THE BALTIMORE ANNUAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTEENTH Session in Trinity Church, Baltimore, Maryland, Wednesday, March 26 1902, at 9 o'clock A. M.

Bishop Charles B. Galloway, D. D., President of the Conference, in the chair.

The Bishop read, as the lesson, II Timothy, Second Chapter. The Conference united in singing hymn No. 228—

and was lead in prayer by the Bishop.

Question Four of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are admitted into full connection?

Joseph H. Balthis, Lloyd W. Kincaid, Ernest L. Woolf, Bernley D. Harrison, Joseph F. Valliant having passed an examination of character, were also reported as having passed in examination before the Committee on the Course of Study.

Bishop Galloway having called these brethren forward, Bishop Candler, by his request, propounded the Disciplinary Questions after an impressive address. The questions were severally answered in the affirmative and they were admitted into full connection.

Question Eight was called, viz: What traveling preachers are elected Deacons?

Conference met pursuant to adjournment.

Bishop Galloway in the chair.

Religious exercises were conducted by S. K. Cox.

The following question of law was submitted to the Bishop for his decision:

At the session of an Annual Conference, under question twelve of the General Minutes, a brother (a member of the class of the fourth year) is proposed for election to Elder's orders. Objection is made because it is alleged that the brother is not willing to use the ritual of the Church for the administration of the Lord's Supper, except upon his own private interpretation of its meaning. Upon inquiry of the brother as to what his interpretation is, and whether, if elected an Elder, he will sincerely use the ritual according to the meaning of the language in which it is embodied in the Discipline, and in the sense in which it is accepted by our Church, on motion this inquiry is referred to a special committee to confer with the brother, ascertain his position and report to the Conference. A lay delegate, regularly elected and enrolled, claims the right to speak and vote upon this motion.

- (1) Is this a question affecting ministerial relations upon which a lay member of the Conference has a right to vote?
- (2) Are lay members of the Annual Conference excluded from voting on any matter which properly comes before the body under question twelve of the General Minutes?
- (3) Can the lay members of the Annual Conference be excluded from voting for or against the election of a candidate to Elder's orders on the ground that the objections to his election consist of matters affecting his ministerial character?
- (4) If a lay member cannot be excluded from voting for or against a candidate for Elder's orders, can be be excluded from speaking to the question?

Question Five of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are re-admitted?

Henry Lawson, recommended by the Lewisburg District Conference, was re-admitted into the traveling connection.

The following resolution was presented and read:

Believing that there is a widespead and growing desire on the part of our people for a fall session of our Conference, be it therefore

Resolved. That we request the Bishops to appoint the fourth Wednesday in October as the time for the next meeting of our Conference, and that all assessments be made upon the basis of the length of the Conference year.

The recommendations of James Hubert Haley, from the Winchester District Conference; Charles W. Stump, George W. Yost, from the Moore-field District Conference, were presented in due form, and they were elected to deacon's orders.

Question Fourteen: What local preachers are elected elders?

The recommendations of Frederick A. Stier, Benjamin A. Shreve, from the Washington District Conference; Lewis S. Rudasill, from the Roanoke District Conference, were presented in due form, and they were elected elders.

The following resolutions were presented and read, and on motion they were adopted:

Resolved, (1) That we hereby express our sincere sympathy with our beloved and venerable brother, Rev. Nelson Head, D.D., in his advanced age and infirmity, and in his present severe affliction, and commend him to the tender mercies of our God, praying that he may experience in all their preciousness and power the consolations of that grace he for so many years proclaimed to others.

Resolved, (2) That the Secretary of the Conference be requested to send a copy of this resolution to Dr. Head.

On motion, the memorial services for deceased brethren was made the order of the day for Monday morning next at 10.30 o'clock.

The Conference proceeded to the election of delegates to the General Conference, which meets in Dallas, Texas, next May.

The Chair announced that the Conference was entitled to five clerical and five lay delegates, and being divided into two electoral colleges, it proceeded to vote, D. H. Kern, H. M. Canter, M. L. Walton, A. B. Pugh acting

as tellers. G, T. Tyler was appointed secretary to the clerical tellers, and A. R. Martin to the lay tellers.

The tellers with the secretaries were permitted to retire to count the votes.

Rev. J. J. Tigert, D. D., book editor, addressed the Conference in regard to his work. Rev. J. J. Lafferty addressed the Conference in behalf of the Baltimore and Richmond Christian Advocate.

The secretary and tellers for the lay delegates to the General Conference reported on the first ballot that 25 votes had been cast; necessary to a choice, 13; of which M. L. Walton received 20 votes; A. B. Pugh 18; T. T. Fishburne 15; A. E. Huddleston 14; C. E. Muller 10; C. M. Armstrong 6; J. W. Woods 6; E. S. Conrad 5; A. C. Nadenbusch 4; S. T. Moreland 4; E. D. Newman 4; E. D. Preston 3; C. P. Jones 3; B. H. Hiner 2; T. C. Dye 2; F. B. Thomas, E. C. Berry, O. L. Rhodes, Reeves Catt, 1 each.

The President announced that M. Lauck Walton, Arthur B. Pugh, Tipton T. Fishburne and A. Elias Huddlestun, having received a majority of the votes cast, were elected lay delegates to the General Conference.

The lay members proceeded to vote on the second ballot, and the Secretary and tellers retired to count the vote.

The committee appointed to respond to the communication from the Preachers' Meeting of the Methodist Episcopal Church in this city reported as follows:

The Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South gratefully acknowledges the christian courtesy of the Preachers' Meeting of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Baltimore, manifested in the resolutions brought to the Conference by a committee of five of the members of the Preachers' Meeting, and prays that God may abundantly bless the great work in which our brethren are engaged.

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Conference be instructed to send a copy of this paper to the Preachers' Meeting of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Baltimore.

Rev. James Atkins, D. D., Sunday School Secretary, addressed the Conference.

The secretary and tellers for the lay delegates reported the second ballot.

Number of votes cast, 25; necessary to a choice, 13; of which Charles E. Muller received 15 votes; Charles M. Armstrong 4; scattering, 7.

The President announced that Charles E. Muller, having received a majority of the votes cast, was elected a delegate to the General Conference.

On motion, the Conference determined to elect three clerical and three lay alternate delegates.

The lay members proceeded to vote on the first ballot for alternate lay delegates to the General Conference. The Secretary and tellers retired to count the ballots.

Rev. W. G. Starr, D. D., President of Randolph-Macon College, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

The secretary and tellers for alternate lay members reported number of votes cast 27; necessary to a choice 14; of which E. S. Conrad received 16; B. H. Hiner 15; C. W. Prettyman 11; C. M. Armstrong 8; P. D. V. Conway 5; F. B. Thomas 4; E. D. Newman, 4; J. W. Woods 3; 9 scattering.

The Bishop announced that Edward S. Conrad and Benjamin H. Hiner, having received a majority of the votes cast, were elected alternate lay delegates to the General Conference.

The lay members proceeded to vote on the second ballot for alternate lay delegates.

The secretary and tellers retired to count the ballots, and reported: Number of votes cast, 26; necessary to a choice, 14; of which C. W. Prettyman received 23 votes; scattering, 3. Whereupon the Bishop announced that Charles W. Prettyman was elected third alternate lay delegate to the General Conference.

Collins Denny, chairman of the committee in the case of Seymour Grady, made a verbal report that they had conferred with him, and that he gave assurance that if elected Elder he would conscientiously conform to the requirements of the Discipline.

Resolved, That the Baltimore Conference memorialize the General Conference to change paragraph 102 of the Discipline of 1898 by striking out

the words "when approved by the College of Bishops" after the words "and such decisions," and by inserting after the word "published" the words "with a history and a syllabus of the case," so that the paragraph as amended will read: "And all such decisions shall be recorded in a permanent form and published with a history and syllabus of the case in such manner as the Bishops shall agree to adopt."

A communication was presented and referred to the Committee on Temperance.

A communication was presented and referred to the Committee on Publishing Interests.

Question One of the General Minutes was called, viz: Who are admitted on trial?

The recommendations of Selwin Kennedy Cockrell, James Frederick Peake, from the Washington District Conference; James Hubert Haley, George Washington Staples, from the Winchester District Conference; John Markwood Kline, from the Rockingham District Conference; Louis Singleton Rudasill, from the Roanoke District Conference, were presented in proper form, and having passed in examination before the Committee on the Course of Study, and having been also recommended by the Committee on Admissions, they were severally admitted on trial.

Question Seven: Who are the deacons of one year?

The characters of Frank A. Tyler, Henry W. Burruss, Henry C. Febrey, Boyd V. Switzer, Harvey Q. Burr, George Hasel were examined and passed, and having passed in examination on the Course of Study, they were advanced to the Class of the Third Year.

Question Twelve: What traveling preachers are elected Elders?

Henry W. Burruss, having passed in examination on the Course of Study, was elected Elder.

Question Two: Who remain on trial?

The characters of John W. Smith, Claude M. Hesser, Jesse D. Pope, Wm. M. Compton were examined and passed, and having also passed in examination on the Course of Study, they were advanced to the Class of the Second Year.

The characters of James P. Hupman, Jerry C. Jeter, Edwin W. Brubaker, George Herbert Fielding were examined and passed, but not having passed in examination on the Course of Study, their names were continued under Question One.

C. F. McClintic passed in examination of character, but not having been before the Committee on the Course of Study, he was continued in the Class of the First Year, under Question One.

Rev. G. S. Lightner, of the West Virginia Conference, Rev. R. P. Lumpkin, of the Virginia Conference, Rev. J. T. Meyers, of the Japan Mission Conference, were introduced.

On motion, the session was extended until the report should be made on the second clerical ballot.

Question Twenty of the General Minutes, viz: Are all the preachers blumeless in their life and official administration?

The call of Washington District was resumed, and the characters of E. V. Regester, G. T. Tyler, J. H. Boyd, S. G. Ferguson, C. Sydenstricker, C. B. Sutton, C. H. Buchanan, W. H. Woolf and H. S. Coe were examined and passed.

When the name of T. E. Carson was called, he addressed the Conference in reference to his year's work. He stated that his physical health had so far failed that he was no longer able to do effective work. He presented a review of his long ministry in this Conference, and asked that his name be referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for a superannuated relation. Bishop Wilson and J. E. Armstrong addressed the Conference in reference to Brother Carson's request.

The character of Thomas E. Carson was examined and passed, and his name was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for a superannuated relation.

The following preamble and resolution were presented and read, and on motion, they were referred to the Board of Education:

Whereas, Randolph-Macon Academy, at Front Royal, Virginia, is the only institution of learning within the bounds of our Conference belonging to the Church, a relation which we gladly welcome and cherish; and,

Whereas, We fully believe in the competency and faithfulness of the present governing body and faculty; and

Whereas, It is of first importance to the stability and vigor of our cause that the sons of our people be educated under the tutorship of the Church;

And whereas, a recent circular from the Principal of the Academy shows the attendance of but one student from distinctive Methodist homes for every 1,000 members within our Conference bounds; therefore,

Resolved, That the Board of Education be requested to give specific consideration at this time to the question of service rendered in its way to the Church: and if they judge wise, to make such suggestions as they may deem proper to this body, and through this body to the Board of Trustees of the Randolph-Macon System, as may best serve the purpose of extending the sphere of usefulness of this valuable institution to the Conference and the Church.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY, BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.

. To the Bishop and Members of the Baltimore Annual Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN:

The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of this Conference rejoice to be part of the Forward Movement of Missions. A decided increase in energy and interest has been manifest, mainly due to the assumption of the salary of a missionary from our own Conference, Miss Carroll, at Won-san, Korea. We cherish the hope that in time we may support both the ladies at work in Korea who went from our Conference.

The Melissa Baker Scholarship at the Scarritt Bible and Training School is not yet finished. As our members begin to understand that a course at the Training School is essential to missionary equipment, surely they will not relax their endeavor to its completion.

These are our specials.

We have received one legacy of five hundred dollars, and one donation of one hundred dollars to the scholarship. The rest of our funds have come from dues and smaller gifts. We are grateful for any assistance rendered by members of your body. In return we gladly lend our powers to all your work, church building and maintenance, education, conference collections. We have no desire to press our own claims unduly where other church work was first undertaken. But we work under a Constitution imposed by the General Conference, which organized each department of Southern Methodism. By that Constitution, funds raised for and by the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society cannot be diverted into any other channel. Not even so essential a need as the Conference collections can be aided from our treasury. We mutually aim to build up the Kingdom of God; but our lines of work lie in different departments. Every woman who loves the foreign field will work no less for her pastor and church at home. We ask that you will help, not hinder us, nor deny us your good will.

Under my supervision are now seventy-five adult societies, with nearly sixteen hundred members; twenty-nine juvenile societies, with about five hundred members. The societies at Front Royal support a day school in Shanghai; and a number of societies educate girls in China or Mexico.

I present to you a summary of the Treasurer's Report.

To the Baltimore Conference M. E. Church, South :

TWENTIETH CENTURY FUND.

The Board of Education recommends that the Executive Committee in charge of the Twentieth Century Fund be continued in office, and that they continue their effort to collect subscriptions already made and add any other that may be gotten up to the time of the General Conference in May, 1902.

We urgently request our pastors to furnish Mr. George R. Hill, Treasurer of our Executive Committee, the names of unpaid subscribers to the Twentieth Century Fund.

RANDOLPH-MACON SYSTEM OF SCHOOLS.

The Board of Education of the Baltimore Conference, recognizing the superior advantages offered for classical education by the Randolph-Macon Colleges and Academies, does most heartily commend them to the Church and the general public for sympathy and support.

Every effort should be made to put these institutions beyond the possibility of any embarrassment whatever, and to this end we would urge all our people to become their liberal patrons.

1. Randolph-Macon College.

The College at Ashland, Virginia, continues, under the leadership of Dr. W. G. Starr, to be true to its historic past in setting before the students high ideals and demanding thorough and earnest work. We hope that the number of students from the Baltimore Conference will grow larger every year.

We should be greatly pleased to see a Chair of Modern Languages in Randolph-Macon College, endowed by our members, and we heartily commend this proposition to their liberality; but we cannot advise the Conference to enter upon this undertaking as a Conference enterprise.

2. Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal.

The Front Royal Academy, located within the bounds of our Conference, is thoroughly equipped for academic work, and under the management of Professor Charles L. Melton stands second to none among schools of the kind.

We recommend that earnest effort be made to reduce the debt on this institution and an endowment fund provided as soon as possible. We would urge upon our pastors and people the importance of substantial sympathy and support of this school.

3. Randolph-Macon Woman's College

This institution stands in the very front rank among American Colleges for women. The rigid maintenance of the high grade of its course of study, the superior character and intellectual equipment of its faculty, and the pains they use to give their students a thorough education, insure to every diligent pupil who passes through its classes a real college education. Its diploma is conclusive evidence of the culture it professes to represent.

REPORTS.

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But we especially emphasize the fact that Randolph-Macon Woman's College is, in fact and spirit, as well as profession, a Christian institution. Nothing inconsistent with the highest type of Christian character is tolerated there—much less will anything inimical to the Gospel, as held and expounded by Southern Methodism, be fostered or winked at. The daughter, sent to Lynchburg, will not be alienated from the simplicity and sincerity of the Methodist faith and practice; she will not be sent home, at the end of her course, a worldly votary of doubtful and forbidden pleasures, despising the church of her parents and holding their Godly living in contempt.

We plead with our people not to be misled by the advice of some, and the example of others, who would have you educate your children outside of our own Church schools.

4. Other Schools of the System.

The Academy at Bedford City, Virginia, and the Institute at Danville, Virginia, are of the highest grade, and we learn, with gratification, of their success.

SOUTHERN SEMINARY.

We believe that the Southern Seminary, located at Beuna Vista, Virginia, is an excellent educational institution, worthy of our patronage, and may receive our hearty recommendation and endorsement as a school where our daughters will be given careful, Christian education, preparatory for the Randelph-Macon Woman's College, at Lynchburg, Virginia.

PAINE AND LANE INSTITUTES.

It is very gratifying to note the continued prosperity and progress made by these schools. The increased numbers of their pupils and the large number of their graduates holding positions of usefulness in the Church and in the world give promise of still larger results.

ASSESSMENT.

We recommend an assessment of two thousand three hundred and sixty dollars, of which three hundred and sixty dollars shall be for the General Board of Education and two thousand dollars for the benefit of Randolph-Macon College at Ashland, Virginia; also an assessment of five hundred dollars in aid of Paine and Lane Institutes.

The Board recommends the appointment of Reverend J. A. Kern, D. D., and of Reverend Collins Denny, D. D., as Professors in Vanderbilt University.

We recommend the appointment of Reverend H. P. Hamill as Conference Secretary of Education.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

The Sunday School Board respectfully submits the following report:

SUNDAY SCHOOL LITERATURE.

We are glad to be able to recommend cordially our Sunday School Literature, which is maintained at its former high standard, and we note with gratification that the combined circulation of our Sunday School periodicals for last year reached 1,151,300 copies, which is a gain of 25.400 over the previous year. Surely our own schools everywhere can fine no reasonable excuse for using any other literature than our own.

BIBLE TEACHERS' STUDY CIRCLE.

We wish to call especial attention to the course of study provided by the Sunday School Editor and his assistants for Sunday School teachers and Bible students. We are convinced that this is what all Sunday School workers have long needed, and we are pleased to note that our own Church is a pioneer in this field. We earnestly recommend and urge all our pastors and superintendents to organize Study Circles in every school, and hope that the course of study provided for such circles will be secured and studied by every teacher. Over 6,000 sets of the first year's course have been sold, indicating an interest in and appreciation of the opportunity thus offered for increasing the efficiency of the teaching corps Mr. Rush Robinson, agent of the Southern Methodist Book Depository, 646 Equitable Building, Baltimore. Md., will furnish the three books of the course, post paid, for one dollar.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

A very interesting and profitable Sunday School Convention was held at Lexington, Virginia, last summer. Those who attended were not only interested, but instructed and helped. We regret that the attendance on these conventions is not larger, and urgently request the preachers to see that their schools are represented as far as possible. The Convention this year will be held in Luray, Virginia, in July. Hon M. L. Walton has been elected president, and Mr. W. W. Millan secretary of the Convention, who, with Rev. F. J. Prettyman, are appointed an Executive Committee to make all necessary arrangements. We confidently announce that in programme and speakers this Convention will be equal, if not superior, to those of recent years.

CHILDREN'S DAY.

Sample copies of Children's Day Programme for this year will shortly be mailed to each pastor and superintendent in the Conference, and the Board will continue to furnish the programmes free to our schools that will observe the day as the Discipline prescribes. We are glad to say that the collections for the past year show a substantial increase over the previous year. We sincerely hope that the day is not far distant when the amounts raised as shown in the statistical tables and the receipts of our treasury will tally; but we know of nothing we can say that we have not already said to induce individual pastors to report only such amounts as are paid to us.

SUNDAY SCHOOL ANNIVERSARY.

We recommend that Thursday night of the Conference week be set apart for the holding of a Sunday School anniversary, at which the very important work of the Sunday Schools may receive proper attention.

STATISTICS.

We regret to report that owing to the delay on the part of a few of the preachers in reporting to the statistical table, the Conference Sunday School statistics cannot be embodied in this report.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

The cause of Church Extension holds no second place in those great enterprises of the Church which claim the interest and support of our people. If the missionary movement be regarded as of prime importance, it finds its handmaid in this more modern, but not less aggressive and evangelizing agency. The two are indeed inseparable. The missionary, whether at home or abroad, can only successfully prosecute his work by having a home-shelter for himself and family, and a place of public assembly for those to whom he preaches the Word. Previous to the organization of the Church Extension movement the Mission Board partially supplied this need in the foreign field, but did nothing for the large destitute area The grand results recently accomplished on our Western frontier in multiplying houses of worship, to say nothing of what has been done in older, but in many instances not less needy districts, demonstrates both the urgent and vast utility of this work. And now that the Church Extension Boards are extending their beneficent work into the foreign field, the importance of this movement is greatly enhanced. We wish that our people could come into a full recognition of its value and its high claim upon their generous consideration and support.

The supplemental contribution by the Conference to our receipts puts us slightly in advance of last year. The applications for aid exceed as usual the amount on hand for distribution. This is a common experience of most of the Conference Boards, as it is of the Parent Board. While it has its encouraging indication in the evident growth of Churchbuilding enterprise among us, it is greatly to be regretted that each year finds us unprepared to meet fully the demands upon us. A little more earnest effort on the part of our preachers in collecting the assessments for this fund would greatly aid us in accomplishing this most desirable end.

We have made appropriations to eleven churches, representing all the districts in the Conference. We refer to the Treasurer's report for a tabulated statement of these appropriations.

Up to this date our Conference Board has aided 149 churches with donations to the amount of \$20,110. The Parent Board has aided 27 churches in our Conference to the extent of \$13,100 by donations, and \$23,050 by loans, making a total of \$33,210 by donations, and \$23,050 by loans.

This showing means the erection of a number of houses of worship, many of which could not have been built but for the aid thus extended to them, beside the assistance rendered in the completion of others and the removal of long-standing encumbrances.

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We append the report of the Corresponding Secretary of the Home Mission Society of our Conference, and also of the Treasurer, and again commend that important branch of our work to the hearty support of our people.

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

The past year's statistics are as follows: Number of chapters, 210: League members, 9,791, a gain of 547.

The Epworth League Board has carefully considered, in connection with our General Secretary, Rev. H. M. Dubose, D. D., the interests of the League within our Conference territory, and recommend the following:

1. That our pastors give special attention to the fact that in the Baltimore Conference about 10,000 of our choice young people have offered themselves to the church in an organization whose model our General Conference has suggested, and in a form perfectly adjusted to our work.

2. That while we do not recommend the ntilizing of our League forces in the direction of any one connectional interest, we do most heartily urge our pastors to use their organized young people in the direction the individual pastor may find himself most in need of help, whether this be to assist him in raising in full his missionary assessments or the other benevolent collections. In any event, let the chief aim be the education and development of the young people, so that the church of the near future may be dominated by those who give and serve intelligently.

3. That we continue to urge our pastors to organize and cultivate junior chapters, believing that such eventuate in superior senior chapters; besides. the Junior League fills an important place in the training of our very

4. We recommend that district organizations be continued, and that presiding elders give special attention to these as to the time they are held, and the programmes used.

5. Finally, we recommend the Epworth Era, our League organ, and we would suggest to our General Conference delegation that the League, as an organization, be left much as it is, save that some adequate provision be made which will place this important interest of our church upon a selfsupporting basis.

MEMOIRS.

Rev. Francis A. Mercer.

Rev. Francis A. Mercer was born on a farm near Hyattstown, Montgomery county, Maryland, on Christmas day, 1829; and died at his home, 426 North Stricker street, Baltimore, Wednesday, January 15, 1902, in the seventy-third year of his age.

His last illness was of short duration, but very painful. He was taken sick January 12th, and grew worse rapidly, suffering intensely until his release. After one of his paroxysms of pain on Tuesday afternoon, he said to one by his bedside: "The body is suffering, but the soul is all right; I am ready." He soon became unconscious, and the next day, falling into his last, sweet sleep, he passed peacefully away.

For years he suffered from partial paralysis, which, together with other complications, finally brought about his decease.

The funeral services were conducted at the home by his pastor, Rev. H. M. Canter, assisted by Rev. C. L. Damaron. The pall bearers were ministers of the Conference. His body rests in Mt. Olivet Cemetery.

Brother Mercer was converted at a camp-meeting near his home in 1853, when in his twenty-fourth year, and he united with the Methodist Episcopal Church at Clarksburg, under the ministry of Rev. Jeremiah Cullum.

He had received his education at private schools at Clarksburg and Hyattstown, taught by Prof. McClanahan, and was preparing to study medicine when he yielded to the heavenly message and sought the divine favor. This resulted in a change of all his life-plans; he felt called of God to the ministry of his gospel, and he at once set about preparing for the work, studying under his pastor one year.

He was received into the Baltimore Conference on trial at the session in 1855, and appointed to Cumberland Circuit (in Pennsylvania) as junior preacher with Rev. John Lloyd and Rev. John A. Collins, his Presiding Elder.

He was ordained deacon March 8, 1857, by Bishop Levi Scott, at old Light Street Church, Baltimore, and was ordained Elder by Bishop Osman C. Baker at Lewisburg (now West) Virginia, March 6, 1859.

During his active ministry he served the following charges: In 1855 he was associated with John Lloyd, on Cumberland Circuit; in 1856 with Job W. Lambeth, on St. Mary's Circuit; 1857 on Charles Circuit, with B. H. Smith; 1858 with J. N. Davis, on Rockingham; 1859. East Rockingham, with R. Smith; Winchester, with W. S. Baird, in 1860, and with J. H. Waugh, on Hillsboro Circuit, in 1861.

During the period of the Civil War, from 1861 to 1865, there is no account of his work in the official Conference records. It appears, however, that he taught school in the year 1862. In an unofficial list of charges served, "Dorchester" appears, which is not found in the official list, and it is inferred that he wrought during those troublous time in the field named, now in the bounds of the Virginia Conference.

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In 1866 he appears as preacher in charge of Talbot Circuit; in 1867, of Frederick; '68, East Harford; '69, Calvert; '70-2, South River; '73-4, Bladensburg; '75, Christiansburg; '76, Kent; '77, Prince George; '78, Prince William; '79-80, Cedarville; '81-3, Berkley; '84, Brucetown; '85, New Market.

From 1886 till 1890 he held a supernumerary relation, and in 1891 he was made effective and appointed with J. J. Engle to Dranesville Circuit. In 1891 he was superannuated, and remained in that relation until his death.

Brother Mercer was married to Miss Georgia Smith, of Winchester, Virginia, June 16, 1862. To them were born two children, one of whom preceded him to the "better country." He leaves a widow and one child.

One who knew him well says: "I was his Presiding Elder on two districts, and appreciated his good qualities. Brother Mercer had fine ability as a preacher; was fearless in denouncing the vices of the times, and he was admired and loved by those who knew him well." And his pastor writes: "Unable to do any active service, he was always present at his place in the church. Day and night, winter and summer, often through storms which kept those who were strong at home, Brother Mercer was to be found in the sanctuary. He did what he could up to the very last. He was faithful until death."

"The pains of death are past,
Labor and sorrow cease;
And life's long warfare closed at last,
His soul is found in peace.
Soldier of Christ, well done!
Praise be thy new employ;
And while eternal ages runs,
Rest in thy Saviour's joy."

Rev. Henry Hoffman Kennedy.

The mortuary record of our Conference contains no sadder chapter than that which notes the removal from our midst, and from his earthly life and labors, of the beloved and lamented subject of this memoir. In the early part of the Conference year, by a sudden and appalling accident, his wife was instantly killed, and such injuries inflicted upon his own person as terminated fatally a day or two afterwards. It was one of those mysterious events, the explanation of which must be referred to the fuller disclosures of the great and final day. We have the Master's assurance that "what we know not now we shall know hereafter." Our brother died with the harness on, while in the regular discharge of his ministerial duties. The manner of his death should profoundly impress us with a sense of life's awful uncertainty and imminent peril, and the importance of being always ready for the summons of our Lord.

Rev. Henry Hoffman Kennedy, second son and fourth child of William W. and Catherine E. Kennedy, was born in Baltimore, Md., March 27, 1847, and was educated in the private schools of that city.

In 1867 he served as a supply on the Rockville Circuit under Rev. J. E. Armstrong as preacher in charge. In 1868 he was admitted into the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Churth, South, and appointed as junior preacher on Rockville Circuit, Rev. J. E. Armstrong continuing in charge.

In 1869 he was appointed junior preacher to Trinity Church, Baltimore. In 1870 he was assigned to Staunton Station as preacher in charge, where he remained three years. In 1873 he was placed in charge of the Loudoun Circuit. In 1875 he was appointed to Calvary, Baltimore; in 1877 to Leesburg, Va., and in 1880 to Winchester, Va.

In 1881, on account of the state of his health, he was transferred to the Florida Conference, where he remained till 1888, being successively stationed in Tallahassee and Jacksonville. In 1888 he returned to the

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Baltimore Conference and was appointed to Martinsburg; in 1890 to Arlington; in 1894 to Salem; in 1897 to Woodstock, and in 1899 to Charles Town.

On Sunday afternoon, May 19th, of this Conference year, while returning with Mrs. Kennedy from Bethany, a rural appointment connected with Charles Town Station, crossing the tracks of the B. & O Railroad, near Shenandoah Junction, the vehicle in which they rode was struck by a fast train, the horse was instantly killed, the buggy crushed, and Brother Kennedy and his wife hurled violently to a considerable distance. She was killed outright, and he, stunned and mangled, was borne to his home in Charles Town, where he lingered in unconsciousness till the following Tuesday, and expired.

Thus passed away one of our most faithful, zealous and consecrated ministers. The call hence was a sudden one, but he was fully prepared to obey it.

His loins were girt about, and his lamp trimmed and burning, and he in the attitude of those servants who watch and wait for their Lord's coming. Death was to him an instantaneous transition from the fields of toil on earth to the rest and reward of heaven.

The double funeral of himself and wife was held in the Methodist Church in Charles Town on the day succeeding his death. The services were conducted by Rev. B. W. Bond, D. D., assisted by Rev. H. P. Hamill. Presiding Elder of the district, B. F. Ball and Rev. Dr. Hopkins, of the Presbyterian Church. A large number of ministers were present. The large concourse present and the many evidences of deep-felt emotion showed the high esteem in which he was held, not only by the people of his charge, but by the entire community. Indeed, a pall of gloom rested on the whole town, and all classes spoke of him with the tenderest regard.

Nor was this surprising. He was of that genial, generous, warm-hearted nature, so bright, cheerful and sunshiny in his disposition; so kind and cordial in his intercourse with others, as to attract and attach to him all with whom he came in contact. At the same time his purity of life and conscientious fidelity to the duties of his sacred office challenged the confidence and respect of every observer. No man ever devoted himself to the work of the ministry with more ardent zeal and singleness of purpose.

The ministry was indeed his "loved employ," and death, though it came without warning, found him in the midst of his work, and heralded his immediate entrance into "the joy of his Lord."

Brother Kennedy was twice married: first to Miss Virginia Wadlow, of Freedom, Carroll County, Maryland, and the second time to Mrs. Sadie Collins, widow of the late Mr. Bond Collins, and daughter of the late Capt. Jones. Five children, one son and four daughters, by his first wife, survive him.

The sympathies of the church go out to them in their double bereavement. May the gospel of the grace of God, which their father so delighted to proclaim, be their solace and their stay in this sore trial.

Rev. Jacob Markwood Eavey.

Rev. Jacob Markwood Eavey was born in Sangersville, Augusta county, Va., September 26, 1860, and died at the parsonage in Crab Bottom, Highland county, Va., August 16, 1901.

The deceased was happily converted to God at the age of fifteen years and joined the United Brethren Church. Feeling that he was in more perfect agreement with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, he later united therewith and was licensed to preach February 23, 1889, under the Presiding Eldership of Rev. J. H. Waugh, D. D. He was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference at its following session and appointed to

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Dranesville (now Sterling) Circuit as junior preacher, Rev. W. P. C. Coe in charge. After one year of service on this charge he was sent to Hot Springs, 1890-'91; Millboro and Shiloh, 1891-'95; Gilletts, 1895-'97; Green Bank, 1897-'99; Alvon, 1899-'01; Crab Bottom, 1901, which charge he served faithfully until July 21 of the same year, when he was attacked with typhoid fever. His illness was not thought to be severe, but on August 11 his condition developed for the worse and death came to him about noon, August 16. Brother Eavey served twelve years in the itinerancy. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Hendrix in 1891, and Elder by Bishop Granbery in 1894.

Brother Eavey was faithful in the gospel ministry. He possessed a clear religious experience and was firm in his convictions. He cultivated a studious habit, and conscientiously performed his work. Of a modest and retiring temperament, he may have appeared to lack geniality; but he was known to have a spirit of gentleness. He was united in marriage to Miss Mattie C. Clark, of Bath Alum, Va., October 4, 1892, which union happily continued until his death. Our tenderest sympathies are with the widow and the five fatherless children who survive him

His earthly career ended in peace. His farewell message was: "Tell my brethren of the Baltimore Conference to meet me in heaven." The language of the 23d Psalm was upon his lips with his expiring breath—a happy realization of the desire expressed in the Wesleyan hymn:

"Happy if with my latest breath, I may but gasp his name."

The funeral services were held in the parsonage at Crab Bottom, by Rev. J. W. McNeil, assisted by Rev. J. H. Schooley and Rev. H. A. Murrill; also Rev. John Ruff, of the Presbyterian Church, and Rev. Mr. Brill, of the United Brethren Church.

His remains were laid to rest in the Crab Bottom cemetery, in the quiet shadow of the hills that compass his last earthly home, awaiting the day that will join anew the sundered ties of earth and usher us all into the presence of Him who will have to say to the faithful servant: "Well done, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

Rev. Samuel M. Bowman.

Scarcely had the Conference adjourned one year ago at Roanoke and the preachers gone to their several appointments, when the startling announcement was made that Samuel M. Bowman had fallen suddenly at his post of duty. It was known to many of us that for two years he had not enjoyed robust health, but such a sudden collapse of a man in the prime of life was wholly unexpected,

Brother Bowman was a native of Virginia, and came of good old Methodist stock. He was born near Mt. Clifton in Shenandoah county, in 1851. Under the ministry of Rev. Thos. Briley he was converted early in life. and immediately united with the Methodist Church. Much of his early life was devoted to teaching in the public schools of his native State, and in this responsible calling he proved himself a decided success. During this time, however, he was deeply interested in the church, and contributed liberally of his time, talent and means to advance her interests. In 1874. at the age of 23, he was united in marriage to Miss Alsie Jordan, a resident of his own community. He had early premonitions of a call to the ministry, but seemed reluctant to give up his vocation as a teacher. His final decision was hastened by the accidental killing of his only child, a bright boy of eight summers. He then assured his wife that he had fully made up his mind, regardless of consequences, to devote the remainder of his life to the active service of God. He was licensed to preach in January, 1888, by Rev. J. H. Waugh, Presiding Elder of the Rockingham District. During his local ministry he rendered much assistance to Rev. R. S. Cun-

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ningham, at that time in charge of Mt. Jackson Circuit, filling appointments almost every Sunday. In March, 1889, when this Conference met in Alexandria, Va, he was admitted on trial and appointed to the James River Circuit. This was by no means a desirable charge, but he went to his work with the true spirit of a Methodist itinerant, and for four years did efficient and valuable service. He was next appointed to the Botetourt Circuit, in the same district, where he labored for three years with marked acceptability and success. While on that charge he built a substantial church at Glen Wilton, this giving Methodism a secure foothold in that town. Scarcely, however, had he fluished it when the New Bethel church, only two miles distant, was entirely destroyed by fire. Unfortunately the church was not insured, so that the task of rebuilding was a severe strain upon the congregation. Brother Bowman, however, determined that no time should be lost. With the earnest co-operation of the membership he set to work with his usual energy, and in due time had the satisfaction of seeing a new and modern church erected in the place of the old.

He was next appointed to the New Castle Circuit, but served that c sarge only one year. In March, 1897, he was appointed to Brunswick, Md, a new and growing charge. Here he labored most earnestly and faithfully for four years. His first important enterprise was to finish the church which had been commenced by his predecessor, Rev. A. P. Boude. As soon as this object had been accomplished, he went resolutely to work, and in

due time succeeded in building an excellent parsonage.

At the Conference one year ago he was appointed to the Parnassus Circuit. Although not in his usual health he went promptly to his new charge with high hopes for the future. On Sunday morning, April 21, he began his work by preaching with more than his usual force and freedom to his congregation at Mt. Sidney. In the afternoon of that day he was taken suddenly ill at the home of one of his members. Medical assistance was promptly summoned, but nothing could be done to stay the progress of the disease. He evidently suffered from a complication of disorders. That night about ten o'clock, after severe suffering, he quietly breathed his last, assuring his wife that all was well.

Brother Bowman had just reached the mature age of 50 years. He was a sound, sensible and thoroughly evangelical preacher. He preached for revivals and witnessed the conversion of many souls. Some of his meetings were occasions of great spiritual power. In this work he took delight, and by uniting with it faithful pastoral work he never failed to build up his charge and to leave the impress of his own piety and zeal upon those whom he served. All his life he was studious in his habits. During the twelve years of his membership in the Conference his leisure time was largely devoted to reading. Of Methodist literature he was particularly fond. This gave vigor and variety to his preaching so that his people never failed to hear him with pleasure and profit.

Two days after his death his remains were taken to Mt. Jackson, Va., nearthe home of his boyhood, and buried with impressive services in the cemetery of Grace German Reformed Church, about two miles from that

We have carefully considered the report submitted to the Conference by the agents of the Publishing House at Nashville. Tennessee, and are glad to note the increase in business and larger usefulness of this branch of our Cnurch work. We regret, however, that the financial statement does not show greater returns upon the capital invested, and that existing conditions do not justify an appropriation to the support of those whose claims upon us are of the highest consideration. We most heartly commend The Christian Advocate, The Methodist Review, The Review of Missions, The Epworth Era, The Woman's Missionary Advocate, Our Homes, Sunday School Visitor, and the new illustrated missionary monthly, Go Forward, published at the low price of twenty-five cents a year We earnestly recommend a larger circulation of all these periodicals throughout our bounds. Our ministers and people are respectfully urged to patronize our own Publishing House, and are requested to extend their patronage through our Conference agent, Mr. Rush Robinson, 646 Equitable Building, Baltimore, Md., whenever possible to do so.

We recognize the superior quality of our Sunday-school literature, and recommend the exclusive use of the Magazine, Senior Quarterly, Intermediate Quarterly and other periodicals in all our schools. We do not believe that any other Sunday-school literature should be allowed to supplant our own. We believe, however, that the Senior and Intermediate Quarterlies are not fully adapted to the conditions and needs of our work. We think also that the program for Children's Day might be made more interesting and attractive. Hence we trust that such improvements will be introduced by those who prepare these periodicals as to gain for them

universal favor and use in our Sunday-schools.

We are convinced that reading is a sure means of promoting intelligence and culture of our people. We believe in excluding objectionable literature from their homes by supplying them with reading of the best quality. Hence we recommend to our people the books issued by our own Publishing House, and urge our preachers, in their pastoral visits, to call the attention of their members to the many entertaining and profitable works that may be obtained at a very reasonable price. We especially feel that every precaution should be taken to guard our young people against the trashy and demoralizing literature that floods our land.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

With reference to the paper submitted to our Conference by temperance workers in Maryland, we desire to express our sympathy in their efforts to secure such legislation as may be proper for the suppression of the liquor traffic in their State. No greater evil confronts the American people, nor threatens our Christian civilization, than the accursed liquor traffic.

The constant and concentrated effort of all our people should be directed against this defiant and ever increasing vice.

We appreciate the importance and value of the Anti-Saloon Leagues working within the bounds of our Conference, and extend our earnest support and hearty co-operation with them and all other wise and proper movements for the suppression of the liquor traffic.

Resolved, 1st. That we urge upon our citizens the importance of having the existing laws against this great evil enforced.

2d. That as ministers and laymen, we will exercise greater zeal in directing the minds of our people to the consideration of the merits and practice of total abstinence.

3d. That we will endeavor to follow more closely the requirements of the Discipline in regard to the manufacture, sale and use of intoxicating liquors in every form.

4th. That we further recommend that in all our Epworth Leagues, Sunday Schools and other organizations, the subject of temperance be frequently urged upon our young people for their earnest consideration.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

Your committee submits the following: In consideration of the reports of the collection for the Bible cause, they show a much smaller amount than might be expected of a Conference the size of ours. It becomes necessary to devise means to bring this subject to the attention of our con-

gregations and secure their hearty co-operation in this work.

The American Bible Society commends itself to our aid and sympathy by its noble work. It provides Bibles for all evangelical missionaries going from this country for free distribution in foreign fields, as well as the destitute of our own land. It sends colporteurs into districts and among people that are without church privileges. It offers the Bible at a very low price to any one that will buy it, and gives it to those who can not pay. It supplies public institutions, hospitals, asylums, mission schools, vessels, railroads and immigrants with Bibles.

Demands from all these sources are constant and pressing, but they are supplied only as means are furnished. For this it must depend on the voluntary contributions by the Church.

The collections have not been as liberal as they might have been, considering the importance of the work.

We believe that when we are brought to see and realize the importance of this collection to the extent it deserves the result will be gratifying.

The collections have improved this Conference year. The amount collected for the Bible cause is about \$453, while the Treasurer's report of last year shows that there was collected for the Bible cause only \$391, an increase of \$63 over last year.

The Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia Bible societies operating within the bounds of our Conference are auxiliaries to the American Bible Society, to whom its surplus funds are paid after supplying the wants of the respective States.

The call is for yet an increase of funds that this work may be the more successfully carried forward. We recommend that the Conference again appoint a special time, not later than the third Sunday in September, or as near thereto as possible, when this claim may be presented and collections taken.

1. Randolph-Macon in all its branches belongs jointly to the Virginia and Baltimore Conferences of the M. E. Church, South. The aggregate value of these properties is now \$818,550. In 1882 it was \$81,785. Number of students in last catalogue, 683. The number ought to be 1000.

2. The college is essential to our work and to our standing as a Church. It educates our ministers free of tuition and provides the very best educational facilities for our people under wholesome religious influences. It is a power for our Church and for the cause of Christ, and should be heartily sustained by our people.

3. The Baltimore Conference has equal rights to all the advantages of the five institutions, and is represented on the Board of Trustees in proportion to membership, furnishing one-third of that body. It proposes to pay one-third of the expenses for maintaining and developing the work.

4. The Virginia Conference assesses annually \$3,500 and pays about \$2,700; the Baltimore Conference assesses \$2,000 and pays about \$1,200.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

The Baltimore Conference has proposed ecclesiastical union with the M. E. Church, South, and the proposal has been frankly accepted, so far as it could be without the action of the General Conference of that great Methodist body. A Bishop of the M. E. Church, South, has presided over our Conference, and from him, as one of our acknowledged Superintendents, we have cheerfully taken our appointments.

An act so important would require long and detailed explanation to others, it needs little to you. You will see in it the logical conclusion of enforced circumstances, the consistent conduct of honest men, and the spiritual fruit of Christ's religion. To you this change of relation will appear as it is, not the beginning, but the ending of the new and unknown way by which God has been pleased to lead us away from the domination of politico-ecclesiastical confederations to the liberty of church fellowship, the love of the brethren and the consciences of those to whom He

would make us messengers of salvation.

To the public, time would fail to give the information which they should have. But many will inquire of you, and through you we will put one argument to that common sense which rarely fails, in due time, to ascertain and support the good and the true. We will ask men who know men and the universal motives of human action to try us by the infallible tests by which honor and right are commonly and certainly judged. The single argument for our sincerity is that all the world could give—much that it has given us—solicited to a conduct opposite to that which we have chosen. By submitting to the Northern Methodist authorities we would have entered into as much rest as can be enjoyed by the Demases who forsake Jesus for the present world. Our churches would not only be secured to us, but exuberant bounty would repair them from the injuries of war and fill them with everything necessary to worship—except the presence of the Lord. Our parsonages, from which soldiers, led on by Methodist preachers, are extruding our wives and our little ones, would be made sure to us. Missionary money, ostensibly appropriated for the christianization of the South, would be the gracious reward of our conversion, and prostration before a Northern Bishop would be accepted as full compensation for imputed hostility to the nation; for, in the long absence and uncertain return of charity, it is loyalty to a Methodist Church that covers a multitude of sins. By union with the Northern Church we would save everything but our honor—by going to the South we save nothing else.

A band of ministers, who for four years have dwelt in the very vortex of a great war, have come together for the first time. They bring a common contribution of sorrowful memories and alarming facts. All are poor; many so destitute that they have no means to reach their appointed fields of labor except on foot. In other denominations, old kindness has survived the shock of war. However violent have been the political attitudes of their ecclesiastical bodies, charity did not die; and, from that greatest of the virtues, their suffering brethren in the South are receiving cheerful and important aid. We, too, look across the blood-stained border to a denomination, the largest, the wealthiest, the most liberal in gifts. Their coffers are filled with millions. They are, consciously and actively, a great political power, to whose demands it is perilous for authority to demur. Of all other people, we had most to expect from those who bear a common name, teach a common creed and have formerly constituted

with us one christian family. In the sympathies of natural kindred it has become an adage that "blood is thicker than water;" and from men of the world we expect that the ties of love shall, in the time of trouble, prove stronger than the strife of opinion, that the children of God would exhibit at least equal charity, but there was no charity for us who followed not them. On the contrary, our former brethren are our bitter and unpitying enemies. They, indeed, offer us their pottage, but for it they will have our birth-right. Their love or hate, their benefience or hostility, are determined by our reception or rejection of their ecclesiastical supremacy.

This demand for our subjection is not based upon any spiritual consideration. They are content that we shall remain here and preach as we now preach, and live as we now live, and guide as we now guide. It is not a conversion of mind or heart that they require but a cession of territory. It is not as a part of Christ's Kingdom that they approach us, but as the M. E. Church in the United States. Because we will not determine our relations simply upon consideration of their desires, they have arrayed themselves, and, as far as possible, the government and nation against us for a war, avowedly, of extermination. They take our churches by force and instal their ministerial agents by files of soldiers. They imperiously order our families from their homes, and bring strangers to occupy them. They extrude congregations and force them to comfortless rooms and to the woods and fields. Money, got from well meaning piety by fervid our people is used to drive them away from the gospel and to gain only barren conquest of buildings at the expense of a demoralized ministry a an ignominious name. Only, of all ministers in the South, we find c selves without sympathy from our ecclesiastical kindred.

On the other hand, the Church South has no material benefit to give They are, as we are, very poor. A partnership with them is a communi of distress, a fellowship of suffering. Now, we ask men to explain our conduct upon any other principles than those whose inspiration comes from the things that are invisible and eternal. The reply, of coure, will be that political sympathies determined us, but the accusation is false. The M. E. Church South is, in this respect, a noble monument of christian consistency. Neither her General Conference, nor her Annual Conferences, nor her Bishops have presumed in the name of God to cheer on resistance to the Federal Union. Not one word of that Church has committed her as a party to a merely secular strife. It was her aim to hold up the Cross in the midst of the war of human passions; to keep a living coal on the altar of God amidst the very floods of revolutionary deluge, and to exalt the crown of Christ the higher, as popular idols were lifted up. This we also, in our lot, ever assayed to do.

We believe that Christ's kingdom is not of this world. Evil, and only evil, has ever come from every ecclesiastical departure from this fundamental truth. We believe that from this truth, nevertheless, the Northern Church has gone away—the Southern Church has not. We believe that one is on the way to secularization, the other to spirituality and usefulness.

We believe that one is expecting a mixed success from money and material force; the other comes out of the wilderness leaning only on Christ, and her eye is single. Men whose work is to know only Jesus, to preach only Jesus, to count all things but loss for his name, cannot hesitate which of the two proferred associations to accept. We have made our choice with a unanimity which of itself is a demonstration of its propriety; and now we come to you. Will you receive us, as before, in your confidence and love? We are all coming. Scarcely a man has withdrawn to secular employment, a fact as surprising to us as to you. We are coming to take our wonted places as your preachers and pastors. Perhaps, when you receive us, you must go away from the houses of God you have built, from the graveyards you have enclosed around your fondly remembered

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You must give us as you can of the little oil and few cakes that you Temporarily you will be poorer for your love of us. In all worldly respects you will find us anything but profitable. But we know you, and God knows both you and us. We solemnly and fearlessly appeal our cause to Him. With regard to temporal things, He shall think for us. We, by His help, will think only of things that minister to salvation. "We trust not," brethren, "in ourselves, but in God, which raiseth the dead, in whom we trust that He will yet deliver us, ye also helping together by prayer for us. For our rejoicing is this, the testimony of our conscience, that in simplicity and godly sincerity, not with fleshly wisdom but by the Grace of God, we have had our conversation in the word, and more abundantly to you-ward. For we write none other things unto you than what ye read or ye have acknowledged us in part that we are your rejoicing, even as ye also are ours in the day of the Lord Jesus, and in this confidence we are minded to come unto you." That you will receive us we know. That God will bless us we believe. That we shall be instruments in His hands to spread scriptural holiness over these lands is our only desire and our cheering anticipation. "And having this confidence," brethren, "we know that we shall abide and continue with you all for your furtherance and joy of faith, that your rejoicing may be more abundant in Jesus Christ for us by our coming to you again. Only let your conversation be as it becometh the Gospel of Christ, that whether we come and see you, or else be absent, we may hear of your affairs, that ye stand fast in one spirit, with one mind striving together for the faith of the Gospel, and in nothing terrified by your adversaries, which is to them an evident token of perdition, but to you of salvation, and that of God. For unto you it is given in the behalf of Christ, not only to believe on Him, but also to suffer for his sake; having the same conflict which ye saw in us and now hear to be in us."

"Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God, that He may exalt you in due time, casting all your care upon Him, for He careth for you. But the God of all grace, who hath called us unto His eternal glory by Christ Jesus, after that ye have suffered awhile, make you perfect, establish, strengthen, settle you. To Him be glory and dominion forever

and ever Amen.".

Finally, brethren we exhort "you to study to be quiet, and to do your own business," abstaining from all controversy and strife, believing that "in quietness and confidence shall be your strength." Maintain a steadfast adherence to the economy and usages of the church, as transmitted to us by our fathers and embodied in our book of discipline.

Procure good and useful books for the instruction of yourselves and your families. Train your children carefully by means of Sabbath schools and otherwise, that in due time they may become pillars in the temple of our God. Prayerfully study the Holy Scriptures and devoutly attend upon the ministry of the Word. Withal make it a matter of conscience to supply the wants of those preachers who are appointed to labor in your midst. We be brethren. Let the connectional principle be maintained. Thereby shall we mutually aid one another and promote the interests of our common Christianity.

"Now the God of peace that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, that great Shephard of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work, to do his will, working in you that which is well pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen."

By order of the Conference the following resolution adopted at the Session of 1866 is reprinted in the Minutes of 1902.

Requesting an Equitable Division of the Funds of the Preacher's Aid Society of the Baltimore Annual Conference.

Whereas. The "Preachers Aid Society" of the Baltimore Annual Conference, is the result of the joint labors and liberality of the preachers and people of the whole Conference up to the session of said body in 1861; and

Whereas, The brethren, understood to be the "minority" at the above-mentioned session, and who have since formed themselves into a separate Conference in the M. E. Church, are entitled to an equitable pro rata share of the funds of said society; and inasmuch as this Conference needs pecuniary assistance in the prosecution of its mission as an itinerant ministry; therefore,

Resolved by this Conference, That Samuel Regester and E. R. Veitch be and they are hereby constituted a Board of Commissioners, and are authorized to effect an early, and if possible, a peaceable division of such funds or other Conference property as may exist.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Conference be and he is hereby instructed to furnish a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolutions to said Commissioners.

At a subsequent session, Samuel Regester, surviving commissioner, reported that the brethren who constituted the "minority" at the session of 1861, and had since formed themselves into a separate Conference in the M. E. Church, had taken possession of all the funds of the "Preacher's Aid Society" and refused to divide the same with the preachers of this Conference (that is, with the preachers who constituted the majority in 1861) or to consider any proposition for a division of said funds, but referred us to the civil courts.
