FIRST DAY.

The Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its One Hundred and Twenty-sixth Session in Mount Vernon Place M. E. Church, South, Washington, D. C., Wednesday, March 23rd, 1910, at 9 o'clock A. M.

"XXIII .- Of the Duty of Christians to the Civil Authority.

"It is the duty of all Christians, and especially of all Christian ministers, to observe and obey the laws and commands of the governing or supreme authority of the country of which they are citizens or subjects or in which they reside, and to use all laudable means to encourage and enjoin obedience to the powers that be."

REPORT NO. 2 OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Never before, in the history of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, has there been such progress made in missions as has been made during the past year, and we are pleased to see that the Baltimore Conference is giving promise of being among those in front rank. The increase in collections, the progress of the Laymen's Missionary Movement, and the constant demand for our missionary literature, all seem to indicate that we are being awakened to a sense of our obligation.

Last year, twenty-four (24) annual conferences paid out their mission assessments in full, a gain of two (2) over the previous year.

We congratulate our ladies of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society on the excellent report that they have been able to make through their corresponding secretary, and join them in their earnest prayers that God, through the Holy Spirit, stir up the uninterested in our charges to realize the value of an organization in every appointment.

It is very encouraging to note the progress that has been made in the number of Sunday Schools, Epworth Leagues and other organizations of our church, which are making special contributions to missions, over and above their regular assessments.

We rejoice to note the progress of the Laymen's Missionary Movement in our Conference during the past year, and in this report wish to assure these Godly men of our heartfelt interest in their great plans. The Board of Missions wishes, in this report, to express its thanks to Rev. W. H. Best, our Conference Missionary Secretary, for the faithful and efficient service rendered during the past year.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

1st. We recommend the holding of an anniversary, as per Discipline, and that Friday night of the next Annual Conference be set apart for that purpose.

2nd. That we call the attention of every pastor to paragraph 247 of the Discipline, which requires that every Sunday School shall be organized into a missionary society. 3rd. That the fourth department of the Epworth League be made a practical working factor for the dissemination of missionary information.

4th. That we urge the preachers of this Conference to call the attention of the Sunday Schools, Epworth Leagues and Missionary Societies to the great variety and excellent quality of our missionary publications, which can be secured from the educational department of our Board of Missions for the asking.

We especially urge a campaign in every charge for subscriptions to our missionary periodical, "Go Forward."

5th. That our motto be missionary assessments in full as the least that the Conference should do and that we work and pray to bring about such a result.

6th. That every pastor do his best to organize Mission Study Classes among his young people.

7th. Your Board notes with profound interest, the development of plans and materials, through the Educational Department of the Board of Missions, for the missionary education of the church. We wish especially to call attention to the missionary policy for the Sunday School, as adopted by joint action of the Sunday School Board and Board of Missions; and to recommend to our pastors the use of the materials available for the cultivation of the Sunday School as a missionary force. An excellent missionary literature is provided by this department, and is well adapted to the needs of the Epworth League, the women's societies, the Laymen's Missionary Movement and other departments of church activity. A wise and thorough use of the plans and materials now at our command will greatly aid the pastors in the development of an intelligent missionary interest in the church and in securing an increase in missionary giving.

The Rev. D. L. Blakemore is recommended for appointment as Conference Missionary Secretary in connection with a regular appointment.

The good work done by the Laymen's Missionary Movement and other Missionary organizations is shown in the decided increase in the amounts paid on Foreign Missions, the Conference overpaying its assessment for the first time in its history, the excess beyond the assessment being \$1,665.00. We recommend a thorough organization of all missionary societies for the coming Conference year.

REPORT OF CORRESPONDING SECRETARY OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH, 1910.

Dear Fathers and Brethren-

I present to you the report of the Treasurer of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Baltimore Conference. You will note that it shows a decided increase in funds; nearly three hundred dollars in excess of last year's report. This I regard as a great advance on previous years; since it does not mean large gifts, or indicate growth in number of our membership, but comes from deeper devotion of the women who have been serving their Master in this manner. We desire that all the women in our Conference may become members of our Society, and join in our efforts to send the Gospel to heathen women and children. We ask the aid of the brethren in all our work.

The general work of our Society is indicated by figures. We have ninety-three adult auxiliaries, with nearly twenty-four hundred members; twenty-seven bands of Young People, with nearly four hundred members; and twenty-six juvenile societies, with two hundred and fifty members; a total membership of about three thousand. It is impossible to obtain exact figures. The special objects outside of the regular work of our Woman's Board of Foreign Missions are the support of the Susan Bond Wilson School, in China; the support of one missionary already employed; and the undertaking of two new ones not yet appointed; four Bible women and seven scholarships. In addition to these, the Young People's Societies of the Conference plan to undertake a missionary's salary themselves during the coming year.

There is undoubtedly a real awakening of interest among the women, and signs of desire for information about missions at large as well as about our own church work. It is the earnest wish of the officers of our Society to plan more largely and execute more effectively than ever before.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

RANDOLPH-MACON SYSTEM.

We are pleased to report the Randolph-Macon System of Schools still holding its high and honored position in not only our immediate territory, but among the institutions of learning in our country.

Words of commendation have come from leading educators for the admirable work that is being done, and for the efficient management of the schools. The Church will be pleased to know that the past year has been, under the circumstances, a year of progress and success, which evidences the interest in and attests the close relationship of our people with these institutions.

It is gratifying to state the addition of \$40,000.00 in cash to the endowment of the College at Ashland, and to note the increased enrollment of the Schools. The total enrollment in the System is over 1,200. The endowment of the two Colleges now amounts to \$471,349.23, and the property of the System is reported a valuation of \$871,304.76. These Schools are served by 115 officers and teachers, who are giving efficient service in the cause of Christian education, and merit the co-operation of our constituency. We heartily commend the Randolph-Macon System to the ministry and laity for any help or assistance they can render.

CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOL.

With this year the Correspondence School closes its second quadrennium. During the eight years, out of the some 6,500 ministers in the church, 2,500 have been enlisted as students in the School, or about 40 per cent. of the entire number. These have taken, on an average, two courses each, and of the courses taken, 61 per cent. have been completed in full. 27 per cent. in part, and only 12 per cent. dropped. This shows something of the far-reaching benefits of the correspondence work to our ministry.

In addition to correspondence courses, the School is seeking to serve the ministry in several other ways, as through the extensive lectures, the Extension Library and the Summer Institute at Vanderbilt. Through such instrumentalities, a considerable number of ministers, not enrolled as regular students of the School, are being aided in their studies and work.

During the past two years, by order of the General Board of Education, the Correspondence School has been giving attention to the matter of ministerial supply. Statistics have been gathered showing the need for more ministers; the conditions under which our young men are called have been investigated; our colleges have been visited, and the students addressed touching the ministry, and literature dealing with this matter has been distributed throughout the Church. During the past year four thousand copies of Mott's "Future Leadership of the

Church" have been placed in the hands of our preachers, as a result, in part, of such efforts. It is gratifying to note that during the past year more men have applied for admission into our Conferences than in any one year in the history of our Church.

SOUTHERN SEMINARY SYSTEM.

The Southern Seminary System includes the Southern Seminary, at Buena Vista, Va.; the Alleghany Collegiate Institute, at Alderson, West Va., and the Bowling Green Seminary, at Bowling Green, Va.

SOUTHERN SEMINARY.

The Southern Seminary is an institution of which the Methodists of the Baltimore Conference may be justly proud. It is beautifully and healthfully located, and in addition to its intellectual advantages it enjoys a social and religious atmosphere which is of the highest order. It holds no complicated relation to our Conference, yet is doing for our girls all that Front Royal is doing for our boys. The property is valued at \$100,000.00, and is admirably adapted for educational work. It has an able and accomplished faculty of nineteen professors and a present student enrollment of 125. Your Board commends this School as in all respects worthy the patronage of our people. We recommend that William Stevens, W. H. H. Joyce and J. H. Light, or their successors, be appointed a visiting committee, their expenses being paid by the Seminary, and we urge that this committee make a report to the Board of Education in writing.

ALLEGHANY COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE.

This School is located in a rich, prosperous and progressive section of our Conference, and supplies a need for a Methodist School for our boys and girls in that part of our Conference territory. The Institution has a faculty of nine professors and a present enrollment of 107 pupils. The value of the property is now \$22,000.00, and has increased \$7,000 during the year. The plant shows every indication of being in a healthful condition. Your Board believes that the members and friends of our Conference, especially in the Lewisburg District, will make no mistake in sending their boys and girls to the Alleghany Collegiate Institute. We recommend that D. M. Brown, W. H. Best and A. M. Cackley, D. D., or their successors, be appointed a visiting committee and their expenses paid by the Institute, and we urge that this committee make a report to the Board in writing.

BOWLING GREEN SEMINARY.

At the request of the management, we recommend the Reverend C. K. Millican as Resident Principal of Bowling Green Seminary, Rev. S. A. Parker, resigned.

APPOINTMENTS RECOMMENDED.

We recommend that the Conference request the Bishop to appoint Rev. J. A. Kern, D. D., and Rev. Collins Denny, D. D., professors in Vanderbilt University; Rev. H. P. Hamill, D. D., Conference Secretary and Treasurer of Education; Rev. J. B. Hupman and S. J. Lester Du Laney, students at Randolph-Macon College; Rev. James Keene, student at Vanderbilt University; and Rev. L. S. Shires, Principal of Alleghany Collegiate Institute.

We recommend an assessment of \$4,000.00 for the benefit of R.-M. College at Ashland and Randolph Academy at Front Royal, and \$1,835.00 for educational extension, as assessed upon this Conference by the General Board of Education under the direction of the General Conference.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

To say that the Sunday School is of great and growing importance in the church and in the community is but to state a fact that is well-nigh universally accepted, for the Sunday School's pre-eminence as an educational influence, as a moral force and as an evangelizing agency, is fully and thoroughly recognized, not only by intelligent Christian people, but also by all classes of the well-informed among the general public.

The echoes which come to us from the general field indicate that Sunday School interest, enthusiasm and efficiency are running at high tide. We take pleasure in reporting that the condition of the work throughout our Conference is satisfactory and gratifying. The number of schools has increased 20, since last Conference, and is now 620; while the total enrollment has increased almost exactly three thousand, and stands at more than fifty-nine thousand. This total is within a very few hundreds of the church membership in the Conference, and places us, as to proportional numerical strength, in the forefront of Southern Methodism, as we have long been, in efficient work. The report of the Sunday School Editor shows a splendid increase in enrollment in the church at large, and indicates a healthy condition of progress.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

Our annual convention continues to be a source of great help to those who attend, and a means of stirring up enthusiasm and creating interest in the work. The convention of the past year was held at Front Royal, Va., and was of great profit to the more than 250 of our workers

who were present. This year, we are to meet at Trinity Church, Roanoke, Va., June 14-16, and the Board assures our workers a programme fully up to the high standard that has been maintained for the past several years. We have re-elected Hon. M. L. Walton as President and W. W. Millan as Secretary of the Convention, and these officers, with the President of the Board and Rev. W. F. Locke, will have charge of the programme.

DISTRICT ORGANIZATION.

Good results continue to flow from the institute work in the Districts, five of which have been organized according to the uniform plan adopted two years ago and amended last year. Successful institutes have been held in three of these during the past year. We expect to continue to push this work and have made an appropriation to aid it in Districts where financial assistance is required.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LITERATURE.

We again express our appreciation of the high character of the Sunday School literature and lesson-helps issued by our Publishing House, and commend the enterprise and faithful service of our Sunday School Editor, Dr. Chappell. With the great flood of such literature issued by denominational and private publishing houses, our own holds rank with the very best. We especially call attention to the "Home Department Quarterly" and the "Adult Student," publications of comparatively recent birth, but fully equal to the oldest and best in the field. No teacher in a Southern Methodist Sunday School, whatever the method he pursues, ought to be without our Teachers' Magazine. We recommend that our officers and teachers give careful consideration to the new Graded Lesson Course, which is being introduced in many of our schools, with good results.

MISSIONARY

It is gratifying to note that the effectiveness of the Sunday School as the rallying point for missionary interest and effort continues unabated. The work there, supplemented, as it has been this year, by efforts put forth through other agencies, such as the Laymen's Missionary Movement, has resulted in full payment, or a surplus, in most of the Districts. We recommend that our schools make it their aim to not only raise the missionary assessment, but to take up some special mission work in addition.

We have adopted and approved the educational features of a new missionary policy for Sunday Schools, promulgated by our General Board and the General Board of Missions, the particulars of which may be obtained from Dr. Ed. F. Cook, Educational Secretary, Nashville, Tenn., but have decided that our policy of taking the offerings in the schools should be continued.

MEETING OF BOARD PRESIDENTS.

During the year, a meeting of the Presidents of the Conference Sunday School Boards, for counsel and comparison of views and plans, was held at Nashville, Tenn. Our President attended this meeting. We are pleased to note that he returns to us, after a survey of the whole field, confirmed in the view that the Baltimore Conference is one of the banner Conferences in Sunday School Work. This meeting is to be made a regular annual affair, and we have authorized our President to attend the one to be held during the coming year.

CHILDREN'S DAY OFFERINGS.

We congratulate our schools upon the fact that there has been a large increase in the offerings on Children's Day, and urge them to yet greater efforts in this direction. The surplus of this fund, after paying the expenses of the Board, paying to the Board of Education and the General Conference Sunday School Board, ten per cent. each, as required by the Discipline, and providing for needy Sunday Schools within our bounds, goes to endow a chair of religious pedagogy in Vanderbilt University. An earnest effort is to be made to complete this endowment, which is to be \$50,000.00, within the present year. Many of our schools did not take an offering on Children's Day last year; at least none was reported to us; a number never take it. We urge that all do so this year, and that an effort be made to increase the offerings in schools where they have been taken. Owing to the fact that the General Conference will be in session in May, and for other good reasons, we recommend that Sunday, June 12th, be observed as Children's Day. Programmes will, as usual, be supplied, without charge, to all schools which apply for them and agree to take an offering for the Children's Day Fund. The Board has adopted a plan for promoting these offerings which it earnestly hopes will be generally followed. It adopts the motto, "An offering from every school and everybody," and provides that a period of four consecutive Sundays in every year to be known as Children's Day Period be set apart, and that on the three Sundays next preceding the Children's Day proper prominence be given to the service and its objects in the announcements and the church bulletins, and that these objects be emphasized by pastors, superintendents and teachers. It is also proposed to print an attractive leaflet which will be placed in the hands of all officers and teachers, and a special Children's Day Contribution envelope in sufficient quantity to supply every school. A member of the Board in each District has been designated to put this plan into operation.

BOOK DEPOSITORY AT STAUNTON, VIRGINIA.

The Book Depository at Staunton, Va.; under the direction of Brother E. B. Lipscomb, continues to merit our cordial approval, which is hereby accorded, and the support of our schools, which is respectfully urged.

NEEDY SUNDAY SCHOOLS AND NEW SCHOOLS.

The Board, in harmony with the purposes for which it is organized, reminds our preachers and laymen that it stands ready to aid, to a reasonable extent, needy schools anywhere within our Conference territory. Application should be made to either of the officers of the Board. In this connection, we urge the formation of new schools, believing that there are many fields not yet occupied and that the formation of new schools in these places would result in strengthening all our church work.

TRAINED TEACHERS AND OFFICIAL SUPPORT.

The necessity for teachers properly equipped for their work, and the desirability that the official membership of the church support and encourage the Sunday School in every way, are as great as ever. We renew our recommendations made under these two heads, last year, and especially urge a more extended use of our Teacher Training Course.

World's Convention.

The World's Sixth Sunday School Convention, which is to be held in our National Capital, May 19-24, should be the occasion of a great awakening in Sunday School and Missionary effort. We recommend that our people be much in prayer, during the conversion period, for a blessing upon these great lines of work.

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

REPORT NO. 1.

To the Baltimore Annual Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South——

We have pleasure in reporting that the work of church extension is very evident all over our Conference territory. Nowhere more so than in our Southern Districts. Our people have generously responded to the appeal for church extension funds, which amounted this year to the sum of \$7,658.25. Yet applications for help are far in excess of funds in hand. Dr. McMurry, our General Secretary of Church Extension, has again renewed his offer to give us dollar for dollar on any amount we raise, over the General Board's assessment, such amount, with his gift, being for use in our own territory. We recommend that the assessment this year be \$11,500.00.

DISTRICT CONFERENCES.

Feeling the importance of our people being fully informed concerning the work, we have asked our Executive Committee to appoint special representatives to each District Conference, and urge the Presiding Elders to give them ample opportunity to represent the cause.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BIRTHDAY OFFERINGS.

The General Board has requested Birthday offerings in the schools for church building in Oklahoma. We recommend that our schools, as far as possible, observe this request.

BALTIMORE CONFERENCE LOAN FUND.

We recommend the setting aside, each year, of ten per cent. of the money at the disposal of the Conference Board, to form a Conference Loan Fund, said fund to be used within the bounds of our own Conference and administered by the Conference Board, through the General Board.

MEETINGS OF CONFERENCE REPRESENTATIVES.

The meeting held at Memphis, Tenn., last April, was a great success. We commend the regular holding of such meetings, and instruct our Executive Committee to appoint representatives, should one be held this year. We favor the holding of this conference at the time and place of the meeting of the General Board.

REPRESENTATIVE CHURCH AT WASHINGTON, D. C.

We are gratified to learn of the progress which has been made in the matter of the Washington City Representative Church, under the management of Bishops Candler and Hoss and Dr. McMurry (who constitute the commission representing the General Conference), aided by the splendid work of Rev. George S. Sexton, Assistant Secretary of the General Board of Church Extension. A National Building Committee has been appointed to co-operate with the General Conference Commission, composed of representative business men. carefully selected from all parts of our territory, as follows:

Governor George W. Donaghey, of Arkansas; R. S. Munger, of Alabama; J. E. Wall, of Florida; Asa G. Candler, of Georgia; J. Adger Stewart, of Kentucky; John P. Scott, of Louisiana; Murry Carleton, of Missouri; J. L. Dantzler, of Mississippi; J. S. Carr, of North Carolina; T. P. Howell, of Oklahoma; H. P. Williams, of South Carolina; John R. Pepper and R. B. Davenport, of Tennessee; Jesse H. Jones and J. W. Slaughter, of Texas; John P. Branch and R. A. Schoolfield, of Virginia, and John C. Mayo, of West Virginia.

The Building Committee has entered actively upon its duties, and, we are informed, has already accomplished substantial and gratifying results.

We hereby again express our profound belief in the wisdom of this movement and promise it our continued earnest and hearty support, in the confident hope of its early and complete success.

BALTIMORE CITY CHURCH.

The steps taken to erect a monumental church in Baltimore City command our whole-hearted commendation. The erection of such a church will, we believe, not only help our work in that city, but throughout the whole Conference, to which it gives its name. The large sum of nearly \$100,000.00 already contributed gives most cheering assurance of success, and encourages all in the effort of securing the balance of \$56,000.00. We give this our heartiest endorsement.

WOMAN'S HOME MISSION SOCIETY.

We have received the report of the Woman's Home Mission Society, and note with pleasure the progress they are making.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

To the Baltimore Conference, M. E. Church South:-

The Bible Board, during the past year, has endeavored to bring before the membership of our church the necessity of liberal contributions to the American Bible Society. We are gratified, because we can report a decided increase in the contributions of this year; but, still, we feel that the collections should have been larger.

The work of the American Bible Society is world-wide and deserves our hearty support. It is a positive necessity for the intelligent and fruitful spread of the Gospel, and without its aid in spreading the Scriptures in the native tongues of the heathen the church would be seriously hindered in her mission. The amount of money to be raised by the Society in order to secure the gift of \$500,000.00 from Mrs. Russell Sage is now practically assured. While we rejoice in the success of this enterprise, we are especially gratified with the response to this special call throughout the bounds of our Conference.

We regret to find that no collection for the Bible cause was taken in 17 of our charges, some of them being among our more prominent appointments. We insist that the requirements of the Discipline be followed by every pastor.

We recommend that our pastors preach at least once a year on this most important work, and also avail themselves of any opportunity to have agents of local auxiliaries preach in their charges and assist in the collections. We recommend, secondly, that the Presiding Elders emphasize the collection for the American Bible Society in the charges of their respective Districts. Thirdly, we recommend that the cause be presented and the collections taken early in the year.

We insist that all money raised for the American Bible Society be paid to the Treasurer of the Bible Board. Should there be a sufficient reason for giving the collections from any charge to a local auxiliary, and a request from the pastor to that effect be presented to the Board, the Treasurer will be instructed to apply the funds as requested.

REPORT NO. 1-COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

We, your Committee, beg leave to make the following report:

The Baltimore Southern Methodist, our Conference organ, deserves our special mention and most careful consideration. We are glad to note the successful operation of the paper during this year, in that the Board of Directors have been able to publish the paper and meet all its financial obligations.

For six years, under trying conditions, it has continued to visit our homes with messages of encouragement and inspiration. It has done much to cultivate the connectional spirit in our people and to enlarge their vision. It seems to be indispensable to the work of the church. We thoroughly appreciate the untiring efforts of the Board of Directors, and the very efficient services of the Editor, Brother E. V. Regester. But we also realize both the injustice and the impossibility of continuing the practical arrangement in the publication of the paper; and whereas it appears from the report of the Board of Directors to your Committee that we must make a decidedly forward movement or end the existence of the paper. Be it therefore,

Resolved, First—That the Conference make itself responsible for the salary of the Editor and Business Manager, and to this end make an assessment on the Conference for \$3,000, or such part of it as the Conference may deem wise, said assessment to be apportioned on the Districts after the usual plan of apportionment.

Second—That this assessment be a separate assessment, taking its place in the Conference Minutes as such. If any surplus remain after the payment of the Editor's salary, said surplus to be retained by the Joint Board of Finance until disposed of by Conference action.

Third—That we commend the recommendation of the Board of Directors requesting the Bishop to appoint Rev. Charles D. Bulla Editor and Business Manager of the Baltimore Southern Methodist.

Fourth—That we recommend the continuation of the guarantee plan operated by the Board of Directors during last year, commending the effort to increase the fund to \$2,000.

Referring again to the Conference organ and to the resolution that steps be taken looking toward the establishment of a Joint Organ with other Conferences, we recommend that no such steps be taken at the present time, and that the Board of Directors again be given the same business opportunities with which they achieved the financial success of the past year.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

We, your Committee, beg leave to submit the following report:—
The time has passed, in the history of temperance reform, for long preambles and glittering generalities. We have reached the stage of action.

The legalized beverage liquor traffic is a disgrace to our people and a constant menace to our Christian civilization. The results of recent investigations by special committees of commercial, benevolent, legislative, scientific and religious bodies show more conclusively than ever that the beverage liquor traffic is the greatest contributing cause of moral perversity, commercial waste, political corruption, criminality, disease, insanity, poverty, ignorance and the sum total of all human misery, wretchedness and wickedness.

The statistics in every liquor-dominated city in this Republic show the saloon to be the Church's greatest competitor for the young manhood of the Nation, and that it bars more effectually than anything else the Church's approach with the Gospel of the Son of God.

While the abolition of this traffic is primarily a moral issue, yet inasmuch as it is authorized and protected by the civil law, it is necessary, in order to destroy it, to secure legislation that will withdraw from it the sanction and protection of the civil authorities and make it a criminal in law as it already is in fact.

Within the Baltimore Conference territory is presented the anomalous and paradoxical condition of the liquor traffic fighting before the General Assembly of the State of Virginia with the determination of desperation for the principle of Local Option, as being the only sane method of dealing with the traffic in intoxicants, while in the adjacent State of Maryland the same traffic, at the same time, before a similar body, with the same vigor and determination, fought against the principle of Local Option as being subversive of the rights and contrary to the interests of the whole State.

But in either case the duty of the enemies of the beverage liquor traffic is clear. Standing by their oft-expressed determination to destroy the saloon, they must see to it that their representatives in the General Assemblies reflect the moral sentiment of the Church of God and of the intelligent, patriotic citizenship of the communities from which they come on this great question.

As a body of Christian ministers and laymen we hereby declare our position by the adoption of the following resolution:—

Be it Resolved—

- 1. That the legalized beverage liquor traffic is a community, State and National sin, and we pledge ourselves to fight for its complete extinction in town, State and Nation.
- 2. That law enforcement and law enactment are equally important, and we earnestly urge our people to strive both for the elevation to official position of those who will enact desirable legislation and of those who will strictly enforce the laws, so that the will of the people for the suppression and destruction of the curse may be given vital expression and permanent effect.

- 3. That we rejoice in the increased number of daily papers which are disposed to be fair to the temperance cause; that while the above is true, we deplore the fact that as the temperance question becomes more acute, the pro-liquor papers become more hostile in their attitude and more reprehensible in their methods; that we warn our people everywhere that the liquor-dominated papers have entered upon a campaign of misrepresentation for the specific purpose of discrediting the temperance leaders and destroying the organization of the Anti-Saloon League.
- 4. That we urge our pastors and teachers to preach and teach the Bible doctrine that drunkenness is a crime against the individual, against society, against God, and to impress upon the minds of our young people the danger of moderate drinking and the value of total abstinence, and we especially commend to local societies and to town and city governments the use of posters in public places setting forth the evils that follow the use of intoxicating liquors.
- 5. That we heartily endorse the conservative and practical methods of the Anti-Saloon League; that we rejoice in the great results that have followed its work within the bounds of our Conference, and we hereby pledge ourselves to give the officers and workers of the League a welcome hearing in our churches at least once annually, and we pledge ourselves to give the League our moral and financial support.
- 6. That we heartily commend the effort of the Anti-Saloon League of Virginia to secure to the people the right to vote on the question of the abolition of the saloon as a separate issue, entirely apart from any personal or political complications. The thanks of the people are due to the officers of the League for the brave fight recently made to secure such legislative action as would have left the whole question in the hands of the people. We deeply regret that their effort was not successful, and we call upon our people to recognize their responsibility as citizens for the existence of this legalized curse, and to meet their obligations as, Christian citizens by using all honorable and proper means to abolish it forever from our land.
- 7. That in view of the present situation in the State of Maryland, we feel it our duty and desire to declare in the most unequivocal way, our historic and unalterable opposition to the present alliance between the State and the liquor traffic, and we heartily commend the effort of the Anti-Saloon League of the State of Maryland to secure the passage of a Local Option law for the State.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The Sabbath is the Lord's Day. He rested from all His works after the creation of the world and sanctified the day, commanding us to keep it holy. The Fourth Commandment was made a part of the Decalogue by the Creator—the source of all law. He has never repealed it; no other being has the authority to do so. It is just as vital, just as binding, today as when first promulgated.

In this age of commercialism and worldliness the temptation to ignore this law is very great, and this holy day is constantly being descrated, both in business and in social life. The all-absorbing and unremitting pursuit of business during six days of the week but too often leads to the unrestricted pursuit of ease and pleasure on the seventh.

It is urged by some that under the complex conditions of our modern life it is essential to the well-being of many classes of our population that the day should be largely given up to some form of healthful recreation. Near our larger centers of population various forms of recreation, in themselves harmless, or even highly beneficial, are engaged in on the Sabbath Day, but usually in a quiet and more or less unobtrusive way.

To the credit of our Christian civilization, be it said, up to the present time but little in the way of organized sport on the Sabbath for the entertainment of the public has been attempted in any of the Eastern cities of our Union. If, however, statements appearing in the daily press are to be credited, arrangements are now being made in a neighboring city, within the bounds of our Conference, for Sunday baseball games between professional teams, and the sporting element of that city is assured a high-grade presentation of the National game on practically every Sunday of the coming baseball season.

What can be done to arrest this lawlessness? Shall we as ministers and members of the Church of Christ be silent and look on with indifference while the world tramples upon the law of God? We cannot be silent without becoming partakers of other men's sins.

Therefore, be its Resolved :-

1st. That we call upon all of our people to refuse to patronize or encourage the Sunday newspaper, Sunday excursions, Sunday sports and, as far as possible, Sunday railroad travel or traffic, and every other form of Sabbath desecration.

2nd. That we discourage Sunday visiting, and teach our people that the Sabbath is a day set apart for the worship of God, and that the sanctuary and the Sunday School are the places towards which their steps and those of their children and servants should tend on the Lord's Day, and that no Sunday visitors should be allowed to keep them from their religious duties.

3rd. That sermons of Sabbath observance be preached throughout the bounds of our Conference territory during the month of June, and that attention be called to this resolution through the columns of our Conference organ the last week in May.

4th. That our ministers, as the representatives and leaders of our people, be urged to bring to the attention of the civil authorities all violations of the Sabbath laws enacted by our State and municipal governments, coming under their observation, and to enter, in the name of our church, an earnest and solemn protest against all such violations.

Finally, your committee would respectfully suggest that this Conference consider the advisability of sending a memorial to our next General Conference, asking that the Discipline be so amended as to place a sermon on Sabbath observance on the same basis as the sermon on Christian Education.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FEDERATION.

The Committee on Federation beg leave to report that during the past year no new complaints of the violation of proper fraternal relations between the Methodist Episcopal Church and our church within our territory have reached us, while we are happy to state that the matters of which complaint in the Roanoke and Lewisburg Districts was mentioned in our report at the last session of the Conference have been materially, if not wholly, abated. For this result we feel that we owe our thanks largely to the kind and active intervention of the Committee on Federation of the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, as also, no doubt, to the influence exerted by the General Commission on Federation of the two churches, to whom the complaints were referred.

We regret, however, to be compelled to say that in the Rockingham District the conditions complained of at our last session have not improved. As appears from the report of Brother G. D. White, the Presiding Elder, the aggressive movements of the West Virginia Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in that territory continue to violate the spirit and practice of true fraternity and federation. We recommend that the Conference again call the attention of the General Commission on Federation to this unhappy state of affairs there.

Copies of papers relating to the cases of certain of our churches situated within the territory jointly occupied by the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church and by us were, in December, forwarded to their Committee on Federation for their consideration, with the suggestion that, if desired by them, we might have a meeting of the Joint Commission, constituted of the two committees, at some time before the meeting of our two Annual Conferences, but, beyond the acknowledgment of the receipt of the papers sent, we have not thus far heard from their committee, and accordingly no joint meeting has been held.

At the last session of the Conference, by direction of the Conference and at the suggestion of Dr. G. B. Sanford, Secretary of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, "the powers of the Committee on Federation were enlarged so as to take into consideration the federation of all Christian organizations." Accordingly, correspondence was had with Dr. Sanford during the year with reference to the general subject, and consideration otherwise given to it.

This great movement is now fully organized and in successful operation. The Council meets every four years, and meantime its Executive Committee, composed of representatives of the various denominations, of which Brother A. B. Pugh, of our Conference, is one of the members. representing our church, meets annually. The last meeting was held in Louisville, Kentucky, in December, 1909. Thirty-three denominations, with seventeen millions of communicants, have united by the action of their highest official bodies, in co-operation to secure the objects of the Federation. These are principally as stated by the Federation:

"1. To express the fellowship and catholic unity of the Christian Church;

"2. To bring the Christian bodies of America into united service for Christ and the world;

"3. To encourage devotional fellowship and mutual counsel concerning the spiritual life and religious activities of the churches."

The movement began with the great Inter-Church Conference held in New York City, November, 1905, when a constitution for a Federal Council, composed of representatives from all the Evangelical Protestant Churches in America, was agreed upon. This constitution was duly ratified by those churches almost without exception, our own church included, and went into operation with the first meeting of the Council in Philadelphia, Pa., in December, 1908. Encouraging progress in the work has been made since. It is intended that State and local Federations be organized throughout the United States and Canada in every State and in every city and town where there are churches of different denominations existing. Four National Districts "in strategic centres of population, representing different sections of the country,

besides the central office in New York City," each having a Superintendent to develop the work, are now being organized. In this connection, Dr. Sanford writes that "later in the year we may be able to call together a group of representatives appointed by the denominational organizations, covering the State of Maryland and the District of Columbia," and he suggests that "at least five delegates should be selected to represent your Conference when this meeting is called."

We cordially commend this great movement of the churches to the interest and prayers of our people and their active efforts in its behalf in their respective localities, and we recommend to the Conference that, in compliance with Dr. Sanford's request, five delegates be appointed from this Conference to represent us in the meeting contemplated by Dr. Sanford during the ensuing year.

MEMOIRS.

REV. SAMUEL KEENER COX, D. D.

Samuel Keener Cox was born in Baltimore, Md., July 16, 1823, and died in Harrisonburg, Va., November 27, 1909. His father, Luther J. Cox, was a Local Preacher in the Methodist Church. His mother was a Miss Keener and an aunt of the late Bishop Keener. In youth he enjoyed rare educational advantages, of which he made diligent use.

In response to early impressions of a call to preach he made the ministry his life work, and in March, 1844, he joined the Maryland Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, of which his father was one of the founders, in 1828.

In this church he rendered efficient service for twenty-two years, serving as pastor in Washington, D. C., Wilmington, Delaware, Charleston, S. C., and Georgetown, D. C. In 1853 he was called to the Professorship of Mental and Moral Philosophy in Madison College, Uniontown, Pa. Being an ardent Southerner, Dr. Cox. along with several of his colleagues in the college work, on account of the aggressive and often offensive anti-slavery agitation in the North, resigned his position and returned to the more congenial atmosphere of Virginia. He went to Lynchburg, where he established a college, which prospered until the war. Here he established also a school for young ladies.

In 1859 he moved to Alabama and took charge of the Lowndsboro Female College, which enjoyed great prosperity under his leadership until the devastations of the Federal Army compelled its abandonment. During the war he served as Chaplain of the Twenty-third Alabama Regiment.

He next went to Montgomery, Alabama, and established the Montgomery Female College. In 1866, when our General Conference had accorded the laity representation in all the Conferences, Dr. Cox withdrew from the Methodist Protestant Church, and entered the ministry of the M. E. Church, South, where he labored for the rest of his life.

After eleven years in Alabama, failure of health compelled him to seek a higher latitude, and he returned to Virginia, where he purchased, at Christiansburg, a Female College. He revived the institution, securing a large number of students from the South, and started it on a prosperous career.

After five years in Christiansburg, he re-entered the pastorate, and was, in 1875, appointed to St. Paul's, Baltimore, where in four

years the membership was doubled and a large debt paid. In 1879, he was appointed to Calvary, Baltimore. During a pastorate of three years there the recently sold church and parsonage on the corner of Greene and Lombard streets was purchased and the membership largely increased. While in Baltimore he was also the editor of the Episcopal Methodist, the organ of the Conference. From 1882 to 1886, he was pastor of Mt. Vernon Place Church, Washington, D. C., paying a large debt on the church, largely increasing the membership and organizing a society and Sunday School which became the basis of the present Epworth Church. From 1886 to 1888 he was again at St. Paul's, Baltimore, and while there built the present Wilkens Avenue Church. From 1888 to 1892 he was pastor at Harrisonburg, Va., serving with great acceptability and efficiency.

In 1892 he was appointed one of the editors of the Baltimore Christian Advocate and organized Grace Church, Roanoke, Va. In 1893, he was appointed to Front Royal, Va., where he remained until 1896. From 1896 to 1900, he served Winchester, Va., adding \$9,000.00 of improvements to the church building and 137 to the membership. At this time he was appointed again Baltimore Conference editor of the Baltimore and Richmond Christian Advocate, and then, continuing his editorial work, he served one year at Basic City, Va., and Charles Town, W. Va., and one year at Cumberland, Md. From 1903 to 1907, he served Elkton, Va., and in 1907-08, East Rockingham Circuit, where he was taken ill before the Conference year closed, from which sickness he never recovered sufficiently to enter the active ranks again.

Dr. Cox was twice married. His first wife was Miss Billings, who died many years ago. His second wife was Miss Bryan Moffatt, of Harrisonburg, Va., who survives him and has been an unfailing help and inspiration in his work and a ministering angel in the prolonged illness that terminated in his death.

More than eighty-six years ago, Dr. Cox was born. Sixty-six years ago he entered the Methodist ministry. For sixty-three years he answered the annual roll-call. His was a long and useful life. His talents were as varied as his labors. His ability with the pen rendered large service to the church. His editorial utterances were always timely, scholarly, trenchant and vigorous, though never harsh nor bitter.

As a preacher, Dr. Cox took high rank. He was clear in his understanding of the truth and precise and strong in his declaration of it. He never brought unbeaten oil into the sanctuary, nor did he ever give a stone when men asked for bread. He preached a pure Gospel with great power. Sinners were converted; saints were edified; revivals came. He had a precision of utterance, an elegance of diction, seldom found. He was thoroughly orthodox, and knew no such thing as that shallow-minded contempt for the "Standards of Doctrine" sometimes seen these days.

As a pastor he was rarely equalled. Kind and sympathetic at heart, he was gentle and tender in manner. His presence was a benediction in the sick room and a charm and inspiration in the social and family circle. Few men incarnate more fully the blessings of the beatitudes than he did, such as "Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God"—he was as guileless as a little child; "Blessed are the peacemakers for they shall be called the children of God;" "Blessed are they that hunger and thirst after righteousness, for they shall be filled." His holy life was the practice of the pure Gospel he preached. The attractiveness of Godliness found in him a living witness of rare power.

But why continue? It would take a volume to portray adequately such a long and useful life and a character so gifted and diversified.

The end came peacefully at his home in Harrisonburg, Va. To him it was not death, but only a departure. Death was robbed of its sting and the grave of its victory. It was the sailing time of a full-freighted vessel. Full of years, replete with service, loaded to the water line with the golden grain of nearly a century's sowing and reaping—

"There was no moaning of the bar
When he put out to sea;
But such a tide as moving seemed asleep.
Too full for sound or foam,
When that which drew from out the boundless deep
Turned again home."

The funeral services were conducted at Harrisonburg, Va., in the Methodist Church by Rev. H. H. Sherman, assisted by the other pastors of the town and with the honors of the Masonic Fraternity, of which he was an eminent member. His body was taken to Baltimore, Md., the city of his birth, on Monday, November 29, 1909, and buried in Greenmount Cemetery in the presence of a number of his brethren of the ministry and sorrowing parishioners of former days.

REV. HAMILTON ALEXANDER GAVER.

Hamilton Alexander Gaver was born at Burkettsville, Frederick County, Maryland, February 25, 1830, and died of the infirmities of old age at *Middletown, Frederick County, Virginia, at 3.30 o'clock in the afternoon of Friday, March 18, 1910, aged 80 years and a few days.

His parents were members of the Lutheran Church, and were one of the oldest and most substantial families of that section of the country.

Early in life he was converted to Christ and united himself to the Methodist Episcopal Church. Soon he felt the call to the ministry of

the Gospel, and in 1853 he was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference; he was a member of that historic class of thirty-five who were admitted on trial in 1853.

The published records show that Brother Gaver served the following charges, namely:

1853, he was junior preacher on Berkeley Circuit;

1854, he was junior preacher on Wardensville Circuit;

1855, he was junior preacher on Front Royal Circuit;

In 1856 and 1857, he served New Creek Mission;

In 1858, he served Lexington Circuit;

In 1859, he served Covington Circuit; and possibly in 1860 he also served the Covington Circuit;

In 1861 and 1862, he served Fincastle Circuit;

In 1863, 1864, and 1865, he served Augusta Circuit;

In 1866 and 1867, he served East Rockingham Circuit;

In 1868, he served New Castle Circuit;

In 1869 and 1870, he served Gainsboro Circuit;

From 1873 to 1877, he served Catletts, in Fauquier;

From 1877 to 1879, he served Poolesville (Montgomery);

From 1879 to 1883, he served Queen Anne;

From 1883 to 1886, Parnassus;

From 1886 to 1888, Strasburg; from 1888 to 1892, Centreville, Monroe; from 1892 to 1895, Berkeley; and from 1895 to 1898, he served the White Post Circuit.

Thus it is observed that for forty-five years, without a break of the connection he was actively engaged as an effective minister of the Gospel.

When the Baltimore Conference united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in 1866, Brother Gaver, firm in his convictions, went with his brethren to the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

He was married March 1, 1856, to Miss Nannie Wigfield Watts, a daughter of the Rev. James Watts. Four of the Watts daughters married Methodist ministers, namely, Mrs. Meminger, Mrs. Stephenson, Mrs. Shoaff, and Mrs. Gaver, the youngest child.

His wife preceded him to the grave several years ago. She died at Middletown, Va., January 24, 1899.

Brother Gaver is survived by four sons—Messrs. James W., Charles H., Frank A., and George S. Gaver. He is also survived by two daughters—Mrs. H. V. McNeer and Miss Bessie Gaver.

The death of Brother Gaver was not unexpected. He had been in a serious condition nearly all winter, and at several times his friends thought he was near the end of the journey of life. He rallied until recently, when his condition became more and more grave every day, and he finally passed peacefully away on the eighteenth of March.

It will be noticed that Brother Gaver's ministry extended over a large territory, as well as a long period of time. He served faithfully some of our most laborious charges in Virginia, West Virginia and Maryland. He passed through the strenuous days of 1861 to 1865, when to preach the Gospel was the work of a full-grown man. The records show that he stood at his post of duty when the noise of war was heard everywhere in the land.

He was a faithful man of God, loved by his brethren, commanding at all times the highest respect of a large circle of friends. In the pulpit he was a strong, safe, forceful preacher of the Gospel, though never demonstrative. He was a most diligent pastor, and wherever he labored his people loved him.

Though he lived in a day when circuits were large, and not always easy, he went to his appointments without a murmur, and did his work faithfully. He was a minister of the old style, a quiet and constant Christian gentleman.

He seemed to realize the fact that his recent illness would be his last illness. He did not wish to live to be a care to his loved ones, but preferred rather to die in the full vigor of his powers.

When he called in his physician in his last illness, he said: "Doctor, you have piloted Brother Gardner and Brother Eggleston over the river, and now I want you to pilot me."

He was conscious to the last, and like one waiting for the time to come to start on a journey, Brother Gaver was waiting to hear the Master call him to that land from which no traveler returns. With a calm faith in God he passed peacefully to rest. He died in the Lord.

At 2 o'clock in the afternoon of Sunday, March 20, 1910, the funeral services were conducted in Grace Methodist Church of Middletown, Va., by Rev. G. T. Tyler, assisted by the Rev. Mr. Link, of the Presbyterian Church. The body of Brother Gaver was brought to Stephens City, Va., where it was laid to rest beside his wife in beautiful Green Hill Cemetery.

REV. JAMES HENRY WOLFF.

Rev. James Henry Wolff was born in Martinsburg, Virginia, February 21st, 1834, and died in Charles Town, West Virginia, February 21st, 1910, having reached exactly the age of seventy-six years.

His parents were John M. and Maria C. Wolff. The home was a Christian home; the father was the priest ministering in his family

before God, and the atmosphere was favorable to the children, who one by one gave their hearts to God. Brother Wolff was converted early in life, and his conversion was something he claimed as very real, and the impression and experience he never lost. He was called divinely, as he believed, to the work of the ministry, and not daring or wishing to disobey he gladly made it his life work. Having settled the question of his call to the ministry, he applied for license to preach, and in 1853 at the Quarterly Conference of Lewisburg Circuit, Marbury Goheen, Presiding Elder, he was licensed to preach. In 1855, he was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference, was ordained Deacon in 1857 at the Conference in the City of Baltimore by Bishop Scott, and Elder at Lewisburg, West Virginia, 1859, by Bishop Baker. His first appointment was to Charles Circuit, Md., 1855-56; 1856-57, Bladensburg; 1857-58, St. Mary's; 1858-59, Lexington Circuit; 1859-60, Shepherdstown, W. Va.; 1800-61, Bath Alum; 1861-66, the period of the war, he served Shannondale, W. Va.; 1866-68, White Sulphur; 1868-70, Farmwell, Va.; 1870-71. Swanton, Md.; 1871-73, Petersburg, W. Va.; 1873-77, Springfield Circuit; 1877-81, Gainsboro; 1881-85, Fauquier Circuit; 1885-87, White Post; 1887-91, Frederick Circuit; 1891-95, Darkesville; 1895-99. Jefferson Circuit; 1899-1901, Page Circuit. At the Conference of 190 he was placed on the Superannuated List, and retained that relation In 1873, Brother Wolff was married to Miss-Seln until his death. Hout, of Shepherdstown, W. Va., a sister of Rev. H. L. Hout, of th. Conference. This was an eminently happy union, and the hands and heart of the preacher were strengthened by the true, brave woman who shared in all his toils, his joys and sorrows. She with two sons, Dr. E. E. Wolff, of Cambridge, Md., and Mr. Herbert Wolff, of Petersburg, Va., James H. Wolff was a true Methodist, a loyal Methodist survive him. preacher.

He knew the doctrines of his church and preached them. He was familiar with the hymns of Wesley, and loved to sing them and to quote them in prayer. He loved to pray, and often in the prayer meeting or the Sunday congregation, as his strong voice rang out in confession, entreaty, appeal and praise, he would grow happy and all would feel the power that thrilled his own soul.

His was a fruitful ministry, and on the Circuits he traveled many scores of souls were converted, and in this was his rejoicing. He was neither reticent nor garrulous, but his talk seasoned with a kindly humor was often the life of the company with which he was thrown. His last years were years of infirmities and suffering. During the last days he was unconscious, and so left no dying words, but he had walked the path of the just and "the shining light" ended in the perfect day.

We have lost one more name from our Conference roll, but one more saint has gone home to his God.

REV. LEMUEL WILSON HASLUP.

It is a proverb among the Arabs that Death is a camel that kneels at every man's door. He has knelt with sad and sorrowful frequency at the doors of clerical members of our Conference the past Conference year.

Rev. Lemuel Wilson Haslup, son of Rezin and Patience Haslup, was born in Baltimore, June 23rd, 1832. Was educated in the private and public schools of and engaged in business in his native city. May 19th, 1857, he was a penitent at the altar of Charles Street Church, converted the next day, received on probation the day subsequent to his conversion, and received into full membership December 27th, 1857. Licensed to exhort March 1st, and to preach September 13th, 1858. He preached till interrupted by the war. Then went to Charlottesville as Missionary Chaplain to the hospitals, with a clerkship in the Medical Department. Entered 1863 as a student in the University of Virginia, of which he was a graduate. Received November 1st, 1864, a regular commission from the Confederate Government as Chaplain of the hospitals. He was at Charlottesville till the close of the war.

Appointments: Franklin, 1866-67; Moorefield, 1868; Petersburg, 1869-70; Frostburg, 1871-74; East Baltimore, 1875-77; Linden, 1878-79; Beltsville, 1880; Church Hill, 1881; West Harford, 1882-83; Easton, 1884; Morrisville, 1885-86; Listonburg, 1887-88; Laurel, 1889-92; Wilkens Ave., 1893-97; Frederick Ave., 1897-1900. Supernumerary relations, 1901, continued till death, December 16th, 1909. His sun went down in the evening glories of his well-spent day, to rise in the radiant light of a new morn.

His long, serene life, useful labors, kindly feelings, sweet disposition, gentle manner, fine courtesy, noble and lovely character combined to form an interesting and attractive personality and a career instructive, admirable in a high degree, winning universal esteem, and placing him high in the hearts of all who knew him.

His life and character are rich in suggestion and full of lessons in living. He was a man of entire integrity of character. His conscience seemed at rest at all times with himself, his fellow-men and his Maker. He observed the laws of God in his body, and was crowned with 78 years of life and health. His was not a heart that lived alone, housed in a dream, at distance from the human race; but was full of the healing balm of sympathy. In it was perennial spring of the milk of human kindness, and he found delight in helping and serving others. He believed that "He who serves his brother best gets nearer God than all the rest." He gloried in the Gospel, magnified the Atonement in his preaching; had a profound reverence for the name of Jesus and divine things. The keynote of his attractive personality was the enthronement of the King of Glory. He stepped "Out of self, unto Christ, into glory."

His illness lasted ten days, and on the 16th day of December, Nature, with no rudeness in her touch, softly and gently snapped the vital cord, and he passed serenely into rest on the other shore of that mysterious sea "that never yet has borne on any wave the image of a homeward sail."

He is gone, but he has left behind him for our instruction the lesson of his beautiful life of sympathy, service and piety. To contemplate and emulate is the only way to make it profitable to us. Death comes and assigns the lesson which we must study, or lose its teaching. The poetic lines express the golden text in the lesson of this dutiful and beautiful life:

"The bravest lives are those to duty wed,
Whose deeds, both great and small,
Are close-knit strands of an unbroken thread
Where love ennobles all.

The world may sound no trumpets, ring no bells, The book of life the shining record tells."

A service was held at his home, where relatives and friends gathered and a number of preachers, some of whom took part in the service. The remains were taken to Savage Church, where relatives and friends gathered to bid him a long, last and sad farewell. His body now lies in his last earthly resting place.

"Say not 'Good-night,'
But in some brighter clime
Bid me 'Good-morning.'"

REV. ABNER ALLEN PRESTON NEEL.

Rev. A. A. P. Neel was born on Indian Creek, in Monroe County, West Virginia, on May 4th, 1841. He died at Frankford, Greenbrier County, which adjoins the county of his birth, November 20th, 1909. His parents were of the sterling Presbyterian stock that early settled in that part of the Old Dominion. It was an occasion of no little grief to these faithful disciples of John Calvin that their only son should become enamored of the Methodist faith and unite with that Church in the neighborhood.

Brother Neel was educated at Emory and Henry College under the presidency of Dr. E. E. Wiley, for whose memory he always cherished a most profound veneration.

In May, 1861, near his twentieth birthday, he volunteered in Lowery's Battery, at Greenville, W. Va., and served with his company in Wise's Legion until the Fall of that year, when the Legion was dissolved. In April, 1862, he was detailed with Lieutenant Chapman to raise a com-

pany of artillery. The company was organized in Lewisburg, W. Va., that same month and year. In it he served as First Lieutenant during that year. Resigning his lieutenancy in that company in 1863, he served as Chaplain in Second Corps Hospital, Army of Northern Virginia. While yet chaplain in the Confederate service he was received on trial into the traveling connection in the Baltimore Conference. If union with the Methodist Church was a grief to his parents, his service in the Confederate Army was little short of a scandal. His father, by heritage and training, was a strong anti-slavery man and an ardent Unionist. It was a bitter thing to him that his son should volunteer in the hated Southern Cause. But father and son have doubtless met where Calvinist and Arminians are one, and where heartaches and the prejudices of our great civil strife are gone forever.

Brother Neel's forty-six years in the Conference were spent as follows: 1863, at Fincastle; 1864, at Levelton; 1865, at Peterstown; 1866, 67 and '68, at Churchville; 1869, at Mount Sidney. Beginning with 1870, he spent two years on Berkeley, followed by four years at Shepherdstown. In 1876, he was appointed to Prince George's, and in 1877 was transferred to the Florida Conference and stationed at Ocala. He returned to the Conference by transfer from the Florida Conference in 1878, and was sent to Calvary, Baltimore. In 1879 he was stationed at Hamilton, and returned to that appointment for a second year. Following his pastorate at Hamilton, he served two years on Winchester Circuit, and yent thence to Loudoun for a four years' term. In 1887 he returned to hepherdstown Circuit for two years. The two years following he was astor of Montgomery Circuit, and also served as Conference agent of colportage. Then four years as pastor of Jefferson Circuit. From 1895 to '97 he served as Conference Colporteur. For three years, beginning in 1898, he held a supernumerary relation, supporting himself and family by teaching and serving as superintendent of public instruction of Jefferson County, West Virginia. From 1901 to 1904 he served as pastor of Gainsboro charge. For three years from 1904 he held a superannuated relation. In 1907 he served Alvon Circuit; 1908 and '09 he was superannuated, but served as associate pastor on Frankford Circuit.

Brother Neel was a superior preacher. He was a student of Scripture, and was strong and clear in exposition of the sacred writings. His preaching was chiefly without embellishment, but never without interest. Under the blessing of the Holy Spirit, it edified and convinced the hearer. He was a man of much prayer. He was given to constant and prayerful reading of the Bible. It was his custom for many years to read his Bible through once a year. He was a humble and sincere Christian man. Without ostentation and without moroseness or severity, he carried the dignity of a Christian man and minister into every circle where he moved. While never demonstrative in his affections, he was a faithful friend and a loving husband and father.

He was a good pastor. He served the sick; he comforted the bereaved; he encouraged the weak; he exhorted the wayward. He never counted it a "pastoral visit" unless he had prayer with the family where he visited.

Brother Neel was a man of deep conviction of duty and truth. The doctrines of Methodism drew him as a youth and held him to his latest Once when invited into the ministry of another communion he investigated first of all the teachings of that church. When he found they held the Calvinistic doctrine of imputed righteousness he drew back. He was utterly loyal to Methodist order and usage, going without complaint or hesitancy to any charge assigned him. He impressed his spirit of loyalty to Christ and to Methodism upon his children, so that they all are members of the church of their father's adoption, and three sons now serve in the Methodist ministry. He was alive to every vital movement in the church. He was never radical in his thinking or attitudes toward questions of interest. He was just as far from the spirit of reaction. He was in the front line. He never sought change for the sake of change. He never feared change when in his belief a change would be profitable to the Church or Conference. He was twice married. His first wife was Miss Alice Anderson, of Fincastle, Va. second wife was Miss Ida Payne, of Baltimore, Md. Eleven children survive him.

The end came in peace. The picture of perfect contentment, he lay in his last sleep. He rests in the cemetery at Shepherdstown amon his own dead and among the dead and living whom he loved so devoted by. No doubt or trouble vexed his last hours and no interrogation poin marks his grave. Many perplexities and anxieties, and much of sorrow disturbed his life. His faith in God was perfect, and his personal acceptance admitted no question.

REV. THOMAS G. NEVITT.

Thomas George Nevitt, son of Robert Kirby and L. Caroline Nevitt, was born at Bennings, near Washington City, March 20, 1840, and died near Port Republic, Va., December 15, 1909. He was a Christian from his childhood.

His father said of him: "He never willingly gave me a moment's anxiety. I never knew him to tell a falsehood or use a profane word." His mother was in feeble health for several years before her death, in 1864, and he was her comfort and blessing. He joined the Methodist Church when about 12 years old, and from that time led in prayer whenever called on to do so. He was a student from his youth. He graduated from West River Classical Institute, Md., in 1860, and began teaching as assistant in the school from which he graduated, and later became

principal of the institution. At the same time he was reading law, which he expected to make his profession. In 1868 he gave up his position at West River, on the sudden death of his father in Richmond County, Virginia, and came home to assist in settling up the estate and to look after the interests of a younger brother and an only sister, to whom he was ever after both brother and father.

His next work as teacher was in Warsaw Academy, in Richmond County, Va., which he established in 1869.

For several years he was so impressed with a call to the ministry of the Gospel, that about the year 1871 he gave up all thought of the law and was licensed to preach. It was his first intention to combine the work of a local preacher with that of teaching, but later he gave himself entirely to the work of the ministry, and in 1874 joined the Baltimore Conference. This was somewhat later in life than is usual, and yet, if the preaching of the Gospel had been the one dream of his boyhood and the sole occupation of manhood's earliest years, it would be difficult to see how he could have loved it better or pursued it with a more steadfast will.

His ministerial life covered more than the third of a century of active and efficient service, as follows: Junior preacher on Springfield Circuit, 1874-5; Frostburg, Md., 1875-6; Rainsburg, Pa., 1876-8; Fincastle, Va., 1878-80; James River, 1880-81; Fairfield, 1881-82; Kent, 1882-85; Queen Anne, 1885-88; Romney, 1888-90; Marshall, Va., 1890-94; Freedom, Md., 1894-95; Rockville, Md., 1895-97; Hamilton, 1897-98; Monterey, 1898-1900; Charles and St. Mary's, 1900-04; Berkeley, 1904-05; Edinburgh, 1905-09; Port Republic, 1909, where he "ceased at once to work and live."

One cannot think of such a thing as secularity or worldliness in connection with Brother Nevitt's character. His dominant aim and ceaseless endeavor was to live the Christ life, which, for him, included the ministry which he had received from the Lord Jesus. Not only in the pulpit, but also from house to house, in the business meeting, at Conference, in the circle of friendship, wherever he might be, this Christian care lay upon mind and heart. The ideas of "God's altar" and "sacrifice" were very familiar to his thought and ever personalized in his life. To the great central truth of consecration to God in Jesus Christ he gave himself without stint, that he might make it a reality in his own experience and in that of all others to whom he should have opportunity to minister.

There was that lofty mystic strain in our brother's life and hence in his prayers and preaching that does not appeal strongly to the multitude. But to the like-minded or the awakened his word came in the demonstration of the Spirit and of power.

He was married February 20, 1879, to Miss Matilda Kern, of Romney, W. Va., who, with three children—Rev. Robert K. Nevitt, Miss Nellie Nevitt, and Miss Rebecca Nevitt, survive him.

In his home the hallowing power of his pure and devoted life was very manifest, and it will never cease from the lives that were dearest to him. He was once heard to say in answer to some question of a friend as to his family and place of residence: "Yes; we have a little Paradise there." But, however real, it could not be otherwise than transient. Yet the Christian children nurtured in it will perpetuate its lessons and its spirit in their own faithful living and their own ministration of the Gospel, wherever in the Heavenly Father's providence their steps may be led.

And in other homes, besides his own, in many and many a receptive soul, the touch of his personality and the power of his message has made for all that is highest and best.

In the midst of his work, away from home, in protracted and intense suffering, apparently without the realization that his illness must prove fatal, and so without a farewell word, he closed his eyes to all he loved on earth and passed to his home in Heaven. But in one respect, the desire of his heart was given to him; he had more than once expressed a preference to "die with the harness on."

His last revival meeting was held in a country neighborhood and in the winter. It was unusually full of interest and encouragement. There were many professions of faith. Before it was over he broke down; and on his bed of pain he was still thinking of his work and praying and planning for it, unto the last. Brave and faithful Soldier of Christ! We are sure you would have willingly laid down your life anywhere at His command, but we cannot lament that when you fell it was in the thick of the battle you loved and with the note of a victory for Him thrilling your soul.

Yes, it was victory, indeed—that of the veteran warrior's last well-fought battle in the cause of his King. Joy, eternal joy, with his Lord, to him that overcometh!

REV. LEONIDAS A. SNOW.

Rev. Leonidas A. Snow was born at Miona Springs, Georgia, April 24th, 1854. He received his academic education at a boarding school conducted by Prof. Calhoun; and afterward studied law. But feeling that he was called to the Christian ministry he gave up the law course and was admitted into the South Georgia Conference in 1875, at the age of twenty-one years. He served two years as junior preacher. The writer was unable to secure some important data concerning Brother Snow's early ministry, but from reliable sources it was learned that his early ministry was very successful. While on Sumpter Circuit there were great revivals at La Cross Academy and Pleasant Grove. A cor-

respondent had this to say of him: "Rev. L. A. Snow has been chosen to deliver the annual address before the Jesup, Ga., high school, and we feel sure the occasion will prove a rare treat." We are sorry that more is not known of this period of his ministry. He was ordained Elder by Bishop George F. Pierce, December 12, 1880, at Hawkinsville, Georgia.

In 1886 he was transferred to the North Georgia Conference, and was sent to Little River Circuit; 1887-8-Sublinga. In 1888 he was transferred back to the South Georgia Conference, and sent to Irwinton Circuit; 1889-90, Macon Circuit; 1890-1, Allapaha and Tifton Circuit; 1891-2, Tifton Station; 1892-3, Macon Circuit. While at Macon he was struck by a railway train and received injuries which resulted in curvature of the spine; and at the Conference held at Atlanta in the Autumn of 1893 he was granted a superannuated relation. 1893-4, his home was on a fruit farm at Tifton, Ga.; 1894-7, his home was on the Fair View fruit farm, near McIntire, Ga.; 1897-1900, he resided at Indian Springs, Ga. Here his health was very much improved, and he did a great deal of evangelistic work. His efforts in evangelistic work were crowned with success; many were turned from sin unto righteousness by his able presentation of the truth. 900-2, he served as supply on Chauncy Circuit; 1902-5, he served as apply on Dexter Circuit. In 1905 he returned to the effective relation in the ministry, and was transferred to the North Georgia Conference and appointed to Monroe Station. In 1906, his health again becoming impaired, acting upon the advice of his physician, he transferred to the Western Virginia Conference, and was appointed to Clarksburg Station. In the spring of 1907 he transferred to the Baltimore Conference, and was appointed to Shenandoah Circuit; 1908. Blue Sulphur Circuit. While at Blue Sulphur he had two attacks of penumonia. In the Spring of 1909, broken in health, Brother Snow attended the Conference in Baltimore, and believing that a change of climate would be beneficial, he asked to be sent to some place east of the Blue Ridge Mountains, and was appointed to Prince William Mission. He went from the Conference to his new charge, but not to preach; the Great Head of the Church ordered otherwise. On his arrival in Prince William County he went to the home of Mr. R. P. Harnsberger, to await the coming of his family; but before they arrived he was taken suddenly very ill with nephritis. Physicians were called in, and they, with kind neighbors did all that could be done to relieve him, but he grew On hearing that his family would arrive on April 15th, he expressed a desire to be moved to the parsonage at Brentsville, which was granted. Dr. Wine, the attending physician, remained at his bedside day and night in his efforts to break the force of the disease and make him comfortable, and kind neighbors did all in their power to relieve his wants; but he grew rapidly worse, till the end came. Brother Snow passed quietly to his heavenly reward on the morning of April

21st, 1909. His funeral services were conducted by Rev. O. F. Burgess, assisted by Rev. W. T. Gover. His body was laid to rest in the Manassas Cemetery, to await the resurrection of the just.

On November 24th, 1886, Brother Snow was happily married to Miss Lucie Ashby Cocke. Of this union four children were born—Leona Ashby, Marshall A., Pearl A. and Henry A. Leona, their first child, died in infancy.

Some published accounts of Brother Snow's labors show that he had great success in his ministry and that he was highly esteemed by those who knew him. I quote from an article published from Pleasant Grove, Ga. August 3rd, 1885: "Brother Snow began a meeting here on the 18th ulto., and without the aid of any other minister has labored with us nearly two weeks, and a great part of the time preaching two sermons a day. Business was laid aside and the roads were filled with buggies, wagons and people on horseback, all going to church.

* * During the first four days twenty were added to the church; some time later twenty-two others, making in all forty-two accessions, besides the twelve children baptized and several backsliders from this and other churches reclaimed. * * * "

Another says: "He came to us almost an entire stranger, and though his stay has been brief, he has, by the faithful discharge of his duties, the amenity of his manners and his genial social qualities, won the esteem and respect of all with whom he has come in contact."

Brother Snow was studious and painstaking, and his sermons indicated thorough preparation. He devoted much time to the Greek classics, and was a student of the best literature. He manifested great interest in young men, and by his strong and manly presentation of the truth led many into the happy experience of the Christian life. He gave the greater part of his library to the South Georgia College. Brother Snow's name will happily linger in the memory of many who came under the influence of his ministry.

REV. WILLIAM LEE DOLLY.

The sunset of a Christian life leaves behind it a path of radiant glory. The after-glow is all the more beautiful if the sun has set behind the clouds of a stormy evening. Amid the gathering gloom of a deadly disease, Brother William L. Dolly left us; but, as we follow the track of his consecrated life, we catch its meaning and rejoice in the fulfillment of the promise, "The path of the just is as a shining light that shineth more and more unto the perfect day."

This devoted man of God came to us with that large inheritance of faith and character which is the possession of the second generation of Christian ministers who have blessed our Conference. His father

was a Methodist preacher of the old order and he left upon his son the stamp of his own heroic spirit. This man was born and reared in a Methodist parsonage, and entered the ministry with the fine fitness of one to the manor born. He not only had the advantage of that parsonage training, but his parents, with the foresighted vision that belongs to those whose lives are God-centered and with the sacrifice of the saints, gave him the best school and college equipment and gave him to the church, the finished product of a holy home.

As a further preparation for his successful ministry, he married in 1886 Miss Florence Peters, daughter of Major Stephen T. Peters, of Lynchburg, Va., who brought into his home life the refinement and culture of this high type of Southern womanhood.

There must be added to his furnishing for a successful ministry a native endowment of strong and acute intellectual power and a heart of ardent devotion to the truth. But we fail to record the yet finer qualities of his Christian manhood that made him so tender as a pastor, so devoted as a husband and father and so passionate in his friendships. These belong to the fathomless abysses of the soul, and are written only in the fuller light and glory of the life beyond.

It is only our duty today to record the simple story of his life. He was born in the parsonage at New Hampden, Highland County, Va., July 28, 1861. Beginning life on this mountain top, he grew to manhood amid the ever varying scenes of an itinerant preacher's family. After receiving the instruction of the public schools at different places he attended for four years Washington and Lee University, at Lexington, Va. Upon the completion of his college course he began to teach school, and at the same time pursued a four years' course in the study of law.

Upon the threshold of a most promising career in his chosen profession the hand of God was laid upon him, and he surrendered to the divine call to preach the Gospel. At the Conference held at Calvary Church, Baltimore, in March, 1884, he was admitted to the Conference on trial with a class of seven. This class has served the church for twenty-six years, without a break in their ranks, until Brother Dolly left us for the larger ministry in the skies.

His first appointment was to Prince George Circuit as junior preacher. The next year he was sent as junior preacher to Berryville. At the Conference of 1886 he was made preacher in charge of Augusta Circuit. In 1888 he went to Rockingham Circuit. In 1889 he servéd Kent. This year he reported the largest net gain on his charge that was reported from his District. In 1891 he went to Trappe. Blacksburg was his next charge, where he served a successful pastorate of four years, from 1892 to 1896. His appointment at the Conference of 1897 was to Bridgewater, which he also served, 1898 and 1899. In 1900 he went to Arlington, and in 1901 to Marvin, Washington, D. C. Here his term was

three years, when he went to Leesburg in March, 1904. After a most successful ministry of four years at Leesburg, he was appointed to Fredericksburg, where he was in the midst of his second year when his call came from his Lord, on February 5, 1910, to lay down his work and enter into rest. During this present year his charge was visited by two glorious seasons of revival, and if he had lived to greet us at this session, he would have reported what was, in some respects, the most successful year in his pastorate of twenty-six years slow to lay down his weapons of warfare. During the past year he had been in failing health. Disease was reaching to the foundations of his life, yet, upheld by a strong and unyielding will, comforted by the watchful care of a loving wife, and encouraged by a faithful and sympathetic flock, he toiled until the clouds of the evening of his life gathered about him. To the last moment of his physical and mental endurance he remained at his post of duty until God called him to the cloudless land of eternal day. His own beloved people laid him to rest in their beautiful little city of the dead, at Fredericksburg, Va. Rev. J. A. Anderson, his former senior comrade; Rev. J. Howard Wells, hi friend and admirer, and the writer of this memoir, his classmate an chum, together with the pastors of the churches in Fredericksbur; performed the simple yet beautiful rites of burial.

So we left him with sorrow and tears, yet chanting in our hearts the pean of Christian victory: "Thanks be to God which giveth us the victory through Jesus Christ our Lord."

REV. CHARLES BUHRMAN LE FEW.

Charles B. Le Few was born in Montgomery County, Virginia, near Christiansburg. February 2, 1857, and died in Salem, Virginia, April 9, 1909, aged 52 years 2 months and 7 days. His parents, William Le Few and Eliza Le Few, are both dead. Two brothers, W. D. and J. M. Le Few, and two sisters, Mrs. M. A. Akers and Mrs. L. A. Fulcher, survive him. His mother's maiden name was Eliza Sumner.

When he was but a few years of age his parents moved to Pulaski County, Virginia. Here Charles was reared on a farm. At the age of nine years he was converted to God under the ministry of Rev. John Bell. As a boy he was good, kind, gentle and forbearing. He made the Bible his study. His mother said he was one of the best boys she ever knew. One who knew him all his life said he was always good.

Some years after his conversion, in 1882, he was licensed to preach. He served the church on several circuits as a supply until the Fall of 1887, when he was received on trial into the traveling connection in the Holston Conference. In the Spring of 1896, after a service of nearly nine years in the Holston Conference, he was transferred to

the Baltimore Conference, and appointed to Catawba Circuit. At the end of his second year in this charge his failing health made it necessary for him to retire for medical treatment. In one year his health was sufficiently restored to allow him to resume his regular work, and at the Conference of 1899 he was appointed to Roanoke Circuit. At the end of the year he was appointed to Bath Circuit; the next year to Talcott, and the next to Peterstown. His last charge was Alvon, which he served during the years 1904, 1905. Broken in health, he retired from the active work of the ministry, and, being granted a superannuated relation, he settled in Salem, Virginia. His condition growing worse, he submitted to a surgical operation in the Salem Hospital on April 7, 1909, and died two days later. The last three years of his life were spent in much suffering. He bore it all patiently and was ready when the summons came.

Brother Le Few's school advantages were limited, though all through life he was studious. His conversation was without grammatical error, and even his preaching did not betray his lack of a good education. He wrote often for the press, and never had an article refused. On one occasion his article was chosen by the editor of the "Holston Metholist" as the best submitted to the paper from a number written on the same subject.

Brother Le Few was a man of very high Christian character. Too much cannot be said in his praise. He spent much of his time in prayer. He had his stated times of prayer. Three times a day he retired to pray; and he kept this up faithfully until his "faith was changed to sight and his prayer was changed to praise." He had a wonderful gift of prayer. Persons of all denominations enjoyed hearing him pray. His prayers had spiritual power and moved men's hearts. Few could follow up a sermon in prayer as he could. The testimonies that he gave for Christ in the experience meetings were always good, and they got better all the time. He was a man given to spiritual meditation. This made him appear sometimes listless and uncompanionable.

He was faithful in the discharge of all his duties, very industrious, always doing something as long as he had any strength. No rain, snow, nor cold weather could keep him back from his appointments. He would go when he knew there would not be anyone else there, saying that the preacher must always be faithful. He would not quit any piece of work until he was satisfied that he had done it as well as he could.

His ministry succeeded. His preaching was plain, scriptural, spiritual and resultful. He never failed to have a good revival meeting through any fault of his own. He believed in holding his own meetings when he had the strength. His first work was to get the church membership right before he began preaching to the sinners. He believed in getting down on your knees at the altar. Night after night in his meet-

ings the altar would be crowded. The first meeting he held after his marriage seventy-five souls were happily converted. It was corn-planting time; the people were busy and wanted the meeting postponed. He said he had come to hold the meeting, and hold it he did with wonderful success. During one of these revival meetings a friend of Brother Le Few said he knew him to remain on his knees for two hours in private prayer, wrestling with God for the outpouring of His Spirit upon the meeting.

His whole thought was to do good. After he had to give up his work in the ministry on account of ill health he longed to get well so that he might work for the Master. His wife says: "The last few months of his life I could hear him praying or preaching in his sleep almost any time in the night."

For his fellow-ministers he entertained a very high regard. He had many friends. He was a good host to his guests, doing all in his power to make everything pleasant and enjoyable to all about him. Those who knew him best held him in high esteem and cherish his memory. He went where the Conference sent him and served some hard appoint ments without a murmur.

On November 29, 1892, Brother Le Few was married to Miss Annie B. McCulloch by Rev. J. S. Hutchinson, then pastor in Salem, Va. Thus death broke a union of nearly seventeen years of happy married life. It was not marred by a single cross word between husband and wife. Two children were born, both of whom survive their father—a daughter, Bunah, aged 14, and Charles, aged 12 years.

His funeral services were held in the Methodist Church, Salem, Virginia, on Sunday afternoon, April 11, a large congregation being present. The pastor, Rev. David Bush, had charge of the services, being assisted by Rev. J. R. Andrew, presiding elder of the Roanoke District: Revs. L. L. Lloyd, W. H. H. Joyce and E. L. Woolf, of Roanoke; Rev Mr. Campbell, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, and Mr. Gillespie, pastor of the M. E. Church, of Salem.

REV. HARRY WILLIAM BURRUSS.

Harry William Burruss, son of Henry L. and Hannah Burruss, was born in Baltimore, Maryland, April 27, 1872, and died in Gaithersburg, Maryland, April 27, 1909. He was converted in a revival conducted by Rev. George G. Smith in St. Paul's Church, Baltimore, the fall of 1884, and joined that church. He was licensed to preach September 11, 1893. He was ordained deacon by Bishop Wilson, March 27, 1898, and elder by Bishop Galloway, March 30, 1902. He was admitted on trial in the Baltimore Conference, March, 1898, and into full connection April, 1901. He served as junior preacher the following charges during vacation pe-

riods: Ronceverte, 1895; Rockville, 1896; Asbury Church, Manchester, Virginia, 1898. In 1899, he was appointed to North Baltimroe. This church disbanded, and he was appointed junior preacher on Prince George's Circuit in June. In September he was transferred to Sudbrook. His subsequent appointments were: Easton and Caroline, 1901-03; Aberdeen, 1903-07. In 1907 he was appointed to Gaithersburg, where he applied himself with his usual energy to the work of Grace Church for two years, when he ceased at once to labor and to live. For two years, 1905-07, he rendered most efficient service as Conference Missionary Secretary, in addition to the work of his charge. June 4, 1902, he was married to Miss Mary S. Schey, who, with four children, survives him.

REPORTS.

Harry Burruss was a true Christian gentleman. In the home he was affectionate and considerate. During an absence from home he wrote: "Father, let me tell you home is one of the most sacred names that ever fell upon the ear of an absent boy. Home means the place where sisters dwell. Home is where a boy's best friend abides—his mother." The memory of his home life is a precious heritage to his wife and children. His entire life as newsboy, bookkeeper, student and preacher was marked by a conscientious devotion to duty. He declined a promotion n the office of The Baltimore American because it required Sunday work. At academy and college he was the leading spirit in religious work, visiting the poor and establishing Sunday Schools in neglected places in the country. He was a tireless student; winning a medal in debate, he asked the privilege of taking the value of the medal in books. He was an earnest and practical preacher of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. During his college days he wrote: "Life is real to me. I want to live so true, and pure and noble a life that my conversation and preaching may be backed by my actual life." He recognized the fact that both truth and personality are elements in preaching; that while truth is omore than the preacher, yet to be at its best, truth must come through the life as well as over the lips. That was a meaningful tribute paid to him by one who was his teacher: "To me he was more an example than a pupil." His intense interest in the work of the ministry and his concern for those under his care amounted to a passion. He said he would rather have the poorest appointment in the Conference than to be the head of the richest corporation in the world; for in the very poorest appointment there is opportunity "to lead men to loftier planes in this life, and eventually lead them into that eternal home." This holy fervor made him a soul-saver.

Easter Sunday, April 11, he was in the pulpit for the last time. The following Saturday he had a chill. On Monday, April 19, pneumonia developed. He said: "I willing to go or to stay." At 6.30 o'clock, Tuesday morning, April 27, he passed beyond the horizon of this life into the realm of the Morning Land of Eternal Spring. He died on his thirty-seventh birthday. Truly, life is as a weaver's shuttle, which

flies to and fro until the thread is exhausted and the web is taken from the loom; and yet that life is long which answer's life's great end. The author of "Festus" gives us the true measurement of life.

We live in deeds, not years; in thought, not breaths; In feelings, not in figures on a dial.

We should count time by heart-throbs. He most lives Who thinks most, feels the noblest, acts the best.

Life's but a means unto an end; that end Beginning means an end to all things—God.

On Thursday, April 29, the beautiful church at Gaithersburg was filled with his friends. The funeral services were conducted by Dr. B. W. Bond, assisted by F. J. Prettyman, J. A. Anderson, W. E. Henry, J. H. Wells and E. V. Regester. The stewards of Gaithersburg charge acted as pallbearers. We laid him to rest in Forest Oak Cemetery.

Our friend and brother has finished his day's work, but not his life. Paul Hamilton Hayne wrote his lines "Face to Face" for those who have eyes to see that death is but an incident in a continuous life.

I tell thee his face is fair
As the moon-bow's amber rings,
And the gleam in his unbound hair
Like the flush of a thousand springs;
His smile is the fathomless beam
Of the star-shine's sacred light,
When the summers of Southland dream
In the lap of the holy Night;
For I, earth's blindness above,
In a kingdom of halcyon breath—
I gaze on the marvel of love
In the unveiled face of Death.

But beyond the stars and the sun
I can follow him still on his way,
Till the pearl-white gates are won
In the calm of the central day.
Far voices of fond acclaim
Thrill down from the place of souls,
As Death, with a touch like flame,

Resolved, That the Baltimore Conference memorialize the next General Conference of the Church to give careful consideration to the educational policy of the Church, and to set forth that policy with the utmost possible clearness; to take such steps as may be needed to secure to our Church all the educational institutions built up by the wisdom, toil and gifts of the Church, or that, because of confidence in the Church, have been by others entrusted to our Church; to secure to the Church beyond cavil the ownership and control, through Boards of Trustees, of its educational institutions, so far as the laws of the States will allow the Church to own and control educational institutions; and to enjoin increased diligence in the work of education under such conditions as may enable the Church most efficiently to meet her obligation to her Lord in developing the character, training the mind and imparting the truth to all students who enter our schools, colleges and universities.

Second—For the protection of our people and to assure those who respond to the appeals of the Church for gifts to the cause of Christian education that their gifts will be controlled and used by the Church, it shall be enacted by the General Conference that none of our Conferences shall levy an assessment, or make an appropriation, or make an

appeal for the benefit of any educational institution not owned and controlled by the Church so far as the laws of the States will allow the Church to own and control educational institutions.

- 8. Doxology and Benediction.

With the exception that it is permitted to use the following:

- 2. Singing from the common Hymnal, the people standing.
- 3. The Apostles' Creed recited by all still standing.
- Prayer, concluded with the Lord's Prayer repeated audibly by all kneeling.
- 5 Anthem or voluntary.
- Lesson from the Old Testament, which if from the Psalms may be read responsively.
- 7. The Gloria Patri.
- 8. Lesson from the New Testament.

- 9. Notices, followed by collection, with or without an offertory.
- 10. Singing from Common Hymnal, the people standing.
- 11. The Sermon.
- 12. Prayer, the people kneeling.
- 13. Singing from the Common Hymnal, the people standing.
- 15. Doxology and Apostolo.

(Recommends concurrence.)

(V.)

Wrereas, it is reported that there are about 700 appointments in our Church dependent upon supplies for ministerial service.

Resolved, That the Baltimore Conference memorialize the General Conference to give serious attention to the matter of recruiting the ministry of the Church.

And in view of the further fact that of those entering the ministry so small a per cent. have had a thorough mental training, to devise ways and means for increasing the educational qualifications of those who are entering our ministry.

Resolved, That the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, memorialize the next General Conference against the transfer of the Lewisburg District of the aforesaid Conference to the Western Virginia Conference.

(VIII.)

Whereas, the line of Greenbrier County, in West Virginia, having been changed by the formation of Summers County in 1870, which makes the original boundary line between the Baltimore and Western Virginia Conferences indefinite according to the description as given in the Discipline, which has not been changed since 1866; therefore, be it

Resolved. That we, the Baltimore Conference, do hereby respectfully memorialize the General Conference to so change the phraseology, as to make intelligible the original line and make it more definite, as follows:

Paragraph 500 (3) "Baltimore Conference shall embrace all that part of the State of Maryland which lies north and west of the Great Choptank River, and also the part of Caroline County, in said State. lying south and east of said river; New Castle and Kent Counties, in the State of Delaware; and so much of the States of Virginia and West Virginia as is included in the following boundary lines: Begin ning at the mouth of the Potomac River; thence up said river to the County line between Stafford and King George Counties; thence with said line to the Rappahannock River, and with said River (but including Fredericksburg Station, on its southern bank) to the Blue Ridge Mountains;" thence by that chain of mountains to the Holston Conference line, and following that line to East Radford, on the New River, in Montgomery County, Virginia, and by that river westward (excepting Big Stony Creek appointment) to the City of Hinton, West Virginia (including Hinton), and thence with the top of Keeney Mountain to Keeney Knob; thence to Dougher Knob, in Greenbrier County, West Virginia; thence along the divide (leaving Meadow Bluff in the Western Virginia Conference, and Clintonville, in the Baltimore Conference) to Big Clear Mountain; thence to the southwest corner of Randolph County, where Pocahontas County touches Randolph County; thence with the line of those two counties to the Alleghany Mountains; "thence by said mountains northward, so as to include all the territory which may be now or hereafter under our jurisdiction, and not embraced in other Conferences."

(IX.)

Resolved, That the Baltimore Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South, do respectfully request the General Conference of our Church, which will be held in Asheville, N. C., next May, to amend Section IV, Chapter III, of the Discipline, as it now stands, by inserting an additional Paragraph immediately following Paragraph 136, which shall read as follows:

"Paragraph 137, Answer 18—To preach upon the subject of Sabbath Observance, and to urge upon our people the importance of striving, both by precept and example, to counteract the widespread and growing tendency towards Sabbath desecration."

Further, and in accordance with the above, to amend also Paragraph 87, by inserting after Question 17, an additional Question, which shall read as follows:

"Question 18—Has the sermon on Sabbath Observance, required in Paragraph 137, been preached in every congregation? (4)"

CONSTITUTION OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE BENEVOLENT SOCIETY.

ART. I.

This Association shall be called "The Baltimore Conference Benevolent Society."

ART. II.

- SEC. 1. The object of the Society shall be to provide a sum of money on the death of any preacher of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, who may be a member of the Society at the time of his death, for the immediate benefit of his widow or minor children, if there be such, or for the benefit of both, as the neficiary may determine and indicate by name.
 - SEC. 2. Or, if there be no widow or minor children, then the amount assessment shall be paid to the personal representative of the deused member to meet funeral and other necessary expenses.
- Sec. 3. In the event of any member of this Society being elected to the Episcopacy and continuing the payment of his assessments, his heirs upon his death shall be entitled to the usual benefits, and anyone who was a member of this Conference at the time of his election to the Episcopacy may likewise become a beneficiary member of this Society.

ART. III.

- SEC. 1. Any preacher of Baltimore Conference may become an active member of this Society by paying to the Treasurer the membership fee of one dollar, providing the same be paid within the first year after his admission on trial into the Conference. If not paid until the second year, the charge shall be two dollars. If not paid until the third year, three dollars; if not till the fourth year, four dollars; if not till the fifth, five dollars. Should no payment be made by the close of the fifth year, then he shall be debarred from membership in the Society.
- SEC. 2. Any person agreeing to pay an assessment of one dollar upon the death of a ministerial member of the Society, as provided for in Article IV of the Constitution, shall be enrolled as an Honorary and

Contributing Member, and shall not be subject to the Initiation fee of one dollar, the family of such a person not being entitled to the benefits of the Society.

ART. IV.

Whenever any preacher of the aforesaid Conference, who may be a member of this Society, shall die, each surviving clerical member shall be assessed two dollars, to be paid at once to the Treasurer.

ART. V.

Immediately on being informed of the death of any preacher of the aforesaid Conference, who was a member of the Society at the time of his death, the Treasurer shall call on each surviving member for the payment of his assessment.

But without waiting to receive payment thereof, he shall at once pay to the widow of the deceased, if there be one, or else to his minor child or children, if there be any, or to both as provided in Art. II, Sec. 1, one-fourth of the sum of which the whole assessments would amount; and within sixty days he shall pay as aforesaid such additional sum as shall make the whole amount paid equal to the whole amount received by him in payment of the assessments; provided that if the amount be payable to minor child or children, payment shall be made for its or their benefit to such person as may have been designated by the father to receive it, or to the legal representative of such thinor child or children.

ART. VI

If any member of the Society, being a preacher of the aforesaid Conference, shall fail to pay any assessment within thirty days after the date of the Treasurer's call, he shall forfeit his membership; but he shall have the privilege of renewing it at any time by the payment of a renewal fee of two dollars; provided, however, that if any such member shall have given written notice to the Treasurer of his withdrawal from the Society when there was no assessment pending against him, he may renew his membership by paying again the regular fee of one dollar

ART. VII.

A General Meeting of the Society shall be held annually at the seat and during the session of the aforesaid Conference, at such particular time and place as may be appointed by the President of the Board of Directors.

ART. VIII.

The management of the affairs of the Society, in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution, shall be vested in a Board of Directors, to consist of five members, who shall be elected annually at the General Meeting of the Society.

Should any vacancy occur in the Board at any time, it shall be filled by the remaining members thereof, at their first meeting thereafter.

ART. IX.

Within fifteen days after their election the Directors shall meet, and organize by the appointment of a President and Secretary, who shall perform the duties usually pertaining to their respective offices.

They shall then elect a Treasurer of the Society to serve for one year, or until a successor shall be appointed.

Whenever the office of Treasurer may become vacant by reason of death, resignation or other cause, the Directors shall meet within fifteen days thereafter and fill the vacancy.

ART X

The Board of Directors shall have power to remove the Treasurer, or to declare the office vacant at any time, for such cause as, in their judgment, may render such procedure just and proper.

ART. XI.

It shall be the duty of the Board to direct the Treasurer in regard to any of his duties whenever they may deem it proper so to do, or whenever he may apply for instructions.

It shall also be their duty to examine the books and the Annual Statement of the Treasurer, and to submit the latter to the General Meeting of the Society, with the appended certificate of at least two of their number as to the result of their examination.

ART. XII.

It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to keep a correct account of all receipts and disbursements, and to submit to the Board of Directors a tatement thereof for the year ending on the first day of March in each ear; to turn over to his successor in office all money, books and other property in his possession belonging to the Society; and to follow such instructions as may be given him from time to time in writing by the Board.

ART. XIII.

The funds of the Society shall be deposited in bank, subject to the order of the President of the Board of Directors and the Treasurer of the Society. And, whenever the surplus in excess of amount paid claimants, as provided for in Article V, shall exceed fifty dollars, the Board of Directors shall invest such surplus, the interest accruing therefrom to be added to the fund held for expenses.

ART. XIV.

The Treasurer shall not pay cut any money belonging to the Society, except as provided in Article V, unless he be authorized to do so by the Board of Directors.

Nor shall the Board authorize any appropriation of money except for such items of expense as they may deem requisite for the proper conduct of the affairs of the Society.

ART. XV.

Should it ever become necessary to raise funds to meet the current expenses of the Society, the Board of Directors may levy an assessment on each member, which, however, shall not exceed fifty cents in any one year.

ART. XVI.

The Treasurer shall be ex officio a member of the Society, and in view of his gratuitous services, he shall be exempt from the payment of the membership fee and of all assessments, unless in the event of his death his widow or children would become beneficiaries of the Society.

ART. XVII.

A meeting of the Board of Directors may be called at any time by the President, or by the Treasurer of the Society.

ART. XVIII.

Any proposed amendment to this Constitution shall first be submitted to the Board of Directors, and if approved by a majority of them, it may be submitted to a General Meeting of the Society, and may then be adopted by a vote of two-thirds of the Members present and voting.


