## RULES OF ORDER

#### OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is move and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:

<u>.</u> :- (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present, the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and, if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide, or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

He has been in poor health all the year, so much so that at the 3rd Quarterly Conference an assistant pastor was appointed. The people are loyal to the church and the financial part of the work has not suffered. New electric lights have been put in the church and paid for. Parsonage remodeled, pastor paid, and benevolence up to last year.

LINCOLN.—M. W. Clark, pastor. This was another good fit. This charge has met every request demanded this year. 20 conversions. Salary advanced \$75. and paid. Benevolence in advance of last year. The people have asked for pastors return, and he wishes it may be the Bishops pleasure.

MILFORD.—Has a careful pastor, a good preacher, a painstaking man. His work always shows advancement. Conversions 20, accessions 15. The spiritual condition of the charge is excellent. Salary increased \$50. Beenevolences in advance of last year.

NASSAU.—S. J. Horsey, pastor, is winding up his first year. This has been in all probability one of the most successful years of this charge. Brother Horsey is painstaking and successful. He reports conversions 20, accessions 21.

NORTH BERLIN.—T. H. Woodley is closing his third year at Berlin. Nothing of real interest escapes him. The church si well organized, and working well. 15 conversions. Benevolent collections in full. Money in bank for a new church, pastor's salary paid. A unanimous request for pastors return.

SNOW HILL CIRCUIT.—L. T. Robins—the conundrum of the District and the Conference, with great possibilities to do and be helpful to his people, but to a great extent used otherwise. He reports 20 conversions, and 10 accessions.

#### CENTREVILLE DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren:-

With thanfulness to our Heavenly Father for His abundant and sustaining grace, and to my co-workers for their loving service and fellowship, I submit this my sixth annual report for the Centreville District.

Death has entered our effective rank this year reaping rather a rich harvest as his first within the six years. Sunday, April 12th, 1914, while ending his first day's labor Melitota was suddenly shocked by their new pastor R. E. Stepney falling by a stroke from which he never rallied, his death occurred eleven days later. November 12th, after a lengthy period of illness S. J. Hammond of Church Hill was summoned from a most successful pastorate in the very prime of his life. A. F. Ennels was stricken February 5th died the 8th surrounded by his companions and friends among whom possibly the greatest work of his ministry was being accomplished, suitable memoirs for these worthies are provided.

The work at Melitota was promptly supplied by the retiring pastor father D. R. Dunn. Church Hill was supplied by W. H. Saunders a local preacher who has shown much devotion to the work both before and since the pastor's death. Carmichael has done marvelously by the help of the surrounding pastors who have not ceased to encourage the faithful and untiring widow and loyal members of the charge. The majority of the churches are well organized, and are anxious to understand the best method

presented by the denomination. In nearly every charge the Financial Plan has been shown and explained, also in our district meetings we have given the plan a prominent place, while many parts so appeal to the brethren that they are used, we are hopeful that an early adoption of the whole is not far off.

Sunday Schools: In nearly all of our churches the work is active and alert concerning the higher possibilties of the institution for moulding the leaders that must manage this new generation if they are to be effective christian workers, but the need in these parts is that the church even though it may have a few gray hairs shall cease to say go, to the youth, but make the saying come, thereby making the church a part of the school, the organization will then feel that it is a part of the church.

Epworth League: Notwithstanding the lack of effective leaders to mann this department in many sections of the districts we have hope for much good, because of the growing interest in conventions, and especially along the line of demonstrations which shows clearly that the work can be done and that some are doing it, and how they are doing it. Our Junior Leagues are in a growing state, most of them are pursuing the studies in courses, becoming yearly as they rightly should members of the church.

The Brotherhood: Only a few of these chapters are active, however in the several communities where they exist a mighty force for good is noticed and acknowledged, I have urged with all earnestness the presence of this organization in every charge.

The Woman's Home Missionary Society has grown in our midst as a reward for the constant efforts of the few who will not accept defeat, numbers of girls are organized and being trained to pust forward this worthy work.

Our Ladies' Aid Societies are very active indeed making possible many things for the trustees and stewards in the charges, their gifts will exceed three thousand dollars this year.

Our monthly preachers' meeting in November was favored with a visit by Dr. J. O. Randell whose stirring addresses on Personal Evangelism inspired our brethren for greater work along the line of personal efforts for the salvation of the masses, and the growth of the membership in our church, the cry is come again, you are always welcome in our midst.

New Churches: The new structure we referred to in our last report as being in course of erection at Chestertown, Md., was dedicated November the 8th. We were assisted in this pleasant task by Drs. J. O. Spence, T. H. Kiah, S. S. Jolly and others. The site and building cost these good people about \$9000. By earnest and untiring efforts of pastor and people and friends \$4000 has been paid ,leaving a mortgage of \$6000 which covers the debt on all property in their possession, all of which is in a splendid location.

At Federalsburg on November the 29th assisted by the pastor W. H. Johns the beautiful new church which is a credit to therapidly growing community, filling a long felt need was dedicated. The pastor reports \$2000 raised and paid on the structure, the remaining sum of \$3000 is cared for by mortgage.

The congregation of Mt. Zion Church on Church Hill Charge has enlarged and beautified their church at the cost of about \$900 as a result of the plan layed by their pastor S. J. Hammond prior to his fatal illness.

Bro. C. J. Hall has succeeded in making the long needed repairs at Bureau on Williston Charge, at the cost of near \$300. This building was erected and given to our people of that section by the Freedmen's Bureau nearly 50 years ago for school and religious worship, much credit is due all who helped to save the old land mark form early decay.

A brief survey of conversions, accessions, and benevolence as reported from each charge are as follows:

Carmichael though greatly affected by the sudden death of their much beloved pastor A. F. Ennals, has labored hard to make good by showing unswerving devotion to the efforts of his hard working and devoted widow who has endeavored to carry out the plans of her companion. The total number of conversions reported this year has reached 710 the number of accessions 393 truly we desire greater results for the Masters' Cause, but we are thankful for these and earnestly pray that they may be saved to the church and give a creditable percentage to the growth of each charge, and a crushing defeat to the enemy against whom we contend.

We regret that our offerings which are very meagre at the best are so largely affected by the general depression so much in evidence everywhere, and especially it seems in our oyster industry upon which the masses of our people depend for their living in many parts of the district. The prices quoted are the lowest for many years, hence some of our brethren have toiled and are sad, others are joyful because they were fortunate enough to make good their collections early in the conference year before the evil days drew nigh thus saving the day for a cause so deserving and dear.

### Summary.

The total number of conversions reported 710; Accessions 393; Benevolence \$2931. 12 charges report gains in membership from 10 to 30 per cent the remainedr except 3 have slight gains, for all it can be truthfully said there exist a better understanding touching this vital work than ever before. Some of the results obtained in the six years labor are the erection of eight new churches, seven parsonages, and the remodeling and enlarging of eight churches, only three charges on the district are without homes for their pastors, two of this number have purchased land and are preparing to build in the near future.

Our conference collections have ranged from \$2928 to \$3457 each year, the highest point per member reached was 91 cents.

I found the work in a splendid condition, with all earnestness my efforts have been to encourage workmen to keep the record high in every respect, how well we have succeeded is left for others to judge.

My expiring days have been brightened with many tokens of goodwill from the kind people whom I have served all of which is acknowledged with a grateful heart, and purpose to render loving and helpful service wherever my lot may be cast, the loving cup, silver and gold yea every article will always be a reminder that it pays to serve men to please God.

My brother a splendid people awaits your coming who are willing to be led upward, a people who love and honor our church, and believe in brotherhood by the way of the cross. Your victory in this field will be my hearts delight.

#### PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

In humble gratitude for divine help and in thankfulness for divine mercy I come to report some of the things, the pastors and people have done for, and in the name of, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Let me pause, however, to note sorrow has overshadowed us.

Jacob C. Dunn, pastor of St. John's Church, Orange, N. J., fell on sleep January 14th, 1915, after an illness of nine days. He was more than ordinarily intelligent, industrious and self-sacrificing. His life was a benediction. He was greatly beloved. He leaves a widow and two children.

The Church accepted the servce of a Local preacher and allowed the bereaved family to remain in the parsonage and continued to pay the promised salary.

Jehu H. Pearce, a retired member of this Conference and the last of those who were in its organization went home to heaven Feb. 7th, 1915.

He was a burning and shining light, loving and lovable. He was highly honored in life and greatly remembered in death.

Several pastors and their families have suffered of sickness.

A. R. Shockly was taken ill three weeks ago and will not be able to attend this session of Conference. Hope, however, is entertained of his speedy recovery.

Conditions, rather than theories confront us in the cities and towns of this northern country where, for the most part the 38 appointments comprising this district, are situated. A constant influx of people of African descent with their social, moral and spiritual needs make it necessary to have wholly alive and wide awake Churches. Such as have for their dynamic the Holy Spirit.

ATLANTIC CITY with A. L. Martin pastor has about completed this beautiful edifice in which we are now holding our session. This is the result of great faith, great sacrifice and strenuous efforts on the part of pastor and people plus the aid of the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension and other friends. Here the "impossible" has been done. Notwithstanding the unprecedent business depression and financial stringency this charge has raised and paid \$5500 on the building, advanced the pastor's salary, increased the Benevolent Collection, had a glorious revival and added 96 to the Church.

BRIDGETON has put in new pews, improved her property, reduced her debt, advanced the Benevolent Collections over 100 per. cent, and increased her membership 57 per cent. J. E. Cook, pastor.

BRIDGETON CIRCUIT with T. O. Johns, pastor, has had 20 accessions a gain of 51 per cent. in members and an increase of over 300 per cent in Benevolent Collections.

BROOKLYN has made a reduction in debt, a gain in membership and advance in the collections.

CAMDEN has had a revival and reports 38 received on Probation and the Church quickened. On account of a large number of the people being without work the collections have come up short. E. O. Parker, Pastor.

CAPE MAY with H. T. Johnson, pastor, paid off their entire property debt of \$400. It was owed to the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension and was over a quarter Century old. The charge has taken on new life and reports 26 accessions and over 400 per cent gain in the Benevolent Collections. A large and better Church building is now their hope.

CHESTER, St. Daniels has enrolled 45 Probationers, and paid \$587 on account of improving her Church Edifice. The pastor made a heroic fight

against the Liquor traffic and against members of the Church signing in favor of Liquor Licenses. He has had to suffer persecution. The charge reports a gain in membership. W. T. Hemsley, pastor.

CHESTER, SILOAM with W. R. A. Palmer, pastor, reports \$100 paid on old debts and an advance in Benevolent and Conference Collections. The pastor also fought nobly in the Anti-Saloon Campaign.

DELAIR has had a revival which has stirred the whole village. 26 conversions and 31 accessions. The charge has a net gain of 10 per cent. in members. The pastor A. R. Shockly was taken suddenly ill three weeks ago but is now convalescent.

EGG HARBOR, a mission supplied by J. T. Shaw has had 6 accessions and a bright outlook.

ENGLEWOOD F. D. Queen has supplied this mission and struggled hard to purchase a lot and needs only help to have a suitable edifice and a strong Church. We are praying that some way may be opened to supply this great and imperative need.

GRENLOCK and RHODES has a hard struggle but has hope of a better day. M. C. Jennings, pastor.

HUDSON, with Malachi Rasin pastor has made slight gain in membership, 12½ per cent. increase in pastor's salary, and over 100 per cent. advance in Benevolent and Conference Collections.

MAGNOLIA has had a harvest of souls; 100 conversions, 63 accessions and greatly increased Church attendance. Benevolences in advance of last year. P. M. Shelton, pastor.

MERCHANTVILLE, with W. T. Purnell, pastor, has had a spiritual and moral revolution. The saloons and degrading pool rooms have felt the effect. The hope of their gains has disappeared. 110 professing saving faith have been enrolled on probation. This charge reports 16 per cent. gain in membership, and greatly increased ministerial support and an advance in the Benevolent Collections. Here what seemed impossible has been accomplished.

MONTCLAIR keeps up her good record of steady advance although she has had the same preacher in charge for 10 years. The main audience room has been renovated and beautified. \$861 paid on improvements, 131 accessions and 10 per cent. gain in membership. The Benevolent Collections are in advance of last year. All other claims fully met. F. H. Butler, pastor.

MOUNT HOLLY with A. E. Liles pastor has had 19 conversions, 26 accessions and raised \$275 on improvements of Church property.

NEWARK reports over 17 per cent. gain in membership, \$594 paid on old indebtedness and an advanc in the Benevolent and Conference Collections. J. R. Waters, pastor.

OCEAN CITY a summer appointment was supplied by J. H. Russum and reports \$101 paid on old indebtedness.

ORANGE was bereaved by death of her pastor J. C. Dunn. The charge had been well organized. The work had been systematically carried on. F. H. Quinn, a local preacher has supplied the work for nearly three months. A fair report will be made. The people have loyally stuck to their Church.

OSSINING supplied by E. F. Morris has had a glorious revival, 25 conversions and accessions and a gain of 27 per cent. in members.

PLEASANTVILLE reports an increase of membership of 16 per cent. \$260 raised on old indebtedness and \$176 for improvements. J. A. Kiah, pastor.

EAST CALVARY with C. A. Tindley, pastor, keeps the revival fire continually burning. 336 have been enrolled as probationers, 140 have been gained in membership, over \$1200 has been raised for Benevolent and Conference collection and over \$12,000 for all purposes notwithstanding a large number of members have been out of employment and in destitute circumstances. This church has helped many. At each service on Sunday this our largest church building is crowded to overflowing although the pastor has just closed his 13th year.

FRANKFORD has done remarkably well raising \$600 on account of a fine parsonage well located; increasing the ministerial support and advancing the Benevolent Collections. Considering the circumstances I count this one of the great achievements of the year. W. J. Moore, pastor.

GERMANTOWN with J. T. Fletcher, pastor, paid off the entire debt on the parsonage, \$1500 within the first three months of the Conference year. This charge advanced the pastor's salary, put the new Financial Plan into action and reports everything in full up to apportionment. 68 have been received on probation and the membership has increased 18 per cent.

HAVEN though heavily burdened with debt has wrought well and reports \$464 paid on old indebtedness, \$274 raised for improvements and 44 received on probation. J. R. Brown, pastor.

JOHN WESLEY with M. V. Waters, pastor, paid \$326 on old indebtedness. This is good considering the conditions.

ST. PAUL, in spite of may handicaps has made 28 per cent gain in membership and an increase in Benevolent Collections. Supplied by I. J. Brittingham.

SOMERVILLE with E. E. Parker, pastor, has taken on new life and reports a gain in membership of 29 per cent. and the debt reduced.

ZOAR adopted and put into action the new inancial Plan and reports increased Benevolent Collections, \$1000 paid on old indebtedness and all other claims fully met; 105 received on probation and 10 per cent. net gain in membership. F. J. Handy, pastor.

SALEM with D. H. Hargis, pastor, has had a gracious revival with 32 accessions, paid \$440 on old indebtedness and increased the pastor's support and advanced the Benevolent and Conference Collections.

SALEM CIRCUIT has had a hard struggle but reports 3 accessions. C. W. Shockly, pastor.

SPRING LAKE supplied by J. C. Johnson is a summer appointment only. The Church was burned and seriously damaged last May. But has been repaired and beautified. Services during the Summer were held in a tent and \$102 was raised for building and improvements.

SWAINTON, E. P. Smax who was appointed to this charge was unable to serve on account of failure of his voice. I supplied the work with J. I. Peaco who has had great success and reports 100 per cent gain in members and greatly increased Benevolent Collections.

WHITE PLAINS reports 7 accessions. R. R. Robinson, pastor.

WOODBURY supplied by R. H. Tilden has had 12 accessions and reduced the debt on the Church.

YONKERS is a mission and has had several handicaps, the pastor himself being seriously ill at one time but he has done good work, especially in gathering in the hildren and training them for Christ. An advance in Benevolent Collection is reported. Supplied by A. H. Hill.

## Evangelism.

This has been a year of Spiritual harvest, of great ingathering. Nearly every charge reports conversions and accessions. We have had over 1300 conversions and have enrolled on probation 1318.

The program of the Commission on Evangelism has been presented and urged upon the Quarterly Conferences and several charges have tried it with splendid results.

Would that all our Quarterly Conference members were aroused to the fact they are divinely called to help in the work of leading the unsaved to begin the Christian Life and that they were convinced that it is not only a solemn duty but also a glorious privilege, winning souls to Christ.

Would that all our pastors were aroused to try this program and to stir all our members to help in this Soul saving business, leading folk to Jesus.

We have been favored with the help of Dr. J. O. Randall, Corresponding Secretary of Commission on Evangelism, who conducted two group meetings in Philadelphia and inspired and enthused us for this work.

An Annual District Preachers' Institute was held Oct. 7th and 8th in Camden, N. J. where a large company of ministers studied together how to do more efficiently the work assigned them. Evangelism was the keynote of the meeting.

While the atmosphere in and about Philadelphia was pregnated with Spiritual influences most of our pastors and people have been active in harvesting souls for the Master's garner.

#### Conservation.

The number of Probationers now on roll is the largest in the history of the district.

What we need is greater attention to and effliency in, building up probationers into the Kingdom of God and into the Church so they may become full members and come into a majority experience. The work of conservation needs to be emphasized. While the district as a whole has made a 10 per cent gain in full members, some charges appear very inefficient in holding and building up those who are gathered in. They lose too large a per cent. of their probationers. Caring for converts is an imperative duty. People are not only to be brought into the Church but they are also to be built up in the Church. They are to be properly fed. They need to be put into Bible Classes. They need to be set to work doing something for their Lord and Master. They need to serve their fellow men.

# New Financial Plan.

I have noticed the greatest advancement has been made by the charges that have adopted the new Financial Plan.

At every church where it has been fairly tried there has been not only an increase in the amount of the collections both for Current Expenses and Benevolences but also greater Spiritual results and larger per cent. of gain in membership.

This has been brought before the ministers individually and collectively and before the Quarterly Conferences respectively.

Time has now come when every charge should adopt it. Forward is the command. Victory is the watchword. Faithfulness is the test. We cannot continue to use non-effective and out-worn methods after better ones have been shown us and remain loyal to Christ.

# Temperance.

Eevery Sunday School in the district is now organized into a temperance society.

With the Temperance Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church furnishing the literature needed it remains for pastors and Sunday School Superintendents to stimulate and keep these organizations active. We need such a sentiment generated in all our churches that no member will be continued in an official position who is known to be a tippler. We need to have our churches so aroused that every official and every member will be a totail abstainer and actively engaged in the anti-saloon campaign. King Alcohol must go. Let us all unite to hasten the time.

#### Financial Report.

I think the reports will show that in the collections for Benevolent Enterprises of the Church this district has taken no backward step.

Eevery cause has been looked after. While the financial depression has affected some charges considerably, and they will show a decresase but others have forged ahead and their gains I think will carry the district beyond the achievement of last year.

I respectfully submit this my second annual report.

#### SALISBURY DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren:

With gratitude to our Heavenly Father for His tender mercies, and gratefulness to pastors and people for their co-operation, I present this my fourth annual report from the Salisbury District. This has been an exceedingly hard year for the churches on the Peninsula. The failure of the oyster business, the short farm crops, the low prices of produce, the high cost of living, the scarcity of labor and the small-pox epidemic, affected the financial and spiritual efforts of the churches very greatly.

Some of the charges were quarantined and the churches closed up for several months during the best season of the year. Notwithstanding these advertities, most pastors and their loyal people through sacrifice have wrought well.

SICKNESS AND DEATH: While we rejoice that our ministerial ranks remain unbroken this Conference year, we have been deeply grieved by reason of death casting a shadow of sadness over several of our parsonages. On June 13, 1914, sister Mary L. Waters, the loving wife of brother J. W. Waters, departed this life in peace and entered the Haven of rest. Sister Luela Anderson, the devoted wife of brother C. L. Anderson, on September 21, 1914, suddenly dropped the curtain of death and went up to live with God. Bro. I. D. Pitts mourns the loss of his mother, sister Mercline Pitts, who died at her home in Berlin October 11, 1914, at the ripe old age of 83 years. Brother J. T. Wallace on January 6, 1915 suffered a sore bereavement in the loss of his sister Mrs. Elizabeth Jones, who died at Nanticoke, Md., a devout christian. She had been a member of the Methodist Episcopal church for forty years. These all died in faith.

YOUNG PEOPLES' SOCIETIES: The Sunday Schools, the Epworth League and Junior Epworth League chapters in most charges are progressive. The young people of the District are giving better attention to this work. The Sunday School and Epworth League Convention held at Fruitland, Md., in June, 1914, was an inspiration to the young life of the District. The Masterly addresses given by Dr. J. O. Spencer president of Morgan Coslege, Dr. W. C. Jason president of the Delaware State College, and Dr. P. O'Connell, professor in Gammon Theological Seminary, were full of thought, instruction and helpful to all.

TEMPERANCE: While we have no open saloons in any part of our territory we are affected by the pernicious influence of the speak-easies so damaging to the young life. Strong drink is a curse to the American civilization. It impovishes homes, blasts character and blocks christianity. Hence all our preaches are in perfect harmony with the great movement to suppress the liquor traffic in this Republic, we believe that it is God's will that we should fight this worst of evils out of the nation and have every State in the Union dry.

EDUCATION: Princess Anne Academy, under the principalship of professor T. H. Kiah, A. B., is making excellent progress. The literary and industrial work is of very high grade. The moral and religious atmosphere of the Institution is very healthy. All the students are christians except two. Nine were converted this year, two of whom were converted in the services on the day of prayer for Colleges which will not soon be forgotten. Each school year closes with the entire sudent body christians.

The enrollment of boarding students this year is larger than it was last year. If there had been sufficient dormitory accommodations the enrollment would have been much larger than it now is. The improvements about the Institution are very encouraging. The boys in the blacksmith shop have built a safe fire escape on the old girl's domitory. The work is a credit to themselves and to the school.

One of the chief features of the improvements is the erection of a new girl's Dormitory on the campus at a cost of \$8000. The Delaware Conference assumed the financial obligation and \$3000 has already been paid. Another thousand dollars is to be paid when the building is completed which will be about the first of May. The remaining \$4000 will be secured by notes on safe terms of easy payments.

The building is a beautiful structure 76 feet long and 32 feet wide and four stories high containing 44 rooms. A heating plant has been installed in the new building with capacity for heating each room in both the new and old buildings to temperature of 70 degrees in zero weather and then still have a reserve heating force of 50 degrees, hence the invitation to the youth now is whosoever will may come and the school can accomodate you comfortably. Thanks to president J. O. Spencer, the Board of Trustees of Morgan College and the advisory committee of the Delaware Conference for the interest manifested in the christian education of our race. For the gospel of education is needed among our people as badly as the gospel of religion.

#### Brief Review of the Churches.

COTTAGE GFOVE with brother J. W. Waters pastor has richly furnished the church at Cottage Grove with new pews, pulpit furnature and built a recess pulpit to the church at Westover. Raised on old debts \$50, for improvements \$350, Conference collections \$115, Conversions 21, Accessions 21.

CRISFIELD under the pastorial supervision of brother C. S. Sprigg has installed gas in the parsonage, rebuilt the side porch and laid a cement pave-

ment in front of the building. Raised on old debts \$482. For improvements \$184. Conference collections \$244. Conversions 1. Accessions 16.

DAMES QUARTER.—It was said that no pastor could succeed in this charge without holding a so-called campmeeting. Brother C. T. Covington was sent there this year and he determined to take a stand for God and righteousness. Hold no Sunday picnics but fight vice and Sabbath desecration out of existence. The result of his stand is that the charge makes the best report than for many years. The Lord blessed the charge both financially and spiritually. The church at RockCreek has been neatly remodeled and new furniture put in the parsonage. Raised on old debts \$29.90 for improvements \$434.52. Conference collections \$88. Conversions 103. Accessions 103.

DEALS ISLAND with brother T. A. Johnson pastor, is engaged in building a new church. On the account of business depression they have had quite a struggle. Notwithstanding the building has been shut in so that they can hold services in it. Raised for building and improvements \$700. Conference collections \$81. Conversions 29. Accessions 29.

EXMORE.—This charge was quarantined for several months during the best season of the year. Yet some good work has been done. Raised on old debts \$175. Conference collections \$66. Conversions 141. Accessions 141. H. C. Snead, pastor.

FAIRMOUNT, CENTRAL.—This is a charge where the people leave home seeking a livelihood. Hence the failure of the oyster business effected the church financially. Raised on old debts \$535. Conference collections \$50. Conversions 5. Accessions 5. Brother I. D. Pitts, pastor.

FAIRMOUNT, ST. ANDREWS.—The officials of this charge are determined not to allow their church to fail. Raised on old debts \$257. For improvements \$11.49. Conference collections \$53. Conversions 10. Accessions 10. The church is well organized and in good condition. W. A. T. Miles, pastor.

FRUITLAND.—The people of this charge are farmers, thus the failure of farm crops and the scarcity of labor effected the efforts of the churches financially. Raised for improvements \$137. Conference collections \$147. Conversions 23. Accessions 23. W. C. Bowland, pastor.

GREENWOOD.—This charge, though quarantined for several weeks, has done good work under the administration of its new pastor, brother T. E. Randall, who is greatly beloved by his people. Raised on old debts \$15. For improvements \$140. Conference Collections \$61. Conversions 10. Accessions 10.

HOPEWELL has enjoyed a glorious revival, a new back building has been added to the parsonage and a new front poarch. Raised on old debts \$100. For improvements \$250. Conference collections \$110. Conversions 56. Accessions 56. G. T. Townsend, pastor.

HORNTOWN with Frederic C. Gillis pastor, has built a enw parsonage. It is a neat six room house ready for occupancy next Conference year. Raised on old debts \$160. For improvements \$379. Conference collections \$52. Conversions 25. Accessions 25.

JAMESTOWN under the pastorial care of brother T. B. H. Coleman has raised on old debts \$80. For improvements \$70.16. Conference Collections \$56. Conversions 19. Accessions 19.

KINGSTON.—This charge was crippled in her financial efforts by reason of being quarantined so long. But with brother I. H. Bivens in the lead a good work has been done. The church at Kingston has been beautifully remodeled and neatly furnished with new pews and pulpit furniture. Raised for building and improvements \$1000. Conference collections \$100. Conversions 40. Accessions 40.

LAWSONIA has had a little struggle this year. The pastor has been sick the greater part of the year. The last of the year the pastor and his wife were both sick. But following the careful directions of the pastor, brother W. S. Brown, the work has gone on nicely. Raised on old debts \$208. For improvements \$75.00. Conference collections \$165.

LEEMONT.—This is a strong charge and following the leadership of the pastor brother E. E. Rogers, seems to have taken on new life this year. The church at bayside has been beautifully remodeled at a cost of \$2300 and it has been tastefully furnished with new pews and pulpit furniture at a cost of \$400. The building was dedicated on December 13, 1914, and is said to have a seating capacity of 700 people. Raised on old debts \$200. For improvements \$1500. Conference collections \$105. Conversions 15.

LIBERIA.—Notwithstanding being quarantined for several weeks this charge under the leadership of the pastor, brother L. J. Waters, has done well. Raised on old debts \$50. For improvements \$290. Conference collections \$100. Conversions 6. Accessions 6.

MARDELA SPRINGS is still holding her own under the administration of brother C. L. Anderson. Here the pastor is doing an excellent work to elevate his people. Raised on old debts \$24. For improvements \$62. Conference collections \$82. Conversions 23. Accessions 23.

MARION STATION.—This is one of the strongest charges on the District with a large membership. Following the administration of brother J. H. Nutter the parsonage is being rebuilt and when completed it will be a beautiful parsonage home. But these people have not by any means done as much for the Benevolent cause as they are able to do. They are being misled by some outside influence and thus their interests are divided. Raised on old debts \$264. For improvements \_\_166. Conference collections \$82. Conversions 27. Accessions 29.

MT. VERNON under the careful leadership of brother J. K. Adams, has done a very good years work. The newly appointed pastor is greatly beloved

by his people. Raised on old debts \$230. Conference collections \$104. Conversions3. Accessions 3.

NANTICOKE under the wise pastorial care of brother S. T. Parker makes a most excellent report. The best perhaps than for many years. Nanticoke has become one of the prominent charges of the District with a very loyal people. Raised on old debts \$153. For improvements \$320. Conference collections \$242. Conversions 53. Accessions 53.

ORIOLE.—This charge, at the beginning of the year had some little dissatisfaction about the reception of the new pastor. But after the people became reconciled with brother I. H. Johnson in the lead some good has been done. Raised on old debts \$115. For improvements \$50. Conference collections \$58. Conversions 16.

PARSONSBURG under the skilful management of a strong pastor brother J. L. Davis this charge has become one of the prominent appointments of the District. The work is in an excellent condition and the people say that their pastor is a safe leader. Baised on old debts \$100. For improvements \$200. Conference collections \$200. Conversions 23. Accessions 17.

POCOMOKE CITY.—This charge is one of the leading appointments on the District, and is making excellent progress under the pastorial supervision of brother J. W. Bond. The church is so well organized with the operation of the new financial plan that the charge being quarantined for several weeks did not effect the work at all. The financial obligations were fully met and followed by a glorious revival. Raised on old debts \$550. For improvements \$225. Conference collections \$240. Conversions 68. Accessions 70.

PRINCESS ANNE.—This is the most important station on the District. The faculty and student body of Princess Anne Academy worship in this church every Sunday morning. Under the careful pastorial leadership of brother J. U. King the work is in better condition than it has been for many years. Brother King is a great pastor and an able preacher. The people of the town and the Academy say that they can not do without him. Raised on old debts \$200. For improvements \$500. Conference collections \$300. Conversions 19.

PRINCESS ANNE CIRCUIT.—This charge with brother R. H. Boggs, pastor, has the foundation built and the lumber on the ground to erect a new church. Raised on old debts \$17. For improvements \$178.70. Conference collections \$30. Conversions 6. Accessions 6.

QUANTICO.—This charge with the lead of its new pastor, brother J. W. Parker, has taken on new life. The pastor's salary has been increased \$100. The church has been remodeled, tastefully furnished with new pews and pulpit furniture, and beautifully painted. The new financial plan works fine in this charge. Raised on old debts \$854. For improvements \$855. Conference collections \$70. Accessions 2.

REVEL'S NECK MISSION supplied by brother Roswell Waters has done some work commendable. The little church building has been neatly painted, paid for and something has been done for the benevolences.

SALISBURY, JOHN WESLEY—For five years brother R.G.Waters has served this charge with success. His people respect him as a minister and large congregations gather every Sunday to hear him preach the gospel so eloquently. All the interests of the church have been carefully looked after. Raised on old debts \$212. For improvements \$557. Conference collections \$265. Conversions 63. Accessions 65.

SALISBURY, WHITE'S CHAPEL.—The little congregation of this charge is faithful and loyal to their church. There is a very bright future dawning upon it. With the pastor, Bro.L.D.Beecham in the lead a systematic work has been done. Raised on old debts \$144. For improvements \$196.30. Conference collections \$52. Conversions 2. Accessions 3.

SALISBURY CIRCUIT is in a struggle building a new church at Hebron, a town where a church is badly needed. When this building is completed they will have a nice congregation there. Brother G. B. Coleman and his people are making every effort to succeed with this work. Raised for improvements \$113.65. Conference collections \$14. Conversions 26. Accessions 26.

SHARPTOWN.—This charge with brother W. H. Turner, pastor, has made progress. The parsonage has been nicely furnished, and neatly painted. A new barn, carriage house and a stable have been built. Raised on old debts \$525. For improvements \$785. Conference collections \$102. Conversions 47. Accessions 47.

UNIONVILLE.—This charge was effected by the small pox epidemic and one church was quarantined for several weeks. But with the pastorial care of brother J. E. D. Grigsby some good work has been done. One church has been neatly repaired. Raised on old debts \$200. For improvements \$250. Conference collections \$31. Conversions 20. Accessions 20.

WACHAPREAGUE CHARGE with brother A. A. McDowell pastor, makes an excellent report. These people are loyal and the work is in good condition. Raised on old debts \$458. For improvements \$175. Conference collections \$90. Conversions 127. Accessions 127.

WATTSVILLE is a strong charge with a large membership many of whom are quite wealthy: Under the administration of brother J. S. Coulbourne a lot has been bought at Atlantic and plans are laid to build a new church there. Raised on old debts \$517. For improvements \$49. Conference collections \$158. Conversions 25. Accessions 25.

WETIPQUIN.—Brother A. W. Lowber has served this charge for four years with success. His people love him an stand by his administration. The church at Wetipquin has been neatly furnished with new pews and pulpit furniture. Raised on old debts \$211.17. For improvements \$213. Conference collections \$60. Conversions 36. Accessions 35.

WHITE HAVEN following the leadership of brother S. A. Waters as pastor has had a year of success. The church at White Haven has been nicely furnished with new pews and pulpit furniture. Raised on old debts \$200. For improvements \$278. Conference collections \$120. Conversions 22. Accessions 22.

WITHAMS with the wise and skilful leadership of brother J. T. Wallace this charge has made excellent growth. The charge was quarantined and one of the churches was closed for several months, but the churches were so well organized that the work did not suffer at all financially. All the obligations were fully met. Brother Wallace is a splendid pastor. Raised on old debts \$165. For improvements \$136. Conference collections \$120. Conversions 27. accessions 27.

# Summary.

I have kept every interest of the church constantly before our people, and earnestly requested the collection of the apportionments in full for our church benevolences. I believe that both pastors and people have done their best to make the work a success. Adverse circumstances prevented us from reaching the goal at which we aimed. The reports show the following results.

Conversions 927. Accessions 1075. The number received into full membership this year 800. The total conference collections \$3900. Number of churches rebuilt 4, and two new churches and one new parsonage. We love the kingdom of christianity and our hearts are in the work of God.

#### WILMINGTON DISTRICT.

The year has been one of incessant labor. We were met when we entered upon our duties with receptions and kindly words in a large number of churches, and were made to feel at home among a generous Methodist public, and loyal hard working pastors. We were given Godspeed in the heartiest manner.

There has been no break in the ranks of the Ministers on the Wilmington District. The health of the Ministers with the exception of Bros. A. L. Henry, J. A. Jeffers, and W. F. Cotton, has generally been good. Rev. J. A. Jeffers was stricken with acute indigestion April 26th, but soon recovered and resumed his work until Dec. 26th, since then a Local Preacher, Nicholas Brown, has carried the work on.

W. F. Cotton was taken ill July 5th, and his physician advised him to take a rest for a while.

Rev. A. L. Henry has been in his pulpit every Sunday with but few exceptions.

Too much cannot be said of my predecessor in regards to the condition he left the District. He said in his last report, "he found it the hindermost and left it the foremost", and it is a well-known fact, that it is harder to climb than to fall. I have righteously striven to hold the place gained. Whether I have succeeded judge ye after the report is heard.

#### The New Financial Plan.

I have everywhere brought forward and explained the new financial plan in the Quarterly Conferences; and related how successful the churches are that have adopted it, but they are slow to attempt it. Some have promised to adopt it in the near future.

#### Sunday Schools.

Our Sunday Schools are improving. Most of the Superintendents are active and doing all they can to train the children, but the need of teachers is the chief cause for failure. In many places the children gather only to find the teacher absent. There is a very great need of a teachers training class in every church, so the teachers may be prepared for this important work.

The Epworth League is hard to keep active the year round. An Epworth League and Sunday School convention was held in Smyrna on June 15-17, and the meeting was very profitable and helpful to the leagues in many ways, through the reading of papers, and the large amount of Sunday School and Epworth League literature that was for sale, and through such gatherings our people have purchased nearly \$100.00 worth this year; if this continues, and there is no apparent reason why it will not, our young people's societies will surely improve.

### Review of the Charges.

BARCLAY reports a fair year's work. One of the churches, Friendship, does her whole duty, gladly. St. Daniel could do as well if she would. It is discouraging to the church that reports in full while the other fails, to have the charge reported a failure. I shall report the work of each church and by so doing hope to encourage those that have done well, and show which have not. Accessions 33. Conference collections \$48.00. Rev. J. L. Taylor, Pastor.

CATLIN. Regardless of the high cost of living, these people are not willing to estimate a comfortable support for their pastor. \$400 is not enough for a family, and the pastor must keep a horse out of this; yet the pastor is cheerful and willing to serve them another year. Accessions 2. Conference collections \$35.00. M. H. Murphy, pastor.

CHESWOLD has greatly advanced, spiritually, financially, and socially. The pastor, M. A. Thompson, has worked heroically to this purpose, and the people appreciate it by increasing his salary and the benevolences. The churches are in union and the result is a splendid revival at each church. Accessions 51. Conference collections \$85.00.

COKESBURY. This charge is not doing according to the opportunity. Enough people are there for a strong church. They own acres of land, but it is not developed, hence no progress. The pastor, H. T. G. Jennings, is trying to organize them into an improvement association, and if this is done it will help greatly. The pastor has organized a mission at Perryville with eight members and has had a revival that resulted in 12 converts. The outlook is bright for a prosperous mission, as no other place for worship is near for our people. Accessions 47. Conference collections \$18.00.

COLEMAN. This charge has more young people within its bounds than any one church in the rural district, and they attend church regularly. If they are organized they can accomplish a great work each year. Rev. Spellman has given them three years of earnest service. Accessions 3. Conference collections \$145.00.

CRUMPTON is a circuit of three churches. Two of them, Mog Neck and the Mission, meet their obligations. Pondtown is often in the rear, and since they have the largest membership it is expected that they would do more. The women are anxious, but they cannot carry all of the burden. This charge has been blessed with a gracious revival, and it is to be hoped that the spirit of giving, as well as receiving, will possess them. Accessions 61. Conference collections \$65.00. B. C. F. Parker, pastor.

DELAWARE CITY. The leading member on this charge says that it is rapidly improving under the leadership of Rev. O. P. Dickerson, and in a short time the debt will be cancelled and a commodious parsonage will be erected. Kirkwood feels the loss of one of its faithful members in the person of Bro. G. T. Williams, who was always at his post of duty. He passed to his home beyond. Accessions 3. Conference collections \$45.00.

DOVER is the only charge on my District that is trying the New Financial Plan. The officials te!l the Pastor that they will look after the finance and he can look after the spiritual work, and they do it. The pastor, J. W. Jefferson, knows how to hold the young people together, hence the church is well organized. He is ending his fifth year, and they unanimously ask his return. Accessions 12. Conference collections \$197.

DOVER CIRCUIT has set a pace for herself under the leadership of Rev. H. J. Steward. The charge has advanced along all lines. Camden leads with Bells Chapel close at hand and this will inspire Jones Neck to do more next year. Accessions 12. Conference collections \$51.00.

GALENA. When it comes to raising money this charge leads the District. It has not been very spiritually inclined; but under the leadership of Rev. L. E. Toulson it has had quite a revival, such as has not been for many years. The charge lost a very influential member this year, Bro. Robert D. Peaker, who looked out for the pastor well. For twenty years no pastor has left that church without his salary. He is no more. Accessions 26. Conference collections \$84.00.

MARYDEL reports a fair years work. I am quite sure that this charge would do better spiritually and financially if it would cease to hold the kind of campmeetings that it does. It is unreasonable to think any church can prosper by desecrating the Sabbath to gather finance. They have been made to see the evil of such and many of them have promised not to support such again. Accessions 27. Conference collections \$36.00. H. R. Purnell, pastor.

MIDDLETOWN. The spiritual condition of this charge is good. Rev. J. A. Jeffers proved to be the right man for this place. His health has been poor all the year; until Dec. 20th he was in the pulpit every Sunday; since then he has not been able to be out of doors. He organized the young people to do good work in the Sunday School and Epworth League, and was gathering the children about him, as was his custom, indoctrinating them in the doctrine of the Methodist Church. The charge has not fallen below the record that it holds. The pulpit has been supplied by a Local Preacher, Nicholas Brown. I have looked after the pastoral work. Rev. Jeffers sees no prospects of a speedy recovery, and thereby is compelled to ask the Conference to release him for a while, that another may take his place. Accessions 18. Conference collections \$150.00.

MILLINGTON. Under the leadership of P. W. Price this charge steadily advances. This is a strong circuit of two churches, and both are in union with the pastor and each other, hence nothing but success can come to them. This is an active charge, young and old work in the church. Accessions 25. Conference collections \$85.00.

NEW CASTLE. Rev. A. L. Henry's record in this Conference is well known, and when any report of his work is not in class "A 1" we know that something serious has happened to him. And so it has. He is broken down in health and has not been able to preach, plan and work as before. His ever faithful wife is also ill, and had to be taken to her daughter's home in Salem, New Jersey. Two weeks ago while Bro. Henry was visiting his wife in Salem he was taken to his bed and he had to secure a local preacher to fill the pulpit. These conditions have caused him to have the report you hear; such he has not reported for 23 years. He asks permission of this Conference to rest a while—ere the Master calls. Accessions 22. Conference collections \$28.00.

NEWPORT has not many members; but the most of them may be depended upon. They are loyal, self-sacrificing, and perfectly willing to remain a station. They are struggling to raise money for a new church though the times are hard in the money matters, yet they have raised this year \$244.00. Accessions —. Conference collections \$32.00. E. H. Webb, pastor.

PORT PENN, a circuit of three churches, reports a good year's work. It has lost some very influential members this year, which is keenly felt. This charge is seriously affected by Sunday excursions during the summer

at the piers, which take the people from the church and Sunday School. The pastor, R. S. Johns, has labored faithfully to win souls for the Master. Accessions 2. Conference collections \$51.00.

ODESSA. The pastor, L. W. Deakins, went to this charge very happy, thinking it was as he knew it twenty years ago. But, Oh, what a change! Twenty-five persons were present to hear him deliver his well prepared sermon. He was affected with the blues before Monday and he possessed them for six months or more, until he succeeded in gathering a good congregation together each Sunday, and had a revival. Today he is as happy as when he went. This should remind us that we may not be satisfied when we are sent where we desire. This is the best year for Odessa since it has been a station. Accessions 9. Conference collections \$50.00.

PORT DEPOSIT is a small station, and it is difficult for the charge to support a pastor and keep up the local interests in the church. The stone quarry, the main dependance for the laboring men, has been closed since last December, but in some way the members have managed to keep things moving on fairly well. Rev. J. C. Harris is an earnest worker among the young people. Accessions 6. Conference collections \$20.00.

SASSAFRAS steadily rises to a higher mark. The pastor, J. H. Stevenson, is the right man for the place. Each of the three churches have had good revivals. A plan is on foot to move the Poplar Neck Church near Cecilton, which will be near the members. This is no longer the dead Sassafras; but a living charge. Accessions 47. Conference collections \$95.00.

SMYRNA is in a splendid condition. Quite a spiritual awakening has come over it, resulting in a good congregation every Sunday. The debt that has so long embarrassed it is being rapidly reduced. Here are a loyal set of people, deserving our highest commendation. Accessions 14. Conference collections \$42.00. J. O. Stanley, pastor.

STILL POND is the strongest circuit on the District, and Rev. D. G. Waters is the man for the place. They have advanced in salary and benevolence. The spiritual condition is good. The two leading churches paid the pastor's salary in December. The young people are planning to build a hall for socials. Accessions 61. Conference collections \$185.00.

TOWNSEND, under the leadership of L. S. Moore, has come to the old place she once held. Scott's Mission has been reorganized and is active. Ebenezer Church was dedicated on June 28th, and since then the officials have put in pews, organ and lights. The best of all the church has had a glorious revival and many souls have been added to the Church Lees' Chapel and Haven are rapidly improving. This charge looks favorable to become one of the strongest on the District. Accessions 54. Conference collections \$146.00.

EZION, WILMINGTON. This stately edifice has the best location of any colored church in Wilmington. The church is well organized, and contains as large a number of church working women as any church in the Delaware Conference. They have worked hard to bring about success. This year has been very hard for them, and yet, Ezion sends up a fair report. The bonded debt has been reduced. Ezion's members usually do things well and send up a report commensurate to their strength and pride, and when they do otherwise they can tell their reason for so doing. Such is the case this year. Accessions 10. Conference Collections \$622. J. A. T. Faust, pastor.

HAVEN. These people were elated over having W. F. Cotton sent to them as pastor, and they looked forward to see great improvement in their church, and so they did. The attendance was larger and collections better; but to their sorrow Rev. Cotton was taken suddenly ill on Sunday, July 5th, and the nature of his illness was such that Dr. Elbert advised him to take a vacation for three months. The pulpit was supplied by the Brothers of the District and the local preacher, Bro. Atwell. Rev. Cotton returned, but his strength was not as before, hence he could not preach and work as he had done. The charge holds its own compared with a few years past. A new pipe organ has been installed, the parsonage renovated and refurnished, a cement pavement laid along the whole front with steps to the church and home and sewerage connections made, all at a cost of over \$400.00 and nearly all paid for. The quarterly conference asks his return, hoping that he will come to his normal condition and yet bring them to their coveted place in the conference. Accessions 3. Conference collections \$100.00.

MT. JOY. This is a strong charge financially, when the people have a mind to work. Last year's report should make them ashamed of this year's, as it is so far below. The pastor, W. E. Waters, is a good man no one doubts; but he was not able to bring the factions together to do a creditable year's work. There is a division among the people, hence a church divided against itself can not succeed. They need a real baptism of the Holy Ghost, and not until this is received will Mt. Joy do much spiritual work. Accessions 00. Conference collections \$140.00.

#### Revivals.

The spiritual condition of the District is fair. There has been a very earnest desire, and I believe, honest effort, this year on the Wilmington District, to have a revival, and some charges have had gracious revivals, and have rejoiced in the same. Not all reaped as they hoped. Some very devoted, earnest pastors sorrow more over the failure to win souls they see perishing, than any other disappointment. Though the church is quickened, souls have been strengthened, people have come to a larger conception of privilege and duty, and a richer experience and who can tell the good this accomp ished?

Fifteen pastors report more than the 10% increase in their membership. Cheswold leads the District, and with the following named charges stands in class "A 1": Barclay, Cokesbury, Crumpton, Galena, Marydel, Middletown, Millington, New Castle, Odessa, Port Penn, Sassafras, Smyrna, Still Pond and Townsend.

### Temperance.

We are with the Anti-Saloon League heart and hand, for a saloonless nation. We know no party when it comes to voting for the dry, and against the wet. We are teaching our people the necessity of pledge signing, the effect alcohol has on the human system, and the damaging effect upon the offspring. We have very little trouble to persuade men to pray against rum; but it is hard, very hard, to persuade all that pray, to vote against it.

My fellowship has been delightful with my brethren and the people to whom I am a debtor, for many kindnesses shown me during the year. I am glad for the opportunity of service which has been mine, and when my report is commented upon by my brethren, if they can say, perhaps they can, "He did his best. He played the man. His ways were straight. His soul was clean. His failings not unkind or mean. He loved his fellowmen, and tried to help them," I shall be satisfied.

#### VISITING PRINCESS ANNE ACADEMY.

The educational atmosphere of the school now is clear and invigorating, recitation in class work puts each student on their mental mettle and merit, since there is an effort made on the part of the teacher to have the scholar master the matter in hand, not only from the author's point of view but also from his own personal appreciation of the methods in vogue and the conclusions of other authors on the same subject. This is true of all the teachers in literary work and in music.

Just a word on the musical progress of the school. It is nothing short of the facts in the case when we say the Princess Anne Academy is a new school from the standpoint of musical taste, intrepitation and rendition.

There are four pianos on the floors of the building and they are being pressed to their utmost capacity by Mrs. Klah, the student body and Miss Bowen the expert instructor of the department. The book work of the school is thoroughly done. Each year students come to us better prepared to enter the academic work and so we are about to cut off the lower couses.

The morals of the school are good. The statement here made is from the watchful christian principal. The committee was impressed with the high moral attitude of the principal and that the students are as safe here morally as they are in any christian home.

We also remark at the unusutl good health of the students.

We visited the departments in the following order: 1. Domestic Science. 2. Printing Office. 3. Carpenter Shop. 4. Poultry Yard. 5. Dairy and Barn and. We found the Domestic Science Department neatly arranged and modernly equipped with sewing machines, coal range and an alchohol cook stove, everyone was busy in this department.

Th printing department was in perfect shape and every eye was on the type or press or page. Prof. Reed is a master hand at printing having turned out the "Marylander and Herald" for the white press of Princess Anne town when it was burned out.

The carpentry department was alive in its every available space. The very latest machinery has been installed and the boys are "hewers of wood" but with the hand of a skilled worker.

All praise to Prof. Cordry for his skill and anxiety to train our boys for usefulness.

The new Domitory is about complete at this writing; having cost \$8,000 and is one of the finest buildings on the Eastern Shore of Md., the conference building committee consisting of S. S. Jolley, J. R. Holland, C. A. Tindley, J. H. Nutter, J. W. Jefferson ond of which District Superintendent Rev. W. J. L. Hughes is chairman deserves highest commendation for their tireless efforts, careful planning and personal financial sacrifices to make the building a tangable reality, also the trustees of Morgan College and Doctor Spence have indeared themselves to the race in general and the Delaware Conference in particular for their hearty co-operation and leadership in this great effort. Three cheers to Prof. T. H. Kiah and his wife for their brilliant success and high standard and christian service in the literary, moral and religious uplift to these young Americans.

#### FREEDMEN'S AID SOCIETY.

More than ten thousand of our young people are doing better because of what the Freedman's Ald Society has done for them, these schools are still the main dependance of our 325,000 members for trained and consecrated pastors, physicians, teachers and christian teachers.

Many are in preparation for the christian ministry, missionary work at home and abroad, even in Africa which is now represented by more than a score of native students, in our schools.

We are still a poor weak struggling people, handicapped by many hinrances. Serving as we do amid social industrial and economic conditions our employments are the least renumerative. Our people cannot pay the full cost of their childrens education, hence they must be the victims of leadership without training.

We cannot commend too highly the great work of Gammon Theological Seminary and rejoice in the scope of work to be undertaken in this the wealthiest school of the prophets for our race in the world, few institutions of any race can boast of such a magnificant endowment.

#### MORGAN COLLEGE AND ITS BRANCHES.

The work of the schools of Morgan College corporation has been successful during the year, 356 students enrolled, 39 students in the college proper, the largest number in our history. A course in Philanthropy or Social Service has been organized under an expert in housing and social betterment.

Princess Anne Academy goes steadily forward under the leadership of principal Thomas H. Kiah, A. B.

The Summer School so successfull last year, will be held again, June 28 to August 6.

This has been a year of shadow as well as sunshine. Dean Young of the college was paralyzed in the summer, but is now able to move about with

difficulty, March 25, 1915, his beloved wife Francis Young departed hence, to be forever with the Lord. Bishop Henderson appointed Dr. Irvine of Bay Shore, N. J. to conduct revivals in our schools, 23 were converted and reported in the privilege of the new life.

In view of these facts we commend the appeals of the board for funds to meet its obligations and pledge our support of plans for creditably returns for our local schools.

#### GILFORD MAZIE LANDIN.

Rev. Gilford Maize Landin, son of Josiah and Dianah Landin, was born in the city of New York, October 11th, 1842.

His parents were devoted christians, and through their influence he received his spiritual birth at Pine Brook, N. J. in the A. M. E. Zion Church. He was licensed to preach in the same church at the age of 18 years and became its pastor serving it until 1877.

In the year 1864 he was united in holy wedlock to Miss Mary E. Hicks in New York Olty, by the Rev. Barcroff.

From this happy union 10 children were born; eight sons and two daughters; two children preceded him to the glory-land. In 1877 he joined the Delaware Conference; served many important charges, among the following: Chestertown, Centreville, Pocomoke City, Atlantic City, Burlington and Magnolia N. J. Failing in helth, he retired from active work some years ago.

November 25, 1909 he was joined in holy wedlock to Mrs. Julia A. Heath by Rev. J. W. W. Cox at Corsica Neck, Md.

As a preacher he was throng, clear, and convincing; as a church worker, he was untiring in his efforts to build and improve churches and parsonages weherever he went.

From New York to the extreme southern end of our Conference there are

marked evidences of this fact, many have been led into the kingdom through his instrumentality.

He was a methodist in the strictest sense of the word; he believed in the witness of the spirit and in a real heaven and hell. This he never failed to declare.

Preached his last sermon Sunday evening September 27, 1914 at Ellendale, Del. Text, Isa 21-11-12: "Watchman what of the night." On Monday morning he came home apparently well; while waiting for breakfast he was stricken with apoplexy and lingered for 10 days.

The writer, Revs. A. R. Shockley, and W. E. Hilton visited him; he expressed his unshaken confidence in God his Saviour. He loved to sing "Bread of Heaven" and "Higher Ground". Among his last words were; "I have no fear of death; it is only a shadow. My Lord is with me, Halleiujah! etc.

He lapsed into unconsciousness toward the last, at 9 o'clock p. m., October 8, 1914 at Lincoln City, Del., he passed to be with Jesus.

Funeral services were held at Lincoln his home, Sunday evening, October 11, at 9 p. m. The writer officiating. On Monday 9 a. m., the remains were shipped to Magnolia, N. J., and laid to rest in the church cemetery there.

Richard Edward stepeny was born of humble christian parentage under slavish condition in Calvert county, Maryland. Amid the many hardships of life through which he passed, he learned to read and write and was early trained to follow the higher ideals of life.

His methods of life were perfectly sane and helpful. He lived to serve others. He was first admitted in the church on good desires, where he served faithfully and well.

At the age of eighteen years he accepted the call of Abraham Lincoln for volunteers of the Union. He served in Company I Regiment 29 Connecticut Infantry.

He served faithfully and well as a minister of the Lord Jesus. Prices Chapel 2 years, Baltimore 2 years, Union 5 years, Prices Chapel 3 years, Green Hill 4 years, Williamsburg 3 years, 19 years. He joined the Methodist Episcopal church and took up work as a supply in the ministry of our church, where he has given acceptable service in building up the waste places in Zion. Longwood 6 years, Centreville Circuit 4 years. 10 years, 10 and 19, 29 years of faithful service.

He left the parsonage on Saturday, April 11, 1914 for his appointment at Melitota, Md., said good bye the last time. He was met by some of the new members and friends, who came to welcome him in their midst as their pastor. Sunday morning April 12, 1914, he preached a forceful sermon. Sunday night at Mt. Pisga Church, the departed began another gospel message to the people and fell with a stroke of paralysis. He was cared for by this heart stricken people, and medical assistance was given. April 13th telephone call was sent to our District Sueperintendent, the automobile was pressed into service and a trip was soon made and brought him back to the parsonage upon the kindness of the present pastor and wife. He was granted room and all the accommodations to make him and his wife comfortable until the last.

Thursday morning about 1.15 he passed away amid triumphs of faith as a mighty victor.

The little hamlet that gave to the nation and navy a Decateer gave to the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Delaware Conference a Stephen Hammond, the subject of this memoir.

Stephen Hammond was born in the town of Berlin, Worcester Co., Md., September 3, 1871, of John E. and Elizabeth Hammond. But it was his grand-parents who heard the command "take this child and nurse it,, for me, and in their humble home obeyed, to the honor and blory of God.

Early in life he married Sarah his first wife and soon demonstrated that spirit that characterized him through life, and made of him a man of integrity and a husband and father.

Before death had broken the tie that bound these young hearts, God had blessed them with two children, a boy and a girl who now mourn the loss of both parents.

After the death of his beloved wife Sarah, he spent a number of years in Montclair, N. J., and Boston, Mass., where he was active in the work of his church, having so labored that cheerished memories still linger around these places of his early strivings.

His sterling honesty and straight forwardness in these sections won for him positions of honor and trust which he held until the call to the pastorate of our church in Boston, where he had under Dr. Lucas labored as a local preacher.

To answer this call he gave up these positions, severed these pleasant rela-

tions, in order to make some preparation to succeed in the work unto which he had been called.

It can be said of him that in all that was committed to his care, he did his best to advance.

On June 21st, 1909, while serving Easton Circuit he and Miss Mayble V. union, was not acquired wealth and children to leave it to, but the substantial Brooks were joined in holy wedlock. The results of this short though happy victories and achievements of the cross of our blessed Christ.

Here were two bodies but one purpose of mind and heart, the betterment of the conditions of their fellow man and to this aim all their energies were exerted.

Monday, September 20, 1914, his natal month, brother Hammond was seized by the illness that called him from labor to reward.

He made a long brave fight against disease and death. Not that he feared, but for the sake of her, who night and day like an angel of mercy hovered over him, that no look might be unanswered, no want unsupplied. Brother Hammond wanted to live for his works and loved ones. Yet he had a premonition of the approaching end for when the doctor ordered him to bed he very cooly remarked. "I'll not get out again."

When the sun was nearly down and the sands of life nearly run he glanced back over the way he had come, the choice he had made I heard him saying, "Nothing to regret, Nothing to regret."

The devotions of his people made happy his last hours and cannot be excelled. They had during his short pastorate caught of his spirit and made his last moments peaceful by carrying forward the work which he had so wisely planned.

The days of his stay on earth were summed up in forty three years two months and nine days, and of these at least thirty were spent in the service of God and used to the advancement of his kingdom.

Let us pray heavens choice blessings upon the work he started and the dear ones he leaves behind.

#### ARCHIBALD FRANCIS ENNALS.

The subject of this sketch, the son of Archibald and Airey Ennels was born in Dorchester Co., Md., June 3rd, 1849. Early in life the city of Baltimore was selected for his home, and Asbury M. E. Church, for which he had lasting devotion, was selected as the choice of his religious activities.

In Asbury, the Graces were cultivated which served him in later years as the base of success attending the work in which his life ended. His first venture in wedlock was with Katherine Bailey, who for many years toiled with him as a worthy and devoted companion; preceding him to the better land a few year ago.

God favored him with the hand of Miss Ella Irene Jones, to whom he was married April 27th, 1911; who, with undaunted devotion, has attended him, true to her promise, until the end which caused his sudden removal to the

realms beyond the mystic bar.

About twenty years ago A. F. Ennals, then a local preacher, found his way into the bounds of the Delaware Conference. His usefulness was soon observed by Dr. H. A. Monroe, and further known by those whom he soon had the honor of serving as pastor. He served acceptably an unexpired term in Ezion M. E. Church, Wilmington, Del., 1894 until Conference 1895, that his return would have been welcomed notwithstanding the fact he was only a local preacher and a supply.

The Conference of 1895 admitted him on trial, two years later he was admitted into full membership and served most acceptably the following charges: Haven, Phila., Pa., 2 years; Grenlock, N. J., 2 years; New Castle, Del., 2 years; East New Market, Md., 4 years; Siloam, Chester, Pa., 3 years; Frankford, Pa., 2 years; New Port, Del., 2 years; Witman, Md., 2 years; Carmichaels, Md., 1 year.

Prior to entering the Delaware Conference Brother Ennels supplied Oderick Corner Ct., in the Washington Conference. As a workman he was aggressive and firm; to know him well meant for the right minded lasting friendship that at all times breathed the spirit of uplift for which he was a champion in every community.

He was never found supporting the wrong side, but willing to suffer, if need be, promoting the right. As a preacher he was thoughtful and forceful, believing with all his heart in an inspired ministry, and living fire burning sin consuming christianity, as such he moved men, and was known as a preacher of high order, blessed with good fruit for his labor.

The charge from which he is called from labor to reward loved him; this they evidenced both in his life and death by following his counsel which produced peace and prosperity in churches and communities, indeed everything this man and faithful companion touched seemed to prosper.

When the voice that directed ceased to be audible they hovered around him with the loving family, working and watching until the message came.

Only a few days before the summons came, he asked to be excused from a meeting of the trustees; before leaving, he told them not to be surprised at anything happening for there was a change near at hand. A few days later while wife was preparing breakfast, and he was trying to write a letter, the hand grew unsteady, the task remains undone; he was stricken, but not surprised.

With manly courage he talked, adjusting affairs while he could, saying, he would not be able to talk in a short while (which was indeed true) hence

would direct affairs while he could, when ended, he said tell the boys it is all right I have made ready for this hour.

He lingered from Friday morning February 5th until Monday night. February 8th, making known his wishes by words and signs fully conscious until a few hours before death. With loving wife and friends attending every call while the blows fell heavily upon his mortal frame from the hand of the monster death, his work ends a few moments of eleven p. m. leaving sorrowing wife and many friends to mourn their loss which, without doubt is his heavenly gain. Now there by his own request the remains of your worthy son now rests after a sojourn in this world of sorrow for 65 years, 8 months, 5 days. Let us view the change with Horatius Bonar, who says:

"Ty day has come not gone,
Thy sun has risen, not set,
Thy life is now beyond
The reach of death or change;
Not ended but begun
Such shall our life be soon
And then the meeting day
How full of light and joy?

She rendered her first public service as teacher at Unioniville, Worcester County, Md. Having successfully served here, she taught at Liberty, Frederick County, Md. Then, subsequently at Fairmount, Md., and finally, she returned again to Unionville serving the second time as teacher. She also experienced her second birth here Sept. 15th, 1869, during the pastorate of the late Rev. Jas. R. Webb. She joined the fellowship of Little Union M. E. Church, near Pocomoke City, Md.

July 5th, 1871, she married the Rev. John W. Waters. Of this happy union three children were born. She was a valuable asset to her husband during

his ministry. She was hightly esteemed by all who knew her. Her husband revers her as a true, loving wife. The children remember her as an effectionately painstaking mother. She was a kindly devoted friend.

During the last five years, she was greatly afflicted. Her suffering was intense, but she patiently endured to the end—Saturday, 4.30 a. m., June 13th, 1914. "She was not for God took her." Aged 64 years, 5 months, 21 days.
