DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' COMBINED REPORT.

To our Resident and Presiding Bishop, the Active and Retired Ministers, and to the United Session, we extend hearty greetings:

In making this combined report, we do so in a spirit of gratitude to the God of all grace and glory, who hath brought us thus far on our way. Words are inadequate to fully express our gratitude to Him for His goodness, and our appreciation of the pastors, their families, and people who by their cooperation and faithful service have made this report possible.

From Labor to Reward.

Two members of the Conference have passed away this year. On September 10, Rev. L. W. Molock, after an illness of several months "was not; for God took him" to his well earned reward. He had served acceptably—Fairlee, Maryland, three years; and Seaford, Delaware, ten years. Brother Molock was a good preacher and often helped his brethren.

On December 30, the whole Conference was shocked by the sudden home-going of Dr. T. H. Kiah, twenty-six years principal of Princess Anne Academy. Dr. Kiah had served only two churches before taking charge of the school—Ocean City, New Jersey five years and St. Michaels, Maryland four years. He was honored four times with membership in the General Conference and served on the Book Committee for eight years. Many were his labors at the school and in preaching throughout the conference.

On Aug. 22nd, Rev. W. W. Hoy, an Accepted Supply, passed. At the time of his death he was serving his second year as the pastor of Mt. Carmel Church in Wilmington, Delaware.

April 11, Mrs. Annie Bullen, faithful wife of Rev. J. N. Bullen was called to her reward; June 14th, Mrs. Mary B. Dickerson, devoted wife of Rev. O. P. Dickerson, died in full faith, and on Jan. 25th Mrs. Mattie D. Peaco, beloved wife of Rev. J. I. Peaco, passed peacefully away.

And still their silent ministries Within our hearts have place, As when on earth they walked with us And met us face to face."

Stewardship.

Success in Evangelism, social service, and religious education is delayed and will be, so long as we continue our inefficient financial methods and fail to recognize the fact, that God has His own method for financing His church.

It has been proven again and again that when we substitute our imperfect ways for God's perfect way, we interfere with the successful operation of His program. Stewardship is a doctrine which we should accept and practice as we do any other doctrine; for it is necessary to the successful accomplishment of God's purpose in the world. Whenever we interpose our inefficient ways for God's efficient way, there is not only retardation, but actual failure in the chief work for which the church exists.

The impulse, which moved Abel, Abraham and thousands of Jews to bring their firstlings and tithes to God, does not seem to move in our hearts today. God is still challenging us to prove Him with offerings and tithes, and He still promises to bless us, saying: "Try me therewith and see if I will not pour out blessings upon you until there is not room enough to contain them." But we, by our action, say "no, Sunday Teas, Chicken Suppers, begging cards, and Rallies are better than God's method."

It is our belief that the church will advance but little in evangelism, religious education or social service until it has more faith in God and has accepted and practiced his ordinance. Christian Stewardship is of personality, of prayer and of possessions. We are not our own, we were purchased with a price, we were redeemed by a sacrifice, and we by choice have given ourselves away. If we do not own ourselves, how can we own anything? All we have is by the grace of God through Christ Jesus. We should be saying:

"We give thee but thine own, Whate'er that gift may be; All that we have is thine alone, A trust, O Lord, from Thee." Our methods take much of the time and energy of some of the best members of our churches, and what is worse, so much of the time of the pastors until there is insufficient time for the word of God, for study, for meditation and for prayer. How long shall we leave the word of God to serve tables?

We have had drives and campaigns that have energized the life of our church helpfully; The Centenary and the World Service did much to stir up interest in the church and increase our benevolent giving, and the Fellowship Unit Movement is destined to do even more; but when shall we have a ten years drive for four million Christian stewards? We might not get four million, but if we secured one million who would subscribe to the doctrine and practice of Christian Stewardship the spirit of God would be poured out upon us in such measure that revivals would break out in many places. We must believe He had this in mind when He said "Try me and I will pour out blessing upon you."

Stewardship is both an old and New Testament doctrine. Moses taught it, Paul, Jesus and the Holy Spirit approved it, (the early Christian Church gave all), shall we not give a tithe? We abound in many things; shall we not "abound in this grace also?" This question we must answer before we can advance toward our goal of world redemption.

The Million Unit Fellowship. Movement—(World Service).

The Christian Religion is a missionary religion and the Christian church is an out growth of it. Its supreme task is the saving of souls. The Methodist Episcopal Church has been Missionary in spirit from its beginning. The Holy urge which came down upon the Church caused many self-denying pastors and self-sacrificing laymen to seek to build the kingdom of God in the hearts of men in other lands as well as their own.

The essential nature of the Christian Church has not changed. The Church still believes in the doctrine that the human spirit is of supreme value and finds its fulfillment in God, consummated through the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The Million Unit Fellowship Movement—(World Service)—expressed in terms of today is a spiritual and financial effort to meet the desperate need that faces the church. It is to meet the challenge of God, in this crucial time of strife, prejudice, hate, mistrust, lawlessness, and disregard for the welfare of others.

This movement will quicken the church to a sense of its spiritual opportunity and its financial responsibility in these new and difficult days. Christ alone is sufficient for these things and the church is the best medium through which his message of redemptive power can reach the multitudes.

It is an enlistment of the entire membership of the church in a united effort for the saving of the life of the world and for bringing in the kingdom of God

It will give each person an opportunity to express his gratitude to God in the service to his fellowmen.

It will enable the church to stimulate and maintain the spiritual and intellectual life of the missionaries who seek the redemption of all men from personal, social, political, and economic sins.

Both ministers and laymen have accepted the challenge offered in the Million Unit Fellowship Movement not as a spasmodic something, but as a four fold covenant. A working together with Christians in all lands, that all may be eventually permeated with the spirit and motive of Jesus our Lord.

The plan has been carefully presented and in many instances the Churches have subscribed their full quota of units.

Institutions and Organizations.

Home for the Aged.

Dr. J. H. Scott, the agent has worked hard to stir up interest in the home and to collect funds for current expenses and for liquidating the debt. Little or no interest is manifested in many sections of the Conference. This ought not to be.

The Friendship Home.

This has not been an easy year for this institution. Mrs. E. P. Thomas, the supervisor, and the Woman's Home Missionary Society have striven hard to maintain and put the Home on a firm financial basis. Interest in this, one of our best social agencies, lags. We plead for more cooperation on the part of the whole Conference. These women deserve it, and the Home is doing a great service for our girls and young women.

Schools.

· Morgan College is still meeting a great need in the life of our Conference by training young men and women for Christian service. Unless better support is given, the school may be driven to the necessity of changing ownership and policy.

Princess Anne Academy has been sold to the state of Maryland and has started on its way as a state school. We wish for it great success and pledge it our moral support.

The Summer School of Ministerial Training was held in Princess Anne in July and was graced by the presence of Bishop Herbert Welch, who gave a series of lectures on the "Human Race." Dean F. J. Handy and faculty deserve much credit for the help and inspiration they are giving the ministers, young and old.

The Epworth League Institute at Morgan College directed by Dr. D. H. Hargis last summer was successful, without such training many of our churches would suffer, even more than now, for better leaders.

Youth Conferences and Conventions are multiplying in numbers and interest on all the districts. They mightily aid the churches in their evangelistic and religious educational programs.

Teacher Training Schools have been conducted in many sections of the Conference and efforts have been made to start a Teacher Training class in every church. Much credit for this is due Dr. E. H. Brewster, who ends his services with us at this session of the Conference.

A most helpful youth gathering is the Mid-Winter Institutes held in some of the Districts for intensive study of methods and programs.

The District Conferences are great gatherings; and are helpful in stimulating the officers and members of the churches to greater activity.

The Efficiency Conferences give opportunity for pre-conference check-up and inspiration for closing the year's work.

The Woman's Home Missionary Society is doing its usual good work. If it were not for this organization we would have no Friendship Home. It needs more encouragement.

The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society is not strong in our Conference. The President and the few women working with her are courageous and faithful. We hope many others will catch the vision and enlist in this Foreign Missionary enterprise.

The Ladies' Aid Societies are very helpful agencies in the local churches. If only our Brotherhood chapters could be brought to the same point of interest and activity as these, our churches would be mightily helped in their social and financial work.

Temperance.

Wine is still a mocker and strong drink is raging, and the unwise are still being deceived thereby. The status of the liquor traffic is well described by the story of a man out of whom an evil spirit was cast, which returned with seven other spirits and the second state was worse than the first. Those of us who remember the temperance situation before the saloons were outlawed are agreed, that it is worse now than before. By our lack of interest and proper organization we suffered the friends of rum to rob us of what we had gained through prohibition, and now we must fight to regain it.

Perhaps no traffic or business is multiplying so rapidly as the liquor traffic. We are told that sixty two million more gallons of distilled liquor were consumed last year than 3 years ago. It is estimated that our rum bill is five billion dollars a year, or one tenth of our national income.

Although the liquor traffic has proved itself to be our greatest American menace by its destruction of morals, health and life, there seems to be no organization sufficient to destroy it.

· If the organized Church is lax in its interest and effort to stamp out this curse, what will be the outcome is easy to predict. The number of accidents and deaths caused by drunken drivers is constantly increasing and highway traffic is decidedly unsafe, but the moral and spiritual life of the nation is much more endangered.

There are laws governing the traffic and sale of alcoholic liquors, but it is exceedingly hard to get traffic officers and magistrate courts to enforce these laws, and harder still to get the state that receive taxes from the traffic to feel that these laws should be strictly enforced.

The Methodist Episcopal Church, through its General Conferences has always put itself on record as opposed to liquor in every form and exhorted its membership to prohibition and total abstinence.

All our pastors and officials should acquaint themselves with the pronouncement of the last General Conference in reference to temperance, and teach all with whom they have to do, about the evils of this iniquitous evil. Our Church Schools should not only be organized into temperance Societies, but should conduct a Temperance program monthly and secure temperance pledges. Our sympathies and prayers go out to that stalwart foe of intemperance, Dr. Clarence True Wilson, who by enforced weakness and affliction was compelled to resign his position as Executive Secretary of the Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals at the last General Conference.

Social Service.

For the church to give an interpretation of the scriptures and to tell what ought to be done for society, is but one of its functions. An exegesis of the scriptures becomes a mere shell when devoid of practical application. The plain teaching of the scripture is that we are our brother's keeper and neighbor to all who are in need.

The church should be profoundly aware of its social obligations in those demands and needs, which continually confront it; that is to lessen physical discomfort, to succor the sick and needy, to feed and clothe the poor and to provide shelter for the homeless. These are duties which the church cannot neglect and still claim to be the exponent of Christianity.

The United States Government in its Social Security and Federal Housing Acts, its Slum Clearance and Recreation centers is not prompted to these activities merely because of an economic necessity, but as a distinct Christian social duty.

It is the business of the church to create public sentiment sufficient to influence legislation forbidding child labor, gambling, lynching, Sabbath desecration, improper films, literature and shows.

Religious Education.

The development of Christlike characters of every age, and the making of a Christlike world, is the supreme goal of religious education. We must improve our method for leading those already in our churches and church schools into more fruitful living, and also contact that greater multitude of the spiritually untaught.

When the average church school attempts to improve its work and increase its usefulness it at once becomes conscious of its greatest needs—among which are the following:

- 1. More skilful teachers and leaders.
- 2. Guidance in using lesson materials to the best advantage.
- 3. A more accurate knowledge of its community.
- 4. An improved method to reach the untaught.
- Aid in seeing its educational task and relating its work to the teaching agencies.
- The sympathetic cooperation of homes, public schools and other community forces.

Reaching the Larger Number.

The government of each of our states plans for the education of its growing citizens. This work is being extended through childhood and youth into adulthood so that it is coming to provide education for all the people. The state outlines the program so as to reach every growing citizen and provides for the continuous improvement of its educational system.

Religious education is equally concerned with all the people. This responsibility is left to the voluntary effort of its citizens to be carried out in and through the churches. The total task of religious education parallels the total task of public education. It means reaching all the people with adequate religious teaching.

This calls upon the agencies of religious education to reach a larger number of the total population. The aim may be concisely stated in this excerpt from Article 1 in the Children's Charter adopted by the White House Conference on Child Welfare: "For every child spiritual and moral training to enable him to stand firm under the pressure of life."

Inter-Church and Community Co-Operation.

This effort to reach a larger number of the unreached calls for denominational co-operation and, yet, a program looking to this can only be worked gradually. Many sincere Christian leaders have yet to be convinced that the Lord's work can better be done by co-operation than by the complete independent action of each Church or School. Where no start has been made in this direction, they may begin in some small and simple projects. No Church can get away from the community life and ideals of which it is a part and must share with other religious forces the problems of self-improvement. There must be a statesmanlike facing of the religious needs of the community and adequate planning to meet them. But those who lead in this must be as wise as serpents and as harmless as doves. They must be skilled in the slow but effective educational method of bringing the Church School leaders to know real co-operation. Along this line an impact on community consciousness may be made that would be impossible working separately.

Our task is as great as that of the state, but we must have more togetherness in the essentials of our method, if our achievement is to measure up to our opportunity. The challenge in religious education today is "to see life as a whole, give religious content and interpretation to all aspects of experience and comprehend the whole of life with ultimate meaning and value. All education may become religious when it lifts experience to the level of ultimate relationship to God."

The Family Altar.

The Episcopal Address to the General Conference held in Columbus, Ohio in May 1936, has the following paragraph touching our home life that needs a re-emphasis.

"Of preeminent importance is a revival of domestic piety. Our problem is as truly as parental one as it is a filial one. The greatest thing we can do for the "rising generation" is to equip it with praying fathers and mothers who turn their homes into sanctuaries, their hearts into altars, and their

love into burning appeals to their children to remain true to the Parenthood from which every parenthood in heaven and in earth is named. The fathers and mothers of Methodism should revive into an evangelical meaning the commission long since given to Jewish parents: "The thing which I command thee this day shall be in thine heart: And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou riseth up."

Dr. E. H. Brewster.

We have greatly profited by the guidance, inspiration and help given us thru the work of Dr. E. H. Brewster as our Director of Religious Education during the past four years. We are grateful to our resident Bishop, Ernest G. Richardson, for being so thoughtful in administrative provision as to make this arrangement possible. Dr. Brewster has been a brother beloved among us and his leadership has brought light and understanding to one of the newest and most difficult lines of work that we have. His own report will give information in regard to our activities in the Epworth League Institute, Leadership Training and other phases of the program.

Evangelism.

Ours is a time of great movements. The world is astir. Weaker groups are seeking a place among the stronger, and often at the expense and destruction of still weaker groups. To desire a place among the strongest is natural, but the spirit that prompts the desire does not always guarantee universal good. Today many leaders are offering themselves to groups with the promise of leading them to political and national supremacy, but he leads best who leads for the good of all and for the glory of Him, who is the Father of all.

These political movements, national and international, and all class strife need the sanctifying grace of God as it is in Jesus Christ, who said "He that would be greatest among you must be the servant of all." He is the best leader today, who in the spirit of Christ seeks to lead to peace, brotherhood and goodwill. The going of all others is to chaos, destruction, and death.

Did ever a greater challenge face the Christian church than now? Did ever we need the spirit and power of evangelism more than we need it today? We need faith and courage to go before these moving, surging multitudes with the cross of Christ, and lead them into the way of the Prince of Peace, who leads to something more glorious than political or national supremacy. He leads to hope: hope of mastery not over others, but over self and greed and prejudice and strife and hate and death. We need to recognize Christ as our Leader. This is no time for spiritual impotency but for power and aggressive warfare against sin and wickedness at home and abroad. We sing:

"Lord we are able, Our spirits are thine." Yet folk are still saying "Lord we brought him to you disciples and they could not cure him."

But, lets come back to our Jerusalem, to our home to our community. Have we been able to direct the movements there? We are commanded to begin at Jerusalem and unless we do we can never proceed out to the utmost part of the earth.

Have we organized our children and young people into classes for religious instruction and taught them the way of salvation and of the Christian life? Here is the most futile field today. Fail here and our failure is most complete, begin and continue here and our success is sure.

We must also evangelize, Christianize and organize the adult life of our church and community, and then with these and the young people go forth, like a mighty army with Him who said "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

To do that we must sing all of that beautiful hymn the chorus of which is:

"Lord we are able,
Our spirits are thine
Remold them, make us,
Like the divine.

Thy guiding radiance Above us shall be A beacon to God, To love and loyalty."

The outlook, however, is encouraging, in that, there is within the Church an increasing sense of dissatisfaction with present achievements; a willingness to part with unsuccessful methods and to adopt those which have always been successful. Also, there are many leaders whose ambition is not to lead to political conquests but to spiritual, and to lift all by serving all.

Like Elijah, many recognizing the spiritual death, are praying, and there are signs of refreshing rain and rising tides.

Say what we will or may about the Exford Group Movement, the Young Peoples Interracial Fellowship movement, The Methodist Youth Conference movement, or the Million Unit Fellowship movement; we believe these are movements in the right direction and might well be called a new or better form of Evangelism than some we have known.

Has anything, in recent years, more completely gripped the imagination or life of the church than has the Million Unit Fellowship movement? Read its fourfold program:

- 1. Each member a Unit of power for God.
- 2. Intercessory prayer that God's kingdom may come.
- 3. Each member of the fellowship witnessing daily for Christ.
- 4. Each sharing his temporal blessings in the interest of others.

May these spiritual movements, like that which stirred the heart of Wesley and saved England, save us and the Church and then regenerate, dominate, and control these worldly movements until the Kingdoms of this world shall become the Kingdom of our Lord and Master.

Summary.

The pastors not being able to make full reports to us before the last Sunday in the Conference year, made it impossible for us to give complete results here but they will be given by the pastors in their reports to the statistician and treasurer, and also by the District Superintendents individual reports.

The reports received, indicate that there has been an advance in all the major interests of the church to be sure, much that has been accomplished cannot be written on paper or told in words, but is to be seen in the character and lives of the people among whom these ministers have labored.

It is sufficient to say that the pastors generally, have been faithful to their calling, untiring in their efforts, and are one with all, who seek to present the ideals of the ideal Christ to a confused and a bewildered world.

Conclusion.

The measure of our success this year is the measure of our faithfulness to the ideals and convictions begotten in us by the word of truth which we preach, and our endeavor to follow them in the spirit of Him who said "I must work the works of Him that sent me while it is day for the night cometh when no man can work." To have had a chance to try and grace to achieve in the work of God is an honor and privilege indescribable, angels would desire such but God has reserved and bestowed them upon us, the redeemed of his Son; "To whom be glory and majesty, dominion and power both now and forever, Amen."

PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

By the grace of God we are spared to make this our third report for the Philadelphia District. God has been good to us; no pastor has died and most of them have enjoyed good health. Some, however, have had sorrow. Rev. J. N. Bullen was saddened by the death of his wife, Mrs. Annie Bullen; Rev. T. H. Woodley by the death of his sister, Rev. R. G. Waters by the death of his brother and Rev. M. W. Clark by the death of his brother.

Mrs. H. T. Johnson, Mrs. R. A. McCarthy, Mrs. J. C. Dunn, Mrs. Wm. Goldsborough, Mrs. J. E. A. Johns and Mrs. W. A. Johnson have been indisposed some part of the year.

Just as last year, the District has been organized into the following committees: Evangelistic, Religious Educational, Social Service, and Financial. The chairmen of these committees have from time to time projected programs and conducted discussions that have kept the work of the committees before the various charges and results have been gratifying.

Some of the charges have had good revivals and added many to the churches. Results along this line would be better if we were able to take advantage of Lent, Passion Week and Easter specifically for winning souls; but usually we are making preparation for conference, and thus have a divided interest. Our recommendation is that young people and adults be organized into classes and prepared for reception on trial during the Easter season.

The people have shown their gratitude for improved economic conditions by a larger response to their financial obligation, hence a better financial report than last year. According to reports from the charges World Service collections have gone well beyond last year's and ministerial support is in advance of last year. There was some advance in Conference Claimants, but not nearly enough. We have hope and faith that this will immediately advance. Pro-rata division has been urged, and a few pastors and churches have strictly observed it. May their tribe increase.

The Million Unit Fellowship Movement was cheerfully accepted and the district quota subscribed.

The young people's annual meetings, The Preachers' Meetings, District Conference and Efficiency Conference give opportunity for stimulating interest and obtaining results which would be otherwise impossible.

The Charges.

BROOKLYN:-

JOHN WESLEY'S future is uncertain. J. E. Dunn, the pastor, has put forth great effort and has had success. With so few interested members, it is difficult to meet all the financial obligations. There have been two conversions and seven added to the church. \$55. was raised for World Service and \$35. for other benevolences. 10 units were subscribed.

NEWMAN—This church continues to grow as its program expands.

E. H. Crampton reports 5 added to the church and World Service \$70.00; an increase of \$20.00; other benevolences \$50.00 and 23 units subscribed. The church conducted a Vacation Bible School and is well organized. The Brooklyn Federation of Churches give much encouragement to our work in that city.

NEW YORK:-

BUTLER CHURCH has been remodeled and the future for it looks more encouraging. F. J. Handy reports \$500.00 raised for trustees and \$10.00 for World Service; \$15.00 for other benevolences. 2 units subscribed.

EAST CALVARY, our new work in New York City, is growing. 29 members on roll. Raised for World Service \$5.00, other benevolences \$6.00. Subscribed for 2 units. J. N. C. Davis, pastor.

ENGLEWOOD—The pastor, W. A. Johnson, and his wife were ill part of the year, nevertheless, the church has advanced along all lines; congregation has been built up and confidence established. \$10.00 for World Service; \$13.00 for other benevolences.

JAMAICA—If better support were given and thus enabling the pastor to give more time to the work, a better report could be made; but there has been some advances. 14 persons were added to the church, \$1000.00 raised for trustees, \$50.00 for World Service, a \$10.00 increase, \$23.00 for other benevolences, and 14 units subscribed. A good Vacation Bible School was conducted. R. A. McCarthy, pastor.

JERSEY CITY though laboring under tremendous financial burden, makes a good report. \$ conversions and 26 added to the church. \$24.00 for World Service and 5 units subscribed. A Vacation Bible School was conducted. J. W. Thomas, pastor.

MONTCLAIR is a strong charge, but is not as responsive to World Service and benevolences as some other churches in its class. Conversions 32; accessions 35; World Service \$260.00; other benevolences \$75.00. Units subscribed 35. W. J. Helm, pastor.

NEWARK is gradually moving forward. They had a World Service and benevolent gain; 16 conversions and 51 joined the church. Raised for World Service \$176.00 and for benevolences \$123.00; 40 units were subscribed. Congregation continues to grow. W. C. Thompson, pastor.

CAMPHOR increased its World Service and benevolent giving. Had 4 conversions and 28 accessions. World Service \$68.00; other benevolences \$4.00; 7 units subscribed, and a Vacation Church School. M. W. Clark, pastor.

EAST GERMANTOWN had another good year. 5 conversions, 8 accessions. World Service \$72.00; benevolences \$37.00—both an increase. This was the first charge to report full Unit subscription, which was nine, but they subscribed 21. A Vacation Bible School was held. J. T. Wallace, pastor.

GERMANTOWN—J. E. A. Johns "will not down." He again advanced World Service and benevolent giving. Conversions 20; accessions 20; World Service \$735.00; benevolence \$138 and subscribed 76 units, 21 more than their quota.

HAVEN also increased World Service giving and benevolences. 32 conversions; 168 accessions—leading the district. Subscribed 63 units. Their quota is 55. Vacation Bible School was conducted. World Service \$650.00; benevolence \$200.00. J. W. Jefferson is the popular pastor.

JOHN SIMMONS had another successful year. If this debt could be reduced and a revival should come this would be another of our great churches in Philadelphia. Conversions 29, accessions 31. World Service \$52.00, an advance; benevolence \$36.00; units subscribed 20. A. L. Martin, pastor.

JOHN WESLEY has advanced in World Service and benevolent giving. W. A. Hubbard reports 40 persons added to the church. A Vacation Bible School was conducted. World Service \$235.00; other benevolences \$97.00. Units subscribed 15.

MT. ZION is still gaining ground. 46 conversions, 108 accessions, \$155.00 for World Service, an advance; \$97.00 for other benevolences, an advance. 32 units were subscribed, 5 beyond the quota. Vacation Bible School and a crowded church. H. R. Coleman, pastor.

PENIEL—William Goldsborough has been handicapped, but makes a good report. 35 accessions; 25 conversions; for World Service and other benevolences \$42.00; units subscribed 16, and a Vacation Bible School conducted.

TINDLEY TEMPLE—Raised for World Service \$1500 and for other benevolences \$198.00, both an increase over last year. Interest is being taken care of and the debt reduced. Outstanding obligations have been met and a better organization effected. This church needs an associate pastor,

ZOAR CHURCH has had one of its best years. Conversions 35; accessions 49; for World Service \$1000.00; for other benevolences \$180, both an increase. The debt has been reduced and interest paid. 90 units subscribed and a Vacation Bible School conducted. L. H. McArthur, pastor.

SPRING LAKE enjoyed a successful summer season and reported an

advance in ministerial support. D. R. Fletcher, pastor.

TRENTON still stands in need of a better church building. T. H. Woodley gives a good account of himself by raising \$71.00 for World Service, \$18.00 for benevolence, both an increase. Conversions 4; accessions 4. Units subscribed 13.

WHITE PLAINS—H. T. Johnson reports 3 conversions, 18 accessions, raised for World Service \$150, same as last year. Units subscribed 25. Pastor and people have worked hard, but against odds.

FRANKFORD reports 8 conversions; 16 accessions. World Service \$32.00, an advance; other benevolences \$15.00. Units subscribed 6. This charge has 3 rented properties, which help to carry the interest on the bonded debt. R. G. Waters, pastor.

According to reports from the pastors, there have been 296 conversions on the district and 764 accessions to the churches. \$5,474.00 raised for World Service; \$1,134 for other benevolences; 731 units have been pledged, 3 above our district quota, 14 churches conducted Vacation Bible Schools.

For these achievements we are thankful to our Heavenly Father in whose services we have labored. It has been a genuine pleasure to serve with the pastors and members of this district. The fellowship has been wholesome and beneficial. In closing we desire to thank the pastors and their families for the many courtesies shown and for their cooperation in the work committed to us all.

SALISBURY DISTRICT.

It is with a grateful heart and unalloyed praise to Almighty God that I am permitted to make this my sixth and last report of the Salisbury District.

District Health.

This district generally has enjoyed the blessing of health in common with the most of the districts. Aside from the mild epidemic of influenza that swept this section there has been no serious illness; nearly every home was affected but there were only a few fatalities. Brother Charles P. Spencer met with the misfortune of having his leg fractured in November; Mrs. I. D. Pitts clavicle was fractured by a fall down stairs; Mrs. F. C. Kershaw was injured by a fall from her automobile; Brother C. L. Jones has been afflicted seriously with high blood pressure causing a slight lameness.

Deaths.

There came to this district, community and conference the most distressing event they have suffered perhaps in a score of years in the passing of Brother T. H. Kiah who for many years was Principal of Princess Anne Academy on December 30th, 1936, at the Peninsula General Hospital at Salisbury, Md., where he was confined from the evening of December 28th. His funeral was one of the largest and most pathetic ever witnessed by the writer.

District Activities.

The usual district meetings were held during the year with the usual declaration of being the best ever held. The District Steward's meeting was held at Metropolitan church, Princess Anne; the Epworth League and Church School convention at Snow Hill; the district Conference at Pocomoke City; and the Efficiency conference also at Snow Hill. The program of the Epworth League and Church School convention, also the Youth conference which was held at Princess Anne College was prepared by Dr. E. H. Brewster, Conference Director of Religious Education. Princess Anne affords the best site for the youth conference because of the facilities of the college buildings which are placed at the disposal of the district for that occasion.

Educational Interests.

The former Princess Anne Academy is now Princess Anne College affording a four year course as an agricultural and mechanical arts institution. The death of Professor Kiah left a vacancy for president of that institution which has not been permanently filled at this writing.

There are at least three high schools in the course of reconstruction with a higher curriculum. The elementary schools of this district will compare in the matter of instruction very favorably with the adjacent states; in the matter of equipment they are not as good as one of them.

Social and Industrial.

The Social and industrial conditions are about the same on this as in other rural sections. The most of its industry is agriculture, oystering and fishing is the exception. There are but a few industrial plants on the district and they will be found in Salisbury where only a few colored people are employed in the most menial capacities in seasonal occupations.

Survey of Charges.

COTTAGE GROVE—This charge thinking that with the addition of another charge would enhance its value as a potential religious factor in the territory it would cover, was enlarged by the addition of Greenwood charge and dropping Westover which seemed to be the hindering cause has not yet measured up to expectations. World Service \$12.00. Jose Angulo, pastor.

CRISFIELD, SHILOH-Although this is the pastor's eighth year the

zeal of both pastor and people continue unabated. World Service \$130.00 J. A. Kiah, pastor.

CRISFIELD, UNION-ASBURY—There seems to be lethargic condition—existing at this charge. There is a static condition which is about as har to place as the static in the radio. We know it is there. World Service \$10.00. Alexander Reid is the pastor.

DAMES QUARTER—An effort was made last conference year to connect Dames Quarter with Oriole and Chance with Deals Island which was so bitterly opposed we thought they would be aroused to greater activity. Notwithstanding the conscientious efforts of the estimable pastor they have failed to arouse from their lethargy. The pastor, last December was compelled to cease from his labor for a few weeks owing to an accident he sustained by his leg being broken while he was helping to fix an automobile belonging to some one else. World Service \$6.00. Charles P. Spencer pastor.

DEALS ISLAND—The pastor of this charge is by far the most zealous and energetic they have had since I have been on the district. The people have striven as best they know how to please him in carrying on his program but because of the disadvantages he has had to face because of inadequate facilities in his home life the work has been somewhat irksome. World Service \$6.80. D. M. Collins, pastor.

FAIRMOUNT and UPPER HILL—Owing to the ill feelings which was engendered when St. Andrews church was founded at Upper Hill, which at times subsides and then revives the charge has not done all it is capable of doing and will not as long as that incident is agitated. The pastor has done all he could in a most sacrificial and painstaking manner to change conditions by precept and example and if this amiable young man would be saved for future service in the church his capabilities should be recognized by placing him in another field of labor, which is strongly recommended. World Service \$38.00. N. W. Moore, Jr., pastor.

FLOWER HILL and LEATHERBERRY CHAPEL—This work having been neglected for a period of years has had the attention of the present pastor for the last two years and were it not for the tradition of the section to which it belongs would be quite a factor financially, spiritually and intellectually. Recommendations will be made at the next session of the Annual Conference to place it with Oakville so that it will be able to furnish a more adequate support for the pastor. A. F. Winder, pastor.

FRUITLAND—This charge maintains its record of last year. The pastor heeding the scriptural admonition that it is not good for man to be alone took unto himself a help mate which has so much enhanced his value and increased his prestige that it is reflected in his work and esteem by the people. GIRDLETREE—This charge has not escaped the traditional summer vacation which the charges of this section voluntarily enjoy without or paying and the work lags during this period to such an extent that it is hard to recover however hard they may try. The pastor was afflicted in late summer with an ailment similar to paralysis caused by high blood pressure and for a time had to walk with a crutch but is convalescent. He is very zealous and conscientious in the performance of his duties and perhaps too much for his physical condition. World Service \$——. C. L. Jones, pastor-

HOPEWELL—The work on this charge is necessarily retarded during winter, because of the condition of the road to the main church; but under the leadership of a young man and vigorous pastor he is not daunted by rainy Sundays and muddy roads, wins the victory. For the fourth year this pastor makes a fine report. World Service \$22.00. I. R. Elzey, pastor.

HORNTOWN, VA.—This charge seemingly has sunk to the very lowest possible for maintainance. It is not impossible and I believe can be resurrected under a different leadership. It is greatly desired to make a change at this session of the Conference but it is not possible to do so. World Service \$4.00. S. D. Mallard, pastor.

KELLER—This charge arose from the grave two years ago and altho one of the church edifices was sold under foreclosure last year they are still carrying on with a hope of redeeming this property. With the leadership of the present pastor I see no reason why their objective can not be accomplished. World Service \$20.00. C. J. Williams, pastor.

KINGSTON—This work continues to advance under the leadership of a bold and courageous leader; but upon a constructive campaign with a people who for a long time were without such. World Service \$17.00. R. A. F. Graham, pastor.

LEEMONT—A severe setback happened to this charge about three years ago from which they have never wholly recovered. There is a disturbing factor at work here on the outside who interferes with the pastor's program and defeats some of his plans, so I have been informed. The pastor has worked heroically and wholeheartedly notwithstanding. World Service \$19.00. W. E. Stanley, pastor.

LIBERIA—This charge suffered the loss of its parsonage because of one of the churches of this charge refused point blank to meet its share of the indebtedness and the other church refused just as positively to pay more than their share. It has been supplied by Brother I. H. Bivins an Accepted Supply, who by reason of illness has been hindered from giving much attention to the work and will be relieved at this session of the conference. Many of the officials and members think it wise to discontinue the charge altogether; but for the sake of the young people there I think such a thing untenable. Brother S. D. Holland of Hopewell charge, an Accepted Supply will be recommended for pastor, as his home is not far removed from the work and is willing to carry on. I. H. Bivins, pastor.

MANOKIN—WESTOVER—This charge renders the best report in six years under the leadership of a young man full of energy and vigor who has a vision. This charge was also enlarged by the addition of a very small appointment, Westover, which has loaned some assistance financially, it being taken from the Cottage Grove charge making this a three point circuit but it is still far from being self supporting. MARION—Still rejoicing in their freedom from the thralldom imposed upon them when this Cathedral was built the people of this charge in a tangible way are showing the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension their gratitude by meeting their obligation. So happy and grateful are they that they presented the writer with a silver loving cup to manifest their gratitude toward him for the insignificant service rendered by him in bringing about their liberation. ORIOLE—One of the churches of this charge continues to lag in their responsibility, thus causing the other, St. James, to furnish most of the support to the charge. Through their earnest and persistent efforts many have forged ahead to higher heights than those reached last year.

Translations.

The Rev. W. W. Hoy, our faithful accepted supply at Mt. Carmel, was translated August 22, 1936. He was true to the trust committed to him.

Mattie Delthena Peaco, the devoted wife of Rev. John I. Peaco, our pastor on Odessa charge, passed to her eternal reward January 25, 1937, at her home, Atglen, Chester County, Pa.

Rhoda A. Johns, the mother of Rev. W. H. Johns, our pastor at Port Norris, N. J., was taken home to be with her Lord, March 4, 1937, at the ripe age of 91 years and 10 months.

Dr. J. A. T. Foust, our pastor at Mt. Holly, was bereaved of his father March 4, 1937.

Sickness invaded some of the other parsonages of the District, but without serious consequences.

Change in Appointment.

One pastoral adjustment was made during the year when P. B. Bailey, Local preacher at Darby, Pa., continued the work at Mt. Carmel, Wilmington, after the passing of W. W. Hoy.

Meetings.

The usual Official meetings have been held and were sources of great inspiration and enthusiasm. The District Stewards met at Ezion, Wilmington, with Dr. D. H. Hargis and his loyal people as hosts. Here the pastors and district stewards pledged anew their full cooperation for a larger support for Conference claimants and other connectional askings; a greater effort toward the promotion of evangelism and the increase in church membership; and for greater emphasis in the proper nurture of the youth of the church.

The Young People had a good time at the Church School and Epworth League Convention at Elkton, Md., June 30, July 1 and 2, 1936. A new worship service and three First Series Courses were introduced by the President, Rev. L. S. Moore, and the director of religious education, Dr. E. H. Brewster. The attendance was excellent. The cooperation and enthusiasm kept up until the close. The young people returned to their local churches more loyal to their Master; ready for immediate service.

Daily Vacation Bible Schools still continue to grow in influence and value.

Early in the fall the mechanics of the Million Unit Fellowship Movement were introduced at the five group meetings by the District Superintendent. This was followed by a thorough explanation at the District Conference at Pleasantville, N. J., Oct. 12, 14, 15, by our Resident Bishop E. G. Richardson, D. D., LL. D. At this meeting, each group leader pledged 100% support for his group. In most cases the men have lived up to their pledge personally and further registered the pledges for their congregations for their full number of units at the Annual Efficiency Conference held at Chester, February 9, 1937.

Excellent work has been accomplished by the Ladies' Aid Societies, the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies, the Brotherhoods and kindred organizations. On a whole a good year's work has been given for the Master's cause.

For intensive cultivation and stimulation towards reaching goals set forth in the forward program, the district is divided into six groups.

REPORT OF THE MANAGER OF THE WASHINGTON AND DELAWARE CONFERENCE INSTITUTE, THE 16TH SESSION AT MORGAN COLLEGE BALTIMORE, AUGUST 17-23.

The test of the worth whileness of an Institution is in its ability to carry on under adverse circumstances and conditions. Measured by these standards the joint effort of the Washington and Delaware Conferences in promoting this training school for the youth through these years is a proof that they believed that it was worthwhile and the enthusiastic attendance upon the part of the youth from year to year if the further assurance that the program is meeting in need.

The nineteen thirty six session of the Institute at Morgan College was one of the finest in personnel, program, leadership, and spirit we have had. The young people in attendance were largely from High School, Normal School, and College, and their response to the Christian Education program was genuinely sincere. The members of the faculty were carefully selected for the subjects which they were to teach. The school officers and agents were highly co-operative and the Manager aimed to make the whole atmosphere conducive to genuine christian fellowship. The commission in their annual session did two things which should appear in this report; first, they authorized the increase of youth representation in the commission, the same to be elected by the several councils of youth on the ten districts. action will greatly increase the expenses of the Institute and should be heartily supported in the local church and borne in mind when the apportionments are given. Second, the commission authorized the purchase of new cots for the women's and girls dormitories, the cots have borne the weight of Institutes for sixteen years. They are weary, worn and tired and are asking for a retired relationship.

Perhaps the happiest result of the past years Institute is that it will enable the Manager at this session of the conference to report that all the bills have been met and the deficit of the long standing has been wiped out. This is due to the larger support of the districts, to the most economical management and to the increase of receipts from registrations. Here I wish to thank the pastors, district superintendents, and the local charges for this brings a very happy moment in my life.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE 1987.

John D. Rockefeller, Jr. gave impetus to the nation-wide Million Unit Fellowship Movement, sponsored by the Methodist Episcopal Church, as he warned a great radio audience gathered in churches throughout the United States, that the world is too concerned with the material and too little intent on spiritual values. To "stem the rising tide of materialism, of selfishness, of shaken traditions, and crumbling moral standards" he proposes a united Christian world in which people may "find unity of purpose in seeking a simple fundamental religion as the way to peace, well being, and happiness." Commenting on the radio speech of Mr. Rockefeller, a columnist in one of our great daily newspapers reminds us "The proposal is

not new. In one form or another it has appeared for many years. That the ideal has not long since been attained may point to a mistaken emphasis. Perhaps the need is not so much that people shall UNITE TO ATTAIN HIGHER SPIRITUALITY, AS IT IS THAT PEOPLE SHALL ATTAIN HIGHER SPIRITUALITY SO THAT THEY MAY UNITE."

With this observation in mind, what an obligation the church has to its children and their leaders! We must not be satisfied with impressive figures but ever seek to promote changed lives; clearer conception of what it means to be a Christian in these times; and a mastery of the skills that are essential to adequate spiritual leadership of the church.

Our Organization

Members of the Board, representing both ministers and laymen, meet twice a year to plan for our common task. In each district there is a Youth organization which carries out the program as outlined by the Director and the Board. Several of the districts hold annual district Youth Conferences, with the youth assuming entire leadership. The annual Youth Conference at the seat of the Annual Conference brings together representatives from each district within the Delaware Conference, as well as a goodly number of young people from the Philadelphia Conference.

The Service of Dr. E. H. Brewster

After four years of most devoted service Dr. E. H. Brewster relinquishes the office of Conference Director of religious education. His counsel and guidance have been invaluable. He has shown that is possible for Christian people of different color to work, worship, and serve on the basis of Christ's redemptive love. At another time and place we shall show our appreciation to Dr. Brewster for the splendid work he has done in Kingdom building.

Morgan College and Its Relationship to the Higher Education of the Negro

- 1. Last June over 840 Negro boys and girls were graduated from high schools in Maryland, with practically no State provisions for their college training. Morgan College is the only institution in State where these students may complete their college education.
- 2. For many years Morgan College has done this work for the State at considerable expense to the institution.
- 3. Over 90% of the 1500 Negro public school teachers in Maryland received some part of their training in Morgan College.

A proposal to combine the Delaware and Washington conferences in a program of religious education has been discussed. It was thought that since the Delaware Conference has made some progress in this field the director for any joint arrangement should come from the Delaware Conference.

Dr. Merle English has shown unusual interest and cooperation in our work, promising us generous financial help when our program and policy take final form. Bishop Richardson and the District Superintendents are equally as interested and cooperative.

Finance

The financial support given our work has never been adequate. We all know the chief means of support comes from the Rally Day offering. While there has been a slight increase in the Rally Day offering each year; yet we have never raised the total amount asked. If the work already begun is being conserved and an enlarged program developed more attention must be given to finances. We earnestly urge larger giving in the Rally Day offering.

The New Challenge

Great social, political and religious tasks confront the church today as it attempts to project its program of social service, religious education and evangelism.

The modern method of securing results is by cooperation and appreciation.

It's the greatest thought in heaven or earth— It helps us know our fellow's worth; There'd be no wars or bitterness, No fear, no hate, no grasping; yes, It makes work play, and the careworn free When I appreciate you and you appreciate me.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION—TO THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE,

APRIL 3, 1937, ATLANTIC CITY, NEW JERSEY.

Dear Brethren:

I would have completed four years of service in the Delaware Conference in June. I remember how slight was my acquaintance with the members of this conference when I came. I had much trepidation of spirit. I did not know how you would receive me; whether you would understand me. I was fearful lest you should attribute to me a condescending attitude, or feel that my appointment had been made in a spirit of patronage. All these misgivings were soon corrected. I have moved throughout the Delaware Conference with the same freedom, friendliness and mutual response as in the other two conferences I served. You have taught me much that I needed to learn. Your unswerving friendliness, understanding and appreciation have enriched my life. You have a permanent place in my affections. The Delaware Conference, as the English Queen said of Calais, is written on my heart.

In spite of the fact that the year was broken by assignment to other duties, many helpful educational enterprises have been promoted. Last year's annual Youth Conference was distinctive. All five districts were represented. The addresses by Dean Mays, of Howard University, and Senator Nye, of North Dakota, were especially bright lights. The attendance reached 200.

In May a delightful interracial gathering was held at my home in Norwood. The continuation committee of the Philadelphia and Delaware Youth Conference met together. Many still remember the day with gladness. Those who are skeptical of the compatibility of the races—especially when the races have formed their unity in Christ—would have been enlightened by the experience. A similar gathering was held during the Christmas Holidays at Zoar Church. One of the officials of Zoar Church remarked, as he watched the 35 or more young people mingling in some joyous games, "Any one can tell that these are Christian young people."

I have been charged with promoting interracial fellowship. I admit it—and accept the charge as a compliment. I shall continue to do so. If I should be so unhappy as to lose the vision of Christ, I should probably fall into the ways of segregation.

Once more the Delaware Conference was represented at a nationwide Methodist Youth Conference—this time at Berea, Kentucky. To encourage enrollment of delegates, urge financing, mobilize for the trip—all required careful planning. What a splendid delegation you sent! They were, Philadelphia District, Florence Lucas, Jamaica, N. Y.; Wilmington District, Miss Lucy Wricks, St. Daniel's, Chester, Pa.; with Miss Wricks went a school teacher friend, Miss Anna Johnson; Dover District, Miss Ruth Williams, Cheswold, Del.; Easton District sent two delegates, Miss Elaine Coulbourne, Easton, Md., and Brice Miles, Ridgely, Md.; Salisbury District, Miss Vivian Hughes, Princess Anne. The Morgan College Institute graciously appointed and helped to send an official delegate. Mr. James Hardcastle, of Dover, Del.

These young people have reported Berea in all the districts, and several have promoted similar youth conferences in their districts. They were heartily welcomed at Berea. They were unquestionably the outstanding delegation from the Afro-American membership of our Methodist Church. Congratulations, Brethren, on these delegates! Many thanks to you, District Superintendents, for the support of this enterprise. I strongly urge that such contacts with our nation-wide Methodist be maintained. Especially since we approach jurisdictional organization is this necessary. We must not become a provincial Church, nor lose the glory of our interracial heritage.

In June came the District Epworth League and Church School conventions. I attended five. In three, First Series Training Courses were given, and with much success. The teaching was exceptionally well done. I urge the continuance of this practice.

Leadership Training has had a wholesome emphasis throughout the year. At Atlantic City a group Training School was held in November. I was unable to have the school in Bridgeton, Wilmington and Philadelphia, as before. These efforts, however, should not be dropped. I am confident of their continuance.

Many local training courses were held by pastors. A particularly impressive effort was carried on by the Rev. Kelly Jackson and cooperating pastors on the Dover District. Congratulations to these energetic brethren.

The Vacation Church Schools provided a blessing to many children during the Summer. Thee Institutes were held by the director, one in Princess Anne, for three days; another at Chester, and a six-week Inter-denominational Institute in Philadelphia. Several young women (benefited by the Institute at Princess Anne) helped to train teachers elsewhere. About 15 Vacation Schools have reported, but many more were held. No schools in any denomination exceeded in numbers those held at St. Daniels, Chester, Peniel, Philadelphia, and Tindley Temple, Philadelphia.

Other very strong schools were at Ezion, Wilmington, Haven, Philadelphia, and Princess Anne. Some of our most efficient schools were in the rural churches. Many pastors could fulfill the disciplinary requirement respecting the religious instruction of children, if they would conduct a Vacation Church School. A two-week school, meeting five days each week, or two hours every day, would be the equivalent of what is afforded the average child in Sunday School.

As in previous years I was very happy to make visits to local churches. My regret that time did not permit more such visits. I did, however, preach in the following churches, Haven and Janes, Philadelphia; Ezion, Wilmington; Bridgeton, N. J.; White Haven and Nanticoke, Berlin, Royal Oak, Deals Island and John Wesley, Salisbury, Md.

Morgan College Institute is one of our finest training centers. The enrollment last year was gratifying. Dr. Hargis, Dr. Butler, the Rev. Mr. Moore, the Rev. O. H. Spence, from this conference, gave themselves unremittingly for the welfare of the students. The Washington conference cooperated with enthusiasm. No Institute of my acquaintance maintains a better balance of the intellectual, spiritual and recreational elements. The quality of the student body is superior. The devotional hours, last year in charge of Professor H. L. Cornish, are upon the highest level. Methodism can well be proud of Morgan College Institute. Support it, Brethren, with increased fidelity.

I must record my warm appreciation of the faithfulness of our conference board. At the sacrifice of time and money the members meet in goodly numbers twice each year. The district superintendents without exception attend. The Rev. E. H. Crampton proved a conscientious and able president.

Financially we have made a small advance over previous years. The total received exceeds slightly \$700.00. If any one could make \$700.00 go further than your board has done this year, he should be made treasurer of the World Service Funds of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

I dislike to write a word of farewell. I shall be present through the sessions of the Youth Conference Saturday and Sunday. I shall hope thereby to meet many of you. You may be confident of my continued affection and prayers.

"For what is man better than sheep or goats,
Who nourish a blind life
"If knowing God, they lift not hands of prayer
Both for themselves and those who call them friend."

Let us keep our faces forward, where the bright gleam of our bright star is cast. Nothing can permanently hinder truth. God wills brotherhood, friendship, democracy, peace, salvation—and what God wills no man can stay.

REPORT OF PRINCESS ANNE SCHOOL MINISTERIAL TRAINING.

The purpose of the Commission on Conference Course of study in seeking to raise the character of the work of the Boards of Ministerial Training throughout the Church to academic rank is becoming realized, and our own Summer School in co-operating with this program has accordingly developed the school point of view and elevated its own scholastic standards. The following activities have been pursued during the past year. The instructors engaged with the students during the first 3 months succeeding the last Conference in intensive Correspondence work on all books marked in the Discipline "To be Studied"—This was followed by a ten (10) day session at Princess Anne (July 28-Aug. 6); These same books were reviewed and studied in the class room under the personal direction of the teachers. Final examinations were held, this obviated the necessity of examinations at the seat of the Conference except in such cases where legitimate excuses were offered and special permission granted for the examination. In addition to the undergraduate courses a graduate seminar was held on Dr. Lewis' graduate course-Jesus Christ and the human quest. Doctors Helm and Hargis were discussion leaders. Bishop Herbert Welch was guest lecturer. He presented a series of discussions on "The Nations and the Race." This was an outstanding presentation, it represented a Christian Scholar's world view and was comprehensive in scope, sane in judgment and uncompromising in its enunciation of the only basic principle calculated to lead out a weary and troubled world into achieving an abiding peace. On Dec. 5th, at Ames M. E. Church, Baltimore, Maryland a Training Conference was conducted; it included the instructors and District Superintendents. Its purposes related to the educational and spiritual activities of the school and Boards of Ministerial Training within the Washington and Delaware Conferences.

The following problems were considered: "How to teach Efficiently", "How maintain the morale of the school," "How to study," "How Properly conduct a worship Service," "How relate the school to the District Activities"—The Supts. and the School, The graduate Courses and similar subjects.

Dr. Oscar M. Buck of Drew University gave two very striking lectures on the "Missionaries point of view of education." He stressed the fact that early Christianity starting from Jerusalem, first captured the hearts and minds of the Jew and then expanding in ever widening circles conquered the gentile world: Its task today is to capture the modern world and to save civilization from complete collapse. During the entire year

these instructors have exercised constant supervision over the students, and at no time has the school not been at work: we have repeatedly held before these young men the futility of attempting to build a worthwhile and permanent ministry on a purely emotional upsurge devoid of intellectual content moral earnestness and spiritual power. The school has endeavored to aid these men in creating the students desire and will to learn and the scholars passion for accuracy and truth so that having established in early life the habits of study one may go almost indefinitely inhibiting by the sheer powers of the will the processes of physical decay and thus give a long and worthwhile ministry in the greatest vocation to which a man has ever been called.

Sanctify them through Thy truth; Thy word is truth; neither pray I for these alone, but for them also which shall believe on me through their word; that they all may be one, as Thou Father art in me, and I in Thee; that they also may be one in us: that the world may believe that Thou has sent me."

Obituary

REV. THOMAS HENRY KIAH, A.B., A.M., Ped. D.

Thomas Henry Kiah, son of the late William and Adelia Kiah, was born in Cambridge, Dorcester County, Md.

He departed this life Wednesday, 1:15 P. M., December 30, 1936, in the Peninsula General Hospital, Salisbury, Md.

The life of Prin. Kiah falls into three periods. The period of growth and preparation. The period of pastoral service in the Christian ministry of the Delaware Conference. The period of principalship of P. A. Academy.

Through his own efforts he made his way through P. A. Academy and Morgan College, and took postgraduate courses at Columbia and Cornell Universities. Graduating from college he married Miss Mary Roberta Townsend, June, 1906.

God blessed this union with six (6) children—five (5) boys and one (1) girl—Brewington, Lycurgus, Waldo, Gregary, Rodelia and McQuay. This happy union was broken Oct. 7, 1918. Mrs. Mary Roberta Kiah was not, for God took her.

June 8, 1921, Prin. Kiah married Miss Cynthia Ola Powdrill. God blessed this union with five (5) children, two (2) boys and three (3) girls—Cynthia, Thomas Henry Jr., Humphrey, Gwendolyn and Grace.

Prin. Kiah was converted early in life. From the time of conversion until his translation, there was never any note of uncertainty in his Christian profession.

In his early life he was impressed with the thought of the ministry as a possible calling. His conviction deepened the childish impression. He was licensed to preach, and sent to pastor Oakville, Md. at the age of seventeen (17) years.

During this pastorate he enrolled as a student in Princess Anne Academy. Graduating from P. A. A. he entered Morgan College. While in college he pastored Ocean City, N. J., a summer appointment. Graduating from college he was sent to St. Michaels, Md. It was when he had reached the zenith of his ministry at St. Michaels that Dr. J. O. Spencer, President, and the Board of Trustees of Morgan College, called him to the Principal-ship of Princess Anne Academy.

Prin. Kiah's ministry was one of fullness and helpfulness. As a pastor he was eminently strong and faithful, and was an industrious and stimulating force in the social activities of the Church, to which also he ever gave a wise leadership.

Prin. Kiah was a great preacher, a preacher by native instinct as well as by the divine call. He was possessed of very considerable imaginative

power and strong emotions, but by force of will he held these gifts somewhat in abeyance, in the interest of the intellectual character of his pulpit and educational work.

It was in his preaching that Prin. Kiah found the fullest scope for the exercise of all his varied powers. His sermons were always the reflex of his own broad and generous nature, fair and stately, in form, and vivified by an ever fresh supply of spiritual life.

He was a mighty expositor of the scripture in his ability to draw out the main teaching of the word and present the fundamentals of doctrine in their simple grandeur. Scores of all classes have been lifted, comforted and edified by the sermons, addresses, private counsels and special hearttouch of this greathearted man.

The two great wings by which Prin. Kiah soared to the exalted heights of his usefulness and power as a minister and as an educator were his well balanced qualification as minister and educator. His administration as an educator commands profound respect. He displayed the fine tact of governing without any self assumption.

He was deferential to the feelings of those about him, and was incapable of cherishing ill toward any one. Faculty, students and the general public alike felt the charm of his superior mind.

His consecrated life, his intellectual force, and his ample learning contributed a mighty efficiency to his administration. No administration of the school's existence ever brought to Princess Anne Academy a more unselfish spirit, a more thorough devotion and consecration.

Prin. Kiah's nature was a sympathetic one—he felt for all who lack or suffer. Especially did he interest himself for the education and equipment of young people. The three periods of his life are so related that any statement must include them all. Each one of us will think of him under special aspects. Some of us will think of him as a fellow laborer working side by side in the service of the Church.

There are those here who will recall him with tenderness as their educational father, their principal and president, stimulating them to higher ideals of scholarship and usefulness. They will always acknowledge that the touch of Prin. Kiah is still upon them, and that his influence upon them for good is still abiding.

There are others here who look upon him as their colleague, their big brother in the Christian ministry of the Delaware Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1916 the brethren of his conference honored him with an election to the General Conference, an honor repeated in 1920, 1924 and 1928.

In the General Conference he was elected a member of the Book Committee of the M. E. Church, and served two quadrenniums with honor and distinction. Prin. Kiah was a friend of the minister, he was a friend of the laymen, he was everybody's friend. His nature and culture were peculiarly adapted to win the confidence of all people, white and colored.

Prin. Kiah's personal life, his worth as a husband, father and brother, towered above all his active labors, and shed a beautiful luster on his ministerial and educational toils.

The Academy had two (2) disastrous fires, destroying the dining hall, Men's dormitory, two (2) other buildings and badly wrecking the principal's home. This did not daunt his courage. With indomitable will he went to work and Phoenix-like more stately buildings rose from the ashes.

I bid you turn your eyes toward the Academy for a moment, and see the changes that have come since Prin. Kiah went there. It was advanced from high school grade to that of Jr. College, from Jr. College to a four (4) year standard college.

It was not the principalship of P. A. Academy that honored Thomas, Henry Kiah, but it was Thomas Henry Kiah who lifted the office in honor before the Church and the State of Maryland. He achieved in two (2) great ways: in character and service. Who is there among us equal to the task of estimating the measure of the influence of this servant of God and servant of humanity?

An eminent preacher once said: "There is but one light that will never grow dim; it is the light of this world—Jesus Christ. There is but one power that will never wane, it is the power of the Spirit of God. There is but one love that will never perish from the earth; it is the love of the Lord Jesus Christ." This light, this power, this love, all were embodied in the person of Thomas Henry Kiah, because his was supremely a life of faith in the Son of God.

It doesn't matter much when, or where, or how a man dies, the thing that determines his value to family, Church, community, State and Nation, is how, when and where did he live?

Prin. Kiah lived well, he died well.

Prin. Kiah's domestic relations were happy. He was a faithful husband. His first and second marriages were of those rare and beautiful companionships to which death itself can set no bounds, and which the infinite love has marked with his own eternity.

His children were tenderly, almost passionately, loved, and their growing lives were watched with incessant care and jealous guardianship.

A grief stricken wife, eleven (11) children, a twin brother, Rev. J. A. Kiah, Treasurer of the Delaware Conference, and pastor of Shiloh M. E. Church, Crisfield, Md., one (1) grandchild, Dolorous Hughes, and many relations and friends mourn their loss. The tender sympathies and prayers of ministers and laymen of the Delaware Conference, and thousands of friends, white and colored, go out in behalf of the sorrowing family.

LEVIN WASHINGTON MOLOCK.

The Rev. Levin Washington Molock was born to Levin W. and Mary L. Molock, August 9, 1888, at Ayres, Maryland; and departed this life September 10, 1936, at Seaford, Delaware.

He surrendered his life to Jesus at Waters Chapel M. E. Church, Ayres, at the age of 15 years, thus making a Christian pilgrimage of about thirty-three years. Many parishioners will rise up in that day and call her blessed.

In November, 1910, at Salisbury, Md., her husband, the Rev. I. H. White, passed away. RESOLUTION ON EDUCATION OF OUR MINISTRY.

WHEREAS, The General Conference has constantly placed special emphasis on the education of our ministry, as is being done elsewhere throughout the country; and

WHEREAS, The requirements for admission to our Annual Conference is increasing so that "Beginning with the Fall Conferences of 1938 the minimum requirement for admission shall be graduation from an approved College." We therefore deem it essential that those who are to teach this group of intelligent young men that they themselves should continue their habits of systematic study so as to be able both to lead wisely and supervise correctly the educational activities of all those placed under their care. Be it

RESOLVED, That all persons appointed by the Bishop during this quadrennium be required to pursue at least 3 Graduate courses offered by the Commission or similar courses offered by institutions recognized by the University Senate, and that failure to do so will be construed as sufficient grounds for the removal by the Bishop from the Board of Ministerial Training. Be it further

RESOLVED, That it would be a fine gesture if every District Superintendent enroll in one or more graduate courses, as an earnest of his own interest in graduate work and as a practical example and effective method of aiding graduate work throughout the Church, and we do so recommend.

RESOLVED, That we request the printing in the Minutes of 1937 the resolution on "Graduate Seminar" of the Minutes of 1936, page 605, and

the appointment of a Graduate Committee by the Superintendents for each district.

"Graduate Seminar."

RESOLVED, That we offer to all students who have completed the Conference Course of Study and any others who may desire it a Scholarship to the Summer School. This Scholarship includes the payment of registration and board for one week at the School.

The above Scholarship will require of the student the election of one or more of the graduate courses offered by the commission and a minimum of 8 hours a day of intensive study during the period designated.

2—RESOLVED, That we request the Publishing Committee of our Conference to publish in the Minutes—The graduate courses offered by the commission on Conference Courses of Study.

Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:

(1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.
