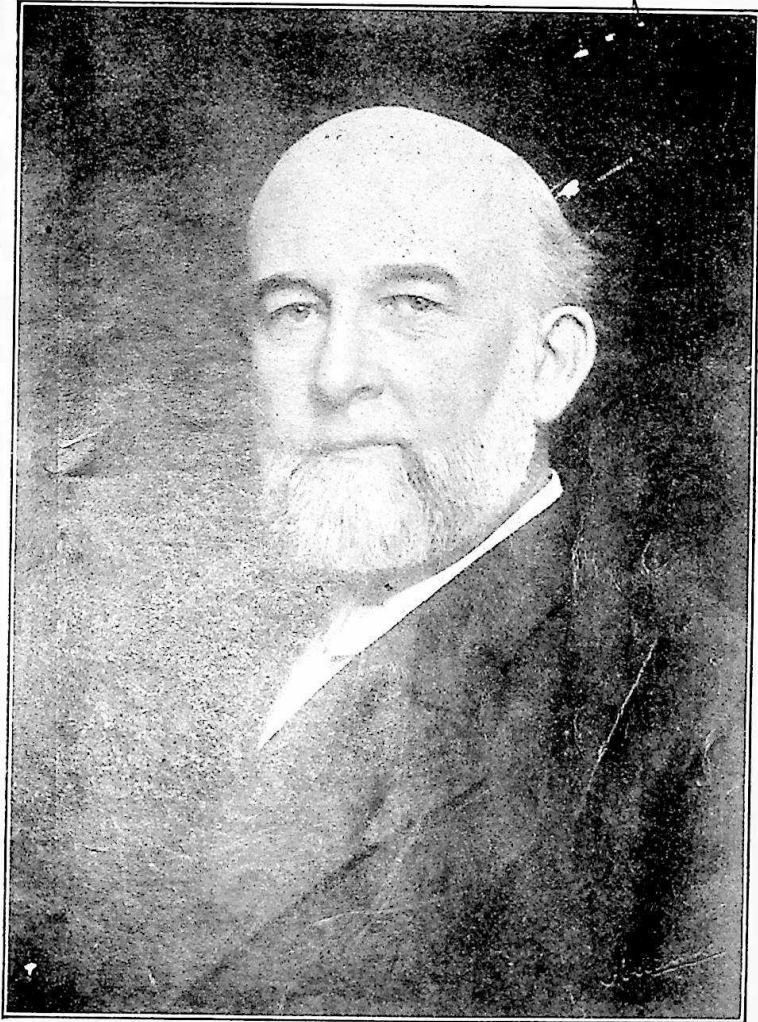

Who Presided at the 60th Session, Del. Annual Conference.



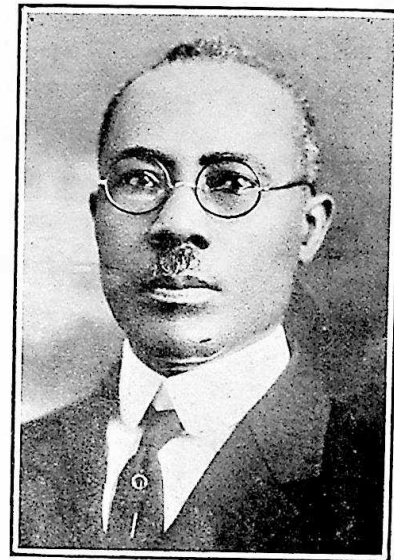

RULES OF ORDER.

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely: (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present, the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and, if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY MORNING, APRIL 4, 1923.

The bishop announced Hymn number 520, Methodist Hospital, "And are we yet alive?"

SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER.—The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered by the Bishop assisted by the pastor and the District Superintendents.

ROLL CALL.—Upon request of the Bishop, the secretary of the last Conference called the roll of the Conference. The Conference stood while the names of the deceased members was called.

ORGANIZATION.—a. Election of Secretary:—On motion of R. G. Waters, James M. Dickerson was nominated Secretary of the Conference. He was unanimously elected.

TELEGRAM TO WILMINGTON CONFERENCE.—On motion of L. S. Moore the Secretary was ordered to send a telegram of greeting to the Wilmington Conference in session at Dover, Delaware.

CAMBRIDGE DISTRICT.

Bishop Berry and Brethren:

With gratitude to God, we present this report. The lives of all the effective pastors have been spared. Nevertheless death has invaded our ranks.

July 17th, Rev. C. W. Downs, retired, triumphantly went from labor to his reward. Aug. 1st, Mrs. Peter Burrows was not for God took her. Aug. 9th, Mrs. R. A. F. Graham crossed the mystic river. Jan. 27th, Mrs. F. T. Johnson was translated. Mrs. B. B. Carson lost her father and Mrs. George Young a son. Others have been seriously ill, but were spared.

The forward program of the Church has been our goal. Incessantly, we have striven to actualize it as our standard of achievement.

AIREY has raised \$393 for improvements, advanced the Centenary and Conference collections taken. A. E. Martin, pastor, has successfully organized the four churches and a greater interest is being manifest in the Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues.

BECKWITH has been greatly effected by the migration of her members. H. J. Stewart, pastor, has zealously labored to heal the factional differences. \$132 have been raised for improvements, Centenary and conference collections have been taken.

BRIDGEVILLE under the pastorate of F. O. T. Laws still remains on the "roll of honor." The Centenary, \$460, the conference collections and Ministerial Support have been raised in full. \$200 paid on indebtedness. 12 conversions and 35 accessions. The various societies of the young are well organized and functioning.

BRIDGEVILLE CIRCUIT with R. W. Thomas continues to progress. \$175 have been raised on indebtedness, the Centenary advanced and conference collections nearly in full.

CAMBRIDGE—ST. LUKE'S. This Mission's membership is being depleted thru migration. Centenary and conference collections have been taken. Conversions 7; accessions 7. F. C. Kershaw, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE—WAUGH has been visited by a gracious revival. They have done well spiritually and financially. Conversions 35; accessions 24. \$324 have been raised for improvements, \$914 for Centenary and Conference collections in full. The classes have been reorganized according to the Discipline and the large Adult Bible Class taught by M. A. Thompson, pastor, continues to effect greatly the social life of the city.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT has experienced both cloudy and sunshine weather. Mrs. R. A. F. Graham died Aug. 9th, and thru the removal of Rev. R. A. F. Graham to Chincoteague, Va., Rev. F. C. Kershaw by consent of Bishop Berry was appointed pastor and betook to himself a bride.

Conversions 13; accessions 13. Centenary and Conference collections taken.

CHINCOTEAGUE ISLAND was set apart from Stockton Circuit. It has just enough people for one church. R. A. F. Graham, pastor, thru a community program is trying to unite the run down church with ours. Centenary \$20 and Conference collections taken.

CHURCH CREEK under the leadership of L. H. Martin has regained her lost stride. Centenary has been increased 200%. Conference collections raised nearly in full and \$300 on indebtedness and improvements.

CRAPO reports a prosperous year. \$216 have been raised on indebtedness, Centenary advanced, Conference collections almost in full. This charge subscribed its full quota, 21, for the Southwestern Christian Advocate. W. B. Whittington, pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET has installed and paid for an electric lighting system. Raised \$534 on old indebtedness, \$250 for Centenary and increased the Conference collections. This charge has an excellent Junior League. C. W. Pullett, pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET CIRCUIT has experienced a gracious revival. Conversions 38; accessions 38. Both church and parsonage have received new coats of paint, greatly beautifying them. Centenary and Conference collections have been taken. J. A. Fassett, pastor.

Soliciting and taking the trees to the mill, a beautiful church is now inclosed, which when completed will be valued at \$4,000. They greatly appreciate the promised donation of \$625 of which \$375 have been paid by the Board of Home Missions. Centenary and Conference collections have been taken. Conversions 12; accessions 12. D. R. Shockley, pastor.

HARRINGTON is bestirring herself under the pastorate of G. B. Coleman. \$245 have been raised on indebtedness. Both Centenary and Conference collections have been increased.

HURLOCK, with J. N. Bullen, pastor, has a mind to work. Union

Grove is liquidating her long standing indebtedness. Washington is busily engaged conserving her youth. Petersburg has laid the foundation for a new church to cost \$5,000. \$654 have been raised for indebtedness and improvements, \$436 for Centenary and Conference collections in full. Conversions 15; accessions 17.

LAUREL has increased her pastoral support \$150. \$309 raised for Centenary. Conference collections almost in full. \$536 have been raised for improvements. D. G. Waters, pastor.

LEWES with T. L. McDonald, pastor, has zealously labored to organize and save her young people. \$65 have been raised for Centenary and the Conference collections have been taken.

LINCOLN CITY with J. G. Harris, pastor, started the Conference year with an excellent forward program, but failed to maintain themselves accordingly. \$112 have been raised for Centenary and Conference collections taken.

LINKWOOD has raised \$162 on improvements. Centenary and Conference collections have been taken. Conversions 23; accessions 23. E. H. Nichols, pastor.

MADISON has completed the remodelling of Malone Church and paid \$917 on the same. A new church is needed at Smithville. Lane located at Taylors Island is well organized. Centenary and Conference collections have been increased. Conversions 10; accessions 8. Jose Angulo, pastor.

MILFORD reports another prosperous year. \$1022 paid on indebtedness; Centenary \$300, an increase; Conference collections in full; 20 conversions; 15 accessions. The Fourth Quarterly Conference unanimously voted to invite the Delaware Annual Conference to hold its 61st Session in St. Paul M. E. Church, Milford, Del. J. R. Holland, pastor.

NASSAU under the leadership of F. H. Quinn, pastor, has been engaged in a persistent effort to organize and develop the young people. Some success has greeted them. Both the Centenary and Conference collections have been increased.

NEWARK has increased both Centenary and Conference collections. Besides they have raised \$500, as a counter gift to the Rosenwald Fund in erecting a new school building. Conversions 12; accessions 4. E. H. Jolley, pastor.

NORTH BERLIN covered herself with glory as hostess of the District Conference. \$549 have been raised for Centenary and Conference collections nearly in full; \$1,000 paid on indebtedness. Here we have the largest graded Sunday School. W. J. Helm, pastor.

PRESTON has been blessed with a gracious revival resulting in 58 conversions and 58 accessions. \$306 have been raised for Centenary and Conference collections nearly in full. Mr. Pleasant Church has a large progressive, spiritual minded Sunday School. W. G. Matthews, pastor.

SEAFORD has experienced a revival in all three churches. Conversions 53; accessions 46. \$180 have been raised for Centenary; Conference collections nearly in full. W. T. Purnell, pastor, attended the School for Rural Pastors and has begun effectually to organize the young people.

SNOW HILL has experienced a successful year. But much has been applied locally. Ebenezer Church has purchased a new organ and paid \$200 on the same, and built a stone wall in front of the cemetery costing \$500. Mt. Wesley has raised \$190 on remodelling their church. Centenary \$275 and the Conference collections taken. D. S. Quillen, pastor.

SNOW HILL CIRCUIT has repaired both churches and paid for the same. Centenary increased and Conference collections taken. Conversions 21; accessions 26. R. J. Williams, pastor.

SOUTH BERLIN still successfully continues her work as a training station. E. F. Showell, pastor, has not only a model Junior League but the young people are organized as a Junior Church. \$136 have been raised for Centenary, \$88 for Conference collections, \$304 for indebtedness; besides \$500 have been raised as a counter gift to the Rosenwald donation to erect a public school building. Conversions 11; accessions 12.

STOCKTON has been under the clouds. Many of her members have died. Notwithstanding Alexander Reid, pastor, has kept up courage. Centenary \$146, increase 100%; Conference collections in full. \$170 raised on remodelling the church, conversions 10; accessions 24.

STOCKTON CIRCUIT, S. J. Hooper, pastor, has done the best he could pastoring these two churches. The people are able but lacking in spiritual vision. The hope lies in the education of the young people. Centenary and Conference collections taken. \$150 raised for improvements.

TRINITY has beautified the parsonage by painting it. These people also must be given a broader vision thru Christian Education. B. B. Carson, pastor, attended the School for Rural Pastors, and has labored ardously to help them. Centenary \$64; Conference collections have been taken. Conversions 10; accessions 9.

VIENNA, stirred thru gratitude to the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, for \$400, donated on their new parsonage has made up her mind to go to work. Hence M. W. Clark, pastor, makes the best report this year of the three. \$535 raised for indebtedness. Centenary \$100. Conference collections nearly in full. 2 conversions; 24 accessions.

WHALEYVILLE, with J. H. Dredden, pastor, has been intensely engaged in reorganizing and spiritualizing her forces. A more healthy social condition prevails. Conversions 21; accessions 21. \$151 have been raised for Centenary. Conference collections taken. \$400 raised for improvements.

District Meetings.

Our Epworth League and Sunday School Convention met in Bridgeville, Del., June 27, 28, 29th. Dr. F. H. Butler, Secretary for Colored Work, Pres. J. O. Spencer, Prin. T. H. Kiah and Pres. W. O. Jason rendered valuable service. Able and inspiring addresses were also delivered by Dr. H. V. Holliday, Superintendent of Education for Delaware, and Prof. J. Walter Huffington, Supervisor of Colored Schools of Maryland. The attendance was very large. The young people seemed to have gotten a broad-

er vision of life. Several attended the Institute at Morgan College, Baltimore, Md. Nominal chapters have been revitalized and Sunday Schools reorganized and graded.

The Annual District Conference was held at North Berlin, Oct. 10th, 11th, 12th. The forward program of the Church was strongly and enthusiastically presented. District Superintendents Wallace, Fletcher, Jewett and Scott and others felicitated us with inspiring messages. Sunday, Oct. 22nd, was set apart for the culmination of the "I Will Maintain" Fund. With the assistance of Bishop M. W. Clair and Dr. J. W. Jackson the District reported its full quota of 14 units raised at the District Survey Conference Oct. 24th.

Education.

More and more it is becoming evident that God can exert the greatest influence and achieve the highest good thru the skillfully trained, consecrated mind. Therefore Christian Education is the imperative demand of the age. It is exhilarating to know that many parents are gladly making the needful sacrifices that their children may prepare to rightly serve their age. Besides the vast numbers in public schools, there are 24 students in Morgan College and Princess Anne Academy and 68 in other secondary schools and colleges.

Six pastors attended the School for Rural Pastors. Greater efficiency and large results are exhibiting themselves in their charges. Good Literature Day was observed. The SouthWestern Christian Advocate's Semi-Centennial Campaign to make that great organ selfsupporting has been strenuously advocated. The collections for the Boards of Education have been taken.

Christian Stewardship and Ministerial Support.

"The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein."

"All things were made by Him; and without Him was not anything made that was made."

"In Him we live and move and have our being." Therefore all mankind is morally obligated to acknowledge the stewardship of God, by dedicating both his personality and his possession to Him. Christian Stewardship has been stressed in each Quarterly Conference and preached in the pulpits. Many young people are cheerfully choosing their vocation for Life Service. Tithers are springing up here and there thruout the District. We are laboring and praying that their number will rapidly and permanently increase until each pastor shall receive an adequate support,—until each Conference Claimant, his widow and orphans shall have received 100% of their allotted annuity—yea until there shall be meat in the storehouse sufficient to finance God's Universal Kingdom Program. Some charges continue to increase their ministerial support.

Evangelism and Temperance.

The spirit of the age is Socio-Industrial. An almost insatiable love for worldly pleasure and greed of gain seems to have a tendency to make the people indifferent to the Christian Religion. Nevertheless the 36 pastors hearing the charge "to be watchful in all things, to endure afflictions, do the work of evangelists and to make full proof of their ministry," have prayerfully planned and zealously labored for revivals. They report besides backsliders reclaimed 428 conversions. Decision Days held and classes for religious instruction formed.

Herein lies the solution to the crux of the whole Temperance question. Our ministry must be no less devoted to the grownups but more devotedly teachable to the children in order to conserve them to the lofty conceptions and fundamental ideals of Christianity. Then self-control shall pervade and righteously predominate the whole social fabric of our government. And the 18th Amendment shall have become a practical reality.

Summary.

We have not done all we desired. We have done our best under the existing circumstances. The program of the Church has been consistently and persistently presented. The pastors have been faithful and self-sacrificing. The people generous and hospitable. They enable us to report:

The \$1,200 mortgage on the District Parsonage cancelled; \$5,843 raised for improvements; \$4,151 for indebtedness; \$644 for Centenary and Apportioned Benevolences which is 10% increase; \$3,352 for Conference collections; 302 tithers; 428 converts; 425 accessions and the ministerial support advanced.

To adjust rightly such a disrupted world as ours, JESUS (i. e. the principles of Christianity applied) is the only hope.

With due appreciation to pastors, their wives and the people for their hearty cooperation and gratitude to God for His bounteous blessings, I submit this report.

Rev. Nicholas Brown, a supply pastor of Easton Circuit, was translated on January 18th. Brother Brown was a faithful pastor, a consistent christian beloved by many. Suitable memoir has been prepared by J. H. Blake.

Rev. and Mrs. J. H. Nutter were bereaved of their son Marshall during the session of our last Conference at Atlantic City. He died in a Hospital in Philadelphia.

A Brief Survey of Charges.

BARCLAY under the leadership of W. R. Price, sends the following report. Conversions 2; accessions 2; tithers 10; centenary \$71, advanced above last year. Other benevolence \$31. Total \$102. Total raised for all purposes \$582.

CENTREVILLE. This difficult Charge has had splendid supervision for five years. The Charge reports conversions 2; accessions 5; tithers 6. Episcopal Fund and Conference Claimants full. Paid on church debt \$110. Centenary \$138; other benevolence \$16. Total \$154. Raised for all purposes \$902. S. J. Horsey, pastor.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT supplied by T. B. H. Coleman makes a good report everything considered. Conversions 23; accessions 21. Paid on church debt \$118; centenary \$75, advanced. Other benevolence \$4. Total \$79. Raised for all purposes \$339.

CHESTERTOWN. The pastor labored hard, but former achievements fall him. Reports as follows: Accessions 2; tithers 32; paid on church debt \$300; renovated the parsonage at the cost of \$600. Centenary \$100, other benevolence \$46. Total \$212. Raised for all purposes \$1,438. W. H. Johns, pastor.

CHURCH HILL reports conversions 2; accessions 2; tithers 1; centenary \$203, advanced. Other benevolence \$47. Total \$250; raised for all purposes \$306. Lewis Hodges, pastor.

CORDOVA with J. O. Stanley as pastor, reports conversions 13; accessions 13; tither, 1; centenary \$120, advanced. Other benevolence \$30. Total \$150. Raised for all purposes \$228.

DENTON under the leadership of its pastor for seven years, is still having success, and reports: Painted the church at Thomastown inside and out; painted and repaired the church and parsonage in Denton. Conversions 36; accessions 36; tithers 17; paid on church debt \$250; centenary \$216; other benevolence \$57. Total \$223. Raised for all purposes \$1011. M. V. Waters, pastor.

EASTON never fails. The pastor has been diligent in his effort for success, and reports: Conversions 4; accessions 5; tithers 10; paid on church debt \$380; parsonage \$150; Episcopal Fund full. Centenary \$457, advanced. Other benevolence \$67; Total \$524; Raised for all purposes \$1181. T. H. Woodley, pastor.

EASTON CIRCUIT has been afflicted by the death of its beloved pastor. Reports paid on parsonage debt \$10; centenary \$30; other benevolence \$13; total \$53.

FAIRLEE. The home church was struck by lightning during the summer, and considerable damage was done. The pastor reports that they have in bank \$300 for the purpose of renovating the church. Painted parsonage and enclosed it with a new fence, at a cost of \$110, and paid for the same. Conversions 16; accessions 10; tithers 3; paid on church debt \$125; centenary \$65; other benevolence \$37. Total \$102. Raised for all purposes \$410. L. W. Molock, pastor.

GREENSBORO seems to be pleased with its new pastor, and reports as having painted and carpeted one of the churches, and painted the parsonage. Tithers 10; Episcopal Fund full. Centenary \$206; other benevolence \$70; Total \$276. Raised for all purposes \$398. P. W. Price, pastor.

MARYDEL. Rev. F. C. Gillis, the pastor of this Charge, was called to his eternal reward July the fifth. Since that his widow with the assistance of neighboring pastors and Local Preachers have carried on the work quite successfully. Some repairs have been made on the parsonage and outbuildings. Conversions 6; accessions 5; paid on church debt \$246; centenary \$128, advanced. Other benevolence \$15. Total \$143. Raised for all purposes \$544. Mrs. Fannie Gillis, Supply pastor.

McDANIEL is pleased with the leadership of its new pastor. Reports conversions 3; accessions 1; tithers 8; paid on church debt \$163; Episcopal Fund full. Centenary \$187, advanced. Other benevolence \$51. Total \$238; Raised for all purposes \$688. W. E. Stanley, pastor.

MELITOTA has been very negligent this year. Reports conversion 1; accessions 3; paid on church debt \$30; centenary \$15; other benevolence \$5. Total \$20. Raised for all purposes \$114. G. W. Joynes, pastor.

MILLINGTON. Constructive work has been done on this Charge. The home church building which has for a long time been a disgrace to the denomination in this town, has been remodelled and renovated so thoroughly that it is practically a new building. Paid \$1,766; balance due \$500; Conversions 2; accessions 2; tithers 54; Episcopal Fund full. Centenary \$162; other benevolence \$36. Total \$198. Raised for all purposes \$2,148. J. C. Bantom, pastor.

OXFORD is not among the strongest Charges on the district, but it sets the pace for many of them. For five years it has not failed to give a good account of itself. Conversions 3; accessions 3; paid on parsonage debt \$478. Episcopal Fund and Conference Claimants full. Centenary \$281, advanced. Other benevolence \$66. Total \$347. Raised for all purposes \$972. L. D. Beecham, pastor.

POMONA. This Charge is a little reactionary since the young people are in charge of affairs. Reports: conversions 11; accessions 11; tithers 15; paid on church debt \$800; centenary \$127; other benevolence \$33. Total \$160. Raised for all purposes \$1226. S. A. Waters, pastor.

RIDGELY under the administration of J. H. Nutter makes a good report. Conversions 6; accessions 9; tithers 28; paid on church debt \$71; centenary \$273, advanced; other benevolence \$56. Total \$272. Raised for all purposes \$671.

ROCK HALL with J. O. Lockman as pastor, sends a good report. Conversions 13; accessions 13; tithers 1; paid on parsonage debt \$75; centenary \$205, advanced. Other benevolence \$38. Total \$251. Raised for all purposes \$452.

ROYAL OAK. The revival fire still burns. The Charge is still spiritually alive. Conversions 27; accessions 27; tithers 10; paid on parsonage debt \$40; Episcopal Fund and Conference Claimants full. Disciplinary Benevolence full. Total centenary collections \$211; other benevolence \$45. Total \$256. Raised for all purposes \$614. C. W. Winder, pastor.

ST. MICHAELS has concluded that they have the right man in the person of R. B. Thompson and sends the following report: Conversions 6; accessions 9; tithers 3; paid on church debt \$400; for furnishing the parsonage \$115; centenary \$240; other benevolence \$157. Total \$399. Raised for all purposes \$1218.80.

STEVENSVILLE has been unfortunate, and for that reason we have a meager report from that Charge. Conversions 5; tithers 2; the Delco Electric Light plant has been installed in one of the churches and the church renovated. Raised for centenary \$81. Raised for other benevolence \$19. Total \$104.

TRAPPE. During the summer this church was struck by lightning and considerable damage done. But the damage has been repaired and the church has been painted inside and out at a cost of \$850. Revival fire is burning in Trappe. The pastor reports conversions 60; accessions 60; tithers 47; paid on parsonage debt \$125; centenary \$222, advanced. Other benevolence \$60. Total \$282. Raised for all purposes \$709. J. H. Blake, pastor.

WILLISTON has faith in the leadership of its pastor, and has endeavored to cooperate with him in doing the work. Conversion 6; accessions 8; tithers 16; centenary \$106; other benevolence \$38. Total \$144. Raised for all purposes \$307. John E. Nichols, pastor.

WITTMAN. The pastor has labored very hard in this Charge to advance the welfare of the Kingdom. He could not realize his ideal. The great need of this Charge is a revival. Conversions 10; accessions 3; tithers 7; paid on church debt \$1,100; paid on parsonage debt \$72; Centenary \$90; other benevolence \$24. Total \$114. Raised for all purposes \$1,331. G. W. Downs, pastor.

WOODLAND is still advancing under the leadership of W. T. B. Devron. The home church has been remodelled, painted inside and out. New lights installed; pulpit chairs, new carpet for pulpit platform and choir recess, back entrance to the choir and pulpit. A bell with which to call the flock to service. Paid on church debt \$170; Episcopal Fund full. Conversions 5; accessions 12; tithers 5; centenary \$140, advanced. Other benevolence \$69. Total \$217. Raised for all purposes \$577. W. T. B. Devron, pastor.

LONGWOODS under the leadership of W. H. Hayman has built a new parsonage at the cost of \$2174; paid \$1,574; balance due \$600. Made extensive repairs on the home church. Conversions 14; accessions 14; tithers 5; centenary \$67; other benevolence \$36. Total \$103; raised for all purposes \$2,334. W. H. Hayman, pastor.

District Activities.

The Epworth League and Sunday School Convention was held at Trappe, June 27-29. Dr. F. H. Butler, secretary for The Colored Work of the Epworth League, was present and rendered valuable service. The convention was well attended by an enthusiastic body of young people, who seem to have gotten a larger view of the meaning of Life Service.

Monthly Preacher's Meetings have been held every month during the Conference year. The brethren find these meetings a source of inspiration and help. Through these meetings the brethren have fellowship one with another, are inspired to put over the program of the Church, Stewardship and Evangelism emphasized.

The Twelfth Annual District Conference was held in John Wesley M. E. Church, Denton, October, 24-26, M. V. Waters, pastor. This Conference excelled all others in advanced reports; inspirational addresses, and spiritual manifestation. The District Superintendents delivered addresses which greatly inspired the conference. Stewardship was emphasized.

Dr. L. C. Murdock, Area Secretary on Conservation and Advance, came to us with a burning message relative to the Righteousness of Stewardship and its Possibilities. Dr. J. W. Jackson, assistant Area Secretary, was present and assisted in every way he could in putting over the "I will maintain" proposition. Without any other assistance from the outside, the district reported in a few days to Chicago, nine units and a fraction. In other

words—\$923. We felt grateful to the pastors for their cooperation, in raising \$923 of the \$1200 apportioned. Dr. W. A. C. Hughes' address lifted the Conference to its highest spiritual enthusiasm. Local Preachers left the Conference with a determination to be more evangelistic in preaching the Word. Laymen expressed themselves as having been amply repaid for time and money spent in attending the Conference. Prof. T. H. Kiah and Dr. W. C. Jason were present to present educational interests to the conference, which was graciously received.

Evangelism.

To my mind, evangelism is the means by which nearly all of our church problems may be solved. I think it is fundamental to the success of activities of our churches. Wherever evangelistic spirit prevails, pastors have the least trouble in putting over the program of the Church. The term "Centenary" has about served its purpose. We now face the general benevolent program of the Church. I believe if we would have this program to be a success, we must have pastoral leadership in special evangelistic meetings in our churches. By this means, we would have more enthusiastic support of Stewardship in all its departments, which would greatly advance the benevolent program of the Church.

The financial efficiency of the district has been greatly hindered because of the continual migration of our people in large numbers to industrial centers in northern cities in search of work and better wages. The majority of these are our young people (on whom we depend for the success of the activities of our churches. Many of them never return.

Letters sent out by the Resident Bishop to laymen on various Charges on the district were greatly appreciated by the recipients. These letters inspired many persons who were indifferent to spiritual activities, to wake up to their duty in this matter. The result is apparent all over the district.

Summary.

The 31 charges on the district reports full members 4,014; preparatory members 980; Sunday School scholars 2,900; Senior League members 924; Junior League members 512. Conversions 276, accessions 270, tithers 270; paid on debt \$9,747; Episcopal Fund \$552; Conference Claimants \$686; centenary \$4,299; other benevolence \$1,177.

With gratitude to our Heavenly Father for all of the blessings of the year, this report is submitted.

Bishop Berry and Brethren:

Hitherto the Lord hath led and blest us, and enables us to make this our Fourth Annual Report. When we think of some of our comrades who on other districts have fallen, and then of our own active ranks, unbroken, our gratitude to God for life and health is intensified. We pause to pray and sympathize with the bereaved; and then, that the Kingdom may not suffer, we push forward with the work of God, knowing that His grace sustains us all.

Sickness and Death.

During our last Conference Session, in Atlantic City, Rev. A. W. Lower, one of our retired ministers, was overcome by gas, and died at the home where he was being entertained.

Rev. P. M. Shelton, though blind, is in fair health. His faith is unshaken and his spirit cheerful. He sends his love and greetings to the brethren.

Mrs. Hannah Berry, widow of the late Rev. B. W. Berry, died Feb. 2nd. She was a faithful member of Ferry Avenue M. E. Church. Dr. J. R. Waters conducted the funeral and has prepared a memoir for the Conference Minutes.

The Work.

Our position in the conference territory is strategic, embracing 18 great cities and a larger number of thriving towns, all having an intense industrial and social life. Knowing as we do, that unless this life is trained, directed and given the Christian ideal, it will impede our progress and embarrass the whole conference, we set ourselves to the task assigned us. We fully realize the greatness of the responsibility and are filled with a sense of our insufficiency and our utter dependence upon HIM who is our Chief Pastor.

The problems of our day are many. They are not only industrial and economic, but social and religious.

Within the bounds of our district are skeptics, heretics, doctrines, cults, missions and altars about as numerous as Paul beheld when he climbed Mars' Hill to preach "the only true God." This religious confusion has given no little trouble to some of our pastors.

Once it was said, that there were no destructive higher critics, or skeptics among our people, but the tide that has been running against others is now setting in on us. Today we can find those, who not only deny the Deity of Christ, and the resurrection of the body, but who claim themselves to be the Christ, and sad to say they have some followers. We need, for these times, very much more thoughtful and soulful preaching and much less careless speculation.

To quibble now, would be ruinous to our Cause. We must not play;

we must not falter; we must be true to Him who has given us a place in His Kingdom and in this great nation, and holds us responsible for helping Him to save it.

If there ever was a time when we need Him who will guide us into all truth, taking the things of Christ and making them known to us, it is now. With His help there will be less of negative and more of positive preaching, and that with a simplicity superb.

With His help, preaching the great truths of the great Book in Wesleyan fashion, we shall stem the tide of doubt and skepticism and lead our people in ways of peace and prosperity.

Religious Education.

The pastors of the district have striven diligently to preach and instruct the youth in the principles of our holy faith. Many of them have "Church Training Night," "Study Classes for Adults" and "Teacher Training Classes." Our Directors of Religious Education and Social and Recreational Life are beginning to understand their work and the necessity for it.

The Sunday School and Junior League Superintendents are growing in efficiency; our Women's societies are increasing in valuable service, and the pastors have all had a measure of success, as a few details from each charge will show.

Group "I" Honor Roll Charges.

ATLANTIC CITY has had a phenomenal year. The young people's societies are active; and through them many are being led into the Church. A revival added 71 converts and 141 to the membership. The pastor was his own Evangelist. Three years ago, this church gave \$600 to the Centenary—this year \$1800; \$100 for "I Will Maintain," and \$100 for Africa. Everything is in full and the church goes into Class "I". Paid on mortgage \$5000; building and improvement \$1455. The pastor and church have stood loyally by the Hamilton Mem. Mission, having paid \$150 on the pastor's salary. Dr. A. L. Martin is growing more popular each day as a new suit will show.

BRIDGETON has a strong Sunday School and League. Prayer, class and revival meetings brought 19 converts and members into the church. The charge goes in first rank, having raised its Centenary in full. \$50 for "I Will Maintain," and \$50 for Africa through the African Club; Tithers' Association of 10 raised nearly as much money as the other seventy members. Raised for debt and improvement \$443. J. I. Peaco, pastor.

NEWMAN is still increasing in membership. A few more years and this will be one of our great churches. Centenary full, \$37 for Africa and \$345 for debts and improvements. T. W. Cooper, pastor.

CAMDEN has had another prosperous year. 9 converts and 6 members added; some much needed improvements made in the basement of

the church, \$750 paid for the same; raised on debt \$58; 8 tithers; Centenary full, according to quota, and the charge goes in Class "I." Dr. J. R. Waters and people are faithful.

DELAIR forges ahead. Sunday School and League graded; revival brought in 10 new members; Centenary and benevolence in full and \$50 for Africa. Through the influence of the pastor, water pipes were run through the town and other public improvements made; 70 in the Tithers' Association; for debt and improvement \$400. Delair remains in Class "I". E. F. Morris, pastor.

MOUNT HOLLY abounds in every grace. An educational program is carried out. Sunday School and League well organized; 18 persons added to the membership; 30 feet added to the length of the church building. A contract has been awarded for reconstructing the Sunday School room and kitchen. \$2059 raised for improvements. \$25 for Africa; \$100 for "I Will Maintain", and Centenary raised in full by the middle of the year. The pastor, Sydney Emptage, follows a plan and gets results.

GERMANTOWN stands just as last year—nearly perfect. Young people are organized. A revival resulted in 32 conversions; 50 joined the church. They have actually paid \$900 ahead on Centenary quota. Of course, it is full for this year and \$50 over, with \$300 for "I Will Maintain" and \$50 more for Africa. 90 tithers in the association, which is one-fourth of the church membership; raised two-thirds of the total receipts, \$6000 in bank towards new church, which they both need and deserve. J. E. A. Johns, pastor.

HAVEN comes back into Class "I." A revival; the Centenary in full, \$112 over, and \$135 for "I Will Maintain." They have one of the best organized Sunday Schools on the district, 68 officers and teachers in all departments; 3 Teacher Training Classes; new members 61; for debt and improvement \$900. J. R. Brown is painstaking and faithful.

JOHN WESLEY (Philadelphia). This church has revivals and accessions frequently; 57 converts; 121 joined the church; raised for renovation, new pipe organ and debt \$2734; Centenary and benevolence in full; \$150 for "I Will Maintain," and \$20 for Africa; 78 members in Tithers' Association.

The splendid entertainment we are receiving shows the quality of these people. This charge has grown rapidly and is making itself felt in this community. J. W. Jefferson, pastor.

SOMERVILLE is again in Class "I." Centenary full according to quota and \$25 for "I Will Maintain"; 3 converts; 3 joined the church; 7 tithers and \$350 for improvement. E. E. Parker, pastor.

ZOAR.—This has been one of Zoar's best years. Her pastor has bowed and smiled himself into the favor of his entire community. It is said he pulls more door bells than any minister in his neighborhood, and this is right, for while many of the older members are moving towards the suburbs, new people are coming in and he is filling the church with them. The young people's societies are numerous.

Here, we have in operation, the only Community House on the dis-

tract. In six months, under the direction of Dr. W. Harry Barnes, assisted by seven other physicians and a trained nurse (furnished by the city), 290 babies, and 256 adults were treated in the Clinic, and 134 needy families were reached. Plans are being made to open an additional building.

There were 183 conversions, and 220 accessions. Raised for repairs and mortgage \$7,470; Centenary \$3086 in full; for "I Will Maintain" \$300. W. B. Perry, pastor.

MT. ZION has had 36 conversions and 33 joined the church. We are planning to turn the two properties into one church-house. It is well located and has a great future. Centenary and benevolence in full; \$50 for "I Will Maintain." Improvements \$868. Wm. Goldsborough, pastor.

PLEASANTVILLE has built a parsonage for \$4500—and paid \$1200 on it. Centenary full, and \$50 for Africa. 24 tithers; 5 conversions and 7 joined the church. R. S. Johns, pastor.

WHITE PLAINS is in Class "I." Centenary in full. \$12 for "I Will Maintain"; 20 conversions; 63 accessions; debt and improvement \$1525. Young people organized. A new church is much needed. Four charges added to the Honor Roll. L. S. Perry, pastor.

YONKERS is in Class "I." Centenary in full; has had 4 conversions and 12 added to the church; Sunday School and League graded. The New York Society is helping this work, and is seeking better quarters for the congregation. A. G. Henry desires to go back to this hard field of labor.

Group II.

In this group are also First-class pastors, and First-class congregations, some of whom would have been in Group "I" but for some conditions for which they were not responsible. The follows:

BRIDGETON CIRCUIT.—Springtown Church has been remodelled and enlarged, at a cost of \$1200—\$952 paid on the same; 5 tithers; 10 conversions; 10 accessions. W. E. Hilton is faithful.

BURLINGTON'S report came late, but the work is in fair condition. They had a revival; 7 accessions and advanced the Centenary. J. H. Blackiston, pastor.

JOHN WESLEY (Brooklyn) has had 27 conversions and accessions. They have 40 tithers; have relighted, remodelled and beautified the church and furnished the parsonage. Paid for improvements and debt \$2001. J. R. H. Matthews, pastor.

ENGLEWOOD.—Rev. F. D. McQueen was bereft of his wife at the beginning of the year, and he, himself, has been sick most of the time. Not very much has been accomplished.

GREENLOCH AND RHODES had 2 conversions; raised \$25 for improvement; has 7 tithers. The pastor, C. W. Johnson, has put forth an effort.

FRANKFORD.—This charge has been revived. An educational pro-

gram has been put on to include all the people; metal ceiling, two coats of paint, new carpet and pipe organ add much to the appearance of St. Thomas. There were 8 conversions; 15 accessions; 12 tithers; raised for debt \$1,619. I believe a day of hope dawns for this struggling church. J. T. Wallace, pastor.

HUDSON had 2 accessions. Improved its Sunday School; repaired parsonage and paid \$575 on same. H. R. Coleman, pastor.

JERSEY CITY is buying a fine property in a good location. The membership is growing and we have a bright future. N. O. Osborne, pastor.

MAGNOLIA.—Local interests are well cared for. The parsonage has been renovated, which cost \$897; the same was paid. The Centenary increased by \$150 and \$50 for "I Will Maintain." The Sunday School is graded; 3 persons professed conversion. R. G. Waters, pastor.

MERCHANTVILLE has a graded Sunday School and League; had 7 conversions and 7 joined the church; raised \$500 for Centenary, \$— for Africa, and \$425 for improvement. In three years the pastor has put \$3000 in the bank toward a new church. L. H. McArthur, pastor.

MONTCLAIR reports 20 conversions; 10 accessions; a Centenary increase and \$600 for improvement. F. J. Handy, pastor.

NEWARK has a graded Sunday School; 12 accessions; Centenary \$650, and \$100 for "I Will Maintain"; 10 tithers; for improvement \$1200. W. A. Hubbard, pastor.

ORANGE has raised for improvement \$650; for Centenary \$500; had 12 conversions and 12 to join the church. There are signs of improvement. Pastor E. O. Parker has worked hard.

OSSINNING has done well according to numbers. 3 conversions; 4 added to the membership; Centenary and benevolence increased. The property has been improved, and \$300 paid on the same. M. C. Anderson, pastor.

SALEM, though struggling to complete the church, has increased the Centenary and raised benevolence in full. The young people are well organized; 80 tithers; raised for improvement and debt \$2170. They deserve more financial help. W. B. Nelson, pastor.

SALEM CIRCUIT has had a revival and 16 joined the church. They have 30 tithers, and advanced the Centenary. The plan is to build a new church along the Salem Pike, which will greatly improve the charge. J. N. C. Davis, pastor.

SPRING LAKE had a fair year. L. B. Buchanan, pastor.

Departments.

Auxiliaries of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies are altogether too few. The need for one in each charge has been urged by the district superintendent and by officers of the district and conference societies.

The work in the Societies organized has been stimulated by our appeal for support of the Friendship Home.

There are only a few auxiliaries of the Foreign Missionary Society, and in order to create interest in the work, we have started several African Clubs, which we hope will eventuate into auxiliaries. There are 20 Ladies' Aid Societies whose reports show increase in membership and collections. Total raised \$2,723.

We have 36 Sunday Schools with 5,942 members; 20 are graded; 4 others are graded in part. There are 14 Teacher Training Classes, and 9 Junior Leagues perusing the regular course.

Every church has attempted the Unit System and in many it is working well.

District Meetings and General Work.

Our first District Conference was held in St. John's Church, Newark, N. J., September 26, 27 and 28. This being our first, we cannot use superlatives in describing it, but my colleagues who were present said, "It was good for beginners." At any rate, it was productive of good fruit, for we have seen it. The laymen got a clearer conception of Methodism and what it seeks to do as evidenced by their work.

The venerable District Superintendents gave unusually good addresses. These and the ones delivered by Dr. Ragg of the American Bible Society, and Bishop Clair made it quite easy for us to raise the "I Will Maintain" money.

The Conference pledged support to the Old Folks, and Friendship Homes, and also to the Church Program.

Christian Education.

Recognizing our need of trained leaders, the District Stewards and Pastors in joint session, passed a resolution urging the Directors and Superintendents of the Sunday School and League to greater diligence and to a more faithful execution of the Program of Religious Education. The same was adopted by each Quarterly Conference and urged upon those responsible for training the youth.

June 27, 28 and 29, in this church (John Wesley) was conducted a School of Methods in League and Sunday School work. Addresses were delivered by Bishop Thomas B. Neely, D. D., LL.D., on "History of Methodism"; Rev. A. G. Henry on "Cradle Roll and Beginners' Department"; Mrs. Wm. Plowman of the County Sunday School Association on "Primary and Junior Department"; Mrs. Olivia Y. Taylor on "Intermediate Department"; Dr. F. J. Handy on "Senior Department and Teacher Training Classes"; Mrs. Leroy Sterling on "Bible Class and Home Department"; Mr. H. D. Gates on "Christian Stewardship and Mission Study Classes." Other speakers were Dr. W. C. Thompson of Wilmington, and Dr. J. W. Hayward of Morgan College.

League Work was discussed by the following: Junior League in actions by Dr. F. M. Gray, Philadelphia Conference; Junior League Course

of Study, Mrs. Helen Driscoll of New York; Epworth League Methods, Dr. R. C. Wells, Philadelphia Conference, and Christian Citizenship by Dr. F. H. Butler of the Chicago Office.

A Pageant, entitled "The American Home", given by Miss Ruth Scott and others of the Literary Department, closed one of the most worthwhile meetings the district has had.

We feel that interest in the Young People's work is not waning, but increasing. It is encouraging to note that more of the Public School teachers are taking interest in Religious Education. They should be encouraged.

Temperance and Reform.

We are sorry for the attitude taken by Governor Smith of New York, and Governor Silser of New Jersey, toward Prohibition. Both states are working to discredit the Anti-Saloon League by placing it on the list of Political Organizations and to modify existing enforcement laws; but we are glad to have in Pennsylvania a governor of the Roosevelt type, determined to make his state saloonless.

We believe Prohibition is here to stay and as preachers of civic righteousness we are with the state and Federal Government in their effort to complete this reform.

We are doing what we can to assist the Lord's Day Alliance and other agencies to prevent Sabbath Desecration.

Evangelism.

Evangelism has been stressed in each charge and a greater use of literature encouraged. We are still convinced that pastoral Evangelism is the best. The stimulation which the presiding Bishop's letter gave the pastors and laymen, was exceedingly helpful.

The "Win One—Stand-By" Method is making personal workers of some hitherto inactive members. Some of the Sunday Schools and Leagues observed "Decision Day" and "Win My Chum" week.

Stewardship.

Stewardship and Evangelism are inseparable and we shall have neither without the aid of the Holy Spirit.

Pentecost came, and there were 3,000 converts, and no man said, "ought of the things he possessed was his own. They had all things common," and the needy ones were fed. It is still true, the offering and the blessing go together.

The church offers us no better opportunity to know the fellowship of Christ's sufferings than when it invites us to become Christian Stewards, and partners with Him in saving the world.

The charges that have faithfully pursued the Stewardship Plan have had Spiritual blessings and financial success. It is my conviction that we shall support our churches, maintain our self-respect, and Evangelize the

world in no other way, except as we

Negro population increasing. A large percentage of these people coming from our own churches, and settling in cities and towns where we are not established, have, naturally, joined other denominations. I am not sorry that they have found church-homes, but I am sorry we were not there to have received our own.

It is not too late to establish ourselves in these centers, and my desire to see it done, is not that we may take our people out of these churches (unless they desire to come) but that we may be there to receive others who are coming, and to meet our part of the responsibility.

In some of these places other denominations have represented themselves as being the M. E. Church and have gained by it not only members, but financial help from white Methodists.

I reported these findings to the Board of Home Missions through the Bureau of Negro Work. They agreed that it is a responsibility and appropriated \$11,000 to our district for Mission work, and within the last six months we have organized the Saint Paul Mission in New Rochelle, N. Y.; C. C. Scott Mission, Trenton, N. J., Hamilton Memorial Mission, Atlantic City, N. J., and Saint Matthew Mission near 58th Street, West Philadelphia. Membership in all is growing.

We are negotiating for properties in five of these cities, and nature and kind of which, I have not time to tell.

Summary.

Bishop and Brethren—what we have done is not all compatible with what we ought to have done, or what we must do; but the members, pastors and superintendent of the Philadelphia District are thankful to have our Heavenly Father for the success He has given us.

The charges report 573 conversions; 1077 accessions; 26 Junior Leagues with 1145 members; 20 graded Sunday Schools; 14 Teacher Training Classes; 153 new subscribers to the Southwester Christian Advocate.

Twenty-three charges are using the Disciplinary Financial Plan and 28 have 1,081 tithers, and 11 have Store-House Associations.

Centenary giving exceeds last year by \$3,784, and that of the first year's by \$7,920. Five charges increased the Centenary, and 15 raised it in full. Total regular Centenary \$14,130; "I Will Maintain," \$1,377; Special for Africa \$384. Grand total for Centenary \$15,891. If the Centenary should go on for three more years, I believe the district would raise 100% of its annual quota.

Raised for Children's Day Fund \$364; Local Benevolence \$937; increase in Conference Claimants \$731; Total for Ministerial Support, \$42,910; Current Expenses \$24,503; Building and Improvements \$32,217. Grand Total, exclusive of Women's Societies and Sunday School expense \$119,401.

I close this report with prayer that the District, the Conference and the Church may be forward-looking and aggressive, with every church

door open 7 days in the week, serving the present age, by serving the community in which it is, and that grace and wisdom may be given to each of us in this hour of great responsibility.

And now, with thankfulness and love in my heart for every pastor and layman, and with supreme love for Him who has preserved us, unto whom be honor and glory forever, I submit this report.

SALISBURY DISTRICT.

Bishop Berry and Brethren:

With gratefulness to our Heavenly Father for his unfailling love and mercy, with which he has abundantly blessed me during the year, and with appreciation for the kindness shown me by the ministry and laity among whom I have labored in the interests of the Kingdom on the Salisbury District, I come now to this sixtieth session of the Delaware Conference to present my annual report.

On the 3rd of last June, the Rev. John W. Bowling, who was rendering his third year of service at Mardela Springs, passed on to the larger service of the heavenly country. A suitable memoir has been prepared.

While there has been considerable sickness, it has not been so serious or protracted as to hinder very materially the progress of our work. The one exception to this statement is Brother Roswell Waters, who is unable to attend this session of the conference because of pneumonia, from which he is just recovering. Another affliction for Brother Waters was the loss of his father during last month.

Survey of the Charges.

COTTAGE GROVE, H. C. Snead, pastor, while handicapped by the removal of many of its members to larger cities in the North, in search of employment, makes a better report than last year. Accessions 3, raised for Centenary and apportioned benevolence, \$100; other benevolence \$38; old debts, \$40.

CRISFIELD, SHILOH, has a good report exceeding that of last year by more than twenty-five per cent. The pastor has been actively interested in educational facilities in the town. The result is a new school building for our children. The church is spiritually alive and growing. Conversions, 9; accessions, 20; ministerial support raised in full; \$509 raised for Centenary and apportioned benevolences; \$128 for conference collections. The improvements to the parsonage have been completed and \$461 paid on same. G. S. Sprigg, pastor.

CRISFIELD, UNION ASBURY, continues to forge ahead, with the long looked for new church practically assured. The foundation was laid a few days ago. The project should be encouraged, for the need of a new church here cannot be too strongly emphasized. Conversions, 4; accessions, 5; reports for Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$250; for conference collections \$27, and \$390 paid on old debts. W. E. Waters, pastor.

DAMES QUARTER has built a new church, with ample rooms for Sunday School and social activities. They were able to save quite a sum of money on this building project by utilizing the old church building. The white people of that section have already contributed a neat sum toward the enterprise, and promise to help further when the church is dedicated.

DEALS ISLAND, under the leadership of J. E. Waters, is doing well. Conversions 23, accessions 23. Paid on old debts, \$110; Centenary and apportioned benevolences, \$130; other benevolences, \$32.

DELMAR is now splendidly organized, and is making an effort to execute the program of the church. Here, it seems to me, is an opportunity to develop a strong church. Centenary and apportioned benevolences, \$201; other benevolences looked after; conversions, 8; accessions, 8. F. G. Campbell, pastor.

FAIRMOUNT, CENTENNIAL. The majority of these people are away during the greater part of the year, yet the charge has done well. The report shows 3 conversions; 6 accessions; Centenary and apportioned benevolences, \$170; other benevolences, \$30; old debts, \$160. Geo. H. Bivens, pastor.

FAIRMOUNT, ST. ANDREWS. At the last annual conference, C. T. Covington was appointed to lead the forces at this point. He was royally received, and under his leadership success has been achieved. Conversions, 35; paid on old debts, \$445; Centenary and apportioned benevolences, \$225; other benevolences, \$30. Ministerial support increased \$126.

FRUITLAND has built a new church at Allen. This is the second church built on that charge by the present administration. It is one of our most beautiful churches, and reflects great credit upon both pastor and people. The cost is \$5,120.00, of which \$1,081 has been paid. Raised for debts, \$1,384; Centenary and apportioned benevolences, \$105; other benevolences, \$31. Conversions, 22; accessions, 17. I. D. Pitts, pastor.

GREENWOOD, with R. C. Hughes, pastor, has taken on new life. One church has been treated with a new roof, and \$107 paid on same; \$400 on old debts; \$120 for Centenary and apportioned benevolences; other benevolences, \$37. Conversions, 25; accessions, 14.

HEBRON is now practically out of debt, and may be expected to do more for benevolences. The report shows an advance over previous years. \$75 for Centenary and apportioned benevolences; other collections looked after; old debts, \$175. C. A. Norwood, pastor.

HOPEWELL is still hopeful, and makes a better report than last year. Centenary and apportioned benevolences, \$175; other benevolences, \$65; old debts, \$200, and a handsome increase in ministerial support. Conversions 5; accessions 6. W. T. Spellman, pastor.

HORNTOWN. Notwithstanding the failure of the farmers to realize from their investments, this charge has moved forward. Conversions 24; accessions 5. Raised for Centenary and apportioned benevolences, \$210; conference collections, \$38; for improvements, \$117, and for old debts, \$151. O. H. Spence, pastor.

JAMESTOWN has had a rather hard year, but the financial report at least will equal that of last year. The record shows 3 conversions; 4 accessions; Centenary and apportioned benevolences, \$140; other benevolences, \$28; old debts, \$62. O. P. Dickerson, pastor.

KELLER is a problem. For two years conditions have been unsettled at this place. The pastor, L. T. Robbins, reports 50 conversions; \$43 for Centenary; \$16 for conference collections, and \$250 for improvements.

KINGSTON is a growing charge, led by I. H. Bivens, as pastor. The one great need here is a parsonage so that the pastor might live on his work. Considering the handicap, a commendable work has been done. Centenary and apportioned benevolence, \$302; other benevolence, \$45; old debts, \$85; conversions 32; accessions 26.

LEEMONT, with E. E. Rogers as pastor, reports a church bought from the white people, which is to replace Adams Chapel, now outgrown. It is to be rebuilt, and adapted to the needs of the congregation. Thus far the cost is \$1427, of which \$327 has been paid. Centenary, \$305; other benevolence, \$63. Conversions 23; accessions 25. This is a large circuit, with a large membership, but in order to develop its possibilities it should be divided.

LIBERIA has enlarged its parsonage by adding three rooms, a pantry and front and back porches. The entire house has been renovated, painted and furnished throughout, furnishing a very neat appearance. Cost of building, \$1200; paid on same, \$800; Centenary, \$160; other benevolences, \$40; conversions, 12; accessions, 8; old debts, \$125. Roswell Waters, pastor.

MARDELA SPRINGS suffered the loss of its pastor in July. With the consent of the resident Bishop, I supplied the work with L. W. Pinkett, a local preacher. The indebtedness on the church has been carefully looked after. Centenary and other benevolences a little in advance of last year. Centenary and apportioned benevolences, \$80; other benevolences, \$25; old debts, \$375. Conversions, 10; accessions, 8.

MARION STATION. Here is a charge with a large membership. The charge has some advantages that should have inspired effort and sacrifice as an adequate response. We believe it is capable of larger results than the report shows. Conversions, 8; accessions, 8. Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$204; other benevolence \$33; old debt, \$1600. W. A. T. Miles, pastor.

MT. VERNON, under the leadership of G. S. Jacobs, has increased the benevolences over the previous year. The report shows \$117 for Centenary and apportioned benevolences; other benevolences \$20; old indebtedness, \$200. Conversions 3, accessions 3.

NANTICOKE. This place has raised and deposited in the bank considerable money for the purpose of building a new church, much needed. The industrial conditions here are good, and the people make money, but unless there is better understanding and spirit among the officials, it will be difficult to succeed. The pastor, M. Raisin, a good man, has worked hard to harmonize the forces, and there are signs of a better day. Conversions, 16; accessions, 7. Centenary and apportioned benevolences, \$185; other benevolences, \$38.

OAKVILLE began the year very beautifully, but soon lapsed into its characteristic mood. The result is seen in the report. \$35 for Centenary; other benevolence, \$22; old debts, \$225. Conversions 10; accessions 10. S. T. Parker, pastor.

ORIOLE has advanced. This is the pastor's first year in the ministry, and he was somewhat discouraged at what seemed to be meagre results for his efforts. I think he is now more optimistic. Reports for old debts, \$186. Centenary and apportioned benevolence, \$62; other benevolence, \$43. S. G. Dix, pastor.

PARSONBURG, led by R. N. Davis, continues to move forward. These fifty members are loyal Methodists. In addition to renovating their church and improving their parsonage, paying \$300 on same, \$325 has been paid on old debts; \$116 on Centenary and apportioned benevolence; \$12 on conference collections. The second Teacher Training Class of this charge was graduated this year.

POCOMOKE CITY. This is a strong charge, pastored by a strong man. A sub-basement has been added to the church, the work of mechanics of the local congregation, basement renovated and improved with a large platform and facilities for social and recreational activities. A daily Vacation Bible School was initiated by the pastor, and was a success. Conversions, 19; accessions, 8; raised for building and improvements, \$500; old debts, \$500; Centenary and apportioned benevolence, \$407; other benevolence, \$146. W. R. A. Palmer, pastor.

PRINCESS ANNE has had a very successful year under the leadership of D. W. Henry as pastor. One of the best parsonages within the bounds of the conference has been built. It is modern in every particular and cost \$3600. The reports show 20 conversions; 25 accessions; raised for Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$562; other benevolences \$73; old debts \$200; building and improvements \$300.

QUANTICO has painted its parsonage and made improvements to the church. \$186 has been paid on improvements; \$125 for Centenary and apportioned benevolences; \$25 for conference collections. Conversions 11; accessions 12. J. A. Klah, pastor.

SALISBURY, JOHN WESLEY, with J. M. Dickerson as pastor, made

improvements to its parsonage, paid \$80 on same; paid \$750 on old debts; Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$337; other benevolences \$88; conversions 4; accessions 4.

SALISBURY, WHITES CHAPEL, with A. Chase as pastor, has made a creditable advance over last year. The church was improved by adding a tower and bell at a cost of \$478; paid on old debts \$200; Centenary \$102; other benevolences \$25; conversions 30; accessions 18.

SHARPTOWN is spiritually alive, having had a sweeping revival, resulting in 88 conversions. Quite an advance has been made in Centenary and apportioned benevolences. The amount raised for these claims is \$141; conference collections \$16; old debts \$265. H. R. Purnell, pastor.

UNIONVILLE has had a rather hard year, and its report is not quite up to last year. Conversions 5, accessions 20; Centenary and apportioned benevolence \$85; other benevolence \$32; old debts, \$85. G. T. Townsend, pastor.

WACHAPREAGUE. The failure of the potato crop, on which the people of this place depend, greatly affected this work. Hence a report reduced beyond last year. Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$83; other benevolences looked after. Burtons church was rebuilt at a cost of \$1250. Paid on same \$850. Conversions 9. W. H. Turner, pastor.

WATTSVILLE. This charge has also felt the heavy hand of financial depression, which has been the bitter experience of the farmer for the last two years. Failure of crops, and exceptionally low prices for farm products, together with the high cost of agricultural operation, have all contributed to the farmer's financial troubles. When the farmer fails the finances of the church must naturally decline. Conversions 41; accessions 41; Centenary and other apportionments, \$300; other benevolences, \$54; old debts, \$——. J. S. Coulbourne, pastor.

WETIPQUIN. Under the leadership of W. W. Brown, this place has had a successful year. It reports 21 conversions; 18 accessions; \$110 for Centenary and apportioned benevolences; \$15 for conference collections, and \$360 on old debts.

WHITE HAVEN has been successfully led by J. O. Griffin. The parsonage has been improved and \$200 paid on the debt. Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$212; conference collections \$44; conversions 4, accessions 4.

WITHAMS has increased its Centenary and apportioned benevolences and reports for the claims, \$114; for other benevolence \$48; for old debts, \$55; conversions 46; accessions 2. J. R. Purnell, pastor.

District Activities.

The monthly preachers' meeting, the District Stewards' meeting, the Sunday School and Epworth League Convention, and the District Conference are sources of social, intellectual and spiritual uplift to our work. These meetings are largely attended by people from all parts of the District, and the good effects are seen in the various charges. The Sunday

School and Epworth League Convention was held in Princess Anne last June and the District Conference was held at Marion on the 3, 4 and 5th of last October. These conferences were inspired by the helpful and instructive addresses and sermons by Drs. L. C. Murdock, Vaughan S. Collins, J. U. King, F. H. Butler, J. H. Nutter, and D. W. Henry. The messages of fraternal delegates and District Superintendents Hargis, Wallace, Fletcher and Scott were never so great as at Marion Station.

Womens' Auxiliaries.

The women's organizations are a right arm of power to our work. The social and spiritual benefits of these auxiliaries are incalculable, and it is difficult to see how many of our projects could be financed without some such helps as these. The Ladies' Aid Societies of the District have raised this Conference year the magnificent sum of \$3,876.

The founding of the Friendship Home within the bounds of the Conference for the better protection of young women coming to Philadelphia has increased interest in the work of the Woman's Home Missionary Society. The result is a larger number of new auxiliaries and a considerable increase in money to support this most laudable enterprise in our midst. The report shows that the District has contributed \$528 to the support of the Woman's Home Missionary Society.

Education.

There seems to be a better day dawning in the world of education for our group in the State of Maryland. This condition has not been brought about without a struggle. The friends of public education of both races are realizing that in a nation where democracy wields the sceptre, the state should provide equal opportunities for education to all its people, without regard to race, color or creed. The social conscience of the commonwealth of Maryland being thus aroused, the minimum school term is now eight months, with bright prospects to increase to nine months. That the efforts of the state are being appreciated by our group is evidenced in the fact that the daily average attendance is greater than ever before.

Princess Anne Academy, under the leadership of Principal T. H. Kiah, is full, crowded to capacity with eager and bright minded young people in quest of Christian training for life service. Here education is so related to life that the student is brought to realize that he only is educated truly who renders his best service, unselfishly, to the social order.

Young People's Societies.

We consider the work of training the children and young people of paramount importance. We have, therefore, called attention to this very necessary work in every Quarterly Conference. The Young People's Societies offer the best opportunities for soul culture and spiritual development. We cannot afford to neglect the organization and training of our young people. To be indifferent to the program which the church pre-

sents to us in the Sunday School, the Junior and Senior Epworth Leagues, is not only an injustice to our young people, but is to stultify one's own mind, and cut off one's main sources of power and spiritual efficiency. Every Sunday School should have a Teacher Training Class, and every League should pursue a regular course of study under efficient leadership.

Decision Day was observed in most of the charges, 230 young people deciding for Christ.

The Rev. R. N. Davis, having graduated two Teacher Training Classes in his own charge, has rendered valuable assistance to pastors and the District Superintendent in organizing such classes throughout the District.

Evangelism.

The spirit of Evangelism is a heritage of Methodism. Proceeding upon this premise the evangelistic campaign has been incessantly carried on. Thoroughly convinced that the pastor is his own best evangelist, we have encouraged and advocated pastoral evangelism. There are abundant evidences that this plan has worked. While we cannot report as many conversions as in some previous years, it is a fact that there is a spiritual awakening in many places that is resulting in better living, higher Christian ideals and greater loyalty to Jesus the Christ.

Bishop Clair's Visit and Stewardship.

If there was any doubt as to the duties and obligations of stewardship, that should have been dispelled after Bishop Matthew W. Clair's great deliverance at the District Conference at Marion, on the text, "What owest thou my Lord?" To a crowd that packed the church and overflowed into the yard, he pictured the pagan world, told of the horrors of heathenism and laid on the Christian consciences of all their true relationship to these conditions. He made it perfectly clear that life is a stewardship, that time, talents, possessions and personality are resources committed by God to man to be used as God directs. Fundamentally, this teaching throughout the scriptures is based on God's ownership, both by creation and redemption. It is clearly evident that if we are to keep pace with the steady progress of the church of this day and make an adequate response to the cry of a needy world, if the Centenary pledges are to be redeemed that the work of the Kingdom may proceed without let or hindrance; if Jesus is to reign and His Kingdom spread from shore to shore, we must teach and practice Christian Stewardship. Our people are slowly but surely learning the lesson, and there is a bright day just ahead. The District quota in the "I Will Maintain" Campaign was \$1600. We subscribed and paid in \$2025.

The Easter Week tithing plan was generally observed, and as last year the results were fine. The number of regular tithers is growing. The number is 318.

The "Southwestern."

It has been almost fifty years since Bishop Hartzell founded the Southwestern Christian Advocate, at New Orleans, La. The General Conference of 1876 adopted it as an official organ, with specific reference to service among the members of the church of our racial group. During this half century of time, it has supported every interest of the church, and has been a strong arm of defense for the Negro. He should see to it that this splendid paper, which has been subsidized by the church for all these years, comes to immediate self-support. Dr. King, the able editor, has spoken, and the reverberation of his bugle blast, "Crown Fifty Golden Years With Dignified Self-support," should re-echo in every church and chapel of the colored conferences of Methodism, until on Sunday, July 1, 1923, a shout of victory shall proclaim to all the world that the "Southwestern Christian Advocate" walks on its own feet. We have constnaly kept this very live subject before the pastors and people and confidently believe the Salisbury District will do its part in helping to bring about this glorious consummation.

Summary.

We have failed to realize our hopes, but there has been some success, and the reports show an increase in the benevolences and other finances over last year. They also show 7034 full members; 851 preparatory members; 5675 Sunday School scholars; 1463 Senior Epworth League members; 1002 Junior League members; paid for buildings and improvements \$12,656; paid for old indebtedness, \$10,573; current expenses, \$8,987; Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$6,974; Conference collections \$1,506; ministerial support, \$40,787.

Thanking God for his innumerable blessings, and with heartfelt gratitude to pastors and people for their kindness and cooperation, this my sixth annual report is respectfully submitted.

SOUTH PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren:

While thankful for the opportunity to serve and the privilege to manifest the Spirit of our Lord, I have been so deeply impressed with the tremendous responsibility that I have kept on the move. Most of my brethren have felt the Holy urge. Christ's love has constrained them.

The lives of all the pastors have been graciously preserved.

Bro. J. M. Whittington has been bereaved of a son just entering manhood and Bro. T. E. Randall of a daughter entering womanhood. They died in the faith and went home to be ever with the Lord.

Sister Matilda Adams, the widow of our late Bro. J. P. Adams, departed this life December 19, 1922 and joined her companion in the Home above.

It has been gratifying to work with some of these pastors who seem to have been on the mount of vision and caught the meaning of the Church's program as what God wants done. They have labored to make all things according to the pattern shown them in the mount.

BUTTONWOOD with S. S. Lankford, past, has raised Centenary collection in part.

CAPE MAY has had 16 conversions and 16 accessions; installed a new heating plant in the Church; paid \$365 on improvements, \$300 on old indebtedness. The centenary and other benevolences looked after. H. T. Johnson, pastor.

CHESTER, ST. DANIELS Charge with W. J. L. Hughes, pastor, reports 14 conversions, 71 accessions, \$2000 paid for building and improvements; \$633 for old indebtedness; \$1620 for Centenary and apportioned Benevolences and all other apportionments met in full.

The forward program has been worked. The pastor assisted by a woman worker, Mrs. E. P. Thomas, who serves as director of religious instruction and of social and recreational life, maintains one of the best Sunday Schools on the district, an effective Epworth League, both Senior and Junior chapters, and also a suburban Sunday School at Village Green. A daily vacation Bible School with an enrollment of 200 was held during the month of July.

CHESTER, SILOAM Charge steadily advances. 12 conversions, 22 accessions; a net gain of 10 per cent. in membership. All apportionments raised in full; \$565 for Centenary and apportioned Benevolences, an advance over last year; and \$300 in bank towards a new parsonage. J. W. Bond, pastor.

CHESWOLD with J. H. Russum, pastor, has had 5 conversions and the same number of accessions and made an advance in Centenary and apportioned benevolences.

COKEBURY has increased the benevolences and reduced the debt of the charge. J. S. Coard, pastor.

COLEMAN with J. H. Stevenson, pastor, has installed a new lighting system, paid \$125 on improvements; \$225 on old indebtedness and advanced the Centenary and other benevolences. 15 conversions and 14 accessions.

DARBY, supplied by J. M. Whittington, has paid \$375 on a building lot centrally located and raised the Centenary apportionment in full. These people deserve help to get a church building.

DELAWARE CITY has had 13 conversions and 22 accessions; remodelled and beautified the church in town, paid \$250 for improvements

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and \$138 on old indebtedness. The amount raised for Centenary and apportioned benevolences is in advance of last year. E. B. Green, pastor.

DOVER with L. S. Moore, pastor, keeps up her good record. The Sunday School departments have been renovated. \$380 paid on improvements and \$280 on old indebtedness. 12 conversions and the same number of accessions. This is a well organized charge where the program of the church is intelligently worked. All apportionments fully met. Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$627.

DOVER CIRCUIT reports her best year in raising Centenary collection, an increase of 400 per cent. over last year. 6 conversions and 6 accessions. M. P. Sterling, pastor.

GALENA has held her own and reports \$204 raised for Centenary and apportioned benevolences and the debt of the church reduced. T. E. Randall, pastor.

MIDDLETOWN with W. C. Bowland, pastor, has renovated and beautified her church; paid \$674 on improvements and \$218 on old indebtedness, and raised for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$200.

NEW CASTLE has spent \$979 enlarging and beautifying her property and has raised for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences \$215 and looked after all other apportionments. 10 conversions and 11 accessions. J. L. Taylor, pastor.

NEWPORT with J. L. Parker, pastor, reports 11 conversions, 12 accessions; the exterior of the church painted and other repairs made and paid for; \$220 spent on improvement and \$120 on old indebtedness; \$260 for the Centenary, an advance over last year, and all the other apportionments met.

OCEAN CITY has raised \$120 for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences, which is more than its quota. \$116 has been paid on property and the pastor's support has been advanced. J. E. Dunn, pastor.

ODESSA with M. H. Murphy, pastor, has had another good year. A new heating plant has been installed. \$200 paid on improvements and \$200 raised for Centenary and apportioned benevolences and other apportionment met. 6 conversions and 8 accessions.

PHILADELPHIA, EAST CALVARY charge report 254 conversions and 291 accessions; the full quota, \$5620 for Centenary and apportioned benevolences and all other apportionments in full. One of this Church's great achievements this year has been the paying of \$25,007 on old indebtedness, thereby lifting the last mortgage on the property. They have raised for all purposes over \$45,000. Ground has been broken to build the new and larger edifice so that the hundreds who desire may attend. For twenty-one years the same brother has served as preacher in charge, and still we need room for the folks. C. A. Tindley, pastor.

MACEDONIA with J. W. Parker, pastor, has furnished the parsonage and raised for all purposes \$1750.

ST. PAUL, a mission work disbanded, most of the members withdrawing from our church, grieved at the action of our last Conference

which expelled for cause their former pastor. Those who desired it, I gave transfers and they joined our church elsewhere.

PORT DEPOSIT has repaired and beautified their church and advanced the Centenary and other collections. R. H. Coleman, pastor.

PORT PENN, with K. S. Stewart, pastor, has purchased from the Wilmington Conference, a church which will well serve them and is raising by cash and reliable subscription \$1000. The Board of Home Missions and Church Extension has granted them a donation of \$500. \$185 for Centenary and other collections looked after.

SASSAFRAS CIRCUIT reports ten conversions and the same number of accessions and the Centenary and other collections in advance of last year. A. A. McDowell, pastor.

SEWELL, with C. E. Kincade, pastor, has wrought well and raised in full its apportionment for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences.

SMYRNA, with J. W. Gillis, pastor, has put a new roof on the church and painted and beautified the interior of the edifice; paid \$500 for improvements; \$328 on old indebtedness; and raised \$245 for the Centenary, an advance over last year. 6 conversions, 11 accessions.

STILL POND reports paid \$600 for improvements; \$250 for Centenary and apportioned benevolences; 10 conversions and 11 accessions. W. C. West, pastor.

SWAINTON, with W. N. King, pastor, has increased the amount for Centenary and apportioned benevolences and looked after the other collections.

TOWNSEND CIRCUIT has dedicated the newly remodelled Haven Church; paid \$275 on building and improvements, \$200 for old indebtedness and \$164 for the Centenary, an advance over last year. F. L. Tomlinson, pastor.

EAST WILMINGTON, supplied by A. W. McBride, has wrought well under adverse circumstances and reports Centenary collections raised in full. 8 accessions.

EZION, WILMINTON, has had a banner year. In a gracious revival 136 professed conversion. Total conversions during the year, 186; accessions 165. They have a net gain in full membership of 21 per cent. The entire debt on the property of \$1215 was raised in one rally when the people brought in \$2400. \$2381 was raised for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences being \$100 in advance over the apportionment. All other claims fully met and the preacher's support was increased from \$1800 to \$2000. W. C. Thompson, pastor.

HAVEN, with G. T. Fields, pastor, has had 12 conversions; 11 accessions; paid for improvements \$300 and raised for centenary and apportioned benevolences \$292, an advance over last year. All other apportionments met. This charge steadily advances and has for the year a net gain in full membership of over 10 per cent.

MT. JOY reports 42 conversions and 56 accessions and a net gain in membership of twelve per cent. \$700 has been spent on improvements.

\$746, the full apportionment for Centenary, and apportioned benevolences, has been raised, and all other claims have been fully met, and also an advance of \$200 has been made in the support of the preacher in charge. J. A. T. Foust, pastor.

WOODBURY, with J. L. Davis, pastor, reports \$445 paid on old indebtedness, the pastor's support increased and the Centenary and other collections looked after.

New Work.

October 9th, 1922, I organized a mission in South Philadelphia, on 22nd Street, near Lombard, to be known as St. Marks M. E. Church, with 15 members and a Sunday School with an enrollment of 21 scholars. Supplied by Milton N. Johns as pastor, it is growing.

March 8, 1923 I organized a group of our people into a mission on Bainbridge Street, near 11th to be known as Warren M. E. Church. It has 28 members and a Sunday School with an enrollment of 20 scholars. It is supplied by Noah Lewis.

Evangelism.

The work of winning disciples for our Lord and bringing them into the Church and developing them into Christ-like characters is our chief business. Revivals have not been as extensive or intensive as in former years. We face new conditions. We have some handicaps our fathers never had. The unsaved folks do not now attend in large numbers the protracted meetings. Once the church in certain seasons was the only place to go. Now there are many and varied places. Revivals ought not to be given up, but they should not be our only method. Pastors having the vision and possessing the passion must more and more work through consecrated and trained members of the church. The unsaved ought to be reached. It is our business to reach them. Our Lord came to seek and to save. He trained His disciples and sent them out to seek and save. The members of our churches must be trained to give themselves systematically to the work of gaining disciples for our Lord and bringing them into the Church and standing by them. Emphasis needs be put on training for personal work. We have had on this district conversions, 702; accessions, 810.

Christian Stewardship.

The District has 1200 tithers. The campaign for Christian Stewardship has been vigorously waged in some charges. In others feeble efforts have been made. The acknowledgment of God's ownership and man's trusteeship have not yet been understood by many of our people as to its importance as a factor in the extension of the kingdom of our Lord. By printed page and by human voice, by example and precept, a continuous campaign must be kept up. The principle of proportionate giving must be

faithfully taught in the Sunday School, in the Epworth League, and in the Junior League. It will pay to keep on training in Christian Stewardship.

Religious Education.

Sunday Schools are increasing in numbers and in interest. Our need of trained teachers is great. Several pastors are maintaining teacher training classes. One Sunday School Convention for the study of methods has been held. Christian truth, christian attitude, and christian practice are the ends sought. We need the help of a specialist, a Sunday School Missionary. We must have more intensive cultivation of this field.

Epworth League Chapters are doing effective work in a few charges. Several have flourishing Junior Leagues. The studies of the League have been such as to give substantial aid in steeping the young people in the ideas and ideals of Jesus. This I take it is worth while if our people are to be really Christian in all their thoughts, attitude, and dealings; if they are to love their neighbors as themselves; if they are to be ardent workers for the Kingdom.

In Chester, Pa., and in Wilmington, Del., Dally Vacation Bible Schools in which our church was connected were held last summer. It has been well said of this movement, "It is worth more to a community than two or three extra policemen. The children are kept off the streets, their hands are kept busy, their morals improved, their minds enriched, their love of country quickened, and incidentally they imbibe as much Bible truth in these six weeks as the average pupil in Sunday School does in six months. The teachers come into contact with social conditions, and the church is placed in happy relations with the community as a whole."

Summer Schools.

On the camp ground adjoining the State College, Dover, Del., the Summer School for preachers was held for nine days, beginning July 25th, 1922. It was an improvement on one of the previous year, both as to number in attendance and the work accomplished. The register showed forty-one preachers attended. The program pursued was in accordance to the suggestion of Dr. Allen McRossie, Director of Conference Course of Study. Members of our Conference Board of Examiners instructed and examined the undergraduates. All the District Superintendents were present and took part in the program.

District Conventions.

The annual District Sunday School and Epworth League Convention was held in New Castle, Del., June 21st and 22nd, 1922. It proved a profitable meeting.

A great and stimulating force was the District Conference held at Middletown, Del., Oct. 17th to 19th, 1922. Stirring messages were delivered by the Area Secretary, Dr. L. C. Murdock; my colleagues, District

Superintendents Hargis, Wallace, Fletcher and Jewett. The laymen were greatly moved. The connectional causes were seen in a brighter light and the zeal of both pastors and people was quickened. The importance of getting new subscribers for the Southwestern Christian Advocate was stressed. We recognize this paper as an invaluable assistant. We urge all our people to take it and call upon both ministers and laymen to join heartily in the campaign to make it self supporting.

Benevolences.

It has been no small task to keep up the pace of giving for the Centenary and apportioned benevolences which this district set. In the rural appointments, financial conditions have been unfavorable, yet the reports of the charges show an increase over last year. Over \$15,000 has been raised for Centenary and apportioned benevolences, nearly eight per cent. of the apportionment.

Thanking our Heavenly Father for his innumerable blessings and my brethren of the ministry and our faithful laity for co-operation and support, this report is respectfully submitted.

REPORT OF MANAGER OF THE DELAWARE AND WASHINGTON CONFERENCES INSTITUTE.

The attendance of the past years Institute held August 14th to 21st at Morgan College was the largest yet of our Institute efforts. The student enrollment was 154, the student and faculty enrollment were 172. The dormitory capacity of Morgan College was taxed to the uttermost.

The arrangement made with Morgan College for boarding the Institute leave the only resource for the Institute to secure funds for the carrying forward of this great religious educational program, promotional money from the charges and from the Institute concert and Sunday collections. All the members of the faculty of the Institute give gratuitously their service. The Management however pays their traveling expenses, text books and board. When we take into consideration the nature of the work which it is the aim of the Institute, and the number of persons who must be employed in the faculty to finance such an undertaking is no small task unless we secured the co-operation and support of every member of these two cooperating Conferences. For the past two years the manager has carried the deficit of Institute—First, because he believes in the work which the Institute does. Second, because he believes the men in the two Conferences will pay him back the amount advanced.

He has given more than one million dollars to establish Negro schools in Delaware, and several hundred dollars worth of furniture to the Dover State College. As a religious association we protest against that iniquitous organization known as the Ku Klux Klan whose policy is against the Catholics, Jews, and Negroes as well as civic righteousness. We ask that the District Superintendent and pastors of the Delaware Conference consent to give us one Sunday of each Conference year to raise funds for the support of the Conference Home for aged laymen.

MEMOIRS.

ALBERT W. LOWBER. . .

Albert Washington Lowber, son of John and Rebecca Lowber, was born at Port Penn, Delaware, July 26th, 1842, and departed this life at Atlantic City, New Jersey, March 30th, 1922, aged 79 years, 9 months, 4 days.

At the age of 24 years he was converted and joined Zoar M. E. Church during the pastorate of the late J. H. Pearce, where he soon became a class leader and Sunday School Superintendent, and soon after he was licensed as a local preacher and almost immediately entered The Centenary Biblical Institute, now Morgan College, Baltimore, Md. There he remained three years, preparing for his life-work after which he taught in the public schools of Delaware for one year.

On August 18th, 1875, he was married to Miss Edith M. Anderson and to this union were born seven children, viz.: Olivia, Mae, Oscar, Bertha, Addie, Lillian, and Aldina, five of whom preceded him to their final rewards.

In 1876 he was received on trial into the Delaware M. E. Conference and ordained deacon by Bishop E. S. Jones.

In 1880 he was ordained Elder by Bishop Bowman. With great success he filled the following appointments, viz.: Still Pond, 3 years; Denton, 2 years; Church Creek, 3 years; Salisbury Circuit, 2 years; Fruitland, 1 year; Wilmington, 2 years; Royal Oak, 3 years; Newport, 2 years; Townsend, 1 year; Church Hill, 3 years; Mardela Springs, 3 years; South Berlin, 4 years; Dover Circuit, 1 year; Sassafras, 3 years; Barclay, 2 years; Wetipquin, 7 years; retiring in the year 1917.

He was of a quiet, even disposition and he truly loved his family, for he was a devoted husband and a loving father. He was faithful to his church and his call to the Ministry.

While his Conference was in session at Atlantic City, during the early Friday morning hours and while his brethren were peacefully sleeping, he quietly moved out of the old house and when Nature's sun shone in his chamber, Albert W. Lowber was not, for God had taken him.

Thus ends a life of rare usefulness and beauty.

Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord.

"We miss you here,
We'll meet you there."

His wife and two children survive him. The funeral services were held at Atlantic City, N. J., on Monday, April 2, 1922, with Rev. J. T. Fletcher, District Superintendent, in charge, assisted by Revs. W. B. Per-

ry, D. H. Hargis, R. H. Wallace and others, after which services the remains were taken to Philadelphia and on April 4, 1922, funeral services were conducted in Zoar M. E. Church, by Rev. J. T. Fletcher, assisted by Revs. J. H. Scott, J. E. A. Johns, J. R. Brown, W. B. Perry, W. J. Parker, the writer, and others. Interment was made at Simpson Cemetery, Newport, Del., to await the resurrection of the dead.

JOHN W. BOWLING.

John W. Bowling, son of John and Henrietta Bowling, was born near Brandywine, Prince Georges County, Md., March 27th, 1857, and departed this life at Mardela Springs, Md., in the full triumph of faith, Saturday, June 3rd, 1922. Age 65 years and 7 days.

He leaves to mourn their loss a faithful and devoted wife, four sons, four daughters, and two grandchildren. He was twice married. His first wife was Miss Lucy Mead, who died in 1885. He was married the second time June 2nd, 1887, to Miss Annie M. Flamer, now his widow. He was converted on Wye Camp Ground, Queen Anne County, Md., in 1885, and joined John Wesley M. E. Church at Carmichael, Md., where he retained his membership until he joined the Delaware Conference.

He was licensed to preach by Rev. L. H. Martin, and joined the Delaware Conference at St. Daniels M. E. Church, Chester, Pa., in the year 1896. Before joining the Conference he supplied Ridgely, Md., one year, and three years afterward; Woodland, Md., one year; Warwick, Del., three years; Mt. Vernon, then Widgton, Md., one year; Wachapreague, Va., three years; Hurlock, Md., four years; Woodland, Md., one year. Retired 1912. While in the Retired relation he supplied Liberia, Md., one year, and Fruitland, Md., from August, 1917 until the Conference Session of 1918, when his relation was changed from retired to effective. He then served two years more at Fruitland and two months at Mardella Springs, when he fell in the gospel harness and passed happily to his reward.

While at Ridgely he moved the church from Boonsboro to Ridgely and built a parsonage. He also moved a church at Hillsboro, Md. He remodelled the church at Mardella Springs and painted the same.

He was a strong, intellectual, and forceful preacher and was acceptable in the pulpit of any charge in the Delaware Conference.

He knew the Word of God and preached it without fear, favor, or affection. He knew the Church, its Discipline, and its programme, which he endeavored to instill into the hearts and lives of his flock. He was one among the first to secure the full Centenary quota in pledges on the Salisbury District.

He was of a jovial, light-hearted disposition, and it was impossible to be heavy-hearted or despondent in his company.

He carried sunshine with him and darkness and gloom disappeared at his approach.

The pastors with whom he was associated on the district were always made glad when he appeared among them, and there were always a number around him, listening to his usual wit and humor, and having their spirits revived. He loved the brethren and whenever possible he never failed to mingle with them. He was a devoted husband and father. His children adored him and he in turn loved and adored them. Their love and affection for him were clearly manifested by their attention and care, when they, with the devoted wife and mother, were present at every sign of unrest to administer to his needs.

His District Superintendent and Rev. J. M. Dickerson called to see him the day before his death, and found him in a very weak condition, scarcely noticing anything or anybody. And he remained in that semi-conscious condition to the end. All that medical skill and good nursing could do was done, but to no avail.

The brave old soldier, with a long warfare, of many hard fought battles, and with many victories to his credit, stacked arms on Life's battlefield, and went sweeping through the heavenly gates to hear the Master say, "Well done!"

Though he left no parting word, but quietly stole away, just before the setting sun, he entered the portals of that peaceful abode where the sun never goes down, and greeted the inhabitants over there with an eternal good morning.

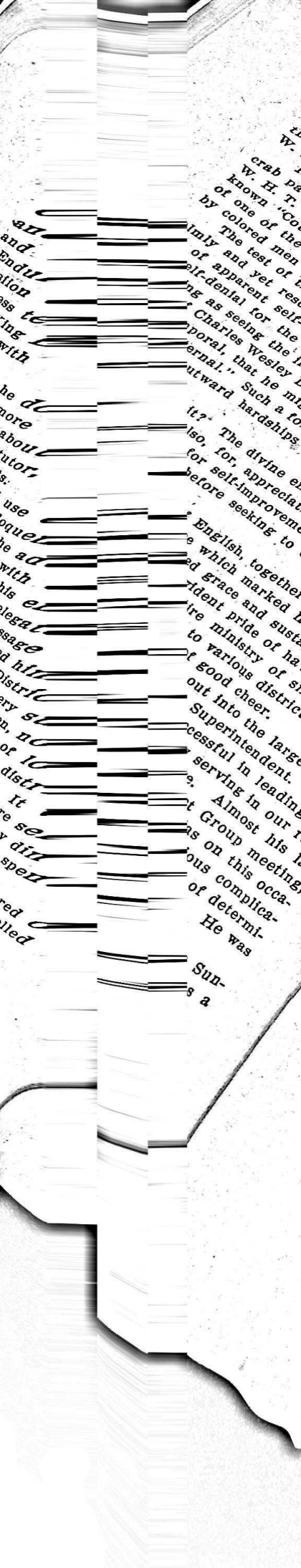

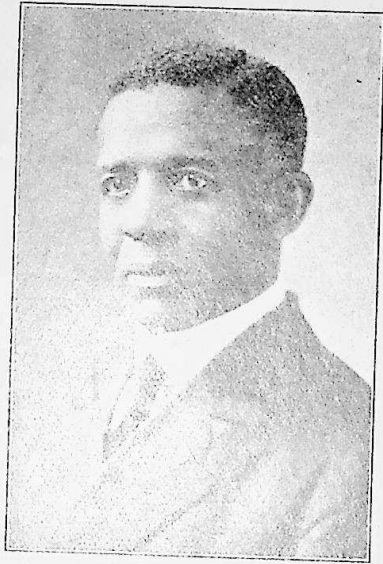
