FIRST DAY.

Evening Session.

Rosenberger 51, W. H. Barger 41, George H. Lamar 40, Mrs. T. J. Copeland 30, H. C. Mullikin 17. The Bishop announced that J. H. Rosenberger, W. H. Barger and George H. Lamar were elected alternate lay delegates to the General Conference.

THE BISHOP ordered the second ballot for alternate clerical and lay delegates to the General Conference be cast. The vote was taken and the tellers retired to count the ballot.

ON MOTION of S. V. Hildebrand it was ordered that the Memorial Session of the Conference be held at 3.00 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

THE ORDER OF THE DAY having arrived Dr. W. F. Quillan, Secretary of the General Board of Christian Education, was introduced and addressed the Conference relative to the work of the Board.

THE NAME of A. A. P. Neel was called, his character passed and at his request his name was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for a superannuate relation.

THE NAME of J. J. Ringer was called, his character passed and his name was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for a supernumerary relation.

SEVERAL MEMORIALS to the General Conference were presented and referred without reading to the Committee on Memorials.

CONFERENCE united in singing and adjourned with the benediction by Bishop McMurry to meet tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

FOURTH DAY.

G. G. Martin moved to amend the report by asking for one instead of two offerings each year, but the amendment did not prevail.

J. H. Wells and H. M. Wilson, Supt. of the Home, spoke on the report, and upon motion, it was adopted.

THE REPORT of the Treasurer for the Home for the Aged was presented and read.

W. H. BEST addressed the Conference on behalf of the Baltimore Conference Benevolent Society, urging that all the preachers join and that as many laymen as possible become contributing members.

DR. F. J. PRETTYMAN addressed the Conference in behalf of the work of the Board of Finance and of Group Insurance and moved that the Committee on Group Insurance be discharged and the whole matter of insurance be placed in the hands of the Board of Finance, and the motion prevailed.

A RESOLUTION was presented by W. W. Millan and others instructing the Committee on Publication of the Minutes to edit the reports and give briefly the substance of them, but it did not prevail.

QUESTION FORTY-THREE of the General Minutes was called, viz., **Who is elected Conference Lay Leader?**

M. L. Walton, Jr., of Woodstock, Va., upon nomination of the Board of Lay Activities was elected Conference Lay Leader.

DR. F. M. RICHARDSON, Managing Editor of the Baltimore Southern Methodist, urged the Conference to support whole-heartedly the effort to maintain the paper and requested their loyal support in the work.

QUESTION ELEVEN of the General Minutes was called, viz., **Who are located this year?**

The name of J. J. Ringer was called and he was granted a location at his request.

THE COMMITTEE on the Sesqui-Centennial presented their report, which was read and adopted.

THE FOLLOWING resolution, signed by John Paul Tyler, Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., Charles R. Curtis, D. L. Snyder, and Robert C. Meeks, was presented and, upon motion, adopted:

"WHEREAS, The Sesqui-Centennial Commissioners of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and Methodist Protestant Church have invited the College of Bishops of our own Church as well as the Board of Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church and the presidents of the Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, to hold their regular fall meeting in Baltimore at or about the time of the Sesqui-Centennial celebration in 1934, and

"WHEREAS, The Baltimore City Ministerial Association of our own Church has added its voice to this invitation and expressed its hope that our Bishops may see fit to hold their meeting in Baltimore as set forth above; now therefore be it

Resolved, by the Baltimore Annual Conference in session at Roanoke, Virginia, that we cordially add our voice to that of our ministers in Baltimore and hereby express our hope that our Bishops may see fit to respond to this invitation; and we furthermore feel that the Baltimore Conference itself will be honored if during the 150th Anniversary of its own organization our Bishops may thus come within our territory to transact their regular business and to engage in fraternal and social relationship with our ministry and membership, together with those of the other Churches whose people will likewise celebrate the Sesqui-Centennial."

H. M. Canter moved that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet at 3.30 o'clock this afternoon.

Conference united in singing and adjourned with the benediction by Bishop McMurry to meet this afternoon.

FOURTH DAY.

Afternoon Session.

Saturday, October 7th, 1933.

Conference met at the appointed hour, Bishop McMurry in the chair.

G. H. Lamar led in prayer.

THE JOURNAL of the morning session was read and approved.

THE REPORT of the Agent of Group Insurance was presented and read.

THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION regarding changes in charter of the Francis Asbury School was presented by George N. Conrad on behalf of the Trustees, read and, upon motion, adopted:

"Resolved, That the Trustees of the Francis Asbury School, Inc., be requested and directed to take such action as may be appropriate to secure amendment of the Charter of Incorporation in the following particulars:

1st. That Article III relating to the purposes of the corporation be struck out and that in its stead the purposes of said corporation be stated as follows:

PURPOSES.

To provide by the establishment and maintenance of schools and colleges or otherwise for the education and training of white youths, primarily those residing in the mountainous or remote rural sections within the bounds of the Baltimore Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South; to aid and assist such youths by scholarships or financial assistance, when they are without means in whole or in part, in securing an education in secondary schools, and to give such aid and assistance in college education to those who desire to prepare for the ministry or missionary work of the M. E. Church, South; to receive by bequest, devise or gift any funds or property which may be willed or given to the corporation for any of the purposes herein set forth; to

contract and be contracted with; to purchase, hold and convey real estate; to have and exercise all the powers necessary for the purposes above enumerated and conferred upon like corporations by the laws of the State of Virginia.

2nd. That Article VI of said charter be so amended as to provide that the number of Trustees shall be eleven, to be elected by the Baltimore Annual Conference of the M. E. Church, South, upon nomination as follows: two to be nominated by the Woman's Missionary Society of said Conference, two to be nominated by the Board of Missions, and seven to be nominated by the Board of Christian Education of said Conference. Upon the death, resignation or removal of any Trustee his or her successor for the unexpired term of such Trustee shall be nominated by the Society or Board upon whose nomination the deceased, removed or resigned Trustee was originally elected.

3rd. That Article VII of the charter be amended so as to add the words "or educational" after the word "school" in said paragraph.

QUESTION EIGHT of the General Minutes was called, viz., **Who are re-admitted?**

Answer, None.

QUESTION TEN of the General Minutes was called, viz., **Who are received from other churches as traveling preachers?**

Answer, None.

QUESTION TWELVE of the General Minutes was called, viz., **Who have withdrawn or been expelled?**

Answer, None.

QUESTION THIRTEEN of the General Minutes was called, viz., **Who are transferred to other Conferences?**

William Thomas, an elder, to the Belgian Conference. This transfer was made several years ago but not being officially reported his name was not stricken from the roll.

THE COMMITTEE on Memorials to the General Conference presented its report recommending non-concurrence in the following memorials which recommendation was approved by the Conference:

The Election of Bishops for a term of four years subject to re-election.

Limitation of presiding elders' term of service.

Electing Sunday School Superintendents for four years.

Concerning composition of Building Committees.

Enrolling baptized children as members of the Church.

The recommendation of non-concurrence by the Committee in the following memorial was not approved: Upon motion the memorial was adopted:

Resolved, to amend paragraph 122 in line eleven, to read "six years" instead of "four years" and to strike from this

paragraph the last statement which reads "provided further that when a majority of the presiding elders shall concur by ballot the Bishop may appoint a preacher to a pastoral charge for more than four consecutive years."

THE FOLLOWING memorial on lay representation in the Annual Conference presented by the Committee in lieu of several memorials on the same subject was so amended upon motion as to make the basis of representation in the Annual Conference one for every two thousand church members. This memorial as amended was adopted:

"WHEREAS, The present large number of lay representatives elected to each Annual Conference has within recent years added greatly to the expense of the church in entertaining these Conferences, and

"WHEREAS, many lay members do not find opportunity to participate in the affairs of the Conference to any great extent, since this is so much concerned with ministerial reports and procedures, and

"WHEREAS, the rights of the laity in passing on constitutional changes that may be proposed in future for the general church are well protected by having equal lay and clerical and lay representation in the General Conference, which proposes such changes.

"Now, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the present lay representation in the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, is considered excessive by the Baltimore Conference and should be reduced to approximately the ratio that prevailed prior to 1926; and in furtherance of this our judgment we, the membership of the said Baltimore Annual Conference, do memorialize the General Conference to reduce the present lay representation by changing section II, question 1 of paragraph 44 of the present discipline so that it will read:

"All the traveling preachers in full connection in it and one lay representative for every two thousand church members or majority fraction thereof, one of whom may be a local preacher, in each presiding elder's district; provided, however, that no district shall have less than four lay representatives to the Annual Conference; and provided, further, that the number of church members in each district shall be determined by the statistics of the district reported to the preceding Annual Conference."

INTRODUCTION: Dr. W. B. Gates, President Blackstone College for Girls, was introduced to the Conference and made a brief address regarding the work of that institution.

UPON MOTION of N. B. Harmon, Jr., Monday morning was fixed as the time for the final session of the Conference.

Conference adjourned with prayer by Dr. R. E. Blackwell, to meet in Memorial Session Sunday afternoon at three o'clock.

FIFTH DAY.

Afternoon Session,

Sunday, October 8th, 1933.

CONFERENCE was called to order at three o'clock.

Bishop McMurry in the chair.

CONFERENCE united in singing Hymn No. 604.

A SPECIAL musical selection "I think of a city that eye hath not seen" was rendered by the choir.

QUESTION FOURTEEN of the General Minutes was called, viz.,

The memoir of W. F. Lowance was read by S. K. Cockrell.

The memoir of G. Dorsey White was read by J. C. Copenhaver.

The memoir of J. C. Thrasher was read by W. H. Best.

The memoir of J. W. Mitchell was read by J. J. Rives.

The memoir of C. B. Sutton was read by C. H. Cannon.

T. M. SWANN made a most appropriate address, taking for his theme "The Christian Pilgrim."

UPON MOTION the report of the Committee on Memoirs was adopted by a rising vote. Conference united in singing Hymn No. 617,

"On Jordan's stormy banks I stand
And cast a wistful eye,
To Canaan's fair and happy land,
Where my possessions lie."

and adjourned with the benediction by Bishop McMurry to meet tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

SIXTH DAY.

Morning Session.

Monday, October 9th, 1933.

Conference met pursuant to adjournment, Bishop McMurry in the chair.

Hymn No. 207,

Is Jesus Christ her Lord."

After reciting the Apostles' Creed, Bishop McMurry led in prayer. THE JOURNAL of Saturday afternoon's session was read and approved.

THE JOURNAL of the Memorial Session Sunday afternoon was read and approved.

QUESTION EIGHTEEN of the General Minutes was called, viz., What traveling preachers and what local preachers have been ordained deacons?

QUESTION TWENTY of the General Minutes was called, viz., What traveling preachers and what local preachers have been ordained elders?

In reply to the above questions the Bishop presented the following certificate:

"This is to certify that I, William F. McMurry, one of the Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, did on October 8th, 1933, at the Greene Memorial Church in Roanoke, Virginia, after the sermon, ordain to the office of deacon in the Church of God, Frank Alexander Settle, Rice Moorman Parker, traveling preachers, and Julian Eugene White, local preacher.

"At the same time and place, assisted by the elders present, I ordained to the office of elder in the Church of God, Arthur Leroy Hunter, Raymond Eugene Musser, Lewis Otmer Rose, traveling preachers, and Malcolm Gordon Lilly, local preacher."

"(Signed) William F. McMurry.

"Done at Roanoke, Virginia, this the 8th day of October, 1933."

STATISTICAL QUESTIONS twenty-four, twenty-five, twenty-six, twenty-seven, twenty-eight, twenty-nine, thirty, thirty-one, thirty-two, thirty-three, thirty-four, thirty-five, thirty-six, thirty-seven, thirty-eight, thirty-nine, forty, forty-one and forty-two of the General Minutes were severally called and answered. QUESTION NINE of the General Minutes was called, viz., Who are received by transfer from other conferences?

The Bishop announced the transfer of George D. Naylor, an elder, from the Cuba Conference, and of John Haywood Blakemore, a probationer in the Class of the First Year, from the North Mississippi Conference.

REPORT of the Treasurer of the Board of Finance was read and placed on record.

THE RECOMMENDATIONS for the distribution of the funds in the hands of the Board of Finance was, upon motion, approved.

REPORT No. 2 of the Board of Missions carrying the appropriations to various charges was presented, read and, upon motion, adopted.

F. J. PRETTYMAN made an announcement concerning the celebration of American Methodism and moved that the Bishop in charge of the next session of the Baltimore Conference be requested to set the date of its meeting for Friday, October 5th, 1934.

A COLLECTION for the sexton amounting to \$51.00 was taken. THE FOLLOWING resolution, signed by E. H. Blackard, Robert C. Meeks, F. J. Prettyman, H. H. Sherman, and Edgar C. Beery, was presented and adopted unanimously by a rising vote:

"Resolved, That we the members of the Baltimore Conference express our deep appreciation of the many courtesies and of the hospitality shown the Conference by the people of Roanoke. We desire to express especially our appreciation to those who have entertained us in their homes, Rev. C. K. Ray, pastor of this church and the other pastors of this city, who have cared for our wants and needs.

"We desire to express our gratitude to the people of Roanoke, who have extended so many courtesies. We express appreciation to the local papers for the accurate reports of the proceedings of the Conference, and to all those institutions and individuals who have made our stay such a happy one.

"We also wish to express our appreciation to our presiding Bishop, W. F. McMurry, for the efficient way in which he has conducted the business of the Conference, and for the courteous treatment which he has shown to all the members of the Conference."

THE FOLLOWING resolution signed by F. M. Richardson, C. R. Curtis and H. M. Canter was adopted:

"Resolved, That our thanks be extended to the Wright Furniture Company, the Nash Furniture Company, the Cut Rate Furniture Company, the Cawley Furniture Company, the N. W. Pugh Company, the Easter Supply Company, and the F. B. Thomas Company for the loan of tables and chairs."

NOMINATIONS: E. L. Woolf was nominated and elected in place of H. C. Marsh on the Board of Missions.

C. M. Hesser was nominated and elected in place of J. C. Copenhaver on the Board of Church Extension.

THE MINUTES of the morning session were read and approved.

QUESTION FORTY-FIVE of the General Minutes was called, viz., Where are the preachers stationed this year?

Hymn No. 415, "Faith of our Fathers", was sung.

THE BISHOP made a brief address and read the appointments (See Appointments) and the Conference adjourned *sine die* with the singing of the doxology and the benediction by Bishop McMurry.

The Conference Board paid superannuates at the rate of ten dollars and widows at the rate of six dollars per service year, supplemented in necessitous cases by an appropriation from emergency fund.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON SPIRITUAL LIFE.

We, the Conference Commission on Spiritual Life, in presenting the matters committed to us, approach it with the realization that we are considering the interests of greatest importance that can concern the church.

Our life is a spiritual life, and for this all of our efforts are exerted, and our interests center. All of our business is that which relates to the saving of lost souls and the edification and sanctification of believers, that his people may be so clothed upon with the Spirit of our God, that men in sin may be deeply moved with a sense of God's infinite holiness and power, and of their own helplessness and hopelessness because of their iniquity. The world without question has lost the knowledge of God and is not touched with any feeling of his divine being or is conscious of his love.

In high places and low, in politics, commercial life, social life, in places and by agencies of learning, men mock at the deepest realities of life and seek by all the wisdom and contrivances of men to satisfy the longings of man's inner being. They are without hope and without God in the world, and the Church, the Bride of the Lamb, appointed of God, and anointed of God to save a lost world, stands amazed, shocked, dumb, and helpless in the midst of a perverse and adulterous generation.

Have we trifled with the richest heritage of our Father in heaven? Have we emphasized matters of secondary importance to the neglect of that which is above all things in importance? Have we trusted so much in our power and wisdom and in the organizations we have placed in operation, that the Spirit has gone from us, and sin walks brazenly among us unrebuked?

We believe that the salvation of every sinner and our own salvation is not by might or wisdom or power of men, but by the Spirit of the Lord. Do we not feel the Spirit crying within us, Lord, save or we perish?

While we believe that Jesus purchased redemption for every soul, he has not left his followers alone and helpless in the world, but said, "Go preach," "I am with you," "You shall receive power." Brethren, by his own words, all things belong to us.

With these thoughts before us we would recommend as follows:

1. That we as has before been recommended, as preachers and laymen, give ourselves first to an earnest seeking of the deepening of our own spiritual lives by the waiting upon every means of grace afforded us, by giving ourselves to fasting and prayer and the reading of God's word in secret, in our homes, and in public gatherings as opportunity makes possible. Let us so wait before our Lord until he shall speak to our hungering hearts his assuring words of peace.

2. That we as preachers keep before us as of first importance, the calling, to preach Jesus Christ crucified to redeem a lost world from sin, not preaching on topics to enlighten men intellectually or to entertain, but let us preach to awaken the consciences of men to their desperate condition of sin, giving them to know that they have a soul to save from the guilt and power of sin, that they have a hell to shun and a heaven to win. Let the spirit of evangelism and such efforts that have in the past been used of God in reaching men and that have given Methodism her distinctive place in the world as a winner of souls be emphasized in our personal contacts with men, in our public services and in special seasons of revival, let us call sinners back to God and church members to a complete consecration of life to him.

3. That we use our strongest efforts to place our religious periodicals and books in all of our homes, to establish family altars, to secure the observance on the part of our people of the Holy Sabbath, knowing as we do that spiritual life will fail if these are neglected.

4. That we suggest that in all of our District Conferences, special emphasis be placed upon religious services and if practical that a certain season be set apart for the discussion of matters pertaining to the spiritual life.

5. That anticipating the next meeting of our Annual Conference to be held in Baltimore, it would be in keeping with our purpose to observe in some fitting way the Sesqui-Centennial of Methodism in America, to use the occasion to promote the chiefest ends of the fathers of Methodism, that is the deepening of the spiritual life by making it an occasion of deep searching of hearts and out of which may come to us all an outpouring of the Holy Spirit, and to this end we would suggest that the committee having charge of the planning of the program of the Conference, and by consultation with the Bishop in charge, secure some one most fitted for such service to preach or speak each week night of the Conference and at the morning devotions of our daily sessions.

6. That we as ministers bring, by the most effective way possible, by commenting upon the interests set forth in these resolutions or reading them before our congregations. And may this year be a year when deep conviction of sin may come to those who are unsaved and the church may put on her strength, and God's presence may be felt in every part of his Zion.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The work of the Board of Christian Education is making progress throughout the Conference. In spite of reduction in finances, the report of the Executive Secretary shows decided gains along all lines.

While our schools and colleges are in need of financial help, there is a note of optimism that they will be able to carry on with our cooperation.

We received from the Board of Trustees of the Randolph-Macon System the following nominations to fill vacancies on the Board: Mr. E. Bunker Jones to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Frank H. Chalmers, and Mr. E. Barrett Prettyman to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Mr. Charles M. Armstrong. The Board recommends that these nominations be approved. The Board makes the following recommendations for 1933-34:

1. That the presiding elders and pastors continue their efforts to carry out the Church's program of Christian Education in the several districts and charges.

2. That the Local Church Boards be set up in every charge, make a thorough study of the local needs, and plan to meet those needs.

3. That the Training Work—Standard and Cokesbury—be continued and extended into every possible field.

4. That the fourth Sunday Missionary Day be observed in every church with a program and offering, and that ten per cent. of the total amount raised, or one fourth Sunday offering a year, in those schools not now contributing to Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise, be so directed.

5. That Sunday School Day, Church College Day, and Young People's Day be observed in all Churches with an offering for the work of the Board as ordered in the Discipline.

6. That the preachers and lay workers support even more zealously the Conference Training School at Front Royal to be held as usual with a program especially adapted to the needs of preachers.

7. That a Young People's Assembly, Intermediate Assembly, and an Adult Assembly be held next year; this latter, if possible, in connection with the Conference Training School.

8. That the General Board be requested to appropriate the following amounts for student work: Blacksburg, \$100; Lexington, \$100; Harrisonburg, \$500; Hyattsville, \$50.

9. That the Staff consist of an Executive Secretary, an Extension Secretary, and an Office Secretary.

10. That the following budget be granted by the Conference:

11. The following schedule of district institutes:

12. That our pastors and congregations cooperate in the observance of the Sesqui-Centennial Celebration of American Methodism through training schools, sermons, and in such other ways as may seem wise and appropriate.

13. That H. H. Sherman be appointed Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education; that W. S. Thomas be appointed Chaplain to Staunton Military Academy, and that C. L. Robson be appointed student to Emory University.

14. At the request of a friend, the board recommends that a H. P. Hamill Fund for Ministerial Supply and Training be established. (This fund has been started with a contribution of \$100.)

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FINANCE.

The depression has continued on throughout the year and along with all other causes the work of the Board of Finance has suffered proportionately. However, it is with real pleasure that we report to you that the General Superannuate Fund has been added to during the past year to the amount of \$23,155, making the total in both General and Conference Funds to be \$6,249,872.41. with \$53,439.33 in the Reserve Fund, from which during the fifteen years of the existence of the Board, it has paid to the claimants' support \$2,423,334.82. The amount the General Board distributes this year to the claimants is \$146,007.44. Your Conference Board will receive from the General Board this year the sum of \$3,289.07, which is \$905.34 less than we received last year. We would recommend to our preachers a careful perusal of the annual report of the General Board that the work done by the General Board may be better understood and appreciated. While enterprises in the business world have lost heavily from their investments, it is of peculiar interest that the General Board has not sustained any losses that have impaired its capital investments.

Our Conference has in the hands of the General Board an endowment fund administered by the Board for our Conference the sum of \$95,369.02, an increase of \$824 over last year.

The campaign for the collection of the adjusted quotas of the several charges is being continued. The amount due from the several charges under the adjustment is \$23,670.38. It is important that this amount be taken care of by the charges and we do most urgently request our preachers to give attention thereto. We request Bishop William F. McMurry to appoint Rev. Harry P. Baker, the nominee of the General Board, as Conference Director of the Superannuate Endowment, in connection with his regular work in the Conference.

Your Board has received from the Corporate Board of Finance the sum of \$5,000; and the Publishing House has sent us \$1,937.77; and we have received from the General Board of Finance \$3,289.07.

In accordance with the provisions of Par. 363 of the Discipline the Board this year is distributing the amount of its income to the claimants thereon, on the basis of the years of service—\$10 per year for the superannuates, \$6 per year for the widows, and each orphan \$75, after making provision for such emergency cases as have come to us. Your Board has made effort to get full and definite information from the claimants as to their condition, and, upon the information thus gathered, it has endeavored to distribute the funds that have come to it, giving each case proper consideration from the information furnished.

The claimants have been paid quarterly as the Conference ordered. Last year we had to borrow from the Reserve Fund, which had been gathered through the year for the purpose of caring for any emergency and to make the quarterly payments. We dare not draw further on this amount. We have not been able to replace the entire amount used from the Reserve Fund.

The Treasurer of the Conference and of this Board are bonded as directed by the Conference.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.

Methodism is the grandchild of John Wesley. The immediate parent of Methodism is the printed page conveying religious thought, of which type of literature John Wesley was the father. If Methodism is to be true to its family tradition, it must be a distributor and a reader of Christian literature. There is flooding from our presses today an amount of good literature that does justice to a Church with such traditions as we. Besides the many books that are being printed, the Publishing House publishes regularly some of the best church publications available. One might wish that these could be combined into one great magazine; but, since they probably will not be, we must do our best to promote them as they are. Each publication has a definite purpose and is published more or less for a definite group, with the exception of the Advocate. The Christian Advocate is the general publication of the Church; the Methodist Layman is published primarily for the officials of the Church; the World Outlook is the missionary publication of the Church, with long dresses and a borrowed name. The Church School Magazine is for Church School

officers and teachers and the Epworth High Road, the Haversack, etc., as well as the various "quarterlies" are designed for special groups. It is too much to ask of busy pastors that they give their time to the securing of subscriptions for these publications; but certainly some effort should be made, through a committee that will work, to put these publications at least into the hands of those for whom they are specially designed.

We call attention to the Free Tract Service of the House. In this whirling age, people will not take time to read anything very long if it be religious. One of the most effective ways of getting truth to our people in a form in which it will be read is the use of this tract service.

There never has been a time in the history of our Church when world events crowded more thickly upon us and moral issues were so much to the fore. It is useless at a time like this to cry for another Amos to come to Bethel and raise his voice for righteousness. The mass of the people are no longer at Bethel. But we have a voice today of which Amos and Jeremiah never dreamed. Printers ink will convey truth as well as untruth; righteousness as well as unrighteousness. If the mountain will not come to Mohammed, Mohammed must go to the mountain; and so doing he can bring a part of the mountain back with him. One of the ways—not perfect, but good up to an advanced point—for bringing the mountain back is the use of printers ink in tracts and other products of the printing press.

Your Board had before it a letter from the Publishing Agents setting forth some facts brought about by present conditions. They urge that our pastors discover the prices of Sunday School literature as charged by other houses in order that they may be convinced of the accuracy of the claim of the Publishing House that its publications are actually cheaper than similar publications of other houses. The National Recovery Act will doubtless force an increase in the cost of all printed matter, but our pastors and people should recognize the fact that other houses are raising their prices at the same time. The Christian Advocate will continue to be published for \$2.00, which is fifty cents less than formerly. The agents state that this will mean a loss on this publication unless there is a decided increase in the number of subscriptions. We call attention of the membership of the Conference to the offer of the Publishers of the Christian Advocate to send the paper for seven months—to May 1st for \$1.00. The business of the Publishing House is in a sound condition. Fifty thousand dollars is being distributed this year to the Conference Claimants of our Church. \$1,937.77 of this appropriation has been sent to the Board of Finance of our Conference. The Publishing Agents state that, owing to the unsettled conditions brought about by the National Recovery Act, they must stay close to their office, thus making it impossible for them to be present at the Conference in person. It is for this reason that this report has been entered into somewhat at length.

If it be necessary that our Publishing House exist and continue to circulate publications in order to keep alive the spirit of Methodism; it is just as true that the Baltimore Conference must have a conference organ to keep alive the morale and the esprit de corps of our rather diversified Conference. For three years this Board has been wrestling with the problem of keeping the paper on a sound basis. This year the problem is especially acute due to rising costs of printing as a possibility and a decreased budget as a certainty, coupled with the resignation of Dr. Harmon as editor. After carefully considering all the plans that were suggested, your Board recommends the following plan:

That the office of publication be removed from Baltimore, Maryland, to Salem, Virginia, where printing costs and living conditions are more favorable, and that a managing editor and business manager be appointed with the understanding that he is to spend a considerable part of his time in the field for the purpose of increasing the subscription list of the paper. It is recommended that this field agent and business manager be allowed a salary of \$2,800 plus \$200 moving and traveling expenses; and that he be required to provide his own home without additional cost to the Conference. It is further recommended that an editorial staff of three members of the Conference be appointed to write the editorials.

We respectfully request the Bishop to appoint Dr. F. M. Richardson as business manager and managing editor, and to appoint Drs. N. B. Harmon, Jr., M. D. Mitchell and F. J. Prettyman as contributing editors in connection with pastoral charges. It is recommended that Miss Maude Hodges be retained in her present position.

In order to make possible the carrying on of the conference paper, we recommend to the Conference that an apportionment of \$8,000 be included in the Annual Conference Assessments for the support of the Baltimore Southern Methodist. We are pleased to hear that the Budget Committee has already voted to allow us this apportionment.

It is recommended that the Board of Directors of the Baltimore Southern Methodist be authorized to borrow money to an amount not to exceed the proceeds from the Assessment.

It is understood that the Southern Methodist Publishing Company through its Board of Directors shall continue to be responsible for the publication of the conference paper.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN METHODIST PUBLISHING COMPANY.

The Southern Methodist Publishing Company was incorporated for the sole purpose of publishing the Baltimore Southern Methodist as the organ of the Baltimore Annual Conference. The income from the stock sold at the beginning of this enterprise has long since been absorbed in the business of the corporation. As the sole purpose of the corporation is the publication of the conference organ, so the entire asset of the company is the good will of the Baltimore Conference. The Conference has from time to time selected the editor and requested his appointment by the Bishop to this work. It has also from year to year made an assessment sufficient to finance the publication of the paper. The cost of the publication of this paper consists of fixed charges which with the exception of the salary of the editor and a necessary office help is of such a nature that it cannot be cut. Last year the assessment which had been \$9,500 for years previous was cut to \$8,000. It was understood at the time that this would not be sufficient to finance the paper for the past year. An effort was made by certain members of the Conference who were especially interested in the continuance of the publication to secure a free will offering of \$1,000 to supplement the income from the assessment. This effort has not materialized except in a very small sum. As a result of the foregoing the paper has been published this year at a loss. It may be said to the credit of the present editor and business manager that a debt amounting to approximately \$4,000 has been reduced during his incumbency to the present indebtedness of approximately \$2,000.

It becomes our duty at this time to lay before the Conference as clearly as we may be able the necessities of this publication. After years of experience with the practice of every possible economy we find it impossible to finance the paper on its present basis for a less sum from the Conference than that which accrues from an assessment of \$9,500.00. If it is the will of the Conference to have the paper published upon this basis we will be glad to serve them to the best of our ability. Or if the Conference can suggest a way of publication on a cheaper basis we will be glad to serve the Conference if in our judgment a sufficient amount is assured to pay the expenses of the publication. We desire, however, to remind the Conference that if the good will of the Conference is withdrawn from the paper, and an assessment laid less than the amount necessary to pay the fixed charges it will be necessary for this corporation to cease to exist. In which case we will request that an assessment be laid upon the Conference for the coming year sufficient to net at least \$2,000 to pay off our present indebtedness. The corporation exists solely to serve the Conference.

During the present year the conference organ has enjoyed almost unprecedented success in the response of our subscribers. It has been

strong and fearless in its defense of all that the Conference stands for. Its columns have been open for the full and free expression of opinion on all questions pertaining to the work of the Conference. It has carried the announcements of the various organizations that form a part of the Conference, and has contained from week to week the local news of our churches. We desire to express our heartiest appreciation of the splendid work that has been done by Dr. Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., as editor and business manager. We would desire most earnestly that he continue in this office if the paper could continue to be published on its present basis. Dr. Harmon, however, after serving most efficiently and acceptably for five years in this trying situation desires to be released, and return to the pastorate. We desire to assure him of our good will and of our prayers for his success in an ever enlarging ministry.

We also desire to give expression of our appreciation of the work of Miss Maude Hodges, who has been one of the most important factors in the success of the paper in its past history.

If the Conference decides to continue the paper upon any plan whatsoever it would be necessary to secure another editor and business manager.

This corporation is so entirely made up of members of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the Baltimore Conference that we do not think of it as separate from the Baltimore itself. We have a common interest with all the other members of the Church in the Baltimore Conference, and we are ready and anxious to serve the Conference in any way that is possible.

Hoping and praying that some plan may be devised at this Conference for the continuance of the paper we close our annual report with the assurance that we are yours to command.

of infinite refreshment that will keep her alive in the most trying periods. Have faith in the Head of the Church, keep on in sacrificial abandon and the day of relief will come.

Second—To those planning to build. Plan within your means. Obey the law of the Church and have three-fourths of the cost in sight in reliable subscriptions and other resources. Do not begin to build until your plans are endorsed by the Architectural Department of the General Board. They may save you from costly mistakes and will help you get the most beauty and efficiency out of every dollar invested. Strive for beauty as well as usefulness. The Church is sick of architectural atrocities—they are unnecessary.

Third—Remember the Loan Fund of the Board of Church Extension in your will. You will then be building churches and helping folks receive the comfort of the Gospel long after you have ceased to need your property. And if you give the Board your money now they will pay you a generous interest on it as long as you live.

REPORT OF THE BIBLE BOARD.

Your Bible Board would respectfully direct the attention of our people to the fundamental place God has given the Holy Scriptures in His plans for saving immortal souls. The Book sets forth God's methods of dealing with His children, unveils His love and proclaims His law. In our day of multiplied responsibilities and unusual prob-

lems there are numerous codes for procedure toward solutions, still there is but one for the human family—The Word of God. We would lead our people in this brief prayer: "O that my ways were directed to keep thy statutes".

We rejoice that through the efforts of various organizations the whole or portions of the Scriptures have appeared in 933 different languages and dialects. Nine new languages have been added during the past year. Added to the task of translating into languages and dialects is the circulation of thousands of embossed copies of the Scriptures for the blind. During 1932 the American Bible Society, through the agencies in the United States and abroad issued, at the cost of publication, more than eight millions of Bibles, Testaments and portions. Certainly this is a real achievement in view of the paralyzing effects felt everywhere from economic situation.

Your Board would call attention to Universal Bible Sunday, promoted annually by the American Bible Society. This year the date falls on December 10. The theme will be "The Light Shineth in Darkness".

Your Board respectfully presents for adoption the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, The American Bible Society in carrying on its work of increasing the circulation of Scriptures is engaged in a task essential to the whole church enterprise and looks to the churches of America for financial support in its program, be it

Resolved, First, That we heartily endorse the efforts of the American Bible Society in its program of encouraging a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures.

Second, That inasmuch as Sunday, December 10, 1933, has been designated as Universal Bible Sunday, the ministers of this body cooperate in directing the attention of their congregations on that day to the important place in Christian faith which the Holy Scriptures occupy.

REPORT No. 1 OF BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The missionary cause of our Church has shared with others the limitations of present day conditions. Our great Church was the last to yield to the necessity of recalling from foreign fields some of our devoted missionaries. The administrative forces of our General Board have been cut in personnel. Severe reductions have been made in salaries. Additional tasks are thus placed upon those who remain, but

we face the future with determination and with faith believing as we do that the ideal of missions represents the heart of the Christian Gospel.

The Board of Missions in 1922 and in 1923 set aside a Reserve Fund of \$25,000 which was a ten per cent. refund from the General Board of Missions from Centenary money from the Baltimore Conference. This amount was to be used for the maintenance of the Francis Asbury School when and if such a school should be built. In view of the lack of the consummation of this project the Board of Missions has voted to return this sum with accrued interest to its treasury, to be used at its discretion to supplement the receipts from the apportionment of the Annual Conference, thereby assisting in making it possible to pay a larger percentage of the allowances made to mission charges, and for such other mission purposes as the Board shall direct.

We call the attention of our people to our splendid missionary publication, the World Outlook, and urge the placing of this Christian magazine in the home of our Methodism. Our Conference Standard Training School held each summer in Front Royal is commended to the attention of our people, hoping for a loyal support of the same by a representative attendance from each charge of our Conference.

We hereby nominate Rev. W. H. Best as Missionary Secretary of the Baltimore Conference to serve without compensation and in connection with a charge, and we respectfully request Bishop McMurry so to appoint him.

We approve the request for the offering to be taken for the Paine College Jubilee Commission the third Sunday in November.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE.

Dear Brethren:

We, your Committee on Temperance and Social Service, having been charged with the task of making a careful study of principles involved in the same, effecting the social, moral and religious life, beg to make the following recommendations:

First—Sabbath Observance: This institution around which has grown up the Christian Church and out of which has come our civilization deserves a large place in our thoughts. The true meaning of what the Holy Sabbath is to the Church and State must be created in the minds of our youth. Resolved,

1st. That we as a church and as individual Christians give active co-operation with the agencies now at work to safeguard the Christian Sabbath.

Second—The Home: The home has been a mighty tower of strength in creating social purity and moral safeguards. We recommend:

1st. That we urge the heads of families as far as practical to daily read a part of the word of God and that family worship be established in the homes of Christian followers;

2nd. We recommend that we do all in our power to secure uniform divorce laws and thereby check the rapid increase in divorces in our country.

Third—As to Intemperance: The position of the Methodist Church as to the use of intoxicating beverages is well known. The Methodist Church is the unceasing foe of the liquor traffic. From the beginning it has demanded of all who would be admitted to its communion to refrain from drinking spirituous liquors unless in cases of necessity. We would urge upon all our people the observance of these directions in all sincerity. Unthinkable and almost unbelievable as it is the people of the United States are asked to endorse a program of repeal that will open the way to a campaign that will let loose a flood tide of liquors that will spare no age and exempt no home from the appeal of intoxicating drinks. Brethren, in the face of these things, what must we do and what can we do?

"The Voice," organ of the Methodist Episcopal Church Temperance Board, carries an article, analyzing the prohibition situation to date in which it asks:

"If repeal is upon us, two questions must be faced: What is to be our attitude toward governmental readjustment?"

"We can demand that we be consulted, or we can go into retirement and let the wets do their worst. The latter policy might more quickly bring prohibition again, but it means death to human beings and disaster to our society. It is difficult indeed for anyone to say a good word for the administration in regard to this particular matter and at this particular time.

"The second question, which is clearly raised by the situation, is this: What is our long term program? Are we going to stop talking about education and proceed to do it? Are we going to rally our own church people for warfare on this great curse? It is time to be thinking about this."

Brethren, we, your Temperance Board, can do nothing more than urge upon the Conference the endorsement of the last paragraph of the report of the General Board of Temperance and Social Service of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South:

"The warfare of society with the liquor traffic is inevitable, irrepressible and absolutely necessary for the protection of society from the selfish indulgence of the individual, and though the warfare be prolonged society will finally in self-defense be compelled to prohibit the traffic just as it has prohibited the traffic in narcotic drugs. So even though the present campaign should finally be lost, this great warfare will continue with unabated vigor for the entire abolition of the traffic and for the total abolition by the individual. Southern Methodism will stand unswervingly in the future as in the past for such an educative and legislative program as will accomplish this purpose. Our watch words must be 'No retreat, no surrender, no compromise.'"

We further recommend: That our preachers and laymen, unless in cases of necessity, refrain from patronizing those places where beer and other intoxicating beverages are dispensed. We desire also to call attention to paragraph 515 of the Discipline, which we quote as follows:

"Let all our preachers and members abstain from the manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquors to be used as a beverage, from signing petitions for their sale, from becoming bondsmen for any person as a condition for obtaining a license, from acting as a dispenser or voluntarily accepting an appointment or election as such under the laws of any State in which there is a dispensary law authorizing the sale of intoxicating liquors by the State, county, or municipality, and from renting property to be used for such sale."

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, HOME OF THE AGED AND ORPHANS, OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH, INCORPORATED, AND LOCATED AT GAITHERSBURG, MARYLAND.

This report is so remarkable in view of the unfavorable financial conditions which have prevailed that we praise the Giver of every good and every perfect gift for His blessing upon our work.

Guests:

We now have 65 members in the family and have cared for 100 since the opening of the Home. We have received 9 new guests dur-

ing the year and 8 have entered the house not made with hands. The health of the entire family, when the age of its members is considered, has been unusually good. Careful provision has been made throughout the year for both the religious and social life of the family.

Buildings, Grounds and Farm:

All buildings are kept in excellent condition and three small farm buildings have been erected during the year. Shrubbery has been planted and roadways improved about the main building. Mr. Houck, the farm manager, has demonstrated his efficiency by running the farm at a net profit which exceeds any previous year. Feed has been stored for the stock and fruits and vegetables canned for the family, in large quantities.

Women's Guilds:

Another guild has been organized since the Annual Conference. The Winchester District Guild, which has as its President, Mrs. J. H. Balthis, planned a pilgrimage to the Home which enlisted about 200 visitors, and these visitors stimulated the interest back home noticeably. This new guild painted the men's dormitory at a cost of \$65.00 and have assumed as their special work the care of the third floor. The Washington District Guild and the Baltimore District Guild have assumed definite responsibilities in the upkeep of the Home, some of the outstanding accomplishments of the year being the completion of the men's dormitory on the third floor and the erection of outside stairways as a precaution in case of fire. This, in addition to the regular work of supplying furniture for the reception room and corridors and numerous supplies in the dining room.

Sources of Income:

The Christmas offering dropped below that of last year by about 30%, and was the saddest disappointment of the year. The Mother's Day offering was more encouraging, exceeding the offering last year by about \$200.00. We note that 83% of the charges responded with a Mother's Day offering which is the largest percentage on record. However, only 56% of the Sunday Schools made an offering and the offering from this source was decreased by \$801.69. The general contributions increased more than 50% over last year.

The Treasurer's Report:

The Treasurer's report shows that the receipts during the past year have enabled us to meet all current running expenses and reduced the bonded indebtedness \$8,050.00. But this record cannot be repeated unless our people continue their same loyal support. This institution is wholly dependent upon the liberality of our people and has no other source of income. Our needs are giving us much concern. The Superintendent, facing the obligations of tomorrow, said, "Days demanding sacrificial service and faith are ahead of us."

Commendation:

The trustees desire to extend hearty appreciation to those who have had a part in making this excellent report possible. To Rev. Herman M. Wilson and Mrs. Wilson and their staff of faithful workers, to the presiding elders, pastors, superintendents, home directors and to the thousands of friends throughout the Conference we offer our sincere gratitude.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE HOSPITAL BOARD.

No period of our Nation's history has ever more fully demonstrated the value of our hospitals to society than the period through which we have just passed. The hospitals, themselves, have seen their revenues diminish, they pay patients decline in number, and the demand for free service increase. It is remarkable that these valuable institutions have stood the storm.

Several hospitals made loans for building purposes that seemed reasonable at the time they were made, but have proven extremely burdensome during recent years. Every one of these hospitals, however, except the Montgomery Memorial Hospital, is still running and doing good service. Several of them, however, are in default in the payment of principal and interest on bonds. Adjustments with creditors have been made and with the return of normal business conditions all of these institutions hope ultimately to work out of their difficulties.

The Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital at Elkin, North Carolina, during the year has erected a nurses' home. Advances have been made by the hospital cause even in this dark period. The beautifully located Warren A. Candler Hospital, Savannah, Georgia, acquired in 1931 by the General Hospital Board, is doing fine work and has a promising future.

The Southern Methodist Hospital and Sanatorium at Tucson, Arizona, has been largely dependent on the Golden Cross and Kingdom Extension funds in Conferences, like our own, where there is no conference hospital. This support has sharply declined since 1930. These conditions and unpaid hospital bills have forced this connectional hospital to omit its semi-annual interest payment on a \$69,000 bond issue due since last November. The owners of these bonds, through a Protective Committee, have offered to grant a four-year moratorium on principal payments, and a much lower rate of interest for the next few years.

Our denomination cannot afford to lose this, its only connectional hospital, its only work among tuberculars, its only institution west of the Rockies. By responding to the Golden Cross and Kingdom Extension calls our Conference can render this institution the assistance imperatively needed at this time. We beg the members of this Conference to place these facts before our people and help us to save this threatened ministry.

The law of the Church directs that the Golden Cross Enrollment funds shall benefit the hospital in the Conference where the money is raised. In the Conferences where there are no hospitals the Golden Cross revenues are used for the benefit of the tubercular connectional hospital at Tucson, Arizona.

We are glad to note that the General Hospital Board has handled its funds with rare economy. Its overhead expense has been reduced to the irreducible, as its working force now consists of the General Secretary and one clerical helper.

We urge the appointment by the pastors, subject to the confirmation of the fourth quarterly conference, of a wide-awake Golden Cross Director for each local church.

Your board recommends the diligent and punctual observance of the Golden Cross Enrollment, particularly as these funds are so critically needed to save the life of our connectional tubercular hospital at Tucson. We urge the conference-wide observance of Golden Cross Week, which includes the third and fourth Sundays in May.

Your hospital board welcomed with peculiar pleasure the visit of Dr. C. C. Jarrell, General Secretary of the General Hospital Board, and profited by his helpful counsel and hopeful outlook for the healing ministry.

We would ask our pastors and Golden Cross Directors to follow the law of the Church, as contained in Paragraph 560 of the Discipline, with reference to the disposition of Golden Cross funds, viz.: Send remittances to the Conference Treasurer, Mr. J. T. Houck, Harrisonburg, Virginia, who is required by law to forward the amounts raised to the General Hospital Board, Atlanta, Georgia, monthly, the law providing further that the General Hospital Board shall remit Golden Cross funds promptly to the Southern Methodist Hospital and Sanatorium, Tucson, Arizona.

REPORTS.

We would request our presiding elders, pastors and lay leaders to co-operate with the efforts of this Board, and particularly with the efforts of our Conference Golden Cross Director, Dr. N. M. Canter, of Harrisonburg, Virginia, in creating a larger interest among our people in the healing ministry of the Church through district conferences and other group meetings held throughout the Baltimore Conference.

REPORT ON FRANCIS ASBURY SCHOOL.

The Trustees of the Francis Asbury School have been giving careful attention to the interests committed to them. They have not thought it wise or expedient in view of all the circumstances to locate and establish the proposed school. They recognize that it is highly important that these funds be used in accordance with the intent of the original donors and the purpose of the proposed institution.

It has, therefore, been decided, for the present at least, to use the funds in hand to assist under-privileged boys and girls and young people, preferably Methodists, in securing in other institutions, preferably Methodist, such educational advantages as were originally intended in the Francis Asbury School. The terms of the charter are rather broad and authorize this use of the funds and we believe it is in harmony with the intent of the donors.

Auditor's Report.

A complete audit of the treasurer's books by a certified accountant has been made and shows that \$29,352.42 has come into this fund from the Christian Education Movement and special contributions; that the accrued interest collected amounts to \$17,917.53, making a total of \$47,269.95 principal and interest; and the present annual income amounts to \$2,468.00 or nearly 5½%.

There have been some small items of expense for board meetings, securing a charter, annual corporation fees, etc.

Two copies of the auditor's report giving full details and exhibit of investments have been filed with the secretary of the board and are open for inspection by anyone who may be interested.

It is recommended that the present Board of Trustees continue another year in order that its organization may synchronize with the quadrennial boards of the Conference. This is in harmony with general corporation law that trustees are to serve until their successors are elected.

REPORT OF THE SESQUI-CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE.

The Baltimore Conference enters the 150th year of its existence and that of organized Methodism in America with a heart of grateful praise to God, who through a century and a half has so wonderfully blessed its labors, communion and fellowship. The vast number of the people called Methodists have much for which they may thank God and take courage, but surely the Baltimore Conference, the mother of Conferences, in a peculiar way can join in the celebration of the coming anniversary of our Church. Approaching the sesqui-centennial mile post in the life of Church and Conference, it is fitting that this body should call the enthusiastic attention of its members to the plans that are being made to celebrate in 1934 our century and a half of progress. As is known to this Conference, our Methodist Episcopal Church, South, with the Methodist Episcopal and Methodist Protestant Churches, has appointed a commission which, together with the representatives of the organizations named, is charged with formulating plans that will worthily and fittingly celebrate the sesqui-centennial year. These commissions have called upon every Conference to appoint a committee to have in charge the matter of co-operating with the General Commission for each special conference territory, and of planning appropriate exercises for the conference session of 1934. We, your committee, therefore recommend that a permanent committee be appointed by this Conference to serve in this capacity through the year 1934. We request this committee to plan some special sesqui-centennial feature or features for our 1934 session. Our Conference is honored by having within its membership Rev. F. J. Prettyman, D. D., the chairman of the Commission of the M. E. Church, South, and we take pleasure in requesting him to act also as head of our Baltimore Conference committee. We request that associated with him shall be Mrs. T. J. Copeland, Mr. M. Lauck Walton, Jr., Dr. B. V. Switzer and Dr. S. K. Cockrell. We pledge our co-operation in assisting the working of this committee and will endeavor to set aside such time as the committee shall request for the presentation of its work and program at our next session.

As the program of the joint Sesqui-Centennial Commission contemplates a celebration not simply during the conference session but

throughout the entire year of 1934, we call upon our ministers and churches to assist in every way to make available the literature, songs, pageants and the like, which are prepared for churches and gatherings. We hope that the Conference itself may see fit to select historic Baltimore where the Methodist Episcopal Church in America was organized in 1784, as the place for its sesqui-centennial gathering; and when the sesqui-centennial celebration now planned for October 10-14, 1934, shall be held in Baltimore, that great queen city of Methodism, we hope that the Methodist ministers and people of the Baltimore Conference shall be foremost in taking part in the great program being drawn up for the occasion.

MEMOIRS

WILLIAM FRANKLIN LOWANCE.

The best place for the appraisal of a life is its latter end. From that vantage point one can see the interplay of lights and shadows and appreciate the rugged forces which have wrought the character of a man. For, after all, the shuttle of one's days upon the Loom of Life is weaving a pattern which is concealed from every eye until death reveals the finished fabric.

Certainly this was true of William Franklin Lowance, teacher and preacher, and those who knew him best, as they stood beside his silent form, marvelled at the color scheme which the Great Artist had employed and at the results which had been achieved.

He was born near Lewisburg, W. Va., September 11, 1861. The mystic loom, however, had begun its work long before that day, for his father and mother, pious and faithful members of the Methodist Church, bequeathed to their son a rich spiritual heritage. The intervening days and years, with all their changing experiences, carried out the pattern thus begun and on November 2, 1932, in the Maryland General Hospital at Baltimore, the tapestry of his life was completed.

During his boyhood he lived in Williamsburg, W. Va. In that place he started laying the foundation of the educational equipment which was characteristic of him and, so far as his native state is concerned, he laid the keystone of it in the Normal School at Athens. Not satisfied with this he continued his studies at a Normal University in Lebanon, Ohio. In what would have been his senior year at this institution, he was elected superintendent of schools for Greenbrier County and at once entered upon the office which he faithfully administered for two successive terms. Subsequent to this he taught for several years in the public and graded schools, in schools for teachers, and for two years was a member of the faculty of the State Normal.

When fifteen years of age, Brother Lowance made a profession of religion during a meeting at Williamsburg. However, doubts arising troubled him greatly and led to a practical abandonment of the church. But at old Brushy Ridge Camp, on August 23, 1883, he received such a wonder manifestation of the Spirit that he could never afterward doubt the power of Christ to save or doubt his own salvation.

Coincident with his conversion came the call to preach. After much prayer he applied for license and was at once placed in charge of Peterstown Circuit. Though in middle life, he sought admission to the Conference and was received on trial at Winchester, in 1905.

Entering upon his studies with vigor, he completed the prescribed course in less than the allotted time and was ordained deacon in 1907 and elder in 1909.

In the order named he served the following charges: Peterstown, Greenville (W. Va.), Greenbank, Levelton, Port Republic, Newport, Bethany and Fairview. Completing his work at this latter place, he felt it necessary to ask the superannuate relation on account of his health. Yet so eager was he to "carry on" that he served the next two years as supply on Catawba.

Brother Lowance was a faithful preacher and pastor. Always studious, he sought patiently the true interpretation of the Word and proclaimed it with such earnestness and zeal that it strengthened the faith of those who believed and challenged the attention of the unsaved. He had a passion for souls. Not satisfied with the fruits of his ministry, he sought an endowment of the Spirit to qualify him for winning souls. God heard and answered that prayer. He became proficient in the art of introducing men to his Master and was honored of the Lord in bringing hundreds to a saving faith in His Name. Multitudes from every charge he served rise up this day, in grateful acknowledgment of his ministry, to call him blessed.

On September 3, 1896, he was united in marriage to Miss Dora Hamilton Gibson, who comforted and encouraged and helped him in all his work. To them God gave seven children, one of whom died in infancy. Surviving him are his beloved wife and the following children: Mrs. B. B. Thawley of Baltimore; Dr. Mason Ira of Atlanta; Mrs. George Lieben of Douglas, Arizona; Mrs. R. J. Niebenck of Ivanhoe, Va.; Franklin N. of Duke University, and Carter O. of Roanoke, Va.

Conscious of his approaching end when he entered the hospital, Brother Lowance calmly set his house in order and "soothed and sustained by an unflinching trust" proceeded to put the finishing touches to the pattern of life he had pursued all his days and then, with joy, laid it at the feet of his Lord.

The funeral was conducted from his residence in Roanoke by Rev. H. M. Canter, Rev. W. F. Locke, his presiding elder, and Rev. D. L. Fringer, pastor of Huntington Court. A large number of his brethren in the ministry were present and a great number of friends, all of whom came to do him honor. It was like a triumphal procession which wound its way through the streets of the city out to the beautiful cemetery near Salem. There we left his mortal remains to sleep in peace just as the westerling sun was throwing its lengthening shadows across the evening sky. But as we turned away there was no thought of approaching night: only of the new day which had dawned for him. Ringing in our ears was the music of the Master's voice:

GEORGE DORSEY WHITE.

George Dorsey White, son of Horatio and Elizabeth Trout White, was born at Buchanan, Botetourt County, Virginia, March 4, 1850, and died at Salem, Roanoke County, Virginia, December 28, 1932.

At the age of sixteen he made a profession of faith and united with the Salem Methodist Episcopal Church, South. He was licensed to preach by the quarterly conference of his home church in 1878, and he at once began to invest his gifts, serving as a supply under the appointment of his presiding elder. Upon the recommendation of the quarterly conference of Salem Church, Rev. L. R. Greene, pastor, and Rev. George H. Zimmerman, presiding elder, he was admitted on trial at the session of the Annual Conference convening at Charles Town, March, 1883, Bishop John C. Keener, presiding. Only two of his class survive: the Right Reverend John N. McCormick, Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Western Michigan, and Rev. J. L. Henderson of Roanoke, Va., an honored member of this Conference.

He was received into full connection and ordained a deacon by Bishop Holland N. McTyiere at the Staunton Conference, March, 1886. At the Martinsburg Conference, March, 1888, Bishop Alpheus W. Wilson presiding, he was ordained an elder. His years of service embraced the following charges: Severn, 1883-86; Bladensburg, 1886-90; Reisterstown, 1890-92; Christiansburg, 1892-96; Waynesboro, 1896-99; Rockville, 1899-1903; Front Royal, 1903-06; Rockingham District, 1906-10; Moorefield District, 1910-13; Roanoke District, 1913-17; Baltimore District, 1917-19; Mt. Olivet (Roanoke), 1919-23; Piedmont, 1923-24; Falls Church, 1924-25. By request, he was granted the superannuate relation at the Washington Conference, 1925. Thereupon he located in Salem, Virginia, closing his earthly career where he was converted and where he was licensed to preach, respected, esteemed, and loved by the people of the town, regardless of creed or race.

He was united in marriage, January 2, 1879, to Miss Mary Virginia Dame. This was a most happy wedded life; each making his own contribution to the building of a happy, useful home. Seven children were born of this union; three sons: Walter Wesley, Dorsey Marvin, Thomas Haygood; and four daughters, Nora Kern, Emma Gertrude, Roxie Lucile, and Mary Elizabeth. These all, with the exception of Walter Wesley, remain, the inheritance of a good name which is far better than great riches.

As a preacher, Brother White was thoughtful, logical, helpful. He was largely expository in method. The Good-News in Jesus Christ furnished abundant material for his sermons. As a pastor, he was never accused of being a respecter of persons. Both the sheep and the lambs of the flock were the objects of the solicitous care of this good shepherd. He never turned a deaf ear to the cry of the lost. No night was too dark and no storm too severe to prevent his response

to the call of the lost. The spirit of this under-shepherd is well expressed in the lines of the hymn:

Hast thou a lamb in all thy flock
I would disdain to feed?

His ability as an administrator was recognized by our chief pastors. Thirteen years of his active ministry were spent in the presiding eldership. He honored the office by his painstaking, persistent, faithful application to its responsibilities. The writer of this memoir succeeded him on the Baltimore District during the closing months of the Centenary Campaign, and the response of that district to the call of the Church was due in no small way to his leadership that enlisted the heartiest co-operation of both preachers and laymen.

As a superannuate he was a benediction to his brethren and an inspiration to his church. He was alert and interested to the end. The welfare of Zion was his chiefest joy. The personal appearance of this high-toned Christian gentleman was but the outward expression of an inward purity of spirit and stainlessness of mind. In character he was dependable; in friendship trustworthy; in citizenship loyal; in church membership faithful. He was both a good man and a good guide. As a husband ever true, as a father ever considerate, his family was the center of his interest and the source of unspeakable joy.

In life he was exemplary and victorious; in death resigned and triumphant. He enjoyed life. Within him was a well that never ceased its steady, sparkling flow. Hundreds were blessed as the stream of his life flowed by. Life to him was indeed a trust. His years of service, his contribution to the kingdom of God, his ideals of life, the home he builded and the family he reared attest his goodness and his faithfulness as a steward of the multi-colored grace of God.

The memory of a life like his is dear not only to those of the inner circle within which he was best known and most loved and to the members of this his beloved Conference, but also to many others whose burdens were made lighter here and whose joys will be more resplendent there because he lived and loved.

The funeral services were in charge of his presiding elder, Rev. W. F. Locke, and his pastor, Rev. M. D. Mitchell, D. D. The very large attendance of the ministers of his own denomination as well as other denominations along with the citizens of the town and community bears testimony to the richness of his friendship and the fragrance of his life. His remains were laid gently to rest in the Salem Cemetery. There his body sleeps until the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God, and those who hear shall live.

JOHN CALVIN THRASHER.

John Calvin Thrasher passed peacefully away while asleep at his home in Bridgewater, Virginia, on the morning of February 8th, 1933. This soldier of the cross was born at Big Lick, now the city of Roanoke, Virginia, seventy-seven years ago in the year 1856. He came from a long line of sturdy and upright people who left their impress upon his life. Early in his young life he heard the call to preach the Gospel and began preparation for his life work. He was educated at Randolph-Macon College and entered the itinerant ranks of the Baltimore Conference in the year 1880 in the same class with Bishop Collins Denny. Thus began a long and useful ministry whose quiet, gentle and helpful influence has permeated the Conference and helped many a soul on to the City of God.

He was sent, for his first appointment, to the far away Eastern Shore of Maryland. It was a long journey in those days but he rode the entire distance on horseback. He spent many of his most fruitful years in that section of the Conference preaching and building up the Kingdom. Today his name is still fragrant in many of the homes there. During his long life he served many of the circuits and some of the stations of the Conference always with fidelity and zeal for the Master. He loved to preach and was preeminently a preacher of the Word. His sermons were children of his own heart and experience and had the warmth and glow of a tender loving soul which made them messages of joy and comfort to all who heard.

Like the flaming pioneers in whose footprints he trod he has left behind achievements and victories for the Master which are now a valuable part of the glowing records of the Baltimore Conference, but best of all these victories and achievements are a part of that glorious record kept by the angel of God.

He was a man among men. Of striking appearance and a strong personality he appealed to the best in men and bound to him with enduring ties the congregations he so faithfully served. He was congenial and courageous with a sense of humor which made him a delightful companion and enabled him to win his way into the hearts of the people. Under the touch of this congenial spirit men softened and turned to God. When he went about shadows lifted and discouraged people took up their tasks with new hope. Little children clung to him and old age waited for his coming and youth found in him a friend. His preaching gripped and held and lifted, for out of it and through it one felt the power of a great soul stirred and awakened by the Gospel of a loving Christ.

As a pastor he came and went leaving behind a fragrance of divine things and a spirit of courage and faith which made people stronger and better. Like the Parson in Goldsmith's "Deserted Village", "he lured to brighter worlds and led the way." He was truly a Knight of the Shining Armor and golden heart whose glittering sword had never been sheathed in the battle for right.

In the year 1885 he was most happily married to Miss Eliza McNeel, of Hillsboro, West Virginia. She was to him, through their married life, a great helpmate upon whom he leaned and whose companionship was the source of inspiration for great tasks. Her going away in 1907 left this courageous soul bent and bruised but still triumphant in the Gospel he preached so helpfully to others.

Surviving him are his three children: Henry W., of Clarksburg, West Virginia; Paul, of Charleston, South Carolina, and Mary, at home in Bridgewater, who was his faithful companion and housekeeper after the death of his wife. He also leaves a sister, Mrs. Minnie Short, of Roanoke, Virginia.

Funeral services were held in the Methodist Church in Bridgewater on Friday morning, February 10th, 1933, conducted by his pastor, Reverend O. D. Lambert, assisted by Reverend William Stevens. Present and assisting also were Reverend C. B. Smith of the Church of the Brethren, and Reverend Mr. Beard of the Presbyterian Church. His body was taken to Stephens City and laid to rest in Green Hill Cemetery beside his wife.

May the spirit of this devoted son of the Conference, like the mantle of Elijah, fall upon the shoulders of the young men of today whose feet are treading the paths he so faithfully made during a long and faithful ministry.

JOHN WESLEY MITCHELL.

The highest achievement in life is to show forth in daily conversation and action the Christian virtues. To be good is to be noble and thus to be a joy and blessing to others. The life one lives is his own memorial, our words but a feeble symbol.

John Wesley Mitchell was born in Rockbridge County, Virginia, on September 18, 1856, the son of Abraham M. and Mary Brown Mitchell. He was the second of four children—three sons and one daughter. From this Christian home and from the surroundings of a country-side of natural charm and beauty he inherited and developed those basic factors that go to make sturdy character. Brother Mitchell followed the pursuits of the average country boy, availing himself of such educational and spiritual opportunities as his day afforded. At the age of sixteen years in a log meeting house in Balcony Falls, Virginia, Brother Mitchell was soundly converted in a revival being held by Rev. J. T. Williams of our Conference. It was always his delight, as opportunity afforded, to visit the place of his spiritual birth, the old log house still standing but no longer in use. It was a sacred spot to him. He talked frequently of his conversion. From the time of this supreme experience in his life he felt the call to preach the gospel and he

began preparing for that work. As his education proceeded he never lost the fire and vision that came to him in that log meeting house. He would walk miles and miles through all kinds of weather over the mountains holding prayer meetings and conducting Sunday Schools. At the completion of his education, which included one year at Randolph-Macon College in Ashland, Brother Mitchell taught for a number of years in the public schools of Rockbridge County, Virginia. Finally the day to which he had looked forward with enthusiasm and high expectation arrived and he was received on trial into the Baltimore Conference at the session held in Harrisonburg, Virginia, in March, 1881, Bishop H. N. McTyeire, presiding. At that Conference he was sent to serve Gainsboro work and in 1882 he served Brucetown. At the session of the Annual Conference held in Charles Town, West Virginia, in 1883, Brother Mitchell was ordained deacon on March 18, by Bishop J. C. Keener, and at the same Conference was assigned to serve the Jefferson work. Next year he was sent to the Frederick mission where he remained for two years. On March 15, 1885, at the Annual Conference held in Salem, Virginia, he was ordained elder by Bishop John C. Granbery. On February 12, 1883, Brother Mitchell was married to Miss Mattie Hook of near Berryville, Virginia. During the greater part of their married life his wife was an invalid, and after twenty-six years of devoted companionship Mrs. Mitchell died on October 22, 1909, at Forest Grove, Maryland. During that time Brother Mitchell served, in addition to the places already named, Hillsboro from 1886-1888, Royal Oak from 1889 to 1892, Kent from 1893 to 1895, Charles in 1896, Springfield from 1897 to 1898, Church Hill from 1899 to 1902, Sterling from 1903 to 1904, Trappe from 1905 to 1907 and Forest Grove from 1908 to 1910. On September 20, 1911, Brother Mitchell was married to Miss Catherine Oxenham of near Royal Oak, Maryland. With this companion he served Clarksburg from 1911 to 1913, Colesville from 1914 to 1917, and Brunswick from 1918 to 1921. His wife died at Brunswick, Maryland, August 30, 1921. There were no children by either marriage. From 1922 to 1923 Brother Mitchell served Savage, Maryland, and at the session of the Annual Conference held in 1923 in the West End Church of Roanoke, Virginia, he took the superannuate relation. During the ten and a half years of his retirement Brother Mitchell made his home in Brunswick, Maryland, living in the home of Mrs. Alma L. Smith and her son Lee, the widow and son of our own Brother William L. Smith of sacred memory. In this home Brother Mitchell found the fellowship, care, understanding and Christian love so congenial to his nature. He was always glad to tell of what Mrs. Smith and her son did to make his last days pleasant. He was far from inactive, however. He always was ready to preach, to serve anywhere and in any way in the promotion of the Kingdom of God. Brother Mitchell's life was marked by simplicity of manner, humbleness of spirit, and a fidelity in friendship and trust. He was delightful in the home. His entire ministry was marked by a revival

fervor, a fervor so pronounced, indeed, that in his latter days he was often led to attempt preaching tasks beyond the measure of his physical strength. This man of God represented in his life and ministry the best in our sacred religion. In the candor of his heart, the sincerity of his motives, the zeal of his efforts, the gentleness of his spirit, and the depth of his consecration he stood among those whom we reverently call the "Old Guard." In March, 1932, Brother Mitchell went to make a week-end visit in the home of his friend, Mr. Thomas E. Shaw of Silver Springs, Maryland. While there he was taken ill and died within a week of bronchial pneumonia. He died on the morning of March 21, 1933. His funeral was held in Brunswick, Maryland, on Thursday, March 23, 1933, from the home which he had loved and where he had found happiness in his latter days. The services were conducted by Rev. J. J. Rives of Washington, assisted by Rev. Dr. E. L. Woolf, presiding elder of the Winchester District, and by Rev. R. L. Wittig, pastor of our church at Brunswick. A number of ministerial brethren and other friends were present. His body was taken on Friday, March 24, 1933, to Easton, Maryland, where it was buried. For months before his death he seemed to realize the approaching end and made all his own funeral arrangements.

REV. CHARLES B. SUTTON.

When the announcement appeared in the daily papers last July that Rev. Charles Bailey Sutton had recently died in Staunton, Virginia, there was a little cause for surprise. It was generally known to his

kindred and brethren that for several years he had been in precarious health, liable at any time to become serious, so that his death on July 10, 1933, at the ripe age of seventy-six and one-half years, was hardly unexpected.

He was a native Virginian, and was born January 2, 1857, at Kensale, Westmoreland County, the son of Frederick T. and Susan B. Sutton. While a mere boy he was converted to Christ, and soon afterwards united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. A few years later he became conscious of a call to the ministry and answered the call with a glad heart. Soon he began diligently and earnestly to prepare himself for the ministry, and received license to preach while living in Baltimore.

In March, 1882, he was admitted on trial in the Baltimore Conference, upon recommendation of the quarterly conference of Ashland Station, Richmond District, Virginia Conference, where he had been a student in college. At that Conference, over which Bishop McTyeire presided, he was appointed junior preacher on Prince George Circuit, Maryland, with Rev. S. Townsend, preacher in charge. Here he served for two years.

In 1884 he was appointed junior preacher on Hillsboro Circuit, Washington District, with Rev. E. H. Henry, and continued there one year. He was then in 1885 appointed preacher in charge of Petersburg Circuit, Moorefield District, where he served acceptably for two years.

His next appointment in 1887, was to Occoquan Circuit, Washington District, where he served the full term of four years. He was then sent in 1891 to Drainesville Circuit, in the same district, where he spent another term of four years.

In 1895 he was appointed to the Sudley and Manassas Circuit, Washington District, as preacher in charge, where he served successfully for another quadrennium.

In 1899 he was appointed preacher in charge at Alderson, West Virginia, but the very damp climate of the Greenbrier Valley proved unfavorable to his health, never robust, so that at the end of one year he was compelled to move. His next appointment was to Middleburg, Washington District, where he served for two years, and then, in 1902, was appointed to Parnassus Circuit, Rockingham District, and continued in charge for two years.

In 1904 he was appointed to the New Hope Circuit, and served with his usual acceptability for the full term of four years, and then served for two years on the East Rockingham Circuit.

At the Conference of 1910 he came back to the east side of the Blue Ridge Mountains, and served the Fauquier Circuit another full term. In 1914 he received his last appointment to the Hillsboro Circuit, where he had served as junior preacher many years before, and did earnest and faithful work for four years.

At the Conference held in Central Church, Baltimore, in April, 1918, failing health compelled him to take a superannuated relation, after a long and very useful ministry in the regular pastorate.

He was ordained a deacon in March, 1885, by Bishop John C. Granbery, and in March, 1887, he received elder's order at the hands of Bishop J. C. Keener, at Leesburg, Virginia.

On the 13th day of October, 1885, he was happily married to Miss Iola Estelle McKee, who passed to her heavenly reward August 10, 1928.

Brother Sutton possessed many of those qualities of mind and heart that never fail to endear a pastor to his people. His sincerity and earnestness gave him influence in the pulpit, while the inherent refinement of his nature made him popular in the social circle. There was always about him an air of quiet dignity that made a favorable impression upon all with whom he came in contact. The better his people came to know him, the more they esteemed him for his fine mental and moral qualities. His preaching was always appropriate and practical. Not gifted with unusual oratorical powers, he often spoke with a directness and vigor that never failed to fix the attention of every person in the congregation. He had the tact to adopt himself to the condition and needs of the people wherever he was sent, so that his ministry was nearly always efficient and successful. His devout religious spirit was everywhere recognized, and this greatly helped him both in pulpit and pastoral work, so that he not only quickened the spiritual life of his people, but left the precious and permanent fruits of his ministry in every charge that he served. It may be truly said of him that he entered whole-heartedly into all the duties of a Christian minister and made full proof of his faith by his works.

THOMAS L. DUNN.

Thomas Leroy Dunn who for many years bore the title, "Martinsburg's Grand Old Man,—a title conferred on him by the affection of his fellow citizens in recognition of his great worth,—passed to his heavenly home February 25, 1933.

Born in Frederick County, Virginia, June 13, 1854, there hung over his childhood years the dark clouds of Civil War, his birthplace being in the pathway of hostile armies marching to and fro. In later life he retained vivid memories of those tumultuous years marked by skirmishes and battles fought within hearing distance of his early home. Even more vivid was his memory of the social disorganization and dire poverty of the years immediately following the close of the war. The grim conditions brought about by "Reconstruction" in Vir-

ginia, forced him, while yet a boy, to plunge into the struggle of life. In his fifteenth year he became an apprentice in a small woolen mill not far from his home. Here he soon attracted attention by his persevering industry and his manifest ambition to learn all he could about the art of weaving. Making rapid progress in his chosen work, in a few years, he became foreman of a prosperous mill at Brucetown. Determining to go into business for himself, he leased a woolen mill at Buckland, Fauquier County, which enterprise he conducted successfully until an untoward failure of water power put an end to the operation of this mill. Returning to Brucetown, he became associated with W. H. Crawford in the operation of mills at that place. The expanding business of the Crawford Company led to the establishment of a mill at Martinsburg, W. Va., of which he was manager for a number of years. That he might undertake business on his own responsibility, he resigned from the Crawford Company and purchased a mill at a receiver's sale which he reorganized as The Dunn Woolen Company. The remaining years of his life were devoted to the development and successful operation of this enterprise.

This bare recital of facts gives little indication of the long and severe struggle through which he passed in wresting success from defeat in his long business career. Most men would have sunk under the load but the dauntless spirit of this man rose superior to all opposition and overcame all obstacles.

Through all the vicissitudes of his busy life he evinced unswerving loyalty to God and no man more than he carried his religion into his business. Those who came in contact with him recognized this fact and had unbounded confidence in his integrity; his employees loved and trusted him. No cause that held any promise of human betterment failed to enlist his active advocacy and liberal support. He saw the evils of the drink traffic and gave himself to the advocacy of all measures that had for their purpose the advancement of temperance and sobriety.

He, through the years, was devoted to his church. For many years, and to the day of his death he was president of the board of stewards of our Martinsburg church. As busy as he was and despite the many outside demands made upon his time, his church duties were never given second place. His simple unostentatious faith and upright life ever afforded an example worthy of imitation by those associated with him in the work of the church. As a leader he never asked others to do what he himself was unwilling to do. He was equally observant of the smaller duties as of the larger. In the face of difficult situations, he was the last to be discouraged and often revived the drooping spirits of others by his cheerful optimism and his complete trust in God. His giving was wholly without ostentation, as he gave for the pure love of giving and the earnest desire to help others. Only the record in heaven will reveal the extent of his charities—no honest appeal to him for help ever went unheeded.

In the Providence of God he led an active life to the last,—his last illness being comparatively brief. The vast assemblage of friends, local and from a distance, attested the esteem in which he was held by those who knew him best. As a mark of respect all business ceased as his body was borne through the streets of his "home town" to its last resting place in Rosedale Cemetery while, in distant Philadelphia, a group of wholesale woolen stores closed at the same hour as a mark of respect to a man known and loved there as he was at home.

Surviving are his widow, formerly Miss Charlotte Adelia Boden of Virginia, five sons and three daughters.
