1934

FIRST DAY.

Evening Session.

Thursday, October 4th, 1934.

THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its one hundred and fiftieth session in the Alpheus Wilson Memorial Church, Baltimore, Maryland, at eight o'clock in the evening.

THE OPENING SERMON was preached by Rev. J. J. Rives, D.D., from the text in Revelation 3:8: "Behold I have set before thee an open door, and no man can shut it."

Following the sermon the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered by Rev. Forrest J. Prettyman, D.D., assisted by the several presiding elders.

REV. JOHN PAUL TYLER announced the receipt of a telegram from Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon, who was unable to be present because of illness, directing the Conference to organize by the election of a president, pending the arrival of Bishop Paul B. Kern.

Dr. Tyler requested the secretary of the last Conference to call the roll, and 203 clerical and 51 lay members answered to their names.

SUBSTITUTIONS: The following substitutions on the roll were made: Mrs. Pryor Tatum in place of W. R. Cross from the Roanoke District; Mrs. W. A. Lynch in place of W. G. Clark; I. Q. Simmons in place of C. E. Armentrout, and J. H. Bryan in place of J. H. Furr from the Rockingham District.

H. M. CANTER, acting as secretary, requested the following to serve as tellers in the election of the president of the Conference: J. A. Johnson, W. W. McIntyre, C. E. Brandt, W. Delford Sheets, Thomas G. Anderson and M. H. B. Hoffman.

THE BALLOT for president was taken and the tellers retired to count the ballots.

THE TELLERS returned with the result of the ballot for president as follows: Total votes cast, 254; necessary to a choice, 128. Forney Hutchinson, 163; F. J. Prettyman, 82; J. Howard Wells, 4; John Paul Tyler, 3; E. L. Woolf, 2.

THE CHAIRMAN announced that Dr. Forney Hutchinson, having received a majority of the votes cast, was elected president of the Conference. Dr. Forney Hutchinson took the chair.

H. M. CANTER was elected secretary of the Conference, and upon his nomination C. R. Curtis was elected assistant secretary; N. B. Harmon, Jr., recording secretary; J. Harry Smith, statistical secretary; J. H. Haley, J. H. Bean, C. E. Brandt, C. J. Clark, C. L. Beard and Earl Miller, assistant statistical secretaries, and H. W. Craver, assistant secretary in charge of the sale of minutes.

JOHN PAUL TYLER offered the following resolution: "Resolved that we have heard with deep sorrow of the illness of our bishop, Edwin DuBose Mouzon, and that we instruct our secretary, to convey to Bishop Mouzon our love and the assurance of our prayers for his full and speedy recovery", and it was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

H. P. BAKER moved that twenty per cent. of the receipts from the assessment for the Board of Finance be set apart for distribution on the basis of necessity.

An amendment was offered by W. F. Locke to substitute ten per cent. for twenty per cent., but upon motion the amendment was lost and the original motion prevailed.

ORDERS OF THE DAY. On motion of J. J. Rives tomorrow morning at ten thirty o'clock was made the order of the day to vote on the Constitutional Question concerning the tenure of office for presiding elders.

William Stevens moved that when the vote on the Constitutional Question is taken it be taken by ballot, and the motion prevailed.

ON MOTION of G. G. Martin, tomorrow morning at eleven o'clock was made the order of the day for the report of the Board of Christian Education.

THE BAR of the Conference was fixed at a line running across the church in front of the fourth window from the chancel.

THE HOURS of meeting and adjournment were fixed at nine and twelve thirty o'clock, respectively.

CONFERENCE united in singing the Doxology and was dismissed with the benediction by W. F. Locke to meet tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

SECOND DAY.

Morning Session.

Friday, October 5th, 1934.

CONFERENCE met pursuant to adjournment, the president, Forney Hutchinson, in the chair.

THE PRESIDENT announced Hymn No. 560:

"And are we yet alive,
And see each other's face",

and led in the recital of the Apostle's Creed.

R. M. WHEELER led in prayer.

THE CONFERENCE united in singing Hymn No. 19,

“Come thou fount of every blessing”.

THE PRESIDENT read and briefly expounded Galatians 6:1-10 and called for prayer in behalf of Bishop Mouzon, that he might be speedily restored to health, and for Bishop Kern, who is coming to preside over the Conference.

J. H. BILLINGSLEY led in prayer.

THE JOURNAL of yesterday was read and approved.

THE ROLL of absentees was called by the secretary and 15 clerical and 11 lay members responded to their names.

UPON MOTION it was ordered to dispense with further calling of the roll.

SUBSTITUTIONS: The name of Roy H. Downey was substituted for that of Dr. F. E. Wood from the Lewisburg District; Mrs. J. D. Orcutt for Mrs. C. E. Dare from the Washington District, and R. Clarence Thomason for Edward T. Fritts from the Winchester District.

COMMITTEES: The nominations of the presiding elders for the several committees were presented and read, and upon motion they were elected.

ON MOTION of John Paul Tyler, the secretary was instructed to send messages of love and sympathy to the absent superannuate brethren and those who are sick.

INTRODUCTIONS: Dr. W. N. Thomas, Chaplain U. S. Navy; Dr. G. L. Morelock, Secretary General, Board of Lay Activities; Dr. S. C. Hatcher, Vice-President Randolph-Macon College, and Dr. Theodore C. Jacks, President Randolph-Macon Woman's College, were introduced to the Conference.

Dr. T. D. Ellis, Secretary of the General Board of Church Extension, was introduced and addressed the Conference relative to the work of the Board of Church Extension.

THE REPORT of the Trustees of the Home for the Aged and Orphans was presented and read.

Herman M. Wilson, Superintendent of the Home, addressed the Conference in its behalf, and upon motion the report was adopted.

The report of the Treasurer of the Home for the Aged and Orphans was read and placed on record.

W. S. HAMMOND, Chairman of the Commission on Budget, announced to the Conference that the Budget Commission was recommending that the total amount to be assessed for conference work for the ensuing year be eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) and the assessment for general work for the same period be sixty thousand dollars (\$60,000) and the recommendation was upon motion adopted.

THE NOMINATIONS of the presiding elders for the Conference Board of Christian Education were presented and they were elected.

QUESTION TWENTY-TWO of the General Minutes was called, namely: "Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration?"

PRESIDING ELDERS: John Paul Tyler, presiding elder of the Baltimore District; Charles L. DeLong, presiding elder of the Lewisburg District; Harry C. Marsh, presiding elder of the Moorefield District, and John C. Copenhaver, presiding elder of the Roanoke District, represented the condition of their several districts, and their characters were examined and passed.

THE ORDER of the day having arrived,* J. J. Rives moved that when the ballot on the Constitutional Question concerning the tenure of office of presiding elders was taken, it be taken without debate, and the motion prevailed.

THE SECRETARY read the question as formulated by the College of Bishops, and the following were appointed as tellers: E. S. Sheppe, Harry S. Coffey, A. I. Orndoff and E. W. Aaron. N. B. Harmon, Jr., was appointed secretary to the tellers.

THE VOTE was taken and the tellers retired to count the ballots.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE was requested by the Secretary for C. R. Curtis, assistant secretary, who was called away on account of the death of his mother. The Conference stood in expression of its sympathy and was led in prayer by John C. Copenhaver.

THE TELLERS returned with the result of the ballot on the Constitutional Question as follows: Votes cast, 292. Ayes, 241; noes, 51.

A TELEGRAM was received from Bishop Mouzon expressing his appreciation for the sympathy and prayers of the Conference, and announcing he would be able to reach the seat of Conference by Sunday morning.

THE ORDER of the day having arrived, the report of the Board of Christian Education was presented and read. H. H. Sherman, Executive Secretary of the Board, addressed the Conference in behalf of the report.

W. M. Alexander, D.D., Secretary of the Department of Schools and Colleges of the General Board of Christian Education, and Dr. R. M. Blackwell, President of Randolph-Macon College, were introduced and addressed the Conference with reference to their particular work. The report was upon motion adopted.

DR. ELMER CLARK was introduced and addressed the Conference with reference to the work of the General Board of Missions, and presented Dr. Channing H. Tobias, Senior Secretary of the Colored Work of the Y. M. C. A. in New York City, who represented the Joint Commission of Cooperation between the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church.

Mr. W. F. White, representing the Richmond Branch of the Publishing House, urged an increased patronage on the part of our people, that larger returns might be made for the benefit of our superannuated preachers, their widows and orphans.

CONFERENCE adjourned with singing and the benediction by E. L. Woolf to meet tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

THIRD DAY.

Morning Session.

Saturday, October 6th, 1934.

CONFERENCE met pursuant to adjournment, Bishop Paul B. Kern in the chair.

Hymn No. 463 was sung:

THE BISHOP read the eighth chapter of Romans and led in prayer. CONFERENCE united in singing Hymn No. 222:

"Jesus the name high over all,
In earth, or hell or sky."

THE JOURNAL of yesterday was read and approved.

QUESTION TWENTY-TWO of the General Minutes was resumed. S. K. Cockrell, presiding elder of the Rockingham District; J. Howard Wells, presiding elder of the Washington District, and W. F. Locke, presiding elder of the Winchester District, represented the condition of their respective districts and their characters were examined and passed.

ON MOTION of D. M. Brown it was ordered that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet in memorial session Sunday afternoon at three o'clock.

QUESTION ONE of the General Minutes was called, namely: "Who are admitted on trial?" The recommendations of Charles Albert McCormick, Jr., from the Roanoke District Conference; Lance Keith Knowles from the Washington District Conference, and Benjamin Wierman Coe from the Winchester Conference were presented, and having passed in examination before the Committee on Course of Study and having been recommended by the Committee on Admissions they were on motion severally admitted on trial.

QUESTION TWO of the General Minutes was called, namely: "Who else is in the Class of the First Year?"

The names of Hugh Lafayette Shiley and Harry Cleveland Rickard were called and they were reported as not having passed an approved examination before the Committee on the Course of Study. On motion

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.**Report No. 1.***General Statement:*

The report of the Executive Secretary shows that although we have had during the year some serious interruptions and hindrances, real progress has been made as is shown by the several statistical tables. But statistics can reveal only a small part of the work. The intangibles are the most important elements and cannot be expressed in figures. There is a very definite increase in the interest and activities of our people in the field of Christian education. All educational processes are slow, especially among larger groups.

There is no conflict between the revival method of building the Kingdom and the educational method, but many of our pastors and people have depended largely upon the revival and neglected the educational method. Both must be used if we are to build wisely and permanently. It is a case of "both-and", not "either-or". Our preachers and people are becoming more educationally-minded. The pastor is logically the director of religious education in his charge. The wise pastor recognizes this. Of course, he has many helpers and associates but he is "in charge". Likewise, the presiding elder is director of religious education in his district, with many assistants and helpers.

District Institutes:

Soon after the last Annual Conference, district institutes were held in all of the districts with a total attendance of approximately 1,000 (one thousand) preachers and laymen. The work of the previous year was reported and reviewed and plans for the new year explained and launched with considerable enthusiasm, and a fuller knowledge and appreciation of our entire program of Christian education. Miss Mary Skinner of the Nashville office was with us and rendered valuable service.

We are recommending a similar series of institutes again this year which Rev. O. W. Moerner of Nashville is expected to attend.

Local Church Boards:

The importance of the Local Church Board cannot be overestimated. It is absolutely necessary to a successful program of religious education. Diligent effort is being made to set up this board in each church and to see that it functions properly. Pastors and presiding elders are earnestly urged to cooperate in this effort. Its membership was slightly changed by the General Conference in the interest of simplicity and efficiency.

Training Work:

Notwithstanding the numerous difficulties and hindrances, more than the usual amount of training work has been done during the

year. Twenty-two standard schools and eleven standard classes have been held, the total number of standard credits being 1,668. Forty-three Cokesbury classes have been reported with nearly 400 credits issued. The enrollment and attendance in the schools and classes are considerably greater than the number of credits issued, many of the students being audit students, so that at least 500 more people have received substantial benefit from the courses offered than have received credits.

The Conference Training School at Front Royal, in the opinion of many who generally attend, was the best we have ever held in many important respects, including personnel of faculty and courses offered, but the attendance was smaller and disappointing.

Special attention is called to Dr. Norman E. Richardson's course on Worship, which, it is hoped, will be continued in the school next year, according to plans already tentatively made.

We report a much better financial showing for the school this year. Last year there was a deficit of about \$350.00, reducing our surplus to about \$100.00. This year we not only paid current expenses, but also recovered a large part of our last year's surplus.

Young People's Division:

The Young People's work is well organized, both in the Annual Conference and in the districts. The assembly at Massanetta reached high-water mark in attendance, interest and influence, and was satisfactory financially. The total enrollment, including the faculty and staff, was 531. An excellent Intermediate Assembly was held at Front Royal with an attendance of 168, including the faculty and staff. The Moorefield District Institute was held again this year at Van Myra Camp with Christian Culture and Christian Adventure Departments.

Daily Vacation Church Schools:

Seventy-two vacation schools have been reported to the office with an enrollment of 5,034. We have reason to believe that many others have been held, but not reported. It is probable that the number held is 100, with a total enrollment of 7,500. This is a growing and important feature of our Church's program of Christian education.

Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise:

The receipts for the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise from the fourth Sunday offering have been about the same as last year. Not many schools are sending in the 10% ordered by the Annual Conference. We recommend that the new board give careful consideration to this cause in which, as far as practicable, the law of the Church should be observed.

Finances and Statistics:

Notwithstanding extra expenses during the year, the work has been carried on within the budget limits, a full financial exhibit will be

published in the conference minutes as usual. The Executive Secretary's report contains detailed tabulations of statistics on Training Work, Sunday School Day Offerings, Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise, contributions, Extension Work and Ministerial Supply and Training.

Recommendations covering the various features of the work of the board have been included in the report of the Executive Secretary and passed on to the new board for their consideration. They will make their report to the Conference later. We commend their recommendations on this great interest of our Church to your prayerful and sympathetic cooperation.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Report No. 3.

Your Board of Christian Education recommends:

1. That the presiding elders and pastors, through district organizations and Local Church Boards of Christian Education, see that there is an effective program of Christian education in every local church, in harmony with the law of the Church.
2. That the training work—Standard and Cokesbury—be continued and extended into every possible field.

3. That Church School Day, with program and offering, be observed in every local church as soon after Easter as possible; and that the law of the Church be observed with reference to the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise, provided that where this is impracticable, at least 10% of the fourth Sunday offerings be applied as the Discipline directs.

4. That the presiding elders be requested to see that a vigorous promotional campaign is carried out in the interest of both Church School Day and the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise, and further that the presiding elders be earnestly requested to ascertain at each quarterly conference whether the action of the Annual Conference is being observed with reference to the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise.

5. That Randolph-Macon College Day or week be observed in every congregation, beginning on the second Sunday of January, with an offering for the chair of Religious Education in the Randolph-Macon College, and that we recommend the schools of the Randolph-Macon System to the patronage of our people.

6. That the General Board of Christian Education be requested to make the following appropriations for student work in state institutions:

REPORT OF BOARD OF FINANCE.

No other interest of the Church has a warmer place in the hearts of the people called Methodists than the care of their honored retired ministers, their widows and orphans. Your board, charged with the task of administering this care, has not been unmindful of this, and has proceeded to conduct its affairs in accordance thereto.

Your Board of Finance has, in accordance with paragraph 363, changed the method of distribution of the funds which it handles, to give the best possible care to the many claimants upon this fund. It has not been at all easy, but with patience and affection we believe we have been able to do the work assigned with a result which we trust will be of the greatest good to these honored ones of the Conference.

It is with pleasure we call attention to the report of the General Board of Finance, in which we are told that the General Superannuate Endowment Fund is \$6,261,193.90. The amount which the General Board administered for the Baltimore Conference is \$95,257.97, from which the Conference Board received \$2,801.07 as against \$3,289.07 or \$488 less than last year.

There remains uncollectable on the adjusted quotas of the Superannuate Endowment Fund a balance of \$22,691.32. It is earnestly desired that this amount be raised during the present quadrennium. The campaign will be continued that this amount may be collected, and the pastors are urged to give proper attention thereto. We request Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon to appoint Rev. Harry P. Baker, the nominee of the General Board, as Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment in connection with his regular work in the Conference.

The board has received from the Corporate Board of Finance \$5,000; from the Publishing House \$2,237.82; and from the General Board of Finance \$2,801.07.

The payments of the board to the claimants this year will be \$12 per service year to the superannuates; \$6 per service year to the widows; and to the orphans \$75; with adjustments for necessity in accordance with paragraph 363, and the action of the Conference.

The Group Insurance, which this Conference has purchased, has been committed to this board and is still in force. 210 of the preachers are members of this insurance group. It is very necessary that all continue their membership and all others eligible sign up without delay, especially the young men of the Conference, that the premiums be kept down to the minimum; that their dependents be given some measure of security; and the interests of the brethren be protected. As an economy measure the board has voted to merge the office of Conference Insurance Secretary with that of the Conference Treasurer and has elected the Conference Treasurer the insurance agent without salary, in connection with his work as Conference Treasurer.

We further recommend that the President of the Board of Finance, together with the Conference Insurance Agent, do the promotional work of the group insurance.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.

As representatives of a Church that was founded by a man who was a prolific writer and publisher, and who, all his days, was tremendously interested in the power of the press, we continue to be deeply interested in the work of our Publishing House, which shows a healthy condition and has a promising future. Our preachers are urged to patronize this, our own Publishing House, and to keep it before their people as much as possible. Our general organ, the "Christian Advocate", is now the official organ of the Board of Lay Activities and of the Wesley Brotherhood, as well as of the Church in general. There is no real conflict in interest between this publication and our own conference paper; yet a survey of our conference minutes shows that our laymen do not patronize the "Christian Advocate".

The attention of your board was necessarily centered upon the problems confronting our conference organ, "The Baltimore Southern Methodist". That you may have some idea of its problems, we give a brief review of its history for the past year. The 1933 session of the Annual Conference directed that the offices of the paper be removed from Baltimore, Md., to Salem, Va. This change was made as soon as the printer who, at that time had the contract, could be satisfied. This move necessarily entailed some expense and a great deal of extra work

We congratulate the management, however, on the fact that only one issue of the paper was missed, and the publication was begun at Salem with a remarkable degree of smoothness for the beginning of such an enterprise.

Not only did the paper have a new place of publication this year, but it also had a new business manager and managing editor and staff of editors.

The paper has made splendid progress both financially and in point of service under the management of Dr. F. M. Richardson. The board wishes also to express its utmost appreciation of the services rendered by the staff of editors, Drs. F. J. Prettyman, M. D. Mitchell and N. B. Harmon, Jr.

Recognizing also, that the district correspondents, whose business it is to furnish most of the news of the Conference, are an invaluable adjunct to the staff of the paper, we go on record as appreciating their services.

One difficulty that has been increased by the removal of the offices of the paper to Salem is that of getting together the stockholders and board of directors of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company. It is, however, necessary, so long as this company is in existence, to have at least one meeting of the stockholders every year in the state of Maryland. This is very difficult due to the fact that many of the stockholders have been claimed by death and their places have not always been taken; some of them are unable to attend the meetings and do not send proxies, whereas no meeting can be held until there is present a majority of the stockholders or their proxies.

There is next the increased difficulty of borrowing, due to the uncertainty of the amount of the assessment under the New Financial Plan.

In order to meet these difficulties and to carry on the publication of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist" for another year, your board makes the following recommendations:

1. That the Southern Methodist Publishing Company be requested to continue the publication of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist" for another year.
2. That the executive committee of the Board of Christian Literature, together with the executive committee of the Board of Directors of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company, be constituted a joint committee to work out, during the coming year, a plan whereby these difficulties may be adjusted; this committee to meet on the call of the editor of the conference paper and to report to the Annual Conference at its regular session in 1935.
3. We recommend that the Conference authorize the Board of Christian Literature, through the business management of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist", to take definite steps to pay off the old indebtedness of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), thus relieving the Publishing

Company of an indebtedness incurred by them for the welfare of the Conference.

4. We recommend that the Conference authorize the Board of Directors to borrow, during the Conference year 1934-35, the funds necessary to meet the current expenses of the paper; provided, however, that the borrowing agent be bonded not to execute loans in excess of four thousand dollars (\$4,000), which is the reasonable amount to be expected from the proceeds of the askings.

5. We recommend that the Budget Committee be asked to levy an assessment of seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500) to be included in the conference budget this year.

6. We recommend that the Conference request our bishop to appoint Dr. F. M. Richardson editor of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist" for the year 1934-35.

7. We recommend further that Miss Maude Hodges be retained as secretary to the editor.

8. We recommend that the salary of Dr. Richardson be fixed at three thousand dollars (\$3,000), he to furnish his own home and take care of his traveling expenses; and that the salary of Miss Hodges be fixed at fourteen hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,450).

9. We further recommend that an effort be made to set up an endowment fund through bequests and annuities, which shall eventually make the paper more nearly self-sustaining.

10. Finally, we recommend that a committee composed of Dr. F. M. Richardson, Rev. W. W. McIntyre and Rev. C. M. LeFew be appointed to confer with like committees from the Holston and Western Virginia Conferences; these committees to work out a satisfactory plan for a joint publication for the three Conferences. This committee is to report its plan to the next Annual Conference, which shall accept, reject or amend the plan as it shall see fit.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Conference Board has been embarrassed in making the appropriations for the reason that needs are so great and we have so little to give. Ninety-five per cent. of all applications are for old debts. In many cases the debt is so heavy, some of the members are deserting their churches on this account. We ask for continued loyalty and look forward to the time of rapid liquidation of debts.

The following is a paragraph from a letter to the Conference Board which we are sure can be read with interest:

"The Church as well as the entire country has been passing through years of serious financial depression. This financial

condition came upon us rather suddenly and found many congregations heavily burdened with debt, with large programs of work, and decreased income. The Board of Church Extension has tried to give sympathetic cooperation to congregations embarrassed by church debts, especially to those churches which have loans from the Board of Church Extension. The board has granted extensions of time reducing the amount of annual and semi-annual payments, and accepted interest at 4% even though accounts were overdue and according to contract called for 6%. We feel sure that most churches which have loans from the board have appreciated this attitude and many of them have responded nobly and made payments even at the cost of genuine sacrifice. We regret to say, however, that some congregations which were able to make payments have taken advantage of financial conditions and the sympathetic attitude of the board and have not responded in a spirit of cooperation. We are calling your attention to this condition in the hope that you will urge all churches which have loans from the General and Conference Boards to make plans in the financial set-up of the new Conference Year to make reasonable payments on Church Extension loans."

REPORT OF BIBLE BOARD.

We your Bible Board respectfully submit the following report:

In the time of unrest and uncertainty in which we are living there is a pressing need of sane clear thinking upon the problems facing us not only upon the part of our leaders in Church and State, but also upon the part of the constituency of these.

Such thinking can take place only when the data upon which it is based is sound and choice.

It therefore requires in these times that the choicest wisdom of the world's greatest sages be made available to humanity everywhere.

This wisdom is found in the Word of God as He spoke to the Prophets and through His Son and the Evangelists who followed Him, and which they recorded in our Bible.

We, therefore, rejoice in and are happy to give you the following summary of the report received by us from the American Bible Society. This report shows remarkable progress in the distribution of the world's choicest wisdom, the Bible, to the world's peoples.

The American Bible Society made advances during 1933 despite reduced income.

Translation.

Translation was carried forward in Africa, Guatemala, the Philippines, China and Turkey. Recent statistics show that the entire Bible has been translated into 175 languages and translation of Scripture has taken place in 940 languages and dialects.

Publication.

Publication of the Scriptures has taken place in languages spoken in Turkey, New Mexico, the Philippine Islands, and West Africa.

A new series of self-pronouncing Bibles at 25c. for the entire Bible, 5c. for the New Testament and 2c. for the Gospels, was published during the year so that no one need to be without the Scriptures.

Distribution.

The year 1933 saw the issuance of 7,800,000 copies of Scripture through the agencies of the American Bible Society. Remarkable advances in distribution were seen in China, the upper Andes, Brazil, and the Caribbean territory.

Two new Bible Houses were completed and dedicated in Tokio and Rio de Janeiro.

In its 118 years of existence the Society has circulated approximately 255,000,000 volumes of Scripture—"a ministry in the Christian enterprise incapable of being quickly evaluated."

Service to the Blind.

Last year the Society produced an "embossed" volume of Scriptures for the blind at 25c.

The New York Bible House distributed 2969 volumes in seven different systems making a total of 95,324 volumes distributed during the 99 years of such service.

Universal Bible Sunday this year, December 9, marks the four hundredth anniversary of the publication of the translation of Martin Luther's Bible. It is noteworthy that this is coincident with the 150th anniversary of the founding of American Methodism, which is the direct descendant of the revival which swept England because of the experience which came to Mr. Wesley in Aldersgate Street during the reading of Martin Luther's preface to the book of Romans.

A stereoptican lecture entitled "The Book Goes Forth", describing Scripture distribution at home and abroad, is available through the agencies of the Society free of rental charge, and we commend its use by our pastors as well as the use of other materials furnished free by the Society for use in addresses and sermons.

In these days of financial strain the Bible Society looks to the Churches of America for financial support in carrying on its indispensable missionary work. All its financial processes are carefully examined annually by an advisory council, whose representatives are officially appointed by the supporting denominations but like every religious agency its income has been woefully reduced.

Your committee respectfully presents for adoption the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, The American Bible Society is engaged in a missionary labor indispensable to the whole Christian enterprise, be it

Resolved, First, That we heartily endorse the work of the American Bible Society in its encouragement of a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures;

Second, That inasmuch as December 9, 1934 has been designated as Universal Bible Sunday, the ministers of this body cooperate in emphasizing the importance of the Holy Scriptures.

REPORT No. 1 OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

The Church moves forward in the midst of the ruins of a broken and disappointed world. There never has been a time in the history of civilization when world events crowded more quickly upon us and

moral issues were so much to the fore. The present condition of world affairs is both a challenge and a responsibility. In the face of the unparalleled conditions the missionary cause of our Church has shared with others the limitations of present day economic conditions. Our great Church was the last to yield to the necessity of recalling from foreign fields some of our devoted missionaries. Expenditures of the General Board of Missions have been curtailed in order to meet the present income. We face the future with determination and with faith, believing as we do that the ideal of missions represents the heart of the Christian Gospel.

We recognize with appreciation the presence among us of Dr. Elmer T. Clark, whose message of encouragement and assurance of the security of our mission policy give us hope.

We hereby nominate Rev. W. H. Best as missionary secretary of the Baltimore Conference to serve without compensation and in connection with a charge, and we respectfully request Bishop Mouzon to appoint him.

REPORT NO. 1 FROM THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES.**Church Finance.**

One of the major responsibilities of our board is to "promote a sound financial system in every local church". Probably no field in which we labor holds greater possibilities for real service to the Church. Fortunately, we have an effective tool at hand. Dr. J. E. Crawford, Associate Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities, was asked to write a book on Church Finance. This splendid volume, "Financial Recovery for the Local Church", has just been published and is our official book on church finance for this quadrennium. We bespeak for this book an immediate and wide circulation.

Benevolences.

The last General Conference gave to the Church a new financial plan. The lay organization is related directly to the whole scheme of cultivation and promotion of the benevolences. We are facing one of the most crucial periods in the history of our Church—the transition from the old to the new financial plan. This offers wonderful possibilities of developing in our membership a new vision, a new zeal, a new loyalty and a new consecration. A wrong attitude would prove disastrous to the Church.

We heartily support the voluntary principle and we believe that generous provision should be made for the benevolences by every quarterly conference and that an honest effort should be made to pay all that is pledged. Our task is continuously and effectively to create sentiment throughout the Church in favor of the connectional program of Methodism. This calls for more intensive education with reference to every feature of that program. We must bring to our entire membership a conviction that when a congregation thinks of itself alone in its local program, it ceases to be a Christian Church.

Hence we make the following recommendations:

1. That a mass meeting of stewards and other church officers and pastors be held in each district, as soon as practicable after the session of the Annual Conference, for the purpose of giving information concerning the New Financial Plan and creating inspiration for the acceptance by every quarterly conference of an amount for general and conference work that will represent a generous share in the benevolent program of our Church; and that the presiding elder and district lay leader give direction to all the details of the program.
2. That one-half of all the benevolences be paid by Easter or the session of the district conference.
3. That proper emphasis on the benevolences and the New Financial Plan be given at the session of the district conference.

4. That we respectfully request our Bishop and Conference Lay Leader to give direction and leadership to all necessary publicity and program.

REPORT NO. 2 OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES.

In addition to church finance, which is considered in report No. 1 from this board, we respectfully submit the following:

Christian Stewardship.

Christian stewardship furnishes a background for a proper understanding of a layman's responsibility to God and his Church, and offers a worthy incentive for the fulfillment of that responsibility and thus lays a solid foundation upon which the Church can build permanently.

We are gratified to note that steady progress has been made in this important field. The Discipline instructs that "A definite period during the year, preferably at a time when no immediate financial objective is in view, shall be designated, in which major emphasis shall be given to the study and promotion of stewardship principles." We recommend that in each church in the Conference this period of study and promotion be observed throughout the month of January, 1935.

We recommend that Stewardship Study Classes be promoted in the following ways:

1. Courses in stewardship in Standard Training Schools.
2. Use of Standard Class when Standard School is not feasible.
3. Urging Young People's Classes and Adult Classes to elect stewardship study for one quarter instead of the regular international lessons, using Dr. Crawford's book, "Stewardship Life", as a text.

We should magnify the benevolences as a challenging stewardship objective, worthy of the finest and best response our people can make.

Men's Work and Evangelism.

As social beings men crave fellowship. We believe it is the duty and privilege of the Church to furnish the avenue through which that may be found. Therefore, we suggest the continued organization of Brotherhoods under the direction of the pastor, wherever it is practicable, for fellowship, for study, and for personal evangelism.

When Jesus said, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men", He was speaking to us. We believe the greatest undeveloped asset in our Church today is our man-power. The great need is for men workers. Our bishops have suggested as a goal for this quadrennium 750,000 new members. A group of twelve persons to win only one in twelve months would achieve this goal. Certainly we could not expect the Church to do less. Therefore, we urge increased evangelistic effort

through educational processes, personal contacts and mass appeals, looking toward that perfect day when all men shall acknowledge our Saviour as Lord and Master.

Lay Speaking and the Church Press.

We urge that every board of stewards have a Committee on Lay Speaking, and that this committee, in cooperation with the pastor, formulate and carry forward a systematic program of lay speaking on the objectives our General Conference has outlined for us to promote. Adult class sessions, mid-week services, and preaching services offer weekly opportunity for three-minute speeches, and occasional opportunity for full programs.

Our district lay leaders have no greater duty and opportunity than to cooperate with his presiding elder, and associate and charge lay leaders, in working out a program of lay speaking so as to provide an evangelistic service in every rural church every Sunday.

We recommend the continuance of "Laymen's Day" and designate the second Sunday in June, or the Sunday as near thereto as practicable, for the observance of the day. For 1935 we recommend the theme, "WE'RE IN THE FIGHT" for:

1. The Christian Home.
2. A Christian Industrial Order.
3. A Sober Nation.
4. A Warless World.
5. We'll Fight this Fight to the End.

We commend the merging of "The Methodist Layman" with "The Nashville Christian Advocate" and heartily accept the opportunity and responsibility involved. We suggest as our immediate goal "Every member of the board of stewards a reader of 'The Nashville Christian Advocate'."

But in using and promoting the circulation of our general organ, we must not by any means make less use of, or give less support to, our conference organ and "The World Outlook". These valuable periodicals are needed in every Methodist home.

Training Official Boards.

Progress has already been made in this field. The work should be extended and intensified. For this purpose we recommend the continued use of institutes for stewards and the organization of boards of stewards into groups to study "The Board of Stewards" by G. L. Morelock and "Financial Recovery of the Local Church" by J. E. Crawford.

The Board of Lay Activities in joint session with the presiding elders of the Conference nominated M. L. Walton, Jr., as Conference Lay Leader.

REPORT NO. 3 OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES.

We are fully conscious of the great responsibility that the General Conference has laid upon our board in adopting, at its last session, "The Social Creed of the Churches", found in paragraph 593 of the 1934 Discipline. We urge pastors and people to read and study it. Many of its objectives are of vital importance if social justice and social cleanliness are to be secured and maintained, and yet so difficult to attain in the complex civilization of today, that we ought to understand them thoroughly, while committed to them irrevocably.

Endorsing this creed, we believe our people should be, and are, definitely committed to the elimination of objectionable "movies"; that protective influences should be thrown around the family and home life and all destructive agencies combatted; that our Church should direct its energies against international war and the conditions which make war possible; that our members should continue their efforts to destroy the liquor traffic with its consequent train of evils; and that there should be economic justice as well as social justice for the laboring classes of our nation.

**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE AND
SOCIAL SERVICE.**

Your Committee on Temperance and Social Service (as we expected under repeal of the prohibition law), is convinced that we are facing a critical situation as regards the distribution and control of intoxicating beverages.

Recent figures, gathered by the Methodist Board of Temperance and Prohibition and Public Morals, show over thirty-one per cent. increase in drunkenness in one hundred and ninety-two cities during the first three months of 1934, as compared with a similar period of the preceding year.

The board reported an alarming increase in arrests for drunkenness in industrial areas. In some instances arrests were shown to be as high as 110%.

The first nine months of repeal have seen liquor interests defying all laws of liquor control, according to a recent statement of the American Business Men's Research Foundation of Chicago, which says, "Everywhere the liquor traffic and the liquor trade press are boldly assailing and recklessly advocating nullification of every legal curb they choose to oppose."

Further evidence of the liquor dealers revolt against control is given in the report of Jessie F. Binford, director of the Juvenile Protective Association of Chicago, for more than thirty years regarded as one of

the most important agencies of social welfare in the city. Miss Binford notes the serious problem presented by the "new tavern", such as women drinking, and says that there are more drunks, both men and women, than in the days of the old saloon.

In the face of these glaring facts, what can we as a great Church do? We as a committee recommend, that we again assert our position as to the liquor traffic.

First—By calling attention to the requirements of the Discipline, which we quote as follows: "Let all our preachers and members abstain from the manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquors to be used as a beverage, from signing petitions for their sale, from becoming bondsman for any person as a condition for obtaining a license, from acting as a dispenser or voluntarily accepting an appointment or election as such under the laws of any state in which there is a dispensary law authorizing the sale of intoxicating liquors by the state, county or municipality, and from renting property to be used for such sale."

Second—That Southern Methodism will stand firm in the future as in the past for such an educative and legislative program as will accomplish the destruction of the liquor traffic.

We also recommend:

First—That we, as a Church and as individuals, give active cooperation with the agencies now at work for a better observance of the Lord's Day.

Second—That we urge the establishment of family altars in the homes of our people.

Third—That we do all in our power to secure uniform divorce laws, and thus lessen the increase of divorces in our land.

Fourth—That we unite with other agencies in the attempt to secure cleaner and better moving pictures, and that the ministers of the Church unitedly stand together in warning the members against the evils of the modern dance and card table, and urge them for the sake of the spiritual state of the Church and for their own souls that they desist from them.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

WHEREAS, the sanctity of the Lord's Day is vital alike to Home, Church and State.

WHEREAS, the Lord's Day should have a definite and important place in the educational program of the Church, be it

Resolved, by the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in session in Baltimore, Maryland, this the 6th day of October, 1934, that we endorse the Lord's Day educational program, and recommend that there be a Lord's Day Committee in every one of our charges, whose work it shall be to supervise a Lord's Day educational program in our local churches; and be it further

Resolved, that we request each of our presiding elders to name a Lord's Day Secretary for his district, whose work it shall be to secure, as rapidly as possible, the appointment of a chairman by the pastor of each church, who with the pastor and Sunday School superintendent shall constitute a Lord's Day Committee for that particular church, it being understood that this committee shall have power to add to its membership; and therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, that we request the leaders in our educational work to give the Lord's Day a definite place in the curriculum of our schools; therefore, be it further

Resolved, that we request our publishing interests to give the Lord's Day a larger place in our church literature, with a special reference to that prepared for our church schools and young people's work; and be it further

Resolved, that we endorse the work of those organizations whose work it is to promote the proper observance of the Sabbath, pledging them our whole-hearted cooperation.

And be it further recommended that we request our Conference to name Rev. R. C. Meeks a member of the educational committee of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland.

THE ELEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, HOME OF THE AGED AND ORPHANS OF THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE, METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH, SOUTH, INCORPORATED, AND LOCATED AT GAITHERSBURG, MD.

In a peculiar sense the Home for the Aged is the fruition of a liberal voluntary service and a generous labor of love. We look upon the

citation of Deuteronomy, eleventh chapter and twelfth verse, appearing in the first report of the Board of Trustees to the Baltimore Conference, as a prediction having been verified over a trying decade. The text reminds us of "a land which the Lord thy God careth for; the eyes of the Lord are always upon it, from the beginning of the year even unto the end of the year."

The Conference will welcome the report that the Home has closed another year with a small financial balance and a larger number of friendly supporters. This is due in the main to the skillful management and the untiring devotion of the Superintendent and the employed staff of the Home. Our report is considered noteworthy when reviewed in the light of existing circumstances.

Guests: Nine guests have been received during the year, making a total of seventy. Six helpless patients are in the infirmary and others should be there, but we have no room. The health of the family in the main has been very good when the advanced age of the guests is considered. The spiritual needs of the family, as well as the temporal, occupy a very definite place in planning for the welfare of the guests.

Property: The grounds show definite improvement. Some voluntary improvements have also been made on the inside of the building, while a minimum of repair work has been done on the outside, although the need is evident, but our limited resources prohibited further outlay. The farm continues to be a valuable asset.

Assisting Agencies: The woman's guilds are increasing their activities. Guilds have been organized in the Washington, Baltimore, Winchester and Roanoke Districts and have accepted definite duties for improvements within the building. The fifth district is preparing to organize. Plans are ready for the formation of a Conference Guild as a means for correlating the work of the districts. Much credit also should be given the Home-Directors who have served most effectively in promoting interest in the Christmas and Mother's Day offerings in the several charges and in the promotion of the work in many other ways. Their continued effort is being encouraged.

Finances: The past year brought extra financial burdens. The original mortgage bonds matured May the first. The debt has been refinanced, reducing the rate of interest from 6% to 5%, saving the Home \$750.00 annually. The last bond issue is for \$75,000.00, which is \$25,000.00 less than the first, and this figure represents every dollar of our indebtedness, against which we hold assets amounting to \$290,700.00. We congratulate the Sunday Schools and congregations and their leaders for making this a banner year—presenting the largest offering in the history of the Home. And this has been accomplished in spite of the fact that 188 Sunday Schools and 285 congregations failed to report an offering.

Epworth Church, Washington, made the largest Christmas offering. Mount Vernon Place Church, Washington, made the largest Mother's Day offering and Epworth, Washington, headed the list with the largest combined offering totaling \$336.96. We note with pleasure the substantial gain in the amount of these free-will offerings.

All in all, this has been a favorable year in the work committed to us. The board joins the Superintendent of the Home in the just recognition that only divine guidance and the Father's blessing make such things possible. Ours is indeed a work of faith. Others may call it what they will, we call it a miracle.

Second, we request the presiding elders, at their first quarterly conference, to ask this question: "Who is elected Director of the Home for the Aged?" and to report the names and addresses to the Superintendent of the Home.

Third, in view of the new financial legislation, we request the Conference to authorize a continuance of the Christmas and the Mother's Day offerings in every Sunday School and congregation, because without this source of income it is impossible to sustain the Home. Furthermore, we request the superintendents of all our Sunday Schools and the pastors of all our churches to take an offering for the Home—Christmas and Mother's Day respectively.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE HOSPITAL BOARD.

The Conference Hospital Board, under the new legislation enacted by the last General Conference, eliminating the necessity for its further existence, is submitting its final report. Your board is grateful for the privilege of having served the Church and humanity in this capacity, but it feels that the action of the General Conference in combining this work with that of the Board of Missions is taking a step in the right direction.

The members of the board believe that a larger opportunity will now be presented to make the ministry of healing more appealing to our people and more vital to the needs in our own conference area, without narrowing the scope of interest and service in the general work.

It is the purpose of the board to direct its treasurer, George S. DeLong, after an auditing of his accounts to turn over the balance of the money to the treasurer of the Board of Missions.

REPORT OF FRANCIS ASBURY SCHOOL TRUSTEES.

The Trustees of the Francis Asbury School, in accordance with the recommendations of the board as approved by the Annual Conference one year ago, have begun to use the funds entrusted to them for scholarships awarded to under-privileged young people, thus carrying out the original purpose of the school, and the intent of the donors. For the school year 1933-34, 6 scholarships were awarded and paid, amounting to \$632.00. Six have been awarded for the current school year, 1934-35, amounting to \$700.00, the first installments of which have been paid. Three others were approved and awarded but not used.

The changes in the charter, suggested by the board and approved by the Annual Conference, were presented to the State Corporation Commission through Honorable George N. Conrad of Harrisonburg, Virginia. Some technical difficulties were encountered, which we think have been satisfactorily adjusted. In accordance with the charter as amended, we are presenting for your approval, the names of the following persons as trustees for the quadrennium, 1934-38: Mrs. W. H. Ballengee, Mrs. T. J. Copeland, S. K. Cockrell, George N. Conrad, J. H. Rosenberger, B. H. Riddleberger, E. A. Lambert, Watson E. Holley, J. H. Balthis, Edgar C. Beery and H. H. Sherman.

The treasurer's books were audited as of August 27, 1934, by a certified accountant, and found to be accurately and satisfactorily kept. The auditor's report was submitted to the board at its annual meeting and filed with the secretary. A summary of this report is as follows:

MEMOIRS.

BISHOP WILLIAM FLETCHER McMURRY

With profound sorrow our entire Church is brought to record the death on January 17, 1934, of one of its honored members, William Fletcher McMurry. His body reposes now in the old family burying ground at Shelbina, Mo. The outline of his life is stated in this tabulation:

William Fletcher McMurry was born June 29, 1864, in Shelby County, Mo., the son of Rev. William Wesley McMurry and Mary Elizabeth (Williams) McMurry. During the years 1880-82 he was a student in St. Charles College, and 1882-85 in Central College, Fayette, Mo. The degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him by Emory and Henry College, and the degree of Doctor of Laws by Kentucky Wesleyan College, Centenary College, and Central College. He began his ministry in the Missouri Conference in 1887, and for three years, 1887-90, was pastor at St. Joseph, Mo.; Macon, Mo., 1890-94; Richmond, Mo., 1894-98; presiding elder of the St. Joseph District, 1898-1901; transferred to the St. Louis Conference, and was presiding elder of the St. Louis District, 1901-02; pastor of Centenary Church, St. Louis, 1902-06. In 1906 he was elected by the General Conference Secretary of the Board of Church Extension, and reelected in 1910 and 1914. In 1918 he was elected Bishop. He was President of the Board of Church Extension, 1924-1930. President of the Board of Finance from its organization, and President of Central College 1924-30. On October 1, 1888, he was married to Miss Frances Byrd Davis, of St. Joseph, Mo. To this union were born five children: Claudia, Bernice (deceased), William Fletcher, Frances, and Wesley (deceased).

In his *History of Civilization* Buckle attributed to soil, climate, and general conditions the forces which determine social conditions. In like manner, there are factors which go far toward the making of a man. In the case of Bishop McMurry there were marked elemental influences. He breathed in his childhood the air of the wide prairies of North Missouri and grew up amid people inured to simplicity, frugality, industry, honesty, and manliness. His neighbors were individualists, capable of initiative and success. The ways and dreams of mid-westerners appealed to his growing understanding. He knew and wondered at men who made themselves conquerors of new and strange conditions. Roundabout him were those vigorous powers which, being woven into personality, produced a strong and self-reliant manhood. Besides the general circumstances of his childhood, William Fletcher McMurry had the benefit of a sturdy parental heritage. He was the son of an itinerant minister in the Missouri Conference who, like himself, was stalwart in mind and frame. His mother possessed those choice qualities of womanhood which enabled her to direct

the interests and training of a large family of sons and daughters. Growing up at the altar of the Church and amid the appeals of exemplary Christians, he could not avoid the consideration of that way of life which was to become his own ideal and purpose. He therefore early became a personal believer in Jesus Christ as his Saviour and dedicated himself to the service of the Christian ministry. After preparation in academic courses, having yielded to the divine call to preach the gospel, and being restless for his work, he began holding successful revival meetings and thus got a taste of the joy of calling sinners to repentance and directing saints in the way of life everlasting. He grounded himself in the elements of Arminian theology and became a persuasive, forceful preacher of the gospel as expressed in the language of Methodism. Never did he turn aside from the doctrinal paths of the fathers. His sermons were characterized by noble language, constructive thinking, and plain Biblical interpretation. The truths which he desired to enforce were illustrated by human incidents told in effective and tender language. His sermons were never dull. They often rose to heights of power and occasionally to grandeur. His hearers were always impressed with his earnestness and with his loyalty to his Master. Hundreds of people were converted under his ministry. He increased the membership of every Church of which he was pastor. His charges ranged from mission work at the beginning up to a Church of the largest membership in the connection.

The same success that attended him in his pastorates characterized him in his administrative duties in the Church. He was one of the very best presiding elders the Church has known. He organized his districts and directed his pastors and official members in such ways as to fill the statistical columns of annual reports with highly commendable figures. He could have little patience with a pastor who was negligent or ineffective. He desired every minister to be as earnest and industrious as himself and believed that diligence and steadfast purpose would produce worthy results. He believed that under faithful cultivation the garden of the Lord would prosper.

Having joined the Missouri Conference in 1887, and having transferred to the St. Louis Conference in 1901, he so generally impressed the Church that in 1906 he was made Secretary of the Board of Church Extension and thereupon began a most impressive Church-wide career, touching all the Annual Conferences and largely contributing to the deliberations of all the bodies of the Church which gave direction to denominational policies and plans. He early gained the reputation of being a secretary distinct and eminent in performance and ability. He rapidly built up the loan funds of the Board of Church Extension and was constantly called into widely separated sections for the purpose of lifting debts, financing church building enterprises, and improving the material welfare of the churches.

A man of such imposing build of body, such driving force of mind, such lavish expenditure of energy, such conspicuous power of leader-

ship, naturally stood on a high eminence before his brethren. He immediately became prominent in the midst of any assembly. His lofty stature, his orotund voice, his sound sense and poised statesmanship everywhere attracted admirers and followers. The result was that in 1918 he was chosen to be one of the bishops. His assignment to an episcopal district was an assurance of progress within those Conferences. No interest of the Church would be overlooked. Every detail in the affairs of the Conferences, presiding elders' districts, pastoral charges, would come under his watchful and discriminating eye. The impelling causes of the denomination would have his enthusiastic support. He would be sure to march at the head of the columns in all sectors of the progress of the Church of God. His ability as an administrator increased from the earliest years of his ministry through to the end of his enlarging responsibilities. Heavy loads were placed upon his shoulders. His brethren sought him for counsel in places obscure and in positions of the highest importance. He knew how to weigh the minute as well as the prominent factors of the problems he had to consider. When he had thought the questions through and stated his position in his characteristic language, his conclusion was likely to prevail.

Bishop McMurry was notably a builder. Lines of nobles architecture never failed to appeal to him. Strength and beauty always had his admiration. Houses of worship, the Church Extension Building in Louisville, the structures on the campus of Central College which were built under his presidency, all proclaim his devotion to chaste and lovely principles of building. Evidently he was a man of dreams. Although he was known as having a most dependable, practical understanding, yet he lived not in material or temporal confines. While he walked upon the earth his brow was lighted by the beams of the stars. Being one of the most human types of men, able to enjoy fond relationships and sure to nurture loving friendships, he could not but be a dreamer of dreams, happy in the realization of those elemental characteristics of life which lie far beneath the surface. He was a lover of books. Stirring fiction and noble poetry had their place in his reading. He enjoyed history, traced the political movements of the world, and delighted in great biography. The more intimately one became acquainted with the mind and soul of Bishop McMurry the more he was impressed with the secret tenderness of his nature, the stalwartness of his character, and the power of his mind.

A just estimate of Bishop McMurry would place him in the very foreranks of the tall men of the kingdom of God. His works in the earth bore abundant fruit. All that he did surpasses our ability of estimation and cannot be included in a short tribute to his life. They stand before the eyes of men and angels and proclaim him a star that shall shine forever.

OLIVER CROMWELL BEALL.

For sixty-one years the name of Oliver Cromwell Beall has been heard in the annual roll call of our Conference. His passing therefore adds another name to the lengthened list of those who have rendered veteran service for the cause of Christ in our conference territory.

The incidents of birth, parentage and early environments are features in common with his fellows, but with the variation of a romantic cast that reflects the character of his day and times that impressed his personality with a vigorous and rugged type of piety.

Brother Beall was born in a country home five miles northeast of Cumberland, Maryland, April 19, 1846. He was the fourth son of Margaret and William Beall. On the farm owned by his father stood a log "meeting house" called "Union". This building was succeeded by a brick edifice in 1853, which still stands, and is known as "Union Church", owned and served by the Methodist Episcopal Church. It was here at the age of fifteen that his religious experience took definite form under evangelistic preaching, in a conviction of sin, attended by the witness of the Spirit. It was here that the old-fashioned class meeting nurtured the spiritual life begun in faith and projected it into the path of service.

In 1867 he was appointed Sunday School superintendent under the auspices of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which began work in his community. In 1869 he was licensed to preach by the Flintstone quarterly conference and served as junior preacher on Franklin Circuit under the Rev. Thomas Hilderbrand.

The educational furnishings of Brother Beall began under the limitations of his day, but were pursued with diligence and deserving achievement. Public schools depended upon the local provisions of the community. He made good use of his limited opportunities, attained a proficiency that qualified him to teach and he served three years as teacher in the public schools. In 1870 he attended Preston and Olin Institute at Blacksburg, Va., and in 1871, Randolph-Macon College, under the presidency of Dr. James A. Duncan. He was graduated in one year with distinction.

The work of Brother Beall had its regular beginning at the Conference held in Warrenton, Va., 1872, presided over by Bishop Robert Paine. At this time he was received on trial and was sent to Loudoun Circuit as junior preacher with Dr. R. R. S. Hough. Alpheus W. Wilson was his presiding elder. In 1873 he was sent to Alexandria as junior preacher with Rev. E. F. Busey. In 1874 he was put in charge at Warrenton. In 1875 he was moved to Farmwell, now Sterling Circuit. Here three church buildings were added to the holdings of the denomination. His succeeding appointments were as follows: Martinsburg, 1879; Warren Circuit, 1880; Cedarville, 1881; Fairfax Courthouse, 1885; Edinburg, 1889; Hinton, 1892; Brucetown, 1896; Emory, 1900; Wesley Grove, 1904; Del Ray, 1906. At the Conference

of 1910 he was granted the superannuate relation. For the two successive years, however, he rendered active service as the junior preacher of Rev. F. A. Strother on Brucetown and Fairfax Circuits.

In 1877 Brother Beall was married to Miss S. K. Coleman whose character and sympathetic devotion greatly aided him in his pastoral work. She preceded him several years to the better land.

In the material things of the Kingdom Brother Beall wrought worthily. Notable achievements are the church building at Hinton, W. Va., and the parsonages at White Post and Edinburg.

Coming of stalwart, physical stock, Brother Beall was a striking personality among us. He possessed a unique manner and a sententious style of utterance which emphasized his individuality. The writer of this memoir shared his friendship through many years and ministered to the members of his family as pastor, a witness to their sturdy integrity and lofty faith under severe trial. Truly did he maintain and reflect the traditions of a Godly home, whose influence lives on in the "lives made better by their presence".

The closing years of his life were spent in the quiet of his home where the heavenly summons came at eventide, November 28, 1933, in his 88th year. Funeral services were held in Del Ray Church, Dr. J. Howard Wells in charge, assisted by Dr. E. V. Regester. A number of his brother ministers were present, sharing in the service and serving as honorary pallbearers. His body was taken to Cumberland, Md., and laid to rest near the scenes of his early life.

It is fitting that this sketch should close with the following significant tribute given the deceased, near the close of his many years of active superannuation in the Del Ray community, by the pastor, Dr. E. V. Regester:

"I have never known a man whose life has become so interwoven in the civic, social and religious interests of the community as his. He is the Elder Brother, the Pastor Emeritus and, indeed, the Bishop of our flock. He is so constantly in attendance upon all the services of the church; sitting twice every Sunday in the chancel, an inspiration to pastor and people; teaching his Bible Class and taking part in the social activities of the Church, until we have come to regard him as indispensable to the work. He is of the 'Old Guard' incarnating the faith of our fathers and exemplifying its fulness and power. We of Del Ray love him, honor him, revere him and will hold him, as long as God allows, in hallowed service and association; and when the 'roll is called up yonder' he will be ours still, for he and we shall be there."

NEWTON CAMPBELL RICE

"With long life I satisfy him." Length of life is not estimated by the number of years, but by service rendered. Some lives are both short

and long; short as to number of years, but long because filled with good. Such was the life of Newton Campbell Rice.

The memory of such a life should be preserved, not so much for the past, as for the future; in order that men may read and know what God can do with one who wholly follows his Lord.

Newton Campbell Rice was born at Travilah, Montgomery County, Md., May 3, 1879.

His father was George R. Rice, a successful farmer, and an elder in the Presbyterian Church. His mother was Elberta Moore Tschiffely of Washington, D. C.

Brother Rice was educated at the Andrew Small Academy, Darnestown, Md. His first position in the business world was that of clerk in a general merchandise store at Potomac, Md. He moved to Sandy Hook, Md., and took a similar position in a leading store of that town. Here he met Miss Virginia M. Himes, to whom he was married December 26, 1901. Later he moved to Quince Orchard, near Gaithersburg, Md., and went into business for himself.

Under the ministry of the late Rev. Harry W. Burruss, Brother Rice was converted. In writing a tribute to the memory of his pastor, he signed it thus: "Written by one who was sweetly led to the throne of grace by this beloved pastor, and who loved him so ardently." Brother Rice immediately joined the Methodist Church at Quince Orchard.

The writer of this memoir had the happy privilege of being his pastor for four years, and the friendship, formed at that time, grew in strength through the years. Outside the circle of his loved ones, none will miss him more.

His talents were soon recognized, and he was honored by being elected to the board of stewards; later he became the successful teacher of a class of young men, and assistant superintendent of the Sunday School.

Feeling the call to the ministry, he sold his business and his home, and, with his devoted wife, moved to Ashland, Va., where he entered Randolph-Macon College, to prepare for the ministry. His helpful and constant companion also took such subjects in the college that would further equip her to work by the side of her husband, in winning souls to Christ and building His kingdom.

As a preacher of the gospel, Brother Rice was clear, strong and forceful. His congregations went away deeply impressed with his intense earnestness and with spiritual food upon which they fed during the days to follow. He was gifted with evangelistic fervor; and wherever he labored, the Holy Spirit honored his preaching with genuine revivals, in which men and women were born again, and Christians were strengthened.

He was found in the home of mourning, bringing the comfort of God's word. He went where trouble was, and tenderly soothed

breaking hearts. He went where sin was, and pointed the sinner to the "Lamb of God which taketh away the sins of the world."

He was a builder and always left his charge better than he found it. He improved churches and parsonages and built new ones; and by his godly ministry, the spiritual life of his people was strengthened. He was able to adapt himself to all classes and ages. They saw in him a friend to be trusted, and they loved him.

The Master's message was his command; the Bible was to him, a divine book; and it wielded an immeasurable and ever increasing influence over his life; and he in turn influenced, for good and heaven, hundreds of his fellowmen. The world respected him; his people loved him, and the church honored him.

On May 28, 1927, his devoted wife was called to service in a higher realm.

August 27, 1928, Brother Rice married Miss Ocie McNeal Hidy of Highland County, Virginia. After five years of happy married life, she, with their young son, Newton Hidy, are left to mourn the going away of a true husband and father.

On Friday night, December 23, 1933, Brother Rice retired, apparently as well as usual. Sometime during the early hours of Saturday morning, God called him up higher, there to enter upon his eternal reward, and out of sleep he passed to the right hand of his Heavenly Father, there to await our coming.

His body lay in state in the Mt. Solon Church, of which he had been the pastor for only three months, from two o'clock until three, after which the funeral services were conducted by his presiding elder, Rev. S. K. Cockrell, assisted by Revs. W. H. Ballengee, O. D. Lambert, F. L. Strieby and C. W. Zimmerman of the Bretheren Church.

His body was taken to Darnestown, Md., where the second service was held in the Presbyterian Church December 25, which was participated in by Rev. Mr. Lowden, pastor of the church; Revs. F. A. Tyler, C. M. Sarver, W. T. Gover and P. C. Helmtoller, Jr.

In the family lot, his body was laid to rest on Christmas Day. His loved ones and friends know where he is; and while he cannot return to them, they can go to him.

REV. WILLIAM CLARK EARLY.

W. Clark Early was born November 22, 1893, in Staunton, Virginia, and died at Gaithersburg, Maryland, April 4, 1934. He was the oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Early, who still live at Staunton. He is survived by his wife and one son, Laress Clark; a brother, John Livering Early, an attorney in Sarasota, Florida, and a member of the

Florida legislature; a sister, Mrs. Earl Dortzbach, of New York City. A brother, Charles Alfred, May 18, 1918, by a powder mill explosion when employed as an assistant chemist.

His parents are very devout Christians and the home one of those most unusual into which he was born and reared. The best and most enduring education received in the course of life is that given by intelligent and pious parents to their children while young. Its importance cannot be over-estimated. This they believed and practiced and they saw the gracious outcome in Clark's becoming a Christian when a small boy. He loved his Lord always, and honored his parents and his Saviour by a devout Christian life and ministry.

He was educated in the public schools of his native city, and to obtain a higher education entered Asbury College at Wilmore, Kentucky, in the fall of 1912. There he met Miss Ruth Beevers, of Cleveland, Miss., who later became his wife. They entered together the junior year, both taking the Course of Expression and Public Speaking and graduating together in 1914. He then took a course in theology and received his A. B. degree, May, 1918. He and Miss Beevers were married June 4, 1918, at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lee Beevers of Cleveland, Miss. They lived most happily through the years and she was always to him a helpmate.

Brother Early was licensed to preach in the Kentucky Conference, M. E. Church, South, in the spring of 1916, while a student at college, and was admitted on trial into that Conference in September, 1917. He was transferred to the Baltimore Conference, April 5, 1918, the Conference being held at Central Church, Baltimore. He was appointed to Collierstown Circuit. However, he had served as assistant to Rev. H. S. Coffey on Fairfield Circuit the summer preceding. He remained at Collierstown only one year, desiring to pursue his education by going to a university. He could only do this by serving a student pastorate at the same time, which could not be obtained around Emory University where he so much desired to go. He therefore accepted a scholarship to Drew Theological Seminary at Madison, New Jersey, and a student charge as well in the M. E. Church, Newark Conference, of which he became a member in April, 1919, and he was appointed to Vienna and Janes Chapel, New Jersey, a charge which he served one year.

He entered Drew Seminary in the fall of 1919, and was a student there until the spring of 1920. He was ordained deacon by Bishop Luther B. Wilson March 21, 1920. In the fall of the same year he went to Boston University School of Theology and graduated there in the class of 1921 with the degree of Bachelor of Sacred Theology (S. T. B.). He transferred to the New England Southern Conference in the spring of 1921 and served a church at Fall River, Mass., until June, 1922, when he returned to the Baltimore Conference into which he had been received March 25, 1922. He was appointed to Hillsboro

Station, Lewisburg District, where he served faithfully and very efficiently for three years.

He was ordained elder by Bishop Warren A. Candler April 6, 1923, at the Conference held at West End Church, Roanoke, Virginia.

When Conference was held in Washington, D. C., March 25-30, 1925, Brother Early was sent to Middleburg Charge, Alexandria District, where he served three and a half years with much success. At the Conference held at Staunton, Virginia, September 26—October 1, 1928, Brother Early was appointed to South Roanoke Station, Roanoke, Virginia, a new and rapidly growing church. He did fine work there but his health was poor. He had become a victim of asthmatic trouble which continued with him at intervals in severity till his death.

At the Conference in Washington, D. C., September 25-29, 1930, Brother Early was sent to Frederick Avenue Church in Baltimore City, which was his last charge. It was a happy appointment both for preacher and congregation, and by their earnest cooperation and consecration the work greatly prospered. The church maintained its good standing notwithstanding the depression that affected seriously so many churches. The salary was not decreased and there was no falling off in any of the benevolent collections. He was returned for the fourth year and entered at once into the preparation for another successful year, but took a deep cold which rapidly resulted in pneumonia. After being in a hospital in Baltimore more than three weeks, he went to his brother's home in Sarasota, Florida, where he remained for some weeks recuperating in that climate. He returned early in January, somewhat improved but not in good condition. However, he soon started into his work with his usual zeal, but his heart had been weakened by his severe illness and in less than three months he suddenly passed away.

He was attending the Baltimore District Conference at Gaithersburg, Md., and went to the Methodist Home of the Aged as a guest of Rev. H. M. Wilson, superintendent, to spend the night. When about to retire to his room he remarked that he was tired. The next morning he was found dead in his room. He had preached to the Conference at 8.00 P. M., using as his subject, "God's Unfailing Love", and entered into his subject with very great earnestness as he always did, and the people heard him gladly. In closing he announced the hymn that was so very appropriate as it was not only the closing of that service, but the closing of his ministry on earth:

"O love that will not let me go!
I rest my weary soul on thee.
I give thee back the life I owe,
That in thine ocean depth its flow
May richer, fuller be."

That love held him steadfast to this hour through weariness, trials and affliction, but very soon he was gone to the land where "God's Un-

failing Love" is even more manifest than it is here—"richer and fuller".

"That in the sunsine's blaze its day
May brighter, fairer be."

Not only was Brother Early a gifted orator, but he was a most diligent and effective pastor, never sparing himself when duty called or when his people were sick or in distress in any way. He loved his people and they were devoted to him, recognizing in him a man of God, a leader with a pure heart and a challenging appeal to Christian service. The aged looked to him for comfort, and men in their prime found in him sane counsel and pastoral advice. The dying found direction and comfort in his words. The sinner was loved and pitied and was led to the One who saves from sin.

Each interest of the Church had his careful attention. From reports he made to the various Annual Conferences he never failed to meet assessments in full. He always worked hard and took great delight in serving. Weary though he often was in body, for he was not physically strong, yet his mind was ever alert. Preparation for the pulpit was a passion with him, it was so thorough, and he proclaimed the gospel in demonstration of the Spirit and of power. He was truly a gifted preacher, possessing far more than ordinary ability, and always interesting and inspiring. But above all, he loved the gospel that he expounded, and with a firm grasp upon the fundamentals of faith and a rich experience of divine grace loved to preach the gospel as the power of God unto the salvation of sinners.

How fitting it was that he preached the last night of his life! And I truly believe he would have had it that way. No doubt he had often expressed his desire as many of us have in the words of Charles Wesley's beautiful hymn:

"Happy, if with my latest breath
I may but gasp his name;
Preach Him to all, and cry in death,
Behold, behold the Lamb!"

The funeral services were held at Frederick Avenue Church, Baltimore, on Friday afternoon, April 6th, at 2.00 o'clock. They were conducted by his presiding elder, Rev. John Paul Tyler, D. D., assisted by Dr. J. Howard Wells, Revs. C. K. Ray, W. J. Elliott and the writer. Many of his brother ministers were present and a large congregation. The body was taken on Friday evening to Staunton, Virginia, and on Saturday at 11.00 A. M. at Central Church a service was held, conducted by Rev. G. G. Martin, D. D., assisted by Drs. S. K. Cockrell, R. L. Fultz and Rev. C. E. Brandt. A great number of ministers were present at this service also, and a large congregation. His body was laid to rest in beautiful Thomrose Cemetery, Staunton, Virginia.

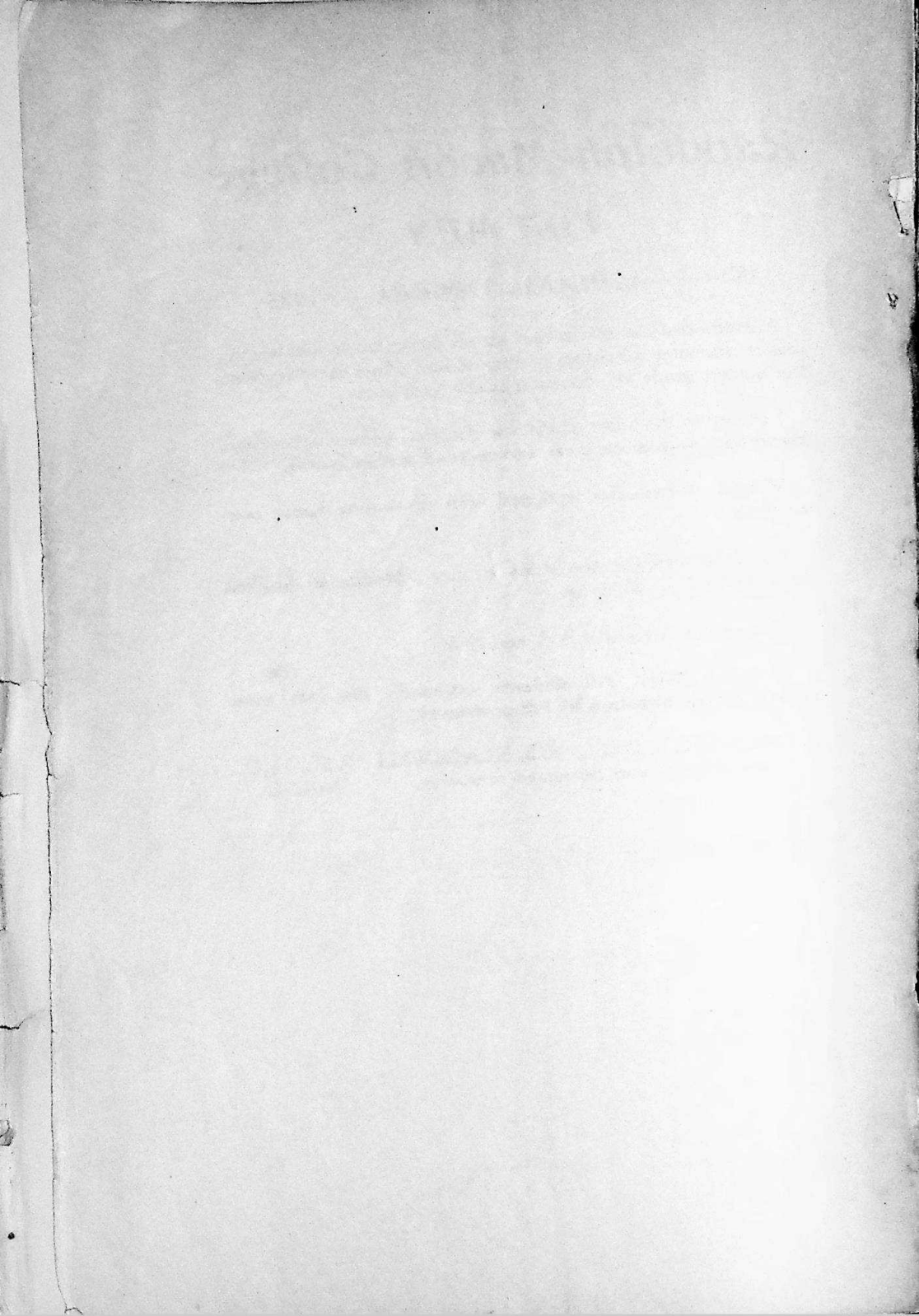
