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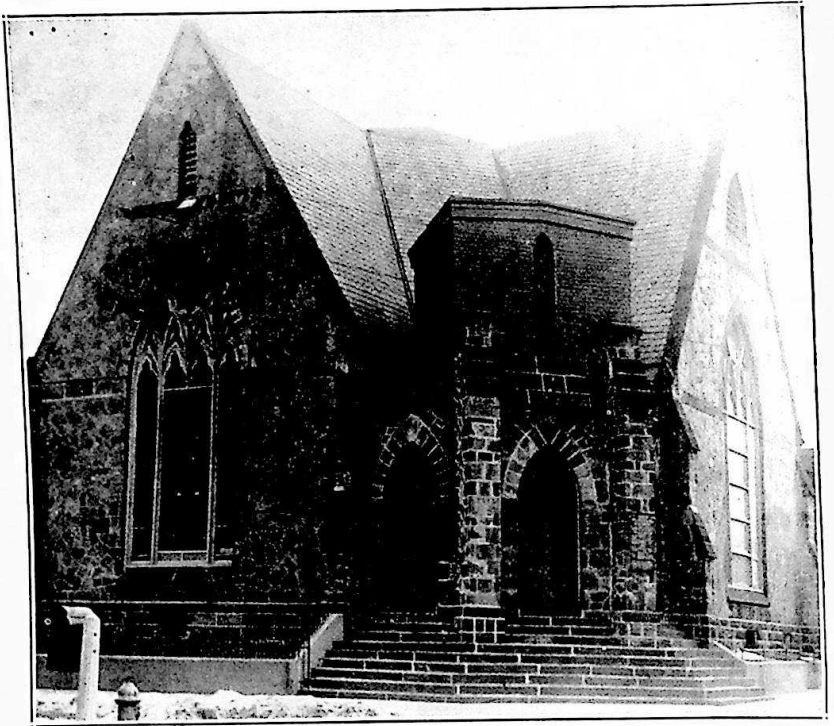
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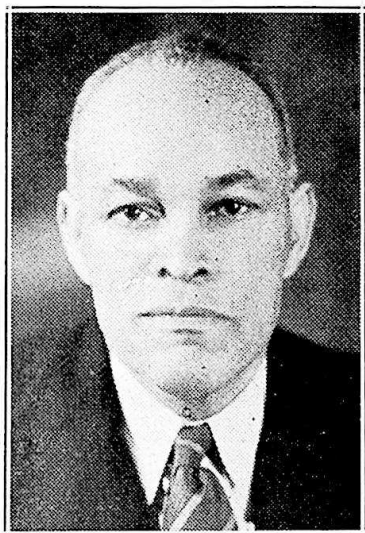

FIRST DAY, WEDNESDAY, APRIL 16, 1941

DOVER DISTRICT

Bishop and Members of the Conference:

It is with pleasure that we make this our Fourth Annual Report of the Dover District. This District covers the whole of two counties of Delaware, a small portion of the other Delaware County, one Maryland county and tiny parts of six other Maryland counties, stretching from Newark, Md. on the South to Port Deposit, Md. on the North.

To travel this District one needs a sound body, good health, an optimistic spirit, strong mentality, firm faith, good religion, and a dependable automobile. Some of these I have, others I am trying to acquire.

I have found this district to be a fine field for study. There is something in the location and the setting that is conducive to study and meditation. These things contribute greatly to the development of personality and the building of character. Hence, the stalwart characters and the loyal personalities to be found in this district. This statement applies alike to the laity and the ministry.

I am happy to note a deepening of the spiritual life of our people in several places on the District. Led by a progressive and sacrificial group of ministers, the laymen, in most instances, are rallying to the call of our new Church for a deeper interpretation of Christian duties, obligations and privileges. Some of the fruits of this are seen in a goodly number of revivals, and a greater emphasis upon evangelism, with a consequent increase in accessions to membership.

Among the number of charges sharing in this spiritual awakening are Bridgeville, Bridgeville Circuit, Chestertown, Clarksville, Crumpton, Dover, Fairlee, Laurel, Lewes, Lincoln, Mardela, Nassau, Coleman, Pomona, Seaford, Rock Hall, Trinity, and Sharptown, where on Sunday morning, March 23rd, I had the unusual pleasure of receiving into full membership forty-five persons, who had been converted in a revival conducted by the pastor and his wife.

District Meetings

These have been well attended, averaging more than two hundred. Distance does not deter, nor weather weaken the interest in these happy and helpful occasions. The District Stewards Meeting was held at Bridgeville, Del., Tuesday, April 16, 1940 and a splendid program was rendered, enthusiasm ran high, and thus our district work got off to a fine start at the very beginning of the Conference year.

The Young People's Institute, held at Nassau, Del., brought together an unusually large number of our youth. This meeting was held on the 26, 27 and 28 of June, the week following the Central Jurisdictional Conference at St. Louis, and, also the week after the closing of the public schools. This made it possible for teachers and other special workers to attend. Helpful messages, dealing with Christian Education, with lay activities and kindred subjects, were delivered by Mrs. Elizabeth Shockley, Prof. James R. Webb, Rev. R. B. Thompson, Rev. W. L. D. Lyght, Rev. M. O. Ballard, Rev. B. B. Carson and Rev. F. D. Jones.

The Youth Conference of the Delaware Conference, entertained by Whatcoat Church, Dover, Del, Saturday and Sunday, April 20 and 21, brought great inspiration to the Young People of the District. Dr. F. J. Handy, Conference Executive Secretary, delivered a timely sermon on Sunday morning to a large and appreciative audience.

Christian Education has been stressed throughout the year. Dr. Handy's leadership in this field is bearing fruit. He is ably assisted in this work on the Dover District by Mrs. Elizabeth Shockley, who has charge of the Children's Division, Rev. M. O. Ballard, The Youth Division, and Rev. W. L. D. Lyght, the Adult Division. Schools have been held at Chestertown, Md., Millington, Md., Dover, Milford, Nassau, Bridgeville, Seaford and Laurel, Del. Several charges have conducted Vacation Bible Schools and other courses in week-day religious education with good results. These schools are increasing in number, efficiency and attendance.

The District Conference was held at St. Paul Church, Berlin, Md. This was another outstanding occasion, largely attended. The Conference was highly favored by the presence of Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, D. D., LL. D., who thrilled his audience with a matchless address. He was accompanied by Dr. John W. Haywood of Morristown College, well and favorably known to all of us, who also delivered a very timely address.

But this was not all, for we were welcomed to Berlin by His Honor, Mayor W. M. S. Whaley, Miss L. Katie Henry, Rev. Dr. O. H. Connelly, pastor of the Methodist Church (white), and Prof. E. J. Williams, Principal of the Junior High School. In response to these an address was made by the Rev. W. L. D. Lyght. Other speakers on that occasion were: Drs. F. J. Handy, J. T. Fletcher, J. R. Waters and Mrs. Lavinia Jewett.

The annual sermon, closing the Conference, was delivered by one of Berlin's own sons, Rev. Dr. D. W. Henry.

The Tenth Annual Efficiency Conference of the Dover District was held at Harrington, Del., Wednesday, March 12th, 1941. The theme of the Conference, "Christian Efficiency To Meet Changing World Conditions," was closely adhered to throughout the day. In addition to the District Superintendent, the following persons addressed the Conference: Dr. W. J. Helm, Rev. J. H. Stevenson, Rev. C. S. Sprigg, Dr. F. H. Butler, Rev. R. B. Thompson, Dr. N. J. Crolley, of the Board of Pensions, Dr. L. S. Moore, Mrs. L. B. Jewett, Mrs. Elizabeth Shockley, Rev. M. O. Ballard, Rev. W. L. D. Lyght, Prof. J. R. Webb and Prof. George H. Dredden. District Superintendents Fletcher, Horsey and Johns brought words of greetings and felicitations from their respective districts.

The closing sermon by Dr. D. W. Henry was joyfully received by an appreciative audience.

Charges

BRIDGEVILLE continues to advance. The new church is being paid for in a businesslike manner. The pastor and people would like to be together another year. The church is well organized.

BRIDGEVILLE CIRCUIT, after straightening out some embarrassing conditions, is having a period of smooth sailing. This is largely due to an era of good feeling between pastor and people. The charge is organized and doing well.

CHESTERTOWN has achieved success. The pastor and his wife are hard and efficient workers. Here a difficult situation has been skillfully handled.

CHESWOLD has pursued the even tenor of its way, seemingly but little disturbed by current conditions in the church or in the world. The pastor has done his best to succeed, and deserves credit for his efforts.

CLARKSVILLE'S report will surpass that of last year. The pastor and his wife have worked with the people and they are happy.

COLEMAN has had a good year. The charge is spiritually alive, well organized, and harmony prevails. Ministerial support, world service and other benevolences have been increased.

CRUMPTON. The work of this charge and that of Barclay, formerly of the Easton District, were combined at the last conference. This was done in the interest of economy of administration, and with the hope that the people would be inspired to greater endeavor. This hope has not been realized. The pastor has worked hard.

DELMAR has renovated the church building. Iron rods have been installed to hold the building in place; asbestos shingles have been laid over the weatherboarding, and the building painted. The report for Ministerial Support, World Service and Conference Collections will equal that of last year.

DOVER still holds its place as the leading charge of the district. The friendly rivalry between the men's and women's organizations of this church

contributes much to the spiritual, social and financial life of the church. Bishop Shaw's visit and great sermon on Sunday morning, March 30, inspired our people in Dover in a most unusual manner. The report shows increase in ministerial support, and maintenance of benevolences. The old debt is reduced by \$100; with \$75 raised on improvements.

DOVER CIRCUIT, a small weak charge, looked after this year by a faithful local preacher, has done well, comparatively, exceeding last year's record.

FAIRLEE. In order to strengthen this charge, we took one of the churches of the old Melitota charge and added it to Fairlee.

The outcome has hardly justified the change. Friction and misunderstanding have conspired to defeat the forces of righteousness, so that the report is not up to the level of last year.

Many of GALENA'S best members have died, others have gone to the cities. The charge is becoming weaker all the time; it should be combined with other work. The pastor and his wife have rendered faithful service. Most of the people have supported them.

We are recommending that GEORGETOWN MISSION be connected with Trinity charge. While this year's report is better than that of the previous year, it plainly is evident that it cannot support a pastor.

HARRINGTON continues its great record of last year. The home church was renovated, a roof was placed thereon and other improvements made. The report equals that of last year in most respects. The cry is for more Lyght.

LAUREL had a good revival, succeeded in raising the largest amount of money in the Annual Mock Conference of the Laurel group, and has the honor of counting among its members the Leader of Lay Activities of the District. Ministerial support, World Service and other benevolences in advance of the previous year.

LAUREL CIRCUIT continues to go forward. The outlook is good for this small work. The pastor and his wife deserve credit for their sacrificial service.

LEWES, under the leadership of its pastor, has had another year of success. Two splendid church buildings, a modernly equipped parsonage, and a progressive people are among the assets of this charge, making it desirable.

LINCOLN has taken on new life. The people are showing more interest in the church and are more appreciative of the efforts of the pastor. There are increases in World Service, benevolences and ministerial support.

MILFORD. Some needed improvements have been made to the church. A long standing mortgage on the parsonage is to be cancelled by a gift of \$1000 by a member of the church, who died recently, making this provision in his will. The pastor and his wife deserve credit for their work, here.

Millington sends up a creditable report. The people are loyal and think well of their pastor and his family.

NASSAU still presses on to certain victory. Here we have one of our best organized charges. The pastor is well trained in head and heart for his work, and gives his best to a people who are appreciative of his services. The report shows increases in membership, ministerial support, world service, and other benevolences.

NEWARK was blessed with a revival. This encouraged the pastor and his people and a good year's work has been done.

NORTH BERLIN is in some respects our strongest charge. Its failure to register a higher standing is not easily determined. Misunderstanding may account for this in part. The report is about the same as last year. The pastor and his wife are anxious to succeed and are faithful workers.

POMONA with its new pastor has had a good year, especially at the home church. He and his young wife make safe and sane leaders for a loyal people. There are increases in all collections.

PORT DEPOSIT has experienced a hard year, but makes a creditable report for a small charge. The people like their pastor and cooperate with his efforts to help them.

ROCK HALL has greatly improved the parsonage and its surroundings. It is well furnished and comfortable. The people are working with the pastor to make a stronger charge. They are attending to their Church Extension obligations, and at the same time they are not neglecting other duties. There are increases in Membership, Ministerial Support and World Service.

SASSAFRAS is not strong enough to be alone. Several things have militated against success here. A mortgage on the property, the long continued illness and subsequent death of the pastor's wife, and the physical breakdown of the pastor himself, have broken the morale of the people and left them with insufficient strength to carry on.

SEAFORD. Under the leadership of its new pastor, this charge has been busy during the year remodeling and improving churches. New roofs were placed at Cokesbury and Mt. Hope Churches. John Wesley, in the town of Seaford, has been raised 27 inches higher and a new basement added, walls in the interior of this church have been renewed. All necessary claims on these improvements have been met, and all conference obligations carefully looked after.

SHARPTOWN gladly received its new pastor and family. The parsonage was renovated and refurnished, the pastor's salary was paid out a month ago. Ministerial Support, World Service and Conference collections considerably increased. A great revival, conducted by the pastor and his wife, resulted in 47 conversions, 45 of whom joined that church.

SMYRNA, a weak charge, getting weaker. The pastor has been sick a large part of the year. His wife has worked hard and is to be commended for her sacrificial efforts in behalf of the people. The report will equal last year.

SOUTH BERLIN has met its obligations to the Home Board. The pastor has worked hard, not without success. The people seem anxious to do well. There have been some increases.

STILL POND, now a circuit of three churches, should do well. The people rallied to the new pastor and there are improvements which reflect credit upon the loyal supporters of this work. All Conference collections considerably in advance of last year.

TOWNSEND, has done well, notwithstanding the illness of the pastor. Improvements were made to the property, the pastor took to himself a helpmate, and the charge has taken on new life. Increases in membership, World Service and other benevolences.

TRINITY is building a new church which will be a credit to the Charge and to the District. The pastor and the forward looking people insisted on coming out of the woods and building the new church in a fine location on the public road, opposite the entrance to Rosedale Beach and among the people. This church will be modern in several respects and well adapted to the needs of the people whom it is to serve. The wise planning pastor, together with the donation of his work as a mechanic and that of several of the members, have made it possible to construct this beautiful edifice to the point of its present development free of debt. All Conference obligations have been successfully looked after.

The Laymen of the District have been organized under the leadership of Prof. James R. Webb, of Laurel as lay leader of the District. Several District meetings have been promoted. The program of Lay Activities is beginning to furnish an outlet for the talents and abilities of our splendid laymen.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service is already a strong and virile organization on the Dover District. Mrs. Elsie C. Briddell of North Berlin is the efficient President. She is well prepared in mind and heart for this position. The District is especially fortunate and happy in its official personnel. In addition to Mrs. Briddell, there are: Mrs. Rella Fassett, Cor. Sec., Mrs. Clara Crippen, Rec. Sec., Mrs. Ellis Dix, Treas., Mrs. Ruth Webb, Leader of Young Women and Girls Work, and several others of similar training and preparation to lead this new organization among women and girls of the church. In a few of the charges there was a lack of understanding of the work of the society at first. This was true of some ministers as well as lay people. A small minority still holding allegiance to the former Ladies Aid Society, are not supporting the new organization as they should. Let us be patient with these erring ones and show them by our godly example that they should cease to do evil and learn to do well.

I am keenly cognizant of the inadequacy of this brief statement to reveal the self-sacrificing labors of the pastors and people of the Dover District that give meaning to this report. These are of the Spirit, and we should leave them with that Agency which "itself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered." Praise be to Him who is worthy to receive glory and honor and power: For He has created all things.

Death has gathered his year's toll in the passing of Rev. G. T. Townsend, a retired pastor who was supplying the East New Market Circuit charge who died as he lived in the service of his Lord. The Rev. L. E. Thomas surrendered his earthly stewardship as a supply on the Hurlock charge in the midst of his devoted family and loyal members. These have gone to the reward of the faithful.

The tragedy at Princess Anne College spread gloom and sorrow over Brother A. W. McBride in the deaths of his near relatives. Mrs. Anna Jones, a sister-in-law, Mrs. Letitia McBride and Mrs. Emma Wright and boy cousins of Brother McBride and a niece not expected to live. I am sure Brother McBride has the sympathy of the whole conference.

The district stewards' meeting as always a love feast of Christian fellowship and good will was a time of spiritual profit.

The Epworth League and Church School district convention which met at Oxford, Md. brought together the best of the youth of the district. Classes were formed and adequate religious instruction was imparted. Dr. F. J. Handy delivered an informing and illuminating address as he usually does and we all left for home after a two days' stay feeling intellectually and spiritually benefited.

The District Conference was held at Easton and is always looked forward to with great anticipation and in this we were not disappointed for we had a very profitable conference in every way.

The Efficiency Conference at Trappe closed our district meetings and was the climax for the year in enthusiasm and fellowship. CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT has had a year of serene and united action. Cooperation and fellowship is the watchword here. World Service \$35; other benevolences \$62; other causes \$257; for all causes \$1470. O. P. Dickerson, pastor.

CARMICHAEL has had a year of peace and tranquility, the pastor and people are happy. Bryans Chapel has been beautifully painted, some repairs to Wesley Church; the pastor is invited to return for another year. World Service \$15; other benevolences \$27; other causes \$250. C. C. Thomas, pastor. Conversions 5; accessions 5.

CENTREVILLE seems to have reached a static state and the situation does not seem very hopeful; a revival of religious interest is the great need of this point. The finances and benevolences are not up to last year, we are hoping for improvement by the end of the conference year. World Service \$15; other benevolences \$31; other causes \$315. Conversions 5; accessions 5. C. B. Miles, pastor.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT is not quite up to last year, here is needed a spiritual revitalization. World Service \$12; other benevolences \$28; other causes \$302. O. S. Edwards, pastor.

CHAPEL has completed a very fine little bungalow parsonage for the home of the pastor after the destruction of their parsonage last year at a cost of \$1400 which is nearly paid for; this charge is sorely in need of a church building which was also destroyed by fire. This is a heroic little group of people and bring up a fairly good report. World Service \$18; other benevolences \$11; other causes \$1447; conversions 4; accessions 1. W. C. Thomas, pastor.

CHURCH CREEK has been blessed with a revival which brought in 10 conversions, this has quickened the church life of the charge. The pastor and wife have been alert to all the interests of the church and the people appreciate this. World Service \$14; other benevolences \$69; other causes \$113; conversions 10. A. W. McBride, pastor.

CHURCH HILL. The pastor left his work in the midst of the year leaving the work without a pastor; the district superintendent appointed Bro. E. A. Hughes, a local preacher from Cambridge Circuit to take charge till conference. World Service \$7; other benevolences \$62; other causes \$473; conversions 6; accessions 6. E. A. Hughes, pastor.

CORDOVA is supplied this year by Brother J. G. Stevens who, upon arriving to this charge found the church in a deplorable physical condition and unfit for services. The pastor went to work to remodel the church and gather his scattered flock, they soon realized he was the man they wanted. The church has been thoroughly remodeled and presents a pleasant view inside; the afternoon of the 6th of April the district superintendent rededicated the church which was packed to the door; the offering was about \$70.00. World Service \$10; other benevolences \$16; other causes \$308; conversions 2; accessions 3. J. G. Stevens, the pastor, is urgently requested to return.

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CRAPO AND GOLDEN HILL:

DENTON has been inspired by the businesslike manner in which the pastor has addressed himself to the bonded debt of the church; with the assistance of the Board of Church Extension Society a discouraging debt has been adjusted at a saving of nearly \$600.00 to the church, and the debt adjusted so that the congregation can pay the debt off. Peace and contentment reign here. World Service \$15; other benevolences \$24; other causes \$503; conversions 3; accessions 2. W. A. Harewood, pastor.

EASTON seems to have gradually halted her pace until now she is very deliberate in the general causes of the church. This charge is capable of greater things than results show. World Service \$100; other benevolences \$86; other causes \$1152; conversions —; accessions 3. J. S. Coulbourne, pastor.

EASTON CIRCUIT has not done so well this year. The people visit around to the camp meetings during the summer when the most of the money may be gathered for the interests of the church. World Service \$5; other benevolences \$14; other causes \$375; accessions 5. E. N. Foster, pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET is growing in effectiveness, and its pastor is wide-awake to every need of a growing church; the senior and junior choirs have donned caps and gowns for the divine services of the church. An oil heater has been installed in the parsonage. Benevolences show an advance over last year. World Service \$40; other benevolences \$29; other causes \$100; conversions —; accessions —. O'Connell Milbourne, pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET CIRCUIT who lost its pastor last year by death has done a commendable year's work under the leadership of Brother Milbourne, who conducted a revival with some success. World Service \$10; other benevolences \$21; other causes \$90; conversions —; accessions 4. This charge has been divided between East New Market and Vienna. New pews have been placed in the Reid's Grove Church giving more comfort and beauty to the building. O'Connell Milbourne, pastor.

GREENSBORO has maintained her excellent report of other years and brings up a good report. World Service \$100; other benevolences \$138; other causes \$935; grand total \$2429; conversions 8; accessions 6. The Ladies Aid reports \$555 for the year's financial program of the church. J. O. Griffin, pastor.

HURLOCK notwithstanding this charge lost its pastor in the middle of the year they have carried on very well under the leadership of J. I. Williams, a local preacher from Ridgely, and under the circumstances send up a commendable report. World Service \$36; other benevolences \$41; other causes \$74; conversions —; accessions —. J. I. Williams, supply.

LINKWOOD reports a fair year's work. This is a farming section and a part of the year there is no work to be had and thus the work of the charge is handicapped. World Service \$20; other benevolences \$30; other causes \$135; conversions 2; accessions 2. J. E. McBride, pastor.

MARYDEL has had a year of peace and understanding and some advancement has been made; the spiritual life has improved; one of the churches has been renovated and made more comfortable. World Service \$14; other benevolences \$17; other causes \$400; conversions 13; accessions 2; grand total \$1184. F. R. Richardson, pastor.

McDANIEL has been hard hit for the lack of employment, the people have been out of work for a greater part of the year and this greatly hindered the work of the church but the people have kept their heads up. World Service \$9; other benevolences \$25; other causes \$111; conversions 1; accessions 1. E. W. Holden, pastor.

MILES RIVER has not come up to the expectations of the pastor although he has worked hard to realize his hopes, but under the circumstances they have done fairly well. World Service \$12; other benevolences \$23; other causes \$118. Clarence Wilson, pastor.

OXFORD has had a fairly good year although the oyster season gave poor returns. Sixty per cent of the oyster yield was formerly sold to the Canadian markets but the war cut off the avenue of income and left the people with nothing to do, but the courage and wisdom of the pastor just would not be defeated and a fair report is the result. World Service \$20; other benevolences \$14; other causes \$735; conversions 4; accessions 2. L. F. Hodges, pastor.

FEDERALSBUG is a bee-hive of activity, every department is at work led by a wide awake pastor. All departments are alive and have shared in the very commendable report for the year. Many young people have become interested in Christian work and are wholeheartedly giving their services. A revival in the midst of the year greatly quickened the life of the church. A bath room has been installed in the parsonage and paid for. An old bonded debt on the church is gradually being liquidated; the people are contented and happy and so is the pastor. PRESTON is a strong charge but has not given full strength to kingdom building and social uplift although the pastor has done what he could the results do not measure up to expectations and ability. There are many young people here who should be integrated with the whole program of the church and become a potent factor in development of christian character. RIDGELY has greater ability than the results show; if the unused strength of this charge could be made effective the church and the kingdom would be advanced. The charge reports World Service \$15; other benevolences \$20; other causes \$275; conversions 10; accessions 2. W. A. T. Miles, pastor.

ROYAL OAK reports another commendable year's work for the Lord's cause. This charge has two among the best choirs of the district. They were trained largely by Mrs. Spellman and her daughter, Madaline, who is the organist. The charge is very well organized and the members love to do their work. STEVENSVILLE is a strong charge of three churches and if properly conducted can do a fine piece of work, however a fair year's work is reported. World Service \$54; other benevolences \$17; other causes \$230; conversions 2; accessions 4. S. R. Miles, pastor.

ST. MICHAELS has had a stormy year, the trouble centers around a little group which has caused trouble with many former pastors and thus has retarded the work of the kingdom. The pastor has played the part of a Christian gentleman and comes through with a fairly good report all things considered. World Service \$35; other benevolences \$40; other causes \$572; conversions 10; accessions 5. R. S. Johns, pastor.

TAYLORS ISLAND is not inclined to follow leadership but is a law unto itself, hence the work of the kingdom is often retarded, in some cases rendered abortive. The pastor and his good wife have done their best under the circumstances. Report was not in time for publication. Van B. Wright, pastor.

TRAPPE has covered herself with glory for the old Trappe has gone and has become a new charge, so great has been the transformation. Both races are loud in their praises of pastor Hamilton. The church and parsonage are now side by side on the same side of the main vehicular artery between Cambridge and Claiborne Ferry to Baltimore through Easton. Listening to you, we realize that the Baltimore Area, the Central Jurisdiction, and the Methodist Church are but a "Noble Experiment," in the realm of brotherhood, and interracial goodwill. Signs indicate that this experiment may lead to a happy realization by the grace of Him, who of one blood hath made all the nations to dwell together upon the face of the earth. To this end we set ourselves, and pledge to you, and all our leaders, our loyal support and heartiest co-operation in whatever plans or programs you may project for the good of the church and the advancement of the Christian Cause.

We further pledge you, that the Baltimore Area, so far as the Delaware Conference is concerned, will be kept to the fore in all the essential requirements of the Church. We believe, that through you, we shall receive such consideration, and representation as our faithfulness and work may merit.

The Church and Its Task

The superintendent and members of the Philadelphia District realize the seriousness of the responsibility that rests upon us in these days, when not only the life of democracy is threatened, but the very life of the Church itself.

Perhaps, the world never needed, more than it does today, a great spiritual force to allay its fears, extirpate its greed, eradicate its hate, exterminate its strife, and bring in a glorious reign of peace, brotherhood and love, based in the teachings and life of the Prince of Peace, who is Lord of lords and King of kings.

There is now in the world an institution, and a force for the eradication of evil and the bringing of good, but these stand greatly in need of revitalization. They are the Christian Church and the Christian Religion. They are here but are not as vitally operative in the life of the world as they ought to be. Our program for Social Betterment, through Christian Education and Evangelism, has lagged. We have allowed other institutions and forces to come in, develop, and spread, until, in some places, they have almost blacked out that institution and force which was meant to save life, and not to destroy life. True, these institutions are powerful, but not all powerful. They are limited by the giver of all power, and He has promised this power to His Church, and His word is "Fear not." In these days the purpose, the passion, and the faith of Christ's followers need to be strengthened. Our spiritual eyes need to be opened that we may see that God's horses and chariots of fire about us are greater than the horses and chariots of the evil forces about us.

Sickness and Health

God has been gracious to us; during the year no pastor in the active relation has died, though some of them have been ill, and some of their families have been ill.

At the beginning of the year there were four retired ministers on the district: Reverends T. D. Stewart, C. W. Shockley, R. H. Coleman, and Dr. J. H. Scott. The latter, on January 9, 1941, fell asleep to awake in the immortal city, and receive a well earned crown. Dr. Scott was, for many years, the accepted leader in this conference, and six times represented it in the General Conference as a delegate.

Charge Activities

Although the pastors are to speak for themselves, I desire to call attention to a few outstanding achievements of the year. Reports from the pastors indicate that a few had no converts or accessions, however, all did seek to do so, either by special evangelistic services or by regular appeals at each Lord's Day service. The following charges reported success: John Wesley—Bk., Newman, Bethsaida, Newark, John Wesley—Phila., Zoar, Mt. Zion, Trenton, Jamaica, Camphor, Englewood, East Germantown, Haven, Germantown, John Simmons, Montclair, Orange, Peniel, White Plains, and Tindley Temple. Total number of conversions 282, accessions 588.

Organizations

Every pastor, either in part or in whole, has set up the New Church organizations, including the Board of Education, the Board of Lay Activities, and the Woman's Society of Christian Service. This task has not been easy, but those who have persisted in the matter have been successful. Unification in the General Church will succeed only in so far as it succeeds in the Local Church.

Christian Education

By the help of our Conference Board of Education, and our Executive Secretary, Dr. Handy, we have been able to promote a few Teacher Training Classes, but not nearly so many as we need in order to carry through the New Church program. Thirteen churches had Vacation Bible Schools.

Property Improvement

The following churches have been beautified by painting inside or outside, or both: John Wesley—Bk., Newman, Butler, East Germantown, Haven and Trenton.

Other improvements: Peniel installed a hot water heater, and is now remodeling the organ. They pay as they go. Haven has added a new ceiling to the Church School room, and has paid for the same.

Debts

Some of the churches have been able to pay their interest, and reduce their mortgage debts. Perhaps the most outstanding of these was at Tindley Temple, where a \$24,000.00 debt on the organ was settled for \$6500.00

More than \$6,000.00 of this was raised in a rally. Peniel, with the \$2000.00 they raised, and \$5000.00 borrowed from the Division of Missions and Church Extension, has taken title to their church property and a twelve room parsonage. This was the most property we have ever bought for \$7000.00.

During this term Camphor Memorial congregation, with a loan of \$5000.00 from the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension, took title to their property. The congregation raised an additional \$1200.00 with which to repair and beautify the building.

Missionary and Church Extension

Our first tenure in office was more successful, in missionary and church extension work, than the second, due, perhaps, to the fact that there was more money available during Centenary days than during World Service days. Some gains, however, have been made. Three churches have been organized and title taken to the two properties mentioned above. On April the eighth we received into the district and conference, the Trinity Independent Church in New York City, with one hundred thirty-one members. They were organized a few years ago by the Rev. William A. Meyers, who is seeking admission into the conference as an Accepted Supply Pastor.

During the term the Redeemer Methodist Church, in Brooklyn, N. Y., was organized (formerly known as Stuyvesant Heights). This group, against great physical odds, had made fine progress. During the present year, they have raised more than \$1000.00 for the Building Fund, and the congregation has nearly doubled. The Division of Home Missions and Church Extension, with the aid of the Long Island Missionary Society, and the congregation, is negotiating for the building in which the congregation is now worshipping. \$8000.00 to pay for the same is ready. Rev. John L. Bryan, the pastor, is seeking to enter this conference.

East Calvary Church, in New York City, was also added during this term, and is making some progress. The New York City Society aids this group by providing the building, heating and lighting it.

John Simmons congregation was not so fortunate as some of the others. A \$27,000.00 mortgage, and a large building to maintain proved to be too heavy for so small a group. The building has been sold and they are now worshipping in the Grace Union Church, two blocks away from their former location. Funds are being raised to purchase a smaller church edifice.

The pastors and congregations of these missions, together with Dr. F. W. Mueller, Dr. W. Vernon Middleton, Dr. Fred B. Newell, and Dr. Harry B. Belcher deserve great praise.

District Activities

The District Conference, the Church School and Epworth League Convention, The Mid-Winter Institute, the Youth Conference, the Lay Activities meeting, and the Woman's Society of Christian Service, all held their Annual Sessions. They were well attended. These gatherings furnished opportunity for helpful contacts and fellowship, as well as for the dissemination of much needed information.

The Friendship Home, under the direction of Mrs. Elnora Thomas, is doing a worthwhile piece of work among our girls. Our great need is another building.

World Service and Benevolence

With one exception, the district has had a World Service gain each year during the term. According to reports, this year is not an exception. The following charges had an advance this year: Newark, John Wesley—Phila., Jersey City, Zoar, Mt. Zion, Trenton, Spring Lake, Redeemer, Montclair, and East Germantown.

Ministerial Support

With the increase of employment some churches increased the pastor's support. The Episcopal Fund and the Conference Claimants collections have increased. We sincerely hope that the conference shall qualify for the extra Conference Claimant Dividend by raising at least fifty percent of our appointments for that cause. Our Claimants both need and deserve it.

The following charges raised ten per cent of pastor's cash salary for Support of Conference Claimants: Mt. Zion, John Wesley—Phila., Camphor, Peniel, Zoar, Tindley Temple, Montclair and Haven. These are in the "Star Honor Class." The following raised five per cent or more: Englewood, East Germantown, Germantown, John Simmons, Newark, Newman, Orange, Trenton, and White Plains. These are in the "Honor Class."

Twelve of the pastors took the "ten cents per member collection" for the Permanent Fund, R. G. Waters, N. W. Moore, E. V. Wimberly, J. N. Bullen, O. H. Spence, H. R. Coleman, E. H. Crampton, J. E. Dunn, D. R. Fletcher, D. W. Henry, L. H. McArthur, and L. E. Jordan.

We have in every Quarterly Conference urged the members, to take and read the Upper Room, the Christian Advocate (Central Edition), and the New Church Literature. We believe there is increased interest in this matter.

Mr. Chairman, time will not permit me to speak of Temperance, Social Service, Christian Stewardship, or Evangelism, but I must not close this final report, until I have again thanked all of the Bishops, who have expressed confidence in me by appointing me to this very responsible position from year to year, and also to my colleagues in the cabinet: Brothers Jewett, Parker, Johns, and Horsey, for their helpfulness and brotherly kindness. I want also to thank the pastors and their families for their loyalty and interest in the work. And now I am gratefully mindful of the fine type of laymen on the district, whose cooperation and support helped to make possible whatever of success we have had. May God bless them and give them such a district leader as will lead them into the promised land. I commend them to the favor of Him, who is able to keep them from falling, and present them faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever, Amen.

SALISBURY DISTRICT

Bishop and Co-workers:

This my fourth annual report for the Salisbury District bears our sincere and hearty welcome to you as our honored leader in United Methodism of which we are a central part; and we trust that our labor and sincerity will justify this expression as you observe our efforts to help hasten the Kingdom of our Lord and His rule in this troubled world.

We are grateful for the privilege to answer another roll call with the rank of our pastors unbroken by death; while some illness in our midst has recalled to mind the valley of the shadow of death; yet each has escaped the evil.

The home of the Rev. M. C. Anderson was visited in June and his beloved companion passed to her immortal home leaving a husband and four children to mourn her departure. March 31st brought the greatest sorrow our group on the Eastern Shore has known; and the major fatalities occurred in families of our communion; a fire destroyed the building on the Campus of Princess Anne College where a group of W. P. A. workers were busy. At least five were burned to death, while a score were injured by jumping from the second and third story windows; several of these passed to eternity; three in one family. Our pastor, Rev. C. P. Spencer was affected with the loss of a son; also his companion was badly injured; our pastor at Wetipquin, Md., Rev. Alexander Reid has a daughter badly injured and still confined in the hospital. Every available physician and nurse gave service to these victims in the Salisbury General Hospital and are still serving faithfully.

Appropriations were made by the State of Maryland as the result of a large Mass Meeting called by Mr. J. F. Stewart and other leaders including our own Dr. J. W. Jewett an Alumni of the institution and numerous white friends to secure modern buildings in order to prevent other scenes so likely to occur in crowded frame buildings.

District Activities

These activities have not ceased but gained momentum; they dare not cease because of the requirements of the new set-up, and the desire to know and master the part to be played in our great Church, which says it is needful to know if we would move forward, hence there is a keen interest manifested in Christian Education throughout the District.

Our Director, Dr. F. J. Handy, has in every call met a large number of anxious folk who seem willing to know and do; these meetings have in them many workmen who will not grow old but continue to think and work with our youth.

The Church School and League Annual meeting had more than three hundred in attendance; while more than four hundred young folk attended the mid-winter conference held at Princess Anne, Md.

The visit of our Bishop A. P. Shaw and Dr. J. W. Haywood to our District Conference, held in Pocomoke City, Md., was an inspiration enjoyed by all and an acquaintance cherished on the Eastern Shore.

Our folk in twenty-nine charges on the District have organized and have monthly meetings of the W. S. C. S. under the leadership of Mrs. Melnese Gibson, and her District Staff; they seem eager to do as requested by Conference Leaders. The charges in which these organizations exist already feel the good effects of such united service; no longer have they some organizations alive while others are dead or dying.

The Dean of Administration in Princess Anne College, Prof. R. A. Grigsby, and his splendid faculty show unflinching devotion to the representatives of Methodism; the fine old Mother of this growing institution finds that not a thing is left undone in their efforts to make us feel at home, and a real part of the College.

We are delighted to say that the crowd of students grows larger each year; and that every modern equipment is there, with men and women as teachers capable to give all the curriculum calls for—Let us help to crowd this splendid institution with our youth.

Charges

COTTAGE GROVE—This charge is rapidly finding itself through the service of its very capable leader; life is seen in every department. The program of the church is taught with success evident. Increased giving is noted for Benevolence and Maintenance; the pastors return is desired. Raised for Benevolence \$8.00. A. E. Martin, pastor.

CRISFIELD—SHILOH—With earnestness that characterizes R. C. Hughes and his work; this charge goes forth to another victory by filling all apportionments; paying debts; repairing church and parsonage; also conducting all organizations of advancement in church life for which our Methodism calls. Pastor and people are one in all that means success, declaring by works, the old flag shall not touch the ground. Raised for World Service and Education \$165.00.

CRISFIELD—UNION ASBURY—This work was disturbed by change of pastors mid-year; the Rev. T. N. Hodges was transferred to the Washington Conference after spending a year and a half in this charge. The Rev. M. L. McKenny was transferred to this work from Washington Conference, taking charge of the work in November, 1940. He has wrought well notwithstanding the handicap of such a late change. He has made good as pastor and workman reporting for the Cause \$10.00.

DAMES QUARTER has a large membership and is led by the faithful pastor and splendid preacher, C. P. Spencer, whose task is made difficult because so many of the folk follow the seasons in work that takes them from home leaving on a few faithful to serve. The possibilities for a strong and victorious church is great; the energy of this leader is unabated. Raised for World Service and Christian Education \$13.00.

DEAL'S ISLAND has the service of a clean, earnest and an evangelistic pastor in the person of Bro. J. S. Coard; the revival fires are kept alive; the debt decreased, and Peace abides. The membership here is small but heroic; giving to the Cause shows advance over former years. Reported for World Service and Education \$3.00.

FRUITLAND is well pleased with the service of their faithful pastor and companion; church debt is fading with the spirit of giving advancing. A. L. Black, the pastor, is finely trained and demonstrates his ability to serve. The call of the church for training and advancing our youth takes first place with this leader. Benevolence has advanced. This pastor is untiring and alert in Kingdom advance; he never accepts defeat where right should be proclaimed. Efforts to have the people know the church and serve earnestly is always foremost. Raised for World Service and Christian Education \$12.00.

HORNTOWN, VA. continues to evidence satisfaction with the leadership of Elisha White their pastor by advancing their giving to each cause presented. The charge has continued its upward trend with revival fire always aglow. Debt paying and improvements are in evidence; the pastor and family are made happy. Raised for World Service and Education \$50.00.

KELLER, VA. has advanced under the leadership of G. N. Jones. Sufficient energy has entered this work under his leadership to cause the Church Extension to extend help to buy back the church that was sold in 1936. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I hope it is not bad taste on my part to call attention to a bit of history the Board of Education has made during its life span of only nine years. Although the Discipline of 1928 stated "It shall be the duty of each Annual Conference to organize within its bounds an Annual Conference Board of Education" it was not until the year of 1932 that the three old Conference Boards, the Sunday School Board, the Epworth League Board and the Board of Education were consolidated.

Believing an earnest attempt should be made to relate religion to the common, everyday living of people and knowing that a religious approach to life can be made a reality in terms and concepts that have meaning, I took upon myself to call together the following members of the Conference—

J. M. Dickerson, W. J. Helms, L. H. McArthur
R. W. Cheers, J. T. Fletcher, T. H. Kiah.

After sharing with these men my convictions and vision it was agreed that we conform to the Discipline of 1928 and recommend to the Annual Conference the organization of a Conference Board of Education. The writer was honored with the confidence of his brethren far beyond his merit, in being selected as President of the Board. I have the unique distinction, therefore, of having served as the President of the Delaware Conference Board of Christian Education during the whole of its life. I shall be ever grateful for this high honor.

What little service I have been able to render has brought me great joy and I have had no other motive than to serve the Kingdom, because I believe in God and His church. I have tried to preside with courtesy and fairness.

Please bear with me a bit further while I recount some of the achievements of this Board during the nine years of its existence.

First—It made an excellent choice of its first Director of Religious Education in the person of Dr. E. H. Brewster. For four years he patiently and officially worked with us, moving throughout the Delaware Conference with the same freedom, friendship, and mutual response as he did in the Wyoming and Philadelphia Conferences. In 1938 Dr. F. J.

Handy, the present Executive Secretary was chosen because of his interest in Christian education. He has been a worthy successor to Dr. E. H. Brewster and has not only built on the foundations laid by Dr. Brewster but has also brought about some gratifying results for himself.

Second—There has been a steady increase in support and interest of the total program of this Board during the nine years. The first year we raised only \$250.00 for the work. Last year the total amount raised was \$2,536.00. The expansion program for the new year calls for an enlarged staff, special work with young people and children, and close cooperation with the Student Religious Center at Morgan College.

Third—The report of the Executive Secretary and other reports found in this Year Book will indicate progress in Vacation church schools, teacher training classes, and adult work.

Fourth—We call attention to our first Year Book. This is the result of many hours of work and planning. This is just a beginning. Next year the Book will contain comparative reports as well as a report from each charge on "Fourth Sunday World Service Offerings," and "Rally Day Offering."

The Board has prayerfully and sincerely faced the task of developing a united program of Christian Education in the Delaware Conference. I believe as you receive the reports and plans for the coming year you will become enthusiastic. It is going to be a great year on all fronts. We promise you to neglect no phase of the program already promoted and hope to do some significant things never done before.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Our great command is to lay a foundation for the work of Christian Education; that is educationally sound and religiously effective.

The approach to the problem has been through the recognition of the natural age groups into which life falls, the discovery of their needs and interests; and upon these to build the program, as one of the essential means in the development of christian character.

No attempt is made to disguise the conviction, even in the area of conversion and character development that the application of modern educational methods, to the study of growing religious life will secure a better and more enduring result, than if the divine element had to work with human nature whose chief asset was an emotionalism, primitive and unguided. The time has passed when mere feeling as such should be the chief or perhaps the only avenue of approach for the Divine Spirit to enter into the life of man. If the will and intellect as well as the emotions are not also trained

to become sensitive to the Divine appeal and to respond, then the Holy Spirit can only accomplish a very small part of His work, while at the same time whole areas of human personality remain untouched and unmoved. If life is to be full, symmetrical, effective and free, the total man must be reached and dominated by the Divine power.

For the realization of this aim, stress has been placed on the four (4) aspects of our work.

1. The Program of Christian Education in the Local Church.

The organization of our Local Church Boards of Education has been urged and encouraged continuously. This has been accomplished through my visits to preachers meetings and coaching conferences. Visits to individual churches, district meetings, panel discussions and other group conferences. Practically every church in the Conference has been reached either singly or in groups and enjoyed the privilege of studying and understanding what the general church requires and how to do what is recommended.

2. District Directors and Activities.

In order to accomplish what is desired and especially in a territory so extensive as ours, an intensive program was introduced in which my privileges and responsibilities were shared with likeminded men and women. District age group directors were appointed, who also explained the program and aided pastors to organize their respective churches. So well was this work done, that to omit any individual name in this report would be unpardonable. Each district has its quota of leaders: Easton—C. D. Gerald, C. B. Miles, Mrs. Helen Waters, Mrs. Elsie G. Earl, C. J. Williams and O'Connell Milbourne; Philadelphia—O. H. Spence, Herman Brown, Francis Watson; Salisbury—J. W. Elbert, R. C. Hughes, A. L. Black, W. H. Meers, Mrs. Maude Clark, Mrs. Selma Waters; Wilmington—L. S. Moore, Howard A. Bailey, Miss Rosa Clayton. Twenty-one peerless and tireless workers. "In labors more abundant" through whom the conference has become religiously educationally conscious. Individual and detailed reports will appear later in the Conference News Bulletin.

These services have been supplemented by the activities of the youth themselves, who in each case have conducted District Youth Conferences at Tindley Temple, Philadelphia.; Dover, Delaware; Atlantic City, N. J.; Federalsburg, Md. and Princess Anne, Md. These young leaders have added greatly to the on going program of the church. They are C. J. Williams, M. O. Ballard, Herbert Wise, E. P. Gibson, Reese Brown.

3. Church Literature.

No less important has been the distribution of church literature, relating to Christian education and church schools and allied young people's organizations. The conference has literally been flooded from the central office at Nashville, Tenn., and from myself with various sources of information. Books, pamphlets, mimeograph sheets, booklets and the like all bearing directly

on this work, so that both pastors and laymen have had at their disposal such sources of knowledge as to help and guide them in their respective churches. The Conference Board has also made it possible for the Ex. Secretary and President to attend staff and educational meetings in Nashville, Tenn., and Cleveland, Ohio, so that through personal contact, other important information was obtained and in return relayed to the brethren, thus giving direction and guidance as to what should be done.

4. Church School Advance.

No challenge has had such a far-reaching significance as has the Church School Advance. The losses in Church School which in many cases were retrieved last year are due to many causes, such as from poor Church School equipment, intellectual indifference, moral confusion, spiritual apathy, and finally, the gradual weakening of the influence of the Church which is the only institution in our contemporary life whose message is absolutely spiritual and whose goal is the redeemed life for all. If we are to save our Youth and at the same time, preserve our Christian Institutions, we must direct our most efficient labors and our most fervent prayers toward the task of saving the Youth to the Church, through Christian Education and thus save the Church itself whose Holy task of saving the community must not be committed to another, but must be accomplished largely by itself, if it is to be done at all. This is the Philosophy which undergirds the Church School Advance, and if we fail, here—Nothing Else Matters.

We are indebted to each District Superintendent, the Pastors and the Board of Education, which under its efficient President, Brother E. H. Crampton, have all made it possible for me to carry forward this program. It is no mere platitude to say that we are confronted with the greatest responsibility in the American life. Unless we can christianize the sources of human thought, feeling and will as early as they become conscious, and which will in turn give motivity, urgency and direction to all that we are and may become, the promise and outlook for the tomorrow is dark.

The eyes of the world are toward the church, and especially that aspect of its work which deals with the direction and guidance of children, youth and adults. To this, if we are to progress at all, we must respond with broad intelligence, consecrated services and sacrificial lives.

**A Statement Ordered by the Conference Board of Education at the
Semi-Annual Meeting**

By REV. W. A. T. MILES

We are fortunate in having in Rev. E. H. Crampton a forward looking leader in the field of education, sometimes spoken of as religious and other times spoken of as Christian. You will find in this president of our Conference Board of Education a man in every sense a pioneer so far as our Conference is concerned. Able in every way to grasp the indications of the spirit and letter of the General Conference in setting up a Board of Education with such large scope concerning as it does the needs of the Local Church in every detail.

* * * * *

Our Churches have reacted in a fine manner. There are two or three reasons for this response on the part of our congregations.

First—Dr. F. H. Butler's connection with the Epworth League of the former M. E. Church and Dr. W. C. Jason's forethought for Summer Chautauqs before we had Summer Schools as such.

Second—The Morgan College Institute and the School of Ministerial Training, largely fostered by Dr. Ernest Lyons and Dr. Thos. H. Klah. And along with these men and all these factors Dr. F. J. Handy, Dean of our Summer School and Executive Secretary of the Board of Education.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING

Dear Brethren:

The School of Ministerial Training has an enviable record of uninterrupted services of 19 years.

The late Dr. Allan MacRossie invited a number of leaders of the Delaware and Washington Conferences to meet him in John Wesley Church, Phila., April 5, 1923 to organize the first School of Ministerial Training among our group in the Church.

The following brethren constituted the charter members:—W. C. Jason, F. J. Handy, H. T. Johnson of the Delaware Conference and Abraham L. Jenkins, Geo. Curry, Ernest Lyon, of the Washington Conference. The following officers were also elected: F. J. Handy, Dean; A. L. Jenkins, Secretary; H. T. Johnson, Assistant Secretary and Registrar; Ernest Lyon, Treasurer and Manager. Dr. Jason was Chairman of Board of Ministerial Training of the Delaware Conference and Dr. Curry, Chairman of Washington Conference. A long and distinguished list of ministers from both Conferences served at different times on the Faculty, among whom should be mentioned: W. C. Jason, J. H. Scott, J. T. Fletcher, J. W. Jewett, D. W. Henry, H. T. Johnson, D. H. Hargis, Moses A. Thompson, W. R. A. Palmer, T. H. Woodley, L. S. Moore, W. A. T. Miles, R. B. Thompson, J. E. Dunn, E. H. Crampton, D. L. Ridout, W. J. Helm, L. H. McArthur. (A similar list of

members of the Washington will also be placed in the record). These names should be preserved in the Annals of our Conference because they represent a group who with Vision assisted in laying the foundations of a movement within the church of far reaching significance in our educational program and outlook.

The training of the undergraduates in the Conference Courses of study has evolved from a mere Board of Examiners, in name only, to a well articulated system of study for the students and representative graduate courses for all other ministers.

The Princess Anne Summer School has made a notable contribution toward this achievement and according to the testimony of Dr. MacRossie occupies a position of high regard among similar schools of the church for the fine quality of its work and the intellectual integrity and character of its leaders. We are now at the beginning of another development of the Summer Schools. There is to be an annual Conference of the Ministerial Training Schools of the Central Jurisdiction at Atlanta, Ga. sponsored by our new educational Director, Dr. Wm. K. Anderson, whom we hail with delight; and the unification of the Schools of the Baltimore Area in which the Delaware, Washington, East Tennessee and North Carolina Conferences will operate as one Area School meeting alternately within the boundaries of these several Conferences and on the campus of our church School within said territory. This is the plan and recommendation of our Bishop.

The Accepted Supplies

Your attention is again called to the number of accepted supplies serving in the several Pastorates—over 30 percent of the entire membership of our Conference belongs to this class. This is too large a percentage—nor does the number seem to decrease. The quality of the service of these brethren in many cases has been—and is notable—and it is the more the pity that many of them could not qualify for membership into our Conference. They have and continue to do as creditable piece of work as is being done by some members of the Conference, and in some cases superior; but there seems to be no reason to multiply this number without making some definite effort to correct the situation. I therefore recommend that beginning with the Conference year of 1942 and thereafter, "All Accepted Supplies employed by the District Superintendents shall not be more than 6 months over his 55th birthday, and shall have attained an Academic standard of graduation from an accredited High School or its equivalent" (This recommendation does not apply to those employed before this date).

New Legislation

The following changes are recommended by the Commission on Courses of Study:

1. The former Textbook on the life of St. Paul will be substituted by Stewarts book, "A Man in Christ."
2. Wesley's Selections by Bishop Welch is to be superseded by Bishop McConnell's "Selections of Wesley's Writings."

3. All B.D. men are required to have all their credentials well authenticated, if they expect exemption from Conference Course of Study; but they must take the required course on the Discipline and use the Guide on the Discipline prepared by the Church.
4. All ministers who have completed eight graduate courses will receive diplomas from the Commission.
5. All Local Preachers who are not accepted Supplies but who desire ordination shall take the regular Conference Course of Study in the same manner that the other men in the Conference take it; and that all these studies shall be under the direction of the Board of Ministerial Training.

Young Men and the Ministry

In my report of 1940 in the Conference Minutes, Pages 115-117, I worked out a fairly scientific salary schedule of our ministers based on a comparison with a similar wage scale of the professional and industrial salary or wages of those in our group—as prepared by The United States Bureau of Labor for 1935, 1936, 1937. It appeared from actual facts, that although there were special cases where these professional men and some specialized workers in the industries received a higher wage scale than the ministers, yet the average salary of the one class was about equal to the salary of the other class with a slight advantage in favor of the ministers. I further showed that a minister changes in his appointments during the early period of his ministry quite frequently, but also set forth that in the process of these changes that it had been and still is the general policy and spirit of the Conference to aid in securing better appointments for our preachers as opportunities offer themselves. Until the age of retirement which appears to culminate approximately after 45 years of service.

I also showed that the quality of ones training had something to do with one's advancements, but also pointed out that some men with less training exceeded in quality of service some others with superior training. The logic of the above facts forces upon me an answer to the claim made by some that the ministry does not offer an adequate income to appeal to the Modern Youth. Some of these conclusions may be stated as follows: That the man himself determines his own advancement—All things being equal; that it is impossible to keep one back, provided he does not live in an atmosphere of complaint and defeatism which destroys his physical energies, moral fiber and spiritual outlook; but if he lives in an atmosphere of constructive thinking and action there is always a future for him. That the mere claim of superior training, even years of it and the expenses involved is both futile and pointless, if there does not go with it some other qualities—*inherent or acquired*, that will create a demand from among the laity for his services: Again all things being equal—these several qualities being present in any reasonable young man make him invincible and unstoppable in his attempt to advance for even the very stars in their courses will fight for him—and that means God.

The other problem which seems to deter many from the ministry is the claim of an inadequate annuity at the close of their career. The answer to this appears to be that it is bootless to place the blame of an unfortunate situation upon somebody else when the remedy for that has always been and still is in our own hands. If the younger men are sincere in their claim, then, since most of the advantages, small or great, which they enjoy are inherited from the labors and sacrifices of others; let them on their own account make similar sacrifices and thus with what the older men have already accomplished and are willing to continue to do, let us all together plan and work so that these young men when they have served through the years may share in an adequate provision for old age which they themselves have helped to secure; this is at least one answer to the claim of an inadequate annuity.

It is not written in the record of our holy brotherhood that any one de Novo like Minerva should leap full grown and completely armed from the head of Apollo. In other words, in any walk of life in the long run, you only get what you earn. This is a fundamental principle of all life. The exceptions to the contrary nevertheless. It were better for those who are not willing to pay the price not to apply, and from the stones God will raise up standard Bearers.

The Board of Ministerial Training is a legitimate recruiting agency for the ministry. It makes its appeal to all young men seeking a career big enough and noble enough to command the best they have to give for investment in a life's career. The Christian Ministry still remains the one unexcelled enterprise that has ever commanded a human soul, and the challenge still comes to all who have the moral courage and spiritual insight to respond.

**REPORT OF THE MANAGER OF THE WASHINGTON AND DELAWARE
CONFERENCE INSTITUTE HELD AT MORGAN COLLEGE
AUGUST 19TH TO 25TH, 1940**

In keeping with the recommendation of the Institute Commission, the Washington and Delaware Conferences celebrated the 20th Anniversary of the Epworth League and Church School Institute at its last session with an elaborate program. A souvenir booklet was prepared containing the events of the week and pictures of the many contributors to the success of this adventure in Religious Educational Training through the years.

The student enrollment was greater than it had been for many years, and the age groups fitted in completely with the institution's objective. This fact gave great encouragement to the faculty and manager that the work would be carried back and prosecuted in the local churches.

The curriculum was arranged to anticipate all of the needs of the Board of Christian Education in the local church. The faculty which consisted of

finely trained men and women evidenced a sense of deep consecration to their work with very happy results from the student body.

The management was complete in every detail and while there was an additional expense of ten cents per capita, the registration fee and board was kept down to the price of former years. The increased attendance enabled the manager to pay all of the expenses and carry a net balance in the treasury.

The two conferences were considerably generous in their support in this twentieth anniversary session. There is evidenced on the part of these two conferences, in a marvelous way, their very keen concern for an adequate Christian Educational Program for the youth of the two conferences, which is very praiseworthy. The commission wishes that I should thank you and solicit your continuous support.

The following are the recommendations which we would make and submit for your approval:

1. That we submit the financial part of this report to the auditing committee of the commission for their approval at the session of the institution.
2. That we accept the available dates of Morgan State College August 18-25 as the dates for the 1941 Institute.
3. That the Washington and Delaware Conferences accept an apportionment of four hundred dollars each to be distributed by the District Superintendents.
4. That each charge through its pastor report its apportionment to the District on or before July 30, 1941.
5. That each charge send at least one delegate and the larger churches at least one for every 200 members.
6. That the week be observed as Youth Institute Week and the pastors aim to give fellowship with their youth at the Institute.

We want to express our thanks to the Morgan State College for allowing us to carry on our work on the campus as heretofore.

**RESOLUTION ON SOME POLICIES & PROJECTS FOR CONSIDERATION
AND ADOPTION BY THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE**

Whereas: The Delaware Annual Conference is entering upon a new era as part of the Baltimore area of the Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church, and

Whereas: This new era brings new and greater opportunities with correspondingly greater responsibilities, it is fitting and imperative, if we are to meet the challenge of these new opportunities that we take inventory of our resources, condition, personnel, Policies, Projects and Program,

Be it resolved that we adopt the following Policies and Projects as a part of our forward Program:

Part I. Policies

A. That our Resident Bishop make every effort possible to become personally acquainted with the men and appointments, and make it possible for the Ministers and Laymen to become acquainted with him, thereby fostering a finer spirit of sympathy, understanding and cooperation.

Adopted—B. That our Resident Bishop, Ministers and Laymen cooperate in the creation of a finer spirit of Brotherliness so that each shall realize we are laborers together with God in Kingdom building.

Adopted—C. That the Bishop and Cabinet consider most carefully among other factors the Wisdom, Fairness and Effect upon the Morale of the Ministers and Laymen of reappointment of men to a second or third term as District Superintendents, at the same time consider the claims of others as regards ability, Promotion, and other qualifications, and also give the District an opportunity to express their wishes and suggestions.

Adopted—D. In the making of Appointments, weigh carefully the Proposition,

Taking Care of a Man and Taking Care of an Appointment.

Adopted—E. That this Conference consider, define, and adopt some definite Pronouncement or Policy regarding Travelling Pageants, Choruses and other church groups.

Part II. Projects

Adopted as a whole by motion of Ridout:

A. Appoint a Special Committee or Commission to Cooperate with the Cabinet in the Following:

1. Make a careful study and recommendations regarding consolidation or realignment of Churches or charges, exploring the Possibilities of two or more Churches Worshipping at a Strategic Center.

2. Make a careful survey and recommendations regarding the Debt Obligation of Churches in the conference with a view to a concerted program of Debt, Readjustment, Refinancing and Liquidation.

3. Survey needed or Proposed Building or Improvement Projects with a view to the same advice and cooperation to prevent burdening congregations with back and heart breaking debts.

4. Launch a campaign of Improvement of Church, Parsonage, Cemetery and other Properties.

5. Find and recover the large batallion of distant and inactive members, also discover and list all constituents for whom we have a definite responsibility.

6. Find, encourage, and enlist recruits to the Ministry and other forms of Christian service.

Charles Pullett and joined the church at Centreville, Md. Brother Nichols was denied the privilege of attending school. His mother passed away when he was small. He helped his father support the family. He was married to Miss Sarah Gardner July 11th, 1878. To this union was born one son, Wm. H., who preceded his father to the great beyond. He joined the Delaware Conference in 1895 and served the following charges: Cambridge Ct., Parsonsburg, Wittman, Unionville, Box Iron, Nanticoke, Bridgeville, Linkwood, East New Market, Reids Grove, Hebron, Withams, Oakville, Deals Island, Polks Road and Liberia. He retired in 1935. About a year ago his health began to fail and on Oct. 16th, 1940 he passed to be with his Heavenly Father. He leaves a very devoted wife, an adopted daughter, Mrs. Helen Phillips and two nephews. The funeral services were conducted by the District Superintendent and other ministers, at Centreville, Md.

J. H. SCOTT

The Rev. J. H. Scott, the son of the late John and Sarah Scott, was born in Baltimore, Maryland in the year of 1860. He received his early education in the public schools of Baltimore. Following his graduation from high school he matriculated at Lincoln University and graduated from that institution after four years of study with a very high average, receiving the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Upon his graduation from Lincoln he returned to Baltimore with the idea of entering the public school system. He took examination of the Board of Education for principalship in the city of Baltimore and passed. He was the first Negro to pass the Baltimore Board of Education for this position. It was at this period in the life of Rev. J. H. Scott that he felt the urge of the Christian ministry. He at once gave up the idea of the teaching profession and returned to Lincoln University to pursue a course in Theology. He was awarded the degree of Bachelor of Sacred Theology. While studying Theology he was also tutor in Greek and Latin. He entered the Delaware Conference in the year of 1886 and was appointed to our church at New Castle. It was during this pastorate that he married Miss Emma Hall of Baltimore, Md. A beautiful Christian character who after 52 years together she preceded him in death less than a year ago. To them were born a large family of children. Rev. J. H. Scott's progress in the Christian ministry was very rapid. He served in the leading appointments of the Conference. He was District Superintendent for two full terms on the Centreville and the Philadelphia District respectively. He also served the unexpired term on the South Philadelphia District of one of our late members of the Conference. He served as secretary of the conference for eight years, and was elected Delegate to the General Conference six times. During the Quadrennium 1916-1920 he was appointed as representa-

tive from the Philadelphia Area as a member of the General Committee which committee was organized for the purpose of promoting the Benevolent causes of the church. He was also a charter member of the Delaware Conf. Trustees Board. He received from Wiley College, Marshall, Texas, the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Divinity.

He served the following churches: New Castle, Del., Wilmington Ct., Del., Ferry Ave., Camden, N. J., Newark, N. J., St. Daniels, Chester, Pa., Zoar, Philadelphia, Pa., Germantown, Pa., Princess Anne, Md., Frankford, Phila., St. Paul, Phila., Bethsaida. After forty-eight years of service he retired in the year of 1934 and became a member of the Quarterly Conference of the Zoar Methodist Church which church he had formerly served as pastor. As years advanced he became physically unable to attend the services at Zoar, the distance being too great so he became a regular attendant at the Camphor Memorial Methodist Church located within walking distance of his late home. He attended Camphor until it was a physical impossibility, for the past few months he has been confined to his bed but during that time he has been a very patient sufferer and wore continually upon his face a radiance that blessed all those who came to see him, as the end drew near his one statement was I cannot get enough rest, and on Thursday, January 9th, 1941 God gave him the complete rest for which his soul yearned. As a husband, J. H. Scott was loving and true, as a father he was devoted and very dutiful as a friend, he stuck closer than a brother, as churchman he possessed knowledge and understanding and fidelity that few men have been able to equal. He was a strong preacher, a great pastor and a true and tried Christian. He is survived by one brother, one sister, 5 sons, 3 daughters and one grandson, relatives and a host of friends. Easter is a joyful season not because it reveals the fact that life survives death, but that life conquers death. A spirit like his cannot die; it conquers the very worst that can happen to a man—even death and lives.

L. E. THOMAS

L. E. Thomas was one of the purest and sweetest, most winsome and lovable spirits that ever shared the fellowship of the Christian Ministry of the Delaware Conference Methodist Church. His was one of those pulling personalities that leave an ineffaceable impression upon all who meet him. Like the Master whom he so devotedly served "he could not be hidden."

He had a rich religious and cultural background for his life-work. He grew up amidst the simple old fashioned home that was conducive to moral and spiritual growth that must go into the network of great souls.

One of his most striking characteristics was his humility. With gifts and attainments that qualified him for service he saw the years slipping away, and the larger and so called more important charges closed to him. But there was no resentment, no bitterness, no sense of grievance or frustration. On the contrary he felt honored to serve any church and to minister to any people.

There was a mystical quality in his religious faith. But it was a sane and balanced mysticism—the mysticism of St. Paul "I am crucified with Christ, Nevertheless I live; yet not I but Christ liveth in me." The mysticism of Christ himself. "As Thou Father art in me and I in Thee, that they may be one in us." And now he is not for God took him.

He built a Christian personality. This is the greatest of all creative achievement. His self-expression was born of self-denial. Through years of painstaking effort, he was able to harmonize his instincts and emotions and subordinate them to the ideal of Christ. Hence he was able to achieve true liberty.

He was the builder of a happy home. We never saw a more devoted couple. Theirs was that glorified friendship born of sharing life's joys and

sharing life's sorrows. Each had unselfishly given of himself or herself to the other, and by thus giving, had increased his or her capacity for receiving—their personalities had blended until they were a spiritual unit. When he was stricken the good wife realized that a part of herself was gone, never to be replaced.

He was the bulder of great sermons. His was an orderly and logical mind. Spending much time and effort in their composition, his sermons contained a depth of feeling that always aroused an emotional response. I have known him to preach with such eloquence and power that shouts of praise from the congregation would compel him to stop mid-way his sermon.

He was the bulder of churches. He enjoyed success in all his pastorates. As an organizer and administrator he was unexcelled. He knew people and how to handle them. He loved and understood youth and young people adored him. Only death could and did retire a man of such power. He therefore laid his tools on the banks of the Jordan and crossed over.

To paraphrase Ruskin: He knew how to build well enough; he built with stone well, but with flesh better, temples not made with hands, but riveted of hearts, and that kind of marble, crimson veined, is indeed eternal.

Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely: (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.
