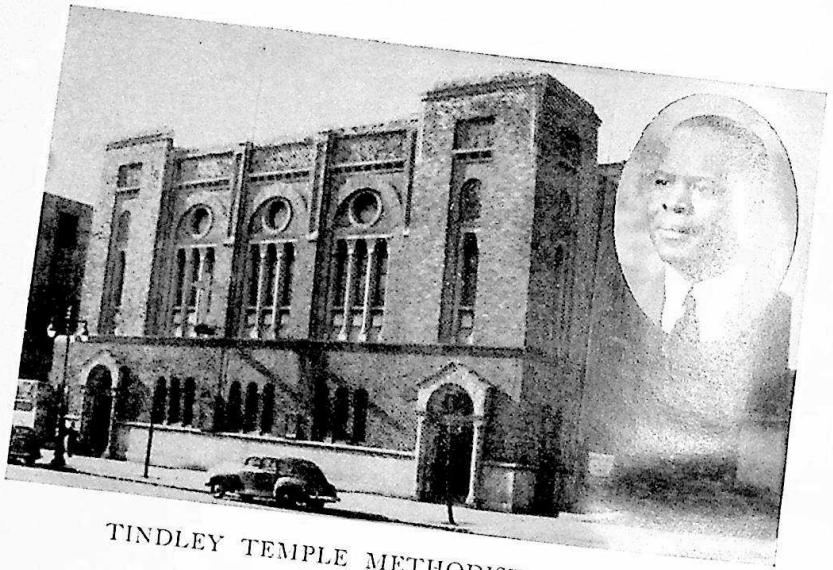

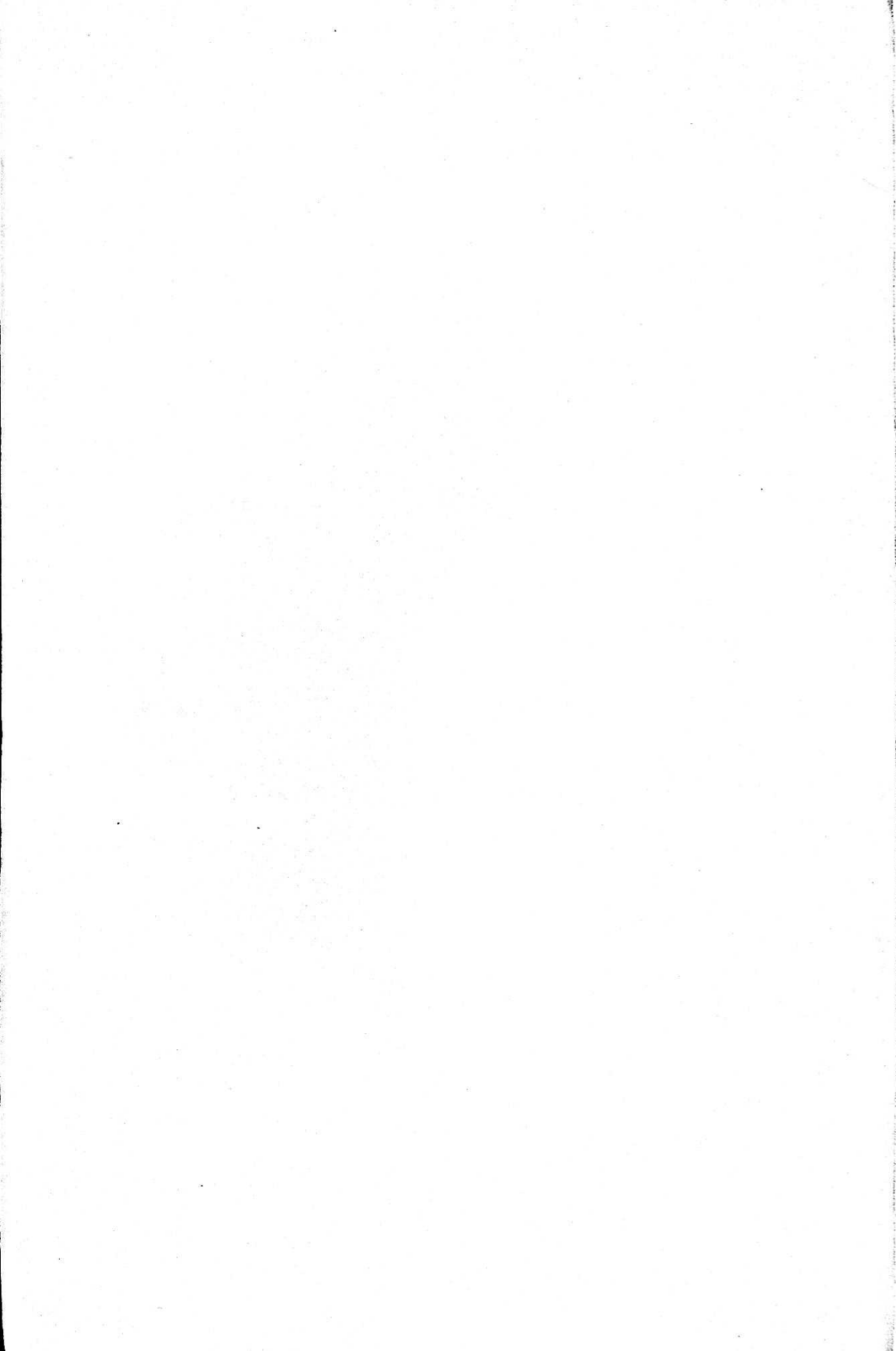

Report District Superintendents

Bishop Jones, Members of the Conference and visiting friends. I am happy to present this my first annual report of the Dover District. The District extends over a large area but by the help of the Lord I have been able to make the round four times, for which I am grateful to my Heavenly Father.

I have spent one of the most pleasant years of my Ministry on the Dover District. While it meant much travel to do the work of the District, yet it was a recreation to me in meeting different people and preaching to a different congregation each Sunday.

All of these meetings were helpful and educational.

The Efficiency Conference was held at Dover, Delaware. We were honored in having Bishop A. P. Shaw as our guest, who delivered the noontide message.

We are grateful to Dr. F. J. Handy and the District Directors for what has been accomplished in Christian Education. While there is still room for improvement. We are also grateful to Dr. J. T. Fletcher who planned with and encouraged the Pastors to pay on mortgages held by the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension.

EASTON DISTRICT

Dear Bishop Jones, Members of the Conference, and Friends:

With profound gratitude to our All wise Heavenly Father for His providential guidance and protection, we submit this, our first annual report for the Easton District, to the third session of the Delaware Annual Conference, of the Methodist Church.

Appointed by Bishop A. P. Shaw, April 20, 1941, we officially resumed our responsibility April 27, by preaching the initial sermon 11:00 a. m. at the Asbury M. Church, Easton, Md., Rev. J. S. Coulbourn, pastor. The responsibility has been weighty. Our experiences have been mingled somewhat with joy and grief. The formal welcome to the District tendered by selected representatives at the District Stewards Meeting, May 7, Easton, Md., where the salary was estimated and the District forward program was planned, was a felicitation beyond our most sanguine expectations. Let me hereby express my gratitude to my distinguished predecessor for the brotherly way he endeavored to place the various affairs of the District at my disposal.

Deaths and Changes

From the human side our sorrows have been very grievous. July 31, Rev. J. S. Coulbourn was translated. September 10, Rev. Saulsbury Johns, pastor of Charles Wesley, Centreville, suddenly passed to his reward. September 28, Rev. W. T. Spellman, pastor of Royal Oak Charge, after a prolonged illness, "was not for God took him." Mrs. J. I. Williams, mistress

of the Hurlock charge, "left to be with the Lord," February 15, 1942. Just last Friday, April 24, the Rev. E. O. Parker, Denton Charge, joined the triumphant procession. Appropriate funerals were conducted. Suitable obituaries will be published.

Bishop Shaw granted each widow—A monthly stay in the parsonage, with pay, dating from the funeral. The appreciating officials and members with deep gratitude for the worthy lives and fine service rendered, gladly acquiesced with the Bishop's highly commendable request. August 19th, Rev. C. C. Thomas was released from the Carmichael charge to accept a chaplaincy in the U. S. Army. After consultation the Bishop made the following changes. The Rev. C. W. Derrickson was appointed to fill the vacancy at Asbury, Easton. Rev. A. W. McBride succeeded him at the Preston charge. Church Creek was supplied by Rev. W. C. West, retired; Carmichael, by Rev. Emmons Foster; Easton Circuit by Rev. F. T. Johnson, retired. W. C. Thomas was appointed to Centreville; Centreville Circuit was supplied by Rev. J. U. Watson. Rev. F. R. Richardson was appointed to Royal Oak; Marydel was supplied by Rev. J. G. Stevens, who was superseded at Cordova by Rev. Richard Bowser.

Monthly Preachers' Meeting

The District Monthly Preachers' Meeting has been quite an asset. It enables us to maintain the Christian solidarity, to announce the programs and policies sent down from time to time, as well as affording unique opportunity for disseminating valuable information and inspiration through the programs rendered. It rotates.

Youth Activities

The District Epworth League and Church School Convention, held at East New Market, Md., June 17-19, was a highly intellectual and spiritual assembly. It was very largely attended. Appropriate addresses were delivered by His Honor, the mayor of East New Market and the Reverends Dr. Diston W. Jacobs of Cambridge and Dr. F. J. Handy, Ex. Secretary of Christian Education of the Delaware Conference. The Rev. O'Connell Milbourne and his loyal people were very hospitable hosts.

Just prior to the final adjournment, the Methodist Youth Fellowship of the Easton District was organized. The officers elected were: President, Eddie Magee; Vice President, Miss Gwendolyn McBride; Secretary, Miss A. Erldine Fountaine; Treasurer, Leon Griffin.

Chairman of Departments: Worship & Evangelism, Miss Agnes Curtis; Community Service, Miss Eva Sampson; Friendship, Miss Evelyn Pritchett; Recreation, Thomas Miles.

Counsellors: Adult Group, Rev. C. D. Gerald; Youth Group, Rev. W. A. T. Miles, assistant, Mrs. Helen C. Waters; Childrens Group, Mrs. Grace C. Gates.

Program Committee: Chairman, Miss A. Madelyn Spellman; Vice chairman, Rev. O'Connell Milbourne; Sec'y., Paul E. Wise. The Annual Conference set-up was: Director of adults, Rev. C. D. Gerald; assistant, O'Connell Milbourne; Director of Youth, Eddie Magee; Director of children, Mrs. E. G. Earle.

The Delaware Conference Caravan consisting of Mr. Eddie Magee, Mr. Herbert Wise, Mrs. Catherine Champ, Miss Frances Watson, Mrs. E. G. Earle, Counsellor, visited the District for a week. They held three very successful, profitable meetings at Easton, Centreville and Cambridge, Md., respectively. Likewise, Rev. H. H. Nichols and Mr. Reese Brown held one day workers' Conference at Greensboro and Easton, Md., respectively.

The School

To meet the urgent need for religious trained workers and to foster the Christian growth and development of our young people, a Christian Education Workers' School was held, February 3, 4, 5 and 10, 11, at Asbury Church, Easton, Md., with Dr. F. J. Handy, Executive Sec., Dean. Accredited instructors in various departments were: Children, Mrs. Elsie G. Earle; Youth, Rev. C. D. Gerald; Junior Adults, Rev. O'Connell Milbourne. Special courses for Church School Superintendents and Pastors, Dr. F. J. Handy; Methods, Mrs. Grace C. Gates and Rev. W. A. T. Miles. The attendance was very large, and 148 registrants were certificated. This Christian Education Workers School was permanently organized with Mrs. Grace Coulbourne Gates, Dean.

The Special Conferences

The Ministerial Training School at Morristown, Tenn., July 21-31, was attended by all our accepted supply pastors, also the District Superintendent and teacher, Rev. W. A. T. Miles. The benefits derived therefrom have been manifestly evident in the zealous activities of the attendants.

The Area Council meeting held at Metropolitan Methodist Church, Baltimore, Md., August 19-22, was officially represented by the District Supt., and Rev. W. A. T. Miles. Mrs. H. R. Hargis, was the elected representative of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. Many of the pastors were also in attendance.

The Washington and Delaware Conference Institute was simultaneously in session with the Area Council meeting. The attendance was large, the interest was intense. As it should have been, it was the best and most unique of all the 21 Annual sessions.

District Conference

The District Conference convened at Zion Methodist Church, Federalburg, Md., Rev. C. J. Williams, pastor, October 21-24. The welcome on behalf of the city was tendered by Senator Wilmer F. Davis. The educational evening with the youth, was a unique occasion. A Symposium, "The Imperative Need of Christian Education," was ably discussed by the heads of our colleges, Dean R. A. Grigsby, Princess Anne College; President, R. S. Grosley, Delaware State College; Dr. J. J. Seabrook, Director of the Morgan Christian Center. The various benevolent causes of the church were stressed. This conference was very largely attended.

Brother Williams and his loyal people catered to over 300 on Wednesday for dinner. Besides the regular Disciplinary order, all the District Superintendents were present and delivered very helpful addresses.

Efficiency Conference

The Second Annual Efficiency Conference was held at Mt. Pleasant M. Church, Greensboro, Md., March 12, 1942. Appropriately practical subjects touching the essential needs of the District were illuminatingly discussed and a financial and spiritual checkup of the charges were made through the pastors. Bishop A. P. Shaw, Resident Bishop, visited us and delivered a very profitably and highly inspirational address. At the evening session, a grand musicale was sponsored by the Ministers Wives Association. The seating capacity was over exhausted. Rev. J. O. Griffin and his genial people exerted themselves to the uttermost to make our stay happy and our entertainment perfect.

The Woman's Societies

(1) The Woman's Society of Christian Service, with Mrs. Josephine Dickerson, Pres., has been very zealous in its endeavor to correctly set up local Societies in each charge. Meeting in conjunction with the Preachers Meeting, they have been mutually helpful to each other.

(2) The Ministers Wives Association has been a very great help to the District. They have made a very fine financial contribution to the Conference Claimants. The Annual Outing at _____ Manor is reputed to have surpassed all former occasions.

Lay Activities

The Board of Lay Activities with Mr. W. D. Earle, as chairman and Mr. Fred Chester (superseded by Mr. Elwood S. Jewett) and Mrs. Helen C. Waters, associates, has strenuously striven through group study courses strategically assembled to effectually organize a Brotherhood in each Church. The Annual District Lay Activities Conference was held November 13, at John Wesley M. Church, McDaniel, Md. It was very largely attended and intensely interesting.

District Parsonage

The District Parsonage indebtedness was \$2671.03, with interest at 6%, payable semi-annually. The cooperation on the part of the charges with the District Parsonage Board of Trustees and Auxiliary Commission in their persistent effort to liquidate this indebtedness is highly praiseworthy. Utilizing the opportunity of our Resident Bishop's touring visit to the Easton District, Nov. 21, a grand financial rally was staged at Waugh Chapel, Cambridge, Md. Bishop A. P. Shaw, D. D. LL.D., very highly delighted and enthused us with one of his great addresses. The financial response was very fine—\$590. This with other paid apportionments has enabled us to reduce the principal to \$1911. The District Parsonage committee has renovated, recarpeted and reelectrified the District Parsonage.

Quarterly and Sub-District Conferences

The District has been strategically, geographically, divided into seven sub-districts, duly organized. The quarterly conferences of the first quarter were held individually, the second and third were held through the group conferences. In these group conferences, the most essential disciplinary requirements and reorganization of the churches were discussed. In the fourth quarterly conference, all organizations according to par. 532—Discipline 1940, were effected. We have endeavored to visit and preach in each church during the conference year.

The observance of the Disciplinary holidays and special occasions has been stressed. We have endeavored to have a revival in each charge. Evangelism, Temperance and Stewardship have been urged and the Area collection for Evangelism has been taken. Number of Conversions 220; accessions 253.

The ministerial support, we have strenuously striven to raise in full. Several pastors salaries have been increased for the ensuing year. The raising of the conference claimants has been urged with 10% of the cash pastoral support as the maximum, and 5% the minimum standard. These with the General and Annual Conference Benevolences and other causes will show a considerable increase.

The current expense and other financial interest of the Trustees have been carefully looked after. Each charge is expectantly awaiting the launching of the District Campaign to liquidate old indebtedness.

Charges

AIREYS charge consists of four churches. They are remote from each other. Traveling is difficult. They have nearly raised their ministerial support in full, but there is a slight decrease in General and Annual Conference Benevolences. They have raised for all purposes \$1700. Conversions 4; accessions 4. Van B. Wright is pastor. They are capable of accomplishing much greater results.

BECKWITH was left without a pastor at the conference. Finally, S. D. Holland was secured. Laboring under a handicap, they have done a fairly good year's work. They have raised ministerial support \$600; General and Annual Conference Benevolences \$17.

CAMBRIDGE—Waugh Chapel reports another very successful year. Ministerial support, \$1430, has been raised in full, General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$370; other items \$237; for repairs, current expense and old debts \$1415. The parsonage has been repainted, the pipe organ has been rebuilt at a cost of \$950, the same paid in full. Conversions 6; accessions 6. The church is well organized and functioning. C. D. Gerald, pastor.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT has had a very prosperous year. They have raised their ministerial support \$1,143, in full; \$80 for General and Annual Conference Benevolences; over \$1600 for all purposes; 8 conversions; 5 accessions. O. P. Dickerson, pastor, is highly esteemed and his return is unanimously requested.

CARMICHAEL highly esteemed her former pastor, C. C. Thomas but she has taken kindly to a change of pastorate. They report an increase in all the causes. They have raised ministerial support \$850; General and Annual Conference Benevolences \$45; other items \$23; for trustees \$491. Conversions \$7; accessions 7. A long standing mortgage on the John Wesley Church, Carmichaels, has been liquidated. E. N. Foster, pastor.

CENTREVILLE. W. C. Thomas, pastor was most cordially received as the successor to the late Rev. R. S. Johns, who was efficiently carrying on. The young people have been organized and the Tabernacle is being used as a Recreational Center. They report \$1200 for ministerial support; \$90, General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$208, raised on old indebtedness. Accessions 6.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT. This charge was also affected by the mid-year changes. J. U. Watson, the present pastor, succeeding W. C. Thomas, has wrought successfully. The ministerial support, \$913, has been raised in full; General and Annual Conference Benevolences \$96; other items, \$46; grand total \$1225. Conversions 3; accessions 3. The moral and spiritual life of the people is being intensified and deepened.

CHAPEL. J. S. Coard has labored faithfully to develop the latent possibilities in this charge, but for about six weeks he was hindered by a serious operation. However he makes a good report. \$730 has been raised for ministerial support; \$32 for other causes; \$234 to be applied on the erection of a new church.

CHURCH CREEK. A. W. McBride had begun his fifth year here, enjoying the confidence and esteem of both races. In September he was superseded by W. C. West, a former pastor. He has maintained the former's high standing. They report: ministerial support, \$888; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$57; raised for all purposes \$1100. Accessions, 8.

CHURCH HILL. E. A. Hughes, pastor, has well organized and united the people of this three-cornered charge. Success has followed his herculean efforts. They report 14 conversions and 13 accessions. Ministerial support \$1234, raised in full; General and Annual Conference Benevolences \$77; other items \$77; grand total for all purposes \$2,100.

CORDOVA. Likewise, Cordova was affected by the midyear changes. Richard Bowser, pastor, successor to J. G. Stevens, makes a favorable report. \$636 has been raised for ministerial support; \$288, for trustees and other items. The parsonage is greatly in need of renovation. Accessions 2; conversions 2.

CRAPO and GOLDEN HILL with P. R. Brown, pastor has been greatly handicapped. Neither pastor nor people expected a return. The cooperation has been rather meager. They have raised \$696, ministerial support; for trustees and other causes, \$417. Conversions 2; accessions 2. The old church at Middle Hooper's Island needs renovating badly.

DENTON has stressed raising her bonded indebtedness. They have done well, for which the Board of Church Extension has complimented them. The ministerial support and General and Annual Conference Benevolences have been taken. This charge is in need of a great spiritual awakening. The late E. O. Parker, pastor, did well under existing circumstances, but was greatly hindered by failing health.

EAST NEW MARKET and THOMPSONTOWN. This has been a very busy year for these people. Each church has been beautified by painting; the cost of the same has been paid. The pastor, O'Connell Milbourne and his loyal people very graciously and hospitably entertained the District Epworth League and Church School Convention. They report \$1418 raised for ministerial support; \$62 for General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$42 other items; \$600 collected for trustees. Conversions 4; accessions 7. The East New Market Church is well organized.

EASTON. J. S. Coulbourne, ex-pastor, had arduously labored for 7 years and had effectively organized this charge. The indications were that his eighth year would have been a climax. C. W. Derrickson, pastor, has successfully carried on. They report raised for ministerial support \$1504; General and Annual Conference Benevolences \$179; other collections and trustees \$365. Accessions 5. The pastor is unanimously invited to return.

EASTON CIRCUIT. F. T. Johnson, pastor, successor to Emons N. Foster, reports an increase in ministerial support; \$31 for General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$14 for other items. The Church and parsonage have been electrified. Brother Johnson has made a strenuous effort to reorganize and unify the people.

FEDERALSBURG reports another prosperous year. The various organizations continue to effectually function. They have raised the ministerial support almost in full; \$122 for General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$50 for other items; \$857 for repairs, current expense and old debts. Conversions 5; accessions 5. C. J. Williams, pastor.

GREENSBORO. J. O. Griffin, pastor, and his loyal people would be unhappy with less than a very prosperous year. Laboring zealously and consistently, they have obtained their desire. They report the ministerial support \$1318, raised in full; General and Annual Conference Benevolences and other items \$305; trustees \$810. Conversions 10; accessions 25. This church is well organized and is functioning in all its departments.

HURLOCK has enthusiastically followed the leadership of J. I. Williams, pastor. A three-cornered circuit, yet they cooperate very fully. They report their ministerial support almost in full; \$125 General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$56 other items; \$600 has been raised on building a new church at Union Grove. Plans are being made to erect the church this ensuing year. These loyal people were deeply grieved through the loss of their pastor's wife. Conversions 1, accessions 1.

LINKWOOD also suffered because of the late after conference appointment. Late in May, Jesse T. Cottman was secured as pastor. Brother Cottman made a good beginning but was compelled, because of poor health, to ask release, December 9th. Rev. George Murray has filled the vacancy. They report \$450 for ministerial support; \$18 for General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$16 for other items; \$230 for repairs. The parsonage also is greatly in need of renovation.

MARYDEL was also affected by the change. J. G. Stevens, pastor, has effectually carried forward the work begun by F. R. Richardson, former pastor. This charge reports \$910, for ministerial support; \$60 for General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$19 for other items; \$250 for repairs and old indebtedness. Accessions 5. Electric lights have been installed in the parsonage and the Parker Church has been repaired.

McDANIELS has endeavored to retrieve her former good record. She reports an increase. Ministerial support \$675; General and Annual Conference Benevolences \$24; other items \$33; repairs of parsonage and current expense \$204. E. W. Holden, pastor has taken to himself a helpmate. She is proving to be a very valuable asset to his ministerial work.

MILES RIVER has enjoyed a prosperous year. Clarence Wilson, pastor, has been persistently active. They too have witnessed a gracious revival. Conversions 27; accessions 27. They have raised \$756 for ministerial support; \$55 for General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$142 for trustees.

OXFORD. A prosperous season for the oystering industry enabled this charge to surpass its former good reports. Under the leadership of its energetic pastor, W. A. Nichols, they have raised their ministerial support in full with an increase. For General and Annual Conference Benevolences and other items, \$206; for trustees, \$887; conversions 5; accessions 5. A very active Brotherhood has been organized and extensive repairs have been made to the parsonage and paid for.

PRESTON. C. W. Derrickson, the former pastor, had planned a very comprehensive forward program for his 7th year and was successfully working the same, when he was superseded by A. W. McBride, pastor, who very readily adjusted himself to his inherited responsibilities. They report the ministerial support, \$1394 in full; General and Annual Conference Benevolences \$92; other items \$66. The exterior and interior of Mt. Pleasant Church and also the Community Hall has been beautified by painting. Electric lights have been installed in each. Likewise, the parsonage has been beautified within and newly furnished. The total cost, \$863, has been paid. Accessions 8.

ST. MICHAELS. J. H. Stevenson, pastor, has proved a perfect fit. \$1,550 has been raised for ministerial support; \$121 for General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$1,304 for the trustees; \$2,829 for all purposes. Conversions 33; accessions 35. The church has been renovated and painted. They have refurnished the parsonage, added a bathroom and installed steam heat. All departments of the church are well organized and functioning.

STEVENSVILLE, led by S. R. Miles, pastor, has done a very commendable year's work. They have raised the ministerial support, \$1223; \$90, General and Annual Conference Benevolences; other items \$50. Costly repairs have been made at Ezion and Union Churches. Wesley has been newly roofed and all paid for. Conversions 6; accessions 11.

TRAPPE has also witnessed a gracious revival: Conversions 47; accessions 42. The ministerial support, \$1145, has been raised in full; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$89. Trustees and other items, \$749; grand total, \$2550. R. E. Hamilton, pastor, is a dynamic leader.

RIDGELY, under the leadership of L. F. Hodges, pastor, reports a very successful year. The ministerial support has been raised in full; \$112 for General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$657 for the trustees. This charge is well organized, functioning in all of its departments. The salary for the ensuing year will be increased.

ROYAL OAK. Shortly after the return from the Annual Conference, W. T. Spellman, pastor, was fatally stricken with a lingering illness. His affectionate wife, supported by the loyal people, successfully carried on the

work until his demise. F. R. Richardson, present pastor, has continued the good work so successfully begun. They report ministerial support \$1165, in full; \$118 General and Annual Conference Benevolences; \$107 other items; \$762 raised for the trustees. An artesian well has been installed at the parsonage at a cost of \$200. Accessions 1. This charge is well organized and functioning.

TAYLOR'S ISLAND. J. E. McBride is serving his second tenure as pastor. Notwithstanding, he has been very cordially received and is held in high esteem. Their report indicates increases. This is a three-cornered circuit. The people have employment most of the year. They are highly spiritually minded and are capable of doing much to advance His Kingdom.

VIENNA. A. A. McDowell, pastor, has concluded his eighth year. His good report indicates that he is still acceptable. They have raised for ministerial support, \$890; for General and Annual Conference Benevolences and other items, \$76; \$445, for trustees. Conversions 4; accessions 4.

WILLISTON. W. H. Whittington pastor, all things considered, is making a fairly good report. \$550 raised for ministerial support; \$36 for other causes; \$107 for current expenses and repairs. The pastor is handicapped by an invalid wife.

WITTMAN. W. A. T. Miles, pastor, enjoys the high esteem of his people. They report: accessions 1; ministerial support \$1114; General and Annual Conference Benevolences \$17; other items \$27. The old church has been remodeled into a community hall at a cost of \$650. \$150 has been paid on the same. The pastor has given considerable time in an endeavor to establish a mission at Tilghman' Island but the realization is not certain.

The Conclusion

The perpetrators of Sabbath desecration, the advocates for commercialized amusements, the keepers of the diabolical beer gardens and nefarious saloons and the stealthy sellers of salacious literature are endeavoring to corrupt the moral and religious character of our youth. But we have constantly stressed Christian Education, Evangelism, Stewardship, Temperance and the preaching of the word. Our pastors have stood doggedly against the moral and spiritual reactions. They have done their best.

The world forces of evil have enkindled a universal conflagration. They are endeavoring to destroy the foundations of civilization and culture and to burn down the palaces of hope, but by the gracious influence of the preaching of the glorious gospel of the Blessed God, tomorrow, as today, hope, happiness and peace will come pouring through the gates of love opened gloriously wide.

All pastors of the Easton District were delightfully willing and cheerfully donated to the "Area Parsonage Honorarium."

Finally, let me express our sincere gratitude to the pastors and laity for the fine formal Welcome Reception and sumptuous repast tendered Sister Hargis and me, April 7th, at Asbury M. Church, Easton, Md. We are deeply grateful to our Heavenly Father for His unbounding goodness and His loving care during these trying days. We greatly appreciate the hearty cooperation and good will of the Pastors, their wives and the Laymen with whom we have been permitted to labor.

It is with a sense of deep gratitude that we present this our first annual report of the Philadelphia District.

We are delighted to have our senior General Superintendent of the Central Jurisdiction, Bishop Robert E. Jones, to preside over this session of our Conference.

Sir, we welcome you!

All the usual District meetings were held: The District Stewards Meeting and the Epworth League Convention both at Peniel; the District Conference at Newark; the Youth Fellowship Mid-winter Institute at Camphor, and the Efficiency Conference at John Wesley.

Bishop Shaw. In his visits among us, in his helpful communications to us, and in his brotherly administration over us, Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, our resident Bishop, has been an inspiration and a benediction to the Philadelphia District and to the Delaware Conference. He is a brother beloved.

Charges

BROOKLYN, New York: Here we have three appointments, ^{namely}, Church of the Redeemer, John Wesley, and Newman.

Redeemer has had a great year. A splendid church building was bought at the corner of Troy Avenue and Herkimer Street. The purchase price was \$8,000. This obligation was met by a loan of \$5,000 from the Board of Missions and Church Extension; a loan of \$2,000 by the Brooklyn Long Island City Missionary Society, and \$1,000 raised by the people of the church. Renovations and repairs have been made in amount of \$500, which has been paid. Conference collections \$160. Total raised \$3,312. Membership increased by 26. John L. Bryan, pastor.

JOHN WESLEY, under the leadership of J. N. Bullen, pastor, makes a better report than last year. He and his people desire that the present relation continue. General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$73. Ministerial Support, \$1400; Woman's Society, \$565. Other items, \$60; repairs, \$210; current expenses, \$685; paid on debts, \$1591. Total, \$3897.

NEWMAN: The pastor, S. J. Horsey, was stricken with illness early in the Conference year, and was not able to look after the work for a long period of time. The faith and loyalty of the people never failed. Credit is due them for the devotion they have shown to their church and to their pastor. The report shows \$1741 for Ministerial Support; \$95 for General and Annual Conference benevolences; \$76 for other items; \$1225 for repairs and current expenses. Total, \$3,137.

ENGLEWOOD, with R. A. Bolden, pastor, has raised \$30 on its debt to the Board of Missions and Church Extension; \$200 raised on pews; General and Annual Conference benevolences, \$52; Ministerial Support, \$591; other items, \$20; total, \$1003.

JAMAICA has done well under Charles L. Carrington. \$300 raised on old debts; \$125 on Benevolences; \$1400 for Ministerial Support; \$600 for other items; total, \$2425.

JERSEY CITY: This small charge is well organized; thus the fine results shown in this report. Every item of ministerial support raised in full: \$773. General and Annual Conference benevolences, \$43; other items, \$121; for old debts, repairs and current expenses, \$770; total, \$1707. R. D. Crockett, pastor.

MONTCLAIR continues to move forward with its hard-working and energetic pastor, O. H. Spence. Membership increased by 33; Ministerial Support more than full, \$2,490; General and Annual Conference Benevolences in excess of apportionments, \$651; other items, \$212, running over. Raised on old debts, repairs and current expenses, \$5,470. Grand total for the year, \$8,823.

NEWARK has surpassed all expectations. The pastor, R. B. Thompson, had the unique distinction of delivering the Easter Message on Eagle Rock, Essex County, N. J., some seven or eight thousand persons being in attendance. He is the first of our group to be so honored. Ministerial Support, full, \$2,240; General and Annual Conference benevolences, \$407; other items, \$127. Raised for repairs and current expenses, and old debts, \$1291; total, \$4,067.

NEW ROCHELLE: This mission has been served this year by George T. Jackson. He has given himself unsparingly in service to this work. His wife passed to her reward August 3, 1941. Amount raised for all purposes, \$595.

NEW YORK CITY: Butler Memorial. The change here has not worked well. The report follows: Ministerial Support, \$637; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$20; other items \$15; old debts and current expenses, \$200. Total, \$872. E. W. Dean, pastor.

EAST CALVARY: This church, in the heart of Harlem, is doing a splendid work in social service. A nursery, a school, and other activities for children have been successfully conducted by competent leaders. The New York City Society, under Dr. Fred B. Newell, has greatly aided this work. William M. James is pastor.

TRINITY, with William A. Meyers as pastor, reports 134 full members, three preparatory members, and \$750 raised for all purposes.

ORANGE: The report from this charge exceeds that of last year. Accessions, 3; Ministerial Support, \$1235; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$167; other items, \$30; repairs and current expenses, \$300; total, \$2,002. J. E. Dunn is pastor.

OSSINING: With its new pastor, O. S. Edwards, this charge began the work of the year rather impressively, which raised our hopes for a successful year. Before very long, however, there was a change in attitudes which has militated against the success of the work. Hence, a meagre report is the result: Ministerial Support, \$955; Conference Collections, \$45; old debts, repairs, and current expenses, \$80. Total, \$1080.

PHILADELPHIA: BETHSAIDA, C. W. Pullett, pastor, shows signs of progress. A fund has been started to buy property in which to worship. They report 7 accessions; \$638 for Ministerial Support; \$47 for Conference collections; \$86 for current expenses. Total, \$771.

CAMPBOR MEMORIAL is a rapidly growing church, and has had a great year. 55 persons have been added to the membership, increasing it to 351. Here all departments of the church are organized and functioning.

A new parsonage has been bought, through the assistance of the City Missionary Society, the financial obligation for the same, \$3,600, being met by the Brotherhood of the church. The pastor and choirs of the church have presented several radio programs of superior quality, which have been well received throughout this section of the country. Ministerial Support, full, \$1834; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$204; other items, \$156. Paid on new parsonage, old debts, repairs and current expenses, \$2,728. Grand total, \$5,316. D. L. Ridout is pastor.

EAST GERMANTOWN gladly received its pastor, R. G. Waters, and its response to his leadership has been remarkable. The building has been renovated by painting of the auditorium, concrete floors laid in basement, and other improvements costing \$425. Raised on old debts, \$365; current expenses, \$268; Ministerial Support, \$940; Conference collections, \$73. Total, \$2,071.

FRANKFORD, Henry H. Nichols, pastor, presents the best report in years. The church has been renovated, and a new heating plant, with air conditioning features, has been installed. Accessions, 8; raised for General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$48; other items, \$34; renovations and repairs, \$665; old debts and current expenses, \$1164. Total, \$3,387.

GERMANTOWN: This church has accomplished great things this year. The pastor, H. R. Coleman, is a tireless worker, who knows no defeat. A parsonage has been purchased at a cost of \$3,650; repairs, \$400; old debts and current expenses, \$2,931; other items, \$182; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$755; Ministerial Support, \$2,485. Grand Total, \$9,753.

HAVEN: This is a strong church, situated in a densely populated section of North Philadelphia. 57 persons have been added to the membership; 49 preparatory members. Ministerial support in full, \$2,490; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$816; other items, \$139; old debts, \$1,000; current expenses, \$3,613. The total is \$7,058. J. W. Jefferson has been pastor for 13 years, and his return is requested.

JOHN SIMMONS: E. V. Wimberly, pastor. This congregation, with the aid of the City Missionary Society and the Board of Missions and Church Extension, has bought and paid for the building at 1731 Reed Street. They are worshipping in this building, which is too small, and they are greatly in need of more room. However, they are an optimistic group, and believe they will soon be situated so as to do greater work. The pastor is a hard and conscientious worker, and presents a splendid report: Accessions, 21; Ministerial Support, \$1223, in full; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$135; other items, \$66; church building, \$910; repairs, \$283; old debts, \$569; current expenses, \$328. Total, \$3,379.

JOHN WESLEY, W. A. Hubbard, pastor, is going forward with increasing success. 60 members have been added to the church. The Woman's Society reports more than \$1200, the largest amount of the District, and probably of the Conference. Ministerial Support, \$2,445, in full; \$347 raised for General and Annual Conference Benevolences; other items, \$105; old debts, \$2,400, and for current expenses and repairs, \$1,000. Grand total, \$6,297.

MOUNT ZION: F. H. Butler was sent to this charge last year, and has had a successful and pleasant year. 90 full members have been added to

the church, bringing the total membership to 513. Through the good offices of Dr. W. Vernon Middleton, superintendent of the Philadelphia City Missionary Society, and Dr. F. W. Mueller, of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, this church has come into possession of the Tabernacle Methodist Church property on North Eleventh Street, near Oxford Street. Building operations are about to begin. Raised for building, \$1500; repairs, \$100; old debts and current expenses, \$1,850; Ministerial Support, \$2,073; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$237; other items, \$132; total, \$6,385.

PENIEL is another growing church. D. R. Fletcher, the pastor, keeps on the move, and his people move with him. Preparatory members received, 5; full members added, 17; raised for Ministerial Support, \$1589, which is \$122 more than they estimated; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$1061; other items, \$63; repairs, \$376; old debts, \$400; current expenses, \$1,729. Total, \$4,263.

TINDLEY TEMPLE: In the midst of a multitude of activities preparatory to entertaining this Annual Conference for the 15th time, this truly great church sends to the Conference a report commensurate with its strength and greatness. D. W. Henry is the pastor and leader of this gigantic institution. Preparatory members received, 138; full members, 32; Ministerial Support in full, \$4,218; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$1,806; other items, \$529; for repairs and renovations, \$979; current expenses, \$5,510; interest and old debts, \$7,300. Total, \$20,441.

ZOAR, mother church of Negro Methodism, is looking forward to the celebration of its sesqui-centennial four years hence. This church has been victoriously led this year by N. W. Moore, Jr., as pastor. The report shows Ministerial Support in full, \$2,490; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$1,159; other items, \$223; Woman's Society and Church School, \$400; repairs and renovations, \$530; current expenses and old debts, \$6,912. Total, \$11,183.

TRENTON has had a successful year. C. L. Trader is pastor. The great need here is a church building. Full members added, 10; preparatory members received, 12; Ministerial Support, \$1,385; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$78; other items, \$48; repairs, \$140; old debts and current expenses, \$691. Total, \$2,342.

WHITE PLAINS: H. T. Johnson completes his eleventh year at this charge. The report shows, full members added, 4; preparatory members received, 5; ministerial support, \$1,382; General and Annual Conference Benevolences, \$55; other items, \$75; building, \$465; repairs, \$418; old debts, \$384; total, \$2,779.

SPRING LAKE is a summer appointment. C. W. Pullett had a successful summer at this seashore point, and reports \$320 for ministerial support; \$13 for Conference collections; \$108 for repairs and current expenses; total, \$441.

We are profoundly thankful to our Heavenly Father for health and strength to travel the District, to meet all the Quarterly Conferences, and to preach in all the churches on the District. My predecessor, Dr. J. T. Fletcher, deserves great credit for his splendid services on the Philadelphia District for eight years.

The pastors, their wives, and their people have been extremely kind to us in every way, tolerant of our mistakes, and considerate of our weak-

nesses. We are deeply grateful to them, and to every one whose interests and sacrificial efforts make possible the presentation of this excellent report to the Conference. We realize that this is but a feeble and inadequate representation of the labors and sacrifices of the ministers and laymen who have worked with us diligently in Kingdom building this year.

"Thus far the Lord hath led us; the promise has not failed;
The enemy, encountered oft, has never quite prevailed.
The shield of Faith has turned aside, or quenched each fiery dart,
The Spirit's sword, in weakest hands, has forced him to depart.

This is an all fireproof building, 160 feet long, 40 feet wide, two and one-half stories high. Plans are being laid for a summer semester beginning June 15. This is the expression of the Acting Dean of Administration, R. A. Grigsby.

We are intentionally interested and would gladly hurry the day when the Power and Beauty of Our Lord's Cause may be seen in us to such an extent that Right shall win in every section of our work; because each professor will lift Him up and draw all men unto Him.

The folk on the District are increasing salaries to stimulate workmen. The work deserves far more than we are giving or can give but we will keep trying in His name.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT

Bishop Robert Elijah Jones and Members of the Conference:

With profound gratitude to God and to both ministers and laity we make our first Annual Report of some Acts of the Apostles and Prophets of the Wilmington District. In the first place we are signally honored to have the presence and presidency of the senior Bishop of the Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church. You will agree with me when I say that the whole church has been greatly enriched by his wise counsel and far-seeing leadership.

There were some perplexities and problems that would naturally confront us in times like these as we come to the district, but we endeavored to build upon foundations so successfully laid by our predecessor, Dr. S. J. Horsey, and in doing so we enjoyed his most excellent spirit of cooperation for which we are very thankful. Changing and shifting scenes of church policies and threatening clouds of a total world war have kept us on the alert and anxious to do our best and wisest at all times. We have not confined our religious activities merely within the four walls of our church building but have endeavored to do Defense work whenever and wherever permitted to do so. Some of the wives of our ministers along with other women have taken special instructions in war work as is suggested by the United States Government and in many instances served as Aid Raid Wardens in the various parishes where they are located. Several of our pastors have busied themselves in securing employment for newcomers in our communities and also endeavored to see that they are happily housed. The territory covered by the Wilmington District furnishes a shining mark for our national enemies. There is within our territory such industrial centers as Chester, Wilmington, Camden and the most popular seashore resorts of the entire world.

Sick and Bereaved

The District has been spared from the ravages and pillages of death in the ministerial rank, but a few among us have been confined to the sick room a few days. Rev. L. S. Moore was confined to his room a brief period because of his ill health but soon recovered and was again on the firing line of a busy pastorate. Rev. E. M. Neals has been deprived of the joy of serving his people most of the Conference year but has been happy to furnish wholesome advice. The charge has done well under the circumstances.

Mrs. B. B. Carson, Mrs. J. W. Parker and Mrs. C. S. Sprigg stopped to rest awhile during the year for recuperation, but are on their feet again now. Mrs. B. B. Carson was bereaved on account of the passing of her brother, Rev. W. C. Thompson. District Superintendent was called to Los Angeles, California in August to attend the funeral services of his sister, Miss Mary L. Thompson, a teacher of Atlanta, Georgia Public Schools. She passed while visiting in the west. Rev. W. A. Mulley, pastor of Haven Church, Wilmington, Del., mourns the passing of his wife.

District Meetings

The District Meetings have been sources of dynamic power throughout the year. Much interest and enthusiasm were manifested at the very beginning. We started off with a meeting of the District Stewards and leaders of other outstanding organizations and organized ourselves into a "Workers' Council" which took under advisement the various phases of christian services to be undertaken during the year. The district activities started off in high gear from that very moment and has not been placed in neutral since that time. Many of our friends both of the ministry and laity of other Districts visited our meeting during the day. Among the many were Dr. J. W. Jewett, District Superintendent of Philadelphia District and Dr. D. W. Henry,

pastor of Tindley Temple; both of these brothers brought helpful and effective messages. The annual District Conference was very hospitably entertained by New Castle charge, Rev. C. S. Sprigg, pastor, October 14, 15, and 16. The Conference was tendered a hearty welcome by the City Government and the local church. An appropriate response on behalf of the Conference was made by Rev. L. S. Moore. Worship Services and Vesper Services were in charge of Rev. H. A. Bailey and Mrs. Agnes Brown respectively. Six phases of church activities were emphasized in persons heading up these groups, viz: Evangelism, Rev. W. H. Johns; Social Service, Rev. C. E. Kincaide; Christian Education, Rev. E. H. Crampton; World Service and Finance, Rev. L. S. Moore; Women's Society of Christian Service, Mrs. Jennie Maddox; Board of Lay Activities, Mrs. Ella Bailey. Among those who delivered addresses were District Superintendent L. H. McArthur, D. H. Hargis, J. W. Jewett and J. E. A. Johns. Rev. W. H. Mears, Conference Missionary Secretary and Dr. F. J. Handy, Conference Executive Secretary of Christian Education were present and represented their causes. The character of all th Local Preachers and Exhorters were passed. The following were recommended to the Annual Conference: For Admission on Trial: Brothers Raphael Hazzard and Randolph Fisher. For Recognition of Orders: Reverends Raphael Hazzard and Milton S. Jackson. Rev. F. C. Kershaw preached the Annual District Conference Sermon and Rev. L. J. Taylor preached the closing sermon.

The District Women's Society of Christian Service holds regular Quarterly meetings which are well attended. The Annual meeting of the Society was held at Mt. Joy, Wilmington. The attendance was very large which crowded the church auditorium back to the door. According to our pastor's reports we have twenty-eight organizations of the Women's Society of Christian Service on the District and a magnificent membership of 1431. This constitutes organized christian forces on our district.

The Annual Efficiency Conference of our District was held at Haven Church, Wilmington, Del., Rev. W. A. Mulley, Pastor. This church proved to be a very congenial host to that record breaking crowd. Among those who delivered most excellent addresses were Dr. Oliver J. Collins, Jr., Superintendent of the Wilmington District, Peninsula Conference, Methodist Church, our own District Superintendents, Reverends, L. H. McArthur, J. W. Jewett, and J. E. A. John. Dr. F. J. Handy and Dr. D. W. Henry were at their best in very effective deliverances. The Efficiency Conference was thrilled by demonstrations conducted by Mrs. Ella Bailey, Mrs. Clarice Walker, Miss Nettie A. Callis and Rev. L. S. Moore. The day closed with Masterly delivery of a great sermon by our Resident Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, D.D., LL. D., who was introduced by Bishop E. B. Ennis of the U. A. M. E. Church. We held our first District Missionary Institute which was conducted by Rev. C. E. Kincaide our District Missionary Secretary at Siloam, Chester, Pa., Rev. W. H. Johns, Pastor, Jan. 29, 1942. The District Superintendent outlined the General Objectives of the Institute after which Dr. Middleton of the Philadelphia City Missionary Society and Dr. F. H. Butler, pastor of Mt. Zion Church in Philadelphia conducted discussion groups. The people returned home with increased Missionary Zeal.

The Annual Retreat of the Conference Board of Lay Activities was held at St. Daniels Church, Chester, Rev. L. S. Moore, Pastor. The meeting was

in charge of Mr. Herman D. Brown, Conference Lay Leader. Leaders of charges, churches and districts were there in great numbers. Several fine plans and suggestions were brought forward. Among the many progressive steps taken was the recommendation that the appointments be so arranged as to appoint no pastor to a charge that estimates less than 800 dollars per year for pastoral support. May it be said in this connection that the laity on the Wilmington District are receiving very helping information and inspiration through the leadership of Mrs. Ella Baily who is the District Lay Leader. According to the pastors reports we have 26 Boards of Lay Activities organized and functioning. This is a large percentage of the 31 charges on the district.

Church and Parsonage Properties

1. The following charges have paid off their mortgages and notes this year and now own the properties in fee simple: Delair Church, Middletown Parsonage, Port Norris Church, Woodbury and Jerico Parsonage.

2. The following charges have made improvements on either church or parsonage properties: Port Norris church, Ezion Parsonage and Garage; Fordsville church; Buttonwood and Christian Church; Mt. Joy Parsonage; Mt. Carmel; Pleasantville Parsonage and church; Haven Parsonage and church; Elkton built Community Hall. The following charges have made substantial payments on their old church debts: Camden, Cape May, Merchantville, Lawnside, Newport, Mt. Carmel, Hamilton Memorial. Ocean City has done a fine piece of work also this year, also Mt. Holly and Burlington Charge, Pleasantville and Delaware City.

3. New District Parsonage. Perhaps the most marvelous accomplishment from a material point of view done by the district this year was the purchasing of a District Parsonage. The District met in October, 1941 and elected a Board of Trustees which was commanded to purchase a parsonage and place the District Superintendent in it before this session of the Conference. The Trustees were not given one penny with which to make the purchase, however they did it. The Wilmington District has recorded in her name a nice new brick parsonage with seven rooms, tile bath, hardwood floors, hot water and oil burner. There goes with the purchase a nice brick garage. To assist the Board of Trustees in their efforts the District Superintendent and his family lived practically in two rooms most of the year and moved four times. A good plan is inaugurated for the payment of this property and quite a sum of money has already been contributed in payment by the charges. An English Twilight Tea was conducted by Mrs. Maude S. Thompson and a committee of women in the vicinity of Wilmington a few days ago to raise funds to furnish the District Parsonage. There are several more items of furniture and furnishings now needed.

Ministerial Support

On account of the increase of employment, the increase in salaries of the laity, the higher cost of living and a greater appreciation of the services of the christian ministry, a few of the charges have increased their pastors

salaries: Ezion, Asbury, Atlantic City, Bridgeton, Port Norris, Pleasantville, Haven and Newport.

CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS. It is confidentially expected that our Conference will meet the requirements necessary to receive the special consideration offered by the Board of Pensions and Relief at Chicago. The maximum askings for local conference claimants set by the last session of the Annual Conference is 10% of the pastor's Cash Salary received. Some of the charges have met that challenge and are reporting the same to this session of the Annual Conference. They are as follows: Ezion, St. Daniels, Asbury, Atlantic City, Siloam, Chester, and Port Norris. The minimum standard set by the conference is 5% of the cash salary paid the pastor. The following charges are meeting this challenge: Grenlock and Rhodes, Merchantville, Delair, Haven, Wilmington, Bridgeton, Lawnside, Grace and Darby, and Mt. Carmel, Wilmington, Mt. Joy, Wilmington and Newport. Some of the pastors have paid the 1% of their cash salary as is required by action of the last Annual session of the Conference. We will refrain from calling the names of those reporting to me, because it may be that some of our pastors have sent their money direct to the conference Treasurer. However we expect to publish the full list in the Annual Conference Journal. The lay members of this Conference on the Wilmington District are expected to report one dollar (\$1.00) each to this conference for the Permanent Fund of Conference Claimants. The money can be reported to the District Superintendent or Conf. Treas. Some of the charges observed Veteran's Day during the year as was requested by the last annual session of the Conference. The laity is manifesting much concern in building a much larger fund in order to take better care of the retired ministers, widows and children.

Christian Education

The District Program of Christian Education has occupied the front of the stage in the religious drama that has been playing throughout the year. There are 23 well organized Boards of Education in the District. The following are some of the assemblies held in the interest of a larger and fuller life of children, youth and adults. Group Leadership Training Classes were conducted at St. Daniels, Ezion, and Asbury, Atlantic City; Youth Fellowship Group Meetings were held at Lawnside, and Mt. Joy; The Youth Caravan Group visited and rendered very valuable services at Ezion and Bridgeton churches. There was held at Ezion Church a 2 day planning Conference with representatives not only of our districts and conference staff but with the office staff direct from Nashville, Tennessee. The Epworth League and Church School Convention was held at Lawnside, Rev. L. S. Moore is the president. All of these activities were under the general direction of Dr. F. J. Handy, The Conference Executive Secretary of Christian Education.

World Service and Finance

The Benevolence Apportionments both General and Annual Conference assigned to us were properly apportioned as well as other items of the Conference. The following charges raised every item of every kind in full along with all ministerial support in full. These are the charges: Asbury, Atlantic

City, W. J. Helm, Pastor; Grace and Darby, B. A. Arnold, pastor; Siloam, W. H. Johns, pastor; St. Daniels, L. S. Moore, Pastor; Delair, S. M. Emptage, pastor; Port Norris, J. E. Bishop, Pastor; Ezion, E. H. Crampton, Pastor; Haven, W. A. Mulley, Pastor; Mt. Carmel, J. T. Ayres, Pastor; and Fordsville, J. H. Blackiston, Pastor; Quinton & Springton and Mt. Joy, Reverends C. B. White, J. H. Russum, pastors, respectively raised everything in full but one item and come in for honorable mention. We are happy to report that every charge on the District reports an increase of General and Annual Conference Benevolences, except one whose pastor was ill almost the entire year. The charges and pastors who raised all their apportionments in full are entitled to an award for "Distinguished Service."

Evangelism and Church Membership

All but a very few of the charges conducted special Evangelistic meetings on the charge this conference year. Fordsville charge reported the largest number of converts for the year which was 49. The entire district reports 237 converts for the year, which is a small number for us. However, we hope that the churches will be able to do more next year in the field of Evangelism. The number of full members added to the church is 264 which will strengthen our christian forces, but this number of persons added to our christian forces is not at all commensurate with our ability to do as a wide awake group.

Ministers Wives Association

It would not be fair to the Ministers Wives Organization to close this report without making reference to that group. These wives of ministers generally meet at the same time and place with the District Preachers Meeting. These splendid women of the parsonage never fail to put forth every effort to enhance the best interests of our district program. Mrs. Maud S. Thompson is president, Mrs. S. M. Emptage, Vice-President, Mrs. H. A. Bailey, Recording Secretary, Mrs. J. E. Bishop, Financial Secretary, Mrs. J. L. Taylor, Treasurer and Mrs. D. M. Collins, Chairman of the Program Committee. We have words of praise and thanks for the labors of our faithful, loyal, hard working and sacrificing pastors and laity. We have grateful hearts for the providential care which our Heavenly Father has had over us and His work during the year. These laborers together with God have brought new spiritual life to 264 precious souls which is a small number added to our church membership.

It is very evident that most of our time and energies have been given to money matters which we confess are very essential. Our Ministers and Laity are to be congratulated for raising the magnificent sum, a grand total of \$85,628 this Conference Year for all purposes, for which we give God thanks for the opportunity.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Dear Bishop and Brothers:

The program of Christian Education has progressed steadily during the past year. This was realized largely because of the faithful services of the 15 Age Group Directors on the Districts and the Conference Director of Youth, Brother Henry Nichols; each one of these volunteer workers rendered invaluable services.

The work was organized around five projects, the caravan, leadership training, Daily Vacation Church School, Methodist Youth Fellowship and Sub-District Fellowships and the Educational Planning Conference.

The Caravans

Four young people and their Counsellor Mrs. Elsie Earle gave themselves beautifully to this task of Christian Education. They were Herbert Wise, Catherine Champ Frances Watson, and Eddie McGee.

After a week of very intensive study at Berea College, Ohio, they began their Itinerary through the Conference and remained on the field without cessation for seven weeks. Their program was built around four objectives, Worship and Evangelism, World Friendship, Community Service and Recreation. They visited the following communities and their environs, Pocomoke City, Easton, Md., Milford and Chestertown, Delaware, Ezion, Wilmington, Bridgeton, Montclair, N. J., Camphor, Phila. These services were voluntary and very commendably done. It was one of the outstanding accomplishments of the year.

Leadership Training

An imperative essential for adequate leadership is training for leadership.

Early in the year the District Directors met in Phila. and outlined the program which included special emphasis on training leaders for the 3 age groups. Institutes for both leaders and workers and plans for the organization and development of Methodist Youth Fellowship. A similar meeting was also held in October at Dover to check on what had been accomplished to develop further plans. The second step in the leadership program was to require all prospective teachers to become accredited. A number of pastors and young people responded to this request and it has proven very profitable. The third step was the establishment of leadership training schools and classes on every District in the Conference, namely:

DOVER DISTRICT—M. O. Ballard, Dean. Milford, Laurel, Chestertown, Delaware.

EASTON DISTRICT, Easton, Md. There was one of the best schools of the year. There were 6 accredited Instructors with a similar number separate courses and 148 accredited students.

PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT, D. R. Fletcher, Dean. The leadership courses were non-credited courses and were held at the Methodist Youth Fellowship meeting at Peniel, Phila. and at the Mid-winter Institute at Camphor Memorial. O. H. Spence was the Dean of this Institute.

SALISBURY DISTRICT, J. W. Elbert, Dean. A District Planning Conference was held at Princess Anne College, Princess Anne, Md. in November where the age group directors and others interested in Christian Education met for study and planning the work of the District; and in January, this year, a Mid-winter Institute was held at Princess Anne College. There were over 200 young people registered. The largest registration of the conference.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT—Accredited schools were held at Ezion, Wilmington, Del., H. A. Bailey, Dean and St. Daniels, Chester, Miss Dorothy S. Hall, Dean. Plans were also completed for School at Salem, N. J. Another school was held at Atlantic City, N. J. and to be continued for a period of 4 weeks or more. The longest time given for leadership training in the conference for any school.

Vacation Church Schools

This enterprise represents one of the outstanding needs of our program; practically most of the churches have had these schools and have done a very creditable piece of work. It is not possible to give due credit to all of the churches conducting these schools because a very few reports have been sent to me. The proper procedure for all those having schools is to report to your District Director of Children's work and they in turn report to me on a blank prepared by the church. The following churches have submitted reports of their Vacation Church School activities. DOVER DISTRICT, Milford, Del., Delmar, Chestertown, Berlin, Harrington, Laurel, Smyrna, Seaford. EASTON DISTRICT, Easton, Md. PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT, Zoar, and St. Thomas, Mt. Clair, N. J. SALISBURY DISTRICT, White's Temple, Salisbury, Md., Marion Station and Pocomoke City, Md.

I shall be pleased to add further to the list if you will inform me. These activities were under the direction of the District Directors of Children.

Methodist Youth Fellowship

The program of our young people's Fellowship has been made very effective through the activities of the Conference Director of Youth, Brother Henry Nichols and Conference President of the Youth Fellowship, Brother Reese Brown. Sub-District Meeting Conferences have been held on the following districts: DOVER DISTRICT, Milford, Laurel, Del., Chestertown. EASTON DISTRICT, Easton and Greensboro, Md. PHILA. DISTRICT, John Wesley, Phila., Thirkfield, Jersey City. WILMINGTON DISTRICT, Lawnside, N. J., Mt. Joy, Wilmington. This was a new feature of our work and represents the youth contribution.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION PLANNING CONFERENCE—No aspect of our work was more important than this conference held Jan. 20-21, 1942 at Ezion Church, Wilmington. The General office at Nashville, Tenn. sent two members of its staff to give direction and leadership, namely, Dr. J. Fisher Simpson, Director of Leadership Training and Miss Freddie Henry, Director of Childrens work; they were assisted by Dr. E. C. Kebock, Exec. Sec. of Central Pa. Conf. and Miss Eliz. Eggleston, Exec. Sec., Phila. Conf. Bishop Alexander P. Shaw gave additional impetus and inspiration by his presence and very fine challenging address. At this meeting the work already accomplished was adequately evaluated and plans were further formulated for 1942 and 1943. The climax of the entire year's work was reached at this conference. I have been happy to have been permitted to attend every Epworth League or Fellowship meeting held in this conference year, every District Conference and every Efficiency Conference but one, besides numerous other educational meetings in rural towns and city communities, including giving guidance and direction to the Caravaners during their seven weeks of service on the field. No mere statistics or detailed recital of achievements can ever give a time estimate wherever human values are concerned, adequate changes in attitude, habits of behavior and character development are the only outcomes worth seeking. These values cannot be weighed, they are life's great intangibles and can only be achieved as we have insights into the Christian interpretation of life and its meaning, and the personal appreciation and appropriation of the Divine resources and power which alone make for righteousness.

If in any degree our children, youth and adults have been guided toward and assisted in the realization of these objectives of Christian living, by means of the Conference Program of Christian Education, then we may not have labored in vain.

THE SCHOOL OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING

After 18 years of continued and successful service at Princess Anne College, Princess Anne, Md., the Princess Anne School of Ministerial Training was discontinued and merged into the Baltimore Area School, which was held at Morristown College, Morristown, Tenn., July 22 to August 1st, 1941. Upon the advice and authority of Bishop Shaw the following conferences of this area were merged into what is to be known in the future as the Baltimore Area School of Ministerial Training. These conferences are Delaware, East Tennessee, North Carolina and Washington.

The session of last year was an experiment; an attempt was made to conserve the main values of the old Princess Anne School composed of the Delaware and Washington Conferences and the Claffin School composed of the North Carolina and East Tennessee and other conferences. Each one of these conferences was represented on the faculty. The total number of whom was 16. The student body also comprised ministers from each conference, the total attendance of all present was 100. It is worthy of note that a number of district superintendents were present. The largest number coming from the Delaware Conference. Those present were: Delaware, Doctors J. W. Jewett, D. H. Hargis, J. E. A. Johns, L. H. McArthur. Dr. W. C. Thompson sent a special letter regretting and explaining the cause of his absence. North Carolina, Dr. R. W. Winchester. East Tennessee, W. L. Saunders, N. D. Shambourger and L. D. Thomas. Washington Conference, B. P. Jordan.

The total expenses for the school were \$1078.91.

The deficit of \$361.41 was met by the Commission in addition to the sum indicated above with the understanding that \$100 of this deficit which they gave was a loan to be paid back during the present conference year and that Dr. Anderson hold me personally responsible for the payment of this loan. This sum should be met by the Washington, North Carolina, and East Tennessee Conferences. The Delaware Conference having already raised \$100 more than the other conferences. In addition to the pursuance of the regular undergraduate studies additional lectures were given by Dr. Carroll DeWitt Hildebrand of DePaw University on the Philosophy of Religion and Dr. Roger S. Guptill of Gammon on Christian Missions.

Bishop A. P. Shaw encouraged us by his presence and gave an outstanding and penetrating address on the significance of an educated ministry.

Dr. William K. Anderson was present to supervise the work of the school and to present an additional check as noted above.

The new venture appears to have been worth while and the foundation seems to have been laid for even a more successful enterprise than that which obtained prior to this understanding.

The school this year will be held at Morristown, Tennessee, June 30th to July 10th. The date being changed in order to have Bishop Shaw with us again. Plans have been made by which all the students who are required to attend will be able to do so. Each student is requested to secure his Eastern Clergy Book immediately after conference and send the enclosed slip to me signed by June 1st. I will obtain his round trip transportation from Washington, D. C. This is done to guarantee the presence of all required to attend, some of whom may not otherwise be able to do so because of lack of money.

We shall be compelled in the interest of economy to make a drastic reduction in the faculty representation. It will be as follows: 4 from the Delaware and Washington Conferences (each), 3 from the North Carolina and one from East Tennessee Conferences. This reduction will enable us to give more financial aid to our students.

The commission in order to bring the teaching staff of all the schools up to the standards of modern education recommends that all of its teachers at least be both college and seminary graduates and that each person who teaches become accredited by an authorized accrediting agency of our church. This will raise the standard of the faculty of all our Summer schools to a par with the other educational institutions of the church and bring a new dignity and character to all the schools of ministerial training.

The Baltimore Area School enters whole heartedly into all these recommendations. It seeks efficiency and desires nothing less than that which the church requires of its most favored conferences.

It begins now its new career with appreciation to all the District Superintendents and ministers who contributed toward making the former school a success, and looks forward to the years ahead to the achievement of the task committed to it by the church.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

To the Presiding Bishop and Members of the Third Annual Conference of the Methodist Church—here assembled:

We your Commission on World Service and Finance, beg to submit this our First annual report of our Stewardship in respect to the function of the commission and its tremendous responsibilities.

The adjournment of the Conference last year, left not only your Commission faced by an unexplored land of financial experimentation of an annual budget of \$40,548.00 toward which the Delaware Annual Conference agreed to set its compass, in an effort to accomplish by the time of the 1942 Conference convened—but the entire conference was also faced with this new situation. While the commission is not in position to state how near we are to accomplishing our last year's goal to date—yet the feeling of the commission is that the conference on a whole has done well.

The chairman of the commission feels that the ANNUAL CONFERENCE Treasurer should be instructed to issue monthly or quarterly statements of the general and Annual Benevolent receipts received. Such instruction would enable the Commission to become more intelligent on the general response of the conference in general toward the prescribed annual budget, and at the same time be able to ascertain the needs for greater missionary cultivation.

We the members of your commission are very frank to confess, that we were experimenting along with you last year—and was far from being sure of ourselves in the total budget—and district budget allocations submitted. This year—it would seem, all of us should be less susceptible to the same mistake or blunders made last year; in the execution of the function of the Commission responsibilities. Much of our work last year was experimental. All were aware of the fact that we were blazing a new trail in the acceptance of the budget submitted last year. Hardly had we advanced very far after the conference adjourned last year before we began to observe certain budget omissions, and the need for certain changes in budget allocations to districts. There were items that should have been submitted as a part of our ANNUAL BUDGET—before it was finally adopted. Since the same regulation that affects the Local Church-Finance Committee in meeting items outside of the budget—the same is true with the action of the commission; that “no appropriations should be made for items not included in the budget without also providing additional funds to meet such added items.” Therefore in defense of the commission we offer this as an explanation for the changes and extra assessments last year. Your commission found it necessary in consultation with the Bishop and Cabinet to acquiesce or concur with many suggested regulations in order to meet some emergency financial situations in some of the boards. Thus you can see that such alterations would of necessity result in some changes—in the Conference and Districts allocations, different from what was approved by the Annual Conference.

The commission realized also last year that it is responsible for District allocations, but also it is the duty of the commission to break down the District Apportionments—and make the apportionments to Local Charges. But the commission found in visiting some of the District Stewards Meetings—the wishes of said meetings were to assume as heretofore this responsibility—therefore the method of making charge apportionments is the same as it was under the old system.

The Commission has discovered that there is some little confusion relative to GENERAL AND ANNUAL CONFERENCE BENEVOLENT INTERPRETATION: The Treasurer has given some little time in trying to clarify this matter. You will find that the General Conference Benevolence—involves eleven Boards—all to share in the one General World Service Fund: Namely, (1) Board of Missions and Church Extension, (2) Board of Education, (3) Board of Temperance, (4) Board of Hospitals and Homes, (5) Board of Pension, (6) Board of Lay Activities, (7) American Bible Society, (8) Theological Schools, (9) Commission on Courses of Study, (10) Commission on World Peace, and (11) The Commission on Evangelism.” These I believe represent the General Boards which share in the above stated fund.

THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE BENEVOLENCES it would seem is simple enough. It has to do with all Annual Conference interests—whatever

those interests may be—which should include all the legitimate needs of the Annual Conference Boards and Agencies recommended and approved by the Conference for action. The same method of meeting the annual conference needs as used for the General Church. The annual conference apportionments are distributed among the Districts and Charges—just as are the General Conference for the World Service Fund and the General Administration Fund.

Following the action of the last General Conference—the World Service Fund for the entire Church is approximately \$3,000,000 annually. And by action of the last General Conference the amount apportioned to each individual Annual Conference, prior to the General Conference—was to remain the same for the ensuing quadrennium. At that time the World Service apportioned to this conference was \$27,948.00 annually, which equaled \$111,792.00 for the four years. Since the highest amount of said General Conference asking up to 1940 was only \$12,629.00—the Commission with the approval of the Annual Conference submitted a budget of \$10,000.00 for World Service to be raised in full for this present conference that is now assembled.

Our recommendation, if you recall for a \$17,948.00 reduction of the General Benevolent budget last year was based (1) Upon the sentiment throughout the Local Church in the Conference of being over assessed with the one item in the Benevolent askings—World Service. (2) The reduction was made in order to give the local churches a little breathing spell as well as inspiration to seek a reasonable giving level. (3) To create an opportunity for staggering our conference interests, in accepting larger responsibilities in the interests of some Annual Conference causes, that have a most cases been woefully neglected. It may have been a slip up in our procedure last year; but we felt that the reaction on the part of the charges receiving a more reasonable apportionment—and give inspiration to raise the full amount assessed—would justify the action of the commission and the conference.

Commission Organization and Function

The commission is composed of twelve members with one member at large—making thirteen—five of whom were appointed by the Cabinet—are Laymen. The Commission is sub-divided into committees whose functions are to perform certain tasks appertaining to the work of the commission; namely, (1) The committee on contacting Annual and District Boards for their budgets. (2) The committee on cooperating with District Stewards in charge of apportionments. (3) The committee on Conference and District Percentages. (4) The committee on suitable bonding and proper bank for depositing conference funds. And (5) the committee on auditing treasurers' books forty days after the adjournment of the conference. Some of the same members of course serve on several of these sub-committees, where we only have a limited number that compose our commission duplication would be expected.

Division of Finance

There are three divisions of finance for which the commission is expected to consider in the formation of the annual budget—as we see it: (1)

The support of the General and Annual Conference Benevolences. (2) The General Administration Fund and (3) The Episcopal Fund.

The Commission is not unmindful of its grave responsibilities. We also realize that, if we your commission are to function intelligently and more efficiently and at the same time expeditiously—some action should be taken at this conference to assure the traveling expenses of the members of the commission who attend the commission meetings—without them having to wait a year or more before they are paid. We experience this year because of unpaid traveling expenses it would seem—that we were unable to get many of the men to attend the meetings. Therefore in the light of our past experience—the chairman of the commission has a few suggestions or recommendations to offer at this time for conference action if the conference sees fit to act upon them: (1) In respect to expenses of travel by the members of the commission—we suggest that the commission be authorized to work out some system on percentage basis on our total conference budget, whereby it will be possible for all expense accounts, properly attested by the conference or district boards presenting them, be paid by the conference treasurer.

The action of the conference on this suggestion or recommendation; the reason for such might be seen in the further duties of the commission; The commission is responsible for seeing that all the treasurers of the several Conference Boards are Bonded we assume: If this be correct—much could be saved in bonding if it were possible to eliminate some of the treasurers, by the process of centralization of our conference debt paying, that may be incurred by our conference and district boards. (2) The commission would suggest in as much as the Discipline plainly states (page 261 Par. 832) that no employee of any conference or connectional board shall be eligible to membership in the Commission on World Service and Finance that the same apply to our Annual Conference. We recommend that our Conference Cabinet exercise the greatest care in studying and appointing members to the commission. The commission feels that no person or persons—whose board to which they may previously belong and such board has a budget to be considered by the commission should be eligible to membership. The reason for this is obvious. (3) In order to further curtail Annual Conference expenses—the commission wishes to have this conference to permit by authorization—the election or appointment in the commission—an EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—composed of the heads of the various sub-committees—who will have authority to meet quarterly or semi-annually or as often as may be deemed necessary—to transact such business as may be the committees responsibility to perform. Action, granting such privileges—the commission feels will also save the conference less travelling expense to be taken care.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE, APRIL, 1942

You will find in the Year Book figures and reports which in part record the achievements of the staff workers and local churches of the Delaware Conference in Christian Education this year. We rejoice that they seem to say at the end of our tenth year of work "we are on the march."

In reporting for the Board I shall mention only a few matters in the work of the year. Please read the reports of the staff workers and the record found in the Year Book.

Our Aim Has Been To Help

At our Board meetings during the year, and especially at the Conference on Christian Education, (the only conference of its kind so far as we know held in the Central Jurisdiction) efforts were made to acquaint the Board members and certain other "key" persons with the function of a Conference Board of Education. We are aware that effective work in this area calls for staff workers and board members who have sufficient specialized training, interest, and insight in religious education to meet the standards approved by the General Board of Education of the Methodist Church.

Toward Better Understanding

We entered upon this year with considerable misgivings lest the changes incident to adjusting ourselves to the new order of things might retard our work. We are glad to point out that a study of this report will reveal that something really great has been happening this year. We thank God and You. We believe there is a clearer understanding of the relation of the staff members to the Board and the Board to the staff; and what we all are expected to do and how it is to be done.

Finances

The Treasurer reports all bills paid to date, with sufficient cash on hand to begin another year in good shape. In this connection we wish to express our appreciation for the business-like management of our affairs on the part of D. W. Henry, our Treasurer. He has provided a check book with the name of the Conference Board printed thereon, and issues neat and dignified Rally Day vouchers.

It is the desire of the Board of Education to help and cooperate at all times with the World Service Agency of our church. With this in mind, we have decreased our benevolent asking for Christian education this year from \$5,075.00 to \$3,386.00. This will, of course, decrease our receipts from the conference treasurer, but it will mean a larger percentage for General Benevolences. Please note the record of the churches on Rally Day offerings. This has not been so good. The present budget calls for \$1,500.00 for the Rally Day Fund. In view of the decreased amount we will receive from the Conference Treasurer, it becomes imperative that the churches raise the total Rally Day asking of \$1,500.00.

Another item that should be given your careful attention is **Fourth Sunday World Service Offering**. The discipline requires each church to set aside the offering on the fourth Sunday in each month for **World Service and Annual Conference benevolences**. A portion of this offering is returned to the Conference Board of Education, and the offering each church gives may be applied on the acceptances of the local church **General and Conference Benevolences**.

IN APPRECIATION

We wish to express our appreciation for the splendid cooperation on the part of the following persons: **BISHOP A. P. SHAW**, who sat with us in Executive meetings and gave us helpful advice as we faced some problems during the year; **F. J. HANDY**, Executive Secretary, who has been very conscientious, traveling many hundreds of miles in the discharge of his duties; **HENRY J. NICHOLS** and **REESE BROWN**, who have given real leadership to the Youth program; **THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS**, who being fully alert to the significance and importance of our task, have cooperated fully all along the line.

A CLOSING WORD

A little child in London had been evacuated and was living out in the country. In her prayer one night she said, "Lord take care of mother and daddy back in London, but be sure to take care of yourself, because if anything happens to you I am sunk."

In the face of today's normal breakdown when the entire world is deserting the old idealism and is being compelled to turn to violence, unless we who call ourselves Christian take care that the religious and ethical teachings of Jesus replace the pagan ideas of hate, injustice, and war, "we are sunk."

Obituary



REV. JOHN SHERMAN COULBOURN

The Rev. John S. Coulbourn passed to his reward July 31, 1941 in Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore, Maryland. He was born to the late Alfred and Elizabeth Coulbourn at Deal Island, Somerset County, Maryland, May 31st, 1867. He was handicapped in his intellectual opportunity through the early death of his father who left him to share with his mother the responsibility of a large family. During his boyhood days he read the life of the late Joshua Thomas, who was a pioneer character of "The Peninsula Methodism." Like his hero, he became a man of great faith in God. Converted when a youth, soon thereafter he felt the urge and call to the Christian ministry.

Realizing that his meager training was incomplete, he diligently applied himself. Aided by capable tutors he became a well read man, an earnest student, and a deep thinker. He was highly appreciated by the eminent men with whom he was associated. In his own conference (Delaware) he had been for many years and was still serving as a member of the Board of Stewards and Trustees. For twenty five years he attended consistently the Hampton Ministerial Conference, Hampton Institute, Hampton, Va., and was serving as a director and member of the executive committee.

As a pastor-preacher, he might be equalled by many but surpassed by few. He was largely endowed with evangelistic passion; gracious revivals accompanied his preaching. He was a capable administrator and an able financier. While tactful in his Christian leadership he never compromised.

In 1896 he joined the Delaware Conference, Bishop Isaac W. Joyce presiding. He served successfully the following charges: White Haven, Maryland, 3 years; Quantico, Maryland, 3 years; Wattsville, Virginia, 23 years; Berlin, Maryland, 8 years; Easton, Maryland, 7 years, 3 months.

At the Wattsville charge in Virginia, he organized and built the St. Johns Church, extensively renovated the parsonage, and left a goodly sum in the treasury for remodeling the present Friendship Church. Here for 23 years he was highly esteemed and enjoyed the confidence of the people of both races.

At St. Paul, Berlin, Md., in two years he liquidated the long standing mortgage of \$3200.00. Extensive modern improvements were made in the parsonage. Serving eight years, he left this church well organized and active in all of the many departments.

At Asbury, Easton, Maryland, likewise he renovated both church and parsonage and liquidated large past due indebtedness. Besides he majored in the educative as well as the spiritual interest of the young people, as is reflected in the intellectual development of his own children. A Junior Choir, Boy Scout Troop, and several other young people's clubs had been organized as a result of his efforts. "The Easton Journal" paid him the following tribute: "Rev. J. S. Coulbourne was one of the most popular Negro ministers of the Eastern Shore and was an indefatigable worker for the uplift of his people."

Rev. Coulbourne was twice married. In early life to Miss Georgeanna Robinson of Deal Island, Maryland. She passed during the early stage of his ministry. In 1899 he was joined in holy wedlock to Miss Helen C. Waters of Pocomoke City, Maryland. She survives and was a very valuable asset to him in his Christian ministry. From the former union there survive two sons, John Herman of Pocomoke City, and James Percy of Salem, N. J. Of the latter union there are five daughters: Mrs. Viola C. Jackson of Baltimore, Md., Mrs. Elsie C. Briddell of Berlin, Md., Mrs. Lavinia C. DeBrille of New York City, Mrs. Elaine Fields and Grace C. Gates of Easton, Md. Other relatives include a brother, Mr. James M. Coulbourne of New Castle, Delaware, and a sister, Mrs. Isaac H. Bivens of Marion, Md.

The funeral was conducted at Asbury Methodist Church, Easton, Md. at one p. m. August 4th. The eulogy was delivered by the Superintendent of the Easton District, Rev. Dr. D. H. Hargis, assisted by his former district superintendents: Reverends J. E. A. Johns of the Salisbury District, Rev. Doctors J. W. Jewett of the Philadelphia District, F. H. Butler, former Supt. of the Dover District, and J. R. Waters former Supt. of the Salisbury District. Prayer was offered by the Rev. J. L. Taylor of Merchantville, N. J. The Scripture lessons were read by Rev. Dr. W. C. Thompson, Dist. Supt. of the Wilmington Dist. and Rev. L. H. McArthur of the Dover District. Resolutions of sympathy from various departments of the church were read by Mrs. Gertrude Poney. Rev. C. W. Derrickson of Preston, Md. read resolutions from the Easton District and announced those from the other districts and numerous telegrams and letters of condolence from eminent friends and

admirers. The pall bearers with a large cortege of automobiles accompanied the body to Berlin, Maryland, where final leave was taken and interment made in St. Paul Cemetery, North Berlin, Maryland.

J., 5 years; Swainton, N. J., 2 years; Ocean City, N. J., 3 years; St. Peters, Wilmington, Delaware, 3 years; Galena, Maryland, 1 year; Sharptown, Maryland, 4 years; Still Pond, Maryland, 1 year, 5 months.

On August 30th, Saturday, 10 A. M., while having a battery changed in his car, at the garage in Still Pond, he was mortally stricken with a stroke of paralysis. After he was brought home he said to his wife, "Mame, send for all the children, I want to see them because I am going home." Having preached his last sermon the Sunday before, his subject was, "Heaven is a place for the Soul." His text was, "I go to prepare a place for you,—" John 14:2. People who heard him said, they have never heard him preach a more powerful sermon. Being rendered speechless by the stroke, he could only say yes and no.

Saturday, September 13th, he waved his hand to his wife, and the children around the bedside, Goodbye; he then turned over on his side just one hour before the end, and at 4:15 A. M., Sunday, September 14, he quietly stole away to be with His God for evermore. At the bedside was his wife and nearly all the children.

Beatrice, Dorothy E., Earl M., and Barbara B., one brother, Andrew, 22 Grand-children, 4 great grand-children and many nieces and nephews, and other relatives and a host of friends.

In the death of Rev. J. L. Davis the wife sustains the loss of a good and kind husband, the children lose a loving and indulgent father and the Delaware Conference the loss of an able gospel preacher, a faithful pastor and a lovable christian brother.

REV. ROBERT SALISBURY JOHNS

He remodeled and painted the church and parsonage at Centreville Ct., and Frankford, Pa. He bought the ground and built the spacious parsonage at Pleasantville, N. J. which stands as a monument to his memory; even though his stay at Centreville was brief, he freed the tabernacle of a long standing debt with the hearty co-operation of the faithful members, and the kind white friends. His term as president of the preachers' meeting of his district expired in June. He was deeply interested in the program of the church, and did his best to help his district put it over.

He was a devoted husband, a kind, sympathetic and affectionate father, a friend that was faithful, loyal and true. (He made sacrifices and performed deeds of kindness for his friends that were extraordinary), a churchman that was upright and conscientious, a powerful and effective preacher, and a christian gentleman of the first magnitude.

REV. EUGENE OTHO PARKER

In the year of our Lord 1867 on the 29th day of August in Dorchester Co., there was born to the happy union of the late Rev. E. E. Parker and Patience Parker their first child—a male child who was christened Eugene Otho. He grew up as the average country lad experiencing all the hardships and privations of an undeveloped rural community. He attended the public schools of Maryland and later the Institute for Colored Youth of Phila. and Morgan College. For several years he taught in the public schools of Maryland and Virginia. These experiences were but preparations for the larger calling to the ministry. Yielding to this call which came while teaching at Miles River he entered the Theological school of Morgan College. He was licensed to preach by the late Rev. J. H. Winters and preached his first sermon in the Whatcoat Methodist Church, Dover, Delaware, having been admitted to the conference in 1896 and received his first appointment at John Wesley Mission, New Haven, Conn. It was while here that he met and married Miss Elizabeth Williams with whom he lived in happy wedlock for over 44 years. This union proved through the years to be one of complete sympathy, understanding and happiness emanating from lives filled with spiritual devotion.

His life as a minister in the Delaware Conference has been an epic in christian faith, hope and perseverance. Through all his experiences he had an abiding faith in his brethren and a love which transcended personal gain and preferment. So unselfish was he that oftentimes it would seem that this attitude reacted against his best interest. In manner he was rather reserved and one had to have intimate contacts in order to appreciate and evaluate his high christian ideals. The impress of his personality has borne significant results in all the appointments which he has served. His position as statistical secretary of the Delaware Conference covering a period of over 20

years, established an enviable record and stands as a tribute of high estimate in which his services were held. It has been stated that not in the history of the Conference has a district superintendent revealed and practiced such unselfish service and manifested greater personal interest in his brethren than he. Their personal welfare at all times took precedence to his own. He indeed was a true christian brother.

He died as he wished in the active service of the Master. As the close of the conference year approached so too approached the close of his life's work. In his own home at Denton, Md. which he had purchased at great sacrifice, in the presence of his dearest earthly companion he laid down to sleep in the quiet afternoon of April 25 at 3:20 p. m.

While the sun was shining and the birds singing their carols of life and happiness he passed to the larger life for which through all the years of toil, hardships and disappointments he had been directing his footsteps.

He is survived by four brothers, B. C. F. Parker, E. W. Parker of Philadelphia, T. R. Parker and E. Q. Parker of New York and three sisters, Mrs. M. E. Taylor and Mrs. A. G. Waters, of Phila. and Mrs. C. P. Henry of Dover, Del.; and a foster son, Lester E. Parker.

There were two funerals. 10:30 a. m. at Denton, Md. and 3:00 p. m. Ezion Methodist Church, Wilmington, Del. respectively, conducted by Rev. Dr. David H. Hargis, Dist. Supt. Rev. J. E. A. Johns, Supt. of the Salisbury District, a class mate, delivered the Eulogy at Denton. Remarks were made by Rev. Dr. J. W. Jewett, Supt. of the Phila. Dist.; Rev. L. H. McArthur, Supt. of Dover Dist., Rev. Dr. D. W. Henry and Pres. R. S. Grossley, Del. State College.

Resolutions representing the various departments of the local Church were read by Mrs. Jessie Brown, Rev. C. D. Gerald read the resolutions from the Easton Dist. and announced the other resolutions, telegrams and letters of Condolence. The favorite hymns of the deceased were sung.

At Wilmington, Del., Rev. Dr. F. J. Handy, another classmate, delivered the Eulogy. Remarks were made by Rev. Dr. W. C. Thompson, Supt. of Wilmington Dist., Revs. Drs. F. H. Butler and J. T. Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely: (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and if sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

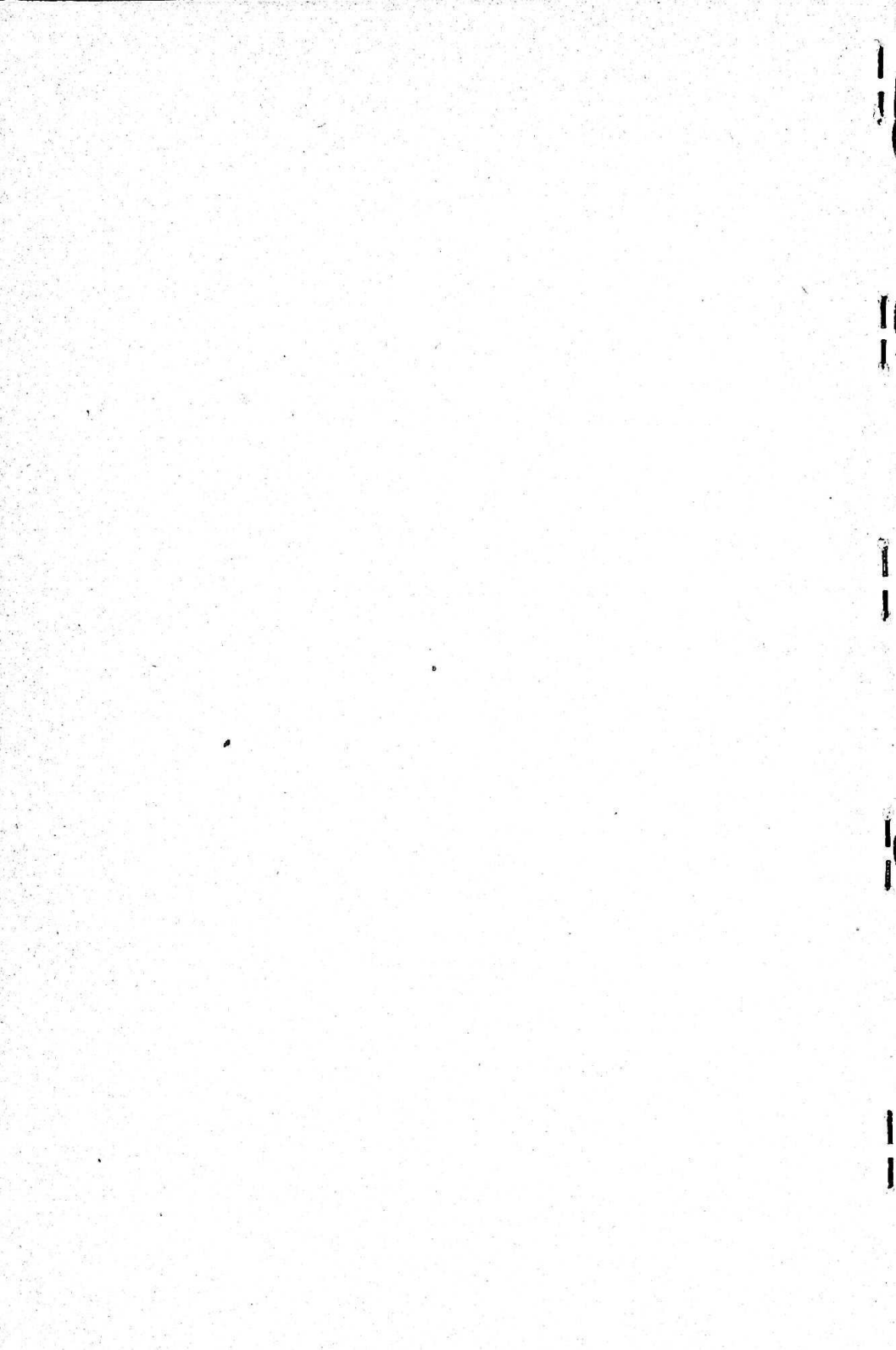
