### REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Sixty-six charges receive aid from the Board of Missions this year.

These charges report 14,923 members, 1,042 additions, 232 Sunday-schools, 1,700 officers and teachers, 12,515 scholars, 223 church buildings, valued at \$261,140.

They have paid Presiding Elders \$2,655, pastors \$24,296, Foreign Missions \$1,817, Domestic Missions \$1,591.

The Board directed that the Conference Secretary shall communicate with all appointments which have not paid their missionary assessments in full, or where there are no missionary societies in Sunday-schools, and urge that efforts be made to bring up the assessments in full, and to organize all the Sunday-schools for missionary work.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

To the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Your Board reports as follows:

### Educational Campaign.

Our General Board of Education is planning a campaign on Christian Education this year, which will be presented through the Presiding Elders to the District Conferences. We desire to give our approval to the same and urge our preachers to co-operate in this work.

### School of Correspondence.

We recommend that the Conference Secretary of Education be requested to do all he can to induce all the undergraduates to enroll themselves in the School of Correspondence.

### The Randolph-Macon System of Schools and Colleges.

The work of the Randolph-Macon system of schools and colleges is making noticeable progress. The college at Ashland has more students than last year, its attendance this year being one hundred and twenty-nine, and its finances are in better condition, owing to the increased assessment, than for the last five years.

The Woman's College has not been able to accommodate the young women who have desired to take advantage of the courses there offered. The trus tees have just ordered the erection of another dormitory which will furnish rooms for one hundred students.

The Academy at Front Royal reports eighty-nine pupils. It is encouraging for the future prospects of the school that so many of the students are younger than usual, and are therefore likely to continue at the Academy for several years. Hitherto the students have stayed on an average less than one and a fourth years. Under such circumstances it has been impossible to keep the school filled. Parents are beginning to find out that it is better to send their children to Front Royal for their preparation for college rather than to cheaper schools. The history of such academies as ours shows that the best work is done with boys who come to the school when they are thirteen or fourteen years old. The awakening of interest in the cause of education throughout the South, promises well for an increase in patronage in the Academy. But more than an increase in patronage is sure to come to us from this movement. For whenever a people have become aroused on the subject, large gifts for educational purposes have always followed. And in order to do the work that Randolph-Macon College and the Academy have to do, they must have large endowments. The College should have at least one additional professorship, and more modern buildings for dormitories. When our people of means learn the value of an endowed Conference Academy, Front Royal will receive the liberal gifts that it merits. We should keep before our people what is essential to make our Randolph-Macon system a success. We must have an endowed college with an endowed Academy where boys may be fitted for the College.

Orrocher's dustitute at athlaws.

Both ministers and laymen of our Church have been more active in their efforts to increase the patronage of our schools than ever before.

The amount of fourteen thousand dollars has been raised on the Branch proposition, which means a total for the College at Ashland of twenty-one thousand dollars.

Space has been granted in the Virginia building at the St. Louis Exposition for an interesting exhibit of our System.

### Southern Seminary.

This institution of learning, located at Buena Vista, Va., is an excellent school, highly endorsed by its patrons as a well conducted home permeated by religious influences and doing good educational work, and worthy of our patronage. Its property is valued at seventy-five thousand dollars. It has enrolled this year ninety students, coming from a number of lower Southern States, as well as the nearer ones, under ten instructors. Its course of study prepares for admission to Randolph-Macon Woman's College. We may heartily recommend it as a school where our daughters will be given careful attention and Christian education.

### Alleghany Collegiate Institute.

This school, purchased last year by the Lewisburg District, reports a year of successful work. Located at Alderson, West Virginia, in a section of our Conference that is large and prosperous, and developing rapidly in material wealth, its usefulness as a factor in the education of our boys and girls is worthy of our endorsement.

The buildings, valued at fifteen thousand dollars, are in good condition. Ninety-four students have been enrolled this session. It is controlled by a Board of Trustees appointed by the Lewisburg District Conference, with Prof. Edgar A. Rippey, M. A. as Principal. We heartily recommend this school to the patronage of our people.

### Board of Visitors.

We recommend that Visiting Committees be appointed to Southern Seminary, and to Alleghany Collegiate Institute and that they be requested to make their reports in writing to this Board.

### Appointments Recommended.

We recommend that the Conference request the Bishop to appoint Rev. J. A. Kern, D. D. and Rev. Collins Denny, D. D., Professors in the Vanderbilt University, Rev. L. S. Shires, Professor in Alleghany Collegiate Institute, J. H. Balthis, student at the Vanderbilt University, and William M. Compton and William P. Johnston, students at Randolph-Macon College.

We also recommend the re-appointment of Rev. H. P. Hamill, Conference Secretary and Treasurer of Education, and the continuance of the Committee on Twentieth Century Fund. Sunday School Convention uninterruptedly through a long series of years, though such meetings are now being very generally held. The Convention at Winchester, last July, marked a long stride forward. The attendance was far in excess of that of any former yeas, the enthusiasm was up to the highest pitch and the programme very helpful. There is no doubt that great good was done. This year's Convention will be held at Martinsburg, W. Va., in July. Due announcement will be made to the schools. The Board has appointed the same committee which had charge of last year's Convention to arrange for the one to be held this year, and confidently announces that the high standard set will be mainty al. ### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

It is with pleasure that we report a most satisfactory year in Sunday School work. The report of the Sunday School Editor, showing the magnificent increase of more than fifty thousand in Sunday School enrollment during the year, is inspiring. We believe that our Conference is keeping step with the advanced movement evident in the whole church.

### Better Work.

We are pleased to note that so far as we have been able to inform ourselves, there is a decided and growing sentiment to the effect that our Sunday Schools are entitled to the best thought and the most intelligent effort, from both clergy, and laity, that they are able to give them. This is a time of advanced and progressive ideas in Sunday School work and our people ought not to be satisfied with less than the best in plans, methods and literature. We congratulate our Sunday School workers and the authorities of our Publishing House upon the fact that the high character of the literature issued from that Institution is fully sustained. We urge all our Sunday Schools to use our own literature, because there is none better and because it is ours. Special attention is called to the Teachers' Magazine, which is a publication of a very high order, equalled by few in its field. This is not only our judgment, but the opinion of eminent Sunday School workers in other churches. No teacher should be without it; also to the Children's Visitor, than which there is no more pure, wholesome and carefully edited young people's publication issued today. It should be in every home where there are children or young people.

We commend their example to others, as a means of help to them, and possibly of supplying a satisfactory leader for the Circle.

### Sunday School Anniversary.

We have been assured by many preachers and other Sunday School workers that the Anniversary on Thursday night of Conference week has been interesting, helpful and inspiring. We recommend a continuance of the order of the Conference setting apart this night for the Anniversary exercises.

### Book Depository.

We recommend that our Sunday Schools patronize the Southern Methodist Book Depository at Staunton, Virginia. The Depository will carry a full stock of our publications, and will be prepared to promptly fill any order for Sunday School literature at the same prices charged on orders from the Publishing House direct.

### Children's Day.

We regret the tendency in many Churches to give the children little or no part in the service which they hold under the name of "Children's Day."

The General Conference has ordered that Children's Day be observed in all our Sunday Schools; and that the Secretaries of the General Sunday School Board and the Board of Education prepare "A suitable programme for Children's Day." The Conference Sunday School Board will furnish such a programme to all the schools of the Conference without charge. We urge all our schools to observe the law, and give this day to the little folks, thus making the occasion what it was designed to be, a day for the children.

### Children's Day Collection.

The Children's Day collection seems to be the only fund for which no special responsibility is felt and of which no exact account is rendered.

Other funds reported as having been collected are carefully accounted for to the Treasurers of the various Boards. A comparison of our Treasurer's statement of money received, with the amounts reported by the preachers as having been collected, will reveal some astonishing facts. The money is needed by the Board, and these collections should be administered with the same care as any other fund. It is the intention of this Board to hereafter call attention to these discrepancies, more in detail.

### Sunday School Convention.

We call attention to and earnestly commend the work being done in our Annual Sunday School Convention. This Conference is, we are informed, one of two in our entire connection which have maintained an Annual

Sunday School Convention uninterruptedly through a long series of years, though such meetings are now being very generally held. The Convention at Winehester, last July, marked a long stride forward. The attendance was far in excess of that of any former years, the enthusiasm was up to the highest pitch and the programme very helpful. There is no doubt that great good was done. This year's Convention will be held at Martinsburg, W. Va., in July. Due announcement will be made to the schools. The Board has appointed the same committee which had charge of last year's Convention to arrange for the one to be held this year, and confidently announces that the high standard set will be maintained. All Schools should be represented. We urge Pastors and Superintendents to take up the plan of providing for the expenses of at least one delegate to the Convention from each charge, or better still, from each School.

### Needy Schools.

Applications for aid to needy schools may be made to the Chairman, the Secretary or the Treasurer of the Board, the addresses of all whom will appear in the Conference Minutes and in the forthcoming Year Book.

### REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

The American Bible Society continues to commend itself to our aid and hearty support by its noble work. The work accomplished by it in preparing the way for the missionaries in foreign fields is of great importance to the church. It not only translates the Sacred Scriptures into foreign tongues, thus greatly facilitating the work of the missionary, but stands ready to supply Bibles to all at cost of manufacture, and to the needy, free.

This work is dependent upon the voluntary contributions of the church. Our church has always responded to this cause, but the demand at present is urgent. The work of the American Bible Society, either the printing of fewer Bibles or the recalling of some of its agents in foreign fields, must be retrenched, unless the church at large rallies to its support.

The Maryland, Virginia and the District of Columbia Bible Societies as auxiliaries of the American Bible Society carry on the work in their respective territories. Each Society uses the funds sent to it for its own territory, the surplus being sent to the American Bible Society in accordance with the agreement between these auxiliaries and the parent society.

We regret the recent fire disaster in Baltimore which swept away the Maryland Bible House and earnestly trust that the Maryland work will loyally support their auxiliary while the income of the same is curtailed.

The Virginia Bible Society reports great success in its work and stands ready to do its full duty to the State of Virginia in the distribution of the Scriptures.

An increase of nearly 14 per cent. in amount collected for this cause gives hope for yet larger development of this work.

We recommend that our preachers at least comply with the provision made in our Discipline for this important cause; that the collection be taken early in the Conference year and reported to the Treasurer of the Bible Board; also that we use the literature prepared by the Bible Societies and gratuitously furnished, and employ the methods suggested by them whenever practicable.

# REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S HOME MISSION SOCIETY OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE FOR THE YEAR 1903-1904.

To the Bishop and Members of the Baltimore

Annual Conference, M. E. Church, South:

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN: The great movement of Individual Christian effort for suffering humanity is taking a strong hold upon the hearts of our Home Mission Workers. Through organized effort we have found now avenues of service, ways to reach forth a helping hand, and grasp firmly the trembling ones outstretched for support.

We report increase in *local* work, showing that as our horizon enlarges, clearer views of the home needs appear. If we had the hearty co-operation of ALL our pastors, we could report this year, instead of only seven new auxiliaries, many times seven—then would preachers and members, prisoners, strangers, the sick and sorrowing, orphaned and desolate, lift up glad hearts because of the risen Christ moving in our midst, ministering to others.

### REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

The reports indicate that the League is sustaining itself throughout the bounds of our Conference. The losses appearing in last year's statistics are believed to indicate a pruning process, from which a greater fruitfulness may be expected. The League has achieved for itself a definite place in the body of the Church, and is daily demonstrating its value as an important arm of the service. We would urge upon our preachers the commitment of definite responsibilities to the Leagues of their charges, and we believe that such a course will receive entire justification in the ultimate response which it would elicit.

We find that where District League Conferences are held and genuine effort put forth to realize their possibilities, that stimulation of League and Church work generally throughout the District is the invariable result. We would recommend that these District gatherings be made places for the exchange of realized experiences and the thoughtful study of methods of work.

We unhesitatingly and cordially commend the work of Dr. Du Bose. The *Epworth Era* is now upon a self-supporting basis and has bright promise of greater worth and usefulness than ever before.

The unification of the educational work of the League in the Christian Culture Courses is an achievement which deserves special mention and commendation.

We would especially present these courses to the thoughtful consideration of our ministers and League members, in the belief that they afford a very feasible opportunity for the acquisition of the training of which so many of our young people stand in need.

# MEMOIRS.

### REV. SAUL B. DOLLY.

The Baltimore Conference held its annual session in March, 1856, in the old Light Street Church, Baltimore, Bishop Levi Scott occupying the chair. In a class of twenty-four young men admitted on trial at that time, we find the name of Saul B. Dolly. This was the beginning of an active, efficient and faithful ministerial career, covering a period of forty-seven years.

Brother Dolly was born on the 9th of August, 1827, in Pendleton county, West Virginia, and was therefore just seventy-six years of age when summoned to his reward. At the age of eighteen he was clearly and soundly converted at a Methodist protracted meeting held near his home. A few months later, feeling called to enter the ministry, he began preparations by entering an academy in Harrisonburg, Va. This was the beginning of careful and long-continued preparations for the sacred office.

Early in 1854, having received license to preach, he was appointed junior preacher on Churchville Circuit, by Rev. Samuel V. Blake, P. E. He continued to work in this capacity for two years. Having been received into the Annual Conference, he was sent as junior preacher to Woodstock, with Rev. J. N. Eakin. In 1858 he was admitted into full connection, and appointed preacher in charge of Highland Circuit. For four years he contined to do efficient service on large circuits; and when the great crisis came in 1861, and the Baltimore Conference must decide whether it would forsake or maintain the principles it had long held, he was ready for the test. His convictions were clear and settled, and in everything he did, and every vote he cast, he stood firm for the cherished principles and traditional policy of the old Conference. He voted with the majority to withdraw the Conference from the jurisdiction of the Methodist Episcopal Church, because he believed this action necessary to the continued efficiency and largest success of its work.

From this session he was sent as preacher in charge to Green Bank Circuit. When the small number of preachers who were able to assemble, held their Conference in Harrisonburg, in March, 1862, Brother Dolly was not present. He was with them, however, one year later when the Conference met in Churchville, and was appointed to Monterey Circuit. He was present also at the Conference held in Bridgewater in March, 1864, and was returned to Monterey. He was not able to reach the Salem Conference in March, 1865, but was continued preacher in charge at Monterey. When the Conference, holding its session in this city (Alexandria) in 1866, officially and formally united with the M. E. Church, South, Brother Dolly was in full sympathy and hearty co-operation with his brethren. He never for a moment doubted the validity and righteousness of their action. For a number of years he was appointed to large and laborious circuits in Virginia and West Virginia, but in every field of labor he made full proof of an able and efficient ministry.

In 1884 he was appointed preacher in charge of West River Circuit, in Maryland, and remained there three years. His next appointment was to Prince George Circuit, where he served two years, and was then transferred to Church Hill, where he also remained two years. He was next appointed to West Harford, where he did efficient service for three years. In 1894 he was appointed to Fauquier Circuit, and remaine there two years, moving

in 1896 to Hillsboro Circuit, where he labored faithfully for three years. In 1899 he was appointed to Sterling Circuit, where he served the full term of four years. At the last session of this Conference he felt compelled, by the infirmities of age, to ask for a superannuated relation; but although placed on the retired list, he was ready to serve the Church to the full measure of his strength.

For a few weeks in the early summer, during the absence of the pastor, he filled the pulpit of the church in Fredericksburg. But on the 8th of August, 1903, at an early hour in the morning, he was taken seriously ill, and in about two hours had breathed his last. His remains were laid to rest in the cemetery of Fredericksburg, in which town he had made his home.

Brother Dolly possessed many qualities of mind and heart which contributed to his success during his long and eventful life. A Methodist in principle, he was thoroughly in harmony with the doctrines and polity of his Church. Whenever necessary, he was ready to defend her doctrines and vindicate the wisdom of her polity, with all the energy of his nature. Although not endowed with a mind of the finest order, he was nevertheless a strong, forcible, and thoroughly evangelical preacher. Many souls were converted under his ministry. He often reported revivals of remarkable power and far-reaching results. The charges to which he was appointed were often large and difficult, but he went to his work with a glad heart, and never failed to leave the impress of his piety and zeal on every community in which he lived. He possessed an aptitude for gaining the confidence and affections of his people which contributed largely to his acceptability and usefulness to the close of his career. Combined with an exceedingly friendly and affable disposition, there was great firmness of principle and earnestness of purpose, so that he presented to the world a fine example of consistent and symmetrical manhood.

In May, 1858, Brother Dolly was married to Miss Margaret C. Seiver, who died in July, 1874. His second wife was Miss Mary C. Rodeffer, who survives him.

In every relation of life, whether public or private, personal or official, he exemplified the high and holy principles of his religion; and having served his generation by the grace of God, he was ready and willing to lay aside his armor and receive his crown.

### REV. THOMAS JAMES MILLER.

Brother Thomas James Miller was born in the northern part of Ireland, May 26, 1864, and died at Hedgesville, W. Va., October 1, 1903.

The parents of the deceased, removing from Ireland to America soon after the Civil War, brought him to this country while yet a little child.

He was converted at about the age of fourteen, at Easton, Md., under the ministry of Rev. G. H. Zimmerman; and not long afterwards, feeling himself called to preach the gospel, began to improve his opportunities in making preparation for his life work.

He was recommended for admission into our Traveling Connection by the Quarterly Conference of Salem Station, Roanoke District, and admitted on trial at the session of this Conference held at Staunton, Va., March, 1886.

His first appointment was to Calvert Circuit, as junior preacher, with Rev. L. M. Lyle, where he served for two years. 1890, he was in charge of Talcott Circuit; 1890 and 1892, of Collierstown; 1892 and 1893, of Botetourt; 1893 and 1895, of New Hope; 1895 and 1899, of Page; 1899 and 1901, of Warren; and 1901 and 1903, of Berkley Circuit, where his earthly ministry and life together ended.

On March 8, 1888, in Calvary Church, Baltimore, Brother Miller was united in marriage to Miss Bessie S. Hammett, daughter of the late Captain John H. and Mrs. Anna E. Hammett, who with two children, survive him.

Brother Miller possessed those qualities of mind and heart; of purity, of gentleness and kindness, which won for him the love and friendship of the best people among whom he lived and labored; and his fidelity to duty, his zeal in the Master's service, gave to his ministry a commanding influence in all the charges committed to his care; while his consecrated life, his disinterested devotion to the good of others, and his evident hopefulness of endeavor proved an inspiration to his people. The official members of Berkley Circuit, in giving some expression of their appreciation of the man and his work, shortly after after his death, said: "We have foully looked upon our beloved pastor as our trustee and successful leader, who has raised the work to its highest standard, both spiritually and financially. He had just reached the beginning of a series of protracted services. We had looked forward to a Conference year of unexampled religious prosperity, and all indications pointed to the realization of our brightest anticipations. He was only permitted to move among us long enough to teach us in part our relations to him, to the church, and to the world, and what our duty in all those relations was. Those who heard his earnest prayers, his fevent exhortations, will never forget the lessons which he taught."

The circumstances of his death were indeed most sad. At the time he was engaged in a protracted meeting at Cherry Run, where the year before a beautiful church had been built largely through his own labor and generosity. Rev. William Hedges, one of our superannuated preachers, was there to assist him in the meeting, and writes of Brother Miller and his tragic death as follows: "I never saw him in better health nor spirits. He really glowed with religious fervor during the last two days of his life before the tragedy."

On Wednesday morning, September the 30th, he received a message to go to Bedington to visit a family whose little child had been, they feared, fatally burned. He felt that he ought to go, and went, expecting to return in time for night service. He returned on a 'Helper' engine in the evening to within a half mile of Cherry Run, where the obliging conductor let him off in a very safe place. He walked, as was supposed, fifty yards on a beaten path along the right of the track, when he found his way obstructed by two lengths of rails, and just beyond these an ash heap forty feet long. To avoid these, he stepped upon the track while the engine from which he had alighted was slowly backing towards the water tank in the same direction Brother Miller was walking. Just opposite the heap of ashes the tender struck him. He was thrown beneath the wheels and such injuries inflicted as were necessarially fatal. He was carried back to his home the same evening, where he lingered until 3.45 o'clock Thursday afternoon, October 1st, and sank into the arms of death as into a sweet sleep."

Funeral service on Saturday afternoon, October 3d, was conducted by his Presiding Elder, Rev. Henry P. Hamill.

The ministers present and taking part in the services were Revs. D. F. Eutsler and C. D. Harris, and pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Hedgesville.

### REV. CHARLES GARLAND LINTHICUM.

Doctor Charles Garland Linthicum has gone to his reward. His death occurred in Prince George's County, Md., at 9 o'clock Sunday evening, October 25, 1903. Thus closes a long and earnest life.

He was born June 25, 1822, in Baltimore County, Md., near Glen Burnie, a few miles from Baltimore City, and was the son of Amasa and Rachel Johnson Linthicum.

His parents died while he was very young, too young, indeed, for him to have any remembrance of them. His childhood was spent under the care of his sister, Margaret Linthicum.

Little is known of his schooling; but he attended an academy in Baltimore, and then for some time was clerk in a store in the city. He afterwards studied dentistry at a college there, graduating in 1843, and he practised his profession until 1847—hence his title. In his youth, somewhere about 1842, at a camp-meeting held near Baltimore, he was soundly converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church. In later years he often alluded to the clearness of his experience in conversion, so that he never had been troubled with doubt on that point.

He soon felt called to preach, and he gave up his dental work for the Christian Ministry, after first receiving exhorter's license from North Baltimore Station, September 3, 1845, signed by Rev. Henry Slicer.

Dr. Linthicum was a member of the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church for eighteen years, and for thirty-seven years, until his death, he was a member of the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

He was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference in the spring of 1848, and was one of a class remarkable both for number and the standing attained by many of its members. He served a number of charges until 1862, when he was superannuated. He became effective again in 1863 and 1864, and in 1865 he was given the supernumerary relation.

The next year, 1866, he withdrew from the M. E. Church and gave his adherence to the M. E. Church, South, in which he labored until 1890, when he was superannuated, and he remained in this relation to the close of his days. The appointments of his ministry were in the following order: In the Baltimore Conference, M. E. Church—Rockville, Montgomery, Patapsco, Patuxent, Salem, Va., St. Mary's, New Washington, Pa.; Bladensburg, Md.; Charles, Brentsville, Va., and Bladensburg, Md. And in the Baltimore Conference, M. E. Church, South—Mt. Vernon, Prince George's, Queen Anne's, Piedmont and Linden, Hillsboro, Piedmont, Linden, Frederick Avenue, Baltimore; South River, Md.; New Hope, Va.; Augusta, Luray, Mt. Jackson and Furnace No. 2.

After his superannuation in 1890, he retired to a small farm near Beltsville, Md., where he was much respected by all the neighborhood, and where he finished his days.

Dr. Linthicum was of a rather quiet, retiring disposition, and yet frank and outspoken when occasion required as to his views and convictions. He was not constituted socially, perhaps, to be a popular favorite, as were not the prophets in their day; but his heart was bent on preserving the "favor God, which is better than life;" and to this the steady trend of his life, through all its vicissitudes, toward the true Polar Star of a blessed future, gives unequivocal testimony.

A former colleague of his affirms: "He was a sincere, honest, upright Christian gentleman." And an intelligent layman, who knew him well, says: "His high sense of honor and his calm and dignified manner won for him the respect of those among whom he was thrown. He would not have stooped to anything small to have secured for himself the best appointment in the Baltimore Conference. His natural affections were very strong, and his character as a Christian gentleman was above reproach. I knew him and loved him, and shall cherish his memory."

According to the testimony of his brethern who knew his ministry, he was a master workman as a preacher of the Word. A brother already quoted, says: "As a preacher he was no ordinary man; as a sermonizer he was above the average preacher. He had a strong hold on The Word: clear insight into its meaning, and expressed himself clearly and intelligently." Another, now retired, who knew him from early manhood, writes: "While

I never heard him very often, at no time was his discourse that of mediocre. In early life his manner, voice and method of treatment of his subject were both attractive and effective. Once I heard him at his own campmeeting (in Maryland), when the sermon was a fine specimen of clear analysis of his text, delivered in a natural oratorical style, and the effect was masterful." He adds: "His pulpit themes were both of the persuasive and pathetic, and of the heroic and bold. Moses, Elijah and Daniel, of the Old Testament; the Prodigal, John 3: 16, and such, of the New Testament, seemed to be his preferred topics." He was an industrious and useful minister, and gave care to the spiritual upbuilding of his churches and led sinners to Christ.

On June 2, 1850, in Montgomery County, Md., Dr. Linthicum was married to Miss Anna Louise Perrie. They lived together most happily until April 10, 1901, when she was called to the life above. For about twenty years before her translation, she was afflicted with blindness, during which period her husband's constant, thoughtful care of her was very beautiful and affecting.

Two of Dr. Linthicum's children preceded him to the "better country," and six survive.

He was married again on November 26, 1902—his second wife being Miss Elizabeth A. Beall, of Beltsville, Md. She writes of his declining days: "The lasi year of his life would fill a volume. His memory was clear and he loved to talk of his travels in the itenerancy. He loved to sing; as soon as he awoke in the morning, he would sing one of his favorite hymns. He was full of faith and prayer, and I have heard him say many times, 'O, that I may be ready when my change comes; this is the most important of all things in life."

In June he took cold, from which he never recovered. In the summer, anticipating his approaching decease, he sent for his son, and gave minute directions concerning his funeral.

Sabbath morning, October 25th, though very feeble, he rose, sang and had family prayer. He grew weaker as the day advanced, and about four o'clock in the afternoon he was stricken with violent pain. Screaming out in agony, he bid his wife good-bye, and asked her to stand by him and help him to die. His last barely audible words were, "the brethren," and then he peacefully breathed his life away.

The funeral took place at eleven o'clock Wednesday morning, October 28, 1903, from the Methodist Church, South, Beltsville, Md., and was conducted by Rev. A. M. Cackley, assisted by Revs. B. Lee Parrott and George V. Leech, of Washington, D. C.

He was buried by the side of his first wife, in the Western Cemetery, Baltimore, Maryland.

### REV. SYDNOR G. FERGUSON.

On Monday morning, March 7, 1904, the startling intelligence was flashed abroad that Rev. Sydnor G. Ferguson had suddenly departed this life at Leesburg, Virginia, where he was just closing his third year as pastor of the Southern Methodist Church. The day before he seemed in his usual health, and preached to his own congregations and performed all his accustomed duties, with nothing to indicate that the close of his career was near at hand. The next morning he was taken suddenly ill in his own room at the parsonage, and before medical aid could be summoned the end came.

He was born at Paris, Fauquier county, Virginia, in 1845, and was therefore in the fifty-ninth year of his age. When a boy of sixteen he entered the Confederate army, and served with distinction in the command of Col. John S. Mosby during the war between the States. In the autumn of 1863

he made a profession of religion and identified himself with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Soon after the close of hostilities, feeling that it was his duty to enter the ministry, he obtained license to preach, and entered Randolph-Macon College to prepare for his life-work.

In March, 1872, he was received on trial in the Baltimore Conference, and appointed junior preacher to Winchester Circuit. He applied himself diligently and faithfully to his work, and soon developed far more than average ability as a preacher. His vigorous intellect and studious habits led to his rapid promotion, and after serving several important charges, including Charles Town, Front Royal, Moorefield and Woodstock, he was appointed in 1886 presiding elder of the Moorefield District. Here he served the full term of four years, and was then transferred to the Lewisburg District, where he served as presiding elder for two years. In 1892 he was appointed to Trinity Church, in Roanoke, and remained there one year. He was then appointed to Fredericksburg, where he served the full term of four years. In 1897 he was appointed to Martinsburg, where he also remained four years. In 1901 his appointment was to Leesburg, where he applied himself with his accustomed energy to his work, and had labored faithfully for three years, when he ceased at once to labor and to live.

Brother Ferguson was a man of far more than average ability. He had many qualifications for public life. His appearance, his voice, his manner, and the full command of all his resources in preaching or in debate, enabled him to hold the attention of any audience he addressed. Not in the technical sense an orator, he was nevertheless earnest and eloquent in his preaching, and often left a lasting impression on those who heard him. His sermons were carefully prepared, and frequently combined in a remarkable degree the doctrinal and the practical elements. His mind was not only vigorous but comprehensive, enabling him to discuss great themes with fulness and force. He possessed the happy tact of adapting himself. to his congregation, so that, as a rule, he was equally acceptable and useful among the cultured and the illiterate. Whatever he felt called to do was done with his might. He was not a man to tolerate half-way measures, and when he undertook a church enterprise he never rested until it was pushed to a successful issue. Hence the charges he served never failed to flourish under his management, and he often reported extensive material improvements, as well as growth and development in church life.

The least that can be said of Brother Ferguson is that he was a broad-minded man. He was in sympathy with every philanthropic movement, and was always ready to give them encouragement and assistance. In the temperance reformation he stood in the front rank, and contended not only for total abstinence, but for the total legal suppression of the liquor traffic. He held that it was the duty of every Christian—minister and layman alike—to use every available and proper method to secure prohibition in our land.

In 1890, Brother Ferguson was elected to represent his Conference in the General Conference of that year.

He was twice married. His first wife was Miss Kathleen Finnell, who died in 1895, and his second wife, to whom he was married in 1898, survives him.

His funeral was conducted by his presiding elder, Rev. J. W. Duffey, assisted by several of his brethren in the ministry, and his remains were taken to Charles Town, W. Va., and laid to rest near the spot where other members of his family repose.

We compete in style and workmanship in the open market with the best products of the press and at a cost only sufficient to meet the requirements of our people.

This is a most important department of our Church work and demands the support of all of our members. Attention is particularly called to the various periodical publications of the House.

We do not believe that there are any other "just as good," or that there is any justification on the part of any one for substituting others for them.

We congratulate the Church at large upon the election of Dr. A. J. Lamar to fill a vacancy in the Book Agency, and we express our pleasure in the wise choice of the Book Committee in his selection.

Your committee has been informed that the Book Depository conducted at Staunton, Va., by Mr. Rush Robinson has changed hands and is now under the management and control of Brother E. B. Lipscomb. Brother Lipscomb is an official member of our Church, a zealous and devoted Christian gentleman. We are glad that he is to have charge of this very important work within the bounds of our Conference. Staunton is at the centre of our territory and is a stronghold of Methodism. It is an ideal place for the Depository. The establishment of the business there will insure the quick return of orders from all parts of the Conference. Such an enterprise deserves our very hearty support and we commend it to our people, especially for all of their Church supplies.

Your committee had before it a committee appointed at the last session of the Virginia Conference to confer with our Conference as to our wishes with reference to a joint Conference Organ. The Committee consisted of Rev. J. W. Bledsoe, D. D., Rev. B. F. Lipscomb, D. D., Rev. W. W. Royal, D. D., Rev. W. B. Beauchamp and Bro. Frank Talbott. We desire to express for ourselves and for the Conference our pleasure in the visit of these distinguished members of our sister Conference, and to bear witness to the able and brotherly manner in which they have fulfilled the mission upon which they were sent. We recognize the courtesy of the Virginia Conference in sending such a Committee to us, and assure them of our high appreciation of the close relation which so happily exists between the two Conferences.

We also had before us Rev. James Cannon, Jr., D. D., and Rev. Sidney Peters, both of the Virginia Conference, who have recently purchased a controlling interest in the Advocate Publishing Company of Richmond, Va., and who presented to your Committee a statement in writing relating to the present ownership and management of the "Baltimore and Richmond Christian Advocate." This paper has been read to the Conference at their request.

It contains two propositions in substance, as follows: First: The purchase of the stock of the said Advocate Publishing Company by the Conference at a cost of \$15,000. Second: The endorsement of the paper under its present management, without control on the part of our Conference.

The second proposition also provides for the appointment of an Editor selected by the Publishing Company, and they name Rev. S. K. Cox, D. D., to be the Baltimore Conference Editor. In the light of all that has come to us touching the paper, and with an earnest desire to meet the needs of the Conference, we offer the following resolutions:

Resolved I. That in view of all the facts presented we do not deem it expedient, or in the best interests of our Conference; to accept either of the propositions presented to us by the Advocate Publishing Company.

Resolved II. That a Committee of sixteen, consisting of one clerical and one lay member from each Presiding Elder's District, be elected by the Conference upon the nomination of the Presiding Elders, which Committee shall take into consideration the question of a Baltimore Conference Organ, and that when in the judgment of this Committee arrangements can be made, either by organizing a stock company, or in any other manner, publish a paper without involving debt, the Committee is authorized to elect an editor and proceed to the publication of the paper, which shall be the official organ of the Conference, subject to such regulations as the Conference may at its next session impose.

Resolved III. That in view of this purpose to establish an official organ for our Conference owned and controlled by the preachers and laymen directly connected with the Baltimore Conference, we withdraw the endorsement heretofore given to the Baltimore and Richmond Christian Advocate as the organ of this Conference.

Third. That as ministers and laymen we will exercise great zeal in directing the attention of our people to the consideration of the merits and practice of total abstinence.

Fourth. That we will endeaver to follow more closely and enforce as far as possible the requirements of the discipline in regard to the manufacture, sale and use of intoxicating liquors, in every form.

Fifth. That we further recommend that in all our Epworth Leagues, Sunday-schools and other organizations, the subject of temperance, and lessons prepared for such organizations, be made as clear, attractive and strong as possible, and that a sermon on temperance be preached at least once a year.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

We, your committee on Sabbath Observance, respectfully submit the following resolutions for adoption by the Conference:

Resolved First. That we deeply deplore the disregard for the Christian Sabbath that expresses itself in so many ways, among which may be mentioned Sunday excursions, handling of unnecessary traffic by railroads, hunting, fishing and in sports of various kinds.

Second. That the ministers of our own Church be requested to preach emphatically and specifically against the sins of Sabbath desecration.

Third. That all our people be requested not only to abstain themselves from all unnecessary labor on God's Holy Day, but also to see that their children and servants of every kind be likewise permitted to observe the Day in a becoming manner.

Fourth. That we as citizens employ every legitimate means to have existing civil laws against the various forms of Sabbath desecration enforced, and when the laws are defective to have better ones enacted.

Fifth. That we are in full accord and sympathy with the work being done by the Sunday League of America, and as we have been requested to do by the Executive Committee of said League, we recommend that two members from our Conference be appointed as official delegates to the International Sunday Rest Congress to be held at the Exposition in St. Louis on October 11-14, 1904, and, we further recommend that Rev. I. W. Canter, D. D. and Rev. Collins Denny, D. D. be appointed as the delegates.


