JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY, March 28, 1894.

THE BALTIMORE ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its One Hundred and Tenth Session in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Fredericksburg, Va., Wednesday morning, March 28, 1894, at 9 o'clock.

Rev. Bishop John C. Granbery, D. D., President of the Conference, in the chair.

The Bishop read from the Scriptures, 1 Cor., chapter xiii.

Hymn 228-

"And are we yet alive,"

was sung by the Conference.

Roll called.—The Secretary of the last Conference, Rev. J. E. Armstrong, by request of the President, called the roll of clerical members and also that of lay representatives.

One hundred and forty-five clerical and twenty-one lay representatives responded to the call of their names.

Secretary elected—Upon nomination, James E. Armstrong was re-elected Secretary. The Secretary was, on motion, granted the privilege of nominating his assistants, and

George T. Tyler, Asbury R. Martin, James P. Stump, Henry S. Coe and William M. Waters were elected Assistant Secretaries.

Bar—Conference fixed the bar of the Conference with a line running from the centre of the third double window.

The hour for meeting was fixed at 9.30 A. M. and for adjournment, 12.30 P. M.

On motion, Boards and Committees were, upon nomination by the Presiding Elders, constituted of one clerical and one lay member from each district. (See pages 10, 11, 12 and 13.)

Visitors were introduced—Brother D. M. Smith, Book Agent, Nashville, Tenn.; Brother T. B. Holt, Treasurer of the Board of Missions, Nashville, Tenn.; Rev. G. G. Smith, D. D., of Georgia Conference; Rev. A. G. Brown, D. D., Virginia Conference.

On motion, C. D. Harris was appointed to collect moneys for the Missionary Board.

The report from the Publishing House at Nashville was presented, read and referred to the Committee on Publishing Interests.

W. G. Hammond presented a paper, which was referred to the Committee on Memorials to the General Conference.

The report from the Sunday School Board, Rev. W. G. E. Cunningham, Secretary, at Nashville, was presented, read and referred to the Sunday School Board.

A report from Paine Institute, signed by G. Williams Walker, and a paper from Bishop Isaac Lane, of the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church, relating to Lane Institute, were presented and read, and, on motion, they were referred to a special committee appointed by the Conference, as follows: E. H. Henry, C. L. Kennard, H. P. Hamill.

The Report of the Board of Church Extension, at Louisville, Ky., was presented and read. Rev. David Morton, D. D., addressed the Conference. The Report of the Board of Church Extension was referred to the Conference Board.

Dr. Morton presented a message from an aged member of the Kentucky Conference, Rev. Thomas Bottomly, formerly a member of the Baltimore Conference, containing a quotation from Deut. 1:11, "The Lord God of your fathers make you a thousand times so many as you are and bless you as he hath promised you."

On motion, the Secretary was requested to return the greetings of this Conference to the message of our venerable brother.

Question Twenty of the General Minutes was called, viz: Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?

The characters of Francis M. Mills, David Thomas, Nelson Head, J. Hoffman Waugh, John W. Tongue, Joshua M. Grandin, John W. Wolf, Robert Smith, Charles G. Linthicum, James M. Follansbee, Joseph H. Temple, Francis A. Mercer, Aaron Boon, William Hedges, Mabury G. Balthis, Charles L. Damaron, Wesley Hammond, Robert Ross, Hamilton Kinzer, were examined and passed.

Brothers Nelson Head, Joshua M. Grandin, John W. Tongue and Robert Smith severally addressed the Conference.

On motion, the names of the brethren called were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for a Superannuated relation.

The characters of J. Newman Hank, John W. Boteler, Joseph J. Engle, and Asbury R. Martin were examined and passed, and, on motion, their names were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for a Supernumerary relation.

The character of William K. Boyle was examined and passed, and, on motion, his name was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for a Superannuated relation.

The characters of Samuel K. Cox, Adam P. Boude and Larkin H. Crenshaw were examined and passed.

The Presiding Elders, Samuel Rodgers, of the Baltimore District, James E. Armstrong, of the East Baltimore District, Rumsey Smithson, of the Washington District, David Bush, of the Winchester District, James S. Gardner, of the Rockingham District, Peter H. Whisner, of the Roanoke District, William G. Hammond, of the Lewisburg District, and George T. Tyler, of the Moorefield District, represented the condition of their Districts, and their characters were severally examined and passed.

Conference adjourned with singing the Doxology, and with the Benediction by Bishop Granbery, to meet to-morrow at 9:30 A. M.

SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY MORNING, March 29, 1894.

Conference met at the appointed hour.

Bishop Granbery in the chair.

Religious services were conducted by J. W. Duffey.

The Roll was called and ten clerical and seven lay members answered to their names, in addition to those of yesterday.

The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.

The following was presented by the Secretary, as having been sent to day, by mail, to Rev. Thomas Bottomly, of Hopkinsville, Kentucky:

Venerable and Dear Brother:—The Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South, requests me to return to you cordial greeting in response to your kind message and earnest prayer. A letter from F. M. Mills, Neosho, Mo., was presented and read.

Rev. G. Wesley Moore, from the South West Missouri Conference, Rev T. S. Dunnaway, D. D., Pastor of the Baptist Church, and Rev. A. P. Sanders, Pastor of the Presbyterian Church, in this city, Revs. J. J. Lafferty, Riddick, Paine, Rowe and Tucker, of the Virginia Conference, Dr. W. W. Smith, President of Randolph-Macon College, T. Masao, from Japan, were severally introduced.

On the Sunday School Board, J. M. McWhorter was substituted for M. L. Woodzell, and T. J. Smithers in place of E. D. Preston.

Question Six of the General Minutes— Who are received by transfer from other Conferences?

The Bishop announced the transfer of G. Wesley Moore from the South West Missouri Conference.

The following preamble and resolution were presented and read, and, on anotion, they were adopted:

Whereas, The appeals for money at sessions of our Conference have become so numerous and urgent as to be a burden; and whereas, the money contributed in response to these appeals is given largely by preachers and laymen who have already given liberally at their homes; therefore,

Resolved, That a Committee of three preachers and three laymen be appointed, who shall consider and report on the merits of every cause for which a collection is desired; and that no collection be taken without the recommendation of said Committee.

Question Twenty-Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?

The name of Charles M. Bragg was called. His Presiding Elder, J. E. Armstrong, stated that Charles M. Br gg had, in the interval of Conference, been tried and suspended on the charge of immorality. The Bishop appointed a committee of nine traveling Elders, together with the chairman, to whom the case was referred for trial, as follows:

Chairman, J. T. Williams; L. L. Lloyd, W. Melville, J. R. Van Horne, R. M. Wheeler. O. F. Burgess, R. H. Wilson, S. Townsend, T. E. Carson, J. L. Kibler.

On nomination by the Secretary of the Conference, G. H. Zimmerman was elected Assistant Secretary, and he was appointed to keep the record of the trial of C. M. Bragg.

The name of Vincent W. Wheeler was called. His Presiding Elder, W. G. Hammond, reported that the Committee of Investigation, ordered at the last session of the Annual Conference in the case of V. W. Wheeler, had met at Clifton Forge, May 10, 1893, and that, after an investigation was had, he was

acquitted. He also stated that subsequent developments had, in his judgment, rendered another investigation necessary.

On motion, the President of the Conference appointed three traveling Elders, to whom the accusation was referred for investigation, as follows:

Dashiell, from Central Station Quarterly Conference, Baltimore District, John Henderson Dills, from West River Quarterly Conference, Charles Washington Moore, from North Baltimore Station, East Baltimore District, Daniel Mason Brown, from Martinsburg Station Quarterly Conference, Frederick Alexander Gains, from Winchester Station Quarterly Conference, Winchester District, Levi Burrell Atkins, from Newport Circuit Quarterly Conference, Roanoke District, Jesse Lee McNeer, from Gillett's Circuit Quarterly Conference, Lewisburg District, Courtland Prentice Smith, from Hardy's Circuit Quarterly Conference, William Stevens, from Romney Circuit Quarterly Conference, Woorefield District, were presented in due form, and having passed in examination before the Committee on the Course of Study, they were severally admitted on trial.

The invitation was, on motion, accepted.

A letter from Mr. Robert L. Coffman, Mount Jackson, Va., offering to take a photograph of the Conference, was presented and read.

Conference instructed the Secretary to reply, declining the invitation on account of inconvenience.

Conference adjourned with singing the Doxology, and with the benediction by the Bishop, to meet to-morrow morning at 9:30.

THIRD DAY.

FRIDAY MORNING, March 30, 1894.

Conference met at the appointed hour.

Bishop Granbery in the chair.

Religious services were conducted by J. W. Grubb.

The Roll was called of members absent during the previous sessions. John W. Shipley and Levi B. Atkins, lay representatives, responded to the call of their names.

On motion, the call of the roll after to day was suspended.

The Journal of yesterday was read and approved.

The Report of the visitors to the Valley Female College was presented, read and referred to the Board of Education.

The following resolutions were presented, read, and referred to the Committee on Memorials to the General Conference.

Resolved,: That we memorialize the General Conference to so change the law as to provide for the examination before committee, instead of in open Conference, into the character and adaptation to the work of the Itinerant Ministry, of applications for admission on trial and probationers in the Conference, so as to avoid so far as practicable the public discussion of the character of our young preachers.

The characters of William D. Keene, B. Lee Parrott, Harrah M. Reed, James Henry Smith, William J. Whitesell, Henry A. Wilson, and Homer T. Hieronimus were examined and passed, and having also passed in examination before the Committee on the Course of Study, they were, on motion, continued on trial.

The character of Linwood Hammond was examined and passed, but as he was not before the Committee on the Course of Study, he was continued on trial in the class of the first year.

Question Three-Who are discontinued?

The characters of John T. Kestler, Josiah J. Ringer, and Sidney J. Sarver were examined and passed, and, on motion, they were discontinued at their own request.

Collections.—The President announced the Committee on Collections, as follows:

REPORTS.

MEMOIRS.

Rev. GEORGE STEVENSON.

Rev. George Stevenson, the second son of John and Frances Stevenson, was born the 20th day of September, 1810, on a farm owned by his father and belonging originally to the estate of Lord Abercom in the county of Tyrone, in the Province of Ulster, Ireland, and died in Stephens' City, Frederick County, Virginia, July 8, 1893. He was baptized in infancy by the Rev. Matthew Clark, pastor of the Presbyterian Church (at Ardstraw Bridge), of which his father was a Ruling Elder.

His mother previous to her marriage had been a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. George, together with the other children, was taught the confession of faith and the Shorter Catechism. But when a boy of only twelve years, he felt he could not subscribe to the doctrines in which his father had him so thoroughly drilled. In the providence of God, it so happened that he was permitted to attend a Wesleyan Methodist Church. The word preached made a lasting impression on George Stevenson. He was brought under the convicting power of the Spirit. He felt that he was under the wrath of the Almighty. In reference to his condition at this time, his private journal contains the following: "While the Spirit of God was at work with my heart I prayed often in private, sometimes using a kind of penance, by kneeling upon stones that left indentations in my little knees," "a mistaken idea," he adds, "which I caught from the Roman Catholic hirelings whom I often heard talk about the merit of bodily suffering." While in this state of mind God in his mysterious providence removed George's father by death. About this time, the Methodists were invited to hold religious services at the Stevenson homestead. Little George was soon found with other penitent souls seeking Christ in the pardon of sin. In his journal is found the following: "I sought God with prayers and tears. At last deliverance came; upon a Sabbath afternoon, in a meeting held for penitent sinners, God blessed me with a sense of pardoning mercy." George's conversion led to the renewal of his mother's religious life and also to the conversion of other members of the household. From the day of Brother Stevenson's conversion, the old homestead was a stopping place for the preachers of Wesleyan Methodism until the family removed to America. Some time after Brother Stevenson's conversion he felt that his spiritual enjoyment was greatly disturbed by reason of conflict with duty. First, he was called upon to unite in the public services of the sanctuary, and furthermore he felt moved of the Spirit to preach the Gospel. Resisting the Spirit in these two matters he was cast into temporary darkness of mind. But when he yielded himself fully to the claims that pressed themselves upon heart and conscience, he again felt that,

"The Lord all the day long Was his joy and his song."

About the time of this transitive period in his religious experience he came to America to visit a brother there residing in Philadelphia. Here,

as well as in his native land, young Stevenson heard the call to preach the Gospel still sounding in his ear. At the expiration of a year he returned to Ireland and took charge of affairs on the home place. About this time a great revival of religion broke out in Scotland and swept through Ireland. In the midst of this great revival Brother Stevenson was licensed to preach. "He wrought day and night" with the preachers, and soon found himself doing the full work of a Methodist preacher. In 1840 he emigrated with other members of the family to America. They came to Philadelphia, but they finally selected Lyconing County, Pennsylvania, as their future home and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church.

Brother Stevenson's official standing was recognized and his license as a local preacher was renewed by the Quarterly Conference of the Lyconing Charge. In 1841 he was recommended for admission on trial in the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and was appointed as junior preacher on the Clearfield Circuit, with that saintly spirit, the Rev. Thomas Hildebrand. In 1842 he was appointed to Warrior's Mark, with Father Stevens. Here, as at Clearfield, the work was blessed with abundant prosperity. In 1843 he was ordained Deacon by Bishop Waugh, and sent as junior preacher to Bedford, with Rev. Jonathan Munroe as preacher in charge. In 1844 he traveled with Rev. Peter McAnally on the Alleghany Circuit. On the 20th of February, 1845, Brother Stevenson was united in marriage to Miss Teressa G. McLaughlin. At the ensuing Conference he was ordained Elder and appointed as preacher in charge of the old Trough Creek Circuit. In 1846 he was appointed to this field again, with the late Rev. David Shoaff as junior preacher. From that day they were as inseparable as Jonathan and David. In 1847-8 Brother Stevenson served on the Concord Circuit with Rev. Alexander McClay.

In 1849, he was appointed to Mifflin, where he was greatly afflicted by the death of his wife and one of his children. In 1850, he was appointed to the Williamsburg charge. On the 28th of November of the same year, he was united in marriage to Miss Sarah Watts, one of the daughters of the late Rev. James Watts, of the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1851-2, he was appointed to Hancock. 1853-4, to Berkley Circuit as preacher in charge, with Rev. Hamilton A. Gaver, as junior preacher, who afterwards became his brother-in-law. In 1855, he was appointed to Hampstead. 1856-7, to New Port. About this time the Baltimore Conference was divided, and Bro. Stevenson, according to the boundaries made, fell into that part called the East Baltimore Conference. In 1858-9, he was appointed to Lewistown, Pa. 1860, to Green Castle. 1861, Gettysburg, where he felt the strain peculiar to those days and times. In 1862-3, he traveled the Frederick Circuit. In 1864, under the strain of circumstances, he asked for a superannuated relation. At this time great excitement prevailed in the Church. Non-slaveholding had been declared a test of membership. Amid the tide of war excitement rose to unwarranted heights. Brother Stevenson felt himself no longer at home in the M. E. Church. He could no longer subscribe to its views upon national and ecclesiastical questions. He felt that in all good conscience he could not remain in the M. E. Church. His sympathy was with the M. E. Church, South. In conflict of mind and soul he withdrew from the M. E. Church, and in 1865 he united with the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, and was appointed to the Buckeystown Circuit. The brethren of this sister denomination knew that his position was a tentative one, and that if the way ever opened he would seek affiliation with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. In 1866, seeing his way clear to be with the brethren of his choice, he withdrew from the Methodist Protestant connection and united with the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South, and was appointed to the Bridgewater charge, where he served two years. In 1868 he was appointed to Luray. In 1869-70-71-72 he traveled the Winchester Circuit. For two years he was junior preacher

with that man of precious memory, the late Rev. Wm. H. Wheelright. The two succeeding years he was preacher in charge, and had for his fellow-laborer the Rev. S. G. Ferguson. In 1873 he was appointed to Frederick Circuit, where he served four years. In 1877 he was granted a superannuated relation, but as long as physical strength would permit he labored in word and doctrine.

Brother Stevenson was a man somewhat below medium stature, but, nevertheless, compactly built, and a man of great physical strength. He had a massive head and a keen black eye that sparkled with the brilliance of Irish wit and humor. He was the soul of generosity, and those who entered his home were met by the warmth of "one given to hospitality." If he had a will of iron and a nerve of steel, at the same time he possessed a nature of almost boundless sympathy. No sacrifice was too great for him to make for a friend, and if he faced a foe, he was open, brave and dauntless. He was a man of strong convictions, and unbending religious principles. "He was a devout man, full of faith and the Holy Ghost." Through his whole life he was a constant reader. He both knew and loved the doctrines of Methodism. His knowledge of the Scriptures was, in some respects, almost phenomenal. If asked for references bearing upon any phase of religious doctrine he would immediately marshal passage after passage, and give the chapter and verse where As a preacher, he was scriptural, clear, analytic, forcible, practical, and direct. In his palmy days he possessed an imagination of vivid power. He also possessed the power of condensation to a remarkable, degree. He retained something of the brogue of his native land, but when Brother Stevenson was in health and strength he "preached with power and in demonstration of the Spirit." Many gracious revivals attended his ministry, and in the final day of reckoning many stars will adorn his crown. He never lost interest in the great movements of Methodism. As long as he was able to read his study table was the home of the leading papers and periodicals of the great family of Methodism. For years Brother Stevenson's health was so precarious that he was unable to attend the sessions of the Annual Conference, but he took a lively interest in all its proceedings and always made affectionate inquiry after his brethren. The last three years of his life were years of great physical weakness and suffering. The greater portion of the time he had to be under the constant care and attention of a nurse. His death was not unexpected to his friends. He was ready and waiting for the messenger. On the 8th of July, 1893, the aged patriarch "gathered up his feet and departed in peace," and within two days his beloved wife followed after. His funeral services were conducted from the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Stephens' City.

Rev. WILLIAM ANDERSON WADE, D. D.

Rev. William Anderson Wade was born in Christiansburg, Va., August 2, 1826, and died in Washington, D. C., December 4, 1893, aged sixty-seven years, four months and two days. When he was twelve years old he was left an orphan.

Three years later he entered Emory and Henry College, where he remained until the age of eighteen, when he entered mercantile business in his native town.

The next thirteen years of his life were spent here and in Baltimore. In 1857 he accepted the position of cashier for the White Sulphur Springs Company of Virginia, and subsequently engaged in the wholesale hardware business with a firm in Richmond, Va.

After the civil war began he was chosen to fill an important office in the Treasury of the Confederate Government, which office he held until 1863, when he was elected cashier of the Farmers' Bank in Blacksburg, Va.

After the close of the war the settlement of this bank devolved chiefly upon him. In all these positions, some of them involving heavy responsibilities, he discharged every duty with the strictest fidelity and to the entire satisfaction of all parties concerned. Through all these years of secular toil he felt his conscience impelling him to a higher calling.

For twenty years he had been a local preacher, rendering faithful and acceptable service where he lived, and in the country around, as occasion afforded; but he always felt that he was called to the work of the regular ministry, yet there were barriers which always appeared to close up his

wav.

When, therefore, Providence opened the way, he turned aside from several lucrative business openings, and offered himself to the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and was

received into the traveling connection in March, 1868.

This was the consummation of his ardent hope, and the path of duty upon which he now entered rendered him supremely joyful. His first appointment was Salem Circuit, which he served three years. In 1871 he was stationed at Harrisonburg, and in 1872 and 1873 at Charlestown, West Virginia.

The next year at Moorefield; and 1875 and 1876, he traveled Montgomery Circuit, Md. At the close of his second year on this charge, he was appointed to Brucetown, where he remained one year. The next three years he labored on Winchester Circuit, and in 1881 he was stationed

at Front Royal, where he remained three years also.

From here he was sent to Lexington, which station he served 1884 and 1885. In 1886 and 1887, he filled Christiansburg Station, and 1888 and 1889, was appointed to Warrenton. His last charge in the Conference was

Falls Church, to which he was assigned in 1890.

At the Conference which met in Roanoke, in 1891, he was placed on the supernumerary list, and remained on this list until Conference one year ago, when he was granted a superannuated relation. He came into the Conference late in life, yet his ministry extended through twenty-six years, and embraced twelve pastoral charges.

After a change of his active relation to the Conference, he accepted a position in the Auditor's office of the District of Columbia. His excellent business qualifications, and his aptness as an accountant, served him well

in this office, and secured for him a fair remuneration.

He was filling this office when he died.

Our deceased brother was a man of deep and solid piety. He professed faith in Christ at the age of twenty-four, and the same night he consecrated his home to God by erecting a family altar. Next to his family came his Church; and whether he served it as class-leader, steward, recording steward, local preacher or pastor, he was in every office faithful, and in everything conscientious.

He observed regular habits of private devotion. Early in the morning, when other members of the family would awake, he would be found up, and engaged in the devout study of God's word. Pen marks and marginal notes all through his Bible, indicate the care with which he studied it. He was prudent in speech, carefully avoiding the speaking of evil about

others, and encouraged the same disposition in others.

He was very happy in his domestic life. On August 31, 1847, he was married to Miss Charlotte Louise Amiss, who, with their three children, survive him. The warm, tender love he bestowed upon his household was fully reciprocated, and the careful, watchful training of his children was rewarded in their early conversion and the development of their religious characters. His return home from business or pastoral calls always brought joy and gladness to his family.

As a preacher he was orthodox, systematic and clear. His sermons were carefully prepared; usually they were written, and a free use of the manuscript was had in the pulpit. Tall and commanding in person, courtly in manners, a strong voice and emphatic delivery, a mind well stored with knowledge, and a heart brave and courageous, yet tender, modest and shrinking, together with a high sense of honor and deep convictions of the efficacy of Christ, were among his chief characteristics. He was not without seals to his ministry, yet he seemed to be more specially called to "feed the flock" of Christ and edify the church, and no doubt many will rise up in the day of the Lord and call him blessed. In recognition of his ability as a preacher the Washington and Lee University, in the year 1885, conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity.

But how did he die? Whether he had a premonition of death or not we cannot say, but he seemed to grow weary of life as his last sickness came on. Walking to church with his family the Sunday before he was taken down to his bed, he spoke of the heavy burdens which this life lays upon one, and said: "If I could only provide for your comfort in this world, how gladly would I die." Two days after this he was seized with fatal illness, and in five days he was dead. During his sickness he often prayed and quoted verses of Scripture and stanzas of familiar hymns. A short time before death he repeated "The angel of the Lord encampeth round about them that fear Him and delivereth them;" and again, "Helper of the helpless, help thou me." He asked the hour, and when told that it was five o'clock in the morning, said: "Thank the Lord, the night is nearly gone and the dawn is approaching." Half reclining on his pillow, he looked smilingly towards his daughters standing near his bed, and bringing his hand suddenly to his heart, exclaimed: "I cannot stand this pain any longer," and instantly expired. Thus lived, and thus died, this minister and servant of Jesus Christ.

Rev. SAMUEL W. HADDAWAY.

Samuel Wilmer Haddaway was born at St. Michael's, Talbot County, Maryland, August 1, 1850, and died in Washington October 26, 1893. Converted August 22, 1866, at a camp-meeting near Easton, Maryland, Brother Haddaway at once joined the M. E. Church, South, the first one of his family to do so. He soon, however, had the deep pleasure of seeing his father and mother and others of the family come into the same communion, and that largely through his influence. From first to last, in doctrine, principles and polity, the subject of this memoir was a Methodist. Hence, though but sixteen when converted, he at once became zealous in Church work; and being a school teacher at this period, his sprightly intelligence made him available for much good service. Successively a class leader, an exhorter and a local preacher, his way gradually opened to the ministry, in entering which work he seems to have yielded to the call of years. The impression that the active ministry was his life business was ineffaceable, and it bore him toward the itinerancy. By the Fourth Quarterly Conference of Trappe Station, in February, 1869, he was duly recommended to the Annual Conference for admission on trial into the traveling connection. The Conference met that year at Trinity, in Baltimore, Bishop Wightman presiding. Brother Haddaway's journal gives an interesting account of this his first visit to an Annual Conference. Preachers were not strangers to him, for at the camp-meeting where he was converted were some as effective as any in the Church. His observations concerning the Bishop and others at the Conference were thoughtfully and discriminatingly made; and the association there with his brethren seems to have afforded him intense pleasure.

At Salem, in 1871, Brother Haddaway was ordained Deacon by Bishop Pierce, and, at Baltimore, in 1873, by Bishop Pierce, he was ordained Elder. His successive appointments were: Baltimore Circuit, 1869-72, Beltsville, 1872-75; Holland street, 1875-77; Piedmont, 1877-79; Moorefield, 1879-81; Loudoun Circuit, 1881-83, with J. H. Waugh; Middleburg, 1883-84; Fall's Church, 1884-86; Mt. Vernon, 1886-90; Central, 1890-92; Marvin, 1893. Of the conference of 1892 he asked a superannuated relation, his health having failed; and though he came back in 1893 to take up again his beloved employ, and was appointed to Marvin, in Washington, yet he was not privileged to work through the year.

That the first six years of his ministry should have been spent at two-appointments was uncommon, and the favor thus shown a young man gave him a keen sense of his responsibility. His devotedness, so marked a characteristic in him, early and variously showed itself. To this day the-people of Baltimore Circuit tell how he commenced holding services in a barn, which was soon over-run by the press of attendants. Out of this, asout of similar enterprises, grew a church society and structure. On Moore-field Circuit, also, his zeal led him to work with his own hands upon the church building, helping it forward to a speedy completion in every possible way.

Brother Haddaway's remarkable devotion to every work he undertook was due to his decision of character. He was a man of intense convictions, deep sympathies, and fervent spirituality. He knew what he wished to achieve, his aims were comprehensive, and they were followed with his whole heart; while sustaining every effort he made was a courage undaunted by the severest obstacles. This easily made him a power in his work. He was the leader of his people, young men notably following his counsel, and often making him their model.

Though he neglected no interest of a charge, yet special features of church work engaged his concern. Foreign missions enlisted his most earnest endeavor. He lectured on their operations in various countries, and made urgent personal appeals for their support, usually securing contributions beyond assessments. Nor was he behind in eare for home mission work. He enlarged the borders of any vineyard he was sent to cultivate. His plans in organizing were practical, and his methods carefully adopted. He was both progressive and aggressive. Many features of the modern institutional church appeared in his enterprises, especially in stations, while such was his unfailing spirituality that the religious character of those under his care was his chief concern. Revivals and growth in grace were insisted upon by him, with a persistence that gave him marked success as a pastor.

According to years, our deceased brother was cut off in the prime of life; but his course was full and well-rounded. Twenty-five years a preacher, earnest, energetic and unctious, the sheaves of his ministry were abundant; and eighteen years the head of a happy home, his domestic life was to him a continuous and unalloyed blessing. In February, 1875, Brother Haddaway was married to Miss Mollie E. Thompson, daughter of Dr. R. H. Thompson of Carroll county, Maryland. For the sake of his tenderly beloved wife and daughter, as well as for his work's sake, he wanted to live, his abounding vitality resisting to the last encroachments of disease. And while he could have smiled at death as at a foe disarmed, he hastened not to lay down the weapons of a successful warfare, even for the rest of an endless peace. In the winter of his superannuation he was not content to be idle. The pastor of the Methodist Protestant Church in Oxford, wrote of him to the press:

"Side by side we stood in loving and sympathetic co-operation, and preached the Gospel and called sinners to repentance. In the pentecostal revival of last winter, Brother Haddaway was present whenever his health would permit, and did grand work. His stirring, thrilling appeals I shall never forget."

We, who have seen him in the midst of revival work, can appreciate every word of this fraternal-acknowledgment. He was never happier than when instrumental in saving souls.

It seemed a provision of a tender leading in his life that the little vine of his own planting should become the grateful shade to his failing strength. In March last Brother Haddaway went to Marvin. That loving people welcomed him, shielded him from over-exertion, encouraged him under the gathering shadow of fatal disease, and gently ministered to him to the end. In August he assumed the duties of the Chaplaincy of the House of Representatives. Here, too, his individuality was as manifest as in the pastorate. His prayers were pointed and terse, void of affectation and noticeably fervent. His ministrations made an impression, giving him influence among all attending upon such services. He won their sincere regard, and they mourn his untimely death. His last illness was brief, though he had suffered for years. He went to bed on Sunday and on Thursday next his spirit gently passing away his body was laid in Maryin. Thursday next, his spirit gently passing away, his body was laid in Marvin Church, to be watched over by the young men whom he had formed into a society. On Friday, sorrowing friends, ministerial brethren, and a committee of respect from the House of Representatives met to pay a parting

tribute to his memory. He was buried at Freedom, Carroll county, Md.
Ministerial friends who were with him in his last days speak of his
unfaltering faith and firm peace. He said that all was well, and no one

who knew him can doubt it.

Rev. W. W. HEDRICK.

Rev. Wm. W. Hedrick was born June 15, 1827, in Wythe county, Virginia, and died in Newport, Giles county, Virginia, October 10, 1893.

The accident by which he lost his life was likely a fall from his vehicle. on the morning of October 7th, in passing over the mountains from Blacksburg to Newport. This caused concussion of the brain in addition to other serious internal injuries. He never rallied sufficiently to give an account of the sad circumstance, but continued to sink until Tuesday following; when, at 10 A. M., his spirit gently passed away.

His parents, Jacob and Susanna Hedrick, were godly people; and, consequently, in youth he developed that characteristic principle that was destined to be the controlling feature of his life. As a marked evidence of this he carefully made his associates of those who were deeply pious,

although greatly his seniors.

He long sought a knowledge of his sins forgiven, allowing nothing to discourage him. With these influences at work, he united with the church in 1844, or two years before he was converted. This blessed season, about which there were never any doubts in his mind, occurred in 1846. He at once became the friend, companion and intimate of his class-leader, and was looked upon by all who knew him as a model young Christian.

He was married to Miss Evelyn Wisely, daughter of Michael and Barbara Wisely, in Wythe county, Virginia, November 10, 1849. She still survives

him, with nine of their twelve children.

He was licensed to exhort at the old Cripple-Creek Camp Ground, in the County of his nativity, in 1853; licensed to preach on June 9, 1855, by the Quarterly Conference of the Wytheville Circuit, Rev. J. M. McTeer preacher in charge. He served twenty years as a local preacher, conscientiously performing his duty in this respect, so far as health and opportunity permitted. On October 30, 1859, he was ordained Deacon, and on October 11, 1863, he was ordained Elder, being inducted into both of these offices by the sainted Bishop Early. He joined the Baltimore Conference on probation in March, 1875, and was admitted into full connection in March, 1878.

He was preacher in charge of Upper Botetourt one year; James River, three years; Lafayette, three years; New Castle, two years; Catawba, two years; Cave Spring, three years; Catawba, four years, and was appointed to Newport Circuit at our last Conference session, which he served up to the time of his death.

From his first sermon, preached on June 24, 1855, up to the last,

preached on October 1, 1893, he had delivered 3,075 sermons.

He fell at the post of duty. As a man he was respected and esteemed by those who knew him. Being very reserved in manner, and by no means aggressive in character, he suffered in the estimation of the casual acquaintance. But upon a more intimate association he invariably assumed his proper place, and was best loved by those who knew him best. He loved peace, and pursued it. In fact, so great was his love for peace that at times, to his detriment and suffering, did he purchase it. Few are aware of the severity of the personal trials through which he was called to pass. Conscious of the necessity of his own personal experience being clear, and so sternly devoted to the principle he had adopted in youth as his, amidst much that would have wrecked a weaker character, he stood true and steadfast unto the end.

As a preacher of the Word he was plain and practical, clear and forcible, impelled by a deep conviction of the truths he would expound. Although usually an even preacher, at times he would arise above his ordinary efforts and tower aloft in logic and eloquence. Particularly was this so in campmeetings or revival services.

The atonement with him was a theme in which he had his chiefest delight: warming with the advancement of his subject, he would become thoroughly aroused and mounting to his grandest heights appear indeed the inspired messenger of a new covenant. On the subject of baptism he was thoroughly at home, whilst he was considered an extremist on temperance. On all moral questions, his position was ever positive, being seriously honest to his convictions.

He was ever chaste in his conversation, eschewing the appearance of evil and was too serious to enjoy an anecdote. He was particularly appreciated in the family circle as he would enter the homes of his people. However, of all in the home the children loved him best. Their hearty greeting was warmly met and sincerely enjoyed by him. He was uniformly beloved by the people he was privileged to serve.

We conclude in the words of his Presiding Elder, Dr. P. H. Whisner: "He was an able expounder of the Word of God, a workman that needed not to be ashamed. He was a man of spotless character, without fear and without reproach, and faithful in all the work of a Methodist preacher."

His body was laid to rest October 11th in a cemetery at his home church in Wythe to await the morning of the resurrection.

Rev. CHARLES M. BROWN.

"Rev. Charles M. Brown, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Front Royal, Virginia, was drowned June 7, 1893, in the Shenandoah River, near Harper's Ferry."

Such was the startling announcement of the death of one of the most faithful and beloved members of the Baltimore Conference. Many were shocked and saddened by these awful tidings. Only a few weeks before Brother Brown had been appointed for the third year to Front Royal, Va., and had entered upon his work with his accustomed zeal and energy,

hoping to make it the best year of his ministry. But in the short space of two months his earthly ministry has ended.

June 9th, 1893, a large concourse of sorrowing and bereaved friends attended his funeral in the church in Front Royal of which he had been pastor. The community was in mourning over the death of one so useful and good and true, and reverently followed his remains to their quiet resting place in the beautiful cemetery overlooking the scene of his late home and last ministry.

Charles Melville Brown was born in Greenville, East Tennessee, November 28th, 1851, and died in his 42d year. His parents were Joseph R. and Fannie J. Brown, both staunch members of the Presbyterian Church. His education was begun at home under a private tutor, Mr. Robert McKorkle, and was finished with a five years' course at Emory and Henry College, Va., from which he graduated and took his degree of A. B. In 1867, in the 16th year of his age, he was converted and joined the Presbyterian Church under the ministry of Rev. Nathan Bachman. While a student at Emory and Henry College, having decided to enter the Christian ministry, and convinced that he could not conscientiously accept and preach all the doctrines of the Presbyterian Church, he connected himself with the M. E. Church, South, with which he found himself in accord. Intimate association from his childhood with his grandmother, who was a pioneer Methodist, and for whom he had great love and admiration, is believed to have contributed largely to this decision. In 1873 he was licensed to preach, and subsequently admitted on trial into the Holston Conference, from which he was transferred to the Baltimore Conference at its session in Washington, March, 1875. His first appointment was as junior preacher on Rockville circuit, with that true friend and kind counsellor of young preachers, Rev. J. C. Dice. His ministry here was successful and greatly blessed. So prudent and useful did he prove himself as a minister, that at the close of his third year he was appointed, in 1878. to White Sulphur Springs, a difficult and important charge. Here he remained two years, and was in high favor with the church and the many visitors who frequented this celebrated resort. In 1880 he was appointed to Reisterstown, Md., where he remained four years, displaying unusual talent for organizing, and exerting a wide influence among the people. His work in this charge was pre-eminently successful. His power and usefnlness as a minister took more definite form, and gave sure prophecy of his subsequent career. He was abundant in labors, and full of resources. The Church at Reisterstown feels still the force of his life and ministry, and no name is more precious than that of Charles M. Brown. While stationed here he married Mrs. Lida Phinney, a devout and active member of his congregation, and an earnest Christian worker, who with their five children survive to lament his death.

His superior capacity in organizing, his zeal in evangelistic labors, his varied talents for work among the young, and his unsurpassed pastoral fidelity, designated him for broader fields of usefulness; and at the close of his fourth year at Reisterstown, in 1884, he was appointed to Central Church, Baltimore. The extent of his labors in all directions and spheres of ministerial activity resulted in large blessings to the Church, and gave promise of even more abundant fruit. But the constant strain of such labors upon his never-robust constitution proved too severe, and at the close of his second year he was removed and appointed to Middleburg, Loudoun county, Va. Here his physical vigor promptly returned, and soon the whole work felt the force and stimulus of his spirit and activity, and began an upward movement. He was not content with "the metes and bounds" of his work, but pushed out and opened up new preaching places, in schoolhouses and in the woods. Churches were repaired, congregations enlarged, Sunday Schools re-organized, families visited and souls converted. After four years of marked success he was appointed, in 1890, to Freedom Circuit, Maryland, where he remained but one year.

While successful and beloved here, as elsewhere, his talents for certain kinds of work had been so clearly indicated that, in 1891, he was appointed to Front Royal, Va. The Church and community immediately felt the influence of his presence and ministry. There was a gracious revival of religion and many accessions to the Church, both in Front Royal and in the country around. New openings were discovered and entered, the Sunday School took on new life, the young people were marshalled in active service and the older members were invigorated with the impulses of a higher life. His influence and zeal were strongly felt among the students at the Academy. At the time of his death he was planning and working for greater results in this direction. Bút his "sun went down when it was yet day," and his labors ended in the very zenith of his ministry and usefulness.

Brother Brown was one of the most popular and beloved ministers of our Conference. He was genial and approachable, gentle and courteous, yet firm and dignified. He was unselfish, self-sacrificing and generous. He was a true friend, one to be trusted and loved. Withal he was a man of deep and fervent piety. He loved the Word of God and studied it closely. He had great joy in the conversion of sinners and carnestly labored to build up believers. He was an evangelist in the true Scriptural sense and exulted in a revival of religion. His preaching was practical and illustrative, often embodying the doctrinal element. His style was simple, clear, earnest and effective. He always held himself under control. He was kind, charitable and pure in speech. He was rather above medium height, erect in form and vigorous in movement. While his features spoke of a kind heart, they also indicated strength and decision of character. In a large measure he possessed the spirit of enterprise and adventure. If we might discriminate, without any depreciation of his talents and usefulness in other departments, we would say that his special sphere of usefulness by his own choice and rare adaptation, was among the young.

He loved young men Before our church provided for the organization of Epworth Leagues Brother Brown had in his work young people's societies and leagues. He held Sunday School Institutes, was a member of the Sunday School Board of the Conference continuously from the first year of its organization, and in every way sought to promote the spiritual welfare of the young. He had a genius for this work.

But in the gentle courtesies, the pure atmosphere, the unrestrained freedom and delight of his home, he was perhaps best known. He ordered his household with gentle, but firm discipline. He made companions of his children, himself becoming a little child, and gave most careful attention to their religious interests. His aged mother writes: "His home life was as near perfect as mortals ever attain to—a dutiful and loving son, full of the Spirit from his boyhood on through his short life."

We append a brief quotation from the remarks of Rev. Samuel Rodgers, who conducted his funeral services, assisted by Revs. David Bush, B. W. Bond, H. P. Hamill, H. W. Kinzer, W. H. D. Harper and others:

"He had the observant eye, the guarded tongue, the ready hand and the swift feet when duty beckoned." His work was wrought after careful survey and according to a well considered plan. "He sought the lost and brought them to the Great Shepherd. And what a care he had for the lambs! Was any one among us more solicitous for the welfare of the children? Did any one among us equal him in teaching the little folks? And what a cheery, bright Christian experience was his! He walked in the light of the Lord. He was large-hearted, gave liberally and freely, was given to hospitality, a lover of good men, and in all relations he was the Christian gentleman." May we not say, an Israelite indeed, in whom there was no guile. "He served his generation according to the will of God, and fell on sleep."

REPORT

OF THE

SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Board of Missions of the Baltimore Conference during the past

year has furnished financial help to the following charges, viz:
Wilkins Avenue, Emory, Boyd's, Brunswick, North Baltimore, Easton
and Caroline, Church Hill, Charles, West Harford, East Harford, Epworth,
Marvin, Fauquier, Sudley, Manassas, Morrisville, Strasburg, White Post,

Fairfield and Baths, Bell's Valley, New Market, Mt. Jackson, Port Republic, Markesville, West Augusta, Grace, Elliston, New Castle, James
River, Wesley Chapel, Buena Vista, Collierstown, Alleghany, Milboro'
and Shiloh, Gillets, Hot Springs, Alvon, Talcott, Greenville, Petersburg,
Franklin, Frostburg, Morgan, Gainsboro', Wardensville and Listonburg.

and Shiloh, Gillets, Hot Springs, Alvon, Talcott, Greenville, Petersburg, Franklin, Frostburg, Morgan, Gainsboro', Wardensville and Listonburg. These charges report: 11,852 members, 1,094 net gain, 1,449 conversions, 1,372 additions, 176 Sunday Schools, 1,404 officers and teachers, 9,819 scholars, 914 baptisms, \$21,072 contributed on ministerial support, and

\$4,191 on disciplinary collections.

It must be evident from this summary of results that the money expended has been well invested. Some of these charges require a very small sum from the Board to give their pastors a comfortable living, while others need a more liberal amount. The good done in either case amply justifies the expenditure, and it is hoped that the Church realizes the importance of sustaining this department of its benevolent work. While not asked to lessen his interest in and contributions towards the foreign mission fields, every member of the Church should readily help to swell the sum demanded to support the mission fields within the territory of our own Conference.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.

To the Bishop and Members of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South.

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

The year just closed upon the Woman's Missionary Society of the Baltimore Conference has been, in many respects, a prosperous one. No increase of membership can be reported, but there has been evidenced a deeper interest in mission work and a greater willingness to labor for the cause. This is shown in the fact that, in spite of depressing times, our receipts for this year are nearly three hundred dollars in excess of those of last year.

The Woman's Board of Missions, last June, asked the women of the church to raise \$100,000 during the year. In response to this appeal our society has raised \$2,733.

Our membership is 2,391; adults, 1,661; juveniles, 730; subscribers to "Woman's Missionary Advocate," 347; to juvenile paper, "The Little Worker," 96.

We have started a circulating library, and expect this to be an efficient means of disseminating missionary information and furthering the interests of our work. Our fifteenth annual meeting was held in Luray, Va., October 7th to 11th, 1893.

An unusually large delegation was in attendance, and also a goodly number of visitors. Among the latter was Mrs. A. W. Wilson, who addressed the society on the subject of our Eastern work.

The annual sermon was preached by the pastor, Rev. T. W. Brown. The singing by the choir was, at all the services, exceptionally fine. The kind people of Luray opened their hearts and homes to the members of the society and dispensed a liberal hospitality.

Brother Brown proved himself in entire sympathy with our work, and ministers of other denominations cheered us by their presence and good words.

Our next meeting will be held in Berryville, Va.

REPORT No. 1. BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The Randolph-Macon Colleges and Academics

The four institutions bearing the Randolph-Macon name, and under the control of one board of trustees representative of the Virginia and Baltimore Conferences, are not only worthy exponents of the progressive spirit of our church, but factors of inestimable value in the accomplishment of its mission in the advancement of the Kingdom of Christ. The success which has attended their work thus far, the high position which they occupy in the confidence both of educators and the public, and their bright promise for the future, demonstrate the wisdom of the policy of unity and concentrated effort under which they have been conducted. They are not burdens to be borne by the church, but instruments of power in its hands.

The enrollment of students the present session is 470. The total value of the properties held is over \$600,000. The total receipts and expenditures for the year are about \$75,000. We call attention to these facts as showing the magnitude of this work, and its claim upon the appreciative interest and earnest support of the Conference.

The religious spirit and work of these institutions is recognized as a matter of supreme importance by the officers in charge; and it is especially gratifying to note the large number of their students that have this year been won to the Christian life.

At Randolph-Macon College the number of matriculates, despite the stringency of the times, is slightly greater than last year. The students from the territory of the Baltimore Conference represent 29 pastoral charges, leaving 119 charges without a representative at the college. These facts would seem to indicate that, with increased effort, a much larger patronage might be secured.

The hearty co-operation of the Conference in the earnest and vigorous canvass of the Principal of the Front Royal Academy has resulted in a remarkable increase of attendance at that institution, the number of students having risen from 65 last year to 109 for the present session. The work of instruction has been faithful and effective; and the school is worthy of the full confidence and support of our people.

The Woman's College at Lynchburg, in its management and course of instruction, has conformed to the plan under which it was organized, as a college of equal grade with Randolph-Macon College, at Ashland. No students are admitted as boarders whose preparation would not entitle them to admission there. The college is conducted in sympathy and cooperation with our own Conference school, the Wesleyan Female Institute. The enrollment of students for this, the first year of its existence, is 106, and we think it may already be regarded as both an educational and a financial success. We would especially emphasize the fact that the Woman's College is not simply one more school for young ladies, but occupies a position and does a work not attempted by any other institution in the South. It is, in the true sense, a college; and we regard the prosperity which attends its opening session as the augury of an honorable and useful future.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Conference at its last annual session:

WHEREAS, The Conference has, by resolution at two successive sessions, pledged its co-operation with the President and Trustees of Randolph-Macon College in a special effort to raise the sum of §40,000 for Randolph-Macon College; and,

WHEREAS, The Wesleyan Female Institute, the property of this Conference, is in urgent need of financial aid; therefore,

Be it resolved (1), That a canvass of the Conference shall be made, during this year, to secure the sum of \$50,000, of which \$10,000 shall be paid to the Trustees of Wesleyan Female Institute, to be applied to the payment of the debt of that institution; \$10,000 to the Trustees of Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal; and \$30,000 to the endowment of the chair of Biblical Literature in Randolph-Macon College; each of these funds to receive proportionally as collections shall be made.

Resolved (2), That the Rev. P. H. Whisner, the Rev. R. Smithson, T. T. Fishburne, Geo. R. Hill, and M. L. Walton, in conjunction with the President of Randolph-Macon College, the President of Wesleyan Female Institute, and the Principal of the Front Royal Academy, be appointed a committee to devise plans and organize the canvass called for in the foregoing resolution.

Resolved (3), That this committee shall have authority to call upon as many as twenty members of the Conference to assist in this canvass, and that the churches supplied by these ministers be requested to release them for this important service, not exceeding four Sabbaths, distributed over the period of two months.

We greatly regret that the peculiar financial condition of the country has prevented the committee from carrying out the purpose of the Conference as expressed in these resolutions. The need is as great as it was last year, and even more urgent. We, therefore, recommend to the Conference the re-adoption of the resolutions, with the following amendment, viz, that the first resolution shall read as follows:

Resolved (1), That a canvass of the Conference shall be made during the year, to secure the sum of \$60,000, of which \$15,000 shall be paid to the Trustees of Wesleyan Female Institute, to be applied to the payment of the debt of that institution; \$15,000 to the Trustees of Randolph-Macon Academy, at Front Royal; and \$30,000 to the endowment of the chair of Biblical Literature in Randolph-Macon College; each of these to receive proportionally, as collections shall be made.

We also recommend the usual assessment of \$2,000 for Randolph-Macon College.

REPORT No. 2, BOARD OF EDUCATION

Wesleyan Female Institute.

We feel gratified to report that this institute has had a successful session thus far, since September, 1893.

It has an enrollment of 75 boarding and 33 day pupils, or 108 in all.

REPORTS.

There have been added in the way of permanent improvements to buildings, &c., \$3,007.15; musical instruments, &c., \$1,559.96; furniture, &c., \$2,630.25; laboratory, \$106.19; making a total increase in the value of school property, \$7,297.55.

The present bonded debt of the institute, is \$21,267.58, all of which is now long past due; the interest, however, has been paid in full to January 1,1894.

The standard of the course of study has been raised very considerably, and the institute is now equipped with a corps of teachers who, as far as can be ascertained, are thoroughly in sympathy with the management, and who are in every way qualified to fill the position they hold.

All of the teachers, without a single exception, are members of the Methodist Church, and exert an influence for good that can not be overestimated. As a partial result of this goodly influence, seventeen young ladies have professed a saving faith in Christ, since the opening of the present session.

The general tone of the school has been very much improved, both in a musical and literary way.

This financial report shows that the present session will, after paying all current expenses, and paying the interest on its mortgage bonds, leave a net gain of several hundred dollars, and after carefully looking into the affairs of the school under the new management, we feel fully warranted in making the statement that the Board of Trustees made a wise choice when they selected Prof. W. W. Robertson as President of the Wesleyan Female Institute.

As an evidence of the appreciation of the school by the people of Staunton and of their hearty co-operation with the new management, we are pleased to note the fact that there has been subscribed by them \$10,445 towards the liquidation of the bonded debt of the institute, which, however, was subscribed under certain conditions.

In order that these conditions may be complied with, and in order that the balance of the bonded debt may be provided for, and that the further necessary improvements, such as putting in new heating apparatus, etc., be made to the school property, it is an absolute necessity that the Conference take immediate steps to provide at least \$15,000 in addition to the amount already subscribed by the people of Staunton.

A resolution looking towards this provision was embodied in our report of Randolph-Macon College, presented Saturday, March 31, which report, we trust, will receive the hearty co-operation of the entire Conference, to the end that the Wesleyan Institute, our Conference school, may be relieved of its present embarrassment and that its influence for good may be widened each year.

Finally, we desire to say that the intellectual, moral and religious training which our young ladies receive in this institution, cannot be too highly

appreciated, and that our Conference should use its every effort toward providing said institute with all necessary accommodations that would aid in making it more and more the pride of the Baltimore Conference.

Valley Female College.

The Valley Female College, located at Winchester, Va., under the control of Rev. J. P. Hyde, D. D., possesses excellent advantages for the education of young ladies. The location is attractive and healthful. The president and his accomplished wife give careful attention to the comfort and welfare of the pupils. The study of physics and chemistry is greatly facilitated by the use of improved apparatus and advanced methods of instruction. The religious opportunities are excellent. All these and other advantages combine to make this institution worthy of continued patronage, and we recommend it to our people in its vicinity.

Ministerial Education.

The Board has received no applications for aid in ministerial education during the past year, and no appropriations have been made. A small amount of money remains in the treasury. We again most heartily recommend this cause to the Church, and bespeak for it a liberal financial support whenever this may be needed.

We recommend the following appointments: J. A. Kern, Professor in Randolph-Macon College; B. W. Bond, Principal of Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal; Collins Denny, Professor in Vanderbilt University; J. P. Hyde, President of Valley Female College.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

The Sunday School Board submits the following report:

STATISTICS.

Number of Sunday Schools, 538; number of officers and teachers, 5,190; number of scholars, 38,195; amounts raised in schools for missions, \$9,612; total amounts raised in schools, \$22,535.

We report an increase of \$750 in amount raised in schools for missions, and an increase of 761 in the number of Sunday School scholars.

We would emphasize the importance of statistics of Sunday School work, and request pastors and superintendents to furnish promptly any information that the Secretary of the Sunday School Board may ask for.

EPWORTH LEAGUE.

We are convinced that organization and constant employment in church work is the best means of interesting our young people in the Church, and, therefore, recommend the organization of leagues, where another doing the same work is not already organized.

SUNDAY-SCHOOL METHODS.

We earnestly recommend the early training in systematic giving, and recommend the adoption by all our Sunday-School Missionary Societies of the envelope system prepared by G. L. Stevens.

We recommend the careful study of the lessons at home, and the constant use of the Bible in the class, by both teachers and scholars.

We think it very desirable that our Sunday-school periodicals should be made bright and attractive, so as to compare more favorably with the publications of other churches.

SUNDAY-SCHOOL ROOMS.

We would call the attention of all our people who contemplate building or improving churches to the importance of providing separate rooms adapted to the work of the Sunday-school. "A Sunday-school room for every school" should be the motto of the church.

Reference to our catalogue of plans will also show that a separate room for the Sunday-school can be built at comparatively small additional cost.

NEEDY SUNDAY-SCHOOLS.

We regret to report a further decrease in the collections on Children's Day for needy schools. All applications for assistance should be sent to H. S. Dulany, 300 West Lombard street, Baltimore, Md.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

With the approaching General Conference three quadrennia will have clapsed since the Church Extension movement was inaugurated among us. No enterprise of the Church, in comparatively so short a time, has borne more abundant fruit, or now promises a richer return for the future. During the successive years of its existence the Parent Board has dispensed its benefits with a liberal hand, multiplying houses of worship along our Western frontier and in other destitute portions of our work. In this general work the Conference Boards have been an important factor, contributing half their funds annually to this purpose. With the remainder they have greatly promoted and stimulated the erection of churches within their own borders. During the period referred to about half a million of dollars has been raised through the regular Conference collections for church building. To this must be added the amounts that have accrued from the several Loan Funds and special donations. Within eleven years upwards of 3,000 houses of worship have been erected through the agency of the general and local boards. This is about onefourth of the entire number of churches owned and occupied by us as a religious denomination. Our own Conference has raised for this object \$25,653.00.

We regret that we cannot make a more encouraging report for the past year. The extreme stringency of the money market has seriously affected all the Conference collections; and yet, making due allowance for this circumstance, we are satisfied that, had the efforts to raise the assessments for this fund been proportioned to its important relation to the interests of the Church, we should not be under the necessity of reporting a falling off from last year's receipts. While we have less money to distribute, the demands upon us are beyond all precedent. Twenty-one churches, representing every District in the Conference, have applied for help this year. After laying aside three of them as less urgent than the rest, the remainder receive only a small proportion of the amounts asked for. The Board has done the very best it could do under the circumstances, and only regrets that it could not make a more liberal apportionment in every case.

We are convinced that our people are not yet educated to the full appreciation of this vitally important part of our Church work. We are glad, therefore, to announce that the Board has made arrangements to supply every clerical and lay member of the Conference with a copy of the "Church Extension Bulletin," and sincerely hope that those receiving this magazine, gratuitously, will seek to diffuse its circulation among our people. It is a quarterly of 16 pages, at the low price of 20 cents annually.

We refer to the Treasurer's report for a detailed statement of the financial operations of the Board. There is appended the report of the Woman's Parsonage Home Mission Society, showing a most encouraging progress in this arm of our work.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

We congratulate the church that our Publishing House has not only been able to continue all of its work during the period of financial stringency, but also to realize a profit from its business nearly equal to that of preceding years. We are glad to report that no complaints against the house have come to the knowledge of your committee. This is in itself a strong testimony to the efficiency of the management, because our territory is large, and the orders, while individually small, are numerous.

The Nashville Christian Advocate continues to be acceptable to our people. We heartily recommend it to our entire membership.

The Review of Missions marks a decided advance both in the character and value of the missionary information furnished to the church, and in the admonition so much needed by all of us in reference to this important work. We believe a wide circulation of this periodical in all of our pastoral charges will increase the interest in the cause of missions.

The Quarterly Review continues to be a charge on the church. It cannot be doubted by those who give any thought to the subject that the church needs a review. Are we responsible for the failure to sustain this periodical, or is there a lack of appeciation on the part of our people?

Our Sunday School literature continues to keep abreast with the times in quality and in cost. This literature deserves, as it receives, the patronage of our own and other churches.

It is gratifying to be able to report that arrangements have been made, satisfactory to the publisher and editor of "The Episcopal Methodist," whereby the editor will hereafter give his entire time to that paper. While the Episcopal Methodist has done very well financially, indeed much better than could have been expected, yet the fact is that Dr. Lafferty, the owner and publisher, has been publishing the paper at a loss to himself. This is not creditable to us, and your committee does not believe the Conference is willing that this state of affairs shall continue. The Episcopal Methodist needs and deserves a better support. It is a paper that in purity of contents, allegiance to God, and our Methodism, fidelity to the best interests of our Conference, and in the neatness of its make-up, none of us need be ashamed to put into our own and in others' homes. So long as it preserves these and adds other desirable characteristics, the paper will continue to receive the endorsement and support of the Baltimore Conference. Let us at once increase the number of subscriptions to our Conference organ.

We recommend the appointment of Samuel Rodgers to the editorship of the paper.

We also recommend that the Conference assent to the request of the publisher to change the form of the paper, and also to change the name to "The Baltimore Christian Advocate."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Conference would reiterate with more pronounced emphasis than ever before its past deliverances that the traffic, use and manufacture of intoxicating liquors are incompatible with the teaching of the word of God, and damaging to the best interest of the Church. The evil is rapidly growing, and fearfully multiplying the victims of pauperism, insanity, disease and crime. It lies at the root and gives vigor to almost every social and national vice. It presents the most formidable obstruction in the legislation of our country, and imperils more than any other enemy the glorious inheritance of liberty, so dearly bought by our fathers.

The vast destruction of nutritive food in the manufacture of intoxicating liquors, the enormous capital perverted and massed together in this fatal trust, and the untold millions snatched from the school-houses and homes of our people, warn us in tones that cannot be misunderstood, that the dearest rights of domestic happiness and the most sacred duties of the sanctuary are in imminent danger. Our character as ministers constitutes us the natural guardians of childhood and the protectors of exposed womanhood. We, therefore, most earnestly protest against every encouragement of this the most destructive evil to the good morals of the community and the prosperity of the kingdom of God.

The fatal history of this traffic convinces us more than ever that we should take a firm and decided stand against every form of licensing intemperance; and we here express, in the following resolutions, the profound convictions of this body:

1. That we earnestly call upon our people to read the General Rules of the Discipline and the Chapter on Temperance.

2. That the Word of God and the whole legislation of the Church are in antagonism with the use, the vending and the manufacture of intoxicating liquors.

3. That we call upon all our people to present a united front in advancing all measures that look to the extirpation of this great social and national vice.

4. That we specially enjoin on all the ministers and members to become more watchful and to enforce with more fidelity the provisions of the Discipline on this subject.

5. That we earnestly invite our people throughout the Conference to invoke the Great Head of the Church to keep us in purity, and to stay the ravages of intemperance throughout our beloved country.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GENERAL CONFERENCE MEMORIALS.

Your Committee on General Conference Memorials begs leave to report the following:

I .- ON NUMBER OF CHARGES IN THE DISTRICTS.

WHEREAS. The condition and needs of our work vary in the broad territory of our Church, calling especially for more of the Presiding

Elder's care and oversight in some sections and less in others, and thus indicating need for greater adaptability in the rule limiting the number of charges in the Presiding Elders' Districts; therefore,

Resolved, by the Baltimore Annual Conference, in Annual Conference assembled, That we memorialize the General Conference so to change the law contained in Paragraph 104, page 76, of the Discipline, as to omit the proviso, and let it read: "To see that the Districts be formed according to his judgment."

II.—On Examination of Applicants and Probationers more Privately.

Resolved, That we memorialize the General Conference so to change the law as to provide for examination into the character and adaptation to the work of the itinerant ministry of applicants for admission on trial and probationers in Conference, before a committee, instead of in open Conference, so as to avoid, as far as possible, the public discussion of the character of our young preachers.

III.—On Authority for Unordained Traveling Preachers in Charge to Marry and Baptize.

Resolved, That we memorialize the General Conference to enact a law authorizing unordained traveling preachers in charge to celebrate the rite of marriage and to baptize.

IV .- ON REDUCING THE NUMBER OF MISSIONARY SECRETARIES.

Resolved, That we memorialize the General Conference to reduce the number of Missionary Secretaries from three to two.

V .- ON CHANGE OF OUR CONFERENCE BOUNDARY.

We have received a paper embodying the action of the Lewisburg District Conference at its last session, protesting against the agitation of the question of a severance of any of that part of our Conference territory from us, and requesting that the Baltimore Conference memorialize the General Conference to allow no change to be made in the boundary lines of our Conference; therefore,

Resolved, That we memorialize the General Conference to suffer no alteration to be made in the present boundaries of the Baltimore Conference

VI.—ON PROVISION FOR SCHOOLING OF YOUNG MINISTERS, WHEN ADVISABLE.

Resolved, That we memorialize the General Conference to insert in the Discipline, paragraph 98, answer 2, page 73, line 16, after the semicolon, and immediately before the word "also," the following clause: Also when recommended by the Board of Education, which recommendation is concurred in by the Annual Conference, to appoint preachers to study in institutions of learning under our care.

VII.—ON VERBAL CORRECTIONS IN OUR ARTICLES OF RELIGION.

Whereas, When the General Conference of 1808 provided for a delegated General Conference, said delegated General Conference was placed under

certain limitations and restrictions, one of which contains the following: "(1) The General Conference shall not revoke, alter, or change our Articles of Religion;" and whereas, no General Conference has ever attempted to ignore this restriction; yet whereas, some unknown hand has altered our Articles of Religion without any authority whatever, making the following changes in said Articles: In Article V, line 1, the word "containeth" has been changed to "contain;" in Article X, line 10, the word "is" has been inserted; in Article XI, line 3, the words "they call" have been changed to "are called;" in Article XVI, last line, the words "I Cor. xi: 29" have been added; in Article XVIII, line 23, the word "mean" has been changed to "means." Now, therefore,

Resolved, That the General Conference be memorialized to instruct the Book Editor of the Church to correct these alterations and to restore our Articles verbatim to the form in which they stood at the close of the General Conference of 1808, retaining, however, the note added in 1820 to Article XXIII.

VIII.—On Appropriation of Children's Day Money Not Used in the Conference.

Resolved, That we memorialize the General Conference so to amend paragraph 245, page 142 of the Discipline, as to allow each Annual Conference, on the recommendation of the Conference Sunday School Committee, to turn over to the Parent Sunday School Committee any of the money collected on Children's Day—namely, the ninety per cent. retained under the law by the Annual Conference—remaining in their hands, and that cannot be used to advantage in the bounds of said Conference; such money to be used by the Parent Committee for the publication of Sunday school literature for our foreign work.

IX.—REFERRING TO THE PROPOSED PREPARATION OF A COURSE OF READING AND STUDY FOR SUNDAY SCHOOL TEACHERS AND OLDER SCHOLARS; AND ALSO TO THE PROPOSED CHANGE IN THE RELATION OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE TO THE QUARTERLY CONFERENCE.

Your Committee recommend non-concurrence.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PAINE AND LANE INSTI-TUTES.

The Paine Institute, located in Augusta, Ga., is an institution for the education of Colored preachers and teachers, which was established by our General Conference.

The Lane Institute is the property of the Colored M. E. Church in Jackson, Tenn., which aims to do the same thing. The salary of the Professor of Theology in the Lane Institute is paid by the Paine Institute. These schools are both necessary, both doing good work and both needing help. As they are purely missionary, the burden of their support falls on the general Church.

All of the Conferences have agreed to accept an amount asked for, and to have it assessed with the other collections. The amount asked for from this Conference is \$500, and your Committee advise that this amount be accepted, and that the Board of Finance shall apportion it to the District as an assessment for colored education.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE BIBLE CAUSE.

Your Committee appointed on Bible Cause beg leave to submit the following report:

We recognize the great importance of circulating the Bible in connection with the preaching of the Word of God, which teaches the way of salvation.

We regret that so many inferior and worthless books take the place of the *Bible* in many Christian homes. Such reading gives us false ideas of life; but the Master said, "Search the Scriptures, for in them ye think ye have eternal life and they are they which testify of me." We deplore the destitution of the Bible amongst the poorer classes of people.

Resolved (1). That we, as a Conference, recognize and indorse the American Bible Society and its auxiliaries in their laudable work.

Resolved (2). That inasmuch as the collections in the past have failed to meet the demand, that we will do all we can, as a Conference, to increase the collections.

Resolved (3). That collections be taken by the preachers at their convenience, and forward the same to the nearest agent of the Bible House and take his receipt. Also, that members making contributions be requested to report to their pastor, so that we may know what our church is really doing for this cause.


