

Rev. E. F. Kale, of the Holston Conference, addressed the Conference in the interest of the Children's Home Society.

QUESTION FOUR of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are admitted into full connection?

Theodore M. Swann, Richard L. Wittig, George G. Oliver, E. Frank Fielding, Vincent W. Wheeler, Lee V. Ruckman, Edward A. Roades, having been reported as having passed in examination before the Committee on Course of Study, and having been recommended by the Committee on Admissions, they were called forward. Bishop Kilgo, after an impressive address, propounded the Disciplinary questions; these questions were severally answered in the affirmative, and they were admitted into full connection.

The Report of the Bible Board was presented, read, and upon motion It was adopted.

Report No. 1 of the Board of Missions was presented and read.

Rev. C. F. Reid addressed the Conference in the interest of the General Missionary Conference to be held at the Southern Assembly, Waynesville, N. C., June 25-29, 1913.

Upon motion, the Report was adopted.

Conference adjourned with the Doxology and with the Benediction by Bishop Wilson to meet Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

FIFTH DAY.

Conference met pursuant to adjournment.

Bishop Kilgo in the Chair.

Religious exercises were conducted by Bishop Kilgo.

W. H. Woolf led in prayer.

The Journal of Saturday was read and approved.

Bishop Denny very feelingly addressed the Conference.

Upon motion, the Secretary was directed to enter the names of Bishops Wilson and Denny upon the Roll of the Conference.

Upon the call of Question Twenty-two of the General Minutes, the characters of Bishops A. W. Wilson and Collins Denny were examined and passed.

QUESTION SIX of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are received by transfer from other Conferences?

Answer: None.

QUESTION FORTY-SEVEN of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who is elected Conference Leader?

Answer: E. D. Newman.

Rev. S. C. Hatcher, D. D., addressed the Conference in relation to the Randolph-Macon College and Endowment.

Rev. E. H. Rowe addressed the Conference in relation to the work of the Southern Seminary System.

Upon motion, the Report was adopted.

Bishop Kilgo resumed the Chair.

QUESTION FORTY-SIX of the General Minutes was called, viz: What are the educational statistics?

The above question was answered by the Report of the Board of Education (see General Minutes).

The Report of J. E. Alexander, Treasurer of the Board of Missions, was presented and read.

The Report of the Committee on Temperance was presented and read by D. L. Blakemore, and was upon motion adopted.

QUESTION SEVEN of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are received from other Churches as local preachers?

Answer: William B. Owens from the M. E. Church.

Upon motion, the Joint Board of Finance was directed to pay any expense that may be incurred by the attendance of Conference Counsel upon the sitting of the Committee of Appeals.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Missions was presented, read, and upon motion it was adopted.

Upon motion it was decided that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet tonight at eight o'clock.

Bishop Wilson, on taking leave of the Conference, very feelingly and impressively addressed the Conference; referring to his long term of service and to his abiding interest in and affection for his old Conference, and exhorted as a Father for earnest living and pure preaching; and expressed the wish that the preachers of this generation might be as the men of the olden time, lovers and winners of souls. He left with the benediction of his prayers upon us.

Suitable remarks of appreciation of the work and lives of the deceased brethren were made by J. Kyle Gilbert, J. A. Anderson, B. W. Bond and J. H. Haley.

The time of the Session was extended.

After being amended so as to allow the Committee on Memoirs to complete the Memoir of Adam Q. Flaherty and have same printed in the Minutes, the Report was adopted.

Conference adjourned with singing the Doxology and with the Benediction by Bishop Kilgo, to meet tonight at eight o'clock.

Before the arrival of the Bishop a collection was taken for the sexton, amounting to \$27.09.

QUESTION TWENTY of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are Superannuated?

QUESTIONS Twenty-three, Twenty-four, Twenty-five, Twenty-six. Twenty-seven, Twenty-eight, Twenty-nine, Thirty, Thirty-one. Thirty-two, Thirty-three, Thirty-four, Thirty-five. Thirty-six, Thirty-seven. Thirty-eight, Thirty-nine, Forty, Forty-one, Forty-two, Forty-three, Forty-four, Forty-five, of the General Minutes were severally called and answered (see General Minutes).

QUESTION FORTY-EIGHT of the General Minutes was called, viz: Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?

The matter was referred to the Committee on Conference Entertainment.

Upon motion, the following Resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That a Committee of three, consisting of A. C. Nadenbousch, L. W. Davis and F. B. Thomas, be appointed to select the place of meeting for the next session of the Conference and to make further arrangements for said session."

The Report of the Board of Church Extension, together with the Report of the Treasurer of that Board, were presented and read, and upon motion they were adopted.

The following Resolution of appreciation, signed by G. T. D. Collins. L. W. Davis, C. W. Ray and J. T. Williams, was presented and read, and upon motion it was adopted by a rising vote:

"Whereas, The History of the Old Baltimore Conference, by our late brother Armstrong, only brings our history down to 1857; and

Whereas, There are so many important facts in which our common Methodism is concerned, that are historic, since 1857:

Resolved, That we request our brother, Rev. J. A. Kern, D. D., to consider the feasibility of giving us a History of our Conference down to date."

Upon motion, C. S. Stanton was elected Conference Transportation Agent.

Upon motion, E. V. Regester, C. D. Harris and C. M. Armstrong were elected a Committee on Publication of the Minutes.

The following extract from the Journal of the last session of the Moorefield District Conference, relative to the number, and the mode of appointment of lay members to the District Conference, was presented and read:

"The Resolution concerning Par. 69, of the Discipline, adopted by the last Annual Conference, calling for discussion and advice concerning the number, and mode of appointment, of lay members to the District Conference, was answered by the adoption of the following Resolution:

"'Resolved, That it is the sense of this body that we are satisfied with our present number and method of electing delegates to the District Conference.'

The Report of the Sunday School Board, together with the Report of the Treasurer of that Board, were presented and read; upon motion they were adopted.

The Report of the Treasurer of the Corporate Board of Finance was presented, read and upon motion was adopted.

Report No. 2 of Committee on Publishing Interests was presented, read, and upon motion it was adopted.

The Report of the Committee to which was referred the Communication from the Roanoke District Conference, relative to providing homes for Superannuates, was presented, read, and upon motion it was adopted, as follows:

"Your Committee, to whom was referred the paper, signed by W. H. D. Harper and others, coming to us from the District Conference and requesting the Conference to order the Joint Board of Finance to lay an annual assessment upon the Church of \$2,000 for the purpose of purchasing homes for Superannuated preachers, recommend to you non-concurrence.

For the reasons:

1. The Baltimore Conference is now giving our people quite an heavy assessment for our Superannuates, enabling the Conference to make a more liberal allowance than any other Conference in our Connection, and if added to, we believe, will work more injury than good to this sacred claim and to these noble claimants.

2. We believe the matter can be more effectively done by the stirring of an interest directly among our well-disposed laymen and members who are willing and able to assist the Church in this laudable and praise-

worthy work.

Therefore we recommend that the Presiding Elders at their District Conferences be requested to appoint a Committee of three or more persons who shall be asked to take up the matter of provoking interest in and procuring donations and contributions, and urge bequests for the purchase of homes for Superannuates; and if such home or homes be procured or purchased, the deeds therefor, conditions and stipulations pertaining thereto, be in the hands and under the supervision of the Conference Corporate Board of Finance.

We, therefore, recommend that a Committee of three preachers be appointed at this session of the Conference to look into the subject of the Superannuates and present to the next session a Memorial embracing their conclusions.

BOARD OF MISSIONS REPORT No. 1.

Appreciating the benefit that will accrue to the Baltimore Conference from having a large and representative delegation in attendance at the General Missionary Conference to be held at The Southern Assembly, Waynesville, N. C., June 25-29, 1913, the Board of Missions recommends:

First—That the Presiding Elders be requested to take up the matter of attendance on their first round of Quarterly Conferences, and have a layman in each charge elected to secure registration for membership in the Conference and entertainment while attending, and to act as chairman of the delegation from his charge.

Second—That all our pastors be requested to make public mention of the Conference, from time to time, and to suggest the desirability of attending.

Third—That our Conference, District and Charge Leaders be urged to heartly co-operate with their pastors, and those appointed as chairman of delegations, to secure registration as early as possible.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS No. 2.

The reports of the General Secretaries indicate an increasing interest in the missionary activities of our Church on the part of our people. The widening vision of the need of humanity, and the deepening of our sense of responsibility to give unto men the gospel of Jesus Christ, have resulted in an increase of contributions for this cause. This year the aggregate will pass the million-dollar mark and be the largest in our history. The Baltimore Conference has had a part in this general result, yet in still larger measure must we contribute of ourselves and our substance if we are to have an adequate share in the rich triumphs of the Kingdom of God.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

It is worthy of note that for several years our Conference has made a steady advance in its contributions to Foreign Missions. For a long time the Board has urged the importance of paying the assessments, which are the minimum, first, and then making the best possible effort in behalf of specials, for the General Board must depend upon the collections from the assessments to support its regular work. This policy may not have been altogether without fruit, as the Baltimore Conference, though a Border Conference, leads the North Georgia, the Holston, the Alabama, the Missouri, the St. Louis and many of the other stronger Conferences in the average per capita payment on the missionary assessments; and, apart from the specials of the Virginia Conference, which are largely the result of a Missionary Secretary spending his entire time in the field, our Conference stands ahead of its great sister. But we have not yet reached the goal. The Church has enlarged the sphere of its missionary operations by making all necessary provision for the establishment of a mission on

the Congo river, in Africa, in a large section of the country where the Gospel has never been preached. Our established stations are pressing for enlargement. Everywhere there is imperative need, and there must be a large increase of funds if we are to accomplish the work to which as a Church we are committed.

HOME MISSIONS.

For the second time in our history the assessment for Home Missions is larger than that for the foreign field. While not paid in full, the response of our people to the call has evidenced their appreciation of the work that is being done. Too large a proportion of the funds contributed for this purpose is consumed in the maintenance of well established charges that ought to be self-supporting. It is the policy of the Board, as far as possible, to reduce the amount of such appropriations, that they may be able to enter new fields and occupy distinctively missionary territory.

EDUCATIONAL WORK.

The Missionary Voice, published by the General Board, and the work being done by the educational department are of the highest order. We recommend that greater effort be made to increase the circulation of this paper, and that our people draw largely upon the helps which the Church supplies. Increase of knowledge will mean increase of effort.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL AND MISSIONS.

The contributions of our schools for Missions have been remarkable. There has been a gradual increase until at present the bulk of our assessment is drawn from this source. We are justly proud of this record, and their activity is to be commended. But we fear the Sunday School is being over-burdened to the neglect of the membership of the Church. It is hoped that gradually, through a systematic effort after a weekly contribution for this cause, the Church may be brought to bear its own burden and leave the school to raise a surplus for some special object.

THE EPWORTH LEAGUE AND MISSIONS.

We call attention once more to the policy of our Epworth League Board to raise a special fund for the Cuban work, and urge all our Leagues to join heartily in the work.

THE LAYMEN'S MOVEMENT.

The Conference Lay Leader, Judge E. D. Newman and his corps of faithful assistants, have wrought well during the past year. Their splendid leadership has been manifested in many ways, and they merit the appreciation and encouragement of all our people.

WOMAN'S WORK.

The reports of the work done by the women in each department show gratifying progress. We commend this branch of our ecclesiastical organization to the particular attention of the pastors, that both societies may be more largely developed in their efforts to establish the Kingdom of God.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY.

Your Board is convinced that there can never be any great forward movement in behalf of Missions without the leadership of a secretary giving his entire time to the work. The General Board urges this policy upon every Conference, and it is the hope and the earnest request of your Board that as speedily as possible the Baltimore Conference may fall in line with this movement and appoint a secretary who may serve without the burden of a pastoral charge. In this connection we wish to express our profound appreciation of the work accomplished by Rev. D. L. Blakemore. Faithfully has he tried to fulfill the onerous duties of Missionary Secretary, while attending to the demands of a large pastorate, and in order to comply with the law we ask that he be re-appointed for the ensuing year.

COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

We recommend that the Committee on Evangelism be composed of the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions.

MISSIONARY ANNIVERSARY.

We recommend that Friday night of the next Conference session be the time for holding the Missionary Anniversary.

Our work, observed year by year seems to make slow progress. But figures for this year show an increase, in every detail of over one hundred per cent, when compared with the report of ten years ago. There is no reason for discouragement in any department; but we have not yet reached the women of our Conference. Our full membership amounts to about three thousand; and there must be thirty thousand women in this Baltimore Conference. If we could stir these outsiders to share the labor, our Society would fall behind none in its possibilities. We urge the preachers to discuss with their members "woman's work for heathen women;" and assure them that a vigorous Woman's Foreign Missionary Society is an active agent in all other Church interests. The information and appeal of Home Mission week last autumn cannot have been without effect. We would, however, ask the aid and the prayers of the brethren of the ministry of the Baltimore Conference in giving the women of our Church a more vivid realization of the spiritual needs of our own land, and inspiring a more patriotic, more Christ-like endeavor to carry the Gospel to every part of the great country which God has made our earthly home.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

RANDOLPH-MACON SYSTEM.

All of the institutions of the Randolph-Macon System have submitted reports to the Board of Education, and these reports show an encouraging increase in property value, endowment and the number of students.

Randolph-Macon College at Ashland has had an usually prosperous session. There are 170 students in the institution, an increase of 16 over last year. Health conditions have been perfect, and both professors and students have done excellent work. We recommend that the following resolution be adopted: That we pledge our sympathetic co-operation in the endeavor to increase the endowment of Randolph-Macon College and that our preachers be urged to open their pulpits for the presentation of this cause.

Randolph-Macon Women's College, at Lynchburg, has increased its endowment from \$220,000 to \$382,000. It still maintains its standard as one of the first-class colleges for the higher education of women.

Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal, Va., reports 9 professors, 163 pupils, and a property valuation of \$100,000.

Randolph-Macon Academy at Bedford City, Va., reports an increase in the number of professors and students, and this school has now reduced its indebtedness to \$10,000.

Randolph-Macon Institute at Danville, Va., shows an increase in the number of students and in the value of school property.

Altogether this System represents a property value of \$941,000, and an endowment of \$667,500, making a total of \$1,608,500. There are 103 professors and instructors, and 1,340 students, an increase of 22 over last year.

The cause of Christian education, and especially the Randolph-Macon System, has sustained a severe loss in the death of Dr. W. W. Smith, who was formerly President of Randolph-Macon College and later Chancellor of the Randolph-Macon System. Few men of this age have been so successful in efforts to advance the cause of Christian education. The Randolph-Macon System is his creation, and under his masterful direction and unflagging energy there has been developed and established this peculiar and effective potentiality of the Church. Someone has said of Washington "that his country is his monument"; so the Randolph-Macon System is W. W. Smith's monument.

These institutions are all worthy of our hearty support. They cannot be excelled by any other schools in their respective classes, either secular or denominational. The diplomas of the colleges are recognized by the Johns Hopkins University, and similar schools, as being worth what they purport to be. The standard is never lowered for the purpose of increasing the number of students, or for any other cause.

We urge our people to send their children to our own schools, where they can be as efficiently served and be under the influence of their own Church.

SOUTHERN SEMINARY SYSTEM.

We recommend to the patronage of our people the institutions which constitute the Southern Seminary System. We are informed that the educational work done by them is thorough and their systems of administration modern and intelligent. The moral and spiritual influences are such as Christian parents wish thrown around their children.

The Southern Seminary, at Buena Vista, Virginia, a school for girls and young women, is housed in a most comfortable building, well furonished and equipped. Its report shows property value at \$75,000, 17 teachers and 118 pupils. Rev. E. H. Rowe is the resident principal.

The Alleghany Collegiate Institute, a thorough training school, located at Alderson, West Virginia, has property value at \$13,000, with 8 professors and 80 pupils. Rev. J. S. Engle, of our Conference, has been resident principal since the first of the present school year. The system of military drill is in use here, and is regarded by the management as of great value in the development of physical vigor and habits of precision and promptness among the students. We understand that this is the only military school affiliated with our Church, with perhaps one exception. In view of the tendency of boys toward military schools, we think it well that the management of this system has provided us with one such among our Methodist Schools.

We recommend that Rev. J. H. Wells, D. M. Brown and W. F. Locke, or their successors, be appointed a visiting Committee for the Southern Seminary and that Rev. W. M. Compton, G. D. Kidner and J. H. Bean, or their successors, be appointed a visiting Committee for the Alleghany Collegiate Institute, the expenses of said Committees to be paid by the respective institutions.

We call the attention of these visiting Committees to our standing request for written reports. The lack of such reports from our visiting Committees sometimes embarrasses us in reporting on these institutions.

PAINE COLLEGE.

Our people will please take notice that Paine College, Augusta. Ga., is the only institution which our Church owns, holds, and administers for the benefit of the colored race in our midst. Our obligation to this race—this multitude of people living in our midst—for whom Christ died, cannot be discharged by the small service we have rendered for the past half-century. There must be a much larger contribution of money, warm sympathy and personal service before our souls are clear of responsibility in this matter. We are told that our forefathers in Southern Methodism contributed sometimes from a hundred and fifty thousand to two hundred thousand dollars a year, and the service of

some of our best preachers to the conversion and training of this race. Our duty will not be done until we exceed what our fathers did. The confidence of the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church in us is even pathetic. It should hurt our conscience until we justify it more fully.

Paine College is controlled by a board of trustees of our Church. Two members of our Conference, Dr. Isaac W. Cauter and Dr. F. J. Prettyman, are members of this Board. Dr. J. D. Hammond is President of the College. The scope of its course is industrial, academic and theological, and its great aim is to develop and conserve the spiritual and moral life of the negro, along with his physical and mental advancement. The attendance last year was 330, 17 teachers working in the Preparatory and Normal Departments and in the College proper. Consecrated young women of our Church are here giving their service to the training of negro girls. Devoted men of our Church are rendering like service to the negro boys. Shall not the Church give the sympathy and support that we owe for Christ sake to these people?

REPORT OF SECRETARY-TREASURER.

The books and vouchers of Dr. H. P. Hamill, Secretary-Treasurer, have been examined and found correct in all respects. The total receipts of Department of Ministerial Supply and Training were \$687.30; disbursements, \$369.80, leaving a balance in bank to the credit of the fund of \$317.50.

Three ministerial students attending R.-M. College and the Academy were granted aid under our conditions to the extent of \$320.00, and one aided in taking the correspondence course to the amount of \$10.00. Vouchers submitted show the amount as having been received from the Joint Board of Finance and paid over to Randolph-Macon College of \$2,742.00 and the sum of \$2,555.00 to the General Board of Education.

APPOINTMENTS RECOMMENDED.

We recommend the re-election of Dr. H. P. Hamill our present efficient Secretary-Treasurer, and the appointment of Rev. John A. Kern, D. D., as Professor in Vanderbilt University.

We recommend the acceptance of the paper presented by Dr. Forest J. Prettyman in reference to the Court proceedings in the Randolph-Macon controversy, and that the Conference appropriate such sum as may be necessary, not exceeding \$150, to meet the expenses and liabilities incurred by the Conference Representatives, and that the Joint Board of Finance be directed to pay the same out of the Conference Expense Fund.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL BOARD OF EDUCATION.

We have considered the communication from Dr. Stonewall Anderson, Corresponding Secretary, which was referred to us and make the following recommendations:

- 1. That, pursuant to the suggestion of the General Board of Education, the Conference direct the Joint Board of Finance to combine under the general head of Education, the General Conference and the Annual Conference educational assessment; that this combined assessment then be apportioned to the several presiding elders' districts, and thence to the several pastoral charges as the assessment for education, and that the amount collected on this assessment be divided pro rata between the two funds.
- 2. That a Committee consisting of H. H. Sherman, C. S. Stanton and S. K. Cockrell be appointed to confer with the management of the Great Falls Institute with reference to the establishment of a Preachers' Institute at a central and convenient point and to report to the Conference Board of Education at its next session such recommendations as they may deem best.
- 3. As to the other suggestions of the Secretary's letter, we report that they are either already covered by existing practices in our Board, or are not practicable or adapted to our conditions.

MINISTERIAL SUPPLY AND TRAINING.

We recommend that the Committee on Ministerial Supply and Training, consisting of Judge E. D. Newman, Rev. H. P. Hamill and Rev. H. H. Sherman, continue to solicit funds for this work, and that they continue their investigations as to the propriety of incorporating the Board of Education and make report to this Conference at its next session.

We recommend an assessment of \$3.173.00 for Educational Extension and \$5,000.00 for Randolph-Macon College and Ministerial Supply and Training. The proceeds of the \$5,000.00 shall be divided by the Joint Board of Finance, as follows: nine-tenths to Randolph-Macon College and one-tenth as provided for by the paragraph on Ministerial Supply and Training, contained in our report of 1911.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

We find in the report of our Sunday School Editor encouraging evidence that Sunday School work throughout our Church is in a healthy condition. The Statistics which he gives show that our enrollment in Sunday School is increasing at a rate substantially greater than the rate of increase in the population of the country, thus demonstrating that we are very much more than holding our own in a numerical sense. These statistics, coming down to April 1, 1912, are now a year old, and with the evident signs of progress before us, we have no doubt that the total enrollment, then reported at 1,464.869, has now passed the million-and-a-half mark.

OUR LITERATURE.

In no department of our work has there been more marked and definite advancement than in the character of our Sunday School literature, now surpassed by that of no other publishing house, either denominational or undenominational. The varied, but always able, clear and thorough, treatment of the Sunday School lessons in our Magazine, the Adult Student, and the several quarterlies and lesson helps, puts within the easy reach of the teacher of any grade of attainment, teaching material adapted to his needs.

We congratulate Dr. Chappell and his associates upon the high quality of their work. There is no excuse for any Superintendent of our faith who allows our denominational lesson helps to be superseded by any others. Furthermore, while we reiterate all that we said in our last annual report, concerning interdenominational co-operation, and rejoice in the splendid results which have come to Sunday School work throughout the country from such co-operation and the fine fraternal spirit back of it. Co-operation, not combination into so-called Union Schools, is what we advocate. The gradual disappearance of such schools is the best evidence of the soundness of our position. If we can not hold a particular neighborhood with a school of our church, some other church is entitled to try and to have our best wishes in the effort.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Arrangements are in progress for holding the Annual Sunday School Convention of the Conference at Martinsburg, West Virginia. The date is not yet fixed, but will be announced within a few days. We are pleased to report that the convention of last year, held at Winchester, Virginia, was a pronounced success.

We urge pastors, presiding elders and Sunday School Superintendents to secure a representation in the Convention from all the Schools. Our convention has, for more than forty years, been doing effective work. The relatively high standard of Sunday School work in the Baltimore Conference is largely due to the convention. The schools which are doing the best work are those which have actively supported the convention and sent representatives to its sessions. Realizing that it is not possible for so large a territory as that of our Annual Conference to be adequately represented in a single convention, we have increased the appropriation for institute work in the Presiding Elders' Districts, and if encouragement locally is apparent, the Convention Executive Committee, composed of the President of the Convention, Brother W. W. Millan, the Secretary, Brother W. L. Brannan, and Rev. H. M. Canter, will be prepared to promote and actively support an institute or convention in each District.

MEETING OF BOARD CHAIRMEN.

During the year there has been held at Washington City, within our territory, a meeting of the Chairmen of Sunday School Boards and the Field Secretaries of the various Conferences of our Church, which, in its broad outlook and enlarged conception of the Sunday School and its work, indicates that a great forward movement in this department of our Church's activities is already at hand. This meeting has become a regular annual affair, and we have made provision for our Chairman to attend the next one which will be held at Hot Springs, Arkansas, in January or February, 1914.

ORGANIZED BIBLE CLASS WORK.

We again place our hearty approval upon the organized Adult Class. The movement which, in seven years, has added a million and a half of men to the Bible Schools of North America, is, in its assured results and confident promises of definite and positive help to all the work of the Church, easily second to none that this generation has witnessed. We are gratified to note that in our own Church, the organization has been extended to include Senior and Intermediate Bible Classes, and that these departments have taken up the work of organizing with great interest. We strongly urge our preachers and Sunday School leaders to push the work of organizing the classes in their schools and to see to it, that when classes are organized they enroll with the Wesley Bible Class Department. We note with pleasure the presence at this session of the Conference of Dr. Chas. D. Bulla, Superintendent of this Department, whose assistance to the Board in its deliberations is much appreciated.

TEACHER TRAINING.

We feel that the need for teachers trained for their work is still one of the acute problems of the Sunday School, and we urge renewed activity in the work of Teacher Training. With the abilities of so eminent a specialist as Dr. H. M. Hamill, head of our training work, at our command in this department, and the facilities which have been provided, we ought to be constantly advancing towards the goal of a trained teacher for every class. Let there be in every school a succession of teacher training classes to supply the constant demand for new teachers to take the places of those who drop out and to meet the needs of the expanding work.

SOUTHERN ASSEMBLY.

We invite special attention to the Conference of Sunday School workers upon the grounds of the Southern Assembly at Waynesville, North Carolina, August 6-16, 1913. The plans, not yet fully matured, contemplate an institute and school of methods. Our Conference should be represented. As the Assembly is undoubtedly destined to become a notable centre of influence in the life of the Church, our workers should identify themselves with its great meetings.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

Applications have been received asking for aid for thirteen churches and one parsonage, to the amount of \$6,075. After deducting the 50% of the receipts due the General Board, we had only \$3,300 with which to meet these demands. Many of the cases represent burdens of debt that are almost crushing to the local congregations, and other enterprises of promise, if only timely aid can be secured to launch them. Much larger amounts than those asked could have been profitably used, yet on account of a decrease of \$1,900 in the receipts of last year, we could only appropriate 55% of the total amount asked for.

We believe Church extension to be indispensable to the great Missionary movement of our day. It is really a part of the movement that has for its end the conquest of the world for Christ, and therefore should receive equal emphasis, both in word and deed, in sentiment and cash. We can not too strongly urge that an equal chance be given this claim with the other benevolent claims, and that collections in full, and even running over, be the watchword.

Some thing of the debt the general Church owes to this arm of her service is indicated in the following statement of Dr. McMurry:

"During the thirty years of Church Extension history, aid has been granted to 8,394 churches and 2,177 parsonages. By comparing the number of churches aided with the total number of houses of worship (16,829), it is readily seen that fifty per cent. of our Church buildings have Church Extension money invested in them. Church Extension, therefore, has to its credit five and one-third churches for every week of the thirty years of its existence, to say nothing of the 2,177 parsonages aided.

"The total amount invested by the Board in Churches is \$3,279,381.05, or an average of \$390.68 to each church aided."

In our own Conference there are 615 church buildings, of which 242 have received aid from the Boards, the General Board granting \$79,478 in donations and \$61,300 in loans, and the Conference Board donating \$49,255.

There are now 71 congregations within our bounds without houses of worship.

CONFERENCE LOAN FUND.

So far we have not been able to set apart any of our receipts as a loan fund. We still hope, however, that the time is not far distant when we can take advantage of this privilege accorded by the action of the last General Conference. In the meantime we hope there may be those who, by bequest or gift, will make a beginning in this matter.

GENERAL LOAN FUNDS.

We are glad to note the constant increase in these funds until now they amount to more than a half-million dollars. The Annuity and Memorial features make them attractive to those who wish a safe investment during the period of old age, or to those who wish to erect a fruitful memorial to loved ones. We heartily commend these funds to all benevolently inclined people.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LOAN FUND.

We again call attention to the offer of the General Office at Louisville to furnish suitable Jars in which to receive birthday offerings to be used in the erection of Sunday School additions to our churches. The result will be better Sunday School equipment among those who are not able to provide it all for themselves, and in addition will incidentally mean education among the children on the wider subject of Church Extension.

THE WASHINGTON CHURCH.

We reaffirm our conviction of the wisdom of the whole Church in building a great church in the Capital City. We are pleased to hear of progress in the enterprise, but we are convinced that a project of such magnitude can better afford to mature its plans slowly, than by the exercise of undue haste to stop short of the best.

LITERATURE.

The General Office has a varied and helpful literature for free distribution. A great fund of timely and accurate information may be found in the Hand Books, and numerous folders and leaflets deal with different phases of the work. For such supplies write to Dr. W. F. REPRESENTATION.

We are sorry that it is still necessary to insist on a fair chance to represent Church Extension in the District Conferences and other gatherings of our people. We would not claim for it any advantage over the other interests, but we insist that it has its rights along with the other vital claims as being of equal importance. We therefore urge that it be given a place on the program of District Conferences and Missionary Institutes.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

With gratitude to Almighty God, your Board is gratified to report a continued increased interest throughout our Conference in the great work of giving the Bible in their native tongues to the nations of the world. A larger number of charges report an offering to this cause than in any previous year of our history.

Your Board regrets to report that it has learned that the receipts of the American Bible Society are not sufficient for the great work which it has in hand, and retrenchments, which would be a calamity, will have to be made unless there is an increase in the contributions.

The great work which the society is doing in translating, printing and distributing the Word of God to the nations that are beyond, and to the needy of our own land, is the basis of all Missionary work and essential to the wider extension of the Master's Kingdom.

Your Board would respectfully offer the following suggestions:

1st: That an appropriate sermon be preached and the claims of the Bible Society be presented early in the Conference year and the disciplinary collection be taken.

2nd: That the envelopes furnished by the American Bible Society be used in the collection and as far as possible an individual canvass be made in all our congregations.

3rd. That the Presiding Elders be requested to emphasize the importance of the work of the American Bible Society and the duty of liberal contributions of the same both in the Quarterly and District Conferences.

4th: That Bible meetings be held in each charge and agents and others qualified to present this important matter be invited to make addresses.

5th: We earnestly request that all money raised for the American Bible Society be paid promptly to the Treasurer of the Bible Board, N. R. Roberts, Summit Point, West Virginia.

6th: Should there be sufficient reason for any charge to contribute to a local Auxiliary or agent, the pastor should take a receipt for the same.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

The Epworth League Board of the Baltimore Conference would submit the following report:

We are regretful that there has been a slight decrease in Epworth Leagues in our Conference, having at present 236 Chapters and 9,971 members, but we are not satisfied with present conditions, for we believe that the League can be made a greater factor in our Church life and of inestimable value. We urge, therefore, that League Chapters be established in every Church, and that the Presiding Elders be requested to co-operate with the Epworth League Board in their plans to hold a League Conference in every district, and to see that the League work is properly recognized at every District Conference.

Our General Secretary reports that many of our Chapters have neglected the payment of the annual 10 cent per member assessment. We beg our pastors to see that the League officers give attention to this matter, and that agents be appointed to canvass for the larger circulation of the Epworth Era, our League organ.

The noble work of our Washington District League Union, also that of the Baltimore District League cannot be overlooked. Our Washington District Leagues have assumed the responsibility of paying \$500 toward our Warrenton Church, and have actually raised \$300 of that amount. Our Baltimore District Leagues have raised \$750 for our Mission work in Cuba, and intend to support one Missionary.

We appreciate Brother Harris giving us a page in our Conference organ, and Brother W. D. Keene has been selected as its editor. Brother Keene is also selected to serve in the capacity of Corresponding Secretary.

We request that hereafter at our Annual Conference one evening be set apart for an Epworth League anniversary, the program to be arranged by our Conference Board.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

REPORT No. 1.

Your Committee on Publishing Interests commends the policy of the Baltimore Southern Methodist.

We call attention to the general organ of our Church, The Nashville Advocate, which has proven a success in every respect, and recommend it to our people as a periodical worthy of a much larger circulation among us.

The Methodist Quarterly Review commends itself to us as one of the most valuable publications in the South, and we are pleased at its financial success.

We are gratified to note the improvement in the Epworth Era, and believe that in its present form it will prove to be more helpful to our Leagues, and earnestly urge that efforts be made to increase its circulation.

The attention of our people is called to that excellent Missionary periodical—The Missionary Voice, which ought to have a wider circulation among our people.

We are gratified to learn of the marvelous success of the Richmond branch of our Publishing House, and urge all our preachers and Sunday School Superintendents to order their books and literature through this house, thereby conserving our own resources in building up our own publishing interests.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Dear Brethern-

Your Committee most respectfully submits the following report:

In view of former utterances of this Conference upon this important subject and the well organized interdenominational agencies at work among us, we deem it unnecessary to bring in a lengthy report at this time. What we do need most of all is active co-operation with the agencies now at work to safeguard the Christian Sabbath.

This institution around which has grown up the Christian Church and out of which has come our civilization deserves a large place in our thought.

The true conception of what the Sabbath means to Church and State must be formed in the minds of the young.

Therefore, Resolved First. That we urge all parents and guardians of young people to instruct them by precept and example, as to their duties and privileges in regard to this sacred institution of the Church. We are glad to note that the President of the United States, in the higher circle of society, is setting a most commendable example in the observance of the Holy Sabbath.

Resolved Second. That we commend the civil magistrates of Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia, for bringing to justice offenders against the laws regarding the Sabbath, and for closing a number of resorts in the vicinity of Washington and Baltimore, which were a menace to the peace and quietness of the Sabbath:

And that we pledge our sympathy and co-operation to the officers charged with the duty of safeguarding the Sabbath.

Resolved Third. That we recommend that all our preachers, on the second Sunday of June or as near thereto as convenient, preach on the subject of "Sabbath Observance."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

WHEREAS, The church of God is the divinely commissioned agent for establishing the kingdom of God in the world, and must therefore combat and destroy, so far as she is capable, every form of evil which prevents or in any way obstructs or delays the coming of that Kingdom; and

WHEREAS, The Liquor Traffic is responsible for the major part of the evils which alienate the race from God, and prevent the church from fulfilling her divine commission;

Resolved, That we, the members of the Baltimore Conference, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, regard it as our sacred duty, as well as the sacred duty of the people whom we represent, to identify ourselves in every practical way with the temperance reform movement which is sweeping over our country, particularly as that movement is related to the war of extermination which is now being waged against the liquor traffic within the bounds of our Conference.

Resolved. That we congratulate the Anti-Saloon League, which is the duly accredited agency of the Church for co-operating in the fight against the saloon, upon its growing influence and the increasing recognition of its efficiency, even by its enemies. We hereby pledge the League anew our hearty support, and recommend that our pastors open their churches to the representatives of the League, giving them the opportunity to present the interests of the League to our people and to solicit funds for its support.

Resolved. That we appreciate the growing disposition of Congress to respond to the moral sentiment of the nation, as evidenced by the passage of The Webb Bill to protect the states, and the enactment of the Jones-Works Bill, for the District of Columbia. We express our especial thanks to those members of Congress, who led and were active in securing this legislation, and we instruct the Secretary of this Conference to send a copy of this resolution to our representatives in Congress.

Resolved, That we rejoice to know of the great victory won for the Prohibition Amendment in West Virginia last November, having been adopted by over 92,000 majority. Law enforcement is the watch word needed by all the friends of temperance to rid the State of the evils of the liquor traffic.

Resolved, That since West Virginia has already voted to outlaw the liquor traffic, and Virginia is far advanced in a campaign for statewide prohibition, we endorsed the decision of the Anti-Saloon League of Maryland to start at once, to secure an amendment to the Constitution of the State in case the Local Option Bill is defeated by the next legislature; and we ratify, by our official endorsement, the action of our Baltimore Preachers' Meeting in asking the Anti-Saloon League of Maryland, as the representative of our Maryland churches, to introduce a prohibition amendment at the next session of the Legislature of that state, this action not be construed as an

abandonment by the League of the Local Option Bill, but simply to obtain a record and to save two years time in the amendment contest, in case it becomes necessary to start it at once.

Resolved, That, in view of the acute nature of the temperance issue in the greater part of our territory, we advise our people that it is unsafe to support any legislative candidate, no matter how respectable, who will not declare frankly and publicly that he will stand for giving the people a chance to exercise their right to vote against the liquor traffic.

Resolved, That we urge faithful and systematic temperance education, through pulpit. Sunday School, Epworth League and our homes. We commend our Conference Organ, The Baltimore Southern Methodist, for its fearless editorial policy on the temperance question, and for the wide dissemination of temperance news and facts through its columns.

Resolved, That we recommend the use of unfermented wine by all our pastors in the administration of the Sacrament of The Lord's Supper.

MEMOIRS.

LEONIDAS BUTT.

To Paul, Tychicus was "a beloved and faithful minister in the Lord"; so to his brethren was Leonidas Butt. Tychicus could be trusted by the Apostle to make known to the church at Ephesus all things committed to his charge; so Leonidas Butt never betrayed the confidence of the Baltimore Conference, nor proved unfaithful to its commissions. Of fine presence, sensitive, gentle, cautious, inclined perhaps to shrink from public notice, but the soul of honor,

"His tribe were God Almighty's gentlemen."

He was born in Lewisburg, W. Va., the third and youngest son of Dr. Shannon and Mary Reese Butt. In his ninth year the family moved to Monroe county, and there under the influence of a pious household he soon became conscious of religious aspirations. However, a sense of youth and immaturity, rather than lack of religious purpose, delayed his confession until a camp-meeting in Monroe County not far from his home, when he was converted and united with the Church. Religious activity now became a relief rather than a cross to his hitherto pent-up spirit; the second day he led the congregation in public prayer, and then came his call to preach. Lack of preparation united with a native modesty precipitated a struggle; prayers and tears evidenced its intensity; but the end was a triumph for the Holy Spirit. In his own words: "Hoping to get rid of this call, I began the study of medicine under the tutorage of my father, but by day and by night I knew I was called to preach." This experience and his conversion were two that ever after rose clear and strong above all doubt.

At Centerville, Monroe Co., January 14th, 1860, he was licensed to preach, and at once began seriously his preparation for the work of the ministry. March, following, he was admitted on trial into this Conference, and at Salem, Va., March 13th, 1865, he was ordained both deacon and elder by Bishop Early; and in this relation he remained until God said: "It is enough; come up higher."

That year he was appointed junior preacher on Blue Sulphur Circuit; the next, junior on Frankford; and the third year of his ministry, junior on East-Rockingham. In 1863 he was sent to Highland as preacher in charge, and the next, junior to Peterstown. The soldier of the cross as well as the soldier of the country was at this time following the fortunes of war, which, doubtless, accounts in part for the frequency as well as character of his appointments.

In 1865 he was appointed preacher in charge of White Sulphur, and 1866 again of Highland. From '67 to '69 he was junior preacher on Springfield Circuit; '70 and '71, preacher in charge of Frederick; '72

Brother Jenkins was happily married March 21st, 1905, to Mrs. Elizabeth McMillan, who with a little daughter of six years old survive him. May our God be very near them in their sorrow.

Brother Jenkins could not, like many, give the exact time nor place of his conversion, but from early childhood knew that he was in a state of acceptance with God.

Early in life he knew that he was called into the ministry of our Lord and began to prepare himself for his life's work.

He was a hard student even in his boyhood, and at both the public school and home was found at his books.

After attending the school near his home, he went to the High School at Newton, Alabama; from there he went to Kinsey, Alabama, and entered Mallilieu Seminary, from which he graduated with honors, easily leading his class. His teachers speak in the highest terms of his Christian character, and habits as a student. Brother Jenkins was blessed with a superior mind, and was no stranger to his study; at the time of his death he was taking a correspondence course with the University of Chicago.

Brother Jenkins was licensed to preach at Mariana, Florida, in 1898. He was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference at Alexandria, Virginia, in March, 1904, Bishop A. W. Wilson presiding.

Brother Jenkins was ordained a local deacon by Bishop Wilson at that Conference.

In March, 1908, in the City of Roanoke, at Greene Memorial Church, he was ordained Elder by Bishop A. W. Wilson.

He served the following charges with great acceptability: Frostburg, Maryland, 1904; Goldsboro, Maryland, 1905-6-7 and 8; Brunswick, Maryland, 1909-1910; Augusta, Virginia, 1911, 1912. It was here that he "fell asleep"; ceased both to labor and to live. He was a forceful and practical preacher. He had the happy faculty of knowing what to say and how to say it.

His one effort was to secure results. His illustrations were usually from personal experience or observation, and he rarely failed to drive the truth home.

He was successful in seeing material advancement on his charges, but was especially successful in soul saving. He was a winner of souls.

When he was taken ill it was not thought that it would terminate in death. He would have preferred to wait, if it had been the Master's will, for he, like all true ministers, saw the fields ripe for the harvest and laborers few. But he was ready to go. The Gospel he had preached to others was a comfort to him. He knew whom he had believed.

Just before he died he called his loved wife and child to his side, and said: "Good-bye! be good!" and then, before the watchers around the bed realized what was taking place he passed away to be with Jesus.

One who knew him well, a member of another Church and Conference, wrote: "As to my estimate of him, I do not hesitate to say that his was a substantial, a noble, holy, exemplary and most beautiful life. He was a godly man. I knew him well enough to say, that as a Christian gentleman and minister he was of the highest type."

Life is not to be measured by length of days, or what men may think or say; life only reaches its highest place when it is surrendered to the will of God.

By the record of the life as given here, Frank Jenkins met that test, in giving his love and life to his Lord.

His spirt has returned to God; his body rests in the grave; his memory is in our hearts.

ADAM Q. FLAHERTY.

Adam Q. Flaherty was born March 2nd, 1827. He died in Craig Co., Va., March 19th, 1913. He was married to Miss Lucy Bishop in 1850.

The following data of this long and useful life was furnished by himself and is, therefore, authentic:

He received a good high school education and taught for some time in his early life. His call to the ministry came to him at the time of his conversion, which was when he was about fifteen years old; but being of a timid and shrinking disposition, he stifled the conviction to preach until urged to do so by the Church.

At the instance of the late Dr. Armstrong he was licensed to exhort in 1857, and under the late Dr. Martin, was licensed to preach in April, 1859, and that year was placed on Lexington Circuit, to which work he was returned the next year under Rev. Samuel Regester, P. E.

In 1861 he applied for admission into the Conference, but being a married man had some difficulty in getting in. His cause, however, was espoused by such men as Martin and Regester, and he was received. He was ordained Deacon at the session of the Holston Conference of the M. E. Church, South, held at Bristol, Va., in 1863, by Bishop Early. At the same time the Rev. L. R. Jones, of our Conference, was ordained both Deacon and Elder. These brethren were compelled to go to the Holston Conference for ordination because of the disorganized condition of our Church in our territory at that time. He was ordained Elder in 1865. He filled the following appointments: Sent to Huntersville in 1861, but transferred to Lexington on account of unfavorable war conditions there; 1862-3, Jacksonville Circuit; 1864-5, New Prospect; 1866-7. Covington; 1868-9, Montgomery; 1870, Buchanan; 1871, Linganore, Md.; 1872, Baltimore Circuit; 1873-4-5, Collierstown; 1876-7-8-9, Monterey; 1880-1, Crabbottom; 1882-3-4, Centerville; 1885-6, Roanoke; 1887-8, La Fayette; 1889-90-1-2, Newport; 1893-4, Amsterdam.

A COMMUNICATION ON THE RANDOLPH-MACON SUIT.

To the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Session at Staunton, Va., March 26th, 1913—

I greatly regret to report the fact that the agreement entered into between this Conference and the Trustees of Randolph-Macon College concerning the selection of Trustees of said College has been called in question in the Courts of the State of Virginia. In a bill of complaint brought in said Courts three members of this body are made co-defendants with the Board of Trustees, viz: F. J. Prettyman, T. T. Fishburne and J. H. Light. J. H. Light has been transferred to the Virginia Conference since the suit began. Since I was named in this suit as a member of this Conference, and probably because I was elected to represent the Conference in certain conferences held with the Trustees of Randolph-Macon College looking to a peaceful and satisfactory solution of a controversy without resorting to the civil Courts, I have felt it to be my duty, and I believed that it would be the will of the Conference that I should take such steps as might be found necessary to prote the interests of the Conference in said suit. I attended the first he ing of the case before Judge Chichester at Fredericksburg, Va., at whi time the case was taken up on a petition in Chancery to enlarge at make permanent an injunction granted by the Court to restrain the Trustees from carrying out their agreement with the Conference and the Conference from performing their part of the agreement. At this time the Court continued the injunction so far as it related to the acts of the Trustees, but removed its operation in reference to the Conference. It was ascertained at that time that it would be necessary in the further trial of the case upon its merits to secure the affidavits of many persons in various parts of the State, and that in securing this testimony it was necessary that all of the parties to the suit should either be present in person or be represented by an attorney. After due consultation I decided that it would be far less expensive and more satisfactory to secure the services of an attorney. Mr. A. W. Patterson, who is the attorney for the Board of Trustees, having in charge their case, and who, because of his relation to said case, is conducting the examination of witnesses for the Board, has been retained as my attorney. His fee will be a nominal one.

I may further state that at the first hearing of the case at Fredericksburg, Va., I consented, together with the representative of the Board of Trustees, to have the case heard on its merits without further testimony, but the petitioners would not so agree. The case is now in process of trial.

I have the honor to make the above report, and await the pleasure of the Conference as to the future conduct of the case.
