REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

RANDOLPH-MACON SYSTEM.

The reports of the several institutions of the Randolph-Macon System to the Board of Education are of vital concern, and show the following interesting facts:

Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, Virginia, has property valued at \$149,129.60 and an endowment of \$405,445.20, an increase of \$21,981.20 over last year. There are seventeen Professors and Instructors, five officers, one hundred and eighty-four students, one hundred and thirty-eight from Virginia Conference territory and thirty from Baltimore Conference territory. Thirty-six students are preparing for the ministry, none of whom are from the Baltimore Conference. We note with great pleasure the increase in the endowment fund and congratulate the College on this success. If, however, the present high standard of excellence is to be maintained, it is absolutely necessary that our endowment fund should be increased to \$500,000.00 at the earliest possible moment.

Randolph-Macon Woman's College, Lynchburg, Virginia, reports property valued at \$460,242.25, and an endowment of \$382,131.83. There are forty-seven Professors and Instructors, thirteen officers, six hundred and twenty-four students, an increase of fourteen over last year, thirty-five of whom are from Baltimore Conference territory.

The denominations represented are: Methodists, 259; Presbyterians. 123; Baptists, 92; Episcopalians, 74; Christians, 26; Lutherans, 9; Congregational, 6; Jewish, 6; Roman Catholic, 5; Reformed, 2; United Brethren, 1; Christian Scientist, 1

We are especially gratified with the religious feature of the report. Thirteen students enrolled in the Student Volunteer Movement. Five hundred and twenty-two enrolled in voluntary Bible Classes. Two hundred and sixty-five enrolled in Mission Study Classes.

Randolph-Macon Academy, Front Royal, Virginia, has property valued at \$100,000.00. There are seven teachers, three officers, and 109 students, 63 of whom are from the bounds of the Baltimore Conference. Six pupils are preparing for the ministry.

Amount subscribed to Construction Debt Fund......\$3,466.83 Amount paid this Conference year on subscriptions.... 1,919.65

Randolph-Macon Academy, Bedford City, Virginia, reports property valued at \$125,000.00, an increase of \$10,000.00 over the past year. There are nine teachers, four officers, 195 students, 12 of whom are from the Baltimore Conference. There are eleven ministerial students. The alumni wing was built the past summer at a cost of \$12,940.00 affording room for thirty more students. For the alumni wing \$10,000.00 was subscribed by the alumni, of which amount \$7,490.00 have been paid.

Randolph-Macon Institute, Danville, Virginia, has property valued at \$119,000.00, 21 instructors, 4 officers, 288 students. During the year

subscriptions to the amount of \$30,600.00 were secured on the indebtedness of the institution; \$15,000.00 on subscriptions have been paid.

We desire to call especial attention to the work of our Academy at Front Royal. The service rendered to the Church by this institution can hardly be overestimated. In our own Conference forty of the ministers of the Gospel now on the effective list received their academic training there, and within its bounds hundreds of consecrated laymen—effective laborers in the Master's vineyard—gratefully acknowledge their indebtedness to this Academy for much of the inspiration that has made and is making their lives worth while.

Recognizing these facts and realizing that the Academy is now seriously handicapped in its efforts to serve the Church by the Construction Debt still hanging over it, the Conference at its last session called upon our people to come to the relief of the Academy by raising a sum of money sufficient to liquidate this debt.

A plan of campaign was formulated by the Executive Committee of the Academy and an effort was made to carry it out. The meagreness of the success attained has been due to the fact that under the plan which was adopted, the responsibility for raising this fund was widely distributed, and, in every instance, placed upon men already overburdened with work.

We reaffirm the claims of the Academy upon the liberality of our people—her debt is our debt; whatever impedes her progress must necessarily result in serious loss to us. We, therefore, urge that a special effort be made to wipe out this debt at the earliest possible date.

We further recommend that the Executive Committee of the Academy engage the services of a Field Secretary, charged with the duty of laying the claims of our Academy upon the hearts and consciences of our people, and that our preachers pledge to him their cordial co-operation in his efforts to remove this burden from the Academy which has served and is serving us so nobly.

OUR UNIVERSITIES.

During the present quadrennium the Church has undertaken the largest enterprise in respect to Christian education that has ever been projected by a Church at one time. In conformity with the action of the last General Conference, the Educational Commission has established a University at Atlanta, Georgia, known as Emory University, and has "taken over" the Southern Methodist University at Dallas, Texas, to do the work of higher education for our Church.

The success of these schools has been phenomenal from the beginning. They show as nothing else has ever shown the power resident in our Church when there is united purpose to accomplish its end, and they manifest the high ideals that the Church has set for itself in bringing men through a knowledge of the truth to the fullest life.

3S REPORTS.

Three Departments of Emory University are already in operation:
Emory College, a school with a great history in the educational life of the South, constitutes the School of Liberal Arts; the School of Theology, named by the Commission the "Candler School of Theology," is at present conducted in the Wesley Memorial Building. It has a faculty of nine men, eminently qualified for their several departments. The enrollment of students from the beginning has surpassed all expectations and there is promise of ever-increasing expansion.

The University has acquired by gift the fee simple title to the Atlanta Medical College, a medical school of highest grade and well equipped with apparatus, laboratories and hospital facilities.

There is in course of erection a splendid marble building, which will be the future home of the L. Q. C. Lamar School of Law. This department will be opened in the fall of this year.

The financial success of Emory University has been made possible by the generous gift of one million dollars by Mr. Asa Candler. Of equal importance was the deed made by the Trustees of Emory College to a Board of Trustees elected by the Educational Commission by which the Church came into possession of property worth not less than \$700,000.00. Numerous other gifts have been made, and among them we are pleased to note one of \$1,000.00 from Mrs. Thomas and one of \$25,000.00 from Rev. T. T. Fishburne, both of our Conference.

The University has acquired also by gift a tract of seventy-five acres situated near the City of Atlanta and known as Druid Hill Park. On this splendid campus, said to be the most beautiful in America, the buildings which will be occupied by the schools of theology and law are already in progress of erection. The assets of Emory University now aggregate a little more than \$2,500,000.

The success of the Southern Methodist University is not less striking. Its property consists of 600 acres of land, of which 132 acres have been reserved for the campus. Its total resources are reported to be considerably over \$2,000,000.

These Universities belong to the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Every transaction, either for the acquiring of land or securing the endowment, has been carried on with a view of making them in perpetuity the property of the Church. They are now and will always remain in the absolute ownership and control of the Church. It remains for us as a Conference to lay these institutions of higher learning upon the heart of the Church. We have only made a beginning in a noble enterprise. The endowment of each school, apart from its building and equipment, ought to be not less than \$5,000,000. Surely with this vast opportunity for service we will not be satisfied simply to have these schools stand equal to any in the South. The day of larger responsibility has come to us, and we will not rest content until our Church has achieved the distinction of building great Universities whose fame will be known in all lands.

God has given us the vision of a service hardly dreamed of by us as possible a few years ago. Let us enter and possess the land.

SOUTHERN SEMINARY SYSTEM.

We have received the communication of E. H. Rowe, President of the Southern Seminary, situated at Buena Vista, Virginia. This splendid school for girls and young women still enjoys the large patronage to which its many attractive features entitle it. The property of the school is valued at seventy-five thousand dollars. It has seventeen officers and professors and instructors, and the number of students matriculated is 105. It draws its patronage from every section of the United States and outside. The school has achieved its well-earned reputation by thorough instruction, careful attention to the physical welfare of the student, the home-like atmosphere of the social life, and earnest attention to the development of the spiritual nature. We can safely commend it to the patronage of our people.

The Alleghany Collegiate Institute at Alderson, West Virginia, is under the personal care of Rev. J. S. Engle, of our Conference, who is the resident principal. The value of the property is fifteen thousand dollars, the number of instructors eight, and the number of students matriculated fifty. We commend it to the patronage especially of those parents in the Lewisburg District who desire thorough Christian training for their children in a well organized school not too far from home.

At the request of the principals, E. H. Rowe and J. S. Engle, and in accordance with the Discipline, the request is hereby made that these schools be recommended to the General Board of Education for classification as Methodist schools.

We recommend that the following persons, at the request of the principals, be confirmed as directors of the Southern Seminary: E. H. Rowe, A. W. Robertson, E. V. Regester, David Bush, and J. S. Engle; and that the following be confirmed as directors of the Alleghany Collegiate Institute: E. H. Rowe, E. Chase Bare, L. S. Shires and J. S. Engle.

We recommend further Revs. W. S. Hammond, D. M. Brown and W. F. Locke, or their successors, as a visiting committee for Southern Seminary, and Revs. W. D. Keene, J. Herbert Bean and W. M. Compton, or their successors, as a visiting committee for the Alleghany Collegiate Institute, the expenses of these committees to be paid by the respective institutions.

MINISTERIAL SUPPLY AND TRAINING.

The report of Dr. R. H. Bennett, Director of the Correspondence School, with headquarters at Atlanta, Georgia, shows that there are enrolled in this school one thousand, four hundred and seventy-eight students, all of whom are undergraduates in the various Conferences. While this is a large number, and most excellent work is being done,

it is a matter of regret that all of the undergraduates of the Conference are not taking this course. We would suggest to all of the Presiding Elders that they use their influence with the young men passing through the Conference course to take the course of the Correspondence School.

We call attention to the importance of the annual sermon on the claims of the ministry, the proper observance of Vocation Day in our Sunday Schools, the distribution of literature dealing with the various aspects of the ministry. The Department of Ministerial Supply and Training will send literature on these subjects free of charge to all pastors who will write for it.

Dr. H. P. Hamill, Secertary-Treasurer, submitted the following report for the Conference year 1915-1916, which has been duly examined by the Auditing Committee and found to be correct:

BIBLE STUDY AND THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Our attention has been called, both by the communication of the General Secretary of Education, and Professor W. M. Forrest, of the University of Virginia, to the general subject of securing school credits in the public schools for Bible study. We consider this a matter of the most far-reaching consequence, and would, on the one hand, bring it to the attention of the Church, as one of the living issues which it must confront and solve, and also to the State Superintendents of Public Instruction in the several States covered by our Conference territory, in the hope that some plan may be devised along the lines of those already inaugurated in twenty-one States, whereby there may be cultivated a deeper appreciation of the wealth of Bible literature and a profounder sense of Bible truth.

We call attention to the fact that the State Board of Education of the State of Virginia has appointed a Committee to formulate a plan by which a credit may be given in the High Schools of this State for Bible study. We commend this movement and recommend that whenever practicable the Church co-operate with this Committee to this end.

ASSESSMENTS.

We recommend an assessment for Education of \$10,021.00 to be divided as follows:

The proceeds to be divided pro rata among these causes.

APPOINTMENTS RECOMMENDED.

We recommend the appointments of Dr. H. P. Hamill as Conference Secretary of Education; Dr. J. A. Kern as Professor in Randolph-Macon College; Rev. H. H. Sherman as Field Secretary for Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal; W. W. Beasley as student at Randolph-Macon College; R. D. McNeer as student at Emory University.

Dr. H. P. Hamill, Judge E. D. Newman and H. H. Sherman are continued as a Committee on Ministerial Supply and Training, with the usual duties.

We would call the attention of any young men who are called to preach to the liberal conditions on which we make them donations and loans, whereby they may secure adequate preparation for the great work of the Christian Ministry, and urge that they avail themselves of this assistance.

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION—REPORT No. 2.

The assessment on the Baltimore Conference for Church Extension this year was \$9.540.00, and the amount paid on the assessment was \$7,000.00. After the Board had set apart 50% of the amount received on the assessment to be forwarded to the General Board, we had \$3,500 to be used within our own Conference. We are glad to report that this exceeds the amount we had to distribute last year by \$200. Twelve churches and one parsonage asked for aid aggregating a total of \$6,550.00, which is practically double the amount to be appropriated. The sums asked, in most cases, were moderate and should have been granted in full. No part of the work of this Board is so hard as hearing the numerous appeals which convince us that if established work is to be developed, when its day for development has come we must come to the aid of the old church which is too small and weak to provide adequately. Or, on the other hand, the new and growing places where we have Sunday Schools and congregations with no church home at all, and we must help them if they have it, and yet to know our hands are tied for lack of funds. May our people not perish for lack of help, as well as for lack of knowledge? It is a matter of great regret that we can not give more substantial aid to these promising fields. Bishop Marvin said: "God is glorified in the building of a house of worship. It is the homage of both labor and capital to Christ. In it a man's toil, or that which he has toiled for is consecrated to Christ."

THE LOAN FUND CAMPAIGN.

It is gratifying to know that last year the increase in the Loan Fund Capital of the General Board was a record breaker, amounting to \$110.853.56. The largest increase for any preceding year was \$66,222.66. This unusual increase is especially noteworthy during a year of such widespread financial depression. It certainly indicates a growing interest in this phase of our work.

We ask you to observe another fact equally as gratifying: the total receipts for the year closing March 31st, 1915, amounted to \$395,798.90, and is the largest contribution in our history. We believe this is largely due to the zealous and efficient work of our great Corresponding Secretary, Dr. W. F. McMurry.

Our own Conference leads all others in the amount contributed to the General Loan Fund, but alas, we have done nothing toward creating a Baltimore Conference Loan Fund. We believe that the time has come for the writing of a new chapter in the history of our Board, and unanimously recommend that the amount secured during the year by the President be set aside as a nucleus for our Baltimore Conference Loan Fund, and urge that our presiding elders, pastors and laymen diligently preach the Gospel of Church Extension.

OUR LITERATURE.

We believe that one of the chief reasons for the lack of interest in the work of Church Extension is due to the lack of information. The Church Extension Hand Book of 1915 is a work of art and full of just such facts as our people need. We respectfully suggest that all our pastors write Dr. W. F. McMurry, Louisville, Ky., and secure a copy of the Hand Book, a set of Church Extension Charts, and leaflets. Put a copy of "The Awakening of Stephen Standback" in the Church pew, of "How Henny Penny Went to Sunday School" in the Sunday School, and when you communicate with your people enclose in your letter a leaflet such as "A Precious Jewel; or, Dewrop's Memorial," and thus preach the Gospel of Church Extension

REPRESENTATION.

We again request that our representations be heard in all of our District Conferences, and other assemblies where the cause should be presented.

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

We, the Epworth League Board of the Baltimore Conference, beg leave to submit the following report:

We note with pleasure the gain of over six thousand members and of one hundred Chapters during the past year reported by our Central Office, and in our own Conference a gain of 650 members and 9 Chapters. This, being the first net gain reported in a quadrennium, may be counted as a token of increasing prosperity in our Epworth League work.

The amount contributed by the Epworth League for Missions for the past year is thirty thousand dollars, according to the report of the Treasurer of the Board of Missions, fourteen thousand of which was for specials raised in excess of the amount for the support of our Mission in the Congo. For other purposes report a total of eighty thousand dollars. In our own Conference the Leagues raised \$6,406, of which \$1,556 was for Missions.

The *Epworth Era* reports a larger paid circulation than ever, amounting now to twenty-two thousand. We have assurances from many sources that the *Era* is meeting the needs of our young people's societies and is highly appreciated for its literary quality.

The Central Office also reports that there were held last year thirty annual meetings of the Epworth League Conferences attended by approximately five thousand young people. These Conferences were rich in spiritual results and in the volunteering of young men and women for the ministry and special forms of missionary service.

It is gratifying to report that the Leagues in our own Conference have been organized, and that last summer they held their first annual meeting. The report of the President, Mr. Theodore C. Thomas, of Baltimore, is hereby made a part of this report. The second annual meeting will be held in Charles Town, W. Va., July 6-9. All our ministers are earnestly invited to attend and co-operate.

It is especially desirable that the lead of the Baltimore and Washington Districts be speedily followed in the matter of organizing the other Districts of the Conference, and that the co-operation of Presiding Elders and pastors with the District Secretaries is solicited to this end.

The Central Office reports that a movement is well under way looking to the formation of an interdenominational Council of Young People's Societies, and with the co-operation of the several denominational boards and the united society of Christian Endeavor, the consummation of the organization will soon be effected.

For the better systematizing of the finances of the Leagues, it is proposed that all general as well as Conference funds be collected by the Treasurer of the Conference Epworth League, Mr. Roger Manuel, of Charles Town, W. Va.

The observance of Epworth League Anniversary, the second Sunday of May, is now provided for in the Book of Discipline. An excellent

program has been prepared for 1916, and we trust that the day will be observed in every pastoral charge where there is a League; and where there is none, that the observance of the day may be made the occasion of organizing. An offering for Epworth League extension is to be taken and forwarded to Mr. Manuel.

The placing of the Central Office support upon the basis of \$2.50 for each League Chapter has resulted well. If there has been no great increase in the amount received, there has been a gratifying increase in the number of Chapters contributing.

We especially commend the increasing attention being given to the Junior and Intermediate Leagues. The last General Conference provided for a Junior League Secretaryship, which is ably filled by Miss Ada Trawick. In our own Conference some of the most vigorous and useful of our organizations are Junior Epworth Leagues.

For the guidance of pastors and workers, we direct especial attention to the Epworth League Hand Book, price 15 cents, which has been thoroughly revised and made as comprehensive as possible. Ample material for all forms of League work may be had of the Book Depositories at Richmond and Nashville, and the Central Office begs that we urge pastors and other workers to call upon them for personal correspondence and field work to aid in forwarding the local interests of the Epworth League.

We request that the Committee of Public Worship of the next session of the Conference grant, as usual, the Epworth League Board Wednesday of Conference week for our anniversary.

REPORT OF BIBLE BOARD.

We deeply deplore the fact that the collections for the Bible Board have fallen short \$53.89 from last year. Last year only four charges did not take collections. This year thirteen charges reported no collections taken for this cause.

Bishop Mouzon stated on the Conference floor: "When we are contributing to the American Bible Society we are contributing for missions." We are sure that every preacher and every charge believes in Missions and the importance of this great work. Then how can we fail to be interested and how can we fail to do our duty for the Bible cause? How any preacher can fail to give his sanction and hearty co-operation we can not understand. Besides, we beg leave to call your attention to the fact that it is not a matter of choice, but a demand made upon us by the Law of the Church.

It is very gratifying to learn through Dr. M. P. Porter, of the South Atlantic Agency, and Dr. L. T. Widerman, of the Maryland Bible So-

ciety, that no Church or organization of any denomination within a similar area as that occupied by the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South, contributes as much annually as does this body. Special emphasis is laid on the fact that in this time of unrest and war there never was a greater need and call for the Word of God than at present. Never in the history of the world did such a golden opportunity to do good to humanity, in this particular line, knock at our door. Shall we open the door and make good the opportunity? We as preachers and laymen recognize the Word of God as the very foundation of Christianity; upon it souls must be fed or they will perish. For the moral and social uplift and for the hastening of the coming of our Lord nothing can take its place.

We are planning for big things this year. We are to celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of the American Bible Society in the service of the Master. This is to be a worldwide celebration. Every Christian denomination, every Christian congregation and every Christian is asked to take a part in this celebration. Already plans have been made by the Virginia Conference, the Southern Presbyterian Church, the Northern Presbyterian Church, the M. E. Church and others to make this a great occasion. On the first Sunday in May this cause will be brought before the world. Shall we have a part? Of course, we shall. All necessary literature for this celebration may be had free of charge upon application to the American Bible Society with one exception—"The History of the American Bible Society," edited by Rev. Otis Dweight, which will cost the nominal sum of fifty cents in paper binding and one dollar in cloth. We are told this book reads like a love story. Everybody get it.

None of our charges pay proportionately for this work as they contribute to other interests of the Church. Some of the strongest appointments of the Church pay virtually nothing to the American Bible Society. A number of charges report no collections taken when the Discipline specifically requires that each charge and each congregation shall take a collection for this cause.

Something is wrong somewhere. Must we train our preachers that they may train the people?

We urge upon our preachers and laymen the importance of this great work. Therefore be it,

"Resolved first, That the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South, which has always cherished a supreme regard for God's Word, and confidence in its efficiency and integrity as the revelation of God's will, offers its gratitude to God for the results of almost one hundred years of existence and effort of the American Bible Society.

"Second, That May the 7th, 1916, or as near thereto as possible, be designated as a day to be observed in our congregations for the furtherance of the Bible distribution, that the Word of God shall be the prime thing in the celebration and that an offering be taken on that day for the American Bible Society.

"Third, That the Presiding Elders be requested to emphasize the importance of the work of the American Bible Society, both in the Quarterly and District Conferences, and insist upon liberal contributions for the same.

"Fourth, That should there be sufficient reason for any congregation or individual contributing directly to an agent or local organization, a receipt shall be taken and sent to the Treasurer of the Conference Board.

"Fifth, That receipts from the Treasurer of the Conference Board for moneys sent him during the Conference year, must be sent or brought to the Board, as a voucher, at the ensuing session of the Conference.

"Sixth, That the paster appoint one layman at each church to assist him in making an every-member canvass for the American Bible Society.

"Seventh, That all money collected for the Bible Board, during the year, be sent promptly to the Treasurer of the Board, Mr. N. R. Robert, Kearneysville, West Virginia.

"Eighth, That all reports shall be in, if possible, the first day of the Conference session."

REPORT NO. 2-BOARD OF MISSIONS.

WORK OF THE GENERAL BOARD.

We have carefully considered the communication from the General Board of Missions, and we are gratified at the hopeful note sounded, notwithstanding the fact that the world has passed through a most tragic and terrible year.

The Church has never before faced a situation so fraught with difficulties, nor so full of unparalleled opportunities. The General Board faces this situation better organized, with more clearly defined policies, and with better promise than ever before. The whole world is awake, and the Church is becoming more responsive. Providence has honored us with a great responsibility, and offers us the joy of introducing a new era in missions.

It only remains for the Baltimore Conference to unite with the other Conferences of our connection in meeting this great responsibility.

The assessments from the General Board for the coming year remain the same as last year, namely, for Foreign Missions, \$15,900; for Home Missions, \$5,088.

We were glad to have with us on our anniversary Rev. John M. Moore, D.D., representing the General Board, and Rev. J. A. G. Shipley, of China. Their addresses were highly appreciated.

WORK OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD.

Again, your Conference Board is glad to report that the policy for Conference Missions is working admirably. This year, as last, with the co-operation of the preachers and the churches of the Conference, the Board has succeeded in paying all of the preachers on our Mission charges, 20% of their allowances on each of the first three quarters of the year, leaving 40% for final adjustment for the last quarter.

It is vitally important that all of our preachers serving Mission charges should fill up the blanks that will be sent them just before the meeting of the Annual Conference, and return the same to the Secretary of the Board. The Board has been lenient heretofore, but now insists on the observance of this rule.

The Board is committed to the policy of helping Mission charges while they are attempting to become self-supporting; and to that end will view with more favor the applications made by charges which prove by their actions and reports that they are doing their best to help themselves, and with less favor those whose reports show the less efforts to become self-sustaining.

This is but fair to all parties, and is the only way the Board can provide for absolutely necessary new work.

The assessment for Conference Missions remains practically the same this year as last. While there have been reductions in allowances to some charges and several have been promoted to the roll of honor of

self-sustaining charges, the necessity for entering new fields has kept the assessment at about the same figure.

The Committee on Evangelism has worked out a Conference-wide policy, which was adopted by the Mid-Year Meeting of the Board, and the Board asks the co-operation of the presiding elders and preachers with the committee in putting this policy into operation.

NOMINATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

We nominate as the Committee on Evangelism the members of the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions.

We recommend the election of Judge E. D. Newman, of Woodstock, Virginia, as Conference Lay Leader.

We recommend to the Bishop, for appointment, Rev. D. L. Blakemore as Conference Missionary Secretary, to fill this office in connection with a pastoral charge.

We recommend that all specials throughout the year go through the hands of our Conference Treasurer, Mr. J. E. Alexander, Alexandria, Va., that our Conference may get the proper credit.

We recommend that all money raised for Missions, both by our churches and our Sunday Schools, be sent to our Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.

We recommend the use of the Duplex Envelope by all of our churches in raising the assessments.

We recommend that Friday night of our next Conference be the time for holding the missionary anniversary.

In harmony with the ruling of the last General Conference, and in order to carry out the plans of the Woman's Missionary Council, organic union went into effect in the Baltimore Conference with the beginning of the year 1915.

This change in the work makes it difficult in some instances to give accurate statistics. Though several new Young People's and Juvenile auxiliaries were organized, and hundred of members were added in the three departments as a result of the Membership Campaign, yet

they can not be reported as a net gain. The difference in methods makes it almost impossible to institute a comparison between this year's work and last. On the whole, we have gone forward, and the results accomplished are remarkable, thanks to the consecration and zeal of our loyal women. Several auxiliaries have a place on the Roll of Honor, more than half of the total number observed the Week of Prayer, netting a considerable offering; an unusual number of Mission Study Classes were formed, and our Conference Pledge of \$5,200 was paid in full.

The financial report above includes only the amount of money sent to the Conference Treasurer. The sum contributed to the City Mission Board will be found in its report, and the total for Local Work does not appear, as it could only be partial because of the failure of so many of the auxiliaries to report this item to the Conference officers.

THE CITY MISSION BOARD, OF BALTIMORE.

We review the work of the past year with a heart full of thanksgiving and praise to our Heavenly Father for giving us the privilege of laboring together with Him in the work of City Missions. The continued prosperity of this work, in spite of difficulties, is abundant evidence of Divine approval.

The Treasurer's report shows that the year 1915 was the best since the beginning of the work, thereby evidencing an increased interest on the part of the membership of the various auxiliaries. The total receipts for the year were \$894.27. In addition to the salaries of the workers, quite a goodly sum has been used in relieving the needs of the poor.

The two workers employed by the Board have paid over 2,000 visits in the interest of the churches with which they are identified, and among the destitute of their localities; \$400.00 is a conservative estimate of the value of clothing distributed, some of which came to us from auxiliaries throughout the Conference; \$61.35 were spent for delicacies for the sick, new clothing for children, etc., by the workers themselves. These two consecrated women have been untiring in their efforts in this portion of the Master's vineyard.

The Mother's Club at Wilkens Avenue deserves special mention, as it has developed to such an extent that they are now reaching out themselves to help the less fortunate, reporting from fifteen to twenty-five sick visits at each meeting. Occasional baskets are sent, money contributed to help a mother in a sanatorium, etc., thus showing how God has blessed the efforts in that department.

We feel the figures given do not fully express the work that has been accomplished. In many instances, there are those who have been brought to accept Christ as their Saviour through the material aid given.

According to our faith, so shall be the results of our work, so we pray for "a faith that will not shrink."

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

Your Sunday School Board reports as follows:

It is with pleasure that we record that there is no abatement in the zeal pervading the ranks of our Sunday School workers, no ebb in the tide of progress in this important department of the work of the Church.

STATISTICS.

The latest report of our General Sunday School Board, laid before us at this session of the Conference, presents figures necessarily a year old. It shows a striking numerical advance in the Sunday Schools of our Church at large during the year covered, the gain being 219 schools, S.603 officers and teachers, and 87,116 pupils, bringing the total to 16.868 schools, with 1,725,409 enrollment. The very latest figures, compiled but not yet published, will show an increase for the year just ended of 121,790 in enrollment, being the greatest gain in the history of our Church, making the present total enrollment 1,847,199, and giving promise that we will pass the two million mark before the end of the quadrennium in 1918.

Nowhere is the numerical advance more encouraging than in our own Conference. The reports submitted at this session show an increase of 285 officers and teachers and 3,803 pupils, making a present total of 6,510 officers and teachers and 68,127 pupils in 635 schools.

LITERATURE.

The Sunday School literature of our church fully maintains the high standard to which it has long held. No more complete, thorough, satisfactory and usable treatment of the Sunday School lesson than that given in the lesson helps issued by our Publishing House is to be found. We do not depend upon our estimate alone in making this statement. It is cordially endorsed by experts from other denominations. Certainly, until something better is offered, there is no excuse for schools of our Church to use any other. It is with pleasure that we note that the circulation of our publications increases from year to year.

FIELD SECRETARY.

At the close of the session of the Conference last year the Board re-elected Brother A. L. Dietrich to the office of Field Secretary. He continued the work which he had so auspiciously begun until about the first of June, when his work and merit having attracted the attention of our general Sunday School authorities, he was called to a wider field of activity as Divisional Field Secretary for the Middle Division. Later he was transferred to the Gulf Division.

To fill the vacancy thus caused, our Executive Committee appointed Rev. J. J. Rives. He assumed office October 1, 1915, and has served with marked success. His work has stimulated Sunday School interest and resulted in progress in every locality that he has visited. It is with keen regret that we learn that Brother Rives feels impelled to return to the active ministry, thus leaving the office of Field Secretary vacant for the time being. The Board will fill the vacancy when a suitable man can be secured.

CONVENTION.

The Sunday School Convention held at Shepherdstown, W. Va., was a pronounced success in attendance, interest and character of program.

This year, the convention will be held at Waynesboro, Va., at a date yet to be announced. Thus conveniently located, it should be largely attended by workers from all parts of our Conference territory.

DISTRICT ORGANIZATION.

Realizing that notwithstanding the advantages of our annual convention, many of our workers are not able to attend it, the Board has endorsed a plan of district organization recommended by the General Sunday School Board, and will proceed as speedily as possible to organize the districts in accordance with this plan, with the view of holding annually in each one or more conventions, institutes or schools of methods.

MEETINGS AT LAKE JUNALUSKA.

We call special attention to the Sunday School period at Lake Junaluska, North Carolina, July 11-22, 1916, including meeting of the General Sunday School Board, conference of Board Chairmen and Field Secretaries, School of Methods and Wesley Bible Class Conference, and urge our workers, where it is possible to do so, to attend, that they may catch the inspiration which comes from this great gathering of our leaders.

TEACHER TRAINING.

We extend to Rev. John W. Shackford, our new Superintendent of Teacher Training, our cordial greetings and pledge him the same hearty

support and co-operation always accorded by the Sunday School workers of the Baltimore Conference to his illustrious predecessor, Dr. H. M. Hamill. We urge the formation and maintenance of Teacher Training classes in all our schools.

ORGANIZED CLASSES.

Profoundly impressed with the belief that no other agency is contributing more to the efficiency of our Sunday Schools than the organized class, we urge that all eligible classes in all our schools be organized into Wesley Bible Classes and enrolled with the Superintendent of the Wesley Bible Class Department, Rev. Chas. D. Bulla, D.D., at Nashville, Tenn. The Board records its pleasure at the presence of Dr. Bulla in its meetings at this session of the Conference.

CHILDREN'S DAY.

The increase in Children's Day offerings and the cordial response to the Board's efforts in this direction are most gratifying. The exact amount of the increase can not be stated at the time this report is written, but it is apparent that it will be more than \$400. It also seems probable that our aim to secure an offering from every charge will be realized by the time the Treasurer's books close for the year. We urge every school to hold a Children's Day service. Children's Day programmes at the expense of the Board will be furnished to all schools that will use them, upon condition that they comply with the law in the Discipline which directs that every school hold a Children's Day service, take an offering and send it to the Board as soon as taken.

The Treasurer of the Board is Mr. O. C. Michael, Aberdeen, Md., and to him the money should be sent as soon as collected.

PENNANTS.

At the beginning of the Conference year, the Board offered two pennants to be awarded in recognition of the best showing in connection with Children's Day offerings. One was to go to the District showing the largest proportionate gain for the entire Conference year and the other to the District having the largest proportion of its offerings in the hands of the Board's Treasurer by the 1st day of January, 1916.

After a careful examination of the figures by a committee of the Board, these pennants were awarded to the winning districts, namely, Roanoke, for greatest proportional increase, and Rockingham, for the largest proportion of its offering in the Treasurer's hands January 1, 1916.

ANNUAL REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES, 1915-1916.

The principal work of the Board of Lay Activities of the Baltimore Conference for the year was directed to the securing of the organization of the Board itself, and to the organization of the work in the Districts and Charges.

It has been the policy of the Board to secure organization of the Charges only as members of the local churches were found ready and willing to do active work along Christian lines. Otherwise it was feared the progress of the work might be impeded rather than accelerated by the composition of Committees on paper only, which would prove dead weights and require time for removal before real lay activities could begin.

Local conditions as they were found were allowed to determine largely the extent of the organizations formed, and the lines of the initial activities undertaken.

It was sought to limit the number of members of Committees on Lay Activities as formed to the number of active laymen who had a vision of the purpose of the effort being put forth and of the work to be done, intending to enlarge the Committees as interest developed.

In some Charges owing to conditions prevailing it was concluded best to organize the general Committee on Lay Activities only, and work to the point where the interest developed should enable the sub-committees to be formed, in order that these Committees might have no opportunity to lie idle after being constituted.

Special effort was made to secure an every-member canvass for weekly contributions to missions and other interests of the Church and to introduce the use of the Duplex Envelope System where possible.

In general, however, the local Committees were encouraged to direct their activities along lines that seemed to appeal most favorably to the membership of the Committees, believing that the initial object to be sought to be to secure the active effort of as many laymen as possible in Christian work of some character, realizing that following the development of activity on the part of the laymen, its direction would become an easy task.

Written reports have been received from six out of the eight Districts of the Conference, giving statistics of the work, which have been tabulated, and a copy of the same is attached to this report.

One District made only a general verbal report, without giving statistics.

The totals as shown for the seven districts reporting are as follows:

COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

REPORT No. 1-On the Baltimore Southern Methodist.

Your Committee begs leave to make the following report:

It is a source of gratification that, despite the unsettled financial conditions of the country this year, the paper has enjoyed one of the most prosperous years in its history, as its entire indebtedness and the cost of its maintenance during the present year have been paid, and there is a slight balance in the treasury, not to speak of its fairly clean subscription list of about 7,000 subscribers. On this financial basis we believe that the time has come for its enlargement, its improvement and the extension of its field of usefulness. It has been proposed that the Company publish a twenty-four page paper once a month, the other weekly issues being of the present size,—a sort of magazine number, similar to the plan of the Outlook and the Literary Digest, and to feature in this number the Children's Department, Book Reviews, Sainted Dead notices, a couple of pages looking to soul culture, and a strong

sermon, with occasional illustrations—a paper very much like the Christmas edition. This special number would not only be an attraction in itself, but by giving more space to the departments would relieve the pressure on the columns of the other issues, allowing them more room for other important matters, thus strengthening the paper along all lines.

This feature would add about \$650 a year to the present cost of publication. Two ways have been suggested to meet the additional expense. One is that a better support be given the assessment, as all in excess of the editor's salary will go to the maintenance of the paper; the other that the Conference add at least 1,200 new subscribers to the subscription list. Twelve hundred would be fewer than an average of six to a Charge, and with the new feature as an attraction they ought to be secured without a great deal of difficulty.

The paper itself secured 1,300 in one of its campaigns. The 1,200 could be apportioned to the Charges on some equitable basis, and the total be secured in a campaign of three or four weeks. The Western North Carolina Conference is now engaged in a campaign to extend the circulation of its organ by the addition of 3,000 new subscribers. The North Carolina Conference is conducting a campaign to secure 1,500 and is using the apportionment plan we have spoken of. The accomplishment of this task and the preachers giving more of their time to the circulation every year would result not only in the enlargement of the paper's usefulness, as it would go into many homes into which it does not go at present, but in its general improvement, as it would give the editor the time that has hitherto been spent in building up its circulation, in strengthening its editorial and literary departments and giving more attention to its business. Our editor has repeatedly voiced as his conviction that no one man can do even reasonably well the work of Editor, Local Editor, Business Manager and Field Worker, and yet he has been compelled to carry all these burdens for five years. Transferring the thought and energy the editor has hitherto devoted to increasing the circulation to the making of the paper would necessarily result in marked improvement in that direction.

Therefore, in view of the foregoing, we recommend:

First—That we as a Conference heartily approve of the enlargement and improvement of our Conference paper in accordance with the Company's plan of issuing once a month a twenty-four page number, with the Children's Department and other special interests featured as the directors and management may deem best.

Second—That in order to provide for this additional cost, that we give due diligence to the assessment with the understanding that all in excess of the editor's salary be used in paying for improvements; and that we will use our best efforts to secure at least 1,200 new subscribers, and adopt the plan that other religious papers have employed with signal success by having the Joint Board of Finance distribute the 1,200 among the Districts on an equitable basis, and the District Stewards

redistribute the number assigned to their District to the Charges as the minimum to be secured, it being understood, however, that an earnest effort is all that will be expected of our preachers, and that any preacher will be without blame if he fails to secure the number allotted to his charge after such an effort has been made; that the month of May or as much of the month as necessary be set apart for securing new subscribers, and that the management of the paper be requested to carry these provisions into effect; and, furthermore, the management shall commence the publication of a twenty-four page number as soon after Conference as the financial conditions of the Company will justify such publication, and shall continue it from month to month as long as it receives the support necessary for its maintenance.

Third—That the assessment be the same as last year, and the subscription price of the paper remain unchanged.

Fourth—That nothing in these resolutions shall be construed as authorizing the Publishing Company to involve the Conference in any financial liability.

REPORT NO. 3-COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS.

Your Committee on Publishing Interests submits Report No. 3.

We have examined the reports from the Publishing House and branch houses for the year ending February 28th, 1915, and note the following facts:

That while there were decreases in the sales for the year, yet not what might have been expected owing to the unsettled financial condition of the country. The total net gain for the three houses was \$111,532.51. The Report further shows that the *Methodist Review*, the *Epworth Era* and the *Christian Advocate* were published at a loss of

\$13,497.57. We are sorry to note this and hope the time may soon come when these periodicals may become self-sustaining.

We are pleased to note the increase in the circulation of our Sunday School periodicals, and urge our pastors' attention to their value in Sunday School work.

The Methodist Review commends itself to us as a periodical of highest merit, which should have a larger circulation among our preachers and people.

The Christian Advocate is too largely the paper of the preacher only, so we recommend that our preachers call attention to the value of this paper in the homes of our people, and co-operate with the editor in securing a larger circulation among our people.

We also call attention to the *Epworth Era* and the *Missionary Voice* as being exceedingly useful in the departments which they represent.

The attention of our people is called to the large number of tracts and other publications coming from our Publishing House, and we do earnestly recommend a campaign of education along the line of useful and instructive information which is greatly needed among our young people and others.

We appreciate the courtesy and promptness of the Richmond Branch of our Publishing House, and recommend that our preachers and people patronize it as being nearer to our own Conference territory.

"Resolved (1), That the Presiding Elders impress upon the Pastors of their respective districts the importance of preaching a special sermon on Sabbath observance as early in the Conference year as practicable;

"Resolved (2), That the pastors urge the Sunday School teachers to teach and instruct their scholars the great importance of due observance of the Lord's Day;

"Resolved (3), That we earnestly ask every Christian father and mother by precept and example to promote an intelligent observance of the Lord's Day that God may be enthroned in the home, whereby the

children at an early age may be taught a glad obedience to the holy purposes of the day and thereby discourage the modern tendency to make of it a mere holiday;

"Resolved (4), That we may preserve the Lord's Day holy, honorable to our God, a sure guarantee to all that is best in state and national life, we heartily request the co-operation of the people, ministers and laymen with the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland, or similar organizations, within the bounds of the Conference."

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The warfare on the legalized liquor traffic continues with an increasing number of decisive victories. The national conscience is aroused in regard to this matter as never before, and the people are determined that this gigantic evil shall be destroyed.

The liquor traffic is national in its organization, character and influence, ignoring and defying a due administration of both state and national laws. Hence we will continue to pray and work for National Prohibition as the only final solution of the liquor problem, and hereby urge our Senators and Representatives in the Congress of the United States to pass a resolution submitting to the vote of the several States a Constitutional Amendment prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors within the territory of the United States.

We pledge anew our sympathy and support to the Anti-Saloon League of America as it leads in the fight for National Prohibition. We most heartily endorse the resolution our last General Conference, namely:

"Resolved, That we endorse the great work which has been done by the Anti-Saloon League in its National State Organizations, and we pledge our support in the accomplishment of this glant task. We urge our people to remember that the Liquor Traffic hates the Anti-Saloon League because of its effective work, and endeavors to destroy its effectiveness by exciting suspicion against its leaders. We pledge to these leaders our loyalty and assure them we will not desert them in the hour of battle because of the slanders of the enemy, but that we will rally even more earnestly to their standards and give them our undivided support."

We also recognize and commend the W. C. T. U. and all other organizations and forces which are contributing to the present advance in temperance legislation. We rejoice in the progress that the cause of temperance has made within our own Conference territory.

MARYLAND.

We commend the fight made by the temperance forces of the State of Maryland under the leadership of the Anti-Saloon League for the sub-mission of the question of State-wide prohibition to a vote of the people and deplore the defeat of that measure by the Legislature of the State after a majority of both Houses had pledged their constituents, prior to their election, that they would support such enactment if elected.

VIRGINIA.

We rejoice to know that on the 1st day of November of this year the liquor traffic will be abolished in the "Old Dominion," and that the recent Legislature of the State conserved the results of the splendid victory so recently won.

We commend the election of Rev. J. Sydney Peters, of our Virginia Conference, as "Commissioner of Prohibition," and also commend the Act of the Legislature for placing at his disposal a sum of money sufficient to enforce the prohibitory laws.

WEST VIRGINIA.

We rejoice in the moral and commercial benefits of the State-wide prohibition as demonstrated in West Virginia, where prohibition really prohibits, as it always does when the laws are properly enforced.

We commend the Commissioner of Prohibition, Mr. Blue, for his successful efforts in bringing to justice those individuals and companies which have endeavored to transport illegally and traffic unlawfully in intoxicating liquors.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA.

We believe that the capital of a great nation should represent the most enlightened and best governmental policy, thus setting a national example, hence urge Congress to pass the legislation proposed by Senator Shepard which, if passed, will prohibit the liquor traffic in the District of Columbia.

RESOLUTIONS.

First—That we commend our Conference Organ, the Baltimore Southern Methodist, for its vigorous and uncompromising editorial policy regarding the liquor traffic, and recognize its great influence in any temperance campaign waged in our Conference territory.

Second—That our pastors are hereby urged to open their pulpits to the representatives of the Anti-Saloon League and to co-operate with those representatives in securing such funds as may be necessary to do the work of the League.

Thirdly—We are glad to know the debt of the Anti-Saloon League of Virginia, incurred in the State-wide campaign, has been reduced from \$24,000 to \$10,000. We believe, however, that the balance of this debt should be speedily paid, in order that the League may be free from

In every relation of life, public and private, personal and official, he exemplified the high principles of his religion; and having served his generation by the grace of his God, by this same grace he was ready and willing to lay aside his armor and receive his crown.

During his last days on earth, on account of disease and senile weakness his mind became feeble, but in all of his mental wanderings the Church and her holy services were ever present in his confused mind. Every morning he would ask those about his bedside if it were not Sunday, and would express a desire to go to church. Before he was confined to his bed and while still able to walk about the house, eluding the members of the home, he feebly found his way to the church and tried every door that he might enter his Father's house and offer Him worship. In the delirium which came upon him a few days before his death, he preached a sermon concluding with a beautiful prayer.

On July the 31st, 1915, Brother Watts passed peacefully to his reward. His end was peace, a fitting close to the life he had lived. Funeral services were conducted in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Strasburg by Rev. J. H. Haley, assisted by Rev. R. C. Meeks and other ministers of Strasburg.

A life like this, a life simply lived, a life full of faith in God and full of confidence in man, a life spent in doing good, a life triumphant in death, does more than all the bursting buds and blooming flowers, more than all the glittering wings that flutter above the ruins of the chrysalis, more than all the books written on Christian Evidences, to convince this tired and discouraged world that Jesus Christ is alive and that the tomb wherein He lay is empty.

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WILLIAM MAGRUDER WATERS.

William Magruder Waters was born at Brookeville, Maryland, September 9, 1861. He was the son of Zachariah and Elizabeth Hammond Waters. Through his father he was related to the old and distinguished Waters family of Maryland, from which family came William Watters, the first native-born Methodist preacher in America. Through his mother, whose maiden name was Magruder, he was connected with the ancient Scotch family Gregor. He was for years the chaplain of the American clan Gregor.

He was educated at the Brookeville Academy, Maryland, and at Randolph-Macon College. After leaving college, he taught school at the Rockville Academy, Maryland. He entered the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, March, 1888. At the Conference of March, 1890, which met at St. Paul's Church, Baltimore, Maryland, he was elected to Deacon's Orders and ordained by Bishop W. W. Duncan. Two years later, at Harrisonburg, Virginia, he was elected Elder and was ordained by Bishop J. C. Keener. The following list of appointments tells the story of a life spent in the itinerant ministry of his Church:

1888-1889 he served Piedmont, Virginia, as junior preacher with Rev. C. A. Joyce. The friendship created between these two men in the blessed fellowship of service on this large circuit lasted through all the years until the older man went home to his reward. 1890 he was sent as preacher-in-charge to Beltsville, Maryland, and in 1891 Emory, D. C., was his appointment. 1892-1893 he was stationed at Elkton, Virginia. During the next twelve years he served Franklin, West Virginia, Reisterstown, Maryland, and Hillsboro, Virginia, each four years. 1906-1907 he was at Moorefield, West Virginia. From 1908 to 1911 his appointment was Calvert, Maryland. His next station was Leesburg, Virginia, which he served three years, from 1911 to 1914. He went from the Conference of 1914 to Remington, Virginia, for one year. March, 1915, he was sent to Glen Wilton, Virginia. During the year his health, which had been failing for several years, entirely broke down. Seeing his approaching end, his care was for the future welfare of his family. He was released from his work by his Presiding Elder, and moved to Washington City. Here he secured a home for his loved ones. He at once associated himself with the Mt. Pleasant Church, and it was the hope of all that a season of rest amid congenial surroundings would at least prolong his life. It was not so ordered by the Divine Providence. He had not more than set in order his earthly affairs when the summons came from On High. As he had lived in quiet and peaceful faith in God, and a lover of the souls of men, so he died and entered upon the great achievement of eternal life.

This is the simple story of a high and noble spirit. Brother Waters was first of all a man of deep piety. From his childhood he lived in an atmosphere of genuine religious fervor. His boyhood home was one of marked religious devotion. A view of such a home would be a sure prophecy of the consecration of the service to the Master's cause of the two sons, both in the ministry, that went out of it. There was in it the air of real refinement and culture, and all of its relationships were dominated by the spirit of Christ. The Ark of the Lord was in this home, and the Covenant of pious parents included the dedication of the boys to the ministry of the Gospel of Christ. Though many avenues of successful life were opened to him, and many attractive fields invited him to the achievement of fame and fortune, he could not rid himself of the claims of God upon his whole life in the service of the

Church. The writer of this memoir stood with him at the parting of the ways in his early manhood. The way of the world seemed so alluring and attractive. He was splendidly equipped with perfect physical life, with courage of manly strength, with inherited grace of manner and charm of personality, with well-trained intellect and with wide family influence. He seemd ready for any high enterprise. To throw his fortune with the itinerant ministry was no slight matter. He well know that he would meet many conditions of the most uncongenial sort, and that he was assuming many responsibilities foreign to his training and temperament. When will the world come to appreciate the force of such a battle, and the glory of its victory? The final crisis came at old Wesley Grove Camp-Meeting. Under a powerful sermon by Rev. W. M. Leftwich, on "The Call to the Ministry," he saw his duty clearly, and without further counting the cost he decided to spend his life as an itinerant preacher. His character was too true, and his piety too deep, to allow him to try an experiment with God. His answer once made to the divine call, knew no revocation. He was committed for life.

Brother Waters was a man of the open air and the sunlight. He loved to commune with Nature. He knew her varied language and loved to ramble through those marvelous paths of earth where the footprints of God lead to God Himself. It was not the wandering of a truant spirit when, with rod and line, he would spend the blessed day by some crystal stream in the mountains. Here, amid the prodigality of the Father's revelations of truth and beauty, he often reveled in his high kinship with the God of Nature.

"One impulse from the vernal wood May teach you more of man, Of moral evil and of good, Than all the sages can."

He loved to enter the courts of the great Temple through the Gate Beautiful.

Closely related to his love of Nature was another leading trait of his character—his love of Truth. He knew no deviation from the way of Truth. Call it what you please—the art of getting on in the world, diplomacy, tact—whenever either of these meant the least semblance of insincerity, he was a stranger to it. I doubt if Brother Waters ever told a lie. He may have been considered too frank sometimes, but if he was it was for fear that self-interests might compromise the absolute truth. His intellectual integrity was so well established that he did not fear to do his own thinking. While he was modest of his own attainments, and distrusted himself to a fault, it was not the face of man that he feared.

Friends he had everywhere. He knew what friendship meant. He was too sincere to be universally popular. Many of his highest qualities have little value in the world's market.

He preached the Gospel as he absorbed it in his Christian home, as he deepened his convictions of its truth in his study, as he drank in its beauty in God's great out-of-doors, as he felt its power upon his knees. S4 REPORTS.

We may judge that his most lasting impression upon the world will be upon those high souls that waited upon his ministry in the holy passion of finding God where His grace and truth touch human life in its highest ranges of experience and in its deepest moods of worship and adoration and praise.

Few men have questioned themselves more closely in their quest of self-discovery. Few have held themselves through all the years more finely to the Christ-ideals in a struggle for self-mastery. Few have had a sweeter instrument of self-revelation than he in his rich, full voice, which rang true and clear the note of the soul's exaltation and victory.

He was buried at Glenwood Cemetery, Washington, D. C. Here his friends will love to linger while unawares they catch the music of his voice still singing the songs of Moses and the Lamb, and feel the impulse of a new hope in the whisperings of a holy memory, "He was a friend of Jesus."

His beloved wife, who was Miss Bessie Woolf, and three children survive him. They have received the rich inheritance of his stainless life. More precious to them will be the sweet memory of his faithful service and devotion to humanity and to God than all the wealth of this world. The world will be a better place to live in if his grace of personality passes on to another generation and flows on through the years like the river of God that blesses all the shores it touches.

JEROME KYLE GILBERT.

Jerome Kyle Gilbert was born in Shellsburg, Pa., June 21, 1851. His father was the Rev. John L. Gilbert, who for many years was a prominent member of the Baltimore Conference. Brother Gilbert was born again at the old Brushy Ridge Camp-Meeting in August, 1872. While he seldom spoke of his birthplace in Pennsylvania, he often talked of Brushy Ridge, his spiritual birthplace, where he first knew his sins forgiven and that he had passed from darkness unto light.

He commenced his career as a young man in Lewisburg, W. Va., where he studied law and was licensed to practice. Soon after his conversion he felt that he was called to the ministry, and in the fall following his conversion, at the request of his pastor, he held a protracted meeting in a schoolhouse near Lewisburg, which resulted in the conversion of thirty-four souls. This new experience only served to deepen the conviction of the genuineness of his call of God to preach the Gospel, and in the spring of 1873 he was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of the Lewisburg Charge.

In the year 1875 he was admitted on trial to the Baltimore Conference in Washington, D. C., Bishop Marvin presiding, and thus commenced his career as an itinerant Methodist preacher. He continued in the regular ministry of the Church for forty years, serving the following Circuits: Laurel, South Branch, Fairfield, Monterey, Highland, North River, Morgan, James River, Lexington, Talcott, Greenbank, Mt. Jackson, Port Republic, Parnassus, New Hope, Stafford, Sudley, Newport, Oriskany, Catawba, Bath, and Churchville, where he ceased from labor and entered into rest.

In the month of February, 1915, his health began to fail, owing to serious heart trouble. He was compelled to give up his work, that he might take a needed rest, hoping to be able to regain his health and enter again upon the ministry he loved so much; but he was not permitted to do so.

On September the 25th, 1878, he was happily married to Miss Mary E. Jones, of Highland County, who entered heartily into his work, and shared with him all the trying experiences of his itinerant life.

He was particularly anxious to attend the last session of the Conference in Washington, as it had been just forty years since he joined the Conference in that city, and during this time he had failed only once to answer the roll-call. But Providence willed otherwise.

Brother Gilbert had unusual preaching ability, and presented the great themes of the Gospel in a strong and vigorous style. One of his friends, who heard him just a few months before his last illness, said: "Those two sermons were peerless in pulpit fervor and eloquence." He had a voice of thunder that rang with the authority of the Gospel. Among the last sermons which he preached was one on "A Call to the Ministry," delivered at the District Conference held at Port Republic. Upon this occasion he doubtless drew on his personal experience, but the sermon was in every way in perfect accord with the idea that the call to the ministry was divine, and that it was a proposative 'clonging to God to call men into this service. Forty years of preaching here on earth was to end with his call to a higher ministry. The weary itinerant expressed on several occasions a desire to depart and be with Christ, if it was God's will that his work was done. So on the morning of August the 19th he quietly fell asleep. His body was buried in Churchville, while his spirit went back to God who gave it.

"No star goes down, but climbs again in other skies; The rose of evening folds its glory up, To burst again from out the heart of dawn. Love never dies, though hearts run waste And sorrow makes a chastened soul to sigh—The darkest night reveals the starriest hope, And faith can trust its heaven, beyond the veil."

CHARLES E. SIMMONS.

Rev. Charles E. Simmons was born in Anne Arundel County, Maryland, November 20, 1851, and died at Manassas, Prince William County, Virginia, August 22nd, 1915.

These dates mark the beginning and close of an earthly career which

made deep and abiding impressions.

His educational fitness for his lifework was begun in the public schools of his native county. Later he attended school in Baltimore City. In the days of scholastic preparation he felt his sphere of service was the schoolroom. That he might instruct others he made himself master of the subjects to be taught. In his pulpit ministries these school tendencies were manifest. He analyzed his theme, brought to light the principle implied, stressed it and made it clear to his hearers. Thoroughness was a dominant trait in him.

He had scarcely begun his work as a teacher when the Holy Spirit called him to the higher service of teaching the lost the way of salvation. He responded to that call with whole-heartedness, giving himself unqualifiedly unto that work. He was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in March, 1874. Two years later he, with Robert J. Andrew, J. Frederick Baggs, Oscar F. Burgess and Rufus M. Wheeler, was received into full connection.

Forty-three years of service he gave unto the Church as a herald of righteousness. His appointments were such as laid upon him the burden of heavy service, and he met these demands with the full consecration of his every power. In self-forgetfulness he went forth breathing the prayer, "Lord, make me a blessing to others." That prayer was answered—not in the sphere of great pulpit oratory, but in that sphere where the real powers of the man find their amplest expression: in the circle of personal contact. Those who knew him in this more intimate relation conceded he was one of God's noblemen.

His labors were chiefly among those who venerated the preacher; who welcomed his coming into their home circle; who counted it a happy privilege to have him read God's word, and in prayer commend the family to the Heavenly Father. His pastorates brought him in contact with a people hungering "for the good things of the life to come"; gave opportunity for noble service. He met the opportunity. He wrested success from conditions which would have filled less heroic spirits with despair. His pastorates covered a large part of our Conference territory. He served the following: Franklin, Flintstone, Royal Oak, Jarrettsville, Church Hill, Occaquan, Blue Súlphur, Berkeley Springs, Capon Bridge, Springfield, Roanoke Circuit, Churchville, Edinburg, Morrisville. In the spring of 1914, feeling unable for the duties of the pastorate, he asked for and was granted the superannuate relation. With his family, he retired to Manassas to rest until he should be called to his reward. The waiting was brief. On Sunday,

August 22nd, 1915, he was called to sheath his sword and go to his coronation.

He died of acute indigestion. The end came so suddenly none were prepared for it. Before his watchers realized the gravity of his condition he closed his eyes and was gone. Funeral services were held in Grace M. E. Church, South, Manassas, Virginia, August 24th, 1915, conducted by Rev. D. H. Kern, assisted by Rev. C. M. Sarver, Rev. J. H. Kuhlmann and Rev. E. A. Roades. The Masonic Order attended the services at the church and escorted the body to the railway station. The interment was in Mount Olivet Cemetery, Baltimore. Rev. T. J. Lambert and Rev. J. R. Andrew conducted the services at the grave.

In 1884, Brother Simmons was married to Miss Mary E. Paxton, who with their four children survive him and mourn his loss.

"There is a world above,
Where parting is unknown—
A long eternity of love
Formed for the good alone;
And faith beholds the dying here
Translated to that happier sphere!

"Thus star by star declines
Till all are passed away—
As morning high and higher shines
To pure and perfect day;
Nor sink those stars in empty night,
But hide themselves in heaven's own light!"

CHARLES SAMUEL STANTON.

In the heart of the Shenandoah Valley, amid the foothills of the North mountains which mark its western border and in full view of the picturesque Massanutten range, nestles the little village of Mount Clifton, Virginia. Here it was that on May 8, 1864, the subject of this memoir was born and to him there seems to have been imparted, as a birthright, something of the ruggedness and strength of the land in which he lived.

He was the son of Benjamin J. and Mary Jane Stanton, but in early youth went to live with his uncle, Capt. J. Clinton Boude, of Lexington, by whom he was reared and educated. At the age of eighteen he was happily converted in a meeting held at Mt. Clifton by Rev. Charles G. Linthicum. For a few years he taught school, but, feeling called to the ministry, in the fall of 1887 he applied to the Quarterly Conference of his home church for license to preach, and it was granted him, Dr. J. H. Waugh being Presiding Elder. Some months later he attended the session of the Baltimore Conference in Martinsburg, W. Va., where

on March 16th, 1888, he was received on trial into the traveling connection.

During the twenty-seven years of his itinerant ministry Brother Stanton served the following charges: 1888-89, Linden; 1889-93, Hillsboro, Md.; 1893-95, Trinity, Roanoke; 1895-98, Reisterstown: 1898-1900, Middleburg; 1900-04, Clifton Forge; 1904-05, Keyser; 1905-07, Lewisburg; 1907-10, Hinton; 1910-11, Shepherdstown; 1911-13, Christiansburg; 1913-15, Elkton.

No man among us seemed more stalwart and of none would long life have been more confidently predicted. Consequently, it was a great shock to his brethren when, toward the close of his first year in Elkton, it began to be noised abroad that his health was failing. Almost from the very first it was realized some serious malady had befallen him, and he was advised to go to Baltimore for treatment. After several weeks, appearing to be much improved by reason of the operation he had undergone, he returned to his charge. But his strength was not equal to the task, and he entered the hospital at Harrisonburg, where for three months the tireless ministrations of a faithful physician and friend proved unavailing. Once more he goes to Baltimore in the hope that further surgical assistance may bring permanent relief, but this time the doctor refuses to operate and, as gently as possible, tells him to set his house in order. The end was not far distant. Tender ministries of love soothed his declining days, and for a brief period he seemed to improve. The Conference of 1915 being at hand he moved to Harrisonburg and asked for a superannuate relation. All hope of recovery was now abandoned. His massive constitution had been undermined by the insidious disease and slowly he passed into the Valley of the Shadow. On October 24th, 1915, he fell asleep with his family gathered about him. A few devoted neighbors and his pastor were also present. The funeral was conducted by Rev. J. Howard Wells and his body laid to rest in Woodbine Cemetery, Harrisonburg.

Brother Stanton was married February 4th, 1884, to Miss Victoria Elizabeth Will, by whom he is survived. One son and two daughters also remain to mourn his loss.

It is not easy to characterize a many-sided life, and brother Stanton was many-sided. In him the extremes seemed to meet. He was genial and versatile, possessed of an unfailing fund of humor and equipped with the power of apt portrayal. He could be tender as a woman, but also stern and unyielding when the occasion demanded, and he was terribly withering in his scornful denunciations of hypocrisy and sin. As a preacher he was scriptural. His style was his own and very unique, startling his hearers oftentimes by the unexpected turn he would give the text, but always true to the spirit of his Lord. He expounded the word with power, and in consequence his ministry was uplifting and edifying; by it the saints were strengthened and sinners were converted to God.

During the weary months of his last illness he entered into a richer knowledge of his Lord through the fellowship of suffering. His was the patience of hope. No murmur or complaint fell from his lips. Doubts arose only to disappear from the horizon through a triumphant faith. The assurance of his salvation was unshaken, and his pastor writes of him: "He was not afraid to go, but wanted to get well that he might preach the Gospel he loved." When the summons came it found him ready, waiting and watching, and "like one who draws the drapery of his couch about him and lays him down to pleasant dreams," he passed away full of peace.

Thus again our ranks are broken, but not forever. Faith has its fruition and with unshaken confidence we can say:

"He is not dead, this friend, not dead;
But, in paths no mortals tread,
Gone some few trifling steps ahead
And nearer to the end!
So we, too, once passed the bend,
Shall find again, as face to face, this friend
We now call dead."

JAMES T. WILLIAMS.

On the morning of November 29th, 1915, the pure, heroic spirit of Rev. James T. Williams left, in the hospital in Charles Town, West Virginia, the shattered tenement of clay which had been its home for sixty-nine years, and passed to its new abode in the "House not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."

The life thus ended began in Warrenton, Virginia, September 10th, 1846. When but a boy of sixteen years, Brother Williams entered the service of the Confederacy under Colonel Mosby and served from that time until the close of the war. The record of his soldier life is one of heroism and loyalty. He was converted in the old church in Warrenton, Virginia, under the ministry of the Rev. J. D. Blackwell, D.D. Of the fact of his conversion he seems never to have had any doubt. He enjoyed the experience of the witness of the Spirit to his adoption into the family of God. Under the inspiration of this great experience he lived and labored.

Brother Williams entered the ministry in 1871, but because of illness lost one year. He re-entered the Conference in 1873, and was appointed to the James River Circuit, where he remained three years. In the fall of 1875, while pastor of this circuit, he was married to Miss Mary S. Watkins, who, with three daughters, Mrs. C. M. Hesser, wife of Rev. C. M. Hesser, of the Baltimore Conference; Mrs. Strider, of Charles Town, W. Va., and Mrs. Kuykendall, of Romney, W. Va., and

one son, Mr. Marvin Williams, survives him. Brother Williams was greatly blessed in his marriage. Every charge which he served from 1875 to 1915 and, indeed, the whole of the Baltimore Conference knows what a helpmeet he had in his good wife.

The other appointments which Brother Williams served are: Blue Sulphur, 1876-1880; Dranesville, 1880-1882; Hamilton, 1882-1886; Central, Baltimore, 1886-1890; Staunton, 1890-1893; Falls Church, 1893-1895; Alexandria, 1895-99; Keyser, 1889-1902; Moorefield District, 1902-1906; Charles Town, 1906-1910; Berryville, 1910-1912; Poolesville, 1912-Nov., 1915.

The record of Brother Williams' work, as far as the Minutes of the Conference show, is a record of faithful and efficient service. This is true both as to the ingathering of souls and the ingathering of money.

Back of these statistics lies the unwritten history of more than forty-two years of preaching and pastoral work, the importance, the value and the success of which no man can estimate, but is recorded in the Book of Life. Brother Williams was a man of courage. This appears in his enlistment when a boy of sixteen with Mosby. Neither as a soldier of the Confederacy nor of the Lord Jesus did he ever show the white feather. He was the sort of man who would not hesitate to suffer or to die for what he believed to be right. He had the courage of his convictions.

He was faithful in all the relationships of life. He discharged the obligations growing out of his relationship as son, brother, husband and father as a true man of God. His home was a Christian home. The fire was kept burning on the family altar.

Brother Williams was a good pastor. Through the cold of winter and the heat of summer, he visited from house to house. He visited all the members of his flock. His visits were pastoral visits. He read the Word of God and prayed among his people, and his visits were benedictions to their homes. He dealt honestly, faithfully, face to face with his people as one who must give account.

He was a good preacher. He read; he studied. He prepared his sermons with care; he prepared them under the illumination of the Holy Spirit, who in olden time inspired the holy men to speak and write. He preached his sermons as he prepared them under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. He always preached well. One of his most intelligent members said of him a few months before he died: "Brother Williams' preaching is monotonous-monotonously good." The last sermon which any considerable number of his brethren of the Conference heard him preach was the Communion sermon of the Washington District Conference, 1915. It was characteristic. His text was: "I am not ashamed of the Gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth." He was a Gospel preacher

He was a preacher of the Gospel as the Methodists understand it. He loved to preach. He was such a preacher as could truthfully sing:

"Happy, if with my latest breath
I may but gasp His name,
Preach Him to all and cry in death:
Behold, behold the Lamb!"

Judge Chambers, of the Poolsville congregation, wrote of his preaching in the Baltimore Southern Methodist of December 16th, 1915: "His preaching was elevating, educational, and at times eloquent; courageous, convincing, comforting; ornate enough to please the ear, declamatory enough not to shock the nerves; emotional enough to warm the heart and sometimes to moisten the eye; full of truth and always overflowing with the Gospel as the common people love to hear it preached. No church was ever more faithfully and efficiently served than was this one at Poolesville during the last three years of Brother Williams' ministry."

His ministry was blessed to the salvation of a great many souls. He worked and prayed always toward this end. On nearly every work there were considerable numbers added to the Church. This was especially true of Hamilton and Staunton, where he had great revivals. He was anxious to close up his pastorate at Poolesville with a revival. It turned out as he had hoped and prayed. He closed a gracious revival just before he was stricken which resulted in a great blessing to the Church and in the conversion of a number of souls. The last service but one or two which he conducted was the reception of members. Many of the congregation at that service were struck with the appropriateness and impressiveness of the words which he spoke to each one as he gave the right hand of fellowship. What more appropriate or what happier end could there be to such a ministry?

A few days after the close of this meeting Brother Williams suffered a stroke of paralysis. He rallied from this, however, and might have gone on with his work but for the recurrence of an old malady. November 11th he was taken from Poolesville to the hospital at Charles Town. The physicians decided that the only hope of a cure lay in an operation, which was performed. He, however, did not rally, and on the morning of November 29th he went to be with God. He died in the triumph of a living faith, with a bright hope of everlasting life.

The tender sympathy of the people of Charles Town and Poolesville was expressive of the deep impression that Brother Williams' godly life and helpful ministry had made upon them. And this was true not only of the Methodists but of all the people regardless of demonimantional lines.

The funeral service was held in our Church at Charles Town, being conducted by the Rev. F. A. Tyler, who had ministered very tenderly to Brother Williams while he was in the hospital. Rev. H. M. Canter, D.D., made the prayer. The sermon, in accordance with the request of

Brother Williams, was preached by the writer, the text being, "Well done, good and faithful servant," Matt. 25: 21.

Rev. H. P. Hamill, D.D., Rev. H. L. Hout and Revs. W. O. Talbert and J. A. Anderson were present, as were also the pastors of all the Charles Town churches.

The body of our brother was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery at Charles Town to await the resurrection of the just.

In harmony with the truth of the text and with Brother Williams' life, the large congregation sang James Montgomery's great hymn:

"Servant of God, well done!

Rest from thy loved employ;
The battle fought, the victory won.
Enter thy Master's joy!
The voice at midnight came;
He started up to hear:
A mortal arrow pierced his frame;
He fell; but felt no fear.

"Tranquil amid alarms,
It found him on the field,
A veteran, slumbering on his arms,
Beneath his red-cross shield.
His sword was in his hand,
Still warm with recent fight,
Ready that moment, at command.
Through rock and steel to smight."

JOHN H. DAVIDSON.

In keeping with Brother Davidson's thoughtfulness and foresight, the following sketch was found among his papers in his own handwriting, which I deem eminently proper should largely make up his memoir, and is as follows:

"I have felt that if I could have any preference. I would like to drop out unnoticed when my work in the Conference should be finished. But we can not always have our preference, and, besides, membership on the Memoirs Committee in past years has impressed me with the necessity for some data to be at hand. Therefore, I write the following sketch: I am the son of George H. and Emily Davidson, and was born in Baltimore, July 30th, 1851. On both sides my family were Methodists as far back as I know. My father's people were of Scotch and German extraction and were among the early Baltimoreans. My father when a boy attended the Sunday School superintended by Christian Keener, father of the late Bishop John C. Keener, and, I think I have

heard him say, became a classmate of the late Dr. Samuel Regester, after he was converted and joined old Caroline Street Church, Baltimore, Md. My mother's father was a New York man who traveled South in his business and found his wife in Hanover County, Virginia. He established their home in Baltimore, but died when my mother was only about three years of age. My maternal grandmother's sister, Miss Polly Bowles, according to the late Dr. John Edwards, of the Virginia Conference, organized the first Methodist Sunday School in Richmond, Virginia, and I have often wondered if she got the idea from Bishop Asbury, who, I believe, organized the first Methodist Sunday School in America, in Hanover County, Virginia.

"We lived in Baltimore until I was between eight and nine years of age, when in April, 1860, my father moved with his family to Strasburg, in the Valley of Virginia, one year before the great Civil War. I was too young to appreciate the dreadfulness of that destructive period of our history, and yet old enough to see a good deal of what was doing and to receive lasting impressions. I had gone to school while we lived in Baltimore from a very early age until I was eight years old, and after that I was taught at home until I could read. eight until I was grown, my school advantages consisted of about eighteen months of schooling under Mr. Richard Long, Mr. Erasmus Painter and the Rev. John Pirkey, a minister of the Disciples Church. I don't know when I was taught the form of prayer; it reaches farther back than my memory goes. It seems that I was born with the fear of God before my eyes, and from a very early age, being taught the essentials of the Christian religion, I had a longing desire to experience the sense of divine pardon and salvation from sin. I remember sitting with a boy chum on a curbstone in Baltimore, and we were talking of a temperance meeting we had attended at Patterson Park the Sunday before, and the propriety of signing the pledge. I said: 'But, Fred, there is something better than that, and that is to be converted. I expect to be converted some day.' Long and varied were the exercises my mind and heart went through between that time and the time I was happily converted at a little past fifteen years of age. Rev. Mr. Heterick, a local preacher, was at the time serving as second man on the old Winchester Circuit under Rev. Jos. H. Marsh. There was a gracious revival under Brother Heterick at Strasburg. After presenting myself at the altar three nights without having found peace, I went home much disappointed, but as my dear father talked to me explaining and simplifying by illustrations, the subject of faith in Christ, I was most consciously and happily born of the Spirit into the Kingdom.

"When I was a small boy it was thought I might preach some day, but I have no recollection of that subject ever occupying my attention. After I was converted, however, I was so impressed with the feeling that I should preach the Gospel of Christ that I said to my eldest sister Lizzie while we were talking in confidence one evening: Lizzie, I believe I was born for that purpose.' Nearly all my life I

have been a sufferer from a most trying physical infirmity which might well be termed a 'thorn in the flesh,' but 'grace has kept me safe thus far.'

"I have meant to be faithful as a professed follower of Christ and have tried to be such to the work of the Lord, but have fallen far short of what I desired to do for the good of my fellow-men.

"I was married first on April 27th, 1880, to Miss Mary Augusta Jump, and the last time to Miss Annie M. Hershberger, Oct. 16th. 1907."

Rev. J. H. Davidson joined the Baltimore Conference in 1876 and served the following charges during his ministry:

Fincastle, 1 year; North Baltimore, 2 years; Martinsburg, 1 year; Warren, 1 year; Keyser, 2 years; Luray, 4 years; Fairfax, 4 years; Clifton Forge, 1 year; Queen Anne, 3 years; Blacksburg, 4 years; Poolesville, 3 years; Eagle Rock, 2 years; Cambria, 1 year; superannuated, 1 year; Remington, 1 year; Goldsboro, 2 years.

Brother Davidson became a superannuate in 1911, and moved to Luray, Virginia, where he lived until his death. There was no truer, purer, nobler man among us. He was a clear thinker and a logical and forceful preacher of the Gospel of the Son of God. He had many souls to his ministry. He was a loving son, a devoted husband and father, and was greatly beloved by the people whom he served and by all who knew him.

He died in great peace after a long period of illness at his home in Luray, Virginia, December 5th, 1915, in his 65th year. After appropriate funeral services conducted in the Methodist Church by Rev. H. M. Strickler, a lifelong friend, assisted by Rev. L. L. Lowance and the writer, his body was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery in Luray, Virginia, to wait the resurrection of the just.

SAMUEL A. PARKER.

Rev. Samuel Anderson Parker was born in Monroe County. West Virginia, April 3, 1857, and died in Berryville, Virginia, March 12th, 1916, aged 58 years, 11 months and nine days.

He was not converted until he was twenty-five years of age, and in the year 1884 was licensed to preach, and in the following year was sent by his presiding elder as a supply to Woodland Mission in Bath County, Virginia. At the close of a successful year's work in this field he was received on trial by the Baltimore Conference and was returned to Woodland Mission.

At the Conference which met in Martinsburg, West Virginia, in March, 1888, he was received into full connection and also ordained a deacon by Bishop Wilson. Two years later at the Conference which convened at St. Paul's Church, Baltimore, he was elected to Elder's Orders and ordained by Bishop Duncan.

On April 3, 1889, his thirty-second birthday, he was married to Miss Leola Florence Kincaid, of Bath County, Virginia. This union was a very happy one for the contracting parties, and became a source of blessing to all who were privileged to enjoy the hospitality of the Christian home which they established and which they maintained for nearly twenty-seven years. Only one child, Miss Marion, was born to this union. She is a young woman of splendid mind, of noble character and promises to be of much comfort to her mother in the great sorrow that has fallen upon the home.

He had charge of Huntersville Circuit in 1887; North Branch Mission, 1888-89; Listonburg, 1890-92; Springfield, 1893-96; Cumberland, 1897; McDowell, 1898-99; Romney, 1900-01; Augusta, 1902-05; Linganore, 1906-08. In 1909 he was appointed Principal of Bowling Green Seminary. During the years 1910 and 1911 he served Hillsboro, and in 1912 was assigned to Berryville, where he closed his quadrennium and earthly ministry together.

Rev. Samuel A. Parker was a man of deep-seated piety. His Christian character and life were of that pure and lofty type that challenged the confidence and admiration of all who knew him, and added power to the words he uttered from the pulpit. He believed in God with the simplicity of a child. He trusted in the infinite merit of Christ with an abiding confidence, and in the Holy Ghost as his Sanctifier, Comforter and Teacher. Rarely, if ever, was he heard to utter a discouraging or disheartening word. In the funeral service Rev. John A. Anderson, his presiding elder, said he had never heard Brother Parker make an unkind criticism of anyone. He loved the Methodist Church; he loved its institutions, doctrines, usages and people. loved his brethren in the ministry and they in turn loved him. fraternal and social attachments were unchangeable. With a genial smile, a pleasant word of greeting, and a warm handgrasp, he would meet his brethren time after time until they felt these were the real expressions of a true and noble heart that beat warm with genuine affection. He loved God, he loved God's Word, he loved the Church, he loved his home, he loved all people. And love is the bow which impels the arrow of obedience; the mainspring which moves the wheels of duty; the strong arm tugging the oar of diligence. He that hath love can no more be motionless than the aspen in the gale, the dead and dried leaf in the hurricane, or the spray in the tempest. Love is instinct with activity; it can not be idle. It is the wellspring of heroism, and noble deeds are the gushings of its fountains. If one seeks to find the reason for Brother Parker's beautiful, uplifting, Christian influence it is in this love which characterized and vitalized his life.

Wherever he labored he was much beloved by those whom he served. The expressions of kindness and sympathy and material aid shown by the people of Berryville during his last illness was indeed marvelous.

"He needs no wreath or marble's sheen To keep his blessed memory green; In hearts that love and trust 'twill bide Until time's latest eventide."

For several weeks prior to his death Brother Parker knew he could not get well, and without a cloud dimming his sight or a fear possessing his heart he calmly resigned himself to the will of Him who doeth all things well. On Sunday, March 12th, 1916, while the evening shades were enveloping all in their shadows his soul loosed its earthly moorings and dropped anchor in the haven of eternal rest. The funeral services were held in the Berryville Methodist Church, conducted by his presiding elder, Rev. John A. Anderson, assisted by Rev. W. H. Ballengee, Rev. F. A. Tyler, Rev. W. R. Hardesty, Rev. F. T. Ridgeway and Rev. W. O. Talbert. Rev. R. L. Eutsler, Rev. C. H. Cannon, Rev. R. D. McNeer, Rev. C. C. Bush, and most of the ministers of other denominations in Berryville, together with a very great throng of sympathizing friends, were present. The funeral sermon, which was full of soul-inspiring truth and sympathy, was based upon a part of the 15th verse of the xvii Psalm: "I shall be satisfied, when I awake in thy likeness." The body was laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery on the hill overlooking Berryville, there to await the coming of Him "who shall fashion anew the body of our humiliation, that it may be conformed to the body of his glory."
