Its grade of scholarship is high; yet it does not exclude young men who are unprepared to enter the higher classes—arrangements have been made by the organization of Introductory Classes, which are taught by the Professors themselves, in which they are prepared for higher departments of the College.

It offers this year a course of study by which the student can accomplish, in three years, the subjects which will entitle him to the degree of Bachelor of Philosophy, (B. P.); and in four years, those which will entitle him to the degree of Bachelor of Arts. (A. B.,) viz: For the three years' course, graduation with distinction in Latin, Chemistry, German and distinction in Intermediate English. Junior Mathematics, Junior Applied Mathematics, Junior Moral Philosophy, Political Science, Junior Natural Philosophy and Physiology For the four years' course, graduation with distinction in Latin, Chemistry, and distinction in Intermediate Greek, (or graduation with distinction in German, and distinction in Junior French,) Intermediate English, Intermediate Mathematics Junior Applied Mathematics, Junior Moral Philosophy, Metaphysics, Political Science and Junior Natural Philosophy.


Its expenses are moderate, not exceeding \$115 per term, or \$230 for the entire Scholastic year. No charge is made for room rent, servant's hire, libraries, or for lectures on Biblical Literature. All ministerial students receive instruction in all the Schools without charge for tuition.

Its location is remarkable for its extraordinary healthfulness and accessibility, being 16 miles north of Richmond, immediately on the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Railroad, on the most elevated plateau between the Potomac and James rivers.

Its religious influences are invaluable; yet no interference is allowed with the denominational preferences of the students. Prayers are conducted every day in the College Chapel; public worship is held every Sabbath, both morning and evening. A Sunday School is in successful operation under the special superintendence of one of the Professors. A weekly prayer meeting is held by the students. There are also services regularly held in the village churches by ministers of other denominations.





FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY, March 8, 1882.

THE BALTIMORE ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its NINETY-EIGHTH SESSION in the George-street Church, Fredericksburg, Virginia, Wednesday morning, at 9½ o'clock, March 8, 1882.

BISHOP HOLLAND N. McTyeire, D. D., President, in the chair.

By request of the President, the Secretary of the last Conference called the Roll of Clerical members, and one hundred and thirteen responded to their names.

The Lay Representatives from the several Presiding Elders' Districts were reported, and on call of the Roll twenty-eight Lay Representatives answered to their names.

Secretary Elected.—On motion, John S. Martin was re-elected Secretary.

The Secretary was permitted to choose his Assistants, and they were chosen as heretofore, in order, as follows: James E. Armstrong, George T. Tyler, Asbury R. Martin, Beverly W. Bond.

Conference determined to meet daily at $9\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock, a. m., and to adjourn at $1\frac{1}{2}$ o'clock, P. m.

The Bar of the Conference was fixed.

Committees Appointed.—On motion, STANDING COMMITTEES were appointed, composed each of one Clerical and one Lay member from the several Presiding Elders' Districts—on Education, Sunday Schools, Publishing Interests, Temperance and Memorials to the next General Conference. Each Committee thus appointed, was permitted to choose its own chairman.

COMMITTEES were appointed on the Bible Cause; Public Worship; to receive and distribute letters; to give return tickets on railroads; to canvass Conference for subscriptions for the publication of the Conference Minutes. (See Committees, page 12.)

Changes in Committees.—Wm. G. Hammond was appointed in the place of J. S. Gardner, and J. S. Hutchinson in place of Wm. K. Boyle, for the examination of candidates for admission on trial.

The Committee of the Fourth Year was changed by the appointment of W. P. Harrison in place of S. K. Cox, who had not arrived.

Wm. K. Boyle was substituted in place of J. S. Gardner on the Committee on Memoirs.

The report from Rev. J. B. McFerrin, D. D., agent of the Publishing House at Nashville, was presented and read, and on motion, it was referred to the Committee on Publishing Interests.

Woman's Missionary Society—A report from the Woman's Missionary Society of the Baltimore Conference was presented, and, on motion, it was referred to the Conference Board of Missions.

Board of Missions.—A communication from Rev. Dr. Wilson, Secretary of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, was presented, and, on motion, it was referred to the Conference Board of Missions.

Wesleyan Female Institute.—A memorial from the trustees of the Wesleyan Female Institute, asking for a division of the Educational collection, and also, presenting an exhibit of the amounts remitted each year in favor of the education of preachers' children, was presented and read, and, on motion, it was referred to the Committee on Education.

The Report of the President of the Wesleyan Female Institute was presented and read, and, on motion, it was referred to the Committee on Education.

The Seventeenth Question of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are Supernumerary? (For answer, see General Minutes, page 8.)

The Eighteenth Question of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are Superannuated? (See answer in General Minutes, page 8.)

The Twentieth Question of the General Minutes was called, viz: Are all the preachers blameless in life and official administration? The names of the Presiding Elders of the several Districts were called, as follows:

Samuel Rodgers, of the Baltimore District; John Poisal, of the East Baltimore District; James S Gardner, of the Washington District; James E. Armstrong, of the Winchester District; John S. Conference determined to dispense with the further call of the roll.

The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.

The Second Question of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who remain on trial? Basil W. Waters, James E. Wilson, John Miller, John W. Mitchell, Henry A. Brown, Simpson V. Hildebrand, having passed in examination of character, and also before the Committee on the Course of Study, they were, on motion, continued on trial.

First Question .- Frank Thomas Griffith, of the class of the first year, passed in examination of character, but did not pass in examination on the course of study, (on account of ill-health,) and he was continued on trial under Question First.

Question Third. - Who are discontinued? Jeremiah W. Pastorfield was examined in character, and passed; but was discontinued at his own request.

The Fourth Question of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are admitted into full connection? Collins Denny and John C. To the Bishops and Members of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South:

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN:

I, B. R. Wilburn, this day withdraw from the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and respectfully request that my name be so entered upon the Journal of the Conference.

The following preamble and resolutions were presented and read, and, on motion, they were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, "every itinerant is under covenant with the Church for pastoral service, at least till the next session of the Conference, and has no right recognized in the Discipline, or by the Conference, during the current year. to negotiate with parties outside of the Church, or to assume obligations to them which involve the transfer of himself, or his services, beyond the pale of the Church;" therefore,

1st. Resolved, That B. R. Wilburn, in entering into an engagement to serve an independent congregation, and thereby by example, if not by precept, encouraging the alienation of the people he was appointed to serve, acted in bad faith toward the Church, and in violation of his ministerial vows, and is deserving of the gravest censure of this Conference, not for his withdrawal from our Church, but for the disingenuous and unmanly measures which he adopted to accomplish his purposes.

2d. Resolved, That his name be entered as withdrawn.

Specification 2d. A short time before the date above named, the said James L. Porterfield asserted that some of the principal or official members of Hillsboro Circuit were liars.

Specification 3d. About the time mentioned in Specification No. 2, the soid James L. Porterfield said that Rev. Rumsey Smithson, his former Presiding Elder, is a liar, or had lied.

CHARGE SECOND-CONTUMACY.

Specification 1st. That on the 25th day of October, 1881, at James' Chapel, Hillsboro Circuit, after the finding of the committee in the case of W. R. Stringer, had been declared, fully exonerating him from all blame, the said

James L. Porterfield asserted that he did not care what the Committee had done, that W. R. Stringer is a liar.

Specification 2d. That in a letter to his Presiding Elder, Rev. J.S. Gardner, dated December 5, 1881, the said J. L. Porterfield defies the authority of the church, and declares that he is not responsible to any ecclesiastical court in the universe.

Specification 3d. That after repeated and earnest admonition on the part of his Presiding Elder and senior brethren, the said James L. Porterfield persisted in the use of not only such uncharitable but violent and vindictive language in regard to his brethren.

Resolved, That if even the reasons given by our brother for his refusal were, in the judgment of the Conference, sufficient to justify his declination, still the Conference could but regard the tone and temper of his letter, and in particular, the terms employed therein to express his estimate of the animus

controlling in the making of his appointment, as reprehensible in the highest degree, and as especially unseemly in a person who cannot plead the impetuosity of youth in palliation of the indecorum of opprobrious epithets to the presiding officer of this Conference, as well as to his faithful advisers.

2. Resolved, That in allowing himself to apply terms so full of scornful reproach to an office bearer who embraces, in so high a degree, dignity and courtesy, firmness and gentleness, patience and impartiality, our brother has caused us the greatest surprise and deepest grief.

3. Resolved, That notwithstanding our surprise and grief, on witnessing the exhibition of a spirit so unbecoming, and the use of words so unloving, while our brother is asking the severance of the tie which has so long bound him and us together, we accord his request.

4. Resolved, lastly, That in justice to our presiding officer and his council, as well as to ourselves, as a body, we can but accompany our consent to our erring brother's withdrawal from our Conference with these words of sorrow-
