Wolff, John W. Wolfe, W. Eggleston Woolf, were examined and passed.

Conference proceeded to complete its unfinished business in the Election of Delegates to the General Conference.

The Secretary and Tellers for the Lay members reported the result of the fourth ballot. Whole number of ballots cast, 20. Necessary to a choice, 11.

Amos L. Pugh received 12 votes; Joseph P. Houck, 6; J. B. Wilson and J. A. Robinson, 1 vote each. Whereupon, the President declared Amos L. Pugh elected Lay Delegate to the General Conference.

It was determined by the Conference to elect four Reserve Lay Delegates tothe General Conference, and that the four receiving the highest number of votes should be declared elected.

The Tellers, together with J. P. Stump, one of the Secretaries, retired to count the votes.

A second ballot for Clerical Delegates was cast. The Tellers having counted the ballots in the presence of the Conference, reported: Whole number of ballots cast, 146. Necessary to a choice, 74.

On motion, the Tellers, together with G. T. Tyler, one of the Secretaries, were permitted to retire to an adjacent room to count the vote.

Report on Fire Insurance—The report of the Committee on Fire Insuranceupon Churches, appointed at the last Session of the Conference, was presented. and read, and on motion it was adopted.

On nomination, G. H. Zimmerman was elected Treasurer of the Baltimore Conference Fire Relief Association.

The Secretary and Tellers for the Lay Delegates to the General Conference-reported: Whole number of votes cast, 15. Necessary to a choice, 8.

James Chalmers, having received 12 votes; John E. Crout, Joseph P. Houck, 9 votes each; Rev. J. Edgar Wilson, 8 votes, were declared by the President elected Reserve Delegates to the General Conference.

Second Clerical Ballot—The Secretary and Tellers for the Clerical Delegates to the General Conference having counted the votes on the second ballot reported: David Bush received 80 votes; Sydnor G. Ferguson, 62; James E. Armstrong, 24; Robert R. S. Hough, 23; Peter H. Whisner, 22; W. H. D. Harper, 20; Sam'l K. Cox, 14; Collins Denny, 13; John S. Hutchison, 11; J. Hoffman Waugh, 8; Scattering, 9. Whereupon the President declared David Bush elected Clerical Delegate to the General Conference.

A third ballot for Clerical Delegates was cast. Whole number of votes cast, 148. Necessary to a choice, 75.

Question Twentieth—Question Twentieth of the General Minutes. The character of S. N. Tucker was examined and passed. His Presiding Elder reported that he had withdrawn. The name of S. N. Tucker was entered upon the Journal withdrawn.

The Secretary and Tellers for Clerical Delegates having counted the votes on the third ballot, reported: Sydnor G. Ferguson received 88 votes; James E. Armstrong, 15; Peter H. Whisner, 12; W. H. D. Harper, 10; J. S. Hutchinson. 6; S. K. Cox, 6; R. R. S. Hough, 4; Scattering, 10. Whereupon the President declared that Sydnor G. Ferguson had been elected Delegate to the General Conference.

The Clerical Members of the Conference proceeded to elect Reserve Delegates to the General Conference,

On motion, Resolved, that the four members receiving the highest number of votes be declared elected Reserve Delegates. The Clerical Members cast their ballots, and the Secretary and Tellers retired to count the vote.

Sunday School Board—The Report of the Sunday School Board was presented and read. The Report of the Treasurer of the Sunday School Board was presented and read.

Publishing Interests—The Report of the Committee on Publishing Interests was presented and read, and on motion it was adopted.

Bishop Wilson took the chair.

Bible Cause—Report of Committee on the Bible Cause was presented and d, and on motion it was adopted.

Bishop Duncan took the chair.

The Secretary and Tellers for the Clerical ballot for Reserve Delegates to the General Conference having counted the votes, reported as follows: James E. Armstrong received 82 votes; Robert R. S. Hough, 68; Wm. H. D. Harper, 58; Peter H. Whisner, 57; Collins Denny, 50; S. K. Cox, 48; J. H. Waugh, 42; J. S. Hutchinson, 42; B. W. Bond, 21; W. K. Boyle, 15; J. T. Williams, 14; J. C. Dice, 10; G. H. Zimmerman, 8; J. W. Duffey, 8; J. W. Shoaff, 7; H. P. Hamill, 6; W. J. Young, 5; Scattering, 34. Whereupon the President declared that James E. Armstrong, Robert R. S. Hough, Wm. H. D. Harper, Peter H. Whisner, were elected Reserve Delegates to the General Conference.

Leave of absence was granted to A. R. Martin during the remaining part of the session.

Church Extension.—The Report of the Board of Church Extension, together with the Treasurer's Report, were presented and read.

On motion the time of the session was extended.

On motion Conference determined that when it adjourn, it adjourn to meet this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The following Resolution was presented and read, and on motion it was adopted:

MEMOIRS.

Rev. LEWIS CAPERTON MILLER.

The true record of every faithful servant of God is on high. There; in an eminent sense, "The righteous shall be in everlasting remembrance." But it is fitting that a memorial of them shall be preserved on the earth, both as a merited recognition of their worth, and an inspiring stimulus to others to follow in their footsteps.

We are but in the line of the highest of all examples and records when we consecrate a part of each session and of our Conference Minutes to these posthumous tributes to glorified virtue and excellance.

Among the brethern who during the past year have left our ranks for their seats in glory, none deserves worthier notice than Lewis Caperton Miller.

He was born at Salt Sulphur Springs, Monroe County, West Virginia, January 1st, 1840, and died at Harrisonburg, Virginia, April 25th, 1889, in the 50th year of his age.

In 1854, at the age of 14 years, he united with the M. E. Church, under the ministry of Rev. Joseph Aiken, of blessed memory. In 1861, he volunteered as a member of Lowry's Battery, one of the first companies that left Monroc County for the Confederate army. In 1862, he was appointed Chaplain in Genl. Gordon's brigade from Georgia. In 1863, with Rev. A. A. P. Neel, he entered at Churchville, Augusta County, Virginia, Baltimore Conference, still remaining, however, in the Chaplaincy. In 1864, he entered the active work of the Conference, and was appointed to White Sulphur Springs. In 1865, he was ordained Deacon by Bishop Early, at Salem, Virginia, and appointed as junior preacher to Salem Circuit. In 1866, he was junior preacher on Rockville Circuit. He was ordained Elder by Bishop Pierce at Trinity, Baltimore, in 1867, and appointed successively in 1867 '68 and '69, to Severn Circuit. In 1870 and '71, he had charge of Howard Chapel, a missionary enterprise, in connection with Trinity Church, Baltimore, and during part of the time filled a vacancy at Trinity. In 1872 and '73, he was assigned to Warrenton, and from 1874 to '76, inclusive, to Martinsburg, West Virginia. The two succeeding years he had charge of Laurel Circuit. During this period, he was married. October 31, 1878, to Miss Ada Pilson, daughter of Robert Pilson, Esq., who survives and mourns his departure. In 1879, he was appointed to Loudoun Circuit. The four following years were spent in the pastorate of the Lexington Church. In 1884, he was assigned to the charge of Harrisonburg Station, and remained through the full disciplinary term of four years. He was compelled occasionally, on account of enfeebled health, to suspend his pulpit labors, but would resume them with the slightest improvement in his condition. At the close of his ministry in Harrisonburg, his physician and friends urged him to abandon for awhile, at least, the active work of his calling and seek rest. This, however, he would not consent to do. Impelled by a desire to fill up the full measure of his obligation, and to "finish the ministry he had received of the Lord Jesus," he insisted on taking an appointment at the ensuing Annual Conference, and was assigned to the charge of Woodstock and Edinburg. But the worst fears of his friends were realized. His waning strength proved unequal to the task, and before the year expired he was compelled to resign his charge and seek relief from the responsibilities and toils of the ministry. Returning to Harrisonburg, where many and warm friends welcomed his return, he engaged in a light, secular occupation that promised a moderate support. After a few months his disease took a fatal turn, and rapidly terminated his mortal life. From a pulmonary it became also a cerebral disorder, the formation of tubercles in the membranes of the brain causing him intense agony, and hasting the end. He was confined to his bed only ten or twelve days, but it was a period of most acute suffering, mitigated only by the use of the strongest opiates, until at last he lapsed into a state of unconsciousness that continued till his death.

Our brother was then deprived of the power of giving expression to his christian faith and hope in his closing hour; but his consistent and consecrated life furnished the most satisfactory evidence of his readiness "to depart and be with Christ." Long before the last hour came his title was assured to the Heavenly inheritance, and it mattered but little in what form the Death

Angel might transfer him to its full fruition.

Surely, 'tis not what men may say
When death is near, that makes their way
A path of triumph to the throne;
'Tis what they are, and what they've done,
The battles they have fought and won,
Through Christ, Who gives them passports—these alone.

Brother Miller's pulpit ministrations were characterized by careful preparation, earnestness of manner, and a forcible, impassioned delivery. He carried no "unbeaten oil" into the sanctuary. The subject under review was thoroughly examined, and the results of his thought and study committed to writing. He always carried his manuscript into the pulpit, but did not confine himself to an exact and slavish reproduction of the words he had written. He entered the pulpit saturated with his theme, and so intensely absorbed did he at times become that his enthusiasm bore him beyond the limits of his physical strength. No man could have more truthfully appropriated the language of the Psalmist: "The zeal of Thy house hath eaten me up." That his life was shortened by his burning ardor, and its excessive expression and effort, cannot be doubted. He was bold and fearless in the proclamation of truth and the exposure of vice and wickedness in all their forms. Sin found no hiding place under the searching scrutiny of his penetrating speech; while hypocrisy, formalism and worldly-mindedness in the church were stripped of their disguises with an unsparing hand. And yet, brother Miller was a popular preacher. Men admired his honesty, and were thrilled by his earnest and eloquent presentation of the Truth. Wherever he labored, his faithful work was fruitful in good results.

In Harrisonburg, where he closed his life, he was not only endeared to the people of his former charge, but held in high esteem by the members of other churches, and the community at large. This was evident from the crowded concourse in attendance upon his obsequies, notwithstanding the storminess of the weather. The funeral service was held in the M. E. Church, South, in Harrisonburg, April 20, 1889. Rev. Samuel Rodgers, D. D., and Rev. S. K. Cox, delivered brief addresses, and Rev. B. F. Ball, with the several ministers of the town, participated in the remaining exercises.

"Our brother rests—rests from his earthly toil, But still he serves 'mid higher ranks above; Ranging the wide, supernal realms of light, And raptured ever by the smile of God."

Rev. GILSON MAUZY.

The subject of this memorial notice, son of Peter and Sarah Mauzy, was born in Fauquier county, Va., September 17th, 1814, and died October 28th, 1889, having compassed three quarters of a century in his earthly life.

Brother Mauzy was converted September 15th, 1847, and soon thereafter joined the M. E. Church, South. During the following year he was licensed to preach. In 1850, he served on Stafford Mission as a supply, and was admitted on trial into the Virginia Conference in 1851. He was continued that year on the Stafford Mission. In 1852 he was assigned to Springfield and South Branch Circuit. On the 30th of October, 1853, he was ordained Deacon by Bishop Paine, at Lynchburg, Va., and appointed to Orange Circuit. where he remained two years. December 2, 1855, he was ordained Elder by Bishop James R. Andrew, at Petersburg, Va., and during that and the following years had charge of Culpepper Circuit. 1857 and '58 he was appointed to Caroline, and 1859 and '60 to King George's Circuit. On the 30th of November, 1860, he was granted a local relation, in which he continued for several years, in the meantime rendering much substantial service to the church. In 1866, he, with the charge he was then serving, was transferred to the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South. He served successively upon the following charges: In 1870, on Newcastle Circuit; in 1871, on Prince William; in 1872 and '73, on Calvert; in 1874, on West River; in 1875 and '76, on Bridgewater; in 1877 and '78, on Woodstock and Edinburg; in 1879 and '80, on Sudley Mission; and in 1881 and '82, on Occoquan Circuit.

In March, 1883, at the session of the Conference held at Charlestown. W. Va., he was granted a Supernumerary Relation, and during that year assisted

Rev. J. W. Wolf on Fauquier Circuit.

In March, 1884, he was placed on the Superannuated list, where he remained till the day of his death, which took place at his home in Mt.

Sidney, Augusta county, Va., on the date above mentioned.

Brother Mauzy was an earnest and successful minister of Christ. He was clear and sound in his exegesis of the truth, and forcible in its presentation. His powerful and well-modulated voice gave effectiveness to his delivery, especially in large assemblies, while his love for souls found expression in pathetic and persuasive appeals that reached the hearts of men. He was imbued with the spirit of his calling, and, under God, was "wise to win souls." The seal of the Divine approval was upon his ministry; and now that he "rests from his labors, his works do follow him."

Brother R. M. Wheeler, who was with him during his last illness, says that he often spoke of his labors and successes in the ministry, recalling many circumstances of interest in connection with his itinerant life. The foretokenings of his death were unmistakable for some days before the fatal event occurred, but did not in the least disturb his perfect composure of spirit.

"The Gospel he had preached so long. Was his support in death."

Often he would give utterance to such ejaculations as these: "I am ready," "I am waiting," "I am on the watch-tower." Shortly before he lost the power of speech, he said to Brother Wheeler: "Give my love to all the brethren." That message of affection is borne to you to-day, and it borrows tenfold tenderness from the circumstance that the lips which framed it can speak to you no more till they greet you at the gates of the New Jerusalem, and share in your welcome to its everlasting joys.

Rev. GEORGE ROBERT JEFFERSON.

All memorial notices link together the two extremes of human life—one's entrance into this world and his exit from it. Bro. Jefferson was born in Talbot County, Maryland, July 28, 1833, and died at his home near Parnassus,

Augusta County, Virginia, January 2, 1890, in the 57th year of his age. was converted when about 14 years of age, and connected himself with the Methodist Church in Baltimore, under the ministry of the now sainted Dr. John S. Martin. The Sunday after, he united with the Sunday School, in which he afterwards served as teacher and superintendent. He also sustained to the church of his early choice, the relation of class leader and exhorter.

His preaching license bears date December 10, 1853, and the signature of C. B. Tippett, as Presiding Elder. In 1855, he was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference; was ordained deacon by Bishop Scott, in Baltimore city, March 8, 1857, and elder by Bishop Simpson, in Winchester, Virginia, March 4, 1860.

In 1863, he was united in marriage to Miss Sallie M. Whitmore, of Augusta County, Virginia, who with unswering devotion shared with him the joys and sorrows of life, and now mourns the loss of an affectionate and faithful hus-

In 1867, he was assistant to Rev. H. A. Gaver, on E. Rockingham Circuit. In 1868, he was appointed to Frederick Circuit, Winchester District; in 1869, was junior preacher under Rev. Jno. W. Woolf, in Woodstock Circuit, and in 1870 and 71, sustained the same relation to Rev. J. J. Engle on the Church-He continued at this appointment for another year, under Rev. A. A. Eskridge. In 1873, on account of affliction that disabled him from doing the full work of an itinerant, he was granted a supernumerary relation, in which he continued till called home to his everlasting rest. His appointment, from year to year, as supernumerary, meant all that that designation implied. He was always ready to render aid to the preacher-in-charge, whenever circumstances demanded and his strength allowed. The latter years of his life were spent at his quiet home near Parnassus, Virginia, where he made a comfortable support for his family by the practice of surgeon dentistry, and the products of his farm. No man in the community did more for the support of the church and her institutions than did Bro. Jefferson, according to his ability. He was especially interested in the cause of missions, and contributed liberally to the furtherance of this great enterprise.

Rev. R. M. Wheeler says, in a memorial notice of him:

"I was intimately associated with him for nearly two years preceding his death, and during all that time found him a true christian brother, a faithful co-laborer, a safe counsellor, and a warm personal friend. His hands, heart

and home were at all times open to my necessities."

Early last spring he was stricken down with heart disease, attended by complications which battled medical skill, and finally resulted in his death. Though he suffered greatly, he never murmured, bearing patiently the discipline through which his Father in Heaven was maturing his spirit for its final and blessed abode. Frequently during his illness he said it did not concern him whether he recovered or not, that matter was in the hands of God, and that through His grace he was prepared for whatever issue He might At noon, January 2d, while sitting in his chair and conversing with his physician, he suddenly expired.

His funeral was attended by a large number of sorrowing kindred and The services were conducted by Rev. Dr. Samuel Rodgers and Rev. R. M. Wheeler. His body was laid to rest in the Parnassus burial ground, by the side of Addie, his only child, who had preceded him to the better land. There he has doubtless already rejoined her, with many of his associates in the ministry of the Word "who, through faith and patience, have inherited

the promises."

Rev. WILLIAM T. QUINN.

Rev. William T. Quinn was born in Princess Anne, Somerset County, Maryland, November 13th, 1828, and died February 26th, 1890, in Baltimore, Maryland.

He was the son of Rev. William and Mrs. Rebecca Quinn. His father was an honored member of the Philadelphia Conference, of the Methodist Episcopal Church. His mother died during his infancy, and he was taken by his grand parents, James and Susan Hopkins, of Kent Island, Queen Anne's County, Maryland. They were Methodists, and devoutly pious people, under whose roof Mr. Asbury and many of the pioneers were hospitably entertained.

Brother Quinn gave his heart to God in early childhood, and at the age of twelve years, united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1849, he received exhorter's license, and was appointed class leader. In 1856, he was recommended to the Philadelphia Conference, and was received on trial, and appointed junior preacher with Rev. Geo. Heacock on the Millington Circuit. In 1857, he was appointed junior preacher with Rev. John W. Pierson, on Easton Circuit. 1n 1858, he was again appointed junior preacher with Rev. John W. Pierson, on Sudlersville Circuit. In 1859, he was appointed junior preacher with Rev. James A. Massie, on Anna Messeck's Circut. In 1860-61, he was appointed preacher in charge of Berlin Circuit. The appointment for 1862 could not be ascertained. In 1863, he was appointed preacher in charge of Hillsboro Circuit, Caroline County, Maryland. After traveling this work one year his health declined, and he took a supernumerary relation. In 1864, he severed his connection with the Methodist Episcopal Church, for the purpose of uniting with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. In this movement Brother Quinn "was as bold in action as he was firm in his convictions." Having united with this Conference, he was appointed to Sinking Creek Circuit in 1868-69; 1870, to Catawba; 1871-72, Frankford; 1873-74, Union; 1875-76-77. Covington; 1878-79, Prince George's; 1880, Upper Botetourt; 1881-82, Amsterdam. Again his health failed, and he was granted a supernumerary relation, which continued four years. In 1887, he was appointed to Alvon, and in 1889, Collierstown. This, said he to Brother Shoaff, "closes the chapter.'

Brother Quinn was educated in the public schools. On Kent Island, in the Chesapeake, where "he was brought up," his memory is blessed by those who knew him in boyhood. They speak of him in fond and endearing terms.

He was twice married. First in 1859, to Miss Maggie Anderson, daughter of James Anderson, of Easton, Maryland, who died November 16, 1868. By this marriage there were four children, all of whom preceded their mother "to the other world."

The second marriage was to Miss Lizzie Peck, daughter of Lewis Peck, Esq., of Giles County, Virginia, who died October 26, 1884. There were

seven children by this union, six of whom survive their father.

Brother Quinn was not a man of robust make. He was more than medium height, lean, and of delicate appearance. He had a piercing black eye, shaded by a heavy brow. His face bore the mark of "true christian manhood." He was characterized by sincerity, simplicity, humility, independence and courage. He was a good preacher. He made careful preparation for his pulpit work. He was Wesleyan, scriptural, clear and practical. His ministry was not barren.

Shortly after Conference he took a dose of medicine through mistake,

which brought on the trouble that resulted in his death.

His suffering was intense, nothwithstanding he continued to work, as best he could, until October; from that time he was not able to work. He was advised to go to Baltimore for special treatment. He went, and on New Year's Eve arrived at Emmanual Parsonage, where he was kindly entertained while arrangements were being made for special treatment.

He went to the Presbyterian Eye, Ear, and Throat Infirmary. It was supposed that he had stricture of the throat, but on examination by Dr.

Chisholm, it was found that his disease was of a different nature.

He was advised to put himself under special treatment at the Maryland University Hospital; he did so, but all that human skill could do was unavailing.

He desired life, and cherished the hope that he might again preach the

Gospel, but it was not so ordered.

While able to read, his Bible was his constant companion. Much of his time was spent in devotional reading, and he derived much spiritual pleasure and delight from "The Palms of Elim, by McDuff,"

Brother Quinn was a patient sufferer. On one occasion while enduring the most excruciating pain, he said to a Brother by his side: "If we suffer, we shall also reign with Him." Again, when too weak to talk, in answer to the question, do you feel that all is bright before you? he nodded assent.

At his own request, the funeral obsequies were conducted by Rev. J. Watts Shoaff, on Kent Island, in the Methodist Protestant Church. He was buried with his ancestors in the family burial ground which dates from the earliest Colonial days. Thus ends the mortal life and labor of "a good man."

Rev. ANDREW ROBEY.

Rev. Andrew Robey was born in Loudoun County, Virginia, in 1818, and died in Edinburg, Virginia, March 13, 1890. When a young man he was converted to God, at a camp meeting in his native county, was subsequently licensed as a local preacher on the old Loudoun Circuit, and did good missionary work in the vicinity of his home.

He was received on trial in the Baltimore Conference in 1860, and sent to Shannondale Mission. 1861, he was assigned as second preacher on Berryville Circuit; but located during the year at his home in Loudoun County, Virginia, where he remained during the year, in the local service of the church. 1867, he was re-admitted into the Conference, and for three years traveled on the Shannondale Mission, on the Blue Ridge Mountain. 1870, he was appointed to Stafford Circuit; 1874, to Harper's Ferry Mission; 1875, to Shenandoah Mission; 1876–7, to Port Republic; 1878, to Mt. Sidney; 1879, to Rockingham; 1880, to Capon Bridge; 1881, to Wardensville; 1882–4, to Warren Circuit. He was placed on the Superannuated list in 1885, and settled in Edinburg, Virginia, where he remained until his death. His first wife was Miss Martha E. Strother, of Loudoun County, Virginia. Seven of their children remain. His second wife was Miss Sallie M. Weast, of Augusta County, Virginia, who survives him.

Brother Robey was a man of amiable disposition, and genial and courteous in his bearing towards others. As a preacher he possessed ability, acquaintance with the Word of God and an earnest manner, with frequent touches both of humor and pathos. His ministry was not without fruit, many souls having been brought to God through his instrumentality. His work, for the most part, embraced the harder fields, to which he uncomplainingly went, and preached as faithfully as he was able, the gospel to the poor. The last hours of his life revealed his abiding confidence in Christ, and his last message to his brethren of the Conference, in session at the time of his death, was that of love for them and of the hope of immortality.

II.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

We are most profoundly grateful to the Head of the Church for his continued blessings upon the Sunday Schools within the bounds of our Conference. The review of the work of the past year reveals the gratifying fact that there has been general advancement. While the schools have increased in number only three, the number of scholars and teachers has grown from 40,388 to 41,090, a net increase of 602. Although the membership of the church increased 141, during the past year, more than the Sunday School, yet there are 926 more scholars in the Sunday School, than members in the church. We sincerely hope the day is near when the entire membership of the church will be fully identified with the Sunday School.

The most gratifying feature of the annual report, is that 1,274 of the Sunday School scholars have been converted.

These results are not secured without organized effort and self sacrifice on the part of many. This vineyard of the church requires laborers to till it, who count not dear their ease and time and money, if they may lead the young to the knowledge of Christ, and to be useful members of the church.

The \$9,191 reported as current expenses of the schools, added to the \$717 for supplies in behalf of needy schools, are suggestive of the determined effort on the part of the church to cherish and develop the institution with which she is so intimately and dependently identified.

We call especial attention to the Sunday School Convention, to be held in Staunton, Virginia, during the month of July. "The Sunday School Society of Baltimore Conference." has, by formal action, at its last annual meeting, committed the entire management of the convention to the Sunday School Board, according to disciplinary requirement, (ans. 7, par. 105.) The following committee has been appointed by the Board, to arrange for, and give direction to the convention. By action of the Board, this convention shall be composed of one delegate from each Sunday School numbering less than 100, and two for schools numbering one hundred or over, together with all the superintendents of our schools, and the pastors of the Conference. The convention shall elect its own officers to serve during its session. The following is the committee of arrangement: T. J. Magruder, A. Davisson, J. Edgar Wilson, E. B. Tucker, C. M. Brown, G. D. White, R. Catt, J. M. McWhorter and M. L. Walton.

The hearty co-operation of ministers and laymen, is needed to make the convention as eminently successful as it has been in the years gone by.

Your Board would offer the following suggestions, as conducive to the welfare of the schools within our territory:

1st. That children's day be faithfully observed as directed by the discipline, and collections be taken in behalf of needy schools within the bounds of our Conference.

2d. That teachers' meetings for the study of the lessons, and reserve teachers' classes, be organized and maintained wherever practicable. That in these special classes and meetings for teachers, emphasis be put upon the im-

portance of an experimental knowledge of Christ and the enduement of the Holy Ghost, as requisite qualifications for the important work committed to their care.

3d. That the following executive committee of the Sunday School Board be and are hereby appointed to receive funds and applications for aid to needy schools, and to distribute supplies accordingly. Committee: T. J. Magruder, J. E. McCahan, G. H. Zimmerman, C. M. Brown and G. D. White.

4th. That we emphatically urge the use of our own literature in all our Sunday Schools.

5th. That we recommend the colporteur to be appointed by the Bishop, and request our schools to purchase their supplies from him or his agents.

6th. We call attention to the following Treasurer's report.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Wesleyan Female Institute.

The last year was a very successful one at the Valley Female Institute, Staunton, Virginia. The present session shows an increase in attendance over last year of 40 boarding pupils; and the reports made to your. Board of Education by the President of the Institute, Rev. W. A. Harris, D. D., and by the Conference Committee of Visitors, show the school to be meeting successfully the purpose of its existence. We are glad to note in the reports submitted to your Board, that the standard of scholarships has been raised. There is great need of Christian schools affording to our girls thorough training and broad courses of study. The school providing these, with sound christian influence thrown around the pupils, has a career of success and usefulness open before it.

We commend to the favorable consideration of our people, the Wesleyan Female Institute.

Your Board feels called upon to request the Trustees of the Wesleyan to furnish us from year to year a statement of the amount of money turned over to them under the terms of the lease; the disposition of that money; the sum total of the debt; the probability of the ultimate extinction of that debt, and the preservation to the church of so widely known and useful a school as the Wesleyan Female Institute.

Randolph Macon College.

The Board is glad to learn that notwithstanding the continued financial depression in the agricultural sections from which the patronage of the College is largely drawn, the number of students now enrolled is about the same as that reported last year. This is an evidence of the increased influence and popularity of the College. There are at present 190 students, 49 of whom are from the Baltimore Conference, including 57 ministerial students, 22 of whom are from the Baltimore Conference. If the work now being accomplished, is compared with that of four years ago, it will be seen that its efficiency and importance have been at least doubled in that time. Not only has the number of students advanced from 109 to 190, and the number of ministerial students from 16 to 57, but great advance has also been made in the grade of scholarship and in college discipline and administration. During the present session, the faculty has been increased by the addition of Dr. Jno. L. Buchanan, formerly professor of Latin in Vanderbilt University, to fill the chair of Latin.

Our Conference at its last session, voted to unite with the Virginia Conference in establishing as part of the college, a great academy. The estimated cost was \$65,000, of which \$15,000 was to be raised in our bounds, and \$50,000 in the Virgina Conference. Of this amount, \$41,000 has been secured in the Virginia Conference, including \$15,000 in grounds and appurtenances, and \$6,000 in our Conference, \$4,600 of which was subscribed at our last session in Alexandria, and \$1,400 by Arlington Station, Baltimore District.

We are glad to know that the work on the academy has been pushed with energy and success, and that it will be opened next September, for the reception of pupils. We believe that this enterprise will add greatly to the usefulness of the college, and will work an era in the history of education in the South. The Virginia Conference has contributed, up to this time, \$110,000 toward the permanent endowment fund of the college, and \$10,000 toward this fund has so far been secured in our Conference. It is hoped to increase these amounts to \$150,000 and \$50,000, respectively. We believe that it is of urgent importance to complete these sums, as already resolved by the vote of the Conference last year, and in every way to sustain the college in its present advanced position.

We therefore recommend that the members of the Conference co-operate heartily with President Smith in whatever efforts he may make to raise the funds in the bounds of our Conference, and that we continue, through the Joint Board of Finance, the annual assessment of \$2,000, for the benefit of the college.

Valley Female College.

Your Board have heard with pleasure of the increased prosperity of the Valley Female College under the presidency of Rev. J. P. Hyde, D. D. The Visiting Committee report the examinations as being, thorough and in all respects satisfactory. We are glad to note an increase in the number of boarding pupils in attendance the present session. The President has associated with him a corps of thoroughly qualified teachers who love their work, and who by their untiring efforts have largely assisted him in effecting the good work done by the College in the past.

The homelife of this Institution being under the immediate supervision of Dr. Hyde's wife, is admirable. We would heartily commend the Valley Female College to the favorable consideration of our people.

Paine and Lane Institutes.

These normal schools for the education of preachers and teachers for special work among the colored people, are entitled to our sympathy and such financial aid as it may be possible for us to give.

We are informed by the Commissioners of Education that at a meeting of the Board having this work in charge, held in Nashville, May, 1889, it was agreed that the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, should be asked to raise \$8,000 for this work in 1890. Of this amount, this Conference is requested to raise \$300.

Paine Institute has 110 students—Lanc, 51. Of the former, 35 are fitting themselves to preach, and 75 to teach. Of the latter, 16 expect to preach, and 35 to teach.

The entire running expenses for the year ending May 31, 1889, is given at \$4321, of which amount the Baltimore Conference is credited with only \$29.00.

The small sum asked for at our hands to aid these schools seems entirely disproportionate to the numbers and needs of the class who are to be its ultimate beneficiaries; and yet your Board does not feel justified in recommending an assessment for even this small amount, but, in lieu thereof, recommends that a collection be taken in each charge, (either publicly or

privately, according to the judgment of the preacher-in-charge,) and that the Presiding Elders, at their several District Conferences, inquire what amounts have been raised for this purpose, and, if necessary, urge upon the attention of the brethren this important and worthy work. Let all monies raised for this object be remitted to Rev. W. J. Young, who will forward them to the Commissioners of Education.

Allegheny Collegiate Institute.

The Board of Education have received the Report of the Visiting Committee to the Allegheny Collegiate Institute and would commend it to the favorable attention of the Church. This Institute is located in a beautiful and healthy section of the country. This school should be built up and sustained by our Church; and we would suggest that the committee hereafter appointed report to the Conference the financial and legal status of this School.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON COLPORTAGE.

Your Committee to which the subject of Colportage was referred have considered the subject and submit the following report.

The agent appointed by the Bishop at the last Annual Conference on the recommendation of the Conference, the Rev. A. A. P. Neel, submitted his report of the operations of the year. This report is filed with this paper. It is a clear and satisfactory statement and indicates as much success in the work as could have been reasonably expected in the face of many difficulties.

It is the judgment of your Committee, (1) that the effort to establish a system of Colportage in our Conference should be continued, (2) that no attempt be now made to formulate a plan of Colportage. It is the judgment of the Committee that the suggestion of experience will be our safest guide, (3) that the Conference recommend that our preachers and people make all purchases of books, Sunday School literature and periodicals, of and through the agent of Colportage, it being understood that sales will be made on terms equally satisfactory with those offered elsewhere, (4) that the question of location of agency be left for decision with the agent, inasmuch as all financial responsibility rests upon him.

Finally, your Committee offers the following resolutions:

I. That the effort to establish a system of Colportage be continued.

II. That the recommendation of the Conference be that our preachers and people make all purchases of books, periodicals, and Sunday School literature of and through the agent of Colportage.

III. That the Bishop be requested to appoint Rev. A. A. P. Neel, agent of Colportage for the ensuing Conference year.

REPORT OF AGENT FOR COLPORTAGE,

FOR YEAR ENDING, MARCH, 1890.

Appointment.

An agent for Colportage was appointed one year ago for the first time in this Conference, under the present provisions of the discipline for this work. Your agent received his appointment in good faith, and has strictly adhered to the work assigned him by the Bishop.

Hinderances.

It was stated to him, by the Chairman of the Committee on Books and Periodicals: "We desire you to develop a system of Colportage adapted to the needs of our people;" but there being no provision made for the support of the agent, it was necessary for him to develop a system by practical work.

It is not necessary to name all the hinderances; but the chief was in the confusion created by the Sunday School Board putting another agent in the field for almost the same work. And when he resigned in favor of this agent, the Sunday School Convention endorsed another party in Baltimore city, so that well nigh this whole patronage was lost; a very essential part of the work at this stage of development.

Plans.

As soon as your agent would make a plan, some untoward circumstance would render it well nigh inoperative. The general plan, however, was: Personal canvass, selling by samples. By circular correspondence, and otherwise, we endeavored to enlist the preachers, and create a wholesale trade; that is, a trade by means of Public Carriers. This part of the work well nigh failed until recently. Our preachers as a rule preferred making orders elsewhere, although we offered as good discount to them as the House at Nashville.

Agents.

We have had eight sub-agents in the field first and last; but only two of them did anything of consequence, and these did not begin until late in the year.

Owing to financial difficulties the agent could not offer inducements sufficient to young men, or others, to devote their whole time to the work.

Books.

Perhaps the greatest discouragement we had was the delay of our new Hymn book. We did not get it at all, except sample copies, until last of November, and nothing like a supply until February.

Most of the samples used were from our own Publishing House. Other good books, and Bibles, were sold, not purchased at Nashville, but such only were circulated as were instructive and beneficial to religious character.

Revenues.

As your agent was not salaried, he had no revenues, but the per centum on his sales.

The sales for the year aggregated about \$2,300, on which he realized less than 20 per cent. net profit. But these profits would not be so great if your agent would sell chiefly through other agents, as is the design; perhaps it would be safe to say he would not realize more than 12 per cent. Yet this agency ought, and, with the entire practicable patronage of the Conference, could, I think, sell from \$8,000 to \$10,000 worth of books—and that would give him about the salary of his brethern in the pastorate.

Place of Business.

A location for your agent, suitable for his work, is important. Shepherdstown, West Virginia, is not the most central, but under all the circumstances was the best for me. My family lived during the past year on about what would have paid rents in a city. But the chief consideration at this time is freights. Express charges now are nearly double what they were 18 months ago; and thereby the sub-agents' profits are greatly reduced.

This matter of location, however, should I think be left to the agent himself, inasmuch as he is responsible for all liabilities.

Patronage.

. Every District in the Conference has afforded more or less patronage to your agent during the past year. But most of it was secured by personal solicitation. It is of utmost importance that your agent should have the entire patronage of the Conference for all our publications at Nashville, and other religious works as far as practicable. The Sunday School literature has been worth next to nothing during the year; this ought not to be so.

The Future.

If the Conference wishes to continue this agency, I would suggest that it is of the utmost importance that there be but one agent for all our literature. It will be necessary, in order to success, that the agent have the co-operation of all our preachers and official laymen, and the entire patronage of the Conference for our own publications. It will be further necessary to have at least one good canvasser in each District all the year; and other workers during the summer months.

This perhaps will be the hardest part of the work to compass. Some of the brethern having written your agent about asking for sub-agents with "Pluck and Piety," I know no better terms to describe the successful canvasser.

This ought to be, and can be made a very valuable help to the work of the ministry; but it will require some time, much patience, and no little work.

The Agent.

Allow me to suggest that you select an agent who may command some money or good credit. A small Depository would be of great advantage, and ability to give credit for a short time to good men would greatly forward the work.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

We desire to present the following brief statement of the condition and prospects of the Board, in connection with the education of young men for the ministry in our Conference.

The Executive Committee, at its session at Wesley Grove last August, appropriated the sum of \$600 to eight approved applicants—an average amount of \$75 to each. The subscriptions given at the two preceding sessions of the Conference, on the basis of which these appropriations were made, have been paid with sufficient promptness to enable the Treasurer to supply the needs of these young men thus far during the College session. There is now in the treasury the sum of \$72.35; and if the remaining subscriptions are paid in full, there will be a balance of \$27.35 at the end of the session.

In addition to the contributions made at the Annual Conference, \$50 were contributed at the Moorefield District Conference and \$200 at the Washington District Conference, in behalf of special cases in those districts.

It gives us great pleasure to record, as a matter of general and permanent interest, the gift of \$200 by Bro. A. W. Anderson of Greenbrier County, West Virginia, as a memorial of his son, the late J. Robert Anderson, and to be used as a loan fund in aid of ministerial students.

We would remind the Conference that the appropriations of the Board are not designed to substitute but to supplement the efforts of the candidates at self-help. The appropriations are made with the utmost care. We have not been able thus far to afford aid to all worthy applicants, but are thankful for what has been done, and look forward with faith and hope to the continuance and enlargement of the work. In our judgment there is no undertaking, at this time in our church's history, that deserves more hearty sympathy or promises better returns for the effort expended, than this cause of ministerial education.

VII.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Conference Board of Church Extension, in presenting its Seventh Annual Report, has occasion for grateful recognition and review in the fact that this aggressive and evangelical department of church work introduced among us only two quadrennia ago, has already been productive of such widespread and beneficial results. The Conference has listened to the gratifying statement of Dr. Morton, as to the operations of the General Board. The map accompanying the last Annual Report of that Board shows how rapidly houses of worship have been multiplied along our western and southwestern frontier through this important instrumentality. A perfect cordon of churches, with slight gaps here and there, extends from the northern part of Washington Territory to the southern part of California, and thence eastward through

Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and the Indian Territory, while all the remaining portions of our ecclesiastical domain between the two oceans are dotted, and in some instances, crowded with the evidences of this beneficent work. The Parent and Conference Boards jointly are erecting on an average a church for nearly every day of the year; and when we consider the manifold blessings that accrue to a community and to the individual souls of men from the erection of a single house of worship, what a vast aggregation of good must result from this daily increase of these sacred edifices?

Our own Conference has shared in these widely-distributed benefits. Upwards of \$14,000 have been raised among us for this object, and our local Board has aided in building not less than 54 churches, but few of which in all probability would have been built but for the encouragement and stimulus thus afforded.

The amount raised the present year by the regular collections is \$2,015.00, which is \$54.00 less than last year. While several of the districts have fallen slightly short of the amounts raised last year, three have gone beyond—the Washington, Winchester and Moorefield. Dividing half the amount received with the Parent Board, leaves \$1007.50 for distribution, which, with \$41.00 remaining over from last year, and one-half the amount raised by special collection, subscribed and paid, makes the total for disbursement \$1,141.

This amount has been apportioned as follows: Salem Church, Freedom Circuit, \$250; Mt. Pleasant, Montgomery Circuit, \$50; Oakland, West River Circuit, \$100; Forrestville, Dranesville Circuit, \$100; Grace Chapel, \$50; Linnville, Rockingham Circuit, \$100; Mint Spring, Augusta Circuit, \$200; St. Paul's, Christiansburg, \$100; Pickaway, Union Circuit, \$75; Mt. Zion, Petersburg Mission, \$50; Fairview, Morgan Circuit, \$66—making a total of \$1,141.

The Board found itself unable, as in former years, to meet the increased demands upon it. It has done the best it could with the funds in hand, regretting its inability to respond to every appeal for aid. We can only suggest, as last year, that the Presiding Elders and Preachers in Charge bring the subject of Church Extension, in a special form, before their respective charges and District Conferences, and urge enlarged liberality in this behalf.

We again call attention to the Woman's Department of Church Extension, having for its specific object the erection of parsonages in destitute portions of our work.

This branch of our cause is slowly gaining favor among our people, but too slowly for the encouragement of the noble women who are laboring so carnestly for its furtherance. It is to be hoped that it will command that considerate regard and cordial support among us that its importance demands.

IX.

REPORT ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

Your Committee on Publishing Interests respectfully submit the following:

The Nashville Publishing House.

From the last report of Rev. J. D. Barbee, D. D., submitted April 1st, 1889, we learn, with pleasure, of the continued prosperity of our Publishing House. The increase in business this year over last, was \$14,082.63. The amount appropriated by the House, from dividends, to Conference Claimants throughout the connection is \$12,500, more than double that of last year. While we are glad to receive the proportion of this which falls to our Conference, we are in sympathy with the wide-spread demand that, as our House is now in prosperous condition, our Church at large have the benefit of its profits in cheaper literature.

· We are glad to learn of the prosperous state of our Sunday School Department. An appropriation of \$1,500 has been made to the Sunday School Editor, yet we agree with our Book Agent that our Publishing House could not more profitably spend of its proceeds than in this direction.

Our Revised Hymn Book has at last made its appearance. In matter we heartily endorse it, and think it stands in the front rank of Hymn Books extant; in workmanship it is below the average, but improving. We regret the absence of the Ritual, and would earnestly request that, as an Appendix, it be added to the future editions of the Hymnal.

Nashville Christian Advocate.

We rejoice with the Church at large, at the increased size and improved type of the "Christian Advocate." We endorse its management and matter, and should be glad to see it in every home within the bounds of our Conferentiory.

Southern Methodist Review.

The Review is not sustained by our people. It fills a place in our Church Literature which nothing else can fill. It is ably edited, and well printed. We therefore regret the indifference our people feel towards this enterprise of the Church. The sum of \$1,500 is annually appropriated for contributions to its pages, yet the Review has hitherto failed to pay the cost of its publication.

The Episcopal Methodist.

We feel especially desirous that the Episcopal Methodist, our Conference Organ, be found in the homes of all our people. We recommend the appointment of Rev. W. K. Boyle, D. D., as Editor, and hope that as manager and editor, he will be heartily sustained by his brethern of this Conference. At the request of Dr. Boyle, we recommend the appointment of Rev. A. Davisson to the position of Assistant Editor.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee, to which the subject of Temperance was referred, submits the following report:

At a conference held in Salem, Va., March, 1885, there was a very full and frank discussion of the subject. There was perfect agreement respecting the evils of intemperance and the demand for the extirpation of the traffic in and use of strong drink. Any differences of opinion respected solely details in relation to the best form of a Conference deliverance to the Church.

The report is as follows:

"The Committee on Temperance submit the following report:

Believing the liquor business and the license system to be at variance with Christian principles, good morals and the best interests of the people, therefore—

Resolved—1. That we urge all ministers of the Gospel and editors of religious journals, to keep the subject of Temperance, in all its phases, before the people.

- 2. That we believe it to be the duty of every enlightened Christian citizen, not only to endeavor to reform the drunkard, but also to give his influence and efforts to suppress this curse of curses.
- 3. That the renting of property for the liquor business is inconsistent with the principles of our holy religion, and should not be tolerated in the Church.
- 4. That we urge the strict enforcement of the discipline against any who may in anywise be connected with the manufacture or sale of alcoholic beverages, and also against those who indulge in intoxicants.
- 5. That we most heartily endorse the organization and work of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, in opposition to the liquor business, and that we pledge them our co operation.

XI.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE.

The Committee on Memorials to the General Conference respectfully report:

- 1. Having considered a resolution adopted by the Sunday School Committee of the East Baltimore District Conference, recommending "that the General Conference be memorialized to authorize the publication of a catechism in connection with the Sunday School lessons of our church," your Committee does not concur in such recommendation, in view of the fact that a series of catechisms has already been published for the use of the Church.
- 2. A paper was also referred to your Committee memorializing the General Conference to make certain changes in the Uniform Statistics. This paper we have adopted with some alterations, and recommend to your favorable consideration—as follows:

Resolved. That we memorialize the General Conference to make the following changes in the "Uniform Statistics": In Table No. 1—

1st. Strike out "Net Gain" and "Net Loss," and substitute for them "Membership last year."

2d. Add columns:

"Additions by Certificate.

Additions by Profession of Faith.

Removed by Church Conference.

Removals with Certificate.

Removals by death.

Removals by Expulsion.

Present Indebtedness on Church Property."

3d. Arrange all in the following order: Local Preachers, White Members, Colored Members, Membership last Year, Additions by Certificate, Additions by Profession of Faith, Removals by death, Removals with Certificate,

Removals by Expulsion, Removals by Church Conference, Removals by Withdrawal, Baptism of Adults, Baptism of Children, Number of Churches, Value of Churches, Number of Parsonages, Value of Parsonages, Value of other Church Property, Money expended on Church Property, Present Indebtedness on Church Property.

4th. In Table No. 3-

1. Strike out column, "Money expended for Sunday School Literature," and insert, "Expenses of Sunday Schools." Add "Conversions in Sunday Schools."

Arrange as follows: Number of Sunday Schools, Number of Officers and Teachers, Number of Scholars, Expenses of Sunday Schools, Contributed for Missions, (two blanks for other objects), Conversions in Sunday Schools.

- Resolved, 2. That our Delegates to the General Conference be hereby instructed to use all proper efforts to secure these changes.
- Resolved, 3. That we hereby instruct our Secretary, Brother Armstrong, to have added to the blanks for Reports from charges, for use through the next quadrennium, and for publication in our Minutes, so many of these items as the General Conference may decline to adopt for the Uniform Statistics.
- 3. Your Committee have also adopted a paper recommending that paragraph 188 of Discipline, in respect to boundaries, be so altered as to read as follows:
- "Beginning at the mouth of the Potomac river, thence up said river to the county line between Stafford and King George counties; thence with said line to the Rappahannock river, and with said river (but including Fredericksburg Station, on its southern bank) to the Blue Ridge Mountains; thence by that chain of mountains to Pilot Mt., Floyd County, Va.; and thence from the top of said mountain, with the Holston line to Central Depot on New river, and by that line westward to the line of Summers and Fayette Counties; and thence with the line of said counties to where it intersects the line of Greenbrier County; and thence to the top of Meadow Mt., where it is crossed by the James river and Kanawha turnpike; so as to include in the Baltimore Conference all of Greenbrier County known as Grassy Meadows, not included in . the Otter Creek appointment of West Virginia Conference; thence so as to include all the pastoral charges in that locality embraced in the Lewisburg District; thence with the line between Pocohontas and Randolph Counties to the Allegheny Mountains; thence by said mountains northward, so as to include all the territory which may be now or hereafter under the jurisdiction of the Baltimore Conference and not embraced in other Conference.
- 4. We further recommend, in accordance with a paper referred to us, that the General Conference be memorialized to amend the Discipline respecting Presiding Elders' Districts, by striking out of paragraph 62, answer 8, page 75, the proviso; so that the presiding Bishop shall be at liberty to place on each District, such number of appointments as in his judgment may best serve to promote the prosperity of the Church.
- 5. We further recommend for adoption a resolution submitted to us, that in our judgment the Book Committee at Nashville should be constituted in the same manner as the Missionary Committee; that is, be drawn from the

Church at large, instead of being composed, as now, mainly of residents of Nashville, with authority to appoint an Executive Committee of their own number.

6. Two resolutions were also referred to your Committee memorializing the General Conference, First. to amend paragraph 100 of the Discipline as to the order of public worship, by striking out the word "sitting," and substituting in lieu thereof the word "standing," in section 14, answer 1. Secondly, by substituting section (6) for section (7), and so reversely; so that "Prayer—the Congregation kneeling," shall immediately follow "Preaching."

We concur in the second of these resolutions, but do not concur in the first.

7. One other paper was referred to the Committee, proposing a change in the basis for assessing the Conference collections, and giving to some of these collections precedence over the rest, and under certain conditions to the exclusion of the rest, in which we do not concur.

- 2. By taking collections in all of our charges for the benefit of the Bible Cause.
- 3. By making special inquiry of our people as to their reading of the Word, and urging them to a close and systematic study of the scriptures.

XIV.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PLAN OF INSURANCE OF THE CHURCHES OF THE CONFERENCE.

Your Committee, appointed at the last session of the Conference, "to consider the practicability of the Plan of Insurance of the Churches of the Conference, submitted by Rev. G. H. Zimmerman," and any other feasible method for insuring our churches, respectfully report that they recommend the adoption of the plan submitted to them and presented herewith, and that a Treasurer be elected according to the provision of said Plan, who shall be authorized to work up its practical operation during the year.

PLAN OF CHURCH INSURANCE.

The following is the "Plan for the Insurance of the Churches of the Conference," which has been before the Conference for two years; and was at the last session of the Conference referred to a special committee, to report at the present session.

- 1. This Association shall be styled, "The Baltimore Conference Fire Relief Association."
- 2. The object of the Association shall be to aid in rebuilding or repairing Churches destroyed or damaged by fire, and its operations shall be confined to Churches of which we have exclusive control.
- 3. No liability of more than five thousand dollars shall be assumed by the Association on any Church,—which shall also be the limit of assessment,—but the full value up to this sum, as set forth in the minutes of the Conference, shall be allowed.
- 4. The payment of one dollar shall constitute any Church a member of this Association.
- 5. The Churches entering into this Association shall pay at the rate of fifteen (15) cents per one hundred (100) dollars of their valuation, upon every one thousand (1,000) dollars of the valuation of the Churches suffering loss by fire, when the destruction is total, and proportionately for partial destruction as hereinafter ascertained.
- 6. Any Church failing to pay its assessment, within three (3) months, after notification shall forfeit its membership; and can have it restored only on payment in full, of all arrearages.

- 7. A Treasurer shall be elected by the Conference, who shall keep the Books of the Association, and shall notify the Churches, through the preacher-in-charge, of their assessment, whenever a fire occurs, so soon as he shall have information of the loss sustained. He shall collect the same, and pay it over as hereinafter provided.
- 8. The Presiding Elder; Preacher-in-charge; and Recording Steward of the Church suffering loss, shall be a local Committee of Estimate of damages, and shall, within three (3) months after a fire shall have occurred, forward their estimate to the Treasurer, and also designate the person, or persons, to whom the Treasurer shall make payment. Said estimate shall be signed by all the Committee and a copy of the same shall be furnished for record on the Journal of the Quarterly Conference to which the Church belongs.
- 9. The Presiding Elders of the Conference, shall constitute an Advisory Board, to whom shall be referred, any matter that cannot be satisfactorily adjusted by the local "Committee of Estimate." They shall bring before the Conference, for its action, any question that may so require, and also any changes in, or additions to this Plan. The Treasurer shall not assess, collect, or pay out money, until he shall have received explicit instructions, either from the Committee of Estimate, or from the Conference.
- 10. In no case shall this fund be appropriated for other purposes, than repairing or rebuilding Churches, damaged or destroyed by fire. But if it should be deemed advisable, for the general good of the work, to change the location of a burnt Church. from one neighborhood to another, within the congregational territory, the "Advisory Board" shall lay the subject before the Conference, whose decision shall be final. Provided, however, any congregation shall be at liberty to change to another site in the same neighborhood.
- 11. The expenses connected with the settlement of each case, shall be paid by the Church receiving the benefit, out of funds in the Treasurer's hands.
- 12. This plan shall go into operation, as soon as a sufficient number of Churches to aggregate two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) in value, shall enter into the Association.

But more, we recognize the sacredness of the Sabbath; the obligation man is under to keep this day holy, according to the commandment of God; the requirement to give gladly to Him and His service this day He has sanctified.

We view with sorrow the widespread failure on the part of multitudes to keep the Sabbath holy, and see in it an evidence not only of irreverence, but also of rebellion against God.

We hail with pleasure and are heartily in sympathy with every movement leading, by proper means, to the better observance of the Sabbath. We are glad there are those who bring to the attention of the powers that be their responsibility to God for no little of the present Sabbath desecration.

We recommend that our preachers' stress get more prominently in public and in private, and especially in their instruction of the children, that allegiance to God demands of all the proper observance of His holy Sabbath.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.

To the Bishop and Members of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South.

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

Again are we brought face to face with figures in the results of the work at hand. While as children of faith, we are controlled in our plans and efforts by the Unseen, yet evidence of growth in the "things which are seen" gives cheer and encouragement. During the year, we found it needful to drop from the roll 8 defunct auxiliaries, but 12 newly organized societies gives a continued increase in our Statistical Report. Our inability to secure efficient, active Secretaries in the several Districts, is still a hindrance in the extension of the work. The healthful development of old auxiliaries, as well as the inauguration of new work, depends very much upon these officers. To reach our sisters of the Baltimore Conference and interest them in the salvation of the heathen, is no easy task. We are not, however, discouraged. It is God—our Father's cause, and even though our ideas and methods fail, all nations shall own Him Lord. With joy we accept the privilege He gives, in making us co-laborers.

Being impressed that more specific attention should be given to the Juvenile work, an assistant to the Corresponding Secretary was appointed at the annual meeting last October, to attend to this department. Vernon Church, Washington, we were greatly indebted to Brother Haddaway, not only for cordial words of welcome, but for invaluable advice and assistance in the proceedings of the convention. An item worthy of note was the generous gift of the late Mrs. Bowie Davis. She bequeathed to our Conference Society \$400 worth of Water Stock of Balttmore City.

This donation will annually help the funds in our Treasury. With grateful recognition of God's blessing upon the Woman's Missionary Work, both in the home and foreign fields, we commend again the great interests involved in it, to your consideration and hearty co-operation, invoking upon both it and your assembly the riches of God's grace, and the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

FORM OF ACT OF INCORPORATION.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That the members of
Methodist Episcopal Church, South, of in county, (or
city) State of Maryland, above the age of twenty-one years, desiring to secure
the incorporation of a board of trustees under the provision of the General
Assembly of Maryland of Church Corporations, assembled on the - day of
, 18_, at, in said county (or city), being the place ordin-
arily used for the meetings of said congregation-notice of said meeting having
been regularly given the preceding Sunday, by Reverend -, the preacher
in charge of said church-and did, then and there elect the following fourt
sober and discreet persons, A. B., C. D., E. F. and G. H., being above the age
of twenty-one years, and members of the said - Methodist Epis-
copal Church, South, trustees of said church, who, together with the preacher
in charge, shall constitute a body corporate, with full power and authority to
act in the name and behalf of said church, as provided for by the General
Assembly of Maryland.* And did, then and there, further adopt the follow-
ing plan and regulations for the perpetuation and government of said body
corporate: ¿

I. The name of said body corporate shall be "The Trustees of _______ Methodist Episcopal Church, South, of _____ in ____ county (or city), Maryland."

II. The preacifer in charge of said church, shall be ex-officio president of the body corporate, and shall call its meetings. A majority of the members elected shall constitute a quorum. The members shall elect their own secretary and treasurer. Whenever it shall be deemed necessary or expedient, any two members may call a meeting; and, in the absence of the preacher in charge, the members present, if a quorum, shall elect one of their number chairman of the meeting.

III. The trustees aforesaid shall, in all respects, be amenable to the Quarterly Conference having jurisdiction in said church, and shall perform all the duties of their office in accordance with the rules and regulations set forth in the Discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

IV. All vacancies that may occur in said corporation, by death or otherwise, shall be filled, and the corporation perpetuated, by the Quarterly Conference, in accordance with the disciplinary provisions of the church aforesaid.

V. All property, real and personal, now vested in trustees for the use of said church, and all other property belonging to the same, or that may hereafter belong to the same, shall be vested in the said body corporate and their successors, forever; and shall be held by them in accordance with the terms and conditions for holding such property now prescribed and that may,

from time to time, be prescribed in the Discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

VI. The Articles of Incorporation, and all the proceedings of said body corporate, shall be entered in a good and sufficient record book, to be provided and kept for the purpose; and the same shall be subject to the inspection of the members of the incorporating church, from time to time; and shall be laid before Quarterly Conference, whenever called for by that body.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

BALTIMORE CONFERENCE BENEVOLENT SOCIETY.

ART. I.

This Association shall be called "The Baltimore Conference Benevolent. Society."

ART. II.

SEC. 1.—The object of the Society shall be to provide a sum of money on the death of any preacher of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, who may be a member of the Society at the time of his death, for the immediate benefit of his widow or minor children, if there be such.

SEC. 2.—Or, if there be no widow, or minor children, then the amount of assessment shall be paid to the personal representative of the deceased member, to meet funeral and other necessary expenses.

ART. III.

SEC. 1.—Any person may become a member of the Society by the payment to the Treasurer of the membership fee of one dollar.

SEC. 2.—Any person agreeing to pay the assessment of one dollar upon the death of a ministerial member of the Society, as provided for in Article IV of the Constitution, shall be enrolled as an Honorary and Contributing Member, and shall not be subject to the initiation fee of one dollar, the family of such a person not being entitled to the benefits of the Society.

ART. IV.

Whenever any preacher of the aforesaid Conference, who may be a member of this Society, shall die, and shall leave a widow or minor child. each surviving member shall be assessed one dollar, to be paid at once to the treasurer.

ART. V.

Immediately on being informed of the death of any preacher of the aforesaid Conference, who was a member of the Society at the time of his death, the Treasurer shall call on each surviving member for the payment of the assessment of one dollar.

But without waiting to receive payment thereof, he shall at once pay to the widow of the deceased, if there be one, or else to his minor child or children. if there be any, one-fourth of the sum of which the whole assessments would amount; and within sixty days he shall pay as aforesaid such additional sum as shall make the whole amount paid equal to the whole amount received by

him in payment of the assessments; provided, that if the amount be payable to minor child or children, payment shall be made for it's or their benefit to such person as may have been designated by the father to receive it, or to the legal representative of such minor child or children.

ART. VI.

If any member of the Society, being a preacher of the aforesaid Conference, shall fail to pay any assessment within thirty days after the date of the Treasurer's call, he shall forfeit his membership; but he shall have the privilege of renewing it at any time by the payment of a renewal fee of two dollars; provided, however, that if any such member shall have given written notice to the Treasurer of his withdrawal from the Society when there was no assessment pending against him, he may renew his membership by paying again the regular fee of one dollar.

ART. VII.

A General Meeting of the Society shall be held annually at the seat and during the session of the aforesaid Conference, at such particular time and place as may be appointed by the President of the Board of Directors.

ART. VIII.

The management of the affairs of the Society, in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution, shall be vested in a Board of Directors, to consist of five members, who shall be elected annually at the General Meeting of the Society.

Should any vacancy occur in the Board at any time, it shall be filled by the remaining members thereof, at their first meeting thereafter.

ART. IX.

Within fifteen days after their election the directors shall meet, and organize by the appointment of a President and Secretary, who shall perform the duties usually pertaining to their respective offices.

They shall then elect a Treasurer of the Society to serve for one year, or until a successor shall be appointed.

Whenever the office of Treasurer may become vacant by reason of death, resignation or other cause, the Directors shall meet within fifteen days thereafter and fill the vacancy.

ART. X.

The Board of Directors shall have power to remove the Treasurer, or to declare the office vacant at any time, for such cause as, in their judgment, may render such procedure just and proper.

ART. XI.

It shall be the duty of the Board to direct the Treasurer in regard to any of his duties whenever they may deem it proper so to do, or whenever he may apply for instructions.

It shall also be their duty to examine the books and the annual statement of the Treasurer, and to submit the latter to the General Meeting of the Society, with the appended certificate of at least two of their number as to the result of their examination.

ART. XII.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep a correct account of all receipts and disbursements, and to submit to the Board of Directors a statement thereof for the year ending on the first day of March in each year; to turn over to his successor in office, all money, books, and other property in his possession belonging to the Society; and to follow such instructions as may be given him from time to time in writing by the Board.

ART. XIII.

The funds of the Society shall be deposited in Bank, subject to the order of the President of the Board of Directors and the Treasurer of the Society. And, whenever the surplus in excess of amount paid claimants, as provided for in Article V., shall exceed fifty dollars, the Board of Directors shall invest such surplus—the interest accruing therefrom to be added to the fund held for expenses.

ART. XIV.

The Treasurer shall not pay out any money belonging to the Society, except as provided in Article V., unless he be authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

Nor shall the Board authorize any appropriation of money except for such items of expense as they may deem requisite for the proper conduct of the affairs of the Society.

ART. XV.

Should it ever become necessary to raise funds to meet the current expenses of the Society, the Board of Directors may levy an assessment on each member, which, however, shall not exceed fifty cents in any one year.

ART. XVI.

The Treasurer shall be ex officio a member of the Society, and, in view of his gratuitous services, he shall be exempt from the payment of the membership fee and of all assessments, unless in the event of his death his widow or children would become beneficiaries of the Society.

ART. XVII.

A meeting of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by the President, or by the Treasurer of the Society.

ART. XVIII.

Any proposed amendment to this Constitution shall first be submitted to the Board of Directors, and if approved by a majority of them, it may be submitted to a General Meeting of the Society, and may then be adopted by a vote of two-thirds of the Members present and voting.




