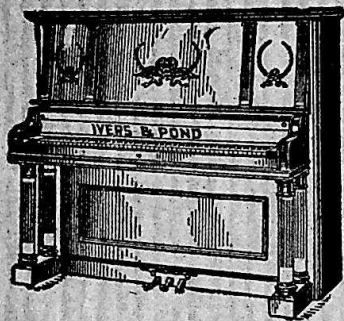

## FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY, April 3, 1901.

THE BALTIMORE ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTEENTH Session in the Greene Memorial Church, Roanoke, Va., Wednesday, April 3, 1901, at 9 o'clock, A. M.

Bishop O. P. Fitzgerald, D. D., President of the Conference, in the chair. Conference united in singing hymn No. 228—

"And are we yet alive."

After prayer, the Bishop read, as a lesson, 1 Cor. 13, and addressed the Conference.

The Roll was called by the Secretary of the last Conference, and one hundred and forty-one clerical and twenty-two lay members responded to their names.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY,  
BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.

*To the Bishop and Members of the Baltimore Annual Conference, Methodist  
Episcopal Church, South.*

FATHERS AND BRETHREN :

I present to you the annual report of the Treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of this Conference. With regret I must acknowledge some loss in our numbers, principally from the difficulties with which our societies in small villages and country appointments contend. For these I specially beg your tender care and watchful supervision. We need all the help which the pastors can give; and can safely promise that we will repay it in full, because a band of women working for the souls of far-away heathendom will not fail in their duty at home.

We acknowledge with gratitude the service to our society rendered by the editor of the "Baltimore Christian Advocate," in giving us space for our literary work. We hope under the new management that we may still have access to our members through the columns of the "Baltimore and Richmond Advocate."

We report our Twentieth Century Offering for educational purposes in foreign lands as beyond our promise; twenty-seven hundred and fifty-two dollars having been raised from the inception of the plan to the present date, though it does not appear in the Treasurer's report to you for the past year. The larger part of the offering came in small sums, showing a widespread interest. Many of our contributors gave not only through our societies, but to the pastors, for educational demands in our own land.

We have received one bequest from Miss Thomas, of St. Paul, Baltimore. The remainder of our funds is from our societies in general.

I report under my supervision seventy-one adult societies, with fourteen hundred and fifty members, approximately, and twenty-nine juvenile societies, with nearly four hundred members. Our specials are scholarships in China and Mexico, one day school in China, and the endowment of a scholarship in the Scarritt Bible and Training School, to be called the Melissa Baker Scholarship. We plan from this date to undertake in addition the support of one of our two missionaries from the Baltimore Conference at work in Korea.

I can attribute the increase in our collections, from a reduced number, to no other cause than the fact that our women begin to understand that regular specific daily prayer will have its results. Years ago the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions appointed the noon hour for prayer, which is the hour observed by nearly all mission boards, and as they have taken it up in our Conference, it is evident that some force is working in us, and will increase our faith and our zeal.

## REPORTS.

---

### BOARD OF EDUCATION.

ROANOKE, VA., April 8, 1901.

*To the Baltimore Conference M. E. Church, South :*

The canvass for the Twentieth Century Fund, committed to the direction of this Board, has been prosecuted with such resources as it could command. Through the devotion and loyalty of various brethren who have from time to time been called upon for special service, the Board has been able to send some special representative to almost every point when such assistance was asked for by the Presiding Elders and Preachers. Many of these have given diligent attention to this great call of the church, and usually with satisfactory results.

The statistical report shows, however, that in very few of our charges has the ideal plan been carried out—a public presentation of the cause to each congregation and a personal application to each member to say what part he will have in this great muster of Methodism.

In many of our charges little personal canvass has been made and some have not had as yet even public presentation of the movement. In consequence of this lack we can only report \$41,988.48 of our \$62,500, as now subscribed, of which \$20,330.42 has been paid. This amount was subscribed by only 6,262 of our members, and 162 of our preachers.

A chief purpose of this great undertaking of our church was to arouse our people to a deep sense of gratitude to God for His mercies, and to evoke and develop a connectional and aggressive spirit in our entire church for supreme and united effort to win the world for Christ. This purpose we certainly cannot hope to accomplish until each congregation has had the cause presented to it, and each member has been asked to make his individual thank-offering. For this work the faithful and laborious co-operation of all our preachers with further efforts of the Board is still necessary. Indeed, the law of the General Conference obligates us to continue the canvass to completion.

We therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

*Resolved*, That the Board of Education be instructed to continue the canvass until each congregation in our bounds shall have had the cause presented to it, and so far as possible each member shall have been asked to make a thank-offering.

The Conference has already decided that the fund raised be given—after setting aside 5 per cent. for Mission Schools—to Front Royal Academy and Randolph-Macon College, at Ashland.

We recommend the adoption of the following additional resolution:

*Resolved*, That the Treasurer of the Twentieth Century Fund of this Conference be instructed to apply the amounts raised for these institutions of our Conference, first, to Front Royal Academy the amount of \$30,000.00, and the remainder to Randolph-Macon College, at Ashland, Va., except where donors may especially direct otherwise.

*Randolph-Macon System of Schools.*

The Board of Education of the Baltimore Conference earnestly commends the Randolph-Macon Colleges and Academies to the Church and the general public for sympathy and support. Especially at this time do we urge that the greatest possible effort be made by our preachers and people to make the Twentieth Century Offering sufficient to meet the pressing financial needs of these institutions.

*1. Randolph-Macon College.*

The College at Ashland, under the management of Dr. W. G. Starr, President, assisted by the scholarly and consecrated faculty, continues to do work of so high a character as not to be excelled by any school of its class.

The patronage of the College from this Conference territory should be very much increased.

*2. Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal.*

We note with pleasure the comparatively prosperous condition of our Front Royal Academy. We commend the Academy, as peculiarly our own Conference School, to the patronage of our people.

Prof. Chas. L. Melton, the Principal, is proving himself eminently qualified for the position, and assisted by a competent faculty, is doing academic work of the highest order.

*3. Randolph-Macon Woman's College.*

The Woman's College at Lynchburg, under the Presidency of Chancellor Smith, continues to increase in attendance.

The building and equipments are all that can be desired for successful work. The College is first-class in every particular, and merits an increasing patronage from our Conference territory.

*4. Other Schools of the System.*

The Academy at Bedford City, Va., and the Institute at Danville, Va., are having prosperous sessions.

*Valley Female College.*

This school, with Rev. J. P. Hyde, D. D. LL. D., as President, which has been so highly commended by the visiting committee for its care and attention to its students, morally and intellectually, and its efficiency as a factor in our educational interests, is cheerfully endorsed by us, and we commend it to our people.

*Palme and Lane Institutes.*

It is very gratifying to note the continued prosperity and progress made by these schools. The increased numbers of their pupils, and the large number of their graduates holding positions of usefulness in the Church and in the world, give promise of still larger results.

*Vanderbilt University.*

We are glad to recognize the good work in Christian education that has been done by the Vanderbilt University during the last twenty-five years. Especially do we desire to express our interest in its Biblical department. It is a matter of congratulation that our own Conference College is so well represented in the enrollment of Biblical students. We should be glad if the minds of our young men generally who are preparing for the ministry should be turned in the same direction.

The Twentieth Century Thank Offering, according to the original idea of it, was especially designed for the endowing of the Biblical Department

of the University. But under the regulations adopted by the General Conference, a very small amount of the contributions is being devoted to this purpose. We commend this cause to the liberality of our people, and hope it may be in their hearts to take a part in the fuller equipment of our theological school.

*Fairmount Seminary.*

We renew our endorsement and recommendation of Fairmount Seminary. Prof. A. T. Ramsay has secured for the use of the Seminary the fine property known as "The Chinese Legation Building," at the corner of Fourteenth and Yale streets, Washington, D. C. This school is under Christian influences, and is conducted by Southern Methodists.

*Wesleyan Female Institute.*

Upon the communication of Miss Mattie P. Harris, administratrix of the late Dr. Wm. A. Harris, preferring a claim against the Conference for \$7,642.29 on account of the indebtedness of the Board of Trustees of the Wesleyan Female Institute, which was referred by the Conference to this Board, we report that it is the sense of this Board, that the Baltimore Annual Conference is not under either legal or moral obligations to the estate of Dr. William A. Harris.

*Assessment.*

We recommend an assessment of \$2,360, of which \$860 shall be for the General Board of Education, and \$2,000 for the benefit of Randolph-Macon College at Ashland, Virginia; also an assessment of \$500 in aid of Paine and Lane Institutes.

The Board recommends the appointment of Rev. J. A. Kern, D. D., and of Rev. Collins Denny, as Professors in Vanderbilt University, and of Rev. J. P. Hyde, D. D., as President of the Valley Female College.

We recommend that the Executive Committee be continued, and that the Conference Secretary of Education be *ex-officio* a member of the Committee.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. H. P. Hamill as Conference Secretary of Education.

## REPORT OF SUNDAY-SCHOOL BOARD.

### LITERATURE.

We cannot speak in too high praises of the Sunday-school literature, which is ably edited by Dr. Atkins and published by our Publishing House. We desire to call special attention to the Sunday-school Visitor and the Teachers' Magazine, which are unsurpassed in the place which they are to fill. We urge all the Sunday-schools in the bounds of our Conference to use the periodicals of our own Church in preference to any others. If we would be loyal to our Church and true to our own interest and the welfare of our children, we must do so.

### CHILDREN'S DAY.

We urge upon all of our Sunday-schools the observance of Children's Day, as directed by our discipline. Let a collection be taken up and made as large as possible. This fund is carefully used and is of great help to needy Sunday-schools. As usual, the Board will supply Children's Day

programmes free. We call attention to the fact that some of our preachers report Children's Day collections in the statistics, and do not turn the money over to our treasurer. From statistical tables, the preachers have reported \$596.00 as having been raised, of which only \$443 44 has been turned over to the treasurer of the Board. The money collected on Children's Day should be sent promptly to Mr. Wm. Dean, Treasurer, Harrisonburg, Va.

#### SUNDAY-SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The Convention held at Staunton, Va., last year, was a very great success. The attendance was large. There was much enthusiasm, and vital questions were ably discussed by speakers of note. We are sure that much good is done by these Conventions, and we urge our schools to send representatives to the Convention which will be held this year at Lexington, Va., July 9th-11th. Hon. M. L. Walton has been elected president of the Convention, and Mr. W. W. Millan secretary, who with Rev. Dr. C. M. Hawkins are appointed an executive committee to make all arrangements.

#### STATISTICS.

From reports presented to our Conference, we gather the following statistics: Sunday-schools, 570; officers and teachers, 5,541; scholars, 41,512; collected for Sunday-schools, \$11,553 00; for Missions, \$11,388.00; Children's Day, \$596.00; other objects, \$4,591.00; making a total collections in Sunday-schools for the year of \$28,128.00.

#### REPORT OF CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

Each year's history of the Church Extension movement demonstrates more and more the great importance and utility of this department of our church work. Its value is to be estimated not simply by the multiplication of houses of worship, but by the fact that their establishment gives permanency to church organization and work in their respective localities. This is an effect the ultimate issues of which cannot be reckoned.

Our own Conference Board, from the date of its organization, has raised for Church Extension purposes \$40,290. It has appropriated to 150 churches within its own territory \$19,133. The Parent Board has, during the same period, donated to churches within our bounds \$12,500, and loaned \$22,050, making a total of \$31,633 donated, and \$22,050 loaned.

The entire amount raised for this object in all the Conferences by annual collections and by other means from March, 1882, to the corresponding month 1900, was \$1,157,000, and the number of churches aided by this fund 4,461—of which 27 were in foreign lands.

This statistical statement will give some idea of the extensive and beneficent operation of this great enterprise of the church. Not only has it greatly stimulated church building in the older conferences, but largely supplied the need in this regard in more destitute regions, and especially along our western frontier. The want, however, is one that is perpetually recurring, and must for years to come engage the largest liberality and most sympathetic co-operation of the church. This is particularly the case now that the Parent Board has extended its work into the foreign field.

We regret to report a slight falling off in the collections for this fund in our Conference during the past year. Last year and the year before there was an encouraging increase in the amounts contributed. We had hoped to have a similar experience this year, but the Twentieth Century Thanksgiving Fund has somewhat, though not seriously, affected our receipts, as it has some of the other collections of the Conference. We urge the preachers in charge to bring the subject of Church Extension before their congregations, and make special and earnest effort to bring up the assessments for this purpose during the coming year. We trust that among the various collections prescribed by the Conference no unfair discrimination will be made against that for the particular object we represent. Yielding priority of claim to the collection for our chief pastors and for the superannuated claimants, we maintain that no other Conference collection should have precedence of that for Church Extension.

The report of our Treasurer will give in detail an account of the receipts and expenditures for the year. Eight churches have been aided by our fund in six of the districts of the Conference. The relief afforded in some of these cases was most timely, and saved the churches thus aided from serious difficulty and embarrassment.

The reports of the Corresponding Secretary and the Treasurer of the Woman's Home Mission Society are hereunto appended. We again commend this important and growing branch of our work to the cordial support of our ministry and membership.

Seven new auxiliaries were organized at Keyser, Fredericksburg, Marquis Memorial, Calvary, Baltimore, Barclay, Md., Port Republic, Va, and Aberdeen, Md.

Two union District meetings were held respectively at Staunton and Alexandria, and were signal successes.

A great deal of local work is done that cannot be reported in figures. The Home Mission Society has everywhere favored itself the most valuable help to a pastor in his benevolent work.

We again beseech the co-operation of our brethren of the ministry in helping the District Secretaries to organize Home Mission Societies in their various charges. Unless this is done we cannot possibly grant the donations that have been asked of us. Every year more money is asked by needy parsonages than we have raised as dues. Since only one-half the dues can be appropriated in this conference, we have been compelled to refuse some brethren the donations they asked. If every preacher would organize a Home Mission Society, or allow the District Secretaries to organize such, we could meet all demands. Nothing cripples our work so much as indifference from the ministry, and nothing helps us so much as their endorsement and active co-operation. We urge the brethren to organize their old aids into the new aid to the preacher, the Home Mission Society, which is authorized by the General Conference to do the work done by the former "aids," and a great deal more in the way of local benevolence, visiting, Bible readings, etc.

We cordially thank the brethren who have helped and cheered us in our work, and earnestly pray God to bless them in their temporary homes, which we, as a *Home Mission Society*, are pledged to build and maintain for their comfort.

## REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

The reports of the pastors show an increase of 10 chapters and 292 members. Our total membership is now 9,636, the largest in the connection. As gratifying as the report is we are far from being satisfied with the growth and efficiency of our League work.

We commend the interest of our Young People's Society to the consideration of our pastors. Let the aim be to increase our League membership, and to render more efficient each chapter and more helpful each member.

1. We would suggest that the devotional meetings be made services of real spiritual power, and each League be an individual factor in the religious life and work of the church.

2. While we would not attempt to make our Leagues mere money gatherers, we would seek the development of each member in systematic liberality and effort.

We urge our pastors to utilize their Leagues in securing the full payment of the benevolent collections.

*Orphans and the Orphanage.*

We desire to enlist all our members in some form of philanthropic enterprise, so long neglected by us. Accordingly we have requested Rev. J. H. Light, our Conference Second Vice-President, to inquire into the actual needs for work in the interest of helpless orphans that may be found within our Conference territory, and to discover if possible some practical way of meeting the same.

*District Organizations.*

We recommend that the district organizations hold *conferences* at convenient times and places in every district.

Revs. J. S. Engle, W. H. H. Joyce and J. O. Knott are appointed to prepare a skeleton programme for such conferences, to be published in the Baltimore and Richmond Christian Advocate not later than May 15th.

Rev. J. H. Light has been appointed to take charge of the Epworth League page in the Baltimore and Richmond Advocate.

We commend the *Epsworth Era*, our young people's organ, to the attention of all our Leagues, and would urge them to improve the advantages of its excellent clubbing rates—with a view of placing a copy of the *Era* in every Leaguer's hands.

## COMMITTEES.

### MEMOIRS.

Rev. J. Hoffman Waugh, D. D.

The subject of this memoir was born in Alexandria, Va., March 27, 1814, and died in Harrisonburg, Va., August 10, 1900, in his 87th year. He was the eldest child of a distinguished attorney of Washington city, and a nephew of Bishop Beverly Waugh, of the Methodist Episcopal Church. His mother, who was a devout member of the Society of Friends, dedicated him at his birth to the Lord, of which fact she did not inform him till his entrance into the ministry.

He was liberally educated at the noted "Benjamin Hallowell School," Alexandria, Va., and at Georgetown College, District of Columbia. He was engaged for some years in secular pursuits, but during most of the time was deeply impressed that it was his duty to devote his life to the work of the ministry. In vain did he endeavor to shake off these impressions. Until, at last, impelled by the call of God, he resigned a Government position worth twelve hundred dollars a year for a rural appointment paying but one hundred dollars a year.

He was converted when about twelve years of age, and united with the Methodist Church. In 1842 he was received on trial by the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church; became a full member, and was ordained Deacon by Bishop Morris at the Old Foundry Church, in Washington, March 17, 1844. March 15, 1846, he was ordained Elder by Bishop Janes at Eutaw Church, Baltimore. In his early ministry he filled some of the most important stations in Baltimore and in Washington city. Apart from his various pastoral appointments, he was Presiding Elder of the Lewisburg District, and served two terms of four years each as Presiding Elder of the Rockingham District.

Dr. Waugh served the following charges at the periods indicated: Jefferson Circuit, in 1842; Hillsboro, 1843; Prince George's, 1844; Baltimore City Station, 1845; Winchester Circuit, 1846; Jefferson, 1847; Lewisburg, 1848; Lexington, 1849; Salem, 1850 and 1851; Fincastle, 1852 and 1853; East Baltimore, 1854; Fayette Street, Baltimore, 1855 and 1856; West Loudoun, 1857 and 1858; Jefferson, 1859 and 1860; Hillsboro, 1861-1865; Lewisburg District, 1866-1870; Rockingham District, 1870-1874; Alexandria, 1874-1877; Hillsboro, 1877; Falls Church, 1878-1881; Loudoun, 1881-1883; Piedmont and Linden, 1883; Piedmont, 1884-1886; Lexington, 1886; Rockingham District, 1887-1891; Berkely, 1891. While at Lexington, in 1886, the degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him by the Washington and Lee University. In 1892 his name was placed on the list of superannuates, having completed the fiftieth year of his active ministry. After his superannuation he settled in Harrisonburg, Va., where he passed a serene old age, amid warm friends, and pleasant surroundings, respected and beloved by the entire community.

In form Dr. Waugh was tall, commanding, and well proportioned; dignified in his bearing both in the pulpit and out of it. He had an incisive order of mind, was a diligent student, a learned theologian, and a man of wide information. He was "An able minister of the New Testament," preparing his sermons with great care, and bringing no "unbeaten oil" into the sanctuary of God. He was remarkable for his wide command of



language, always choosing the most fitting and forcible words to convey his meaning.

Above all, he was a man of great devotion and piety, consecrated with singleness of purpose to his high and holy office. He declined no work assigned by the church, and shrunk from no labor or sacrifice that it involved. The responsible positions of his long career were filled with fidelity and success.

Dr. George V. Leech, of the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, who previous to the civil war had been associated with Dr. Waugh in ministerial work, in speaking of him, says:

"It was my good fortune to be the junior colleague of my friend twice; first, in the second year of my ministry on West Loudoun Circuit; again in my fourth year on Jefferson. I came to know him intimately. What wise counsel, given with the tenderness of an elder brother! What thorough honesty of spirit! What extensive and exact information! What fidelity to truth and to his exalted work! I was much in my colleague's home. I always left exalted by my intercourse with this strong man, and his gentle but queenly companion."

Although his health had been declining for some time his last illness was of brief continuance. God spared his aged servant a period of protracted suffering. Some days before his death he spoke calmly of his approaching departure, and hopefully of the bright and blessed future upon which he was soon to enter.

He leaves behind him a widow and five daughters, to whom we extend our sincere sympathies.

The funeral services were conducted at the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Harrisonburg, Va., on Sunday, August 12th, at 11 A. M. As a mark of respect to his memory all the churches in the town, except one, suspended their morning services, and the ministers of these several churches were in attendance at the obsequies, together with some of our own brethren from adjacent appointments. Rev. Dr. Palmer of the Presbyterian Church offered the opening prayer. Rev. Thomas Cooper read the first lesson, and Rev. R. L. Fultz the second. Rev. J. E. Armstrong, Presiding Elder of the Rockingham District; Rev. J. R. Andrew, Dr. Waugh's pastor, and Rev. Dr. S. K. Cox, editor of the *Baltimore Christian Advocate*, spoke upon the character and ministerial career of our deceased brother.

The interment was at Woodbine Cemetery, Harrisonburg, Va.

### Rev. Thomas Briley.

Rev. Thomas Briley was born in Frederick county, Md., in 1836, and died at Mt. Jackson, Va., April 19, 1900.

He was converted to God at an early age, and united with the M. E. Church in Altadale, Franklin county, Pa.; was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference at its session in Lewisburg, W. Va., 1859; was ordained a Deacon at Staunton, 1861, by Bishop Scott, and Elder by Bishop Early at the session of 1866 in Alexandria, Va.

He served as assistant preacher on Springfield, Berkeley Springs and Shepherdstown Circuits, and as preacher in charge of Union Circuit, Lewisburg District, in 1861. In 1862 he was united in marriage to Miss Sidney Smith, of Darksville, Berkeley county, W. Va., who survives him.

His subsequent fields of labor were Blue Sulphur, 1862; Warm Springs, 1863-65; Franklin, 1866; New Market, 1867-68; Crab Bottom, 1869; Augusta, 1870. In 1871 he was appointed to Monterey, but on account of feeble health failed to go and was placed in charge of Augusta Circuit until 1874, when he was superannuated. In 1876 he was made effective and served Fairfield and Collinstown circuits till 1882, when his relation was

again changed to that of a superannuate, which relation he sustained for two years. Entering again with undaunted courage upon the effective work, he was assigned to West Harford, in Maryland, 1884-'85; to New Market, 1886-'87; to Port Republic, 1888; New Hope, 1889-'91; Rockingham, 1892-95; Mt. Jackson, 1896-1900.

At the last session of the Conference held in Washington city, he was placed for the third time on the superannuated list. At the close of the session he contracted a severe cold and returned home to sicken and die. He was called to attend a funeral in the vicinity of Mt. Jackson. Exposure to the inclement weather was followed by double pneumonia, which his frail constitution could not resist. His last days, though days of suffering, were full of personal testimony to the power of sustaining grace. For forty-one years he preached "the Word"—that Jesus Christ was God incarnate, who for the redemption of the world suffered even unto death—after proclaiming the Gospel for so many years, in prospect of impending death, could say with Paul, "I know whom I have believed." Possessing and enjoying this knowledge, and retaining his faculties to the last, he "passed through death triumphant home."

Brother Briley was a man of strong Christian character. One who knew him well says, "He had decided ability as a preacher, and won the confidence and affection of the people on every charge he served. In the pulpit he was sound in doctrine, grave and dignified in manner, and gentle in spirit. In association with his friends, a vein of humor lightened the gravity of his bearing, yet without lessening the influence of his pure life and example. His zeal for God and his high ideal of duty often led him beyond the limit of his physical strength and subjected him to much suffering." But his work on earth is done. Surely he is one of those to whom the Master will say, "Well done, good and faithful servant; enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

Brother Briley was loved by all his brethren in the ministry, and the memory of his useful and faithful career in the ministry of the Baltimore Conference will long abide in the hearts of those who were under his pastoral charge; and, in no part of the Conference territory more deeply than within the bounds of the Rockingham District, where he spent, in all, twenty-five years in the effective ranks, besides resting two years in Greenville, Augusta county, Va.

The funeral services were held in the M. E. Church, South, in Mt. Jackson, on Friday morning, April 26th, and were conducted by the Rev. James E. Armstrong, Presiding Elder of the Rockingham District, who selected for his text, II Timothy, 4 ch., 6, 7 vs.: "For I am ready to be offered, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith." Rev. J. R. Andrew and Rev. R. M. Wheeler took part in the services.

His remains were carried to Harrisonburg, and there laid away to await the resurrection morn.

### Rev. John Clay Jones.

John Clay Jones, youngest son of J. M. and Phoebe Jones, was born in Franklin, Pendleton county, W. Va., September 18th, 1853, and died at the home of his father-in-law, Rev. B. F. Ball, in Romney, W. Va., August 21, 1900.

In early manhood he was happily converted to God, and shortly after felt called to preach the Gospel. In 1877 he applied for admission into the itinerant ministry, and was received by the Baltimore Conference. That year he was appointed as junior preacher to Augusta Circuit, Rev. B. F. Ball in charge, and was returned to the circuit the following year as the junior of Rev. L. H. Graybill. In 1879 he was junior preacher on Bladens-

burg Circuit. In 1880 he was appointed to White Sulphur Springs Station, and continued in charge until 1883. From 1883 to 1887 he was in charge of Occoquan Circuit. At the Conference of that year he was placed in charge of Grace Mission, now Epworth Church, Washington, D. C. In 1891 he was appointed to Basic City, but, obtaining a release from that charge after a brief service, he spent several months of travel in Europe. On his return he was assigned to his former charge in Washington and remained until 1895. His next appointment was Trinity Church, Roanoke, which he served well for four years, and from which he went in 1899 to Woodstock, and was in the second year of his ministry there at the time of his death.

Brother Jones was twice married, his first wife being Miss Ada Warren Gibson, of Paris, Fauquier county, Va., who lived only a little over one year after her marriage, dying December 25th, 1890. On the 19th of October, 1898, he was married to Miss Francis Elizabeth Ball, daughter of his first colleague, Rev. B. F. Ball, Presiding Elder of the Moorefield District.

Brother Jones was a man of fine physique. His death was as unexpected to us as was that of Brother J. D. Martin last year. He had been complaining for two or three weeks, and, under the advice of his physician, had gone to Romney where his wife was visiting her father, trusting that the change and rest would soon relieve him. Although he knew he had typhoid fever, it was only a few hours before his death that it assumed a violent form. He was conscious to the last. Looking death in the face he called his wife, and attended calmly to some matters of business. As he concluded, in response to a proposition to talk about spiritual matters, replied: "Since I have been sick I have been so dull and stupid; my mind so confused, that I have not been able to read, scarcely to think, and hardly to pray connectedly, but I have no doubt or fear, and am fully satisfied as to my acceptance with God, through Him that loved me and gave Himself for me." Later in the day he prayed with those that were present, commending his broked family to God. In a little while afterwards fell asleep, to awaken in the Kingdom above.

Wednesday afternoon, the Moorefield District Conference went in a body to the district parsonage where the funeral services were held. The next day his remains were taken to Harrisonburg for interment, the official board of Woodstock acting as pallbearers. The following Sunday memorial services were held in Woodstock, all of the churches of the town uniting to pay a last tribute to one they all loved so well.

In the death of Brother Jones the Conference has lost one of its best men and ablest ministers. In his preaching he was clear, thoughtful and logical. He never indulged in repetitions, trite sayings and stereotyped expressions. His subjects were thoroughly discussed, showing thought, research and freshness. As a pastor he was genial, helpful, vigilant and discreet. He was a man of superior sense and judgment. He knew men as well as things. He understood human nature, and know how to deal with all kinds of men. He was a man of the finest social qualities, his ready wit, which sparkled with brilliancy, along with his sunny humor and disposition made him a favorite with all who knew him. His information was most accurate. He never indulged in idle speculations, but *knew* "whereof he spoke." To those who did not understand him he was kind, generous and forgiving. To his friends; true in every word and deed, counting no sacrifice too great to make for them. Those who knew him best loved him most. In the language of his last text, from which he preached August 5th, we offer our last and highest eulogy: "For he was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith, and much people were added unto the Lord."

For his sorrow-stricken wife and two children left behind, we pray: May his God be their God, and the God of the widows and the fatherless keep them, 'neath the shadow of His wings.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.**

DEAR BRETHREN.—The influence of the press is being more and more felt in all the departments of church work, and demands the careful consideration of our Annual Conference. No human agency except that of the living ministry is comparable to it in the formation of public opinion, and in directing the activities of the church. With a proper appreciation of this department of the church's work we have heard with pleasure and gratitude to God of the continued prosperity of our Publishing House at Nashville, Tenn. The report is most gratifying in that it shows a constant increase in the volume of business done by the house. The report presented to the Conference shows an increase of business for the year ending March 31, 1900, of \$10,000 over that of any preceding year in its history. We are assured by the agent, Dr. Barbee, that the year ending March 31, 1901, will show a still larger increase. Not only in the volume of business, but also in the character of the books and periodicals published is there special reasons for congratulation. The books that have been published under the imprint of our book editor have been pure in character, elevated in tone, and

thoroughly Christian in spirit. The mechanical work upon them is, we believe, equal to that of any other publishing house of the country. We would give unqualified endorsement to the periodicals which are being issued. These are *The Christian Advocate*, *The Methodist Review*, *The Review of Missions*, *The Epworth Era*, the *Sunday-School Periodicals*, *The Woman's Missionary Advocate* and *Our Homes*. These seem to cover the whole need of the church, and we believe that there is a field for each of them, so that none ought to be dispensed with. As *The Methodist Review* and *The Epworth Era* are reported as not self-sustaining, let the effort be made to increase their circulation, not discontinue their great usefulness by ceasing their publication.

We endorse the consolidation of the Richmond and the Baltimore *Christian Advocates*, and commend the new paper to the patronage of our people. Inasmuch as we incur no financial obligation in its publication, and also reserve the right to withdraw our endorsement of it by resolution at any annual session of our Conference, we feel under the greater obligation to give the paper our hearty and loyal support while it remains our recognized Conference organ. We would express our highest appreciation of the scholarly manner in which our Conference editor, Dr. S. K. Cox, has performed his editorial work. At the request of the publisher we recommend his appointment as the editor for the Baltimore Conference for the ensuing year. We would also express our thanks to Rev. H. M. Hope for the manner in which he has conducted the editorial management of the paper during the past Conference year, and pledge him our support for the coming year.

We are glad that by a contract with the Publishing House, Brother Rush Robinson will be in a position to carry a stock of current Sunday-school literature and a full line of Methodist publications. Such an arrangement will be of great service to our Conference. We recommend the appointment of Brother Rush Robinson as colporteur of this Conference for the ensuing year.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

With regard to the papers received from the American Anti-Saloon League, of Washington, D. C., and James W. Bodley, of Staunton, Va., requesting our co-operation in the suppression of the saloon: While we do not deem it proper for this Conference to send delegates to the Convention of the American Anti-Saloon League, or to unite with the same and other specially organized temperance bodies in petitioning the Constitutional Convention of the State of Virginia to give the people an opportunity to vote their wishes on the question of the liquor traffic, we, the committee, unanimously set forth what we think are the sentiments of this Conference with reference to the liquor traffic in the following resolutions:

1. We would remind our people of paragraph No. 215 of the Discipline: "Let all our preachers and members abstain from the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, to be used as a beverage, from signing petitions for such sale, in becoming bondsmen for any person as a candidate for obtaining license, and from renting property to be used for such sale. If any member shall violate any provision of this paragraph, it shall be the duty of the pastor to deal with the offender." (Chap. 7, sec. 5.)
2. We recommend that temperance societies be organized for the promotion of the cause of temperance whenever it is thought good may be done, and that special effort may be made to enlist our young people in this cause.
3. We recommend that our people avail themselves of the benefit of the local option laws of their respective States, and exercise their rights as citizens in suppressing the liquor traffic.



4. We suggest that the cause of temperance be prominently brought before our District Conferences, that it may thereby be brought and kept before the minds of the people as a safeguard and help against intemperance.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

Your committee has had several sittings. It has carefully considered the needs of the Bible cause in our own territory. Dr. Campbell, Virginia State Agent of the American Bible Society, was before the committee and gave us some facts that should be of interest to us as Methodists and as a Conference. When we remember that the support of this great work is largely in the hands of the Methodists and Presbyterians, and that only \$2,496 was received from all sources from the State of Virginia for carrying on this work, it certainly behooves us, as the Baltimore Conference, to seriously consider our obligations to this great religious institution. In considering the reports of the collections for the Bible cause, they show a much smaller amount than we ought to pay for a Conference with a membership of some 50,000. Yet 50,000 members contributed, in 1900, but \$471. We are constrained to believe that the small collections for this cause are due largely to a lack of system or entire neglect by many of our pastors. There seems to be, in the majority of cases, no special time when this claim is presented and the collection taken. Therefore, we recommend that the third Sunday in September be appointed by the Conference as the day when all of our pastors shall present this cause, and lift a collection for the same, not that we believe one Sunday better than another, but that some Sunday is better than none. We trust that the Conference will concur in our recommendation. We would further call the attention of our brethren to the opportunities they have of circulating the Scriptures in their communities in their pastoral word, and thus aid by their personal efforts the work of the Society. We believe that this work of putting the Scriptures in the hands of the people is too much neglected by our pastors, and is left entirely too much to the agents of the Society. Much labor and expense could be thus saved the Society.

We would further call the attention of our Epworth Leagues to the great opportunity many of them have of supplying the jails and almshouses with copies of God's work.

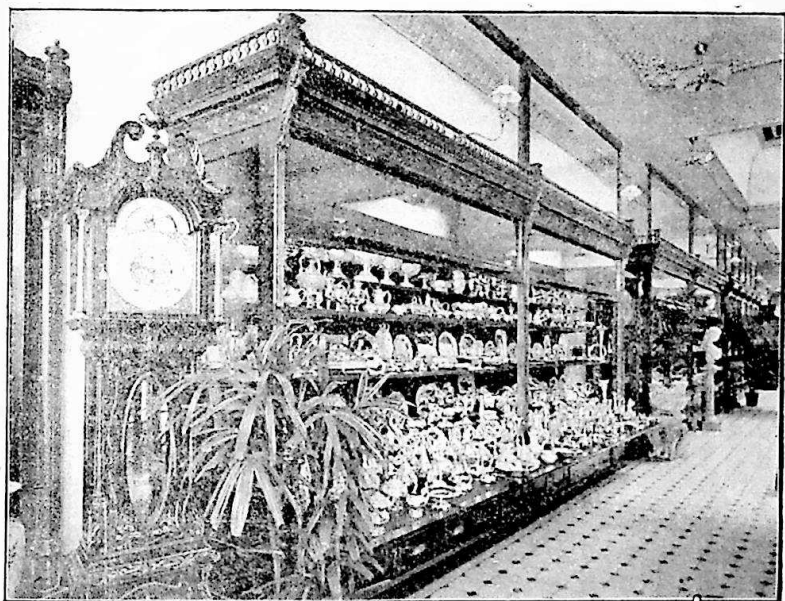
