OUR AFFLICTIONS.

We have been sorely strickened with disease and poverty. The great Monster has imprisoned the mortal of Sister Henrietta H., beloved wife of Rev. S. G. Waters. She was ripe and triumphant. Bro. Waters, who has been sick during the year, is much better. We are grateful to know that the brethren in the effective work are all alive and in fair health. Our Providential sup-Port has, in the last two years, been exceeding short. Year before last there was a total failure of corn and berries and a partial failure of oysters; last year our corn was short, less than half-crop, also of berries; no peaches and the Two and One-half Inch law deprived them of oysters for market, so those settlements depending on such produce as was Fairmount, Crisfield, Deal's Island, Nanticoke, Manokin, Stockton or the major part of our work are entirely destitute. Never have our people suffered as they have this year and are now for want of daily bread. For these poor souls only the prisons and alluring low-price saloons are open continually; thus inviting our people to misfortune and destruction, while the spirit of caste and prevailing prejudice are armed with doc it with deadly weapons together with the force of circumstances driving them to misfortune.

TEMPERANCE.

Certainly we have temperance organizations, but not in unity. We have church and schools for those that are able only. We preach the gospel, but not to even schools for those that are able only. 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
