INTRODUCTIONS—Rev. A. J. Lamar, D. D., one of the Book Agents of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and Rev. L. E. Todd, D. D., Secretary of the General Board of Finance, were introduced.

The General Conference of 1918 sent down to the Annual Conferences for Conference action the following items:

1. "Shall lay members be eligible to all conference boards and lay offices of the Church, without regard to sex?"

The vote was taken and resulted as follows: 175 members of the Conference were present and voted, 128 members voted in the affirmative and 47 voted in opposition.

2. "Shall the Apostle's Creed as it occurs in the Discipline, Chapter XXIII, Section IV, Paragraph 756, and elsewhere be so amended as to substitute for the words 'holy catholic Church' the words 'Christ's holy Church'?"

The vote was taken and resulted as follows: 168 members of the Conference were present and voted, 109 members voted in favor of this change and 59 voted in opposition.

3. The Question, Will the Annual Conference approve the change in Article 23 of the Articles of Religion proposed by the General Conference of 1914 and 1918, which change is as follows: Strike out the article as it appears in the Discipline of 1914 and in previous Disciplines, and in lieu thereof insert the following:

"XXIII. Of the Duty of Christians to Civil Authority.—It is the duty of all Christians, and especially of all Christian ministers, to observe and obey the laws of the governing or supreme authority of the country of which they are citizens or subjects, or in which they reside, and to use all laudable means to encourage and enjoin obedience to the powers that be."

The vote was taken and resulted as follows: 137 members of the Conference were present and voted in the affirmative.

The Report of the Board of Church Extension was presented, read and, on motion, adopted.

On motion, it was ordered that the selection of the place for holding the next session of the Conference be referred to the Committee on Conference Entertainment.

The Report of the Board of Education was presented, read and, on motion, adopted.

. The Bishop called D. H. Kern to the Chair.

The Order of the Day having arrived, the Conference united in singing Hymn No. 461, "How Firm a Foundation."

QUESTION TWENTY-ONE of the General Minutes was called, viz: What preachers have died during the past year?

The Committee on Memoirs presented their report.

The Memoir of Asbury R. Martin was read by H. P. Hamill.

The Memoir of John T. Maxwell was read by M. D. Mitchell.

The Memoir of William Hedges was read by J. P. Stump.

The Memoir of William Melville was read by S. V. Hildebrand.

The Memoir of S. G. Thomas was read by W. W. White, and was, on motion, ordered printed in the Minutes.

Suitable remarks of appreciation of the life and work of William Melville were made by William E. Miller, J. P. Wiley and S. V. Hildebrand; of William Hedges by F. J. Prettyman and C. D. Harris, and of J. T. Maxwell by F. J. Prettyman.

The Report of the Committee on Memoirs was, on motion, adopted. The following resolution, signed by H. M. Canter, F. J. Prettyman, John C. Copenhaver and B. V. Switzer, was presented, read and, on motion, adopted:

"It is a matter of great interest to the whole of Southern Methodism and especially to the Baltimore Conference that the Representative Church at Washington, D. C., has been brought to a successful completion. It is reported to us that this great gift of Southern Methodism to the National Capital will be opened for public worship in the month of June. We have given to this enterprise our unstinted co-operation, and we wish to record our appreciation of the generous response not only by our own Conference but by all the Conferences making up our whole connection.

"The General Conference Commission has worked with indefatigable zeal and has brought to its completion an enterprise to the praise and glory of Southern Methodism. Especially we commend the untiring efforts of the Field Secretary of the Commission, Rev. George Sexton, D. D.

"This Church, which is the most handsome building representing the religious order in our Capital, has been completed at a cost of more than a half of a million of dollars. The present success of this Church under the pastorate of Rev. C. G. Chappell, which has been augmented this year by the addition of more than five hundred members, demonstrates the wisdom of the General Conference in projecting it as a Representative Church.

"The Baltimore Conference joins with the whole Church in this expression of our gratification of the completion of this great work. Grace be unto it."

The Report of the Treasurer of the Board of Church Extension was Presented and read.

The Report of the Committee on District Conference Records was presented, read and, on motion, adopted.

Report No. 3 on Publishing Interests was presented, read and, on motion, adopted.

The Report of the Epworth League Board was presented, read and, on motion, adopted.

The Report of the Committee on Temperance was presented, read and amended so as to change the order of naming the co-operating institutions to give prominence to the Church.

The Report as amended was adopted.

The Report of the Visitors to the Maryland General Hospital was presented and read.

Conference adjourned with singing the "Doxology" and with the Benediction to meet this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Monday, March 31, 1919.

Conference met pursuant to adjournment.

Bishop Hendrix in the Chair.

Religious services were conducted by Rev. J. W. Walling, D. D.

The Journal of the morning session was read and approved.

A collection for the sexton was taken, amounting to \$42.12.

The Nominations of the Boards to serve for the ensuing four years were made and they were, on motion, elected.

The following Recommendations of the Centenary Commission were presented and, on motion, adopted:

- 1. That the Presiding Elders and the Pastors, with the co-operation of the District and Charge Directors, make the most possible of the Minute Men in giving publicity to and arousing interest in the Centenery plan.
- 2. That Charge and local Church Institutes be held if possible in every pastorate.
- 3. That full co-operation be given the Conference and District Directors in completing the organization for the Eight Day Drive, May 18-25. The work cannot be well done without this organization.
- 4. That every charge undertake its full allotment and count the credits only after the drive has been completed.
- 5. That we have learned with inexpressible satisfaction of the great Inter Church movement in which a united Protestantism proposes to undertake its world tasks; that we heartily approve of this movement and assure the Committee of our fullest co-operation.

The Report of the Conference War Work Commission was presented, read and, on motion, adopted.

An invitation from Dr. and Mrs. Frazier, of the First Presbyterian Church to Members of the Conference to visit the Manse and see the birth chamber of President Wilson was unanimously accepted with pleasure.

The following resolution, signed by J. W. Smith, C. D. Harris, H. H. Sherman, D. H. Kern, H. Sydenstricker, J. H. Wells and C. M. Hesser, was presented, read and, on motion, adopted:

"Resolved, That in order to procure the best results of our Conference Sessions and to give to each board equal rights,

"That three Clerical members of the Conference be appointed to serve during the quadrennium as a Committee on Conference Program. This Committee, after consulting with the Presiding Elder in whose District and the preacher at whose Charge the Conference is held, to arrange a program for the Conference, with the exception of the regular business sessions."

Rev. S. K. Cockrell sent the following telegram, "Your message brought comfort; Philippians one—three to five."

The following resolution of appreciation, signed by J. H. Smith, William H. Best and G. D. White, was presented, read and unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

"We the members of the Baltimore Conference, Methodist Church, South, in appreciation of the generous hospitality extended to us while guests of the good people of Central Church, do hereby extend our thanks to the paster of this Church, Rev. M. D. Mitchell, D. D., Dr. Frazier of the Presbyterian Church, the Y. M. C. A., and all others who contributed to our entertainment. Also to the newspapers for their accurate accounts of our proceedings."

The Journal of the afternoon session was read and approved.

The Conference united in singing Hymn No. 107, and Bishop Hendrix led in prayer.

QUESTION FIFTY-THREE of the General Minutes was called, viz: Where are the preachers stationed this year?

Bishop Hendrix announced the appointments. (See appointments.)

The Conference adjourned sine die with singing the "Doxology" and with the Benediction of Bishop Hendrix.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

THE RANDOLPH-MACON SYSTEM.

The reports of the several institutions have been made to the Board of Education and should be of real concern to every member of the Conference. In addition to the statistical part of the reports for which see answer to question 49 in the Minutes, we call attention to the following points of special interest:

The College at Ashland reports an increase of \$6,500 in endowment. The College has returned to normal conditions which had been modified because of the war.

While there is nothing of peculiar interest financially to report concerning the Woman's College, we would call attention to the splendid service rendered during the war. Thirty of its graduates were actively engaged in service, four of that number at the front in France. Rev. C. G. Hounshell, in speaking of the religious influence of the College, said at the recent meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Conference that the Woman's College was doing a most excellent work for the cause of missions.

The Institute at Danville has the largest enrollment in the history of the school, the number of students matriculated being 361, an increase of 128 over the past year.

The Academy of Bedford City is still maintaining its high record of attendance, 31 in excess of any previous year's attendance.

The condition of the Academy at Front Royal deserves special attention. It has enjoyed an unprecedented year. Of the \$32,000 recently subscribed on Construction Debt, \$17,300 have been paid. One hundred and ninety-one students have matriculated during the year, and there is a large number on the waiting list.

We would urge our pastors and people to an unstituted loyalty to our institution. As never before in our history should the Church realize the place of the church school in everything that pertains to our highest welfare.

UNIVERSITIES.

We record in our report with satisfaction and pride the success of our two universities, Emory at Atlanta, Ga., and The Southern Methodist University at Dallas, Texas. These schools have weathered the storm of the War period, and are worthy of the support of the great Church which they represent in the higher field of Christian Education. Emory, which is intended to supply the need of our territory east of the Mississippi River is of especial importance to our Conference. It is the apex of our educational system. Without it we would have to admit our inability to cover the whole ground of Christian scholarship, and our lack of equipment, not only to train our ministry, but our lay

men in the sphere of technical learning and professional life. It is a matter of great gratification to us that one of the beautiful marble buildings of Emory bears the name of one of our honored laymen, Brother T. T. Fishburne, who contributed a large sum for its erection.

The University is but in its infancy. It now holds property and endowment amounting to over \$3,000,000. This must be increased by many millions to enable it to take rank in all respects with the leading educational institutions of the country. It is to be hoped that in this day of world vision our Church may furnish the means to make this the centre of a world influence in higher education.

DEPARTMENT OF MINISTERIAL SUPPLY AND TRAINING.

In connection with Emory University, we call attention to the Department of Ministerial Supply and Training. No more important work in the educational field has been undertaken than that which has been entrusted to this Department. It has been adequately and successfully conducted under the direction of the Board of Education through the most efficient leadership of Rev. R. H. Bennett, D. D. In his report to the Conference Dr. Bennett calls attention to the great need of an increasing number of candidates for the ministry. It is laid upon the heart and conscience of the Church to use all proper means to direct the thought of our young men to this self-sacrificing, yet noble and all important service. It is made the duty of each preacher to preach at least once a year on "the Call to the Ministry".

MINISTERIAL LOAN FUND.

The Ministerial Loan Fund is one of the most essential offerings for the well-being of the Church, and it is to be hoped that it will be largely increased this year by generous and voluntary gifts.

Our undergraduates are reminded that the laws passed by the last General Conference makes it obligatory upon them to take the course of the Correspondence School.

We recommend that in conformity with the action of the last General Conference a commission consisting of Rev. John William Smith and Rev. G. G. Martin be constituted for the purpose of providing for the religious education of Methodist students in schools maintained by the State.

THE SOUTHERN SEMINARY.

The Southern Seminary is reported by the Visiting Committee appointed by our Board of Education as an institution of learning with the spirit of Methodism in it. This is a factor in education it is impossible to overestimate at any time, and especially in these times. Moreover, it is the only school of this sort for female education located within the bounds of the Baltimore Conference.

This School has hitherto been recognized as a church school, but will hereafter, under new management, be conducted as an independent seminary under Methodist influence.

THE BLACKSTONE COLLEGE FOR GIRLS.

We heartily commend to our people the Blackstone College for Girls, situated at Blackstone, Va. This institution is a Junior College wholly owned and controlled by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the high standard of excellence which it maintains renders it well worthy of our confidence and our patronage.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

General Board of Church Extension.

Your Board has had before it the report of the Secretary, Rev. H. A. Boaz, D. D. During the past four years Church Extension has made greater progress than in any quadrennium in the history of the Church. The total increase amounted to \$2,335,144.10. This is an increase of \$653,919.24 over the previous quadrennium. The Loan Fund Capital is \$1,106,326.44. Great things have been accomplished for Church Extension by Dr. W. F. McMurry—now Bishop McMurry—our former Secretary.

The last General Conference has ordered the Loan Fund increased to \$1,140,000. This may seem a big task for the Church, but not so. God's Kingdom is growing in our midst and the need is great. We confidently believe in these days of Centenary inspiration under the leader-

ship of our new Secretary, Dr. Boaz, we will more than accomplish the work.

Annuity Bonds.

Business men are looking for good investments. The time has come for us to personally tell our people that their church offers them one of the safest and best investments possible. An Annuity Bond of any amount can be purchased with rate of interest ranging from 5% to 9%.

The Conference Board.

The assessment from the General Board for Church Extension this year was \$9,540.00, with a special assessment of \$2,000 ordered by this Conference for the Washington City Representative Church. Total, \$11,540. Paid on assessment, \$10,481.00, showing a net gain of \$1,031.00. Nine churches applied for aid, amounting to \$4,000.00. One parsonage, \$350.00. After setting aside \$1,500.00 for the Representative Church and transmitting \$4,331.00 to the General Board, the Conference Board had \$4,500.00 at its disposal, \$475.00 more than last year.

OUR LOAN FUND is two years old at this Conference and we rejoice that it now has \$2,501.00 to its credit. Two loans have been made to needy churches and others will be helped during the year.

We recommend:

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Baltimore Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South-

The Sunday School Board submits the following report:

The statistical reports of the Sunday Schools of the Conference are not available for incorporation in this report, but from the oral reports made by the pastors to the Conference they manifest continued and successful operation of the work of the Sunday School and indicate a healthy condition of growth. The statistics which are available to us from the reports of last year show not only an increase in the number of Sunday Schools, but also a substantial increase in the enrollment in the various departments of the school.

Literature.

The Sunday School literature is of high grade and meets the needs of our schools. The new publication, the *School Standard*, is designed for the use of officers and teachers. No school whose workers are seek-

47

ing to acquaint themselves with the principles and methods of modern Sunday School work can afford to do without the School Standard.

Definite Aims for the Coming Year.

The Board herewith submits some definite objectives for the coming year, and in order that Sunday School Workers may be acquainted with the same we shall endeavor to submit a brief summary.

In this connection we would mention the Church-wide Membership Campaign and the house to house visitation to be conducted during the month of May. It is believed this membership campaign will increase the Sunday School enrollment of our Conference 5,000 or more. Specific instructions as to the matter of conducting this canvas will be forwarded to all superintendents and pastors upon application to C. D. Bulla, D. D., Corresponding Secretary, 810 Broadway, Nashville, Tenn.

Another objective is to secure the 5 cents a month per member from our Sunday Schools for the Missionary Centenary. Schools should accept this allotment without delay and send pledge cards to J. L. Neill, Nashville, Tenn.

Field Secretary.

Recognizing the imperative necessity for the employment of a Sunday School Field Secretary for the Conference and realizing that most of the Annual Conferences in the connection have already secured Field Secretaries, including our neighboring Conferences, the West Virginia and the Virginia, we have availed ourselves of the opportunity of selecting for this important office Rev. W. H. Best. It is proposed to have him take up his work of organization and personal visitation to all sections of the Baltimore Conference in promoting this supremely important work. We earnestly request in his behalf the hearty co-operation of the Sunday School Workers of the Conference.

Sunday School Anniversary.

We again request that the Thursday night of the Conference Week be set aside for the observance of our Sunday School Anniversary. We deem it very essential that the interests of the Sunday School should be set forth prominently and fully on this Anniversary occasion at the next session of our Conference.

Institute Work in the Districts.

The Board has decided definitely that Sunday School Institutes should be held in all the Districts of the Conference, which districts are requested to organize in accordance with the plan of the General Board. Literature for such Institutes will be furnished by our Field Secretary or the General Sunday School Board.

Training Schools for Leaders.

The Training School for Sunday School Leaders will be held at Lake Junaluska, N. C., July 23 to Aug. 6, 1919. We earnestly urge our Sunday School workers to attend.

Sunday School Day.

We are glad to announce that the Sunday School Day offerings show an increase over last year. Every School is urged to observe Sunday School Day, and, according to the requirements of the Discipline, take an offering on that day. This offering should be sent as soon as taken to the Treasurer of the Board, O. C. Michael, Aberdeen, Md. The Board will furnish Sunday School Day programs, without cost, to all schools which take the offerings and remit them to the Board's Treasurer. These programs may be ordered through Smith and Lamar, Richmond, Va., or Nashville, Tenn.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

The Epworth League Board of the Baltimore Conference desires to submit the following report:

The Epworth League work in our Conference is abreast of the best in the entire Church, only two other Conferences, the North Carolina and the North Alabama, equalling, and none surpassing ours.

We have over 200 chapters in our Conference. There are 211 pastoral charges, with 696 congregations; putting one league chapter to every charge, we would have eleven charges and 496 congregations without leagues. Is it asking too much to request our preachers to make earnest efforts to institute chapters wherever it is at all possible?

The Central Office is making effort to produce a closer co-operation between itself, the Conference Board, the Conference League and the individual chapters. We rejoice to see fruit being already born to these efforts and call on our Leaguers to do all to make our Leagues efficient and standard.

The Epicorth Era shows improvement in material, make-up, influence and patronage. We urge our Leagues to do their utmost to provide a still wider use and circulation of our organ.

The Leagues of the Church have been given no mean place in the great Centenary movement. We have been asked to raise among the Leagues of our Conference the sum of \$3,800.00 per year for five years. Already we have assurance enough to warrant the statement that our young people will go over the top in this drive.

We desire to call your attention to the Anniversary Day of the League, and urge our preachers to give one whole service to this service, using it to make a suitable address to the young people and explain the need of a generous offering. We would call attention of the preachers to Paragraph 404 of the Discipline and ask their co-operation in carrying out its injunctions.

The African Special still shows increase in popularity and amounts raised for this worthy mission. We congratulate the Leagues on this special work.

We commend the Conference Epworth League to our young people and urge in view of the marvelous results that come to both leagues and individuals through its influence, a larger and more general attendance upon its session in Lexington, July 3-5, 1919.

We desire to thank the Editor and Directors of the *Baltimore Southern*Methodist for the League Page in the Conference organ, and request
the continuance of the privilege for another year.

We request the Committee on Public Worship to grant us Wednesday evening of the next Conference session for our Board anniversary.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

As to our country, so to the American Bible Society, the year has brought the challenge of peculiar opportunity and the test of responsibility. The special opportunity in the home fields has been created by the entrance of the United States into the war, and the consequent sudden prominence of the questions of life and death in the thoughts and hearts of the manhood and womanhood of the country. In foreign lands the challenge of opportunity arises out of the discrediting of material, intellectual, political means and ends, and the turning of civilized and uncivilized peoples, of nominal Christian and non-Christian races alike, to search for that which is enduring, and which cannot be ruthlessly snatched away. The test of responsibility has put us on trial as to our faith, our devotion and our generosity in responding to the appeal and meeting the need for the word of God which has arisen marvelously, the world over, out of the present sad and serious world conditions.

This is not the place for a full statement as to the ideals of Holy Scriptures. Everyone knows that therein, and therein alone, is the doctrine of one great family, one Father, "The Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, of whom the world family in heaven and earth is named," one Saviour who "hath broken down the middle wall of partition" and made us "no more strangers and foreigners, but fellow-citizens with the saints and household of God," "Builded upon the foundation of the

apostles and propnets, builded together for a habitation of God through the spirit."

Wherever the Bible is a cherished book there are members of an international society which cannot be shaken.

Never was there such an opportunity.

Never was France, or Italy, or Austria, or the new nationalities rising out of the breaking up of Central Empires, never were the people of Asia, or Africa, or the Islands of the sea, so ready for the Bible as at the present hour. Will we rise to undertake this task? The record of last year, as every year since 1913, has been surpassed during this year by the gifts from the various charges which rose this year to \$2,611.83.

It is cheering to have this continued and increased evidence of awakened life, vigor and interest on the part of those interested in the great work of supplying our country and other countries with the Scriptures. About 7,000,000 copies of Scriptures were distributed to the armies and navies this year.

Therefore we recommend that one-half of the collections taken for the American Bible Society this year be applied toward the expenses incurred in providing Scriptures for our army and navy.

In view of the supreme importance of the work of the American Bible Society and the comparative small assessment which has been made upon our Conference by the Board of Finance for this purpose, we therefore recommend that a special for the American Bible Society be raised in each charge for this purpose not to go in the budget for distribution, but to be sent directly by the Conference Bible Board to the agents of the Society.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The General Board of Missions reports that, notwithstanding the distractions and confusions of a world war, our great cause of missions has not suffered, but on the contrary, has moved forward with tremendous momentum. We have surpassed the year 1917, which was the banner year up to that time.

The year 1918 shows this increase over 1917:

Foreign Missions	\$126,058.00
Home Missions	37,566.00
Total increase	\$162 624 00

There was a total increase from assessments and budget specials for Foreign Missions of \$192,025.00, giving a surplus of \$125,000.00 and enabling the Board to answer all the needs of our missionaries and do some very necessary things not included in the appropriations for the year.

The increase of \$97,826.00 from the woman's work is also gratifying, showing a steady growth in missionary spirit and liberality.

The increase in the budget specials of \$97,251.00 for the past two years is another encouraging fact that our missionary propaganda is bringing a fruitage, and the possibilities are limited, only, by the intelligence and thoroughness of our missionary education.

The Missionary Centenary is proving a great inspiration. The most satisfactory and enheartening news comes from every section of the Church, not only in material advances, but in spiritual power, which is the greatest of all assets. A special Centenary report will be submitted by the Commission charged with the responsibility of the movement in our own Conference.

Our Conference is on fire with missionary zeal and activity, as is evidenced by the reports from the charges. The Christmas offerings, by the Sunday Schools for the starving Armenian and Syrian children have exceeded in magnitude all expectations.

Our people have caught the vision and are thinking in terms worthy of our great Church.

We recommend to the Bishop Rev. H. H. Sherman, D. D., for appointment as Conference Missionary Secretary to give his full time to the office in connection with the Centenary movement.

We recommend that Friday night of our next Annual Conference Session be fixed as the time for holding the Missionary Anniversary.

REPORT ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

There are conditions confronting us today which threaten the sanctity of the Sabbath. Standing as we are upon the eve of world reconstruction, we need to keep in mind the scriptural observance of the Sabbath as a fundamental principle of Christian civilization.

Any disposition to look upon the Sabbath as a day of convenience, amusement and business rather than a day of worship, is fraught with serious danger.

The popular demand for an open Sabbath threatens the morale of civil life and undermines the churches' endeavor to establish the Kingdom of righteousness on the earth.

We recommend:

- I. That each local church study the causes of Sabbath violation and put forth every possible effort for securing a proper observance of the Lord's Day.
- II. That whenever Sabbath Observance is a topic before any department of the Church it be given special study and emphasis.
- III. That the Church co-operate with such movements as undertake to preserve the sacredness of the Sabbath.
- IV. That the Presiding Elders of the Baltimore, Washington and Moorefield Districts appoint one clerical and one lay representative each from their respective districts to represent our Church in Maryland and the District of Columbia to co-operate with the "Lord's Day Alliance."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

With gratitude to God, we rejoice that the prayers of millions of men and women and children have been answered in the overthrow of the organized liquor traffic by a sufficient number of States ratifying the Prohibition Amendment of the Federal Constitution during the past year.

We believe this end has been accomplished through the work of the Church of Christ in co-operation with the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, the Anti-Saloon League and other temperance organizations.

Yet we are reminded that eternal vigilance, at the price of liberty, must still be maintained that the monster of vice and crime may not further crush the hearts and homes of the people of our land.

To this end we recommend a further and if possible, a fuller, co-operation with all the forces which have achieved this glorious end and the choice of such men and means as will make this amendment most effective in the several states of our country and extend a similar service to all countries of the world.

We recommend that the use of intoxicants & a beverage and as a medicine be further discontinued, and from pulpit, platform and press the people be further warned against the poisonous, degrading and deadly effect upon its subjects.

We further recommend co-operation with all officers in their dangerous work of enforcing the law.

REPORT OF THE WAR WORK COMMISSION OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE.

The War Work Commission of this Conference met in Mt. Vernon Place Church, Washington, D. C., Aug. 8, 1918, at 10 A. M. A statement was made by Dr. E. O. Watson, Secretary of the General War Work Commission and the following Conference officers were elected: Rev. H. M. Canter, Chairman; Rev. C. M. Hesser, Secretary; Executive Committee: Rev. B. W. Bond, Rev. R. L. Fultz and Mr. W. L. Brannon. By action of the Commission, the Chairman and Secretary were made members of the Executive Committee.

A report was made to the Commission by the various Presiding Elders in whose districts camps were located and where the religious and social welfare of our soldiers might be provided for. This work we consider our most important and sacred task. Our boys who have been called out of our homes and churches for service to their country must be made to feel the warm touch of sympathy and love by the church. They are under great temptation and must have the ministry of their spiritual guides. They are to be our future leaders in state and church and must not be left now in the day of their greatest need.

We therefore commend in the fullest degree the splendid work of our Commission on war work and would direct their attention to the following fields of service within the bounds of our Conference:

We recommend-

- I. That no special appointment be made at this Conference for the work at Camp Meade, as we believe the situation can be fully met by the pastor of Wesley Grove Charge, assisted by such aid as the War Work Commission in Washington, D. C., pledges to render.
- II. We are convinced there is a great opportunity for work for the boys at Quantico and for the future of the Church there and ask for the appointment of Rev. Wade Johnson that the work may be continued in this field.
- III. There has been great need for special work among the soldiers in Alexandria. This has been fully met by the work carried on there in the Young People's Building, and we suggest that it be done as long as the need is apparent.
- IV. No greater opportunity has presented itself to the Church than that of ministering to the sick and wounded at Walter Reid Hospital. We therefore urge the appointment of Rev. N. B. Harmon as associate paster at Emory Church that this need may be fully met.
- V. The special task of the Church at this time, when so many of our boys are returning to their homes, is that of aiding them in finding work at once. In this field we believe that our pastors and laymen can render great service. We therefore beg them that they let no opportunity pass unimproved.

REPORT OF VISITORS TO THE MARYLAND GENERAL HOSPITAL.

Your committee appointed to visit the Maryland General Hospital of Baltimore desires to offer the following report:

The hospital is in the best condition in its history. It is well patronized and is doing more charitable work than any other hospital in the

City of Baltimore. Even during the past year, with the increase in prices, the Hospital has been able to maintain itself and keep out of debt. In February a second campaign was effected which resulted in securing one hundred and fifteen thousand dollars. This will enable the Hospital to pay off the first mortgage bonds and clear it from all indebtedness. Provision has also been made to erect a nurses' home, costing thirty-five thousand dollars. When this is done we shall have one of the finest institutions in the country.

We recommend that our Conference sympathetically co-operate with the Methodist Hospital Association in its work in every way possible, but without in any way incurring any financial obligations thereby, or becoming responsible for its management in any sense that would bind our Annual Conference legally, financially or morally.

We request the preachers of the Conference to commend the hospital to our people and that each pastoral charge at the discretion of the pastor observe one Sabbath in the year to be known as "Hospital Sunday," and the sacramental collection of that day be given to the Hospital Association.

MEMOIRS

ASBURY ROBERTS MARTIN.

"The righteous shall be in everlasting remembrance." The deeds of good men are worthy of record. The living honor themselves when they make mention of the virtues of their dead.

Asbury Roberts Martin's ancestors were Scotch-Irish, were among the first settlers of Virginia, and well bore their part in the early struggles of our country for civil and political freedom. He was born July 6th, 1844, while his father, the Reverend John Satchel Martin, of precious memory in this Conference, was the pastor of Wesley Chapel, in the City of Baltimore. His mother was a Miss Ruff, of Rockbridge County, Virginia. He was baptized by the Rev. Jos. Merriken and was converted under the ministry of his father, in his twelfth year, in Exeter Street Church, Baltimore. In his middle name is preserved the memory of a distinguished physician and local preacher of Baltimore Methodism, so that in name, dedication and spiritual experience is preserved much that was best in the Methodism of his infancy and early youth.

Outside his home, for that was a day of education in the home, his education was first in the private schools of his native city, and then at Roanoke College, Salem, Va.

The family, having on account of the exigencies of the Civil War, removed to Rockbridge, near the close of hostilities he enlisted in the Rockbridge Artillery and bore his part in the activities of that honored command. In March, 1868, he was admitted on trial into the traveling connection of this body. From that time his service record includes pastorates, as Junior preacher, on Baltimore Circuit in 1868, Rockville in 1869, Loudon in 1870-71 and Talbott in 1872.

In 1873, because of failing health, he was compelled to take a supernumerary relation, which continued until 1895. Then he became effective again and served Crabbottom, Stafford, New Hope and Shenandoah City. Meanwhile, from 1879 to 1905, he was one of the statistical secretaries of the Conference.

At our session in Fredericksburg, 1903, because of increasing infirmities, he asked for and was granted a superannuate relation, in which he remained until it pleased God to enter his name in the records on high. Infirm though he might be, yet he was never idle; during the time he was a supernumerary, he engaged in merchandising at Goshen, Md. At Shenandoah he endeavored to supplement his allowance from the superannuate fund by serving as clerk to the town council and assistant in the local bank.

In December, 1875, he became the happy husband of Miss Annie Stewart, of Goshen, Md. Two sons who came to maturity were the fruit of this marriage, John Satchel and Stewart. On the former survives him, now in the Government service at Boise, Idaho. Stewart died from appendicitis while a student at Blacksburg, Va., an afflictive stroke from which neither parent perhaps ever fully recovered. After the death of his wife in Gaithersburg, Md., November, 1914, to which place they had then gone to live, he made no less than three visits to Boise, but the old home times, the nearer residence of his surviving sisters, the footprints of his parents, the graves of his devoted dead, and the fellowship of his ministerial brethren, for the time seemed to be stronger than the drawing of a father's heart to the fellowship of an only son and family; so on the fourth of last May, he came again to the last earthly home of his sainted mother, now occupied by his maiden sister, thence as it turned out to go up higher.

Until he went away, August 28th, he was rarely free from suffering, and yet most patient and submissive, unwilling ever to burden others with complaint or the story of his distress unless inquired of. His last illness was quite unexpected and severe from the first and lasted but three days, but they were days of wonderful fortitude and lovely acquiescence in the will of the divine Father, revealing to all who saw him in those days, how close and intimate was their fellowship.

His body was taken by loving hands to Goshen Church, Montgomery County, Md., where after a brief funeral service, under the direction of the writer, whom he was wont affectionately to call his "Pastor," assisted by Brothers Barrett and Balthis, of the Conference, he was tenderly laid to rest beside his wife and son, there to await the day when this corruptible shall put on incorruption, this mortal, immortality, and that which has been sown a natural body shall be raised a spiritual body. That is their hope and our comfort.

JOHN THOMAS MAXWELL.

Being fully ready to depart from this world after having lived in it for more than eighty-one years, the Reverend John Thomas Maxwell passed to his Heavenly reward on Saturday, October 12, 1912. He was born in the City of Baltimore, Maryland, on October 9, 1837. His father was a native Scotchman and from him, his son John Thomas inherited much of that quality of soul with which the people of Scotland have enriched so many countries of the globe. There was in him a profound depth of conviction concerning the genuineness of those things which Methodists have ever regarded as the cardinal principles of Christianity, and Divine Grace, through a long series of years, had

sanctified this conviction to a remarkable degree, as was shown, both in the fervor of his spirit and in the great charity of his heart. His experience of conversion to God was a wonderful reality in his religious life and he made this the rallying point of his assurance down to the very end of his life. It was out of this state of soul that his answer arose to God when he heard his call to enter the Christian Ministry. Like the apostle of old, this man was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision—he yielded himself to it.

But war clouds had gathered and the storm of battle had broken over the country. Soon after the war began he left his home in Maryland for the purpose of joining the Confederate Army. He arrived at Manassas. Virginia, while the battle of Bull Run was in progress, and there joined White's Battalion of the Maryland Cavalry. While his battalion was in camp at New Market, Virginia, he obtained a furlough that he might attend the session of the Baltimore Annual Conference, which convened at Bridgewater, Virginia, on March 10, 1864. There being no Bishop present at this Conference, Rev. Norvel Wilson was elected President and presided over its sessions. It was at this time and place that he was admitted on trial into the itineracy. The Conference Minute of that session shows that John T. Maxwell was appointed to a chaplaincy in the Army of the Confederate States of America. He was the last survivor of the fourteen members of the Conference appointed chaplain at that session. Being a man of true evangelical faith, and his heart being aflame with love for his fellow soldiers, he possessed a genuine appeal for the men in arms whom he served. It is a tradition that soldiers said to their comrades: "Be quiet, Maxwell is at his prayers."

When the war was over he reported to the Conference as being ready for a pastoral charge, and from that time until he superannuated, on account of failing health, at the Conference session held in Staunton, Virginia, in 1897, he served faithfully the following charges: Bladensburg, with Rev. W. H. D. Harper; Loudoun Circuit, with Rev. David Shoaff; Lingamore Circuit, Hamilton, with Rev. John Landstreet; Jefferson Circuit; Luray; Rockingham; West Augusta Circuit; Port Deposit, Manassas; Gainsboro; Morgan; Bath Circuit and Alvon and Greenbank Charges; in all, fourteen pastoral charges. Much of this work was ardous. Mountain roads, high altitudes, unbridged streams, long distances between morning and evening appointments for preaching made the burden great, but all was courageously faced and faithfully done.

After superannuation, Brother Maxwell did not wholly cease to labor in the gospel. Locating in Staunton, he assisted whenever able, the pastors on nearby appointments.

In all these years, as a lay member of the Church, as a soldier in the service of his country, as a chaplain in the army, as a pastor of churches, as a citizen and as a husband and father, there was never so much as a whisper of suspicion as to the correctness of his moral life. A great record that, for such times as those through which he lived.

In 1872 he married Miss Laura Virginia Gibson, of Loudon County, Virginia, to whom he devoted himself with a beautiful faithfulness to the very end of his days. Those of his house who survive him are the widow, Mrs. Laura Virginia Maxwell, and the following named daughters and son: Mrs. S. C. White, Mrs. J. L. Goodloe, Mrs. H. N. McManaway, Misses May, Alvernon, Neal and Nelson Maxwell, and Mr. John Noble Maxwell. These, everyone, call him blessed, for to them he was a princely man and a noble Christian. Dates, and times, and temporal position may never encompass the power of personality; it rises upon imperial wings into regions and ranges of other human souls, and even outruns the life of the earth and scintilates in worlds beyond the vision of men in the flesh. So was this man's influence. There are many yet alive whom this servant of God ministered unto on those fourteen pastoral charges, and elsewhere, who yet hear his words and feel the touch of his hand as if they were the voice and the hand of the true prophet of God. Then, too, when his eyes rested upon the shores of the Promised Land doubtless there were among the host whom he beheld, faces whom he had known in the earth, and who were there because of him! Well, well, servant of God! Thou didst not live in vain nor die in distress.

We who are left shall endeavor to follow on to the end of our ministry in faithfulness that we may rest with thee from the cares of life in our Father's House. Until then good-bye to thee, and peace!

REV. WILLIAM MELVILLE

Rev. William Melville was born in Baltimore, Md., September 4, 1850. and died at Waldorf, Md., January 28th, 1919. The days of his youth were spent in the City of Baltimore, in whose schools he received his education.

At the age of 21 he left for South America, locating in Georgetown, British Guiana. Under the ministry of a missionary of the Wesleyan Church he professed conversion. Like the Apostle of old, he believed that this new relationship with his Lord carried with it the call to service. He answered that call by enlisting himself as a Sunday School teacher, a class leader and very soon a local preacher.

He became a candidate for the regular ministry and was accepted. After four years of probation he passed very creditable examinations before the Missionary Committee in London, England. In July, 1875, in the Coke Chapel, he was ordained to the full ministry of the Wesleyan Church.

The Conference sent him to labor in Jamaica, West Indies. While this was his special field, he did not stop here, but carried the work

into Cuba, Porto Rica and Panama. Under his excellent leadership the cause grew and prospered.

After eighteen years of such service he decided to return to the land of his birth. In 1893 he was received into the membership of the Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South. During a ministry of 21 years the following appointments were served by him: Taylors, 1893-1895; Hyattsville, 1896-1899; Lewisburg, 1899-1901; Berryville, 1901-1903; Capon Bridge, 1903-1906; Eagle Rock, 1906-1909; Edinburg, 1909-1911; Royal Oak, 1911-1914.

In 1914 on account of his physical condition, he was compelled to ask for the superannuate relationship.

Shortly after his ordination to the ministry, Brother Melville was married to Miss Harriett M. Robertson, of Kingston, Jamaica. She was indeed a true helpmeet and rendered him valuable service in his ministerial duties. Writing before his death, he says of her, "'A good woman' is the highest expression I can use in giving my estimate of her life and character." God blessed the union with three children, W. A. B. Melville, Mrs. G. J. Cunningham and Mrs. M. H. Shepherd. The wife and children survive him. Brother Melville was a minister who placed first in every respect his Master's work. He was an indefatigable toiler. His profound belief in the divine call made him give himself unreservedly to his calling. He never shirked a single duty and no task was too arduous to be undertaken. At times he overtaxed his physical strength, but it was the expression of the passion within for the kingdom.

Never has the writer known a man possessed with a deeper sense of the spirit of reverence. Occasionally there was the flash of righteous indignation as he witnessed the things that were sacred touched with unholy hands. The Church was God's house, it must not be desecrated; the ministry was God's calling, it must not be dishonored; life was a sacred trust, it must not be abused.

He was absolutely fearless in the discharge of his ministerial duties. He stood firm for his convictions. If censure came, rather that than the displeasure of his Lord.

Brother Melville was an excellent preacher. Clear, forceful, spiritual were his messages. He had stored his mind with many of the best hymns of the Church and he knew how to use them with good effect. Of his own ministry he wrote, "My ministry has been one of hard work. I never took any other view of my work as a minister of the gospel. I close with saying that God crowned my labors and blessed me with a fair measure of results in the salvation of souls." Even after superannuating he did not cease his labors, and it was at the close of a day on which he had preached twice that the end came.

The funeral service was held in our Church at Hyattsville, Md., conducted by Rev. H. M. Canter, Presiding Elder of the Washington Dis-

trict, assisted by Rev. J. P. Wiley. His body was interred in Evergreen Cemetery, Bladensburg, Md., awaiting the resurrection of the just.

"Servant of God, well done!

Thy glorious warfare's past;

THE REVEREND WILLIAM HEDGES.

Brother Hedges was born on "the old place"—Hedges—between Tomahawk and Jones' Spring, Back Creek Valley, Berkeley County, W. Va., Februray 22, 1838; was converted in early youth, and joined the Conference in 1859. His early religious experiences easily reflected their influence upon his later views of spiritual truth. To him such experiences were most real because, as he was wont to think, always certified by the Holy Spirit in the heart of every genuine believer.

His ministry was mainly confined to the Valley of Virginia, Morgan, Hampshire and Hardy Counties of West Virginia. A retentive and accurate memory was filled with many interesting incidents of his life in those fields. During the war he ate, slept, marched and prayed with the Southern soldiers, and he had fruit among them to his ministry. One of his best meetings was held in Berryville, in which both soldiers and civilians were converted at a time when "Battletown" could get up a "fight", as Col. Mosby would have said, almost any day or night.

His wife was a Miss Isler, of Clark. Five children survive, three sons and two daughters; all are grown and married, and reside three in West Virginia and two in Ohio. Though, from impaired health, Brother Hedges was compelled to cease traveling, yet he did not sit down to idleness; for he betook himself at once to the work of selling religious books, especially Bibles, distributing tracts, soliciting subscribers for religious periodicals, and assisting his brethren in the ministry when he could. He was himself a reader of good books; the productions of his own pen were sure to have a reading; and much of the last three years of his life was spent in locating the scripture passage set forth in a scheme of pictures issued by the Christian Herald.

His company was always refreshing. Small talk was hardly known to him. Religious thought whether in print or word of mouth was likely to be analyzed, if not criticised, to make sure of correctness and orthodoxy. The "old paths" were his delight. He loved men and was loyal to their souls in his testimony and admonition. What a feast was prayer—and his visitors always carried away a word of cheer and appreciation.

"1857—William G. Hammond; 1858—A. Poe Boude; 1859—William Hedges." Thus the Conference record stood until Sunday, March 9th.

1919, when at nine o'clock in the morning William Hedges finished his course and went home to God.

Some two weeks before he seemed to realize that his end was near, but he contemplated it with perfect calmness of spirit. "How blest the righteous when he dies"—Just a week before, at his request, the Holy Communion was given to him, and when his pastor, Rev. H. P. Hamill, saw him just a few hours before his death, he was rather wishing to be absent from the body and present with the Lord. Especially did he abound in hope through the power of the Holy Ghost and also in love. "I love you and if it were possible I would say the same words to every member of the Conference." Not only had a place been prepared for him, but he had also been fitted by grace to use and enjoy the place. And so in full assurance of hope he went away to be forever with the Lord.

An intelligent lady who had known him both in his earlier and later life wrote to a friend thus: "He walked with God and as surely as God took Enoch home with him so he has taken William Hedges."

He was a good man, full of the Holy Ghost and of Faith. We shall know where to find him.

ADDENDA.

After consulting Dr. C. D. Harris, President of the Conference Board of Missions, and Rev. E. V. Regester, of the Committee on Publication, it was decided to dispense with the elaborate and minute details for "Specials" by Districts, charges and individuals—

1st. Because of the expense of publication; the cost of the composition of the report, 33 pages of the minutes of 1917-18 amounted to over \$100 and this year, 1918-19, would be greater, as the report was longer

2nd. The Armenian and Syrian Relief Fund was reported in so confusing a manner as to render it practically impossible to submit an accurate account.

The Conference Treasurer accounts for \$3,539.71, which was forwarded to him, but the preachers have reported \$9,257.34 contributed for this fund, leaving \$5,717.63 as sent direct.

3rd. Since Conference closed, the Conference Treasurer has been under the care of a physician and not in condition to attempt to reconcile this item.

The report shows \$18,031.63 paid on assessments, \$6,501.69 for "Specials" Foreign and Home Missions and for the Centenary Fund; also \$12,238.26 for War Work, and the total amount raised for the Conference year is \$64,660.45.

The world may not know, how much each individual contributed to this sum, but the individual knows and best of all God knows by name and locality who assisted in bringing to pass such a gratifying result.
