Bishop E. Embrey Hoss, President of the Conference, in the Chair. Conference united in singing Hymn No. 577: "O God, our help in ages past, Our hope for years to come."

#### REPORT NO. 2 OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Never in the history of the Old Baltimore Conference, and indeed throughout the entire Church, has there been such an advance in Missionary interest. Last year we paid \$1,000 above our assessment on Foreign Missions, and this year, with an increased assessment, we advanced \$1,000 more. The demand for Missionary literature is most encouraging, as well as the increased number of Study Classes. While many of our Sunday Schools are not organized into Missionary Societies, the number is steadily increasing. The ground is being well prepared in many charges, and the seed is sown. With much pleasure we note the new method is not one of begging for dollars, but that of pouring in facts, with the result that every true Christian is receiving in formation concerning the "How" of Missions.

We regard the uniting of our three Missionary Boards, by action of the last General Conference, a forward step, putting us in the front rank for the compactness and solidarity of our Missionary organization, and securing increased economy and efficiency both in funds and forces.

With pleasure we note the decrease in the amount asked for in some of the Districts, and ask the Presiding Elders to further help us by concentrating the appointments and otherwise, so that at no distant date every married minister may receive \$700 and a parsonage as the minimum salary. This, we believe, can be done if some of the Missions, in prosperous communities at least, be no longer recognized as legitimate claimants.

We recognize that no successful campaign can be carried on with an inadequate home base. An adequately equipped Ministry is absolutely essential to a prolonged and victorious campaign.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

1st. We recommend the holding of a Missionary Anniversary in accordance with the Book of Discipline, and that Friday night of the next Annual Conference be set apart for that purpose.

2nd. We call attention of the Presiding Elders and Pastors to paragraphs 380 and 381, of the Book of Discipline, noting especially the action of the last General Conference on the matter of presenting the subject of Missions to the people.

3rd. That we urge the Pastors to organize and set in motion the Fourth Department of our Epworth Leagues and have Missionary Study Classes in all the Charges and at every appointment where possible, believing this educational work is essential to the cultivation of a Missionary spirit.

4th. That we heartily recommend the method of the Educational Department of the Board of Missions and call especial attention to the monthly programme for the Sunday School and the literature provided by the Board gratis to all who apply. The "Million-Dollar Fund for Missions", a pledge for a specific amount, at the beginning of the Conference year with a definite goal, we recommend. In this connection we take pleasure in bringing to your attention the "Duplex Envelope" system, published in Richmond, Va., by the Duplex Envelope Co., as the best method yet devised for raising Missionary money, as well as other funds in the Church. This plan is endorsed by the Laymen's Missionary Movement and all the leading Missionary Boards.

REPORTS.

5th. That we make a special canvass for subscriptions to the "Missionary Voice", the outcome of the recent combination of the "Woman's Foreign Missionary Advocate", "Our Homes" and "Go Forward", regarding this the best publication the Church has yet produced.

6th. That we commend most heartily the "Every Member Canvass". This method of enlisting every member and securing a contribution every week through the weekly envelope will easily provide the Missionary income.

7th. That we co-operate with the Laymen's Missionary Movement in realizing their inspiring ideal, "a Missionary Committee in every Church, a contribution from every member and a sum equal to an average of \$2.00 per capita, in every congregation."

8th, We recommend "The Children's Home Society of Virginia" as an Institution worthy of our support.

9th. That we heartily endorse the work of our efficient Missionary Secretary, the Rev. D. L. Blakemore, and recommend his appointment for the ensuing Conference year, in connection with a regular appointment.

10th. That we recommend the appointment of the Rev. A. B. Sites as Missionary at Laurel and Savage.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH, 1911.

#### Dear Fathers and Brethren-

I present the report of the Treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Baltimore Conference. It shows a small advance over last year, and is hopeful of better things. A part of the increase is due to the recent celebration of the jubilee of organized work for Foreign Missions by women. This represents funds actually paid in; and a still larger amount is promised to be paid by October. The sum total will probably reach nearly a thousand dollars, and is directed to building in Rio. The jubilee offering was mainly contributed by women not now in our Society; but interested and filled with enthusiasm by the spirit of the jubilee. One or two new auxiliaries have been formed in consequence; and in several localities women are considering how they may organize other bands. Will not the preachers help wherever there is a good prospect of such organization?

The last General Conference added to the General Board of Missions representatives of both the Foreign and Home Mission Societies, without any material alteration in existing circumstances of each Society. It is now proposed by some of the executive officers to bring about a union in all departments of auxiliaries for adults, young people and juveniles. In this day, when almost all work is specialized, this appears illogical. The first meeting of the Woman's Missionary Council, to be held in St. Louis in April, will vote on the issue. Should it be carried, radical changes must follow. Yet where good work is being done and suitable progress shown, it does not seem wise to risk violent alterations.

My last report to the Central Office mentioned ninety-five adult auxiliaries, thirty-five Young People's Societies, and twenty-four Juvenile Bands, with a total membership about thirty-three hundred. We support one missionary, one day school, four Bible women, and seven scholarships. The women of the Baltimore Conference work quietly, but only deep piety and earnest faith could have accomplished such results as this financial report. We do not reckon money as the only way to show our devotion; but it is a substantial means of manifesting our desire to make our Lord known to the ends of the earth!

Our Society is bereaved in the death of the Treasurer of the Memorial Fund two months ago. Miss R. Virginia Cloud, of Front Royal. The memory of her saintly life is added to that of many others who have joined the Church Triumphant, but as a Society we are deeply bereaved in her loss.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

#### RANDOLPH-MACON SYSTEM.

"By their fruits ye shall know them." The confidence of the public in this system as an educating agency is evidenced by its patronage of twelve hundred and fifty students; the variety and efficiency of its service, by the employment of one hundred and twenty teachers; the financial profitableness of its work by a gross income of something over three hundred thousand dollars; and its national reputation by drawing this patronage from thirty States of the Union with seven from beyond its bounds. This popularity is, doubtless, due to the fact that its scheme of education contemplates not only a sound mind in a sound body, but also a converted heart in a life consecrated to God. As a Conference we would, therefore, join its many patrons in their admiration of its splendid ideals and assure its management of our confidence in its wisdom and integrity. Said someone of Washington, "His country is his monument". So the Randolph-Macon System, as we know it, must be regarded as the monument of those for whose intelligence, zeal and self-sacrifice it stands. But it will never do the work for us, nor the work that it wants to do, until all its debts are paid and its endowments increased. To this end in a way well calculated to mark the esteem in which these institutions are held by the educating world, the General Education Board, of New York, has recently made a donation of fifty thousand dollars to the endowment of the College at Ashland on the condition that other friends contribute one hundred thousand. The benefits of the College to our people cannot well be overestimated. Can we not, therefore, respond to this most commendable offer with a liberal effort, and thus prove both our gratitude and faith by our works? We are the heirs of our fathers: let us leave to ours this legacy of wisdom and liberality. We most heartily commend the System and this cause of its richer endowment to our people.

#### SOUTHERN SEMINARY SYSTEM.

The Southern Seminary System includes the Southern Seminary, at Buena Vista, Va., the Alleghany Collegiate Institute, at Alderson, West Virginia, and the Bowling Green Female Seminary at Bowling Green, Virginia.

#### THE SOUTHERN SEMINARY.

The Southern Seminary is the only Southern Methodist Institution, within the bounds of the Baltimore Conference, for the exclusive training of girls. Although it is neither owned nor controlled by the Conference.

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ence, it is doing for our girls and for Methodism all that a similar institution owned by ourselves could do. Its traditions and aims are in full accord with the teachings of Methodism; yet it is not at all sectarian. The school is admirably located near the centre of our Conference; and we have never seen a finer or more pleasant site for the location of an educational institution. The building is well adapted for its purposes, yet the management contemplate the erection of a spacious auditorium, and the installation of a pipe organ. The faculty is made up of a thoroughly competent body of teachers who know and love the work; the moral and religious tone is of a high order. The past year has been one of great prosperity and the future is bright with promise. The plant is valued at \$100,000; there are twenty-five teachers and officers, and one hundred and forty pupils. Your Board commends this school as in all respects worthy of the patronage of our people. We recommend that Rev. Wm. Stevens, Rev. W. H. H. Joyce, and Rev. Linwood Hammond, or their successors, be appointed a visiting committee, their expenses being paid by the Seminary, and we request this committee to make a report to the Board of Education in writing.

#### ALLEGHANY COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE.

This school is located in a rich, prosperous and progressive section of our Conference, and supplies a need for a Methodist school for our boys and girls in that part of our Conference territory.

The Rev. L. S. Shires, Resident Principal, has conducted the school with signal succees. The faculty is composed of a company of Christian men and women well adapted to the work in which they are engaged. The military feature introduced this year has given fresh impetus to the work of the school. The building is valued at \$22,000. There are ten teachers, and one hundred and six pupils. Your Board believes that the members and friends of our Conference, especially in the Lewisburg District, will make no mistake in sending their boys and girls to the Alleghany Collegiate Institute. We recommend that Rev. D. M. Brown, Rev. Wm. H. Best and Rev. H. I. Stephens, or their successors, be appointed a visiting committee, their expenses being paid by the Institute, and we request this Committee to make a report in writing to the Board of Education.

#### BOWLING GREEN FEMALE SEMINARY.

This school is located within the bounds of the Virginia Conference, and has been conducted during the past year by the Rev. C. K. Millican, who has had a most successful year.

#### THE CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOL.

The Correspondence School has done another year of successful work. The enrollment of students has ranged from seven hundred to one thousand during the year, and the work of the students has been very gratifying; practically every English-speaking Conference has been represented on the roll. During the eight years the school has been organized, 2,492 separate students have been enrolled, about one-third of the entire number of the active pastors of Southern Methodism. For the past two years the Correspondence School has given considerable attention to the matter of ministerial supply, and it is significant that during the past year more men were admitted to the Annual Conferences than ever before. Your Board thoroughly commends the work of this school, and hopes that all of our undergraduates, especially, will avail themselves of the advantages it affords.

#### MINISTERIAL SUPPLY AND TRAINING.

The problem of ministerial supply and training has been before this Board for several years, and we are convinced that some steps should be taken to meet the situation in an adequate and permanent way. We therefore offer the following plan for your consideration:

First—That the Corporate Board of Finance be authorized to receive and hold funds for ministerial education, subject to the direction of a committee of three, appointed by the Board of Education at the beginning of the quadrennium, to be known as *The Committee of Ministerial Supply and Training*, vacancies to be filled by said Board.

Second-All applications for aid shall be approved by the Presiding Elder and the Preacher in Charge where the applicant resides, and for continuance of aid, also by the Faculty of the institution attended. No donation shall exceed \$100 per session, and no loan shall exceed \$150 per session. In the case of loans the committee shall determine the conditions of repayment, the following plan being suggested: the candidate shall be expected to make the repayment of the money loaned at such time as the committee may determine, provided, however, that if it seems proper to the appointing powers to assign men who have received loans from this fund, to charges paying meagre salaries, the man who has completed the R.-M. Academy course, or its equivalent, shall be credited on his loan by so much as his salary, including Domestic Mission appropriation, if any, shall fall short of \$300.00; first-year college course, \$350; second-year College Course, \$400; and third-year College course or A. B. degree, \$500. The particular application of these suggestions shall be left to the discretion of said committee, and a full report made to the Conference Board of Education.

GG REPORTS.

Fourth—We recommend that \$500 be added to the Randolph-Macon assessment and direct that the Joint Board of Finance shall apportion to this fund its pro rata share—one-ninth—of the receipts of said assessment, which shall be used in aiding only those candidates who attend Randolph-Macon College or R.-M. Academy.

This Committee is authorized to make further provision for carrying on its work by securing gifts, legacies and collections at church gatherings.

#### APPOINTMENTS RECOMMENDED.

We recommend that the Conference request the Bishop to appoint Rev. John A. Kern, D. D., Professor in Vanderbilt University; Rev. Henry P. Hamill, D. D., Conference Secretary and Treasurer of Education; Rev. L. S. Shires, Principal of Alleghany Collegiate Institute; Rev. Rembert D. McNeer, student at Randolph-Macon College, Ashland; Rev. C. C. Lambert, student at Randolph-Macon Academy, at Front Royal; Rev. Jas. S. Keene, student at Vanderbilt University, and Rev. Henry Miles Johnson, student at Johns Hopkins University.

At the request of the management we recommend that the Conference request the Bishop to appoint Rev. Charles K. Millican as Resident Principal of Bowling Green Seminary.

#### ASSESSMENTS

We recommend the assessment of \$3,173.00 for educational extension and four thousand five hundred dollars for Randolph-Macon, the proceeds of which shall be divided by the Joint Board as follows: eightninths to Randolph-Macon College at Ashland and Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal and one-ninth as provided for by the paragraph on ministerial training and supply.

#### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

We are glad to be able to report a year of unusual progress along all lines of Sunday School activity.

We report 607 schools; an enrollment, including officers and teachers, of 61,903, an increase of 2,658 during the year.

Our Children's Day offerings almost doubled, and we are glad to state that the condition of our Treasury will justify your Board in the payment of the entire \$750.00 apportioned to this Conference by the General Sunday School Board for the purpose of completing the endowment of the chair of Religious Pedagogy in Vanderbilt University.

We thank God for what has been achieved, and with renewed energy and hopefulness turn to the widening fields of Sunday School Endeavor.

#### THE SUNDAY SCHOOL ANNIVERSARY.

The Sunday School Anniversary held on Thursday afternoon and evening was a most helpful occasion. The "Round Table" conducted for an hour in the afternoon, was a new feature of the Anniversary that proved intensely interesting. Overflowing congregations, composed of both clerical and lay workers, attended both the "Round Table" and the evening service.

Dr. H. M. Hamill, the Superintendent of Teacher Training, conducted the "Round Table," and made the principal address at the evening service. Dr. Hamill never appeared among us to greater advantage. We thank God for him and his work.

We recommend that so far as consistent with the business of the Conference the "Round Table" be made a regular feature of the Anniversary.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL LITERATURE.

It is a matter for profound thankfulness that the character of our Sunday School Literature is equal to the best in the country. Its excelence is universally recognized, and any school pretending to be Southern Methodist, and yet not using our own literature, but advertises its lack of appreciation of that which is best, and its disregard of that which is doctrinally safest for our children.

All the Sunday School literature issuing from our Publishing House is deserving of more than passing notice, and we accord it our unqualified commendation.

#### TEACHER TRAINING.

The Sunday School is essentially the School of the Church. The three great essentials in a school are: text-book, teacher and pupil. The text-book is divinely given, the pupils are immortal souls, and upon the character of our teaching may depend their eternal weal or everlasting woe. How incumbent upon us, then, to see that our teachers are properly equipped!

GS REPORTS.

The wise introduction of the Elementary Graded Courses and the Organized Classes make teachers who can teach, an absolute necessity.

Teacher Training has passed the experimental stage and has abundantly justified its existence in a thousand schools in Southern Methodism. Dr. Hamill has enrolled 20,000 students in 1,200 Study Circles.

We, therefore, urge upon our teachers and superintendents the necessity of constantly agitating the question of Teacher Training and of using all proper means to organize Teacher Training Classes in every Charge of the Conference.

We endorse the recommendation of Dr. Hamill that, so far as possible, these classes be organized in the Sunday School itself, reciting at the regular Sunday School hour, and that the pastors and superintendents co-operate to put into these classes from the entire school those who give the greatest promise of becoming efficient teachers.

#### ORGANIZED ADULT CLASSES.

The organized Class Movement has broadened the scope of the Sunday School until it is no longer a place for teaching the Word of God only. but these classes have become "Life Saving Stations", "Training Camps". Hives of Missionary and other Christian activities, whose energies rightly directed mean much for the progress of the Kingdom.

It is a matter of special gratification that Rev. C. D. Bulla, a member of our Conference, has been selected Superintendent of the Wesley Adult Bible Class Department of our Church, and we recommend the enrollment of all our existing organized classes in his Department, as well as the organization of other classes in every school where it is possible to effect it.

For information concerning the Department and the work of organized classes, address Rev. Charles D. Bulla, No. 810 Broadway, Nashville, Tenn.

#### THE SUNDAY SCHOOL AND MISSIONS AND TEMPERANCE.

We believe the work of the Sunday School is absolutely necessary to the largest development of the Missionary Spirit and the Temperance Conscience.

It is essential that we should have the most up-to-date information with respect to the conditions, environments, struggles and needs of our fellow-men, but all this scientific information must be enforced by the plain teaching of the Word of God, in relation to Himself as our Father and Man as our Brother. The Sunday School is the place where this can be most readily and effectively done.

We therefore recommend that special emphasis be given by our Superintendents and teachers to our regular Missionary and Temperance lessons, and that some special features be added to the program on these days that will make the lessons even more convincing and helpful.

The manual "Sunday School and Missions" should be in the hands of every Superintendent in the Conference.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL EVANGELISM.

Statistics show a constantly increasing number of additions to our churches to have come by way of the Sunday School, until at the present time possibly less than 10 per cent, of our increase comes from all other sources.

We believe with the intense personal evangelism of the Organized Class and the faithful observance of the Decision Day Revival, the future will show a still larger per cent. of our increase to have come from the efforts of the Sunday School.

We therefore recommend that the pastors encourage the Organized Classes in their efforts to seek and save the lost, and that special attention be given to and special arrangements made for the Decision Day Revival in all our schools.

Information for pastors and Superintendents explaining the most approved method of conducting Decision Day Revivals can be had in pamphlet form of our Publishing House.

#### CHILDREN'S DAY.

The special emphasis given to the observance of Children's Day the past year has resulted in a very large increase in the Children's Day Offerings, as may be seen by the report of the Treasurer hereto attached. We earnestly urge upon our pastors and superintendents a still wider observance of Children's Day this year. The hope of the Board is that the day may be observed in every School within the bounds of our Conference and that an offering may be taken on that day and applied according to disciplinary requirements.

#### DISTRICT ORGANIZATION AND INSTITUTES.

The Annual Convention does not take the place of District Institutes. but rather the one is intended to supplement the other.

We recommend that so far as possible Institutes be held in all our Districts, and we urge upon our District Organizations the advisability of holding Circuit Institutes in which two or more charges may join together in an Institute and Rally.

The Board has made an appropriation for the purpose of giving reasonable aid in this district work where financial assistance may be required.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

For reasons deemed sufficient by the Convention Committee, the Convention was omitted last year. Arrangements have been made to hold the session of this year at Trinity Church, Roanoke, May 31, and June 1 and 2. The committee is already at work upon the program and promises an excellent one. Dr. and Mrs. H. M. Hamill will be present throughout the session. The Board has elected Hon. M. L. Walton President and W. M. Millan Secretary of the Convention, and these with Rev. W. F. Locke, constitute the Committee in charge.

All our schools are urged to send delegations to the Convention that the entire Conference may get the benefit of the inspiration, the Convention and its splendid program will furnish.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

We are pleased to report a growing interest in the cause of Church Extension in our Conference. The largest amount in the history of the Conference was collected this year, as may be seen from the Treasurer's Report. Yet the incerase of collections is hardly equal to the increased demands for aid; and we are forced to give meager assistance only to many building enterprises whose merits call for larger liberality. At the present session applications were presented from twenty charges for an aggregate of \$12,000. After the usual appropriation of \$2,000 to the Washington church, there was only \$4,000 left to satisfy the urgent demand for \$10,000 in the nineteen remaining cases. These facts make insistent demands that the assessment be paid in full in all the charges.

#### DR. McMurry's Offer.

This challenge has proven a profitable incentive for several years, increasing the sum to be appropriated this year by \$1.126. The proposition is to duplicate for distribution by the Board any amount raised above the regular assessment. So that, after sending to the General Board 50 per cent. of the assessment, we still have the other 50 per cent., together with the excess and an amount equal to the excess to be paid by Dr. McMurry. Dr. McMurry has renewed this liberal offer, and we recommend that it be accepted with thanks.

#### ASSESSMENTS.

The assessment upon the whole church this year is \$250,000, the increase of \$50,000 being due to the transferring of parsonage aid to the Board of Church Extension. The assessment upon our Conference this year for this double purpose is \$8,350. We recommend the assumption of \$3,150, in addition, making the total the same as last year, or \$11,500.

#### APPLICATIONS.

Attention is called to the fact that hereafter all applications must have the approval of the Quarterly Conference (see Discipline, Par. 395, 7).

#### MEETING OF CONFERENCE BOARD REPRESENTATIVES.

In harmony with the action of the General Conference we recommend that the Board be authorized to elect delegates to such Conference of Representatives at the time and place that may be designated by the General Secretary.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL LOAN FUND.

The object of this fund is to encourage the best equipment for Sunday School work and to aid in providing it. It will be loaned only where adequate provision for efficient Sunday School work is a part of the plan for the proposed structure. Birthday offerings in the Sunday Schools will be largely depended upon for the creation of this fund. We, therefore, urge that all the pastors place a jar for such offerings in a conspicuous place in the school room, see that its purposes be explained, and report the offerings to this Board.

#### CONFERENCE LOAN FUND.

The recent General Conference has authorized your Board either to loan or donate the funds collected on the assessments. So far, however, the demand for donations has been so great that we have been unable to retain any part to be used as a loan. We, therefore, take this means of calling the attention of our people to the wide field of usefulness for a fund that would be available for loaning in the bounds of our own Conference, and respectfully solicit contributions to this end.

#### LITERATURE.

The general office is prepared to send, without cost, the Church Extension Hand Book, leaflets and charts to anyone who will write for them. We take pleasure in calling attention to this helpful literature, and urge its wide circulation. Address Rev. W. F. McMurry, D. D., 707 W. Chestnut St., Louisville, Ky.

#### DISTRICT CONFERENCE REPRESENTATION.

The President of the Board is authorized to secure a representative at each of the District Conferences. We earnestly request that the Presiding Elders give the prominent place on the program which this cause deserves.

#### MT. PLEASANT, WASHINGTON.

Complying with the request made by this Conference at its last session, the General Board has purchased a site on 16th street, N. W., Washington, D. C., upon which it is proposed to eventually erect a church for the use of the congregation known as Mt. Pleasant. We wish to record our hearty appreciation of this wise and generous transaction by the General Board, by the advise of its efficient secretary, Dr. McMurry; for without such timely aid we do not believe any arrangement could have been made to secure a place in that most promising community.

#### INSUBANCE.

Special attention is called to Paragraph 21 of the Church Extension Manual, and notice is given that in all future applications for aid, when property has been destroyed by fire without insurance, this will prove an important factor in determining whether the application will be considered.

#### THE REPRESENTATIVE CHURCH.

Gratifying reports have reached us of the satisfactory progress being made towards the consummation of this enterprise. The character of the structure that will adequately represent our denomination in Washington City calls rather for caution and wisdom than for impatient eagerness to realize results. We have all confidence in those charged with the responsibility of bringing this enterprise to completion. But we recognize the fact that it requires time to impress the church at large with the importance of it.

#### REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

Recognizing the fact that the American Bible Society does not stand any less in need of support derived from our churches because of its recent endowments, and knowing that 40 per cent. more money is given to Bible work in the South than is contributed to the support of the Society in the same section of the country, your Bible Board during the past year has endeavored to bring before our churches the necessity of liberal contributions to the American Bible Society. We are gratified because we can report an increase in the contributions of this year, but still we are convinced that the collections should have been larger.

The American Bible Society now has 9 home and 12 foreign agencies, thus covering all portions of the world reached by the Gospel, and the work the Society is doing is a positive necessity to the spread of the Gospel both in this and in foreign lands

We are pleased to report that a larger proportion of our charges contribute to the Bible Society than of any other ecclesiastical organiza-

tion in the South, yet we regret that no collection was taken in 10 of our charges, some of them being among our more prominent appointments. We insist that the requirements of the Discipline be followed by every pastor.

We recommend that the "Tercentenary Celebration" of the publication of the King James Version of the Scriptures be observed this year wherever possible, and that our pastors procure for their congregations the special programs furnished by the Society for the occasion. Secondly, we recommend that our pastors preach at least once a year on this important work, and avail themselves of any opportunity to have agents of local auxiliaries preach in their charges and assist in the collections. We recommend, thirdly, that the Presiding Elders emphasize the collections for the American Bible Society, both in the charges and at the District Conference of their respective Districts. Fourthly, we recommend that the cause be presented and the collections taken early in the year.

We insist that all money raised for the American Bible Society be paid to the Treasurer of the Bible Board. Should there be a sufficient reason for giving the collection from any charge to a local auxiliary, and a request from the pastor to that effect be presented to the Board, the Treasurer will be instructed to apply the funds as requested.

With the closing of this present Conference year your Bible Board appointed for the quadrennium completes its work. We have not accomplished all we had hoped for, yet we have tried to do our work conscientiously and faithfully, and we do rejoice because of the largely increased offerings from our charges. We lay our work down, praying that under the new Board to be appointed still more fruitful results may be obtained.

The Baltimore Southern Methodist commends itself to our loyalty. It is also indispensable to the work of the Church, a necessity for the conservation of the interests of the Conference. We are pleased to note that the income of the paper during the past year has been equal to any in its history, and that the Publishing Company is able to pay all outstanding debts. We firmly believe the financial plan to be the only solution for the maintenance of the Conference organ.

Therefore, be it Resolved, That the Conference make itself responsible for the salary of the Editor and Business Manager, and make the same assessment on the Conference as last year, said assessment to be apportioned on the districts after the usual plan of apportionment. If any surplus remains after the payment of the Editor's salary, said surplus to be retained by the Joint Board of Finance until disposed of by Conference action.

We most heartily recommend that the month of May be known among us as "paper month", and that the pastors be urged to wage a vigorous campaign for the extension of the circulation of the Baltimore Southern Methodist during the month of May. In order to facilitate the collec-

tions of the amounts due by the subscribers to our Conference Organ and for increasing its circulation among our people, we recommend that the preachers co-operate with the Editor in securing one or more of the members of their congregations to take charge of the work in collecting unpaid amounts and for securing additional subscribers, and that the pastors encourage these assistants in the work assigned them, and their names and addresses be promptly reported to the Editor. Let our ambition be ten thousand paid-up subscribers during the year.

We recommend the continuation of the guarantee plan, operated by the Board of Directors for the last two years.

We, in accord with the wish of the Board of Directors, request the Bishop to appoint Rev. C. D. Harris, Editor and Business Manager of the Baltimore Southern Methodist without other work.

We recommend the payment of the bill of expenses, presented by the Board of Directors, of \$1.934.15.

We recommend that the publishers and editors of our various Church papers be careful in accepting advertising matter for the columns of our papers, and that all objectionable matter be excluded.

It affords us pleasure to be able to report that we are not behind any Church in the land in the production of high-grade Christian Literature. We can safely recommend to the loyal support of all our Southern Methodist people our Connectional and Conference Organs.

Our publishing house at Nashville is in a healthful financial condition, and to go elsewhere for the literature which we need is not necessary. Our publishing house products are the best, and it deserves our most cordial patronage and loyalty.

The Methodist Review continues to maintain its high standard of ability in its contributed articles and in its editorial pages. Every minister should take it and read it.

The Christian Advocate is being well edited under its new Editorial management, and we believe it is the equal of any religious paper in the United States. We are not ashamed of our general Church Organ. It is worthy of a place in every home in Southern Methodism.

We most heartily recommend our Sunday School literature and urge all our pastors and people to see that no other literature is used in our Sunday Schools.

We cordially indorse our own Southern Methodist Book Depository at Staunton, Virginia, and call attention to the fact that we can save time and money by ordering our literature from the Depository.

The Epworth Era merits the patronage of all our Epworth Leaguers. Pastors and League Presidents will do well to see to it that the circulation of the Era is increased among our young people.

We beg to call attention to the new 1910 Discipline and could wish it were in every Southern Methodist home of the Baltimore Conference. The Missionary Voice is the organ of all our missionary forces, and it is an appealing and winning "voice" for the men of every nation, for the women and children of the heathen world, and for the enlightenment of the Church at home. It deserves a place in every Southern Methodist home.

We hear with delight that there is a strong probability of our Publishing House establishing an Eastern branch house, and as a Conference we very heartily endorse the plan and pledge to the movement our loyal support. We shall be happy to have the branch house established in the "Magic City" of Roanoke, Virginia.

### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

We are deeply grateful to Almighty God for the increasing sentiment against the liquor traffic within the borders of our Conference, and pledge anew our loyalty and co-operation to every movement which looks to the total destruction of this traffic; especially do we indorse and commend the non-partisan and inter-denominational Anti-Saloon League movement. We also rejoice in the part which Southern Methodism has had in the creation of the existing sentiment against the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors and predict that she shall never cease her efforts until the widespread liquor curse shall have been blotted out.

### Therefore Let It Be Resolved-

First—That we express our thorough confidence in the leaders of the Anti-Saloon League movement in Virginia and deplore the efforts of the liquor sympathizers to impair their influence and reputation. We earnestly recommend that our preachers and Churches co-operate with them in every possible way in the furtherance of their work.

Second—We endorse the proposed Enabling Act for the State of Virginia, which will give the people the right to vote on the question of State-wide prohibition; also the proposed restricted license measure which will prevent the shipment of intoxicants from the "wet" cities and towns into "dry" communities. We earnestly urge all our people of the State of Virginia to use all proper efforts to secure the enactments of these measures.

Third—We heartily commend the efforts of the Anti-Saloon League of the State of Maryland to secure the passage of a local option law, Statewide in its application. REPORTS. S5

Fourth—We rejoice in the successful efforts of the temperance forces of West Virginia to have the question of State-wide prohibition submitted to a vote of the people and pray that the result may be the addition of another prohibition State to the growing list of dry American Commonwealths.

Fifth—We earnestly urge the passage by the next Congress of an interstate law which will prevent the shipment of intoxicating liquors from "wet" States into "dry" communities of other States, or from any licensed State into any State having State-wide prohibition laws.

Sixth—We hereby request that the Presiding Bishop appoint the Rev. J. H. Light, D. D., to engage in temperance work as Secretary of Publications of the Anti-Saloon League of Virginia.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Recognizing as we do the growing tendency on the part of the people to yield to the seductive influence of commercialism and worldliness, of business activity, and the seemingly mad rush toward amusement and sport, and the utter disregard of the people for the sanctity of our Holy Sabbath and the Law of God, we deeply deplore such conditions as having a hurtful influence over the young people of our country, and very much retarding the work and progress of the cause of Christ.

Therefore, Be It Resolved-

First—That we will urge our people, both privately and from the pulpit, to refuse to patronize the Sunday newspaper, the Sunday excursion, the Sunday sports, and as far as possible Sunday railroad travel or traffic and every other form of Sabbath desecration.

Second—That we discourage our people from making the Sabbath a day for social visiting and pleasure; that we teach them that the Sabbath is a day of rest and for the worship of Almighty God. And that we further urge our people to allow nothing to hinder them in the discharge of their religious duties on the Sabbath Day.

Third—That the National Lord's Day Memorial on the first Sunday after Easter be set apart as the day when our preachers shall preach the annual sermon on Sabbath observance and take a voluntary offering for the Duncan Memorial Fund, as authorized by the unanimous action of our last General Conference, for the purpose of assisting in the erection of an Administration Building for the Sunday League of America, at Fort Worth, Texas.

Fourth—That we express our hearty appreciation of the action of the Postmaster-General in the promulgation of the recent Sunday closing order for the postoffices of the United States. We believe the sanctity of the Sabbath, the welfare of postal employees, the betterment of the postal service, the common weal, as well as the interests of the Church of God, all demand such an order, and will abundantly justify its issuance and enforcement.

Fifth—That we appreciate the presence of Doctor Thompson, General Manager of the Sunday League of America, at this session of the Conference, and that we note with pleasure that he expects to spend at least a month during this Conference year within the bounds of our Conference, for the purpose of creating public sentiment, and especially to concentrate such sentiment in Washington City, as will demand a Sunday Law for the District of Columbia. We recommend that so far as possible our preachers give Dr. Thompson a hearing before their congregations. We recommend the Publications of the Sunday League of America as containing valuable and suggestive matter, calculated to educate Public Sentiment and awaken the consciences of Christian people of all faiths. And your Committee respectfully recommends that a copy of Section four of these resolutions, signed by the President and Secretary of this Conference, be sent to the Postmaster-General at Washington. And we further recommend the following brethren as District Secretaries:

# MEMOIRS.

### JOSEPH JUDY CRICKENBERGER.

The hand that essays to write a chapter in the mortuary record of our itinerant ministry assumes a sacred service.

By the power of faith redeemed man wins a place near the Throne of God and shares with the Christ in the glory which angels have not. "By faith the elders obtained a good report \* \* \* these all died in the faith \* \* \* and being dead they yet speak."

The subject of this memoir was born Sept. 19, 1831, in Rockingham Co., Va., and died in Lewisburg, W. Va., Dec. 25, 1910, in the 80th year of his age and the 47th year of his ministerial career.

While the early life of Bro. Crickenberger was uneventful, its incidents indicate the ruling of Providence in keeping with the Scripture truth: "I girded thee, though thou hast not known Me."

He acquired a good English education through the school facilities of his native county. Pursuant to the excellent custom of that day relative to apprenticeship, he was at an early age apprenticed a tailor, at which trade he industriously worked in the towns of Staunton and Harrisonburg, Va., until he obeyed the call to preach the Gospel.

Bro. Crickenberger's parents were of the German Lutheran faith. He therefore became a Methodist by adoption. Converted at the age of twenty-four years and blessed with a clear and a definite religious experience, he ever referred to the event as magnifying the grace of God in the essential change that was wrought in his habits both of Thought and outward life.

Bro. Crickenberger was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference at its session in Bridgewater, Va., March, 1864. The year previous to his admission he served as a supply on Franklin Circuit. He diligently pursued his four years' course of study and was ordained elder in 1869 at Trinity Church, Baltimore.

The following are the places he served and the time of service: Franklin, 1863-66; Churchville, with Rev. A. A. P. Neel for six months, Bridgewater, the remainder of 1866-68; Williamsville, now Burnsville, 1868-69; Peterstown, 1869-72; Greenbank, 1872-74; Frankford, 1874-76; Centerville, now Greenville, 1876-78; Highland, now Back Creek, 1878-79; Huntersville, 1879-80; Warm Springs, 1880-84; Wardensville, 1884-86; Capon Bridge, 1886-88; Alvon, 1889-91; Talcott, 1891-94; Greenville, 1894-95; West Augusta, now Churchville, 1895-98.

On the 25th day of February, 1868, Bro. Crickenberger was married to Miss Cyrena Catherine Windle, of Edinburg, Va. This happy union was blessed with seven children, five sons and two daughters. These with his wife, the faithful companion of his itinerant labors, survive him.

At the Conference in Hinton, March, 1898, Bro. Crickenberger was given the superannuate relation, which he accepted with characteristic loyalty to the itinerant system, and took up his residence in Lewisburg. Here he spent the remainder of his years in the midst of his family, all of whom were with him at the time of his departure.

The years that followed his superannuation until his physical disablement were marked by activity in his loved employ as opportunity was afforded. He lent frequent assistance to the neighboring preachers with great acceptance to the people. In the winter of 1901-02 he served Alvon Circuit six months.

It may be said of Bro, Crickenberger's preaching that it was not with "enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and with power." Moreover, his life was the fine exemplification of what he preached. One who knew him testifies that he impressed him as a man who was "pure in heart and holy in life and all manner of conversation."

With the gift of power in public prayer he was endowed to a remarkable degree. The closeness of his fellowship with his Lord and the depth of his consecration was manifested in this form of public utterance, which gave a wonderful uplift to the congregation.

In the early winter of 1907 Bro. Crickenberger was attacked with a stroke of paralysis from which he never recovered. For more than three years he was a helpless invalid. This was a period of patience and fortitude expressive of the hold he had on unseen things. Retaining the ability to read and with mental faculties but slightly impaired, his interest in the Church continued until very nearly the last. His brother ministers and especially the pastors of the local church were the better for their visits to him. His appreciative responses in prayer and his spiritually refined and exalted countenance were a benediction.

His sky was always clear and continued so until a sudden yielding of his physical strength portended the close of his earthly life. For a few days prior to his death there were frequent lapses into unconsciousness. His mind turned back upon the paths of childhood, and the words "home" and "mother" were much upon his lips. There was light at eventide. It was while the night shadows fled before the morning sunshine that ushered in the glad Christmas Day that the soul loosed its earthly moorings and dropped anchor in the haven of heavenly rest. Our brother had gone to see the face of Him whom he had loved and served.

The funeral services were held in the Lewisburg Methodist Church, conducted by the pastor, Rev. D. M. Brown, assisted by Revs. J. H.

Schooley and H. A. Murrill, also Rev. M. L. Lacy, D. D., of the Presbyterian Church.

The earthly remains were laid to rest in the local cemetery, there to await the coming of Him "who shall fashion anew the body of our humiliation, that it may be conformed to the body of His glory."

## REV. ADDISON WELLER.

Addison Weller was born in Augusta Co., Va., Dec. 28th, 1830; departed this life at Govanstown, Md., May 15th, 1910. He was converted in Sept., 1852, under the ministry of Rev. W. Downs. From the time of his conversion he felt impressed with the call to the work of the ministry; he took an active interest in religious work, praying in public and discharging whatever duty presented itself to him. In the fall of this year he went to Mossy Creek Academy, where he remained for two years. He then went to Dickinson College, where he remaind two and on-half years. After leaving college he taught school for a short time. In 1858 he was married to Miss Elizabeth Kerrnann, of Rockingham Co., Va. In 1859 he became a tutor in the family of Col. Rinker, an uncle of Mrs. Weller, living near Mt. Jackson, Va. While engaged in this capacity, desiring to do other work for the Master, he requested. and after some difficulty secured, permission to hold religious services in the schoolhouse, resulting in the conversion of twenty-nine persons. Bros. John W. Wolff and Samuel Cromming, who were serving Woodstock Circuit, hearing of the meeting, called on Brother Weller and urged him to enter the regular work; accordingly he made application to the Quarterly Conference, and was licensed to preach by Rev. E. R. Veitch, Presiding Elder of Rockingham District.

There being no vacancy in the District, Brother Weller set out to do missionary work. He took up the old neglected Bethel Church, in Powell's Fort, where Asbury once preached, repaired the church, preached, visited and held meetings, and had the satisfaction of seeing many converted, some of whom are still living and serving the Church today.

In 1860 Brother Weller was junior preacher on Woodstock with Rev. Wm. Speak, P. E. In the beginning of the Civil War. Brother Speak, not being in sympathy with the Southern cause, left the charge, and Rev. J. E. Armstrong succeeded in charge of the circuit. The next year the charge was divided and New Market was made a separate charge with A. Poe Boude in charge and A. Weller junior preacher. After Brother Boude was appointed chaplain in the army, Brother Weller was left in charge of the work. The war cloud grew darker and the

contest fiercer day by day; first one army and then the other held possession of the country and rendered it very difficult to carry on even religious work with any degree of regularity. Brother Weller had his full share of difficulties and trials with which to contend, being arrested and threatened with imprisonment and even death if he did not show the byways and paths to the enemy; but amid it all we find him acting the part of a true servant of the Master; visiting and comforting the sick and the dying, preaching to the soldiers in camp, and especially when the Confederate Army was camped at Road's Hill, between Mt. Jackson and New Market, he held a series of meetings in the Dunker Church, where quite a number were happily converted, some of whom he was permitted to greet at the Soldiers' Home at Pikesville in the latter years of his life.

At the Annual Conference held at Bridgewater, Va., March 10th, 1864, he was received on trial with J. J. Crickenberger and C. L. Damaron. Feb. 11th, 1866, he was ordained Deacon at Alexandria, Va., by Bishop Early. March 8th, 1868, he was ordained Elder at Baltimore, Md., by Bishop Doggett. '64 to '65 he served New Market Circuit; 1866-8, Blue Sulphur Circuit, Greenbrier Co., W. Va., where he found things very much disorganized and conditions were discouraging by reason of the ravages of war and the failure of crops. There were a few faithful souls, and these rallied around the preacher and, with unfaltering faith in God, he went to work in earnest and in the two years of his stay on this charge God gave him many seals to his ministry and many souls for his hire.

His next appointment was Centreville Circuit, Monroe Co., W. Va., two years; then Covington, Va., two years; Waynesboro, Va., two years, where seventy souls were added to the church and the present church was creeted; Blacksburg, two years; Front Royal, two years; New Hope Circuit, two years; Luray, Va., four years; Wesley Grove Circuit, Md., two years; Taylor's Circuit, Md., four years; Kent Circuit, Md., two years; next Gainesville, Va., two years; Stirling, Va., three years; Linganore Circuit, Md., three years; thence he moved to Patuxent Circuit.

In 1905 he retired from active work, but continued to preach whenever an opportunity presented itself and his health would permit. A rather singular coincidence marked the closing of his ministerial career in that his last sermon was preached for the son of the man under whose ministry he was converted—Brother Downs, pastor of the Govanstown M. E. Church.

Bro. Weller was a sound, sensible Gospel preacher. His one great aim in life was to lead sinners to the Saviour and Christians to a richer experience and to enlarged usefulness in the Master's cause. He was a great builder and repairer of churches. He was a faithful workman and his work abides, not only in the commodious churches that he erected.

but in the many men and women whom he led to the Saviour. On the 15th of May, 1910, after some weeks of suffering, on the Sabbath morning, he gathered his family around him as the church bells were ringing, took for his text the words, "Therefore be ye also ready"; exhorted those around him very earnestly, then, lifting his trembling hands, he pronounced the benediction. At fifteen minutes to eleven o'clock he was not, for God had taken him.

#### JOHN SAMUEL HUTCHINSON.

John Samuel Hutchinson was born in Edinburg. Virginia, May 28, 1842. He attended the village school. He joined the Confederate Army on April 18, 1861, and served as a soldier through the four years of civil strife. He was converted September 25, 1866, and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. South.

On March 17, 1869, he was married to Miss Alice A. Miller, of Edinburg, who survives him. This union was a most happy one for the contracting parties, and it was the source of great blessing to all who were permitted to enjoy the hospitality of the Christian home which they established and which, for forty-two years, they maintained. Four children were born to them, Myrtle, the eldest, died in young womanhood. Edward W., John C., and Mrs. Edgar Whorf are still living.

Brother Hutchinson was licensed to preach April 24, 1869, by the Quarterly Conference of Woodstock Circuit; Rev. William S. Baird was Presiding Elder and Rev. John W. Wolfe preacher in charge. He was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference, March 7, 1870, and was appointed Junior Preacher on Woodstock Circuit with Rev. John W. Tongue.

He had charge of Luray Circuit, 1871-73; Mt. Sidney Circuit, 1873-4; South Branch Circuit, 1874-78; Lewisburg Station, 1878-82; Fredericksburg Station, 1882-86; Roanoke District, 1886-90; Salem Station, 1890-

94; Baltimore District, 1894-98; Arlington Station, 1898 and half of 1899, when he was appointed to the Lewisburg District to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Rev. J. D. Martin; he served this district, 1899-1903, and was then appointed the second time to Fredericksburg Station.

During this year his health failed, and he was superannuated in 1904. After a year's rest he was able to resume his place in the effective ranks, and served the Washington District, 1905-1907. His health again failed, and he was compelled to superannuate again. He fondly hoped that rest would again restore his health, but it was not to be so. His was an incurable malady, and he died March 20, 1911, in the 69th year of his age.

The years of his retirement were spent in Edinburg, where he was born, where he was married, where he was converted, where he was called to preach, and where he began his itinerant ministry. So complete was the circle, that the house in which his life ended was directly opposite that in which it began.

He identified himself at once with the work of the Church in Edinburg. He preached occasionally, as opportunity offered, and as his strength permitted. When he did not lead the service, he was in the pew, showing undiminished interest in the services of the sanctuary. He taught a class of boys in the Sunday School, and it was his unspeakable joy to see them unite with the Church a few weeks before his death.

Brother Hutchinson was a self-made man. Diligent reading of good books and association with some of the choicest spirits of the Conference in his day gave him a breadth of information and a clearness of judgment which would have been creditable to a man of much more abundant opportunities. He loved good books and good men. After his superannuation he sent Farrar's Life of St. Paul to a younger preacher, and said: "I hope you will get from it as much pleasure and profit as I did." A week before his death he referred to a long list of godly men for whose influence upon himself at a formative period in the ministry he expressed his gratitude to God.

He was a man of strong convictions, and was possessed of the courage to defend them when necessary. He was fearless in the discharge of what he conceived to be his duty, and protected them who were assailed because they were faithful to duty.

He was at his case in the social circle. Wherever he went he made friends and he held their friendship. There are many homes which cherish the fondest recollection of his visits and the light and peace they afforded.

In the pulpit he was clear, forceful and convincing. He was a preacher of more than average ability. He had the happy faculty of proceeding at once to the most important part of his subject, and the good sense to stop when he had made his point clear.

He was a writer of no mean ability. He succeeded Dr. Rodgers as Editor of the Baltimore Christian Advocate, and later succeeded Bro. Zimmerman, both of whom died in the editorial office. His editorial work was excellent. He had a vein of humor and a keen sense of the ridiculous which made him a formidable antagonist in an editorial bout. He delighted to coin aphorisms. Hundreds of readers of the Conference paper have read his "Snap Shots" with enjoyment and even mirth; but they did not dream that many of them were framed while his body was wrung with anguish.

He enjoyed the confidence of his brethren. For years he was a member of the Board of Trustees of Randolph-Macon College. He was president of the Benevolent Society. He was a delegate to the General Conference of 1898 and 1902, and was first reserve delegate in 1906. His life was a busy one and his hands were filled with trusts, to every one of which he was faithful. Wherever he wrought he was a workman that needed not to be ashamed.

His closing years were painful. He felt the privations of a superannuate most keenly. A year and a half ago he wrote, in reply to a letter from a friend: "I thank you so much for your letter. When one is enduring the privations of idleness, cut off from association with his prethren, and nervous from a very painful disease (neuritis), a bright, cheery letter is an episode. I have not lost interest in the work of the Church."

His very soul was stirred as he saw the hosts of God go forth to battle while he was chained in the tent by disease. It cost him many a struggle of the fiercest sort before he could submit with patience to be ministered to by the wife to whom he was moved to minister by every impulse of his nature.

Bodily pains deprived him of rest, excited his nervous system and brought him an irritation against which he struggled even in tears. But his faith in God was never shaken. He resigned himself to the discipline which was to ripen him for Heaven. Truly, it may be said of him that, like his Master, "He learned obedience by the things which he suffered."

One day the physician discovered alarming symptoms, and said to him: "Mr Hutchinson, I do not wish to alarm you," but before he could proceed further Bro. Hutchinson interrupted him by replying: "You cannot alarm me, doctor; that business has been all fought out and settled. You may say what you wish without fear of its consequences to me." And in a private letter, after giving an account of his sufferings and the progress of his disease, he closed by saying: "I do not know what the end is to be, but 'I know whom I have believed.'"

A few months before Conference he rallied, and looked forward with joyful anticipation to meeting again with the brethren, and especially with his friend, Bishop Hoss. When he suffered a relapse, and it was

sure that he could not go, his disappointment was keen. But he submitted to that, and told a friend that it might be that he would stand in the general assembly of the saints. When it was suggested that if such were the case, he would not be a stranger, he replied: "Indeed, I will not; I have more friends there than here."

He gave necessary directions to his loved ones as to his burial and the disposal of his few earthly effects. He resigned himself to the will of God, and met death as became a Christian warrior. He was unconscious for two days before the end, and so left no dying testimony; but none was needed. He rests from his labors, and his works do follow him.

In accordance with his own request, his funeral services were of the simplest character. On Tuesday afternoon, March 21, his body was carried into the Church at Edinburg. Three familiar hymns were sung. Rev. William Melville read the sentences and the psalms; Rev. W. E. Miller read the lesson from Corinthians; Rev. R. L. Fultz and Rev. Charles Lynch offered prayers. Brief tributes were paid by the Presiding Elder, Rev. George T. Tyler, Rev. Dr. Duffey, a classmate of Bro. Hutchinson, and by Rev. H. S. Coe and C. S. Stanton. Rev. G. W. Gaither was present with the ministers, and Rev. J. H. Haley pronounced the benediction.

The body remained in the church until the following morning, when it was taken to Salem. Va., and interred by the side of his daughter, the service at the grave being conducted by Rev. John A. Anderson, Rev. W. H. Woolf and Rev. L. L. Lloyd.

Thus has closed the earthly life of our brother. He died in faith in Jesus Christ and in the full hope of a resurrection from the dead.

# REV. JACOB S. HOPKINS.

Brother Hopkins was born in the City of Staunton, Virginia, on the 25th of November, 1823. He died in Strasburg, Virginia, Dec. 4th, 1910. He had just passed his eighty-seventh birthday.

In early life he went to the State of Ohio, where he remained until after the Civil War, when he returned to his native State. While in Ohio he married Miss Rebecca Jennings, of Springboro, in that State. His wife died some twenty years ago. Of two children born to them, one, a son, was killed while serving in the Union Army during the War. A daughter survives him.

Converted at the age of five years, his whole time of eighty-two years was spent in the membership of the Visible Church. During his early manhood he was a local preacher in the State of his adoption.

In 1877, Brother Hopkins was admitted into the Baltimore Conference on trial and received into full connection in 1879. His first appointment was Furnace, in Rockingham County. His second was to Port Republic, and in 1879 he was appointed to Waynesboro. For the following four years he served Rockingham Circuit. In 1884 he was sent to Mount Jackson and continued in charge of that work for four more consecutive years. His ministry in the charge was noteworthy for the building of the churches at Mount Jackson, Quicksburg and Mount Clifton. Brother Hopkins practically founded the work on that charge. From 1888 to 1891 he served Strasburg charge. In 1892 and 1893 he was again appointed to Mt. Jackson, building during this time the parsonage.

With this appointment Brother Hopkins' active service in the ministry closed. In 1894 he took the supernumerary relation and in 1894 he was superannuated. For three years of his supernumerary relation he conducted a school in Middleburg, Virginia. In 1897 he removed to Strasburg and became head of the Strasburg Institute, doing excellent work for the youth of the community until the fast-gathering years obliged him to relinquish the labor.

His remaining years were spent in the quiet of his home, ministered to by his ever faithful daughter. His life in the community was a benediction. His white head and erect form was a feature of note in the town. Up to within a short time of his death he met his class regularly in the Sunday School. On the Thanksgiving Day a little while before the end, he made the address of the occasion. It was his last public ministry, and was a strong testimony to the willingness and power of God to keep a man through many years and many ills.

The end came, not without warning, and yet not with prolonged suffering. When it came he was ready. There was no reluctance and no questioning. His citizenship had so long time been in Heaven that he could pass in person into the upper world without hesitancy or even surprise.

The funeral services were conducted from our Church in Strasburg, by the pastor. In spite of unusually inclement weather, many of his fellow-townsmen assembled to honor the memory of the man who had lived so long among them. Besides the pastor, the Presiding Elder and the ministers of the town participated in the solemn services; and each bore fitting testimony to the esteem in which he was held. After the service of the church, the Masonic order concluded the burial with their impressive rites.

# WILLIAM EUSTACE HENRY

Life is filled with the mysterious. What more so than the passing away of a life in the very height of vigor, consecrated to the noblest purpose and success following its efforts? The heart of trust leans upon its God and holds that all things work together for good unto them that love Him. Just entering upon the prime of life, William Eustace Henry left us, but the beauty of that life is manifest to all. This servant of God, the son of Rev. Edward Hugh Henry and Mary Anna Henry, was born at Fairfax Courthouse, Virginia, April 6, 1874. His father, a beloved minister of the Baltimore Conference, was filling the Fairfax charge. Young Henry was a strong, healthy boy, overflowing with life and good spirits. As a child he possessed an amiable disposition and abounded in good nature.

Seldom has one been more blessed in the advantages of heredity and environment. No child could have desired more. On his father's side he was a direct descendant of Judge James Henry, a member of the Continental Congress and Chief Justice of Virginia. On his mother's side, the direct descendant of Thomas Stone, of Maryland. W. E. Henry exhibited the traits of a long line of distinguished forefathers.

Born in a Methodist parsonage, he was reared in a distinctly spiritual atmosphere. Here were set before him high and noble ideals of life. He accepted them as his own, however, only after long deliberation. In early boyhood he hesitated for a while to follow fully in the steps of his father and to accept altogether the instructions of his mother. But religion had been made to appear so sound, so sane, so altogether reasonable in that home; the examples set before him daily in the walk and conversation of godly parents and in the earnest lives of Christian brothers and sisters, all his seniors; the morning and evening hours devoted to family worship; and the care taken to make truly holy the Sabbath Day, with a wise selection in the school finally chosen for his advanced education, that all hesitation disappeared, and a whole-hearted surrender to Christ followed. This was during the first year that he attended Front Royal Academy. With it there came a clear call to the Writing that year to his mother, just before the session of the Conference, he said: "Father will soon be answering the roll-call at Conference, and I hope it will not be long before I shall be there with him, answering to my name as a member of the Conference too."

His education was obtained in private institutions with a brief attendance at public schools. Four years were spent at the Academies at Bedford City and Front Royal, Virginia. During his last pastorate, feeling the need of more scholastic preparation for his work, he entered the George Washington University as a special student.

His ministry began in the spring of 1895, at the Conference session held in Washington, though he was not admitted into the Conference on trial until a year later. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Wilson in 1898, and ordained Elder by Bishop Candler, April 15, 1910.

Calvert Circuit was his first work, as assistant to his father; here he remained four years. Father and son labored together with mervelous success. Crowds waited upon their ministry and hundreds were converted.

In 1899 he served Taylor's Circuit with Rev. J. Lester Shipley.

In 1900 North Point was assigned him. He worked here three years; building the present stone structure and paying for it.

From North Point he went to Easton. Here he was eminently successful. Large congregations greeted him at the different services and he was greatly loved.

In 1907 he was at Trinity, Baltimore, as co-pastor with Rev. F. J. Prettyman.

In 1908 he came to St. Paul, Washington, his last charge. He labored here faithfully and enthusiastically. His work was well done. He seemed to become more and more intense and his one thought was concerning his work. Almost without a moment's warning his health gave way and his life came to a close November 14th, 1910. His funeral service was held in Baltimore, Maryland, conducted by Rev. F. J. Prettyman, assisted by Revs. E. V. Regester, J. Howard Wells, P. W. Jefferies and J. Paul Tyler. His body was laid to rest in the cemetery at Gaithersburg, Maryland, to await the glorious morn of the Resurrection.

Brother Henry was married February 13, 1908, to Miss Lilly Meyers, of Baltimore, Maryland, who in every way was his companion and helpmate.

W. E. Henry was a devoted son and a true husband and father. To his mother he was always tender and considerate, and more so as she advanced in age.

He always maintained the deepest affection for the members of his own family. To his wife he was always the ardent, considerate, affectionate lover.

He loved to preach. He felt at home in the pulpit. His sermons were interesting and impressive. Conversions followed his proclamation of the truth.

He was a man of the people. He knew nothing of class distinctions. All alike appealed to him. He was a good pastor, giving attention to the poor and suffering. Wherever he served he was extremely popular, and made a host of friends. The children loved him. To some of us he was as a brother and our hearts yearned for his companionship.

Such a life, though short, has not been in vain. It still lives. For he has joined—

"the choir invisible
Of those immortal dead who live again,
In minds made better by their presence: live
In pulses stirred to generosity,
In deeds of daring rectitude, in scorn
For miserable aims that end with self,
In thoughts sublime that pierce the night like stars,
And with their mild persistence urge man's search
To vaster issues.

So to live is Heaven; To make undying music in the world."

## COMMUNICATION FROM EXECUTORS AND ATTORNEY OF ESTATE OF WM. P. BUSH.

ROANOKE, VA., March 27, 1911.

Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Clifton Forge, Va.

GENTLEMEN-

As the Executors of the estate of Wm. P. Bush, we beg to inform your Body that by the terms of his will, written September 13, 1910, the day before his death, certain bequests are made to your Corporate Board of Finance. The clauses of the will of interest to you are as follows:

"Clause 3. I direct that my Executors, out of the funds coming into their hands as such purchase in Salem, Va., or elsewhere, a suitable home costing not exceeding \$3,000.00 for my sister, Annie LeFew, to be used and enjoyed by her during her natural life, and at her death the same to revert to and vest absolutely and in fee simple in the Corporate Board of Finance of the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South; and I hereby request that said Board use same, or the proceeds derived therefrom, either as a home for superannuated preachers of said Conference or otherwise as in the discretion of said Board will best promote their welfare. The title to said property in said Board, however, subject to said life estate of my said sister, shall be absolute and without condition, and said Board is hereby fully authorized and empowered to dispose of said property and convey same and to use the proceeds thereof as to it shall seem most advisable.

"Clause 5. I will and bequeath to the Corporate Board of Finance, a corporation of the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, the sum of (\$8,000.00) Eight Thousand Dollars, to be used by said Board in its discretion (full discretion being hereby given said Board), for the benefit of any orphanage or orphan society under the general control of said Conference, that may now or hereafter be established; but should this bequest be deemed void for uncertainty, then said Board I request shall use said fund in such manner as in its discretion will most nearly carry out my wishes; said fund to be paid over in two years from my death."

The Executors will have ample funds from the proceeds of the estate to pay the above bequests in full under the terms as provided in the will.


