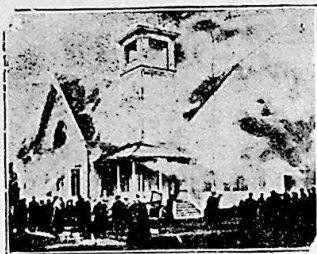
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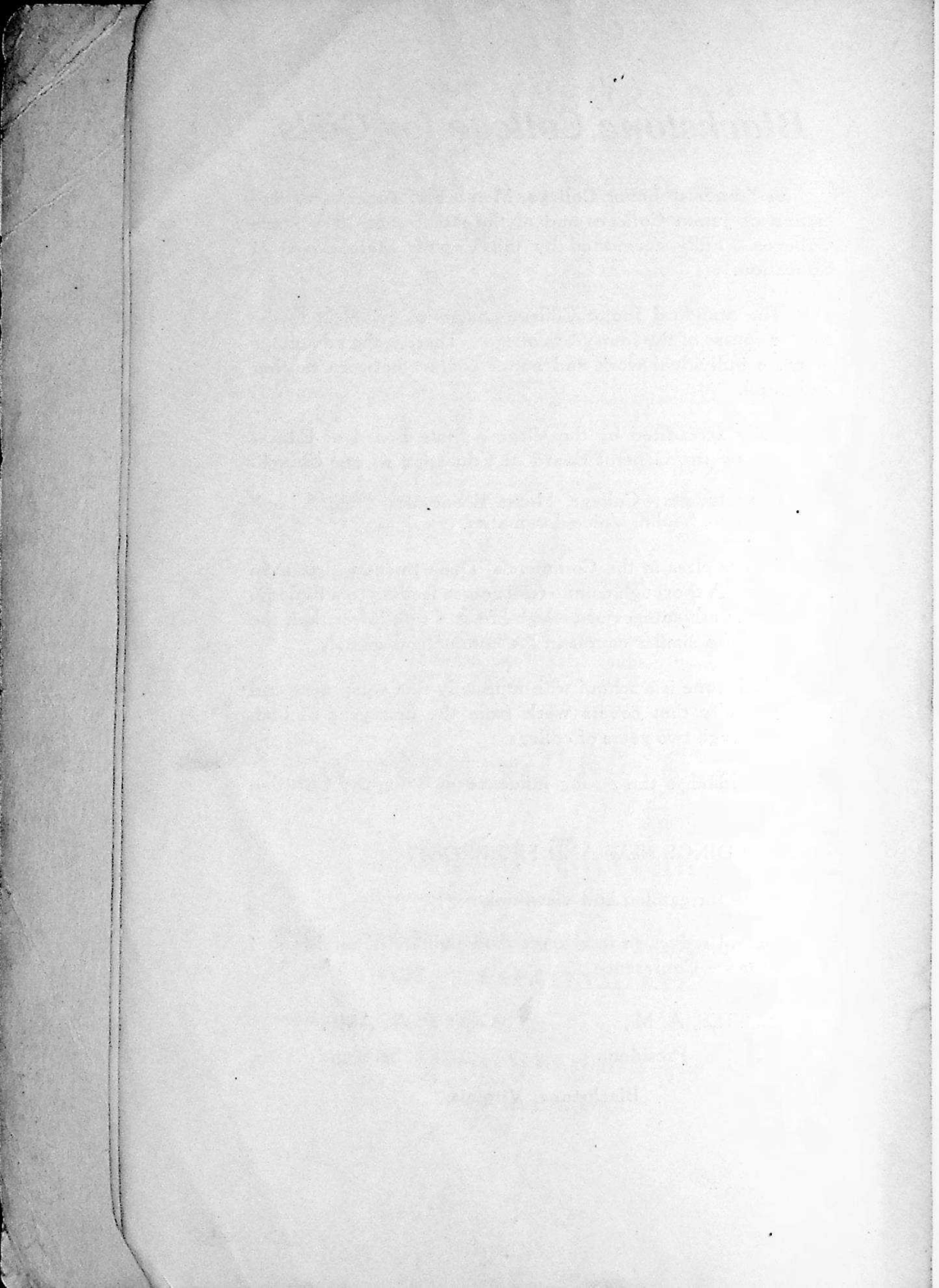

FIRST DAY.

Morning Session.

Thursday, September 25, 1930.

The Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its 146th Session in Mount Vernon Place Church, Washington, D. C., September 25th, 1930, at nine o'clock A. M.

Bishop W. B. Beauchamp, President of the Conference, in the Chair.
The Conference united in singing Hymn No. 553—

"All praise to our Redeeming Lord,
Who saves us by His grace."

Rev. R. L. Fultz read a selection from Philippians Chapter 3, and led the Conference in prayer.

THE ROLL was called by the secretary of the last Conference and 209 Clerical and 78 Lay Members answered to their names.

INTRODUCTIONS: Rev. W. M. Given and Rev. W. L. Reed of the Western Virginia Conference; Rev. H. P. Myers of the Virginia Conference; Dr. Fred Barnett, Assistant Secretary of the General Hospital Board, Dr. R. E. Blackwell, President of Randolph Macon College and Dr. S. C. Hatcher, Vice-President of the Randolph Macon College, were introduced to the Conference.

ON MOTION it was ordered that 12.30 P. M. tomorrow be the order of the day for taking a picture of the Clerical members of Conference in front of the Church.

CONFERENCE ADJOURNED with singing the Doxology and with the benediction by Dr. S. C. Hatcher, to meet this afternoon at three o'clock.

Afternoon Session.

Conference met pursuant to adjournment.

Bishop W. B. Beauchamp in the Chair.

J. T. Thrasher led in prayer.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

QUESTION ONE of the General Minutes was called, viz., **Who are admitted on trial?**

The recommendations of Paul Kemper Gentry and Nathaniel Gideon Barnhart from the Alexandria District Conference; William Clay Sponaugle from the Baltimore District Conference; Richard Abraham Bergdoll from the Moorefield District Conference; Lawrence Henry

Greenwood from the Roanoke District Conference, and John Henry Davidson from the Rockingham District Conference were presented, and having passed in examination before the Committee on Examinations, and having been recommended by the Committee on Admissions, they were severally admitted on trial.

The recommendation of Charles Lewis Robson from the Baltimore District Conference was presented. Having passed in examinations before the Committee on Examinations and having been recommended by the Committee on Admissions, but not having met the full educational requirements of the Discipline he was admitted by a two-third vote.

PERMISSION was given the Committee on Admissions to retire.

ON MOTION J. W. Leggett and J. A. Johnson were excused for the remainder of this session of the Conference.

SECOND DAY.

Morning Session.

Friday, September 26, 1930.

CONFERENCE was called to order at nine o'clock.

Bishop W. B. Beauchamp in the Chair.

After singing Hymn No. 463—

"Jesus lover of my soul"

C. T. Collyer read a selection from 1st John, 1st Chapter, and led in prayer.

MINUTES of the afternoon session yesterday were read and approved.

A PAPER from the Danville District Conference of the Virginia Conference requesting the Baltimore Conference to ask the Trustees of Randolph Macon College to make certain changes in the charter relative to the election of Trustees of the College, was presented and read, and upon motion referred to the Board of Christian Education.

THE ANNUAL REPORT of the Baltimore Conference Women's Missionary Society was presented and read.

BISHOP W. F. McDOWELL, D.D., Senior Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, was introduced and with special reference to the report of the Commission on Spiritual Life of our own Church, he addressed the Conference on Pentecost.

IMMEDIATELY AFTER reading the Journal of the Afternoon Session it was made the order of the day for receiving the report of the Commission on Benevolences.

THE ORDER OF THE DAY having arrived, the report of the Board of Christian Literature was presented and read.

B. A. Whitmore, one of the General Agents of the Publishing House, was introduced and addressed the Conference on the 75th Anniversary of that Institution.

Dr. Costen J. Harrell, Pastor of Monument Street Church, Richmond, Virginia, was introduced and addressed the Conference on the Place of Books in the Development of the Inner Life.

N. B. Harmon, Jr., Editor of the Baltimore Southern Methodist, addressed the Conference in reference to that paper.

Mr. M. T. Turner, Manager of the Richmond Branch of the Publishing House, was also introduced and spoke to the Conference.

On motion, the report of the Board of Christian Literature, which included the report of the Directors of the Baltimore Southern Methodist, was adopted.

AN APPLICATION was received from the Quarterly Conference of Epworth Church, Baltimore, requesting the restoration of the Credentials of William Clay Sponaugle, and upon motion the same was granted.

J. J. RIVES presented the request of the Washington Preachers Meeting to change the time of the meeting of the Annual Conference to the first Wednesday in June and moved that the same be granted. Upon motion the request was laid on the table.

REPORT of the Trustees of the Home for the Aged and Orphans was presented and read.

J. Howard Wells, President of the Board of Trustees, and Herman M. Wilson, Superintendent of the Home, spoke to the report.

UPON MOTION the report was adopted.

INTRODUCTIONS: Dr. L. D. Patterson of the North Alabama Conference, former Missionary in China, and Dr. W. W. Davis, Secretary of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland, were introduced. Dr. Davis addressed the Conference in behalf of Sabbath Observance.

Conference united in singing the doxology and adjourned with the benediction by H. H. Sherman to meet this afternoon at three o'clock.

Afternoon Session.

Friday, September 26th, 1930.

Conference met pursuant to adjournment.

Bishop Beauchamp in the Chair.

C. D. BULLA read a selection from the Ninth Chapter of the Gospel of St. Matthew and led in prayer.

THE ROLL of absentees was called and fifteen clerical and twenty-one lay members answered to their names.

THE ORDER of the day having arrived, the report of the Commission on Benevolences was presented.

Dr. G. L. Morelock, Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities and representing the General Commission on Benevolences, addressed the Conference in behalf of the Report.

Bishop Beauchamp also emphasized the report of the Commission, and upon motion the report was adopted.

H. M. Canter, a member of the Committee on Group Insurance, stated to the Conference that the bank in which H. L. Hout, who acted as

THIRD DAY.

Morning Session.

Saturday, September 27th, 1930.

Conference met at nine o'clock.

Bishop Beauchamp in the chair.

After the singing of Hymn 334—

“My Faith Looks Up to Thee”

S. V. Hildebrand led in prayer.

THE MINUTES of Friday afternoon session were read and approved.

W. A. SHELTON, D.D., formerly of Emory University, Georgia, was introduced to the Conference and spoke to the report of the Spiritual Life Commission, emphasizing the pre-eminent necessity of the spiritual passion among the preachers and people of the church.

QUESTION NINETEEN of the General Minutes was resumed.

The recommendation of David William Persinger for Elders Orders was presented from the Roanoke District Conference. A certificate of his belief in the Doctrine and Discipline of the Church was attached and upon motion he was elected to Elders Orders.

DR. S. C. HATCHER, Vice-President of Randolph-Macon College, and Dr. R. E. Blackwell, President of the College, announced the Centennial Celebration of that Institution for October 23rd and 24th, 1930, and cordially invited the members of the Conference to attend the same. Bishop Beauchamp also addressed the Conference with reference to this Centennial and emphasized the great need of a larger endowment for the College and also urged its claims upon the thought and support of our people.

REPORT NUMBER ONE of the Board of Christian Education was presented and read.

Upon motion the report including the item for the operating expenses of the Board, but excepting all other budget items, was adopted. Those items of the budget which were excepted were upon motion referred to the Commission on Budget.

THE ORDER of the day having arrived

QUESTION FOURTEEN of the General Minutes was called, viz., **What preachers have died during the year?**

The Memoir of J. W. Duffey was read by S. V. Hildebrand.

The Memoir of J. H. Wilhite was read by K. D. Swecker.

The Memoir of J. H. Schooley was carried over to the next session of the Annual Conference.

UPON MOTION the report of the Committee on Memoirs was adopted.

QUESTION FORTY-FOUR of the General Minutes was called, viz., **Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?**

F. B. Thomas, on behalf of the Preachers Meeting of Roanoke City, cordially invited the Conference to hold its next session at that place and the invitation was unanimously accepted.

UPON MOTION, J. P. Tyler was instructed to send telegrams of greeting and love to each of the absent Superannuate Preachers.

A CONSTITUTIONAL QUESTION regarding the setting up of a Judicial Council was handed down by the General Conference. One hundred and twenty-one members of the Conference were present and voted as follows: Ayes—One hundred and nineteen. Nays—Two.

QUESTION SIX of the General Minutes was resumed.

The name of Francis H. Strieby was called and being reported as passing in examination before the Committee of Examination and

being recommended by the Committee on Admissions, he was advanced to the Class of the Third Year.

QUESTION THIRTEEN of the General Minutes was called, viz., **Who are transferred to other Conferences?**

The Bishop announced the transfer of William A. Lambeth, an Elder, to the North Georgia Conference, and H. L. Hoffman, an Elder, to the Virginia Conference.

C. D. BULLA, representing the General Board of Christian Education, H. H. Sherman, Executive Secretary, and W. G. Winton, Extension Secretary of the Conference Board, addressed the Conference in regard to the work of this new Board, and the Conference by a rising vote pledged the board and its officers their cooperation and support.

QUESTION SIX of the General Minutes was called, viz., **Who are admitted into full connection?**

Conrad William Jordan, Charles Carroll Burruss, John Sanders Schwartz and Francis Henry Strieby were called forward. The Bishop addressed them impressively and propounded the Disciplinary questions, and on motion they were severally admitted into full connection.

THE TIME of the Conference was extended to receive the following Resolution:

"With a deep interest in the matters of fundamental value to our Conference, and feeling specifically that the time of meeting for the sessions of our Annual Conference is an item of vital concern to our general success and prosperity; therefore be it

"Resolved, That we do hereby request that a special committee be appointed this morning by the Bishop to consider an appropriate time in October as the date for the meeting of our Annual Conference, and that this Committee make its report to this Conference on next Monday morning.

FOURTH DAY.**Morning Session.**

Monday, September 29th, 1930.

Conference met at nine o'clock.

Bishop Beauchamp in the chair.

J. H. Balthis announced Hymn No. 506 after which he read a selection from the Forty-Second Psalm and led in prayer.

MINUTES of the preceding session were read and approved.

QUESTION EIGHTEEN of the General Minutes was called, viz., **What traveling preachers and what local preachers have been ordained deacons?**

QUESTION TWENTY of the General Minutes was called, viz., **What traveling preachers and what local preachers have been ordained elders?**

The Bishop presented the following certificate to the above named question:

"This certifies that I, W. B. Beauchamp, one of the Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, after a sermon preached by me in the Mount Vernon Place Church, in the City of Washington, District of Columbia, on Sunday morning, September 28th, 1930, did ordain each of the following traveling preachers to the office of Deacon in the Church of God, each of them having been elected to that office by the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and each of them being presented for ordination to that office by H. M. Canter, an Elder, and also the Secretary of the Annual Conference mentioned above, namely:

"Albert Hinkle Shumate, Francis Henry Strieby, Edward Davis Walraven, Samuel Herman Schwartz, Delis C. Alford and Charles Miller Flippin, the last four Local Preachers."

"Following a sermon preached by F. J. Prettyman in the evening of the same day, and at the same church, I ordained each of the following Traveling Preachers to the office of Elder in the Church of God, each one having been elected to that office by the Annual Conference named above, and each one being presented for ordination to that office by the Secretary named above, namely:

"Harold Hetzer Hoyt, Charles Roy Curtis, Emory Wilson Jordan, Floyd Montgomery Lucas, Harry Stockton, Myerly, Edwin Samuels Sheppe, Jr., Edward Byrnes Cook, William James Elliott and David William Persinger, the last named being a Local Preacher.

"In this service W. H. Ballengee, an Elder, read the Epistle, and J. Howard Wells, an Elder, read the Gospel. Both of these above named Elders assisted me in the laying on of hands.

"Done in the City of Washington, District of Columbia, this twenty-eighth day of September, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and thirty.

"(Signed) W. B. BEAUCHAMP."

THE NAME of H. S. Coffey was presented by Presiding Elder of Winchester District in nomination to fill a vacancy on the Board of Missions from the Winchester District, created by the election of H. H. Sherman as Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education.

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS presented S. K. Cockrell in nomination for this same vacancy.

THE BISHOP ruled that the Board of Missions for the quadrennium was not actually in existence until the close of the present session of the Conference, and that the Presiding Elders had the right to fill the vacancy. On motion H. S. Coffey was elected a member of the Board of Missions.

S. K. COCKRELL rose to a point of personal privilege and explained that his nomination had been through no choice of his own, and that he stood ready now, as always, to serve the Conference in any capacity to the best of his ability.

THE NAME of W. J. Groah was presented by his Presiding Elder in nomination for the vacancy on the Board of Christian Education created by the election of W. G. Winton as Extension Secretary of that Board. The Board presented in nomination for the same vacancy the name of C. L. Beard.

THE BISHOP ruled that while this was a quadrennial Board it had no predecessor and began to function immediately upon election in accordance with the requirements of the Discipline, and being in existence had the right to fill its own vacancy.

ON MOTION the name of W. J. Groah was withdrawn and C. L. Beard was elected a member of the Board of Christian Education.

W. J. GROAH was nominated and elected to the Board of Finance in place of C. L. Beard.

THE REPORT of the Commission on Budget was presented and read. An amendment was offered to the report that the assessment for the Baltimore Southern Methodist be so changed as to place it on the same basis as last year, and the amendment prevailed.

IT WAS MOVED to recommit the report to the Commission on Budget with instructions to reduce the Annual Conference Assessment to one hundred thousand dollars.

A SUBSTITUTE was offered to reduce the Annual Conference askings by ten thousand dollars, and to request the Budget Commissions of the various Districts to place the total amount as they deemed best, but the substitute did not prevail.

THE ORIGINAL motion to recommit was carried.

ON MOTION the Commission on Budget was instructed, in making this reduction, to scale all items in the Budget on the same basis.

QUESTION FORTY-THREE of the General Minutes was called, viz.,
Who is elected Conference Lay Leader?

ANSWER—M. L. Walton, Jr., of Woodstock, Virginia.

QUESTIONS twenty-four, twenty-five, twenty-six, twenty-seven, twenty-eight, twenty-nine, thirty, thirty-one, thirty-two, thirty-three, thirty-four, thirty-five, thirty-six, thirty-seven, thirty-eight, thirty-nine, forty, forty-one and forty-two were severally called and answered.

Reports of the Board of Finance and Treasurer of the Board of Finance were presented and read.

REPORT No. 2.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The Board reports:

1. The Board received a request that W. S. Thomas be appointed post chaplain at the Staunton Military Academy and a request that John F. Owens be appointed a student at the Candler Theological School of Emory University. The Board approves and respectfully requests the Presiding Bishop to make these appointments.

2. The Board received from the Danville District Conference of the Virginia Conference a resolution respecting a change of the charter of the Randolph-Macon system concerning the election of members of the Randolph-Macon Board of Trustees. The resolution is hereto attached, as follows:

Resolved, First, That we, the Danville District Conference memorialize the Virginia Annual Conference and the Baltimore Annual Conference, respectively, to urge the Randolph-Macon Board of Trustees to change their annual charter so that the Board may be constituted and may function as follows:

(a) Reduce the number of members of the Board to a maximum of twenty-four, sixteen from the Virginia Conference and eight from the Baltimore Conference with an equal number of ministers and laymen from each Conference.

(b) That two preachers and two laymen from the Virginia Conference and one preacher and one layman from the Baltimore Conference be selected to serve one year. That two preachers and two laymen from the Virginia Conference and one preacher and one layman from the Baltimore Conference be selected to serve two years. That two preachers and two laymen from the Virginia Conference and one preacher and one layman from the Baltimore Conference be selected to serve for three years. That two preachers and two laymen from the Virginia Conference and one preacher and one layman from the Baltimore Conference be selected to serve for four years, after which two preachers and two laymen from the Virginia Conference and one

preacher and one layman from the Baltimore Conference shall be selected each year for a term of four years.

(c) That no trustee and no officer of any of the institutions in the system be eligible to membership on the Board of Trustees.

Resolved, Second, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the secretary of the Virginia Annual Conference and to the Baltimore Annual Conference to be presented to their respective Conferences.

Resolved, Third, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the Richmond Christian Advocate and to the Baltimore Southern Methodist for publication.

REPORT OF BOARD OF FINANCE.

We note with pleasure the growth of the Superannuate Endowment movement during the past year as reported by the General Secretary, Dr. Luther E. Todd. We now have over six millions of dollars in hand, an increase of \$184,644 in capital for the year. \$188,462.66 was distributed to claimants on the basis of years of service, on July 1, 1930. The Baltimore Conference has in the Conference Endowment funds, handled by the General Board, \$89,154.42, from which we receive this year for our claimants \$5,104.09. We have received a nice increase from our Corporate Board of Finance, while the publishing house has sent us almost as much as they did in the very prosperous year of 1929. The Baltimore Conference stands third in percentage

paid on quota, among the Conferences of our Church. The recent General Conference has directed the continuance of our effort during this quadrennium. We call your special attention to the adjustment of unpaid quotas at the first quarterly Conference, and request our Presiding Elders to give special consideration to this plan of the Board.

We request the Conference to designate December of each year as "Superannuate Endowment Month" and urge our preachers to plan therefor special effort to raise adjusted balances.

We request Bishop W. B. Beauchamp to appoint Rev. H. L. Hout Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment and request that he be given a place on the program of our District Conferences to present this cause.

Your Board has found that the treasurers of our boards are most all bonded by their boards, therefore we ask the Conference to rescind their former instructions to bond all treasurers and direct the board to have only the Treasurer of the Conference and treasurer of this Board of Finance bonded.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

With this report the work of the Board of Education under the old order comes to a close. At the last General Conference a new order was set up looking to the consolidation of the Board of Education, the Sunday School Board and the Epworth League Board into a new Board to be called the Board of Christian Education. We are glad to be able to turn over to the new Board the work which has been under our care in the past. Our people have shown an ever deepening interest in the field of education. The Institutions of learning connected with the Conference have for the most part prospered, though they have passed through the vicissitudes common to all schools today. The Randolph-Macon system in which we have been associated with the Virginia Conference has a standing in the field of education equal to the best in the country.

The charter for Randolph-Macon College was granted in February, 1830, and by charter this college is the oldest Methodist College in America. The trustees, faculty and alumni have planned to celebrate the one hundredth anniversary on October 23rd and 24th of this year. The celebration is to be in keeping with the splendid traditions and history of the Institution. Distinguished speakers and educators have been engaged to present the phases of our educational problem, and many social events, especially interesting to the alumni have been planned. Former students from all points of the nation are manifesting an intense interest in this occasion and are signifying their intention to meet their former classmates at this celebration. It will be very fitting for this conference, that has had such a large part in the making of the college, to be well represented. Bishop Beauchamp will be one of the principal speakers and the college invites and urges the alumni and the members of this conference to plan to be present for a better acquaintance and appreciation of the work of the Institution.

Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal is the only one of the system situated within the bounds of our Conference. It has grown through the years giving an opportunity for boys to be educated under the finest Christian influences during the most critical period of character building and to prepare themselves for the advanced courses in College. Unfortunately the main building of this school was destroyed by fire. It was rebuilt by order of the Board of Trustees of Randolph-Macon system at a very heavy cost and is now burdened with a debt that must be financed in some way. We make no recommendations but leave this matter in the hands of a new Board of Christian Education to be elected at this session of Conference. One of the interests of the Church coming under the direction of this Board has been the assistance given worthy young men in their preparation for the ministry. The Board has looked upon this cause as one of primary importance. The Committee on Ministerial Supply

and Training has given constant and most effective care to the proper administration of the funds appropriated to this department of our work. We heard with great satisfaction the strong emphasis that is now being placed upon the whole cause of Christian education. It has been said with a large degree of justification that the modern science of Education has broken down at the point of character. Our Church has now committed itself to the task of furnishing a unified system of distinct Christian Education in which we propose to direct the mental and moral development of the youth committed to our care through the whole period of their school life. This includes the work done in this field in the Sunday School, the Epworth League, the Academy and the College. It is a high adventure. It is a mighty task, We believe that our Conference will enter most heartily into the new order and endeavor to work out its ideals to the highest success, and to the glory of God.

We thank the Conference for the unstinted support that they have given this Board and we bespeak from them the enthusiastic support that the new Board of Christian Education will demand and merit.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON LAKE JUNALUSKA METHODIST ASSEMBLY.

At the last meeting of the Conference, Dr. E. L. Woolf and Blair J. Fishburn were elected trustees, one to serve two years, the other one year. Fourteen Annual Conferences thus far have elected trustees to hold this property for the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The trustees met and were organized as the Lake Junaluska Methodist Assembly, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and incorporated under the laws of the State of North Carolina.

The present holding of the Lake Junaluska Methodist Assembly amounts to \$1,000,000 with an indebtedness of \$280,000. The income for the year 1930 amounted to \$30,000, leaving a balance of \$2,900 after deducting all expenses. An effort is being made to liquidate the indebtedness by a group of representative men headed by Bishop Ainsworth.

During the year of 1930 there were more than 20 conferences, councils and camps conducted, including the following: Sunday School Leadership School, Epworth League Assembly, School of Missions, Summer School of Religion, and Spiritual Life Conference.

The general condition of the property is in good state of repair, several thousand dollars having recently been spent on improvement.

The General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, meeting in Dallas, included in the General Apportionments an amount for the Western Methodist Assembly at Mount Sequoyah and the Lake Junaluska Methodist Assembly. Each annual conference has the right to decline its pro rata of such apportionments or any part thereof. The money thus raised East of the Mississippi to go to Lake Junaluska Methodist Assembly.

Your committee recommends M. L. Walton, Jr., as trustee for a two-year term.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.

We, your Board of Christian Literature, have had before us the annual statement of our Publishing House for the fiscal year closing February 28, 1930. This being the 75th anniversary of the founding of our Publishing House, the report is of very special interest.

The report shows that our Publishing House not only ranks among the leading publishers of religious and devotional books in our own country, but also in the world. The prices for the publications and also for our Sunday School literature are appreciably lower than other houses on almost every item.

The total sales of the house this year have reached almost the two million dollar mark and the net profits something more than \$150,000, which is a little short of 8%; \$100,000 has been appropriated for the benefit of claimants on the superannuate funds which is \$40,000 more than the amount appropriated the first year of the last quadrennium.

Your board regrets that the Christian Advocate and the Quarterly Review are still published at a considerable financial loss. The only remedy is to secure a large increase in the number of subscribers. How to do this is as yet an unsolved problem.

It is gratifying to note that notwithstanding the high order of the publications put out by the House that they continue to show improvement and it is hoped that all Southern Methodists will show their appreciation of the untiring labors of those in charge by giving the House their generous patronage.

A year's trial of the Circulating Library has given ample proof of the wisdom of this enterprise.

Your board has had before it the annual report of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company and after careful perusal recommends that it be adopted as presented.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN METHODIST PUBLISHING COMPANY.

We take pleasure in presenting to the Baltimore Conference the following report:

We desire to keep before the mind of the Conference the fact that the Southern Methodist Publishing Company exists for the sole purpose of serving the Conference in the publication of its official organ. The stock of this company was issued for the purpose of furnishing the capital to publish the "Baltimore Southern Methodist." It has never declared any dividends, nor has it ever paid any officer or member of the corporation for any service rendered. Its only asset is the good will of the Baltimore Conference. The salary of the editor and one secretary in the office are paid out of the general funds of the corporation received from subscriptions, advertising, and the assessment from the Conference. The editor is appointed by the Bishop in charge at the request of the Conference.

We are glad to report that so far as we have any knowledge the paper stands in high regard throughout the Conference. It has been strong in its deliverances on current topics and has ably represented the whole Conference in questions of general interest. We think that we can safely say that the paper has never enjoyed a larger popularity than at the present time.

With the assessment furnished by the Conference we are able to publish the paper without going into debt. The need of the paper becomes more and more apparent as time goes on. That unity of effort which is absolutely necessary to our success as a Conference would be impossible without it. As long as we remain a Conference engaged in a common task we will need this means of communication between us, and also the voice of a paper to express our united appeal to the world. We request that the present editor be again appointed to this great work. The Conference recognizes the splendid work that Dr. Harmon has done during the past year, and we desire to express our appreciation of his service in this most difficult field.

We are dependent upon the continued assistance given by the Conference by way of the assessment, and we ask for the same amount for the coming year.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

The following extracts from the letter of the Rev. T. D. Ellis, D.D., Secretary of the General Board of Church Extension to our Conference Board, we believe worthy of special attention from our Conference:

"It seems to us that there has been a period of extravagant and unbusinesslike financing of building enterprises in our Church. The result is that a number of churches have secured loans from institutions which were willing to finance large enterprises, loans beyond the ability of the congregations to repay promptly, hence bringing embarrassment to congregations, and, in some instances, serious loss of money and property. I suggest that you take under serious consideration the sounding of a warning note against large church debts, especially such debts as may not be easily repaid even should disaster overtake the congregation.

It seems to us that a larger percentage of Church Extension money should be used in starting new enterprises, rather than in aiding well-established congregations in the erection of larger and more beautiful houses of worship. This is especially true in reference to the donation funds both of the General and Conference Boards. The rapid growth of cities and the increasing number of industrial plants within the South call for many new church buildings and Church Extension funds should aid as liberally as possible in securing new locations and houses of worship for new congregations."

We desire to emphasize the value of the Architectural Department of the General Board and its head, Mr. H. M. King. We are under urgent necessity to make every sacrificial dollar that goes into a church building count for the most. Tragic mistakes have been made by inexperienced persons drawing plans for church buildings resulting in the loss of money and opportunity. No application will be considered by the General Board from any church whose building plans have not been endorsed by the Architectural Department. And our Conference Board at this session has decided to make the same requirement of all asking help of us.

As to our Loan Fund, we would suggest that folks remember it in their wills and have part in the building of churches many years after they have passed away.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

Introduction.

This report concludes the work of the former Sunday School Board of the Baltimore Annual Conference. We hereby express to our Heavenly Father our gratitude for blessings upon our efforts, and express to our brethren of the Conference our appreciation for the cooperation and sympathy in our work. We have been able to achieve a measure of success that is both gratifying and valuable, as we believe, to the Kingdom of God. Our sincere good wishes are extended to the new Board of Christian Education.

Leadership Training.

Our Board through its efficient workers has been unsparing in its effort to provide our Conference with a consecrated and trained leadership. Standard Training Schools and Cokesbury Classes have been held throughout our territory, issuing approximately 1,100 credits. Large numbers of our workers have become acquainted with the principles of religious education and with the methods of practical application, all thoroughly consistent with deep spiritual experience.

New Programs of Work.

As a part of the general plan for information and inspiration we have provided schools with our new programs of work as a standard for checking both objectives and degrees of progress.

Sunday School Day.

The great work of carrying on the program of Christian education within our Conference has depended in large measure for its financial support upon the contributions made by each school on Sunday School Day. Our Board has made special effort to realize the goal of observing this day with an offering in each of our schools, and is glad to report gratifying results towards this end.

Literature.

The printed page is more influential today than every before. Our Church has provided a thoroughly intellectual and a deeply spiritual Christian literature, and a literature that is soundly pedagogical as well. We are glad to report that nearly all of our Sunday Schools are now using our own denominational literature.

District Organization.

Our Board has sought to carry on much of its work through our District organizations. We hope that the values of the former District organizations will be preserved in any plans adopted by the new Board of Religious Education.

Missionary Offerings.

Two years ago the Conference adopted the following recommendations: "Whereas, our church law provides that the monthly missionary offerings in the Sunday School shall be applied as a special for missions as the Workers' Council may determine, with which law we are in full accord, and as a large majority of our Sunday Schools of the Baltimore Conference have been applying their monthly missionary offerings to the Conference assessments and could not immediately be relieved entirely of this responsibility without a material shortage in these assessments, we recommend that all Sunday Schools thus applying their missionary offerings in whole or in part be urged to apply at least a part of this offering to the Sunday School Missionary Special.

Employed Staff.

The fact that we have had a staff in the field for several years has increased decidedly the degree of achievement toward the ideals of Christian Education within our Conference. It is our hope that the new Board of Religious Education will continue the work so effectively carried on through our field staff.

Conclusion.

A supplementary report will be handed in by a special committee on recommendations and financial status. Our Board will pass on to the new Board of Religious Education a financial condition cleared of all outstanding obligations and with a surplus of approximately \$4,000. In addition, we relinquish to them as further assets the equipment of the present offices of the former Sunday School Board.

EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

We are happy to report a year of vitality and progress in this department of church activity.

There are 353 Epworth League Chapters with a membership of 10,988. The number of life service volunteers numbers 91. During the past year \$4,319.04 was contributed to the Mission Special and \$4,633.16 to Epworth Hall. Nearly 4,000 young people are enrolled in the three covenants. There were 136 mission study classes conducted the past year.

We desire to call attention to several special features in our League work—

THE MASSANETTA ASSEMBLY.

We would call attention to the Massanetta Assembly as an institution for the development of the talents of our young people and giving them inspiration for vigorous prosecution of their work in the various chapters from which they come. The atmosphere of this assembly is distinctively spiritual and has proven most helpful to all the Leaguers who have been privileged to attend these meetings.

THE QUIET HOUR COVENANT.

In this day when there is so much hurry and confusion, there is need for stressing the Quiet Hour Covenant which pledges all our young people to spend some time each day in meditation, reading the

Bible and prayer. This covenant has had a most wholesome effect on the spiritual life of our young people.

MISSION STUDY.

It has been the purpose of the Epworth League to enroll all its members in Mission Study classes for a more comprehensive understanding of the needs of our mission work and to familiarize themselves with history and progress in the various mission fields of our Church. This has had the effect of stimulating missionary activity among the young people of the Church.

THE RECREATIONAL DEPARTMENT.

The youth of today has such little leisure time so it is the purpose of this department to so direct the youth that they may spend their time in such a way as will be helpful to them physically and stimulate the mental and moral side of their natures.

LIFE SERVICE WORK.

It is a fact worth noticing that in nearly every instance those who offer themselves for the ministry or for missions at home and abroad come from among those who are working in our Epworth Leagues. These candidates for life service need guidance and instruction. This the League is endeavoring to do through the Department of Life Service and the good results can be affirmed by the large number who are now in the field of service either in the mission field or the ministry.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

The Bible Board of the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in annual conference assembled in the city of Washington, D. C., reiterates its spirit-inspired belief in the Holy Bible as the word of God, written by holy men who were moved by the Holy Ghost, and in that it constitutes the infallible rule of faith and practice, that it "is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness"; yea, that its gospel message is "the power of God unto salvation to every one that believes."

Further, the Board laments the fact that attempts to prohibit the presence of the Scriptures in the public schools and places of public concourse have in some measure succeeded, and is not insensible to the further attempts to bring reproach upon the sacred page; nevertheless, it stands upon the eternal promise "heaven and earth shall pass away but my word shall not pass away."

Further, in its endorsement of the work of the American Bible Society, the Board recognizes the Society's achievements in translation, publishing and distribution. Particularly, would the Board note the Society's new record established in 1929 in the number of volumes of embossed Scriptures distributed to the blind.

Now, be it resolved, first: that this Conference urge upon all its preachers the continued distribution of the Holy Word, in its complete form, in testaments and in portions of the various books. This can be done successfully in pastoral visitation as well as through efforts of a public nature.

Second: that the great enterprise of the American Bible Society be heartily approved and that Universal Bible Sunday, December 7, 1930, be observed in sermon, song and story of the marvelous successes of that organization.

Third: that the Gideons in their faithful stand for the Holy Bible and in their distribution of the same at the cross-roads of men, be given the support of this Conference and that we register our joy at their having exceeded their goal of placing one million Bibles in 1929.

**REPORT OF BALTIMORE CONFERENCE BOARD OF
LAY ACTIVITIES.**

Washington, D. C., September 25-29, 1930.

To the President and Members of the Baltimore Annual
Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South:

Dear Brethren:—

Your Conference Board of Lay Activities submits its annual report
as follows:

General Conference Legislation.

The last General Conference made some changes in the program
of work and the organization of the Board of Lay Activities to which
we direct your attention.

1. The scope of work is enlarged to include "Training of Church Officers" in cooperation with the Board of Christian Education.
2. The Charge and Church Lay Leaders and the Chairman of the Stewardship Committee are made members of the Quarterly Conference, being elected by the Quarterly Conference.
3. The District and Associate District Lay Leaders are members of the District Conference, and are elected as before.
4. The District Board of Lay Activities is required to meet with the District Stewards in the interest of the Benevolences and to plan the lay work for the year.
5. The Board of Stewards is made responsible for the work of lay activities in the charge and the local church under the direction of the pastor and lay leaders.

Stewardship.

We recommend that the program of Stewardship education be continued along the lines used during the past quadrennium: Stewardship revivals, sermons, lay programs on Stewardship, Stewardship pageants, the distribution of literature and Stewardship study classes in Pastors' Schools, Standard Training Schools, and in organized Bible classes in the Sunday School.

The Benevolences.

According to the instructions of the General Conference, the Board of Lay Activities will continue its efforts to promote full payment of all Benevolences, "but under the direction of the Commission on Benevolences." Success has attended our work in this regard in the past and we urge the entire lay organization, including the Board of Stewards of each Church, to cooperate earnestly in the plans outlined and adopted for this work. We must go forward in this endeavor until all our people are informed concerning the great causes represented in the Benevolence Dollar and gladly bring their offerings as an act of worship and an investment in the extension of the Kingdom of Christ.

Men's Work.

We urge our pastors and lay leaders and especially the Board of Stewards to study carefully the needs of the men in the local congregations for spiritual culture and development and to cooperate in the plans that shall be worked out by the General Board of Lay Activities in cooperation with the Board of Christian Education for the inspiration and enlistment of the men of the Churches.

The Methodist Layman.

We recommend the Methodist Layman not only as an official organ of the Lay Board, but also as a religious magazine for the men of

the Church and in particular for the members of the Boards of Stewards. This paper will prove to be invaluable to the Stewards in their new responsibility. We pledge ourselves to secure a wide circulation of this paper and set as our goal a subscription from each Lay Leader and each member of the Board of Stewards.

Laymen's Day.

We concur in the plan of the General Board for the observance of "Laymen's Day," using as the theme for the day, "The Way to Spiritual Power," and we ask the Conference to designate for this purpose the second Sunday in June, June 14, 1931. We pledge our best efforts to secure on this day a service conducted by laymen in every Church in the Conference.

Spiritual Life.

We pledge ourselves to an earnest effort to translate into action the keynote of Bishop Beauchamp's opening address at this session of the Conference in which he appealed for deeper spirituality as vital to the progress of the Church.

Leadership.

We earnestly plead for the sympathy, encouragement, and leadership of our Presiding Elders and Pastors in inspiring and training the lay organization for its task. We have only one desire and that is to serve as best we can in advancing the work of our great Church and the cause of Christ.

In Appreciation.

We wish to record our sincere love and esteem for our Bishop, Presiding Elders and pastors and pledge to them our loyal support in all their labors for our beloved Church.

Inter-Denominational Congress on Men's Work.

We have referred the selection of delegates to the Inter-Denominational Congress on Men's Work to be held in Cincinnati, Ohio, December 11-12, 1930, to the Executive Committee of the Board of Lay Activities.

World Conference on Stewardship and Church Finance.

The selection of a delegate to the World Conference on Stewardship and Church Finance to be held in Edinburgh, Scotland, in June, 1931, has also been referred to the same committee.

**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND
SOCIAL SERVICE.**

Your committee on Temperance and Social Service is convinced that we are facing a critical situation as regards the enforcement of the prohibition laws. Political expediency has prompted many office seekers to become turncoats in order to get elected. The strength of the dry vote has been much weakened in Congress by recent elections and it now looks as if there would be further weakening in this respect unless we can awaken renewed interest in this great moral issue.

The Methodist Church in its several branches has been severely criticized during recent months for so-called "lobbying" and "dabbling in politics." We are unafraid in the face of such accusations for we are sure that they come from enemies of moral righteousness who are not patriotic and are unchristian. We are convinced that no church should attempt to dominate a government nor should her ministry "preach politics" but believe that the Church and her ministry can no longer afford to be partisan, nor should they be intimidated by certain subtle influence, who in any and every crisis of local and national importance seeks by such means to hush the mouths of those who would cry aloud and spare not. The moral law is the highest law and must prevail. We first of all ought to be Christian. Let us teach our people that the right of franchise is sacred and urge them to vote their convictions as children of God.

We believe the enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment and the Volstead law to be practical and within the range of possibility, but we are aware that in many sections the law is being nullified by the treachery and fanaticism of officers whose duty it is to enforce the law. Education seems to be the greatest need in this respect. Let the home, the school and the church teach prohibition and in a generation there will be a transformation.

We desire also to call your attention to worldliness within the Church, such as the modern dance and the divorce evil. The divorce evil is a terrible monster that strikes at the very heart of our nation—the American home. We urge our ministers to observe great care in marrying divorced couples. Let us surround the altar of marriage with all the sacredness at our command.

It is enough to refer you to the discipline of our Church concerning the modern dance.

The Naval Conference in London, England, was, we believe, another step in the right direction of world peace.

In view of the foregoing, your committee begs to offer the following recommendations:

1. That this Conference whole-heartedly endorses the action of our last General Conference as regards temperance and social service, and that our Church shall not be considered political, but we reserve the right to lead our people in great moral issues and pledge ourselves to uphold the constitution of these United States.

2. That we express ourselves as being opposed to the settlement of international disputes by force of arms, and that we favor the reduction of armaments compatible with our policy of national defense.

3. That we go on record as opposing any modification of the Federal liquor laws and pledge ourselves to support the several agencies for the promotion of adequate enforcement.

4. That we use our influence to procure a uniform divorce law, and to refrain from marrying couples contrary to the discipline of our Church.

5. That the ministers of the Church call the people's attention to the evils of the modern dance and urge them to desist from it.

Whereas, the sanctity of the Lord's Day is vital alike to the best interest of the Home, Church and State;

Whereas, public sentiment is absolutely essential to the keeping of the Lord's Day as a Holy Day; therefore, be it

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, HOME OF THE AGED AND ORPHANS, OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH, INC., AND LOCATED AT GAITHERSBURG, Md.

Institutions of mercy are distinctly the product of Christian ideals. David Gregg suggests that we may search the ancient marbles in the museums of the world, the ruins of the buried cities of Greece and Rome, and question travelers from afar, "and in vain will you seek for the report of a single public institution of mercy, built and supported for the alleviation of human want and misery." These finer things are a legacy from Christian civilizations.

Your Board feels very keenly the responsibility of providing in the Baltimore Conference a very definite form of needed charity for the maintenance of the aged within the household of faith. We labour in your stead, but with a deep conviction that we are fulfilling the law of Christ in bearing the burdens of these aged comrades. We are greatly encouraged in this work by the sympathetic co-operation and generous support given by many pastors, officials and members throughout the bounds of the Conference.

The Board of Trustees gladly reports another successful year for this institution in spite of the serious difficulties encountered. Seven guests have been admitted during the year. We now have sixty-one members in the Home family.

Many improvements have been made in the Home during the year. The grounds have been graded and beautified. Swings, rocking chairs, awnings and such things have been supplied for their comfort. In spite of the prolonged drouth the farm has produced vegetables in abundance for the table. Many religious services and social occasions have been provided to meet the spiritual and social needs of our Home guests. Truly their lot has been cast in a pleasant place.

This has been an unusually difficult year from the financial standpoint. In the words of the Superintendent, "This has been the hardest year financially that the Home has ever experienced." In spite of the conditions, we have come through without a deficit on current running expenses. The yearly budget for the Home is approximately \$50,000. The semi-definite income is approximately \$20,000, which includes maintenance subscriptions amounting to approximately \$5,000; Christmas offering in the Sunday Schools and collections on Mother's Day in the congregations, \$5,000; farm, \$10,000. The remainder comes from memorials, contributions, annuity bonds, etc. We know it is necessary to greatly increase our definite sources of income and we earnestly request the pastors and superintendents of the local Church to pledge us their hearty support to this end. We have determined, with your help, to keep the support of the Home on a voluntary basis.

The Superintendent is interested in organizing Guilds in each district of the Conference to sponsor furnishing many things needed in the Home. Two such organizations have already been formed. The Baltimore Guild has assumed the responsibility for the upkeep of the dining room, and the Washington Guild has turned the north porches into comfortable outdoor living rooms and is now contemplating other needed improvements.

We commend the Superintendent, Rev. H. M. Wilson, as a devoted servant of the Home and an efficient leader in this important enterprise. We bespeak for him your heartiest co-operation as a guarantee of future success in this most worthy cause.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE HOSPITAL BOARD.

Your Conference Hospital Board begs leave to report that gratifying progress is being made in the development of the hospital program of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. During the past year the Methodist Hospital of Ft. Worth, Texas, representing a total cost for building and equipment of \$1,250,000, and with a capacity of 405 beds, has been opened. It is admitted to be one of the most complete hospital plants in the entire country. The Duke University Hospital, with a plant costing \$4,000,000, an endowment of \$6,000,000 and a capacity

of 400 beds, was opened in early July, and is destined to become one of the great hospitals of the world.

The Good Samaritan Hospital at Lexington, Kentucky, has recently let a contract for a new building which will cost \$300,000 and will increase the capacity of the institution 200 beds. A Southern Methodist Hospital is now being erected at Elkin, N. C., with a capacity of 50 beds and a location on a beautiful tract of 15 acres of land, one-half of the original cost being paid by the Duke Foundation.

The Rand-Johnson Memorial Building is being completed at Barnes Hospital in St. Louis at a cost of \$500,000, with an endowment for the surgical ward from the Rockefeller Foundation of \$450,000. This building will provide 200 additional beds for the Hospital. The Washington University Radiological Department, which is connected with the surgical ward of Barnes Hospital on the north side, is being completed at a cost of more than \$1,000,000, and the new 14-story Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Clinic is also being completed on a site near Barnes Hospital as a part of the Washington University Medical Center.

Your Board wishes to call your attention to the legislation enacted at Dallas whereby 80% of the Golden Cross funds raised in a Conference not having a hospital of its own shall be directed to our one connectional institution, the Southern Methodist Hospital and Sanatorium at Tucson, Arizona, the remaining 20% being allowed the General Hospital Board for its promotional work. Your Board is glad to report that a fund amounting to \$340.95 stands to our credit with the General Hospital Board in Atlanta, Georgia, and we hereby recommend that this amount be remitted to the Southern Methodist Hospital and Sanatorium at Tucson, to be used in the work of that worthy institution.

Your Board would urge upon Pastors and Presiding Elders the importance of making a careful selection of the Church and District Golden Cross Directors, in order that this cause may be promoted effectively throughout the bounds of the Baltimore Conference. Your attention is called to the fact that the Church Golden Cross Director, who is elected by the fourth Quarterly Conference, upon the nomination of the pastor, is now made, under the law of the Church, a member of the Quarterly Conference; and to the further fact that the District Golden Cross Director, who is appointed by the Presiding Elder, subject to confirmation by the District Conference, is made a member of the District Conference.

Your attention is called to the fact that under the present law all Golden Cross funds raised in the local Churches are to be remitted promptly to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference, and by him remitted monthly to the Treasurer of the General Hospital Board, 406 Wesley Memorial Building, Atlanta, Georgia, who shall see that the funds are sent without delay to the hospitals for which they were raised.

We recommend that Golden Cross Week in the Baltimore Conference shall include the third and fourth Sundays in May, since this is a more desirable period for the Enrollment than the week provided for in the Discipline, which includes the second and third Sundays in May.

We wish to announce that Mr. Fred. T. Barnett has been elected Associate Secretary and Treasurer of the General Hospital Board, and we wish to place in nomination for Conference Golden Cross Director the name of Dr. N. M. Canter, of Harrisonburg, Virginia.

We further recommend that the Commission on Budget be asked to set aside a small amount of money asked for by the Conference Hospital Board, in order that the Board may forward its work throughout the Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE.

To the Baltimore Conference of the
Methodist Episcopal Church, South:

Your Committee on Insurance has, through its agent, Rev. H. L. Hout, carried a group insurance policy of \$208,000 for the year 1929-1930 with the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States in two classes, viz., 190 Preachers for \$1,000 each and 9 for \$2,000 each at a cost of \$22.64 a thousand per year.

A dividend for 1928-1929 of \$1,197.21 was received from the company.

Three members of last year's group were dropped and six new applications were granted and added. One other was sent in and rejected by the company because the applicant failed to have an examination made.

Every member admitted on trial should at once join the group as he can then join without examination, and all who are eligible, and have not, should join because of the very cheap rate to them and for the help they could render in lowering the cost upon the Conference.

The policy covers both life insurance benefit and total and permanent disability benefits, and by the action of the Conference becomes a paid-up policy at superannuation.

We ask the Conference to direct the Treasurer to pay the Agent the sum of \$39.00 for the premiums of five who were superannuated at the last session of the Conference.

We recommend that the same amount be assessed for insurance as last year. Our Agent has attended to all the details of this work without remuneration and no provision is made for actual expenses of printing, postage and stationery. We, therefore, ask the Conference to instruct the Treasurer to pay our Agent, out of the Insurance fund, the sum of \$15.79 to reimburse him for the expense of the past year and suggest that the members of the group make their annual payment \$8.00, the twenty cents extra going to the Agent for his expenses.

We recommend the appointment of a standing committee of five on group insurance for the quadrennium who shall appoint one of their members as Agent to collect the premiums of the Preachers, paying the same to the Conference Treasurer, and to attend to the detail work.

REPORT OF THE BALTIMORE ANNUAL CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON BENEVOLENCES.

The Annual Conference Commission on Benevolences begs leave to report its organization and action as follows:

Chairman ex-officio, Bishop W. B. Beauchamp.
Vice-Chairman, M. L. Walton, Jr.

Mr. G. L. Morelock appeared before the Commission as the representative of the General Conference Commission on Benevolences and reported its recent organization at Nashville, Tennessee, and brought communications from that body.

Mr. Morelock read the recent action of the General Conference constituting the Annual Conference Commission on Benevolences as follows: Chairman, the Presiding Bishop, the Presiding Elders, the Chairmen of the various Conference Boards, and the District Lay Leaders.

The Commission under the law is to co-operate with the General Conference Commission on Benevolences and to promote in the Annual Conference the full program of cultivation for the General and Annual Conference Benevolences and the Annual Conference Commission on Benevolences as the regular agencies during the coming quadrennium for the cultivation of the Church with reference to its whole benevolent program and has charged these agencies with the primary responsibility of securing the regular Benevolences and the Voluntary Kingdom Extension Offering.

In view of this legislation of the General Conference, and the responsibility thereby conferred upon us, the members of the Baltimore Annual Conference Commission on Benevolences pledge their co-operation with the General Conference Commission on Benev-

olences in its effort to carry out the financial policy established by the recent General Conference.

(a) We hail the purpose of the General Conference, and the organized effort pursuant thereto, and of the General Commission on Benevolences, to stabilize the Benevolent Dollar in Methodist circles. We join with them in the passionate hope and Christ-like purpose to redeem this Benevolent Dollar until it is worth one hundred cents.

(b) We pledge our efforts and venture to pledge the co-operation of our entire Annual Conference in carrying out the wise and comprehensive cultural program inaugurated by the General Conference Commission in response to the instructions of the General Conference. We suggest, as requested by the General Commission, the months of January and February for the particularly intensive period of cultivation.

(c) We recommend that you authorize the Presiding Elders to distribute the Baltimore Conference allotment out of the Voluntary Kingdom Extension Offering among the various districts on the principle of their ability and willingness to pay. This allotment is \$40,564.00.

(d) We recommend that the expenses of the Commission shall be paid by the several participating boards and interests in proportion to the amount each receives from the budget.

MEMOIRS.

JEFFERSON W. DUFFEY.

Jefferson Waite Duffey was born in Moorefield, West Virginia, September 23, 1846. He was converted January 1, 1865, in Hebron Lutheran Church, located upon Capon River, Hampshire County, West Virginia, Rev. Peter Miller being pastor of the church, and two months later was received into the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Moorefield by Rev. James Beaty. He was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Moorefield Circuit September 28, 1867, Rev. John C. Dice, Presiding Elder, and Rev. Thomas Hildebrand, preacher in charge. He was admitted on trial in the Baltimore Conference at the session held in St. Paul's Church, Baltimore, March, 1870, Bishop Holland McTyeire presiding. He was ordained deacon at the Warrenton Conference, 1872, by Bishop Robert Paine, and Elder at the Staunton Conference, 1874, by Bishop David S. Doggett. He served the following charges:

At the Roanoke Conference, 1921, he was granted superannuation, at his own request, after fifty-one years in the active service. He served at different times on all the Committees and Boards of the Conference except the "Joint Board of Finance," the last Committee work being to examine on the Course of Study for admission on trial, on which Committee he served 12 years, during which time 95 men were admitted on trial into the Conference.

He was educated at Randolph-Macon College, from which college he received the honorary degree of D. D. and elected a Trustee of the College in 1892.

The above simple record of fifty-one years of active service was prepared practically as it is here written by Dr. Duffey himself and in view of his extreme modesty and shrinking from publicity it might stand alone on our records. However, it is our practice and our sacred privilege to record in simple form the activities of one of our departed brethren and place upon our minutes a brief word of appreciation of their services and an expression of our estimate of their life and ministry.

The boy born in the little mountain city of Moorefield, West Virginia, in 1846, was destined to grow to manhood under conditions that knit the fibre of his soul into threads of steel for the conflict of life. Two currents were running strong in the minds of the men of his day, each of them of far-reaching importance and lasting significance on the life of the country. One was the current of religious enthusiasm which was sweeping the country with an almost irresistible tide. The various divisions of Protestant Christianity were making their appeals to the people and winning great victories through their evangelical efforts. The different branches of the Church in their individual propaganda acted upon each other to increase their zeal, to deepen their convictions and awaken a spiritual and intellectual appreciation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

The other was mainly in the field of politics. The country was agitated with controversies centered upon the construction of the Constitution of the Nation which were fated to continue with ever increasing force until the country was swept into the maelstrom of the Civil War.

This boy grew to manhood amid these conflicting and awakening influences. He had not reached full manhood when the Civil War began in 1861, and we find him taking his place with his mountain comrades with a command known as "McNeill's Partisan Rangers." His experience of four years of Civil War was such as to forge the fibres of his soul in a furnace of fire. Having staked all during this fiery trial upon his convictions of right he came out of the conflict unsoiled and with a strength of character that could never be swerved from the path which he believed to be the path of duty and of honor. No prize however great or subtle could buy him, and no sacrifice was ever too great to be willingly endured for the cause in which he enlisted. His entrance into the ministry of the Gospel of Jesus Christ was equally as complete in its adventure of faith and service as had been his loyalty to the standard which he followed upon the battle field.

Endued with many qualities of greatness, chief among them gentleness and grace, he gave most distinguished and valued service to the Church.

Dr. Duffey had many qualities of mind and soul that made him one of the outstanding preachers of his day. His list of appointments shows that he was recognized as having the ability to meet the de-

mands of the Church in the centers of keenest intellectual activities and highest culture. Everywhere he preached the simple gospel with firmness and power, and yet with a winsomeness that drew to him all classes of men. Firm in his convictions, strong in his ability for sustained thinking, capable at times of high emotional inspiration, but always tender in his appeal, he won thousands to the standard of the Cross and to consecrated living.

People everywhere loved him and this was because he loved them. His supreme gift was probably in the sphere of personal contacts. It is to be doubted if he ever made an enemy. He had marvelous grace in the sick room and here all the tenderness and interest and care of the shepherd heart was unstintingly given to those of his flock who were passing through the dark shadows.

Dr. Duffey took little interest in the governmental and administrative policies of the Church. This was not because he did not feel the importance of organized efforts but because the sweep of his interest and the reach of his ministry were little affected by the changing policies of the day. He dealt wholly with spiritual interests and with eternal issues.

The fineness of his character was seen in his native sense of humor—that which was sordid and low amid the incongruities of life made little appeal to him, but running through all his processes of thought the finer and more subtle forms of humor lightened and illumined his preaching and conversation. He was never tiresome in the pulpit and always a charming companion in the social circle.

Dr. Duffey was at the time of his death one of the last two surviving veterans of the Civil War in our Conference. This is not the place to record his war experiences except to show how these laid the foundation of his life and service in the ministry. One incident pronounced by military experts to be one of the most daring feats of the war was when he, with a small detachment of confederate cavalry, entered Cumberland, Maryland, under cover of night where there were eight thousand union troops and kidnapped two Major Generals and carried the distinguished prisoners, Crook and Kelley, within the confederate lines. This with many other feats equally as daring and hazardous, illustrate the heroic mold in which his character was cast.

In the fifty-one years of active service in the Conference he was not less brave and heroic in fighting under the banner of the Cross.

Though the familiar verse of one of our hymns has been so frequently used in connection with the memoirs of other preachers its application to the life and ministry of Bro. Duffey is so evident that we feign would quote it here:

“Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last.

"Redeemed from earth and pain,
Ah! when shall we ascend;
And all in Jesus' presence reign
With our translated friend?"

The funeral services of Dr. Duffey were conducted after the manner of his own planning with the utmost simplicity. They were in charge of Dr. W. A. Lambeth and held in Mt. Vernon Church. Assisting in the services were Revs. J. H. Balthis, H. P. Hamill, J. C. Copenhaver, Frank T. Griffith, E. V. Regester and F. J. Prettyman. At his request two prayers during the services were offered by Dr. H. P. Hamill and Rev. Frank T. Griffith. He had expressed the wish that there would be no flowers except a white and a red rose laid upon his coffin— emblems of the Confederacy. His remains, draped with the flag of the Nation and the flag of the Confederacy were interred with military honors in the Confederate section of the National Cemetery at Arlington, Virginia.

His body sleeps with the comrades of his boyhood. We cannot doubt that the company of souls redeemed by the blood of Christ and brought to salvation through his ministry welcomed this hero of the Cross to the land of eternal peace.

Surviving him are his beloved wife, two sons and two daughters. To these we express our deepest sympathy and rejoice with them in their inheritance of his life and character.

J. H. WILHITE.

J. H. Wilhite was born March 2nd, 1860, near North River, Virginia. His parents were members of the Lutheran Church, and he grew up in the delightful atmosphere of a Christian home. He was converted at the age of sixteen in an old school house where Fairview Methodist Church now stands. He attended the public school at Mount Crawford, Virginia, where he was associated with H. H. Sherman, B. V. Switzer and W. J. Whitesell, men who have become leaders in our Conference and Church.

He taught school for some years, and while teaching he felt a divine call to the ministry and yielded himself without reservation to the call of God. He entered Randolph-Macon College to better prepare for his life work. He was licensed to preach by the Quarterly Conference of Bridgewater Charge, Rockingham District, under the administration of J. H. Waugh, D.D., Presiding Elder.

He joined the Baltimore Conference in 1890, and served with acceptability the following charges: West River, two years, as junior preacher under G. H. Zimmerman; Rockville, three years as junior

preacher under L. L. Lloyd; Freedom, one year as junior preacher under W. A. McDonald; Frederick City, four years; Elkton, three years; West Washington, two years; Woodstock Mission, one year; Sudbrook, one year; Brentwood, two years; North Point, four years; Burlington, four years; Petersburg, six years; Brucetown, part of one year.

Broken in health, believing that his work was done, no longer able to go out and come in as the loving shepherd of the flock, he took the superannuate relation. He made his home for some years with friends in Maryland, but as his health declined he came back to his old home in Virginia to die. After reaching the home of his sisters he was never able to leave his bed; and for nine months suffered intense pain, but he bore it all with the courage of a soldier and the patience of a saint.

At the home of his sister, Mrs. Tom Tutwiler, North River, Virginia, he passed to his eternal rest on Tuesday, June 17th, 1930. His funeral was held from the Methodist Church at Mount Crawford, conducted by Dr. H. M. Canter, Presiding Elder of the Rockingham District, assisted by Rev. J. C. Thrasher, Rev. H. M. Roane, Rev. C. L. Potter, Rev. B. V. Switzer, Dr. G. G. Martin, Rev. M. L. Fearnow, Rev. W. A. Lynch and the writer.

It was a beautiful life this man lived—strong, tender, loyal to his friends; almost, if not altogether, without enemies—happy in his work. He had an exalted conception of the Christian ministry, and he preached what he had, namely, experimental religion. No man ever lived less of self-seeking in him. He never planned for himself. In the years of his ministry he never lifted a finger for an appointment. Recognizing the great doctrine of stewardship in things material, he was an example of Christian liberality. And during the years of his superannuation he sent a tenth of his meager salary to his home Church.

He loved the brethren of the Conference with a genuine and deep affection, which increased with the passing years. And the letters he received from them during his prolonged sickness he cherished and kept in a box by his bed, and would have you read them when you went to see him.

It now remains for us to assume the mantle that he has laid down to dedicate our lives to the task to which he was so nobly consecrated, and to walk with like faith and courage for the glory of the Master. He is not dead. The scene of his pilgrimage has but changed. A turn of the road has brought him into the glorified presence of his Lord, and to a joyful reunion with those whom he had "loved long since and lost a while."

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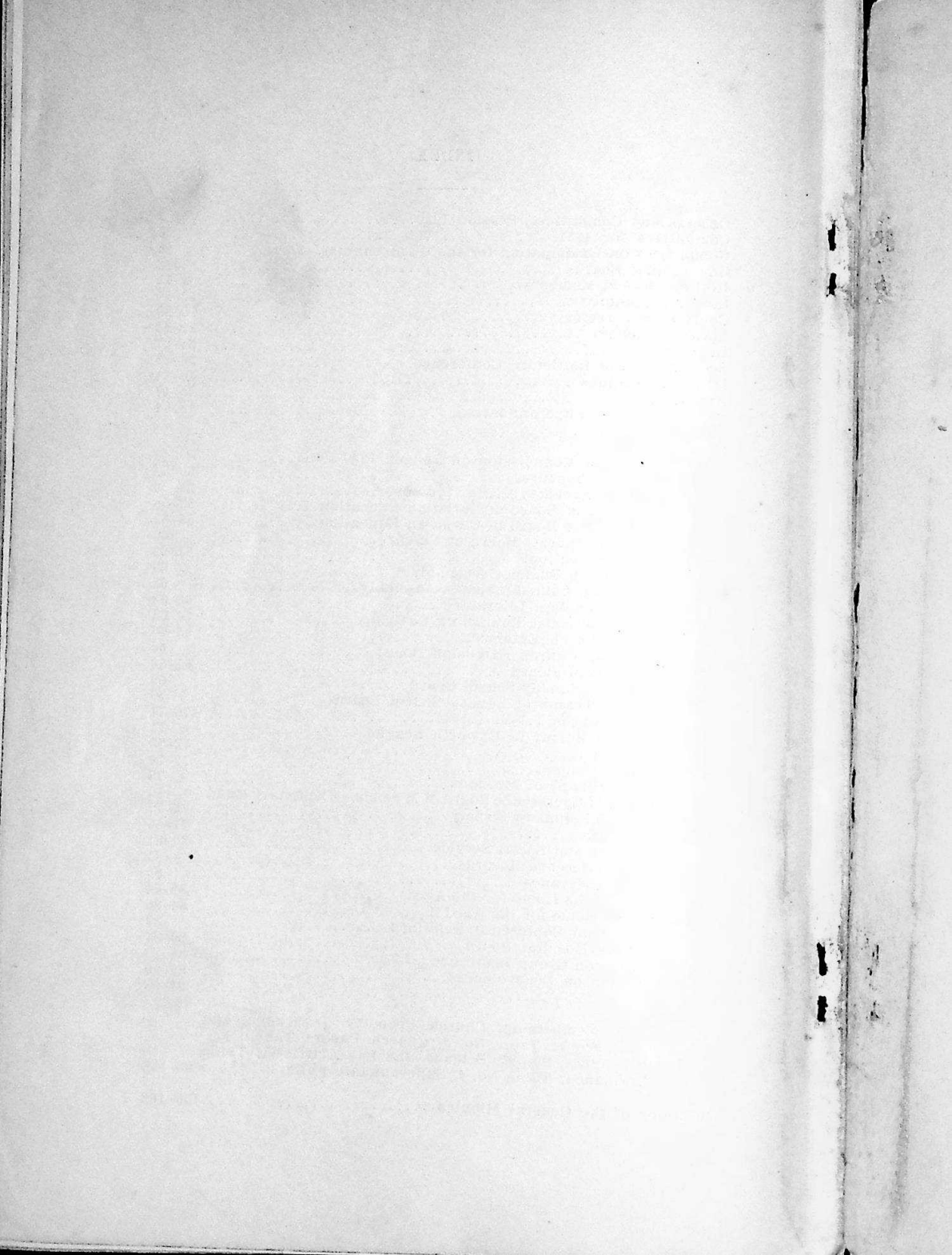
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
