new vitality and ministries that are channels for God's life-changing presence, while others are struggling to survive as institutions. We are grateful for God's presence in the successes and failures, the joys and the sorrows for each of our congragations. God is working through many of our local churches in transforming lives and impacting communities.

Words of admiration seem inadequate for the people of Grace UMC, Pittsville. After much prayer and painful consideration this faithful remnant decided that they would discontinue as a congregation rather than continue to decline in membership adn spend all of their dissipating energies on maintaining their sanctuary. With the pain and grief born of their love for their church, they have sold their property working to make sure that their former sanctuary would not decay before their eyes. Now a Korean Congregation is emerging to serve the Ocean Pines and Salisbury communities. St. Andrews UMC, Salisbury is graciously sharing their facilities with our Korean congregation. Rev. Lee and the organizing congregation are under the supervision of Dr. Poong Ro Cha, superintendent of the Eastern Korean Mission.

Thanks to Rev. Gary Tulak and the people of Grace Church with their openness and commitment to serving their community. The Rev. Grant Johnson is completing his first year in a very successful cross-racial appointment. With Rev. Johnson's leadership, the people of Grace are deeply involved in a growing outreach ministry to their neighborhood and the City of Salisbury.

Congratulations to the people of the Girdletree and Nanticoke Charge who through great commitment and much hard work ahve completed new parsonages this year. Also a word of appreciation for the folks in Mt. Vernon who took a bigh step in faith as a two (2) church charge last year and now are builging a parsonage.

Now that the days and years of my six year term as Superintendent of the Willington District have passed, I sit down to write a final report with rejoicing and gladness for what has been accomplished by the pastors and people on the district.

- It all began six years ago with a consultation of laity and clergy on the District who cam together under the leaership of the Rev. Dr. william Ramsden to discern the strategies that would advance the cause of Christ in the immediate future. Those strategies and the results are as follows:
- 1. Congregational Stratesy the District has a primary role in encouraging congregations to develop effectively responsive strategy and the strategy of the strategy of the strategy of the semphasis, virtually every church on the District has a Statement of Purpose out of which has come objectives and goals on the basis of which sectific programs are planned.
- 2. Clusters The District also has the primary role in creating clustes of churches for coopering in mission and ministry. Most of the churches on the district are working either with another United Methodist Church or churches of other denominations. Some of the most exciting services, retreats and festivals have been the surface of the description of the most exciting services, retreats and festivals have been the basis to serve of celebrate.
- 3. Resourcing Teams and/or Programs The District will need to develop specific teams/program to enable local churches to become more effective. htis has been done through the use of conference staff, special consultants, education consultants, aging ministry consultant and many other consultants in evangelism, stewardship and

planning on the district. The District continuing Education Events on better meetings mass mailing and worship have also belied in this

- New Church Development The District will bear the primary responsibility for convening and sustaining the needed cooperation and action. The primary focus here has been on the Hispanic Mission and a new congregation on Route 896 south of Route 48. I am pleased to report that the Hispanic Mission should be chartered as a church in the next year and we are closer than ever before to signing a contract for land on Route 896. The Kirkwood Church and Outpost Sunday School will be involved in this new congregational development plan.
- 5. Financial Aid The district is key to dealing with the dilemma posed by the need for financial aid on the one hand and the dllemma posed by the need for financial aid on the one hand and the virtual certainty that providing is will undercut congregational development on the other hand. The two primary sources of aid are apportionment adjustments and equitable salary. I am pleased to report that churches receiving apportionment adjustments are down from 34 in 1983 to 11 in 1988. Equitable salary is up slightly due entirely to our heavy investment in the Mispanic Mission.

 In short, more churches are paying their own way than ever

before and are proud of it!

THE DEPOND OF THE CHARICATOTAN Peninsula Annual Conference January 1. 1988 to December 31. 1988

After two consecutive years of membership growth in the Peninsula Annual Conference, a slight decrease in full membership was recorded in 1988 Full membership at the end of 1988 ctand at 98.528. fifty-two (52) less than that recorded at the end of 1987.

The decline is attributed to fever numbers of persons received on confession of faith or restored. In 1987, 2.418 members were received on confession of faith or restored, as compared with only 2, 144 in 1988, a decrease of 266. Many membership audits were reported, often with a necative effect in determining actual numbers on the rolls. However, this annears to have had an impact primarily in the Wilmington District. For only in this district did the number of members removed by Charge Conference action or withdrawn exceed the number of deaths. The total number of members removed by Charge Conference action or withdrawn are wirthally identical with that of a year ago. There was a slight increase in the number of deaths.

On a positive note, the Dover and Salisbury Districts recorded an increase in full membership. Dover District gained 125 members, and Salisbury District increased by 31. The Easton District was essentially stable, losing 9 members, while Wilmington District declined by 199.

There were 489 full service churches and 33 limited service

churches on December 31, 1988.

There were 178 churches which received no new members on confession of faith in 1988, seven more than in the previous year. Of these churches, 133 received no new members at all, twelve (12) fewer than in 1987.

Average attendance increased slightly despite the decrease in

membership.

Church school membership decreased by 425, or 1.3%. Church

school attendance also dropped slightly from that in 1987. Average membership in Peninsula United Methodist Churches remained at 201, the same as in 1987. Average attendance in worship is 70; here again there is really no change. Thus, on a typical Sunday, 35% of church members are in attendance at the principal weekly worship services.

The 153 full-service ethnic minority local churches reported

13,971 members in 1988, 62 fewer than in 1987.

Every annual conference in the Northeastern Jurisdiction reported a net loss in membership during the period 1988-1987. However, the rate of decline for the Peninsula Annual Conference was only six-tenths of one percent, the least in the jurisdiction.

I am especially grateful to Linda Etter for her assistance in

verifying and tabulating the reports. The Cabinet is to be commended for its heavy emphasis upon the need to submit data in a timely fashion. Finally, on April 13, the last reports were received. Our appreciation to all pastors, church secretaries, and others who assisted in any way. As always, our Conference Treasurer, Ted Briggs, and his capable staff were supportive. Rich Loch, consultant to the Business Office in the area of computer software support, and the Rev. K. Richard Varell enabled us to enter the data on our own personal computer. Their patience deserves a word of thanks.

Let us go forth, "proclaiming in the highways and preaching in the fields," which will result in persons being won to Christ and the Church, so that our report in 1989 will be a more positive one.

THE GENERAL CONFERENCE The United Methodist Church

Proposed Constitutional Amendment

On Friday evening, May 6, 1988, at a session of the General Conference of The United Methodist Church held in St. Louis, Missouri, the following Constitutional Amendment was made by a recorded vote of 783, yes; 85, no; 3, abstaining. It is now presented to the Annual Conferences for vote.

In Section VII, Paragraph 35, Article I, insert the following words:

In the Annual Conferences of the Central Conferences, the fouryear participation and the two-year membership requirements may be waived by the Annual Conference for young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age. Such persons must be members of the United Methodist Church and active participants at the time of election.

If voted and so declared by the Council (f Bishops, Par. 35 would then read:

The Annual Conference shall be composed of ministerial members as defined by the General Conference, together with a lay member elected by each charge, the diaconal ministers, the conference president of United Methodist Women, the conference president of United Methodist Men, the conference lay leader, district lay leaders, the president or equivalent officer of the conference young adult organization, the president of the conference youth organization and two young persons under twenty-five (25) years of age from each district to be selected in such manner as may be determined by the Annual Conference. In the Annual Conferences of the Central Conferences, the four-year participation and the twoyear membership requirements may be waived by the Annual Conference for your persons under twenty-five (25) years of age. Such persons must be members of the United Methodist Church and active participants at the time of election. Each charge served by more than one minister shall be entitled to as many lay members as there are ministerial members. The lay members shall have been for two years next preceding their election members of the United Methodist Church and shall have been active participants in the United Methodist Church for at least four years next preceding their election.

If the lay membership should number less than the ministerial members of the Annual Conference, the Annual Conference shall, by its own formula, provide for the election of additional lay members to equalize lay and ministerial membership of the Annual Conference.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

The Report of the President

Why does the Peninsula Conference have a Council on Ministries? Some readers may say they've always wondered! The Purpose of the Council, "as part of the total mission of the church, is to facilitate the Church's program life in the Annual Conference. The council's task is to be responsible for the development, administration, and evaluation of the program of the Annual Conference and to encourage, coordinate, and support the conference agencies, districts, and local churches in their The United Methodist Church." That's pretty heavy stuff, so The United Methodist Church."

The Church is called to be a witnessing and serving community. Most of the good things which happen come about in or through local churches as they carry out their ministries. Listing several of the key responsibilities of the council will illustrate why it makes sense to have such a body and staff.

- * to receive program recommendations from the local churches and other groups; to evaluate these recommendations, and to formulate a coordinated conference program for consideration by the Annual Conference.
- * to provide personnel and other resources for the implementation and administration of the program adopted by the conference.
- * to determine priorities and make budget recommendations to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration concerning all requests for funds for proposed programs.

Council members have invested substantial effort in working toward more selective setting of priorities. This involves choosing among more good things to do than the church can handle at one time; it means saying "Nor" Not now "to some proposals which have merit but which are seen to have a lower priority. The goal is to move forward with realizable plans, with acceptable timelines (which could go as far out as to the end of quinquennium), and with desired results clearly stated.

As this is written, council members point to "strengthening the local church" as the top priority for the Peninsula Conference. "Leadership development", "social justice and outreach", strengthening the family", and "racism, inclusiveness" follow in order at the head of the long list of potential priority items. This first step in the process primarily identifies those areas which call for new or increased attention and allocation of resources to bring about desired changes. The categories for action are still too broad.

The discussion and collective consideration to date have influenced somewhat the proposed program for 1998 which is presented in this booklet for adoption or modification by the Annual Conference. Council members will continue to struggle together toward becoming truly the program body for the Conference rather than an assembly of board and supplied the conference program is agreed for 1991 and subsequent years.

Are program dollars, provided through apportionments, spent visely? That's a tough question. Probably few members of the Annual Conference even know the council has a Budget and Program Review Committee, chaired by Ralph J. O'Day, or appreciate the significant role of the committee in pushing to have those dollars be effective in helping to meet high-priority needs. The committee set separately with representatives of all program individual 1988 programs with the results and the written program proposals for 1998, including answers to these questions, among others.

* "In what way does this program relate to our Comprehensive Plan?" (This plan deals with strategies for strengthening the ethnic minority local church for witness and ministry)

* "In what way, if any, does this program contribute to the live and work of our local churches?"

* "How will you measure the results of this program?"

The committee met again with representatives of each group to discuss its proposals and budget request. Finally, it hammered out a potential Peninsula Conference program budget, substantially smaller than the sum of the askings, for consideration by the Conference Council on Ministries. A recommendation will be presented to the Annual Conference through the Council on Finance and Administration, whose vice chairperson was an active member of the review committee.

Stress is laid on weaving inclusiveness into all that is done in the life of the Conference. Much progress has been made but the need persists to be sensitive and intentional in efforts to achieve greater success.

The council rejoices in the adoption of challenging goals by many local churches during the early weeks of the Camp Perometh capital fund drive. Prospects for an expanded, richer camping ministry for children, youth and adults alike, have never shone brighter.

An ad hoc committee of the council, chaired by J. T. Seymour, has studied possible means for honoring Felton E. May, who was elected a bishop from the Peninsula Conference. The council will bring a recommendation before the Annual Conference.

More detail on good things which have happened and on dreams for the future are included in other reports. The reader is encouraged to read on. It could be easy to look on Gordon and his staff as "overhead" or paper shufflers. Not so. These fine and able people are major contributors in designing and carrying out the many components of the coordinated conference program which the Annual Conference adopts. They deserve our thanks and support.

1990 PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

Responsibilities: The responsibilities of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries are:

- a) To describe, coordinate, and organize opportunities to respond to the missional priority, should any be adopted by the General Conference.
- b) To assist the Annual Conference and local churches in discovering their mission and to determine program emphasis which will enable them to fulfill their mission.
- c) To receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district and Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Council on Ministries; to evaluate these recommendations; and to formulate a coordinated conference program to be presented to the Annual Conference for consideration.
- d) To provide staff personnel and necessary resources for the implementation and administration of the program adopted by the conference.
- e) To receive and coordinate the budget askings of all conference program agencies and to determine priorities to make budget recommendations to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.
- f) To cooperate in ecumenical projects and events which have been approved by the Annual Conference.
- g) To interpret the programs of the General Church, the Jurisdictional or Central Conference, and the Annual Conference to the local churches; and to promote all General and Annual Conference benevolences.
- h) To provide two-way channels of communication among Annual Conference agencies, district Councils on Ministries, and local churches.
- i) To provide for relationships with all news media within conference; to lead the conference in making creative use of television and telecommunication ministries; to provide training in communication; and to perform public relations functions for the conference.
- j) To give leadership in research and planning for the Annual Conference.
- k) To provide linkage with general program agencies and provide names of Annual Conference agencies and persons who carry Program responsibilities related to each general program agency.

CHILDREN

This budget is not large for the amount of work that is done. The goals for 1998 will be to use part of this money for the purpose of selected resources to be used in the Peninsula Conference library and to be losned to churches. Today these consist mainly of video tapes and books. A second goal will be to use a part of this money to train a new children's coordinator in a General Church program that takes place in 1990. A small

portion of the money was used this year for resources for a new "outpost" Sunday School and we will need to give some help in 1990.

YOUTH

The goals for 1990 include four district events partially supported by the Annual Conference that will bring together youth from a geographical area. 2) The Youth Rally, which attracted 741 people in 1999, is costing more to promote but the results show that it is worth the investment. 3) There is a jurisdictional event in 1990 in which our elected youth leaders are expected to participate and 4) there is a national youth ministry organization in which every conference is to be represented. Please note that we spent \$1239.60 over our allotment which was provided from other line items in the C.O.M. bludget.

ADDIT.T

Our adult work has been concentrating in the area of older adults. The money in this line item will be used for a major training event within the bounds of the annual conference using professional personnel to help clergy and adults better understand our growing older adult population.

Overall Goals:

 Assist pastors of congregations to increase awareness of their aged as persons of worth and take responsibility for helping these persons attain the highest possible level of fulfillment in their lives.

Assist churches in identifying the needs of elderly persons in their congregation.

3. Make local churches aware of existing systems that link the aging population in meed with available services, such as information and referral, case work, home care, transportation, friendly visits, telephone reassurance, meals on wheels and institutional care.

 Where there are gaps in available services, provide information and reference points to enable congregations to develop outreach programs and training for local leadership.

Specific Objectives:

Sponsor three to four mailings to pastors of local churches with information that will assist them to develop programs for, with, and by the aged.

Resources Budget \$300.00 Mailings to pastors 200.00

Provide at least one aging ministries workshop in each district at \$58.88 each. This will cover resources and materials \$780.88 S780.88

A new quinquennium, a first for us. Already the work has begun in earnest as new board and commission chairs have assumed leadership. The Council officers and Executive Committee, chaired by James Robinson are moving us in the direction of centralized planning. In the near future, we hope, the focus of boards and commissions will sim their goals.

Rollowing the 1988 Annual Conference, we contracted with the Center for Parish Development to offer training for board and commission officers and members. As we begin life together as new groups, the conference leadership is picking up on the work of previous boards and commissions and are now planning for the entire quinquennium.

Two new staff members joined the team at nid-year. Connie Metzger has stepped into the Associate Council Director's slot for Communications. Her past experience in published writings and her expertise in public relations enabled her to move quickly into the position. Pamela Lardear is the Associate Council year with any local church groups using the facility. Pam is a good host and an efficient manager. With the help of the Drayton Board the future looks very positive.

The Racial Inclusiveness Dialogues, begun during the session of the last Annual Conference, have now moved to the Districts. Under the able direction of Vaughn Johnson this program will be completed on all four districts in 1989 and move to the next phase in 1998. We are committed to keeping before the Conference our goal of an inclusive church. If we are truly one in Christ Jesus, we must demonstrate it in our life together as a church.

Local church training programs continue week by week. Often these go unnoticed by congregations who have not asked for staff assistance. Many local churches have improved Church School programs, budget building programs, mission statements and taken the opportunity to face realities through a staff directed needs assessment. In addition to full-time staff, a team of education and special ministries consultants work with local churches when services are requested.

Leadership training for local church leaders and for conference leadership is under the direction of Harvey Manchester. At the time of this writing, more than 1,80% local church officers and clergy have benefited from the most recent training design. A conference youth rally with training for local church youth workers attracted 74l persons, which Harvey, with the help of Charles Barton, designed, promoted, and successfully accomplished. Much of the work that is reported by the Board of Discipleship is executed with Harvey's assistance, and those programs are interpreted in that report.

The Camp Pecometh Campaign is now underway. Finally results of the churche' initial responses will be presented at Annual Conference. We are deeply indebted to Wesley and Luise Sheffield for their guidance and leadership in helping us reach our petential. Under the leadership of Jack Simpers, our Director of Camping, our program continues to grow. We now have an American Camping Association accredited camp which means the highest standards for safety, programs, and maintenance. With our new expanded facilities, we will be able to offer more programs to more children and youth. In the Fall through Spring season, more space will be available for week-end youth groups and specialty camps.

This year our Council joined the rest of the Conference in the Celebration of the Church that welcomed back our area, Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel. We affirm his leadership among us as he begins his second term as our repiscopal and spiritual leader. We is present when the Council on Ministries meets and is a full participant in our deliberations. We are grateful to him for the amount of time he is able to devote to the program planning in the Council and for his teaching role in district leadership training programs. We are delighted that Joe and Lois will continue among us.

The Council Office is a busy place and if you have visited us, you know that. Your are equally aware of the graciousness of several persons who often are responsible for filling you mailboxes with conference information or responding to your telephone calls. All of us owe much to Shirley Still, Gloria Reed and foni Moor who have been with us for several years. This year, Alice Murgatroyd has joined our staff and is very much a part of the team. For them I especially dive thanks.

And above all we thank God, for guidance, challenge, and presence. Only that strength and grace makes all things possible.

Camp Pecometh

- As the quadrennium comes to an end, it is a privilege to report that the year 1988 has been one of the most exciting and spiritually enriching years in the history of the camping ministry of the Peninsula. Some of the highlights have included:
 - 1. 1988 Summer Theme: was based upon Genesis 1:31 which reads, "And God saw everything that He had made and was very pleased; and then there was evening." The theme permeated Bible Study, daily vesper services and the weekly Galilean Candlelight Service of Christian commitment.
 - Weather Conditions: effected all facets of the camping program as never before: The performance of the staff was commendable under extremely hot conditions with temperatures averaging 183 degrees throughout the summer.

- 3. Camper Registration: reached a new high of 1,288 as compared to 1,183 the year before. Camp Percometh exceeded its normal housing capacity and experienced overcrowded conditions. More than 48 children were turned away according to the registrar. Most significant is the fact that sore children from the local churches of the Peninsula Conference attended history camp than ever before in the camp's 42 year history.
- 4. Racial Ratio: 1,176 Caucasian, 107 Black, 4 Hispanic, 1
- 5. Camper Information: revealed the following:
 - A. Total Campers: 1,288
 - B. Non-Peninsula Conference Campers: 203
 - C. Campers from outside the Eastern Shore: 16 D. Neighborhood House Campers: 33
- Morld Hunger Offerings: totalled \$1,187.88 as compared to \$1,088.88 last year. Since 1975, the total amount of contributions for this worthwhile cause has been \$18,095.08. Pecometh campers and staff CARE about the tragedy of world hunger.
- AIDS: guidelines as adopted by the Council on Ministries were presented during Staff Training Week. Each counselor was equipped with an AIDS emergency kit for resident and travel camp programs.
- Burning Ban: existed throughout the summer due to dry conditions. This had a detrimental effect upon the camp programs since campfires and cookouts were prohibited.
- Day Camping Program: was initiated and for six weeks was found to be a valid addition to the overall program. Although attendance was less than expected, it is recommended that this program be continued next year.
- 10. Mini Camp: for second grade children, in its third year, once again proved to be a success on four occasions with 189 in attendance. (Our goal was 180 children.) We are experiencing a 180% return each year as our mini-campers return for a full week of camping.
- 11. EMLC Camperships: showed a dramatic increase once again with 37 on-half camperships being utilized as compared to 27 last year and 17 in the year of 1986.
- 12. Christian Education Sunday: this special offering for Camp Pecometh produced \$10,220.00 as compared to \$9,822.00 last year. We are indebted to those who enable us to exceed the goal of \$10,000.00.00.
- 13. Campership Fund: provided a rich camping experience for 24 disadvantaged boys and girls. Total subsidy was \$2,477.58 for children who otherwise would have been denied the privilege of attending our church camp.

- 14. Cabin Adoption Plan: has completed 13 years. We a indebted to the hundreds of lay persons and pastors who have contributed time, labor, and materials to the camp. Their loyalty continues to the lifeblood of Pecometh's ongoing ministry. The men of Kent Island UMC were welcomed as newest members of the camp
- 15. Camp Staff: has risen from 42 persons to 63 full and part lime persons. The counseling staff has increased from 39 to 27 in just one year. of the 27 counselors, 11 came from other lands including England, West Germany, Scotland, New Zealand, The Netherlands and
- 16. Camp Utilities: all overhead power lines were buried underground by Delmarva Power at no cost to the camp in reparation for future land use and development.
- Camp Usage: reached a new high of 6, 827 campers using the facilities for 19,223 camper days. This was an increase of 212 campers and 738 camper days over 1987.
- 18. Continuing Education: the Camp Director/Manager attended the National Conference of the American Camping issociation in Nashville, TN, the Northeast jurisdictional United Methodist Camp Leaders' Conference in Stoystown, PA, and the Northeast jurisdictional Convocation on Racism, Lancaster, PA.
- 19. Memorial Program: was officially established by the Board of Directors whereby individuals and churches could make contributions so the camp. It is hoped that live this program. A memorial book is located at the camp Administration Building.

CAMP DECOMPTH

ACTION GOALS FOR 1998

1. TO ESTABLISH A CAMP AMBASSADOR IN EVERY ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCH OF THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE.

Process: Every minority local church will be contacted in the next two years. The Ambassadors will promote the camping ministry and campership funds available to ethnic minority children.

 TO CONTINUE TO RECRUIT ETHNIC PERSONS TO SERVE ON THE SUMMER CAMP STAFF SO AS TO SECURE A MINIMUM GOAL OF 25% MINORITY REPRESENTATION.

Process: Maintain contact with those who have served and to distribute materials and hold interviews at black colleges for prospective black staff persons. Contact will be made with the black pastors of the Conference seeking names of prospective summer camp staff.

3. TO INCREASE THE GENERAL CAMPERSHIP FUND FOR NEEDY CAMPERS BY 25% WITH PARTICULAR ATTENTION TO EMEC YOUTH.

Process: Promote contributions to this fund through the Conference Communicator, the Ministers' Coordinated Mailing, and through individual and church sources.

4 TO CONTINUE TO IMPLEMENT THE CONSULTANT'S DEPONT

Process: The Camp Pecometh Board of Directors will assume responsibility for implementation in cooperation wit the Conference Council on Ministries and the Council on Finance and Administration

* Ethnic Minority includes Asian Korean, Hispanic, Native American and Black.

5. ENCOURAGE THE USE OF THE PECOMETH "SPEAKERS' BUREAU" THROUGHOUT THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE WITH SPECIAL EMPHASIS DIRECTED TOWARDS THE ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHIRCHER.

Process: Promote use of the "Speakers' Bureau" through the Communicator, Ministers' Coordinated Mailings, and the Ministers & Mates' Associations.

6. TO DEVELOP AT LEAST ONE NEW CAMPING PROGRAM DURING THE YEAR.

Process: Discover Camper's interests and needs through written evaluation on a weekly basis in addition to communication with other church camps.

7. CONTINUE TO STRENGTHEN AND PROMOTE ADULT CAMPING PROGRAMS.

Process: Discover needs of adults who already use the camp and continue to work through the Conference Coordinators of Adult and Family Ministries in conjunction with the Conference Committee on Retreat Ministries.

8. TO THOROUGHLY EVALUATE AND FURTHER DEVELOP THE CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMPONENT OF THE SUMMER CAMPING PROGRAM.

Process: This evaluation and development shall be the responsibility of the Program Committee of the board of Directors in conjunction with the Area Coordinators of the Conference Council on Ministries and the Camp Director/Manager using the Summer Campers Evaluations as references.

9. TO INCORPORATE A GREATER SENSE OF APPRECIATION AND UNDERSTANDING OF WILDLIFE IN THE CAMP PROGRAM.

Process: The Wildlife Management Plan as formulated by the Maryland Wildlife Administration, Department of Natural Resources, shall be implemented. PRoper cultivation of the property for continued growth of habitat for birds, animals, fish, be given priority attuined the common of the came of the came.

16. IN REFERENCE TO THE PECOMETH CAMPAIGN THE CAMP BOARD OF DIRECTORS WILL COOPERATE WITH THE PECOMETH CAMPAIGN CONTINUATION COMMITTEE.

Process: Information will be provided on a regular basis concerning campaign receipts and expenditures in addition to reports on the progress of land use and camp development plans.

11. TO BE INTENTIONAL IN RECRUITING CAMPERS FROM ETHNIC MINORITY LOCAL CHURCHES AND ESPECIALLY MALE CAMPERS FROM ALL CHURCHES OF THE PENINSULA COMPERENCE IN STRIVING TO ACHIEVE A MORE HAVORABLE BALANCE BETWEEN MALE AND FRALE CAMPERS.

Process: The Program Team of the Camp Board of Directors will implement this goal through program and promotional materials, use of the Conference Communicator, Coordinated Mailings and other means such as speaking engagements and color slide presentations, etc.

 CAMP PECOMETH WILL CONTINUE TO EVALUATE THESE GOALS AND STRATEGIES IN RELATIONSHIP TO THE EMLC.

Process: This evaluation shall be done by the Camp Pecometh Board of Directors in conjunction with an Ethnic Minority Task Force, Special Ministries of Peninsula Annual Conference and the Camp Director/Manager. Particular attention will be give to Asian Korean, Mispanic, and Native American, as well as Black.

The Committee has also decided that a vigorous campaign to expand the subscription base of the Communicator must be one of our priorities. A little less than \$30.00 to communications is spent on the Communicator; therefore it is imperative that we make good use of this resource. Our goals reflect this soulce.

We are also dedicated to maintaining our presence on the T.V. and radio. It is our belief that local churches will ultimately be the beneficiaries of this effort. We encourage local churches to become trained in using local media for effective communication and, therefore, are still offering matching-fund grants, although at a reduced level.

Drayton Retreat Center

Drayton is a ministry of the Peninsula Annual Conference; it seeks to provide both the physical facilities and the programmatic structure for the intentional cultivation of our avareness of God in our lives and in our world. It stands physically within the bounds of our Conference, and exists in our hearts and minds as a reminder of our privilege of, and our bounds of the conference of t

Many favorable advancements have been a part of Drayton's days recently. These developments are outlined as follows:

1. Improvements to the Physical Facility and Operations - A new water purification system was installed, which guarantees 1988 iron free, neutral water, and which is environmentally safe. A new telephone system has been installed providing three phone lines, eight phones, and ten phone locations. A new computer system has been set up to increase official content of the Town I records maintained. The restoration of the Town I records maintained. providing better service for guests and staff. Finally, new office and administrative procedures have been put into place, to provide for better management of Dravious's facilities and programs.

- Programmatic Development The educational component of Drayton's programming continues to be strong. The process for developing the Continuing Education Program has been somewhat revised to more directly respond to the continuing education needs and wishes of local congregations and pastors. Plans are wisnes of local congregations and pastors. Plans are being developed to offer a program in spirituality and mission cooperatively with Methodist Action Program, for both pastors and lay persons. Other educational programs, designed basically for lay persons are being explored and scheduled. Drawton is cultivating several new ventures in the exploration of our spiritual life. intended to not be educational as much as experimental Weekends are being set aside for prayer and work retreats and days are being specifically set aside for personal contemplation and reflection. Drayton is now offering regular evening worship experiences, intended to expand our experience of worship, by employing a unique setting, and unique celebrations.
- 3. Fiscal Responsibility Perhaps most notable is that Drayton is operating this current year, 1989, without an operating subsidy from the Annual Conference Budget. The financial support of the Conference is limited to the support of the Associate Council Director which has primary responsibility for the operation of Drayton. The financial outlook is good for Drayton, the budget is balanced and there is strict management of all expenditures through a new purchase coder system. There is every reason to believe that increase in the cost to use the facility in the near future.
- 4. Staff There have been several staff changes at Drayton in the past year; a new secretary and part-time maintenance person have been hired, as well as a number of new waitresses. The staff is working well together, and is striving to provide the highest possible service and hospitality to our guests. Hiring and personnel policies are being developed in accordance with guidelines for employees of the Annual Conference.
- 5. Public Relations Drayton is actively seeking to improve relationships within the immediate community of Kinnard's Point; we are taking positive steps to be a "good neighbor" to those who live closest to our facility. Within the larger community of the Annual late as adequately as possible to those who are less than familiar with it. Increased communication with Peninsula Conference, and surrounding conferences, has been important; we have tried to utilize the Communicator to a greater degree, have utilized more direct mall, and have developed demi lated more direct mall, and have developed demi publication at Rester 1989.

6. Building Project - The usage of Drayton is steadily on the increase, as noted below in the report of statistics. We are only able to accommodate slightly more than one half of all those who call to request space. Consequently, Drayton's Board of Directors has been actively developing a strategy to enlarge the facility at Drayton. Initial plans propose the addition of a three-story wing, to he located off the back of the building to insure the preservation of the esthetics of the building. Such an addition would provide additional sleeping, meeting, and dining space, while upgrading the kitchen facilities. Currently, Drayton is working with the Tri-Conference Construction Services, a construction service supported by the Peninsula, Rastern Pennsylvania, and Southern New Jersey conferences. TCCS is providing the necessary expertise to guide the thinking and planning of the Drayton Board, particularly in developing plans which will meet the needs of Drayton, for establishing a timeline for building, and for finally determining the costs of the project. TCCS will also provide the support needed for Drayton to act as Owner/Builder for the project (should construction become a reality) thus reducing the final cost of the project. Donations for the proposed addition continue to come in steadily from many supporters.

7. Statistics - The numbers which can be reported for usagm of Daryton during 1988 are indeed heartening. They reflect the growing recognition of the value of a retreat center sinistry in our Annual Conference, and of the adequacy of the Drayton facility. In 1988, 74 groups from the Peninsula Conference, and 85 other groups used Drayton, for a total of 159 groups, an increase of 164 over 1987; reported total. Additionally, 30 individuals or families used Drayton as a place of personal retreat, and 165 Pastors attended a Continuing Educations event at Drayton. The Reservations for 1989 took equally promising, with 168 reservations on the calendar, as of the end of February.

8. The Drayton Board of Directors — The Board continues to take a very active role in the operation of Drayton. A Long-Range Planning Day was held last fall, and a continuing committee to work on long scale plans has been put into place. Nembers of the plans has been put into place. The work of the leadership and your response to the sessions to date is something we need to celebrate!

Professional Growth Seminars, sponsored by BOOM continue to be held twice annually and will continue until all clergy have participated. The purpose of the seminars is to develop racial sensitivity among clergy. Barbara Thompson, General Secretary of the Commission on Religion & Race, still gives skilful leadership to these seminars and the response has been rewarding from those who have attended.

The Board of Ordained Ministry continues to develop guidelines for adoption by the Annual Conference to assure greater equity in cross-racial appointments with regard to compensation and status as was requested by the Annual Conference. Special Ministries continues to resource the Ethnic Minority Local Church. It has done this well during the past year by continuing to utilize the skills of the Special Ministries Consultants: Janet Harmon - Wilmington District; George Commodore - Easton District; Grant Johnson - Salisbury District; and Hayward Greene - Dover District. Liz St. Clair and Doris Phillips, the Educational Consultants, have met regularly wither special Ministries Consultants to plan and implement

Special Ministries has continued to implement the Comprehensive Plan by developing an annual strategy report at its summer retreat. This year the strategy report included resamining and monitoring the vision of all the ethnic groups represented (Asian Korean, Afro-American, Hispanic and Native American). As a result, we have discovered that Special Ministries has aided in the development of a new Asian Korean congregation in Salisbury and Ocean Pines, resourced the developing Hispanic congregation through the General Commission on Religion & Race, and facilitated the building of EMCC. Building Ministries and Salisbury and Caston Comprehensial Commission of McClighon & Race, and facilitated the building of EMCC.

 - Help Ethnic Minority Churches develop social justice ministries as it pertains to housing, substance abuse, infant mortality and AIDS education.
 - Assist Ethnic Minority Churches affirm their rich, religious heritage through the ministries of Christian education and Christian Mission.

THE BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY *

This report covers the leadership of two persons: Phillip Bosserman, from January to June, and Dr. Ruth Laws from June to December. The following projects and programs were funded as indicated for each item. Board actions are also included when appropriate.

I. An AIDS Ministry Program

The Board of Church and Society gave \$842.00 to health Support Ministries, Inc., 196 Clemwood Street, Salisbury, MD., to help their hands-on ministry to persons with Alos and their educational projects in the community.

II. Pacem in Terris

The Board continued its support of Pacem in Terris, giving this ecumenical program \$2,168.88. Its director, Dr. Sally Milbury-Steen, is a member of the Board and provides for the whole conference, leadership and resources, projects and programs in which and through which United Methodists of all ages can participate. Peacework, Pacem in Terris publication, is sent to each local pastor, and/or Church and Society chairperson.

III. Housing and Homelessness

The Board contributed \$1,688.88 to Habitat for Humanity for their work in numerous communities throughout the Conference area making possible self-help housing for persons an families needing shelter.

IV. Emerging Issues

\$358.88 were given to the Delaware Guidance Service for Children and Youth, Inc., DE., to meet the critical needs of families, and particularly children.

V. The Smyrna Bus Ministry

The Board continued to support the ecumenical Smyrna Bus Ministry project in the sum of \$348.88. This program provides bus transportation for Willington area families of prisoners at the Smyrna Prison who do not have the means of travel for regular visits.

VI. Training Event: The Fall Retreat

At the fall planning retreat the Board established primary goals for eight key result areas to be carried out during the next five years, starting in 1989. They are:

Key Result Area #1: Peace with Justice

Primary Goal: To communicate and work toward a vision of Shalom in which all people experience both inner peace and outward security based on faith, mutual cooperation and trust in God.

Key Result Area #2: Violence

Primary Goal: To create an awareness of the violence within each of us and to begin to address the various forms of violence present in our society and their desensitizing and dehumanizing influence on us.

Key Result Area #3: Inclusiveness

Primary Goal: To establish the recognition that all people are created in God's image, have worth and a contribution to make.

Key Result Area #4: Poverty and Economic Justice

Primary Goal: To insure that people's basic needs for food, housing, health care, education and employment are met.

Key Result Area #5: Substance Abuse

Primary Goal: To create an awareness of our bodies as temples of God's Holy Spirit and to provide additional resources for those affected by substance abuse.

Key Result Area #6: Environmental Justice

Primary Goal: To create an awareness of our role as stewards of God's creation and to begin to take responsibility for its care. Key Result Area #7: Administration

Primary Goal: To perform the responsibilities of the Board of Church and Society in a way that is cooperative, shared and effective.

Key Result Area #8: Education/Resourcing

Primary Goal: To inform the Conference, Districts and local Churches of the societal issues confronting the church and to assist them in formulating Christian responses to these issues.

BOARD OF DISCIPLESHIP

The year 1988 was a year of transition, as one quadrennium came to an end and another began. Special thanks to those division chairpersons who completed their service to the old Board in 1988: Paul Bauer, Robert O'Kelley Wallace, Michaele Russell, and Beverly Roupp.

The reports from the various divisions reflect the programmatic work of the board throughout the year. Clearly the new board members have honored and are building upon the work of those who have served before them. In that spirit, the new board spent much of the second half of the year determining its mission, vision, and quadrennial goals.

The mission of the Peninsula Conference Board of Discipleship (see 1988 <u>Discipline</u> para. 729 and 1281) can be summarized as providing a vital link between the General Board of Discipleship, the annual conference, and the local church to enable the local church in its ministry of:

Reaching out and receiving people where they are, as they are;

Helping persons to enter into relationship to God;

Nurturing, supporting, and equipping persons for Christian discipleship;

Sending disciples into their community to serve and give witness to the transforming power of God.

The vision of the Peninsula Conference Board of Discipleship is expressed as follows:

We are called to walk on water - Our energies are not drained trying to keep the boat afloat. Instead we are called by the living Christ to walk upon the gale swept sea. (Mt. 14:22-33) -- Peninsula Conference local churches are no longer focused on "survival" or "maintenance" but on "transforming ministry" in which the local church is an inclusive, energetic faith community, taking seriously its pro-active, missional role in the larger community.

We have many limbs and organs, but we are all one body - We are different, but not disconnected. In Christ, our variety is a source of wholeness and strength. We know indeependence is an illusion. Interdependence produces growth and builds us up in love. (ICor. 12:12-27, Eph. 4:15-16)

--The members of our local churches consciously experience connectionalism in terms of inclusiveness, ownership, and corporate ministry.

Grounded in our mission and guided by our vision, the Board developed the following three Quadrennial Goals:

To be-- and be perceived by the annual conference and local church members as -- a Board of Discipleship that does support and help local churches in their ministries.

To develop and pioneer (utilizing resources of the General Board of Discipleship) a model of distinctively United Methodist disciplemaking for use by the churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference.

To assist each local church in developing at least one connectional/inter-racial ministry with another (or other) United Methodist church(es).

The current Board of Discipleship is working hard to be a unified board. The various divisions are working hard to keep their work coordinated and focused.

I want to express appreciation to the outstanding team of officers, members, and council staff who have gotten this board off to a great start.

Division of Education

"Within every local church are women and men who have been gifted by God with the special ability to teach and to share their faith with others in order to build up the community of faith. These disciple makers are called TRACHERS. They are essential to the life, health, and growth of the church. This affirmation begins the statement of introduced this strategy for Disciple Making to the local church through a series of 17 substitute of the strategy for district workshops involving many local church teachers, administrators, and pastors. This comprehensive plan provides support for Christian Education at many different levels.

It is supportive of the local church Sunday School. Teacher training workshops were provided this year with the theme:
"Teaching Invitationally/Making Disciples/Teaching for Commitment". A special Festival of Music was held in October to assist Church School teachers and choir directors in the use of music in the classroom. Lir St. Clair and Doris Phillips, our education consultants, provided on the site training and support for many local churches and were responsible for helping several churches in our conference begin new Church School programs. A new outpost Sunday School program has begun in Glasgow and many churches have reported great success stories resulting from our assistance and support.

The plan also focuses upon the development of leaders for Christian Education work in our conference. 128 persons from the Peninsula Conference attended the Area Education Rally for a daylong training event and the celebration of the role which Sunday School plays in the life of the church. Persons were involved in Lab School Training to prepare then to lead workshops and several ethnic minority persons were sent to the Christian Educators Conference to receive further training for work within the EMLC. About 58 pastors attended an overnight seminar at Drayton entitled "Pastor as Educator" as the division sought to encourage pastoral leadership in the educational ministry of the local church.

Another vital part of this plan is to help provide the mecessary resources for Church School. Our financial and leadership support of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency Resource Center has made it possible for them to establish an 880 number for local church use and extend their services to the southern denominations enables us to have a much more extensive library of resources and opens the exciting possibilities of ecumenical cooperation. Our consultants have assisted the Conference Special Ministry Consultants in developing and training mission teams who worked with EMLC Churches during the summer. They also provided assistance in the creation of the Resource Centers in priority.

The inauguration of "To Grow a Teacher" has brought excitement and interest from many local churches. The dedicated work of many leaders in our division and conference has made it possible for us to plant the seed. Special thanks must be given to Marvey Manchester for his vision and creative support. As we move into the next quinquenium the seeds which have been planted will begin to bear fruit. The following represent our dreams for the nurture and growth of our program in 1998:

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES:

1. To equip persons to provide leadership for our Conference in Christian Education by providing training opportunities. Specific training components will include Northeastern Jurisdiction Lab Schools, "Disciple" Training (a course designed to train persons to lead Bible Studies in local churches), and the Christian Educators Fellowship National Conference. These persons are frequently used as workshop leaders in our conference.

- 2. To provide local churches with a balance of near-by workshops and on-site support in the development of their local education ministry leaders, workers and program. This will be accomplished through the work of our Consultants, our support of the Interfaith Lay Academy, and by providing workshops for local church teachers, superintendents, and other Church School
- 3. To make a wide array of quality printed and audio-visual resources accessible to our local churches. This goal will be accomplished through our support of the DEA Resource Center and by providing curriculum samples and training in the use of United Methodist Curriculum Resources.
- 4. To work closely with the other Divisions of Board of Discipleship as we seek to support the local churches in their ministries.

Division of Evangelism

The Division began the year by encouraging clergy and laypersons to attend the Congress of Evangelism held, in January, in Chicago, Illinois. Scholarship monies were made available to persons attending.

The Five Star Program was again promoted throughout the Conference with over sixty-five local churches receiving recognition for their outstanding work in Evangelism during the year. Progress was made in developing a spiritual formation program to be used at the local church level.

Workshops promoting "Ways of Witnessing" were presented at Cambridge, MD. and Dover, DE. The keynote speaker as Jean Henderson from the Holston Conference Techniques Local Henderson translated the three for witnessing, Occasional, Lifestyle and Intentional. Workshops were attended by over 288 people.

The Harry Denman Evangelism Award was awarded to Rev. Robert O'Kelley Wallace of Zion Church in Cambridge, MDL and to Mrs. Barbara S. Jester of Salem Church in Newark, DE.

Scholarships were made available to twelve persons who attended the Annual Northeastern Jurisdictional School of Evangelism held at Lycoming College in Williamsport, PA in July.

The Division continued its support of National and Jurisdictional sections of Evangelism through financial pledges.

Training sessions for D.O.E. members included N.E.J. School, Convocation on Racism and Training Event, Congress of Evangelism, and "Offering Christ Today" Seminar sponsored by the G.B.O.D., section on Evangelism held in Cherry Hill, NJ.

Our celebration at Annapolis drew thousands and exceeded all expectations. Evangelism from the Peninsula was well represented. We welcomed a new staff person from the Program Management Team, Rev. Connie Metzger, at our Convocation of Boards held in June in Seaford.

Strategies for developing a plan of Evangelism for EMLC were

In November, we honored the 1988 members of the Order of St. Barnabas at a reception held in Asbury U.H.C. in Marrington, Delaware. The program was highlighted by a message from Rev. J.T. Sewmour.

The Board of Discipleship continues to adopt concerns which emphasize the importance of equipping persons to help in the nurturing and educating process of building effective disciples in the Conference. By providing funds to both laity and clergy, the Division of Worship was able to send persons to the Northeastern Jurisdictional School of Worship (FUHWMOA), held at Lycoming College in Williamsport, Pennsylvania during August 7-12, 1988. This experience enables persons to receive training in worship skills and to become worship resource persons to the churches of our Conference.

The Division has again purchased worship enrichment resources and placed them in the Conference Resource Library for use by worship leaders in the local church. It is our hope that the worship leaders in the local churches will avail themselves to the use of these very important resources.

Efforts are still being made by the Division of Worship to establish a Peninsula Conference Chapter of the Fellowship (FUMHMOA). This will receive much attention in the coming year. It is our intention to increase the number of (FUMHMOA) members in our Conference and to assure that Ethnic Minority members are recruited.

During the past 29 years, Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc. has established a Christian tradition of caring by providing services which enhance the lives of older adults. Within our homes, staff and residents alike share a deep commitment to thee well-being of all persons living and working together. At Methodist Country House, Methodist Manor House and Cokesbury Village, more than 980 older adults enjoy the services, security and companionship of a life care retirement community.

With the number of 65-plus adults growing rapidly, POWH continues to improve crising services to its residents, while implantant of defect of the programs to meet new needs. The dedication of the new wing of the Pigueron Health Center at the Methodist Country House adds 12 skilled nursing beds to our list of accomplishments for 1988. This addition will make it possible for POWH to meet the medical needs of older resident population and offer the community the same fine quality nursing care that Country House residents have enjoyed since 1968. This S1.4 million project was largely funded by \$1,227,838.88 given to the Commitment to Caring capital campaign. To all those who supported POWH in this endeavor, we are most grateful.

As well as responding to the needs of those residents requiring health care, PUNH has improved transportation service for residents at both Cokesbury Village and Manor House. Two easy access buses, specially equipped to handle wheelchair patients, were provided through federal and state funds available to non-profit organizations serving elderly and handlcapped individuals. These new vehicles enhance our ability to provide trips to shopping areas, cultural activities and social events

In an effort to improve our managerial efficiency, PUMH worked with the firm of Coopers & Lybrand on unified management system for all of our facilities. In sharing our knowledge and experience with others, PUMH has effected major improvements in the management of the Layton Home, a 18% bed nursing facility which serves low-income, primarily black elderly in Wilmington. Occupancy at thee facility has increased, medical care has greatly improved and today, with an active community relations program, the Layton Home is experiencing a positive change in the public's perception toward this nursing facility. We are grateful for the opportunity to extend our service to low-income, minority elderly applied to the "Home with a service to the

More than simply managing nursing and retirement facilities, within the Peninsula Conference PUMH reaches out beyond our homes to share experience and resources and support advocacy efforts. PUMH works with the Older Adults Task Force to address the needs of the older adult population throughout local churches and communities.

1988 brought the retirement of Robert W. Mercer, vice president and director of operations for PUMH. His 25 years of service, characterized by his Christian faith and financial expertise, will have a lasting impact upon our organization and will add immeasurably to the fulfillment and security older people experience as residents in our retirement communities.

Other celebrations in 1988 included our annual staff recognition events. The commitment of our staff was honored as 28 PUMH employees received awards for 5-year increments of service. The dedication and true personal care show to residents, volunteers and fellow staff members by those honored and all PUMH employees agree the key to the high quality, individualized service we offer our residents.

Also celebrated was the tenth anniversary of the Cokesbury Village retirement community this year. The highlight of the festive occasion was the recognition of Rev. William Hemphill, Jr., former PUMH board chair and member for 23 years, who there is the provided the fourth annual Founders Award. In 1988, PUMH took great strides in enhancing its ability to attract and meet the needs of prospective residents. The value of retirement in one of our life care communities can now be

communicated more effectively, and contacts and trends can be followed more efficiently. New horchures, stationery and logos add to the overall effectiveness of our admissions program. As with any service, satisfied customers are the best source of new customers, and this is also true with PUNH facilities. Throughout the year, many persons inquiring about our homes gave friends in residence as the source of referral. The continuing success in providing well-run facilities and quality service is the single most important strategy we have to meet growing commetifien in this field.

Successful planning and marketing continue with our efforts in developing Heron Point of Chestertown, PUNH's planned retirement community. This, our newest project, will blend the PUNH tradition of quality retirement care with the unmistakable charm of Eastern Shore hospitality. With almost half of its planned apartments and cottages contracted for, Meron Point is scheduled to open in 1931. The project has received final Maryland's "critical areas" legislation.

PUNN is most grateful to the many generous friends who contributed \$1,830,568 in 1988 for benevolence assistance to limited-income residents, for special projects such as the health center addition at the Country House and for the endowment fund. Neighborhood House, Inc. has been long recognized as a service provider to meet the present needs of the community it serves, while anticipating and planning for future concerns. We have been blessed with your prayers and generosity in helping us to carry out our ministry. Thank you for your love and concern.

The year of 1988 provided many challenges and rewards. The following is a reflection on some of the programs and activities of the center.

Apple Square Development

In 1988, Neighborhood House, Inc. started and completed construction of 28 modular homes in South Wilmington. This was the first new home construction in the area since 1954 When 188 units of public housing were built. The started was the started by the started

Child Care

In 1988, 189 different children were enrolled in Day Care. They received many developmental and educational experiences. The program enabled parents to work, to school and to have job training, Quality Day Care negates the need for special education, rehabilitation mation's economic security.

Youth Development

Neighborhood House, Inc. was one of ten community centers to participate in Delaware's Office of Prevention Substance Abuse Prevention Demonstration Project. The project called "Wilmington Cluster Against Substance Abuse (MCASA) is designed to promote a healthy life style free of drugs.

In 1988, 48 youth between the ages of 9 and 15 participated in the program. In addition to information sessions they also participated in a variety of special organized activities such as martial arts, weight lifting, and drill team. These activities to the program of the pro

Coordinator for the project was Kenneth Lemon. Kenneth, a product of Neighborhood House, graduated from Morgan State University. Educational Services

Education is so important to the future of our youth that we offer a variety of services. In 1988, 117 youth participated in tutoring, 17 participated in adult basic education, 15 in college career readiness, and 1 in dropout presention.

It is rewarding when youth in the College Career Readiness Program blossom when nurtured with love and care. Currently, there are two young men who are enrolled in the program who are the first in their families to attend college. The first in their families to attend college. Social Services

In 1988, 236 families received emergency assistance from the agency's food closet. This was a short term solution to a long term problem. To address the long term need, the agency established a Brown Bag Club for low-income families.

The Brown Bag Club has 24 families who pay monthly dues and receive donated food and household supplies from the Delaware Food Bank for 12 cents per pound. Club members assist with the purchase and distribution of the food. It has provided opportunities for developing friendships and opportunities for developing friendships, club members shared two food baskets with needy families.

The Future

Neighborhood House, Inc. is currently engaged in a long range planning process to assess the needs of the community it serves and to determine what it must be doing as an agency to meet those needs. The agency will be developing a five-year plan.

Although the focus of the planning process is on needs and regards, the agency recognizes the need to improve its facilities. It is anticipated that a major capital campaign will be needed in 1990 or 1991 to raise money to improve our facilities.

Dr. H. DeWayne Whittington Chairperson My report last year noted the importance to Wesley College of the then upcoming visit of the Middle States Accreditation Team. Let me begin my report on 1988 by stating with pride that your Wesley College came through that process with flying colors. Following an intense period of self-study, we were visited in April by a team of eight distinguished college administrators and scholars who interviewed hundreds of students, Trustee leadership, every faculty member and administrator, and read through voluminous files and a self-study report. Following their favorable exit report to us and their recommendations to the Commission on Higher Education of the Middle State the Commission of the Middle State 1888, along the commendation of the Middle State 1888, along the Commission of the Middle State of

An expected visit by a team from the University Senate of the United Methodist Church, the body charged with the oversight of all United Methodist colleges and universities, failed to materialize in 1988 due to changes in the top leadership of the National Board of Higher Education and Ministry in Nashville. That visit was rescheduled for the Spring of 1989 and is about to take place (March 5, 6, and 7) even as I write. I am confident that these outstanding and welcome representatives of the Church will find the same strengths identified that the ware equally serious about and proud of our relationship to the Church

My confidence is based on a solid record of achievement in 1988 which includes the following highlights:

*The College opened its doors for the Fall 1988 semester with the second largest student enrollment in its 116 year history -- 825 full-time students, and increase of 228 over the Fall of 1987. By "headcount", we are now in the service of over 1,880 students of all variety.

*The addition of six new Baccalaureate programs - the Bachelor of Science in Education/Biology, Education/General Science, Education/Physical Education, Elementary Education and Fashion Marketing, and the Bachelor of Arts in History - brings us to a total of 20 baccalaureate programs, up from six programs in 1983.

*The College purchased the property of the First Saptist Church which adjoins the Wesley campus on the South and which includes an education building and a sanctuary. The Muscale building was put into use in Sanctuary will be used by the First Baptist congregation until it moves into its new building about a year from now. When we take possession of the sanctuary, Wesley will have the first separate chapel building in its history.

*The College also purchased property adjoining its athletic field which will provide the space for a new football stadium and playing fields for baseball, soccer, field hockey and women's softball.

*The auditor's report indicated that Wesley has completed its fifth consecutive year with a financial operating surplus.

*Beginning with the Fall of 1988, Wesley now offers a Fre-Ministry Program which leads to a Bachelor of Arts degree in applied communication, history, liberal studies, political science or psychology with a minor in religion. Designed according to the guidelines of the American Association of Theological Schools, this program is a visible sign of our commitment to be Church.

Our higher education system, nationally, is entering an era of very dramatic change. According to a compelling presentation by the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, an organization in which Wesley has membership and in which I am personally active, challenges have not been met and opportunities have not been near realized for greater minority participation in higher education. While high school graduation rates have been increasing for minority students, college enrollment rates have not kept pace. The high school graduation rate for black students was 62% in 1971, 71% in 1981, and 76% in These figures show a marked improvement nationally. However, the percentage of black high school graduates continuing on to college has decreased from 29% in 1971 to 28% in 1981 and even further to 26% in 1986. This is a situation where every college in the United States -- especially the Church related college -- must become positively and helpfully involved. Lamentably, the situation among Hispanic students is no better. The high school graduation rate for Hispanics has improved from 52% in 1971 to 63% in 1986. However, the percentage of those graduates enrolling in college rose from 30% in 1981 to a sharp drop-off of 27% in 1986. Even more vexing is the fact that there is a current and a projected shortage of minority teachers and professors. The Church related college must develop new initiatives to respond to these crises. Wesley College will soon take under active advisement the proposal of actions that hold the potential of increasing minority participation at Wesley. We will also eagerly await the results of the special NAICU Task That Task Force on minority participation in higher education. Force and its working groups will be meeting throughout calendar year 1989 to address these concerns and Wesley will be a grateful recipient of NAICU findings and recommendations. meantime, Wesley College calls upon the Church to give consideration to advocating Wesley College as an excellent educational opportunity for minority students and to give aid to advancing scholarship monies for the sake of successfully recruiting and retaining minority students at Wesley College.

Change is the only constant in successful higher education today. Accordingly, the College is now involved in long range planning which will lay the strategy to invent an increasingly impressive future. However, the College related Church may be assured that in the building of that impressive future this Church related College will never draw a partition between the ideal of success and the ideal of service in the name of our Lord.

Mesley Foundation at Delaware State College has continued during the past year to be pastorally in touch, individually and corporately, with Untied Methodists on campus. Meekly visits are paid to Halls of Residence and student centers, to meet, counsel, and keep in touch with students, and to invite and encourage attendance and fellowship, participation and involvement in Sunday worship and other activities of Whatcoat and other area United Methodist Churches of their choice.

Opportunities for group fellowship, discussion, Bible Study and Faith sharing, support and encouragement (especially with new students and at examination times) have been provided through dinner meetings, social hour, etc. Wesley Foundation has participated in the United Campus Ministry - and ecumenical inclusive approach to ministry on the campus, by area denominations and Wesley Foundation.

Accommodation provided by the College as a Center for United Campus Ministry and religious emphasis, has been renovated and is to be furnished; but is already providing a sense of location and identity for our campus Ministry.

An evaluation of Wesley Foundation revealed the need to strengthen our ministry at Delaware State College, so that it receives primary pastoral attention (e.g. 4 - 5 days per week) instead of secondary attention (e.g. 1/2 - 1 day per week) which has been the situation for nearly a decade.

BOARD OF PENSIONS .

This year has been a year of challenge for the Peninsula Annual Conference Board of Pensions. At the 1988 Session of the Annual Conference, the Board of Pensions was given the responsibility for the Clery-Lay insurance Program. This program includes our health, dental, non-contributory life and cliquently to life insurance programs security for our clergy, and the program of the programs. We have sought to direct and administer these programs with financial interrity and compassion.

Despite the major fluctuations in the stock and bond markets in 1988, our portfolio of \$3,573,626, managed by the Bank of Delaware experienced a positive growth.

The Board is committed to the principle that financial planning is helpful for each clergy person and their family. In April 1989, a Financial Planning Seminar will be offered for clergy and their mates. Resource persons for the seminar will be from the General Board of Pensions.

The contribution rate that the local church pays into the MPP for the pastor's pension is 12%. This percent is contingent on the past service rate for clergy service rendered prior to 1982 being not less than .9% of the Conference Average Compensation. The PSR of \$225 for 1989 is 8.93. The proposed PSR of \$249 for 1989 will be 8.94.

Statement of Goals for 1998:

- 1. To solidify our rising health care costs.
- To make improvement in closing the gap between a Past Service Rate (PSR) that is 0.94% of Conference Average Compensation (CAC) and a PSR that is 1% of CAC.

Pension Recommendations:

The Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions recommends that:

- The Past Service Rate for 1990 be \$240 per year of approved service.
- Each charge is encouraged to observe Retired Minister's Day, in honor of the retired ordained ministers and their spouses, and the surviving spouses of ordained ministers that reside in the area of your parish.

3. It is recommended that the President of the Conference of Pensions be notified when a death or disability occurs in the family of an active or retired ordained minister or full-time local pastor so that contact with the family can be made to inform and assist them in obtaining their benefits.

RESOLUTION RELATING TO RENTAL/HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED OR DISABLED MINISTERS OF THE PENINULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as the United Methodist Church and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of the United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of the Untied Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and compensation for active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the Peninsula Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed minsters who are members of their Conference; and

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received by a retired minister, or 100% of the disability benefit payments received by a disabled minister, during the year disabled minister, during the year as a rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordsined or licensed minister of The United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the time of himmal Conference at the time of him of her retirement or disability;
- The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such

retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all amployment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of the United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of the United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry contributions to the pension or benefit funds of the United Methodist Church for the United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's pension or disabled minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

NOTE:

INSURANCE COMMITTEE:

The chief challenge faced by our Board this year and most likely will continue in the foreseeable future has been rising health costs. This problem is not unique to our Conference. It is a national problem affecting all segments of society. Health care costs are increasing about 22% per year and doubling every 3.5 years. These statistics are avesome and foreboding. They represent serious implication s not only for our Conference but also for the nation.

Johnson and Higgins, a reputable health care consulting firm, has been engaged to give direction to our Board as we make plans for the future health care concerns and programs of our conference. Johnson and Higgins is a national firm and our consultant works out of their Wilmington office. We are most grateful for the assistance the consultant has given us as a Board and to Ted Briggs who has served us so faithfully and competently.

The consultant working with the Insurance Committee to redesign the health care benefits for the Peninsula Conference considered the following objectives:

 A balance be struck between a health care program that would be competitive in the community, yet not so rich in benefits that it would be financially burdensome on the Peninsula Conference or participants in the program who contribute toward family coverages.

- bavelop a plan design that would attempt to have a positive impact on the claims experience, such as preventative care, so that future plan changes, which may be necessary to keep the costs at reasonable level, would be as modest as possible.
- Deal with the health care costs as a financial vehicle composed of three elements-
 - A. Paid Claims
 - B. Reserves
 - C. Fixed Costs

INSURANCE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. Medical Insurance

Preventative Care:

Physical exams for the subscriber and eligible dependents once every two years. Allowance is limited to \$188.08 per two year period per person and is to include the exam and related tests.

Four physical exams for dependent children during the first year of life.

Immunization of children under six years of age for:

Diphtheria 4 doses Tetanus and pertussis (DPT) vaccine Measles, mumps and rubella vaccine (1 dose) Polio vaccine (3 doses)

Comprehensive Major Medical Coverage:

\$200 calendar year deductible per individual. When two family members have met the \$200 deductible, the deductible is met for the entire family.

Individual co-pay is at 80/20 of the first \$5,000 of allowable expenses per calendar year. Individual maximum out-of-pocket per calendar year including the deductible is

\$1,200. When two family members have met the calendar year co-pay, it is met for the family.

100% coverage following the deductible and co-pay.

Coverage will be less comprehensive for mental, nervous and alcohol/drug rehabilitation.

2. DENTAL INSURANCE

Preventative:

In full coverage with no deductible or co-pay for preventative dental services - two visits per year.

The \$25.00 deductible is common to basic and major services. Calendar year maximum per individual is \$1,000.

NOTE: All claims, both medical and dental, are paid on the allowable charges determined by the insurance carrier.

- Effective January 1, 1990, retired ministers' premiums for contributory group life insurance will be withheld from his or her pension check.
- 4. Effective July 1, 1989:
 - a) Ministers appointed to the Peninsula Conference, for the first time, must make arrangements with the Conference Business Office for enrollment in medical, dental, life and pension programs.
 - b) Ministers leaving appointments in the Peninsula Conference, must make arrangements with the Conference Business Office to be properly transferred from the benefit program.
 - c) Ministers incurring changes in their family status, such as marriages, divorces, newborn children, deaths, etc. must notify the Conference Business Office within thirty days of these events.
- Each pastor is responsible to keep the Conference Business Office and the General Board of Pensions apprised of any changes to their designated beneficiary.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

The primary responsibility of the Commission on Archives and History is the care of Barratt's Chapel and Museum. In this we depend on the able and enthusiastic work of our curator, Ed Sharp and his wife, Mary Ann.

Barratt's Chapel has been designated a Shrine of the United Methodist Church by General Conference. The Museum includes displays relating to the history of the Peninsula Conference, as research library, and the official archives of the Conference, as the conference of the Conferenc

The Commission sponsors two worship services a year at Barratt's Chapel. On the second Sunday of November, we celebrate the anniversary of the meeting of Coke and Asbury. This year's service featured Dr. Carol Hoffecker of the University of Delaware as speaker, with music provided by the choir of Asbury United Methodist Church, Sayrna. In December, we also hold a candielight carol service. Our 1988 carol service, led by Commission members, Dr. Fred Seyfert and George Cale; Occamism of the Commission members, Dr. Fred Seyfert and George Cale; Church, Milford by the Sell Chuir of Avenue United Method; Milford, was patticularly successful, with 298 persons in attendance.

We are always concerned with the maintenance and improvement of the physical facilities at Barratt's. A significant improvement this past year was the addition of new lighting in the parking lot. Expansion of the Museum collection is another continuing emphasis. We were fortunate in 1988 to receive the library of the Rev. O.N. Spence, which includes much material on the former Delaware Conference. A special committee is now at work on a history of the Delaware Conference.

The Commission depends on endowments and gifts from churches and individuals for about two-thirds of its support. Also, we are always seeking new material s of historical interest to add to the Museum collection. The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency is an organization of fifteen Christian denominations united to share faith ministry on the peninsula. The conference is one of the most generous members in numbers of persons involved (29) and monetary support (over \$21,988). Bishop Yeakel, Gordon Stapleton, Edwin Lasbury, Beatrice Lynn, and Vernon Schmid serve on the board. The chief goals of DER this year was to offer more programs to congreations.

The AIDS Ministry Team, Cliff Armour representing the conference, has developed a packet which provides educational information to prevent the spread of the disease and pastoral material to foster a compassionate ministry to people with AIDS.

The Faith and Order Committee, Laurence Berry representing the conference, has designed consultations on Christian ministry for local congregations. To date, 129 persons from seven judicatories have taken part in these consultations.

The Ministry for Public Policy of Delaware and Maryland, Ruth Laws and Sandra Steiner Ball representing the conference, advocate and Sandra Steiner Ball representing the conference, advocate maintenance, criminal justice, and hunger. Seventeen United Methodist congregations requested to be on our list of contact for advocacy issues.

The Resource Center, Elaine Stout director, provides

religious educational materials and consultant services to congregations. The conference is represented by <u>Harvey</u> Manchester and Amelia Bobon, chair. A major effort is the expansion services to Dover, <u>Faston</u>, Georgetown and Salisbury. Servy Device, 70m Donachi, Bombu Kelley, and Willis Cupery

The staff, Judy Berry and Thelma Meginniss, continue to be a vital link among the judicatories and in the community. A few examples follow: assisted in the allocation of over \$250,000 in Tederal funds to agencies that serve the hungry and the homeless; 35 groups used our mailing lists to contact congregations about such varied needs as cancer education, support groups, hospital

In 1998, we plan to continue our emphasis on direct services to congregations and thereby make our work of growing in Christian unity more visible.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

It is the purpose of The Commission on Equitable Salaries to support ministry in the charges of the Annual Conference by 1) administering funds to be used in salary supplementation; 2) recommending conference standards for ministerial compensation; and 3) providing counsel and advisory material on ministerial compensation to District Superintendents and Pastor/Parish Relations Committees. In accordance with those quidelines, the commission has provided financial assistance to those pastors whose charges, for various reasons, were unable to provide the minimum compensation established by this Annual Conference. In addition, the commission continues to award financial supplements to those pastors whose special talents are required to effectively serve their respective appointments. (A list of those charges receiving financial supplement can be found at the end of this report.) Furthermore, the commission also provides the related pension (MPP & CPP). In 1988, pastors in 54 charges received salary supplements of \$108,672.72, plus pension fund contributions of \$18,128.00, for a total of \$126,800.72. Additionally, seven (7) pastors received grants for furniture totaling \$8.000.00

Minimum Salary and Travel Reimbursement

WHEREAS, the Commission on Equitable Salaries has strived to bring the Peninsula Conference up to the Denominational Average (D.A.C.);

WHEREAS, the Commission on Equitable Salaries for the past two years have based minimum salary using the Conference Average Compensation;

STANDARDS FOR THE PARSONAGES THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

I. The purpose of Parsonage Standards is three-fold:

To help the congregations provide suitable housing, within reasonable limits for the pastor's family.

To help the pastor's family and the congregation in taking proper care of the parsonage.

To help avoid misunderstandings between the congregation and the pastor, (and successive pastors) where pastors move from one parsonage to another.

II. Minimum Standards for Parsonages:

- A. The minimum number of rooms should include: three bedrooms with ample closet space in each, living room, dining room, kitchen, 1/2 baths, utility room. If there are two bedrooms or less in an existing parsonage, it is recommended that the parsonage be upgraded to Minimum Standards. In some cases adding new rooms should be considered. If a study is not available at the Church, there shall be one at the parsonage.
- B. Utilities: We recommend central heating system; combination storm windows and doors; hot water heater and sufficient electrical

outlets in each room. Air conditioning should be installed for the pastor's study, and consideration for the entire parsonage. Basic cable and/or antenna should be provided where needed.

- c. Pastor's Study office is preferably in the church building, but if located in the parsonage it should be on the first floor. The study should be equipped with adequate bookshelves, desk, files, storage closet for supplies, mimeograph machine and/or copier, typewriter, and telephone. The pastor's bookshelmen an outside entrance when at the partonage are not trible entrance when at
- D. Furnishings and equipment to be provided by
 - Window blinds, curtains, or drapes; rugs or wall-to-wall carpet; adequate lighting.
 - Kitchen: refrigerator with freezer, range and oven, dishwasher, adequate cabinet and counter space. It is recommended that vinyl floor covering be on the kitcher floor.
 - Utility Room: An automatic washer and dryer; adequate plumbing and wiring for all utilities.
 - 4. Church to supply fire extinguishers for kitchen and outside the furnace room door. These should be the ABC type or other Underwriters approved type. They need to be checked once a year. Smoke alarm systems should be installed on each floor.
 - A good working lawnmower should be provided.

III. Care of Property:

- A. Insurance: The church shall provide adequate fire and liability insurance on the parsonage. The minister shall provide insurance on furniture and personal items. The minister shall provide a copy of insurance coverage to the trustees.
- B. The parsonage shall be well maintained with periodic checks by Chariperson of Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, the Chairperson of Board of Trustees and pastor. Paint, wall paper, wiring, plumbing should all be inspected. A report shall be made annually to the Charge Conference. This report shall be given by the Chairperson of the Trusteest of the Charge of the Pais and the Charge of the Dissert Superintendent of current condition of the parsonage.
- C. The Pastor-Parish Relations Committee should make an inventory of the parsonage equipment with the help of the parsonage pastor,

listing all items owned by the church, their condition, and date purchased. There should also be kept records of the dates when the various rooms were renovated, painted, etc and their current condition.

- D. The minister is responsible for any damage to church property by members of the family or family pets.
- E. Such things as cutting grass, trimming shrubs, shoveling snow, and the like are to be worked out between the minister and the Pastor Parish Relations Committee.

IV. Minister's Responsibilities:

- A. Since the minister's goods, are not provided protection by the church's insurance policy, it is recommended that every minister's family inventory their possessions and have them insured against loss, both in the church building and in the parsonace.
- B. At moving time, the minster should leave the parsonage in clean, orderly condition. The facilities should be in good report. The condition of the condition
- C. While the Church to which the minister moves is responsible for the cost of moving, a minister who has a hobby that involves considerable quantities of equipment ought to participate in the cost of the moving, to the extent of his/her equipment. This is a
- D. The minister should leave for his/her successor:
 - 1. Tagged Keys for all locks.
 - Notes on whom to call in case of emergency.
 - Notes on whom to call for service and repairs.
 - Notes on where to find such things as screens, lawnmowers, etc.
 - Same telephone number. (If not possible, notify the Secretary of the Annual Conference immediately of the change.)

V. Make life more pleasant for Minister and Congregation:

- A. We recommend an "open house" be observed in accordance with the program of the church.
- B. The parsonage is the home of the minster and the minister's family during their occupancy;

their rights and privacy should always be observed by members of the congregation. However, the minister and the family should take good care of all parapage property.

- C. The Chairperson of Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations, The Chairperson of Board of Trusttes and the pastor should make an annual inspection of the parsonage to determine necessary repairs and replacements. This should be done at the discretion of the narsonage family.
- D. Since all utilities are paid by the church,

such items as storm windows,insulation, and improved heating systems should be given every consideration. Utilities are interpreted to mean heat, electricity, gas, oil, sewage, water, telephone atennae and/or basic cable TV service if connected. (Note: The minister is responsible for personal toll calls made by the parsonae family.

- E. It is recommended that maintenance free material be used in existing and new parsonages, such as: ceramic tile, paneling, durable floor coverings, aluminum siding, vinyl or aluminum windows, formica, brick, split shingles, and aluminum gutters.
- F. Parsonage yards should be easily maintained.

The parsonage is a witness of the Church, and its is a symbol of the stewardship of the congregation; the parsonage should, therefore, receive the same kind of care as the church building.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

The 1988 transition to a new quadrennium has been smooth and with no loss in momentum. We have lost some dedicated workers and have gained some who have shouldered the task with equal energy and determination for an inclusive church.

The monitoring committee, now under the leadership of Rev. Bill Scott, has monitored Wesley College and found that black students desire more of a black presence on the teaching staff. We have made this recommendation. Also, monitoring of black pastors of the Conference shows an alarmingly high attrition rate. We need to do more to resource and keep our black pastors. We have monitored PUMH and found a low percentage of utilization by black people. We have monitored the CCOM and find a low percentage of blacks in major leadership and decision making positions. We recommend that the Nominating Committee evaluate this situation to increase black leadership on the Conference level.

The Cross-Racial Appointments Committee under the leadership of Joe Threadgill has been instrumental in planning and presenting the District Dialogue Sessions on racial inclusiveness. Two sessions have taken place, starting on the Salisbury District at Stevenson UMC in Berlin and at Grace UMC in Salisbury. The sessions have been well received by Blacks, Whites, and Asians who have expressed thanks for the opportunity to face the lissue of racism openly. The remaining districts will

The education committee under the leadership of Mrs. Doris Thompson has planned and presented an outstanding Martin Luther King Symposium in Seaford, Delaware, on Saturday, January 14, this year. The theme was "Children of the Kingdom valk, talk, work and pray together". Several instances of this working in the Conference were presented and discussed, and awards were presented to special nominees for exemplifying love and racial district dialones sessions.

- Request the Conference to establish inclusiveness as a major priority by requesting the CCOM to develop a vision for an inclusive church for the 1991 Annual Conference.
- To develop suggested "models" of inclusiveness for the CCOM as an aid in "creating vision".
- To direct the monitoring committee to audit progress of the CCOM in developing a vision of inclusiveness, and also to work in conjunction with COSROW in the monitoring process.
- To develop the program for the Martin Luther King Jr. Symposium.
- To promote the utilization of inclusiveness resources by local churches by having planned events through the Conference, District and local church.
- 6. To develop programs for children and youth incorporating models of inclusiveness in cooperation with Conference children and youth councils. We suggest that these programs be implemented at Pecometh, the Conference Youth Rally, the Bishop's Confirmation Rally, at local church youth events and other conference events for children and youth.
- To provide training opportunities for CORR members through jurisdictional and national events.

COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

During 1988 COSROW has worked to increase inclusive participation at all levels of the church.

Our fall retreat focused on team building and long range planning. Chairperson, Mary Lou Green, and program management team member, John Simpers, established contacts with other conference COSROWs and developed new skills and ideas at Northeastern Jurisdictional training in November.

Monitoring 1988 Annual Conference sessions revealed gaps between actual and potential participation by both clergy and lay members of conference. We are working with the Board of Laity on ways to expand participation at the 1989 Annual Conference and have recruited experienced persons to serve as resources for curches developing proposals and for those wanting assistance on also working on child care to enable greater conference participation.

COSROW is working with the Commission on Religion and Race to survey current membership and participation on conference boards, divisions, commissions and committees. Findings will be reported to groups involved and to the Conference Nominating Committee to encourage greater inclusiveness.

COSROW members are trying to recruit and support local church reps. Wilmington District local reps held a March dialogue about local church concerns, program ideas and resources. We rejoice to have representatives in each District increasing contact and support between COSROW, district councils on ministry and the local churches.

WASHINGTON AREA EPISCOPACY COMMITTEE

The Celebration of the Church was held Sunday, September 25, at the Naval-Marine Corps Stadium in Annapolis, Maryland. Although heavy rains pelted Maryland and Delaware in the morning, and intermittent showers continued in the afternoon, about 6,000 United Methodists gathered together to worship and to welcome back Bishop Joseph Yeakel to the area.

At the Jurisdictional meeting in July, Bishop Yeakel was reassigned to the Baltimore and Peninsula Conference for another quadrennium. And thus United Methodists from West Virginia to Hagerstown to the farthest points of Delaware in the Peninsula Conference came primarily to be in a service of thanksgiving and prayer as a church in celebration of God's goodness and, also to unite together in thanks for Bishop Yeakel's service to God and the Area as he continues in these conferences.

Flagpoles held bright colored balloons. Several churches bravely brought beautiful banners. Buses arrived from all over, although some cancelled because of the weather. Churches offered hot soup, sandwiches, cookies and other goodies, and Boy Scouts helped at many points.

About 1,800 voices combined in a mass choir and other voices joined in singing the great hymns of the churches. Accordingly, the conference treasurer has returned monies in excess of \$19,898, left over from the 1987 budget and the 1988 budget, to GCFA and to both the Baltimore and Peninsula Conferences,

according to the proportional formula with which the monies were given. We believe this is good stewardship and will continue this rectice with twee them as we foresee the need for major

After having to drop out of school in the fifth grade in order to help support his family, William returned to school and graduated at age 26 from Princess Anne Academy (now The University of Maryland, Eastern Shore), Princess Anne, Maryland, Determined

to further his education, be graduated from Morgan State College in 1939 and received the M. Div. degree in 1933 from Drew University.


Mrs. Coleman was a homemaker.



IX. Conference Rules of Order

- Rule 1: The Conference shall convene and adjourn at the discretion of the presiding Bishop and the Committee on Conference Arrangements. The Conference in plenary session may alter the time of convening or adjourning.
- Rule 2: The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his/her appeal.
- Rule 3: All resolutions, motions, amendments, and substitute motions presented at the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.
- Rule 4: When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.
- Rule 5: No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
 - 1. To fix the time in which the Conference shall adjourn.
 - 2. To adjourn.
 - 3. To take a recess.
 - To lay on the Table.
 For the previous question.
 - 6. To postpone to a given time.
 - 7. To refer.
 - 8. To substitute.
 - 9. Amendment. 10. To postpone indefinitely.
- Rule 6: A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.
- Rule 7: When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, she/he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him/her.
- Rule 8: No member shall be interrupted while speaking except by the President to call him/her to order when she/he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when she/he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when she/he thinks herself/himself misrepresented.

- Rule 9: When a member desires a question of privilege, she/he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for her/him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.
- Rule 18: No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.
- Rule 11: When any motion or resolution shall have been acted by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.
- Rule 12: No member shall absent herself/himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless she/he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13: No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14: Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his/her vote, unless the Conference, for special reason, shall excuse him/her.
- Rule 15: It shall be in order for him/her to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16: The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending or seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.
- Rule 17: All reports of the Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall be published and mailed to members of the Annual Conference ten (18) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must in the hands of the Secretary by the date set annually by the Conference Council on Ministries.
- Rule 18: No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19: These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.

- Rule 20: All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary not later than 14 days following the adjournment of the Annual Session or they shall be excluded, the date to be part of the Organizational motion of the Annual Conference.
- Rule 21: The Nominating Committee shall distribute copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Annual Conference.
- Rule 22: Recommendations as to change in policy regarding data to be included in the Journal shall be determined by the Journal Committee and submitted to the Annual Conference for action.
- Rule 23: With the exception of the Board of Ordained Ministry, no member of any Board, Division, Committee, or Commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said Board, Division, Committee, or Commission, and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one quadrennium has elapsed except members of board, committees or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has lapsed and except that when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term she/he may complete the unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. Persons elected to the Board of Ordained Ministry may serve eight (8) years regardless of what year in the quadrennium they begin serving. No member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall be elected to serve on more than two Boards, Divisions, Committees, or Commissions concurrently, except the committees elected or appointed for the Annual Conference session only, district committees whether or not elected by the Annual Conference and the quadrennial committee of the local church. The distribution of membership shall be according to districts, three lay persons and three ministers as nearly as possible to each district.
- Rule 24: Lay members of the Annual Conference will be elected quadrennially. A lay member may be re-elected for another quadrennium but must wait one quadrennium before being eligible for election for a third term.
- Rule 25: In order to achieve balanced membership in the Annual Conference, the Conference Secretary shall report quadrennially the number of lay persons required to preserve equality of membership, and that the Peninsula Conference achieve the desired equality of membership, by (1) the Associate Lay Leader of Life and Work, the four District Lay Leaders, the four District Presidents of the United Methodist Women, the four District Presidents of United Methodist Women, the four District Presidents of United Methodist Women, all United Methodist Described active and retired within united Methodist Described Annual Conference and Landertiffed Directors of Christian Annual Conference and all other voting lay persons of the Conference Council on Ministries, shall be members in the Annual Conference with vote; (2) each pastoral charge enrolling more than 500 members, but having only one clergy member appointed to it, may elect one additional lay

member, and further, that a pastoral charge having more than one clergy member appointed to it may elect one additional lay member, provided that more than 1,500 members are enrolled; and (3) the Conference Council on Youth Ministries shall elect as many youth members as needed to maintain a balence, divided equally among the




