FIRST DAY.

Morning Session.

Wednesday, September 30, 1931.

After the Holy Sacrament, administered by Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon, assisted by the several Presiding Elders, the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its 147th Session in Greene Memorial Church, Roanoke, Virginia, at ten o'clock A. M.

Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon, President of the Conference, in the Chair.

Friday, October 2nd, 1931.

"RESOLVED, That N. B. Harmon, Jr., Recording Secretary, Rev. W. H. Best and the Presiding Elder of the Baltimore District be appointed a committee to cooperate with like committees of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Protestant Church in making available the valuable historical records of our Conference, and that they be given authority to examine, exhibit and edit the same, or to have copies made of them as in their judgment they may deem best."

REPORT of the Committee on Conference Group Insurance was presented, read and upon motion adopted.

BISHOP MOUZON resumed the Chair.

REPORT of the Board of Temperance and Social Service was presented and read.

Bishop James Cannon, Jr., President of the General Board of Temperance and Social Service, addressed the Conference.

By request, Bishop Mouzon also spoke to this report, and upon motion the report was adopted.

S. V. HILDEBRAND, Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs, moved that a session of the conference be held Sunday afternoon at three o'clock to receive report of that Committee, and to hold a memorial service for those preachers who have died during the year, and the motion prevailed.

QUESTION EIGHT of the General Minutes was called, viz., Who are Readmitted?

Bishop James Cannon, Jr., took leave of the Conference in a brief address.

Conference adjourned, with the Benediction by Bishop Mouzon, to meet tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

read a portion of the eighth chapter of the Epistle to the Romans and impressively addressed the Conference.

THE SECRETARY informed the Conference that Mr. Richard Hamrick of Staunton, Virginia, had in his keeping an adding machine which was the property of this body, and moved that the same be given to the Home for the Aged and Orphans at Gaithersburg. The motion prevailed.

S. K. Cockrell and Dr. C. P. Clark spoke to the report, and Bishop Mouzon in a brief address urged upon the Conference the pre-eminent importance of deepening the spiritual life, which was the burden of the report.

Upon motion the report was adopted.

REPORT of the Commission on Budget was presented and read.

C. H. Cannon moved to amend the report by raising the amount allowed for the Baltimore Southern Methodist from \$8,900 to \$10,000.

William Stevens offered a substitute to raise the total amount of the Budget from \$100,000 to \$102,500, and the substitute prevailed.

ON MOTION it was ordered that the amount allowed for the Baltimore Southern Methodist be \$10,000; that the allotment for conference expenses be increased \$750 and the allotment for conference insurance be increased \$650. The report as thus amended was adopted.

forty and forty-one of the General Minutes were severally called and answered.

THE BISHOP called the attention of the Conference to the net loss in membership, deploring the necessity for such a report, and urging the Conference to make this its first concern, and to give its supreme effort to the saving of souls, preaching earnestly upon such subjects as Sin, Regeneration, Religion in the Home, the Bible, the Church and Salvation Through Faith.

THE NAME of F. H. Strieby was called, his character passed and he was advanced to the Class of the Fourth Year.

THE FOLLOWING resolution, signed by J. J. Rives and Frank A. Tyler was presented and adopted unanimously by a rising vote:

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SPIRITUAL LIFE OF THE CHURCH.

Bishop H. N. McTyeire said that the Methodists did not start out to reform the world, but to reform themselves. Primarily, they were seeking not a revival for all mankind, but a revival in their own hearts. This ideal was never more timely than at present, having as we have a vast and complex organization, laying upon us multitudinous duties which tend to deaden the tone of the spiritual. We must have a care lest we overlook the basic principles upon which our Methodism was founded—that is the cultivation of our own personal piety and holiness.

We are aware as a Church of an acute loss of spiritual power. On every hand we see indications that point to a growing laxity in our people's views of religion and private morality. So much is this so, that actions that once would have disqualified us as Methodist people, are now taken as matters of course. This world is too much with us, and we are too much a part of the world. There never was a time when there was a greater need to come forth and be separate and become again a people zealous of good works than there is at present.

That there is an intense yearning for a deepening work of grace in the hearts of the people, we are convinced. Secular influences surround them upon all occasions and in many cases even our preaching is permeated more with the matter of present-day happenings than with the timeless and eternal deeps that reveal the love of God. It is almost pathetic to see how the populace will turn to the preacher whose voice sounds the note of heavenly authority, and whose tones are those of a gospel messenger. It is wonderful to observe how the character of a lay man or lay woman known, read and respected of all ever can undergird an entire community. We need better patterns of correct life and more perfect examples of Christian living.

The early Methodists were much given to searchings of heart. Many of them kept journals, not to preserve the minute records of their every-day lives, but in order to examine properly the manner in which they spent their time day by day. Others were never so critical of their conduct as they were of their own. They made every minute count and were opposed to many habits and even songs, not because these were harmful in themselves, but because they did not definitely tend to the glory of God.

It is time for us to take account of these things and to outline for our own lives and for those of our people a course of conduct and daily living looking toward the more complete supremacy of the spiritual. We are not to be as other people are. We are to live each day as God would have us live and climb each year more and more in spiritual grace. The early Methodists rightly or wrongly aimed at living the sinless life. Their goal was high whether or not they fell short

of it. We can imagine no better ideal to set before the whole Church at present than to ask every member of it to so live and so act and pray as that they may ultimately attain unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ.

Therefore, in view of these things we make the following recommendations:

1. We recommend that our people give more earnest heed to those means of grace conducive to the strengthening of the spiritual, such as family worship, reading of the Word, private prayer, attendance upon the sanctuary.

2. That seasons of prayer, heart-searching and self-examination known as a series of Spiritual Life Conferences be observed in our Annual Conference.

3. Due to the geographic shape of our Conference, we suggest that these conferences be three in number and that they be designated as follows in order that they may be accessible to our people—Washington City, Roanoke City, Harrisonburg, Va.—and that the time of these conferences be left to the discretion of our Bishop.

Let the following year be with all our people a year of spiritual striving. Let us be more methodical in our observance of those things which we ought to do. So shall we be Methodists again.

REPORT No. 1.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The Board of Christian Education is anxious to do its work with efficiency and wishes to present its plans to the Conference. We recognize that the key to the program is vested largely in the local church board. About one hundred such boards have been set up and the plan is gradually finding its place in the operations of the local church program.

Training Work.

During the year 26 Standard Training Schools have been held offering three or more courses and 992 credits awarded for the work done. The Conference school for pastors and other Christian workers, held at Front Royal, was the largest and most enthusiastic in the history of the school. This, with all other training work done through other methods, makes a total of 1,590 credits for the year.

Young People's Assembly.

The Young People's Assembly at Massanetta had an enrollment of about 400 and was characterized by a fine fellowship, high spiritual tone, and deep moral earnestness.

Schools and Colleges.

The increased attendance at the R. M. College is gratifying, with enrollment of 280. It is also gratifying that the Academy at Front Royal paid its running expenses and reduced its indebtedness about \$11,000 last year, with the help given by the Conference. The work at the State Institutions in the Boards of the Conference is of a high order and means a great deal to the young people who will soon be the leaders of thought and action in the State. Especially is this true of the State Teachers' College at Harrisonburg.

Ministerial Supply and Training.

During the year the board is helping through loans and donations fifteen young men who are preparing for the ministry. The sources of income for the board for this special work are as follows:

1. The Conference assessment.
2. Income from two legacies.
3. Repayment on loans.
4. Special contributions.

It is among the most valuable work the board is doing.

Recommendations.

1. That training work be continued and extended as rapidly as possible to all of the leaders in the local churches so that all shall have an opportunity to take these courses. This can be done through standard schools, classes in local churches, or through correspondence. The need is greater this year because of the lack of a full-time extension secretary.

2. That the local church boards be organized in each church according to the plans of the board.

3. That the fourth Sunday Missionary Program be put on in each Sunday School and that the offering or a reasonable part of it be sent promptly each month to the Board for home and foreign Missionary enterprises.

4. That the Conference School at Front Royal and the Young People's Assembly be held as usual. If feasible that camps be provided for Intermediate groups.

5. That Church College Day, both quarterly and annual, be observed with every fifth Sunday presenting the needs and especially that the work of our schools be brought to the attention of our people.

6. That Sunday School Day be observed in all our churches with suitable programs and offerings taken for work of the Board.

7. That the organization of Conference, District and Group Councils be maintained to make more for reaching and more effective our unified program of Christian Education.

8. That as soon as practicable a Young People's Secretary be employed as a member of the staff to give special attention to this divi-

sion of the work and that Young People's Assembly, formerly called Epworth League Day, be observed at the usual time in each church. It may be a Young People's Day where no Epworth League has existed.

9. That World Temperance and Prohibition Sunday be observed for its educational value to offset the misleading reports of the wet daily newspaper. Also Childhood and Youth Week be observed whenever possible.

10. That we shall emphasize evangelism as the supreme objective of all church programs of Christian Education. We must be awakened to the fact that our S. S. Enrollment is less now by 6,000 than it was five years ago. We are not satisfied, but we feel that if the program of Christian Education can be put on in every local church and be efficiently conducted it will not only regain for us those we have lost, but will also give us a more intelligent leadership for the minimum task of reaching the unreached.

REPORT OF BOARD OF FINANCE.

We note with no little pleasure the excellent management of our General Board of Finance through its careful and systematic General

Secretary, Dr. Luther E. Todd, as evidenced by his excellent annual report recently submitted. In caring for our Superannuate Endowment Fund, now reaching \$6,443,093.21, which evidences an increase of \$184,644.00 in capital for the year, there was realized notwithstanding the financial depression 5.24 per cent.

\$184,364.57 has been distributed to the claimants on the basis of years of service on July 1, 1931, of which our claimants received \$7,544.49.

The Baltimore Conference has, in the Conference Endowment Fund, handled by the General Board \$91,865.64 from which we receive this year for our claimants \$4,960.43.

Very many of our charges throughout the bounds of our Conference in the adjustment authorized by the General Conference have ignored their former quota almost entirely causing the Conference to decrease the amount it had agreed to pay by \$118,417.90.

We are glad to report that 20 of our charges will pay their original quota in full, 54 have promised to take an annual offering. All the others with few exceptions have agreed to raise from \$100 to \$500 during the present quadrennium. We plead with every preacher to do his very best for Superannuate Endowment as it will be more and more needed in the years to come.

We have received this year from our Corporate Board of Finance \$5,000.00, while the Publishing House has sent us their check for \$3,878.75.

The Baltimore Conference again stands third on amount paid on original quota among the Conferences of our Church.

In accordance with the action of our Conference last year, December is known as Superannuate-Endowment Month, and we urge our preachers to plan therefor special effort to raise adjusted balance.

We request Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon to appoint Rev. H. L. Hout, the nominee of the General Board, as Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment, in connection with his relation to the Conference, and request that he be given a place on the program of our District Conference to present this cause.

The Treasurer of the Conference and the Treasurer of the Board of Finance are bonded as directed by the Conference.

We would note with much sorrow the passing of Brother A. C. Nadenbousch, who, for many years, has been an active member of this Board and request the Conference, through its Committee on Memoirs, to give him proper recognition.

During the year Brother A. Lee Shaw a member of this Board passed away. Brother Shaw was an interested, active and efficient co-laborer, and he will be missed from among us.

**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON LAKE JUNALUSKA METHODIST
ASSEMBLY.**

We, your committee on Lake Junaluska Assembly, have had before us the annual report of the Board of Trustees of the Assembly, which indicates that the 1931 season was one of the most satisfactory ever held. Several thousand persons from both east and west of the Mississippi River attended the various conferences, schools and camps. The Missionary Conference, the Spiritual Life Conference, the Laymen's Conference, the Leadership Schools and the School of Religion were led by men and women of exceptional ability. Our presiding officer, Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon, was among the outstanding speakers on the program this past summer.

Since the meeting of this conference last year, the Executive Committees of the General Board of Missions and the General Board of Christian Education have met with the Executive Committee of the Assembly to discuss ways and means of making the Assembly of larger usefulness to the Church. With the cooperation of these two great Boards of our church, the Trustees of the Assembly have great hopes of making the Assembly one of the greatest institutions of its kind in America.

Plans are now being made for a great Bible Conference, Laymen's Conference, Missionary Conference, Leadership Schools and other important meetings for 1932, to which will be invited the outstanding religious leaders of the world. Your committee will be glad to cooperate with the Conference Boards and agencies in promoting attendance upon these meetings.

We recommend the appointment of District Directors for Lake Junaluska to assist in advertising the various schools and conferences.

We further recommend that the pastors call attention of their people to the advantages offered at Lake Junaluska for training and inspiration.

We recommend the election of Dr. E. L. Woolf as a Trustee for a two-year term.

REPORT No. 1.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.

The status of the Baltimore Southern Methodist was presented to the Board in the report of the Board of Directors of the paper and by the Editor. The paper has been run thus far under the management of Dr. Harmon without incurring an indebtedness. However, the returns from the assessments have fallen off to such a degree that it has become impossible to continue publication without either incurring debt or asking for a larger assessment for the paper. The Editor and the Board of Directors of the paper as well as the Board of Christian Literature are all opposed to the paper incurring debt. There remain only three possibilities: Suspend publication; merge with some other Conference organ; or levy an additional assessment on the Conference. It takes exactly six thousand nine hundred dollars (\$6,900) annually to keep the paper going; and this is possible only by paring down expenses to a minimum. A large part of the traveling expenses of the Editor have been paid out of his own pocket. The Board of Christian Literature, after considering every possibility, makes the following recommendation:

That an assessment of ten thousand dollars be made for the benefit of the paper, with the understanding that a committee be appointed with power to enter into negotiations with some other Conference organ or organs with a view to a merger; and that this committee shall have power to effect such merger or to make such other dispo-

sition as seems feasible. Provided, that this committee shall have no authority to assume any indebtedness of any other Conference organ.

We recommend that the following committee be appointed: Dr. Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., W. W. McIntyre, Dr. H. H. Sherman, J. R. Poland and B. M. Weller.

We respectfully request the Bishop to appoint Dr. Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., as Editor of the Baltimore Southern Methodist for another year.

The Board wishes to go on record as commending in the highest terms the business management and editorial work of Dr. Harmon in the three years that he has been connected with the paper. He has given us a paper that is excelled by none in the connection. We have felt justly proud of our Conference organ; and it is with deep regret that we recommend the only course that seems possible.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN METHODIST PUBLISHING COMPANY.

The Board of Directors of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company begs leave to make the following report:

We are glad to report that the paper this year has met with universal acceptance and approval as far as we know. The editorial page has been kept thoroughly alive and abreast of the times; it has discussed the leading issues of the day and voiced the thought of the Baltimore Conference in a strong and conservative manner. The news columns have been kept up with the utmost care to bring from every section of the Conference the news of what is going on in matters of church interest.

The business management of the paper has been conducted with great care and with the most economical policies possible to the publication of a paper that will be acceptable to our constituency. We consider the publication of the paper a matter of primary importance to the work of our Church in the Baltimore Conference. We call attention to the fact that in the publication of a conference paper there are certain fixed charges that must be met, and this fact has been the matter of chief concern with all the conference organs in the connection.

We present a financial statement written by the Editor and Business Manager of the Baltimore Southern Methodist and published in the issue of September 10, 1931. This statement has been carefully reviewed by the board of directors of the paper and we believe it contains a full and just account of the financial status of the paper. We recommend that the Conference provide through its regular assess-

ments a sufficient sum to meet the necessary financial obligations of the paper as suggested in the statement of Dr. Nolan B. Harmon, Jr. Without sufficient provision it will be impossible to continue the publication of the paper.

We recommend that the Conference request the Bishop to appoint Dr. Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., as editor of the Baltimore Southern Methodist for this next Conference year.

REPORT No. 2.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.

Your Board had before it the annual statement of the Publishing House, showing that in spite of the depression of the year, their total sales fell off less than five per cent. We recommend to our pastors and especially our membership the publications of this house, the profits from which go to our superannuates. It is not generally known that our Cokesbury Press is recognized as one of the outstanding publishers of religious literature in the entire country.

A publication not so well known throughout the Conference as it deserves is our Church organ, "The Christian Advocate," published by our Publishing House at Nashville. The quality of this publication in its devotional and theological literature would make it well worth the while of any pastor to push its circulation in his own local church.

The needs of the new organization of the Christian Education work in our church are met so far as publications are concerned, by our Publishing House in the new literature, with which we will soon become familiar.

The Board wishes to add this one word about the Baltimore Southern Methodist. It feels that if all our pastors should take seriously the obtaining of subscriptions for the Conference paper, the problems of the paper would be nearer a solution.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Board would like to emphasize an exhortation given in the annual letter from the General Board, which is as follows:

"The widespread distress throughout our Connection caused by church debts and the inability of congregations to meet

payments under present financial conditions demonstrates that churches should not create debts which cannot be repaid without embarrassment even in times of financial depression. It is an injury to all churches in a community when a congregation defaults in payments. It is better to worship in a moderate church house than to erect a building beyond the means of the congregation bringing the whole church life of the community into embarrassment should payments not be made and the property be sold. It would be wise for both General and Conference Boards to urge upon all congregations the danger of contracting debts which cannot be repaid without difficulty even in times of financial distress."

The law of the church is that before a building enterprise can be begun, three-fourths of the cost must be in sight. It is because this law is ignored that there is such a burden of debt throughout our whole connection. All the program of our church is slowed up because of the burden of debt on our church buildings. It would be better to worship in more modest structures and be able to follow our leaders into wider ranges of service.

We, therefore, exhort our pastors and people to consider and observe this wise law.

Much money and opportunity for efficient service are lost because of unwise planning in building construction. Our General Board offers the services of its Architectural Department to those about to build or reconstruct and we earnestly advise all to confer with this Department at Louisville, Kentucky, before starting to build.

The Loan Fund of our Conference Board is a very attractive opportunity for investment for those who desire to perpetuate their service after death. By bequeathing their funds to the Loan Fund of the Conference Board they will be building churches and parsonages down through the years to come. Let our preachers bear this in mind when advising with those who have property to leave for the furtherance of the Kingdom.

We note also that this achievement marks the sixth year in succession in which the circulation of the preceding year has been exceeded.

Your Board presents the following resolutions:

Whereas, The American Bible Society in carrying on its work of increasing the circulation of the Scriptures is engaged in a task essential to the whole Christian enterprise; be it

Resolved, First—That we endorse heartily the efforts of the American Bible Society in its program of encouraging a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures and that we prayerfully remember the Society before the throne of Grace;

Second—That inasmuch as Sunday, Dec. 6, 1931, has been designated as Universal Bible Sunday, the ministers of this Conference co-operate with the American Bible Society on this

date, as generally as possible, in directing the attention of their congregations to the important place in the Christian faith which the Holy Scriptures occupy.

And Whereas, The Gideons are doing a noble work in reaching many through their distribution of the Holy Scriptures, be it

Resolved, That this Conference commend them in their efforts to place the Bible in hotel rooms and other public places, and that our preachers lend their co-operation in this worthy cause.

**REPORT OF BALTIMORE CONFERENCE BOARD OF
 LAY ACTIVITIES.**

Roanoke, Virginia, Sept. 30—Oct. 5, 1931.

To the President and Members of the Baltimore Annual
 Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South:

Dear Brethren:

Your Conference Board of Lay Activities submits its annual report as follows:

Stewardship.

We recommend that the program of Stewardship education be continued during the remaining years of the quadrennium by the use of Stewardship literature wisely and judiciously distributed; that the months of April and May be designated as a period for special stewardship emphasis throughout the Conference; that Stewardship be included in at least one Standard Training School in each district; and that the study of Stewardship be promoted in Stewardship Committees, Boards of Stewards, and Sunday School classes of young people and adults. We urge that each lay leader read at least one approved book on Stewardship during the year, that he may know stewardship in its larger sense and be better able to help the congregation he serves.

The Benevolences.

We urge the attendance of the District and Associate Lay Leaders and all Charge Lay Leaders at the District Stewards' Meetings and the above officers and the members of the Board of Stewards at the Missionary Institutes held during January. We recommend the promotion of lay speaking campaigns on the regular appointments following the District Stewards' Meetings and a definite promotion program on the voluntary Kingdom Movement that this conference may speedily take a leading place in the record of these two great causes. We earnestly recommend an Every Member canvass in each church and at least a quarterly check-up by the Board of Stewards to the end that full payment of all benevolences be secured.

Men's Work.

We urge our pastors to plan and promote the training of church officers and whenever possible, we urge that the social and spiritual culture and development of the men of the church be fostered by Brotherhood and Men's Organizations.

The Methodist Layman.

We believe the Methodist Layman to be the one religious magazine published by our church that can be of most assistance to the men and therefore, pledge ourselves to secure the widest circulation possible.

Layman's Day.

We again urge the general observance of Layman's Day on the second Sunday of June. We believe the pastors and congregations find this an occasion of the greatest help in increasing the sense of responsibility and a deeper loyalty among layman.

Spiritual Life.

We call upon every layman of our church to deepen his own spiritual experience by prayer, study, worship, giving and service.

In Appreciation.

We wish to thank our Bishops, Presiding Elders and Pastors for the assistance and inspiration given us and in turn again pledge to them our support in their labors for this our beloved church.

Conference Lay Leader.

**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND
SOCIAL SERVICE.**

Dear Brethren:

Your Committee on Temperance and Social Service has diligently labored that we might bring to you a comprehensive outline of the conditions which confront every loyal citizen of our country, and to suggest to you some means by which evil may be reduced and finally overcome. First of all, we observe that we are charged to report upon two very closely related subjects, neither of which should over-shadow the other. The first of these is **Temperance** and the second is **Social Service**. It is essential that we think of them in their relation one to the other and it is also important, under present day conditions, that each be studied and dealt with after its own kind.

1. **Temperance.** We note that we are to deal with **Temperance**, not in one of its aspects, but in all its aspects. For instance, this Conference is a body of Christian believers, each of whom should think, feel and act upon every occasion with that moral precision which Christian teachings require and good citizenship demands.

We would shrink from any suggestion which would lead our church into an improper invasion of the domain of the State. This has been our denominational holding from the first, and we have not the least idea of departing from it now.

But the hour has struck when we as leaders of the third largest denomination in this nation, must cry aloud upon the walls of Zion, and directly to our own membership, information and warning relative to certain destructive evils which stalk, unashamed, throughout our native land. For instance, as Christian citizens, we can but see the devourer of virtue and righteousness working upon public society to an alarming degree and to an almost universal extent. Therefore, we feel that as Christians we should give definite aid, in every way possible to us, to both State and Federal Governments in their effort to apply the law to existing evils.

The Eighteenth Amendment, together with the law provided for its enforcement, is under heavy fire from enemies who have much power in high places. Violations are reported on every side, but we are fully convinced that whosoever knowingly violates the National prohibition laws has been as criminally involved as he would be, should he violate any other fundamental law of his country. Our people need to recognize this fact and to be strengthened so as to stand steadily upon it. Nothing else can justify.

Antagonistic Propaganda. Our land is being continuously sown down with insidious suggestion and blatant proposals for the purpose of misleading, especially our youth and our unsophisticated population, as to National prohibition. Some of the cries are: "Personal liberty is taken away." Another is that "Prohibition has failed and has

become a hypocrisy." Still others clamor for "States Rights," while the last outcry is "Beer." These are all easily answerable, so we give one instance by which to illustrate, and that is the demand for beer. Everyone knows that the place where beer is manufactured and distributed is one step only from the saloon. That no one will, we believe, question. Powerful organization and much money are back of this propaganda and their literature is disseminated by means of pamphlet form through the mail and through nearly all the great newspapers of the day. Once and for all we would place ourselves squarely upon record as those who obey our prohibition laws and who would give our influence and service toward helping others to do the same.

II. **Social Service.** Our nation and the world stand appalled before an unprecedented crime wave, which public officials fail to stamp out. No person has defense from gangster attacks. Murder has increased until we are humiliated and ashamed as a nation. Kidnapping is not uncommon and the divorcement of man and wife shakes our social and domestic fabric. The home has been the high tower of social purity and moral competency; and we are not ready to surrender its sanctity. There is much superficial thought and vulgar passion abroad. Also there is too great a distance between the wealthy and the deserving poor especially during this financial crisis. What should be the attitude and service of every loyal follower of our Lord Jesus Christ under the present stress and strain? The answer is an unbroken and ever growing consecration to God, and, an unflinching service to our neighbor. But how are we to do this? First, we must protect the weak through the law and we must teach and teach and teach righteousness to our children and youth. By the grace of God we will go forward preaching and living the word of God, remembering that no nation has ever survived because it was rich and wicked, and no nation has ever died because it was pure and poor.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Recognizing the importance of the Christian Sabbath, the basis of all religious work, and clearly seeing the dangers which threaten its meaning and purpose, especially through commercialization of the day by persistent invasions of amusements and sports societies; and as a ruling of the Supreme Court of Virginia, made a few years ago, in which the word "necessity" upon which the Sunday Law is based, has been left to the doubtful and hazardous interpretation of local juries, making it necessary to prepare and present a bill to the next session of the Virginia Legislature, which, if passed, will clarify and strengthen the Sunday Law, and give some guarantee against commercial exploitation of the people on this day; and whereas, the Lord's Day Alliance of Virginia and of Maryland have asked for our co-operation, and requested that this Conference be represented on the Board of Managers and Educational Committee, we make the following recommendations:

I. That we request our pastors, teachers and parents to give more faithful instruction on the proper observance of the Lord's Day.

II. That we endorse the efforts of the Lord's Day Alliance of Virginia and of Maryland to bring about a proper observance of the Day, and urge our preachers and our people, to co-operate in this great work.

III. That we recommend for appointment by this Conference, Rev. S. R. Neel, Rev. B. V. Switzer, and Rev. J. W. Seay to membership in the Board of Managers of the Lord's Day Alliance of Virginia, and the reappointment of Rev. N. B. Harmon, Jr., to membership on the Educational Committee of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, HOME OF THE
AGED AND ORPHANS, OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE
METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH, INC.,
AND LOCATED AT GAITHERSBURG, MD.**

Many romantic records are available of institutions of mercy, in the form of Orphanages, Hospitals and Homes, but we doubt whether the story of many surpasses the marked progress which we have noted in the development of the Home for the Aged, at Gaithersburg, Maryland. A brief summary of our work there may be interesting. This project was launched six years ago with less than \$5.00 in cash resources. Today we have a valuable farm, two large home buildings,

four dwelling houses and a cottage for Superannuates, dairy barn and a modern poultry plant, with thousands of dollars in stock and equipment. The leaven in the form of the first \$5.00 has increased until our total assets are valued at approximately \$272,000.00, with only \$80,900.00 liabilities, which means that our assets exceed our liabilities by \$191,100.00. This indicates that the original \$5.00 has multiplied in value on an average of 6,400 times annually. This marked achievement can only be accounted for in part. Surely, the Lord has prospered this work, and the persons who have piloted the way deserve our congratulations. Too much credit cannot be given to pastors and superintendents, friends and members of the several congregations, Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues throughout the Conference, who have supported the work heartily. The responsiveness and generosity of our people must take first place in this phenomenal development.

Our people have borne faithful testimony of their Christian love in ministering to the homeless aged of our territory in this excellent way. We have an institution in Gaithersburg which is expressive of the ideals and spirit of the Baltimore Conference. In the language of the Superintendent: "It gives us great pleasure to report that, in spite of the financial depression, we have completed another successful year in this department of Kingdom building." We have collected and disbursed above \$50,000.00. We have paid \$8,650.00 on our indebtedness in addition to the current running expenses.

The ordinary difficulties have arisen during the year, but we have found a way out of them. We confidently affirm that we have never had a better staff of workers and a more effective organization than we have today. This is reflected in a more homogeneous spirit among our guests. We should not overlook the fact that the Superintendent is the key-spirit and that he has given unreservedly of his time, strength and patience to this work. Mrs. Wilson is also very valuable to the institution. Brother Wilson speaks as follows for his helpers: "I cannot give too much praise to my loyal staff of workers. The matron has left no stone unturned to do her best, and she has succeeded admirably. The farm manager is more than we could hope for."

We have received eight new guests during the year. Five have passed on to their reward. The family numbered five persons when we opened the doors five years ago, and sixty-eight at present. We have cared for eighty-four persons since opening.

The Home celebrated its fifth anniversary on April 15. There were over a thousand visitors, including the entire Board of Montgomery County Commissioners, a number of other prominent County Officials, several members of the Maryland Legislature, officials from other institutions and a number of the ministers of the Conference.

The buildings are kept in excellent condition, within and without. The main building and all other buildings owned by the Home, except

the tenant house, have been painted on the outside and some parts on the interior. The grounds adjoining the buildings have been graded and seeded, an attractive colonial entrance erected as a donation of Miss Lucy Hunley of Baltimore, shrubbery planted and roadways built. Our grounds are showing signs of growing beauty.

We wish to express our hearty appreciation for the faithful support which pastors and people have given during this trying year. The Christmas Offering amounted to \$3,725.00 and the Mother's Day Offering amounted to \$2,926.00. Twenty-two additional Sunday Schools gave and twenty-three additional congregations made offerings this year, the additional offering amounting to approximately \$500.00. Another regular source of income is the Annual Maintenance Subscriptions, and the amount received therefrom was \$7,953.00. We are dependent upon these sources of income, and hope that many more churches and people will enlist in the support of this Christian ministry during the coming year. We have found the women's guilds in the Washington, Baltimore and Alexandria Districts very valuable, and we desire to organize other Districts as soon as possible.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE HOSPITAL BOARD.

Your Conference Hospital Board rejoices in the progress that is being made in the development of the hospital program of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as shown by the following facts:

1. The completion at Elkin, N. C., of a new hospital for the Western North Carolina Conference, at a cost of \$100,000, entirely free of debt.
2. The acquisition by the General Hospital Board of a valuable hospital property in Savannah, Georgia, now known as the Warren A. Candler Hospital, and the development of plans by the General Board for the expansion of the institution into an outstanding institution of healing for the Southeast.
3. The recent completion on the campus of the Good Samaritan Hospital at Lexington, Kentucky, of a new hospital building, to be known as the Mary A. Ott Memorial, at a cost of \$500,000, representing the generosity of Henry L. Ott, a consecrated Kentucky layman, and his now-sainted mother, Mrs. Mary A. Ott.
4. The Duke University Hospital, at Durham, North Carolina, built at a cost of \$4,000,000, with an endowment of \$6,000,000, has just completed its first year of service, and its records show that \$80,000 worth of free service was performed by the institution during the first 12 months of its history.

Your Conference Hospital Board makes the following recommendations:

1. We urge the Conference-wide observance of Golden Cross Week, during the week which includes the third and fourth Sundays in May.

and we would request those pastors who may fail to observe this particular time to promote the Golden Cross Enrollment at some other specified period of the Conference Year.

2. We urge the appointment by the pastors, subject to the confirmation of the fourth Quarterly Conference, of wide-awake Golden Cross Directors for the local churches.

3. We would ask our pastors and Golden Cross Directors to follow the law of the Church, as contained in Paragraph 560 of the Discipline, with reference to the disposition of Golden Cross funds, viz.: Send remittances to the Conference Treasurer, Mr. J. T. Houck, Harrisonburg, Virginia, who is required by law to forward the amounts raised to the Treasurer of the General Hospital Board, Atlanta, Georgia, monthly, the law providing further that the Treasurer of the General Hospital Board shall remit Golden Cross funds promptly to the Southern Methodist Hospital and Sanatorium, Tucson, Arizona.

4. Your Conference Board hereby reports to the Conference its purpose to send a delegate to the next meeting of the Methodist Hospital Association, in order that the members of our Board may become better acquainted with the development of plans for the expansion of our hospital work throughout the Church and also with the humanitarian service that is being performed by our existing hospitals.

5. We would request our Presiding Elders, pastors and lay leaders to cooperate with the efforts of this Board, and particularly with the efforts of our Conference Golden Cross Director, Dr. N. M. Canter, of Harrisonburg, Virginia, in creating a larger interest among our people in the healing ministry of the Church through District Conferences and other group meetings held throughout the Baltimore Conference.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE TO THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH.

Your Committee on Insurance, through its Agent, Reverend H. L. Hout, carried this year a group policy of \$210,000 with the Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States in two classes, viz., 192 preachers for \$1,000 each and 9 for \$2,000.

A dividend for 1929-1930 of \$2,248.32 was received from the Company.

During the year we have lost two by death and three were dropped from our number, while seven new names were added. Two other applications were sent in and rejected by the Company because the applicants failed to have an examination made.

We made an effort to get \$1,000 more insurance for the group and were successful with the Company, but only about 50 per cent. of our preachers agreed to take it. As the Company required 75 per cent., our effort failed.

All of our preachers admitted on trial should at once join the group as they can then join without a medical examination, and all of our active members who are eligible, and have not, should join the group because of the very cheap rate to them and for the help they would render in lowering the cost upon the conference.

The policy covers both life insurance benefit and total and permanent disability benefits, and, by the action of the conference becomes a paid-up policy at superannuation.

We ask the Conference to direct the Treasurer to pay the Agent the sum of \$62.40 for the premium of the eight superannuates we now have on our roll for 1931-1932.

We recommend that the same amount be apportioned for insurance as last year. We recommend that Rev. H. L. Hout be appointed as Conference Insurance Agent.

Most of the members made their premium \$8.00 this year, the 20 cents extra going to the Agent to pay for printing, postage and sta-

tionery. We hope all will do this, and that the preachers will pay their premium at the session of the Conference.

REPORT OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON BENEVOLENCES.

The Annual Conference Commission on Benevolences, which is composed of the Bishop in charge, the Presiding Elders, the Chairman of the various Boards, and the District Lay Leaders, reports as follows:

The purpose of the Commission is to work in cooperation with the General Conference Commission on Benevolences, and to promote in the Annual Conference the full program of cultivation for the General and Conference apportionments and Voluntary Kingdom Extension Offering.

It is gratifying to report that the Commission succeeded in carrying out this purpose during the past year to the following extent:

In each district unusual District Stewards meetings were held, at which not only the District Stewards were present, but also pastors and charge lay leaders. The large and representative groups assembled were given full information concerning the new financial program, and plans for putting this program into operation were adopted. It is our conviction that these meetings made a vital contribution to the good results reported this year. Through the request of this Commission a motion was adopted by the Conference reducing the total Conference Benevolence Askings by \$17,000. We believe that this reduction, with the more equitable distribution of apportionments to the various charges that followed, has resulted in encouragement to many hard pressed congregations and actual increases in the amounts paid.

We are also gratified at the attendance and interest manifested at the District Kingdom Extension Institutes.

The Commission requests that the Conference instruct the Commission on Budget to add \$500 to the allowance of the Board of Lay Activities to pay the Commission's expenses in promoting its work.

The Commission requests that the General Conference Commission on Benevolences send to each pastor from the general office not later than three weeks after adjournment of Conference all necessary literature on the regular apportionments and that the literature concerning the Voluntary Kingdom Extension program be sent to them by January 10.

MEMOIRS.

JOHN HENRY SCHOOLEY.

John Henry Schooley, son of Thomas Addison and Hannah Ann Schooley, was born in Hamilton, Virginia, December 20, 1867, and died in Washington, D. C., September 26, 1930. After being admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference, meeting in Harrisonburg, Virginia, March, 1892, he served the following charges:

Dranesville Circuit (junior preacher), one year; Sutton, one year; Catawba, one year; Romney (junior preacher), one year; Flintstone, three years; Franklin Circuit, four years; Prince George Circuit, four years; Blue Sulphur Circuit, two years; White Sulphur, four years; Grace, Roanoke, four years; Rockville, one year; Freedom, three years; Goldsboro, five years; Reisterstown, one year; Jarrettsville, four years.

He was educated in the public schools of Hamilton, Virginia, and at Randolph-Macon College.

He was married to Miss Martha Crawford, of Montgomery County, Virginia. She proved an ideal Methodist minister's wife and entered into the fullest sympathy and heartiest co-operation with him in all the work to which he devoted his life.

In early life—that great transaction took place in his happy conversion—a work of grace concerning which he never for one moment entertained any doubt in the years that followed. He not only retained what was divinely imparted to him in that supremely happy moment when his heart was so strangely warmed and filled with ineffable joy, but advanced in the power and knowledge of the grace of God until he attained unto a perfect manhood, even unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ.

Thus he entered upon the ministry, covering a period of thirty-eight years. The type of his preaching was apostolic. It was not therefore with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power. The fruits of his labors, which were abundant, justified the decision made in young manhood to follow wherever God should lead.

As a Christian, he was consecrated; as a preacher, he was faithful; as a brother, he was ideal and beloved; as a member of the Baltimore Conference into the full connection of which he was admitted at Fredericksburg, Virginia, in 1894, at the same time being ordained by Bishop John C. Granbery, he was loyal and true.

Brother Schooley came to the end of life's pilgrimage while attending a session of the Annual Conference. Listening to the proceedings of the Conference, talking to his brethren, whose association was

always a delight to him, looking forward to receiving an appointment for another year of loving service to Him whose he was, whom he loved and whom he followed, and apparently in good health, Brother Schooley was suddenly called away from the activities of this life to join that immortal throng, whose robes are washed white in the blood of the Lamb and in whose hands there are palms of victory.

His funeral service was conducted by his presiding elder, Rev. T. J. Lambert, assisted by Rev. E. L. Woolf, Rev. D. L. Blakemore, and Rev. O. L. Gochenour, in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Hamilton, Virginia. His body was laid to rest in Lake View Cemetery, awaiting the passing of the night and the coming of that glorious resurrection morning.

"He hastened on with eager step toward that happy land,
Beyond the gray horizon, where the sun of earth goes down;
Content to know that all the way his father held his hand,
And that ere long he'd give to him
An everlasting crown."

"He did not die;
One morning near the break of day
Hand in hand with some unseen evangel
He went away."

HENRY PHELPS HAMILL, D. D.

Rev. Henry Phelps Hamill, fourth child of the Honorable Patrick and Mrs. Isabelle Hamill, was born at Westernport, Maryland, February 28, 1853.

Dr. Hamill entered into a splendid heritage at birth. Both of his parents were leading members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Piedmont, West Virginia, Patrick Hamill, his father, being a local elder in the church, a preacher of unusual ability, a man of influence in his community, and at one time a member of the Congress of the United States. Within the Hamill family circle the history, the doctrines, and the polity of Methodism, were known and loved. The Hamill home was a "preacher's home." The child of such a home, it is not surprising that Dr. Hamill was converted in the days of his youth, nor that his thoughts soon turned toward the Christian ministry. The very environment in which he lived at this formative period of his life made it easy for him to hear and to respond to the call of God. In fact, he "had been set apart for the work of the ministry" by his father, as the father thought and prayed regarding the future of his sons.

After his conversion, Dr. Hamill united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Piedmont, West Virginia, just across the Po-

tomac River from Westernport. Because of his southern sympathies, after his membership and that of his family in the Methodist Episcopal Church had been severed, Patrick Hamill had become one of the organizers and a charter member of our Piedmont Church, and to the day of his death remained one of its most faithful and honored adherents.

As a youth Dr. Hamill pursued his studies for one year at the West Virginia University, Morgantown, and then for three years at Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, Va., where he was a member of the class of 1876.

He was admitted on trial into our Baltimore Conference at the session of 1877, and was ordained deacon in 1879 by Bishop William M. Wightman, and elder in 1881 by Bishop Holland N. McTyeire. Thus Dr. Hamill began an active ministry extending over half a century. Through this long period of time his appointments were as follows:

1877-78, junior preacher, Loudoun Circuit, Thomas E. Carson, preacher-in-charge; 1879-80, Fairfax Circuit; 1881-82, Frederick City; 1883-86, junior preacher, Rockville Circuit, B. W. Bond, preacher-in-charge; 1887-90, Keyser; 1891-94, Charles Town; 1895-97, President Wesleyan Female Institute; 1898, Secretary-Treasurer Randolph-Macon Woman's College; 1899-1900, Lexington; 1901-04, Presiding Elder Winchester District; 1905-08, Staunton; 1909-12, Blacksburg; 1913-14, Gaithersburg; 1915-18 Martinsburg; 1919-22, Presiding Elder, Alexandria District; 1923-26, Conference Secretary of Education, giving full-time service to the Christian Education Movement; 1927, was granted the superannuate relation, in which relation he continued until death.

As the years passed by the Conference honored Dr. Hamill with many positions of trust and usefulness. For sixteen years, in connection with his appointments, he served as Conference Secretary-Treasurer of Education, a work he continued until physical weakness compelled him to lay it down. Four times he was honored by being elected a delegate to the General Conference, viz., in 1902, in 1906, in 1910, and in 1914. Randolph Macon College bestowed upon him in the year 1908 the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity, and in 1921 he was elected a trustee of the Randolph-Macon System.

Dr. Hamill was a man of keen and logical intellect, of sterling character, of definite, satisfying religious experience, an earnest champion of any cause he believed to be right. He did not always agree with his brethren in matters of intelligence and judgment, and on the conference floor was a debater of unusual strength and skill, but he never allowed bitterness or unbrotherliness to find a place within his heart. He knew God as his Father, Jesus Christ as his Saviour, the Holy Spirit as his Guide, Strengthener and Comforter. To him all men were brothers.

Dr. Hamill was an excellent preacher. His sermons were always carefully prepared, scriptural, spiritual, instructive, pointing his hearers to the one and only Saviour of men, and to the highest things in

the Christian's experience and service. The power of the Most High rested upon him, and his public utterances were never more helpful than when dealing with the personality, the Deity, and the work of the Holy Spirit, and the "Spiritual Life of the Church."

But the grand passion of Dr. Hamill's heart was to discover and to train young men for the ministry of our church, especially for the ministry of the Baltimore Conference. A man of splendid culture himself, no man among us saw more clearly the need for a thoroughly educated and trained ministry. To the meeting of this need he gave the greatest efforts of his life. The credit must be given to him, and to his fellow-worker, Dr. H. H. Sherman, for beginning the work of "Ministerial Supply and Training" within our Conference, even before this work was enterprised by the General Board of Education, at Nashville, Tenn. Many of our younger preachers can thank Dr. Hamill for a part, if not for all, of their education. How he loved this work! And the young men he had aided and guided through college and university! "Even unto the end," he loved them!

On July 27, 1887, Dr Hamill was married to Miss Sarah C. Jones, daughter of the late William T. Jones of near Poolesville, Md. For more than forty years she shared with him the trials and the joys of the itinerant life of a Methodist preacher. Their home-life was delightful. On August 21, 1927, the faithful wife passed on to the heavenly home. Her going was a great blow to Dr. Hamill. It left him quite alone, for no children had ever come to bless his home. But he was fortunate in having a niece, Miss Belle Browning, for many years a member of his family circle, to make a home for him, and to minister to his needs. No daughter could have been more faithful.

For quite a while it had been evident to all that Dr. Hamill was in failing health, and in January, 1930, he was stricken with what proved to be his last illness. For eighteen months he was confined to his room, the greater part of the time to his bed. Endowed as he was by nature with a strong constitution, earnestly desiring "to be spared for further service, if it were God's will," as he expressed it, it took a long time for the dreadful anemia to do its deadly work, but at last it was done and on the morning of July 4, 1931, the soul of Henry Phelps Hamill, purified, and mellowed, and sweetened, yea, and strengthened, by many months of suffering, went to "be forever with the Lord." Two sisters only survive him: Mrs. John T. Mitchell and Mrs. Arthur Townshend, both of Oakland, Maryland.

The funeral services were conducted on July 6 by the Rev. J. J. Rives, D. D., his pastor, and the Rev. J. H. Balthis, D. D., his presiding elder. At the home on New Hampshire Ave., Washington City, Rev. H. H. Sherman, D. D., led in prayer. After the prayer the body was carried to our Francis Asbury Church, where, together with the officiating ministers, Mr. W. W. Millan, personal friend and lay leader of the Washington District, and the Rev. A. C. Jordon, a retired member of the Virginia Conference, occupied seats in the pulpit, and this ac-

cording to Dr. Hamill's own arrangement before death. The auditorium of the church was filled. Many of the members of our Conference were present. Brief tributes to the character and work of Dr. Hamill were paid both by his pastor and his presiding elder. The music, under the direction of Mrs. Fannie Hartsill, was appropriate and beautiful. Two of the great hymns of the church were used: "Abide With Me," and "How Firm a Foundation." Alfred, Lord Tennyson's "Crossing the Bar," was sung by a trio of trained voices. Many lovely floral designs bore testimony to the high esteem of a large circle of friends. Upon the conclusion of the service at the church, the body was taken to Beallsville, Montgomery County, Maryland, where it was interred beside the grave of his wife in the beautiful Monocacy Cemetery, there to await "the resurrection of the just." At the grave the ritual of the church was read by the officiating ministers, with the benediction by the Rev. A. C. Jordan.

Successful as pastor, preacher, presiding elder, wise in the counsel halls of the church, Dr. Hamill has left an impress upon our Conference that will endure far into the future. Truly, such men as he was, are "the chariot of Israel and the horsemen thereof."

FRANK T. GRIFFITH.

Frank T. Griffith, son of Franklin T. and Mary E. Griffith, was born at "Mt. Airy," on Fishing Creek farm, in Calvert County, Md., on February 25th, 1858, and died at his home in Washington, D. C., on April 22, 1931. In his early childhood his parents moved to their farm near Friendship, Anne Arundel County, Md., where he grew to manhood. He was educated in the public schools of his town and at Randolph-Macon College. Converted at the age of fourteen, under the ministry of Revs. Presley B. Smith and W. E. Miller, he immediately felt the call to preach, and at the age of twenty-one was licensed as a local preacher. After serving for two years in the local ranks he was admitted to the Baltimore Conference on trial at the session held in Harrisonburg, Va., March 9-15, 1881. On account of eye trouble, he was not able to appear before the committee on examinations the next year, but in 1884 he passed his examinations and was ordained a deacon and received into full connection by Bishop A. W. Wilson, in Baltimore. At the session of the Annual Conference held in Staunton, Va., in 1886, he was ordained an elder by Bishop H. N. McTyeire.

On the seventh day of October, 1885, he was united in marriage with Miss Kate Kennie Beaty, of Moorefield, W. Va., daughter of Rev. James Beaty of the Baltimore Conference. She proved to be a true helpmeet and an ideal preacher's wife. To this ideal union three children were

born: Misses Mary Allen and Kate Chambers Griffith, and Dr. James Beaty Griffith, all of Washington, D. C. Dr. R. S. Griffith of Waynesboro, Va., is the only member of his father's family to survive him.

Brother Griffith spent twenty-four years in the active work of the ministry; nineteen in the Baltimore Conference and five in the Florida Conference; fifty years a minister of the M. E. Church, South, including the years of retirement. During his active ministry in the Baltimore Conference he served the following appointments: 1881-83, junior preacher on Calvert Circuit, with Rev. S. B. Dolly; 1883-84, junior preacher, West River Circuit (Chesapeake), with Rev. Nelson Head, D. D.; 1884-86, Hardy Charge; 1886-88, Franklin; 1888-90, Springfield; 1890-92, Severn; 1892-94, Ingleside; 1894-98, Prince George; 1898-1900, Emory, D. C. At the close of his pastorate at Emory, on account of serious illness, he requested and was granted a superannuated relation. But two years later his health having greatly improved, he assisted in filling a vacancy on the Gaithersburg Charge, caused by the death of Rev. William A. McDonald. From May until Conference the following spring he filled the appointments at Travilah and Darnestown, then connected with Gaithersburg Charge.

In 1908 he was transferred to the Florida Conference and served appointments at Alachua one year and at Coleman and Citra two years each. On his return from Florida in 1914 he was readmitted into the Baltimore Conference and granted a superannuated relation. But he was by no means idle. Whenever his health permitted it was his greatest joy to preach the gospel and to help his brethren in revival meetings. By numerous trips, he revived the scenes of his active ministry and by correspondence renewed old friendships. His last sermon was delivered in his home church the past summer from the text: "Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee a crown of life." Rev. 2: 10.

Frank Griffith, during the fifty years of his ministry in the M. E. Church, South, has always been recognized as the uncompromising champion of orthodoxy and of individual and civic righteousness. In behalf of these and all the interests of the Church and the Kingdom he freely employed his tongue and pen whenever and wherever occasion required and the opportunity was given. The cause of temperance and prohibition, the sanctity of the sabbath and of the home, and everything which makes for a strong, virile Christian citizenship challenged his interest and cooperation to the close of his earthly life. And everything which threatened to undermine or destroy the foundations of Christian faith and practice always challenged him to combat. Uncompromising in his attitude toward all forms of evil, he was, at the same time deeply sympathetic. His constant and unwavering devotion to his family, his sympathetic interest in his friends and neighbors, are well-known traits of his character. All through his life he manifested a deep interest in young people, and was active in securing

positions for many and in providing the means for their education. A kind and loving heart, which knew how to forgive and to forget, and an undying passion for souls characterized this servant of God.

During the last years of his life he was afflicted with partial deafness and blindness, but otherwise enjoyed good health until on April 11, when he was taken suddenly with an attack of angina pectoris. During his illness his mind remained clear; he frequently quoted passages of Scripture and talked with his family. He looked forward with confidence to meeting his saviour, his mother and other kindred and friends; and on the morning of the last day, after a restful night, and when the doctor thought he had a fighting chance, he said: "I am going to heaven today"; and with a childlike faith he awaited the summons.

On Friday afternoon, April 24, his body was laid to rest in the old burial ground of Emmanuel Church, Friendship, Md., after appropriate and impressive services conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. J. Ringer, assisted by Rev. J. H. Balthis, D. D., presiding elder of the Washington District; Rev. T. J. Lambert, presiding elder of the Baltimore District; Rev. H. R. Deal, assistant pastor of Mt. Vernon Place Church, Washington, D. C., and Rev. B. F. Denton, pastor of the M. E. Church, Friendship, Md.

The entire service was carried out as planned by Mr. Griffith himself, including the selection of hymns, and was brought to a fitting and impressive close by singing that beautiful hymn:

"We Shall Sleep, But Not Forever."

I can find no more fitting words with which to close this sketch than the following tribute from his daughter: "I had always anticipated with sorrow the thought of losing my father; but all through the eleven days of his illness his whole attitude and expression were so comforting that I felt that, except for leaving us, he was with joy looking forward to a beautiful journey, far more lovely than the many we had taken together."

REV. SAMUEL ROGER SNEAD.

Rev. Samuel Roger Snead, son of Anthony M. and Julia Snead, was born March 25, 1867, in Allegany County (near Covington, Va.). These good parents dedicated their son to God in baptism when only a small boy. But not being wealthy, they could only give him the advantages of an elementary education. Early in life he began to make his way in the world that he might help support those dependent upon him.

He was a Bible student long before he was truly converted to God. Let him tell his own story:

"I was working firing a steam boiler at night, and reading my Bible, when my heart grew heavy and my prayers ascended to God for consciousness of sins forgiven. Just as the sun began to come over the eastern horizon, God let the sunlight of His countenance flood my soul. The whole world seemed different. Things all around me never looked so beautiful before. My soul was all aglow. I knew God had saved my soul, and from that hour I wanted to go out and tell others of the blessed Saviour I had found."

Not having the means with which to go to school, it was necessary for him to continue in business a few years longer. During this time he became active in church work, acting as steward, Sunday school superintendent and choir leader. So urgently did he feel God's call to the ministry that he yielded and was licensed to preach at the Lewisburg District Conference, August 18, 1904, Rev. George Tyler, presiding elder. He was sent to Talcott Circuit, West Virginia, after the district conference, and served until the Annual Conference. At the Annual Conference he was sent back for another year. He served in all two and one-half years on Talcott Circuit.

Brother Snead was thrice married. His first wife was Miss Florence Corn Jackson. To this union six children were born: Harry, Roy, Charles, Arch, Jessie (now Mrs. Hamrick) and Nellie, all of whom survive him except Nellie, who died in infancy. Mrs Snead died March 12, 1905, while Brother Snead was on his first charge.

Five years afterward, Dec. 12, 1910, he married Miss Sallie M. Bird of Highland County. To this union there were four children born, Robert, James, William and a son who died when a baby. The three fine boys also survive him. This Mrs. Snead died in the parsonage at Romney Oct. 10, 1918.

Brother Snead was again married June 19, 1923, to Miss Emma L. Noel of Botetourt County, who survives him.

He was a strong preacher and a mighty man of prayer and was used of God in a large way during the few years he was allowed to preach. The writer has no way of knowing just how many were led to God by his preaching, but I cite one meeting of which Brother Snead spoke. While on the Newport Charge he told me he preached for six weeks and the Holy Ghost came with quickening power. One hundred and fifty souls were converted during that meeting.

He was a wonderful pastor, loved by his people and all who knew him.

The following are the charges he served: Talcott Circuit, two and one-half years; Hot Springs Circuit, four years; Newport Circuit, three years; Romney Circuit, three years; McDowell Circuit, three years; Buchanan Circuit, two years.

While at Buchanan he suffered a stroke of paralysis, which made it necessary for him to quit the active ministry. For six years, though

unable to do the work of an itinerant preacher, he was untiring in the work of the Master. He was the teacher of the Men's Bible Class until he died.

For about six weeks prior to his death he was confined to his bed with what the doctor called a general breakdown. While loving hands and a skilled physician did all they could for him, he peacefully fell asleep November 10, 1930. The funeral was held in the Buchanan Church, Rev. W. F. Locke, presiding elder of the Roanoke District; Rev. A. B. Sites; Rev. D. E. Murray, of the Baptist Church; Rev. G. C. Crowell, of the Presbyterian Church, and the writer took part in the service. The body was then conveyed to Covington and kept until the next afternoon. After a brief service in the Granbery Memorial Church, he was laid to rest in the cemetery nearby. Rev. M. D. Mitchell, D. D.; Rev. Charles M. York and his pastor had charge of the services in Covington.

A great and good man has left us to go and be with God. We shall miss him, but he is at rest.

LINDWOOD HAMMOND.

Lindwood Hammond, son of the Rev. Augustus Hammond, of the Methodist Protestant Church, and Mrs. Mary Virginia Hammond, both deceased, was born October 26, 1863. He was a native of Maryland, and his boyhood days were spent largely within that state at New Market, Frederick County.

At about eighteen years of age Lindwood Hammond was soundly converted under the preaching of the Rev. George C. Bacon, D. D., of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and at once united with the Church of his mother's choice, the Trinity Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in New Market. From the time of his conversion he became active in Christian work, and at an early age served the local congregation most faithfully both as steward and Sunday school superintendent. At this period of his life he was a clerk in the store of his uncle, the late Grafton B. Hammond, a man of prominence in the community. He was looking forward to a mercantile career; but there came to him a clear, definite call to preach; and to this call Lindwood Hammond was not disobedient.

He was licensed to preach by the quarterly conference of the Lingnore Circuit April 19, 1890, Rev. Samuel Rodgers, D. D., presiding elder. At the conference session of 1891 Brother Hammond was admitted on trial. He was ordained deacon in 1896 by Bishop J. C. Granbery, and elder in 1901, by Bishop O. P. Fitzgerald.

His appointments were as follows: Flintstone, four years; Morgan, three years; West Harford, four years; Aberdeen, one year; Queen

Anne's, Queene's and Goldsboro and Ingleside, four years; Lewisburg, two years; Luray, four years; Christiansburg, one year; South Cumberland, one year; Waynesboro, two years; New Hope, two years; Mt. Airy, three years; Shenandoah, four years; Greenville, one year; Goshen-Emory, two years and a little over.

Brother Hammond was never of robust health. "I have never been without pain," he remarked on one occasion to his faithful wife. But his will was strong, and for over thirty-nine years he wrought effectively in the itinerant ministry. At the conference session of 1917 he was compelled to take the superannuate relationship, but for one year only. During this period of enforced rest, he made his home in Martinsburg, West Virginia, where he won the love and confidence of all with whom he came in contact, and where he is still affectionately remembered.

In his family life Brother Hammond was delightful: a gentleman by birth and culture; kind, affectionate, tender as husband and father; a most gracious host to all who visited within his family circle. He was twice married. On October 24, 1888, Miss Jessie Wood, of New Market, Maryland, became his wife. Of this union five children, all living, were born: Earl L., now of Yonkers, N. Y.; Mrs. Mary V. East, of Waynesboro, Va.; Grafton B., of Shenandoah, Va.; Mrs. A. Christine Clay, of Wilksburg, Pa., and Miss Eleanor M., now making her home with her sister in Wilksburg, Pa. On January 22, 1925, while living at Shenandoah, Va., the faithful wife and mother of this splendid family passed on to her everlasting reward. The second wife, who survives him, and to whom he was most happily married, was Miss Ethel Anderson Jones, of Luray, Va., daughter of the late Rev. Louis R. Jones, a sainted member of our Conference.

Brother Hammond's religious experience was deep and satisfying. With the Apostle Paul he could say: "I know whom I have believed." It was his custom to rise in the morning between five and six o'clock, that he might spend some time alone in the cultivation of his spiritual life by Bible study and prayer. He said to his wife on various occasions that "he had happy times with God during those early hours." It is no wonder that his life during the day was so splendidly Christian, a living demonstration of the gospel he proclaimed from the pulpit from Sabbath to Sabbath.

As a preacher, he was far above the average. Though he was deprived of college and seminary training in his youth, his intellect was strong and clear, and by nature and habit he was a student. He had a choice library, and even unto the end was a reader of the great books of the past, as well as of the latest books of the present. His sermons were carefully prepared, thoroughly Scriptural, deeply spiritual. At times he rose to the heights of genuine eloquence. God blessed his words to the salvation of sinners and to the up-building in Christian character of the membership of his churches.

As a pastor, Brother Hammond was faithful. Quiet, dignified, courteous, and at the same time warm-hearted and brotherly, his presence was a benediction in any home. Especially was this true in homes where there was trouble and sorrow, for he always brought with him the consolations, the peace and the joy of the gospel.

He entered into the whole program of his Church; all its interests, whether material, or benevolent, or spiritual, were safe in his hands. Everywhere Lindwood Hammond went he left behind an imperishable trail of service for God and for humanity.

From the Conference of 1930 he was returned to the Goshen-Emory charge for his third year. He was never more loved and honored, never were his sermons more appreciated, never was his service more effective, than in this last charge. He was looking forward to a most successful year. But he was not a well man. On Sunday morning, December 6, taking his wife with him, he drove from the parsonage in Laytonsville to the Emory Church, a distance of some eight miles, for the preaching service at 9.30 o'clock. Along the way his wife insisted again that he refrain from preaching, but he had remarked at other times: "The pulpit would be a good place from which to go to heaven." Following this service and one later in the morning at 11 A. M. at Goshen Church, came a severe heart attack, and at his own parsonage in Laytonsville, at 4 P. M., as a beautiful smile came over his face, the spotless soul of Lindwood Hammond went home to God.

The funeral services, in charge of his presiding elder, Rev. Joseph H. Balthis, D. D., were conducted on Wednesday morning, December 10, at the Goshen Church. The auditorium was completely filled by sorrowing relatives and friends. The presiding elder paid a brief tribute to his character and work. Rev. F. A. Tyler, D. D.; Rev. W. B. Waters, Local preacher and evangelist; Rev. H. V. Wheeler, and Rev. John A. Gross, of the Methodist Episcopal Church, took part in the service. From the church his body was borne to his old home town, New Market, Maryland, where it was interred in the family lot, beside the resting-place of the wife who had preceded him to the better land. Rev. A. L. Harnesberger, Rev. Nat. G. Barnhart and Rev. R. L. Wittig, together with the presiding elder, conducted the service at the grave.

HARVEY LUTHER BIVENS.

Harvey Luther Bivens was born in Pennsylvania, September 24, 1878, the son of Michael and Elizabeth Bivens. He died March 20, 1931, at Upper Marlboro, Maryland. He was ordained deacon by Bishop A.

W. Wilson in Washington, D. C., on March 27, 1910; and an elder by Bishop E. D. Mouzon in Alexandria, Virginia, March 29, 1916. He served the following charges: Freedom one year, Clarksburg one year, Hyattsville four years, Remington one year, Occoquan two years, Middleburg two years, Warrenton five years, Trinity, Cumberland, one year, Calvert Circuit three years and Beltsville-Branchville two years.

The subject of this memoir was a rare soul who labored among us with a kindly heart of sympathy and with rare devotion to the cause of Christ. His only ambition was to so live the Gospel of Christ that his ministry would be effective in winning men to Christ and in building them up in the Christian faith. He believed implicitly in God and His overruling providence. It was in that faith he lived and preached. He believed the great doctrines of the Church and centred his preaching around them, and gave proportionately less attention to the mere incidentals.

He loved folks and those whom he served learned readily not only to love him but also trust in his spiritual leadership as a pastor. It was not a strained or reserved friendship, but one that arose spontaneously out of a great heart of love for Christ's sake. Because of his abiding love for Christ, he wanted to win all men for Him. Because of his abiding love for folks, he wanted all people to know and love Him. It is no wonder his ministry was crowned with success. He was never sensational. It was not place he sought, but power to influence men to right living. His emotions were deep, but they did not run riot. He did not claim perfection, but was one who was constantly "going on to perfection."

So great was his desire to be of larger service to his fellowman that he yielded to the call of God to enter the itinerant ministry. In the local ranks he had done splendid work in the Church in which he labored, and often filled other pulpits as a supply, but the call was imperative to the larger field of service which opened in the regular ministry of his beloved Church. He seemed to catch the words of the poet:

"Lord, help me live from day to day
In such a self-forgetful way,
That when I kneel to pray,
My prayer shall be for others.
Others! yes, others—
Let this my motto be,
Help me to live for others
That I may live like Thee."

He left the marks of his personality upon the charges he served that through and beyond himself they might see the Master whom he served with such unbounded loyalty and joy.

Brother Bivens was sincere in his pulpit work. He accepted his call to the ministry with a full consciousness of its implications and

demands. There was the complete desire to make full proof of his ministry.

Never did a Sunday morning come in which he did not breath a spirit of thankfulness that another opportunity had arrived to preach the Word. It was never an irksome task but one of great joy. He brought his messages out of a glowing heart of love. He gathered his sermon material from a wide range of reading the best books on theology and the study of the best literature of the day. He indulged his taste for the best of poetry that he might turn it to a good account in his pulpit ministrations.

In his vocation before he entered the active ministry, he had formed a great fondness for flowers. He carried this labor of love into his work in after years. Every parsonage yard was a scene of beauty. In his love for the flowers the message of love of God come fresh to himself which he also turned to good account in his public ministry.

Like his Master he used the beauty of the flower to direct the thought of his people to the God of beauty and of holiness and of watchful care.

Brother Bivens led to the altar Anna Barbara Wagner, the daughter of John W. and Mary Elizabeth Wagner of Baltimore, Maryland. During the years of companionship they established a most beautiful family life and a home which was always hospitable. It was God's way of enriching and multiplying the usefulness of two lives. In lovely and chaste affection, self-forgetful and constant devotion, love-inspired and creative faith, this marriage will forever remain an example of the Christian ideal for those who knew its joys, its calm and blessed hopefulness, its poise and self-control.

To this marriage were born five children: Mrs. John B. Dent, Mrs. Vernon Williams, Douglas M., Randolph L. and Donald W., all of whom, with their mother, survive.

The funeral services were held at Stone Chapel Methodist Episcopal Church, Pikesville, Maryland, and the interment was in the family lot in the adjoining cemetery. The services were in charge of Rev. J. H. Balthis, D. D., assisted by Rev. T. J. Lambert, Rev. C. I. Flory, Rev. H. S. Myerly, Rev. W. H. Best and Rev. W. Clark Early.

REV. HAMILTON MITCHELL ROANE.

Hamilton Mitchell Roane, eldest son of Charles Alexander and Matilda Mitchell Roane, was born in King and Queen County, Virginia, November 2, 1857, and died March 27, 1931.

Brother Roane was a steady, quiet, home-loving boy, with a reverence for everything good. He was always fond of attending church.

About the age of fifteen he lost his right arm through the accidental discharge of a gun which he himself was handling. The wound was so severe that his life hung in the balance for some time. With returning strength, while yet in bed, his thoughts dwelt much on the mercy of God in delivering him from death. It was during these serious meditations that there came to him a profound conviction of sin. He was also deeply impressed with the realization that God spared his life for a purpose. A definite call to the ministry, however, did not come to him till several years later. His life had then been completely dedicated to God and he was but quietly and patiently waiting for the Spirit's answer to his cry, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" When a call to preach did come, he set himself earnestly to prepare himself for the great work. The devastations of the Civil War, the loss of slaves and the general conditions obtaining during that tragic era greatly impoverished the family. Besides this, when he was still in his teens, his father died, leaving great responsibility on him. To secure an education meant an heroic struggle.

"He was not disobedient, and however, to the heavenly vision." With an undaunted courage, and an unflinching faith in God, he made his way to Randolph-Macon College. He went in 1883 directly from college to his first charge, which was in the Virginia Conference. Having contracted malaria, the doctors ordered him to a higher climate. About this time a call came to the Virginia Conference from the Rev. Wesley Hammond, presiding elder of the Moorefield District, Baltimore Conference, for a young man to serve on South Branch Circuit as junior preacher. Brother Roane regarded this as a leading of Providence. Thinking that this charge provided the change in climate so much needed, he gladly accepted the place. This was the beginning of his labors in the Baltimore Conference.

Brother Roane was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference at Calvary Church, Baltimore, March 12, 1884, Bishop A. W. Wilson presiding; ordained deacon at Leesburg, Va., in 1887, by Bishop J. C. Keener; ordained elder at Alexandria, Va., 1889, by Bishop A. W. Wilson.

He served the following charges: South Branch, 1883; North Branch, 1884; Hillsdale Mission, Lewisburg District, 1885; Healing Springs, 1886; Woodland Mission, 1887; Staunton Mission, 1888-1889; Belle Valley Mission, 1890; Marksville, 1891; Centerville and Petersburg; 1892-1893, Blue Sulphur, 1894-1897; Hillsboro, Md., 1898; Patuxent, 1899-1901; Rockingham, 1902-1905; McDowell, 1906-1908.

Brother Roane was happily married June 18, 1890, to Miss Annle Farrer, of Augusta County, Va. From this union four children were born: Merlyn F., Yorktown, Va.; Thoburn H., Baltimore, Md.; R. Hilton, Kansas City, Mo., and Miss Avis, Staunton, Va., who, with his devoted companion, survive, and mourn his departure.

Brother Roane's active ministry was terminated while he was serving on McDowell Charge. In the spring of 1909 he was placed on the

superannuate list. He located in Staunton, Va., where he resided to the day of his death. He served several charges after his superannuation, either as supply or as pastor in charge. To Central Church, Staunton, Va., of whose quarterly conference he was an honored member, he was an inspiration and a benediction. Gladly and cheerfully he performed most acceptably any service that his pastors asked of him. He was generally regarded in Staunton as a city missionary. He continued to visit from house to house praying with the people, comforting the sorrowing, ministering to the sick and the distressed; like his Master, he went about doing good.

Brother Roane was one of God's noble men, in whom the qualities of innate manhood blended with all the Christian graces. He was born with high ideals and he continued to cultivate them throughout his eventful and triumphant life. He was a man of great faith and love; modest and retiring in disposition, yet possessing deep and abiding convictions. He never faltered, he never hesitated; to him, duty was a sublime word. He went to his appointments (many of them were hard mission charges), without any complaint or murmuring, but with a cheerful spirit, believing that he was sent of God to that very charge. His kindness, gentleness, sterling manhood, and Christian-likeness won for him a place in the hearts of the people wherever he went. His life was indeed an unusual life. From the very beginning his life was one of suffering, but his afflictions, by the grace of God, made him heroic, noble, faithful, Christlike. In the last records his name will be found among that illustrious company in the 11th chapter of Hebrews.

Brother Roane was a good preacher. He knew God as a pardoning God. He knew and loved the doctrines of the Methodist Church. Regeneration, the witness of the Spirit, and Sanctification were no mere theological theories with him, but living realities. Out of a deep Christian experience he came before his people with a message warm with the love of God, and delivered it in demonstration of the Spirit. Nor did he hesitate to proclaim the whole gospel. The rich experience that came to his soul in the awful sufferings of body and mind in his boyhood days, became a more blessed peace as the weight of years and afflictions fell upon him. A deepening realization of the all sufficiency of Jesus Christ for all the needs of men, as verified in his own life, became the dominant note of his preaching.

On March 27, 1931, the Master said, "It is enough, come up higher," and he entered into "that rest that remaineth for the people of God." The funeral services were held in the presence of a large company of his friends and brethren of the ministry, at his late home on Oakenwold Street, conducted by Rev. H. M. Canter, D. D.; M. D. Mitchell, D. D., the writer and others of his brethren of the ministry. His remains were laid to rest in Thornrose Cemetery to await the resurrection of the just.

LAURA VIRGINIA HOMAN.

Laura Virginia Homan, wife of Rev. German O. Homan, was born March 1, 1853, and died February 23, 1931.

Mrs. Homan was no ordinary woman. The stamp of the extraordinary marked every phase of her life. The Son of Righteousness rose upon her life as quietly as the natural sun rises upon the earth. Her husband says she was born in the Kingdom. So she was, and ever remained a subject of it. The potentialities of her life always turned towards the face of God. Hence her life unfolded like a flower under the quickening sunshine of His presence and the refreshing dew of His favor. When but a girl she assumed the vows of the Church, and took upon herself its obligations. From that day until the close of her life she was ever true to its vows, loyal to its ideals, committed to its teachings, and wholly given to its mission. She possessed rare intellectual ability, an ability ever enlarging through careful and constant cultivation. No opportunity to develop her gifts eluded her. She was graduated from Wesleyan Female Institute, Staunton, Virginia, and she continued to be a student. She knew her Bible; she also knew the polity, the doctrines, the standards and the program of her Church.

She was aesthetic in her tastes. She loved the beautiful in nature, in art, in literature and in life. Environment, therefore, meant much to her. She was happy in her humble home, yet she craved the best. Her home was beautiful with flowers without, and the fragrance of her own life within.

She was sacrificial in service. Truly she had the mind of Christ. She thought of others, not herself. She was no respecter of persons. Where the need was most urgent, there she was with towel and basin. She spared not herself in helping others find Christ and themselves. In the community where she spent the last years of her life she was the first lady, respected, honored and loved for her work of faith and labor of love. Her visits to the homes of the people were the visits of an angel of God, for she carried hope and courage and fidelity and inspiration for higher thinking and purer living.

She was possessed of a passion for world-redemption. Her heart's desire and prayer to God was for the full salvation of the womanhood of her own Church; yea, for the womanhood of all lands. This passion was not merely emotional. She lived Jesus with every atom of her being, and that love expressed itself in a service that began with her entrance into the Church militant and doubtless continues in the Church triumphant.

She bequeathed to the women of the Baltimore Conference a rich legacy in character and in service. For thirty years she lived in the parsonage, the wife of an itinerant Methodist preacher. She fills no small place in the annals of the wives of the preachers of the Balti-

more Conference and even a larger place in the records of the work of the women of the whole Church, who loved her, respected her and esteemed her. Thirty years of the ripest part of her life she was a district secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society within the bounds of the Roanoke District. The leaven and the mustard seed symbolize the work of these years. It was both transforming and enlarging. Under her ministry more than one woman became a new creation and gained a new vision. She held aloft at all times the highest ideals of saintliness and of service, but no higher for others than for herself. The hundred thousand dollars raised by the women of the Roanoke District for missions under her administration tell only a part of the story of her achievement as a leader. Back of this was a life of prayer and of faith and of sacrifice.

She not only loved, but was loved. The establishment of the Laura Virginia Homan Scholarship at Scarrit College by the Woman's Missionary Society of the Baltimore Conference is the united voice of her sisters saying: "Mrs. Homan, we loved you and appreciated you, and we are expressing both our love and our appreciation in a way that we believe will please you most." The throng of women filling Greene Memorial Church on the day of her funeral was also a token of the love of those who knew her best and labored with her most, as was also the beautiful memorial service held during the Annual Meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society at Fredericksburg, Virginia.

But who could know Mrs. Homan and not love her? A life so sincere, so pure, so redolent with the spirit of Jesus, could not but set the love chords a-vibrating in the hearts of others.

She was married to Rev. German O. Homan in the month of October, 1881. Two children were born of this union. Both, however, stole away in childhood. How she loved to speak of them, and in a language that revealed the tenderness and wealth of a mother's heart!

I have visited many homes and had many friends whose memories I cherish, but the Homan home and the Homan friends have a place all to themselves in my memory. This home and these hearts refuse to be catalogued—they are unique.

The latter days lost nothing of the beauty and glory of the former days. She was patient, appreciative, trustful, expectant. Towards the end Brother Homan in his characteristic way said, "She is all packed up, ready to go." The veil between the today and the tomorrow was so thin at the end of the day that she just slipped through to be at home with God and the glorified.

Her funeral services were held in Greene Memorial Church, in charge of her pastor, Rev. C. K. Ray, assisted by Rev. W. F. Locke, her presiding elder, and Rev. Watson E. Holley, Rev. Edgar C. Beery and Rev. E. L. Woolf. The day, the flowers, the music, and the serv-

ice were just as she would have had them. We could almost hear her say, "I appreciate it all."

Her body was borne to the Homan homestead near Burlington, W. Va., and buried in God's acre to await the voice of His Son, saying: "Laura Virginia Homan, come forth!"

ADRIAN COLLINS NADENBOUSCH.

After a painful and wearying illness, lasting for about two years, Adrian C. Nadenbousch passed into the Great Beyond June 19, 1931.

For many years he was a familiar figure at the sessions of our Annual Conference—a choice layman devoted to his Church and ever ready to render loyal service. During his long service as a member of the Board of Finance of this Conference no member was more highly esteemed for industry and valuable help in conducting the affairs of the board. His quiet, unobtrusive manner, perhaps, somewhat hid from the public his solid elements of character, but acquaintance and association with him afforded a constant revelation of shining virtues that marked him an unusual man. To know him was to put implicit confidence in his integrity. The people of his home town, his county, his state, knew him and trusted him as few are trusted by their fellow-men. In the long and active practice of his profession, the purity of his motives was never questioned, nor the honesty of his methods ever challenged. He was decided in his convictions,—no one was ever left in doubt as to where he stood on any vital question of church or state,—yet he had the broadest charity for those who might hold opposing opinions.

His great interests in life were his home, his Church, his Masonic activities and his profession.

Born in Hedgesville, Berkeley County, W. Va., April 10, 1865, he received his education in the public schools and at Randolph-Macon College. After leaving Randolph-Macon he studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1888. He located in Martinsburg, where he continued in the practice of his profession until his death.

In 1892 he was happily married to Miss Margaret Wilen of this city. With his good wife he founded a home of culture and refinement. Here true hospitality abounded and a warm welcome awaited those who might cross its threshold.

He was active in his home church until disease struck him down. Even through the long months of suffering he was interested in the Church's welfare, an interest which endured to the last day of his earthly life. At the time of his death he was recording steward, an

office which he had filled for many years. It is characteristic of the man that no records were better or more painstakingly kept than the quarterly conference records of the Martinsburg Church. He was a trustee of Randolph-Macon and, from time to time, served on many special committees of the Church at large.

Becoming a member of the Masonic fraternity in 1900 he took much interest in the work of this great order. In 1912 he was made Grand Commander of the Knights Templar of the state; in 1920 he became Grand Master of the Masons of West Virginia, and in 1924 he was made Grand Treasurer of the Grand Lodge, a position which he filled until the time of his death. In 1923 he became a 33rd degree Mason.

His honors came unsought,—“the place sought the man and not man the place.”

His end was peace. After a simple service at the home, conducted by his pastor, amid throngs of sympathizing friends, his body was borne to the beautiful mausoleum in Green Hill Cemetery, where he was laid to rest with the highest Masonic honors. Distinguished members of the fraternity from every part of the state were present and participated in this solemn service.

His earthly work is done, but the good he did lives on among the many he served and helped; after the weary earthly day he fell asleep to awake in the timeless City of God.
