

# FIRST DAY.

THE ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-FIRST SESSION.

The Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its One Hundred and Twenty-First session in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Winchester, Va., Wednesday, March 22, 1905, at 9.30 o'clock, A. M.

In the absence of Bishop Wilson, President of the Conference, the Secretary of the previous session called the Conference to order.

On motion, the Conference determined to elect a President; after nominations.

- J. W. Duffey, Collins Denny and P. H. Whisner were put in nomination.

(2) That we assure Bishop Duncan of our appreciation of the brotherly readiness with which, notwithstanding the many inconveniences in which the journey and the work involved him, he has consented to take the place of Bishop Wilson and to bear the burdens of presiding over our annual conference, for which he had no opportunity to make special preparation.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Sixty-six charges received aid from the Board of Missions this year.

These charges report 13,360 members, 986 additions, 212 Sunday-schools, 1,588 officers and teachers, 11,975 scholars, 208 church buildings, valued at \$304,600.

They have paid Presiding Elders \$2,579, Pastors \$25,528, Foreign Missions \$1,758, Domestic Missions \$1,624.

The following resolutions were adopted:

- 1. That mission study classes be organized in connection with our Epworth Leagues, wherever it is practicable.
- 2. That all our Sunday-schools be organized into missionary societies, where these do not now exist.
- 3. That we approve the appointment of District Secretaries by the Presiding Elders, whose duty it shall be to co-operate with the Conference Missionary Secretary, and work under the direction of the Presiding Elder.
- 4. That we endorse Dr. Lambuth's suggestion that Presiding Elders call their preachers together, very early in the Conference year, for prayer and discussion of plans and purposes for the year.
- 5. That Presiding Elders be urged to conduct missionary institutes in their respective districts, in accordance with the discipline.
- 6. That we favor the sending of two or three men to the Missionary School, at Nashville, when our missionary assessments are met in full.
- 7. That we specially emphasize the importance of all our preachers making every possible effort to meet the assessments in full.
- 8. That we heartily endorse "Go Forward," and urge our preachers to endeavor to increase the circulation of this excellent missionary periodical.
- 9. That the Disciplinary Mid-year Meeting be held at the call of the President. And the prayers and co-operation of Conference be asked for the success of this movement.

The following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, This Board is anxious to make an arrangement whereby the preachers, who are serving the mission charges of the Conference, may get what is allowed them, in quarterly payments; therefore, be it

Resolved, 1. That we assess five per cent. on the basis of \$13,000, to be set aside for the period of two years, in order to create a surplus fund, out of which to begin such quarterly payments.

- 2. That the preachers be requested to raise and send the money for Domestic Missions, quarterly, to J. E. Alexander, Treasurer.
- 3. That the Conference Secretary of Missions be requested and authorized to do all he can to secure special donations for the purpose of increasing the specified surplus fund.
- Rev. H. W. Burruss was nominated for appointment by the President of the Conference, Annual Conference Secretary. The Board requests Rev. E. L. Woolf to co-operate with and assist him in his work.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

To the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.
Your Board reports as follows:

#### The Randolph-Macon System of Schools and Colleges.

Your Board had before it reports of the Randolph-Macon system of schools and colleges. The system as a whole is in an excellent condition. The College at Ashland has an attendance this year of 141, the largest enrollment for ten years. There has been a gracious revival during the year and 95 per cent. of the students are now members of the Church.

The College reports the beginning of an effort on the part of the alumni to raise a fund of \$30,000 to endow an alumni chair of modern languages.

The general financial condition of the College appears satisfactory.

The Woman's College at Lynchburg has property valued at \$227,000, with an endowment of \$109,000. During the year a new dormitory has been erected at a cost of \$40,000, which accommodates an addition of 100 pupils, and also the erection of buildings at a cost of \$55,000, to meet the growing needs of the college is contemplated.

The report of the Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal, shows that school to have made considerable growth since its last report. It now has an enrollment of 100 students.

The Academy at Bedford City seems to be in a flourishing condition. Its enrollment this year is the largest in its history and is exactly double what it was six years ago.

The Institute at Danville reports 104 students, which fact indicates a healthy growth. This institution is doing excellent preparatory work and is furnishing a number of students each year to the college at Lynchburg.

The entire Randolph-Macon system has nearly 900 students under instruction, and is undoubtedly doing a wonderful work for the future of Southern Methodism.

We heartily commend the effort of the alumni to endow a chair of modern languages and most earnestly urge all cld students and also all friends of the College to subscribe to said fund to the amount of at least one share of ten dollars.

#### Southern Seminary.

The Southern Seminary, located at Buena Vista, Va., reports a most successful year's work. As the only institution for exclusive female education within the bounds of our Conference, offering Christian education to our daughters, it is our hope for their education and is fortunately located. The climate and surroundings; the commodious and beautiful structure; the equipments and course of study; its faculty and the work done have received the highest endorsement of its patrons, and commendation of many educators. Here, we believe, our daughters will receive thorough instruction combined with home life and a careful regard for religious influences. Its course of study is correlated with Randolph-Macon Woman's College, and prepares those who desire for admission thereto.

We most heartily recommend it as a school worthy the patronage of our people and bespeak for it a greater matriculation from within our bounds. The property is valued at \$75,000. It has enrolled this year 80 students, coming from some of our lower Southern States, as well as those nearer and from every district in our Conference. There are ten instructors.

We recommend that Rev. David Bush, Rev. J. S. Hutchinson and Rev. Chas. D. Bulla be appointed a visiting committee to this institution and that they be requested to make a written report to this Board, and further that the expenses incurred be paid.

#### Alleghany Collegiate Institute. .

This school, located at Alderson, W. Va., is the property of the Lewisburg District. It reports a year of successful work. The rapid growth and development of this large and prosperous part of our Conference make this institution a factor in the education of our boys and girls, and is worthy of our endorsement and commendation. Its property is valued at \$15,000. Seventy-four students have been enrolled this session. There are five instructors. It is controlled by a Board of Trustees appointed by the Lewisburg District Conference with Rev. L. S. Shires as Principal. We recommend that Rev. W. H. Sanders, Rev. L. B. Adkins and Rev. H. C. Febrey be appointed a visiting committee and that they be requested to make their report in writing to this Board, and further that the expenses incurred be paid.

#### Appointments Recommended.

We recommend that the Conference request the Bishop to appoint Rev. J. A. Kern, D. D. and Rev. Collins Denny, D. D., Professors in the Vanderbilt University; Rev. L. S. Shires. Principal of Alleghany Collegiate Institute, and C. F. McClintic, a student in Randolph-Macon College, and Edward Barber, a student in Vanderbilt University.

We also recommend the re-appointment of Rev. H. P. Hamill, Conference Secretary and Treasurer of Education, and the continuance of the Committee on the Twentieth Century Fund.

#### School of Correspondence and Preachers' Institute.

We are pleased to learn of the success of the Correspondence School and urge all our undergraduates to take advantage of it in connection with their Conference Courses.

We also hail with satisfaction the effort to hold Preachers' Institutes, and would earnestly commend them to our preachers as supplying a need greatly felt in prosecution of our work.

#### Assessments.

We recommend an assessment of three thousand dollars for the benefit of Randolph-Macon College, at Ashland, Virginia; three hundred and sixty dollars for the General Board of Education, and five hundred dollars for Paine and Lane Institutes.

#### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Baltimore Conference, M. E. Church South:

We have the pleasure of reporting a very successful year in the Sunday School work. The report of the Sunday School Editor, showing an increase of more than fifty thousand in enrollment during the year, thus equalling the record-breaking figures of last year, shows that the church is to some extent at least waking up to its golden opportunity in the Sunday School.

#### Possibilities and Needs.

It is not the purpose of the Board to unduly magnify one department of Christian work as compared with others, but no well-informed minister or layman denies the tremendous and ever increasing importance of the Sunday School as the very fountain source of Church growth. The figures showing the very large proportion of Sunday School Scholars among the accessions to the Church, are startling, and strongly emphasize the now commonly accepted statement that the Sunday School is the hope of the Church. So eminent an authority as the Chairman of the International Lesson Committee stands sponsor for the prediction that the Twentieth Century will not be old when every member of the Church will have been trained in Sunday School. Yet, though these facts are well known, the most weighty perhaps of all the questions confronting us in connection with the Sunday School problem, is how to make the people, laity and clergy as well, recognize them in action as well as in theory; how to arouse the Church to a more systematic effort toward reaping and garnering its most fruitful harvest. We believe that the resources of the Church, not only in money, but in the time, talents and thought of its strongest men and women should be poured out upon the Sunday School.

#### Our Own Literature.

We congratulate our Sunday School workers and the Sunday School Editor upon the fact that the high character of the literature issued from our Publishing House is fully sustained. Without attempting to go into details, we call special attention to the Teachers' Magazine, and the Children's Visitor, each of which stands in the front rank of publications of its class.

#### Sunday School Anniversary.

We extend the thanks of the Board to the Annual Conference for setting apart one evening of the session for the observance of a Sunday School Anniversary, and, believing that it meets with universal approval, we recommend that the custom be continued.

#### Book Depository.

We congratulate the Book Depository at Staunton upon its success during the year and recommend that Sunday schools patronize it more extensively than in the past. The Depository will carry a full line of our publications and will fill orders at the same price as the publishing house.

#### The Teacher Training Course.

The need of properly equipped teachers continues to be a burning question. It is not believed by even the most sanguine that this question can be solved in a day, but no plan that goes further in the direction of solving it than does that embraced in our Teacher Training Course has been suggested anywhere. We urge all schools that have not formed Study Circles to do so at once, and we especially recommend that those schools which have formed such circles shall not allow the work to drop with the gradution of a single class. The work should go on, to the end that there may be a constant supply of trained teachers to meet the ever pressing demand.

#### Children's Day.

We are glad to report that Children's Day seems to have been more generally observed, and that the offerings have been more carefully looked after. We urge every school to comply with our church law in this regard, which directs that Children's Day be observed in all our Sunday Schools. Children's Day programs will be furnished as heretofore, free of charge, by the Board, to schools applying for them. Children's Day offerings should be carefully looked after and accurately and promptly reported.

#### Sunday School Convention.

We earnestly commend the excellent work which is being done by our Conference Sunday School Convention. The Convention held at Martinsburg, W. Va., last year, touched high water mark in the history of such gatherings. The attendance was large and the interest very marked. It is the plan of the Executive Committee to hold this year's Convention at Clifton Forge, Va., provided satisfactory arrangements can be made with the railroads. Due announcement of the time and place will be made in the forthcoming Year Book and in a circular which will be sent by the Committee to all superintendents and pastors. We urge that every school arrange to be represented in the next Convention.

#### REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

The American Bible Society sends an urgent appeal to every loyal child of the Gospel. Its demands are urgent; it needs money and continued support for its friends. It has not retracted its work in preparing for publication the Holy Scriptures in every language and dialect in which it is needed. Portions of the Bible are now supplied in over 400 dialects.

In view of these facts, and the hearty co-operation of the Society with our missionaries in their attempt to spread the Gospel broadcast over the land, it deserves our heartiest support. Because of the fewness of legacies received our voluntary offerings must continue to increase if the work is to be carried on successfully.

The Maryland and Virginia Bible Societies are supplying their own territories through their various agencies, also sending contributions to the American Bible Society.

We recommend, first, that each pastor investigate the needs of Bible supply in his charge and report the same to the society that has charge of that respective work. Second, that every preacher at least comply with the requirements of Par. 134 of our Discipline, which reads as follows: "Also to present once a year to each congregation in his charge the claims of the American Bible Society, and to report the amount of contributions raised by him for this purpose;" also that the above collection be taken early in the Conference year.

# MEMOIRS.

#### PHILIP S. E. SIXEAS.

Just at the beginning of the Christmas festivities in December of 1904, the news was flashed abroad that Rev. Philip S. E. Sixas had died suddenly of paralysis at his home in Newcastle, Va., on the 23d day of that month. He was in the seventy-third year of his age, and the forty-ninth year of his connection with the Baltimore Conference.

He was born in St. Thomas, Penn., and was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church in early life. He soon felt that it was his duty to enter the ministry and spend his life in the active service of God, and in due time he received license to preach. At the Conference held in Baltimore in March, 1856, he was admitted on trial in the traveling connection and appointed to the Augusta Circuit, in Rockingham District. His next charges were Lewisburg Circuit, Greenbrier Circuit, Monroe Circuit and Blue Sulphur Circuit, on each of which he traveled one year. In 1858 he was ordained a deacon by Bishop Ames, and in 1860 an Elder by Bishop Simpson. In 1861 he was appointed to the Warm Springs Circuit, where he traveled for two years. Another year was then spent on Blue Sulphur Circuit, and one at Peterstown, in the same district. From 1865 to 1867 he was preacher in charge of the Levelton Circuit, and in 1868-9 he served the Collierstown work. In 1870, because of impaired health, he received a supernumerary relation. The next year, as his health did not improve, he was given a superannuated relation, which he held until March, 1883, when he was again placed on the supernumary list. He continued in this relation until 1891, when he was made effective and appointed to Fairfield Circuit, then in the Roanoke District. He worked acceptably on this Circuit for three years, and in March, 1894, was sent to Newcastle, where he served as preacher in charge for two years. In 1896 he was again given a superannuated relation, which he held to the close of his life.

He was a man who always commanded the confidence and esteem of his brethren in the ministry. Those who knew him best appreciated him most highly He was a thorough Methodist in sentiment and principle, and never failed to discharge his duties faithfully wherever he was sent. The charges he served were generally large and laborious, but he worked with the true spirit and zeal of a Methodist itinerant, and witnessed many seals to his ministry in the conversion of souls and the upbuilding of the Church.

On the 11th of January, 1859, he was united in marriage to Miss Virginia P. Henning, of Lewisburg, W. Va.

The least that can be said of Brother Sixeas as a preacher is that he was strong, clear and thoroughly evangelical. Although his early advantages were not of the best, he made up for it by diligent application to study. During his whole ministry his habits were studious. He had a vigorous mind, a fine vocabulary, and always expressed himself with precision and force. His favorite studies were the works of Watson, Fletcher and Bledsoe, which easily accounts for the strong Arminian coloring of his preaching. He was thoroughly in sympathy with the principles of his Church, and insisted that her rules should be kept by the membership, and whenever necessary to do so, he was ready to enforce her discipline with a firm hand but a brotherly spirit. He gave much attention to pastoral work, and his intercourse with his people was always for their good to edification and improvement in spiritual things.

Although never conspicuous in the Conference, he was one of those who made up the bone and sinew of the ministry, and did faithful and efficient work in every charge he was appointed to serve. The summons to lay aside his armour came suddenly and unexpectedly, but he knew that his work was done, and twenty-four hours after he was stricken of paralysis his pure and gentle spirit passed to its heavenly reward.

#### REV. AARON BOON.

Long years ago several families of English Wesleyan Methodists came to this country and settled in the Warm Springs Valley, in Bath county, Virginia. At that time there was no Methodist Church in that country, but these people, true to their convictions, found or made a Methodist Church in their dwellings, in school houses, under the trees, or "wherever two or three could be gathered together" for prayer, exhortation and mutual encouragement in the way of life. They were soon found out by the circuit riders as they traversed their wide fields of mountain territory, taken into "the plan" of the circuit and given stated preaching at long intervals. At much longer intervals Quarterly Meetings were held by the Presiding Elders of the Lewisburg District in the court house at Warm Springs. Out of this little colony there sprung, besides the subject of this memoir, such men as Mark Boon and Daniel Boon, of Monroe county, West Virginia; Zebulon Boon, of Salem, Virginia; George Law, of Lewisburg, West Virginia, and others, life-long pillars of the Church, and godly women not a few, whose influence on the religious and social life of that country will never die.

Here, in the home of George Boon and Harriet Star Boon, his wife, on Friday, December 13, 1833, Aaron Boon was born. Here, where the morning and evening sacrifice ascended daily from the home altar—where the weary itinerant in his monthly rounds paused to rest, while his presence, like the Ark in the house of Obed-edom, was a benediction—here, in the bosom of nature, where purity and religion rustled in every breeze and laughed and bounded in the streams adown every hillside—he spent his childhood and youth.

No wonder that with such surroundings he was converted to God when only about 17 years old. His conversion was so thorough, so clear and satisfactory as that he was never tempted to doubt it even for a moment, to his dying day.

Shortly after his conversion he was called of God to the ministry. In order to render his Master the best service possible he went to Dickinson College at Carlisle, Pennsylvania, where he distinguished himself as a student and graduated with honor. After leaving college, in order to thoroughly digest and assimilate the results of his training, he taught school for a time in Botetourt county.

He was admitted on trial in the Virginia Annual Conference in 1857, and appointed to Albemarle Circuit as junior preacher under Jeremiah McMullin. He was afterwards sent, successively, to Spottsylvania, Blue Ridge, Amherst, Buffalo, Currituck and Rappahannock Circuits, in the Virginia Conference.

On Thursday, July 5, 1860, he was married to Miss Clarissa Ann Warren, of Luray, Va., who, after having shared with him the triumphs and privations of a ministry of nearly half a century, survives him.

He was transferred to the Baltimore Conference in 1867, and appointed to Gap Mills. In 1868 he was sent to Alleghany Circuit, and returned there in 1869 and 1870. In 1871 and 1872 he was sent to Jackson's River; 1873, to Luray; 1874, to Powel's Fort; 1875, he was supernumerary at Luray; 1876, he was sent to Petersburg; 1877, 1878, to New Castle; 1879, to

Catawba; 1880, he was again supernumerary at Luray; 1881, 1882, he was sent to Furnace No. 2; 1883, 1884, to Healing Springs. In 1885 he was granted a superannuated relation, and spent the rest of his life in Luray.

Brother Boon was very finely equipped for the work of the ministry. A gentleman by both birth and training, he was a welcome guest in the homes of the people everywhere. His warm heart, his chaste conversation and undeviating piety, gave him a most wonderful influence at the fireside, the preacher's most fruitful field. He was a fine preacher in the true sense of those words. His sermons were prepared with care and gave evidence of mature scholarship and ripe Christian experience. He brought no unbeaten oil into the sanctuary, and no one could hear his sermons attentively without being edified. His ministry was fruitful. One who knew him long and well has said that he never left a charge where there had not been souls converted under his ministry.

Brother Boon had never the appearance of robust physical manhood, and yet his finely knit frame, his strong will and unconquerable zeal, carried him successfully through 28 years of active service, much of it in hard fields where stouter men would have faltered; and when no longer able to brave the storms of circuit life he was compelled to retire from it, he taught school or engaged in colportage as his health permitted, preached as occasion offered, and so, in some capacity, worked for the Master almost to the very last.

Aaron Boon was the friend of humanity. He sounded no trumpet, but his private ministrations to the sick and the poor, in which his left hand never knew what his right hand was doing, his unceasing efforts to put temptation out of the way of the poor drunkard, and to lift up the fallen of the human race, are of record on high, ready to be revealed "when Jesus comes to reward his servants."

After months of painful but patient suffering, on Wednesday, December 21, 1904, he departed "to be with Christ, which is far better." His end was peace, a fitting close to the life he had lived.

Aaron Boon is not dead. He is living in that better country beyond the sunset; and the influence of his life will go down the ages in ever-widening circles to the end of time.

#### REV. JOHN C. SEDWICK.

Rev. John C. Sedwick was born on a farm near Prince Frederick, Calvert County, Maryland, January 16, 1842, and died on the old home place in Calvert County, Maryland, April 13, 1904. He was sixty-two years, two months and twenty-seven days old. The immediate cause of death was consumption.

The funeral service was conducted by his pastor, Rev. George W. Richardson, at the old home, and he was buried on the farm, by the side of his loved ones, to wait with them the summons from on high.

Brother Sedwick was well educated. He attended first the West River Classical Institute of Anne Arundel County, Maryland, and was a graduate of Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pennsylvania. He was received into the Baltimore Conference on trial, at the session held at Warrenton, Virginia, in the Spring of 1872, Bishop Robert Paine presiding. Brother Sedwick was ordained deacon by Bishop Doggett, at the Staunton Conference, in 1874, and elder by Bishop Marvin, at Winchester, in 1876. He was superannuated in 1902, and continued in that relation until death.

In the thirty years of his active ministry he served the following charges: 1872-3, Harford; 1874. East Harford; 1875, Howard: 1876-7, Franklin; 1878-81, Covington; 1882-3, Strasburg; 1884-86, Charles and St. Mary's; 1887, Petersburg (Grant county, W. Va.); 1888-91, Assistant on Calvert Circuit; 1892-95, Charles; 1896-7, Kent; 1898-9, Fauquier; 1900, Manassas; 1901, Page.

Brother Sedwick was married three times. His first marriage was ... Miss Sarah F. Williams of Calvert county, Maryland. They were married in Baltimore in the Charles Street M. E. Church, in 1864, by Rev. Thomas Sewell, D. D. His second marriage was to Miss Annie Williams of Calvert county, Maryland. This marriage took place in Trinity M. E. Church, South, in the year 1871, Rev. Samuel Rodgers officiating. His third marriage took place in Trinity M. E. Church, South, in the year 1871, Rev. Samuel Rodgers officiating. riage was to Miss Mattie H. Johnson of Pendleton county, W. Va., in the year 1878. Rev. G. H. Zimmermann was the officiating minister. There were eight children by these marriages, only four are now living, namely, Mrs. Dr. G. V. Copp, child by his first wife, and Mary Louise, Phebe May, and Elizabeth, by his last wife. These mourn their loss, but not as those that have no hope. They shall meet again. Brother Sedwick was a good sound practical preacher. He was successful in winning many souls to Christ, and in strengthening believers. He was a good pastor, and dillgent in all the duties of a Methodist preacher.

A close personal friend said of him: "As a preacher he was clear and scriptural, well versed in Methodist doctrine and preached it with earnestness. He was not a speculative preacher but preached the pure gospel of "He believed, therefore, he spake." He knew whom he had believed. A former presiding elder of his sent this tribute: "He was a good preacher, sound in doctrine, pleasant in speech, and faithful as a pastor. He was courteous, hospitable and kind, a typical Christian gentleman." Brother Sedwick was a liberal man. He was possessed of large means, and gave liberally from time to time to the Church he loved so much. He was a Southern Methodist in principle and remained faithful to

the Church of his choice until death.

A brother minister wrote: "I never knew a man more devoted to his Church. He was urged in early life to join another Church, but his reply was, never. I am a Methodist in doctrine and a Southern Methodist in principle."

His was a life with the courage of deep conviction, and he was willing after having made the decision to abide by it through the eternities.

A "life hid with Christ in God."

Does not this prepare us for the words of cheer that come to us from him as he was about to pass from earth to heaven-"I have no doubt and no fear." He rested upon the promise: "Lo I am with you always even unto the end of the world." Therefore, his last hours were spent in converse with God, and there could be no fear of death to him. He had read and understood the words of the Apostle, "forasmuch then as the children are partakers of flesh and blood, he also himself likewise took part of the same, that through death he might destroy him that had the power of death, that is the devil, and deliver them who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage."

His pastor wrote: "I was with him often in his last sickness. We always talked of the hour of death which he knew was fast approaching, but it was no alarm to him. When asked if he had any doubts, he said there is not a doubt, he was ready for death, and if it were not for leaving his children behind, he would be glad for the summons to come, so that he might be with his blessed Lord, and the loved ones who had gone on before. His sun went down in a clear sky."

"Thou art gone to the grave, but we will not deplore thee. Whose God was thy ransom, thy guardian, thy guide. He gave thee, he took thee, and he will restore thee. And death has no sting, for the Saviour has died."

#### CHARLES SHIPLEY.

Few laymen have occupied a more prominent position in the Baltimore Conference than the subject of this brief memoir. For quite a period he was the Treasurer of the Missionary Board of our Conference, and a liberal contributor to its funds. He was for many years actively identified with the interests of our Church in Baltimore, and was among those who bore the brunt during those trying times that so severely tested the loyalty of the Southern Methodists in that city. He deserves special and appreciative recognition for his generous gift of \$20,000 to our Superannuated Fund, the revenue from which is being distributed among the beneficiaries of that Fund.

He was a pronounced Methodist, adhering to the old Wesleyan usages, and a firm believer in experimental religion.

He died in peace at the unusual age of 89 years.

#### GEORGE R. HILL.

We note with sincere sorrow the death of George R. Hill, of Alexandria, Va., who served this Conference efficiently as Treasurer of the Twentieth Century Fund and was deeply interested in and fully identified with our educational interests, giving liberally of his means to the College and to the Church, and who in his public business and private life adorned the doctrine of God our Saviour.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE OF SIXTEEN.

To the Raltimore Annual Conference M. E. Church, South:

The Committee of Sixteen, appointed at the last Session of the Conference to consider the question of A Baltimore Conference Organ, and authorized to elect an Editor and proceed to the publication of the paper, when in the judgment of the Committee arrangements could be made to publish the same without involving debt, beg leave to submit the following report, namely:

This Committee reported before the adjournment of the last Session of Conference that it had then sufficient stock subscriptions to insure the successful organization of a stock company, and that the Committee had elected Rev. B. W. Bond, D.D., Editor. The organization of the Company was completed by its incorporation in due form of law on the 28th day of April, 1904, under the name of the "Southern Methodist Publishing Company of Baltimore City."

· By formal arrangement with your Committee, this corporation was authorized to publish the "Baltimore Southern Methodist," the Conference not having any financial liability or risk in the enterprise. The success and present condition of the work thus begun under the direction of the Conference appears by the Report made by the Directors of the Company to your Committee, which we hereto append as follows, namely:

"To the Committee of Sixteen, elected by the Annual Conference at its last Session, to consider and act in the matter of publishing a Conference Organ:

"The Directors of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company of Baltimore City, who have, by your authority, conducted, printed and published the Conference Organ—The Baltimore Southern Methodist—since its first issue, deem it proper that they present to you at this time a statment of the progress and condition of the Conference paper, in order that you may have the same for reference in making your report to the Annual Conference.

"The cordial reception given by our people to the Conference Organ has justified the judgment of your Committee that such a paper was needed, and the time was ripe for its establishment. This attitude on the part of the laity of the Conference, together with the generous, enthusiastic and industrious labors of our preachers on its behalf, enable us to report a circulation of 6,554.

"As the first issue of the paper came out on the 2d day of June, 1904, only nine and a-half months of its first year have expired, and many of our patrons subscribed for the paper at much later dates, and have received it for comparatively short periods. In view of these facts we are gratified that we are able to inform you that seventy per cent. of our subscribers have already paid their subscriptions. This will doubtless be largely increased by settlements to be made during the Conference Session.

"The terms of subscription to the capital stock were fifty per cent. cash on the first call and the balance one year later. \$2,359 was received upon the first call, and although payment of the second call is not due until May 7th next, some subscribers have preferred to anticipate it, and we have already received \$185 upon the second call. For the amounts of these final payments subscribers gave their notes to the Company.

"We have done an advertising business of \$936.75. Our revenue from this source would have been much greater but for the conscientious policy we have pursued with reference to advertisements. We advert more fully to this matter at a later point in this report.

"To March 20, 1905, we have expended for the paper, all told, \$6,281.42; owe no debts whatsoever, and have in the treasury a balance of \$1,200.06.

"The Directors have endeavored to give constant and painstaking attention and service to the interests of the paper throughout the year. We have watched closely the details of its business, studied the field it serves and considered and discussed most carefully every question as to the policy and business methods best calculated to promote its present success and permanent establishment.

"Our directors, having studied the subject together, in the light of our experience during the year, are prepared to recommend to you the following lines of policy upon which, in our judgment, the Conference Organ will be established permanently as a self-supporting paper at its present price—one dollar a year:

"1st. The continuance of the enthusiastic support and efficient service rendered the paper during the past year by our preachers is necessary to its further success and enlarged usefulness.

"2d One of the best established conclusions arising from our observations and consideration is that it is essential to the interests of the paper that it have the entire time of one man set apart by the Bishop for its service. Also, we realize that the character and volume of work this year will be too great to expect one man to accomplish the whole of it unaided. We therefore ask that one of the brethren engaged in the pastorate or like work be appointed 'Contributing Editor,' and charged with the duty of furnishing editorials each week for so much space as may be required of him by the Board; and that another of the preachers be appointed 'Editor and Manager' to have charge of and be responsible for all the interests and business of the paper, except that required of the 'Contributing Editor;' all the affairs and interests of the paper to be, of course, under the direction and control of the Board of Directors, who have the care of the paper and are responsible to the Conference for its conduct and policy. The Company is ready to provide proper salaries for the 'Editor and Manager' and 'Contributing Editor.'

"We ask the appointment of B. W. Bond, D.D., Contributing Editor, and John S. Engle, Editor and Manager.

"3d. Publishing the Conference Organ we have, in response to the Christian conscience of the Conference and in consonance with our own convictions, excluded all advertisements that could be considered in any sense questionable. In deliberately adopting this policy our Board was well aware that it would cut off what is the most profitable source of income to nearly every church paper; but we preferred clean columns, Christian consistency and respect for the moral sense of our brethren to a money profit.

"Being a new publication and at the beginning without a record of circulation as a basis for advertising business, our income from that source has been heretofore small. Our Directors have now under consideration and in progress plans for the enlargement of our earnings from that source. It is the purpose of the Board to publish only such advertisements as we can recommend. In view of the policy of our paper in the matter of advertisements, we ask the Conference to recommend that our preachers and people deal with our advertisers where they can do so without disadvantage to their own interests.

"4th. It is important to the interests of the paper that the balances on the capital stock subscriptions be paid promptly by maturity.

"5th. We recommend that the preachers be asked to push the circulation of the paper with a view to putting it into every family, and that the Conference make this the ultimate goal for the circulation of its Organ.

"In conclusion we desire to say that we have endeavored to produce a paper which would be acceptable to and worthy of the support of our whole people. This we ask—and we ask it not only because we desire it, but because we deem the undivided support of the preachers and people essential to the fullest success and largest usefulness of the paper."

Your Committee have carefully considered this report of the Company and heartily approve the recommendations therein contained.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

Your Committee on Publishing Interests beg leave to submit the following report, namely:

The report of the Book Agents was before us and was carefully considered.

We are glad to note a substantial increase in the business done by the Publishing House, and in its profits.

We are especially pleased to learn that the "Methodist Quarterly Review" and the "Epworth Era" have reached a circulation which makes them self-sustaining.

We heartily recommend these periodicals and the "Christian Advocate," our general organ, and urge preachers and people to endeavor to give increased circulation to our books and all periodicals published by our Book Agents.

Your Committee has been informed that the Book Depository conducted by Bro. E. B. Lipscomb at Staunton, Va., has received such patronage from the members of our Conference as to enable him to carry on this important branch of Church work with reasonable business success during the year. The Depository is well and firmly established, and in the judgment of the Committee is an important aid in the work of the spread of religious literature among our people. We heartly endorse this work, and would urge our preachers and people to patronize it for their Sunday School literature, Church supplies and books.

We also had before us the Report of the Committee of Sixteen appointed at the last session of the Conference to consider the question of a "Baltimore Conference Organ." This report contained a brief review of work done during the year by the "Southern Methodist Publishing Company," a corporation organized pursuant to the action of the Conference and for the publication of a Conference Organ.

We are gratified to note than in less than ten months after the first issue of the paper the "Baltimore Southern Methodist" has reached a circulation of over 6,500, which result has been attained by the industrious and enthusiastic support given the enterprise by the preachers of the Conference.

We heartily commend the Board of Directors, and indeed the whole body of our preachers and people for the hard work done in the interests of our Conference paper, work not only difficult to do, but also efficiently done and greatly beneficial to the Conference. Beginning with nothing, they have in this short time started a paper and gained a circulation within our Conference greater than any paper has ever received from our people.

The "Baltimore Southern Methodist" has pursued a policy to which we give our commendation and gratefully record the fact that this policy has met the approval of our preachers and people with a unanimity that is rare.

We recommend the adoption of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist" as the official organ of our Conference.

Its further success and enlarged usefulness depend upon the continued support of our preachers, and only thus may we hope to attain the much desired end of placing a religious weekly in the home of every family of our people.

It being the purpose of the management of the paper to insert only such advertisements as they can recommend, we would urge our preachers and people to deal with its advertisers, where they can do so without disadvantage to their own interests.

We have carefully considered the suggestions of the Committee of Sixteen as to the future management of the paper, and request the appointment of B. W. Bond, D.D., Contributing Editor, and Rev. J. S. Engle, Editor and Manager of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist."

Second. That our District Conferences be urged to give the subject of local option their especial attention, and that we urge our people to extirpate the saloon, as the local option laws of their respective States may permit.

Third. That as ministers and laymen we will exercise great zeal in directing the attention of our people to the consideration of the merits and practice of total abstinence.

Fourth. That we will endeavor to follow more closely and enforce as far as possible the requirements of the Discipline in regard to the manufacture, sale and use of intoxicating liquors in any form.

Fifth. That we further recommend that in all our Epworth Leagues, Sunday-Schools and other organizations, the subject of temperance and lessons prepared for such organizations be made as clear, attractive and strong as possible, and that a sermon on temperance be preached at least once a year.

Fifth. That we as citizens employ every legitimate means to have existing civil laws against the various forms of Sabbath descration enforced, and when the laws are defective to have better ones enacted.
