

Conference met pursuant to adjournment.

The Nomination of Trustees for the Francis Asbury School, made by the Board of Education, the Board of Missions, the Sunday School Board and the Epworth League Board, were presented and, upon motion, they were elected.

The Report of the Board of Trustees of the Home for the Aged and Orphans was presented and read and, upon motion, was adopted with regard to those portions of the Report upon which the Conference was called to act.

The following Resolution was presented, read and, upon motion, adopted:

"In view of America's providential opportunity to save and train a generation of children in Bible Lands, orphaned by recent wars and deportations;

"In view of the constructive work being done for these orphans through Near East Relief; and

"In view of the endorsement and urgent request of our last General Conference.

"The Baltimore Annual Conference hereby requests the General Conference Committee on Near East Relief to give our Churches and Sunday Schools an official message concerning the present work over-seas, the need for support and the method of International Golden Rule Sunday Observance."

QUESTION FORTY-FOUR of the General Minutes was called, viz., Where shall the next Session of the Annual Conference be held?

An invitation from Central Church, Cumberland, the other Churches in Cumberland co-operating, to hold the next session of the Annual Conference in that place, was presented and, upon motion, was unanimously accepted.

The following Constitutional Question, handed down by the General Conference of May, 1926, for the approval of the Annual Conference, was presented and read:

"The Clerical Representatives shall be elected by the Clerical members of the Annual Conference; provided that such representatives have been traveling preachers at least four years next preceding their election, and are in full connection with the Annual Conference which elects them when elected, and also at the time when holding the General Conference.

"The lay representatives shall be elected by the lay members of the Annual Conference; provided that such representatives be twenty-five years of age and shall have been members of our Church for at least six calendar years next preceding the time of their election, and also at the time of holding the General Conference; provided that, if such representative elected shall change his membership to another congregation outside the boundaries of the Annual Conference which elected him, the alternate shall take the seat in the General Conference in order of election."

By unanimous consent the Bishop was requested to explain the proposed Constitutional change.

One hundred and fifty-three members of the Conference were present and voted. 10 voted Aye and 143 voted No.

Upon motion, the Baltimore Southern Methodist was requested to print the Report of the Committee on Temperance and Social Service.

The Secretary presented the matter of keeping the permanent Records of the Conference and, upon motion, he was instructed to have bound the Printed Minutes instead of transcribing them in typewritten form.

A message of Greeting was received from F. T. Griffith.

The Secretary was instructed to send telegrams of sympathy to the family of Rev. C. D. Harris because of his death and to Rev. and Mrs. J. H. Wells because of the death of Mrs. King.

INTRODUCTIONS: Rev. George E. Booker, D. D., Presiding Elder, Richmond District; Rev. H. C. Pifer, D. D., of Charlottsville; Rev. J. T. Moore, D. D., all of the Virginia Conference; Rev. S. C. Hatcher, D. D., Vice-President of Randolph-Macon College; Rev. Thomas Priddy, of the Holston Conference; Rev. C. N. Coffman, of the Charleston District, and Rev. A. J. Gearhead of the Western Virginia Conference; Rev. A. M. Frazier, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Staunton, Va., and Dr. F. L. Day, of Randolph-Macon College, were severally introduced to the Conference.

Rev. C. C. Jarrell, D. D., Secretary of the General Hospital Board, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Conference united in singing Hymn No. 279:

and adjourned, with the Benediction by Rev. S. C. Hatcher, D. D., to meet tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock.

The Recommendations of Conrad William Jordan of the Baltimore District Conference and John Franklin Owens of the Richmond District Conference of the Virginia Conference were presented and, having passed in Examination before the Committee on the Course of Study and having been recommended by the Committee on Admissions, they were admitted on Trial.

The names of Charles Fadely Phillips and Edwin Samuels Sheppe, Jr., were called and the Committees of Examination reported that each had completed the entire Course of Study.

Permission to retire was granted to the Trustees of Home for Aged and Orphans.

Report number one of the Board of Finance, dealing with group insurance, was presented.

Representatives of insurance companies were granted twenty minutes to explain to the Conference the advantages of such insurance and, upon motion, the Report was adopted.

Report number one of the Commission on Budget, relative to an assessment of \$8,500.00 for Randolph-Macon Academy, Front Royal, Va., was presented.

Dr. R. E. Blackwell, President of Randolph-Macon College, was introduced and addressed the Conference in behalf of the assessment.

After discussion, the Report was adopted by a vote of 109 Ayes to 95 Noes.

Upon motion, the Report of the Committee on Memoirs was adopted. Bishop Denny resumed the Chair.

QUESTION THIRTEEN of the General Minutes was called, viz., Who are transferred to other conferences?

H. H. Sherman, Secretary of the General Board of Education, addressed the Conference in regard to the Educational work of the Church.

The Trustees of the Home for Aged and Orphans requested the appointment of A. B. Sites as Assistant Manager at the Home and, upon motion, the request was approved.

Conference united in singing and adjourned, with the Benediction by Bishop Denny, to meet Monday morning at 9 o'clock.

Conference met pursuant to adjournment. Bishop Denny in the Chair. Conference united in singing Hymn No. 458:

The Bishop presented the following Answer to the question of law in Report No. 2 of Board of Lay Activities:

While the question of law presented by the Board of Lay Activities comes from that Board alone, the accompanying documents and figures referred to in this concrete case cover the "Benevolences" collected in the Baltimore Conference.

The special items submitted in the case for my decision are "Printing Minutes," "Treasurer' Expenses," "Conference Secretary for Space in Minutes," "Premium on Treasurer's Bond," "Printing, Postage and Stationery." If the interests concerned derive benefit from these items and no special collections are taken in the Conference to meet these expenses, then the interests concerned must in equity bear their reasonable and proportionate part of the cost. It is but reasonable to suppose that the Commission on Budget includes these necessary expenses in the total amount assessed on the Church, consequently it is legal for the Conference Treasurer, "subject to the approval of the Conference" (par. 335), in dealing with the report of the Conference Commission on Budget, to pay these necessary expenses; a practice which conforms to long-established usage, and in the Baltimore Conference to the instruction in open Conference of Bishop Wilson.

REPORT NUMBER 1-BOARD OF FINANCE.

There has appeared before your Board of Finance a number of gentlemen representing Insurance Companies placing before your Board the subject of group insurance for the ministers of our Conference. Your Board would report to you that it will be possible for this Conference to carry group insurance on the preachers of the Conference at the approximate cost of \$2,400 per year, to be provided for by the Conference with an assessment and at the cost of 60 cents per month per thousand to be paid by the policy holder—this 60 cents to be collected by the Conference Treasurer or special appointed Treasurer and by him paid to the insurance company; provided that there be at least 75 per cent. of the active preachers take a policy for from \$500 to \$4,000. If the Conference is desirous, these representatives will be glad to explain the plan to your body, and your Board of Finance will govern themselves in accordance to your action in this matter.

The Randolph-Macon System.

The Randolph-Macon System continues its marked progress as shown by the following facts: The number of students in attendance at the schools of the Randolph-Macon System is 1,792, which is an increase over the enrollment of last year of 59 students.

The number of students now attending the Woman's College from the Baltimore Conference is 76. There are 41 from the Baltimore Conference at the Randolph-Macon College. The Academy at Front Royal, Va., has 72, and the Academy at Bedford, Va., has 19 from this Conference.

The value of the property of the Randolph-Macon System is \$5,282,348.00. This includes the Woman's College at Lynchburg, Va., the Randolph-Macon College at Ashland, Va., the Academy at Front Royal, Va., the Academy at Bedford, Va., and the Randolph-Macon School for Girls at Danville, Va.

There are 15 ministerial students from the Baltimore Conference at Randolph-Macon College, and 4 at the Academy at Front Royal, Va.

The beautiful and modernly equipped building at Front Royal, Va., is recognized as one of the best arranged buildings of its kind to be found anywhere in this section of the country. Owing to the loss sustained by the fire, and the very high cost of material and labor, this building is now burdened by a tremendous debt of \$210,000.00

We wish to go on record as expressing our appreciation to Prof. Charles L. Melton, Mr. Frank Chalmers and the entire faculty for their untiring services in the present situation.

We recommend that all of our people give their co-operation in giving patronage to the schools of the System and in helping to lift the indebtedness from the Academy at Front Royal, Va.

We recommend that, in accordance with the Discipline, the second Sunday in June, or as near thereto as practicable, be set aside as Christian Education Day. Suggestive literature may be secured at the Board's headquarters, Nashville, Tennessee.

Conferences.

We endorse the delegated Missionary Conferences at Memphis on January 1, 2, and 3, 1929, also the conferences on Religious Education at Junaluska, July 17 to 21, 1929.

Student Work in State Institutions.

We recommend that application be made to the General Conference Board of Education for an appropriation of not less than \$300.00 for student work at Lexington and \$300.00 for student work at Blacksburg. We ask for the continuance of the assessment of \$700.00 on the Conference for the establishment of a chair of Religious Education in the Virginia Polytechnic Institute at Blacksburg, under the agreement of a year ago.

School for Pastors and Christian Workers.

The Summer School for Pastors and Christian Workers held at Front Royal last summer under the support of the several Conference Boards is heartily approved for the coming summer, the details of which will be made by the Board of Directors duly elected for the purpose.

Requirements for Admission on Trial.

The Board is glad to record the growing tendency to keep the educational requirements up to the standard of at least two years of work in a standard college for those admitted on trial in the Conference.

The Francis Asbury School.

We are glad to report progress on the proposed Francis Asbury School and trust that the new Board of Trustees will be in a position to consummate some plans in the near future.

If the character of publications displayed on our news stands is a good cross section of the tastes of the reading public, it is the churches' duty to produce and circulate an attractive, virile worth while Christian literature.

Your Board is very much gratified to observe that our Publishing House is doing a worthy part to fill this need, and while to make money is not the chief object of the House, yet it is a pleasure to note that in its several branches its sales during the past year have reached nearly the two million dollar mark, with a net profit of above six per cent., which is twelve thousand dollars better than last year, and out of this profit \$75,000 has been appropriated for Conference Claimants. In view of this and for other obvious reasons we earnestly hope that all our people will patronize our own Publishing House. We believe that for our purpose our own literature is the best published in the land. We commend all our general publications to our people.

It is with profound sorrow that we have heard of the death of our brother, C. D. Harris. We remember his untiring efforts in behalf

of the paper.

Your Board wishes to express its gratification at the selection of our brother, N. B. Harmon, Jr., as editor and we pledge to him our unanimous loyal support in every movement to stimulate interest in the paper.

We are pleased to report that our publishing house has established a Department of Tracts for the purpose of supplying our people with tracts on the Doctrines of Methodism, History and policy of our Church, Evangelistic work, and Christian Stewardship. This literature may be had upon the request of our preachers, and by laymen endorsed by their pastor, absolutely free.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Board had the most perplexing problem this year it has had for many years in distributing aid to its applicants. There was a total of \$18,900 asked for, as donations, and for disposal the Board had \$5,800. The Board attempted to administer this sacred trust after earnest prayer and exhaustive deliberation. The Board was impressed with the fact that the large proportion of requests came from churches that had a long standing building debt, which indicated that they had built far beyond their resources and were thus heavily burdened, in some cases almost to the breaking point. We would admonish our preachers and congregations to adhere more closely to the disciplinary requirements before building and thus save themselves from embarassing and discouraging experience.

We would advise that no building enterprise be executed until the Architecture Department of the General Board had been consulted and plans had been endorsed by them. Many mistakes would be obviated, many dollars saved, and much greater satisfaction obtained

in the erection of our buildings. The average architect is not acquainted with the needs of a modern church building, so we urge our people to submit their plans to our General Board for their approval and get the fullest value for the money invested.

The Secretary of our General Board, Dr. T. D. Ellis, writes in his letter to the Conference Board:

"I sincerely trust that your Board will discourage and if necessary, refuse to approve applications from immature enterprises. Church Extension money can be made available only when the enterprise may be brought to completion free of debt, except what may be due the Board of Church Extension as a loan. It is a mistake to rush applications on to the General Board before the building is in course of erection and sufficient money raised to complete it with the aid which the General Board may be able to render."

Those who are building would be saved many disappointments and misunderstandings in their dealings with the General Board if they would heed this admonition.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

Literature.

This is the day of the printed page. Our church has provided a thoroughly intellectual and a deeply spiritual Christian literature, and a literatue that is soundly pedagogical as well. We call special attention to the Elementary Teacher. This periodical has been changed from a quarterly carrying only Group Lessons material to a beautiful and attractive monthly carrying helps for elementary teachers of all types. It has received from our elementary workers an enthusiastic welcome and its circulation is steadily growing. Another very important publication is the Workers' Council. It is the only publication issued under the joint auspices of the General Sunday School Board and the Bcok Committee that furnishes practical discussions of educational principles and methods for workers of all kinds, and that illustrates these discussions with reports of what is actually being done in the various sections of our field. We urge upon our people the use of our own denominational literature.

Leadership Training.

Our Board through its efficient field workers has been unsparing in its efforts to provide our Conference with a consecrated and trained leadership. Standard Training Schools and Cokesbury Classes have been held throughout our territory, issuing 1808 credits. We beg our pastors for increased cooperation in this particular, attending themselves upon the Schools, and working to get their superintendents and teachers enrolled.

School for Pastors and Christian Workers.

The Sunday School Board, in cooperation with the Conference Board of Education, the Board of Missions, the Board of Lay Activities, and the Epworth League Board held last June at the Randolph-Macon Academy Building in Front Royal, Virginia, a successful and most encouraging School for Pastors and Christian Workers. We had an enrollment of 214, including 80 pastors and 6 presiding elders. We heartly commend this School to the attention of our people and invite their interest and participation in the School for 1929.

District Organizations.

Our Board seeks to carry on much of its work through our District Organizations, and it is our policy to return to each District 20% of the Sunday School Day offering for work within the District. It is

our earnest desire that the several District officers will see to it that our important Sunday School work is adequately presented and administered within the bounds of their respective fields.

Sunday School Day.

The great task of carrying on the program of Christian education within our Conference depends in large measure for its financial support upon the contributions made by each individual school on Sunday School Day. This day carries great educational value to our people in setting forth the aims of our work and in giving the people opportunity for participation in the purposes. We realized last year from Sunday School Day offerings approximately \$3,900.00. Our goal is the observance of this day with an offering in each school in the Conference.

Programs of Work.

Only by having a Program of Work can each school check up upon itself and determine relative progress. We ask that each school provide itself with this Program and to test itself constantly by the goals held up therein.

Home for the Aged and Orphans.

Our Sunday Schools have accepted responsibility for the dining room of the Home for the Aged and Orphans at Gaithersburg, at a cost of \$20,000. This part of the building will be a Sunday School Memorial. We ask, therefore, that each of our schools take a liberal offering in the Christmas season and send the same to Mr. W. F. Hummer, Treasurer, Gaithersburg, Maryland.

State Work.

While we subscribe to the general principle of interdenominational co-operation we believe that such co-operation should originate in each local situation and should be promoted by the regularly constituted denominational agents. After due consideration at the hands of committees appointed by each participating Conference of our Church we deem it wise not to accept officially membership in the Virginia State Council of Religious Education as at present constituted, or its affiliated county and community councils, but that we declare our willingness to co-operate with the Council through our employed staff and volunteer workers in such phases of their program as seems practicable, without in any way interfering with the prosecution of our denominational program or involving our Sunday Schools in financial obligations.

Missionary Offering.

As our Church law provides that the monthly missionary offering in the Sunday School shall be applied as a special for missions as the Workers' Council may determine, with which law we are in full accord, and as a large majority of the Sunday Schools of the Baltimore Conference have been applying their monthly missionary offering to the Conference assessments and could not immediately be relieved entirely of this responsibility without a material shortage in these assessments, we recommend that all Sunday Schools thus applying their missionary offering in whole or in part, be urged to apply at least a part of this offering to the Sunday School missionary special. Beginning with January, 1929, the Sunday Schools throughout the connection assume entire support of our missionary work in China.

Our Employed Staff.

We hereby record our hearty endorsement and deep appreciation of the efficient and consecrated work of our Conference Superintendent, Rev. R. K. Nevitt, and of Miss Etta Mai Russell, Conference Elementary Superintendent. The Board has voted to continue the valued services of Miss Russell, and we hereby respectfully request Bishop Collins Denny to appoint Rev. R. K. Nevitt as Conference Superintendent of Sunday School work. We respectfully request Bishop Collins Denny also to appoint Rev. C. D. Bulla, D.D., Associate Sunday School Editor.

Objectives for 1928-29.

- 1. That Childhood and Youth Week be observed in at least 25% of the schools of the Conference.
- 2. That a minimum of 30% of the officers and teachers of the Conference take at least one unit of credit in Leadership Training during the year.
- 3. That the District Standard of Efficiency as adopted by the Conference Council be the goal of each District.
 - 4. That we aim at a 10% increase in our membership.
- 5. The co-operation of all the schools in the Conference in the Board's plan of District Organization.

REPORT OF EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

Your Board has given careful attention to the work of the Epworth League, both within the bounds of the Baltimore Conference and throughout the church, and is happy to report there are evidences of vitality and progress in this department of the church's activity. Though the degree of progress cannot be adequately expressed in mere figures, yet a few of the outstanding facts may be of interest.

Our records show an increase of 6 Senior Chapters, 7 Epworth-Hi Chapters and 6 Junior Chapters in the Baltimore Conference for the past year. For the same period of time it shows an increase of 251 in membership.

Six years ago the Leaguers of the Conference started a campaign to raise \$25,000 in ten years for the erection of Epworth Hall. At the end of six years they had already raised, in cash money, the sum of \$27,500, and have good prospects for raising more than \$5,000 this next Conference year. We feel this has been no small undertaking and it shows the energy, loyalty and devotion of our young people.

We wish to call special attention to the theme of the Epworth League Program for the present year—"Adventures in Christian Living." This is the practical application of the principles of Jesus in everyday life about us. The League has set itself to the accomplishment of its motto—the social order must be Christianized.

Then we would call attention to Recreation Week. The entire Southern Methodism is urged to observe this week, April 14-20.

Lastly, we call your attention to the so-called "Young People's Revival." This is one of the most recent developments in the Epworth League. It is an effort to enlist our Leaguers once a year in a campaign of personal evangelism in behalf of their friends and associates who are not christians, however, in no way is it expected to take the place of the regular revival conducted by the pastor. For his part, we believe, the pastor will do well to encourage his Leaguers to undertake such a campaign, and will lend them such assistance as he can give. We trust our pastors and Epworth Leaguers may co-operate to such good purposes that many of our young people may be brought to a fuller realization of Jesus as their Saylour and Lord.

REPORT OF BIBLE BOARD.

Total.....

As in all past ages of the Church, the Holy Bible today is to be recognized as the revealed word of God. It is to be given and is to retain the place of pre-eminence among the world's literature. It is to be received and believed in as the all-sufficient—the only-sufficient rule of faith and practice; the record of the divine purposes for God's people in all generations, and the indicator of the power of God unto salvation to all who will believe.

The Bible Board reiterates the statement upon which the Church of Christ stands, relative to the Bible, as being its own foundation; further, it accepts the Bible as being the very word and will of God and recognizes the divinity of its authorship throughout through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, its infallibility as the guide to personal soul salvation and entire sanctification of life and conduct.

Your Board recommends to this Annual Conference that continued and augmented emphasis be given by all our preachers to these facts; that all our sermons be constructed upon the bases of Bible texts; that the use of the sacred Volume in our Sunday-School classes and in all our work be employed and the use of the helps to the displacement of the pure Scriptures be emphatically discouraged.

The Board recommends, also, the replacement of the Holy Bible upon the altars of more of our homes that around it may be re-established the worship of the family, so that from its illumined pages may be shed abroad over each day's path the radiance of its heavenly light.

It is recommended, further, the constant carrying on the person of a copy of the Bible or a portion thereof and the daily searching of the Scriptures that the way of life may be known more perfectly, and their testimony of the Lord Jesus Christ may be our own.

It recommends, further, the endorsement of the noble work of the Gideons in their distribution of the Word of God in the rooms of hotels and public places. Many have been the cases where souls have been reached and saved through this means.

It recommends, lastly, the establishment, where possible, in the towns and villages of our charges depositories for the sale and distribution of copies of the Scriptures, especially of the cheaper editions that all the people may have access to the Bread of Life. Arrangements for such may be effected by the pastors with the American Bible Society whose great work is hereby commended and endorsed.

In pursuance of this order there will be held at Memphis, Tenn., on January 1, 2 and 3, 1929, a delegated Missionary Conference. The members of our Conference Board of Missions will be ex-officio members of this delegated conference and we request each of the other of our Conference Boards to name at least five delegates from their membership. Rev. D. L. Blakemore has been selected as Conference Director to help to make certain the attendance of a large number of these delegates and others.

REPORT NO. 1 OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES.

To the Baltimore Conference Methodist Episcopal Church, South-

The Board of Lay Activities rejoices in the increased interest and activity of the laymen of the church in all its enterprises and in the increasing efficiency of the laymen's organizations, indicated by the report of the General Board of Lay Activities submitted to us at this session.

We renew our pledge of loyalty to the plan of lay activities prescribed by the General Conference and assure the General Board of our cooperation in the execution of their programme.

We cannot better express our position on the subject of the benevolences of the church than by repeating the declarations made in our Report at the 1927 Session of the Conference, in the form of resolutions, which we now reintroduce as such:

Be it Resolved-

- 1. The assessments, general and conference, constitute the first and abiding obligation of the laymen's organization;
- 2. That the benevolences be provided for in cash or pledges as soon as practicable after the session of the Annual Conference;
- 3. That at least half these claims should be paid by the time of the District Conference;
- 4. That as far as possible, these funds be sent to the Conference Treasurer monthly or quarterly as an integral part of the church budget;
- 5. That a campaign of education on behalf of the benevolences be actively waged in every charge.

In addition to these recommendations, we urge each District Leader to begin at once a close and detailed study and survey of his District, and, having ascertained and classified the weak spots, that he address himself, in co-operation with pastors and church and charge leaders, towards the goal of 100 per cent, as the minimum on all collections. Special recognition and commendation should be given the District showing the greatest increase, at the next session of the Conference.

Methodist Layman.

We urge a wider circulation of the Methodist Layman, in the confident belief that if this, our official organ, be more generally read, it will be a great stimulus to activity and interest and a source of pleasure and profit to the readers. We plead with pastors to put their influence behind the lay leaders on behalf of this really splendid publication. It is sent by the Board at its own expense to all clerical members of the Conference.

Christlan Stewardship.

We again declare our adherence to the principle of Christian Stewardship. We urge its practice and its promulgation by the organization of Stewardship Committees as rapidly as conditions will admit and by sermons on stewardship by pastors, until every charge has been covered. We call attention to the fact that the year 1929 is to be Stewardship Year, and urge that all charges begin to prepare for it at once.

Wesley Brotherhoods.

Wesley Brotherhoods have not been formed in our Conference as numerously as might be desired. We are confident that such a brotherhood will quicken the spiritual life of any congregation where it may be founded and we urge that the formation of them be pressed. It is hoped that the recent visit of the General Secretary, Mr. Fred T. Barnett, to several of the Districts, where conferences were held, will result in renewed activity.

Communications Referred.

Several communications have been referred to the Board. One is a letter from Mr. John R. Pepper which calls attention to the fact that in traveling through rural sections, many churches are found without markings to indicate their identity and recommends that the laymen undertake to have all or churches marked with signs identifying them as belonging to our denomination. We heartly indorse this recommendation and direct our District leaders to carry it into effect as far as practicable.

Group Insurance.

The matter of group insurance for members of the Conference has been brought before us. Feeling that it is a question for the Board of Finance, we respectfully commend it to their careful study.

REPORT NO. 2 OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES.

To the Baltimore Conference Methodist Episcopal Church, South--

The Board of Lay Activities have had referred to them a communication from Mr. J. E. Crawford, Secretary of the General Advisory Council on Benevolences, calling attention to a statement in a report from a special committee of said Council, copy of which accompanies the communication, to the effect that it has been ascertained that seventeen of the home Conferences, including the Baltimore Conference, made deductions for some item or items of expense, or to pay in full some amount or amounts levied by the Conference, before the total amount collected on the assessments for general and conference benevolences had been properly divided.

As the matter of the benevolences, while of interest to all, preachers and laity alike, is of especial interest to the Board of Lay Activities, because of the duties imposed upon them, and as we find from the exhibit which accompanies said communication, that such deductions were made in the Baltimore Conference, during the Conference year ended with the 1927 session, as follows: Printing Minutes, \$1,069.54; Treasurer's Expenditures, \$900.00; Conference Secretary for space in minutes, \$14.00; Premium on Treasurer's bond, \$62.50; Printing, Postage and Stationery, \$45.77; and as we are of the opinion that the aforesaid deductions by the Treasurer of this Conference may have been unauthorized under the law, we respectfully report that it is desirable to have, and we hereby request of the presiding Bishop, and Episcopal Decision as to the legality of the practices above set forth, and to that end propound, and request his decision upon the following question:

When the General Conference had placed an assessment upon the church for all the various general interests as set forth in paragraph 330 of the Discipline, and when this amount had been apportioned to the several Annual Conferences in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 331 of the Discipline, and when the Baltimore Annual Conference had raised funds on account of these general interests, then, was the Conference or its Treasurer, authorized, under the law, to withhold from the Treasurers of the several interests included in the assessments, any part of the amounts so raised and apply it to the expense of printing Conference Minutes, expense of Treasurer, Premium on Treasurer's bond, Conference Secretary for space in minutes, or printing, postage and stationery? If any deductions, before distributing to the Treasurers of the general interests, are lawful, what amounts may the Conference, or its Treasurer, deduct and for what purposes?

The communication, with the accompanying exhibit, is hereto attached.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE.

In compliance with the resolution passed by the Conference on Wednesday of this week calling upon the Board of Temperance and Social Service, "To present to the Conference a clear-cut declaration of our historical position on temperance and other social problems, in order that no doubt may be raised as to our stand on these matters."

We the Board of Temperance and Social Service present the following report:

Whereas, it is appropriate that we renew a statement of the attitude of this Conference, respecting the subject of temperance and that we should express our loyalty to prohibition, and

Whereas, the attitude of our church heretofore was expressed in the Episcopal address at Hot Springs in 1922, in the following words: "It is the cause of deep gratitude that the greatest of all nations has led the way in this mighty and matchless reform. It is incumbent, therefore, upon every good citizen to work for the placing in power men who are sincere friends of the law and to assist in every proper way the enforcement of the law. The vital issue before the people today is whether they will stand by those members of congress who have voted to maintain the prohibition amendment and whether the people will vote to defeat candidates who will attempt to repeal or weaken the Volstead Act. The only certain place to meet that issue is in the primary and in the general election. The crisis should be promptly and vigorously met by the Christian Citizenship of this nation," and

Whereas, the attitude of our church was further expressed in the Episcopal address of May, 1926, in the following words: "The industrial, social, educational, moral and religious forces of the nation, led by its Christian citizenship, overthrew the legalized liquor traffic and secured national prohibition. The same great forces must unite in the fight with equal vigor and persistence to outlaw the criminal traffic and the would-be nullifiers of the law," and

Whereas, the General Conference in May, 1926, in the report on temperance, declared the attitude of our church in the following words: "In our states from constable to governor, and in the nation from revenue agent to president, officials must be elected who believe in enforcement, not only because prohibition is the law, but because it ought to be the law. To the attainment of these ends we will call upon our teachers and preachers to give voice to the social creed of our church, and upon all people to assert their full influence as citizens and as patriotic citizens of our republic."

Now, therefore, this conference desires to reaffirm and to emphasize and endorse the action taken by the General Conference and the sentiment as expressed above in the Episcopal address, on the great moral

issue of prohibition and as to the duty of our people in connection therewith.

Many other problems in our social order present themselves to the church for careful consideration and solution. We call attention to the "Social creed of the churches" which has been adopted by our General Conference and published in the Discipline.

We recommend that the various items of this creed be constantly brought to the attention of our people, and every effort be made to hold the church to its high historical social ideals.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

We, your Committee, beg to make the following report on Sabbath Observance.

That there is an evident rising tide for a better Lord's Day throughout the boundaries of our Conference, but realizing the vital importance of the Lord's Day to our Church life as well as our Christian civilization we recommend: 1st—That all our Churches and Sunday Schools use the Educational Program of the Lord's Day Alliance as a part of our regular work.

2nd—That we endorse the membership program of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland, and urge all our Churches, Sunday Schools and members to take some one of these Memberships.

'3rd—That we rejoice in the success of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland in defeating professional Sunday baseball in Frederick and Washington Counties, the closing of Sunday Motion Picture Theatres in Baltimore City and Montgomery County and in its prevention of other commercialized forms of Sunday business.

4th—That all our Presiding Elders be requested to have Sabbath Observance as one of the topics in our District Conference Programs.

5th—That this Conference name Rev. Nolan B. Harman, Jr., a member of the Educational Committee of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland.

6th—That each of our Presiding Elders be requested to serve as Chairman of a Lord's Day District Committee to consist of two ministers and two laymen, named by the Presiding Elder, to cooperate with the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland and bordering states.

7th—We recommend passage of the Lankford Sunday Rest Bill, H. R. 78, by the U. S. Congress, having for its object the securement of one rest day in seven for the people of said District; the control and suppression of commercialism, the closing of theatres, dance houses, club rooms, baseball diamonds and all other places of worldly amusement and traffic on the Lord's Day and to effect better and more Biblical Observance of the Sabbath in our Nation's Capital.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, HOME FOR THE AGED AND ORPHANS, METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH, INC., AND LOCATED AT GAITHERSBURG, MARYLAND.

During the Conference year the Executive Committee held sixteen meetings for the purpose of giving specific attention to the many interests of the Home. Monthly reports were received from the Superintendent, Financial Secretary, Treasurer and Matron. The members of this Committee have conscientiously devoted time and talent to the end that this growing institution of the Baltimore Conference might be directed both economically and efficiently. The Board of Trustees at the Annual Meeting carefully reviewed the work of the Executive Committee and official staff, giving approval and commendation of the same.

Many applications have been filed and disposed of on the dual basis—the worthiness of the applicant and the welfare of the Home. A few disagreeable and previous experiences had taught us that a thorough investigation of each applicant would often save embarrassment later and we have persistently exercised this care. This precaution has been misunderstood in some few cases but we deem it a wise policy. The family has grown steadily. We now have fifty residents, having reached the capacity of our building and started a waiting list.

During the year the Board of Trustees in joint action with the Executive Committee of Epworth Hall have completed plans for an additional unit to be known as "Epworth Hall." This building is well under way and when completed will provide some additional rooms and other conveniences which are sorely needed. This addition will increase our assets \$40,000.00. The vision, ability and liberality manifested by the youth of this Conference in making this additional unit possible merits special mention and an acknowledgment of appreciation by this Board.

While steadily increasing our responsibility within the Home, we are also endeavoring to enlarge our constituency throughout the Conference. We assume keeping our people aware of our various needs will encourage a more liberal support. The interest which the people are manifesting in this project leads us to believe that our cause was never more acceptable than it is today.

We again remind you that our definite financial policy consists of a free-will offering from each Sunday School at Christmas time and a like offering from the congregations on Mother's Day combined with the maintenance subscriptions to provide for the current expenses of the Home. We have also issued Annuity Bonds and offered them for sale as a means of reducing our bonded indebtedness. All funds accruing from the sale of these bonds must be so applied. We solicit the abiding interest of the pastors and people in the promotion of this particular feature of our plan. Seven of these bonds have been sold and a total of \$5,000.00 received from the same.

After more than five years of unremitting toil, Rev. J. J. Ringer asks to be relieved of the Superintendency of the Home. The Board deems this a fitting occasion to acknowledge their appreciation of the unusual services of Brother Ringer in connection with the Home and to express their confidence in him as a man capable of doing big things. Under trying conditions of which the public knew little or nothing, he has done more than any other in establishing the Home and bringing it to its present successful status. To do this he has shown at all times signal devotion to the work, in nothing sparing himself or seeking his own advancement. This institution today stands and through all the coming years will stand as a monument to his untiring zeal and industry. Brother Ringer while retiring from the superintendency will retain his relation as a member of the Board of Trustees and continue

to give the Home the benefit of his intimate knowledge and practical experience in the work.

Through the faithful service of the staff members and the growing liberality of our people this has been a fruitful year. The average monthly income for the Conference year has been \$6,322.00; while the previous eighteen months averaged \$4,314.00. Total income from all sources \$75,861.00. Total indebtedness on the Home at the beginning of the Conference year \$117,000.00. Reduction of indebtedness during the year \$27,500.00, present indebtedness \$89,500.00. Total income from annual maintenance subscriptions \$4,776.00.

The Board is confident that with efficient management, diligence in effort and the practice of economy in the use of funds at our disposal the maintenance problem can be solved and additional funds secured to liquidate our bonded indebtedness within a reasonable period. With this as our goal we seek your hearty co-operation and solicit your liberal support.

Mr. W. M. Magruder, Treasurer, has resigned and his resignation has been duly accepted with sincere appreciation of his long and efficient service to the institution.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN METHODIST PUBLISHING CO.

The Board of Directors of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company submits the following report for the year.

The past year has been one of real progress for your Conference organ. Under the experienced leadership of Dr. C. D. Harris, the Editor and Business Manager, the paper has been put into many additional homes and each week has gone forth as an assistant preacher of the Conference to enthuse, inform and to create interest in all the work of the Conference and the enterprises of the Church at large. Because of the visits of the Editor and the extensive campaign carried on by the preachers of the Conference the circulation has increased from 5424 to 6560—which gives us 1351 new subscribers for the year.

The editorials have dealt with practical questions of church policy and government. They have rung true on all the great moral issues of the day. We have sought always to keep the editorials along the high levels of thought and for the very best interests of the Conference. We trust that a spirit of optimism has been fostered and that the confidence of the people in the program of the Church has been greatly increased. We have found by experience and observation, that where the paper is most widely circulated and read by the people, there the Conference interests are better conserved and greater results in loyalty and support are obtained.

The Editor has been able, during the past year, to visit many of the churches and present the important cause of Christian Literature. As a result of these visits our people have a better knowledge and a wider vision of the tremendous power of the printed page in the formation of life and character.

Financially we are on a safe and sound foundation. With the continued support and hearty co-operation on the part of the pastors of the Conference we shall be able to make the paper a greater factor for good than ever before.

Last year you very generously increased the assessment to the sum of \$9,000. This act on your part put new life in the paper and has enabled us to carry on with increased energy and a greater degree of success. We promised, at that time, that we would, at the earliest possible moment, ask for a reduction when the business of the paper justified such a reduction. We are this year asking for a small reduction of \$500.00 in the assessment for next year. We have not had sufficient time to increase our assets very materially but as we get on our feet financially from year to year, we shall ask for a reduction in the amount of the assessment until that amount shall cease to be an excessive burden on the Conference and yet enable us to do successfully the work that you have asked us to do for you. The printed page is needed today as never before to give direction to right thinking and in the shaping of public opinion on all great moral and religious questions. Hence no sacrifice is too great on the part of the Conference in the accomplishment of this good end.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE HOSPITAL BOARD.

Your Hospital Board is glad to report an ever rising tide of enthusiasm in The Gracious Ministry of Healing to which our Church has so recently committed itself. Our Church now owns and controls eleven (11) hospitals which represent a property value of more than ten millions of dollars, and we learn that our great Duke University is preparing to build a \$4,000,000 hospital which will have an endowment of 6,000,000 dollars. In addition to these hospitals, we have eight Training Schools for Nurses in which about five hundred of our finest young women are being trained for this ministry of healing. The doors of opportunity are ever opening, bidding us enter and occupy the field.

The medium of our assistance in this great work is The Golden Cross Society, which has been heartily endorsed by The College of Bishops and membership in which the General Conference has made obligatory upon every church of our connection.

In view of the foregoing facts your Board makes the following recommendations to the Conference.

- 1.—That the Conference observe the week including the second and third Sundays of May as Hospital Week, and that every possible effort be put forth to enroll members in The Golden Cross Society.
- 2.—That Dr. Noland M. Canter of Harrisonburg, Virginia, be appointed Conference director of "The Golden Cross Society" and that each Presiding Elder appoint a District Director whose name and post office address shall be given to The Conference Director; and that each director be given the opportunity to present this cause to his respective District Conference.
- 3.—That the General Board be instructed to direct 80% of the funds received from The Golden Cross enrollment in our Conference to The Southern Methodist Hospital and Sanatorium at Tuscan, Arizona.
- 4.—That, The Commission on Budget of our Conference be asked to set aside the small sum of money requested for the use of The Conference Hospital Board, to enable it to carry on its work.

MEMOIRS.

HENRY A. BROWN.

Rev. Henry Alexander Brown, the son of Lewis and Malinda Brown, was born October 3, 1855, in Monroe County Virginia (now West Virginia), and departed this life at Sebring, Florida, February 17, 1928. He was the oldest member of a family of eleven children, four daughters and seven sons, three of whom were ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Henry A. Brown was reared on the farm mainly in Giles County, Virginia, where his parents moved from Monroe County, West Virginia. By diligent study and close application he gained a good English education, acquiring also some knowledge of the foreign languages. Especially was he well informed in the Scriptures and was an earnest and prayerful student of the Bible, which he believed with all his heart to be the word of God for he felt its power in his own life. He was well acquainted with the doctrines of his church which were very dear to him and which he loved to preach. In his early life he taught in the public schools serving also as a local preacher.

He was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, September 1877, under the ministry of the Rev. P. S. Sutton, Preacher in Charge, of Parisburg Circuit, Holston Conference. And he was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of the same charge, June 1, 1878; Rev. J. W. Bowman, P. C. and Rev. A. J. Frazier, P. E.

At twenty-five years of age he felt the call to enter the regular ministry. With the usual equipment of a Methodist preacher of that day, consisting of a horse, saddle bags, and Bible, he started for conference, choosing to cast his lot among the preachers of the Baltimore Conference rather than those of the Holston Conference. He traveled many miles across the Alleghany mountains on horseback to the seat of the Baltimore Conference. On arriving at his destination he found the conference fully supplied with preachers. He was sadly disappointed. However, Dr. John S. Martin, one of the presiding elders, seeing the dilemma in which the young man was placed, took charge of him and gave him work as a supply under a regular preacher. With this rather discouraging outlook, but with a determination to do what he felt the Lord wanted him to do, he entered the ranks of the Methodist itinerant ministry. This rather discouraging beginning resulted in a long and useful career of more than forty-two years of active service. During this time he served on circuits, in stations, and eight years as a presiding elder.

Brother Brown was admitted on Trial in the Baltimore Conference with Rev. John C. Thrasher, Rev. Collins Denny, now Bishop Denny, the honored President of our Conference, and others, at the session held at Front Royal, Virginia, March 3-10, 1880, Bishop John C. Keener, presiding. He was received into full connection at the conference held at Charles Town, West Virginia; and was ordained Deacon by Bishop Keener, March 18, 1883. And he was ordained Elder by Bishop Keener, March 13, 1887, at Leesburg, Virginia.

He served the following charges: 1879-80, a Supply on Rockingham Circuit; 1880-82, Junior preacher on Luray Circuit; 1882-83, Junior preacher on Augusta Circuit; 1883-84, West Augusta Circuit; 1884-86. Staunton Circuit; 1886-90, Crabbottom Circuit; 1890-92, Frostburg Circuit; 1892-96, Moorefield Circuit; 1896-1900, Hinton Station; 1900-04, Stephens City; 1904-07, Bridgewater Circuit; 1907-10, Romney Circuit; 1910-13, Loudoun Circuit; 1913-17, Presiding Elder, Moorefield District; 1917-21, Presiding Elder, Roanoke District; 1921-22, Middletown, Virginia; 1922, Superannuated on account of continued illness.

Middletown was his last appointment in the conference. During the year he was attacked by the fatal disease, influenza, from which he never fully recovered. It prayed upon his system until it settled in his lungs making it necessary for him to go to such a climate as was adapted to his condition. Consequently, he moved to Florida where he found relief and was hopeful of recovery; but it was temporary and only a means, probably, of prolonging his life for a period of four or five years. Other complications set in and finally Angina Pectoris fastened its deadly hold upon him, and, unexpectedly to his family and many friends, he passed away suddenly.

Early in his ministry, August 5, 1886, by Rev. James S. Gardner, D. D., he was happily united in marriage to Miss Sarah J. Keller, daughter of F. G. and Esther A. Keller, Churchville, Virginia, devout methodist people. To this union were born two sons, Harry K. and Charles L. The faithful wife and mother who survived her husband lives at Sebring, Florida. She was truly a devoted companion and entered into church activities of every kind sharing the hardships and the joys of her husband as well as making the parsonage an ideal home. The father's heart as well as the mother's has been gladdened by the two sons, who are still living having developed into useful men; Harry, a Superintendent of Schools in North Dakota, and Charles, a field representative with the American Telephone and Telegraph Company of New York office, both honor their father's and mother's God and stand in places of trust and responsibility.

In the worthy tribute they made to their father, published in the Baltimore Southern Methodist soon after his death, they said, "The home of a methodist preacher is not one of luxury, and indeed in our home there have been times when there was not any great evidence that more than the bare necessities of life were there; but if we were given the opportunity now to start life anew, choosing our own en-

vironment, we would not exchange our home for the palace of a king. Father often used to sing 'I am the child of a King!' We, his sons, being in direct descent, claim a birthright no less honorable." They exclaim, "We his sons, verily believe there has been no better man than our father and no nobler woman than our mother! Can any sons claim a richer heritage?" In his own family he shed the luster of an upright life and impressed those around him with the dignity of his high office as a minister of Christ. To his friends who knew him intimately his gentleness, honesty and sincerety made him great and he was characterized by tenderness of heart.

Brother Brown had a clear religious experience and could say with St. Paul "I know whom I have believed." He lived in daily communion and fellowship with his Lord. He was a faithful pastor, sympathetic and helpful; he knew the art of reaching those in distress; he could adapt himself to all conditions and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. He ever stood true to his convictions of right as he saw them. The ministry was to him a labor of love, and he honored the high calling with his best service whether it be on a large circuit, in a station or on a district as the presiding elder. He accepted always willingly and served faithfully whatever charge was assigned him at the hands of the Bishop.

He was an excellent preacher. His sermons prepared with care, were instructive, suggestive, intensely practical, and helpful to his hearers. He loved to preach the gospel for he believed it with all his heart to be "the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth." And God honored his ministry in the salvation of souls and the upbuilding of believers in the faith. He was warm-hearted, unselfish and generous; all had in him a wise counselor, and a friend whom they could always trust. These qualities combined with executive ability of high order made him a very effective presiding elder serving two districts in this capacity. His preachers loved him and had confidence in him not only as an executive but as a true consecrated man of God. He had ambition and energy beyond his physical strength. At times he labored under difficulties to meet the demands made upon him and finally, gave down under the pressure. To him it was a great disappointment to have to lay down his life-work and go on the retired list; and then, for health's sake to move to the state of Florida, away from his conference and out of touch, largely, with the brethren with whom he had been so intimately associated for the many years in active service and whose fellowship he so much enjoyed. It was said, however, that he was never more kindly received anywhere than he was by the good people of Sebring, Florida. They loved him and helped to make his last years happy ones. The writer of this memoir would write him occasionally and he would always reply cheerfully and everytime would testify to his abiding faith in God and his bright hope of Heaven.

Rev. George W. Gaither of this Conference was at Sebring, Florida, at the time of Brother Brown's departure and gave the following information concerning his death and burial. On Saturday morning, February the eleventh, he walked to the market and returned complaining with a pain around his heart. They called in a doctor but Brother Brown continued to grow weaker until the following Friday morning, February the seventeenth, about 7 o'clock he called his son, Harry, to his bedside and said, "I am going, Goodbye" and he passed away peacefully through the portals of death into "the city which hath foundations whose builder and maker is God." He left a well rounded life of useful service, and could exclaim with Saint Paul: "I am now ready . . . I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith."

Monday morning, February 20th, at 10 o'clock, attended by a large congregation, the funeral services were held in the Methodist Church just across the street from Brother Brown's home at Sebring, Florida. The sermon was preached by Brother Gaither from the text: "Know ye not there is a prince and a great man fallen this day in Israel?" He was assisted in the services by Dr. Wm. G. Clinton, Pastor, M. E. Church: Dr. C. B. Toombs, Pastor, Presbyterian Church; Rev. V. G. White, Pastor, Christian Church; Rev. James S. Day, Jr., Pastor, Baptist Church; and Rev. G. B. Strickland, Pastor, M. E. Church, South, Avon Park, Florida. Interment followed in the Sebring Cemetery. His body now lies in Florida ("the land of Flowers") to await the resurrection morning.

DAVID FRANK EUTSLER.

The true estimate of life comes at its latter end, for it is only in the perspective of the past that we can form a proper estimate of our experiences. Those who wait and watch, as their loved ones pass down into the valley of the shadow, are never really ready for the final hour, and to them it seems tragic, yet for the departing saint himself, "soothed and sustained by an unfaltering trust," that hour is an hour of triumph, in which he reaches the very climax of

his earthly career and enters upon the heavenly inheritance within his Father's House. Mingled with our falling tears, therefore, ought ever to be a note of joy for those who have wrought well and have entered into rest.

Such a one was David Frank Eutsler; and such an hour of glorious victory came to him on the morning of June 3, 1928. A Sabbath day it was, appropriate for his translation; the earth beautiful in its dress of living green and fragrant with the perfume of bursting bud and blossoming flower, as he loosed the moorings of his little bark and set sail upon the tideless sea.

Seventy-five years before, on January 22, 1853, he had been born near Port Republic, Virginia. His parents were George Washington and Sarah Byerly Eutsler, to whom God gave thirteen children, David being the second child. Three years later the family moved to Meridian in Augusta County. It was here in the very heart of the Shenandoah Valley that he grew up, and something of the strength of its rugged mountains and the quiet beauty of its waving fields seemed to pass over into his character and become part of his life.

He attended the school near his home, and early manifested a deepening interest in the church and in religion. Consequently it is not surprising that God should come to him and set him apart for his service. His conversion and his call to preach were almost simultaneous, and both occurred at a Camp Meeting held near New Hope church in Rockingham County. Immediately he began to "bring forth fruits meet for repentance," which evidenced a genuine work of grace. It is significant that he was the first of the family to profess conversion, but his parents soon followed, influenced, no doubt, by the life of their son, and each of his brothers and sisters subsequently came into the same blessed experience and united with the Methodist Church.

Feeling, like Paul, that he must preach the Gospel, and desiring a better preparation for the ministry, he left his home and entered Randolph-Macon College. In 1878, while still a student, he appeared before the Baltimore Conference at St. Paul's, Baltimore, and was admitted on trial. Completing his studies at school and then giving his entire time to the work, he was elected Deacon three years later and ordained in Harrisonburg, Va., by Bishop McTyeire. In 1883, he had finished his course and was made an Elder at Charles Town, W. Va., being ordained by Bishop Keener. The following charges bear the impress of his ministry: Montgomery, Fincastle, Fairfax, Catletts, Union, Covington, E. Harford, Moorefield, Brucetown, Shepherdstown, Upperville, Jefferson, Berkeley, Howard, Queen Anne and Frostburg. While at Howard his health began to fail but he would not surrender his "loved employ" until at Frostburg it became evident, even to himself, that he could not continue. Then, not because he would, but because he must, by reason of his physical infirmity, he asked the reference of his name for the superannuate relation.

In his character strength and gentleness combined, and in his ministry the same virtue and grace appeared. He was well grounded in the truth. No doubts shadowed his horizon. The ever increasing assaults upon faith, which mark our day, could not affect him. He rested upon the Bible as the Word of God. The Gospel was to him a divine message which he was divinely commissioned to proclaim. and with the full assurance of a deep experience he could say with the Apostle, "I know whom I have believed." In consequence his was a fruitful ministry, strengthening the faith of those who believed and bringing multitudes to a saving knowledge of his Lord. As a citizen, he was above reproach in his daily walk and conversation. As a husband and father his wise counsels and tender affection have left behind treasures of memory which lie too deep for words. And as a good minister of Jesus Christ there are thousands who rise up to call him blessed, while others whom he led to "wash their robes and make them white" surely welcomed him on the other side.

On August 5, 1881, he was happily married to Miss Annie M. Landes, who shared with him the trials and triumphs of the itinerant life. Always watching over him and ministering to him, it was her loving presence that smoothed the way for his faltering feet and cheered his fainting heart. To them six children were born, four of whom, with their mother, survive: Virginia and Frank of Winchester, Va., Keener Wilson of Ocean Port, N. J., and Mrs. Allen D. Merrill of Pocomoke City, Md. He is also survived by three sisters and by four brothers, one of whom is Rev. Robt. L. Eutsler of Buchanan, Va., an honored member of our own conference.

His funeral was held in Braddock Street Church, Winchester, conducted by his presiding Elder, Rev. H. M. Canter, assisted by Rev. M. D. Mitchell, his pastor, Rev. W. O. Talbert, Rev. J. B. Hupman and Rev. O. D. Lambert. The interment was at Charles Town, where other ministers had gathered and where Rev. W. J. Whitesell, Rev. W. D. Keene and Rev. C. C. Bush took part in the burial. In addition to these many brethren of the ministry came to do him honor.

In the early hours of the morning, without a struggle, peacefully, quietly, gently as a child asleep upon its mother's breast, he passed away. So—

We cannot think of him as dead
Who walks with us no more;
Along the paths of life we tread,
He has but gone before;
And still his silent ministry
Within our hearts has place,
As when on earth he walked with us
And met us face to face.

REV. JOHN R. JACOBS.

It is the sacred duty and a sweet privilege to record at these sessions of our Annual Conference our appreciation of the life and work of those who have been called from us during the year by death. At the last session Bro. John R. Jacobs was read out for Ronceverte Station—today the entry is made to his name "Died in the Lord." We are missing with heavy hearts one of our most manly of men. How strange that this stalwart and courageous spirit should be called from us in what seemed the prime of life. Such a providence awakens in us who believe in a future life, and in a just and loving Heavenly Father, vast visions of that far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory that shall be revealed in us. We are sure that the reward will far more than compensate for the lack of years to fulfill our Divine commission here.

Bro. Jacobs was born at Unison, Loudon County, Virginia, October 18th, 1868. He began his service in our ministry at the Conference held at Roanoke, Virginia, March, 1896, when he was admitted on trial and sent as Junior Preacher with Rev. H. M. Strickler to Marshall, Va. During this year occurred the romance of his life, when he married Miss Edith, the daughter of his Senior Preacher. Nothing but happiness has come of this romantic marriage which continued in most beautiful love and peace to the end of his life.

At the Conference of March, 1897, the young couple went to Sterling, Va., where he spent only one year.

From this time on his pastorates lasted four years, 1898 to 1902: Listonburg, Pa.; 1902 to 1906, West Harford, Md.; 1906 to 1910, Wesley Grove, Md.; 1910 to 1914, Fredericksburg, Va.; 1914 to 1918, Woodstock, Va.

At the Conference of 1918 he was in France as a Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in the World War.

This intermission in his ministry in the Conference was most characteristic of the manner of the man. He had the qualities of manhood that eminently fitted him for service in the sphere of battle. He went with the boys to the front and saw active service in the great World War. He knew the temper and spirit of the American man and could stand with him in the front of the battle and minister to him with tenderness and manly courage in sickness and death.

He resumed his work in the Conference at the close of the war and at the Conference of March, 1919, was stationed at Martinsburg, W. Va.

Here he remained four years and in 1923 was appointed to Blacksburg. He now once more came into intimate contact with young men at the Virginia Polytechnic Institute. His ministry here was most successful and fruitful. Last year, 1927, his assignment was Ronceverte, W. Va.

It is altogether possible that the awful strain of his army life had left its mark upon him and sapped his splendid vitality. He was stricken several months before the end came. His last battle was well fought and his victory was won.

As a preacher he was clear in his statements of the fundamental truths of the Gospel, and forceful in the delivery of his message. One of the characteristics of his ministry was his ability to point his sermon with the incidents of current life and express it within the channel of present day thought. The boys never missed the meaning of his message.

As a man he was outstanding in his fearless position on all questions and he had abhorrence of any failure to face any issue squarely.

As a comrade he was true and loyal. Friendship with him was as tender and constant as a lover's vow. He was faithful to the end.

His one year at Ronceverte had endeared him to the hearts of the members of his flock, and during his last days they expressed their love for him by every possible means and ministered to him with great tenderness and care. He died in the parsonage, and on July 5th, 1928, funeral services were conducted at the church by his Presiding Elder, the Rev. G. W Richardson, assisted by Rev. D. L. Blakemore and Rev. T. W. Swann. He was buried at Luray, Va., July 6th, 1928.

Beside his wife, three children—one daughter and two sons—survive him.

We thank God for his life and ministry among us.


