

Paper from Bishop McTyeire. The following Paper was read by the President of the Conference and ordered to be recorded:

I have received from certain persons a paper purporting to be an Appeal to the President of this Body, from three decisions of the Presiding Elder, of the East Baltimore District, made at the Third Quarterly Conference of Trinity Station, during the past year. With due respect to the persons signing this paper, it cannot be entertained as an Appeal. The law requires appeals in such cases to be taken by the Quarterly Conference, as an official body, and not by individuals, even though they be members of that body.

MEMOIRS.

Rev. JAMES HENRY MARCH.

James Henry March was born in Winchester, Va., January 22, 1820, and died in Middletown, Frederick Co, Va., July 30, 1885. His parents, Henry and Sarah March, were among the early Methodists of his native town. He was brought to Christ under the ministry of Rev. Job Guest, in 1837; from the time of his conversion, he seemed impressed with the fact that he was called to preach, and commenced to study with this object in view. January, 1841, he was licensed to exhort; and soon after, the great of the course of the same results and the study with the converted. The same year he traveled under the Presiding Elder, Rev. J. A. Collins, the South Branch Circuit, with Rev. Horace Holland. ensuing session of the Baltimore Conference he was received on trial, and appointed to Bath Circuit. A few weeks later he was transferred by his presiding elder to Woodstock Circuit, of which Rev. C. Parkinson was the preacher in charge. In 1843 he was sent to Berkeley; 1844, to Westminster; 1845, to Great Falls; 1846 he was stationed with Rev. S. A. Roszell, at Caroline street, Baltimore; 1847, at Alexandria, where he was the colleague of the sainted Joseph Merriken, who died there at the end of the year; 1848, Frederick City, Md.; 1849, Frederick Circuit; 1850, with Revs. Philip D. Lipscomb and J. C. Dice on Jefferson Circuit; 1851, in charge of Fincastle Circuit; 1852-3, Churchville; 1854-5, Hollidaysburg, Pa. His health failing, he rested in 1856; and, in 1857-8, served the Shepherdstown Charge; 1859, West Loudoun; 1860-65, Wardensville Circuit; 1866-68, Winchester Circuit; 1869-71, Front Royal; 1872-3, Woodstock; 1874, East Rockingham; 1875, assistant on Winchester Circuit; 1876-78, Christiansburg; 1879-80, Berkeley; 1881, Strasburg. Here the active. efficient and successful labors in twenty five fields, through a period of forty-one years, gave place, by reason only of sheer physical exhaustion, to an interval of less than four years of retirement from the active work of the ministry. Then he was called to his home and rest in Heaven.

In 1851 he was united in marriage with Miss Laura A. Eby, daughter of Mrs. Henry L. Eby of Charlestown, Va.

This proved, to use his own expression, a "happy marriage." His cheerful home not only attracted those whom he served in the gospel, but was just the place where an itinerant, worn by toil and disease, might wish to rest, till called to the better life beyond.

Brother March was a man of unusual natural ability. His character united originality, courage and goodness. He was a forcible preacher, always acquainted with his subject, clear in statement, unique in style and manner, blending humor, pathos and unction throughout the discourse. He never failed to interest, please and profit his hearers. His early ministry was marked by gracious revivals and numerous conversions, and the fire of his youth was not quenched during his later years of labor. In the

brief outline of his work, from which these facts are chiefly taken, he writes: "I look back, with heart-felt gratitude to God, that, in nearly all those places where I have toiled in my feeble way, numbers have been converted. Many of them are still living a life of devotion to God, whilst many have reached the other shore. Yet when I look over my ministerial life, I see so little devotion to the work of God, compared with my duty and opportunities—so little zeal in winning souls to Christ, that I can only praise God for His surprising mercy and grace to me through every hour and every step of my journey.'

The estimate to be made of our dear brother's life and work is enhanced by the consideration that he had ever to struggle with severe physical infirmities. These compelled him to halt once in the midst of his most successful labors; but his restless zeal soon pressed him again into the service, where he held his place in the pulpit till he could neither stand nor walk. It was with undisguised reluctance that he at last yielded to necessity and asked for a superannuated relation. The closing days of his life were marked by severe cares and trials, in the midst of which he was stricken down by a fatal illness. For nine days he lingered in pain, humbly estimating the work of his life, yet trusting in his Saviour to the last; then, in the 66th year of his age and the 45th of his ministry, he "entered into the joy of his Lord."

Rev. C. L. TORREYSON.

Charles Lewis Torreyson was born in Loudoun county, Va., July 4th, 1833, and died in Fairfield, Rockbridge county, Va., April 29th, 1885.

Brother Torreyson was converted to God at the early age of nine years, and uniting with the church of his choice, he gave to it the obedience of his childhood, the vigor of his youth and the consecration of his manhood. Thus the love and simplicity of the child developed into an ardent zeal and enduring devotion for the doctrines and teachings of our beloved Methodism. When but 18 years of age, he was licensed as a local preacher. His first active work in the ministry, was on the Springfield Circuit in Hampshire county, W. Va., where he travelled two years under the presiding elder; in 1859 he was received on trial in the Baltimore Annual Conference and was appointed junior preacher on Berkeley Circuit, with Rev. Wm. Champion; in 1860 he was appointed preacher in charge of Berkeley Springs, and on the 11th of December, of the same year, he was united in matrimony to Miss Emma T. Clabaugh, daughter of N. N. and Susan Clabaugh, of Morgan county, W. Va., to which section the family had removed from Carroll Manor, Frederick county, Md.

In 1861 brother Torreyson was sent to the Springfield Circuit, and served that charge during the late civil war. At the memorable session of this body held at Alexandria in 1866, he was appointed to South Branch Circuit; 1867, to Wardensville; 1868, to Gainsboro'; and in 1869 he was appointed the second time to Wardensville; 1870-71-72, to Flintstone; 1873-74, to Queen Anne; 1875, to Kent Circuit; 1876-7, to Calvert Mission; 1878-79, to Centreville; 1880-81, to Highland; 1882-83, to Crab Bottom.
In 1884-85 he was appointed to Fairfield, his last field of labor in the

church militant, where, after a laborious itinerant life, he fell on sleep.

Brother Torreyson's first year on the Fairfield Circuit had been crowned with abundant success. He entered upon his second year, with the field "white unto the harvest" before him, but in the midst of his usefulness, the messenger came and told him to put up his sickle, "and he was gathered to his fathers." Brother Torreyson was a man of striking physique. Tall and erect broad shouldered and strong-armed, he possessed a spirit in harmony with his well wrought frame. His massive head and open countenance bespoke the presence of an impulsive and generous nature. He loved Methodism and was always ready to defend her usages and doctrines from rude assault or unjust insinuation. To this end, he not only familiarized himself with her weapons of defence, but used them, careless of smiles and fearless of foes. As a worker in the vineyard of his Master, Brother Torreyson was laborious, consecrated and useful. As a preacher, he was scriptural, earnest, forcible and practical. During his short but painful illness, his peace was abiding, his experience clear and his hope buoyant. Dying, he "died unto the Lord," leaving a beloved wife and four children to mourn his loss, he now mingles with "the great multitude, which no man can number, before the throne," into whose joyful, presence, three bright-eyed children had entered before him.

Rev. G. W. LIGHTNER.

George W. Lightner, a venerable man of God, and minister of the Lord Jesus Christ, has entered into rest.

Brother Lightner was born in Baltimore, March 28th, 1805. He was converted and joined the M. E. Church in 1840. After having been a member of the church four years, he was licensed to exhort.

In 1870 he was licensed to preach under the ministry of Rev. Joseph H.

Davis, of the Virginia Conference. After he entered the itinerant ministry, he was employed by the Presiding Elder on Prince William Circuit.

He was ordained Deacon-

He was ordained Elder in 1867 by Bishop Doggett, and admitted into

the Baltimore Conference, M. E. Church, South, on trial, in 1868. In 1868-69 he traveled Prince William Mission; in 1870, Alexandria City Mission; in 1871-4, Laurel Circuit; in 1875, Calvert Circuit; in 1876-79, East Harford Mission; in 1880 he was granted a superannuated relation to the Conference, which he held until his death.

In manner, brother Lightner was reticent and unassuming; he was not

well known even to his cotemporaries, by reason of these facts.

He was a man of deep piety-fully consecrated to God.

He was a devoted, self-sacrificing minister of the New Testament. He came into the Conference late in life, but he accepted in the most uncomplaining spirit, all the appointments that were given him.

As a preacher, he was plain, practical and scriptural. He was a good expounder of the word of God.

The blessing of God rested upon his ministry.

He took great pleasure in telling Bible incidents to the youth and children of the church. He was greatly beloved by all who knew him

intimately.

His last illness was not protracted. He died of pneumonia, February 14th, 1886, in Falmouth, Stafford county, Va. He was very patient and peaceful during his illness. He was a great sufferer, but he testified that Christ gave him the victory.

"The Saviour I have so long preached to others. His last words were:

I find within my heart the hope of glory."

Rev. A. B. BLUE.

Rev. Alexander B. Blue was born March 27, 1851, near Springfield, Hampshire county, Va, and died at the residence of his brother-in-law, Mr. John Morter, near Rockbridge Baths, Va., June 6, 1885.

Brother Blue was converted in Texas, June 27, 1872. In July, 1872, he was leading to the fell of 1878 he was received as

Brother Blue was converted in Texas, June 27, 1872. In July, 1872, he was licensed as a local preacher; in the fall of 1876 he was received on trial in the N. W. Texas Conference, and was appointed to Fort Griffin Mission; in December, 1877, he was ordained Deacon by Bishop McTyeire, and was appointed to Glen Rose Circuit; in 1878 he returned to his home in Hampshire county, W. Va. Having been transferred to the Baltimore Conference, M. E. Church, South, he was in March, 1879, assigned to Monterey Circuit, as the colleague of Rev. A. Q. Flaherty.

July 27, 1879, he was married to Miss Annie F. Dixon of Staunton, Va.

In 1880-1-2 he served the North River Circuit; in 1883 he was appointed to Furnace No. 2, where his labors were blessed in the conversion of one hundred souls. In 1884 he was ordained Elder by Bishop Wilson, and appointed to Morgan Circuit.

In 1885, on account of failing health, he was placed on the superannuated list. He went to the neighborhood of Rockbridge Baths, Va., for the purpose of securing restored strength. In this he was disappointed; but he submitted meekly to the providence which so prematurely ended his life.

After a few months of suffering, he passed into rest—exclaiming as he died: "Lord Jesus receive my spirit." His remains were interred in his uncle's burial ground at Springfield, W. Va.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Randolph Macon College.

The present collegiate year has to this time shown larger receipts from tuition than last year. The College is now on a paying basis. There will be probably \$500 over expenses at the close of this year, which can be applied to the reduction of the debt. An additional professor took his place in the professional Corps last year. It is in contemplation to add another next year. The indebtedness of \$13,000 mentioned in the report submitted to the last Conference, has been reduced to \$11,500.

Within the year the work of endowment has been pushed forward. The three Cities, Lynchburg, Danville and Norfolk, have already contributed \$50,000, which sum is expected to reach \$65,000 when the subscriptions are all collected. It is expected the Virginia Conference will have given for endowment by the next meeting of the trustees, \$100,000. It is hoped the Baltimore Conference will increase the sum to \$157,000. The centennial gifts have amounted up to this time to \$18,000 from the Virginia and Baltimore Conferences. There is due from this Conference in subscriptions and centennia bonds \$1,593. We hope these will be paid as promptly as possible.

Religious training has been a marked feature of the College. There has been a revival of religion every year. The blessing from these revivals to the Church and the world is inestimable.

At Randolph Macon, young men are not educated at the expense of their souls.

We recommend the passage of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we cordially recommend to our people, the effort now being made to endow the College, and trust they will contribute at least \$50,000 for this purpose.

Wesleyan Female Institute.

The Institute is reported to be in a prosperous condition—the number of boarding pupils being 115; and in this number there are representatives from 18 States. Special attention has been paid to the comfort of the young ladies.

The religious influence exerted upon the scholars is worthy of the highest commendation; and during the present session a number of them have been happily converted.

Dr. Harris, the president, has selected an admirable corps of teachers in the various departments of the institution, and in no period of its history has the College combined more elements of success. A plan has been adopted for funding the debt of the institution. When this arrangement shall have been completed, the liquidation of the debt will follow as a simple and easy result.

In all respects the present outlook of the institute is cheering. We cordially commend the Wesleyan Female Institute to the patronage of our people as in the past.

The Valley Female College,

The Valley Female College, located in Winchester Va., under the presidency of Rev. J. P. Hyde, has been steadily growing in influence. The faculty has been judiciously selected and the utmost pains are taken by the teachers, with both the mental and religious culture of the pupils. The course of instruction is thorough. The location of the College is beautiful and healthful. We recommend the Valley Female College as an excellent instutition for the mental and moral training of our daughters.

The Montgomery Female College.

The Montgomery Female College, under the admirable management of Mrs. O. L. Pollock has, at the present time, 50 boarding pupils. We regret that owing to her physical condition, Mrs. Pollock has found it necessary to give up the business management of the institution—owing to this fact the College has been leased to Dr. Baird of the Presbyterian Church, for three years—Mrs. Pollock taking charge simply of the literary department.

Resolved, That we cordially commend to the attention and patronage of our people, Mount Parvo Institute, a school for young ladies, situated at Charlestown, Jefferson County, West Virginia, and presided over by Mrs. Belle W. Galleher and Miss Augusta V. Wilson, and request the appointment of a visiting committee to that institution.

Resolved, That we furnish the same privilege to Professor W. W. Smith, in his efforts to raise an endowment fund for Randolph Macon College, within the bounds of our Conference, as he had in the Virginia Conference—that is: he may call on any brethern to assist him at such central points as their efforts shall be made.

Whereas, The Trustees of the Wesleyan Female Institute have not complied with the request of the Conference to present an itemized statement of the assets and liabilities of the corporation to the Conference, therefore,

Resolved, That said Trustces be requested to submit such a report to the next session of the Conference.

The Board recommend that the Conference, through the Joint Board of Finance, make an assessment for educational purposes, of \$2,000, for the benefit of Randolph Macon College.

Resolved, That the Bishop of this Conference be requested to appoint visitors to Randolph Macon College, Wesleyan Female Institute, and Valley Female College.

REPORT ON PAINE INSTITUTE.

The Committee to whom was referred the papers relating to the Paine Institute, beg leave to report:

That this educational enterprise, in behalf of the colored people of the South, for whom, as a Church, we have always manifested a deep interest,

commends itself very strongly to our sympathy and help. Its object, chiefly, is the training of men for the ministry, and for teachers. We rejoice at the prospect of its endowment in the near future, and also in the educational facilities already possessed, and in the good work it is now accomplishing for our colored friends of the South. \$25,000 have been pledged by a responsible brother, as a personal gift, to endow the School, if the Church will furnish grounds and buildings. To secure these, will require fifteen thousand dollars. This amount, by the Executive Committee, has been apportioned to the several Conferences, excepting the Mission Conferences. The amount apportioned to the Baltimore Conference is \$650. And your Committee recommend the acceptance of this apportionment by our Conference.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

The Present Condition of Schools.

At no time in the history of our Conference has our Sunday School work been in as good condition as now. The Statistics of this year show an increase in every particular except in officers and teachers. In officers and teachers, a decrease of 37; scholars an increase of 1,535; and conversions, an increase of 334. Membership in schools 1,415 more than in the churches.

From sources, other than Statistics, we learn of new schools being formed; feeble ones becoming stronger; and stronger ones becoming more efficient.

What has been done during the past year?

Much of this is due to the increased interest taken in Sunday School gather, ings; such as, our Annual Convention, District Conference meetings-Children's Day, Institutes, in city and country, Teachers' meetings, &c., but to no one cause more than to the aid given feeble and new schools out of the Centenary fund placed in our hands. The sub-committee appointed by this Conference to apply this fund, makes the following report:

"The applications for help have been comparatively few, and always moderate; and the result has shown that no money of the church has been used to a greater advantage in advancing the cause of Christ in our bounds.

Amount in hand from Centennial offerings, 1884, was \$1,428.17. Of this \$625.55 have been distributed as above detailed, and \$32.55 expended for record book, blanks, and children's envelopes, and traveling expenses of the member of the sub-committee from Virginia—leaving in hand of that fund \$770.07.

The Treasurer reports \$246.28 receipts during the past year. Total \$1,016.35

A few Schools adopted the plan of exchange of second hand books, and thus replenished their libraries.

Some of the stronger ones have donated their old books to weak schools near them, thus materially helping them.

What we may do the Ensuing Year.

We would urge greater diligence in the study and teaching of Bible truth. To this end we would suggest the use of Bibles by both teachers and scholars in the class; to have the *entire* Word before them, is certainly better than a fragmentary portion, as found on the lesson leaves. As useful as the lesson helps are in *preparing* the lesson, in the class, the *entire* Book should be used.

We would also suggest the *frequent* use of "object lessons" to illustrate truth; especially are these useful in the infant class; which, in many places, is the largest and more important part of the School.

Complaints from many quarters, both in the city and country, reach us, that young men leave the Sunday School at an early period in young manhood.

We will here suggest but one remedy; earnest prayer and effort for their early and thorough conversion. We are sure this will keep them; numerous expedients may be used, but this is the surest and safest.

We would reiterate and emphasize the suggestions in second section of last year's report:

The thorough co-operation of parents; the choice of devoted Christian teachers; the organization of Mission bands to bring in other persons; preaching by the Pastor as often as practicable, especially to young men; and entertainments of a Missionary or benevolent character. We are sure if the members of a Sunday School be thoroughly imbued with the Spirit of the Gospel, there will be no difficulty in holding them in the school for life.

Let us profit by past experience. The methods which have been tried, and found useful, let us use them more vigorously; and methods hitherto used only in a few places, and found useful, let us universally adopt them; and other methods not used, but promising good, give a fair trial. We as workers for our Lord must not hold to old methods simply because of their age; nor reject new things only because they may be new to us. "Prove all things; hold fast that which is good." 1st Thess. 5:21.

The Annual Convention of the "Baltimore Conference Sunday School Society" bears no mean part in our improvement and progress. We therefore commend it again to this Conference, hoping for increased attendance; and that out of these meetings there will soon grow an "Annual Training School" for officers and teachers. We herewith submit the report of its Executive Committee on "Order of Exercises":

VI.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

As the Church Extension movement was only inaugurated among us at our last General Conference, it was not until the session of 1883, that our local Board was organized, and not until March, 1884, that it may be said to have entered upon its practical work. Since then it has afforded substantial aid to 23 Churches in our Conference bounds. During the present session, nine churches have been assisted from our fund, as follows: \$300 donated to Smithfield, Brucetown Circuit, Winchester District, \$600 asked for; \$125.00 to Hamilton Church, Trappe Circuit, E. Baltimore District, \$150.00 asked for; \$125 to Pisgah, Charles and St. Mary's Mission, E. Baltimore District, \$200 asked for; \$50 each to Fairview, Clover-Hill, and Spring-Creek Churches, Rockingham District, \$200 asked for; \$150 to Huntersville Church, Huntersville Circuit, Lewisburg District. \$200 asked for; \$50 to Manassas, Sudley Mission, Washington District, \$150 asked for; \$50 to Talcott Church, Talcott Circuit, Lewisburg District, \$100 asked for. We greatly regret to have been compelled to lay aside for future consideration, five additional applications for aid. It would have been gratifying to your Board to have been able to respond to every call made upon it, and to the full amount asked for; but the limited means at our disposal rendered this impossible. In dispensing our funds we have been guided by the necessities of the individual cases, and with reference

to an equable distribution of our gifts throughout our Conference territory. We had hoped to report an increase in our receipts this year over the last, but there has been instead a slight falling off. This has been largely due to the scarcity of money in many portions of our Conference, particularly in the rural districts, and which has proportionably affected our Conference assessments for other purposes; but the very important relation which this fund sustains to all the vital interests of the Church might well elicit extraordinary effort to meet the demands upon it.

It cannot be doubted that this important agency has greatly stimulated Church building among us, and encouraged a decided improvement in the architecture of our Houses of Worship. In many instances the Churches partly erected by us, would not have been projected but for the prospect of help thus afforded. In a single District of our Conference, the expenditure of \$600 by the Board, has secured us property worth at least tenfold that amount. It will thus be seen that the Conference is already receiving a rich remunerative return for the amounts contributed to this fund. The benefits of its bounty are so immediate in their application and results, that its great practical utility can scarcely be overstated. While abating not one whit of our zeal and liberality in behalf of our missionary work abroad, we should not overlook the urgent demands of the home field that promises such early and fruitful returns.

We appeal to our brethern of the Conference to address themselves with increased interest and energy to the furtherance of this great aggressive enterprise of the Church. Let every effort be made to bring up the full amount of the assessments for this object that its beneficial effects may be more fully realized.

The Treasurer's report will fully acquaint you with the financial operations of the Board during the past year.

VIII

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee on Temperance unanimously beg leave to report the following resolutions:

Resolved 1. That the attitude of our Church and of this Conference upon the subject of Temperance has not at any time been doubtful or undecided. From the beginning, Methodism has always prohibited "the drinking spirituous liquors except in cases of necessity;" and when scarce any other voice, was heard, her preachers, both in this country and in Great Britain, in the face of general opposition and often of persecution, unsparingly denounced intemperance in common with all other vices and sins, as condemned by God's word, and prohibited by the Church. From this course our Church and Conference have never departed; and to this, our constant and unshrinking proclamation of the truth, we believe is largely, if not principally due, all the temperance sentiment that now prevails in our country.

- 2. That we rejoice in the extension of that sentiment among the people at large, and pray that it may completely prevail through the length and breadth of the land until the iniquitous liquor traffic, with all its guilt and crime, and all its ruinous consequences to every human interest in the world, and to the souls eternally hereafter, shall be utterly and forever suppressed.
- 3. That in imitation of the fathers, and relying on the same God, who through them, by the preached word wrought so great things for Temperance as for all righteousness, we will continue to preach against intemperance, and to use all other proper means to secure such suppression, and to establish temperance in the land. And we especially call attention in this connection to the provisions of the Discipline made and provided for this very purpose, as contained in the chapter on Temperance and in answer to the question: "What shall be done for the extirpation of the great evil of intemperance?" and remind our people that this is the authoritative declaration, on this subject, of our supreme and only legislative body.
- 4. That we urge our preachers and people everywhere to acquaint themselves with the history as well as with the existing provisions of our Church and Conference respecting temperance, and to represent the same wherever our position and action on this subject are either unknown or are not properly understood.
- 5. That in so far as their work may be in harmony with these resolutions we commend those various organizations of Christain men and women who are laboring in the cause of Temperance.

IX.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH TITLES.

Your committee having carefully investigated the question of the titles to our property contained in Church buildings, report that all such property when held under deeds containing the trust clause set forth in our Discipline, or any trust clause similar thereto, is valid "for the use of a particular congregation in the limited and local sense of the term," but "not for the use of the M. E. Church, South, in a general sense." In a general sense, such a conveyance in Virginia would be void. Our opinion is that we have a good title to Church buildings when the trust clause contained in our Discipline is used, so long as our congregations or any part thereof are loyal to the Church; but if any such congregations unanimously turn from the Church, then the Church property belongs to such congregations, or the deed lapses.

And such is also the law of West Virginia. In regard to our Parsonage property, however, the use of the trust clause contained in our Discipline leaves the beneficiaries so vague and indefinite as to be inoperative and of no effect under decisions already rendered. We, therefore, recommend that the General Conference be memorialized to change the trust clause for parsonages, so as to conform to the law, and suggest as such change, "In trust that said premises shall be held, kept, maintained and disposed of for the use and benefit of the Members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in and such others as may be associated with them, as a parsonage or place of residence for the preachers of the said Church who may from time to time be appointed in said place, subject to the usage and discipline of said Church, as from time to time authorized and declared by the General Conference of said Church and the Annual Conference within whose bounds the said premises are situate."

We also recommend that the Legislature of Virginia be memorialized to pass such acts as may be necessary to validate titles to parsonage property already held, and that a committee of three persons from this State be appointed by this Conference to carry out this recommendation.

Your committee having carefully considered the different publishing interests of the Church submitted to them, beg leave to report as follows:

Publishing House.

The report of the Agent shows that the business of the House continues to prosper.

New machinery has been purchased, alterations and improvements in the building have been made, aggregating an outlay of nearly \$20,000. The

stock of merchandise and raw material in all the departments has been kept up, and the business of the House shows a net gain of \$56,645.75.

We heartily endorse the management of the House, and commend it to the patronage of our people.

Book Depository.

We heartily endorse and recommend to the favorable consideration of our preachers and people, the Book Depository, under the management of Rev B. F. Ball, established in Baltimore, and advise and request that they purchase their books, stationery, and Sunday School Literature from him, and that he be re-appointed to his present work.

The Christian Advocate.

It is a source of much satisfaction to know that this, our General Church Organ, is growing in popular favor, as is evidenced by its steady increase of circulation. It deserves, not only because it is our Official Organ, but also because of its intrinsic worth, the universal patronage of the Church. We confess ourselves in warmest sympathy with the efforts of the editor and the publisher, to reach, by the time of the assembling of our approaching General Conference, a circulation of thirty thousand copies. To assist in the consummation of this desirable end, we request the preachers of this Conference to commend the Advocate to their several congregations, and solicit subscriptions for the same

Missionary Papers.

The "Advocate of Missions," and the "Woman's Missionary Advocate," are intended to keep the home Church fully informed as to the work of the foreign fields. Increased information will effect increased interest. We therefore recommend these publications to the hearty and liberal support of our people.

The Episcopal Methodist,

Published in the interest of the Baltimore Conference—the Editor, a member of our body, and appointed to this special work—brings the paper directly to our notice and patronage. It should be a weekly visitor in every Methodist home. It is a great help to the pastor, and to every department of our work. We heartily endorse it as our home organ, and hope its circulation may be greatly increased. Rev. W. K. Boyle, the earnest and faithful editor, deserves the sympathy and co operation of our people. We recommend his re-appointment to the Editorship of the Episcopal Methodist.

Quarterly Review.

We cordially recommend the "Quarterly Review," Edited by Dr. Hinton, to our preachers and people, and trust that this important periodical may have an increased circulation throughout our territory, the ensuing Conference year.

- 4th. That we request the President of the Joint Board of Finance to present (with a statement), these resolutions to the Conference.

Of the sum contributed by Leesburg, for Missions, \$37 were raised by the Mission Board of that Station.

Of the whole amount contributed by Staunton for Missions, \$50 were raised by the Sunday School at Wesleyan Female Institute, and \$40 by the Society of the Station, known as Busy Bees; this amount to be applied to continue its education of a girl in China, named Mollie Carroll.


