FIRST DAY, WEDNESDAY, APRIL 16, 1947

Tindley Temple, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

OPENING: The Delaware Annual Conference of The Methodist Church opened its 85th session at 2:00 P. M., Wednesday, April 16, 1947, in Tindley Temple Methodist Church, Philadelphia, Pa. J. T. Fletcher led the devotional service, with D. L. Ridout at the organ and R. B. Thompson leading the singing. Hymns 73 and 402 were played ("Be Still, My Soul," and "And Are We Yet Alive?") after which the leader read the scripture lesson and offered prayer. Hymn 465, "Where Cross the Crowded Ways of Life," was then sung, and Hymn 172, "Come, Holy Spirit, Heavenly Dove," was played.

COMMUNION: Bishop Alexander Preston Shaw, resident Bishop of the Baltimore Area, conducted the Holy Communion service, assisted by Pastor D. W. Henry, the district superintendents, C. D. Gerald, D. H. Hargis, E. H. Crampton, O. H. Spence, and W. C. Thompson. The bishop delivered the Communion message from Psalm 139: 11, 12.

ROLL CALL: D. L. Ridout, secretary of the last session, called the roll of members of the Conference, probationers, and accepted supply pastors. Lay members were directed to register with the secretary through Mrs. Ella F. Bailey, of the secretarial staff.

SECRETARY ELECTED: On motion of M. W. Clark, D. L. Ridout was elected secretary of the Conference, and named the following assistants: Dennis R. Fletcher, Argalius E. Martin, W. G. Matthews, Mrs. Ella F. Bailey, and Mrs. Clarissa D. Walker.

TREASURER'S ASSISTANTS NAMED: W. J. Helm, treasurer of the Conference for the quadrennium, named W. A. Harewood and W. A. T. Miles as his assistants.

STATISTICIAN ELECTED: On motion of W. L. D. Lyght, M. W. Clark was elected statistician of the Conference, and named the following assistants: W. E. Stanley, R. C. Hughes, E. W. Holden, C. B. Miles, W. E. Marks, J. I. Williams, W. R. Price, M. L. McKenney, S. G. Fullman, J. A. Fassett, J. W. Hayman, and E. A. Hughes.

POSTMASTER ELECTED: On motion of D. R. Fletcher, W. H. Johns was elected postmaster for the Conference session.

PROGRAM ADOPTED: On motion of W. L. D. Lyght, the printed program was accepted as the official guide for the Conference sessions, subject to necessary changes at the discretion of the presiding bishop.

LEGAL LIMITS: On motion of D. H. Hargis, the legal limits of the Conference were fixed at the first eight rows from the front and across the auditorium.

COURTESY COMMITTEE: The following were named the Committee on Courtesy by the respective district superintendents: William Tasco (Dover); O. S. Edwards (Easton); W. H. Mears (Philadelphia); J. W. Hayman (Salisbury); C. E. Kincade (Wilmington).

RESOLUTION OF WELCOME: L. S. Moore offered a resolution of welcome to Presiding Bishop Shaw, with a pledge of co-operation by the Conference in the deliberations of the 85th session. On his motion, the resolution was adopted.

ORDER OF THE DAY: On motion of F. H. Butler, the balloting for election of delegates to the General Conference was ordered to begin Friday morning after the reports of the Committees on Ministerial Qualifications and Conference Relations.

INTRODUCTIONS: Dr. J. W. E. Bowen, editor of the Central Christian Advocate, New Orleans, La., was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Dr. David D. Jones was introduced, and announced the death of Mr. Jackson Davis, of the General Education Board. The secretary was ordered by the Conference to send a letter of sympathy to the family of Mr. Davis.

Chaplains J. W. Handy, Jr., of Fort Dix, N. J., and Elmer P. Gibson, of Fort Jackson, S. C., members of the Conference, were presented and addressed the Conference.

Dennis R. Fletcher, recently appointed to the staff of the Church Extension Department of Debt Raising and Finance of the Board of Missions, was presented and addressed the Conference.

The Revs. A. J. Carter, S. J. Mack, and A. E. Berry, of the Washington Conference, and W. J. Brown, of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, were introduced.

CHECK PRESENTED: Dr. J. W. E. Bowen presented a check for \$2,622.82 from the Methodist Publishing House, representing the Conference's share in the past year's profits of the publishing interest of The Methodist Church.

INTRODUCED: Bishop Fred Pierce Corson, of the Philadelphia Area,

was introduced by Bishop Shaw.

Also introduced were: Dr. S. H. Sweeney, pastor of the St. Marks Church, New York City, and the following members of the Washington Conference: The Revs. E. A. Haynes, Kelly Jackson, C. E. Hodges, V. M. S. Hughes, V. T. Keys, and the Rev. and Mrs. C. A. Scott.

After the singing of hymn 357, Bishop Corson was presented and delivered the noontide message from the third chapter of the Acts of the Apostles, using as his theme, "What a Christian Has to Give." The three

things a Christian has to give, he said, are:

1. The Word, that word being JESUS CHRIST, the only Hope and Redeemer of the World.

2. Example, for the world will not rise higher than the level of the

people inside the church.

3. A Friend. The people of the world need the friendship of Christian people.

VOTE OF THANKS GIVEN: On motion of D. H. Hargis, a rising vote of thanks was given Bishop Corson for his message.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT: Bishop Shaw announced that he had invited Bishop Corson to preside over the next session of the Delaware Conference, the invitation being subject to approval by the Council of Bishops.

BENEDICTION: After various announcements the benediction was pronounced by Bishop Shaw.

ADJOURNMENT.

SECOND DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION

MISSIONARY SERVICE: With J. O. Lockman presiding, the annual missionary service was opened at 2:30 P. M. The sermon was delivered by W. G. Matthews, assisted in the service by D. G. Waters, Jose Angulo, R. W. Thomas, J. E. A. Johns, N. W. Moore, Jr. Music was led by the choir of Siloam Church, Chester. A special musical contribution was made by a gospel chorus led by Mrs. Carletta Whittington.

REPORTS CONTINUED: With Bishop Shaw in the chair, W. C. Thompson, retiring superintendent of the Wilmington District, was called, and read his sixth annual report.

DR. NEWELL PRESENTED: Dr. Fred B. Newell, executive secretary of the New York City Society, was presented and addressed the Conference in the interest of the memorial to be presented at this session respecting change of boundaries of the Central and Northeastern jurisdictional Conferences.

ORDER OF THE DAY: On motion of D. R. Fletcher, the order of the day following the Stewardship Emphasis Program Friday afternoon will be the vote on the memorial from the New York and New York East Conferences.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR: On the request of W. A. T. Miles, the privilege of the floor was granted I. R. Elzey, who made a presentation to W. C. Thompson on behalf of the Wilmington District.

BOARD OF EDUCATION REPORT: E. H. Crampton and H. A. Bailey, president of the Conference Board of Education, and executive secretary of Christian Education, respectively, made the annual report of the Board, distributing the same in comprehensive booklet form.

ADJOURNMENT: After various announcements, the Conference adjourned with benediction by Dr. E. A. Lofton, of the Washington Conference.

THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION

QUESTION 32: "What preachers coming from other denominations have had their orders recognized?"

E. H. Crampton, J. E. Licorish, and L. S. Moore.

VOTE ON MEMORIAL: Vote was taken on the New York and New York East Conferences Memorial as follows:

Action of the Conference therefore favored permitting the New York and New York East Conferences to develop new Negro work within their borders. Thus the General Conference will be requested to change the existent ruling that automatically places all new Negro work in this territory under the Delaware Conference.

On motion of D. R. Fletcher, a committee was ordered to work with the New York City Missionary Society in the plan to develop new Negro work within their jurisdiction.

MEMORIAL ON CHILDREN'S DAY: The memorial from the New Jersey Conference that will request the General Conference to return to the observance of Children's Day (replaced by "Methodist Student Day" by the last General Conference) was read and unanimously approved.

CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS CAMPAIGN: J. W. Parker read the result of the three-year Conference Claimants Campaign. On motion of W. R. Price, he was given a rising vote of thanks for his efforts in behalf of the successful drive.

On motion of J. W. Parker, the pastors' one per cent was ordered

applied this year to the regular (instead of the permanent) fund.

REPORT OF LAY LEADER: Hally P. Johns, Conference lay leader,

read his annual report.

On motion of Hally P. Johns, members of the Conference Board of Lay Activities who are not members of the Conference will be entertained free of charge at the annual sessions.

Bishop A. P. Shaw, Members of the Conference and Friends:

Another Conference year has ended. The curtain has fallen. Like nature, that drops its sable curtain and closes the day, our 1946-47 Conference year has come to a close. What our thoughts, acts, and deeds have been, constitute the record. Already it has been judged by Him who judgeth with righteousness, equity and love. But according to our mores, the essential custom of making an annual report of our work, and the requirement of the discipline, I am happy to present to you this my fourth report, for your information and evaluation.

First, "Thanks be to God who always causes us to triumph in our labors." For it is He who worketh in us, both the willing and the doing of his good pleasures. Therefore we can say, one more year's work for Jesus.

Sickness and Death

A few of the brothers have been ill for short periods during the year. Among them were Revs. J. O. Lockman and A. C. Whittington. Mrs. H. D. Davis underwent an operation and has now regained her health. There have been no deaths in the active ranks. One death came to our retired ranks, when on June 9th, 1946, Rev. J. J. Mitchell departed this life. These ministers' wives have passed during the year: Mrs. Lulu Turner, Mrs. C. A. Norwood, Mrs. G. B. H. Colman. Their obituaries will appear elsewhere in the Conference Journal. Those who have had death in their families: Mrs. J. O. Lockman, a mother, Mrs. C. D. Gerald, a sister. Several of our good laymen have passed, among those I mention Brother John W. Dennis, Associate District Lay Leader of Newark, Md. "The name of death was never terrible to him that knew to live. These had no fear for God was near."

GALENA. L. C. Waters, pastor. Raised for all causes \$1408. Advance over last year. Olivet Church has been electrified.

LAUREL CIRCUIT. L. R. Jones, pastor. Raised for all causes \$736. Youth have been organized. Best report within years. Conversions 4.

MILFORD. E. V. Wimberly, pastor. While this church has raised more money this year than it has for some time, it did not quite raise its W. S. and Conference benevolences in full. Raised for all causes \$4302. A furnace has been installed in the church.

MILLINGTON. G. O. Commodore, pastor. Raised for all purposes \$1835. Interior of church beautified.

PORT DEPOSIT. R. T. Jones, pastor. Raised for all causes \$3598. Great progress has been made. Improvement made on church property. Cokesbury church shingled and painted. Church and parsonage electrified. Conversions 34.

District Parsonage

After three years of active waiting the superintendent and his family moved into the newly built district parsonage on Nov. 6, 1946. The house has been furnished from bottom to top with new furniture. Five thousand dollars have been raised on the building. Seventeen hundred dollars have been raised on the building fund this year and seven hundred dollars on furniture.

Eighteen charges held Vacation Church Schools with a total enrollment of 190.

Christian workers' Schools were held at Berlin, Chestertown, Dover and Laurel with an enrollment of 298.

Salaries

Charges increasing pastor's salaries for another year are:—Bridgeville Circuit \$100; Cheswold \$200; Dover \$100; Fairlee \$35; Colman \$100; Mardela \$300; South Berlin \$150; Still Pond \$125; Townsend \$65; Lewes \$200.

District Organizations and Meetings

Organization is the framework or skeleton structure for supporting and enclosing something. It is made up of many parts united in a system for the purpose of better prosecuting the program as handed down. To this end the District's forty-five Woman's Society of Christian Service organizations, twenty-seven Methodist Youth Fellowship, seven Young Adult Fellowship, and fifteen Methodist Men organizations, have been set up. The program can not be properly implemented without these mechanics.

On the district level meetings have been held regularly. The District Stewards' Meeting was held at Janes, Chestertown, and the program for the year was outlined. The Methodist Youth Fellowship was entertained at Nassau, Bishop and Mrs. Shaw honored us with their presence. Shaw delivered an inspiring and challenging message to the young people. Our District Conference, Lay Retreat, four Quarterly meetings of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, meetings of Minister's Wives' Association, one meeting of the Young Adult Fellowship, one Methodist Youth Fellowship sub-district meeting, ten monthly Preachers' meetings and one District cabinet meeting have lent themselves in stimulating interest, giving information and inspiring the district constituency. One of the high expectations of our Preachers' Meetings is an inspiring sermon from one of our good pastors. The pastors have majored in living up to this expectation of them. We have kept in touch with one another, we have kept abreast with our task, we have kept busy. There have been achievements for "work wins everything."

In our district activities, we have sought to keep before us the main emphases of the Church at large, the Annual Conference, and the needs of the district. No better evidence of this can be given than the timely symposia and discussions given at District and Efficiency Conferences. The Laymen responded largely. They discussed things that matter—were living issues. Who could but speak?

Individual and Group Quarterly Conferences

The first and fourth quarterly conferences are always individual conferences. They offer the superintendent his greatest opportunity to help the pastor and his church in a large way. He can better serve in this official capacity than by preaching a good sermon on Sunday, however important a good sermon may be, and a good sermon is always important. But in the quarterly conference he has the official family, those that represent certain units of the church's program. There, each official talks about his work,

receives instructions as to how he can do even a better job. Thus his help is of a two-fold nature. He is helped personally and for what he might be to the others. Incidental questions arise that need to be answered, clarified and interpreted. It is good education technique and process to meet questions as they arise. The Quarterly Conference offers this opportunity.

Group Quarterly Conferences have passed the experimental stage with us and have almost become a must. If we are to gear into the high powered educational machinery, it means teaching, more teaching, better teaching as to how to develop skills to better do the work. To meet this challenge, outlined programs upon the work of the local church have become the order of the day. Ministers and laymen meet on a common level and share in the discussions. They take on the pattern of a clinic in that the laymen are told how to do their particular job. These conferences are always fraught with helpful information that can be put to work in the various areas in which we have to serve.

Evangelism and Stewardship

The test of a movement is not merely what happens during the intensified effort, but what is carried over. The official year of Evangelism terminated on December thirty-first, but Evangelism did not close. The methods and evangelistic techniques that were in vogue during the special effort, are being used as regular evangelistic procedure. Home visitation evangelism, teaching evangelism, mass evangelism, personal evangelism—any method that will bring men to conscious faith in Jesus Christ as their Savior and to a conscious surrender to him as their Lord, is the method. So there continue to be seasons of refreshing. These seasons like rain, bring new life to the individual and to the churches. Therefore we reaffirm our faith in the power of the gospel message and pledge our loyalty to the great world-wide program of Evangelization.

Then follows as a natural sequence the Stewardship emphasis, which is to perfect what was begun in conversion, consecration and development of this new life. As a prophecy it designs to do in the individual what leaven does in the meal, leaven the whole. When a tree grows, it grows as a whole. Roots, trunk, branches, leaves, blossoms, and fruit are all affected by the growth. So Christian Stewardship is to develop us symmetrically, to make us full-rounded Christians. Every area of our being is to be affected and is to express itself in a useful, helpful manner. The techniques we are using in getting the message over are: preaching, teaching conversational groups, clinics and seminars on Stewardship.

Christian Education

Christian Education is given a large place in our district program. Rev. Bailey, Executive Secretary of Christian Education, and the district staff, are tireless in their service. Rev. Bailey's helpful suggestions, fruitful knowledge, and rich experience are always at our disposal. Whenever we call he answers, yes. Our Institutes, district assembly, sub-district meetings, Christian workers' schools are all geared into the movement. Christian Edu-

cation is doing much in preparing the soil of the soul for receiving the seed of Grace. The more thorough we do the work of Christian education, the greater is God's chance in winning that life, for the more fertile the soil, the more possible the germination of the seed.

An Observation

One of the needs of a few of the circuit charges of the district is, for the stronger church or churches to become willing to assume a larger proportion of the total askings of the charge. This unwillingness on the part of the stronger church affects the charge seriously. In the first place the pastor is not likely to get the estimated salary; secondly, the Benevolences are likely to be slighted. Each church should have the charge concept, for a deficiency on the part of either affects the charge. A more liberal view and enlarged sympathy will aid in the solution.

Conclusion

The great threat to the Christian Church today is found within itself in terms of compromise, neglect, indifference, and complacency. Apparently, nobody is disturbed about anything. Moral death has already started in many homes. Some parents are saying that they are teaching their children moderation in the home, but total abstinence by precept and example is the lesson to be taught. The Judge of the Juvenile Court of Kent County, Delaware averred that he knew church officials who attended Saturday night tocktail parties and then would go to church on Sunday morning for worhip. They are at a disadvantage physically, mentally and spiritually to make any contribution to the worship service.

"The world is too much with us; late and soon, Getting and spending, we lay waste our powers. Little we see in nature that is ours.

We have given our hearts away, a sordid boon! This sea that bares her bosom to the moon, The wind that will be howling at all hours, And are up-gathered now like sleeping flowers; For this, for everything we are out of tune.

It moves us not—Great God! Nature nor anything seems to give us proper motivation."

Deep down in many hearts today there is a weariness of hypocrisy. People are sick of dishonesty and insincerity in the religious life. What the church needs more than anything else is men of deep devotion, character, ability; men who have complete confidence in the inherent power of right and truth—Christian leadership that is genuinely converted and spirit-filled.

An Appreciation

I am thankful to God for his fatherly care and guidance during the year. I have been blessed with good health, which is a primary requisite to endure the rigor and exigencies that the superintendency entails. I am indebted to the loyal pastors, their good wives, and faithful laymen for their

encouragement, cooperation, fidelity and service. You have done everything possible to make it pleasant for me and my family. I am glad to have had the privilege of being associated with Drs. Hargis and Thompson, the Nestors of the conference. Each in his own peculiar way has contributed something that has enriched my experience. I am grateful to you Bishop Shaw for making the unique arrangement for me. May God bless you; May God bless them; May God bless us all.

Reports of Charges

LINKWOOD. E. W. Holden, pastor, has resolutely endeavored to lead. They report World Service and Conference Benevolences in full, but a slight decrease in their ministerial support and other askings. Raised for trustees \$328; grand total \$1667. Christian Stewards 40; conversions 5. The church at Hicksburg was completely destroyed by fire last November.

MARYDEL. J. I. Williams, pastor, persists in their mutual admiration for each other. They report all annual Conference causes in full. Trustees \$1059; grand total \$2854. Conversions 3; Christian Stewards 38. This commencement the pastor anticipates graduating from Delaware State College.

McDANIEL. Crafton Whittington, pastor, has labored zealously and his loyal people have cooperated, especially the youth. They report the annual Conference budget in full and \$1666 raised for the trustees, enabling them to build a modern church hall which they use as a community center. Grand total \$2833. Christian Stewards 6; proportionate givers 15; conversions 12.

MILES RIVER. C. T. Wilson, concluding his sixth year as pastor, has undergone a serious operation and has intermittently been ill throughout the whole year. He planned well his work and his good people, led by Mrs. Wilson, report a 100% victory. Grand total \$1745; Christian Stewards 20; tithers 20; proportionate givers 6; conversions 8.

OXFORD again a complete victory. The annual Conference budget \$1762 was raised in full. Trustees \$739; grand total \$2501. Christian Stewards 12; proportionate givers 30; conversions 7. W. A. Nichols, pastor, excels as a financier.

PRESTON repeats her last year's excellent record by raising in full her Conference budget \$1916; and \$1468 for trustees; grand total \$3384. Christian Stewards 25; tithers 6; proportionate givers 15; conversions 5. Johns Church and parsonage both inside and Church re-roofed. Harvey Hall, pastor, is diligent in all things, but majors in interest with his young people.

RIDGELY. The five years ardent labors of L. F. Hodges, former pastor, wonderfully resurrected this charge. J. W. Mickle, present pastor, has successfully entered into his labors. They continue to report a 100% victory. Raised for all purposes \$3635. The parsonage has been refurnished. Conversions 2; proportionate givers 50.

ROYAL OAK, led by R. W. Thomas, pastor, continues her kingly reporting. Conversions 35; Christian Stewards 106; tithers 80; proportionate givers 26. Conference causes \$2318; trustees \$1350; grand total \$3668.

SAINT MICHAELS, with J. O. Griffin, pastor, continues her triumphant reporting. Annual Conference budget \$2296; trustees \$3840; grand total \$6136. Conversions 20; proportionate givers 20; tithers 18; Christian Stewards 21.

STEVENSVILLE makes another excellent report. Christian Stewards 20; tithers 2; proportionate givers 120; conversions 12. Annual Conference causes \$2228; trustees \$1675; grand total \$3903. George H. McMurray is a very, very happy pastor. Recently G. H. McMurray, Jr. was added to the McMurray family.

TAYLOR'S ISLAND, with her new pastor, J. G. Stevens, reports a large advance but not a complete victory. World Service and Conference Benevolences are raised in full. Ministerial support and other askings nearly in full. Conference Claimants Endowment \$80; trustees \$190; grand total \$1852. Christian Stewards 5; conversions 5.

TRAPPE as in former years reports all causes in full—\$1924. Trustees \$385; grand total \$2309. The parsonage has been renovated within, with a new living-room suite added; electric plant installed. A strenuous effort has been made for increased moral and social betterment. Conversions 2; Christian Stewards 25; tithers 16; proportionate givers 45; F. R. Richardson, pastor.

VIENNA and REIDS GROVE reports all financial apportionments in full—\$1842; trustees \$1675; grand total \$3517. Zoar Church at Reid's Grove has been remodelled at a cost of \$2300. \$1480 has been paid on the same. The young people's organizations at each church are intellectually vigilant. A. A. McDowell, pastor, is completing his 13th year. Conversions 7; Christian Stewards 18; tithers 5.

WILLISTON. R. T. Wallace, pastor, and his loyal people constituting this four-point circuit, again make a 100% report. Raised for all purposes \$2642. A long standing indebtedness on the parsonage has been liquidated. The church has been renovated within. Christian Stewards 25; tithers 7; proportionate givers 15.

WITTMAN repeats her last year's basic blunder of starting too late. Intensely interested in what they call home improvement, they lagged far behind in their zeal for the spiritual realities. The church at Sherwood has rebuilt their hall, assisted by the donations of a benefactress. It is used as a community center. The Youth Fellowships at both churches are eager for Christian advancement. Raised for Conference causes \$1662; trustees \$2490; grand total \$4152. Christian Stewards 60; conversions 18; tithers 25. E. N. Foster, pastor.

Summary

The accustomed meetings, with appropriate instructive and inspirational programs, have been held. The District Stewards Meeting, The District Methodist Youth Fellowship, The District Monthly Preachers' Meeting, The District Layman's Retreat, The Efficiency Conference, The District Speaking Contest, and 13 Vacation Bible Schools were held: enrollment 619. At the Youth Fellowship and Layman's Retreat we were specially honored by the presence of our Resident Bishop A. P. Shaw. Two District Christian Leadership Training Schools were held during the winter. 193 registrants were certificated. The Ministers Wives Association donation to the Board of Conference Claimants will show a great advance over former years. That group, along with the Methodist Men and the Woman's Society of Christian Service has been very active. The leaders of each have striven to have them function according to the disciplinary requirements. We were well represented at the Delaware Conference Methodist Youth Institute held in July at Delaware State College. The accepted supply pastors required, attended the Ministerial Training School at Harper's Ferry, W. Va. Besides the very large enrollment at our four county high schools, a goodly number of our young people are matriculated at Princess Anne, Bowie State, Morgan State, Bennett and other accredited colleges.

The leaders at the six sub-district group conferences, co-operating with the district lay leader, four associates, and two sub-associate leaders have been persistent in their efforts to accomplish whatever possible, under the third spearhead of the Crusade—Christian Stewardship. The results are as follows: 870 Christian Stewards, 395 tithers, 935 proportionate givers, 404 conversions and accessions, 431 additional pupils to the Church School.

Likewise, financially the results have been somewhat pleasing. 34 charges constitute the Easton District. Evangelistic efforts have been conducted in each. The salaries of all pastors, the District Superintendent, Bishop, have been paid in full. 12 charges have increased pastors' salaries; 33 paid in full their Conference Claimants; 32 Annual Conference Investment; 33 College and Seminary Fund; 34 charges will receive the World Service Distinguished Service Certificate, i. e. 100%.

The interior of the District Parsonage has been renovated and a living room suite purchased. During the six years tenure, the large and embarrassing mortage has been paid and there is an amount of \$303.87 in the hands of the District Trustees treasury. Indebtedness on all the charges has been liquidated. A cozy Mission has been established at Middle Hooper's Island. The John Wesley Church, Chapel Charge, is nearly finished. Union Grove on the Hurlock Charge, Social Center at Waugh, Cambridge, and the St. Luke Church have applied for blueprints to begin construction.

The tenure of six years on the Easton District has been very strenuous, consistent with the times in which we serve, but they have been joyous because of the rich Christian fellowship and very fine cooperation on the part of both the ministry and the laity. They tactfully tendered us a welcome reception to encourage us to undertake a very difficult task, and very graciously tendered us a farewell Testimonial Reception to celebrate the victorious achievements, on April 10th. Again we are deeply grateful to our Heavenly Father for His Abiding Mercy and Loving kindness during these

trying years. We sincerely thank our loving and tolerant Resident Bishop, A. P. Shaw for his wise guidance. We shall ever retain fond recollections of our colleagues, the District Superintendents, with whom we have been privileged to serve. Let me repeat with emphasis, we most highly appreciate the hearty cooperation and goodwill of the intrepid and devoted pastors and their faithful wives, and the zealous lay-members with whom we have been permitted to labor, to make this report possible.

Let me close this final report by reciting the great hymn of John Haynes Holmes, which vividly portrays the condition of this age and voices loud

demand for change.

The Voice of God is calling, It summons unto men; As once He spake in Zion, So now He speaks again. Whom shall I send to succor My people in their need? Whom shall I send to loosen The bonds of shame and greed?

I hear my people crying In cot, and mine and slum; No field or mart is silent, No city street is dumb. I see my people falling In darkness and despair, Whom shall I send to shatter The fetters which they bear?

From ease and plenty save us; From pride of place absolve; Purge us of low desire: Lift us to high resolve; Take us and make us holy; Teach us Thy Will and Way. Speak and behold! We answer; Command and we obey!

PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT

Bishop Shaw and Members of the Conference:

A new world spirit is changing all things and making all things new. We have felt this new world spirit the past year throughout the length and breadth of the Philadelphia District. All year this superintendent has been dreaming dreams and seeing visions. Some of them have come true; others are being realized, and some have just petered out. With a hilarious optimism, pastors and laymen alike have labored to make some of our dreams come true and to make the spirit of Christ regnant and dominant in all areas of human activity.

District Meetings

We started the year with the District Stewards meeting which was followed by such gatherings as: District Conference, Church School Institute, District Lay Conference, District Woman's Society of Christian Service, District Preachers' Meeting, Ministers' Wives Association, Pre-Conference Rally, Leadership Training Schools, and District Young Adult Fellowship.

Three of these meetings were really outstanding. The District Conference was held in the newly renovated St. John's Church in Orange, S. D. Emptage, pastor. The Forum Period which consisted of questions and answers by the District Superintendents was not only interesting but served to enlighten all concerning Methodist policy and program.

"Ways the Church Can Meet the Rise in Crime" was ably discussed by Rev. A. E. Martin and Rev. Noah Moore of Chester. Rev. Roger Fair, Port Byron, New York, Personal Consultant and Religious Adviser to 500 migrants gave a challenging and inspiring message. Dr. Beverly Shaw gave the closing sermon.

The District Lay Meeting was held at Trenton, N. J. Mr. Roy Cordery. District Lay Leader, reports that vision, zeal and intelligence were evident as stress was given to the Stewardship Program of the Philadelphia District.

Geared to bring vision, challenge and courage to all, our Pre-Conference Rally attracted more than 125 persons. It was a memorable conference. In addition to the pastor's report which showed a year of unusual achievements, we were privileged to listen to a timely address by Prof-Walter Brooks of the Chemistry Department of the University of Pennsylvania, on the subject "This Atomic Age." After giving us some basic facts and information concerning atomic energy, we were convinced that each of us has a personal stake in the world control of atomic energy.

Stewardship Objectives have been presented, studied, and accepted as they have come to us from our constituted authorities. We feel that the Stewardship Program makes it possible for every church to transform the whole attitude, outlook, and program of the local church. The central attempt in this effort on the Philadelphia District is not merely to get money, although that is desperately needed, but our central drive has been to get people to enlist non-givers and to widen the financial and spiritual base of the church. To this end we have used reports, graphs, interpretive addresses, lay speakers, audio-visual aids and pageantry.

Three Stewardship Training Classes were held during the year. One in Philadelphia, Newark, and Brooklyn. About 150 persons attended the three classes. Dr. M. Walker Clair, Jr. from Chicago, directed the thinking of the group and gave several inspiring addresses.

A study is being made of Methodist opportunity in New York. The superintendent is now serving on an important committee composed of Bishop Oxnam, Dr. Newell, Executive Secretary of the New York City Missionary Society, the District Superintendents of the New York Conference and several pastors from the Delaware and New York Conferences. This committee meets frequently to plan action and develop new work among the million colored people living in New York.

It requires real effort to worship. With this in mind, we have urged our ministers and officials to give special attention to the Sunday services with the view of helping the people in their worship of God. Methodism has never been considered a liturgical church, but it always has had fixed forms to guide it in its acts of worship. Most of our churches print attractive Sunday Bulletins, containing the announcements and activities for the week and in this way, do away with the reading of notices. Rallies and special financial campaigns are planned to take place at a time other than at the morning hour of worship. One Church, St. Marks, Montclair, N. J. has reached the place where the people on entering the sanctuary, place their offerings and tithes in a box at the door or in the vestibule. Nothing is said about money during the service.

Increase in Salaries

In light of the great increase in the cost of living, we have suggested that wherever possible, an increase should be made in the pastor's salary. A year ago, I reported to you that every Charge, except four, had substantially increased the salary. Some of these have made a further increase. They are, Montclair—\$400, making the salary \$3,000; Jamaica—\$200, making the salary \$2,000; Camphor—\$50, making the salary \$2,650; Frankford—\$340, making the salary \$2,340; Butler Memorial—\$100, making the salary \$820; Shaw Chapel—\$100, making the salary \$600; White Plains—\$640, making the salary \$2,040.

Our Expansion Program

I think I am not far from the truth when I say that at present the Philadelphia District is carrying on the greatest expansion program in the history of the Conference. Charges raising funds on indebtedness and for expansion are as follows:

Redeemer, \$1,168; Newman, \$7,175; John Wesley—Brooklyn, \$5,545; Shaw Chapel, \$128; Asbury—Trenton, \$4,500; Zoar, \$4,502; Jersey City, \$2,324; Tindley Temple, \$13,000; Peniel, \$1,050; Mt. Zion, \$6,000; John Wesley—Phila., \$1,795; John Simmons, \$860; Haven, \$3,500; Germantown, \$8,000; Frankford, \$2,700; Camphor. \$3,500; E. Germantown, \$331; Bethsaida, \$800; Ossining, \$650; Orange, \$2,700; Butler Memorial, \$2,362; White Plains, \$1,400; Newark, \$903; Montclair, \$10,400; Englewood. \$1,700. Grand Total, \$86,580.

We note with approval certain churches that already have accomplished outstanding achievements. Brooks Memorial, Jamaica has recently purchased for cash a fine building lot at a cost of \$6,000. This congregation has outgrown its present building and after carefully considering all the factors involved, the Quarterly Conference voted to secure a new building site.

ASBURY, Trenton has completed the basement walls of the new church at a cost of \$18,000. The work would be further advanced at this time except for the fact that after completing the walls of the new church, there seemed to be an opportunity to purchase the Fifth Presbyterian Church (white) which is located nearby. This is a well appointed church and if we can secure the building it is believed we would do well to purchase the church. In this event our present property would be sold.

TINDLEY TEMPLE, Philadelphia, has purchased the lot adjoining the Church on the south side. The cost was \$13,000. It was paid for in one year. Plans call for a modern Parish House with chapel, educational facilities, social and recreational rooms. Tindley Temple has begun a new chapter in her history. In this chapter will be written the services rendered the older adults and the opportunities offered the younger generation whom the modern Church must reach and save.

JAMES, Germantown, has installed new comfortable pews in the beautiful sanctuary at a cost of \$6,000.

BUTLER MEMORIAL has paid off a long standing mortgage of \$2,300.

JERSEY CITY. The interior of the parsonage has been beautifully renovated and the workmen are now painting the parsonage on the outside.

CLAIR MEMORIAL came into existence on July 1, 1945, by the merger of St. Mark and Thirkield congregations. At the time of the merger the combined membership was a little over 100. In 20 months, the membership has increased to 298. The total raised this Conference Year was \$19,104.00. The pastor's salary is \$2,500. The property cost \$37,000. The mortgage at present is only \$18,000. This splendid achievement is due to the fine leadership of Rev. D. M. Collins, who cooperated wholeheartedly with the Board of Missions, our resident Bishop and Superintendent.

MT. ZION, Philadelphia, has recently purchased a parsonage. In addition the Trustees have installed new stained glass windows in the Church.

ZOAR, Philadelphia, has bought a new parsonage in North Philadelphia. New furniture adds to the attractiveness of the manse.

Assisted by the Board of Missions and Church Extension Society Bethsaida Church has purchased the building in which they have been worshiping. Also the adjoining lot has been secured. Plans have been drawn and approved for the new Church and Church School building. We expect to break ground this Spring.

We have been fortunate in securing the annual use of Camp Murray for our young people's Conference. Camp Murray is an Interdenominational young people's conference ground, operated by the Christian Service Center of Trenton, on Rotary Island in the Delaware River. Our District Youth Fellowship Conference will be held at Camp Murray, June 13, 14, and 15. There will be Bible study, interest classes, sports, swimming, group recreaction, camp fires and hikes. There Young People who are privileged to attend Camp Murray will enjoy a fine christian fellowship.

Church Extension and City Missions

We believe the hour has come when the Philadelphia District should give careful consideration to the Church extension possibilities in Philadelphia and New York. In a survey and report made by the Presbyterian Church of Philadelphia, we find this statement, "In Philadelphia every seventh person is a Negro. Philadelphia has the highest ratio of Negroes of any Northern Metropolis. Out of an estimated population of 2,000,000, 14.5 per cent or 290,000 are Negroes."

Study should be given to the possibility of taking over some of the Methodist Churches of Philadelphia Conference in those sections of the city where Negroes are concentrated. We need pastors with the missionary spirit and not afraid of hard work to meet these challenges. On March 28. it was my privilege to organize a new mission in the Merrick Park section of Jamaica. A large number of substantial colored people live in this section of Jamaica. The group met in the home of Dr. Edgar Love for organization. You can get some idea of the opportunity offered here when I tell you

that of the 1,000 boys and girls in the public school, 900 are colored and 100 are white. There is no church in the community except a small Baptist building. Dr. J. D. Kelly is the pastor.

Some Projects Underway

Under this heading I would like to say a word about several projects that are in the making:

JOHN WESLEY, Brooklyn, is still trying to secure a church in the Stuyvesant Bedford section where their members reside. While there is not much to be said definitely on this project at this time, we have good reason to believe that within the next 18 months this congregation will be worshipping in a fine church.

REDEEMER, Brooklyn, has a program underway to rebuild the front of the church, making the building more attractive and giving the church a "face lifting."

WHITE PLAINS negotiated to purchase one of the Jewish synagogues for \$27,000. The Y. M. C. A. offered \$32,000 for the building and the seller accepted their bid. We have, however, another building in sight and negotiations are underway to purchase the edifice.

ENGLEWOOD, N. J., Quarterly Conference authorized the Trustees to purchase a parsonage for \$6,000.00 and make needed repairs on this beautiful little church. We will do well to develop this charge. As in all the suburban communities of this section, colored people arc settling in large numbers.

JOHN WESLEY, Philadelphia, has appointed a special committee to confer with the Board of Missions and Church Extension concerning its expansion program. This Church has outgrown its present building. It now seems that if the Presbyterian Church nearby cannot be purchased in a short time, we must begin to think in terms of erecting a new building from the ground up.

JOHN SIMMONS, Philadelphia, through the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension has made an offer to purchase the St. Paul's Lutheran Church on Wharton Street, near 18th. We are now waiting to hear from them.

OSSINING plans to remodel their present church so as to have Church School facilities for the large number of Young People who attend the Church School.

The gain in church membership is impressive. The number of persons received into full membership during the year is 1277. The churches making this report possible are:

Brooks Memorial, Jamaica 78; Redeemer 8; Newman Memorial 201; John Wesley, Brooklyn 10; Shaw Chapel 6; Trenton 12; Zoar 20; Jersey City 114; Tindley Temple 210; Peniel 38; Mt. Zion 52; John Wesley, Philadelphia 34; John Simmons 6; Haven 138; Germantown 41; Frankford 24; Camphor 54; East Germantown 9; Bethsaida 8; Ossining 12; Orange 11; Butler Memorial 11; Newark 75; Montclair 75; Englewood 9; White Plains 21.

Some Personal Notations

Last January a situation developed at John Wesley, Brooklyn, making it necessary to release the pastor. The pastor has done nothing wrong. Perhaps, if more tact and understanding of the people had prevailed the story would be different. Dr. J. T. Fletcher supplied the work.

In October, 1946, a son, Charles L. Carrington, Jr. was born to the Rev.

and Mrs. C. L. Carrington of Jamaica.

During the year, the angel of death has visited two homes of parsonage families and sealed the lips of two wives: Mrs. Rosella Johns and Mrs. Mabel A. Crampton. Mrs. Lottie Downs, widow of the late Rev. Downs passed April 1st.

Rev. D. M. Collins was greatly bereaved by the death of his mother. The District Superintendent passed through a similar experience in the loss of his mother.

Rev. C. W. Pullett, Rev. J. W. Parker and Rev. R. B. Thompson were confined to bed for several weeks during the year.

On October 6, 1946, Rev. J. E. Dunn and Miss Alberta Lewis were married at Orange, New Jersey, by the Rev. S. D. Emptage.

Dr. F. H. Butler who has had a very happy, useful and profitable ministry of 52 years reaches his year of automatic retirement. He closes his active ministry at Mt. Zion Church, where he spent 6 years. During this period he has built and paid for a new Church costing \$55,000, including pews and stained glass windows. He inaugurated a program of social activities which is proving a benediction to the community, served by the Church. It is significant to note that Dr. Butler organized Mt. Zion Mission when pastor of Zoar Church and is closing his ministry at Mt. Zion, now one of the leading appointments of the Conference.

THE DISTRICT PARSONAGE. It is a happy privilege for me to report that the District Parsonage has been almost paid for. Less than two years ago, the District's Trustees purchased a parsonage for \$5,000. During these eighteen months, we have paid this sum, made extensive improvements costing \$1,500, and furnitured the parsonage with new furniture at a cost of \$2.500.

FINALLY—When Richard Henry Harrison, gifted principal in the Negro cast of Green Pastures, died, a big daily paper published an arresting caption under his front-page photo. Words that stopped the reader were: "De Lawd" is Dead!

Yes, Richard Henry Harrison is dead, but the Lord God, Almighty is not dead. His Kingdom is not defeated. 'Tis true, times of great darkness are upon us. With atomic energy in the hands of sinful men and selfish politicians, we tremble as we contemplate the future of our world. Someone has said the atomic bomb will either scare hell into us or out of us,

Yet, we cannot afford to surrender the Gospel to a world's despair. The pulpit should take the crepe off the door of heaven. Jesus Christ still lives.

and is Lord of time and eternity; the same yesterday, today and forever. Not one promise He has made has been withdrawn or invalidated. The moral order of the Universe is unshakened. The ancient truth still holds, "Righteousness exalteth a nation; but sin is a reproach to any people." The power of Hell cannot destroy the Church of the Lord God. The ancient word still speaks to us all. Tried and tested in the fires of criticism, it has not been found wanting. Its sacred pages still glow with inspiration and instruction. We all rejoice in its light, and, entranced with its visions of the God of Israel, turn confidently to the future and cry with the psalmist:

"Lift up your heads, O ye gates
Yes, lift them up, ye everlasting doors;
And the King of glory will come in."

And then, as the question comes back:

"Who is this King of Glory?"

we triumphantly answer:

"Jehovah of Hosts He is the King of Glory."

Reverends H. A. Bailey, Conference Executive Secretary, and H. H. Nichols, Conference Youth Director, both rendered invaluable service. Our Institute was highly honored with the presence of Bishop Alexander P. Shaw. His address maintained every unique element of interest. It was opportune, practical, forceful, full of childlike simplicity, and most challenging. District Monthly Preachers Meetings consist of worship, business, study in book reviews, namely: "The Minister Teaches Religion," "The Message of Stewardship," and "The Stewardship Life." Discussions and inspirational addresses have become an oasis of intellectual October 1st to 3rd, 1946, the Seventh Annual and spiritual enrichment. District Conference, Metropolitan Methodist Church, Princess Anne, Md. The attendance, interest, and entertainment will be hard to excel. District Superintendents and other visitors were given a place on the program, and rendered excellent service. November 19th, 1946, District Board of Lay Activities-Layman's Annual District Meeting, Mt. Zion Methodist Church, Pocomoke City, Md. Program-"The Crusade for Christ in Christian Stewardship." Mrs. Sarah E. Church, District Lay Leader, presiding. Stewardship Message by Dr. J. B. F. Shaw, Area Secretary. His message was biblically instructive, inspirational, portraying man's relationship and responsibility to God his Creator. District motto being "The Cross of Christ Our Symbol of Conquest." January 14th to 30th, 1947 covering three nights in each week-The Fifth Annual Sub-District Christian Workers Leadership Training Schools. The Centers were (1) Adam's Methodist Church, Parksley, Va.; (2) Mt. Zion Methodist Church, Pocomoke City, Md.; (3) Salisbury-John Wesley Methodist Church, Salisbury, Md. We had two qualified deans, Reverends C. B. White and T. M. Booth. Teachers and officers 17, enrollment 273. Those teaching courses, Reverends T. M. Booth, R. C. Hughes, W. A. Dennis. Mistresses Inez Harewood, L. M. Purnell, Anna Maddox, Pcarl R. Spence, Mae A. Stewart, M. A. Elder, Miss Leah Gayle; Professors H. S. Wilson, Wm. H. Hayman and B. T. Hall. February 20th, 1947, The Sixth Annual District Missionary Institute, Mt. Zion Methodist Church, Pocomoke City, Md. Our District Missionary Secretary, Rev. W. A. Harewood was active in all of its deliberations. Reverends W. H. Mears and I. R. Elzey brought inspirational addresses for which we felt profoundly grateful. Our guest speaker. Reverend August H. Klebsattel, Missionary to Africa. He also assisted the District Superintendent with the consecration service. March 19th. 1947. District Methodist Youth Speaking Contest, Princess Anne College. speaker, Dr. J. F. B. Shaw, Area Secretary. Number competing 16. Winners, Misses Anna Pettit, Agnes Barkley; Alternates Mr. Charles White and Miss Thelma Bivens. District director, Mrs. Emma Ore, a public school teacher who rendered sacrificial service. Judges, Professors Charles C. Jacobs, H. S. Wilson and Miss Alma V. Parker.

March 26th, The Seventh Annual District Efficiency Conference, Union Asbury Methodist Church, Crisfield, Md. Host, M. C. Anderson, pastor. Conference Theme—"Stewardship—Jesus' Philosophy of Life." The keynote address—Rev. J. W. Hayman, who set the spiritual tempo for the day. District Superintendents were present and took active parts in the program. Reports from charges revealed progress along all lines far in excess of last year. The evening program was climaxed by a literary and musical program by the District Minister's Wives Association. They also held annual roll call.

The District Woman's Society of Christian Service is most active, holding regular quarterly meetings with most gratifying results. Such meetings become dynamos and sources of power in generating and stimulating new spiritual enthusiasm by sharing, and disseminating information, and disposing up-to-date periodicals. The local societies are doing a better work as a result of such meetings. Mrs. O. M. Hughes is the president.

CHARGE READJUSTMENTS. Since the Rev. Edward H. Holden failed to accept Exmore Mission, the work has been studied by the Keller pastor. Stockton circuit has been supplied by Rev. H. W. Spencer, Rev. Amos Wilson failed to accept. August 11th, 1946, Rev. S. E. Parker took over Deals Island, which was made vacant by Rev. F. E. Waters.

STEWARDSHIP IN THE CRUSADE FOR CHRIST. "Stewardship Cultivation" is meeting with most gratifying results. Many of the charges have organized entire Memberships into Stewardship Classes. Official Boards, Church Schools, Woman's Societies of Christian Service, Methodist Men, Youth, and Young Adult Fellowships are devoting much time to the study of Stewardship. District Training Schools, and Sub-District Training Schools have been great assets in promoting stewardship in the local church. We have used the Kodachrome Stewardship Lecture and slides—"World Catastrophe or World Christianity—Which." And the "Methodist Church Schools Crusade for Christ" has been used in the District by our Missionary Secretary and District Machine.

DISTRICT PARSONAGE IMPROVEMENTS. The District Board of Trustees had the Eastern Shore Construction Company to shingle the roof and sides of the district parsonage at a cost of \$1,027. The same has been paid in full.

Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, D.D., LL.D., resident Bishop of the Baltimore Area and Members and Friends of the Conference:

There is a feeling of joy mingled with sadness in the rendering of this my Sixth and last report to you as a worker and servant in this office, so graciously given six years ago. I am very grateful to our Heavenly Father, to our Bishop, to the ministry and laity of the district and to the members and friends of the Annual Conference for an opportunity to serve without any serious handicap of any kind or nature. We are reporting for thirty-three pastoral charges and forty-three churches, which are for the most part fully organized with the usual machinery and equipment of the Methodist Church of this day and time.

Our greatest aims and purposes have been and are to follow the general and noble leadership of our resident Bishop as he passed on to us, his interpretations of the principles, the policies and wishes of our great church under God. The ministers and laity of the Wilmington District would have me say that words are inadequate to express our gratitude for a Bishop with an understanding heart and with a sympathetic attitude in administering the affairs in his official position.

Sick and Bereaved

Sickness—Rev. B. A. Arnold, who has been in the hospital at least twice is the only one in our ministerial family whose illness retarded the usual onward march of the charges. There have been slight attacks of severe colds among us but were of short duration, and were of not serious handicap to our church activities.

Deaths—Rev. F. O. T. Laws; J. R. Waters. The sister of Mrs. J. I. Peaco; Mrs. B. B. Carson and the uncle of Rev. O. W. Jones. Proper mention may be made of them at the proper time and place.

Special Mention of the Efficiency Conference

This meeting was held March 27, 1947, at Salem, N. J., I. R. Elzey, pastor. The day was full to overflowing of most interesting and attractive features. We emphasized efficiency for service among the ministers and the

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laity, cultural features in the local churches, and the lifting of standards in our church reports. A grand banquet and testimonial was tendered the Superintendent and his wife for the most excellent services rendered for six years on the District. Aside from the high class musical and literary program rendered by the ministers of the district and the Ministers of the Conference and the Ministers Wives Association, the District Superintendent and his wife were presented with a purse of considerable sum of money by the laymen of the district and the Ministers Wives Association.

On the same night the National Methodist Youth Speaking Contest was conducted by Rev. W. R. Hazzard.

Crusade for Christ

The District is divided into sub-district groups with the following Chairmen: Chester, N. W. Moore, Jr.; Wilmington, O. W. Jones; Middletown, J. I. Peaco; Salem, I. R. Elzey; Merchantville, B. B. Carson; Camden, C. B. Miles; Seashore, W. J. Helm. These groups with their chairmen render very helpful services in executing any program that may be suggested.

Board of Lay Activities Emphasizing Christian Stewardship assisted by the Board of Christian Education, and Board of Evangelism.

Christian Workers Schools were conducted in each one of our sub-district groups. According to the reports of pastors, 501 pupils have been added to the church schools this year. This record does not include Easter gatherings. Only one charge failed to have an increase during the year. The Rev. H. A. Bailey was the General Director.

The charges continued to carry on according to suggestions offered by the General Board of Evangelism. Some inactive members were restored to various rolls of the active membership. The pastors report that a total of 428 full members were added to the district up until the Easter Season. Stewardship cultivation and organizations were given special attention throughout every sub-district group. Competent leaders conducted coaching conferences for the purposes of assisting the charges in getting properly started off with the Stewardship Campaign.

Reports According to Charges

ATLANTIC CITY—ASBURY, N. J., W. J. Helm, pastor. This charge has enjoyed another year of prosperity. Several physical improvements have been made to their church property such as the shingling of the outside of the parsonage and some painting and papering on the inside. The church auditorium has been painted and decorated beautifully. The church pipe organ has been reconditioned. It will cost the church around \$6,000 to do so. The Conference apportionments and askings are being reported in full. The church membership totals 646. Forty full members were received during this Conference Year. The church school enrollment is 290. Forty pupils joined the school this year.

ATLANTIC CITY—HAMILTON MEMORIAL, W. R. Hazzard, pastor. This charge is developing some phases of a Community Center project which deserves some encouragement. The church location is well fitted for such a

venture if properly organized and properly financed. All benevolence, apportionments and Conference askings are reported in full. The pastor has received 8 full members into the church this year which increases the membership to 161. The church school has an enrollment of 101 pupils; 10 of these have joined this year.

BRIDGETON—M. L. McKenney, pastor. This is the pastor's first year on this charge. There was just a little nervous tension and unpleasant apprehension while the wheels of the machinery were being properly adjusted in correct grooves. Matters finally got off to a good start and continued to a successful closing of the Conference Year. The pastor has received 4 full members into the church, giving the church a membership of 114. The church school received 4 new pupils which gives them 114 pupils in the church school. All of the Conference apportionments and Conference askings are reported in full.

BUTTONWOOD and CHRISTIANA—J. H. Russum, pastor. This charge goes to the head of the class in her building program. She started after some of the others had begun but has run around and is now out in front. The building lot for the new church at Buttonwood, Delaware was purchased last year with the hope of erecting the new church during this Conference year. This program has been adhered to and carried out. Rev. Russum and his congregation at Buttonwood deserve much credit and commendation for their foresight in this effort and the heroic and yeoman services rendered to accomplish this task. The building is about complete and ready for a great opening service. The regular current expenses and other activities of the charge have gone on in such a way to enable the charge to make a full report in Benevolence and Conference askings. This charge has a church membership of 72. Three of these were added this year and the Church school enrollment is 49—five of these were added this year.

They carried a church building budget of around \$6,000—\$1,000 of that was a donation by the Board of Home Missions and Church Extension; \$500 from the Conference Promotional Fund. Some of us feel that the toes of Rev. Russum are turned up the mountain and he needs before it is too late a little backing-of some kind.

CAMDEN—FERRY AVENUE, C. B. Miles, pastor. This charge has met a long felt need by installing a new heating plant in their church building. The church property is undergoing a somewhat extensive program of improvement, such as painting, putting in new equipment for the church school and some needed repairs at the parsonage. Ferry Avenue Church has been recommended for a donation of \$350 from the Conference Promotional Fund as a challenge for greater service. The charge has a membership of 174 members, 10 of whom were received during the year. The church school has an enrollment of 134 pupils, 30 of these joined during the Conference year.

Benevolence and Conference askings have received special attention.

CAPE MAY and SWAINTON—J. L. Taylor, pastor. The present administration started off with the avowed purpose and determination to complete the repairs and improvements so well begun by his predecessor. The auditorium of the Church at Cape May has been painted both inside and outside.

New heaters are to be installed in the church as soon as they are available from the factories. Plans are being made to do needed repairs to the parsonage. When the proposed program of improvements is completed by these good people and the plans are carried out at Swainton Church this charge will have the finest, the best appointed and the most beautiful frame building on the Wilmington District. Be it known to all that Rev. J. L. Taylor is yet a strong character and looks forward to a brilliant future. The pastor reports 80 members of his church—one member was received this year. The church school had an increase of 7 pupils. This increase gives the charge 27 pupils in the church school.

CHESTER-GRACE, Benjamin Arnold, pastor. This charge has a building program which was in the making during the closing days of the last Conference Year. The people had a splendid start with a subscription list of more than \$7,000. Many of these pledges were secured through the help of Rev. J. T. Fletcher who came back into the employ of the Board of Home Missions for a few weeks to help in that matter. Many circumstances and elements have figured in to retard the collection of those pledges, and the securing of others; such as the sudden closing of the war, the illness of the pastor who can give but part time work or service to his pastoral duties. However, some progress is being made toward the building of a new church edifice, such as breaking the ground on the new lot, and grand rallies and the collection of some pledges. Pastor Arnold has expressed a desire to return in order to build the new church. The church membership has been increased by 22 members and the church school by 22 pupils this Conference Year. The membership is 139 and the church enrollment is 72. All asking is full.

CHESTER—ST. DANIELS, N. W. Moore, Jr., pastor. This charge maintains her respected and expected high standard in church activities. She belongs to that class of churches, that will not accept a low standard of doing things for God, for the people and for her own self pride.

Some worthwhile physical improvements have been made around the church, such as, the installation of new pews in the auditorium and new chairs and pews in the church school department. A social worker is employed by the charge to assist the pastor in maintaining the time honored, well organized units of church activities and at the same time add more and a greater efficiency to the powers already in their grasp.

All apportionments and Conference askings are reported in full. The charge reports 20 members added to the church and 30 pupils added to the Church School. The Church membership is 725. The Church School enrollment is 264. St. Daniels was honored by Gammon Theological Seminary, by the selection of their pastor as one of the Seminary preachers last year.

CHESTER—SILOAM, W. G. Matthews, pastor. This charge moves with the even tenor of her way. The people are satisfied to listen at the very earnest gospel messages of their pastor and they do cooperate with him in whatever program he may present to them. This splendid charge is reporting askings and benevolence apportionments in full. Brother W. G. Matthews is among his brothers, who has no desire to break up the plan of salvation to become District Superintendent or to receive a mere promotion. This honored pastor is our preacher of the Missionary sermon at this session of the

Conference. Siloam Church has a present membership of 211—and 17 of these were added this year. They have a church school of 80 pupils—2 of

these were added this year.

DARBY—ST. MATTHEWS, William C. Strother, pastor. The pastor of this charge is accepting a G. I. Scholarship and at the same time doing a splendid work as a pastor. This charge enjoys an increase of 9 members this year. The total membership is 48. The Church School had an increase of 11 pupils which gives them an enrollment of 44 pupils. All the benevolence and Conference askings are reported in full. This has been done while the pastor and people were laying plans for the future development of our church in that Community. The church has a building fund of around \$1,000 now on hand.

DELAIR, S. L. Jones, pastor. This pastor started the beginning of the Conference Year with a heavy responsibility on each shoulder. The charge of Delair and the charge at Eighth Street, Camden. It was thought best to relieve him of one of these responsibilities that he might have an eye single to one glory. The work at Delair has gone on as was expected. They are reporting 100% in all askings. The church building has undergone some very essential repairs and the work has been paid for. This Church has enjoyed an addition of six members this year which gives them a total of 126 church members. The Church School has added 7 pupils to the roll. The enrollment now is 110 pupils. Our church in Delair has had some of our best pastors. The Conference seems to spare no pains in giving them our best. They could not wish for any better than they have now. Rev. and Mrs. Jones are expecting a new member to join the church soon, which will increase their efficiency.

DELAWARE CITY, C. E. Kincade, pastor. This is the pastor's first year there. The parsonage is occupied by the minister alone. Brother Kincade says that he may surprise us all some day. We are waiting. The charge reports all askings in full. The pastor has received 11 members into the church—total membership 86. Church school added 3—total enrollment 52 pupils. Rev. Kincade is systematic and painstaking in his work and successful in getting things accomplished.

ELKTON, A. A. McKenzie, pastor. This charge has done good work and reports all apportionments and askings in full.

FORDSVILLE, J. H. Blackston, pastor. This has been another great year for this charge. Within the last 21 years this charge has made marked advancement. They worship in a beautiful auditorium, they have a parish house for entertainments, a nice parsonage just equipped with modern improvements. The voice of the people is that because of the large number of youth and young adults (ages 16-35) they need and want a pastor to live on the grounds and give special attention to that situation. Added to church this year 6—total members 233. Added to Church school 15—total number of pupils 249. All apportionments and askings in full. Salary \$1,500.

GRENLOCH and RHODES, I. H. Thompson, pastor. This is yet a semirural charge with three churches. The people are courageous and determined to measure up to all askings. They report all apportionments in full. Fullmembers added to church 7—the, total number of members—77. Church school pupils added—6—total number of Church school members—57. LAWNSIDE, W. A. T. Miles, pastor. This charge lifted their ideals like magic at the coming of the new pastor. One objective of the pastor and people was to install a pipe organ. Much strength of every kind was directed, and used most of the Conference Year toward that end. Collected \$1,450 for an organ fund. Number of members added to the church were 12—total membership of the church, 162. Added to the Church School were 38, making the total 228.

MERCHANTVILLE, B. B. Carson, pastor. This charge has been carrying for a long time a mortgage with the Board of Missions and Church Extension. The debt remains around \$5,000. It was fondly hoped and expected that during this Conference Year, that most of the standing mortgage would be liquidated but the passing of the pastor's wife and other extenuating circumstances caused them to fall short of their goal in that regard as well as some other things, that were on the agenda for this year. Brother Carson deserves the sympathy and prayers of his brothers and sisters. Number of members added were 14—total membership 155. Number pupils added to the Church school were 25—total number in school 130.

MIDDLETOWN, J. I. Peaco, pastor. This charge has done a very successful year's work under the leadership of this safe spiritual guide. Requests and askings met in full. Added to the church membership were, 8—total number, 61. Those added to the Church School—9, making a total of 54.

MOUNT HOLLY and BURLINGTON, L. E. Jordan, pastor. This charge received this pastor gladly and seemed to enjoy his well seasoned pastoral services during the year. This pastor is known among us as a metropolitan preacher and has a future. He reports all askings in full.

NEW CASTLE, H. T. Johnson, pastor. The New Castle people have been wonderfully blessed through the wonderful services of their noble pastor. He is reporting at this Conference another 100% in every item of askings and apportionments. Aside from that the parsonage has been thoroughly renovated. New stairway, house painted and papered inside and modern improvements. The Church building now has modern facilities. The basement kitchen and dining room with tables and chairs newly placed. Much of the work was done by the members of the church. Members added to the church—2—total membership is 102. Pupils added to the Church School—10—making a total of 75 pupils.

NEWPORT, N. B. Higgins, pastor. This was the pastor's first year at this charge. He was sent not knowing where he was journeying. Most of the time he has walked by faith and not by sight. This charge has by no means made a failure in her efforts and deserves credit for what has been accomplished. All apportionments in full reported. Members added to the church—6—making a total of 95 members. Pupils added to the Church School—making a total of pupils enrolled 80.

OCEAN CITY, E. A. Maddox, pastor. This charge kept her place this year in being the first on the District to pay the full amount of World Service and Conference Benevolence. Ocean City has a beautiful church auditorium

and is contemplating the making of it more beautiful and attractive for summer visitors. The church has 31 members—three of those joined this year. The Church School has 15 pupils.

ODESSA and PORT PENN, W. R. Price, pastor. This charge has made a step forward this year. Among many things the parsonage has been shingled on the outside. The pastor received 9 members into the church school. All benevolence and askings in full.

PLEASANTVILLE, J. W. Jefferson, pastor. This charge is beginning an extensive program of repairs and renovations which will make the church building more comfortable as well as more beautiful. The church has paid \$1,500 on church improvements so far. Members received—8—making a total of church members—87. Added to an enrollment of 64 in the Church School were 30 pupils.

PORT NORRIS, J. E. Bishop, pastor. Port Norris members have bought, paid for another lot on a higher level to erect a new church building. These good people have done a most remarkable achievement in collecting money for building purposes. The Church is all set for building a new commodious, well appointed, modern, but practical edifice for this worthy people in South Port Norris and vicinity. Aside from the splendid building and money raising program, they are reporting, all appointments and askings in full. Nine persons joined Church School, making a total of 84, and a total of church members, 79.

QUINTON and SPRINGTOWN, W. H. Johns, pastor. This charge has enjoyed another very good year of Christian Service and fifteen memberships have been added to the Church and 16 to the Church School. Total church members—122 and total Church School pupils—78.

SALEM, I. R. Elzey, pastor. This charge is yet carrying on in a splendid fashion. The new pipe organ purchased less than three years is now paid for. Plans are being made for new church pews and a pulpit set. There is much need for the completion of the basement of the building and the installation of modern toilet system. The people have increased the estimate of the pastor's salary from \$2,080 to \$2,600. This church has a membership of 182 and a church school of 123 pupils. These figures include 15 members added this year and 12 pupils joined the school this year. All Conference apportionments and askings are reported in full.

EZION—WILMINGTON, O. W. Jones, pastor. All benevolences and askings reported in full. The pastor has received 43 full members this year and has now a membership of 908. Twenty pupils have joined the Church School this year, which gives a total of 468 pupils in the Church School. The improvement program has continued through the year. A new seating plan is arranged in the church school room and a new floor covering. The workmen are busy on the lower basement, plastering and painting the walls and woodwork. There is a new metal ceiling, new wiring and a rest room on the lower level. They are planning for new seats, new stairway to the new toilet for men. The people are paying as they go. The church is new from upper ceiling to lower basement.

HAVEN—WILMINGTON, J. A. Fassett, pastor. There is a new spirit and new life and a regular buzz of religious activities around that church from Sunday to Sunday. The new pipe organ installed and the complete renovation and painting done last year are now all paid for. The people owe no man. The pastor comes to the Conference fully cared for. Haven has received 18 members into the church which gives them a total of 127. Added to the church school is 16 pupils, making a total of 82 pupils in the school. The officials of Haven called us late one night last week to inquire whether there was any truth in news that they were losing their pastor this year. They were ready for fervent prayer.

MT. JOY, WILMINGTON, C. E. Geddis, pastor. This charge is reporting 100% in all askings and apportionments. They have painted the inside of the church auditorium and put down a beautiful new carpet to correspond with the new pulpit set installed.

Eleven members were added to the church which gives them a present membership of 247. 36 pupils joined the church school which gives us an enrollment of 158 pupils. Rev. Geddis is expecting a new member any day or night.

MT. CARMEL, WILMINGTON, O'Connell Milbourne, pastor. All benevolences and conference askings are paid in full. More than \$3,000 paid on the principal of the mortgage this year. \$1,000 of that amount was donated by the Conference Promotional Fund. The balance due on the mortgage is less than \$3,000. This very valuable church was purchased with an up-to-date parsonage and garage less than 4 years ago at a cost of \$18,500 and will be ready for dedication during the conference year next, free of debt. At a special rally in March, the resident Bishop was there and preached to a capacity crowd. 60 members added to church this year. Total membership 301; 34 pupils added to church school. Church school total 145. Mt. Carmel has new well equipped restrooms and heating plant.

WOODBURY and JERICHO, S. G. Fullman, pastor. This charge has made this year another excellent record in clearing up old debts and vitalizing and harmonizing some opposing forces among the people. All claims and askings are reported in full. 6 members are added to the church—total membership 84. Two pupils joined church school—total membership church school—42.

CAMDEN—8th STREET, W. A. Hubbard, pastor. This is a new project purchased from a Methodist Congregation of the New Jersey Conference. The building is well located among the colored people. This new project was officially born in some spectacular and beautiful services on the 1st Sunday in May, 1946. We began this service without a member nor a pupil in the church school. On that day 8 members joined the church and a few pupils promised to form a church school class at some time. The opening day was a great day for Camden Methodism among the colored people of Camden. Visitors were there in large numbers from Delaware, Pennsylvania, and New Jersey. Dr. J. B. F. Shaw, Executive Secretary of Baltimore Area preached the opening sermon. The charge now has 32 full members and 35 pupils in the church school.

CONCLUSION. It has been our honest endeavor to do teamwork together in the general program of the church. The Stewardship Program, the Program of Evangelism, the plans and program of Christian Education and a general church building program have received our personal attention and services.

The following charges are in the process of building new sanctuaries at this time: Grace at Chester, Port Norris, N. J. and Buttonwood, Del., which is about complete. St. Matthews at Darby plans to start building next year. Some of these projects are being encouraged or aided by the Board of Missions and Church Extension. Aside from these projects a parsonage is being secured for the new 8th Street Church in Camden, New Jersey.

During these six short years, some charges have been added to the Conference, some members to our churches, some improvements made, some debts paid, some youth guided and helped, and much to my joy, some pastors and their families have received our best efforts to improve their conditions and to give them a better chance and a larger outlook on life. My faithful wife has stood with me almost to the breaking point, in her efforts to serve the people of the Conference. Her efforts were especially devoted to the needs of the Conference Claimants Funds. We come to the end with no remorse of conscience and with no serious regret for having neglected our duties in any way as we saw them.

To my successor, we pledge our whole hearted support as a friend and a brother beloved. Again, I thank one and all.

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Report of the Executive Secretary

After another year of service, it becomes my high privilege to make the fourth annual report of our work.

In this new age which has so suddenly come upon us through the recent discoveries of science, there has come a sense of urgency in the Christian cause. The potential forces of destruction which create an accompanying feeling of insecurity, have made teaching the way of Christ an imperative. Some one has expressed it thus, "Teach Christ or Perish." It is with this sense of compulsion that we have sought, this year particularly, to have our Church Schools and churches enter actively the teaching ministry as never before.

At the annual meeting held at Morgan Christian Center in May, 1946, we faced frankly our task of promoting the cause of Christian education in the Conference. After a careful consideration of the many phases of our work, the standing committees made many recommendations. These were taken under further consideration and made the basis of our program for the year. Those of us who constitute the Conference and District staffs have accepted this program and have faithfully endeavored to execute it.

I, as your executive officer, feel a sense of responsibility for the total program, but the task is not mine alone. Without the ceaseless labors of the members of the Conference and District staffs, district superintendents, pastors and lay workers, this report could not be made. In fact, I shall make only a partial report. It will be supplemented by reports from the Conference directors of the age group divisions.

WORK OF THE AGE GROUP DIVISIONS. Our children's workers have been led effectively under the direction of Mrs. Caddie Ridout, our Conference director. Through the promotion of training enterprises, for Vacation Church School teachers, visitation, and teaching in the Christian workers schools, she has done much to help this phase of work. We will leave for her report the achievements of her work and that of her District directors. May I add, however, that through our special fund of \$500.00 for Vacation Church School grants, we assisted 47 churches in conducting their vacation schools last year.

With a conviction that youth must be taught and won to Christian way of life, Rev. Henry Nichols has led the youth for another year. Under his leadership the total youth program has been carefully re-thought in terms of its effectiveness and in terms of what is happening or is not happening in the lives of our young people.

It has been his privilege to be associated with the foremost leaders of Methodist youth during the past year. He brings to his task many of the results of these contacts, as his report will doubtless show. With vigor and insight he leads our youth onward.

We are happy to report that out of sixteen Methodist delegates to a world-wide meeting of Christian youth to be held at Oslo, Norway, next summer, one is from our Conference. She is Miss Mildred Johns, of Janes Church, Germantown. Miss Johns is now a student at the College for

Christian Workers, Kansas City, Missouri. Miss Dorothy Levy of John Wesley Church, Philadelphia, a student at Morgan State College, has been selected as an alternate to the Oslo Conference. This report has come from the selection committee of the General Board of Education. We are greatly encouraged to know that two of our young people have been so honored.

Our adults stand in need of the teaching ministry. Rev. R. C. Hughes has led this field for another year. Several visits to local churches have convinced me that the work of our Adult Division is becoming more and more a vital part of our local church program. This is especially true of the Young Adult Fellowship. We will leave to the director's report the details of this work.

THE CRUSADE FOR CHRIST: Increasing Enrollment and Attendance in the Church School. No one has worked harder in this phase of the Crusade for Christ than have our district superintendents. Since they encouraged them and their local boards of education to set their goals, more than a year ago, they have given every support to the churches in helping them reach their goals.

From time to time we have published the results of these efforts in the "INFORMER," the most recent report appearing in the issue for January. At the Annual Conference in 1946 we had made a total gain for the Conference of 1984. However, the report as of October 15, 1946 was as follows: 265 Church Schools reporting a total increase of 3756.

Stewardship: Along with our continued effort to increase the size of our Church Schools we are seeking through the ministry of teaching to have persons become Christian stewards. It is our conviction that Stewardship, as an emphasis in our church program cannot become what it should apart from an intensified period of teaching.

One of the most profitable enterprises of our Board during the year was the Stewardship Coaching Conference, which was sponsored jointly by the Board of Lay Activities, the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Board of Education. This conference was held in Mt. Carmel Church. Wilmington, Delaware, November 1-2. Thirty prospective instructors were invited from all parts of the Conference, representing the three sponsoring agencies. With very few exceptions these persons have qualified through the General Board of Education as teachers of the course "The Stewardship of Life." They are teaching in sub-District and local Church Schools.

We are deeply grateful to Mr. H. P. Johns, Conference Lay Leader; Mrs. L. B. Jewett, Conference President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. A. P. Camphor, Conference Secretary of Missionary Education of the W. S. C. S., and Dr. D. W. Henry, member of the General Board of Lay Activities, for the contributions which they made to the success of this project.

In all of our sub-District Christian workers' schools which were held, there were 42 classes in Stewardship taught. These were all accredited classes. This does not take into account the many local church classes, some of which were accredited and some were on a noncredit basis.

We have urged the Church Schools to make full use of the Stewardship material appearing in the regular church school literature. Stewardship is also being emphasized in all age group activities. LEADERSHIP EDUCATION: We feel that trained leadership will go far in realizing the goals of Christian Education. We, therefore consider our efforts in this field of major importance. In seeking to improve our leadership, we have sponsored or participated in the following: nine Vacation Church School Coaching Conferences, one Stewardship Coaching Conference, five District Church School Institutes, one Conference M. Y. F. Institute. There were held during the months of January, February, and March, 17 sub-District Church Workers Schools, conducted by 15 deans and having the services of 77 teachers, all of whom are accredited from the General Board of Education in Nashville, Tennessee.

The following persons attended the Jurisdictional Leadership School held at Morristown Junior College, Morristown, Tenn., July 2-9, 1946; Revs. D. H. Hargis, O. H. Spence, C. D. Gerald, C. E. Kiah, Alexander Reid and Howard A. Bailey; Mesdames Maude Clark, Nora Bailey, Irene Thomas and Ruby McMurry.

CHRISTIAN VOCATION: We have long since recognized the need for recruiting youth in the ranks of Christian Vocations. We are happy to report that at the summer Institute, many young people expressed a desire to enter into some form of full-time Christian service. We are encouraged by the increasing number of our young people who express a desire to give themselves to religious work. An inter-board committee of our Conference has been organized and is working in this field. It is our hope that this committee will soon produce some practical plan by which we may recruit our youth for Christian life service.

LOAN LIBRARY: Feeling the need to help our workers to better prepare themselves for their task, we instituted a loan library this year. Although the collection of books is limited, we have been able to serve a large number of our instructors in our Christian Workers Schools.

THE INFORMER: We have completed one year of service through the publication of the Informer. Each month we send out something over 500 copies. Through this bulletin we have tried to be of larger service to our workers. The response that has come from the churches has convinced us that our efforts in this direction are not in vain.

OPPORTUNITIES FOR SERVICE: I am very grateful for the opportunities for service which the General Church, the district superintendents and pastors have given me during the year. I shall mention only a few here for want of space: I spoke in five District Church School Institutes, five District Conferences; participated in various District and sub-District meetings; served as guest speaker in Sunday worship services in 30 churches; paid many visits to Church Schools and worker's meetings; served as instructor in the Jurisdictional Training School at Morristown, Tenn.; taught in Philadelphia Conference at the Camp Innabah Retreat, and at the New Jersey Conference Youth Institute held at Pannington, N. J., and was also instructor at our Methodist Youth Fellowship Institute at State College, Dover, Delaware. I was a delegate to two national meetings and one regional meeting.

In the summary may I state, that this year we have sought to serve and promote all interests in our local churches as follows: Church School enrollment and attendance, Evangelism, Stewardship, Education in Alcohol problems, Race Relations Sunday, Rally Day, Methodist Student Day, Student Recognition Day, Leadership Education, Cooperation with Colleges, Parent Education and Family Relations, Audio Visual Aids, Church School Literature and general publicity.

Under the Children's Division: Vacation Church Schools, Children's Workers Conferences, Week Day Religious Education and Special Missionary Emphasis.

Under the Youth Division: District and Sub-District Fellowships, Methodist Youth Fund, Volunteer Service and Conference Institute; with a growing activity of fellowship work in the local churches.

Under the Adult Division: Conference Young Adult meetings, District. Young Adult Fellowships; and a host of new Fellowships being organized in the churches.

In my course of work it has been necessary to travel thousands of miles by auto and train, both within and without the Conference. God has granted me health and every labor has been a joy. The joy of service has been heightened by the joy of fellowship with the many others with whom it was my privilege to work. I am ever mindful of the support of the bishop, district superintendents, pastors, and the host of lay workers, with whom to work has been a most enriching experience.

With gratitude for the past achievements and with high hopes for the future, we move onward with Him who has called us to be co-workers with Him.

The results are gratifying to the commission and to the director.

STATE OF THE CHURCH

The Church is the witness for Christ in the world. It is a living-organism infused with the love and spirit of Christ. It represents Christ. The world needs the church today as much as ever, for men have gradually discovered that the solution of our problems does not lie in things. The industrialist has no solution. The statesman has no solution. The scientist has no solution. The very best they can do is to provide mechanisms, materialistic solutions. They are unable to meet the deep spiritual needs of men. Only the Church of Jesus Christ can do this. It alone is able to utter the everlasting judgment of God, sound the great imperative, and speak with the commanding note of spiritual authority.

The divine imperative for the Church is simply stated. The church must witness for Christ in the world. This is its primary function in society. The church has something to say, something which God has given it to say to the world—to politicians, to business men, to laboring people, to scientists—the church must tell them that: In Jesus Christ, the Risen Redeemer, man is able to know the power of the new life, he is able to triumph over the world of sin and the forces of corruption in this broken universe and bring in a new world social order. The church is teaching and preaching today as never before that Jesus Christ actually can save human lives and restore them to God. It teaches that the gospel of Jesus

Christ has the power to make drunkards sober saints; it can make the thief an honest Christian; it can make the rebel obedient; it can bring home the prodigal son; it can rehabilitate broken homes; it can strengthen weak wills; it can destroy the hateful spirit; bring together alienated lives, and lead men into that new order of living where all men are brothers.

The church is confronted with a stupendous task. The unexampled testing time through which the world has been passing—an experience which has tried by fire all nations, all human institutions, all cultures, has served by a process of exclusion and elimination to withdraw the gaze of confidence from one after another of the pillars of our civilization, and of the supports of the spirits of men, save one, the Lord Jesus Christ. Nothing has transpired in these recent years to invalidate a single claim made by Him. He stands forth today, never so unique, never so necessary, never more sufficient, the fountain-head of spiritual vitality and the generating source of the most significant changes in the lives of men and nations.

Another tragic situation that challenges the church is the matter of giving for the support of its program. Many of us marvel at the fact that we are raising large sums of money in churches—but listen to this fact: In the same year that eight billion dollars was spent in this country for alcoholic beverages, the church received less than one billion dollars, nearly one eighth as much. Three and one half times as much was spent for tobacco as the church and other institutions of charity and relief received. During the year of stewardship, let's pray for a rebirth of sacrificial giving. Then we may sing earnestly and lustily, "Take My Silver and my Gold, Not a Mite would I Withhold."

The church needs men who will preach. It needs men who will preach the gospel of Christ without fear or favor—men who will declare the unsearchable riches of Christ in season and out of season—men who will stir up the glft of God that is in them—men who will be courageous—men who are dynamic—men who will live joyously until like the Christian of the first century, we turn the world upside down and rightside up, and men who will preach the righteousness of God until sinners and hypocrites repent and plead for mercy and become transformed persons in Jesus Christ. The church needs men who will declare the eternal truth of the gospel in speech, in living and in deed.

The world looks to the church for a standard of righteousness. The church of Christ has the standard, but before the world will accept our standard it says, "physician heal thyself." In other words the world says to the church, "if you preach unity to us, there must be unity in the church; if you preach forgiveness to us there must be forgiveness in the church; if you preach love to us, there must be love in the church; if you preach clean, righteous, and Christian politics to us, there must be clean, righteous and Christian politics in the church."

God grant that our prayer for the church will be that the church will be baptised anew and afresh in the spirit and love of the immaculate Christ, and that upon her lips will be the ancient gospel of her Lord. Grant that she may be filled with the prophet's scorn of tyranny, and with a Christlike tenderness for the heavy laden and downtrodden; that the church may be

valiant to give up her life to humanity; that like her crucified and risen Lord, may mount up the path of the cross to high and higher glory and achievement.

STATE OF THE COUNTRY

Today, as we meet in the eighty-fifth session of the Delaware Annual Conference, we should pause and give consideration to the state of things about us, the dominant trends, and the peculiar beating of the pulse that is America. It is now two years since the countries of the world laid down their arms in a victorious triumph for democracy. In these two years we have tried to readjust ourselves to a state similar to that which existed prior to 1940, only to find that peculiar state all too elusive. We are confronted by problems of war, both social and economic. We are living in a new age.

Socially the white man has found it expedient to recognize the Negro as an individual of marked ability and limitless capabilities. The war years afforded the Negro an opportunity to display latent talents in many fields hitherto closed to him. The Negro won a place for himself then, and is determined now to keep what he has gained at all costs. Was not Dr. Ira Reid appointed Professor of Sociology at Haverford College because in him was found a vast storehouse of material and a wealth of knowledge found in few other sociologists, colored or white? Were not twelve Negro surgeons recently appointed as Fellows in the American College of Surgery, an honor dreamed of by every surgeon in the land, but hitherto denied to colored men? Dr. Brunch is leaving Howard University to take a full professorship at the University of Pennsylvania, a school which until recently discriminatingly accepted Negroes as merit students. We have hundreds of our young men and women attending the so-called finest colleges and universities in the country. Many businesses, formerly lily white, are gradually absorbing our more capable men and women. It is no longer the altruistic spirit that compels recognition of the colored man. It is the inability of the white man to forever keep his eyes closed to the vast wealth of material stored among us, waiting only to be tapped.

Economically, we are in a whirlwind. Employees, unwilling to forego the high wages of wartime are striking for increased wages. Reluctantly, the industrialists grant the increases but pass them on in the form of increased taxes to you and me. The prices of the most ordinary commodities have skyrocketed to previously unheard of levels, leaving the fixed income employee, in which category we find ourselves, with dollars, the purchasing power of which is no more than sixty percent of pre-war values. The President recently urged a voluntary reduction in prices under a veiled threat of recurrent modified control by the Government. Prices of clothing and some foodstuffs have dropped a little in the past few days. However, unless something is done to help, we of the fixed income group may soon find ourselves starving in a land of plenty.

And in the field of politics we are constantly warned of the menace of Communism. Is it not true that unemployment leads to unrest, and that the inability of the common man to acquire the things he considers the necessities of life soon leads him to desire a change in the peculiar system under which he finds himself? Our government officials will do well to take note. A contented man under any system is its firmest and staunchest supporter. We fought a war to save democracy in Europe and Asia. We can't lose the war on the home front.

We of the churches have felt a distinct change in the attitude of the people now that the war is over. Attendance in most cases has declined, and not too gradually. Is it that we seek the consolation of God only in time of stress? Can we afford to neglect the church—the very institution that was the foundation of our civilization? It is true that God is in his heaven, but all is not right with the world. If more faith were placed in the churches; if more of us would pattern our lives after the true Christians of old; if more of us would make a concerted and determined effort to become God's children, many of our worldly problems would be solved. The church marches on. We need more soldiers in that great army of the Lord.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

In these days of confusion, chaos and fear, the church is called upon to affirm its faith in the goodness and power of God, and to do His service of reconciliation. Our hope for the ordering of the world is in the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the way of life to which He calls us. In the complexities and difficulties of the political scene, the church of Christ has an indispensable word to speak; for it is the only community without boundaries of nation or race, culture or tradition. It is the bearer of a gospel of forgiveness, of understanding and brotherly love, of the equality of all men before God, on which alone a lasting peace can be established.

We, your committee, therefore make the following recommendations: First, we recommend that the Conference will elect a Committee on World Peace, auxiliary to the jurisdictional Committee and to the General Commission on World Peace to promote the work of World Peace within the boundaries of the Conference. The Committee shall elect its own officers. This committee shall cooperate and consult with other committees engaged in educational work within the Conference and shall report every year to the Annual Conference in such manner as the Conference may direct.

Second, we recommend that the Committee on World Peace reconsider its membership and either by the action of the Annual Conference or by invitation see that the membership includes each from the young people's work, the organized women's work, social relations and local church activities group, and the organized lay work. We believe it would be well to invite someone representing the missions interest to meet with the Committee on World Peace. We recommend a minimum of seven to nine members on the Committee on World Peace.

Thirdly, we recommend that some means be found to acquaint members of the Committee on World Peace before they leave the seat of the Annual Conference, and, if possible, a convener be appointed with authority to call the committee together.

We recommend further that the Committee on World Peace, at an early time in the Annual Conference session, request an order of the day for the

report of the Committee.

Finally, we recommend that the committee endeavor to provide a minimum program which might include: (An order of the Day at Annual Conference, (b) a report of activities and accomplishments, and recommendations for action by the Annual Conference, (c) a literature display with the use of posters, lantern slides, film strips or movies. The program should include each item, such as:

- Encourage District or sub District Conferences to face the functions of the church for peace in our Atomic Age.
- Provide a specialized leadership in pastors' schools, Youth Institutes, Leadership Schools and other assemblies.

TEMPERANCE REPORT

Methodist people everywhere are on the march in an Advance Movement against alcoholic liquors which are costing the American people more than \$7,000,000,000 annually to say nothing of the inestimable human cost in the mounting increase of juvenile delinquency, crime, gambling, prostitution and every other sort of evil and vice imaginable connected with the beverage alcohol traffic.

The time is ripe and we must strike now and strike hard.

Bishop Wilbur E. Hammaker, president of the Methodist Board of Temperance, said in his keynote address at the Chicago meeting launching the Temperance Cause and the Advance Movement, "The battle must be joined. The good people of this land, the church forces of America, can no longer hold back. An irrepressible conflict is at hand."

We therefore, beg to submit the following recommendations:

- 1. That we adopt in toto the Report of the Findings Committee of the January 1947 Chicago meeting of the Great Temperance Advance Movement of The Methodist Church. Copy of which is attached to this report, with such additions, emphasis and adjustments as to details necessary to meet our conference, district and local church needs.
- 2. That we as ministers, church leaders and members shall here recommit ourselves to the Temperance Cause and the Advance Movement.

(Dr. Roy Smith in the closing address at the Chicago Temperance meeting said, "We will never win alcohol outside of the church until we win it on the inside. Begin by working inside our own churches.")

- A. We recommit ourselves by our declaration to abstain from the use of all alcoholic beverages.
- B. We recommit ourselves to the promotion of Temperance education throughout the church on a Conference, district, sub-district and local church level during 1947 and 1948 by:

- (1) Courses in Temperance given in all departments of the church and in youth gatherings, adult assemblies, vacation church schools and in all leadership training schools and conferences of the district.
- (2) A one day Temperance Institute in each District, under the direction of the District Superintendent. (See Chicago Meeting Findings III 2. a.)
- (3) The observance of one Sunday each month as Temperance Sunday.
- (4) The observance of World Temperance Sunday at which time an offering shall be received for the Temperance Cause and forwarded to our Conference Treasurer designated The Methodist Board of Temperance.
- (5) Special emphasis shall be given to Temperance during the observance of Mother's Day and Father's Day. (Dr. Roy Smith said, "We are not going to win this war 'against liquor' until young mothers take the Temperance vow.")
- (6) Each church shall maintain a literature table or rack with ample supply of Temperance literature and information for free distribution.
- (7) The preaching of Temperance sermons by both minister and lay preachers with emphasis upon Total Abstinence. ("No Alcohol is the only solution.")
- 3. That the first Sunday in Lent 1948 shall be observed as Commitment Day on which the people called Methodists shall be called upon to sign Commitments to total abstinence. (See Chicago Meeting Findings IV 7.)
- 4. That as individual qualified voters we write personal letters to our respective senators and representatives in behalf of anti-liquor advertising legislation.
 - (a) That our senators be urged to give favorable consideration and support to Senator Capper's Bill (S-265), a Bill to prevent the interstate transmission of advertising of all alcoholic beverages and the broadcasting of such advertising by means of radio. (A hearing on this Bill will be held on or about May 12).
 - (b) That each pastor shall secure as many signatures of his members as possible to the petition recently received from The Methodist Board of Temperance urging Senators and Representatives give favorable consideration and support to S-265, and that the same shall be mailed to his senator, Senate Office Building, Washington 25, D. C. before May 12.
- 5. That a representative from each district appointed by the District Superintendent of the respective district be sent by the district to the Yale School of Alcoholic Studies during the sessions of 1947 and 1948.
 - (a) The person so appointed shall return to his district to give cooperation and assistance to superintendent, pastors and churches in forwarding and promoting the Temperance Cause and the Advance Movement.

(b) He shall serve as Dean of the one day Temperance Institute.

6. We request our resident bishop to proclaim a day of prayer throughout the churches of the Conference in which every minister and layman gathered in their various churches shall call upon Almighty God to strengthen

and empower us in this great task.

May I take this opportunity as chairman of our Conference Board of Temperance to express my personal appreciation to our Resident Bishop,—Bishop Alexander P. Shaw for selecting me to represent our Conference at the January 1947 Meeting of The Great Temperance Advance Movement of The Methodist Church held at the Stevens Hotel in Chicago, Ill.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

This has been an enriched year in the lives of many of our laymen. I have heard ministers and laymen say that working in this Stewardship movement has done something to them that they cannot explain. We have striven this year in our Crusade for Christ to make more real the teachings of Jesus in our every-day living. We have tried to put into action what we profess with our lips.

Last July, it was my pleasure and opportunity to sit in a great meeting of Christian leaders from all over the country. I heard lectures from bishops, outstanding ministers, and laymen on Christian Stewardship. These were the richest four days that I have ever spent in Kingdom building. Whites and blacks were discussing together Christian brotherhood. I thought to myself while sitting there in that meeting what a fine demonstration it would be if both races would go back to their communities and put into practice what we said there by words and action.

On my return from this meeting I contacted the executive secretary of the Conference Board of Education and talked over plans with him to develop our Stewardship program in our Conference. We met at his office with a representative from the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and there we formulated plans for a coaching conference, to develop workers for our Stewardship program to convene on November the first and second day in Mt. Carmel Church at Wilmington, Delaware. We had a successful conference, 28 representatives being present out of thirty.

After the meeting of the district superintendents in Grand Rapids, Michigan, each District was divided into sections and institutes were set up. It was my pleasure and privilege to serve and attend several of them.

I believe that these meetings have done much to deepen the spiritual lives of the laymen. They have had an opportunity to serve and be inspired to do greater work in the church.

All the Districts have held retreats, which have been very educational. We have sensed a closer working together of both ministers and laymen this year. Our churches cannot help from growing and becoming of greater service to our homes and communities. We have studied and discussed Christian Stewardship until it has become a reality in everyday living.

We had a fine opportunity and a pleasure to declare on Laymen's Day with fervent zeal that real conception and obligation of Christian Stewardship. I am sorry that all of our churches did not take advantage of this opportunity. I hope that every local church will look forward next year to observe this special day, when we will stress importance of a larger enrollment of our Church School.

Our great church cannot help from going forward under such a program as the Crusade for Christ. Are you a crusader for Christ? Are you doing your best in helping to put this program over?

We have had this year a closer contact with our bishop, district superintendents, ministers and laymen. It has been a pleasure to work with such a cooperative group.

District lay leaders have given time and money in travel all over their Districts. I have not words to thank them for their interest manifested. My prayer is that their interest will be increased.

It has been my pleasure and privilege to attend every District Conference and many other District meetings this year. I would like to urge at this point that every local lay leader and District officer will make the necessary sacrifice to attend every District Conference, if possible, in his or her District. These meetings are for your growth. The church cannot grow without your development. Our churches cannot be any stronger than our laymen.

One of our goals this year in the Conference was a men's group in every local church. We did not fully accomplish that goal. I am sorry that I am not able to tell you the number of Methodist Men's organizations to date, but we have had a large increase. The proper development of our men and boys in our local church greatly depends upon an active men's organization in the church. Let us continue until we reach this goal.

The secretary of the Lay Speakers Bureau, Mrs. Clarice Walker, wishes me to say that we can furnish a lay leader for any subject germane to our church program. Please use these speakers in order that we may have a better informed laity. We thank Mrs. Walker for her service rendered. May I also thank Miss Florence Wilson, Conference Secretary of Good Literature, for the following report. Miss Wilson reports that there are in the hands of the laymen ten hundred and ninety Disciplines to date. We subscribed last year for eleven hundred and twenty-nine Christian Advocates, five hundred and thirty Methodist Laymen and three thousand, nine hundred, and eighty-five Upper Rooms.

May I again thank the bishop for his brotherly spirit and the fine cooperation of district superintendents, the ministers and laymen to make this year a great success in our Conference.

The following are recommendations that I wish to make to the board this year:

- 1. All churches that have not organized their Stewardship Committee to do so as soon as possible. This will greatly help to develop the laity of your church.
 - 2. We recommend the continuance of the evangelistic effort next year.
- We recommend that all special days set apart by the General Board of Lay Activities be observed in the local church on the dates specified, if possible.
- 4. We recommend that a larger opportunity be given our lay speakers in the local church through special programs and any other way possible to aid their development.
- 5. We recommend that every local church that has not succeeded in organizing a men's group make this one of their goals for 1947 and secure a charter from the General Board as soon as they are organized.
- 6. We recommend that the official board of every local church urge and aid the local lay leader to attend all District Conferences and the Annual Lay Conference which convenes the last Saturday and Sunday in September.
- 7. We recommend that the Conference delegate give authority to the district superintendent and the Conference lay leader to fill vacancies occurring ad interim in office of District and Associate District Lay Leader.
- 8. We recommend that each member of the Conference Board of Lay Activities who is not a member of the Conference be entertained during the entire session of the Annual Conference.
- 9. We recommend that a commission be set up to draw plans whereby an unmarried pastor will receive not less than twelve hundred dollars annually and that a married pastor will receive not less than sixteen hundred annually. (Referred to Committee on World Service and Finance.)
- 10. We recommend that a strong temperance committee be set up in each local church and formulate a strong temperance program so that we might be able to curb the excess drinking among our people, especially our youth.
- 11. We recommend that a study be made in each local church of the origin of our denomination so that we will be able to talk intelligently about it.

SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

1946-1947

Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, Members and Friends of the Delaware Conference:

Your Commission on World Service and Finance rejoices with the Conference over the magnificent achievements made in the finances of the church this year. We are happy to report that our local churches continue to liquidate old debts, increase local budgets, establish reserve funds for current

expenses, and create funds for improvements and new church building enterprises.

Your Commission desires to express its sincere appreciation to those who have made this report possible; namely, Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, the five district superintendents, the many pastors, and our loyal laymen throughout the bounds of the Conference. All of these have been helpful and cooperative in the matters relating to the work of this commission.

While we rejoice in the successes of the present year, we must look ahead into the new Conference year and face its challenge. Our problem is that of winning the victory over a way beset with agencies of horrible destruction and appalling misery and suffering. The task ahead reveals the startling fact that our World Service and Conference Benevolence givings are fearfully inadequate.

Our records show that more than seven thousand of our members contribute nothing to the church. Many others give irregular support. It is necessary that we broaden the basis of giving by enlisting the active support of every member of our church. This will enable the church to meet effectively the manifold responsibilities of these times.

The work of the church desperately needs the strong support of our people. Active participation in its program, through the Stewardship of Possessions is not merely our Christian responsibility but also "a means of grace." Your Commission has carefully considered the budgets submitted by your many boards and agencies. We now present them to you for your most thoughtful consideration and action.

Recommendations

- 1. We recommend that all boards and agencies receiving financial support from the Conference Budget, shall make a report to the Commission on World Service and Finance, not later than May 21, 1947. Such reports shall include all receipts and disbursements, with supporting evidence such as cancelled checks, bank statements, and receipts.
- 2. We recommend that each local church shall promote a vigorous program, designed to fully inform its members of the great needs of the world today. The general aim of this program shall be to intensify the interest and secure the active financial support of every member and constituent.
- 3. We recommend that the World Peace Commission in each local church, shall work with their pastors and the Conference Commission on World Peace, in an effort to liquidate the debt created by Methodist men of the Delaware Conference, who served in Civilian Public Service Camps. This is to be a voluntary offering.
- 4. We recommend that all treasurers of the Delaware Conference, shall meet with the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance, at a time set by the Commission. This group shall endeavor to construct a workable plan for centralizing the treasury. We recommend further that the said plan be presented at the next session of our Annual Conference. (1948).

Obituary

JOSEPH R. WATERS

One of the Methodism's most amazing ministerial careers came to an end on July 29th, 1946, when Joseph R. Waters passed from labor to reward after serving the Delaware Conference actively for 63 years, and then living in retirement for four more years. Up to this time no member of the Conference had held a record of 67 years of membership on our roll.

Joseph Robert Waters was born on May 8, 1856, at Fairmount, Maryland, the son of the late Samuel G. and Henrietta Waters. He was educated in the public schools of his native community, and early heard the unmistakable call to the Christian ministry, for which he was richly endowed with natural gifts.

His first marriage was to Miss Effie Rounds, of Snow Hill, Maryland, to which union were born four children, two of whom survive. Joining the Delaware Conference in 1879, his record-making ministry covered the following assignments:

Snow Hill Circuit, Md., 1 year; Fruitland, Md., 3; Salisbury, Md., 2; Princess Anne, Md., 2; Ezion, Wilmington, Del., 3; Cape May, N. J., 1; Salem, N. J., 1; St. Daniels, Chester, Pa., 1; superintendent of the Wilmington District, 6 years, and of the Salisbury District, 6 years; Germantown, Philadelphia, 7; Newark, N. J., 3; St. Daniels, Chester, 2; field agent for the Conference Claimants Fund, 2; Newman, Brooklyn, N. Y., 2; Çamden, N. J., 3; Magnolia, N. J., 1; field agent for the Conference Claimants Fund, 3; Pocomoke City, Md., 3; Mount Holly, N. J., 2; Haven, Wilmington, Del., 2; Bridgeville, Del., 3; Milford, Del., 3; South Berlin, Md., 1; Lewes, Del., 1. He retired in 1942.

On June 24, 1924, his wife went to her final reward. On September 10, 1927, he was united in wedlock to Mrs. Sarah Gaskins, of Philadelphia, who shared the privileges of the Christian ministry with him with undying devotion until the end.

Dr. Joseph R. Waters will be remembered by all who knew him for many outstanding qualities and noble accomplishments. He was a man of great personal magnetism and charm, possessing a rich speaking and singing voice, and being a preacher of power and persuasion. His pastorates were marked by devotion to a great cause—that of our Conference Claimants. He was, as a result, twice appointed to the field in this interest. Up to his last years in the pastorate, even when he was serving as a retired supplied, he took great delight in the achievements of raising his own charge's claims in full for this cause.

And yet his greatest contribution was not in the raising of funds for pension and relief of retired ministers, widows, and orphans, nor in any church or parsonage building which may have been erected under his supervision—but in the field of education. While he was not professionally an educator, yet his idea started a college back in 1886. At that time he was pastor of Metropolitan Church, Princess Anne, Maryland, and envisioned the need of an institution of higher learning on the Eastern Shore of Maryland for Negro youth. Thus Princess Anne Academy was born, becoming a

branch of Morgan College, Baltimore, and an outstanding school in the Methodist educational system. Today "Princess Anne Academy" is Princess Anne College, fully State owned and controlled, and promises to be one of the great State schools for Negroes in America.

In October, 1944, it was the writer's privilege to sit on the platform at Princess Anne College with Dr. Waters and to hear him relate—58 years afterwards!—without faultiness of memory or inaccuracy of grammatical speech the remarkable story of the beginnings of Princess Anne Academy. It was a challenge that students can never forget. It is a memory that is dear to all of us who heard it.

In recognition of his significant contributions to his Conference, church, and Christianity at large, Bennett College conferred on him the degree of doctor of divinity.

A man of unusual vigor and vitality, and blessed with almost perfect health until he had reached his "allotted years," three score and ten, he did not have a tooth extracted nor a serious illness until he was past seventy. Even in his 90th year he was taking care of pastoral duties during the illness of Brother F. O. T. Laws, at Lawnside, N. J., where he lived in retirement. When the splendid physical frame finally broke under the weight of years, he was tenderly cared for by his faithful wife and devoted daughter. In his last days he indeed "did not want for any good thing."

Funeral services were held on August 5, at Tindley Temple, Philadelphia, conducted by his district superintendent, Dr. W. C. Thompson, who delivered the principal eulogy. Other speakers included the Revs. L. S. Moore, C. W. Pullett, D. W. Henry, F. H. Butler, and Professor Robert A. Grigsby, acting president of Princess Anne College. The obituary was read by Dr. R. G. Waters, and several other pastors assisted in the services.

* Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Sarah G. Waters; a daughter, Mrs. Lillie Bunday, of Philadelphia, and a son, Paul, also of Philadelphia; a brother, the Rev. Wilmore E. Waters, retired, and many more distant relatives.

FRANCIS O. T. LAWS

Francis O. T. Laws, son of the late Thomas K. and Anna M. Laws, was born in Chester, Pa., on June 14th, 1883, and departed this life on July 3, 1946, in Philadelphia, Pa., where he was living in retirement undergoing treatment in a convalescent home.

He was educated in the public schools of Chester, and at Princess Anne Academy, Delaware State College, and Lincoln University. On April 18, 1917, he was united in wedlock to Miss Lillie Mae Stewart, of Chester, who proved a devoted and inspiring companion to him throughout his successful ministry.

When the late Dr. J. R. Waters was appointed field agent for the Conference Claimants Fund the first time, during the Conference year 1916-17,

Brother Laws supplied the pulpit at Saint Daniels Church in Chester until the Annual Conference of 1917, when he was appointed to John Wesley Church, Bridgeton, N. J. Here he remained five years and enjoyed one of his most successful pastorates.

Succeeding charges were, Bridgeville, Del., 3 years; Middletown, Del., 4; Peniel, Philadelphia, 1; Trinity, East Germantown, Philadelphia, 5; Delair, N. J., 5; and Lawnside, N. J. 6.

He was a hard working and conscientious pastor, so much so, indeed, that he did not give proper attention to his personal health. Thus his tremendous physique broke under the strain several years before his passing. And yet, despite long periods of illness and hospitalization, he carried courageously on and did not "give up" until the Conference session of 1946, at Newman, Brooklyn, N. Y., when he decided to "rest a year."

Rest came eternally-and suddenly-when he was showing some ap-

parent signs of improvement.

His widow, Mrs. Lillie Stewart Laws, and a daughter-their only

child-Frances Mae, survive.

Funeral services were held at Zoar Church, Philadelphia, Monday, July 8th, conducted by District Superintendent W. C. Thompson. Many of his comrades of the Conference assisted in the services and spoke in loving tribute of his life and fruitful ministry.

Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely:
(1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn.
(3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved: and is sustained by a two-thirds vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

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
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
