FIRST DAY.

Morning Session.

Wednesday, October 9th, 1935.

"Your Committee that was appointed by the Conference to consider the question of Group Insurance, after consultation with a majority of those involved, recommends that the two thousand dollar group be discontinued on account of the increasing cost; and that the master policy providing one thousand dollar Insurance for each member of the Conference as set forth in said policy be continued.

"Your committee also recommends that the Board of Finance appoint Harry P. Baker as the Conference Insurance Agent."

After discussion the report was upon motion adopted.

REPORT of the Board of Christian Education was presented and read. Dr. J. Fisher Simpson of the General Board of Christian Education was introduced and addressed the Conference relative to this report, and upon motion the report was adopted.

DR. A. F. SMITH, one of the publishing agents of the Church, was introduced and addressed the Conference in regard to the work of the Publishing House and in particular presented the new Methodist Hymnal for consideration.

THE REPORT of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company was presented and referred without reading to the Board of Christian Literature.

F. J. PRETTYMAN was called to the chair.

A RESOLUTION from the Washington Preachers' Meeting was presented and read as follows:

"Whereas, the Ministerial Association of Washington and vicinity has taken cognizance of the felt need for a proper place to preserve and keep for ready reference our priceless Baltimore Conference records, and

"Whereas, these records are at present kept in the vaults of the Mercantile Trust and Deposit Company of Baltimore, a

location very inaccessible and a method of preservation that entails an annual expense on the Conference; and

"Whereas, the Ministerial Association of Washington and vicinity on September 16th, 1935, discussed this situation and appointed a committee to petition the Baltimore Annual Conference to provide a fireproof vault for our Conference records in Mount Vernon Place Church, Washington, where these records can be better kept; therefore, be it

"RESOLVED, that this Conference request the Bishop to appoint a committee of three to plan and build such a fireproof vault in Mount Vernon Place Church at a cost not to exceed fifteen hundred dollars, and that the conference treasurer be instructed to pay this bill when presented by the committee."

BISHOP MOUZON resumed the chair.

N. B. HARMON, JR., offered the following substitute:

"That such a committee as called for in the original motion be appointed and instructed to make a careful study of ways and means for preserving our conference records in some such way as proposed, and that the committee be instructed to bring to the next session of our Annual Conference a fully matured plan looking toward securing a vault or other permanent repository for the preservation of our conference records."

This substitute motion prevailed.

F. M. RICHARDSON, Editor of the Baltimore Southern Methodist, stated that Duke University desired to purchase the files of the paper going back to the very beginning of its existence and upon motion this matter was referred to the committee on providing a suitable place for the permanent preservation of our records.

CONFERENCE adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Mouzon to meet tomorrow morning at nine o'clock.

FOURTH DAY.

Morning Session.

Saturday, October 12th, 1935.

CONFERENCE met at nine o'clock.

BISHOP MOUZON in the chair.

AFTER a service of song W. F. Locke led in prayer.

THE BISHOP read a portion of the fifth chapter of II Corinthians and addressed the Conference upon the theme: "The Christian's Three Supreme Motives."

THE JOURNAL of yesterday was read and approved.

QUESTION FORTY-SEVEN of the Minutes was called, i. e.: "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?" W. Angie Smith presented an invitation from the preachers' meeting of Washington, D. C., and from the board of Mount Vernon Place Church, to meet in Washington and at Mount Vernon Place Church. The invitation was unanimously accepted.

E. S. SHEPPE, JR., offered a resolution regarding the neutrality of our country in this time of war, and upon motion of H. M. Canter it was referred to a special committee of five to be appointed by the chair.

E. C. BEERY moved that the Board of Finance be authorized to set apart ten per cent of its receipts for distribution on the basis of necessity, and it was adopted.

Jarvis and Herman Moorman, representing the young people of the Baltimore Conference, were introduced and urged that the quota allotted to the Conference be in attendance.

F. J. PRETTYMAN also spoke in regard to this Conference.

REPORT of the trustees of the Home of the Aged and Orphans was presented and read. Herman M. Wilson, superintendent of the Home, spoke of the work of the year and the results accomplished through the cooperation of the various charges. Upon motion the report was adopted.

REPORT of the treasurer of the Home for the Aged and Orphans was presented and read.

THE REPORT of the Baltimore Conference Woman's Missionary Society was presented and read. Mrs. W. H. Ballengee, president of

the Baltimore Conference Woman's Missionary Society, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

INTRODUCTIONS: Dr. W. A. Smart of the School of Religion at Emory University and Dr. T. H. Jacks, president of Randolph-Macon Woman's College, were introduced and addressed the Conference.

ON MOTION of E. V. Register it was ordered that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet in memorial session Sunday afternoon at three o'clock.

QUESTION SIX of the General Minutes was called, i. e.: "Who are admitted into full connection?" The names of Claude Holmes Thompson, Benjamin Thomas Price, Lyscum Elbert Crowson, Stuart Monroe Iglehart, Walter Melancthon Lockett, Jr., and Lewis Whitefield Darst were called by the secretary and they came to the altar. The Bishop addressed these candidates on the disciplinary questions and upon motion they were severally admitted into full connection.

CONFERENCE united in singing Hymn No. 287:

CONFERENCE adjourned with the benediction by Bishop Mouzon to meet Sunday afternoon at three o'clock.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Report No. 1.

The work of the Board of Christian Education of our Conference has made substantial gains along all lines during the past year. Among the outstanding accomplishments might be listed:

(a) The issuing of 3,725 Christian Culture, Christian Adventure, Cokesbury and Standard credits, an increase of 8% over the previous year.

(b) The enrollment of 7,061 pupils in Vacation Church Schools, an increase of approximately 40% over previous records.

(c) The holding of 160 sessions of Circuit Institutes, reaching about 200 churches, and 2,000 workers.

(d) The attendance of 592 young people at the Young People's Assembly at Massanetta, a high-water mark; the attendance of 302 youths at the Intermediate Assembly at Front Royal, practically doubling the attendance of the previous year.

(e) The payment to the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise of approximately \$4,600, an increase of about 40%.

The board wishes to express its appreciation of the splendid work which has been accomplished by the executive Secretary, Dr. H. H. Sherman; the Director of Young People's Work and Extension Secretary, Rev. C. A. York, and the office secretary, Miss Bettie Hale. The decision of the Conference last year to strengthen the educational program by the addition of a young people's worker and Extension Secretary has been justified by the great progress which has been made. The Conference is very fortunate in having as its presiding Bishop, Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon, the president of the General Board of Education, whose interest and cooperation have inspired us to press forward.

We have many dreams and hopes for the coming year. The supreme goal is to lead the individual to know Jesus Christ as his personal Saviour and to express the Christian ideals in all relationships of life. All of the activities of this board are directed to this end.

Our prayer is that during the coming year this board and its staff may be of service to the pastors and Christian workers of the Conference, looking to a great advance in soul-winning and Christian nurture. We believe that God can work through our educational processes to bring about a great spiritual awakening such as was experienced during the days of the Wesleys.

We nominate and request the Conference to elect as additional members of this Board, Dr. W. Angie Smith and Mr. Charles L. Melton, whose nominations have been approved by the presiding elders.

We are glad to state that the finances of the board are in good condition, a complete statement of which will be published in the Minutes as a part of this report.

We submit the following recommendations for your adoption:

1. That the presiding elders, through the district organizations and quarterly conferences, and the pastors, through the Local Church Boards, continue and increase their efforts to make the Church's program of Christian education effective.

2. That training work be carried on and extended into every local church if possible.

3. That circuit institutes be held, as far as possible, in all our rural charges.

4. That Church School Day be observed in every church, with a program and an offering for the work of the board.

5. That the fourth Sunday missionary day be observed regularly in every school with a program and an offering, and we urge that the receipts be used as the law of our Church directs.

6. That College Day be observed in every congregation during June, 1936, and that plans be worked out by the staff or executive committee, with special emphasis upon the claims of Randolph-Macon system upon our constituents.

7. That Childhood and Youth Week be observed the third week in October, or as soon thereafter as possible, using suggestions in our literature.

8. That the Conference Training School at Front Royal and the assemblies for Intermediates and Young People be held as usual.

9. That district institutes be held November 18-25 as follows, at which the work of the previous year is to be reviewed and plans made for the new year, with special emphasis upon evangelism:

10. That the General Board be requested to make appropriations of \$100 for student work in each of the following institutions:

11. That a Coaching Conference for Vacation School Workers be held in each district again this year; and a Vacation Church School in every church.

12. That the staff consist of an Executive Secretary, Conference Director of Young People's Work and Extension Secretary, office secretary, and part-time Director of Children's Work, if it can be arranged; that the Adult Work be taken care of through District Directors as far as possible.

13. That the askings, subject to the approval of the Commission on Budget, for 1935-1936 be:

15. That we cooperate with our young people in sending our quota of 132 delegates to the Memphis Conference, December 28-31, and assist them financially as far as possible.

16. That our presiding elders, pastors and church school superintendents urge every local Church Board of Christian Education to use our-own church school literature in all our church schools.

17. That the Bishop be requested to appoint Dr. H. H. Sherman, Conference Executive Secretary; and Rev. C. A. York Conference, Director of Young People's Work and Extension Secretary; Rev. W. S. Thomas, Chaplain to Staunton Military Academy; Rev. Rembert D. McNeer, Professor of Religious Education in Brevard College; Rev. Frank A. Settle as one of the assistant editors in the Editorial Department of the General Board of Christian Education, Rev. Harry C. Rickard as student in Duke University, and Rev. Hugh L. Shiley as student in Asbury College.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FINANCE.

No other interest of the Church has a warmer place in the hearts of Methodists than the care of their honored retired ministers, their widows and orphans. Your board, charged with the task of administering this care, has not been unmindful of this, and has proceeded to conduct its affairs in accordance thereto.

The General Board of Finance reports that the amount of the endowment fund is \$6,288,441.86, of which \$2,437,182.52 is Conference Endow-

ment Fund. Our Baltimore Conference Endowment Fund now totals \$300,530.52. There remains uncollected and due on adjusted quotas in our Conference \$22,019.61. This amount should be collected as soon as possible, and we would respectfully request our preachers, where there is a balance due on adjusted quotas, to bring the matter to the attention of their people and give them an opportunity to liquidate these amounts. There are also a number of charges, that, in adjusting the quotas, did not accept any adjustment, but pledged themselves to take an annual offering for this most worthy cause, and we urge upon each the privilege of doing so.

At the suggestion of the General Board of Finance, we designate the month of May as Superannuate Endowment Month and respectfully request each presiding elder to provide in his district conference program an opportunity for a speaker, selected by the presiding elder, to exhort at least ten minutes, on the importance of every charge having an unpaid balance to raise something during the Superannuate Endowment Month to apply on this obligation. We request Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon to appoint Rev. Harry P. Baker, the nominee of the General Board, as Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment in connection with his regular work.

The board has received from the Corporate Board of Finance, \$6,000; from the Publishing House, \$2,795.28, and from the General Board of Finance, \$2,817.73. The payments of the Board of Finance to the claimants this year will be \$13 per service year to the superannuates; \$9 per service year to the widows, and to the orphans, \$75; with the adjustments for necessity in accordance with paragraph 363 of the Discipline and the action of this Conference.

The Group Insurance of \$1,000 per each policy holder, which the Conference has purchased, the care of which was committed to your board, is still in force, and 208 of the preachers are members of this group. Seventy-five per cent. of the membership of our Conference is necessary to keep this insurance in force. We, therefore, call upon all preachers to continue their membership, and upon all who are not members to take out this insurance without delay. In this way only will the rate-base be kept at the minimum, the premiums as low as possible, the undergraduates given some means of security, and the interests of all the brethren protected. The Board of Finance has elected Rev. Harry P. Baker, Conference Insurance Agent, in connection with his regular work in the pastorate.

We are glad to report that the insurance company has granted the Conference a waiver of medical examination for a period of sixty days, making any active preacher of the Conference eligible to take this insurance.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.

Creating, printing and circulating Christian literature is an indispensable factor of our Methodism. One of the most essential of all our institutions is our own Publishing House. We can hardly be too emphatic in urging the preachers and people of Southern Methodism to prize their relation to this essential concern.

We should be proud of our Publishing House, not only because it represents the power of the press in the promotion of the Gospel, but because of its continuous prosperity as a business concern. In the year ending February 28, 1935, the House made a profit of \$86,270.76. This is \$20,172.29 more than the profit of the year before. A little more than 5½% was made on the purchases of its customers.

Out of these profits the Book Committee has appropriated \$75,000 to superannuates. The portion due the claimants of our Conference is \$2,795.28. A check for this amount has been received by our Conference Board of Finance, to be distributed to our heroic men and women to whom it justly belongs.

This board takes pleasure in reporting that many of the difficulties of former years, connected with publishing our conference paper, the Baltimore Southern Methodist, have been successfully adjusted. The report of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company shows that all current expenses have been paid, and a \$500 curtailment was paid on a note in bank at Aberdeen, Md., leaving the old indebtedness only

\$1,500. This conference year promises to be better than last year, and it is hoped that all the old indebtedness can be paid.

The circulation of the paper has increased more than two hundred, making the total number of subscribers now 5,001.

The matter of endowment has received attention during the year and a deed of trust for \$3,850 has been added to the fund, besides \$200 in cash, plus \$500 which can be credited as soon as 500 new subscriptions have been added to our list. This will make a total for the endowment of \$9,570.

This board wishes to express its appreciation of the stress put upon the need of our church periodicals by our presiding officer, Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon. The circulation of our literature has taken a turn for the better. Through several years it declined rapidly and seriously. Now there is improvement.

The General Board of Christian Education is continuing to issue two types of church school literature, the closely graded and the group graded, from which schools may choose according to their needs. We feel that it is important for our Methodist schools to use our own literature. We commend the spirit of the editors in that they are continuously seeking to make improvements and are sympathetic with suggestions that come to them from local church workers in the interest of producing better lesson materials.

Recommendations.

1. We recommend first, that all our people give their continuous support to the Publishing House by purchasing their books, periodicals and supplies from it.
2. That the Commission on Budget be asked to grant an apportionment of \$7,000 for the support of the Baltimore Southern Methodist.
3. That the Bishop be requested to appoint Dr. F. M. Richardson editor and business manager for the conference year 1935-36, and, owing to the fact that the business manager is expected to spend a considerable portion of his time in travel about the Conference in the interest of the paper, that he be authorized to procure such editorial assistance as may seem necessary and that his assistants be paid out of the running expenses of the paper.
4. We recommend that the editor and business manager's salary be the same as last year.
5. We recommend that Miss Maude E. Hodges be continued in her present position at the same salary.
6. We urge that a vigorous campaign be waged during the remaining part of October and the whole of November for new subscriptions, and that each presiding elder endeavor to carry to the quarterly conference a like appeal to that of our Bishop before this Conference.
7. We recommend that the business manager be authorized to borrow the money necessary to meet the current expenses from time to

sixty days before Conference so that the members of the board in the various districts may make a careful study of each case.

We wish to record our appreciation of the bequest made to the Board of Church Extension by Rev. G. O. Homan, deceased.

REPORT OF BIBLE BOARD.

Your Bible Board respectfully submits the following report:

The American Bible Society continues its work of translating, publishing and distributing the Bible and portions of Scripture, with encouraging results. During the 119 years since its organization, in 1816, the Society has put the Bible and portions into 954 languages and dialects, and has distributed approximately 261,250,000 volumes.

Four Centuries of the Printed English Bible.

Your board would call especial attention to the fact that an anniversary of more than ordinary interest in the history of the Bible occurs this year. In 1535, four hundred years ago, there appeared the first printed English Bible, translated by Miles Coverdale. A national committee, appointed to foster a suitable celebration of this fourth centenary, has defined the objectives of the observance to be: Emphasizing the invaluable treasure possessed by the English-speaking people for four hundred years, encouraging a fresh reading and study of the Book, and, finally, making a copy of it available to every American home.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

We have read with interest the report of the secretary of the General Board. Their problem is the same as with us and they appeal from debt-burdened churches and ask aid for them. We quote from the report of the secretary because it is a worthy expression of the attitude of the board toward these distressed congregations:

"The General Board of Church Extension has tried to enter sympathetically into the embarrassing situation in which congregations find themselves because of debts and has granted assistance as liberally as the funds of the board would justify. The board has granted extensions of time, has reduced the amount of annual and semi-annual payments when necessary, and accepted interest at 4% on overdue accounts although according to the contract the interest is 6% on overdue loans. We feel that churches have appreciated this liberal attitude upon the part of the board and, in most cases, have made payments on principal and interest even when they could not meet the account entirely up to date."

The amount the conference board has to appropriate has gradually decreased in recent years until it is now less than one-half of that apportioned in former years. If we had a reasonable sum at our disposal so that we could make a conditional grant to some of these burdened churches we could encourage them and make possible the payment of these debts. As it is now, we must eliminate many worthy causes and distribute a small amount to those most burdened.

The chief trouble is old debts made in more prosperous times. We believe that the time has come when there must be a united effort to wipe out or substantially reduce these amounts. Your board is convinced that it is a bad policy for the same congregation to make application for aid every year and would discourage this as far as possible. We note also that application is made for aid to pay bills where churches and parsonages have been repaired. This work is important, but we feel that we must help congregations reduce their debts.

We are now reminding those who expect to apply for aid next year that we will ask that the applications be in the hands of the secretary

There are approximately seventy-five charges in our Conference to which missionary appropriations are made by our board. We urge upon our preachers, presiding elders and people the duty of making every effort to reduce the amount of these financial appeals.

We hereby nominate Dr. John Paul Tyler as missionary secretary of the Baltimore Conference to serve without compensation, and in connection with a charge, and we respectfully request Bishop Mouzon so to appoint him. The following committees were appointed to serve for the coming year: Evangelism—L. H. Greenwood, J. C. Dugger and William N. Dunn; Representatives on the Board of Managers of the Pastors' School, Front Royal, Va.—John Paul Tyler and R. E. Musser.

BALTIMORE CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES.

Report No. 1.

Under the responsibility given us by the last General Conference, we submit our Report No. 1 on the question of temperance.

The Methodist Church has consistently held that the use of intoxicating liquor is inimical to the welfare of the individual and to society. From the time of Wesley, our Church has espoused the cause of temperance and has fought this great evil. For the past fifty years it has pressed the battle until a great victory was won in the passage of the Eighteenth Amendment.

Then there was a blunder. The Church ceased its education, its propaganda, its fight, and after a few years the liquor interests succeeded in overthrowing the amendment. Now the question is in the hands of the several states for a solution.

The liquor interests in America have deliberately set out to make as many drinkers as possible. By the most lavish and most insidious propaganda, by fair means or foul, they would make every man, woman or young person in this country a drinker of intoxicants. The attendant evils are nothing to them. They care nothing for human welfare; their only concern is gain.

On the other hand the Church of Christ stands for the highest welfare of human society and must again be in the forefront in its opposition to this curse of the human race. The Church must take a stand. This Conference must voice its position and enforce the Discipline on this question.

By education against intemperance from the pulpit, in the church school, in the literature of the Church, in the home, by the sober, godly example of church members, and supporting other agencies for educational purposes, the evil of the liquor traffic must be made known to our people. The Church must also build again in this country a sentiment for character and integrity in those who represent us in government, by voting for good and honest men for all public offices.

This issue is clear. In another generation a nation of drinkers of intoxicating liquor, with all its attendant evils, will come upon the stage, or the Church triumphant in its mighty efforts for the welfare of the millions of God's people must bring about the destruction of this traffic.

We must have courage and wisdom and press the battle hard, remembering that Christ and all the enthroned host of God fight on our side.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

The Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, is fully conscious of the fact that the command, "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy", is of divine origin. A world without a Sabbath is unthinkable. It would be as dull and desolate as a spring without flowers; it would be as cold as a mother's face without a smile.

THE TWELFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, HOME OF THE AGED, GAITHERSBURG, MD.

During the past year we have provided a comfortable home and temporal and spiritual succor for seventy guests. Two new members have entered our Church Home during the year and six have entered the house not made with hands. Sixty-four old people are looking to us daily for shelter, food, raiment and care. This responsibility has been assumed by us and we look to thousands of friends in the Baltimore Conference to share their gifts with their less fortunate brothers and sisters. Our faith in the liberality of our people, touching this responsibility has been justified yearly. May our efforts continue to merit the praise of Him who said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me".

We employ a staff of twelve workers at fixed salaries, keep twelve buildings repaired and painted, the grounds improved, the farm cultivated and stocked, and this and more is done as economically as we know how. Such a large enterprise requires regular sources of in-

come. Our largest sources consist of maintenance subscriptions, Christmas offerings, Mother's Day offerings, memorials, bequests, general contributions and profits from the farm. We note a steady increase coming through most of these channels, for which we are deeply grateful, but we note a decrease in some channels. We would impress our pastors and leaders with the importance of keeping the needs of the Home before our people, for we are convinced that an increased emphasis upon these offerings will be necessary if we purpose to adequately sustain the Home.

We report that for the first time since 1930 we close the year with a deficit, carrying over an unpaid obligation of \$1,998.26. We accept this obligation as a challenge and with the determination to recover our coveted position next year by your help. Moreover, we have in contemplation the opening of Epworth Hall, which will accommodate twelve more guests and will increase our running expenses. However, we believe that our people are expecting us to provide for many urgent cases now upon our waiting list and we look to the churches of the Conference to supply the necessary funds. If the 40% of the churches which neglected the Mother's Day offering this year would respond with an offering next year that alone would supply our need.

The outstanding improvement for the year is the completion of our hospital. We now have an attractive hospital, with six private rooms, diet kitchen, dispensary and nurses' room. This needed improvement was made possible through the generous gift of Miss Carrie M. Young, Mt. Vernon Place Church, Washington, D. C.

Gratefully acknowledging our appreciation to our faithful staff of workers, our volunteer workers in the field and all cheerful givers to this worthy institution we press forward.

Recommendations:

First, we request Bishop Edwin D. Mouzon to reappoint Rev. Herman M. Wilson to the superintendency of the Home.

Second, we request the presiding elders, at their first quarterly conference, to ask this question: "Who is elected director of the Home for the Aged in each church?" and to report the names and addresses to the superintendent of the Home.

Third, we request the Conference to authorize a continuance of the Christmas and Mother's Day offerings in every church school and congregation. Furthermore, we request the superintendents of all our church schools and the pastors of all our churches to take an offering for the Home—Christmas and Mother's Day, respectively.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF FRANCIS ASBURY SCHOOL, INC.

During the school year 1934-35 scholarships were granted from the funds of this board to the amount of \$837.50. For the current year 1935-36 nine scholarships have been granted, amounting to \$1,175.00. These scholarships are of two kinds, namely, loans and donations, limited to \$150 each per school year. For the loan scholarships properly attested notes must be given and the interest and principal paid promptly, according to agreement. Donation scholarships are given with the understanding that repayment shall be made, in whole or in part, if and when the beneficiary is able to do so, he being the sole judge thereof. The application must be approved by the presiding elder and the quarterly conference.

According to the terms of the charter, as amended, these scholarships are available to boys and girls, preferably from mountainous and remote rural sections, who need financial assistance in securing an education in secondary schools. In the case of young men and young women who are preparing for the ministry or missionary work of the M. E. Church, South, the funds are also available in helping them meet the expense of their college education. The board asks the cooperation of the presiding elders and pastors in giving information concerning these funds entrusted to us and the conditions regarding their use.

That we earnestly hope and pray that the governments of the world shall live up to their professed policy of peace, and their announced intention of renouncing war as an instrument of national policy in accordance with the Kellogg Pact;

That we condemn in unmeasured terms any and every war of aggression; and that the selfish efforts of munition manufacturers and those who profit from war to foment international discord, be branded with the infamy they deserve;

That we approve the spirit of the Neutrality Act enacted by the 74th Congress as an effort to promote peace; and that we heartily endorse our President's announced intention to see that the United States shall act as a good neighbor to the world.

And that, furthermore, we request our President and officers of government to use all good offices to bring peace among men; to this end we ask appropriate co-operation with other peace loving nations, and urge our people to use their influence on the side of peace.

We request that the Secretary of the Conference send copies of these resolutions to all congressmen in the territory covered by the Baltimore Conference, as well as to President Roosevelt and Senator Nye.

MEMOIRS.

EDWIN WALTER BRUBAKER.

It was an inspiration to know intimately well Edwin Walter Brubaker. Always, after having been in his presence, you knew that you had been with a man of God. Brother Brubaker was a quiet, unassuming man, caring little for notoriety, but with a conscientiousness and conviction that were rarely exceeded. He was never demanding in the Conference, but felt any appointment that was given him was an opportunity to serve God and a challenge to his best efforts.

As a preacher, he was sound and of the evangelical type. He believed absolutely in the doctrine of Regeneration—that one must be born again and that the religion of Jesus Christ, when applied to life, did produce new creatures.

As a friend he was dependable and trustworthy. He would go out of his way to be friendly. It is doubtful if he ever had an enemy, but through deeds of kindness and proving himself a friend, he was held in highest esteem by those who knew him.

As a Christian, he lived by his conviction. How well his pastor remembers him in his last days when he was conscious that the evening shadows were gathering and that he was nearing the end of his journey. There was his lament over the return of the liquor traffic and his constant prayer that it might be short lived. Then, there was his constant heartsearching. Had he always been just and kind and forgiving? Because, he said, he could not hope to be forgiven unless he himself forgave. Had he any unpaid debts? Had he unknowingly ever defrauded anyone? Had he always given God His tithe? Had he always done the best he could to be a Christian? Those last few days before he slipped away were spent in a grand and glorious farewell to the things of earth, and in taking a firmer grip on things eternal.

Brother Brubaker began life's journey near Marksville, in Page County, Virginia, October 23, 1868, and he laid down to rest in Front Royal, Virginia, November 12, 1934. He was sixty-six years of age. He was the son of William and Margaret Ann Brubaker. He was converted when he was about fifteen years of age at the old Mt. Horeb Camp Meeting, near Elkton. His testimony was, "When I was converted God spoke to me in such a certain way, I had to shout." He was educated at Randolph-Macon Academy at Bedford City and at Randolph-Macon College at Ashland.

In September, 1894, he was married to Miss Jessamine Thomas of Mifflinburg, Pennsylvania. From this union were born seven children—Charles W., E. Walter, Mary Margaret, Emma Calphurnia, John T., Willard G. and Irma Ruth. He is survived by his widow and the

above named children and also by a sister, Mrs. W. J. Whitesell, the wife of an honored member of the Baltimore Conference.

Brother Brubaker was admitted into the Baltimore Conference in the spring of 1900 and served the following appointments—Flintstone, Morgan Circuit, Greenville, W. Va., Prince George, Shenandoah, Frederick Circuit, Potomac, Warren Circuit, Riverton, Williamsburg and Huntersville. He retired at the session of the Conference which met at Winchester in the fall of 1932 and spent the rest of his days quietly at Front Royal.

Funeral services were conducted from the church in Front Royal by his pastor, Rev. R. B. Clagett, who was assisted by Revs. W. F. Locke, Hubert Sydenstricker, W. J. Whitesell and H. H. Sherman. He rests in that silent city of the dead, overlooking the town of Front Royal, where he awaits the final summons of the righteous when he shall answer the call of the redeemed.

REV. GERMAN O. HOMAN.

In the Book of Minutes of the Sesqui-Centennial session of the Baltimore Annual Conference the name of German O. Homan is the eighth to appear on the Chronological Roll. Admitted on trial in 1877, this rugged veteran could wear the service insignia of 58 years as a member of this body. Only 17 names on our Memorial Roll were not contemporary with him.

In 1906 Brother Homan took the supernumerary relation at Roanoke, and in 1929 he took the superannuate relation at Cumberland. Twenty-nine years on the retired list must not cause us to overlook the fact that for a previous twenty-nine years he was actively engaged as a pastor according to the following record of appointments:

1877, admitted on trial at Alexandria and sent to Page; 1878, Churchville; 1879, ordained Deacon and sent to Bridgewater; 1880, Hardy; 1881, ordained Elder; 1882, Shenandoah; 1884, Warren; 1886, Highland; 1888, Capon Bridge; 1892, Frankford; 1896, Botetourt; 1898, Newport; 1901, Roanoke Circuit; 1905, Listonburg.

Brother Homan was born at what is now Ridgeville in Mineral County, West Virginia, on June 24th, 1852. His father was the Rev. Henry Homan, a well-known local preacher who served in that section of our Conference. In his youth he was converted at Old Stone Chapel under the preaching of the Rev. M. G. Balthis, father of our Brother J. H. Balthis. Called to preach, Brother Homan prepared himself at Randolph-Macon College.

Early in his ministry he was married to Laura V. Whitmore of Parnassus, Va. Thus came to the service of the church one of the most influential and aggressive leaders in the noble sisterhood of our

conference. None of us will forget Sister Homan's remarkable addresses made during the time she was secretary of the Woman's Missionary Society in the Roanoke District. She always thanked God when a pastor who was careless of the missionary interests, was removed, and in her characteristic way would say: "I prayed him out of the district." These two servants of God were outstanding characters in our Conference in their day and generation. No couple prayed more earnestly for the peace and prosperity of the Church of our Lord Jesus Christ, and they being dead yet speak through their bequests to the Board of Missions and to the Board of Church Extension.

As a preacher Brother Homan was a man of the Book. With him the Bible was the Word of God, and it was final in all matters of faith and practice. He wrestled with a passage until he was satisfied that he had its message from God. Whom he spoke he felt he might rightly say "Thus saith the Lord". There was always in his interpretation the note of originality and in its presentation his characteristic manner. He enjoyed the preaching of others and was a just critic of them. He had no patience with men of compromising attitude of spirit and he was a fundamentalist of the strictest type.

It was fitting that he was permitted to preach a final sermon on January 28th, 1935, just before his final illness. It was in Raleigh Court Church and his text was "Upon this rock I will build my Church" and he closed this fervent discourse with a favorite hymn:

"I love thy Church, O God,
Her walls before thee stand
Dear as the apple of thine eye
And graven on thy hand."

About noon on Thursday, April 13th, 1935, Brother Homan passed to his reward from his earthly home in Roanoke, Va. Memorial services were conducted by the Rev. J. R. Wood and Rev. C. M. Hesser at Raleigh Court Church at four o'clock the following afternoon. The body was taken to Burlington, W. Va., and further services were conducted from the home of a brother, H. Crowder Homan (who for many years has been a lay delegate to this Conference). The Rev. R. L. Eutsler, the Rev. Harry Marsh and the Rev. H. S. Coffey officiated at this service and laid the body to rest in the family cemetery in a grave next to that of his beloved wife, who preceded him in death four years ago.

With the passing of Brother Homan another link that binds us to the Old Baltimore Conference is broken. This Conference will long hold in cherished memory both Brother and Sister Homan, who are now united in that upper kingdom where righteousness reigns and the glory of God is the supreme delight of all its inhabitants.

OSCAR FRANKLIN BURGESS.

Oscar Franklin Burgess was born in Fauquier County (near Warrenton), Virginia, September 15, 1847, and died in Washington, D. C., May 17, 1935.

He was the youngest of four children, two sons and two daughters, born to Peyton Price Burgess and Frances Ann (Newhouse) Burgess.

His boyhood was spent on the farm, contiguous to Bethel Academy, at which noted institution he received his initial educational training.

His call to the ministry seems to have been co-instantaneous with his conversion; and here we catch an illuminating note from that interesting brochure of Rev. J. T. James—Four Years of Methodist Ministry: "Oscar Burgess, now a member of the Conference, was converted here (Wesley Chapel), and I well remember the spitting his mother and I had at her house and table, when I followed him to ease his way into our church. She was of another faith, and expressed her thoughts of the Methodists very freely. However, she surrendered her boy to them, and God made him a preacher."

After two years' study at Randolph-Macon College, he was admitted on trial into the Baltimore Conference, at its session in Staunton, Virginia, March, 1874.

He was ordained deacon by Bishop E. M. Marvin at the Conference in Winchester, Virginia, March 5, 1876, and was ordained elder by Bishop W. M. Wightman at the Conference in Salem, Virginia, March 9, 1879.

His active ministry covered thirty-six years, and was spent on charges as follows:

1874, Junior Preacher on Frankford Circuit; 1875, Summers; 1876, Hillsdale; 1877, Summers; 1878, Fairfield; 1881, Upper Botetourt; 1884, East Harford; 1887, Patuxent; 1888, Fairfield; 1890, Buena Vista; 1891, Wesley Chapel and Glasgow; 1893, James River; 1896, Frankford; 1897, Union; 1901, New Hope; 1904, New Castle; 1905, Sterling; 1907, Fauquier.

It will be noted that he served twice on three charges.

On March 1, 1877, he was united in marriage to Miss Janie E. McNeer, daughter of Major Anderson McNeer of Monroe County, West Virginia, and to this union were born five children, three of whom died in infancy. Surviving are Ethel Coe Burgess, now the wife of Ashlan F. Harlan of Washington, D. C., and Norman W. Burgess of Lexington, Virginia. Also surviving are three grandchildren, Ashlan F. Harlan, Jr., Frances McNeer Harlan and Betsy Jane Burgess. Janie died September 8, 1919.

On October 12, 1922, he married Mrs. Seymore Wilbur, who was formerly Mary Margaret Miley of Raphine, Virginia. She died January 22, 1934.

She and the first Mrs. Burgess were former schoolmates at Wesleyan Female Institute, in Staunton, Virginia.

The Conference of 1910 granted him the superannuate relation, and he retired to a modest home at Catlett, Virginia, in the bounds of his last charge.

Yielding to the solicitations of his daughter, he went to Washington after the death of his second wife and, though "in age and feebleness extreme", spent some peaceful and happy months in the home of his daughter and son-in-law, who ministered lovingly to his every need.

It was here, in the Capital City, that the writer of this memoir found growing delight in renewing and rewelding ties that began forging some sixty years before. We came, frequently, into a close personal relation that seemed more vital because of the intimacy of the early years of our ministry. The passing years tore us apart, geographically, but the brotherly touch held, and still holds.

His daughter writes, with affectionate appreciation of his sterling worth:

1. "Almost without exception, my father left a circuit with better churches or parsonage."
2. "He preferred small places, circuits."
3. "There are at least two preachers in the Conference who were converted under his ministry."
4. "His trumpet never sounded an uncertain note. People always knew where he stood."

An incident illustrative of the positiveness of his character seems worthy of record: Following him for the third time, I was met at the parsonage by William H. Buhrman, one of the best men, and almost the best steward, I have ever known. He seemed glad to usher me into a new parsonage in a charming village. He remarked: "When Brother Burgess came to our circuit, I escorted him to our parsonage, and after he had viewed it thoroughly, within and without, I asked what he thought of it. He replied: 'My wife shall never be subjected to the experience that would be her's in this isolated spot'; and that proved to be his final word. We did not like his attitude—but he left you this parsonage."

But other traits adorned the character that unfolded with the years—sincerity, honesty, fidelity, human sympathy, Christian charity—all the graces that go with a life consecrated to high purpose were manifest to those who watched his growth and ripening age.

As he did not try to save himself, his naturally robust physique yielded to the hardships of continuous circuit life in horse-and-buggy days. So, earlier than many, he came to anchor in that port of derelicts, the Sargasso Sea of superannuation. Even here he experienced much joy in the services of the sanctuary, and in contact with the brethren, all of whom he loved fervently.

His earthly end came suddenly at last. But "All journeys end in welcome to the weary." Funeral services were conducted in Mount Vernon Place Church, Washington, Monday morning, May 20, 1935, at

11 o'clock. Dr. W. Angie Smith, pastor of the church, was in charge of the services, assisted by Dr. J. Howard Wells, Dr. H. M. Canter, Rev. W. P. C. Coe and Rev. W. D. King. Dr. H. M. Canter spoke very inspiring and fitting words of tribute to the deceased as well as words of comfort to the bereaved family. The services were concluded at Catlett, Virginia, the place of interment, where they were in charge of Rev. E. T. Harrison, a former pastor.

Friend of many years, with whom we enjoyed long and sweet companionship, thou are gone from us, and have left us gazing up into the heavens, where, presently, together:

"We shall sit at endless feast,
Enjoying each the other's good;
What vaster dream can hit the mood
Of love on earth?"

GEORGE WHITEFIELD RICHARDSON.

In the passing of Rev. George Whitefield Richardson the Baltimore Conference has lost one of its most faithful and efficient ministers. The story of his life may be briefly told, but its influence will abide through the years.

He was born October 14, 1862, at Mt. Pleasant in Alleghany County, Virginia, not far from the city of Covington. Back of him were godly parents and they bequeathed their son a rich inheritance of faith. When but three years of age he was bereft of his mother and the care of the family fell entirely upon his father, William Carl Richardson, who was a local preacher, licensed and ordained before the War between the States. Every evening, before the children were too sleepy to understand, this good man would gather them about him to read and explain in simple language the Word of God. To this George always attributed his love of the Bible.

During the pastorate of Rev. J. C. Sedwick, when he was sixteen years of age, George was genuinely converted. At once he began to take active part in the work of the church and in time became one of its stewards and later superintendent of the Sunday School. Subsequently he moved to Covington and was there granted a local preacher's license March 9, 1895. At this time he was connected with the Dolly Ann Mines and occupying a responsible position, but the "divine urge" was upon him and he relinquished it all to enter, on trial, the Baltimore Conference at its session in Roanoke, Virginia, in 1896. Two years later Bishop Wilson ordained him deacon and in 1900 Bishop Candler ordained him to the eldership.

In the order named he served the following charges: 1896, Greenville, Junior preacher; 1899, Frankford; 1903, Calvert; 1907, Bridge-

water; 1911, Rockingham; 1914, Hinton; 1916, Union; 1917, presiding elder of the Moorefield District; 1921, presiding elder of the Rockingham District; 1925, Leesburg; 1926, presiding elder of the Lewisburg District; 1930, Middleburg. Here his active ministry came to a close after two years of splendid service.

To a rich experience of divine grace in his life was added a rare ability of imparting it in a picturesque way to others and those to whom he ministered never failed to receive their portion of meat in due season or to be fed upon the Bread of Life. He was a choice spirit and he loved his Lord, being never so happy as when engaged in preaching the Word. His heart was as big as his body and overflowed in tenderness and sympathy to all. Possessed of splendid administrative ability, he rendered distinguished service both as pastor and presiding elder. Wherever he went he left behind him a holy influence in "minds made better by his presence". He was genial and gracious and kindly with a sparkling wit which could "beget smiles that had no cruelty" and he was a real man, a man four-square, a Christian gentleman whom to know was to love.

On December 16, 1891, Brother Richardson was married to Miss Mary Spencer de Krafft of Amelia County, Virginia, whose loving care made bright all his remaining days and smoothed for his tottering feet the descending path. No children came to bless their home and yet they were not without the music of childish voices playing about them for his niece, Lillian Johnson Richardson, lived with them from the time of her mother's death, when she was very young, until she married and went to live in Los Angeles, where she now resides. During their first pastorate, living in the home of Mr. M. T. Spangler, they became so enamored of Polly, the baby of the household, that upon leaving they asked the privilege of having her go with them. This she did and ever after she spent the greater part of each year with these foster parents. Had she been their own daughter the ties which bound them together could not have been more tender and to them she came for a parting blessing, as she went out into her own home, the wife of Mr. Edward S. Macklin, president of New River State College, Montgomery, West Virginia.

At the Conference of 1932, Brother Richardson asked for the superannuate relation and retired to the home he had built in Upperville, Virginia. He was happy here in the fellowship of this people and spent his days in the little cabinet shop where he loved to work, and in preaching as opportunity offered and visiting among his friends.

Death found him ready. The advancing shadows, which he clearly saw, were to him but the harbingers of a brighter day. "I am not looking into the grave," said he in his characteristic way, "but beyond." The last conscious words from his faltering lips were an echo of the glorious gospel he had preached for almost forty years: "Whosoever will . . . come." In the home of his foster daughter in Montgomery, West Virginia, on the afternoon of Saturday, June 22,

1935, he fell asleep, with his devoted wife and loved ones at his side. The funeral, conducted by his presiding elder, Rev. W. F. Locke, assisted by Rev. C. L. DeLong, Rev. George Heydrick and Rev. H. M. Canter, was attended by a host of sorrowing friends and relatives. Many of his ministerial brethren came to do him honor. The services were held in the old home church, Mt. Pleasant, which had been builded largely by his father's hand. Here he had attended Sunday School as a boy, here he had grown to young manhood, here he had been steward and superintendent, here he had preached his first sermon and here, in the cemetery close by, he wanted to rest at the side of his mother.

We left him there amid the hills which he loved; and as we turned away with tear-dimmed eyes, sorrowing because we would see his face no more in the flesh nor hear his voice, we, too, looked beyond the grave and thought of the day when we should find him in the Father's House.

CHARLES LUTHER POTTER.

It was on Sunday, July 21, 1935, in Mount Crawford, Virginia, that Charles Luther Potter put off the mortal to be clothed upon with immortality and passed into the presence of his Lord, that he might lay down the record of a faithful ministry, which he had rendered, and receive the Crown of Life. Almost eighty years before this Triumphal Entry he had been born in Staunton, Virginia, September 9, 1855, and these years had been filled with such fruitful service that he came not empty-handed to his coronation day, but bearing many golden sheaves for the garner of God.

His ancestry was a distinguished one. His great-grandfather, Bartholomew Fuller, had come to this country from Ireland at the solicitation of Washington and, settling in Fredericksburg, had taken charge of an academy. Subsequently this ancestor moved to Staunton where he continued teaching as headmaster of a school in that city. His father was an elder in the Presbyterian Church of the same place during the pastorate of Dr. Wilson, the father of President Woodrow Wilson. After his father's death, doubtless due to the influence of Miss Sallie Fuller, who was a warm friend of Bishop Alpheus W. Wilson, his mother connected herself with the Methodist Church.

No record of Brother Potter's conversion is available save the fact that it occurred when he was eleven years of age. At that time he joined the Church and as he grew up to young manhood the call to preach became so insistent that he sought a local preacher's license and shortly after became a full-time supply in the Conference. Not satisfied with anything less than the best he could obtain, he pursued his studies until he was ordained both deacon and elder by

Bishop Granbery in 1885 and 1894, respectively, and while he was still in the local ranks. The death of his wife, formerly Miss Ella Hutcheson of Staunton, to whom he had been married January 4, 1880, and the care of his family, made it necessary for him to give up his work in the Conference and return to a business career. This he continued for seven years; but the hand of the Lord was upon him and turning his back upon flattering opportunities for worldly success he sought admittance into the traveling connection in 1895.

The following are the charges he served: 1895, Wardensville; 1899, Berkeley; 1901, Stafford; 1905, Frederick; 1909, Monterey; 1911, Mount Crawford; 1915, Elkton; 1920, Greenville; 1922, Mount Crawford. In 1926, when Conference convened, he asked for the superannuate relation.

Brother Potter was married a second time, December 4, 1891, to Miss Alice Grant of Clarke County, Virginia. To this union no children were born. Of the two sons and one daughter of his first marriage, only Mrs. Gertrude Potter Payne, of Washington, D. C., survives.

By whatever standard judged, Charles Luther Potter was a successful minister of the gospel. His education, begun in the schools of Richmond, was continued by his own efforts until he became familiar with the best thought and teaching of the Church. He was alert to every movement of his day and quick to note its effect upon the Kingdom of God. His business training gave him a fine approach to the people of every community in which he lived and his preaching, always scriptural and expository, carried conviction to the hearts of his hearers. He was a wise administrator and by reason of his magnetic personality, which drew young and old into the circle of his friendship, he was enabled to adjust difficulties, smooth out differences and harmonize discordant elements into a pacific whole. The people to whom he ministered found in the messages he brought them a continual enrichment of their faith. Character was strengthened under the impact of the gospel as he proclaimed it and many souls were led by him to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ, not a few of whom remain to this day to bear grateful testimony to the holy influence of his work and life.

During Brother Potter's second pastorate in Mount Crawford, he established his home and retired to that place after his superannuation. Here his last years were spent, among a people whose tender sympathy and loving care made glad his declining days. Gradually his health began to fail. Medical skill was unable to stay its progress. Slowly the end of the pilgrimage drew near. However, the day before his death he was able to be about the house and even out of doors. Yet the hour was at hand. He had made every preparation and, with the coming of the Sabbath Day, he fell gently asleep as "one who lays him down to pleasant dreams."

His funeral was held in the church at Mount Crawford, which was filled to overflowing with sorrowing friends. The services were con-

ducted by Rev. H. M. Canter, assisted by Rev. S. K. Cockrell, Rev. E. L. Woolf and Rev. F. H. Strieby. Many other brethren of the ministry were also present. The interment was in beautiful Thornrose Cemetery in Staunton.

How we shall miss him—but only for a time!

"He is not dead, this friend, not dead,
But in the paths no mortals tread,
Gone some few trifling steps ahead
And nearer to the end;
So, we too, once passed the bend,
Shall find again, as face to face, this friend
We now call dead!"

REV. LEWIS LYNCH LOWANCE.

"Sunset and evening star and one clear call for me,
And may there be no moaning of the bar when I put
out to sea."

With these words upon his lips, late on an afternoon a few days before he passed away, our Brother L. L. Lowance watched a lovely sunset. With these same words we may fittingly begin our tribute to this brother-departed.

Lewis Lynch Lowance was born February 8, 1874, near Williamsburg, West Virginia. He was the son of the late John M. and Susan Judy Lowance, persons well known in their local community. These gave him the benefit of a sound and thorough early training. At the age of fifteen he felt the call of God and united with the Church. It was early discovered that he had an unusually acute and logical mind, and learning became a passion with him. Through local school and normal school, our brother's incisive intellect was developed, and he was the proud possessor of a teacher's certificate when but nineteen years of age.

For several years he taught school. It is not too much to say that Brother Lowance was always adept in the field of teaching. Those who listened carefully to his sermons could perceive in them the skillful technique of a splendid teacher. He took seriously the Master's command to "teach all things" that He had commanded.

But L. L. Lowance had a wider mission than that bounded by the teacher's desk or classroom blackboard. As he grew in years, the Divine Spirit certified with unmistakable distinctness that L. L. Lowance was called to preach the Gospel. Our brother was not disobedient to this heavenly calling, and after enrolling in West Virginia Wesleyan College and studying there for the ministry, he entered

the Baltimore Conference on trial in 1904 at the session held at Alexandria, Virginia.

In 1907 he married Miss Lucy Pearl Lightner of Valley Center, Highland County, Virginia. His bride proved a helpmeet worthy of him. She became the mother of his children and the gracious mistress of the parsonage upon those charges where her husband served. To Brother and Sister Lowance were born the following children, who survive: Misses Alma and Edna Lowance, and Lewis Lynch Lowance, Jr., now residing in Covington, Virginia.

The years between 1904 and 1935, when God called His laborer home, were filled with the usual diversified but important labors of the ministry. The annals of pastoral life are very much alike in any series of appointments. Our brother's record can be outlined in the list of the charges he served: Greenbank, West Virginia; Hot Springs, Virginia; Rockbridge, Virginia; Selma, Virginia; Blue Sulphur, West Virginia; Monterey, Virginia; Shenandoah, Virginia; Ridgeway, West Virginia; Berryville, Virginia; Romney, West Virginia; Hillsboro, West Virginia, and Brunswick, Maryland.

Brother Lowance was always a successful evangelist with children and young people, and was one of the first to emphasize the value of Christian education in its wider reaches, as this affects the youth of the Church. At the time of his death he was planning to write a catechism for primary children—something yet very much needed. He had already formulated and printed certain helps for the benefit of those pastors who take seriously their duties with regard to the pastoral teaching of children. This writer had the privilege of sending for and using some of the material prepared by Brother Lowance for the instruction of young members of the Church—material that proved very helpful. Those who have seen the plan and completed structure of the splendid religious educational building at Romney, West Virginia, built under the personal supervision of Brother Lowance, can the more readily understand the interest and concern of our brother for the work of the Church as a teacher of the young.

Nor was he more concerned for the education of others than he was to keep himself abreast of the thought currents of the time. Throughout life he was an untiring student, always to be found reading and studying. Brother Lowance memorized the entire Gospel of Mark, with several other parts of the Scripture, in order that he might better give the gospel story to his people.

As a church builder, our brother made a distinguished record for himself. When he was appointed to Selma, there was no church on that work. Brother Lowance at once set to work and planned one. The edifice which stands there today was built during his pastorate. Much of the labor on the building was done with his own hands.

Likewise, at Stanley, Virginia, he drew plans for a new building, solicited the funds, and with his own labor and under his supervision

the present church was erected at that point. He had the happy privilege of building, paying for and dedicating this structure while he was pastor.

We have already mentioned the handsome religious educational building at Romney. Brother Lowance watched over the erection of this edifice from the moment ground was first broken, and there are some of us who will never think of that structure without remembering the watchful care and labor of the good pastor who was responsible for its existence.

So life with him moved on—a Methodist preacher doing his duty, teaching, preaching, building, calling sinners to repentance and edifying the members of the Church committed into his keeping. A devoted family life bore fruit in the love and affection of his children and home, and wife and children yet live to call him blessed.

Following what was considered a minor operation, he went into a physical decline, but kept on at his work until the 15th of June of this year. Then, on the advice of his physician, he went to Mill Gap, Virginia, for a rest. He did not, however, respond as hoped for to treatment, and his powers gradually wasted away until the final summons came on August 8, 1935, at 7:30 A. M.

The funeral was conducted from the Beulah Church of Highland County by his close friend, Rev. J. H. Haley of Covington, who was assisted by the following ministers: Revs. O. D. Lambert, W. G. Winton, R. C. Maxwell, J. Harry Smith and Rev. Mr. Houck of the Presbyterian Church. Interment was made in the Lewisburg Cemetery. Great crowds came from various points to attend the funeral of our brother, while banked flowers offered by a sorrowing people bore testimony to the love and esteem in which this modest, self-sacrificing soldier of the cross was held.

And so, amid the eternal mountains of the territory which he served, we leave at rest one who walked with us, talked with us and wrought with us, looking not for an earthly heritage, but for that Holy City which hath foundations whose maker and builder is God.

"Father, in thy gracious keeping, leave we now thy servant sleeping."

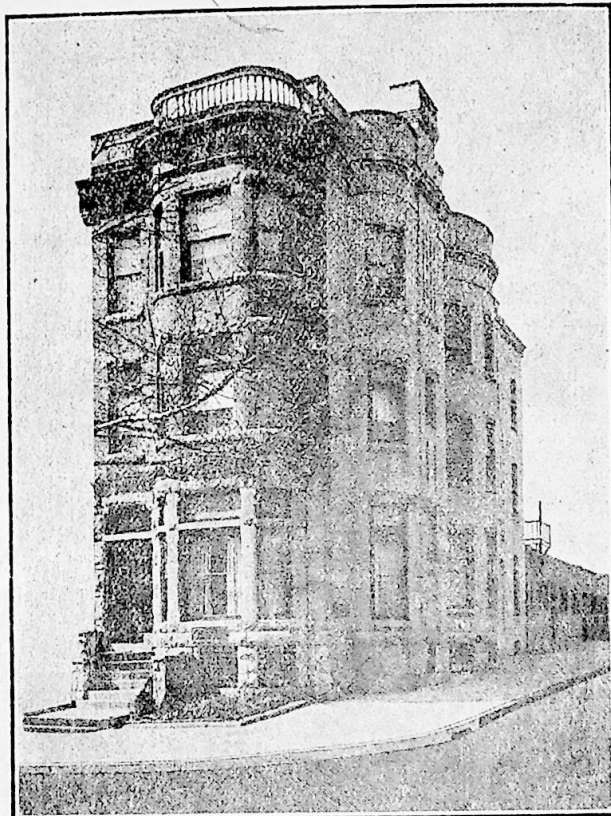
