

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Sixty-nine charges received aid from the Board of Missions this year.

These report 11,760 members, 1,261 accessions, 177 Sunday-schools, 1,455 officers and teachers, 11,139 scholars, 181 church buildings, valued at \$303,450.

They paid Presiding Elders \$2,308, Pastors \$20,341, Foreign Missions \$1,600, Domestic Missions \$1,611.

We note with pleasure the statement of the Secretary of the General Board "That it is with a deep sense of gratitude to God that we record marked progress in both evangelistic and educational work. There has been considerable increase in membership, notably in Cuba, and at home we have made the greatest financial advance in our history. There is but one interpretation of this fact, that is, the strenuous effort put forth to awaken a 'Missionary Conscience' is beginning to bear fruit." It is a pleasure to us to report that our own Conference shares in this increased interest in Missions. This is evinced by an increase of \$3,400 in the contributions to Foreign and Domestic Missions.

We attribute the increase in our Conference largely to the intelligent zeal and activity of our Conference Missionary Secretary. We therefore submit the following resolution:

Resolved, That we request the presiding Bishop to re-appoint Rev. Harry W. Burruss Conference Missionary Secretary, and that the Board request Revs. E. L. Woolf and J. Harry Smith to co-operate with him.

Twelve Annual Conferences of our church have paid all assessments for Missions in full; ours is not one of them. We want the Baltimore to be in the front rank, and should strive to place it there in the coming year.

Therefore, resolved (2), That all charges should regard assessments as the minimum amount expected and make an earnest and persistent effort to pay them in full, and that our stronger charges should endeavor to exceed the amount assessed.

(3) Growing interest in Missions in our Conference is also shown by the report of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, the report of whose Treasurer is submitted herewith. The society desires the active co-operation of all the pastors and requests that by speech and sermon the pastors keep the objects of the society before their congregations.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE, METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN:

I present to you the report of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Baltimore Conference.

You will note a considerable increase in the amount reported by the Treasurer over last year.

This is due partly to a growth of missionary interest, and partly to our newest special, a school in Sung Kiang, China, to be called the Susan B. Wilson School, after the president of the Conference Society.

The general fund raised from dues is appropriated to the maintenance of work already existing; but when we undertook, a few years ago, the support of a missionary as an extra, there was a rapid increase of enthusiasm among our women.

The school building will be a heavy tax, in addition to the salary of our missionary; but the devotion of our members will be equal to the amount required, about eight thousand dollars, in two or three years.

I could wish for an increase in our membership until we could have a Woman's Foreign Missionary Society in every charge.

May we ask for the help of all the preachers in any way that may open? If the pastors would give a sermon once a year or oftener, and set our work before the congregations, it will aid in the upbuilding of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.

And the women ought to put the more ardent work into their own churches, when the pastors lend us their assistance.

May we also ask the pastors to keep before the people our specials, and to encourage outside friends to give for these purposes?

We would not conflict with the church collections; but there might sometimes be contributions to our school, and missionary in addition to what ought to go, first, to the church.

We had a heavy blow in the death of the secretary of the Baltimore District, Mrs. Washington Waters, whose earnest, devoted service had given impetus to her district.

For some years the East Baltimore Distrist has been without a secretary. I beg the preachers whose work may lie within its bounds the coming year to stand by Miss Tippett in every possible way, as she tries to develop new interest among their charges.

In my report to the Woman's Board of Foreign Missions for the fiscal year just closed there were included 87 adult auxiliaries, 15 Golden Links and 27 Juvenile Auxiliaries, with a total membership of nearly twenty-six hundred.

Comparison with the treasurer's report shows that the average contribution is about \$2.08.

Remembering that most af our members are limited in means this is a high average.

When our work is fully exploited, as we hope, we expect it to be doubled easily.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

To the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

We are very much gratified to note the generally prosperous condition of our Educational work, both in our own Conference and in the entire church. There is a large increase in attendance upon our institutions of learning and in the endowments and receipts from various sources.

The Randolph-Macon System of Schools and Colleges.

Reports have been received from the various branches of this system, showing a general advance. The statistics are as follows:

Randolph-Macon College at Ashland has a new dormitory costing over \$35,000. It has been built through the generosity of Mr. John P. Branch of Richmond, Va., and fills a long-felt want. The number of students has increased and the usual high standard has been maintained. The Alumni Endowment Fund of \$30,000 for the Chair of Modern Languages has not been completed, but efforts are still being made and we renew our endorsement of the work.

Mrs. Rhea, of Norfolk, Va., has devised an estate estimated at \$85,000 to \$100,000 to the Board of Trustees for the education of young men for the ministry. As an evidence of the favor in which the work of this College is held by persons interested in higher education, it is notable that Mrs. Rhea was a Presbyterian. This should stir up our own people who have large means to aid the College in its great work by similar benovelence.

R. M. Academy at Front Royal, Va., which is not surpassed in building or equipment by any Academy in the South, has had the most successful year of its history, enrolling 135 students. The financial condition has improved and is steadily improving.

The Academy, at Bedford City, Va., has 180 students and paid off \$10,000 of its indebtedness last year. The Institute at Danville is showing steady growth and strength.

The Randolph-Macon Womans' College has had a truly wonderful development. That in thirteen years this College should have attained the eighth place in enrollment among the fourteen great Colleges in the United States was a great achievement. That in the past three years it should be able to add \$110,000 to its buildings and to prepare to advance to the fifth place, surpassed only by Vassar and the three chief Colleges of Mass., is an astonishment. That all this should be achieved for us with little or no struggle on our part is not so much a matter for congratulation as for thoughtful consideration. Do we really know about this work? Do we care for it? It is in the judgment of your Board, one of the most significant and important Educational movements of our day. We shall soon have a plant at Lynchburg, Va., worth a half million dollars, and an enrollment of 500 students, with 50 instructors and an annual income of \$150,000.

We have before us the challenge of Mr. Carnegie to the Methodist who stand behind this great work, that if they will add \$20,000 to its resources he will erect a Science Hall at a cost of \$20,000. Our Virginia Conference brethren have already subscribed \$16,000 and propose to make it \$17,500, asking us to take \$2,500 as our share. We could not wish to do less. We are partners in this enterprise and do not wish to be counted out in any important effort in its behalf. We, therefore, recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we earnestly request our people, especially our men and women of means, to respond to this opportunity to serve their church by meeting promptly and gladly this challenge to our zeal in behalf of Randolph-Macon Woman's College.

Southern Seminary.

Without the cost of a dollar to the church of actual expenditure or financial liability, we have in the Southern Seminary at Buena Vista, Va., a Methodist School for the daughters of our homes, with property valued at \$75,000, a building admirably adapted to school purposes, a complete and able faculty, and an enrollment representing not only every part of our Conference territory, but other sections and States. The Seminary has the best outlook in its history of forty years. It may be said, to the credit of this institution, that assistance has been given to worthy young women desirous of securing an education, but who were without means. The Southern Seminary is the only exclusively Methodist institution for young ladies in the Baltimore Conference, and should have the support and patronage of our people.

We recommend that Rev. H. L. Hout, Rev. J. R. Andrew and Dr. S. K. Cox be appointed as a visiting committee, and that they be requested to make their report in writing to this Board, and further, that the expenses incurred be paid by the Seminary.

Alleghany Collegiate Institute.

This school, located at Alderson, W. Va., is the property of the Lewisburg District. It reports a year of successful work and an enlargement of its course of study, with additional departments of stenography and type-writing and a business course. The remarkable development of this large and prosperous part of our Conference territory makes this institution an important factor in the education of our boys and girls, and is worthy of our endorsement and patronage. Its property is valued at \$15,000. Seventy-five students have been enrolled this session, with a faculty of six instructors.

This institution is controlled by a Board of Trustees appointed by the Lewisburg District Conference with H. A. Scomp as Principal.

We recommend that Rev. W. O. Talbert, Rev. W. H. Sanders and Rev. C. S. Stanton be appointed a visiting committee and that they be requested to make their report in writing to this board and further that the expenses incurred be paid.

Appointments Recommended.

We recommend that the Conference request the Bishop to appoint Rev. J. A. Kern, D. D. and Rev. Collins Denny, D. D., Professors, in Vanderbilt University; Rev. L. S. Shires, Instructor in Alleghany Collegiate Institute; G. W. Staples, a student in Randolph-Macon College; Rev. Jas. M. Greene, Associate President of Tuscaloosa Female College; S. R. Neel, student in Vanderbilt University, and O. D. Lambert, student at Randolph-Macon Academy, Front Royal, Va.

School of Correspondence.

We are pleased to learn of the success of the Correspondence School and urge all of our under graduates to take advantage of it in connection with their Conference Courses.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Baltimore Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South:

The Sunday School Board is glad to be able to report a year of prosperity in the work under its care. There has been a healthful growth in the church at large. The report of the Sunday School Editor to the Annual Conference shows an increase of enrollment of 26,481 in the School of the Connection during the past ecclesiastical year, and the reports to our Annual Conference will show a substantial increase among us.

Room for Larger Growth.

Yet there is room for still larger growth. There are about 70 societies in our Conference which are without a Sunday School. It is a matter of profound regret that there is an organized society within our borders where no successful effort can be made to train the children for the service

of God and His church. The Committee on Needy Sunday Schools earnestly desires to find consecrated men or women in these neglected fields who will use the help the Board can grant in establishing a Sunday School. The Board has ample funds for this purpose, and will spend them with a cheerful and liberal hand.

Literature.

We heartily recommend our own literature to all our schools. The recent substantial improvement in the periodicals issued by our Sunday School Department are heartily commended, and are appreciated by all who use our lesson helps. We know of no better Sunday School literature published anywhere, and certainly there is none so well adapted to the needs of our own schools. We are pleased to note, from the report of the Sunday School Editor, that the increase in circulation of our literature for the past year was nearly 27,000.

Children's Day.

We are gratified to note that the exhortations of the Board in past years as to the more general observance of Children's Day, and a more careful accounting for the collection in accordance with the requirements of the Discipline, are being heeded. We have little trouble now from any source, either as to failure to observe the day or as to carelessness with the collection.

Sunday School Convention.

A most successful Sunday School Convention was held last July at Clifton Forge, Va. The attendance was good, the speeches and addresses were of a high order and much good was accomplished. The Convention Executive Committee is determined to maintain the high standard of the former Conventions. The next Annual Convention will be held in Greene Memorial Church, Roanoke, Va., July 18, 19 and 20, 1906. Dr. H. M. Hamill, Teacher Training Secretary, has been engaged for the entire Convention. We urge all our Schools to send representatives.

District Institutes.

We wish also to mention and to commend the District Institute, which was held at Roanoke, Va., during the past year. This is a movement in the right direction, taking instruction in Sunday School methods to those who need it most. We recommend the holding of such institutes in each district, and to encourage them the Board has appropriated \$50.00 for the assistance of those districts which may need help in meeting the expenses of such a movement, the money to be expended in the discretion and under the direction of the Convention Executive Committee.

Study Circle.

The Board desires to repeat its recommendations that more attention be given to the training of Sunday School teachers in the Study Circle. Our teachers need the training and help of such a course of study, and the most encouraging reports of increase of interest and efficiency come to us from those schools in which Study Circles are maintained.

Missionary Training Course.

We commend to our Pastors, Superintendents and Teachers the Missionary Training Course prepared by our Missionary Secretaries. We would especially recommend this course to all those schools which have completed the course of study offered by the Teacher Training Department. An inquiry addressed to the Mission Rooms, at Nashville, Tenn., will bring full information as to the Missionary course.

Book Depository.

We recommend the Southern Methodist Book Depository, under the management of E. B. Lipscomb, Staunton, Va., to the patronage of all our schools. The Depository will furnish this year, as in the past, free programmes for Children's Day Services to all schools desiring them.

Sunday School Anniversary.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

To the Ballimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South:

It is with profound gratitude that your Bible Board is able to report a decided increase in the amount of money contributed for the Bible cause. Without passing judgment upon anyone we are constrained to believe that this most important feature of Christian work is at least partially, if not entirely, overlooked by some of our preachers. We sincerely believe that if our preachers would comply with the instructions of the Discipline, para-

graph 134, we would be able to increase many fold our contributions to the Bible Society. The total amount reported last year is \$610.92. We report \$933.57 this year, an increase of \$322.65, or 65 per cent.

The urgent needs of the American Bible Society have been vividly brought to our attention during the past year by the appeals sent to the various pastors calling attention to the lack of funds in the treasury of said society necessary to continue the work of printing and sowing broadcast the Scriptures in nearly every language and dialect.

The auxiliary societies, within our bounds, are all doing a good work in their specific territory, but-in view of the urgent needs of the American Bible Society at this time we recommend, first, that 50 per cent. of all funds collected by our Conference this year for the Bible cause be sent direct to the American Bible Society, and hereafter 100 per cent. Second, that each pastor investigate the needs of Bible supply in his charge and report the same to the society that has charge of that respective work. Third, that our pastors preach upon the Bible claims and take the collection for the same early in the year; and, further, that all moneys collected for the Bible cause be paid to the Treasurer of the Bible Board, Geo. W. Laycock, Hamilton, Va., and not be paid direct to the agents of the various auxiliaries of the American Bible Society.

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

Your Epworth League Board submits the following report:

From all we can gather, the League spirit is developing throughout the church. The days of planting and experimenting are past, and what we now have is likely to abide and expand. If fewer new leagues are reported, we also report fewer lapses.

The League has caught the spirit of the times, and is becoming, where it is in a healthy condition, decidedly evangelistic. It has also identified itself with every department of the church, so that it has become less a society and more a center of Christian activity.

In its development certain features over-emphasized have become practically obsolete. The Reading Course has dropped out while the subject of Missions has become a study as never before.

The Epworth Era has reached a circulation of 23,000, and may reach in a few months the 30,000 mark.

We had with us this session of our Conference our General Secretary, Rev. H. M. DuBose, D. D., who, in our Board meeting as well as before a large public audience, was able to lay before us the League situation as it exists today throughout our church.

We would ask our pastors and people to remember the attitude of the Baltimore Conference to the League in the earlier years of League activity. We occupied, in proportion to numbers, the first place, and in point of efficiency were second to none. Now that the International Conference of 1907 will likely be held on the Atlantic Coast, and may be held within the bounds of our Conference territory, we press the interests of the League, and would urge our young people to carry to the highest possible efficiency the chapters now organized, and organize where there is a place and work for this department of our church.

We commend the *Era*, our League organ, to the patronage of our people and express our appreciation of the untiring and successful efforts of Rev. H. M. DuBose, D. D., its editor, in extending the circulation of the paper to where it is not only self-sustaining, but where its circulation is first of all our church papers, not including the Sunday School literature.

In accordance with a resolution adopted by the last session of the Winchester District Conference, we recommend that an Epworth League delegate to the District Conference be elected from each pastoral charge, said representative to be included in the regular delegation.

Third—That as ministers and laymen we will exercise great zeal in directing the attention of our people to the consideration of the merits and practice of total abstinence.

Fourth—That we will endeavor to follow more closely and enforce as far as possible the requirements of the Discipline in regards to the manufacture, sale and use of intoxicating liquors in any form.

Fifth—That we further recommend that in all of our Epworth Leagues, Sunday Schools and other organizations, the subject of temperance and lessons prepared for such organizations be made as clear, attractive and strong as possible, and that a sermon on temperance be preached at least once a year.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Second. That we pray earnestly that God's Holy Day may be kept holy. Third. That the Ministers of our own Church be requested to preach on the proper observance of the Sabbath.

Fourth. That all our people be requested not only to abstain from all unnecessary labor on God's Holy Day themselves, but also to see that their children and servants of every kind be likewise permitted to observe the day in a becoming manner.

Fifth. That we as citizens employ every legitimate means to have existing civil laws against the various forms of Sabbath desceration enforced.

COMMITTEE ON MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE.

The Quarterly Conference of Mt. Vernon Place Church, Washington, D. C., passed resolutions on September 21, 1905, and March 13, 1906, calling attention to the need of a church building in that city worthily representative of our great denomination, and requesting that this Conference memorialize the General Conference to take such action as might be deemed best to accomplish this purpose.

Your committee recommend the adoption of the following:

We endorse the action of the Quarterly Conference of Mt. Vernon Place Church, and approve the purpose to erect in the Capital city of our general government a church building that will be truly representative of the progressive spirit, the strength, the life and the work of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The city of Washington is a center of commanding importance in religious and educational work, as well as in our civil and political affairs; it is also the center of influences that affect every part of our country.

Other denominations have long since seen the importance of Washington city, and have strengthened their influence and the influence of the Church of God, by erecting in that city large, attractive, well-equipped and representative church buildings. This they have done, in most instances, by means of contributions from their membership throughout the Union.

Nearly fifty years ago our General Conference of 1858 recognized the need of our church for such a building in Washington city, and cordially commended the project, and promised "hearty co-operation."

The great and terrible war that followed so soon after the adjournment of that General Conference prevented the accomplishment of the plan so heartily endorsed. In the half century that has followed it has not seemed possible to carry out this purpose of our fathers. But the opportunity is still open, and the present time seems propitious to put our Church in a position that will enable her to command the strength and influence in our Federal Capital to which she is entitled, and especially to take care of the great numbers of our people who from all parts of our territory gather in that city. We covet for our Church and for our people an equipment and advantages at least equal to those provided by our sister churches for their own people.

Therefore, Resolved, 1. That this Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, memorialize the coming General Conference to take such action as will accomplish the purpose of the General Conference of 1858, viz: to aid in the erection in Washington city of a church building representative of our denomination and equal to our needs.

- 2. That the resolutions of the Quarterly Conference of Mt. Vernon Place Church and the accompanying historical sketch be made a part of this memorial.
- 3. That the presiding Bishop, once the preacher in charge of Mt. Vernon Place Church, be requested to appoint a committee of five of the members

of our church, who from their knowledge of the whole situation can give any needed aid in this matter to the delegates elected by this Annual Conference to the General Conference.

Also a memorial signed by John A. Kern and C. D. Bulla.

1. To change the order for the administration of the Lord's Supper, paragraph 475, page 218, of the Discipline, by omitting the sentence. "If the consecrated bread and wine be all spent before all have communed, the elder may consecrate more by repeating the prayer of consecration."

Your committee in recommending concurrence in this memorial has in mind the possibility that the General Conference of 1890 directed that this rubric should be omitted. Because of inaccessibility at this time to the printed Journal of that General Conference, your committee cannot now determine that fact. Your committee, therefore, recommends that the delegates to be elected by this Annual Conference to the next General Conference be requested to examine into the facts, and if no such action has been taken, then to present this memorial; if such action has heretofore been taken, then our delegates are requested to take such steps as shall lead to the omission of the rubric referred to from future editions of the Discipline.

- 2. To change the administration of Baptism to infants, paragraph 476 of the Discipline, so that the words, "and be made a lively member of the same," page 219, shall read "and be made a living member of the same;" and the words, "Grant that whosoever is dedicated to Thee by our office and ministry," page 220, shall read as does the corresponding prayer in the Ministration of Baptism to such as are of riper years, viz: "Grant that he being here dedicated to Thee by our office and ministry;" and the words, "did shed out of His most precious side both water and blood," page 220, shall read, "did shed His most precious blood."
- 3. To change the form of the Solemnization of Matrimony, paragraph 479, so that the words "I pronounce that they are man and wife together," page 236, shall read, "I pronounce that that they are husband and wife together."
- 4. To change the closing sentence in paragraph 99, pages 51, 52, beginning with the word, "the Bishop may appoint," so that the last clause of this sentence, which begins with the words, "provided, however," shall read as follows: "and the time thus spent in school shall count on the time required for trial and also for becoming eligible to orders in the Annual Conference, unless the Conference shall determine otherwise."

As to the above resolutions 2, 3, and 4, we recommend non-concurrence.

5. Also the following memorial signed by Henry P. Hamill and S. K. Cox: That there be inserted after paragraph 138, page 62, a new paragraph, as an additional answer to the question, "What are the duties of the preacher in charge?" the following, viz: "To give notice of the issue of such certificate to the preacher of our church nearest in residence to the member so removing."

MEMOIRS.

REV. JAMES S. PORTER.

On the morning of the meeting of this session of our Conference a note was received announcing the death of Rev. James S. Porter as having occurred on the preceding evening at Front Royal, Va.

Brother Porter was born near Richmond Court House, Va., nearly 72 years ago. His parents are said to have been genuinely pious and devoted members of the Methodist Church. The early years of his life being spent in a home whose atmosphere was so favorable to religion it is not surprising to learn that he was himself converted while yet a child. A little later on, feeling it to be his duty to devote himself to the work of the ministry, he set himself to prepare for this sacred vocation as his life-work.

In 1857 he was admitted on trial into the traveling connection of the Virginia Conference. In that year he was appointed as junior preacher, with Rev. Cyrus Doggett in charge, of Eastville. In 1858, with Rev. J. P. Reed in charge, he was appointed to Prince Edward Circuit. In 1859 he was junior preacher of Prince William Circuit. From 1860 to 1865 he served the following charges: Alleghany, Westmoreland, King George and Prince William.

In 1866 Brother Porter was transferred to the Baltimore Conference, within whose bounds for the next thirty years he served the following charges: Lexington Circuit, Blue Sulphur, Frankford, Highland, Jackson River and Warm Springs, Fairfield, West Augusta, Fauquier, Gainsboro, Prince William, Sudley, Severn, West Harford and Susquehanna, New Market, Mt. Jackson, Frederick and Warren.

In 1899 Brother Porter's health was so feeble as to require that he should be given a superannuated relation, and with two daughters and a son he located at Front Royal, Va., where the last seven years of his earthly life were spent.

In last December Brother Porter was taken rather suddenly ill. It was soon understood from statements of his physician that the nature of his disease was such as to render recovery impossible. He was perfectly acquainted with his condition, and although at times a great sufferer, he bore his sufferings with remarkable patience and fortitude, expressing the desire, that whether living or dying he might magnify the grace of God.

His interest in the salvation of souls continued to the last. He mentioned several persons by name, on one occasion, expressing the wish that they might come to his room, saying: "If nothing else will impress them, I would like, if the Lord be willing, that they might see how a Christian can die."

Brother Porter's religious experience was well defined and most satisfactory. Those who knew him best could not doubt the fact of his conscious access to God in social and public prayer, or that he lived in daily fellowship with the Heavenly Father.

His life was clearly above reproach in every relation and position in which he was found. During his residence in the town where his life closed so easily and peacefully he had the confidence of the entire community as a true and trustworthy man of God. He was undoubtedly "a good man and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith."

REV. SYLVANUS TOWNSEND.

Rev. Sylvanus Townsend, son of William and Annie M. Townsend, was born March 5, 1837, on Cedar Grove farm, near Royal Oak, Talbot county, Md., and died of heart failure at his home in Cecil county, Md., February 1, 1906, aged 68 years, 10 months and 27 days.

Brother Townsend was converted when a boy, and immediately united with the Methodist Episcopal Church. The genuineness of his conversion was subsequently shown by his upright life and manly christian character. Early in life he felt called to preach the gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ; and, in order to prepare for this high and holy calling he was educated at Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pa.

He was admitted on trial into the Philadelphia Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, March 5, 1859; and appointed to Denton Circuit, Caroline county, Md. The next year he was appointed to Harrington Circuit, Kent county, Delaware. In 1861, he was admitted in full connection, ordained deacon by Bishop Simpson of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and appointed to Queen Anne's Circuit, Queen Anne's county, Md. In 1862, he traveled Hillsboro Circuit, Caroline county, Md.; and in 1863 he served Ayries Circuit, Dorchester county, Md. These were years of trials and tribulations, when the manhood of men was tested to its utmost.

At his request he was granted a location in 1864, and in 1866 united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and assisted in the organization of Talbot Circuit. In 1867, he was received into the Baltimore Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, ordained elder by Bishop George E. Pierce, D. D. and appointed junior preacher with Rev. A. Eskridge to Calvert Circuit, Md.; here the spirit graciously attended the ministry of the Word, and about 100 souls were converted.

He subsequently served Greensboro, Md., 1868; as junior preacher with Rev. J. H. DuLaney on Queen Anne's Circuit, Md., 1869; Collierstown, Va., 1870-71; Prince George, Md., 1872-73; Berryville, Va., 1874-75; Brucetown, Va., 1876; Springfield, W. Va., 1877; Upper Marlboro, Md., 1878-79; Prince George, Md., 1880-81-82; Levelton, W. Va., 1883-84; Page, Va., 1885; Frederick, Va., 1886; Cedarville, Va., 1887-88-89-90; Franklin, W. Va.. 1891-92-93, and West Harford, Md., 1894. Upon these charges much success attended his labors, parsonages and churches were built and repaired and he witnessed the conversion of many souls.

Owing to failing health, he was compelled to superannuate in 1895, at which time he retired to the old Bryan farm, Bohemia Manor, Cecil County, Md., where he remained until he was summoned to his heavenly home.

Brother Townsend was a man of positive nature, strong convictions and possessed strength of character to enforce them. As a workman in the vineyard of his Master he was laborious and useful, and as a preacher he was earnest and successful.

Rev. James E. Armstrong says: "I was brought into official and personal relation with Brother Townsend as his Presiding Elder, when he was at Waldorf, on Prince George Circuit, and found him a genial companion and a true friend, greatly beloved by his family and the people whom he served. It was my privilege years later to be associated with him at Jarrettsville, on West Harford Circuit, during a period of deep distress and severe personal suffering. He was a good man, honest, conscientious and faithful. I do not doubt he has gone to his reward in heaven."

Brother Townsend was twice married. His first wife was Miss Anna Isabelle Bryan, of Cecil Co., Md., who preceded him to the better land, His second wife was Miss Maggie Weaver, of Frederick Co., Va., who, together with two sons and two daughters, survives him. We extend our sincere sympathy to the sorrowing family.

His funeral services were conducted at his home on February 3, 1906, by Rev. J. H. Kuhlmann, and his remains tenderly laid to rest in Bethel Cemetery, Cecil County, Md., to await the resurrection of the just.

REV. HENRY DAVID BISHOP.

Rev. Henry David Bishop was born in Buchanan, Botetourt county, Va., April 30, 1842. He was the son of Jas. S. and Martha Bishop, who were blessed with a large family of sons and daughters, who grew up to be worthy men and women, and who were examples of the truth that children trained in the way they should go will not depart from it when old.

The exact date of Brother Bishop's conversion is not definitely known. Of the fact that he was converted, there is not the shadow of a doubt. It was thoroughly conscious and joyful. He rejoiced in it many days, testifying of the grace of God, and urging others to seek the same salvation.

He entered the Confederate Army in the first year of the war, enlisting in the Botetourt Artillery, and cheerfully and faithfully discharged the duties, and endured the privations of a soldier's life until he was rendered incapable of further service, by the loss of his-left leg, in the battle of Cold Harbor, in the time of the Seven Days' Battles, around Richmond.

After the close of the war, realizing a distinct and Divine call to the ministry, he diligently applied himself to the work of preparation for that high and holy calling.

He was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Fairfield Circuit, held at Greenville, Augusta county, Va., on 31st day of October, 1868, Rev. E. F. Busey, Presiding Elder.

At the Conference held in Trinity Church, Baltimore, March, 1869, he was admitted on trial, together with F. H. Shipley, Frazier Furr, George T. Tyler, Wm. O. Ross, R. S. Shreve, Samuel W. Haddaway, and was appointed to Rockingham Circuit, E. F. Busey, P. E. In 1870 he was with Rev. Mr. Reed, on E. Rockingham. He was received into full connection and ordained a Deacon at Salem by Bishop Peirce, March 12, 1871, and was sent to Rockingham Mission as preacher in charge, where he remained two years. In March, 1873, he was ordained an Elder, and was assigned to Elk Run. In 1874 he was at Greenville Circuit.

On May 6, 1875, he was happily married to Miss Jennie Smith by Rev. J. S. Porter, and began a faithful and successful ministry of three years on Highland Circuit. In 1878 he had charge of Sinking Creek Circuit. Upper Botetourt was the field of his ministerial and pastoral labors in 1879. The next year went to Hillsdale. 1880 he was at Hinton. In 1882 was appointed to Bath, but before beginning his work he was changed by the Presiding Elder and sent to Fairfield, which he served for two years. Warm Springs Mission received the benefit of his ministry in 1884. In 1885 he was assigned to Port Republic, which he served for three years; 1890-91 Furnace Mission was his field; 1892-3-4 he was at Bell's Valley. 1895-98 he did faithful work on the difficult charge of Milboro. The year 1899 was the last of his effective ministry, and was spent on Green Sulphur Mission. At the Conference of 1900 he, under the pressure of increasing infirmities, asked for and was granted a superannuated relation. On his retirement from active work he first settled in Harrisonburg, Va., where he was highly esteemed, both for his personal worth and for the valuable services he rendered the church there. In 1904 he purchased a home in Covington, Va., to which he removed last July.

He was comfortably and happily situated. Here he expected to spend the closing years of his life. Both he and his wife had friends and relations in Covington. He was loved by church and highly esteemed by the people who knew him.

During the winter he had been engaged in the sale of books by subscription, and had secured a large number of orders. On Saturday May 13, he

was at work delivering books. On his way home he was stopped at a street railway crossing, and within a few hundred feet of the parsonage, by a heavy freight train going past. He stood very near the outer rail of the west-bound track watching the passing train. He was seen by a colored woman, who at the same time noticed a freight train going west approaching. She called to him, but failed to get his attention. An instant before he was struck he seemed to have realized his danger, as he was seen to stoop forward. This action was accounted for by his wife, who said that sometimes his artificial limb failed to act, and it was necessary for him to lean forward to adjust it. It appears he was in the act of doing this when struck by the pilot of the engine.

His injuries were a severe bruise on the left side of his face and eye; also a contusion of left shoulder and arm. There was a small wound over the left eye, which fractured the skull; also a larger one at back of the head.

He was borne to his home and every service that medical skill and tender sympathy could render were given, but without avail. He lingered in absolute unconsciousness until 2 o'clock Sunday morning and passed without a struggle into the realization of his long-sought rest, the rest of an eternal Sabbath.

He was buried Monday, from the church at Covington. Rev. J. R. Van Horne, assisted by Revs. W. H. Sanders and A. C. McNeer, conducted the services.

Brother Bishop was well known and highly esteemed in the Conference. A man of God, a true Christian, a faithful minister and pastor, a devoted husband, a sincere friend. He exemplified the virtues of the Christian life in his character and conduct.

His religious experience was rich and joyous. The services of God's house were seasons of joy and spiritual refreshment to him. He was especially efficient as a teacher in the Sunday School. He loved his brethren in the ministry, sympathized with them in their labor and rejoiced in their success.

He left no dying testimony, but his Godly life, his faithful ministry, and a well-rounded Christian character, are a higher witness to his readiness for his exodus from the world than any last words could be.

"Servant of God, well done;
Thy glorious warfare past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last."

3d. The expenses for the programme will approximate \$150.00 which can be met, provided fifty men will attend, paying \$3.00 each for tuition.

The expenses for board and lodging at the Academy will be \$5 for the term.

4th. If the Conference approve, we ask the privilege of making a canvass of the Conference, for subscribers, to a guarantee fund of \$150.00 at the rate of \$3.00 each.

5th. That a committee be appointed to have in charge the arrangements for the Institute.
