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





**RULES AND GUIDELINES FOR THE CONFERENCE
NOMINATING COMMITTEE**

A.

1. That the Peninsula Conference again record its faith in the Principle of Rotation and adherence to the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church.
2. That the Nominating Committee be composed of the Cabinet, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Lay Leader, the Lay Leader of each District, the Conference President of United Methodist Men, a representative selected by the United Methodist Women Executive Committee, the District Presidents of United Methodist Women, a youth selected by the Conference Youth Council, one minister under appointment from each District to be elected for a quadrennium by the respective District Ministerium, and the Conference Council Director.
3. That, since the quadrennial system is an established part of the United Methodist economy, all members of boards, commissions, and committees shall be elected for a quadrennium unless restricted by Discipline, charter, or some other legal requirement. In the event of such legal restrictions, the Principle of Rotation is still to be observed. That for the 1988-93 time period, persons elected to Boards and Agencies of the Peninsula Annual Conference at the Annual Conference of 1988 will serve for a quinquennium (5 years). (This change in rules for this one time period, only, will bring the next change in leadership in 1993 following the Jurisdictional Conference of 1992 when Episcopal leadership changes occur.)
4. That no member of any board, committee, or commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said board, committee or commission and shall not be eligible to be re-elected until after one quadrennium has elapsed, except members of boards, committees, or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has elapsed and except that, when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. See Conference Rule #23, page 413, 1987 Conference Journal.
5. That no member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall serve on more than two boards, commissions, or committees concurrently. Ex-officio membership on conference boards or agencies in excess of two shall count toward the total of two. The following shall not be under the Conference rotation system nor counted in the above total: district committees or secretaries, Wesley College Trustees, Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundations, Board of Trustees of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., the Episcopal Residence Committee, and the Committee on Investigation. In the case of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Nominating Committee is to request the courtesy of the bishop to inform it as to those persons who will be named to the Board of Ordained Ministry, in order to assist the Nominating Committee in equal distribution of responsibility on the part of the Conference ministry members. The Nominating Committee will consider membership on the Board of Ordained Ministry as one of two memberships permitted to each minister.
6. Insofar as possible, the membership on Councils, Boards, and Agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen, in keeping with policies for general church agencies, except for the Board of Ordained

Ministry.

7. That ministerial membership on Annual Conference boards and agencies shall be limited to Conference members and associate members of the Peninsula Annual Conference. In order to be eligible to serve on the Conference boards and agencies, lay members shall be members of a local church within the Annual Conference. The Conference Nominating Committee may select other persons as affiliate members without vote.
8. "In recognition of the Rights of the Aging" as stated in the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church (Page 98 of the 1988 Book of Discipline), age shall not be a barrier to serve on any board, council, or agency of the Annual Conference. However, the Conference Nominating Committee shall give careful attention to assuring that younger members of the Conference are given full opportunity for service.
9. That a conscientious effort shall be made to distribute membership geographically. No fixed number shall be assigned, however, to any one district, since this could become artificial and impractical. Consideration shall be given to the inclusion of lay and clergy persons from small membership churches.
10. That one representative of the Program Management Team shall be selected to serve on each Conference board and on all other support agencies except where the Book of Discipline states otherwise.
11. That failure to attend the particular board or agency to which one is assigned for at least one called meeting during the year, without written explanation, or statement of intended activity to the chairperson of that board or agency, one will be subject to automatic removal in the next nominating committee's report. A report of the board or agency chairperson to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee by March 1st will include the attendance record of this board, committee or agency.
12. That the Conference Nominating Committee designate persons to serve as Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, and Secretary for Boards, Commissions and Committees. Boards and Committee members will be notified in advance of their officer nominations. The Program Management Team Member assigned to each unit will convene the first meeting and present the nominations of officers. Additional nominations may be received from the members of that unit. The officers elected at the meeting shall serve for the quadrennium. *Except where the Book of Discipline directs otherwise, the Vice-Chairperson will succeed the Chairperson in the event of a resignation. The board or commission shall elect a new Vice-Chairperson.

The following Criteria for Leadership shall be used in the selection of Chairperson:

1. Willingness to commit time as required by the position.
 2. Willingness to commit time for training for the responsibilities of the office.
 3. Have an understanding of and a willingness to support the polity of the United Methodist Church.
 4. A demonstrated leadership ability in the local church.
13. That the date of election to any board, commission or committee be clearly indicated in the journal.
 14. That in every case a nominee of any board, commission or committee shall be notified

and consent to serve before the name is placed before the Conference. When vacancies occur in the report, nominations may be made from the floor, provided that the nominee is present and agrees to serve.

15. That recognizing again the belief in the principle of rotation in order to involve greater leadership, all district committees and officers shall be elected to four-year terms with a maximum of eight years and persons shall be ineligible for re-election until after a four-year term has elapsed, with the exception of the District Committee of Ordained Ministry and the District Committee on Church Building and Location which shall serve a minimum of four years and a maximum of eight years.

B.

Concerning the Nominating Committee, its report and the securing of talent:

1. That the report of the Nominating Committee at the Annual Conference session will reflect a complete adherence to all the guidelines established by the Annual Conference.
2. The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.
3. That forms shall be circulated for both ministers and laity in local churches to indicate areas of interest, thus creating a Talent Bank. In addition, the same form shall be sent to the members of the Cabinet, Board of Laity, Conference United Methodist Women, Executive Committee, and Conference Youth Council in order to obtain names that might otherwise be overlooked. These forms shall be returned to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee.
4. That a complete file of all ministers in the Conference should be kept indicating where each one is serving in terms of Conference boards and agencies. Laity should likewise be listed on a similar file. A third file would be divided between ministers and laity as part of the Conference Talent Bank.
5. That a minimum of four meetings per year should be held by the Nominating Committee (it may be advisable that the committee meet more often, since its influence is so broad; whenever the committee approaches a new quadrennium, this latter need for additional meetings may be more evident).
6. That the above adopted guidelines for the Nominating Committee of the Annual Conference shall become a printed part of its report at each Annual Conference session.
7. That at the beginning of a new quadrennium, a complete and open look at membership on all boards and agencies shall be initiated by the Conference Nominating Committee and all personnel shall be eligible for re-alignment in accordance with A-5.
8. Titles such as "Mrs," "Miss," or "Mr." shall not be used in the preparation of the Nominating Committee report.

Miscellaneous

1. That the council director, and associate council directors, not be elected to boards and agencies under the Conference rotation, but serve only as ex-officio where assigned by the council director.
2. That two high school youth (preferably in the 10th and 11th grades) shall be members of all program boards of the Conference Council and on the Conference Council on Ministries on assignment by the Conference Youth Council.

Others may want to take this route and we outline here the steps involved in case you may not be aware of the procedure.

- (1) All salary and conference apportionments are removed.
- (2) The church drops out of the listing of churches to which pastors are assigned.
(We urge the conference to begin a listing of such churches in the journal with the charge conference where they are to report each year. This will allow for proper records and constitutes the historic continuity of these churches.)
- (3) The only services to be held are weddings, funerals, or special occasions.
- (4) One or more special services a year may be held with the offering received to be used for the upkeep of the building.
- (5) The remaining members are transferred to a nearby United Methodist Church for regular worship and church involvement.
- (6) The remaining members become a special committee under the charge conference to plan with the pastor for weddings, funerals, and special days. They also present a written report each year as to services held, money received and how expended, etc.
- (7) This allows the possibility that should population shifts bring people into the area we would simply resume regular services.

(Original motion can be found in the 1973 Journal of the Peninsula Conference on pages 152-153).

THE PROCESS OF MAKING APPOINTMENTS

Par. 57, Article X - The bishops shall appoint, after consultation with the district superintendents, ministers to the charges; and they shall have such responsibilities and authorities as the General Conference shall prescribe.

Article X, quoted above from the 1988 Discipline, is the primary authority for itinerancy in the Constitution of The United Methodist Church. (The Constitution can only be changed by 2/3 vote of the 74 Annual Conferences. All other Discipline paragraphs quoted in these pages are in Part IV, Organization and Administration, and require only a majority vote of the General Conference to change.) This constitutional delegation of responsibility and authority cannot be negotiated or modified. All pastors accept this as part of their ordination and Conference membership vows, and all United Methodist churches are by covenant and law so committed.

Par. 437 - The Itinerant System - The itinerant system is the accepted method of The United Methodist Church by which ordained ministers are appointed by the bishops to fields of labor. All ordained ministers shall accept and abide by these appointments.

Par. 530 - Responsibility - Pastors and clergy in appointments beyond the local church shall be appointed by a bishop, who is empowered to make and fix all appointments in the episcopal area within which the Annual Conference is a part. Appointments are to be made with the consideration of the gifts and graces of those appointed, to the needs, characteristics, and opportunities of congregations and institutions, and with faithfulness to our commitment to an open itinerancy. Open itinerancy means appointments are made without regard to race, ethnic origin, sex, color, or age, except for the provisions of mandatory retirement. Through appointment-making, the connectional nature of the United Methodist system is made visible.

Par. 412.2 - Both men and women are included in all provisions of the Discipline which refer to the ministry.

Par. 531 - Consultation and Appointment-Making - Consultation is the process whereby the bishop and/or district superintendent confer with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, taking into consideration the criteria of Par. 532, a performance evaluation, needs of the appointment under consideration, and mission of the church. Consultation is not merely notification. Consultation is not committee selection or call of a pastor. The role of the P.P.R. is advisory. Consultation is both a continuing process and a more intense involvement during the period of change in appointment. Consultation is not negotiation or voting upon the appointment of a pastor. It is information sharing and advice to the cabinet and bishop prior to the bishop's fixing the appointment. (Par. 531.1)

Par. 533.1 - Process of Appointment-Making - 1. A change in appointment may be initiated by a pastor, a Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, a district superintendent, or a bishop.

Pastor-Parish Relations chairpersons and/or pastors are asked to make such requests by using the evaluation form which is required to be sent annually to the district superintendent by January 15th. (See "Timeline for Appointment-Making" - #2.) The Pastor-Parish Relations Committee is to represent the charge in the appointment-making process. The chairperson is the designated officer through whom the charge contacts the district superintendent, and

through whom the district superintendent contacts the charge.

Par. 533.2 - The Bishop and the Cabinet shall consider all requests for change of appointment in light of the criteria developed for each charge and the gifts and evidence of God's grace, professional experience, and family needs of the pastor.

Par. 533.3 - When a change in appointment has been determined, the district superintendent should meet together or separately with the pastor and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee where the pastor is serving, for the purpose of sharing the basis for the change and the process used in making the new appointment.

This meeting will provide the pastor the opportunity, in the presence of the district superintendent, to declare his/her acceptance of the change of appointment, stating his/her reasons for responding to the new opportunity and thereby to facilitate the grief process for the pastor and for the congregation.

Par. 533.4 - All appointments shall receive consideration by the bishop and the district superintendent(s) and the Cabinet as a whole until a tentative decision is made.

We interpret this to mean that all appointments require the participation of the entire Cabinet. This is to insure that all ministers of the Conference are considered whenever there is an opening.

Par. 533.5 - The process used in making the new appointment shall include: a) The district superintendent shall confer with the pastor about a specific possible appointment (charge) and its congruence with gifts, graces, professional experience and expectations, and the family needs of the pastor identified in consultation with the pastor (Par. 532.2).

Only "open" charges (churches) shall be considered by the Cabinet. A charge (church) becomes "open" by virtue of its pastor's retirement, change of appointment, leave of absence, sabbatical leave, disability, location, death or withdrawal from the United Methodist ministry. In certain situations the Cabinet, with the written agreement of the present pastor and the knowledge of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, may declare a charge "open" for appointment purposes.

Par. 533.6 - The district superintendent shall confer with the receiving Pastor-Parish Relations Committee about pastoral leadership (Par. 532.1).

Par. 533.7 - When appointments are being made to less than full-time ministry, the district superintendent shall consult with the minister to be appointed and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee regarding proportional time, salary, and pension credit.

Par. 533.8 - If during this consultative process it is determined by the bishop and Cabinet that this decision should not be carried out, the process is to be repeated until the bishop, basing his/her decision on the information and advice derived from consultation, makes and fixes the appointment.

Par. 533.9 - A similar process of consultation shall be available to persons in appointments beyond the local church.

Par. 533.10 - When the steps in the process have been followed and completed, the an-

nouncement of that decision shall be made to all parties directly involved in the consultative process; that is, the appointment Cabinet, the pastor, and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee (of both charges) before a public announcement is made.

Par. 532 - Criteria - Appointments shall take into account the unique needs of a charge in a particular setting and also the gifts and graces of a particular pastor. To assist bishops, Cabinets, pastors, and congregations to achieve an effective match of charges and pastors, criteria must be developed an analyzed in each instance and then shared with pastors and congregations.

1. Congregations - the district superintendent shall develop with the pastor and Pastor-Parish Relations Committees of all churches profiles reflecting the needs, characteristics, and opportunities for mission of the charge consistent with the church's statement of purpose (Par. 520.1). These profiles shall be reviewed annually and updated when appropriate to include:
 - a) The general situation in which a congregation finds itself in a particular setting: size, financial condition, quality of lay leadership, history.
 - b) The convictional stance of the congregation: theology; prejudices, if any; spiritual life.
 - c) The ministry of the congregation among its people for the sake of the community: service programs, basis for adding new members, reasons for losing members, mission to community and world, forms of witness.
 - d) The qualities and functions of pastoral ministry needed to fulfill the mission and goals of the congregation.
2. Pastors - The district superintendent and the pastor shall identify the pastor's gifts, graces, and professional experience and expectations, and also the needs and concerns of the pastor's spouse and family.
 - a) Spiritual and personal sensibility: personal faith, call and commitment to ordained ministry, work through the institutional Church, integration of vocation with personal and family well-being, life style.
 - b) Academic and career background: nature of theological stance, experience in continuing education, professional experience, record of performance, age.
 - c) Skills and abilities in church administration, leadership development, worship, liturgy, preaching and evangelism, teaching and nurturing, counseling and group work, ability to work in cooperation, and ability in self-evaluation, and other relational skills.
 - d) Family situation: health and educational needs of the family, and the spouse's career.

Par. 534 - Frequency - While the bishop shall report all pastoral appointments to each regular session of an Annual Conference, appointments to charges may be made at any time

deemed advisable by the bishop and Cabinet.

Appointments are considered "fixed" until changed. They are reviewed and reported annually but not "made" annually.

Par. 269.2.f.8 - (The duties of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall include the following:) To confer with the pastor and/or other appointed members of the staff if it should become evident that the best interests of the charge and pastor(s) will be served by a change of pastor(s). The committee shall cooperate with the pastor(s), the district superintendent, and the bishop in securing clergy leadership. Its relationship to the district superintendent and the bishop shall be advisory only.

It is also vital that the committee understand that its relationship to the district superintendent and bishop is advisory only, and that it is to represent the needs of the entire charge. Members of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee must understand how the itinerant system of The United Methodist Church functions to fulfill their responsibilities faithfully.

Par. 269.2.e - The committee...shall meet only with the knowledge of the pastor and/or the district superintendent. It may meet with the district superintendent without the pastor being present; however, when the pastor is not present, the pastor, or any member of the staff under consideration, shall be informed prior to such a meeting and immediately thereafter be brought into consultation either by the committee or by the district superintendent.

Par. 269.2.f.3 - (The duties of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall include the following:) To evaluate annually the effectiveness of the pastor and staff, based upon criteria, processes, and training developed by the Board of Ordained Ministry and Cabinet (Par. 445), and, where applicable, the Board of Diaconal Ministry.

Par. 444 - Evaluation - Evaluation is a continuous process which must take place in a spirit of understanding, acceptance.

1. The pastors in local churches shall receive evaluation annually from the Committee on Pastor-Parish Relations for use in an ongoing effective ministry and for identifying continuing education needs and plans (Par. 269.2f[2]), using criteria, processes, and training developed by the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Cabinet. The district superintendent will evaluate annually the pastors' effectiveness for ministry (Pars. 423.1b, 520, 733.2n,o), using criteria, processes, and training developed by the Cabinet and the Board of Ordained Ministry.

2. Clergy serving in appointments beyond the local church will undergo annual evaluation by their immediate supervisors, engage in annual self-evaluation, and include copies of these evaluations in the annual report submitted to the bishop, district superintendent, and the Board of Ordained Ministry (Par. 443.2a).

NOTES ON RETIREMENT

Mandatory Retirement - Pastors who attain the age of 70 before July 1 must retire as of July 1 of that year (Par. 451.1).

Voluntary Retirement - Voluntary retirement is available to those who attain the age of 65 or complete 40 Conference years of service before July 1 (Par. 451.2.c).

Voluntary retirement is also available at a reduced annuity rate to those who attain the age of 62 or complete at least 35 Conference years of service before July 1 (Par. 451.2.b).

A pastor may also retire after 20 Conference years of service with benefits beginning the first of any month after the session of Annual Conference in the year which the minister attains the age of 62 before July 1 (Par. 451.2.a).

ALL MINISTERS WHO QUALIFY FOR VOLUNTARY RETIREMENT MUST INDICATE IN WRITING BY JANUARY 15 THEIR INTENT TO ACTIVATE THIS OPTION; Otherwise, the Cabinet will assume their continued eligibility for appointment. The annual self-evaluation form may be used for this purpose.

TIMELINE FOR APPOINTMENT-MAKING

1. **FALL AND EARLY WINTER:** District Superintendents make an informal inventory and evaluation of their charges (churches) and pastors, including a review of the criteria (Par. 532). They are available for consultation (Par. 531) with Pastor-Parish Relations Committees and pastors, and, in some instances, may initiate such contacts. The official contact person for the charge is the chairperson of the charge Pastor-Parish Relations Committee.
2. **JANUARY 15: DEADLINE FOR REQUESTS** for change of appointment, including retirement. By January 15, Pastor-Parish Relations chairpersons and/or pastors are asked to make their requests and recommendations to the Cabinet by using the annual evaluation form. The reason(s) a change appears to be desirable shall be included (Par. 269.2.f.8). Initiating a request for change is not to be interpreted as an automatic guarantee that a change will be made. All requests will be treated with integrity by the bishop and Cabinet (Par. 533.1). Persons planning retirement must also observe the above date. Notification of intention to retire must be in writing. (See "Notes on Retirement").
3. **FEBRUARY:** Cabinet needs to begin the appointment-making process. Requests for change will be carefully reviewed. When neither the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee nor the pastor has made a request, the Cabinet, however, has the prerogative of initiating changes of appointment which are deemed to be for the good of the charges or the pastors or the program and missional strategy of the Conference.
 - a) "Open" charges (churches) will be determined, (see commentary under Par. 533.5) and the district superintendent will meet with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee to gather all available data about the charge and its pastoral needs (Pars. 532 & 533.2) and present pastoral support including parsonage compliance with Conference policies.
 - b) The Cabinet determines which available pastor best fits the needs of the charge (Par. 533.2). Note: The present pastor is to remain neutral in all appointment proceedings concerning his/her successor.
 - c) The district superintendent of the "open" charge contacts the prospective pastor and consults with him/her, supplying essential data and information about the

"open" charge, community setting and time frame for the prospective pastor's response.

- d) When the pastor-designate is determined, the district superintendent then contacts the chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee of the "open" charge and arranges a time for the pastor-designate and the committee to meet. This meeting is an introduction of and to the pastor-designate and not an interview. The district superintendent will preside at this meeting.

The purpose of the meeting is:

1. To aid the district superintendent and the Cabinet, through consultation, in their responsibility to the appointment process.
2. To verify the appropriateness of the proposed appointment, matching local needs and pastoral aptitudes.
3. To initiate the process of getting acquainted with the pastor-designate.
4. To arrange for the moving and receiving of the pastor-designate and his/her family.

The district superintendent will bring the meeting to a close with an appropriate summary of his/her insights and understandings. It is understood that barring prohibiting factors which may become apparent in the conversation with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, the pastor-designate will be appointed to the "open" charge.

- e) When the results of the meeting have been shared with the Cabinet and the appointment has been fixed by the bishop, public announcements shall be arranged through the office of the district superintendent (Par. 533.10).

NOTE: The meeting of the pastor-designate with the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee may not always be possible for pastors receiving their first appointment following seminary.

4. **FEBRUARY - MAY:** Using the above process, the Cabinet will arrange for the appointments to be reported to the Annual Conference (Par. 534). The list of appointments will be published in the Conference paper prior to the Annual Conference session, and publicly announced at the Annual Conference session along with additional changes and corrections.
5. **JULY 1:** Changes of appointment become effective.
6. **POST-CONFERENCE:** The district superintendent will meet with the new pastor and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee for post-Conference role clarification to help facilitate the new shared ministry of charge and pastor. This meeting will be held at a mutually agreeable time.
7. **DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT AVAILABILITY:** The district superintendent is available to Pastor-Parish Relations Committees and pastors for consultation at any time it is deemed appropriate.

B. Daily Proceedings

Clergy Executive Session - Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel convened the Executive Session in the Fellowship Hall of Antioch United Methodist Church, Princess Anne, Maryland at 1:20 PM. The opening worship service was led by the Reverends Douglas M. Ridley, Charlotte A. Nichols and Charles M. Moyer.

The Bishop announced that Seong Ki Biak and Samuel Layton Greening, Jr. have transferred into our Conference since the last executive session.

Courtesy Seatings. Rev. Ridley presented the following motion:

"The Board of Ordained Ministry moves that the following persons be allowed participation in this Executive Session of the Peninsula annual Conference, without vote:

those several Associate member of the Peninsula Annual Conference who have been ordained elders in The United Methodist Church;

Karen Hittel and Stanley Erickson, ordained elders who, in accordance with para. 426.1 of the 1988 Book of Discipline, are members of other annual conferences serving under appointment in the Peninsula Annual Conference; and

the delegation visiting this session of the Peninsula Annual Conference from the Baltimore Annual Conference: Rev. Marcus Matthews, the Dean-Designate of the Cabinet, and the Rev. Bryon Braught, and Rev. Barbara Sands."

It was granted by the body.

The Rev. Dr. F. David Weber, Registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry, distributed the report entitled "PART II PERTAINING TO ORDAINED MINISTERS AND LOCAL PASTORS." This report can be found in its entirety under the Disciplinary Questions of this Journal.

Involuntary Retirements: Rev. Ridley moved that -

"The Board of Ordained Ministry recommends David T. Seymour and William T. Swager be placed in the retired relation to the Peninsula Annual Conference, effective July 1, 1990, in accordance with para 451.3, 1988 Book of Discipline."

He explained that neither one has the age or the number of years for voluntary retirement under the Discipline."

After much discussion it was adopted by more than 2/3rds vote. Under Questions 31 and 38(a), Dr. Weber presented the following candidates for Full Connection and Ordination as Elder:

Bishop Yeakel led the session through the balance of the report, making corrections, additions and editorial changes as needed. The report was adopted by the body.

Rev. Ridley moved to amend policy 2.A "Local Pastor Licensing School" found in the 1989 Journal on pages 157 by adding:

"EXCEPT GRADUATED OF UNITED METHODIST-RELATED SEMINARIES/SCHOOLS OF THEOLOGY".

The Reverend Garry O. Parker moved a substitution amendment:

"The Peninsula Annual Conference requires all person who are to be appointed as pastors, except graduates of seminaries and schools of theology accredited by the American Association of Theological Schools and, approved by the University Senate of The United Methodist church who have taken the required courses in United Methodist policy, discipline, and doctrine, to complete the local pastor's licensing school by or at the time of their first appointment."

The substitute motion was adopted.

Bishop Yeakel adjourned the session until later in the day.

After the afternoon plenary session at 4:20 PM Bishop Yeakel reconvened the Executive Session in the Ella Fitzgerald Performing Arts Center.

Rev. Ridley moved that two additional policy statements be made to the present one found in the 1989 Journal on page 158:

"8. RETURN FROM LEAVE OF ABSENCE OR HONORABLE LOCATION

When a deacon or elder formally requests a return from leave of absence or honorable location, he/she shall be required to have a psychological evaluation by the Board-appointed psychological evaluator. Persons entering either of these relationships shall be notified of this policy before they are approved for leave of absence or honorable location."

It was adopted.

"9. PSYCHOLOGICAL EVALUATION AT FULL MEMBERSHIP

All probationary members who make application for full membership to the Peninsula Annual conference shall have a psychological evaluation conducted by the current psychological evaluator if their prior evaluation was not within the last four years."

It was adopted.

The Executive Session was adjourned by Bishop Yeakel.

Friday Afternoon - June 1, 1990

"Gathering": The Conference joined in the singing of "This is the Day of New Beginnings" under the direction of Dr. E. Farley Smith.

PLENARY SESSION: Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel convened the fifty-first session of the Peninsula Annual Conference. The Conference sang "Are We Yet Alive" and Bishop Roy C. Nichols offered the invocation and then led everyone in the Lord's Prayer. Bishop Yeakel introduced Bishop and Mrs. Nichols, Dr. Smith and Dr. Richard Allen, Conference Organist.

The Bishop called on the Conference Secretary, the Rev. Gary L. Moore, who offered the Organizational and Procedural Motion:

- A. The bar of the Conference includes the center three sections and excludes the far left and far right sides of the auditorium.
- B. The roll call will be taken by all members signing in at the registration desk in Room 1109 in the Fitzgerald Center.
- C. The printed program is the program of the Conference subject to changes by the Conference President, Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel.
- D. All members must have a valid Conference Badge.
 1. Charges With One Lay Member. The names of the Lay Member and Reserve be printed on one badge. When the Reserve takes the place of the Lay Member, the badge will be brought to the registration desk where the attendant will hold the Lay Member's badge and type another one for the Reserve. Before the Lay Member can return to the bar of the Conference, the Reserve Member's badge must be returned to the registration desk.
 2. Charges With More Than One Lay Member. The Reserve Member(s) name will not be typed on the back of a Lay Member's badge. When a Reserve Member takes the place of a Lay Member, the same procedure is followed as

stated in D.1.

- E. The Secretary will send greetings to members unable to attend the Conference on report of such cases by the District Superintendent.
- F. Members will be excused from the sessions upon report to the District Superintendent or Secretary.
- G. The Conference Minutes will be made the official Journal of the Conference and the Secretary is authorized to edit and condense the same.
- H. The Reverends Norma O. Bailey and John I. Penn be appointed as the Committee on Daily Proceedings.
- I. The Boards, Divisions, Commission, and Committees as printed in the Journal become the Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees of the Conference, with such corrections as may be needed.
- J. All motions to be presented to the Secretary on the forms provided for this purpose prior to or at the time they are presented to the Conference. Forms can be found on the Secretary's desk or secured from an usher.
- K. Resolutions not appearing in the Pre-Conference Booklet or in the Conference Packet be in the hands of the Secretary by Noon on Saturday. The petitioner will need to have 800 copies made for distribution to the Conference.
- L. When the customary draft is received from The United Methodist Publishing House that it be endorsed and given to the Conference Treasurer.
- M. The Reverend Constance Metzger be named the reporter for United Methodist Information and Publications and the press contact for the religious and secular media.
- N. The Reverend Kevin E. English be named as the Head Usher and Doorkeeper of the Sessions.
- O. The following be designated Assistant Secretaries for the 1990 Session of the Peninsula Annual Conference:

This service lifted up that experience with a variety of persons sharing what had been their experience as well as the promise of the future.

EUCCHARIST/MEMORIAL SERVICE: The service was held in the Ella Fitzgerald Center for the Performing Arts. The celebrant was Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel and the preacher was the Reverend Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton. The Anthems were offered by a Mass Choir from the Wilmington District under the direction of Dr. Richard Allen of Newark United Methodist Church, Newark, Delaware. The servers were clergy and laity of the Conference. The ushers were from the Wilmington District.

Their families were served the Sacrament of Holy Communion first by Bishop Yeakel, after which the congregation was served. An offering of \$1,214.95 was received for the Africa University. The Bishop dismissed the Conference with a blessing.

A reception for the retiring clergy and their families was held in the Student Development Center.

Saturday Morning, June 2, 1990

WORSHIP: The morning started with worship outside in front of the Ella Fitzgerald Center under the leadership of the Rev. Lawrence Livingston.

PLENARY SESSION: Dr. E. Farley Smith, Conference Song leader, led the Conference in singing "Woman in the Night" and "To God Be the Glory." The Bishop offered a prayer.

GREETINGS: Dr. Marcus Matthews, Dean-Designate of the Baltimore Cabinet, brought greetings to the Conference and spoke of the joy of being among friends and of our gathering as we look to our history and look into the glimpses of the future.

BISHOP'S ADDRESS: Bishop Yeakel shared a recent story about people telling stories about Bishops. He remarked that one day maybe the Bishop would turn out to be the hero! After sharing a recent account about a reserved parking sign for the friend of a Bishop, he shared his concerns with us and for us.

1. He affirmed the twenty-fifth anniversary of the merger between the Delaware and Peninsula Conferences. These two conferences led the way and challenged the future. The symbol of that occasion is the Bishop's crozier which symbolizes the acts of communion and ordination. He probed the relationship a little further by musing on what should be the official date of the conference and is the name of the conference still appropriate?
2. He lifted up the new churches that have been charted since last conference — Cornerstone UMC and St. Matthews-By-The-Sea. The conference is committing itself in the old words "Dig in or Die Mr. Hyde."
3. The Camp Pecometh Campaign is under way but there are still 134 churches who have made no commitment or donation.

4. When he arrived in the our conference one of his first acts was to sign a \$1.8 million line of credit for Wesley College. Since then that obligation has been met and the college does not need our support. He gave a brief review of our relationship with the school and strongly affirmed Dr. Stewart's leadership.

5. He is confident that our conference will meet its full responsibility for the African University as we have for other great undertakings in the past.

6. Now as a trustee of the American University which is chartered by the United States Congress, he will strive to undertake a conversation on how the school and The United Methodist Church can and will relate to each other.

7. He applauded the work of Bishop Felton E. May who embodies the church's concern for the violence and the damage of drugs in our country. This is a morals, values and lifestyle issue that he is attempting to address in the name of Christ. The churches in the Washington, DC area are calling themselves "saving stations" as they reach out this summer to their neighborhoods.

8. Next month will be a special session of the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference to decide the issue of episcopal areas in the jurisdiction. He spoke at great length about what this means to us being moved to the Philadelphia Area and for the Washington Area as a Bishop relates the Baltimore Conference.

9. The task of strategic planning is like a small pump car moving ahead of the train to look down the tracks to see what is coming ahead that needs to be taken into consideration. This task is not optional but necessary whether we like it or not. Life in our churches must change. When one out of three churches received no new members on confession of faith, we are saying, "Why worry about anyone else?" When 140 churches receive no new members at all, there is no urgency about the work of the gospel. We are in a new fiscal environment. Health Insurance is skyrocketing yet the stewardship remains the same. What kind of vision have committed ourselves too? We need to know where we are in the relationship to the mission and to God. Strategic planning is not a luxury but a necessity.

10. He then outlined the Dunbarton situation where the congregation wanted to hold a holy union ceremony for same sex persons. He went into great detail outlining the situation in that congregation in the Baltimore Conference and his understanding of what is the Discipline's position.

11. He requested each person who is Appointed Beyond the Local Church (ABLC) to stand and they were greeted with applause. He recognized the conference secretarial staff — Shirley Still, Gloria Reed, Toni Moor, Alice Murgatryd, Jenny Durant, Joan Warren, Carla Lynda, Theodore Briggs, Conference Business Manager, who is completing 25 years of service — Ruby Knock, his administrative Assistant, and the Conference Council staff — Jack Simperts, Pam Lardear, Connie Metzger, Lawrence Livingston, Harvey Manchester. He expressed his sympathy on the deaths of Richard Varell and Robert Whitlock and shared his concern for the Howard Ketterman family in his disability. He concluded by introducing Gordon Stapleton, Tom McKelvey, J.T. Seymour and the new Easton District Superintendent, Charlotte Nichols. He noted that Charlie Barton was in the hospital and unable to attend the conference this year. The Conference received his report with applause.

The Conference took a brief break and resumed when Dr. Smith led the Conference in singing "Let There Be Peace."

PRESENTATION OF YOUTH MEMBERS: After the Rev. Sandra Steiner Ball introduced the Conference youth members, they were greeted with applause.

COMPOSITE REPORT OF THE CABINET AND COUNCIL DIRECTOR: The Dean of the Cabinet, the Rev. Dr. P. Thomas McKelvey, stressed "Spiritual Foundations For Ministry," "Conference Programs and Ministries," "Congregation Leadership and Ministries," and "Financial Commitments and Priorities For Ministry." The complete text of the report can be found in section VII.C.

PHILLIPS MOTION: The Bishop recognized Paul Phillips of Church Creek Charge who moved that -

"the District Superintendents be instructed to convene the lay and clergy members twice a year for the purpose of sharing information on the Conference work. Further that one of the meetings will take place in the fall of 1990 and another in the spring of 1991."

It was seconded and adopted.

CONFERENCE STATISTICIAN: The Rev. Boyd Etter presented his report that is found in the reports section of the Journal. The report was received by the Conference.

CAMP PECOMETH CAMPAIGN: The campaign chairperson, the Rev. Dr. R. Jervis Cooke, spoke that he did not know how to low key a priority. He shared the channels by which information has been given to pastors and churches and how they all will

strive to improve these in order to increase the number of church participating in the campaign. He concluded with these words, "The time is now. The future is in your hands."

The Rev. William Hemphill, Jr., Campaign Director, presented the following report:

"May 31, 1990 marked the end of the first year of our three-year payment period for the Pecometh Campaign. The computer print-out distributed to you shows the money received from churches here at the Business Office by May 25. Because of the holiday weekend, this was posted and printed on the 29th, but there are checks that have in since May 25 which do not show here. This is the approximate report of where we stand, the best we can do since the May receipts will be finally processed until next week. I want to thank pastors, Administrative Board/Council Chairpersons and Pecometh Campaign Coordinators who responded to my appeal because we did receive \$71,520 from the churches this month. Four additional churches accepted goals this month for a total of \$6,250 but two church found it necessary to reduce their previously accepted goal for an total amount of \$50,500. Consequently, the total of what the churches expect to give is a little less than previously reported. However, when this is added to the clergy pledges, major gifts pledged, and special gifts and gifts from churches not accepting a goal, the grand total we expect to receive is \$3,064,957. Let's praise God for that accomplishment and take courage as we move forward.

Now from these financial statistics there is both some good news and some bad news to be noted.

First, the good news is that we have received to date \$749,042 in cash, far more than we, as a Conference have ever raised for one cause in one year before. 59% of our churches have committed themselves to give and another 17% are giving even though no commitment has been made. 173 clergy have pledged \$149,923 for an average pledge of \$858. Other clergy have told me that they chose to give through the local church. Such giving has proved funds for the first two program shelters and give us a start on the cost of two bunk houses which will be built next. All campaign expenses have been paid.

BUT at the end of one year, we should have received a little over one million dollars. The bad news is that we are running 25% behind in our receipts. If we project this same rate of giving over the remaining two years of the campaign, it means that we will receive only \$2.25 million to work with instead of the expected \$3.1. But it is not possible to do a project that was estimated to cost \$5.1 million when only \$2.25 is provided.

HOWEVER, I'm not ready to settle for only \$2.25 million, are you? The full \$3 million is certainly achievable if we really put our hearts into the effort with much prayer and hard work. And even more is still possible. Our Continuation Campaign Committee through its District units is still working to develop major gifts from potential donors. And we are hoping that the 24% of our church that have not yet responded will get on board this year. During May we received nearly \$2,000 from 5 churches that had neither pledged nor given before. If your church has not yet participated, won't your go home and work to get at least one major special offering from your people for Camp Pecometh? Or even better, get your Board/Council to set an achievable goal for the next two years and go after it. What a difference it would make if 100% of our churches would be involved.

The recent fire at the Barn has left Pecometh in a very difficult position with no winterized facility for youth week-end retreats and with a deficit of facilities for

summer camp. When I remember that half the youth groups that applied for the barn last year had to be turned away, I realized how desperately we need the two new Bunk Houses that will replace the Barn. Each of these will accommodate 30 people and greatly increase our ability to serve. BUT the need is immediate, and funds must be on hand soon. All of this reminds me that we are not just in the business of raising money. This Campaign is about serving people, children and youth. It is about providing facilities that will enhance spiritual formation through Christian camping. It is about providing a setting where people can be led to know Jesus Christ, and guided in His service. I don't believe that there's a church in this conference that wants to say "no" to this ministry of Pecometh. Yet the report that you've been given this morning indicated that one out of four churches are still saying "no" and others are not yet seriously involved. We can change that, if we really want to and if we believe that God is calling us to this ministry at this time. Will you — each of you — do your part, to pray and work until together we offer our best efforts to the Lord in this Campaign? If we will all do that, the dream we have shared of a new expanded Pecometh will be realized for the glory of God and the good of all who will use it in the years to come."

The Conference received the report.

CAMP PECOMETH COMMITTEE: The Rev. Dr. C. Edwin Lasbury, Chairperson of the Committee, spoke of how one week at Pecometh is equivalent to one year of Sunday School. He introduced the Director of Camp Pecometh, the Rev. Dr. John Simpers, Jr., who shared the camp's registrations have far exceeded last year's which will make this the highest year in its history. He shared about the Barn's burning and how it was created out of the 1965 merger in honor of the Delaware Conference.

The Conference received the report.

BOARD OF CHURCH & SOCIETY ESSAY: Amanda Deimer, 12 years old, presented her essay to the conference. She is a member of St. Mark's Church in Stanton, Delaware. Debbie Pierson, also 12 years old and from Asbury Church, New Castle, Delaware, won the poster contest for her age group.

PREACHING: The conference turned its attention to a time of worship as Bishop Roy C. Nichols preached his first sermon of the weekend.

Saturday Afternoon, June 2, 1990

Bishop Yeakel reconvened the Conference at 2:00 P.M. with the singing of the hymn, "Jesus, Keep Me Near The Cross."

POINT OF PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: The bishop recognized the Rev. Dr. W. Hayward Greene who presented a plaque to the Rev. Gary L. Moore in appreciation for his work on the Delaware Conference History booklet.

WORKSHOP ON THE CONFERENCE BUDGET: The remainder of the afternoon plenary session was spent under the guidance of the Conference Council on Finance Administration concerning the budgets for 1991 and beyond. A video was shown on the ministry expressed through the Annual conference. Then the Bishop spoke on how we are all theologians of stewardship every time we write a check. The time has come for the Conference to make critical decisions regarding its financial future. We are not in a financial crisis yet but we must decrease our expenses or increase our income. The issue is how to make benevolences a reality. The video was shown again without the audio. The Rev. Harvey Manchester, Jr. spoke of the need to have a broad participation as the Conference wrestles its financial future. The Conference was

divided into four groups to better facilitate the concerns and responses of the Conference. This information is to be used in the formulation of the 1991 budget that will be presented on September 15.

Sunday Morning, June 3, 1990

MORNING DEVOTION: Youth members of the Conference led the Conference in a morning devotion on "Happiness and Sorrow."

COSROW ANNOUNCEMENT: Mrs. Mildred Hamilton introduced resource persons who are available to help Conference members with procedural questions. The Rev. Cindy Koski presented Bishop Yeakel with a V.I.P. (Very Inclusive Person) sticker.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY: Mrs. Cindy Quillen presented the following report:

Professional certification is the church's recognition that an individual has met the required standards for academic training, experience, and continuing study necessary to achieve and maintain professional excellence in the areas of Education, Evangelism, Music and Youth Ministry.

COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATIONS: The Rev. Alex Slonin presented an overview of what the committee has been doing to communicate the church's message in our area.

He then presented "A Resolution For Vision Interfaith Satellite Network (VISN)." It was adopted and is found in the "Conference Resolutions Section" of the Journal.

ETHNIC LOCAL CHURCH COMMITTEE: The Rev. Lawrence Livingston highlighted issues found in the "Comprehensive Plan Progress Report." It is found in the "Reports" section of the Journal.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE: The Rev. William Scott gave an overview of the commission's report, especially the "Racial Identity Development Workshops."

Mrs. Doris Thompson lifted up the January 12, 1991 Martin Luther King, Jr. Symposium.

The Rev. Karen Booth of the monitoring committee shared their intention for a comprehensive study of churches, pastors, and pastoral experiences in cross-racial appointments.

The Conference received the report.

RACIAL INCLUSIVENESS COMMITTEE: The Rev. Anne Pruett-Barnett shared their vision about developing a vision of inclusiveness.

Then Mrs. Grace Purnell of Berlin, Maryland shared her experience of a cross-racial appointment in Philadelphia. Her black pastor had been moved and a white pastor was appointed to her church. The church and the pastor made up their mind that it would work. He stayed for seven years. When he moved to Lancaster, a relationship was built between his new white congregation with his former black congregation.

The conference received the report.

MERGER MINUTE: Mrs. Geraldine Jones shared her story about being raised in the United Methodist Church in Seaford and how those nurtured by the church were leading productive lives and continuing to influence others in the church. She asked all the United Methodist Women to stand as a prayer was offered to God.

Bishop Yeakel led the Conference in singing the hymn, "I Want To Be A Christian" and the prayer by Howard Thurman, "For Holiness of Heart." He then introduced Bishop May.

BISHOP FELTON E. MAY'S ADDRESS: He shared how the story of Jesus weeping over Jerusalem and his Miami experience led him to take action on the problem of drug abuse in our country. He spoke of how it is rooted in a spiritual malaise, racism and economic injustice. We are experiencing a slavery of addiction. We are in a MESS - Misery & Evil Side by Side. He has set about to produce a program in Anacosta area of Washington, DC this summer where there will be "saving stations" - tents erected for preaching, drug counseling, helping and healing. He stated that we know what to do, why don't we do it?

The conference stood and sang "Am I Soldier of the Cross."

After a 10 minute break, the conference resumed with the singing of hymn, "The Church of Christ, in Every Age."

PRESENTATION OF PRESIDENT HYCHTE: Dr. James T. Seymour presented our Conference Host, Dr. William P. Hychte, to the conference. He brought greetings and

stated that we are the largest group to use the UMES campus. The conference greeted him with applause.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES: Mr. James Robinson, President of CCOM, brought forth a plate of fruit and asked, "What keeps it together?" The local churches and the conference have more to do than we can handle. The budgeting of people resources is more important than the budgeting of financial resources. It is we the people who keep it together by working together. He introduced the Rev. Harvey Manchester, Jr. who shared his vision for the conference. His vision is found in the "Reports" section of the Journal. President Robinson then presented to Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton a polished apple for being one of his outstanding teachers!

The conference received their report.

METHODIST ACTION PROGRAM: Mr. James Walker introduced himself as "one of your missionaries" and presented a slide program on "Working Miracles Through M.A.P."

CHURCH & SOCIETY ESSAY: The second award winning essay for her age group was presented by Jennifer Bevan, a 15 year old from St. Mark's Church, Stanton, Delaware. The best poster award was presented to the 16 year old Francine Koontz who is a member of Asbury Church, New Castle.

WORSHIP: The Conference entered into a period of worship emphasizing the Pentecost Day theme and Bishop Nichols preached.

Sunday Afternoon, June 3, 1990

PLENARY: Bishop Yeakel led the conference in singing, "Spirit of Faith, come Down" and called the session to order.

FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF UMCOR: The Rev. Jerome R. DeVine introduced Mr. Kelly Miller who shared how the ministry of UMCOR serves Christ in a world full of emergency situations. He gave illustrations from the recent relief efforts following Hurricane Hugo and the flooding in Texas and in Mozambique and Angola. The One Great Hour of Sharing offering is UMCOR's greatest source of undesignated giving. For the 50th anniversary they are setting a goal of 1-cent per day for 1-year for UMCOR. When United Methodists are concerned, the money will come.

BOARD OF PENSIONS: The Rev. Olin Shockley presented tow recommendations:

1. The Past Service Rate for 1991 be \$255 per year of approved service.

The conference adopted the first recommendation.

2. Up to 100% of the pension and disability payments received to be designated as the permitted housing allowance for 1991.

RESOLUTION RELATING TO RENTAL/HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED OR DISABLED MINISTERS OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as the United Methodist Church

and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of the United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of the United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the Peninsula Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of their Conference; and

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received by a retired minister, or 100% of the disability benefit payments received by a disabled minister, during the year of 1990 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of The United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the Peninsula Annual Conference at the time of his or her retirement or disability;
2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of the United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of the United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension or benefit funds of the United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

NOTE:

The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually

expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-280, 1971 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities." Beginning in 1984, there is no longer a sick pay or disability income exclusion available with respect to disability benefit payments. Therefore, the full amount of disability benefit payments will be taxable income to the recipient beginning in 1984.

The conference adopted the second recommendation.

Rev. Shockley gave an overview of the Insurance Committee's report.

DRAYTON RETREAT CENTER: Mr. Bud McKee noted that Drayton was given to the conference in 1964 and was opened to guests on October 1, 1965. He expressed his appreciation to Mr. Lewis Lardear for his assistance to Drayton and to Carolyn Godfrey for her bulletin design. Then the Rev. R. Jervis Cooke shared how the conference came to own Drayton and how it was sustained in its early years by the sale of apples. The Rev. Pamela Lardear, Director of Drayton, presented a theological statement of how hospitality is for the stranger, the fatherless, the old, the young, black and white and the handicapped and how that is embodied in the ministry of Drayton and the church. Mr. McKee invited the conference to their Open House later in the year.

MERGER MINUTE: The Rev. Dr. Bruce Cooke shared his experience of being appointed in 1973 to a newly created charge of two black churches and two white churches. The next pastor the churches welcomed with open arms—a woman!

Bishop Yeakey summoned Mr. Gilbert S. Scarborough, Jr., Chair of the Wesley College Board of Trustees.

Mr. Scarborough presented the "Resolution to Amend the Corporate Charter"—

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees deems it advisable to amend Article Ninth of its Certificate of Incorporation:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Wesley College, Inc. amend the Certificate of Incorporation of the Corporations as follows:

1. Article Ninth of the Certificate of Incorporation is amended by deleting the first and second paragraph of said Article Ninth in its entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

NINTH: The property and affairs of this corporation are to be managed and conducted by its Board of Trustees consisting of Thirty members, which shall be its governing body.

One member shall be the Dover Area District Superintendent of the Peninsula Conference of The United Methodist Church who shall be an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees and one member shall be the President of the Wesley College Alumni Association, Inc. who shall be an ex officio member of the Board of Trustees. The elected Board of Trustees shall consist of twenty-eight (28) persons divided into four (4) classes of seven (7) members each elected to serve a term of four (4) years upon their installation at the Fall meeting of the Board and terminating upon removal for cause, death, resignation, or the installation of their successors. Of the elected Trustees (20) shall be lay persons, at least ten (10) of whom shall be members of local church of the Peninsula Annual Conference. Eight (8) elected trustees shall be ordained clergy, at least five (5) of whom shall be members of the Peninsula Annual Conference. No salaried or hourly employee of the College is eligible for membership on the Board.

2. The remainder of said Article Ninth shall remain unchanged.

It was moved and seconded. The corporate session adopted the resolution.

Dr. Reed M. Stewart, President, gave his report on the progress of the school and his desire to keep the personal touch alive in the midst of a computerized society. Dean Alice Rasmussen gave an overview of their orientation program and the variety of positions women hold at the school. Chaplain Robert Price gave an overview of the "Comprehensive Plan For Enhancing diversity at Wesley College" and the new program for those seeking Associate Conference Membership.

Mr. Scarborough opened the session for questions. Conference members asked about the ethnic composition of the Board of Trustees, the use of the campus by the Army, graduation rate for Black students, and the possibility of a mandatory course in racism.

The motion to adjourn was made, seconded and adopted. Mr. Scarborough adjourned the session at 4:00 P.M.

Bishop Yeakel resumed his position as presider and called on Dr. Stapleton.

the deletion of the paragraph on the line of credit. The document entitled A REAFFIRMATION OF THE COVENANT RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN WESLEY COLLEGE AND THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH can be found in the "Resolutions & Conference Action Section."

The conference adopted it.

PUMH COVENANT RELATIONSHIP: Dr. Stapelton presented A COVENANT OF AFFILIATION BETWEEN PUMH OF MARYLAND, INC. AND THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH which is found in the "Resolutions and Conference Actions Section."

The conference adopted it.

The afternoon session adjourned with the singing of "The Battle Hymn Of The Republic" at 4:20 P.M.

SERVICE OF ORDINATION: The service started at 6:30 P.M. with the processional of clergy and ordinands. The choir consisted of members of the Wilmington District and members of the Conference under the direction of Dr. Richard Allen. Bishop Yeakel preached the sermon. Bishop Nichols joined him in the ordination of the Deacons and Elders.

Monday Morning, June 4, 1990

MORNING WORSHIP: Beginning at 8:00 A.M. the Division of Worship led the Conference in a service of worship outside in front of the Ella Fitzgerald Center.

PLENARY: Bishop Yeakel opened the session with the singing of "And Can It Be That I Should Gain," "Alas! And Did My Savior Bled" and "He's the Lily of the Valley." He led the conference in prayer for the family of the Rev. Frank Robinson who had died last night.

BOARD OF CHURCH & SOCIETY: Dr. Ruth Laws shared the intent and the task of the Board as it seeks to make an impact for Christ in our world.

She introduced Mrs. Sally Steen who presented the resolution "Opposition to Invasion of Panama".

OPPOSITION TO INVASION OF PANAMA

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Church "rejects war as an instrument of national foreign policy", and

WHEREAS, President Oscar Arias in his Peace Plan specifically asked the U.S. and U.S.S.R. to support the efforts for peace in Central America by not sending arms...and

WHEREAS, the 1988 UMC General Conference asked that "U.S. agencies support the Esquipulas II Peace Plan and ...not attempt to undermine its fragile existence...especially in El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, and Panama by the sending of lethal material and military personnel", and

WHEREAS, the Organization of American State members had asked that the U.S. not invade Panama:

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Peninsula Conference of the United Methodist Church deplore the U.S. Invasion of Panama and urge that we, as a nation, not engage in such activities in the future. We join with those who grieve at the loss of both Panamanian and U.S. lives caused by the invasion.

Copies of this statement will be sent to President Bush and the Secretary of State Baker.

Rev. James Hawkins moved to amend by deleting the word "deplore" in the final paragraph and substituting the word "regrets." The amendment was seconded and defeated. The resolution then failed to gain the needed majority and failed.

The Rev. James Faltot presented the resolution, Peacemaking Emphasis."

Rev. Clifford Armour moved to amend by adding to the last paragraph of the resolution, "and that programs that are effective and meaningful be gathered by the Board of Church & Society for distribution to other congregations. Furthermore, as an activity of our peacemaking we become aware of the concentration camp conditions of our Palestinian brothers and sister living in the occupied territories of the West Bank and Gaza Strip and that we encourage people traveling in the Holy Land to visit and get to know the holy people who make the land holy—the Palestinians." It was seconded.

Rev. Faltot moved to amend the amendment by deleting the paragraph beginning with "Furthermore and ending with "Palestinians." It was seconded and passed. The conference passed the amended amendment. And it adopted the amended resolution.

The Rev. Mae Etta Moore presented the resolution "Support of Bishop Felton E. May." It was adopted as presented.

Mrs. Sally Steen presented the resolution, "Eastern Europe Disarmament and Economic Conversion." The Rev. Howell Wilkins moved to amend by changing deleting the words, "join them in working" and adding the words, "work with them". The amendment was seconded and passed. The conference adopted the amended resolution.

The Rev. Tom Edwards presented the resolution, "Making Peace With God's Creation: Environmental Justice." Rev. Clifford Armour moved to amend by adding to paragraph c "by surveying our local churches." It was seconded and passed. Rev. James Hawkins moved to amend by deleting in the first line of the first paragraph the words "sludging of" and adding the words "accidental oil spill." It was seconded and passed. The resolution was adopted as amended by the conference.

Rev. Mae Etta Moore presented the resolution, "To Create A Standing Committee On Alcohol & Other Drugs." It was adopted by the conference.

Dr. Roberta Tarbell presented the report, "One Church, One Family." Rev. Karen Booth moved to amend by adding to the first line of the be it resolved paragraph after "each church" the words "and/or pastoral charge." It was seconded and passed. The resolution was adopted by the conference as amended.

Dr. James Seymour moved that the Credo by referred back to the committee for

further perfection. The conference agreed with the motion.

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Thomas Short who made the following motion:

Inasmuch as The United Methodist Church is opposed to gambling,

And inasmuch as a bill was introduced to the Delaware State Legislature to legalize slot machine gambling at race tracks,

And inasmuch as Governor Michael Castle vetoed that bill and led the opposition to have his veto over-ridden,

Therefore, be it resolved that the members of the Peninsula Conference of The United Methodist church meeting in Princess Anne, Maryland on this fourth day of June express their heartfelt gratitude to Governor Castle for his leadership against slot machine gambling in Delaware and consequently for a better quality of life for the citizens of the state.

It was seconded and adopted by the conference.

Ms. Karen Priestly presented the resolution, "Environmental Concern—Use of Recycled Paper." It was seconded and adopted.

After a brief break Bishop Yeakel resumed the session with the singing of "Kum Ba Yah."

Bishop Yeakel recognized the Rev. Clifford Armour who presented the following motion:

"I move that the Peninsula annual conference ask its Board of Church and Society to assist the local church as an activity of our peace-making to become aware of the concentration camp like conditions of our Palestinian brothers and sisters living in the occupied territories of the West Bank and the Gaza Strip and that we encourage people traveling to the Holy Land be sure to visit and get to know the Palestinian and whenever possible to worship with them."

It was seconded and adopted.

STRENGTHENING THE LOCAL CHURCH COMMITTEE: Dr. Gordon Stapelton presented their report and asked that the conference discharge the committee of this responsibility. It was granted.

DIVISION OF PARISH & COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Mrs. Nancy Leathrum presented the Rev. Donald Hurst who presented the resolution, "On A Revolving Loan Fund." It was adopted by the conference.

SIX LANES OF THE ADVANCE: The Rev. Jerome DeVine introduced the Rev. Bruce Storms who recently traveled with Mrs. Ruth DeVine and Dr. Bruce Obershein to Zaire. He presented a hand-made cross symbolizing God dealing with his human creation from the Bishop of the North Shaba Conference to Bishop Yeakel.

Then Rev. DeVine presented the resolution, "Six Lanes of the Advance." It was adopted.

SECRETARY OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES: The Rev. Harvey Manchester, Jr. moved that the Rev. Jerome R. DeVine be the Secretary of Global Ministries for the next year. He was elected.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES: The Rev. Laura Martin stated that last year's Weber motion on the sale of parsonages will be brought to the 1991 session of our conference.

Rev. Martin moved that the 1991 minimum salaries be:

Full Time Elder	\$17,700.00
Probationary--Associate	\$16,400.00
Full Time Local Pastor	\$15,100.00
Student	\$12,500.00

They were adopted by the conference.

Rev. Martin moved that the service increments continue at a rate of \$120.00 for every year of service to a maximum of 15 years.

Rev. Nat Miller moved to amend by changing the "15 years" to "20 years." It was seconded but failed.

Rev. Martin moved that reimbursement for travel expense during 1991 shall be 26 cents per mile. In addition, we also recommend that pastors be reimbursed for tolls and parking expenses incurred in the performance of pastoral duties.

It was adopted.

Rev. Martin moved the commission's report on "Standards For Parsonages."

Rev. Dilio Mariotti moved to delete the last sentence in III.A. which reads, "They shall provide a copy of insurance coverage to the trustees." The amendment was passed.

Dr. Gordon Stapelton moved in behalf of the Cabinet the following motion:

1. Move IV.A to become III.F
2. IV to become "Moving Standards"
3. IV.A to become

Confer A - The local congregation receiving a pastor from within the Annual
ence is responsible for paying moving costs.

Confer B - The local congregation receiving a pastor from outside the Annual
ence is responsible for paying the moving costs from the Peninsula
Conference boundary to the local parsonage.

4. IV.B to become IV.C
5. IV.C to become IV.D
6. IV.D to become IV.E

The motion was adopted.

The Parsonage Standards were adopted as amended. (They are included in the "Resolutions Sections" of the Daily Proceedings.)

MERGER MINUTE: Rev. Janet Harmon shared her experience at Mt. Salem where black and white churches worked and ate together.

BOARD OF CHURCH & SOCIETY ESSAY: The essayists was Mr. Franklin Sykes, 74 years old, from Ebenezer UMC.

PREACHING: Bishop Nichols gave his final sermon which centered on the work he has been doing on vital congregations.

Monday Afternoon, June 4, 1990

PLENARY: Bishop Yeakel reconvened the conference with the singing of "This Is My Song" and "Because He Lives."

UNITED METHODIST PUBLISHING HOUSE: Mrs. Molly Nash shared how the new hymnal is now being used in half of our congregations and that the publishing house is working to support the new African University. She presented a check for \$10,981.41 to Bishop Yeakel and a first edition of the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible.

COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS: Dr. Stapelton presented the report in behalf of the Rev. Charles E. Barton, Jr. who is recuperating from surgery. After several editorial corrections the report was adopted by the conference.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: The Rev. James T. Seymour presented the Rev. Jeremiah Park, Associate Director of Multi-Ethnic Center located at Drew University who shared the objectives of the center: acceptance, appreciation and affirmation.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION FUND: Dr. Douglas Lewis, President of Wesley Seminary, share his personal story of how he was called into the ministry because the churches are the seedbeds for future ministers. There are many ways we share in the call of people into the ministry.

HARRY DENMAN AWARDS: Mrs. Barbara Jester, Chair of Division of Evangelism, presented the award to Mr. J. Francis Turpin, a layperson from Christ Church, Federalburg, Maryland and to Rev. Albert C. Burton, pastor of Union Church, Bear, Delaware. Rev. Alfred E. Taylor received Mr. Turpin's award in his absence. The award states:

In recognition of exemplary obedience to the great commission of the Lord Jesus Christ and in appreciation of significant leadership in helping The United Methodist Church be faithful to its historic evangelism commitment.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES & HISTORY: The Rev. Dr. Philip C. Lawton presented the Local Church History Awards to:

There were ten responses this year. He commended all the churches for preserving their heritage for future generations.

Dr. Lawton presented the resolution, "On The Numbering of Annual Conference Sessions." It was adopted.

He presented the resolution, "Designation of Judge White's House as a Unite Methodist Historic Site." It was adopted.

Rev. Lawrence Livingston moved "that the Commission on Archives & History study the name of the Conference and bring back a recommendation at next year's conference." It was passed by the conference.

The conference received the report of the commission.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION & CAMPUS MINISTRY: The Rev. Karen Moore substituting for Dr. Whittingdon introduced the respective campus pastors and Mr. Christopher Jones from Dillard University and a Black College Ambassador who brought greetings from the Black College Fund.

Rev. Sam Hale presented the resolution, "On Peninsula Conference Promotion of the Africa University Fund." It was adopted by the Conference.

The conference received the report of the Board.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION: The Rev. George Godfrey reminded the conference that a budget would be presented to the adjourned session in September from the discussion at this conference. The conference received the council's report.

PROPERTY RESOLUTIONS: Dr. Stapleton presented two resolutions:

1. The East New Market Charge requests that the action taken at the 1989 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference be amended. The request is that the St. James Church be listed as Limited Service rather than discontinued as reported. It further requests the Annual Conference to direct the Conference Trustees to sell the St. Paul's Church, previously discontinued and divide the proceeds from the sale among the three active churches.

It was approved by the conference.

2. I further recommend that the Metropolitan United Methodist Church, formerly a part of the Queenstown-Carmichael Charge, placed on Limited Service, May 25, 1978, be declared Discontinued and offered for sale. On approval of this resolution the Annual Conference is requested to approve the continued negotiations for sale to be completed by the retiring President of the Board of Trustees, the Reverend William H. Revelle, Jr. Preliminary negotiations with the remaining trustees are underway with Mr. Revelle at the present time. A full report is to be made to the Conference Trustees.

It was approved by the conference.

CHILD CARE CONCERNS: The Rev. Karen Moore presented the resolution, "Addressing Child Care Concerns of Parents Attending 1991 Annual Conference."

The Child Care Task Force recognized that our conference is engaged currently in a careful review of its financial obligations and its funding sources. We are not insensitive to the financial crunch that has arisen from increasing health costs annually. However, we feel strongly that this

particular expenditure of monies would be justified because of the need and opportunity anticipated; our wish to include the "Baby Boomer" population in the greatest possible way; and our wish as an annual conference to be sensitive to the fact that many families on our Peninsula may not be earning large amounts of money, especially younger families for whom child care need at annual conference may be greater than that of other families. This is an timely issue and our hope is that you will treat it as an opportunity, not a burden.

Therefore be it resolved that the Council on Finance and Administration be urged to consider the addition of \$3000 to the Conference Session Expenses line item in the proposed conference budget for the purpose of supporting a child care program for the 1991 annual conference.

It was adopted.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: The Rev. Dr. P. Thomas McKelvey presented Dr. Cha of the Eastern Seaboard Korean Mission who is helping with the Korean Mission in Salisbury, Maryland. He introduced the Rev. Biak who is the church's pastor to the conference.

PRIVILEGED MOTION: The Rev. Dr. David Weber presented a nonbinding resolution opposing the creation of the tenth episcopal area. It was received by the conference.

Dr. Weber moved that this resolution be communicated to the other delegation of the Northeastern Jurisdiction by the Conference Secretary. It was adopted.

CONFERENCE RULES: The bishop asked that the Conference Secretary to study the conference rules regarding resolutions.

MOTION TO ADJOURN: Dr. Gordon Stapleton moved that the June 1-4, 1990 session of the Peninsula Annual Conference be adjourned and that an adjourned session be held on September 15, 1990 or at the call of the Conference President. It was adopted.

CLOSURE: Bishop Yeakel led the conference in "A Covenant Prayer in the Wesleyan Tradition." The conference sang the hymn "Make Me A Captive, Lord" and the Bishop closed with prayer.

C. Daily Proceedings of the Adjourned Session

The Conference gathered at the Central Middle School in Dover, Delaware on September 15, 1990 for an Adjourned Session of Conference. Bishop Susan Murch Morrison presided over the session. The hosts were the Wilmington District under the leadership of the Reverend Dr. James T. Seymour and Wesley College whose President is the Reverend Dr. Reed Stewart. The roll call was taken by passing out registration cards to the conference membership and collected by the ushers. There were 174 laity and 192 clergy in attendance. The Reverend Glenn P. Catley led the members in an inspiring time of worship.

The Reverend Dr. James T. Seymour introduced and welcomed Bishop Morrison to our Conference area. With the July 14 action of the Jurisdictional Conference the Peninsula Conference was moved from the Washington Area to the Philadelphia Area, thus changing the episcopal leadership from Bishop Yeakel to Bishop Morrison. Dr. Seymour presented her with a gavel as a sign of her leadership in our midst.

PLENARY SESSION: Bishop Morrison struck the gavel to the table and called the Adjourned Session of the Peninsula Conference to order. The Conference Secretary presented the Modified Organizational and Procedural Motion:

1. The bar of the conference includes the seating on the main floor of the auditorium, excluding the galleries.
2. Roll call will be taken by all members signing cards and returning them to the ushers.
3. There will be no name tags.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION: The Reverend George Godfrey, President, shared their report with the conference members. The Reverend Susan K. Kester spoke on what the Benevolences portion of the budget means for the church at large. Mr. James Robinson addressed the connectional responsibilities we have in the budget. The Reverend Lawrence Livingston shared how the conference staff relates to the local church. The Reverend Olin Shockley stressed the importance of ministerial support.

Then Reverend Godfrey moved that the following seven (7) recommendations be

adopted:

1. That .38 be the apportionment fraction for 1991. (Note: It is our intention to hold the apportionment factor at .38 for 1992).

It was adopted by the conference.

2. That the 1991 budget in the amount of \$4,433,872 be adopted.

Mr. Burr moved that the budget be reduced from \$4,433,872 to \$4,333,872 by taking \$100,000 from the Health and Dental Insurance lines of the budget. The motion to amend was seconded but was not adopted.

3. That up to \$100,000 be taken from reserve funds to balance the 1991 budget.

It was adopted.

4. That in the event apportionment receipts for 1991 fall short of projections, the Council on Finance and Administration will determine how to adjust the 1991 budget to stay within income.

It was adopted.

5. That the 1992 budget item for health and dental insurance be limited to an increase of 15% over 1991.

Mr. Atkinson moved to add "we recommend" after the word "that". It was seconded but failed to receive a majority of votes.

It was adopted.

6. That the 1992 budget item for pre-1982 pension funding be limited to an increase of 3% over 1991.

It was adopted.

7. That the 1992 budget be balanced using only receipts from apportionments.

It was adopted.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: The Reverend Charles E. Barton, Jr. called the conference's attention that 25 years ago this month Mr. Theodore Briggs became our Conference Business Manager. The members stood to their feet and gave Mr. Briggs an enthusiastic applause.

PERSONAL PRIVILEGE: The Reverend Seymour introduced the Reverend Robert Daugherty, Conference Council on Ministries Director, Mr. Dale Owens, Conference Treasurer, and the Reverend Gilbert Caldwell, District Superintendent, who are members of the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference.

ADJOURNMENT: The Reverend Charles Barton moved that the September 15 Adjourned Session of the Peninsula Conference be adjourned. It was adopted.

The Reverend Seymour dismissed the conference with prayer.

In the afternoon a Service of Welcome and Holy Communion was held in the Central Middle School auditorium. Bishop Morrison was the preacher and celebrant of the sacrament. She was welcome by members of the conference as well as by the Interfaith Community by the Most Reverend Robert E. Mulvee, Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Wilmington. A reception was held in her honor at Wesley College.

CONFERENCE ACTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS

A Resolution for Vision Interfaith Satellite Network (VISN)

WHEREAS, Television is one of the most powerful communication media today, and

WHEREAS, The National Interfaith Cable Coalition, Inc. (NICC) has been created by 22 Protestant, Roman Catholic, Jewish and Eastern Orthodox faith groups, including The United Methodist Church, and

WHEREAS, the Vision Interfaith Satellite Network (VISN) has been created by NICC as a national cable network to promote positive religious and social values and to illustrate that religion is vital and integral part of American life, and

WHEREAS, VISN provided direct ministry and witness to viewers in nearly every state across the country through 18 hours of programming daily, which also serves as a national outlet for more than eight hours of weekly of United Methodist-related programming, including "Catch the Spirit," and

WHEREAS, VISN allows no on-air fund raising, no attacks on other faith groups, and no proselytizing by one group to members of another faith group, and

WHEREAS, VISN offers 14 hours of time per week for United Methodist and other local faith groups to present their own ministries and witness at a community, level, and

WHEREAS, VISN can inspire and motivate persons to become active again or in new ways in their own churches and synagogues as well as help to create a spirit of tolerance, acceptance, understanding and trust among the faith groups within the community, and

WHEREAS, cable is available to 57% or 52.2 million American homes and will increase to 67% or 66.43 million American homes by 1991, and

WHEREAS, the cable industry has agreed to advance between \$5 and \$12 million during the next two years to cover VISN's operational expenses as well as agreeing to underwrite the operational expenses of VISN on a continuing basis through a payment of \$.03 per subscriber per month, and

WHEREAS, VISN must reach 15 million household to become self-supporting,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED,

That the Peninsula Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church endorses the National Interfaith Cable Coalition and the VISN cable network, and

Urges our pastors and laypersons to take the initiative in their communities to work with other religious leaders in securing VISN for our communities, and

Urges our pastors and laypersons to support the production and airing of local programs for VISN, and

Urges our pastors and laypersons to actively support and invite people to view

VISN once it is available in the community and to utilize it creatively as a resource of mission and witness within our own congregations and within the community.

PEACEMAKING EMPHASIS

WHEREAS, the biblical notion of Shalom manifests a wholeness of spirit and body, inner peace as well as outer security.

WHEREAS, Shalom comes about through a cooperative effort of both God and us. God's power transforms us so that right relationships can be restored: between us and God, between us and God's creation, between us and one another, between us and ourselves.

WHEREAS, Jesus gives us peace, "not as a world gives," but rather an inner tranquility which enables us to experience Shalom in the midst of strife.

WHEREAS, the concept of Shalom challenges us and calls us to action. It does not call us to be successful, but rather to be faithful. Free from fear, filled with God's peace, we can be what God would have us be; we can do what God would have us do: to be and act as agents of God's Shalom.

THEREFORE, We call upon the Peninsula Conference of The United Methodist Church to recognize and reaffirm this program emphasis of peacemaking with one another, within the family, within the congregation, and within the world.

FURTHERMORE, We call upon members and congregations of the Peninsula Conference of The United Methodist Church during the coming conference year to develop one or more programs in their churches and communities that will emphasize these forms of peacemaking and invite members and congregations to look at the Board of Church and Society for resource materials, resource persons, or other assistance in planning and implementing these programs.

SUPPORT FOR BISHOP FELTON E. MAY

WHEREAS, Bishop Felton E. May has been assigned by the Council of Bishops to work full-time for one year on a special demonstration project designed to find an effective United Methodist response to the drug crisis; and

WHEREAS, this project will take place in the Washington, D.C. neighborhood of Anacostia where fourteen United Methodist Churches have banded together to respond to the heavy drug traffic in the neighborhood; and

WHEREAS, national United Methodist agencies will combine efforts to provide facts, resources and training through the leadership to Bishops and Annual Conferences; and

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Church will mobilize its people to dramatize the issue of drug abuse, and to advocate creative legislation and social action to assist individuals, families and communities;

WE THEREFORE resolve that the churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference keep this project in their prayers, support the project through the Advance Special, "To Be Our Neighbor's Neighbor" #982598-1, and assign to the Board of Church and Society, the task of studying any of the reports of this project for what may be applicable to ministries within the Peninsula Conference.

EASTERN EUROPE DISARMAMENT AND ECONOMIC CONVERSION

The Hebrew prophets call us to a world in which all peoples are secure in their own land and on their own mountains. God breaks the bars of the yoke of oppression and feeds the people in justice (Ezekiel 34). The dramatic events in Eastern Europe during this past year have brought democratic reforms to Poland, Hungary, East Germany, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria and Romania remind us that this is a time of Kairos in which God is working through sons and daughters in these countries to bring justice, righteousness and peace. God's inbreaking is empowering and is changing the course of history. "He hath put down the mighty from their seats, and exalted them of low degree. He hath filled the hungry with good things; and the rich he hath sent empty away." (Luke 1:52-53)

WHEREAS, the developments in Eastern Europe have moved the world beyond the constraints of the Cold War and have created new possibilities for nuclear and conventional disarmament. Nuclear disarmament would include the fulfillment of the obligations of nuclear states under the Nuclear Non-proliferation treaty to end the arms race and prevent further nuclear proliferation. General disarmament in Europe could be achieved by an orderly withdrawal of all armed forces based in foreign territory, the demobilization of withdrawn forces in their homelands, and the establishment of mechanisms for achieving common security and resolving disputes between and within European nations through peaceful means.

WHEREAS, the Berlin Wall — the symbol of the Cold War — has come tumbling down, the dismantling of the arms race must have its corollary economic conversion. Resources now spent on the arms race should be used to solve domestic social and economic problems plaguing nations in Europe and North America to include retraining persons who derive their livelihood from the military industrial complex. Converted resources should be made available to developing nations to assist in overcoming hunger and poverty and in improving living condition. Part of the peace dividend should be used to deal with global environmental problems.

THEREFORE, We call upon the members and congregations of the Peninsula Conference of The United Methodist Church to recognize the accomplishments of our brothers and sisters in Eastern Europe and join them in working for a new world order based on common security, by looking to influence public policies which will bring an end to the nuclear and conventional arms race and make resources now spent on the military available to meet human and environmental needs both at home and abroad.

MAKING PEACE WITH GOD'S CREATION:
ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE
RESOLUTION

In light of the accidental oil spill in the Prince William Sound by Exxon Valdez, March 24, 1989, we of the Peninsula Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church are keenly aware of what harm a similar accident would produce in the Chesapeake or Delaware Bays. And because the Exxon Valdez was transporting oil to provide fuel for our home, office, factories and autos, all of us therefore are stained by the sin of the Valdez.

From the perspective of Biblical faith, the God who makes human wrath into an instrument of divine praise, bringing hope from despair, is opening up new possibilities for environmental protection. We therefore must respond with repentant, persistent, and earnest efforts to transform these new possibilities into new realities. The challenge now is for environmental protection.

WHEREAS, The Peninsula Conference shore line includes two major bays and the Atlantic Ocean, and they are important natural resources; and

WHEREAS, many of our church members derive their livelihood from the waterways either directly or indirectly; and

WHEREAS, the petroleum industry has located important refineries within our region; and

WHEREAS, we, as a nation, are dependant upon fossil fuel for much of our daily existence,

THEREFORE, be it resolved that:

a. We affirm the General Board of Church and Society's resolution to call upon the federal government to strengthen its regulations regarding the transportation of oil and hazardous substances, and vessel construction.

b. We demand a halt to off-shore oil exploration and drilling in the Delaware and Maryland Atlantic shore line until such time it can be done without harm to the environment.

c. We practice, as stewards of God's creation, individually, congregationally, and denominationally, prudent responsible energy conservation methods thereby reducing the demand on our energy supplies and reserves.

d. We call upon the scientific community to develop alternative forms of energy.

e. We encourage the auto industry to develop and install engines with higher fuel efficiency once again reducing our demand on our oil reserves and protecting our environment.

f. Be it further resolved that copies of this resolution be sent to the appropriate state and federal executives and agencies, the Council of Bishops, the General Board of Church and Society, and annual conference chairperson of Church and Society.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERN — USE OF RECYCLED PAPER

Whereas, we as Christians have a special calling to stewardship of God's creation and an obligation to implement all possible actions to prevent further deterioration of the earth.

Whereas, the people of Wyoming United Methodist Church feel that the Church should lead by example in protecting our environment.

Whereas, the production of recycled paper consumes 30-50% less energy than the production of new paper and reduces air pollution by 90%.

Whereas, the Peninsula Conference office uses large quantities of paper for annual ~~conferences~~ ~~conferences~~, reports and especially for materials related to the

Therefore, be it resolved that:

- a. the Peninsula Conference office be directed to use recycled copy paper for all conference business.
- b. all local church offices be encouraged to use recycled copy paper.
- c. all office personnel be encourage to separate office wast paper and dispose of by taking to recycling centers where feasible.

RESOLUTION ON A REVOLVING LOAN FUND

In order to increase the potential loans of The Conference for developing new and existing churches, the Congregational Development Committee makes the following recommendations:

Since one of the purposes of the Congregational Development Committee is to encourage and support the development of new churches and established congregations, administratively and financially;

And since the Congregational Development Committee has applications from Local Churches for loans an/or grants in excess of available funds at any time;

And since any loan or grant is presently restricted according to funds available within our committee compared to applications pending;

And since the Congregational Development Committee has no economic resources other than the funds allocated through the budget of the Peninsula Annual Conference;

We, the Congregational Development Committee, the Division of Parish and Community Development and the Board of Global Ministries recommend to the Peninsula Annual Conference that a Revolving Loan Fund (Trust Fund) be established to assist new and established churches in their development and that the Trust Fund be composed of:

- o the present outstanding loans to Local Churches,
- o the future monies designated for loans to Local Churches,

- o the interest generated from any present or future loan to Local Churches,
- o and monies received from Local Churches, organization or individuals designated Congregational Development funds for loans;
- o the trust fund will be administered through the Conference Treasurer, Peninsula Conference Business Office, by depositing all designated monies for this cause to the Division of Parish and Community Development Account, Congregational Development, and the Congregational Development Committee will then disperse said monies for loans only accounting to the current application procedures of the Board of Global Ministries.

We further recommend that we compose a list of Local Churches which have funds to invest which they are willing to loan to specific other Local Churches to assist them in developing;

And we further recommend that we develop a pool of technically skilled administrative volunteer personnel to assist Local Churches in planning, developing and building projects or programs.

And finally, we recommend that these opportunities for encouraging and supporting the development of new and existing churches be included in the six avenues for the advance being promoted and cultivated for the Conference by the Board of Global Ministries, with the help of Jerome R. RESOLUTION ON THE NUMBERING OF ANNUAL CONFERENCE SESSIONS

WHEREAS, the Book of Discipline (par. 824) gives the Annual Conference the authority to use its own formula to determine a founding date; and

WHEREAS, the Peninsula Conference's present system of dating sessions from the 1939 merger of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and the Methodist Protestant Church does not take into account the 1965 merger of the Peninsula and Delaware Conferences; and

WHEREAS, more inclusive dating formulas are available. (Possibilities include 1965 and 1784, the date of the Christmas Conference, which is used by the Baltimore Conference.)

THEREFORE be it resolved

1. That the Peninsula Conference is prepared to reconsider its present formula for the numbering of Annual Conference sessions; and
2. That the Commission on Archives and History is instructed to study this issue and to prepare an appropriate resolution for the 1991 Annual Conference.

**DESIGNATION OF JUDGE WHITE'S HOUSE
AS A UNITED METHODIST HISTORIC SITE**

WHEREAS, the location of Judge Thomas White's house, near Whiteleysburg, Delaware, is of significant historic interest to United Methodists (it was there that Judge White gave refuge to Francis Asbury for twenty months during the American Revolution, during which time Asbury held two Preachers' Conferences and otherwise continued to fulfill his role as leader of American Methodists); and

WHEREAS, the Commission on Archives and History at its meeting on March 20, 1990, recommended that this location be designated as a United Methodist Historic Site;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Peninsula Annual Conference, in accordance with Discipline 1812.4, designates the location of Judge White's house as a United Methodist Historic Site.

**A REAFFIRMATION OF THE COVENANT RELATIONSHIP
BETWEEN WESLEY COLLEGE AND
THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF
THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH**

SECTION I An understanding of Covenant

It is the intention of this document to set forth the covenant relationship between Wesley College and the Peninsula Annual conference of the United Methodist Church. This covenant relationship can be defined as a tangible device for making explicit the relationship between the College and the Annual Conference, encouraging mutual understanding, and fostering a joint approach to emerging issues in church-related higher education today and tomorrow.

Let it be accepted as a part of the covenant relationship that this document will be reviewed jointly by the College and the Annual Conference at least once every quadrennium.

SECTION II The History of the Covenant Between
the College and the Annual Conference

The establishment of the institution which was to become Wesley College was first considered in the Methodist Episcopal Conference of 1870. Three years later a charter was secured. In September, 1873, the Wilmington Conference Academy, a preparatory school, was opened in rented buildings in Dover, under the patronage of the Wilmington Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The first building, known as OLD MAIN, was finished and occupied in September of 1874.

In 1918, a new charter changed the name to Wesley Collegiate Institute and enabled the school to extend its offerings to include the first two years of college. The first junior college class began its studies in 1922 and was graduated in June, 1924.

The Depression of 1929 made the Wesley Collegiate Institute one of its temporary casualties and the school was closed in 1932. After the union of 1939 in which the Methodist Protestant Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Episcopal Church became The Methodist

- B. Through its relationship to the church, the College is part of a world-wide community of faith with a world-view rooted in the transcendent. So connected, Wesley is expected to present an alternative vision to the world's narrowness and provincialism.
- C. Wesley College is expected to take its faith commitment seriously and apply that faith in every aspect of its institutional life. This means giving recognizable expression to its faith through the functions of scholarship, personnel policies, over-all campus ethos, and in an active concern for corporate responsibility in the area of institutional investments.
- D. Wesley College is expected to work faithfully at building true community. The College can have no greater impact than by providing an experience of true, Christian community—a place where the barriers of sex, race and ideology are overcome and people actually live in an atmosphere of peace, mutual acceptance and personal fulfillment.

SECTION V College Expectations of the Annual Conference

- A. The Annual Conference reaffirms its understanding that there is a Christian witness to be made through its support of Wesley College, a witness that cannot be made as clearly through secular institutions of higher learning. This support will find expression in prayers, counsel, advocacy and financial contributions/commitments.
- B. The Annual Conference will interpret its ministry at Wesley College to the local churches and help them to appreciate the College as a unique and vital part of the church's overall mission.
- C. The Annual Conference will encourage its pastors and lay delegates to lift up Wesley College as an option for those persons in their local churches who are considering a personalized Christian academic experience. The Annual Conference also encourages local church members to be advocates for the College in its endeavor to find potential friends and students in local communities.
- D. The Annual Conference will urge generous support on the part of local churches for the annual Wesley College Sunday offering, all of which is applied as scholarship assistance for Peninsula Annual Conference students attending Wesley.

SECTION VI A Renewal of the Covenant

With a shared heritage of 117 years of ministry in higher education, we the Board of Trustees of Wesley College, and the members of the Peninsula Annual Conference, do hereby reaffirm our covenant relationship and pledge ourselves to pursue the program of cooperation and mutual support stated above. Once again, we affirm as our common quest the objective so ably phrased by Charles Wesley himself, to "unite the pair so long disjoined, knowledge and vital piety." By God's grace, in the unity which is ours as members of the body of Jesus Christ, and empowered by the Holy Spirit, we pledge so to do.

A COVENANT OF AFFILIATION
BETWEEN
PUMH OF MARYLAND, INC.
AND
THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF
THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

SECTION I. THE MEANING AND PURPOSE OF AFFILIATION

A. Annual Conference affiliation with a health and welfare type ministry or other program and the conference's permission for that ministry or program for the use of the words "Peninsula United Methodist", or any abbreviation thereof, in its name signifies that its goals and activities are consistent with the mission and ministry of the conference. Through affiliation the Annual Conference witnesses to the vitality and reliability of such ministries and publicly commends them as worthy ministries. It testifies that the services provided are worthy of the support of The United Methodist Churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference, public and private organizations and individuals.

The purpose of this covenant of affiliation is to provide a clear and consistent mutually agreed upon statement of the relationship between PUMH of Maryland, Inc. and the Peninsula Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church. This covenant defines the ongoing responsibilities of each party to the other and supersedes any other prior understandings and relationships whether express or implied. All future relevant communications and contracts by either party shall reflect the affiliated relationship as covenanted herein.

SECTION II. RESPONSIBILITIES OF PUMH OF MARYLAND, INC. TO THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

A. To present to the Annual Conference session the following: (When the information required by Items 1 through 5 below is published it shall be preceded by the following:

"The following information about PUMH of Maryland, Inc. is printed because the Conference has a common missional interest with PUMH of Maryland, Inc. although the Conference does not have any financial or legal responsibility for PUMH of Maryland, Inc.")

1. A current mission statement and a summary of the common religious heritage shared with the Peninsula Annual Conference. Notification shall be made to the Annual Conference of any amendments made to the mission statement.
2. An annual report concerning the operations of the corporation.
3. An annual independent audit of finances.
4. Notification of any changes in its Certificate of Incorporation and By-Laws.
5. The names of those nominated by PUMH of Maryland, Inc. to be confirmed by the Annual Conference for the current class of Directors and the names already serving to meet the following requirements;

a. 40% of the elected membership of the Board of Directors of PUMH of Maryland, Inc. shall be made up of persons confirmed by the Peninsula Annual Conference. One half of these shall be lay persons currently holding membership in a local church of the Peninsula Conference and having done so for no less than four consecutive previous years. The other half of these shall be clergy holding full membership in the Peninsula Annual Conference and having done so for at least four consecutive previous years. Every effort shall be made for both groups to be representative of the diversity of the Annual Conference. Through this process there is a sharing in the recognition of individuals who support high standards of care and operation with a sense of mission in common with the Annual Conference. The persons nominated and confirmed as directors do not represent, nor are they responsible to, the Annual Conference which confirmed them. The Board of Directors of PUMH of Maryland, Inc. operates autonomously from the Annual Conference. (While 40% are confirmed by the Peninsula Annual Conference, all of the directors are elected by the PUMH of Maryland, Inc. Board of Directors under the provisions of the by-laws.)

b. The district superintendent of the Easton District will be considered as a liaison person to the Board of Directors and will have ex-officio membership.

B. To present to the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries of the Board of Global Ministries of the Peninsula Annual Conference the following:

1. All of the above information for review and recommendation no less than 90 days before the Annual Conference session.
2. A current copy of the Certificate of Incorporation and By-Laws.
3. Documents advising of any significant changes in program or direction.
4. Any plans to solicit funds from the churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference. Such plans shall be reviewed and coordinated with the Council on Finance and Administration of the Peninsula Annual Conference.
5. To keep on file with the division current samples of all promotional materials, service contracts, and other significant materials.

C. To maintain membership in the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries.

D. To use the name PUMH of Maryland, Inc. on all promotional and official documents.

E. To present to current residents of PUMH of Maryland, Inc., facilities and all future residents a summary of this covenant.

F. In the event of dissolution of PUMH of Maryland, Inc., consideration shall be given the Peninsula Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, its successors and assignees in transfer of any assets which must be assigned as result of dissolution.

SECTION III. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH TO PUMH OF MARYLAND, INC.

A. Permit the use of the name and logo of the Peninsula United Methodist Annual Conference including reference to the affiliated relationship.

Provide for the confirmation of nominations made by PUMH of Maryland, Inc. representing 40% of the Board of Directors as outlined in Section II., B., 5. of this covenant at the regular session of the Annual Conference. The Peninsula Annual Conference may confirm or reject any of these nominations. If additional nominations are necessary between sessions of the Annual Conference, the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries of the Board of Global Ministries will have the power to confirm such nominations and report such to the next Annual Conference session.

B. Provide PUMH of Maryland, Inc. with access to communication channels of the Conference, including the Journal, the Conference proceedings, and Conference newspaper, as well as other means of furthering promotion and interpretation of its mission and program.

C. Give consideration to the needs of PUMH of Maryland, Inc., in its annual funding.

D. Encourage participation in peer review and self evaluation programs which may be offered by the Department of Health and Welfare Ministries of the General Board of Global Ministries, the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries or the Continuing Care Accreditation Commission of the American Association of Homes for the Aging. To share resources which may be offered through these channels for enrichment or support of ministry.

E. Assist in maintaining awareness of spiritual and missional priorities in ministry.

F. Communicate any changes in the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church and/or Annual Conference action which may affect this relationship.

G. Maintain membership in the United Methodist Association of Health and Welfare Ministries.

SECTION IV. LIMITATIONS ON THE SCOPE OF THIS RELATIONSHIP

A. Neither PUMH of Maryland, Inc. nor the Peninsula Annual Conference has or accepts any legal or financial responsibility for the operations or affairs of the other. Neither is the agent or servant of the other, neither shall represent that it is the agent or servant of the other and neither shall represent that the other is its agent or servant.

B. Ownership and control of the assets and operations of PUMH of Maryland, Inc. resides totally and solely in PUMH of Maryland, Inc.

SECTION V. REVIEW PROCEDURES

This Covenant agreement shall be reviewed annually by the Annual Conference Division of Health and Welfare Ministries and Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., and revised as needed. Either party may terminate

revision or notification of termination, the Covenant agreement will continue in force from year to year.

STANDARDS FOR THE PARSONAGES

I. The purpose of the Parsonage Standards is threefold:

To help the congregations provide suitable housing, within reasonable limits for the pastor's family.

To help the pastor's family and the congregation in taking proper care of the parsonage.

To help avoid misunderstanding between the congregation and the pastor, (and successive pastors) where pastors move from one parsonage to another.

II. Minimum Standards for Parsonages:

- A. Floor Plan: The number of rooms in a church parsonage shall include: living room, dining room, kitchen, three or four bedrooms, 1 1/2 baths, study (if not in church building), utility. One of the existing bedrooms should not be used as a study unless an existing bedroom is not being used. If the parsonage does not meet the room standards, it should be upgraded.
- B. Utilities: We recommend central heating system; combination storm windows and doors; hot water heater and sufficient electrical outlets in each room. Air conditioning should be installed for the pastor's study, and consideration for the entire parsonage. Basic cable and/or antenna should be provided where needed.
- C. Pastor's Study: The office is preferably in the church building, but if located in the parsonage it should be on the first floor. The study should be equipped with adequate bookshelves, desk, files, storage closet for supplies, mimeograph machine and/or copier, typewriter, and telephone. The pastor's study should have an outside entrance when at the parsonage.
- D. Furnishings and equipment to be provided by the church:
1. Window blinds, curtains, or drapes, rugs or wall-to-wall carpet; adequate lighting.
 2. Kitchen: refrigerator with freezer, range and oven, dishwasher, adequate cabinet and counter space. It is recommended that vinyl floor covering be on the kitchen floor.
 3. Utility Room: An automatic washer and dryer; adequate plumbing and wiring for all utilities.
 4. Church to supply fire extinguishers for kitchen and outside the furnace room door. These should be the ABC type or other Underwriters approved type. They need to be checked once a year. Smoke alarm systems should be installed on each floor.
 5. A good working lawn mower should be provided.

III. Care of Property:

- A. Insurance: The church shall provide adequate fire and liability insurance

on the parsonage. The minister shall provide insurance on furniture and personal items because the minister owns the furniture.

- B. The parsonage shall be well maintained with periodic checks by the Chairperson of Trustees and/or Pastor-Parish Relations Committee. Paint, wall paper, wiring, plumbing, should all be inspected. The Chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee, the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees and the pastor shall make an annual review of the church owned parsonage to assure proper maintenance. This report should be given at the Charge Conference.
- C. An inventory of the parsonage equipment with the help of the pastor should be kept. In addition, a listing of all items owned by the church, their condition, and date purchased should be maintained. There should also be records of the dates when the various rooms were renovated, painted, etc. and their current condition.
- D. The minister is responsible for any damage to church property by members of the family or family pets.
- E. Such things as cutting grass, trimming shrubs, shoveling snow, and the like are to be worked out between the minister and the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee.
- F. Since the minister's goods, are not provided protection by the church's insurance policy, it is recommended that every minister's family inventory their possessions and have then insured against loss, both in the Church building and in the parsonage.

IV. Moving Standards:

- A. The local congregation receiving a pastor from within the Annual Conference is responsible for paying moving costs.
- B. The local congregation receiving a pastor from outside the Annual Conference is responsible for paying the moving costs from the Peninsula Conference boundary to the local parsonage.
- C. At moving time, the minister should leave the parsonage in clean, orderly condition. The facilities should be in good repair, the light switches working, the faucets not leaking, etc. Trash and unwanted items should be hauled away. Ministers and/or family who damage walls and church property should be charged accordingly.
- D. The minister should leave for his/her successor:
 - 1. Tagged keys for all locks.
 - 2. Notes on whom to call in case of emergency.
 - 3. Notes to whom to call for service and repairs.
 - 4. Notes on where to find such things as screens, lawn mowers, etc.
 - 5. Same telephone number. (If not possible, notify the Secretary of the Annual Conference immediately of the change.)

V. Make life more pleasant for Minister and Congregation.

- A. We recommend an "open house" be observed in accordance with the program of the church.

- B. The parsonage is the home of the minister and the minister's family during their occupancy; their rights and privacy should always be observed by members of the congregation. However, the minister and the family should take care of all parsonage property.
- C. Since all utilities are paid by the church, such items as storm windows, insulation, and improved heating systems should be given every consideration. Utilities are interpreted to mean heat, electricity, gas, oil, sewage, water, telephone and cable TV service if connected. (NOTE: The minister is responsible for personal toll calls made by the parsonage family.)
- D. It is recommended that maintenance free material be used in existing and new parsonages, such as: ceramic tile, paneling, durable floor coverings, aluminum siding, vinyl or aluminum windows, formica, brick, split shingles, and aluminum gutters.
- E. Parsonage yards should be easily maintained.

The parsonage is a witness of the church, and it is a symbol of the stewardship of the congregation; the parsonage should, therefore, receive the same kind of care as the church building.

RESOLUTION TO CREATE A STANDING COMMITTEE ON ALCOHOL & OTHER DRUGS

GIVEN there is a growing awareness and concern relative to the use and abuse of alcohol and other drugs worldwide; and

WHEREAS, the General Conference of The United Methodist Church has urged the creation of a Standing Committee on Alcohol and Other Drugs within each Annual Conference to coordinate programs of education at all age levels, to encourage local churches to initiate and assist in the formation of self help recovery programs, to conduct workshops for clergy and lay people, and other activities which assist addicted people toward recovery;

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Peninsula Annual Conference establish such a Standing Committee, with funding provided by Conference Board of Church and Society, to be chaired by a member of the Conference Board of Church and Society and consist of one clergy person, one lay person, and one youth representative from each of the four districts of the conference and that a member of the Program Management Team serve on the committee as a resource persons; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Standing Committee is to report to the Annual Conference its progress in the afore-mentioned areas of concern.

RESOLUTION TO IMPLEMENT THE ONE CHURCH/ONE FAMILY CONCEPT THROUGHOUT THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE DURING 1990-91

We now come to the time to vote on implementing the One Church/One Family concept throughout the conference. All churches aided by suggestions in the guidelines and by the experiences of many sister churches can sponsor one homeless person or family.

WHEREAS, this resolution is an action goal fulfilling two Key Result Areas of the 1991 Goals of the Board of Church and Society—to establish the recognition that all people are created in God's image, have worth and a contribution to make and to ensure that people's basic needs for food, housing, health care, education and employment are met, and

WHEREAS, dramatically rising numbers of the visible homeless, the sheltered homeless, the hidden homeless, and those at risk of homelessness have been documented by several recent major studies;

WHEREAS, we as Christians have felt compassion for the homeless,

THEREFORE be it resolved that each church in the Peninsula Conference reach out in a people-to-people action to adopt at least one of America's 3 million homeless persons or families and to enable them, warmed in body and soul, to face the future with hope.

Suggested methods of evaluation: 1) a question asked at each Charge Conference; 2) a one-page report on progress mailed to the Task Force Chairperson in nine months to be reported at the next Annual Conference.

PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE SIX LANES OF THE ADVANCE

WHEREAS the parent bodies of what now is The United Methodist Church faithfully set forth to fulfill a global vision of the mission of the church universal,

AND WHEREAS our present United Methodist Church, working with other Methodist bodies, and with other ecumenical connections throughout the world continues to respond to Jesus Christ's call to be ambassadors of love, justice and healing,

AND WHEREAS the Peninsula Annual Conference has inherited this rich and challenging tradition from our parent Conferences,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that we, lay and clergy members of the Peninsula Annual Conference, in order to carry out our calling, do hereby accept in concept and content the focused mission program entitled "PENINSULA ANNUAL CONFERENCE 6 LANES OF THE ADVANCE".

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in order to make this commitment bear fruit, we accept the goal for 1990-91 for every Peninsula Conference congregation to choose at least one project from one of the 6 lanes.

WEBER RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, this July 1990, at the Northeast Jurisdictional Conference, a proposal will be presented to create a new, 10th, Episcopal Area.

WHEREAS, we are losing membership at a staggering rate in the N.E.

WHEREAS, the expense for this initiative is more than \$200,000 per year (1,600,00/per two quadrennia) according to the General Minutes.

WHEREAS, there is an ethical dimension to this proposal. The Washington area does not now meet this criteria. According to the spirit of The Discipline we should left untouched.

WHEREAS, this really hurts the two Maryland Districts that will totally lose any presence in their state capital, Annapolis. For housing and poverty issues this will be a real set-back for the eastern shore of Maryland.

WHEREAS, if a Bishop/Area costs us \$1,600,000+ (every eight years) the question is, "where do the finances come from and who pays for it?" Answer: the plan will be financed by the Episcopal Fund.


WHEREAS, the April Interpreter says, "A deficit of about \$870,000 in the Episcopal Fund was projected by Dec. 31, 1989. Council officials listed among the reasons for the shortfall: increased expenses, including the creation of three new episcopal areas, and the churches' failure to pay the percentage of the apportionment required to cover the cost of Bishop's salaries, travel and office operations." (pg.5)

WHEREAS, to cover the cost the Interpreter responds. "Raising the apportionment to 2.5 percent of all clergy salaries in the U.S. is expected to bring the fund deficit to \$275,000 by Dec. 31, 1992. The council is expected to propose a higher ceiling for apportionments to the 1992 General Conference. Currently, apportionments cannot be increased more than 2.5%."

WHEREAS, most conferences in the Northeast are having financial trouble

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the conference adopt a non-binding resolution indicating its desire that there not be created another episcopal area this year.

PENINSULA CONFERENCE BUDGET 1991



CABINET REPORT TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

TEXT: EPHESIANS 4:4-7, 11-13

INTRODUCTION:

This is a time of change! Much transformation is happening around us and in us. Globally, we celebrate that East is meeting West. But there is much silence when it comes to North and South, the haves and have nots of God's world. In some areas of the world the church is marginalized, while in other areas of the world the church is a vital instrument of God transforming peoples' lives and changing the course of nations and whole societies. Salvation is being made real within people and within communities.

Change is evident within the Peninsula Conference. We are grateful to Bishop Yeakel for his leadership which has been ever so pastoral, fair-handed, and visionary. He has made us so much more aware of our covenant with God and with one another as United Methodists, leading us to a greater accountability to one another in love. Thus, we are strong as we face the transition of personnel, policies, and priorities within our conference. Our strength is in our vision as we look to the future, attempting to discern the kind of church that God would have us to be. The need and possibilities of strategic planning is a gift that Bishop Yeakel has given to us that could help us by the power of God to become a more vital church, as a conference, districts and local congregations. Bishop Yeakel we are grateful to you for your leadership and for your life and ministry in our midst.

As we, the Cabinet, look at the present and future, we share the following vision and concerns for the life and ministry of the people of the Peninsula called United Methodists.

SPIRITUAL FOUNDATIONS FOR MINISTRY:

Our vision for the ministry of God's people is determined and shaped by certain factors that are fundamental to faithful followers of Jesus Christ. **The first fundamental issue of ministry is that of doing the will of God.** The purposes of God for the salvation of humankind, the renewal of creation, and the uplifting of the oppressed are some major aspects of the will of God.

The second fundamental issue for ministry is that of the situational realities of any given age and place. Such realities include needs, circumstances and opportunities. As the ministry of Jesus was "situational" in its relevance to the specific matters he confronted, so the ministry of God's people needs to be pertinent to local concerns in the name of Christ and in the presence of Christ.

The third fundamental issue for ministry is the active presence of God's Holy Spirit which is at work in the world through events and movements of the times and also at work in human lives both directing and empowering God's servants. It is the Holy Spirit that precedes us in discerning the direction and shape of ministry in obedience to the will of God and in the light of the realities of our times.

We are being led to recognize that one of the primary ways of fulfilling our mission is by responding at each local level to the circumstances and opportunities at hand. It is indeed appropriate to affirm that it is primarily at the local level that the church encounters the world. **Local congregations therefore need to be vital and vibrant centers of mission empowered by God's Spirit to uphold and advance the purposes of God for salvation, justice, healing and wholeness.**

***We call upon all members of local congregations and pastors serving those congregations to a renewed commitment to excel in building up the church for witnessing and serving. Renewed and revitalized each local congregation can become a significant instrument in the hands of Almighty God.**

CONFERENCE PROGRAMS AND MINISTRIES:

Any strategy that focuses on bringing new life to congregations must emphasize the development of new congregations and promote the renewal of existing congregations. Such an undertaking will require the coordinate effort of all of our Conference program resources.

***We call upon the Conference Council on Ministries to examine its structure to determine whether it might be redesigned to increase our ability to strengthen local congregations needing to break free from a survival mentality that undermines their life and health.**

***We call upon the Conference Council on Ministries to examine carefully the assignments of its valuable staff to provide for the greatest impact on the local congregation, especially in the light of any redesign of the Council on Ministries itself. We also affirm the work of our various consultants from the Council on Ministries and urge that kind of direct ministry to local congregations they provide be increased.**

All this said, it is true that if you know where you are going, you can use almost any vehicle to get there. If we are to be effective in helping local congregations discover the particular mission to which God is calling them, then we must have a clear vision of what God is calling us to be as an annual conference, and we must have a disciplined commitment to the mission that vision reveals.

CONGREGATIONAL LEADERSHIP AND MINISTRIES:

To focus on local congregation vitalization means to orient pastoral and lay leadership to be visionary ministers who lead congregations to become more vital and more intentional in development and outreach that strengthens the local congregations as they reach out to the needs of all persons.

Such visionary leadership involves a critical approach that stands over and against the life of the congregation and speaks the truth in love. Is there a vision for ministry? Are lives being transformed, nurtured, and energized for witness and service? Are communities being changed? Is there evidence that the congregation is a vibrant center of mission empowered by the Holy Spirit to uphold and advance the purposes of God for salvation, justice, healing and wholeness?

***We call upon the lay and pastoral leadership of each congregation to catch a vision for the vitalization and growth of your congregation for ministry with a "congregationally owned" purpose - a working mission statement - that is then fulfilled through specific and prioritized goals that become effective programs and ministries through which God is working to impact individuals, communities and beyond to our global community.**

We are a connectional church and a part of the Body of Christ, and so that there is a tremendous need for leadership that is collegial and cooperative. Rather than pastors and laity and congregations trying to "do it alone"; we need to cultivate relationships and cooperative ministries with other congregations in our communities. Preoccupation with the survival of "our church" often causes congregations to turn inward, become isolated,

stagnate and die all the quicker. Racism and denominationalism all too often are sins that prevent us from being in the ministry with other congregations in our community. God can do so much more through us as we enter into cooperative and shared ministries with those neighboring congregations.

***We call upon pastors and laity alike to be intentional in reaching out beyond humanmade barriers and to connect with United Methodist and other congregations building relationships in Christ and developing cooperative ministries through which God can have an even greater impact on our communities and neighborhoods.**

We are a connectional church with a variety of conference programs and ministries that will strengthen and vitalize congregations. Sometimes some of our pastors and laity do not share conference communications and opportunities with the local congregation. **Blocking sometimes takes the place of enabling.** This is one of the reasons that some leaders and some congregations have no idea of how our Peninsula Conference can be and is a resource available for the upbuilding of the congregations.

***We call upon the leadership of our congregations to boldly function as United Methodists and to utilize the resources and programs of our annual conference and our general church to help vitalize the life and ministries of each congregation.**

Accountability to God and to one another is important for us whether as individuals or as congregations. This entails evaluation in light of the congregational vision for ministry and of what is most valuable in the vitalization of the congregation. It means de-emphasizing the programs that are less productive, and emphasizing the ministries that are effective. The time is at hand to cease honoring dysfunctional programs and leadership.

***We call upon all pastors and Pastor/Staff Parish Relations Committees to build a greater accountability in their ongoing relationship and in the annual evaluation process with a strong focus on the vitalization of the congregations' ministry and the pastoral leadership that enables that congregational ministry.**

FINANCIAL COMMITMENTS AND PRIORITIES FOR MINISTRY:

The Vision must also have a fiscal focus. In the years ahead we must find a way to witness through our mission to others and at the same time care for increasing costs such as health care, pensions, and programs to support the local church. **Too many of our churches are trying to remain on a survival status which leaves no room for mission and ministry.** Jesus was not making an empty statement when he told us that we find our true selves by losing ourselves. **The vision cannot penetrate our congregations that refuse to look beyond themselves. The church that cannot or will not reach out beyond itself is already dead.** There are no eyes to perceive the Vision.

We must recapture the Vision that sees God as the Giver of all that we have, including our means of livelihood. In the hands of God's people there will be the means to financially support the Vision. **In the hands of "church people" who put location, survival and personal satisfaction above faith in God to lead us, the Vision will not perish.** Each local congregation will decide what will claim their highest priority.

The Vision demands choices. Choices will be made from many worthwhile options. When we can affirm together as local congregations comprising an annual conference what the Vision will be, support from God's people will follow.

***We call upon every congregation to develop a stewardship program that**

will challenge greater levels of commitment and giving.

*We call upon every congregation to recapture a sense of benevolent giving by setting a budgetary goal of spending as much on others as upon their own congregation, so that each congregation's stewardship will be a part of a genuine vision for ministry.

*We call upon the leaders and members of our Peninsula Annual Conference to prayerfully and seriously enter into Saturday afternoon's budgetary process with honest and helpful participation that is rooted not in survival or maintenance but in a vision for ministry.

During the fall and winter, a survey was taken of the Fenwick Island area to determine the feasibility of St. Matthew's By The Sea's going to a full-time status. All through the summer of 1989, visitors were asked about an interest in a full-time church at Fenwick Island. St. Matthews By The Sea was organized in December of 1989, and services began on Easter Sunday, 1990, with 107 people present. Rev. D. O. Clendaniel, Sr. is the organizing pastor. This project has been under the supervision of the Conference Board of Global Ministries, who have been and are supportive of the project.

There is an interest in faith development in many of our churches. Bible study groups are more plentiful and better attended in many churches. More churches are using the "Making Disciples Through Bible Study" program. More of our laity and clergy are becoming part of the "Walk to Emmaus" and there are more youth in Chrysalis.

Over two hundred Dover District youth attended the Conference Youth Rally. Three of our youth went to the Soviet Union as the "Mission of Peace". There was a well-attended District Youth Rally in the fall. A District group worked on homes in the Wilmington area in the summer of 1989, and a District group will be going to Wise County, Virginia in July, as a part of the Appalachia Service Project.

More prayer groups and prayer chains have been formed. New Sunday Schools are beginning. New community outreach programs are being initiated. Even though we have more churches that are still in a "survival" mode, more and more of our churches are growing in faith development, in interest in missions - locally and abroad - and in new members.

It is a joy to serve the Kingdom in the District. Thanks be to God who gives us the victory.

The District Council on Ministries and our District Office Secretary, Mrs. Helen Berry, went to great lengths to keep the program alive that had been started at the beginning of the year with an emphasis on racial inclusiveness. While some accomplishments were made in this area, it has now been decided to continue through the Conference Year 1990-91 in hopes of fulfilling the dream that was begun under Dr. Whitlock.

The Rev. Charles E. Barton, Jr. functioned as relief superintendent while carrying on the responsibilities of the Dover District. In November, Bishop Yeakel appointed Dr. J. Gordon Stapleton to complete the Conference Year. The people of the Easton District have rallied in support of the Whitlock Family and have functioned well in a transitional time. Although our membership gains in total numbers declined due to membership audits, more persons have been received on profession of faith than in previous years. It is a tribute to the pastors and laypersons of the District who have responded with generous commitment of time and money to meet the needs of the District.

Youth

Youth from the Easton District Churches were part of the overflow crowd that attended the Conference Youth Rally at Salisbury State University in January. Our District Youth Team put together a District Rally on April 1 in Centreville. In the spring, Mrs. Melvina Fields accepted the position as District Youth Coordinator and is working with our District Youth Ministry Team on future plans.

Outstanding Achievements

Some 152 churches out of 154 paid their apportionments in full. This represents a high level of commitment on the part of the pastors to the mission of the church and to our covenant together.

SALISBURY DISTRICT

This past year has been a fast moving and eventful year on the Salisbury District. There have been a multitude of joys and sorrows, of struggles and triumphs packed into this year. The richness of the year has been in the sharing of life and ministry with so many in our Salisbury District. Sadness has fallen heavily first with the untimely and tragic deaths of two youth who were former parishioners and now with the recent death of two close friends and colleagues: Dick Varell and Bob Whitlock. There have been other

sorrows and deaths, but thanks be to God whose forgiving, healing and empowering presence enables us to overcome sickness and even death. Indeed, in the light of the resurrection we can count it all joy.

The context for ministry on our Salisbury District also has been a mixture of joys and sorrows, but again the love of God sustains in the midst of it all. Along the Atlantic Ocean, much of Worcester County has prospered and is rapidly growing in population. On the other side of our District and along the Chesapeake Bay, Somerset County, which has been struggling with a polluted Bay and a declining water industry, has been hit with 2 major plant closings in addition to a plant closing in near by Pocomoke City. On the northern portion of our District, Salisbury and Wicomico County have been going through a period of an exploding population and an urbanizing process that is producing many affluent suburban developments and unfortunately inner-city neighborhoods that are anything but affluent.

Statistically our District shows a total membership loss of 28 persons. However, well over that number were reduced in several charges as the result of membership audits that discovered errors from previous years that had led to membership numbers that were larger than the actual membership. 61 congregations showed an increase in membership. This membership growth occurred in congregations of all sizes and located in areas that had both population growth and decline.

We rejoice in the pastors and laity of all of the above congregations as you have led the way in receiving persons on Confession of Faith and/or as you have shown membership growth.

Also a word of appreciation for those congregations who have paid their conference benevolences in full. Our District Task Force on Benevolences has work with a number of congregations to work out adjustments that are manageable yet stretching for congregations with special hardships. There is no reason any congregation should not meet their benevolences in 1990 and beyond. We should make 100 % and greatly increase the total dollars for our District. If a congregation is having a problem the District office should be contacted immediately.

Beyond the numbers is a far more significant dimension of the quality of the life and ministries of our congregations. Sadly some of the congregations on our District are in a survival mode where most of their time and energies are spent in fund raisers to keep the church alive. Some of our congregations do not have mission statements and program goals and ministries that will take them beyond institutional survival to mission and ministry. Gratefully, there are ever so many congregations with an articulated vision for ministry and are transforming people's lives and changing communities.

Two very special missional efforts are progressing very well on our District. The Outreach Ministry of Grace Church, Salisbury that has resulted in the cross racial appointment of the Rev. Grant Johnson is having an impact on their East Side neighborhood and is touching the lives of neighborhood residents and those congregational members who are involved in this ministry. This ministry is supported by our Peninsula Conference. Our Salisbury Korean Mission with the leadership of new pastor Seong Ki Baik is developing very well. A special thanks to the members of St. Andrews Church, Salisbury for sharing their facilities with our Korean Mission. What a joy it has been to see relationships develop and grow between these two congregations. This mission is supported by congregations in our Salisbury Cluster, our Peninsula Conference, the Eastern Seaboard Korean District, the General Board of Global Ministries and the General Commission on Religion and Race.

A special thanks to all of those who are providing leadership for our effort to bring together all of our congregations into inclusive clusters for the purpose of helping to strengthen one another's congregations and of providing a stronger witness and mission in

their common community. Some of our clusters are doing very well, while others are not. The pastors in some of our clusters are meeting monthly for breakfast, mutual support and for planning. Some of the most productive cluster ministries have been special joint celebrations and worship services and cluster United Methodist Youth Fellowship Groups.

Another area for cooperative ministry has been housing. Walden Howard of Trinity UMC, Salisbury and John Johnson of Christ UMC, Salisbury have played the key roles in Habitat On Maryland's Lower Shore. Thanks to their inspirational and organizational leadership Habitat has built or rehabilitated 5 homes in Salisbury. Several congregations from the Salisbury District have sent work teams to work on the Habitat homes. Other congregations interested in becoming involved in this vital hands on ministry with people in need should call Warden Howard at 749-5109.

This year has been a very successful inaugural year for Interfaith Housing Development Corporation of the Maryland Eastern Shore. The goal of this ecumenical group for the Eastern Shore is to build 1,000 affordable homes for those in need of a decent place to live. The first developments are in process for Cambridge and Dorchester County, while other sites for housing developments are being pursued in other areas across the Eastern Shore. Mrs. Anne Taylor, Ebenezer UMC, Snow Hill; Dr. Lehman Tomlin, Waugh UMC, Cambridge; Rev. Buford Painter, St. Paul's UMC, Cambridge; along with the Easton and Salisbury District Superintendents have been a part of this cooperative ministry.

Many of the congregations on our Salisbury District are making preparations for the Ralph Bell Crusade (the Billy Graham Organization) in Salisbury on October 21-24 at the Salisbury Civic Center. We look forward to a very successful crusade.

How encouraging it is to see some of our congregations who were in an earlier day station churches now once again becoming station churches. The vision of the pastors and laity of 4 of our congregations have had the vision for ca greater ministry as station (1 church charges) churches. Each has been through a visioning and planning process as an integral part of their step in faith. All of which is part of a strategy for church growth and vitalization on our District. The new station churches are: Berlin: Stevenson, Fruitland: St. John's, Hebron: Nelson's, and Princess Anne: Antioch. Other charges resulting from this effort are Berlin: Friendship; Fruitland-Cokesbury (Cokesbury and Old Friendship and Union); and Hebron-St. Paul's (St. Paul's and Charity).

Congratulations to Mt. Vernon Charge for their building of a new parsonage; to Whaleysville-New Hope Charge for their new parsonage; to Friendship, Allen of the Fruitland - Mt. Calvary Charge Allen for their newly completed church hall; to Mt. Nebo of the Sharptown-Zion Charge for the new addition to their sanctuary; to Metropolitan, Princess Anne for their vision of acquiring property and expanding their facilities; to St. Stephen's, Oriole for their major repairs of their fire damaged sanctuary; and to so many other congregations that have undertaken major repairs and improvements of their facilities.

The District Board of Laity with the leadership of District Lay Leader, Gene Cray, and the support of Conference Lay Leader, Dolly Brittingham, has been very active this year. A very effective training session was held for church/charge lay leaders with the Rev. Dr. Gordon Stapleton as the resource person. A highly successful Lay Speakers School was held and directed by Joyce Whittington with classes being taught by Mr. James Fox, Rev. Grant Johnson, Rev. John Randolph, Rev. Gertrude Jones, Rev. Thomas Blakelock, and Rev. Patti Collett. Mrs. Lois Rogers has led a monthly, District-wide Hymn Sing that rotates to a different church each month. This has been a beautifully inclusive and inspiring celebration that has helped to build a greater sense of family on the Salisbury District.

The Rev. Grant Johnson and his executive committee for the Salisbury District Ministers' Association has provided a well organized and helpful monthly program. In

addition, the Second Annual Summer Retreat was held in Crisfield for pastors and families. Also, a fellowship dinner was held to honor and to thank those pastors and district families who would be moving to another district.

I am grateful for the clergy and laity of our Salisbury District whose vision and faithful leadership has enriched my life. I truly am indebted to my wife, Karen, and my sons, Scott and Tim, for their patience and support of me and for allowing me to share in their lives and accomplishments -- that is a privilege even greater than the privilege of serving God as a pastor in our United Methodist Church.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

The Conference year 1989-1990 has been an exciting year full of meaningful experiences for particular congregations and the district as a whole. Towards the end of the Conference year the district found itself preparing to serve as the host district for the 1990 sessions of the Peninsula Annual Conference. This has also been a year of both continuity and change in the work of the district.

The fruits of continuity have been evident in the diligent and faithful service rendered by clergy and congregations. An element of change has come through my appointment as the new District Superintendent as from July 1, 1989, succeeding the Reverend Dr. C. Edwin Lasbury who completed a six year term on the district. It seems helpful to report on the life and work of the district in several categories.

1. The Board of Laity has had another good year. This year, as in previous years, a full program of events was implemented. In addition, the Board added a new event called "A Pre-Conference Rally and Appreciation Program" at which appreciation was expressed to the following: Mr. Bernard Peck and Dr. Willis Cupery, outgoing sub-district Lay Leaders, who had served for several years; and Mrs. Barbara Harmon, who completed four years as the District Director of Lay Speaking, having done a first class job.

United Methodist Men's and Women's groups also held their usual events with much success during the year. In the case of the U. M. Men, both the new District Superintendent and the Bishop of our Washington Area were invited to be speakers at their Fall '89 and Spring '90 Breakfasts, respectively.

2. The Charge Conferences were held during this Conference year on an individual basis rather than in pairs or clusters. This arrangements made it possible for me to become better acquainted with the leadership of the various congregations and to understand better the programs and ministries that are currently in place in the local churches. A full agenda at each Charge Conference enabled superintendent and people to review unhurriedly the programs of the local congregations. Each Charge Conference was a helpful and good experience.

3. Conference Benevolences. Our congregations in the district continue to be faithful to their financial commitments to the Annual Conference and the district office. For the year 1989, we ended with a total benevolence payment of 98.5% as an overall district accomplishment. While there is always room for growth in our stewardship capabilities, I do wish to commend all the congregations that paid their benevolence amount in full and to encourage the few congregations that did not attain the 100% level of support to do better.

4. The Ministers and Mates Organization of the district met regularly for meetings that were held throughout the Conference year. There was an emphasis on programs dealing with social issues, but there was also time spent on programs designed for spiritual

renewal. The following were the meetings held:

September - Evangelism and Church Growth;
October - Pastors and Spirituality;
November - The Homeless Issue;
December - Christmas Worship Service and Dinner;
January - The Abortion Issue;
March - Joint Meeting with the West Chester District Clergy and Spouses;
April - Help for Battered Women: The Role of the Clergy
May - Infant Mortality Prevention.

It was a good experience to work in cooperation with the Reverend Dr. Janet Harmon, who served as Chairperson of the Ministers and Mates, and with a good team of officers as well in the planning and implementation of the foregoing programs.

5. Membership and Church Growth. Membership returns continue to be important indicators of the state of our congregations. For the calendar year of 1989, the following congregations deserve to be commended for receiving 20 or more persons on profession of faith or restored:

It is significant to note that the total of numbers of persons received on profession of faith or restored increased by 101 for 1989 over the previous year. However, there were also more persons removed in 1989 by Charge Conference action than in 1988. It is also of concern that 17 local congregations received no new members on profession of faith during 1989.

6. Youth and Children's Work. This area continues to receive appropriate emphasis in many of our congregations. New children's choirs and youth activities are being established around the district. The Conference Youth Rally was well attended by youth of the district. In recent months an effort was made to foster youth work by activating the District Council on Youth Ministries. One of our outstanding youth choirs from Simpson UMC called "The Russell Delegation" sang at District Board of Laity events.

7. Congregational Development. Our district rejoiced over the organizing of a new congregation, Cornerstone UMC. This new church resulted from the merging of the former Kirkwood congregation with the Glasgow Outpost Sunday School. Thanks to the assistance of MAP and the Conference Board of Global Ministries, along with the steady work of Pastor Paul Owens, Lay Leader Jim Sapp and many others, the purchase of six acres along Route 896 was completed and the Kirkwood Church property was sold towards the cost of the new site. Efforts continue expeditiously to prepare to construct a new church home for the Cornerstone congregation.

8. Deaths. The district was saddened over the loss of the following persons during the Conference year:

Whitlock, both of whom were nurtured at Richardson Park UMC and had numerous friends across the district and the entire Conference area. We express tributes to congregations which gave prayerful support when serious illness struck parsonage families and then later surrounded the bereaved relatives with many practical deeds of love and kindness. In this regard we mention particularly the people of the Bethel and Shelemiah congregations of the North East-Bayview Charge and the congregations of the St. Georges Charge.

9. Marriages. Two of our clergy had the experience of entering into new marriages during the Conference year:

10. The work of the Methodist Action Program continued to move forward during the Conference year. Among other programs, an important part of this work is the support given to the Hispanic Mission and other Hispanic ministries in the Wilmington area. During the year a planning retreat was held at which several issues were identified for future action. One emphasis is that of substance abuse prevention and a special task force has been established to consider the issue and propose ways in which MAP and local congregations can best become involved.

11. General Comments. The year under review has included programs in a variety of areas. Several local congregations emphasize mission by holding mission fairs and/or encouraging support for mission causes or missionary personnel. Programs of community outreach are being encouraged. Our United Methodist buildings are used by a great variety of community groups. Many congregations of the district are responding to the Pecometh Campaign effort, although much remains to be done in that regard.

We affirm the need for each local church to be a vital congregation doing the Lord's will and responding to human needs under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. May we all continue to affirm the words of Charles Wesley as part of our own intentions for ministry:

To serve the present age,
My calling to fulfill;
O may it all my powers engage
To do my Master's will.

**The Report of the Statistician
Peninsula Annual Conference
January 1, 1989 to December 1, 1989**

In 1986 and 1987 we celebrated two consecutive years of membership growth in the Peninsula Annual Conference. Unfortunately, we have since observed two years of decline in total full membership. Membership in the 486 churches at the end of 1989 was 98,145, a loss of 383 or .4%. Dover District membership increased by eight.

The loss is largely the result of membership audits conducted in many of the local churches. Three churches reduced their respective memberships by more than 100. In some cases these were large discrepancies between the actual number of members counted and the number reported in previous years. Thus, much of our loss is purely mathematical, and not solely the result of removing people from the rolls. This trend indicates a critical need to establish and maintain accurate membership rolls in each local church. And when a change in appointment occurs, we must insure that adequate records are provided to the succeeding pastor.

There were 175 churches which received no new members on confession of faith in 1989, three fewer than the previous year. Among these churches, 144 received no new members at all, an increase of eleven from 1988.

Now for some good news! Despite the loss in church membership, a greater number of members were received on confession of faith than in the previous year. Increases were also recorded in worship attendance, enrollment in confirmation classes, church school membership, and church school members joining the church on confession of faith.

Membership in United Methodist Youth Fellowships, reported for the first time in this new quadrennium, is 3,079, an average of six in each local church.

The General Church has also requested the reporting of our full membership by ethnic category — this can be found on line 9 of the report showing conference totals.

I am especially grateful to Linda Etter for her assistance in verifying and tabulating the reports. The Cabinet is continuing to address the issue of reporting in a timely fashion. This data is due on January 31; the last reports were received over the telephone the first week of April. Our appreciation to pastors, church secretaries, and others who assisted in any way. Our Conference Treasurer, Ted Briggs, and his capable staff were supportive. Richard Loch was patient in his role as consultant for computer software.

Our prayer is that as we enter a new decade, "vital congregations" empowered by the Holy Spirit will produce "faithful disciples" who "celebrate and witness" to the Good News of Christ. Certainly this will result not only in numerical growth, but more importantly in spiritual vitality!

PECOMETH CONTINUATION CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE

The Pecometh Continuation Campaign Committee has been mandated to keep in close touch with the progress of the Campaign until it is completed. This includes monitoring the system of pledge collections and informing local churches and pastors of the progress, overseeing a lively flow of information on how the monies are being used in the development of Pecometh, pursuing major gifts efforts, and contacting local churches that have yet to act on an accepted goal for the camp. The structure to accomplish this mandate has been set in place and these tasks are being carried out.

This status report on the Pecometh Campaign is really a report of the work of enthusiastic local churches, pastors and laity who during this first year of the payment period have made great strides towards our goal. As this report is written at the end of eight months of giving, we have received \$557,038 from all sources towards the amount of \$3,092,561 which has been committed to date by churches, clergy, and individuals. Since this is 8/36's of the 3-year payment period, we should have received \$687,235, and we feel that the effort is nearly on target. 356 churches, 71% of the total, have accepted a goal or have at least begun to contribute. We believe that almost all of the other 134 churches will participate before the campaign is over.

Local churches have been very creative in raising money in addition to securing pledges from individual members and receiving special offering on a regular basis. We have heard about such things as "Trick or Treat for Pecometh", special musicals, dinners, bake sales, car washes, a rock-a-thon, and a dinner theatre held with the theme of racial inclusiveness during Black History month. There is no limit to what God's people can accomplish as they allow creative imagination to go to work, empowered by the Holy Spirit.

The Continuation Campaign Committee has met regularly to monitor the progress of giving and to plan how to keep the program before our people. We have reported on the giving statistics and the development activities through the Coordinated mailing to pastors, articles in The Communicator, reports to the District Meetings of Lay and Clergy Members of Conference, reports to the District Clergy Association, and through a special full page insert in the January 29, 1990 issue of The Communicator. We also keep in close touch with the Pecometh Board and assist with publicizing its development work.

Each District has a Continuation Campaign Committee working to encourage churches that have not accepted a goal and to assist other churches wherever needed. District Committees are also working to develop major gifts.

Although we are a long way from the original goal \$5,000,000, we believe that we can come much closer to it and request your prayers and cooperation to that end. The challenge of reaching children and youth for Christ through the ministry of camping is so great that we must not fail to respond with our very best.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

The Report of the Chair

What problems does your local church face when it takes a close look at its "program"? For sure, one of them is that there are more good things to do that you can handle; you don't have enough money and willing people to get everything done. It gets tough when you say "Yes" to some proposals but must say "No" to others.

Your Conference Council wrestles with the same priority-setting problem. One major obstacle is that we don't yet have a shared vision as to what the Peninsula Conference should be about. Yes - we can say "we must be about the Lord's work" but what does that really mean? Where do we want to go and what do we want to accomplish? We need valid answers to such questions before we can make good decisions as to how to allocate scarce resources — money and people.

In a way, the 1989 Annual Conference addressed this matter. Most of you were present and voting when the Conference dealt with the report of the Task Force to Study Strengthening the Local Church. After discussion, the Conference directed the Council "to move ahead with the process to develop a strategic plan..." and to report to the Conference annually. Current status will be a principal topic for comment at the 1990 session.

"Strategic planning must proceed but getting a full-blown process into place will take time. Meanwhile, program bodies have struggled with their budget proposals for 1991. They have been increasingly conscious of strong pressures for increases in other parts of the Conference budget which call for fiscal restraint elsewhere. Here are some responses to recognition that a "business as usual" approach is no longer acceptable:

- o boards and agencies have examined their programs with a goal of asking for no more for 1991 than was approved for 1990
- o Wesley College reduced its request for support to \$90,000, down from the \$115,000 approved for 1990
- o as this is written, the budget/program review committee is recommending for the Council's consideration an overall budget which totals less than the 1990 amount.

It can be argued that every Conference member — lay and clergy — is a part of the program team. However, those who are on the Council staff have particularly key roles, and that roster changed during 1989. Gordon Stapleton announced intent to retire in 1990. After serving with distinction as the Council Director, he moved late in the year to an interim appointment as the district superintendent of the Easton District. He was succeeded by Harvey Manchester, already well-known to many of you. Vaughn Johnson returned to pastoral ministry after providing significant stimulus and leadership in the area of special ministries and ethnic concerns. Lawrence Livingston joined the staff as Associate Council Director for Special Ministries.

The Council has tracked carefully the progress in the Pecometh capital funds drive. Although encouraged by the early results, it recognized need for sustained follow up and approved mounting a continuation campaign under the leadership of R. Jervis Cooke and William Hemphill, Jr.

The 1989 Annual Conference instructed district superintendents to convene the lay and clergy members of the Conference twice a year for the purpose of sharing information on Conference work for a trial period of one year. Such meetings provide opportunity for direct communication between those in attendance and the persons reporting about Conference activities and challenges. A good case can be made that they should be continued.

We know that the Conference confronts problems which may seem insurmountable sometimes. On the other hand, there is much to celebrate out there. The reports which follow present evidence of how the United Methodist Church has vitality in many settings on the Peninsula. Do read them, with particular attention to whether the programs sponsored or endorsed by the Conference Council make sense to you. We invite your comments, suggestions, and yes, criticisms which can help the Council be more effective in support of the local church as it seeks to witness and to serve its community.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL DIRECTOR

Nineteen-eighty-nine turned out to be a year of transition in the office of the Council Director. As you know, almost the entire work of the Council Director in 1989 was a result of the faithful and skillful leadership of J. Gordon Stapleton. Under his guidance for nearly six years, the work of the Council Office has grown and evolved. There is widespread appreciation throughout the Peninsula Conference for the steadfastness of his commitment. I am honored to have served in ministry with him as a colleague.

Since my tenure as your Council Director did not begin until the last six weeks of the year, allow me to use this report as an occasion to look to the future, rather than the immediate past. I think it is fair to say that the few words of vision which follow represent a vision shared by other members of the Council Staff, the Program Management Team, many leaders and members of Peninsula Conference boards and agencies, and many persons in local congregations.

- o We have nearly five hundred congregations in our conference, a tremendous opportunity for presence and witness on the Peninsula. However, to the extent that some of those congregations are dying or simply struggling to survive, the power of our witness is greatly diminished. The vision: That Peninsula Conference local congregations can move beyond "survival" or "maintenance" and into "vital ministry" that becomes a channel for God's transforming power. My intent is that strengthening local congregations will have a high priority in the work of staff and the programming of conference boards and councils.

- o As a denomination on the Peninsula, we United Methodists are unique in our distribution of white and black congregations. In the vast number of communities within the bounds of the Peninsula Conference where there are two or more United Methodist congregations, usually at least one of these is ethnic

and at least one majority. The vision: That we bring into the experience of these communities living examples of what it means to be an inclusive people. My intent is that the work of staff and the programming of conference boards and councils will encourage congregations of different ethnic composition to work together around common concerns and to discover and share the richness of their varied heritage. (Again, this can only happen if the congregations are thriving, not merely surviving.)

- o There is a generation vastly under-represented in our church. The so called baby boom generation of Americans is 77,000,000 people strong. Yet two-thirds of them are not reached by our church or any other church. The vision: We will find ways to help members of the missing generation make a life-changing commitment to Jesus Christ, to say "Yes" to God's call to be disciples. My intent is that the work of staff and the programming of conference boards and councils will help local congregations to identify who the members of the missing generation are and what their unique needs are, and to make an active commitment to effectively reach out to them.

The Peninsula Conference is indeed fortunate to have a Council Staff that includes Pam Lardear, Lawrence Livingston, Connie Metzger, and Jack Simperts. Their hard work and ministry is supported and enlarged by Alice Murgatroyd, Toni Moor, Gloria Reed, and Shirley Still. Yet for all their dedication and effectiveness, this team by itself cannot hope to accomplish the ministry envisioned here. Therefore, it will be crucial that we place a heavy emphasis on developing a broad network of leaders who can extend the ministry of the Council on Ministries undergirded by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Along with you, I am "eager for manifestations of the Spirit" in our Peninsula Conference, and for that reason I am committed to the challenge that we "strive to excel in building up the church." (I Corinthians 14:12)

CAMP PECOMETH

As we enter a new quadrennium with unlimited opportunities for ministry, Camp Pecometh faces a future with excitement and anticipation of what is yet to come! Christian Education Outdoors has become a viable experience in the lives of many children, youth and adults throughout the Peninsula Conference. Some of the highlights have included:

1. '89 Summer Theme: was based upon John 6:35 which reads "And Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life; anyone who comes to me shall not hunger and anyone who believes in me shall never thirst." This theme permeated our camping program.
2. Camper Registrations: continue to increase yearly. This year attendance totalled 1,340 campers as compared to 1,288 a year ago. Of the 1,340 campers, 1,082 children came from local churches of the Peninsula Conference.

3. Staff Training: was especially significant this year as 22 staff persons participated in a CPR/First Aid course led by Thomas McDougall and son Tom of Wesley UMC, Georgetown, DE. All were certified, which in turn assisted in the ACA re-accreditation process.
4. Racial Ratio: among campers was as follows:

5. World Hunger Offerings: totalled \$1,019.00 as compared to \$1,107.00 last year. Since 1975 the total contributions for this worthwhile cause have been \$11,078.00. Pecometh campers care about the tragedy of world hunger.
6. New Tents: were added to the Riverside Area to help relieve the pressure of the expanding enrollment. These two large tents (16' x 20')accommodated 9 persons each and were installed at a cost of approximately \$1,900.00 each.
7. EMLC Half-Camperships: were granted to 37 children for a total of \$2,707.50. These funds were drawn from the General Campership Account of Camp Pecometh.
8. General Camperships: were granted to 17 children for a total of \$1,605.00. These represented partial or total camperships as needed by individual campers.
9. Cabin Adoption Plan: welcomed the Bethel-Groome Charge of Lewes, DE to this important program in the life of the camp. All buildings have been adopted by local churches in the Riverside Area with the exception of Jakes's Place (Staff House).
10. Memorial Program: continues to be well supported as individuals and groups designate trees to be planted throughout the camp. "Living memorials" have become a part of this program as trees are being planted to honor pastors, lay persons and children attending camp. Pecometh needs more trees!
11. Camp Staff: has increased from 41 to 61 persons in the last three years. International counselors from England, Australia, The Netherlands, Hong Kong, New Zealand and Denmark added to the breadth of our program and staff.
12. Accreditation: demanded much time and energy last summer. Camp Pecometh was re-accredited by the American Camping Association for a three-year period, guaranteeing the highest standards in program, personnel, administration, safety, risk management and land use development.
13. Voices of Pecometh: is a singing group comprised of former camp staff persons which enjoys performing in local churches. It has sung in over 45 churches during the past two years. Contact the camp office for information.
14. Spiritual Life Coordinator: was added to the summer staff leadership team for innovative and creative ways to present Bible Studies. The entire Riverside Camp gathered daily for enrichment and spiritual guidance in addition to vesper

services in the outdoor chapel.

15. Pool Renovations: as mandated by the Board of Health were completed at a cost of \$18,456.00 including installation of a water conditioning system. The pool is now 25 years old.
16. Christian Education Sunday: special offering realized \$9,329. as compared to \$10,220. last year. This is the first time since 1977 that the goal was not reached.
17. Camp Usage: increased from 6,827 one year ago to a new high of 7,103 campers while the number of camper days showed a decrease from 19,223 to 16,493 this year. In addition to the summer program, Pecometh continues to serve the needs of such groups as football camps, public and private schools, outdoor education programs for persons with handicapping conditions, and community agencies.
18. Camp Director/Manager: attended the United Methodist National Camp Leaders' Training Event, Port Townsend, WA.; the National Conference of the American Camping Association, Seattle, WA.; and the Northeast Jurisdiction United Methodist Camp Leaders' Meeting, West River, MD.

1991 Goals

I. TO CONSTRUCT THREE BUNKHOUSES AND SUPPORT FACILITIES TO ACCOMMODATE YOUTH AND ADULTS IN THE YEAR-ROUND SPECIALTY CAMPS AREA.

Process: Begin planning immediately with a view to constructing in the fall of 1990 and opening in the spring of 1991.

II. TO INCREASE BY 10% THE NUMBER OF PERSONS USING PECOMETH YEAR-ROUND IN 1991.

Process: Through additional and varied programing for all ages and an increased publicity schedule, printing of The Pavilion twice yearly.

III. TO OFFER ANOTHER CAMPING OPPORTUNITY IN THE OUTDOOR ATMOSPHERE.

Process: Invite large and small groups to reserve the bunkhouses for program and planning retreats on a year-round basis.

- IV. TO INCREASE SIGNIFICANTLY THE SALARY OF COUNSELORS IN 1991.**
- Process: Raise the Conference asking in the budget to increase salaries which have fallen behind other camps and made the recruitment process more difficult.
- V. TO BALANCE THE BUDGET IN 1991.**
- Process: Increasing the Conference appropriation, the total capacity of the camp and registration fees to keep pace with inflation will help balance the budget.
- VI. TO PRODUCE MORE INCOME ON A YEAR ROUND BASIS.**
- Process: Advertise the availability of the bunkhouses for year-round usage by large and small local church groups.
- VII. TO INCREASE THE OPERATIONS BUDGET BY \$1,500 TO COVER THE COST OF NEW FACILITIES.**
- Process: To encourage usage and request Conference support.
- VIII. TO SET ASIDE 1% OF CONSTRUCTION COST OF ALL NEW FACILITIES ANNUALLY TO FUND FUTURE MAINTENANCE.**
- Process: To encourage and request Conference support.
- IX. UPDATE AND FURTHER IMPLEMENT THE RECORD SYSTEM FOR EACH BUILDING'S NEEDS.**
- Process: Look at existing system and evaluate possible improvements during 1991. This process, to be accomplished by the Facilities Team, should cost little or nothing.
- X. TO ENLIST A CAMP AMBASSADOR IN EVERY ETHNIC LOCAL CHURCH OF THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE.**
- Process: Every ethnic local church will be contacted in the next two years. The Ambassadors will promote the camping ministry and inform the congregations of the campership funds available to ethnic minority children.
- XI. TO CONTINUE TO RECRUIT ETHNIC PERSONS TO SERVE ON THE SUMMER CAMP STAFF SO AS TO SECURE A MINIMUM GOAL OF 25% MINORITY REPRESENTATION.**
- Process: Maintain contact with those who have been served, distribute materials and hold interviews at black colleges for prospective black staff persons. Contact will be made with all ethnic pastors of the Conference seeking names of prospective summer camp staff.

XII. TO CONTINUE TO IMPLEMENT THE CONSULTANT'S REPORT

Process: The Camp Pecometh Board of Directors will assume responsibility for implementation of the consultant's report in cooperation with the Conference Council on Ministries and the Council on Finance and Administration.

XIII. TO COOPERATE WITH AND ENCOURAGE THE PECOMETH CAMPAIGN CONTINUATION COMMITTEE.

Process: Information will be provided on a regular basis concerning campaign receipts and expenditures, land use and camp development and program development and usage, both summer and year-round.

XIV. TO BE INTENTIONAL IN RECRUITING CAMPERS FROM ETHNIC LOCAL CHURCHES AND MALE CAMPERS FROM ALL CHURCHES OF THE PENINSULA CONFERENCE.

Process: The program team will implement this goal through program and promotional materials, use of the conference Communicator, Coordinated Mailings and other means such as speaking engagements and color slide presentations, etc.

XV. EVALUATE ALL THESE GOALS AND STRATEGIES IN RELATIONSHIP TO THE ELC

Process: This evaluation shall be done by the Camp Pecometh Board of Directors in conjunction with an Ethnic Task Force, Special Ministries of Peninsula Annual Conference and the Camp Director/Manager. Particular attention will be given to Black, Asian Korean, Hispanic, and Native Americans.

THE COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

This year promises to be a year of change. Because of Conference budget cuts, we have been forced to take a less active role in helping to establish communication projects in local churches. The "matching grant" program had to be curtailed one year ahead of schedule for lack of available funding. Our hope is that the local churches don't interpret this move as a message that the communications ministry is not important, but rather interpret this reality as a challenge to get the Word out on their own.

We are also in the process of re-evaluating the actual function of the Communications Committee. We are working toward a more active role for the committee members to assume in terms of actual work done by the members in the districts and local churches. This contrasts with a more advisory role that committee members have had in the past.

The Communicator remains as our most reliable and accessible medium for communications. Our efforts to bolster circulation continue.

Catch the Spirit will continue to be broadcast "over the air" on Channel 16 (WBOC) and also appears on most cable companies on the Shore. The Communications Committee feels that the public presence of a distinctively United Methodist television program is an essential part of each local church's presence in the Community.

DRAYTON RETREAT CENTER

1. Groups in Residence

During the calendar year 1989 there were 173 groups which used the Drayton Retreat Center, an increase of 14 groups from 1988. There were a total of 3613 guests. Of those groups and guests, 75 groups and 1518 guests were from the Peninsula Annual Conference. An additional 15 groups and 316 guests were from the Balti-

more Annual Conference. Already on the calendar for 1990, there are 148 groups scheduled, a 50% increase in the number of reservations made at this same time last year.

The guests that were here came for a variety of reasons. There were planning retreats, spiritual growth retreats, leadership development retreats, and fellowship events. Drayton continues to be widely used by Conference groups, as well, for meetings, retreats, and extended planning sessions.

On the average, Drayton is able to accommodate about one-half of the groups who call for reservations. The facility is booked strictly on a first come, first served basis.

2. Finances

The year 1989 was the first year that Drayton operated with no subsidy to its operating budget from the Annual Conference. The year finished with a balance of over \$4,000, and an increase of almost \$400 from the end of 1988.

We have instituted a system of cost accounting which will continue to enable us to monitor expenses and spending. For the first time, in 1990, there are monies in the operating budget for equipment replacement and for painting the exterior of the house. We anticipate keeping such monies in the operating budget to be able to care for similar major needs on a regular basis.

3. Continuing Education Program

One of the major offerings of Drayton continues to be the program of seminars and events designed to strengthen the ministry of pastors and local churches through Continuing Education. This past year, the committee began to research different formats and designs for events, as well as different topics.

For 1990 - 1991, the events are being planned to have direct impact upon the life of a local congregation. The seminars will be primarily practical, program oriented events, the benefits of which can be immediately appropriated by local congregations.

Although this program continues to be a financial liability to Drayton, it is a program of service to the Annual Conference. While ways are always sought to minimize the liability to the budget, Drayton will continue to support this educational venture.

4. Property

The Resident Director and Board of Drayton continue to make improvements to the physical facility, to make sure that it is safe, comfortable, and as efficient as possible.

This past year has seen several purchases in new food equipment, and a number of small repairs and adjustments to the equipment. The Council on Finance and Administration granted up to \$28,000 to provide substantial renovation to the pool,

which includes complete resurfacing, a cover for off-season, and a third filter to meet Health Department standards.

5. Building Program

The Board of Directors for Drayton continue to investigate and pursue the addition and renovation project which was begun a number of years ago. The intention of the plan is to make Drayton more useable as a public facility, allow for greater service and more flexibility in that service, and provide additional accommodations for groups we are presently not able to serve. The plans being developed and refined are plans which must be within the financial resources of Drayton without placing any additional demands on the finances of the Annual Conference.

6. Staff

The staff at Drayton continues to serve well and faithfully. Many of the staff persons have served Drayton for a great number of years. Drayton still deploys staff on an "on-call" basis only, with the exception of the Administrative Assistant. The Administrative Assistant was newly hired in 1989, and has added much to the ministry and operation of Drayton. Additionally, a third cook has been added to the staff, and a number of part-time dining room servers. We are proud that we have been able to offer employment to handicapped individuals, who might not otherwise be able to attain employment.

7. Director

The resident Director of Drayton continues to be an Associate Council Director of the Annual Conference. Salary and benefits are paid by the Council on Ministries budget.

This year, Pam Lardear joined the International Association of Conference Center Administrators, and is among the first to apply for the newly developed Certified Conference Center Administrator program. She attended a continuing education program entitled, "Managing the Retreat/Conference Center," which included seminar in all aspects of retreat center life.

This has been a solid year for Drayton, both financially and programmatically. Many persons have been blessed, and the lives of many congregations have been strengthened by participation in Drayton programs and activities. The Board of Directors is working to insure the continued viability of Drayton for a long time into the future. Drayton has been confirmed as an important part of the ministry of our Annual Conference. We are committed to maintaining that ministry.

ETHNIC LOCAL CHURCH COMMITTEE

The Ethnic Local Church Committee has attempted to do God's will as we planned, implemented and carried out the mandate of empowering ethnic congregations for witness and mission. In doing this we have kept two things in mind, 1) Ethnic congregations sometimes have more needs than resources, and 2) limited resources often produce morale problems, brought on by preoccupations with maintaining old buildings, which limits program resources and time. The ELCC attempts to break this cycle through undergirding congregations' programs of mission and ministry.

During the year, the ELCC welcomed Lawrence Livingston as staff person in July, 1989. The Special Ministries consultants continued to assist local churches in developing needs assessments for mission and ministry. This has been helpful in determining resources needs and capabilities for new-church building programs. The consultants in their work with local congregations have set four areas of priority for the consultation process -- evangelism, Christian education, communication and stewardship.

During the last year the ELCC funded the following projects:

—The Mt. Joy Church and Community worker program	\$2,000
—Wesley Temple, Church Planning Retreat	1,108
—The Hispanic Mission, youth ministry program	850
—The Korean Mission (Salisbury)	2,000
—Whatcoat UMC (Dover)	2,000
—Scholarships and Grants	1,500

Also, the ELCC has been effectual in acquiring funding from the General Board of Global Ministries, National Division. These are listed below.

—The Hispanic Mission (Wilmington)	\$10,000
—Community Church, Korean Mission (Salisbury)	8,000
—Grace UMC, Community Outreach Ministries	7,000

Finally, we are continually re-examining our role in the life of the annual conference. Presently we are doing this by updating the Comprehensive Plan, which we will present at the 1990 session of the annual conference. The Comprehensive Plan will be revised for the 1991 Peninsula Annual Conference Session.

1991 Goals

1. To continue to monitor cooperation, compliance and performance of the Comprehensive Plan.
2. To continue to resource and assist ethnic congregations develop mission strategies through the special ministries consultant program.
3. To revise the comprehensive Plan.

4. To continue to support some congregational programs of mission and ministry through funding.

SPECIAL MINISTRIES

The special ministries office of the Council on Ministries is designed to (ensure) that the mission and ministry needs of ethnic congregations are addressed with staffing and programming. In essence the special ministries director and consultants serve as the "multiple" staff of small membership churches and particularly ethnic churches, much like associate pastors in other churches. We are in partnership, so to speak, with congregations and only upon invitation by the clergy. Naturally, with a new associate council director (ACD), the special ministries office is currently in a phase of redevelopment in order to be more effective at the local congregational level. The program enjoys a sound foundation in the work done by the previous ACD, Vaughn Johnson, and redevelopment necessarily begins with prototypes for special ministries initiated by the program under his leadership.

The consultant program is a vital part of the work done by the special ministries team: George Commodore, W. Hayward Greene, Janet Harmon, and Grant Johnson. The services of the education consultants, Doris Phillips and Liz St. Clair also are used extensively.

Special Ministries works closely with the Ethnic Local Church committee as it seeks to develop and strengthen ethnic congregations. We continue to work with the development of two mission churches in the conference, the Korean Mission in Salisbury, Md. and the Hispanic Mission in Wilmington. Further, the special ministries offices is actively involved with several established African-American congregations.

1991 Goals

The objectives of the special ministries program are:

1. To assist congregations in the development of programs of mission and ministry, stressing:
 - a. mission statements
 - b. key result areas
 - c. situational analysis
 - d. overall objectives and goals
 - e. consolidation of all goals and plans
2. To work with the Peninsula Conference Black Methodists for Church Renewal as it implements its programs.
3. To work with the Ethnic Local Church Committee as it executes the Comprehensive Plan.
4. To assist ethnic congregations affirm their religious heritage through Christian

education, evangelism, stewardship, communications, and worship.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

During the past year, the following actions were taken by the Council:

1. Task Force to Study Strengthening the Local Church – granted \$5,000 for 1989 and \$5,000 for 1990.
2. New Church Development – Granted Conference Board of Global Ministries \$4,025 for New Church Development.
3. Conference-Wide Property and Liability Insurance Program – Conducted a survey of the churches to establish their interest in such a program. Results of the survey are not available at this time.
4. Easton District Office – Granted \$1,500 for a photocopier and a typewriter.
5. Equitable Salary Commission – Granted \$30,000 to help the Commission meet its 1989 commitments.
6. Drayton – Granted \$28,000 for pool repairs.
7. 1991 Conference Budget –

The Council on Finance and Administration voted to not recommend a 1991 Conference Budget at the June 1-4 Session of Annual Conference. Also, the Council will not be recommending the 1991 apportionment factor. The Council voted to implement a process to provide the Conference members with the maximum possible education on the Conference Budget. A Conference team will be trained to provide this budget educational process.

The budget educational process will be as follows:

1. The Budget Education Team will be at the March and April Clergy/Lay Member District Workshops to discuss the 1991 Conference Budget and have dialogue with the members.
2. The Budget Education Team will be at the Pre-Conference briefings to provide additional education on the Conference Budget and have more dialogue with the members.
3. The Budget Education Team will provide a major budget educational workshop on Saturday afternoon, June 2, 1990. The Local Church Finance Chairpersons and Local Church Administrative Board/Council Chairpersons will be invited to participate.
4. Following the June Session of Annual Conference, the Council on Finance and Administration will meet to finalize the 1991 Conference Budget.

The 1991 Conference Budget, along with the apportionment factor, will be recommended to the September 15, 1990 Adjourned Session of Annual Conference for adoption.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

The year 1989 was one of intensive activity toward the achievement in key result areas and goals established in the five year planning retreat conducted in 1988, "Shalom 93". Ten Board meetings were held during the year.

A more in-depth study of the issue, environmental justice was pursued through a retreat for ministers and other church leaders in October, "Making Peace With God's Creation: Environmental Justice in the Local Church". A report of the retreat findings and recommendations were disseminated to all participants.

The following programs and projects were funded as indicated for each item. The funded projects relate to the key result areas and goals:

I. Pacem in Terris

The Board continued its support for Pacem in Terris, giving this ecumenical program \$6,000. Its Director, Dr. Sally Milbury-Steen, is a member of the Board and chairs its peace and justice effort. Pacem in Terris provides leadership and resources, projects and programs through which United Methodists can participate. Peacework, the bi-monthly publication is sent to each local pastor and/or Church and Society chairperson.

II. EMLC Youth Training

The Board contributed \$1,800 to EMLC Youth Training during the summer.

III. Housing and Homelessness

The Board contributed \$1,000 to Salisbury Christian Center; \$1,000 to Sojourner's Place in Wilmington, and \$900 to the Housing coalition efforts.

IV. AIDS Program

AIDS programs had the continuing support of the Board. The Delmarva Ecumenical Agency received \$950 for the production and distribution of AIDS packets for ministers. Health Ministries, Inc. (100 Clemwood Street, Salisbury) received \$300 for their program of AIDS education, counselling and ministry.

V. Smyrna Bus Ministry

The Board supported the ecumenical Prison Bus Ministry in the amount of \$500.

VI. Emerging Issues

Emerging issues supported included: \$400 for Armenian earthquake victims; \$100 for the Delaware Guidance Associate, Kent County Unit; \$500 for the Methodist Action Program for the Hispanic Center and \$500 for Gethsemane United Methodist Church, assistance for youth travel to Russia for Peninsula Conference Peace Mission.

VII. Environmental Justice

Support for materials for participants in the retreat, "Making Peace with God's Creation: The Role of the Local Church", was \$100.

VIII. Training Events

The cost of participation of Chairperson in the National Convocation conducted by the General Board of Church and Society was \$860.45.

Primary Goal: To create an awareness of our bodies as temples of God's Holy Spirit and to provide additional resources for those affected by substance abuse.

Key Result Area #6: Environmental Justice

Primary Goal: To create an awareness of our role as stewards of God's Creation and to begin to take responsibility for its care.

Key Result Area #7: Administration

Primary Goal: To perform the responsibilities of the Board of Church and Society in a way that is cooperative, shared and effective.

Key Result Area #8: Education/Resourcing

Primary Goal: To inform the Conference, Districts and local churches of the societal issues confronting the church and to assist them in formulating Christian responses to these issues.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

One of the primary goals of this board in 1989 was to inform the people of the Peninsula Annual Conference, both clergy and laity, about diaconal ministry. We have been encouraged by the response of the conference as we engaged in a variety of activities. With the Board of Ordained Ministry we made available to each Staff-Parish Relations Committee a packet of materials relating to both ordained and diaconal ministry. Also with the Board of Ordained Ministry we participated in a day of ministry exploration. Board members, persons already in process and those who expressed interest attended an information and retreat session at Drayton Manor. Members of the board have worked to define diaconal forms of ministry through our relationships with conference staff, the cabinet and other boards and agencies with whom we relate.

The efforts of the Board of Diaconal Ministry in the past year have been rewarded as two persons have made decisions to return to graduate school to work toward consecration and a third person has begun certification studies in the area of education. Several other persons are seriously considering diaconal ministry.

This board has been an active one. Their dedication to this work and their willingness to be on the cutting edge is vitally important and much appreciated. Also appreciated is the leadership of the Board of Ordained Ministry who has included the Board of Diaconal Ministry in joint projects and who mentored us through a difficult but necessary orientation period.

The Board of Diaconal Ministry has consistently lifted up its friends and others in prayer and has modeled love and concern for board members and those who need our support.

Together with all who have experience a call to ministry, ordained, diaconal, general, we celebrate our oneness in Christ and the variety of gifts we have been given for ministry. This we will continue to do...not because we are a board but because individually and collectively we take seriously God's work through us in the world. Truly we are ALL ministers.

1991 Goals

This board will continue to address our quadrennial focus on educating and informing the Peninsula Conference about diaconal forms of ministry by:

- o presenting at least one opportunity for interested persons to ask questions about consecration/certification. A day long event will be scheduled which will feature a leader of experience and expertise.
- o attending a training event for Conference Boards of Diaconal Ministry so that our board members will be informed.
- o presenting displays, articles, informative pieces where appropriate in conference gatherings and periodicals.
- o supporting those who have decided to pursue consecration/certification by assisting in arrangement of needed financial resources.
- o scheduling a mentoring training event so that trained persons will be available to guide those persons seeking consecration through their journeys. The selection and equipping of caring and committed mentors is vital to the successful completion of the diaconal journey.

BOARD OF DISCIPLESHIP

Simply stated the mission of the Board of Discipleship is to be a connectional partner with local congregations in their ministries of:

- o Reaching out and receiving people where they are, as they are;
- o Helping others to enter into relationship to God;
- o Nurturing, supporting, and equipping persons for Christian discipleship;
- o Sending disciples into their communities to serve and give witness to the transforming power of God.

During the current quadrennium our three quadrennial goals are:

- o To be-- and to be perceived by the annual conference and members of local congregations as-- a Board of Discipleship that does support and help local congregations in their ministries.
- o To develop and pioneer, utilizing resources of the General Board of Discipleship, a model of distinctively United Methodist disciple making for use by the churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference.
- o To assist each local church in developing at least one connectional/intra-racial ministry with another (or other) United Methodist congregation(s).

In 1989, the Board further generated its action plan for these goals through the initial development of the PARTNERS PROJECT. The PARTNERS PROJECT is:

...the Board of Discipleship entering into direct partnership with specific local congregations over an extended period of time for the purpose of building up those congregations' discipleship ministries of stewardship, education, evangelism and worship.

...a clear path for local church revitalization.

...a coordinated plan that works in cooperation with each District Superintendent to identify churches in the doldrums, on the list of churches receiving equitable salary support, for example, and to revitalize them through a process designed in consultation with each of those congregations.

...a viable means of moving all participating churches in the direction of self support.

Special thanks is extended to the leaders, members, and staff of the Board of Discipleship for their enthusiasm and commitment to making our Board an effective resource for the Peninsula Conference and its local congregations.

DIVISION OF EDUCATION

How do we come to faith and grow in it? In The United Methodist Church, we recognize the importance of Christian Education in bringing persons into a vital relationship with Christ and helping them to grow in their faith. The Division of Education's primary goal is to assist the local churches in our conference in making their Christian Education programs an effective and vital part of their ministry. Through Sunday School persons, young and old, come into a growing relationship with God and better understand their role as a disciple of Christ. The Division attempted to accomplish this goal in 1989 in several ways.

It has been supportive of the local Church Sunday School. Teacher training opportunities were provided through the Teacher Readiness Workshops in the fall. Local churches use these events to support their teachers and helpers by offering them

training for their respective responsibilities. A special bi-district Rally was held for local church teachers in the fall to lift up the vision of the potential power of the teacher in a local church to be a partner with God in transforming other person's lives. Under the superb direction of Judy Gattis Smith, the participants learned how to "teach with joy" and share the vitality of our faith. Liz St. Clair and Doris Phillips, our education consultants, provided training and support for many local churches as they worked with congregations in their own environment to improve their Sunday School programs. Such support resulted in many new classes, recruitment of teachers/leaders, revitalization of Sunday School programs, and helping several new programs to begin.

Our churches are beginning to discover the value of seeking this kind of assistance and how training can greatly enhance their ministry and mission.

In order to provide leadership to do the training in our local churches, our division is intentional about the recruitment and training of leaders for Christian Education work in our conference. Nine persons were sent to Lab Schools to prepare them to lead workshops in local churches. We encourage our local churches to utilize these persons in providing on site training. Persons were involved in FOCUS '89 sponsored by the National Conference on Ministries with Children and several received specific training in how to effectively minister to the "Baby Boomer" population. Our division supported the training of conference persons on the new hymnal. These persons will be responsible for providing workshops throughout our conference in 1990.

Another valuable part of our work is to help provide Christian Education Resources for use in the Church School. We provide financial and leadership support of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency Resource Center. We are excited about the number of our local churches utilizing this resource and the extension of the Resource Center into the southern part of the Peninsula Conference. Our consultants continue to assist the Special Ministry Consultants in providing resources for the ELC Resource Centers on each district. At each workshop, new materials are available for review by our participants.

Our division is indebted to the dedicated work of many throughout our conference. Special thanks must be given to Harvey Manchester who has served as Conference Staff person for our division in recent years. He has given tirelessly of his creativity and energy. We look forward to the vision he will bring to the Council Director's position.

The following represent our vision in 1991 for growth and nurture in our church school programs. With the other division of the Board of Discipleship, we will give considerable energy and resources to the PARTNER CHURCH PROGRAM which we feel will bring new life to many of our local congregations.

1. To provide churches with a balance of near-by workshops and on-site support in the development of their local education ministry teachers, leaders, and program. This will be accomplished through the work of our consultants, workshop leaders, and other resource persons. We will seek to address the specific needs expressed by local churches in these workshops and training events.
2. To equip persons within our conference to provide leadership for local churches. Through Lab Schools, specific training events sponsored by our National and/or Regional Boards, and local training we will equip persons who will be used as workshop leaders in our conference.

3. To work closely with the other Divisions of the Board of Discipleship in the implementation of our PARTNER CHURCH PROGRAM. This program will receive our highest priority.
4. To assist the other Division in providing quality printed and audio-visual resources for local churches in our conference. This will be accomplished through our involvement with the DEA Resource Center.

DIVISION OF EVANGELISM

The Division of Evangelism began the year by sponsoring on lay person and one clergy member to the Council on Evangelism in Atlanta, GA. This enabled us to have two additional people available as resources on Evangelistic Programs for local church leadership training.

In addition to this training, seven persons including both laity and clergy, were trained for "Reaching the Baby Boomers" and scholarships were made available for five people to attend the NEJ School of Evangelism at Lycoming College in Williamsport, PA. The Division supplied financial support for the training of one Growth Plus consultant.

During the year, workshops on Church Growth were held in several local churches by Division of Evangelism members. A series of workshops on Lifestyle Evangelism was offered in several areas.

The Harry Denman Evangelism Award was awarded to Rev. Dr. Gerald Foster, Conference Evangelist, and Arthur Gamsby of Ebenezer U.M. Church in Newark, DE.

The Five Star Program was again promoted throughout the Conference with over 58 local churches receiving recognition for their outstanding work in Evangelism during the year.

The Division supported the Delmarva Walk to Emmaus community in the formation of a youth movement known as Chrysalis. Seventy-five youth from grades 10-12 experienced this program in its first year.

The NEJ Board of Evangelism promoted a training session in Nashville. Key leadership from GBOD Section of Evangelism presented an overview of resources available to local churches. Two members of the Division of Evangelism attended.

The Division continued to support National and Jurisdictional Sections on Evangelism through financial pledges.

It was the prayer and vision of this committee to present itself as a viable resource for the local church in 1989, helping to equip them to be the witnesses that Jesus called them to be in Acts 1:8.

The Division of Stewardship has worked together to develop a clearer and more intentional plan of stewardship. We feel that a spirit of cooperation between the whole Board of Discipleship is necessary for the success of stewardship, education, evangelism and worship. The direction of our division is exemplified in the goals that were accomplished in 1989:

- a. Members of the Division of Stewardship were involved in training events that would help churches understand the importance of tithing their time, gifts and money.
- b. Jim Jones attended a three day event in Oklahoma City, OK. provided by the National Association of Stewardship Leaders.
- c. The members of the Division of Stewardship attended a two-day retreat at Drayton Manor that provided new vision for the unified Board of Discipleship.
- d. We celebrated the 4th Anniversary of the Order of St. Barnabas with an induction service on the floor of the Annual Conference and a recognition and presentation of the Order at the Laity Banquet.

The 1990 goals are set with a vision of greater involvement in the local congregations throughout our conference. Our hope is to establish district teams that will work with local congregations to aid them in establishing a greater sense of ministry through stewardship. With the training events, scheduled in our 1990 goals, we will be able to provide local congregations with trained people.

1. To provide training for the Division of Stewardship:
 - a. Northeastern Jurisdictional Training Event.
 - b. NASL training event in Orlando, Florida.
2. To help churches understand the purpose of the title and how it enables us to reach out and minister beyond our present ability.
3. To continue the conference wide program of the Order of St. Barnabas.

DIVISION OF WORSHIP

The Division of Worship has continued to move forward during the year 1989. Our Division continues to be blessed with the leadership and support of its committee members and very dedicated staff representatives. This year has been one of continued growth and much excitement.

The Division of Worship worked closely with the Conference Arrangements Committee in planning and preparing worship experiences for Annual Conference. The Division made such recommendations as would enrich our Annual Conference experience.

The Worship Task Force Committee met and after much discussion made such decisions as: 1) preparing and coordinating all the worship services at Conference including Holy Communion, 2) furnishing service attendant logistics such as liturgist, servers, choirs, music and auditorium visuals.

The Board of Discipleship continues to adopt concerns which emphasize the importance of equipping persons to help in the nurturing and educating process of building effective disciples in the Conference. After an intensive two day Planning Retreat at Drayton Manor on December 1-2, 1989, the Board adopted a Partners Project. The Partners Project is a concept and a process whereby the Board of Discipleship seeks to enter into direct partnership with specific local congregations over an extended period of time for the purpose of building up those congregations' discipleship ministries of stewardship, education, evangelism and worship.

Because funds were provided to both laity and clergy, the Division of Worship was able to send members of the Division to the National FUMWMOA Convocation for training in worship leadership skills, held at Clairmont College in Clairmont, CA July 16-20, 1989. These persons agreed to become part of the resource leadership pool for the Division of Worship's work on behalf of the local church.

The Division has again purchased worship enrichment resources and placed them in the Conference Resource Library for use by worship leaders in the local church. It is our hope that the worship leaders in the local churches will avail themselves to the use of these worship resources.

The Division of Worship is happy to report the establishment of a Worship Fellowship Chapter in the Peninsula Conference. A Convocation was held at St. Luke's U.M. Church, located in Denton, MD on October 21, 1989 for the express purpose of beginning a Fellowship Chapter of United Methodist in Worship, Music and the Other Arts in the Peninsula Conference. This inaugural event included workshops and worship led by national resource persons such as Dr. William Farley Smith and Jerry Henry, Executive Secretary of the National Fellowship. The Division will continue to embrace our Peninsula Conference Fellowship even throughout the coming year. It is our intention to increase the number of (FUMWMOA) members in our Peninsula Conference and to assure that Ethnic Minority members are recruited.

- o Sterling Green: Insights from Liberia/Sierra Leone

In the year ahead Carol Quinn, Vice-Chair of Education and Cultivation, will become the Mission Itineration Coordinator. I participated in two mission festivals in local congregations (one aimed at district participation).

While attending the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference Secretaries of Global Ministries meeting in Buckhannon, West Virginia, I visited several mission projects in that region that are part of the Advance. One of them is included in the new "6 Lanes of the Advance" proposal. My thanks to Gordon Stapleton for generating the basic concept for this new focused mission effort of our Conference.

I have worked regularly or on specific tasks with the C.C.O.M., B.O.G.M., Division of Education and Cultivation and the Congregational Development Committee. I am continuing to work with Fay Whittle, member of Newark United Methodist Church, to follow up on the unanimous vote taken at our last Annual Conference in support of U.M.C.O.R. 1-2-3 Hunger Project. A major portion of this emphasis is the "Beyond Charity" event, October 27-28, 1990 to be held in Dover.

He will introduce individuals, organizations and churches to the many things that can be done to encourage and support the development of new and existing churches. Don Lee Novey, 100 N. Main Street, Port Deposit, MD 21904, (301)378-4140 will continue after Cowell's departure to resource and to follow-up this responsibility."

Second, "to conduct research studies and community surveys that plan for and assist with developing innovative strategies for missions" the Congregational Development Committee is requesting that each district in the Peninsula Conference under the direction of its Superintendent with the help of The District Council on Ministries, the District Committee on Building and Location or whatever other group he or she thinks feasible, prepare a list of new and existing churches on the district needing development. This list is being requested because The Congregational Development Committee has discovered that this is information that the superintendents already know. If further information or testing is required, it is readily available through the U.S. population census and other statistics from the local community and businesses. The lists of needs for new and existing church development would by necessity be up-dated regularly and published annually in the Congregational Development Committee Report for the Peninsula Annual Conference Sessions."

And third, "To make recommendations for loans and grants" the following where recommended by the Congregational Development Committee to the Division of Parish and Community Development and the Conference Board of Global Ministries and approved in 1989:

METHODIST ACTION PROGRAM

The Methodist Action Program (MAP) is the ACTION program of the Peninsula Annual Conference in metropolitan Wilmington. Since 1966 we have been bringing the Word and Love of Jesus to this urban community by: (1) supporting and developing local churches; (2) meeting human needs; and (3) working for social change.

The following quote from our own United Methodist Discipline sums up what I think the Methodist Action Program is all about, and why its ministry is so important to the life of this Annual Conference as well as the communities we serve.

The people of God are the Church made visible in the world. It is they who must convince the world of the reality of the gospel or leave it unconvinced. There can be no evasion or delegation of this responsibility; the Church is either faithful as a witnessing and servicing community, or it loses its vitality and its impact on an unbelieving world. (The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, Paragraph 107)

MAP is about the work of convincing the world of the reality of the Gospel. Through MAP's ministries, churches and people like yourself work together as a "witnessing and servicing community." Together we are having an important, effective, impact on an unbelieving world by bringing God's word and love to people in need. Through our witness and service together, we vitality to our church and to our faith.

Witness and Service With the Hispanic Community

Together we are in witness and service to the Hispanic Elderly through our Outreach Program and the Los Abuelos Senior Center. The Outreach program continues to provide one on one personal attention to individual needs by providing transportation, helping the elderly receive critical medical care, helping them find housing, and insuring that they receive the other social services that they need. The Los Abuelos Center now serves lunch every day and is a place where the Elderly come for recreation as well as assistance. Next year we will receive a new handicapped accessible van that will help improve the transportation assistance we provide but we need to raise additional funds to cover it's insurance and operating costs.

Together we are also in witness and service to the Hispanic community through our support of the new Hispanic United Methodist Mission. After its first full year of operation the Mission is making steady progress towards its long term goal of becoming a chartered congregation. One important step in that direction was their recent decision to change from an informal Sunday evening worship to regular Sunday morning services. Another exciting highlight is the continued development of their youth program. Their new musical group continues to grow and they recently co-spo-

nsored a retreat for 23 area teenagers with the Latin American Community Center.

Witness and Service to the Hungry

Together we are in witness and service to the hungry through our food closets at Old Asbury, Brandywine-Trinity, and the Hispanic Mission. In partnership with the Ministry of Caring and through the support of many of your local churches we sponsor Emmanuel Dining Room East which provides over 50,000 meals to the hungry each year.

Witness and Service to Families Who Need Housing

Together we are in witness and service to low income families who need affordable homes through our financial and volunteer support of the Interfaith Housing Task Force. We are in witness and service through volunteer work crews from local churches who help rehabilitate homes each Saturday; through the fund raisers that are helping to raise our \$20,000 per year pledge to Interfaith; and most importantly we are in witness and service through the creation of homes for families in Claymont (31), New Castle (the first 40 of 111 by next spring), and Wilmington (3 rehabilitations and 8 new homes under construction).

Witness and Service At Old Asbury

Together we are continuing our long witness and service to low income families on Wilmington's East Side through Asbury Center's Afterschool Education Program which gives 40 children the help they need to succeed in school' the Old Asbury Summer Day Camp; and through the Emergency Assistance Program to families in crisis. One exciting new program is the new Saturday Morning Bible School which was started this Fall.

Witness and Service Through Advocacy

Together we are in witness and service to low income communities throughout the State who are benefiting from commitments that the Delaware Community Reinvestment Action Council has negotiated with three local banks to invest over \$150 million loans to create housing and small business in their communities. Not only is MAP a member of DCRAC but we have played a leadership role in the negotiation and implementation of each agreement.

Witness and Service to the Low Income Elderly

Together we are in witness and service to the low income elderly persons through the church youth groups who repair their homes as part of MAP's Summer Youth Mission Project. This year seven groups including ones from both the Baltimore and Eastern Pennsylvania conferences participated.

Witness and Service Through the Establishment of a New Church

Together we are witnessing and servicing community as we work with Kirkwood UMC and the Glasgow Outpost Sunday School to build a new church on Route 896 near Lum's Pond. On November 1 we completed the purchase of 6 acres

for a new church and Kirkwood UMC has already purchased a trailer that will allow the new congregation to have activities on the new property as well as at the Hodgson's Vo-Tech School until the new congregation is formed and builds its own new building on the site.

**All these Ministries are Made Possible
Through your Support**

With your support MAP has been able to continue reaching out in witness and mission by developing several new ministries over the last three years. The Los Abuelos Center, the new Hispanic Mission, the Afterschool Education Program, the Summer Youth Work Project, the Saturday Bible School at Old Asbury, the development of the Interfaith Housing Task Force and our leadership in the Delaware Community Reinvestment Action Council are all new ministries which we made possible by increased financial contributions of this Annual Conference, it's local churches and church members.

MAP has established two new Task Forces for 1990 to look at what we should do to support the development of affordable quality Day Care and how we can address the critical problem of Substance Abuse. Your support is critical if we are going to continue to support and develop these ministries.

Support for Urban Ministry in Other Districts

Working through the Committee on Urban Ministry Committee of the Board of Global Ministries we have met with the Conference leadership to offer to support the development of urban ministries in the other districts of the Annual Conference. In addition, we will be hosting the Northeast Jurisdiction Convocation on Urban Ministry in Wilmington in 1991. We hope that this event will be used as a resource by the entire Annual Conference.

Unfortunately, the cost of providing these ministries continues to increase. The "health insurance crisis" alone has meant that the cost of providing health insurance to our employees has risen at least 20% a year for the past three years. We need the continued help of this Annual Conference and all our other financial supporters if we are going to meet these costs and continue to develop new ministries of "witness and service" in the future.

We ask each church of this Annual Conference to keep us and those we serve in their prayers throughout the coming year. Together we are having an impact on a world that needs us and our message of God's Word and Love.

NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE, INC.

In 1989 NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE, INC. continued its long range planning efforts to assess community needs and to determine its role in meeting those needs. The Board of Directors reviewed and revised its Mission Statement and adopted goals to guide it for the next five years as part of the process.

The Mission Statement and Goals as adopted by the Board of Directors are stated below:

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of Neighborhood House is to enable the people in and around South Wilmington to improve individually their quality of life and to develop cooperatively a better neighborhood. People with different backgrounds join as partners, continuously seeking opportunities to overcome individual and community problems. We believe we can help most effectively by keeping a high priority on enhancing the functioning of the family unit.

Better housing, family unity, education and counseling, recreation, neighborhood development, racial and cultural relations, as well as spiritual and emotional enrichment are important aspects of programs which meet the various and changing needs of the people.

Neighborhood House, Inc. (NHI) is a community center that stands in the heart of South Wilmington, Delaware. It is an independent non-profit agency related to the General Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church, and is governed locally by an inclusive, autonomous, predominantly lay Board of Directors, which is a cross section of people from the Church, Community and South Wilmington. Major financial support is received from The United Methodist Church; the United Way of Delaware; the Federal, state and city governments; and individuals and business contributions.

GOALS:

Promote community and economic development.

Provide a range of services and resources to help families and individual develop long-term solutions to their problems and needs.

Promote and provide counseling and assistance in obtaining long-term employment.

Promote and provide educational and training opportunities for children, youth and adults.

Promote and provide recreational, cultural, and enrichment opportunities and programs.

Increase housing opportunities for low and moderate income families in and around South Wilmington.

Broaden the base and improve the quality of financial, physical and human resources available to Neighborhood House.

In addition the Board of Directors decided that the agency needs a new building. The current building is over one hundred years old. It is in need of major repairs and fails to meet the current life safety codes. The building is too small for current programs and cannot accommodate any new programs.

In 1989, the Board of Directors established a Building Committee to develop plans for the new building. The Board of Directors also established a Capital Campaign Strategy Committee to start planning for the capital campaign which will kick off in 1991.

Although planning efforts consumed much of the agency's time in 1989, there are accomplishments to report. They include:

Apple Square Development

The 28th and last home was sold in June of 1989. The home was bought by a former Neighborhood House employee.

Youth Development

Neighborhood House youth performed for President Bush when he came to Delaware in March of 1989. The youth were members of the agency's Wilmington Cluster Against Substance Abuse (WCASA) program.

Van

The agency purchased its first van. Neighborhood House Alumni led an effort to raise \$7,000 to purchase the van. Their effort convinced the United Way of Delaware to give the agency the balance needed.

DIVISION OF EDUCATION AND CULTIVATION

Due to the transition of membership in the Division, our efforts in 1989 were not as expansive as we would have hoped. However, we are now moving ahead at a good momentum for the remainder of 1990 into 1991. In February of 1990, members of the Division conducted training for Missions Chairpersons on each District as part of the Conference training for local church officers. Follow-up is being made with those persons requesting specific information.

Henry Zollinhofer, Conference Volunteer In Mission Coordinator, led a disaster relief effort in November 1989 to St. Croix and surrounding islands following hurricane Hugo. In addition to delivering 15,000 square feet of plastic tarpaulin, his team met with contact people on location to assess future rebuilding projects. June Caine, member of St. Paul's (Wilmington), visited the same area in February 1990, for an update.

She and Henry will coordinate a Volunteer In Mission opportunity to St. Croix for Peninsula United Methodists by Annual Conference this year. June Caine also participated in a V.I.M. project to Nigeria in 1989 and is available to share insights with local congregations. Henry is also helping coordinate local gleaning projects in the Peninsula. In April 1990, Dr. Bruce Obenshain, former missionary to Zaire, took Bruce Storms, Easton District Missions Secretary, to Zaire to assess the continued growth of the hospital (Advance project) that Dr. Obenshain helped to build. Both persons are available for itineration to local congregations. The Division continues to work on developing audio-visual and training events focused on educating and motivating local congregations, and equipping them for the Advance — "the Advance of God's project in the world."

1991 Goals

1. District Mission Interpretation Events centered around the "6 Lanes of the Advance" proposal.
 - o The goal is to move every congregation to adopt at least one project in 1990-1991.
2. Local Congregation Training focusing on follow up of District Events, emphasizing E.L.C. and small-member congregations as well as large.
 - o The goal is to enable the local Missions Committee to strategize a complete missions program that grows each year. Hope for 4 events/district/year.
3. Develop a list of congregations seeking mission speakers, and to resource that list as part of that local congregation's complete mission program.
4. Continue developing mission interpreters within our Annual Conference, including V.I.M. (Volunteers in Mission).
5. To have a mission presence at the Conference Annual Youth Rally, including a V.I.M. focus for youth.
6. To develop a complete interpretation package for each project or area of the "6 Lanes of the Advance."

PENINSULA UNITED METHODIST HOMES, INC.

"The following information about Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., is printed because the Conference has a common missional interest with Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., although the conference does not have any financial or legal responsibility for Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc."

(A Covenant of Affiliation Between Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., and the Peninsula Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, adopted June 1985.)

As Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc. enters its fourth decade of service, the corporation reaffirms its commitment to excellence in providing services and facilities to meet the changing needs of older adults. We are the largest nonprofit retirement community provider in Delaware and the Eastern Shore of Maryland. In our facilities - Methodist Country House in Wilmington, Methodist Manor House in Seaford, and Cokesbury Village in Hockessin, more than 900 residents enjoy the services, security and companionship of a life care retirement community. In addition, we provide skilled nursing care at the Layton Home for Aged Persons, a 108-bed facility in Wilmington, Delaware which we manage under contract.

1989 was an exciting and challenging year for PUMH. We continued our emphasis

on improving our managerial efficiency and strengthening the corporation's financial base. Now in full practice, our unified management system helps us assess the effectiveness of our operations, identify opportunities for improving management and enhancing the services to our residents.

In March, PUMH purchased the Heron Point of Chestertown property in Chestertown, Maryland. Official ground breaking ceremonies were held in November on the project, PUMH's first continuing care retirement community in Maryland. With 75% of the facility's 198 apartment and cottage units already reserved and construction well underway, the community is expected to open to residents in fall 1991.

Spring brought the retirement of Leona J. Brown as executive director of the Methodist Country House. One of her accomplishments was the accreditation in 1986 and reaccreditation this year of the facility's health center by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO). Country House is the only long-term care provider in the State of Delaware to hold this honor. The Rev. Edward E. Kester was named to succeed Mrs. Brown as the facility's executive director. Another key personnel change was the promotion of Mrs. Linda R. Souder, formerly director of health care services for Methodist Manor House, to the position of executive director for the Seaford facility.

In June PUMH welcomed Edward J. Steiner as the new chairman of the board. He is an active member of Avenue United Methodist Church in Milford, and is former treasurer of the Annual Conference. Mr. Steiner's enthusiasm and commitment in building on a solid base of communication among residents, staff and board follows the direction set forth by outgoing chairman Robert D. Ullrich. The PUMH Board of Trustees guides the corporation with sound business policy decisions while maintaining our mission as an organization that cares for people. Our board members represent diverse expertise in business management, ministry and health care.

PUMH has completed its second full year of management of the Layton Home for Aged Persons, a 108-bed nursing care facility primarily serving low-income minority elderly in Wilmington. Offices, hallways and public area were remodeled making the facility a more attractive place for residents and staff.

Recognizing that today's residents desire larger living accommodations, PUMH has begun the conversion of a number of single rooms into apartments at each of our facilities. The Board of Trustees in December announced a master plan for the Methodist Manor House, which opened in 1966, to increase the number of apartments in the facility, add approximately 30 cottages to the property, provide a personal care wing and health center dining room, refurbish public areas, modify the building's roof life and enhance landscaping around the property over the next several years. Similar plans to increase the number of larger living units are being considered for the Methodist Country House as well.

As a Christian provider of health care and retirement services, PUMH is grateful to the many generous friends who contributed \$325,000 for benevolence assistance to limited-income residents and the endowment fund. We are pleased to note that the 1989 Conference grant of \$100,000, combined with Mother's Day offerings of \$22,000, and other gifts provided benevolence funds to 66 Country House and Manor House residents whose financial resources do not enable them to meet the full cost of care. On behalf of our residents, we are most appreciative of these gifts.

It is our mission to serve our Conference's many older adults not living in PUMH

communities. Throughout the year our aging ministries program actively assisted local churches and community groups in developing their ministries to older parishioners. Mrs. Naomi G. Winchester, aging ministries consultant, is a catalyst in assisting educational institutions and other organizations in the development of training programs for lay persons and professionals serving the aging population. PUMH energetically works toward these goals with the Peninsula Annual Conference's Older Adult Task Force.

Throughout the 1990 the corporation will work towards accreditation by the Continuing Care Accreditation Commission of the American Association of Homes for the Aging for each of its three facilities. One of PUMH's primary goals for 1991 is to achieve this mark of excellence and to maintain the high standards which must be met to hold this nationally recognized mark of achievement. We will also work toward our ongoing goal to increase in terms of the number and diversity of adults served in our communities.

It is our firm belief that to make sure growth possible, we must employ and retain highly trained, dedicated staff. We must continue to administer our communities in the most efficient manner possible. And we must always consider first the needs of our residents who trust and satisfaction remain the most important indicators of success in carrying our mission.

WESLEY COLLEGE

The year 1989 was another excellent year for Wesley College. The long-awaited visit of a team from the University Senate of The United Methodist Church occurred in the Spring. Wesley received its recommendation, subsequently adopted by the University Senate, that the College continue to be listed by the Church as an approved institution. Members of the team were especially generous with their comments regarding our efforts in admissions and student services, and cited our strong commitment to our relationship with the Church through the Peninsula Annual Conference.

Other good news to be highlighted:

- * Classes began on August 30, 1989, with the largest full-time student enrollment in the 117-year history of Wesley College, a total of 876. These enrollers were joined by 66 part-time students, 287 continuing education students, and 18 combined day and evening students, for a total enrollment of 1,247.
- * Wesley College ended the last fiscal year with its sixth consecutive financial operating surplus.
- * Ten new faces joined the Wesley faculty, four of whom will fill new positions in chemistry, history, English and communications. Four of the ten are women, and six of the ten have earned doctorates.
- * 1989 data revealed that 12.9% of Wesley's full-time enrollment and 19.5% of its

part-time enrollment are ethnic minority students.

- Nearly one-third of the money received by Wesley from the Peninsula Annual Conference was given as financial aid to ethnic minority and low-income students.
- The College initiated two new programs leading to baccalaureate degrees in economics and liberal studies.
- Dr. Prudent Precourt, Vice President for Institutional Advancement, announced the best year-end total in cash gifts from donors in the history of the College. Gift income for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1989, reached \$679,000, including \$300,000 from a single foundation.
- The Wesley College Sports Complex, with fields for football, baseball, soccer, field hockey, and softball, was dedicated on Saturday, September 9, before a crowd of 1500, which included the governor of Delaware and the mayor of Dover.

Our commitment to ever increasing inclusiveness in our Wesley community was demonstrated anew when the Board of Trustees created two at-large positions on the Executive Committee and filled on of those positions with a distinguished woman executive from the ethnic minority community. The Trustees also created an Ethnic Minority Recruitment Task Force with the Rev. Dr. Robert M. Price, College Chaplain, as convener. This Task Force has been working on a Comprehensive Plan and I am hopeful that the completed plan, approved by the Trustees, will be available for distribution to members of the Annual Conference at the Conference session in June.

The Plan will include a leadership statement of my vision of where Wesley College can be five to ten years from now: a multi-cultural campus of students, faculty and staff living in creative community. It also will include specific action steps to increase not only the number of ethnic minority students, but the number of ethnic minority faculty and staff persons as well. Clearly, the future of our nation is bound up inextricably with the future of our growing ethnic minority population, and Wesley College is committed to becoming a multi-cultural institution where all will be taught not only how to make a living, but also how to live.

As we enter the decade of the 90s, Wesley College is challenged by its historic affiliation with The United Methodist Church. It is my hope and my prayer that the covenant between Wesley and Peninsula Annual Conference will maintain a dedication to the arts and sciences and to a holistic approach which will emphasize the physical, psychological and spiritual dimensions of human existence. This is the heart of our calling and the soul of our relationship. How appropriate, then, that our first commencement speaker of the new decade, on May 12, 1990 will be the Peninsula Conference's "own," Bishop Felton E. May. Bishop May will receive the first Honorary Doctor of Divinity degree ever granted by Wesley College and you are all invited to join us for this joyous occasion.

1991 Goals

1. To ensure the excellence and quality of our comprehensive four year College by emphasizing the creation of new revenue sources including the implementation of innovative adult education programs.

2. To advance the quality of the institution by beginning a program designed to raise admissions standards on an incremental basis over a period of years while simultaneously strengthening the existing programs of the College.
3. To encourage inclusiveness by emphasizing the importance of recruiting and retaining minority students.
4. To strengthen the ties between the Church and the College and enhance the quality of religious life on the campus by emphasizing our Pre-Ministry program throughout the College's market areas and by continuing to emphasize the entire spectrum of our full-time Chaplaincy Program.

WESLEY FOUNDATION, UNIVERSITY OF DELAWARE

The year 1989 was a very good one for the Wesley Foundation. Since 1986, we have experienced a seven fold increase in the number of students who regularly participate in the activities of the Wesley Foundation. For the first time we have begun to attract graduate students to our program. We had several very successful programs in 1989 including folk-singer and songwriter Bob Franke in concert, the Asbury Lecture and Pastor's School with William Willimon, our second work trip to southwestern Pennsylvania, our largest attendance to date for our winter retreat at Drayton and our fall retreat at the beach, a joint event with Hillel and a Thanksgiving worship service and dinner with the Anglican Student Fellowship. We have outgrown our facilities at Newark United Methodist Church, though we are happy to remain there. The staff and congregation continue to embrace us with their hospitality and love. We took our slide show and program into eight United Methodist Churches and were well received in all cases. The Wesley Foundation Board of Directors has developed into a strong guiding force for the ministry, and has been deliberate in electing persons of color to its membership. The campus pastor is a member of the University Solutions to Sexual Violence Task Force and Campus Clergy. He attended a national workshop on ministering to persons of color on campus sponsored by the General Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

The Wesley Foundation at the University of Delaware is the strongest it has ever been, and the future looks bright as new avenues of ministry constantly open up for our exploration. We continue to covet the prayers and support of the people of the Peninsula Conference as we begin another decade of service and ministry to the university community.

UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND, EASTERN SHORE

WESLEY FOUNDATION CAMPUS MINISTRY AT U.M.E.S., continues to provide opportunities for our Students and Staff, to deepen their Spiritual Lives, and to share their faith with others in the Campus Community.

Our Weekly Wednesday Mid-Week Chapel Service provides Worship and Spiritual Reflection in the middle of the week; and continues to grow. This year for the first time, we have seen a dramatic increase in the participation of graduate students and some staff persons.

Our Weekly Thursday Evening Fellowship and Bible Study, in conjunction with the Baptist Campus Ministry, also continues to be an affective study tool. This year such themes as: "Evangelism, Prayer, Christian Social Issues", and "Stumbling Blocks to Spiritual Development", generated a great deal of interest; and while the average numerical participation was not as great as that of last year, participation was rich and varied.

There were students attending these events who had no religious background whatsoever, or any knowledge of the Bible. Others came from other religious backgrounds; there were yet others who were quite spiritually matured.

The Bible Studies held on "The Parables of Jesus", and "The Meaning and Celebration of Christmas" were also well received.

Campus Ministers, Faculty members of U.M.E.S., and the pastors of local congregations served as Presenters and Study Leaders.

Retreats and Conferences: There were four of these, including one for Foreign Students, and one for the training of Campus Ministry Student Leaders. All these retreats were designed to assist the further spiritual growth of our Campus Ministry participants. We are happy to report that they were fairly well attended.

Our students also participated in the local observance of "Black Religious Heritage Sunday" at the Metropolitan U.M.C. This, as is the case in the previous years, as well received.

Our Religious Emphasis Week Observance in the Spring, was the highlight for the year. We attempted, in all the events, to involve the entire Campus Community. Highlights during our observation were: The Keynote Address by The Rev. Dr. Major Jones, past president of Gammon Theological Seminary in Atlanta, GA; and Gospel Choir Concerts by Salisbury State University Gospel Choir, and an earlier concert by the Bethune-Cookman College Inspirational Gospel Choir, Daytona Beach, FL.

Our Annual U.M.E.S. Day Worship event at Metropolitan, (culminating activity for Religious Emphasis Week) involved Faculty, Staff, Students and the U.M.E.S. Gospel Choir. The Speaker was an alumnus as well as a Pastor in our Conference.

Many other activities were carried out by Campus Ministers and students, with the assistance of Board of Director's Members, but cannot be reported in the confines of this report.

- o To the Annual Conference for your support. Without your prayers and stewardship, this ministry might not have taken place.

BOARD OF LAITY

Our annual Laity Banquet was held on May 23, 1989 with a capacity crowd of 600 at the Peninsula Annual Conference. Edward Steiner, former Secretary of Delaware Department of Public Safety, spoke to the theme "Beyond Aldersgate: Proclaiming in the Highways and Preaching in the Fields." Again, pointing out that the way we live our daily lives in the likeness of Christ is spreading the Word of God on the highways and byways.

Six churches through-out the conference took part in a study by the Board of Discipleship. Evelyn Burry, Director, is doing some research of how lay people see their lives reflective of their Christian beliefs and values. One church in the Salisbury District had small group interviews with Evelyn focusing discussions around how they seek to act as Christians in their daily lives.

Two other churches have been asked to take part in a study being conducted by the COMMISSION FOR THE STUDY OF MINISTRY, a committee appointed by General Conference to study current structure of The United Methodist Church and to make recommendations for possible restructuring for a more effective ministry.

God's timing in regards to the election of an Associate Conference Lay Leader could not have been more prudent. Howard Mason has had to assume my many responsibilities for much of the year. My heartfelt gratitude and thanks goes out to Howard.

We had our first "Day-Apart" at Drayton Center with the members of the Conference Board and the Districts Boards of Laity. Using THE DISCIPLINE to get a better understanding of our job of enabling and assisting the laity throughout the Conference. Thanks to the able leadership to Rev. Dr. Pamela Lardear, Rev. Dr. Gordon Stapleton, Elizabeth St. Clair, and Rev. Connie Metzger. Many came away with an expanded vision of their role as leaders.

Howard, as Conference representative, and the district Lay Leaders have endeavored to assist as the District Superintendents met with the Annual Conference lay and clergy members to broaden their understanding of the work of the church.

The Second Annual Lay Speakers Seminar was held in May. Workshops were offered on (1) Doctrinal Standards and Our Theological Task, (2) Creating a New Community: God's People Overcoming Racism, and (3) Peace with Justice.

All four districts continue their work with the laity by participating with Lenten Breakfast, Laity Banquets and the Lay Speakers School. The board members are involved as called upon by the districts.

Our goal to uplift and celebrate God's Grace in each life is paramount.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

To serve on the Board of Ordained Ministry is a great responsibility and an even greater privilege. The work of the Board touches the lives of our pastors at every point, from the time of their response to God's call to set apart ministry, through their years of service and retirement, to their death and resurrection into the Church Triumphant. We work with people, very important leadership people in the Church. We also address issues affecting their lives and ministry, as well as provide programs to enhance the covenant which connects us to one another. The Board has sought to carry out its responsibility and privilege in a grace-filled, caring, and sensitive way.

Programmatically, in 1989 the Board:

- o sponsored Day Apart events with Bishop Yeakel for all pastors as a preparation for Lent (St. John's, Seaford, Shrove Tuesday, February 7), for pastors in appointments beyond the local church (Cokesbury Village, April 15), and for persons to be recommended for conference membership and ordination (Drayton, April 24);
- o granted scholarship aid to college and seminary students preparing for ordained ministry, totalling \$23,637;
- o provided training events for pastors and spouses beginning with their first appointment in our conference (Drayton in July), for 11 new pastors (Inter conference Local Pastors Licensing School, Drew Seminary in July), for the 4 lay observers newly-appointed to the Board (Whatcoat, Camden, in July), and for pastors serving as Counseling Elders (Grace, Georgetown, in September);

- o held two Professional Growth Seminars on Cross-Racial Appointments at Drayton, in April and October;
- o stepped up recruiting efforts by:
 1. contacted local churches for their assistance in identifying potential candidates for ordained ministry.
 2. visiting seminary students from our and other conferences to encourage them to become members of the Peninsula Conference.
 3. encouraged all pastors to lift up the call to ordained and diaconal ministry in their preaching one Sunday in November, and
 4. in conjunction with the Board of Diaconal Ministry, held a day of celebration of ministry over the Christmas holiday for persons to learn about ordained and diaconal ministry;
- o sent members to Lancaster Seminary program evaluation (May), to national convocations on Pastoral Effectiveness (Atlanta, February, and Chicago, October) and Spiritually (San Diego, November); and
- o presented new policies and new continuing education policy guidelines for our conference Board to the executive session in May.

Looking to 1990, the Board will:

- o evaluate current Board interview procedures to determine the best way and setting for this important task;
- o continue to emphasize the recruiting efforts begun last year;
- o hold another training event for counseling elders in September;
- o continue to work toward becoming more pro-active in developing and providing supportive programs and systems for clergy, rather than reacting to situations as they arise;
- o hold an orientation session for all new members appointed to the Board before the first fall meeting of the Board;
- o continue to sponsor clergy events: Professional Growth Seminars, Shrove Tuesday Day Apart for all pastors, Day Apart for New Ordinands, ABLC Day Apart, New Appointment Orientation Seminar, and Inter conference Local Pastors Licensing School.

In 1989, the Board of Ordained Ministry received two gifts, which were deposited into a new Scholarship Endowment Fund, through the Conference Business Office. The interest from this fund will be administered by the Board's Scholarship Committee, and used to make financial assistance awards to seminary students. The two gifts were:

\$876.00 from the Riverview Charge on the Easton District, and \$661.54 as a memorial to Rev. and Mrs. Frank A. (Louise S.) Baker from their children: Frances, Frank, Jr., Terry, and Rev. David W. Rev. and Mrs. Baker served 31 years in this conference, beginning in 1926. We are most grateful for these gifts.

As a Conference, in 1989 we continued our records of supporting the Ministerial Education Fund 100%, paying our asking in full. We also joined with neighboring conferences in the Northeastern Jurisdiction as partners in the Inter conference Local Pastors Licensing School, held at Drew Seminary, Madison, N.J., each July.

To close this report, I must express my deep gratitude to the members of the Board. They have been a gracious and faithful group to work with. They have been faithful in attendance, conscientious in doing the Board's work, and supportive of one another, especially me. It has been a joy to serve with them.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

The Conference Board of Pension's duties and responsibilities are defined by the Book of Discipline, "as having charge of the interests and work of providing for and contributing to the support, relief, assistance and pensioning of clergy and their families and other church workers of The United Methodist Church, its institutions, organizations and agencies within the Annual Conference, except as otherwise provided for by the general board."

The Board has worked diligently to keep faith with its duties and responsibilities as defined by the Book of Discipline. In each instance, we have kept in mind the needs and concerns of our pensioners and have attempted to make prudent financial decisions that will assure a financial soundness for the future. We have sought to strengthen financial security for the clergy, lay employees, and their families covered by our pension, health, dental and life insurance programs, by following a course of action undergirded with financial integrity and compassion.

The Board's portfolio that exceeds three million dollars is managed by the Bank of Delaware. We are pleased to report that our portfolio has again experienced growth this past year.

The contribution rate that the local church pays into the MPP for the pastor's pension is 12%. This percent is contingent on the past service rate for clergy service rendered prior to 1982 being not less than .90% of the Conference Average Compensation. The PSR of \$240 for 1990 is 0.94. The proposed PSR \$255 for 1991 will be 0.93.

Statement of Goals for 1991:

1. Strengthen the pension portfolio.
2. Modify our rising health care costs.

Pension Recommendation:

The Peninsula Conference Board of Pensions recommends that:

1. The Past Service Rate for 1991 be \$255 per year of approved service.
2. Up to 100% of the pension and disability payments received to be designated as the permitted housing allowance for 1991. (The full text of this resolution may be found in the 1989 Conference Journal, Page 294).

Insurance Committee:

The chief challenge facing our Board continues to be rising health care costs. As all of us recognize, this problem affects all segments of our society. It is a national dilemma with serious implications for all of us. It is not predicted to diminish in the near future. In the December 1989 issue of "Industry Week", this paragraph appeared: "Health care costs are getting dangerously high. The amount of dollars spent on health care in the U.S. will exceed 600 billion dollars in 1989. By the year 2000, the health care costs are projected to exceed 1.5 trillion dollars, a triple increase in just ten years."

The startling reality of these facts is simply, that the Peninsula Conference, like all other segments of our society, will have to continue making hard, prudent decisions regarding our health care program and costs. There are no deviations; for each benefit there is a cost.

We have continued the services of Johnson and Higgins, a reputable health care consulting firm, to give direction to the Board, as we continue to study, and make plans for the present and future health care concerns and programs for our conference. Their consultations with the Board have been helpful and resulted in substantial cost savings and increased benefits.

During the year of 1989, our health care plan introduced a preventive dimension. This included the following:

Physical exams for the subscriber and eligible dependents once every two years. Allowance is limited to \$100.00 per two year period per person and is to include the exam and related tests.

Four physical exams for dependent children during the first year of life.

Immunization of children under six years of age for:

- Diphtheria (4 doses)
- Tetanus and pertussis (DPT) vaccine
- Measles, mumps & rubella vaccine (1 dose)
- Polio vaccine (3 doses)

Dental

Preventative:

In full coverage with no deductible or co-pay for preventative dental services – two visits per year.

Continuing our emphasis on wellness, the Board contracted with The Center For Corporate Health Promotion, Inc., which publishes a monthly health letter to sent to all participants in the conference medical plan. This health-letter entitled Taking Care, is a colorful, eight page magazine that will have articles designed to improve health and decrease medical costs by enabling individuals to use medical care appropriately and to adopt healthy lifestyles. Hopefully, this newsletter will be beneficial to all promoting better health and therefore helping to lower our health care costs.

The book, "Take Care of Yourself", by Dr. Donald M. Vickery that normally retails for \$14.95 will be made available at this session of the annual conference to all clergy and lay members for \$3.00.

Reminders:

1. Ministers appointed to the Peninsula Conference for the first time, must make arrangements with the Conference Business Office for enrollment in medical, dental, life and pension programs.
 - A. Ministers leaving appointments in the Peninsula Conference, must make arrangements with the Conference Business Office to be properly transferred from the benefit program.
 - B. Ministers incurring changes in their family status, such as marriages, divorces, newborn children, deaths, etc., must notify the Conference Business Office within thirty days of these events.
2. Each pastor is responsible to keep the Conference Business Office and the General Board of Pensions apprised of any changes to their designated beneficiary.
3. Local churches are reminded that they are responsible for the full cost of the family/dependent health/dental insurance program of their clergy family.

The Conference Board of Trustees has not dealt with either situation because neither motion instructed the

Trustees to act.

The Board has met three times conference year to oversee matters and money assigned to its responsibility. The members have been very diligent in their attendance and obviously take their membership seriously.

The Board again expresses its appreciation to Mr. James B. Tyler, III of Georgetown, Delaware and to Mr. Charles B. Dashiell of Salisbury, Maryland for serving as Chancellors for the Conference in their respective states.

After a serious review, the Trustees have voted by a three-fourths majority to discontinue use of the Peninsula Conference Foundation for investment management of its funds.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

The primary responsibility of the Commission on Archives and History is the care of Barratt's Chapel and Museum. In this we depend heavily on the able and enthusiastic work of our curator, Ed Sharp, and his wife Mary Ann.

Barratt's Chapel has been designated a Shrine of The United Methodist Church by General Conference. The Museum includes displays relating to the history of the Peninsula Conference, a research library, and the official archives of the Conference. The Chapel and Museum are open every Saturday and Sunday from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m., and at other times by appointment with the curator (302 335-5544).

Throughout the year the facilities are used by tourists, confirmation classes, school groups, genealogists, and people doing research on local history. The Chapel is also made available for wedding, funerals, and other special services and meeting. In 1989, over 3,000 people visited Barratt's Chapel and Museum for one reason or another.

The Commission sponsors two worship services a year at Barratt's Chapel. On the second Sunday of November, we celebrate the anniversary of the meeting of Coke and Asbury. This year's service featured Dr. Kenneth Rowe of Drew University as speaker, with music provided by the choir of St. John's United Methodist Church, Seaford. About 300 people attended the service. Each December, we also hold a candlelight carol service.

We are always concerned with the maintenance and improvement of the physical facilities at Barratt's. Significant improvements this year included a new furnace in the Chapel, an alarm system protecting both buildings, and new shelving in the library area. Expansion of the Museum collection is another continuing emphasis. One especially noteworthy addition this year was Bishop Levi Scott's 1852 passport signed by then Secretary of State Daniel Webster. The passport was presented by Francis I. duPont, Bishop Scott's great-great grandson, at a ceremony with Bishop Yeakel. We were also very pleased to receive a new portrait of Bishop Felton May, which is now on display at the museum.

The Commission depends on endowments and gifts from churches and individuals for about two-thirds of its support. Also, we are always seeking new materials of historical interest to add to the Museum collection. If you are interested in making a

7. Identify and train Local Church Historians.
8. Expand the collection of materials and memorabilia in the Conference Archives at Barratt's Chapel Museum.

THE REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

In keeping with its original four year plan, the Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns came together in September at its annual planning and evaluation retreat at Drayton Manor.

The commission president, Dr. Vernon L. Schmid, shared the Consultation on Church Union (COCU) "Covenanting Communion" plan which is to be considered by all nine participating bodies in COCU. The commission set in motion their own study regarding the issue and plan to introduce legislation relating to the issue at the 1991 Annual Conference.

Sponsorship of three visitors from the World Council of Churches Conference on Evangelism and Mission in June, 1989, was discussed. The visitors, from West Germany, Japan, and East Germany met with persons in the Wilmington and Dover districts and received positive response.

The Rev. David Garrett spearheaded as study for the commission concerning use of the Common Lectionary. With the cooperation of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency and the Division on Worship the survey of pastors on the peninsula provided a great deal of encouraging news concerning the use of the lectionary. Returns of the survey were extremely high and the results of the study were scheduled for publication in the DEA Newsletter and the Communicator.

A long range project concerning ecumenical observance of Pentecost were scrapped due to lack of response from initial contacts.

1991 Goals

Plans set for the coming year include:

1. Workshop leadership in district local church leader training events.
2. Further study of the COCU proposal and dissemination of information concerning the proposal, as well as development of interpretation teams for local churches and districts.
3. Attendance at the National Christian Unity Workshop.
4. Sponsorship of Dr. Gerald Moede as an interpreter of the COCU covenant proposal at the 1991 Peninsula Annual Conference.
5. Continued support of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency.

DELMARVA ECUMENICAL AGENCY

The excitement of working for Christian Unity is bringing people together so they can know each other better as Christians and work together in service to those in need. That is the mission of the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency. Christ calls us to live together as closely as Father, Son and Holy Spirit in love and service.

D.E.A. carried on its work through formal ministries and special projects. A recent survey conducted by the agency indicated a priority of resources that local congregations wanted help with. Helping the homeless, ministering to youth, and knowing where to refer people in need were at the top of the list. With the financial assistance of Maryland Bank, we published a directory for emergency and transitional housing on the peninsula containing 44 listings. For the youth, we plan to work with the churches to organize trips in the summer to New York and Washington, DC visiting ecumenical and denominational centers of ministry. Helping church people find out how to help people in need was the subject of three conferences on the peninsula in October. At these conferences, participants developed their skills of effective interviewing, formulating guidelines for handling requests, and knowing what community resources are available to assist the needy. These will be repeated in 1990.

Community groups as well as the churches have used the up-to-date D.E.A. mailing list of congregations on the peninsula to communicate available services from cancer treatment to assistance to children and the elderly.

D.E.A. organized a conference for religious leaders to learn about current demographic and economic projections for the Delmarva Peninsula with an eye toward establishing new congregations.

D.E.A. staff serves on the local board of FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency), which has distributed \$1,371,971 over the last six years for food and shelter for the needy in Delaware. The executive director staffs the monthly meeting of the religious leaders of northern Delaware. This year, he produced three reports for them: Religious Services in Correctional Institutions, Services in Mental Hospitals, and A Plan to Nominate Members of the Religious Community to State Health and Human Service Advisory Boards.

D.E.A. has promoted special events through the year, for example: the "Housing Now" March on Washington (October 7, 1989) and the Week of Prayer/Ecumenical Sunday in January. Judy Berry staffs the office.

In such ways as these, we help make the unity we have in Christ more visible.

D.E.A. MINISTRIES

A.I.D.S. MINISTRY:

The purpose of the AIDS Ministry is to offer preventative education to the churches and to develop support for the compassionate ministry to people with AIDS. Episcopalians, Lutherans, Presbyterians, and United Methodists were active in this effort. The Rev. Clifford Armour is chairperson. We have recently published and distributed an AIDS packet to 450 clergy and congregations on the peninsula.

FAITH & ORDER COMMITTEE:

The participants were: Episcopal, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Roman Catholic, and United Methodist. Consultations on the understanding of Christian Ministry among the congregations were held in Princess Anne, Salisbury and Easton, Maryland, as well as in Milford, Wilmington, Claymont, Greenville, Hockessin, and Sussex County, Delaware. The committee's next project was to produce a similar consultation on the "Baptism" section of the "BEM document. In the meantime, the Faith and Order Committee held sessions on the church and racism.

MINISTRY FOR PUBLIC POLICY:

D.E.A. exercises a ministry for public policy in Delaware and Maryland. Denominations participating are: Lutheran, Presbyterian, Roman Catholic, United Church of Christ and United Methodist. The Delaware Ministry for Public Policy's major effort during the past year was a conference on welfare reform which it sponsored. Beyond this program, the ministry advocated for the needy with the government with the help of twenty-five congregational contact persons.

In Maryland, similar advocacy through the Maryland Interfaith Legislative Committee achieved these results:

- o An additional \$3 million for recipients of General Public Assistance and Aid to Families with Dependent Children.
- o \$3.5 million in new state funds for additional job training.

D.E.A. RESOURCE CENTER

Elaine B. Stout, Director

The 3,000 holdings of the resource center, including an extensive listing of video tapes, have been used by over 1,000 persons from the 130 member congregations on the peninsula and others. Services were provided at five sites: Wilmington, Dover, Georgetown, Easton and Salisbury. The Interfaith Lay Academy held classes at these tow locations in New Castle County, Delaware. One hundred persons attended. A religious educators' support group met bi-monthly.

OTHER D.E.A. ACTIVITIES

Ecumenical Award:

Each year, in a different region of the peninsula, the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency presents an ecumenical award to an individual for promoting Christian unity. This year, the presentation was made in Northern Delaware at a dinner on November 9, 1989.

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As the ecumenical agency serving Delaware and Maryland's Eastern Shore, we work with other groups to serve the needs of persons in this area. Among them are:

1. Casa San Francisco (302) 684-8694 - feeding the hungry and providing emergency shelter in Sussex County.
2. Clinical Pastoral Education (302) 421-6234 - at the Delaware State Hospital.
3. Delaware Interfaith Coalition on Aging (302) 764-2393 - serving our senior citizens.
4. Delaware Coalition for the Homeless (302) 762-6111 - works on problems of homelessness and decent affordable housing in Delaware.
5. Delmarva Rural Ministries (302) 678-2000 - serving migrant workers in Delaware and Maryland.
6. Food Conservers, Inc. (302) 654-5214 - feeding the hungry.
7. Habitat for Humanity Salisbury, MD (301) 749-5109; New Castle Co., DE (302) 479-0128 - rehabilitates or builds one house at the time with the work of volunteers.
8. Interfaith Housing Task Force (302) 654-7180 - is an arm of denominations and congregations in Delaware for low income housing.
9. Kent Ecumenical Food & Crisis Fund (302) 422-6408 - feeds the hungry and provides emergency shelter in Kent County, DE.
10. Meeting Ground (301) 275-8990 - provides crisis housing and many kinds of support for the needy.
11. National Conference of Christians and Jews (302) 655-0039 - for mutual

programs.

12. Pacem in Terris (302) 656-2721 - to promote peace.
13. Public Assistance Task Force (302) 762-5621 - helps the poor in Delaware.

In these ways, we have pursued our goal to make more visible the unity we have in Christ in 1989. Our specific objectives for 1991 will be to strengthen or develop county-based ministries in cooperation with local congregations.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

The Commission on Equitable Salaries has continued to provide financial assistance to those pastors whose charges, for various reasons, are unable to provide the minimum compensation set by The Peninsula Annual Conference. In addition, the Commission continues to award financial supplements to those pastors who special talents are required to effectively serve their respective appointments. In 1989, pastors in 46 charges received salary supplements of \$130,824.91 plus pension fund contributions of \$21,192.26 for a total of \$152,017.17. Also, furniture grants totaling \$4,000.00 were awarded.

Reimbursing pastors for miles traveled on Church business is a policy established by this conference. Therefore, the Commission recommends the following:

BE IT RESOLVED that reimbursement for travel expense during 1991 shall be 26 cents per mile. In addition, we also recommend that pastors be reimbursed for tolls and parking expenses incurred in the performance of pastoral duties.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

The 1989 year has had a change of leadership and addition of some new members who worked very effectively in helping to accomplish some significant interaction this past conference year.

The Racial Inclusiveness Committee under the leadership of Mr. Joseph Threadgill, conducted on each district, a series of racial dialogues, which helped to raise the consciousness of many persons regarding racial inclusiveness within the churches and districts in which they are a part. This was a good beginning but is far from being an effort completed.

The monitoring committee in cooperation with the C.O.S.R.O.W., sent out survey's to the majority of the boards and agencies regarding their inclusiveness in number, in meeting, in decision making process, and ideal regarding positive and negative needs within the areas of services. It is important that each person on our boards and agencies be accountable to be in meeting, and to be good stewards to themselves and conference, as in many meetings important decisions are needed to be made. The monitoring committee met with Wesley College Boards to encourage them to be more sensitive to inclusiveness as they fill the vacancies within the college. The Monitoring Committee's new chairperson is the Rev. Karen Booth.

The education committee, under the leadership of Mrs. Doris Thompson, once again presented an outstanding Martin Luther King, Jr. Symposium at Whatcoat in Dover, using the theme, "Our Christian Mission and the Unfinished Agenda." There was a panel discussion, "Racism and its effects in the Peninsula Conference in the last 25 years."

The Lowan Pitts awards were presented to Carrie Brown and Pauline

Wilkins, for contributions in race relations as it relates to church and community. The Richard Wynder Award; for contributions in race relations as it relates to church and education, to Mr. James C. Hardcastle. The Alberta Brown Award; for contributions in race relations and inclusiveness as it relates to conference work, to Mrs. Barbara Ricks Thompson, General Secretary of the Commission on Religion and Race. The Martin Luther King, Jr. Award; the highest award for outstanding achievement in race relations as it relates to church in conference, local church, education and community, to Rev. Vaughn Johnson and Rev. Gordon Stapleton.

1991 Goals

1. To train through Racial Identity Seminars using national leaders, beginning in the latter part of 1990 and the first part of 1991; Beginning with the Program Management Team and the C.C.O.M. and continuing in the latter part of the year with the pastors and their mates and then into each district.
2. To provide training for each local C.O.R.R. or outreach person with a training period of four to six weeks.
3. To continue dialogue training and utilize resources for inclusiveness.
4. To design events regarding inclusiveness that will also involve youth and children.
5. To include in the Martin Luther King, Jr. event a part or parts of service including youth and children.
6. To develop an instrument whereby we can monitor the progress of the comprehensive plan.
7. To continue to sensitize and monitor all boards and agencies, colleges that are in some way related to The United Methodist Church.
8. To continue to provide training for C.O.R.R. members through jurisdictional and national events.

COMMISSION ON THE STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

Spring conversations among COSROW, the Commission on Religion and Race, and the Wesley College Board of Trustees, produced an agreement on several ways to promote greater inclusiveness. President Steward invited CORR and COSROW to share highlights of the agreement at the Corporate Session of Wesley College.

The Board of Laity and COSROW provided a training exercise at Annual Conference to help lay members understand how to make motions, participate in discussion and raise questions. COSROW also assisted greater participation by providing a team of resource persons to assist members throughout each session and by facilitating care for children of conference members and for the mate's lunch. Members of the Board of Laity and CORR helped COSROW tally floor and platform participation. A child care survey for the 1990 Annual Conference revealed several members desiring help as well as some concern for assistance with elder care.

The fall retreat tested a district training model designed by Harvey Manchester. COSROW enlisted pastors to help recruit local church SRW chairpersons and supply their names and addresses to the commission in order for personal invitations to reach as many as possible. Six COSROW members shared leadership responsibilities for the February 1990 workshops, which were well attended. The model was successful in generating enthusiasm and ideas for local church application.

Results of the joint CORR/COSROW survey of conference boards, divisions, commissions and committees were shared with CCOM and the Committee on Nominations in hopes that recruits can be found to provide greater inclusiveness. The survey will be repeated in 1990 to try to achieve more complete returns.

COSROW has supplied each district superintendent with a video on local church concerns relating to clergywomen for use with pastor-parish relations committees.

We have made great headway during 1989 in updating our financial record-keeping, thanks to the volunteer work of our treasurer, James Beall. Our records are far more detailed and centralized than ever before, which will make possible a considerable savings in audit fees.

One of the on-going responsibilities is the administration of over sixty Charitable Gift Annuities and individual Trusts, which includes the regular sending of

checks, and the preparation of tax reports.

Although we are small, among the many foundations of our denomination, we believe that your foundation has great potential to serve God's Kingdom as we work with your church. Seed ideas, planted in the minds of people during planned giving training session, may not bear fruit for months or years. Neither does one have apples, until the tree has been planted and nurtured. In either case, it all has to start somewhere. Let us help you plant the financial future of your church. We stand ready to serve you, as together we serve the LORD.

THE TRI-CONFERENCE UNITED METHODIST CONSTRUCTION SERVICES, INC.

The Tri-Conference United Methodist Constructions Services, Inc. (TCCS, Inc.) is a cooperative effort between the Southern New Jersey, the Peninsula and the Eastern Pennsylvania Conferences. TCCS, Inc., and has been established to assist Churches in realizing their dreams of new construction or renovation of church facilities. The purpose of this ministry is to offer guidance and direction to all church related construction needs.

Throughout the last year, over 50 churches in the tri-conference area have been assisted with their building and renovation projects. Ten (10) of these churches have become major projects using the full Project Management Services of TCCS, Inc. for their Owner/Builder Programs. Many churches have received assistance on a smaller scale, using TCCS, Inc. on a consultation basis when they feel the need for guidance or direction. All of these churches have different and varying needs which dictate the level of Service involvement.

Each church is encouraged to use all of their available resources and to obtain high levels of congregational participation in their programs. This achieves two important goals: An effective, cost efficient building program and exciting fellowship and ministry for the congregation.

The use of available internal resources, the Owner/Builder program and congregational participation on all levels from a volunteer laborer to making design decisions all add to the lowering at the costs of building programs for churches, many of which would not be able to realize their dreams without the incorporation of these cost saving measures.

WASHINGTON AREA COMMITTEE ON EPISCOPACY

One of the most important features of each meeting of the Committee on Episcopacy is Bishop Yeakel's report on the Key Result Areas that govern his ministry among us. These are presented each quadrennium and have been affirmed by our committee as embracing the broad scope of a bishop responsibility. In order that both annual conferences might better understand the breadth of our bishops work-life, the areas are listed here:

- o Celebrating the Good News
 - embraces all those functions of ministry expressed in the public worship of God by reading the Scriptures, preaching the Word, and administering the Sacraments.
- o Human Resource Development
 - embraces all those functions of ministry related to discovering, equipping,

deploying, evaluating and shepherding the gifts and graces found in persons, both lay and clergy.

- o Area/Conference Administration
 - embraces all those functions of ministry related to planning, organizing, staffing, resourcing, coordinating and controlling spiritual and temporal affairs.
- o General Church Oversight
 - embraces all those functions of ministry related to general superintendency within The United Methodist Church beyond the Area/Conference.
- o Ecumenical and Interreligious Witness
 - embraces all those functions of ministry related to Episcopal involvement with other religious traditions and faiths.
- o Christian Presence in Public Life
 - embraces all those functions of ministry which find expression in society beyond the normal framework of the church.

This year, in addition to the normal workload in the annual conferences, Bishop Yeakel's responsibilities have taken him into the Oval Office at the White House and an appearance to testify before a Congressional committee. He annually reports to the Committee on Episcopacy the results of personal study program in lieu of quadrennial leave.

This committee also have oversight of the budget for the Area Episcopal Office. The General Church Episcopal Fund provides approximately 2/3rds of the cost and the two conferences share the cost on a 70/30 basis.

A major topic of discussion and planning has been the possible realignment of area and the cooperation necessary should this take place September 1990. Transition teams from both conferences are meeting jointly to work out details. The Committee wishes to point out to the two conferences that this proposal for realignment by the NEJ College of Bishops came from a paper prepared by the NEJ Committee on Episcopacy. This paper, "Visions of the Office of the Bishop in the Year 2000 Northeastern Jurisdiction" deals with the nature of the Northeastern Jurisdiction, and reflects on the functions of the office of bishop. It encourages us to think strategically about what that office will look like in the 21st Century. The paper also recommends an additional number of bishops for this jurisdiction to be centered in major metropolitan centers.

We would also report that we have met with Bishop Felton May who reviewed with us his goals and objectives as the leader of the Bishops' Initiative on Drugs. A high point came as this program began in a service of commitment and dedication at Asbury United Methodist Church, Washington, D.C. supported by the churches of the area and civic leaders of the city of Washington.

We commend to the conferences our bishop who lives among us sharing the

full energies of his life and who is faithful to the mandate that The United Methodist Church lays upon him. We ask God's continued blessing on Bishop and Mrs. Yeakel as they carry on the work of the church among us.

CONFERENCE RULES OF ORDER

Rule 1: The Conference shall convene and adjourn at the discretion of the presiding Bishop and the Committee on Conference Arrangements. The Conference in plenary session may alter the time of convening or adjourning.

Rule 2: The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the grounds of his/her appeal.

Rule 3: All resolutions, motions, amendments, and substitute motions presented at the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.

Rule 4: When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule 5: No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:

1. To fix the time in which the Conference shall adjourn.
2. To adjourn.
3. To take a recess.
4. To lay on the Table.
5. For the previous question.
6. To postpone to a given time.
7. To refer.
8. To substitute.
9. Amendment.
10. To postpone indefinitely.

Rule 6: A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.

Rule 7: When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, she/he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him/her.

Rule 8: No member shall be interrupted while speaking except by the President to call him/her to order when she/he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when she/he deems a speaker out of order,

and any member may explain when she/he thinks herself/himself misrepresented.

Rule 9: When a member desires a question of privilege, she/he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for her/him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged question.

Rule 10: No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule 11: When any motion or resolution shall have been acted by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debate.

Rule 12: No member shall absent herself/himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless she/he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule 13: No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule 14: Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his/her vote, unless the Conference, for special reason, shall excuse him/her.

Rule 15: It shall be in order for him/her to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.

Rule 16: The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending or seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.

Rule 17: All reports of the Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall be published and mailed to members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must be in the hands of the Secretary by the date set annually by the Conference Council on Ministries.

Rule 18: No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.

Rule 19: These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of two-thirds of the members present and voting.

Rule 20: All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary not later than 14 days following the adjournment of the Annual Session or they shall be excluded, the date to be part of the Organizational motion of the Annual Conference.

Rule 21: The Nominating Committee shall distribute copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Annual Conference.

Rule 22: Recommendations as to change in policy regarding data to be included in the Journal shall be determined by the Journal Committee and submitted to the Annual Conference for action.

Rule 23: With the exception of the Board of Ordained Ministry, no member of any Board, Division, Committee, or Commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said Board, Division, Committee, or Commission, and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one quadrennium has elapsed except members of board, committees or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has lapsed and except that when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term she/he may complete the unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. Persons elected to the Board of Ordained Ministry may serve eight (8) years regardless of what year in the quadrennium they begin serving. No member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall be elected to serve on more than two Boards, Divisions, Committees, or Commissions concurrently, except the committees elected or appointed for the Annual Conference session only, district committees whether or not elected by the Annual Conference and the quadrennial committee of the local church. The distribution of membership shall be according to districts, three lay persons and three ministers as nearly as possible to each district.

Rule 24: Lay members of the Annual Conference will be elected quadrennially. A lay member may be re-elected for another quadrennium but must wait one quadrennium before being eligible for election for a third term.

Rule 25: In order to achieve balanced membership in the Annual Conference, the Conference Secretary shall report quadrennially the number of lay persons required to preserve equality of membership, and that the Peninsula Conference achieve the desired equality of membership, by (1) the Associate Lay Leader of Life and Work, the four District Lay Leaders, the four District Presidents of the United Methodist Women, the four District Presidents of United Methodist Men, all United Methodist Deaconesses active and retired within the bounds of the Peninsula Annual Conference, all certified Directors of Christian Education employed by churches of the Peninsula Annual Conference, and all other voting lay persons of the Conference Council on Ministries, shall be members in the Annual Conference with vote; (2) each pastoral charge enrolling more than 500 members, but having only one clergy member appointed to it, may elect one additional lay member, and further, that a pastoral charge having more than one clergy member appointed to it may elect one additional lay member, provided that more than 1,500 members are enrolled; and (3) the Conference Council on Youth Ministries shall elect as many youth members as needed to maintain a balance, divided equally among the districts.

Rule 26: All budget requests must be referred to the Council on Finance and Administration prior to Annual Conference action.

Rule 27: All statistical material for inclusion in the Statistical Tables to be printed in the Annual Journal must be in by January 30 or it will not be included.

Rule 28: In keeping with paragraph 746 in the 1988 Book of Discipline which states "A District Conference shall be held if directed by the Annual Conference of which it is a part and may be held upon the call of the district superintendent, which call shall specify time and place," a district superintendent may call a District Conference with the consent of the presiding Bishop and the District Lay Leader. This rule will be reviewed quadrennially at the Annual Conference following each session of the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference.

Bishop John Wesley Lord

Bishop John Wesley Lord of the Washington Area 1960-72 once remarked that with a name like his, "how could he fail to become a bishop." But there was much more to his 1948 election to the episcopacy than his name. Born August 23, 1902 in the manufacturing city of Paterson, New Jersey, he was called to the ministry from teaching. He further prepared himself at Dickinson and Drew with advanced study at Edinburgh and Rutgers. His pastoral career in Northern New Jersey 1931-48 led to his selection for the Boston Area and effectual service there including Presidency of the Massachusetts Council of Churches and vice-chairmanship of the Visitors Committee for Harvard Divinity School.

In the general church his executive posts included Presidency of the Council of Bishops, the Board of Pensions, the Board of Temperance and the Methodist Corporation.

When he was named Bishop of Washington, Mrs. Lord, the former Margaret Ratcliffe, burst into tears; but his leadership brought the Washington and Baltimore Conferences together on equitable terms and gave new meaning to the struggle for racial equality when he and other Washington preachers marched arm in arm with Dr. Martin Luther King at Selma, Alabama. Later he joined other clerics in opposition to the Viet Nam War.

Fearless in his opposition to perceived evils and social and spiritual maladies, Bishop Lord spoke early and often on a variety of personal and cultural issues. He led district evangelistic rallies in 1967, preached from a boat, promoted the Consultation on Church Union, advocated interfaith cooperation, went on a World Peace Tour in 1968, dedicated and consecrated scores of church buildings, and was master of ceremonies at a Memorial Service for slain President Kennedy at Lincoln Memorial in 1963.

In opposing prayer and Bible reading in schools he told a House Committee that "Public school teachers can teach moral principles and spiritual values by precept and example without violating separation of church and state." Of his own upbringing he wrote in 1965, "The family altar, the prayer meeting, the Sunday Services were inherited, also ... tolerance, a forgiving spirit, a love of others and high and holy standards of living."

The Pastoral Counseling Service, the Medical Expense Plan and Legislative sections were introduced in the Baltimore Conference at his urging. As the conference grew by merger, he once presided at perhaps the only split level session in Methodist history with closed circuit TV linking the Metropolitan sanctuary and undercroft and DS Jack Foy wielding the gavel downstairs. After Methodist-EUB union he ably guided merger of the Baltimore, Susquehanna and Virginia Conferences in the new United Methodist Church.

As Program Chair of the Methodist Bicentennial in BALTIMORE 1966 he and Gov. McKeldin persuaded President Lyndon Johnson to speak along with Cardinal Shehan and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

By his leadership advanced giving was recorded during the Urgent Needs Crusade 1964-67 and new Sibley and Maryland General Hospitals erected facilities while American University added dormitories, the Spiritual Life Center and Western Maryland College a new library. Wesley Theological Seminary also completed its campus while he chaired the Board of Governors.

After retiring in 1972, the Bishop coordinated the "Bishop's Call for Peace and Self Development of Peoples." Later, he preached often in New Hampshire each summer and ministered around Lakeland, Florida in winter. He died unexpectedly October 8, 1989 in Wolfeboro, New Hampshire and was buried there, leaving an appreciative wife, his daughter, Jean Cooper, of Indiana and hosts of friends and associates to mourn his passing and to laud his accomplishments. The WASHINGTON POST headlined his work for Civil Rights in a lengthy obituary, and Bishop James K. Mathews eulogized him in the Council of Bishops.

Harry Hanson Conner

Harry Hanson Conner was born to Nellie (Hanson) and Robert G. Conner on July 17, 1906, in Wilmington, Delaware. He was one of five boys and two girls.

Nellie and Robert Conner and their children attended Madeley Methodist Church in South Wilmington. They took a vital leadership role in its life and mission. This along with his parents' christian devotion led Harry to accept Jesus Christ as personal savior. Although Harry dropped out of high school to go to work, he felt led to the ministry. He attended Wesley Collegiate College, Dover, Delaware to finish his high school education.

Harry married Betsy Ann Faulkner in 1942. To them was born one son, Harry F. During his pastorate he found children in many families who had never been baptized. Through this contact families return to their church. Harry felt the future of the church rested in securing christian teachers for Sunday school and vacation Bible school. He encouraged teacher-training classes for new teachers. It was not unusual to have 100 to 150 vacation Bible school students in attendance in community churches.

While serving as Pastor of Holly Oak United Methodist Church, he solicited pledges for \$20,000 to purchase the old Chapel from Bainbridge, Md. as a base for a new place of worship. Harry Conner's untiring efforts led him ever on to succeed not only in the love, work, and devotion to his God; but, also, to his family and fellowman. He believed in honesty and loyalty to Christ and others.

After Harry Conner's retirement in 1964, he accepted a position with Field Enterprise, Inc., producers of "World Book" and "Childcraft." Education he taught was vitally important in the life of each individual.

Before moving into the Methodist Country House in July of 1989, Harry and Betsy lived in their home in Bestfield, Wilmington, Delaware for twenty-six years.

Edward J. Hemphill, Jr.



Ed Hemphill was born in New Castle, Delaware on 19 September 1912. After graduating from high school in 1931, he attended Beacon College in Wilmington, Delaware. There he earned a B.A. in Accounts.

At an early age, Ed decided he wanted to be a minister. This meant working during the day and attending college at night and in the summer. For 12 years Ed worked in New Jersey, came home to New Castle and traveled by train to Philadelphia to study at Temple. When he finished he had earned one Master's Degree and two Doctorates.

Ed served three years in the Peninsula Conference before joining the Navy in 1943. He married Reba Figley Greer in 1942. Together they lived 31 exciting Navy years—moving 20 times and loving every minute of it. Had two children—Greer and Edward.

During his Navy career, Ed had 10 years of sea duty. In Italy and Greece he was the Supervisory Chaplain. For three years each he was the Chaplain at the Naval Postgraduate School at Monterey, California and the Armed Forces Staff College at Norfolk, Virginia. He served as Chaplain at two Training Centers—first at Quantico, Virginia then at Orlando, Florida. While in D.C. for 10 years, Ed was Director of the Special Projects and Chaplain Corp's Planning Group. He wrote eight Chaplain Corp publications. In 1968 he was selected "Chaplain of the Year."

Ed devoted his Navy life to serving young men between the age of 17–25. He loved them and enjoyed their challenge.

In May of 1974 Ed retired from the Navy while we were in Greece. That's when he decided he should learn something about his peers. Thus a new career was begun and it was all volunteer—no pay.

From the University of Florida Ed earned a Doctorate in Behavioral Science. Because of his new interest in retirees and the elderly, we moved to Sun City West, Arizona. Immediately he attended USC and got a Post Doctoral Certification in Gerontology from the Andrus Gerontology Center.

Ed never stopped learning. He kept abreast of the latest innovations by reading and study became involved in all forms of community life—always trying to improve the conditions for the elderly locally, statewide and nationally.

Here are some of Ed's activities.

Advisor for human service and educational programs and consultant for planning, developing, and demonstrating Older Adult Ministries.

Committee Chairman, Flinn Learning Resource Center, Beatitudes Center D.O.A.R. and Center Workshops Leader.

Program design and training sessions for the Grand Canyon Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church.

Field Director of the Sun Cities area for the Long Term Care Gerontology Center, University of Arizona.

Member of the Policy Committee and of the Religious Activities Committee, American Society on Aging.

Interreligious Liaison Volunteer Consultant, AARP.

Program Chairman, Arizona Governor's Conference on Aging, 1989.

Speaker and training sessions for church groups, service and fraternal clubs, social and professional clubs.

Member Professional Advisory Boards for Hospice and Continuing Care Retirement Communities.

Dr. Hemphill was a scholar, a minister, an educator, a dedicated Christian and a lover of people—especially, older people who were hurting.

He was much in demand as a speaker and a retreat leader for adult groups dealing with the welfare of the older citizen. He was an advocate of critical issues concerning the aging population. Realizing that aging is a primary fact of life, he sought to meet the needs of older people locally, statewide and nationally.

He was active in Meals on Wheels, Human Services Committee for Maricopa County and the Association of Gerontologists. He was a member of the board of the Sun City Community Council. He was a volunteer consultant—religious liaison for AARP. He was a member of the Foundation Board of Camelot Community Hospice and wrote the motto under which the Hospice serves—"If Cure is not possible: comfort always." He was a member of DOAR advisory council—Chairman of Education. He was on the Health Advisory Council of Glencroft Care Center. He was a member of the Sun City Ministerial Association. He was the 1988 Program Chairman for the Governor's Conference on Aging.

Ed was not one to conform. His active mind was always exploring new and different ideas. He loved one of David Frost's poems and it ends this way:

"I took the road less traveled by, And that made all the difference."

This was Ed. He believed he was put on this earth to develop to its highest whatever capacity he had and to help others do the same with their capacities.




