III. Conference Bules Of Order

- Rule 1: The Conference shall convene and adjourn at the discretion of the presiding Bishop and the Committee on Conference Arrangements. The Conference in plenary session may after the time of convening or adjourning.
- Rule 2: The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such an appeal the question shall be taken without debate, except that the appellant may make a simple statement of the crounds of his/her appeal.
- Rule 3: All resolutions, motions, amendments, and substitute motions presented at the Annual Conference shall be submitted to the Secretary in writing at the time they are made or as soon thereafter as possible.
- Rule 4: When a motion is made and seconded, or a resolution is introduced and seconded, or a report presented and read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of the Conference at any time before amendment or decision.

No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under

- consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene which shall have precedence in the order in which they are placed, namely:
 - 1. To fix the time in which the Conference shall adjourn.
 - 2. To adjourn.

Rule 5

- 3. To take a recess.
- 4. To lay on the Table.
- 5. For the previous question.
- 6. To postpone to a given time.
- 7. To refer
- 8. To substitute.
- 9. Amendment.
 - 10. To postpone indefinitely.
- Rule 6: A motion to amend shall be in order, and a substitute for both amendments may be received which substitute may be amended only once, and if a substitute be accepted, it shall operate as an amendment to the original proposition.
- Rule 7: When a member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, she'he shall rise and respectfully address the President, but shall not proceed until recognized by him/her.
- Rule 8: No member shall be interrupted while speaking except by the President call him/her to order when she/he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when she/he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain when she/he thinks hersel/filmiself imisroresented.

- Rule 9: When a member desires a question of privilege, she/he shall briefly state the question; but it shall not be in order for her/him to proceed until the President shall have decided it a privileged duestion.
- Rule 10: No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than ten minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have sooken.
- Rule 11: When any motion or resolution shall have been acted by the Conference, it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider is a non-debatable motion and shall be decided without debata.
- Rule 12: No member shall absent herself/himself from the sessions of the Conference without leave, unless she/he is sick or unable to attend.
- Rule 13: No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar of the Conference at the time when such question shall be put by the President, except by leave of the Conference when such member has been necessarily absent.
- Rule 14: Every member who is within the bar at the time a question is put shall give his/her vote, unless the Conference, for special reason, shall excuse him/her.
- Rule 15: It shall be in order for him/her to move that the question be taken without further debate on any measure pending, except in cases in which character is involved, and if sustained by two-thirds, the question shall be taken.
- Rule 16: The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except, (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or a vote is being taken; (3) when the question is pending or seconding the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and is still pending; and (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived and no business or debate has intervened.
- Rule 17: All reports of the Boards, Commissions, and Committees shall be published and mailed to members of the Annual Conference ten (10) days prior to the date of meeting of the Annual Conference. Reports to be included in this mailing must in the hands of the Secretary by the date set annually by the Conference Council on Ministries.
- Rule 18: No report shall be received or adopted by the Conference until a copy has been placed in the hands of the Secretary.
- Rule 19: These rules shall not be suspended or amended except by a vote of twothirds of the members present and voting.
- Rule 20: All materials to be published in the Journal shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary not later than 14 days following the adjournment of the Annual Session or they shall be excluded, the date to be part of the Organizational motion of the Annual Conference

- Rule 21: The Nominating Committee shall distribute copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Annual Conference.
- Rule 22: Recommendations as to change in policy regarding data to be included in the Journal shall be determined by the Journal Committee and submitted to the Annual Conference for action
- Rule 23: With the exception of the Board of Ordained Ministry, no member of any Board, Division, Committee, or Commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said Board, Division, Committee, or Commission, and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one guadrennium has elapsed except members of board, committees or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has lapsed and except that when a member is elected to fill an unexpired guadrennium or term she/he may complete the unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. Persons elected to the Board of Ordained Ministry may serve eight (8) years regardless of what year in the quadrennium they begin serving. No member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall be elected to serve on more than two Boards, Divisions, Committees, or Commissions, concurrently, except the committees elected or appointed for the Annual Conference session only, district committees whether or not elected by the Annual Conference and the guadrennial committee of the local church. The distribution of membership shall be according to districts. three lay persons and three ministers as nearly as possible to each district
- Rule 24: Lay members of the Annual Conference will be elected quadrennially. A lay member may be re-elected for another quadrennium but must wait one quadrennium before being eligible for election for a third term.
- Rule 25: In order to achieve balanced membership in the Annual Conference, the Conference Secretary shall report quadrennially the number of lay persons required to preserve equality of membership, and that the Peninsula-Delaware Conference achieve the desired equality of membership, by (1) the Associate Lay Leader of Life and Work, the four District Lay Leaders, the four District Presidents of the United Methodist Women, the four District Presidents of United Methodist Men, all United Methodist Deaconesses active and retired within the bounds of the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference, all certified Directors of Christian Education employed by churches of the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference, and all other voting lay persons of the Conference Council on Ministries, shall be members in the Annual Conference with vote; (2) each pastoral charge enrolling more than 500 members, but having only one clergy member appointed to it, may elect one additional lay member, and further, that a pastoral charge having more than one clergy member appointed to it may elect one additional lay member, provided that more than 1,500 members are enrolled; and (3) the Conference Council on Youth Ministries shall elect as many youth members as needed to maintain a balance, divided equally among the districts.
- Rule 26: All budget requests must be referred to the Council on Finance and Administration prior to Annual Conference action.

Rule 27: All statistical material for inclusion in the Statistical Tables to be printed in the Annual Journal must be in by January 30 or it will not be included.

Rule 28: In keeping with paragraph 746 in the 1988 Book of Discipline which states *\(^1\) District Conference shall be held if directed by the Annual Conference of which it is a part and may be held upon the call of the district superintendent, which call shall specify time and place, *\(^1\) a district superintendent may call a District Conference with the consent of the presiding Bishop and the District Lay Leader. This rule will be reviewed quadrennially at the Annual Conference following each session of the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference

Rules and Guidelines for the Conference Nominating Committee

Δ

- That the Peninsula-Delaware Conference again record its faith in the Principle
 of Rotation and adherence to the Book of Discipline of The United Methodist
 Church.
- 2. That the Nominating Committee be composed of the Cabinet, the Conference Secretary, the Conference Lay Leader, the Lay Leader of each District, the Conference President of United Methodist Men, a representative selected by the United Methodist Women Executive Committee, the District Presidents of United Methodist Women, a youth selected by the Conference Youth Council, one minister under appointment from each District to be elected for a quadrennium by the respective District Ministerium, and the Conference Council Director.
- 3. That, since the quadrennial system is an established part of the United Methodist economy, all members of boards, commissions, and committees shall be elected for a quadrennium unless restricted by Discipline, charter, or some other legal requirement. In the event of such legal restrictions, the Principle of Rotation is still to be observed.
- 4. That no member of any board, committee, or commission shall serve more than two consecutive quadrennia on said board, committee or commission and shall not be eligible to be re-elected until after one quadrennium has elapsed, except members of boards, committees, or commissions elected for three-year terms may serve three consecutive terms and shall be ineligible to be re-elected until after one term has elapsed and except that, when a member is elected to fill an unexpired quadrennium or term and serve not more than one additional consecutive quadrennium or term. See Conference Rule #23, page 413, 1987 Conference, Journal.
- 5 That no member of the Conference, lay or ministerial, shall serve on more than two boards, commissions, or committees concurrently. Ex-officio membership on conference boards or agencies in excess of two shall count toward the total of two. The following shall not be under the Conference rotation system nor counted in the above total: district committees or secretaries. Wesley College Trustees, Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundations, Board of Trustees of Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc., the Episcopal Residence Committee, and the Committee on Investigation. In the case of the Board of Ordained Ministry, the Nominating Committee is to request the courtesy of the bishop to inform it as to those persons who will be named to the Board of Ordained Ministry, in order to assist the Nominating Committee in equal distribution of responsibility on the part of the Conference ministry members. The Nominating Committee will consider membership on the Board of Ordained Ministry as one of two memberships permitted to each minister.
- Insofar as possible, the membership on Councils, Boards, and Agencies of the Annual Conference shall include one-third clergy, one-third laywomen, and one-third laymen, in keeping with policies for general church agencies, except for the Board of Ordained Ministry.

- 7. That ministerial membership on Annual Conference boards and agencies shall be limited to Conference members and associate members of the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference. In order to be eligible to serve on the Conference boards and agencies, lay members shall be members of a local church within the Annual Conference. The Conference Norminating Committee may select other persons as affiliate members without vote.
- 8. "In recognition of the Rights of the Aging" as stated in the Social Principles of the United Methodist Church (Page 98 of the 1988 <u>Book of Discipline</u>), age shall not be a barrier to serve on any board, council, or agency of the Annual Conference. However, the Conference Nominating Committee shall give careful attention to assuring that younger members of the Conference are given full opportunity for service.
- That a conscientious effort shall be made to distribute membership geographically. No fixed number shall be assigned, however, to any one district, since this could become artificial and impractical. Consideration shall be given to the inclusion of lay and clergy persons from small membership churches.
- That one representative of the Program Management Team shall be selected to serve on each Conference board and on all other support agencies except where the Book of Discipline states otherwise.
- 11. That failure to attend the particular board or agency to which one is assigned for at least one called meeting during the year, without written explanation, or statement of intended activity to the chairperson of that board or agency, one will be subject to automatic removal in the next nominating committee's report. A report of the board or agency chairperson to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee by March 1st will include the attendance record of this board, committee or or agency.
- 12. That the Conference Nominating Committee designate persons to serve as Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, and Secretary for Boards, Commissions and Committees. Boards and Committee members will be notified in advance of their officer nominations. The Program Management Team Member assigned to each unit will convene the first meeting and present the nominations of officers. Additional nominations may be received from the members of that unit. The officers elected at the meeting shall serve for the quadrennium. "Except where the Book of Discipline directs otherwise, the Vice-Chairperson will succeed the Chairperson in the event of a resignation. The board or commission shall elect a new Vice-Chairperson."

The following Criteria for Leadership shall be used in the selection of Chairperson:

- Willingness to commit time as required by the position.
- Willingness to commit time for training for the responsibilities of the office.
- Have an understanding of and a willingness to support the polity of the United Methodist Church.
 - . A demonstrated leadership ability in the local church.
- That the date of election to any board, commission or committee be clearly indicated in the journal.

- 14. That in every case a nominee of any board, commission or committee shall be notified and consent to serve before the name is placed before the Conference. When vacancies occur in the report, nominations may be made from the floor, provided that the nominee is present and agrees to serve.
- 15. That recognizing again the belief in the principle of rotation in order to involve greater leadership, all district committees and officers shall be elected to four-year lerms with a maximum of eight years and persons shall be ineligible for re-election until after a four-year term has elapsed, with the exception of the District Committee of Ordained Ministry and the District Committee on Church Building and Location which shall serve a minimum of four years and a maximum of eight years.

Concerning the Nominating Committee, its report and the securing of talent:

- That the report of the Nominating Committee at the Annual Conference session will reflect a complete adherence to all the guidelines established by the Annual Conference.
- The Nominating Committee shall distribute mimeographed copies of its report to the Annual Conference on the day before the report is to be voted on by the Conference.
- 3. That forms shall be circulated for both ministers and laity in local churches to indicate areas of interest, thus creating a Talent Bank. In addition, the same form shall be sent to the members of the Cabinet, Board of Laity, Conference United Methodist Women, Executive Committee, and Conference Youth Council in order to obtain names that might otherwise be overlooked. These forms shall be returned to the secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee.
- 4. That a complete file of all ministers in the Conference should be kept indicating where each one is serving in terms of Conference boards and agencies. Laity should likewise be listed on a similar file. A third file would be divided between ministers and laity as part of the Conference Talent Bank.
- 5. That a minimum of four meetings per year should be held by the Nominating Committee (it may be advisable that the committee meet more often, since its influence is so broad; whenever the committee approaches a new quadrennium, this latter need for additional meetings may be more evident).
- That the above adopted guidelines for the Nominating Committee of the Annual Conference shall become a printed part of its report at each Annual Conference session.
- That at the beginning of a new quadrennium, a complete and open look at membership on all boards and agencies shall be initiated by the Conference Nominating Committee and all personnel shall be eligible for re-alignment in accordance with A-5.
- Titles such as "Mrs," "Miss," or "Mr." shall not be used in the preparation of the Nominating Committee report.

Miscellaneous

- That the council director, and associate council directors, not be elected to boards and agencies under the Conference rotation, but serve only as exofficio where assigned by the council director.
- That two high school youth (preferably in the 10th and 11th grades) shall be members of all program boards of the Conference Council and on the Conference Council on Ministries on assignment by the Conference Youth Council.

Others may want to take this route and we outline here the steps involved in case you may not be aware of the procedure.

- (1) All salary and conference apportionments are removed.
- (2) The church drops out of the listing of churches to which pastors are assigned. (We urge the conference to begin a listing of such churches in the journal with the charge conference where they are to report each year. This will allow for proper records and constitutes the historic continuity of these churches.)
- (3) The only services to be held are weddings, funerals, or special occasions.
- (4) One or more special services a year may be held with the offering received to be used for the upkeep of the building.
- (5) The remaining members are transferred to a nearby United Methodist Church for regular worship and church involvement.
- (6) The remaining members become a special committee under the charge conference to plan with the pastor for weddings, funerals, and special days. They also present a written report each year as to services held, money received and how expended, etc.
- (7) This allows the possibility that should population shifts bring people into the area we would simply resume regular services.

(Original motion can be found in the 1973 <u>Journal of the</u> <u>Peninsula Conference</u> on pages 152–153.)

- (8) Beginning with the 1994 Annual Conference, churches seeking Limited Service status will submit the following to the Conference Business Office:
 - a copy of the deed for the property;
 - specific directions for locating the property from a major highway;
 - an 8" x 10" photograph of the church building.
- (9) The Charge Conference to which the Limited Service Church is assigned will furnish the District Superintendent with the names of persons assigned by the Charge Conference to oversee the maintenance of buildings and grounds during the Conference year. When there no longer are persons to be found for this, the Charge Conference may recommend to the District Superintendent that the property be declared Abandoned.
- (10) Where conditions exist that indicate the buildings are no longer property maintained, and where no report to the Charge Conference is made giving valid reasons for the continuation of Limited Service status, the District Superintendent may bring the property before the Annual Conference to declare it Abandoned without further consultation.

Clergy Executive Session, Wednesday, May 31, 1995

Bishop Susan Murch Morrison called the Executive Session to order at 10:27 a.m. in the Wesley College Gymnasium, Dover, Delaware. The report was presented in the context of a worship service.

On behalf of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference Cabinet, James T. Seymour, Dean of the Cabinet, made the following motion, which was properly seconded and passed unanimously:

That the 1995 Executive Clergy Session authorize a mail ballot vote to be scheduled for September 1995 regarding the approval of candidates for local pastor status who will be attending the August 1995 NEJ Interconference Local Pastor's Licensing School.

Jonathan E. Baker, Chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry, gave the response to Question 17 (see the Disciplinary Questions), which was accepted by the Executive Session.

Michaele S. Russell, BOOM Registrar, introduced the new Conference Benefits Manager - Elaine Wilkerson.

PLENARY: Bishop Morrison convened the Two Hundred Eleventh Session of the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference at 11:36 a.m. Bishop Morrison then welcomed and introduced two representatives from the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference, District Superintendents, the Rev. Sandra Forester Dufresne and Dr. Violet Fisher.

ORGANIZATION & PROCEDURAL MOTION: Rev. Dr. Robert Lee Harris, Conference Secretary, presented the motion, which was unanimously approved:

- The voting bar of the Conference is the <u>main level</u> of the Ella Fitzgerald Center for the Performing Arts Auditorium.
- The roll call will be taken by all members signing Roll Call cards at the registration desk.
- C. The printed program is the program of the Conference subject to changes by the Conference President, Bishop Morrison.
- D. All members must have a valid Conference Badge. (Please note: Part-time and Student Local Pastors receive badges for personal identification only. They are not Conference members with voice or vote.)
- Members will be excused from the sessions upon report to the District Superintendent or Secretary.
- F. The Conference Minutes will be made the official <u>Journal</u> of the Conference and the Secretary is authorized to edit and condense the same.
- G. The Reverends Kenneth S. Valentine and John W. Van Tine be appointed as the Committee on Daily Proceedings.

- H. The Boards, Divisions, Commissions, and Committees as printed in the <u>Journal</u> become the Boards, Divisions, Commissions and Committees of the Conference, with such corrections as may be needed.
- All motions to be presented to the Secretary on the forms provided for this purpose prior to or at the time they are presented to the Conference. Forms may be found on the Secretary's desk or secured from an usher.
- J. Resolutions not appearing in the Pre-Conference Booklet or in the Conference Packet be in the hands of the Secretary by 5:00 p.m. on Friday. The petitioner will need to have 600 copies made for distribution to the Conference.

There were 207 Clergy Full Members, 95 Clergy (Associate Members, Full Time Local Pastors, Student Local Pastors and Probationary Members), 276 Lay Members, and 28 Reserve Lay Members registered for Conference.

RULES FOR BALLOTING: Host District Superintendent, Rev. H. Sterling Green, presented the Rules for Balloting, and thanked the Rev. Charles E. Barton, Jr. for his assistance in securing the tellers and making arrangements for the balloting procedures. Motion was approved.

RULES FOR BALLOTING

 Only clergy members in full connection (active and retired) shall be entitled to vote for clergy delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences. Probationary, associate and lay pastors shall not vote.

- Lay members of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference shall be entitled to vote for lay delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences. Duly seated alternate members may vote in the absence of lay members.
- Clergy and lay members shall be entitled to vote only within the Bar of the Conference.
- The number of ministerial and lay delegates to the General Conference shall be determined by the provisions of Para. 602, Book of Discipline:
 - a. The number of clergy and lay delegates to the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference shall be determined by provisions of Para. 614, <u>Book of Discipline</u>; provided that the duly elected delegates to the General Conference shall be delegates to the Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference and additional clergy and lay delegates shall be elected to complete the total number to which the Peninsula-Deleware Annual Conference is entitled (1996 Delegates: General 4 Clergy, 4 Lay; <u>Jurisdictional</u> -- Additional 5 Clergy, 5 Lay).
 - The additional Jurisdictional Conference delegates, in order of their election, shall be reserve delegates to the General Conference.
 - c. After all Jurisdictional Delegates have been elected, additional ballots shall be cast (one lay ballot and one clergy ballot). The three clergy and three lay persons receiving the most votes shall be elected as reserve delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference (Reserve ~ 3 Clergy, 3 Lay).
- 5. Ballots shall contain no more than the number of names of the places to be filled. Ballots containing more names will be invailed. A majority of valid ballots will be necessary for election. When more persons receive a majority than there are places to be filled, the person or persons receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected. A tie vote for a vacancy when only one place remains to be filled will be disregarded and another ballot cast.
- The following ballot variations shall not invalidate other names on the ballot:
 - When there are two or more clergy or lay members of the Conference with the same last name and a ballot fails to contain the Christian name or identifying initials, the name shall be disregarded.
 - When a ballot contains the name of a person already elected, that name shall be disregarded.
 - When a ballot contains the name of a person not eligible to be elected, the name shall be disreparded.
- The ballot page number must correspond with the number of the ballot being taken (ballot page number 1 is used for the first ballot; ballot page number 2 is used for the second ballot; etc.).

The plenary session recessed for lunch at 11:47 a.m. Host Superintendent Green offered grace.

Friday Afternoon, June 9, 1995

LAITY SESSION: The Laity Session of the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference convened in the Ella Fitzgerald Center on the campus of the University of Maryland Eastern Shore, Princess Anne, Maryland. Jack Sparks, Dover District Lay Leader led the

worship service with the theme, "Unity in Ministry." Participating in the service were members of the Dover District Board of Laity, Robert A. Davis, Secretary, and Patricia Dorey, District Secretary for Lay Speakers.

Howard Mason, Conference Lay Leader, welcomed members to this session. He introduced the new 'Reporting Guide for Lay Members of the 1995 Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference' which had been distributed to each member. He outlined the purpose of the Guide as:

- An aid to lay members in recording their experiences and feelings about the events of the Annual Conference.

 A maps of experience lay members to interest the mission.
- A means of encouraging lay members to interpret the mission and ministry of the Church through the Annual Conference.
- A guide in preparing their report and interpreting the actions and business of the 1995 Annual Conference to the local congregations.

He expressed the hope that lay members would find this useful, as they are the vital link between local congregations and the Annual Conference.

Chairperson of the Conference Nominations Committee announced that no nominations were received for the vacant position of Associate Lay Leader; however, there were two nominations from the floor, both from the Salisbury District. Darlene Webster of Asbury UMC, Princess Anne-Mt. Vernon Charge was elected.

Reports were received from United Methodist Men's President, Bill Harmon, and from Robin Farnell, Conterence Director of Lay Speakers. Both spoke of events being considered for the new Conference year, including vists from James Hollis and Zan Holmes, Evangelists, and new training for lay speakers for Hospital/Nursing Home/Shut-in visitation. District reports showed active participation by the laity and successful programs on each district.

Kay Cloud, Chairperson of the Conference Council on Finance & Administration, in her continuing effort to inform the laity of financial concerns within the Conference, explained in detail the Pension Funding, and efforts being made by this conference to honor its obligations especially with regard to pre-1982 pensions.

The meeting was adjourned following the closing prayer by James Marvel of the Dover District.

Chalplain Ron Bell at Wesley College reported on the first Intercampus Retreat for the Peninsula-Delaware Conference held in Ocean City, MD; 86 students, from 6 colleges attended. Rev. Walton Burke presented The Lena McCord Summer Intern, Miss April Jones, from Wiley College, who represented the Black College Fund.

Chripsn. Ledger announced that two Merit Scholarships of \$500 each were awarded to Lisa Muller and Margaret Emory, and a \$1,000 Foundation Scholarship was awarded to Eric Paul McKennon.

Chrpsn. Ledger and Bishop Morrison presented The Francis Asbury Award to Rev. Walton Burke. The report was then received by the Conference.

Results of Ballot #3 were reported: Clergy - one election, Rev. Jonathan Baker; Laity - one election, Kay Cloud. Ballot #4 was taken and sealed to be counted Saturday morning.

COOPERATIVE URBAN MINISTRIES OF SALISBURY: Executive Director, Rev. Donald E. Hamilton presented the report which was received by the Conference.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN UNITY & INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS: Chairperson Howell Wilkins presented the report, and asked Rev. Charles Walter to announce the recipient of The Bishop's Award for Christian Unity, which Bishop Morrison then presented to Rev. Dr. W. Daniel Rich.

Chrpsn. Wilkins then presented to the Conference the resolution entitled <u>PROPOSAL FOR THE ADDPTION OF COVENANT COMMUNION</u> which was adopted. See Adopted Conference Actions for text.

Chrpsn. Wilkins then read a letter, written on behalf of the Conference, to Bishop Robert Mulvee, former Bishop of the Diocese of Wilmington of the Roman Catholic Church, extending best wishes to Bishop Mulvee as he assumes a new appointment to Rhode Island. Letter was accepted by the Conference, and the report was received.

Session adjourned at 9 p.m.; Rev. Howard L. Gordy, Jr., Salisbury District Superintendent, offered the closing prayer.

Saturday Morning, June 10, 1994

PLENARY: Bishop Morrison called the Conference to order at 9:25 am. The first item for business was the report of the Lost Colin Group. The following persons presented the report: Rev. Ron Bell, Mrs. Kay Cloud, Rev. Dr. Bruce Cooke, Rev. Dr. Lehman Tomlin, Jr. Conference members were provided an overview of the Lost Colin Report, and were provided the following information: (1) District Dialogues will be held to further disseminate the Lost Colin Information. (2) Special Session of Annual Conference - October 14, 1995. (3) March 9, 1996 - Special Session of Annual Conference to adopt the proposal for a new Conference structure.

Bishop Morrison thanked the members of the <u>Lost Coin Group</u> for their commitment of time and talent, and also expressed appreciation to consultant, Nan Foltz.

The results of Ballot #4 were reported: Laity - James Hardcastle, elected; Clergy - Rev. Dr. James T. Seymour and Rev. H. Sterling Green, elected. Ballot #5 was then taken.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES: Chairperson John F. Mitchell presented the report, and introduced Rev. Howell Wilkins, to present the report on Spiritual Formation. Rev. Tom Carter gave comments about Camp Pecometh and Drayton Retreat Center. Tammy Ward presented information concerning the 50th Anniversary celebration of Camp Pecometh next year (1996).

Before the 11:00 A.M. worship service, Bishop Morrison reported to the Conference that Harvey Manchester has withdrawn from The United Methodist Church. She expressed appreciation for his ministry, and specifically his leadership concerning the formation of the Lost Coin Group, and asked for the Conference's consent to send a letter to Harvey expressing our best wishes and concern for his future. After receiving Conference consent, Bishop Morrison led in prayer for Harvey.

Saturday Afternoon, June 10, 1995

PLENARY: Bishop Morrison reconvened the session at 2:04 p.m.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION: Ms. Kay P. Cloud, President of CF&A, presented the report and the following recommendations:

- That the 1996 Budget, in the amount of \$5,148,221.00 be adopted. It was passed.
- That 0.38 be the apportionment factor for 1996. It was passed.
- In the event payments on apportionments fall short of the budget, the Council on Finance & Administration shall determine where to adjust the 1996 Budget. It was passed.

Rev. Gary L. Moore made the following motion, which was seconded and adopted:

"that a committee be formed, not to exceed 9 persons, composed of CF&A members and other Conference members, to explore a new way to apportion local churches."

Chrpsn, Cloud then presented the <u>Additional Recommendation From The Council On Finance & Administration</u>, which was passed: 166 For, 156 Against. See Adopted Conference Actions for text.

Chrpsn. Cloud and Treasurer William Westbrook then presented the resolution, <u>Honoring</u>
Of Theodore W. Briggs For Service To The Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference. It
was unanimously approved. See Adopted Conference Actions for text. The entire report
was then received.

Gordon Stapleton made the following motion, which was seconded and adopted:

"that CF&A consider, on a trial basis, providing meals and housing for deceased pastor's spouses who wish to attend Annual Conference."

Results of Ballot #5 were reported. The Laity elected their 5 Jurisdictional Delegates as follows: Lois Rogers, Irene Hoffman, Nancy Leathrum, Willard Russell and Gil Hoffman. There was no Clergy election. Ballot #6 was taken.

<u>BOARD OF PENSIONS:</u> Chairperson Warner J. Clark presented the report and the Pensions Recommendations as follows:

- The Past Service Rate for 1996 be \$318 per year of approved service. It was passed.
- Up to 100% of the pension and disability payments received by a retired
 pastor or pastor on disability be designated as the permitted housing
 allowance for 1996. (I.R.S. restricts this allowance to the pastor. The
 surviving spouse does not qualify.) It was passed.

RESOLUTION RELATING TO RENTAL/HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED OR DISABLED MINISTERS OF THE PENINSULA-DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed ministers: and

WHEREAS, the practice of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of The United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service: and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of their Conference: and

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference:

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received by a disabled minister, during the year of 1996 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of The United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference at the time of his or her retirement or disability.
- 2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of The United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension or benefit funds of the United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

NOTE:

The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount

actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-280, 1971 C.B.92, the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the code as a fental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair ental value of the home, including furnishings and appurenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities. Beginning in 1984, there is no longer a sick pay or disability income exclusion available with respect to disability benefit payments. Therefore, the full amount of disability benefit payments will be taxable income to the reciciont beginning in 1984. (Adopted May 30, 1992)

Rev. Dr. Lawrence Jameson made the following motion, which was seconded and passed:

"that when the Board of Pensions recommends a Past Service Rate increase, the rates for the previous two years be included in parentheses () to provide a frame of reference for voting ourposes."

Chrpsn. Cloud then introduced Elaine Wilkerson, Conference Benefits Manager, and William Westbrook, Conference Treasurer. The CF&A report was received.

Results of Ballot #6: Laity elected the following persons as Alternates to Jurisdictional Conference: Naomi Winchester, Darlene Webb and Marjorie Fields. There was no clergy election. Clergy Ballot #7 was taken.

LAITY ADDRESS: Conference Lay Leader Howard Mason presented the Laity Address.

Results of Clergy Ballot #7: No election. Clergy Ballot #8 was taken and sealed, to be counted after the dinner recess.

Conference members then participated in <u>A Celebration of Merger: A Service of Recommitment And Renewal of Baptism.</u>

Saturday Evening, June 10, 1995

PLENARY: Bishop Morrison reconvened the Conference at 6:35 p.m., and introduced Vivian Otto, representative of Cokesbury (Cokesbury Curriculum Consultant). Ms. Otto then introduced Maryann Draper, who presented a check to Bishop Morrison for the Peninsula-Delaware Conference in the amount of \$9,774.85.

<u>UNITED METHODIST WOMEN:</u> Louise Hess, President, presented the report, and stated that last year Peninsula-Delaware Conference United Methodist Women gave \$125,680.40 for missions. As a denomination, the United Methodist Women contributed more than \$20 million for missions.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE COMPENSATION: Chairperson Douglas M. Ridley presented the report, with the following recommendations:

1. Minimum salary recommendations for 1996:

Full-Time Elder	\$ 20,700
Full-Time Probationary Member	18,800
Associate Member	18,800
Full-Time Local Pastor	17,500
Student Pastor (Local/Probationary Member)	14 800

The minimum salary for Student Pastors will be \$ 14,800 for 1996, unless some smaller figure is agreed upon by the district superintendent, student, and charge, as being appropriate for the work to be performed.

Service increments will be \$125.00 per year up to a maximum of fifteen years service.

(Note: These recommended salary figures represent an average increase of 3.5% over 1995. 1995's increase was 2.3%; 1994's was 3.4%.)

The Commission recommends that the reimbursement for travel expenses during 1996 be at the rate set by the Internal Revenue Service for that year. (The rate for 1995 is \$.30 per mile.)

In addition, we also recommend that pastors be reimbursed for all tolls and parking expenses incurred in the performance of their pastoral duties.

Recommendations 1 & 2 were passed, and the report received.

CORPORATE SESSION OF WESLEY COLLEGE: Mr. John Jardine, Chair of the Board of Trustees called the corporate session to order and introduced Rev. Charlotte Nichols. Chair of the Trustee Development Committee, who presented the following nominees:

Results of Clergy Ballot #9 - Susan Keirn Kester was elected as the fourth General Conference Delegate. Clergy Ballot #10 was taken, sealed, to await counting Sunday morning.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRY: Rev. David Bennett, who has worked with Rev. Sandra Steiner Ball throughout this year, will be the new Conference Youth Coordinator. Rev. Bennett presented Kathryn Hopkins, a member of CCYM, who presented Rev. Sandra Steiner Ball a gift in recognition of her seven years of service as Conference Youth Coordinator.

<u>COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS REPORT:</u> The Rev. H. Sterling Green presented the report which is found in the nominations section of the Journal. After the report was edited, it was adopted. Also, William E. Westbrook, Jr. was nominated, and elected, as Conference Business Manager/Treasurer.

REPORT ON THE CONFERENCE INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE ON HEALTH CARE ISSUES RE PEOPLE OF COLOR: The Rev. Dr. James T. Seymour presented the report which was adopted by the Conference.

Rev. Dr. Thomas Short conducted a special recognition ceremory for Ted Briggs upon his retirement as Conference Business Manager for the past 29 years. Kay Cloud presented a plaque which will hang in the Conference Office. The Conference members gave Ted Briggs a standing ovation for his 29 years of dedicated service to the Conference. The Conference members were invited to a reception in Ted Briggs honor after adjournment.

RESOLUTION TO APPROVE LINE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH AS A CONFERENCE HISTORICAL SITE: Rev. Dr. Mark M. Pruett-Barnett, Chairperson of the Commission on Archives & History presented the resolution, which was adopted. See Adopted Conference Actions for text. Chrpsn. Pruett-Barnett then presented historical awards to Ann Roede, of Hockessin UMC and Barbara Bryant White of Christiana UMC.

RESOLUTION FOR PLANNING AN EPIPHANY VIGIL FOR VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE; The Commission on the Status & Role of Women presented the resolution. Grant Johnson offered the following amendment: "Be It Further resolved that COSROW provide resource materials to educate clergy and laity on this issue." Amendment was properly seconded and adopted. The resolution, as amended, was then adopted. See Adopted Conference Actions for text.

RESOLUTION CONCERNING COUNSELING SUPPORT FOR CLERGY: Wyoming United Methodist Church presented the resolution which was adopted. See Adopted Conference Actions for text.

Results of Clergy Ballot #10: Lawrence Livingston and Charlotte Nichols were elected. Clergy Ballot #11 was taken.

RESOLUTION ON REVISING THE BOOK OF DISCIPLINE'S PARAGRAPH ON ABORTION (71th): Rev. Dr. Michaele Russell presented the resolution on behalf of the Administrative Council of the Greenwood United Methodist Charge. Rev. Edward E. Kester offered a substitute motion stating "that we, as a Conference, affirm the present United Methodist position on abortion." The substitute motion was properly seconded and adooted.

- (2) Whereas the Street United Methodist Church, located at Golden Hill near Church Creek, Dorchester County, MD, was placed on limited service by the Crapo Charge Conference and its building has been demolished by fire,

Be it therefore resolved that the 1995 Session of the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference declare the property now abandoned and placed in the custody of the Conference Board of Trustees. In keeping with Paragraph 2549 of <u>The 1992 Book of Discipline</u>, I hereby recommend the discontinuation of the Eastake United Methodist Church located at 30th and Tatnall Streets in Wilmington, Delaware with effect from July 1, 1995.

I further recommend that:

- (A) Control of the Eastlake United Methodist Church property be assumed by the Peninsula-Delaware Conference Board of Trustees; and
- (B) The Wilmington District Superintendent continue to work on the transfers of Eastlake members to other congregations.

It was approved.



We trust this information will be a useful tool in understanding both the budget and the ministry it supports.

Since some groups in the Annual Conference are involved in more than one category, their budget is appropriately divided among those categories. For example, since the work of the Board of Global Ministries involves both benevolence and connectional ministries, one portion of its request appears under "Benevolences" and the other under "Connectional Funds".

2. RESOLUTION ON THE FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY OF THE UNITED NATIONS

WHEREAS, representatives of 51 nations met in the San Francisco Opera House on June 26, 1945 to adopt The United Nations Charter and on October 24, 1945, at 3:00 p.m., the Charter became effective; and

WHEREAS, October 24th is annually observed as United Nations Day throughout the world; and

WHEREAS, the membership of The United Nations, during the past fifty years, has grown from 51 nations to 185; and

WHEREAS, since its creation, The United Nations and its specialized agencies have been the source of unparalleled international cooperation in efforts to solve international problems of health, education, and the welfare of people; and

WHEREAS. The United Nations is now engaged in 17 Peacekeeping Missions and 28 Diplomatic Peacemaking Interventions in Africa, Asia, Europe, and Latin America, and continues to hold out the hope that the scourge of war will cease; and

WHEREAS, The United Nations is an independent agency for preventive diplomacy, peace-building, and sustainable development in the world, and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, written by and ratified by members of the U.N., is a standard of achievement for all persons and nations; and

WHEREAS, United Nations Peacekeepers were awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1988 and the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1986.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the members of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference of The United Methodist Church go on record as reaffirming their support for The United Nations and urging all member countries to fully fund it; and

THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that local congregations in the Peninsula-Delaware Conference of The United Methodist Church are urged to mark the fiftieth anniversary of The United Nations through prayers, preaching, or special events during 1995 and to report these activities to Charge Conference.

3. RESOLUTION ON WELFARE REFORM

WHEREAS, 'In response to God's gift of grace, centered in the biblical experiences of exodus and resurrection, we are to live in relationship to God as communities of witness in the midst of the world (Exodus 19.4-6). In covenant, we are committed to the welfare of our neighbors, and this must include our economic and political relationships. Covenant people are committed to equitable distribution of resources to meet basic human needs and to social systems that provide on-going access to those resources"; (The Book of Resolutions, 1992, "Economic Justice", pp. 403-4)

WHEREAS, "The biblical mandate is to uphold the right of all persons to fullness of life and to confront all people and systems which would deny this right to others"; (The Book of Resolutions, 1992, "Economic Justice", p. 404)

WHEREAS, we believe that people are more important than the sum of their economic activities, and that successful welfare reform demands more than economic incentives and disinoantives:

WHEREAS, successful welfare reform depends upon overcoming both biased assumptions about race, gender, and class that feed hostile social stereotypes about people living in poverty and suspicions that people with perspectives other than our own are either indifferent or insincere

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the members of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference of The United Methodist Church go on record as being committed to welfare reform that focuses not on eliminating programs, but on eliminating poverty and the damage it inflicts on children (who are two-thirds of all welfare recipients), on their parents, and on the rest of society; and

THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that copies of this resolution shall be sent, by the Board of Church and Society of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference, to the Governors and the members of the U.S. Congress of Delaware and Maryland representing those areas within the bounds of the Conference.

4. "WORLD BANK/IMF - 50 YEARS IS ENOUGH" CAMPAIGN

WHEREAS, Christians are called to respond faithfully to the biblical call to "let justice roll down like waters and righteousness as an ever flowing stream"; and

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Social Principles state that: "We applaud international efforts to create a more just international economic order, in which the limited resources of the earth will be used to maximum benefit of all nations and peoples"; and

WHEREAS, "A Call for Increased Commitment to End World Hunger and Poverty from the 1992 Book of Resolutions, page 461, states that: "The transformation of persons and institutions such as the World Bank and International Monetary Fund, which create and perpetuate strongholds of power and privilege for some at the expense of the many, into new personal, social, economic and political environments which are committed to ending hunger and poverty, and which are more conducive to justice, liberation, self-development, a stabilized population, and a sustainable environments." and

WHEREAS, World Bank and International Monetary Fund (IMF) development projects and the structural adjustment programs imposed by these institutions on developing nations are drastically increasing debt and promoting development that is inequitable, environmentally damaging, and non-participator. Debt owed to the IMF and World Bank has increased to \$276 billion. Increasing debt payments and accompanying structural adjustment programs mean lower wages, deteriorating education, fewer benefits, reduced medical assistance, and errivromental destruction. Many rural and urban communities in the U.S. are also experiencing these problems as our economy is globalized, and

WHEREAS, in 1994, to mark the 50th anniversary of the World Bank and International Monetary Fund, a diverse group of U.S. organizations established the '50 Years Is Enough' Campaign, calling for far-reaching changes in the lending process, internal processes, and structure of these organizations; and

WHEREAS, over 130 U.S. organizations and 165 non-governmental organizations from 50 countries have now joined the campaign, including the General Board of Church and Society of The United Methodist Church:

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church will join the other organizations in their

campaign, calling for:

- Institutional reform to cause openness, full public accountability, and the participation of affected populations in decision making to be standard procedure at the World Bank and the IMF.
- 2. A shift in the nature of economic policy reform programs and policies to support equitable, sustainable, and participatory development.
- An end to all environmentally destructive lending and support for more selfreliant resource-conserving development that preserves biodiversity.
- 4. The scaling back of the financing and operations role, and hence, the power of the World Bank and the IMF, and the rechanneling of financial resources thereby made available into a variety of development assistance alternatives.
- A reduction in multilateral debt to make additional capital available for sustainable development.

THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we oppose funding these institutions with our tax dollars until they become democratic and accountable, and promote sustainable and equitable people-centered development; and

THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that letters be written to the World Bank, the IMF, the Secretary-General of the United Nations, the President of the United States, and appropriate Congressional oversight committees to inform them of this resolution.

5. BOARD OF PENSIONS

The Peninsula-Delaware Conference Board of Pensions recommends:

- 1. The Past Service Rate for 1996 be \$318 per year of approved service.
- Up to 100% of the pension and disability payments received by a retired
 pastor or pastor on disability be designated as the permitted housing
 allowance for 1996. (I.R.S. restricts this allowance to the pastor. The
 surviving spouse does not qualify.)

- Ministers appointed to the Peninsula-Delaware Conference for the first time, must make arrangements with the Conference Business Office for enrollment in the medical dental. life, and pension programs.

 - B. Ministers having changes in their family status, such as marriages, divorces, newborn children, death, etc., must notify the Conference Business Office within thirty days of these events.

- Each pastor is responsible to keep the Conference Business Office and the General Board of Pensions apprised of any changes to their designated beneficiary.
- Local churches are reminded that they are responsible for the full cost of the dependent portion of the health and dental program for their clergy family.
- 4. You can help contribute to the continued success of our medical program by becoming familiar with and using the preventive medicine provisions of your program. You should also be receiving a publication called "Taking Care". Please take the time to read it. It will benefit you and your medical program.

PENINSULA-DELAWARE CONFERENCE BOARD OF PENSIONS CLERGY/LAY EMPLOYEE INSURANCE PROGRAM

POLICY ON BENEFIT ELIGIBILITY

- A. The Insurance Program is divided into the following categories:
 - 1. Health
 - 2. Dental
 - 3. Non-Contributory Group Life
 - 4. Contributory Group Life
- B. Those clergy holding appointments as indicated below are eligible for coverage under all four categories in "A" above with the full costs of health, dental and non-contributory group life paid by the conference.
 - Full members appointed to serve a charge
 - Associate Members appointed to serve a charge
 - Probationary Members appointed to serve a charge
 - 4. Full-time Local Pastors appointed to serve a charge
 - Student Local Pastors appointed to serve a charge
 Clergy appointed to the Superintendency and Conference Staff
 - Clergy appointed to the supermendency and contented station
 Clergy appointed to attend school after serving under appointment for six consecutive years (full connection) and eight consecutive
 - years (associate member). Benefits limited to two years.

 8. Clergy on sabbatical leave benefits limited to one year
 - Clergy on disability leave
- C. Retired Clergy

For a retired clergy person to be eligible for health and dental benefits, he/she must be receiving a United Methodist Church pension then full. If util time appointments to charges, Conterence staff or superintendent are less than 21 years, clergy health and dental benefits will be paid in accordance with the following scheduler.

- Premiums for surviving spouses and mental retardation or physical handicap, who is so incapable prior to attainment of age 19 (or age 24 for qualified students) and who is chiefly dependent upon the employee for support and maintenance) will be at the same percentage used for the clergy person.
- When a retired clergy marries after retirement, the spouse is not eligible for health and dental insurance.
- 3. If a retired clergy person has not served a Peninsula-Delaware Conference charge within 15 years prior to date in which a United Methodist Church pension benefit begins, proof must be provided that no other health coverage is available. When proof is verified, benefits will be in accordance with the above schedule.

D. Dependents of Active Clergy

- Dependent health coverage is available to all active clergy listed in "B" above with the charge responsible for the full cost.
- Dependent dental coverage is available to all active clergy listed in "B" above with the charge responsible for the full cost.

E. Spouses of Retired Clergy

- Spouses of retired clergy are covered with health insurance with the cost paid in accordance with the schedule above, if they were the clergy's spouse at the time of retirement.
- Spouses of retired clergy are eligible for dental coverage at the retired clergy's expense, if they were the clergy's spouse at the time of retirement. Reinstatement of coverage not allowed after cancellation.

- F. Surviving Spouses and Surviving Dependent Children
 - The surviving spouse of an active clergy listed in "B" above is eligible for health coverage with the full cost paid by the Conference until such time as the surviving spouse remarries. After remarriage, surviving spouse is not eligible for health benefits.
 - The surviving spouse of an active clergy is eligible for dental coverage with the full cost paid by the surviving spouse. Reinstatement of coverage not allowed after cancellation. After remarriage, surviving spouse is not eligible for dental benefits.
 - Dependent children of a deceased active clergy listed in "B" above will continue to be covered with health and dental insurance until age 19 or 24, if a full-time student.
 - The surviving spouse of a retired clergy is eligible for medical coverage with the cost paid in accordance with the schedule above, provided he/she was the clergy's spouse at the time of retirement.
 - The surviving spouse of a retired clergy is eligible for dental coverage with the full cost paid by the surviving spouse, provided he/she was the clergy's spouse at the time of retirement. Reinstatement of coverage not allowed after cancellation.
- G. Clergy Appointed to Less Than Full-Time Service (Par. 437.2)

Not eligible for health, dental and life insurance.

H. Part-Time Local Pastors

Not eligible for health, dental and life insurance.

I. Divorce

Health and dental benefits are not available to the spouse of an active or retired clergy after divorce.

J. Other

Those persons indicated below will be eligible for coverage under health, dental and contributory group life insurance with the employing agency or the individual responsible for the full cost.

- Lay employees serving a local church or Conference agency thirty hours or more per week.
- Retired lay employees, their spouses and their surviving spouses provided that they were covered at time of retirement.
- 3. Clergy on leave of absence
- Clergy and their dependents serving in Appointments Beyond The Local Church provided they pay the full costs.

- Clergy appointed to attend school after serving under appointment for less than the required time (six consecutive years [full connection] and eight consecutive years [associate member] for a limit of two years.
- 6. RESOLUTION TO APPROVE LINE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH
 AS A CONFERENCE HISTORICAL SITE

WHEREAS Line United Methodist Church was established in 1779 as a result of preaching among a family named Vincent; and

WHEREAS Line United Methodist Church has been meeting at the same site along the Mason-Dixon line since 1785; and

WHEREAS Line United Methodist Church was the site of preaching for Bishops Asbury and Coke:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT Line United Methodist Church be approved as a Conference Historical Site by the Peninsula-Delaware Conference.

7. PROPOSAL FOR THE ADOPTION OF COVENANT COMMUNION COUNCIL OF BISHOPS May 5, 1995

WHEREAS, the Scriptures call us to one hope; one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all, who is above all and through all and in all (Ephesians 4:4-6); and

WHEREAS, Jesus prayed for the church "That they may all be one" (John 17:20); and

WHEREAS, despite the brokenness of the Church, the Holy Spirit works among us to break down the dividing walls between Christians; and

WHEREAS, the diversity of gifts among Christians is for building up and strengthening the Body of Christ; and

WHEREAS, The United Methodist Church has pursued and supported the unity of the church through prayer, study, and leadership in the ecumenical movement; and

WHEREAS, The United Methodist Church has been a member of the Consultation on Church Union (COCU) from its beginnings, giving leadership to the work of the nine churches in the U.S.A. as they have sought to make visible the unity of the Body of Christ; and

WHEREAS, The COCU Consensus: In Quest of a Church of Christ Uniting, was given support by the 1986 General Conference, as an expression of the Apostolic Faith, and 'a sufficient theological basis for the covenanting acts to be proposed by the Consultation...(1992 Book of Resolutions, p. 206); and

WHEREAS, the COCU covenanting proposal, Churches in Covenant Communion, has been developed by the representatives of the nine member churches of the Consultation, and studied by The United Methodist Church over the past eight years; and

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Council of Bishops stated in May 1992, "we celebrate God's call to the concept of covenant relationships expressed in Councils of Covenant Communion... (and) long for the day when the covenant may be realized

among us, and acknowledge with joy our eagerness to enter into covenant* (1992 Book of Resolutions, p. 217); and

WHEREAS, this covenanting proposal offers to open doors to greater unity in theology, worship, sacraments, ministry, and mission among Christians in the U.S.A.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the following changes be made in The Book of Discipline:

- Article 5, Div. 1 of the Constitution, after the word "Union", insert the words "and Covenantal relationships"...
- Par. 2402, in the heading after the word "Churches" add "and Covenantal relationships"
- Par. 2402.1, in heading, after word "Union", add "and the Church of Christ Uniting"
- 4. Add a New 2402.1b
 - "The United Methodist Church is in covenantal relationship with other churches in the Church of Christ Uniting."
- 5. Par. 918.2 after "Church Union" add "and the Church of Christ Uniting".

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the 1996 General Conference of The United Methodist Church adopt the coveranting proposal of the Consultation on Church Union, and approve the text Churches in Coveranting Communion: The Church of Christ Uniting as the basis for agreement to join with other participating churches in covenant communion, including the acts sufficient to enable it:

FURTHER, The United Methodist Church declares its willingness to enter into a relationship of covenant communion with the member churches of the Consultation on Church Union and other churches which similarly approve this agreement and The COCU Consensus which is its theological basis, sealed by the proposed inaugural liturgies;

AND FURTHER, that The United Methodist Church will begin to identify for itself such steps and procedures as may be necessary to prepare for the reconciliation of ordained ministries and for entering into covenant communion as set forth in this document.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Council of Bishops shall oversee The United Methodist Church's participation in the Church of Christ Uniting and shall develop and present to future General Conferences such changes in The Book of Discipline as may become necessary as we live into this covenant.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the 1996 General Conference of The United Methodist Church entrusts to the Council of Bishops, in cooperation with the General Commission on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns, the guidance of The United Methodist Church at national, regional and local levels into the covenanting acts and relationships described in Churchas in Covenant Communion including the steps and procedures necessary to prepare for the recognition and reconciliation of ordained ministries.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the 1996 General Conference of The United Methodist Church send greetings of grace and peace in Christ to the other member churches of the Consultation, offering prayers that we may all be one so that the world might believe.

8. COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE COMPENSATION

Recommendations:

 The Commission makes the following minimum salary recommendations for 1996:

Full-Time Elder	\$ 20,700
Full-Time Probationary Member	\$ 18,800
Associate Member	\$ 18,800
Full-Time Local Pastor	\$ 17,500
Student Pastor (Local/Probationary Member)	\$ 14,800

The minimum salary for Student Pastors will be \$ 14,800 for 1996, unless some smaller figure is agreed upon by the district superintendent, student, and charge, as being appropriate for the work to be performed.

Service increments will be \$125.00 per year up to a maximum of fifteen years service.

(Note: These recommended salary figures represent an average increase of 3.5% over 1995. 1995's increase was 2.3%; 1994's was 3.4%.)

The Commission recommends that the reimbursement for travel expenses during 1996 be at the rate set by the Internal Revenue Service for that year. (The rate for 1995 is \$.30 per mile.)

In addition, we also recommend that pastors be reimbursed for all tolls and parking expenses incurred in the performance of their pastoral duties.

 A RESOLUTION FOR PLANNING AN EPIPHANY VIGIL FOR VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

WHEREAS, a resolution from the Board of Church & Society on *Domestic Violence & Child Abuse* was adopted at the Peninsula-Delaware Conference on Saturday morning, June 4, 1994; and

WHEREAS, however, that this resolution was transmitted to duly elected representatives of state and federal government representing those areas within the bounds of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference; and

WHEREAS, no specific action was called for within the Conference; and

WHEREAS, the issue of domestic violence is still becoming increasingly prevalent in today's society; and

WHEREAS, domestic violence touches each of our lives in various ways and affects the life of the church, both directly and indirectly; and

WHEREAS, the Conference should be invited to recognize the complicity of our church, and participate in naming the violence, grieving for the victims, and bringing each one and her/his church community to action towards justice for all persons affected by domestic violence.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that each district should plan to hold a service; or several churches on the district (African American, Euro-American,

Hispanic, Native American, and others) could get together and plan for the whole district.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that those concerned will gather at this service on Epiphany, or during the Epiphany Season, to remember persons from our Conference, and around the world, who were killed during 1995 in domestic violence.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the liturgy used should issue a challenge to the Church community with a call to action.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that COSROW provide resource materials to educate clergy and laity on this issue.

10. A RESOLUTION FROM WYOMING UNITED METHODIST CHURCH CONCERNING COUNSELING SUPPORT FOR CLERGY

WHEREAS, fast pace, pressures and fragile relationships of our society place great stress on all of us and the clergy are especially vulnerable to these stresses by the nature of their work. This may result in the development of personal or family problems in the clergoperson's life:

WHEREAS, the special status of the clergy within their local communities may make the sharing of their personal problems and concerns with others very difficult;

WHEREAS, the itinerant ministry and our denomination's method of appointment of clergy can make confiding of personal problems to fellow clergy difficult;

WHEREAS, unresolved stress within the clergyperson's life may interfere with performance of the duties of ministry, dilute the effectiveness of Christian witness and, in some cases, may result in persons being lost to the ministry of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference;

WHEREAS, clergy who are struggling with crises in their lives may need immediate, confidential access to competent counseling:

WHEREAS, the clergyperson may be under financial constraints which make it difficult to seek counseling help.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the Peninsula-Delaware Conference shall establish a method to make counseling readily accessible to clergy in crisis by pre-arranging a counselor or counseling service, with skills in pastoral counseling, in each of the four districts. Contact with the counselors shall be initiated by the clergyperson directly to permit strict confidentiality. Any cost incurred above any medical insurance coverage be paid by the Conference by a means which allows the clergy person to remain anonymous. All clergypersons in the Conference shall be made aware of this availability of counselino.

11. RESOLUTION ON REVISING BOOK OF DISCIPLINE'S PARAGRAPH ON ABORTION (71H) SUBSTITUTE MOTION APPROVED

That, we as a Conference, affirm the present United Methodist position on abortion.

12. CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATIONS

Add new paragraph following $\P727$, renumbering the present $\P728$. Deletes $\P9726.5.b$, 726.10.g, h & i. Amends $\P9726.5$.

¶728.1. In each Annual Conference there shall be a Commission on Communication, which shall include persons with skills in communications nominated for membership in a manner determined by the Conference, in accordance with ¶707.4.

The commission shall be a service agency to meet the communication, publication, multimedia, public and media relations, interpretation and promotional needs of the Annual Conference. It shall be responsible for providing resources and services to conference agencies, districts and local churches in the field of communication. The commission shall have a consultative relationship with all agencies and bodies within the conference structure. (deletes) 172.65.b)

2. a) The commission shall include at least seven voting members. The following shall be ex-officin members of the commission in addition to the number set by the Annual Conference: (1) the conference director of communications (if employed, without vote); (2) any member of the General Commission on Communication or the General Board of Publications who resides within the bounds of the conference, with vote, unless voting membership is in conflict with another provision of The Book of Discipline, in which case his/her membership shall be without vote; (3) the presiding bishop, without vote; (4) a district superintendent, chosen by the cabinet, without vote; (5) the conference creasurer/director of administrative services, without vote; and (6) the conference council director, without vote.

b) Two or more conferences may decide to have a single Commission on Communication, in which case each Annual Conference shall be represented as stated in the preceding paragraph and each shall elect an equal number of voting members.

 The responsibilities of the Commission on Communication, unless the Annual Conference has designated another agency to carry any of these responsibilities, shall include:

(a) To consult and cooperate with the conference Council on Finance and Administration in providing district superintendents, pastors, and appropriate officers of the local churches and charge conferences with interpretive aids or materials to assist in gaining understanding and support of the conference budget and other approved causes.

(b) To interpret and promote the programs and benevolence of the general Church, the Jurisdictional or Central Conference, and the Annual Conference to the local churches in consultation with other general Church and conference agencies (deletes \$726.10.0).

(a) To develop, implement and maintain a comprehensive internal communication network among clergy and lainy within the Annual Conference, districts, and local churches. (deletes ¶726.10.h).

(d) To guide radio, television and telecommunications ministries in the Annual Conference.

(e) To assist other agencies of the Annual Conference, districts, and local congregations in the use of computers and computer networks for communication purposes.

(f) To provide oversight for all periodicals (print and electronic) of the Annual Conference

(g) To facilitate training opportunities in communication for Annual Conference agencies, districts, and local churches.

(h) To provide oversight of conference multimedia resource collections shared

among Annual Conference agencies, districts, and local churches.

(i) To develop and coordinate, in consultation with the bishop, cabinet and other appropriate Annual Conference and general Church agencies, disaster and crisis communication plans for the Annual Conference.

(i) To provide a liaison between the Annual Conference and the United

Methodist Publishing House (deletes \$726.5.e)

Memodist Publishing House, (believes Jr2-b.s.)

(k) To raise public awareness within the geographical region of the Annual Conference of the programs and policies of The United Methodist Church; to be the primary source of information services on behalf of the Annual Conference to the general public; and to perform public and media relations functions for the conference. (Feletate, 179.6.10)

(I) To recommend the effective use of emerging communication technologies and methods.

(m) To perform such other communication services as the Annual Conference

4. An executive officer, to be known as the director of communications, shall be designated, by one or more annual conferences to assist the commission in carping out its responsibilities.

13. RESOLUTION PRESENTED BY CENTENARY CHURCH

Delaware State Senate - Senate Substitute No. 1 for Senate Bill No. 34, Entitled
*An Act To Amend Tritle 14 of the Delaware Code Relating to the Exercise of First
Amendment Rights by Public School Students* Sponsored by Senator Robert L.
Venables Sr.

WHEREAS, the Delaware State Senate and House of Representatives wish to ensure that students in Delaware's public schools are permitted to exercise all of the religious freedoms that they are guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States and the State of Delaware:

WHEREAS, the Senate and the House of Representatives also recognize that the Establishment Clause of the United States Constitution places limitations upon the ability of public schools to allow organized religious activities during school-related functions: and

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court of the United States has handed down several rulings which have helped to define the types of religious activities which the public schools can allow consistent with the Establishment clause of the Constitution; and

WHEREAS, certain public school officials and administrators have sought in recent years to impose limitations on the religious and free-speech rights of public school students over and above those required by law in an apparent effort to avoid controversy; and

WHEREAS, the Supreme Court of the United States has identified the individual's freedom of conscience as the *central liberty that unifies the various clauses in the First Amendment* of the United States Constitution; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent and purpose of the Delaware General Assembly by means of this Act to guarantee opportunities to public school students in the State of Delaware to exercise First Amendment rights in an appropriate manner during graduation or commencement ceremonies according to the dictates of their individual consciences:

NOW THEREFORE

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF DELAWARE.

Section 1. Amend Title 14, ¶4101 of the Delaware Code by deleting the phrase "daily student activity" where said phrase appears in the Title of ¶4101.

Section 2. Amend Title 14, ¶4101 of the Delaware Code by deleting ¶4101 (b) and by deleting the subsection designation "a" from ¶4101 (a).

Section 3. Amend Title 14 of the Delaware Code by adding thereto a new section, ¶4101A, to read as follows:

"4101A. Use of schools for First Amendment purposes.

- (a) As used in this section:
 - (1) 'student-initiated' refers to any message spoken by a student of the public school at which the message is delivered.'
- (2) 'student-delivered' refers to any message spoken by a student of the public school at which the message is delivered.
- (b) During the initial period of study on each school day all students in the public schools in Delaware may be granted a brief period of silence, not to exceed 2 minutes in duration, to be used according to the dictates of the individual conscience of each student. During that period of silence no other activities shall take place.
- (c) Notwithstanding any other provision or provisions of the Delaware Code, on public school property, other public property, or other public property, student-delivered, voluntary messages may be permitted by schools during graduation or commencement ceremonies where appropriate in the context of the event. The content of any message authorized by this section shall be determined by the student delivering the message. No school district, school administrator, teacher or other school employee shall exclude, include, or otherwise discriminate for or against any student on the basis of the political, philosophical, religious, or other content of the message that the student intends to deliver or draw delivers.
- (d) A school shall be deemed to offer a fair opportunity to students who wish to deliver voluntary messages during graduation or commencement ceremonies under the provision of this section if such school uniformity provides that the delivery of such messages occur in a manner which does not substantially interfere with the orderty conduct of the ceremony.
- (e) Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the authority of the school district, school administrators, teachers or other school employees to maintain order and discipline on school premises, to protect the well-being of students and school administrators, teachers and other school employees, and to assure that the control of student-delivered voluntary messages is consistent with federal and state law.
- Each school district shall establish rules and regulations for the implementation of this section within the district. The Department of Justice shall provide each school district an annual set of model.

rules and regulations on or before August 15 of each year commencing in 1995 which, if adopted by a school district, will ensure that this section is implemented consistently with federal and state law.*

Section 4. If any provisions of this Act or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to that end the provisions of this Act are declared to be severable.

SYNOPSIS

This substitute bill substantially reduces the scope of the original Senate Bill 34 in ensuring students an opportunity to exercise their First Amendment rights by confining the opportunity for voluntary, student-delivered messages to graduation and commencement ceremonies. It should be noted, however, that the federal Equal Access Act of 1984 (20 U.S. Code §4071-4074) already goes considerably farther in guaranteeing the exercise of such rights by sudents in a variety of different settlings.

Sections 1 and 2 of the bill, which are unchanged from the original S.B. 34, take the existing provisions in ¶4101 of Title 14 for a 2-minute period of silence at the beginning of each school day and place them in a new section which also includes the new provisions concerning voluntary,

student-delivered messages at graduation exercises.

This substitute bill provides that the delivery of such messages occurs in a manner which does not interfere with the orderly conduct of the ceremony and is appropriate to it context. It further provides that school officials will continue to have the authority to maintain order and discipline on school premises, to protect the well-being of students and school administrators, leachers and other school employees, and to assure that the content of student-delivered voluntary messages is consistent with federal and state law.

It also requires that each school district establish rules and regulations for the implementation of the Act's provisions. It requires the Department of Justice to issue annual model rules and regulations for the use of school districts to insure that this Act is implemented in a manner consistent with federal and state law.

14. RESOLUTION HONORING OF THEODORE W. BRIGGS FOR SERVICE TO THE PENINSULA-DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, Theodore W. Briggs faithfully served the Peninsula-Delaware Conference of The United Methodist Church for 29 years as Business Manager and Treasurer and his service was modeled from the example set by our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ:

WHEREAS, during these years many vital policy decisions and significant events shaped the direction of the Peninsula-belaware Annual Conference and the single constant during this period was Theodore W. Briggs, his guidance in administering these significant changes in the life of the Conference, and his prudent fiscal management;

WHEREAS, Theodore W. Briggs was instrumental in the planning, construction and financing of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference Office Building, which has served as a focal point for numerous meetings and Conference activities since its dedication in 1982. WHEREAS, the members of the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference wish to honor Theodore W. Briggs for his years of dedicated service and the lasting impact of his exemplary stewardship.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Peninsula-Delaware Conference Office, Conference Room located in the lower level, bear the name of Theodore W. Briggs in honor of his dedicated service. May all who enter the Theodore W. Briggs Conference Room be inspired by his faith in the Holy Spirit to guide him and to use his talents to glorify God and our Savior Jesus Christ.

D. REPORTS

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORTS

Dover District

This has been a very exciting year to be Superintendent of the Dover District. I am deeply indebted to Charlie Barton for his strong, compassionate and tireless leadership of the District for the last six years before his retirement. His ministry and presence continues to be felt by both laity and clergy, especially the District youth. I am also indebted to Edie Knotts for her wonderful support as Secretary to the Superintendent.

Clergy again met with the District Superintendent to plan Charge Conferences. The theme this year was "Risks and Rewards of Ministry" based on Luke 10. Churches (charges) were encouraged to consider the point at which they were taking a risk in their ministry. Each Charge Conference was held in a setting of worship and closed with communion.

There were two major initiatives held on the District this year. The first was known the Care of the Soul' and was intended to help clergy be more intentional in caring for themselves spiritually, physically and relationally. The second initiative was "Mission Alive in "95" which focused on promoting mission involvement within local churches as well as the District as a whole. To this end, a gala Mission Weekend was held in May featuring four mission interpreters itinerating among over 20 churches, the publication of a mission resource booklet, and a festive mission fair involving over 35 booths and displays. Our Bishop, Susan M. Morrison, spoke at the fair, sharing her passion for mission involvement. This proved to be a very successful endeavor to raise mission awareness on the District.

One particular mission project has been strengthened during the year. The Dover District Latino Ministry Committee has successfully promoted the need for missionaries to the rapidly growing Hispanic population in the corridor from Georgetown to Selbyville in Sussex County. To this end, over \$20,000 has been raised from within the District and a lay mission couple will be appointed through the National Hispanic Plan of the General Board of Global Ministries beginning in mid July 1965. A continuing mission emphasis is the Dover District Volunteer in Mission to Homestead, Florida to help rebuild the area after Hurricane Andrew

A strong Board of Laity, under the leadership of Jack Sparks, was very supportive of missions this year in all of its programs including the fall Laity Banquet and the Lenten Communion Breakfasts. In addition, another very successful Lay Speakers School was held with over 150 in attendance.

Mariner's Bethel in Ocean View and St. Matthew's By-the-Sea in Fenrwick Island both have completed new additions to their buildings to be used for education and fellowship ministries. In addition, John Wesley on the Seaford Charge is building a fellowship/education building and Bethel on the Gumboro Charge is completing a Sunder School addition. Long Neck has just built a new parsonage adjacent to the church.

Two churches were discontinued during the year: Manship on the Felton Charge and Shiloh on the Laurel Charge.

The Dover District Committee on Ordained Ministry was busy this year interviewing candidates and overseeing their supervision. Several strong candidates were guided through the process and will become pastors in local

Salisbury District

The Salisbury District approached the new year with joyful thanksgiving for God's blessings and the confidence of faith in Christ above all. With the Apostle Paul we are able to "thank God in all of our remembrances... thankful for our partnership in the Gospel... and sure that God who began a good work in us will bring it to completion." (Philiopians 1.35.5)

A good work begun by former District Superintendent Dr. P. Thomas McKelvey and beginning Executive Director Rev. Crant L. Johnson, the Salisbury Cooperative Urban Ministry is being nurtured into fulfillment by the dynamic leadership of new Executive Director, the Rev. Donald E. Hamilton. Making his presence felt as the Urban Missioner for United Methodists in Salisbury, Don and his helpmate Mildred have established positive relationships with the members of Asbury, Bethesda, Christ, Grace, St. Andrew S.

Trintly and Wesley Temple congregations. Monthly meetings with pastors, and sharing with pastors in Disciple Bible Study, are creating collegial relationships with key leaders in ministry to Salisbury. Monthly Parish Council luncheon meetings are energizing the laity, as well as pastors, to involve an ever increasing team of workers in Christ's mission to the city. To establish a unified United Methodist presence in Salisbury to confront the urban type problems facing the city, is one objective of Cooperative Urban Ministries. To utilize the outreach ministries of each congregation in the community is the second objective of Salisbury Cooperative Urban Ministries. The Rev. Donald E. Hamilton's leadership skills, sense of mission, and declicated spirit are being used by God to do a new thing in Salisbury through the Cooperative Urban Ministry. Illustrations of new cooperative ventures of faith include the funding of and provision of labor to build a Habitat for Humanity House, a cooperative choric camp, a weekly feeding program, summer vacation church schools and day camps in several locations, and city-wide youth meetings sponsored by a youth council.

A second exciting project spear-headed by the Rev. Donald Hamilton this year, has been the itineration of Sam and Jackie Onwu, United Methodist Missionaries on leave from Zaire, throughout the District and Conference. Jackie, a native of Salisbury, and Sam were placed in the second paranage of Bethesda Church with furnishings supplied by the District under the Rev. Hamilton's leadership. Management of funding during the time the Onwu's were in residence in the Salisbury District, scheduling of visits to churches, meeting of transportation and support needs on a regular basis were ably handled by the Rev. Mr. Hamilton in his capacity as District Missionary Secretary of Education and Cultivation for the Conference Board of Global Ministries.

A special project of church renewal took place on the Whaleyville Charge under the inspired and inspiring leadership of retired pastor Brooks E. Reynolds and Diaconal Minister Cindy Quillien. The Salisbury District and the Peninsula-Delaware Conference were given an example of what can happen in a short time on a small multi-church charge when the leadership team is exceptionally talented and dedicated to evangelism and spiritual renewal. The fruits of Dr. Reynold's and Mrs. Quillen's labors were an astonishing 55 new members, with a phenomenal number, 49, being by confession of faith and restored. Approximately 10% of all the members received on the Salisbury District for the year 1994 by confession of faith or restored (502) were received by three small membership churches on the Whaleyville Charge. New Hope - 20, Whaleyville - 20; and St. Martins - 9. God has accomplished an awe-inspiring goal through the intentional leadership of two well-seasoned and highly committed professionally trained ministers.

Isabel Gardner, and the Rev. Carol Svecz who will be serving on other Districts of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference; and the Rev. Dale Brown who will be relocating out of the Salisbury District. May the Lord bless each of these pastors and their families.

The activities of the District Board of Laity have received strong leadership from District Lay Leader Gene Cray. One new venture has been the re-development of the District United Methodist Men by new President Sherwood McGrath. The District was greatly touched by the passing of Conference Lay Leader Dolly Brittingham who was very active in her home District laity programs. New District Director of Lay Speaking Chuck Anderson added new courses to this year's Lay Speakers' School which was very well attended. A new course, "Women in Leadership in the Church", was team-taught by women pastors of the District and climaxed with an evening with Bishop Susan Morrison.

A highlight of the year was a retreat across Conference and Jurisdictional lines with our colleagues in the Eastern Shore of Virginia District held February 9,10,11 at the Dunes Manor Hotel, located on the beach in Ocean City. The theme was "Shepherding the Shepherds," and the spiritual director was Professor John Copenhaver of Shepandoah University who received his doctorate in Christian spirituality from Catholic University. The many ministers and mates who were in attendance experienced renewal and refreshment through sharing in these sessions at the seashore.

The District Committee on Ordained Ministry spent many hours interviewing persons at various stages in their response to God's call to ordained ministry. Our lay members have added a significant dimension to the work of the Committee. New Beginnings

"this is a day of new beginnings, time to remember and move on..."

The Peninsula-Delaware Conference is in a welcomed state of flux. The winds of change and renewal are blowing across the conference; indeed across the church. This change is thorough-going and deep. It has to do with mind-set and some traditions originating in nineteenth century America. New thought patterns and ways of doing ministry are beginning to challenge the age-old structure of past decades. The vision for ministry that is being developed in the Peninsula-Delaware Conference is wholly different in that the delivery systems are changing and are more inclusive of the laity and ethnic-racial groups.

The Conference Council on Ministries, including its staff and related boards, commissions and agencies, is (1) to be in partnership with local congregations as they work to improve their process for making disciples, (2) to enable and encourage local congregations to participate in ministries they could not reasonably provide on their own, and (3) to strengthen our connection as a global church.

The New Out of the Old

As the New Testament came out of the exigencies of the Old Testament, so there are new ways of doing ministry coming out of the old pattern. An excellent example is the New Venture Ministres. This "new" ministry was established to encourage fresh, innovative programs that would be on the cutting edge of doing the gospel in significant new ways. This ministry is new in that it permits ministry from the "bottom up" rather than the top down. It is highly successful. Another innovative program, "Doing A New Thind also has the "new" coming out of the old. It is a Discipleship Team Forum that "played" on the four districts with the purpose of "exposing a six person team (including the pastor) to the vision and excitement of the four essential dimensions of witness." It too proved highly effective. The CCOM will continue to support similar efforts by the local congregations functioning within mission areas.

Strategic Planning

During the 1994-1995 Conference year, the Lost Coin Group, designated and selected by Bishop Susan Murch Morrison, has forged ".a. new and living way." to do ministry across the Peninsula-Delaware Conference. After the research and planning buttressed by a really good indepth demographic-look at the Peninsula-Delaware Conference, the group began a detailed and thorough-going look at the Conference and what the Conference would look like when it is engaged in all the parameters of ministry as it relates to serving the local church. At the 1995 Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference, a report will be given on the progress of the Lost Coin Group. It will encompass: 1) environmental changes on Delmarva and implications for the United Methodist Church, 2) an expanded meaning of stewardship and its implications ministry, 31 the segregation of Peninsula-Delaware Conference in mission, ministry and composition of congregations and how it effects clergy, 4) Vision-Mission Statement and commendations following, 5) recognition of the variety of ways we worship and what it says relative to the inclusive/exclusive bearing of the Conference, 6) recognizing the

This is an exciting time to be United Methodists as we writness "faith and hope" being born again in the Peninsula-Delaware Conference. It is a time to remember our glorious past, but not to be entrenched in it — it is a time to seek the face of Jesus Christ and move on.

The Conference Council on Ministries pledges, at risk of its own demise to do what is necessary to bring this vision of ministry to fruition.

Howard A. Bailey Life Enrichment Program

We have worked hard to be "the program of the people", and like our logo suggests, we desperately continue to Transform and Liberate People Affirmed by God". This has been a very challenging year for the HBLEP. We have been able to see the fruits of our labor come to harvest. The ministries that were created in 1933 have begun to take wings and liy. The Followers of Christ youth ministry has proven to be a pioneer in dealing with diversity, racism and sexism. The Women's Division, under the direction of Mrs. Frances Livingston, has begun to shine as a new beacon of light in which Affician American women can be affirmed. The regular children's programming has increased in the year of 1994. We anticipate the programming to increase even more next year. This year's banquet had an attendance of over 300 people. More and more we see that the local church is beginning to take ownership of the program.

A crowning highlight in the 1995 HBLEP calendar year was the HBLEP Board of Directors Luncheon held at CMoore's Place in Dover. The Honorable Gregory Sleet, U.S.

Attorney General, gave the keynote address titled "Children: Our Focus - Our Future". Attorney Sleet encouraged the church, and the community, to become involved in our children's lives and the life of the community.

HBLEP will also be the guest program to be presented in the NEJ Urban Convocation to be held in Philadelphia during September 21:23, 1995. We believe, with perseverance, that the 1995 calendar year will reap an even greater harvest. For the past six months, there have been some radical changes in structure and administration within the program. We see the need for more adult programming. We have been soliciting ideas throughout the Conference as to what type of programming will accommodate the needs of the people. The following subtitles will help to explain the route that the program has taken over the last nine months:

- 1) Exploration of full-time directorship of HBI FP
- Quality of ministry which will be effective for the Conference
- Program expansion
- 4) Centralization of HBLEP ministry
- 5) Expansion of personnel
- Generation of capital

1. Exploration of full time directorship of HBLEP

At the 1994 Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference, the resolution was passed creating a task force to look at the possibility of full directorship for the program. It has become imperative at this point that this exploration be endorsed by the Board of Directors of HBLEP. The program has the ability to reach and to effectively minister liberating theological concepts which are valid to the growth and future, not only of the African American Church, but also to The United Methodist Church in total. We believe, and strongly suggest, that this ministry can revitalize, regenerate, inspire, and motivate the local church. Expansion of the program has entailed the increase of our volunteer program. In order to utilit the need for which we have labored, we must come up with creative ways to keep this vital ministry functioning.

2. Quality of ministry which will be effective for the Conference

Over the past three years, we have worked diligently to fine tune the children's Frogramming for HBLEP. However, the time has come to implement the adult component of the program. We need to create, and put in place, seminars that offer spiritual wellness, physical health, church development, and community empowerment. This can only be done if we are able to give full attention to these projects. We believe, by utilizing the resources on the districts and in the local churches, that we can produce quality programming which will empower and liberate the church for the year 2000. We have gone into collaboration with the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference to introduce the program as a regional adventure. It is our prayer that we will be able to expose our young people to The United Methodist Church in its urban settings. This welcomed opportunity will enhance our inter-conference relationships.

Program expansion

God has blessed this ministry to win the hearts of the people. The ministry has expanded to the point in which we can no longer function without permanent facilities. We have been privileged to introduce program ministries in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and Virginia. We have also been blessed to become involved with denominations outside of Methodism. Our vision is to create a multi-faceted ministry which will invite seminars, refereats and an ongoing Christian educational program. We have been fortunate enough to complete the HBLEPs' *Chacil Church Module*. God has enabled us to provide a

teaching module in which the local church (at low cost) can implement the program on a weekly or monthly basis as their schedules permit. We believe that this cost-effective atteration to the ministry will enable the participants to be involved in the program yearround.

4. Centralization of HBLEP ministry

As suggested in the earlier part of this report, it is essential that the ministry derive from a central point of reference. Unless we have a central location, organization and administration of thorough ministry cannot be achieved. Many would say, or suggest, that we are moving too fast. However, I would content that we are not moving fast enough. In the beginning, with the program's inception, we were anticipating the ministry to be free-standing by the year 1997. However, the question arises what must we do to prepare for that time? The contention that the administrative staff and I have arrived at, is that it is essential that we begin to explore and secure a central location for HBLEP ministries. This endeavor will help to stabilize the ministry and provide room for more consistent cororammino.

5. Expansion of personnel

Not only is it critical for a full-line Executive Director, it is just as important for the position of Program Coordinator to be expanded on a hall-line basis minimally. We foresee the duties of the Executive Director and the Program Director as promotion agents to the Conference and the local church. It is important that we have the floxibility to schedule speaking engagements and workshops throughout the Conference, on district and local church levels. With this type of intimate contact, it is most appropriate that proper remuneration be given for time accrued.

The volunteer staff of HBLEP is faithful and committed. However, it is essential that we be able to recruit more volunteer staff persons by means of church visitations, workshops, etc. Support staff are direly needed to continue the enormous amount of work which will compliment the work of the vital ministry.

6. Generation of capital

We are under no illusion that it will not take an enormous amount of capital to realize the vision that is set before us concerning this ministry. As we have been in the past, we remain open to creative and innovative ways in securing funds to keep the ministry going. We are intentional to maintain that monies generated by and for the program, should serve the participants and the church. Yet it is good business sense to utilize funding organizations who are able to supplement expenses through financial giving or in-kind services. In pursuing these avenues, we have solicited the expertise of two local proposal writers who will guide us along these lines.

Women's Division

Since August of 1993, the Women's Division of HBLEP, under the direction of Frances Livingston, has blossomed into a beautiful garden of flowers. We have seen the development of a program for African-American women with height, depth and understanding designed to meet the needs of today's African-American female. The Women's Division has introduced liturgy and theological paradigms from a woman's point of view.

The African name of the Women's Division is "Maliaka" (Swahili word meaning queen). We introduced this name to promote a positive role model for our African-American sisters. Maliaka House has nurtured girls into accepting the responsibility of womanhood. The Women's Division has been a vehicle for young girls to be responsible

Children's Program

HBLEP has been privileged to utilize three major sites for execution of programming for 1995. The first being Camp Pecometh where the program was born. Our relationship with Camp Pecometh has grown and been enriched by the willingness of both programs to interact and share cultural and religious perspectives. This year, because of program expansion, we will be privileged to utilize the facilities at Carson Simpson Farms in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania and University of Maryland Eastern Shore in Princess Anne, Maryland, Carson Simpson Farms provides a unique setting in which the children will be able to enjoy a camping setting while still being close enough to the city to experience the urban church. We plan to expose the children to the historical black churches such as Tindley Temple, Camphor Memorial and Savers United Methodist Churches. We also intend to take excursions to the Franklin Mint, Liberty Bell, St. George's Church, and The African-American Museum. UMES will provide a setting for the HBLEP students to interact with summer college students, faculty and staff. UMES. being one of the historical African-American academic institutions in the nation, provides cultural and historical sites which enables the youngsters to appreciate their culture and tradition even more.

Followers of Christ

The HBLEP "Followers of Christ" young adult program began as a brainchild of Ray Pope, Thomas Johnson and Kenneth Johnson, who are members of the HBLEP Board of Directors. These young men envisioned a diverse HBLEP ministry involving older teenagers from all walks of life. The project was initiated on January 15, 1994 - Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. HBLEP staged a youth rally, "Followers of Christ African American Youth Summit, on the campus of Deteware State University. We nervously articipated sixty kids. We received an overwhelming turnout of over one hundred and fifty young adults. We provided an empowerment workshop dealing with the issues of sex, violence, relationships, worship, discipletinj, etc. When we evaluated the students at the end of the workshop, they all wanted to come back again. We went back to the drawing board and worked on developing a ministry that fits the needs of this age group.

Prior to the January workshop, Spiritual Formation Director Tom Carter and I had spoken about the possibility of having a diverse group at Camp Pecometh. Hence, Followers of Christ was born during Senior High Week at Camp Pecometh. This was the first time that there has been a strong African American presence at Riverside. We applauded the Camp for their cooperation in working with us on this project.

Together we witnessed black and white young adults deal with challenging issues and learned how to co-habitate with one another. It is our mission to consistently and intentionally create programs that include all people from all walks of life.

In 1995, the Followers of Christ will be hosted by the University of Maryland Eastern Shore. This will enable the students to experience the atmosphere of another one of the area's historically African-American Colleges. With the help and cooperation of Rev. Walton Burke, Campus Minister at UMES, and area pastors, we are hopeful that the environment at the campus will help to encourage young begole to pursue pathways to higher education. HBLEP is also looking forward to full participation from the area lattyclergy to be involved in the shaping of the program in this new setting.

St. Barnabas Award

The Peninsula-Delaware Conference Board of Laity honored the Howard Bailey Life Enrichment Program as a 1994 recipient of the St. Barnabas Award. The thrill in receiving such an austere award points back to the mission of the HBLEP as being the "program of the people". This endorsement will forever be honored and cherished. Proclamation

During 1994, Governor Thomas Carper, and the State Legislatures of Delaware, proclaimed "June as Howard Bailey Life Enrichment Program Month in Delaware". That historical event speaks to the diversity from which the Peninsula-Delaware Conference enables ministries to reach into the community and present the gospel of Jesus Christ.

The Ministry of Spiritual Formation

1994 completed the third full year of operation for the Ministry of Spiritual Formation of the Council on Ministries. The Ministry of Spiritual Formation is a comprehensive structure of operating facilities and developing programs to enable persons to engage in intentional experiences of spiritual growth outside and within the local church.

In 1994 the Spiritual Formation Board of Stewards completed its second year of leading the Ministry of Spiritual Formation in the areas of Sites and Finance, Program and Marketing, Staff and Volunteers. Together with the site staffs of Camp Pecometh and Drayton Retreat Center, they have brought about positive changes in the rate structures, procedures, and properly improvements of both facilities. Actions included the purchase of new vehicles and equipment, the implementation of a five-year maintenance plan for both sites, and restructuring of the maintenance department. They have also been successful in gaining additional funds for renovations and repair on major items. Currently the Board is overseeing the renovation of Camp Pecometh's dining hall, led by the Sites and Finance Committee Chairperson, Robert McKee. This renovation, which will be completed in time for the 1995 camping season, updates the original dining hall and kitchen built in 1994. It will provide additional seating space, allow for year round operation of the dining facility, and can easily be expanded in the future.

Virginia Coleman, Alvin Wolf, Carol Shaw, Beth Landing, and Mollie Barton are the Spiritual Formation staff persons whose dedication and commitment contributed to the efficient and effective operation of our facilities. The hard work of the Spiritual Formation staff made possible the rewarding experiences of all the guests at these Peninsula-Delaware Conference facilities.

Both Camp Pecometh and Drayton Retreat Center had a vital year of operations. The facilities were busy with a variety of groups and individuals from churches and other non-profit institutions. The Spiritual Formation operating debt was reduced by \$48,909. We started 1995 with a operating debt of only \$15,442. We anticipate a balanced budget will be achieved by the end of 1995.

Camp Pecometh

One Thousand Three Hundred and Seventy Five youth attended summer camp in 1994 at Camp Peccmeth. The summer staff of 46 included 8 international counselors and 34 counselors from Peninsula. Delaware Conference churches. The campers were able to chose from 17 different program offerings. Campers and staff explored the theme 'Enough for All' and developed new skills and abilities including. basic camping skills, discovery of God in community life and natural surroundings experienced uniquely in camp setting. The spiritual focus of the summer was explored through music, Bible study led for the second year by volunteer Spiritual Life Coordinators (Conference pastors) infendship and quiet vesper services. Pecometh continued to operate under the accreditation of the American Camping Association, the most widely recognized program of camping accreditation for health, safety and integrity of program. Camp Pecometh achieved 100% on the 325 areas checked during the 1994 accreditation visit, a first for Camp Pecometh)

Pecometh offers both year-round and seasonal facilities for groups, individuals and families, in addition to the extensive summer camp program for children and youth. In 1994, 121 groups with 4,712 participants used the facilities.

Plans are now complete for the 1995 summer season. The program theme is *Hear and Live,* and campers will be able to choose from 19 different camping programs. Two new programs have been added: Swimming and Spirit Alive For Adults Over 50. One of the exciting parts of the 1995 summer season is the return to expanded use of volunteers in the program. The use of volunteers in 1994 added enrichment to our programs and helped in reducing expenses.

Drayton Retreat Center

During 1994, Drayton provided 3,510 guests from 161 groups with a variety of printual life experiences. Of the above individuals, 1,711 guests from 84 groups came from Peninsual-Delaware Conference churches. Some came for continuing education programs, some for a time of rest and refreshment, and some to discover a new dimension of living their Christian lives. The average Peninsula-Delaware Conference group size was 20. One group was there for the 29th consecutive year.

The swimming pool at Drayton was used by 2,193 guests. Some were guests of Drayton through pool membership, some through attending programs, some as guests of members and some from grounds use groups.

We are pleased to report that we ended our fiscal year in the black.

One of the continuing aspects of the operation of Drayton Retreat Center during the year was the significant work accomplished by volunteer crews organized by Carolyn Godfrey. Major projects completed during the year were: returbishment of the library, complete renovation of the Bell House, and completion of numerous indoor and outdoor maintenance projects. The efforts and donations of volunteers continues to enable Drayton to preserve and utilize this important facility for the Peninsula-Delaware Conference, allowing staff to focus their efforts on ministry rather than fund-raisings.

1996 GOALS

- 1. To increase the number of persons using both facilities by 10%.
- 2. To offer an adult camping program at Pecometh.
- To introduce group initiatives and environmental educational programs at both locations.
- 4. To maintain a balanced budget for the Ministry of Spiritual Formation.
- To seek additional contributions for the maintenance trust funds established for Camp Pecometh and Drayton Retreat Center.
- To continue to recruit ethnic persons to serve on the summer Pecometh staff; 15% as a minimum goal.
- 7. To maintain and enrich the spiritual environment of both locations.
- 8. To continue to improve the physical appearance of both facilities.
- To continue to emphasize the importance of recruiting volunteer workers at both locations.
- To continue to build the Spiritual Formation Team into a highly motivated and skilled group.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

"The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world and those who dwell therein." (Psalm 24:1, NEB) As steward, the Council on Finance and Administration manages the Lord's money—the gifts of the people, the apportionments of the churches. The Council makes every effort to be a wise steward, spending those funds in ways that reflect the mission of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference.

Throughout the 1993-1996 Quadrennium, C.F.& A. has been continually studying the apportionment formula system. Several different formulas have been tested; as yet, a satisfactory atternative to the present formula that meets the objectives of being more equitable and not overly complex has not been discovered. However, C.F.& A. will continue to study this matter.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS:

During the past year, the following actions were taken by the Council:

- Approved a one-time additional sum of \$60,000 for the Board of Pensions to help in meeting past service funding for 1995.
- Granted \$50,000 to Camp Pecometh toward the renovation of the kitchen/dining facility.

- 3. Granted \$90,000 to Spiritual Formation for major maintenance. Drayton: office equipment, mower, tools, mattresses, volunteer self-help supplies such as paint and walipaper, and matching funds for nature trails. Camp Pecometr: upgrading of recreation hall (siding, floor, doors, window, paint), upgrading of electric service at Riverside, office equipment, mattresses, mower and tools, sailboat repair, cance, paddles and life jackets, tents and replacement parts, sports equipment, upgrading of phone service, stain exterior of administration building, two golf-cart-like trucks, volunteer self-help supplies, and matching funds for nature trails.
 - Approved up to \$20,000 for major repairs to Salisbury District Parsonage to meet Conference standards.
 - Approved \$4,700 to fund Theological Task Force established by the 1994 Annual Conference.
- Approved a one-time additional sum of \$2,000 for the Contingent Relief Fund.
- Granted \$80,000 to Spiritual Formation for major replacement and maintenance. Camp Pecometh: tractor and equipment, repair of pool and deck, and two additional golf carts. Draytor: repair service drive, repair conference room floor, and carpet front hall.
- Hired William E. Westbrook, Jr. as Business Manager and elected him Treasurer of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference to replace Theodore W. Briggs, who retired effective February 1, 1995.
- Hired Elaine A. Wilkerson to fill the newly created position of Benefits Manager.
 - Approved the expenditure of \$4,000 for new furniture for the Conference Business Office.

OBJECTIVES AND GOALS FOR THE QUADRENNIUM:

Objective I: Members of local churches have a positive attitude and understanding of our connection, have a sense of ownership in our Conference program, and understand the significance of apportionments and the role of local churches.

Action Goal 1: C.F.& A. work with Board of Laity to train Lay Members of Annual Conference in their roles as interpreters to local churches of Conference work and budget.

Action Goal 2: C.F.& A. work with Communications Committee to develop and present budget interpretation at Annual Conference in each of the years 1993-1996.

Action Goal 3: C.F.& A. request that District Superintendents affirm and compliment, at the Charge Conferences, those churches that pay their apportionments in full. Request that District Superintendents, as soon as possible after annual reports are received in January, send a letter to the pastors complimenting those churches on the full payment of their apportionment with the request that the letter be read to the congregation at the Sunday morning services.

Objective II: Local church Finance Chairpersons helped to understand their job and to know some of the techniques to help them do their job. "Saturation" teams work for one day each with three churches per district selected by the District Superintendents.

Action Goal 4: Form teams of persons with some financial expertise, one team for each district. District Superintendents invite team to meet for one day with a church, a minimum of three churches per calendar year. Team train local church officials and clergy in standardized budgeting of income and expenses, standardized record keeping and reporting, conducting financial stewardship campain, and auditing procedures.

Objective III: Churches in apportionment hearings come wanting to find a way to meet their apportionment.

Action Goal 5: C.F.& A. review method of calculating apportionments. C.F.& A. review procedures for apportionment review and adjustment, and communicate procedures (guidelines) to District Superintendents and all churches/charges requesting apportionment review. (Revised)

Objective IV: Help pastors in first appointment to understand apportionments and how to interpret them.

Action Goal 6: C.F.& A. request Board of Ordained Ministry to inform all pastors newly serving in the Peninsula-Delaware Conference:

- What are apportionments (benevolences)?
- 2. What are ministries funded by apportionments?
- 3. How are apportionments calculated?
- 4. Why is it important that each and every local church pay its apportionments in full?
- Why is it important that each and every local church pay its apportionments on a monthly basis?
- What financial forms are required by the Annual Conference and how are the figures obtained?

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- That the 1996 Budget, in the amount of \$5,148,221.00, be adopted.
- 2. That 0.38 be the apportionment factor for 1996.
- In the event payments on apportionments fall short of the budget, the Council on Finance and Administration shall determine where to adjust the 1996 Budget.

4. ADDITIONAL RECOMMENDATION:

- In accordance with paragraph 251.1 of <u>The Discipline</u>, each local church will elect a District Steward at the 1995 Charge Conference.
- 2. These District Stewards will be divided into several groups of 15-20 persons and will meet with their District Superintendent and a member of the Council on Finance and Administration to discuss the Conference budget and other questions pertaining to the raising and spending of Conference funds. These meetings are to be held in the first quarter of the 1996 calendar year.
- 3. These District Stewards will return to their local church boards and finance

committees to interpret and explain how these Conference funds are raised and dispersed. This is to be done during the second quarter of the 1996 calendar year.

The election of a District Steward by the local church is a prerequisite for an apportionment review.

BOARD OF CHILD CARE

This year, the Board of Child Care has focused its effort on continuing to enhance and add treatment services for children and looking at our mission and new ways to serve in the future. The Board of Child Care serves 140 children daily in our residential, shelter and foster care programs. Our occupancy in all our programs have averaged 95% capacity thus being the highest census in many vears.

In October, at Autumniest, Bishop Joseph Yeakel dedicated our on-campus school or children who are educationally handicapped and those who need additional time prior to being mainstreamed into public school. Rev. Joan Carter-Timbach, appointed in July so our flut-lime chaplain, has developed a superb spiritual life program. Boys and girls attend formal vespers services on alternating Sundays. Our pupped ministry, "Puppets in Harmony", have performed at several churches and for church groups. Bible study and volunteer time at retirement homes, soup kitchens and shut-lins are part of our expectations for our residents. One of our cottages now houses ten adolescent boy between 16 and 18 years of age with the focus on preparing them for independent living. Preparation includes job interviewing techniques, work in the community, visiting colleges and work places, and developing a resume.

Our foster care program in the District of Columbia at Allbright Church serves close to 50 children daily. Our dedicated foster parents and staff work closely to provide a quality service. The problems of the District of Columbia has impacted the Board of Child Care in that they have fallen behind considerably in their payments to us. We continue to try to negotiate the 3 year old licensing issue for the Board of Child Care. It is our hope that both the financial and licensing issues will be resolved in the near future.

The Board of Directors continue to allocate funds to improve the physical plant of our facility. By summer, each cottage on campus will be air conditioned and bathrooms remodeled to go along with each unit being remodeled and refurbished last year. Kelso, our girls shelter, was completely remodeled and refurbished list year. The Board of Child Care has purchased six acres behind our campus that has frontage off Rolling Road for future possible development. In January, the Board of Directors began a Strategic Plan process with an ad-hoc committee of the Board of Directors, representatives of the church and auxiliary, plus staff. The firm of Parente, Randolph, Orlando, Carey and Associates have been hired as consultants to help us look at our mission statement, alternate ways of serving, and future expansion.

The Harford County Project continues to be litigated by the neighborhood community association. Since last year, the hearing officer's decision has been upheld in local review and now is in Circuit Court. We continue to appreciate the support of the church, individual members in the Baltimore East District and throughout the conference, in our pursuit to meet the increasing needs of children who are in need of help.

Finally, we have hired a project director for Youthcheck which will be housed in East Baltimore at St. Paul's United Methodist Church. Ms. Paula Stokes of our staff, hopes to recruit mentors, with the help of Rev. Doug Hoffman, and be ready to provide services for children by July 1, 1995. We have chosen the Frederick and Cumberland-Hagerstown Districts as our first sites for satellite programs. The Board of Child Care anticipates future expansions throughout the Conference by January 1, 1996. The satellite programs will offer short term counseling for adults, children and families. This past year, the Board of Child Care has responded to over 100 church-related inquiries regarding children and families in crisis. Several children spent time in our Shelter program for short term treatment reasons. The above affirms the need for outreach services.

The Board of Child Care is committed to 'Do all the good you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as you can.' It is in the above Wesleyan tradition that the Board of Child Care and its partners, the Church, members of the Church and its auxiliary, will continue to find ways to make this world and list neighborhoods a better place to live in.

BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

The members of the Board continued to work in our four key result areas in 1994: Environmental Justice, Human Welfare, Peace with Justice, and Resourcing Congregational Life.

The Environmental Justice program had an ecological exhibit at Annual Conference which demonstrated friendly household commodities and distributed publications of environmental organizations. They have worked with the Grassroots Coalition for Environmental and Economic Justice to encourage groups within local churches to embark on environmental activities, especially youth.

The Parish Nursing program received support from the Board through a grant to develop a Health Ministry Library in the Peninsula-Delaware Conference which will be maintained by the staff of the Chester Bethel Health Ministry.

The Peace with Justice program of the Board continued the Legislative Internship at Wesley College and Chesapeake College. The Interns attend legislative sessions, receive copies of bills, and make the Board aware of legislative issues which concern United Methodists as set forth in the Social Principles.

The Board enlisted the help of the Conference, Pastors, and church members in an effort to defeat the legislation permitting slot machines to be placed at Delaware race tracks.

The Board of Church and Society continues its support of Pacem in Terris which serves as the international part of our Peace with Justice work area, addressing ethnic conflict, global economics, foreign policy, racism, and economic justice. The Executive Director and Administrative Assistant prepared mailings for our Board meetings, contacted and arranged for the speaker for our Fall 1995 conference, "Of Such is the Kingdom: Helping Local Churches Develop a Holistic Ministry to Children." In order to reach more local churches, this conference is planned for two days – one in Centreville, Maryland and one at St. Paul's Church in Wilmington.

The Resourcing Congregations program continued to encourage activity at the local church level through its mini-grant program. Grants were awarded to the indian Mission Church for a Native American Christian Sunday School to make children more aware of Christianity and the Native American culture and to the Oakville-Cottage Grove Charge to offer hope in the misst of adversity and lead them toward self-help.

BOARD OF DIACONAL MINISTRY

In 1994, the Board of Diaconal Ministry EXPERIENCED this scripture passage as

the Board worked to carry out its mission in the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference.

The Board continued to respond to inquiries from persons seeking to respond to God's call for their fives through the areas of music, evangelism, education, youth ministry, and through the areas of lay ministry as postal workers, church secretaries, nurses, and insurance people. Not all persons committed themselves to certification and/or consecration. Anu each received help articulating for themselves God's call.

The specific journeys of those who are declared candidates for consecration were supervised and encouraged and the Board rejoiced in the approaching consecration, in 1995, of one of its own - Pat Sullivan. In addition, persons who have received professional certification were supported and their credentials renewed.

Attention has shifted from helping people understand what a Diaconal Minister I, to HOW a Diaconal Minister, or one who is certified, can function in a staff or agency configuration. As persons move toward diaconal forms of ministry, the question becomes "How can they, and where can they, best use their gifts to live out God's cail?". The Board will continue to encourage the involvement of Diaconal Ministers in the life of this Annual Conference at all levels and will begin to help a new leadership team assume responsibility for the direction of this Board.

The Board of Diaconal Ministry continues to be a group of widely diverse individuals, but motivated by love of the One God, they are varied in their interests but remain one in their loyalty to the mission of this Board. We truly are "One in the Spirit". Praise the Lord!

BOARD OF DISCIPLESHIP

The Board of Discipleship reordered its life around the primary task which dictates that we operate as one ochesive board' rather than several unconnected "divisions". The BOD celebrated a year of growth and genuine "shared community" as we embraced one central focus: Effective Disciplemaking in the Local Church. We thank the Lord Jesus Christ for His sustaining grace that enabled us to plunge together in seemingly chaotic and sometimes uncertain waters.

But now we invite you to embrace and celebrate with us the beginning fruit of our labor evidenced in 1994:

 LOCAL CHURCH DISCIPLEMAKING - COOPERATIVE WORK AREAS - The Board implemented Part I of an extensive Disciplemaking Plan to local congregations through four district-wide workshops - 'Locking Through New Glasses'. Leadership Team approach to planning and doing ministry (Emphasizing Primary Task as a system) was introduced in these workshops in which forty-three churches participated. Part II of our Disciplemaking Plan, 'Yonig a New Thing' Discipleship Forums, were planned and implemented in early 1995.

- 2. PARTNER'S PROJECT Mt. Salem UMC in Wilmington completed this year with evidence of measurable growth in their overall ministry. West Cecil Charge of North East, MD our recent recipient, experienced the leadership of a 5-person team utilizing the Administrative Council model of nurture and discipleship. This was a successful one-day training event that emphasized leadership training and development. Partner's Project is a proven model with trained personnel available to effect revitalization of all local congrenations.
- 3. PRINT AND A-V RESOURCE The Interfaith Resource Center (IRC) is a ministry that encourages and equips the congregations of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference by providing support and resource so that all may study the soriptures, share the faith, minister to others and praise God. Through the IRC, local churches were afforded the opportunity to use resources that may otherwise be too costly. Two volunteer consultants, Letta Hull and Althea Armstrong assisted in the staffing at two of the four Resource Center's satellite areas, Salisbury and Dover, respectively. There are presently 50 membership churches, but several congregations participate in this ministry.
- 4. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION CONSULTANTS This continues to be the most effective ministry of the BOD. The CE consultants, Althea Amstrong, Liz SI. Clair and Alice Hemmelian, gave leadership to an increased number of congregations, BOD district events and the planning of Annual Conference Events. Some specific accomplishments include organization/implementation of first charge-wide Vacation Bible School, formulation of new church schools, organizing Christian Education programs, teacher training/evaluation and long-term and short-term goal planning with individual churches.
- 5. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION The BOD sponsored a Conference-wide event, Vacation Bible School Preview, and several district events including VBS workshops, New Cokesbury Curriculum Preview and teacher training workshops. Seven persons were sponsored to attend the Christian Educator's Fellowship in Orlando, Florida including a scholarship given to a certified Christian Educator in the Peninsula-Delaware Conference. The BOD sent a representative to the Christian Educator InthINK TANK to explore with leaders from all over the country new directions and possibilities for the future of Christian Education in the local church.
- 6. EVANGELISM TRAINING Ten members of various churches in our conference received scholarships to attend the NEJ School of Evangelism in Ocean Grove, NJ. The Board sponsored a Conference-wide two-day event, "Let's Get Real About Evangelism" with Rev Jim Salminen of Frazier UMC. Approximately 100 persons were in attendance each night. We continue support of the Wilmington District "Come Alive in Christ" event. The Board is developing a "Come Alive in Christ" event for Salisbruy District. Evangelismhelephone teams were developed to promote/monitor district events. Two Denman Awards were awarded to a clergy and laity at the 1994 Annual Conference.
- 7. OLDER ADULT MINISTRIES Four district Leadership Empowement workshops were conducted at Draylon Retreat Center. The Board sponsored a camping experience at Camp Pecometh to enhance spiritual formation of older adults. We also continue to provide resourcing to the Parish Nursing Program. Training for this was coordinated in Eastern Pennsylvania and Virginia Conferences this year. The BOD sponsored members of local churches to attend the national training events. This area continues to raise consciousness of health-related issues of older adults.

- 8. NEW VENTURES MINISTRIES The Board assumed responsibility for implementation of New Ventures Ministries. We developed an instrument for evaluation of 1994 awarded New Ventures Ministries. Six grants were awarded to local churches and/or boards and agencies in 1995.
- WORSHIP The BOD provided support to the Fellowship of United Methodists in Worship, Music and Other Arts (FUMWMOA) and sponsored a Conference-wide Fall Worship Event. There was an increase in membership of FUMWMOA local chapter and a 50% increase in attendance at the Regional Convocation and the Conference annual fall event

- We will have an evangelism training event, with nationally recognized leadership, that will address one aspect of evangelism.
- We will identify and resource African-American persons skilled in the practice of Evangelism and develophest models to be used in the revitalization of African-American Churches.
 - We will support pilot projects in evangelism that encourage local churches to try new evangelism ideas. ("New Thing")

WORSHIP - RELATING TO GOD

 We will provide leadership, inspiration, and resources, both material and human, in development of alternative and innovative ideas to enhance worship in our local churches.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION - NURTURING IN THE FAITH

- We will make quality training tailored to needs of Christian Education teachers and leaders available and accessible to local congregations in easy-to-reach, near-by locations.
- We will provide training for leaders and teachers in curriculum, skills and new understandings to increase the quality of Christian Education in local congregations.

STEWARDSHIP - SENDING OUT TO SERVE

- We will have a major Conference-wide stewardship event in the Spring of 1996. Our speaker will be a prominently noted authority in stewardship.

Older Adult Ministries Committee

Scripture Reading: Matthew 22:36-39

The Peninsula-Delaware Conference Older Adult Ministries Committee meets regularly to identify issues that impact their lives. It is through these dialogue sessions that we identify the emotional, physical, and spiritual health needs and specific ways to address them. These are concerns that must be uplifted on behalf of all individuals. During the past year, plans for programs and projects were developed that address specific needs of elderly individuals and groups in our Conference.

The continued rapid growth in the aged population should encourage each church to embrace the following challenge: Free itself from all forms of agelsm: to develop partnerships with agencies that serve the aged; to become serious about developing an intentional ministry by, for, and with older adults; reach out to older adults and nivel them to experience a renewed relationship with Got, nuture older adults as they confront their losses or needs. A spiritual formation program for, with, and by the aged will be developed so older adults will become engaged in a life-long spiritual journey.

During 1995-1997, the Aging Ministries Program will seek to develop a framework by which we can:

Network with other agencies that seek to serve the aged and become a referral agency so seniors may receive available services.

Identify ways to empower aged individuals so they can manage their own health and advocate for the services they need.

Introduce models for Health Ministries Programs that will provide churches the opportunity to select the ministry that will best fit the needs of their entire congregation.

<u>Volunteer Bank Program</u> - to assist the elderly to obtain the services they need through bartering systems. Expand the Sharing Our Services to three sites.

White House Conference on Aging (Governor Appointment) - To examine the Older American Act and seek ways to obtain services through the legislative process for older persons.

This division exists to help local churches through grants and loans, in the construction and repair of church facilities and parsonages. The application process is simple, and the division is available to help walk you through the complete process.

Division of Health and Welfare

In 1994, the Parish Nurse program trained five additional parish nurses. This program, begun in our Conference in 1993, prepares nurses for holistic health promotion and disease prevention in local churches.

A one-day empowerment training workshop was held on each district. A total of 103 people attended the workshop, lead by John N. Atleno of the African Medical Research Foundation in Nairobi, Kenya. Peninsula United Methodist Homes cosponsored this event with the division.

Throughout the year, the division malled to all clergy members in the Conference information on various health subjects, including: parish nurses, older adult ministries, modern wills, healthy handly hints, cancer, and grief.

1996 GOALS

- To assist local churches in the education of members on various health ministry programs through seminars and mailings.
- To expand the Parish Nurse ministry, in conjunction with the Eastern Pennsylvania and Virginia Conferences.

Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc.

The following information about Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc. (PUMH) is printed because the Conference and PUMH share a common mission although the Conference does not have any financial or legal responsibility for PUMH.

(A Covenant of Affiliation Between PUMH and the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church, adopted June 1985.)

Peninsula United Methodist Homes, Inc. (PUMH) is the area's largest not-for-profit provider of retirement/health care services. PUMH opened Delaware's first not-for-profit continuing care retirement community, Methodist Country House, in 1960. In 1966, the Methodist Manor House opened in Seafort or provide retirement living on the eastern shore. Twelve years later, in 1978, PUMH opened Cokestry Village in Hockessin, Delaware to ofter more spacious living units to the older adult population. In additionable published the published the published in the Methodist of the published published in the published published the published published in Methodished published publis

In its five communities, PUMH serves approximately 1,380 men and women over the age of 60 and employs about 1,070 people. The total assets of the corporation and the five facilities are approximately \$145,000,000.

All of PUMH's continuing care retirement communities in the State of Delaware are accredited by the Continuing Care Accreditation Commission (CCAC) an independent agency sponsored by the American Association of Homes and Services for the Aging. The three PUMH communities, Methodist Country House, Methodist Manor House, and Cokesbury Village are among the 172 facilities nationwide that have earned this prestigious honor. The 1990 accreditation was a result of extensive evaluation and assures commitment to excellence in resident life, finance, health care, governance and administration. These three communities will seek reaccreditation in 1995.

PUMH is grateful to the many friends who in 1994 contributed \$294,100 for immediate benevolence assistance. We are pleased to note that the 1994 Conterous grant of \$45,000, combined with Mother's Day offerings of \$37,100 and other grifts, provided benevolence funds to twenty-nine Country House and Manor House residents who financial resources no longer enable them to meet the full cost of care. On behalf of all the recipients, PUMH is most appreciative of these grifts.

Expansion and improvements continued in 1994. At the Methodist Manor House, seven new cottages were completed bringing the total number of cottages to forty-out-Construction of the Nanticoke Wing, which will offer ten new apartments and will open in 1995, is currently ahead of schedule. Eight apartment conversions took place and ten wisting apartments received new sprinker systems. Additionally, improvements to the main entrance off Middleford Road have been completed.

The project to improve the water supply at Methodist Country House continues. The project involves improvements to the facility's wells and well pumps, repairs and improvements in the main boiler room water control equipment, new piping, and uporading the City of Wilmington's water supply to the Country House.

A traffic light has been installed by the Delaware Department of Transportation at the main entrance of the Country House. The main entrance shares the intersection with the Wilmington Country Club. The light offers greatly improved safety for Country House residents.

Six new cottages will be built at Cokesbury Village on a recently purchased parcel of land.

A significant number of repairs and renovations took place at the Layton Home in 1994. Among these were extensive restoration and improvement of the main lobby and the multipurpose room complete with new furnishings and new lighting. Additionally, new security cameras, monitors and building perimeter lighting were installed. A new kitchen dishroom is complete and in use.

Layton Home received funding from the State of Delaware Grant-in-Aid Appropriations Bill for fiscal year 1995, as it has done for three previous years. This grant, designated for operating support to Layton Home, represents an increase over the amount received last year. In addition to the support of volunteers and donors, Layton Home is supported by the sound management of PUMH.

1994 was a year for implementation of new services and enhancement of existing programs for residents to increase the level of care offered. Additionally, PUMH worked to expand its visibility in the community by offering new services to the older adult population.

PUMH published its first resident at calendar in 1994. The most accomplished resident artists were selected with the help of senior staff members at each community. The art was presented to a special panel comprised of PUMH staff and featured everything from wood carving to oriental gardening. Twelve selections were made and compiled into a calendar that has received rave reviews. It is an excellent example of the scope of talentic individuals residing in the PUMH communities.

In its effort to extend more flexible retirement living to a wider range of individuals. PUMH has developed a plan to offer studios at the Methodist Country House on a fee for service basis with no entrance fee. Residents may rent a studio for a monthly fee which includes the apartment, all utilities and three meals a day. PUMH constantly strives to provide greater services to our residents. With this is mind, PUMH has formed a partnership with Delaware Hospice and formed a not-for-profit corporation PUMH Home Health Care, Inc. (PHHC). The partnership with Delaware Hospice and PHHC will enhance the care already provided by the medical teams at the communities.

Delaware Hospice provides for in-home care for those suffering from terminal illnesses which dramatically lowers medical costs and at the same time gives the resident a choice of the type of care they receive. The care provided is individualized, thereby offering dignity and respect for the resident. The families of Delaware Hospice recipients will benefit with respite care which allows the resident to spend several days in the health center to relieve the burden of care on the spouse or other family member. Additionally, trained volunteers are available to stay in the home with the resident allowing the spouse or designated caretaker the opportunity to attend to other responsibilities.

PHHC was formed to provide home health care to residents of PUMH retirement communities and it eventually is anticipated that PHHC will offer services to those outside of the communities. PHHC works to minimize the cost of heath care by serving those who need therapeutic, supportive and rehabilitative services in their home. Home health providers educate and support the residents and their families in the care giving and treatment process allowing the resident and his or her family to assume control of recovery enhancing the quality of life and dinniv of the individual

PUMH's Aging Ministries Program continues to flourish. This program is cooperatively sponsored by the Peninsula Delaware Annual Conference and is an outreach resource for local churches, interfaith groups and community organizations that serve the elderly. The program has developed a system to link the aging population with available services for older adults, assists aged individuals to reach their highest potential and live with dignity and independence as long as possible and coordinates training events for, with and by local leadership in the aging network.

In addition, the Aging Ministries Program developed a partnership with local congregations to assist in the implementation of the Health Ministries Program. It has encouraged Annual and General Conference financial support so local congregations can participate in the program which would not be possible otherwise. The Health Ministries Program promoted the recruitment of RN's from local congregations who attended the 1994 Parish Nurse Preparation Training that was held in Easton, Pennsylvania, and was responsible for coordinating funding that provided partial scholarships for this training.

Sharing our Services (SOS), a volunteer bank program, is another program developed by the Aging Ministries Program at the request of the Division of Aging of the State of Delaware. SOS was developed to assist the elderly in obtaining the services they need through a bartering system. Currently, the program is available through nine churches in the greater Wilmington area. Approximately 100 individuals are being served by this program.

It has always been PUMH's intention to serve a racially diversified group of residents. Federal regulations require that advertising reflect a racial balance and recent interpretations of those regulations have supported the application of those requirements to advertising for continuing care retirement communities. In January 1994, PUMH was used by Baltimore Neighborhoods, Inc., an advocacy group, which claimed that PUMH's advertising did not adequately meet these requirements. A full and complete settlement was reached by August 1994 with no admission of liability on the part of PUMH. However, because of its heightened awareness of the issues, PUMH and Delaware State University have embraked on a study to discover how to attract more minorities to retirement communities. Additionally, a fund has been established by PUMH to subsidize entrance lees of African American applicants at Methodist Manor House and/or Heron Polint who meet all other entrance requirements.

At the annual meeting of its Board of Trustees in September 1994, PUMH presented the George H. Pigueron Jr. Founder's Award to Ruth E. Faust. Mrs. Faust is a member of Aldersgate United Methodist Church. She opened the Country House Gift Shop in 1960 as a volunteer and continued to manage the shop until 1994 when she retired after 34 years of volunteer service. Proceeds from the gift shop over these years have been contributed to the Country House Benevolence Fund and have totalled more than \$50,0,000. Mrs. Faust exemplifies the true meaning of selflessness and unconditional qivino.

In 1994 PUMH continued to meet the challenges it faced in providing the most progressive and comprehensive retirement living available. Expansion, renovations of existing facilities and innovative new programs for residents and the community at large all illustrate the constant forward motion of PUMH while it retains its strong heritage and tradition of pursuing the ministry of care in a socially responsible manner.

Peninsula United Methodist Homes of Maryland, Inc.

The following information about PUMH of Maryland, Inc. is printed because the Conference and PUMH of Maryland, Inc. share a common mission although the Conference does not have any financial or legal responsibility for PUMH of Maryland, Inc.

(A Covenant of Affiliation between PUMH of Maryland, Inc., and the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, adopted June 5, 1990.)

In 1986, because of its recognized leadership in the retirement industry, Peninsula United Methodst Homes, (PUMH) was approached by the Chester-Sassaffars Poundation about developing a retirement community in Chestertown, Maryland, PUMH created PUMH of Maryland, Inc. (PUMH of Maryland) in 1987 to serve as the owner of the proposed retirement community, PUMH of Maryland contracted with PUMH to develop and manage the new retirement community which was later named Heron Politics.

Heron Point was developed to conform with the historic aspect of Chestertown. The architects designed structures to compliment the historic buildings of the town. Great care was taken to preserve the natural beauty of the riverside site and the surrounding wetlands.

Ground was broken in November 1989 and Heron Point was completed early in 1991. The first cottage was occupied in January 1991. After staff training and other preparation, the health center was opened and, therefore, the facility truly offered continuing care to the residents. On May 7, 1991 Heron Point welcomed its first partment residents.

Heron Point currently serves approximately 240 men and women over the age of 60 and employs about 130 people. The total assets of the corporation and Heron Point are roughly \$46,000,000.

Residents of Heron Point are a vigorous and involved group of individuals. They continue to contribute actively to society by donating their time and talents to special causes throughout Chestertown. Volunteers from Heron Point immerse themselves in at a juvenile detertion, enter. Heron Point volunteers also make regular visits to hospitals in the community to assist patients with a variety of tasks. Many residents are involved in civic affairs and attend local government meetings to voice their opinions on issues affecting Heron Point, Chestertown, and the Chester River. A number of Heron Point residents are active in the churches in Chestertown.

Residents are also finding fulfillment through self-improvement. The Academy of Lifelong Learning at Washington College of tiers a wonderful educational resource to Heron Point residents. The college environment provides interaction with a diverse group of people, young and old, and offers stimulating lectures, intriguing reading and challenging projects. A few Heron Point residents serve as instructors for courses offered at the college.

Like the PUMH communities in Delaware, Heron Point has a Resident Council and the residents have established more than 12 committees for every interest from drama

to ecology.

PUMH Aging Ministries Program has also been active in Chestertown. This year, the Parish Nurse Program began in the community. This program involves bringing healing and nurturing back to its origins, the Church.

Using the foundation and principles set forth by PUMH 35 years ago, Heron Point is continuing a tradition of superior retirement living and care. The future looks promising because of the commitment to providing the highest possible quality of life for older adults.

Division of Mission

The purpose of the division is to promote mission within the Peninsula-Delaware Conference on the local, national and global levels.

In 1994, the division coordinated the Mission Alivel weekend on the Salisbury District. The goal of Mission Alivel is to encourage congregations to become more involved in mission, from the local to the global level. The weekend was a mission saturation event in which all interested congregations had a mission speaker. Approximately one-third of the congregations on the district participated, and the response was positive. A Mission Alivel weekend will be held on the Dover District in the spring of 1995, and on the Easton District in 1996. The Wilmington District participated in the first Mission Alivel weekend in 1993.

The division continued to encourage congregations to participate in the Global Mission Partners Program. There are six criteria to be met in order for a congregation to be a global mission partner:

- Apportionments paid in full
- 2. Have an ongoing mission education program
- 3. Support for local mission
- Have a covenant relationship with a missionary through the General Board of Global Ministries
- Pledge support for an international person in mission (i.e., a non-U.S. missionary)
- Share the congregation's story of mission with other congregations

In 1994, Elkton and Hockessin Churches became the first Global Mission Partners in the Peninsula-Dalaware Conference.

Also in 1994, the division provided partial scholarships enabling some pastors to attend the School of Christian Mission sponsored by the United Methodist Women. This is the first time in several years that interested pastors have applied for this assistance.

1996 GOALS

weekend on the Easton District as well as follow-up events on the Dover, Salisbury and Wilmington Districts to encourage ten percent of congregations in the Peninsula-Delaware Conference to enter a covenant relationship with a missionary, and five percent of congregations to become Global Mission Partners.

- Mission Interpreter Training -- To train one or two persons who will be mission speakers and visit at least ten congregations within two years.
- Volunteers in Mission -- To support one conference or district sponsored VIM team, thus enabling persons to have a hands-on mission experience.
- United Methodist Committee on Relief -- To encourage each congregation in the Annual Conference to contribute at least \$1 per member to UMCOR.
- Clergy Scholarships to the School of Christian Mission -- To encourage pastors to attend the School of Christian Mission.

Division of Parish and Conference Ministries

A change in the leadership of our division led to a need for not only securing a firm grip of the reins, but for the understanding of the essence of the horse to which it is attached. After the initial ride, the "horse' seems healthy and the landscape seems fairly ordered and brimming with life. Compliments to the erstwhile leader of this division and to our partners in ministry.

To the extent that change has occurred, and to the extent that this division has been called "to be a catalyst for missions ministries in the Annual Conference and the various communities within its bounds", it is imperative that it strives to insure the survivability and success of the viable ministries of its partners.

In that regard, and riding the virtues of self evaluation, 1994 can be adjudged a rewarding and successful year. The relationship between Parish and Conference Ministries and its partners continued to thrive, as did the various ministries. We also kept abreast of the necessity for finding new ways to address the changing faces of the mission fields. We were able to complete a survey which sought to identify cooperative ministries around the Annual Conference. We will assess its results to determine any meaningful answers that can be deduced.

Furthermore, whether it is in evolving relationships with other ministries, such as the Lost Coin Group, or the prayerful anticipation of the successful emergence of others, such as the one being nurtured in the Sussex Corridor, we thank God for, and celebrate the growth of, our ministries. We feel embodied to venture into 1996, made so by the knowledge that God, whose purpose we serve, will be our guide.

By God's grace, our journey in 1996 will be worthwhile and fruitful to our parishes and the entire Annual Conference. To God be the Glory!

Cooperative Urban Ministries of Salisbury

Cooperative Urban Ministries involvement in the City of Salisbury has begun to make its impact. Our urban churches have taken the steps needed to ensure this ministry heighten awareness and success. Our thrust to become involved and make a difference is being seen throughout the Salisbury District.

Ultran problems have not changed. Many of our neighborhoods have declined with more services needed for the materially impoverished. Poverty has increased, the rental housing base has declined, many are working menial jobs, violence in our neighborhoods continues at an alarming rate. More persons have become homeless and our young families are fragmented. Yet, Cooperative Urban Ministries believes that the Lord is calling our congregations to come together and "Do A New Thing". Our urban churches are doing just that. Together, we will build among our congregations and a city a special concern for understanding and appreciating each other for who and what we are -Children of God.

Our mission is to develop and coordinate programs for the urban churches which serve and minister to the needs of the Salisbury Community. Our core service areas include:

- 1. Providing short and long termed housing
- 2. Single parent ministries
- Survival assistance
- 4. Remedial Education

Salisbury Cooperative Urban Ministries (SCUM) relates to the materially impoverished. We expect to get to know each other as one of God's people relating to another one of His servants. SCUM helps each congregation to build stronger relationships, unifying the ministry of their churches. God is calling us to witness this very special time in our city, whereby, our urban congregations have laid aside their individuality and banded together for building a better community in the Salisbury area.

Accomplishments for 1994 are many:

- Completion of a new roof project for a minister's widow.
- 2. Confirmation Rally hosting 200 participants.
- Clergy Canvass of South Salisbury.
 - 4. Assisted with VBS at St. Andrews UMC and helped with funding.

Operated Family Support Center at Grace.

6. Held and Urban Choir Camp for city youth.

7. Coordinated a Youth Progressive Dinner for 200 Youth. 8

Begun the construction of a new Habitat Home.

9 Provided logistical and financial support for Samuel and Jackie Onwu, UM Missionaries,

10 Conducted four leadership training workshops.

11 Held a successful Walk-A-Thon raising \$1,000.00 for Urban projects.

Our vision for SCUM as it relates to the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference is a broad one. SCUM is a great resource tool for all of our local congregations. SCUM has established a vast network and is involved with other community agencies, denominational boards, local churches and prominent city, government and community leaders. The programs and work of our agency can be seen in every town, hamlet, and community throughout our Conference. We see the same problems, needs, and cries for peace and justice, and empowerment and relief. Our culture has become urbanized. Urban life touches us all regardless of where we may live

When we examine the city, its operations and institutions, it will lead us to a greater understanding as to what the future will bring; we are a "global village". On the peninsula, the problems of our communities are similar. Apostle Paul reminds us that "we are all members of one body." When one part of the Body suffers, all of us suffer. People are suffering all over this peninsula. The church is challenged to extend its ministry to the social and spiritual conditions of our people. SCUM can reach beyond the local church area, link-up with other churches, social agencies, boards, resource persons, and institutions. Indeed, SCUM is a valuable resource and tool for our Conference.

Changing Directors in July 1994 had slowed SCUM's progress. While, ministry and programming had been planned, the new Director had to get his feet wet. Our Executive Committee, under the excellent leadership of interim Chairman, Jerome Sterling, the work of this important new agency moved forward. Our District Superintendent, Howard L. Gordy, Jr.; Council Director, Dr. Lehman Tomlin; and Salisbury Urban Pastors have been very supportive in providing the New Director guidance.

Accolades to Mrs. Lucille Bedford, Editor of our Conference Communicator, for her excellent coverage on SCUM and the helpful suggestions she gave to improve our public relations and publishing of the SCUM story.

In February, a new Parish Council Team was elected and our outlook for the new year is very positive. Many lay persons have come forth to assist with this ministry. SCUM, through its cooperativeness, makes a great witness to the people of the Eastern Shore of Maryland. Lives will be touched, people will be saved, churches will become more intimately involved with the materially impoverished in Salisbury, Maryland. It's a challenge and vision I've long hoped for. May God lead us onward to victory.

1995 GOALS

CONFIRMATION RALLY - This event would be held in May of 1995. The purpose here is to provide a training and informational event for the youth of the city. Youth from the Princess Anne BUMP churches will be invited to participate as in the previous year.

- URBAN WALK-A-THON This will be a march through the city of Salisbury for the purpose of providing our powerful witness and the Lord's disciples. The march will take place in March and will benefit the Haitian Mission at Wesley Temple. Persons of all faiths may join us in this witness.
- URBAN CHOIR CAMP This is an opportunity for children from urban churches, ethnic and cultural backgrounds to come together to gain a better appreciation for music. This event will be held during the first week of August.
- 4. HOT DOG SOCIALS This program is a time for selected members of the various churches to get together for bonding, knowledge of the churches, cultures, and understanding about our city, its peoples, barriers, goals and resolutions.
- 5. FAMILY SUPPORT MINISTRIES & SUPER PANTRY AND ST. ANDREW'S This is a program targeting persons 13-25 with pre-school children, non-parenting teens 10-18. Our purpose is to cause a decrease in the number of teen pregnancies in the area, to decrease the drop-out rate and to provide support systems; family, church, community, friends; to make the task of parenting easier for young parents. If funded through New Ventures and Maryland Food Committee, we expect to get started early in 1995.
- CONTINUE THE HABITAT HOME PROJECT Home ownership continues to be a problem with many of the persons we minister to. The Habitat Home Project provides for our churches raising, building and giving to a deserving family a brand new home.
- 7. GENESIS PROJECT Working with the Wesly Temple congregation, Urban Ministries will provide volunteers who will work with youth first time offenders. We will provide counseling, remedial training for basic skills, mentoring opportunities, job preparedness training.
- 8. CONFLICT RESOLUTION TRAINING We have discovered that many of our ministry participants have difficulty in maintaining congenial relationships which often evolves in disruptive behavior. If we are to reach these children and youth we need a positive and effective tool in which to provide a better quality of life. We expect to provide training opportunities for those persons who work with our children and youth.
- DEVELOPMENT OF CHILDREN/WOMEN'S VIOLENCE AND ABUSE TRAINING/SUPPORT GROUP - This program is needed throughout the Eastern Shore of Maryland. Our program will be informational, making referral to mental health agencies. The ultimate goal is to provide a place and opportunity for a support group to form and meet regularly.
- 10. TUTORIAL VOLUNTEER/FOR OUR CORE CHURCHES (Grace, St. Andrews and Wesley Temple) The need for assisting children and youth throughout our city with the basic subjects has been established. Many of our urban youth do not have good academic skills. We need to establish or assist the core churches with programs that will help alleviate this tremendous problem.
- 11. FAMILY SUPPORT CENTER CONSORTIUM This center will serve Wiccomico County. The planning group will be Shore-up, Wiccomico Health Department, Wiccomico Housing Authority, and Urban Ministries. This center will provide many services such as Prenatal Health, well baby clinic, parenting skills, parent support group, job preparedness courses, and so on. This is contingent upon funding from Friends of the Family (State of MD).
- 12. VOLUNTEERS Summer Camp and VBS at Grace UMC. These programs are ran by Grace each summer for East Salisbury residents. Urban Ministries has been

requested to provide volunteers to assist with these projects.

13. YOUTH COUNCIL - A number of our churches are interested in forming a youth council to coordinate city-wide events. Representatives from each urban church will make up the council alone with their coordinators.

Methodist Action Program

Re-MAPing urban mission – re-focusing and re-building urban ministries – was the primary emphasis of this year. The formulation of new strategies in 1992 and the employment of new staff in 1993 opened opportunities for charting new directions.

Partnering with local congregations in the development and extension of urban mixtries is the new strategy. Twenty-five years ago, M.A.P. had understood its task as building neighborhood ministries in our city churches. Then, for a number of reasons, M.A.P. collected its programs into its own buildings. This new strategy reverses policies of the past ten to twenty years and directs programming again through our urban neighborhood churches.

New staff persons brought new dreams and new possibilities. We began thinking outside the box* or, at least, inside a larger box. A new programming concept was articulated, refined, and initiated during the year: congregational revitalization. Those city and older suburban churches that wish to change their patterns and emphases for new possibilities in ministry and mission will be assisted in making those changes and in finding new life in Christ in the midst of their geographical neiphothodods.

In order to free resources for this new emphasis, on-going programs were restructured for efficiency. Some staff were assigned increased responsibilities, others were employed a reduced number of hours. Administrative efficiencies were implemented to redirect resources to new programming. Near the end of the year the Revitalization Program was initiated with six congregations -- three in the City of Wilmington and three in the surrounding suburbs.

In addition to the Congregational Revitalization Program, M.A.P. operated and/or assisted the following:

Housing Rehabilitation Program; M.A.P. WALK for Housing; Delaware Ecumenical Council, Maternal and Infant Health; Centers for Home Ownership; and Prison. Health Care, and Gambling reform issues.

At Old Asbury Church:
After School Educational Enrichment Program,
Brown Bag Club,
Crisis Alleviation,
Emmanuel Dining Room,
Summer Day Camp, and
The Wildemess Church:

At the former Harrison Street Church Parsonage: Centro Los Abuelos (The Grandparents' Center), Hispanic Senior Outreach Program, and Socialization for mentally handicapoed Hispanic children; Re-MAPing congregational development -- re-focusing and re-newing church extension strategies and practices -- was the other emphasis of this year. M.A.P. worked with three different styles of new church development and identified strategies for church extension and redevelopment in lower and middle income communities.

The Nueva Vida Mission Congregation continued as a project of the Willnington District and of the Methodist Action Program. M.A.P. supplied administrative and management assistance and substantial funding for this developing congregation for Spanish speaking people. Begun several years ago, this mission congregation continues to have a full time pastor assigned to it and now shares, without cost, the facilities of Grace United Methodist Church in Wilmington. This is a very expensive model for church extension: M.A.P. is exploring other models.

The new Hope Congregation in Pike Creek, southwest of Wilmington, was initiated by Hockessin Church's funding and freeing one quarter of its Associate Pastor's time for this project. This major contribution, plus some Conference funding, has created what should become a new congregation in April 1995. M.A.P. provided administrative assistance as well as some consultation. This is a method of developing new congregations that several of our larger churches need to explore; it could become a normal pattern of church extension in growing communities.

The third new church development project is The Wildemess Congregation at Old Asbury Church. It is a combined effort of a retired American Union Methodist Episcopal (AUME) clergyman, a small group of concerned Christians, and the Methodist Action Program to create a congregation focusing on homeless and marginalized people in the urban "wilderness." A volunter pastor and "free" space are enabling a mission focused congregation to explore new styles of ministry. Perhaps other congregations can be accompanied with part-time, volunteer, lay or ordained congregational baders using shared space in available churches or other community buildings or even in members' homes.

Re-MAPing Methodist urban mission and church extension has begun in earnest. During the next few years these and additional strategies will be implemented to share God's love and the Gospel of Jesus Christ in the midst of our secular city.

Neighborhood House, Inc.

In 1994, Neighborhood House provided services to 6,533 unduplicated individuals. The geographical distribution of clientele included City of Wilmington 3600, Newark 765 and other parts of New Castle County 2097.

Services ranged from Child Care to assisting first time home buyers to purchase a home. The Child Care program provided wholesome and developmental activities for 110 children throughout the year from ages 1 to 12 years. Valerie Miller, a former Child Care employee, returned again as a teacher.

Over 2,000 clients received service from the Housing Counseling Department which is a HUD certified comprehensive program with counselors certified by the National Federation of Housing Counselors. Those services included pre-purchase, pre-rental, mortgage default, rental delinquency, budget, post occupancy and HECM counseling

HECM (The Home Equity Conversion Mortgage) counseling is a program for clients over 62 years of age who may need additional income for immediate needs and can use the equity in their home for income. Ten households took advantage of the program, in some cases staff made home visits to accomodate them.

Educational and recreational activities for youth included a Day Camp Program for children ages 5 to 13 years, who enjoyed seven weeks of learning experiences and fun. Camp activities included computer instruction, visual arts, where skills were gained in mask building, tie dying and book binding. Some of the educational trips included Hagley Museum, African Festival, Franklin Institute, Maryland Science Center and the Washington National Zoo.

Twenty-seven youth attended Camp Pecometh including nine from the Middletown-Odessa-Townsend area. Five of the nine participated in the Howard Bailey Followers of Christ Program.

Two 4-H'ers participated in a 4-H Honda Mentoring Program for five days at the Honda Technical Training Center, Norrestown, N.J. The program's goal was to encourage youth to adopt a can-do attitude for learning about technology and related careers.

A teen council was formed to create an environment for youth to focus on self and community development. The youth involved learned leadership skills, how to elect officers, conduct meetings and what it meant to take responsibility for their own actions. The highlight for the teens was when eleven of them took a two night trip to Kings Dominion, Doswell, VA where they demonstrated that teens can have a great time without including in a lot of neative behaviors.

Other activities have included an "I Am Special Spelling Bee" and a City-wide Spelling Bee Contest. Chest instructions for youth culminated with a City-wide Tournament where several members of Neighborhood House's Club received the top three prizes in the different age categories.

The addition of a computer lab upgraded the Tutorial Service.

Two staff, Betty Webb, Community Worker/Liaison and Nancy Slawter, Secretary/Receptionist has allowed the Southern New Castle County site to become more of a full service agency and identify additional resources for the agency.

Some of the services in the Southern New Caste County office included emergency utilities/ental/mortgage assistance, food closet, brown bag club, housing and legal aid assistance and summer day camp for youth.

BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

Board members began 1994 with a workshop on "The Relationship of Campus Ministry and the Local Church". It was led by the Rev. Dr. James Noseworthy, Director of Annual Conference Relations and Public Policy Programs of the General Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. We were awakened to the holistic concept of Campus Ministry.

On April 8-10, 1994, the Board, in cooperation with the Wesley Foundation Campus Ministry at the University of Delaware and Campus Ministry Advancement, Inc., sponsored a "Fund Raising and Development Workshop for Campus Ministries" at Drayton Retreat Center. Various Wesley Foundations in the Jurisdiction were represented.

The Lena McCord Summer Intern, Joy Anita McCoy, a junior at Paine College in Augusta, Georgia was our guest at the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference. As the Black College Fund Ambassador, she visited churches around the Conference and brought a positive message about Campus Ministry.

The Board selected John Francis Abel, Jr. (Jack) to receive the \$1000 United Methodist Foundation Annual Conference Scholarship. He is a member of Calvary United Methodist Church in Wilmington, Delaware. He entered Wesley Theological Seminary in Washington, D.C. in September.

The Francis Asbury Award for Fostering United Methodist Ministries in Higher Education was presented to Rev. Laura Lee Wilson by Rev. Dr. James Noseworthy at the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference. She has been the Executive Director of the Wesley Foundation at the University of Delaware since 1991. Because of Rev. Wilson's outside the Conference of the Production, she was also named recipient of the Francis Asbury Award for the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

The new Wesley Foundation, which was started at Salisbury State University, hired a part-time team made up of Mr. Lawrence Purnell and Mrs. Vera Patterson. Rev. Homer Minus became half-time Campus Minister at Wesley Foundation at Delaware State University.

The Board established the Vaughn Johnson Scholarship Fund in his memory and in recognition of his outstanding and dedicated service to Wesley Foundation and Campus Ministry.

The Wesley Foundation of the University of Maryland Eastern Shore was evaluated by the Board. The students, faculty and members of the Board of Directors were interviewed on Campus. The evaluation team was greatly impressed by the activity and effective witness of the students. They are definitely making a difference on the campus.

The 1994 Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference passed the Resolution that: The focus of the 1995 Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference be "Campus Ministry: A Vital Mission of the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference."

The Board, seeing the interest and value of an Inter-Campus Retreat, established a planning committee under the leadership of Rev. Ronald Bell. The committee consisted of the Campus Ministers, two Board members and two students from each campus in the Conference. Plans are being made for a Retreat in March 1995.

Methodist Student Day, Africa University, and Student Recognition Day were promoted by articles in <u>The Communicator</u>.

The Board ended the year with a joyous spirit of new life. Recognizing that progress has been made, but that there are many exciting new challenges ahead.

Wesley College

Wesley College seeks to be a premier institution for helping students gain the knowledge, skills, and moral and ethical attitudes necessary to achieve their personal goals and contribute to the welfare of their communities in the global society. The College endeavors to impart a desire for life-long learning and an enhanced capacity for critical and creative thinking so that students can reap the rewards of intellectual growth and professional effectiveness. As a college in a covenant relationship with The United Methodist Church and founded upon Christian principles, Wesley strives to realize a holistic campus environment of common purpose, caring, loterance, inclusiveness, responsibility, and service that is the heart of the concept of community. Wesley College provides an education leading to associate and baccalaureate degrees for its students.

Following the adoption of a new mission statement by the College, the Weeley College Faculty this year approved a new core curiculum. Also this year, Weeley completed an important geo-demographic market research, conducted by Consultants for Educational Resources and Research of Washington, D.C., using recent census data and software programs from Claritas, Inc. to determine where our students come from. This research will assist Wesley College in identifying primary student recruitment markets and enable Wesley to consider new markets as well.

Wesley's target clientele would be persons desiring a college education ranging from those who are just out of high school to those who are retired and seeking enrichment in their retirement years. With the offering of a Master of Science Degree in Nursing, Wesley's target clientele would now include men and women who may already be in the nursing field and would like to pursue a graduate degree in nursing.

Wesley's target audience is inclusive, embracing adult women and men of all ages, races, religious heritage and nationalities who have a diploma from high school or its equivalent and who demonstrate a potential for performing college-level work.

We continue to give emphatic attention to make real our resolve to bring ethnic innorities into the mainstream of the College. Twenty percent of the present Board of Trustees is made up of ethnic minorities. The Chaplaincy Program at Wesley College this year has provided numerous popurulinise for spiritual growth. We have affirmed the priorities adopted by The United Methodist Church, Division of Higher Education, during its October meeting. While ministries with all persons of higher education are important, the primary constituency and commitment are to students and their welfare. We have called for a renewed emphasis upon the development of student Christian communities and intercollegiate organizations on the Wesley campus. For the first time in the history of Wesley, a Fellowship of Christian Athletes has been established on the campus. Chaplain Bell has been working with campus pastors from the University of Delaware. Delaware State University, University of Maryland Eastern Shore, and Washington College to help plan and coordinate the first sever Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference Inter-Campus Retreat. Even as this report is being written, over seventy individuals have registered for this retreat.

Additional opportunities for witness and ministry this past year were:

New Student Chapel Service: On August 28, 1994, two hundred new students were welcomed at a special chapel service in the Wesley Chapel.

Business and Christian Ethics: On October 19, 1994, in the Wesley Chapel, Mrs. Sharon Morgan, a contracting agent for Dover Air Force Base, addressed the Wesley community on the topic of business and Christian ethics.

Thanksgiving Offering Service: In November 1994, 86 coats and jackets were collected and donated to the Salvation Army for their Thanksgiving Day Dinner and Coat Give Away.

Unity Day: Unity Day was celebrated in the Wesley Chapel by the Office of Community Service and 28 persons from the community were served a hot meal.

Church Relations:

The Wesley College Gift Sharing Program: This program was developed to reach out to the churches and local organizations within the bounds of the Peninsular-Delaware Annual Conference as they planned seminars, lectures and workshops. Wesley offers itself as a resource to those who might benefit from the expertise within its community. A number of churches and organizations continue to use this resource.

Peninsula-Delaware Conference Youth Rally: Once again Wesley was present at the Annual Youth Rally held at Salisbury State University. Chaplain Bell facilitated a workshop on "Who Was Dr. Martin Luther King. Jr.?"

Board of Church and Society: Ms. Lorna Paredes continues to serve as Legislative Intern for the Board of Church and Society. This program, designed by The Peace with Justice Program of the Board helps United Methodist Legislators in Delaware to become more familiar with the United Methodist Social Principles and encourages them to consider these principles in their decision making process.

Lastly, Wesley College continues to encourage the support and generosity of the Annual Conference in developing a mission and strategy which will involve a mix of traditional forms of campus ministry with a variety of alternative approaches in order to strengthen our common mission in ministry. We invite local congregations and districts to share fully in this ministry. We believe that the Church needs the participation of our students in the life of its congregations, and the College needs the participation of the Church in its midst in order for both to fully express our common mission and ministry in the clobal society.

Wesley Foundation - Delaware State University

The Wesley Foundation at Delaware State University is a ministry with a long instory but a new form. In the past, this ministry has been carried on by a pastor of a nearby parish, and has tried to maintain a United Methodist presence on campus. We are now trying to establish a kind of 'resident' United Methodist campus minister on this campus in order that University personnel might have ready access to the Church through that person. In addition, we are appreciating the possibility of guiding students into church related vocations.

During these early months, the Wesley Foundation Director has been attempting to be known to groups and individuals on the campus by attending both student and faculty meetings, gatherings and activities. Early in the semester, we distributed the magazine "Orientation" 94" to all dormitories and commuter student lounges. "Orientation is a magazine published by GelHEM for college students, particularly newcomers.

The Wesley Foundation Director has met with, and enjoys a good working relationship with, the Vice President for Student Affairs and members of her staff, especially the University Coordinator of Relicious Affairs.

The Board of the Wesley Foundation is enthusiastic and supportive. both administratively and financially. We have sponsored a gospel concert on homecoming night, and we're sponsoring students (17) going to the Conference inter-campus retreat along with four other campuses in March 1995. The Director has been a part of the planning team for that retreat.

We met and cooperated with the Delaware State University United Campus Ministries, especially in the leadership of Sunday Worship on campus and Religious Emphasis Week. In addition, we transport students to and from worship services off campus.

The Director serves as chaplain for the Delaware State University Football Team, speaker for United Methodist Student Day at Whatcoat U.M.C., Dover and is meeting with the Whatcoat Mission Team to develop a community food ministry, whose operation will be shared with the Wesley Foundation.

Wesley Foundation - University of Delaware

The Wesley Foundation Campus Ministry at the University of Delaware continues to be a vital part of the campus community. We continue in our Wesleyan heritage in our presence and in our mission for The United Methodist Church. We continue to encourage the uniting of knowledge and vital plety through an intellectual, spiritual, and material ministry to God's people. We continue our connectionalism with the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference.

Throughout this year we have had opportunities to meet our goals, mission statement and purpose on campus. In partnership with the Board of Directors, there is a full-time campus pastor providing leadership, counsel and a presence to the campus community. The Board of Directors have continued in their efforts to raise funds necessary to keep this ministry at the University of Delaware. In April, the Board sponsored a national workshop on Fund Raising at Drayton Retreat Center. The workshop was led by Campus Ministry Advancement, fic. and was attended by campus pastors and their Board members from various parts of the country. There were more than one fourth of our own Board members present for the weekend.

The Board of Directors have raised funds this year by a direct mail campaign, an Art Show and Auction and the Annual Benefit Dinner. Dr. Costel D. Denson, former Board member and chair of the Board of Directors, was the honoree.

The Board of Directors submitted a resolution to the Peninsula-Delaware 1994 Annual Conference recommending that the 1995 Annual Conference emphasize Campus Ministry: A Vital Mission of the Church. The resolution was unanimously approved.

The dialogue with the Center for Black Culture, the Hola Group and the students associated with the English institute continues to grow. This year we have shared in interfaith worship experiences with Hillel. The highlights of these worship experiences came with the Universal Day of Prayer for Christian Students and the Interfaith December Service of Lichits.

There continues to be opportunities for ecumenical and interfaith experiences on campus. This year, the campus ministers/pastors have joined efforts and formed a professional group, the University Religious Leaders' Organization. The President's Commission to Promote Racial and Cultural Diversity has established a Religious Concerns Caucus, the first in the history of the University of Delaware. Laura Lee Wilson was selected by the administration to serve as the caucus chair.

We continue to be in support of our graduates who have journeyed into ministry. Stacy Hitch will graduate in May (1995) from Wesley Theological Seminary. Becky Robinson is in her second year of the US-2 program through the Board of Global Ministries serving in Des Moines, Iowa. Angle Burkholder is in Bolivia serving as a mission teacher in a rural school for children.

As we continue our covenant with the Newark United Methodist Church, the church amily has provided much support for the students. Many of our students attend weekly worship services and have been fiturgists or communion servers. A highlight each year is the one Sunday designated as University Sunday which is a student-led worship service.

Our spiritual life is at the center of our lives through retreats, worship, Bible study and Sunday fellowship. One of the highlights this year was attending the National Ecumenical Student Gathering in St. Louis, Missouri. The student lounge provides a quiet, sacred space for the students to meditate and study. Holding fast to our belief that social activities are an important part of our Christian community, we have shared in parties, sport activities, movie nights, dining out, taligating, Christian rock concerts, hayfide and various other events. Committed to living our Christian discipleship, we continue our service projects in love for the community. We have sponsored a blood drive, cleaned our highway, served at Hope Dhing Room, served at PeaceMeal, collected gifts for persons living with HIV/AIDS and co-sponsored with the Newark United Methodist Church the NAMES Project AIDS Memorial Quilt and program.

The number of students continues to grow inspite of the "in and out" students. There seems to be an interconnection between all the students with a love and respect for whose they are, daughters and sons of God.

This past year, the Wesley Foundation Campus Ministry celebrated 40 years of ministry at the University of Delaware. Got has provided a wonderful, challenging ministry for the church at this institution of higher learning. It is an exciting time to be part of the church and the academic community. Through God's grace, and the love of the community of faith (the church), the presence of The United Methodist Church will remain

on the campus of the University of Delaware.

As I continue in this wonderful, vital and challenging ministry as the earthen vessel of God's grace, sharing in God's love, I pray for the church to remain faithful to its call to be in ministry to all God's people. May we never forget our responsibility to be the church reaching out with the Word and stepping out on the promises.

Wesley Foundation - University of Maryland Eastern Shore

For three years it has been my greatest joy to work with students, faculty and staff of the University of Manyland Eastern Shore under the auspices of the Wesley Foundation. Our goal is, and shall continue to be, that of bringing a United Methodist presence to the UMES campus and providing a safe and warm Christian family atmosphere within the student population of the Wesley Foundation. In the short time that I have been a part of this campus community, I have become recognized by both faculty and staff alike.

The UMES Wesley Foundation is housed in the University Chapel on the second

floor of the Student Development Center located on the campus of the University of Maryland Eastern Shore. In the early days of this appointment, we were in a slightly used converted classroom. Folks would often remark about the darkness of the room, as light bulbs would often turn up missing when they were needed in other sections of the building. During that first semester, a very small group of committed students would make their way to the chapel faithfully each week. We would sometimes wonder aloud what we could do to draw more students into the fellowship of the Wesley Foundation. We came up with common sense answers like putting up posters in public places such as dormitories. Still nothing profited us as much as the prayers of the saints. When our young people began to pray, we saw the results. Gradually, a spirit of invitation began to take over and, from week to week more persons would begin to drop by that converted classroom. We are still using the same room, but no one refers to it as slightly used any more. Plans are currently being made for the building of a brand new student development center which will have a chapel; complete with office space for the various campus ministry programs. There are currently groups of Roman Catholic, Islamic, Baptist, and Methodist students all utilizing the same room with great regularity. During the Islamic celebration of Ramadon, it has become common place to see Muslim students come into the chapel to pray during the noon hour. Roman Catholics celebrate mass on Monday evenings. The United Methodist and Baptist groups meet together on Thursday evenings.

During the academic year 1994, a group of ethnic pastors from Wicomico, Somerset, and Worcester Counties began utilizing the chapel for mid-week worship. This group has provided the University, and the community, with an ongoing noon day service on Wednesdays each week for almost a year. This worship experience has been a tremendous benefit to the campus and the community as well. The students of UMES Wesley Foundation are very active. They are very diverse denominationally and academically. Even though there is much diversity within our group, there is a sharing of Jesus by all and a wish to grow in serving Him. Each Thursday during the fall and winter semesters, UMES Wesley Foundation students gather at 7:00 p.m. The students lead worship and volunteer to lead Bible Study each week. One of the most memorable things that happened last year was that a group of the students within the fellowship developed a small choir. This campus ministry choir accompanied me during the spring semester to help New Berlin UMC celebrate its 139th Church Anniversary. This choir has since participated for revivals in both Metropolitan and Ebenezer UMC's as well as the first Black United Methodist Preachers Banquet held on the Campus. The UMES Wesley Foundation has sent students to a variety of on and off campus activities. Twenty of our students attended the Kirk Franklin and The Family Concert when the group performed at the University's Ella Fitzgerald Center. Approximately 22 of our female students attended a women's retreat sponsored by Koinonia of the Eastern Shore in Ocean City, Maryland. We have attended a Washington Bulletts basketball game and a Christian Rally. Students have gone into Washington, DC to see one religiously-based play. All of these activities are geared to providing our students with Christian growth as well as fun during their college years.

The highlight of the Wesley Foundation year was, without question, the Religious Emphasis Celebration. During this celebration, students held a Diversity Day program in which they celebrated their religious diversity. The week began with a reception that is always used to give special thanks to students, staff and community persons who have had a positive impact on the life of the campus ministry program. This year's program was led by the Reverend Ronnie Northam, Jr. Rev. Northam was the banquet and revival preacher for the 1994 Religious Emphasis Week. Not only did this young man preach, but he spent the better part of the week interacting with our student population. The best thing about these events was not that they were student led and well attended, but that the spirit of Christ led some new souls into a right relationship with Him. On Sunday morning, we were led in celebration of UMES Day by the Rev. Robert Starkey. The

power of God was felt again and more souls were added to the kingdom.

We are praying that this year's Religious Emphasis Week would be equally as beneficial to the Campus community. This year's program brought the Reverend Cornelius Henderson, the Dean of Gammon Theological Seminary to the Metropolitan pulpit for UMES Sunday on April 2. The revival featured the Reverend George Anderson, pastor of Coleman-Sill Pond Charge. We again reached out to local choirs to assist us with song. Finally, the Ella Fitzgerald Center was the site of our annual choir concert featuring the Daughters of Faith.

The University of Maryland Eastern Shore is perhaps the most ethnically diverse campus within the University of Maryland system. It has ties to Methodism which reach back to its beginning. The students that come to Princess Anne to be educated at UMES come from cities and small towns from all over the country and in some cases from various parts of the world. These young persons come to educational institutions with a very different world view than the students of years ago. Someone has to try to reach them at a very ruculat time in their development. We, who are part of the UMES Wesley Foundation, come from the Wesleyan tradition in that we still see the world as our parish. These students deserve to have the opportunity to grow academically. The UMES campus is part of our mission field. Their minds should be exposed to the best information that a university system can provide. However, if I may paraphrase some of the sentiments expressed by a deceased African Methodist Episcopal Bishop, Daniel Payne, they should grow heart and mind together. I am grateful to God, and the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference, for the opportunity of working in such an exciting and challenging place as the UMES community.

The training of Lay Members and Reserves was continued with additional information on the budget process. A panel discussion on "What is a Lay Member of Annual Conference" was held. Liz St. Clair and Kathryn Hopkins, members of the General Council on Ministries, explained the Connectional Issues Study Survey, which was taken at Conference.

The 6th Annual Day Apart was conducted by Rev. Harvey Manchester, which was based on Ezra Earl Jones' book Quest for Quality in the Church. Many new insights were developed during this all day session. All four districts held schools for Lay Speakers and over 400 people attended. This year our focus is to develop new courses to increase the learning of our Lay Speakers. The training of Local Church Lay Leaders and Pastors continued in the Districts because each year new Lay Leaders and Pastors move into the local church. This year we are setting up a new method for electing General and Jurisdiction Lay Delegates. We expect that we will have more emphasis on grace and talents of the laity for this task. At Annual Conference, we will set aside time for people to meet with the nominess.

As we continue the work of Lay Ministries, we must ask ourselves "How can the Annual Conference be a transforming experience?" We need to think about this, pray about it and then follow God's directions.

The Order of St. Barnabas

For the past two years, the Conference Board of Laliy has taken the responsibility or the Order of St. Barnabas. 1996 GOALS

- Increase the training for Local Church Lay Leaders and their Pastors to develop a closer partnership ministry.
- Provide Lay and Reserve Members of Annual Conference with training and guidebooks to improve the ministry between the local church and the Peninsula-Delaware Conference.
- Promote and train lay people in all three ministries of Lay Speaking; caring, leadership, and speaking; following the guidelines of the Conference Committee on Lay Speaking.
- Work with the District Boards of Laity, United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women, United Methodist Youth, and other organized lay groups to promote awareness of the role of the laity to live out the mission of the United Methodist Church.
- Develop a plan to help local churches increase the lay ministry involvement so that all of the laity truly are "Ministers".

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

The Board of Ordained Ministry has the primary responsibility for the enlistment and recruitment of ordained clergy. By working in consultation with the Cabinet and Division of Ordained Ministry, the Board seeks to study and interpret clergy needs of the Annual Conference. With the reduction of the average retirement age across the nation and the reduction of the number of new candidates for ordained ministry, the work of the Board becomes more critical. A special task force is being created to study our immediate and long range needs and help create a vision for the Peninsula-Delaware Conference and its clergy leadership.

An important link in the enlistment and recruitment of persons for the ordained ministry is the prayerful selection and encouragement of persons from our local churches to consider full time Christian ministry. Every pastor and congregation has the responsibility and privilege of cultivating persons for the ordained ministry.

Another important link in this process is the work of the District Committee on Ordained Ministry. Each District Committee helps candidates clarify God's call for their lives and seeks to discern whether a person is a candidate for the ordained ministry. The work of these committees, and persons who serve as Supervisory Pastors in our Conference, is outstanding.

To help the Board of Ordained Ministry in its work with each candidate, a new interview process has been established and proven to be very effective over the past two years. Considerable time is spent with each candidate before any recommendation to the Executive Session. A new peer evaluation team is being considered for 1996. The Board is very appreciative of the work of Counseling Elders and District Superintendents as they provide supervision for each candidate in the ordination process.

One crucial factor in the enlistment and recruitment of persons for ordained ministry is the financial support we can provide candidates through our scholarship fund. In recent years, the cost of theological education has risen considerably and our scholarship support for candidates has declined. The Board of Ordained Ministry believed it is imperative that our Conference seeks to find attentate ways to help our candidates financially. If we want competent and effective pastoral leadership, we must be willing to make recruitment and enlistment a high priority.

Besides working with persons moving toward ordination, the Board seeks to be supportive of all clergy and their families. A Transition Fund was established last year, funded by voluntary gifts from clergy families, to help persons during times of transition such as death, divorce, and leave of absence. We continue to affirm our clergy through the yearly recognition of five year anniversaries of ordination.

I am very appreciative of the significant and demanding time each board member contributes. Our Conference is blessed to have such outstanding leadership and we have worked hard to build upon the foundation built by our previous chairperson, Ashley Maxwell. We cover your prayers for the work of our Lord.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

It has been a busy year for the Board of Pensions. Last year, you may recall, I spent a few minutes expressing concern about the future and this Board's commitment to a year long review process to determine just how that future might look.

I'm pleased to announce that the near future looks very bright. Although, given the vagaries of our economy, no one can predict the future, it appears that, if the economy stays fairly steady, our pension fund should remain adequate for several years into the next century, with no major changes in our current method of funding.

An analysis of pension activity in the future is limited by the information provided through the General Board of Pensions. They will only provide actuarial information for five years into the future. However, that is sufficient to give us a trend. By merging that trend with the dollars in the endowment fund, and estimated future contributions, we can get a reasonable picture of where we are heading. We also took a hard look at exactly what funds we have available to us, how they are allocated, and what rules had previously been set for use of these funds.

By adopting some new controls, we were able to reallocate our resources, and significantly change the financial picture for several years into the future.

The Investment Committee has met on a regular basis, reviewed it's operational procedures and has made changes which should improve our portfolio performance and continue to protect the integrity of the fund.

The Benefits Committee is happy to announce that, due to the excellent experience we have had, our rate increase from Blue Cross and Blue Shield is minimal, and as a result, there will be no increase in the rates that are being charged to the clergy and churches for dependent coverage. This year, the Benefits Committee will be reviewing the possibility of including more preventive medicine coverage in the health insurance package.

I want to personally thank all the members of the Board for their faithful attendance and their active participation at our meetings.

Pension Recommendations:

The Peninsula-Delaware Conference Board of Pensions recommends:

- The Past Service Rate for 1996 be \$318 per year of approved service.
- Up to 100% of the pension and disability payments received by a retired
 pastor or pastor on disability be designated as the permitted housing
 allowance for 1996. (I.R.S. restricts this allowance to the pastor. The
 surviving spouse does not qualify.)

RESOLUTION RELATING TO RENTAL/HOUSING ALLOWANCES FOR RETIRED OR DISABLED MINISTERS OF THE PENINSULA-DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of the United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the Peninsula Delaware Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rent; allowance for retired ordained or licensed minsters who are members of their Conference and

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference:

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received by a retired minister, or 100% of the disability benefit payments received by a disabled minister, during the year of 1994 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of The United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference at the time of his or her retirement or disability.
- 2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of the United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of the United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who

elected to make contributions to the pension or benefit funds of the United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

NOTE:

The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-280, 1971 C.B. 82, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities. Beginning in 1984, there is no longer a sick pay or disability income exclusion available with respect to disability benefit payments. Therefore, the full amount of disability benefit payments will be taxable income to the recipient beginning in 1984. (Adopted May 30, 1992)

Reminders:

- Ministers appointed to the Peninsula-Delaware Conference for the first time, must make arrangements with the Conference Business Office for enrollment in the medical, dental, life, and pension programs.
 - A. Ministers leaving appointment in the Peninsula-Delaware Conference, must make arrangements with the Conference Business Office to be properly transferred from the benefits program.
 - Ministers having changes in their family status, such as marriages, divorces, newborn children, death, etc., must notify the Conference Business Office within thirty days of these events.
- Each pastor is responsible to keep the Conference Business Office and the General Board of Pensions apprised of any changes to their designated beneficiary.
- Local churches are reminded that they are responsible for the full cost of the dependent portion of the health and dental program for their clergy family.
- 4. You can help contribute to the continued success of our medical program by becoming familiar with and using the preventive medicine provisions of your program. You should also be receiving a publication called "Taking Care". Please take the time to read it. It will benefit you and your medical program.

PENINSULA-DELAWARE CONFERENCE BOARD OF PENSIONS CLERGY/LAY EMPLOYEE INSURANCE PROGRAM

POLICY ON BENEFIT ELIGIBILITY

- A. The Insurance Program is divided into the following categories:
 - 1. Health
 - Dental
 - 3. Non-Contributory Group Life
 - Contributory Group Life
- B. Those clergy holding appointments as indicated below are eligible for coverage under all four categories in "A" above with the full costs of health, dental and noncontributory group life paid by the conference.
 - 1. Full members appointed to serve a charge
 - Associate Members appointed to serve a charge
 - 3. Probationary Members appointed to serve a charge
 - 4. Full-time Local Pastors appointed to serve a charge
 - Student Local Pastors appointed to serve a charge
 Clergy appointed to the Superintendency and Conference Staff
 - Clergy appointed to attend school after serving under appointment for six consecutive years (full connection) and eight consecutive years (associate member). Benefits limited to two years.
 - 8. Clergy on sabbatical leave benefits limited to one year
 - 9. Clergy on disability leave
- C. Retired Clergy

For a retired clergy person to be eligible for health and dental benefits, he/she must be receiving a United Methodist Church pension benefit. If full time appointments to charges, Conference staff or superintendency are less than 21 years, clergy health and dental benefits will be paid in accordance with the following schedule:

- Premiums for surviving spouses and mental retardation or physical handicap, who is so incapable prior to attainment of age 19 (or age 24 for qualified students) and who is chiefly dependent upon the employee for support and maintenance) will be at the same percentage used for the olergy person.
- When a retired clergy marries after retirement, the spouse is not eligible for health and dental insurance.
 - 3. If a retired clergy person has not served a Peninsula-Delaware Conference charge within 15 years prior to date in which a United Methodist Church pension benefit begins, proof must be provided that no other health coverage is available. When proof is verified, benefits will be in accordance with the above schedule.

D. Dependents of Active Clergy

- Dependent health coverage is available to all active clergy listed in "B" above with the charge responsible for the full cost.
- Dependent dental coverage is available to all active clergy listed in "B" above with the charge responsible for the full cost.

E. Spouses of Retired Clergy

- Spouses of retired clergy are covered with health insurance with the cost paid in accordance with the schedule above, if they were the clergy's spouse at the time of retirement.
- Spouses of retired clergy are eligible for dental coverage at the retired clergy's expense, if they were the clergy's spouse at the time of retirement. Reinstatement of coverage not allowed after cancellation.

F. Surviving Spouses and Surviving Dependent Children

- The surviving spouse of an active clergy listed in *B* above is eligible for health coverage with the full cost paid by the Conference until such time as the surviving spouse remarries. After remarriage, surviving spouse is not eligible for health benefits.
- The surviving spouse of an active clergy is eligible for dental coverage with the full cost paid by the surviving spouse. Reinstatement of coverage not allowed after cancellation. After remarriage, surviving spouse is not eligible for dental benefits
- Dependent children of a deceased active clergy listed in "B* above will continue to be covered with health and dental insurance until age 19 or 24, if a full-time student.

- The surviving spouse of a retired clergy is eligible for medical coverage with the cost paid in accordance with the schedule above, provided he/she was the clergy's spouse at the time of retirement.
- The surviving spouse of a retired clergy is eligible for dental coverage with the full cost paid by the surviving spouse, provided he/she was the clergy's spouse at the time of retirement. Reinstatement of coverage not allowed after cancellation
- G. Clergy Appointed to Less Than Full-Time Service (Par. 437.2)

Not eligible for health, dental and life insurance.

H. Part-Time Local Pastors

Not eligible for health, dental and life insurance.

I. Divorce

Health and dental benefits are not available to the spouse of an active or retired clergy after divorce.

J. Other

Those persons indicated below will be eligible for coverage under health, dental and contributory group life insurance with the employing agency or the individual responsible for the full cost.

- Lay employees serving a local church or Conference agency thirty hours or more per week.
- Retired lay employees, their spouses and their surviving spouses provided that they were covered at time of retirement.
- 3. Clergy on leave of absence
- Clergy and their dependents serving in Appointments Beyond The Local Church provided they pay the full costs.
- Clergy appointed to attend school after serving under appointment for less than the required time (six consecutive years [full connection] and eight consecutive years [associate member] for a limit of two years.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

The Commission on Archives and History continues in its ministry of helping our history become our heritage. Dr. Ann Boylan spoke at our Annual Colloquium on the Sunday School in the Nineteenth Century. It was an excellent presentation. This event was supported well enough that we are encouraged in our hope that this will become annual tradition supported throughout the Conference. The Anniversary and Carol Services were well-attended. We had another fine Anniversary Preacher in Dr. Heather Murray Elkins of Drew University. At the service, the Rev. Dr. William Fitzhugh presented a rare copy of John Wesley's Sunday Service to be displayed on permanent loan at Barratt's. The Carol Service is proving to be very popular scheduled in the early evening.

Progress is being made with the Delaware Conference History. As I reported verbally at the last Conference, Eastern Pennsylvania and Peninsula-Delaware found ourselves working independently on this history. We controlled the financing for publication and they had a potential manuscript by the late William Jason. An informal group of interested people from the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference and our Conference have been meeting in order to get a history published. As of this writing, chapters of the Jason manuscript have been made available to members of the group for penusal. It is my hope that we may be seeing light at the end of the tunnel concerning the bublication of the Delaware Conference History.

Progress has been made in a variety of areas. Dr. Philip Lawton has completed the computer catalogue of Barratt's holdings. The interior of the museum has been renovated and an attractive research and reading area is now in place. The mortar on the Chapel was re-pointed. We hope to spark interest in a local church video contest as well as continuing our sponsorship of a local church history contest. The Commission will be pursuing ways to expand our permanent endowment. We had a small but interested group of people at the Financial Planning Seminar at Barratt's. This was led by Parke Hess, Executive Director of the Eastern Pennsylvania-Peninsula United Methodist Foundation. Anyone interested in contributing to this endowment, can contact Parke Hess of the Foundation at 12f-666-9990 or Barratt's at 302-335-5544.

Barratt's Chapel is a Shrine of The United Methodist Church. The Chapel and Museum are open on Saturdays and Sundays from 1:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Other times to visit the Chapel can be arranged through the Curator, Lynn Hobbs (302-335-5544). The Chapel and Museum depend upon the generosity of individuals and churches for about two-thirds of its financial support. In addition, we are always seeking new materials of historical interest to add to the Museum collection. 1995 GOALS

- 1. Operate and maintain Barratt's Chapel, Museum and Archives.
- Celebrate the anniversary of the meeting of Thomas Coke and Francis Asbury at Barratt's, on the second Sunday of November.
- Continue work on a Delaware Conference History in line with Strategy One of the Ethnic Church Comprehensive Plan.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

The Commission continues to develop and support a series of emphases which been part of its recent history. A person was sent to the National Workshop on Christian Unity which is supported by numerous denominations of a wide spectrum. This provides for up-to-date information, development of relationships, stimulation, and encouracement.

The Christian Unity Award, started in our Conference several years ago, is now being called The Bishop's Award for Christian Unity, in keeping with what is developing in many Annual Conferences around the country. This award provides recognition and also encouragement, as well as providing information of a wide ecumenical and interreligious experiences which are occurring on the perhabits.

ECU-NOTES provides a direct relationship with the local church's lay and clergy leadership, sharing information about things that are going on. This will be done in conjunction with information shared in The Communicator.

The 1996 General Conference will consider the Covenanting Proposal of the Consultation on Church Union or Church of Christ Uniting. We plan to make people of our churches informed and supportive.

Some Annual Conferences include participation of persons from other denominations in the Service of Ordination. Most often this means representatives of the other denominations included in the Commission on Christian Unity. This idea is being explored.

Perhaps most important, is the lifting up of ecumenical and interreligious experiences. This serves as an opportunity for sharing and stimulation.

The Christian Council of Delaware and Maryland's Eastern Shore

Over the past year, the Christian Council, formerly the Delmarva Ecumenical Agency, has been engaged in a re-visioning process to develop a more responsive and efficient structure. The mission of the organization has not changed, which is to share the Christian faith, and encourage ecumenical dialogue across denominational boundaries in Delaware and on Maryland's Eastern Shore.

Membership in this newly reorganized Council is open to all denominational executives who ascribe to the mission of the organization. The structure of the

organization, which was large and cumbersome, has been streamlined to become more cost effective and efficient. Denominational executives will meet quarterly to explore common theological, ecclesiastical and community concerns. Task groups can be appointed by the Christian Council as needed to explore issues and recommend action to that body.

Community concerns can be brought to the attention of any denominational executive for consideration by the Council. The work on Racism in the Church and Society will continue as a priority for Council executives and the several denominations they represent.

Participating denominational executives in this process were Bishop Susan Morison, United Methodist Church; Bishop Robert Mulvee, Roman Catholic Diocese of Delaware; Bishop Cabell Tennis, Episcopal Diocese of Delaware; Bishop Martin Townsend, Episcopal Diocese of Easton; and Rev. Patricia McClurg, Presbyterian Executive. The remaining denominational executives of the former Christian Council will be invited to participate in the new structure.

Officers of the Christian Council elected at the October 25 meeting for 1995 were: President, Rev. Patricia McClurg, Executive Presbyter, New Castle Presbytery; Vice President, Bishop Martin Townsend, Episcopa Diocese of Easton; Treasurer, Bishop Cabell Tennis, Episcopal Diocese of Delaware; and Secretary, Rev. Elizabeth Doty, New Castle Presbytery. Staffing will rotate annually among the member denominations. In 1995, New Castle Presbyter will provide staffing support.

Significant work has been accomplished in addressing racism in society and the church. In May the Council passed a "Call to Action Against Racism", which describes, confronts and condemns racism in all its manifestations in persons and institutions of our society. This paper calls our member churches to study this document, endorse it, and seek ways to take action, which will begin the process of dismantling personal and institutional racism. Another task group worked on racism in the church. In four weekend retreats, eighten participants from several denominations, both African-American and European-American struggled with the effects of racism on both groups. We learned that the norms and standards of our society are imposed by the dominant group; that often the dominant community, i.e., history, housing, land, music; and that we see persons of color as responsible for their own condition. Those of the dominant group came to understand the privilege they carry by virtue of their color in our society.

The work ahead calls for us as Christians to work within our denominations to identify and dismantle racism. In addition, the newly reorganized Council has agreed to seek funding for the writing of an African-American history of Delaware and Maryland's Eastern Shore.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE COMPENSATION

The Conference Commission on Equitable Compensation is charged in the Discipline (¶722.2) with supporting ordained ministry in the charges of the conference by 1) recommending conference standards for clergy support; 2) administering funds to be used in base compensation supplements; and 3) providing counsel and advisory material on clergy support to district superintendents and Committees on Pastor-Parish Relations. While focusing on these essentials, the Commission also administers funds provided in the Conference budget for compensation supplements to Ethinic Minority Pastors who, for

missional purposes or in recognition of meritorious effectiveness, have been recommended by their district superintendent, and to situations where New Church Development is taking place. We have also responded to a wide range of other issues regarding clergy support, including travel, Social Security and annuties allowances, housing and furmiture, and moving.

In 1994, the total for all compensation supplements was:

This represents a significant increase over 1993, when the totals were: Grants - \$91,549.54; Pensions - \$17,401.12; and Support - \$108,950.66. However, while the total supplement amount has increased over the years, grant requests vary greatly, quite high one year, much lower the next, etc.

Recommendations:

1. The Commission makes the following minimum salary recommendations for 1996:

Full-Time Elder	\$ 20,700
Full-Time Probationary Member	\$ 18,800
Associate Member	\$ 18,800
Full-Time Local Pastor	\$ 17,500
Student Pastor (Local/Probationary Member)	\$ 14.800

The minimum salary for Student Pastors will be \$ 14,800 for 1996, unless some smaller figure is agreed upon by the district superintendent, student, and charge, as being appropriate for the work to be performed.

Service increments will be \$125.00 per year up to a maximum of fifteen years service.

(Note: These recommended salary figures represent an average increase of 3.5% over 1995. 1995's increase was 2.3%; 1994's was 3.4%.)

 The Commission recommends that the reimbursement for travel expenses during 1996 be at the rate set by the Internal Revenue Service for that year. (The rate for 1995 is \$3.0 per mile.)

In addition, we also recommend that pastors be reimbursed for all tolls and parking expenses incurred in the performance of their pastoral duties.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

Every year since its inception, the Commission on Religion and Race has attempted to put in place activities and "how for guidelines on dealing with ractal issues. Last year the Commission followed suit with the following: 1) each District Superintendent was asked to include a Racial Inclusion Form in the Charge Conference material (which they did); 2) a resolution entitled "When Hate Groups Come to Town" was presented and adopted at the 1994 Annual Conference. Its intent was to offer support as well as suggestions on how to handle such activity when it occurs in your town. Second, it called upon each of us to discourage participation in hate groups, par-military groups, KKK and other racist groups (sepsecially those which recruit our young people); and 3) through a video, Bill Cosby shared with us his views "On Prejudice". Cosby's video was a part of the Martin Luther Kino. Jr. Symposium and Effusation Activities.

Racism, like other infectious diseases, contains the possibility to destroy everyone who is infected with it. The symptoms of racism are far-reaching. If left unattended, these symptoms will continue to spread until they invade humankind's personal, social, institutional, civil, educational, economical as well as religious and Christian lives. Even with this knowledge before us, we are content with "dealing" with the symptoms rather than removing the cause and the rot of racism.

Religion and Race needs involvement from everyone (especially you). The programs put forth by this Commission will only be as effective as our willingness to make them work. The responsibility is given to all of us. The task of shouldering the burden of racism must be bome by all. First and foremost, the Peninsula-Delaware Conference must denounce racism and dissuade any and all participation in racist activity. Second, clergy and lafty must proclaim racism as a spiritual evil and recognize it as sin which inhibits our true affirmation that "we are the daughters and sons of God" regardless of race, creed, color or national origin. Third, Religion and Race must lift up the desirability of cultural diversity. Cultural diversity within itself does not have the power to sequester, therefore, we must not use our diversity as excuses to separate us. Rather a truly diverse people see and understand the significance of their difference and applaud the same.

While Religion and Race is willing to do our part, we cannot do it alone. We need the sincere participation of every church, every member, every commission, board and agency of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference if we are to address racism effectively. As we prepare for the next quadrennium, Religion and Race will continue to challenge the sin of recist activity be that battant practices or the spirit of racism contained in the minds and hearts of people called Peninsula-Delaware United Methodists.

The Peninsula-Delaware Commission on the Status and Role of Women is focusing on faithful advocacy for the dignity and uplift of women through the ministry of The United Methodist Church.

The Foundation maintains offices in Valley Forge, Pennsylvania and Dover, Delaware. As a member of the National Association of United Methodist Foundations, we are provided with resources and coverage throughout the United States.

In 1994, we provided financial consulting services to individuals, churches, agencies, and institutions. We continued our emphasis on financial planning, estate planning, and planned giving. By stimulating planned giving, we particularly helped local churches acquire new assets. In addition, we continued our successful program to establish and promote endowment funds in our local churches.

We expanded our function of managing assets as a trustee, executor, investment adviser, investment custodien, and investment manager. The Foundation is the investment manager for an increasing number of Conference agencies, corporations, local churches, and individuals. We currently manage approximately 100 accounts. With regard to investing, the Foundation carries out the directives of the Social Principles of The United Methodist Church as written in Paragraph 2513.3(e) of the 1992 Book of Discipline.

In 1996, we plan to promote a new balanced pooled fund for non-profit clients that desire to invest less than \$150,000.00 in equity, fixed income, and money market investments. In addition, we plan to publish materials that will describe all of the Foundation's services throughout the Eastern Pennsylvania and Peninsula-Delaware Conferences.

The Foundation involves itself with wills, trusts, taxation, securities, life insurance, annuities, retirement plans, real estate, etc. Meetings and seminars are conducted on a regular basis and individual counseling sessions are conducted in a confidential manner. We continue to urge each local church to establish an ongoing emphasis on wills by forming a Planned Giving Committee. The Foundation provides resources and personnel to help any church establish and carry out this urgent work. We distribute the "Planned Giving Handbook," prepared by the National Association of United Methodist Foundations, and other written material free of charce.

The Foundation represents all United Methodist congregations and causes, therefore, it is prepared to assist people who wish to make lasting contributions to churches, institutions, and mission programs or services. The United Methodist Women continue to be challenged to fulfill our goals of 1994 by working with women, youth and children. The issues that have faced us this past year have caused us to work together, study, evaluate and spread the word of our faith. The strength and unity of UMW is the envy of many organizations. Our commitment to go forth in mission has been shown through:

The Spiritual Life Retreat at Drayton Manor, when Dolly Brittingham led 50 joyful participants in an approach to prayer, through study of the book, <u>Breath of God</u>.

Annual spring meeting in Crisfield, Maryland, was highlighted by Bishop Susan Morrison's message followed by a re-affirmation of our baptismal vows, for 335 women in worship.

The Young Women's Retreat in June at Ocean City, Maryland, increased to over 70 young women as Olivia Costango directed us in "Spiritual Listening."

Eighty women from our Conference were lifted spiritually and emotionally at the Assembly in Cincinnati in April with 11,300 attenders. We heard President Carolyn Johnson say we are *100 years and counting; one million strong and growing.*

Exceptional study leaders taught "Families*, "Making the World Safe for Children" and "African Churches Speak*. Team members and study leaders traveled to Burlington, Vermont for training at Regional School.

A Christian Disciplines Workshop at Drayton Manor was directed by Ann Craig of Women's Division to expand our knowledge in worship, prayer and ecumenism.

Twenty-five Conference and District officers attended.

Director Faye Wilson of the Board of Global Ministries spoke on "Making a Difference for Children" at the Fall annual meeting in Elktron. Following election and installation of officers, a memorial service was held for our departed sisters.

District officer training at Wesley UMC in Dover took a "hands-on" theme. The planning and evaluation meeting continued through Sunday at the Days Inn Conference Room.

New officer training in Chicago was attended in December by Carolyn Shortess and Mildred Hamilton.

REPORT OF THE TASK FORCE ON THE THEOLOGICAL FORUM ON WISDOM/SOPHIA ISSUES

In response to the Re-Imagining Conference, the 1994 Annual Conference adopted a resolution establishing a Theological Task Force to plan and implement a Theological Forum on Wisdom/Sophia issues. The Task Force gathered for the first time shortly after Annual Conference and continued to meet thereafter on an almost monthly basis.

Our initial task was to develop a Statement of Purpose. Basing our deliberations on our Theological Task as set forth in our <u>Book of Discipline</u> (Para. 68 Section 4), we sought to develop a forum grounded in our denomination's Doctrinal Standards, yet also critical and constructive in its approach. We hoped we would "help participants to clarify and name their lears and theological issues, and to better understand the influence of cultural dynamics and diversity upon theology and gractice."

The Task Force members believe that the Forum, held on March 11 at St. John's

Church in Seaford, accomplished those goals. The keynote address was given by Dr. Josiah Young (Wesley Seminary) about "How United Methodists "Do' Theologies". Dr. Young described how cultural contexts - his as an African American male - impact our understanding of our United Methodist doctrinal foundation. "Constructive" speaker Dr. Leo Lefebure (Mundelien Seminary) presented a comprehensive description of Wisdom/Sophia understandings within Church history and tradition as well as in current fermists sto-hostispip. And "critical" speaker Dr. Catherine Clark Kroeger (Gordon Conwell) raised pertinent concerns about the integrity of theological and doctrinal boundaries in response to the Re-Imagining Conference.

We also came in well under budget, spending less than \$2000 of our allotted \$5000.

One glaring weakness of the Forum, however, was in small group interaction. Table discussions were largely ineffective due to the noise level in the room. And if we could do it over again, we would shorten the question and answer period to allow time for small group processing at the end.

142 of the over 200 participants returned evaluations. A significant number (55) were ambivalent or negative in tone. Some (23) left that the presentations were too scholarly and not geared to meet the needs of latly. The majority (52) believed the "real" issues were being sidestepped and that United Methodist leadership should have been more "accountable" in making a definitive stance on Sophia and Re-Imagining clear.

The Task Force is unsure how to interpret these negative results. On the one hand, we realize that as all participants were not clergy or lay member to Annual Conference, they may not have had the opportunity to hear Bishop Morrison speak to this issue last year. Likewise, they may not have read her or other denominational official's responses in <u>The Communicator</u>. On the other hand, we also realize that many may have come with personal theological and political "agendas". Conference leadership may want to consider addressin these needs.

The majority of the evaluations (87) were very positive. These respondents thought that the Forum was well-organized and informative, that it was also thought provoking and broadened their theological horizons. The Forum was balanced and helped to clarify the differences between Biblical/traditional and non-Biblical/non-traditional understandings of Wisdom/Sophia. These respondents were also interested in attending future Theological Forums - around such issues as: human sexuality and/or homosexuality, racism, gender issues and roles of women, United Methodist doctrinal beliefs, abortion, Christianity and culture and the Trinity.

Several resources were generated by the Forum and are available to local churches as aids to further study. A bibliography of books which have been most helpid to participants is attached as part of this report. Audio tapes of the keynote and guest speaker presentations are also available for a nominal cost. (Contact Rev. Karen S. Booth, Long Neck United Methodist Church, R.D. 6, Box 288D, Millsboro, DE 19966 for copies.)

My deepest appreciation is extended to the hard-working members of the Task Force (Rev. Thomas Blakelock, Rev. Sandra Steiner Ball, Rev. Cynthia Griffith Koski, Rev. Chariothe Cartion-Ba, Rev. Jonathan Baker, Rev. Lehman Tomlin, Marie Robinson, Robert Moyer, Charles Mason and the late Dolly Brittingham) for their creativity, thoughtfulness and dedication. Thanks also to St. John's Church for their gracious hosting of the Forum and to the many clergy and laity who supported the event through their participation and prayers.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE INTERAGENCY COMMITTEE ON HEALTH CARE ISSUES RE PEOPLE OF COLOR

As lay and clergy members of the Annual Conference may recall, the 1994 session of our Annual Conference approved a resolution submitted by the African-American Summit of the same year. One of the components of the resolution calls for attention to be addressed to health care issues re people of color by appropriate conference agencies and hoards.

In following up on this resolution, the Conference Board of Church and Society made an initial response in a paper dealing with health care realities and possible solutions in relation to people of color featuring, but not limited to, African-Americans. The Conference Council on Ministries subsequently affirmed several recommendations in responding to health concerns of people of color within our Conference. One recommendation was for the inclusive coordination of various efforts in regard to such health care concerns. Since the February 18, 1995 decision setablishing the interregency committee, meetings have been held on March 30th and May 18th to review recommendations and to delegate responsibilities appropriately.

A specific proposal concerned the sponsoring of a conference-wide seminar for furthering health education, health and wholeness emphases and congregational health ministries. It is the intent of the steering committee for the conference-wide event that information and screenings, etc., helpful to persons in our congregation and communities be provided throuch concreational ministries. The progress made thus far on the various proposals is as follows:

 Actively promote the formation of health ministries units to include parish nurses in African-American churches.

Response: Such promotion in ongoing and active in our Conference. In addition, four persons will be going with Naomi Winchester to a July 6-10, 1995 training event at Lake Junaluska related to health ministries.

 Mailings to African-American congregations on health related matters. Support for existing communication efforts re dissemination of resources.

Response: Such mailings continue to be sent by Naomi Winchester to all pastors. An event featuring Dr. David Hilton will be held on November 2, 1995 and appropriate information will be mailed.

 A particular Sunday to be designated for observing a health and wholeness theme in worship, Christian education, etc., especially in African-American congregations.

Response: Our Conference BMCR coordinator, Darlene Webb, is seeking to arrange for BMCR Sunday 1996 to have a focus on health ministries.

4. A survey instrument to be used with minority churches in relation to subjects dealing with transportation for greater access to health services; infant mortality and morbidity prevention programs; programs for the reduction of stress and environmental health risk factors in minority communities

Response: A survey instrument is currently being designed. It is proposed that the persons to be trained at Lake Junaluska be asked to do the survey by telephone.

Guidance to be provided on the formation of health ministries in congregations, especially those of people of color. Encouragement to be given re health advocacy networks of local churches, etc. to impact leoislative initiatives.

Response: This matter to be pursued by the Conference Board of Church and Society. Meanwhile other possibilities exist for Health Ministries Alliances.

Annual Conference agencies to be encouraged to maintain a strong focus on social and economic justice for all.

Response: Among other approaches, the Conference Council Director has agreed to do this through an article in The Communicator.

7. Increase substance abuse programs held around the conference.

Response: The Conference Board of Church and Society continues to address this need. It is to be noted that funds may be made available through mini grants from CBCS for local churches doing substance abuse programs.

 Support for continuing efforts by the Conference Commission on Religion and Race counteracting institutional and environmental racism. Response: Support was given to one such recent event held on the Wilmington District.

 A conference-wide seminar on health care issues affecting African-Americans in particular and people of color in general to be organized.

Response: A meeting of the steering committee to initiate action towards this event was held on May 15, 1995. The work of planning is underway. Related seminars and conferences sponsored by other ecumenical and community groups are also to be encouraged.

The work of the Interagency Committee is an example of how conference boards and agencies can work in cooperation and collaboration, sharing information on a variety of measures and programs related to health care, parish health ministries, issues of racism, social concerns, health and wholeness, advocacy and legislative monitoring, and concerns for the elderly and children in our society. In this way, the duplication of efforts is avoided and energies can be focused on reaching communities through our churches and through church sponsored community events.

Kenneth Marion Dickey



The Reverend Kenneth Marion Dickey was born on February 11, 1919 in Wagner, Illinois to Reverend Homer Edger and Lillie (Jostes) Dickey. On June 12, 1944, Kenneth married Marie Guessford in Stanton, Delaware. To this union was born three children: Dr. Kenneth Marion Dickey. Alice Fenichel and Virginia Wells as well as five grandsons.



In 1937 he graduated from Newton High School, Newton, Illinois. He entered Adrian College in 1937. In 1938, he was placed on trial in the Methodist Protestant Conference, Lewistown, Illinois. After graduating from Adrian College, Adrian, Michigan in 1941 with a B.A. Degree, he

entered Garrett Seminary in 1941 and transferred to Westminster Theological Seminary, Westminster, Maryland. He graduated in 1944. Rev. Dickey was raised in Methodist parsonages and joined church after a conversion experience at an early age. On September 25, 1943, Kenneth was ordained

Deacon at Carbondale, Illinois in the Southern Illinois Conference. He was ordained Elder in East St. Louis, Illinois in the Southern Illinois Conference on September 24, 1944. He transferred to the Peninsula Conference in 1946 and served the following appointments: Stanton, Delaware 1939-1943; Cecilton, Maryland 1945-1946; Allen, Maryland 1946-1947; Newark, Maryland 1947-1948; Hosier Memorial-Hoopers, Hoopers Island, Maryland 1950-1952; Sabbatical 1953; Tilghman-St. John 1954-1956; Nassau-Conley's Chapel 1956-1962; Houston-Williamsville 1962-1963; Tome Memorial, Port Deposit, Maryland 1963-1965; Smith Island-Ewell 1965-1968; Parsonsburg 1968-1971; Mt. Vernon Charge 1971-1973; Sharptown, Maryland 1973-1975; Greensboro-Burrisville 1975-1977; Princess Anne-Antioch 1978-1980; Laurel-Mt. Pleasant 1981-1982.

Kenneth was involved in the development of Camp Pecometh when it was held at Wesley Junior College, Dover, Delaware. For many years when the camp was located near Centreville, Maryland, he served both as dean and counselor many times. He had a special talent for working with youth and young adults and was active at local and conference levels.

He retired from the Laurel-Mt. Pleasant Charge in 1983 and lived for several years near Mardela Springs, Maryland. While living there, he served the St. Thomas Charge, Wingate, Maryland.

Rev. Dickey later moved to Burnham, Pennsylvania. After moving to Burnham, he served the First Baptist Church, Lewistown, PA for five months. He also served the Reedsville-Schrader Charge for six months and White Memorial Congregational Church in Siglerville, PA for six months.

The summers of 1993 and 1994, he served as Chaplain at Poe Valley State Park and Hemlock Acres Park, Pennsylvania.

He was an active participant in the Church School program and taught a summer class for college students, as well as hospital and shut-in visiting for the First United Methodist Church, Lewistown, where he attended.

He took an active part in community activities serving as a member of volunteer fire companies, Lions Clubs, Ruritan Clubs and supporting Boy Scout activities. He loved people, the land, animals and had a passion for gardening. His was a rural ministry all the way.

Rev. Dickey died at his home on May 15, 1995 from complications of heart disease. Funeral services were held at Heller-Hoenstine Woodlawn Funeral Home, Lewistown, PA, with the Revs. Jay E. Jones and Bruce Hinderliter officiating with burial at Lind Memorial Cemetery, Lewistown, Pennsylvania.

Kenneth served the Lord with gladness and his appointments with faithfulness and enthusiasm. He was a kind and caring man, a devoted husband, father and grandfather. He is greatly missed.

Warren Jefferson Ford



Warren Jefferson "Jeff" Ford was born May 29, 1925 in Dames Quarter, Maryland. He was the youngest of sixteen children of Etta (Jones) and Warren Pringle Ford.

After graduating from Deal Island High School in 1942, he entered the U.S. Armylair Force and served until November 3, 1949. While in the military, he achieved the rank of 17/Sergeant. He served in the Aerial Combat team as flight engineer and upper turret quurity flying thirty missions in the European Theater. He was awarded medals for markmanship and good conduct.

Post-war settled Jeff back on his farm in Delmar, Maryland. He raised chickens and worked full-time for Dresser Industries in Salisbury, Maryland. During his already busschedule, he completed the correspondence "Ministerial Course of Study of The United Methodist Church" in 1964.

Joseph Vaughn Holliday, Jr, known by his friends as "Joe", was born in Lookout, West Virginia, to Joseph Vaughn Holliday, Sr. and Annie Havnes Holliday, the fifth child in a family of nine children.

He left school to join the Navy in 1940 and was on many tours. He reached the rank of Chief Commissary Steward before being honorably discharged on August 17, 1946. He finished his High School with a GED. While serving a seven-point Methodist Crutit, he graduated in three years from West Virginia Wesleyan

College, Buckhannon, West Virginia in 1952, with a Bachelor of Arts Degree. He graduated from Temple School of Theology with a Master of Divinity degree in 1956, while serving four churches in Georgetown, Delaware.

While in college, the fourth child arrived making him more determined to finish his education.

The Dover District Superintendent needed some more good ministers, so he, along with two other ministers, came to be interviewed and were given churches.

His first appointment was the Georgetown Circuit, consisting of four churches: St. John's, Bethesda, Cokesbury, and Sandhill. This was 1952-1956, during which time a new parsonage was built.

In 1956-1960, he was appointed to Queenstown, Maryland to serve three churches: Calvary in Queenstown, Immanuel in Grasonville and Wye of Carmichael. A new sanctuary was built at Queenstown.

In 1960-1965, Joe moved to a new alignment consisting of three churches in Rock Hall, Maryland: Rock Hall, Raum and Wesley Chapel United Methodist Churches. He had the largest youth group in the sub-district on the Easton District.

He was appointed to Centenary United Methodist Church in Laurel, Delaware in May 1965 and in January was asked to serve Christ United Methodist Church until Conference in May, which he did; but not for only six months, but for two and a half years!

In 1969, while recovering from an accident which kept him from the pulpit, he continued to oversee the building of a new parsonage. In 1971, he was put on disability and moved to Barratt's Chapel where he was the Curator for eleven months.

In 1972-1975, he was appointed to the West Harrington Charge in Harrington, Delaware, with four churches: Trinity, Prospect, Salem, and Bethel United Methodist Churches.

His next appointment was Marshallton-Cedars in Wilmington, Delaware, 1975-1978, where the "We Care Group" was started.

In 1978, he was appointed to St. Luke's United Methodist Church in St. Michaels, Maryland and had a good ministry there for four years.

In 1982-1987, he enjoyed his appointment to Colora-Hopewell in Colora, Maryland, where an education building was started.

Joe retired in July 1987, but before he had a chance to experience retirement, he was asked to serve the West Harrington Charge until they found someone, which he did, for seven years! All the while, commuting from his home in Lauerl, Delaware. Under his leadership, a new multi-purpose educational building was built at Prospect United Methodist Church. All tolled, he had 45 years in the ministry.

Retiring the second time on July 1, 1994, he continued as Chaplain at Nanticoke Moroital Hospital in Seaford, Delaware. All the while, filling several speaking engagements, weddings and funerals. The last worship service he conducted was in Greensboro, Maryland on November 27, 1994.

Joe served on the Board of Pensions, the Board of Higher Education and Ministry, Relationship to Chaplains, Board of Child Care and others.

He was Chaplain in the Delaware National Guard, Maryland National Guard and finished in the Army Reserve, having over thirty years of service, retiring as Lieutenant Colonel on Seotember 30, 1977.

On January 8, 1995, in Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, Maryland, God took Joe home to be with Him in the place He had gone to prepare for him, fee from all pain and suffering. He leaves behind his wife, Hids Louise of Laure), Delaware; four children, Patricia Jo Shannon of Red Lion, Pennsylvania, Joseph Vaughn Holliday, Ill of York, Pennsylvania, Margaret Ann Ort-Coleman of Chestertown, Maryland, and Karen Suffeliday of Holliday of Tuscarora, Maryland, eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

A Celebration of Life and Resurrection was held on January 11, 1995, in Centenary United Methodist Church, Laurel, Delaware. The officiating ministers were the Reverends Kevin E. English, Arthur G. Backus and H. Sterling Green. Burial was in the St. John's Cemetery, Springfield Crossroads, Georgetown, Delaware.

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
