

Bishop Warren A. Candler, D. D., President of the Conference, in the chair.

The Bishop read the lesson, after prayer, taken from the Epistle to the Ephesians, chapter 4, and then addressed the Conference.

Reports signed by Nina Wilson, Corresponding Secretary, and by Virginia C. Massie, Treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Conference, were presented and read.

A communication from Rev. J. W. Compton, Troy, Idaho, a former member of this body, dated March 31, 1900, was presented and read, and on motion, the Secretary was instructed to respond.

Question Twelve: What traveling preachers are elected Elders?

The characters of Joseph J. Ringer, M. Preston Weikle, William E. Henry, David H. Kern, (already a local elder) Alfred II. Harnsberger, George W. Richardson were examined, and having also passed in examination before the Committee on the Course of Study, they were severally elected Elders.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY, BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.

To the Bishop and Members of the Baltimore Annual Conference, Methodist

Episcopal Church, South

FATHERS AND BRETHREN:

It is with great pleasure I present to you the report of the Treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Baltimore Conference. There is no shadow of falling off; but in many regards, progress in our work is noted. About five hundred dollars over last year's amount is reported. We have lost in membership, I regret to say. We number sixty-nine adult societies, and thirty juvenile societies. Some of our juvenile societies have been merged into the Epworth Leagues; so, though they do not count on our roll, they are not lost to the church.

We have received no large gift during the year; but love for souls have stirred our women to generous giving. We plan to make our share of the Twentieth Century Offering, twenty-five hundred dollars; and this we wish to give without detracting from what our pastors will raise.

We feel that we can only fail in our work, unless we have the moral support of the Conference. We ask the pastors to help us with advice and co-operation; and pledge ourselves in turn to support them in their undertakings.

We feel that no small portion of our success during the past year is due to the kindness shown to us by the editors of the Baltimore Christian Advocate; who ungrudgingly have placed at our service a page in their valuable paper; and have with kindness and judgment given us suggestions of practical value. We ask a continuance of this favor, which we most heartily appreciate.

REPORTS.

THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

REPORT No. 1.

Washington, D. C., April 6, 1900.

To the Baltimore Conference, M. E. Church, South:

In undertaking the Twentieth Century Movement, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South has entered upon the greatest campaign it has ever attempted.

This movement was planned by the last General Conference and received a hearty and unanimous endorsement from our own Annual Conference at its session in 1899. The Church is fully committed to the work, and it must go forward. Failure to accomplish what the constituted authorities of our great Church have set before us to be done, would not only be humiliating and disappointing, but disorganizing and perilous to our Church as a connectional organization. Failure to keep step to the great world-wide movement for which the hosts of Methodism are being marshalled would forfeit the honorable position in its ranks which we hold.

The Board of Education still feel, as expressed in their report of last year, that our membership can, with few exceptions, be brought to look upon the movement as a glorious opportunity for giving expression to the gratitude which all God's people must teel, for the wonderful things that he has wrought during the century about to close. The all-important problem now before us is to provide means for bringing the subject fully before all our people, to the end that all may be educated up to their duty with respect to this movement, and reminded of the privileges which it affords them.

Let us resolve, that so far as we are concerned, the movement to raise a million and a half of dollars by the first of the new century, for the support of the educational work of our Church, shall be successful.

So far \$746,000 has been secured.

The Baltimore Conference has assumed, as the minimum amount to be raised within its bounds, \$62,500.

Our opportunity is our call. The century now closing has been a glorious one in many ways, and we ought to thank God for the material blessings, and for the intellectual, moral and spiritual development which he has so marvelously multiplied and strengthened. As Methodists, we should be most profoundly thankful for the rich harvest of souls which he has made our Church the means of bringing to Him. The new century will be yet more wonderful than the closing one, if we are true to our trust. What shall we render to the Lord for all his benefits? We are to give expression to our gratitude by turning our material wealth into the intellectual and spiritual wealth of our children. We cannot afford to prove ourselves unworthy of the great work committed to us by our Church.

We will not fail if the work is carried out in the spirit of prayer and consecration and sincere anxiety for the extension of the Kingdom of Christ.

The time is short. The whole Church must awake. We must organize. We must work.

We recommend that a Twentieth Century Committee, with the pastor as chairman, be organized in each charge; that through this committee literature may be distributed and every member and friend of our Church given an opportunity, and, if necessary, urged to make an offering for this cause. We further recommend that a committee of five, with the Presiding Elder as chairman, and two ministers and two laymen, to be chosen by this board, be formed in each district, to organize the canvass in their respective districts in co-operation with the Executive Committee, and after conferring with the pastors, to arrange for the presentation of the movement in each charge.

We commend the work of the Executive Committee formed last year, and are pleased to report that they have distributed literature and otherwise diligently carried on the work of enlightening the people concerning the movement. So far as known, (it is impossible now to make a complete statement) there has been subscribed in our Conference about \$10,000, and this, we think, has been largely secured through the efforts of the Executive Committee. We recommend that that committee be continued for the purposes indicated in last year's report.

REPORT No. 2.

The Randolph-Macon System of Schools.

The Board of Education of the Baltimore Conference is glad to commend again to the attention and confidence of the Church and the general public this system of schools.

Chancellor Smith has relaxed none of his efforts to maintain their high standard of excellence, and to deserve fully the approval and benefactions of our people in their behalf.

1. Randolph-Macon College.

The old college at Ashland, though not now under the presidency, as in recent years, of a member of this body, may yet be assured of the unfailing and hearty interest of the Baltimore Conference.

In Rev. W. G. Starr, D. D., recently appointed president, we recognize an able and eminently fitted successor to Dr. Kern, welcome him to our Conference bounds and charges, personally and officially, and promise him our zealous co-operation in behalf of the College. Meanwhile we are glad to learn from Dr. Starr, whose absence from our Conference session on account of sickness we regret, that the College has a larger enrollment of students than for any one of the past nine years, and that the "young men are studious, orderly, cheerful, healthy and obedient," and, with the faculty, are seeking to maintain a high standard of scholarship in a spirit of devotion to God and Methodism.

2. Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal.

The high standard of this Academy has been fully sustained the past year.

Prof. A. L. Melton, principal, is eminently qualified for that position, and, aided as he is by teachers of marked ability and devotion to christian education, a most thorough academic work is the result.

This Board most carnestly recommends the Front Royal Academy as, in every way, worthy of the patronage and support of all our people, and others who have sons to educate.

The attendance this year is a slight increase over that of last year.

3. Randolph-Macon Woman's College.

The Woman's College at Lynchburg continues to grow in accommodations, efficiency and patronage. Its affairs are now receiving the personal and continuous attention of Chancellor Smith.

Within the past year the buildings have been completed and furnished according to the original designs, thus adding to the comforts and conveniences of its residents and its capacity for boarding pupils; and notwithstanding the additional room, it was nearly all taken as soon as ready.

We call attention again that this College is listed by the United States Commissioner of Education in "Class A," and for attendance, equipment and resources it stands eighth in this class, of fourteen colleges for the education of women.

4. Other Schools of the System.

The Academy at Bedford City, Va., and the Institute at Danville, Va., a school preparatory to the Woman's College, are as the Academies at Bedford City and Front Royal to the College at Ashland, are having a prosperous year and are doing good work.

Valley Female College.

This school, with Rev. J. P. Hyde, D. D. LL. D., as president, is reported as having had a very successful year, and giving careful training to its students. We cheerfully renew our endorsement and commend it to our people.

Fairmount Seminary.

We note with pleasure the establishment of this Institution for young ladies, by Prof. A. T. Ramsay, at 2025 13th street, N. W., Washington, D. C., and extend him a welcome to our bounds, and wish him great success.

Paine and Lane Institutes.

It is very gratifying to note the evidences of progress made by these schools. The number of former pupils who are occupying positions of usefulness in the Church and in the world gives promise of still larger results.

We recommend that the subscriptions made by members of this Conference on April 6th last be recorded in a special book of record and be entered upon the Minutes of this session, with leave to other members to add their subscriptions to the roll and record. We recommend also that the subscription card used in that collection be the authorized subscription card of our Twentieth Century Offering canvass.

We request Bishop Candler to furnish us a copy of his admirable address on the Twentieth Century Offering for publication, to be used throughout our Conference in the interest of that movement.

The Board recommends an assessment of \$2,360, of which \$360 shall be for the General Board of Education, and \$2,000 for the benefit of Randolph-Macon College at Ashland, Va. Also an assessment of \$500 in aid of Paine and Lane Institutes.

The Board recommends the appointment of Rev. J. A. Kern, D. D., and of Rev. Collins Denny, D. D., as professors of Vanderbilt University, and

of Rev. J. P. Hyde, D. D., as president of the Valley Female College; also of Ernest L. Woolf and Frank A. Tyler as students in Vandervilt University.

REPORTS.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. H. P. Hamill as Conference Secretary of Education. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

LITERATURE.

Nothing but words of praise and commendation can be given our ably-edited and attractively printed Sunday School literature, issued by our publishing house at Nashville. Every Sunday School in our bounds should use these periodicals in preference to all others, if we would be loyal to our Church and true to our own interests and the welfare of our children.

CHILDREN'S DAY.

The Board will continue to furnish free programmes to all schools which will observe the discipline concerning Children's Day. We urge upon every Sunday School to faithfully observe "Children's Day," as directed by our discipline, and to remit promptly the collections taken on this day to the treasurer of our Board, Mr. W. H. Thomas, Leesburg, Va. It is a violation of our Church laws to divert this collection to any other use, and yet many of our schools habitually do this. Of the \$768 reported to the statistical secretary as collected on Children's Day last year, \$150 has not found its way into the treasury of the Board.

SUNDAY-SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Past experience has encouraged us to believe the provision for holding a Conference Sunday School Convention a most wise one, and we urge all our schools to take an interest in making the convention the success it should be. The arrangements for the convention to be held this summer have been left in the hands of Hon M. L. Walton, president, Mr. W. W. Millan, secretary, and Rev. Dr. C. M. Hawkins, as an Executive Committee. Due notice will be given of the time and place of meeting.

CATECHETICAL INSTRUCTION.

We deem it important that our children and young people should be instructed in the doctrine and polity of our Church. To this end we urge that more attention be given in our schools to the use of our catechisms, that the teachings of our Church may be more generally and thoroughly impressed upon those under our care in our Sunday Schools.

STATISTICS.

According to reports presented to our Conference, there are this year 577 schools, a decrease of 20; 5,491 officers and teachers, a decrease of 349; and 40,906 scholars, a decrease of 738. We deplore even a seeming decrease in numbers in this important branch of our work. The amount collected for Sunday Schools is \$12,280, an increase of \$2,020; for Missions, \$11,809, an increase of \$1,812; for Children's Day, \$768, an increase of \$171.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

It is gratifying to be able to report a steady increase in the receipts of the Board from year to year. Last year they were \$102 in advance of the previous year. This year the increase is \$132 over the last, making the percentage on assessments 633. We are in advance of most of the Conferences in our connection in this regard, and yet far below the standard we could reach with a little more earnest effort and should seek to attain. There is no reason why we should not very closely approximate the total amount of the annual assessments. This would enable us to meet every claim upon our funds without abatement. If the preachers in our various charges would bring the subject of Church Extension to the attention of their congregations, and show the important relation it sustains to the most vital interests of the Church, and what a vast amount of good it has accomplished in our own Conference, we are satisfied our receipts from year to year would be largely increased.

Some statistics from the report of the Parent Board will show what has been achieved through this great department of Church enterprise during the seventeen years of its existence. Of the 14,241 churches now owned by our denomination, 4160, or a little less than one-third, have been aided by our organization, and of the \$22,003,165 at which our churches are valued. \$1,048,091, or a little less than one-twentieth, has been furnished by it dur-

ing its brief history.

According to the General Minutes of 1898, 155 church buildings were added to our number during the year, besides the many new and better ones that have taken the place of others. And yet there are 2681 organized societies in our Church without houses of worship. In view of this fact, as well as the ever-growing demands for help from all quarters of our territory, no effort should be spared to supply these pressing needs as early as possible. And now that the Board has extended its system of relief into the foreign field, the necessity is the more urgent to give it our liberal and hearty support in this enlarged sphere of its operations.

The Treasurer's report, which accompanies this, will show the amounts received and expended during the year, and the appropriations for aid. We have been able to do something for all the Churches applying for help but not to the extent we desired.

We append to this the reports of the Corresponding Secretary and the Treasurer of the Woman's Home Mission Society of our Conference, and again heartily commend this important branch of our work to the support of our ministry and membership.

Mrs. J. C. Jones, Mrs. M. E. Rowzie and Mrs. J. R. Andrew have been made patrons to the P. W. Loan Fund. Revs. J. C. Jones, B. W. Bond, J. C. Sedwick, J. R. Andrew, L. L. Lloyd, W. H. D. Harper, E. V. Regester, Thomas Cooper, R. M. Wheeler, and Mrs. J. O. Tackett, Mrs. Thomas Cooper and Mrs. R. M. Wheeler have been made patrons to the Educational Endowment Fund. The work has been presented at five District Conferences, and we rejoice that our brethren of the ministry are recognizing this organization more and more as a regular part of the organic machinery of Southern Methodism. It has the advantage over the former aid society, in that, while it does no less for its own local parsonage, it broadens out into connectional work and also the great work of Home Missions. It is with gratitude to our Heavenly Father, who has owned and blessed our labors in this department of His vineyard, that we call your attention to the fact that there has been a healthy and encouraging increase over the statistics of last year. Two parsonages have been helped, Waynesboro and Lexington, to the extent of \$125. It is not possible to estimate the results of the number of visits made in Christ's name to the sick and strangers, corrective and benevolent institutions, and the cottage prayer meetings held and Bible readings given, beside the practical work of supplying the necessities of God's heroes of the Cross, and the poor that "we have always with us."

Our society has not grown as rapidly as we earnestly hoped it would in the last ten years of its existence in this Conference, but we take comfort in the fact that most all great movements spring from small beginnings. Its development has been sure and abiding, because it grows only in the soil of that thoroughly consecrated Christian womanhood that is willing to do in person the missionary work that she pays some other woman to go to foreign lands

and do.

We beg your co-operation in our efforts to raise our part of the Twentieth Century Thank Offering for the benefit of our educational schools in Key West, Tampa, California, and among the mountain whites of Kentucky and Tennessee, and the industrial training schools in our various cities. The amount raised by our societies, being a part of the regular Thank Offering asked of our whole Church, can be included in the reports of the different pastors in whose charges it is raised. The money is sent to the Conference Treasurer of our Home Mission Board. We respectfully ask a continuance of your interest in the work you have authorized us to do.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

The Epworth League Board, after full consultation with our General Secretary, Rev. H. M. DuBose, D. D., and carefully weighing the facts concerning the place and progress of the League in our Conference, submits the following report:

A summary of the pastors' reports shows the following results:

Number of chapters now in our Conference, 211, a decrease of two.

Number of League members, 9,244, an increase of 1,041, indicating intensive development of League work.

In order to make the force of our Board most effective during the year, we have organized it after the model of the regular Epworth League Constitutions, and have added to the officers already in the Board, Rev. J. E. Wilson as First Vice-President, Rev. W. H. H. Joyce as Second Vice-President, Fred. E. Woodward as Third Vice-presieent, J. S. Richey as Treasurer, and Rev. J. L. Kibler as Superintendent of Junior League work. George H. Lamar continues as Corresponding Secretary of the Board.

The new organization of the Board and the character of duties imposed upon the members thereof, render it important that Presiding Elders, Pastors, District and Chapter officers of the League co-operate in furnishing our Corresponding Secretary, from time to time, as they are elected, with the names and post-office addresses of the President, Secretary and Vice-Presidents of the senior, the Superintendents of the junior chapters, as well as with the names and addresses of the officers of each of the district Leagues. To this end it is the sense of this Board that the Pastors and Presidents of the chapters be enjoined to have such information communicated to the Corresponding Secretary promptly upon the election or appointment of such officers.

Blanks will also be furnished the Presiding Elders in advance of Conference for distribution among the several Pastors, to be filled out and delivered to the Corresponding Secretary of this Board upon the assemblage of Conference.

We make the following recommendations:

- 1. That we do not this year attempt to hold a Conference League Conference but that the District work along with that tending to produce greater efficiency in individual Chapters receive the benefit of our effort, and to this end a committee has been appointed to prepare a uniform program to be sent to the District Presidents for use in the District Conferences. Said Committee consists of Revs. J. O. Knott, J. L. Kibler and J. H. Light.
- 2. That the Chapters be used as far as possible to promote the raising of our benevolent collections, without discriminating in favor of any particular cause.
- 3. We have appointed the following Committee of this Board to inquire into the subject of orphanages, training schools and other forms of

philanthrophic effort; to gather all available data bearing upon these matters, and to report to us a year hence, as a basis of possible future action, namely: Revs. J. E. Wilson and F. J. Prettyman, and Brother J. P. Woods.

4. We most heartily endorse the Epworth Era, our League organ. Its Editor, our General Secretary, has spared nothing in his effort to make it in appearance and matter a paper that is an inspiration to our young people. We urge our League Chapters to organize clubs and help to put put the paper upon a twenty thousand circulation basis.

5. We recommend that Rev. J. H. Light be requested to continue acting as the Editor of a page in our Conference Organ, which that paper has

agreed to devote to the interests of the League.

This Board has no source of income, and as necessarily some expenses must be incurred, we ask that each Chapter throughout the Conference make such contribution to the Board for this purpose as its resources may permit, and that all such moneys be sent to the Treasurer of the Board, Bro. J. S. Richey, Fort Defiance, Va.

Rev. J. D. MARTIN.

"There is a prince and a great man fallen this day in Israel."—2 Sam. 3:38

When the great heart of the Rev. Jefferson Martin was stilled in death at the District Parsonage in Lewisburg, W. Va., September 2, 1899, the Baltimore Conference lost one of its most efficient preachers, the Lewisburg District a judicious Presiding Elder, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, a worthy and loyal member, and humanity one of its truest friends.

He was born near Mountsville, Loudoun County, Virginia, January 21, 1859, and died at Lewisburg, W. Va., in the forty-first year of his life. The early years of his life were spent in the vicinity of his birthplace, and it was there he received his first religious impressions from a Christian mother. It was in this community that he also received his education, mainly at the public schools, until his conversion to Christ, and a call to the ministry of the Gospel, which came simultaneously.

Brother Martin was converted at twenty-one years of age, in the Methodist Church at Middleburg, Va., under the ministry of Rev. L. H. Crenshaw, and L. C. Miller; and so genuine was his conversion, that of this great change wrought by the Spirit of God within his soul, he never thereafter entertained a doubt till the day of his triumphant death. After his conversion he immediately began a conscientious preparation for his life work, and he became a master-workman.

He was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of the Middleburg charge under the administration of Rev. J. S. Gardner, Presiding Elder of the Washington District.

He preached his first sermon in the Fall or Winter of 1881, at Mountville, Va.

In the Spring of 1882 he began preaching as a supply on Sudley Circuit, Rev. J. T. Maxwell being preacher in charge.

He entered the regular ministry in the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South, in March, 1888, and afterwards served the following charges, viz, Sudley Circuit in 1883, as a junior preacher, under Rev. J. S. Porter; Piedmont Circuit in 1884, as junior preacher, under Rev. J. H. Waugh. On March 25, 1884, soon after receiving the latter appointment, he was married to Miss Eliza H. Birdsall, at the residence of Dr. I. S. Stone.

In the Spring of 1885 he was appointed preacher in charge of Linden Circuit, serving most successfully there for two years. In 1887 he was sent to Gaithersburg Circuit, where he served efficiently for four years. While here he attended a college of elocution and oratory, in Washington, D. C., from which he derived great benefit in many ways.

In the Spring of 1891 he was appointed to Buena Vista, Va., and remained there three years, managing a large church enterprise with that enterprise, energy and skill characteristic of the man.

Next he went to Fincastle Charge, and after a year of great spiritual growth in that field, he was appointed in 1895 to Covington, Va., where, after another year of successful labor, his work was recognized sufficiently to be appointed in the spring of 1896 to the Presiding Eldership of the Lewisburg District. Here, in the work of the district, he displayed that energy in his work and that fidelity to his Lord which we would naturally expect of such a man; and he met with that degree of success and appreciation by his brethren in the ministry and laity of the Church which he

so justly merited. Our beautiful district parsonage at Lewisburg, in its present improved condition, is due to his untiring energy and zeal.

This was Brother Martin's last appointment on earth. He finished the work which had been given him to do, and the Supreme Bishop of the Church Universal called him to an appointment in the skies.

Before reaching the meridian of life, in the full vigor of his well-developed physical powers, intellectual energies and moral greatness, "God's finger touched him, and he slept."

He fell at the post of duty, with that singular interest in the Church he loved as dearly as his life, and anxiety in its future welfare which had always been shown in his vigorous life.

"How did he die?" said one; and before time was given for an answer, his friend bethought himself, and replied in language most appropriate: "Just as you would expect Martin to die."

He looked with eagerness to the coming of this Conference, when he could meet his brethren with usual cheerfulness, and more than usual joy, because he would surrender his commission by reason of limitation, of the trust committed to his hands as Presiding Elder of the Lewisburg District, after four years of successful and happy service there, for his Church and his Lord.

But while it belongs to man to propose, it is God's to dispose. After arduous labors at the Bushy Ridge Camp and the Marvin Grove Camp Meetings, Brother Martin had come home to die—a privilege which seemed most providential. The summons came and he was ready. He knew full well that the end of his earthly career was at hand, and without a tremor of alarm, or an apparent wish that it were otherwise, only that he might labor longer for the Lord, following feebly, yet deliberately and firmly, his devoted companion in the quotation of Charles Wesley's immortal sonnet, "Jesus, lover of my soul," and the twenty-third Psalm, he closed his eyes on all that had been dear to him on earth, and went to join the hosts above "that have obtained the prize,"

His life work is well known, and will be more fully written, for his name deserves to live in the history of our Church. His memory will live in the hearts of a grateful people whom he served.

To his bereaved companion and little daughter, the sympathies of the Baltimore Conference are extended.

One of his brethren who had known him best and longest, and was with him to the end, most fittingly said at the memorial services which were held in Lewisburg:

'Jefferson Davis Martin was no ordinary man. He was a many-sided man. In the social circle he had but few peers; in the pulpit a man of incisiveness and power, because his heart was filled with that which is best and strongest, (and strongest, because the best of all,) the power of the Holy Ghost. In the business affairs of this world he was well qualified, faithful to all his trusts, genial and sunny in his disposition, and above all, he was a man of Christian character and nature multiform, well rounded and symmetric. No ordinary witness, that life of his, to the saving power of the Gospel and grace of our risen Lord."

Testimonies to his worth could be multiplied, but this is not the time and place for more than a brief sketch of one we loved in life and mourn so widely in his untimely death.

A man, a preacher, a pastor, a manager of ecclesiastical affairs, a revialist and a Christian gentleman of the highest type, has been transferred to that larger Conference in Heaven.

With a slight variation of those immortal lines of the poet, we would close this tribute of tender respect to the memory of our ascended brother:

"He was a man among the bravest men, We shall not soon behold his like again."

Rev. J. N. HANK.

The Rev. J. Newman Hank was but little known to the members of the Baltimore Conference. From 1857 to the time of his death—a period of nearly forty-three years—he was not engaged in the regular work of the ministry. He was born in Fincastle, Virginia, October 18, 1827, and was, therefore, at the time of his death, a little past 72 years of age. He was received into the Baltimore Conference in 1851. After his graduation from Dickinson College in 1846, he chose the vocation of school teacher, and devoted several months to that work. But he soon felt it his duty to enter the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and began to make all necessary preparations for efficient service. After entering the Conference he served several important appointments; but while stationed at the William Street Church, in Baltimore city, his health failed, and he became affected with a throat trouble from which he never recovered. His voice grew so weak that he was rarely able to preach, and for many years preceding his death he did not attempt to do so. But he never for a moment lost interest in his Conference and Church. He was still a Methodist preacher, ready and willing to do everything in his power for the advancement of his Master's cause.

After the failure of his voice he again devoted himself to teaching. In this vocation he had every decided success. He first was in charge of a seminary for young ladies at Huntsville, Alabama. He then taught in different schools in Baltimore, until 1882, when he became Professor of Latin in the Baltimore City College. Here he was in great favor with the students, who never failed to respect him for his high character and manly bearing. His duties were discharged in the most conscientious and faithful manner. He never failed to exert a strong moral and spiritual influence over those who were placed under him.

For several years before his death his health was not strong, but he attended Divine worship whenever possible, and was always ready to assist our pastors in Baltimore to the full measure of his ability. He was very liberal to the Church, and was ready to devote his means to every worthy cause. During all these years he remained a supernumerary member of this Conference. He never married. His life closed peacefully in December, 1899, and on Tuesday, December 12, after services at the Central Southern Methodist Church, his remains were laid to rest in the Greenmount Cemetery, Baltimore.

Rev. J. M. FOLLANSBEE.

The subject of this memoir, Rev. James M. Follansbee, was for thirtythree years a highly esteemed member of this Conference. He was born in Washington, D. C., May 31, 1823. He was baptized in infancy by the Rev. Dr. Henry Slicer, who was at that time a chaplain of Congress, and was afterwards received by Dr. Slicer into the Church in Carlisle, Pennsylvania. He graduated from Dickinson College in 1844, and afterwards studied medicine, expecting to devote his life to that profession. For that purpose he moved South, and settled in San Antonio. Texas, but after a year or two he became deeply impressed that he was called to devote his life to the ministry, and was received into the Texas Conference in 1849. After traveling several circuits, he was stationed at Austin and Houston, two of the most important charges in that Conference. For two years he had charge of Andrew Female College, and was then called to the presidency of the Soule University, a new institution that was afterwards merged into the Southwestern University at Georgetown, Texas. Failing health caused him to resign this position in 1866. He then returned to Washington, and was transferred to the Baltimore Conference in 1867. He proved a valuable addition to this Conference, and served in succession

the following charges—Christiansburg, Bridgewater, Fincastle, Leesburg, Hinton, Trappe, East Rockingham, Shenandoah and Marksville. In all of these charges he did efficient service, and was held in high esteem. Six years of his ministry were spent in the Western Virginia Conference, and he was stationed at Huntington, St. Albans, and on the Fayettesville Circuit. He was an able and earnest preacher, and always exemplified the principles and doctrines that he taught. Wherever he was appointed hewent with a willing mind, and left the impress of his piety and zeal on every charge that he served.

In 1893, because of increasing infirmities, he was given a superannuated relation by the Baltimore Conference. During the latter years of his life he made his home with his children, within the bounds of the Holston Conference. He died at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Fannie L. Stevens, at Glade Spring, Virginia, January 12, 1900, in the 77th year of his age. He was buried in the cemetery of the Emory and Henry College, a few miles from the place of his death.

During his whole life he had been a consistent and faithful servant of: God, and closed his earthly career in the full assurance of a glorious immortality.

Rev. WESLEY HAMMOND.

The subject of this memoir, Rev. Wesley Hammond, the son of John and Charlotte Hammond, was born in Botetourt county, Va., July, 1838. He was converted in the summer of 1857 under the ministry of Rev. W. C. Blount, of the Virginia Conference, and connected himself at once with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. He was especially favored, both in his educational and religious advantages, and these were not neglected by him. His father was a man of more than usual intelligence and piety, and gave careful attention to his son's intellectual and spiritual culture. He was for some time a student at Emory and Henry College, until his entrance into the Confederate Army suddenly interrupted his college curriculum.

He entered the army in 1861, and became sergeant of the "Dixie Greys," 42d Va. Regiment. He served under Genl Robt. E. Lee in western Virginia, until his health failed, and he was compelled for a while to retire. He subsequently served as Chaplain of a Virginia regiment to the close of the war.

In November, 1864, he joined the Virginia Conference, and was appointed junior preacher on Chesterfield Circuit, under Rev. A. M. Hall. The next year he was in charge of Fairfax Circuit of the same Conference, but was transferred with that part of the Virginia territory to the Baltimore Conference, and stationed at Christiansburg. In 1867 he was appointed to Collierstown; in 1868, as second man on Loudoun Circuit; in 1869-70 to Fairfax Circuit. In 1871 he located, in order to pursue a course of study, in the University of Virginia. He was readmitted into the Baltimore Conference in 1873, and sent to Kent Circuit, then in 1874 to Martinsburg, W. Va., where he served as preacher in charge until 1875. From 1875 to 1879, he served the church in Keyser, W. Va. From 1879-81 in Christiansburg, Va.; in 1881, the Lexington Circuit; from 1882-86 the South Branch, now Romney Circuit. His home was in Romney during this pastorate, and here he continued to reside when granted a superannuated relation in 1886.

In May, 1879, he was married to Mrs. Anna Heald, nee Ward, who, with two children, a son and a daughter, survive him.

He was an industrious and indefatigable worker, and continued in the active service of the Church when the state of his health would have fully justified his retirement. Consecrated to the ministry to which he had been called, a kindly heart, genial and gentle in his manners, he was greatly

beloved as a pastor, while his earnest presentation of truth was the means, under God, of winning many souls to Christ.

For fourteen years he suffered from a disorder that at last proved fatal; and yet, when he could no longer perform the work of an itinerant minister, he was employed in such work as he could do even to the period of his late illness. For nearly a week before his death he lay in an unconscious condition, and at last passed away peacefully without a struggle or a sigh. There was needed no final expression of his faith and hope. His pure and consistent life was the best testimony to his preparation for the change which happily released him from all suffering, and introduced him into the presence and joy of his Lord.

The funeral services were held in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Romney, on Friday morning, February 23d, and were conducted by Rev. B. F. Ball, Presiding Elder of the Moorefield District, assisted by Rev. D. L. Reid, Rev. H. M. Strickler, and Rev. W. A. Sites, of the Baltimore Conference, and Rev. E. D. Washburn, D. D., of the Presbyterian Church, who had been a fellow student of Brother Hammond at the University of Virginia

ginia.

His remains were taken to Frostburg. Md., where they were interred on the afternoon of the same day, and where they lie awaiting the resurrection of the just.

Rev. A. C. HAMILL.

Archibald Chisholm Hamill was born about 64 years ago, in Garrett county, Maryland, and was the only child of Henry and Nancy Hamill. His mother died before he became of age. He may be said to have been religious from his early youth, and, in the face of many discouraging circumstances, maintained his piety, and in the locality of his home was as a "light that shineth in a dark place." No adversity seemed able to move him from either the consistency or purpose of a godly life.

Soon after the establishment of our Church in Piedmont, W. Va, Brother Hamill became the sole representative of our Church west of that point, and in the territory now embraced in Elk Garden Circuit. Then he served as local preacher with acceptability and efficiency until he united with the Baltimore Conference in 1891. He may be called the originator of that circuit.

He served the following charges, viz: Morgan, 3 years; Listonburg, 2 years; Levelton, 2 years; Alvon, 3 years; and Greenbank, lacking a little of one year. He died in the Methodist Parsonage at Greenbank, Pocahontas county, W. Va., on Saturday morning, February 24, 1900, and was buried in his native county in Maryland. We have no fears concerning Brother Hamill's future, for he lived the life of a devout Christian, and passed into the eternal world with prayer on his lips. He is survived by a wife and children, with whom we sorrow in their sad bereavement.

Brother Hamill was a preacher of marked ability. Although enjoying but a limited education in early life, yet through his natural gifts, and taste for knowledge, he acquired no small preparation for the ministry, which, added to his sterling piety and fine common sense, made him a man of usefulness in the influence of personal character, as well as in his public ministry.

He was quiet, unpretentious, gentle, and withal faithful in every positionto which the Church appointed him. He was not a man to demand choice places, but like a loyal Methodist preacher, accepts what was given him cheerfully, and like his Master, "went about doing good."

He was a man of prayer, and faith, and hope; and he died as he lived.

Brother Hamill will be missed. He will be remembered by those he has belped, and while he "rests from his labors, his works do follow him."

Rev. FRANCIS M. MILLS.

Rev. Francis M. Mills was born in Williamsburg, Va., August 5, 1810, and died at his home in Neosho, Missouri, March 10, 1900, in the ninetieth year of his age.

His parents moved to Washington, D. C., in 1819, where he grew to manhood. He was converted to God at the age of 19, in the old Foundry Church. The leader's meeting recommended him for license to exhort, October 4, 1830, and the license was signed by that old pioneer of Methodism, Rev. Stephen George Roszell. At the same place he was licensed as a local preacher, March 14, 1831, was received on trial in the Baltimore Conference, March, 1832, in Baltimore city, Bishop Hedding presiding. In 1834 he was ordained deacon by Bishop Andrew; and in 1836, an elder by Bishop Hedding. In February, 1836, he was married to Miss Mary Greiner, of Franklin, Pendleton county, Virginia, who died 1889, leaving six children, of whom three daughters and one son survive. Father Mills was an effective itinerant preacher for seventeen years, serving acceptably in Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Wisconsin, Illinois, Minnesota and Missouri.

In 1849 the following minute is recorded in the Journal of the Baltimore Conference:

"On motion, Resolved, that the Bishop be and is hereby respectfully requested to transfer our beloved brother, F. M. Mills, to this Conference."

The Bishop granted the request and Brother Mills was placed on the superannuated list. In 1866 Brother Mills cast in his lot with his brethren of the majority of the Baltimore Conference at the session held in Alexandria, Va.; and while feeble in health did good service in that city and vicinity. Not long atterward he removed to Neosho, Missouri, where he spent the remaining years of his life; was held in high esteem as a minister and Christian; and at each session of the Baltimore Conference, sent his loving greetings to his brethren. He lived to a ripe old age and was venerated as a patriarch by the people among whom he had a place. His death was sudden, congestion of the lungs caused heart failure and he fell on sleep as quietly as an infant in its mother's arms. His devoted daughter Mary, who had long been the support of her aged father, was with him when he breathed his last. She writes: "All loved him; young and old called him Father Mills, and he was as happy as the days were long, contented to go or stay, as his Father willed."

He was buried in the cemetery overlooking the town of Neosho, by the side of his beloved companion, who, nine years before, preceded him to the better land. "The memory of the just is blessed."

Rev. E. H. HENRY.

Rev Edward H. Henry was born in Northumberland county. Virginia, October 12, 1832, and died April 7, 1900, at Marshall, Va., in the 68th year of his age. His ancestry dates back to the Colonial times of Old Virginia. His great-grandfather, James Henry, was a member of the Continental Congress, and Judge of the Virginia Court of Admiralty. His grandfather, E. H. Henry, married, first, Martha Catharine, daughter of Patrick Henry; and, for his second wife, Elizabeth Washington Peyton. Her son Edward H. Henry, M. D., married Elizabeth Fitzhugh, of Prince William county, Virginia, and their son, the subject of this memoir was named for his father. He was educated at William and Mary College, Virginia, where he took the degree of Master of Arts in 1852. For the next five years he taught in the Episcopal High School, Fredericksburg, Va., was a member of Washington's Masonic Lodge, and was the leader in gay society life. During the great revival of 1857, in old St. George's Episcopal Church, at a prayer meeting to which he was induced to go by a pious lady friend, he

was converted to God and became a zealous christian worker. His unconverted father, and his wild companions became the first objects of his earnest efforts. On the 20th of August, 1861, he was married to Mary Anna Stone, niece of Mrs. John T. Bronaugh, at the home of the latter, Green View, Warrenton, Virginia. He spent the following six years in teaching and preaching in the State of Georgia.

Previous to his marriage, and while absent in Texes, he began reading the works of John Wesley, and of the Early Methodist authors. From these pages he learned his theology, and soon sought a place in the Methodist Ministry, never ceasing to love her doctrine and discipline, and preaching without intermission, for forty years, with zeal, power and success. He was admitted on trial an ordained Elder, into the Baltimore Conference in 1868, and was appointed to Fauquier Mission, where he served four years; 1872-4, Fairfax; 1875-77, West River; 1878-81, Stafford; 1882-4, Hillsboro; 1885-8, Frankford; 1889-90, Covington; 1891-4, Gaithersburg; 1895-98, Calvert; 1899, Marshall.

Edward H. Henry was a man of more than ordinary parts. He was pos-essed of a sound logical mind and a vivid imagination blended with a wholesome degree of practicalness. He had the instinct of a true christian gentleman, the refinement which broad culture brings; and, above all, the deep piety which sanctifies all human attainments. "He was a man of prayer, getting up regularly, even in the coldest nights, often more than once, to pray at his bedside. The barn, the fields, the woods he made places of prayer. A more unselfish father, a more loving husband, a more faithful pastor it would be difficult to find." Such is the testimony of one who knew him best. He never failed to attract and impress his congregations from the pulpit, preaching often with power and success. Many souls were, during his ministry, brought to Christ. His zeal, tempered with knowledge, stimulated both the spiritual and temperal activity of the Churches under his charge. He was beloved by all who came in personal contact with him.

His life in his home was beautiful, his work in the Church was faithful even to the last. He is now crowned victor, at his Savior's side. The prevailing epidemic, the grippe, had seized him on his work, and detained him from the session of the Conference. It was hoped that the worst had passed, but death came suddenly from pneumonia, on Saturday evening, at 8.30 o'clock, April 7, 1900.

His remains were taken to Warrenton for burial. Rev. J. Lester Shipley, his personal friend and co-laborer, conducted the funeral services.

"How beautiful it is for a man to die
Upon the walls of Zion; to be called,
Like a watch-worn and weary sentinel,
To put his armor off and rest in heaven."

REPORT ON COMMUNICATION OF DR. CRAFT.

The committee to whom was referred the communication of Dr. W. F. Crafts begs leave to report: That inasmuch as the law of our Church explicitly prohibits our ministers from solemnizing the rites of matrimony between divorced persons, except in the case of innocent parties who have been divorced for the one scriptural cause, we deem any further deliverance upon this subject unnecessary.

While we do not hesitate to express our adhorrence of polygamy as being contrary to the spirit and teaching of the Gospel and repugnant to the moral sentiment of the community, we do not judge it to be our province as a Conference to direct in matters of civil legislation. We recommend that so much of Dr. Craft's paper as refers to the question of temperance be referred to the committee on that subject.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

1st. We beg leave to again call the attention of our people to the discipline in paragraph 215: "Let all our preachers and members abstain from the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors to be used as a beverage, from signing petitions for such sale, in becoming bondsmen for any person as a candidate for obtaining license, and from renting property to be used for such sale. If any member shall violate any provision of this paragraph it shall be the duty of the pastor to deal with the offender. Chapter 7, section 5."

2d. We recommend that temperance meetings be held wherever practicable, and that special effort be made to interest the young people in this cause.

3d. We are in hearty sympathy with all organizations that seeks by lawful and proper means to suppress the liquor traffic and are unqualifiedly opposed to any movement that seeks to legalize the liquor traffic in any form.

4th. We heartly recommend that our people avail themselves of the benefit of the local option laws of Virginia, West Virginia and Maryland, and urge them to press the contest against the liquor traffic in the exercise of their rights as citizens in their respective districts, counties, towns and cities.

5th. We recommend that the District Conferences take such action upon this report as will bring it more prominently before our people.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

Your Committee on the Bible Cause beg to report as follows:

The work of the American Bible Society, the printing of the Scriptures without note or comment, and their distribution among all classes at cost of printing and binding to those able to pay, free of charge to those not able, is a work which challenges our interest as Christians, and is worthy of our carnest sympathy and active support. Our Church has recognized its obligation to the Society and has charged the preachers, the Quarterly, District and Annual Conferences with the duty of seeing that the obligation is met and discharged. Yet it is evident, from the small amount contributed to the Bible cause, and the fact that many charges contribute nothing, that the worthiness of the cause and the value to the Church of the Society's work are not fully appreciated by our people. We are glad to note that the collections for this cause are larger than they were last year, but they are still for below what they ought to be, and what they may be made by proper effort. We urge that the disciplinary requirement that the Bible cause shall be presented to each congregation at least once in each year, be complied with, and at as early a date in the Conference year as practicable, and that our Presiding Elders, Quarterly and District Conferences insist upon specific reports of the work, and give due emphasis to the importance of aiding the society by liberal contributions, and prosecuting its works in our midst by bringing to its attention those sections of our territory that are not properly supplied with the word of God.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

The Committee on Publishing Interests beg leave to report:

That The Baltimore Christian Advocate for the past year has filled a need of the church to an extent not met by any former conference paper because of the embarassing conditions surrounding former editors of great and tried ability, and it is but meet that some recognition should be given Rev. John O. Knott and his associates for the labors, care and ability displayed in the editing and managing of the paper, making it a conference organ of which each member of the church may be proud. The results of the appointments as editors of the brethern who have edited the paper have been remarkable, in that in a single year they have gained the admiration, confidence, and esteem of the whole church, and have made the paper a welcome visitor to every home to which it has come.

Therefore, be it resolved, that the thanks of this conference are due and are hereby tendered to the editors of *The Baltimore Christian Advocate* for the signal ability, often arising to brilliancy, in the editorials written, the care and diligence in the selections inserted, and above all in the loving Christian spirit that has animated the entire conduct of the paper. It is safe to predict that an assured and useful future was before the paper under the last year's management, and it is a calamity much to be regretted that circumstances have so changed as to make such conduct of the paper for the future impossible.

In regard to the future of the newspaper interest of the conference, the committee would report, that, according to its information, The Baltimore Christian Advocate, together with The Richmond Christian Advocate, has been bought by joint stock company. This paper is, therefore, as it always has been, beyond the control of this conference. The representative of this company, Rev. H. M. Hope, of the Virginia Conference, has appeared before the committee and has made statements and given information as to the designs of the company and propositions bearing upon a newspaper organ of this conference. The company is to have a capital stock of \$30,000, represented by 300 shares of \$100 each. Of this stock, Mr. Hope, or those he represents, is to have \$15,100, or a controlling interest, the balance the company hopes to have subscribed by the preachers and active laymen of the two conferences. From his statement of expenses and probable receipts, there seems to be a reasonable prospect of the financial stability and success of the enterprise. He then, at the request of the committee, made two suggestion:

First. To continue the two papers, both, of course, to be printed at and issued from Richmond, Va., using, as now, editorial and other matter interchangeably, but having separate editors, the subscription and appearance of the papers to be the same as at present.

Second. To issue one paper of twenty pages, under the name of the Richmond and Baltimore Advocate, under the control of a directorate of five, to consist of Mr. Hope as business manager and two members each from the Virginia and Baltimore Conferences, and two editors, one from each conference, to be elected by the respective conferences upon nomination of the representative of the company.

The purchase of *The Baltimore Advocate* by this company makes the acceptance of one or the other of these proposals imperative, unless the conference desires to establish an independent paper of its own. This seems impracticable in view of the disastrous financial outcome of various

enterprises of this character in the past.

Your committee upon careful consideration would recommend the consolidation of the two papers and the publication of one paper under the name and upon the conditions above named. The reasons upon which this conclusion is based are largely the lessening of the cost of the production of such a paper and thereby making it possible to have one creditable paper rather than two more or less inferior, with the Baltimore Conference getting the worst of it every time, when the lessening of expense is to be considered.

It is said that one of the by-laws of the company will provide that any earnings from the paper, after paying running expenses and a dividend, not to exceed 10 per cent., on the stock, shall be applied to the fund for aged preachers and dependent families of deceased preachers of the two Conferences. This, it is fair to consider, although the sum realized to this fund would probably be small for at least a few years.

We have said that the financial exhibit made by Mr. Hope seems to assure stability and success for the enterprise, but your committee must not be understood as recommending any brother to invest in the stock of the company. This must be determined by each individual for himself, after careful investigation of the details of the proposed plan.

Your Committee would, in view of what has been said, recommend the following resolution:

Be it resoived, that the Baltimore Conference recommends the establishment of one paper to be known as The Richmond and Baltimore Advocate, to be managed and edited as indicated in the foregoing report, and pledges the hearty co-operation of the members of the Conference in all proper efforts to make such paper a success. Provided always, that no financial obligation is or will be assumed by the Conference or any of its boards; and provided further, that nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to prevent this Conference from withdrawing its endorsement of said paper by proper resolution at any annual session; nor in anywise prevent this Conference from the establishment of an independent paper whenever the Conference may deem it advisable.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. Samuel K. Cox, D. D., as the Baltimore Conference representative on the editorial staff of the consoli-

dated paper.

The net gain in assets of our Publishing House of \$40,144.19 is quite gratifying in view of the unpropitious circumstances confronting the book agents. Yet we can but deprecate the fact that the gains of the house, owing to existing business exigencies, have not been directed to the relief of our worn-out preachers, and the widows and orphans of our deceased preachers. We most heartily commend the periodicals and books issued by the house. We desire to express our appreciation of the high standard and able editorial management of The Christion Advocate, The Review of Missions, The Methodist Review, The Epworth Era, the Sunday-school periodicals, The Woman's Missionary Advocate and Our Homes. We bespeak for them all an extensive circulation among our people.

Form of Certificate for Incorporation of a Religious Congregation in the State of Maryland.

On the—day of——, in the year of our Lord——, at a meeting of the members above twenty-one years of age of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, who worship at——, in———county, in the State of Maryland, and whose names are upon the Church Register of the membership of said Church, at said——, (said meeting being held at the place now ordinarily used for public meetings of said members,) for the purpose of electing (here state the number of the trustees—not less than five nor more than twelve) trustees, to form and constitute, with the minister for the time being, a religious corporation under the General Corporation Law of the State of Maryland, and for the purpose of adopting regulations for the government and succession of said corporation, the following agreement was adopted:

I. The object for which this corporation is sought is to create a corporation to provide, keep, maintain and dispose of a place of divine worship for the ministry and membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, residing at or in the vicinity of——, in ———county, whose names appear upon the Church Register or other proper record of such members in said vicinity, subject to the discipline, usage and ministerial appointment of said Church as declared by the General Conference of said Church, and the Annual Conference within whose bounds the said premises are situated.

II. A. B., C. D., E. F., and G. H. are hereby elected trustees, and together with the minister for the time being, shall constitute a body politic and corporate, which shall be called "The Board of Trustees of——Methodist Episcopal Church, South, of——county."

III. Said "The Board of Trustees of —— Methodist Episcopal Church, South, of ——county," and its successors, shall have and exercise all the powers conferred upon such corporations by the laws of the State of Maryland; it shall have perpetual succession by its said name of incorporation, shall elect its own president and fix his term of office, and adopt a corporate seal, and shall be capable to purchase, take and hold to it and its successors in fee or for a less estate any lands, tenements and hereditaments, rents or annuities, goods and chattels within this State by gift, bargain, sale, devise or bequest of any person, body politic or corporate capable of making the same, and to use or lease, mortgage or sell and convey the same in such manner as it may judge most conducive to the interests of said corporation.

The said—trustees hereby elected shall be responsible to the Quarterly Conference of the circuit or station of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, within whose bounds the property of said corporation may be situate, and the said Quarterly Conference shall have the power to dismiss any of them from office; provided that no person who is a trustee shall be ejected while he is joint security for money for or on account of said corporation or its property, unless such relief is given him as is demanded, or the creditor will accept.

IV. If any trustee shall remove from the State, his office shall thereupon become vacant.

V. All vacancies occuring in said Board of Trustees by death resignation, displacement, removal or other cause, shall be filled as follows, to wit: the aforesaid Quarterly Conference shall elect a suitable person upon the nomination of the preacher in charge of said circuit or station, or, in his absence, of the presiding elder presiding over such Quarterly Conference, and all members of said Quarterly Conference shall have the right to vote in such election. No person shall be a trustee unless he be above twenty-one years of age and a resident of the State of Marylaud, and all trustees must be members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, when proper persons can be had, otherwise, one-third of said trustees may be from without. It shall be entirely within the discretion of the Quarterly Conference electing to decide whether it is necessary that a person not a member of said Church be a trustee.

VI. This agreement may be, at any time, altered or amended by the members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, holding their membership at (insert name of the local church) Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and whose names appear on the Church Register or other proper record of the members of said Church, who are above the age of twenty-one years, or a majority of them, in a meeting called for that purpose; and the minister in charge shall call such a meeting by announcing the time, purpose and place, (which shall be the usual house of worship of said members,) at one or more of the regular public meetings of said members, whenever any five of them shall unite in demanding it; and if he refuse or neglect so to do, then any five of such members may call such a meeting, either by reading in any regular public meeting of the members of said Church a written call signed by themselves, or by leaving copies of such a call at the places of abode of the several members.

I hereby certify that on this —— day of ——, in the year ninteen hundred ———, before me, the subscriber, a Justice of the Peace of the State of Maryland, in and for ——— county aforesaid, personally appeared, (insert names of the minister and trustees who have signed the certificate,) and did severally acknowledge the foregoing certificate to be their act and deed.

When the above certificate is duly adopted, executed and acknowledge by the preacher in charge and a majority of the trustees, and recorded, th persons named as trustees become a corporation under the laws of Mary land.

Deeds to Church property will be void if they declare or create any trust. Hence a deed to a Church corporation should be a plain conveyance, just as to any ordinary purchaser, except that it should contain a preamble, reciting that "the Board of Trustees of ———, pursuant to the objects of said corporation have purchased the ground hereinafter conveyed, for use as a Church or place of worship and for no other purpose, but this recital is not made as a declaration of trust, nor shall it be permitted to raise any trust or use, but is here set out in evidence of the lawful character of this conveyance under Article 38 of the Declaration of Rights of the State of Maryland."


