The Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its One Hundred and Thirty-first Session in Mount Vernon Place Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Washington, D. C., Wednesday, March 24th, 1915, at 9 o'clock A. M.

Bishop Warren A. Candler, President of the Conference, in the Chair. Conference united in singing Hymn No. 222.

J. W. Duffey led in prayer.

The Bishop read the first thirteen verses of the twenty-fifth chapter of St. Matthew, and impressively addressed the Conference.

THE ROLL was called by the Secretary of the last Conference, and 159 Clerical and 21 Lay Members answered to their names. (See Roll.)

E. V. Regester was elected Secretary and, upon his nomination, J. Harry Smith, W. H. Best, C. L. DeLong, J. J. Rives, W. L. Smith, and G. D. Kidner were elected Assistant Secretaries.

THE HOUR of meeting was fixed at 9 A. M., and of adjournment at 12.30 P. M.

THE BAR of the Conference was fixed at a line running across the church from the fourth window from the pulpit.

COMMITTEES—The nominations of the Presiding Elders for the Committees were presented and read, and they were elected.

SUBSTITUTIONS—S. R. Pritchard, in the place of R. H. Farrier on the Roll and on the Committee on Publishing Interests; G. T. Tyler, in the place of L. R. Markwood on the Committee on Conference Relations

COMMUNICATIONS were received and referred as follows: From the Trustees of the M. E. Church, South, to the Joint Board of Finance; General Board of Church Extension, to the Conference Board of Church Extension; General Board of Education, to the Conference Board of Education; Smith and Lamar, Agents, to the Committee on Publishing Interests; Woman's Missionary Society of the Baltimore Conference, to the Conference Board of Missions.

A communication from the Educational Commission, accompanied by a letter from Bishop Warren A. Candler, Chairman of the Commission, was received and read.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

RANDOLPH-MACON SYSTEM.

The reports of the several institutions of the Randolph-Macon System to the Board of Education show an encouraging increase in property value, endowment, and the number of students.

Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, Va., has property valued at \$157,000 and an endowment of \$383,464. There are 12 professors, 4 instructors, 4 officers and 195 students, which is the largest enrollment that the College has had since the establishment of the Randolph-Macon System. Twenty-nine of these students are preparing for the ministry, and six of the twenty-nine are from the Baltimore Conference. By the appointment of Rev. J. A. Kern, D. D., to the faculty, the Biblical Department has been greatly strengthened and four courses of study have been added. During the year another dormitory has been erected which cost \$42,500, and is said to be the most modern dormitory in the South.

Randolph-Macon Woman's College, Lynchburg, Va., reports a year of progress and growth. This institution has property valued at \$442,650 and an endowment of \$392,000. There are forty-nine professors and instructors, 11 officers with 610 students, an increase of 26 over last year. In this first-class College there are offered to young women rare opportunities for intellectual culture in an institution pervaded by a splendid religious atmosphere.

Randolph-Macon Academy, Front Royal, Va., has property valued at \$100,000. This school has 8 teachers, 4 officers and 137 pupils. Thirteen of these pupils are preparing for the ministry. This is the largest enrollment of ministerial students in this institution since 1905-1906.

Randolph-Macon Academy, Bedford City, Va., reports: Value of property, \$115,500; teachers and officers, 13; pupils, 201. During the summer an addition will be made to the building, completing the plant as it was originally designed by Dr. W. W. Smith. About \$8,500 of the necessary \$10,000 has been subscribed for this purpose.

Randolph-Macon Institute, Danville, Va., reports: Value of property. \$118,750; teachers, 21; officers, 4; pupils, 275; an increase of 46 over last year.

In total this system has a property valuation of \$933,900, an endowment of \$775,464, with 130 professors and officers, and 1,417 students.

These institutions are all worthy of our hearty support. They cannot be excelled by any other schools in their respective clases, either secular or denominational. We urge our people to send their children to these schools, where they can be as efficiently served as elsewhere and also be under the influence of our own church.

We desire at this time to make more than the usual reference to Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal. It is known already perhaps to many members of this Conference that there is yet on the Academy

a bonded indebtedness of seventeen thousand five hundred dollars bearing six per cent interest, incurred for original construction of the buildings. This debt has now been standing twenty-three years, and the fixed charge thereon has become a serious burden, so much so that the discharge of other and necessary obligations is already prevented thereby. We, therefore, earnestly commend the Academy to our people for sympathetic interest at this particular point, and hereby approve any methods to be adopted by the Executive Committee of the Academy to conduct a canvass within our bounds during the year for raising at least ten thousand dollars on said debt.

SOUTHERN SEMINARY SYSTEM.

We recommend to the patronage of our people the institutions which constitute the Southern Seminary System. We are informed that the educational work done by them is thorough, and their system of administration modern and intelligent. The moral and spiritual influences are such as Christian parents wish thrown around their children.

The Southern Seminary, at Buena Vista, Virginia, a school for girls and young women, is housed in a most comfortable building, well furnished and equipped. Its report shows property valued at \$75,000.00, fourteen teachers, and eighty-five pupils. The Rev. E. H. Rowe is the resident principal.

The Alleghany Collegiate Institute, a training school, located at Alderson, W. Va., has property valued at \$15,000.00, with 8 professors and eighty-two pupils.

Rev. J. S. Engle, of our Conference, has been the resident principal for the last two sessions.

The system of military drill is in use here, and is regarded by the management as of great value in the development of physical vigor and habits of precision and promptness among the students. We understand that this is the only military school, with perhaps one exception, affiliated with our Church. In view of the tendency of our boys toward military schools, we think it wise that the management of this system has provided us with one such among our Methodist schools.

We recommend Revs. W. S. Hammond. D. M. Brown and W. F. Locke, or their successors, as a visiting committee for the Southern Seminary, and Revs. W. D. Keene, J. Herbert Bean and W. M. Compton, or their successors, as a visiting committee for the A. C. I., the expenses of said committees to be paid by the respective institutions.

EMORY UNIVERSITY.

We have learned with great satisfaction of the auspicious opening of the Theological Department of the new University, now named Emory University, at Atlanta, Ga., established by the Educational Commission as authorized by the General Conference. We expres our entire

sympathy with its work and ideals, and most cordially commend it to our people for their substantial co-operation. We note with pleasure that at least two generous donations have already come from the bounds of this Conference, namely, \$25,000 by T. T. Fishburne, of Roanoke, Va., and \$1,000 by Mrs. W. S. Thomas, the wife of one of our preachers. The selection of our Presiding Bishop, W. A. Candler, as the first Chancellor of this institution meets with our fullest approval, and we hereby pledge him our support in this great work.

REPORT OF SECRETARY-TREASURER.

The report of Dr. H. P. Hamill, Secretary-Treasurer, has been examined by an auditing committee and found correct, vouchers having been shown for all expenditures, the balance in the treasury being \$206.

ASSESSMENTS.

We recommend an assessment of \$6,000 for Randolph-Macon College, \$1,000 for ministerial supply and training, and \$3,021 for Educational Extension, the proceeds to be divided pro rata.

APPOINTMENTS RECOMMENDED.

We recommend the appointment of Dr. H. P. Hamill as Conference Secretary of Education; Dr. J. A. Kern, as Professor in Randolph-Macon College.

We recommend the confirmation of Charles W. Ray as Trustee of Randolph-Macon College.

Dr. H. P. Hamill, Judge E. D. Newman and H. H. Sherman are continued as a committee on ministerial supply and training, with the usual duties. We would also call the attention of any young men who are called to preach to the liberal conditions on which we make them donations and loans whereby they may secure adequate preparation for the great work of the Christian Ministry, and urge that they avail themselves of this assistance.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

After setting aside 50 per cent. of the amount received on the assessment to be forwarded to the General Board, your board had \$3.300 for distribution to applicants from our own territory. Applications were received from eleven churches and three parsonages for donations aggregating \$6,150, or nearly double the amount at our command. All these cases had merit, and some of them were so important that they should have had even twice the amount asked for. We regret our inability to meet the constant demands on this fund, for we feel that nothing of a material nature is more effective as a conserving and aggressive force than the house that stands for the spiritual life of the people.

THE LOAN FUND CAPITAL.

The donation is not the best aid in every case. A congregation with ability and self-respect will not wish to be pensioners on charity simply because they are not in a position to pay cash. They would rather borrow than beg. Such preference is heartily commended by the board as being also the best policy for itself.

The last General Conference set as the goal of the loan funds \$1,000,000. Dr. W. F. McMurry, our able General Secretary, has, during the past year, added to the amount in hand more than \$100,000, bringing the total up near to the \$700,000 mark. While the Baltimore Conference has the proud distinction of being the largest contributor to these general funds of any Conference in the connection, having to her credit about \$75,000, yet she is, so far, among the backward Conferences in creating a loan fund of her own. We can not too strongly urge the pastors and presiding elders to keep a sharp lookout for possible donations and bequests by benevolent persons towards creating a Conference Loan Fund.

CITY AND DISTRICT ORGANIZATIONS.

To facilitate closer co-operation in the smaller sections of our territory, we desire to call attention to the provision of the Discipline contained in paragraphs 443 and 444. We believe there are great possibilities in the city and district boards, and recommend that effort be made, where there is fair promise, to organize and set in motion such building aids.

UNAUTHORIZED CANVASSING.

We would discourage the fading practice of unauthorized and general canvassing outside the interested territory for funds for local enterprises. It hurts the spirit of self-reliance, annoys the public, and is a detriment rather than an aid to the cause.

MT. PLEASANT.

We are still impressed by the unusual opportunity presented to the Mt. Pleasant enterprise. The rapid growth in this finest section of the city is convincing proof of the wisdom of taking up work in that locality. Imposing buildings are going up throughout the neighborhood, and our own people are among the many who are moving into the section.

We have, in past years, donated \$1,000 to aid the General Board in the purchase of the lots upon which it is proposed to build, and later donations were made to the building fund. This is an indication of the interest in the enterprise felt by the board and by the conference.

We believe the time has now come to erect a suitable building, for without such equipment it is impossible to take full advantage of the magnificent opportunity presented. We, therefore, present the following resolution for adoption by the conference:

"Resolved, That the General Board of Church Extension be requested to transfer the title to the above-mentioned lots on Sixteenth street to the local board of trustees, subject to such conditions as the Board may impose.

LITERATURE.

The Church Extension Hand Book of 1914 is full of information that ought to be in the hands of every pastor and prominent layman. Besides, the general office has many publications in the form of leaflets, folders, and charts bearing on many phases of the subject, that contain ample information for addresses and sermons. A list of these publications appears on pages 487-490 of the Hand Book, and will be cheerfully furnished without cost on application to Dr. W. F. McMurry, Louisville. Kentucky.

REPRESENTATION.

We renew our request for a hearing at all District Conferences and other assemblies where the cause may be properly and profitably presented.

REV. P. W. JEFFRIES.

We ask the privilege of recording our deep sense of loss in the death of Rev. P. W. Jeffries, for several years secretary of our board. No man ever gave more diligent attention to the duties of his office. Early in his official connection with the board he originated and successfully operated a method by which an accurate average judgment of the individual members in making appropriations was arrived at. To such extent was his fitness recognized that the board continued him as secretary even after he had ceased to be a member, four years ago.

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

Your Epworth League Board is pleased to report a year of general success in Epworth League work, both within the bounds of our own Conference and throughout the entire church. The General Secretary reports that twenty-five Conferences were held last summer, attended by approximately six thousand leaguers, and that the Conference organizations were never more prosperous and effective. Despite the figures in the general minutes, a net gain of more than two hundred league chapters is reported by the General Secretary for the past year, this information having been gained by actual correspondence with chapters.

The Epworth Leaguers have assumed the entire budget for the Congo Mission. This lays upon the young people of our church a heavy and solemn obligation, which they are meeting nobly.

The Epworth Era is proving even more popular in its monthly form than when issued each week. There are now eighteen thousand paid-up subscribers, and the magazine is more than meeting expenses.

Attention is called to the new legislation enacted by the last General Conference with reference, 1st, to the better defined relations of the Epworth League Board and the Board of Missions; 2nd, to the formal provision for the Assistant Secretaryship and the Junior League Secretaryship; 3rd, to the recognition in the Discipline of the Intermediate Leaguers, the Knights of Ezelah and the Girls of Epworth: 4th, to the change in the financial plan, by which the Central Office is supported by a Chapter membership fee of \$2.50 from every Chapter, instead of the ten-cent assessment, a cultivation fund of 10% on League specials for Missions over and above the assessment on the charge, and a fee of \$1.00 for issuing charters to the new Leaguers; 5th, to the constitution for the organization of the Conference Epworth League Board: 6th, and to the establishment of Epworth League Anniversary Day, the second Sunday of May, and provision for an offering on that day for Epworth League Extension; one-half to be sent to the Conference Board and one-half to the Central Office.

The Central Office has rendered much assistance during the past year. Dr. F. S. Parker, the General Secretary, has inspired us with new hopes by his strong address and personal counsels.

Our thanks are due Rev. J. P. Tyler for the splendid articles he has furnished the Baltimore Southern Methodist for the Epworth League Page.

Your board recommends: 1st, That Anniversary Day, May 9th, be observed as far as practicable in every pastoral charge; and 2nd, that a Baltimore Conference Epworth League organization be effected during the coming summer.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

We congratulate the Conference that at the close of another Conference year and quadrennium there is the same steady increase in the financial receipts, and number of charges reporting collections. The Treasurer's report will show a net increase in the regular collections over any year of the past, besides a bequest from the late Mr. John A. Adams of Stephens City, Va., of \$270.00.

It is very gratifying to learn through Dr. M. B. Porter of the South Atlantic Agency, that no church organization of any denomination within a similar area as that occupied by the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South, contributes as much annually as does this body; also that there never was a greater demand for the word of God and better opportunity to distribute it than at the present time. But in view of the supreme importance of the circulation of the Word of God, which is the basal feature of the Salvation of Souls, as well as all the work of, and for, the coming of God's Kingdom, and the moral and social uplift of the world; we deplore the fact that so little, comparatively, is being done by us. None of our charges pays proportionately with what they contribute for other interests, and some of the strongest pay virtually nothing towards the American Bible Society, reporting "no collection," which the Discipline requires shall be taken annually in each congregation. Something is radically wrong with the preacher or the people he serves where this is the case.

Therefore be it Resolved-

1st. That in every congregation this subject of the significance and importance of the circulation of the Bible and the claims of the American Bible Society be intelligently presented and the annual collections be taken not later than September the 1st.

2nd. That the Presiding Elders be requested to emphasize the importance of the work of the American Bible Society, both in the Quarterly and District Conferences, and insist upon liberal contributions for the same

3rd. That meetings, at least annually, be held in each of the congregations, and that agents and others qualified be invited to speak in the same.

4th. Should there be sufficient reason for any congregation or individual contributing directly to an agent or local organization, a receipt shall be taken and sent to the Treasurer of the Conference Board.

5th. That receipts from the Treasurer of the Conference Board for moneys sent him during the Conference year, must be sent or brought to the Board, as a voucher, at the ensuing session of the Conference.

6th. That all moneys collected for the Bible during the year be sent promptly to the Treasurer of the Board.

7th. That all reports shall be in, if posible, the first day of the Conference session.

REPORT NO. 2-BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The letter dated March 27, 1912, addressed to Bishop Wilson from Rev. L. E. B. Rosser, who was then pastor of the Miles Memorial Colored Methodist Episcopal Church of Washington, D. C., requesting financial aid for that church, which letter was brought before the last session of our Conference that appointed F. J. Prettyman and E. V. Regester to look into the matter, has been referred to the Board of Missions, with a communication from those brethren requesting that the Board consider the whole question with a view of rendering assistance. Your Board is of the opinion that this matter is outside of its jurisdiction, and respectfully recommends that the matter be referred to the Home Department of the General Board of Missions.

REPORT NO. 3-BOARD OF MISSIONS.

WORK OF THE GENERAL BOARD.

It is a source of gratification to learn that notwithstanding some reduction in revenues on account of the general business depression, the General Board of Missions reports its work in a healthy state and making all the progress that could be expected under existing conditions. It has increased the assessment of our Conference for Foreign Missions from \$14,000 to \$15,900 and that for Home Missions from \$4,500 to \$5,088, as it has increased the assessments on all the other Conferences. Though it is to be regretted that these increases come this year, we cannot afford to take any steps backward, and the only thing to be done is to bravely shoulder them and meet this responsibility, as the Baltimore Conference has met other responsibilities in the past.

We were glad to have with us this year Rev. John M. Moore, D.D., representing the General Board, whose address at the anniversary and whose counsel at our Board meetings were highly appreciated. The anniversary this year was an occasion of great inspiration, when President Wilson, Secretary Daniels, Bishop Candler and Dr. Moore made addresses.

WORK OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD.

The work of the Conference Board, though difficult, has been encouraging. This year, with the co-operation of the preachers of the Conference, it has succeeded in paying all of the men on our mission charges 20% of their allowances on each of the first three-quarters of the year, leaving 40% for final adjustment for the last quarter. This new feature has not only substantially helped the men on the mission charges, but has helped the preachers on the other charges, who thus got their missionary collections in hand earlier in the year than usual. It is vitally important that all of our preachers serving mission charges should fill up the blanks furnished them and return to the Board according to direction, that it may have the proper light for the consideration of the needs of their work.

We are glad to say that, despite adverse conditions, the missionary collections for our Conference this year are exceedingly gratifying, as will be seen from the tabulated report.

The assessment for Conference Missions is slightly in excess of last year, owing to the opening up of new work and special needs.

We welcome the creation by the General Conference of a Board of Lay Activities which promises to be a virile factor in promoting the interests of all of the other Boards of the Conference.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

We recommend the election of Judge E. D. Newman, of Woodstock, Va., as Conference Lay Leader.

We recommend to the Bishop for appointment Rev. D. L. Blakemore as Conference Missionary Secretary, to fill this office in connection with a pastoral charge.

We recommend that all specials throughout the year go through the hands of our Conference Treasurer, Mr. J. E. Alexander, Alexandria, Va., that our Conference may get the proper credit.

We recommend that the Committee on Evangelism be composed of the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions, with the power to add others to it, if it should be deemed wise.

We recommend that Friday night of our next Conference be the time for holding the missionary anniversary.

As shown in the above report, the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies of the Baltimore Conference no longer exist as separate organizations. On the fourth of June, 1914, they were united, and thus was formed the Baltimore Conference Woman's Missionary Society, with two departments—Home and Foreign. The change and consequent readjustments have not retarded the work; indeed, it seems rather to have gone forward with renewed vigor. Reports show an advance along all lines.

Rapid strides have been made in the Junior Division, which has had the greatest increase both in number of auxiliaries and in membership. The Young People too have added large numbers to their ranks. This speaks well for the adult auxiliaries of the future. In spite of the financial stringency of the times, the receipts have gone beyond those of last year in both departments. Not only, however, are numbers and funds greater, but there is an equally encouraging increase in interest and service, as evidenced by larger demands for missionary literature, more Mission Study Classes, and general observance of the Week of Prayer.

When all of our ministers realize that Woman's Missionary work helps rather than hinders local work, and the Woman's Missionary Society takes its true place in every church, then the Baltimore Conference will be second to none in results achieved for our great cause.

REPORT OF THE CITY MISSION BOARD OF BALTIMORE.

Facts and figures embodied in reports are not always impressive, and acts of kindness and errands of mercy lose much of their significance when reduced to cold type. However, this being our only method, we will do the best we can to give a brief summary of the activities of the Board and its faithful workers.

The workers have paid about 2,000 visits during the year; have distributed 445 garments valued at \$165.80; have given away nearly 400 papers, tracts and periodicals of various kinds.

About 45 baskets were distributed at various times to those in need, there having been much sorrow and distress, especially in certain localities during the past winter.

The Mothers' Club, with a membership of 50; three Girls' Clubs, with a combined membership of 65, and one Boys' Club, with a membership of 20, continue to grow in numbers and interest, and we have every reason for being encouraged.

Constant effort is being made to bring the women and children, in the sections where the work is located, nearer to Christ.

\$729.34 has been expended during the year 1914, in the furtherance of this work.

Our workers have been faithful and untiring in the fulfillment of the duties entrusted to them, and we take courage from past results to go forward to larger conquests.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

Your Sunday School Board reports as follows:

Our first duty is to place on record our sincere regret at the absence from the annual meeting, on account of serious illness, of our beloved President, Rev. C. S. Stanton. Suitable resolutions have been adopted and copy sent to Brother Stanton. At his earnest request the Board has accepted his resignation. To fill the vacancy, Brother M. L. Walton has been elected. Brother Stanton's work as President, during his long incumbency of the office, has been faithful, efficient and consecrated. By reading, investigation and conference he has kept fully abreast with the advance of the Sunday School movement.

DR. H. M. HAMILL.

Dr. H. M. Hamill, our Superintendent of Training Work, has passed to his final reward since our last annual meeting. In the death, on January 21, 1915, of this great leader, our Sunday School work has sustained a heavy loss. We have placed upon our minutes a suitable expression of our appreciation of his life and work.

STATISTICS.

We note with satisfaction that the last report of the Sunday School Editor, now a year old, shows the great increase in Sunday School enrollment in our church at large, for the year preceding the report, of 174 schools, 2,028 officers and teachers and 112,544 pupils, a total gain of 114,617, or more than $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., bringing the total enrollment up to 629,690. The very latest statistics show 16,868 schools, 140,575 officers and teachers, 1,584,834 scholars; total enrollment, 1,725,409.

LITERATURE.

We view with satisfaction the continued high character of the Sunday School literature issued by our Publishing House. The Teacher's Magazine, as at present conducted, is especially strong, and its close study by all our teachers must surely produce a higher grade of work in the classes.

The Adult Student grows in favor, and is fully up to the highest standard for such publications. It doubtless has not a little to do with the marked advancement in the organized work which is everywhere apparent. The new publication, The Missionary Messenger, is being received and used with great profit and interest in some schools. We commend it to all. The Worker's Council is likewise calculated to be of great value and assistance to our leaders.

FIELD SECRETARY.

The Board has been able to put in the field during the year a Field Secretary, in the person of Brother A. L. Dietrich. He has made a most auspicious beginning. The Board has re-elected him and has unanimously declared its policy to keep a Field Secretary permanently employed. To accomplish this we must have the support of our preachers and other workers throughout the Conference. Children's Day offerings must be increased and sent promptly to the Treasurer of the Board. Those charges that have not been observing Children's Day, or, if observing it, not taking an offering, are urged to conform to the Discipline in that respect. Above all, charges which have been taking the offering but failing to send it to the Board are most earnestly requested to amend their practice. The co-operation of the pastors is greatly desired.

NEW LEGISLATION.

We rejoice in the wider outlook for Sunday School work indicated in the legislation adopted by the General Conference of 1914, and look for a great advance. We urge that every school, so far as practicable, bring its organization and operations into harmony with this legislation and, further, that it make itself a standard school according to the standard adopted by our General Board.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The committee in charge of the Sunday School Convention are at work upon their plans for this year's convention. They are not yet able to make a definite announcement because of their failure, so far, to find a place which is willing to extend an invitation to entertain the convention. Definite information will be fully circulated at an early date.

ANNIVERSARY.

We recommend that a Sunday School Anniversary Meeting be held on Thursday night of the Conference week next year.

· CHAIRMEN'S MEETING.

The Board has made arrangements for its Chairman to attend the annual meeting of Board Chairmen, which will be held this year at Lake Junaluska. In the event the Chairman is unable to attend, the Secretary is to be his alternate.

REPORT NO. 2—COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

Your Committee on Publishing Interests submits the following report: Never in the history of our church has there been a greater supply of reading matter flooding the country, and never have people done more reading than they are now doing, so it behooves us to inquire into the kind of literature our people are reading, what effect it is having upon them. It takes no prophet or son of a prophet to see what effect some of this literature, falsely called religious, is having upon the minds of some of our young people.

The great daily newspaper may have its educational value, but when such large space is being paid for weekly, for the propagation of doctrines which are false in their conception, misleading in their teaching and positively hostile to the plain teaching of the Word of God, it is time for the ministers and laymen to sound a note of warning.

The question naturally arises, what is the antidote for this spiritual poison?

We answer, first, the Word of God; secondly, the periodicals of our church, the presence of which in the homes of our people safeguards the young against the baneful influence of this false teaching. The one great need of our people is such education as will enable every young Methodist to give a reason why he is a Christian and a Methodist.

The Baltimore Southern Methodist as our Conference organ continues to have a large place in the hearts of our people, and notwithstanding the time of severe financial depression, the circulation continues to increase.

We commend the editorial policy of the paper for its uncompromising stand on the question of prohibition, and from the expressions of many, believe that it has been of great value in the recent fight for state-wide prohibition in Virginia.

The various departments of the paper are growing in interest and are being read by an ever increasingly larger number of our people. While the income of the paper has been largely affected by the exclusion

of all questionable advertisements and by the European War, yet there are a sufficient number of unpaid good subscriptions to more than pay all of the indebtedness of the paper. We recommend that the preachers give their hearty support to the paper by assisting the management in the collection of the unpaid subscriptions and by endeavoring to secure one thousand new subscribers. We recommend that the month of May, 1915, be the time selected for this campaign.

We wish to call attention to the Christian Advocate as a periodical of especial merit, and regret that it is largely a preachers' periodical, as comparatively few of our laymen are subscribers to this excellent paper. We heartily endorse this paper and plead for it a larger circulation among our laymen.

The Methodist Quarterly Review has a larger circulation than it has ever had before in its history of more than half a century. It now not only pays the full expense of publication, but it does much more than this. For the quadrennium from 1906 to 1910 it paid a net profit of nearly \$2,000.00. The quadrennium from 1910 to 1914, the profit amounted to about \$2,500.00, according to the statement of the Publishing Agent. It has subscribers in all parts of the country; over 200 in Canada, and a few in other parts of the world. It has come to be recognized as one of the leading periodicals of its class in the world.

We recommend earnestly that all our preachers take the Review, and that we urge that the attention of our laymen be called to this valuable periodical of our Southern Methodism.

We rejoice in the continued prosperity of our Publishing House the fiscal year ending February 28, 1914, showing a net gain of \$13,589.43, the gain to our Richmond Branch was \$15,248.98.

The unsettled condition of affairs in the financial world has necessarily affected conditions, but with the loyal support of the Southern Methodist Church we believe we shall continue to enjoy continued prosperity.

We appreciate the convenience of the Richmond Branch, and recommend it to loyal patronage of all our people, as an institution unqualifiedly our own.

We call attention to the literature named in the report of the Sunday School, Epworth League, and Mission Boards, which is of excellent character and serves our purpose better than any other could possibly do.

Finally, brethren, let us urge upon all of our people the necessity for better equipment for the service of Christ and the Church, that each may "Study to show himself approved unto God a workman that needeth not to be ashamed."

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The Committee on Sabbath Observance beg leave to submit the following report:

"Whereas, a proper respect for the Holy Sabbath is of incalculable value to the home and the church; and

"Whereas, repeated attempts have been made within the bounds of our Conference to have some good laws on Sabbath Observance repealed; and

"Whereas, there is no form of public amusement and no business. except that of the saloon, that may not be legally conducted in the District of Columbia on the Sabbath as on any other day of the week: therefore be it Resolved:

1. That we urge the members of this Conference and all of our people to use their influence for the enactment of a law for the District of Columbia that will prohibit all theatrical performances, moving picture shows, base ball, and other demoralizing agencies on the Sabbath Day, and that will reduce secular employment, buying and selling to the minimum.

2. That we commend the Lord's Day Alliance and other organizations for the fine work in securing the enactment by the Legislature of the present Sunday laws in the State of Maryland, and for preventing the repeal of these laws when repeated attempts were made to do so, and when bills were introduced striking at the very heart of Sabbath obsevance.

3. That the subject of Sabbath observance be presented to all our congregations by the respective pastors, as early in the Conference year as in their judgment may seem best, endeavoring to quicken and arouse the conscience of our people that they may use their influence against all things that have a tendency to descrate the Holy Sabbath.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The warfare on the legalized liquor traffic continues with an increasing number of brilliant and decisive victories. More and more the public conscience is being aroused. More and more the people are determined that the unholy alliance between our government and this gigantic evil shall be dissolved.

The liquor traffic is national in its organization, character and influence. It is a national menace, ignoring and even defying local or state control, and, therefore, requires national treatment for final relief. Rapidly the States are closing in on this National foe.

Judging by a recorded vote of the House of Representatives of the last Congress on the question of the submission to the States of an amendment to the Constitution for National Prohibition, this country is "dry" in sentiment, and only awaits an opportunity to prove it at the polls. We shall continue to pray and work for National Prohibition as the only final solution of our liquor problem.

We call upon our Senators and Representatives in the Congress of the United States to support a resolution submitting to the several States a Constitutional Amendment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors throughout the United States.

We pledge anew our sympathy and support to the Anti-Saloon League of America, which is leading the fight for National Prohibition.

We most heartily endorse the resolution of our last General Conference, namely:

"Resolved 3. That we endorse the great work which has been done by the Anti-Saloon League in its National and State organizations, and we pledge it our support in the accomplishment of this giant task. We urge our people to remember that the liquor traffic hates the Anti-Saloon League because of its effective work, and endeavors to destroy its effectiveness by exciting suspicion against its leaders. We pledge to these leaders our loyalty and assure them we will not desert them in the hour of battle because of the slanders of the enemy, but that we will rally even more earnestly to their standards and give them our undivided support."

We also recognize and appreciate all of the other forces which are contributing valuable help in the present temperance advance, and are entitled to a share in the honor of the glorious victories being won. In particular we commend the women of our country for the work they are doing in both State and Nation. Under the leadership of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, they are rendering a splendid service in every campaign.

We have great cause to rejoice over the progress the cause of temperance is making in our own Conference territory.

VIRGINIA.

We rejoice to know that the people of Virginia by a majority of more than 32,000 have decreed that the licensed saloon shall be no more. On the first day of November, 1916, the liquor traffic in the Old Commonwealth must legally cease to exist. As Methodists, we especially rejoice, because this notable victory has been won under the leadership of a Methodist minister, an honored member of our Sister Conference, the Rev. James Cannon, Jr., D. D., Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of the State.

However, we would remind our people that the battle is not yet over. for the foe, though beaten, is not yet destroyed, and will raise its

slimy, defiant head again at the first sign of indifference. The price we must pay for victory is eternal watchfulness.

A House of Representatives and 40 State Senators are soon to be elected. We urge our people to use their utmost endeavor to secure the nomination in their respective parties of men who are in sympathy with the legislative programme of the Anti-Saloon League.

We rejoice to learn that the debt incurred by the League has been reduced from \$24,000 to about \$10,000, yet much money will still be needed to effectively carry on the work.

WEST VIRGINIA.

We rejoice in the blessings and benefits of State-wide prohibition for West Virginia. The Prohibition Law in this State took effect on the first day of last July. The good effects were immediately manifest throughout the State.

As had been anticipated, illegal traffic and transportation was at once resorted to by the outlawed traffic, and for a little while the good effects of the law threatened to be minimized, but the splendid law enforcement features of the law were invoked under the leadership of the Commissioner of Prohibition, and the offending transportation companies and illegal traffic have been brought before the courts of the State, and by conviction and injunction have them put out of business.

West Virginia has given a death blow to the argument, "Prohibition does not prohibit."

We urge upon our people throughout the State the importance of seeing that the very excellent Prohibition laws recently enacted by the State are rigily enforced.

MARYLAND.

We are gratified to hear of the progress Maryland is making toward State-wide Prohibition, and urge our pastors and people to support the program of the Maryland Anti-Saloon League to elect a Legislature which will submit the question of State-wide Prohibition to the people to decide for themselves.

We congratulate the Anti-Saloon League on its effective leadership, which has won four counties to the dry ranks since our last Conference Session. Dr. T. M. Hare, the Superintendent of the Maryland League, is exhibiting rare qualifications for the position which he fills, and we commend him for the important service he has already rendered and pledge him our best co-operation for the future.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA.

We urge the Congress of the United States to enact as speedily as possible the necessary legislation to banish the traffic in liquor from

our National Capital, and make Washington, not only a model city for our own country, but the model Capital City of the World.

- (1) Resolved, That we appreciate the part contributed by our Conference organ, the Baltimore Southern Methodist, to the victory for prohibition in Virginia, and we commend the vigorous and uncompromising temperance editorial policy which is making the paper a power in every temperance campaign within the bounds of our Conference.
- (2) Resolved, That the pulpits of our Conference be opened to the representatives of the Anti-Saloon League, and we request the preachers who may be in charge of our work in Virginia to co-operate with those representatives in securing the payment of the debt still owed by the League, and in meeting all other expenses necessary to the proper conduct of the work.
- (3) Resolved, That we note with pleasure the changing attitude of the press and many public men toward the whole temperance movement. Many of our leading dailies, backed by an aroused public sentiment, are now giving the cause of temperance fair treatment, and some are editorially rendering valuable service.

We commend the action of our Secretary of Navy by which for the first time in our history intoxicating liquors have been banished from the Navy.

(4) Resolved, That we pledge ourselves to continue the fight against this great foe of humanity and the Kingdom of God until that for which we have long prayed come to pass, viz, Prohibition of the manufacture, sale, importation, exportation and transportation of intoxicating liquors to be used as a beverage anywhere under the Stars and Stripes.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FEDERATION.

Your Committee on Federation beg leave to report:

Immediately upon the adjournment of the Annual Conference at Its last session, the Committee met and organized, and considered the application of the similar Committee of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church for a joint meeting of the two committees to take action in reference to the protest from their Committee agains the entrance of our Church into Herndon, Va., during the preceding year.

Your Committee agreed to meet as requested, but with the proviso that when we met action should be taken first upon the cases already before the Commission before any new case should be taken up. The cases of Bladensburg and Emory had been laid before the Committee of the Methodist Episcopal Church as long ago as December, 1911, but though we had more than once requested to be informed what action they had taken on them, we had had no information from them on the subject. Indeed, it was finally ascertained that the papers had been mislaid and the whole matter seemed to have been forgotten.

Accordingly, since the original resolutions constituting the Commission, as passed first by both Conferences and afterwards also unanimously by the Joint Commission at its first meeting, declared the object of the Commission to be the improvement of the then "existing conditions," it seemed to your Committee that we should not be expected to take up any new case while the two cases presented by us to their committee, more than five years before, so far as we were informed, had received no attention.

Notice, therefore, was given by us to the Committee of the Methodist Episcopal Church of our readiness to meet them under this proviso. But to this they demurred, and, finally, they notified us that they had taken the Herndon case up to the General Commission on Federation of the two churches.

REPORT OF THE VISITORS TO THE METHODIST HOSPITAL.

A number of gentlemen, members of the three Methodisms represented in the City of Baltimore, Md., came together, formed themselves into an organization under the name of "The Methodist Hospital Association, Incorporated," and became duly incorporated under the said name and title April 27, 1911, sixteen days after the adjournment of the Maryland Conference of that year held in Federalsburg, Md.

The "Association" is composed "of at least thirty managers, of whom seven shall always be laymen and two ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church; seven shall always be laymen and two ministers of the

Methodist Protestant Curch; seven shall always be laymen and two ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the remaining three shall always be members of the Faculty of the Baltimore Medical College of Baltimore City. In the event that the Board of Managers is ever increased or diminished in number the ratable proportion above shall be preserved." Provision is also made in the By-Laws for the annual election of managers in May and for the prompt filling of vacancies occasioned by death.

For good and valuable considerations this corporation received by deed from the Baltimore Medical College of Baltimore City, bearing date of April 27, 1911, certain lot or parcel of land on the east side of Linden Avenue, the north side of Madison Street and the west side of Howard Street, in Baltimore City, Md., with all the buildings and improvements thereupon erected, and all the furniture, appliances and equipment located in the buildings, all of which is fully set forth in the inventory referred to in the deed. The property is fee simple, except certain small lots of leasehold subject to ground rents aggregating the sum of \$200 per annum.

There is also an agreement, carefully prepared in legal phraseology, setting forth in detail, most clearly and comprehensively, the covenants, agreements and stipulations entered into between the Methodist Hospital Association, as the party of the first part, and the Baltimore Medical College of Baltimore City, as the party of the second part. This paper shows that the deed given by the Medical College to the Hospital Association is subject to two mortgage deed of trust executed by the said Medical College, the first to the Mercantile Trust and Deposit Company, Trustee, to secure an issue of First Mortgage Bonds aggregating \$125,000.00; the second to the Fidelity Trust Company. Trustee, to secure an issue of Second Mortgage Bonds, aggregating the sum of \$60,000.00.

To provide for meeting the bonded indebtedness at maturity the Medical College created a sinking fund, which fund has been passed over to the Hospital Association. The amount now in this fund is \$30,000.00. It is on deposit in the Trust Company and draws five per cent. interest, the same rate of the bonds. Deducting the amount of the sinking fund now in hand from the aggregate of bonded indebtedness, leaves the latter \$155,000.00. The bonding scheme is arranged to run forty years from 1901. The sinking fund is planned to parallel that period, but it is now apparent that the present rate of annual deposits to the credit of the sinking fund the bonds can all be cancelled in the period of thirty years from 1901. Your Committee has carefully examined all these papers. We are not lawyers, therefore can not speak from the viewpoint of the legal profession. But to our lay minds and understanding, the papers are clean, clear, comprehensive and satisfactory; all the agrements and stipulations seem most reasonable, fair and just, while the interests of both parties thereto are properly protected.

Whereas, certain members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church are interested in, and as individuals, are aiding morally and financially a corporation in the City of Baltimore known as the Methodist Hospital Association, said Methodist Hospital Association owning and operating (what has heretofore been known as) the Maryland General Hospital, in Baltimore City; and

Whereas, the work of the said Methodist Hospital Association is wholly benevolent; and

Whereas, the said Methodist Hospital Association seeks a close identification with the Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church;

Resolved, That we, the Joint Committee, composed of the members of the several Committees appointed by our several annual Conferences, hereby recommend that our respective Annual Conferences sympathetically co-operate with the Methodist Hospital Association in its (benevolent) work, in every way possible, but without in any way incurring any financial obligation thereby, or becoming responsible for its management in any sense that would bind our Annual Conference legally, financially or morally.

Resolved, Second, That we recommend that our respective Annual Conferences commend the Methodist Hospital to our people for their patronage, and that in the discretion of our pastors, representatives of the Methodist Hospital Association be permitted to present the claims of the Institution from our pulpits and to take contributions in our congregations for its support.

We recommend further that each pastoral charge at the discretion of the pastor observe one Sabbath in the year to be known as Hospital Sunday, and the sacramental collection of that day be given to the Maryland Hospital Association. We recommend that each of our conferences appoint a committee of visitation to the Hospital.

MEMOIRS

LAFAYETTE FOX.

Rev. Lafayette Fox was born near Sudley, Va., July 14, 1846, and on July 14, 1914, the 68th anniversary of his birth, took his departure for his home on high. He was the son of Jacob and Margaret Fox, and one of seven children, four of whom still survive, viz: Jacob, Sylvester and Zachariah Fox and Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor.

In many respects Brother Fox was a remarkable man. His people were poor, and growing up as he did just after the Civil War, when education was so difficult for young men without means, he struggled against hardship and bravely fought his way in the face of opposition. He felt his call to the ministry and set to work to prepare for it. He studied two years under the direction of the late Rev. Thomas Hildebrand, with direct reference to the work of preaching the Gospel which he loved to do. Brother Fox was always ready to preach. His surrender to his Lord was complete and without reserve. His highest ambition was to preach "Christ crucified, the power of God unto salvation."

He entered the ministry in the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in 1872, and his first appointment was as second man on Bladensburg Charge. In 1873 he was junior preacher on Hillsboro Circuit. In 1874 he was ordained Deacon at Staunton, Va., by Bishop David S. Doggett, and put in charge of Elk Run, where he served one year. He was ordained Elder in 1876 by Bishop Enoch M. Marvin, at Winchester. From 1875 to 1877 he served Furnace No. 2; after which he served four years on each of the following charges: Strasburg, Greenbank, W. Va., Shenandoah, Warren, Stafford, Frederick and Warren again, which terminated his active ministry in 1905; after which time he held a superannuate relation, until his death.

As a preacher, he was fluent and gifted in the use of excellent language. His thought was pure and lofty, and his bearing dignified and manly, though as humble as a little child. Truly he was one of God's great men, "a workman that needed not to be ashamed," universally beloved and popular wherever he went. He was jovial and lively; fond of life and lively people, but never indulging in questionable language. His desire was to be a help to others. Often when meeting a person his salutation would be: "Beloved, what can I do for you?" His thought was of what he could do for others, not what someone might do for him. And this thought dominated him when going to a new field of labor; what he might be able to do for the people, and not what the charge might be able to do for him.

Being a man of strong faith, he yielded a cheerful obedience to the call of duty; not considering his own personal pleasure, but the will of

his Master. In the performance of duty he knew no compromise with evil. He stood for the right as he saw it, and when his conviction was clear there was no surrender.

He claimed the Lord Jehovah as his ally, and felt no hesitancy in calling upon Him for help. He talked to God as one standing in His presence and expecting immediate response. He believed in prayer, as was singularly attested in one instance during his ministry. When called on to officiate at the funeral of a murdered man, he made the apprehension of the murderer the subject of prayer, and almost immediately the trail of the murderer was marked by the withering of the forest trees along the way from the spot where he stood when he fired the fatal bullet. Such was the modesty of the man that he would never allow himself to be drawn into discussion of the circumstance. But it may be said that his fame went out far and wide as that of a man whose hands were on the horns of the Altar and whose heart was in touch with Him who said: "And whatsoever ye shall ask in my name, that will I do."

Brother Fox was clear in his enunciation of the plan of salvation, and was successful in winning souls to Christ, as many who still live can testify. No doubt, there will be many stars in his crown, as "They that turn many to righteousness shall shine as the stars forever."

A good and true man has gone from amongst us, and we miss him. but we know where he has gone, and there we shall see him in the presence of his Lord in that day when we shall appear in the presence of Him who redeemed us.

On February 19, 1874, Brother Fox was married to Miss Susan Catherine O'Rear. This tie did not last long, as death soon claimed his companion. One child was born of this union. His second marriage was on February 12, 1879, to Miss Annie Cordelia Connell. Of this union there were four children. His third wife was Miss Catherine Victoria Stoneburner, to whom he was married on February 24, 1889, and who survives him. There were five children born of this marriage, all of whom survive save one, Enoch Marvin, who preceded his father to the Glory Land.

The funeral was conducted at the Methodist Church in Front Royal, on Wednesday, July 15, at 11 o'clock, by Rev. J. C. Copenhaver, assisted by Rev. T. J. Lambert, P. E. of the Winchester District, and others. Interment was in Prospect Hill Cemetery, Front Royal, Va.

J. HERVEY DU LANEY.

On the seventh day of September, 1914, Dr. James Hervey Du Laney left us for the eternal home in the triumph of an all conquering faith. The close of his earthly life was after the manner of the fathers of Methodism; with undimmed vision he looked upon the glories of the

world beyond, and with the simplicity of the faith of a little child, he rested his head upon the bosom of his Divine Saviour and slept while the cloudless day was breaking upon his redeemed spirit. A short time before his death he dictated to his daughter a few facts concerning his life and ministry, giving those events which, we may presume, he would desire to stand as the record of his career in the minutes of his Conference.

He was born at Abingdon, Harford County, Maryland, January 25, 1836. His father, Rev. Aquila Du Laney, was a local preacher in the Methodist Church for about fifty years, and his mother, Susan Ann Taylor, was the daughter of Isaiah Taylor, one of the first stewards of the Methodist Church in Harford County. He joined the Methodist Church in Cecil County at the age of seventeen, and soon after felt the call to preach the Gospel. He resisted the influence of the Holy Spirit, and moved to the State of Missouri. For five years he sought to rid himself of the impression of his divine call to the ministry, but in September, 1858, he yielded to the influence of the Spirit and joined the St. Louis Conference. His first appointment was as a volunteer missionary to the Ozark Mountains. Here he began that heroic career that has left such a deep impression upon his Church. This experience seems to have given color to his whole ministry, and zest to his never ending effort for the salvation of souls. In 1860 he married Miss Mary Priscilla Stier, of Frederick County, Maryland. Returning with his bride to the West, he served at Perryville Circuit, in the St. Louis Conference, for three years. On account of the war he found himself compelled to leave Missouri in the fall of 1863, and came to Washington, D. C., where he remained until the close of the war. During his stay in Washington his wife died, and in March, 1866, he married Miss Sarah Virginia Shipley, daughter of Charles Shipley of Baltimore, Md. His next move was to Kentucky, where he was ordained Deacon by Bishop Doggett at Winchester, Ky. He remained in the Kentucky Conference for eighteen months, and then returned to his native State to cast his lot with the Southern Methodist Church. Amid the chaotic conditions of the Church on the Eastern Shore of Maryland following the war he began a work that firmly planted the Church in Kent and Queen Anne's Counties. This was accomplished by two large campmeetings, and numerous revivals, at which there were marked demonstrations of the favor and power of the Spirit. From that time he served various charges in the Baltimore Conference until the spring of 1907, when he took the superannuate relation. Among the charges which he served were Dranesville Circuit, Piedmont Circuit, Winchester Circuit, Hillsboro, Va., Linganore, Montgomery Circuit, Wesley Grove, Beltsville, Howard, Frederick Avenue. Baltimore, Freedom Circuit. At the time of his superannuation, while not able to stand the strain of all the pastoral duties, he still retained great vitality as a preacher and was almost continuously engaged in supplying vacant pulpits and assisting in camp-meetings and revivals to the time of his last sickness.

Dr. Du Laney was a graduate dental surgeon, and as opportunity offered he practiced his profession.

Such is the simple record of one of the truly heroic souls of the Baltimore Conference. His Methodist inheritance and his strong personal faith made of him the embodiment of the spirit of the early Church. As fully as any man of his generation he fulfilled the exhortation of St. Paul: "Not slothful in business; fervent in spirit; serving the Lord." His preaching was after the model of John Wesley-simple in style, thoroughly scriptural, strongly evangelical, convincing in logic. He was welcome in all pulpits on all occasions. He was eager for results. He never missed an opportunity to invite sinuers to the Saviour, and as a result of his insistent pleading a great multitude of souls found the way of salvation. Not even the briefest sketch of his life would be complete without mention of his buoyant spirit. It always did you good to meet him. He loved his brethren in the ministry. Who ever heard from him an unkind word or a cutting criticism? His life was an open book. Kindly in his attitude toward all, sincere in his friendship, high in his ideals, he kept alive the spirit of the itinerant brotherhood. Every heart in the Conference is sad today as we think that we shall not grasp his friendly hand, nor hear the overflowing mirth of his heartening salutation at this annual meeting. He will not be changed much when we meet him in heaven.

His death was glorious. Surrounded by his wife and children, who tenderly responded in every loving ministry to his passionate care for their spiritual welfare, he seemed to bring earth and heaven close together in that room. He was heard at last to say: "I wish Jesus would come." This he repeated several times. Finally he said to his son: "Good-bye, darling boy, I'm going home." When the hope was expressed that he might yet get better, he said: "Yes; I think I'll go today." He seemed to catch a vision of loved ones on the other shore, and called them by name. Following the vision with his eyes for a short time, he finally yawned as a tired child and went to sleep.

"O happy, happy soul!
In ecstacies of praise,
Long as eternal ages roll,
Thou seest thy Saviour's face.
Redeemed from earth and pain,
Ah! when shall we ascend,
And all in Jesus' presence reign
With our translated friend?"

At his request, his funeral service was conducted by Brother E. V. Regester at Mt. Vernon Place Church, Washington. The sermon was preached by Dr. H. P. Hamill. A large number of preachers attended

the service. His body was laid to rest in Loudoun Park Cemetery, Baltimore.

What a faith is this! Its inspiration is the passion of eternity, its reward is the joy of service, its product is the transformed life of men, and the measure of its glory is the power and grace of the Son of God. The legacy of his life to his family and to the Church is the undimmed record of a life that followed Jesus the Lord.

CHARLES L. DAMARON.

Rev. Charles Louis Damaron was born in Frankford, W. Va., December 13, 1840, and died in Baltimore City, Md., November 20, 1914.

When only an infant he was adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Ralph McMullin, of Frankford, W. Va., splendid Methodist people, who reared him with all Christian tenderness and gave him most careful religious training. Surrounded thus by such helpful influences it is no surprise that he was early converted and joined the Methodist Church.

In 1863, Brother Damaron heeded the Spirit's call to preach the Gospel, and was licensed to preach at Churchville, Augusta County, Va., by Rev. E. R. Veitch, Presiding Elder of Rockingham District. At the Conference which met in Bridgewater, Va., March 10, 1864, he was admitted on trial into the travelling connection and was appointed to Bridgewater Circuit as Junior Preacher under Rev. G. R. Jefferson. He was ordained Deacon by Bishop Early at Alexandria, Va., in 1866, and in 1869 was ordained Elder in Baltimore, Md., by Bishop Wightman.

During his active Ministry, Brother Damaron served the following charges: Bridgewater, as Junior Preacher, 1864-65; Warm Springs, 1865-67; Fairfield, 1867-70; Botetourt, 1870-73; Hedgesville, 1873-75; New Market, 1875-77; Union, 1877-80; Christiansburg, 1880-83; Middleburg, 1883-85; Gardenville, 1885-86; Aberdeen, 1886-90; Hinton, 1890-91, and Berryville, 1891-92.

After two years' service at Berryville, Brother Damaron, on account of ill-health, was granted the relation of superannuate preacher. He continued his residence in Berryville for one year after passing to the honor roll of the Conference, when he moved to Baltimore, spending the remainder of his earthly life in the Monumental City.

His was not a nature to remain idle; so, after retiring from the ranks of the active Ministry, he found much to do for his Lord as his physical strength would permit. Ever willing to supply pulpits in the absence of pastors, he received many calls for such service and always responded cheerfully. He ministered at many sick bedsides and soothed many distressed hearts. At Central Church, where he spent his last days, his work abides. He taught in the Sunday School, and his splendid expositions of the Holy Scriptures to his class made impressions

that glow in the memory of its members to this day. His careful, mature judgment about matters concerning his local Church was a great aid many times to the pastor in deciding perplexing questions. But his opinion on any subject had to be sought; for his modest spirit revolted at even the semblance of interference with the prerogatives of the pastor himself. While his strength lasted, he took supreme delight in attending to any duties committed to his care in the absence of his pastor, and many were the times he was thus left in charge and never was a detail of any trust neglected.

Brother Damaron loved the Baltimore Conference and believed in her divine mission. Coming into her ranks during the troublous times of the Civil War, he served in her Ministry under all of the hard conditions incident to that perilous conflict. During the trying period of Reconstruction he stood valiantly at his post along with the other heroes of the Cross of those days, who gathered together the fragments of Methodism left by the war, and laid anew the foundation upon which has risen our great Church in the bounds of the Baltimore Conference. He lived to see the successful outcome of the labors of those heroic days and rejoiced to have had a part in them. His interest in the affairs of his Conference never flagged. At the Conference in Baltimore last year he asked permission to send by a friend his sealed ballot for delegates to the General Conference, as he could not attend in person because too ill. The Conference, with fine courtesy, granted his request, and he passed to his eternal reward happy to have shared actively in the proceedings of the last Conference of his earthly career. Never did a pastor of his leave for any gathering of preachers without bearing this message from Brother Damaron: "Give my love to the brethren."

In private life the noble virtues and beautiful graces of Christian character shone out most brilliantly in Charles L. Damaron.

Gentle, tender, devoted, helpful to those nearest to him, and ever exemplifying before them the religion he professed, his life now looms large in their memory as a vivid illustration of the fine product of divine grace in a surrendered life.

No higher tributes are paid to his Christian worth than those which come from his own loved ones who lived in his presence day by day, and formed their judgments at close range. As of nature, so may it be said of some men, "'Tis distance lends enchantment to the view"; but the pure life of Charles L. Damaron threw its most enchanting spell upon those who were closest to him in the sacred circle of his own fireside.

On April 25, 1864, Brother Damaron married Miss Sara Catharine Allen, of Port Republic, Va., who survives him. The wedded life of this pair of congenial souls proved most happy. To the last, the husband proved the same ardent lover who won the girlish heart of his life-companion originally, and his courtly conduct toward her never

changed with the passing years. Though other willing hearts and hands respond to her every want, his tender, self-sacrificing ministeries, especially in her later years of physical decline, are sadly missed by the lonely widow who sits and waits with longing heart for the happy time of reunion, which cannot be much longer delayed.

Six children—five daughters and one son—were born to Brother and Sister Damaron, five of whom, four daughters and one son, are still living to revere the memory of their honored father.

The rigors of army life spent in the Confederate service during the first years of the Civil War proved too severe for Brother Damaron's physical constitution, and laid the foundation for a lifelong struggle with disease. When he superannuated in 1892, it was with the full expectation on his part that he would not live the year out. Though he lived for more than twenty years afterwards, it was a perpetual marvel to him why God should permit him to live on under such a hopeless handicap as his ill-health, while so many of his brethren, younger in years and more vigorous in health, were removed, many of them summarily by death, from the ranks of the Ministry. In conversation one day, a short time before his death, he named offhand about twenty members of the Conference who had died in their prime since he had ceased his own labors as a travelling preacher. He bore his sufferings like a man and a Christian, and patiently waited his Heavenly Father's will. Though long delayed, the summons finally came "to depart to be with Christ." The coming of death did not surprise or perturb him. His hope was in the Conqueror of Death. Almost the last words he ever spoke to the writer of this Memoir were: "Christ is all and in all." With this testimony freshly fallen from his lips, Charles L. Damaron, one of God's true noblemen, left us for the Heavenly World, November 20, 1914.

Funeral services were conducted at Central Church, Baltimore, Md., on Sunday afternoon following, by the writer, assisted by Dr. J. T. Wightman, Rev. C. D. Harris, Dr. Isaac W. Canter and Rev. C. M. Hesser. A large attendance of friends attested the high esteem in which he was held.

A touching contribution to the funeral service was the solo, "Face to Face," rendered by Mrs. C. H. Kriete, of Aberdeen, Maryland, whom Brother Damaron received into the Church as a little girl. His remains were taken to Harrisonburg, Va., for interment. A detail of old Confederate soldiers met the body at the station and formed an honorary escort to the cemetery. There we laid to rest all that remained mortal of our friend and companion in the Comradeship of the Ministry of the old Baltimore Conference.

Though never again shall we hear his familiar voice respond to the roll-call of the Conference he loved so dearly, yet when the roll of the General Assembly on High is called, we shall not listen in vain for

those same familiar tones in answer to his name. He is not lost to us, but saved forevermore.

PETER W. JEFFRIES.

Rev. Peter Williams Jeffries was born at Liverpool, England, December 11, 1857. He was the son of Thomas and Eliza Grace Jeffries, and the grandson of Captain Peter Williams of the Royal Navy, from whom he received his name. He received his education, first at the Liverpool College. At the age of fourteen he joined the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Fairfield, England, of which his parents and family were active members. He began a business career with the firm of P. R. McQuie & Son, and later was connected with the firm of Mr. Joseph P. Brunner. Feeling called to the Ministry, in 1882 he entered Didsbury College, Manchester, where he studied for three years. While at Didsbury he was under the instruction of Dr. William Burt Pope and Dr. John Drury Geden, who were both members of the Old Testament Revision Committee. According to the practice of the Wesleyan Church. he served four years as a probationer, when he was received into the Ministry, and continued his connection with that Church for ten years. While holding the relation of probationer of the British Wesleyan Church he served two years as District Missionary and two years at Welshpool. Upon entering the Conference he was stationed at Welshpool one year, Newton Abbott three years, Yeovil three years, and at Bishop Auckland three years.

At the session of the Baltimore Conference held in the City of Washington in March, 1899, Bishop J. C. Granberry presiding, he presented his application for admission to our Church and Ministry. With his application he presented his credentials as an Elder in the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and also a letter from Bishop E. R. Hendrix. This letter was inspired by a letter from Rev. Richard Martin, D. D., of Sutton, England. He was unanimously received, and was sent to Staunton, Va., for his first charge. He remained in Staunton three years, when he was selected by Bishop Galloway to take charge of Calvary Church, Baltimore. While at Calvary his work attracted the attention of Bishop Wilson, who after two years of service in the

Baltimore Church, selected him to take charge of a new enterprise in Washington, to be known as St. Paul. During his pastorate at St. Paul he was instrumental in the building of this church and in the purchase of a parsonage. The work grew under his wise leadership, and has now become one of our strong churches in this city. At the close of his full term of four years at St. Paul he was sent by Bishop Wilson to Warrenton, Va. At this time another important work was to be begun in the new residential section of Washington, and again Bishop Wilson put him in charge of this congregation known as Mt. Pleasant. Here he organized a congregation; and with the aid of the Church Extension Board secured three lots on Sixteenth Street, called the Avenue of the Presidents, as the future site of the church. He remained at Mt. Pleasant four years, and was stationed at Wilkens Avenue, Baltimore. Here he ceased at once to work and live.

On Sunday, November 29, 1914, after three weeks' illness, he entered into rest. Within a month of the date of the signing of the treaty of Ghent, which has marked the period of a hundred years of peace with England, this Englishman gave up his life after fifteen years of unre mitting toil for the spiritual uplift of our country as an ambassador of Christ. In each of his appointments his work was distinctly constructive. This was particularly so at St. Paul and Mt. Pleasant, in Washington City, which are the creations of his skill and leadership. To his success as an organizer and builder of churches must be added his great service to the church through his connection with the Conference Board of Church Extension. The business method of this Board is his plan. He was the secretary of the board for years, and it was largely through his efforts that the Baltimore Conference has been the leading Conference in church extension for a number of years. active co-operation with the women of the Church in the activities of the Woman's Missionary Society also gave to his ministry a wide, lasting influence and blessing.

In making the briefest reference to our estimate of the worth of this man of God, we would mention first of all that he was a Christian gentleman. By inheritance and by culture he lived among us after the fashion of the highest ideals of manhood—courteous, modest, refined in every feeling, gentle in every expression of his personality. He was clean of speech, and we may venture to say that no one ever heard him utter a sentiment, even in the strictest confidence that could not with propriety be repeated on this occasion.

He was a man of vision. His outlook upon the world was through the windows of prayer. Most of his praying was in the secret place, not in the public sanctuary, and so he gained much of God's view of life. He next measured life by the word of God. No form of literature took for him the place of the Old and New Testaments. He knew from the Book the methods of God's dealing with His children. Added to this, he took a keen interest in the actual affairs of life. He got

much of his information of the world's need at first hand. He was the friend of the toiler. No soul was so unfortunate as not to find in him a sympathetic friend and a willing helper.

Out of these spiritual experiences and practical hand-to-hand contact with men of all classes he saw the trend of affairs and could read the signs of the times. He was a man of strong convictions. He had no controversy with God. Strictly orthodox in his personal faith, yet no man was more lenient and patient with the weak and erring. He would be the last man to compromise a principle, no matter how unpopular his position might be. You always knew where to find him.

He was a patient and tireless toiler. Duty was the watchword of his life. Time and again we have seen him take his stand in the hard places. He would say that difficulties have no use except to be overcome. And how he overcame them! His courage and conviction were contagious, and, before you could suspect, a great plan began to develop and take shape, and from the smallest beginnings, a great church, fully organized, would begin its splendid ministry.

If I were asked what sort of a man was Peter W. Jeffries in his inner and personal life, I would mention his relation to two men—Rev. Richard Martin of England and Bishop A. W. Wilson. Dr. Richard Martin was one of the choicest spirits of English Methodism. A man of great learning and culture, and devoutly pious. He was as widely known throughout England as any Methodist minister in the Kingdom. He was devoted to the interests and welfare of Brother Jeffries. He had visited this country, and was intimately acquainted with the spirit and policy of Southern Methodism. It was upon his advice that we received the helpful ministry of our brother.

We all know the appreciation and warm personal affection in which Brother Jeffries was held by Bishop A. W. Wilson. Our great Bishop, held by us all as the greatest theologian of American Methodism in a whole generation, knew and respected his great worth. He gave him four of his six appointments.

A man is known by his friends. If so, it is a commentary that needs no other explanation to recall that these two great and good men, famed in two continents for their learning and piety, were his friends.

We will keep his precious dust in this place where his greatest work was done. Two churches will stand as a perpetual memorial to his name, and from his achievements we will take courage and carry on our work to the glory of our Lord.

"Men die, but sorow never dies;
The crowding years divide in vain,
And the wide world is knit with ties
Of common brotherhood in pain."

JOHN T. WIGHTMAN.

Rev. John Thomas Wightman. D. D., was born in Charleston, S. C., September 9, 1825, and died in Baltimore, March 3, 1915, in the ninetieth year of his age. His parents were John Thomas Wightman and Eliza Stohl his wife, both of whom were well grounded in Methodist doctrine and discipline. He came from a distinguished Methodist family, as the lives of the Wightmans are interwoven with the history of South Carolina Methodism. Bishop Wightman was his first cousin.

He attended Cokesbury School, at Cokesbury, in his native State, from 1839 to 1842, and in one of those years professed conversion and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church of that place. Later he graduated from Charleston College with the degree of A. B. The honorary degree of D. D. was conferred upon him by the South Carolina University some years later.

In 1848 he united with the South Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and was sent to Wadesboro Circuit, and subsequently stationed at Charleston, Columbia, Cheran, Camden, Spartansburg and Marion; in several of these cities he served more than one term, his pastorates in Charleston aggregating nineteen years. During his ministerial service in the South Carolina Conference, he served as Presiding Elder of the Shelby District, North Carolina, which was then a part of the Conference to which he belonged.

He was paster in Charleston during the three seasons of yellow fever, when thousands were stricken, and untiringly ministered to the suffering in smitten homes and hospitals, until his strength gave way and he himself became three times a victim to the plague.

He preached the first sermon under the Confederate flag to the soldiers at Fort Sumter, after its surrender at the beginning of the War between the States. He was pastor of Trinity in Charleston during its historic bombardment. The church was in an exposed area and was under the fire of the besiegers' guns, and often the preacher's voice was drowned by the noise of bursting shells. The detonation of the explosions were so heavy that the massive obelisks in the cemetery of the city were moved several inches out of line on their pedestals. Eight of these death-dealing missiles penetrated the church, two entered the parsonage and many buried themselves in the yard, but the intrepid preacher, with a large white congregation and three thousand colored people under his pastoral care, remained fearlessly at his post. Pemberton, in command of the city, contemplated suspending the religious services for colored people, but was dissuaded from doing so by Dr. Wightman, to whose influence with that race, which considerably outnumbered the white population, was due the marked fidelity and devotion to their masters that is said to be unparalleled in the annals of history. A Methodist preacher held the key of the city and controlled the situation with a master's hand.

SO REPORTS.

Dr. Wightman established a daily union prayer meeting at Trinity during the blockade of Charleston, which was largely attended and participated in by the pastors and members of all denominations. These unique services calmed the spirit of the people and taught them to look to God in those appalling days, when men were in danger of the terror by night, the arrow that flieth by day, the pestilence that walketh in darkness, and the destruction that wasteth at noonday.

Though it is estimated that 50,000 missiles were hurled into the heart of that city and two thousand houses were struck, the remarkable fact is there were not more than ten lives lost. Dr. Myers, of Georgia, in a speech before the South Carolina Conference, commenting on this phenomenal immunity, said: "A monument of brass should be erected in the city on which should be inscribed, 'Saved by Prayer.'" The history of those memorable days of Charleston would be incomplete without the name of John T. Wightman writ large upon its pages.

He was stationed at Camden, S. C., during Sherman's "March to the Sea," and there lost almost his entire patrimony that was invested in cotton for safe-keeping, which was burned on a plantation by the invaders.

While a member of the South Carolina Conference Dr. Wightman was president of the Board of Trustees of Columbia Female College for some time, and for ten years was chairman of the Board of Conference Claimants. He organized the first Sunday School convention south of the Potomac, at Charleston in 1859.

In 1885 on the advice of physicians, he moved to Baltimore in an attempt to restore the health of his wife and daughter, and served Chatsworth Independent Methodist Church five years. In 1890 he became a member of the Baltimore Conference and was stationed successively at Mt. Vernon Place Church, Washington, Emmanuel Church, Baltimore, and Lexington, Va. In 1899 he took the superannuate relation.

In 1857 he was happily married to Amelia Wilson Spain, daughter of Rev. Albertus Spain, of the South Carolina Conference, who preceded him to the better world in 1910. From this union five children were born; Dr. Arthur C., who died about eleven years ago while a professor at Randolph-Macon College; J. Pinckney, of Ashland, Virginia; Annie Eliza, who died in 1899 and who will be remembered as her father's "second pastor," as he affectionately called her; Albert Spain and Francis Pelzer, of Baltimore, with whom their father made his home. Those who knew Dr. Wightman recall how beautiful and Christlike his life was among men, but one of his sons remarked that it was even more beautiful and Christlike in his home.

Since his superannuation, Dr. Wightman has resided in Baltimore beloved by all who knew him, especially by the pastors and people of the three Methodisms. Though he loved his own Church with an undying devotion, his sympathies were as boundless as the Kingdom

of God. He loved all of God's people, and particularly the people called Methodists. His broad catholic spirit dwelt in an atmosphere far removed from all denominational bitterness. As long as he had the strength his energies were freely expended in pulpit ministrations in and out of the city and in visiting the sick and bereaved. He was lovingly spoken of as "The Grand Old Man," whose life was a benediction to Baltimore Methodism.

For some weeks previous to his death, he had been confined to his home from the effects of a fall on the street, but was seriously ill only several days. As the shadows were gathering on Wednesday evening, March 3, the light of a new day burst upon his vision and the spirit of John T. Wightman entered the Holy City, so often the subject of his thoughts and dreams. His funeral services were conducted at St. Paul's Church on the following Friday afternoon, by the pastor, Rev. L. S. Rudasill, assisted by several of the city preachers, in the presence of a large congregation, after which his remains were interred in Loudoun Park Cemetery near the mounds of his loved ones.

As a mark of the veneration and love of the Methodist people of Baltimore, a memorial service was held at St. John's-Emmanuel Church in that city, on Sunday afternoon. March 21, under the auspices of the three Methodisms—Bishop A. W. Wilson of our Church, Dr. C. Herbert Richardson of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and Dr. T. O. Crouse of the Methodist Protestant Church, paying loving tributes to the character and worth of this distinguished son of Methodism. Bishop Wilson said he almost begrudged Heaven such a gain, for he felt that it was a pity that John T. Wightman, with his clear, strong mind, well cultivated, could not live a thousand years in service for God and humanity. The ministerial quartette, composed of four ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church, sang "Crossing the Bar," and "Good-night, Beloved."

As a man Dr. Wightman was distinguished by a chivalrous bearing, a courtly grace and a native culture that marked him as one of the finest products of the Old South. He was gentle, unselfish, sunny-tempered, noble-minded—the soul of all that is beautiful and exalted in humanity.

As a Christian, he was a man of simple, childlike faith, and of the deepest piety, and could say with a meaning deeper than words, "I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live; yet not I but Christ liveth in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith of the Son of God, who loved me, and gave himself for me." Death had no terrors for him, for he looked upon it for a white-winged angel, who should release him from his frail tenement of clay, and let him go home to God.

As a pastor he was sympathetic and comforting, especially in the home of sickness and death, and he never entered a home without

carrying the breath of heaven with him, making its inmates feel conscious of the presence of the Spirit of the Christ.

But his chief strength was in the pulpit, for he was a great preacher. He had a genuius for preaching, and preaching was the passion of his life. He believed with every fibre of his being in the regenerative, transforming, sanctifying power of God's spirit in rehabilitating a lost and ruined humanity and making it the glory of earth. Someone has told the strange history of the bells of St. Michael's, Charleston, Dr. Wightman's native city, that have chimed the hours of morning and evening prayer since Colonial times. They have crossed the ocean five times. During the Civil War they were shipped to Columbia for safe-keeping. But on a certain famous "March to the Sea" they were burned and broken into fragments by vandal hands. But every sacred piece was gathered up and all were shipped back to the foundry in which they were originally cast. They were made anew and brought home to the tower of St. Michael's without the loss of a single note or the lowering of a single majestic tone.

Dr. Wightman believed that God could do even more with every sinful, broken human life; that He could gather up the scarred and scattered fragments, make them anew in His image and put cathedral music in the reedemed soul. With such a conviction, it is not surprising that his pulpit utterances, especially at the zenith of his power, resulted in the salvation of many souls.

· He loved exegesis, was familiar with his Greek Testament and delighted in finding the inner meaning of the word. Many of his sermons were scholarly expositions of the great doctrines of the Bible, clothed in exquisite diction and rhetoric, and delivered with an impassioned eloquence that at times was overwhelming in its effect upon his hearers.

The writer once heard him when his eye was lighted up with divine fire, his face was iluminated with an unearthly glory, and his slight frame shaken with strong emotion as he described in words and thoughts that seemed to be inspired, the crucifixion of our Lord. The very atmosphere seemed to be vibrant with the winged visitants of the heavenly world.

His lecture on the Atonement delivered before the Methodist preachers of Baltimore shortly before his death was pronounced by competent judges one of the truly great utterances on that subject—an utterance that will linger many years in the minds of those who heard him.

But the eloquent tongue is mute—the voice that charmed multitudes is hushed. Know ye not that a prince and a great man has fallen in Israel? There are no honors that earth could give that could have made him greater than he was. He needed none of the things of this world to make him great, for true greatness, according to the divine standard, had stamped itself upon his life and character. His life as a

star of the first magnitude has not become extinguished—it has simply vanished from our sight and still shines on with undimmed splendor.

"The star that sets

Behind the western wave is not extinct;
It brightens in another hemisphere,

And gilds another evening with its rays.
Oh, glorious hope of immortality!"

HENRY HOMAN.

The subject of this memoir, Rev. Henry Homan, was born in Hesse-Cassel, Germany, October 23, 1821, and after several years of feeble health, died at his home, near Ridgeville, W. Va., January 2, 1914. He was the youngest son of Conrad and Katherine Homan.

At the age of twenty-two, Brother Homan decided to come to America. After a perilous voyage of three months in a common sailboat, on January 2, 1844, he landed at Baltimore, Md. His future home was found in what is now Mineral County, W. Va., where he engaged in farming and fruit-raising until advancing years compelled him to retire from active life.

Brother Homan was soundly converted in the autumn of 1844, and at once united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. At this time his home fell within the bounds of the then Virginia Conference of our Church, and he was closely associated with Drs. James A. Duncan, W. W. Bennett and other leaders of that Conference in those early days.

After the organization of the Baltimore Conference, Brother Homan's residence fell within its bounds, and he became a pillar of strength for our Methodism, not only in his own community, but also in what we know as the "Moorefield District." He served the Church faithfully as steward, exhorter, class-leader and Sunday School superintendent, but his greatest service was rendered as local preacher. He was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Petersburg Circuit, in 1874, Rev. David Thomas presiding elder, and was ordained Deacon at Staunton, Va., March 4, 1886, by Bishop McTyeire. Brother Homan magnified his office in the ministry. He was every ready to assist his brethren in the active work, and at times served with acceptability various circuits as preacher-in-charge.

Brother Homan was a Methodist of the old type. His home was always open to a Methodist preacher, and many a weary itinerant found rest and inspiration there. He was a man of great faith. His familiarity with the great hymns of the Church and with the Word of God was remarkable. At times his religious emotions found expression in shouts of praises unto God.

The preaching of Brother Homan was strikingly original and scriptural. In intellectual and spiritual power, at times, his sermonas were remarkable, and he was always possessed of a fine sense of humor, which he used in his discourses with telling effect. Great crowds would gather at whatever place it was known that he was to preach. He was never happier than when in a revival, and he had many souls for his hire—his "sheaves," he called them. Many of his characteristic utterances still linger in the minds of those who heard them. Especially in his sermons on "Jesus Only," "The Seven Steps to the Throne," and on the "Parable of the Lost Sheep," did Brother Homan rise to true greatness in declaring the Gospel. His last public service was leading the experience meeting at Van Myra Camp, near Burlington, W. Va., August 25, 1913.

On December 15, 1848, in the room in which he died. Brother Homan was married happily to Miss Mary Carroll Hogan, who preceded him to the better world on May 9, 1890. Five children were born to them, four of whom are living—Rev. German O. Homan, of Roanoke, Va.; Henry C. Homan, of Sweet Springs, W. Va.; Mrs. Olivia F. Clause, of Ridgeville, W. Va., and Miss Mona K. Homan, who resides at the old family residence.

The funeral services of Brother Homan were conducted at his late home, on January 4, 1914, by his pastor, Rev. J. H. Wilhite, assisted by Revs. Harry V. Wheeler and M. H. Keen, after which his body was laid away in the family cemetery by the grave of his wife, to await the resurrection of the just. "Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright; for the end of that man is peace."


