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**RULES OF ORDER**


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**OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.**

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:

(1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present, the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and, if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide, or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

**STATISTICIAN:**—E. O. Parker, the Conference Statistician, collected the statistics by districts.

**REPORTER TO THE SOUTHWESTERN CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE:**—On motion of R. G. Waters, J. W. Fenderson was elected Conference Reporter to the Southwestern Christian Advocate.

## DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS REPORTS.

### CAMBRIDGE DISTRICT.

Dear Bishop, Fathers and Brethren:—

With a spirit of humility, a sense of unworthiness, and a heart filled with thankfulness, I present for review my third annual report of the Cambridge District. By motion our Conference has set a time limit for the reading of District Superintendents reports to fifteen minutes; in order to comply with the law I must be brief and read rapidly. The year now closing has brought to the district many sorrows and many joys. Truly we can adopt the language of the poet who says; "What troubles have we seen! What conflicts have we passed! But out of all the Lord has brought us by His love, And still He doth His help afford and hides our lives above."

Sickness and death:

Brother Joshua R. Brinkley, who was retired at the last conference and who had for several years been indisposed passed from labor to reward April 7th, 1914. A suitable memoir will be presented by Rev. C. W. Downs.

After preaching at eleven a. m., on Sunday, December 14th, 1913, and attending the afternoon and night services of the same day, Brother D. W. Martin of Hurlock charge, on leaving a friend's home, going towards the church fell dead suddenly. Brother Martin was complaining, but nothing serious was expected by his friends. He was a splendid man, and a good preacher. He died respected by the people with whom he lived, white and colored. A suitable memorial will be read by Rev. C. W. Bowling.

On April 26, 1913, as I was about to leave to go on my work to Lincoln, Delaware, suddenly a pistol shot rang out from up stairs. I immediately ran up, only to find my wife lying in a pool of her own blood, lifeless. She was, indeed, a helpmeet, a devoted wife, a consistent Christian. Her loss to me is an irreparable one. Were it not true that I trust in God, believe His word, have His support and the sympathy of the ministers, their wives, and the laymen of the district, in addition to many others who have written and spoken encouraging words to me, God knows, I would have fallen by the way. To Him who has loved, kept, and sustained me, and to my many friends I am grateful. My daily prayer is that I may be able to render something for their many kindnesses to me.

Rev. J. H. Grinnage was confined to his home for two weeks during the winter by la-grippe.

Mrs. G. W. Gillis and Mrs. I. D. Payne have both been very sick during the Fall.

The wife and children of Rev. J. C. Banton have been sick during the year.

Sunday Schools:

Many of our Sunday Schools are disturbed by camp meetings in Summer, and bad roads in the winter. We have not failed to emphasize the importance of Sunday School auxiliary to the church. The organization of temperance

societies in Sunday Schools and Home Departments is generally found in most of our churches.

**Temperance:**

Seeing the need and following the lead of our church, the temperance cause has not been neglected. We are anti-camp and anti-whiskey, hence, with our voice and influence, we give the alarm whenever we have an opportunity to speak against these menaces.

**Epworth League and Sunday School Convention:**

We had a most successful one at East New Market, June, 1913. The young people of our district are becoming more interested in these conventions as was proved by their attendance and reports. The annual addresses by Dr. W. C. Jason and Principal Kiah were very soul-stirring and helpful.

**District Conference:**

We met at Waugh M. E. Church, Cambridge, Md., October, 1914. The annual sermon was preached by Rev. C. W. Bridell. It was a good one; the Lord through him gave us a good start. The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered, we had a glorious and profitable time there for three days. A few opposed to district conferences, were converted there and we are now a unit on the subject.

**Ladies Aid Societies and Methodist Brotherhood:**

They are becoming very popular on the Cambridge district. The Ladies Aid at Bridgeville, Delaware, raised \$334; The Brotherhood \$260. Laurel Ladies Aid raised \$150; The Brotherhood \$80. East New Market Ladies Aid raised \$360; The Brotherhood \$75. Vienna Ladies Aid raised \$182. Madison Ladies Aid raised \$125. Linkwood Ladies Aid raised \$150. South Berlin Ladies Aid raised \$77. Church Creek Ladies Aid raised \$66.

**Charges.**

**AIREY**—J. W. W. Cox, Pastor. The home church at Airey was burned March, 1914. It was insured for six hundred dollars. With the one hundred dollars raised this year for remodeling we have about seven hundred dollars in hand for a new building.

**BECKWITH**—R. C. Hughes, pastor. That he has done more and gotten the folks there in better mood than any other pastor is the verdict of one of the most influential members.

**BOX IRON**—I. D. Payne, pastor. At one time this year it was thought best that the pastor move. I agreed with the thought and told him. Since then he and his folks have taken on new life, hence I do not know what the Bishop may do.

BRIDGEVILLE, DELAWARE—J. W. Fenderson, pastor, finished his eighth year with better success than any previous year; advance along all lines. He succeeds because he is a manly man, a good leader and has an earnest people who follow his lead. Raised for all purposes \$1365.

BRIDGEVILLE CIRCUIT, DELAWARE—G. R. Hollis, pastor. No man could have done more under the unfavorable circumstances with which he has had to work. He reports: Raised for all purposes \$600.

CAMBRIDGE, MD.—Waugh, S. S. Jolley, pastor. This is unquestionably the hardest point on the district. We have the right man stationed there, I was fearful of Dr. Jolley's health in October. God has through medical skill brought him out. He now possesses health and strength. Waugh is alive spiritually and financially. His best year is the fourth, just closing, surpassing any previous year in benevolent reports. Five thousand dollars have been secured, a loan from the Home Mission and Church Extension Society at five per cent, by the pastor. A new heating apparatus has been installed in the church and needed improvements added at the parsonage. Conversions 21; Accessions 25; Paid pastor \$900; Raised for benevolence \$223; Raised for all purposes \$2800.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT, MD.—S. J. Hammond, pastor. He closed a successful year and reports, Conversions 9; Accessions 21; Paid pastor \$375; Raised for benevolence \$40.

CHURCH CREEK—J. R. Powell, pastor, this work has not done all that was possible to be done, no fault of pastor, he is a preacher and a leader, the folks are indifferent in following his lead and carrying his plans. There has been needed improvements made on the parsonage. Conversions 10; Accessions 17; Paid pastor \$300; Raised for benevolence \$60; Raised for all purposes \$600.

N. W. Brown has supplied Cannon, Del., at a great sacrifice. There is an opportunity and should be a good church at Cannon. The people have worshiped in a private house all the year. Forty dollars has been collected for the church lot. They have a good Sunday School.

J. H. Grinnage has supplied Crapo for three years successfully. Notwithstanding the fact that he has been sick he reports well. Raised for all purposes \$712.

EAST NEW MARKET, MD.—J. W. Gillis, pastor, shows a splendid advance along all lines, in salary, debt-paying, and a remodeled parsonage. Conversions 6; Accessions 4; Paid pastor \$500; Raised for benevolence \$73; Raised for all purposes \$700.

GOLDEN HILL, MD.—This is a part of the original Crapo charge S. W. Cooper has with the cooperation of the people done very commendable work. Lot has been purchased for a parsonage, and \$150 in bank to build the same.

HARRINGTON, DEL.—E. H. Nichols, pastor. Harrington remains y a possibility. Were both churches alike in spirit and in work the possibilit would be brought out. A new organ has been placed in one of the churches besides added improvement in pulpit furniture. Raised for all purposes \$80

HOOPER'S ISLAND, MD.—Supplied by B. F. Nichols, who has done ver commendable work in completing the church, paying the debt, and addin several members.

HURLOCK, MD.—This charge, composed of three churches was sadl bereaved by the loss of its pastor, Rev. D. W. Martin. The people are symp thetic and loyal. They voluntarily agreed to pay the widow the estimat salary, raised the remainder of benevolence, accepted a local preacher to fi out the unexpired term. All of these obligations have been cheerfully an faithfully carried out. Conversions 31; Paid pastor \$625.

LAUREL, DEL.—Has had a prosperous year with C. W. Winder, pastor Conversions 8; Accessions 24; Paid pastor \$625; Raised for benevolence \$153. Raised for all purposes \$1226.79.

LEWES, DEL.—J. W. Cook, pastor. He though early in the year he woul give up Lewes but he has changed and the folks have asked me to recommen him for the ninth year. He is a good pastor, cheerful, studious, up to date and beloved by the people of both races in the town. Conversions—; Acces sions 4; Paid pastor \$400; Raised for benevolence \$96; Raised for all pur poses \$689.57.

LINCOLN, DEL.—Is growing under the pastorate of W. J. Helm. His people ask that he remain there. He does not object. This is a splendid charge, two churches, good condition, and bids to become a station in a few years. Conversions 9; Accessions 9; Paid pastor \$525; Raised for benevolence \$100; Raised for all purposes \$1000.

LINKWOOD, MD.—This charge is too large,—four churches. The pastor cannot reach the people. We recommend a division. T. W. Downs has zealously labored with the people and reports a splendid revival. Conversions 27; Accessions 15; Paid pastor \$500; Raised for benevolence \$28; Raised for all purposes \$800.

MADISON, MD.—Another charge too far reaching, too hard on pastor and horse. Brother J. L. Nichols has done a fair year's work under the circum stances which clearly demonstrates where his work less he would accomplish more. Conversions 17; Accessions 15; Paid pastor \$575; Raised for benevolence \$115; Raised for all purposes \$635.

MILFORD, DEL.—W. E. Hilton, pastor. He and his people think that the district superintendent made no mistake last year in his appointment. Conversions 18; Accessions 17; Paid pastor \$550; Raised for benevolence \$58; Raised for all purposes \$924.

NOTH BERLIN, MD.—T. H. Woodley, pastor. The largest district achievements along all lines have been at this point. Pastor's salary has been advanced a hundred dollars, a thousand dollars in bank for a new church, everything up to date. A unanimous request for his return. Conversions 40; Accessions 50; Paid pastor \$700; Raised for benevolence \$164; Raised for all purposes \$2160.

QUEPONCO, MD.—C. H. Spencer is serving this charge with two churches, as supply for the second year. A lot in an appropriate place has been secured for a parsonage. He is progressive and prosperous. SINEPUXENT, MD.—Has had a quiet year under the pastorate of Bro. Louis T. Robbins, pastor. Conversions 5; Accessions—; Paid pastor \$300; Raised for benevolence —; Raised for all purposes \$418.

SNOW HILL, MD.—J. W. Jewett, pastor. Both people and pastor are happy, church debt paid, and a new and more acceptable place purchased for a parsonage. The people follow the lead of their pastor. C. W. Bridle has closed his second year at Snow Hill Circuit. He has labored hard with the folk, remodeled the church at Huts Chapel, and now he is ready for another recommendation. Conversions 20; Accessions 25; Paid pastor \$300; Raised for benevolence \$39; Raised for all purposes \$475.

SOUTH BERLIN, MD.—Under the pastor Brother C. W. Downes is yet on the advance line. He, too, thinks that Bishop Berry made no mistake in appointing him last year. Pastor's salary has been advanced fifty dollars. Conversions 30; Accessions 8; Paid pastor \$600; Raised for benevolence \$116; Raised for all purposes \$1319.

STOCKTON, MD.—J. C. Bantom, pastor. A good year's work has been done under the very unfavorable circumstances of a sick family. Conversions

14; Accessions 14; Paid Pastor \$600; Raised for benevolence \$75; Raised for all purposes \$750.

TRINITY, DEL.—S. Hammond, pastor. This is a hard charge, on pastor and his family, and horse. The parsonage is located in a remote place, far from people and railroad. Improvements have been made on parsonage this year and the work of the charge has been well cared for at a great sacrifice. Conversions 7; Accessions 4; Raised for benevolence \$67.

VIENNA, MD.—D. S. Quillen, pastor. This is one of our best young men—a good preacher, successful leader, he gets hold of the young people and holds them. A parsonage is badly needed at Vienna and the trustees have promised to build one. He is invited to serve the people for the third year. Conversions 8; Accessions 2; Paid pastor \$525; Raised for benevolence \$56; Raised for all purposes \$1000.

R. W. Thomas has closed the third year with great success at Whaleyville, Md. He does right because it is right; his people follow him. I wish that I had more like him on the district. Conversions 28; Accessions 25; Paid pastor \$408; Raised for benevolence \$42; Raised for all purposes \$741.

#### Summary.

Notwithstanding sorrows and conflicts supplemented by a hard winter, the year has been one of decided advance on the District. Peace and harmony prevails. The hearts, homes and hands of the 35 Pastors, their wives, children and 5500 Laymen have been open to me.

They have consoled and cheered me. In Aug. the brethren insisted that I take off for a month. They volunteered to keep the work ago, this they faithfully did. Feb. 11th, 1914, the preachers of the District presented me with a splendid gold watch and chain.

The Church at Hoopers Island has been completed and paid for this year.

At Snow Hill & Queponco new sites for parsonages have been secured. A lot for a church at Ocean City, Md., secured, the parsonage has been remodeled at East New Market, Md., also an additional room and bath-room added to the parsonage at Milford, Del. The Williamsonville church of Harrington, Del., has put in an organ and pulpit furniture. A new chandelier added to Trinity church, Bridgeville Circuit.

Through the efforts of Rev. J. W. Fenderson, Mr. H. W. Vivian (white) Pres. of the Bank, and Mr. Geo. L. Waters, a building lot, upon which a modern school house of three departments has been secured at a cost of \$1800. The District parsonage has been paid for which cost \$800.

Conversions 784; Raised for Benevolence \$3014; Raised for all purposes \$24205.52.

## CENTREVILLE DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren:—

Our hearts are rife with grateful recognition of the kindness our Heavenly Father hath bestowed upon us in permitting us to present this our fifth annual report for the Centreville District with our effective rank unbroken by the hand of death.

The year has not passed without some of the brethren encountering illness and other hardships, but this they have borne bravely then rallied to defend the cause with renewed and dauntless vigor.

The splendid weather enjoyed the greater part of the year inspired large hopes in the brethren for the causes so dear the heart of the Church, but these hopes have in many cases been marred by happenings beyond our control; for the winters blast has not only played its part by making traffic halt, and many workmen idle, but numerous churches and schools on the district have been closed to prevent the spread of contagious diseases that have appeared in several communities, nevertheless the pastors in the charges affected are doing their very best in these few days of sunshine to make the best showing possible with their reports.

With very few exceptions the pastors and people in the various charges are working in unity to make conditions better in every department of the work.

The Sunday School and kindred organizations on the district continue with increasing effectiveness to serve as the chief channel of church activity.

The influence created by the literature sent from the Board of Sunday Schools is not without good fruit for there is a growing interest in this department that promises a bright future. Wherever the graded system is adopted can be seen efforts on the part of the officers and teachers to be better prepared for their work by training themselves to teach the Scriptures. Such movements have my unqualified support for in this way only can recruits be properly trained for the future church. The Methodist Brotherhood is alive and active in a few charges showing the true spirit of consecration by their work with neglected men, and have given already to some congregations strong and influential workmen who hitherto could not be reached. The number of chapters have increased to twelve, and should continue to increase until each charge find themselves happy with such effective work among men. The work of our Epworth League indeed without needless display gave the greatest and most substantial evidence of an advance in its work at our last district convention that we have yet witnessed. The climax was reached in demonstrations made of the League at work by Junior furnishing object lessons for many anxious workers. The efforts no year on the district have excelled this in continued and systematic attempts to make effective work of personal evangelism, meetings each month were held in different charges with this end in view, the work is welcomed by many enthusiastic laymen. We believe that the co-operative work needed to launch the new financial system throughout the work will be much easier obtained because of these visits to the laymembers.

The work of the W. H. M. S. deserves a place in our hearts and a home for the protection of our girls within the bounds of our conference, but due en-

couragement in every charge to all existing and prospective auxiliaries must precede such a needed advent. We were hopeful that the action of the General Conference giving the Society representation in the Quarterly Conference would have proved a greater inspiration to activity than it has thus far.

The Ladies Aid Societies are in the lead of active organizations in our midst, there are forty one bands of these noble workers making their work for good tell in their respective churches having raised more than three thousand dollars this year.

Following the good example of as many others, twelve charges and the district included have advanced salaries this year from fifty to one hundred dollars each, now 21 of the 28 charges are paying their pastors from \$600 to \$750 per year.

#### Charges.

CARMICHAEL sustained the loss of their school building and hall by fire in the latter part of September 1913. By consent of pastor and the trustees the church has been used for school purposes since. The church work is in good condition with every interest carefully looked after. Raised for benevolence \$103; Conversions 7; Accessions 5. R. H. Coleman, pastor.

CENTREVILLE continues busy nurturing the many organizations for the church, and they in return are responding to every call for advance made by the Denomination. Every interest of the charge is well in hand. The pastor is untiring in his efforts to help his people make the showing most commendable in the community, his devotion to the sale of books and the distribution of other literature well deserves this commendation, also the distinction of being a moveable book concern. Raised for improvements \$125; Benevolence \$231; Conversions 23; Accessions 26. An invitation to return for another year is tendered. J. H. Blake, pastor.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT is in position to make a very desirable charge both because of location and the ability of those composing the membership, the great need is unity and continued liberality that they may take their rightful place in the march of progress. The pastor has wrought well great odds. R. E. Stepney, pastor.

CHESTERTOWN in activity has made this the tenth year of brother Holland's pastorate in their midst the greatest, as also will happenings of the unusual make it memorable. On Sunday night March 1st. the old church building was destroyed by fire leaving the congregation homeless, also sad with memories, for the old church had been to them a place for mental training as well as spiritual for nearly fifty years. The property had been transferred for the site on which the new Janes Memorial Church is being erected, and for which the cornerstone was layed Sunday March the eighth. The loss to the congregation on furniture and fixtures was quite heavy having no insurance thereon. As an evidence of the willingness of the people to make sacrifice the pastor reports \$2000 raised on the new building and for all purposes \$3084. The building is corse of erection will be comodious and attractive, located in a splendid section of the town, and will cost about \$8000.

The pastor is invited to return. The organization of the work is quite complete reporting under these trying conditions for benevolence \$269. Conversions 39; Accessions 34. J. R. Holland, pastor.

CHURCH HILL is a large work with many commendable features. The greater part of the work has enjoyed a marked degree of success, the need of a genuine revival and uniting of forces in the home church seems to be the only thing in the way of making the appointment second to none. The pastor is a strong preacher, and an untiring worker. Raised for benevolence \$61; Conversions 20; Accessions 20. M. W. Clark, pastor.

CORDOVA amid the gloom of having one part of the work closed by an epidemic for a number of weeks is ending the year with reports in excess of last year. The pastors return is desired for the seventh year. The charge reports for benevolence \$84; Conversions 22; Accessions 22. W. H. Hayman, pastor.

DENTON continues to prosper under the lead of Bro. F. T. Johnson despite the repeated attacks of illness that so often interfere with his plans. The Ladies Aid Society donated \$80 on church debt. Thomastown has installed a splendid lighting system. The charge has enjoyed a revival in which twenty souls professed conversion, with 16 Accessions. Benevolence \$148. Every interest has been faithfully served.

DENTON MISSIONS are served with loving zeal in a way characteristic of the faithful pastor Bro. J. H. Cooper. His people are happy and ask for his return. Conversions 2; Accessions 2. The work accomplished by these few people is commendable.

EASTON has enjoyed a gracious revival as the result of prayerful waiting in which 20 professed conversion and many were reclaimed, now 41 are seeking membership with the church. In the most painstaking way every interest of the church has been cared for, and the people are happy. The reports will equal those of former years. Raised for benevolence \$208. The church says that R. H. Wallace is the right man in the right place, return him.

EASTON CIRCUIT is of the opinion that the appointment of L. B. Buchanan as their pastor was not a mistake, he has done good work, and now that he has taken to himself a wife they are sure he will do better. Already steps have been taken to build a parsonage which is the one great need to enhance the facilities for work on the charge. The church at Bambra which is a part of this work has been deserted for nearly two years because of the exodus of our people from that section. Many acts of vandalism to fill one brother Stanley with fear to the extent that he sold the building for \$30 without consulting any one, nor did any one know until after the building was torn down and hauled away. The pastor succeeded in getting the money which will be used to purchase a lot nearer the people. The land on which the building stood was borrowed for worship. The charge reports for benevolence \$24. The work is in a growing condition.

FAIRLEE under the lead of Bro. A. Chase has kept actively engaged all phases of church work. The debts of the charge are in good shape also good spirit for work prevails. A gracious revival in which fifty-six souls found the Lord has blessed the entire work, forty five of this number joined the church on this charge. The work reports for improvements \$43. Benevolence \$114. The pastor is one who wears well and the prospects for greater usefulness are bright.

FEDERALSBURG has to the delight of all concerned been led to the erection of a beautiful edifice which will be dedicated in June. The pastor and people are working heroically to make good every demand of their charge. The amount raised for this purpose is \$600. For benevolence \$100. Conversions 35. Accessions 29. The charge is well pleased and expect pastor W. H. Johns to return.

GREENSBORO is a strong charge and continues to advance to the call of the church, shown by diminished debts, improved churches, increased salary and spiritual meetings. The pastor has not enjoyed the best health but is a constant worker. Benevolence \$90. Conversions 14. Accessions 9. Every interest of this charge has been served with rare faithfulness. J. M. Dickerson, pastor.

LONGWOODS has completed the debt on their parsonage site, and are ready for building. The pastor has done a splendid work with a faithful few already with brighter views ahead. Raised for improvements, and debt \$197. Benevolence \$56. Conversions 8. Accessions 7. S. A. Earle, pastor.

McDANIEL with W. G. Matthews pastor have enjoyed one of the best revivals in their history. The work has been well done, every interest of the church cared for, however the closing of the years work has been marred by closing of churches as a precaution against the spread of a contagious disease found in two or three families within a few miles of this settlement. The reports show for benevolence \$51. Conversions 32. Accessions 32. The flock expressed satisfaction with their leader.

MELITOTA for the second time has enjoyed the pastoral care of Bro. D. R. Dunn, once when a young man and now as an old man but still he is revered and would be accepted if returned. Now after 40 years of service with the weight of more than 70 years carrying an untarnished character he decides to retire and for a while look on at the fray. I am sure we are looking with strained eyes up that path, and our prayers will follow the man of earlier days who helped clear this pleasanter pathway for us. The charge is clear of debt, with echoes of a pure gospel and an upright life lingering. Raised for benevolence \$13. Conversions 6; Accessions 8.

OXFORD enjoyed a spiritual awakening this winter that is considered remarkable because of it being the first to visit the town for many years. The pastor and people are happy and the church greatly strengthened. Fifty persons professed saving faith. The work is well in hand, and constant efforts are made to reduce the debts that have so long involved this work.

Raised for debt \$190. Benevolence \$93. Accessions 50. Faithful service has marked the years work. D. A. Ridout, pastor.

POMONA'S churches were closed from the 2nd of November until the middle of January because of diphtheria on a part of the work, the effect of which is evident in all parts of the work. The pastor reports three conversions, and three accessions. Raised on debt \$150. Benevolence \$52. M. P. Sterling, pastor.

PRESTON presses beyond last years mark in her effort to do as the church asks, also continues preparations for rebuilding the church. Life is very much in evidence in all departments of the church. Raised for benevolence \$184. Conversions 19. Accessions 18. Peace and harmony prevails on the charge. W. C. West is the happy pastor.

RIDGELY is justly proud of one of the best parsonages on the district, so is the good pastor and his wife who have labored hard to make this improvement. Raised for improvements \$365. Lockerman is also proud of an improved church free from debt. This work enjoys a steady growth with a bright future. Conversions 9. Accessions 12. Benevolence \$144. Bro. C. W. Moore expects to return.

ROCK HALL—Jose Angulo the pastor is closing his third year in this charge and has wrought well. Paid on lot \$125. The charge witnessed the conversions of 41 souls and as many accessions. The pastor is a faithful workman.

ROYAL OAK with apparent ease successfully continues a constructive work along all lines. Satisfaction reigns praying the present pastorate continued. The report will equal and possibly surpass that of last year. Raised for benevolence \$225. For improvement \$35. Conversions 18. Accessions 18. Bro. T. W. Cooper is eminently successful.

ST. MICHAELS was blessed with an extraordinary spiritual demonstration during the revival in which 56 persons during the services of one day professed faith and joined the church. The offering for benevolence will equal that of last year at least, amount \$225. Raised for improvement \$250. Conversions 65. Accessions 65. The congregation recognize in the pastor a preacher of exceptional ability, and have made an earnest request for his return. J. U. King, pastor.

STEVENSVILLE ends another happy year with Bro. G. T. Fields as pastor. Intense spirituality has increased liberality on both debt and benevolence. Raised on debt and improvements \$610. The mortgage from Ezlon has been lifted, the church painted and gas lights installed, and also paid for. Conversions 21. Accessions 19. Raised for benevolence \$147. No one need cast a wistful eye for they have advanced the salary and want G. T. Fields returned.

Bro. C. A. Norwood seems as well contented in the Trappe as the folks are to have him there, his work is satisfactory. Raised on debt and im-

provements \$520. Benevolence \$56. Conversions 8. Accessions 6. The pastor is well cared for even in dress and is invited to return.

WILLISTON was visited with a glorious revival this year in which 3 converts and 28 accessions blessed the charge. Raised for improvements \$2 Benevolence \$56. C. J. Hall, pastor.

WITTMAN'S report will be affected because of closed churches as a precaution against the spread of an epidemic, this charge with others have our sympathy. The pastor reports for benevolence \$50. For improvements \$50 Conversions 14. Accessions 14. The pastor is faithfully devoted to the work. A. F. Ennals, pastor.

WOODLAND has the veteran pastor for service having served the Conference 44 years successfully who will ask to retire from active service at this session of the conference. let us wish for him many years to view the growth of the work from soil he helped to prepare. Bro. F. J. Lee reports for benevolence \$31. Conversions 5. Accessions 4. The pastor has been faithful to his trust.

Truly the cause for which we labor deserves far more than reports present, we gratefully deplore our failure to do more, but our most earnest endeavour will ever be to inspire men to attain in life and practice that spirit of brotherhood taught by the way of the cross, that a more effective work may be done for the Master's Cause. How well we are succeeding is not for us to say for we are simply sowers, and this we will do with Gods help knowing that the fruitage is the Lord's.

#### PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

It is to report our work, to be inspected, to catch fresh inspiration and to receive new orders, we have come. We are soldiers of the Cross. Real conditions have confronted us and difficulties have beset us. Sorrow like a lowering cloud have overshadowed us. Our ranks have been broken.

Haman B. Ward, pastor of Bridgeton Charge, after laboring hard to build a new church succeeded so far as to hold services in the new edifice Sunday, Nov. 23rd, 1913, but on the next morning, Nov. 24th, he departed from the body to be ever present with the Lord. He was an effective preacher, a faithful pastor, a brother beloved,—a young man of great promise. He leaves a widow and three small children.

October 7, 1913, Matthias H. Horsey, a retired member of this Conference, in Philadelphia, fell on sleep. He was a veritable son of thunder.

Mrs. T. S. Als, the widow of a much beloved and lamented brother minister, went home to her reward Jan., 1914. She was a woman of great heart and zeal.

The wife of W. R. A. Palmer has been physically disabled during the whole year.

Several of the pastors and members of their families have suffered of illness.

L. Y. Cox, a retired veteran, has been quite sick and though much recovered is still feeble.

This district comprises the eastern part of Pennsylvania, all the state of New Jersey and part of the state of New York—37 appointments. Nearly all of them are in cities and towns. Urban conditions confront us. The increasing migration of the people of African descent northward where they receive better wages and where greater opportunities for pleasure and indulgences are afforded, but where they are not well housed or morally or religious well environed, constitutes a real problem. Our Church for Christ's sake is duty bound to do what she can to solve it. Many believe she is eminently fitted to aid in this work. More fields are calling us to enter and to help save their men, women and children than we have men and means at our command.

This surely is Home Mission field and larger appropriation should be given to it.

It is a pleasure to relate some of the achievements of the self-sacrificing and faithful pastors and churches of this district.

ATLANTIC CITY with A. L. Martin, pastor, has had 115 accessions, 54 by conversion, and has completed and is now worshipping in the Lecture room of their large and beautiful church now in course of erection. It is expected to be finished and dedicated the coming summer. \$1000 is reported raised for all purposes; \$7500 of which has been applied to their new building. Mr. Andrew Carnegie has given them \$1500 to aid in installing their \$3500 organ. The Board of Home Missions and Church Extension has aided with an additional loan of \$10,000. The over crowding of their place of worship every Sunday emphasizes their need of the main audience room. They heartily extend an invitation to the Conference to hold its next session in their new edifice.

BRIDGETON.—Here our late brother H. B. Ward wrought so effectively and sacrificed so heroically that the work of building a new \$3000 church with less than one hundred members became an actual fact. The people nobly rallied to him. The debt has been reduced to \$1600, which is secured by mortgage. George S. Jacobs, a local preacher, supplied the work after the death of brother Ward and has rendered faithful service.

BROOKLYN reports 12 accessions and slight advance in the benevolent collections and ministerial support. L. T. Robbins, pastor.

BURLINGTON—J. H. Blackiston, pastor; Englewood, supplied by F. D. McQueen; Fordsville, H. T. G. Jennings, pastor; White Plains, R. R. Robinson, pastor; and Yonkers, supplied by A. H. Hill, are but missions served at great sacrifice by these brethren. The ministerial support at each of these appointments is painfully small. They should receive a larger missionary appropriation.

ENGLEWOOD—Where an earnest band of true Methodists are now worshipping in a hall is a promising field. They have paid \$1360 for a lot of good location and have an offer for a neat, commodious and well fur-

nished edifice owned by our white Methodist that can be purchased, remove and placed upon their lot for \$5,000. They have sought in vain to have the Board of Home Mission and Church Extension aid them. I shall have them try again. It is a worthy case.

In Yonkers, N. Y., we have a large opportunity if we could purchase a suitable building or a lot and erect a church. We are renting a large store room. The need here is great. Brother Hill and his wife are true missionaries and are accomplishing good work in training the children for Christ.

FORDSVILLE CIRCUIT has had a gracious revival at the Friendship appointment, resulting in 12 accessions.

WHITE PLAINS has shown signs of improvement and have slightly reduced their debt.

CAPE MAY has nearly wiped out their indebtedness but greatly needs a revival. A marked advance is reported in the benevolent collections. E. E. Parker, pastor.

CHESTER, ST. DANIELS, has spent \$457 in improving their property. The pastor, W. T. Hemsley, led his church in the Anti-Saloon campaign that put two notorious liquor saloons out of business.

CHESTER, SILOAM, with W. E. Waters, pastor, has redeemed their parsonage and placed it in a building and loan association where easy payments are required.

GRENLOCH AND RHOADES—M. C. Jennings, pastor. The Grenloch Church has cancelled its entire debt and the Rhoades Church has renovated, beautified and reseated the Sunday School room.

HUDSON has made some progress and is clear of debt. With an organized Ladies Aid Society of 40 members and a Methodist Brotherhood of 44 members hope sees a star. The pastor, H. T. Johnson, has faithfully presented the benevolent collections.

MAGNOLIA has reduced by \$550 the debt on the church besides keeping up current expenses and advancing the benevolent collections. P. M. Shelton, pastor.

MERCHANTVILLE with J. W. Parker, pastor, has paid \$125 on Church and parsonage debt under unfavorable circumstances, beside making a fair report on the benevolent collections.

MONTCLAIR report 69 accessions; 41 being conversions; \$600 paid on Church debt and an advance in ministerial support and the benevolent collections. F. H. Butler, pastor.

MORRISVILLE—The pastor, A. R. Shockley, has been on the job and improvement can be seen on all lines.



MT. HOLLY charge is alive. There is a marked increase in the attendance upon the public means of grace; 18 accessions; a new organ has been installed and an advance made in the benevolent collections. A. E. Liles, pastor.

NEWARK with J. R. Waters, pastor, reports \$700 paid on old indebtedness and 17 accessions.

ORANGE—Well organized, children carefully trained, Sunday School graded, 19 accessions to the Church, and renovation of the Church completed and paid for bespeak the effectiveness of J. C. Dunn as pastor and the co-operation of the people.

OCEAN CITY is a summer appointment and was served by D. H. Henry. \$150 was paid on all indebtedness. After the summer season J. T. Shaw supplied it and organized a Sunday School.

OSSINNING supplied by E. F. Morris has nearly wiped out their indebtedness and advanced the benevolent collections.

PLEASANTVILLE has had a year of marked success. A church 40x62 has been purchased, removed and placed upon a substantial foundation built on their lot. They have now a beautiful and well equipped edifice. They have raised \$847 on building and improvements and have had 17 accessions. J. A. Kiah, pastor.

CALVARY with C. A. Tindley, pastor, is a soul saving and character building station. The spirit of Methodism richly abides here. They have had 250 conversions, 515 accessions and have raised for all purposes over \$13,000—an average of \$250 a week. They have raised for benevolent and Conference collections, \$1100. Here, we have a well organized, enthusiastic, devoted people. Although the pastor has served them 12 years there is a unanimous request for his return. Every Sunday it is impossible for all who desire to hear him preach to gain admission.

FRANKFORD with W. R. A. Palmer, pastor, reports improvement of Church property and slight reduction in debt and an advance in the benevolent collections. This means much considering the adverse circumstances under which the pastor has labored.

GERMANTOWN has had a remarkably prosperous year. They have lifted the mortgage on the church, reduced the debt on the parsonage, raising for old indebtedness \$1405.50. They spent \$124.35 for repairs and increased the benevolent collections and raised all the apportionments for ministerial support in full and had 59 accessions. J. T. Fletcher, pastor.

HAVEN with J. R. Brown, pastor, has purchased a nine-room parsonage with modern improvements, located near the church. They have raised for improvements \$796.75, and paid on old indebtedness \$915.70 and

advanced the benevolent collections over last year more than 100 per cent and raised an increased apportionment for ministerial support in full. They had 63 accessions. This charge has a great future, being admirably located and fully alive to the interest of our Master's kingdom.

JOHN WESLEY has made marked improvements. The congregation has increased and they have had 30 accessions and raised \$300 on old indebtedness. M. V. Waters, pastor.

ST. PAUL is but a mission and is greatly in need of a suitable edifice. Yet it reports an advance in the benevolent collections and 7 accessions. B. F. C. Parker, pastor.

SOMERVILLE reports 5 accessions, \$246 paid on improvements and \$204 on old debt. The children here are being well trained and the Sunday School is making rapid progress. W. S. Brown, pastor.

ZOAR with F. J. Handy, pastor, has had a year of success and reports \$700 paid on improvements, \$500 on old indebtedness and 86 accessions. The old mother Church is marching on.

SALEM reports 21 accessions, \$200 paid on old indebtedness and an advance in the benevolent collections. W. J. Moore, pastor.

SALEM CIRCUIT with H. R. Purnell, pastor, has had a hard struggle but reports 9 accessions.

SWAINTON, a rural charge, has had marked success and reports 17 accessions, all conversions and a great advance in the benevolent collections. E. P. Smax, pastor.

SPRING LAKE, a summer appointment, was well supplied by J. C. Johnson, Jr., and reports \$230 raised for old indebtedness.

WOODBURY.—Here a new frame church costing \$700 has been erected in a suburban settlement of our own people. \$318 has been paid on it. Energetic and persistent work has been accomplished. They report increased ministerial support and benevolent collections. Supplied by R. H. Tilden, pastor.

Two missions have been started this year. One at Atlantic City, where Charles Freeman, a local preacher, has supplied the need of a densely settled section. It has a class of 12 members and a Sunday School of 52 scholars.

At the earnest request of some laymen I visited Egg Harbor City, N. J., in company with Rev. A. L. Martin and organized a church with 12 members, March 10th, 1914. The outlook is bright. There is no other church of colored people in that growing town.

This district has had this year 615 conversions, 1151 accessions. And now has 6403 members and 870 probationers.

Notwithstanding the handicap of the severe winter and the disagree-

able weather on so many Sundays the benevolent collections will equal if not surpass last year.

Three church edifices are in the course of erection and are nearly completed.

#### Pastoral Support.

The meagre salary paid many of the pastors where the cost of living is the highest is a serious handicap to efficiency. Poorly fed and ill equipped workmen are not of the greatest advantage to the employer.

Some of the churches are learning it is no wise economy to cheapen the pastor and keep his salary down to the minimum as to estimate and maximum as to deficiency.

It is a pleasure to note that several charges have increased both the estimate and the payment of salary. Also some have adopted a financial plan by which the pastor receives his support regularly and promptly at stated times.

I hope to see the time when all the charges will treat the paying of the preacher in a businesslike and brotherly way.

I think there will be an increase in the amounts for the support of Bishops and Conference Claimants. These claims have been faithfully urged.

#### Sunday School.

Our Sunday Schools in most places are improving. We received great instruction and inspiration from a Sunday School institute held in Calvary Church, Philadelphia, Oct. 10th and 11th, 1913, under Dr. L. O. Hartman, Superintendent of Institute work of the Board of Sunday Schools of the Methodist Episcopal Church, assisted by Dr. C. C. Jacobs and others. Since then several schools have been graded. We hope the Board may be able to give us more such institutes.

There are only a few pastors who do not take proper interest in Sunday Schools and the young people. Attention has been called in every Quarterly Conference to the importance of having the Sunday School organized into a Missionary society and into a Temperance society.

#### Temperance.

I believe in creating sentiment so strong that no one can continue in official relation in the local church who is known to be in sympathy with the liquor traffic.

This foe must have no quarter. Down with King Alcohol. Let us arouse our people to an indignation that will cause them to rise in might and majesty and help thrust out of our land this enemy of all races and all classes, this foe of God and man. Let us join hands with those who fight this cursed traffic by advocating national constitutional amendment. The call is to war. The fight is on. Let us rally to the cry. No longer support at the ballot box the adherent or the sympathizer of king alcohol.

**Efficiency.**

Our aim is for maximum efficiency and minimum waste, for conservation as well as development of our spiritual forces.

A ministerial institute was held by this District in Philadelphia, Oct. 8th and 9th, 1913, and care was taken to stimulate and promote greater efficiency for doing the work assigned us. Bishop Berry attended and instructed and inspired us by his address.

I am glad to report so much has been attempted; something has been accomplished. I am sorry we have not done more. We rejoice, however, there remains in us a burning zeal to labor for the Lord and serve his people.

I thank our Heavenly Father for health, support, guidance and comfort—yea for innumerable blessings; and the pastors and people for kindness and co-operation.

I highly appreciate and now publicly acknowledge the good work of my predecessor, F. J. Handy, and all who have led the district before me. They have made it possible for the work to advance.

This my first annual report is respectfully submitted.

In the wisdom, goodness and tender mercy of Him whom we serve I am permitted to present this my third annual report of the work of the Salisbury District. We are glad to say that by earnest toil and steadfast loyalty of pastors and people the District has enjoyed another prosperous year. The Lord poured out His blessings upon us and the work succeeded. But in the midst of these Divine blessings we have not been without our afflictions.

Driving from Newtown to White Haven wharf on September 22d, 1913, to reach Salisbury in time to fill an engagement with the superintendent of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company to straighten out some insurance papers for brother R. G. Riley, the writer was thrown from his buggy by a runaway horse, from which he sustained a compound fracture of his right leg. The injury was serious but by having the treatment of a skillful physician, Dr. S. Norris Pilchard, the Lord healed the limb in two and a half months and the writer was able to continue his District work in good condition in three months.

**DEATHS.**—Sister Mary E. Riley, the esteemed wife of the late R. G. Riley, departed this life on August the 6th, 1913, and entered the glory of her eternal rest beyond this veil of tears, in the full triumph of faith.

After suffering for a long time with tuberculosis brother R. G. Riley, seeing that the malady was fatal, gave up hope of recovery, and arranged for his death. He held his last church service on Sunday, November the 2d, went to Centreville, Md., November the 4th, to see his sick father and at 3.30 Wednesday morning, November the 5th, 1913, he passed into that

Haven of rest for which he had labored. Brother W. A. T. Miles will present the memoir.

Brother Samuel Horsey, the father of the Rev. Samuel J. Horsey, died at his home in Liberia, Md., January the 28th, 1914, at the ripe old age of 80 years. He had been a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church for a number of years.

There has been no sickness among the pastors and their families to hinder their work seriously. Brother L. W. Deakins, while driving from Salisbury to Quantico was thrown from his buggy by a horse frightened at an automobile and was slightly injured but he soon recovered. Brothers J. K. Adams and I. H. Johnson have been on the sick list during the year.

**YOUNG PEOPLE'S ORGANIZATIONS.**—The Sunday School and Epworth League Chapters are potent factors for the moral and spiritual training of our youth. There has been quite an improvement in these organizations on the District. The Epworth League and Sunday School Convention held at Lawsonia, Md., last June was full of interest and exceedingly helpful. The addresses of Dr. J. O. Spencer, president of Morgan College, Dr. W. C. Jason, president of the Delaware State College, and Prof. T. H. Kiah, principal of Princess Anne Academy, were so rich in thought and information that they inspired the young people to greater efforts and better work has been done this year.

**TEMPERANCE.**—The pastors are unitedly in favor of the Anti-saloon movement in Maryland to suppress the liquor traffic. A business that disturbs the peace of communities, impoverishes homes and destroys the human body, soul and spirit. If the Maryland Legislature would pass a measure to stop the shipment of liquor into the dry sections would help to destroy the speakeasies which are so damaging to the young life.

**EDUCATION.**—Princess Anne Academy with its active and efficient principal, Prof. T. H. Kiah, A. M., is doing an excellent work in all of its departments. The improvements in the Industrial training department deserves special mention. The greatest need there now is more room. The increasing number of boarding students knocking at the door of this christian school each year for admission and have to be turned away for lack of room is indeed deplorable. There should be room enough provided upon that campus to accommodate members of our race seeking a christian education so that the invitation can be whosoever will may come and equip yourself for usefulness in the drama of life. The school is in the best condition of its history. It has grown nearer to selfsupporting under the present management than ever before. Too much credit cannot be given to principal T. H. Kiah and president Spencer. The atmosphere in the school is very healthy. All the students are christians. 11 were converted this year. Through the energy of the teachers the Academy has raised \$333 on the Jubilee fund to erect a Domestic Science building.

DAMES QUARTER.—Brother G. T. Townsend has labored in this field for three years with some good results. The parsonage has been paid for, a clear deed secured and the differences between the churches settled. Raised on old debts \$65; Conference collections \$34; conversions 18; accessions 18.

DEALS ISLAND with brother S. A. Waters, pastor, has done well this year. Raised for improvements \$150; Conference collections \$102. Conversions 2; accessions 20.

EXMORE has bought a lot at Keller, Va., and part of the lumber is on the ground to build a new church. The outlook is promising. Raised on old debts \$196; for improvements \$200; Conference collections \$60; conversions 6; accessions 6. Pastor's return is asked for. H. C. Snead, pastor.

FAIRMOUNT, CENTENNIAL, with its new pastor, I. D. Pitts, in the lead, has done well. Raised on old debts \$180; Conference collections \$60; conversions 2; accessions 2. Pastor's return is earnestly requested.

FAIRMOUNT, ST. ANDREWS.—This is a growing charge with a promising congregation and a bright future. Raised on old debts \$412; for improvements \$40; Conference collections \$100; conversions 60; accessions 80. The church is well organized and in good working order. W. A. T. Miles, pastor.

FRUITLAND is spiritually alive and a good work has been done. Raised on old debts \$108; for improvements \$84; Conference collection \$123; conversions 16; accessions 16. W. C. Bowland, pastor.

GREENWOOD has enjoyed a good revival. The pastor is an earnest worker. Raised for improvements \$150; Conference collections \$75; conversions 47; accessions 40. C. W. Shockley, pastor.

HOPEWELL.—This is another growing charge. Brother J. K. Adams has labored five years in this field with great success. Raised on old debts \$20; for improvements \$494.97; Conference collection \$126; conversions 2; accessions 2. The charge is in an excellent condition.

HORNTOWN was taken from the Wattsville charge last year and made into a new charge by adding to it Chincoteague Island and New Church, and according to circumstances a fair work has been done. Raised for improvements \$410.66; Conference collection \$20; conversions 85; accessions 83. Frederick Gillis, pastor.

JAMESTOWN has raised on old debts \$120; for improvements \$100; Conference collections \$75; conversions 5; accessions 15. The Fourth Quarterly Conference voted for the return of the pastor. T. B. H. Coleman, pastor.

KINGSTON with I. H. Bivens pastor has bought a lot at Shelltown and plans are laid to build a new church there. \$500 in bank to build a parsonage. Raised for improvements \$250. Conference collections \$134. Conversions 16. Accessions 23.

LAWSONIA under the administration of brother S. T. Parker has enjoyed a great revival. The church is spiritually alive and an excellent work has been done this year. Raised on old debts \$675; Conference collections \$241; conversions 78; Accessions 91.

LEEMONT has built a new front and steeple to the church at Whitesville and paid off the mortgage on the parsonage located at the bayside. The charge is in good condition. Raised on old debts \$275; for improvements \$399.90; Conference collections \$100; Conversions 10; Accessions 10. The pastor's return is asked for, E. E. Rogers, pastor.

LIBERIA makes one of the best reports for many years. The new church at Liberia was dedicated last June. Raised on old debts \$500; for improvements \$175; Conference collections \$130; Conversions 8; Accessions 10. The pastor's return earnestly requested. L. J. Waters, pastor.

MARDELA SPRINGS—Under the leadership of C. L. Anderson this charge has had another year of pleasant success. Raised on old debts \$40; Conference collections \$95; conversions 34; Accessions 23; Pastor's return is asked for.

MARION STATION has beautifully frescoed the church in town. The work was done by Prof. S. H. Long a skillful artist, to his credit. The charge has done well. Raised on old debt \$269.90; for improvements \$200; Conference collections \$100; Conversions 6; Accessions 10. Brother W. T. Purnell, pastor.

MT. VERNON has enjoyed the greatest revival for many years and a good work materially has been done. Raised on old debts \$82; for improvements \$375; Conference collections \$100; Conversions 92; Accessions 92. C. T. Covington, pastor.

NANTICOKE keeps up her good record in the foremost rank raising the benevolent money. Raised on old debts \$265; Conference collections \$200; Conversions 42; Accessions 42. T. A. Johnson, pastor.

NEW CHURCH is a small Mission that has been attached to Horntown charge.

ORIOLE.—This charge under the pastoral care of W. H. Turner has done a good year's work. The church at Habnab which had been in debt 21 years has been paid for. The church is now free of debt. Raised on old debts \$222.05; for improvements \$224.54; Conference collections \$102; Conversions 5; Accessions 7.

PARSONSBURG following the leadership of brother J. L. Davis has had another year of success. Raised on old debts \$325; Conference collections \$200; Conversions 20; Accessions 20. The charge is in good condition for progress. The pastor's return is requested for another year.

PRINCESS ANNE.—For three years brother J. H. Nutter has labored in his native town, among his home people successfully. The church is completely organized and a good work has been done. Raised on old debts \$169; for improvements \$148. Conference collections \$232; Conversions 2; Accessions 6.

PRINCESS ANNE CIRCUIT—This charge with brother R. H. Boggs pastor has bought a lot and the lumber is on the ground to build a new church. They have money in the bank to begin the work. Raised on old debts \$165; for improvements \$25; Conference collections \$30; Conversions 5; Accessions 5.

POCOMOKE CITY under the administration of its new pastor, brother J. W. Bond, seemed to have taken on new life. The pastor's salary has been increased \$100, and the benevolent collections advanced \$50. Paid on old debts \$375; Conference collections \$200; Conversions 23; Accessions 30. The pastor's return earnestly requested.

QUANTICO—This charge has not done as well this year as it is able to do. Brother L. W. Deakins is a good pastor and has labored hard for the ethical development of his people. Raised for improvements \$29.25; Conference collections \$100; Conversions 6; Accessions 6.

SALISBURY, JOHN WESLEY—This is a strong station and leads the District in benevolent collections. The church is organized in good working order with an intelligent Official Board. Raised on old debts \$600; for improvements \$250; Conference collections \$300; Conversions 12; Accessions 35. Pastor is asked to return for another year. Brother R. G. Waters, pastor.

SALISBURY, WHITES CHAPEL—This is a promising little station. Its growth for the last two years shows that it will soon become a strong appointment. Raised on old debts \$212; for improvements \$144; Conference collections \$51; Conversions 3; Accessions 3; pastor's return is asked for, L. D. Beecham, pastor.



SALISBURY CIRCUIT according to its strength has done well this year. Something has been raised on the benevolences. Conversions 10; Accessions 13; the pastor is requested to return for another year. G. B. Coleman, pastor.

SHARPTOWN has had quite a struggle. Their pastor and his wife were both sick the greater part of the year, and finally both died. The people of this charge deserve great credit for the care given them while living.

Brother R. G. Riley went there sick and unable to do the work yet the people received him cordially and took good care of him and his wife until their death. For which Bishop W. A. Quagle records his thanks and high regards. With all this burden a good work has been done. Raised on old debts \$70; for improvements \$116; Conference collections \$82; conversions 14; Accessions 10. Brother Abraham McDowell served out the unexpired time.

UNIONVILLE—This charge under the pastoral care of brother J. E. A. D. Grigsby has made quite an improvement. The interior of the church at Unionville has been beautifully painted by Prof. S. H. Long who is able to make any church building attractive and beautiful. The salary has been increased \$50. Raised on old debts \$50; for improvements \$500; Conference collections \$75; Conversions 24; Accessions 25. Pastor's return requested.

WACHAPRAGUE—This charge was greatly hindered by the epidemic of smallpox among its members and the hard weather at the last of the year. Yet \$69 has been raised on the benevolences, brother B. W. Berry, pastor.

WATTSVILLE is a strong charge. Brother J. S. Coulbourn has served these people twelve years, and they are just as anxious for his return for another year as if it were his first year. His work is in good condition. Raised on old debts \$285; for improvements \$108; Conference collections \$112; Conversions 88; Accessions 94.

WETIPQUIN under the administration of brother A. W. Lowber is making some progress. Raised on old debts \$75; for improvements \$150; Conference collections \$70; Conversions 12; Accessions 10; pastor's return requested.

WHITE HAVEN—This charge, with brother I. H. Johnson pastor according to its strength has done a fair year's work. Raised on old debts \$115.50; Conference collections \$100; Conversions 6; Accessions 6.

WITHAMS. This is another charge of promise. The work, under the pastoral supervision of Brother J. T. Wallace has advanced on all lines. His people think that they can not do without him another year, thus his return is requested. Conference collections \$160; Conversions 76; Accessions 76.

#### SUMMARY.

The pastors have toiled faithfully for success, we regret that we are not able to make a better report, we planned for larger things. The bad weather in March effected our plans. Organization and efficiency are the only means of

success in advancing the interests of the church. The reports show the following results.

Number of Conversions 986, Accessions 1050, total amount of Conference collections \$4596 an advance of \$528 over last year, total amount collected for all purposes \$28,868.85 an advance of \$2,227.08 over last year. We thank God for his leadership. The glory belongs to him.

Bishop and Brethren:—

By the unmerited favor and the love of God toward us in Christ, I am completing with joy, the term of six years as superintendent of the Wilmington District, and gladly submit this my final report.

The health of the brethren with the exception of brother A. L. Henry, has generally been good. The wife of brother J. W. Jefferson has been ill for more than two months, and her present condition is not indicative of a speedy recovery.

BARCLAY, notwithstanding the counsel and experience of seniority, the importunity of the middle-aged preacher and the restless energy of a younger one, has continually and signally failed to do the work reasonably expected of it. Raised for improvements \$24, on old indebtedness \$115. Conference collections \$40. Accessions 13. J. L. Taylor, pastor.

CATLIN has advanced financially. Both churches have been painted and the parsonage repaired. The entire cost \$100 has been paid. Conference collection \$50. Accessions 3. M. H. Murphy, pastor.

CHESWOLD'S work, the last three years' is really gratifying. The members are more liberal, especially in their contributions to the benevolent causes, and pastoral support. They have a growing faith in their pastor. It has dawned upon them that he is vastly more concerned about their welfare than he is about what he shall receive as a compensation for services rendered. The pastor's life among these people has invigorated their social and spiritual life. A soul stirring revival resulting in 29 accessions has greatly strengthened this charge. Raised on old indebtedness \$60. Conference collections \$50. M. A. Thompson, pastor.

COKESBURY, for the last three years, being especially favored with competent leadership, should have advanced more rapidly than it has, but some day perhaps the blast of the gospel trumpet may awake these sleepy folks into a righteous activity. Raised on old indebtedness \$98. Conference collection \$45. Accessions 11. S. J. Horsey, pastor.

COLEMAN has again taken its place in the advancing columns of the district. It is one of the two charges of the district which has raised all of its apportionments in full. Improvements as follows: a new choir gallery erected

interior decorations, new pulpit furniture, a new lighting system, and new carpets laid. The entire cost of improvements \$400. Raised on old indebtedness \$116. Conference collection \$242. Accessions 14. W. T. Spellman, pastor.

CRUMPTON fluctuates. It has not maintained the place it won a year ago. The two smaller congregations of this charge are faithful in the execution of duty, but the larger congregation is too often indifferent. Raised on old indebtedness \$55, for improvements \$185. Conference collections \$85. Accessions 23. L. S. Moore, pastor.

DELAWARE CITY is putting forth very little effort for the strengthening of its forces and the enlargement of its borders. There are scores out in the hedges and highways, but who will bring them in? Raised on old indebtedness \$172, for improvements \$10. Conference collection \$49. O. P. Dickerson, pastor.

DOVER has to its credit four years of unbroken success. The pastor has not only filled acceptably his ministerial functions, but has successfully pursued a course of study in Delaware State College for Colored Students, and he will doubtless complete the course in the month of May. Raised on old indebtedness \$240, for improvements \$80. Conference collection \$120. Accessions 11. J. W. Jefferson, pastor.

DOVER CIRCUIT has accomplished but little financially. It is not a strong charge, but this year's results are the most insignificant in six. Accessions 15. T. O. Johns, pastor.

GALENA permits nothing to take precedence of its local interests. The members seem to consider all other matters pertaining to church work secondary. The people are honest and industrious, but lack spirituality. They are not wholly indifferent to benevolent causes, but according to their circumstances they should not be satisfied contributing less than \$100 for benevolent enterprises. Raised on old indebtedness \$175, for improvements \$250. Conference collections \$81. Accessions 10. J. A. Jeffers, pastor.

MARYDEL has placed the responsibility of this year's failure on the indifference of the present pastor, but failure here is much more common than success, the pastor is not wholly responsible. These are a wan and weary folk devoid of enthusiasm, with all their balmy and golden days behind them and hopeless as to the future. Raised on old indebtedness \$150. Conference collections \$46. Accessions 19. J. E. Cook, pastor.

MIDDLETOWN still holds its own. The membership is not large but faithful. It is rather difficult to interest young people in church affairs, but 27 have joined the church this year. Raised on old indebtedness \$48. Conference collections \$127. W. A. Hubbard, pastor.

MILLINGTON is cooperating with a leadership which is tried and true, and achieving a success which will doubtless abide. Asbury one of the churches of this charge, has been taken down and moved from its original site to

Chesterville Grove, where the members now live, and here rebuilt. These people who for ten years have been worshipping in a mekeshift rejoice exceedingly in the realization of a long cherished hope, a better house of worship. Raised for building and improvements \$586. Conference collection \$100. Accessions 12. P. W. Price, pastor.

NEW CASTLE has wasted much energy in useless warefares, which has worked ill especially with the pastor's physical condition, frequently rendering him unfit for service, but notwithstanding some things of merit have been accomplished. Raised on old indebtedness \$575, for improvements \$65. Conference collections \$87. Accessions 4. A. L. Henry, pastor.

NEWPORT has not grown numerically, and the earning capacity of the membership has greatly diminished, but there has been no falling off in the contributions. I am fully persuaded that these thirty members do about the best they can. Raised on old indebtedness \$20, for improvements \$140. Conference collections \$35. E. H. Webb, pastor.

ODESSA possessing a remarkably good church and parsonage property, is now in a position to pay its pastor a living salary, and contribute its full quota to the benevolent causes, but there is need of considerable training before these duties will ever be performed. Raised on old indebtedness \$18, for improvements \$139. Conference collections \$50. T. E. Randall, pastor.

PORT DEPOSIT rather impatiently waited the arrival of the pastor who was detained a month at Gammon Theological Seminary, completing his course. He entered upon the work with a determination to make up for lost time. Raised on old indebtedness \$162, for improvements \$90, Conference collections 15, Accessions 5. J. G. Harris, pastor.

PORT PENN, many people of this charge are moving to the cities, and the majority of those who remain at home are more concerned about farming, fishing and fur-trading than they are about the prosperity of Zion. Raised on old indebtedness \$80, Conference collections \$44. Accessions 10. R. S. Johns, pastor.

SASSAFRAS, once sleepy and slow, has at last awakened and is now vigorously active. This has been the most successful year in the history of the charge. Raised for repairing parsonage and other improvements \$231. Conference collections \$100. Accessions 62. J. H. Stevenson, pastor.

SMYRNA has shown remarkable zeal in effort to meet its spiritual and financial obligations, the results denote progress which is unusually pleasing. Raised on old indebtedness \$252. Conference collections \$63. Accessions 15. J. O. Stanley, pastor.

STILL POND is active and strong, and always performs a service in keeping with its strength. The results of this year's endeavor eclipse those of any previous years. One church painted, ground purchased to enlarge cemetery together with other improvements costing \$540, and the same has been paid. Conference collections \$263. Accessions 15. D. G. Waters, pastor.

TOWNSEND has failed to maintain its record of the last two years. There is an appalling shortage in both ministerial support and the benevolent collections, but something worthy of note has transpired.. A much needed new church has been built at Ebenezer, and \$583 have been paid on the same. Conference collections \$35. Accessions 7. L. E. Toulson, pastor.

WILMINGTON, EZION is one of the historic churches of the Delaware Conference. As a beacon it has stood here more than a century. Its influence is largely responsible for the growth of Methodism among colored people of this town, and on the Peninsula. The membership is well organized and splendidly equipped for doing things decently and in order.

The Delaware Annual Conference assembled here is cordially welcome and everything pertaining to its comfort and pleasure will be most cheerfully considered. The success usually attained by this church is not at all wanting this year. Raised on old indebtedness \$450, for improvements \$463. Conference collections \$650. Accessions 25. J. A. T. Foust, pastor.

WILMINGTON, HAVEN has seen better days. Not long ago it either lost, or purposely threw away the key to success, and it has not yet been found. The hope for better results in the near future was all the consolation obtainable from its last year's accomplishments, but another year has passed, and the hope has not been realized. Raised on old indebtedness \$150, for improving parsonage property \$90. Conference collections \$90. Accessions 5. J. L. Parker, pastor.

WILMINGTON, Mt. JOY is the other charge that has raised all of its apportionments in full. Every interest of the charge has been carefully looked after and success is the sequence. Raised on old indebtedness \$350, for improvements \$61. Conference collections \$301. Accessions 7. D. H. Hargis, pastor.

PARTIAL SUMMARY: Raised for Board of Foreign Missions \$574, Board of Home Missions and Church Extension \$579, Board of Freedmen's Aid \$232. Total Conference collections \$2557. Total raised on old indebtedness, for building and improvements \$6132. Total pastoral support \$15,235. Grand total \$23,927.

During my term of supervision of the Wilmington District five churches have been built, and twenty five have been renovated. Three parsonages have been purchased, and five repaired, and \$15,658 have been raised to pay for said improvements.

In 1909 the total pastoral support was \$10,600, but it is now \$15,235 and advance of \$4,635. Comparisons are said to be odious, and I have studiously avoided them, but I owe it to the brethren who have heartily cooperated with me in the advancement of the district, and to the laymen who have been both loyal and liberal, to say that, I leave the district not as I found it, the hindermost one of the five, but the foremost.

• For all purposes during this administration \$135,892 have been raised. We have toiled almost incessantly trying to reap something for the

Master, but that which we have gathered is comparatively nothing to the great harvest which waves before us.

The demand for a reason of the hope that is in us is increasingly insistent, and the people should have a clearer conception of Christianity, the religion of Jesus as taught in the New Testament. No better supply for this demand can be found than in the sermons and teachings of the orthodox preacher. Higher critics evincing more scholarship than spirituality, have not been especially helpful to the common people, similar to those who heard Jesus gladly. They are in a measure responsible for much of the doubt which manifests itself in the religious life of our times. The people need the simple gospel without so many ifs and buts.

The child problem is one of the gravest problems which concerns either church or state, and it is more serious because of a general laxity of parental authority. But let it not be truthfully said that the church has become lax in this particular. It means two things; the peril of the child and a loss to the church. That the church has an all important mission to children was demonstrated when the Master took them up in his arms and put his hands upon them and blessed them. The most fruitful source of the church's permanent growth is among the children, and we greatly regret that this source has not been productive of better results. While we have done a fairly creditable work among the children, it is doubtful whether we have thoroughly realized how important the church is to the children.

For six years we have been waging war against intemperance, but it is like Banquo's ghost it will not down, but we are making it more and more uncomfortable for those who engage in the liquor business.

The most pleasant term of my ministry now ends. The welfare of the brethren who have labored with me has been my serious concern, and they have reciprocated the same with faithful service and kindness.

There has been no misunderstanding between me and any brother who has served on the district during my administration. We part in peace. I have, this my last year especially, been the happy recipient of many tokens of esteem in form of receptions, and some of a more tangible character, from both clergy and laymen, for which I am more than grateful.

I leave my brethren in battle array, facing duty, waiting my successor's command to march forward.

## REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

### Report No. 1.

#### EDUCATION.

We shall not infringe upon the time of the Conference by a repetition of expressions of a general character regarding the necessity for continued efforts to inspire our people with a zeal for the highest and best to be obtained in educational advantages for their children. Contentment with such things as we have is not incompatible with persistent striving for better things in the future. Better school houses, better teachers and a longer school term are some of the things demanding our effort ceaseless and untiring.

The encouragement of such of our youths as may do so to avail themselves of the opportunities offered by the secondary schools on our territory is a sacred duty.

Our purpose in this paper is to impress if possible upon those who have been called to preach, the futility of attempting leadership without preparation for leadership. That our fathers wrought well with such material as was theirs to employ is no warrant for the young men of today to neglect the provisions made by our great church that they may train for service. Colleges and schools of Theology established and conducted at great cost of toil and wealth are not for ornament but for use. They are the answer to an imperative need.

Princess Anne Academy and the State College are good secondary schools accessible to more students than attend them. Morgan College deserves not only the recognition given by the University Senate of the M. S. church but also the patronage of those for whose sake it exists.

Gammon School of Theology with splendid equipments for the work is more ready to help than we are to be helped. The doors of the Boston School of Theology and of Drew Theological Seminary are open to those of us who will enter.

We call attention to the recommendation by the General Conference that all candidates for the ministry of our church complete a full collegiate course of study, and, if possible a course in one of our Theological Schools before applying for admission to our Annual Conference. And respectfully submit that experience proves some action must be taken by the Delaware Conference to make this recommendation known and respected. Briefly and plainly can we afford to encourage young men to enter into the Conference whose only mental training for their special work must be gained from the Conference course of study?

If the most favored race find the best obtainable preparation indispensable the success, do we not need the more, because of our disadvantages, the help which training gives?

We recommend great care on the part of our District Superintendent in the recommendation of candidates for admission, and on the part of the Board of Examiners that (1) only those of creditable attainments be admitted on trial and (2) those admitted be required to meet all the conditions of advancement in the several classes.

### FEDERATION OF CHURCHES.

We recommend that the Conference Commission on Federation be employed to hold proper relations with the accredited authorities of other denominations, in order that problems as herein set forth may be settled more properly by the united help of the people and churches concerned.

## TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

(Paragraph for Temperance Resolutions—Temperance Society)

We commend the Temperance Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church for its great activity in the circulation of literature; the dissemination of facts thru the secular and religious press; the promotion of total abstinence by pledge signing in Sunday Schools and street meetings, and its hearty cooperation in the movement for national constitutional prohibition. We urge our pastors to make a larger use of its literature and men, and to raise its apportionment in full.

Whereas: About three-fourths of the territory and one-half the people in the United States are under some sort of Prohibition law; and

Whereas: The liquor interests (mail order liquor sellers) have made a practice of soliciting orders for liquor in "dry" territory, thus bringing prohibition laws into dis-repute and thwarting the will of a majority of the people in such territory, therefore

Be it resolved by the Delaware Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, representing 169 members and 24,000 constituents, that:

We call upon the Postoffice Department of this administration and upon our representatives in Congress to exclude from the mails liquor advertising, just as lottery tickets and lottery solicitations have been barred as contrary to the public welfare. The use of the mails by the brewers and distillers and wholesale dealers in liquors to insult citizens in dry territory, and to promote the consumption of their poisonous beverages, is not a right, but in an outrage upon the rights of fifty million citizens.

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#### FREEDMEN'S AID SOCIETY.

We have in the twenty-two schools 479 teachers and 6,588 students. Increasing emphasis is being placed upon normal and industrial work, while the higher training is still an interesting feature.

Morgan College, Princess Anne Academy and the Lynchburg, Va., Institute, offer exceptional opportunities to those who wish to supplement the training of the common schools, there have been one hundred and twenty



students at Princess Anne Academy during the year, and the outlook for the future is bright.

We call attention to the extraordinary response upon the part of the Church to the action of the General Conference in setting apart a Jubilee Movement to raise a half million dollars, one hundred thousand of which is to be raised by the colored conferences. Her hands were full of labors, not aimless nor misdirected but intelligent efforts to accomplish results of permanent value to those whom she could help.

I can appreciate the loneliness even to despair which may enter the home and heart where love is lost. This was not so here. Affectionate solicitude, a tender and everpresent interest in each other seemed to pervade the atmosphere of this home. They were stationed in two towns where I had lived and knew the people well enough to have them talk to me with great freedom. Their devotion to each other was a fact of common knowledge and frequent comment. I was often the guest in their home, and from personal knowledge can confirm the general impression. Love was here.

To those who have doubts about the future, when once they feel that their experiences cover the allotted range, with nothing more to hope for or to fear, the temptation comes sometimes with resistless power to take the final plunge, courting oblivion. But this woman was a Christian. She was taught from childhood to think of the life to come with a faith unwavering in its eternity of joys, especially precious to those who suffer in the flesh. She would bear the cross believing it the complement to the crown.

My clearest impression of her was that of a woman of remarkable good sense.

What, then, must we conclude? That such an one, active, useful, loved, loving, consciously a child of the heavenly King, clothed and in her right mind would desert her post in the midst of the conflict and willingly court reproof? Not so, not so!

When deeds fraught with momentous consequences are committed without reason, reason has been dethroned. Our sister was not herself. The real self—the mind, has left the earthly temple even while that which we call life remained.

God's will, not ours, be done!

The shadow is deep, my brother; you grieve, but not alone. Our hearts mourn with you and we cannot did them cease.

"Yes, grieve; it can be no offense to Him  
Who makes us sensitive our loss to know.  
The hand that takes the cup filled to the brim  
May well with trembling make it overflow.

Who sends us grief means that it should be felt;  
Who gave us tears would surely have them shed.  
The metal which the furnace does not melt  
May yet be hardened all the more instead.

Yes, grieve; 'tis nature's, that is, God's behest,  
If what is nature called be will divine;  
Who fain would grieve not cannot know how blest  
It is to sorrow and yet not repine.

## IN MEMORIAM.

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### DANIEL WEBSTER MARTIN.

Rev. Daniel Webster Martin, the son of George and Mary Martin, was born in Still Pond Neck, Md., September, 1861. His mother was a devoted Christian and through the influence of this Christian home he was converted to God at 15 years of age and joined Union Methodist Episcopal Church at Coleman, Md. He was united in holy wedlock to Miss Clara Wilson in 1883. To them was born 14 children. He was granted local preachers license by the Quarterly Conference at Coleman and in 1894 he supplied Trappe, Maryland, filling the unexpired term of Rev. Robert J. Waters and served that charge 1 year and 6 months; he also served Greensboro, Md. 3 years; Church Creek, Md. 2 years; Aireys 4 years; Nassau, Del., 6 years; and Hurlock, Md. 2 years and 8 months. He was admitted in the Conference in 1902 and his success as pastor, organizer and builder, proved that the Conference made no mistake in admitting him. He was a good and forceful preacher. It can be truly said he made himself thoroughly acquainted with his work. All the children knew him well and were glad to see him some. Too much cannot be said of him as a manager of his work. But like a true soldier he fell at his post of duty on Sunday night, December 14, 1913 at 9:45 p. m. This is an account of his last day's work: Sunday, the 14th, at eleven o'clock, he preached at Washington Church from Psalms 17:15: "And as for me I shall be satisfied when I awake in His likeness," and those who heard him said he was at his best. After services he went to the parsonage and after dinner, he went to Petersburg Church and at three o'clock in company with the writer, listened to a discourse by Bro. Yancy Nichols and at night we listened to a sermon by Rev. Daniel Dafney, a local preacher, and after services he said, Brother Bowling, will you walk with me to Brother John Sprys, it is too close here for me in this church. We went and so strange it seems, it was our last walk together. It was very sad indeed. In the yard at Bro. Sprys he staggered and fell, and before we thought what had happened, death was in our midst and brother Martin was gone from this strange world of ours, no more to gather its thorns with its flowers. He died in the midst of his congregation, loved and revered by all and his pastoral work up to date. He was a kind husband, father and friend. He is survived by his wife, four children and five brothers.

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### ROBERT GRANT RILEY.

Robert Grant Riley was born near Centreville, Maryland, Sept. 11, 1867, died at his father's home, Centreville, Md., Nov. 5, 1913, at 3:30 Wednesday morning, the day after election 1913, aged 46 years, 1 month and 24 days.

H., Martha J., Wm. J., Serena M., Minnie E., Earl M., and Harrison R. He was a kind and affectionate, gentle and indulgent.

He joined the Delaware Conference 1878 and served faithfully the following charges:

Parsonburg, 2 years; Vienna, 3 years; Snow Hill, Md., 3 years; Denton, 2 years; St. Michaels, 3 years; Kent Island, 5 years; Middletown, 4 years; Chestertown, 2 years; Princess Anne, 3 years; Federalsburg, 2 years; East New Market, 2 years.

His eyesight was failing for some time, here it became so dim he found it necessary to cease work. This to him was a hard blow. To be compelled to leave the work he loved so well, seemed to prey on his mind which cast a mental gloom over his last years. But at any time in his lucid moments any reference to his former joys of spiritual life and power would cause gleams of light to beam from his furrowed brow and exclamations of joy burst from his lips.

The Rev. Mathias Horsey was no ordinary church builder. Churches and parsonages are dotted all along the way of his earnest tread for progress.

His early training was very limited, but he seemed always to hear St. Paul's charge to his son Timothy: "Study to show thyself approved unto God; a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, mighty, divining the work of truth." The people heard him gladly.

He was mighty in song. With a soul weighted by love, sweet melodies flowed from his lips like the gentle zephyrs floating through the tops of the weeping willows. How hundreds hungered to catch the sweet strains that seemed to well up from a spirit filled soul!

Many will recall with what fervor he sang his favorite song in love-feasts in Cambridge, Md., "Angels get my mansion ready, I am coming home."

He no doubt has gone there and is now enjoying that beautiful mansion. Oct. 7, 1913, 6.30 a. m. he laid down the old worn out frame. The old eyes from which the light of earth had faded laid down till the resurrection power shall bring the light of glory, and this mortal shall put on immortality. "Then shall be brought to pass the saying death is swallowed up into victory."

Rest, brother, they toils all over, thy trials all past, thy work all done. We will meet thee at the margin in sweet by and by.

#### HAYMAN BRATCHELL WARD.

"For me to live is Christ, to die is gain."

Those of us who knew him believed the above words befitting the life and faith of Hayman Bratchell Ward, whose body sleeps beneath the sod; but whose soul rests with God.

Hayman Bratchell Ward, the son of Henry and Elizabeth Ward, was born August 10th, 1878 in Sassafras, Maryland. When he was seven years old his parents moved to Lawnside, New Jersey: taking Hayman

with them. Two years later his mother died, and he was hired to a farmer in the neighborhood for his board and clothing. He attended school about five months in the year; but did not get to church more than three times during his five years stay with the farmer. This did not satisfy his thirst for education and religion, which had now become evident. God opened the way for him, and he soon found himself into the friendly home of Mr. John L. Stevens, who lived near Magnolia, N. J.

He then attended the public schools of Snow Hill, N. J., and in 1902 sought larger opportunities for his mental growth by entering Morgan College, Baltimore, Md. Here he applied himself to books and mastered subjects in a manner which called forth the respect and commendation of both students and faculty. In this institution it was discovered that Hayman B. Ward was endued with extraordinary gifts, which gifts he used in after days to the glory of God, and for the uplift of his people.

Brother Ward was converted in 1897, and joined the Mount Zion Methodist Episcopal Church in Magnolia, N. J. In 1899, he was licensed to preach by the Rev. W. C. Dickerson. On Oct. 10th, 1905, he was married to Miss Hattie M. Welsh of Woodberry, N. J. In the same year, he was appointed to supply Jericho, a mission with seven members. He went to his work in dead earnest believing in the presence and power of God's spirit. He bought the ground and built a church at Jericho, doing much of the work with his own hands. A gracious revival blessed his ministry, and nineteen were added to the church in that village. In 1907 he was received on trial into the Delaware Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. At this time the North Camden Church was attached to the Jericho church, forming the Woodberry circuit. He remained there until 1910, and was appointed to the Fordsville Circuit. Here he reopened and remodelled the church at Friendship. For two years, he served this charge with great faithfulness. Several were added to the church. In 1912, he was appointed to Bridgeton, N. J. Here he also built a church, and had a revival in which twenty-three souls were converted to God. This was Bro. Ward's last appointment, and proved to be the best and crowning work of his ministry. The beautiful church, which he just had time to finish, stands as a monument to his memory, and a glory to those who loved him.

On Friday, November 22nd, 1914, the church was completed; but he finished the windows himself on Saturday the 23rd, and on Sunday morning the 24th conducted the first service in the new church. This was said to have been one of the most spiritual meetings in the history of the organization. God approved the work of his servant by giving him one soul for his hire. Bro. Ward sang two hymns, "My hope is built on nothing less," and "I shall know Him." He told the congregation that he felt much better, and that if it pleased the Lord for him to get well it was all right, and if not, it was all right: for he belonged to the Lord, and had nothing to fear. He was at the church again in the afternoon and conducted a platform meeting. In the evening, he started to church for the third service, but his physical strength, which was not equal to his holy ambition, failed him like a wounded soldier on the battle field, with sharp bayonet in hand, and not able to wield it, he took a last earthly look

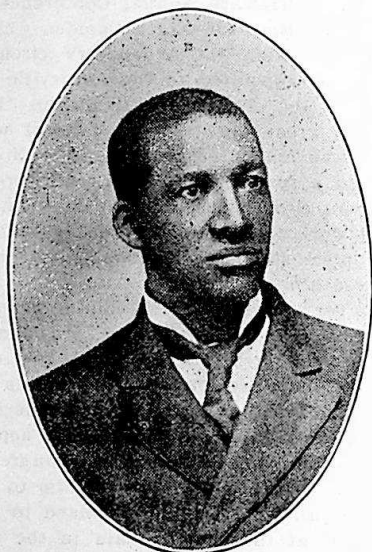
toward the church, gave up, and was helped back to his home where watched and cared for by his loving wife, he sat in a chair all night waiting the summons from on high. It came with the rising of the sun. As quietly as a child would fall to sleep in its mothers arms, he passed to be with God. A soldier of the cross, who had stood in the front of the battle, left the militant host, and joined the host triumphant.

"His sufferings ended with the day,  
Yet lived he at its close  
And breathed the long, long night away,

The funeral services were held in the new church at Bridgeton, and also in Mount Zion Church, Magnolia, conducted by Dr. J. H. Scott, District Superintendent. A good many of the ministerial brethren were present, and joined in praising him, whom we all had learned to love.

Bro. Ward is survived by a wife and three children. May God bless, preserve and keep them.

**JOSHUA RICHARD BRINKLEY.**

The late Rev. Joshua Richard Brinkley, the son of the late Rev. Joshua and Elia Brinkley, was born at Odessa, Delaware, August 22nd, 1850.



His father was one of the pioneer ministers of the gospel. He was one of the memorable ten Charter Members present in the organization of the Delaware Conference by Bishop E. S. Janes, July 29th, 1864.

The elder Joshua was noted for his piety. He was an earnest preacher of moral righteousness. Even in those early days his conception of righteousness enabled him to teach that there is no divorce between the Christian Religion and morality. In this regard young Joshua was the legitimate heir of his father's belief. For moral earnestness was the consuming passion that actuated his Christian endeavor both as a layman and as a minister.

His early boyhood was spent at Odessa. At the age of sixteen, he migrated to Wilmington. Spending three years here, he went to Philadelphia. In the autumn of 1873 at Zoar M. E. Church during the pastorate of the late Rev. Wesley J. Parker, he experienced his second birth.

As a lay member he was a faithful laborer in his Master's vineyard. He uniquely served as an usher, as trustee, as president of the board, as an exhorter, and as Local Preacher. In 1880, he was elected delegate to the Lay Electoral Conference. His Christian activities as a lay member in Zoar Church were contemporaneous with the illustrious pastorates of the Revs. W. J. Parker, J. Q. Dennis, W. C. Dickerson, Drs. W. H. Coffee and W. F. Butler and W. H. Thomas.

October 28th, 1875 he was married to Miss Amelia Catherine Parker, the daughter of the late Rev. W. J. and Mary E. Parker in Philadelphia, Pa. She proved to be a suitable companion and a very helpful asset to him during his life.

In 1885, at Salisbury, Md., he joined the Delaware Conference. Two years later he was ordained deacon by the late Bishop John F. Hurst. The sainted Bishop Thomas Bowman ordained him elder in 1889 at Chester, Pa. He served very acceptably the following charges: Bridgeton, N. J., 2 years; Cheswold, Del., 1 yr.; Church Hill, Md., 2 yrs.; New Castle, Del., 2 yrs.; Salem, N. J., 2 yrs.; Haven, Wilmington, 2 yrs.; Centreville, Md., 3 yrs.; St. Michaels, Md., 2 yrs.; Siloam, Chester, 1 yr.; Fairlee, Md., 4 yrs.; Coleman, 3 yrs.; East New Market, 3 yrs.; South Berlin, 1 yr.

His father had preceded him as pastor in the Bridgeton, Cheswold, New Castle, and Haven charges. What sacred memories must to have arisen in young pastor Brinkley's soul inspiring him to the most ardent endeavor as the shepherd of his people in these especially memorable folds.

As a minister of the gospel he was an earnest conscientious student of the Bible. The love for righteousness was the controlling passion of his being. His ministerial life was somewhat strenuous. His devotions to the Biblical ideals of holy living compelled him to undertake the work of a reformer in each charge he served. He believed that every Christian ought to be at his best in service for his God, and duty for his fellowman. Hence every manifested evil in the social and religious life of the people of his pastorate felt the forceful touch of his Christian zeal. Campmeetings as modernly conducted were giant monsters of iniquity to be annihilated. The material welfare and social betterment of the community

demanded it. As an evangelist many souls will rise to pronounce him blessed.

Bro. Brinkley had a passionate love for the beautiful as well as the good. The churches and parsonages of his charges were usually remodeled or renovated. He always tastefully beautified their general surroundings. He possessed marked ability as a financier. In some of the charges served he not only satisfied the monetary obligations incurred by himself, but cancelled several large debts of long standing. He had the coveted good record of having never failed to report his benevolent apportionments in full.

He was especially interested in the religious growth of the young people. To him the future advancement of Methodism depended upon the careful infoldment and skillful indoctrinating of her youth. Ill health characterized the latter part of his ministry. Notwithstanding this, his intense zeal supplemented by the deep and broad sympathies and affectionate regard of his wife for his parishioners coupled with her herculean labors enabled him to maintain his previous high standard until the last. While at East New Market he took severely ill, but his indomitable will enabled him to rally again to health. At South Berlin, Md., early in the Spring he was again threatened. But through the deep sympathy of the people, and the medical skill of Dr. Ira Tyndall, he was greatly revived. During the Summer, he seemed to be quite restored to his usual health. November 1st, 1912, he again showed signs of failing health. He continued to grow worse until Feb. 12th, 1913, when he became bedfast. The Fourth Quarterly Conference unanimously requested him to return to serve them another Conference year. Through the recommendation of his District Superintendent he stopped in Wilmington, March 31, while enroute to Conference, to consult Dr. Samuel G. Elbert as to the advisability of acquiescing with their request. The doctor advised immediate rest in a private residence where he could give him special attention. Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Woodland proffered the hospitality of their splendid home, which was graciously accepted. Here he lingered for 17 days, tenaciously holding fast to life. For he said, "I am ready to die but I want to live to serve." Finally after repeating some favorite passages of Scripture and a prayer by the Rev. John L. Parker, he said, "I have given up everything." His last words were—"I desire that all the young people in the whole world shall be saved." After this, 5 p. m. on Wednesday, he became semiconscious, and finally unconscious. The end came at 2 p. m. Thursday, April 17th. "He was not for God took him." Aged, 62 years, 7 months, 25 days. When known as he really was, he was usually esteemed very highly by the brethren and the people.

He leaves to mourn their loss: an affectionate wife, two brothers—Thomas B. and Joseph D. Brinkley, and a sister, Mrs. Henrietta Rothwell and many other relatives and friends.

The funeral services were conducted at Zoar M. E. Church, Philadelphia, April 21st, 1913 with Rev. C. W. Pullett, D. S., presiding. A large representation of the ministry was present. Eulogies were delivered by Revs. Dr. J. H. Scott, J. R. Brown, and the writer. Resolutions of sym-

pathy were read from the Centreville and Wilmington Districts by Revs. R. H. Wallace and J. L. Parker respectively.

Revs. E. H. Webb, J. A. Jeffers, J. H. Harman, L. E. Toulson, A. L. Henry and W. A. Hubbard, were the pallbearers. Interment at Eden Cemetery, Darby, Pa.
