

### FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY, March 9, 1887.

THE BALTIMORE ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its One Hundred and third session in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Leesburg, Loudoun County, Virginia, Wednesday morning, March 9, 1887, at 9 o'clock.

Present, Rev. Bishop John C. Keener, D. D., *President* of the Conference, in the chair.

Religious service was conducted by the Bishop.

Reading from the Holy Scriptures, Ephesians, chapter II.

Hymn 272 was sung by the Conference-

"And are we yet alive."

The Conference was led in prayer by the Bishop.

Roll called. By request of the President, Rev. John S. Martin called the Roll, and 93 Clerical Members answered to their names. (See Roll.)

Lay Representatives. Lay Representatives were reported from the several Presiding Elders' Districts, and 13 answered to their names. (See Roll.)

Secretary Elected. On motion, Rev. John S. Martin was re-elected Secretary.

By permission of the Conference, the Secretary chose as his Assistants the same as last year, Rev. James E. Armstrong, Rev. George T. Tyler, Rev. Asbury R. Martin, and Rev. Beverly W. Bond.

Changes of Lay Delegates. On motion, J. S. Sullivan, alternate Delegate from East Baltimore District, was substituted for J. S. Biddison, absent. J. M. McWhorter, alternate Lay Delegate from Lewisburg District, was substituted for J. J. Hobbs, absent.

Standing Committees. On motion, Standing Committees were appointed. (See List. pages 9 11.)

Church Extension. On motion, T. W. Brown was elected a member of the Conference Board of Church Extension, in place of L. R. Green, deceased.

Change in Committee of Examination. On motion, J. W Steele was appointed on the Committee of Examination for "Admission on trial," in place of J. S. Hutchinson.

Conference determined to meet in daily session, at 9 o'clock, A. M., and to adjourn at 12.30 P. M.

The Bar of Conference was fixed on a line crossing the house ranging with the third pillar.

Change in Board of Education. J. M. Follansbee was substituted on the Board of Education for C. Denny.

Publishing House. A statement from the Publishing House at Nashville was presented by the President, read by the Secretary, and referred to the Committee on Publishing Interests.

Church Extension. A statement from the Board of Church Extension at Louisville was presented by the President, read by the Secretary, and referred to the Conference Board of Church Extension.

The Joint Board of Finance was stated, at this time of the session, the same as last year.

Wesleyan Female Institute. The Report of W. A. Harris, President of Wesleyan Female Institute, at Staunton, Va., was presented, read and referred to the Board of Education.

#### Conference of 1812, in Leesburg, Va.

In accordance with the wish of the Conference, and with the consent of the President, the Secretary read from the Journal of the Baltimore Annual Conference, held in Leesburg, Virginia, March, 1812—seventy-five years ago. The roll of the members composing that Conference was called—58 names—the names of those admitted into full connection; also those "admitted on trial," as well as the answers to other Minute questions, were read, as follows:

FRIDAY, March 20th, 9 o'clock. The Conference was opened by Bishop Asbury, with reading the Holy Scriptures, Singing and Prayer.

Nicholas Snethen was nominated and chosen Secretary, and Beverly Waugh, Assistant Secretary.

Times of Meeting and Public Exercises were determined as follows: From 8 to 11 o'clock, A. M., and 2 to 5, P. M., and candle light. Enoch George and Nelson Reed were chosen to appoint the preachers, the time and place of meeting.

Wm. Ryland, Robert R. Roberts, John Pitts, Asa Shinn and Alfred Griffith, were chosen Stewards by ballot.

1st Question was considered and the following were admitted on trial: Louis R. Fechtig, John Bull, Jacob Foreman, Thomas Sewell, William Shanks, Robert Hanna, Jr., Joshua Windsor, Oliver Woodworth, Amos Barnes, Robert McCormack.

Joseph Carson asked and obtained a location. Presiding Elders' Districts of the Baltimore Conference were read from the Old Journal as follows: Baltimore District, embracing 8 charges, including nearly all the Western Shore of Maryland; Potomac District, embracing 9 appointments, from Stephensburg and Berkeley to Alexandria, the Northern Neck and Fredericksburg; Georgetown District, extending from Washington City to Alleghany, with 7 charges; Greenbrier District, extending over all the territory from Rockingham to New River, and westward to Pendleton and Randolph, with 9 circuits verging to the Ohio; Carlisle District, with 8 Circuits, extending from Harford, Md., to Juniata, Bedford, Auckwich, through a large part of Pennsylvania; Monongahela District, with 10 circuits, embracing the territory from Ohio, Red Stone, Wheeling, Pittsburg, northward to Shenango and Lake Eric.

The Secretary read from the Journal of 1812 that there were embraced in all, 21,300 white members, 7,886 colored members.

From that Journal the Secretary read that the amount raised from all the circuits for preachers' deficient and for widows, \$2,352.77.

Reference was made also to parts of the Journal embracing a communication from Christian Newcomer and George Adam Geeding, on the part of the Conference of the United Brethren, and the reply of the Baltimore Conference, through Nicholas Snethen.

This correspondence continued for several years, looking to a closer Union.

The Secretary read from the Journal of 1812 of the Conference held in Leesburg, Va., that "the following were elected Delegates to the General or Delegated Conference to be held at New York, May, 1812:

"Asa Shinn, Enoch George, Robert R. Roberts, Joshua Wells, Christopher Frye, Nicholas Snethen, Nelson Reed, William Ryland, James Smith, Hamilton Jefferson, Jacob Gruber, Robert Birch, Joseph Toy, Henry Smith, Andrew Hemphill."

After the reading of the foregoing Extracts from the Old Journal, Bishop Keener addressed the Conference.

Conference united in singing Hymn-

"Children of the Heavenly King."

Conference resumed the regular business which had been suspended for the reading from the Old Journal.

The Twentieth Question of the General Minutes was then called, viz: "Are all the Preachers blameless in life and Official Administration? The characters of Alfred A. Eskridge, Francis M. Mills, David Thomas, Thomas Hildebrand, George Stevenson, Henry Hoffman, Francis H. Richey, John W. Tongue, Joshua M. Grandin, Gilson Mauzy, Ephraim L. Kregloe, Mabury G. Balthis, Aaron Boone, Wm. C. Maloy, Andrew Robey, Wm. Hedges, John W. Ewan, Nelson Head, were examined and passed, and their cases were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for a continuance of their Superannuated relation.

The characters of John Landstreet and Wesley Hammond were examined and passed.

The characters of Edward F. Heterick, Larkin H. Crenshaw, John W. Boteler, Joseph J. Engle, James Beatty, Adam P. Boude, George R. Jefferson, P. S. E. Sixeas, J. Newman Hank, Asbury R. Martin, Joseph N. Spangler, Francis A. Mercer, were examined and passed, and their cases were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations, for a continuance of their Supernumerary relation.

The character of Wm. T. Quinn was examined and passed.

Question Sixth of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are received by transfer from other Conferences? Wm. V. Tudor, received from the St. Louis Conference, and Quincy A. Wheat, from the Western Virginia Conference.

Question Tenth of the General Minutes was called, viz: What Local Preachers are elected Deacons? Recommendations were presented and read of Isaiah Christopher from Easton Circuit Quarterly Conference, East Baltimore District; F. A. Stier, from Mount Vernon Quarterly Conference, Washington District; Daniel W. Files from N. Branch Mission Quarterly Conference, Moorefield District; and they were on motion elected Deacons.

Question Fourteenth of the General Minutes was called, viz: What Local Preachers are elected Elders? None.

Visitor. Rev. John L. Clarke of the Virginia Conference was introduced.

Conference adjourned with singing Hymn 27-

"To Thee and Thee alone,"

and with the Benediction by the Bishop, to meet to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

### SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY MORNING, March 10, 1887.

Conference met at the appointed hour, 9 o'clock.

Bishop Keener in the chair.

Religious service was conducted by Rev. J. H. Waugh.

Roll called. The roll was called, and 40 additional members responded to their names.

The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.

Joint Board of Finance. The chairman of the Joint Board of Finance reported that J. F. Bane had been elected to take the place of J. Liston, on the Moorefield District.

Valley Female College. The Report of the Visiting Committee to the Valley Female College was presented, read and referred to the Board of Education.

Assistant Secretary. On the nomination of the Secretary, Henry P. Hamill was appointed an additional Assistant Secretary.

Woman's Missionary Society. The Report of the Woman's Missionary Society of this Conference was presented, read, and ordered to be published in the Conference Minutes.

The Twentieth Question of the General Minutes was called, viz: Are all the Preachers blameless in life and official administration? The characters of the Elders of the Baltimore District were examined and passed.

Peter H. Whisner, Presiding Elder of the Baltimore District, represented the condition of that District, and his character was examined and passed.

The characters of the Elders of the East Baltimore District were examined and passed.

Thomas E. Carson, Presiding Elder, gave a statement of the work of the District, and his character was examined and passed.

The characters of the Elders of the Washington District were examined and passed.

. Samuel Rodgers, Presiding Elder, gave a statement of the condition of the Washington District, and his character was examined and passed.

The characters of the Elders of the Winchester District were examined and passed.

John S. Martin, Presiding Elder, represented the condition of the Win-chester District, and his character was examined and passed.

The characters of the Elders of the Rockingham District were examined and passed.

The state of the District was presented by John C. Dice, Presiding Elder, and his character was examined and passed.

Publishing Interests. The Report of the Committee on Publishing Interests was presented and read.

Church Extension. The Report of the Treasurer of the Board of Church Extension, re-committed, was presented and read, in accordance with changes, as directed.

On motion, the Report was adopted.

District Conference Records. The Report on District Conference Records was presented, read and on motion, it was adopted.

Forms for Incorporation. A paper in relation to church property and forms of Incorporation was presented, and it was ordered that it be published in the Minutes of this Conference.

The following Resolution was presented, read and on motion, it was adopted.

Resolved, That this Conference has heard, with great pleasure, the address of our brother, Rev. E. B. Prettyman, in behalf of the Baltimore Conference Benevolent Society, and believing that great good would be accomplished by the publication of said address, bringing it before the church at large, we hereby request brother Prettyman to furnish a copy of it for publication in the Episcopal Methodist.

Thanks. The following resolution of thanks was presented, read, and on motion, it was adopted by a rising vote.

Resolved, That we heartily appreciate the kind hospitality of the people of Leesburg, and hereby extend to them our warmest thanks, and pray that they may have the richest blessings of God's Providence and Grace.

The following resolutions were presented, read, and on motion adopted:

Resolved, That the the thanks of this Conference are due and are hereby tendered to the several lines of railroad that have given reduced rates of fare to and from the Conference. We would especially mention the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, which reduced the fares one-half, and in addition to this kindly agreed to detain their Valley train twenty minutes in Washington on Wednesday morning, in order to enable our preachers to get to their homes on the day of their leaving Leesburg.

Resolved, That we return thanks to Rev. J. P. Hyde for his laborious and successful efforts to secure these reduced rates of travel, as well as for the patient and courteous manner in which he has discharged the duties assigned him in issuing return tickets to the members of this body.

Resolved, That Rev. J. P. Hyde be requested to attend to this matter during the coming year.

Assessments of District Stewards to be reported. On motion, Resolved, That the Presiding Elders be and are hereby directed to report to the Secretary of the Conference, as early as practicable, the assessments made by the District Stewards of the various districts to the several charges, and that this be done as early as practicable after the assessments are made.

Conference determined that when it adjourn, it adjourn to meet again this evening at 7:30 o'clock.

#### REPORTS.

I.

#### MEMOIRS.

#### Rev. LEONIDAS ROSSER GREENE.

Rev. Leonidas Rosser Geeene was born in Stafford Co., Va., on the 13th of September, 1853. He was of Methodist parentage. His father and mother, who survive him, "brought him up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." From the cradle, they instilled into his young heart a love for Methodism—its doctrines and usages. At the early age of seventeen he was converted to God in an old church at Falmouth. Immediately upon connecting himself with the church he began to take part as a leader in the young men's prayer-meeting, and through his influence much good was accomplished in the name of the Lord.

In 18— he 'was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Stafford Circuit—Rev. Nelson Head, D. D., P. E. Desiring to prepare himself more thoroughly for his lifework, he went to Randolph Macon College. As opportunity afforded he endeavored to cultivate his gifts and graces. Impressed with the great obligation which rested upon him, he worked his way through every apparent difficulty, determining in the fear of God to make of himself "a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." In 1876 he was recommended by the Quarterly Conference of Fredericksburg Station as a candidate for admission on trial into the traveling connection, and was appointed as junior preacher on Hillsboro Circuit, with Rev. L. R. Jones; but owing to the pressing needs of the work, he was transferred by his P. E. to Piedmont Circuit with Rev J. H. Dulany, P. C. He soon displayed a peculiar genius for preaching. With an eloquence that thrilled the hearer, he proclaimed "the glorious Gospel of the Blessed God." In 1877 he was sent to Warrenton Circuit with that man of precious memory, the late Rev. Jas. Higgins. In 1878 he was appointed junior preacher on Rockville Circuit with Rev. J. C. Dice; and in 1879 he was re-appointed with Rev. G. T. Tyler.

On the 21st of April, 1880, he was most happily united in marriage with Miss Addie Stonestreet, daughter of Dr. E. E. Stonestreet of Rockville, Md. In 1880 he was sent as second married man to Londoun Circuit with Rev. L. H. Crenshaw. In 1881-82-83-84 he was appointed preacher in charge of Salem Station, which he served with marked success and ability. The people heard him gladly. Sinners were converted, believers were strengthened and backsliders reclaimed.

Towards the close of his fourth year the church building was neatly and thoroughly repaired. The name of Rev. L. R. Greene is deeply embalmed in the hearts and memories of the people of Salem. At the close of his pastoral term the Conference convened in that station. The members of this body will no doubt remember the minute attention Brother Greene gave to the many duties which devolved upon him, thereby unconsciously illustrating the close attention he paid to all the details that enter into the work of the Methodist pastorate, whether in circuit or station.

In 1885-6 he was appointed to Roanoke, a new and growing city. This appointment proved to be a happy one to himself as well as the people he served. Crowds gathered to his church and hung with spellbound attention upon his burning lips.

The word preached was fruitful unto the multiplication of the church. The second year of Brother Greene's pastoral relation with that charge opened before him with an inviting field for work. The interest so manifest the previous year did not abate. The Sunday school was "white unto the harvest." A new church building was contemplated for the accommodation of the increasing congregation. But what promised to be the approaching noon of a successful ministry proved to be the radiant glow of its setting sun. The subject of this memoir was somewhat above the average height—of manly figure and of easy and graceful movement. His features were delicately chiselled. He had a calm blue eye which melted upon his audience with moving pathos. He had an open, cheerful countenance. In the social circle he was unassuming, affable and attractive. As a student he was patient and diligent. As a pastor he was kind and sympathetic. He had a remarkable facility in distributing his influence through a church. He knew how to touch centres. Wherever he went he drew the young of the church around him. He possessed a strange reserve power with which he both touched and won men in his daily contact with them.

We would not do our departed brother justice without reference to his character as a preacher. He was an able minister of the New Testament. He studiously avoided metaphysical abstractions. He dealt with truth in the concrete. In doctrine he was clear and scriptural; in argument, direct and incisive; in illustration, brilliant and forcible; in description, natural and vivid; in appeal, pathetic and persuasive; in style he commingled the beautiful and the sublime He scenned to have the eye of a painter, the ear of a musician, and the soul and sentiment of a poet. In voice manner and diction he was an orator; in his preparation for the pulpit he was conscientiously rigid. He was not willing to trust to natural gifts or the inspiration of surroundings. He was only willing to go into the pulpit with a message upon which he had spent faithful work and prayer. Consequently his public ministrations were both uniform and versatile. Above all, he looked for the guidance and unction of the Holy Ghost—the true source of ministerial power.

Brother Greene never expected to attain unto length of years. His premonitions were not without foundation. Early in the month of August he was much indisposed, but with a short interval of rest from work he apparently regained his strength, The latter part of September he went in company with several friends, to New York. Before he reached home disease laid hold of him with an iron grasp. He went home to die. For a few days no fears of such a result were entertained. Soon, however, he became delirious and finally unconscious, never rousing from this sad condition which lasted for some weeks. For days life seemed to hang upon a thread. Human skill was baffled.

On the 23d day of November, 1886, after nine weeks of intense suffering, Brother Greene passed peacefully through the portals of death into "the city which hath foundations whose builder and maker is God."

A memorial service, attended by a large and tearful assembly, was held in the church at Roanoke.

The remains of our lamented brother were then taken to Rockville, Md., where, after an appropriate service, they were committed to the grave to await the sound of the trumpet which shall usher in the resurrection of the just. We shall miss him; but our loss is his gain. He leaves a widow and three children to mourn his departure.

#### FRANK MONTGOMERY STROTHER.

We have the mournful duty of chronicling the death of one of our noblest young men. In the prime of life, and with the promise of great usefulness, he was cut off.

Frank Montgomery Strother, the subject of this memoir, the son of James and Mildred Strother, was born in Fauquier County, Va., March 7th, 1852.

In very early childhood he developed great force of character, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him.

He was converted at the age of nineteen, during a meeting conducted by Rev. F. A. Strother and Rev. H. E. Johnson, at Linden, Warren Co., Va.

He joined the Church very promptly, and shortly thereafter was fully convinced of his call to the Christian Ministry.

Brother Strother enjoyed the privileges of a liberal education. He attended Clifton Academy at first, but being desirous of fitting himself fully for his great work, he arranged and went to Randolph Macon College, where he made his mark as a student, and as a young man of decided talent.

Brother Strother was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Ashland Station, Virginia Conference, and admitted on trial into the traveling connection in the Baltimore Conference in 1877.

He was ordained Deaeon in 1879 by Bishop Wightman; and in 1881 he was ordained Elder by Bishop McTyeire.

In 1877 he traveled Hillsboro' Circuit, having previously traveled some months under the Presiding Elder; in 1878, West River Circuit; in 1879, Freedom Circuit; in 1880-81, Rockville Circuit.

About the middle of this year he was transferred to Freedom Circuit to take Brother Engel's place; in 1882-83, Charles and St. Mary's; in 1884-85, Fincastle.

On the 29th of November, 1881, he was married to Miss Alice Hank, daughter of Dr. J. W. F. and Mrs. Annie Hank, of Baltimore, Md.

At the Conference of 1886 he was compelled, by declining health, to change from the active to the superannuated relation.

Toward the close of his second year in Fincastle his health failed, and in November he resigned his charge and returned to his home at Markham, Va. In the following Spring he went to Southern California, where he remained six months. Finding no benefit from the change, he returned home, and died one week after his arrival, October 29th, 1886.

Brother Strother was a young man of far more than ordinary strength and clearness of mind. His perceptions were quick and vigorous. He was a great reader, and took great pleasure in works upon abstruse and metaphysical questions.

. His sermons, as written, showed a facile pen, were beautiful in unity, strong in argument, direct, incisive.

During the short period that he was permitted to exercise his ministry, he enjoyed every evidence that the pleasure of the Lord prospered in his hands.

Brother Strother's character was marked by great simplicity and sincerity. He abhorred everything that had the apearance of duplicity. His speech was pure. He was an independent spirit—he dared speak and think for himself.

While his last days were days of greatest suffering, he was wonderfully sustained and comforted by the presence of the Saviour. He was delivered from all fear of death, and his faith in Christ never failed him.

His faith gave him the victory over the last enemy. He died in the triumphs of the faith, and was abundantly admitted into the everlasting kingdom of God.

## II.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

## Randolph Macon College.

The present year has been a prosperous one for the College. Two additional professors have been added. The indebtedness has been paid off except \$2,000, which is still due on two houses built for the use of the professors. They are now enabled to pay the president and professors their salaries monthly.

The endowment fund, up to the present time, has reached the sum of \$93,000, and with a probability that within the next year it will be increased to \$150,000 or \$200.000. If the Virginia and Baltimore Conferences will continue their annual collections, the institution will be placed on a paying basis and be enabled to extend its influence and helping hand to indigent students.

Valuable improvements have been made to the grounds as well as to the buildings. The sanitary condition of the College has been much improved.

Three libraries have been consolidated into one, and a reading room connected therewith is kept constantly heated, comfortable and attractive for the students. A commodious room has been tastefully furnished by private subscriptions for the exclusive use of the Young Men's Christian Association.

During the last year there have been one hundred and ten students, including eight ministerial students each from Virginia and Baltimore Conferences, and one from North Carolina.

Religious training has always been a marked feature of Randolph Macon College; there the intellect is not developed at the expense of the soul.

We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we most cordially recommend to our people the effort now being made to endow the college; and we also recommend that the Conference, through the Joint Board of Finance, make an assessment from year to year of \$2,000 per annum for the benefit of Randolph Macon College; and that we furnish the president, W. W. Smith, all the facilities within our reach within the bounds of our Conference in raising the endowment fund alluded to; that is that he may call on any of the brethren at such central points as he may select to assist him in his efforts to raise said endowment fund.

#### Wesleyan Female Institute

By the report submitted by the president at their session of the Conference, we see there had been in attendance, during the session just past, eighty-eight pupils in the boarding department, while the number of day boarders had been larger than ever before.

We are pleased to learn of the religious care and training the pupils receive at the hands of the president and his able assistants. The grounds and buildings have been very much improved.

We most cheerfully recommend this Institute to the patronage and most favorable consideration of the public; and while we are much pleased at the report received, and thus recommend this Institute to the favorable consideration of the public, we have to report the following resolution and ask for its adoption:

Resolved, That we recommend to the Board of Trustees of the Wesleyan Female Institute, at Staunton, Va., that no more of the funds belonging to this Conference be expended in the improvement of the grounds or crection of buildings on the same until the debt owing on the same by said Institute be substantially and materially reduced.

### The Valley Female College.

This College is located in Winchester, Virginia, under the presidency of Rev. J. P. Hyde, A. M.

The Visiting Committee report that excellent buildings have been procured for permanent use, in a beautiful and healthful situation.

The examinations at the close of the last year were highly satisfactory.

The College is well equipped for training, with all needed appliances and a full corps of accomplished and experienced teachers.

The comfort and health of the students received marked attention, making the institution truly homelike.

The college is steadily growing in patronage and success.

We heartily commend the college to the patronage of our people, as a place where they may safely entrust their daughters for social, moral, religious and intellectual culture.

#### Mount Farco Institute.

Mount Parvo Institute, situated at Charlestown, Jefferson County, West Va., is most cordially recommended to the patronage of our people, for the education of young ladies. Mrs Belle Galleher and Miss Augusta V. Wilson, who are in charge of this enterprise, are eminently qualified for the work in which they are engaged. We recommend the appointment of a Visiting Committee.

Resolved, That the Bishop of this Conference be requested to appoint visitors to Randolph Macon College, Wesleyan Female Institute, Valley Female College, and Mount Parvo Institute, at Charlestown, West Va.

Will it be composed mostly of those now in our Sunday Schools, and will these be efficient only in the measure of their previous training? Could we realize this to be true, I am sure we would be more careful and prayerful in our methods, both of teaching and training. We of to-day are serving our generation in preparing them to take our places in the Lord's harvest field of to-morrow.

#### Observations.

Only a few observations may show this fact.

Is the Church of to-day much more than the Sunday School of yesterday? Very few of the men and women, especially in the working force of to-day's Church, but were trained in the Sunday School of yesterday. It is computed that nine of ten now converted and brought into the Church come from the Sunday School It is often, too, that the Gospel finds way to an ungodly home through the Sunday School child, and the child leads the man to Christ, and then to the Sunday School for further training in the knowledge of the truth as it is in Christ.

#### Use in Christian Training.

Here too may we find a most efficient agency in training youthful piety, and developing the best form of christian character.

The Sunday School teacher, with his class of a half dozen or more committed to his care, has the best opportunity to inquire into the spiritual condition of each; and by judicious methods kindle "the smoking flax" into flame, lift up the "hanging hands," strengthen the "feeble knees," and make straight paths for their feet; so that the lamest even may not "be turned out of the way." Where can the pastors of the present day find better helpers in their pastoral work than these teachers in their Sunday Schools?

May we not by this means supplement the work given to the class-leaders of the Church? Sunday School teachers should faithfully pastorate those committed to their classes. Surely we need a more watchful care over the young souls in the Church, that in every way they may become fitted for the Master's use; ready for every good word and work.

All other preparations will be in vain, if the heart, with its own experience of a personal Saviour, be not in the work.

It certainly behooves us to consider well our possibilities and opportunities of making the Church of to-morrow much more aggressive and efficient than the Church of to-day.

Our little ones of to-day are to be the "mighty men of valour" of to-morrow; who, being trained in head and heart, and disciplined in life, shall go up to-besiege and capture not one city; to turn not one people to the Lord, but to-turn the kingdoms of the earth to the Lord our Righteousness; and fulfil the prophecy of the Son's dwelling in the uttermost parts of the earth, and possessing the heathen for an inheritance.

These may be made so efficient that "one shall chase a thousand, and two-put ten thousand to flight."

#### Norma! Class.

The Sunday School is the Normal Class of the Church in training for the Church work of the future.

We can but think the coming Church will be what the present trainers make it.

We would therefore make the following suggestions:

1st. That recognizing a well-known principle in teaching, viz: "That a child is taught the abstract through the concrete—first rules then principles"—we urge superintendents to have the "Ten Commandments" and "Apostles' Creed" thoroughly committed to memory and often repeated by the whole school.

Also that time be found in the exercises for a lesson in our Catechisms, where the Bible doctrines, as we most heartily believe them, are set forth.

- 2d. That teachers in charge of classes "watch for souls, as they that must give an account," and by class conversation, personal intercourse, home visitations, and by praying with and for them, lead them into a genuine experience of personal salvation; and unto the higher attainments of christian love.
- 3d. That all our schools be formed into missionary societies, to practically train all persons therein in systematic benevolence, and so fulfil God's own charge to his people: "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat in mine house," &c.—Mal., 3:10.
- . A constitution for such societies may be obtained by application to Rev. I. G. John, D. D., Mission Rooms, Nashville, Tenn.

We rejoice at the continued prosperity of our Sunday School work. With gratitude we note that so many of our older people are entering the Sunday Schools for systematic Bible study.

#### Statistics

The increase in our Sunday School membership during the past year is 1640. The number of conversions, 1677, is a grateful fact; and there are not now many of accountable age who are not in the Church.

#### Sunday School Gatherings.

Our Sunday School gatherings, as at our District Conferences, Institutes and 'Teachers' Meetings, are doing much to further this work.

We would respectfully request all our Presiding Elders to give one whole day at the District Conference to this subject; and by suitable sermons or addresses, to impart instruction to both teachers and scholars.

We trust the Institute will find its place in every charge, as it has been most potent for good where used. A weekly Teachers' Meeting we deem indispensable to teachers who desire the best attainments in their art.

## Sunday School Convention.

The Annual Convention of the Baltimore Conference Sunday School Society we again commend to all our Sunday School workers, and urge as full an attendance upon its sessions as possible. The "Order of Exercises" for its next meeting, to be held at Winchester, Va., July 5th-8th, 1897, has been submitted to us, and we cordially adopt it, but deem it unnecessary to incorporate it in this Report.

#### Fund for Needy Schools.

The Fund for needy Sunday Schools, intrusted to a special committee, has been judiciously distributed and much benefit has been derived therefrom.

Instead of a detailed report, we think it necessary to state only the amount expended during the past year and the amount in hand. Expended upon new and needy Schools, \$435.85. Balance in hand, \$746.79.

We would recommend two resolutions:

1st Resolved, That immediately upon the adjournment of this session of the Conference, the newly appointed Sunday School Board be and is hereby instructed to meet for organization, and to elect a Treasurer to take charge of this Fund; and is also instructed to appoint five of its members a Committee to disburse the same upon conditions they may adjudge right.

2d. Resolved, That a "Children's Day" be observed upon the Third Sunday in May, as far as practicable, and a collection taken, (this is the order of the General Conference,) one half of which may be used by the School itself, and the other half forwarded to the Treasurer of this Board for needy Sunday Schools.

We would again call attention to the Library question, and the necessity of Sunday School supplies; and offer the following resolutions:

1st. Resolved, That we ask pastors and superintendents of Schools to secure suitable books for both adults and children by the formation of library societies or otherwise, and supply a fund with which to regularly replenish their libraries.

3d. Resolved, That our Schools be thoroughly furnished with our periodicals published at Nashville.

#### V.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Conference Board of Church Extension is gratified to report a slight advance in the receipts from assessments for this purpose during the past year over any one of the preceding years of its existence.

While the percentage received compares favorably with the amounts reported from other conferences in our connection, it is yet to be regretted that we have not more nearly realized the total amount assessed for this important object.

During the present session the following amounts have been appropriated for the erection and completion of churches: To White's Gap Church, Fairfield Circuit, Roanoke District, \$250, \$370 asked for; to Fort-Spring, Hillsdale Mission, Lewisburg District, \$200, \$250 asked for; to Boyce, Berryville Circuit, Winchester District, \$100, \$200 asked for: to Tom's Brook, Strasburg Mission, Winchester District, \$75, \$100 asked for; to Centenary Church, South Branch Circuit, Moorefield District, \$50, \$90 asked for; to Bennett's Chapel, Warren Circuit, Winchester District, \$150, \$300 asked for; to Manassas, Sudley Mission, Washington District, \$100, \$100 asked for; to Brookfield, Maldorff and Prince George's Circuit, East Baltimore District, \$50, \$100 asked for; to Hott Chapel, Hardy Circuit, Moorefield District, \$25, \$50 asked for.

During the four years since the organization of our Conference Board \$8,100 have been raised for Church Extension purposes. One-half of this sum, according to the requirement of the discipline, has been transmitted to the Parent Board at Louisville; the remainder has been devoted to local uses.

Material aid had thus been extended to thirty-two churches within our bounds. Many of these churches would not have been built at all but for the timely help thus afforded; others have been relieved of incumbrances that greatly impeded their usefulness, the removal of which has started them upon a fresh career of prosperity.

The practical good that has resulted from this new movement of the church during the first quadrennium of its existence must be apparent to all. What is true of our local board is true to a much greater extent of the operations of the Parent Board. While we have been meeting, as far as possible, the demands of our home territory, a grand work has been going on in the multiplication of churches along the frontier lines of the rapidly growing west, thus greatly extending our denominational area and influence. It will be seen, by the Fourth Annual Report of the Parent Board, that since the date of its organization, \$145,242.28 have been expended chiefly in this manner. It is to be regretted that domestic affliction detains from the Conference, Dr. David Morton, the General Secretary, and thus deprives us of the more minute information he could furnish, as well as his personal advocacy of the cause so ably represented by him.

The communication from the Parent Board, referred to us, calls attention to the annuity feature incorporated by the last General Conference into the Constitution of the Board, and which is described in Article VI, paragraph 167, of the Discipline. We think it only necessary to commend this new feature to your consideration, as affording a convenient method for increasing the loan facilities of the Board.

The late General Conference also inaugurated a Women's Department of Church Extension, the special object of which is to promote the purchase and erection of parsonages—an object unprovided for by the general plan of operations.

In accordance with the Article XII, paragraph 162, we have taken the initiative in connection with this work in our own Conference by the following appointments:

# VII.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee on Temperance respectfully report that after careful consideration, believing that the wise, Methodistic and Scriptural Report on Temperance, unanimously adopted by this Conference at its last session in March, 1886, cannot be improved, we unanimously recommend that the Conference reaffirm said report and direct its re-publication in the minutes, as follows:

"Resolved 1., That the attitude of our Church and of this Conference upon the subject of Temperance has not at any time been doubtful or undecided. From the beginning, Methodism has always prohibited 'the drinking spirituous liquors except in cases of necessity;' and when scarce any other voicewas heard, her preachers, both in this country and in Great Britain, in the face of general opposition and often of persecution, unsparingly denounced.

intemperance in common with all other vices and sins, as condemned by God's word, and prohibited by the Church. From this course Church and Conference have never departed, and to this, our constant and unshrinking proclamation of the truth, we believe, is largely if not principally due, all the temperance sentiment that now prevails in our country.

- "2. That we rejoice in the extension of that sentiment among the people at large, and pray that it may completely prevail through the length and breadth of the land until the iniquitous liquor traffic, with all its guilt and crime, and all its ruinous consequences to every human interest in the world, and to the souls eternally hereafter, shall be utterly and forever suppressed.
- "3. That in imitation of the fathers, and relying on the same God, who, through them, by the preached word, wrought so great things for Temperance as for all righteousness, we will continue to preach against intemperance, and to use all other proper means to secure such suppression, and to establish temperance in the land. And we especially call attention in this connection to the provisions of the Discipline made and provided for this very purpose, as contained in the chapter on Temperance and in answer to the question, 'What shall be done for the extirpation of the great evil of intemperance? and remind our people that this is the authoritative declaration, on this subject, of our supreme and only legislative body.
- "4. That we urge our preachers and people everywhere to acquaint themselves with the history as well as with the existing provisions of our Church and Conference respecting temperance, and to represent the same wherever our position and action on this subject are either unknown or are not properly understood.
- "5. That in so far as their work may be in harmony with these resolutions, we commend those various organizations of Christian men and women who are laboring in the cause of temperance.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

The Committee on Publishing Interests submit their Report as follows:

#### The Publishing House.

The statements of the agent and business manager, and report of the Book Committee, represent the House to be in a thoroughly prosperous condition. The "sole" debt due by the House is \$80,550, outstanding in four per cent\_

bonds, as against \$225,724.01 four years ago. The total business in all departments from April, 1882, to April, 1886, amounted to \$960,617.14. The House buys and sells on the basis of "cash, or its equivalent," so that no new debts are being made.

We heartily endorse the management of the House, and commend it to the continued patronage of our people.

We realize the need of colporteurs to travel through our bounds to sell and gratuitously distribute religious books and tracts, and to visit and hold religious services in destitute neighborhoods, and families, where the regular pastor can but seldom, if at all, visit. We therefore offer the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Presiding Elders of Districts be and are hereby requested to secure a suitable person as a colporteur in their respective Districts—making such arrangements with each colporteur as to time and remuneration as is in their power, and as their judgment decides best.

#### Book Depository.

The Book Depository, under the management of Rev. B. F. Ball, and situate in the city of Baltimore, Md., meets a want recognized by perhaps a large majority of our preachers and members. Brother Ball is to be commended for his zeal and enterprise in constantly increasing his facilities for supplying our people with Methodist and general literature. Your Committee request that he be re-appointed to his present work, and bespeak for him the support that such an appointment must warrant him in expecting.

#### The Christian Advocate.

This, the general organ of Southern Methodism, deserves the universal patronage of the Church. Its place cannot be filled by any other periodical in our connection. We are gratified to learn that nearly all our effective preachers are regular readers of this paper, and that its subscription list had run up to 26,808, April 1, 1886.

We are in sympathy with the movement now on foot to secure a subscription list of 50,000 names, and, to attain this end, we request the members of this Conference to use every available, legitimate means to secure subscriptions in their respective charges.

#### Missionary Papers.

The "Advocate of Missions," and the "Woman's Missionary Advocate," render an indispensable service in our Missionary enterprise. We must look to them principally for that information concerning our Foreign Missions, which is necessary to give increased interest in this work, and to stimulate the Church to go forward to the conversion of the world. We therefore commend these publications to our people, and solicit their liberal support.

#### Southern Methodist Review.

We have been very much gratified to learn of the great increase in the circulation of this Review since it has changed hands, having trebled its circulation. We cordially recommend the Southern Review, now edited by Rev. W. P. Harrison, D. D., to our preachers and members, and trust that this important periodical may still have an increasing circulation throughout our entire territory.

#### THE EPISCOPAL METHODIST.

Your Committee regrets to learn of the limited circulation of the Episcopal Methodist within the bounds of our Conference. This is our home paper, published for the special benefit of our Conference, and by one of our preachers, appointed to that special work, which facts we believe give this paper special claims upon our preachers and people. Recognizing its importance and helpfulness in every department of our work, we would urge its introduction into every Methodist home in our connection. We therefore most heartily endorse the publication and management of the Episcopal Methodist, and request the re-appointment of Rev. W. K. Boyle, D. D., as Editor.

# REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.

To the Bishop and Members of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South.

#### Dear Fathers and Brethren:

There has been no period, since the organization of the Woman's Missionary Society, when the needs were more urgent, or the circumstances more favorable, for the continuance of such work among our christian women, than at this time. We think the following facts a proof of this statement:

1st. The testimony of Bishop Wilson and others in our mission fields, in regard to the successful growth and progress in this department of the work, and the multiplied advantages and necessities for more extended undertakings.

2d. The quick and prompt response of the eight candidates in answer to the appeals for more missionaries.

3d. The willingness of our Brethren of the Ministry to assist in every way to promote the interests of the cause; and the faithful vigilance and patient effort on the part of some of our members.

4th. The Master's seal of approval upon the work of our hands, and the blessing that has come to the hearts of those carnestly engaged in the work.

During the past year ten new Auxiliaries were organized; and other societies report additional members. While these accessions do not give us a large increase in membership, an encouraging feature—pro rata, more money has been raised.

We are grateful to note an increase in number of Juvenile Societies, and general interest manifested among our young people; this we think a healthful sign, and gives promise of future strength and growth.

One great hindrance to the work in our Conference Society, has been a failure to secure District Secretaries, upon which officer much effective work depends. At the Annual Meeting last October, we thought active workers were elected to fill this position in the several Districts, but all, with the exception of one, declined. Since then, effort has been made to fill the vacancies, but as yet only two Districts have been supplied. Then in many places our ladies need words of encouragement and assistance, to make effective and permanent the societies already organized, and to further enlist the sympathies, gifts and prayers of other christian sisters, so that in every congregation, wherever practicable, we may have Auxiliaries established. In the accomplishment of this we earnestly seek your wise counsel and hearty co-operation, trusting through grace to prove ourselves ever ready and willing to enter the doors God opens to us, in this great work, until "His kingdom shall extend from the rivers unto the sea," and "all the earth shall be filled with His glory."

# SPECIAL NOTES.

In addition to the \$342, reported by St. Paul's Church, Baltimore, for Missions on assessments, the following amounts were raised, viz: \$1,908 for St. Paul's Mission; special contribution to woman's work in China, \$100; Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, \$101; special bequest of \$600 by Miss Sophia Price, a member of St. Paul's, to Foreign Missions.

Of the \$858, raised by Trinity, in Baltimore, on the regular assessments, \$40 are to be applied for educating a child in China, named Achsa Wilkins—the second year; and \$20—special contribution—to assist in sending a Missionary to China.

In addition, \$50 were raised for educating a child in Mexico; \$703 by the Woman's Missionary Society; \$103 for Home Mission Work in the Sunday School; \$125 for Home Mission Work in Church by Woman's Bethel, making a total of \$1,819 in the Station, for Missions.

Of the \$272, contributed by Staunton for Foreign Missions, \$50 were contributed by the Sunday School at Wesleyan Female Institute. Of the total amount raised, \$42.70 were designed especially to be used on the Old Debt of the Parent Board. Of this same total, \$40 were raised by the "Busy Bees," a Juvenile Missionary Society of the Station, to continue the education of a child in China, known by the name of Mollie Carroll.




