FIRST DAY.

Wednesday, September 28, 1927.

The Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its One Hundred and Forty-Third Session in Greene Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church, South, Roanoke, Va., September 28, 1927, at 9 o'clock A. M.

Bishop Collins Denny, President of the Conference, in the Chair. The Conference united in singing Hymn No. 181,

"Come Holy Ghost, our hearts inspire,

Let us Thine influence prove;

Source of the old prophetic fire.

Fountain of life and love."

Rev. E. L. Pell, D.D., led in prayer.

The Bishop called E. L. Woolf to take the Chair.

Dr. Pell addressed the Conference, basing his remarks upon the twenty-first chapter of Saint John's Gospel.

Conference united in singing Hymn No. 508,

"Take the name of Jesus with you, Child of sorrow and of woe." Bishop Denny resumed the Chair.

Upon nomination of the Board of Lay Activities, M. L. Walton, Jr., Woodstock, Va., was elected Conference Lay Leader.

Permission was granted the Board of Education to retire.

The Report of the Sunday School Board was presented, read and, upon motion, adopted.

The following Resolution, signed by William H. Best and William Stevens was presented and, upon motion, laid upon the table:

"Whereas, the first Sunday in October is a very important day in the Sunday School calendar, we therefore request our Presiding Bishop, if it be feasible, not to set the date of the Session of the Baltimore Conference so as to include the first Sunday in October."

The Report of the Treasurer of the Board of Church Extension was presented and the Report of the Board of Church Extension was presented, read and, upon motion, adopted.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Education was presented and read. Upon motion, the Report was amended by striking out the words, "We hope there will be no abuse of the law." It was also, upon motion, further amended by adding to the Section on "Ministerial"

Supply and Training," the following: "Students attending Institutions of Learning of our Church of like grade with Randolph Macon College may in the discretion of the Committee be assisted by funds raised for Ministerial Supply and Training."

Report No. 1.

Your Conference Board of Finance has received with interest the report of the General Secretary, Dr. Luther E. Todd, and while we rejoice in every note of encouragement that is brought to us in the report of our General Secretary, we deeply regret that we are so far from the goal set by the church for this important cause.

The fourth year of our special effort for Superannuate Endowment will end March 31st, 1928. The last year of the 5-year period will begin April 1st, 1928.

We have heard of the plan of the General Board calling for unusual endeavor in behalf of this cause during the fifth year of the movement, setting aside the months of March, April and May as a period of special effort. Therefore, be it resolved that, as a Conference, we are in hearty accord with this plan as presented to us and pledge our earnest co-operation in bringing to a worthy end this cause that deserves our best endeavor.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF FINANCE.

Report No. 2.

Your attention is called to certain facts revealed by the General Board of Finance, as applying March 31, 1927. Payments which have been made since then are not enough to make material changes. The following figures show that:

- 1. Our Annual Conference has a total five-year quota of \$335,034.50, as approved by vote of the Quarterly Conferences and reported to the General Board as an accepted obligation. To March 31, 1927, only \$108,290.86 of this amount had been paid, leaving a balance yet to pay of \$226,743.64.
- 2. There are three Charges in our Annual Conference that have each paid their respective five-year quotas in full, and ten Charges that have each paid three-fifths of their respective five-year quotas.
- 3. There are 138 Charges in our Annual Conference that have each paid more than \$100 on their respective five-year quotas. Some of them have a comparatively good record of payments, more of them have only a fair record, and many of them have barely paid enough to creep into this classification.

4. There are 54 Charges in our Annual Conference that have each paid less than \$100 on their respective five-year quotas, and 19 Charges that have not paid anything.

No cause more worthy than Superannuate Endowment has ever challenged our noblest efforts. It is an appealing call of distress for aid in behalf of the Church's veteran preachers and the widows and orphans of preachers. For us to treat lightly this cause, after being directed by the General Conference to give it faithful attention, is unworthy of the good name of our Annual Conference and inconsiderate of those among us who are enfeebled by age and incapacitated physically for further service.

Our Annual Conference must not lag longer in doing our part for this neglected cause. The amount we have yet to pay for this purpose is a mere pittance compared with the debt we owe these grand old men. Let us pay every penny that we have promised. To this end, we entreat every pastor to join heartily in the plan projected by the General Board of Finance for application during March. April and May of 1928. As members of our Conference Board of Finance, we commit ourselves unreservedly to this work and beseech all the members of our Conference to join us in a united and determined effort to do our part well.

That this work may receive our attention during the period of special endeavor during the year, we request Bishop Collins Denny to appoint Rev. H. L. Hout as Director of the special effort for the Superannuate Endowment Fund. The appointment to be in connection with his regular work.

REPORT NO. 1-BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WHEREAS the rebuilding of Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal, Virginia, makes it necessary to raise \$28,000 in addition to the bonded indebtedness authorized by the Board of Trust; and

WHEREAS this institution has made a great contribution to the ministry and membership of our Conference and is a vital part of our educational work and therefore has a worthy claim upon our confidence and support;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. That the Conference heartily endorse the effort to raise this \$28,000 and urge the Pastors and Presiding Elders to commend it to our people and to co-operate in informing them as to the needs and work of the Academy.
- 2. That we request that this cause be presented to each congregation at the earliest date practicable and an earnest effort be

made to reach the goal of 10% of pastor's salary as shown in the 1926 Minutes.

- 3. For the information of each congregation, we ask the Board of Finance to include this as a separate item in their report to the several Districts, and that the District Stewards include it as a separate item, in their report to the several charges.
- 4. That it is clearly understood that this is in no sense an assessment, but only a voluntary effort on the part of our people in behalf of one of our institutions in dire distress.

REPORT NO. 2 OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

We rejoice in the unusual prosperity that has attended our Educational institutions, both in their material progress and in the development of the spirit for which our institutions stand.

The Randolph-Macon System.

The Randolph-Macon System has continued its steady and healthful growth. The student enrollment is 1733. There are 60 students from the Baltimore Conference attending the Men's College and 84 attending the Woman's College. Out of a student enrollment of 212 at Front Royal Academy 89 are from the borders of our Conference. The gymnasium at the Men's College is almost complete. The value of the property has increased \$50,000 and the endowment \$150,000, while the endowment of the Woman's College has increased \$355,022. The number of ministerial students at the College is 47, 14 of whom come from the Baltimore Conference. The Woman's College draws its patronage from a wide territory, namely 33 states and 3 foreign countries. Four hundred fifty students do voluntary religious group work and a larger number engage in voluntary Bible study.

The Front Royal Academy was at its highest point of prosperity and its influence more far reaching than at any time in its history when the calamity came. We go on record in the expression of our highest appreciation to Professor Melton and his teachers and officers, as well as their students, who heroically risked their lives to save others. The spirit of calm courage that asserted itself may well characterize the spirit that shall rear out of the ashes a greater institution which shall continue to produce men who forget themselves in the opportunity for service.

Christian Education Movement.

Students attending Institutions of Learning of our Church of like grade with Randolph-Macon College, may, in the discretion of the Committee, be assisted by funds raised for Ministerial Supply and Training.

The rules and regulations governing the bestowment of aid from the Ministerial Supply and Training Fund may be secured from Dr. H. P. Hamill.

Student Work in State Institutions.

We recommend that application be made to the General Conference Board of Education for an appropriation of not less than \$250.00 for student work at Lexington.

We most heartily recommend that our Church join in the movement for the establishment of a Chair of Religious Education in the Virginia Polytechnic Institute at Blacksburg. This Chair is to be established under the patronage of the six Protestant churches represented at Blacksburg, the total cost to them to be \$3,000.00 per year. Each denomination is to contribute according to the number of students it has at the school. Our share will be \$1,100.00. We ask for an assessment of \$700.00 by this Conference for this purpose and an appeal to the General Conference Board of Education for \$550.00. The man to occupy this Chair is to be approved by our General Board of Education.

School for Pastors and Christian Workers.

The joint Summer School for pastors at Ashland has been discontinued. It is proposed to establish a school for pastors and Christian workers for the Baltimore Conference. Such a school will be under the direction of and supported by the Board of Missions, the Sunday School Board, the Board of Lay Activities, the Epworth League Board, and the Board of Education.

Requirements for Admission on Trial.

The Board calls attention to the change in the law, whereby those to be admitted on trial hereafter are required to have completed two years of work in a standard college, and a man lacking this qualification can only be admitted by a two-thirds vote of the Conference and that the Committee on Admission or the Presiding Elder must present a statement showing wherein the man is a special case.

The Francis Asbury School.

We are glad to report that progress is being made in securing funds for the establishing this much needed school. There is now over \$60,000.00 in hand for the building and maintenance of the school. When the accounts of the Christian Education Movement shall have been closed, the Trustees expect to begin looking for a location so as to start work. Hon. George N. Conrad was nominated to take the place of Judge E. D. Newman, deceased, on the Board of Trustees of this school.

property will serve the purpose of both. This is the reason for our delay.

2nd. There is greater evidence than ever before that there is a great and growing need for a place to assemble. This Commission hopes to find out this year just how strong is the desire of our people for an assembly. This information will permit the making of a more definite report next year.

3rd. We ask that the Commission be continued.

We, your Committee on Christian Literature, believing the time has come to act and not merely to resolve, recommend,

FIRST, that because of the great influence of the printed page for good or evil on both old and young, we vigorously protest against the buying, selling and reading of the salacious papers, books and magazines which so strongly appeal to the unsaved and careless.

SECOND, that we discourage the reading of the so-called religious propaganda literature.

THIRDLY, that all our pastors,, in their pastoral charges, in their visitations and from the pulpits and through the teaching agency of the church, seek to create a taste for the reading of good literature, as published and sent out by our Publishing House. We especially recommend The Christian Advocate, The Quarterly Review, The Missionary Voice, The Epworth Era and The Baltimore Southern Methodist.

We recommend that the month of May be set apart as a time for the intensive canvass for subscriptions to The Baltimore Southern Methodist.

We wish to congratulate the Directors of the Southern Methodist Publishing House on securing the whole-time service of so able a man as Dr. C. D. Harris as editor of The Baltimore Southern Methodist. We also desire to express our appreciation of the faithful service rendered by the retiring editor, Dr. Selwyn K. Cockrell, in the publishing of our Conference organ.

We recommend that our Sunday School literature be used in preference to that which is sent out by independent or other denominational publishing presses.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

We desire to recall to the minds of our Pastors and people of the Baltimore Conference the overwhelming demands that are being made upon our General Board on account of the gigantic disasters that have visited several great sections of our country. We, therefore, think it can be best done by quoting from the letter just received from the General Secretary, Dr. T. D. Ellis.

"We have had a year of unusual disasters. Destructive storms have visited Florida, Cuba, the Isle of Pines, Arkansas, Missouri and Texas. The unparalleled flood in the Mississippi Valley has done untold damage to churches and parsonages. A large territory in Missouri and Mississippi has been under water while nearly half of the states of Arkansas and Louisiana have been submerged. We are receiving appeals for aid from communities which have lost so heavily that they are unable to repair the damages and provide a place of worship for their people.

"The storms which visited Florida, Cuba, the Isle of Pines and several western states destroyed property amounting to more than a quarter of a million dollars. The Board of Church Extension has gone the limit of its ability to aid in rebuilding destroyed churches and in repairing damaged churches and parsonages. The worthy appeals reaching us from congregations whose churches and parsonages have been damaged or destroyed amounted to many times the sum of money in the hands of the Board of Church Extension available for such aid. It took more than \$80,000.00 to provide homes for the preachers and houses of worship, many of them incomplete and yet in a usable condition, for the area within the Florida storm alone.

"We are glad to report to you that we are aiding the churches suffering these disasters as rapidly and as liberally as the funds in hand will justify. I am setting forth these matters at some length in order that you may join us in an appeal to the unhurt churches of our connection to be patient while we are striving to aid the people who have suffered in these stricken areas."

This will fully explain why we cannot expect much help from this source while our brethren are so sorely stricken elsewhere.

We again call attention to the architectural department of the General Board. If any church is planning to build or reconstruct, it will be the beginning of wisdom to communicate with Mr. H. M. King, Architectural Secretary, 1115 Fourth Avenue, Louisville, Ky. He is equipped to advise and help in every way and the best way to secure the finest results in efficiency and economy. And if help is desired from the General Board, it is absolutely necessary to have the endorsement of this department on all plans.

There are many persons who desire to invest their possessions either during life or at death in the work of the church. Let preachers and laymen call their attention to the great work of the Board of Church Extension. Annuity Bonds are very attractive to those who must have an income on their estate while living and who wish it to go to the Loan Fund of the Board of Church Extension when they are called home. Let those who are interested communicate with the President or Secretary of the Conference Board.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

Sunday School Day.

Because of its great educational value and because of its basic financial importance as well we beg our brethren to attend to the observance of Sunday School Day in each school. It is the medium for imparting important information, for arousing enthusiasm, and for providing support of our employed staff. In the year just closed we raised by this means approximately \$7,000.

We respectfully request our Conference Committee on Program to allow to the Sunday School Board Thursday night of Conference week next year for its anniversary service.

Literature.

This is the day of the printed page, and we well recognize the power of this medium to transmit knowledge, to create an intellectual and a moral atmosphere, and to effect conviction. Our church has met this challenge in a thoroughly intellectual and a deeply spiritual Christian literature, and a literature that is soundly pedagogical as well. We urge upon our people the use of our own denominational literature. Do not be misled by that which is of cheaper price but not adapted to the educational program of our great church. Our Publishing House now issues the graded series for Intermediate Senior Group.

Leadership Training.

The demand for intellectual and consecrated leadership is one of the most urgent in all the field of Christian activity. Our Board through its efficient field workers has been unsparing in its efforts to provide this leadership. Standard Training Schools and Cokesbury Classes have been held throughout the Conference, issuing 2,421 credits. We beg our pastors for increased co-operation along this line, attending themselves upon these schools, and working to get their superintendents and teachers enrolled.

Programs of Work.

Programs of Work are the basis for checking the standing and the progress of each school in the Conference. It is a plan of self-analysis. We desire each school to have such a program and to test itself constantly by the goals held up therein.

Buildings.

Upon the physical side of our program nothing is more important than adequate Sunday School buildings. There have been serious mistakes in this respect, and such errors constitute a permanent barrier to our work. Brethren, please be careful when you go to build; seek advice and suggestions and build wisely.

District Organizations.

The purposes towards which our Board aims are represented in our District Organizations. Each district is now organized and, we hope, doing its work. The Roanoke district received this year the Efficiency Banner for having attained the highest rank according to the District Standard for Efficiency.

Pastors' School.

The Sunday School Board has entered into co-operation with the Conference Board of Education, the Board of Missions, the Board of Lay Activities, and the Epworth League Board, for the promotion of a Baltimore Conference School for Pastors and Christian Workers.

Home for the Aged and Orphans.

The whole span of life is our field. Our Sunday schools have accepted responsibility for the dining room of the Home for the Aged and Orphans at Gaithersburg at a cost of \$20,000. This part of the building is to be a Sunday School Memorial. We ask, therefore, that each of our schools take a liberal offering in the Christmas season and send the same to Mr. Walter M. Magruder, Treasurer, Gaithersburg, Md.

State Work.

While we are in sympathy with the purpose expressed in Article II of the proposed Constitution for the Reorganization Plan for the State of Virginia, we recognize, first, that any plan of co-operation in the State of Virginia should receive the concurrent endorsement of the three Annual Conferences that comprise the work of Southern Methodism in that state. Therefore our procedure in that particular

instance should be the appointment of a committee to act jointly with a like committee from each of the participating Conferences, which joint committee shall report back its recommendation to each cooperating Conference. Second, as to the general principle of interdenominational co-operation we recognize the right of Annual Conference autonomy as it relates to state, county, and district organization, and we believe that interdenominational co-operation should originate in each local situation and should be promoted by the regularly constituted denominational agents.

Upon the above premises, first, we authorize our employed staff to co-operate with the existing state organizations in our territory as far as practicable, without in any way interferring with the prosecution of our own denominational work and without in any way involving our Sunday Schools in financial obligations; second, we recommend that the conclusions of this report be communicated to each pastor and superintendent in our Conference, emphasizing the fact that our schools are not officially committed to the financial support of state or county work.

Our Employed Staff.

We hereby record our hearty endorsement and deep appreciation of the efficient and consecrated work of our Conference Superintendent, Rev. R. K. Nevitt, and of Miss Etta Mai Russell, Conference Elementary Superintendent. The Board has voted to continue the valued services of Miss Russell, and we hereby respectfully request Bishop Collins Denny to appoint Rev. R. K. Nevitt as Conference Superintendent of Sunday School Work. We respectfully request Bishop Denny, further, to appoint Rev. C. D. Bulla, D.D., Associate Sunday School Editor.

Objectives for 1927-28.

- That Children's Week be observed in at least 25% of the schools
 of the Conference.
- 2. That the District Standard of Efficiency as adopted by the Conference Council be the goal of each district.
- 3. That we aim at a 10% increase in our membership.
- The co-operation of all the schools in the Conference in the Board's plan of District Organization.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

Your Board has given careful attention to the work of the Epworth League, both within the bounds of the Baltimore Conference and throughout the church, and is happy to report that there are many evidences of vitality and progress in this department of the Church's activity. Though the degree of progress cannot be adequately expressed in mere figures, a few of the outstanding facts may be of interest.

Dr. Fitzgerald S. Parker, General Secretary of the Epworth League, reports for the year 1926-27 a loss of 2,407 members, but a gain of 335 chapters. The membership of the League throughout the Church is now 265,087. For the same period the gifts of the Epworth League for missions, for Anniversary Day Offerings, and for other objects show in each case an increase over those made the previous year.

The report of Mr. J. N. Anderson, President of the Baltimore Conference Epworth League, shows a loss of three chapters during the past year as compared with the year preceding, but a gain of 119 members, so that the present League membership in the Baltimore Conference is 12,228. The offerings made for Epworth League extension on Rally Day and on Anniversary Day and the sum contributed for the Epworth League missionary special were very satisfactory, and over \$5,000 was added to the fund for the building of "Epworth Hall" at the Home of the Aged. This last-named fund now stands at approximately \$22,000.

The particular obligation placed upon the Conference Epworth League Board by the Discipline is the support, both moral and financial, of the Conference Epworth League. This obligation the present Board has endeavored faithfully to discharge during its term of office now closing. We have followed the general policy of appropriating to the Conference League 80% of the money that we have received from the Annual Conference. Our President and Secretary have availed themselves of their privileges as ex-officio members of the Cabinet and the Executive Committee of the Conference League, and have advised and assisted the leaders of the Conference work in their business meetings and through frequent correspondence. Several members of the Board have served on the faculty of the League Assembly each summer; and one member of the Board, Mr. Samuel M. Dodd, Jr., has each year served with distinguished ability as the Assembly Dean. Our contact with the Conference Epworth League has caused us to feel that, in spite of occasional disappointments and failures, the Conference-wide activities of our Epworth League are managed with intelligence, efficiency, and consecration, and that the fine Christian young people who bear the burden of the work have deserved all the support we have been able to give.

We wish to call the attention of our pastors to several important recent developments in the work of the Epworth League:

- 1. The Junior Epworth League and the Junior Missionary Society have been consolidated into a new organization known as the "Epworth Junior Society," responsible jointly to the Epworth League Board and the Woman's Missionary Council. The official Handbook of the new society is now being prepared, and the "Junior Epworthian" and the "Young Christian Worker" have been replaced by one new monthly magazine entitled "Juniors." We urge each pastor to secure and study the official Constitution of the "Epworth Junior Society" and to use his best endeavors to have the boys and girls under his pastoral care (who are of the proper age) organized in accordance with its provisions.
- 2. The Intermediate Epworth League is now known as the "Epworth Hi-League," the new name referring to the high-school age and relationship of the youth to whom it ministers. Its organ, "The Intermediate Epworthian," has been discontinued, and the helps formerly contained in it will be given in future in "The Epworth Era." We consider "The Epworth Era" one of the most creditable magazines published by our Church, and feel that in its enlarged form it should have our heartiest support.
- 3. We commend to the favorable attention of our pastors the so-called "Young People's Revival," one of the most significant recent developments in the Epworth League. This is essentially an effort to enlist our Leaguers once a year in a definite campaign of personal evangelism in behalf of their associates who are not Christians. A week or more of special services under the leadership of the young people is a part of the suggested plan, but these are not to be regarded as preaching services intended to take the place of revival services under the leadership of the pastor. The Epworth League chapter leaders are expected to make their plans for this campaign in full recognition of the leadership and authority of their pastor in all the evangelistic efforts of the local Church. For his part, the pastor will do well, we believe, to encourage his Epworth Leaguers to undertake such a campaign of personal work as is recommended by the Epworth League Board, either apart from the evangelistic program that he himself may have planned or as a part of it. The month of October is recommended as the time for the "Young People's Revival" this year, and the helps are given in the September number of the "Era." We hope and pray that our pastors and our Epworth Leaguers, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, may cooperate to such good purpose this fall that hundreds of young people in the Baltimore Conference may take Jesus as their Saviour and their Lord.

The Board of Missions has had under consideration the general missionary situation in our Church, and especially our responsibility in the annual missionary cultivation campaign to be observed in January and February in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline. We regret that the campaign of last year was not more successful. The Baltimore Conference reported for the Missionary Maintenance on the 1926 quota of \$30,000 the sum of \$16,859, and on the 1927 quota of \$44,000 the sum of \$15,572 up to September 1, 1927. (There will be an additional amount reported before the end of this Conference.)

The most notable feature in our present missionary situation is that we have adopted a policy of evangelism around the world. The revival fires should be rekindled throughout Methodism. We need now to lay emphasis upon extending the borders of the Church. The spiritually hungry masses are waiting on us everywhere.

We recommend, therefore:

- 1. To commend and endorse the policy of promoting evangelism all over the world.
- 2. To enter heartily into all the educational and spiritual phases of the missionary cultivation campaign in January and February.
- 3. To assume and pledge our best efforts to raise as a free will offering for missions during the coming year the same amount that was accepted as our share last year, namely, \$44,000.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES.

To the Baltimore Annual Conference, in session at Roanoke, Va., September 28th—October 3rd, 1927. Dear Brethren:

As you know, the General Conference has directed the work of our Board along four main lines: the promotion of full payment of the Benevolent Claims, Christian Stewardship, Men's Work through the Wesley Brotherhood, and Co-operation with the other agencies of the Church.

We are glad to report progress and to call particular attention to the following features in our work for this conference year:

The Benevolences.

In view of the responsibility placed upon the Board of Lay Activities together with the Bishop, Presiding Elders, and Pastors for the promotion of full payment of the Benevolent Claims, be it resolved:

- 1. That the assessments, general and conference, constitute our first and abiding obligation.
- 2. That the Benevolences be provided for in cash and pledges as soon as practicable after the session of the annual conference.
- 3. That at least half of these claims should be paid by the time of the District Conference.
- 4. That, as far as possible, these funds be sent to the Conference Treasurer monthly, or quarterly, as an integral part of the local Church Budget.

5. That Boards of Lay Activities unite with the Bishop, Presiding Elders, Pastors, and the other boards of the Conference in a cooperative effort to inform our entire membership of the needs represented in our Benevolent Claims, and to promote systematic, proportional, and sacrificial giving to the great causes represented in the assessments, setting as our goal 100 per cent. payment on all claims for this conference year.

We recommend that a Commission on Benevolences, composed of chairman of the Commission on Budget and the chairmen of all Conference boards, be organized as an Advisory Council to the Conference Board of Lay Activities, to co-operate with this Board in promoting full payment of the Benevolences.

Christian Stewardship.

It is our conviction that the practice of the principles of Christian Stewardship on the part of the individual Christian is the most essential and fundamental need of our Church. This relates to all of life. Too much emphasis cannot be given to this phase of our work which is largely educational. For this purpose we strongly urge the organization and functioning of the Stewardship Committee in each local Church, and recommend that the month of December be observed as a special period for Stewardship education and emphasis.

The Wesley Brotherhood.

For the purpose of promoting Christ's Kingdom among men through fellowship, prayer, Christian testimony, personal work, and aggressive evangelistic effort, we commend the Wesley Brotherhood and urge its organization in every Church where practicable.

Co-operation with Other Agencies.

The Board of Lay Activities pledges whole-hearted support to all the great movements of our Church with special emphasis on Missions and Superannuate Endowment.

The Methodist Layman.

We consider the Methodist Layman, our official organ authorized by our last General Conference, our strongest and most effective agency for promoting lay activities and carrying forward the work of our Board. Therefore, we urge unusual effort to promote its circulation, setting as a goal a subscription from each member of the lay organization and one in addition for each Methodist family in the conference.

Organization and Personnel of Lay Leadership.

We earnestly appeal to our presiding elders and pastors to exercise prayer and care in the selection of all lay leaders and chairmen of committees and to use every possible effort to instruct all lay boards and committees in their work with special emphasis on the Pastor's Cabinet.

(Literature on the Benevolences, Christian Stewardship, the Wesley Brotherhood, and organization of the Lay Boards, can be obtained from the General Board of Lay Activities, 810 Broadway, Nashville, Tenn.)

We desire to record our deep appreciation of our Presiding elders, and pastors in all of their labors, especially in their sympathetic attitude and active co-operation in our lay work.

We have just one desire and purpose, namely, to add our contribution to the extension of Christ's Kingdom, in co-operation with our properly constituted leaders.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE.

The outlawed liquor traffic is still defiant. The opponents of prohibition are openly and brazonly attempting to veto the Eighteenth Amendment by nullification. If they succeed the very foundation of our nation will be shaken. So, the battle is not over. We must fight on. The facts show that wherever the law has been honestly enforced good results have followed economically, socially, and morally. The great problem today is to get enforcement in those places where it has never had a fair trial. As has been pointed out by others, "The issue today is not how much it will cost to enforce the prohibition law, but what will it cost if it is not enforced?" We should carry on an educational campaign to show the good results of prohibition as well as a campaign for law enforcement.

But while we are "carrying on" in the fight against the liquor traffic we must not forget that there are other foes to civic righteousness against which we should warn our people.

The divorce evil continues to grow. It is striking at the very foundation of society—the home. In the country as a whole the ratio of divorce has reached the high mark of at least one to every seven mar-

riages. The constant grinding of the divorce mills is a blot upon the fair name of our country. It will bring us to the brink of ruin unless we can check it.

Then again, among the chief foes of socal righteousness we must place the modern dance. From the earliest time, dancing has been associated with the vices that tear down and destroy the human race. It is an immoral institution. It is a well known fact that thousands of young girls are lost to decent society annually through the dance. The finished products of this unsavory institution are sufficient to condemn it to the Christian mind.

Then, again, we call attention to the movie industry. The commercialized movie industry does not exist for art nor for the elevation of the people primarily, but for dividends. It is a covetous, mammonworshipping, money-seeking institution. This industry could be one of the greatest agencies for training in good citizenship, if properly conducted since so many millions of our people attend the movies daily. But, so far, no one has succeeded in changing the minds and cleansing the hearts of those who control the making of pictures.

Again, we fully recognize the various forms of social activity which comes within the scope of the work of this commission. We are glad to know that the General Conference Commission is holding regular summer conferences at Lake Junaluska and Mount Sequoiah at which for a full week there is a series of helpful addresses and round-table discussions concerning the applications of the teaching of Jesus to the practical every-day life.

In view of these existing conditions your committee begs leave to offer the following resolutions:

- 1. That we go on record again as being eternally opposed to the beverage liquor traffic; that we oppose any modification of the Volstead Act which would favor the manufacture and sale of light wine and beer; that we call upon our people to co-operate with the proper agencies for the enforcement of the law; that we pledge our support to the Anti-Saloon League of Virginia, of Maryland, and of West Virginia, the W. C. T. U. and the world league; that we recognize the great loss which the cause of prohibition has sustained in the death of Wayne B. Wheeler.
- 2. That we denounce the dance as an unholy institution and warn our people of the degrading influence it has on those who engage in it.
- 3. That we call attention to the divorce evil by publicly speaking against it and by refusing to marry divorced persons, except as provided by the laws of the Church and the word of God; that we go on record in favor of a uniform divorce law for the whole country.
- 4. That we call the attention of our preachers and laymen to the Annual Conference on Temperance and Social Service to be held at Lake Junaluska, South Carolina, this summer, and we trust that a large number of our people will attend this conference.

- 2. That we endorse the Membership Program of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland and urge our Churches, Sunday Schools and members to take some one of the memberships.
- 3. That we commend the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland in aiding in certain helpful legislation during the last session of the Maryland legislature.
- 4. That our Presiding Elders be requested to put Sabbath Observance in the District Conference Program.
- 5. That this Conference name Dr. Carlton D. Harris a member of the Educational Committee of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, HOME OF THE AGED AND ORPHANS OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH SOUTH, INCORPORATED, AND LOCATED AT GAITHERSBURG, MD.

The Executive Committee has held twenty-six meetings during the year and the Board of Trustees two. The duties of the Executive Committee have covered a larger variety of interests than formerly.

Last year our problem was in the form of securing funds and constructing a suitable building to house the dependent and aged of our Conference. This year the major problems have been that of more money, building an organization to run the Home and selecting the residents for the same.

Scores of inquiries have been answered. Sixty-three applications have been presented in due form and of this number about forty-seven have been approved, however, after allowing for withdrawals, deaths and removals for other causes, we report forty-two residents now living in the Home, and the prospect of about five more in the next few weeks.

Two small tracts of land have been purchased to improve the lines of the farm. A dwelling house on one of these tracts is being used at the present time for a tenant house. Two barns have been built costing more than \$7,000.00. One building is a first-class dairy barn and the other an adequate horse and feed barn.

The big problem which constantly confronts us, in which you are particularly interested, is that of maintenance. We have a very definite policy to meet this need, recommended and adopted at the last session of the Annual Conference—a goal of 2,000 sustaining subscribers at \$10.00 per year. About 400 of these subscriptions have been secured to date.

Other sources of income are the Mother's Day offering from the congregations and the Christmas offering from the Sunday Schools, but so long as only one congregation out of eight and one-half, and one Sunday School out of every two respond to this call, we cannot depend entirely upon them to provide the bread and fuel for this Institution.

Some interesting facts have been gathered from the Treasurer's report. The amount collected since April 1, 1926, \$\$1,115.42 as compared to \$55,368.55 the preceding year. The total expenditure being \$77,562.95, leaving a balance of \$3,552.46. The amount contributed by seventy-seven congregations \$1,091.56. The amount contributed by 344 Sunday Schools \$5,437.26. The proceeds from the farm \$7,419.19, and in addition thereto the farm has supplied the Home with milk, meat and vegetables conservatively estimated at \$1,650.00, making the actual income from the farm \$9,069.19. The cost of running the Home for seventeen months amounts to \$7,845.75. This is approximately \$462.00 per month, or about \$15.00 per person per month, since the time of opening.

Many delicate and perplexing situations have arisen from time to time respecting the administration of the Home. We have found a way out of each difficulty and tried to profit thereby. We have learned that creating an organization and policy for an institution like this is a difficult task. The untiring efforts, the unusual ability and interest, as well as the oft unappreciated sacrifice which Brother Ringer has invested in the Home, have been nothing less than heroic. The con-

stant responsibility of financing the institution, and the more perplexing experience of supervising the Home, has been burden enough to crush any man who would attempt to bear it alone. Surely God has been his refuge and strength.

We believe the facts in this report indicate steady progress in the direction of stablizing the newest project of the Baltimore Conference We feel keenly the need of a closer medium of communication between the management and the constituency of the Home. When the people are fully acquainted with the needs and realize that the Home is playing the good Samaritan, daily, to the many unfortunate and homeless folk within our territory, we shall have accomplished our first objective and will thereby pave the way for a truly great institution in our midst.

The following officers have been elected by the Board of Trustees for the ensuing year: Rev. J. Howard Wells, President; Rev. E. V. Regester, Vice-President; Rev. E. A. Lambert, Secretary; and W. M. Magruder, Treasurer.

Recommendations.

FIRST: We request Bishop Collins Denny to appoint Rev. J. J. Ringer as Superintendent for the Home for the coming year.

SECOND: We urgently request all Pastors and Superintendents to give each congregation and Sunday School an opportunity to make a free-will offering for the support of the Home, preferably at Christmas time and Mother's Day; and further, that hearty co-operation be given the Financial Secretary in securing a sufficient number of "Maintenance Subscriptions" to fully guarantee the running expense of the Home.

THIRD: We recommend the following Trustees, subject to the confirmation of the Conference:

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN METHODIST PUBLISHING CO.

The Southern Methodist Publishing Company comes up to this Conference with all bills paid, and with a balance in the treasury.

This financial showing is due to the fine executive ability of the Rev. Selwyn K. Cockrell, Editor and Business Manager, and to his Assistant, Miss Maude E. Hodges.

The Board of Directors has been greatly concerned over the reduced number of subscribers, and the lack of interest and support from our preachers and people.

This evidently is the result of the increasing difficulty of circulating religious papers, which all denominations are experiencing, emphasized, in our case, by the growing dissatisfaction with the part-time and part-paid editorial policy to which the Board has been necessarily restricted.

As the paper is sold for \$1.50, and costs something over \$2.00 to produce, it is readily seen that the present assessment is inadequate to allow the adoption of a policy that will produce a satisfactory paper, and one worthy of our great Conference. Surely the Old Baltimore Conference, which is freely giving its thousands of dollars to other interests, can well afford to spend something more to strengthen itself from within.

Recognizing this need and demand for a better paper, the Board of Directors respectfully asks the Conference for a sufficient assessment to allow the employment of an efficient, full-time Editor.

We make the following recommendations:

- (1) That the Conference request Bishop Collins Denny, our presiding Bishop, to appoint the Rev. Carlton D. Harris editor of the paper, without a pastoral charge.
 - (2) That the assessment be \$9,000.
- (3) That the month of May be set apart for a campaign for building up the circulation of the paper, the details of which are to be worked out by the Executive Committee, and published in due time.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE HOSPITAL BOARD.

Your Conference Hospital Board reports a continued growth and an increasing interest in this great work of healing ministry in our Southern Methodism. The report of our General Board is inspiring and should stir the hearts of our ministry and laity to a greater interest and zeal in this too long delayed effort. It shows a property value of \$8,000,000 in our hospitals now in service. Since the last General Conference about \$2,500,000 worth of properties have been or are now being put into service. These hospitals have in use 1000

beds; they treat 23,000 patients a year; and have a gross income of \$1,500,000. They have eight Nurse Training Schools, where 450 young women are being trained in this healing ministry. The doors of opportunity are swinging open, presenting an ever-increasing cry for our occupancy.

The source of our assistance, in this work, at the present, is found in the Golden Cross Enrollment which our College of Bishops have strongly emphasized and which the last General Conference has made obligatory upon each Church in our Great Church. We are informed that the Golden Cross Enrollment has been more generally observed than ever before, and larger results have been achieved.

In the language of the College of Bishops, we urge that our pastors observe diligently and faithfully the annual enrollment period which has been set by the General Hospital Board, viz: the week including the second and third Sundays in May, known as Hospital Week.

We recommend the appointment of J. R. Poland by the Conference, as Conference director; and request each of the Presiding Elders to appoint a District Director, whose name and post-office address they will give to the Conference Director; and that these Directors be given the opportunity of presenting the work at their District Conference.

We also recommend that the General Hospital Board be instructed to direct 80% of the funds received from the Golden Cross Enrollment in our Conference to the Southern Methodist Hospital and Sanatorium, Tucson, Arizona, which is connectional, in its tubercular work.

We further recommend that the Conference Hospital Board be permitted to request the Commission on Budget to include in their work a small amount to enable your board to carry on its work.

MEMOIRS.

JOHN A. KERN.

Rev. John Adam Kern, the son of Nimrod and Eliza Bentley Kern, was born near Winchester, Frederick County, Virginia, April 23, 1846, and died at the home of his son, Dr. Paul B. Kern, Dallas, Texas, March 23, 1926. The funeral was held in Braddock Street Church, Winchester, Va., during the session of the Annual Conference 1925-26. Two of the bishops, Bishops Candler and Denny, the members of the Conference and a host of friends were in attendance.

The services, by personal request, were in charge of Rev. H. M. Canter, D.D., Presiding Elder of the Winchester District, and Rev. E. L. Woolf, D.D., Presiding Elder of the Roanoke District. Six of the brethren of the Conference, students of Dr. Kern at Randolph-Macon College, bore his body to Mt. Hebron Cemetery to rest by the side of the body of his wife to await the quickening of the same spirit that brought up Jesus Christ from among the dead.

Dr. Kern was united in marriage to Margaret Virginia Eskridge, daughter of Rev. A. A. Eskridge, of the Baltimore Conference, January 28, 1875. Four children were born of this union, namely: Leroy E., Technical Secretary of the American Institute of Architects, New York City; Alfred A., Professor of English, Randolph-Macon Woman's College, Lynchburg, Va.; Paul B., Pastor of Travis Park Methodist Episcopal Church, South, San Antonio, Texas, and Katrina K., wife of Rev. J. M. Ormand, Duke University, Durham, N.C.

His early training was received in the public and private schools of Winchester, Virginia. He taught school for a year prior to his entering the Ministry. A great teacher was already in the making. Several years after entering the ministry he was located at his own request in order to pursue his studies at the University of Virginia where he diligently applied himself during the sessions of 1868-70.

Dr. Kern was licensed to preach at a very early age, at Stephens City, Virginia, February, 1864. He was admitted on trial at the historic Conference held in Alexandria, Virginia, 1866, presided over by Bishop Early. Here he received his first appointment, Junior Preacher on Berkeley Circuit, under Rev. David Shoaff. In 1867 at the Conference held at Trinity, Baltimore, he was appointed to Howard Chapel, Baltimore, Md. At Central, Baltimore, 1868, he was admitted into full connection, ordained deacon by Bishop Doggett and granted a location to attend the University of Virginia. He was re-admitted at the Conference held at St. Paul's, Baltimore, March 1870, and appointed Junior Preacher to Rockville Circuit under Rev. Dabney Ball. In 1871, at the Conference held at Salem, Va., he was

ordained elder by Bishop Pierce and appointed to East Baltimore Station. In 1872 he served as Junior Preacher at Mt. Vernon Place, Washington, D. C., under Dr. S. S. Roszel. In 1873 he was pastor of Kent Charge, Maryland; 1874-77 pastor of Central, Baltimore; 1878-80 Salem, Va.; 1881-84 Alexandria, Va.; 1885-86 Warrenton, Va. In the Fall of 1886 he went to Randolph-Macon College to accept the chair of Moral Philosophy and of the English Bible. In 1898 he was elected President of the College. He resigned the presidency in June, 1899, and accepted the chair of Practical Theology in the Theological Department of Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tennessee. No doubt his averseness to the presidency of Randolph-Macon influenced him in accepting the position at Vanderbilt. The duties of an executive were irksome to him. He remained at Vanderbilt until the University was lost to the church, whereupon he returned to Randolph-Macon to accept the chair of Christian Institutions. Here in 1922, owing to the condition of the health, both of himself and of his wife, he closed the active labors of along and useful career and spent the remainder of his days in the homes of his children.

Dr. Kern was an unusual preacher. He was unsurpassed in the choice of a text, the discovery of its truth and the unfolding of its theme—to hear him inevitably awakened within the heart of listening preachers the passion to know how to preach. Simple in style, apt in illustration, logical in presentation and transparent in thought he was gladly heard. "The Ministry to the Congregation," the child of his own brain and heart betrays the greatness of John A. Kern as a minister of the gospel.

But he was pre-eminently a teacher. Twenty-one years in the pastorate were stepping stones to the throne upon which he sat as a teacher. He was perfectly at home in the subjects he taught, completely one with the pupils at his feet, thoroughly familiar with the laws of pedagogy. He knew what he taught, he knew those whom he taught, and he knew best how to teach. How his pupils respected him and his subjects! His class-room was all but a sanctuary. Enrollment in his classes was accepting the challenge to the highest ideals of the class-room. How versatile he was! Think of the subjects he taught—Political Economy, Moral Philosophy, Logic, New Testament Introduction and Exegesis, Homiletics, Pastoral Theology, Christian Institutions—and at his best in every one of them.

Dr. Kern made no small contribution to the Church. His own personality is a bequest beyond comparison—Christian simplicity and unselfishness marked every detail of his life. He sought no right-hand or left-hand place in the Kingdom. He achieved greatness but it was reached over the path of service. He has set his Conference an ideal for the minister in the pulpit and in the pastorate that will continue to call us to the heights throughout the succeeding

years. No man every taught by him was known to imitate him, and yet his impress is upon not a few of the preachers of his Conference.

He was a thinker—original, clear, accurate, liberal. Sure of his own convictions, he was considerate of the beliefs of others. Scholarly though he was, he never lost the evangelistic passion. Nothing pleased him more than the tiding of new-born souls under the ministry of those whom he had helped to fashion for their ministry.

In addition to the gift of himself he made no small contribution in the books he wrote between the years 1397 and 1915: "The Ministry to the Congregation," "The Way of the Preacher," "The Idea of the Church," "Christian Institutions," "The Listening Heart," "Vision and Power," are the product of his ready pen. Varied as they seem, all bear upon the work of the Christian Minister, a work that filled the horizon of his life, enlisted the energies of his spirit and led him to a full consecration of his all that he might apprehend that for which he was apprehended by Christ Jesus.

Singleness of purpose ran through the whole of his life. "This one thing I do," was his motto, and that one thing was to be a good minister of Jesus Christ. His pupils may at times have thought his demands severe, but he was only seeking to impress upon them his own ideal of the Christian Ministry; to be diligent in its business, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord.

He never sought an honor but he was not without them. He represented his Annual Conference four times in the General Conference, leading the delegation in 1890, his first election. He received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from Washington and Lee University in 1899, and the degree of Doctor of Laws from Randolph-Macon in 1910.

Tireless in duty he wrought with both hands, earnestly. Even physical pain was no excuse when duty called. Never robust physically, he gladly burned out that others might share with him a bit of the light of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

In him we have a noble heritage, but we have lost a great personality—great as a man, great as a thinker, great as a teacher, great as a preacher. He was not ours alone. He belonged to the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. He belonged to Methodism. His influence has gone out to the ends of it.

May the spirit of this ascended prophet of Jehovah abide with us, to enable us rightly to divide the Word of Truth and faithfully to shepherd the flock of God:

"Servant of God, well done, Rest from thy loved employ; The battle fought, the victory won, Enter thy Master's joy."

MURPHY DULANEY ELLMORE.

The pleasant and inspiring friendship which existed between the subject and the writer of this sketch began when the former was a student at Randolph-Macon Academy, Front Royal, Virginia, in the year 1911. It was there as a young man and an earnest student and Christian worker, that he endeared himself to all who knew him. As a student Brother Ellmore exemplified those sterling qualities of leadership and spiritual zeal which made him a successful pastor and an effective preacher of the Word.

Rev. Murphy Dulaney Ellmore was born at Ryan, Loudoun County, Virginia, August 24, 1884. His father was the late John Washington Ellmore, and his mother, who still survives, was formerly Miss Pleasant Houser. The loss of his father made it necessary for him to leave school at the age of seventeen and to seek employment to assist in the support of the bereaved family. Four years were spent in the mercantile business in his home town. But coincident with his conversion came the call to preach the Gospel; and, like the Apostle Paul, immediately he counseled not with flesh and blood, realizing, as that Apostle did, that when God's call is clear human counsel is of no avail, except to render that call less distinct. He at once entered Randolph-Macon Academy in order to begin his preparation for his sacred calling. After three years of study here he entered the Baltimore Conference in 1914, taking up the active work of the ministry. He was ordained Deacon in 1916 by Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon, and was made Elder by Bishop James Atkins in Baltimore in 1918.

Subsequent to his admission on trial Brother Ellmore served the following charges: Calvert Circuit, as Junior Preacher, 1914, transferrnig before the end of the year to Patuxent, where he remained until 1916; Kent, 1916-17; Mount Jackson, 1917-22; Edinburg, 1922-26; Romney, 1926 to the end of the chapter, which was much nearer than he or anyone else realized.

When a pastor has spent four pleasant years on a pastoral charge, realizing that he must move on to other fields of labor, there are two questions of paramount importance, and which fill him with deep concern. One of these is the question of his own future relationship and work; the other the matter of who his successor shall be, in this case by no means the least of the two. It was, therefore, the source of no little pleasure and gratification to the present writer when the Bishop, in reading out the appointments, said: "Romney, M. D. Ellmore." The appointment seemed to carry with it the assurance that the interests of this thriving church had been entrusted to safe hands. It was a genuine pleasure to be still present and to assist in welcoming this young, and we supposed, vigorous worker in the Lord's vineyard. Had we known how soon his promising pastorate was to be brought to an end by the ruthless hand of death there

would have been a pang of sadness through it all. But a loving Heavenly Father graciously hides from us the future, in order that we may do our very best work right up to the end. Brother Ellmore had a bare four months in which to organize his work and to endear himself to the hearts of his people; and to say that he accomplished this in a manner in which few, if any, have been able to do, is the highest tribute that can be paid to his genius as a pastor. His memory still lingers with the people of Romney and the surrounding community as a wholesome benediction; but this fact did not hinder their reception of his successor with open arms and the heartiest co-operation.

Brother Ellmore was called home from the Memorial Hospital, Leesburg, Va., on the second day of August, 1926. Only a few days before he had gone with his family to enjoy a well earned vacation at the old home; but was suddenly stricken with peritonitis. He was hastened to the hospital, where everything was done for him that human skill and wisdom could do, but to no avail. The end came quickly, and he answered the call as a brave soldier of Jesus Christ. His remains were laid to rest in the cemetery at that place beside his daughter. The funeral was conducted in the Leesburg Memorial Methodist Church August 4th, 1926, by the Rev. J. B. Hupman, who had married Brother Ellmore twelve years before. The following brethren of the Conference assisted in the services: The Revs. F. T. Ridgeway, Glenn J. Cooper and C. M. Wright. The Revs. W. Clark Early, L. H. Richcreek, L. H. Smallwood, J. A. Johnson, F. F. Neel and Glenn J. Cooper tenderly carried the body to its last resting place, laying it close beside his little Virginia Gray, who had preceded him to the Heavenly home.

What a meeting there must have been with the one so dearly loved and lost a while, and with the dear Saviour into whose keeping she had been intrusted with a sublime and beautiful faith. Fancy, we hope, does not wholly deceive us, as we try to picture that scene. In our imagination we see her running to meet him with outstretched arms, and crying out in her childish glee: "Oh father, is it you? I was not looking for you so soon, for you always seemed to have so much to do. But I am so glad you have come." And then the father heart responds: "I think God sent me to keep you company. Were you not lonely without us? "Oh, yes," we hear her say, "I missed you very much indeed, but I knew you would come. And then nobody is ever lonely here, for Jesus is here. But where are mother and brother? Did you leave them well and happy?" "Well, but not happy; for they were very sad when I came away. But our loving Heavenly Father kept them, for their work is not yet done. He will take care of them, and in His service they will forget their sorrow, knowing that we are waiting for them here." This, we may fancy, at least, was the father's reply. At least it is just what we should expect him to say out of his sublime faith and love, and his deep and abiding confidence in Him who doeth all things well.

Besides the bereaved widow, who was formerly Miss Lena Gray Rollins, to whom he was married in 1914, Brother Ellmore leaves one son, Emory Staley, a bright and promising lad of eleven years. Sister Ellmore, who was an ideal preacher's wife, and a never-failing help to her husband in his ministry, has found useful work to do as matron in the Home for the Aged at Gaithersburg, Md.; and the son, when his education is completed, will, we feel sure, fulfill his father's wishes, as he seeks to know and to do the Master's will.

The following tribute is from Rev. Frank A. Tyler, D.D., who was for four years his Presiding Elder:

"He was a man of conviction, following his ideas of right even to the severance of friendship. Always a student, he endeavored to inform himself that he might lead his people into the truth. Perhaps his personality most clearly revealed itself in his home life. An indulgent father, a gentle husband, he lived to exemplify the spirit of hospitality. His guest always left his home refreshed in body and in spirit; he was one of Christ's gentlemen.

And now the battle is over,
And now he wears the crown,
"Of full and everlasting
And passionless renown."
For He who loved and called him,
He now sees face to face;
Forever to adore Him,
Who saved him by His grace."

HUBERT WILBUR LINDAMOOD.

Hubert Wilbur Lindamood, son of Enos and Sarah Lindamood, was born near McGaheysville, Virginia, June 30, 1869, and died at the Winchester Memorial Hospital, November 21, 1926. His educational advantages were limited to the public schools. He learned the carpenter trade and worked for a number of years with the well known firm of Eutsler Brothers. When about twenty-three years of age he made a profession of religion in a meeting conducted by the Rev. J. Harry Smith at Fairview, then an appointment on the Bridgewater Circuit, and united with our church. From this little country church four preachers in the space of a few years came. He soon felt the call to preach, but fearing that his educational limitations would hinder his admission into our conference, he transferred to the United Brethren Church (Old Constitution) and preached under the auspices of that church some thirteen years. Then he returned to the church

of his first choice and was licensed to preach. For eight years he served as a supply, serving Rockbridge one year, Frostburg one, Listonburg two, Crab Bottom four, and Springfield one. At the conference in Roanoke, 1923, he was admitted on trial and sent to the Gainsboro charge, where he was serving his fourth year at the time of his death. At our last conference, he lacked one book, Logic, of completing his second year's course and so was continued in the class of the second year. No doubt he would have been received into full connection had he passed those studies, but as it is he will go down in our "In Memoriam" list, along with five others, as a probationer, one of whom, Sam D. Bennington, also died on the Springfield charge.

Brother Lindamood was eminently a good man. During his ministry with us he had quite a number of conversions; one year sixty-six were reported received by profession of faith. He was also quite successful as a pastor. He was a man of deep religious conviction and his life as a man and a minister impressed every community in which he lived.

Brother Lindamood leaves his wdow, who was formerly Miss Annie Bageant of Gainsboro, Virginia, and three children, Ralph W., of Cumberland, Maryland; Mrs. Margaret Newman, of Crab Bottom, Virginia; and Miss Janet, at home.

Brother Lindamood's health had been failing for some time and two weeks before the end he was brought to the Winchester Memorial Hospital. But his work was done. His body was taken back to his home at Gainsboro and from our chourch there his funeral was held in the presence of a throng of sorrowing parishioners and friends. His presiding elder, Rev. H. V. Wheeler, had charge of the services and at his invitation the nine other ministers present had some part. The interment was in the beautiful Mt. Hebron Cemetery, Winchester, Virginia, by the side of his two children, who had preceded him to the glory land. So he has slipped away but we know where to find him.

CHRISTOPHER SYDENSTRICKER.

Christopher Sydenstricker, son of Andrew and Frances Coffman Sydenstricker, was born in Greenbrier Co., W. Va., April 25, 1846, and died in Charles Town, W. Va., June 19, 1927. Brother Sydenstricker was of German descent. About the middle of the 18th century his parents emigrated from Pennsylvania to the Valley of Virginia, and later to Greenbrier Co., W. Va. This home was a religious shrine from which went out five ministers of the gospel.

His education was begun in a school house on his father's farm. The school house was also the preaching place for the community, and fro mthis humble institution went out fourteen ministers to the Methodist and Presbyterian churches, one of whom is the subject of this sketch.

In 1860 he was born again under the ministry of Rev. P. S. E. Sixes. When but a youth of eighteen he was called to serve in the Confederate Army, 26th Virginia Battalion, Company D. As in every other relation in life he served faithfully as a soldier of his country. In the same army were Rev. A. A. P. Neel, and the father of the writer. These comrades strengthened each other's faith in their Lord by frequent prayer meetings and private talks while in camp.

In 1869 he was happily married to Miss Elizabeth Tuckwiller Johnson. He was a successful farmer till in 1885 he yielded to the urgent call of the ministry and was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Frankford Circuit, and the following year, 1886, joined the Baltimore Conference and served the following charges: Blue Sulphur 1886-90, Levelton 1890-94, Romney 1894-98, Loudoun 1898-1902, Hamilton 1902-03, Jefferson 1903-07, Occoquan 1907-11, Shepherdstown 1911-15, Stephens City 1915-20, Edinburg 1920-22.

Long before Brother Sydenstricker entered the ministry he was a leading layman, a close student of the Bible, an outstanding worker in the Sunday School and other organizations of the Church. During his entire ministry he was a constant and diligent student. Though serving Circuits always—and usually the largest ones—he never failed to read from 20,000 to 25,000 pages per year. Not having had the preparation he desired, he worked with untiring energy to fit himself for the most useful ministry possible. He read widely in theology and devoured the writings of the best thinkers in the Armenian field. It is not surprising that he became one of the best expounders in the Conference of Armenian Theology. His reading also included other subjects—philosophical, social, historical. He had a missionary passion and he always quickened the missionary interests in the charges which he served.

He built thirteen churches and greatly improved many others. His ministry was fruitful in the conversion of the unsaved and the edification of believers. He always felt the dignity of his high calling and said frequently that above everything else he would rather be a preacher than to have any position in the world.

In 1913 he suffered a broken hip from the effects of which he never recovered. In 1921 he had a nervous breakdown, and was forced to take the superannuate relation in March, 1922. After that time he did such work as he was able. It was always a cross to him that he could not be in the active service.

For fifteen months preceding his death he was confined to the hospital in Charles Town. He died peacefully June 19th, just when the church bells were calling the worshippers to the morning service. He had wished to die at such a time on the Sabbath day.

He is survived by his wife, three daughters-Mrs. C. W. Snyder,

Mrs. L. H. Armentrout, Mrs. C. M. Alder-and one son, Rev. Hubert Sydenstricker.

His funeral services were conducted in the Methodist Church at Charles Town, W. Va., by Rev. T. J. Lambert, assisted by Rev. H. M. Canter, D.D., Rev. H. P. Hamill, D.D., Rev. A. E. Rhoades, and Rev. E. L. Woolf, D.D. His body was laid to rest in the cemetery at Charles Town. A loyal servant of our Lord, a true defender of the faith has gone from among us.

GEORGE HARRISON ECHOLS.

George Harrison Echols, son of John W. and Ellen N. Echols, was born near Newport, Virginia, March 11, 1864. After a lingering illness of six months he went to his eternal reward, September 8th, 1927, at Williamsburg, W. Va., where he was preacher in charge.

The burial services were conducted by his Presiding Elder, Rev. G. W. Richardson, assisted by eleven preachers of the Lewisburg District, on September 10th. The body was placed in the cemetery adjoining the M. E. Church, South, to await the resurrection of the just.

Brother Echols was licensed to preach, February 17th, 1894, and joined the Baltimore Conference in 1895.

On June 24th, 1896, he was united in marriage to Minnie G. Dilly, of Sunset, W. Va., who made him a devoted and helpful wife. To this union were born eleven children, all of whom are living.

He was ordained Deacon at Staunton, Va., March 28th, 1897, by Bishop Charles B. Galloway, and ordained an Elder, April 7th, 1901, by Bishop O. P. Fitzgerald.

He served the following appointments: Huntersville, W. Va., and while there he organized our Church at Marlinton, W. Va., and started the building of the first Methodist Church in Marlinton, which now with its splendid new Church stands as one of our best appointments. He served Huntersville two years; Green Sulphur Springs, W. Va., two years; Peterstown, W. Va., two years; Newport, Va. (his old home) two years; Fairfield, Va., three years; Springfield, W. Va., New Hope, Va.; Cloverdale, Va., two years; Green Bank, W. Va., four years; Levelton Circuit, W. Va., three years; Williamsburg, W. Va., two and one-half years.

Brother Echols was a splendid preacher, thoroughly grounded in the doctrines of his beloved Methodism. While his early educational advantages were meager, with his naturally quick and alert mind he in a large measure overcame this handicap. He was clean and clear cut in his preaching, and the trumpet which he blew gave no uncertain sound, but was a clarion call to repentance and warfare against the forces of evil. Though handicapped with a frail body and precarious

health through all the years of his ministry, he gave unstintedly of the last ounce of his strength and devotion to his work. Many souls were his hire, as he was flamingly evangelistic in his spirit and preaching.

He bore his illness with Christian patience and fortitude, resigning with undimmed and unquestioned faith his all into the hands of Him, whom he loved and served. His brave soul goes marching on, and the impact of the Divine Truth he loosed on earth will be gathered as a rich harvest in the granaries of Heaven. He left as his last message to his brethren of the Conference, II Timothy, 4th Chapter, 5th to 9th verses. Well indeed could these glorious words be said of him: "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous Judge shall give me at that day."

JUDGE E. D. NEWMAN.

The subject of this memoir, Judge E. D. Newman, was born at Woodstock, Virginia, March 26, 1854, but spent his early years at Liberty Furnace, Virginia, where his father and paternal grandfather had long been engaged in the iron business. As a youngster he went to school to a private instructor, and later to the Woodstock Academy and the High School. He attended the Duffield's School, in West Virginia, and later Randolph-Macon College. In 1873 Judge Newman returned home from school on account of bad health, but later attended Virginia Military Institute, graduating in 1876 as one of the honor men of his class.

There being little opportunity for the engineering profession, Judge Newman studied law, and was admitted to the bar in 1878. While studying law, he was associated with his brother in the manufacture of farming implements in Woodstock. While thus engaged, he was offered an opportunity to go to South America on a big engineering project, but declined it. He settled down to his law office and became a partner of his brother-in-law, M. L. Walton, of the firm of Walton and Walton.

The Virginia Assembly in 1885 elected Judge Newman Judge of the County Court of Shenandoah. He remained on the bench for twelve years, returning in 1898 to resume his practice of law. Judge Newman's activities as a lawyer have been principally related to civil cases. He combined with his legal knowledge a splendid knowledge of business, which brought him into demand for legal consultation relating to business. He appeared in many cases in the State and Federal courts. Judge Newman, while an excellent lawyer, was primarily a business man. He inherited much of his

fine business sense from a family that were pioneers in the Valley in the manufacture and management of the Valley's iron industry. He turned his attention to the banking business, in which he became one of the leading bankers of the Valley. He turned his great business genius to other activities. There seemed no end to his activities.

Judge Newman's contribution in time and talent to the General Church was a large one. He served on the Vanderbilt University Commission and represented the Church in her controversy with the trustees of that institution. He was a member of the General Conference of 1922, which met at Hot Springs, Arkansas, and of the special session of the same Conference which met at Chattanooga, Tennessee, in 1925. At the time of his death he was a member of the General Board of Lay Activities.

For years he has been the Conference Lay Leader, and it was under his inspiring leadership that the Missionary Centenary was launched and carried through so successfully, and later the Christian Education Movement. That the Baltimore Conference has made such a favorable showing, as compared with other Conferences of our connection, is due largely to the ability and energy of him who was the Conference Director of these two great church-wide movements.

For years Judge Newman has been a member of the Board of Trustees of the Randolph-Macon System of schools, the President of the Board at the time of his death, and the Chairman of the Executive Committee. He was the Chairman of the Building Committee which erected the first building of the Front Royal Academy, which was destroyed by fire, and deeply interested in the rebuilding of the same, meeting often with the present committee, and at the risk of his life, because of serious heart trouble. He was a member of the Conference Board of Education, and a member of the Board of Missions, where his counsel and interest and service were so valuable.

In the local church Judge Newman was indeed a pillar, a tower of strength. For years he was the teacher of a large Bible Class, and no class ever had a more faithful and devoted teacher. He had a large store of knowledge, and a rich and deep religious experience—in every way capable of giving to the members of his class the instruction and inspiration that they might need.

For years he was the Church Treasurer, and no church ever had a more painstaking, careful and accurate official. He was an expert in figures, and took great pride and joy in doing this particular part of the church work, and seeing that the church records were kept in order as the Recording Secretary of the Quarterly Conference, as well as the Church Treasurer.

Judge Newman died suddenly on the streets of Winchester, Virginia, September 21, 1927, after attending a business conference.

His death was not unexpected, for he, as well as the members of his family, knew that the end might come at any time; but he continued to do a man's work in both business and church, and preferred to die in the harness. When the end did come, it found him ready to meet his Lord, whom he had served for many years so faithfully and loyally. The Judge joined the Church in 1873, under the ministry of brother James H. March, the father of Mrs. M. L. Walton, and for fifty-four years he had been a faithful and active member of the Woodstock Methodist Church.

His funeral was held in the Church which he so dearly loved, and the services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. W. D. Keene, assisted by Dr. H. M. Canter, Dr. H. P. Hamill and Dr. S. C. Hatcher. The Governor of the Commonwealth was present, and large numbers of professional and business men from many localities. The church was filled to overflowing by the many friends and admirers of him who for many years had been so prominent and useful in business and church circles. Dr. Anderson, of the Randolph-Macon Woman's College, Dr. Blackwell and Dr. Hatcher, of the College at Ashland, Professor Melton and brother Chalmers, of the Academy at Front Royal, were present to show their appreciation of the great service that Judge Newman had rendered the whole Randolph-Macon System.

Judge Newman was a man of the highest type of character. transparency of his character was manifested to all, and all who knew him were aware of what was in his heart and of what he stood for in his life. His sincerity and integrity were his outstanding traits of character. His life made a profound impression. He was a man of prayer and brought his family up in the fear of the Lord. Mr. G. L. Morelock, the General Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities, sent a telegram of sympathy to the family, which read: "Strong, courageous, of absolute integrity, unimpeachable character, unfaltering faith in God, our Church, our Lay Board, our country, lost one of their noblest." Dr. Duffey, who served so many years with Judge Newman on the Board of Trustees of Randolph-Macon College, in his telegram to the family, said: "I have known many good and useful laymen, but for unflagging devotion and complete consecration, I have never known his superior, if his equal." The opinions of these two church leaders could be duplicated by others. Judge Newman was an unusual man in his ability and character, and he will be greatly missed in the Conference, and in his local church, home and community, for he was a great force for righteousness and good works.




