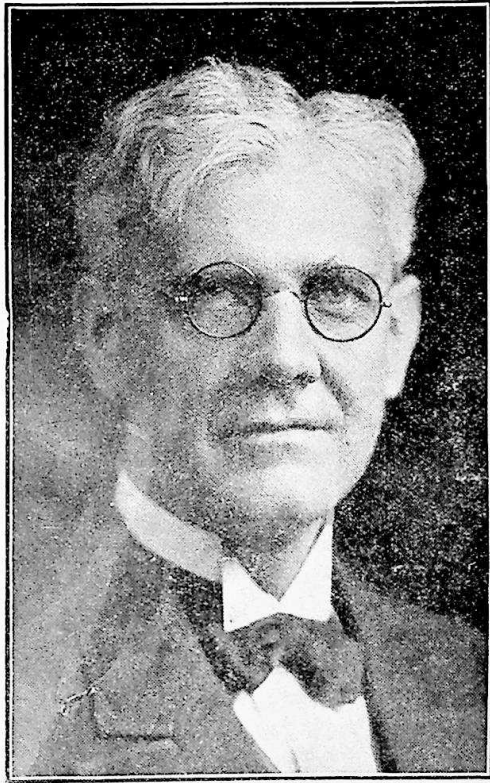
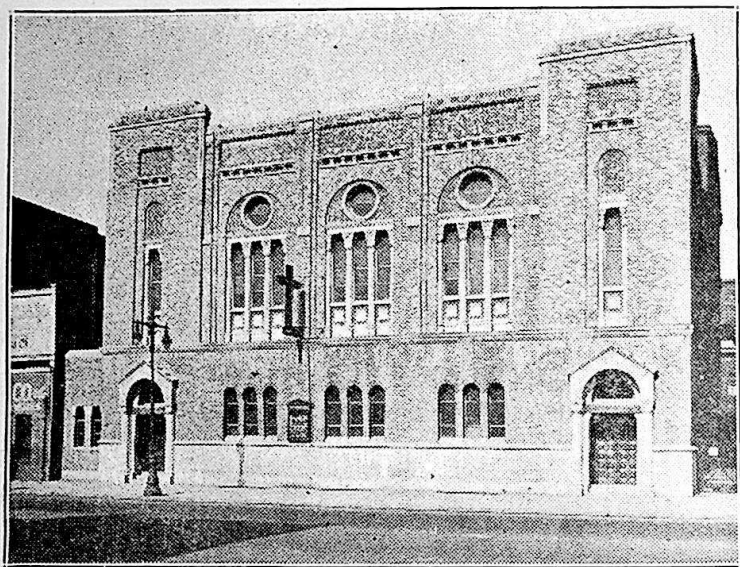

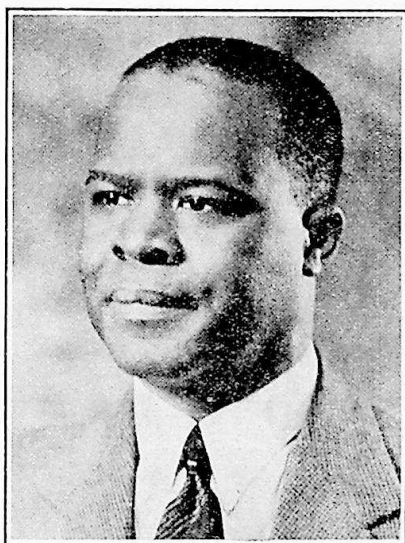

COMPOSITE REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS, READ BY REV. J. M. DICKERSON.

Dear Bishop, Fathers and Brethren:

With an exceedingly grateful heart to Almighty God and with sincere thanks to the brethren of this conference we submit this composite report of the District Superintendents.

The superintendents do not make this report with any feeling of exultation or self aggrandizement but with a feeling of self abnegation and abasement when we realize there is so little to report of what we have done when there was so much to be done.

Circumstances over which we had no control have contributed very largely toward our failure this year; yet there is a feeling that more could have been done if we had taken advantage of the opportunities which were ours in every phase of our responsibilities.

The first part of the conference year was remarkable for its opportunities and there can be no other way to truthfully explain the reason it was not done is because of our trifling away the time with non-essentials.

Economically and financially, in all sections of the conference the first eight months of the year were as propitious as any like period of time since 1929. We had been imprisoned so long by reasons of economic conditions we were like a bird being freed from its cage and literally flew to all parts of the country, both pastor and people and when the season was over we could only say "the summer is ended, the harvest is past and we are not saved." Many of us never enjoyed such prosperity and many of us who had forgotten the intervening period failed to provide for the recurring depression which came upon us without the intervention of man.

Many of the churches in the rural sections of the conference were closed for as long as five or six weeks at a time and indeed up to within two weeks of the convening of the conference, many of the roads are impassable.

Thank God for a sympathetic attitude on the part of many of the people towards the pastor. Many of the people as well as the pastors have suffered great deprivation and hardships. In order that their pastor might have the necessities of life many of the membership have trudged through the snow and slush carrying fuel, food and other supplies for the relief of the pastor and family. When it was impossible to use vehicular traffic of any kind they hitched their horses to logs and snaked them through the mud, snow, slush and over the ice to the pastor's door. Many would carry short wood in their arms and logs upon their shoulders to relieve the distress of their neighbor. Those who were fortunate enough to own woodland gave freely to relieve distress. Color lines and racial discriminations were set aside and we were all partners in distress. With voices raised exultingly, yet trembling with an uncontrollable emotion after having been in forced absence from the sanctuary and fellowship with one another we have sung—"What troubles have we seen? What conflicts have we passed! Fightings without and fears within; Since we assembled last. But out of all the Lord has brought us by his love and still He doth His help afford and hides our lives above.

We would not close this recital of our woes without mention of the kindly and beneficent political government who Almighty God directed to help us so much in our distress and enabled us to make a meagre contribution to the cause of righteousness.

Our Translated Friends.

Hardly had we become settled for the conference year, when as if to keep up the record of the last conference year when so many of our brethren went away, news comes of the passing of Brother C. W. Johnson, on July 1, 1935, at Mt. Holly, N. J. On Tuesday, August 14th, C. A. Norwood passed at his post of duty, Greenwood, Md. On Sunday, August 25th, James E. Waters passed to his reward from the Methodist Hospital, Philadelphia. On December 25th, J. F. Deshiell passed at Crumpton. On October 9th, E. F. Morris passed at the Easton Hospital. On March 26th, just six days before this conference convened Rev. W. J. Rogers died at Parsonsburg, Md. The following named wives and widows of ministers of the conference also passed to their reward. Mrs. Alvertha Marine Whittington, wife of J. J. Whittington and Mrs. Sarah J. Harmon, widow of the late J. H. Harmon. Suitable memoirs have been prepared for publication in the Conference Journal.

World Service.

In view of the relief furnished the above named churches which is made possible because of World Service and gives us a concrete instance of its service we find it to be a simple and uniform plan for a thorough going missionary, evangelistic and benevolent program of our church for bringing about a new and Christian world by conserving righteousness and bringing redemption to a woe stricken people.

This missionary project is vitally connected with christianity, although it has not always been thought so and is not thought so today by every professing Christian. The great commission of Jesus was "Go ye into all the world". The object was to build the kingdom of God in the hearts of men everywhere, without geographical, racial or sectional limitations.

John Wesley, after his heart warming experience at Aldersgate Street, declared "The world is my parish." The first conference in Baltimore, in spite of the impoverished condition of the church and the scarcity of funds decided to send missionaries to foreign fields. Thus from the beginning the church has been missionary in spirit seeking to establish the Kingdom of God throughout the earth and today there is certainly no less need for a great missionary passion.

This world so affected by war, prejudice and hate and isms surely needs the abundant life of Jesus and it is the duty of each Christian to accept their full share of making it possible. The question is no longer will they be saved, if we fail them but will we be saved if we fail them?

World Service meets not only missionary needs but it also carries on a program against intemperance, crime, social and political wrongs as well as provides pension funds for poor conferences and disabled supply pastors.

The missionary and educational enterprises in these nerve racking days strengthen the work of the Christian forces and prepares for new opportunities. It prevents the retirement of many missionaries, the closing of schools and curtailment of education. The work is not limited to people in far away places where Christ is not known but it helps us here at home as well. It saves our churches and stabilizes the Christian forces through designated gifts.

In spite of these facts the missionary program of the church at home and abroad has been greatly weakened all along the line and at some points has completely broken down because of lack of funds. This is a worthy Christian cause and should receive the support of every Christian. It is a cause that costs life's blood. It is the Saviour's way of loving service. It is the path that leads to salvation here and hereafter.

This missionary, evangelistic and benevolent undertaking of our church is so important and so far reaching that it makes its appeal to our hearts and challenges our best gifts for its largest support.

We are grateful for what has been accomplished and for the self sacrificing spirit with which the pastors and laymen have met this large task.

Religious Education.

There is apparently an increasing interest in this field of endeavor which has been greatly accentuated by having a Director of Religious Education in our conference in the person of Dr. E. H. Brewster, who is ever ready to respond to any call made upon him and whose effectiveness cannot be gainsaid. There have been Youth Conferences held on all of the districts and being held on Saturday, generally, were largely attended by the young people and especially those of High School age. The programs were of such an order as would appeal to youth and interest the more advanced in years. The group discussions disclosed much latent talent which was not suspected by a casual observer. A detailed account of this work will be made by the Director of Religious Education of the conference.

The old prophets were the heralds of the fundamental truth that religion and ethics are inseparable and that ethical conduct is the supreme and sufficient religious act. It is our great regret that the whole force of our religious impulse has not been turned in this direction.

We are also to remember that the prophets had in their thinking not only private morality but public morality as well, on which the national life is founded. Theocracy was the religious ideal of Israel and this meant the penetration of the individual and national life by religious morality.

These men believe in both personal and social righteousness. They considered the nation a gigantic personality and if he sinned as one man he ought to repent as one man and that God rules with righteousness in the affairs of men and only what is just shall endure.

In our present religious trend and our conception of a religious leader are we not coming back to a reevaluation of these men who had a vision of the broad reaches of civic affairs and international relations and the power of the transforming influence of religion to change them?

This does not discount the worth of the good individual but means that the togetherness of good individuals is to express itself in the social conscience of our economic, civic and national life. This is the challenge to our program of religious education. We are to achieve both individual and social righteousness.

Religious Education is now entering the area of its greatest opportunity. Its future will be larger and more splendid if there is a worthy response to this great adventure.

In order that we may more firmly grasp this opportunity we need to place a major emphasis upon leadership training, mindful of the cardinal points of leadership discovery, leadership dedication, leadership preparation and leadership realization.

Let it be remembered that our program for individual and social redemption is not a brief campaign. We may have ahead of us years of struggle, sacrifice and prayer but we are confident of victory and know that this cannot be obtained without our children and young people. At a recent conference of representatives of several church agencies the following statement was placed in the record and given to the press: "Churches are right in their emphasis when they insist upon an adequate program of Religious Education and bringing up their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Atheists in Russia turn to childhood and youth when they would destroy religion. We must turn to childhood and youth to make the world Christian."

Morgan College Institute.

The outstanding forward-step in our work of Religious Education has been the Morgan College Institute. The organization and continuance of this experiment in the highest Christian social living has been of the greatest value to the youth leadership of our Conference. In the past 15 years over 1500 of our best young people have had the benefit of the institute approach, contact, inspiration and instruction. This has led to leadership discovery and dedication to the follow-up work of preparation and realization.

Mid-Winter Institute

The district is the working unit of our program of Religious Education. In order to further relay our youth program to each local church, mid-winter institutes have been organized and conducted on each district. These also grow in numbers and interest. So well developed have they become that credits are now given from the Central Office as an incentive to attend the Morgan College Institute and complete the courses.

District Epworth League and Sunday School Conventions.

These gatherings grow in interest and enthusiasm. They are held in the early summer. The programs are carefully worked out upon the basis of some central theme of youth interest. Around these themes the programs are built including the devotional and worship periods.

Adult Training.

There is a growing conviction that satisfaction in the church's educational program awaits a religiously minded adulthood. No matter what stress we may place on child training, church schools, Vacation Bible Schools and the like, we find a retarding and undermining of this work because of the outside environment these children must return to. Here are a few reasons for this environment:

1. Non-attendance of parents and elders in adult classes of church schools and non-interest in the Home Department.
2. Non-attendance regularly at church preaching service.

3. Very low plane of religious ethics.
4. Inadequate religious home life.

The scope, responsibility and significance of our religious educational program is inclusive of every age-group of the church and community. To offset the lack of adult interest and cooperation we need:

1. To enlist and develop a full adult membership informed, alert and consciously responsible for the Christian education of childhood and youth.
2. To provide and foster a systematic and adequate program in Christian education for parenthood.
3. To prepare and organize the man-power and woman-power of the church as informed, alert, consecrated, and united workers with God in the redemption of distracted and painfully racked social and economic order.

Social Service.

A satisfactory economic, moral and spiritual adjustment in modern human society is a fundamental need. In proportion as these needs are satisfied, to this extent will society become efficient and ideal.

To provide food, shelter and clothing to people meets all human physical needs. People toil and labor not so much to satisfy their physical desires as an ultimate objective, but rather a means of laying a foundation for a more significant spiritual, moral and social satisfaction.

Building upon this foundation should be one of the main objectives to which our church should direct itself. This physical service does not end in merely feeding the hungry and administering to the sick, but, there is an inescapable corollary of supplying these needs by which our inherent social instincts shall be administered to. The church is therefore called upon to provide every means to satisfy and direct these natural, physical, moral and spiritual desires and sentiments.

The shorter working day, the steady growing complexities of our social order, the general economic cataclysm in which we live, the myriad industrial innovations in transportation, commerce and communication, bring with them new complexities and a need for new adjustments and adaptations. The church, therefore with its spiritual endowments is called upon as never before during its illustrious history, for practical application of its religious tenets in favor of dynamic social service which shall anchor the people to the stayable rock of happy and aggressive Christian citizenship.

The general social unrest, the growing spirit of radicalism, of skeptical thinking, of increasingly socialistic governmental tendencies, of materialism, of communistic attitudes and of inordinate and fanatic religious practices are revealed by the increase of exotic religious cults here in America, are convincing evidences of the need of a dynamic and aggressive social service program in our evangelical churches which shall keep the people on a sane and even keel.

What way then can the church more effectively render this needed social service work to the people? The church should become more and more the center of community activities with increased provision for the prosecution of its social aims. Already a few churches have realized this need and have provided community houses which afford both recreational and instruc-

tional programs, and are developing through this means needed social and moral leadership under the direction of trained leaders and aggressive pastors .

Community centers under the supervision of the church are quite possible and necessary in rural as well as urban centers. A regular organized social service program should be attempted in every church. In our rural communities this great responsibility has been sadly overlooked, possibly because of an indisposition to break away from the customs and traditions of the past. Therefore the young people not finding healthful social diversion are attracted to the insidious allurements of the urban centers thereby imposing upon these centers responsibilities which the rural communities themselves should assume. If our local churches can be made to feel this need, and are inspired by the deep sense of their social responsibility financial resources can be found for the operation of a program of social service. The heroic work of the small congregation of the Rev. John F. Herion of Adamsville, Ohio, the account of which is given in the January 1936 edition of the Pastor's Journal, should be an inspiration to every pastor and congregation in the land.

This mandatory program of social service work is but the object of the basic religious aims of the church-missionary evangelism.

He who feeds the hungry, visits the sick and comforts the disconsolate is only rendering that form of social service which was so much employed by Olr Lord and which has been the central thought in methodism from John Wesley to the present time.

The opportunity for that development and direction of personality by means of social contacts combined with a knowledge of human personal interests and Christian understanding are features in human development the responsibility for which the church cannot escape. Therefore let every church be that Mecca in the community to which the people can look for social enlightenment and direction and from which radiates the scintillating fervid glow of the spirit of the eternal—a body of Christian believers which stands as an invincible army to fight for the right and give succor to the needy.

There have been established in some communities work projects of the social security type sponsored by the Works Progress Administration and for which the churches have opened their doors, but it has been done in some instances by progressive pastors amid the opposition of the members who fail to see Christianity at work.

Evangelism.

Jesus said, "Go and make disciples of all the nations". Beginning at Jerusalem may mean in our home, in the homes of our friends or in our community at large. To be a Christian is to have the life and love of Christ in our hearts, and this is also a compassionate love for the souls of others. The love that brought Him to us is the love that sends us to seek others. He went about doing good and if He is in our hearts we can do nothing less.

To win converts is the normal function of the church and it dies when it ceases to do so. Jesus said "Follow Me and I will make you to become fishers of men so that you may live."

The general social unrest, the growing spirit of radicalism, of skeptical thinking, of increasingly socialistic governmental tendencies, of materialism, of communistic attitudes and of inordinate and fanatic religious practices are revealed by the increase of exotic religious cults here in America, are convincing evidences of the need of a dynamic and aggressive social service program in our evangelical churches which shall keep the people on a sane and even keel.

What way then can the church more effectively render this needed social service work to the people? The church should become more and more the center of community activities with increased provision for the prosecution of its social aims. Already a few churches have realized this need and have provided community houses which afford both recreational and instruc-

tional programs, and are developing through this means needed social and moral leadership under the direction of trained leaders and aggressive pastors .

Community centers under the supervision of the church are quite possible and necessary in rural as well as urban centers. A regular organized social service program should be attempted in every church. In our rural communities this great responsibility has been sadly overlooked, possibly because of an indisposition to break away from the customs and traditions of the past. Therefore the young people not finding healthful social diversion are attracted to the insidious allurements of the urban centers thereby imposing upon these centers responsibilities which the rural communities themselves should assume. If our local churches can be made to feel this need, and are inspired by the deep sense of their social responsibility financial resources can be found for the operation of a program of social service. The heroic work of the small congregation of the Rev. John F. Herion of Adamsville, Ohio, the account of which is given in the January 1936 edition of the Pastor's Journal, should be an inspiration to every pastor and congregation in the land.

This mandatory program of social service work is but the object of the basic religious aims of the church-missionary evangelism.

He who feeds the hungry, visits the sick and comforts the disconsolate is only rendering that form of social service which was so much employed by Our Lord and which has been the central thought in methodism from John Wesley to the present time.

The opportunity for that development and direction of personality by means of social contacts combined with a knowledge of human personal interests and Christian understanding are features in human development the responsibility for which the church cannot escape. Therefore let every church be that Mecca in the community to which the people can look for social enlightenment and direction and from which radiates the scintillating fervid glow of the spirit of the eternal—a body of Christian believers which stands as an invincible army to fight for the right and give succor to the needy.

There have been established in some communities work projects of the social security type sponsored by the Works Progress Administration and for which the churches have opened their doors, but it has been done in some instances by progressive pastors amid the opposition of the members who fail to see Christianity at work.

Evangelism.

Jesus said, "Go and make disciples of all the nations". Beginning at Jerusalem may mean in our home, in the homes of our friends or in our community at large. To be a Christian is to have the life and love of Christ in our hearts, and this is also a compassionate love for the souls of others. The love that brought Him to us is the love that sends us to seek others. He went about doing good and if He is in our hearts we can do nothing less.

To win converts is the normal function of the church and it dies when it ceases to do so. Jesus said "Follow Me and I will make you to become fishers of men so that you may live."

Whatever may be the program or activities of the church, it should always be to the end that men may be saved.

The proclamation of the gospel in life, word, and deed, accompanied by the Holy Spirit is God's appointed means of evangelizing the world. There are many agencies for bringing folks within the range of the gospel, but the gospel itself is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth.

Social and recreational activities, religious education and other forms of social service have their place in a program of evangelism, but these can never be an end in themselves. Many followed Jesus for the loaves and fishes, but some of them were finally caught by the word of life.

Real evangelism includes in itself all these relationships and attitudes which we commonly speak of as the new social order. It is the act of reconciling man to God and man to man; indeed to establish a brotherhood among men. It engages itself to bring in the long prayed for time when shall come the new heaven and a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness.

To this end we are called and sent and to this end we teach, and live, and serve, that the kingdom of God may come among men. Whatever else we may have done during the past year, or whatever we may do in the coming year, if souls are not saved and the kingdom of God more fully established our work is not done and our reports are not complete.

In many of the churches constant effort is put forth to win souls and to build up the life of the church, and all have done something to win converts and to increase the membership.

We pledge ourselves to carry out the program of the Commission on Evangelism, and pray that there shall come to our conference and to Methodism, as a whole, a great heart-warming.

Temperance.

Intemperance is still with us. Notwithstanding the scriptural injunction to be temperate in all things the things in which we are intemperate seem ever increasing. We are more intemperate in our social and industrial activities than ever before and the tendency seems toward seeking other fields to capture for intemperance so that there shall be no phase of human endeavor characterized by temperance.

Many of the temperate habits of the past are now classed as belonging to the realm of antiquity and obsoletism. It is no longer shameful for social events to be classed under the vernacular of intemperate language and many of the socially elite not only publish such events under their own names but their photographs as well and it is all a matter of fact.

There was some hope for temperance as long as there was a semblance of shame because of being intemperate; but since that emotion has become a thing of the past and every other experiment has failed it looks as though there will be more intemperance than temperance for a long time.

The phrase temperance or intemperance is generally interpreted as applying to the non-use or use of intoxicating liquors; since that is the more common application of the usage we shall not attempt to detract from it by emphasizing any other form of intemperance.

I wish it was possible to state even with the least sense of conviction that any headway has been made to change the temperance front or even that it is marking time. Though I do not believe that the repeal of the 18th Amendment to the Constitution destroyed every possibility of temperance or seated Alcohol as king eternal in our social realm, certainly it invaded the frontier of temperance and every inch gained in a contest gives the contestant so gaining added strength to hold what he has and use it as a foothold to gain still more, yet there is a possibility of reaching the limit of his powers. If the losing contestant does not surrender the tide will probably turn in his favor. The danger in the contest with temperance and intemperance lies in the fear that owing to the many sources of power wielded by the intemperate forces and so strongly entrenched and bulwarked by governmental agencies and influences that the temperance forces will begin to feel like grass hoppers and the intemperance forces will appear to be giants.

There is an old saying and it is as true as it is old that self preservation is the first law of nature. When the politicians and the administration tell us that unless we use the causes of intemperance for taxation in order that sufficient revenue be raised to feed us and clothe us and take care of our old and indigent fathers and mothers and we are willing that they should do it rather than pay the taxes, it does not take much argument to convince us that it is better than taxation.

When a reduction of taxes is suggested the majority of the tax payers welcome any substitute even at the cost of temperance in all things. The saloon, the bawdy house the destroyer of his own home—the debauchery of his own flesh and blood—the consignment of his posterity to perdition—the destruction of his country and the lowering of the vitality of the manhood and womanhood—let it come so it will reduce taxes. That seems to be the obsession of the world today. The voice of the proletariat is drowned by the cry of the capitalist for reduction of taxes so that he might further enjoy the fruits of intemperance.

The intemperance of pleasure has invaded the sacred domain of the church to the extent that the Sunday services are more disrupted by reason of the inordinate lust for pleasure as is manifested in the wanderlust of the members travelling far and near with the delusion that they are doing God and man a service by seeking other fields or places of worship when the fact is they are induced by a prospect of pleasure and become intoxicated thereby.

The busses will drive up to the church door and load up and depart for places at times covering a distance of two and three hundred miles the round trip.

There is no place immune from the intemperate habit of smoking either by the male or female sex. Even visitors to the sick in hospitals carry their cigarettes to the bedside of the patients both male and female. The patients in hospitals lie in bed and smoke and I fear very much that the church will be termed a foggy institution if the preacher is not permitted to puff a few clouds of smoke for the delectation of an exclusive audience, between firstly and secondly.

The evidences of intemperance are so apparent that it almost obscures temperance.

Yet there are a few who have not yet bowed the knee to Baal nor kissed his feet and let us pray that they are those who will lead us into the coveted land of temperance.

What do the masses and the law makers care about drunken driving of automobiles resulting in death, hell and the grave to even their own flesh and blood so their taxes are reduced.

Can a country be called Christian that subjects its population to such down right barbarism?

Deliverance from the evils of intemperance and the ushering in of temperance must be accompanied by the prayers of the faithful.

CHESTERTOWN led by W. H. Coffey, Jr. has greatly reduced the debt.

The cancelling of the floating debts here paves the way to the reduction of the mortgage. Church well organized and an increase in membership.

EASTON DISTRICT.

Dear Bishop, Fathers and Brethren:—

We are profoundly thankful to our Heavenly Father for all the blessings which he has vouchsafed unto us. His merciful goodness has brought us through the year, and by his grace we are permitted to make this our initial

report for the Easton District. We are deeply conscious of our great responsibilities and our insufficiency for the task of leading the Lord's workmen.

The detail work of the district with its financial obligations was left in such fine shape by my predecessor that we were in no way hampered in beginning where he left off. The esprit de corps was all one could wish, and we were received everywhere by laymen and pastors as a brother beloved; God's blessings be upon everyone of them.

The year has been one fraught with examples of finest Christian courage and heroism without murmur or complaint from any quarter. In the multitudinous complexities which we had to meet we have always felt sure of God's help and the sympathetic cooperation of the loyal pastors.

Of the many handicaps which we have had to face, the greatest were the torrential rains, and near floods which, for a while halted all our activities in some sections. Federalsburg bore the brunt; in some sections of this town the inmates of the homes were taken in boats from the second story windows as the whole lower part of the town was flooded, in some places the water was about fourteen feet deep. Motor boats plied up and down the main business street assisting the people to safety. That pastor Grant and his good people are able to make their present report is highly commendable.

The health of the district and of the parsonages has been fairly good, there has been no serious illness of the pastors or their wives. Rev. and Mrs. R. E. Hamilton and Rev. L. H. Martin have suffered cuts, bruises and shock from automobile accidents but they have completely recovered.

Early in October after two or three weeks illness in his home and in the Easton Hospital, the Rev. Elihu Francis Morris, an Accepted Supply, went to his coronation from the hospital. The funeral services were conducted by the district superintendent assisted by visiting superintendents and pastors; a suitable memoir has been prepared by the Rev. W. A. Harewood.

District Meetings.

The District Stewards' Meeting at Greensboro in May gave us a flattering start; nearly every pastor was present with his district Steward and many other laymen. The meeting was pregnant with sweet fellowship. The voluntary pledge of cooperation was spontaneous and unanimous. Pastor Ross had quietly provided every comfort, and made a fine host.

THE CHURCH SCHOOL AND EPWORTH LEAGUE CONVENTION at Asbury church in Easton where pastor Coulbourne had everything in fine shape to receive the flower of our youth, who in the month of June were present in large numbers. This convention was highly inspirational and religious, social; the play life also was encouraged to much benefit to us all. These activities seemed to centralize around the pleasing personality of our Director of Religious Education, Dr. E. H. Brewster, who seemed to be at home everywhere. It was a great convention.

THE EFFICIENCY CONFERENCE at Waugh church in Cambridge was a fine success; very few of the pastors were absent and a large congregation of the laymen filled the commodious auditorium; the spiritual and inspirational values cannot be estimated. Pastor Cheers and his fine committee made ideal hosts.

The Charges.

AIREYS is one of the largest and ablest charges on the district, but has not made adequate response to the ardent leadership and labors of the pastor. Many possibilities are latent here waiting realization. If this charge could see its way to cooperate, phenomenal results would be achieved. A great revival is sadly needed here. World Service \$10; Other Benevolences \$28; Other Causes \$251; Conversions 5; Accessions 20. A. W. McBride, pastor.

BARCLAY, a rural charge of three points has struggled hard to overcome the handicaps of a hard long winter and the scarcity of employment. The pastor has striven hard to maintain his former standards; the people love him and desire his return for the eighth year. He enjoys the respect of both races. World Service \$10; Other Benevolences \$10; Conversions 3; Accessions 3. W. H. Jefferson, pastor.

BECKWITH has done fairly well under the circumstances; bad roads have very seriously hindered church attendance. The pastor has quietly led his forces and achieved a degree of success. CAMBRIDGE is strategically situated with great latent possibilities which if utilized would result in incalculable benefits spiritually, morally and economically to the people. A large number of our people live here, many of whom are fairly well educated and capable of great use. The social proclivities seem to have a captivating influence which seems to rival the church in their activities and loyalty to their interests. The pastor, a Christian gentleman of lofty ideals has worked hard to achieve this year's report. The scarcity of employment and severely low wages has very seriously hindered the work; I think, however, this is a temporary condition and that Waugh will soon give a good account of herself. CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT under the leadership of a versatile pastor has wrought very well. The people seem willing to follow the lead of the pastor. Here the pastor conducted a very successful revival which had a very salutary effect upon the church. The pastor is a hard worker and seeks to carry out the church program. CARMICHAEL is an entirely rural charge and for sometime the roads were all but impassable which seriously hindered the work. Great sacrifices of the necessities of life were made by the pastor and his family. The Board of Home Missions and Church Extension Society came to the rescue of the church upon certain financial conditions which through privations were fully met with the assistance of the white citizens of the town led by the pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and thus the property was saved to Methodism. The pastor has won the confidence and respect of both races. He has visited every home in his parish with the program of the church. Hats off to brother Miles. A revival has greatly quickened the church. World Service \$15; Other Benevolences \$41; Other Causes \$786; Conversions 4; Accessions 3. C. B. Miles, pastor.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT under the genial and aggressive leadership of the pastor and his wife this charge has done a very commendable work. For a time the impassable condition of the roads prevented church attendance. World Service \$10; Other Benevolences \$32; Other Causes \$197; Conversions 7; Accessions 2. R. E. Hamilton, pastor.

CHAPEL has not done so well this year though the pastor has worked hard; impassable roads greatly hindered the work; the pastor has tried to maintain his former reputation. Early in the year the pastor took to himself a bride who at once won her way into the hearts of the people and has become quite an asset to the church. CHURCH CREEK has been affected like other charges in this section with bad roads and the scarcity of employment, and the pastor has the further handicap of an invalid wife and yet he has faithfully tried to carry on, and has done a commendable year's work. CHURCH HILL is another purely rural charge with many dirt roads which are impassable in bad weather, for many weeks church services could not be held. His car having worn out, the pastor has had to walk sometimes as much as fifteen or sixteen miles on Sunday and preach and yet he has faithfully kept at his task. GREENSBORO like most of the other charges has been sadly afflicted with bad weather and unemployment, many of the people have been out of work a large part of the year, and those who have had work received a miserably low wage. These conditions have crippled our church work. The pastor and his wife have worked incessantly and hard to make possible this year's report. The young people's work has been encouraged. In normal times this is a good charge and can accomplish much. World Service \$—; Other Benevolences \$59; Conversions 12; Accessions 16. W. N. Ross, pastor.

HURLOCK has been practically resurrected and is becoming a new Hurlock. The people are united and happy, they delight in following the pastor's lead, and think he is the best in the conference. Church Schools, Epworth Leagues, Junior Leagues and other young people's organizations are organized and working in a fine way. Church attendance has materially improved. This charge has had hard times and bad weather but they just would not fail, they send up a good report. Brother Thomas is a fine workman, and knows the church program. The fourth quarterly conference unanimously besought the superintendent to have the pastor returned for another year. STEVENSVILLE is the center of the oyster industry which this year was negligible in financial return for labor spent; for a large part of the winter the waters were frozen and all work ceased. ST. MICHAELS has taken on new life under the leadership of brother Johns who has wisely led his flock. TRAPPE has been happy all the year; the coming of the Rev. W. E. Large audiences come to hear the pastor preach; they think they have the only preacher. Much has been done for the young people, and many of them are being interested in the work of the church. PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT**Bishop and Brothers:**

Another year of service in the Master's kingdom has passed, and we have come with gratitude to Him in whose service we have labored to make this our second annual report. God be praised for the preservation of the lives of all the pastors and their families. Not one of the pastors has been seriously ill during the year. Some of their wives were not quite so fortunate. Mrs. J. N. Bullen, Mrs. J. E. A. Johns, and Mrs. R. A. McCarthy have been critically ill, but God has been gracious, and has spared them and each is improving.

We desire to thank the ministers, their families and their churches for their sacrificial service, their devotion to the cause, and for their fine cooperation in what we have attempted by way of leadership.

Despite the fact that this has been a short conference year, and the weather conditions unfavorable, the work has gone forward in a manner encouraging to us all. The motto of the district was, "No retrenchment at any point, whatever the conditions." The pastors, almost to a man, have kept this motto before them. This is a great district, and we have some fine workers on it, who have sought to make it greater. Many of their reports show advancement along all lines.

District Meeting.

The District Conference held in Brooklyn, N. Y. (Newman Church) was well attended and of great inspiration. The theme was, "Our Challenge". Dr. Channing A. Richardson discussed "The Great City Challenge". J. H. Scott, "Our Evangelistic Challenge". D. W. Henry, J. W. Thomas and W. A. Hubbard, "Our Stewardship Challenge." Dr. John R. Edwards of the Board of Foreign Missions spoke on "Our Challenge Abroad." The Devotions were led by J. N. Bullen, and the Communion sermon was preached by H. R. Coleman.

An Efficiency Conference was held on each end of the district. One at Mt. Zion church, Philadelphia, and the other in St. John's church, Newark, N. J. At these meetings our four point program was emphasized, viz; Evangelism, Religious Education, Social Service, and Church Finance. These topics were discussed by Dr. E. H. Brewster, F. J. Handy, W. C. Thompson and J. E. A. Johns. Dr. F. W. Mueller, of the Board of Home Missions spoke at both conferences.

Young Peoples' Activities.

The District Epworth League and Sunday School Convention met at St. Marks church, Montclair, N. J. The Mid-Winter Institute was held at Zoar church, Philadelphia. Many of us who attended these meetings were convinced that the young people do mean to help God to build a New World. They are by their works compelling us to take them more serious than we have done heretofore. They need our prayers and encouragement that they may be willing to pay the price that the making of a New World Order demands.

Bi-Weekly Preachers' Meeting.

The members of the district preachers' meeting, that they may the more successfully carry out the program of the district divided themselves into the following committees: Evangelism, Religious Education, Social Service and Church Finance. They are attempting to set up such a program in each local church. Heading the committees are J. N. Bullen, H. R. Coleman, D. W. Henry, E. H. Crampton, J. W. Jefferson, F. J. Handy, J. E. A. Johns and W. C. Thompson.

Local Church Organizations.

The Ladies Aid Societies have rung true to form, and at a time when they were most indispensable. Their response to the call of the churches was splendid. The reports made by them range from \$3.00 to \$968.00—

The Woman's Home Missionary and Foreign Missionary Societies are growing in interest and activity, but need much more encouragement both from women and men. I think their reports will show that they have not fallen back financially.

The clubs and auxiliaries of the churches are entitled to much praise for the financial successes in many of our charges. In some churches the wives of trustees and stewards have organized themselves into clubs and are assuming definite tasks. The Brotherhood chapters of the district do not succeed well. There are many things they could do for young men and boys of the church if they carried out their brotherhood program. We have great hope that they will ultimately succeed.

Up and Onward men—The church needs you in the tremendous task of Kingdom building.

Our splendid District and local Church School and Epworth League officers with their associates deserve great credit for their excellent work, and cooperation in carrying forward the district work; financially, educationally, socially and spiritually. To this group we are grateful.

Finance.

The response of the people to the appeal of the church; general and local, and to the community needs has been generous. Then we consider that many of them are still on relief, and that the few who are working are so poorly paid we must conclude that their giving indicates a generosity born of a real love for God and His cause.

Last, but greatest of all; the spirit of Evangelism has swept over sections of our district resulting in three hundred and eighty-eight conversions, and seven hundred and fourteen accessions.

BROOKLYN:—

JOHN WESLEY—T. H. Woodley, pastor for four years has increased World Service giving and other benevolences and added two members to the church. This is a difficult field, but brother Woodley has been able to carry on despite difficulties. The congregation needs a new church home in the midst of its constituency.

NEWMAN has forged ahead with E. H. Crampton serving his first year. The parsonage has been renovated and property debts reduced. An increase in World Service and benevolent giving. Conversions 22, Accessions 46. Had a Vacation Bible School.

BUTLER MEMORIAL—F. J. Handy, pastor for two years has renovated the church house at a cost of seventeen hundred dollars. The pastor and people are happy. Report arrived too late for publication.

ENGLEWOOD—D. M. Collins, pastor for one year. These people still suffer from unemployment. World Service and Benevolence increased and fourteen added to the church. The pastor did a good years work and deserves much credit.

HUDSON has been closed and the property will be sold.

JAMAICA, Brooks—R. A. McCarthy, pastor for five years, continues to be successful. World Service and other Benevolences, Seventy-five dollars. Accessions 2, Conversions 1. Vacation Bible School, enrolment 71.

JERSEY CITY—J. W. Thomas, pastor for two years. The property here was repurchased for five thousand, five hundred. The church raised \$500. and the Board of Home Missions loaned them the rest. World Service increased and nine persons added to the church. Had a Vacation Bible School.

MONTCLAIR—W. J. Helm, pastor for one year. Raised two hundred and fifty for World Service. Other Benevolence \$218.00 and forty persons were added to the church. They were the host of the Church School and Epworth League Convention; entertaining it in a most pleasing manner.

NEWARK—W. C. Thompson, pastor for one year. World Service increased. Forty-five conversions and seventy four persons added to the church. The Young People's work is growing in interest and attendance, pastor and people happy.

ORANGE—J. N. Bullen, pastor for one year has had a World Service increase and also an increase in other benevolences. Five persons were added to the church. The future looks bright for both pastor and people.

OSSINING and NEW ROCHELLE—E. W. Dean, pastor for two years. The main church (Ossining) installed a new organ and increased World Service. Report received too late for publication.

PHILADELPHIA:—

BETHSAIDA—D. R. Fletcher, pastor for one year. Increased world service and other benevolences. Three conversions and eight added to the church. The pastor and people have worked well together and both have a future.

CAMPBOR—M. W. CLARK, pastor for three years. Has increased world service and other benevolences. Twenty six persons were added to the church. The church building has been improved and needs more improvement.

EAST GERMANTOWN—J. T. Wallace, pastor for one year. World Service more than doubled and other benevolences quite full. A revival resulted in thirty six conversions and thirty two were added to the church. Pastor and people are beautifully united. Vacation Bible School.

FRANKFORD—R. G. Waters, pastor for four years. Thirty two dollars raised for World Service. Six accessions, three conversions. The pastor has striven hard to make the work succeed.

GERMANTOWN—J. E. A. Johns, pastor for seven years. World Service seven hundred and sixty dollars. Other benevolences three hundred and twenty five dollars. Conversions twenty-two, and twenty accessions. He has again reduced the main debt, and they would not let him go.

HAVEN—J. W. Jefferson, pastor for seven years. World Service doubled and other benevolences in full. Sixty-four conversions and ninety seven accessions. The new Community Hall justifies the cost in service to the youth. A good work here as elsewhere speaks for itself. A Vacation Bible School.

JOHN SIMMONS—A. L. Martin, pastor. World Service increased. Other Benevolences seventy dollars. Sixteen conversions and twenty added to the church. Two heaters installed and the church building is still being improved. This was A. L. Martin's third year of faithful service.

JOHN WESLEY—W. A. Hubbard, pastor for four years. World Service and other benevolences increased. Twenty one conversions. Fifty seven accessions. The church property has been improved and a Daily Vacation Bible School was conducted.

MT. ZION—H. R. Coleman, pastor for seven years. World Service increased fifty percent, and other benevolences quite full. The debt was reduced. Conversions seventy-one. Eighty new members added to the church. A Daily Vacation Bible School was conducted. A new church is needed to accommodate this growing congregation.

PENIEL—William Goldsborough, pastor for six years. World Service and other benevolences equal to last year. Thirty conversions and fifty five accessions. A new heater has been installed in the parsonage.

TINDLEY TEMPLE—D. W. Henry, pastor for two years. World Service \$1400. Other Benevolences \$70.00. A Daily Vacation Bible School was conducted. Forty two conversions. One hundred and seventy accessions, and the main debt reduced \$22,000. Attendance and enthusiasm increased.

ZOAR—L. H. McArthur, pastor for two years. World Service nine hundred and fifty dollars. Other benevolences one hundred and sixty seven dollars. Vacation Bible School conducted. Conversions forty five. Accessions seventy-five. The community program continues.

SPRING LAKE—D. R. Fletcher carried on a very successful summer work at this point and is asked to return.

TRENTON—L. S. Perry, pastor for one year. World Service and other benevolences increased. Conversions two. Accessions three. The need of these enthusiastic people is a better church building. Pastor was faithful.

WHITE PLAINS—H. T. Johnson, pastor for five years. They are planning to sell the old church and build a new one. World Service one hundred and fifty dollars. Other benevolences sixty two dollars. Conversions three. Twenty four added to the church. The young well organized.

In conclusion let me again thank God, who has preserved and prospered us through the year and has enabled the pastors and people to carry on in a spirit of cooperation far beyond our ability to describe. It is our hope and prayer that this spirit of fellowship shall continue through the coming year to the end that our next report shall show greater results for the Kingdom than this one.

SALISBURY DISTRICT.

Bishop and Brethren:

It is with exceeding joy and thanksgiving that I am permitted to submit this my fifth annual report of this district.

District Health.

Only a few of the brethren and their families escaped sickness during the year. We are thankful that there have been no fatalities in the families of the ministers. Mrs. J. L. Sawyer was confined to her bed and home for quite a period of time but is present at this session of the conference and believed to be fairly on the road to recovery.

Deaths.

Fate, if there be such a thing, was not so kind to the ministers. Three effective elders, Rev. C. A. Norwood, pastor at Greenwood; Rev. J. E. Waters, pastor at Fruitland and Rev. W. J. Rogers, at Parsonburg, all in Maryland passed to their reward during the year. Mrs. Sarah J. Harman, widow of the late Rev. J. H. Harmon, also passed to her reward from the residence of her daughter at Girdletree, Md.

District Activities.

The usual meetings were held during the year and acclaimed as the best ever held. The District Steward's meeting was held at Princess Anne and was very largely attended; the Epworth League and Church school convention was held at Union Asbury, Crisfield, Md., and conducted under a different worship service introduced by our worthy Director of Religious Education which proved to be highly edifying and constructive; the District Conference was held at Nanticoke, Md., and was very largely and enthusiastically attended. The Youth conference was held at Princess Anne Academy where ample accommodation for group discussion obtains and was attended by a very large number of people from all over the district.

Education Interests.

Aside from the High schools of which there are four, one in each county in Maryland and one in the Virginia county comprising the four counties in the Salisbury district we have a Junior College at Princess Anne, Md., under the presidency of Dr. T. H. Kiah, this conference, who has held that position together with the Principalship of Princess Anne Academy for 24 years consecutively, without the least vestige of complaint against his efficiency or moral status. It is true that there has been a falling away in the matter of attendance since the state of Maryland assumed control and changed its curriculum but there has been no let up in the moral restraint exercised formerly as a church school. Dr. Kiah is very jealous of the reputation of the school and has the whole hearted support of the Board of Education of the state and the co-operation of the entire faculty in maintaining its reputation. The facilities for enhancing its curriculum will be augmented from time to time and he has the assurance publicly uttered by the President of the Maryland University to do all within his power to make the school second to none of its class within the bounds of the state. And in order to assure him that there will be no reason for him to fear molestation in operation of the school he told him that his tenure was secure.

There is no need to fear that this institution will fall below the high standard which has characterized it either in training or character and its patrons need not fear the spectre of irreligion or anti-christian training as long as we have this stalwart exponent of christian principles as its head.

Since Princess Anne Academy, four years ago, took off the high school courses, it has carried only two years of college, freshman and sophomore. Other courses to be included in the four-year system are in the plan of reorganization, the publication of which has not been authorized. Committees have been appointed, and are at work on courses of study for strength, adaptability, and needs of the locality in which the school is situated. The new additions will include extended extra-curricular activities, physical education, and special attention to the study of ethics and the Bible as formerly.

Social and Industrial Conditions.

The social and industrial conditions of this district are about the same as in other rural districts in the conference, isolated from industrial centers. The marketing conditions of the crops were better than for the past several years and also the oyster industry for a while. The unprecedented cold weather made the latter part of that industry absolutely fruitless for the shuckers.

Several of the churches have opened their doors for community service under the W. P. A. or other governmental agencies which have proven a god send to the women particularly in that sewing units are conducted wherein all of the work including the clerical part of it is performed by the colored women. Some very fine work is turned out by these units and they are conducted in a business like manner.

Survey by Charges.

(For information concerning membership and finances in detail see Report of Statistician and Treasurer.)

COTTAGE GROVE—This charge fell somewhat from the heights it attained last year. The Westover church signally failed and while the industrial conditions and camp meeting seemed about as lucrative as last year for some unaccountable reason conditions seemed to be going away. This part of the work has been attached to Manokin and Cottage Grove united with Greenwood. World Service —, Conversions 2. T. N. Hodges, pastor.

CRISFIELD, SHILOH—There seems to be no diminution of affection between pastor and people of this charge and no falling away in its devotion to the church. For industrial activities this place is far ahead of any place on the district. This condition augmented by the loyalty of the people and the perseverance of the pastor and wife assures success. World Service \$100.00. Conversions 2. J. A. Kiah, pastor.

CRISFIELD, UNION ASBURY—The hammer of the auctioneer which was poised at last annual report descended upon this faithful little band October 5th and the property was sold for \$2500.00, which was providential as it made it possible for them through the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension who purchased it for them to still carry on. The Board holds the title to the building and parsonage which it will retain until a stated sum is paid by the church. World Service \$10.00, Conversions 2, Alexander Reid, pastor.

DAMES QUARTER—Charles P. Spencer, is the untiring and optimistic pastor of this heroic band of Methodist patriots. There was some unrest among them when their former pastor was moved but they soon regained their balance and are crying for the return of their pastor. World Service—, Conversions 1.

DEALS ISLAND—The pastor of this charge, living at a great distance from the church was unable to reach it for about 6 weeks this winter because of the weather and health. He and the people agree that it is better to have a resident pastor. World Service \$10.00.

FRUITLAND—This charge suffered the loss of their pastor in August. There was some difference of opinion as to the pastorate upon the demise of the pastor, some not desiring a pastor and a request was made to leave the pastorate vacant but it was thought that the charge was too important to leave it vacant and recommendations were made and approved for the appointment of W. R. Price, who was transferred from Liberia which has proven very acceptable and the charge is united and working very harmoniously. World Service \$10.00, Conversions 7.

GIRDLETREE—This charge continues to rejoice in the pastorate and preaching of C. L. Jones. World Service \$22.00.

FAIRMOUNT CIRCUIT—The re-union of Upper Hill and Fairmount under the present pastor, which seemed to be unpopular when it was effected has proven to be a very harmonious re-union. World Service \$22.00, N. W. Moore is the popular pastor.

FLOWER HILL—This is a minor appointment with a major pastor whose optimism is transcendent. If it takes zeal, energy and a will to excel the future of this charge is assured. Already its forces are becoming augmented and the pastor hopes to become recognized in the major appointments ere long. A. F. Winder, pastor.

GREENWOOD—This work has been in charge of a local deacon since about the first of September owing to the death of the pastor. Brother Johnson who supplied the work gave entire satisfaction and made some needed repairs at one of the churches. He made no charge for his services which was very sacrificial on his part. Owing to his age he is not eligible for appointment as an accepted supply pastor. G. W. Johnson, Acting Pastor.

HOPEWELL—This charge and pastor still remain on a friendly and co-operative basis. World Service \$27.00, Conversions 1. I. R. Elzey, pastor.

HORNTOWN—Because of not being acquainted one of the churches on this charge has not co-operated with the pastor as it should, thereby making a continuation of the situation of last year. World Service \$9.00, Conversions 14. S. D. Mallard is the pastor.

KELLER—This charge has become so inspired under the pastorate of a real active pastor that they increased his salary by \$200.00 and is banking money for the construction of a parsonage. World Service \$5.00, Conversions 22. Carson J. Williams, pastor.

KINGSTON—This charge has completely recovered from its set back of a year or so ago because of inability of pastor and people to understand each other and is marching on under the present pastor and wife. World Service \$21.00, Conversions 16. R. A. F. Graham is the pastor.

LEEMONT—This charge is coming into itself again and proved the old saying that all sickness does not necessarily end in death. The new pastor has entirely cemented the breach between the two churches and a good year's work has been accomplished. World Service \$30.00, Conversions 3. W. E. Stanley, pastor.

LIBERIA—The pastorate of this charge was disturbed by the death of J. E. Waters at Fruitland when W. R. Price was transferred from them to the latter place. J. S. Gerald a local preacher was appointed supply pastor and conducted the affairs of the charge till conference. A fire occurred at his home destroying all of his papers and barely escaping with his life. The charge makes a fairly good report. J. S. Gerald, pastor.

MANOKIN—This charge, under the pastorate of S. D. Holland, a supply has been fairly well taken care of in view of the handicaps it suffered by not having a resident pastor. Brother Holland could not move on the work because of regular employment nearer his home. S. D. Holland, pastor.

MARION—Early in the year this charge was made to rejoice when the missionary spirit of the Board of Home Missions intervened between them and the demoralizing debt which had dispirited them for a number of years. They are still rejoicing and under the guiding spirit of a very aggressive pastor who never ceases to remind them of their obligations to their benefactor they are marching on with colors streaming. World Service \$40.00, Conversions 3. T. W. Cooper, pastor.

MT. VERNON—A better report is due from this charge than it is making. It is no better because of certain grievances, which are more imaginary than real. It is hoped they will improve. World Service \$10.00, Conversions 1. J. S. Coard, pastor.

NANTICOKE—Foreclosure threatens this charge at every turn of the road yet it seems hard for this people to realize it. Indifference seems to characterize their attitude. This plant has been characterized as the most complete in its settings of any church in this section yet such a fact fails to inspire them. The district conference was delightfully entertained there last October and from the cheerful attitude of the people no one would ever suspect that they were under the shade of the hammer. M. C. Anderson, pastor.

ORIOLE—This charge is praying for relief in its obligations to the district, conference and General church. One of the churches does not seem inclined to assist in bearing the financial strain upon them nor the spiritual either. The Oriole church has to bear the burden of the finances of the charge and if it was not for that there would be no ministerial support or other claims supported regardless of the ability of the pastor in any phase of his ministerial qualifications. World Service \$13.00, Conversions 1, J. W. Elbert, pastor.

PARSONSBURG—This charge has suffered this year for lack of ministerial supervision owing to the illness of the pastor who died the week before the Annual Conference convened. The work was carried on by the local brethren and visiting ministers. The loyalty of two of the churches, viz: Curtis and Whaleyville, although much smaller in membership than the church at Parsonsburg, cannot be questioned. They stood by their sick pastor to the end and Curtis met all of their ministerial support. See reports of Statistician and Treasurer.

POCOMOKE CITY—This charge did not lose any ground in the change of pastors last year. It is one of the best organized charges on the district. In fact it leads in organization which accounts in a large measure for the success it enjoys. In addition to its conference collections this charge reports \$600.00 raised on old debts, \$197.00 for repairs on church and parsonage property and \$50.00 on parsonage. World Service \$161.00 and 40 Conversions. W. H. Mears, pastor.

PRINCESS ANNE—Pastor and people continue to enjoy the confidence of each other and reports another year of progress. A Leadership Training School was conducted at this point with Dr. Brewster the Director of Religious Education in the conference as instructor. Several charges took

advantage of the opportunity to send students to the same. While the district youth conference was held at the academy, the charge was actually the host of the conference and delightfully entertained the hundreds of young folks assembled there. World Service \$37.00, Conversions 7.

QUANTICO—This is the third year of undiminished prosperity which Brother Sterling has enjoyed on this charge and he seems as vigorous and zealous as he was the first. World Service \$35.00. M. P. Sterling, pastor.

SALISBURY, JOHN WESLEY—This church was the first to open its doors to community work thereby making it possible for thirty-five women to earn a living who would otherwise been on the dole. A sewing unit of the W. P. A. has been in progress in the Lecture Room of this church since November and so proficient has it proven itself to be that all doubt has been dispersed as to the intellectual ability of the racial group to do such work as making garments and bed clothing. The energetic pastor Elmer P. Gibson deserves much praise and commendation for the help he has been to the community in initiating such work among the people. The church has not lagged in its financial obligations and its spirituality has certainly been heightened. World Service \$60.00. Elmer P. Gibson, pastor.

SALISBURY, WHITE'S TEMPLE—This charge has had its ranks considerably decimated by reason of the death of several of its best workers and their places seem hard to fill. The pastor and wife have given their full measure of devotion to the church but there seems to be a minimum of appreciation. World Service \$25.00. Conversions 1. F. T. Johnson, pastor.

SNOW HILL—This charge continues to be a "Noble Experiment" with a very great possibility of its becoming a permanent station. World Service \$40.00, Conversions 35.

SNOW HILL CT.—There is but little hope that this charge will ever be other than it is and has been owing to its location. The congregations are really not able to support the charge and it is next to impossible to increase its efficiency. It has one of the most conscientious tireless pastors on the district but he cannot make folks and that is the prime need of the charge. R. J. Williams, pastor.

STOCKTON—This charge has hope as long as there is life. Only a few have a hope that reaches beyond this vale of tears if their attitude towards worship is any indication. It is very discouraging to pastor and wife who strive with all their might and main to bring things to pass. World Service \$5.00. J. R. Purnell, pastor.

STOCKTON CT.—The pastor and the people of this charge have spent a very harmonious year. The pastor lives at Bridgeville, Del., and the congregations live near Stockton and Snow Hill. However, they are together. World Service \$3.00, Conversions 4. E. H. Nichols, pastor.

UNIONVILLE—After a union of five years this congregation and the pastor decided unanimously to sever their union peacefully. This charge was sore afflicted upon the death of Brother A. W. Dix, who for many years was the District Steward and a decisive factor in the affairs of the church—not a boss—but one whose personality dominated for good. Brother Pitts is a thorough going dutiful and painstaking pastor and enjoys the respect of the entire charge and they have responded very cheerfully to his leadership. World Service \$6.00, Conversions 2.

WETIPQUIN—This pastor and people continue in their amicable relationships. A new roof has been put on the home church and the old ramshackle parsonage has been replaced by a bungalow and all of the mechanical work performed by the pastor at a great sacrifice of his time and leisure. The program of the church has received due attention and a daily Vacation Bible School was conducted by the help of intelligent and efficient workers, although the seasonal employment of that section exacted much of their time. Many pastors similarly located would not have attempted the work. See Reports for achievements. A. L. Black, pastor.

WACHAPREAGUE—The work on this charge has maintained its reputation of former years. Last year it was Grace church who earned the palm but this year it is divided but the net results are about the same, with an increase in World service giving of about 75%. World Service \$22.00, Conversions 10. Jose Angulo, pastor.

WATTSVILLE—A return to normalcy of this charge was predicted last year but there seems to have been a re-action, due probably to the enfeebled condition of the pastor's health. A change of climate would probably be beneficial for him and an effort will be made to consummate that end. World Service \$5.00, Conversions 24.

WHITE HAVEN—The change of pastors at this point last year was one of the outstanding acts of the conference both as relates to the pastor and people. The reports will show a marvelous turn in the affairs of this charge both spiritually and financially. There seems to be no strife between the pastor and people and the cry is that brotherly love prevails. World Service \$11.00, Conversions 33.

WITHAMS—The gospel trumpet as sounded by this pastor continues to awaken the drowsy senses of the people of this charge and they are responding to its mandates with unabated alacrity. There is perfect accord in the charge and both pastor and people enjoy the confidence and respect to each other as should characterize the relationships between pastor and people. World Service \$10.00, Conversions 40. J. O. Griffin is the popular pastor.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT.

We are grateful to Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, for the privilege of making this our first recount of the labors and successes of the brethren of the Wilmington District. Despite the short year of eleven months and the severe winter, through earnest and persistent effort the brethren have wrought well. Many have maintained the high levels of last year while others have carried the banner to even higher heights.

Translation.

The Rev. Cabel W. Johnson was translated July 1, 1935. "He fought the good fight of faith and went to be with his God."

Sickness invaded other parsonages of the District but without any serious results.

Changes in Appointment.

Two pastoral adjustments were made during the year. J. A. T. Foust was assigned to Mt. Holly, N. J., and J. J. Whittington, an accepted supply, to Quinton and Springtown.

Meetings.

The work on the district received great impetus through official meetings. Our first,—The District Stewards', met at St. Daniels, Chester, Pa., with the Rev. L. S. Moore and his good people as genial hosts. Here the pastors and laymen of the district gave us a hearty welcome and promised their loyal cooperation in all things furthering the cause of their Master and ours. The advance program for the district was presented, especially emphasizing the larger district idea, including the need for greater support of World Service, payment in full of all conference claims and apportionments, promotion of Evangelism and increased church membership, and the nurture and encouragement of the Youth of the church.

These ideas were carried out in all subsequent district meetings. The Annual District Conference held at Newport, Delaware, October 8-10, 1935 and the Annual District Efficiency Conference held at Mt. Joy, Wilmington, were well attended and were occasions of great inspiration. The Church School and Epworth League Convention held at John Wesley, Bridgeton, N. J., July 1, 2 and 3, and the Young People's Rally Day assembled at Lawnside, N. J., October 26, 1935 were exceedingly valuable gatherings—models of social activity and spiritual uplift for all. Daily Vacation Bible Schools show a marked growth both in success and favor.

Admirable work has also been done by the Ladies' Aid Societies, The Woman's Home and Woman's Foreign Missionary Societies, Brotherhoods and other kindred organizations.

A very effective piece of work has been carried forward through Religious Educational Training classes and one day Conferences under the direction of Dr. E. H. Brewster who not only introduced new text books but strengthened his faculty with competent instructors. These classes and Conferences for Religious Education were held at John Wesley, Bridgeton, N. J.; Ezion, Wilmington, Del.; St. Daniel's, Chester, Pa.; and Asbury, Merchantville, N. J.

The district is divided into six groups for intensive cultivation and stimulation towards reaching goals set forth in the forward program.

The pastor is conscientiously facing the difficulties and honestly solving the problems which are incident to a great church. Conversions 32; accessions 18.

ATLANTIC CITY, HAMILTON MEMORIAL is happily and successfully advancing under the consecrated leadership of pastor H. A. Balley. It seems to know no defeat if self sacrifice will bring victory. Ministerial support \$798; World Service \$20; other Benevolences \$22; repairs and old indebtedness \$124. Conversions 8; Accessions 19.

BRIDGETON—Under the direction of the energetic pastor is successfully carrying on in a unique way. The young people are well organized and are doing a very effective piece of work interracially as well as in their own church. The Consumers' Cooperative Association has established a

cooperative store and members of this church are among the officers and clerks. Conversions 3; Accessions 8; Ministerial support \$1060; World Service \$50; other Benevolences \$107; Paid on repairs \$259.

BURLINGTON reports for ministerial support \$532; World Service \$8.00; other collections taken. B. A. Arnold, pastor.

BUTTONWOOD and CHRISTIANA—This charge is responding beautifully to the painstaking leadership of the pastor C. E. Kincade. They report Accessions 4; Ministerial Support \$555; World Service and other Benevolences \$23.

CAMDEN—D. S. Quillen is completing his sixth year at this charge. Ministerial Support \$1013; World Service \$11; other Benevolences \$32. Paid on old indebtedness \$345. Conversions 19; Accessions 25. A Daily Vacation Bible School was conducted on this charge with an enrollment of 80 pupils.

CAPE MAY and SWAINTOWN—This charge has done splendid work under the conscientious leadership of W. G. Matthews. Conversions 17; Accessions 23; Ministerial Support \$1058; World Service \$30; other Benevolences \$28. Other purposes \$300.

GRACE and DARBY—C. S. Sprigg has worked untiringly in this field to advance the interests of the kingdom and reports the following: Conversions 2; Accessions 6; Ministerial Support \$485; World Service \$27. Raised for other purposes \$575. This church conducted a Daily Vacation Bible School with an enrollment of 300; average attendance of 250.

DELAIR—F. O. T. Laws was very cordially received and pastor and people have enjoyed a successful year's work. Ministerial support \$1120; World Service \$34; other Benevolences \$75. Paid for repairs and old debts \$443. Daily Vacation Bible School enrollment 109.

DELAWARE CITY and KIRKWOOD—This charge is happy under the pastoral guidance of S. G. Fullman, their faithful pastor. They report: Conversions 3; Accessions 4; Ministerial Support \$718; World Service \$21; other Benevolences \$26. Paid on old debts and repairs \$130. Daily Vacation Bible School enrollment 70; average attendance 55.

ELKTON—This charge is gradually moving forward under the direction of O'Connell Milbourne and he rejoices in his opportunity to serve. In February Portia came to the parsonage and both parents are proud of the new baby girl. Reports are as follows: Conversions 4; Accessions 4; Ministerial Support \$658; World Service \$10; other Benevolences \$8. Paid on repairs and old debts \$340.

FORDSVILLE—J. H. BLACKISTON is completing his tenth year as a successful leader of these people. He has not only retained his previous good record but in some instances has gone beyond it. He reports: Conversions 4; Accessions 8; Ministerial Support \$950; World Service \$80; other Benevolences \$39. Raised for other purposes \$465.

GRENLOCH, RHODES and BERLIN reports as follows: Ministerial support \$486. Other collections taken. E. M. Neals, pastor.

LAWNSIDE—S. M. Emptage was appointed here at the last session of the Annual Conference. He took up the work with enthusiasm and has labored hard to put over the program of the church. In November the 130th Anniversary of the church was fittingly celebrated with many interesting and novel features. The offering netted \$1250. She reports all claims in full. Received for all purposes \$10,088. Daily Vacation Bible School enrollment 398; average attendance 350.

HAVEN is gradually moving forward under the wise leadership of W. A. Mulley. They felt keenly the death of J. H. Bird, who was an outstanding layman, but in spite of all handicaps they present the following report: Conversions 7; Accessions 12; Ministerial Support \$932; World Service \$38; other Benevolences \$36; other causes \$408.

MT. CARMEL is one of the smaller appointments but is doing well under W. W. Hoy. They are making a heroic effort to meet their obligation to the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension. Conversions 19; Accessions 20; Ministerial Support \$581; World Service \$4; other collections \$185.

Hargis, the untiring labors of pastors and laymen, the generous hospitality extended us in the churches and parsonages, and the Divine leadership of our Heavenly Father, that have combined to make this report possible.

REPORT OF WORLD SERVICE COMMISSION.

The World Service Commission begs to submit the following report:

WHEREAS, if the Home Mission agencies were suddenly to discontinue this work, millions of boys and girls now being reached by Christian Education would grow up entirely outside of the church in ignorance of the most simple Biblical truths and stories, untaught in the principles of Christian ethics. Many churches would close their doors and be up for sale. What would be true in America would also be true in foreign fields, if the work of our Foreign Mission Board were to cease for the lack of support.

We would not be true to the program and spirit of John Wesley, who realized that the world was his parish. We would be untrue to the spirit of our master, who gave Himself to save the world. In face of this compelling challenge, it is imperative that we as members of the Delaware Conference should be willing to shoulder our responsibility in this world-wide program.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, in order that we may carry our share of responsibility for the educational and connectional work of the church, that we assume as our goal twenty-one thousand four hundred and sixty-seven dollars (\$21,467.00) as our goal for the ensuing year, and that the amount be apportioned to charges to be raised monthly, and be sent to the World Service office.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The changes have been so very swift and radical within the last few years that one can scarcely make intelligent observations of such panoramic views as now pass before us.

Economic and industrial conditions and the present methods of caring for the poorest among us have a tendency to increase the shiftless classes and at the same time make it more and more difficult for the church to carry on financially in a satisfactory manner.

The social and industrial conditions as affected by the laboring classes and capitalists furnish the church of to-day a challenge she has not yet met. These upheavals are creating a bitterness and a communistic spirit that tends to threaten the very foundations of our good government. We believe, however, that there is yet "balm in Gilead."

The feelings of race prejudice and nationalism are taking on new forms which the Christian Church is endeavoring to define and properly adjust by setting up certain religious units among the nations and the race groups. We might well say that the whole world is seriously ill, but it can be cured. The Methodist Episcopal Church is endeavoring to share with other churches and Christian agencies the responsibility in making a new and better world to live in.

We, the members of the Delaware Conference, are resolved to commit ourselves and our all unreservedly and joyfully to our total task and will not quit till the kingdoms of this world become the Kingdom of our Lord and of His Christ.

REPORT OF SOCIAL SERVICE COMMITTEE.

"Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people," so says the Holy Scripture. If, somehow, present-day society could really believe this, its welfare would be guarded with all diligence, and those influences that work havoc with the people of our land, would be restrained.

Your committee desires to remind you of the fact that in this modern world, infidelity is rampant; and where this condition obtains, maladjustments in human society will be prevalent.

We recommend that our Churches sound a note of certainty as regards the fundamental doctrines of our Christian Faith, and do all they can to help the people to recapture the sense of God's reality.

We deplore the gambling craze abroad in the land; for we are well aware that it undermines moral character, and develops a mental attitude favorable to getting a livelihood in the easiest way possible. Local authorities should be called upon to suppress places where it is carried on. We regret also, that in some quarters it has been suggested that number playing be legalized.

We urge our Christian groups to warn our people not to fall into this sin.

The Churches preach the Fatherhood of God and the Brotherhood of man. We therefore call upon them to do their utmost to bring about a practical application of this doctrine.

Especially do we direct attention to Lincoln Sunday; asking our Churches to hold inter-racial meetings in the several Communities for the purpose of bringing about a better understanding of the race problem.

We regret the misleading advertisements in some of our daily papers, and on bill-boards, and on placards in busses and trolley-cars directing the minds of the people to cigarettes and strong drink in such a way as to suggest that their usage is quite beneficial. We trust that those who are interested in human welfare will counteract this publicity by such educational methods they can press into service.

We regret that treaties are no longer binding among some of the nations of the world, and so they are building mighty armaments at tremendous cost.

We commend all efforts looking toward the reduction of armaments and call upon the Christian people everywhere to pray that the nations of the world will learn the utter futility of war and outlaw it as an instrument of national policy.

In conclusion, we wish to call attention to the fundamental unit of human society, namely, the family; and suggest that the parents do their part to hold high ideals before the members of their families so they can contribute toward the development and enrichment of the religious, educational, political, and social life of our nation and thereby hasten a better environment in which people may live.

REPORT OF PRINCESS ANNE SCHOOL MINISTERIAL TRAINING.

The Princess Anne School of Ministerial Training has realized very definite results during the past quadrenium; these have centered around its work for The Accepted Supply Pastors, The Under Graduate and Graduate Students.

The attendance of The Accepted Supplies has increased 100%; the ages of whom range from 45 years to 60 years, no more earnest and conscientious group is to be found among us in their devotion to their studies and their search for ideals.

All the young men in the Courses of Study have met the Disciplinary requirement of Scholarship and about 75% have had both College and Seminary training; to these have come a new meaning of life and a deeper consecration. A Graduate Seminar has also been established, 80% of whom are of College and Seminary grade; these also have realized the need of renewed and continuous study, in order not only for mere knowledge sake, but that they may more efficiently give themselves in the light of their new knowledge.

Many of these men come from exceedingly poor charges in which too often they have the bare necessities of life, but these they count a spiritual luxury, for in them they seem to find not only the real point of contact with those to whom they administer, but even more important the spirit of Christ; and in whose sacrifices and sufferings they share and find their greatest joy and reward.

None the less commendable has been the comradeship and service of the instructors and special lecturers; these Godly men have in a most beautiful way silently imparted a spiritual power not to be estimated in terms of figures and graphs but in the deepening and enrichment of the lives of the Students who have found the highest meaning of life in serving others.

The School is greatly indebted to the Commission for making this work possible and especially for the love and devotion to this cause of its Educational Director, Dr. Allan MacRossie.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION OF DELAWARE
ANNUAL CONFERENCE 1936.**

Significant advances have been made this year in regard to our Conference activities in the field of religious education. We are more certain with each passing year that our churches are being energized by training a new and better leadership, creating an appreciation for religious values, and fostering fellowship with both God and our Fellows. The limitation of our current budget prohibited the carrying out of some of the projects planned last summer.

Items of Interest.

There is time to mention only a few items of interest.

1. Rally Day

The early reports following Rally Day were rather discouraging. In December, however, several of our churches sent in their Rally Day offering and others took a special collection for the Rally Day fund. The total received to date is \$557.28. This offering is vital to our Conference program. While we note with gratitude a decided increase in this offering over that of last year, yet it is hoped sufficient additional Rally Day money is being reported at this Conference to realize the goal of \$1000. Summer Camps for children and Young People, special summer Sunday Schools will be established this summer, providing the \$1000. goal is reached.

2. Meetings

Two regular meetings of the Board are held during the year. One in Dover shortly after the Annual Conference. At this meeting activities for the summer are carefully worked out. Reports of leadership training schools are presented. The next meeting will be held at Dover, Delaware, Wednesday, June 3. The Annual meeting is held in January at Wilmington.

3. District Youth Conferences

One of the outstanding features of the work this year has been the Youth Conferences. On four of the districts a Youth Conference was held bringing together our young people irrespective of organizations. Program of discussions, worship, inspiration and fellowship characterized each Conference. We recommend heartily the continuance of this work.

4. The Work of Morgan College

A serious attempt is being made to maintain Morgan College under the auspices of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The President, Dr. J. C. Spencer and the Dean, John W. Haywood have devoted their energies during the years to reorganization of the curricula and courses. Buildings and equipment have been provided as the needs demanded and funds permitted.

From the President's office comes this statement regarding financial support from July 1, 1934 to June 30, 1935.

We should be keenly alive to the necessity of more financial support for Morgan College on the part of the church. The figures set forth in this report show the small sum being given for the support of the College on the part of the church.

Recommendations.

1. The educational administration of the work of the Board is under the supervision of Dr. E. H. Brewster. The Delaware Conference is indeed fortunate to have the same competent leadership in this vital work as the Philadelphia and Wyoming Conferences. We have the fullest confidence in Dr. Brewster and highly endorse his work. We, therefore, respectfully ask Bishop Richardson to appoint Dr. Brewster for another year as our Director of Religious Education.

2. We recommend a large use of the "First Series of Courses of study for Leaders." These new courses are simple and non-technical, planned to reach the masses of church workers. Many of our religious workers have never had any systematic education for leadership. Neither have they been led to feel the need of any. Any one 16 years or more will find these courses stimulating and helpful in preparing for the service the church expects of you.

3. The National Methodist Youth Conference will meet again from September 3-7 at Evanston, Illinois. The 5 young people who attended two years ago received such great benefit that we believe our youth should be represented this coming September. We recommend that each district plan to send at least one delegate. It would be very desirable if this could be increased to two so that a total delegation of ten might represent us at Evanston.

4. Dyer Blair says "The best personality develops in situations where one can do creative things, can direct one's own efforts effectively and is encouraged to develop originality." The program of Christian education is rich in opportunities for creative experience. Our young people are encouraged to plan and conduct worship services and other meetings. And as a result of our teaching we expect our youth to take the initiative in building certain programs of Christian work and to maintain the Christian attitude in all matters pertaining to human relationships. We recommend to pastors, teachers, and other leaders the wisdom of this procedure.

**REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION
TO THE ANNUAL DELAWARE CONFERENCE, APRIL 3, 1936.**

Dear Friends and Brethren:

The period since last April has been a busy one. It was my privilege to attend all five of the District meetings for the Sunday School and Epworth League. These were held at Crisfield, Smyrna, Easton, Montclair and Bridgeton, N. J. It was a grateful experience to meet young people, pastors, and older lay people in these conventions. The meetings were largely of an inspirational nature. It would be splendid if more training content could be put into them.

From June 13 to 15 a most constructive Institute on Church Vacation School work was held at Princess Anne. Under Brother Hughes' leadership about thirty were brought together in a most happy way for three days. The visitors brought lunches and the local Church furnished cooling drinks. (It was very warm weather.) On Sunday, the closing day, we had very interesting commencement exercises. The Institute was creative in its method. We met and built courses for the Vacation School. The course built for Juniors, entitled, "The Trial of Happiness" has been mimeographed and used in quite a number of Vacation Schools in several Conferences. This type of institute develops those participating. It is amazing how much leadership capacity is to be found in the people of our Churches.

Morgan College Institute again proved most valuable. Our Delaware Conference delegation was not as large as we had hoped. We should seek to remedy this that more of our young people may have the advantage of a week of Institute life. The work of the Institute was upon a high level, and the character and spirit of the students could not be excelled.

In the Fall, attention was given to the work of training. Group schools were held in Wilmington, Bridgeton, Newark, and Brooklyn. A brief one day institute was held at Merchantville. A School was held at Zoar Church, Philadelphia, enrolling 60 students.

Training Classes have been conducted by Pastors in different parts of the Conference. Those enrolling in the group schools numbered 290; number receiving credit, 259.

I attended three of the five District Conferences in the fall, namely, at Denton, Dover and Brooklyn. These, I felt, were very profitable.

A feature of our work this year has been the development of District Youth Conferences. They were held at Bridgeville, Delaware; East New Market, Princess Anne, and at St. Daniel's Church, Chester. These meetings were characterized by a predominate attendance of youth, fruitful discussion of significant problems; worship services, guided recreation, and a fellowship banquet. There was a definite registration, the cost being kept to a minimum. We believe there is a bright future for these gatherings of our youth.

It has been a real joy to be present at Sunday preaching services in some of the Churches. I have served the following Churches in this way, namely, Mt. Zion, Philadelphia; Haven, Philadelphia; White Temple, Salisbury; Princess Anne; North Berlin; South Berlin; Newark; Mont Clair

and Dover, Delaware. These visits are always the occasion of friendly contact—and are made with little or no expense to the Churches. My only regret is that there are not more Sundays in the year.

The Rally Day giving of the Conference was somewhat slow at first this year but has been gathering momentum. To date, \$557.28 has been received. By districts this is—Philadelphia, \$264.28; Easton, \$15.00; Wilmington, \$192.00; Dover, \$56.00; Salisbury, \$20.00. In addition \$50.00 has been received through special designation. The Director's expense in travel for this Conference year to date has been \$145.00.

I wish to express my appreciation to those Churches, such as, St. John's, Newark; John Wesley, Salisbury; Janes Memorial, Tindley Temple, Haven and Zoar, to name only a few, for the thought given to this offering.

Recommendations.

1. A Conference wide effort to introduce the First Series Training Course into every Delaware Conference Church. By District meetings of pastors and others to learn of this type of Training, this objective could be reached.
2. A further development of interracial experience especially for our young people. We can never be wrong in doing what is right. We are in harmony with the leading of Christ's spirit in doing this.

"The right is right
Since God is God
And right the day must win
To doubt would be disloyalty
And to falter would be sin."

3. The continuation of District Youth Conferences. I believe these hold great possibilities.
4. An annual Youth Conference at the time of the annual Conference as for the past two years.
5. The development of a budget for service, that is, an amount sufficient to carry forward projects such as bringing together pastors and others to a coaching conference on the First Series Courses.
6. Semi-annual meetings of the Conference Board for purposes of review, study and inspiration.

I wish to thank the District Superintendents for their most loyal support, the pastors and lay people of the Conference likewise. May the blessing of God rest upon all our efforts.

**THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MANAGER OF THE
EPWORTH LEAGUE YOUNG PEOPLE AND CHURCH SCHOOL
INSTITUTE OF THE WASHINGTON AND DELAWARE
CONFERENCES HELD AT MORGAN COLLEGE,
AUGUST 12-19, 1935.**

The Church like the race moves forward on the feet of the youth. This truth impresses itself upon organized christianity today as never before and provokes the church to create a program of training comparable to give wise direction to these awakened consciousness of these young and active minds.

Co-operating with our own church, in its wise leadership in the field of Leadership training and the opportunities for inspiration and fellowship, the Washington and Delaware Conferences have carried for the past fifteen years this Christian Educational Program at Morgan College.

Last Summer's Institute was outstanding from several view points, first in the calibre of students attending. A more serious and spiritual minded group of young people was never assembled to study a Christian Educational program. These elements brought out the best in a very capable faculty.

Second, there was evidenced a deeper appreciation of the value of the work done by the support from the patronizing districts in the two conferences, five hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$525.00) were reported from the charges through the District Superintendents.

Third, Talent Night revealed a remarkable diversity of cultural ability among the students.

Fourth, The Commission showed themselves more ready and determined to promote this work than ever evidenced by their presence and concern.

Fifth, the deficit was reduced from \$474.12 (four hundred seventy-four dollars and twelve cents) to two hundred and fifteen dollars and twelve cents (\$215.12).

Sixth, thirty one churches were represented in the student body. These achievements point to greater success for the 1936 Institute. We acknowledge with grateful appreciation all the agencies which aided in contributing these results and pledge ourselves to carry on to the consummation of an adequate prepared leadership and a more effective program of Christian Education in the local church.

HOME FOR THE AGED.

We, your committee, on the Home for the Aged come before this seventy-third session of the Delaware Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church now assembled with recommendations concerning the home located at Lawnside, New Jersey.

The committee has considered once more very carefully and sacredly the Lawnside Home, its possibilities, its present physical condition and adequacy for comfortable occupancy by those who would desire a home in their declining years. The committee has checked up on the tangible action taken by the conference by the proper committee invested with the authority to perform the request and wishes of the conference concerning the improvements and upkeep of the home.

The committee recommended last year, with your endorsement, First, that the superintendents of each district apportion certain sums to each charge for the maintenance of this home, and urge the raising of the same.

Second, that necessary repairs be made to the home that the home might be made more attractive for the comfort and care of those who may become inmates.

Our third recommendation was that repairs be made by whatever funds the trustees might have available, and that out of said funds the present matron, Mrs. Lulu Wilson, be compensated for her sacrificial service rendered as a care-taker.

We, your committee, find so far as we have been able to ascertain, both by investigation and inquiry, that not one of the three recommendations has been accomplished. And since we feel that the severe winter conditions have in a large measure handicapped the majority of charges in bringing up their full apportionment for the home, we come with but one recommendation, or alternative:

THAT THE CONFERENCE EITHER TAKE DEFINITE STEPS TO REPAIR THE PROPERTY FOR COMFORTABLE USE, OR DISPOSE OF THE PROPERTY TO SOME REPUTABLE PERSON OR PERSONS, AND FREE THE CONFERENCE FROM FURTHER EMBARRASSMENT CONCERNING ITS UPKEEP.

We are much concerned about the desecration of the Sabbath by the attendance of large crowds at Sunday baseball games. This has a tendency to decrease the attendance at Church and lessen the interest of the Youth in the young people's organizations. In view of this fact,

BE IT RESOLVED that we endeavor to present an attractive program in these departments and increase the interest of the youth by giving them official positions in these organizations and other departments of the Church.

We do not presume to say that all Moving Pictures are detrimental but we would advise proper censorship by the supervisors of our Young People's Organizations and ask that we resolve to do our best to influence them not to patronize indecent moving pictures at any time and to refrain from going to Moving Pictures on the Sabbath. We feel that this day designated as the Lord's Day is a short time in which to accomplish the work for which the Church was instituted.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we as Lay members of the Delaware Conference jointly responsible with our Pastors for the Christian Education of the Youth within our boundaries emphasize the dangers associated with intemperance of any kind and develop a recreational program in our local Churches under Christian supervision.

Obituary

CALEB WASHINGTON JOHNSON

The late Rev. Caleb Washington Johnson was born to the late John and Amanda Johnson, June 1, 1887 at Salisbury, Maryland and departed this life, July 1, 1935, Trenton, New Jersey, aged 48 years, 1 month.

Brother Johnson grew to manhood in his native city. He was educated in the city public schools and through special tutelage of one Rev. Dr. Rageit, a noted Presbyterian minister, for whom he served as valet. He also studied 6 years at Temple University, Philadelphia, Pa.

He was converted at an early age and joined himself to Communion and fellowship of the John Wesley M. E. Church, Salisbury, Md. From 1908 to '11 he served as Church School Superintendent and subsequently he was licensed Local Preacher. Moving to Wilmington, Delaware 1913, he joined Ezion M. E. Church. Here again he was elected Church School Superintendent. He is reputed to have been punctual and efficient in both charges. In 1915 at Atlantic City, New Jersey, he joined the Delaware Annual Conference, the late Bishop Theodore Henderson presided.

Only God knows the number of sinners brought to Christ, the number of backsliders reclaimed, the number of weak Christians strengthened and the number of strong Christians made stronger by the unadulterated gospel of Jesus Christ expounded by this pastor-evangelist. Many a time when the meetings and services which he attended began to get cold and low spirited, Bro. Morris would stir them up with a lively gospel song or spiritual which was sung with all his heart, soul and strength. He will be sadly missed not only from the Easton District, but the Delaware Conference.

In 1901 he was married to Miss Laura Belle Stanton who survives him. This union resulted in a life of blissful happiness. The funeral service was well attended, and ably conducted by the Rev. Dr. E. O. Parker, Superintendent of the Easton District, assisted by other District Superintendents and ministers. Resolutions were sent from the Easton District Preachers' Association, the other Districts of the Conference, the organizations of the charge, and the elementary schools.

He leaves to mourn their loss a devoted widow, one daughter, Mrs. Bessie Payne of Philadelphia, three grandchildren, many nieces and nephews, and a host of friends. The subject of the last sermon he preached at Sherwood, one of his churches was, "It can be done". At that time he said "I don't think I'll be with this church much longer."

EVANGELISM

We, the Lay-members of the United Session of the Delaware Annual Conference, beg to submit the following resolutions on Evangelism; Jesus' Great Command to each of us is to "Go ye into all the world and make disciples of every nation." This command is as potent today as it was the day He spoke it, and our chief business is to obey. Upon our obedience and loyalty depend the Christianizing of the nations and the salvation of the world.

The chief business of the Church is to evangelize and to Christianize. In evangelizing we aim at securing immediate decisions for Christ. In Christianizing we try to show those in fellowship with the Church the attitudes Christians should have toward God and their fellow man and how these attitudes should be expressed in conduct. Evangelism includes both of these approaches to life. These facts show that evangelism is at once the most necessary and the most difficult of Church activities. It is the "fruit" by which we are known with regard to our devotion to Christ, for He has said, "He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same beareth much fruit".

As Christians, we realize that we need more of the presence of God in our lives, in our Churches and in our programs. We see around us and within our reach those who have no conscious experience of fellowship with God. They are strangers to the joys of salvation. That illumination and inspiration which comes out of a triumphant prayer life, is missing in their lives. We need a program which will direct the individual to a decision or the commitment toward the highest and best as revealed in Christ Jesus, our personal Saviour.

1. We would like to see such a program initiated that would call for more serious attention and devotion to prayer, and to the study of the Word.
2. We would like to see such plans made and carried out which would explore every phase of Evangelism in its evangelistic, educational, economic, and spiritual aspects affecting the lives of both our young people and adults. We feel if this was done there would be experienced a spiritual quickening that would enlarge our moral and social horizons, and stimulate a passion for the mission of the Church which is the evangelization of the community.

3. One of the ways by which this might be done would be to plan in each charge a series of all day meetings lasting three or four days, using the morning hours for study and for prayer, the afternoons and evenings for preaching or addresses, spiritual in character. We believe if such a plan or something similar were faithfully and prayerfully carried out, the results would gladden the hearts of those interested in such effort, and add greatly to the spiritual life of the Church and the community.
4. As Lay Members, we pledge our hearty support, to any plan our pastors may see fit to make toward these ends, and for the spiritual refreshment of our Church.

Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely: (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.
