

FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY, March 24, 1897.

THE BALTIMORE ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its One Hundred and Thirtieth Session in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Staunton, Va., Wednesday morning, March 24, 1897, at 9 o'clock.

Rev. Bishop Charles B. Galloway, D. D., President of the Conference in the chair.

Opening—The Bishop read for the lesson from the Scriptures, the fifth chapter of the Second Epistle of Peter.

The Conference united in singing hymn 228-

"And are we yet alive."

Roll—By request of the President, Rev. James E. Armstrong, the Secretary of the last Conference, called the roll of clerical and lay members; one hundred and fifty-four clerical and twenty-one lay members responded to the call of their names. (See Roll.)

The hour for meeting was appointed for 9 A. M., and for adjournment, 12.30 P. M.

Church Entension—The Report from Rev. Dr. Morton, Church Extension Secretary, was presented, read and referred to the Conference Board of Church Extension.

Missions—The Report signed by Rev. H. C. Morrison and Rev. W. R. Lambuth, Missionary Secretaries, was presented, read and referred to the Conference Board of Missions.

Education—The Report of Rev. R. J. Bigham, Secretary of the Education Board was presented, read and referred to the Conference Board of Education.

Publishing House—The Report signed by Barbee and Smith, Agents of the Publishing House, at Nashville, was presented, read, and on motion referred to the Committee on Publishing Interests.

W. F. I. Debt—The Report of the Committe appointed at the last session of the Conference to take into consideration the Debt on the Wesleyan Female Institute, with an accompanying statement; also the Report of H. P. Hamill, President of the Wesleyan Female Institute, were presented and read and they were referred to the Board of Education.

Woman's F. M. Society—The Report of Mrs. L. P. Beehler, President, and also of Miss Virginia C. Massie, the Treasurer of the Woman's Missionery Society of the Baltimore Conference, was presented and read, and on motion, it was ordered to be printed in the Annual Minutes.

Question Twenty of the General Minutes was called, viz: Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?

Presiding Elders' Reports—The several Presiding Elders, John S. Hutchinson of the Baltimore District, James E. Armstrong of the East Baltimore District, Rumsey Smithson of the Washington District, Jefferson W. Duffey of the Winchester District, Peter H. Whisner of the Rockingham District, Benjamin F. Ball of the Roanoke District, Jefferson D. Martin of the Lewisburg District, George H. Second. That, after the application of such amounts as may be realized from said sale and collection, if there be any remaining indebtedness, the preachers of the Conference shall appeal to the members and friends of the Church in their respective charges, and shall make an earnest and faithful endeavor to raise, by private or public collections, or both, as large an amount as possible, to be used in the liquidation of said remaining indebtedness; and it shall further be made the special duty of each Presiding Elder in the Conference, or such person as he may designate, to to see that such appeal is made in good faith to the people of each charge in his district, and also to bring the matter to the attention of his District Conference.

SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Conference Board of Missions has furnished financial help in a small degree; and yet, in such a measure as was necessary to properly man the fields cultivated, and give a bare support to the laborers therein. No fund is more judiciously or more carefully administered than the sum contributed for Domestic Missions; and the chief regret is, that the means within the control of the Board is so limited, as to prevent it from devising more liberally for those brethren who must look to it for needed material support for themselves and families. There is no body of men more heroic and devoted, and hence

more deserving of the money received from the treasury of the Board.

The following summary of facts and results for the year, will vindicate the appropriations made by the Board to the charges under its care for the past '

Members, 13,743; net increase of members, 644; Sunday Schools, 186; Officers and teachers, 1,576; scholars, 10,784; churches, 169; value of churches, \$218,725; paid on ministerial support, \$20,342; paid on foreign missions,

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY, BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.

To the Bishop and Members of the Baltimore Annual Conference, M. E. Church, South.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN:

We rejoice to report a steady growth during the past Conference year; an increase in numbers, a more general interest in the subject; and a better understanding of the importance of Missions.

We thank the pastors for their aid and hearty co-operation, and feel sure that this is but the beginning of better things.

Our adult membership is 1,697; juvenile, 977; subscribers to Woman's Advocate, 357; to the Little Worker, 203. In every item there has been increase, so "we thank God and take courage."

During the past year we have supported two candidates for the foreign mission field in the Scarritt Bible and Training School at Kansas City, and a number of our auxiliaries support scholarships or other special work in the foreign fields. In addition to our regular dues we have, this year, appropriated the money to furnish a chapel, to be known as the Melissa Baker Chapel, in the Hayes-Wilkins Memorial School at Sung Kiang, China.

REPORTS.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

REPORT No. 1.

The Randolph-Macon Colleges and Academies.

This correlated system of educational institutions, which exemplifies, at least to some extent, the policy recommended by the Board of Education, commands the attention and confidence of educators and greatly increases the influence of our church with the general public. It is gratifying to state that our students, who have gone to universities for post-graduate study, have maintained the very highest standing in these institutions. During the last year three of them have taken the degree of Ph. D., four have won scholarships and three have won fellowships. At the University of Leipzig, a student who received the doctor's degree, and was said by the Chancellor to have passed the best examination that had been known during his chancellorship, was trained entirely at our College, and has been secured as a member of the faculty of one of our schools.

Randolph-Macon College has been recognized for many years as necessary to the successful prosecution of the work of our Conference. It is a training school for our ministers; it offers unsurpassed collegiate advantages to the young men of our Church; it endeavors to educate all its students according to a high intellectual standard and under positive Christian influences. For these and other reasons, it still commends itself to our cordial co-operation and support; and we believe that there has never been a time in its history when it was doing a better work or was more worthy of our confidence than at present. Five of its students are candidates for admission into the Conference at this session.

Randolph-Macon Academy, at Front Royal.

This Academy has maintained its high standard of excellence, and, under the diligent guidance of Rev. B. W. Bond, D. D., has endured the financial stress with a degree of success which encourages us to hope for a future of unqualified prosperity. Dr. Bond, after five years of faithful service, has carried out the purpose announced more than two years ago, and deferred at the request of the authorities of the Academy, and has resigned the position of principal, to take effect April 15th. At the request of the Executive Committee, Dr. Wm. W. Smith will take charge of the school for the remainder of the session. It seems to your Board very desirable that Dr. Smith shall continue this relation to our Conference Academy, and we hope the Trustees of the College will sanction his assumption of the principalship at the request of the Conference. We recommend the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Conference requests the Trustees of Randolph-Macon College to elect Dr. Wm. W. Smith principal of the Academy at Front Royal, and in that event we pledge him our hearty co-operation and support.

The Randolph-Macon Academy, at Bedford City, is having a prosperous year.

The Woman's College shows a very gratifying increase in patronage and resources. Generous contributions have enabled the Trustees to improve its equipment during the year to the amount of nearly \$25,000. Several additions have been made to the Faculty, and the Course of Instruction has been notably enlarged by the establishment of a Department of History and Economics, under the conduct of Prof. Thos. W. Page, Ph. D., (Leipzig). The patronage shows an increase of fifty-four students—the number of enrolled students for this, the fourth year of the institution, reaching 171—a most gratifying increase for the time, and for the times.

Paine and Lane Institutes.

The Board would respectfully urge the claim of the schools upon the sympathy and liberality of the Conference. They are engaged in a work which must appeal to our hearts and intelligence, and a work which the Church cannot allow to decrease in usefulness. The reports from these schools show a steady and determined effort to educate and prepare teachers and preachers who will labor for the highest good of their race in this country and abroad. We recommend an assessment of \$500 in behalf of Paine and Lane Institutes, and would earnestly urge that special effort be made to secure the whole amount assessed.

REPORT No. 2.

Constitution of the Board of Education.

ARTICLE I.—The Board of Education shall consist of one traveling preacher and one layman for each district, to be nominated by the Presiding Elders and confirmed by the Annual Conference at its first session after the General Conference, whose term of office shall be four years, unless sooner changed, as hereinafter provided.

ARTICLE II.—The officers of the Board shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, and the Conference Secretary of Education shall be the Treasurer of this Board.

ARTICLE III.—The President, Vice-President and Secretary shall constitute an Executive Committee, who shall act in the intervals of Conference session, under such general instructions as they may receive from the Board.

ARTICLE IV.—It shall be the duty of the Board to take cognizance of all the institutions of learning under the care of the Conference, and to secure such statistics of our educational work as are required by the discipline.

ARTICLE V.—It shall recommend to the Annual Conference such assessments and for such purposes as it may deem best; and the distribution and collection of such assessments shall be made by the Joint Board of Finance, and the proceeds to be paid to the Treasurer of this Board at the close of each session of the Annual Conference.

ARTICLE VI.—No educational enterprise shall hereafter be adopted or fostered by the Conference until it shall have been recommended by the Board.

ARTICLE VII.—All vacancies in the Board shall be filled by the Board, subject to the ratification of the Conference.

ARTICLE VIII.—A quorum of the Board shall be a majority of the members present at the Annual Conference.

ARTICLE IX.—Any amendments to, or alterations of, this constitution shall require a two-thirds vote of the Board.

REPORT No. 3.

We recommend an educational assessment of \$2,360, of which \$2,000 shall be for the benefit of Randolph-Macon College and \$360 for the General Board of Education.

We recommend that the second Sunday in June, or as near thereto as practicable, be fixed as the day on which the sermon on "Education," as required by the discipline, shall be preached, and that the educational collection shall then be taken, if the Pastor shall deem the occasion suitable.

We recommend the following appointments: J. A. Kern, Professor in Randolph-Macon College; Collins Denny, Professor in Vanderbilt University; John P. Hyde, President of Valley Female College; H. P. Hamill, President of Wesleyan Female Institute.

We also recommend that H. P. Hamill be appointed Conference Secretary of Education.

REPORT No. 4.

Wesleyan Femule Institute.

From the report of the Committee appointed at the last Annual Conference to arrange with the creditors of Wesleyan Female Institute, it appears that their efforts were unsuccessful. It further appears that the debts reported by the Commissioner of the Hustings' Court, where the litigation is pending, ascertains that the debt and interest as of February 7, 1897, aggregate, approximately, \$40,000; whether all this is justly due by the Institute, your Committee is not prepared to say. It appears from the report of Rev. H. P. Hamill, President, that the Stock Company contemplated for operating the Institute at the last Conference was organized, and the School has been conducted by him, under that organization.

The Company was chartered June 10, 1896, with a capital stock of minimum \$10,000, maximum \$25,000. The patronage of the school largely increased, and there is a hopeful outlook for the future, provided, a continuance of the school can be assured.

In view of the past history of this honored Institute, whose diplomas are held in nearly every State in the Union with pride, and as it is the only female school in the bounds of our Conference directly under the control of the Conference, being centrally located with reference to our Conference territory and the focus of Female Educational Institutions, it should be continued as a Conference school for the Christian education of our young women.

In order to a successful continuance of the school, it is necessary that some arrangement be made for a satisfactory adjustment of the debts justly due by the Institute.

Waiving the question whether or not there is a legal obligation upon the Conference to pay these debts, there is a moral obligation which cannot be ignored, and in some instances, at least, of the highest character.

The obligation of the Conference arises from the fact that the title to the property is vested in trustees for the Conference, appointed and confirmed by the Conference at its annual sessions, and they were, therefore, the agents of the Conference to whom they annually made their reports, and which were confirmed and approved by the Conference; in addition to this, it has been held out to the world as the Conference school, owned and operated by and for the Conference.

1. We recommend that a committee of three be appointed by the Chair, who shall be specially charged with the duty of ascertaining the true and just amount of debt outstanding against the institute, and be clothed with authority to consult with the creditors and ascertain the most favorable adjustment that can be made with them.

2. We are informed that the company incorporated last June is willing to buy the property at the amount of the first lien on the real estate and first lien of the personal property—say \$20,000—leaving about \$20,000 to be provided for, according to the statement of debts before us.

We recommend that provision be made for this probable balance by either first, a voluntary assumption by the various charges in the Conference, or second, an increase of the capital stock of the company already organized.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

From the reports submitted to the Conference we give the following statistics:

Number of schools, 581, increase 2; number of officers and teachers, 5,699, decrease 30; number of scholars, 40,357, increase 442; amount of money raised, \$10,623, decrease \$418; amount of money collected on Children's Day, \$485.

From the report of the Treasurer, which is herewith presented, it will be noticed that only \$196.83 of the amount collected on Children's Day has been turned over to the Board.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LITERATURE.

The official visit of the Rev. James Atkins, D. D., Sunday School Editor, was highly appreciated by us, and we are sure will be found helpful to the Sunday School cause, and we desire to make our acknowledgments to him for the position which he took and sustained by unanswerable argument, that the Sunday School is the foundation of the Church.

All of the literature that emanates from such a source is not only of the highest intellectual worth, but deeply spiritual as well. We note with pleasure the decided improvement of all our Sunday School literature, especially the Sunday School Magazine and the Visitor. The increased circulation of our Sunday School literature, as announced, is very marked, and we sincerely urge the use of the same to the strict exclusion of all other.

COLPORTEUR.

We heartily recommend the work of our Conference Colporteur, Rev. A. A. P. Neel, Shepherdstown, West Virginia, and urgently request that all of our Sunday School supplies be purchased directly from him. It is our hope that those who have heretofore failed to order through our Colporteur the necessary Sunday supplies will in the future be mindful of the claims of Brother Neel upon the Conference. His faithfulness and accuracy in discharging the responsible duties of his office cannot be too highly commended. In assisting him, promptness and fair dealings are at once assured.

SUNDAY SCHOOL DIRECTORY.

The design of the Board, inaugurated at the last session of this Conference, to publish a Sunday School Directory, which would include the names of all the Presiding Elders, Pastors and Sunday School Superintendents of the Conference, with their postoffice addresses, has been completed, and the Directory has been mailed to all of the interested parties. The Directory has been compiled with considerable care, and bespeaks its

own value to the great movement of the Sunday School cause in our Conference. There are other features of a highly interesting character to be found in the Directory, to which special attention is directed.

CHILDREN'S DAY.

We submit herewith the report of the Treasurer of this Board, showing the amount collected on Children's Day for the benefit of this Board. A casual examination of the report will indicate that the amount realized is far below our just expectations. This is doubtless to be accounted for on two grounds—a failure to observe the day, or to turn over the amount collected on the day to our Board.

The law of our Church on this subject is very plain, and why it is not strictly observed we cannot tell. The failure is as surprising as it is disappointing to us. It is our duty to emphasize the fact that the collections taken on that day are imperatively required to be turned over to this Board for disbursement according to the provisions of the discipline. We trust that in the future the strict observance of the reasonable requirements of this law may relieve us of the necessity for further complaint.

The twenty per cent. of the collections taken on Children's Day are very necessary to the maintenance of the General Sunday School and Educational Boards, between which the amount is divided.

In order that there may be uniformity in the use of appropriate programmes for Children's Day, we are pleased to announce that we have made arrangements with the Publishing House to furnish free to all our Sunday Schools, programmes for the day, on the sole condition that a collection shall be taken in accordance with the provision of the discipline. A circular letter will be mailed to the various Superintendents in the bounds of the Conference, giving necessary information, and accompanied with a sample programme. In order that we may carry this project out to a happy conclusion, it is necessary that we have the cordial support and influence of all our l'astors. The programme, as will be seen on examination of it, is not only sprightly and in keeping with the day to be observed, but is also of an instructive character.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Last year the Sunday School Convention and the Epworth League Conference were held separately, and as a consequence the attendance was unsatisfactory. This year it has been determined, after full consideration of the subject by the respective Boards, to hold a joint Sunday School Convention and Epworth League Conference, at Charles Town, W. Va., July 6-9, 1897. By the joint action of the Boards, M. L. Walton was elected President of the Convention and Conference, and the basis of representation left to the action of the respective Boards. Robert Magruder and Rev. J. W. Grubb have been elected as the Executive Committee, with the President, who is ex officio a member of the Committee, which is charged with the arrangement of the programme and all necessary details of the first annual meeting. The speakers and subjects will be announced shortly, together with other information for the guidance of those interested in the success of the meeting.

We desire to make the Convention and Conference the grandest meeting, in numbers and enthusiasm, that we have hitherto had. As all matters pertaining to it have been harmoniously adjusted by the Boards, we look for much good to result from the sessions.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, we can not lay too much stress upon the absolute importance and the vital interests of the Sunday School cause in our economy. It has been the direct means for nearly a century of training the children

for God and the Church, and can not be successfully supplanted by, or justly subordinated by any other kindred institution of the Church. It stands on its own merits, and will constantly be the happy medium of blessing to untold thousands. In this great labor of love and onward movement of the Church, we ask, and confidently expect to receive, the hearty co-operation of all our pastors and people in perpetuating this blessed method which has long since passed the experimental stage, in the inculcation of Scriptural truth, and the salvation of our beloved children

CHILDREN'S DAY FUND.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

With the recurrence of each annual session of our Board, it is an occasion of renewed regret that the funds at our disposal are so unequal to the demands upon them. The applications for aid the present year are more numerous than ever before; the sum called for exceeding three times over the amount in hand. Had the entire assessment for this purpose been paid in, we should still have lacked by several hundred dollars enough to meet these applications in full. While this circumstance indicates a greater activity in church building than heretofore, and, in this respect, bears an encouraging aspect; yet, it is greatly to be deplored that we have not been able to respond more satisfactorily to the urgent appeals for help that have come up to us from all parts of our Conference territory.

While the receipts this year are about the same as those of the last, we feel assured that if our people fully apprehended the vitally important relation which this great work sustains to the highest interests of the Church, it would receive a more liberal and appreciative support.

Since the Church Extension movement went into operation, we have raised in our Conference, for the objects contemplated by it, \$32,743. Deducting the proportion paid to the parent Board, and adding donations from that Board to the amount of \$9,700, and loans amounting to \$17,000, we have a total of \$43.071.50 expended for church building purposes in the period above mentioned. This sum has been distributed throughout the bounds of our Conference, in our cities, towns and rural districts, and has its abiding effects in the large number of church edifices that have sprung up among us within the past twelve or fourteen years.

We have given help at this session to eighteen churches, scattered through all the Districts of the Conference, and have been unfortunately compelled to set aside several applications.

We refer to the report of the Treasurer of the Board for a tabulated statement of receipts and disbursements, and other items connected with our fiscal operations.

The Board has adopted a rule requiring all applications for aid to be accompanied with an abstract of title, and the deed, or a certified copy of the deed, to the ground upon which the church is to be erected. This requirement has been rendered necessary by the difficulty in determining in a number of cases the exact legal status of the property for which help has been asked.

Applicants are also reminded of the rule requiring applications to be in hand at least a month in advance of the Conference session. This rule will hereafter be rigidly enforced.

We append the report of the Secretary and of the Treasurer of the Woman's Parsonage and Home Mission Society of our Conference. It will be seen how steadily this important branch of our Church Extension work is advancing in its noble enterprise and multiplying its beneficient ministries.

REPORT OF BOARD OF COLPORTAGE, 1897.

The Board of Colportage has heard with pleasure the report of the year's work, given by Rev. A. A. P. Neel, Colportage Agent. Sales have been made to the amount of \$2,737.93, an increase of \$490.25. This showing, considering all the difficulties against which he was compelled to labor, is encouraging. Believing that with the beginning already made this work can be carried forward with increasing success, we respectfully nominate Rev. A. A. P. Neel to this work.

We further recommend and urge that our preachers and people cooperate with Bro. Neel, and aid him in his work, by concentrating the entire patronage of the Conference upon our regularly appointed agent.

EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

Report No. 1.

We recommend that the following be adopted as the Constitution of the Epworth League Board of this Conference:

SECTION 1. The Epworth League Board of Baltimore Conference M. E. Church, South, shall be composed of one traveling preacher of the Conference and one layman from each district of the Conference, who shall

be nominated by the Presiding Elders of each district and confirmed by the Annual Conference; the election of said Board to be at the first session of the Annual Conference after each General Conference, the term of office to be four years, unless a change is made as hereafter provided. But the Board shall remain as at present constituted until the session of the Annual Conference following the General Conference of 1898.

Sec. 2. The officers of the Board shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected by the Board, and their duties such as usually pertain to the office.

SEC. 3. If any member of the Board shall fail to attend for two successive years his place may be declared vacant, and when a vacancy occurs from this, or any other cause, it may be filled by the Conference on nomination of the Presiding Elder for the district in which the vacancy occurs.

Sec. 4. This Board shall have general jurisdiction of the Epworth League work within the bounds of the Conference:

(a.) It shall provide for the holding of such Conferences as it shall deem best for the promotion of the Epworth League work.

(b.) It shall prescribe Constitutions for the Conference League Conference and for the District League Conferences.

(c.) It may annually make a levy or assessment on the local leagues of not exceeding five cents a member, for the purpose of defraying necessary expenses and for the promotion of the Epworth League work in the Conference, which is to be paid to the Treasurer of this Board.

(d.) This Board shall appoint the President of the Conference-League Conference and arrange a programme for said Conference, and also select

the time and place for the holding of said Conference.

Sec. 5. Each of the District Conferences and the Conference-League Conference shall make report in writing, signed by its president and secretary, to this Board at its annual sessions, as to the condition and the progress of the work within their several jurisdictions, and any other matter that they may deem pertinent.

SEC. 6. Any changes may be made in this Constitution upon the approval of a two-thirds vote of this Board and ratification by the Annual Conference.

REPORT No. 2 OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

To The Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodiat Episcopal Church, South, in session at Staunton, Virginia, March, 1897:

We are pleased to report decided growth in the Epworth League movement during the year. There has been an increase of sixty-seven local Leagues and 2056 in membership, making a total number of Leagues, this year reported, one hundred and sixty-five, and total membership of 7160. These figures will show the constantly increasing interest taken in this department of our Church work, both by our preachers and people. Yet we find quite a number of appointments in which Leagues have not been organized, and we hope that by the close of another Conference year there will be no appointment without a League. We call the attention of the preachers of the Conference to the annual report of the Secretary of the General Conference Epworth League Board, which has been presented to this Conference, and most heartily recommend that the attention of Local Leagues be called to the ten cent assessment plan provided for in the Constitution of Local Leagues, and that they be urged to send such assessment to Mr. J. U. Rust, Nashville, Tennessee, Treasurer of the Board. Also that all Local Leagues see to it that they are registered at the Central

Office, and work under a charter obtained from the General Board, as only chartered Leagues will be entitled to representation at the Annual, State and District League Conferences.

In order that there may be harmony in the organization of our district work, we recommend the adoption of the following Constitution for District League Conferences:

ARTICLE I.—Name.

This Organization shall be known as the Epworth League Conference of the —— District of the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South.

ARTICLE II.—Object.

The object shall be to promote the interest of Epworth League work in the District.

ARTICLE III .- Membership.

The Conference shall be composed of delegates elected on the basis of one to every fifteen members from each chartered League in the District; provided, however, that each chartered League be entitled to two representatives. The travelling preacher of the District and presidents of the various local Leagues shall be ex officio members.

ARTICLE IV .- Officers.

The officers of the Conference shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary and Superintendent of Junior Work. These officers shall be elected annually by ballot on majority vote. The Presiding Elder shall have general supervision of this District League Conference and shall be President of the Council.

ARTICLE V.—Duties of Officers.

It shall be the duty of the President to preside at the annual meeting of the Conference, and in the interim, to promote the organization of Leagues throughout the District. It shall be the duty of the Vice-President, in the absence of the President, to preside at the Conference, in the order of their election, and to foster the interests of their respective departments in all the charges within the bounds of the District. The Treasurer shall keep all the funds and disburse them only on the order of the President. The Corresponding Secretary shall keep in touch with the Corresponding Secretaries of the local Leagues, and endeavor to furnish them information with regard to the best methods of League work; and the Corresponding Secretary shall prepare and preserve a correct account of all of the proceedings of the District League Conference. The Superintendent of Junior Department shall have general supervision of the work of Junior Department, and shall endeavor to organize a Junior League in every charge, if practicable.

ARTICLE VI.—Council.

The officers of the District League Conference, with the Presiding Elder of the district, shall constitute the Council, which shall meet not later than three months after the adjournment of the Annual Conference. It shall be the duty of the Council to prepare the programme and select the time for holding the District League Conference.

We recommend that the Annual Conference League Conference be held conjointly with the Sunday School Convention at such time, place and nnder such management as may be agreed upon by the Joint Sunday School Board and Epworth League Board. We recommend that the Leagues of the Conference co-operate as far as practicable with the State League Conferences that may be held in their respective States, and that they send delegates to the International Conference to be held next summer in the City of Toronto, Canada.

We recommend that the Editor and Publisher of the "Baltimore Christian Advocate" be requested to appoint Rev. J. O. Knott to edit the Epworth League department in that paper for the ensuing Conference year.

We recommend that an assessment of two cents a member be levied upon the local Leagues to defray the expenses of this Board in publishing and mailing such information concerning League work as may farther promote the interest of this department of Church work within the bounds of our Conference, and that such assessments be sent to Mr. E. D. Preston, Treasurer of the Board, not later than July 15th, 1897.

We recommend that all our Leagues purchase their literature from our Conference Colporteur, Rev. A. A. P. Neel.

REPORT OF THE CORPORATE BOARD OF FINANCE.

It is pleasant to report that this monetary interest is bearing fruit, and contributing to the comfort of those whose care is a sacred charge to the Conference.

The sum of \$1,200 is turned over to the Joint Board of Finance to be distributed to the Conference claimants this year. The Treasurer's report, herewith presented, shows the nature of the investments from which the revenues of the Board are derived.

It may not be out of order to make the following statement: The Board is incorporated under the laws of the State of Maryland, and is located in the city of Baltimore. By the terms of the charter it is composed of five (5) clerical and four (4) lay members, and is self-perpetuating. Its affairs are managed by a Board of Directors, who meet quarterly. The annual meeting of the full Board is held during the session of the Conference.

Its present assets are:

The donation of Brother Charles Shipley, \$20,000, invested in ground rents in the city of Baltimore.

A bequest of Mrs. Fulton, netting \$975, loaned to the Trustees of Randolph-Macon College.

A bequest of Mrs. Sewell, \$3,000, invested in Baltimore city stock.

A loan of \$400 to the Wesley Grove Camp Association.

MEMOIRS.

Rev. JOSHUA MARSDEN GRANDIN.

Rev. Joshua Marsden Grandin was born at Hector, Schuyler county, N. Y., April 3d, 1814. At the age of eight years his father died, and he

shortly after removed to New York City. When but twelve years old he was converted to God, and three years later was licensed to exhort. In his sixteenth year he visited his eldest brother in Portland, Maine, and was there employed to fill the pulpit of an absent preacher for one or two months. He remained with his brother for several years, and, during that period, devoted his time to the study of medicine. Impelled, however, by the conviction of his call to the ministry, he entered Dickinson College, and there graduated. His Sunday hours were spent in the service of the Church, embracing every opportunity both to exhort and preach. In 1845 he was admitted on trial into the traveling connection and was assigned to Charles Circuit in the Baltimore Conference, as assistant with Rev. Isaac Collins. His subsequent appointments were as follows:

1846, Bladensburg; 1847-8, Calvert; in 1848, admitted into full connection and ordained deacon; 1849, he was placed in charge of Charles Circuit; in 1850, he was ordained elder by Bishop Waugh at Alexandria, and appointed to Christiansburg Circuit; 1851-2, Fairfax; 1853, Pleasant Valley Mission; 1854-5, Montgomery Circuit; 1856, he was made agent of the Olin and Preston Institute at Blacksburg, Va; 1857-8, Patapsco Station; 1859-60, Asbury and Mt Zion (colored), Washington city, D. C.; 1861, Harper's Ferry; 1862-66, chaplain in the Confederate States Army; 1866, Fincastle; 1867-8, Charles; 1869, Trappe; 1870, Queen Anne's; 1871-2, Taylor's; 1873, Frederick Avenue, Baltimore; 1874, Mt. Sidney; 1875, Prince William; 1876-9, Sunday school and tract agent; 1880, Rainsburg; 1881, tract agent. In 1882 he was placed on the superannuated list, where he was continued for fourteen years, until his death, July 24, 1896. He was married to Miss Ann Dove Shemwell, in Southern Maryland, in 1849, who, with their only child, Mrs. Mary G. Bennett, survives him.

His grand-uncle was Samuel Seabury, of Connecticut, who received the Episcopate in the Church of Scotland at the hands of three "non-juring" prelates, in the Episcopal Chapel at Aberdeen, November 14, 1784, but a little over a month prior to the ordination of Bishop Asbury; but who did not exercise the functions of his office until June 27, 1785.

Joshua Marsden, the English Wesleyan, "familiar to the Church by his hymns, by his missionary labors in Nova Scotia, Bermuda and the West Indies, and by his long services at home," was the uncle of Brother Grandin, who was named for him.

It is not surprising that a descendant of these historic men should inherit some of their excellent qualities, both of mind and heart. He was, indeed, in some respects, a remarkable man. His originality in the conception of the truth of God's Word, and in the illustrations which abounded in his sermons, was striking. His descriptive powers rendered vivid the men and the scenes of Bible history. At times he preached with great power and with wonderful effect. Many were the seals to his ministry.

It will be noticed in the record of his appointments how varied was the character of his work. This forcibly illustrates the versatility of his talents. It was impossible for a man of his peculiar traits to avoid the exhibition of peculiar contrasts—genial and gentle at times; at other moments he was brusque and impetuous. But he was ever loyal to his Lord and held tenaciously to his conscious relation to Him. So, after bearing the weight of infirmities even to the age of eighty-two years, he could say at the last moment: "I am only just waiting for the call of Jesus—it may come any day, but I am waiting and am ready." When the call came "he passed peacefully and quietly away without a struggle or a sigh" to meet his Lord.

Rev. JOHN WESLEY BOTELER.

Rev. John Wesley Boteler, son of John Davis and Eliza Mills Boteler, was born in Washington, D. C., March 12th, 1829. With the exception of a few years spent as an itinerant in the Baltimore Conference, and then in the Upper Iowa Conference, his labors, as minister and leader in the Church, were confined to the city of his birth, where he has left his indelible impress, and where he fell asleep in Jesus, April 12th, 1896, having lived sixty-seven years and one month.

He began his Christian life early. He was converted at the age of ten, and joined Wesley Chapel, M. E. Church, where his father was a class-leader and prominent member. He always had a warm place in his heart for old Wesley Chapel. Besides its connection with his conversion, his father had laid the first bricks of the present structure, which bears that name, and here his afterwards famous brother-in-law, T. J. Magruder, was at one time, Superintendent of the Sunday School.

Later in life, Brother Boteler's parents having moved to the eastern part of Washington city, he became connected with old Ebenezer, now Trinity M. E. Church, where it is likely he was sent out upon his ministerial career. He was received into the Baltimore Conference at Winchester, Va., in 1851, and was sent as junior preacher, to Greenbrier Circuit, with Rev. John W. Wolfe, preacher in charge. In 1852 he was put in charge of Sewell Valley Circuit. In 1853 he was ordained deacon, by Bishop Morris, at Hagerstown, Md., and received into full connection. That year he was sent to Sweet Springs Circuit, where he was, on 14th of February, 1854, married to Susan Hester Printz, of Dunlop's Creek, Va. The same year he was returned to Sweet Springs Circuit. The records show that he was ordained elder in the Old Light Street Church, Baltimore, by Bishop Waugh. After serving Jacksonville and Union Circuits a year each, he was transferred to the Upper Iowa Conference in 1857, and sent to Rockdale Circuit, near Dubuque. In 1858 and 1859, he served Andrew Circuit, in Jackson county, Iowa. Owing to several severe attacks of vertigo, upon advice of his physician he located, and soon afterwards returned to Washington city, where he engaged, for a time, in the shoe business, from which he retired, however, to accept the Secretaryship of the Mutual Fire Insurance Co., of Washingington, D. C. This place he held to the day of his death, a period of nearly thirty years. He was re-admitted to the Baltimore Conference in 1869, at Trinity Church, Baltimore, Bishop Wightman presiding, and was, at his request, placed on the Supernumerary list.

Contrary to what might have been expected from the relation he sustained to the Church and the connection he had with responsible secular labors, he never became secularized, but the last thirty years of his life must be reckoned as the most significant of all the years he gave to the Church. It was literally true, that his last days were his best days, ending in a fitting climax, and showing that he had, in his selection of place and work, been guided by the Spirit.

For about twenty years of the period of which we speak, Brother Boteler was connected with what is now Mt. Vernon Place M. E. Church, South, having here a class, and withal, being much to that congregation what he was afterwards to Epworth. It was he who suggested the name of the present Church.

About 1889, Brother Boteler moved his residence to the eastern section of Washington City, and soon became connected with Grace Mission, now Epworth Church. He found here a handful of people, who had been worshiping in a small frame structure on the corner of 7th and A streets, N. E. It seemed fitting that one who knew the city so well, and who had done so much here for the church of his choice, should round out his life by leading in the enterprise which eventuated in the beautiful structure which now graces the corner where stood the little frame building. He saw his opportunity and pressed to take advantage of it. "I want to see a new

church on that corner before I die," he use to so often remark, that the expression became known to embody his one desire. He seemed to have an impression that what was to be done must be done quickly. In his last days he thought and talked of little else than this crowning purpose of his life. He lived to see that purpose accomplished, and was glad. He gave so liberally of his means to the enterprise, that his friends chided him for his lavishness. He constantly affirmed that he was giving that which was the Lord's by right, and that he was glad to be able to invest in heavenly stock.

Epworth Church was dedicated January 12th, 1896, by Bishop A. W. Wilson, his warm personal friend. Brother Boteler was present at the services, and suggested Simeon of old. Just three months thereafter he died of paralysis, on Sunday evening, while the church bells were ringing for the evening service. The last words he said to his pastor were words concerning the Church, and were characteristic of the faith he ever had in her final triumph: "The Lord will provide."

In Brother Boteler's death the M. E. Church, South, in Washington City, lost one whose place it is difficult to fill. As the days multiply since he left us, our Methodism there feels no less keenly that loss. He was one of the best known of all the men who had to do with the establishing of our Church in the Capital City

A decided Southern Methodist in all his instincts, he had the love and confidence of all the Christian people of his native city—the Catholics vieing with the Protestants in doing him honor.

In his methods of Church work he was a painstaking "hand picker." If a certain amount of money was to be raised, he would often assume the bulk of it, and then with perseverence in the face of any discouragement, he would add little by little, until he had accomplished what he set out to do. So in his labors for souls, he worked upon individuals. When in the active ministry he rode a great way upon one occasion, to his appointment, and found one man as his congregation. He took a text, preached, and then came down and shook hands with his audience. Many are the souls who will greet him on the other side, who have thus been impressed if not won to Christ through his carefulness for individuals.

As to generosity, Brother Boteler was a kind of marvel. While much he gave was known because of the channels through which it came, much will never be until "that day." He gave scripturally, and most cheerfully, often saying, when various means were used to raise money, "O that Christian people would learn the joy of direct giving!"

In manner, Brother Boteler was gentle and courteous, with an exceedingly low and sweet voice, which he consecrated to the Lord in encouraging the faint-hearted and in singing the songs of Zion. Perhaps in no capacity was he happier than when leading the congregation where he worshipped in its service of song. He loved old Methodist hymns and tunes, and taught others to do the same.

One who knew Brother Boteler in his youth, describes him thus as a preacher, the description agreeing well with what he was in his closing days: "He was not at all demonstrative but calm and deliberate, yet earnest and clear in his presentation of truth." The last sermon he preached, he dellvered at Marvin M. E. Church, South, upon communion occasion. It was on a gospel theme and he was very happy in the service.

He was as calm in the face of death as he had ever been in life, retaining his love of humor to the last. He seemed to have not the remotest dread of the last enemy.

His funeral took place at Epworth M. E. Church, South, Washington, D. C., April 14, 1896. All of the ministers of our own Church in the city and many from the surrounding charges, being present, and taking part in the solemn but sweet service. He was buried in the Congressional Cemetery to await the resurrection of the just.

Brother Boteler leaves a wife and five children. All are members of the Methodist Church. One of his sons is an official member in the congregation where Brother Boteler completed his life, and which owes so much to his leadership.

Rev. ROBERT ROSS.

Brother Ross was born near Westernport in Allegany county, Md., and died, December 13, 1896, within a few miles of the place where he was

born, about 84 years before.

He was converted as a boy, became a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church in his youth, and continued such until his admission into our Conference in 1868. He was a local preacher in the former Church, from 1850 to the time of his union with us. He appears to have been admitted as an elder.

Brother Ross' appointments and years of service were as follows: Admitted in 1868, he served two years on Flintstone Circuit and three years at Rainesburg. In 1873 he was received into full connection and appointed to Newcastle, where he remained four years. He served Catawba two years, James River one and Catawba again for four years; one year at Lafayette, two more at Newcastle, and three years on Botetourt Mission completed his active work in the ministry. In 1890, at the Conference at St. Paul's Church in Baltimore, he superannuated.

Since his retirement, to the time of his death, his home has been with

his brother, Henry Ross, near Westernport, Md.

Among those who knew him intimately, Brother Ross was held in high esteem for his Christian character, and was reckoned a preacher of ability. The brethren who visited him shortly before his death, found him strong in the faith, fond of the Word and cheerful under affliction. Seven months of continuous suffering, tried and proved his patience and Christian fortitude.

He sleeps on the summit of one of his native mountains; his grave almost as lonely as that on distant Nebo. Future generations will scarcely care to find it, or caring will not be able. But the hope of a better resurrection is his, and, on some greater Transfiguration day, with Moses and Elias, and all the company of the Redeemed, he will appear with the Lord

in His glory.

Rev. JOSEPH H. TEMPLE.

Rev. Joseph H. Temple was born in Pendleton County, Virginia, February 21, 1828. His parents were Harry F. and Elizabeth Temple. He was converted under the preaching of Rev. Samuel Regester, and united

with the M. E. Church, 1854.

August 20, 1850, he was married to Miss Sarah A. Bruffey of Rockingham County, Va. She was reared in the Presbyterian faith, but after the conversion of her husband, and upon his admission on trial into the Western Virginia Conference, June 1, 1855, she cheerfully accepted the lot of an itinerant's wife, and, with a fidelity and devotion which never faltered; shared with him his toils and trials until her death, which occurred September 1, 1889.

His first appointment was in charge of Weston Circuit, 1855, and West Union, 1856. In 1857 he was admitted into full connection, ordained deacon by Bishop Simpson, and returned to West Union; 1858, he was sent to Ripley and Mill Creek; 1859, was ordained elder by Bishop Morris at the Conference, held in Parkersburg, Va., and returned to Ripley. His health failing, he was placed in 1860 on the supernumerary list, from which he was transferred to the superannuated relation in 1862. When the Baltimore Conference met at Bridgewater, Va., 1864, he was received and placed on the supernumerary list. He was continued in this relation until 1867,

when he became effective, and was appointed to South River Circuit, Md. He spent two years on this work, and in 1869 had charge of Salem and Bethel Circuit, Va. His subsequent appointments were as follows: 1870-1, Lexington Circuit; 1872-3, Big Lick; 1874, Bridgewater; 1875, Mourt Sidney; 1876-7, Stafford; 1878, Trappe; 1879, Charles and St. Mary's; 1880-3, Frederick, Va.; 1884-5, Crab Bottom; 1886-9, Wardensville, W. Va.; 1890-1, Staunton Circuit Mission.

February 15, 1891, he was united in marriage to Mrs. Elizabeth C. Baskin,

who survives him.

1892 he was granted a superannuated relation, in which he remained

until his death.

The health of Brother Temple was never robust, but he was "fervent in spirit, serving the Lord." He was a good preacher, sound in doctrine, thoroughly committed to the work of the ministry and wise and prudent in administration.

He was a man of few words, grave and somewhat reserved in manner,

"giving no offense that the ministry be not blamed."

Those who knew him best, placed a high estimate on his character. Beneath his seeming reserve he had a warm and loving heart, and needed only to be long enough with a people to grow in their confidence and affection. His ministry was not without fruit. Souls were awakened and brought to God under his preaching; the standard of Christian living was elevated by his upright example; and, through his instrumentality, church

enterprises were wisely guided to successful completion.

·His health steadily declined through the five years of his retirement from the active work. For ten months before his death he was confined to his bed. When the end came it was in peace. He died, March 27, 1897, during the session of the Annual Conference, at Staunton. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. P. H. Whisner, D. D., and Rev. Jas. H. Boyd, D. D., March 29, 1897, at Churchville, Va. He rests from his labors, and his works do follow him.

JOHN W. NUMSEN.

Resolved, That we deem it but proper to express in this form our deep sense of the loss we have sustained by the removal from our midst, during the past year, of Brother John W. Numsen, a prominent and influential layman of our Church, long and actively associated with us in our Confer-

ence sessions.

Resolved, That we gratefully recognize and appreciate the faithful and efficient service he rendered through successive years in his official relations as Treasurer of the Joint Board of Finance, and of the Conference Benevolent Society, as well as his devotion to the Church in all her interests. Though unexpectedly stricken down in the midst of an active and useful life, we feel assured that his sudden departure was only a happy surprise into the presence and joy of his Lord, and a speedier entrance upon the reward of the "good and faithful servant."

Resolved, That these resolutions be published in the minutes of the Conference with the other memorial tributes of this occasion, and that a copy of them be transmitted to the family of our deceased brother, with the assurance of our sincere sympathy with them in their great sorrow.

Resolved, That inasmuch as special reasons have prevented the preparation of memoirs of Rev. Joshua Marsden Grandin, a superannuated preacher of this Conference, who died during the past year, and of Rev. Joseph H. Temple, also a superannuate, whose death has been so recently announced to the Conference, that the members of the Committee on Memoirs in the districts, respectively, where these brethren died, be requested to prepare suitable obituary notices of these brethren and publish the same in the minutes.

It is manly, independent and charitable in advocating the doctrines and the economy of our church. It materially supports in its circulation the worthiest claimants of the Church. It ought to have many more subscribers among us. We recommend a large circulation of this useful paper throughout the bounds of our Conference.

The "Methodist Review" under the very able and earnest management of its wise and gifted editor, has increased in its circulation, is self-sustaining, and is now recognized as standing in the front rank of the periodicals of its kind. We hope that our preachers and laymen will read and

Helm, published at Nashville Tenn. We heartily recommend this valuable paper to the women of our Church.

We are pleased to note a large sale of the course of Epworth reading.

The "Eminent Methodist" series of booklets, issued by the department, has had encouraging sale. With the growth of the League, the "Epworth Era," will increase in its circulation.

We recommend our own Epworth publications to our League workers.

The "Baltimore Christian Advocate," our Conference organ, comes nearest to our homes and our attention. We feel deeply interested in its growth and success. It is our weekly visitor and teacher, giving us our home and general news. We appreciate the services of our faithful and efficient editor, and suggest that the paper would be more effective in the accomplishment of the object of its mission, by the insertion of more connectional news, namely, our mission fields &c, and more frequent general editorials.

We commend the editorial policy, in defending and guarding the interests of our beloved Methodism, and would recommend the re-appointment of Rev. J. S. Hutchinson, as editor of the paper.

ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee beg leave, respectfully, to submit the following report:

Measuring the field of responsibility of a Christian body, and seeing it commensurate with the wide spread ravages of intemperance, this Conference would pronounce with more emphatic denunciation than ever before, that the habitual use, the vending, and the manufacture of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, incompatible with the Spirit and teaching of the Word of God, and is destructive of all the best interest of society; that it presents the most formidable obstacle in the advance of the Church, and threatens the very heart and purity of our holy religion.

The vice has fastened itself on the very vitals of our country. It is growing and spreading. It is multiplying in alarming ratio the unhappy victims of disease, pauperism and crime. The evil gives root and vigor to every vice, poisoning domestic happiness, blighting innocent childhood, and corrupting all sources of national legislation. The evil is putting on a bolder front, and is now denanding, as a right, the license to slaughter unprotected millons of our citizens, and does not scruple in the work to mass vast capital for the avowed purpose of purchasing the exclusive

privilege of sustaining saloons, and brothels, and gambling hells, imperiling our homes, our children, and the glorious inheritance of liberty so dearly bought by the blood of our fathers. Patriotism is at a low discount in the saloon, and Christianity is there trampled under the feet of blaspheming rioters.

The enormous destruction of grain in the manufacture of liquors advances the price of bread. It robs the poor of the world. The vast amount of productive capital thrown into this vortex and diverted from legitimate trade, the untold millons snatched from school houses and colleges, the crime, the riot and anarchy of large cities, the liquor trust and combinations sustaining distillers; the ruinous strikes in factories, and the suspension of wholesome trades, warn the whole country in tones that can not be misunderstood; and also appeal to the Church, that the most sacred duties of life are imperiled by intemperance, that a blasted conscience is offered in exchange for the peace of God, and the utter ruin of soul for everlasting life. Intemperance is one of the greatest sins of the world. It is the mother of atheism. Nothing prevents the masses, and the working people, and poor men from attending the house of worship more than the use of intoxicating liquors. If saloons were closed, Churches would be crowded.

As ministers of the Gospel, we are the commissioned guardians of society, of childhood, of exposed womanhood, and of the good morals of the commonwealth. We therefore, most earnestly protest against any encouragement of the evils of intemperance. The fatal history of the traffic running back for almost a century, demands of Christian people a decided stand against every form of licensing the evil of intemperance; and we would express the profound convictions of this body in the following resolutions:

- 1. We call the attention of our people to the discipline in paragraph 216. "Let all our preachers and members abstain from the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, to be used as a beverage, from signing petitions for such sale, in becoming bondsmen for any person as a candidate for obtaining license, and from renting property to be used for such sale. If any member shall violate any provision of this paragraph, he shall be deemed guilty of immorality. It shall be the duty of the pastor to deal with the offender. Chapter VII, section V.
- 2. That the word of God forbids, and that the legislation of the Church is directly opposed to the use, the traffic and the manufacture of intoxicating liquors as a beverage.
- 3. That we call upon our people to co-operate in all prudent measures that look to the extirpation of this fatal vice; and we recommend them to put themselves in sympathy and afford help in securing wise legislation for the prohibition of the manufacture and saloon sales of intoxicating liquors as a beverage.
- 4. That we recommend a Temperance meeting be held at least once a year in our several charges, especially in the interest of the young people, or that a discourse be delivered on the subject, and that temperance literature be circulated.
- 5. That we earnestly invite our people throughout the Conference bounds to invoke the Great Head of the Church to arouse us to watchfulness against the encroachments of this evil, to keep the Church in purity, and to stay the ravages of intemperance throughout our beloved country.
- 6. That we request the newspapers within the Conference limits to publish this report.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

The Committee on Bible Cause deeply appreciating the great importance of the work committed to it, begs leave to make the following report:

From representations made to us, there exists to-day, in the States represented in our Conference a deplorable proportion of homes without the Bible, and in families too poor to purchase it. We have no figures from the Maryland Bible Society, but from the last annual report of the Virginia Bible Society, we quote the following: "Some of our colporteurs report one out of seven families without the Bible, and one reports for his section one out of three," and the Society places the average for the State, at "one out of fifteen."

We feel that the responsibility of this matter rests upon every Evangelical Church, and it behooves us to urge greater and more earnest exertions for the Bible Cause, and to this end we call especial attention to the requirements of the General Conference, and recommend that in each quarterly Conference, special stress be laid upon the 16th question, and that our pastors emphasize this most important work in the evangelizing of the world, as provided in paragraph 134 of the Discipline. We regret that from the reports received, on many of our Quarterly Conference records, the question, "What are we doing for the American Bible Society" must be answered "Nothing," as sixty-four charges make no report.

The amount received this year is \$360, from the following charges:
