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



DEVOTIONAL ADDRESS:—At this juncture the bishop suggested that no other matter of business be proposed and that the conference enter into a devotional period.

VOTE OF THANKS:—On motion of W. C. Thompson a vote of thanks was tendered the bishop for his devotional address and requested that the devotional hour be observed as suggested.

The bishop using the 26th chapter of St. Matthew as a basis of his address, addressed the conference, closing with the benediction.

VOTE OF THANKS:—The item extending a vote of thanks to Dr. C. R. Oaten and the Board of Pensions and Relief for the help rendered the conference by them was approved and on motion of J. H. Scott the vote was extended.

STANDING VOTE OF THANKS:—On motion a standing vote of thanks was tendered J. R. Waters for services rendered as Conference Agent, Board of Pensions and Relief.

REPORT ADOPTED AS A WHOLE:—On motion of D. H. Hargis the report was adopted as a whole.

REPORT OF TELLERS:—The Tellers on Election of Reserve Delegates reported as follows: Total number of votes cast 126; Defective 4; Necessary for a choice 62.

J. E. A. Johns received 85 and W. C. Thompson received 81.

They were declared elected Reserve Delegates.

REPORTS

(a) District Superintendents

EASTON DISTRICT.

Dear Bishop R. E. Jones and Brethren:

With a sense of my unworthiness I thank our Heavenly Father for His mercy and providential leadings up to this moment, and that He has spared the lives of all our pastors and given us strength to accomplish another year's work to Whom be the glory and honor and praise forevermore. I acknowledge with deep appreciation the faithfulness and loyalty of all the pastors of the district in trying to carry forward the program of the church to the glory of God. Conscious that we have tried to do our best I respectfully make my fifth annual report of the achievements of the Easton District of the Delaware Conference; but we have not achieved without afflictions and sorrows endured to the end, and in these also we glory.

The Rev. W. H. Turner, our workman at the Cordova charge, was stricken on February 4th, 1928 with paralysis, rendering his whole right size helpless. Our prayers and wishes are for his speedy recovery.

Rev. R. H. Coleman, although recently bereft of his faithful and loving wife, has creditably completed the year's work of our defeated brother at Chapel charge. The sadness of his wife's death came in Philadelphia Jan. 14, 1928.

Rev. W. T. Spellman and wife were bereaved by the deaths of a brother and father respectively.

Many faithful laymen of our church have been called to their reward during the year.

Mrs. J. O. Griffin has been seriously ill after an operation and treatment in a Baltimore hospital, but we are glad she has fully recovered.

District Meetings.

The church school and Epworth League Convention held at Ridgely, Md. during the busy days of June was largely attended by interested young christian workers of the district who were stimulated and inspired for greater service in their local churches.

The District Conference was held at Cambridge, Md. October 26-28, 1927. All of the District Superintendents were present and rendered valuable service. "An hour with the Bible" each morning and at noon conducted by Drs. P. O'Connell and J. H. Scott were services of great inspirational information as were also the sermon and address by Dr. F. J. Handy; we were all witnesses of the presence and power of the Holy Spirit. Several persons professed saving faith in Jesus Christ. All the pastors were loyal to the programme of the Church and were present.

The Ladies Aid and Woman's Home Missionary Societies observed

their anniversaries in a becoming manner.

Our work is for the most part rural, and largely in the open country, which in some seasons handicaps our efficiency in prosecuting our tasks.

The educational facilities are improving steadily from time to time; at present we have four high schools and one junior high school, and with a comparatively small expense the pupils could be transported to and from these institutions. Princess Anne Jr. College and Bowie Normal School furnish the preparatory requirement for entrance to Morgan College and Howard University.

Religious Education.

We are convinced that religious education and evangelism are the most important factors in the salvation of the people under our care.

The other great religions must yield to the invincible life of the Nazareen as it is interpreted to us in Christianity.

Religious education and evangelism must, at any cost, be fostered among the people who are to be the standard bearers of the faith which was once delivered to the saints, and thus put to rout, superstition, vice and crime which are the offsprings of sin and the devil. These cardinal prerequisites, therefore, must be aggressively missionary in content and operation, if Jesus is to be enthroned in the home, the state and the country, and false religious ideals corrected in the lives of the people. We urge all our pastors to enunciate these principles in every sermon, and we believe in this way the desired end will be achieved. Let us not underestimate the power and cunning of our common foe, from whose merciless hands we must extriciate the people if God's will is to be done and His Kingdom come in all the earth.

Benevolences.

Attention has been give nto each department of our church benevolences. We regard the pastor as the pivotal and key man; the people's knowledge of the spirit and vision of the church depends largely upon how much consecrated perspiration and shoe-leather the pastor mixes into his work; a restless preacher always packed up for moving cannot raise WORLD SERVICE MONEY, nor inspire a great revival, or teach the people that their first gift to God must be their consecrated lives of service and their tithe of their incomes.

Seventeen charges report an increase in World Service over last year; eleven report decreases and two I have not heard from yet, but we hope the district will show no decrease in the aggregate.

Morgan College.

Morgan College is the only institution of higher learning in all this eastern border for the education for christian leadership of our group for our conference territory; its grave needs of money at this time is most insistent. The gift of \$125,000 by the state of Maryland, and \$50,000 by the board of Education conditioned upon our raising \$90,000, constitutes a most compelling appeal to all the friends of efficient christian leadership, and the above conditions must be met by June 1, 1928, or our race will lose. Brethren, we cannot afford to fail, let us make every possible sacrifice for our college.

Reports of Charges.

AIREYS has advanced each year under the leadership of the young and energetic Caleb W. Johnson, who is a systematic workman who will not accept defeat. Reports for World Service \$80, which is 40 per cent. over last year. Other collections taken. Conversions, 30.

BARCLAY has not had a fair chance. We believe these people can do more than has been done. Up to this writing the report has not come in. G. R. Hollis, pastor.

BECKWITH and its pastor seem to get on well together; the work is in good condition, all the benevolent causes have been advanced over last year. Conversions, 5, added to the church, 6. J. S. Coard, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE, Waugh through its pastor makes a good report in spite of opposition. World Service \$326, other collections in full; 5 conversions, 2 accessions. The District Conference was held here and greatly stimulated the people. J. A. T. Foust, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE Circuit has experienced another good revival when 27 were swept into the kingdom into full membership from last year's revival; this year the pastor reports 40 conversions. World Service advanced and other collections taken. J. O. Griffin, pastor.

CARMICHAEL has once again filled all her apportionments for benevolences. The pastor is a strong workman, leaving no unguarded place. The people are well trained and do their full duty. World Service \$310, other collections taken. Conversions 12; accessions 9. R. S. Johns, pastor.

CENTREVILLE is perhaps the happiest people and pastor on the district. They do their work early in the year and have no unrest at its end. The congregation is small but faithful. For some reason a revival has not come to this community for several years. The pastor reports World Service \$217, an increase over last year; other collections in full. Conversions 1, accessions 1. L. D. Beecham, pastor.

CENTREVILLE Circuit has moved up a little from last year in benevolent giving. Conversions 3, accessions 3. E. W. Holden, pastor.

CHAPEL has suffered many things this year to her detriment. Their pastor abandoned them in the early part of the year, finally sending in his resignation from the conference under complaint. R. H. Coleman, a retired minister, finished the year's work with credit. World Service \$50, Conversions 18; accessions 14. R. H. Coleman, pastor.

CHURCH CREEK—Here the pastor has finished six years of faithful service. Raised for World Service \$56, other benevolences taken. Conversion 18, accessions 14.

CHURCH HILL reports through its pastor 75 per cent. increase in World Service over last year; other collections taken. Conversions 4, accessions 4. The parsonage has been renovated at a cost of \$600; church organizations formed for more aggressive and efficient service. J. O. Stanley, pastor.

CORDOVA. Here the pastor has been stricken with paralysis of his whole right side, which totally incapacitated him for any further service, and had to be taken to the city for medical aid in the midst of plans for his best financial drive. The work is in fair condition. World Service \$65.

CRAPO. The pastor reports benevolences greatly advanced over last year. Conversions 18, accessions 18. J. G. Stevens, pastor.

DENTON has had another successful year, the pastor and people work together harmoniously and peacefully. World Service \$200, other collections taken. Conversions 6, accessions 5. The pastor is invited to return. W. T. Spellman, pastor.

DENTON MISSION. Here brother J. H. Cooper has done well; this is a very small charge and will be united with Willston charge for another year.

EASTON once again sends up a good report, notwithstanding the severe adverse financial conditions of the town. This charge is well organized with a large Men's Usher Association, a Women's Usher Association, Ladies Aid, the Daughters of Asbury, the M. Y. O. B. Club, the Pulpit Club, the Winnie Winkle Club and W. H. M. Society. These organizations contribute largely to the finances of the church and the benevolences. The pastor knows how to organize his church for efficient service. World Service \$315, other collections taken. Conversions 6, accessions 6. E. O. Parker, pastor.

EASTON Circuit is not a circuit since it has only one church at Williamsburg but they insist upon having a pastor all to themselves, though they are not able to adequately support one. They have a fine church building and a fair parsonage, but few people. World Service \$60, an increase over last year. Conversions 1, accessions 4. L. W. Pinkett, pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET sends up a flourishing report. This is a fine charge when the men of the church measure up to the women; each of these groups is strong and capable of making a first class appointment. The pastor, wife and people get on nicely together. The church is well organized. Reports show World Service \$241, other benevolences taken. Conversions 20, accessions 22. T. W. Cooper, pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET Circuit, here the pastor puts in a hard year; his family has been sick and his wife was compelled to go out to work to help maintain the family. A hard worked pastor has brought fine results to pass. A large revival at both churches resulted in 42 conversions, 42 accessions. Benevolences looked after. P. E. Edwards is the hard worked pastor.

FEDERALSBURG advances this year along all lines. The pastor is a strong workman, the people loyal and true. World Service \$100, conversions 7, accessions 10. M. C. Anderson, pastor.

GOLDEN HILL. The pastor and people have done well. World

Service \$59. Conversions 1, accessions 1. Clarence Wilson, pastor.

GREENSBORO has had to my mind a most wonderful year's achievement. Conditions were almost unbearable for a great part of the year, but today no one could wish for better relationship; both churches are working in complete harmony. The work has been done in a workmanship manner. World Service \$162, an advance over last year, other benevolences raised. 12 conversions, 11 accessions. F. H. Quinn, pastor.

HURLOCK reports through its pastor World Service advanced over last year and advances in other benevolences. Conversions 7, accessions 10. W. C. Bowland, pastor.

LINKWOOD, the report for World Service is the same as last year. Conversions 26, accessions 22. The pastor and people have labored harmoniously together. This charge will be able next year to pay the pastor a living wage. A. A. McDowell, pastor.

MARYDEL, this great camp-meeting center has done better this year than was expected. They have made a 100 per cent. increase in benevolent giving including World Service. Conversions 33, accessions 31. L. F. Hodges, pastor.

McDANIEL. That this small charge has increased its World Service giving over 100 per cent. is a fine tribute to the versatile leadership of this wide-awake young pastor. This charge has now come into its own. Conversions 12, accessions 18. A. E. Martin, pastor.

MILES RIVER and its pastor have striven together faithfully all the year; the result is a gratifying increase in all benevolences of the church. Conversions δ . The pastor's return has been requested for another year. L. E. Thomas, pastor.

OXFORD has had a good year. Substantial improvements in the church property has won the confidence of all the people that the pastor is a safe and wise leader. The church is well organized. World Service \$150, other conference collections taken. Conversions 5. W. E. Stanley, pastor.

PRESTON says its pastor is both sane and safe. They follow as a faithful flock their shepherd. The pastor reports for World Service \$84. Conversions 11, accessions 11. Abraham Chase, pastor.

RIDGELY reports a good year's work done; the suave and congenial pastor and his amiable wife have worked hand in hand in marshalling the crowds of people at this point. World Service \$225. Conversions 15, accessions 15. J. H. Stevenson, pastor.

ROYAL OAK reports everything in full, taking the leading row on the district. The pastor is young and able; works all the year; sends in his World Service monthly to the treasurer at Chicago. The young people are well organized, with a flourishing junior league and two Church Schools properly functioning. World Service \$330, all other collections full. Conversions 14, accessions 11. O. H. Spence, pastor.

STEVENSVILLE, better known as Kent Island, is perhaps the healthiest place to live on the Eastern Shore; and has three preaching places and the preacher's Lizzie is still going through all kinds of weather, so all the church activities are carefully looked after. World Service 20θ , accessions 15. S. A. Waters, pastor.

ST. MICHAELS. This charge has had a financial set back in the failure of the oyster industry, the main business of the town, upon which many soley depend for a living; these conditions, however, have not hindered the spiritual condition of the church, this phase of the church goes on. The young people are organized and holding first place in the church. The pastor reports an increase in World Service. World Service \$135, conference collections taken. Conversions 3. R. B. Thompson, pastor.

TAYLOR'S ISLAND has not had a very good year. Somehow it has been a great struggle for the pastor to accomplish what he has. The year's results are not as good as we had hoped. World Service \$25, something on the conference collections. Conversions 25, accessions 23. Zebulon Heath, Pastor.

TRAPPE is another charge which we had hoped would have done more. The pastor has put forth every effort to excell last year. The people like to wait for the very last minute to do their work, and this generally spells defeat. World Service, \$150. Conference collections taken. Conversions 6, accessions 6. J. A. Fassett, pastor.

VIENNA is a beautiful town on a large river with plenty of work for the people and plenty of people for the work. The pastor is at his home; at first we thought this was a great mistake, since "A prophet is not without honor save in his own home"; the pastor is perhaps without honor, but he has been a benediction to Vienna in greatly lifting the people. World Service \$35. Conversions 9, accessions 10. The pastor deserves a better charge. J. L. Parker, pastor.

WILLISTON had this present pastor sent to them last year with the hope that he would do just what he has done, bought a parsonage home for the minister, this consists of a nice little farm of seven acres of good land, having on it a peach orchard, an apple orchard, two lots of strawberries, a wheat field and plenty of spare land for physical exercise. 100 per cent. increase in World Service. Conversions 5. The pastor and people are not seeking a divorce, but want to live together another year. H. J. Stewart, pastor.

WITTMAN and its pastor finished raising their benevolences in September when things were flourishing; all claims raised in full. A splendid revival resulting in 17 conversions, 17 accessions. On district parsonage \$111, on old debts \$400. The people invite the return of the pastor. S. G. Dix, pastor.

Summary.

The district has wrought well financially; old debts have been reduced, improvements made in many places.

Conversions 382. Accessions 370.

I frankly confess that I am dissatisfied with the number of conversions; with nearly six thousand members on the district, if they should go for the sinner as the politician goes after the voter we would bring the entire Eastern Shore to the feet of our Lord and Master.

There are twenty-six (26) Epworth Leagues on the district with an enrollment of 743. Seventy-three organized Church Schools with an enrollment of 1135. Seven Junior Churches with trained leaders.

NEW YORK DISTRICT.

Bishop Jones and Brethren:

Our joy both overflows and superabounds to render an account of our Stewardhip for this the first time to you, bishop, and for the third time to this conference. Twice in six years now, our conference has been graced with his honored presence—the bishop R. E. Jones of the New Orleans Area, bone of our bone and flesh of our flesh. All hail to competent indigenous leadership as expressed by His Holiness!

Sick and Bereaved.

For the most part, "The lines for us, as a district, have fallen in pleasant places." None out of our effective ranks have fallen. The following, however, suffered brief periods of illness: Brothers A. G. Henry and F. C. Kershaw. Sister F. G. Campbell lost a mother, and our last and only deaconess in the person of sister Lucy Valentine fell peacefully and serenely on death, July 22nd. The obsequies were most effectively supervised by her pastor, assisted by the writer. She was mourned by a large and admiring host. Since the writing of this report, Dr. Wm. H. Beck, one of the leading laymen of our district, was bereft of his loving wife. Three-small children survive.

District Activities.

Last year we outlined a plan for intensive, along with our extensive operations for our northern territory. We enjoin that the occupied ground must be thoroughly colored and saturated with holy missionary purpose, dynamically contagious. In pursuance of this plan two discoveries have

been made. First, a careful survey for missionary prospects disclosed, that for the most part, other denominations have preempted this immense and largely populated territory. And hence, with our Board of Home Missions and Church Extension's recent declaration forbidding overlapping of denominational interests, discretion restrains us from entering fields already covered. Second, Even though our New York District has been designated "Missionary," not one dollar has ever been appropriated as yet for new missionary work. Our surveys disclose however, that perhaps Elizabeth, and Staten Island offer the most probable opportunities. But neither can be adequately explored and cultivated without funds for rentals, maintenance, and the like.

Much encouragement comes nevertheless from such mission points already established as: New Rochelle, where new life and interest are incrasing daily; and Trenton, where a fifteen thousand dollar—\$15,000—church property has been secured for that flock.

- 1. THE DISTRICT STEWARDS' MEETING was held as usual in St. John's Church, Newark. Here the laymen took the lead in repledging themselves in full allegiance to the entire district and conference program. The enthusiasm engendered here, has reverberated throughout the charges, giving tone and stimulus to our work all the year.
- 2. THE MONTHLY PREACHERS' AND LAY ASSOCIATION is fast becoming an educational institution, where the current topics of social, civic and religious moment are dealt with in a most thorough manner. At our July meeting in Englewood, The District Men's Council, headed by Dr. W. H. Beck of Jersey City, the laity set up their organization, and he in turn began local organizations over the entire district. These organizations are helping mightily toward the goal of securing A MILLION METHODIST MEN, MAKING the MIND of the MASTER their MAIN MOTIVE and MISSION. This meeting plans a Seminar for next year, where once a quarter, some outstanding scientific, philosophical, or theological subject will be discussed by some of our own scholarly district divines.
- 3. THE DISTRICT CONFERENCE held at Montclair in the closing days of September, far exceeded our most sanguine hopes in attendance, program, and entertainment. Every district was well represented both by district superintendents and pastors. Interest ran so high that we were unable to discern whether we had seventeen appointments, or forty-seven. Perhaps the highest spots were registered on the last day when Dr. Geo. B. Dean climaxed his ringing evangelistic appeal, by summoning the whole conference to a rededication, and reconsecration, that melted us all to tears, in our pledges of surrender to be used by our Lord and Master in definite SOUL WINNING.

This was followed at night by messages from the big four—Drs. L. H. King, Millard Robinson, Thos. H. Kiah, and A. J. Mitchell. So great was the impression, that our laity voted forthwith that we have the Epworth League and Church School Convention meet separate the ensuing year. Too much cannot be said concerning the pastor and his staff, for their unexcelled and most lavish entertainment. John Wesley, Brooklyn—The

Church of the Foreign Born—anxiously and enthusiastically await to entertain the next session.

4. THE DISTRICT WOMAN'S HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY, led on by sister Bessie Henry, held one of their quarterly meetings at Newark, Nov. 18th. These women demonstrated most admirably their most adequate qualification to conduct effectively the Lord's big business. Inspirational addresses were delivered by sister M. A. R. Camphor, "and that other disciple."

Charges.

BROOKLYN—JOHN WESLEY hailed with conspicuous delight her first American administration; and you only needed to have been around at their final Review and Reception to witness somewhat of these folks' behavious, when they are really satisfied. Program and entertainment of the highest order; together with eulogies galore, climaxed with three purses for the pastor, and one for his wife. Upon the arrival of this stranger, about four thousand dollars of floating debts, and a thirteen thousand dollar mortgage debt, was ably faced and soon adjusted. The exterior of the church has been painted, and basement renovated, the latter by labor furnished gratis by the members. A new five thousand dollar pipe organ and the entertainment of the district conference, are items on next year's program for these novitiates. An "ignis fatuus" flare recently appeared to attract these people away, but they preferred a real church, to a store front, they said. Accessions 8, World Service \$450. Other collections taken.

BROOKLYN—NEWMAN MEMORIAL manages thru the efforts of her veteran leader and valiant few, to keep from sliding back, and they make some minor advances. This is a stubborn and rugged field, but our long time conference registrar is resourceful and tenders a fair report. Accessions 12. World Service \$60. Collections taken.

BURLINGTON is slow to get accustomed to a regular, whole-time, resident pastor. Constant misunderstanding has caused the pastor to labor hard with very meagre support for himself, as well as the church. They mutually agree for a divorce. Accessions 11. World Service \$15. Other collections taken.

ENGLEWOOD makes the most glowing report of her history. After gross midnight darkness that threatened their utter distinction over a period of two years, Bro. J. H. Williams, a supply for Newman (Brooklyn) came, and beholding the reddening dawn, led them into a glorious morning. The little church has been renovated and beautified at a cost of about \$600.00, and when she cancels her loan which is long overdue, and amounts to something over a thousand dollars, this will be an inviting pastorate. Accessions 32. World Service \$40. All collections in advance.

HUDSON has had two unusual years under the pastorate of Bro. and sister Campbell. He has proven himself necessary to the community, civically, socially, and religiously, therefore he is respected and supported. Each year philanthropic donors have bequeathed the church the sum of

two hundred and fifty, and two hundred dollars, respectively. He reports accessions 3. World Service \$24. Other collections taken. Bro. Campbell asks for a year's release to attend school.

JERSEY CITY has experienced four years of phenomenal success under the incessant, allinspiring spell of the silver tongued orator R. G. Waters, and his devoted family. This mission has steadily advanced from twenty-five members to more than two hundred; from a salary of four hundred to twelve; and from property value of a few thousand dollars to about seventy thousand. And with the flag of achievement floating on the very pinnacle of glorious conquest, both pastor and people concur in singing: "God be with you 'til we meet again etc." Accessions 36. World Service \$100. Other collections normal.

MONTCLAIR began the new year with a substantial increase in the pastor's salary, and in all things easily retains her priority on the district. This pair make a De Luxe team on any charge. Sister Jewett tapped her hitherto untapped resources when she staged an anniversary that enabled her to turn over to the building fund more than a thousand This charge received her hardest jolt however, in the loss of deaconess Lucy Valentine who will be remembered most for her incessant labors among the Junior Leaguers. These Juniors gave very suitable renditions at the obsequies. God called sister Isabelle Redmond to catch the fallen mantle of deaconess Valentine, and August found her with seven others from this charge, at the Institute recruiting for Montclair's future. The entire Delaware Conference was put in this Charge's debt because of her unexcelled manner of entertaining the District Conference. will call us all back to inspect her new church edifice. Accessions 30. World Service \$690. Other collections taken. The request for the return of this matchless couple is vociferously unanimous.

MOUNT HOLLY altho with a decimated army have again "fought the good fight." Pastor Horsey and his companion have succeeded in extracting the possible from the seeming impossible. The Ladies' Aid, and Parsonage Committee beautified the parsonage without and within, made other minor repairs to the church and paid cash for same. Sisters Bessie Gilbert, and Minnie Willis have much to their credit in making possible this report. The sixty members from this charge report the following: Accessions 8. Old and new debts \$600. World Service \$215, an advance over last year. Other collections reported. S. J. Horsey, Pastor.

NEWARK looking upon the same pastor for eight years developed a slight case of ophthalmitis, rendering them incapable to observe their new pastor in his truest perspective, at first. Slowly, but surely however, they grow convalescent, and accord his his proper estimate—a real preacher of sterling qualities, a christian gentleman and a brother beloved. The work prospers at St. Johns, under the supervision of our treasurer, brother W. J. Helm. Accessions 14. World Service \$505, equal to last year. Other collections up to date.

NEW ROCHELLE has moved into more spacious and inviting quarters, and say, if the conference will send them the right man to lead them,

they will follow hilariously. Brother Pearson, a supply, surrenders willingly to his successor, after two years of difficult sledding. There is here a membership of 25 and a real promise.

ORANGE responds exceedingly slow to a general advance call. This charge has for two years experienced great preaching, great programs, and a concerted effort by the pastor, his wife, and whole family, to make out of Orange a popular charge. But ultra-traditionalism, pronounced and deepseated factionalism, account for her exaggerated and fossilated conservatism. There are signs of promise however, at least the "size of a man's hand," as her report will indicate. Paid on old and new debts \$500. World Service \$430. Accessions 16. All other collections normal. W. A. T. Miles closes his second year.

OSSINING increases her enthusiasm and devotion for her leader—Bro. C. E. Kincade, constantly. This charge and the preacher gradually grow popular together. Not even gruesome SING SING, can dampen their ardor; so they like the little brook sing sing, right on. Brother Kincade's constructive leadership is seen and felt in every department of the church's life. Ossining is clamant for the return of this celebate ecclesiastic. Report in advance of last year.

SPRING LAKE received an unexpected thrill at the hands of Wm. L. D. Lyght, a sophomore of Morgan last year, and they cry unanimously—"Give us more Lyght." Many at first lamented the unannounced departure of the young Warren Scott to his New York post, and wondered when they would be so well suited again. All this was set at rest however, after a few of the well seasoned Eastern Shore of Md. sermons and songs by this promising lad. For all purposes about \$500 were collected.

TRENTON says, that for right down honest to goodness CHEER for a CHEERLESS mission, pastor CHEERS is just bristling with it. This . CHEER-LEADER on Feb. 28th, led his little flock to pay the first five hundred dollars-\$500-down binding the bargain of the purchase of a new edifice situated in the very heart of the city, costing fifteen thousand dollars. This is an edifice furnished and ready for occupancy just as soon as twenty-five hundred dollars is secured, a thousand of which is furnished from our Board. This is the only Methodist property for our people stretching over ninety miles between Philadelphia and Newark, N. J. Any one wishing to help brother Cheers plant Methodism securely in these parts, may venture a contribution. These people are insanely happy and send up all their apportionments full and running over; and have clothed their pastor in "purple and fine linen" for conference. These people are saying to the bishop "Let the Cheer leader, lead on." Accessions 13. World Service full \$50. All other collections in full.

WHITE PLAINS adds another successful year to her already brilliant career. Pastor Waters and family have labored hard to escape the jinx of the two year tenure "complex" here. If he does, he is the second one in all her history, the other being brother F. H. Quinn. The virility of this administration popularized both pastor and people in the eyes of the community. A rally last fall approaching two thousand dollars—\$2000—made possible recently the burning of their mortgage, clearing their six

thousand dollar—\$6000—new church site, worth \$25,000 now. A union revival with the Second Baptist church of the city, quickened the religious pulse of both congregations, and made for closer unity. Accessions 34. World Service \$251. Other collections taken. M. V. Waters invited to serve a third term.

YONKERS is still under strict surveillance by our Mission Board to discover her actual needs. A recent survey found her suffering from a severe case of anemia. A solution will be sought to supply healthier corpuscles either from without or within. Accessions 3. World Service \$66. Other collections regular.

Education.

It is a truism undispuated, that Methodism has from the very outset championed and fostered the high Cause of Education. Her past is redolent with heroic victories that mark her progress all the way from John Wesley-her scholarly founder-to the present bishop F. J. McConnell, and our own honored bishop Jones. In these days of unprecedented scientific research and discovery, she is challenged as never before to produce a leadership that not only copes with the exigencies of the times, but the type who can make definite and recognized scholastic contribution. numerous schools of learning stand throughout the land, to make that fact doubly certain. Among the many educational institutions engaged in this worthy work are our own for which this conference is partly or wholly responsible. The most recent among these is the SUMMER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY. It is generally accepted now by scholars, that no educational unit in our whole system is meeting a greater need, and contributing a more laudable service to our connection. The sacrifice and devotion exhibited by the management and faculties of these schools, for the benefit of their brethren in the Course, merits unstinted praise. To make a special place in our educational system for this department, rather than having it bungled at the annual conferences, is wisdom personified. May we not hail the day, not too far distant, when the true value of these schools shall be fully recognized by us all, giving guaranteed personal and financial support to each of them?

- 2. Our own PRINCESS ANNE JUNIOR COLLEGE has long since won her place as being vitally indispensable to our educational needs. Let her own products speak, if you will, as they fill every walk of our social life, and we are compelled immediately to immortalize her. Certainly our own Dr. T. H. Kiah, and his par-excellent staff, deserve very worthy mention.
- 3. This day, of course, is MORGAN COLLEGE'S DAY, as none other has ever been in all her brilliant and fruitful history. And we have patronized her, praised her, visited her, discussed her both pro and con, but now comes our supreme opportunity to actually love her, and support her to the very limit of our "cable tow." With either her SALVATION or DOOM, barely three months distant, there is but one course for any sane raceloving individual, church, district, or conference, to take, i. e. THE

WAY OF THE CROSS. Thru dark Gethsemane, over the blood drenched VIA DOLOROSO, to CALVARY, to be CRUCIFIED, yes, actually to DIE, that Morgan might LIVE. O yes, it would be far better to really and truly DIE, my friends, than to live, and witness the utter disgrace, shame, ignominy, and unspeakable humiliation, that would descend upon a people who flagrantly failed their own dear educational institution, or race, or their God, at this most critical hour. The New York District has pledged herself to a man, that we all go back to our charges, and under God, stage a crusade that will guarantee every dollar apportioned by May fifteenth. We recommend this as an advanced type of Evangelism.

Conclusion.

The pastors, their wives and children; the laymen, their wives and children, have sacrificially concurred, in making this paltry report possible. We thank you bishop and brethren for permitting us to come here again, and present this our little mite upon the altar of God. PLEASE STAND BY!

Dear Bishop, Fathers and Brothers:

Adequate words are not at our command to express sincere gratitude at this time. Our dear Heavenly Father has been kind and propitious to supplement our strength and to protect us when defenseless. Through accidents and dangers, through difficulties and some handicaps we are here.

Many thanks are due to the pastors and their families for their entertainment of the District Superintendent and their cooperation in district activities. For the most part we have all endeavored to play a game together that would bring to the Kingdom of God the largest possible success.

Too much cannot be said for the loyal laymen on our district who have stood nobly by every effort and endeavor that looked toward the strengthening of character and building and maintaining our religious ideals.

We are happy beyond expression in the thought and experience of sitting under the presidency and fine spirit of Bishop Robert E. Jones, D. D., LL.D. While Bishop Jones is the resident Bishop of New Orleans, he is nevertheless a bishop of the world. Wherever he goes he is recognized as a Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The good Bishop has not come to this position of trust and honor and grave responsibility at a single bound, but has been thoroughly tested and has proven himself

worthy at every point. We gladly welcome him as the president of this 65th session of the Annual Conference, and pledge to him our heartiest support and loyal cooperation in his administrative duties.

Sick and Bereaved.

Only a few of our pastors have in any way been indisposed in health so as to handicap them in performing pastoral duties. E. P. Gibson, pastor of Grace, Chester and Darby, had a slight operation which was very successful. J. R. H. Matthews was allowed to leave his work for a period of time because of ill health, but it was understood that he would subsequently withdraw from our church.

Mrs. D. H. Hargis, the wife of our pastor at Haven, Philadelphia, Mrs. J. E. Waters, wife of our pastor at Frankford, and Mrs. R. H. Coleman, wife of one of our pastors serving temporarily on the Easton District, were the most seriously ill among us in the parsonages. Sisters Hargis and Waters recovered and returned to good robust health, but sister Coleman went home to heaven to await our arrival. Suitable mention of her will be made in the Conference Journal.

Special Mention of Charges.

Springtown, R. A. F. Graham, pastor. This charge and pastor have rendered a service which meant much sacrifice, but it was a service that brought great satisfaction to the people. This charge is reporting \$21.00 for World Service and a quickened religious and social life in the community.

Bridgeton, C. W. Pullett, pastor. This charge reports \$360.00 for World Service and a good report upon other financial obligations. They report five conversions and eleven persons received into full membership.

Fordsville, J. H. Blackiston, pastor. This charge reports 18 conversions and 21 persons received into full membership. They report full apportionment for World Service and \$580.00 paid on old indebtedness.

Salem, G. T. Fields, pastor. This charge is growing day by day in power and usefulness. It is hoped that their church building will be completed soon, which will give us one of the most beautiful buildings on the Philadelphia District. They are reporting 7 conversions and 15 persons received into full membership. They report also \$225.00 for World Service and \$875.00 paid on old indebtedness. The people of Salem believe in expansion and desire more fields.

Quinton, R. H. Coleman, pastor. This charge reports 13 conversions and 16 persons received into full membership. They report also \$105.00 for World Service and \$1400.00 paid on old indebtedness.

Ocean City, Robert Townsend, pastor. This charge has as usual brought in a full report of all benevolent apportionment. They pride themselves in being the first charge on the District each year to pay everything in full.

Pleasantville, L. S. Perry, pastor. This charge reports thirty conversions and 30 persons received into full membership. They report \$124 for World Service and \$706 paid on the mortgage.

Atlantic City, Hamilton Memorial, W. H. Horner, pastor. This people reports 3 conversions and 33 persons received as full members. This charge reports \$184 for World Service and all other benevolent collections in full. Besides this they have \$661 in bank to pay on the church debt.

Atlantic City, Asbury, W. B. Perry, pastor. This charge reports 158 conversions and 58 persons received into the church. They report \$1370 for World Service and an amount equal to that of last year on all other benevolent items. A substantial payment is reported paid on the old indebtedness.

Absecond Circuit, G. S. Sterling, pastor. This is a new charge organized a little more than one year ago. They have one church building and during last January they bought and paid for two lots upon which a church building and parsonage may be erected.

Cape May, W. H. Johns, pastor. This charge reports \$210 for Wold Service, 3 souls won for Christ and 6 accessions to the church. They paid \$1300 for improvements. This church has completed a very beautiful, modern parsonage.

Swainton, J. L. Davis, pastor. These people report a great revival and 36 converts—every young person in the community but four converted. World Service raised \$30.

Camden, F. J. Handy, pastor. This has been an unusually good year for Camden. This charge reports a glorious revival and 11 conversions and 7 received as full members into the church. They report also \$175 for World Service and an increase in some other benevolent apportionments. Some renovations have been made on the church building at a cost of \$600 and all paid for.

Grenolch & Rhodes, J. L. Sawyer, pastor. These people report 9 conversions and 10 persons received as full members. They report \$134 for World Service.

Delair, E. F. Morris, pastor. This charge reports 15 conversions and 16 persons received into full membership. They report also \$200 raised for World Service; \$200.00 for improvements and \$300.00 for old indebtedness. This pastor has served faithfully and well this people eight years.

Merchantville, J. R. Holland, pastor. These good people report 12 conversions and 5 persons received as full members. This charge is reporting \$100 for World Service and \$2400 for building and improvements. Our new church building here is almost complete.

Woodbury, F. T. Johnson, pastor. This charge reports 3 conversions and 9 persons received as full members. Under the leadership of the present pastor this charge reports \$80 for World Service and also the securing of a new parsonage.

Berlin, E. E. Parker, pastor. This charge reports one conversion and two persons received as full members. Brother Parker, true to his previous record, reports all benevolent apportionments in full.

Lawnside, E. H. Crampton, pastor. This charge reports 2 conver-

sions and 5 persons received as full members. They are reporting \$305 for World Service and an increase in some other benevolent collections. The parsonage has been repaired and fitted up with modern improvements.

Germantown, D. W. Henry, pastor. They report 19 conversions and 24 received as full members. This charge reports \$1267 for World Service and other collections in full. This congregation has for several years been collecting funds for their new church. They collected this year \$5460 for the new building. Their plans and specifications are now drawn up and ground was broken very recently for the new structure.

Sommerville, William Goldsborough, pastor. This charge reports 25 conversions and 10 persons received as full members. They report \$180 for World Service and a good sum raised for repairing the building.

Frankford, J. E. Waters, pastor. This charge reports 2 conversions and 15 received as full members. They report \$55 for World Service and \$889 paid on old indebtedness.

Chester, Grace and Darby, E. P. Gibson, pastor. This charge reports 15 conversions. They report also \$60 for World Service.

Chester, Siloam, J. W. Bond, pastor. They report 10 conversions. \$400 for World Service. It is expected that by our next annual conference that Siloam will have built a beautiful, modern home for her pastors. Plans are being made.

Chester, St. Daniels, L. S. Moore, pastor. This charge reports 31 conversions and 23 received as full members. They report \$1427 for World Service and \$1550 paid on old debt.

PHILA. CHARGES. Mt. Zion, C. S. Spriggs, pastor. We have a report of 22 conversions and 6 persons received as full members. This charge reports \$72 for World Service and \$757 paid on all old debts.

Camphor Memorial, J. E. Dunn, pastor. We have a report of 4 conversions and 19 received as full members. Camphor conducted last summer a very successful vacation Bible School. It was partly financed by the Phila. Missionary and Church Extension Society. This charge reports \$71 for World Service and most of the other collections raised in full.

John Wesley, A. L. Martin, pastor. These happy people report 61 conversions and 32 persons received as full members. This charge reports also \$400 for World Service and \$4000 paid on old indebtedness. The outlook is brighter for another year.

Haven Memorial, D. H. Hargis, pastor. This charge reports 75 conversions and 25 persons received as full members. They report also \$1370 for World Service and \$2500 paid on old indebtedness. The young people of this charge are well organized and trained under the supervision of a paid woman worker, who has been employed there for several years. Haven conducted a splendid and very largely attended Vacation Bible School last summer. The local church financed it.

Zoar, J. T. Fletcher, pastor. Mother Zoar reports 33 conversions and 27 received as full members. She reports also \$2429 for World Service, and a payment of \$7,800 on old debt. Mother Zoar has a splendid equipment for social and recreational program and they are making very

good use of it and expect to increase their activities along that line. A splendid Vacation Bible School was conducted on this charge, it being financed by the local church. We desire to make very special mention of a cooperative plan of the Board of Home Missions and Phila. Missionary and Church Extension Society. In this plan four churches in Phila, are involved, viz., Warren, St. Paul, Peniel, and John Simmons. We have on among these four churches a very extensive missionary program. The Board and Society mentioned above are helping in the financing of this proposition. Our plan is to group the churches in a cooperative program somewhat on the larger parish plan. We have employed a very capable woman worker who is now serving all four of these churches in a very effective way.

Warren, J. H. Larkins, pastor. This charge is moving on fairly well under the leadership of her pastor. World Service reported \$5.00.

St. Paul, J. N. C. Davis, pastor. This charge reports 20 conversions and 30 persons received as full members. They report \$30 for World Service. St. Paul has a band of Gospel Singers, a Boy and Girl Scout Troup. A very successful Vacation Bible School was conducted here last summer. It was financed by the Phila. Missionary and Church Extension Society.

Peniel, Chas. T. Spence, pastor. This congregation on Sunday, November 27th, 1927, moved out of a store front into one of the finest brown stone churches occupied by our people in this city. Connected with this church is a fine three story parsonage. We marched into that church one Sunday under banners and with blasts of golden trumpets that told all the neighborhood that Negro Methodism had set up business there. Bishop Jos. F. Berry, our resident Bishop, preached the deciatory sermon and dedicated the church. Several ministers were present. This fine piece of church property was secured for our people by the Phila. Missionary and Church Extension Society of the M. E. Church of which the Rev. W. A. Ferguson, D. D., is the Corresponding Secretary. Peniel reports seven conversions and 65 full members added to the church. They report also \$56 for World Service.

John Simmons Memorial, W. J. L. Hughes, pastor. This charge reports 17 conversions and 26 persons received into the full membership of the church. We have a report of \$70 for World Service. This charge conducted a very creditable Vacation School last summer. It was financed by the Phila. Missionary and Church Extension Society. This finishes the cooperative group plan.

Tindley Temple, C. A. Tindley, pastor. This charge has done another years marvelous work. She has had her lights and shadows, storms, calms, but the vessel's landing safe in the harbor with all the crew on board and safe at their posts. Much attention has been given during the winter months to what they call the "down and outs." Tindley Temple did a very unique piece of Christian service in conducting a soup station this winter. It is reported that at this soup station 31,000 meals were served to black and white men, women and children at a cost of \$2,000. This

charge reports 2,622 converts and 89 received as full members. In spite of the handicaps, hindrances and many difficulties Tindley Temple is reporting \$5093 for World Service and all other collections in full. She reports also as having paid \$27,100.32 on old indebtedness.

District Meetings.

We give attention first of all to our young people and to their organizations. Our Epworth League and Sunday School Convention was conducted at Delair, N. J. in June, 1927. Our especially invited guests and speakers were Rev. J. T. Wallace, pastor of Mt. Joy Church, Wilmington, Delaware, and Prof. J. W. Haywood, Dean of Morgan College. We had more young people in attendance than the church building could accommodate. Our District Epworth League Rally was held at St. Daniels, Chester, last fall. At this rally we had at least 500 of the finest type of youth from all over the District. These young people pulled off stunts, nageants, and demonstrations that would be a credit to any group. The principal address was delivered by the Rev. E. A. Love, pastor of Asbury M. E. Church, Annapolis, Md.

A mid-year Epworth League Institute was conducted at Zoar Church in Philadelphia. D. W. Henry, out pastor at Germantown, was the dean of the Institute; a young layman by the name of Dennis Fletcher was the business manager. This Institute employed a first rate Faculty and the student body was a most excellent group of young people. Drs. R. C. Wells and John Biery of the Phila. Conference delivered inspirational addresses to the Institute.

District Conference.

The District Conference convened at Cape May, Oct. 4th to 6th, 1927. The Conference was very royally entertained by our church and other friends of Cape May. The Conference proved a blessing to the community and the community furnished a splendid opportunity to do good. We have never known before such spiritual fervor to prevail throughout our sessions.

Our specially invited speakers were Dr. T. H. Woodley, Supt. of the Wilmington District, and Dr. Gregory Gibbs, a returned missionary from China, and Dr. A. J. Mitchell, financial secretary of Morgan College. The District Superintendents and several ministers of other districts attended all of our district meetings and helped to make them more efficient.

Efficiency Conference.

This is one of the most helpful features of our district work. This year our Efficiency Conference was merged with Board of Home Missions and Church Extension Council, since they were both scheduled to be held at the same time.

Women's Societies.

The Conference Women's Societies as well as other religious clubs received our special attention. Too much respect and honor cannot be given to the splendid women of the Woman's Home Missionary Society whose district president is Mrs. Lillie Waters Bunday and whose Conference head is Mrs. Hattie R. Hargis. We have the profoundest respect for the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society, whose district president is Mrs. Bessie Harris, and whose Conference head is Mrs. Maud S. Thompson. The splendid women of the Ladies Aid Societies never fail or turn down our worthy appeal for help. According to reports to the Quarterly Conferences there are on the Philadelphia District 37 Ladies Aid Societies, nine Auxiliaries of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society and 25 Auxiliaries of the Woman's Home Missionary Society.

Building and Improvements.

Our building program this year has not been so elaborate and extensive as last year, however, some building has gone on. A beautiful parsonage with all modern improvements has been completed at Cape May. Two lots have been purchased at Douglass Park, a suburb of Atlantic City, upon which we hope to build a church and parsonage. Grace Church, Chester, has enlarged their building and furnished it nicely with pews, carpet and furnace. Merchantville has about completed a beautiful church at a cost of \$30,000. Lawnside renovated their parsonage at a cost of more than \$2,000. Tindley Temple renovated their parsonage at a cost of more than \$2,000. Germantown broke ground on March 4th for their new church edifice. Plans and specifications are darwn up and estimates are in for a beautiful modern structure. Woodbury, N. J. has purchased a parsonage. The Peniel congregation has a fine church and parsonage secured from 20th Street M. E. Church congregation at a cost of \$25,000.

Mortgages and Indebtedness.

There seems to be a tendency among our group to plunge just a little in building churches. It appears that at times we are extravagant and build beyond our means. While we do not always properly and carefully calculate the costs and should therefore come in for our share of criticism yet our purpose are for the most part true. We have believed that money spent in building churches was a good investment for the spreading of the gospel of Jesus Christ. And we know too that if we do not secure this money from some of our group for church purposes that it will be spent foolishly otherwise. We are urging however, that the long standing indebtedness against churches and parsonages be paid off. According to reports several thousand dollars have been paid this year on old indebtedness. Full reports will be seen in the Conference Minutes.

Christian Stewardship.

According to our observation the churches that have the most tithers and Christian stewards have been the most successful both in creating

and maintaining a Spiritual environment and in meeting financial obligations. During our Efficiency Conference last year special emphasis was placed upon tithing, christian stewardship and storehouse association. A campaign was launched for the purpose of securing more tithers in every church and to organize a storehouse association under the auspices of the Official Board of the Church wherever practicable. This plan was faithfully submitted to every charge at the 1st Quarterly Conference this year and the results have been very gratifying, we are glad to say.

Morgan College Crusade.

The Philadelphia District has expressed herself as being loyal to our Educational institutions. We were willing to give Morgan College the right of way in Conference collections but could not do so and remain within the rules and regulations of the Church. We have held mass and group meetings in the interest of this Crusade and hope to organize afresh after the Conference a very vigorous campaign for the purpose of meeting the challenge laid down by the General Board of Education in New York and the conditional gift proffered by the Maryland Legislature. The charges are reporting \$876 at this conference for Morgan College Crusade.

Ministerial Support.

A few of our charges have increased the salaries of their pastors. It is important that a workman be given a comfortable support if you expect of him an honest and honorable day's work. There should be a standardization of pastors salary but not equalization. Churches should be so grouped as to allow a minimum salary that will guarantee a living support.

World Church Collections.

Dr. R. J. Wade paid the Philadelphia District a signal compliment by saying that in no spring Annual Conference had a district come up to the Philadelphia in number of gains by charges in World Service giving. Our people were told of their record. It has affected us in two ways. Some of us have become satisfied and complacent with out past achievements. Others of us are making strenuous efforts to maintain our standing. However in spite of the depressing economic conditions, and the distressing industrial conditions in our territory which affected our group first, and the lethargy on the part of some of us, we shall have no cause to be ashamed of the efforts put forth. We have a faithful and loyal set of ministers and laymen associated with us that never fail when they are called. The following charges have paid more than their World Service Apportionments: Springtown, St. Daniels, Chester.

The following charges have paid in full their World Service Apportionment: Janes, Germantown, Hamilton Memorial, Atlantic City, Sommerville, Peniel, Berlin, Ocean City, Fordsville, Tindley Temple, Absecon Circuit, Haven Memorial, Phila., Swainton, Bridgeton, N. J. (12).

The following charges are reporting an increase over that of last year but did not raise the full apportionment: Camden, John Simmons Memorial, Frankford, Asbury, Atlantic City, Grace and Darby, Cape May, Camphor.

The following charges are reporting an amount of the World Service just equal to that of last year but not their full apportionment: Salem, Lawnside, Mt. Zion, Philadelphia (3).

The other charges fall below the line.

Evangelistic Efforts.

The gospel is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth. It is our duty and privilege to get the gospel across to the people. We are not urging any special form or method of evangelism but the method ought to be effective. We plead for an evangelistic gospel. We have insisted upon a special evangelistic effort in every church at some time during the year. Every Charge on the District conducted a revival but seven, according to reports. We are thankful to God for the souls won to Christ during the year and yet our dream of a great sweeping revival or evangelistic effort that will bring us all to our knees and save many more thousands that are yet unsaved is yet to be realized. There are yet hundreds of thousands of our people within the territory covered by the Philadelphia District that we do not in any way touch. We are all too complacent and satisfied to touch the fringe and edge of things that need us most. Most of our churches are well located in respect to our people. The task is constantly before our gaze. Shall we go to it?

Some apology might be made for the lack of spiritual fervor and burning passion for souls on account of the many and constant financial drives and crusades. It is well known among the ministers and laity that the standing of both ministers and charge is not measured so much by the souls they have saved as by the money they have raised. In fact some of us seem to think we are better off not to save souls since it adds to our financial responsibilities. We have a way of saying we pay for those added to our church records. This accounts often for the pruning of our membership records. Then too it is much easier to put a member on the non-resident list or inactive list than it is to go around the corner and urge and encourage him to return to the church. And yet in the face of all these barriers and obstacles and many more that we do not mention, the Philadelphia District comes to you reporting 443 full members received, 3256 persons converted in our churches this conference We are doing our best in urging, advising, and encouraging, and endeavoring to preach upon every available opportunity in order that nothing shall be lacking at any point, and yet there are higher heights to be reached. We ask the prayerful consideration of the Bishop and Conference that our labors may be more effective for our Lord's sake,

SALISBURY DISTRICT.

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

With grateful hearts to our Father, who has permitted us to serve as workmen with Him in the Kingdom building another year, I submit this, my fifth annual report for the Saltisbury District.

The lives of all the effective pastors have been spared. Sickness has entered several parsonages, but the hand of death was stayed. Two of our retired ministers have passed to their reward. Rev. J. F. Molock, on April 28, 1927, and Rev. H. R. Purnell, on March 11, 1928. Both resided in Berlin, Maryland. J. S. Coulbourne and R. C. Hughes prepared memoirs. Rev. O. P. Dickerson was suddenly stricken February 9, and is now in the hospital at Salisbury, Maryland, for an operation. Mrs. W. N. King has suffered during the year, necessitating an operation, and is now under treatment in Philadelphia.

Bishop, R. E. Jones, the Salisbury District joins heartily in welcoming you for the second time to preside over us, and trust that your pleasure in our midst will equal or excel that of your former visits.

District Activities.

Mr. C. T. Ward, president of the District Methodist Brotherhood, is carrying a successful campaign for organization of chapters. His group meetings are effective and educational. Four charges have made organization recently. The Sunday School and other young people's organizations show evidences of real health, despite the handicaps caused by our people's changing places to make a living, which, of course, affects those organizations. However, the faithfulness of the few remaining at home is rewarded with success.

The Woman's Home Missionary Society work feels the unexpected change of their president following the last session of the conference. However, they are at work with all their might to make good. Each charge should encourage these noble women, for the cause they repersent is worthy of the best we can give.

Total \$4000.00 by these few.

Survey of Charges.

Cottage Grove: For World Service, \$50; paid on old debt, \$200; im-

provements, \$210. Present debts are \$600.00.

Crisfield, Shiloh: World Service, \$514; other benevolences, \$104; paid on old debt, \$500; improvements, \$900. Every apportionment in full. This has been repeated three times in succession. D. S. Quillen, pastor.

Crisfield, Union Asbury: World Service, \$50; other benevolences, \$62; building and improvement, \$527; old debt, \$145. The much needed new edifice awaits the spirit of unity in this capable organization. I. D.

Pitts, pastor.

Dames Quarter: World Service, \$24; other benevolences, \$12. This sad report is due more to lack of unity than to hard times. We pray for the return of that kind of devotion that says, "Thy Kingdom come" with real sacrifice pleasing to our Master.

Deals Island: World Service, \$50; other benevolences, \$26; improve-

ments, \$32. W. H. Hayman, pastor.

Delmar: World Service, \$200; other benevolences, \$58. For five years this has been the banner charge in per capita giving for World Service. The great need is a new church building in the community, where training of youth in adolescence can be carried on. Future results would soon give large dividends for the Kingdom. M. W. Clark, pastor.

Fairmount, Centennial: World Service, \$145; other benevolences, \$48. This charge continues with the foremost in benevolent giving. Sickness and death have affected some of the most dependable workmen. G. H. Bivens, pastor.

Fairmount, St. Andrews: World Service, \$121; other benevolences, \$52; old debt, \$500. There is only a step between this present condition of the charge and that of a model rural charge. J. H. Reed, pastor.

Fruitland: World Service, \$55; other benevolences, \$68. Improvements consist of sale of the parsonage lot for \$1500; the removal and renovation of the parsonage on a large site, with proceeds a beautiful and comfortable home for the pastor and family. Malachi Raisin, pastor.

Girdletree: World Service, \$127; other benevolences, \$93; paid on improvements, \$387; present indebtedness, \$518. Both churches have been renovated and beautified with metal ceilings. Ten years of pastoral service of one man have not tired these people. J. L. Nichols, pastor.

Greenwood: The serious illness of the pastor's wife during the year

has given him much anxiety and greatly affected him in his work. Besides an operation in the Salisbury hospital, she has been required to take treatments in Philadelphia for the past two months. We pray for an early restoration to health and activity. A splendid revival has visited this work in the closing weeks of the conference year.

Hebron: World Service, \$35; other benevolences, \$42; raised on old and present debt, \$300. The appointment of the Rev. Van B. Wright to supply this work after the close of the conference year met with the disapproval of leaders on the charge. They are all happy now, and are praising his success, which equals, if not excels, the best in their memory.

Hopewell: World Service, \$80; other benevolences, \$25; raised for improvements, \$200; present debt, \$600. The parsonage property has been improved. The pastor, E. E. Rogers, worked faithfully, though under great strain because of sickness in his home.

Horntown: World Service, \$150; other benevolences, \$92; paid on old debt, \$225. The pastor, W. R. Price, has the work in good condition.

Jamestown: World Service, \$40; other benevolences, \$38; raised on old debt, \$312; improvement, \$130; present debt, \$601. The pastor, A. W. McBride, is energetic and has succeeded in making improvements that are helpful to the charge.

Keller: World Service, \$30; old debt, \$29; present debt, \$2000. Notwithstanding a great revival, with 96 professions, a spirit of restlessness has affected this work. A comfortable home for the pastor and his family would be the solution for the major part of the trouble in this charge. This would induce men with whom they are satisfied to remain longer in this field, which can be the equal to the best in Virginia. C. A. Norwood, pastor.

Kingston: I. H. Bivens, pastor. This charge has gone forward for sixteen years, with evidences of progress all around. In giving for all causes, they are in the front line. The one great need is a parsonage, the only preventative for this being a reality is the lack of agreement on the location. Raised for World Service, \$360; other benevolences, \$55; paid on old debt, \$300; improvement, \$300; present debt, \$190.

Leemont: In number of members and constituents, this charge has the largest future for Methodism in Virginia, or possibly on the District. The pastor, G. T. Townsend, is alert in trying to organize and have the charge reach the ideal. Much success has attended his efforts during the five years of his pastorate. World Service, \$200; other benevolences, \$56; raised on improvements, \$500; old debt, \$200; present indebtedness, \$800.

Liberia: W. W. Brown, pastor. This charge has enjoyed a pleasant year, with activity noted in nearly all departments of church life. Raised for World Service, \$75; other benevolences, \$33; improvements, \$285; present debt, \$150.

Mardela Springs: The pastor, O. P. Dickerson, though prevented by illness from rendering full service, enjoys sending a report that compares favorably with last year. World Service, \$145; other benevolences, \$48;

improvements, \$210. A comfortable parsonage has been erected. Old debts have been cancelled; present debt, \$1200.

Marion Station: This work has felt the failures more than many in the same area because of the heavy obligations they carry. But through all they met their interest, insurance and settled notes of long standing. Their reports equal that of last year. For World Service, \$200; other benevolences, \$55. W. E. Waters, pastor.

Mt. Vernon: The Delco lighting system at St. Paul's and the painting of Mt. Zion church marked some of the activities of this charge. Raised for World Service, \$67; other benevolences, \$11. M. P. Sterling, pastor.

Nanticoke: Under the pastorate of J. I. Peaco this charge has overcome the handicap of a dull season. Having raised on old debt, \$1100, interest and insurance cared for to date, they have done splendidly; for improvements, \$125; present debt, \$14,000; World Service, \$110; other benevolences, \$75. The spirit of unity prevails. The future for this work is bright. The folk are delighted with their hard working pastor.

Newark: These people have improved their chance for holding and teaching the youth in the years of adolescence by moving one church in the midst of the people where the young people can be reached conveniently. The pastor and his workmen are jubilant over results. Raised for World Service, \$40; other benevolences, \$40; old debt, \$360; present debt, \$440. C. L. Jones, pastor.

North Berlin: These people this year celebrated their freedom from debt by a crusade against sin, with an ingathering of many souls as a reward. The pastor, J. S. Coulbourne, and people are happy over results. Raised for World Service, \$325; other benevolences, \$153.

Oakville: The pastor, I. W. Wallace, has given splendid account of his calling by improvement evident in the work of his charge. Improvement in parsonage property has enhanced the value of the property; the debt has been reduced. Raised for World Service, \$37; other benevolences, \$32.

Oriole: Faithful efforts to advance all parts of the work have met with success by the pastor, W. B. Whittington. The results will equal former reports. World Service, \$75; other benevolences, \$40.

Parsonburg: The lack of unity and the depression prevalent combined has prevented this chtarge from equalling their former report. However, those who have made this possible will not lose their reward. World Service, \$91; other benevolences, \$34. E. M. Neals, pastor.

Pocomoke City: This charge has not allowed the business slump to defeat them. So led by the pastor, R. N. Davis, they paid \$500 for improvements; \$500 paid on their debt for pipe organ; cleared off present debt on church and parsonage, \$1800; World Service, \$220; other benevolences, \$105; Morgan College Crusade, \$40. Presentations came from A. M. E. Church and white people to cheer the pastor.

Portsville Mission: W. O. Turner, pastor. World Service, \$4; other benevolences, \$8.

Princess Anne: Folks find themselves here constantly drawn by the

pastoral care, and delight in the work carried forward. Night services are restored and well attended by youth. World Service, \$300; other benevolences, \$10; paid on old debt, \$400; present indebtedness, \$1900. J. H. Scott, pastor.

Quantico: These people suffered the loss of their splendid church building, which was burned to the ground December 26. Their sorrow is made greater by an irregularity which affects their insurance, leaving them on the mercy of the company, and possibly a total loss. But for the tenacity of their pastor, C. B. Miles, this charge would have suffered badly. World Service, \$105; other benevolences, \$86; Morgan College Crusade, \$40.

Salisbury, John Wesley: The pastor, S. M. Emptage, is an untiring worker. The church has been beautified within and without. Raised on improvements, \$2000; on old debt, \$1000; present debt, \$1600; World Service, \$500. This excels the best. Other benevolences, \$138; the program presented and approved by the first Quarterly Conference is nearly full, notwithstanding obstacles, for which may the Lord be praised!

Salisbury, White's Chapel: Constant growth to the five years pastorate of J. A. Kiah has marked the work of this charge. A mortgage of many years standing on the church was burned. Seats for the grove were purchased, the congregation was greatly increased. Paid on old debt, \$388; improvements, \$140; present parsonage debt, \$825; raised on World Service, \$235; other benevolences, \$134.

Sharptown: Alexander Reid, pastor. The parsonage note has been paid, leaving the charge clear of debt. Raised on old debt, \$175; improvements, \$199.99; World Service, \$150; other benevolences, \$70. The future for this work is very promising. Morgan College Crusade, \$40.

Snow Hill: L. H. McArthur and his people spent a wonderful year together and are willing to try again. The church improvements are, a metal ceiling, new carpet, alternations in pulpit and choir and a rear entrance from basement to auditorium made. Raised for improvements, \$1164; old debt, \$365; present debt, \$1150; World Service, \$240; other benevolences, \$104; Morgan College Crusade, \$50.

Snow Hill Circuit: The pastor, R. J. Williams, has plans for a new church building to replace Hutt's Chapel, the mother of Methodism in that section. Raised on building and improvements, \$250; old debt, \$138; World Service, \$50; other benevolences, \$20; Morgan College Crusade, \$19.

South Berlin and Sinepuxent: These people have raised on old debt, \$530; present indebtedness, \$1732; World Service, \$110; other benevolence, \$82. A thriving Junior Church is an addition to this work. Morgan College Crusade, \$7. R. C. Hughes, pastor.

Stockton: Raised for improvements, \$137; Wold Service, \$60; other benevolences, \$33. The pastor, G. S. Jacobs, is energetic and untiring.

Stockton Circuit: The pastor, I. R. Elzey, is a willing worker and seems to love his job. The charge is difficult to manage, but advancement is evident under his care. Raised for improvements, \$150; old debt,

\$175. The church was painted at a cost of \$85. World Service, \$50;

other benevolences, \$19.

Unionville: Raised on improvements, \$265; old debt, \$300; present debt, \$2000; World Service, \$88; other benevolences, \$46; Morgan College Crusade, \$25. These good folk have made the home on this charge equal to the best. J. R. Purnell, pastor.

Wachapreague: Raised for improvement, \$475; old debt, \$472; present indebtedness, \$350; World Service, \$51; other benevolencesfi \$18.

S. T. Parker, pastor.

Wattsville: The pastor, J. W. Parker's life was in the balance for several months during the conference year. We are thankful that he has recovered sufficiently to return and assume his task. Much has happened for future good to the people of the charge other than enlarging the church. A fine site both for parsonage and school was purchased near the home church. St. John's has met with kindred kindness in school life. A splendid building will replace the old. The latter goes to the church for a community hall. World Service, \$80; other benevolences, \$87; Morgan College Crusade, \$25.

Wetipquin: These people are pleased with their pastor, C. T. Covington. They want him to say, "Forever here my rest shall be." Raised on improvements, \$195; old debt, \$285; present debt, \$489; World Service, \$84; other benevolence, \$52; Morgan College Crusade, \$10.

Whaleyville: These people have to their credit a splendid improvement, almost a new church, quite modern. Raised on improvements, \$915; present debt, \$600; World Service, \$115; other benevolences, \$38. J. H. Dredden is the energetic pastor.

White Haven: W. H. Mears, pastor, has wrought well in this field, and the mass of folk acknowledge his work, saying, "Abide With Us." Raised on improvements, \$150; World Service, \$105; other benevolences, \$43.

Withams: E. H. Nichols, pastor, reports improvements, \$300; old debt, \$200; World Service, \$65; other benevolences, \$29; Morgan College Crusade, \$16.

Exmore Mission: Benjamin Bivens, pastor. Paid on old debt, \$66.95; many debts made before the church was destroyed by fire have annoyed this little work. The pastor, in addition, by renting a building for services, has cleared the place of debt, and has increase the membership from 8 to 25.

Stewardship.

This all important step has been stressed at all quarterly conferences. Whether success appears or not, we must not cease, for the complete victory of our Church cannot be attained without the adoption of this God-given plan. The art of meditation in its highest form is lost until the followers of our Lord, especially his ministers, are relieved of the worry and other difficulties made by the money question in the church. Slumps in church life should not always hit our best Friend hardest, for

we should not always expect His favor without giving our best to the cause for which He suffered. No excuse can satisfy our Lord, if we have not done our very best. Then, and only then, is no excuse needed. However poor our showing, until this is righted, the full, free course of the

Gospel is actually hindered.

Every servant should be anxious for the time when the church with the fullest meaning can say, "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof, the world and they that dwell therein." Then will come the end of church problems, missionaries will return to the outposts from which they were called, Morgan College Crusade, even now, would be sure of a joyful ending, as it rightfully deserves, and to please God, must have. Too many hearts have ached as vainly these worthy pleas have gone forth without success. The plea "hard times" will not stand examination. It is the wrong way of using that which belongs to God that troubles. We cannot, we must not, cease till victory, in God's way, is won; upon whom can our Lord depend if not upon us? As sad as the thought may make many of us feel, still it is worthy of our most serious consideration.

We are fortunate to have Princess Anne Junior College in our midst, and our Dr. Kiah, one of our own sons, as principal. He has given, and is now giving, the best years of his life to its growth, and the welfare of our children who are in his care. The school is finely organized and well managed, with a faculty of sixteen instructors, the attendance the largest in three years, with an increase of 33 and one-third per cent. over last year. This school's welfare should grip us and thrill us through every act that will help make it reach the utmost, for it is ours; its advancement is ours; it is ours if it fails.

Religion is foremost in the school. The impression upon student life gives evidence of this. The team work of teachers and students during the annual day of prayer for colleges was charming and effective in helping to make the student body almost one hundred per cent. Christian. February 9, the school and district united in celebrating the annual Day of Prayer for Colleges. The Rev. J. N. Bullen, of Chestertown, preached the annual sermon and made the appeal. The team work of that body swept out on the tide of that powerful appeal, never ceasing until eleven young people had answered the Gospel's clear call. All but one student in that body are Christians. Our leaders are in the making. Let us make it our business to see that they go forth Christians and as many as possible, from our own Junior College.

Conference Claimants.

The success of our conference claimants fund is urged. Let us note that it will have much to do with the kind of ministry the near future will produce. The ideal ministry for which we all should pray must be unhampered. Such will hardly be reached until an old age without poverty is held before the theological student who is coming.

Southwestern Christian Advocate.

We urge that every official and leading layman become readers of this paper that they may know Methodism better; that they may become acquainted with the way our race is helped to a place of Christian reasoning with other groups who are able to help us. We must continue the effort until our representative can be proud of a paying sheet.

No one can view the inward anxieties, the heartaches, the mountains made to obstruct, the valleys of evil devices, all made or encountered by each workman who has succeeded or failed in the estimation of others more fortunate while trying to gather this offering we bring. Are we satisfied? No, never! For when growth and advancement cease, death begins. While real dissatisfaction would spur us to seek and gain greater heights, and help more largely the rapid spread of His Kingdom on earth.

PRINCESS ANNE ACADEMY.

We, your committee, have made a brief study both by visitation and investigation of the financial situation of Morgan College which has almost reached its crisis. The critical hour of emergency has come. The situation is grave. Unless there comes an immediate financial response from every pastor, member and friend of every Charge all hope for a re-

tention of Morgan College in her present status among the leading colleges of the country will be lost.

We heartily congratulate and commend the Washington Conference on the step they have taken to offset any possibility of humiliation, or loss of status by not raising the sum needed to meet the challenge of the legislature of Maryland as well as the General Education Board. Let us restate what the Washington Conference did at their recent session. They passed a resolution to borrow six thousand dollars to meet any possible deficit that may appear after June 1. This, certainly, will stir us to a healthy spirit of emulation.

Morgan College, as you well know, has a splendid and most admirable location. Its site comprises eighty-five acres, located on Hillen Road and Arlington Avenue, Baltimore, Md. It is the only Negro College in the State of Maryland equipped for preparing and training the Negro youth to meet the needs of this exacting age with voice and pen. Morgan College can safely be accepted as an institution equipped to give the fundamentals which are highly necessary to make the largest contribution in any department of human endeavor.

The great worth of this institution needs no advocate. The great work which is being done by her sons and daughters throughout the country engaged in every vocation is sufficient to establish her worth under the splendid leadership of Doctor J. O. Spencer and his highly qualified faculty. Even a slight observation of some individuals in this Conference will substantiate her worth.

Your Committee has been informed that out of eighteen standard High Schools of the State of Maryland fourteen of them have as their head a finished product of Morgan College, saying nothing of the many who fill Methodist pulpits and the pulpits of other denominations.

It is up to every loyal Methodist to stand by and see that Morgan College retains her status in Class "A". Brethren, it is not Methodism alone that is o ntrial in this Crusade. It is our entire race group. Our interest i nadvanced education for Negro youth is facing us with a big question mark.

White friends have helped us, are still helping, and will continue to help. The fifty thousand dollars conditional gift from the General Education Board is a Challenge for us to cancel the old debt on the college, and raise an additional sum of fifty thousand dollars. The \$125,000 conditional gift appropriated by the Maryland State legislature for the erection of a science building comes to us as a challenge if we help in raising the sum of \$115,000 by June 1, 1928. Shall we lose the gift of \$175,000 by failing to put across this program? Nay. Let us prove equal to this occasion of urgent need.

According to information coming to your committee Morgan College has recently been admitted as a member of the University Senate of the M. E. Church. Shall we fail in this crisis and lose all honors thus far gained?

The State Board of Education for the State of Maryland is demand-

ing that all secondary teachers have a college training. Why not let this Conference go on record as approving every effort that shall be made to enable Morgan College to retain her status quo? This can only be done by raising the full amount in order to secure the additional gifts.

Brethren, in view of the complex civilization in which we now live, and in view of the many questionable theories and dogmas that are being taught in many of our institutions in the land which have for its chief aim, apparently, the shattering of the faith of our fathers, with this lamentable situation before us it is imperative, yes, binding, and obligatory on our part as members of the old M. E. Church that has done so much for us, not to fail her now in this great enterprise for the advancement of the race.

Let us rally to the Crusade Drive with every ounce of energy and money possible. The future destiny of our youth is at stake. We should make it possible for not one of our youth to have to leave home and go into other villages to buy for themselves victuals which so often is tainted with those isms that endanger the very foundation of fundamentalism. Remebber the words of Jesus: "They do not need to go away." Give them some food yourselves. Not only give them intellectual food, but moral and spiritual food, that will make our youth bulwarks against the forces of evil.

With these facts before us your committee wishes to urge each Charge to assume a sufficient amount and write it into the budget of their Church to be raised and reported to Morgan College by May 28—a sum that will equal as many dollars as they have members.

Your Committee desires to go on record as commending Dr. A. J. Mitchell for his excellent work throughout the whole campaign for a greater Morgan College. We welcome his appointment for the direction of the Campaign for the ensuing year.

Princess Anne Academy.

Princess Anne Academy is growing by leaps and bounds. The able and wise leadership of Dr. T. H. Kiah continues. He has steadily grown in power and in efficiency during the eighteen years of his notable work as Principal. Our children are safe in the hands of this star of Methodism.

We would say that the greatest need of Princess Anne Academy is moral support. It needs more constant and an ever increasing moral support on the part of the ministers and laymen of our Conference. The State aid which the School receives should make us resolve to do more than we have done. Let's bear in mind that "Heaven helps those who help themselves."

A dormitory for boys is the greatest material need. No less urgent is the need of a library building and an adequate supply of books. The new building is only temporary as a dormitory. There the boys are housed on the third floor in a very congested manner. This building is essentially an administration which purpose it admirably serves.

Cottages for teachers are also badly needed. It is hoped that we will

also use our influence in behalf of Princess Anne. Let us talk and sing of her worth. Let us pray that she may continue the stronghold of Christian education on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. May her influence be felt throughout the lang through the notable men and women who have passed through her portals.

This deficit of \$172.80 is only apparent over against other years expenses because this year we paid the lump sum of \$240.00 on cots which become the property of the Institute. THE REPORT OF THE TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

THE ENFORCEMENT PROBLEM.

1. Enforcement of prohibition depends upon the character of the delegates selected to sit in the Republican Convention of 1928. The insuring of such a delegation will by all means provide against the nominating of a candidate who is only politically dry.

Remember the phrase of Senator Borah: "This is a presidential election." This is the key to the enforcement problem. How can the drys make sure of a convinced dry presidential candidate standing for law enforcement? Answer: Organize; write platforms; create public opinion; arouse sentiment; educate the masses.

- 2. Arrest: In the past year there were 64,986 persons arrested by federal officers. These figures show 742 arrests over the first year average of 64,244.
- 3. Expenditure: The expenditures of the Prohibition Bureau for enforcement of the National Prohibition Act in 1927 were \$11,720,533, going above the five year average of expenditures.
- Rum Row: Reduction in the number of ships on "Rum Row" show a marked improvement.
- 5. Sentences: There has been a higher percentage of jail sentences. Prosecutions over 48,000. Convictions more than 37,000. Fines and penalties imposed were over \$7,000,000.

SOME SOCIAL EFFECTS.

- 1. Drink causes crime, poverty, immorality, domestic unhappiness, insanity, inefficiency, disease and suicide.
- 2. Those who have acquired the alcohol habit, contribute nothing to the evolution or stability of the human race.
- 3. Prohibition secures the rights and protection of society against anti-social acts. The 18th Amendment is the greates political adventure of a government.
- 4. Economic Value: The 18th Amendment is helping to bring about industrial evolution by securing mass production, speed, conservation, elimination of waste, and the development of skilled workmen.
- 5. Church: Prohibition as a moral issue was pioneered by the church. The task now awaiting the church is education. An educational campaign for students must obtain. Bishop McDowell says, "Our appeal must be to the mind and conscience, and the economic sense of the nation's citizenship."

NULLIFICATION.

We deplore the statement by Senator Glass of Virginia, that the nullification of the 18th Amendment is not in a class with the nullification of the 15th Amendment because there is and can be no congressional enforcement legislation for the 15th Amendment as there is for the Eighteenth.

Literally, there is no nullification of the 15th Amendment by the southern states; but the intent and spirit of the 15th Amendment is flouted in every election in the South.

In intent and spirit the South does nullify this Amendment.

We confidently predict that the "water-wagon-Pullman" to the party convention will be loaded with delegates as a result of the thirty-one national organizations' Meeting, February 28, at the Mayflower Hotel, Washington, D. C. The conference voted two requests directed to the National Conference. First, a platform declaring a clear-cut, vigorous, and efficient enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment, and Second, to nominate candidates who are positively and openly committed to this platform.

We highly resolve, that the churches in the Delaware Conference this year make a generous contribution toward the Methodist Building in Washington.

REPORT OF THE SUMMER SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY.

During the past quadrennium a very constructive and far reaching service has been rendered to our two conferences. The Washington and Delaware through the agency of the Princess Anne Summer School of This has been evidenced by the changing methods of con-Theology. ducting the examinations of the undergraduates, formerly used to that now employed by the school in which modern pedagogical methods are used. This change is further stressed by the personal contact of the student and teacher throughout the year, by correspondence courses, by the special provisions made for the supply pastors by the emphasis on written work-by the annual ten day session at Princess Anne Academy and the enlarged program for graduate work thus combining to encourage the young men under its direction to look forward to both a college and a seminary education. The school has given to these two patronizing conferences one of the most forward looking programs of the day for the advancement of Christian Education.

Its faculty and lecturers numbering twenty persons of both races, have given unreservedly the best of their learning and culture to the two hundred young men who have come to them for instructions and assistance.

The cost for maintaining the school amounted to \$3200.00. Amounts from the following sources were received to meet this budget:

From the Commission on Course of Study, \$1000.00.

From the Washington and Delaware Conferences by apportionments and other sources, \$2065.00. Balance due, \$135.00, which is provided for by a note held by Professor T. H. Kiah and computed at six per cent. annually.

We strongly urge that all young men in the course of study continue to attend the summer school.

We commend the excellent work of Dr. Allan MacRossie, the Educational Director, and recommend the continuance of the General Commission on Conference Course of Study.

MEMOIRS

CYRUS WHEELBANK MOORE.

Cyrus Wheelbanks Moore was born December eight, eighteen and fifty-six, in Sussex County, Laurel, Delaware. Son of Calwell and Elizabeth Moore. He and Mary Ellen Tucker were united in Holy Wedlock, on the thirtieth day of December, in the year of our Lord eighteent and eighty-two. To their union was born nine children, five girls and four boys, six of which survive: Leon, Bessie, Carrie, Grafton, Pauline and Hyland.

It was the highest ambition of both father and mother that the children might have the best educational advantage that they could afford. As a result of their efforts for many years, both lived to see all striving to do their best with the opportunities afforded by the parents.

He surrendered his life to Jesus in the year of eighteen and seventy-seven, at the age of twenty-one years, thus making a Christian pilgrimage of forty-nine years. The work of the church was ever dear to his heart. His christian life, sympathy and love for those with whom he came in contact made for him many warm friends.

He served two years as supply and was admitted to the Delaware Conference in eighteen and ninety-six, serving faithfully the following charges: Fairlee, two years; Carmichael, four; Galena, five; Federalsburg, four; Ridgely, five; Millington, five and Greensboro, one, all of which are in Maryland. He reluctantly retired, after many years of service, with Greensboro his last appointment.

He is survived by a wife and six children, one sister and two brothers, Lewis and William Moore and Sadie Shockley and a host of relatives and friends.

The forty-five years of married life were years of devotion. Nothing ever became too hard to do, when the comfort of both wife and family were concerned. He was ever a father from the beginning to the end. His kindness and loving care will always be dear to our hearts. His precepts and examples we will follow. Forty-five long years he bore the afflictions of life without one complaint. Simply waited patiently for the change at any time. On Friday morning the administering angel at four-thirty brought the heavenly call. And as peaceably as could be, he closed his eyes from time to awake in eternal life.

His last words were that he had striven to do his best for the family and had done all he could to build up the kingdom by his ministerial

work, and was waiting for the change, because he was sure his rest was secure.

Though it has pleased God in His Infinite Wisdom to take him from us, we feel that our earthly loss is his heavenly gain.

Why should our tears in sorrow flow, When God recalls his own, And bids them leave a world of woe For an Immortal Crown?

Is not even death a gain to those Whose life to God was given? Gladly to Earth their eyes they close, To open them in heaven.

Their toils are past, their work is done And they are fully blest; They fought the fight, the victory won, And entered into rest.

Then let our sorrows cease to flow; God has recalled his own; But let our hearts in every woe, Still say, "Thy will be done."

Funeral services were held at Whatcoat M. E. Church, Dover, Del., Monday, April 11th, 1927, conducted by T. H. Woodley, Superintendent Wilmington District. THE FAMILY.

J. F. MOLOCK.

Jonah Francis Molock, the son of Rosetta Molock, was born at Aireys, Md., September 15th, 1863, died at Berlin, Md., April 27th, 1927, aged 63 years, 7 months and 12 days.

He was educated in the public schools and through correspondence. He taught in the public schools of Delaware and Maryland fourteen years. While teaching at Cokesbury, Maryland he married Miss Lurana J. Robinson. From this union three children were born, Hattie Viola, Harrison Colwell and Rosetta Mabel. His wife and three children survive him. He was a loving companion and a kind father. He was a good Gospel preacher and a tireless worker; he conducted great revivals on the different charges on which he served and many persons were saved and added to the Church. He joined the Delaware Conference in 1892, and served the following charges with marked success: Sharptown, Md., 1 year; Ches-

wold, Del., 2 years; Odessa, Del., 2 years; Salem, N. J., 2 years; Germantown, Pa., 3 years; Fairmount, Md., 3 years; Berlin, Md., 8 years. He lost his sight 15 years before his death while pastor at Berlin, Md. During those years he never complained and seemed to have been always happy. He loved his Church and was loyal to the same. He attended all the services and was always ready to help his pastor. He had special love for class meeting, his testimonies were strong, and saturated with evidence of a good life supported by a strong faith in God.

During his last illness, he would often speak of his hope of a glorious immortality. A short while before his death he was speechless, but at the mention of the name of Jesus he would smile. When the end came

he passed away without a frown.

Some one has said, I could never believe that the soul loses its senses by escaping from senseless matter, or that such a release will not enlarge and increase its power. Church, and became a wonderful power for good in that Church. While in Philadelphia he heard and heeded the call of God and was given local license by Dr. Pazavia O'Connell, then his pastor. In the year of 1892 he was married to Miss Sarah J. Jones of Berlin, Md., who survives him. To this union there were no children. In 1901 he was assigned as supply pastor of Somerville, Pa. This is where he showed his ability as a leader for God in the Church. His work there was marked with such success that he remained there for ten years, eight as a supply pastor and two as a member of the Delaware Conference.

In 1909 he was received on trial and 1911 into full membership in the conference. For twenty-six years he served appointments in the conference, eight as a supply and 18 as a probationer and full member.

He served the following appointments:—Somerville, 2 years; Salem, N. J., 2 years; Marydel, Md., 1 year; Longwood, Md., 2 years; Greenwood, Md., 2 years; Liberia, Md., 2 years; Sharptown, Md., 3 years; Jamestown,

Md., 2 years. Retired in 1927 and moved to Berlin, Md., his home and the home of his wife. There he remained until March 12th, 1928 about 7:45 A. M., when he moved to His Father's House above. Six years ago while serving at Liberia, Md., he was stricken with high blood pressure and for a while thought the end was near; he was not able to attend the Annual Conference the first year but the people loved him and would have him return. The second year he was able to get some relief and did a year's work. Moving from there to Sharptown, Md., it was there his physical strength weakened and spiritual strength and power increased. For many months at a time he was not able to fill his pulpit; but it was there that he had the greatest spiritual success of his ministry. In one revival more than one hundred souls were brought into the Kingdom. It was there that he experienced a real Pentecost. While at many times he and his wife thought the angel had come with the chariot to his bedside; but he said God had more work for him to do. He revived, moved and served two years at Jamestown, Md., successfully; but still growing weaker retired and moved to Berlin, casting his lot at St. Paul M. E. Church, with Reverend J. S. Coulbourne, his pastor. There he kept the fire burning in Church, in his home, on the streets or wherever he went, preaching for his pastor and the brethren around until the fall of the year. Then he became a "shut in" because of his health but a brighter light for God.

Early Monday morning, March 12th, after he had given up all earthly possessions and told his wife that his work was done, gave her up and asked her to give him up. Calling for his pastor, Reverend Coulbourne, and telling him that he was going and tell the brethren who spoke at his funeral don't be afraid to talk, giving him arrangements for the service. He closed his eyes on moral to open them on immortality—dropped his corruptible robe to take up his crown of incorruption and Henry Purnell was not for God took him.

Henry Riley Purnell was only trained in the public schools of Maryland but he loved and studied his Bible and was a preacher of the Gospel. Forceful in statement, tireless in energy, blazing hot in earnestness and a brother beloved in spirit. Brother Purnell was devoted to his conviction and of truth and was untiring in trying to make the Kingdom come in the hearts of men. We believe that he won the victory and with him there was no death, not twilight but morning.

He said to me in his last days that his family was growing smaller here but larger on the other shore.

He leaves a wife, one brother, the Reverend J. R. Purnell, of the Delaware Conference, three sisters—Mrs. Maggie Hudson, Mrs. Mahala Showell and Mrs. Minnie Briddell, all of Berlin, Md. Service in his honor was conducted at St. Paul M. E. Church, Berlin, Md., March 14, 1928, by District Superintendent J. E. A. Johns, principal speaker and Reverend J. S. Coulbourne, his pastor, following. Remarks were made by eight other ministers of the Salisbury District, who were there to console his wife and friends, as they tucked him in his bed of clay to rest until the morning comes.

W. L. STEWART.

On Saturday, January 7, 1928, the body of Rev. W. L. Stewart was lai dto rest at Hillsbury, Va. His life extended over the short period of forty-two years, two months, and twenty-eight days, and some few of them, approximately four, he gave to the service of his church and his God in the service of the Christian ministry. On September 27, 1885, God gave him to the the keeping of Francis and George Stewart, who at that time lived at Hillsbury, Va. Six years later the family moved to Montclair, N. J., where they gave to their boy the opportunity to embrace every advantage of school that was possible. Early in his life God spake to him, and pointed out before him the way of eternal life. He accepted, and joined himself to St. Mark's Methodist Episcopal Church, Montclair, N. J. Later, in preparation for the ministry, he entered Gammon Theological Seminary in the early fall of 1921. Though young in the work, he proved himself to be a master of situations, and made himself a record worthy of copy by any; for which reason, if no other, the Conference was justified in its last session in assigning him pastor of the Bridgeville circuit, whence on Monday morning, at 2.45 A. M., December 26, 1927, God called him, and his spirit shook off the mortal body and went to answer the summons of its Maker.

Those of us who touched him in his life, both as student and minister, appreciated him, and saw beaming forth from his life the moral spirit and beauty of the much quoted stanza of Bryant's "Thanatopsis."

He preached two sermons on Christmas Sunday, and retired that night, only to answer to the call from beyond this life in the early hours of the approaching morning. His life was one well spent. The funeral services were held at the Trinity Church of the charge, under the supervision of the Rev. Dr. Woodley, district superintendent of the Wilmington

District, assisted by Prof. John Horner, principal of the Trinity school. These brethren could not have been any more attentive if the deceased had been their blood kin. We commit the care and keeping of the bereaved wife, Mrs. Mary E. Stewart, to the God of her husband, our God, the eternal God.

RESOLUTION ON MORGAN COLLEGE.

WHEREAS, The District Superintendents of the Delaware and Washington Conferences, in joint session December 27, 1927, recommended that the two Conferences assume a sufficient amount of any deficit which may appear by June 1, 1928 to make certain the gifts from the General Education (Rockefeller) Board and the State of Maryland totaling \$175,000.00; and

WHEREAS, To secure such loan the Conference must put itself on record authorizing the same; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Delaware Conference in session March 28-April 1st, 1928, do authorize the trustees of said Conference to borrow a sum not to exceed \$50,000.00 from any financial source or sources, where ever possible, and the trustees and District Superintendents are hereby authorized to endorse note or notes with other endorsers which may be required to make such loan; and be it further

RESOLVED, That said loan shall be secured for four (4) years and that the District Superintendents be empowered to make apportionment to the charges from year to year in sufficient amount and in sufficient manner to meet the condition of the note or notes.

And in order that the trustees and District Superintendents aforesaid shall have as simple a task as is possible we hereby recommend that one Sunday, at the discretion of each church, be chosen and thoroughly advertised as "Educational Day" and that on said Sunday the collections be devoted to the Morgan College Crusade and forwarded to the College not later than May 28th, 1928 and that the collections be reported as sums designated under the rule of World Service so that each charge will receive credit in due form for the collections made, and this cause shall be kept before the Conference with proper apportionments and report of collections from year to year; and be it further

RESOLVED, That a Conference Board of Education be organized with three (3) ministers and three (3) laymen from each district and that they be elected annually on the nomination of the cabinet.

RESOLUTION-LAYMEN'S ASSOCIATION.

Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:

(1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To

postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present, the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and, if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

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
