### FIRST DAY.

#### Morning Session.

Wednesday, October 5, 1932.

The Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its 148th Session in Braddock Street Church, Winchester, Virginia, at nine o'clock in the morning, Bishop W. F. McMurry in the chair.

Hymn, No. 560, "And are we yet alive

And see each other's face",

was sung, after which Bishop McMurry led in prayer.

Conference united in singing hymn No. 309,

"Amazing grace how sweet the sound,

That saved a wretch like me".

Psalm 27 was read responsively.

W. G. HARDY, on behalf of the Board of Stewards of the Braddock Street Church, in a felicitous, historical address, presented to Bishop McMurry a gavel made of wood taken from the timbers of the old house in Winchester in front of which Bishop Asbury preached his first sermon, and in which he held the first conference in these parts.

BISHOP McMURRY made fitting and feeling response in accepting the gavel.

THE ROLL was called by the secretary of the last Conference and 203 clerical and 53 lay members answered to their names.

H. M. CANTER was elected secretary of the Conference, and upon his nomination C. R. Curtis was elected assistant secretary; N. B. Harmon, Jr., recording secretary; J. Craver, assistant secretary in charge of the sale of minutes.

Psalm 24 was read responsively, and the Conference united in singing hymn No. 388,

"A charge to keep I have."

THE JOURNAL of yesterday was read and approved.

THE ROLL of absentees was called and 12 clerical and 19 lay members answered to their names.

ON MOTION further calling of the roll was dispensed with.

SUBSTITUTIONS: W. J. Harrell was substituted in place of E. W. Newman, W. G. Hardy for Mrs. J. D. Manor and F. A. Shryock for Leonard H. Bell on the Roll in the Winchester District.

A COMMUNICATION was received from the General Board of Christian Education and was referred to the Conference Board of Christian Education.

THE BISHOP announced that H. H. Sherman had the floor in support of his motion of yesterday to continue the assessment of \$9,500.00 for the **Baltimore Southern Methodist**.

A MOTION was made to lay the pending question on the table, but it did not prevail.

AFTER CONSIDERABLE discussion the main question was put and the motion was lost by a vote of 58 ayes to 166 noes.

ON MOTION of H. V. Wheeler the conference treasurer was in-



structed to pay out of the Conference Expense Fund, the expenses of the Special Committee on Conference Organ.

PLAN No. 4, offered by the Special Committee on the Conference Organ, was presented and B. V. Switzer moved that it be eliminated.

AS A SUBSTITUTE William Stevens moved the plan be referred to the Board of Christian Literature for consideration and that they report to the Conference. The substitute prevailed.

REPORT No. 1 of the Commission on Budget was presented and read. H. Sydenstricker offered an amendment that the maximum allowed for all purposes by the Commission on Budget be eighty-five thousand dollars.

POINT OF ORDER was raised by G. H. Lamar that the Conference cannot instruct the Commission on Budget until after they have considered the requests of the several boards, and made their report. The Bishop ruled the point of order was not well taken.

H. P. BAKER moved to lay the substitute on the table, but the motion did not prevail.

THE AMENDMENT was put to vote and sustained by a large majority.

REPORT No. 1 of the Commission on Budget as amended was adopted.

THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION, signed by Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., Claude M. Hesser, H. H. Sherman, E. L. Woolf, J. Howard Wells and T. J. Lambert, was presented and unanimously adopted by a rising vote:

"WHEREAS, Bishop Warren A. Candler, Senior Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has recently passed his seventy-fifth birthday, and

"WHEREAS, The Baltimore Conference remembers Bishop Candler with peculiar affection and esteem, mindful of his presidency of our Conference within the past years, as well as his general superintendency of the whole church, now, therefore, be it

**REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON SPIRITUAL LIFE.**

The interest committed to this commission is of the central purpose of all our Christian effort and organization. Whatever else we may be able to accomplish, if we fail to bring spiritual life and growth, all of our investments of labor and means have failed.

In the consideration of this interest let us be reminded again of the ringing declaration of our last General Conference which is as follows:

"Let this be a quadrennium in which there shall be one dominant note—a passion for souls. Let us regard every financial campaign and promotional adventure as secondary to the main purpose of preaching and living Christ. Let our whole educational process, from the smallest Sunday school to the largest university, feel the thrill of a genuine spiritual call until men and women shall confess their sins and seek the Lord and find Him, and our young men shall see visions and our old men shall dream dreams, and Pentecostal power shall break out upon us in gracious and overflowing measure. With nothing less can we be content. God waits to give us the outpouring of His Spirit. Shall not His people be willing in the day of His power?"

We are convinced that there is a great restlessness on the part of men and a hungering of heart that has been mocked by the things of the world men have vainly sought. They are using every means and following the deceptions of all forms of vice to satisfy the longings of their hearts. Can our Gospel meet this world need? What a challenge a fallen, unbelieving and wicked age makes to the Gospel we profess and preach!

With these thoughts before us we would recommend the following:

1. That we as preachers and laymen give ourselves first to an earnest seeking of the deepening of our own spiritual lives by the waiting upon every means of grace afforded us by giving ourselves to most earnest prayer to God and the reading of His word in secret, in our homes, and in the public gathering as opportunity makes possible. Let us so wait before our Lord until He shall speak to our hungering hearts His assuring words of peace.

2. That we insist that our preachers hold revival meetings, combine Sunday school evangelism, personal evangelism, home visitation evangelism, and in our regular services, and the appointed revival seasons, call sinners back to God and church members to a complete consecration of life to Him. God in the past has graciously blessed these means, and will in the future abundantly pour upon us His Spirit if we look to Him for help and guidance and make the needed sacrifice.

3. That the Bishop in charge be requested to fix a special hour at the next session of the Annual Conference for special emphasis on spiritual life values and that plans for the proper observance of this hour be made and announced as early in the year as possible, and that



during our Annual Conference week much time be given to preaching and such religious services as will encourage and strengthen the spiritual life.

4. That special emphasis be given in all of our district conferences to the importance of deepening the spiritual life of our people with a definite program for a specific hour announced in advance and let a spiritual life emphasis dominate the entire Conference.

5. That realizing a danger of too much being said to encourage the thought in the minds of our people that they are overburdened with the financial claims of our Christian cause, and that following so easily and willingly such suggestions, that we are in danger of losing the richer gifts by our unfaithfulness in the smaller matters, we would urge that strong effort be made to reach the large percentage now wasting their substance and living in spiritual poverty by withholding more than is meet, that we give special attention to their needs, that by honoring the Lord with their substance and the first fruits of their increase the Lord may open the windows of heaven to pour out His spiritual gifts upon them and His whole Church.

6. That we use our strongest efforts to place our religious periodicals and books in all of our homes, to establish family altars, to secure an observance on the part of our people of the Sabbath day, knowing as we do that spiritual life will fail if these are neglected. Let us all seek to live among men the principles of our Lord, praying with earnest desire for the coming of His kingdom, and being willing to make the necessary sacrifice.

#### REPORT OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The board reports:—

1. The work of the year has been described in detail in the reports of the Executive Secretary and the Extension Secretary, printed copies of which have been circulated among the members of the Conference.

2. The death of J. N. Maxwell during the year has been noted with keen regret. His influence and advice have been deeply missed at our deliberations.

3. The following persons are nominated to be members of the board:

R. K. Nevitt in the place of W. A. Shelton, resigned;

Mrs. Robert Sterrett in the place of J. N. Maxwell, deceased.

The board recommends that these persons be elected members of the board.

4. The board received from the Board of Trustees of the Randolph-Macon system the names of S. K. Cockrell and J. Arthur York to be

members of that board in the places of H. P. Hamill and Adrian C. Nadenbousch, both deceased. The board recommends that these nominations be approved by the Conference.

5. Randolph-Macon College had the largest enrollment in its history last year, but is having serious financial struggles. The salaries have been cut from ten to fifteen per cent. The enrollment at Randolph-Macon Woman's College is less than last year, but there are no immediate financial problems. The Academy at Front Royal had a smaller enrollment than the previous year and was operated at a loss. However, the Board of Trustees has ordered salary contracts to be made both at Front Royal and Bedford so that the budget will be balanced for the approaching session. The Front Royal institution is our heaviest burden and most serious problem. The trustees are handling it as wisely as possible in view of all the circumstances.

Emory University at Atlanta, Georgia; Southern Methodist University at Dallas, Texas, and Scarritt College at Nashville, Tennessee, are our Church-wide institutions. The first two are supported in part out of the General Conference budget and the last one by the Woman's Missionary Council. While no detailed report of their work is before us, they are rendering an indispensable service and should be adequately supported.

6. For the coming year the board has ordered the following:

(a) The Training Work will be extended with the intention that every congregation be reached with Standard Schools or Classes and every worker in this field be afforded opportunity for special training.

(b) The Conference Training School for Pastors and Lay Workers will be held at Front Royal, the Young People's Assembly will be held at a suitable place and an effort will be made to arrange an Adult Assembly, preferably in connection with the Conference School.

(c) The general board will be requested to make appropriations for student work in state schools as follows:

Blacksburg. . . . .	\$100.00
Lexington. . . . .	100.00
Harrisonburg. . . . .	500.00

(d) The president of the board, the executive secretary and the extension secretary will attend the General Council at Nashville.

(e) Hearty support is proffered and educational program as carried on at Lake Junaluska and our staff officers are encouraged to attend the Leadership Training School there.

(f) The following schedule for district council meetings has been approved:

October 25—Roanoke; October 26—Lewisburg;  
 October 27—Rockingham; October 28—Winchester;  
 November 1—Moorefield; November 2—Washington;  
 November 3—Alexandria; November 4—Baltimore.

(g) A report of the treasurer for the year ending as of October 10, 1932, duly audited, will be handed to the secretary of the Conference.

## 7. The board recommends:

(a) That all presiding elders and pastors more thoroughly acquaint themselves with the program of the Church in Christian Education and more diligently seek its fulfilment.

(b) That every congregation organize its Local Church Board of Christian Education, study the educational needs and resources of its people and carry out so far as practicable the program of the Church in this regard.

(c) That the following special days be observed with the use of the programs supplied by the board:

Sunday School Day;

Young People's Day;

Missionary Day—This latter once a month with a constructive program and a liberal offering.

(d) That our own periodical literature on education be used throughout all our local churches and that all workers be urged to familiarize themselves with the material thus available.

(e) That the staff be composed of an Executive Secretary, an Extension Secretary and an Office Secretary.

(f) The board asks the following assessment for our institutions and the work of the board, the total amount being the amount allowed the Board by the Commission on Budget:

The board records that its askings of the Budget Commission were \$21,175 and that upon the reduction to \$15,000 the board has correspondingly reduced all items in its above request.

(g) The board respectfully requests our presiding bishop to appoint H. H. Sherman, executive secretary for the board; Walter S. Thomas, post chaplain of Staunton Military Academy; C. L. Robson, a student to Emory University.

(h) The board urgently requests that in view of the drastic reductions in assessments and in further view of the desperate need of Randolph-Macon College and Randolph-Macon Academy, a special offering be authorized and taken in all our local churches on Christian College Day for these institutions and be added to the above assessments.

8. The board urges upon all branches and members of the Conference the importance of this work which is the fertilization, the sowing and the cultivation of Christian character to the end that the ripened harvest may be plentiful in the Church.

**REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FINANCE.**

It is with the greatest pleasure, in this year of depression and need, that we are privileged to report that there has been an increase in the General Superannuate Endowment Fund of \$49,040.15, bringing the total of the fund, both General and Conference, to the amount of \$6,492,133.36, the income from which enables the General Board to distribute \$181,845.03 among the claimants throughout the connection, and to distribute to the various Conference Boards of Finance \$106,155.86 to be used for the claimants of the several Conferences. The amount the General Board distributes this year to the claimants is \$4,496.78 less than last year, your Conference board receiving \$4,173.19 as against \$4,960.43 for last year, or \$769.01 less than the year previous. A study of the splendid annual report sent all the preachers of the Church by the General Board will reveal the fact that the affairs of this most important part of our church work are carefully and efficiently administered.

The Baltimore Conference has, in the Conference Endowment Fund, administered by the General Board, \$94,545.02, from which we derived an income of 4½ per cent. for the past year.

The Superannuate Fund passed through a readjustment as authorized by the General Conference, and the amount of our Conference's quota was decreased by \$118,417.90. During the year the interests of this cause have been looked after and there have been some collections, though many charges which had adjusted and assumed a new amount or said they would take special offerings, have overlooked this important matter or had to pass it by on account of the stress of conditions. We would urge our preachers not to fail this worthy undertaking, but give it its place in the program and effort of the charges. We suggest that the month of December be again designated as Superannuate Endowment Month and that the preachers present the cause to our people and give them a chance to assist in this worthy undertaking. We request Bishop Wm. F. McMurry to appoint Rev. Harry P. Baker, the nominee of the General Board, as Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment, in connection with regular work in the Conference.

The Corporate Board of Finance has remitted to your board \$5,000.00; the Publishing House has sent us \$2,327.25; and we have received from the General Board of Finance \$4,173.19.

The board is making honest effort to fulfill its mission in the care of our claimants. Under paragraph 363, of the Discipline of 1930, the board is making its appropriations on the basis of service rendered, supplemented by additional allowance for necessitous cases. In order that the board may do its work impartially and with fairness to claimant and Church it is necessary that the claimants be frank in their statements as to their financial circumstances as provided in paragraph 364 of our Discipline. The policy of the board has been and is now to consider each case on its merits so far as at all possible, that the best



care within our resources may be given. The board has paid the claimants one-fourth of their allowances quarterly as per action of the Conference. To do this we must keep our surplus up to the present amount, and will have to ask the Conference for the same assessment as we have had the past year. This is necessary because we have an increase in the number of claimants and a decrease in the amounts received from other sources than our assessment.

The treasurer of the Conference and the treasurer of the Board of Finance are bonded as directed by the Conference.

We request that there be a place provided in the program and work of the district conferences for the presentation of the work of our board and the cause of Superannuate Endowment.

**REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LAKE JUNALASKA ASSEMBLY.**

The Lake Junalaska Methodist Assembly was founded some twenty years ago by a group of Methodist laymen, ministers and bishops in the interest of the Methodist Church. In 1929 the stockholders proposed to the Annual Conference that the Conferences elect trustees to hold and operate the Assembly for the Church. This proposition was accepted on the strict condition that the Conferences assumed no legal or moral responsibility for the debts of the Assembly incurred by the stockholders.

Plans have been made and agreements reached that will put the Assembly upon a sound basis and provide for the small debt that will remain, provided the Conferences continue their support.

We recommend the appointment of district directors for Lake Junalaska to assist in advertising the various schools and Conferences.

We further recommend that the pastors call attention of the people to the advantages at Lake Junaluska for training and inspiration.

We recommend the election of Judge M. L. Walton, Jr., as a trustee for a two-year term.

**REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.**

Your board had before it the report of the Publishing House of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. It is gratifying to note that, in spite of the financial difficulties encountered this year, the Publishing House has been enabled to distribute \$60,000 for the use of the superannuates and the widows and orphans of our preachers. We wish to go on record as strongly urging our pastors to call the attention of their people, in every way they deem feasible, to the publications of our house. It is no doubt true that practically all the religious literature many of our people ever read is furnished by our Publishing House in the shape of Sunday School and Young People's literature of various kinds. It is true, however, that the peripatetic book agent, of specious religious sects and saviors, still makes victims of the unwary.

The report of the Board of Directors of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company was before your board for consideration. The

report is appended hereto. Since this report, in its main provisions, has already been acted upon by this Conference, we do not read it now.

Your board has taken the position that, since the Conference was acting on the various propositions submitted for the continuance of the **Baltimore Southern Methodist**, the matter of the paper was beyond our consideration as a board. However, since one proposition submitted by the Committee on Merger has been referred back to the Board of Christian Literature, we have gone, as carefully as possible, into every possible angle of the situation not already acted upon by this Conference.

After the most careful consideration of every possible alternative, your board makes the following recommendations:

We feel that, regardless of whether or not it would help the financial situation, our paper does not fulfill the purpose for which it exists in the serving of the constituency of our Conference nearly so well as it should, due to the fact that so few of our homes receive the paper. We are laying the blame at the door of no one. The fact simply exists. Without blaming the pastors for what has not been done, we, most of us pastors ourselves, strongly urge that, for this year at least, we make such an effort as has never before been made to make this a paper for all the Southern Methodists of the Baltimore Conference.

Your board has felt that the Conference would be unwilling and unable to shoulder the same assessment as last year. However, certain brethren of the Conference, Brothers W. W. McIntyre, J. Howard Wells, John Paul Tyler, George N. Conrad, W. H. Barger, George H. Lamar, and E. Chase Bare, feel so keenly the need of the paper that they have agreed to undertake to raise one thousand dollars (\$1,000) of the necessary money, provided the Conference will provide the rest. Our editor, Dr. N. B. Harmon, Jr., has agreed to accept a substantial reduction in the support allowed him.

In view of the foregoing facts, and in view of the tacit agreement entered into in the meeting of the officers of the various boards, we, therefore, recommend: That the **Baltimore Southern Methodist** be allowed an apportionment of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) for the coming year.

We respectfully request Bishop McMurry to appoint Dr. Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., editor for another year.

We go on record as appreciating in the highest degree the place the Southern Methodist Publishing Company and its board of directors have played in the beginnings of our Conference paper and its continuance throughout the years.

### REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN METHODIST PUBLISHING COMPANY.

Religious journalism presents a unique problem to the Church of today. On the one hand is the indispensable value of the religious paper and on the other the prevailing condition and methods of business that cut into the resources of the church paper far greater than in the secular press. All news publications are dependent upon two sources of income, the individual subscription and advertisements. The character of the news carried by a church paper is of such a nature as to confine it to a narrow territory and small constituency, and the present method of advertising seeks only those publications covering wide areas and large circulations. Under these conditions the church press cannot continue unless it is supported as a basic missionary enterprise and supplied means by the organization in whose interest it is published. Even the secular newspaper and magazine claim a subsidy from the public in the form of special postal rates, on the ground that they are necessary to create and promote an intelligent citizenship. Quoting from a recent report from the Dean of Journalism of Columbia University: "Journalism is advancing as a profession with a momentum that is destined to continue, despite the prevailing stagnation in advertising revenue for two fundamental reasons—First, because the success of journalism as a business depends upon its progress as a profession; and, second, because journalism is the chief agency of our present civilization for the advancement of human relationships." Commenting on this fundamental reason the Dean says: "As news provides the sinews of public opinion the newspaper today is indispensable in all public affairs and as long as the principal functions of the state, the church, the home, the school and business are dependent upon public action the press will advance as a profession."

In large measure the well being of the Church depends upon the attitude of our members toward the church press. From our early history as a separate conference we have supported an organ within our territory that has not only supplied a large place in our church life, but has been instrumental in creating a conference-wide unity of thought and action. The spirit thus created has made us not the least in the world-wide sisterhood of Conferences. We have always been in the forefront of the hosts called Methodists.

Last year our Conference was in the lead of all Conferences in the percentage of payments on our assessments, which was due largely to the spirit of the "Old Baltimore". We are not ready to give up our rich heritage of achievement in the wide field of Methodism. Our conference organ has enjoyed a very wide popularity throughout the Conference this year. So far as we know it is universally appreciated by those who read it.

The Publishing Company that is issuing the paper has been diligent in its endeavor to publish it at the least possible cost. Every plan

that has been suggested to save money has been carefully looked into and we are assured that there are no ways of reducing the present fixed charges. The editor this year has voluntarily taken a ten per cent. cut in his salary.

We can continue to get out the paper upon the basis of the assessment for it as last year.

We desire to advise the Conference that the Publishing Company is a joint stock company. We can with a small assessment liquify the present financial obligations of the paper, but the withdrawal of the assessment for the paper and of the good will of the Conference will destroy the Publishing Company, which was organized through the sale of stock to the members of our Church for this purpose alone.

We, therefore, ask that the Conference continue the assessment as of last year, and that the Bishop be requested to appoint Rev. Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., editor.

#### REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE ON CONFERENCE ORGAN.

Your special committee, created at the last session of the Baltimore Conference, assumed the responsibility imposed upon it and has endeavored to carry out your instructions. We were instructed to "enter into negotiations with some other conference organ or organs with a view to a merger; and that this committee shall have power to effect such merger or to make such other disposition as seems feasible."

In accordance with this, your committee has been at work upon several plans looking to a possible merger with another conference organ. Pursuant thereto we have had two meetings with a like committee appointed by the Virginia Conference. At the second of these meetings, held in Mount Vernon Place Church, Washington, D. C., on June 21, 1932, it was moved and carried that the Plan 1 hereafter described, calling for a complete merger of the **Richmond Christian Advocate** and the **Baltimore Southern Methodist**, be presented to both Conferences, "with a full account of what has been done by the joint committee to date, and that this plan be recommended for adoption by both Conferences."

This plan in brief outline is a complete merger of the **Baltimore Southern Methodist** and the **Richmond Christian Advocate**. Dr. J. M. Rowland, now editor of the **Richmond Christian Advocate**, is to be the editor of the new paper. Miss Maude E. Hodges of the **Baltimore Southern Methodist** is to be the assistant editor. There shall be a board of directors to govern the combined organ, consisting of sixteen representatives, eight from each Conference. The cash support which



this Conference shall give to the combined paper shall be proportioned in inverse ratio to the respective subscription lists at the end of the conference year, and in no year shall this cash support from this Conference exceed \$3,500 unless otherwise ordered by a vote of the Conference.

Such is the plan as recommended by the joint committee, and in accordance with the action of this committee we are hereby transmitting it to the Baltimore Conference for its acceptance or rejection.

However, your committee was expressly given power to bring in any other plans which seem feasible. Since the meeting of the joint committee above described, we have thoroughly canvassed other plans and possibilities, and ask the Conference to consider these, as well as the above recommendation of the joint committee.

We recommend, first, in view of the entire situation, that the present plan of editing and carrying on the **Baltimore Southern Methodist**, be continued by the Conference for the ensuing year, with an assessment of \$9,500.00, provided this meets the approval of the Conference. In the event that this plan is approved it is understood that the Budget Commission will be hereby instructed to make the necessary apportionment.

Second: A plan whereby the **Baltimore Southern Methodist** will be continued as at present, except that there shall be no regular editor, Miss Maude E. Hodges of the **Baltimore Southern Methodist** will be continued in the office to receive communications for the paper and from district correspondents, etc. This plan contemplates the purchase of an editorial service from other editors of church papers and an appropriation of fifty dollars a year for each one of the district correspondents. It will also require the oversight of some pastor located near or in Baltimore, or such other supervision as the board of directors of the **Baltimore Southern Methodist** may be able or willing to establish. It is understood that the present editor's connection with the paper will cease under this plan, and that the assessment required from the Conference will be \$4,000.00.

Third: A complete merger of the **Baltimore Southern Methodist** with the **Nashville Christian Advocate** or General Organ of the Church. The paper will be enlarged to forty pages, eight of which it is understood will be devoted to Baltimore Conference news and interests entirely. The subscription price shall be two dollars per year. The editorial work and responsibility will be wholly in the office of the **Nashville Christian Advocate**. This plan shall be in force for two years from the date of agreement. If by that time the plan is satisfactory it may be continued automatically, or if unsatisfactory it may be discontinued after notice of ninety days given by either party. This plan also requires an assessment sufficient to yield \$1,500.00, which shall be levied on the Conference for the year 1932-1933, this apportionment to be used to close up the business of our present **Baltimore Southern Methodist**, and to pay for the services of those

who may be chosen to represent the new paper in the several districts. It is understood that the unexpired terms of all unexpired subscriptions will be completed by the **Nashville Christian Advocate**. We recommend the appointment of a board of five managers for the conference edition of the **Christian Advocate**, the members of said board to be nominated by the Board of Christian Literature and confirmed by the Conference.

This completes the report of your committee and we suggest that in taking action upon this matter the separate plans described above be voted upon separately or in such way as that the Conference may express itself upon each individual plan. We suggest that the vote be taken by the members standing until counted when each special plan is put before the body; that the plan receiving the fewest number of votes be dropped, and this proceeding continued until the Conference makes its choice between the two plans which shall remain.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

Brethren:

The following statement is made in the report of the General Board of Church Extension to the Conference Board:

"The building of churches and parsonages has practically ceased for the present in our Church. There are two reasons for this condition. In the first place, there was a period of church building running through ten or fifteen years and while there are some congregations with inadequate buildings, in the majority of cases our people are well housed. In the second place, present financial conditions make it inadvisable to enterprise new buildings.

"Many congregations are embarrassed by debts contracted when financial conditions were favorable. In many cases the debts carried by banks, trust companies and insurance companies are too large for either the General or Conference Board to undertake to carry them as loans. Our donation funds are too small to relieve them. We feel that it is the duty of the Board of Church Extension to aid in the saving of valuable property and in relieving the embarrassment under which many congregations labor at present when the size of the debt and the condition of our funds justify it."

With this condition in mind your Conference Board has with painstaking care endeavored to distribute the meagre funds committed to it to those places where not only the immediate strain is the greatest, but where the dollar will ultimately do the most good.

The board admonishes those congregations which are contemplating building to be especially careful in their preparations to have their architectural plans approved by the architect-secretary of the General Board and to have three-fourths of the costs assured as legally required. In faithfully observing these requirements greater efficiency in adequate building will be achieved and financial distress will be avoided.

#### REPORT OF BIBLE BOARD.

The Bible Board unhesitatingly and without reserve states again its position with regard to the Holy Scriptures. It is the Word of God, inspired by the Holy Spirit who moved upon those holy men of old, Spirit-called to be the agents of divine revelation. It is the charter of salvation, the lamp for the pilgrims' feet, the light to illuminate the way to glory. "We stand by the Book."

The board recognizes those enterprises whose purpose and work are to spread the gospel over the whole earth, to broadcast the seed which is the Word of God. The American Bible Society is such an enterprise. Your board takes note of its continued success in translation, covering at least 924 languages; in publication and distribution on so large a scale as reported in its statistics; in making its sales policy to be cost of production without profit; in serving those people who, by reason of blindness, cannot read but whose fingers become eyes by the use of the Braille system of type. Universal Bible Sunday is requested by the society to be observed, the date suggested being December 4.

The board calls attention to the growing tendency on the part of our youth of high school age to reject the Bible and to ignore its teachings.

The board would use its powers in the promotion of family worship and of private devotions—the use of the Word in systematic reading along with unhurried, intercessory prayer. It would discourage the use of other devotional material when substituted for the Book itself, but would emphasize the pre-eminence of the Holy Scriptures.

The board would have the Bible to be the chart and compass of all our preaching; would have all our ministers to “preach the Word” (and only the Word), being “instant in season, out of season”, declaring the unsearchable riches of Christ.

WHEREAS, in view of the foregoing, the Bible Board recommends the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. That we endorse those Bible societies propagating the Holy Book as a means of salvation to men. The American Bible Society can be specifically thus regarded.

2. That we observe Sunday, December 4, as Universal Bible Sunday, with appropriate services.

3. That we co-operate as ministers with public school authorities and high school principals without conflict with civil laws in stimulating interest in the Bible by the student bodies and the anchoring of their faith in the inspired truth.

4. That we encourage the enrollment of all our people in the League of Worship Covenant initiated by our General Board of Missions, and urge the use, in their devotions, of the Book of God.

5. That we urge our preachers to beware of the temptation to substitute for gospel texts any basic material other than that found in the revealed word of God.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

We believe that the ideal of missions represents the heart of the Christian gospel. It is our task and our joy to carry the good news to all the world. Parts of our own Conference territory are definite missionary areas. With a view to all the implications of this high task your board has labored.

Special attention is directed to our Conference School for Pastors and Christian Workers, and to Young People's Assemblies, and other educational agencies for the promotion of missionary information and inspiration. We urge upon our people the value of *The World Outlook* as a great missionary agency which should be read by both the men and the women of our Conference, a production perhaps unequalled in Christian journalism.

We recommend the election by the Conference of a Paine College Jubilee Commission to work without expense to the Conference for the promotion of interest in this great institution of our land in this its fiftieth anniversary. We nominate J. J. Rives, W. H. Best, H. H. Sherman, Mrs. T. J. Copeland and M. L. Walton, Jr., as members of this commission.

**REPORT OF THE BALTIMORE ANNUAL CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES.**

Winchester, Va.

To the President and Members of the Baltimore Annual  
Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South :

Dear Brethren :

As directed by the Discipline of our Church, your Conference Board of Lay Activities submits its annual report, embodying some facts, suggestions and recommendations as follows :

**Definite Progress.**

We are pleased to report progress along a number of lines featuring our work for the past conference year. A more thorough comprehension and sympathetic co-operation in the work have followed the efforts of our Conference Lay Leader and his associates, as they have sought to lead the forces in the Conference.

**Laymen's Day.**

Laymen's Day was generally observed with splendid results throughout the Conference. We recommend that Laymen's Day be continued and properly observed and that the second Sunday in June (June 11, 1933) be designated for this purpose, the theme of the program to be "The Stewardship Interpretation of Life."

**The Benevolences.**

We recommend that all lay leaders and boards of stewards redouble their efforts for the coming year to secure one hundred percent payment on all benevolences. All of the great interests of Methodism are involved in the benevolences. The closest possible co-operation should be given by the lay forces to the leadership of the bishop, the elders and the pastors in their efforts to make the Baltimore Conference one hundred percent in all its financial program. We especially recommend that the Every-Member Canvass for the benevolences be taken as soon as possible after the adjournment of the Conference and every effort be made to insure its success.

**Stewardship.**

Your board realizes the great need of a more vital, intensive and extensive educational program for spiritual growth. This will come to our people as they are brought to a consciousness that they are stewards in the great program of God for their lives—stewards of their time, talents, possessions: all their powers of body, mind and spirit—to be dedicated to the service of God and the spread of Christ's Kingdom. The proper

inculcation of this Christian doctrine will materially assist in the solution of the problems of the Church both of service and adequate finance.

We recommend that each lay leader read at least one approved book on stewardship this year; that each district include a stewardship unit in one Standard Training School; and that the boards of stewards, stewardship committees, and the organized Sunday school classes engage in the study of the stewardship course.

#### **Lay Speaking.**

The value of lay-speaking has been proven over and over again in our Church. It develops the Christian character of those participating, and is an effective agency for promoting the general programs of the Church. The responsibility for organizing and making possible these results lies with the district lay leader and the presiding elder, working in co-operation with the charge lay leaders and pastors. Careful selection should be made of all lay speakers and they should be trained for their work through literature and coaching by their pastors.

#### **Brotherhood.**

We recommend that all lay leaders familiarize themselves with the revised plan for the promotion of and conduct of brotherhoods and men's work. We urge all of the larger congregations to organize the men for concerted action. We believe the men will be greatly benefited personally and will be able to do more good in all fields of finance, relief and evangelism.

#### **Spiritual Life.**

We call upon the laymen of our Church to deepen their own spiritual lives by prayer, Bible study, worship, giving, and personal service. Let our laymen avail themselves of the privilege of personal evangelism by example and teaching and working as did our Lord and Master.

#### **The Methodist Layman.**

*The Methodist Layman* is filling a place of its own and is indispensable to the lay leaders, members of stewardship committees, and members of official boards. We would especially recommend that an earnest effort be made to secure at least five (5) subscriptions from each charge, to include the charge lay leader, the chairman of the board of stewards, and the chairman of the stewardship committee.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE.

Dear Brethren:

The Conference has placed upon the Committee on Temperance and Social Service the responsibility of suggesting the principles involved in the same. We have endeavored after careful study and consideration of these principles to make the following recommendations.

First—As to the Home. The Methodist Church has always stood and it so stands today for the sanctity of the home, and of proper marital relations, against the evils of divorce and other similar influences undermining home life, as well as against the modernistic view of sex relations.



If the home goes, the destruction of society begins to take place. Inseparably linked with the home and its sanctity, and not second in importance to the preservation of the Christian order, is the proper relation existing between the rich and the deserving poor. It is not desirable that part of the people of the nation should have the advantages of food, clothing and pleasures, when many other honest, industrious and ready to work folk should lack these necessities of life. Can we really be called Christian, while part of our population lives in affluence and the other part in want of ordinary comforts? We must as Christians learn to suffer and share with our less fortunate brethren.

Second—We recommend that we go on record as endorsing the stand taken by the College of Bishops that the, "Complete outlawry of war must be the goal of all who follow the Prince of Peace"; that we as a Christian nation set the example for the rest of the world by a reasonable disarmament, reducing to a minimum its expenditures of the army and navy, maintaining only such forces as is necessary for what might be called police protection.

Third—We recommend that the Conference endorse the work of the Lord's Day Alliance, and that our constituency be urged to read and distribute literature on the proper observance of the Lord's Day. We especially recommend the book entitled, "The Day of Worship", edited by Dr. W. W. Davis of Baltimore, Md.

We desire to call your attention to worldliness within the Church, such as the modern dance and the moving picture evil.

Fourth—As to the Liquor Traffic. The war between Methodism and the traffic in intoxicating liquors is endless. Whatever other churches, social or political groups say or do, Methodism must nowhere give way.

Before and since the adoption of the Eighteenth Amendment, the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has declared its approval of the amendment. Our country is being sown down with insidious suggestions and blatant proposals for the purpose of misleading the youth of our nation. Prohibition reform is being proclaimed until many good people are successfully deceived. They are led to believe that some people want to improve conditions, when really they want to make them worse. At the present time the advocates of the return of intoxicating drinks are using the word reform in a different sense; instead of reforming drinkers and having a sober nation, they desire to reform sober people and have a nation of drinkers. Reform as is now used by the wet propagandist means not to go from bad to better, but from better to worse. However the advocates of liquor have nothing to offer to take the place of the present law. The law is good and can be enforced, but it has been proven time and again that the liquor evil cannot be regulated. It can be prohibited and should be destroyed. Proof of the benefit of the eighteenth amendment is set forth by government records, social welfare agencies and

other sources. We are face to face with the question: Shall the powerful organization with a wet metropolitan press and with wet millionaires spending part of their wealth for the return of intoxicating liquors, and attempting to dominate the social and religious forces of the nation, be left with a free hand, or shall we as God's militant host rise up in our spiritual strength and smite the terrible monster, intemperance, with the power of the ballot?

We insert in our report the following paragraph from the report of the Board of Temperance and Social Service for your endorsement:

"The situation today is very different from that in 1928. Then the contest revolved around the personal attitude of two candidates for the presidency on the question of prohibition. Today, while again the personal attitude of the two presidential candidates will be involved, the platforms of the two parties are to be carefully compared, and most important of all senators, congressmen and state legislators are to be chosen. Despite the furious assaults of wet fanatics, the continued false wet propaganda and the action of political party conventions, we believe that a majority of the people of the nation are opposed to modification or repeal of the eighteenth amendment, and that they still believe that the best method of handling the traffic in intoxicating liquors is by branding it as criminal, which it truly is. We desire better observance of the law by the people and better enforcement by the state and national governments, and we urge the provision by states and nation of whatever men and money may be necessary for more efficient prohibition enforcement."

**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.**

In line with the aggressions against the Christian Sabbath, with all of its hallowed influences and stabilizing effects upon the life of nations as well as individuals, the past year has not improved the status of the Sabbath in its legal aspects in the territory of the Baltimore Conference. The effort in Virginia to meet the ruling of the Supreme Court of Appeals of Virginia, to the effect that the word "necessity" in its Sabbath law is a question for the jury in each case, has thus far failed, and further effort before the Virginia Legislature must be made for curative legislation as a necessary means of increasing its effectiveness.

In Maryland an even more serious condition has been precipitated by a recent decision of its Court of Appeals in sustaining the constitutionality of the recent statute which permits the municipality of Baltimore City to frame and enforce, as a local law, radical changes in the general state-wide Sunday law, which has stood as the bulwark against the commercialization of the Christian Sabbath for more than a century. This is but the beginning of a state-wide movement through which efforts will undoubtedly be made to change the state law, in its application to many counties and municipalities in different parts of the state. Especially will this be true where the commercial elements may find themselves strong enough to make infraction upon the Holy Sabbath as recognized by our forefathers, both Catholic and Protestant. In the meantime, the success in Baltimore City will undoubtedly render it more difficult to enforce the general laws pending the effort to enact such local laws.

Such efforts in Maryland and conditions in Virginia call for the most resolute service on the part of our people, if they would preserve the benefits of the Christian Sabbath as it applies to our present advanced civilization, unmarred by the ravages of the moving pictures and commercialized sports.

Fortunately there are Sabbath Day organizations both in Maryland and Virginia through which our people may co-operate in their efforts as citizens for relief; but there is no instrumentality which can take the place of the Christian home and the Church in bringing about the revival of faith in, and hope through, the Christian Sabbath.

Now, wherefore, your committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That we request our pastors, teachers, and parents to give more instruction in the proper observance of the Lord's Day.
2. That we endorse the efforts of the Lord's Day Alliances of Virginia and Maryland to bring about a proper observance of the day, and urge our preachers and people to co-operate in the work of Christian citizens in resisting efforts to weaken or repeal the laws enacted by our forefathers for the preservation of the Christian Sabbath as a necessary part of our civilization.

3. That we recommend the appointment by this Conference of Rev. S. R. Neel, Rev. B. V. Switzer, and Rev. E. T. Harrison to membership in the Board of Managers of the Lord's Day Alliance of Virginia, and the appointment of Rev. Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., to membership on the Educational Committee of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, HOME OF THE  
AGED AND ORPHANS, OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE  
M. E. CHURCH, SOUTH, INC., LOCATED AT  
GAITHERSBURG, MD.**

It is with a deep and sincere sense of appreciation to our Heavenly Father for His divine guidance and blessing in this great work of love and mercy which we are doing in His name, that we submit this annual report.

**Guests.**

Our family now numbers 64 and includes people from all parts of the Conference. In addition to the 64 guests now on roll, the Home has cared for 27 others, or a total of 91 people. Six new guests have been received during the year and ten passed to the great Home beyond.

We have been able to care for all urgent applications with the exception of the helpless invalid cases. These cases are indeed pathetic. They cannot be taken care of in private homes unless they have plenty of money, the hospitals will not take them and the county homes are hesitant about receiving them. We hope the time will soon come when we will be able to erect a building similar to Epworth Hall at the other end of the main building for the purpose of providing for helpless invalid applicants as well as for our own guests who become helpless after they enter the Home.

The infirmities of old age are fast making their impression upon our family, but when we consider the fact that most of our folk are in their 70's and 80's and some in their 90's, our oldest guest being 95, this is to be expected. It has been necessary to keep two full-time nurses throughout the year and sometimes a third has had to be called in for special cases.

All holidays and special occasions are observed in the Home. Our Thanksgiving dinner was one of the big events of the year, with turkey and everything that goes with it. Christmas was a joyous



time, with a tree and gifts for everyone. Memorial Day has a special significance for us as all the folk bring flowers to be placed on the graves of our deceased guests who are buried in the Home lot in the Gaithersburg cemetery. Entertainments, treats, special programs, auto rides, victrolas, radio, porches, lawn and our large walk provide for the social and recreational life.

Much is done in the way of providing for the spiritual life—vesper services, sermons, communion, Holy Week services, and sick visitation. Religion is the chief interest of most of our folk.

#### Buildings.

All of our buildings have been kept painted and repaired. The main building needs some inside painting and the corridors need rubber runners. We are hoping that the Washington District Guild, which has as its special work the supplying of the needs in the main building, will be able to take care of these items this coming year. During the past year the Washington District Guild has replenished our supply of linens, provided a storm door and furnished our Thanksgiving dinner.

The Baltimore District Guild, which has as its special work the supplying of the needs of the dining room and kitchen annex, has replenished our stock of table linens, dishes and cooking utensils. In addition to this, they paid the salary of one of our nurses for six months. We soon hope to organize the ladies of some of the other districts.

#### Farm.

Our farm is in excellent condition. In spite of the reduction in the price of milk, our milk checks are larger than ever before. This is due to the fact that our butter fat is higher than it has ever been and our farm and cattle scores are high. We have had a very good garden and to date have canned over 2,000 jars of vegetables in addition to what we have used on the tables. Our early potato crop yielded 145 bushels which are safely stored in the cellar. Both silos are full and we have 49 tons of hay, sufficient to last until next year. Our corn is in good condition and we expect a fine crop. We also had a fine crop of wheat. Our dairy herd consists of 32 cows. We also have 3 heifers, 1 calf, 3 horses, 38 pigs, 8 sheep and 575 chickens, all of which are in good condition. Mr. Houck, our farm manager, is doing exceptionally fine work.

#### Office.

Our books have been checked by the cashier of the local bank and found to be correct. All records and files are up to date.

Receipts have been issued for all monies received and monthly ledger sheets including all receipts and disbursements made. Written



monthly reports, covering all phases of the work, have been prepared and submitted to the executive committee.

Too much cannot be said in appreciation of the efficient, self-forgetful and devoted service of our superintendent, Rev. Herman M. Wilson, in this holy cause.

Too much credit cannot be given our staff of workers. They are loyal, faithful and co-operative.

### Finances.

We close the year with (1) all running expenses, interest, taxes, and insurance premiums paid in full; (2) all money borrowed during the year repaid; (3) \$500.00 paid on the debt; and (4) our assets increased by \$6,500.00. This is a record of which any institution can be justly proud during times like the present.

The Christmas offering amounted to \$3,526.02 this year. Three hundred and twenty of the five hundred and fifty Sunday schools or about 58% sent in offerings. The Mother's Day offering amounted to \$2,668.02 and was received from 157 charges. These two offerings are very necessary to this work.

We realized \$6,149.65 this year from Annual Maintenance Subscriptions. The Home is dependent upon these annual gifts from individuals and organizations.

The year has been a hard one but the progress of the work and the co-operation and interest of the people everywhere has made it a pleasant one. We face the future with confidence.

First: We request Bishop W. F. McMurry to re-appoint Rev. Herman M. Wilson to the superintendency of the Home.

Second: We request the presiding elders at their first quarterly conferences to ask this question: "Who is elected director for the Home for the Aged?"

Third: We request the pastors and superintendents of all our congregations and Sunday schools to take a special offering for the Home on Mother's Day and at Christmas.

#### REPORT OF CONFERENCE HOSPITAL BOARD.

The hospital work of our Church has been carried on this year in the midst of trying circumstances, and we appreciate the earnest efforts put forth and the valiant work accomplished by our hospitals and by our general board.

Dr. Henry C. Pfeiffer of the general board, who was present at the meeting of your conference board, informs us that our hospitals have been confronted with distressing needs for increased services free to the sick poor, and at the same time have been embarrassed with decreased revenues. They have met this issue in heroic fashion, and most of them have been running without current deficit. Several instances of severe financial difficulty have arisen, but even in these cases the outlook is hopeful.

We are grateful to know that with depleted office force the work of the General Hospital Board has been done with such efficiency. Our general board enrolled during the cultivation period of the Golden Cross, 8,500 church directors, thus indicating a generous response on the part of the pastors in the organization effort.

Your Conference Hospital Board makes the following recommendations:

1. We urge the conference-wide observance of Golden Cross Week during the week which includes the third and fourth Sundays in May, and we would request those pastors who may fail to observe this particular time to promote the Golden Cross Enrollment at some other specified period of the conference year.

2. We urge the appointment by the pastors, subject to the confirmation of the fourth quarterly conference, of wide-awake Golden Cross Directors for the local churches.

3. We would ask our pastors and Golden Cross Directors to follow the law of the Church, as contained in paragraph 560 of the Discipline, with reference to the disposition of Golden Cross funds, viz.: Send remittances to the conference treasurer, Mr. J. T. Houck, Harrisonburg, Virginia, who is required by law to forward the amounts raised to the treasurer of the General Hospital Board, Atlanta, Georgia, monthly, the law providing further that the treasurer of the General Hospital Board shall remit Golden Cross funds promptly to the Southern Methodist Hospital and Sanatorium, Tucson, Arizona.

4. We would request our presiding elders, pastors and lay leaders to cooperate with the efforts of this board and particularly with the efforts of our Conference Golden Cross Director, Dr. N. M. Canter, of Harrisonburg, Virginia, in creating a larger interest among our people in the healing ministry of the Church through district conferences and other group meetings held throughout the Baltimore Conference.

#### REPORT ON GROUP INSURANCE.

I took over the work of our late H. L. Hout on November 10, 1931, I have received premiums from the preachers to the amount of \$460.00 and from the Bishop and presiding elders, who are in group two, and carry \$2,000.00 extra, \$471.96. Total, \$931.96. This amount has been sent to J. T. Houck, treasurer.

My expense account for printing, stamps, etc., \$21.27. Seven members have been added to the roll, and three presiding elders have been advanced to group two. Total amount of insurance \$216,000.00, an increase of \$6,000.00. Our dividend last year was \$1,961.25. We sustained a loss last year of five members: three by death—H. L. Hout, C. D. Bulla and J. R. Corron. The company was very prompt in paying these claims. Wade Johnson was transferred and R. D. Cleckner withdrew.

The company was not clear as to the policy of superannuated preachers, but, after much writing and questions, I succeeded in getting a rider placed on the master policy, which shows that a retired preacher holds a life policy, and as you know the Conference has passed a resolution paying the premium out of the dividend, so that when you retire you have a paid-up policy. The rules of the company were that when you were advanced to the eldership you were required to join group two, and carry \$2,000.00 extra, and if you did not join group two you would forfeit your \$1,000.00 policy, and also that when you went back into the pastorate your \$2,000.00 would be canceled.

To these rules of the company I entered my protest, on the ground that when we entered group two that it was for life, and with the assistance of Bishop Denny, I succeeded in getting the company to agree that all who were members of group two on February 21, 1932, would continue as whole life members; but after February 21, 1932, those who were advanced to the eldership would be required to join group two, and carry \$2,000.00 extra, and if they failed to join group two they would lose their \$1,000.00 policy, and when they were returned to the pastorate their \$2,000.00 policy would be canceled.

## MEMOIRS.

### HARRY LEE HOUT.

Harry Lee Hout, son of David H. and Margaret Ann Hout, was born in Shepherdstown, West Virginia, September 16, 1863, and died at Del Ray, Virginia, October 26, 1931. He was the youngest of nine children, seven of whom attained maturity.

There are three factors conducive to the growth and development of life—heredity, environment and personal endeavor. The first two were rich in their contribution to the life of Brother Hout. He was born of Christian parents and was reared in a Christian atmosphere. Fortunate indeed was he to live in a home so decidedly Christian, made so not only by the type of life within the family group, but also by the influence of Methodist itinerants who ever found rest and inspiration beneath its roof. Through personal endeavor he safely guarded and wisely invested this legacy of heredity and environment, with the result that all could say, "This is a man".

He received his educational background in the public schools of his native town and at Shepherd College from which he was graduated in the class of 1881. After graduation, he taught for several years. Not having fully found his place in life, he studied law while teaching, looking to that profession for the investment of his life. But when, under the ministry of Rev. W. G. Eggleston, he discovered Jesus as Saviour and Lord, he also found his place in life, for with his conversion came the call to the ministry. Not for a moment was he disobedient to the heavenly vision. His call was as decisive as his conversion was clear. To this vocation he devoted himself with rare self-abandon and singleness of purpose. The success of his ministry attests the completeness of his surrender and the loyalty of his devotion.

He was licensed to preach by the quarterly conference of his home church and served one year under his presiding elder, Rev. Rumsey Smithson, D. D. He was admitted on trial at the session of the Baltimore Conference, Harrisonburg, Virginia, March, 1892, Bishop John C. Keener, presiding. He was admitted into full connection and ordained deacon at the Conference of 1894, Fredericksburg, Virginia, Bishop John C. Granbery, presiding. He was ordained elder by Bishop R. K. Hargrove at the Conference meeting in Roanoke, March, 1896. His field of service embraced the following charges: Page, Strasburg, Ronceverte, St. James (Roanoke), Piedmont, Marvin (Washington), Calvary (Washington), Fredericksburg, Covington, Hinton and Del Ray. His life counted for the highest and the best, not only in the churches he served, but also in the secret orders of which he was a



member and in the community at large. The lamp of his life shone near and far. Many glorified the Heavenly Father for its bright and constant shining.

The passion of his spirit was to be a bond-slave of Jesus Christ. "To me, to live is Christ" was not only a favorite text, but the motto of his ministry. To him, Christ was not merely the Jesus of history, but of experience also. His sermons were *Christo-centric*. Their delivery was clear, pointed, convincing, comforting and inspiring.

The spirit of the preacher found its replica in the spirit of the pastor. His visits to his people radiated the Spirit of the Good Shepherd. He knew his sheep by name. Their experiences were his experiences. Few preachers know all the members of their flock as fully as he knew his. This happy union of preacher and pastor gave him his place among us in affection and esteem.

The doctrines of the Church, the polity of the Church, the law of the Church were at his finger tips. He believed in them and stood for them. He possessed rare ability as a financier. The Church was not slow to discover this gift and made large use of it. No cause of the Church was dearer to him than the interests of our superannuated preachers, our widows of deceased brethren and their fatherless children. He poured the wealth of his mind and heart into the cause of "The Forgotten Man". The place occupied by our Conference among the other Conferences of the connection in its contribution to the Superannuate Endowment is a monument to his ability and devotion. Doubtless many a home among us is redolent with praise for the fragrant service of Harry Lee Hout in its interest.

He all but ceased to labor and to live at once. At his request, superannuation was granted him at the session of the Conference meeting at Greene Memorial but a year ago. He located at 133 West Lloyd Street, Alexandria, Virginia, and on Wednesday, October 28, left his earthly house to be at home with God. He walked with God, and is not, for God took him.

Brother Hout is survived by his wife, Mrs. Sarah F. Hout; three daughters, Mrs. W. W. Cranford, Mrs. J. N. Mason, and Mrs. C. W. Skinner; and two sons, H. L. Hout, Jr., and Burton C. Hout, together with three sisters, Mrs. J. H. Wolff, Miss Lottie V. Hout and Miss Ella D. Hout.

His funeral services, held in Del Ray Church, Friday morning, October 30, were in charge of his pastor, Rev. E. V. Register, D. D., assisted by Rev. J. H. Balthis, D. D., Rev. H. H. Sherman, D. D., Rev. John Paul Tyler, D. D., Rev. O. C. Beall and Rev. S. V. Hildebrand. More than thirty of the brethren of the Conference were present, extending their sympathy to the bereft loved ones and expressing their appreciation of the life of their ascended brother. On the afternoon of the same day, his body was laid to rest in the cemetery at Shepherds-town, West Virginia. The services at the grave were in charge of Rev. E. L. Woolf, assisted by Rev. J. W. Rosenberger, Rev. C. W.

Fink and Rev. W. M. Compton. Here where he found life in Christ, prepared for life, and dedicated that life to the Church, we left him sleeping, until that hour when all that are in the grave shall hear the voice of the Son of God, and those that hear shall live.

"Is not e'en death gain to those  
Whose life to God was given?  
Gladly to earth their eyes they close.  
To open them in Heaven.

"Their toils are past, their work is done,  
And they are fully blest.

#### REV. GEORGE W. GAITHER.

We are adding to the long roll of our honored dead this year the name of George William Gaither. In the midst of a worthy career of faithful service for the Church and our Lord he fell on sleep on November 30, 1931.

Brother Gaither came into the work of our Conference as a local elder in the Western Virginia Conference during the conference year of 1902-3 and was appointed as a supply as junior preacher with Rev. S. B. Dolley on Sterling Circuit. At the Conference of 1903, which was held at Fredericksburg, he was received into the Conference by transfer from the Western Virginia Conference and was appointed again to Sterling Circuit as junior to Rev. J. W. Mitchell. March, 1904, he was sent to Flintstone, Maryland, where he remained for three years. From 1907 to 1911 he served again on Sterling Circuit. March, 1911, he went to Beltsville, Maryland, and served three years. 1914-16 his appointment was Clarendon and Ballston. His next charge was Remington, Virginia, where he remained for four years, 1917-1921. He spent next one year at Brucetown and three years, 1922-1925, at Stephens City. At the close of this pastorate he was granted a superannuated relation at Washington March, 1925. As his conference class was 1899, he gave to the work twenty-five years of active and efficient service.

Brother Gaither was born and brought up on a farm near Harrisonburg, Virginia. He attended the public school and took a special course at Bridgewater College. He also attended Randolph-Macon Academy at Front Royal.

We all knew this faithful comrade in the ministry as a strong and striking personality. Through all his life he held himself strictly to the high ideals of the Gospel of Christ. Where his own personal

character or conduct was concerned he knew no compromise with the vanity of the world. Yet none was more lenient or patient with those who fell below his standards. From early childhood his aim was the gospel ministry and he gave himself entirely to that great calling.

The care of souls was his supreme object in life. Through heat and cold, in storm and sunshine, he was ever about this divine enterprise. He never failed to report a large number of additions to the Church on profession of faith. The minutes show a total for the time he was in charge of work received on professions of faith of 589 or an average of nearly 30 a year. The number of conversions under his ministry far exceeded this number. He did not defend the Gospel, but preached it. Nor had he any other method of righting the wrongs of the world about him but the way of our Divine Lord. He believed in conversion and in the witness of the Spirit, and his whole ministry was a call to repentance and faith in the crucified Savior as the one way of salvation.

During his second pastorate on Sterling Circuit he began a camp meeting at the Great Falls of the Potomac. This meeting grew from year to year until it developed into a Bible Conference to which thousands came. Some of the greatest of our preachers spoke from that platform, and multitudes were helped and blessed in their religious life. This work cost the Church nothing and though he gave his splendid financial ability and thousands of dollars passed through his hands he took nothing for his services.

Though his income was very small, there was never a time during his active ministry when he was not helping some young preacher to secure a college training. His life work was well done.

On September 27, 1899, he took from one of our finest Methodist homes in Fairfax County Miss Alpha C. Lanham for his wife. Their happy married life continued for thirty-two years, until the time of his death.

Brother Gaither died in his home at Clarendon, Virginia, November 30, 1931. He was buried at Andrew Chapel in Fairfax County, Virginia. The funeral services were conducted by his pastor, Rev. J. H. Pearson, assisted by Revs. J. H. Balthis, S. V. Hildebrand, F. A. Tyler and the writer of this memoir. The church was crowded that November morning with many of those who had been blessed by his ministry. A large number of his comrades in the ministry were there also to pay respects to the memory of one whom all could call a friend.

**JOHN RUSSELL CORRON.**

John Russell Corron, son of Charles Joseph and Mary Ella Corron, was born near White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., November 8, 1899, and died February 20, 1932, at Wardensville, W. Va.

He received his education in the public schools of Greenbrier County, W. Va.

He was converted in September, 1922, and soon afterward felt the call to preach, to which he responded, and was licensed to preach March 9, 1923, by the Lewisburg District Conference at Lewisburg, W. Va. He served two years as a supply and was admitted on trial into the traveling connection in 1925 at the session of the Baltimore Annual Conference held in Mount Vernon Place Church, Washington, D. C., in March of that year. He was that year reappointed to Morgan Charge, in the Moorefield District, which charge he continued to serve until the end of a four-year pastorate.

His appointments in their order are as follows: 1923-24, Paint Bank; 1924-28, Morgan; 1928-29, Richlands; 1929 to the time of his death, Wardensville.

Brother Corron was ordained deacon by Bishop Collins Denny at Roanoke, Va., on October 2, 1927, and was ordained elder by Bishop Denny on September 29, 1929, at Cumberland, Md.

He was married to Miss Lola Buckland, of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., on January 4, 1923. To this union three children were born, Mildred Evelyn, Lola Helen and Jessie Grace, all of whom, with their mother, survive.

It was not the writer's privilege to be intimately acquainted with Brother Corron, but it is said by one who had the opportunity of knowing him better, "He was a preacher of righteousness. He always delighted his devout hearers in his sermons and prayers by exact quotations from the Holy Scriptures."

Funeral services were conducted by his presiding elder, Rev. C. M. Hesser, at Wardensville, W. Va., on Saturday afternoon, February 20, and on Sunday his body was taken to his home near White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., and there laid to rest to await the resurrection of the just.

His ministry was short, less than ten years, but to God's will and wisdom in closing his earthly ministry and calling him from us we bow in unquestioning submission.

"Sometime, when all life's lessons have been learned

And sun and stars forevermore have set,

The things which our weak judgments here have spurned,

The things o'er which we grieved with lashes wet,  
Shall flash before us out of life's dark night,

As stars shine most in deeper tints of blue,

And we shall know how all God's plans were right

And how what seemed reproof was love most true.

**CHARLES DEHAVEN BULLA, D. D.**

Charles Dehaven Bulla was born near Albany, Missouri, January 4, 1862, and died in Nashville, Tennessee, February 2, 1932, having just rounded out the psalmist's allotment of three score years and ten. He was the son of Andrew Jackson Bulla and Elizabeth Witten Bulla, who were married in Tazewell County, Virginia, January 5, 1843, and on September 18, 1845, started by wagon to Missouri, arriving November 12. His parents were of that sturdy, courageous stock that braved the hardships of pioneer life and laid the political and religious foundations of the great west. Their home was a Christian home where early in life Dr. Bulla had instilled into his young heart those generous, unselfish ideals which characterized him as a Methodist preacher. His college work was done at the University of Missouri, but his education did not cease with college days. He was a student all his life and continually drew from a well-stored mind and a rich Christian experience "things new and old" with which he fed the multitude to whom he ministered through the spoken word and the printed page. He had a keen appreciation of the finer things in art, literature and history and out of these treasuries greatly enriched and adorned his messages and ministry.

In 1887 he came to Washington, D. C., where he was employed for eight years in the War Department of the United States Government. During this time he was an active member of Mount Vernon Place Church and Sunday school. In 1895 he was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference and two years later into full connection. He served as pastor of the following churches:

Grace, Roanoke—1895-98.

St. Paul's, Baltimore—1898-1902.

Winchester, Virginia—1902-06.

Alexandria, Virginia—1906-10.

These churches had great prosperity under his leadership. He was popular with young and old, sympathetic and comforting in his ministry to the bereaved and distressed; wise and tactful in handling delicate problems; progressive and constructive in building for the future; inspiring and edifying in his preaching. He led his congregations to "undertake great things for God". He was abundant in labors and his work abides.



In 1910 he was elected editor of the **Baltimore Southern Methodist** and filled this important position acceptably for a short time. His notable work in the erection of modern Sunday school buildings at Winchester and Alexandria, and his inspiring leadership of young people attracted the attention of the General Sunday School Board at Nashville and he was called there to be the Superintendent of the Wesley Adult Bible Class Movement. Dr. E. B. Chappell said of this work, "It prepared the way for more complete organization which came later. Dr. Bulla did this preparatory work most effectively. He helped to develop an understanding of the unity of the educational task in the local congregation, in the Conference and throughout the Church, and to get over to our people the idea that no program of religious education can be effective that is not linked up with definite and purposeful service." He also assisted in editing the **Adult Student** and did much to make it a monthly lesson publication with the largest circulation in America.

In 1914 he was elected Corresponding Secretary of the General Sunday School Board and was responsible for the management of the General affairs of the board in addition to the **Wesley Bible Class Movement**. He continued in this position until 1921 when he was transferred to the Pacific Coast which had long held its lure for him. He was presiding elder of the San Francisco District from 1921 to 1924 and the Los Angeles District, 1924 to 1927, when he was recalled to Nashville to be Associate Editor of the Sunday School Board. In 1930, when the boards were combined and reorganized, he was continued as Associate Editor of the Board of Christian Education where he labored as editor of **The Adult Student**, **The Home Quarterly** and **The Workers Council** until the end came, February 2, 1932, when he "ceased at once to work and live".

During his residence in Berkeley, California, his house was burned with almost entire loss of household furniture, sermons, and manuscripts, his library in which were many rare volumes, including souvenirs, curios and other valuables. He wrote one of his Nashville friends that "the fire had destroyed everything he had except his optimism and his faith". The remark was characteristic of the man.

The Church entrusted many other important matters to Dr. Bulla. He represented the Pacific Conference in the General Conference of 1922 at Hot Springs, Arkansas, where he received a large vote for Bishop. He served as a member of the Commission on Interdenominational Relations; was editor of the **Daily Advocate** during five sessions of the General Conference; a member of the International Sunday School Lesson Committee and of the Executive Committee of the Federal Council of Churches. He did important work with the Boy Scouts of America, the Anti-Saloon League, the Sunday School Council of Evangelical Denominations, the International Council of Religious Education and was influential in having the equestrian statue of Francis

Asbury placed in a public square in Washington, D. C. Randolph-Macon College bestowed upon him in 1912 the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity and he is listed in "Who's Who in America", but none of these honors "turned his head". He remained the same warm-hearted, brotherly comrade. The heart of his life was that love that "is not puffed up and vaunteth not itself".

During the thirty-seven years of his active ministry, except the six years on the Pacific Coast, Dr. Bulla was a member of the Baltimore Conference which he loved with an ardent devotion. He would gladly have spent his entire ministerial life laboring within her borders but his beloved Church needed him elsewhere and he ever obeyed her call.

Dr. Bulla was twice married, the first wife being Florence Scarborough of Albany, Missouri. Of this union there were two children who survive him—Paul S. Bulla of Washington, D. C., and Ruth (Mrs. C. W. Botts), of Nashville, Tennessee. His second wife was Carrie Taxis Brown who survives him with four children, Mrs. E. E. Bennett of Oakland, California, Mrs. Homer B. Terry, Charles D. Bulla, Jr., and Sidney Bulla of Nashville, Tennessee.

The paragraph on Dr. Bulla's family would not be complete without a brief mention of his mother who made her home with him a large part of her later life. She lived to be 101 years old and was a strong, robust character, physically and spiritually. When far past her three score years and ten, she was accustomed to make a visit annually to other children in the far west, traveling thousands of miles alone. She talked freely to strangers and never failed to tell them about "Charlie", her preacher son. Their mutual devotion was tender and beautiful. No mother was ever more tender to or thoughtful of her babe than he was with his mother as she journeyed through the ninth and tenth decades of her long life. She enjoyed a happy Christian experience and shouted her praises even in the city churches where "Charlie" was pastor.

Dr. Bulla's sickness and death greatly shocked and surprised his many friends. He had seemed to be in good health. He was greeting as usual his friends and visitors at the Publishing House. Friday, January 1, he was at his desk, busy at his work. The next day he went under observation at the hospital. An operation on January 9 revealed the fatal disease and the doom of an early end which came February 2.

Funeral services were held in McKendree Church, Nashville, Tenn., conducted by Bishop H. M. DuBose on Wednesday, February 3, and concluded the next day in Baltimore, Maryland. Many tributes were paid to his noble character and Christ-like spirit. *Zion's Herald* said, "He was a man of genuine ability, markedly virile in thought and action. His, too, was the gift of an unusually winsome personality. To know him was to be drawn to him by the charm of his friendliness and the strength and beauty of his spirit."

Another said, "Finer than the service rendered was the gracious and

Christ-like personality which had come to him as the result of years of fellowship with the Master."

The record of Dr. Bulla's abundant life and fruitful labors cannot be given in the compass of a brief memoir. Every such life partakes of the heroic and deserves great praise. He rendered a great service in many fields. He made permanent contributions to the churches he served and especially to the Sunday school work of our Methodism. He made friends and held them with hooks of steel. His personal touch was almost magical. His heart warmed and responded to human need everywhere. His sharp wit and keen humor left no wounds to be healed. He was brave, gentle, faithful and true. We miss him since he has slipped away into the bright morning land of peace and rest.

"I cannot say and I will not say  
That he is dead, he's just away.  
With a cheery smile and a wave of the hand  
He has wandered into the morningland  
And has left us thinking how very fair  
It needs must be since he lingers there."

#### REV. NORMAN N. HALL.

Norman N. Hall was born in Linden, Va., on November 16, 1859, the son of Thomas Samuel Hall and Angelina Boyle Hall. Linden at that time was a center of prominence and among the old families then residing there the Halls occupied a leading position. The father of N. N. Hall enlisted in 1861 in the Confederate Army and subsequently lost his life, a victim of pneumonia due to the exposure and hardship of the camp. His mother then moved to Aldie in Loudoun County, Virginia, where she made her home with her brother, Dr. Thomas Boyle. Ten years later, when he died, Mrs. Hall moved with her family to Northumberland County in the same state.

At Virginia Polytechnic Institute, Norman Hall secured his education and after his graduation in June, 1880, came back to Linden, where he taught school for three years. It was as a young school teacher in 1881, under the ministry of Rev. Dr. Poulton, that he was converted and united with the old Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1885, under Dr. Samuel Rodgers, Norman Hall was licensed to preach, and the next year, on July 22, 1886, he was happily united in marriage to his cousin, Sally D. Hall. The union was in every way a choice one, and his wife, through the inspiration of her presence and the guidance of her practical outlook on life, ever after had a great part in making for his success both as a preacher and a man.

At the spring conference of 1887 he was admitted into the Baltimore Conference. His first appointment was Morrisville, where he served three years; thence he was sent to Centerville (now Forest Grove) three years; then to West River (Maryland) for four years; Gainesboro (Virginia), three; Frederick Circuit, four; Warren Circuit, four. At the end of his ministry upon the appointment last named, he found himself forced to superannuate on account of his health. He continued to make his residence, however, in Front Royal, Virginia, and for the next twenty-six years lived in this beautiful little city, loving and beloved by his fellow men. Eventually he obtained a position as the deputy clerk of Warren County and thereafter, year in and year out, he was to be found at his desk in the court house, conducting the business of his office and conversing cheerily with all who came in. Through his years of service in this position, and through his continued ministrations as a superannuated preacher, and by virtue of his kindness and friendliness to all, he obtained a great hold on Warren County. Everybody knew "Brother Hall", as he was universally called. Young couples sought him to marry them, and older people often expressed the wish that Brother Hall should have charge of their funeral services when the end should come. He enjoyed the complete trust of people in every walk of life. He was always to be found in his place in church and every pastor who ever served at Front Royal had cause to bless N. N. Hall for his labor of gospel love, and the encouragement and help he gave in carrying forward the Kingdom.

The crowning work of his life was to serve as teacher of the great men's class, built up some years ago in the Front Royal Church. This unique organization proved of vast value in the community, and was a great help to the local church. Brother Hall as teacher was admired as well as loved, and the exposition of the lesson as delivered by him Sunday after Sunday was helpful in the extreme. His own personal popularity drew many, and his teaching was made all the stronger by the fact that the listeners knew the quality and character of the man who was delivering the message.

Brother Hall was brought up according to the regimen of the Methodists of an older day, and while his education had not been as broad as that of others, yet there was a profundity to his thought and a depth to his reading that were astonishing. To assist him in his teaching, he clung to and mastered the standard commentaries on the use of the Bible. The older volumes of Clark and Benson were especially prized by him, and at his office in the court house he was often to be seen pulling down a copy of these monumental works, and making notes for the exposition of the lesson for the following Sunday. He understood and loved the polity of Methodism, and had a complete understanding of its processes. The writer owes him a great debt for more than once giving him helpful advice, or for making some astute observation upon the genius or method of our beloved Church.



As the years sped by the slight figure of Brother Hall could be seen day after day passing through the streets of Front Royal, going regularly to his work or returning just as regularly to his home—a character known and read of all. Then on June 2, 1932, he was taken ill and on the 14th of that month passed away at his own residence on Virginia Avenue, in the town where he had lived and served so long.

He was 72 years and seven months old at the time of his death and passed away full of faith in both man and God.

Surviving him, beside his wife, are the following children: Samuel Norwood Hall of Kentucky; Rosa D. Roszell of Delaware; James D. Hall of Atlantic City; Snowden Hall of Staunton; and Neville G. Hall of Alexandria. These with a host of friends were left to mourn the passing of this gentle Christian character.

He was laid to rest after services in the church in Front Royal before the pulpit where he had so often preached, and in the presence of the men to whom he had so frequently expounded the Word of God. The church was filled with a large audience to do him honor, and the solemn words of the funeral office were read by his pastor, Rev. R. L. Fultz, D. D. Afterward the funeral procession wound slowly up and into the lovely Prospect Hill Cemetery of Front Royal. There in the recesses of the earth, Norman N. Hall was left to rest in the keeping of God, while all around the great silent mountains stand watching and waiting like him for the appearance of that One at whose second coming the earth and the sea shall give up their dead and the corruptible bodies of those who sleep in Him shall be changed and made like unto His own glorious body. And while we, his frail brethren, know only in part, we have faith to believe that when Christ shall appear this gentle, sweet-spirited minister, our brother, shall stand to receive everlasting life at the hands of the Master. Even so, Lord, may it be.

### JAMES WALKER.

In the long roll of faithful and consecrated laymen, who have given their lives to make the blessed history of the Baltimore Conference, we may inscribe the name of James Walker. At the last session of the Baltimore District Conference, he was elected a lay representative to this Annual Conference. Since then, he has passed away from us through the gateway of death to the great beyond. This life is the record of one of the most faithful of the men who have stood the storm and stress of our work in Maryland, and is an example of the possibilities that are in a loyal and devoted service to the Church of Christ.



He was born and brought up on a farm in Westmoreland County, Virginia. This is a section that has produced some of the most distinguished leaders in American history. Washington and Lee both came from this section. Brother Walker belonged to an old family of note and ability, and he carried through life the high ideals and noble culture of his honored family. When he entered business in Baltimore, he, with his bride, who was Miss Irma Hall, joined Calvary Church. Here he served on the official board for years until this congregation was forced to move to another church home. He, with the rest of this congregation, united with Trinity Church. Here again he continued to serve as a steward. Finally this church was forced to move by reason of the changing population of this part of the city. In this change, he, with a group of twenty-one, organized the present Wilson Memorial Church. It was a great spiritual adventure. At first, they erected a small portable chapel and started a Sunday school with but two children. He was the superintendent of the Sunday school and the chairman of the board of stewards. This congregation grew, and they were finally able to build the basement of the church over which they put a temporary roof. In this incomplete structure, Brother Walker continued as superintendent of the Sunday school and chairman of the official board.

At last, the present beautiful marble edifice was completed and this man saw the full fruition of his splendid life work. His dream, the dream of a life, had come true.

Brother Walker was a man of the outdoor world. He loved the great open spaces. The sea lured him and the fields and woods filled his soul with their mystic messages. He knew the meaning of Wordsworth:

"One impulse from the vernal wood,  
May teach us more of man;  
Of moral evil and of good  
Than all the sages can."

He had a genius for friendship. He loved folks and sought the company of those who held to his high ideals of life. We miss his hale and hearty spirit at the Conference. Above all, he loved his Church and his Lord. This may be said by the test of years and years of constant and sustained effort for the cause of Christ. As long as the present Wilson Memorial Church stands his name will be linked with its splendid ministry in that great city.

His remains are interred in the old Walker family burial ground, Poplar Plains, in Westmoreland County, Virginia.
