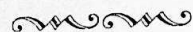
May we feel again our hearts "strangely warmed". May our Father's richest blessings be upon the Conference and abide with us continually.

#### Stewardship.

Is there anything in the gospel more inclusive than the teaching of stewardship? Or anything more necessary to the life of the Church today than proportionate paying to God what is His due? It includes all that we think of as consecration, worship, and service. It includes us and all that God has given us. We should therefore return to Him these gifts for the establishment of His kingdom in the earth.

Efforts have been made to give ourselves to God, but not all that we represent, in prayer, and possessions. We have attempted to divorce ourselves from our possessions, to give ourselves to God, but to withhold our means.

God has given Himself to us with all of His creation. "All things richly to enjoy," and there should be no holding back on our part. A consecration that is not entire is not complete. We cannot honor God apart from our substance, and we cannot serve both Him and mammon.

The dedication of ones self with all that he represents for the glory of God and the establishment of His kingdom, is what is meant by stewardship.

Some think of stewardship only in terms of money. They emphasize tithing and proportionate giving, and seem to forget the value of personality and prayer. Others do not believe in stewardship of possessions, especially in tithing or proportionate giving. They say they own, and therefore have a right to do with their own what they will. These latter forget that God is sovereign and owner of all things, even of us.

Tithing has been thought of as the christian standard of giving, but a tithe is much less than the Christian standard. The unchristian Jew pays tithes and offerings. He is constrained by law. Christians are, or should

be. constrained by love, faith and interest in Christ's kingdom and should do far more than an unbelieving Jew.

Zacchaeus gave the half of his goods. Matthew gave up a lucrative position. Peter, James, and John gave up a prosperous business. The early Christian church sold all and gave to the cause they loved. Paul gave up his home, and his earthly inheritance, and even his life for the cause he espoused and the Christ he loved. Do not the examples of these devoted leaders shame us who follow unscriptural and therefore unsuccessful methods in our attempt at an easier way?

The scriptural demand is proportionate giving—"As God has prospered you so give."

Perhaps nothing hinders church growth quite so much as some of our distasteful as well as inadequate financial methods. These disgraceful methods have driven many people from the church.

We believe in missionary work, hospitals, homes, and churches; but these must be maintained and supported. This we are not adequately doing, and cannot do with our present financial methods.

Our most prosperous churches today are those that have accepted and are practicing Christian Stewardship. We are glad to report that the number is increasing.

We commend this practice to all our pastors and people, and urge that they follow the instructions given in the 1936 Discipline page 83, par. 168, also page 154 par. 388.

A blessing is promised to all who obey and trust God. "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

#### **The Million Unit Fellowship Movement.**

The world today is in darkness and confusion. The Christian Church is designed to disperse the darkness and bring order out of chaos. It can do this if it is sufficiently aroused again to a consciousness of its God given commission. "Go into all the world and disciple all nations."

The church is God's divinely appointed institution—the channel through which he sends his message of righteousness, of justice and of peace to the ends of the earth that cause men to know Him as their Father and Friend. It now faces the most important and exacting period of its history. It is imperative that it should know God as the only practical and safe solution of the world's problems and live under His power and in His spirit. When Christ dwells in the church it is His living body—the channel of divine grace.

The church needs now more than anything else the rediscovery of the God-transforming touch of his power which answers the anguish of our times, and sends men out rededicated to save the world from strife, prejudice, hate, mistrust and lawlessness. The Million Unit Fellowship Movement is a spiritual and financial effort to meet the tremendous needs that face the church. It enables the church to speak authoritatively and effectively in saving the life of the world and bringing in the kingdom of God.

This movement enables each member everywhere to share his possessions with his Lord and the workers of Christ in the saving of the souls of men.

It empowers the church to hold the missionaries in their respective fields and stimulates them in their attempt to save all men from personal, social, and political sin.

The ministers and lay members accept the challenge offered by the Million Unit Fellowship Movement as a call from God. They make a bold attempt to live up to their responsibilities both spiritually and financially. All of the District Superintendents and a number of the pastors and laymen attended The United Methodist Council at Chicago for inspiration and information to more efficiently carry-on in their fields of labor in the Methodist Episcopal Church.

#### **Institutions and Organizations.**

##### **Home for the Aged.**

Dr. J. H. Scott has given himself unreservedly to the interests of this institution with very inadequate results. This condition ought not to be. With all his earnestness and labor very few of the pastors seem to be aroused to the needs of a Home for the Aged. Apportionments have been made and passed over unnoticed. Brethren, are we not bound to perform the wishes of the conference which we are pledged to support?

##### **Friendship Home.**

Like all the other years this has been a hard and strenuous year for Friendship Home and its sacrificing Superintendent, Mrs. E. P. Thomas. But for the dogged tenacity of this super-woman the Home would long since have become only a memory. This Institution deserves a more devoted consideration than it seems some are inclined to give. Oh my brothers and sisters let us stand by our Home, financially and morally. We take our hats off to sister Thomas for the fine work she has done under very adverse circumstances. And she does it with a smile.

##### **Education.**

Education and religion are the two pillars upon which our democracy was founded, and upon which has been erected a superstructure of government that has made this land the refuge of the oppressed of the world. The need for systematic training was early recognized by the Pilgrims soon after they landed at Plymouth. From the church has grown an institution in which one fourth of our population is enrolled. The church therefore gives every possible aid to its indispensable offspring and views with confidence its growing scope and importance.

The election of the first Negro president of Morgan College, marks a new era in the education of the Negro youth, and portends larger possibilities and confidence in Negro educational leadership and at the same time imposes upon us, deeper responsibilities in both moral and financial support. To this end we renew our allegiance and support with greater hope and confidence.

Princess Anne College, situated in the midst of a great agrarian section of the eastern shore of Maryland and Virginia, is in a position to contribute inestimable good to the agricultural and economic life of this section.

We sincerely hope that a settled policy may soon be realized by the appointment of a president to this institution so as to perpetuate, expand and emphasize the work of the school, so that its function as a Land Grant College in providing our youth with technical training, may be realized.

The Summer School for ministerial training which is held yearly at Princess Anne College offers a very fortunate opportunity to our undergraduate ministers for training and inspiration. We emphatically indorse the fine work done under the leadership of Dean F. J. Handy, and heartily commend it to all those who desire to improve their ministerial gifts and powers.

The Epworth League Institute yearly attracts the youth of our church. They come eager for study in the objectives, methods and procedures of Epworth League activities. Dr. D. H. Hargis who directs this Institute has associated with him a faculty of specialists in this field of one of the most important religious activities of the church.

Throughout the Districts, Teacher Training courses have been held for the instruction and enlightenment of our young people for religious leadership. The church realizes that if the ideals and aims of the gospel are to be lasting, they must train the youth for this responsibility. More and more attention must be given in moral and religious guidance of the future church, not only as an offset to the growing worldly diversions, but also for the cultivation of those higher ideals of life's responsibilities.

Our District Conferences have proven to be a source of great enlightenment, inspiration and christian fellowship in all communities in which these meetings are held. Their scope and influence are increasing to gratifying proportions by means of the close cooperation of all the districts.

The Efficiency Conference, which is a more recent innovation in our church, affords a preview of the year's work. The statistical data given by the ministers furnish important facts of the accomplishments of each charge. The work of this conference relieves much of the burdens from the annual session and has proved to be of vast advantage to both pastor and superintendent.

The Woman's Home Missionary Society has built for itself a unique place in our church activities. It has made itself a necessity in our practical religion. It ministers to the needs of the socially and spiritually lost. Its achievements are inestimable, and justifies its place in the church and its claim upon the uttermost of our moral and financial support.

The Woman's Foreign Missionary Society has not found very fertile soil in our conference. It never has grown well, although some women have worked hard. Too few have felt themselves called upon to dig around and cultivate the all-too-sickly plant. But the few work courageously on day by day, here a prayer and there a prayer until the Great Father has blessed the labors of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society.

The Ladies Aid Societies in the local churches are sources of wonderful social, moral and spiritual power. Happy is the church which has an active Ladies Aid Society. Many disconsolate sick, imprisoned in cheerless rooms, have had the light of the cheerful-hearted Ladies Aid Sick Committee bring good cheer, hope and love to the unfortunate of our brothers and sisters. These Societies deserve the support of the men as well as the women of the church.

### Temperance.

The church should by every righteous means at its command, labor to promote temperance in all the world; in every land, in every church of Jesus Christ. We lament deeply the awful decline of the temperance Cause which is really due to the timidity and non-resistance of the professed temperance advocates and friends of temperance. This apparent indifference has permitted the floodgates of intoxicants to be lifted letting into our fair land and upon the youth and the weak of our nation, our church and our schools, this awful scourge. To neglect the cause of temperance and sobriety is not only inconsistent with our christian vows but it exposes our homes to the ravages of its most insidious foe, which are destructive of law and order. We cannot as christians give place to this legalized monster of intemperance which seeks to destroy our home, church, school and state. It breaks every law, honors no pledge and taints everything it touches.

No nation can really profit by its unrighteous revenues which are in many instances, the price of blood. Who can heal the broken hearts of wives and mothers when the lives of their loved ones have gained for themselves years of penal servitude as their reward. Present conditions are infinitely worse than pre-repeal days; for now we see many of our girls and our bright-faced school-boys falling victims to the slimy coils of this hydra-headed monster. Sunday desecration, crime and disregard for law seem to be growing apace. The problems of the church of God are multiplied many times by the repeal of the eighteenth amendment to our constitution.

Brothers the corruption caused by the liquor trade challenges the best there is in us. Shall we stand supinely by and see this monster wreck our homes, our children, our churches. Brothers, preach as never before, live as if each day were our last. Let us up and be doing for God. He is depending on us.

We advise that all our Sunday Schools, Epworth Leagues, Junior Leagues, Young People's organizations, Ladies Aid Societies, Methodist Brotherhoods organize total abstinence leagues and clubs, to save our homes and our loved ones.

### Social Service.

The church is the great social factor which makes mankind everywhere regardless of race or difference of background, brothers in the common purpose of christian ideals and aims. Modern educators realizing how necessary an improvement and development of our social instincts are, have grouped all forms of formal secular instruction around the social studies. To be able to get along with people through an appreciation and understanding of our moral and spiritual relationships is a primary principle for all worth while service. The church realizes this fundamental principle by socializing all forms of its activities so that the brotherhood of man and the fatherhood of God may be living facts in the lives of men everywhere.

Character forming agencies such as the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., the Boy and Girl Scouts, The Girl's Reserves etc. should be greatly encouraged. Much progress has already been noted in the formation of colored

Boy Scout troops throughout Maryland and Delaware. Because of the insidious attractions which worldly pastimes offer our young people, the church must more and more provide healthful recreations and social diversions for them under proper leadership and guidance.

More attention must be given to adolescent psychology, personality traits, temperaments and youthful reactions if the youth is to be interpreted, controlled and guided. Proper recreations and right use of leisure time should be one of the objectives of the church's duty to its youthful members.

The organization of boy's and girl's clubs should be an important part of the social service of every church. Every church through its social service activities must become the master physician to prevent or cure the varying complexities and doubts which characterize the life of the youth.

#### Religious Education.

The theoretic stage in Religious Education is gradually giving way to that which is more practical and helpful. Born in the classroom, Religious Education carried with it all the marks of a theoretic and academic procedure. At first, its language was new and strange to the average churchman. Its diction of problems, modes, objections, motivation, complex, orientation, inhibitions, technique, and sublimation, were not easily understood by many hardworking and conscientious people who for years had given themselves unsparingly to the work of Religious Education in our churches. Also, there was another large class of younger people, who were anxious to qualify for this all-important and necessary work, but could find no practical way to prepare themselves for the task which they desired to do. Then we suddenly discovered that the solution to this problem was chiefly with us. We came to realize that the pastor is the logical and key man for a diversified leadership in his church. Many of our pastors in this conference are qualified to conduct leadership Training Classes, Teacher Training Classes, Daily Vacation Bible Schools, and are doing it in a very effective way in several places throughout the conference.

Then, too, we have been extremely fortunate in having the fine services of two especially trained men as Directors of Religious Education, who came to this work directly from the pastorate. In addition to the theory of the class room they brought to us the experience of the laboratory of practical life in the field of Religious Education. For several years, Dr. E. H. Brewster, of the Philadelphia Conference, rendered splendid service in this field. During the past year our own Dr. F. J. Handy has quickened and inspired us in his work in our own Institutions, Schools and conventions.

#### Evangelism.

The purpose and program of the Christian Church is to make disciples of all nations. For this cause she received her commission and power.

Whatever service the church may render to humanity, unless it is to the end that all men shall be saved from sin unto righteousness and good works, it is not genuine evangelism. Evangelism seeks to save the whole man, body, mind and soul and to bring him to full manhood and citizenship in the kingdom of God.

We live in a day of divided loyalties. "Dictators," says one, "are attempting to draw these together by submerging the personal rights and freedom of men thus stultifying and degrading personality."

We are asked to be free in Jesus Christ by a voluntary surrender of our wills to the will and purpose of Him, who is the Father and Lord of all. To bring the sons of men into such happy relationship with God is the supreme work of Christ's church.

Whether our message and method be like that of John the Baptist preaching damnation to a generation of vipers, or like that of Christ preaching the gospel to the poor, healing the broken hearted, delivering the captives or recovering sight to the blind, one thing is sure, like them we must be loyal to the God of our salvation who through Christ is seeking to reconcile a lost world unto Himself.

Men now as ever must be brought to repentance and to God through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, who is still the Way, the Truth and the Life. If we would be true to God we must seek to bring men, women and children into that way, for no man cometh unto the Father but by Him. This is not only the way to peace and goodwill among men but to peace and joy everlasting. It is the only way to an improved world order, which as a better social order is by the way of a changed human Nature. The power to change human lives resides not in man but in God. We may be the voice crying in the wilderness but God must give the increase.

There have been few periods in the world's history when a revival was needed more than today. Did England and the church of that land need an Aldersgate experience two hundred years ago more than we need it today?

Does our branch of the Christian church, born of "A warm Heart" and with an evangelistic passion, realize that her fire is burning low and that her zeal for souls is abated? Are we concerned about the more than fifteen thousand children that left our Church Schools in the last fifteen years, and the eight thousand full members from our church rolls in the same time? What about the nearly one million on their way out through the inactive list? Is it easier to put them on that list than it is to put them back into the fold? Who shall give an account for them? In whose charge were they left? What does the parable of the lost sheep teach? Did He not mean it for the Delaware Conference, the Methodist Episcopal Church, and for the Christian world? Yes, and he is speaking it again today through the closed churches, empty pews, shortened membership lists, lengthened inactive lists, and the infrequency of seekers at our altars.

"O Zion haste, thy mission high fulfilling,  
To tell all the world that God is light,  
That He who made all nations is not willing  
One soul should perish, lost in the shades of night."

#### Conclusion.

We close this combined report with a feeling of the deepest appreciation for the hearty cooperation and brotherly attitude of our ministers with whom we have labored with sympathy, understanding and mutual appreciation. We are grateful to our Heavenly Father for the blessings that have

come to them and to us. While our people have suffered because of the long-existing depression, they have not been lacking in christian fortitude and faith in our Heavenly Father. Through this unflinching faith the church faces the future with hope and confidence.

#### DOVER.

With a deep sense of gratitude to Almighty God for manifold blessings, I present my first annual report of the Dover District. I want to express my heartfelt thanks to the ministers and laymen of the district for their most cordial reception of myself and family, and for their splendid co-operation in Kingdom-building during the year. Their fine spirit and sacrificial service have made possible this report. It has been a real pleasure to work with them.

The District Stewards Meeting was held at Laurel, April 20th. It was largely attended, adequately entertained, and highly inspirational. South Berlin was the gracious host to the Epworth League and Sunday School Convention. Under the leadership of the Rev. W. L. D. Lyght, Smyrna covered itself with glory in the entertainment of the District Conference. Milford took excellent care of the Efficiency Conference.

Leadership Training Classes were held at Dover, Millington, Chestertown and Smyrna. Mid-winter Institutes were conducted at Chestertown, Dover and Laurel. Daily Vacation Bible Schools were held at Millington, Dover, Berlin and Fairlee.

Dr. F. J. Handy, Conference Director of Religious Education, gave inspiration and impetus to several of these meetings, being in charge of some of them, in addition to rendering invaluable service in a number of our charges.

#### Deaths.

The Rev. Wm. H. Hayman, pastor at Trinity, passed to his reward in May, and the Rev. W. T. B. Devron, pastor at Townsend, was translated late in October. The Revs. J. H. Nutter and W. E. Marks have prepared suitable memoirs of these respective brethren.

#### Charges.

BRIDGEVILLE has advanced under the leadership of Dr. J. R. Waters. He is still a strong preacher. All collections taken and in advance of last year. The membership also was increased.

BRIDGEVILLE CT. This charge is capable of doing good work. T. E. Randall is the pastor, and has wrought well. Accessions and collections advanced.



CHESTERTOWN, once a strong station, now handicapped by debt, has manifested heroic spirit. The debt has been reduced, and conference collections advanced over last year. W. H. Coffey is the energetic pastor.

CHESWOLD. F. T. Johnson went to this charge last year, and has had success. A great revival was held resulting in many conversions and bringing new spiritual life to the charge. The young people have been organized, and are doing commendable work. All collections have been taken, and show considerable increase over previous years.

CLARKSVILLE has had a good year under the leadership of F. Donald Jones. The churches are spiritually alive. Accessions, 11; restored to roll, 16. The charge is well organized. The church at Selbyville was renovated by adding a vestibule, putting in electric lights, painting, and the floor carpeted. Also, the road leading to the church was rebuilt by the officials under direction of the pastor. There is an increase in conference collections.

COLEMAN has had a great revival. In fact, the revival spirit has been present in this charge most of the year. The results have been very gratifying. The church is well organized, and continues as a strong station. J. H. Nutter, pastor.

CRUMPTON. The pastor, L. W. Pinkett, was sick for three months, but is now able to take care of the work. However, there has been a wholesome increase in World Service and other conference collections.

DELMAR has had a revival resulting in 16 conversions. The Church building has been renovated. The report shows splendid increases along all lines. C. L. Trader the pastor, has been successful in organizing his people and adapting his program to their needs.

DOVER. Whatcoat has had another great year, with O. H. Spence as its energetic and efficient pastor. Here every detail of the church program is looked after. The pastor keeps his people alert and active by presenting to them Methodism's whole program, and by leading them in the realization of many of its ideals. The Community Center, recently opened in Dover for the care and protection of the youth is largely due to the efforts of this pastor and the people of Whatcoat. Two of the most active organizations in the church, spurred on by keen, yet friendly, rivalry in church and community activity are the Ladies Aid Society and the Methodist Brotherhood. These two organizations have raised for church purposes more than \$300.00 each. Ministerial support in full, and proportionate division made for pastor, district superintendent, conference claimants and Episcopal fund. The parsonage is being renovated, cost of the same being paid as the work is done. There is thirty per cent increase in World Service and all conference collections.

DOVER CIRCUIT shows signs of progress. Under the leadership of their pastor C. W. Winder, they have centralized their worship, and other activities at Brinkley Hill, Camden, Delaware. This has proved to be a wise action.

FAIRLEE. This charge has had two pastors this year. K. L. Jackson was taken from here and sent to Townsend late in December, following the death of W. T. B. Devron in October. F. R. Richardson was sent from Galena to Fairlee at the same time. The charge has advanced the collections.

GALENA graciously received W. O. Turner when F. R. Richardson was sent to Fairlee. The change has worked well, and Galena goes forward.

An independent congregation at Georgetown, Delaware, under the pastorate of M. J. Pettyjohn, made a request to be taken into the fellowship of the Methodist Episcopal Church by becoming a part of the Delaware Conference. They have met all the disciplinary requirements and have been received. This is a very promising little work.

HARRINGTON increased its World Service and other conference collections. There has been an increase in membership also. M. V. Waters, pastor.

LAUREL, with B. B. Carson as pastor, has renovated its parsonage by painting and by adding a bathroom. A substantial amount has been paid on old debts, in addition to paying the cost of improvements.

LAUREL CIRCUIT. This charge has been supplied by J. J. Mitchell, since late in December, when W. O. Turner was taken from here and sent to Galena. There has been an increase in ministerial support and conference collections.

LEWES has had a successful year. All causes have been presented and collections taken. Accessions 10. The comfort of the parsonage has been enhanced by the addition of a bathroom, the cost of which has been paid. K. S. Stewart is the pastor.

LINCOLN. This potentially strong charge continues the even tenor of its way. Its report is about the same as last year. J. O. Lockman, pastor.

MARDELA SPRINGS has had a good year under the leadership of W. E. Marks. The work is well organized, and the program in the interest of the young people, led by L. C. Johnson is a very helpful one. Increase in World Service, ministerial support, and other collections.

MELITOTO. For three years G. S. Jacobs has labored heroically at this point and has achieved success. There has been quite an increase in World Service and all conference collections. The work is well organized.

D. G. Waters is the faithful pastor at St. Paul's, MILFORD. He has worked hard, not without success, to lift Milford to a higher level. A strong and conscientious pastor and preacher presents a creditable report to the conference. The charge had a very helpful revival, resulting in ten conversions. All causes presented and collections taken.

MILLINGTON continues to advance under the leadership of M. O. Ballard. This charge was helped by having a Vacation Bible School conducted by the pastor. World Service and Ministerial support advanced.

NASSAU, with R. W. Thomas, pastor, has advanced ministerial support. All causes presented and collections taken.

NEWARK presents a report which shows an increase over the previous year. All collections taken. W. W. Brown, pastor.

NORTH BERLIN. Here we have our largest membership of the district, a beautiful church building, and a well-appointed parsonage. Great possibilities are here. J. H. Stevenson, the pastor, is highly respected by his people and the entire community. They have loyally followed his leadership.

POMONA. This strong charge has been led on by C. D. Gerald as pastor. A splendid report shows increase along all lines. Ministerial support is advanced, and World Service shows a substantial increase.

PORT DEPOSIT continues to do well, with George Johnson as pastor. Large advances in ministerial support, World Service and other collections. Membership also is increased.

ROCK HALL is spiritually alive, and a good year's work has been done. J. O. Stanley, the pastor, is looking after the charge's obligation to the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension. Other collections have been cared for.

SASSAFRAS. This charge has been blessed with a revival. Conversions, 30; accessions, 7. The report shows an increase in World Service, ministerial support and other conference collections. J. E. Clark, pastor.

SEAFORD, J. H. Hubbard, pastor, reports \$20.00 for World Service, and \$20.00 for other benevolences,—quite an increase over last year. Ministerial support was considerably advanced.

SHARPTOWN has advanced with J. L. Davis as pastor. This charge ranks second in membership on the district. Accessions, 28. World Service and other conference collections in advance of last year.

Death has taken its toll. Those who have finished their earthly career Mrs. E. Z. Heath. A suitable memoir to her will be prepared by Rev. D. R. Fletcher; Rev. Abraham Chase, a retired minister finished his work February 28 at Cambridge, Maryland. A memoir to his honor will be prepared by Rev. J. A. Fassett.

#### District Meetings.

The Annual District Stewards' Meeting at Asbury M. E. Church, Easton, Maryland was notable for its fine christian fellowship and inspiration. Our laymen thoroughly enjoyed the fine fellowship and every pastor was highly gratified and inspired. Oh, the joy of the communion of saints! Brother J. S. Coulbourne proved to be a competent and affable host at an enjoyable dinner. The meeting closed with each person beaming with hope for the ensuing year.

The District Conference at Cambridge, Md. was one of the outstanding events of the year. The church was a place of floral beauty and art. 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### PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT.

By the grace of God we have come through another year of service in the Master's vineyard.

The District has been blessed in that, not a pastor has died or been seriously ill. July 24, Mrs. R. A. McCarthy was translated, and on May 4, Mrs. William Goldsborough likewise went to her well earned reward. These faithful women were devoted to God and to the service of His Church; blessed memory. Mrs. J. C. Dunn, Mrs. W. A. Johnson, and Mrs. J. N. C. Davis have been on the sick list during some part of the year.

#### District Activities.

The District and Efficiency Conferences were very inspirational and informing. The committees on Evangelism, Religious Education, Social Service, and Church Finance through their Anniversary Programs and discussions presented the work the District is doing, and should do in a most helpful manner. They showed that the Church must meet its social obligation or lose the respect and support of society. No institution can do for the world what the Church can do; for society today it is God and the Church or chaos. His way is the only way to a solution of our economic, social and religious problems.

The District is divided into six groups for the purpose of caring for the local and connectional interests of the church.

The young people's activities have gone along with some degree of added interest in the general program of the church.

The conventions and institutes as well as teacher training classes have received much help through the services of Dr. F. J. Handy, our Director of Religious Education.

The Friendship Home, supervised by Mrs. E. P. Thomas, is increasing in its ministry to those in need of care and guidance. Not only should liberal collections be taken in our District Conferences, but after collections should be taken in all of our churches throughout the Conference.

### Debt Paying Campaign.

The aggregate mortgage indebtedness on church and parsonage properties in the district is more than \$185,000. About \$82,000 of this is carried by our Board of Home Missions and Church Extension. During the year we have conducted a campaign in an effort to pay some of this money back to the Home Mission Board. The campaign brought in about \$10,000, but most of it was paid on mortgages held by banks. The effort will be continued during the ensuing conference year.

The official District Meetings held during the year were sources of great inspiration and help. They were means through which the work of the church was presented and emphasized to our pastors and people.

**REPORT OF THE MANAGER OF THE WASHINGTON AND DELAWARE  
CONFERENCES INSTITUTE AT MORGAN COLLEGE**

**August 16-23, 1937**

The Aim of the Institute, which is being conducted under the Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal Church, through the Department of the Epworth League, and by the local Commissions of the Delaware and Washington Conferences:

Is to give Christian environment, Training and direction to young people, who wish to enrich their lives under a carefully arranged program. For seventeen years the Washington and Delaware Conferences have worked together at Morgan College with a fine and consecrated staff of teachers, and a splendid corps of officers, with a selected group of young people, bringing to bear upon these young people the dream of a church that is to be where the highest ideals of the Christian life can be lived out together.

The test of this work is evidenced in the ennobled lives of thousands of young people who have come and gone from the Institute since August, 1920. And in the many revived and rejuvenated leagues, as the young people have returned to give better service.

The 1937 Institute was not the largest but it was more ideal in its student body than any we have ever held. There were forty-seven between the ages of eighteen to twenty-four; seventeen between fifteen and seventeen; two between twelve and fourteen; and twenty-three adults. All were either junior or senior high school, normal school or College students. Thus bringing a high degree of intelligence to absorb the program and to make their own contribution to Christian thinking and living together.

The Faculty and the Commission are a fine body of consecrated Christian men and women, with an earnest desire to help young people build a better church.

The District Superintendents of the two conferences are members of the Commission, and their interest is reflected in the support which the conferences give for the work of the Institute.

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## ANNUAL REPORT OF DIRECTOR OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATION IN THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE—1938

Bishop and Brethren:

I respectfully submit the following general aspects of the work of religious education in the Conference.

### (A) Conferences

Early in the year Conferences were held with each District Superintendent relative to the work of Religious Education in his respective district. Special committees were formed to outline plans. Sub-district Conferences were also held in the Dover District at North and South Berlin, Maryland, Eastern District at Easton, Centreville and Cambridge. The Salisbury District at Marion Station, Maryland and the Wilmington District at Wilmington, Delaware. These Conferences covered the months of April and May, and revealed some of the specific needs of our annual Conference which challenged us. Dr. Brewster gave a conference of two hours in which he outlined the needs as he discovered them and the means he employed to meet them.

Early in June the late Miss Sarah Green, Supervisor of children's work and Dr. N. F. Forsyth, Leadership Training Secretary set forth at a three-day conference, and in a very thorough going manner the work of their respective departments. This was a planning conference and was of great value.

In September at Chicago, a meeting of the Staff and Directors of Religious Education and counsellors met in an intensive ten (10) day study of the objectives, plans and methods of the total program of Religious Education of the Church, it was against these backgrounds that the work within the Conference was planned. A program that will require at least ten (10) years of constant conscientious study and labor to carry it forward, so that the labors of the past year should be thought of as one of orientation and introduction to a larger and an increasingly onward growing and changing program only to be completely realized in the future.

#### (B) Institutes

Daily vacation Bible Institutes were held at Dover, Delaware, Princess Anne, Maryland, and Philadelphia. Out of these developed Daily Vacation Bible Schools held on the charges in the Conference, many of which were of a very high order, and judging from the reports already sent in, hundreds of young people registered in these schools. Other meetings were held at Philadelphia, Montclair, Newark, Orange, New Jersey.

The institute at Morgan College deserves very special mention, both in the character of its program and the quality of work done.

#### (C) Youth Conference

In addition to the five District Epworth League and Church School Conventions which are in reality youth conferences, and should be designated as such, there were three, (3) special conferences of young people held at Dover, Delaware and Middletown, Delaware.

In each instance, a very creditable piece of work was done. There was also a conference at Princess Anne in which over 300 young people gathered in a mammoth conference at Princess Anne College.

#### (D) Leadership Training Classes

This type of work represents, I think, the watershed of the entire undertaking. Here you will find both youth and adults concentrating on some one or more of the very worth while endeavors. In the first and second series, courses in Religious Education, young and older people are led by a group of intelligent and conscientious teachers. Classes were held at Middletown and Wilmington, Delaware, Bridgeton, Atlantic City, N. J., Philadelphia, Pa., and Morgan College. Each of the above mentioned points were rally centers around which other charges sent representatives, so that a very wide area within the conference was covered and hundreds of young people engaged in systematic religious training. There were two other very ably-conducted classes at Chestertown, Md., and Germantown, Pa. In the former case, Rev. Kelly Jackson was the accredited Dean and in the latter, Brother Staten, a layman of Jones. These were standardized schools and represent in program and character the type of work which should be carried on in the local church as well as on the district.



### (E) Curriculum and Allied Objectives

Other essential and very definite objectives in Religious Education are "Curriculum Building," "How to increase Church School attendance," "The work for Pastors Church School Superintendents," "Training Youth Leaders," "Local Church program of Religious Education," emphasis on study of school, "The social program of the church," "Missionary and Stewardship problems of Education," "Men's work and the like." In place of specific training along these lines because of lack of time, considerable literature was distributed and sold on these subjects at a very low cost through the Conference, and in addition there was distributed as a circulating library from my own book shelves, such books on Religious Education which were not available otherwise, but books necessary for those interested in the subject.

### (F) Sunday Services—Addresses

Sunday and mid-week were employed in preaching and giving addresses. I attended every Church School and Epworth League convention, and every District Conference, and other special meetings and Conferences. Every point in the Conference has been visited either through groups or personal contact, and if any charge was omitted, this was because the calendar had only 365 days, and it was humanly impossible to do otherwise.

Special emphasis should also be mentioned of the character and quality of the worship services which were specially planned to meet the local situation, and conducted with intelligence and reverential attitude by all participating. Throughout the entire year as one went from place to place, there was revealed an earnest and sincere effort to seek and find Jesus' way of life.

### (G) Rally Day Offerings

The challenge which came to the conference from the Board of Education at Chicago—that we demonstrate our interest in the program of Religious Education by assuming a very definite financial obligation has been met magnificently. There was raised this year for Rally Day nearly \$1700—more than twice as much as was raised last year, and  $3\frac{1}{2}$  times as much as in previous years: the smallest charge as well as the largest sent in its quota, regularly and systematically, so that at no time during the year was there any embarrassment. The Treasurer was able to meet the financial demands month by month and close the conference year with every bill paid in full.

### (H) Statistics

In order that we might have before us a definite picture of our needs, so as to build a program in the coming year sufficient to meet these needs, I sent to every member of the conference a questionnaire touching certain fundamental questions and problems as they related to our youth constituency. The answers returned were revealing, and indicate something of a serious challenge presented to us. 162 cards were sent out, with a return

card containing the answers. 102 cards were returned—this gives us a fair cross-section of the work done for our young people, as well as indicating some goals not yet achieved.

There were 28 vacation Church Schools conducted. The period employed was from 10 days to 6 weeks. There were 1800 young people in these schools and 150 teachers, whose services were voluntary; only \$421.00 was spent for paid teachers.

The character of the work varied from the simplest form where Bible stories were told to the more elaborate program which covered the entire work of Daily Vacation Bible Schools.

These schools present a partial answer to the problem; What is being done for the children?

There were 30 Leadership Training Classes in which both the first and second series courses were used. The number of young people attending these classes was 500.

The Annual Conference minutes for 1937 reports a gain in S. S. enrollment of 434, over 1936, the answers to the questionnaire on S. S. attendance indicates at the time of the writing of this report a gain of 414 for the present year. This is a very difficult problem to determine, because so many factors enter which makes accuracy almost impossible; it is a fair and conservative estimate to assume that there were no losses in S. S. last year as a whole, though some churches reported a decrease. The Epworth League reported a gain of 78 for 1936 & 37 and the Junior League a decrease of 352 during the same period. The statistics for both the Epworth League and Junior League indicates neither losses or gains during the current year.

There were only seven camps conducted for boys and girls. Other activities for young people included a few recreational centers, clubs, dramatics, forums, community night, and the like.

Need was expressed for better trained teachers, better recreational facilities, closer cooperation between the church school and the church itself, specific training for children, and emphasis on worship for the different age groups, and more and better trained leaders.

There is therefore no illusion as to the seriousness of our problem and the need of a very definite program of Religious Education. It is a challenge commanding and imperious.

#### (I) Other Activities

The Board of Education at Chicago and the Board of Home Missions worked out a plan by which some of my time should be spent in the South, in presenting the work of Religious Education in the City Institutes and the Rival Schools of Pastors. This work for a number of years has been directed in a very masterly fashion by one of the ablest and most efficient members of our group, Dr. McHughes, with whom I spent a month in one of the most delightful experiences of my life. His geniality and brotherliness, the open-hearted cordiality and responsiveness of our brethren in the South Carolina, Savannah, and Florida Conferences, as the doors of their hearts opened to the appeals of Bible truths and the program of Religious Education made work a joy and benediction; but no less thrilling and appealing has been the work in my own conference, nor less gracious and helpful our

own men. Each Superintendent gave valuable advice and unlimited service as he opened up opportunities for the work on his District. Each Pastor cooperated wholeheartedly and enthusiastically among his own people; so that, thus, encouraged we set ourselves to the task of realizing for the conference the work committed to us and also present the following goals and objectives for the ensuing year:

1. To interpret to the Pastors and Laymen the meaning of the Program of Religious Education.

2. To arouse responsibility for reaching the entire church.

3. To discover leaders for the work of Religious Education and train them for service.

4. To organize each local church as well as the District for work among the young people.

5. To emphasize the special training for all age groups—according to the program of the church.

6. To retrieve all losses in the S. S. and to plan for increasing gains yearly.

7. A planning Conference for Ministers and laymen of the Conference conducted by a member of the staff from Chicago.

8. To relate the program of Religious Education to Evangelism—Social Service—Peace & Missionary Movements, and all other enterprises at work in the community and church.

9. To promote and conduct Leadership Training Classes in local churches and on the community and church.

10. To conduct Institutes, Youth Conferences, Daily Vacation Bible Schools, etc.

11. To emphasize training in worship for all groups.

12. To emphasize and promote adult Education Movements, and to unify the entire church in this program of Religious Education.

Such is our task and objective: During the past year, I have met every appointment by the grace of God, with unfailing mental and physical strength, so that, "Neither rain nor snow, nor heat, nor gloom of night, stayed me from the swift completion of my appointed rounds."—and I stand now at the bar of the Conference awaiting orders.

## ANNUAL REPORT, DELAWARE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION 1938.

One year ago the Annual Conference Board of Education undertook a more intensive supervision of the work of Christian education by asking Bishop Richardson to appoint a full time director of our work. Dr. F. J. Handy was selected as Conference director. The time was strategic. It had been decided to discontinue the Tri-Conference arrangement under the direction of Dr. E. H. Brewster. It was felt that the achievements of our former director should be conserved and the work expanded. With assistance from Bishop Richardson and Dr. English of the Chicago Board your Conference Board of Education was able to secure the full time of a capable director and the splendid work begun five years ago has gone on without any set back.

### **The Importance of Our Work**

I need not tell you that it is a short-sighted and unstatesmanlike policy to weaken the program of Christian education. The continued improvement of secular education in the public schools makes failure in Christian education even more conspicuous than in days past. Boys and girls who have the privilege to go to modern progressive schools, housed in attractive buildings, taught by trained teachers, find it difficult to become interested in church schools with poor teaching personnel, inadequate equipment, antiquated curriculum and little support from homes. Therefore, any program which seeks to raise the level of interest in Christian education throughout the Conference helps meet a real need.

### **The Development of the Needed Religious Educational Consciousness**

The best place to develop the need of religious educational consciousness is in the local church. The intensive local supervision does not make so dramatic a story as the putting on of great conferences and staging of demonstrations, but it is, in the long run, more valuable to the total program of Christian education in our Conference. It is always better to show the people who are going to continue on the job year after year how to be more effective in christianization of life than it is to go in and do the job for them, or to discourage them with standards beyond their attainment.

We can further develop a religious educational consciousness by helping people to realize that the necessary transformation and growth is a process, and for that reason, the whole church should be organized for the purpose of the construction and reconstruction of life. Missionary education, temperance education, and peace education should receive special attention from the pulpit because too often these phases of Christian education have in the past been left largely to special days, and to special conferences and interested groups.

### The Annual Youth Conference

Over one hundred young people and adult leaders of youth were registered at the 1937 Annual Youth Conference, which met at Atlantic City last April. The general theme of the Conference was, "Christ Leads, Youth Follows." Rev. Shelby Rooks, pastor of Nazarene Congregational Church, Brooklyn, New York spoke at the joint session of the Youth Conference and the Annual Conference. This session was preceded by a Fellowship banquet with guest from the Philadelphia Conference.

The emphasis of the Conference was not upon discussion but upon action. The Conference was divided into five action groups, which dealt with the following subjects: Action for Peace, Action for Racial and Economic Brotherhood, Action for Church Unity, Action for Christian Use of Leisure, and Action with Christ to the Ends of the Earth. These groups presented their findings to the assembly meeting of the Conference on Sunday afternoon, and these reports sent to the churches as a basis for study and action.

We have tried to meet the criticism that Youth Conferences create enthusiasm and interest which is soon dissipated and not directed to work of permanent value, by electing a Vice President from each District whose responsibility is to tie up the youth organizations of his district with the findings and program of the Youth Conference.

### Our New Director

Our new Director, Dr. F. J. Handy will give a somewhat detailed report of his activities in his report. We are happy to report that his work has been entirely satisfactory. He has demonstrated his fitness for the work and his consecration to the tasks of the Kingdom.

### Our Budget

Our work is supported by Rally Day Offerings and a special grant from the Board of Education in Chicago and from the Board of Home Missions. The total budget for the year was \$2025. The Rally Day Offerings were over \$1500.

The Board is indeed grateful to the pastors and congregations for the hearty support given the work. You have made it possible for the Director to travel over our Conference and to receive his support without any financial embarrassment.

### Recommendations

1. We recommend that in as much as each District must have at least two ministerial and two lay members on the Board, and as it sometimes happens that the removal of a pastor by change of appointment causes the Board to lose a valuable member, that whenever a pastor is changed to another District he continue as a member of the Board at large until the expiration of his term of 3 years.

2. We recommend that Dr. F. J. Handy be appointed Director of Religious Education for next year.

3. We note with satisfaction the movement known as "The United Christian Adult Movement" which seeks to engage adults of our congrega-

tions in a work similar to that undertaken by the Epworth Leagues and young people's organizations in the program known as "Christian Youth Building a New World." Through the new committee to be appointed at the coming meeting of the Board in May at Dover, we promise cooperation with the general interdenominational program and urge upon our churches favorable consideration of the opportunity afforded by this program for stimulating the Christian education of adults.

#### **Beginning a New Era at Morgan**

During the present school year several events of considerable importance have occurred in the life of Morgan College, making the beginning of a new era in its existence. The first was a change of administration, resulting from the retirement of the venerable, beloved, and efficient Dr. John O. Spencer. Dr. Spencer, at his retirement had reached the age of 80 years. Connected with the event was the election of Dr. Dwight O. W. Holmes as president of the College. Dr. Holmes comes to Morgan from a rich experience of thirty-five years as teacher and administrator in high school, normal school, college, and university. The inauguration of the new President was held on November 19 with impressive ceremonies.

The second event of importance was the dedication of the new stadium, which occurred on October 16. The ceremonies were participated in by His Excellency, Governor Nice of Maryland, His Honor, Mayor Jackson of Baltimore, and several other guests.

The third event of importance was the breaking of ground and the beginning of the erection of the new library. This splendid new structure, to cost \$225,000, will fill a long-felt need at Morgan College. Toward the construction of the library the State of Maryland contributed \$100,000, the Public Works Administration \$102,015, and Morgan College \$24,685, making a total of \$226,700.

It should be of interest to the Conference to know that not only have these improvements cost money, but the additions to the plant, such as the stadium and the library, will increase the current budget considerably. Morgan College is dependent largely upon the interest and generosity of the members of the Conference in this area.

#### **A Final Word**

In high heart we go forward boldly asserting the central place in our work of a living faith in a personal God who while he transcends the world he has created has revealed himself and still reveals himself to men and expresses his purpose through them.

While we must recognize that there is such an animal as a budget, and we must have a figurehead to provide ways and means to meet the needs set forth herein, let up not forget our need now is not the figurehead but a new head, a new way of looking at things. Christ's Way, a new heart; not so much money as a spiritual resurrection, not a recovery of old methods but the recovery of life.

**REPORT OF DEAN.****PRINCESS ANNE SCHOOL OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING**

The Princess Anne School of Ministerial Training has demonstrated its right to exist by the fruits it has born in the past, and its willingness to meet the Challenge of service in the future.

Four definite aspects of its work are presented.

1. The Undergraduate Department.
2. The higher standard for admission into the conference.
3. The Bishop's interpretation of approved colleges.
4. The Graduate Department.

**1 Undergraduate Department**

This aspect of our work maintains a fair degree of efficiency. The specific requirements of the Commission on Conference Courses of Study, with respect both to "The Books to be Studied" and "The Collateral Readings" are carefully carried out. Both the teachers and students have a sense of appreciation of what the Commission seeks to accomplish, and there are repeated and commendable evidence on the part of each teacher and most of the students to carry forward this educational program of the Church as required.

It should be mentioned as not without significance, that the school is practically in session ten months in the year. Even after the close of the summer session, the students through the correspondence courses are under the supervision of their respective teachers, so that both their influence is felt and guidance maintained from Conference to Conference. The values of these contacts and relationships are brought a focal point at the summer school.

The session of July 20th to 30th in addition to the pursuance of the study courses, was marked by a spiritual emphasis and feeling which expressed itself in the specially arranged worship service, the Sunday service and in the annual sermons preached by the members of the graduating class, and the general tone and character of the special lecture course on the theme, "Jesus as they Saw Him," offered by Prof. C. W. Quimby. All these created a spiritual climate which illumed our minds and endowed our hearts and memories with an enriching experience that we desired and are willing to make permanent, and to share with others.

**2 The Higher Standard for Admission into Conference**

Our Discipline for 1936, Paragraph 542, Section 2, reads, "Beginning with the Fall Conference of 1938 the minimum requirement for reception on trial in an annual Conference, shall be graduation from an approved college, except where the annual Conference by a  $\frac{2}{3}$  vote decides that it

desires to adhere to the minimum requirements set by the Discipline of 1932. "The Significance of this is quite apparent, and especially as it relates to our situation, of the 50 students who are enrolled as undergraduates. Nearly 3/5 are Supplies, (32 out of 50) only a small number would be eligible to enter the Conference on the basis of the requirements of the Discipline of 1932, which permits eligibility to two yrs. of College training; one year from now, the standard of entrance into the Conference will have been raised, as far as this Conference is concerned; added to this is the fact that a very small percentage of trained young men actually enter the Ministry; thus you have a very serious problem which we must face—The fact is that the number of accepted Supplies remains constant instead of decreasing while the number of properly trained men either decreases or remains stationary. This means that we will soon have a large number of men ill equipped for the strenuous task of our Modern Ministry, particularly in the strategic centers while our sister Churches are placing many of their best men in these same centers, who not only out maneuver us, but in some instances make successful efforts to capture our own constituency. It appears therefore, that in view of these facts and the possible unification, and certain questions which revolve around the merger that it is exceedingly important we give very careful and prayerful consideration to this aspect of our work.

This challenge comes to our entire Conference, and the Board of Ministerial Training, to whom is charged a grave Educational responsibility, awaits a mandate from you to thoroughly and carefully prepare its young ministers for the task of tomorrow.

### **3 The Bishops' Interpretation on Approved Colleges and other Allied Matters**

Our Bishops in their interpretation of the Discipline of 1936 (Paragraphs 542-2 and 546-1) present the following report.

Paragraph 546-1—All accepted supplies who have completed not less than one year of the Local Preachers course previous to the fall of 1936, may complete their work in that course, but must attend the summer school. If they are Accepted Supplies and have completed the Local Preachers course, they will be required however to pursue the regular Conference course.

(Paragraph 542-2) The Bishops make a distinction between an "Accredited College" and an "Approved College" in which they only recognize Approved Colleges, that is those recognized by the University Senate of the Church. These decisions raise difficult and complicated questions to which we must give very diligent attention, lest we defeat the purpose and program of the Church, and render the entire educational system ineffective.

### **4 The Development and Continuation of our Graduate Work**

Last year about twenty-five ministers pursued graduate work. This included District Superintendents and teachers, and others who had completed the undergraduate courses, and in some cases those who had graduated from college. This was very encouraging, but a problem arises even in this case. It is the plan of the school to offer a Scholarship to those



pursuing this course with the understanding that they will continue this work after the school closes under the direction of the Commission. Some of our men accept the gratuity of the school, but do not fulfill their obligation to continue the work. This is very serious and it raises a very delicate ethical question, namely—Are these men honest?

If ministers do not fulfill their moral obligations, there is little hope for their influence.

Our graduate department is also a challenge to us, and unless it is supported our future is in doubt. We should have an attendance of at least fifty (50) men each summer from the Conferences. Lincoln University, the Schools of practical methods of the Board of Home Missions and Hampton Summer Institute, etc. are our competitors. We cannot ignore these facts and should see that a representative number of men meet at Princess Anne each year for graduate work, and pursue it throughout the year.

In view of the foregoing, I submit the following, recommendations:

1 That we accept as our standard for admission into the Conference. The Standard set by the Church, as per Discipline 1936, Paragraph 542, Section 2, and that we do not invoke the  $\frac{2}{3}$  vote, permitting us to go back to the standard for admission in the Conference as per Discipline 1932, Paragraph 101, Section 43.

2 That we request the Dist. Supt. to present to their respective Quarterly Conferences the Bishops' distinction between "Accredited" and "Approved" Colleges so as to avoid all confusion at the seat of the Conference should some future applicant for admission insist on receiving credit from an "Accredited College" instead of an "Approved College."

3 That we respectfully request the District Supts. to continue as formerly, to exercise very great care and caution in the employment of Accepted Supplies; and we further strongly urge that without any possible injury to these Supplies or without malice or forethought, where ever it can be done, that sufficient and enthusiastic encouragement be given to young men adequately trained to enter our ministry, by offering them the best possible places available, and thus encourage College and Seminary trained men to enter our ranks.

4 I recommend that this Conference appoint a Commission to be designated as a Commission to study the Educational Status of its members. That the Commission be composed of 5 members, 3 to be selected from the Board of Ministerial Training, and chosen by it, and 2 from the Conference and chosen by the Dist. Supt. That this Commission make a survey and study of the Educational history of each member of the Conference by questionnaires and other carefully devised and scientific methods, including High School, College, Seminary and University Training, that a study be made of the various possible sources from which our ministry may be recruited. That a further study be made of the economic status and possible income of our ministry as compared with the economic status and income of the professional and semi-professional classes of our groups, to the end that we may discover possible reasons for inviting young men into the ministry and answer the objection that they are not sufficiently provided for financially. It to be understood that these findings are apart from the religious and spiritual values which come from a life of sacrifice and service.

5 That this commission report to the next session of the Conference in 1939 its findings, in permanent form and request that the Commission on the 75 Anniversary of the Conference consider this report as a part of its work. That the expense for this survey and study be assumed by the Board of Ministerial Training.

I submit this my fifteenth annual report. I am grateful to all for the support given me during these years, and especially to God for His guidance and protection, and trust that this work will continue to meet the intellectual and spiritual needs of our Conference.

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#### REPORT OF WORLD SERVICE COUNCIL DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE WILMINGTON, DEL., APRIL 1, 1938.

Realizing that the Christian church is faced as never before in its history with the greatest challenge to make Christ real and known throughout the world, the challenge and privilege is ours.

The hour has come for a most serious and definite answer to the profound question—Will the church halt or go forward in the face of such world conditions such as Scepticism, Hitlerism, Facism, Communism, that are charged and surcharged with so much absorbed doctrines and militaristic spirit that it deadens the voice of the prophet of righteousness in our land? Which will the church do?

We your Committee feel that the General Church is doing much thru its various boards by way of publicity to interpret Christ to every local church membership and constituency. Christ is being interpreted as Christ for all of life, "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly," Saith the Lord.

The day has arrived when we as followers of Jesus Christ must scrap and revamp our false notions—if we have them—about the solution of the problem of winning the world to Christ.

There is much being said and heard about the World Service dollar and the transition of the terminology of World Service to the Million Unit Fellowship Movement. World Service has been defined as the name which we in the Methodist Episcopal Church give to a vast range of Christ-like work which we carry on in his name at home and abroad under at least 7 Boards, namely:—

- Board of Foreign Mission
- Board of Home Mission and Church Extension
- Board of Education
- Board of Pension and Relief
- Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Public Morals
- Board of Hospitals and Home Deaconess Work
- and the American Bible Society.

The World Service of the Million Union Fellowship dollar is being given to strengthen the stakes of Christian activity both home and abroad.

The most popular terminology therefore, in its pressing missionary outlook and adventure is the Million Unit Fellowship Movement, the name of which came about after the General Conference at Columbus, Ohio, in May 1936, after being seized by high resolves and great purposes.

The purposes of the movement is not only to be a fellowship of sacrificial gifts of money, but it is a movement in which we as Christians have the very high privilege of being seekers thru prayer and faithfulness in worship; but to become greater units of spiritual power thru Jesus Christ in the reorganization of our Young People's Departments—Church Schools, Epworth Leagues, and Jr. Leagues, making possible an Aldersgate experience.

We, the members of the council, recommend, 1st, That there shall be no let down in our effort to urge not only in the signing of the covenant cards, but to also urge the payment of the units.

Finally, The council recommends that the 2329 Units subscribed by the Local Churches and approved by the General Church last year, shall stand as our goal for next year.

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#### SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT.

As your Committee makes its report today, world conditions are disturbing; the problems arising therefrom are many. It believes however, that under the leadership of Jesus and a willingness on the part of mankind to follow his principles great progress can be made.

The Church as the Institute of humanity is expected to lead the way and broadcast the principles of Jesus and so try to mould attitudes that will contribute toward the development and enrichment of personality. We are glad to report that the Church is becoming interested more and more in the well being of man on earth.

Your Committee regrets that changes are taking place in the realm of some governments that condone violence. We are unalterably opposed to such whether it be in the form of nazism, facism, or communism. We therefore favor the democratic form of government as expressed by the phrases of the people, by the people, and for the people. The modern world has become indifferent if not agnostic to the claims of religion; it has become strangely careless as regards matters of conduct; shame seems to have been relegated to the background.

We believe there must be a revaluation of morality for there can be no satisfactory Social life without the common virtues of honesty, veracity, loyalty and justice. We note with pleasure the social legislation being gradually enacted by the nation, looking toward the welfare of our people.

Practically all of this action and interest is motivated by the desire to better the lot of the worker to provide security by protecting him from economic laws because of age, unemployment, illness, accident and death.

The unemployment situation is far from being solved: as a result many people are on relief; extended public relief often destroys self respect and initiative. The machine age that has been ushered in by scientific development is largely to blame. We are of the opinion that this condition can be met quite a deal by scientific employment. The housing situation is one of the most pressing problems facing our group; in many of our urban centers where the demolition of condemned properties have taken place there is a serious lack of houses there by causing overcrowding which is a menace to the health and morals of our people. We recommend that our Churches cooperate with other agencies in their efforts in solving this problem.

We deplore the fact that the spirit of War is in our midst, and in some sections of the world the nations are already engaged. As we sit in Conference today the nations are running their munition factories at high speed to make instruments of death. Millions of dollars have been appropriated for building ships of greater tonnage and gun power. Something must be done or else our civilization will get another tremendous set back.

We commend our government in its great Pan American efforts for peace, as indicated in the good neighbor policy that is being initiated. We recommend to our government the creation of a Department of Peace; the head of which shall have Cabinet rank and authorized to carry on a constructive program of education that will acquaint our people with causes, cost and waste of war.

We call upon our Churches to endorse the program of peace education as now being conducted by different groups. We are proud that denominational bigotry is on the decrease and that religious groups are presenting more and more a united front and bending their energies in denominational cooperation. We note with gratitude the agencies working for better Race Relations particularly the Department of Race Relations of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America; also Youth Groups that are facing the problem and speaking straight from the shoulder relative to same.

In conclusion we call upon Christians everywhere to accept and meet the challenge of all these adverse Social Conditions by making practical the ideals of Christ in all their social contacts until righteousness shall cover the earth as the waters cover the mighty deep and the Kingdoms of this world shall become the Kingdom of our Lord and His Christ.

These problems at the present time are taxing to the uttermost the wisdom of the political statesmen of the world and the wisest and best of the ecclesiastical leaders in the Church. Many plans and means have been tried and are being tried, such as education, legislation, arbitration, great armies and navies, the League of Nations, the world court, peace treaties, unification of churches, and various councils and conferences.

Yet these problems are becoming more and more perplexing and distressing, threatening the very destruction of civilization itself. Why? These awful conditions are the outgrowth of sin and selfishness in the hearts and lives of men. Not any nor all of the means above enumerated as having been tried or being tried, can get sin and selfishness out of the hearts and lives of men. Jesus Christ alone can save mankind from sin and selfishness and the manifold evils that are cursing humanity. The gospel of Jesus Christ is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth. Jesus says, "Ye must be born again." What the church today needs and must have for success in saving the world for Christ is a like experience of heart warming as John Wesley had at the Aldersgate meeting, and what the early church received at Pentecost, the baptism with the Holy Ghost. Jesus is still saying to His church, "And, behold, I send the promise of my Father upon you: but tarry ye . . . until ye be endued with power from on high." "Ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me, both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

Every preacher and every member of the church should now seek and find a rebaptism of the Holy Ghost, and become living witnesses for Jesus Christ.

The Million Unit Fellowship Movement is an urgent call to the church to go forward in the winning of the whole world for Christ.

### DIAMOND JUBILEE.

Meeting of the Committee on Procedure of the Delaware Conference Diamond Jubilee Commission at Ezion M. E. Church, Wilmington, Del., Wednesday, May 12, 1937.

The meeting was called to order by the chairman, F. H. Butler. Members present: D. H. Hargis, J. R. Waters, S. J. Horsey, J. W. Parker, F. H. Butler.

The committee after due consideration and discussion decided upon the following recommendations to be submitted to the Commission:

I. That the District Superintendent be the chairman of his District and the members of the Commission on the District, constitute the District committee and that they operate through the Sub-District Groups.

II. We note that the actual membership according to the 1937 Journal is 33,456. We recommend a campaign for 2 years culminating at 1940 session asking an amount from each member equivalent to 75 cents for each year which would amount to \$25,092 each year or \$50,184 for two years.

III. We further recommend that 25 per cent of net income raised be applied to special conference Claimants' Fund for supply pastors.

IV. We further recommend that the apportionment be made to each district and each charge within the District based on the same ratio of membership as stated above.

#### Evangelism.

I. We recommend as a minimum increase in membership ten per cent each year above deaths and withdrawals and that the Program sent down by the General Conference Commission on Evangelism be the Standard of Guidance with such modification as local conditions may require.

II. We further recommend that aside from the general appeal made each Sunday that periods be set apart for protracted efforts, that is cottage prayer meetings, house to house visitation and contacting the entire constituency in each charge.

III. We further recommend that each District and each charge be requested to organize immediately.

IV. We further recommend that one-half of the above mentioned evangelistic effort and financial work be accomplished and reported at the next session of the Delaware Conference.

### Obituary

#### ABRAHAM CHASE

Abraham Chase, the son of the late Abraham and Harriet Chase was born in Federalsburg, Caroline County, Maryland, March 6, 1887. He departed this life Friday at 1:50 P. M., January 28, 1938, at his late residence, 247 High Street, Cambridge, Maryland.

In his early life he was a sailor and farmer. At the age of 22 he was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church.

He was joined in holy wedlock to Alverta Fountain of Caroline County, who in 1893 preceded him to the glory land. He retired during the conference session at Tindley Temple, Philadelphia in 1929 after 38 years of faithful service with a record showing nothing against him.

Brother Chase and his wife went to Cambridge to live. There he joined Waugh Chapel and was a faithful member until the end.

During the present conference year when the pastor was indisposed and unable to serve his church, Brother Chase served without charge for six months.

During the last two years of his life it was noticeably seen that he was failing and this was manifested by periodic spells of weakness and dizziness. On Thursday night, January 27, 1938 the family noticed a drastic change and called his physician to his bedside. The struggle continued throughout the night, until Friday afternoon when this old war scarred veteran of many hard fought battles stacked arms at the river and said to his daughter while she wiped the dying sweat from his brow, "I love you all." ## WALTER T. B. DEVRON

The late Reverend Walter T. B. Devron was born on the Island of St. Kitts, British West Indies, May 3, 1879, and departed this life 9:00 o'clock, Sunday evening, October 31, 1937, in the Delaware Hospital, Wilmington, Delaware. He had been selected to preach the Evangelistic Sermon at the recent District Conference of the Dover District, at Smyrna, Delaware, on Thursday night. He attended the sessions of the Conference and took an active part in the deliberations until Wednesday evening. He had told some of his friends that he was not feeling so well. He went home on Wednesday night retiring in much pain. His physician was sent for on Thursday. Finding him in a very serious condition, ordered him to the Hospital. **REV. JAMES A. T. FOUST**

The Rev. James A. T. Foust, eminent son of the late James and Lucy Foust, was born in Rockingham County, North Carolina. Early in his life he was converted, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church in Reidsville, North Carolina. He entered Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina, where he completed with honors the college course with the Bachelor of Arts degree. Feeling an urgent call to the christian ministry, he entered Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Georgia, where he diligently applied himself to study, and in due course of time graduated with the Bachelor of Divinity degree.

Dr. Foust was recognized as one of the profound scholars and thinkers of the church. His early ministry was spent in the North Carolina and the Texas Conferences, where he held some of the leading charges. He knew the laws of the church and gave himself to the organization and execution of all that could tell for the best interest of fruitful results.

The church, recognizing his ability as an organizer, as well as his efficiency in scholastic attainments, and his christian integrity, called him to service under the Board of Foreign Missions in Liberia, West Africa. Here he served six years in Cape Palmas District as Pastor, District Superintendent, and as Principal of Cape Palmas Seminary. It was while he was in this service, he met and was married to the talented Miss Amanda Davis, a teacher in the College of West Africa, in the capital city of Monrovia, under the presidency of the late A. P. Camphor and his amiable wife. Unable to withstand longer the rigors of the African climate, he returned to this country for rest and recuperation.

He matriculated at Drew Seminary, Madison, New Jersey. After graduating from Drew, he joined the New England Conference, and served Revere M. E. Church, Boston, Massachusetts, now called Fourth Methodist Episcopal Church, three years as pastor. He was then transferred to the Delaware Conference, giving more than twenty-five years of service in some of the leading charges of the conference.

Feeling an urge to return to his old home in North Carolina to visit his sisters—Mrs. Jane Price and Mrs. Jersie Young—Dr. Foust decided to spend his vacation with them. It was while in the home of his sister, Jersie, in Winston Salem, the summons came, Sunday night, August 15, 1937.

Funeral services were held in Saint Paul's Methodist Episcopal Church, Winston Salem, of which the Rev. G. M. Phelps is pastor, Friday, August 20, 1937. Services were conducted by the Rev. S. J. Horsey, D.D., District Superintendent of the Wilmington District, Delaware Conference. He with his wife accompanied Mrs. Foust from Mount Holly, New Jersey, to Winston Salem. The principal address was delivered by Rev. H. L. Ashe, Superintendent of the Winston Salem District. The ministers of the North Carolina Conference acted as pallbearers. The Church in Mount Holly sent resolutions and many beautiful floral offerings in testimony of the esteem in which he was held.

# Rules of Order

## OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely: (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.



Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.
