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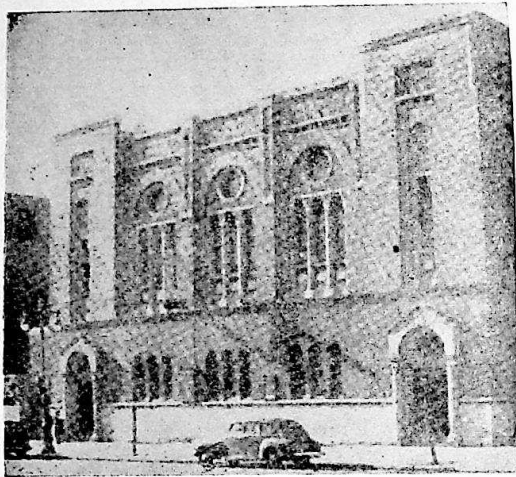

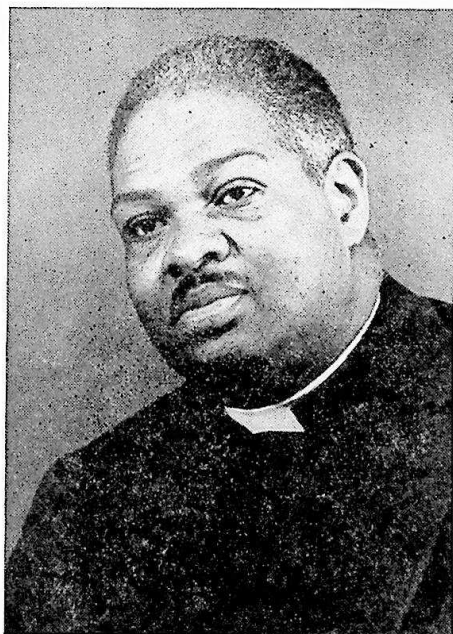

Reports of District Superintendents

DOVER DISTRICT

In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Bishop Shaw, Members of the Conference, and Friends:

The superintendent and his children, and the pastors and laymen of the Dover District were in no respects prepared for the very great shock which came to us the second morning following the adjournment of last year's session of our Conference. On Tuesday morning, April 18, 1950, at 10:30 o'clock, death came into our district parsonage and took the very heart out of it.

Caddie Ridout was such a noble spirit, such a devoted and loyal wife and mother and such a faithful friend that none of us who knew and loved her best ever envisioned life without her. For her life and her love and for her example of Christian character, we are profoundly grateful. And we are thankful, too, that she died in harness. She fell in her tracks, about the work that was so dear to her heart and to which she gave so much.

We know now—if we did not know it before—how beautiful life is and how highly it can be lived. And because we have known her, although we have lost her, life has more meaning for us all.

Truly, "any one who has lived long enough to know Christ has lived long enough."

"We know not what the future hath
Of marvel or surprise,
Assured alone that life and death
God's mercy underlies.

"We know not where His islands lift
Their fronded palms in air;
We only know we cannot drift
Beyond His love and care."

And so, strengthened by His Grace, and guided by His Hand, the Dover District has advanced marvelously this year on all fronts. We have been richly blessed by a warm fellowship such as ought always exist among the "people of God."

Death invaded also our ministerial ranks when, early in the year, on Sunday morning, May 7th, 1950, the Reverend Edward William Holden, our pastor at Fairlee, went to his eternal reward, after less than 20 hours of illness. He had begun his 20th year as an accepted supply pastor, and had given consistently faithful and efficient service to the church.

Other deaths during the year affecting our parsonages included those of the mother of Mrs. W. G. Brown, North Berlin; the father of the Rev. F. S. Walker, Laurel; the mother of the Rev. G. B. Wilson, Port Deposit, and the brother of the Rev. S. P. Sanders, South Berlin.

Having recovered after periods of illness are Pastors D. S. Quillin, Sharptown, and Thaddeus Hackett, Harrington, and Mrs. Hackett. The Rev. R. A. Bolden, Delmar, escaped possible serious injury when struck by an automobile last month, and Mrs. W. G. Brown is recovering from a serious illness which confined her to her home since Christmas.

But amid all the cases of sickness, joy came one morning when a child was born to Pastor and Mrs. Louis R. Jones in the Millington parsonage. In this respect, there is a decrease on the District, as last year two births were reported in our parsonages.

Interim Changes

Following the death of Brother Holden at Fairlee, L. R. Jones, of Millington, was transferred to Fairlee, and Mrs. Marie F. Gibbs, a local preacher at Coleman and a teacher in the Kent County (Maryland) public school system, was assigned to Millington. However, after four weeks, Brother Jones decided that he would rather bear those ills he had in Millington than fly to others that he knew not of in Fairlee. The Millington people gladly welcomed him back, and Mrs. Gibbs was moved over to Fairlee, where she has wrought wonders.

Youth Work

Early in the year, two very fine adventures were made in our youth activities, and both proved highly successful.

Last June, on invitation of a youth group in the Wyoming Conference, the Dover District sent Margaret Kiah, daughter of Pastor and Mrs. Charles E. Kiah, of Bridgeville, to Europe with a Youth Friendship Caravan. The only colored member of the group, Peggie proved an excellent choice, and made fine contributions to the caravan, meanwhile gaining experience of life-long value as she fellowshipped for three months, together with her party, with Christian youth in Norway and Italy. Her reports on her unique trip have inspired the elders as well as the youth on the Dover District since her return last September.

In July and August we engaged the services of Miss Mildred Nero, of Asbury Church, Washington, and a youth leader in the Washington Conference, to help revitalize our youth work on the District. This was a joint project with the Department of Negro Work of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, our investment requiring an expenditure of \$225.

The churches of the District, committed to the task of providing the best possible opportunities for our youth, raised the \$825 necessary for these extra features with a minimum of effort.

Our District Youth Choir of more than one hundred voices has provided discovering rare talent among the youth in our rural areas. excellent opportunity for the young people of the District to be led into deeper appreciation of the great music of the church, and has been a means of

Our youth meetings have been largely attended and well planned by our District staff. The representation at the Morgan College Youth Assembly last summer was the largest in our history. The week of this July 2-7, Marion Gordy, of Delmar, our District youth president, will be fraternal delegate at the Second Senior Assembly of the West Virginia Conference, at West Virginia Wesleyan College, Buckhannon, West Virginia.

Despite these achievement and distinctions, there is much work to be done on the local church level to bring our youth work up to the desired standard. I am repeatedly urging pastors to give larger opportunity to our youth to share in the total local church program, reminding them that much of our effort is still directed to the edifying of the saints—the adults, the elders—of our churches.

Ministerial Support

One of our most encouraging developments the past two years has been the increases in ministerial support in all the charges on the Dover District. Numerically, the Dover District is the smallest in our Conference. It is natural, therefore, that our churches, on the whole, would pay salaries lower than those paid, on the average, on the other Districts. Set as we are in the heart of our Conference territory, we are almost surrounded directly by three great Districts—the Wilmington on the North, the Easton on the West, and the Salisbury on the South. Fortunately, on the East we have to contend only with the Delaware Bay and the Atlantic Ocean!

From the outset I have tried to show our churches the necessity of providing better support for our pastors. Two years ago, only two charges on the Dover District were paying salaries of \$2,000. Both of these this year advanced to \$2,200, and two others joined the \$2,000 circle. Next year, 12 charges will be paying \$2,000 or more. This is progress indeed, but the fact is, every single pastor in the Delaware Conference should be getting right now a minimum salary of \$2,500 a year.

Dr. Ralph W. Felton, of Drew Seminary, has prepared for the Commission on Ministerial Support of the Newark Conference a four-page leaflet entitled "A Frank Talk with Methodist Laymen," which sets forth some startling facts. Dr. Felton points out that, according to statistics released by the United States Department of Labor, \$3,437 is the subsistence budget for a minister's family of four—husband, wife, and two children. Needless to say, this figure is so far above the level of what our pastors get that one wonders how we are able to make ends meet at all.

In our Conference we have established a minimum salary figure and created a minimum salary fund. But the fact is, our minimum salary figure is much too low and our fund is much too inadequate to take care of the minimum needs of our woefully underpaid pastors. About this alarming situation something must be done. We need to rethink the total financial structure and plan of our local church—and this rethinking needs to be started at the top—in the councils of our General Conference. It is utterly impossible for the complex program of our church to be well executed by any other than well trained ministers. And we can never have our churches manned with such personnel until we make possible a more adequate support for our ministry.

Our mission needs around the world are undeniably desperate and our challenge to meet them inescapable. But we cannot meet them without preachers to carry the word and to man our pulpits at home. Without delving seriously into the matter, it seems to me that a considerably larger portion of our missionary funds could be retained at home to help train and

maintain a ministry that will in course of time be fully adequate eventually to preach effectively the gospel "to every creature, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost."

It is taken for granted in military circles, I believe, that an army, to be fit for victory, must be well clothed and well fed. That is no less true of those soldiers who fight in the army of the Lord. I appeal to our laymen to help deliver our pastors from exposure to the humiliation of being gossiped about in their communities because of the inability to pay their debts and to provide the fundamental every-day needs of their families. Every pastor can do better the spiritual work he is called to do if he is adequately fed and clothed and his family provided for.

Spiritual Gains

But high over all in the total picture of our work this year on the Dover District has been the deepening of the spiritual life of our pastors and people. In every letter that I write to my pastors I close with these words, "PREACH THE WORD!"

My "boys" have taken me at my word. They have preached the Word. Souls have been converted. Revival fires have been kindled. Pentecostal showers have come down upon the people. The result is, according to reports made at Efficiency Conference time, and not including final figures, 237 conversions and 338 accessions.

The most significant group evangelistic effort was promoted by the Milford Group, C. E. Kiah, chairman and originator of the idea. A visitation evangelism campaign was carried on by the Milford, Lincoln, Harrington, Bridgeville, Bridgeville Circuit and Seaford Churches from January 9th to March 6th. Services were held each Tuesday night. Each church, when the group visited it, was crowded to capacity throughout the season. Altars were crowded with people crying to be saved from their sins, and a spirit of fellowship was generated among these churches, the results of which will be far-reaching in long years to come. We are fortunate to have in this group our Conference secretary of Evangelism, Brother J. O. Lockman, whose experience and passion for soul-saving greatly encouraged the other pastors in the group, all of whom are young men.

Survey of Charges

BRIDGEVILLE, C. E. Kiah, pastor, maintained its usual high standard of excellence, reporting 20 conversions and 36 accessions. The church has been covered with white asbestos siding, and on the inside the ceiling has been covered with ivory celotex. Our District Conference was splendidly entertained here. Total raised for all purposes, \$4,533. All departments of the church are well organized.

BRIDGEVILLE CIRCUIT, H. T. Moody, pastor, is also ablaze with spiritual fervor. Church attendance has greatly increased and many inactive members have been activated. Conversions, 32; accessions, 25. Total raised, \$4,400. This is an ideal rural situation. Salary raised to \$2,000.

CHESTERTOWN, C. H. Molock, pastor. This is the superintendent's birthchurch, so, of course, can be expected to rank among the District's strongest charges. I always heard through the years that Chestertown was

a "hard place." This is no longer true. This energetic pastor has wrought miracles. Conversions, 24; accessions, 26. Improvements have been made on church and parsonage, and all departments of the church are active. Total raised, \$7,478. Salary advanced to \$2,000.

CHESWOLD, H. R. Snead, pastor, reports 10 accessions and \$3,361 raised for all purposes. The salary has been advanced \$150.00. This is a unique situation, with unlimited and unexplored possibilities, demanding the most sagacious and resourceful leadership.

CLARKSVILLE, W. W. Brown, pastor, closes his eleventh year with increasing effectiveness. Conversions, 2; accessions, 3; total raised, \$4,023. Plans are underway to relocate and to build a new John Wesley—the home—church, the Selbyville church having been completed last year.

COLEMAN, J. O. Stanley, pastor, has had 10 conversions and 10 accessions and raised a total of \$3,600. A roof has been put on the church, the parsonage papered and garage repaired, and a cemetery lot purchased and paid for at a cost of \$250. All apportionments full.

CRUMPTON, W. O. Turner, pastor, is the only four-point circuit on the District. The pastor, handicapped by failing eyesight has accomplished his usual good year's work, but asks retirement at this session. He richly deserves it, after 24 years of effective supply service. Conversions, 3; accessions, 3. Total raised, \$4,376.

DELMAR, R. A. Bolden, pastor, has been greatly revitalized this year. Conversions, 2; accessions, 6. The parsonage has been redecorated and furnished with new oil burner heater. The church has also been repaired and reorganized more effectively "to serve the present age." Total raised, \$3,089.

DOVER, F. D. Jones, pastor. No comment is needed on this charge. There is none better nor more skillfully managed. As always, all obligations are paid in full; church attendance has increased 25% and Sunday School attendance 75%. New carpet bought and paid for at a cost of approximately \$1000, and organ chimes paid for by young adults at cost of \$800. Conversions, 2; accessions, 16; total raised, \$7,195.

FAIRLEE, Mrs. Marie F. Gibbs, pastor, has met every obligation fully, recorded 12 conversions and 20 accessions, and raised a total of \$3,760. The Asbury church has been made a station, and the Mt. Pleasant and Mt. Pisgah churches will form a new charge to be re-named Melitoto. Mrs. Gibbs, in an emergency, has done a remarkable work. She is one of Maryland's most competent school teachers.

GALENA, Mrs. Rachel Brown, pastor, despite no present possibility of future growth, has had a glorious year. There are no young people on this charge, so that there is little hope of survival another generation unless there is a migration of population from somewhere. Accessions, 4; total raised, \$2,548.

HARRINGTON, Thaddeus Hackett, pastor, is an amazing charge. With only 67 members of all descriptions they have raised a total of \$3,552, reporting fully all claims. The pastor's salary has been increased to \$1800, the second successive year for a \$200 increase. Conversions, 1. Church attendance has greatly increased. The members are crying for the pastors return.

LAUREL, F. S. Walker, pastor, has experienced a great year of achievement. The pastor is an able musician and has developed an excellent childrens choir, meanwhile improving the worship services. Church and parsonage repairs, new altar set for the church, and an ample supply of Methodist Hymnals. Conversions, 1; accessions, 8; total raised, \$4,800. Salary increased to \$2,000.

LEWES mourned the departure of its pastor last year, but is rejoicing mightily now in the achievements of the new. A. J. Dredden has had a magnificent first year in the ministry. This charge shared in one or two of the Milford group evangelistic services. All askings are full. Total raised, \$3,263. Salary advanced \$200.

LINCOLN CITY comes through gloriously with J. O. Lockman for the 21st year. Conversions, 17; accessions, 15; total raised, \$4,312. Salary raised to \$2,000. Much needed remodeling of the Slaughter Neck church has begun. This charge is gloriously spiritually alive. The pastor keeps his people abreast with the church's program. Everybody expects him to return for year No. 22.

MARDELA SPRINGS, always a 100% charge, is one of the most smoothly operating in the entire Conference. Conversions, 6; accessions, 6; total raised, \$4,375—all claims having been met fully. S. G. Dix, pastor, and his wife are a great team in Kingdom service.

MILFORD, another supposedly difficult point, has had remarkably easy sailing under the leadership of Randolph Fisher. Conversions, 9; accessions, 11; total raised, \$4,200. Church attendance increased; communion table and altar set presented by choir, at cost of \$161; all organizations functioning well. This pastor is an able leader. Salary raised to \$2,000.

MILLINGTON has great confidence in the leadership of its pastor, L. R. Jones, as indicated by their welcome back to him after his brief sojourn in Fairlee. Pastor and people have enjoyed a most happy and prosperous year. Conversions, 2; accessions, 2; total raised, \$3,465. \$500 has been raised on improvement, awaiting a contractor. The charge is spiritually awake.

MILLSBORO, E. N. Foster, pastor, has had a most successful year. Conversions, 13; accessions, 25. Improvements have been made in churches and parsonage and the charge greatly revitalized, with organizations ably functioning. Total raised, \$3,160. Pastor and people are happy.

NASSAU is an almost ideal appointment. Both churches, at Belltown and Rehoboth, are practically new; attendance is large, and the people are loyal. M. C. Blakely, pastor, makes each year better than the one before, and has no desire to leave. Conversions, 12; accessions, 16; total raised, \$6,039. Rest rooms have been installed in the Belltown church, and at Rehoboth the church has been shingled and basement remodeled.

NEWARK, M. V. Hyland, pastor, is in the process of building a new church at the home point. St. Peters church was completed several years ago. We are hoping that the District Advance specials allocation, together with the help that will come from the Board of Missions, will speed the project along. A glorious spiritual tide has swept over St. Peters, with 16 conversions and accessions. Total raised, \$3,304.

NORTH BERLIN, W. G. Brown, pastor, has achieved well, as usual, this year against great odds. The prolonged and expensive illness of the

pastor's wife has put him to a severe test. His head has been bloody, but unbowed. Conversions, 1; accessions, 9; total raised, \$5,239. This is a strong charge, and the people are loyal.

POMONA, C. C. Thomas, pastor, is another splendid rural point. The budget has been raised in full. Conversions, 3; accessions, 3; total raised, \$3,948. Salary increased \$200.

PORT DEPOSIT, G. B. Wilson, pastor. I said in my report last year, "I believe that this charge has latent possibilities." The pastor this year has largely realized them. Accessions, 4; total raised, \$2,855. The old school house in Port Deposit has been obtained and utilized as a church hall and youth center—and both churches have been greatly activated and spiritually revived. The ancient prophet of Israel was asked this question by his Lord, "Son of man, can these bones live?" The answer at Port Deposit is, "Yes."

ROCK HALL, J. H. Hubbard, pastor, closes his 11th year of service at this charge with victory, and seeks voluntary retirement at this session of the Conference. Conversions, 10; accessions, 8; total raised, \$3,444. Salary advanced \$200.

SASSAFRAS has had another great year under the able leadership of Mrs. Ophelia O. James. All claims are met in full, and the churches are spiritually aflame. The Sassafras church has been thoroughly beautified within, and the cost, \$355, paid. Improvements have also been made in the parsonage property. Conversions, 5; accessions, 12; total raised, \$3,578; salary advanced \$200.

SEAFORD, Roland Grant, pastor. At long last, John Wesley church in Seaford has become a station, and will pay a salary next year of \$2,000, whereas this year, as part of a three-point circuit, it paid only \$1100. The Mount Hope and Cokesbury churches will form a new charge, Seaford Circuit. The pastor has had a glorious first year of service: Conversions, 6; accessions, 12; total raised, \$4,023. The attendance at Church and Sunday School has greatly increased.

SHARPTOWN, D. S. Quillin, pastor. This pastor reports the happiest year of his ministry. Here is our largest church membership and best attendance on the District. Conversions, 15; accessions, 12; total raised, \$4,190. Salary advanced to \$2,000. This church is always crowded, and all organizations are in full operation.

SMYRNA, another traditionally "weak point," has shown hidden strength under the competent leadership of E. L. Maddox. Conversions, 4; accessions, 8; total raised, \$2,823. A new furnace has been installed and pulpit furniture upholstered. Every item fully raised.

SOUTH BERLIN, S. P. Sanders, pastor, is another ideal rural charge, and has been happy under the leadership of this young pastor. Conversions, 7; accessions, 8; total raised, \$4,832. Significant improvements in both churches and the beautiful parsonage. Salary increased to \$2,000.

STILL POND, T. L. Ross, pastor. This energetic young pastor, serving his second year and charge, again reports every item full. Conversions, 2; accessions, 11; total raised, \$4,560. A very successful Vacation Church School was held last summer, and improvements made in the parsonage. This also is an attractive rural situation.

TOWNSEND, W. C. Thomas, pastor. Pastor and people have been happy in service together. Conversions, 2; accessions, 5; total raised, \$2,818. This is another charge with potentialities not yet fully realized. Improvements in the home church and the parsonage. The charge was greatly revived during the recent evangelistic services.

An effort was made to revive both Laurel and Dover Circuits without success. E. W. Dean, assigned to Laurel, made a survey of the community and held several services there during the year. This work will be supervised by the Laurel pastor and local preacher.

Apparently nothing remains at Dover Circuit. The cabinet and the District Board of Location concur in the recommendation for its abandonment. The property will be assigned to the Conference Board of Trustees for disposal.

Conclusion

I could go on endlessly thanking and praising pastors and laymen of the Dover District for their splendid co-operation during the year that makes this report possible. I could thank pastors and laymen throughout the Conference for their personal kindness during our dark hours of last April. Truly should we all be increasingly thankful for the ties that bind our hearts in Christian Love, and for the Fellowship of kindred minds—which is like to that above.

The notable achievements of this year could not be possible without the foundations laid by all my predecessors and the continued faithfulness and competence of our District leaders—in children's, youth, and adult work—Mrs. Elizabeth Shockley, and the Revs. C. E. Kiah and F. D. Jones; in women's work, Mrs. Estelle Nichols; the Ministers Wives Association, Mrs. S. G. Dix; in missionary education, the Rev. H. T. Moody; in evangelism, the Rev. W. G. Brown, and in lay activities, James R. Webb, Elmer Hawkins, George E. Dredden, Sr., James Harcastle, and Bernard Young.

EASTON DISTRICT

Bishop Shaw, Ministers and Laymen:

We are indeed grateful to our heavenly Father for the happy privilege to present our second report to the Eighty-Ninth Session of the Delaware Annual Conference.

The wonderful manner in which we have been able to administer the affairs of the district has proven to us that God will never leave nor forsake those who put their trust and confidence in Him.

We again attended the Jurisdictional Training School at Gulfside in July. We shall never forget some of the unusual incidents that occurred.

In the class for Superintendents we discussed some of the problems of the district, such as, The lack of trained leadership; Recruiting men, for the ministry; How to increase interest in the benevolence program; The decrease in the Church School enrollment and attendance in the Central Jurisdiction; How can I improve Christian Education in my district?

In October we attended the District Superintendents' Conference in Indianapolis.

The achievements for the first two years of the Advance were given, and the plans for the remaining two were dramatically presented by the Bishops and other Churchmen.

We were extremely proud of Bishop Shaw, when he delivered a masterful address on the subject, "Excelling the past in Christian Religion." Three of his pointed statements were, "It takes good people to make a good world; It is our task to take the christian banner and carry it to higher and more glorious heights; We must excel the past in every particular, in the field of christian religion."

It was very encouraging to see and hear the students from India, Japan, Liberia, Brazil, Austria, Czechoslovakia, Greece, Germany, and our own Grant Shockley, who have attended and are attending some of our leading Universities, having been helped by the Advance and Week of Dedication funds.

Sickness and Bereavement

On August 16, while attending the Conference Methodist Youth Assembly at Morgan College, Mrs. Arrminte B. Cook of Centreville, the widow of the late Rev. Jacob W. Cook, passed to her reward. Dr. J. E. A. Johns delivered the eulogy.

On December 17, the Rev. Richard Bowser of Cordova charge was not, for God took him. The superintendent, assisted by the brethren, conducted the service, December 20. Suitable memoirs for these saints will appear in our Journal.

Mrs. Henrietta Butler of Asbury Church, and a faithful trustee of the district personage was called from labor to reward.

The Revs. E. H. Jackson lost a mother; Noble Henry, a brother; and R. S. Caldwell, a nephew. Mrs. Augustus Chancy, a father; Mrs. E. H. Jackson, an aunt; and Mrs. W. C. R. Mills, an aunt.

The Rev. R. W. Thomas who has been ill since June, moved from Ridgely to Germantown with his daughter in December. The Rev. W. G.

Matthews who spent the fall and winter in Baltimore is very poorly. Other brethren and their families were temporarily indisposed.

Mrs. W. A. Harewood underwent an operation in the University of Pennsylvania Hospital, April 11, and is now recuperating at her brothers.

District Activities

The District Stewards meeting, the Coaching conferences for Vacation Church School workers addressed by Mrs. M. W. Clark, and for Youth workers addressed by The Rev. H. H. Nichols, were held in May at Easton, and fulfilled the purpose on the district for which they were planned.

The Methodist Youth Fellowship Institute held at Cambridge in June inspired the youth to such an extent that the majority of them made commitments to render part time and full service to their Church and God.

The District Conference held at Federalsburg had a record breaking attendance. The whole program was edifying. The pastor and people did a fine job with the entertainment.

Even though our Evangelistic program was shortened on account of the gubernatorial election, November 7, the results were gratifying.

The Laymen's Conference held at Centreville was highlighted by the Rev. D. L. Ridout who conducted a service on the "Use and Interpretation of the Methodist Hymnal."

The Young Adults Retreat, held at St. Michaels, January 13, was greatly enriched by the conference officers.

Deans Chancy, Shockley, and Bagwell and their staffs did a great job in the Leadership Training Schools held in January and February at Easton, Cambridge and Centreville.

Our Missionary Institute held at Oxford, March 1, was addressed by the Rev. M. P. Krikorian, a Missionary from Armenia. Our Missionary Secretary W. H. Mears lifted our souls to a high plane with his message.

We were singularly proud and honored to have Bishop Shaw accept our invitation to come to our Efficiency Conference. The day was beautiful, the audience very large, and the message was electrifying and inspiring.

The Quarterly Meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service were largely attended. The able manner in which the work was presented under the capable leadership of the District President, Mrs. Mabel Cooper, was beneficial to the local societies.

AIREYS has done a good job this year. The parsonage has been renovated, and an oil heater installed at a cost of \$675. The pastor is a hard worker and the people appreciate him. He is invited to return. Conversions, 5; accessions, 5. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$300, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$3,385. Van B. Wright, pastor.

BECKWITH with its small but plucky membership rolls up another good year. The pastor and his aggressive help-meet deserve much credit. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$149, in full. All other Benevolences in full. Raised for all purposes, \$1,915. Frank Farrare is the courageous pastor.

CAMBRIDGE. This is the leading charge below Wilmington. The church is well organized, and all groups are working harmoniously. The Church School is the only one on the district that uses the closely graded lessons. The Methodist Men have installed a Sound System. The old coal heater has been displaced with an oil burning unit. The pastor and family are perfectly satisfied, and the people are elated. The salary has been increased to \$2600. Conversions, 7; accessions, 8. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$848, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$9,402. J. R. Shockley is the popular pastor.

CAMBRIDGE CIRCUIT. St. Luke church is nearly completed. A heating plant and rest rooms have been installed. It is a credit to the pastor and people who worked assiduously. The parsonage at Rock has been beautified. Conversions, 16; accessions, 16. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$181. Raised for all purposes, \$4,287. R. E. Hamilton, pastor.

CARMICHAELS makes a better report than last year. Conversions, 8; accessions, 4. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$225. Raised for all purposes, \$3,378. R. S. Caldwell is the quiet pastor.

CENTREVILLE has not done as well as expected. New carpet has been purchased for the pulpit platform, and inside the altar. The coal heater converted to an oil burning unit. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$138. Raised for all purposes, \$3,110. C. W. Bagwell, pastor.

CENTREVILLE CIRCUIT. The new pastor and people have been unable to click. Very little has been done. Conversions, 18; accessions, 3. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$122. Raised for all purposes, \$2,458. S. E. Armstrong, pastor.

CHAPEL. The new pastor has proven himself equal to the task assigned. The people have co-operated in a fine manner, and a good years work has been achieved. Conversions, 6; accessions, 2. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$157, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$2,530. M. D. Brooks, pastor.

CHURCH CREEK has had a fairly good year. Wesley church has been painted outside, and electric lights installed. Conversions, 10; accessions, 2. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$129. Raised for all purposes \$2,021. Albert H. Slacum, pastor.

CHURCH HILL. The report of this charge is a little better than last year. Some improvements have been made to the property. The people are enjoying the administration of the pastor, and request his return. Conversions, 8; accessions, 8. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$207. Raised for all purposes, \$3,572. Noble Henry is the active pastor.

CORDOVA. This charge is to be commended for the splendid job done with an ill pastor who was translated in December. R. E. Lee was appointed to serve until the conference. Conversions, 6; accessions, 6. World Service and Conference Benevolence \$194, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$2,170. Richard Bowser was the pastor.

CRAPO AND GOLDEN HILL. This charge did not do as well as it might have. The pastor's wife has been ill, and he is looking for a taller bush with better berries. Conversions, 5; accessions, 5. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$60. Raised for all purposes, \$2,320. J. R. Bowdoin, pastor.

DENTON is making a good report. Conversions, 15; accessions 15. World Service and Conference Benevolence \$140. Raised for all purposes, \$2,823. R. T. Wallace, pastor.

EASTON has done a wonderful job this year. The old organization has been revitalized, new ones effected, and are working splendidly. The church has been re-wired. The vestibule painted, and the pulpit chairs upholstered. The floors in the parsonage have been sanded, and venetian blinds installed. The salary increased to \$2,340. The people seem to be very pleased with their new pastor and family. His return has been requested. Conversions, 15; accessions, 24. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$644, in full. All other Benevolences in full. Raised for all purposes, \$7,052. Augustus Chancy is the busy, meticulous pastor.

EASTON CIRCUIT. This charge believes in doing a satisfactory job. The superintendent had the unique privilege of confirming and communing 9 young people from the pastor's membership class April 1. Plans are being made to modernize the parsonage. The salary has been increased to \$1,400. The return of the pastor is unanimously requested. Conversions, 12; accessions, 12. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$142, in full. All other askings in full. Raised for all purposes, \$3,865. Rev. Mrs. Sarah C. Austin is the devoted pastor.

EAST NEW MARKET AND THOMPSONTOWN makes another good report. A cement walk has been laid at Mt. Zion church, and the parish house at Thompsontown covered with asbestos shingles. Conversions, 7; accessions, 7. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$208. Raised for all purposes, \$3,179. W. A. Nichols, pastor.

FEDERALSBURG has made some progress this year. A Hammond Organ purchased; the church and parsonage decorated inside; an electric range and an automatic water heater installed. A successful evangelistic campaign was conducted. Conversions, 8; accessions, 8. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$275, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$6,247. J. I. Williams is the beloved pastor.

GREENSBORO. This charge takes care of its financial obligation, but neglects the spiritual. An evangelism campaign is greatly needed. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$358. Raised for all purposes, \$3,450. F. R. Richardson, pastor.

HURLOCK. The Union Grove congregation is worshipping in its new edifice. The cornerstone was laid by Bishop Shaw in November. Conversions, 12; accessions, 4. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$137. Raised for all purposes, \$3,832. J. E. McBride, pastor.

LINKWOOD has done a little better than last year. Conversions, 5; accessions, 5. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$90, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$2,210. O. N. Johnson, pastor.

MARYDEL continues to do her work with ease. The people want to keep "Young" as long as they can. Electric lights have been installed in Ferrell's church. The parsonage has been renovated. Conversions, 3; accessions, 6. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$313, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$5,060. C. I. Young, pastor.

MCDANIEL has done a trifle better than last year. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$99. Raised for all purposes \$2,235. A. C. Whittington, pastor.

MILES RIVER has prevented her banner from trailing in the dust. Conversions, 1; accessions, 1. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$112. Raised for all purposes, \$2,225. R. C. Whittington, pastor.

OXFORD has had another excellent year. Some repairs have been done to Waters church and the parsonage. New Hymnals purchased. Conversions, 2; accessions 1. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$346, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$6,340. A. L. Scriber is the ambitious pastor.

PRESTON has had a glorious year. The pastor conducted a membership training class in each of his three churches. The Superintendent confirmed 32 young people on Palm Sunday evening at Mt. Pleasant church. Zoar church has been moved back, and remodelled at a cost of \$3,680. The salary has been increased \$200. Mt. Pleasant has one of the best men's organizations on the district. Conversions, 34; accessions 34. World Service and Conference Benevolence \$366, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$7,929. Harvey T. Hall is the alert pastor.

RIDGELY has laboured under a serious handicap. The pastor who removed to Germantown with his daughter in December, has been ill since June. James Nichols, the local preacher, rendered valuable service. Salary increased \$200. Conversions, 1; accessions, 1. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$260. Raised for all purposes, \$3,313. R. W. Thomas, pastor.

ROYAL OAK AND BELLEVUE. Two years ago this charge took the wings of faith and flew. Unfortunately, she lost her wings in the flight; consequently she has fallen back almost to the place from which she had flown. The salary has been decreased from \$2,000 to \$1,700. Conversions, 10; accessions 10. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$98. Raised for all purposes, \$2,275. W. C. R. Mills, pastor.

ST. MICHAELS has awakened from her slumber. The church school has been re-organized. The pastor's membership class for young people was conducted. A new roof put on the church. Salary increased \$400. Conversions, 8; accessions, 10. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$274. Raised for all purposes, \$5,445. J. W. Pruitt is the fortunate pastor.

STEVENSVILLE has done well this year. Some improvements have been made on the churches and parsonage. Conversions, 7; accessions, 7. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$205. Raised for all purposes, \$5,506. W. J. Mills, pastor.

TAYLORS ISLAND AND HOOPERSVILLE makes a better report than last year. The parsonage has been decorated. The people are satisfied, and unanimously request the return of the pastor. Conversions, 2; accessions, 2. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$213. Raised for all purposes, \$3,610. Edward H. Jackson is the loyal pastor.

TRAPPE has had a new pastor, a fire, and a fairly good year. The pastor conducted two membership classes, and the superintendent confirmed 18 young people Palm Sunday afternoon. A picture of the group has been taken. The church which was dirtied by the smoke from the fire, has been completely decorated. Conversions, 3; accessions, 21. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$216. Raised for all purposes \$4,298. J. F. Henry, pastor.

VIENNA AND REIDS GROVE. This charge has had a chimney fire. Very little damage was done. The living room was decorated. She has done well, and promises to do better if the pastor is returned. Conversions, 3; accessions, 4. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$330, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$3,560. A. A. McDowell is the tenacious pastor.

WILLISTON. The parsonage of this charge was thoroughly destroyed by fire. Fortunately, it was covered with \$4,000 insurance. That amount has been received and placed in the Denton bank. A new bungalow is being constructed. St. Paul church has been wired, and a new runner bought. Conversions, 1; accessions, 1. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$122, in full. All other Benevolence in full. Raised for all purposes, \$2,055. N. C. Stanley is the happy pastor.

WITTMAN. This charge is capable of doing a much better job than it has done. Conversions, 8; accessions, 8. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$71. Raised for all purposes, \$3,042. I. B. Bivens, pastor.

The Advance

Many of the charges have observed the WEEK OF DEDICATION. We have strenuously advocated the organizing of the pastor's training classes for church membership. Most of the brethren are slow in warming up to the idea. Preston, Trappe, Easton Circuit, Cambridge, Easton, St. Michaels and Federalsburg have conducted them with remarkable success.

We have had 244 Conversions, and 241 Accessions. Raised for World Service and Conference Benevolence \$7,774. For all purposes \$131,641.

Twenty-five charges contributed \$246 for the A. P. Shaw Guild, and seventeen contributed \$251 for the Montclair project.

We are greatly indebted to our Executive Secretary, the Rev. H. A. Bailey; the Conference Directors: Children, Mrs. Maude Clark; Youth, the Rev. H. H. Nichols; our District Directors: Children, Mrs. Elsie G. Earle; Youth, Mrs. Grace C. Gates; and Adults, the Rev. J. R. Shockley, for the great interest manifested in helping to promote Christian Education on the district.

District Parsonage

Through the loyal support of the dependable ministers and laymen, we have been able to decorate the entire parsonage. The floors upstairs have been sanded, and the bathroom modernized at a cost of \$1,346.66, all of which has been paid.

The trustees have made negotiations for the purchasing of the adjoining lot. It will not only enhance the property, but will prevent any undesirable building from being erected near the parsonage. By the help of Almighty God, and the continued support of the good people, we shall pay for it before next Conference.

Conclusion

We would be guilty of the sin of ingratitude if this report were closed without saying that it would have been a matter of impossibility for us to achieve what we did, if it were not for the fact that the ministers and laymen worked with us so splendidly. They are kind, friendly, hospitable, co-operative and sympathetic.

The ministers' wives are second to none. Our heart goes out to every one of them for the great and marvelous job they do continuously for Conference Claimants. The monies they raise are not apportioned; they volunteer to raise a definite amount. Their ambition is not to lead; (however, they get a kick out of it when they do); it is to do the best they possibly can for their brothers and sisters who are less fortunate than they.

Some of us have not added one soul to our membership. According to what Bishop Shaw told us at our Efficiency Conference, we have failed. Let us go down from this conference with a resolution that we shall never again come to the Conference without being instrumental in having brought some one to Christ.

Remember that regardless of how difficult the situation may seem to be, we are not alone in this business. We have that assurance in Isa. 41:10, which is beautifully put in poetic form in one of our hymns:

"Fear not, I am with thee, O be not dismayed,
For I am thy God, and will still give thee aid;
I'll strengthen thee, help thee, and cause thee to stand,
Upheld by my righteous, Omnipotent hand."

Bishop Shaw, Fellow Ministers and Friends:

Among other things, the Discipline said to me—you are to travel the District in order to preach and oversee the spiritual and temporal affairs of the Church. I want to report this morning to the best of my knowledge and ability, that I have endeavored to do my best. I frankly admit that I am only a novice in this office. I can readily see where I might have, at certain points, done better. One thing, however, I do know is, I have tried my best to do what I felt was best for the advancement of the Kingdom of God, and also do unto every minister on the district, and layman, as I would like for them to do unto me.

I want to thank Rev. E. H. Crampton who preceded me in this office. I have tried to carry on the work as I found it. I have made no changes in procedure. I have been studying each Charge to see what improvements might be suggested. I realize that snap and hasty judgment can be dangerous to any Church or District, therefore, up to date, I have only made a few suggestions.

The Quarterly Conferences have not just been a matter of routine, I have striven to put real content in them. At each Conference, I have permitted questions to be asked about any area of the Church Program. The pastors and members have cooperated wonderfully with this, and I want to thank them most heartily for their cooperation.

Deaths

Rev. A. A. McKenzie, our pastor in Englewood, after a long illness, went to be with God on October 30, 1950. Also, the widow of the late Rev. W. C. Bowland, for God took her on January 29, 1951.

Sickness

A number of our ministers, wives, and children have been sick this year. Namely: Rev. J. W. Parker, Mrs. J. W. Parker, Mrs. S. M. Emptage, Mrs. C. B. Miles, Mrs. C. J. Williams, Rev. C. D. Gerald and others.

The Advance

I have kept before the Quarterly Conferences the total Program of the Church. The Advance for Christ and His Church, and the Bishop's Guild. 12 Charges have advanced the pastor's salary for next year.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service

The Woman's Society of Christian Service has a very constructive and effective program. I am happy to say that the Woman's Society of Christian Service is organized in every Charge, with one exception.

The President, Mrs. Mary Peaker and her staff are to be congratulated for the interest manifested. They have visited the churches that needed them most.

Methodist Men

The Methodist Men are taking on new life. There are twelve churches that have secured the new Charter. The District Lay Leader, Mr. Roy L. Corderoy, is working for a Methodist Men's Organization in every Charge on the district.

A Brief Picture of the Charges

I wish it were possible to give in detail the things that have been done in each Charge, but time and space will not permit.

ST. JOHN'S, NEWARK (I. R. Elzey). This church and pastor are really walking on air. They wear a perpetual smile. They are all pulling together in the same direction. The auxiliaries and committees are falling over each other to see which can do the best job.

The parsonage has been completely renovated from roof to cellar. New paper, paint and all new furniture. They are looking for a larger building in order to carry on their expansion program. We think we have found a building that will meet their needs. Additions to Church Membership 59. Total raised for World Service \$777.00. (a) Other Benevolence Askings \$463.00. does lend itself to a vigorous program of advance along all lines in Kingdom building. The church is crowded each Sunday. Also, the Church School. Additions to Church Membership 73. Total raised for World Service \$406.00. (a) Other Benevolence Askings \$993.00. Total Ministerial Support \$3,932.00. Grand total raised for all Causes \$21,582.00.

MT. ZION, PHILADELPHIA (C. W. Derrickson). I feel that this church has the best educational and recreational program on the district. The social and recreational workers make this community program possible and effective. The work is growing nicely. The church is open each day of the week and as a result, both the youth and adults are being trained for future services. The pastor is developing wonderful creative ability and technique. Additions to Church Membership 86. Total raised for World Service \$589.00. (a) Other Benevolence Askings \$465.00. Total Ministerial Support \$3,880.00. Grand total raised for all Causes \$16,084.00.

PENIEL, PHILADELPHIA (J. W. Elbert). The way the pastor has been able to revive this church is most amazing. A new roof which has been needed on the church for quite a long time has been completed at a cost of \$3,270. A new oil heating system has been installed at a cost of \$2,400. A debt of \$600 for 9 years for taxes and sewer rent has been liquidated.

The principal eulogy was delivered by The Rev. R. C. Hughes, who has prepared a suitable memoir. Brother Purnell was a true "son of the soil," who for many years preached the Gospel.

On Monday, April 23rd, 1951, while preparing to attend the annual conference, the wife of Rev. R. T. Croswell, Withams, Va., was stricken and passed to her reward in a few minutes.

The Salisbury District takes delight in the birth of a baby girl, Carrol Ann, to Rev. and Mrs. H. E. Anderson, Leemont, Va. The Ministers wives gave gifts.

District Retrospect

Perhaps the most stirring event of the year was "the march" of seven hundred alert citizens to meet the Governor of the State of Maryland, at the Capitol in Annapolis. In pointed addresses, they were represented in a mighty protest against the possible closing of our College at Princess Anne, established in 1886 by the Delaware Conference, later purchased by the State. The demand is that this College remain and be standardized as the cultural center of higher learning for the Peninsula.

On Sunday, April 1, Bishop Shaw visited our District. He preached at Stockton, Md., in the morning; then again in the afternoon he addressed the Virginia Subdistrict group at Wattsville, Va. On April 5th, at Snow Hill, Md., he attended our annual Climax Day and spoke. When one hears Bishop Shaw, there is felt to be something finer in the man than anything he says. We quote Emerson: "People know that need in their representatives much more than talent, namely, a power to make his talent trusted. Our public assemblies are pretty good tests of manly power. The populace have a taste for character, such men are the conscience of society." In Bishop Shaw, "we view a great principle and a great faith lodged in a person." We pray God's continued blessing upon him and his esteemed wife. There is yet time to make the proposed Bishop's Guild a monumental token of our abiding esteem.

The year's program of Christian Education was featured by the groups meeting at Maryland State College: The Delaware Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, The Salisbury District Youth Assembly, The Inter-denominational Ministers Institute; also The midwinter groups institutes held at Parksley, Va., Pocomoke City and Salisbury, Md.

The Delmarva Peninsula is a land teeming with opportunities for highest attainment in life and in service. The future of our Conference depends on what we do here for the people where Methodism got its historic beginning.

The church exists to witness for God and for Christ, to lift before the eyes of men the ideal life realized only in Christ. As christians we must view ourselves as set apart, the Ecclesia, "called out" to achieve the Kingdom of God on earth.

DEALS ISLAND (C. B. White). The pastor began the year with great prospects, but results have been moderate. Accessions 7; benevolences \$165; other askings \$70; ministerial support \$1661, total \$1964.

FRUITLAND (S. E. Parker). Capable leadership continues to call forth a people's devotion. All benevolences raised in full \$560; for painting Mt. Calvary Church and roofing of parsonage, furniture for Friendship Church raised \$1,800. Grand total \$4900. Accessions 8.

GIRDLETREE (L. H. Purnell). A 100% response to all benevolences \$507; ministerial support \$1997; for current expenses \$600; for building and improvements \$3165. Pastor is urged to return for \$200 advance in salary. Total \$6025.

GREENWOOD (I. H. White). This charge decided to do better and did. Last year for ministerial support \$1443, this year \$1948; for benevolence \$437; for all purposes \$2837. Accessions 5.

HOPEWELL (G. H. Jones). Hopewell makes the best report in its history. For ministerial support \$1928; for benevolences \$455, last year only \$56. Raised for all purposes \$4730. The pastor gets every asking everytime. Accessions 2.

HORNTOWN (E. H. White). For 13 years this pastor and people have carried on with uniform success. Despite ill health a vallant captain leads on. He is invited to return. All regular collections raised in full, \$335; ministerial support \$1976; for trustees \$714. Total \$3098. Accessions.

KELLER-EXMORE (H. W. Spencer). A new charge responds to a diligent leader. Exmore has accepted her share of obligations. Raised for ministerial support \$1100; for trustees \$300; for benevolence \$100. Total \$1500. Both churches urgently request the pastors return.

LEEMONT (H. E. Anderson). Strong and confident, this charge leads in many respects. Raised for ministerial support \$2660; for benevolences \$462; Trustees Total for all purposes \$. . . . The church properties are among the finest of the district. The pastor promotes the educational work of the charge. Accessions 5.

MANOKIN (R. A. Graham). This charge has not done well this year. We believe the pastor faithfully presents the program of the church. Raised for ministerial support \$1678; other collections \$234; for trustees \$670. Total \$2582. Accessions

MARION STATION (George W. Taylor). The two churches make a good team, under the energetic pastor who drives on like Jehu of old. The Handy Memorial church was compelled to undertake the repairs on the church edifice which have reached a total cost of \$16,000. But in addition, the basement is being fully modernized; equipped with oil burner and a kitchen outlay that is unexcelled on the district. Raised for ministerial support \$2433; for benevolences \$453; for trustees \$4682. The Board of Home Missions and Church Extension is giving support. Accessions 14.

MARUMSCO-KINGSTON (Alexander Reid). After five vigorous years, his hand is strong and the people steady in their support. Raised for ministerial support \$2575; the score in benevolences \$641; for trustees \$1725; Total \$4941. Accessions 2.

MT. VERNON (G. V. Bell). This charge falls back in benevolent giving. The trustees raised \$1,000 for improvements, early in the year, then left the pastor to struggle for the collections. Paid on benevolences \$248; on ministerial support \$1719. Total \$2967. Accessions 3.

NANTICOKE (J. W. Mickle). The pastor is an outstanding preacher and a man of God. Raised for ministerial support \$1928; for benevolence \$331; for trustees Total Accessions

OAKVILLE (G. W. Johnson). Oakville is contented and active under devout leadership. Ministerial support \$1500; benevolences \$206; Trustees \$800. Total \$2658. Accessions . . . Improvement and repairs made on parsonage.

ORIOLE (Alexander Boggs). A good preacher and a busy wife have won another invitation to return. The charge advances slightly. Raised for ministerial support \$1581; for benevolence \$302; for trustees \$779; for all purposes \$2533. Accessions ...

PARSONBURG (R. W. Dennis). Brother Dennis is an ordained elder, a transfer from the A.M.E. Church, who again puts his charge on the honor roll. Three churches do excellent team work. The salary was advanced to \$1800. Ministerial support \$2191; raised for benevolences \$413; for the trustees \$1174. Total \$3898. Accessions 4.

POCOMOKE CITY (G. H. McMurray). This church maintains; the pastor fits the situation. Raised for ministerial support \$2601; for benevolences \$377; for trustees \$1250. Total \$4148. Accessions 2.

PRINCESS ANNE (W. E. Stanley). In this classic community an amiable and eloquent pastor holds the interest of all sorts of people. He is esteemed at Maryland State College. The charge advances. Ministerial support in full \$2703; benevolences \$38; debt on new organ paid \$1200; on improvements \$100. Total \$1300; other expense \$825; Total \$5357. Return of the pastor is requested. Accessions 5.

QUANTICO (J. W. Hayman). Last year the pastor was too ill to attend conference. He recovered and reports all askings in full with money in treasury. Salary automatically advanced from \$1600 to \$1800, paid. Raised for Trustees \$983; for all purposes \$4100.

SALISBURY—JOHN WESLEY (C. E. Elder). The pastor is modest and masterful. He is invited to return. Raised for ministerial support \$2557; paid on benevolences \$500; on building fund \$2250; on current expenses and improvements \$1476; miscellaneous \$474. Total \$7150. This charge merits help from our advance special fund. Accessions 3.

SALISBURY—WHITES TEMPLE (H. D. Davis). An easy going parish has become a busy community center. Every department of the church is active. The pastor's salary has been advanced twice. It is now \$2200.00. Instead of rallies a budget plan meets every need. The church has been beautifully remodeled. Raised by the trustees \$2457; for benevolences \$498; grand total \$5576. Accessions 4.

SNOW HILL (G. E. Geddes). Although handicapped by much unemployment this charge has maintained a good record. Benevolences \$614; for trustees \$1300; total ministerial support \$2670; grand total \$4584. The pastor knows his work.

SNOW HILL—STOCKTON CT. (L. W. Jones). The merger of a portion of two circuits has lifted pastoral support and improved the morale of the churches. Total ministerial support \$1360; for benevolences \$170; for trustees \$1339, grand total \$2862. The pastor is invited to return. He leads on gently. Accessions 2.

STOCKTON (A. W. Coffey). The pastor is secure in the affectionate regard of the people. St. Mark's temporarily attached to this charge demands to stay as a mission point. The salary of the pastor advanced to \$1500. Raised for benevolence \$300; paid on remodeling the church building \$1900; for trustees \$785; (St. Marks on salary \$361. For trustees \$153). Grand total for the year \$5,000.

UNION-ASBURY-LIBERIA (M. C. Anderson). The pastor has a winning way, and a capable wife which makes for continued success. Involuntary unemployment in and about Crisfield has halted the advance of the church. They report ministerial support \$2295; benevolences \$400; trustees

UNIONVILLE (G. O. Commodore). The pastor is pleasing and progressive; his wife is a competent musician. The financial report is moderate. Raised for benevolences \$336; for ministerial support \$2086; for trustees \$1,093; grand total for all purposes \$3422. The parsonage has been improved and old debts paid.

UPPER HILL (R. S. Townsend). This charge has done a commendable job on the church at a cost of \$1265, all of which has been paid. In addition \$466 has been paid for current expense. They report \$42 on World Service, last year \$152. Total benevolence in all \$163. Raised for all purposes \$3465. The desire is strong to unite with another church. This should be considered.

WACHAPREAGUE (E. J. Johnson). This charge reports \$144 raised on benevolences; \$1581 ministerial support; trustees \$. . . . The pastor has been faithful in his service to his people.

WATTSVILLE (E. A. Hughes). This charge has carried on considerable improvements on church and parsonage during the year. Raised for current expenses \$716; for parsonage improvements \$532; for church improvements \$637; total for trustees \$2000. For ministerial support \$2500; for benevolences \$470; grand total \$4970. Accessions 4.

WETIPQUIN (C. H. Cottingham). The pastor was persuaded to give the trustees priority during the earlier months of the year, and because of this the charge came out behind on benevolences for the first time in six years. However, he is a good leader. Raised for trustees, \$1100; for ministerial support \$1876; benevolences \$287. Accessions 2.

WHITE HAVEN (Roy S. Ennis). A unique mutual esteem has developed between pastor and people, and the result as a whole has been gratifying. The salary is advanced for next conference year from \$1400 to \$1600 with both churches concurring. Total raised for benevolences \$286; for ministerial support \$1700; for parsonage and church repairs, painting and current expenses \$780. Grace church has \$600 for a church community annex. Total for all purposes \$3396. Accessions. 9.

WITHAMS (R. T. Crowell). Under the present pastorate this charge knows no defeat. World Service in full. Total benevolences \$411. Paid to trustees on old debt \$1,163; improvements \$963; other expenses \$1598. Grand total for the charge \$6,471. His return is requested. Accessions 7,

Summary

Total new members reported from the charges 140; additions to the preparatory list 200; total full members on District 4815. Preparatory members on roll 900. Grand total of members 5,755. The revision of sadly neglected rolls is being carried forward.

Increases are observed in Conference Claimants, World Service, and Ministerial Support payments. The only debts are those acquired this year, with the exception of the new church debt at Exmore, with a mortgage of \$3300, and John Wesley Salisbury with a balance of \$4000 on a former debt

of \$14,000. The people have a mind to work, and the leadership is eager for advancement along all lines.

Laymen must help the pastor maintain our connectional support while cooperating in local church improvements. There is no reason for deserting a pastor who tries to do his full task.

In the name of our Christ we pledge our continued support to the total program of the Methodist Church.

MT. CARMEL, WILMINGTON, O'Connell Milbourne, pastor. This congregation continues to grow. The pastor is a good preacher and an excellent organizer. All apportionments are paid in full and the charge with 100 accessions leads the district in membership increase. World Service and Conference Benevolences \$250.00. Conference Claimants \$276.00. Raised for all purposes \$3,535.00.

MT. HOLLY, J. E. A. Johns, pastor. Whether he has a large congregation, or not a handful of members, this pastor always makes a full report. World Service and Conference Benevolences \$132.00. Conference Claimants \$53.00. \$5,000.00 was spent in improving church and parsonage, oil burner system installed in both. Johns may come and Johns may go but J. E. A. Johns goes on forever.

MT. JOY, WILMINGTON, J. U. Watson, pastor. This pastor is a hard working loyal pastor. He always has a good report. The church building has been reroofed and an oil burner system installed in the same. A lot

has been purchased for the building of a church annex in the future to provide kitchen, recreational, and educational facilities. Accessions 5. World Service and Conference Benevolences \$204.00. Conference Claimants \$240.00. Raised for all purposes \$7,503.00.

ST. DANIEL'S, CHESTER, W. L. D. Lyght, pastor. This pastor and people know nothing but a 100% report. Every claim has been met. Accessions 110. World Service and Conference Benevolences \$1,242.00. Advance

Fund \$300.00. Bishop's Guild \$100.00. Conference Claimants \$384.00. Raised for all purposes \$20,771.00.

WOODBURY CHARGE, Charles Spencer, pastor. This is a two point circuit, both points weak, the outlook is fair for a large number of dwelling units are being built near the church. An aggressive visitation evangelism campaign may alter the picture. The church at Woodbury has been renovated inside, the parsonage improved on the outside, the pastor who is a builder and painter did both jobs. Some benevolences were raised.

The effect of the great Laymen's Meeting held at Laurel, Delaware, on the men of our district has been phenomenal. Out of 34 charges 28 have organized their Methodist Men and many have received their charters.

Our Methodist Youth Institute was held co-jointly with the Philadelphia District at Camp Hilltop. For inspiration, entertainment, and recreational facilities Camp Hilltop cannot be excelled. The camp has facilities for tennis, swimming, baseball, and other sports. The class room work was par-excellent. Our district has set as its goal for this year a representative from every charge.

If we may boast, just a little, out of 34 charges 23 held Daily Vacation Bible Schools. Our goal for this year is 30 Daily Vacation Bible Schools on the district.

In all of our educational work we have had the able assistance and encouragement of our Conference Executive Secretary, Rev. Howard A. Bailey. Rev. H. H. Nichols has inspired our workers.

Missionary Opportunity

Ever on the alert for extending the Kingdom, we are happy to report that a bright outlook for a missionary project is on the Robinson farm and the nearby communities. Assisted by the Board of Missions, we sent Brother William Tasco and Brother J. P. Bell to make surveys. On the Robinson farm we have a fine opportunity. Brother Tasco reports in his survey 207 homes occupied:—103 visited, 82 children will attend a church school, if nearby, regularly 62 at sometime. 44 visited and 35 made no promise. The adults will attend a church if one is started. This is supposed to be confidential, a friend has promised to donate a lot for a chapel. We plan to thoroughly investigate the whole field, if permitted to do so, after conference. There is an underground rumor that interested white friends are ready to back, financially, any missionary effort that is started in that community.

I am certain that this year's report will show advance along all lines.

I, again, want to thank the splendid pastors and laymen for their fine cooperation in the work on the district and Bishop Shaw for the opportunity of service.

We anticipate, with deep regret, the hour when our great leader shall be retired. I believe the Delaware Conference has acquired more church buildings and established more new congregations during his residency over our conference than in any similar period in its history.

We feel it would be a fitting tribute to a great leader if the entire conference will resolve to make the ensuing year the banner year of all the years.

DELAWARE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EDUCATION

ANNUAL REPORT 1951

"In all modern history but one national leader, and he not a professing Christian, has had the faith and courage to follow the precepts of Jesus and rely on the spiritual weapons of non-resistance and soul force to achieve his end, Gandhi of India. The Church can still save civilization from destruction, but it can do so only by a reliance upon the power of love and spiritual weapons." So speaks Chester A. Smith.

The entire task of Christian education is to foster faith and courage so that people will follow the precepts of Jesus and rely upon the power of love and spiritual weapons to achieve a better world for all the people.

In accordance with Paragraph 1449 of the Discipline which states "The board shall report its proceedings and policies to the Annual Conference, including the treasurer's report, showing all resources and liabilities of the board," we respectfully call your attention to the Year Book. This Book is a clear account of our activities during the Conference year. It represents many days of work on the part of our office secretary, the Executive Secretary, and the Board President, as well as many hours spent during the year keeping the records up to date.

We can report to you that both the Board Treasurer and the Youth Fellowship treasurer are bonded by Febly and Strouse. The treasurers' books showing regular deposits, cancelled checks were submitted and approved by auditors.

Preparing for Christian Service—The local church is at the center of the work and program of the Delaware Conference Board of Education. It is through the local church that we make our contribution in preparing people for Christian service.

Our Executive Secretary gives his full time maintaining a direct service to the local church. He does this in the following ways:

- 1—Visiting, upon invitation, the church school of any church while in session, and observing the program of work.
- 2—Meeting with teachers and officers of the Church School to discuss the results of his observations, to offer suggestions to the teachers and superintendents of ways in which their work may be improved.
- 3—By using Audio-visual aids and Film Strips.
- 4—By personal conferences with pastors or general superintendents, or both on the work of the church school, or some phase thereof.
- 5—By meeting with one or more of the youth groups in the local church, or with officers, to help the young people understand their part in the total religious program of the church; to help them with their problems of organization; to help them plan better programs, and to understand the Methodist Youth Fellowship.
- 6—By meeting with one or more of the organized adult groups in the church to help them understand their part in the total religious education program of their church; to help them in their problems of organization; to help them plan better programs.
- 7—By participating in special programs of Christian education as planned from time to time by the local church, where there is opportunity to help

acquaint the local congregation with the purpose of Christian education in the church, and the work of the local church to forward that end.

- 8—By assisting in planning any phase of the educational work of the church, such as vacation church schools, leadership training classes, and missionary education.

Camp Conferences, and Institutes—The summer offers numerous opportunities for the children, youth and adults of our churches to have enriching experiences in Christian fellowship and study. It is our policy to maintain a forward look and follow the trends of our time in summer activities.

The Morgan College Assembly last summer proved to be a very helpful experience. For three years now there has been sponsored by the Philadelphia and Wilmington Districts a joint summer Camp in the Hills of Downington, Pa. This camp is for Intermediates while Morgan College Assembly is for Seniors and older youth. We believe that church camping has a very valuable contribution to make to the Christian growth of the individual.

Scholarship and Student Aid—Our Conference has long since recognized the need of helping worthy young people to acquire an education. Following the action of the 1949 Annual Conference all scholarships are now administered by the Board of Education. We have been able to help seven young people this year, granting a total of \$1,055.00 to worthy students.

In brief this is a report of some of the outstanding projects of the Board of Education. For a more detailed report we refer you to the special issue of our 1951 Year Book, listing the reports of all staff workers and activities.

We mark our Eighteenth Birthday at this session of the Annual Conference. During these years I have seen the word "Christian Education" redeemed, an effective program established, increased interest manifested, volunteer lay workers set afire for God.

The world is sick and worried and all confused. The great Commission is still, "Go Teach." May God's richest blessings be upon our 200 or more volunteer workers, our pastors, District Superintendents, and Bishop, and fill your hearts with real joy in His service. Remember, among men there stands always Jesus Christ as Saviour and the hope which shall never fail. Behind the clouds of human struggles and sorrow, the sun of God's final victory is shining.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY TO THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Bishop Shaw, members of the Conference, fellow workers in the Board of Education and friends. I am happy for this opportunity to make this my eighth Annual report to this body.

May I assure you of my deep appreciation for your loyal support of, and active participation in, the program which you have entrusted to us and which we have sought to promote throughout the conference. I feel certain that no Executive Secretary and his staff of workers have been more favored with the support of their Bishop and their Board of Education than ours.

Likewise the creative planning and wholehearted cooperation on the part of the District Superintendents and their district staffs have been through the years an ever increasing source of inspiration. The Conference age group Directors who head their respective staffs, have done excellent work in promoting their share of the total program. Their reports which appear elsewhere in this booklet speak for themselves.

District Activities

It was a most rewarding experience for me and other members of the Conference staff to participate in a number of district meetings during the year. Early in the year we met all of the district superintendents and their staffs. In these meetings we sought to evaluate the conference program as it affects the district. Helpful discussions were engaged in from which we received a number of good suggestions.

I am happy to learn that the Philadelphia District has been conducting discussion periods on different phases of Christian Education, at the regular monthly Preachers meetings. These discussions are conducted by the District Superintendent and his staff.

The Easton District has a class for Pastors in all of its Christian Workers' Schools. These classes were taught by the District Superintendent. The Dover District employed Miss Mildred Nero, a full-time worker in Christian Education, during the summer months. Miss Nero rendered valuable services in the local churches where she served. The Salisbury and Wilmington Districts also gave considerable time to Christian Education in their monthly preachers meetings and other district meetings.

There are reports in this booklet of other district activities such as, Youth Institutes, Young Adult Fellowship Workshops, Vacation Church School Institutes, Seminars for Adult workers with Youth and Subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools.

We rejoice in the success of these activities which have been designed to improve the work of Christian Education in the local churches of the districts. I am confident that they are steps in the right direction.

Local Church Engagements

Opportunities to serve the local churches are always much appreciated. These contacts keep one in touch with the actual situations as they exist. They also give opportunity to make available to teachers and others, resources which serve as helps. Whenever I am invited to speak at a worship service I seek also to have an opportunity to meet the church school workers.

The number of local situations in which I may get in in a given year may not be large in comparison to the need, when we take into account that the whole conference is my field. Nevertheless, I do welcome such invitations and trust that pastors and others will not hesitate to call upon me. Listed among such services during the year were: preaching at regular worship services; teaching a regular church school class of Young Adults; meeting with workers conferences; meeting with local boards of education; participating in age group work-shops; informal meetings with pastors and church school workers and many other contacts in the nature of counseling workers on the job.

I would also like to encourage a larger number of subdistrict meetings with church school workers, where a number of local churches may be served on one occasion. Where this has been done the results have been gratifying.

Cooperation With Other Conference Boards and Agencies

We are only too well aware that we do not work alone at our task. There are other Conference Boards which are charged with responsibilities that are so closely related to ours that their success is our success and vice-versa. It was my privilege to work with the Board of Evangelism on three districts during the period of their schools on Visitation Evangelism. These training enterprises, plus the practical application of soul winning techniques, revealed the great responsibilities which lie in the realm of house to house contacts, both for Christian education and evangelism. It was a great source of joy to see boys and girls, young people, men and women coming to the church and giving themselves to Christ as a result of these schools. More power to Dr. H. R. Coleman, Rev. J. O. Lockman and their workers in evangelism.

The major cooperative enterprise of the year was the Conference on Church Vocations under the general leadership of the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations of the Washington and Delaware Conferences. A more detailed account of the work of this commission, including the Conference referred to above, appears elsewhere in this booklet. We have enjoyed the usual fine fellowship of service with the Woman's Society of Christian Service, The Board of Lay Activities and the Board of Ministerial Training.

Cooperation With Other Conferences

More and more the Jurisdictional lines are being broken down through the setting up of regional projects in the area of the Northeastern Jurisdiction. Twelve of our Children's Workers participated in the Phila.-New Jersey laboratory school held at Beaver College, Jenkinstown, Pa. Mrs. Maude S. Clark, our Conference Director of Children's Work and Mrs. Emma W. Strother, the Director of the Wilmington District, received scholarships and were given special work as prospective instructors in a laboratory school.

The Board Chairman, The Executive Secretary and Rev. M. O. Ballard were enrolled in a leadership school sponsored by the Northeastern Jurisdiction at Buck Hill Falls in January.

Our youth continue to be well represented at the N. Eastern Regional Conference every summer. Our Youth Director, Rev. Henry H. Nichols has been chosen as the Dean of Men for the 1951 session.

The fellowship of the Washington Conference in some of our projects has been a source of inspiration and has been mutually helpful.

Church School Enrollment

We regret to report that for the first time in recent years our Church School enrollment shows a marked decrease. As the Journal of the last Conference will show, we sustained a loss of 2109 or 9% of the total. There are many factors which give reason to believe that the error is somewhere in the report rather than actually a loss of persons from the rolls of our

schools. Nevertheless, the figures I have just quoted will be sent all over the church.

No doubt we can do much to increase the enrollment of our church schools, but I feel that if we can improve the accuracy of the reports to the annual conference a much better picture would result.

Some Suggested Projects

Here are a few ideas which may be suggestive for future planning.

1. Seminars for Pastors in Christian Education on a district or sub-district level.
2. Church School workers conferences on a subdistrict level, where conference and district workers may serve as resource persons.
3. Local church visits to churches where the District Superintendent discovers a need and assists in getting an invitation extended to conference or district staff workers.
4. Conference wide participation in an interconference Laboratory school for Children's Workers.
5. One day conferences on church school work on each district under the General Board of Education Leadership.

Changes In Our Staff

A few days after the session of the Annual Conference we were saddened by the passing of Mrs. Caddie Ridout, our Conference Director of Children's Work. The genuine Christian spirit and loyalty which characterized all of her labors are an inspiration to those of us who seek to carry on the work to which she gave her last full measure of devotion.

Mrs. Maude Clark, the former Director of the Salisbury District, was elected to fill the vacancy created by Mrs. Ridout's death. Coming as she did with a wealth of experience in Children's work, Mrs. Clark has led the Children's Council in a most effective manner during the year.

Rev. J. R. Shockley succeeded Rev. O. S. Edwards as Director of Adult work of the Easton District. Because of ill health Rev. Edwards gave up the directorship at the Annual Conference. Rev. Shockley has served well in his new office.

Opportunities For Service Outside The Conference By Members of Our Staff

Miss Marion Cottman, Conference President of the Young Adult Fellowship, has been selected through the General Board of Education, as a delegate to attend the Ecumenical Methodist Conference at Oxford, England, August 28—September 7, 1951. The group will also attend the British Conference on Christian Youth held at Bongor, Wales, August 24-31.

Miss Cottman will be one of twelve Young Adults who will represent America at these conferences.

Mrs. Emma W. Strother, Director, of the Wilmington District has recently been appointed to serve as the Director of the Laboratory School for Children's Workers which will be held as a part of the Central Jurisdictional Leadership School held at Morristown College, Morristown, Tenn., July 5-12, 1951.

Mr. Herbert Wise, former President of the Conference Young Adult Fellowship will serve as an instructor in the Jurisdiction School.

Rev. Henry H. Nichols, Conference Director of Youth Work, will serve as Dean of Men of the Northeastern Regional Youth Leadership Conference held at Lycoming College, Williamsport, Pa., July 21-28, 1951.

We are indeed grateful for these honors which have come to some of the leaders in our conference in the field of Christian Education. It gives us a sense of pride to feel that there are those among us who have a contribution to make to these great movements beyond the conference. We shall all be the richer because of what they can bring to us upon their return.

An Appreciation

One can not attempt to report the work done in any phase of the church without feeling a deep sense of gratitude to every person who has contributed to its accomplishment. There are no means of measuring the amount of unselfish labor and sincere devotion which has been freely given on the part of a host of pastors, volunteer workers of the conference staff; district staffs and of the local churches. For them we truly thank God.

Conclusion

The Discipline, paragraph 181, states. "Christian Education — is the process through which individuals and groups grow and develop in their relationship to God, in their understanding of the Christian way of life, in attitude, habits, and conduct which is in harmony with the spirit and teaching of Jesus Christ as these are revealed in the Bible, and as reflected in the lives of Christian persons. Decisions for Christ and the church under the influence of Christian teaching and the Holy Spirit are necessary and normal experiences in the process of growth and development."

This paragraph refers to Christian Education in the local church. We regard our major task to be that of helping the local church to achieve these ends. Our success or failure, finally must be measured by the growth of Christian persons and Christian groups in the local churches and in the communities where these churches are located. The activities in which we have engaged and those which we propose have this as their common objective.

"The hand of the Lord is not shortened that it cannot save." We seek to help Him to save through a rededication of our lives, our efforts and our all to Him and His Church.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

Bishop Shaw, members of the Conference and Friends, it is with a deep sense of responsibility for the task committed to us that we the members of the Commission on Christian Vocations make this our first report to an Annual Conference session. You have given us the responsibility for enlisting

young people in the pursuit of Christian vocations with a special emphasis upon commitments to vocations within the church.

It is common knowledge that the church needs trained professional leadership. The need is urgent for Pastors, workers in Christian Education, Nurses, Missionaries, Teachers in our Church related colleges and many other areas of church vocations. Within our own conference we must have young men to prepare themselves for the ministry if our churches are to meet the growing demands which are made upon them to lead our people in these difficult days.

Your Commission, since its inception two years ago, has been planning and working in an effort to bring to our young people the challenge of the call to serve in the church and in Christian vocations in general.

This challenge has been made in the following ways:

1. Through a class on Christian vocations and a Commitment Service at the Summer Youth Assembly.
2. At the District Youth Institutes.
3. Through Pastoral counseling and Commitment services in the local churches.

Conference on Church Vocations

From the various sources listed above we compiled a list of young people who had made the commitment to some church vocation. Forty of these young people were invited to attend a conference on church vocations held jointly with the Washington Conference at Ezion Church March 9-11, 1951. Of those invited from our conference 21 were present. From the Washington Conference 12 were present. The choices of vocations were as follows from our conference. The Ministry 5, Missions 2, Nursing 4, Christian Education 5, Social Work 3, Physician 1 and undecided 1.

These young people all receive special guidance in their chosen fields from representatives from the General Board of the Church. Members of the Commission are serving as advisors to each of these youth. It is our purpose to keep in contact with these prospective leaders of our church until they shall have made their preparations and shall have found places to serve the church as full-time workers.

We feel quite certain that there are many more young people in our churches who have not yet been asked to consider a vocation within the church. We, therefore, urge our pastors to seek to discover in their youth fellowship those who may be inclined to hear and answer the call. Each Pastor has received a packet of material from The Advance office which is designed to help him in the matter of counseling and recruiting for church vocations. We call special attention to the booklet "Counseling for Church Vocations" by Ewing, which is in the packet.

During the coming year the commission will promote a program similar to the one promoted this year. We greatly desire the cooperation of the churches in our efforts to give guidance to our youth in this most important step in their lives.

We wish to express our appreciation to the Conference Boards and Agencies which cooperated in every way to make our Conference on Church

Vocations a success. They are: The Boards of Education, Lay Activities, Evangelism, Missions, The Woman's Society of Christian Service, Conference Methodist Youth Fellowship and The Institute Commission. The Commission Treasurer's report on page 38 of this booklet gives the amount contributed by these organizations.

We express thanks also to Bishop Shaw, who has greatly encouraged the work and who delivered a most helpful sermon to the Conference on Church Vocations in its Sunday Morning session.

With confidence that we are doing a work which may well contribute to the Advance of the church and to the building of the Kingdom of God, we shall continue our task as we are led by Him who said, "Follow Me."

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Several isms are bidding for the control and guidance of the human races throughout our world today—outstanding because of its aggressiveness, is Communism—but the only ism that can meet the needs of the world at this time is Evangelism. The UN armies may win a war in Korea, China and in Russia, if needs be—but it will not be a victory over Communism—it will not succeed in removing the demon from the hearts of men, "This kind goeth out by faith only."

The Evangelistic Program of the Methodist Church is geared to meet this and any emergency, and will do so whenever and wherever enough trained and Consecrated Christian workers are available for Evangelistic service.

According to Statistics coming from the General Board of Evangelism—Of the 170 charges of the Delaware Conference—the following is the record of Barren Charges (No conversions—No accessions):

1948—31

1949—40

1950—35

The Evangelistic effort is spotty—The need is for all out united effort.

It is the Business of the Church to Evangelize—To win men and women—young people—and children to CHRIST and HIS way of life—And to help them become like their LORD and SAVIOUR. We are in the third phase of the Advance for CHRIST and HIS Church—Our Ministry—To be followed beginning June 1st by the fourth and final Phase—OUR MISSION—All of which is an Assimilation Program—Designed to make Better Christians. The Methodist Church will present another great Program for the next quadrenium. Our readiness for that Program will depend largely upon how well the Advance Program has been used.

The General Board of Evangelism has designated Family Week—May 6-13, as a period for a special Visitation Campaign to complete the family circle—to make the entire family Christian—and that since Mother's Day

and Pentecost Day will be celebrated on the same day—May 13th—that it be made a day for the ingathering of precious Souls and the consecration of new members. The Goal: To commune as many Christian Families as possible on that day. May we urge that Evangelistic Project be strictly adhered to—May we Suggest that—the grouping of charges where no Sub-District group exists—Pooling of Workers for the success of the movement—that one might be used for a preaching Service.

Activities of the Conference Board of Evangelism

Your Board has held two regular meetings this year—and one executive meeting—Planned and conducted three Institutes of Evangelism—On the Salisbury, Easton and Dover Districts respectively—November 5th-10th. At Princess Anne, Easton—and Milford—For Pastors and workers—The attendance was Fair to Good—The Conference Board of Education co-operated in these Institutes—The Executive Secretary was with us and taught classes and delivered addresses.

From these Institutes have come some notable results—Of special importance was the campaign of Visitation and Pulpit Evangelism conducted by the Milford Group, of the Dover District, which lasted 10 weeks. One characteristic of the meetings was overflow crowds—Results: Church attendance in those five charges has doubled—Organizations that were lagging have taken on new life and vigor. Regular Sunday morning collections increased 40%.

2. That in accordance with the invitation and desire of the General Board of Evangelism—Each District will send its District Secretary of Evangelism to the Conference of Secretaries to be held at Albion College, Albion, Michigan—July 13-18, 1951.

3. That each Charge maintain a continuous program of Evangelism—Using any Method or combination of methods that will get results—Organize a Visitation Committee and train and consecrate it to the work of Visitation Evangelism—Maintain an Assimilation Program that will weave them into the life of the church—Get them in and keep them in.

J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, in making his report for 1950, stated that, A major crime was committed every 18 seconds during the year—an increase of 1.5 per cent over 1949. On the average, every day, 146 persons were held up and robbed, 468 had their cars stolen. This was considered a conservative report, because exclusively Federal crimes—and others such as arson and embezzlement were not counted. The predominant age among persons arrested was 21. Arrests of males under 21 increased 6.9 per cent—Murder—Manslaughter—Rape—Aggravated Assault—Breaking and Entering—and Theft, showed sizable increases over 1949.

Our task is before us. The church must awaken and gird itself for its task—"Onward Christian Soldiers," for no matter how large our Stock pile of "A" bombs and "H" bombs, it is no guarantee of "Peace on Earth, and Good Will to Men." The mobilization and maintenance of large armies will increase rather than alleviate sin and suffering—and delay the coming of "Peace on Earth."

"For not with swords loud clashing
Nor roll of stirring drum
With deeds of LOVE and mercy
The Heavenly Kingdom comes."

My closing word is a tribute to the leader of Evangelism of the Central Jurisdiction, Dr. J. W. Golden. How one man can accomplish so much is hard to understand, his territory embraces the entire United States and some of the Islands. Dr. Golden's passion is Evangelism, to this cause he has consecrated his life. We pray God's blessing upon him. Our great Area Bishop, Alexander Preston Shaw, has supported every effort put forward by the Conference Board of Evangelism. His interest, wise counsel and advice have been most invaluable.

We are thankful for the support of the following Conference leaders: Holly P. Johns, Pearl R. Spence, Howard A. Bailey, the four District Superintendents, and the rank and file of Ministers and laymen of our beloved Delaware Conference.

REPORT OF TEMPERANCE, TINDLEY TEMPLE, PHILADELPHIA, PA.

Temperance has been defined as moderation in all things. This must not be understood however that a person may be moderately mean. It does require moderation in those things which build personality and total abstinence from those which destroy personality such as the use of alcohol as a beverage.

To establish any system, it is necessary that responsibility be definitely placed somewhere. If therefore the temperance cause is to succeed the home, the school, the church, the state and the nation must each play a vital part.

The home has been defined as the norm of society. Therefore temperance will succeed in society in proportion as it succeeds in the home. Total abstinence is the only safe way to prevent one from becoming an alcoholic. Fathers and mothers therefore, should educate their children in total abstinence from becoming victims of alcohol and also to fit them to become an honor to their parents, to their communities and to their God. It is an axiom that one cannot accept with all his heart that which he has rejected with all his mind. It follows therefore that if total abstinence is not strictly observed by fathers and mothers it will be difficult for children so to do.

The School

This may be the elementary, the high school, the college or the university. There should be complete harmony between the home and these institutions toward the temperance cause. Viewing the situation keenly however, we find here and there a cleavage between them. This arises from the question as to what is permissible and what is not. The vital question

should be what is the reaction of alcohol upon the human system when used as a beverage? Without prejudice it can be clearly seen that destruction is the answer.

Since, therefore, in the school, ideas formed and character crystalized, the said school should lay on plastic mind of the pupil and student the basic principles of temperance. These would constitute a guide to the individual in the years to come.

The State

In the state care should be taken that only candidates favorable to temperance should be elected to office whether the said office be that of the chief executive or the legislature.

The Nation

What is said of the state may also be said of the nation. It must be borne in mind however that the state legislature or the Senate and House may enact into law a measure which has been vetoed by the chief executive.

Recommendations

We recommend that the Board of Temperance of the Methodist Church and kindred institutions be given loyal support.

That the literature sent out by the Board particularly the VOICE be studied. We recommend further that in every district of the conference and in every local church there be maintained a constructive program of temperance education and that at least every quarter the temperance cause be presented to the entire congregation in the church.

We recommend that we support Commitment Day in all of our churches. We also recommend that we support any legislation that outlaws the advertisement of alcoholic beverage over the radio, in newspapers or any other means.

**TENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE DELAWARE CONFERENCE
COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE****1951-1952**

Bishop Alexander P. Shaw, Ministers and Lay Members of the Conference:

In presenting to you our Tenth Annual Report, we bring you greetings and express our highest appreciation for your continued cooperation.

Your Commission On World Service and Finance, held its annual meeting at Tindley Temple, Philadelphia, Pa., Wednesday, March 14, 1951. The primary purpose of the meeting was to set up the budget for the Conference year 1951-1952.

The Commission was keenly aware of its loss of the late Dr. W. J. Helm, our beloved Conference Treasurer. He was an integral part of our Commission. Through the years he rendered efficient service. He was careful in every detail, accurate in reports, possessed a comprehensive grasp on financial affairs and labored with loyal devotion for his Conference. It is our conviction that he more than justified his election to this important office. Our heartfelt sympathy goes out to Mrs. W. J. Helm.

After the last session of our Annual Conference the auditing Committee examined the books of all treasurers. Likewise it audited the books of the deceased Treasurer in February past. These examinations were made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. In our opinion the statements of cash receipts, disbursements and balances were satisfactory.

Your Commission accepted the Cabinet's temporary appointment of Mrs. W. J. Helm and Rev. Walter Hazzard as treasurers. We signed the release as required by the Bonding Company and cooperated with the new appointees in their efforts to distribute finances to the Boards and Agencies of our Conference. The Commission is grateful to Mrs. Helm and Rev. Hazzard for their fine work and cooperative spirits.

It should probably be pointed out that the Commission maintains a deep concern for the Conference Boards and Agencies and their ever mounting needs. The constant pressure and earnest appeals for more financial aid to satisfy the urgent demands of unmet programs rests heavily upon our hearts. We yearn for the day when the spirit of giving in our Local Churches approximates our needs.

Recommendation

We recommend that a Manual of Finance will be mimeographed by the Commission On World Service And Finance, to aid Pastors and Laymen in gaining a better understanding of the financial operations of the Conference and the General program of Methodism. The contents of the Manual being: I. FOREWORD; II. CONFERENCE BUDGET; III. CONFERENCE FINANCIAL PROGRAM, (a) How the budget is determined. (b) How apportioned to the churches. (c) How your money is handled. IV. YOUR DOLLARS AT WORK; V. ADDITIONAL FINANCE ACTIVITIES. We suggest that copies be distributed to official members, and used for study and discussion in Committees and Boards of the Local Churches.

Woman's Society of Christian Service

The Woman's Division of Christian Service is one of the Divisions of the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

"The purpose of the Woman's Division of Christian Service shall be to develop the work among women and children at home and abroad, to cultivate christian family life, to enlist and organize the efforts of christian women, young people and children in behalf of native and foreign groups, needy childhood and community welfare, to assist in the promotion of a missionary spirit through the church, to select, train, and maintain christian workers, to cooperate with its responsibility, and to seek fellowship with christian women of this and other lands, in establishing a christian social

order all over the world." And that is the purpose of the Woman's Society of Christian Service all over the world.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service is the greatest organization in the church, when properly organized and working. In a well organized society, the women speak a universal language, for we are world citizens; because we make an effort to gain more knowledge and insight; with well rounded programs, well planned study classes; and articles in the Methodist Women and World Outlook all serve to hang pictures on the wall of our minds. These stimulate our thinking, keep us sensitive to human needs everywhere; and a knowledge of conditions leads to action.

The vocabulary of this society is soundly religious, the ideas and ideals expressed are christian, an emphasis on the things of the spirit runs through the entire program. The main object of the Woman's Society of Christian Service is to make Christ known to men, women and children of all lands. It is our deepest desire to enrich the spiritual living of the individual member. Christ's mission into the world was for others; the entire program of the Woman's Society of Christian Service is for others.

The women can not do this great task alone, we need the full cooperation of the ministers, much of our work is hindered in the accomplishment of its purpose in the local church due to the lack of proper understanding of the work.

In the conference we have 5 districts, 170 charges, 259 churches, 202 societies, 21 Wesleyan Service Guilds with a membership of 5,537. We have 73 Interest Groups with a membership of 605 and 53 Children Secretaries.

You will note that we are trailing in youth and children's work, throughout the conference, in every local society, we have a young people and children secretary; since we have 202 local societies we should have 202 youth and children secretaries.

The future of our country depends on our youth and children, and the future of the Woman's Society of Christian Service depends on our youth and children; which are being so sorely neglected. It has been well said that children are mirrors of the life around them; if that be true, what a picture they are getting from the life around them today.

How we are neglecting our children is illustrated in this poem, "Too Little."

"Said a precious little laddie, to his father one bright day,
May I give myself to Jesus; Let Him wash my sins away?"

Oh my son, you are too little, wait until you older grow;
Bigger folks, 'tis true, do need Him, little folks are safe, you know.

Said the father to the laddie, as a storm was coming on,
Are the sheep all safely sheltered, safe within the fold my son?

All the big ones are, my father, but the lambs I let them go,
For I didn't think it mattered, little ones are safe you know.

Ere the evil days come nigh then, let the children come to me,
And forbid them not said Jesus, for such shall my kingdom be.

Will you help us save our youth and children?

The worth of the Woman's Society of Christian Service cannot be measured in dollars and cents, because the society is at work in all departments of the church, but after the budget is raised, the societies through the Christian Social Relation and Local Church Activities help wherever

needed in the church, trustees, stewards, World Service and Benevolence or Community. We also support and maintain a Friendship Home, the only one in the Central Jurisdiction supported by a Conference.

We have done a good job, but we are in hopes of doing a better one, when the 57 inactive or unorganized churches join our fellowship. The Discipline charges the pastors with the responsibility of organizing and maintaining a Woman's Society of Christian Service in every church. Why are our ministers dropping out either by illness or death? They are over worked. The minister cannot do all the things they would like to do in each church, so a wise minister will see to it that he has a well organized Woman's Society of Christian Service to help in the work.

The General Church is asking the local churches to study missions, world conditions, seek youth for full time christian service, and to win more children to Christ and His church. The Woman's Society of Christian Service places special emphasis in missions, in christian social relations, and in Bible study. The Missionary Personnel secretary is searching for full and part time workers. The Board of Missions and Church Extension, including the Woman's Society of Christian Service are working together to see that every boy and girl in Methodism are introduced to world wide missionary work of the church, and have an opportunity to participate in carrying on its activities. All this is done through the great organization of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and we need one in every church.

May I urge every minister after the appointments are read, to return to your new appointment with the Woman's Society of Christian Service on your heart, as one of your main objectives? And if you do not find an organization will you see to it that one is organized? If you find one that is not functioning will you encourage the women to work?

Should help be needed, get in touch with your district president or the district secretary of promotion, if for youth work call upon the district youth secretary, if for children's work see your district children secretary. The conference officers, too, are available at any time.

When you know the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service you will love it, when you love you will give your time, talent, your money, your all for the cause. When you give you live.

RECOMMENDATIONS BOARD LAY ACTIVITIES

1. We recommend that there shall be a mid-year meeting of the Conference Board of Lay Activities, where the District Superintendents and the Conference and District Lay Leaders shall study together the Conference and General Church program.

A. There shall be four sub-district groups set up in each District to process General and Conference program.

B. The Associate District Lay Leaders shall be responsible for activities in one sub-district, and shall report the same to the District Superintendent, District and Conference Lay Leaders.

2. There shall be at least one Annual Conference and District Lay Retreat.

3. There shall be at least one Annual Conference and District Methodist Men's meeting to study the General program of Methodist Men.

A. We recommend that each local church be encouraged to meet the request of the General Board of Lay Activities on Men's Work on or before September 15, 1951.

B. We recommend that each local church re-study the need of men and boys work and provide such funds to carry out such plans.

4. We recommend that there shall be a Lay speaker in each local church. See paragraph #150, Article #4 in the Methodist Discipline.

5. We recommend that each Lay Leader shall attend at least one annual District Conference Board meeting and that the official board shall pay the travel expense of same.

6. We recommend a Local Board of Lay Activities in each local church.

A. To be composed of the heads of all Boards and Standing Committees of the church and that the Local Lay Leader may be the chairman.

7. We recommend that each local church shall have Lay representation at each Conference session and Lay members shall be required to answer roll call of the annual conference and remain during the conference session, unless excused by the presiding officers.

A. The local church shall pay the travel of its Lay delegates to the seat of the annual conference.

8. We recommend that Lay members of the conference committee be appointed because of their fitness for the work of such committees.

A. There shall be equal representation of Lay Members on each standing committee.

9. We recommend that all Annual Conference committees shall meet at least once during the Conference year on or before the session of the Annual Conference.

10. We recommend that Conference-wide emphasis be placed on the mobilization of manpower in the local church.

11. We recommend that this conference give suitable citation to Bishop Alexander P. Shaw and his family for the fine work that he has done during the tenure of his office.

CONFERENCE LAY LEADER REPORT

I am thankful to the Heavenly Father for this opportunity for the fifth time to report to the 89th Annual Conference the stewardship of these loyal laymen.

From a district level, we have participated in every District meeting. Laymen throughout the conference have attended these meetings in large numbers. There seems to be a deeper interest of laymen on every district.

We hope that this interest shown on district levels will be manifest in the local churches. Because that is our objective, we want that the last layman in the local church will become spiritually deepened until he or she is an active working force in the local church, home and community.

We cannot be christian stewards until we accept the whole responsibility of life, the home, church and community.

What is a christian steward? A christian steward is one who has accepted the gifts of God to be used to His glory and honor and for the service of mankind.

This is our objective to deepen the lives of the laymen of the Delaware Conference until they become such stewards.

I believe that the Laymen and ministers are working toward that end.

Goals

During this quadrennium, we have been striving to mobilize man power in the local church.

There is a membership of 2209. What could be done if we would dare to nurture and develop just this small group of men in our conference? I say to you, brothers and sisters, we could save the other seven thousand men for Christ and His church.

I think that this alone is the greatest challenge in the christian church today. If we dare to save men, we will save the world.

I believe with all my heart and soul, that the world's ills today are due to our lack of saving men.

An aroused man power under God will change the trend of our world.

Laymen and ministers, shall we fail Him? If not, let us win for God 1000 men anew by 1952. To do that we should have a men's organization in each local church. Yes, ministers and laymen, it will take hard work, but under God we can do the job. Listen to his assurance: "My Grace is sufficient for all things." Do you believe it?

Let your whole church get behind this business of saving men. This is a big job. I believe that is why we have not been too successful in winning men, because we thought it to be a small job. Jesus said "follow me and I will make you fishers of men." Are you willing to follow?

Laymen, this church business is the fundamental basis of life. It is the source of grace and truth. The source of joy and happiness for all mankind.

I am happy to report to you that 103 churches observed Laymen's Day in February. 95 Churches observed Commitment Day. I hope the day is fast approaching when all churches will realize that it is their duty to lead this fight on the liquor problem.

Church Budget

This is a subject you never hear much about in our churches, but if it is important in our every day lives, it is important in our church life. We must run our churches on a sound basis if we hope to help God to build His kingdom here on earth. There is an old saying that salvation is free. But always remember that what you get free of charge is costing some one something. So, that some one should be you; giving your time, talent, and money to some one else.

So let us share in this business by sharing with the church at least 3% of our income. If we do, we can raise our local church budget. 73 churches reported having an every member canvass. 74 have a church budget, and 125 have official board meetings.

I have not time to say anything about official board meetings except that they are very important in any Methodist Church.

May I say finally, please laymen, answer communications, it is important.

Our Lay annual retreat was the best in the history of our conference, and we are looking forward to a greater one this coming year. With your help and cooperation, we will do so. Our conference board had 2 meetings and our Executive Committee 4 meetings. There were 5 District meetings.

Your conference lay leader visited 33 churches, attended 3 general board meetings, one special call committee meeting of the general board. We have traveled over 8000 miles for our church.

We have sent out 4,950 communications to our conference.

May I thank the Bishop, ministers, and our loyal laymen for this opportunity to serve.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO STUDY AGE LIMIT FOR ADMISSION ON TRIAL AND THE EMPLOYMENT OF SUPPLY PASTOR

After careful study your committee recommends that persons who meet all the requirements of the Discipline and who have not passed their 52nd birthday be admitted on Trial.

All persons must present a medical certificate showing good health from a doctor selected by the Board of Ministerial Training.

The committee recommends that these same rules apply to full time supply pastors who will become claimants on the pension fund.

A RESOLUTION ON PENSION BENEFITS TO RETIRED ACCEPTED SUPPLY PASTORS AND THEIR DEPENDENTS

WHEREAS, Accepted Supply Pastors are required to pay the same per cent of cash salary received as regular ministers, and,

WHEREAS, the Discipline provides that an Accepted Supply Pastor must have 10 years of service to have his credits before he or his dependents can share in the pension benefits,

BE IT RESOLVED, that retired Accepted Supply Pastors be allowed the same annuity rate as regular ministers, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the dependency benefit claims of dependent children and widow of a retired Accepted Supply Pastor be the same as those granted to the dependency benefit claims of regular ministers.

PROPOSED NEW LEGISLATION FOR GENERAL CONFERENCE

Note: Delete #8 beginning with "the duties of" to line #10 concluding with the word "afforded." The paragraph is to read:

Certify proper persons to serve as lay speakers, and inquire annually into the gifts, labors and usefulness of lay speakers on the circuit, station, or mission. Lay speakers shall be constituted by the official board or Board of Stewards of the church of which they are members and certified by the Quarterly Conference, the certificate to be signed by the president of the Quarterly Conference. The duties of a lay speaker are to study the phases of the church work that are emphasized during the quadrennium, subject to the direction of the pastor, to attend all the sessions of the District and Quarterly Conference, and to present a written report to the same. A lay speaker shall be subject to an annual examination of character in the Quarterly Conference, and a renewal of certificate, to be signed by the president thereof.

Recommendation #2

To accept a Supply Pastor as a voting pastor in the annual conference as long as he is active. i.e. (given special authority by the Bishop).

WILLIAM JOHN HELM

The Reverend W. J. Helm, son of the late Daniel and Lucy McCray Helm, was born in Frankford, Delaware, February 26, 1879. In a sketch of his own life, brother Helm states, "I acknowledged Him to be my Saviour and accepted Him as my Lord and Master; and ever since then, I have striven to make Him a faithful servant. Till then my education was that of a grammar school."

He graduated from Princess Anne Academy in 1906 and from Lincoln University in 1909. His athletic ability, scholastic attainments, and conscientious endeavors distinguished him at both of these schools of learning. He was honored in 1918 by the Oskaloosa College with the Doctor of Divinity degree.

At the beginning of his ministry he was united in holy matrimony with Miss Mary Lyda Johnson by the late Reverend Robert E. Ford in Cecilton, Maryland, May 12, 1909. He joined the Delaware Annual Conference of The Methodist Episcopal Church the same year. Together Dr. and Mrs. Helm accomplished much for the advancement of the Church and the Kingdom of God. His pastoral record was as follows: Church Creek, Md., three years; Lincoln City, Del., three years; Hurlock, Md., three years; Snow Hill, Md., four years; Berlin, Md., four years; Salisbury, Md., two years; Newark, N. He also had the privilege of serving as treasurer of the Delaware Annual Conference more than twenty years. People will remember that Brother Helm was one of the most efficient conference treasurers in The Methodist Church.

His personality was enriched with faith in the eternal realities, love for God and mankind, and courage to act according to God's will in his church and civic life. The value of his life to the community has been justly appraised and appreciated by peoples in all walks of life. It was natural to hear one say, "Dr. Helm is so kind, patient, quiet, truthful, honest, exact, impartial, and brotherly." During the last twelve years, the members of Asbury Methodist Church, in Atlantic City, N. J., have known him to be an impartial, kind, understanding leader who set his goals, achieved his purpose, and welded unity.

ASTON ASHLEY MCKENZIE

In 1940 he was received into the membership of the Delaware Conference and served the following

charges:—Mardela Springs, Md., Fairlee, Md., Townsend, Del., Mt. Holly, N. J., Elkton, Md., New Castle, Del., and Englewood, N. J. His devotion to his ministry was clearly observed by his work and outstanding accomplishments as a Minister and Missionary. After laboring for one year and four months at Englewood he was stricken with a Cerebral Hemorrhage and was rushed to the Englewood Hospital, September 2, 1950. JACOB RAY PURNELL

Jacob Ray Purnell, the son of Moses and Leah Purnell was born in Worcester County, Berlin, Maryland, November 8, 1877, and departed this life August 19, 1950, at Onancock, Virginia.

He received his early training in the public school of his home county, then Princess Anne Academy at Princess Anne, Maryland, and Temple University at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He began teaching public school in Stockton, Maryland. In 1911, he joined the Delaware Conference and was assigned to Church Creek charge as Pastor. From that time until the Con-

ference of April, 1950, he served twelve charges in the Delaware Conference, the greatest number in Virginia, where the people endeared themselves to him. It seemed to have been the wise providence of God, that he spent his last days in Virginia.

He was very conscious of his conversion in early years, and throughout his life he strove to make people very conscious of their conversion, which was the propeller of his life.

This union not only brought a mistress in the parsonage but a yoke-fellow in all of his ministerial labors. To this union one son was born—Ray, now at A. and T. College of Greensboro, North Carolina.

Throughout his ministry, this couple has been inseparable siamese twins in their interest and work in all the Kingdom building program, because of this united labor, it has shown in every charge that very creditable advancement has been made physically, mentally, and spiritually.

Some of his outstanding work was shown at a few of the charges on which he served; namely: Wachapreague, Virginia, where he raised money for renovation of the parsonage. Withams, Virginia, Beautification. Unionville, Maryland. Renovation and electrification of St. James Church. Wattsville, Virginia. Cleared up many large and long standing debts. Leemont, Virginia. Electrified the home church; electrified and renovated the parsonage; paid off outstanding and long debts. Cleared Adams church of mortgage, renovated basement; raised money for new pews and renovation of the main auditorium of the church.

On July 19, 1950 at 6 a. m. while driving on United States highway 13, his wife noticed his failure in his usual steady driving, asked him to stop. Finding something wrong, she summoned a physician, and it was found that he was stricken with cerebral hemorrhage and a partial stroke.

He was taken to the Northampton-Accomack Memorial Hospital at Nassawadox, Virginia, and was treated three weeks. During the three week period, his wife remained at his bedside day and night and administered to his wants, while doctors and nurses were showing every interest that any patient might expect.

While being visited by members of the family, he called, "Em, come here—tell me a good hymn to sing when I enter heaven." She replied, "How would you like Something within, I cannot explain, Something within that holdeth the rein,?" He then nodded his head in acceptance.

At the end of three weeks the doctor and nurses felt it was safe to move him to the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Savage. Immediately upon bringing him in the home, a doctor was summoned, and made regular visits. The wife and Mr. and Mrs. Savage responded to every call, while friends of the community greeted him with smiles and kind words; it seemed as if he was on the road to recovery. But, on Saturday afternoon after having received visitors and clearly conversing with them, taking regular meals and walking with the aid of the family, he asked to view the new work on the porch, after doing so he said "Now you may take me back to bed," but before reaching the bed he collapsed and had to be carried—and in a few minutes he was not—for God took him.

A friend wrote this to us on receiving the news of the departure of our loved one:

“You four were such a wonderful combination, it is hard to see the heart go out of it.”

We were indeed a happy family, the life of each being “bound up” in the life of the other. And the passing of her whose presence was always such a benediction seems still to bear no semblance of reality.

We do not ascribe all sickness, sorrow, and death to “the will of God.” We would not even say that this was His will. We do not know. But we do believe that Caddie Ridout’s work on earth was finished. Probably she worked so hard because she knew that she had just so long to live. Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion, or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely: (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and is sustained by a two-third vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

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A Brief Description of Morgan Christian Center

The building is constructed of granite stone and is strictly fire proof. The cost is approximately \$150,000 including equipment and furniture. The Chapel will seat approximately 400 and is equipped with modern church pews and a Hammond Electric Organ. There are social and lounging rooms, banquet hall, conference rooms, a kitchen, check rooms, library, private offices and a large game and recreation room. These facilities lend themselves admirably for carrying out the following purposes of the Morgan Christian Center.

- 1—A shrine for worship.
- 2—An opportunity to become followers of Christ.
- 3—A laboratory for training youth for leadership in church and community activities.
- 4—A recruiting station for religious leadership.
- 5—A constructive cultural, social, and recreational life for youth.
- 6—A home away from home for students.
- 7—A friendly and harmonious understanding between people of varying faiths.
- 8—A counselor in times of intellectual difficulties, religious doubts, and trying Christian experiences.

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
