FIRST DAY.

Afternoon Session.

Wednesday, October 6th, 1937.

THE BALTIMORE CONFERENCE of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, commenced its one hundred and fifty-third session in Braddock Street Church, Winchester, Virginia, at three o'clock in the afternoon. Bishop Arthur J. Moore was in the chair.

THE BISHOP announced that no one having received a majority of the votes cast there had been no election.

THE TELLERS returned with the result of the second ballot for alternate lay delegates to the General Conference as follows: Total votes cast, 76; void, 1; votes counted, 75; necessary to a choice, 38.

THE BISHOP announced that no one having received a majority of the votes cast there had been no election.

THE BISHOP ordered the third ballot for alternate clerical and alternate lay delegates to the General Conference be taken. The ballot was taken and the tellers retired to count the ballot.

INTRODUCTON: Dr. Alfred F. Smith, one of the Publishing Agents, was introduced and addressed the Conference relative to the work of the Publishing House, and urged the support of its publications.

THE BISHOP announced the following Committee on Fraternal Relations and Boundaries as ordered by the Conference on yesterday: H. Sydenstricker, H. H. Sherman, F. J. Prettyman, Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., S. K. Cockrell, Joshua S. Zimmerman, Albert H. Dudley, and the presiding elders of the Baltimore, Washington, Winchester, Lewisburg and Moorefield Districts.

QUESTION FORTY-SEVEN of the General Minutes was called, i. e.: "Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?"

An invitation to hold the next session of the Conference in Harrisonburg, Virginia, was extended by E. L. Woolf and Bruce Slaven and upon motion it was unanimously accepted.

F. M. RICHARDSON brought a message of love from Bishop Collins Denny to this Conference and by a unanimous rising the secretaries were instructed to send the greetings and love of the Conference to him. They were also instructed to send greetings to E. H. Blackard in reply to his gracious telegram.

J. W. LEGGETT addressed the Conference in behalf of the Baltimore Conference Benevolent Society, urged an increase in its membership and its full support by all who belong.

THE TELLERS returned with the result of the third ballot for alternate lay delegates to the General Conference as follows: Votes cast, 65; necessary to a choice, 33; E. B. Jones, 60; Albert H. Dudley, 56; W. R. Cross, 46.

THE BISHOP announced that E. B. Jones, Albert H. Dudley and W. R. Cross, having received a majority of the votes cast, were elected alternate lay delegates to the General Conference.

THE TELLERS returned with the result of the third ballot for alternate clerical delegates to the General Conference as follows: Total votes cast, 197; voided, 1; votes counted, 196; necessary to elect, 99. W. H. Best, 131; W. W. McIntyre, 112; F. M. Richardson, 108.

THE BISHOP announced that W. H. Best, W. W. McIntyre and F. M. Richardson, having received a majority of the votes cast, were elected alternate clerical delegates to the General Conference.

THE REPORT of the Board of Christian Literature was presented and Dr. F. M. Richardson, editor of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist", spoke concerning the interests of that paper, after which the report was adopted.

THE REPORT of the Board of Finance was read. H. P. Baker addressed the Conference in behalf of its Group Insurance and the full payment of the adjusted quotas of the Superannuate Endowment Fund, and the report was upon motion adopted.

THE REPORT OF THE treasurer of the Corporate Board of Finance was read and placed on record.

THE REPORT of the trustees of the Home for the Aged and Orphans was presented and read. H. M. Wilson, Superintendent of the Home, spoke in behalf of that institution and the report was adopted.

ON MOTION of G. G. Martin the Conference gave a unanimous rising vote of thanks to H. M. Wilson for his most efficient ministry at the Home.

REPORT NO. 1 of the Board of Lay Activities was presented, read and upon motion adopted.

RELATIVE to the statement in this report concerning the liquor traffic Bishop Moore made the following statement as representing the attitude of the Conference and Church:

"Let no one imagine that Methodism believes that the last word has been said concerning the overthrow of the liquor traffic. We believe that what is morally wrong cannot be made right by political action. Liquor has not changed its essential nature. It still consumes the substance, rots the brain and damns the souls of men and women.

"We expect to preach against it, sing against it, and vote against it until at last it is driven out of our modern society."

THE ORDER OF THE DAY having arrived, report of the special committee in regard to the Aldersgate Commemoration, which is the second phase of the Bishops' Crusade, was presented. Bishop Moore spoke to this report, urging the preeminent importance of this Crusade and calling upon the Church to match its mighty energies against this strategic hour.

H. Sydenstricker, representing the Board of Christian Education; John Paul Tyler for the Conference Board of Missions; Mrs. W. H. Ballengee in behalf of the Woman's Missionary Society; and F. M. Richardson, editor of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist", all pledged their cooperation in this movement.

THE REPORT was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

ON MOTION it was ordered that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at three o'clock Sunday afternoon in memorial session.

INTRODUCTION: Rev. M. J. Miller of the United Brethren Church was introduced to the Conference.

THE HOUR for worship having arrived, Hymn No. 284, "Am I a soldier of the Cross," was sung and Bishop Moore led in prayer.

THE BISHOP based his message upon the following passages of Scripture—Romans 9:3, "I could wish that myself were accursed from Christ for my brethren, my kinsmen according to the flesh"; and John 17:19, "For their sakes I sanctify myself." He made an inspiring appeal for a deeper consecration even unto suffering and sacrifice on the part of the ministry and laity of the Church.

CONFERENCE adjourned with prayer and the benediction by Bishop Moore to meet tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock.

FIFTH DAY.

Afternoon Session.

Sunday, October 10th, 1937.

CONFERENCE met pursuant to adjournment.

BISHOP MOORE was in the chair.

Therefore, we the undersigned laymen, members of this Conference, and adherents of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, do hereby express our desire that the Baltimore Conference be placed in either the Northeastern or Southeastern Jurisdiction thereby keeping it intact, and do ask that the Special Committee, appointed by this body during this session of the Conference for the purpose of looking after the interests of the Conference in many matters arising out of unification, the delegates to the coming session of our General Conference, and the delegates to the Uniting Conference, and the first General Conference

of The Methodist Church, work to the end that this old historic Conference may remain intact.

REPORT No. 1—BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Randolph-Macon College is a church school. It is essential to the life of the Baltimore and Virginia Conferences. In the words of Bishop Hendrix: "The Church must educate or die". All other work that the Church does depends upon its college. Its ministry today is becoming almost entirely a church school educated ministry. Practically no ministers are coming from secular and state institutions. With the increased educational requirements for our ministry, it is not a case of facing the needs of the church college alone, but of facing the possible results upon our educational work and the ministry and Church of the future. The church college is the agency that makes possible the other institutions of the Church. It is in reality a question of "educate or die".

Randolph-Macon is our college. In days past it secured large support from educational boards. That day seems to be in the past. No longer are small colleges receiving help of this nature. In fact we doubt if there will be a place in the education of the future for a small college with a moderate endowment apart from the Church. But as a church institution we feel Randolph-Macon is a prime necessity in the work of the Methodist Church.

We believe that Randolph-Macon has given a good account of its stewardship. Take out of the Baltimore and Virginia Conferences its influence over the past hundred years and the history would be poor indeed. It has affected every part of the life of the Church from Ashland to the last mission field. One thousand ministers and thousands of laymen have had their places in the organizations of Church and state.

Too long has the Church let it go neglected. Not within the memory of many here has it made a separate appeal to our churches. One cause after another has claimed our attention while the college has been passed by. The time has come when something must be done for the college. While the Methodists have been marking time our competing institutions have forged ahead until today, from a physical standpoint, Randolph-Macon is suffering from comparison. Its scholarship standards have remained secure but with outmoded equipment it must face the question of meeting its needs or withdrawing from the race. Not for long can it remain stationary.

The college is not immediately in grave distress. On the other hand it is far ahead of many denominational institutions. Only our universities have a larger endowment. True, it has a debt but that debt has come almost entirely from improvements and not from its running expense. The college is crowded to capacity. But during the depression its income from endowment has greatly decreased. It has had to aid more students, and its property has been in need of attention.

The campaign for the college is a Randolph-Macon College Forward Movement with emphasis on the "forward movement". We are asking

the support of the Conference in the campaign for \$200,000.00. Every church and every member, the alumni and friends are being asked for help. A million dollars would not make it self-supporting. It must depend upon the Church.

We are asking that the Conference assume responsibility for the effort, that the Bishop give us all the leadership he can, that the matter be headed in each district by the presiding elder that preachers and laymen be enlisted and that everyone take upon his heart the burden of the college.

We are requesting that the last Sunday in May be set aside in both Conferences for the culmination of the campaign, that after cultivation and seeking out those who are able to give generously, the collection be taken in all our churches.

The movement thus far has been receiving enthusiastic support. It has been endorsed by the boards of education of the two conferences. The two cabinets have endorsed it and pledged their support. The Bishop stands ready to give us leadership, as far as his time will permit.

We therefore recommend that the members of the Conference approve this forward movement and pledge it their hearty cooperation; that it be presented to every congregation by the pastor, the presiding elder, and others, and that every member be urged to make to it a liberal contribution.

REPORT No. 2—BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The Board of Christian Education is happy to report to the Conference a year of work and accomplishment. Every phase of the program of Christian education, mapped out by the General Board, has been given attention. Our conference staff has been busy in the office and in the field. The presiding elders, the pastors, and the church school officers have shown a fine spirit of cooperation. Real progress has been made, though we are far short of our aims and ideals. We hail the day when Methodism will measure up to her responsibility in the home, in the church, and in the community. Three new members, C. F. Phillips, W. G. Winton and Mrs. E. H. Ould, have been elected to fill the vacancies on the board.

Definite Accomplishments.

District institutes, circuit institutes, leadership schools, the Conference School, the Young People's Assembly, the Intermediate Assembly, the Adult Assembly, Christian Culture and Christian Adventure Institutes, and standard classes mark some of the activities

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of the staff and the conference and district leaders. The attendance upon these meetings and the credits attained show an advance over the preceding year.

The board desires to express its appreciation of the leadership of Dr. H. H. Sherman, Executive Secretary, and Rev. C. A. York, Extension Secretary in charge of Young People's Work. We record with pleasure also the presence of Professor Boyd M. McKeown at the meetings of the Conference Board, also President R. E. Blackwell, Dr. S. C. Hatcher, Colonel John C. Boggs and Dr. J. Earl Moreland.

Recommendations.

The board makes the following recommendations for your adoption:

1. That the several phases of the work of Christian education be carried on in each district under the direction of the presiding elder, assisted by the district and conference staffs—with special emphasis at the quarterly and district conferences.

2. That in every church, the presiding elder, the pastor and general superintendents see that the Local Church Board is properly organized and functioning.

3. That every church school have a training program at least two years and also provide for the necessary cost as a part of the church school budget.

4. That institutes or conferences be held for every church, or for groups of churches, led by the presiding elder, the pastor, or a member of the conference or district staffs.

5. That Church School Day be observed in every church, with an offering for the work of the board, giving special emphasis to the Aldersgate Street Commemoration.

6. That missionary day be observed every month in all our schools, with a carefully prepared program and a liberal offering for the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise.

7. That the Randolph-Macon Forward Movement be presented to every congregation by the pastor, the presiding elder, and others, and every member be urged to make a liberal offering to it, in keeping with Report No. 1 of the board.

8. That Childhood and Youth Week be observed the third week in October, or as soon thereafter as possible, using the suggestions in our literature and giving publicity to the radio programs to be announced in the "Baltimore Southern Methodist", and in local papers.

9. That the Conference Training School at Front Royal be held, with courses meeting, as far as practicable, the needs of our pastors, and that every pastor be urged to attend; also that an adult assembly and a children's workers' institute be held in connection with the school, as last year.

10. That intermediate and young people's assemblies be held, supplemented by district and union assemblies and camps.

11. That district institutes be held in conjunction with the Board of Missions Institutes, November 16-24, as follows, or at such time as may be arranged by the two boards, with emphasis on the Aldersgate Commemoration and the Randolph-Macon Forward Movement:

- Washington, Tuesday, November 16.
- Baltimore, Wednesday, November 17.
- Moorefield, Thursday, November 18.
- Winchester, Friday, November 19.
- Rockingham, Monday, November 22.
- Lewisburg, Tuesday, November 23.
- Roanoke, Wednesday, November 24.

12. That our own church school literature be used in all our church schools.

13. That the General Board be requested to cooperate with our churches in the following places in their effort to meet the religious needs of the Methodist students in their midst: Blacksburg, Harrisonburg, Lexington, Hyattsville, Fredericksburg, Wilson Memorial, Baltimore, and Mt. Vernon Place Church, Washington, D. C.

14. That the members of the conference staff, and the president of the board, attend the General Council at Nashville in December, and the Leadership School at Lake Junaluska.

15. That the conference staff consist of an Executive Secretary, a combined Director of Young People's Work and Extension Secretary, and an office secretary; also that a Conference Director of Children's Work be employed when a suitable person is available and the work can be adequately financed.

16. That the budget for 1937-38 be the following, subject to the report of the Budget Commission:

17. We request the Bishop and his cabinet to appoint Dr. H. H. Sherman, Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education; Rev. Chas. A. York, Extension Secretary in charge of Young People's Work; Rev. Frank A. Settle one of the secretaries in the editorial department of the General Board of Christian Education, and Harry C. Rickard, Student in School of Religion, Duke University.

Bishops' Crusade.

The Board of Christian Education rejoices in the privilege of having shared in the first period of the Bishops' Crusade and in the fine

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victory achieved in raising the indebtedness of The Board of Missions. The General Board gladly consented to this special effort and threw its energies into work of propagation of the movement and its resources into the payment of the indebtedness.

Facing the second period of the Crusade our Conference Board of Christian Education, following the instruction and leadership of the General Board, pledges its undivided allegiance. We feel that the warming of the heart of Methodism is the vital need of these times when we must have a message and an experience that will grip the life of our beloved America and the rest of the world.

We shall gladly unite with the other boards of our Conference in seeking to reach the very last church of each district and the last individual of each church with a passionate appeal for the heart strangely warmed. We accept our responsibility in this Crusade as a sacred trust to be met only by loyal cooperation and ceaseless activity.

We pray that May 24, 1938, may be epochal in the life of our great Church and that the days ahead shall be those of great conquest and triumph for Jesus Christ, the Great Head of the Church and our Lord and Master.

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REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FINANCE.

Our honored superannuates and the widows of our deceased preachers deserve more consideration for their faithfulness than they receive. Your board regrets that it has not sufficient funds in hand to provide a comfortable maintenance for all those who have worn themselves out.

However, your board wishes to state that the average per capita paid by the Baltimore Conference to its superannuates, widows and orphans is more than that paid by any other Conference in the connection. This year our superannuates will be paid \$15.00 per service year, the widows will receive \$10.00 per service year and the orphans \$75.00, with adjustments for cases of necessity as provided in the Discipline and by the action of this Conference. Your board requests this Conference to allow 10 percent. of the board's funds to be set aside for necessitous cases.

In addition to the amount your board has received from the Conference Claimants apportionments for the year, it has received the following amounts: from the General Board of Finance, \$3,069.43; from the Publishing House, \$3,725.52; and from the Corporate Board of Finance, \$6,500.

Rev. H. P. Baker, Conference Insurance Agent, reports that 223 of our preachers are members of Conference Group Insurance. While this gives us a substantial margin of safety, your board wishes to urge all the young men who are entering the Conference to secure this insurance for themselves. It is both cheap and safe. Your board has elected Rev. H. P. Baker as Conference Group Insurance Agent.

The General Board of Finance has requested your board to include in its report the following recommendations:

First. That a special month during the ensuing conference year be authorized as a period within which each charge, having an unpaid quota balance for Superannuate Endowment, shall make an effort to raise as much money as possible to apply on said balance and to stimulate greater interest in the welfare of the claimants. Your board recommends the month of June, 1938.

Second. That your Conference request each presiding elder to provide in his district conference program an opportunity for a speaker, selected by the presiding elder, to exhort at least ten minutes on the importance of every charge having an unpaid quota balance to raise something during Superannuate Endowment month to apply on this obligation, which, according to the last report of the General Board of Finance, for the Baltimore Conference is \$21,471.94.

Third. That a Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment be appointed by the Bishop of this Conference to serve in connection with his regular work in this capacity and for the purpose of keeping alive the cause in the Conference throughout the year as far as possible. Your board recommends the appointment of Rev. Harry P. Baker.

Fourth. The General Board of Finance has requested your board to elect someone from among its members to attend a joint meeting of the executive committee of the General Board and representatives of the Conference Boards of Finance in St. Louis, Mo., from all the other Conference Boards of Finance in St. Louis, Mo., for the purpose of considering a plan for the reorganization of the denomination and if such meeting is deemed wise and claimants' support, when necessary by the General Board, after the bishops have held their mid-year meeting. Your board has elected Rev. T. M. Swann.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.

Our Church remains the leader among the publishers of the south. In the production of books, church periodicals and Christian periodicals of all kinds Southern Methodism excels. Especially we rejoice in the wide circulation and use of "The Upper Room", which has been an agent in the cultivation of Christian home life.

We desire to express our indebtedness to the Publishing Agents for the noteworthy success of our Publishing House. The Book Committee has been enabled to appropriate this year, out of the profits

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of the publishing interests, \$100,000 to superannuates. Of this amount \$3,725.52 has been sent to this Conference for distribution among our own retired members.

The status of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist" has undergone considerable change during the year. Pursuant to the request of the stockholders, made in 1936, a meeting was called by the Southern Methodist Publishing Company on May 13, 1937, and it was unanimously voted to sell and transfer all the assets of the Southern Methodist Publishing Company, Inc., to a new corporation to be formed in Virginia and known as the Baltimore Southern Methodist, Incorporated, the new company to inherit all the assets and assume all the liabilities of the old company. Counsel was employed to write the new charter in order that all the interests of the corporation and the Conference might be protected.

The new company is a non-stock company, to be managed by a board of not more than nine trustees. All vacancies in the board are to be filled by the body, subject to the confirmation of the Baltimore Conference.

This has been a prosperous year for the "Baltimore Southern Methodist". We have had the active support of our presiding bishop, all our presiding elders and many of our preachers. We have added \$425.00 to the endowment fund during the conference year and that fund now stands as follows: Bonds of the Salem M. E. Church, South, amounting to \$6,100.00; certificates of deposit, kept in the Farmers National Bank, Salem, Va., amounting to \$725.00; and one first deed of trust on improved real estate for the sum of \$3,850.00 and accrued interest.

Last year we reported 5,025 subscribers to the paper. This year we report 5,431. We have received 722 new subscriptions during the year, have discontinued 244 by request and have dropped 162 from our list.

Recommendations.

1. We recommend that the Budget Commission be asked for the same assessment as last year—\$6,000.00. *2,000*
2. We respectfully request of our presiding Bishop the reappointment of Dr. F. M. Richardson as editor and business manager of the "Baltimore Southern Methodist", and that Miss Maude E. Hodges be continued treasurer and assistant editor. *1950*
3. We recommend that the following trustees be confirmed as charter members of the new corporation, the Baltimore Southern Methodist, Inc.: C. M. Hesser, J. A. Johnson, B. W. John, N. B. Harmon, Jr., J. C. Copenhaver, J. H. Moseley, W. E. Holley, F. M. Richardson and Miss Maude E. Hodges.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Conference Board of Church Extension has had before it the report of the secretary of the General Board, Rev. T. D. Ellis, D. D. We bring to this Conference for your encouragement two helpful notes which he sounds.

First. The General Board feels that its first duty is to go to the aid of those churches and people along the Ohio River, who suffered such heavy losses during the recent flood. Nearly \$300,000 worth of church and parsonage property was destroyed. The first business of this board is "to be ready to aid distressed congregations". This it has done and will continue to do because they merit first consideration.

Second. The report says that the churches that are embarrassed and burdened because of heavy debts are doing some very definite work in reducing or wiping them out. The board is helping such churches make plans and raise funds.

We note with interest that the board has taken a forward step in creating a new department known as "The Division of Finance". Rev. B. L. Pool is its first leader. His past experience and achievements fit him for this work. His business is to visit churches throughout the connection that are burdened with debt, confer with their leaders, make plans that will enable them to intelligently face the problem of debt paying and either greatly reduce the debt or wipe it out. Already he has visited a number of these churches and, as a direct result, has helped them raise \$67,000. Brother Pool is available for such work in this Conference. It is hoped that some of our congregations will secure his services.

Your local board has given careful consideration to all of the applications before it. We call your attention to the fact that every congregation asking for aid desired to reduce a debt or free the church entirely. We have \$2,500 to help these people who merit and seek relief. This is far from adequate. Last year the General and local Boards of Church Extension made conditional grants to certain congregations provided they raise a certain amount and free the church of debt. The conditions were met. The money has been paid and the churches are free. We believe that a church free from debt is in a better position to give to benevolences and carry forward the entire work of the Kingdom.

REPORT OF BIBLE BOARD.

Your Bible Board respectfully submits the following report:

The activities and achievements of the American Bible Society, during the year 1936, are very gratifying. The New York headquarters of the Society has been changed from the old historic Bible House on Astor Place to a commodious new building, more central to the business and religious activity of the city. Definite progress has been made in the unification of the Society's work with that of other societies abroad. These are two important steps toward a better adaptation to the demands of and opportunities of these significant days.

Definite progress has also been made in the tedious work of translating and revising the Scriptures. Enterprises that have been under way for several years, such as the Turkish Old Testament, the New Testament for the Indians, and the Bible in another dialect for the people of the Philippine Islands, were completed. Progress was made in the revision of the New Testament for the Belgian Congo, and the Old Testament for China.

The Bible Society's second responsibility, that of publishing the Scriptures after translations and revisions have been completed, was met last year in issuing for the first time the New Testament in Nyore for the Abanyore people in East Africa, a group numbering about 300,000; and the publishing of a new and inexpensive large-type Bible in English for family use, for persons with poor eyesight, or for use in chapels where a small pulpit Bible is desired. At the end of 1936 the whole Bible has been published in 176 languages, the New Testament in 214, portions or selections in 601 more, so that the Scriptures have now been published in 991 languages and dialects.

The American Bible Society is also the world agency for Bible distribution. During last year the Society put in circulation, in up-

wards of forty countries, a total of over 7,760,000 Bibles, Testaments, Gospels and portions, an increase of over a half million over the preceding year. The service to the blind is most commendable. The Society furnished last year 3,933 embossed volumes, bringing the total number of embossed volumes distributed since the beginning of such work to over 125,000 in twenty-five languages and systems. To the countless homes where the Bible is not familiar, to the millions of hearts in which it is not enshrined, the Bible Society has dedicated its most efficient service.

The languages in which the Bible originally appeared have long since joined the ranks of the dead, but it is being reincarnated in the living speech of every people, constantly translated into new languages and dialects, published and distributed by the American Bible Society and rapidly becoming the universal possession of the human race. Nations rise and fall, civilizations crumble, but the Word of God abides forever. A Society that is engaged in distributing in every language, "The unchanging purposes of God and his Christ", deserves the hearty support of the whole Church. It is a matter of regret that the annual contributions of the great Southern Methodist Church to the Society in the last ten years have steadily declined from \$35,000 to only a little over \$12,000.

Sunday, December 12th, will be Universal Bible Sunday. The Bible Board suggests that the occasion be used this year to set forth the Bible as the source of our choicest heritage in art, literature, personal freedom, social opportunity and spiritual and religious power, urging at the same time that the churches and members assume their share of responsibility for the Bible's wider distribution. To all Methodists, Universal Bible Sunday this year should be more meaningful than heretofore. By that date the second phase of the Bishops' Crusade will be well under way. Let us remind ourselves that Mr. Wesley's Aldersgate Street experience came while he was listening to one reading Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans. Bible Sunday presents a great opportunity to exalt the Word of God and to make the Bible central in our reading and thinking. Then, and then only, will we have a widely extended experience of the warm heart and a widespread revival of religion. To this end we suggest that pastors in our rural work provide samples of Bibles from the Society, carry them with them in their cars when visiting that they may be equipped to resell the Scriptures to needy homes.

Your Board respectfully presents the following resolutions:

Whereas, The American Bible Society is adapting its program of service to meet the changing demands of the day, and renders a unique service in translating, publishing and distributing the Bible, a ministry of great importance in the life of the churches and indispensable to the whole missionary enterprise, be it

Resolved, First, That we express our hearty approval of the activities of the Society in deepening interest in the Bible and in promoting its circulation throughout the world.

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Second, That inasmuch as Sunday, December 12, has been designated as Universal Bible Sunday, the ministers and churches, represented in this Conference, be urged to take advantage of the co-operation offered by the Society in furnishing assistance, and plan carefully for a worthy observance of the day, emphasizing the importance of the Bible in a vital, personal religious experience.

Third, That this conference, recognizing that our Church has officially designated only 1.15% of our benevolence budget for the American Bible Society, urge each of our churches to meet its benevolences in full, and that pastors cooperate with any local society that may be functioning within the bounds of their respective charges and encourage individual contributions to the Society.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF THE MISSIONARY FORWARD MOVEMENT OF THE BISHOPS' CRUSADE.

The record of the first phase of the Bishops' Crusade, under the leadership of Bishop Arthur J. Moore, is one of glorious victory.

Our Board of Missions is free from debt, new missionaries have been sent to the fields, our people are heartened and our churches stimulated. Every bishop, secretary and other general official of the Church participated in making possible this achievement.

In his great labor for this cause our own beloved Bishop Mouzon gave his life and another of our bishops was sorely stricken—but the cause was carried to success.

In our own Conference every presiding elder and every preacher, assisted by all our lay officials and people, gave themselves heartily and without stint to this task and it was done!

Carefully wrought out plans for rallies, set-up meetings and district institutes were carried out and on April 23 our people met at dinners and in other groups to hear about the Missionary Forward Movement, and on Sunday, April 25, we made our offering.

In our Conference, every charge responded and only two other Annual Conferences have reported larger offerings than ours.

The total amount paid in by our Conference to date is \$20,124.48 and there are yet other amounts to be reported. We have reason to believe that the total for our Conference will exceed \$21,000.

We thank God and take courage. The Winchester District leads with \$4,718. The Washington District is next with \$4,657.

Braddock Street Church, with an offering of \$1,719, Charles Town, with \$1,146, and Mount Vernon Place Church, Washington, with \$1,000, are our leaders.

The final and accurate detailed report of what our people did is not yet available, because of the inability of our treasurer to set up the extra clerical force needed.

In conclusion, we repeat:

1. Our Board of Missions is out of debt.
2. Too much cannot be said in appreciation of the loyal devotion of our presiding elders and preachers.
3. Our people are intensely missionary and always respond when an informed and clear-cut appeal for missions is presented to them.
4. With gratitude to God for the past we look forward with eager hearts to the second part of the Crusade and trust the experience of hearts strangely warmed may be the possession of every single member of our churches. We would hear our Lord's word saying: "Hitherto have ye asked nothing in my name; ask and ye shall receive that your joy may be full."

REPORT No. 1—CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES.**Temperance.**

Prohibition may have been an economic failure as the wets claimed. One thing is clear, prohibition was not so great a failure as repeal has been. All the claims for repeal have fallen flat. It has not promoted temperance; it has encouraged drunkenness. It has not decreased drinking among our youth; it has stimulated it. It has not prevented the return of the old saloons; it has spread the tavern into every shopping district. It has not brought a wholesome, permanent prosperity as our rising national and state deficits attest. Our police records show that a large percentage of our national death toll in motor accidents is traced to drunken drivers. Our highly mechanized age calls for sober, alert, quick thinking men and women at the steering wheel of every car and truck that travel our roads.

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Therefore, we appeal to every member of our Conference to make a place in his daily devotions, linking his petitions with others of our connection and the membership of other communions, pleading that Jehovah will help the people of the earth to be teetotal abstainers from alcoholic beverages.

That the head of every family be in duty bound to set the example before his children of the benefits of a total abstemious life.

That every church school teacher emphasize the benefits of total abstinence in the presentation of his lesson themes, especially the annual World Temperance Lesson, inaugurated by Miss Frances E. Willard so many years ago.

That every pastor develop a proportionate share of his sermon themes showing the spiritual, civic, social and economic benefits accruing from this quiet, abstinent life.

That as citizens, we petition our county and state boards of education to include in elementary and high school courses a series of studies showing the waste, and disaster associated with the beverage use of alcohol.

That as subscribers to our daily papers and periodicals, we appeal to the editors and subscription managers to delete all advertising for alcoholic beverages.

That our young people study the well edited articles, dealing with alcohol, appearing in "The Epworth Highroad", and give them a prominent place in their weekly devotional services.

We, of the Board of Lay Activities, are in hearty sympathy with the attitude of our great Church toward the traffic in and use of alcoholic beverages; we are altogether opposed to such traffic and use.

The policy of some states in which the Baltimore Conference works is to license the sale of certain kinds of alcoholic beverages in communities and places where other liquors are not licensed to be sold. This in effect establishes bars without reference to the sentiment of the residents of those localities or to the fitness or unfitness of the place or the person.

The Conference Board of Lay Activities urges that every effort be made to have the General Assemblies of those states amend their laws in such manner as to provide that sales of all alcoholic beverages be licensed to be sold only in those places where there is adequate police protection and the sentiment of those places and communities are not opposed to such sales.

We call attention to Paragraph 655, Answer 3 of the Discipline: "Let all our preachers and members abstain from the manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquors to be used as a beverage, from signing petitions for their sale, from becoming a bondsman for any person as a condition for obtaining a license, from acting as a dispenser or voluntarily accepting an appointment or election as such under the laws of any State in which there is a dispensary law authorizing the sale

of intoxicating liquors by the state, county, or municipality, and from renting property to be used for such sale."

We urge every charge in our Conference to stand firm on the action that our General Conference has taken in this matter.

REPORT No. 2—OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES.

Your Conference Board of Lay Activities begs to submit the following report.

The Board has undertaken to have statistical reports from each of the Charge Lay Leaders and the District Lay Leaders, as provided in the Discipline. The response this year was not general. In order to ascertain a true picture of the work done by the laymen in all departments of church life and to value the worth of different types of work done, we are urging lay leaders to make out these reports promptly with, of course, the assistance of the pastor.

In the first stage of the Bishops' Crusade the laymen of our Conference entered joyously into all of the meetings and made every effort to contribute the service that was expected. Our Board of Lay Activities now pledges the whole-hearted cooperation of all active and interested laymen in the second phase. We urge that the men and women of the Conference consider this movement one of the most unusual opportunities for gaining knowledge and experience, as well as an opportunity for real consecrated service and for demonstrating the depth of their religious experience.

In the year 1935-1936, the acceptances for General and Conference Work were 83.29% of the "Askings". This was overpaid. In the present year a larger sum was accepted and this, too, has been paid. We therefore believe that the time has come to increase the acceptances to the full amount asked. Especially is this true when the emphasis of the second phase of the Crusade is taken into consideration. Your board, therefore, will work to the end that 100% be accepted and paid.

We have had the pleasure of receiving and considering a program of activities of the General Board of Lay Activities at the hands of Dr. G. L. Morelock, the General Secretary of this Board. We approve and endorse the recommendations, but as is stated, stewardship is the very heart of the whole matter, and it is the purpose of this board to emphasize stewardship to our laymen.

The major objective for the coming year will be the education and training of stewards. To this end, institutes will be held. But our request of the Conference is that every pastor consider the training of stewards, as well as other leaders in the Church, as one of the most essential things confronting him in the new year. We urge that the book, "A Steward in the Methodist Church", be used as the text book and that every official be persuaded to secure a copy.

We recommend that Laymen's Day be observed the second Sunday in June, 1938, using as the theme, adopted by the General Board, "Why Go to Church?" We urge that every church in the Conference participate in this observance.

We further report that in a joint meeting with the presiding elders of the Conference, John H. Rosenberger was nominated for the office of Conference Lay Leader, and he is hereby placed in nomination, before the Conference, for that office.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Whereas, the Lord's Day is the corner stone of all civilization, it ought to be re-enforced by both the State and the Church.

Whereas, John Wesley made the observance of the Lord's Day by cessation of "ordinary work therein or by buying or selling a requirement among the general rules for the people called Methodists".

Whereas, the Church cannot remain silent while the progress of the Kingdom of God is being retarded by unnecessary labor and commercialized amusements on the Lord's Day; therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, that our pastors be requested to give the Lord's Day a definite place in the educational and preaching program of the Church, and that our presiding elders be requested to bring the necessity of Lord's Day observance to the attention of their quarterly conferences and ask for reports by the pastors, the presidents of the Young People Societies and the Sunday School Superintendents as to the Lord's Day educational work being done by them, and be it further

Resolved, that the Lord's Day educational program of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland, which includes

1. Annual Sermon by the Pastor on the Scriptural Foundations of the Lord's Day.
2. Three of the mid-week meetings to be given to the Lord's Day.
3. Brief Lord's Day educational program, three times a year in church school.
4. Full annual Lord's Day programs by the church school.

be approved by our Annual Conference, and be it further

Resolved, that we recommend a District Lord's Day Committee in each presiding elder's district, to consist of the presiding elder, ex-officio chairman, a pastor, a church school superintendent, a young people's society president, and a representative of the women's societies in our several districts, all of whom to be named by the presiding elder, and be it further

Resolved, that we endorse the work of the Lord's Day Alliance of Maryland and recommend that our pastors, members, churches and Sunday schools, take some one of the memberships in same and that we pledge its General Secretary, Dr. W. W. Davis, our wholehearted cooperation in his endeavor to restore the Lord's Day to its divine purposes.

THE FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT, BOARD OF TRUSTEES, HOME OF AGED, GAITHERSBURG, MARYLAND.

The establishment and maintenance of the Home for the Aged appeals to us as a practical interpretation of the spirit of Him who said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me." Moreover, this work is consistent with the humanitarian spirit and practice of the founder of Methodism. John Wesley observed people who were not able to provide for themselves and, after consultation with his stewards as to how they might relieve this situation, he reported: "They all agreed, if we could keep them in one house, it would not only be far less expense to us, but also far more comfortable for them." To carry out this policy,

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property was leased and equipped and a clean, comfortable home was provided. We are doing just this for our people upon a much larger scale.

We report that in many respects the year which has just closed has been the best year in the history of our Home. More new guests were admitted into the home-family than in any previous year, except the opening year. A larger payment has been made on our bonded indebtedness than in any single year. More money has been received from bequests than in any like period. More church schools and congregations responded with an offering than in any previous year. More people are enlisted in carrying the good news of the Home to our people throughout the Conference than formerly. The number of visitors to the Home has been greater this year. Such noteworthy improvements should gladden our hearts.

All the buildings of the Home are presentable. The grounds surrounding the Home are being carefully improved. Local improvement clubs are rendering us valuable service in this connection. The farm and stock are prospering. The dairy herd is improving in its score. These all contribute to the support, health and happiness of our guests.

We note with pleasure gradual improvement in the cooperative organizations supporting the Home. Home Guilds and Home Directors are manifesting a growing interest in this great enterprise and this accounts in the main for our unusual financial situation. We note with gratitude that through the payment of several bequests and other gifts secured by the superintendent we have been able to exceed our previous record in the reduction of our indebtedness. Our total indebtedness stands today at \$25,000. Ten years ago we had a bonded indebtedness of \$100,000, plus \$25,000 in notes payable. During the intervening years we have reduced this indebtedness \$100,000, and each year has shown some reduction.

We are profoundly grateful to our God for His constant guidance in this noble undertaking. We also thank every cheerful giver throughout the Conference for making this excellent report possible. Our people are to be congratulated for responding so heartily to this call. We face the future with more confidence as we remind ourselves that we have SEVENTY guests in the Home to be faithfully ministered to in sickness and in health, in life and in death. A continuance of the "love offerings" by our people through the approved channels will make it possible to continue to do the Master's work as He would have it done.

Recommendations.

First. We request Bishop Arthur J. Moore to reappoint Rev. Herman M. Wilson to the superintendency of the Home.

Second. We request the presiding elders at their fourth quarterly conferences to ask this question: "Who is elected director of the Home for the Aged in each church?" and report the names and addresses to the Superintendent of the Home.

Third. We request the Conference to authorize a continuance of the Christmas and Mother's Day offerings in every church school and congregation. Furthermore, We request the superintendents of all our church schools and the pastors of all our churches to take an offering for the Home on Christmas and Mother's Day, respectively.

Fourth. We recommend the consideration of "Maintenance Subscriptions" by individuals, church schools, young people's departments, Women's Missionary Societies, or any sympathetic organization in the church.

Fifth. We further recommend that from time to time our people be advised of the great importance of this work and that they be encouraged to remember it in their wills.

REPORT OF FRANCIS ASBURY SCHOOL, INC.

The Francis Asbury School Board has been carrying on its work in about the usual way, giving careful attention to collections, investments, and appropriations. The annual meeting was held in Front Royal, Va., Wednesday, June 16, at which a report of the year's work was presented, considered and recorded.

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The chief disbursements for the year were loans and donations—scholarships to capable and worthy young people to assist in their educational preparation for the ministry and missionary work of our Church. This is done in cooperation with the Ministerial Training Committee of the Board of Christian Education. Without our help many urgent needs could not be met. During the year June 12, 1936, to June 12, 1937, 18 students were given aid to the total amount of \$2,410. About the same number are on the list for the year 1937-38. Total appropriations to date are \$1,975. We feel that this is a very important and constructive work.

There are three vacancies on the board, due to the death of Hon. George N. Conrad and Dr. J. H. Balthis, and the resignation of Mrs. T. J. Copeland. We recommend that the Conference approve for these vacancies George D. Conrad, Albert H. Dudley and Mrs. E. H. Ould.

The treasurer's report, as made to the annual meeting, showed the finances in good condition. The books were audited and found correct. The financial statement, taken from the treasurer's report, is as follows:

**SUGGESTED REPORT OF FINDINGS COMMITTEE ON
ALDERSGATE COMMEMORATION.**

The Committee appointed by the presiding Bishop to consider the cooperation of this Conference in the Aldersgate Commemoration now beginning has heard an outline of the general plan and begs to report as follows:

Nature of the Commemoration.

The Commemoration is a spiritual movement under the direction of the College of Bishops and participated in by all the Boards and other agencies of the Church. It proposes to commemorate the bi-centennial of Mr. Wesley's "heart-warming experience" in Aldersgate Street, London, by leading our Church into a deeper and more vital religious experience. It has no financial objective of any kind, save as such may voluntarily be assumed by a local church for its own purposes. It does not undertake any new tasks nor create any new organizations. It seeks a great spiritual awakening in the Church, and it proposes to bring to modern Methodism the power and spirit which was the possession of early Methodism. It will endeavor to motivate all the programs of the Church with a new spiritual experience.

The Need for Such an Awakening.

That such a movement as this is greatly needed is apparent to all. A spiritual revival, in fact, is the greatest need of the Church and the world, a need which embraces all other needs. If this can come about, most of our other problems will be easy of solution.

The time is at hand when every energy of the Church should be devoted to this end. We have an opportunity now that may not come to us again in this generation. In the hearts of our preachers and people alike there is a sense of spiritual need and a longing for a more personal touch with God. The Aldersgate Bi-centennial comes at a providential moment and enables us to focus the minds of our people upon spiritual reality and the original genius of Methodism. Our Bishops have been wise in their decision to utilize this historic occasion for the purpose of revitalizing the faith and experience of the Church.

In this we are greatly interested and we place ourselves on record as determined to support the Aldersgate Commemoration in every possible way. To our Bishops, and especially to Bishop A. Frank Smith, Director of the Commemoration, we pledge our wholehearted cooperation in carrying out every detail of the Commemoration plan. We call upon our preachers immediately to begin spiritual preparation in their own lives and churches, to inform themselves concerning the history, doctrines and work of Methodism, and to pray earnestly for the success of the entire movement.

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Conference Committee.

We confirm the appointment of the College of Bishops of the following persons to constitute our Conference Aldersgate Committee:

Bishop Arthur J. Moore, Chairman; John Paul Tyler, Conference Missionary Secretary; H. H. Sherman, Executive Secretary of Christian Education; John H. Rosenberger, Conference Lay Leader; Mrs. W. H. Ballengee, Conference President, Woman's Missionary Society.

Conference Goals.

The plan of the Aldersgate Commemoration has certain definite objectives for the whole Church. This Conference will do its utmost to assist in the realization of these objectives. We recommend that we adopt the following goals for our own Conference, and call upon all preachers, people and agencies within the Conference to work for their realization:

1. A more vital experience of religion in the heart of every preacher and local church official and teacher, and a general religious awakening in every congregation.

2. The reception of not less than 7,000 members into our Church on profession of faith during the coming conference year.

3. An increase of 10% in enrollment and attendance in the Church Schools of the Conference.

4. An increase of not less than 10% in acceptances and payments on the general and conference benevolences during the coming conference year.

5. The adoption of a definite set of objectives, or a continuation program, for each charge, in accordance with the plan of the Aldersgate Commemoration.

6. A cultivation movement in every church, using the literature provided and recommended by the College of Bishops and other agencies of the Church, for the purpose of informing all our people in Methodist history, doctrines, and work, to the end that we may have a more intelligent, loyal, and active Church membership.

7. Cooperation, according to the plans now outlined and later to be announced by the College of Bishops, in every part of the Aldersgate Commemoration.

**REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON TRANSFERRING THE
EASTERN PANHANDLE OF WEST VIRGINIA TO
SOUTHEASTERN JURISDICTION.**

We, the special committee appointed to make investigations looking to the transfer of the eastern Panhandle of West Virginia, now in the Baltimore Conference, M. E. Church, South, to the Southeastern Jurisdiction in the event that the proposed plan of Methodist Unification is adopted, beg leave to submit the following report:

First. That as a result of our investigation and study of this question, we believe that it is very desirable that this section of West Virginia, now in our Baltimore Conference, should continue its present relationship to the Virginia section of the Baltimore Conference, in the event that Methodist Unification is adopted.

Second. That Bishop Edwin H. Hughes, and also our late Bishop Mouzon, expressed the opinion that while they had no authority to speak for the General Conference, which alone determines jurisdictional boundaries, they looked with favor upon this suggestion, and believed that the General Conference would approve it, provided a substantial majority of the membership involved desired it.

Third. That in our judgment as a committee, many values would be preserved and benefits result if conference boundaries involved here should be the dividing line south of the Potomac between the Northeastern and Southeastern Jurisdictions, instead of state boundaries.

Fourth. That since the proposed change can be made only by the General Conference, we recommend that a special committee be continued to follow up this question and be instructed to do at the proper time what seems wise and best to bring it to pass; also that they report annually to the Conference, on progress made.

AMENDMENT.

WHEREAS, at the last session of the Baltimore Conference a resolution was passed constituting a small committee, "looking to the transferring of that part of West Virginia, known as the Eastern Panhandle, from the Northeastern Jurisdiction to the Southern Jurisdiction"; and

WHEREAS, there are many other matters having to do with territorial adjustment, property rights, pension funds, conference claimant

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obligations, and the like which should also be examined and looked into, with a view to a final equitable adjustment, when and if the plan of the Union of Methodism shall be put into effect in this conference territory; Now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the committee, as called for and constituted by the Baltimore Conference last year, shall be enlarged and recommissioned as follows:

(1) In addition to the members appointed last year, the committee shall consist of the presiding elders of the Baltimore, Washington, Moorefield, Winchester and Lewisburg Districts, who shall be ex-officio members of the committee; and also four representative members of the Baltimore Conference, to be appointed by the chair and confirmed by the Conference. Two of these last members shall be laymen who live in that part of our Conference, which, in the plan of union, is to fall within the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

(2) This committee shall meet and elect a chairman, and shall have power to invite the Baltimore Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and the Maryland Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, to appoint representatives who may meet with them and talk over matters of mutual interest. In the event that there be no regular conference commissions appointed by the other Churches for this purpose, our committee members may make such approaches and carry on such conversations with unofficial members and representatives of the other Churches involved, as shall seem wise unto them.

(3) This committee shall have power to pledge the good will and cooperation in principal of our Conference upon all matters which have general agreement; it shall endeavor to use its best offices to assist in working out the many details of the pending union insofar as these may be taken up and discussed before union actually takes place; it shall from time to time make reports through the "Baltimore Southern Methodist" or other church papers as to any understandings which have been arrived at; and it shall advise the delegates to our General Conference of 1938, as well as all others who may be concerned, as to its findings and recommendations.

The said committee shall be allowed from the Conference Entertainment Fund expenses for such meetings as it holds as may be necessary.

MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE, ON EVANGELISM.

WHEREAS, there is a growing interest on the part of many in our beloved Methodism in the non-church going multitudes of our land; and

WHEREAS, there is a heartfelt need of a greater passion for the souls of men in the church itself; and

WHEREAS, the moral conditions of our land demand more vigorous efforts to reach the masses; and

WHEREAS, we are about to celebrate "The heart-warming experience of John Wesley" as the next part of the Bishops' Crusade and believing our hearts will warm quicker in obedience to the great commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature";

We the undersigned memorialize the General Conference to appoint a sound committee to consider an aggressive type of Evangelism to reach the masses and thus supplement the program of the Church as it now is.

MEMOIRS.

JAMES LUSTER HENDERSON.

James Luster Henderson, the subject of this brief sketch, was born at historic Fincastle, Virginia, on April 11, 1852, the son of William Thomas and Elizabeth Luster Henderson.

He was educated in private schools, and his education fitted him for a position as teacher, and in this capacity he began his life's work. For a time he taught in the public schools of Montgomery, Craig, and Roanoke Counties in Virginia. Thinking further of a career, he considered giving himself to the legal profession, but man only proposes. God, who calls workmen to His work, suddenly touched our young brother with His Spirit, regenerated him by His grace, and called him into the Christian ministry. Brother Henderson lived then in Salem, Virginia, where he was associated with the late Rev. G. Dorsey White, a neighbor; and where Dr. John A. Kern was pastor in charge. Holding meetings with Brother Dorsey White, living under the ministry of Dr. Kern, and studying under Dr. Fox of Roanoke College, James Henderson soon found himself more and more prepared for the work until he was drawn into the full current of ministerial service. He applied to the Baltimore Conference for admission, and was admitted in 1883 with a number of others, of whom he was the last survivor.

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Bishop John C. Keener ordained Brother Henderson a deacon at Charles Town, W. Va., on March 18, 1883; and four years later at Leesburg, the same bishop ordained him an elder. As a traveling preacher, he served the following charges: Blue Sulphur, Talcott, Ronceverte, White Sulphur, Huntersville, Amsterdam, Bethany, Buchanan, Shenandoah, New Castle, Edinburg, Port Republic, Fairfield, Mt. Solon, Collierstown, Elliston and Shawsville. His active ministry covered a period of thirty-three years. Failing health necessitated his retirement in 1916, and the Conference held at Alexandria that year granted him the superannuate relationship. Thereafter, he made his home in his own house in Roanoke, Virginia, where he spent the years of retirement, not far from the scenes of his boyhood days.

Brother Henderson was married twice. His first wife was Rachel Henderson, the daughter of John and Ruth Henderson of Catawba, Virginia. She died in December, 1887, while he was serving as pastor at Ronceverte. On March 26, 1889, he was united in marriage to Bena Moore, the daughter of A. Washington and Margaret Dever Moore. Mrs. Henderson, who survives, proved a true helpmeet to him, and as the mistress of the parsonages which he served, by her gracious presence, assisted much in the efficient ministry of our brother. Of this union, four children were born: Holland and Elizabeth, both of whom died in infancy; Denny J., and Margaret (Mrs. William A. Ballentine), who now survive to bless the memory of their sainted father.

During the years of his superannuation, Brother Henderson proved to be no idler resting at the oar in the ship of Methodism. He was always glad to be of service to his brethren, and frequently supplied the pulpit of his own Church, as well as responding to the calls of other denominations in the city of Roanoke many times. For a long number of years, he regularly assisted with the sacramental service at Greene Memorial Church, until extreme feebleness prevented him from taking part. The successive pastors of Greene Memorial learned to lean upon him for advice, and for the comfort of his presence and prayers Sunday after Sunday.

Brother Henderson was a diligent student. With him preparation for the pulpit came first, then pastoral duties. Perhaps a certain level-headed business and executive ability was his real forte, as he left behind him, through the years of his active service, churches repaired, new churches built, parsonages purchased, erected, or re-located in an advantageous way. Time would fail to call the roll of those who were converted and received into the Church under his ministry. The writer has in his hand a letter from a woman in Buchanan, Virginia, who delights to recall the constructive work which our brother accomplished at that point many years ago.

During his latter years, Brother Henderson immersed himself more and more in the literature of his Church, keeping up with current

events through the Church press, and keeping in tune with the time,—less promises of God by the diligent study and use of his Bible. He loved the Sunday School and was a leader in a class of men in Greene Memorial Church, with whom he was wont to sit Sunday after Sunday. He loved also his home and the quietness of the peace he found there. In that quiet and in that peace, he rested until after a brief illness he heard his Master's call. He died on November 13, 1936. The funeral was conducted two days later from Greene Memorial Church, with the pastor, Rev. Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., in charge, assisted by Dr. J. Luther Sieber, pastor of St. Mark's Lutheran Church. Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery, Roanoke, where, surrounded by the glorious mountains of the country he loved, he sleeps to await the resurrection day.

This brief and inadequate record of one who was a good man and faithful minister of Jesus Christ can perhaps best be closed by inserting a tribute paid Brother Henderson by Rev. John A. Anderson, a beloved superannuate of our Conference. Brother Anderson and Brother Henderson had the privilege of being associated together in early days, and after Brother Henderson's death, Brother Anderson, whose words are always well-weighed before they are spoken, had this to say in a letter to Mrs. Henderson: "J. L. Henderson was a man of sterling Christian worth. Such was the impression he made when you and he wrought together in now by-gone years on Blue Sulphur Circuit, and not one act or word since then has changed my estimate of the sterling worth of his Christian character. A good, trustworthy Christian man, by his death, has passed to his eternal reward."

These words were echoed by the testimony of many a man and woman who came under the faithful ministry of our brother. We now reverently place them all on record as a brief tribute to one who has gone before us into the house of many mansions, eternal in the heavens.

CHARLES CARROLL BURRUSS.

On Monday afternoon, November 16, 1936, Charles Carroll Burruss passed away in a Washington hospital after a brief illness. Thirty-four years ago this coming March he was born at Easton, Maryland. Soon thereafter his father, the late and well-beloved Rev. Harry Burruss, was assigned to the Aberdeen charge. There he remained for four years, after which he was sent to Gaithersburg, Maryland. From this place Carroll carried with him through subsequent life lasting impressions, partly because he lived there at an impressionable age, but largely because of a great sorrow that came upon the

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family—the death of his father who, like his son, was carried away long before he had achieved the full realization of his powers. Two years after her husband's death, Mrs. Burruss, with her three children—Carroll, William and Martha Brent—made her home in Front Royal, Virginia. This town became home to Carroll, because he went through high school there, considered it headquarters while studying at college and seminary, and frequently resorted to it when in the active ministry.

Most of us are familiar by now with the details surrounding Carroll's illness and death, but there are some things about him which are not generally known, such as his preparation for the ministry, his work as a pastor, and a few characteristics which interpret the true Carroll. These matters we shall write about, not only because they are of vital interest to all who loved him, but also because they are deeply inspirational.

We are sure that not one young minister in the Baltimore Conference will begrudge us this claim we make for this young man—he was as well trained as any of us and much better trained than most of us. We do not intend this to be idle eulogy. His record speaks in support of the claim. He was graduated from the Randolph-Macon College in 1925, and four years later he received his theological training at the Princeton Theological Seminary, receiving the Th.B. degree. In 1931, the George Washington University conferred upon him the Master of Arts degree. While serving in Baltimore he matriculated at the Johns Hopkins University, where he did graduate work toward his Ph.D. In addition to the foregoing it should also be said that his college awarded him the Phi Beta Kappa key, while his master's thesis was adjudged the best for the year in his particular area of study.

During intervals between academic years, he served pastorates here and there, though his first definite appointment was not until 1929, when he was assigned to the Bethesda Charge near Washington. His helpful ministry, begun at Bethesda, was continued at Sudbrook, in the Baltimore District, until his removal in 1934 to Marvin Church in Washington, D. C. Possibly his work at Marvin was the crowning achievement of his already fruitful ministry. As everyone knows, the government appropriation of that property had long been contemplated and this naturally had a serious effect on the members of Marvin, many of whom had moved their membership to other churches. It is obvious, therefore, that he went to this new assignment seriously handicapped; but seemingly he was about the only one who did not realize this or, at any rate, he successfully feigned ignorance of the matter. During his brief stay he gave new life, fresh incentive, definite direction and, above all, a distinct identity to a people who might otherwise have become lost in the shuffle of churches.

What can we say of Carroll Burruss as he lived from day to day? We have talked with his intimate friends and they concur in the opinion that, no matter how apparently free-speaking and accessible he might be, there was nevertheless a wall of reserve about him which no one could penetrate. But, despite this, there were a few characteristics which, belonging peculiarly to him, not even he could conceal. For one thing he was intensely enthusiastic. He drank life deep and full. For another thing, as one of his closest companions said, "Carroll always had time." Oh, how true that was of him! No matter what he had to do at the moment or where he had to go, he somehow made you feel that you were the only person he wanted to see, that at that particular moment he simply had to tell you something which he had been holding in reserve—just for you. A third quality, which so enriched his own life and brought such blessings to others, was his willingness to see the good always. Somehow he was oblivious to the other fellow's shortcomings. Friendship gives a sense of freedom and encourages the most intimate confidence, but Carroll never exercised these privileges at the other man's expense. He was just about the most unassuming chap we ever met. His academic achievements and general versatility bring this quality into sharpest relief. Perhaps this was due to a factor which controlled his thinking and guided his life: he was forever evaluating himself according to our Lord's standards as against the purely human criterion of worth which we have set up in our social and economic life. Always measuring himself alongside the stature of Jesus, he maintained the proper perspective and remained humble.

We rejoice in the knowledge that Carroll himself continues to live, not only as a distinct personality, but in the hearts of those surviving him, who feast daily upon the memory of his rich and fruitful life. But we cannot deny our sorrow in the absence of his body, and we do pour out our earnest prayers and extend our friendliest sympathy to his courageous wife, lovable mother and to his brother and sister.

WILLIAM BUCKINGHAM DORSEY.

On March 27, 1937, the Call came, and William Buckingham Dorsey passed from time into eternity. He was reared on a farm near Sykesville, Maryland. As he rarely spoke of his boyhood days, little

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is known of this part of his life. In 1875, in his nineteenth year, he entered the Baltimore Conference and continued in active service for 52 years.

He was ordained deacon in 1877, and elder in 1882. The following is a list of the appointments he served: 1875-1876, junior preacher, Rockingham and Millboro; 1877, Warren; 1879, junior preacher, Brucetown; 1881, Ronceverte; 1882, Hillsdale; 1883, Hardy; 1884, Listonburg; 1886, Piedmont-Frostburg; 1890, Fincastle; 1894, Hyattsville; 1896, Elkton; 1899, Prince Frederick; 1903, Occoquan; 1906, Hillsboro; 1910, Marshall; 1912, White Post; 1916, New Market; 1920, Easton; 1922, Colesville; 1926, Branchville.

At the meeting of the Conference in 1927, Brother Dorsey was granted a superannuate relation, and he retired to live in his home in Branchville, Maryland, where he and his faithful wife continued to reside until his death. He was one of the few men to serve for 52 years in the active ministry.

March 25, 1889, he was married to Miss Bessie Sencindiver, who was his devoted companion and home-maker. To this union were born a daughter and five sons. The wife and four sons survive.

W. B. Dorsey was a man of great faith, humble and prayerful and one of the most unselfish men it has been my privilege to know. It was not in him to speak evil of his fellowmen. He seemed to see only the good in humanity. The writer of this memoir knew him intimately for almost 40 years, and served as junior preacher with him for nearly two years on Calvert Circuit, Maryland.

I cannot better express my estimate of him than to say, in the words of the Holy Scriptures, "He was a good man, and full of the Holy Ghost and of faith."

The funeral, conducted by Rev. C. H. Cannon, assisted by Rev. H. M. Canter, Rev. E. V. Register and the writer, was held in the Branchville M. E. Church, South, and his body was laid to rest in Martinsburg, W. Va.

WILLIAM SOULE HAMMOND, D.D.

On Sunday evening, April 18, 1937, at seven o'clock, surrounded by his devoted family, who for more than a month had tenderly cared for him, William Soule Hammond quietly and peacefully entered into the Heavenly Home.

For forty-four and a half years he had been a member of the Baltimore Conference, during which time he had won a place of high regard and affection in the hearts of his brethren. His strong and disciplined mind, enriched by years of study and observation, made him an authority on matters of science and history.

During the years of his ministry he served our best churches in every one of which lasting friendships were made. He loved little children and was never too busy to help young people with their lessons. To him the law of the Lord was perfect and all laws sacred.

For years he was on the examining committees of the Conference and many other ministers will recall with gratitude his kindly, helpful consideration during those trying sessions. Retiring and modest though he was, yet when need arose he courageously took his stand and contended for the logical conclusions of his considerate judgment in a way that commended the respect of his opponents. He never was bitter or carried resentment in his heart.

The full respect and tender affection in which all the members of his family held him attest his sincere and unaffected goodness.

"As some tall cliff that lifts its awful form
Swells from the vale and midway leaves the storm.
Though 'round its breast the rolling clouds are spread
Eternal sunshine settles on its head."

Doctor Hammond was born in Fairfax County, Virginia, on April 9, 1870, to Rev. William G. and Frances Ellen Carper Hammond of the Baltimore Annual Conference. He was educated in private and public schools and at the age of seventeen graduated from Shepherd College in West Virginia, where he had won a scholarship to the University of West Virginia. He chose, however, to go to Randolph-Macon College, which he entered in 1887 and in which he remained two years.

It was his purpose to study law but God called him to preach the glorious gospel and while teaching school in Montgomery County, Maryland, he also served as a supply in 1891 under Doctor Samuel Rodgers as presiding elder.

He was admitted on trial into the Conference at Harrisonburg in March, 1892, and gladly served the following appointments: Montgomery Circuit, 1892-1894; Marvin (Washington), 1894-1896; Emanuel (Baltimore), 1896-1899; Epworth (Washington), 1899-1903; Middletown, 1903-1907; Lexington, 1907-1911; Woodstock, 1911-1914; Trinity (Roanoke), 1914-1918; St. John's-Emmanuel (Baltimore), 1918-1923; Alexandria, 1923-1929; Martinsburg, 1929-1933; Aberdeen, 1933-1936. When, because of failing health, he took the supernumerary relation and moved to Arlington, Virginia.

Washington and Lee University conferred the degree of Doctor of Divinity upon him in June, 1911.

On September 18, 1895, he was married to Miss Bessie Price of Montgomery County, Maryland, who survives him after forty-two happy years together. To them were born four children—Elizabeth (Mrs. K. K. Hoyt), William Paul, Catharine (Mrs. A. E. Toye), and Grace W. (Mrs. Marcellus Stow), all of whom, with three grandchildren, live and thank God for such a father.

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At his specific request the funeral service in his home was very simple. It was conducted by his pastor, John Paul Tyler, and Dr. E. C. Beery, his presiding elder. His body was laid to rest under a wealth of floral tributes in Ivy Hill Cemetery, Alexandria, Virginia.

Among those present, who accompanied his body to the grave, were the following brother ministers of the Baltimore Conference—Brothers Baker, Butt, Cannon, Canter, Hawk, Hildebrand, Keene, King, Nevitt, Oliver, Register and Woolf.

WALKER PEYTON CONWAY COE.

On Saturday afternoon, April 10, 1937, the shadow made by the coming of the Angel of God's Presence, which shadow we call Death, paused in the home of Rev. Walker Peyton Conway Coe at Arlington, Virginia, and when it had passed "he was not for God took him". Word of his triumph came as a great surprise to his brethren for they thought of him as still in the far South and so removed from the uncertainty of the winter weather around Washington. But he had returned something over two weeks before and contracted a cold, which baffled the efforts of his physician and rapidly developed into pneumonia. In quietness and peace, surrounded by his loved ones, he loosed the moorings and set sail upon the tideless sea.

Brother Coe was born at Fairfax Court House, October 2, 1859, the son of Rev. William G. Coe, of blessed memory in the Baltimore Conference, and his wife, formerly Miss Anne Armstrong. His early life was the normal life of a son of the parsonage, subjected to all the vicissitudes of a constantly changing circle of friends and acquaintances. He received his first schooling in such public institutions as were available in the places in which his father served and completed his formal work with three years in Washington and Lee University, and a senior year at Randolph-Macon College, graduating there as a Bachelor of Arts. During these latter years he was a member of the Phi Kappa Psi fraternity and took a prominent part in its work.

The early religious experience of Brother Coe cannot now be traced. It is not surprising, however, that the atmosphere of his home should have set his mind upon serious things and we do know he was genuinely converted when thirteen years of age. Doubtless this was

the controlling influence in his college work for he must have felt the call to preach and contemplated the work of the ministry all through that formative period. Shortly after graduating, he was licensed to preach at the quarterly conference of Charles and St. Mary in 1878, and the following year was admitted on trial at the Conference held in Salem, Va. In regular order he completed his course of study and was ordained deacon and elder in 1881 and 1884, respectively. These are his appointments, as recorded in the conference journal: 1879, Junior Preacher, West River; 1881, Staunton Circuit; 1882, Junior Preacher, Rockville; 1883, Beltsville; 1884, Bladensburg; 1885, White Sulphur Springs; 1886, Amsterdam; 1887, Dranesville; 1890, Crabbottom; 1891, Wesley Grove; 1894, Linganore, 1896, Chesapeake; 1900, Marshall; 1904, Charles Town; 1906, Romney; 1907 to 1910, Superannuate; 1911, Staunton Mission; 1912, Sudley; 1915 Reisterstown; 1916, Mt. Jackson and in 1917 he took the superannuate relation which continued to his death.

For fifty-eight years, this man of God adorned the ministry of his Lord by a life and conversation above all reproach. In spite of a weakened constitution, he was indefatigable in his work of preaching the gospel and in his cure of souls. To be with him was to be led always into the high themes of truth and it was a perfect joy to hear him tell of his experiences in winning others to love the Lord. Sunday found him in the sanctuary, "as his custom was," unless physically unable to attend, and by his devout participation in the worship, as well as by his prayers which he so fervently offered, his presence was always a benediction. He delighted to meet with his brethren at the preachers' meeting and from time to time contribute his reminiscences. Never did his zeal lag or his loyalty to the Church grow dim and never did he fail to give insistent emphasis to the supreme need of a deeper spirituality on the part of preachers and people. The spirit of the prophet was his. His also was the voice of a seer, to whom death could bring no fear and for whom life in its richness and fullness had already begun.

Brother Coe was married March 25, 1885, to Miss Ada Ball Trigg, who accompanied with him all through his ministry and smoothed for him the way of life. To them six children were born, one of whom died in infancy. Beside his devoted wife he is survived by Mrs. Elizabeth Ely, Akron, Ohio; Mrs. Ada B. Powell, Falls Church, Va.; Rev. Edmund Dwyann Coe, Charleston, S. C.; Allen Coe, Attorney, Washington, D. C., and Conway Peyton Coe, United States Commissioner of Patents, Washington, D. C.

The funeral was held from Mt. Vernon Place Church, Monday, April 12, 1937, conducted by his presiding elder, Dr. E. C. Beery, assisted by Revs. F. J. Prettyman, E. V. Regester, John W. Rustin, G. G. Oliver and H. M. Canter. The large number of other ministers and the outpouring of people attested by their presence the high esteem in which he was held. The interment was in Glenwood Cemetery. It

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was a beautiful afternoon and the sun, shining brightly upon those gathered about his last resting place, seemed but the symbol of that light "which never was on land or sea", into which he had entered and brought anticipations of the Father's House, where we shall find him face to face.

JAMES LESTER SHIPLEY.

James Lester Shipley was for seventy-eight years a minister of Christ in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. He lacked only a year and ten days of attaining a full century of earthly life. The days of his years spanned the most remarkable period of American history if not of the world's history.

He was born in Baltimore, Maryland, to Charles and Mary (George) Shipley on June 21, 1838. After attendance at preparatory schools in Baltimore, he entered Dickinson College in 1857, at the age of nineteen, and graduated with an A. B. degree in 1860. It was his plan to devote his life to civil engineering, but God called him to preach and during his last year in college he received from Dr. John A. Gere, presiding elder of the Carlisle District, his license as a local preacher.

After graduation from college he taught school in Baltimore County until the meeting of the Virginia Conference in Alexandria, Virginia, when he was admitted on trial and appointed to Warrenton. In 1861, he was appointed to Winchester. Bishop Early ordained him deacon in 1862 and elder in 1864.

When the Confederates evacuated Winchester in 1862, Brother Shipley joined the Stonewall Jackson Brigade and served all through the Valley campaign under the Soldiers' Tract Society of which Dr. W. W. Bennett was president. Following this service in the army he was appointed preacher-in-charge at Randolph-Macon College, then located in Boydton, where he remained until the end of the war. In 1864, he was appointed to Petersburg, where he remained for two years and during which time he was happily married, October 26, 1865, to Miss Elizabeth Augusta Gere, daughter of Dr. Gere from whom he had received his license to preach. To them were born four children: George, who is head of the Boys' Latin School of Baltimore; J. Lester, Chief of the Department of Contracts of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad; Miss Mary A., of Baltimore; and J. A. Gere, a member of the Virginia Conference and at one time a missionary to China under our board—all of whom, with four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren, survive him and thank God for the memory of their father.

Mrs. Shipley died in 1906.

Brother Shipley was a trustee of Randolph-Macon College from 1888 to 1900; was one of the founders of the Phi Kappi Psi fraternity; a 33rd degree Mason and a Knight Templar. For a few years prior to his death he was the oldest living alumnus of Dickinson College and for many years the oldest living member of the Baltimore Conference.

In 1866, he was appointed to Gloucester Charge where he remained for two years. In 1868 he transferred into the Baltimore Conference and therein served the following charges: 1868, Talbot Circuit; 1872, Emmanuel, Baltimore; 1875, Piedmont; 1876, Shepherdstown; 1880, Harrisonburg; 1882, Charles Town; 1885, Moorefield; 1888, Hinton; 1891, Berryville; 1892, Loudoun Circuit; 1894, Warrenton; 1896, Gardenville, Maryland; 1900, Grace, Roanoke. Here he suffered a breakdown and having preached for forty years was granted the superannuate relation.

For a number of years he lived in Baltimore and later on with his son, Gere, in Bedford, Virginia, where on June 11, 1937, in quietness and peace, he entered into the Heavenly Home.

Funeral services were conducted for him in Bedford by Rev. E. G. Hill, his pastor, assisted by Drs. Nolan B. Harmon, Jr., and G. H. Spooner; and in Baltimore, where his body was laid to rest in Loudon Park Cemetery, by Drs. William H. Best, presiding elder of the Baltimore District, and John Paul Tyler.

Brother Shipley was a man of gentle and gracious spirit, possessed by a fervent passion for God and a rare devotion to his Church. His ability as a preacher is indicated in the important appointments to which he was sent. Unusually modest and retiring he yet, when occasion required, was fearless and courageous.

The years of his superannuation were a benediction to his family and friends, who arise to call him blessed.

Despite the infirmities of advancing years, he retained to the very end a keen interest in every interest of the Church he loved together with a fervent love of God. In his life he exemplified the gospel he preached. His interest in and love for little children were beautiful.

And so this man of God has gone from us for God has taken him. We thank God for his life and gird ourselves afresh that we too may keep the faith and finish our course with joy.

"O may Thy soldiers, faithful, true, and bold,
Fight as the saints who nobly fought of old,
And win with them the victor's crown of gold
Alleluia! Alleluia!

GEORGE ROBERT FRINGER.

George Robert Fringer, son of William James and Mary Margaret Fringer, was born at Lithia, Virginia, September 12, 1867, and died at Eagle Rock, Virginia, June 9, 1937.

His early childhood was influenced by the wholesome environment of a Christian home, which led him early in life to seek his Saviour. When he was about nineteen years of age he was converted and joined the Methodist Church at Lithia, Virginia. The congregation at that time was worshipping in a union church known as Back Creek Union Church. Here Brother Fringer was actively identified with the various interest of the Church until the new Methodist Church was built at Lithia, which was about 1899 or 1900.

On May 16, 1886, Brother Fringer was united in marriage to Miss Joanna Morgan Burger. They had been friends from childhood and had united with the Church at about the same time. She had developed into a young woman of superior charm and Christian grace and was a teacher in the public schools at Botetourt County, Virginia. She was ever an inspiration and help to her husband in his efforts to live an earnest Christian life. They established a Christian home and for several years Brother Fringer was a successful farmer and conducted a canning business in connection with his farming operations.

Here their children were born and the future seemed most promising for a successful business career, a happy home and a helpful service to the community through the Church. However, God had other plans for His servants, so Brother Fringer had the heavenly vision and with the loving sympathy and cooperation of his dear Christian wife, he offered himself for his ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, through the Baltimore Conference.

Leaving their happy home, which had been the dream of their young life, they set themselves steadfastly to do the Lord's will and from the steadfastness of that purpose they never for a moment turned aside.

Brother Fringer was licensed to preach by the Roanoke District Conference, which met in Christiansburg, Virginia, August 3, 1889. After having received his license to preach, he began to exercise his gifts and graces, as opportunity afforded, by assisting in revival services on the Buchanan Charge and frequently holding services in school houses and churches, which had practically been abandoned. These were meetings in which the Holy Spirit was manifest in many conversions.

His first work in the regular connection was supply pastor on Montgomery Circuit (now a part of Cambria Charge), to which he was assigned in the spring of 1903.

Brother Fringer was received on trial into the Baltimore Conference, which met in Alexandria, Virginia, in April, 1904, and at the same time he was ordained deacon in the local connection.

His first appointment was Catawba Circuit in the Roanoke District, which he served with marked success for four years. The other charges he served were Newport, 1908-1912; Union, 1912-1916; Buena Vista, 1916-1919; Grace, Roanoke City, 1919-1921; Fincastle, 1921-1923; Middletown, 1923-1926; Eagle Rock, 1926-1928; Union (second time), 1928-1931; Hillsboro, 1931-1933.

It was while he was serving as supply pastor on the Montgomery Charge that the writer of this memorial became acquainted with Brother Fringer and during that fall we worked together in revival services at Trinity, Falling Waters and Lafayette Churches. These were meetings of great spiritual power and more than one hundred souls were brought into the Kingdom of God.

A warm friendship was formed through these contacts which grew through the years. Ten times we assisted each other in revival meetings and never was one conducted without some visible evidence of success. Often there were such great spiritual awakenings that entire communities were stirred by the large number of conversions and reconsecrations to a higher life in Christian service.

Brother Fringer was a man of prayer and believed that prayer was the key that unlocked the door of power. It was his custom, when beginning a revival meeting, to preach a series of sermons on prayer which had the effect of getting the people to praying and the wonderful success in his meetings was largely due to the spirit of prayer prevailing among the people. His was spirit so humble that he never ceased to wonder at the goodness and mercy of God in so wonderfully blessing his ministry. This was especially true when God called his son, Denny, into the ministry.

He had a happy heart and many were cheered by his wholesome humor, his cheerful optimism and his happy experience in the Christian faith. In the sick room and among the discouraged his presence always proved a benediction.

The parsonage home, in which Brother and Sister Fringer lived, was a blessing to all who entered there and the influence of that Christian home is reflected in the lives of their children, all of whom are Christian workers in the communities where they live.

The children are Mrs. Arthur Price, Newport, Virginia; Mr. L. Rosser Fringer, Catawba, Virginia; Mrs. A. C. Myers, Eagle Rock, Virginia; and Rev. Denny L. Fringer, a member of the Baltimore Conference, now stationed at Luray, Virginia.

While located at Hillsboro, West Virginia, Brother Fringer experienced the deepest sorrow of his life in the passing away of his splendid wife, who was called to her Heavenly Home on January 6, 1933. So great was his sorrow that his health broke. At the next meeting of the Annual Conference he took the superannuate relation

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and went to live with his daughter, Mrs. A. C. Myers, at Eagle Rock, Virginia. The love and care that he received in this home were a comfort and a solace to him in the latter days of his life. He was always ready, when his health would permit, to render any ministerial service to the brethren in the Conference and to his own pastor. We have heard him express his grateful appreciation of the pastors who served Eagle Rock during the time of his residence there.

During his pastorate he was always interested in keeping up church property, and looking after the material interest of the Church. The parsonage at Newport, Virginia, was built during his stay there and also the parsonage at Union remodeled.

Brother Fringer had been in failing health for the past year and all that loving hearts and hands could do for him was done, but it pleased God to call him into that "Rest that remaineth for the people of God" on the early morning of June 9, 1937.

His funeral was conducted from the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Eagle Rock, Virginia, June 11, by Dr. J. C. Copenhaver, presiding elder of the Roanoke District, assisted by Revs. Harold Fink, J. H. Haley, C. M. Hesser, A. W. Henton and Rev. R. L. Chadwick, pastor of the Baptist Church at Eagle Rock. Several of his brother ministers acted as pallbearers.

Brother Fringer is also survived by one brother, Mr. C. H. Fringer, and one sister, Mrs. George Kessler, both living at Lithia, Virginia.

He was buried in the Mill Creek Cemetery besides his beloved wife. He peacefully sleeps amid the scenes of his early childhood and his first efforts in the ministry, awaiting the day when "Earth and sea shall give up their dead".

A good man has gone to his reward, but the influence of his Christian life and ministry will live on in the lives of others.

We thank God for his life, his ministry, and his dear friendship.

W. W. MILLAN.

On Thursday morning, September 23, the Baltimore Conference suffered a great loss in the death of Brother W. W. Millan, the Lay Leader of the Washington District, and for many years the faithful and efficient secretary of the Washington District Conference. After an illness of some months, death came suddenly from a heart attack in Washington, D. C.

Brother Millan was past president of the District Bar Association and one of Washington's most prominent lawyers. He had been a well-known attorney in the District of Columbia for nearly half a century. He was the senior member of the firm of Millan and Smith.

founded January 1, 1898, which was the oldest law firm in the city to continue without change of personnel.

He was a member of the faculty of the National University Law School and had been president of its Alumni Association since 1935.

Son of Walter R. and Columbia A. Millan, Brother Millan was born on December 3, 1862, at Fairfax, Virginia, on an estate where members of his family had lived for one hundred years. He was educated in the schools of Fairfax and later in Tennessee. In 1888, he married Miss Jennie Stier, who died in December, 1932.

Brother Millan loved the Church. He carried it always upon his heart and in his prayers. He had that universal outlook that severs the barriers of race and creed. He was widely known among men of many communions. Perhaps his work as president of the District of Columbia Sunday School Association better illustrates than anything else his desire to promote all Churches.

He loved the Methodist Church. He worked for its every cause with a devotion and faithfulness that ought to be an example to every layman. He was a regular attendant upon the services of the Church. He knew its organization and felt the burden that its leaders carried and sensed in a peculiar way the trials of the pastorate. He was for many years superintendent of the Sunday School at Mount Vernon Place Church, prior to his membership in Francis Asbury, where he served as teacher and steward until his death.

Brother Millan was a liberal man. He believed in the separated portion of one's income for the extension of the Master's work. He set an example at Francis Asbury by being its most liberal contributor. Every cause gained his attention and with his means he was always ready to respond to every appeal. No one ever knew how much he gave. Freely he had received from God's hand gifts of grace that made him a great Christian, and freely he gave of his means to help others to find in Christ life abundant and life eternal.

He was not an easy man to know, but to be privileged to enter into his life was to find a man deep in his affections, tender in his sympathies and with a heart of compassion for the underprivileged and lost.

His closing days were bright with faith and steadied by hope. His parting words to me many times were these: "The Lord is my light and my salvation; of whom shall I be afraid?" A noble man, a true Christian, a zealous layman has passed from us. He lives and his work shall live after him!

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MOSES LAUCK WALTON, JR.

He took the honor and responsibility of lay leadership seriously, and consecrated to his task all his splendid talents. He was a familiar figure at all our Conferences, always with a smile of Christian greeting and a spirit that radiated hope and courage to all.

The climax of his public service came at the session of our last Annual Conference. It was a great occasion. On the platform were two great bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Bishop McDowell and Bishop Hughes, and our own beloved Bishop Mouzon. He spoke as a layman and judge on the subject of temperance. Unembarrassed by the presence of these great men, and unafraid as he addressed that magnificent audience in our National Capitol, he threw out the challenge of the Methodist Church to the advancing threats of the liquor traffic. It stirred every heart, and a glow of fresh inspiration swept every soul as Bishop McDowell arose at the finish, and said: "I wonder if his sainted father is looking down on the son with celestial joy tonight." It is a strange providence that released so flaming a spirit at the early age of forty-five; but we know that he laid himself upon the altar, and from there it was but a step to the vaster service beyond.

He was born and lived his life at Woodstock, Virginia. On the 28th of April, 1937, he passed from us in mortal life, handing on the torch to those who are called to carry on in the name of his Lord and Saviour.

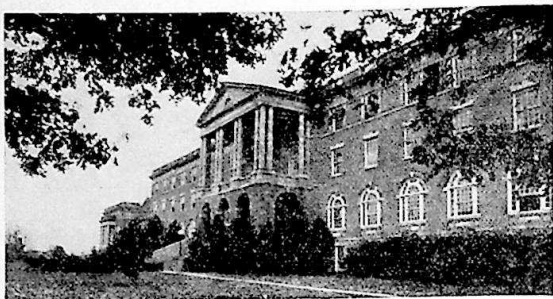

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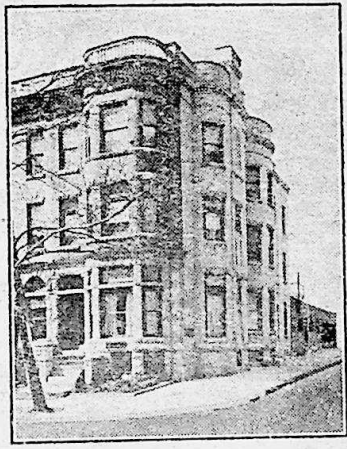
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
