

The Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Session in Mount Vernon Place M. E. Church, South, Washington, D. C., March 23, 1922, at 9 o'clock A. M.

Bishop U. V. W. Darlington, President of the Conference, in the Chair. Conference united in singing Hymn No. 560,

"And are we yet alive And see each other's face?"

The Bishop led in prayer.

Conference united in singing Hymn No. 388, "A Charge to Keep I Have."

The Bishop read Acts I; 1-8, and impressively addressed the Conference

Conference united in singing Hymn No. 393, "Am I a Soldier of the Cross?"

THE ROLL was called by the Secretary of the last Conference, and 165 Clerical and 42 Lay Members answered to their names.

H. M. Canter was elected Secretary, and upon his nomination J. Harry Smith, J. J. Rives, J. H. Haley, E. W. Aaron, C. J. Clark, J. H. Bean and G. D. Kidner were elected Assistant Secretaries.

THE BAR of the Conference was fixed at a line running across the Church in the rear of the thirteenth row of pews from the front.

THE HOUR of meeting was fixed at 9 A. M., and of adjournment at 12.30 P. M. And when afternoon sessions are held the hour of meeting was fixed at 2.30 P. M., and adjournment at 4.30 P. M.

Upon motion M. D. Ellmore was appointed to canvass for Conference Minutes, and J. H. Billingsley was appointed Messenger for the Conference.

The Rev. H. H. Sherman, D. D., Conference Secretary of the Christian Education Movement, presented a paper dealing with the progress of the Movement in the Conference and the policy of our Educational Institutions, and it was referred to the Board of Education.

The Bishop presented the Request of the General Conference to the Annual Conferences asking them to vote on the question, "Shall the Twenty-third Article of Religion in the Discipline of all our Churches in foreign lands read:

XXIII. OF THE DUTY OF CHRISTIANS TO THE CIVIL AUTHORITY.

"It is the duty of all Christians, and especially of all Christian ministers, to observe and obey the laws and commands of the governing or supreme authority of the country of which they are citizens or subjects, or in which they reside, and to use all laudable means to encourage and enjoin obedience to the powers that be."

And it was unanimously adopted by a vote of 183.

The Bishop read a telegram from Rev. C. D. Bulla, conveying greetings to the Conference, and the Secretary was instructed to make suitable reply.

QUESTION SEVENTEEN of the General Minutes was resumed.

PRESIDING ELDERS—H. P. Hamill of the Alexandria District and E. L. Woolf of the Baltimore District represented the conditions of their respective Districts, and their characters were examined and passed.

Conference adjourned with the singing of the Doxology and with the Benediction by Rev. T. N. Ivey, D. D., to meet tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

Santmiers on The Roll and the Committee on Sabbath Observance. F. B. Thomas of the Roanoke District was substituted for Robert H. Farrier.

The Roll of those not present yesterday was called, and 15 Clerical and 11 Lay Members answered to their names.

OUESTION SEVENTEEN of the General Minutes was resumed.

Whereas, Any such withdrawal of America's Good Samaritan Aid endangers the cause of Christian civilization in Asia Minor (the birthplace of Christianity), in Southern Russia and in the world at large; therefore, be it

Resolved, First. That the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Conference Assembled this 24th day of March, 1922, hereby commends the work of the Near East Relief.

Second. That pastors and members shall co-operate with local Near East Relief Committees as far as practicable, recognizing the opportunity for service and sacrifice.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

THE RANDOLPH-MACON SYSTEM.

Reports have been received from all the institutions of the Randolph-Macon System. The facts presented are both interesting and encouraging. There is a total enrollment of 1,668. There are forty-six ministerial students at Ashland, fourteen at Front Royal, and fourteen at Bedford. The Woman's College reports nine enrolled in Student Volunteer Movement, 350 in Voluntary Bible Study Classes, 325 in Mission Study Classes.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION MOVEMENT.

For about two years the Christian Education Movement has claimed the attention of our people. Splendid results have already been achieved. There has come a new emphasis on the significance and importance of Christian Education. The Movement is bringing to our people and educational institutions a new vision and appreciation of the opportunities and responsibilities for the realization of the Kingdom of God. Over 5,000 of our young men and women have offered themselves for life service in the home and foreign field. About 175 of these volunteers are from the Baltimore Conference.

In financial results the Movement has been apparently disappointing. Instead of \$33,000,000, about \$20,000.00 has been pledged. And yet, in view of all the circumstances and almost insurmountable difficulties, this amount is a marvelous sum for our people to pledge at one time for their educational work. It is equal to about seventy-five per cent. (75) of the accumulated assets of all our schools up to this time. No financial campaign previously undertaken has equalled it, all things considered. In the Baltimore Conference nearly \$400,000 has been pledged.

EDUCATIONAL PLATFORM AND POLICY.

In order that we may have a sure foundation on which we can confidently build an Educational program for the future, and in order that we may take our stand along with the educational leaders of our entire Church (as set forth in "The Christian Platform of the Schools and Colleges of the Church," adopted at Memphis, Tennessee, in December, 1921), we deem it important at this time to declare what is and always has been the educational policy of our Conference. Our various efforts in behalf of Christian Education have been undertaken and will be continued with the clear and distinct understanding:

1. That the schools sharing in the benefits are Methodist institutions and an integral part of the work of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and that they "recognize and accept without reservation the duties and obligations" growing out of this relationship.

- 2. That the supreme aim is to realize in the student body the Christian ideals of manhood and womanhood, and they "are best fulfilling their mission when they are doing most to fashion the character of youth in the image of the Master and to furnish them the light of his truth and the guidance of his Spirit," all of which we are confident can be done "without lowering the intellectual standards as educational institutions."
- 3. That "Central, at the heart of the supreme educational process, the Bible must be placed as the inspired word of God, and the teaching of its truths as the only enduring foundation on which to build our individual and collective life." We, therefore, call upon our Boards of Trustees and the heads of our schools to exercise all possible care and diligence, especially in selecting the members of their faculties, so that modern rationalism and destructive criticism which weaken and destroy the authority of the Holy Scriptures and discredit their inspiration shall not be taught in any of our schools.
- 4. That their policy is to have officers and teachers who are not only thoroughly competent in their several departments, but who are also by life and experience Christian men and women of the highest type; that the moral and religious instruction by precept and example is positively Christian and in accordance with the teachings and practices of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; that diligent effort is constantly made to create and maintain an atmosphere helpful to the growth of Christian character and as free as possible from those worldly amusements that weaken and destroy the spiritual life of young people.
- 5. That in accepting any money raised by the Conference for educational purposes, through the regular assessments or otherwise, those in charge of our schools thereby accept also our educational policy and agree to carry it out in the management of the institutions under their care
- 6. That, furthermore, we pledge to our schools our constant prayers and our fullest confidence and co-operation, and also our material resources, adequate to their urgent, growing needs, so that Christian education may become a greater power among us and its full strength be delivered upon the Church's task of taking the world for Jesus Christ.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

In view of the statements set forth above, we desire to make the following recommendations:

- 1. That efforts be continued for further subscriptions to the Christian Education Movement until next November by such methods and at such times and places as seem wise to the Pastors, Presiding Elders and the Education Secretary.
- 2. That November be designated as education month for the Conference, at which time the Pastors and Presiding Elders are requested to bring the educational work of the Church to the attention of our people and the payments to the Education Movement are to be made.

MOUNTAIN TRAINING SCHOOLS.

The Board of Education would once more commend the splendid work of the Ferrum Training School of the Virginia Conference and rejoices to announce that steps are being taken looking to the establishment of a similar school within our own bounds, as will be seen in the joint report from the Board of Missions and the Board of Education submitted to the Conference at this session.

BLACKSTONE JUNIOR COLLEGE.

We regret to note that since our last report the Blackstone School has had another disastrous fire, but under the capable and inspiring leadership of Rev. Asbury Christian, D. D., plans have already been made to replace the building destroyed and to do better work than ever. Not a few of our young people attend this school, and we appreciate the consideration that has been shown them and commend it to our people.

DEPARTMENT OF MINISTERIAL SUPPLY AND TRAINING.

In the report of Dr. R. H. Bennett to the Conference on Ministerial Supply and Training and Religious Education we note the gratifying results of the united effort of this department during the year with the Christian Education Movement, in that the objective of the Christian Education Movement calling for 5,000 volunteers for life service has been realized. Inasmuch as the majority of these young people have still to complete their education, we readily see the urgent need of equipping our colleges to give them the needed training. In addition to the better equipment of our schools there is also the need of giving financial assistance to these young volunteers, many of whom are asking the question, "If I go to college can I get any help to meet my expenses?" This loudly accentuates the need for the completion of the Christian Workers' Educational Aid Fund for students in the Christian Education Budget. This Aid Fund is not yet available, for two reasons. One is that only about \$18,000,000 of the \$33,000,000 asked for by the Christian Education Movement has as yet been subscribed, and the other is that according to the plan the first money from the Christian Education Movement is to be returned to the colleges to repay them for the money advanced for the expenses of the campaign. For these reasons we would impress upon our churches the importance of doing their best to complete their quotas, and to increase their offerings for the ministerial supply and training fund of our Conference.

We hereby renew our endorsement of our correspondence schools.

Comparative statistics for the past two years show a decided increase in the number of young men entering and preparing themselves for the ministry, but there is still room and demand for a greater increase.

This year the Committee on Ministerial Supply and Training has aided 3 students at Emory University, 10 at Randolph-Macon College, 10 at Randolph-Macon Academy, and one each at Ferrum, Scaritt, Blackstone and Emory and Henry, a total of 27—3 women and 24 men; two applications pending. Besides these there are only four ministerial students at the College and only two at the Academy without our aid. All these are of splendid quality and promise effective service for the Church. The women aided are all candidates for our mission fields. The life-service movement has increased our problems as well as our demands for aid. You will note the expenditure of \$118.17 to pay the traveling expenses of volunteers to a Conference in Charles Town in the early fall in order that they might have the counsels of the leaders of this movement.

The following changes in conditions for loans and donations are recommended:

For Students at Randolph-Macon Academy.

A maximum of \$200.00 per year, loan and donation, or either, the total limit to be \$800.00.

For Students at Randolph-Macon College.

A maximum limit of \$250.00 per year, loan and donation, or either, the total limit to be \$1.000.00.

Provided that no student shall receive more than a total of \$1,300.00 at both institutions. And after one year, continuance of aid will depend upon the approval of the Faculty as well as of the Committee on Ministerial Supply and Training.

For Students at Emory University.

Each case as a rule to be decided upon its own merits. But aid will not be given for more than three years, and only to students who have passed approved examinations on two years of college work. And any unused totals named above for Academy or College may become available for university work.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

GENERAL BOARD.

Your Conference Board of Church Extension had before it for consideration the report of the Executive Secretary, Rev. S. H. C. Burgin, D. D. To read the history of this great Church Building Society means to be thrilled. To think of its achievement means a prayer of gratitude to Almighty God for this strong arm of the church. To read this report at the close of this quadrennium is to be instructed, because we learn just what we have done, and means to be inspired because we have succeeded.

Here is a record of what the General Board has to report: The total income from all sources for the year ending March 31, 1921, was \$1,450,769.51. About \$397,000 of this came from the centenary. We want to recall the fact that of the \$2,000,000 which the Board is to receive from the Centenary Fund, as it is paid in, forty per cent. is to be used for work abroad and sixty per cent. at home.

The Loan Fund increases steadily and now amounts to \$1,836,623.64.

The Architectural Department, under Rev. J. A. Baylor, is filling a long-felt need in the church at large, and will be increasingly useful.

CONFERENCE BOARD.

Though the past history of Church Extension is thrilling and the achievements great, your Conference Board, as never before, has been compelled to sit day after day and listen to heartrending appeal after appeal for donations and loans from both Boards and know but a small portion could be granted. At no time have we seen the members of the Board more interested or painstaking, but they could not make this

limited sum cover even the most needy cases. It will help us to understand how inadequate the sum total is when we tell you that it would far more than exhaust the entire resources of the General Board to meet the demands of this Conference alone.

THE CONFERENCE LOAN FUND.

The one thing that we want to lay upon the heart of this Conference is that this Loan Fund must be increased until it is \$100,000. To raise a large sum to give away in donations here and there, year after year, will never get us anywhere, but a Loan Fund of \$100,000 will enable us to carry on an adequate building program in this Conference. Won't you help us to reach this goal?

RECOMMENDATIONS.

We recommend:

- 1. That before contracts are let for the building of churches the paragraph in the discipline, dealing with the amount in hand, be prayerfully read.
- 2. That Church Extension representatives be heard in all District Connferences, that our people may be informed as to the importance and need of this department of the Church.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD REPORT NO. 1.

No more than two years ago some of our leaders, disturbed over the confused conditions that inevitably followed the world war, sent out a distress call over what they thought a backward movement in the Sunday School. That there was no real cause for alarm is proved by the fact that the gain in enrollment for the last two years of the quadrennium is two and a half times the loss during the first two. An increase of 257,000 in enrollment during the last year, with 100,628 uniting with the Church from the Sunday School, is a record that is inspiring, while the report of \$1,609,519 for missions and \$8,745,376 for all purposes, raised by the Sunday Schools during the quadrennium, is cause for hearty congratulation. The statistics of our own Conference for the year just closing are not available when this report is prepared, but it is already certain that progress in our schools is at least up to the average of the whole church.

FIELD SECRETARY AND ELEMENTARY SUPERINTENDENT.

At the last session of the Conference Rev. W. H. Best was continued in the office of Field Secretary, and a little later Miss A. W. Woody was employed as Elementary Superintendent. The detailed reports of these

workers have been printed and distributed among the members of the Conference, and their close examination is most respectfully urged. Finding abundant cause for satisfaction and congratulation in the results obtained through the efforts of these workers, the Board has voted to continue them in office for the ensuing year.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LITERATURE.

We find cause for congratulation in the continued high character of the lesson helps and other literature issued by our publishing house, and urge all our schools to use them. We believe that it would be a source of added satisfaction to many of our workers if the lessons issued under the title "Improved Uniform Lessons" should, in fact, conform at all times in text, title and Golden Text, with the selections of the lesson committee

SUNDAY SCHOOL DAY.

While it might well be supposed that the financial depression prevailing throughout our territory, and especially in the rural sections, would be reflected in our collections, we are glad to report that the offerings from Sunday School Day are about as great as last year. Every school should observe this service and take an offering for the support of the work of the Board and of our General Sunday School Board.

The offering when taken should be sent at once to the Board's Treasurer, O. C. Michael, Aberdeen, Maryland, without diversion, temporary or permanent. Our brethren are affectionately reminded of the disciplinary requirement regarding this. Free programmes may be ordered of Smith & Lamar, Nashville, Tenn., or Richmond, Va., by all schools that will take and forward such offering.

TRAINING SCHOOLS.

Successful training schools have been held in Washington, D. C., and Roanoke, Virginia. The results have been so satisfactory that every effort will be made to extend this work.

OBJECTIVES.

The Board has set for itself certain objectives, the principal of which may be stated as follows:

- 1. To hold at least one Standard Training School in each district each year.
- 2 To reach every Sunday School with expert advice and assistance to the extent that it may be willing to accept them.
- 3. To afford every school opportunity to supply itself with trained teachers and officers.
- 4. To stimulate Sunday School interest and enthusiasm in every way possible.

5. To disseminate information concerning all Sunday School matters through a well-conducted page in our church paper. Appreciating the courtesy of the Baltimore Southern Methodist in that particular, we invoke the use of its columns to the same generous extent as has been granted in the past.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The Field Secretary and the Elementary Superintendent has made certain recommendations which, with slight modifications, the Board has approved, viz.:

- 1. That we make the Easter season fruitful in evangelistic effort in our schools, culminating in Confession or Decision Day the Sunday prior to Easter, and that if it be impracticable to observe such service on the day indicated in any school it be observed on some other day and not omitted in any school.
- 2. That we get our officers and teachers to enlist in leadership. training, or, at least, to read some approved book on Sunday School work every year.
- 3. That we attempt a district meeting in every district during the coming year.
- 4. That when any district shall form a district organization and bring itself into co-operation with the work of the Board, the Executive Committee shall have authority to place at the disposal of such organization such portion of the funds coming from that district as said committee may deem expendient.
- 5. That we seek to have observed in every Sunday School in the Conference, Sunday School Day, with an offering taken and sent to the Board's treasurer.
- 6. That Children's Week, April 22-30, be observed wherever practicable, and that if it be not practicable in any school to observe it that week, it be observed during some other week as near thereto as practicable.

CO-OPERATION WITH THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The Board is in hearty accord with the idea of co-operation between the Sunday School and the Public School, and respectfully recommends to pastors, superintendents and church officers that it be put into operation wherever practicable and will render such assistance as may be possible through the field secretary.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

The work of the Epworth League has gone forward during the year. The Conference Epworth League has had a wondrous year. All its officers have been hard at work and progress along all lines has been made. The number of new chapters has been increased. New Junior and Intermediate Leagues have been organized. The League's subscription to the African Special will be paid; the Epworth Hall in the proposed Home for the Aged will be built by the Leagues of the Conference, and a special offering for the Mountain School has been taken.

We are delighted to report 160 life volunteers—these are from among the choicest of our young people. Some of them are at school preparing for their life work.

The Summer Assembly at Front Royal last June was a veritable Pentecost. A great spiritual power was released there that has carried the work on to greater ends. The Assembly will be held again this year at Front Royal, June 13-19th.

The work of the League has been presented to most of the District Conference during the year. We have never seen greater interest manifested.

Anniversary Day has had wider observation the past year than heretofore. It should be celebrated by every League, as this will provide finances that are very much needed for extension work.

Our Conference League work has developed a new feature in that we have organized a good, strong county union in Augusta County, Virginia, and a Charge Union on Jarrettsville Charge. There have been organized two Junior and Intermediate City Unions. City wide institutes have been held in several of our cities and several district institutes in the bounds of the Conference.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

We respectfully recommend:

- 1. That Saturday night of our next annual Conference be set aside as the date of our League Board Anniversary, subject to the approval of the Conference Program Committee.
- 2. That our preachers give attention to the observance of the Amiversary Day in their Leagues, and where there are no Leagues, that a young people's service be held according to Paragraph 404 of the Discipline.
- 3. That life service be given greater emphasis, and that all volunteers be urged to sign declaration cards, and that an increased effort be made to promote interest in mission study and stewardship.
- 4. That Presiding Elders in arranging the program for their district conferences give place to the representatives of the Epworth League work and that district meetings be held wherever practicable.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

We, the members of "The Bible Board" of your Conference, believing the Bible to be the inspired "Word of God" and the knowledge of it the foundation of the great "Social Structure," the woof and warp of the "Moral Fabric" of our world, submit the following report:

WHEREAS, The knowledge of "The Word of God" is necessary to the mental equipment of the individual life, and is within itself a liberal education, using the word of our former President, Mr. Wilson; and

WHEREAS, The great mass of our American populace, devoid of the privileges of a liberal education, lack also a copy of the sacred Scripture; and,

WHEREAS, The demand for a greater and wider circulation of the Scriptures prevails in our own country first and then in war-stricken Europe; and,

WHEREAS, This greater demand entails greater financial cost, let us as a Conference resolve:

- 1. That we press the matter of the circulation of the Scripture both from pulpit and in private intercourse with our people and endeavor to secure their more liberal subscriptions to and their moral support of those institutions whose business it is thus to circulate the "Holy Book."
- 2. That we lend our hearty endorsement of and pledge our support to "The Amercan Bible Society" in the world-wide circulation of the Truth. This Society is publishing the Holy Scripture in 142 languages at the rate of 5,000,000 copies per year.
- 3. That we especially commend to our people those agencies functioning within our borders, which are as follows: "The Maryland Bible Society," which is giving special attention at this time to the putting of a Bible into the hands of the individual citizen who has it not, and which is operating for the benefit of Latin America a large "Bible House" in Cristoble, Panama Canal Zone; the South Atlantic Agency, functioning in Virginia and West Virginia; and the "Gideons," who are endeavoring to Christianize the "Commercial Traveling Man" and are laboring to place and to keep in each hotel room throughout the world a copy of God's Word.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

We rejoice that a new day has dawned in the Missionary History of the church. In the white light and Pentecostal vision that came to the Church through the Centenary the Church faced a providentially enlarged field, and, with a divinely inspired faith and courage, entered the open door of her opportunity. The scant three years that have passed since the Centenary pledges were made have not given time for a full account of the effects of the movement on our various foreign fields, but there are two outstanding facts that challenge our prayerful consideration. They are best expressed in the findings of the Conference on World Program and Advance held at Memphis, Tenn., in February of this year. We quote a part of the report:

"1. The work has already been profoundly quickened, and the workers have been heartened as by nothing else in our missionary history. The missionaries, equipped with buildings and reinforced by recruits and resources beyond anything they had before dared dream of, have thrown themselves into their work with a zeal and hopefulness that are already yielding a rich harvest. The native churches have not only been stirred to new efforts in their work, but have themselves entered with fervor into the Centenary movement. They have formed Leagues of Intercession; they have taken up astonishingly large subscriptions and willingly accepted the principles of stewardship; their young people are offering themselves in throngs for life service; evangelistic activities are just now getting into full swing among them, and already there is a great ingathering of souls.

"2. The second fact impressed upon us is that for the Centenary to fail now would be an unspeakable disaster. These peoples who have been looking to us for religious help have confidence in us. For them ours is the ideal Christianity. They know that these three years of the Centenary are but a beginning, that we are pledged to go on in the same way for not less than five years. For us to stop or fail would be a mortal blow to their confidence. A broken promise would wreck their estimate of our Christianity. Our future standing as honorable Christians is absolutely staked on our going forward with these pledges which we have made."

Our home mission work has also been greatly aided by the Centenary fund. Out of these funds the salaries of thousands of pastors on our weaker charges have been supplemented; our work among foreigners and in cities and rural districts has taken on new life; the building program of the Church has been enlarged to the point of positive embarrassment, and the whole line of home missionary endeavor has been strengthened.

Shall all this advance now be nullified? Even delay in keeping the Centenary pledges paid up is already becoming embarrassing to our

workers in foreign lands. In the home land 3,000 pastors in hard fields must have their salaries cut if the payment of Centenary pledges is much longer delayed. Already the building program of the Board of Church Extension dependent upon Centenary money is stopped. The one and only practical way to save the Church from the disgrace of retrenchment is to pay her Centenary pledge up to date and meet promptly all future payments as they fall due.

Full statistics on Centenary payments for our Conference will be published in the minutes and we will not encumber the report at this point with them. It must be confessed that Centenary payments slowed down considerably this conference year. Up to the present month only one month shows an increase in payments over last year. But March of this year shows such a material increase in payment over last year as to convince us that the cultivation program for the year is beginning to produce results. This cultivation work must be persistently continued to keep the mind of the Church refreshed in reference to the Centenary and to keep the streams of liberality flowing into this great cause.

The Centenary has inaugurated a definite, uniform plan for the whole Church to promote the payment of our pledges, embodying the following general outline:

- An educational campaign for training leaders and speakers.
- A World Sunday, in which an effort shall be made to reach every congregation of the Church with a world message.
- 3. A follow-up week for which the local Centenary Committee shall be reorganized and all subscribers who are in arrears shall be personally interviewed and urged to bring their payments up to date.

The foregoing plan is now being carried out in all of our Church territory except the Baltimore Conference. On account of the meeting of our Conference we could not put on this simultaneous church-wide campaign; but we recognize its value and feel that we should put it on at as early a date as possible after our Conference closes. The Board of Missions recommends that Sunday, June 18, 1922, be designated as World Sunday, and that we carry out the plan for promoting it as described in this report.

NOMINATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

We nominate Judge E. D. Newman as Conference Lay Leader.

We recommend to the Bishop, Rev. D. L. Blakemore for appointment as Conference Missionary Secretary, to give his full time to the office in connection with the Centenary Movement.

We nominate as a committee on evangelism Revs. D. L. Blakemore, W. O. Talbert, E. L. Woolf, J. H. Balthis, A. Knox, C. D. Harris, S. K. Cockrell.

CENTENARY BONUS.

The members of the Conference are cautioned that the bonus from the Centenary Fund is in each case given only for the year just ended, and should not be counted upon for future years. The Board of Missions would call especial attention to this for the coming year, as the probability, almost amounting to a certainty, is that it will be impossible to grant a bonus next year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.

The Board of Christian Literature is the youngest of our connectional Boards, but the development of Christian literature has been contemporaneous with the development of the Church itself. Christian literature antedates the movable type by many centuries; indeed, it was one of the factors that made the demand for the printing press more imperative. The development of Christian literature has kept pace with the modern facilities for its production.

CONNECTIONAL PUBLICATIONS.

The Southern Methodist Publishing House has grown and expanded until it is in a position to serve with facility the whole connection. Its service has been prompt and efficient, commending itself not only to its own constituency, but to ministers and laymen of other churches.

OUR GENERAL ORGAN.

The Christian Advocate has maintained its high standard and should be in very many more of our homes. While it has been published at a financial loss its suspension would be a much greater loss to the Church. The Methodist Review takes a high place among the periodicals of its class.

The General Boards of the Church are using the Publishing House for the production of the literature that represents their activities and ideals. The great work of this quadrennium would have been impossible without it.

THE BALTIMORE SOUTHERN METHODIST.

The Baltimore Southern Methodist belongs to the Baltimore Conference. It was created eighteen years ago because the Conference felt that it could no longer do its best work without a Conference Organ. Its history has been a struggle, but it has rendered a large and valuable service. The demand that called it into existence more imperatively calls for its continuance.

The impossible was attempted when it was planned to publish it for \$1.00 per year; so, many years ago the Conference voted to subsidize it and to continue the original price.

For eleven years Rev. C. D. Harris, D. D., has been the editor and business manager. He has rendered distinguished and efficient service in this dual capacity. The report of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company, which was before the Board, shows that he has accomplished the almost impossible in financing the Methodist through the past few years.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

The Board of Christian Literature makes the following recommendations:

First—That our people be urged to patronize our Publishing House and to use its publications in all of our work.

Second—That the ministers continue to support by their efforts the circulation of the Baltimore Southern Methodist; that October be set apart as the time for special campaign for securing at least a thousand new subscribers, and that the allotment plan and methods of previous years be adopted. The editor and presiding elders are authorized to carry these provisions into effect.

Third—That we request the Conference Commission on Finance to fix as the assessment for 1922-23 the sum of \$4,500.

Fourth—That we request the Bishop to reappoint Rev. C. D. Harris, D. D., Editor of The Baltimore Southern Methodist.

TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT.

The liquor traffic, society's ancient foe, is still much alive. In a measure it has recovered from the death-blow received by the Eighteenth Amendment and the Volstead Act. Evidences of its organized and wide-spread effort to again intrench itself in a life of society abound on every hand. So persistent, systematic and open has this effort become that it should constitute a warning to the moral forces of the country that unless we speedily awake to the situation and renew our attack with vigilance we stand in danger of losing in a single decade all for which we have fought during the past century.

Along with the liquor traffic there are other foes to civic righteousness. Chief among them:

First—The motion-picture industry. Not a few people believe that the movies are our greatest evil today. That there are a few wholesome pictures all willingly admit, but as a whole the commercialized pictures are unfit, morally speaking, for the children and young people to see. America's greatest school of crime is said to be the movies. From the amount of liquor advertising displayed by the screen one would conclude that the movie operators are no better than the deposed liquor

kings, whose outlawed business they keep before the young life of the land. The movies are making a definite attack on Protestantism, as is evidenced by the fact that while the Jewish Rabbi and his people, and the Roman Catholic Priest and his congregation always appear at their best on the screen, the Protestant Minister and his congregation are nearly always held up to scorn and ridicule. Again, it is a fact which none can deny that the movies are making a definite attack to corrupt legislatures and change our Christian Sabbath into a commercialized day of pleasure. Judged by its fruit, the movie business is evil.

Second—The divorce evil is a growing menace to our civilization. Husbands and wives who have no regard for the sanctity of the marriage vows fill our courts, seeking divorce decrees. The evil has grown by leaps and bounds, as statistics will prove. For instance, in twenty years—1901 to 1920—the divorce evil has grown from sixty thousand to over one hundred and thirty-two thousand, and during the same period 1,883,591 constitute the total number of divorces granted. This, multiplied by two, gives 3,767,182 as the number of persons involved as plaintiff and defendant, without considering the children involved. When we recall that this evil strikes its blow at the home—the foundation of society—we can begin to measure its consequences on our whole life.

Third—The modern dance is unquestionably one of the main causes of much of the immorality so prevalent today. The attitudes assumed toward each other by those engaged in the modern dance, the type of dress worn in many instances, the suggestive music, the midnight cabaret dancers, and the early morning auto rides all contribute their share to making our young people immoral and unfitting them for life. However, the wonder is that they withstand this particular form of temptation as much as they do.

With these facts before us, your Committee desires to recommend for your approval:

- 1. That we stand uncompromisingly against the efforts of the liquor traffic to again intrench itself in the life of our people; that we continue to co-operate with the Anti-Saloon League both morally and financially in its fight against the liquor traffic; and that we assist in maintaining a respect for the Eighteenth Amendment and the Volstead Act by our endeavor to create a sentiment against general lawlessness. That we commend Commissioner Oyster, of this city, and the editor of the Washington Star for their uncompromising attitude toward law enforcement as against lawlessness.
- 2. That we urge our preachers to abstain from attending the movies and that we warn our people against the evils of the commercalized movies, their attacks on Protestant ministers and their congregations and their effort to corrupt legislatures and commercalize the Christian Sabbath. That we congratulate the State Legislature of Virginia on passing the movie censorship bill in its last session.

- 3. That we hold up before our people the sanctity of the marriage vow and the evils resulting from husband and wife becoming divorced.
- 4. That we stand firm as Ministers of the Gospel against the modern dance, inform our people of the evils attending the modern dance and use our influence to persuade them to abstain from visiting the modern dance halls.
- 5. That we exhort those whom we serve to cultivate a kindly feeling toward the colored people and to assist them in their effort to better themselves morally, socially and otherwise.

REPORT OF VISITORS TO MARYLAND GENERAL HOSPITAL.

Your committee appointed to visit the Maryland General Hospital of Baltimore offers the following report:

The hospital, notwithstanding the continued high cost of commodities, is in the best financial condition of its career as a Methodist institution.

Dr. Peck, the general superintendent, is in his third year of that capacity, and through his untiring efforts and splendid executive ability has brought about a healthy condition in all the departments. Many improvements have been added. They have recently completed a campaign during which \$160,000 was raised for a nurses' home, which will be built at once. That will mean the accommodation of about 50 more patients in rooms made vacant by moving the nurses to the new home. When completed the Maryland General will rank with the best in the city.

We recommend that our Conference co-operate with the Methodist Hospital Association in its work in every way possible, but without in any way incurring any financial obligations thereby or becoming responsible for its management in any sense that would bind our Conference legally or financially. We request the preachers of the Conference to commend the Hospital to our people and that each pastoral charge, at the discretion of the pastor, observe one Sabbath in the year to be known as Hospital Sunday, and the sacramental offering of the day be given to the Hospital Association.

BALTIMORE CONFERENCE HOME—REPORT NO. 1.

As the trustees of the proposed orphanage and home for the aged of the Baltimore Conference, we deem it our duty to submit a report of our actions and doings since the last session of our Conference held at Roanoke in April, 1921, including in this report a brief summary of the action of the Conference with reference to this enterprise.

In April, 1919, at the session held at the Conference at Staunton, the Reverend J. H. Kuhlmann was authorized to visit the charges and receive contributions from them for the purpose of establishing an Orphanage and Home for the Aged in the bounds of the Conference, and then in April, 1920, at the session of the Conference held in Washington City, the report of the Reverend J. H. Kuhlmann was adopted and he was continued as agent, and a committee was appointed to draft a charter and to report the same to the next Conference. In addition to this a committee was authorized to receive propositions looking to the location and

the erection of said institution. Then again, the Conference held in Roanoke in April, 1921, received the charter as it was prepared according to its former action and referred the same to a committee consisting of four for its consideration, which committee reported back to the Conference a charter with certain amendments, all of which was accepted and adopted by the Conference, and the following Board of Trustees was elected for the first year, namely: J. H. Kuhlmann, J. Howard Wells, M. L. Walton, Tyson Janney and Herman M. Wilson. This Board has since organized, electing the Reverend J. Howard Wells as president and the Reverend J. H. Kuhlmann as secretary and treasurer. The scope of the institution included the authority to establish an orphanage, with training and industrial schools, for the benefit of the orphans and needy persons within the bounds of the Conference, and also a Home for the Aged, looking to their care and maintenance. All of which more fully appears on page 75 of the Conference Minutes of the session of April, 1921, and Article 10.

The Board would further report that during the year the Reverend J. H. Kuhlmann has been actively engaged in prosecuting the work provided for under the charter and has received contributions and pledges with many anticipated promises, all of which are favorable to the establishment of the said institution. It has transpired that by reason of the action of the Conference in April, 1921, held at Roanoke, the Conference for the first time took any official action looking to the establishment of a mission or mountain school within the bounds of the Conference.

It appears in the development of the two enterprises that a conflict in overlapping has occurred with reference to the development of the educational features, and after some consideration of this matter it seems thus far that the solution has not been found to reconcile these unfortunate differences, and for this reason this Board asked to have all the questions involved submitted to a commission to be appointed by the Conference, which shall have the authority to act, for the purpose of determining the best method to be pursued and of reconciling these differences. In consequence of this situation the action of this Board has been considerably delayed by not knowing what action the Conference would take with these two enterprises, believing that at the time of the action of the Conference in establishing those enterprises the purposes involved were not perhaps maturely and analytically determined. Consequently this Board awaits the ascertainment of the mind of the Conference respecting these differences, and will then proceed in the further prosecution of the work in hand as advised by the action of the Conference. We ask for the continuance of the Reverend J. H. Kuhlmann as our agent.

THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE HOME—REPORT NO. 2.

At the request of the Board of Trustees I have given most of my time in soliciting proposition for the location of the institution and visiting that part of our Conference territory thought to be most desirable for its location. I have received numerous propositions, among which there are some excellent locations.

One reliable party agrees to give \$500.00 in memory of her deceased husband. Another, whatever she realizes from the sale of 10 acres of land (which will probably bring \$100.00 per acre), and after three bequests are complied with and she cared for, will probably leave the residue of her estate to the Home. Have \$120.00 pledged on Rev. W. E. Woolf's Memorial room. The Epworth Leagues of our Conference have obligated themselves to raise \$2,000.00 per year till they have raised \$25,000.00 toward the erection of the first unit of the adult home. Some twenty-five or twenty-six thousand dollars additional have been offered us conditionally; in fact, all money received or pledged is conditional.

AUTHORIZING CHARTER FOR PROPOSED MOUNTAIN OR MISSION SCHOOL.

WHEREAS, The Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has put into its askings for the Christian Education Movement the amount of \$105,000 for a Training School.

WHEREAS, A considerable sum of money has already been subscribed and directed to this cause, and a substantial part of the subscriptions has already been paid.

WHEREAS. The Board of Missions and the Board of Education have taken steps for the securing of other amounts for this great work; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, the Baltimore Conference, now take further steps for the establishment of a Training School within the bounds of our territory.

First—By authorizing a commission to act in this matter, composed of the following persons: E. D. Newman, C. D. Harris, D. L. Blakemore, F. B. Thomas, William Stevens, C. F. Coffman, H. H. Sherman, L. J. Foreman, S. K. Cockrell, E. J. Richardson, R. L. Eutsler, D. L. Snyder, and five women from the Woman's Missionary Society, provided they agree to co-operate in this enterprise.

Second—By instructing this commission to secure a charter for the proposed school, naming themselves therein as trustees to act until the annual conference session of 1924, at and after which time trustees shall be elected quadrennially, as follows: Five to be nominated by and to represent the Board of Missions; five to be nominated by and to represent the Board of Education; two to be nominated by and to represent the Epworth League Board; two to be nominated by and to represent the Sunday School Board; all of these to be elected by the Baltimore Annual Conference; and five to be elected by the Woman's Missionary Society of the Baltimore Conference, provided they agree to co-operate in this enterprise.

Third—By instructing this commission to name the school and corporation, to select a site for the school and to take such other steps and make such other provisions as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of the Conference in establishing this Training School, and report to the next Annual Conference.

Fourth—By instructing this commission to provide that the trust clause, or its equivalent, be inserted in the charter and in all deeds for property so as to secure the property firmly by deed and to be held in trust for the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

MEMORIALS TO GENERAL CONFERENCE.

I.

Resolved, That the Baltimore Conference memoralize the General Conference, to be held at Hot Springs, Arkansas, next May, to change paragraph 487, page 207, lines 13 and 14 of the Discipline, by inserting (in place of the present reading) the words: "One half of the cost, according to such estimate, shall be provided for," &c., so that it shall read: "And also said Quarterly Conference shall appoint a judicious committee of at least three members of our Church, who shall form an estimate of the amount necessary to build; and one-half of the cost, according to such estimate, shall be provided for before such building shall be commenced, &c."

II.

Be it Resolved, That the Baltimore Annual Conference memoralize the General Conference to restore the time limit of the preachers of our Church, making the limit five years.

III.

Be it resolved by the Baltimore Conference, That the General Conference of the M. E. Church, South, to be held in May, 1922, be asked to give the right of way during the latter part of the ensuing quadrennium to the General Board of Finance to raise in the several Annual Conferences a minimum of \$10,000,000 for a Superannuate Endowment Fund.

IV.

Whereas, The Bible Board and the Board of Christian Literature are intrusted with kindred duties we memoralize the General Conference to strike out of the Discipline paragraphs 67 and 68 and substitute therefor:

"Each Annual Conference shall at its first session after the General Conference elect a Bible and Christian Literature Board to continue in office four years, composed of one Pastor from each Presiding Elder's District, and an equal number of members from the laity.

"It shall be the duty of this board to organize as soon as possible after its election and to promote the circulation, publication, distribution, reading and study of the Scripture and other Christian literature.

V.

Resolved, That the Baltimore Conference memoralize the General Conference to make provision that all General Conference Evangelists shall be paid a stated salary from the Home Mission Fund, and that all

monies collected by evangelists shall be turned into the treasury of the Board of Missions.

VI.

The Baltimore Conference respectfully memoralizes the General Conference to add to paragraph 315 at end of word "devise," in line three from top of page, the following: Provided that no Conference Board shall employ a secretary without a majority vote of the Conference.

VII.

The Baltimore Conference respectfully memorializes the General Conference of the M. E. Church, South, to add to Section 6, paragraph 98, the following:

"Presidents of Woman's Missionary Society." The paragraph to read: "Chairman of Social Service Committee, Presidents of Woman's Missionary Society and none others."

Change paragraph 87, Section 5, to read:

"The District Conference shall be composed....., the District Lay Leader, the Charge Lay Leaders, the District Secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society, and other lay members, etc.

VIII.

Whereas, There is a great deal of overlapping, and consequently confusion and waste of effort by the various organizations of the Church that have to do with the work among the young people, the Baltimore Conference hereby memoralizes the General Conference of the M. E. Church, South, to appoint a Commission which shall make a survey of the work among the Young People, as conducted by the Epworth League, the Woman's Missionary Society, the Sunday School and other organizations, and work out a plan of correlation that will minimize, if not entirely prevent, overlapping, confusion and conflict.

IX.

The Baltimore Conference of the M. E. Church, South, memoralizes the General Conference of said Church to form Episcopal Districts and to assign the Bishops to these Districts; to provide episcopal residences within such Episcopal Districts, and to see that the Bishop assigned shall live therein.

MEMOIRS.

REV. JAMES POLK STUMP.

Rev. James Polk Stump was born at Gerrardstown, W. Va., June 20. 1846, and fell asleep in Jesus in Fredericksburg, Va., May 13, 1921. His parents, Casper and Catherine Maddox Stump, were highly honored and beloved by all who knew them. To this father, a successful business man of Gerrardstown, W. Va., a worthy devoted, and trusted member and officer in the Southern Methodist Church, together with his family, especially the subject of this memoir, we are largely indebted for the beautiful Church we now have in Gerrardstown. Brother Stump received the greater part of his education in Gerrardstown and completed it at the University of Virginia. He was popular and beloved as a citizen and was honored with public positions in Berkeley County while yet young, such as Superintendent of Schools, Deputy Sheriff, etc. He was united in marriage to Miss Anna Elizabeth McKown of Gerrardstown, April 13th, 1870, in the Presbyterian Church there by Dr. Finley, the Pastor. Of this union were born four children-William Clifton, James Finley, Charles McKown and Perrin Morgan. The two last named survived him, living, respectively, at Alexandria, Va., and Bluefield. W. Va. While they were stationed at Easton, Maryland, Mrs. Stump died suddenly March 21, 1917. For nearly forty-eight years they lived happily together, and when Brother Stump entered the itenerant Methodist Ministry, she gladly accepted the situation, and they successfully, joyfully and faithfully labored together in the Lord's vineyard until she was called to her reward in Heaven,

Brother Stump was converted and joined the Church in 1866 under the then Pastor of the Circuit, the saintly Rev. David Shoaff, at which time he was impressed that he was called to preach the Gospel and was strongly inclined to yield to the call, but postponed the matter until a need arose on his home circuit for an assistant, and he was employed as second man in the circuit, with Rev. F. A. Mercer as Preacher in Charge. He applied for admission on trial at the Salem Conference in 1885 and was admitted and returned to Brucetown Circuit as Junior Preacher, with the writer of this memoir as Preacher in Charge. There I learned to know, honor and love this man of God. Our fellowship began then and continued to the hour of his death. We were brothers in truth. Jonathan and David were not truer friends, nor did they love each other more. We had three years of phenomenal prosperity together in Brucetown Circuit. The conversions and additions to the Church were numbered by hundreds, and the material advancement of each of the ten appointments was wonderful. The salaries were ad-

vanced from seven hundred to fifteen hundred dollars, and the Conference assessments advanced accordingly, and were all paid in full or overpaid. This success was largely attributable to the consecration, the earnestness, the faithfulness and popularity of Brother Stump, who continued to be eminently successful in all of his subsequent charges. He lived in his home in Gerrardstown, and I in the circuit parsonage at Brucetown, some twenty miles apart, but we were together much of the time either in our respective homes or in our pastoral work and revival meetings. I learned to know him perfectly in all the phases of life, and taking him all in all, I have never known but one J. P. Stump.

He was admitted into Traveling Connection and ordained Deacon by Bishop Keener at the Conference in Leesburg in 1887, and was ordained Elder by Bishop Wilson at the Conference in Alexandria in 1889. His appointments in the Conference were as follows: Brucetown. 1884-88; Moorefield, 1888-92; Woodstock, 1892-95; Charles Town, 1895-97; Fredericksburg, 1897-1901; Calvary, 1901-1902; Alexandria, 1902-1906; Luray, 1906-1907; Middletown, 1907-1910. During the third year of his pastorate at Middletown his health failed, and at the conference in 1910 he took a superannuate relation for one year. During the time of his retirement he was first at a hospital in Baltimore, Md., and suffered a severe operation for hip trouble, evidencing therein wonderful courage, great patience and joyous confidence in God. From the hospital he went to his sister's, Mrs. Virginia Bowers, in Gerrardstown, and spent the rest of the conference year, having regained his strength in part. At the Conference in 1911 he resumed active work and was appointed to Ingleside, where he remained until 1914. In 1914 he was appointed to Easton, and remained there until 1917. His last appointment was at Goldsboro, 1917-19. While stationed at Goldsboro April 16, 1918, Brother Stump was married to Mrs. Clara V. Laytin, a devoted member of the Southern Methodist Church in Fredericksburg, Va., who proved a true helper in the Master's work as well as a devoted and faithful companion, and ministered untiringly to him in his declining days and last illness. Brother Stump, whose health had been failing for a year or more, reluctantly requested, and was granted, a superannuate relation at the session of the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, held in Washington, D. C., April, 1920.

Rev. H. L. Hout, who was his pastor in Fredericksburg, where he spent the last period of his earthly existence and who was a warm personal friend for forty years, wrote his obituary, and so well expressed the facts in connection with his life, death and funeral that we close this memoir by quoting it in part:

"For 35 years he had answered to his name at roll call and received his field of labor from the hand of the Bishop, to which he went to expend his best energy of life and heart to build up the charge assigned and labor faithfully for the salvation of the souls of men. He was of that bright, jolly, cheerful disposition that always made him a welcome visitor and left one with a little more brightness in the midst of

the stressing affairs of life. He was greatly loved by the people he served and the communities in which he dwelt and his people were always the best people and his place unexcelled. Brother Stump was above the average preacher in his pulpit ministration and an excellent pastor. He loved his Church, and faithfully looked after every interest of it. It mattered not where he was sent, the reports were always evidences of advancement. He was evangelistic in his ministry, being sure of his call, and many will rise up in that day and call him blessed for having led them in the way of righteousness. He held some great revivals in his own work for many of the brethren whom he delighted to assist. Brother Stump was kind and friendly to all, especially to the poor and unfortunate. His life was a useful life, well spent in the service of his Master. He was 75 years of age, and his sun set with a splendor and glow of a beautiful evening coloring. His remains were taken Sunday, May 15th, for interment to Gerrardstown, W. Va., the home of his childhood and youth, and where he began his ministry. Funeral services were there held in the Church he loved, conducted by te pastor, Rev. L. L. Lowance, assisted by Rev. F. A. Strother, who feelingly paid tribute to his life and character; Rev. H. L. Hout, who spoke of the triumphant end of a life with which he had associated for more than forty years, and Rev. D. Bittinger, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Gerrardstown, where Brother Stump had preached his farewell sermon. Rev. J. R. Jacobs led the immense through in fervent prayer, and the mortal remains of our Brother were laid to rest."

In addition to his two sons, Brother Stump was survived by his wife, of Fredericksburg, Va.; a sister, Mrs. Virginia Bowers of Gerrardstown, W. Va., and a nephew, Hon. Geo. M. Bowers of Martinsburg, W. Va. These, with a host of friends in all parts of the Conference and elsewhere, mourn his death, but rejoice in the triumphant end of a well-spent life and the joy of meeting him in Heaven.

In loving remembrance of Brother Stump, a memorial window has been placed in our church at Fredericksburg by his widow, Mrs. Virgie Stump, and on Sunday, March 12th, at 11 A. M., most impressive memorial services were held.

ISAAC WHITE CANTER.

Isaac White Canter, son of Isaac White and Susan Jane (McCauley) Canter, was born August 28th, 1843, near Stephens City, Virginia. The father was a farmer and Methodist class leader. The son was the gift of a happy Christian home to the Church, which he grew up to serve so effectively. From early childhood he was inclined toward the ways of the Lord. Discerning eyes might have "perceived that Jehovah had

called the child." His vision of the future was that of a messenger and minister of Christ. On that he had set his heart; it had been suggested no doubt by the personal presence of preachers who were frequent honored guests in his father's house. The boy foretold the man. The dream became a fact.

As to schooling in the ordinary sense of the word, there was lacking the ample and inviting opportunities that are not rare nowadays; but he attended the common schools of the neighborhood and an excellent academy not far distant, and in early manhood had himself the experience of a few months' school teaching among his native hills. Later, while pastor in Lexington, Virginia, he pursued, with characteristic diligence, a liberal course of study at the Washington and Lee University.

As to the Book of books, Brother Canter read both the Old and the New Testament daily in the original tongues, having gained some knowledge of Hebrew and Greek through private instruction. A more Scriptural preacher one would rarely find. With something of Wesley's truth and practice he might have said: "Here is knowledge enough for me; let me be a man of one Book."

I learn from a brief record which our brother left of some events and experiences of his boyhood that he was converted in the year 1856, the twelfth year of his age, at Albin's schoolhouse, about two miles from his home, in a meeting held by William Prettyman and Thomas E. Carson, the two preachers on the circuit at that time, the sermon being preached, as he remembers somewhat significantly to note, from Matt. 5:14.

He was distinctively joyous child-Christian. So have I learned from his own lips. Indeed, it was the joyous type of religion that his life perpetually illustrated. "My happiest moments are spent in the pulpit." he wrote me years ago. "How he loved to preach," wrote to me a brother preacher this morning. But not in the pulpit only. Everywhere he seemed a son of the light and the day, not of the night nor of darkness.

On the last day of October in 1863, having received exhorter's license, he was sent by the Presiding Elder, Rev. Wm. G. Eggleston, to the Wardensville Circuit as junior preacher with David Harris as preacher in charge, and was licensed to preach the next spring by the Quarterly Conference of the circuit at the village of Gainsboro.

Here, then, was the beginning of a noteworthy ministry—noteworthy for its three-score years of duration and for the thousands of conversions, or reclamations, or edifications of souls with which it was attended.

After serving more than two years as junior preacher on the Wardensville Circuit, Brother Canter was admitted on probation into the Baltimore Conference in the year 1866—the year in which the Conference united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; and he was appointed to Big Lick (now Roanoke City) as preacher in charge.

In 1867 he was ordained deacon by Bishop George F. Pierce and appointed as junior preacher of Fincastle Circuit, with John L. Gilbert as

preacher in charge. In connection with the work of each of these two years about 200 converts were reported, one of whom has now been for many years a highly esteemed member of the Conference. In 1868 he was appointed to North Baltimore, and in the autumn of this year he married Miss Marie F. Hudson, who was lost to him in death after only a few months of married life. He remained two years in this charge and led many souls to Christ, three of whom became eminent preachers of the Gospel. In 1870 he was appointed to Emmanuel, Baltimore, where he remained two years. During this pastorate he was married to Miss Jennie Hall of South River, Maryland, his devoted wife and faithful home-maker for many years.

His subsequent appointments were as follows: 1872-73, Calvary, Baltimore; 1874, Harrisonburg; 1875-76, Laurel Circuit; 1877-78, Lexington: 1879-81, St. Paul's Baltimore; 1882-84, Warrenton; 1885-88, Leesburg; 1889-91, Fredericksburg; 1892, East Baltimore District; 1893-97, Mt. Vernon Place: 1898-1900, East Baltimore District; 1901-04, Staunton; 1905-07, Martinsburg.

This was his last appointment and closes the record of forty-four years of pastoral ministry under varied and often difficult conditions, but always in the spirit of a brother and a worker, never a fault-finder, unswervingly loyal, and crowned with notable success. Shall not we who remain for a little longer service be interested in the secret of such a life? Shall we not take to heart a lesson from the example of our brother whom God has taken?

"Doctor Canter," says his last Presiding Elder, Rev. Ernest L. Woolf, "was pre-eminently a pastor. He tended the whole flock. He knew his sheep by name. Obedience to no command of his Lord gave him greater joy than the command, Feed my lambs, Tend my sheep.

"Those within the fold he led out into green pastures and by the still waters. Those without the fold he sought with a passion akin to the passion of the Great Shepherd. Indeed, seeking the lost was an art with him. Few equaled him, none surpassed him in bringing men to Christ.

"This painstaking work as a pastor made him successful as a preacher. Knowing the hopes, the fears and the aspirations of his people, he rightly divided the Word of Truth. To one class of hearers his message meant introduction to Jesus; to the other it meant a constant deepening and enriching of that acquaintance.

"He is to be classed among the truly wise, for he turned many to righteousness. Today he shines as the brightness of the firmament and as the stars for ever and ever."

When at the Conference session of 1907, much to the regret of himself and his brethren, he was constrained to ask a superannuated relation; it was feared that this request had marked the close of his active life. But this did not prove to be so. Though no longer technically "effective," he was still in spirit and in act a preacher of Christ's gospel and a shepherd of souls.

For the space of twelve more years his life was prolonged. By avoiding undue excitement and rightly husbanding his strength, he could meet the various opportunities to preach that arose, and as he sometimes remarked, with no more excitement than in talking with his friends. He was always ready to occupy the pulpit of an absent brother and with a message graciously spoken and good to the use of edifying. So it was even unto the end. His last preaching engagements were left unfilled only because of the Master's call to the larger life and service beyond.

To which summons our dear and honored brother responded not without exceeding joy. For his passing was indeed a triumphant homecoming. Let him tell something of it himself, for he would fain send a farewell word to the brethren of the Conference and of the churches he had served, and to testify in life's closing hour to the truth of the Gospel which he had so long preached and lived. To his son Noland—Dr. Noland M. Canter of the Walter Reed General Hospital—he dictated a few words of dying testimony. Noland Canter writes:

"The last week of father's earthly life was most marvelous to those who were privileged to be with him. Not that there is any strangeness in the faith which sustains a Christian during his life and through the Valley of the Shadow. But he was so willing and eager to go to his reward. On the 25th of August he called me to his side and I had to bend low to get all he said. This was his message:

"Tell Brother Harris, and through him my brethren of the Baltimore Conference, that I love them all. And tell the members of the many churches in Baltimore, Washington and vicinity, and the others which I have served, that my experience now proves that the Gospel I have preached so long is true. There is no fear in death. I am willing and eager to go. I want to meet them in Heaven."

"Then he told his three sons gathered about his bed: 'I don't want you to go now with me. Finish your work and come after me. Preach the Gospel in your work, for that is the thing that counts.'

"It was a wonderful inspiration to be with him, and often he would pray: 'Come, Lord, and take thy servant home.' Once he raised his arms toward the skies and said: 'It is all over, Glory to God. Hallelujah.'"

It was in this spirit of victorious faith that our beloved brother left us. We are the poorer for his departure, but the richer for the life that he lived among us, and a great company rise up within the Church which was his joy and call him blessed.

OSCAR WILLIAM LUSBY.

Oscar William Lusby was born in Calvert County, Maryland, March 7, 1871, and died. after an illness of several weeks in Roanoke, Virginia,

December 14, 1921. For reasons known only to Him whose judgments are unsearchable, a useful life was thus cut short at the height of manly vigor and Christian service.

Brother Lusby was the son of William Augustus and Catherine Joy Lusby. He was only eleven years of age when he was converted and joined St. Paul Church, Calvert Circuit, and not quite eighteen when he was licensed to preach, on recommendation from that charge. He received his early education in the public schools of his native county, then spent a year or two at Randolph-Macon College, and in 1891, when he was twenty years old, was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. He served as junior preacher on East Rockingham Circuit in 1891, and from 1892 to 1894 as junior preacher at Fairfield and Bath. In 1894 he located, that he might continue his education, and spent three years at Washington and Lee University.

He was ordained elder by Bishop Galloway in 1897 and was re-admitted to the Conference. Thereafter he served the following charges: Newcastle, 1897-1900; Fincastle, 1901-1904; Roanoke Circuit, 1905; Marshall, 1906-1909; Wesley Grove, 1910-1913; Aberdeen, 1914-1917; Falls Church, 1918 to August, 1920, and Granbery Memorial Church. Covington, from that time until his death.

Funeral services were held at Greene Memorial Church, Roanoke, in charge of the pastor, Rev. J. W. Smith, assisted by Rev. H. I. Stephens and Rev. H. M. Canter. The Board of Stewards of Granbery Memorial Church were present, and young men of the Bible Class that he had organized bore his body lovingly to its resting place in Evergreen Cemetery. At the same hour, in Covington, people of all denominations gathered in Granbery Church for a service of tribute to their departed friend.

On June 22, 1898. Brother Lusby married Miss Clara Virginia Farrier of Craig County, Virginia. To them were born four children, Oscar W. and Frank F., Catherine E. and Lillian J. Lusby, all of whom, with their mother, survive. Brother Lusby was tenderly devoted to his family, and was particularly solicitous that his children should have the best educational advantages.

He was a good preacher. His pulpit manner was dignified and impressive, and his sermons showed the thorough preparation of a naturally studious mind. As a pastor he possessed unusual gifts. He drew people to himself and to Christ by the warmth of his friendship and the transparent genuineness of his Christian life. He took a sympathetic interest in his younger brethren in the ministry, as the writer of this sketch gratefully testifies. Above all, he devoted himself to his work with an energy that often exhausted his body, but that never caused his spirit to grow weary in well-doing. Many souls were converted under his ministry, and the work of the Lord in many places prospered in his hands.

He had entered with almost boyish enthusiasm upon the work of the important charge to which he was last appointed when "the Master of all good workmen" called him to the rest and the tasks of the eternal city. "Blessed is that servant whom his Lord when He cometh shall find so doing."

CHARLES W. STUMP.

Rev. Charles W. Stump was born on a farm on Little Capon, Hampshire County, West Virginia, November 20, 1859, and answered the summons of God to the Life of the Ages January 1, 1922.

He was the son of Jacob and Margaret Stump.

He was converted in a meeting held by Revs. F. T. Griffith and W. F. Locke at Salem Church, near Slanesville, W. Va., in 1889.

At the time of this meeting he and the Sunday School Superintendent were not on speaking terms, but being deeply convicted of sin, he presented himself at the altar when the invitation was given. I here give the description as given by the superintendent to show how deep-seated was the conviction and how in earnest he was about salvation. He says, "Charlie and I were at loggerheads and did not speak, so that when he went to the altar I did not go near him; but at the close of the service Charlie came to the hitching place while I was getting my horse, and said: 'Mack, will you pray for me?' Of course I told him I would, and I did, and that night he was converted and testified to saving grace the following night at the church. It was a very bright conversion." He often stated that he then and there came to experience peace with God and his fellowman.

Soon after his conversion he felt the call to preach. He often said this call was the most real thing in his life, for he felt God's hand laid on him as distinctly as if it were a human hand, and he immediately began to prepare for the ministry.

After preaching for several years he was forced to locate because of some trouble with his throat, and he engaged in business with his brother near Slanesville. During the time of his enforced retirement from the active work he was very restless and dissatisfied, for the burning desire of his heart was to preach the Gospel. In 1901 his condition having improved, he was sent as a supply to the Petersburg charge, which he served for two years, 1901-2.

In 1903 he was admitted on trial into the traveling connection. Was ordained a Deacon by Bishop Galloway in 1904 and an Elder in 1907 by Bishop Hoss.

He served the following charges: South Fork, 1903-4; Hardy, 1905-7; Linden, 1908-11; Capon Bridge, 1912-15; Levels, 1916-18; Hardy, 1919-22. With the exception of the four years spent on the Linden charge, his

appointments were all within a radius of fifty miles of his home, and yet this prophet had honor among his own people.

He was a man of unusual religious experience. The deep and abiding truths of God were so vital to him that he not only preached them with joy and gladness to others, but found rich and abundant peace for his own soul in the midst of life's responsibilities.

In manner he was reticent and unassuming, and yet, when the occasion demanded he had no fear in voicing his convictions for the right. His disposition was such that he was never heard to complain. Regardless of any unkind treatment he might receive from others, he was never heard to utter an unkind word to any one.

Aside from his earnest, honest love for humanity, which seemed always to attract, especially little children and old folks, he loved nature. He fed the birds in the winter and planted and cared most tenderly for flowers in the summer, until one is forced to believe that in these things he saw the hand of God and loved His creation.

Brother Stump was a good preacher, and desiring that the Word might run and be glorified, and prove the power of God to the salvation of souls, he ever sought to make his preaching so plain and simple that even the children could understand it, and his was the joy of seeing many souls brought to Christ because of his work.

On June 28, 1905, he was married to Miss Frances Baker Clark of Petersburg. No children came to bless their union, and yet they worked together for the promotion of God's kingdom, and were happy in each other's love.

Sunday morning, January 1, 1922, Brother Stump arose early and seemed to be in a most happy frame of mind, singing and rejoicing that a new year had dawned. He went at the hour appointed for worship to the Stony Ridge Church, which is not far from the parsonage, and after the usual opening exercises stood up to preach. His theme was a New Year's one. A moment or two after announcing his text he was seen to be sinking to the floor, and several persons went to him and laid him gently down. For a short time he seemed to be conscious, yet was unable to speak. He lapsed into unconsciousness, and after a couple of hours his soul took its flight to the God who gave it.

The wish which he had so often made "that he might pass out preaching" was granted him, and the life of a good, true and faithful man of God was no more for the earth..

It can be truly said of him, "Living, he lived unto the Lord," and "Dying, he died in the Lord" and has gone to join the great multitude which no man can number before the Throne.

His remains were taken for interment to the little Salem Church near Slanesville. It was a sacred place to him because there he had first heard the Gospel preached; there he had surrendered himself to God, and from there he had gone out to preach to others the unsearchable riches of Christ Jesus.

His funeral services were conducted by the writer in the presence of relatives and friends from far and near, who taxed the capacity of the building, to pay their tribute of respect to the memory of him whom they had known in life. He was laid to rest in the burying ground by the side of the Church, there to await the resurrection morn.

JAMES EDWARD ALEXANDER

James Edward Alexander was born in Alleghany, Pennsylvania, and came to Alexandria, Virginia, in 1864. So fully and so sympathetically did he identify himself with our Southern life that he seemed indigenous and wholly at home.

Very soon after coming to Virginia he united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in whose fellowship and service he spent fifty-five years—years of faithful labor—for he gave himself fully to the Church. During a period of twenty-five years he was Superintendent of the Sunday School, and for a much longer time a steward and trustee.

Nor was his interest in the Kingdom of God confined to his local church; his devotion soon led him to an active interest in Conference and Connectional affairs. He served as Treasurer of the Conference Board of Missions for twenty-eight years. In this responsible office he had and held the full confidence of his associates. He put into the work of this position the very best that was in him, and his annual reports showed much of the midnight hours of toil and interest. When he laid down his arduous labors and the well-earned honors there was "nothing against him."

Brother Alexander was a man of simple and sincere faith. He loved the Bible; it was the Word of God to him; he delighted in the preached Gospel, and his sympathetic interest was always an inspiration to his pastors.

His loyalty to his pastor was markedly unswerving; he could be counted on. Brother Alexander was a man of prayer. He never declaimed before God or an earthly audience, but had communion and conversation with his Father. In the home or prayer-meeting his prayers were a benediction and brought Heaven nearer.

He was not only a faithful servant of the Church, but of the Government as well; he was in the employ of the Navy Department for something like fifty-five years, and because of increasing infirmity, retired from service only last summer. As Chief Clerk of the Navigation Bureau, he was was held in highest esteem by his associates, as also by the various Secretaries of the Navy under whom he served.

His record in secular circles has been distinguished by his faithfulness in many offices of trust and honor. He was a member of the

Masonic order, in which his worth had been appreciated and in which many honors came to him. For fifty-seven years he was a Master Mason; the oldest Past Master of Andrew Jackson Lodge, of which lodge he had been secretary for forty years; a Past Grand High Priest of the Royal Arch Chapter; a Past Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery, and an honored member of all other Masonic bodies. He was secretary of his Council of the Royal Arcanum for forty years. Into all these associations he carried his religion and was always a preacher of righteousness to his fellows.

A friend has said: "James E. Alexander was one of the most lovable men that ever lived. Thoroughly conscientious in the performance of his duties, and rigid in the scrutiny of his own conduct, he was yet of a most forgiving nature and always ready to make allowances for the weakness of others. The influence of his character and example extended far beyond the confines of his own State. His friends frequently sought and valued his advice. His mind was keenly analytical, and his criticisms, while forceful and unbiased, were always helpful and constructive."

Over a half century ago he married Mary Elizabeth Kell of Alexandria. Virginia, who was a worthy and loving helpmeet and companion. Together they established a genuinely Christian home, where upon the family altar incense always burned and where God's servants found prepared a "prophet's chamber" and whole-hearted hospitality.

Mrs. Alexander survives him, together with two daughters and a son. He was buried from the Church which had his life's labors and still holds his sacred memory, and laid to rest in the Methodist Protestant Cemetery in Alexandria.

No man's life has been lived in vain which has won to such heights of service, or won such golden regard from his fellow-man. The departure of James Edward Alexander from our midst has left a gap that must long remain unfilled.






