FIRST DAY, THURSDAY, APRIL 19, 1945

Tindley Temple Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa.

OPENING. The Delaware Annual Conference of The Methodist Church was called to order in its Eighty-third Session at 11 A. M. on the above date and in the above named church. R. B. Thompson led in the singing of the first hymn in The Methodist Hymnal, "Holy, Holy, Holy, Lord God Almighty." The Bishop requested the Conference to bow in a moment of silence, after which he offered prayer.

ROLL CALL. The Secretary of the last Conference, D. L. Ridout, called the roll of the persons selected to transact the business of the Conference, and read the statement recently issued by the resident Bishop giving permission to ministers and elected laymen living in the Philadelphia metropolitan area to attend the Conference as members—this following government regulation issued from Washington, D. C.

SECRETARY ELECTED. On motion of M. W. Clark, D. L. Ridout was elected secretary of the Conference, and named the following assistants: D. R. Fletcher, J. O. Stanley, W. G. Matthews, Mrs. Ella Bailey, and Mrs. Clarissa D. Walker.

STATISTICIAN ELECTED. On motion of F. O. T. Laws, M. W. Clark was elected statistician, and named the following assistants: W. E. Stanley, R. C. Hughes, E. W. Holden, C. B. Miles, Sidney Emptage, W. H. Mears, B. B. Carson, B. A. Arnold, W. E. Marks, J. I. Williams, O. P. Dickerson, W. R. Price, A. L. Scriber, M. L. McKenney, S. G. Fullman, I. R. Elzey, and J. A. Fassett.

LEGAL LIMITS. On motion of R. G. Waters, legal limits of the Conference were fixed at six seats from the front of the auditorium, including the three inside sections.

TREASURER'S ASSISTANTS ELECTED. W. J. Helm, Conference treasurer, named his assistants: W. A. Harewood and W. A. T. Miles.

PIANIST ELECTED. On motion of M. W. Clark, W. L. D. Lyght was elected pianist of the Conference.

CHOIRSTER ELECTED. On motion of F. O. T. Laws, R. B. Thompson was elected Conference chorister.

FRATERNAL GREETINGS. On motion of D. H. Hargis, fraternal greetings were requested from the delegation visiting from the Washington Conference, the group to name such a speaker, who would appear at the discretion of the presiding Bishop.

POSTMASTER APPOINTED. C. B. Miles was asked by the Bishop to serve as postmaster, and was elected by the Conference.

CORRESPONDENT. On motion of R. G. Waters, D. L. Ridout was named correspondent to the secular and religious press, and authorized to select assistants if needed.

COMMITTEES NOMINATED. O. H. Spence, secretary of the Cabinet, announced the Boards, Commissions and Committees for the ensuing year. On motion of J. W. Parker, they were elected, except the Board of Conference Claimants, to be completed later.

DESIGNATED SESSION. On motion of W. L. D. Lyght the Conference voted to be designated by the years since its organization, this being the Eighty-third Session, and the Sixth Session of the Delaware Conference of The Methodist Church.

TRANSFER OF FUNDS. On motion of J. W. Parker, the one per cent of pastors' cash salaries paid to the Investment Fund was ordered transferred to the current fund for immediate distribution.

TELEGRAM OF CONDOLENCE. The secretary was ordered to send a telegram of condolence to Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, widow of the late President, on his untimely passing a week ago today.

ANNUITY FOR SUPPLY PASTORS. J. W. Parker offered a resolution on the special Conference Claimants Annuity to be paid accepted supply pastors. See resolution.

RESOLUTION OF WELCOME. L. S. Moore offered a resolution of welcome to Bishop Shaw and a pledge of co-operation to the local church in view of the problems related to entertaining the Conference in a period affected by war-time restrictions. On his motion the resolution was adopted. See resolution.

COMMUNION. The service of Communion was announced by the Bishop. Hymn 219 was sung, under leadership of R. B. Thompson, with

W. L. D. Lyght at the piano.

The Bishop based his meditation on the fourteenth verse of the nineteenth Psalm: "Let the words of my mouth, and the meditation of my heart, be acceptable in Thy sight, O Lord, my Strength and my Redeemer."

The Communion offering was received, with the request of the Bishop that it be applied to the Delaware Conference's application for membership in the Council of Negro Churches, of which he is president.

Assisted by the District Superintendents and several elders, the Bishop administered the Holy Communion. D. L. Ridout presided at the organ, and C. W. Derrickson led the singing.

MEMORIAL SERVICE. L. S. Moore was named to preside at the Memorial Service. The Conference stood as names of the members, supply pastors, and widows having died during the year were called: R. H. Hymns 525, 523, and 529 were sung. C. W. Pullett offered the prayer. The eulogy was delivered by F. H. Butler. The benediction was pronounced by W. J. Helm.

FIRST DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION

Th presiding Bishop called the Conference to order at 3 P. M. Hymn 219 was sung. Prayer was offered by W. H. Staten. The Bishop called members of the Conference within the bar.

CHECK PRESENTED. F. C. Kershaw, representing the Central Christian Advocate, presented a check from the Methodist Publishing House in amount of \$2,359.02.

JOURNAL APPROVED. The secretary read the journal of the morning session. It was approved.

MINISTERS WIVES PRESENTED. On request of J. W. Parker, the Ministers Wives Association was given opportunity to make its annual report of monies received for the Conference Claimants Fund. Mrs. C. D. Gerald, president, presided. Mrs. S. G. Dix, secretary, called the roll of Districts. The following reported:

WORLD SERVICE COMMISSION. C. L. Trader, chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, was presented, and made the Commission's annual report.

On motion of D. H. Hargis, the Conference voted to accept the increased apportionment for World Service suggested by the Chicago

office.

On motion of F. J. Handy, \$200 was added to the budget for the

School of Ministerial Training.

D. R. Fletcher moved that the Conference treasurer's form for remittances from charges be employed by the District Superintendents in making their apportionments for the year.

After lengthy discussion, the previous question was ordered by F. H. Butler.

The motion of D. R. Fletcher prevailing, District Superintendents were instructed to follow the Conference treasurer's form in apportioning

L. S. Moore made inquiry concerning the failure of the Commission to approve the request for \$1,000 additional for the Promotional Fund. Bishop Shaw explained the purpose of the Fund, after which the increase

was approved.

On motion of D. H. Hargis, the Commission was ordered to study all matters pertaining to Conference entertainment for action at a later session.

The report of the Commission was approved pending settlement of the matters left open for further consideration.

INTRODUCED. The Rev. E. W. J. Schmitt, of the Philadelphia Conference, was introduced, and made a plea for citizens of Philadelphia to open their homes to soldiers and their families temporarily located in the city.

RECOMMENDATIONS. C. L. Trader, chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance, recommended that \$500 be appropriated

to help support migrant work in the Conference area.

The Commission's recommendation that $2\frac{1}{2}$ % of the pastor's estimated salary be the percentage for Conference Support was approved. On motion of Mrs, Helen Waters, the Conference was instructed to carry out last year's order to entertain ministers' wives free beginning at the next session.

On motion of H. H. Nichols, a committee was appointed to decide on distribution of this year's entertainment fund, in consideration of the abbreviated, delegated session. Those appointed, on nomination of the District Superintendents, were: J. W. Elbert, C. W. Derrickson, Hally P. Johns, W. L. D. Lyght, O. W. Jones, D. W. Henry, and W. A. Hubbard.

INTRODUCED. Dr. J. W. Golden, associate secretary of the General Board of Evangelism, and Dr. A. R. Howard, of the Board of Temperance, and the Rev. J. C. King, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, Frankford, Philadelphia, were introduced.

EXECUTIVE SESSION ORDERED. On motion of D. H. Hargis, an executive session was ordered for 3:00 o'clock this afternoon.

OFFERING RECEIVED. The offering for H. T. Johnson was received, amounting to \$51.00.

ADJOURNMENT. After several announcements, the session adjourned with benediction by Dr. J. W. Golden.

L. S. MOORE IN CHAIR. The Bishop appointed L. S. Moore to preside pending the Bishop's arrival.

ASSOCIATE LAY LEADERS ELECTED. On nomination of Hally P. Johns, Conference Lay Leader, the following associates were named for the five Districts of the Conference: Dover District, James R. Webb; Easton District, W. D. Earle; Philadelphia District, Roy L. Cordrey; Salisbury District, Mrs. Sarah Church; Wilmington District, Mrs. Ella Bailey.

REPORT OF PUBLISHING COMMITTEE. B. B. Carson was presented and made the report for the Minutes Publication Committee. On his motion the report was approved, and 3,000 copies of the Minutes were ordered printed this year, the price to be advanced to thirty-five cents.

PRESENTATION. H. H. Nichols made the presentation of \$51 to H. T. Johnson in appreciation of his years of service as Conference registrar.

The Bishop resumed the chair at this point.

BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS. H. R. Coleman made the report of the Board of Conference Claimants. On motion of J. W. Parker, the report was adopted with the recommendation that pastors and churches strive to raise the annuity to the disciplinary standard of \$15 next year.

Drs. N. J. Crolley and C. L. Calkins, representatives of the Board of Pensions, were introduced and addressed the Conference.

OFFERING FOR WIDOW. J. W. Parker suggested that an offering be taken for Mrs. A. F. Winder, widow of a recently deceased supply

pastor. The offering amounted to \$52, which the Bishop presented to Mrs. Winder. E. A. Hughes presented an additional \$30 on behalf of the accepted supply pastors of the Conference.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM REPORT. H. R. Coleman made the annual report of the Commission on Evangelism, with W. C. Thompson presiding. On motion of H. R. Coleman, the report was adopted. See report. On motion of H. H. Nichols, the Conference ordered sufficient copies of the report printed to supply the needs of local churches of the Conference.

Discussion of the report ensued, after which Dr. J. W. Golden, associate secretary of the General Board of Evangelism, delivered an inspirational address.

FEPC APPROVED. D. R. Fletcher offered a resolution ordering the secretary of the Conference to write Governor Martin, of Pennsylvania, urging his support of passage of the Brown FEPC Bill. On his motion the resolution was approved. See resolution.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ENTERTAINMENT. W. L. D. Lyght reported for the special committee appointed to decide on allocation of this year's Conference Support fund. On his motion \$1,400 was ordered paid to the entertaining church, the balance to be applied to the Promotional Fund.

NEW JERSEY STATE COUNCIL. R. B. Thompson offered a resolution urging the New Jersey churches of the Conference to accept membership offered in the New Jersey Council of Churches. On his motion the resolution was adopted (see resolution) and the secretary was instructed to inform the Council of this action.

EXECUTIVE SESSION. The Bishop announced that the delayed executive session would be held immediately following adjournment.

ACTION OF EXECUTIVE SESSION. The executive session was called by the Bishop to hear the report of the Committee on Investigation concerning the case of Roland Grant. J. W. Elbert made the report for the committee. The recommendation was that Roland Grant be suspended from all ministerial duties in The Methodist Church until such time as he may be brought to trial for alleged "unministerial conduct."

Reports of District Superintendents

DOVER DISTRICT

Bishop Shaw, Members of the Conference and Friends:

Praise to Almighty God for enabling me to present this my Second Annual Report of the Dover District to the Sixth Session of the Delaware Annual Conference. The year has been like a checkered pattern. In some the dark predominated, in some the light, but in all the two were blended. This gave symmetry and balance to life. I was able to carry on with an unfaltering trust.

Sickness and Death

For the most part the District health has been good. Only mild colds which usually accompany the wintry months were the experiences of a few. Revs. C. W. Winder and J. L. Parker, retired, remain on the sick list. Rev. A. L. McGill, pastor at Still Pond, Maryland, passed quietly to his well earned reward on February 3, 1945. Suitable tributes will appear elsewhere in the Conference Journal.

These have had deaths in their families: Rev. J. O. Stanley lost a step-mother; Mrs. W. E. Stanley, a brother; Mrs. D. G. Waters, a sister; and the writer an aunt. Among the outstanding laymen of the District who have died during the year, I mention Mr. J. H. Roach, a District Parsonage Trustee, resident of Harrington, Del. These all died in faith.

Changes of Pastors

Bishop Shaw made the following changes during the year: Rev. J. A. Fassett was transferred from Milford, Del., to Haven, Wilmington. Rev. S. G. Dix was changed from Bridgeville Ct. to Milford, Del. Rev. F. D. Jones was transferred from S. Berlin, Md., to Elkton, Md. With the permission of Bishop Shaw, Revs. George O. Commodore, Herman T. Moody, George A. Tiller, Local Preachers, were appointed to finish the unexpired terms at Bridgeville Ct., S. Berlin, and Still Pond, respectively.

District Activities

Our District Stewards' Meeting was held in Wesley Chapel Methodist Church, Lincoln, Delaware. The meeting was well attended by ministers and district stewards. The forward program for the year was presented and adopted. All went away determined to make our dreams come true. Rev. Lockman and his people were our gracious hosts.

Dr. A. R. Howard, of Washington, D. C., visited the Dover District during the week of May 21st. His Temperance Itinerary touched each sub-district group, bringing many people together to hear this great exponent of the cause of temperance and sobriety in all things. The diabolical evil, public enemy number one, was struck at its tap root. His messages were graphic and concrete. Only the impervious mind did not see the nefarious evil that

is taking so many in its wake, draining the body of its power and abusing it by dissipation. Alcoholic beverages clip the wings of every noble aspiration, sear the conscience, weaken the will. Temperance must be taught and practiced in the homes, taught in the churches and schools, until our youth see it and shun it as a deadly poison. We had a good take off for the beginning of the conference year.

Our District Methodist Youth Fellowship Assembly convened in John Wesley Methodist Church, Seaford, Delaware, June 19, 20, 21. A large number of the choice Youth of the thirty-four charges registered for the classes that were taught by able teachers. Judging from the reports of the secretaries of the classes of the interest manifested by the young people, the school was indeed a helpful one. Rev. W. E. Marks and his good people were hospitable and generous in providing for us during the three days we were among them.

The Preachers Organization, Ministers' Wives Association, and the District W. S. C. S. meetings were held throughout the year. These contacts and associations were instrumental in keeping the District alive to the great issues of the church and movements of the age, thereby making our pronouncements upon them. Christian spirit characterized these meetings. We left these meetings with our general morale built up for the days that were ahead.

The District Laymen's Conference of November 15, 1945, at Whatcoat Church, Dover, Del., was quite a success. Professor J. R. Webb, District Lay Leader, and the Associate District Lay Leaders, deserve much credit for the timely discussions, papers that were read and seminars conducted. The evening was devoted to the District Roll Call for the Conference Claimants Campaign. Dr. L. S. Moore, pastor of Haven Church, Philadelphia, was the guest speaker.

Christian Education

Christian Education in the local churches and on the District is making an imprint upon the lives of the people. More Vacation Church Schools are being conducted each year. Christian Workers Schools were held at Berlin, Chestertown, and Dover, respectively. The Conference Executive Secretary of Christian Education visited each of these schools giving Christian Education through visual aid. He and the District staff have helped in a large way in the achievements that we have had. Dr. Simpson of the General Board in Nashville, spent a day with the ministers of the District, giving fruitful information and offering helpful suggestions as to how to do a better job in this all-important field.

Crusade for Christ

The Crusade (financial phase) comes to us as a challenge to our loyalty and devotion to a just and worthy cause. The needs to be met at home and abroad are imperative. It was from this viewpoint that the charges accepted their obligations; it is from this point of view that they are discharging them. The Crusade is a means of revealing the possibilities that are about us. The layman, when intelligently informed and given a post of responsi-

bility, will respond to duty. He has marvelous latent powers which, when released and harnessed to some worthwhile task, have untold results. If the other phases of the Crusade receive the same emphasis, have like co-operation, and intensive efforts followed, the Church will realize its goal.

The Efficiency Conference is always a high point of interest. It was unusually high this year due to the presence of our Resident Bishop, Rev. A. P. Shaw, who delivered the noontide Message. He knows what to say and how to say it in the most effective way. The quality of the papers that were read, discussions, messages by the visiting Superintendents, excellent reports by the pastors, are reverberating in our ears. The conference was climaxed by "A District Talent Night," sponsored by the ministers' wives.

BRIDGEVILLE—This charge continues to advance under the leadership of its hard-working pastor. It was the first to raise its Crusade quota in full. WILLISTON has again excelled herself. The parsonage has been renovated for occupancy, but the pastor persists in living in Cambridge. However, success crowns the final effort. Ministerial Support, \$908; World Service and General Conference Benevolences, \$61; Crusade for Christ, \$221; \$1008 for repairs on parsonage and current expenses. Grand Total, \$2215.

Conversions, 1; Accessions, 4. P. R. Brown, pastor.

WITTMAN has excelled all recent previous good records. At Sherwood Church, the young people have been exceptionally active. The Wittman Church promises to take on new life. They report: Ministerial Support, \$1364; World Service and Conference Benevolences, \$141; Crusade for Christ, \$565, all in full; Raised for Trustees, \$1850. The long standing mortgage has been liquidated and the resident Bishop was present at the mortgage burning. His visit has greatly inspired these people. They have witnessed a revival. Conversions, 21; Accessions, 21. E. N. Foster, pastor.

District Meetings

The accustomed promotional Kingdom building meetings with appropriate instructive, and inspirational programs have been held. Arduous have been the activities but the accruing results have been gratifying. Again all the accepted supplies attended the Morristown, Tennessee, Ministerial Training School. Many ministers attended the School for Rural, and City Pastors at Morgan State College, Baltimore, Maryland, and the Area Council at Wilmington, Delaware.

The 80th Anniversary for the Conference Claimants Endowment Fund and the Crusade for Christ were launched according to the scheduled plan. Each cause has been liberally supported by the loyal self-sacrificing members.

Quarterly Conference

We have visited and preached in all the churches. The first and fourth Quarterly Conferences were held individually. The second and third were very profitably held collectively through the sub-district groups. These groups led by their chairmen, have done very fine and successful teamwork which has been very helpful in raising the Crusade for Christ allotments.

Ministers Wives Association

These energetic women have been an inspiration in all our district meetings. This year they surpass all previous records in their very liberal contribution to Conference Claimants.

Woman's Society of Christian Service and Men's Lay Activities

The Woman's Society of Christian Service has been very constant and successful in their labors. Besides meeting their budget in full, in some instances they have done the major work in raising the Crusade for Christ and other Conference causes.

The Methodist Men intermittingly function but as a whole they are indifferent, lacking the motive power to carry on. This seems to be their prevailing attitude in spite of the Herculean efforts on the part of the District Lay Leaders to have them steadfastly advance. The Annual Laymen's Conference was held at Easton, November 9.

Special Campaign

The special district campaign for liquidating old indebtedness and raising funds to renovate and build new churches has been continued with eminent success. Asbury, Easton, and John Wesley, Denton, have burned their long standing mortgages. Charles Wesley, Centreville, Magee at Longwoods, Waters on the Aireys Charge, John Wesley at Stevensville, Bryan Chapel at Grasonville, Thompson Chapel at East New Market, John Wesley at Beckwith, Ebenezer at Linas Road, St. Paul at Royal Oak, Lockman on the Ridgely Charge have beautifully renovated their churchs. Greensboro, Easton, and Wittman have remodeled their parsonages. Union Grove at Hurlock, and John Wesley at Chapel have considerably increased their building funds for new churches. The loyal people at Hoopersville, Middle Hoopers Island, are also raising funds to erect a mission.

Finally, evangelistic efforts have been conducted and there have been conversions and accessions in nearly all the charges. While we have diligently labored we are not satisfied with the results. Organized, we hope to more successfully major under the auspices of the Crusade for Christ this ensuing year.

All charges have paid their pastoral support, Episcopal Fund and District Superintendent's salary in full. Thirty-three merit the World Service distinguished Service Certificate. Twenty-one have raised their Conference Claimants Endowment Apportionments, and thirty-one of the thirty-four charges have raised their Crusade for Christ in full.

Again we are deeply grateful to our Heavenly Father for His abounding goodness and His loving care during these trying times. We greatly appreciate the hearty co-operation and good will of the pastors, their splendid wives, and the loyal lay members with whom we have been permitted to labor.

PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT REPORT

Bishop Shaw and Members of the Conference:



Earl H. Crampton

A District Superintendent might be tempted to write his report in a grandiose style and paint a picture of magnificent proportions. While I have the inspiration mere words cannot express the intangible values achieved by the churches on the Philadelphia District this year.

While it is not possible to mention in detail every improvement and effort carried through, this grand statement should be made, that every church of the District, led by the faithful Pastors and wise and devoted laymen, has taken advantage of the opportunity presented today to improve the financial situation of the Church and Conference.

The late Rev. L. H. McArthur, my predecessor, left the District in good working condition. When God called him to his reward last August I was appointed to take charge of the District work.

I am grateful to Bishop Shaw who entrusted me with this office, the re-

sponsibility and possibility of which I had not fully sensed from the pastor point of view. The Delaware Conference is highly favored in the leadership of Bishop Shaw, a leader who is wise, sympathetic, human, and constructive.

Having said this, let me now report a few achievements under certain specific headings.

Improvements and Debt Reductions: Possibly the greatest achievement made by the churches has been substantial payments on mortgage indebtedness and the canceling of long standing mortgages. Charges establishing a building fund, making improvements or securing new buildings have raised the amount following the names indicated:

John Simmons, \$1,115; East Germantown, \$700; Haven, \$5,700; Newman Memorial, \$12,500; Mt. Zion, \$14,300; Ossining, \$800; Montclair, \$14,-000; Brooklyn, \$2,500; Bethsaida, \$1,700; Trenton, \$3,400; Jamaica \$2,000; John Wesley, Philadelphia, \$4,000; John Wesley, Orange, \$1,300.

The following charges have raised the indicated sum on their bonded debt:

Thirkield, \$1,993; Zoar, \$6,000; Haven, \$3,025; Frankford, \$2,077; White Plains, \$1,600; Butler Memorial, \$600; Camphor, \$3,834; Redeemer, \$600; Englewood, \$527; Germantown, \$6,000; Tindley Temple, \$41,000. Grand total for both items, \$131,271.00.

It affords me great pleasure to announce that four charges have paid off all bonded indebtedness. They are Haven, White Plains, Englewood, and Tindley Temple.

World Service and Benevolences: Here again we have a definite advance. Churches following have overpaid their asking in the amount specified: Englewood \$7.00; Redeemer, \$20; Camphor, \$100; Montclair, \$129; Mt. Zion, \$25.

Charges receiving our congratulations for paying their asking in full are: John Simmons, Zoar, East Calvary, Haven, Frankford, Trenton, East Germantown, Newman Memorial, Brooks Memorial, Newark, Ossining, John Wesley, Butler Memorial, New Rochelle, Bethsaida, and Germantown.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: The Woman's Society of Christian Service will report a total of more than \$18,000 raised to serve the local church, community interests and its work at home and around the world. As I visit the churches and hear reports I am amazed at the remarkable work being done by our women. In our smaller churches these faithful members often "save the day" and keep the churches going. The Woman's Society of Christian Service on the District is helping to furnish the District Parsonage.

Lay Activities: Our lay leaders have had to feel their way in understanding their task and there is considerable distance yet to go. I am persuaded that the only way to have a real District or Conference enterprise is through strong lay leadership.

As I meet the Quarterly Conferences I am convinced of the need for more education on the part of our lay workers. When I see so many church officials who appear to be interested in only the local church and the apportionment sheet and not in the great enterprise of sharing in the name of Jesus Christ I wonder how some of them can pray "Thy Kingdom Come." One of the greatest challenges of our day to both preachers and laymen is to put understanding and spiritual appreciation into the task of building the Kingdom of God on earth.

Church Membership: We are gratified to report that 1057 new members have been received into the churches of the District during the Conference year. Tindley Temple leads with 176. Other churches reporting substantial membership gains are: John Simmons, 5; Thirkield, 5; Zoar, 50; St. Mark, Brooklyn, 2; Haven, 111; Frankford, 22; Shaw Chapel, 2; Trenton, 8; East Germantown, 2; Newman Memorial, 78; Mt. Zion 112; White Plains, 5; Jamaica, 62; Newark, 20; Ossining, 5; John Wesley, Philadelphia, 75; John Wesley, Brooklyn, 25; Montclair, 75; Butler Memorial, 9; Orange, 6; Camphor, 100; Redeemer, 20; Englewood, 8; New Rochelle, 3; Bethsaida, 9; Germantown, 60.

Pastors' reports to me indicate that they are not neglecting this elemental feature of their shepherding ministry. As the Crusade for Christ moves on to other phases of the five year program we shall see that the real test of one's ministry is to influence men and women, boys and girls for God and eternity.

The Spiritual Life: There has been a deepening concern for the spiritual life expressed in different ways. House to house visitation was carried on at Montclair, East Germantown, Butler Memorial, and Bethsaida. A series of evangelistic meetings running for one or two weeks were held at Englewood, Frankford, White Plains, Shaw Chapel, and St. Marks. We yield to none in our conviction that the necessity of a decision for Jesus Christ is basic in our Christian faith. A revival of religion is greatly to be

desired. But we also believe that a decision to follow Christ is only the first step in the development of Christian Character and the expression of specific Christian attitudes.

Evangelism for To-day: For more than twenty years I have had something to do with Christian education in our Conference. At a time when this phase of our ministry was not taken seriously I was convinced of the truth expressed on the cover page of the Board of Education Year Book, "Put knowledge and love into the head and hearts of youth and they alone will build a New World."

And so, it is not surprising to find the District Superintendent attempting to build a district program around Christian education in its fullest sense. All over the district we have reminded both laymen and preachers that the Christian life is not only a belief, a doctrine, but also a growth. I am happy to report that many of our charges have classes for children, youth, and adults meeting at periods outside the regular Church School hour. Others have conducted special programs for children with the view of giving the boys and girls of the Intermediate Age group an opportunity to decide for Christ and after careful training for membership these children were received into full membership. More pastors should give attention to this type of evangelism in the Church Schools.

Increase in Salaries: All the charges except four have increased the cash salary of the pastors. They are as follows:

John Wesley, Brooklyn \$240. Newman Memorial \$1000. Redeemer \$260. Englewood \$200. Jamaica \$400. Jersey City: St. Marks \$50; Thirkield \$300. Montclair \$400. Newark \$580. New York City: Butler \$60; Shaw Chapel \$212. Ossining \$500. Philadelphia: Bethsaida \$300; Camphor \$380; Germantown \$350; Frankford \$240; Haven \$200; John Wesley \$300; Mt. Zion \$228; Peniel \$385; Tindley Temple \$370; Zoar \$400. Trenton \$260. White Plains \$200.

The Crusade for Christ: All of our churches are enthusiastically supporting the Crusade for Christ. Three charges have over-paid their quota. They are Jamaica, Haven, and Camphor. The following churches have paid in full:

John Wesley, Brooklyn \$435; Redeemer \$186; Thirkield \$60; Montclair \$1774; New Rochelle \$30; Newark \$1775; Butler Memorial \$51; Shaw Chapel \$81; Bethsaida \$165; Germantown \$1786; East Germantown \$276; John Wesley, Phila. \$1734; Mt. Zion \$1047; Peniel \$753.

The following charges have made a partial payment:

Newman Memorial \$100; Englewood \$87; St. Marks \$96; East Calvary \$50; Orange \$208; Ossining \$60; Frankford \$100; John Simmons \$50; Tindley Temple \$2500; Zoar \$2000; Trenton \$100; White Plains \$350.

The total for the District is \$20,094.

Some Observations: I should like to conclude this report with some observations pertinent to the Philadelphia District. Two or three of our churches can easily be made first class appointments with the pastors giving their full time to the work.

A number of our pastors conduct very inspiring services, using the beautiful order of services contained in the Methodist Ritual and making full use of the chants at the Communion services. The notices and collections are handled in such a manner that a worshipful atmosphere is maintained at all times.

There is a growing need for local directors of social and religious activities. With the many demands upon a pastor in our Metropolitan Areas it is impossible for him to assume responsibilities for this work. Several of our charges already have such workers who are paid good salaries.

Two outstanding events of the year are the securing of a new church building for the Newman Memorial Church at Brooklyn, N. Y. at a cost of \$37,000, and the merging of Thirkield and St. Marks Churches in Jersey City. Under the leadership of Rev. R. G. Waters and loyal support of the congregation the financial situation was so well handled that to-day the bonded indebtedness of Newman Memorial is only \$12,000. Without a doubt, in a few years we shall have in Jersey City a church equal to our best in the Conference. Rev. D. M. Collins is supervising the project in a statesmanlike manner.

Conclusion: For Mrs. Crampton and myself I wish now to record some words of appreciation for persons and conditions that have made this, our first six months in the office of District Superintendent, a pleasant and satisfying experience. Pastors and their wives, and congregations have given us their unanimous co-operation and in some cases they have given tangible expressions of their affections. Others have written letters expressing their confidence in us. We face the future with hope. We proclaim our message with confidence. We stake everything on Jesus Christ and His Way of Life. In this I feel sure that I voice the deepest feelings of all the faithful pastors and devoted laymen of the District who have wrought so well this year and who face the future with courage. With gratitude I salute them.

Another glorious conference year is soon to become past history. The tempo of the age is one of streamline. The time is ripe for the Church to accept the philosophy of the Old Indian Chief, "Stop and rest, and let our souls catch up with our physical bodies."

A retrospection of the sacrificial labors of thirty-six hard working conscientious pastors, their wives, and congregations, and their fine spirit of Christian co-operation in Kingdom building, is indeed very gratifying.

Our Profound Gratitude

We are grateful for the manifest love and loyalty and most splendid Christian co-operation of both ministers and laity of the District, and the most cordial hospitality tendered us by the "Queens" of the parsonages, and the hospitality of the members of our several parishes. The milk of love and brotherly kindness is needed today as never before in a chaotic world such as ours. The Prophet Isaiah knew whereof he spoke; "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on thee; because he trusteth in thee."

District Health Conditions

W. Hayman. Ministers wives: Mrs. W. T. Brown, Mrs. E. A. Hughes, Mrs. W. J. Mills, Mrs. O. M. Hughes, Mrs. L. A. Watson, Mrs. L. A. Timmons, Mrs. Georgia Winder, Mrs. Edith Johnson, the wife of W. A. Johnson, who is still confined to a hospital in New York City.

Translations This Year

Rev. I. J. Jones, accepted supply of the Deals Island Charge, died July 17, 1944, 3:35 A. M., while a patient in the Marine Hospital, Baltimore, Maryland.

Rev. A. F. Winder, accepted supply of the Dames Quarter Charge, departed this life February 20, 1945, 3:00 P. M. Serving two years and ten months. This year was the climaxing year of his fourteen years of active service.

Rev. Mrs. G. V. Bell sustained the loss of her beloved husband; Mrs. M. L. McKinney, her brother; and the wife of Rev. R. T. Croswell the demise of her beloved mother. Great is our God, and may His spirit dwell richly in the hearts of the relatives of the deceased.

Charge Readjustments

Rev. A. H. Durham, who was serving his second year in the Unionville Charge, was transferred May 21, 1944 back to the Washington Conference by his own request. Rev. L. A. Watson was transferred from the North Carolina Conference to the Delaware Conference, and appointed June 4, 1944, to fill the vacancy at Unionville. The first death was that of Rev. I. J. Jones of Deals Island. Rev. Amos Wilson, local deacon of the Dames Quarter Charge, was appointed to supply until conference. Rev. Isaac White, a local preacher of Dames Quarter Charge, was appointed to serve as Supply Pastor in the passing of Rev. A. F. Winder until conference. His leadership ability has been very evident, and will best be revealed in the report that will follow.

District Meetings

May 23, 1944, District Stewards Meeting, at Metropolitan Methodist Church, Princess Anne. This meeting was well attended, with a planned program setting forth our district goals and program for the year.

June 20th to 23rd, 1944, Methodist Youth Fellowship Institute, held at Princess Anne College, Princess Anne, Maryland: We had an enrollment of 144. Dr. H. A. Bailey, Conference Executive Secretary, was with us and rendered most excellent service both as teacher, preacher and lecturer. The chief among the regrets of the Instituters was our stay at the College was too short. The Institute voted unanimously to return another year.

November 14, 1944, at Asbury Methodist Church, Nanticoke, Maryland, we held a "Crusade for Christ Introduction Day," prayer, study, and inspiration to accept the challenge of raising the full District quota of \$18,342.00.

On the evening of November 14th we observed our Third Annual District Wide Debt Liquidation Contest. Six churches participated in the Mortgage Burning. Three years ago the Home Missions Board held mortgages against church property to the amount of \$13,301.95. Today every dollar has been paid. Three successful Leadership Training Schools were conducted at the following Centers from January 15th to January 25, 1945; Adams' Methodist Church, Parksley, Va., Mt. Zion Methodist Church, Pocomoke City, Md., and John Wesley Methodist Church, Salisbury, Md. February 13, 1945, the Sixth Annual District Layman's Conference was held at Pullett's Methodist Church, Whaleyville, Md., on the Parsonsburg Charge with the District lay leader, Mrs. Sarah E. Church, in charge. January 31, 1945, the Fourth Annual District Missionary Institute was held at Ebenezer Methodist Church, Snow Hill, Md., Rev. W. A. Harewood, District Missionary Secretary, presiding.

March 21, 1945, our Fifth Annual Efficiency Conference was held at Mt. Zion Methodist Church, Quantico, Md. The three sessions were well attended with an overflowing crowd. The occasion was richly graced by the presence of our resident Bishop, A. P. Shaw, D.D., LL.D. The Crusade Roll was called revealing seventeen charges with quotas paid in full. Over \$13,000.00 was reported raised of a District quota of \$18,342.00. The District Ministers Wives Association were in charge in the evening, with the Superintendent's wife presiding. The participants brought to us a program filled with versatilities, rich in entertainment quality, portraying gifts and talents such as we never knew we had on the district.

The Central Christian Advocate

In all of our district meetings the Advocate has been well represented by our District Missionary Secretary, the Rev. W. A. Harewood. The latest report shows: total number new subscriptions 31, total number of renewals 54. The "Skeletonized Conference" will greatly affect the custom of many who usually subscribe or renew their subscription at the seat of the Conference.

Charges

A brief analysis only of the work of each charge will be given in this report. For fuller details consult the reports of the statistician and the treasurer.

COTTAGE GROVE—Some reverses have prevailed in this charge this year. The pastor has suffered much sickness in his family, but has not let down in taking care of his church work. The charge makes the following report: Conversions, 5; Benevolences, \$74; Ministerial Support, \$1087; Other Askings, \$75; Crusade for Christ, \$225; Paid on old debts, \$84; Church and Parsonage Improvements, \$450; Raised for all purposes, \$1995. E. J. Johnson, pastor. His return requested.

CRISFIELD (SHILOH)—This charge continues to march forward under its progressive and most dynamic leader. The church is well organized and functioning. One vested choir. New Communion Table installed. New roof on church. New roof and steps to parsonage with all debts paid. Both pastor and people are happy. The minimum salary set at \$1750.00 for another year. Conversions, 35; Accessions, 2; Benevolences, \$265; Ministerial Support, \$1920; Other Askings, \$136; Crusade for Christ, \$500; the second charge to pay out. Church and parsonage improvements, \$800; Raised for all purposes, \$4,564. J. R. Shockley, pastor. His return requested.

DAMES QUARTER—On February 20, 1945 this charge suffered the loss of its beloved pastor, the Rev. A. F. Winder. He lived to see the mortgage debt of \$818 of long standing with our Board of Missions, and other aggravating debts cancelled. The two churches have been beautifully painted inside and out, after repairs having been made. The "pay as you go" plan was worked. His end came while he was visiting members of his parish. The work has been carried on by the local preacher of the charge, Brother Isaac White. He has done splendid work, and makes the following report: Benevolences, \$154; Ministerial Support, \$1207; Other Askings, \$71; Crusade, \$567; Old Debts, \$568; Church and Parsonage Improvements, \$1595; raised for all purposes, \$4,551. Isaac White, acting pastor.

DEALS ISLAND—This charge at the beginning of the year sought to make in actual demonstration an exception to the saying of Jesus, "A prophet never goes without honor except in his native place and in his home." This congregation was willing to follow the leadership of one of their own sons, I. J. Jones. He received his summons July 17, 1944. The charge sustained a great loss in his passing. The charge makes the following report: Conversions, 1; Benevolences, \$115; Ministerial Support, \$1182; Other Askings, \$71; Crusade, \$300; Church and Parsonage Improvements, \$354; Raised for all purposes, \$2286. Amos Wilson, accepted supply pastor, has made possible this report. His return requested.

FRUITLAND—Another great year has been evidenced in this charge. Both pastor and people are growing in affection one for the other. The charge is happy to report: Accessions, 1; Benevolences, \$213; Ministerial Support, \$1593; Other Askings, \$153; Crusade, \$672; Church and Parsonage Improvements, \$688; Raised for all purposes, \$3872. C. T. Covington, pastor.

GIRDLETREE—This is a three point circuit, and has tremendous possibilities. With the proper leadership, the people feel that their dreams can become a reality. Benevolences, \$221; Ministerial Support, \$1571; Other Askings, \$125; Crusade, \$402; Church and Parsonage Improvements, \$492; Raised for all purposes, \$2949. R. A. F. Graham, pastor.

GREENWOOD—This charge continues to grow and go under its present leader. Both pastor and people are devoted to each other, and perfectly happy to continue housekeeping together. The long standing debt with the Home Missions Board, and other debts, have all been liquidated. This charge is a fine example of what can be done with a three point circuit, when a man is willing to work. The church is well organized and active. The pastor is

quiet and very unassuming, but he gets things done. Conversions, 6; Accessions, 4; Benevolences, \$162; Ministerial Support, \$1440; Other Askings, \$119; Crusade, \$300; Paid on old debts, \$370; Church and Parsonage Improvements, \$496. Raised for all purposes, \$3288. J. W. Hayman, pastor. His return requested.

HOPEWELL—For many years, this charge has suffered for the lack of a young energetic, well trained leader. The prayers and dreams of the two congregations have finally materialized. The churches have taken on new life. One church painted inside and out, and the other with altar rearranged, and new pulpit furniture. Conversions, 13; Benevolences, \$197; Ministerial Support, \$1335; Other Askings, \$108; Crusade, \$280; Church and Parsonage Improvements, \$1800; Raised for all purposes, \$3920. L. A. Timmons, pastor.

HORNTOWN—This charge has established a record, in the last three years, and continues to maintain it, and in some instances far excels all previous records. The pastor has most gloriously closed his seventh year, with the people still shouting, "We are satisfied." They are saying where this Christian pastor leads they will follow. Conversions, 12; Benevolences, \$209; Ministerial Support, \$1550; Other Askings, \$117; Crusade, \$500; Church and Parsonage Improvements, \$289. Raised for all purposes, \$3861. E. H. White, pastor. His return requested.

KELLER—For the past two years this charge has not lived up to its prevailing possibilities, as we had hoped. It is a farming community, with hundreds of precious human diamonds in the rough, who are willing, and want a leader who will live with the people. This is a fertile missionary field, filled with potentialities. Conversions, 5; Accessions, 5; Benevolences, \$54; Ministerial Support, \$929; Other Askings, \$44; Crusade, \$25; Raised for Improvements, \$300; Raised for all purposes, \$1492. R. T. Wallace, pastor.

LEEMONT—This charge reports another victorious year. At Adams' Church a new cement basement has been completed, with interior alterations and painting. Repairs made at the parsonage and painting, with new furniture put in parsonage and all the debts paid to date. The pastor reports this his banner year, with a fine spirit of co-operation prevailing. Conversions, 26; Accessions, 15; Benevolences, \$251; Ministerial Support, \$1942; Other Askings, \$117; Crusade, \$800; Church and Parsonage Improvements, \$2258; Raised for all purposes, \$6193. J. R. Purnell, pastor.

MANOKIN—This charge is endeavoring to hold her own. The pastor is a hard worker. Centennial Church has been beautifully painted, and St. Paul is undergoing renovation on the "pay as you go plan." Benevolences, \$143; Ministerial Support, \$1283; Other Askings, \$61; Crusade, \$135; Church and Parsonage Improvements, \$550; Raised for all purposes, \$3274. G. W. Jones, pastor.

MARION STATION—This charge has no regrets to offer to the Conference for experimenting two years with a woman preacher. All claims are met in full, even the Crusade for Christ, \$420 in full. The full budget was \$2470. Added to the church 7 members and to the Church School 10 pupils.

BRIDGETON, N. J., O'Connell Milbourne, pastor. The pastor and people are doing most excellent work together. The material improvements made on the charge are attractive and receiving favorable comment. All claims are paid in full even the extra \$716 for the Crusade for Christ. The charge is reporting in full most of the General and Conference Benevolences, but it is trailing in a few other important items. Added to the church roll, 1 member, to the Church School, 3 pupils. Total financial budget is \$1357. Paid \$60 on Crusade quota.

ODESSA and PORT PENN, W. R. Hazzard, pastor. This charge has brought to the Conference a full report for the financial askings except one item. Practically all general and Conference Benevolences including a quota of \$411 for the Crusade for Christ are paid. The amount collected for all purposes is \$4343. Church members added, 3. Church school enrollment increased by 3 pupils.

PLEASANTVILLE, J. W. Jefferson, pastor. The pastor and people did this year what many others had failed to do, that is, to pay off that heavy debt which had been hanging over the people for several years. There was paid on their mortgage and note \$2979. The Crusade for Christ apportionment was paid in full. The total budget was \$4697. The church membership was increased by 4 and the Church School by 7 pupils.

PORT NORRIS, J. E. Bishop, pastor. This is the fifth consecutive year that this charge has paid in full all regular benevolences. They paid this year their quota of \$294 Crusade for Christ. The pastor of this charge is to be received into the Annual Conference at this session.

QUINTON and SPRINGTOWN, W. H. Johns, pastor. This charge has been very busy and well employed during the year. They have taken splendid care of the General and Conference Benevolences and the Crusade apportionment in full, \$672. The total amount collected for all purposes is \$4079. There were 5 members added to the church and 22 persons to the Church School.

SALEM, I. R. Elzey, pastor. This charge has paid all Conference askings and the Crusade for Christ apportionment, which is \$722. The amount collected for all purposes is \$10,568. The pastor received 8 members into the church.

EZION, Wilmington, E. H. Crampton and O. W. Jones, pastors. Rev. Jones had charge for around seven months of the latter part of the conference year. Ezion has enjoyed a very remarkably successful year. All apportionments have been paid in full. This charge was the first in our District to pay their full quota for Crusade, which was \$3330. The total amount collected for all purposes is \$19,668. There were added to the church, 74 members and added to the Church School, 75 pupils. Pastor Jones and his wife are surveying and studying the many phases of their parish. They have the situation fully in hand.

HAVEN, W. A. Mulley and J. A. Fassett, pastors. After the death of Rev. W. A. Mulley, Rev. J. A. Fassett was appointed pastor of this charge. Rev. Fassett received a very hearty welcome by the members and friends of the church. Rev. and Mrs. Fassett are doing a splendid work among the people. All Conference askings are collected in full. The Crusade apportionment of \$412 was paid in full. The total amount collected for all purposes is \$5290.

MT. CARMEL, J. L. Taylor, pastor. This charge has done very good work for the Conference year. All askings are paid in full. This includes the quota of the Crusade for Christ, \$772, which was paid in full. The total amount collected is \$8338. There was paid \$3600 on mortgages and notes. There was added to the church 24 members. This charge has a social worker who does a part time service.

MT. JOY, G. E. Geddis, pastor. This energetic pastor and loyal people raised early in the year their conference askings. All items are paid in full including the quota of Crusade which is \$1020. The church received 37 members and the Church School 25 pupils. The total budget for this charge is \$7524.

WOODBURY and JERICO, S. L. Jones, pastor. This is a two-point charge. The churches are only a few miles apart. The appointment is only a few miles from Camden, N. J. The parsonage is located on the Main Street in Woodbury and is clear of debt. The achievements on this charge have been extraordinary. The Crusade for Christ apportionment of \$408 was paid in full. The regular conference benevolence program was cared for in a satisfactory manner, and church debts have been reduced.

Conclusion

For many reasons, we shall not attempt to summarize, at this time, the special features of achievements of the District this year, but shall make a brief reference to the Crusade for Christ.

In accord with the expressed wishes of our Resident Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, we began at around Christmas time 1944 to place special emphasis upon the financial phases of the Crusade for Christ. From that date to the present date, April 20, 1945, the Wilmington District reports a total cash contribution of \$21,084. We are short of our full quota around \$814 which we are confident will be sent to our Conference treasurer not later than May 31, 1945.

Much has been said and much emphasis placed upon the financial needs of the Crusade for Christ and yet no less stress has been placed upon the regular benevolence program of the Conference and the church as a whole.

We are now ready to enter with full force upon the next part of our Crusade for Christ which is "World Evangelism." We shall expect the same amount of energy and effort put into this most important program and plan for the Crusade for Christ as we endeavored to exhibit in our financial campaign which is now so successfully closing.

We again express our heartfelt thanks to our beloved brothers and sisters and many other friends for their prayers and assistance in many and various ways to encourage us in our endeavor for Kingdom building.

THE COMPOSITE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORT

Dear Bishop Shaw, Members of the Conference, and Friends:

With profound gratitude to our All-wise Heavenly Father for His providential guidance and protection, we submit this composite report of the five districts to the 83rd Session of the Delaware Annual Conference of The Methodist Church.

Our responsibilities have been weighty. Somewhat mingled with joy and grief have been our experiences. Twelve ministers and a pastor's wife have passed to their Eternal Reward. Befitting memorials will be published in our Journal.

"We cannot think of them as dead Who walk with us no more; Along the path of life we tread, They have but gone before.

The Father's house is mansioned fair Beyond our vision dim; All souls are His, and here or there Are living unto Him.

And still their silent ministries Within our hearts have place, As when on earth they walked with us And met us face to face."

The Spirit of The Age

While there are many who strenuously strive to practice the tenets of Christianity there are too many who counter-balance it to suit their selfish conveniences. Many acclaimed eminent statesmen are mere shrewd politicians. The diplomacy governing the national and international relations of the world savors too much of a mere pretense. As one nation expressed it when they desired to circumvent the treaty which opposed their wicked design—"Why should we obey it? This treaty is a mere scrap of paper."

The 18th amendment to the Constitution of the United States was repealed largely through the vote of the Church. The Federal Government licenses the nefarious brewers, and diabolical saloons and beer gardens to secure revenue. Thus they sell the souls of weak men, women and children supposedly to help maintain the government.

Appertaining to social justice not only in the United States, but throughout the civilized world the opinion of Chief Justice Taney in the Dred Scott decision, "That a black man has no rights which a white man is bound to respect," is too largely the prevailing sentiment. In many instances it has been applied to the darker races. When justice is accorded them it is rendered in a conciliatory manner rather than as an act of brotherhood or a civil obligation.

Hence, as a natural concomitance inevitably resultant from the righteous spiritual laws of cause and effect, we are engaged in the most dastardly, devastating, global war of the ages.

"The mills of the gods grind slowly, but they grind exceeding fine." Blessing through iniquity. "Surely the wrath of man shall praise thee—the remainder of wrath shalt thou restrain." Psalm 76-10.

The discovery, growth, and development of science and invention have slowly but assuredly revealed that the world is a neighborhood. But it has failed to become a Christian Brotherhood. Failing thus to realize and to practice the Divine Command cooperatively to serve and to share with each other, they maliciously destroy each other. The nations bomb each other with the most deadly material, dynamite, that the professed Christians may more fully realize their incumbent God-given duty to bomb them with the gospel "The dynamite of God unto salvation." Hence

The Crusade For Christ-What and Why the Crusade?

"Methodism's time for greatness is upon us!" To every member of the Church comes now the ringing challenge to prove ourselves equal to the gigantic tasks laid upon us by history's most devastating war. The Crusade for Christ, officially launched by the 1944 General Conference, is the boldest and most comprehensive program for world redemption and rehabilitation ever put upon the hearts of the people called Methodists.

It is Methodism rising against the storm clouds of earth, like the Sun of Righteousness, with healing in her wings. It is Methodism on the march down the world's war-torn Jericho Road. It is Methodism following her lord down every Via Dolorosa where her people have been blasted and torn, left bleeding and bereft.

A "crusade"? Wise were they who named it that. For the Crusade is Methodism's traditional stride. Confronted by any threat to mankind's chances at a more abundant life, or by any challenge rising from the world's catastrophic need, the people sprung from the spiritual loins of John Wesley have never held back longer than it takes to get their armor on. They respond to a vision of Christian need as to a divine manifesto. They move like a mighty army toward any high goal that beckons or calls against any sinister force that threatens.

Such a need and such a goal are now before us. The Crusade for Christ with its four year outreach, its five-pronged offensive, its \$25,000,000 budget—was born out of two years of God-touched planning on the part of the Council of Bishops and other Methodist leaders. It's a big crusade, suited to a big Church, tailored to big hearts.

And as such, it has a glory in its vision that should "transfigure you and me."

The Crusade Applied To The Delaware Conference

The Crusade Is Four-Fold In Its Objectives

f. The Crusade for a New World Order

This is a continuation of the two-year-old effort, known popularly as "The Bishop's Crusade," which seeks to register in Washington, and across all America, wherever public opinion is made, and before it crystallizes, the opposition of Methodists to American isolationism and their desire for a machinery of cooperation among nations in the post-war world and to raise \$25,000,000.

The Delaware Conference has fully co-operated in every known effort appertaining. Led by our intrepid, matchless Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, the Chicago and St. Louis Conferences were attended by the district superintendents. The official Crusade Councils have been fully organized in the annual and district conferences, and the local churches. The Delaware Conference's allotment for the Crusade is \$101,900. This was apportioned to the five districts according to the percentage rating of the committee on World Service and Finance. Of this apportionment, \$86,078, has been paid to the conference treasurer. The loyal self-sacrificing pastors, members and friends have made this liberal offering possible. Besides, the World Service and Conference Benevolences, other items and ministerial support have been advanced beyond all former years. Also there has been added \$12,025 to the Annual Conference Endowment Fund throughout the 80th Anniversary Memorial Campaign. Practically all the churches throughout the conference have liquidated their indebtedness. There have been joyous mortgage burnings on all the districts.

2. Evangelism

Evangelism is the Crusade plan for wider and specific emphasis in a wiser and more fruitful evangelistic effort, the main calling of the church.

The time is past due for a great revival throughout Christendom. Methodism recognizes the field already white to harvest. Observing the superficial

intimations portrayed by the large crowds that attend the commercialized traveling pageants the indication is that we need to intensify and quicken the spiritual life of the Church so that these attending crowds may feed on the "bread of life."

As we have earnestly endeavored to raise the \$101,900 Crusade allotment so we must more intensely consecrate for this evangelistic movement. Some will give money when they will not give themselves to the Lord. We should be most deeply interested, not only in winning our quota of the 1,000,000 souls allotted to be won to the Kingdom of God, but we should also zealously labor to save all of the unsaved of our parishes. How? Permit us to suggest that after the deepest personal consecration on the part of the pastor, his local church council and other members that the constituent members all be enrolled and tactfully distributed among the Christians by the pastor and his council to be won by personal work. The previous survey and house to house visitation campaign should render this plan practical and effectual in each charge. Besides the Sunday services let us set apart periodical protracted efforts, the same as we do the financial rallies. Like a wrestling Jacob let us hold on until the coveted desire is obtained.

"So, you bring the one next to you,
And I'll bring the one next to me,
In all kinds of weather,
We'll all work together,
And see what can be done.
If you bring the one next to you,
And I bring the one next to me,
In no time at all, we will win them all
So win them, win them one by one.

Citizens and Unchurched Migrants

Again there are many thousands of citizens and migrants living within the borders of the Delaware Conference unchurched. We must plan to utilize our opportunities to serve and save these people. Sunday Schools and Missions must be founded, adequate churches must be erected. Some select sections of Philadelphia, Brooklyn and New York City and other adjacent towns throughout the East and North are specific examples of beckoning opportunities. We sincerely congratulate our Resident Bishop for the fine work he has already achieved establishing new, relocating and uniting established churches in Brooklyn, N. Y. and Jersey City, N. J.

3. The Crusade in Christian Stewardship

Some suppose stewardship is a mere theory, but stewardship is more than a mere theory, it is the Christian interpretation of life, and is concerned with the Christian use of all the resources committed to the individual of which God is the owner both by creation and redemption. The principles of Stewardship should be recognized by each individual Christian. His personality, his time and his possessions all belong to God. God is the sovereign owner of all things. God invites men to subdue the earth and possess it. Man is a steward to acquire and administer his possessions as a sacred trust.

God's ownership and man's stewardship ought to be acknowledged. This acknowledgment requires as its material expression, the setting apart, as an act of worship, of a separate portion of our income. Bible history records the setting apart of a tenth of one's income as that acknowledgment, and indicates the Divine sanction for the practice and the amount.

Methodism has experienced wherever this has been consistently and permanently practiced with the right motive that the individual or church has been abundantly and joyously blessed.

Thus the Crusade is endeavoring to secure 1,000,000 permanent tithers as a nucleus to leaven Methodism. The abortive methods in financing our churches in many communities fully justifies us to adopt the doctrinal method of Stewardship. The prophet asks the significant question, "Will a man rob God?" Then he avers, "Yet ye have robbed me in tithes and offerings. Ye are cursed with a curse: for ye have robbed me even this whole nation. Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse, that there may be meat into my house, and prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts, if I will not open to you the windows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room to receive it." Malachi, 3:8-10.

4. The Crusade: Christian Education and the Church Schools

The Delaware Conference is making a special effort to major in Christian Education. Perhaps our organization is equal to any and superior to many in the Central Jurisdiction. The question arises what can be done to more largely and effectively reach the masses. The recent statement of the Crusade stresses that there are seventeen millions of young people in the United States who do not attend the Church or Church School on the Christian Sabbath. At first view this may seem remote to us, but when we recall that many of our youth are compiled in these statistics, we must stop and seriously ponder. All the more when we witness annually in our midst the most of our Church Schools closed from Children's Day, the second Sunday in June, until the hoar frosts compel us to abdicate the groves. Then in the winter in too many rural places the schools are closed under the trivial, false pretense that it is too cold or too difficult to travel. Does it not merit our most exacting inquiry when we know that in certain sections of the Conference two of the greatest recent tragedies and interracial conflicts have occurred actuated by our youth. The Sunday baseball advocates and the theater managers justify their desecration of the Christian Sabbath because of the many camp meetings, and the baneful conduct there at violating all the laws of the Ten Commandments. As socio-religious students, as ministers of the gospel, as Christian officials of the Kingdom of God, are we not most seriously challenged as to our consistency and full co-operation in the Christian education of our youth?

Christian Education

Previously I have referred to our Christian Educational Organization. Let me now congratulate Rev. H. A. Bailey, our own Executive Secretary, and his staff, and also the District workers for the splendid work they are endeavoring to accomplish. The indications are, in time there will be abundant fruitage. The district leadership training schools are becoming more practical and efficient. A more hearty and fuller co-operation on the part of pastors, parents, and guardians would make this apparent growing efficiency most assured.

Lay Activities

The Woman's Society of Christian Service in all the districts has made a very large contribution, financially and spiritually. While the Methodist Men here and there are gaining, the attainments as it pertains to men in the aggregate are lagging behind. There is need of greater love to motivate them to consistent and persistent zealous activities.

The Ministers' Wives Association

These women are consistently loyal. They are an inspiration to all our District and Efficiency Conference services held in the districts. As previously, they have planned and are making a very fine and large contribution to the Conference Claimants.

The Old Folks Home

Our Old Folks Home at Lawnside, N. J. is reported in a dilapidated condition. The financial and legal status needs to be carefully scrutinized and the remedy effected.

The Friendship Home

This Missionary institution under the auspices of the W. S. C. Service is supplying a social and spiritual need not only in Philadelphia but is exerting a saving influence throughout the Delaware Conference, and in some instances affecting many communities otherwise located in the U. S. A.

It is well located in the midst of our people. The annex purchased about two years ago has been paid for. Extensive renovations are to be made bringing all necessary equipment up to the standard so as to receive and give more adequate care to the many applicants. Mrs. Mary Thompson is the acting superintendent.

The 80th Anniversary for Conference Claimants Endowment

The Conference Claimants Endowment was temporarily halted in order to promote the financial side of the Crusade for Christ. This anniversary according to plans must continue. Our retired co-workers, their wives, and children should be adequately and most assuredly provided for. The results, thus far obtained under handicap, evidence the willingness of the laity to do so.

Christ the Victor

Again the satanic influences emanating from a global war are still evident. Hatred, rapine, destruction, and death continue to be visibly regnant. But an Eminent, All-wise, Everlasting God presides over the uni-

verse. He has promised to reign until His enemies shall have become His footstools. Therefore where sin has abounded, grace and truth shall ever abound. Let us take courage. We will be faithful. His kingdom is assuredly coming.

Let us conclude with a very illuminating and significant quotation from the facile pen of Dr. Lucius H. Bugbee-"We are passing through days of transition and restless change. Many kingdoms of knowledge and experience in which we trusted have crumbled. Principles of conduct which we once regarded as certain as the axioms of Euclid have lost authority. We need to be reminded again that the roots of religion are not in books or theories or creeds, but in the nature and needs of men and in the answering fullness of God. The Church did not create religion. Religion was born, not made. The real significance of life is not to be identified with current events and immediate result, but with the ultimate triumph of Christian Character which frequently comes through apparent failure. What is the passing of time if we have Christ?" I quote from the General Conference Appeal on Evangelism, "Christ is the deathless leader of His Church, and no cause is forlorn with Him at its head. He has illimitable resources at His command and guarantees the ultimate supremacy of righteousness in the world. Shall we not then take our appointed way with Him, evading no peril, seeking no discharge, but in confidence follow Him as He goes forth on His redemptive pilgrimage.

"Arise, Methodism! The light that falls upon your pathway is not the light of the setting sun. It is the light of the morning. Before you is the gateway to a greater age and a more Christlike world."

Again, we are deeply grateful to our Heavenly Father for His unbounding goodness and His loving care during these trying days. We greatly appreciate the hearty co-operation and good will of the pastors, their wives, and the laymen with whom we have been permitted to labor.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Bishop Shaw, District Superintendents, Ministers, Laymen and Friends: '

We, your Commission on World Service and Finance, submit the following recommendations:

- 1. That all Boards, Commissions, and Agencies receiving financial support from the Delaware Annual Conference shall submit for auditing records of all receipts and disbursements, in such detail and at such times as the Commission may direct.
- 2. That the World Service apportionment and approved Conference Benevolence Budget shall be combined into one item known as World Service and Conference Benevolence.
- 3. That the Commission shall make the apportionments to the Districts only, leaving the distribution to the charges of each District to be made by the District Stewards at the respective district Stewards meetings, where the District Superintendents shall preside as chairmen. The District Stewards, in co-operation with the District Superintendents, shall estimate a salary that shall give sufficient and equitable support to the Superintendents, including their dwelling place, travel, and office expense.
- 4. That for the sake of economy and efficiency the Conference Treasurer act as a depository for such monies designated for all Conference Boards and Agencies sharing in the Conference Budget, such monies to be kept in separate accounts for each Board and disbursed upon proper order from each Board or Agency, and that no designated account shall be drawn upon for the benefit of another.

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- 5. That the Delaware Conference shall co-operate with the Association of Schools and Colleges of The Methodist Church, by setting apart a College Day for the purpose of:
 - (a) Receiving offerings to supplement the Annual Conference Benevolent support.
 - (b) Presenting from each pulpit the character and worth of the institutions of higher learning which represent them in educational endeavor.
- That the Annual Scholarship Fund to Gammon Theological Seminary shall be put upon a competitive basis for students of the Delaware Conference.
- 7. That a permanent scholarship committee shall be formed at this session of our Conference for the purpose of receiving applications and awarding said scholarships. Years in which no applications are made by students of the Delaware Conference, the fund shall be awarded by Gammon at her own discretion.

That for the sake of uniformity this Conference shall adopt the following form of apportionment. This form shall be used throughout the Delaware Conference.

We now come to the close of our delightful term of office as members of the Delaware Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance. We wish to express our profound gratitude to our Bishop, the ministers, and the laymen for your continuous patience, your unflagging loyalty and your fine spirit of co-operation.

REPORT OF THE CAMPAIGN REPRESENTING THE 80th ANNIVERSARY

Dear Bishop Shaw, Fellow Workers, Laymen, and Friends:

In presenting this report I wish to relate some facts concerning the History of our Pension System.

In 1908, at the General Conference at Baltimore, Md., the idea of providing for the retired man, his widow, and orphan children was conceived in the fertile mind of the late Doctor J. B. Hingley. This has been the result in the 37 years: For Permanent Fund for the entire church, \$29,575; Reserve Fund, \$28,735; Other Funds, \$1,694,975. Total funds raised \$30,915,285.

The Delaware Conference made their set-up in 1912, under the leader-ship of the late Bishop John W. Hamilton who gave a gift of \$500.00. This Conference was held at Salisbury, Md. Each year from then the heroic leaders of the ministry, and the sacrificing laymen up to 1944 session have built up a Permanent Fund of \$28,927.88; added to this \$958.96 from special endowment for supply pastors, thus making a grand total of \$29,-886.64.

Much credit is due our father in the gospel Doctor J. R. Waters, who stands at the top of the chronological roll, 1879. He was the first secretary placed in the field to raise funds for this most needy cause.

Then there was an increase given from the Diamond Jubilee, this celebration caused many laymen and friends to be sympathetic in caring for these worthy heralds of the Cross.

And now we are in the midst of a Campaign to add at least \$60,000.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Joint Report of the Executive Secretary and Conference Board President

The Conference Board of Education through its staff of workers and its committees has set forth certain objectives to be achieved in the field of Christian Education. It is our conviction that through the achievement, of these objectives we shall be able to make Christ a more vital force in the lives of children, youth, and adults in the churches and communities of our Conference. We who have been entrusted with the major responsibility for executing the program, count it a high privilege to serve in this phase of the church's ministry.

Before speaking of achievements which have been realized, may we acknowledge the very helpful encouragement and constant cooperation that has been ours to enjoy throughout the year from the Resident Bishop, the District Superintendents, the Conference and District Staff Workers, the Pastors and the host of Lay Workers in the charges. To them and all others who have made this report possible, we are deeply grateful.

We are not attempting here to report all that has been accomplished this year. First because there is no adequate means of measuring results achieved in the process of character building. Second, because some of our projects have not yet reached a point where results can be assured. And finally because each of the Conference Age Group Directors will make a detailed report of his or her particular responsibility.

May we call attention to the goals set by the Conference Board in its Annual Meeting in May 1944.

1. That a Conference-wide plan be drawn up and sent to the local churches for the purpose of helping each church to increase its Church School enrollment, the final goal being at least 25%. You will note that this later came to us as one of the five goals of the Crusade for Christ.

The Youth Council, under the direction of Rev. Henry H. Nichols, Youth Director, the Adult Council, under the direction of Rev. R. C. Hughes, Adult Director, and the Children's Council, under the direction of Mrs. Caddie Ridout, the Children's Director, have all met and given thoughtful consideration to this matter. Each of these councils has made definite plans to help the local churches to increase the Church School enrollment and attendance. We will leave each of these directors to make his or her own report as to details.

From our office we have sent communications to all the churches giving guidance materials and suggestions for increasing Church School enrollment and efficiency. A brief questionnaire on a card was sent to each Church School in the hope of ascertaining the present status of the Church School and a statement of the percentage of increase which the school has set as a goal from January 1, 1945 to June 30, 1945. All reports have not been returned. May it suffice to say that the goals of increase are from 10% to 100% in the charges.

It has been our privilege to visit a number of local Boards of Education, Workers Conferences and Church School sessions in the interest of the Church School attendance. Other promotional plans are to be executed from time to time for the purpose of helping the local Church Schools in this matter.

That we keep before the local churches emphasis on Home Religion begun on Family Week, May, 1944.

Through correspondence, visitation in the local churches and District Meetings, we have encouraged the acquiring of an adequate family religion for these times. This emphasis has been continued throughout the year. To encourage us in this effort, the General Board has given us \$100.00 again this year. Appropriate steps will be taken to promote this program throughout the Conference, climaxing in National Family Week, May 6 to 13.

3. That some well defined program be mapped out to aid the local churches in helping the returned service men to readjust themselves to society and the church.

The Adult Council has taken this matter under consideration and will no doubt report on progress made. The Youth Council is also working along this line, through contact with the men in service. This matter we will also leave for their report.

 That some standard requirements be set up for those churches desiring financial aid for Vacation Church Schools. The Board's Committee on Children's Work suggested the requirements in this case be based upon needs of the school as verified by the District Superintendent. We were able to assist 47 churches in the Conference this year. With a total grant of \$500, \$300 of which was given by the General Board and \$200 by the Conference Board.

In order to improve the work of the Vacation Church Schools, a Coaching Conference was conducted for the benefit of the Conference and District Staff of the Children's Workers under the direction of Mrs. W. C. Halteman, who was sent to us by the General Board. District Coaching Conferences were held under the direction of Mrs. Caddie Ridout and the District Director will report on details of these Conferences and the work of the Vacation Church Schools.

5. That we determine the extent to which our Conference and District Workers will participate in the Jurisdictional Leadership Training School held at Gammon Theological Seminary, July 5 to 11, 1945.

The Committee on Christian Workers' Schools with the Executive Secretary took this matter under consideration. Through the financial support of the General Board and the Conference Board the following persons were sent to the School: Rev. E. H. Crampton, Rev. Howard A. Bailey, Rev. C. D. Gerald, Mrs. Caddie Ridout, Rev. R. C. Hughes, Rev. M. O. Ballard, Rev. N. W. Moore, Jr., and Mrs. E. G. Earle. To our great delight all the District Superintendents were present save the late Rev. L. H. McArthur, who was ill. The effects of this school are far reaching and of great significance. A similar school is now being planned to be held at Morristown Junior College, July 5 to 11, 1945. Details of this enterprise will be published later. We are grateful to the General Board for making this source of information and inspiration available to our workers.

6. Methodist Youth Summer Institute—After many years of happy fellowship with the Washington Conference in the joint enterprise of the Morgan College Institute, it was thought best for all parties concerned to dissolve the old relationship and begin in each Conference a separate institute. This is done in the hope of more adequately meeting the needs of youth in each Conference. We will begin the new institute this year at Princess Anne Junior College, July 30 to August 5. We have high hopes of a successful enterprise.

In addition to the foregoing activities which are in connection with definite objectives approved by the Board in the May meeting, may we add the following:

1. Crusade for Christ:

Along with what has been said about increasing enrollment and attendance in the Church School, may we add that we have urged every Church School to make a definite contribution to the financial phase of the Crusade. While we have no definite report on this matter we are impressed from informal reports that the Church Schools are do-

ing a fine job in this respect. We shall enter into all phases of the Crusade as the General Church moves on from goal to goal.

2. Christian Workers' Schools:

One of our major tasks is the conducting of Christian Workers Schools. In all of these schools, totaling 14, we will engage the service of 46 teachers and 11 deans and the five District Superintendents. The value of the services of these volunteer workers cannot be estimated. They are rendering to the local churches a great and needed service. It is a source of great joy to see the Church School workers being encouraged under their influence. We shall be ever grateful for their sacrificial service. A detailed report of these schools appears elsewhere in this year book.

- 3. Opportunities for developing our workers offered by the General
 - A. Conference on Christian Education: The Conference Board President, Conference Director of Youth Work and the Executive Secretary were privileged to attend the Methodist Conference on Christian Education held at Nashville, December 28th to January 5th. This meeting of Christian Educators from all over the country was a source of help to us. May we note in passing that this great body elected as its president, for the first time, a Negro, in the person of Dr. Timothy Echols, of Austin, Texas. This is regarded by us as advancement in race relations in the church.
 - B. Regional Conference of Summer Agencies and Conference on Recreation: These conferences were recently held in New York for the purpose of helping us with our institute work and promotion of recreation in the general program of the Conference. We were able to send 6 persons to attend the former and 5 to attend the latter conferences. The value of these opportunities will no doubt be realized as occasions arise for the exercising of skills learned and information acquired at these conferences.

We close this report being fully aware that it is incomplete. While feeling the pull of a multitude of urgent needs to be met, but at the same time we hear the command of Him who said "Go ye therefore and teach," we press on with confidence in the merit of our task. We face the future with renewed vigor.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Friday, April 20, 1945

Bishop and Brethren:

We believe the World has never needed the Mission of the Christian Church more than it does today. This World-wide Social Upheaval is not only taking its toll in ruined and shattered cities, but in millions of human lives, and tens of millions of wounded men and women.

We thank God for the five point program of our Church. We hail with joy the success of the first endeavor, the raising of 25,000,000 of dollars for rehabilitation both abroad and at home. We are especially pleased with the response of the Delaware Conference led by our able Bishop and his peerless District Leaders.

We believe that no objective is of more importance than Evangelism which means the rehabilitation of men. We do not believe that legislation or force can give us a warless world. We believe when men become Christ centered wars will cease, when men realize that all men are brothers with a common Father, God, a new era will come to distressed mankind.

We recommend for adoption the following Program of Evangelism for 1946 approved by the Executive Committee. Approved by General Board of Evangelism, February 15, 1945.

I. GOALS

- a. Three Thousand Accessions for the Conference.
- b. Daily Devotions in Every Methodist Home.
- c. New Churches wherever the location warrants.

II. PREPARATORY WORK

Planning the Work of the Conference

As early as possible after the Annual Conference, our Bishop call together the Conference Board of Evangelism, District Leaders and one Layman of the District Committee of Evangelism for the purpose of outlining the program for the year of Evangelism.

THE PROGRAM

1. INAUGÜRATE CHRIST LOYALTY CAMPAIGN TO REACH INACTIVE NON-RESIDENT MEMBERS.

We would suggest World-Wide Communion Sunday, October 7, 1945 as an excellent opportunity to launch this Campaign.

2. HOUSE TO HOUSE SURVEY IN EVERY COMMUNITY

Suggested dates November 11 to 25. This is necessary if we are going to have responsibility and prospect rolls for increasing Church School enrollment and securing persons for Christ. Each pastor to report to his Superintendent and the Resident Bishop the number on his responsibility roll.

- ORGANIZE THE FELLOWSHIP OF EVANGELISM
 Material can be secured from the General Board of Evangelism.
- ORGANIZE THE CHURCH FOR PRAYER
 ("Pray ye therefore the Lord of the Harvest that He send forth workers")
 - A. We recommend the Area Bishop to call the Conference to prayer at such a time as he shall choose, to pray for the year of Evangelism.

 This call to include all organizations and agencies of the Church.

- B. District Prayer Clinics for Pastors, December 28.
 - 1. Guided discussions:
 - a. Enriching the prayer life of the Pastor.
 - b. Enriching the prayer life of the Church.
 - 2. Intercession for a year of Harvest.
- C. Watch Night Service, December 31, 1945.
- C. Watch Night Service, December 31, 1949
- D. Covenant Sunday, January 6, 1946.
 Sermon, "Prayer and Evangelism."

Covenant cards stressing the idea of Intercession for year of Evangelism, be distributed to the congregation for signatures.

- E. Observance of Week of Prayer, January 6-13, 1946 to stimulate and inaugurate:
 - 1. Weekly prayer meetings at Church.
 - 2. Weekly prayer meetings in Homes.
 - 3. Church Sanctuaries open for prayer.
 - 4. Prayer Rooms in Churches.
 - 5. Family Worship.

5. ORGANIZE TRAINING CLASSES IN THE CHRISTIAN LIFE

- A. Pastor's Classes for Children.
- B. Pastor's Classes for Young People.
- C. Pastor's Classes for Adults. Recommending the use of Membership Manuals by Anderson, Short, Chubb, Quimby and the "Methodist Primer."

6. CONFERENCE SCHOOL OF EVANGELISM

- A. We recommend a Conference School of Evangelism for four days.

 The date to be fixed by the Conference Board of Evangelism after consultation with the resident bishop.
- B. A District School of Evangelism for two days. The dates to be fixed by the District Superintendents.
- C. A Training School in every Church at such a time as the pastor may select.

STATE OF THE CHURCH

The Church is on trial at the Mercy of Men. The purpose and foundation of the church cannot be questioned or improved upon because it is founded on the Word of God. It was the outcome of the Life of Jesus, His Mission and Ministry on earth. The weakness of the church lay at the door of its followers. We find the world today in the midst of strife, bloodshed and confusion, created from selfishness, greed, hate, injustice, prejudice and seeking military power. The commission of Christ to all His church followers was to go into all the world and preach the Gospel to all creatures. We have failed miserably as His followers in carrying out His command.

- 1. We must admit the world has grown too fast for the church; sin on every hand has a headway; the scientific, material and industrial world seemingly holds the balance of power. Too often the church has kept quiet and played the part of conservatives, when it should have spoken out with boldness against the evils that now grip our very existence.
- 2. We again realize that the program of the church has not been flexible enough and has failed to exert its influence on the outside world.

The programs must be prepared to meet present day conditions, the same holds true with sermons. Too many ministers preach from past events instead of concrete examples of today.

- 3. Evangelistic Power seems to be waning in most of our churches. The great purpose of the church is to save souls of men and women. It may be the lack of Faith that will not shrink, sincerity of Prayer and living the Gospel that we preach.
- 4. There is lack of unity between white and Negro churches. The time is at hand that all our efforts should be directed toward one goal. As the fingers are bound to the hand to serve one purpose, so should all denominations and church, brotherly and co-operatively serve God.
- 5. The attitude of parents toward wholesome, clean, Christ-like living will determine the trend of the child toward Christian Character. The home must be reorganized as a whole, a place where love and union exist for the family and others. The parent's attitude toward his church, the respect with which he holds it, the sincerity and reverence with which he shares its worship will usually be the measure of the child's attachment to it.
- 6. The church school is badly in need of being revitalized for it is the preparatory means of training children and youth for Christian service. The pastor and laymen must give more time and show more interest in planning their programs by attending Church School. We realize the many causes in the decline in Church School attendance and Youth Fellowship work; nevertheless we must meet the situation. Prepare and select people to assume the responsibility to lead young folk.
- 7. One of the big handicaps of the church today is ministerial supply. It is impossible for the work of the church to go forward without trained consecrated leadership and followers. The need for a comprehensive plan of recruiting and training ministers has become paramount and should demand our best thinking. Due to the age and early retirement of ministers now in service, and not having equal number of young men to come into the ministry, we have a condition not too bright for the church's future.
- 8. There is a great need for a substantial pension for retired ministers. This has been greatly neglected; poor salary while in service and a very small pittance at the end of service, show lack of appreciation on the part of the church. It is enough to make young men turn their backs on the sacred calling.
- 9. We must exalt the Ministry with praise and honor that will inspire young men to enter. We must also stress the value of preparedness in both ministers and laymen. No church can be at its best unless it is a reading church. Our religion has been too often based on emotion or feeling. We must think and act in terms of religion. This is necessary. In the Crusade for Christ The Methodist Church has a New Vision, first Physical and then Spiritual that men might be fortified with power to go forward.

The passage of a Fair Employment Act in New York State brings a ray of hope to the minority groups of our Nation. There can be no equality of opportunity without a chance to work.

This is the day for bold action. No people has faced a greater opportunity to serve humanity. The Negro's cause in America is the barometer of democracy. If it fails here, it fails everywhere.

America stands today as a symbol of freedom. The loss of this symbol will mean the loss of hope for white and black alike. This is a People's War, and in spite of selfish interests, a new world is coming to life.

SOCIAL SERVICE

The social question is perhaps the most important question that confronts our generation because it affects the whole range of human relationship in the home, church, school, industry and the state. It is both national and international, and whether or not we shall succeed in creating a better world for the future of mankind, depends fundamentally upon the answer or answers given to it.

The Master's life and teaching is postulated upon the sacredness and worth of human personality. To develop this sense of human worth was the primary aim of His ministry. He sought to impress upon the minds of those about Him the primacy of human values. He insisted that right conduct should be guided by the idea of human worth and the sacredness of personality. Jesus was interested in people. He loved men, He believed in them, He was sympathetic and kind to them. Not because they belonged to any particular race or color, not because they were rich or poor, but because they were men and as such they were of infinite value in the sight of God. And because of His high and noble conception of man He sought to create a society fit for his abode.

The social program of Jesus is therefore the product of His conception of the value and worth of man and cannot be understood apart from this central idea. And no social program however intensive or extensive will be effective in the creation of a new social order that is not founded upon this idea of the worth and value of men and the dignity of life.

Present world conditions have produced many social theorists with visions of a new social order. But few of them have given serious consideration to the way outlined by Jesus. They want a new social order, but they are not willing to accept the idea of the sacredness and worth of the personality of each and all members of the human family. They want happiness and peace but only for certain classes or races of people. They want a new order based upon racial superiority. They cry and howl and rave about the brutality and inhumanity of Hitler and Tojo but they consider it all right to crush, trample, brutalize and humiliate certain groups or classes of people wherever and whenever they please.

Since human values constitute the supreme worth, social service becomes the express goal of the Christian man. Christ does not free men from service, He frees them to service. To become a Christian is to be inducted into a larger and fuller life. "I am come," He said, "that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." And to live abundantly a man must of necessity step out of his narrow selfish life into a life of service. He must become interested in the salvation and well being of his fellowmen.

To serve the present age, My calling to fulfil: O may it all my powers engage To do my Master's will.

This is the challenge that comes to the Christian Church. For to it has been entrusted the task of guiding human life along the Jesus way. And this challenge comes especially to us Methodists who are the followers of John Wesley. For like his Master, he was a man with fire in his bones. He was fired with the spirit of service, and upon the granite rock of unselfish service he laid the foundation of the Methodist Church. It is therefore expedient for the church to expose the cause of justice and right at all times and under all conditions. It can tolerate no social order that seeks to exploit personality for selfish ends. The church must take its stand upon the social and religious philosophy of Jesus and declare the eternal truth of the Gospel without fear if it hopes to lead the world into a new era of peace and goodwill.

TEMPERANCE

General Statement

"The Church of Jesus Christ from its very nature stands at variance with the liquor traffic. For it to be silent in its opposition would be to be disloyal in its function. Therefore, to be true to itself, the Church of Christ must be Militant."

The above are the opening words of the Temperance Resolution adopted by our General Conference of 1944—words which embody the very spirit of our Church. Therefore, as Christian Methodists we have no other alternative—"the die is cast"—we must give militant voice against the greatest foe of the Christian Church and the scourge of civilized men—the organized liquor traffic, and not only must we be heard, but also, must we make ourselves felt by the liquor interests and by the legislators in the assembly halls of state and nation.

We believe that the time is ripe for action. A new day is breaking which is self-evident in the destruction of evil forces by men, the flower of manhood, in the victories they are achieving on far-flung battle fields. But this new day cannot fully break until Christian leaders, men and women, rise up to stamp out the evil of drink which is a greater menace to the security of society and the nation than war.

Recommendations

We recommend the following:

- 1. That we promote a vigorous program of temperance education and cultivation in our local churches and specifically in the Church School and Youth Fellowship, and wherever necessary in our secular schools, we shall seek to bring about curriculum changes and adjustments to include temperance education in the public schools of city, town and country.
- 2. That each District shall plan and make application for the attendance of at least one representative at the Yale University Alcoholic Studies or the Pennsylvania School of Alcoholic Studies at Juniata College.
- 3. That we endorse the program of the Anti-Saloon League and The Woman's Christian Temperance Union and similar organizations, and that we co-operate with such agencies in our communities and states in the promotion of the Temperance Cause.
- 4. That we ascertain from political candidates their stand on liquor questions and that we give our support only to those candidates who are avowedly dry. This shall also apply to Committeemen who are not only the key men in elections, but also, in the selection of candidates.
- 5. That we favor the enactment of state law prohibiting the employment of minors in places that distill, handle or sell alcoholic beverages.
- 6. That we favor and urge the passage of Congressman Bryson's Bill, HR 2082 which would prohibit the manufacture and sale of alcoholic beverages as a war measure for the duration of the war and six months thereafter, and that we write letters and petitions to the Chairman of the Committee on Judiciary, the Honorable Hatton W. Summers, requesting a hearing, and to our representative in Congress for their support of the Bill.
- 7. That we favor and urge the passage of Senator Capper's Bill, Senate Bill 599, which would prohibit the transportation in inter-state commerce of advertisement of alcoholic beverages in newspapers, magazines, radio and all other media, and that we send letters and petitions to our Senators urging their support of said Bill.
- 8. That we favor and urge passage of the following Bills before the Legislature of Pennsylvania: HR 503 which would amend the present law

to include Clubs in provisions of Quota Law and HR 549 which would prohibit the sale of liquor or beer in clubs on The Lord's Day; and that we oppose the passage of the following Bills before the Legislature of Pennsylvania: S 98 which would prohibit local option elections; HR 626 which would exempt clubs from provision of the Quota Law; HR 188 and HR 236 for the same purpose. By means of exchange of beer license for a liquor license without calling it a new license; and HR 250 which would permit restaurants to sell liquor and beer without present requirement that their principal business must be serving food.

- 9. That all drinking places, booze joints, state liquor stores, shall be closed on VE Day and the day following and the sale of all alcoholic liquors be prohibited.
- 10. That as Christian leaders, we shall become more vocal in church and public meetings, and shall work more assiduously for the enactment of State and Federal Laws which favor the Temperance Cause.
- 11. And finally, we recommend that we go on record as inaugurating here and now, a crusade against the organized liquor traffic and intemperance; the hydra-headed monster, alcohol, who was born in the very bosom of Satan and cradled in the very flames of hell, and that we prosecute said crusade through a series of district and sub-district conferences which shall be under the supervision and guidance of our representative on the Methodist Board of Temperance.
- 12. We recommend observance of World Temperance Sunday, and that each church make a special gift next year to the Board of Temperance.

HOSPITALS AND HOMES

It was our Lord Jesus, the Great Physician, who asked the question: "Which now thinkest thou was neighbor unto him that fell among the thieves?" Lk. 10:36.

Then, when the reply to the question was, "He that shewed mercy on him," Jesus said, "Go and do thou likewise."

Also, down through the centuries, wafted upon the wings of Time, hasten our Lord's commendation of the woman with the alabaster box of precious ointment. "She hath wrought a good work on me." Matthew 26:10.

The hospitals and homes supported by Methodism certainly fulfill this exalted role.

These houses of Mercy labor to fulfill our Master's joy by their labors of Mercy and Love under the supervision of the General, Jurisdictional and Annual Conferences.

According to #1529—Discipline 1940, The Golden Cross Society collects money and affords other material assistance in providing hospitalization for the deserving poor and for the care of the aged and children.

The Annual Enrollment in the Methodist Golden Cross Society is to secure interest in and support of Hospitals and Homes in every congregation in such manner and on such date as determined by the patronizing Annual Conference.

The week following Golden Cross Enrollment Sunday shall be known as Hospitals and Homes week.

Funds raised through said enrollment shall be used as directed by the Annual Conference in keeping with the policies of the Golden Cross Society.

#14737—In local churches the Committees on Hospitals and Homes appointed annually should promote the general interest of Hospitals and Homes to whose support they are respectively allocated.

This committee, upon request of the pastor, shall have charge annually of the Golden Cross Enrollment and the dissemination of literature to assist in relating the congregation, not only to the great philanthrophy of the church, but to the social welfare represented in the local parish and community.

Certainly in these days of war and suffering, such services of Mercy, sympathy, and help are invaluable.

One writer said, "Where there is need everything should be attempted."
Who can tell how much need there is now for varied and numerous acts of mercy and help.

To relieve suffering, prevent shock, keep away despair and bring sunshine in place of shadows is now, and perhaps will long be, a vital necessity.

Unless reconstruction after the war is motivated by a genuine spirit of Brotherhood, well seasoned with the Holy Spirit, we may expect another war to scourge the world within the next twenty-five years.

It is not enough for us to clean up the thieves on the Jerusalem-Jericho road. This, of course should be done, but there should also be provided the funds where the wounded may be hospitalized as they may need.

There should also be Retreats for the insane and homes for the aged and the millions of orphan children.

Truly is it said—"No nation can long survive without homes built on Truth, Character and Love."

Houses are built of bricks, stones and wood.

Homes are made of Reverence, Love and Honor. The Christian Home is one of the greatest needs of the modern world.

Homes should be more than mere shelters from the cold. They should be places where God is reverenced, parents honored, children appreciated, old age respected, and love of all that is pure and holy prized.

Though it may call for sacrificial and suffering service, let us have more and better hospitals and homes.

Let us, and many thousands take fresh courage and labor earnestly to usher in a much brighter day for all people.

Obituary

JAMES WILLIAM JEWETT

(Reprinted from the Central Christian Advocate, June 8, 1944)

On Monday, May 1, while the General Conference of The Methodist Church was in progress at Kansas City, death claimed one of Delaware Conference's most beloved and prominent members, Dr. James William Jewett, at his home, 5919 West Girard Avenue, Philadelphia, Pa.

Dr. Jewett, the son of Preston and Annie Frances Jewett, was born September 15, 1879, at Crisfield, Md. His mother, one of earth's rare saints, passed to her reward in November, 1942, at the age of ninety-three years.

After attending elementary school in his native community, Brother Jewett entered Princess Anne Academy, Princess Anne, Md., where he was graduated in 1900. He then entered Morgan College, Baltimore, and, while still a college student, joined the Delaware Conference and was given a summer appointment at Pleasantville, N. J.

Dr. Jewett was graduated from Morgan in 1906, a ranking student in a class which had among its membership five persons who were to become distinguished in Delaware Conference and Methodist history: The late Dr. and Mrs. Thomas H. Kiah (Mrs. Kiah was then Mary R. Townsend); Dr. John T. Fletcher, now a staff member of the Board of Missions and Church Extension; Rev. William A. T. Miles, the pastor of Asbury Church, Trenton, N. J., and Dr. Jewett.

Mrs. Kiah was the first of this quintet to be translated; Dr. Kiah, for twenty-six years president of Princess Anne Academy and College, was next.

On graduation from Morgan, Brother Jewett entered upon his full-time duties as pastor at New Haven, Conn., where he had been assigned at the session of the Delaware Conference. A few months later, his classmate, Rev. Thomas H. Kiah, united him in wedlock to Miss Lavinia Bailey, at St. Michaels, Md., the home of the bride, where the Kiahs were beginning a brief but notable ministry before being called into educational work. Brother Jewett took his bride to New Haven, where he was receiving a salary of \$350 for the year!

This union was a most happy and compatible one, and this young couple were destined to make a unique contribution to Methodism's growth and to the spread of Christian influence through their combined service in the Delaware Conference. For fifteen years Mrs. Jewett has served as president of the Delaware Conference Woman's Home Missionary Society and Woman's Society of Christian Service. To them were born three children. Thelma Louise, Preston Bailey, and Hamilton Sherman. The second child died in infancy.

In 1918, Morgan College conferred upon him the degree of Master of Arts, and in 1935 that of Doctor of Divinity, in recognition of outstanding service to the Church. In forty years of pastoral labor, he served the following charges and districts:

Pleasantville, N. J., two years; New Haven, Conn., one year; Preston, Md., three years; Snow Hill, Md., five years; Mount Joy, Wilmington, Del., two years; superintendent of the Salisbury District, six years; Montclair, N. J., twelve years; Asbury, Atlantic City, N. J., two years; superintendent of the Dover District, four years; superintendent of the Philadelphia District, two years; Zoar, Philadelphia, one year. Just two weeks before his passing, he was appointed to Zoar for the second year. In 1915 he was elected secretary of the Delaware Conference, a post he automatically relinquished two years later on his first appointment as superintendent. He was a thirty-second degree Mason.

On May 1, his wife's birthday, a day on which Dr. Jewett had planned a "special present" for her, as he had promised three days before, "he was not, for God took him." Servant of Christ, a great spirit as pastor, preacher, husband, father, and friend, he sits today on the right hand of the throne of God, where, with other chosen seed of the race, he is crowning Him "Lord of All."

Surviving are Mrs. Jewett; a daughter, Mrs. Thelma L. Taite, a social worker in New York City; a son, Staff Sergeant Hamilton S. Jewett, serving with the Armed Forces in North Africa; a sister Mrs. Lida Miles, of Crisfield, Md., and many other relatives.

To the historical data given, I would like to add a more intimate word. In the Southwestern Christian Advocate of March 16, 1939, on the eve of the seventy-fifth anniversary of the organization of the Delaware Conference, which was held in Zoar, the "Mother Church" of Negro Methodism, I wrote an appreciation of the five district superintendents of the Delaware Conference. Of Dr. Jewett, this was said:

"A brilliant student, a thorough workman, he is the type of man one has in mind when one speaks of 'a perfect Christian gentleman.' He is a kindly, affectioned, sympathetic brother and friend to man, whom all trust for his honesty, sincerity, and unselfish devotion to Kingdom building."

After three years of intimate and practically daily communion with him, the estimate written five years ago is greatly strengthened, and my love for him has steadily grown. It has been said that "no man is a hero to his valet"—which suggests the too-often truth that the closer we get to a man the less highly we regard him.

For three years I lived so close to Dr. Jewett that our backyards almost met. I "chauffeured" him whithersoever he went, and fellowshipped with him in our homes greatly to my spiritual enrichment. I never knew a more wholly unselfish and kindly man, or a more genuine Christian brother. He was never disturbed by the successes of other men. In his place of leadership as superintendent of three Districts in the Delaware Conference, he never took advantage of his position to do a brother an unkindness. It should always be thus among Christian people, but tragically, it just isn't.

He had an inherent sense of honor and justice, and, by keeping faith with his own high idealism, maintained for forty years an unspotted record in personal conduct in public relations.

After forty years of good workmanship in the faith; after a lifetime of helping others, forgetting himself, he deserved to die happy, with the assurance of the understanding and confidence of those whom last he served. But

life is full of paradoxes—and this is one of them: He died heavy-laden—supported, it is true, by a loving wife, whose devotion and tender care were divinely exemplary; loved, certainly, by a multitude of friends—but still heavy-laden.

And yet he has heard his Master's Voice: "Come unto me, all ye that labor and are heavy-laden, and I will give you rest." And today he has found rest in Him.

This verse from his favorite hymn, "Thou Hidden Source of Calm Repose," would make a fitting epitaph indeed for his tombstone:

Jesus, my All-in-All Thou art,
My rest in toil, my ease in pain;
The healing of my broken heart,
In war my peace, in loss my gain;
My smile beneath the tyrant's frown,
In shame my glory and my crown!

ISAAC JAMES JONES

Isaac James Jones, son of the late Alfred and Leah Hester Jones, was born in Deals Island, Maryland, January 10, 1884, and departed this life July 17, 1944, at the Marine Hospital in Baltimore.

He was married to Miss Bertha Mae Milbourne in 1907. To this union were born several children, six of whom survived. His wife died January 17, 1941.

He was converted at an early age; and proved to be a faithful, ardent co-worker with God. He lived a clean Christian life; and was loved and highly respected by all who knew him. So much so, until, when the people of his home town needed a pastor, a man of God to lead them, they chose Isaac James Jones to be their pastor. He served very acceptably this charge and people as supply pastor.

He leaves to mourn his passing six children, two brothers, two sisters, and a host of other relatives and friends.

Y., one year as a student pastor; Hudson, N. Y., two years; Frankford, Pa., two years; Merchantville, N. J., three years; Chestertown, Md., four years; Mt. ADAM LEONARD MARTIN

According to the obituary read at his funeral, The Rev. Adam Leonard Martin, son of the late Adam and Mary E. Martin was born into this world in the town of Merchantville, N. J., about 73 years ago. He was born into the Kingdom of God in the Princess Anne Academy, Princess Anne, Md., on the day designated for prayer in colleges, January 26, 1888, and he was born into the Kingdom of glory, October 24, 1944, at Atlantic City, N. J.

These are mountain peaks of the history of a good man. The first event marks the rise of the currents of his life. The second gave direction to those currents, and the third was the merging of those currents into the great sea.

From 1872 to 1944 he belonged to us, now he belongs to the Eternities. Brother Martin grew from childhood to manhood under the handicap of the dissipations, allurements and distractions of his natal town, but the influence of these was more than offset by a Christian home, and the Sunday School, and the religious fervor that gathered around the Asbury Methodist Episcopal at Merchantville, which has been for many years, the salvation of our youth.

To this church he was led by devout parents from his infancy, and in the light of this beacon he saw the cross and realized the saving power of its sacrifice. Speaking of his Christian rearing and home life, he said to his room-mate: "If I forget the religious influence of my home, and the spiritual teachings of my Sunday School, let my right hand forget her cunning; if I do not remember them, let my tongue cleave to the roof of my mouth; if I prefer not my home and church above my chief joy."

From the time of his conversion he took a very active interest in everything that pertained to the life of the church and his own spiritual development, and very early the Spirit of the Lord began to move him toward the ministry. He correctly interpreted the language of the Spirit and set himself the task of preparing for the great work upon which he entered later. Added to the mental training of the public school of Merchantville, he was for four years a student at the Princess Anne Academy; and four years at Morgan College. He graduated with honor from both of the above mentioned schools.

The church also heard the voice that called our brother to the ministry of the Gospel, and licensed him to exhort in 1889, and to preach in 1890.

On recommendation from his church and Pastor he was admitted into the Delaware Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church on probation, 1895. His ordination to Deacon's and Elder's orders followed the regular schedule of two and four years respectively. He was twice married.

In September 1895, the first year of his Conference membership, he was married to Miss Martha V. Wright of Quantico, Md. by the late Rev. A. R. Shockley. To this union, three children were born. Brother Martin was well endowed by nature in body, brain, and heart, and all capabilities were quickened by the Spirit. He was a clear thinker and a strong expounder of the Gospel.

Brother Martin filled the following appointments with credit to his church, Conference, and himself: Wattsville, Va., 3 years; Cambridge, Md., 12 years; Atlantic City, N. J., 17 years; John Wesley, Philadelphia, Pa., 2 years; Newark, N. J., 4 years; John Simmons, Philadelphia, Pa., 5 years; Princess Anne, Md., 3 years. Retired 1941.

He preached Christ and Him crucified and never wandered beyond the mighty sweep of that soul saving and satisfying theme. He was a filial son, a devoted husband, and a friend as true as steel. The world is richer by his life, and poorer by his death. But our loss is his gain and it shall be our gain too, when we meet him yonder by the crystal sea:

There the saints of all ages in harmony meet, Their Saviour and brethren transported to greet; While the anthems of rapture unceasingly roll, And the smile of the Lord the feast of the soul.

Appropriate funeral services were held in the Asbury Methodist Church, Atlantic City, N. J., and his weary dust was laid to rest in the cemetery at Pleasantville, N. J., October 28, 1944.

Dr. W. C. Thompson, District Superintendent of the Wilmington District had charge of the services, assisted by Revs. W. J. Helm, F. H. Butler, W. A. Hubbard, J. E. A. Johns, J. W. Jefferson, B. B. Carson, F. C. Kershaw, A. L. Scriber, and the writer, who delivered the eulogy.

Rev. Samuel Roscoe Miles, third surviving son of the late Alfred T. and Sabra Crappa Miles, was born at Hopewell, Md., 52 years ago.

Rev. Eddie McCoy Neals was born in Scribben County, Georgia, December 5, 1871, and entered into his rest 9:00 A. M. March 4, 1945, in Philadelphia.

He was taken ill with a stroke early in May 1941 on the Odessa and Port Penn charge; but after finishing out the year, his health no better, he retired. He was elected and served as Postmaster of the Delaware Conference for sixteen years.

Md., Withams, Va., Jamestown, Md., Millington, Md., Kingston, Md., Grenloch and Rhodes, N. J., Odessa and St. George, Del., Odessa and Port Penn, Del.

The funeral services were held at Haven Church, Philadelphia. The services were conducted by Rev. Dennis Fletcher. Remarks were made by Revs. J. E. A. Johns, D. L. Ridout, Howard Bailey, C. W. Pullett, W. A. T. Miles. The main eulogy was by the Rev. Dr. L. S. Moore, pastor of the church.

He leaves to mourn his passing a devoted wife, one brother, four nephews, one niece, other relatives and friends. He was laid to rest in Lincoln Cemetery, Philadelphia, Pa.

WILLIAM EDWARD HILTON

William Edward Hilton was born at Green Spring, Harford County, Maryland, July 5th, 1860, and departed this life on the eve of the 1945 session of the Delaware Annual Conference, at the home of a son in Merchantville, New Jersey.

His parents, William Edward Hilton and Elizabeth Rigby Hilton, were married in 1832, and to their union were born thirteen children. William Edward was the seventh child.

He was converted at an early age, and was baptized in the Baptist Church, but joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, to be with his devout mother. He was a rugged boy of the hilly country who played and fought with the other boys of his community.

Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:

(1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute.

(8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved: and is sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

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
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
