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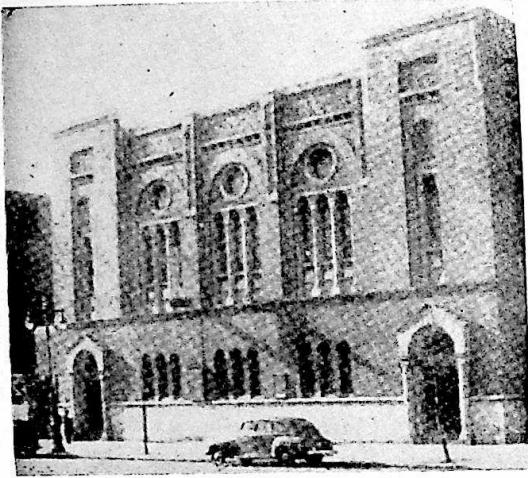

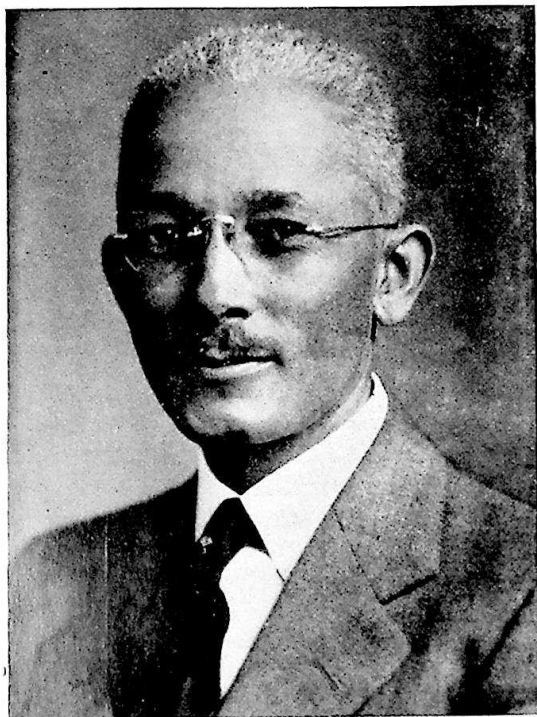


Tindley Temple, Broad St. at Fitzwater, Philadelphia, Pa., seat of the recent session of the Delaware Annual Conference.



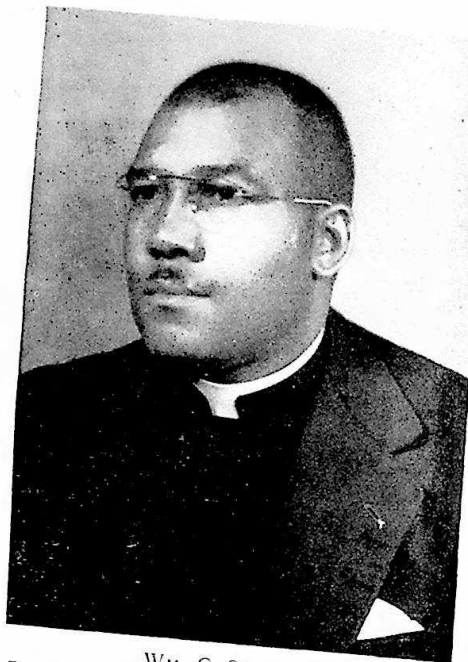
REV. NOAH W. MOORE

Pastor of the Tindley Temple Methodist Church, host pastor to the recent session of the Delaware Conference.

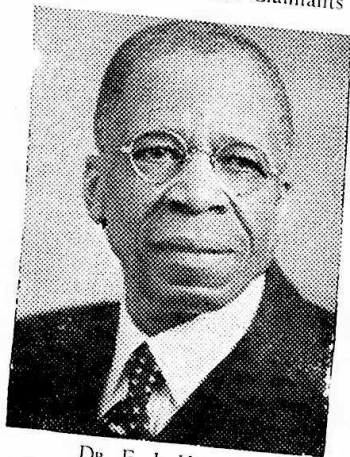

Newly appointed Superintendent of the Wilmington District.



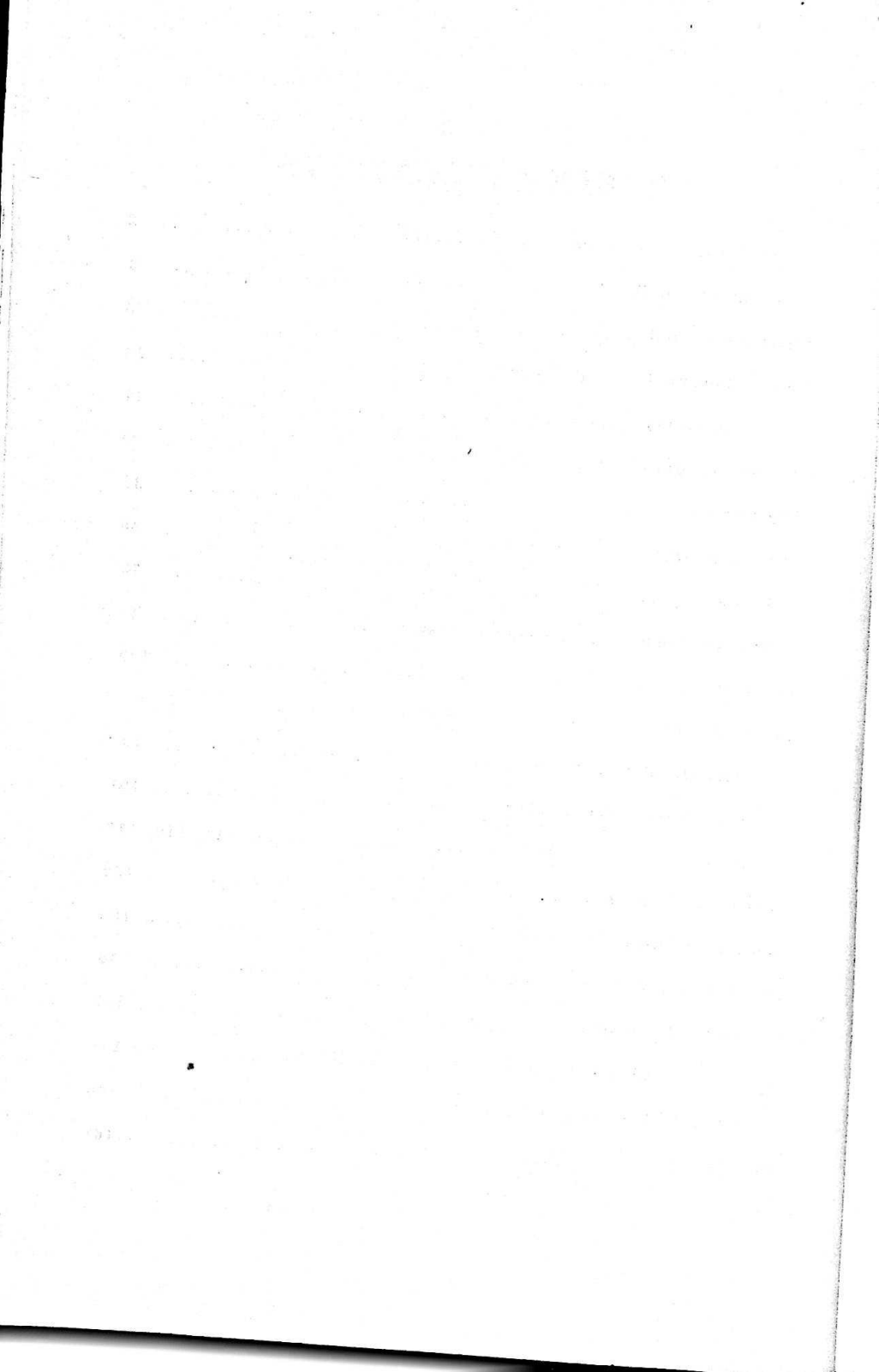

THE DUNLEITH PROJECT: Information was given of the status of the effort to provide a church for the tenants of the Dunleith Housing Project, near Wilmington. While waiting for the decision of the Comity Committee, and permission to build a Methodist Church it was moved by L. S. Moore that the 4th Sunday in October be designated H. R. Suggestions were made that ads of the Methodist Book Concern from the Baltimore and New York depositories be secured and placed in the Journals.

DOVER DISTRICT

In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. Amen.
Bishop Shaw, and Members and Friends of the Delaware Conference:

"Lo, how good and lovely it is
When brethren dwell together as one."

This American Translation of the first verse of the 133rd Psalm is very real to us of the Dover District—because, over a period of three years we have dwelt together, despite the changes which each Conference session has brought, as one. It would be difficult to find anywhere in the Christian Fraternity a family spread out over so wide a territory as we cover, touching the Western Shore of Maryland, across the Susquehanna River, at Port Deposit, Maryland, and reaching almost to the Virginia Line, in Southeastern Maryland, near Snow Hill—it would be difficult to find a family so spread out, but with interests so common and with heartbeats so unified.

I am increasingly grateful to pastors, laymen and constituents for their unswerving loyalty and their countless forbearances; to my colleagues of the Cabinet for their helpful associations, and to our beloved Bishop Shaw for his ready encouragement, and for his sacrificial visits to our District whenever we have called upon him. All of these, together with the abiding Presence of our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is ever with us through the Holy Comforter, make our ministry as titular head of the Dover District an unspeakable joy and the blessings we have received an eternal benediction to our souls.

Some of us here and now present have recently come from the marvelously beautiful and enchanting State of California. A native son has declared that the only way fitly to describe the wonder of California is to lie about it . . . For me adequately to tell about the work of the faithful ministers and their wives, who, with the devoted laymen of the Dover District, have achieved so greatly this year, is to seem to be exaggerating about it; indeed, is to be tempted to talk on to the seeming point of exaggeration!

We do not "count ourselves to have apprehended," to be sure. We have not reached perfection, certainly. Only about 40% of us make full reports. But all have worked nobly, and all have found inexpressibly joy in the working. Perhaps one young pastor spoke for the other 33 pastors on the District as well as for himself when he wrote me just a few days ago, "As much as we need more money, I do not look upon that as the ultimate end of the ministry. I would like to see certain goals that we have set before us achieved."

How definitely is such a man called to the prophetic office of a minister of Jesus Christ!

In Memoriam

On Sunday, November 11, 1951, Owen S. Edwards, our pastor at Fairlee, Maryland, was called from labor to reward. His last pastorate was, in less than seven brief months, indeed his greatest. Already his charge, in so far as finances were concerned, was practically "ready for Conference." He was greatly beloved by his people, and he and his faithful companion, in turn, greatly loved them. Mrs. Grace Watts, formerly of Tindley Temple, was assigned to complete the year.

The Dover District joins the entire Conference in mourning the passing by so tragic circumstance of our co-worker and friend, Howard R. Coleman, superintendent of the Wilmington District. The long roll of our dead of the past year challenges us all to greater devotion to the cause for which they gave their "last full measure of devotion."

Other parsonage homes of the District affected by death were those of S. E. Armstrong, a brother; C. H. Molock, a brother; C. C. Thomas, his father, and Thaddeus Hackett, a sister.

Mrs. J. W. Mickle has been confined to her parsonage home much of the year. Other more extended illnesses were those of L. R. Jones and the oldest daughter of G. B. Wilson. Even the "iron man"—the superintendent himself—showed signs of advancing years last Fall and was compelled to relinquish his duties for several weeks, during which time pastors and people and friends everywhere were kindly considerate.

The year was especially fruitful in marriages and births. The superintendent set the pace immediately after Conference by being united in wedlock, with Bishop Shaw officiating, in John Wesley Church, Salisbury, Maryland, to Mrs. Beatrice Anne Conway, of that city. She is a gracious addition to our District parsonage family. Pastors who took unto themselves charming helpmates were, M. C. Blakely and F. R. Richardson.

Children were born in the parsonage homes of H. T. and Mrs. Moody (a boy); E. A. and Mrs. Maddox (also a boy), and S. P. and Mrs. Sanders (a girl). We pray that these may all, like the Child Jesus, "grow in wisdom, and in stature, and in favor with God and man."

Special Projects

The District again provided expenses for three Church School workers to the Laboratory School at Beaver College, Jenkintown, Pa., and assisted in sending Vivian Ridout to Italy with a Friendship Caravan from the Wyoming Conference. Twenty-three young people from the District attended the annual Youth Assembly at Morgan State College, Baltimore, last summer—the largest number in our history.

District Meetings

Our District meetings continue to be gatherings of high inspiration and spiritual enrichment. Beginning with the District Stewards Meeting at Harrington last May 15, and concluding with the Efficiency Conference at

Dover on April 1st, the year was filled with good things to strengthen and enlighten both preachers and lay people for the tasks which are commonly theirs to do.

South Berlin was host to the Annual Youth Assembly in June. Nearly 100 young people were registered in our largest June conference up to this time. The occasion was graced by the presence of our presiding bishop, whom the young people heard gladly.

Chestertown entertained the District Conference October 23-25 in a manner characteristic of the world's "garden spot." If it were possible for our previous District Conferences to be excelled, this one did it. A minimum of time was given to routine and hackneyed reports, and major time was given to discussion of matters pertinent to the making of better Christians and more efficient leaders for Christ and His Church.

The annual Thanksgiving holiday Youth Rally was held, as usual, in Dover, and brought together a large number of young people for instruction, inspiration, and missionary vision. A large offering was received for the Methodist Youth Fund, a missionary enterprise in which the Dover District has been a leading contributor the last two years.

Most encouraging have been the gains in the quarterly meetings of the District Woman's Society of Christian Service. Throughout the year the churches in which the women met were filled to capacity, and, at long last, nearly every local church is beginning to appreciate the greatness of this the greatest woman's organization on earth.

The Ministers Wives Association has had its most successful year. In addition to the fine fellowship among the women of our parsonages which the Association fosters, the sisters reached surprising artistic heights in their first annual concert given in Bridgeville on March 7th, under the musical direction of "Bump" Ridout. Indications are that their voluntary financial report in support of our Conference Claimants fund will be most encouraging at Friday morning's session.

While the annual Lay Retreat is usually well attended and ably programmed, there is need for more frequent lay meetings throughout the year.

The Christian Workers Schools were well attended and efficiently managed this year. A more comprehensive report of these will doubtless be found in the pages of the annual report of our Conference Board of Education. Schools were held at Laurel, Berlin, Chestertown, and Dover. J. R. Webb, W. G. Brown, C. H. Molock, and Grant Shockley were the respective deans.

Group Meetings

Laymen of the Kent County Churches, comprising the Chestertown and Still Pond Groups, under the able leadership of Elmer T. Hawkins, principal of the Garnett High School, Chestertown, meet monthly and study the Discipline of The Methodist Church and hold discussions and testimonial services of high spiritual value.

The Still Pond, Chestertown, and Milford Groups held most successful evangelistic services during the Winter. In some cases, churches of other groups also participated.

Our group Quarterly Conferences are always more than mere business meetings or even training conferences. They are "scenes where spirits blend, and where friend holds fellowship with friend." They are places where we try to find the answer to the problems of the Christian Life, and where we seek to meet its challenges. Young people and their interests played major roles in our discussions at these conferences the third quarter of the past year.

Survey of Charges

BRIDGEVILLE, C. E. Kiah, pastor, has had 12 conversions and 12 accessions. World Service and Conference benevolences are paid in full. Improvements have been made in church and parsonage properties, and the church is vitally alive in every department. A successful visitation evangelism campaign resulted in greatly increased church attendance. Total raised, \$4,834. Salary increased \$100, to \$2,100.

BRIDGEVILLE CIRCUIT, H. T. Moody, pastor, is a remarkable charge, efficiently operated. Each of the two churches is a strong unit within itself, and both work harmoniously together. Conversions, 25; accessions, 21. The parsonage has been completely renovated and furnished, and has city conveniences in a rural setting. All apportionments fully raised. Total, \$7,250. Salary increased \$200, to \$2,200, with \$200 extra allowance for pastor's car expense. The people plead for the pastor's return.

CHESTERTOWN, C. H. Molock, pastor, has made extensive repairs and improvements in the church and parsonage properties, with all costs paid. Conversions, 26; accessions, 29. Total amount raised, \$10,289. Salary increased \$100, to \$2,100. Pastor and people are overflowingly happy. Chestertown is no longer a "problem child."

CHESWOLD, H. R. Snead, pastor, continues a most challenging and unique field of operation. Repairs begun last year on the church property have been completed, with attractive appearances. Conversions, 2. Total raised, \$3,948.

CLARKSVILLE, W. W. Brown, pastor, has had 5 conversions and 8 accessions. Ground has been obtained for new church site at Clarksville, and the parsonage has been improved. Total raised, \$3,480. The pastor is going strong even after 12 years of service. Salary increased \$200, to \$2,000.

COLEMAN, J. W. Mickle, pastor, has painted the church inside, and provided a bedroom suite for the parsonage. Apportionments nearly fully raised. Salary increased \$50, to \$1,700. Total raised, \$3,509. This charge is not measuring up to its capacity to do. The field is white and ready to harvest, but the workers are sleeping overtime.

CRUMPTON, C. R. Bryant, pastor, is a greatly revitalized charge. Everything, everywhere has been greatly improved. Conversions, 17; accessions, 20. Total raised, \$4,973. There is little excuse for the maintenance of the fourth church on this charge, and the pastor can give even better service without it. Ten young people attended our youth rally last fall, the first time in many years there has been any youth representation at any of our District meetings.

DELMAR, R. A. Bolden, pastor, has done well, but has not seemed to realize it. The pastor has not had the co-operation he rightly merited. The community hall has been renovated and equipped. A total of \$4,000 has been raised for all purposes—a remarkable figure for this small membership.

DOVER, Grant Shockley, pastor, richly deserves its reputation as one of the Conference's main "promotional points." This charge always excels even itself. This young pastor came out of a college professorship and adapted himself amazingly practically to the pastorate. Everything is full, and everything is improved. It would take pages to tell this story. Conversions, 13; accessions, 17. Total raised, \$9,676. Salary advanced \$400, to \$2,600. Church school attendance, tripled; church attendance and giving increased.

FAIRLEE was made a station last year. The experiment worked overwhelmingly successfully. O. S. Edwards had practically completed the year's financial requirements when he "died in action with his armor on." Sister Grace Watts has carried on with such signal glory that her return is unanimously requested by the congregation. Conversions, 8; accessions, 18. Total raised, \$3,100. All apportionments are fully met.

GALENA, Mrs. Rachel Brown, pastor, is supposed to be the weakest charge on the District, but doesn't act much like it. Here is a great pastor, preacher, and leader, Brothers and Sisters! Conversions, 4; accessions, 4. Olivet Church is being renovated on the interior. All apportionments full. Total raised, \$4,273.

HARRINGTON, Thaddeus Hackett, pastor, with but 65 members, produces abundantly, and has increased the pastor's salary \$200, to \$2,000. The church has been renovated. Accessions, 3. Total raised, \$3,603. Conference adjourned last year on April 29th. Since April 30th, the people have been pleading for the pastor's return.

LAUREL, Frank S. Walker, pastor, remains a most inviting appointment and always accomplishes its work well, although no conversions or accessions are reported. Yet, pastor and people courageously curbed the nuisances created by a liquor store in the vicinity of the church, to their everlasting credit. Improvement in church property. Salary advanced \$300, to \$2,300. Total raised, \$5,136. The pastor's musical endowments are effectively used in his ministry.

LEWES. A. J. Dredde, a young pastor, makes his second full report, and reports 4 conversions—an increase of four over last year. Salary increased \$200, to \$1,800. Total raised, \$4,432. These two churches of this charge are immaculately kept and worthy of the name sanctuaries. Improvements to parsonage, in which the pastor needs a wife, are in amount of \$1,800.

LINCOLN. J. O. Lockman, pastor, improves with age, after 21 years of service. Wesley Chapel is about ready for occupancy after having been practically rebuilt at a cost of \$9,000. This charge teems with activity with young people, the pastor keeping young with them. Conversions, 3; accessions, 4. Salary advanced \$200, to \$2,200. Total raised, \$7,713.

MARDELA, S. G. Dix, pastor, has had 3 conversions and 3 accessions. Church School attendance has been increased, and this smoothly operating charge maintains its high standing. Total raised, \$4,400.

MELITOTA, Mrs. Marie F. Gibbs, pastor, is the new charge which was formerly a part of Fairlee charge. The separation of these two churches has also brought amazing results. Mrs. Gibbs, last year's pastor of the three churches of Fairlee Charge, makes her second full report, despite full responsibilities as a successful public school teacher. Conversions, 44—largest number on the District; accessions, 10. Parsonage property improved for pastor's occupancy. Pastor's salary raised \$100, to \$1,400. Total raised, \$4,077—a miraculous figure!

MILFORD, Randolph Fisher, pastor, makes an excellent report, the leader having steered the good ship Saint Paul over stormy seas to safe harborage. Conversions, 5; accessions, 9. Improvements in church property, with long standing indebtedness cancelled, and junior choir organized. Total raised, \$4,502.

MILLINGTON, L. R. Jones, pastor, has, too, taken on new life, even with an "old" pastor of four years of service. Conversions, 26; accessions, 26. Property improvements. The churches are spiritually afire. Pastor's salary increased \$200, to \$1,700. Total raised, \$3,825.

MILLSBORO, F. R. Richardson, pastor, reports an increase over last year, despite the fact that pastor and people have not seen "eye to eye." Telephone and electric lights have been installed in the parsonage, and a community hall is being erected at Friendship Church. Conversions, 2; accessions, 2. Total raised, \$2,551. The charge could have increased the pastor's salary, but wouldn't. Despite this, the charge shows signs of improved spiritual condition.

NASSAU, M. C. Blakely, pastor, presents its usual full report. I have tried to assure these people that they do not know their own strength. Here are two excellent church buildings, with almost inexhaustible resources. The salary, though increased \$200, to \$1,700, is painfully low for this charge. Conversions, 7; accessions, 14. Improvements in parsonage and Mt. Pleasant church properties. Total raised, \$6,039.

NEWARK, S. E. Armstrong, pastor, has achieved wonderfully this year toward raising the necessary funds to complete the new church building at Cedar Chapel. \$3,200 is the amount in hand awaiting a contractor to go on with the plans. World Service and Conference Benevolences in full. Conversions, 17; accessions, 6. Total raised, \$2,804.

NORTH BERLIN, W. G. Brown, pastor, returns this year "to the full glory of her creation." Conversions, 4. This energetic pastor, always initiating helpful projects, has led his young people to the establishment of a student-aid fund, to help needy students of the charge seeking higher education. Salary increased \$200, to \$2,400. Total raised, \$5,500. All apportionments full. Here remains our second largest church enrollment.

POMONA, C. C. Thomas, pastor, reports 3 conversions and accessions, and improvements in church and church hall properties. This charge has been made a station, the pastor to have oversight over Hadaway Chapel. All claims are fully met; salary increased \$200, to \$2,000. Total raised, \$6,000. Church attendance increased.

PORT DEPOSIT has had a good year, under the leadership of C. W. D. Browne. The Howard Chapel and parsonage properties have been attrac-

tively improved. Conversions, 2; accessions, 1. Pastor's salary increased \$100, to \$1,400. Total raised, \$2,700.

ROCK HALL has achieved gloriously under the inspired pastorate of M. V. Hyland. There have been 17 conversions and 15 accessions. The parsonage has been newly furnished throughout, and repairs have been made in both church properties. The church is active throughout, and pastor and people are happy in each other. All claims are fully met. Pastor's salary increased \$200, to \$2,200. Total raised, \$8,167. What hath God wrought!

SASSAFRAS, Mrs. Ophelia James, pastor, is an unusually well operated charge that accomplishes wonders. Conversions, 4; accessions, 4. Improvements in both churches and parsonage properties. The new dining room and kitchen unit at the Warwick church is most adequate to serve the people's social needs. This charge is spiritually alive, but does the temporal things as well. Claims, as usual, fully met. Salary increased \$200, to \$1,600. Total raised, \$3,558.

SEAFORD, Roland Grant, pastor, became a station this year, and indeed has done well "on her own." Conversions, 3; accessions, 7. A new carpet has been put on the church floor and paid for in amount of \$600. Total raised, \$4,047.

SEAFORD CIRCUIT, J. H. Hubbard, pastor, is composed of the other two churches which were formerly a part of Seaford charge. No apportionments were given them in the experiment, but it is certain now that they can take on definite responsibility in view of the excellent start they have made. Total raised, \$1,800.

SHARPTOWN, D. S. Quillin, pastor, defies description. Here is still our largest membership and church attendance. Here everything is always fully accomplished. Conversions, 7; accessions, 10. Pastor's salary increased \$200, to \$2,200. Total raised, \$5,120. The people here have great church and community pride. The pastor calls this the "Canaan" of the Delaware Conference.

SMYRNA. This is a transformed church, and the pastor, E. A. Maddox calls himself a transformed pastor. Conversions, 1; accessions, 3. The church yard is being utilized as a playground for activities for children and youth. Salary increased \$200, to \$1,500. Total raised, \$3,000.

SOUTH BERLIN, S. P. Sanders, pastor, reports our second largest number of conversions, 33; accessions, 15. The church's obligation to the Board of Missions has been met. This is a most challenging and inviting appointment. Total raised, \$4,400.

STILL POND has had a glorious year under the dynamic and evangelistic ministry of G. B. Wilson. Conversions, 16; accessions, 27. A new kitchen has been added to the hall at Mount Zion Church, and both cemeteries have been cleaned, and heaters also installed in Mount Zion Church. The pastor is ably getting the results possible in this productive field. Salary increased \$200, to \$1,900. Total raised, \$6,200.

TOWNSEND, W. C. Thomas, pastor, presents a report greatly in excess of last year. Conversions, 12; accessions, 9. Running water system has been installed in the parsonage. Church School attendance has greatly increased in Lee's Chapel and Haven Churches. Salary increased \$100, to \$1,600. Total raised, \$3,063.

Conclusion

While a report like this always recites a long list of cold figures, we must always remember that the story of sacrifice and devotion back of the figures burns with consuming fire. The labors of the people who make the figures are certainly not cold. To be sure, there are many gains yet to be made, and many souls yet to be won in every local community for Christ and His Church.

Less than a month ago, travelling over the vast open spaces of the Rocky Mountains, through Wyoming, save occasionally where we passed through a town or village, where there was some sign of life, we saw for nearly a whole day nothing but rocks and apparent waste land. There was no evidence of verdancy whatsoever. Not a single tree; not a flower—not even a wild one—only lifeless bushes that could not grow tall or live in stony ground.

There are vast waste places like that in every town and city and hamlet served by the ministers in the Delaware Conference. But, behold, I show you a mystery. Out of a huge stone, in the Rocky Mountains of Utah, not far from where only the roofs of houses were visible above the winters snows that were still piled 15 or 20 feet high—out of this stone grew a peach tree—and it was vibrantly alive.

You and I can throw a peach seed sometimes unwittingly into these stony areas in our local communities, and long after we are gone, out of the stone will spring forth a tree that will bear luscious fruit. Indeed, "Down in the human heart, Crushed by the tempter, Feelings lie buried that grace can restore; Touched by a loving heart, Wakened by kindness, Chords that were broken will vibrate once more." Let us then, "Rescue the perishing, care for the dying; Jesus is merciful; Jesus will save!"

This is the inescapable challenge to us all who would be worthy of the Name of Him Whose Cross we bear.

"Where are you going, Great Heart,
With your eager face, and your fiery grace?
Where are you going, Great Heart?"

"To fight a fight with all my might,
For Truth, and Justice, God and Right;
To grace all life with His fair light."

"Then, God go with you, Great Heart!"

Mr. W. D. Earle, the District Lay Leader, went to his reward, March 21, and was funeralized from Asbury Church, Easton, March 27. On May 2, the Lord took Mrs. P. W. Price. While I was attending the General Conference, R. W. Thomas went to his heavenly home.

District Activities

As usual, the District Stewards Meeting and the Coaching Conference for Vacation Church School Workers were held in May; the attendance was good and the meetings profitable.

The dean, the Reverend Augustus Chancy and his staff of teachers, did a satisfactory job with the Methodist Youth Assembly held at St. Michaels in June. HURLOCK is well pleased with her new pastor, and has done a good year's work. The churches are well organized and functioning. An oil heater installed in Union Grove church. Money raised to decorate Washington church. The parsonage has been decorated. Salary increased to \$2,000. Conversions, 4; accessions, 7. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$380, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$7,048. W. J. Mills, pastor.

LINKWOOD. The congregation at Hicksburg is working hard to raise money to rebuild the church that was destroyed by fire several years ago without any insurance. Conversions, 11; accessions, 9. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$173. Raised for all purposes, \$2,888. O. N. Johnson, pastor.

MARYDEL has done well this year. The pastor is alert to the needs of the people, and tries to supply them. 49 persons were confirmed Easter Sunday night. The salary increased \$300. Conversions, 49; accessions, 49. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$313. Raised for all purposes, \$4,783. Charles I. Young, pastor.

McDANIEL. The smaller church, Bozman, with a membership of less than a dozen, has installed electric lights. This small group deserves credit for its courage. Conversions —; accessions, 1. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$61. Raised for all purposes, \$1,820. A. C. Whittington, pastor.

MILES RIVER is making a glowing report with her new pastor. A new roof has been put on Deshields church. Magee church and the parsonage have been decorated. \$300 raised to build a new hall at Longwoods. Salary increased \$400. Methodist Youth Fellowship organized. Conversions, 9; accessions, 9. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$289, in full. Other askings in full. Raised for all purposes, \$3,298. T. M. Murray, pastor.

OXFORD. This charge does very well with its finances. The organizations are doing a commendable job. A Schumatronic system has been installed in the church. Plans are being made for the construction of a recreational hall. \$916 raised for same. The name of L. D. Beecham will be placed on the Plaque. Conversions, 2; accessions, none. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$397, in full. All other askings in full. Raised for all purposes, \$8,376. A. L. Scriber, pastor.

PRESTON wraps up another good report. The sides of the parsonage have been shingled with white asbestos shingles; running water and a bath tub have been installed. The inside and outside of Johns church have been decorated. Gas heaters have been put in Zoar church. Conversions, 6; accessions, 6. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$429, in full. All other askings in full. Raised for all purposes, \$6,975. H. T. Hall, pastor.

RIDGELY has done a good job this year with her new pastor. Lockerman church has bought a plot of ground and built a hall. Replanted Zion bought a frigidaire and other furnishings for the parsonage. Conversions, 8; accessions, 2. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$300. Raised for all purposes \$3,582. J. E. McBride, pastor.

ROYAL OAK and BELLEVUE has had an extraordinarily good year. Pastor Davis found the people faithless and discouraged. They had dropped the salary \$300 believing they could not pay any more. After having preached a few inspiring sermons, the dry bones began to live. They increased the salary from \$1,700 to \$2,200, and have agreed to pay \$2,400 this coming year. A new roof has been put on the Bellevue church, and the indebtedness on the Hammond organ liquidated. The interior of Royal Oak church has been decorated. Some improvements on the parsonage have been made. The pastor, realizing that New York was too far to make weekly visits, got married and brought his bride in the parsonage. Conversions, 46; accessions, 53. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$525, in full. All other askings in full. Raised for all purposes, \$11,300. J. N. C. Davis, pastor.

ST. MICHAELS. This charge has great possibilities. She has not done what she could. Conversions, 5; accessions, 24. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$197. Raised for all purposes, \$4,284. J. W. Pruitt, pastor.

STEVENSVILLE has stepped up her year's work with her new pastor. The social hall at Wesley has been renovated; electric lights and gas installed. The indebtedness at Union Church has been reduced. A gas range, refrigerator, and oil burner have been installed in the parsonage. The organizations are working splendidly. Conversions, 1; accessions, 5. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$440, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$6,224. W. H. Greene, pastor.

TAYLOR'S ISLAND and HOOPERSVILLE has had another fine year. The interior and exterior of Lanes church have been decorated and a new roof put on the church. Jefferson church has had a new roof also. Conversions, 2; accessions, 3. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$196. Raised for all purposes \$4,162. E. H. Jackson, pastor.

TRAPPE has done exceedingly well this year. The pastor conducted three membership Training classes; we confirmed 32 young people on Palm Sunday. Salary increased \$200. A unanimous request has been made for the return of the pastor. Conversions, 3; accessions, 32. World Service and Conference Benevolence \$401, in full. Raised for all purposes \$3,196. J. F. Henry, pastor.

VIENNA and REIDS GROVE makes a better report than last year. The interior and furnishing of Wesley church have been decorated. Conversions, 5; accessions, 5. World Service and Conference Benevolence \$352, in full. Raised for all purposes, \$3,728. A. A. McDowell, pastor.

WILLISTON. This charge, though small, is giving a good account of herself. Before the seven room bungalow (began last year) was finished, the pastor realized that it was not good for him to be alone, took unto himself a help meet and has begun to show signs of improvement. Conversions, 2; accessions, 2. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$138. Raised for all purposes, \$6,400. N. C. Stanley, pastor.

WITTMAN. This charge is still slumbering, but promises to do better another year. Conversions, 13; accessions, 10. World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$104. Raised for all purposes, \$2,361. I. B. Bivens, pastor.

The Advance

The Week of Dedication has been observed by a large number of charges. With one or two exceptions, every charge had a lay speaker on Layman's Day. Thanks to Mrs. Helen C. Waters for the splendid job done.

There have been 325 conversions and 410 accessions. Raised for World Service and Conference Benevolence, \$10,014. For all purposes, \$162,906.

Thirty charges have contributed \$481 for the A. P. Shaw Guild this year.

The names for the Bronze Plaque are: A. L. Martin by Waugh, Cambridge; E. Z. Heath by Easton Circuit; L. D. Beecham by Oxford; Mae Johns Harewood by W. A. and Inez C. Harewood.

Despite the fact that fourteen charges have increased the pastors' salary, many of them are still inadequate.

We appreciate very highly the help and co-operation of our Executive Secretary, the Rev. H. A. Bailey; the conference and district workers, in fostering the program of Christian Education.

District Parsonage

The ministers and laymen have done an outstanding job by raising and paying the sum of \$2,870 in six months for the two lots of land adjoining the parsonage. When the amount was borrowed, the bank requested that \$250 be paid every six months with the interest. When the first six months expired we went with a check to the bank for the full amount, thus saving the district \$365.25 interest.

A beautiful mahogany bed room suite, costing \$367.65, was put in by the Parsonage Committee for which every penny has been paid.

Conclusion

It would have been a matter of impossibility for us to achieve what we have without faithful, hard working, ministers and laymen.

Our ministers' wives cannot be excelled. They labor side by side with their husbands in promoting the great program of our Church. Too much cannot be said about the beautiful spirit they manifest in raising money for Conference Claimants.

We shall never forget the fine gesture made by the ministers and laymen in raising \$500 to send their superintendent to the General Conference in San Francisco. God bless every one of you abundantly.

The district would be hurt if this report were closed without saying the following. It has been a profound pleasure to have worked with Bishop Shaw. He has proven himself to be a genuine christian gentleman—broad, unselfish, brotherly, kind, sympathetic, christ-like. He has endeared himself to the ministers and laymen of our district. He has gone to churches where many men of high positions would not go, and served them as sincerely as he would one of the large churches on the Philadelphia district. We invoke God's richest blessings upon him and his family. While we are in the district parsonage and wherever we shall go, our door stands ajar for him, Mrs. Shaw, and the members of his family.

PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT

Bishop Shaw, Members of the Conference, and Friends:

It is important that I should give to you an account of my stewardship for the past thirteen months. I believe the ministers and laymen have worked together in a most beautiful way in helping to advance the kingdom. We have been able to succeed in a spectacular manner. The general programme of the church has been kept before the people in each church on the district—without any reservations, they have met the challenge set before them.

Sickness

A number of the ministers and their wives have been physically indisposed. Namely: Rev. J. W. Parker, Mrs. J. W. Parker, Mrs. S. M. Emptage, Mrs. E. H. Crampton, Mrs. W. C. Mears, Rev. H. T. Johnson. Rev. R. W. Thomas, a retired member of the Conference, passed recently.

A number of our laymen have been sick—among them, the late Dr. Wm. Beck, sub-district lay leader, who passed in December.

The Advance

The district lay leaders and sub-district leaders, also the Woman's Society of Christian Service have greatly assisted me in advancing the programme of the district both financially and spiritually.

Methodist Men

The Methodist Men are being greatly stimulated by the Woman's Society of Christian Service. The men have decided that they can put over a creative programme as well as the women in the local church, and they are doing it in a very commendable way. The men in many churches have secured their new charters.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild are working most courageously. Their quarterly meetings are well attended. Their programmes are highly spiritual and informative. There are 30 Woman's Society of Christian Service Organizations and 11 Wesleyan Service Guilds.

These organizations are a source of great power and influence on the district. The new President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Mrs. C. L. Trader, is proving to be a very capable and efficient leader. The women are rallying to her leadership.

The Young Adults and Methodist Youth Fellowships are taking more interest in the work of the church.

I feel, if the pastors and the senior members of the churches will give these organizations a larger opportunity to participate in the church programme, the young people will more largely and energetically support the programme of the church.

The Church School

Our church schools are by no means meeting their opportunities. We have the programme—the literature, and in some churches, the equipment, but we seem to be unable to get consecrated workers. The adults will not give adequate sacrificial service in this department of our church work. Bishop, and brothers, this situation is most alarming. I would like to say that our very efficient Director of Religious Education, Rev. Howard Bailey, is on his toes and doing his best to arouse the district to a sense of its responsibility to "The Lambs" of the Church School. If we are to have a thriving adult church to-morrow—we must look after the children.

Drew University

I secured the assistance of the Rev. W. H. Mears one day this winter that I was in Montclair to drive me up to Drew. I had the pleasure of contacting the Director of Field Work in Drew Theological Seminary and also five (5) young men that are working for their degree in Theology. These young men and others will be available to do their practice work in our churches if we will give them an opportunity. Drew will help them and us financially in this new project.

Missionary Opportunities

The New York Metropolitan area offers many fields for expansion of our church. Our people are moving into new areas in Brooklyn, Hempstead, Amityville, Yonkers, Corona and many other places. There are but two churches in Jamaica to serve over 50,000 Negroes.

May we now take a bird's eye view of the Charges? Many outstanding things have been done in the Charges that time and space will not permit me to mention.

ST. JOHN'S, NEWARK, N. J. (I. R. Elzey). The pace set last year by this Charge is really gaining more speed daily. The sanctuary has been beautifully carpeted. New chairs placed in the lecture room—the choir and gospel singers have secured new choir robes—a most exquisite Steinway piano valued at \$2,500 has been placed in the auditorium, having been presented by one of the family of the late Mrs. Alice MacDonald, this having been designated in her will. The Morning Services on Sunday are well attended. The Church School is growing. Raised for World Service, \$962. Raised for other Benevolences, \$600. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$4,448. Total raised for all purposes, \$20,323. Accessions to the church, 52.

ST. JOHN'S, ORANGE, N. J. (D. M. Collins). There has been somewhat of a struggle or misunderstanding between the officials of this church. The pastor has striven to bring about harmony among them, but at present, they are too much divided. The parsonage has been beautifully remodeled and refurnished. Raised for World Service, \$246. Raised for other Benevolences, \$251. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$2,659. Total raised for all purposes, \$9,390. Accessions to the church, 14.

MONTCLAIR, N. J. (W. H. Mears). This Charge is still running in high gear. The pastor presents or states his programme for the good of the church. The officers never hesitate to perform the responsibility assigned, willingly. A streamlined frigidaire was placed in the parsonage as a surprise to Mrs. Mears on her return from her sick mother's home. These are among the most liberal people on the district. All the Services are well attended. Every organization and club of the church are working in a most magnificent way. Raised for World Service, \$892. Raised for other Benevolences, \$104. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$4,060. Total raised for all purposes, \$35,811. Accessions to the church, 53.

CLAIR MEMORIAL, JERSEY CITY, N. J. (J. E. Licorish). This Charge continues to show great potentialities. The forward programme is most challenging. The pastor is alert and sets a very fine standard for the church. The young people participate in the church activities. Many of them are

attending high school. The pastor and wife show a deep interest in the youth and young adults. Raised for World Service, \$226. Raised for other Benevolences, \$449. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$3,325. Total raised for all purposes, \$9,188. Accessions, 16.

GALILEE, ENGLEWOOD, N. J. (F. C. Kershaw). This church has done an outstanding piece of work for the size of the membership. The interior has been redecorated—all furnishings upholstered. Plans are also being made to rearrange the outside of the church. The pastor has made himself felt in the city. Raised for World Service, \$100. Raised for other Benevolences, \$192. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$1,850. Total raised for all purposes, \$2,142. Accessions, 3.

TRENTON, N. J. (E. H. Holmes). This church and pastor believe in working and they are in every way demonstrating what can be accomplished when all work for the same objective. The pastor and Social Worker, Mrs. Matilda Wynn, are getting results that are really worth while both in the church and community. The pastor is active in the various inter-racial groups of the city, both religious and civic. He is an excellent representative of Methodist ideals in the city of Trenton. Raised for World Service, \$231. Raised for other Benevolences, \$407. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$3,510. Total raised for all purposes, \$13,160. Accessions, 21.

ST. MATTHEWS, NEWARK, N. J. (Wm. R. Mayberry). What was St. John's Mission last year is now St. Matthews Church. They have been very happy since they moved out of the Mission class. The new pastor has been able to accomplish some very outstanding things. He has an exceptionally well organized church. The organizations are now working in a very pleasing manner. The church school is growing nicely. They have not completed the settlement for the new church. I am glad they are ready to do so as soon as all legal angles are straightened out. This will be the first project that the Delaware Conference will be asked to assume some responsibility. The building is in a very fine shape. On the main floor the Sanctuary will seat about 400 people—a pastor's study—a beautiful pipe organ—piano—choir loft to the left of the pulpit—a room adjacent to the Sanctuary—the floor is completely covered with a beautiful covering. The basement has a large Sunday School room—kitchen well equipped—pianos and other furniture. Although they are really making their first report to the Conference, I am glad to say that they were willing to help the General Church. Raised for World Service, \$15. Raised for other Benevolences, \$6. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$1,601. Total raised for all purposes, \$3,891. Accessions, 86.

SPRING LAKE, N. J. (George H. Bethea). This is a summer appointment. There are no members of the church. People from various sections of the country go there to work in the hotels in the summer. A number of them are christians and they work in the church. They are teachers, college professors, students working to help to continue their education. The congregation is made up of all denominations. The hotel owners, I understand, helped these people to get the building. We supervise the work. We have trustees—stewards—selected from among these people. A beautiful night congregation of about 25 or 30. The building is very attractive—well kept

—spotlessly clean. Raised for all purposes, \$585. Paid the pastor, \$425 for two months. If I could find the money, I believe we could start a church in Asbury Park. There is public transportation between the two cities.

JOHN WESLEY, BROOKLYN, N. Y. (C. L. Trader). Brother Trader has accomplished many outstanding things with his affableness and patience and tactfulness. He is doing what was thought to be impossible. The people are kind, sympathetic and lovable. There is more harmony and peace in the church than before. They are working together as one. Both Brother Trader and Sister Trader are adored by this congregation. The results have been outstanding. All obligations to the Brooklyn and Long Island Missionary Society are met regularly. The young people's organizations are organized and active. Raised for World Service, \$200. Raised for other Benevolences, \$1,082. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$947. Total raised for all purposes, \$23,402. Accessions, 55.

NEWMAN MEMORIAL, BROOKLYN, N. Y. (O. W. Jones). The pastor has not had an easy year, but some very necessary things have been accomplished and the work is advancing. I feel that there is a great opportunity to have a great church here. A good foundation is being laid. It is better to take time and build well, than to build up something that will not last. That is now being done in Newman. Results speak louder than words. Raised for World Service, \$545. Raised for other Benevolences, \$45. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$3,878. Total raised for all purposes, \$11,115. Accessions, 83.

REDEEMER, BROOKLYN, N. Y. (A. E. Martin). Redeemer is working extremely hard to get their church building in a comfortable condition for worship. A new heating unit had to be installed and many other very necessary things were forced to be done. The pastor has given excellent guidance and leadership in this improvement. The programme of the church has not been neglected by this work. The various auxiliaries are alive. The pastor is also very active in all city movements. Raised for World Service, \$89. Raised for other Benevolences, \$262. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$2,935. Total raised for all purposes, \$7,892. Accessions, 48.

BROOKS MEMORIAL, JAMAICA, N. Y. (C. L. Carrington). This church has had a very outstanding year. The membership of the church is thrilled because the dreams and anticipations for a new church building are now being realized. Last Fall they broke the ground for their new church building. Sunday, they laid the corner stone. The new church is going up in beautiful fashion. They hope to have the building ready for opening in early Fall. Most of the work is being done by a contractor who is a member of the church. The parsonage has been most beautifully renovated. The church which they now occupy is always over crowded. The Church Board of Education has a very excellent programme of education for every department of the church. The Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Methodist Men are working excellently. The church is a beehive of activity. Raised for World Service, \$206. Raised for other Benevolences, \$1,534. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$4,138. Total raised for all purposes, \$53,795. Accessions, 57.

ST. PAUL, JAMAICA, N. Y. (J. D. Kelly). This church is still advancing very rapidly. All departments are alive. The congregation is increasing. Church School is well organized. The Woman's Society of Christian Service is playing a very conspicuous part in the church and the community. The pastor takes an active part in the civic affairs of the community. Raised for World Service, \$90. Raised for other Benevolences, \$65. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$2,600. Total raised for all purposes, \$10,491. Accessions, 72.

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y. (T. M. Booth). The people here are happy and are anxious for you to know it. They are saying that the Lord really made their assignment. They are not giving the Bishop and the Cabinet any credit for sending Rev. T. M. Booth to White Plains. Since they are so very jubilant, we will acquiesce to their judgment. The finances of the church have been stabilized. Their credit in the community has been rebuilt. The Church School and Young People's organizations are developing most rapidly. Church attendance is increasing. Benevolent offerings, increased. Raised for World Service, \$216. Raised for other Benevolences, \$1,269. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$2,600. Total raised for all purposes, \$16,812. Accessions, 90.

OSSINING, N. Y. (G. T. Jackson). The pastor has worked hard and has been able to do some outstanding things. A beautiful two manual Moller organ has been installed and paid for; also, an oil burner has been installed in the parsonage. A plan is now on foot to redecorate the parsonage. The membership is cooperating beautifully in these projects. Raised for World Service, \$15. Raised for other Benevolences, \$396. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$2,464. Total raised for all purposes, \$6,092. Accessions, 18.

SHAW CHAPEL, N. Y. (S. A. Bellamy). This is a very small congregation, but a more resolute and a more determined one cannot be found. The building in which they worship is too small—it has no elements that would inspire worship—equipment, by no means, adequate—rent is extremely high, and yet these few Methodists carry on in the name of our Lord. When I realize that the church is named for our retiring Bishop, I drop my head in shame—but when I take under consideration the spirit that motivates these loyal members, I call them "blessed." Their optimistic spirit is keeping this church alive. The Delaware Conference should have an outstanding church in New York City. We are the only group that has not. Let us pull together, work together, pray together for at least one outstanding church in the largest city in the nation. Raised for World Service, \$30. Raised for other Benevolences, \$53. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$865. Total raised for all purposes, \$948. Accessions, 1.

EAST CALVARY, N. Y. (L. E. Wise). This is a smaller unit than Shaw Chapel—just able to survive. They are now worshipping on Sunday in a building owned by the City Mission Society of New York. The same building is used for a Day Nursery under the guidance of the City Mission Society. The pastor lives over the first floor. I feel that if the membership were united with Shaw Chapel, we would be at least starting in the right direction. Raised for World Service, \$5. Raised for other Benevolences, \$4. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$580. Total raised for all purposes, \$2,010. Accessions, 8.

BUTLER MEMORIAL, N. Y. (W. P. Johnson). I have been asked many times if the Delaware Conference has any churches in New York City. Yes, we have three congregations. Butler is the only one of the three churches that has a building of its own. This is a fine building but by no means large enough to meet the demands or needs of the community or the congregation. We have a wonderful opportunity in this part of New York for a great church. The Delaware Conference should have one or two outstanding churches here. Rev. and Mrs. Johnson are doing good under the circumstances. Raised for World Service, \$105. Raised for other Benevolences, \$370. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$1,520. Total raised for all purposes, \$8,064. Accessions, 21.

ST. LUKE'S, NEW ROCHELLE, N. Y. (H. M. Deas). The dreams of this pastor and people have not met our anticipations of last year, but I am happy to say that conditions are changing slowly. We think we have enough money in sight to build a new church on a well pointed and located lot, but we will not be satisfied until we get it in our hands. Rev. Deas is really a heroic character. He is a loyal Methodist. He has been offered an outstanding position in other denominations. One white minister asked me to help him to get Brother Deas to be his associate pastor. Brother Deas refused. He decided to stay with us. We must build a church in New Rochelle this year. Raised for World Service, \$47. Raised for other Benevolences, \$13. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$1,050. Total raised for all purposes, \$158. Accessions, 11.

BETHSAIDA, PHILADELPHIA, PA. (J. W. Parker). This is not a large church numerically, but in spirit and heart, none is larger. The pastor has been sick most of this year. The officials have been loyal and very alert, and as a result of this, the work has gone on in a fine way. The pastor is relinquishing his pastoral responsibilities at this conference on account of physical weakness. Raised for World Service, \$100. Raised for other Benevolences, \$233. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$2,081. Total raised for all purposes, \$5,028. Accessions, 10.

CAMPBOR MEMORIAL, PHILADELPHIA, PA. (C. D. Gerald). This is a great church. It has great possibilities. Its potential resources have by no means been evaluated. A large number of high school and college young people are in the congregation. A strong, challenging programme I believe, would draw the young people into active church service. Their mortgage has been cancelled. Raised for World Service, \$461. Raised for other Benevolences, \$641. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$3,836. Total raised for all purposes, \$15,727. Accessions, 56.

TRINITY, EAST GERMANTOWN, PA. (C. J. Williams). Trinity is advancing—but I feel it could do so more rapidly if the various units work together. The Church School needs better support from the adult members of the church. There is an opportunity to have an outstanding church in this part of the city. Raised for World Service, \$120. Raised for other Benevolences, \$20. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$1,341. Total raised for all purposes, \$3,006. Accessions, 3.

EMANUEL, PHILADELPHIA, PA. (L. C. Brown). The church has had a good year. The members were greatly encouraged when we were able to secure a larger building in which to worship. The building was an abandoned

moving picture house. It will seat between 250 and 300 persons. The Division of Home Missions and Church Extension helped finance the project. If we can build up this congregation now—in the future, we have prospects for a regular church building. Rev. Brown and his good people are working anxiously. Raised for World Service, \$50. Raised for other Benevolences, \$65. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$976. Total raised for all purposes, \$10,071. Accessions, 28.

FRANKFORD, PA. (J. E. DUNN). The church is not by any means utilizing its resources. It does not seem to be able to visualize its opportunity. If the church could be really awakened, there is no reason why it could not become a strong organization. I am sorry to say that we have not yet found a panacea for it. Raised for World Service, \$78. Raised for other Benevolences, \$195. Raised for Ministerial Support, \$1,125. Total raised for all purposes, \$4,945. Accessions, 3.

Dear Bishop and Brethren:

By the Grace of God, and your consent, I was commissioned to complete the unfinished task of our fallen leader. I would not voluntarily renew again the voiceless agony which seized us all, a few weeks ago, but future generations demand a record of that fateful night.

Dr. H. R. Coleman—our District Superintendent left his home at Blackwood, New Jersey by automobile March 24, 1952 about 6:30 P. M. to hold his 4th Quarterly Conference at St. Daniels, Chester, Pennsylvania. He reached the Bridgeport-Chester Ferry Slip-New Jersey 7:30 P. M. It was a foggy night, and as he approached the Slip, there seemed to be no guard railings for protection from the dark waters ahead. After this, information appears apparently to be lacking, the imagination must reconstruct the rest. His car moved forward as on sure ground, a plunge into the depths below. A splash, a piercing, agonizing human cry for help—Then silence, darkness, unconsciousness—Then a floating, human body, somewhere in the Delaware River, but a redeemed soul, set free, standing before the Throne of the Merciful God.

Later the automobile was recovered from the river, and similarly the body. This is the tragic story of a man who at 62 years of age was blossoming into his mental and spiritual maturity, and when the years of his rich experience were ripening—He fell never to rise again—That is the Mortal Man, but the Spiritual arose never to return again.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, April 15, 1952 at Ezion Methodist Church—Wilmington, Delaware. The Sanctuary was filled to capacity with Ministers and sympathizing friends to do honor to a great Spiritual Leader.

The following Ministers took part in the services: L. S. Moore—Supt. Philadelphia District; W. A. Harewood, District Supt. Easton District; R. B. Thompson—Dist. Supt. Salisbury District; D. L. Ridout—Dist. Supt. Dover District, who read the Obituary; F. J. Handy—Acting Dist. Supt. Wilmington District; J. T. Fletcher, W. C. Strother, J. U. Watson, J. Quinton Jackson. Organ music by Mrs. Bernice Gardiner. Solo by Mrs. Jessie Pratt. The Body was laid to rest in the Cemetery—Middletown, Delaware.

The entire Conference and others enter with profound appreciation of the affection of the family and point them to the Cross of Christ, our only star of hope in all of Life's crisis. For "Hope sees a star, and listening love can hear the flutter of a Wing."

Similarly, perhaps not as tragically, but as deeply death inflicted wounds in the heart of other families—The following ministers passed away this year: D. H. Hargis; J. E. A. Johns; Wm. R. Price, and with them Mrs. Ollie Hughes, the wife of R. C. Hughes; Mrs. Rella Fassett, the wife of J. A. Fassett; James E. Groves, the brother of Mrs. J. I. Peaco and George Bishop, brother of John E. Bishop. "These all walked with death as a friend and companion and were not afraid"—but like Enoch They had witness born to them—that they had been well pleasing to God.

In assuming the responsibilities of the District, considerable work had to be done in order to finish creditably. The response on the part of both laymen and pastors was both enthusiastic and co-operative; and for this I wish to express thanks and appreciation and add without which I could not have succeeded in this difficult and delicate task. I held 19 Quarterly Conferences. All salaries due Dr. Coleman raised in full and paid to the widow. The District has only one debt unpaid—namely—the Parsonage which amounts to \$1078.00.

The District Program has maintained at a high level. The leaders, men and women of integrity and courage.

Mrs. Pearl R. Spence, our Conference President constantly gives inspiration by her presence, counsel and guidance. She is ably supported by Mrs. Cleo Henry—the Dist. President and others. The Ministers Wives Association—Mrs. Helen B. Jones, Pres. and the Monthly Preachers meetings—R. C. Hughes, Pres. were very active during the year.

Religious Education

Bro. Howard A. Bailey, Conf. Ex. Sec. of Religious Education carefully supervises this work, and is supported by the Sub. District Chairman, O. Connell Milbourne, E. V. Wimberly, W. C. Strother, W. H. Johns, and Waller

R. Hazzard. Other District workers are O. H. Spence, Missionary Sec., Mrs. Clarice Walker, Sec. of Evangelism, J. U. Watson, Dir. Adult Work, S. L. Jones, Dir. Youth Work, Mrs. Emma Strother, Dir. Childrens Work, Mrs. Ella Bailey, Lay Leader, Carlton Punker, Pres. Methodist Youth Fellowship.

The Dunleith Project

This represents a most challenging Missionary appeal. Many new homes are being built here for our group. The nearest church is 3 miles away. A survey reveals 199 persons with Methodist preferences, the largest number of any of the major denominations. At the June meeting of the Wilmington Council of Churches a final decision will be made regarding the assignment of the priority and ground offered by this private Company. For us to lose this opportunity to house our Methodist Constituency, will be fatal. It is hoped that our Board will assist.

ATLANTIC CITY: (Asbury) W. L. D. Lyght, Pastor. A church which established a tradition of high standing, its pulpit one of the leading in the city. The present pastor has maintained the standards—a wise administration, a good pastor, an able preacher. All benevolent and other apportionments raised in full. An equipped nurses unit and a trained nurse provided. A new beautiful lighting system installed costing \$4,300. Parsonage improved costing \$1200. Salary increased \$500—totaling \$3,500.00. The highest paid pulpit on the District. Raised for all purposes \$18,000.00.

HAMILTON. W. R. Hazzard, Pastor. The skilled leadership of the pastor, after 7 years of service has produced a congregation whose culture and spiritual influences make a substantial impact on the life of the community. The work among the Youth impressive, the Sunday services of a high order and uplifting. All benevolences and other obligations paid in full. A new 9 room parsonage purchased at a cost of \$9,000.00—minimum salary \$2,800.00, an increase of \$200.00, raised for Trustees \$5,868.64 and for all purposes \$9,613.84.

BRIDGETON: J. P. Bell, Pastor. Into his home came a baby girl. Following the successes of last year the alert pastor proceeded to add other achievements to his credit. Storm doors built and screens placed around parsonage windows, a new Wurlitzer Organ with chimes installed in church building at a cost of \$2,600.00—\$1,600.00 of which has been paid. A very fine co-operative spirit between pastor and people exists. Benevolent and other apportionments raised. Raised for Trustees \$2,171.57. Current improvements, \$1,369.08. Pastors Salary, \$2,000.00 but \$300.00 allowed for personal expenses, \$100.00 for fuel, total \$2,400.00. Raised for all purposes, \$7,181.74. All Local financial obligations paid to date.

BURLINGTON: Horace Fisher, Pastor and MT. HOLLY: (J. E. A. Johns, deceased) supplied by J. C. Purnell. The late Dr. Coleman separated these two points a few years ago but the arrangement was never satisfactory. Bro. Fisher has done good work at Burlington. Nearly all benevolences and other apportionments raised. Minimum salary \$1,000.00. \$868.84 raised

for Trustees and for all purposes \$2,800.00. In recognition of the heroic services of these people, the Division of Home Missions and Church Extension has granted a loan of \$2000 and \$100 donation for church purposes.

MT. HOLLY: Bro. Johns who never failed left a good substantial foundation for his successor. Some benevolences and other apportionments raised. Minimum salary \$800.00. These two points should be reunited—thus giving the Pastor a better salary of \$1,800.00 and making it possible to do more efficient work.

BUTTONWOOD: Thomas Johnson, Pastor.

DELAWARE CITY and KIRKWOOD: C. E. Kincade, Pastor.

MIDDLETOWN: J. O. Griffin, Pastor.

ODESSA and PORT PENN: I. H. Thompson, Pastor.

ST. GEORGES: Jacob Caulk, Pastor.

Good work has been done at each of the points. Benevolences raised and improvements. At Buttonwood improvements \$193.00. Salary \$860.00.

Delaware City-Kirkwood: Improvements \$1,501.00. Salary \$850.00.

Middletown: Improvements and raised for all purposes \$4,000. Salary \$1,500.00.

Odessa-Port Penn: Improvements and all purposes \$2,706.00. Salary \$1,500.00.

St. Georges: Improvements and all purposes \$1,363.00. Salary \$310.00.

Such an arrangement would be more in harmony with modern trends as well as more effective.

GRACE: B. A. Arnold, Pastor. Total membership 152. Conf. Benevolences nearly in full. Pastors salary \$1,656.00. Raised to all purposes \$2,888.00. The pastor completes his 13th year. Quiet, very thorough—Here is a large opportunity for expansion.

CAPE MAY and SWAINTON: S. G. Fullman, Pastor. Most of the benevolences raised. Improvements on parsonage. \$300 deposited in bank for other improvements on Franklyn Street church property. New oil heater installed in John Wesley Church at Swainton. Pastors Salary \$1,700. Raised for all purposes \$2,065. The pastor is a faithful, conscientious worker.

CAMDEN, EIGHTH ST.: Wm. Gee, Jr., Pastor. Received on confession of faith 9. Received by transfer 1. Full membership 97. A good years work. Benevolences provided for. Pastors Salary \$1,300. Raised for all purposes \$3,121.50. Some essential work on church property; Renovations; new furniture in parsonage.

FERRY AVE.: J. A. Fassett, Pastor. Great sorrow overcame the pastor in the loss of his companion but like a true soldier of the cross he overcame, and girded himself for the task. Received on Profession of faith 1. Received by transfer 1. Received into full membership 7. Total membership 170. Benevolences provided for. Pastors salary \$2,300. The church repainted; new concrete steps to the building; some very necessary repairs on

the parsonage; new chairs purchased for church schoolroom. Total raised for repairs \$3,410 and for all purposes \$6,837.00. Minimum salary \$2,600.

ST. DANIELS: F. D. Jones, Pastor. A church of commanding influence. A pastor of intrepidity and faith, resulting in a combination that gives 100% results. All benevolences and other apportionments paid in full. Exterior of church painted and other necessary improvements. Parsonage refurbished, all repairs paid for. Salary \$3,200.00. Raised for all purposes \$19,477.00. An excellent job. "Well done good and faithful servant."

SILOAM: Sercy L. Jones, Pastor. Here we have a church conscious of its obligations to the community. A keen minded intelligent Pastor, with an absorbing passion to serve. He reports 255 pastoral visits to sick and shut-ins. And seeks those needing spiritual guidance and counsel. A Real Shepherd. The charge has adopted the Commission Plan recommended by the Discipline. Thus giving every person on the charge an opportunity to work. A new property has been purchased on the corner of 17th and Walnut Streets at a cost of \$6,100.00 for local and educational purposes. Minimum salary \$2,600.00 Raised for all purposes \$7,556.00.

DARBY: W. C. Strother, Pastor. I will be forgiven, I hope, if I venture a comparison. The Army does something for a man which can scarcely be done by any other agency. A man who as a Chaplain returns to the Pastorate has an equipment quite unlike anything else. This is true of the other Chaplain Pastors on the District, namely C. W. Perry and M. L. McKenney. Brother Strother reveals in his work this masterly training. The arrangement of his material, the quality of his work, the punctiliousness by which it is done gives one a thrill of satisfaction, that only perfection can give. If I have overstated it, that is at least the way I feel. This is the Bishops Guild church, now the memorial Church of the Conference. On June 10, 1952 the congregation moved into the new church building. Dr. Wm. V. Middleton, Ex. Sec. of the Division of Home Missions and Church Extension spoke. In the afternoon Bishop Alexander P. Shaw delivered the message. The late Dr. H. R. Coleman presiding. All claims paid. World Service \$94.00. Raised for all purposes \$8,000.00. Paid to Board \$1,000.00. All payments up to date. Paid contractor on building project \$6,621.00. Thirty-eight members added to the church.

DELAIR: P. R. Hilton, Pastor. Late in the Conference year, the pastor W. R. Price passed away. He had laid a good foundation. His work was thorough and conscientious. The present pastor upon assuming charge, acted wisely and took hold where his predecessor left off. Nearly all benevolences raised. Pastors Salary \$1,690.00. Raised for all purposes \$3,312.76.

ELKTON: W. A. T. Miles, Pastor. A man need not be old, because the calendar says so, provided he keeps mentally alert and his spirit in harmony with God. Thus, the pastor gives himself with beautiful abandon to the work and obtains results. He reports (a) The organization of Major Boards, (b) Daily Vacation Bible Schools, (c) Installation of rest rooms. Salary \$1,300.00. Raised for all purposes \$3,350.00. The community has responded to this experienced leader.

FORDSVILLE: Wm. Tasco, Pastor. Wife ill, we pray for her recovery. A truly remarkable community and a pastor conscious of the needs of his people. All benevolences and other apportionments raised in full. Con-

structed a wing to the parsonage for pastor's study, fully equipped. Renovated Parish house, basement walls and sub floor of new church completed. All materials and labor paid for. In recognition of the Pastor's services salary raised \$850.00. A total of \$2,930.00. Raised for all purposes \$8,954.00 a commendable achievement.

GRENLOCK and RHODES: Samuel Wilkins, Pastor. A three point charge, with certain inherent inhibitions, yet one is impressed with the loyalty of the people and deep religious devotion of the pastor. He preaches at each point every Sunday and often 4 times. This spirit welds the people together in unity. Benevolences cared for, some improvements on church property at Davistown and Berlin. Many activities are carried on, emphasis on church school activities, the Woman's Society of Christian Service and Mens work. The pastor refuses to permit an increase in salary because he feels the charge at this point is not able to do more. Minimum salary \$1,400 although over \$1,400 paid this year. The term applicable to both preacher and people is selfless service.

LAWNSIDE: E. V. Wimberly, Pastor. A very careful and painstaking Pastor. Benevolences and other apportionments cared for. Purchased new parsonage at a cost of \$7,695.00. Raised for all purposes \$4,250.93. Pastors salary \$2,000.00.

MERCHANTSVILLE: J. O. Stanley, Pastor. A minister who will not fail. He takes all his tasks as commands from God. World services and Conference apportionments in full. Mortgage of over 20 years standing cancelled. Parsonage repapered, other improvements noted. Salary \$2,080. Raised for all purposes \$6,924. They all now sing the Doxology with a zest.

NEW CASTLE: J. I. Peaco, Pastor. I think the word "remarkable" aptly applies to both church and pastor. Every obligation met. Plans have been made for new heating system. Visiting evangelism emphasized, with the Evangelistic note to all preaching. Raised for all purposes \$3,855. Minimum salary \$1,560.00.

NEWPORT: W. H. Johns, Pastor. The Pastor became, this Conference year, a very willing victim of the Matrimonial Casualties, and thus by the same token increased his effectiveness 100 fold. He has done a good years work. Benevolences provided for. The parsonage repaired and made very comfortable. This is a growing community. 250 homes have been built and occupied by our group.

The pastor and wife have gained the confidence of all the people. A new Tabernacle has been erected in the church grove to meet the new demands. All paid for. The town has awakened to new life in response to this aggressive leadership. Raised for all purposes \$5,024.00. Salary \$1,800.00.

PLEASANTVILLE and OCEAN CITY: C. W. Perry, Pastor. These two points were united last year. The pastor was transferred from the N. Y. East Conference. These churches seemed to be waiting for him. He met every anticipation and within a year transformed a small appointment to a larger one. Conference benevolences and other apportionment paid in full. The Quarterly Conference unanimously voted a substantial increase in salary, fixing it at \$55.00 per week; thus raising the charge from

Minimum salary \$1,380.00. Thus have these men, like prophets of all labored in the fear of God—leaving all results with him.

"The Prophets must lead the way—Then speak, O church, and rekindling the faith in a world of despairing men." (Marshall Wingfield). From the Episcopal Address 1952.

And now dear Bishop—May I be permitted a personal word? It is with deep appreciation, I recognize your graciousness in granting me this high privilege to serve again. I now return in retirement to the bosom of my family, and companions and books in meditation, peace and happiness. We may be separated by broad distances, but there can be no separation to those united in the spirit and the fellowship of love. Some day—one or the other of us, perhaps the Elder will slip through the curtain that separates the living from the dead—and stand on the other shore looking and waiting for his younger brother—A Bishop of the Methodist Church to come home—"May the Lord make his face to shine upon you and give you peace."

SALISBURY DISTRICT

Bishop Shaw and Brethren:

Under the guidance of Our Heavenly Father, we come for the fourth time, to report another fruitful year of service on behalf of the Salisbury District, to this the Ninetieth Session of the Delaware Annual Conference. "The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad." (Psalm 126.3).

Within the brief scope of this report we cannot do justice to those pastors and their charges, who have striven to maintain their former record with small membership and some economic reverses. The farmers and their seasonal workers have been the first to feel the effect of lowered income in the face of the continued rising cost of certain goods. But it will be seen that the district as a whole has made general advance, for which we rejoice.

While most of our families have enjoyed excellent health, there has been some sickness, some sorrow, and some loss.

The Rev. R. J. Williams, retired, was called to his reward. He had supplied Stockton Circuit about 20 years to 1946. The father of the Rev. E. A. Hughes also passed; and the father of the wife of Rev. Charles W. Cannon went to his coronation.

Joy came to Rev. and Mrs. George McMurray, when baby Jacquetta LeMay was born July 25, 1951. Another baby girl was born Oct. 10th, to Rev. and Mrs. Charles W. Cannon, named Loretta Carolyn.

On January 5, 1952, the Rev. Lewis H. Jones was united in holy wedlock to Mrs. Ola Waters. The ceremony was conducted by his brother, the Rev. Grover N. Jones, at Snow Hill, Md.

District Events

The District Stewards' Meeting at Wattsville, was marked by budget-planning for a year round program of Christian Education. Rev. H. A. Bailey, Secretary of Christian Education, managed to visit the district frequently, giving guidance in program building and in the execution thereof.

The District Institute and Training Schools received superlative financial support and the work done was commensurate with former years. The Institute for 1952 will be held June 24-27 at Maryland State College. The accommodations are excellent.

The District Conference was held at Princess Anne, Oct. 10-12. The theme was "The Christian Family Living in Today's World." The discussions aided in carrying forward our year's work.

On District Climax Day, March 27, 1952, Bishop Shaw gave the noontide message to an overflow audience. As an English bishop said about Phillips Brooks, "He makes one feel so strong." And we will add, he makes you feel that you can go out and preach a better sermon after hearing him. He does more than discuss a subject; he is creative, dynamic, soulful; the seer with a something of the Eternal in his majestic voice. We love him with all our heart.

On May 2nd, at Princess Anne, a sacred drama, "The Dream of Queen Esther," was presented by a group of ministers, their wives and laymen, directed by Mrs. George E. Geddes. She made the costumes assisted by Mrs. Ada W. Coffey. Net receipts \$137. The Board of Education gave \$50.00 additional to cover expenses. The Ministers' Wives Fund will be the largest to date. In this dramatic performance, our District leads the entire Conference.

The Charges

COTTAGE GROVE (Charles W. Cannon) makes a moderate report as compared with last year. Raised for all purposes \$2,443. A new oil heater has been installed in the parsonage, together with new furnishings. The pastor is invited to return.

CRISFIELD-SHILOH (W. E. Marks) grows in appreciation for a worthy pastor and his diligent wife. All collections are in full. Total raised \$7,502.

DAMES QUARTER (J. S. Collins) has declined in monetary support generally although the pastor has tried to have them advance. Raised for all purposes \$3,100. 2 Accessions.

DEALS ISLAND (C. B. White) has done much better this year. The membership is small. They are willing to unite with another church. Raised for all causes \$2,266.

FRUITLAND (S. E. Parker) is a fruitful charge, progressive and loyal to capable leadership. Friendship Church painted, the parsonage renovated. Pastors salary advanced \$400 in 2 years, now \$2,200. Grand total raised \$5,156. Accessions 9.

GIRDLETREE (L. H. Purnell) goes on and on. Pastor's salary advanced \$200. Raised for improvements \$3,373; for benevolences \$528; for all purposes \$7,254. Accessions —.

GREENWOOD (I. H. White) suffers continued loss in lay leadership. One church is reduced to one member. Accession 4. Raised for all causes \$2,816.

HOPEWELL (G. N. Jones). Pastor and people pull together. Another 100% report. Raised for all purposes \$3,726. Accessions —.

HORNTOWN (Elisha White). This charge after 14 years under the present pastor maintains its former status in good work 100%. Raised for all purposes \$3,205.

KELLER-EXMORE (H. W. Spencer). Keller carries on as before and Exmore is catching her sister's stride. The pastor is one man who has the diligence and tact which this outpost requires. Total raised \$1,260.

LEEMONT (H. E. Anderson) takes adult education seriously, with a special mid-week class in the "Negro in Methodism." The two churches maintain a vigorous program led by the pastor aided by a most capable wife. Raised for all purposes: Benevolences \$1,102; Trustees \$1,175; Total \$5,769.

MANOKIN (R. F. Graham). The pastor and people agree on a change. Collections show decline. Raised for all purposes \$2,399.

MARION STATION (G. W. Taylor). Manages well under present parsonate. He has been especially attentive to paying off the debt at Handy Memorial; and we can expect Mt. Peer to cooperate in the total budget of the charge. Raised for trustees \$4,702; for benevolences \$750; for all purposes \$7,945. Accessions —.

MARIMSCO-KINGSTON (Alexander Reid). The pastor is an esteemed leader who has led his people for six successful years. New members 6. The men are organized and at work in both churches. Total \$4,694.

MT. VERNON (Gertrude V. Bell). This charge has done better and can do much more if it will. The pastor is at work all the year. Raised for all purposes \$3,335.

NANTICOKE (T. L. Ross) has had the best year of its history in genuine advance. Accessions 2. Subscriptions to the Advocate 13. The parsonage is being refurbished, a new frigidaire was paid for in full. Raised for all purposes \$4,503. The pastor and his wife are welcome.

OAKVILLE (G. W. Johnson). The parsonage interior has been renovated and thus made more comfortable; electric lights are installed. The pastor is invited to return. Raised for all purposes \$2,412.

ORIOLE (Alexander Boggs). Venton is discontinued but a fair year of work has been done. Raised for all purposes \$2,548.

PARSONSBURG (R. W. Dennis). The charge remains on the honor roll. The pastor and wife are both capable and faithful in service. Raised for all purposes \$4,059. Salary advanced \$200.00. Accessions 6.

POCOMOKE CITY (G. H. McMurray). With an able leader this charge holds easily its place on the district. All collections in full. Total \$4,523.

PRINCESS ANNE (W. E. Stanley). Preminent in things in educational, the mecca of music and art, Maryland State College includes the

pastor and Metropolitan Church in its area of culture. This is a 100% charge, free of debt. Raised for all purposes \$4,852. Accessions 14. Salary increased \$100.

QUANTICO (J. W. Hayman). The pastor again places his post in the front rank of charges, 100%: Raised for all purposes \$3,389.

SALISBURY-JOHN WESLEY (C. A. Elder). The pastor is again invited to return. With a bit more push the small balance due on the mortgage would be paid. Raised for all purposes \$8,716. New members 15. Thus John Wesley takes the lead again.

SALISBURY-WHITE TEMPLE (H. D. Davis). The Hammond Organ is paid for in full. New Choir robes purchased; new garage and utility building constructed. Accessions 3. Raised for all purposes \$4,544.

SNOW HILL (G. E. Geddes). The interior of both church and parsonage has been redecorated. New Members 6. The pastor and his wife are especially serviceable on the charge and on the district. Total Ministerial support \$2,675. Benevolences \$517. Trustees \$1,750. Grand Total \$4,988.

HUTT'S MEMORIAL and SHILOH (L. H. Jones). This charge results from the merger of Snow Hill and Stockton Circuits. Brother Jones is rapidly bringing it to self-support. There is no parsonage. Friendship will join them this year. Raised for all purposes \$2,431. Accessions 7.

STOCKTON (A. W. Coffey). Stockton and St. Marks together make a good \$2,000 appointment. Here is true fellowship. The pastor is unanimously invited to return for the fifth year. Total raised by Stockton \$3,701; by St. Marks \$610; grand total \$4,311. Accessions 6. Church and parsonage renovated. St. Marks Membership 14.

UNION ASBURY and LIBERIA (M. C. Anderson). The pastor says: "Our churches do a wonderful work with a small membership." Here is a ministry of good will and service. Total receipts \$4,212. Accessions —. \$100 on Bishop's Guild in memory of D. H. Hargis.

UPPER HILL (R. S. Townsend). This charge is finding it difficult to maintain, even with good leadership; the membership is declining. Raised for all purposes —. Accessions —.

WACHAPREAGUE (E. J. Johnson). The parsonage has been given a new roof, also interior painted, and papering has been done. The pastor is faithful. Total receipts \$2,700.

WATTSVILLE (A. E. Hughes). The pastor reports a new space heater in St. Johns Church, the church hall covered and painted inside. At Friendship renovated kitchen and dining room, also parsonage. Held Vacation School with 96 enrolled. 3 denominations united. Total raised for all purposes \$5,183. Accessions —.

WETIPQUIN (C. H. Cottingham). With tactful guidance this charge returns to the honor roll. Raised for all purposes \$4,116.

WHITE HAVEN (Roy Ennis). This charge in two years has attained first rank. The pastor and his wife are a fine team. Total received \$3,741.

WITHAMS (R. T. Crosswell). This pastor lost his devoted wife two days before the convening of Conference last year. He says: "We are grateful to God for a year of success." Receipts \$4,654.

Summary

Total raised for all purposes \$138,632. Total number of new members 200.

Training in church membership and polity is essential to our laymen, who cooperate intelligently with the pastors in maintaining from year to year the expanding work of our Methodism.

Some pastors are not improving their abilities to lead on in efficient service. A man can become a liability. The age level for accepted supply pastors should be kept down to or below the forty year level, so that they may be required to study for an effective ministry. If the laymen will continue to advance salaries so that they may be commensurate with that offered in our city area, more of our trained pastors will be content to serve wherever sent.

The ministry and laity of the district have earned my deepest appreciation and thanks for the kindly support given the program of our great church during the year.

May I again thank you, Bishop Shaw, for your continued favor and help whenever we have called upon you. We hope you will consider us your brothers in Christ forever. Amen.

We at this time pause in memory of two members of our Board who passed during the year: Dr. Howard R. Coleman and Rev. O. S. Edwards. We were very fortunate to have been blessed with their loyal devotion and faithful services.

REPORT OF THE STAFF OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Bishop Shaw and Members of the Conference. We are pleased to present to the Annual Conference a report of our services rendered.

The Membership of our Board was visited twice by death during the year. Rev. O. S. Edwards went to his reward early in November 1951 and Rev. H. R. Coleman left us in April 1952. The memory of the loyal devotion and fellowship of these beloved members will live long to inspire us to greater achievements.

The Challenge of These Days

We are living and working in a time of tension. We are never sure what any day may bring forth. One has a growing sense of approaching crisis as our nation moves toward total mobilization. The tension caused by this state of affairs has its effect upon our work in Christian education. Our youth are in a state of insecurity with regard to their future. Our children are growing up in an atmosphere where preparation for war is the normal activity. Parents are greatly disturbed about the future of their children. Homes are under a heavy strain, if indeed, they are not broken under these tensions. In such a situation the urgency of the need to do a larger and better job of Christian teaching is most apparent.

In light of the urgency of the situation we pause to evaluate our program of the past year in terms of our success or failure to minister to persons in this time of tension.

We are confident that progress is being made. There are many evidences that there is a steady climb in the direction of more efficient Christian teaching in the churches of the conference. The eagerness with which local church workers enter into the training enterprises which are set from time to time is an indication that they are anxious to do the best possible job of teaching.

It has been a great job to labor with the host of workers who are committed to the merits of the ministry of teaching. We have seen some wonderful things come to pass through the years. What has been achieved has been due to the combined efforts of the Bishop, the District Superintendents, the District and Sub-District Directors, the Pastors and the hundreds of local church officers and teachers—this is a vast company of Christian workers. We have an ever abiding sense of gratitude for the privilege of sharing this fellowship through the years. It is our hope and prayer that we shall have vision and strength to meet the challenge of our day; to make Christ known as a real and vital force in the lives of those whom we serve.

We submit this brief report of the highlights of our work in the hope that it will indicate something of the work accomplished toward the achievement of our goals.

Children's Work

We take the position that much of our success or failure in our efforts to lead persons into vital Christian living will depend upon what we are able to do with them while they are in the tender and formative years. From the conference level we see our responsibility as that of helping adults to be effective teachers of children. We seek, therefore, to guide parents, church school teachers and others who work with children. If we are successful in helping them to be better teachers of children we will feel that our efforts are not in vain.

The Laboratory School for Children's Workers was held at Bever College, Jenkintown, Pa. Twelve workers from our conference were enrolled.

The school represents one of the very fine inter-conference projects in which we participate; the other two conferences being the Philadelphia and the New Jersey.

Eight (8) Vacation Church School institutes were held during the month of May in which 163 workers were trained to carry on vacation church schools. The largest number of schools for any one year was reported for the summer:

Youth Work

In our Youth work we share the concern of the whole church for the spiritual welfare of our youth in these days which are in many respects difficult for our young people. We recognize our task to be two fold. (1)

To help guide our youth to the better way of life. (2) To give guidance to adults who have the privilege and responsibility of working with youth.

Seminars for Adult Workers With Youth were held with a large number of adults participating. This method of helping adults to better understand and appreciate the needs of our young people is bringing gratifying results. On the districts where the seminars were not held, classes for adult workers were conducted in the subdistrict Christian Workers' Schools.

District Missionary Rallies were held on all districts, on Friday November 23rd, were among the outstanding projects of the year. A total of 350 youth and adults participated in these rallies. Appearing on the various programs were Miss Vivian Ridout, who had recently returned from Italy; Miss Marian Cottman who had only a few weeks before returned from a tour of a number of European Countries; and Miss Sylvia Rock who spent a few years in Japan with the Red Cross.

The Conference Assembly was one of the best in recent years. The newly elected Dean, Rev. J. E. Licorish, assisted by David Briddell, Conference MYF President, ably guided the youth and adults in attendance. A total of 101 young people were enrolled coming from the districts as follows:

DOVER, 23; EASTON, 19; PHILADELPHIA, 44; SALISBURY, 5; WILMINGTON, 10. TOTAL, 101.

Our young people are increasingly showing a desire to enter the institutions of higher education. We were able to assist 8 worthy students through our Scholarship Fund and one Supply Pastor through the Student Aid Fund.

The number of young people who are making commitments to church vocations is increasing. We now have on file the names of 32 young people who have made such commitments.

Adult Work

We have little hope of improving the home life of our people unless we reach more adults with Christian teaching. Much of our work with children and youth is weakened because adults with whom they live do not set the Christian example before them. We seek to help adults to understand more fully what it means to live as Christians.

Young Adult work is no longer an experiment in our conference. During the year 9 workshops were held on the districts. In these training enterprises large numbers of Young Adults were informed and inspired to attempt greater things for God and His church.

The truly outstanding achievement of the year was the honor which came to us through Miss Marian Cottman being selected to be a member of the Methodist Youth and Young Adult European Travel Seminar. Miss Cottman who was sent by the conference (see special report of the Treasurer) made a very significant contribution to the group in which she was one of the two young adults, the other eight being youth. Her messages, which have been heard by a large number of young adult groups, have been most helpful.

The Y. A. F. Annual Conference recently held at John Wesley Church, Brooklyn, N. Y. served to give guidance to the 67 delegates who came from all sections of the conference. The conference theme: "Christian Family

Living in Today's World," brought to all a challenge to help strengthen the home that it may not fail in these days of tension and insecurity.

Along with seven other conferences, we participated in the first Adult Convocation held in this region. The few days spent at Buck Hill Falls, Pa. under the leadership of some of the foremost leaders in Christian Education of Adults, were most helpful to the 17 delegates who attended from our conference. Upon their return these delegates have been seeking to share something of the rich experience which was theirs at the convocation. We look forward to return to Buck Hill Falls in March 1953.

Other Activities

Christian Workers' Schools are still our principal means of leadership education for the local church workers. The following gives a brief picture of what happened in these schools during the year.

These schools reveal once more that there are a host of workers who are eager to improve their work of teaching. The seventeen deans and the teachers who served so well are to be commended upon a job well done.

Church School enrollment has shown some improvement as of the last report to the annual conference (1951) we had an over-all gain of 456 over the previous year.

Cooperation with other conferences has been most rewarding. The following conferences have fellowshipped with us in cooperative programs. The Washington Conference in preparation for the Jurisdictional Conference educational program; The Philadelphia and New Jersey in promoting the Laboratory school; The Peninsular in promoting The Call to Youth in Action.

Cooperation with other Boards of the Conference has likewise proved to be a rich experience. Outstanding in this regard is the work the Woman's Society of Christian Service; The Board of Ministerial Training; The Commission on Christian Vocations, and The Board of Lay Activities.

Things Which Need Our Attention

Notwithstanding our achievements, "there remains yet much land to be possessed." Here are only a few to which we must give our attention.

1. Make every effort to enlarge our church school rolls. Many of our communities have more children than ever before. This is especially true of the small children.
2. We must seek to get closer cooperation between the church school and the home. We must minister to our homes in every possible way.
3. Double our efforts to train the leadership in the churches.
4. Organize new schools in communities where they are needed. In many of our urban communities Methodist churches and church schools are greatly needed.

- 5. Help churches with the problem of enlisting workers for all age groups.
- 6. Do all within our power to help the church to be a real moral and spiritual influence in the local community.
- 7. Strengthen and deepen the spiritual lives of our people, especially our youth.
- 8. We must render a larger ministry to our older youth, especially those who are in the armed forces.

There are a number of other needs which serve to challenge us as we seek to guide growing persons into Christ-likeness.

REPORT OF BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

The welfare of human society should be close to the heart of every person and especially to the people called Christian; and that is detrimental thereto should be counted as an enemy of public good.

The Church, as the champion of human rights and by its founder the nobility of its precepts and the purpose of its program, must take the initiative and lead the crusade against beverage and other narcotics.

The task of the Church has been made difficult on account of the wide spread publicity given to strong drink.

The liquor interest now enters every home through the medium of radio and television. There is, therefore, a very subtle threat to every home. For the advertiser's purpose is to make drinkers drink more, and to induce non drinkers to begin the habit. Every growing child becomes a potential drinker for the liquor interest, and they are out to convince all of the superiority of some particular brand. Thus children of impressionable years are exposed to the clever inducements to strong drink.

Such advertising is a threat to every child and youth who comes under its influence. Where can there be found a better future market for the distribution of alcoholic beverages than the young men and women of our nation?

Under present conditions of advertisement we hardly have a choice as to whether we are to listen or not, since the advertisements are so skillfully arranged that we can't help but hearing what is being said. Thus we are all victims of a well laid scheme that opens up every home to those who traffic in intoxicating drinks.

We are told that 50 million drinking Americans waste eight billion dollars annually on beverage alcohol; and 500 million cigarettes are manufactured yearly for people in the United States. Think of the economic waste involved.

From reading our daily papers it is observable that the use of narcotics is prevalent among our people, and it seems to be growing, notwithstanding the strenuous efforts of the Federal and State Government to stamp it out. Many of our people have fallen victims to this dreadful habit, and still more stand to yield to it if effective means are not found to prevent it.

It is a vicious habit wrecking men and women mentally, morally, and physically. Through its influence many are driven to crime and at last to destruction. Perhaps this dreadful habit holds the biggest threat to our youth of high school age and above. We must guard against this by teaching our youth of its evils and by warning all men of its dangers and by co-operating with law enforcement authorities in combating the evils wherever it may be found to exist.

In view of the fact that the use of strong drink and other narcotics has reached an all time high, and the church in the advance-movement has taken the position the general adoption of abstinence from all alcoholic beverages and narcotics, is the most natural, surest, simplest and quickest method of removing evils which result from their use; and as the first step toward the solution of many of the most difficult problems that confront us.

Recommendations

1. An Active Temperance Committee in each Church of the Conference.
2. Director of Temperance Work in each District.
3. Conference Wide Circulation of the "Voice," Official Organ of the Board of Temperance.
4. A Temperance Study Class in each local church.
5. Church Wide observance of Commitment Sunday.
6. Temperance Week Rally in each District before Commitment Day.
7. Observance of World Temperance Sunday.
8. Loyal Support to the General Board of Temperance.

WORLD PEACE

The Church has the chief responsibility in waging international peace, and that the hope of the world lies in the Christian Church. The Methodist Church holds latent powers for world wide leadership which has not yet reached its flood-tide. Today is the time for the focusing of Methodism immense spiritual and moral potential upon the points where the issues of war and peace are joined.

God's call to the church is unmistakable. It is a call to far vision and deep insight; to courageous thinking and to courageous action. It is a call to power, to the acceptance of the living Spirit of Jesus, to the commitment of our lives to the coming of His Kingdom.

Because of the tremendous responsibilities which rest upon the church and the influence it wields in the world, a very important subject was brought before it this year, namely, Universal Military Training—Conscription and Your Boy. In cooperation with American Friends Society and other Annual Conferences of our Methodist Church the U. M. T. Bill which was introduced to Congress for a speedy passage was not passed.

The real reason that military leaders and those who support them are working so hard to persuade the country to adopt some form of universal military service is summed up in the word indoctrination.

The military mind, contemptuous of any but the military approach to world problems, would like to see the whole country similarly minded. This, of course, is exactly what free Americans do not want. And the reason the pressure is so great for passage then and now, is that the proponents of U. M. T. believe it can be passed when the emergency ends. So they shout "crisis" and "military necessity," even though a full-scale U. M. T. could not be set up now because it would interfere with the country's defenses in the emergency.

The future welfare of our nation and the strength of the Christian Church is dependent upon young people with deep spiritual roots which have been nurtured in the environment of a Christian home, school and church and for which Military training is no substitute.

If U. M. T. is necessary, it is a necessary evil. It must be justified solely as a military program and measured by its effectiveness as such. There is no other excuse for it.

Because of the importance of the World Peace Committee we make the following recommendations:—

FIRST: That the churches in the Conference organize committees on World Peace so that the lay members may have an opportunity to spread the gospel of Peace.

SECOND: That the work of World Peace shall be under the direction of one pastor and one layman in each district.

THIRD: That forums be held with the united efforts of prayer on the part of all christians to help make our world a fit place in which to live.

FOURTH: That Annual Seminars be conducted in our Conference or unite in seminars with other conferences.

FIFTH: That the committee be given a place in the program of the Annual and District Conferences.

SIXTH: That the committee with one or two District Superintendents be empowered to represent the conference in any important matter or matters relative to World Peace that may arise before the next Conference Session.

SEVENTH: That we fail not in the distribution of good literature.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Here we stand, we women of Methodism in the morning of a new Quadrennium with stupendous tasks before us. Which is the most urgent thing? Not the organization, nor the persons who make up the working groups, not even how much money is raised, nor for what purposes it was spent. The most urgent thing, the one imperative on which rest all the good we do in all lines, is that we give ourselves to the cultivation of spiritual values in ourselves and in the church there is nothing to equal it, much less surpass it, whatever other issues, problems, and tasks may confront us.

This year the societies have studied the Acts of the Apostles and of its character, the emphasis, the victories, the failures of the early church. It was the local church, for it was the only church. About it lay the great heathen world; for a description of the morals of that, would we have only to turn back to the first Chapter of Romans to see it as Paul knew it. Look at our world today, it is not too far from Paul's day. If you will read the head lines of our daily papers, we find that the pattern is not yet lost.

Let us go back to that early church for some of its lessons for our local church, for, as goes the congregation in the individual community, so goes the whole great church. In the first place this early group had a conviction, Christ was alive in the world; great spiritual forces lay about them, available forces, spiritual power, spiritual guidance was theirs for the asking, for the receiving, constantly they lived in the light of that streamed from the face of Jesus Christ. They had faith to believe that truth is able to win its way into the world; a faith in love, in the use of forgiveness, good will, understanding for the building of a better world. They believed in one another, for there was but one heart and soul in the multitude who had become believers, they shared everything they had with one another; they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and fearlessly uttered God's message. The Woman's Society of Christian Service is trying to recapture some of the early church's spirit, through the study of the Book of Acts.

Why should every woman serve the local church? Because it stands for God and her relation to others, for the training of the young, for the comforting ministry to the sad and sick, for the well being of the underprivileged, for an expression of her love to God, because in thus serving I fulfill one of the pledges made when I joined the church, "To uphold it with my prayers, my presence, my gifts and my service."

Where? Each one can find some place where her service will count effectively. How? Not all of us can be as the world counts greatness, but each can be faithful to her task; she can give consistently to the church as a part of her regular budget, keeping in mind that its institutions of mercy, its missionary work, its educational programs are but the expressions of that which lies at the heart of christianity; and my local church is my responsibility.

There is a personal work to be done. It is our duty and privilege to have an adequate program of friendship and fellowship that will seek by every legitimate means to win the co-operation of the last woman in our membership and constituency. No one is too much of a shut-in, by illness, disability, family, work, or inclination to be excluded from our effort; which is truly evangelism.

To face the challenges and opportunities of this day, the women of the conference have an abiding faith, a concern for people, a knowledge of problems, definite methods and definite plans for actions, and a willingness to work and share.

The work of the conference has improved over last year, for which we are thankful. The Ministers are more interested, and co-operative. We reported 202 societies last year. This year 249, an increase of 45; 40 inactive ones activated and 5 new ones. The children's work has greatly improved but the Young People's work is still tralling; yet we are hopeful.

A message from each of the District Presidents will give you some of the high-lights of their activities.

DOVER DISTRICT: Mrs. Estelle Nichols. The Children's work is taking on new life. We have been fortunate to have three of our Conference Officers, the Children's Secretary, Secretary of Promotion and the President, who gave us help and inspiration. North Berlin Woman's Society of Christian Service, gave an "Old Oxford Tea" in December. Mrs. Kelly Jackson of the Washington Conference was the guest speaker. This affair was well attended. The Woman's Society and laymen of the District gave our District Superintendent and Bride a wedding reception on Dec. 6, 1951 which was largely attended. Our Quarterly meetings have been glorious. Rev. J. O. Lockman has conducted Hymn Sings at two of these. Every one was richly blessed. A fine spirit of co-operation prevails on the district.

EASTON DISTRICT: Mrs. Mable Cooper. We have gained 43 new members, 29 of which were direct result of the Progressive Visitation; only 6 societies have reported having completed the Visitation. We had 132 enrolled in the approved study courses. The books were Latin America, The Family A Christian Concern and the Book of Acts. The Children and Youth work have increased, but with room for improvement. The Christian Social Relations and Local Church Activity secretaries are active in the churches and communities.

PHILADELPHIA DISTRICT: Mrs. Margaret Trader. There are 30 societies, one new this year. 147 new members for the Woman's Society of Christian Service and 19 new members for W. S. G. Total membership including the W. S. G. 2,504. The district has one 100% Society, every woman of the church a member of the society. The church, Butler Memorial, Bronx, N. Y. Five societies received Jurisdiction Recognition for approved study

classes. There were 159 enrolled in classes. Subscriptions to the Methodist Woman 410; to the World Outlook 147; held two Missionary Rallies in New York and Philadelphia areas. The speaker, Mrs. Vivian Newton Gray, returned missionary from Liberia, Africa. The district pledged financial support toward helping to buy a generator for the people of Africa. The formation of a district "Atmosphere Committee" has been proved to be a great help. There is more interest shown in the district meetings, increased attendance, information received has been impressive and lasting. At a district meeting an "Information Please Hour" for the reports, given by the district officers. It was a telephone conversation, between the district secretary of promotion and the district officers. Each officer was called and asked questions about her work, showing just what is being done in the local societies. Long distance calls were received by the district secretary of promotion, from the Executive Secretary of the Division and from the Conference. This method saved time, avoided lengthy reports, kept the listeners interested and made the facts more likely to be remembered.

SALISBURY DISTRICT: Mrs. Anna Maddox. The district has shown a decided improvement in the work this year; with 30 societies reporting a membership of 855; two inactive societies were made active through visitation; 17 societies put over the Progressive Visitation Plan very successfully. Two of our Conference officers, Mrs. Emma Strother and Mrs. Marlouise Hudson visited our district and brought information and inspiration. The District meetings have been well attended. Our district is divided into sub-district groups. The workers are doing a grand job.

WILMINGTON DISTRICT: Mrs. Cleo Henry. We have 34 societies, all charges organized, 29 active and 5 inactive. Three district meetings have been held and four executive meetings. The Annual meeting will be held May 22, 1952, at Elkton, Md. Two Seminars were held at Salem, N. J. and Haven, Wilmington, Del. conducted by Mrs. Mary H. Whitten, which was helpful to all. On Aug. 18, 1951 at Fordsville, N. J., Mrs. H. P. Fox brought an interesting report on the Ecumenical Conference, held at Oxford, England. Our Children's work is improving. We are receiving reports from 16 secretaries, four new this year. The Youth Work is not being reported.

The Wesleyan Service Guild is not a part from the Woman's Society of Christian Service, but a part of, and we are working together as a unit and the Conference Secretary of the Wesleyan Service Guild is Miss Wilma Gaines. Two new guilds have been organized, one at Stevensville, Md. and Fruitland, Md. on the Easton and the Salisbury districts respectively. There are 20 Guilds with a membership of 351. The summer saw Guild week-ends everywhere and our conference Guild went week-ending at Delaware State College, Dover, Del.; 50 guests studied, played and fellowshiped there. The morning watch was one of the outstanding features. The Superintendent of the Dover District, Rev. D. L. Ridout and Mrs. O. H. Spence, Conference President brought the meditations. The bedtime worship services were another feature. Mrs. Mary A. Stewart, former president of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, brought an inspirational address. Members of the Newark and Montclair Guilds attended the Newark Conference Guild at Centenary Junior College, Hackettstown, N. J. The guilds in the Philadelphia area attended the Philadelphia Conference Guild week-end

at Beaver College, Jenkintown, Pa. This year the week-end will be held at Maryland State College, Princess Anne, Md., July 18, 19 and 20, 1952. All are invited to attend.

The Philadelphia District held its Annual Guild Day at Tindley Temple. The Supply work worth \$652.76 was exhibited. One Guild has furnished the kitchen in their church at a cost of \$1,000, another a rest-room at a cost of \$720. Another gave the trustees \$200; another a mimeographing machine at a cost of \$300; still another gave four tables for the dining room, others are doing as well. A Guild is a valuable asset to a church as these facts show.

SUMMARY: All the 249 societies are working but some have not learned the art of reporting so therefore they do not get credit for work done. Total membership of the conference is 6,276 including the W. S. G., with 789 subscriptions to the Methodist Woman and 254 to the World Outlook. May God bless each woman as she works to become one of His stars.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

Bishop and members of the Delaware Conference, it is again my privilege to report to you the state of our Conference Lay Work.

Men Work. For the past four years we have stressed Methodist Men's work, to date, we have 56 chartered groups and fifty or more old chartered men's groups not paid to date. It is still our hope that we renew charter's of all these groups in our local churches, and charter those that have never been chartered.

It will mean so much if we can get them chartered so that they will receive all the available help that the General Board can give them.

When a group is chartered, you know what every chartered group in the church is doing. You get an idea of how to win men from others. Then, you have a oneness of purpose. This is the only way whereby a local church can mobilize man power to a great degree. We need to do just that in the local church.

I would like for each local church this year that is not organized to organize a Methodist Men's Group. This is the duty of the Pastor, official board, and the local lay leader to organize this group. This organization

will pay dividends in any church with the proper leadership. This should be the "Pastor's Pet Group." We can not win young men to Christ unless we win older men. This is the churches weakest point, and the church is no stronger than its weakest point.

Lay Leadership

Lay leadership is growing fast in our local churches. We are beginning to feel its impact on our church. Our ministers tell me that they can plan in their official boards, and key persons in official positions are leading in working the plans. Pastors can feel at ease more and more each year. That is the object of the General Board of Lay Activities, to deepen each lay member's spiritual life until he or she becomes a working force in the church.

Training Official Boards

The training of official boards is the key note to success in the local church. Your greatest drawback in any local church is uninformed officials in your official board. Your officials may not know their work when elected, but they should be trained. That is accomplished by reading your discipline or studying it together in your official board, or having special classes for such, "that will pay dividends." A church is no stronger than its weakest official.

"The Growing Interest in Laymen"

It is gratifying to see the growing interest in our laymen. When a special meeting is called at an annual conference, or mid-year annual meeting, it is expected to see three or four hundred present and their pastors. We are more than grateful for this progress. This progress is due to the fact that laymen are anxious to learn and serve.

May I take this opportunity to thank our understanding Bishop Alexander P. Shaw and his cooperative District Superintendents and energetic pastors for their cooperative spirit. May God continue his blessings upon us this ensuing year.

May we pray, that those holding official positions who have not availed themselves with the opportunity of attending the Annual Conference and mid-year annual meeting will make a sacrifice to do so this year. I am sure we will be able to help one another.

"Lay Speaking or Preaching"

This is nothing new laymen; this was in the beginning of Methodism. Mr. Wesley started the early church with lay preachers, Asbury, Charley Wesley, Robert Strawbridge, and Philip Embury, and many others were Lay Preachers. Even Jesus and all of his disciples were lay preachers full of his spirit. Well, the General Conference has said to us this quadrennial to certify lay speakers. We want to make this phase of our work a must this year. Therefore, we will have this year an executive secretary of lay speaking on each district to encourage this phase of our work who will report to the conference secretary of lay speaking. We want to have laymen, who will be able to speak on every phase of our church life.

Young Adults

This has been one of our weaknesses in our lay work. We hope to have such a program this quadrennial that will reach our young adults. They are our present and future church. We hope our speakers bureau will be built up largely around them.

Lay Evangelism

We have had a glorious time in this field of our church life. Laymen have gone out side by side with our ministers on special efforts and won men and women for Christ. One of the great joys of my life was an experience we had this year at Wilmington, Delaware when about thirty of us went out two by two in the Dunleaf Project and won more than two hundred persons to the Methodist Church, which will soon be built on the grounds of the project.

It is not new! Jesus did it that way, John Wesley did it that way, we are doing it that way. Let each local church stress Lay Evangelism throughout the year.

I think it is fitting and proper that I should pay tribute to a great preacher whose heart and soul was in Lay Evangelism, our own, Dr. Howard R. Coleman. He so often talked to the writer what a layman could do to win men and women to Christ. Let us not disappoint him.

What I Owe to Laymen

I can never express my deep appreciation for what you, my fellow laymen and ministers have been to me. If I have meant anything to my church and whatever I am, I owe it to the faithful ministers and laymen. May God bless you and may we have many more happy days of working together in the building of God's Church.

RECOMMENDATIONS FROM ANNUAL CONFERENCE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

WHEREAS, there are any number of unexplored fields in which Methodism should be operating; we beg to make the following recommendations to become effective during the ensuing quadrennium:

1. In the light of the many New and Improved Churches that have been encouraged and wonderfully aided financially by the PROMOTIONAL FUND that was instituted by our retiring Bishop, A. P. Shaw.

We recommend that such worthy institution be continued during the ensuing quadrennium, and the Fund be placed under the CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS, for allocation and supervision at the discretion of the Annual Conference Board of Home Missions and Church Extension with the assistance of the Bishop and members of the Cabinet. (See Par. 1295).

2. We recommend, that the "Dunleith Suburban Estates," located in New Castle County, Wilmington, Delaware, CHURCH BUILDING PROJECT,

which was on the mind and heart of the late Dr. H. R. Coleman, of the Wilmington District; who came to an untimely and most tragic death by accidental drowning at 7:30 P. M. March 24, 1952, in the Delaware River.

That the "DUNLEITH" building project be supported by the PROMOTIONAL FUND and be placed in the PREFERENTIAL CLASS FOR FUND Allocation and support.

3. We further recommend, that the Migrant Work Fund, that has been allocated to the Migrant Work and Workers in the Camps that operate within the bounds of the Delaware Conference be continued; so long as such work is promoted by the National Council of Churches of America. This Fund to remain under the supervision of the Conference Board of Missions.

We recommend, finally, that all benevolences for Migrant Work, Church Aid and Missions, Promotional Fund and Maintenance be placed under the Supervision of the Board.

Obituary

HOWARD RAEFIELD COLEMAN

Howard Raefield Coleman, son of the late Reverend T. B. H. and Mary Elizabeth Coleman, was born in a Methodist parsonage at Wittman, Maryland, where his father was then pastor, on July 4, 1891.

On April 3, 1917, he was united in holy wedlock to Miss Effie Brummell, of Fairmount, Maryland. To this happy union six children were born: Howard Raefield, Jr., who died in infancy; Mary Elizabeth, William Fletcher, Anna Beatrice, John Wesley, and Lillian Frances.

After receiving his early education in the public schools of Maryland, in young manhood, Howard gained employment in Philadelphia, and, after becoming of age, completed his high school education by correspondence. However, possessed with that brilliance of intellect which was a particular endowment of his family, his educational development was far beyond the scope of his actual schooling.

In Philadelphia, he was engaged in business and served as a local preacher in East Calvary Methodist Church—now Tindley Temple—under the pastorate of the late Dr. Charles Albert Tindley. After supplying at Hudson, New York, he was admitted to the Delaware Conference in 1923, and was assigned to Haddonfield, New Jersey—the charge now known as Grenloch and Rhodes. In 1927 he completed the conference course of study.

He was an immediate success in the pastorate. He served at Haddonfield four years; Quinton and Springtown, New Jersey, one year; Mount Zion, Philadelphia, 13 years, and Janes, Germantown, six years.

He will be known as the "man who made Mount Zion." For during his ministry the church arose from a store-front mission to one of the larger churches in Philadelphia. In 1947 he was appointed superintendent of the Wilmington District, by Bishop Alexander Preston Shaw . . . In 1948, Campbell College, an African Methodist Episcopal Church school, awarded him the degree of doctor of divinity, in recognition of his outstanding service in the Christian ministry.

Howard Coleman was an evangelist by nature. He had a consuming passion to lead men to Christ, and experienced great ingatherings of souls in all the churches he served. It was inevitable that he should become the president of the Delaware Conference Board of Evangelism, and a member of the General Board of Evangelism of the Methodist Church. In this capacity he brought distinction to his conference and contributed largely to the current revival movement which is sweeping over our Methodism.

Just two weeks before his untimely passing, he led a highly successful conference-wide institute on Visitation Evangelism, in Ezion Church, Wilmington. We can never forget his enthusiastic promotion of the effort to establish a Methodist Church in the new Dunleith Project in that city, and it should be the prayer of us all that when this dream is fulfilled, the church will stand as a monument to his consecrated effort.

On Monday night, March 24th, tragedy overcame him and he met his death in the chilly waters of the Delaware River, at Bridgeport, New Jersey, in the most shocking accident in Delaware Conference history.

It is not ours to question why a great evangelistic and passionate preacher of the gospel and defender of the Faith should meet his end so suddenly and so tragically. We only know that the promises of our God are still unfulfilling and that His Grace is sufficient to sustain his loved ones and his colleagues of the ministry who are left to carry on:

"Fear not, I am with thee, O be not dismayed,
For I am thy God, and will still give thee aid,
I'll strengthen thee, help thee, and cause thee to stand,
Upheld by my gracious, omnipotent Hand.

"When through the deep waters I call thee to go,
The rivers of woe shall not thee overflow,
For I will be with thee, thy troubles to bless,
And sanctify to thee thy deepest distress."

Surviving our brother and friend are: His wife, Mrs. Effie Coleman; five children, Mrs. Mary E. Tucker, a social worker in Philadelphia; William Fletcher, master sergeant at the Westover Air Base, Massachusetts; Annie Beatrice, a teacher in the high school at Turners Station, Maryland; John Wesley, a prelaw student at Temple University, Philadelphia, and Lillian Frances, a graduate in the January 1952 class of Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina; three brothers, Thomas B. H., Jr., of Baltimore; John Brown Coleman, of Philadelphia, and Ollie Coleman, of Parsonsburg, Maryland; and four sisters, Mrs. Ada Jenkins, an effective local preacher of Ezion Church, Wilmington; Misses Marie and Pauline Coleman, teachers in the Wilmington school system, and Mrs. Beatrice Burley, of Baltimore. There are also four grandchildren and numerous other relatives and countless friends.

"Let us be patient: these severe afflictions
Not from the ground arise,
But oftentimes celestial benedictions
Assume this dark disguise.

"He is not dead, the one of our affection,
But gone unto that school
Where he no longer needs our poor protection,
And Christ Himself doth rule."

Finally, to sum up the message of this Easter Season when we lay his body in its final resting place: "DEATH IS SWALLOWED UP IN VICTORY. THE STING OF DEATH IS SIN, AND THE STRENGTH OF SIN IS THE LAW—BUT THANKS BE TO GOD, WHO GIVETH US THE VICTORY THROUGH OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST."

The Reverend Owen Samuel Edwards, son of the late Samuel Owen and Esther Edwards, was born in Antigua, British West Indies Island, December 23, 1906. At an early age he acknowledged Christ as his Saviour and Lord, and decided to enter the Christian Ministry.

In preparation for this sacred task, Brother Edwards sought thorough academic preparation. In 1930 he was graduated from the College of Liberal Arts in Howard University with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. DAVID HENRY HARGIS

He received the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity June 4, 1919 from Morgan College; the degree of Doctor of Law from the Delaware State College. He was awarded the degree of Doctor of Divinity 1920 and Ph. D. 1925 from Midland University Seminary of Science, Chicago.

He was a trustee of Princess Anne College until it became a State College, and was Trustee of Morgan College until it became Morgan State College. Served six years as Conference Treasurer.

On June 15th he suffered a heart attack in Wilmington, but rallied satisfactorily. Moving to Chance, Md., continued active until on Friday, Sept. 21, he developed pneumonia. He died Saturday at 5:45 P. M. on Sept. 22.

He was married on May 2, 1906 to Miss Hattie Rebecca Waters. The officiating clergy were the late Rev. Noah W. Moore, Sr. and the late Rev. Pezaviah O'Connell. The ceremony took place in the parsonage at Cottage Grove, near Westover.

He was a delegate to the General Conference in 1920, in 1928, in 1932, in 1936; he was a delegate to the Uniting Conference in 1939; Delegate to the General Conference in 1940; the Jurisdictional Conference in 1944; to the Ecumenical Conference, Atlanta, Ga. 1931.

He is survived by his devoted wife, 3 nieces, Mrs. Helen Waters, Mrs. Wm. Ballard, Mrs. Almira Fuller; 3 nephews, Edison, Joseph and Reginald Victory. There are 3 great nieces, 7 great nephews, other relatives.

He was a considerate husband, making ample provisions for his family. His wife shared his work and his confidence. Theirs was a divine partnership in labors of love for Christ and His Church. He was a man who pursued what he believed to be right, having the courage of his convictions. He was ardent and tireless in the faithful performance of his duties, whether as pastor or as an administrator. He was a patron of higher learning and maintained an award for deserving students in Princess Anne College and Maryland State College from 1894-1951. He is remembered for the service rendered in support of the Morgan College Crusade 1924. He was generous in his gifts to causes large or small. He was faithful even unto death.

Rules of Order

OF THE DELAWARE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Rule I. The President shall decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Conference; but in case of such appeal, the question shall be taken without debate.

Rule II. He shall appoint all committees not otherwise specially ordered by the Conference.

Rule III. On assigning the floor to any member of Conference, he shall distinctly announce the name of the member to whom he assigns it.

Rule IV. All motions or resolutions introduced by any member shall be presented in writing, if the President, Secretary, or any two members request it.

Rule V. When a motion or resolution is moved and seconded, or a report is presented, and is read by the Secretary, or stated by the President, it shall be deemed in possession of the Conference; but any motion or resolution may be withdrawn by the mover, with the consent of Conference, at any time before amendment or decision.

Rule VI. The motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, to take from the table, or for the previous question, shall be taken without debate.

Rule VII. No new motion, or resolution shall be entertained until the one under consideration has been disposed of, which may be done by adoption or rejection, unless one of the following motions shall intervene, which shall have precedence in the order in which they are here placed, namely: (1) To fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn. (2) To adjourn. (3) To lay on the table. (4) For the previous question. (5) To postpone to a given time. (6) To refer to a committee. (7) Substitute. (8) Amendment. (9) To postpone indefinitely.

Rule VIII. A substitute or amendment may be amended.

Rule IX. When any member is about to speak in debate, or to deliver any matter to the Conference, he shall rise and respectfully address the President.

Rule X. No member shall be interrupted when speaking, except by the President to call him to order when he departs from the question, or uses personalities or disrespectful language; but any member may call the attention of the President to the subject when he deems a speaker out of order, and any member may explain if he thinks himself misrepresented.

Rule XI. No person shall speak more than twice on the same question, nor more than fifteen minutes at one time, without leave of the Conference; nor shall any person speak more than once until every member choosing to speak shall have spoken.

Rule XII. When any motion or resolution shall have been acted upon by the Conference it shall be in order for any member who voted with the prevailing side to move a reconsideration; but a motion to reconsider a non-debatable motion shall be decided without debate.

Rule XIII. No member shall absent himself from the service of the Conference without leave, unless he is sick or unable to attend.

Rule XIV. No member shall be allowed to vote on any question who is not within the bar at the time when such question is put by the President, except by leave of the Conference, when such member has been necessarily absent.

Rule XV. Every member who is within the bar at the time the question is put shall give his vote, unless the Conference, for special reasons excuse him.

Rule XVI. It shall be in order for any member to call for the yeas and nays in any question before the Conference; and, if the call be sustained by twenty-five members present the vote thereon shall be taken by yeas and nays.

Rule XVII. It shall be in order to move that the question shall be taken without further debate, on any measure pending before the Conference, except in cases where character or Conference relations are involved; and is sustained by a two-third vote, the question shall be so taken; nevertheless, it shall be in order under this rule to move to recommit, to divide or to lay on the table after the previous question has been ordered.

Rule XVIII. The motion to adjourn shall be taken without debate, and shall always be in order, except (1) when a member has the floor; (2) when a question is actually put, or vote is being taken; (3) when a question is pending on sustaining the demand for the previous question; (4) when the previous question has been called and sustained, and action under it is still pending; (5) when a motion to adjourn has been negatived, and no business or debate has intervened; and (6) when a motion to fix the time to which the Conference shall adjourn is pending or shall be made.

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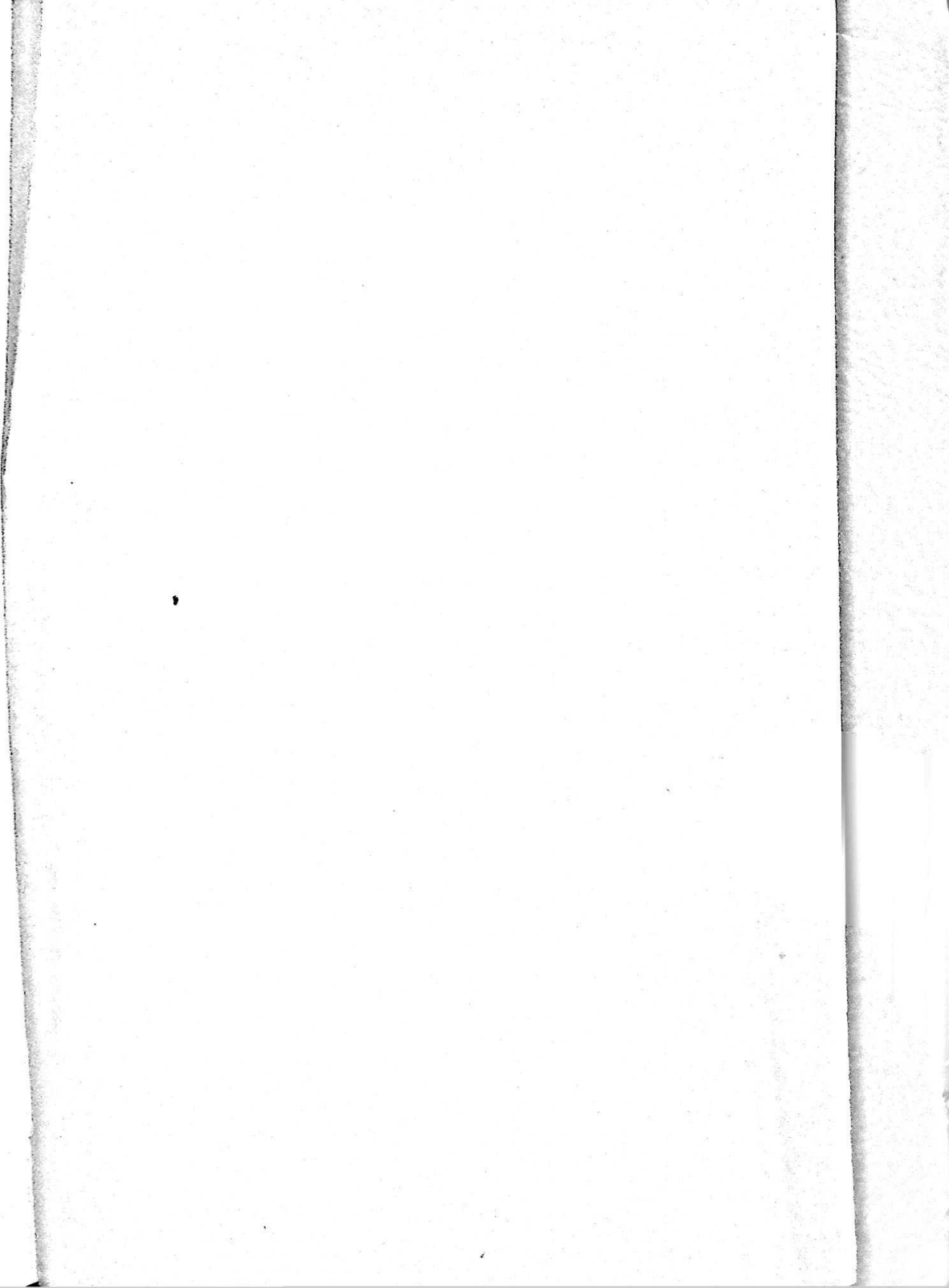
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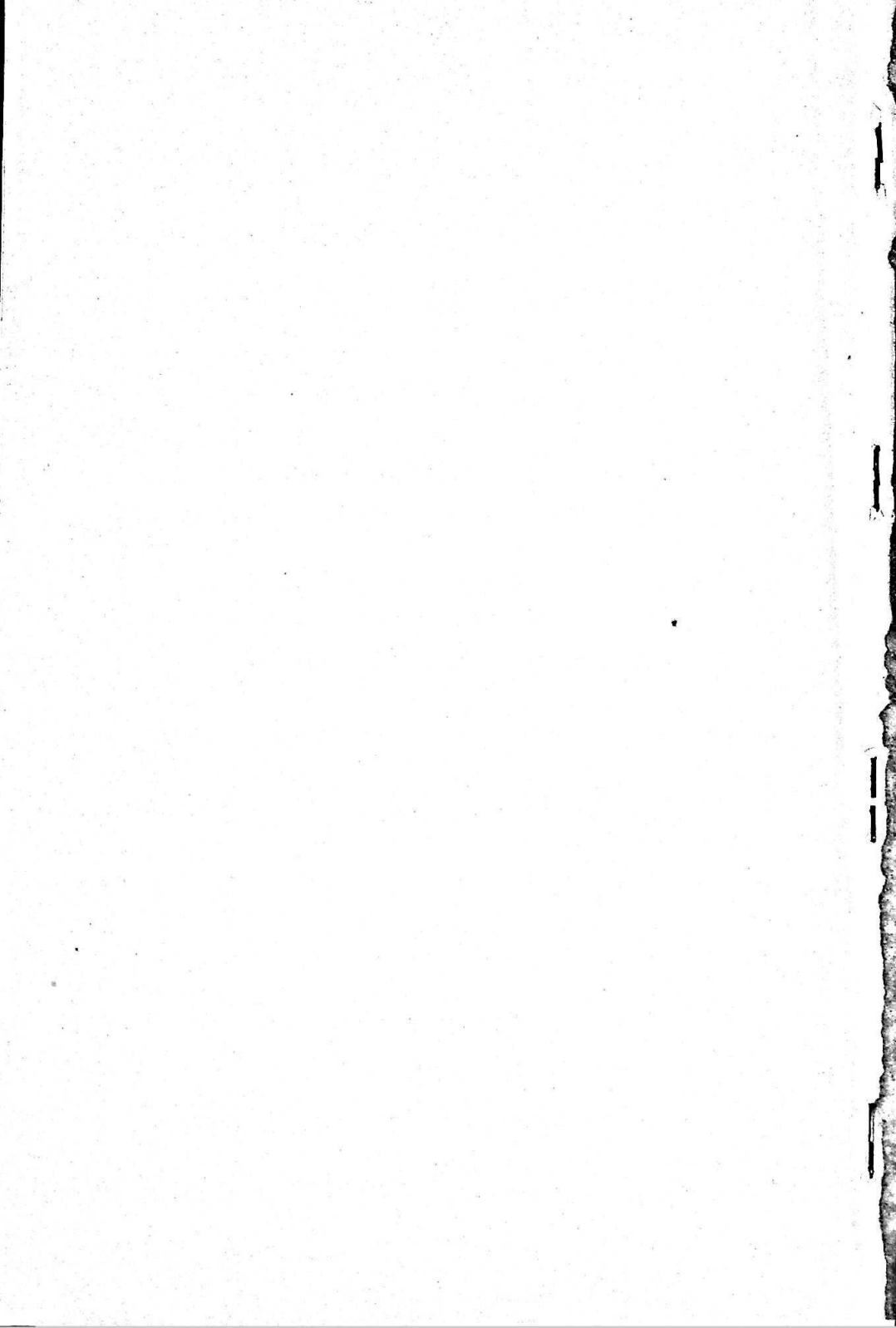
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The building is constructed of granite stone and is strictly fire proof. The cost is approximately \$150,000 including equipment and furniture. The Chapel will seat approximately 400 and is equipped with modern church pews and a Hammond Electric Organ.
